Car theft plague touches Northville

Northville is not immune to the auto theft craze that has racked the metro Detroit area in recent months.

Five vehicles reportedly were stolen here in the past two weeks, but violence associated with some of the Detroit thefts has not strongly impacted the community, according to Northville Township police.

Three car thefts last week in Northville Township hiked the 1991 total to 26, according to police records. No car thefts have been reported yet this year in the city.

A 1988 Chrysler LeBaron convertible reportedly was stolen from the Ridge/Powell driveway late Aug. 29 or early Aug. 30. The vehicle was owned by a Detroit firm and was being used by a Plymouth man prior to the theft, township police said.

Plymouth Township police recovered the car Aug. 30 near the Ridge/Powell intersection. Its windshield was smashed and the radio stolen, police said.

Two vehicles reportedly were stolen Aug. 31 from the Meijer store at 20401 Haggerty. Police said a 1988 GMC pickup was stolen from the Meijer lot sometime between 3:30 and 4:20 p.m.,

and a 1984 Mercury Cougar reportedly was stolen from the lot in front of Meijer's garden section between 8:30-10 p.m.

The pickup was valued at \$5,500, said the owner, a South Lyon woman. The owner of the Cougar, a Detroit woman, estimated her car's value at \$3,000.

No one was injured in last week's thefts, and police have no suspects in any of the cases.

The Meijer lot in particular offers car thieves a wide variety of potential targets, a township police official said Tuesday.

"For a thief, there's good pickings at Meijer," said Capt. Philip Presnell.

Presnell said police have noticed a "huge increase" in car thefts from the Meijer lot over the past few years. And theft rings know the Meijer lot houses both big-ticket and low-budget vehicles.

Expensive models such as Chevrolet Suburbans and GMC Jimmys appeal to car thieves, as do Corvettes and Camaros. But thieves may also cast an eye at more modest vehicles, due to a growing demand for older car parts, Presnell said.

Cars such as the Detroit woman's Mercury Cougar could easily be stolen and stripped or "parted out," police say.

"Unscrupulous locations (could be) stealing older cars for parts," Presnell said. He also said

"clandestine repair" businesses could be involved with car thefts to avoid insurance companies.

Car owners can take some precautions to keep their vehicle from winding up in the wrong hands. Presnell said cars should be parked in locked garages at night, if possible, and homeowners should use "significant exterior lighting" including motion-activated lights to discourage thieves.

Thefts are more likely to occur at high-risk areas such as parking lots, Presnell said. For those areas, commercial car alarms can be effective anti-theft tools, as can wheel locks and kill switches, he said.

Presnell even suggested that car owners use secondary vehicles when visiting potentially risky businesses or high-crime areas.

Northville Township and city each have committed a police officer to the Western Wayne Auto Theft Unit, a consortium that investigates local car theft-related operations, Presnell said.

"We may never stop them, but we sure can deter them," Presnell said.

Car thieves apparently have bypassed Northville City so far this year, with no vehicles reported stolen and only one attempted theft. A man who left his unlocked car at McDonald Ford, 550 W. Seven Mile Road, June 20 returned at the end of the day to find the unlocked car's ignition switch broken.

Hospital patient dies of apparent drug overdose

A 36-year-old patient at Northville Psychiatric Regional Hospital died Friday morning after injecting himself with an unknown "institutional medication," according to state police.

Ricky Mears, a longtime patient of the hospital, was found at about 6 a.m. "laying quietly on his bed," said Michigan State Police Det. Sgt. Dean Sanderson. A final determination of the cause of Mears' death will come with a toxicology report from the Wayne County Medical Examiner's office in about three weeks, he said.

Sanderson, who is conducting an investigation of the matter, added that Mears' death doesn't appear to be a homicide.

"Evidence at the scene doesn't appear to be consistent with homicide," he said. "There was no sign of a physical struggle and there were no injuries to (Mears) body."

Early indications are that the 36-year-old's death also wasn't a suicide. Sanderson said Mears left no note or had not talked of suicide with anyone at the hospital.

Mears shared his room at the institution with three other patients. Two patients were asleep in the ward room when his body was found.

Sanderson said two syringes, one empty and the other full of Thorazine, a tranquilizer used in certain mental disorders, were found on the bed near Mears. He said the thorazine syringe had no needle attached to it.

"Indications are that (the institutional drugs) were gathered from the facility," Sanderson said.

The detective added that it's unclear how Mears obtained the drugs. Sanderson said it will be for the medical examiner to distinguish between the prescribed and illegally obtained medications that were in Mears' bloodstream at the time of his death.

Word manages a different style

Gary Word has managed Northville City Hall for a mere two months, but already the Missouri native is leaving his mark as an open, organized administrator.

Word replaced Steven Walters, who left after a 17-year stint to become Plymouth City Manager June 1.

The new Northville manager has begun holding regular meetings with the city's department heads and has instituted a new form for reports to the city council, called "Council Communications." Each report describes an item's background, analyzes its implications, and recommends a course of action for the council.

Also, council reports are now prepared by the department heads involved rather than the manager himself, and then reviewed by the manager.

Word said he hopes the staff reports answer one simple question.

"Are we doing the job necessary to help the outsider to know what's going on inside here? If not, I want to know about it," he said.

"That's the only way I know how to do it," Word said. "Steve did a good job here and he deserves all the credit in the world, but I'm not Steve Walters. I think we'll get to the same destination in the end, just using a different approach."

Even the language Word wants used in reports differs from those written by Walters, referring to "City Staff" instead of the manager himself.

Word said the language differences reflect a difference in management style between the two men.

"One thing I've tried to impress on my staff is to use the third person, 'the staff,' 'the city council,' rather

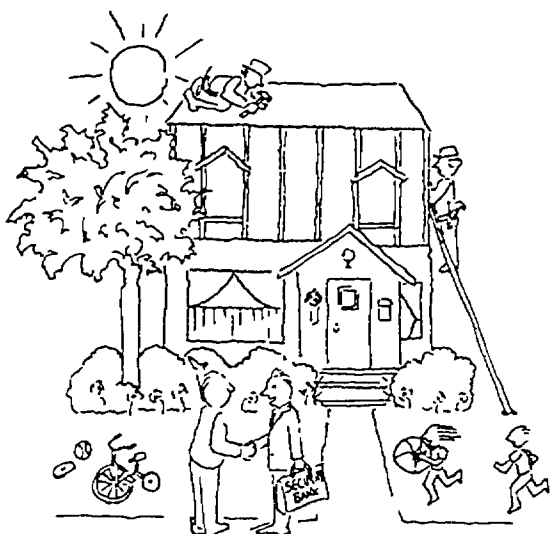

Word, Walters keep the line open

Northville's current city manager, Gary Word, admits that he does not run city hall in quite the same way as his predecessor, Steven Walters.

But their differing styles do not mean that the former and current manager do not work well with each other.

"Fortunately, Steve and I have a good relationship," Word said. The continuing relationship has been valuable to the former South St. Paul administrator, who even bought Walters' house when he

moved his family here from Minnesota.

Word already has had to learn the history of the city's proposed expansion of the Cady Street parking deck, and Walters has helped with that process.

"He's . . . been very helpful in reviewing the parking deck history," Word said.

Walters has also been retained as a computer consultant "on an as-needed basis," and will be paid \$35 an hour for troubleshooting the city's computer programs when problems arise. The task is necessary because many of the city's prog-

rams were designed and written by Walters himself.

The former city manager has already been called in during a recent election to access the city's list of registered voters.

"We've kind of formulated a temporary relationship with the computer system," Word said. "This is a Walters computer system for all practical purposes. And I think we'd be foolish not to take advantage of (his expertise), if he's willing to do that . . . He obviously has Northville's interests at heart."

than "I and we-isms," he said. "I think the intent, really, is that we're all in this together, we're all part of a team . . . It doesn't matter who did what in the organization, at least at the level it's being presented. It's an attempt to depersonalize things to some extent, to make things more professional."

It's also an attempt to turn more responsibility over to other staff members, rather than running the city single-handedly.

"I believe in hiring good people and when you do, hold them accountable but . . . let them go, let them do their jobs," Word said. "I want to be communicated with, I want to know what's going on, but I want them to do their thing."

"I think Steve's approach was much more centralized. He made the decisions and told them (staff members) what to do."

Word now meets before city council meetings with department heads

who have items on the council's upcoming agenda, and with all department heads after every city council meeting. The meetings include the head of the assessing, building, clerks, finance, fire, housing, library, police, public works and recreation departments.

The new meeting schedule was outlined in a July memorandum to all department heads, in which Word noted that the post-council meetings will allow the staff to review the council's actions, discuss other city business, provide staff training and development, and "address problems and provide mutual support."

The change in style has not been lost on the rest of the city staff. Clerk Cathy Konrad said Word's ways have been a marked change from Walters' style.

"I worked with Steve for so long, I forgot that there's other management styles out there," Konrad said.

Word encourages more involvement by staff members, Konrad said. "He's got some good ideas as far as

following up and having the staff make reports to council, doing the background investigations and being more involved," she said. "It makes it a lot more interesting around here. You don't just have your little circle, you're involved with others more."

"It makes you active as a group rather than just thinking of your own department."

Not that Walters would not communicate with his staff, Konrad said. "He'd meet with you individually, and you could go in to talk to him at any time," she said. "Steve was able to make it (that management style) work for him."

"He was always real involved with the departments, whereas Gary seems to want you to do the background investigations and be more involved."

Deputy Clerk Tonni Burns agreed that the new style has resulted in more interaction between the city's departments. "All around, I think that the level of communication has

improved," she said. "The right hand is starting to know what the left hand is doing."

Word's changes may also help address concerns raised by the city's auditors earlier this year.

A study in March by the auditing firm Plante & Moran found the city manager's workload "excessive," and warned that Walters' estimated 65- to 88-hour work week could lead to "a tendency toward crisis management (i.e., getting the immediate need satisfied as opposed to future / proactive planning)" and "insufficient time to adequately document key management processes (i.e., such as documentation related to automated systems which have been developed by the City Manager)."

The auditors recommended that the city hire a deputy city manager, develop improved financial reports, and "establish a monthly meeting process designed to provide a forum for interdepartmental communication."



Hospital Director Walter Brown said Mears had been in and out of the Northville facility for more than 10 years. He had been readmitted within the past few months, he said.

Brown declined to divulge Mears' diagnosis, but did say that he qualified for admission under state mental health guidelines. The hospital is conducting its own investigation, he said, to determine how Mears obtained the medications.

"Whenever there is an unusual event," Brown said, "we conduct our own investigation."

Charges in the case, if any, will be determined after the toxicology report is in, Sanderson said.

"If we find reason to believe it was homicide or there was criminal negligence involved," he said, "the case would be submitted to the prosecutor's office."

No evidence of criminal negligence currently exists, Sanderson said. For criminal negligence to be charged, he added, someone at the hospital would have to have done or not done something that facilitated Mears' death.

Mears had been confined to his ward for "the better part of a month" before his death, Sanderson said. The restriction was placed on Mears because he had broken windows at the facility and showed other aggressive tendencies, he said.

The Michigan Department of Mental Health's office of recipient patient rights is also investigating the case. Sanderson said that investigation will be separate from the state police probe.

Township budget review dates have yet to be set

The names are known of those who will review Northville Township's proposed \$4.05-million 1992 budget.

The setting—Northville Township Hall, 41600 Six Mile Road—is secure.

Even the mission—recommend cuts of at least \$83,000 from the proposed budget before Nov. 1—is clear.

What's not known is when budget cutters will get down to work.

"We haven't confirmed yet" dates for budget review committee sessions, said township Treasurer Betty Lennox on Tuesday.

Lennox—who will be joined on the review committee by township Manager Richard Henningsen, Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan, Deputy Treasurer Jack Hosmer, and residents Frank St. Louis, Wes Henriksen, and John Sassaman—said review sessions likely will be scheduled before the end of the week.

Lennox said review sessions will

be held at township hall during regular business hours to take advantage of record and department head availability.

The public may observe the review sessions, but the primary goal of the seven-member panel is to search for areas to whittle in the proposed 1992 budget.

Review committee members gen-

erally ask individual department heads for an accounting of their budget requests before recommending cuts to the township board at a late October budget adoption session.

The township board must adopt a balanced budget by Nov. 1, according to state law.

Township revenues for 1992 are expected to top \$3.92 million. To avoid a budget deficit, the board must accept cuts of just over \$83,000. In addition, the township may desire to build a fund balance—or budget buffer—of up to \$100,000, creating some potentially tough calls for budget review and board members.

Local SIBIS case still unsettled

The issue of whether a developmentally disabled Westland teenager will wear an electric shock device in Northville schools was expected to be resolved this summer.

But Susan Phelan, the student's mother, chose not to sign her son's individual educational plan, which prohibits the use of the shock device in Northville schools. Every special education student receives a plan. Under normal circumstances, a parent is required to sign the plan within seven days.

Terry Phelan is a special education student attending a Northville program at Bryant School in Livonia. He has a disorder that causes him to hit himself in the head. At times he has hit himself in excess of 100 times per minute.

At issue is the use of a Self-Injurious Behavior Inhibiting System used to curb behavior like that exhibited by Terry. The SIBIS is a head-band prescribed by a neurologist. The device administers an 85-volt shock when its wearer receives a blow to the head. Susan Phelan likened the shot to a pin prick.

"We give our kids immunization shots to protect them," Susan Phelan said. "He had to go through that pain to live better in the future. Nobody has given him consequences for his behavior."

Susan Phelan sought out a doctor who had prescribed the device in the past after Terry's original doctor pre-

scribed medications that made her son have seizures, and his original neurologist suggested a lobotomy.

Northville school administrators refused to allow Terry to wear the device in school.

The case was taken to a Michigan Department of Education hearing officer who ruled the device was not illegal but inappropriate if alternatives were available.

Northville had until the end of the school year to show alternative methods of treatment were working.

District officials claim Terry's behavior has been curbed to the extent expected. Susan Phelan said Terry might be doing well at school, but at home he still hits himself.

And lately, she said, he has taken to poking himself in the eye.

"The experts on both sides give conflicting reports," she said.

"I'm in a position where I'm just a parent. I'm not a professional. I just know what I have observed, and I don't think he has improved as much as they said he would."

In the past school year, two experts were brought to Northville from New York on a monthly basis to work with Terry, said Northville Executive Director for Special Education Leonard Rezmierski.

Terry was videotaped three times a week in three different curriculum areas for at least 60 minutes. In November, a paraprofessional position was added to work on the program.

Rezmierski said district findings show Terry improved as expected.

In July, the findings were presented at a hearing with the Michigan Department of Education.

Susan Phelan chose to not sign the individual educational plan reports. Instead she opted to review the district's findings, which both sides agree is her right.

Rezmierski said Northville schools have benefited from the year-long study of Terry's disorder. But district staff has been under a great deal of pressure through the process.

He worries that the issue could still be far from resolved.

"Everyone is posturing. It has the potential to continue," he said.

Susan Phelan agrees that the issue may be far from resolved.

"I have a feeling there's going to be a big legal battle," she said. "I don't

feel they have met their goals, and I'm not sure this is the proper program."

Susan Phelan plans to bring an independent expert into her home to evaluate Terry's history from birth and advise her on whether she should continue with Northville's program. She expects the evaluation to take several weeks.

A legal battle would fought to get "proper treatment," Susan Phelan said, but not to force Northville schools to educate Terry.

"I would not force anyone to care for my son that does not want to," she said. "I don't want to force the SIBIS down anybody's throat."

Susan Phelan said Terry's home district, Wayne-Westland, may create or find a program for him.

Fraud scheme gains police attention

A pair of former Meijer employees are starting into the teeth of criminal charges for their roles in an alleged falsified time card scheme.

Northville Township police this week expect to obtain larceny warrants for two Highland women, ages 23 and 18, after the two allegedly worked out a plan to receive payroll checks for time they did not actually work at the 20401 Haggerty store.

According to police records, the 18-year-old worked in the Meijer photo department from July 20-27. She quit the job after she was involved in an auto accident, and later reportedly went to the store to claim her 40-hour payroll check.

The check was not ready and the 23-year-old suspect, also a Meijer employee, told the other woman she would re-enter her employment in-

formation in the company computer. A week later, the 18-year-old's check had still not arrived, and the other suspect repeated the process, said township police Det. Michael Wildt.

But the 18-year-old thought she hit a bonanza the third week when three checks were waiting for her at Meijer. She collected and eventually cashed all three checks after the other suspect allegedly told her to keep the money, Wildt said.

Police said the 23-year-old then decided to enter three additional days of employment in the 18-year-old's name. Meijer security staffers uncovered her scheme before another check was issued, police said.

Both Highland women admitted their involvement during interviews with police this week, Wildt said.


The total amount of cash involved was approximately \$400, police said.

Word cuts own path in city administration

Filling the shoes of a man who has worn them for nearly 18 years may not be the most agreeable job.

But the job seems to agree with city manager Gary Word.

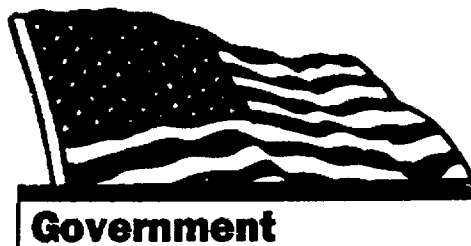
Word has had the unenviable task of taking over the top spot at city hall from Steven Walters, who had run Northville since 1973 and left an indelible impression as an extremely capable administrator.

Walters, of course, was the driving force behind MainStreet '78 and the Downtown Development Authority, and he implemented the creative financing solutions that kept Singh Development committed to building MainCentre when the Birmingham developer was on the verge of dropping the project.

The former manager helped computerize city hall and wrote many of the software programs that are still in use today. Unfortunately, those customized programs still need an occasional tweak from their creator, who already has helped the city figure out how to run the system a couple of times since his departure.

Walters also led the charge for a full-time city assessor and a computerized assessing system. Many of the sophisticated management systems praised by the city's auditors in the past were installed under his leadership, and Walters had a hand in hiring many valued city employees.

As a hands-on administrator, Walters kept close tabs on most departments and was the author of most reports to the city council. He was also the point man for much of the information flowing between city departments, which left him with most of the answers but occasion-

ally may have left the departments themselves in the dark about what was going on across the hallway at city hall.

Gary Word is no Steve Walters, but that is not necessarily a bad thing. Word is proving himself to be a competent manager in his own way, a way distinctly different from his predecessor.

The new manager holds regular meetings with his department heads, briefing them on everything from the latest city council actions to opportunities for training and self-improvement. This tradition alone is a radical break from the past.

Word also has his staff research the history of issues affecting the city and draft their own reports to the city council on the issues, subject to his review. In short, he encourages them to become involved as team members rather than solely as subordinates.

Staff members talk about new challenges, new roles, and a new spirit of communication between departments as well as within them.

Steve Walters served the city well during his 17-year tenure. Judging from Gary Word's first two months in Walters' shoes, the new manager should continue to serve the city well into the future.

SLAPPing the public around



Here's a dandy category for the game show "Jeopardy." Abbreviations. NIMBY. That's easy—"not in my back yard." Holler "NIMBY" when you don't want a group home or incinerator in the neighborhood. ASAP. "As soon as possible." Everyone in an office knows that one. RHIP. "Rank has its privileges." Military veterans got that ASAP. WYSI WYG, pronounced "wissy wig." Your computer-wise kids will tell you it means "what you see is what you get."

SLAPP. Wow, that's a new and nasty one. But folks in growing communities had better learn it because it's going around the country.

SLAPP means "strategic lawsuit against public participation." It's what developers do when homeowners, environmentalists and preservationists fight too hard against tearing up God's ecosystem. I stumbled across SLAPP in the June issue of Planning, a magazine you won't find on the supermarket shelves or chain bookstores. Readers are public officials who deal in land use. The writer is Gary Enos, a New York-based magazine reporter.

SLAPPs are designed to have a chilling effect on folks who speak out against developers' plans or petition government for the redress of grievances.

Some authorities say SLAPPs are a threat to freedom of speech.

Remember the Bill of Rights? We're celebrating its 200th anniversary. University of Denver researchers have identified 400 SLAPP lawsuits around the country. New York, California and Colorado have seen most of these lawsuits, but they are spreading.

Our communities in Michigan could see strategic lawsuits against public participation in the next few years. As I write,

the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments is circulating its draft plan to curb "urban sprawl"—the eating up of cornfields and lakeshores by developers with no population growth to justify it, and the abandonment of older cities.

There is strong, but not unanimous, sentiment for containing urban sprawl. Michigan is ripe for SLAPP suits because we have thousands of teeny-tiny cities, villages and townships, each thinking of itself.

The neighboring community, one block away, wants to rezone for a billion-dollar megamall.

You scream.
You organize protests.
You hold meetings.

You circulate pamphlets. And you could get SLAPPED. It happened, Enos said, in Rye, N.Y., to folks who wanted to protect the 18th century home of John Jay, the diplomat and chief justice. The developer who wanted to build luxury homes asked \$30 million damages.

Now, filing a lawsuit and winning it are two different things. Developers are losing most SLAPPs, Enos reports.

Their lawyers have found it difficult to pierce the people's freedom of speech defense. But we in the news business know about these suits.

They cost you money to defend.
They cost you enormous amounts of time to prepare a defense.

You can't do your regular work while you're defending a lawsuit designed to quiet you. Ultimately, you win, but the suit takes so much starch out of you that you're never the same emotionally.

You seek a new line of work.

You move.

I've seen it happen. Vice President Dan Quayle, himself an ordained lawyer despite his C average, made a speech to the American Bar Association in which he said the U.S. has too many lawyers—70 percent of the world's supply—and too many lawsuits. The ABA members didn't like that.

Many of them like to SLAPP people around.

Cutting taxes has consequences



Last week brought Gov. John Engler's plan to cut property taxes for school operations by 30 percent over five years and to limit annual increases in assessments to 3 percent or less. It's unclear how his plan (which will cost more than \$6 billion in state revenue over five years) would be funded. What would replace the schools' lost property taxes?

This followed by some weeks the Democratic plan to cut homeowners' property taxes and pay for it by repealing the capital acquisition deduction of the single business tax and a whole raft of industrial tax abatements. It's unclear in this proposal what would be used to stimulate private business investment or contribute to job growth in Michigan. Both political parties are in a pandering rush to cut taxes.

Both proposals are to be on the November 1992 ballot, suggesting both parties are more interested in campaign rhetoric than in genuine tax relief. It sounds like *deja vu* all over again.

Remember 1981, the early days of the Rea-

gan Administration in Washington? The cry was that income taxes were too high.

And they were. Led by budget director Dave Stockman, former Michigan congressman, the administration proposed the largest single tax rate cut in American history.

Democrats rushed to submit their own cuts. Stockman himself later admitted the new tax law guaranteed the largest growth in national deficits in American history. Two consequences: First, the federal government systematically sloughed off responsibility for all kinds of programs, from education to housing, onto the states and local governments. Today's result: Chronic, severe financial crisis in states like Michigan and even a city bankruptcy in Bridgeport, Conn.

Second, equally important, was the budgetary straitjacket into which virtually all government programs were jammed. Want to build bridges? Educate poor kids? Provide another 13 weeks of unemployment to workers laid off during the recession? No money.

Sorry. Later it became clear that some canny folk on the political right had this outcome in mind all along.

They reasoned, correctly, that if the country could be thrown into a large and persistent deficit through excessive tax cuts, there would be no money left for activities of government, both

useful and not so useful. Last year the price to achieve a (read my lips) modest tax increase and a balanced budget was an agreement between Congress and the White House that new spending would have to be accompanied by specific increased revenues. Could some clever people around Gov. Engler have devised the same strategy for Michigan? Rush to compete with Democrats in pandering to middle-income taxpayers, they reason, because at day's end no money will be left to drive state government.

No doubt Michigan's tax structure relies too heavily on the property tax.

No doubt a lot of state spending is either wasted or yields dubious outcomes. But does it follow that nothing done by government is useful? Are good schools a waste? Is job training for our workers useless? Should state colleges be ignored? Is it pointless to clean our lakes and preserve our woods? Not at all.

To ask these questions is to answer them. People ought to ask the governor and those around him what they have in mind when they want to cut state revenue by more than \$1 billion a year for the next five years.

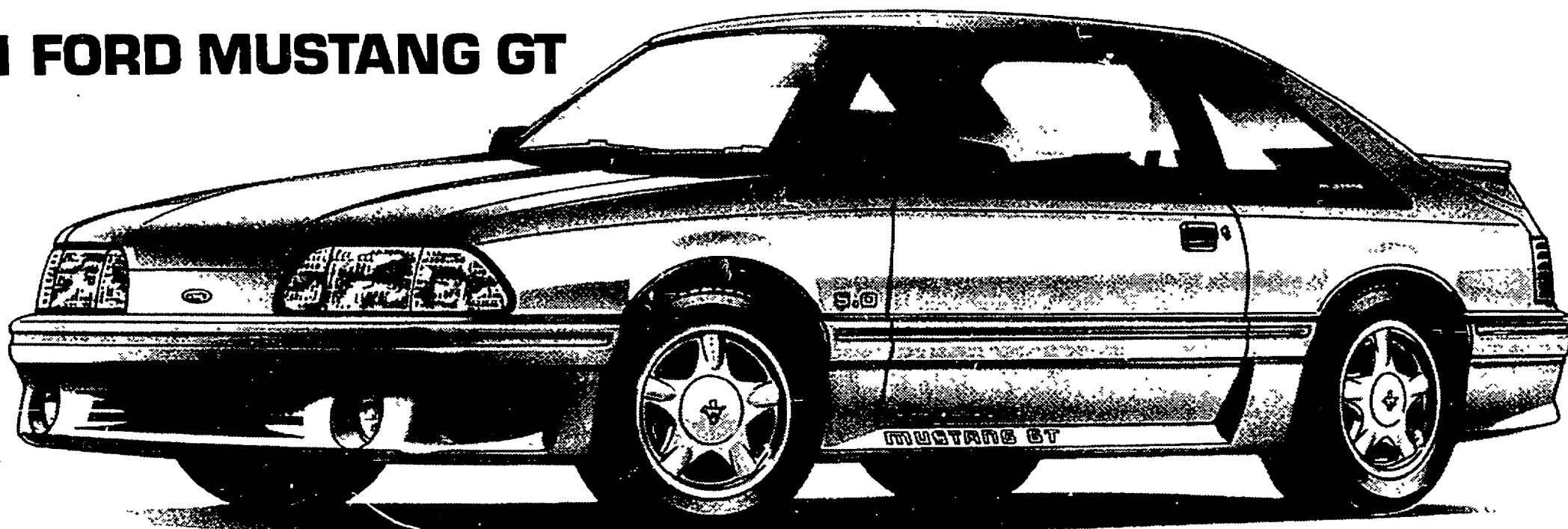

Here comes the Victorian Festival!

Summer is over, fall is here, and the third annual Northville Victorian Festival sits on the horizon.

What has quickly become the biggest event of the year in Northville returns this year Sept. 13-15 with a weekend full of entertainment and activities which harken back to an earlier, simpler time.

Many different events can be considered "highlights" of the festival, including the parade on Friday; the headline entertainment, a multi-act Victorian Review sponsored by the Casterline Funeral Home and Genitt's Hole-in-the-Wall; and the juried Art Market, sponsored by the Northville Arts Commission, which runs in conjunction with the festival.

A festival schedule appears below. A complete guide to all the festival events will be printed as a special supplement to next Thursday's *Northville Record*. But just to keep your appetite whetted for things Victorian, here is a look at some other highlights — one on each of the festival's three days:

FAMILY AUCTION

Following the parade and the initial performance of the Victorian Review, everyone is encouraged to stroll along Main Street to the Northville Community Center, 303 W. Main.

The Northville Community Chamber of Commerce sponsors the auction, a new event to the festival this year, to benefit its building fund. A live and silent auction will combine into one entertaining evening for the whole family.

Merchants from all over the area have donated goods to the auction, which carries a \$5 admission (free for kids under 5). That gets you food from a variety of local restaurants as well as the evening's entertainment.

Items up for auction include some Victorian-type goodies as well as attractions like dinner served at your home by Tom MacKinnon; a tour of the Red Wings locker room; a Pistons autographed basketball; and a couple dozen others.



World-known unicyclists Teresa and Sam will be a part of the Victorian Review, the headline entertainment at this year's Victorian Festival, Sept. 13-15. Sponsored by the Casterline Funeral Home and Genitt's Hole-in-the-Wall, the review will play at the downtown bandshell at about 6:45 p.m. that Friday, 1 and 4 p.m. that Saturday, and 2 p.m. that Sunday. A magic act and other entertainment will also be a part of the review.

VICTORIAN BALL

The third annual Victorian Costume Ball will light up the night Saturday of the festival. The ball features a new location this year at the Northville Community Center, and the ticket price has been lowered to \$40 per person. At the same time the decorations will be more extensive than ever, with the community center transformed into a beautiful Victorian manor.

Parking will be available in the parking lot behind MAGS and across from the post office. From there, horse-drawn carriages will carry ballgoers to the community center.

Raffles will provide cold hors d'oeuvres, while Little Italy and MacKinnon's will offer hot hors d'oeuvres. A main course and dessert will follow. There will be more room for dancing, with a different band and different dance caller this year.

Reservations for the ball are now available from the chamber of commerce office, 349-7640. Reservations may be paid with Visa, MasterCard, or by check.

Organizers are looking for people to help decorate the community center starting at 8 a.m. that day, with free lunch to anyone who helps out. For more information call the chamber office.

FAMILY PICNIC

The festival focuses on Mill Race Historical Village for much of the day Sunday, with a traditional picnic offering entertainment for all.

The village will be open from noon to 5 p.m., but everyone is encouraged to come down for any part of that time to enjoy the atmosphere and a nice picnic lunch. Special highlights are planned throughout the afternoon.

From 1:30 to 2:30, the Northville Community Recreation Department will sponsor games for kids again this year. At 2:30 a new event debuts: a race of ducks (not real ones) in the Middle Rouge River.

Organizer Greg Presley said of the race, "We're going to have fun. We will have prizes from local merchants and businesses." Anyone interested — "kids of all ages," Presley said — is welcome to join in the race. Just show up and get a number; then root for your duck.

Also at Mill Race will be a host of people re-enacting and demonstrating crafts of the era, including a blacksmith, a rug hooker, a seamstress, basket weavers, a wheat weaver, and a dulcimer player. In addition, other people will act out roles of the era — a banker, a prohibitionist, and so on. And of course, the Mill Race Docents will be on hand for guided tours of the historic buildings.

"It truly is stepping back in time. It's very magic, especially if you come in costume," Presley said. "You really get a sense of what it felt like to live during that time."

Presley emphasized that the picnic is a great chance to relax, have a nice lunch, enjoy the atmosphere, and take a trip back to the past.

"Grab your family or come by yourself," he said. "Let's have some good old-fashioned picnic fun."

Marie Knapp's role, aside from being a director, is that of a registrar. She volunteers from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on the second and fourth Friday of each month for applicants young and old.

"I sit at a table," Knapp said, "and check in people as they come."

Karl Peters, she said, who is director of the Senior Citizen Center, drives a truck twice a month to the county offices and brings back a load of food, which, Knapp said, "women from the Catholic church pack into individual bags."

After Knapp has signed in an applicant, another volunteer carries the person's bag to his or her car.

"It's enjoyable volunteer work," Marie Knapp commented. "I like it. I like meeting people. And we need help," she added.

Kids sing out at after school program

First Presbyterian Church of Northville offers a variety of programs, but "Kingdom Kids" is one of the most popular among parents. "Kingdom Kids" is a weekly after-school program open to the entire community, where elementary-age children meet to practice for church choir, participate in religious education programs, and eat a healthy dinner.

Although the religious education is Presbyterian, co-director Martin Ankrum said the group is comprised of "non-Presbyterians as well." Kids participate in three different choir programs, based on age. Children in kindergarten and first grade are in one choir; second- and third-graders are in another, and fourth- and fifth-graders are in a third group. "We had somewhere around 35-40 kids involved last year," said Ankrum, who is responsible for the educational aspects of the program.

"The main thrust is that it's a choir program that sings during church (on Sundays)," Music Director Jeff Fowler is responsible for the music aspect of the program, and children perform approximately twice a month during regular worship services. But, Ankrum added, the program is comprised of three elements: choir, religious instruction, activity time, and dinner. Parents are involved on a rotating basis. They are involved in many as-

pects, Ankrum explained, but mainly they help with dinner. "The kids get religious instruction on one hand, but they also get instruction in music. And from a religious viewpoint, they're given the opportunity to serve. . . . They get to be a part of the community." The program, which begins Sept. 11, costs \$95 per year. Borders Book Shop is looking for people with the gift of gab.

They've started out by hunting down some of the best — WDET-FM News Director Chuck Wilbur, retired psychotherapist Susan Fostey, and spy thriller writer S.K. Wolf.

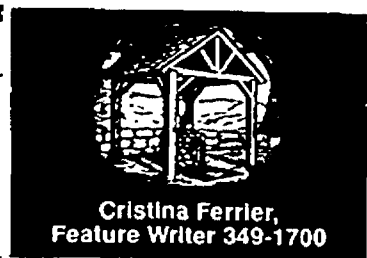

Circle tours shows state's color

Color tours are an autumn celebration that, especially in Michigan, can be breathtakingly beautiful.

They evoke memories of colorful childhood back-to-school days. And they create new memories to return to during the frigid days ahead.

Because Michigan offers so many spectacular views along its Great Lakes, the best color tours are along the roads marked with green and white signs that mark the Great Lakes Circle Tours.

There are three circle tours along Lakes Huron, Michigan and Superior. The Lakes Huron and Michigan tours go north-south, and color will vary through the trip according to the time of year. The Lake Superior route is east-west through the Upper Peninsula, so color will be fairly consistent.

Colors peak in the upper peninsula during mid-September to early October.

In northern lower Michigan, from the Mackinac Bridge south to Traverse City on the west side or Oscoda on the east side, colors peak from late September to mid-October.

In mid-lower Michigan, south to Grand Haven on the west or Port Huron on the east, colors peak during the first part of October.

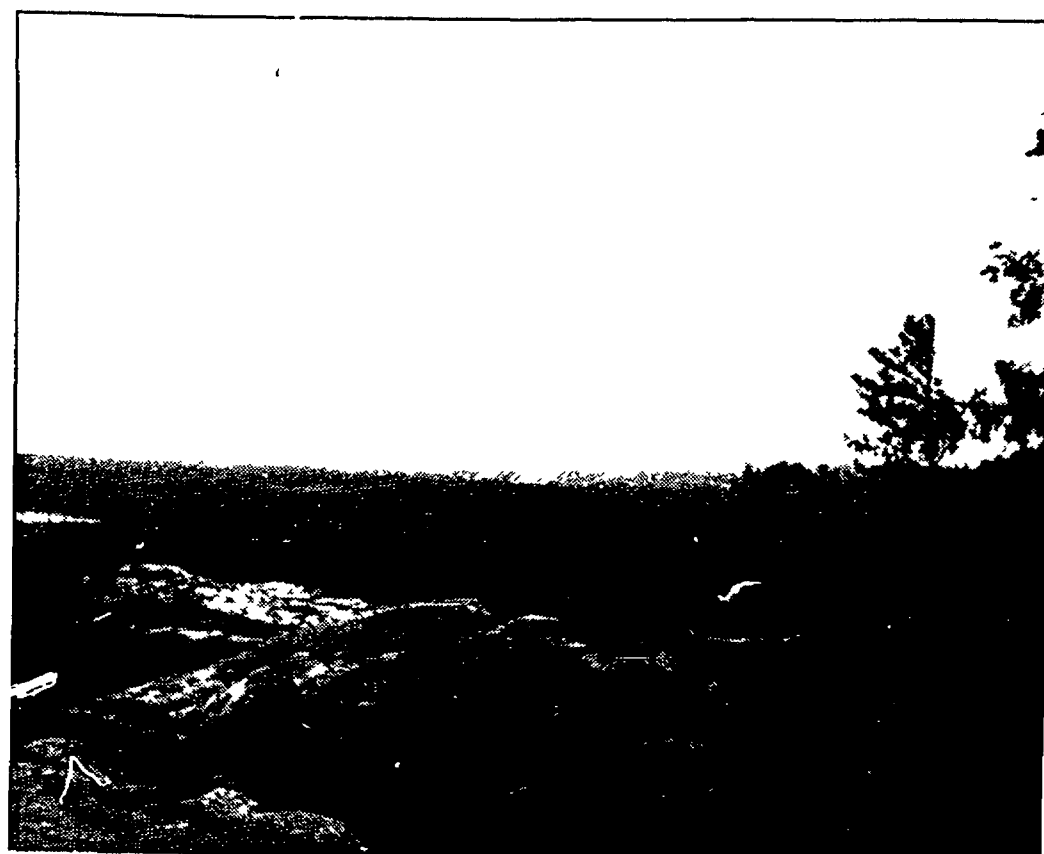
And in the southern portion of the state, the best colors are found in mid- to late October.

Circle Tours meander past wineries, lighthouses, dunes, villages and other attractions in Michigan, surrounding states and Canada.

But the Circle Tours aren't the only way to enjoy fall splendor.

The state of Michigan itself includes a total of 117,000 miles of paved roads, passing by 18 million acres of forests, according to AAA Michigan.

Autumn color could be spectacular this season if the weather cooperates. A check with forestry experts reveals trees are generally healthy and only need sunny, warm days and cool nights in September and October to produce a radiant display.

"One of the best ways to satisfy a craving for fall color is to hop in your car and tour the state's numerous parks, forests and recreation areas," said Peter Erickson, AAA Michigan Club Services director. "Since half of Michigan is forested, a sampling of autumn's stunning color, tasty cider and scenic attractions is within a short drive of almost all residents."

Autumn tourists are expected to spend \$2.5 billion this season in Michigan on lodging, meals, souvenirs and other travel-related expenses. Many resorts entice autumn enthusiasts with special rates and packages.

Trips on cruise boats, bicycles, canoes, horseback and hot-air balloons provide participants with a different look at the fall spectacle. Golfers also can enjoy the season while playing a round on one of Michigan's nearly 600 public golf courses.

"With 65 species of trees, Michigan provides a stunning color display," Erickson said. "But for many fall color watchers, the key is the amount of red. We always have shades of yellow and orange, but red gives forests that memorable sparkle."

Reds are produced by sugar and red maples, dogwoods, sumacs and

black gums. Black maples, beeches and alders display oranges. Birch, willows, white ash and aspens provide yellow.

Generally speaking, maples are dominant in the western half of the state and in the upper peninsula, while white oaks and aspens are predominant in the east.

Color may be dull in a few areas of the state because of damage caused by gypsy moths and forest tent caterpillars. But these scattered pockets affect only a small portion of Michigan forests.

Big Bay Lighthouse a unique B&B

When the sun sets on Lake Superior, you'll know where to find the guests of the Big Bay Point Lighthouse.

In the tower, high among the bluffs, I joined in the show as the glowing orange ball bid another good night to the Upper Peninsula shoreline.

I had arrived just an hour before to find a pink sheet of paper taped to my bedroom door. Innkeepers Buck and Marilyn Gotschall leave these for all overnight guests, a tongue-in-cheek description of duties while staying overnight.

A button attached to the instructions distinguished me as a "Keeper's Helper." I didn't have to monitor weather conditions or replace a lamp filament, but I did feel, for a night anyway, that I guided the mighty Great Lakes freighters as the Big Bay beam traveled out over the waves.

According to the innkeepers, Big Bay Lighthouse is the only privately-owned and operated lighthouse on the Great Lakes and the only one in the country where guests sleep right on the premises.

The Gotschalls purchased the historic 1896 brick structure in 1986 and immediately opened it as an inn. "Guests like the mile of shoreline," Buck says. "It's rocky and craggy and good for rock-hounding." Buck is a character — a great kidder who

picked up tennis at age 50 and has since whipped players half his age in statewide tournaments. He's also an avid sailor and pilot with his own airstrip and plane 100 feet from the front door.

Marilyn, meanwhile, is a world traveler. The breakfast conversation, as a result, is especially fascinating. Stories about Italian vacations. About the bear who ran into the woods with a trash can. About Buck's growing-up years in the same Indiana town where James Dean lived.

Big Bay Lighthouse has all the warmth and friendliness you expect from a great bed-and-breakfast, but it's not a luxury stay.

Like the craggy rocks on which it sits, the lighthouse is more than a little rough around the edges. During my visit, tools and books were piled high on a stair landing. The homey, cluttered common rooms displayed postcards and T-shirts for sale. Some corners needed redecorating, others a simple straightening and dusting.

Six upstairs guest rooms, which command \$65 to \$165 per night, are sparsely decorated and comfortable. Some share bathrooms down the hall. The Tower Room, with its dramatic view of the lake, remains the most requested.

The guests gather after dark in the first-floor living room, where the great stone fireplace takes a bite out of the cold lake wind; the wind can beat fiercely during a fall gale.

Our conversation turned to Wil-

liam Pryor, the original Big Bay Point lighthouse keeper, who died under still mysterious circumstances in 1901 and whose ghost reportedly roams the bluffs.

"He whispers to me in the spring to go fishing," Buck says. "I go because I don't want a mad ghost around, but Marilyn doesn't hear him and she is getting suspicious!"

The second-floor library leads to a circular staircase and up to the tower, 120 feet above the water, where the light casts its beam.

The current lighting apparatus is considerably smaller than the original Fresnel lens, which is on display in the foghouse. Buck notes that it came from Paris with a list of 52 lighting instructions.

Breakfast is in two shifts, six guests each, during busy summer mornings, and it emphasizes the healthy and homegrown. We started with a whipped fruit drink of peaches, pears, apples, red raspberries and a touch of yogurt. Home-baked muffins came next, followed by delicious yogurt/buttermilk waffles.

They serve whitefish or brook trout in season. The innkeepers suggest (and so do I) the 4.5-hour \$25 tour of Big Bay with friend and neighbor Jeff Ten Eyck. He guides the adventurous to favorite spots, hopping stone-to-stone over rushing water or scaling medium sized cliffs.

Jeff caters to any guest, including the elderly or disabled, who want to

journey by van to hiking sites and enjoy a trail lunch of U.P. pasties.

The innkeepers have blazed a pleasant trail that begins as a tree-lined path, then ends in meadows along the Lake Superior bluffs, so you can hike around the property. Explore the town restaurants and the

spots made familiar by *Anatomy of a Murder*, the 1959 movie which was filmed here and in nearby Marquette.

For more information, contact Big Bay Point Lighthouse, No. 3 Lighthouse Road, Big Bay, MI 49808. The phone number is (906) 345-9957.

There's a two-day minimum on weekend.

During your second breakfast, you'll be upgraded to "Senior Helper," but your only real responsibilities will be to relax and enjoy one of the country's most unique bed-and-breakfast experiences.

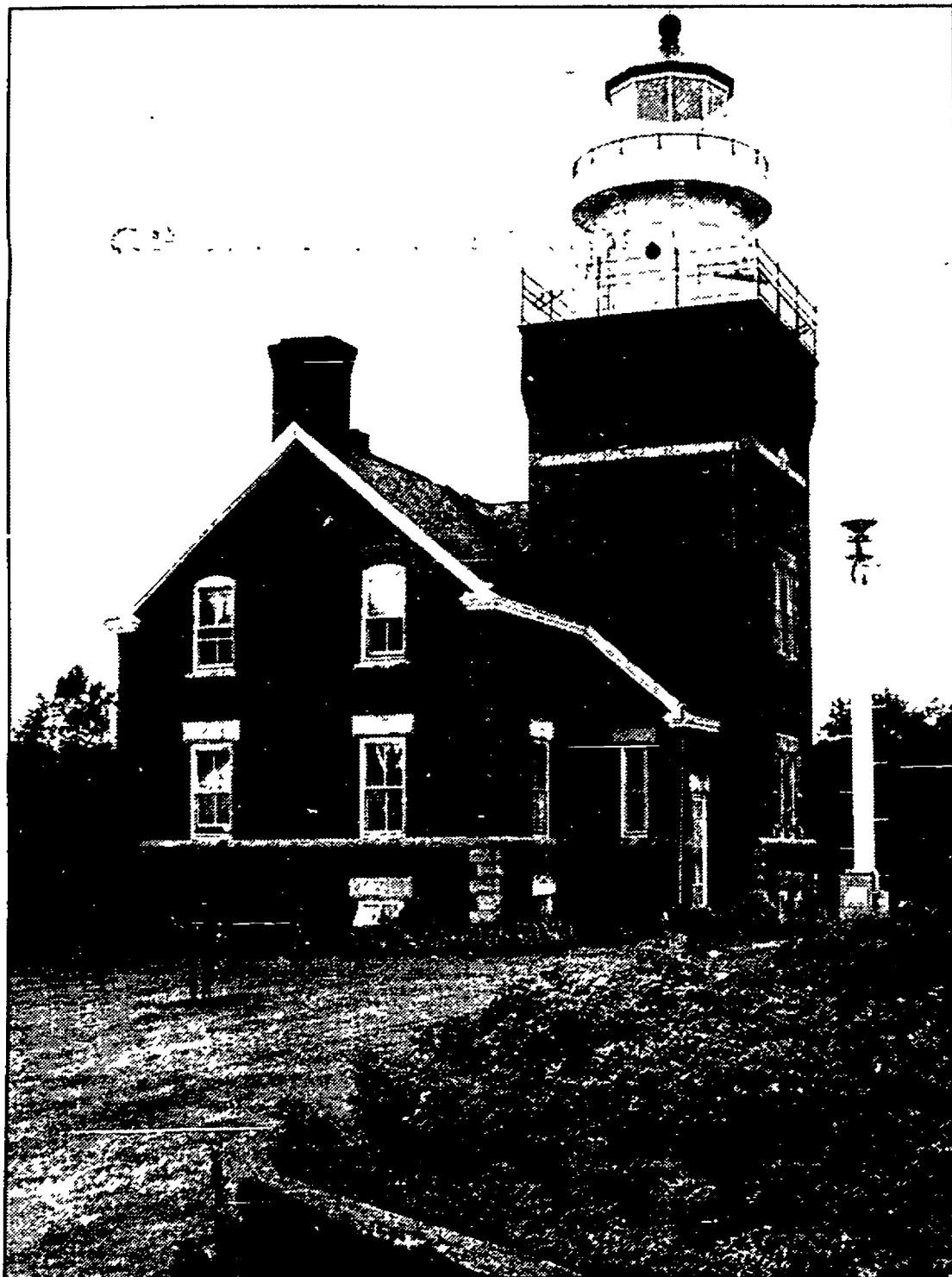

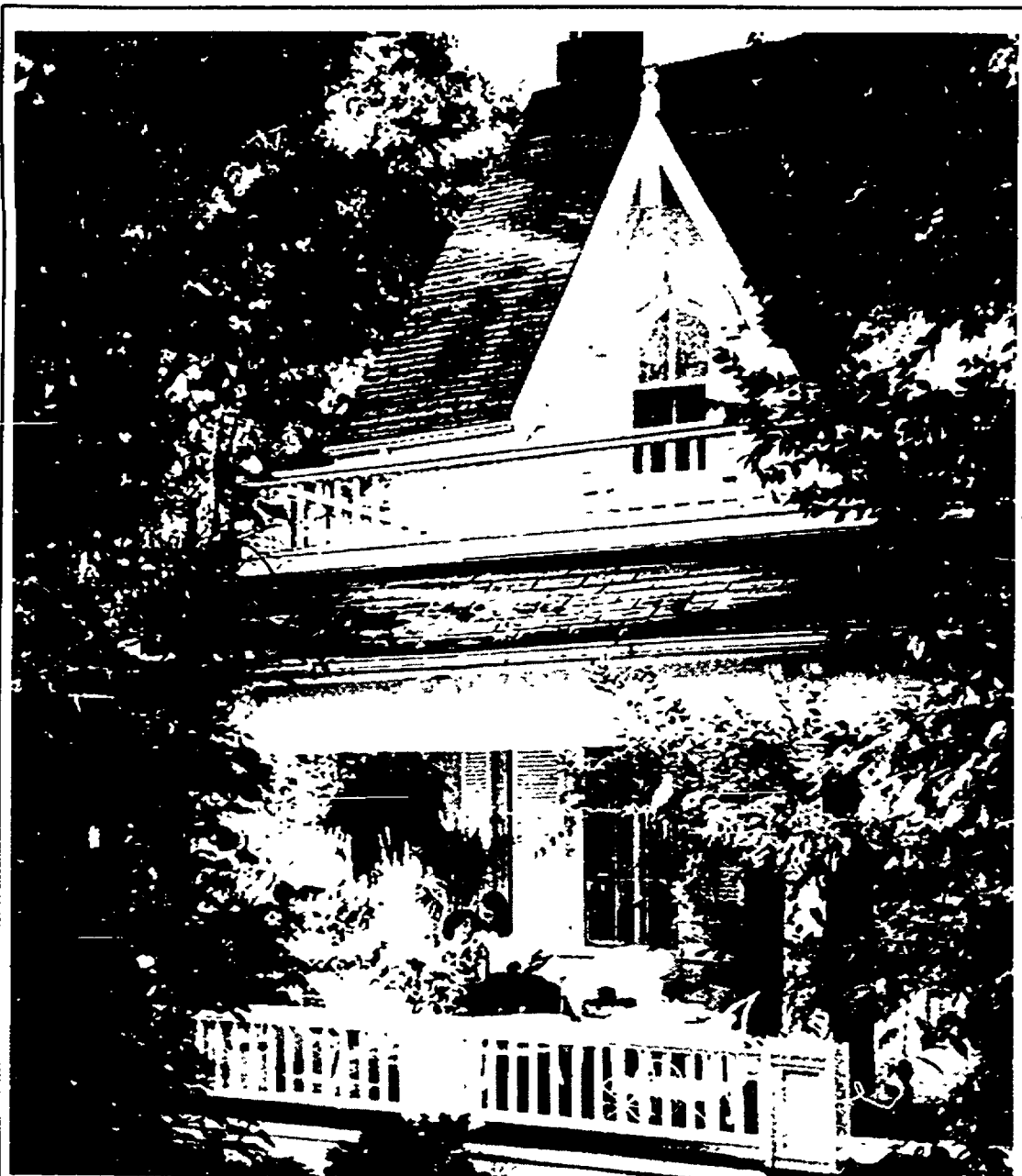

Lions provide tough season-opening test

Huzjak will need help from linemen

The Mustang gridders started their highly successful 1990 campaign last fall by trouncing a proud South Lyon squad 20-6 in the season opener. Northville went on to an 8-4 record and its first-ever playoff appearance. The Lions struggled early and finished strong, but still only won four times.

The two will meet again tomorrow (Sept. 6 at 7:30 p.m.), but some things have changed in the past year. The Mustangs graduated every interior lineman in sight while South Lyon welcomes back all of its. On paper, the Lions have a big edge up front.

South Lyon also has several other advantages: 1). The Lions are out for revenge; 2). They will be playing in front of the home crowd, and; 3). They already have a one-week head start on Northville by opening the season on Aug. 31 against Detroit Finney (a 41-0 victory).

All the intangibles seem to favor South Lyon, but the Mustangs have quarterback extraordinaire Ryan Huzjak, who single-handedly burned the Lion defense a year ago as he accounted for 257 yards and three touchdowns.

Last year, the South Lyon juniors went through what Coach Bob Sche-

loske called "a baptism of fire." This year, Scheloske said that baptism will help them be a better team.

"We'll be an improved team this year," Scheloske said. "We have a lot of veterans."

The Lions will have a senior offensive line of Dan Howell, Dan Anderson, Matt Nicholas, Bill Fox, Pat Moll and Andy Duncan. Five of the six received All-Area recognition last fall as juniors.

Quarterback Jason Williams is filling in for the departed Denny Moyer and one of his backfield mates this season is 215-pound fullback Ken Nelson, a junior who will double as linebacker for the Lions' defensive squad.

"Ken is a bulldozer-type back. He's strong and has good speed. He can take the ball inside and outside. He packs a lot of power," Scheloske said.

At halfback, the Lions will use senior Brian Hall and junior Billy Porter.

The defensive unit will be anchored by Anderson, Howell and Paul Neuns at nose guard. Brett Bennett will captain the defensive squad at linebacker.

The Lions also have a dangerous weapon in kicker Jason Lipke, who holds the school record in the field goal department with a boot of 43 yards.

Wildcat Coach Bob Smith treats the contest as a non-conference double-dual meet, but Northville coach Ed Gabrys calls it a scrimmage. With that in mind, it should come as no surprise that Novi cruised to an 18-45 triumph over the Mustangs.

Northville entered just six runners into the race. They were Coon (fourth place, 18:47), Mark Ritter (16th, 21:02), Diasuke Ishikawa (17th, 21:03), Chris Smith (20th, 21:52), Parag Parikh (23rd, 22:37), and Rob Kukalnis (24th, 23:14).

"It's on our schedule, we have a contract drawn up, so we consider it our season opener," Smith said.

The most interesting battle, however, was between Novi and Farmington — two of the better squads in the state. When the dust cleared, the Cats had slipped past the Falcons 27-28.

"It was quite a battle — Farmington's got a good team," Smith said. "Northville is real young, but (Steve)

Coon is an excellent runner. Overall, I thought we did well. It was very hot and humid, but we were prepared."

Novi exhibited some team depth in the meet. Smith did not run three of his top seven runners — Ken Fenchel, Joe Leahy and Shady Sardy — because they have been hampered by nagging injuries. And All-Stater Brian Molloy probably would have won the race easily, but he decided to run an extra five kilometers immediately before the start of the meet.

"We didn't want to waste Brian in a non-conference meet, so we used it as a training exercise," Smith explained. "The conditions weren't good, so he ran very tired."

As it was, Molloy placed third overall in a respectable time of 18:46. Novi's top finisher was junior Vince Meehan, who navigated the course in 18:31 — his personal best effort. The rest of the Wildcat finishers included John Crawford in fifth (18:48), freshman Shawn Kelly in ninth (19:28), Dave Lykins in 11th (19:48), Brendan Best in 14th (20:26) and Jason Everett in 15th (20:56).

"Everybody ran with a particular goal in mind, so it was a very positive outing," Smith said.

The Mustangs will travel to Walled Lake today (Sept. 5) to take on Western in the division opener.

Mustang girls beat 'Cats

Heaton to bolster MSU's interior line

There's a lot for Toby Heaton to live up to. But all that's needed is one glance and you know he has more than enough to fill the bill. We're talking bulk here. A big guy.

He is, after all, a major college offensive lineman.

Heaton, a redshirt junior from Northville and Redford Catholic Central High, will start at guard for Michigan State this fall. And even though it seems like the offensive linemen from Ann Arbor get most of the sizable press — guys like Greg Skrepenak, Michigan's 6-foot-8, 320-pound behemoth of a tackle — there's no overlooking MSU's interior line.

That would be impossible.

Put it this way: Heaton stands 6-6 and weighs 292 pounds. And he is one of the smaller starters on MSU's tackle-to-tackle line.

So eat your guts out, U-M — MSU could average more than 300 pounds per player on its line. You Wolverines have some catching up to do.

OK, OK, before all the coaches out there start complaining — it's true. Size does not necessarily make might in football.

However, it's also true that the Spartans possessed both last year.

Tico Duckett and Hyland Hickson combined for nearly 2,500 yards rushing in 1990. Both surpassed the 1,000-yard mark and became the Big Ten's most prolific single-season duo.

The yard's didn't come easily, particularly when pre-season All-American Courtney Hawkins — the Spartan's main receiver — missed five games in the middle of the season with a broken collarbone. That all but shut down the passing game.

It was a direct challenge to the offensive linemen.

"We were a running team," Heaton said. "Everyone knew we were. So they would stick eight or nine guys on the line of scrimmage and dare you to run the ball."

The Spartans did anyway, and did it successfully.

"By the second half, we were starting to wear people down," Heaton said. "As an offensive line, that's an indication of the job you're doing."

Three of those linemen (Eric Moten, Matt Keller and Jeff Pearson) have graduated. Only Heaton — who started at left tackle last season before breaking his leg in the eighth game — part-time starting guard Roosevelt Wagner (6-2, 305), and All-American candidate Jim Johnson (6-6, 305), the right tackle, return.

Heaton recovered from his broken leg in time to play in the John Hancock Bowl in Southern California. He admitted he wasn't really physically ready, after missing seven weeks. And he certainly wasn't prepared to switch to guard — but he did.

"We had two guards go down (in the game)," he said. "I hadn't stepped

in at the guard position in over a year."

As a freshman, Heaton appeared in all 12 games at guard. He switched to tackle prior to last season to replace All-American Bob Kula, who graduated. Now, he is back at guard.

"It's really not that difficult," he said. "I played guard my first two years here. And to know your posi-

tion, you have to know what your teammates are doing.

"I like playing guard. You do more pulling, and then you get open shots at people."

Heaton will spend a lot of time in the middle of the action in the weeks ahead. And after sizing up the situation, it's certain he'll be hard to miss.

BRININGSTOOL REPORT: For-

mer Northville All-Stater Tony Briningstool is battling for the starting weak-side linebacker position for the Spartans.

Now entering his senior year, the 6-foot-5, 240-pounder is currently listed just behind junior Earnest Steward (6-1, 218) of Flint on the depth chart. According to MSU Head Coach George Perles, Briningstool has been slowed by a hamstring injury.

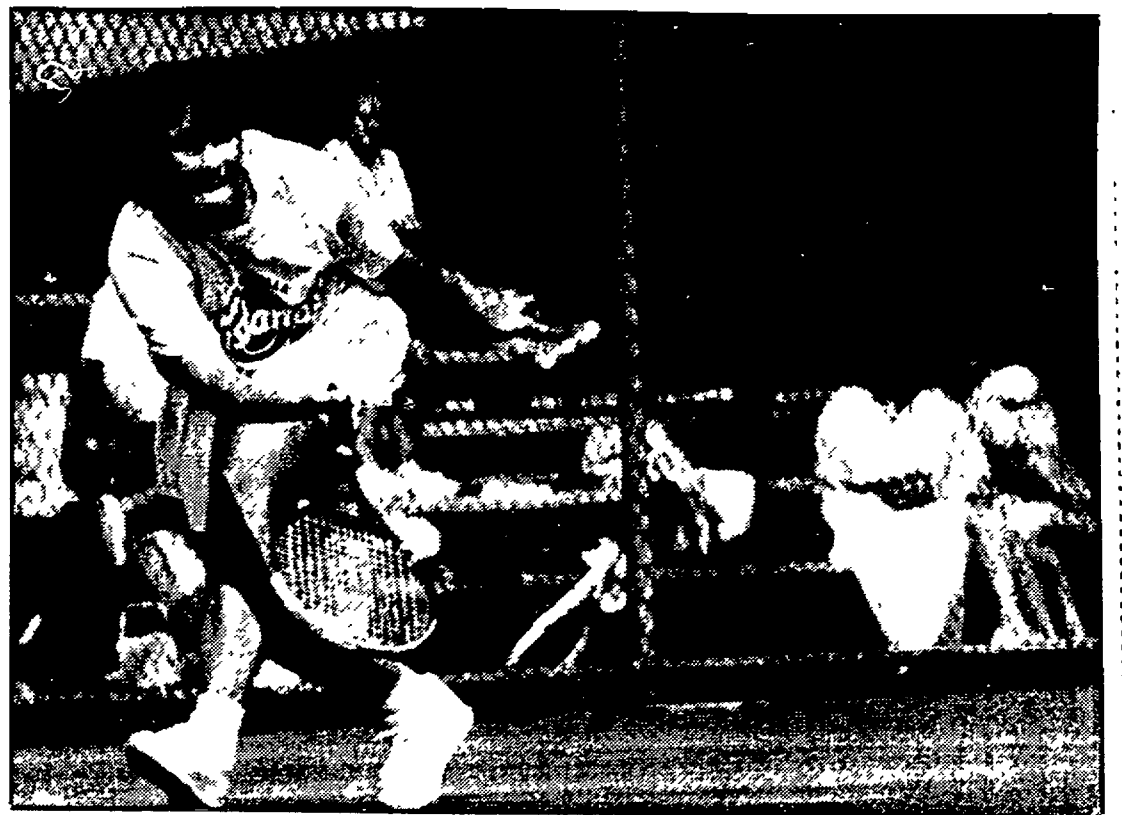

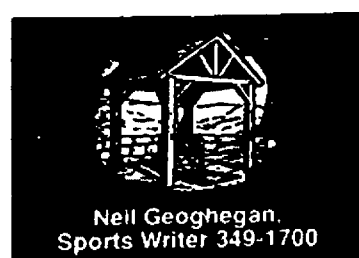

Prenatal fitness begins early

If you're hoping, planning and praying to get pregnant, you need to start preparing yourself physically.

Prenatal fitness begins before you conceive. If you smoke, make every effort to stop. Tone and trim your body, and take a long, hard look at your eating habits.

If it helps to tell yourself you're doing it for the baby, fine. But what many mothers-to-be don't realize is that feeding a fetus puts a strain on their hearts and circulatory systems, and that good diet, nutrition and healthy exercise ensure their own well-being.

CONFIRM THE PREGNANCY

The sooner you know you're pregnant, the better. You'll want to avoid any substances that might harm the baby — particularly alcohol, artificial sweeteners, caffeine and drugs of any kind (check with your doctor).

At-home pregnancy tests are increasingly accurate, but you'll want to go in for a lab test as soon as possible. If you're over 35, your doctor may recommend ultra-sound or amniocentesis to make sure fetal development is normal.

If you fail to conceive after trying for one year, it's time to have a fertility evaluation — one that includes both you and your husband. With numerous methods of reversing infertility available today, there's every reason to be optimistic.

MONITORING YOUR WEIGHT

Like it or not, gaining weight is normal during pregnancy. The average healthy woman will gain about 25 pounds; less if she is petite, more if her frame is large.

Women who get the right nourishment during pregnancy stand to gain more weight if they were thin to begin with, less if they were overweight (because of body reserves available to nourish the baby).

Your doctor will give you specific and detailed information concerning what you should and shouldn't eat during your pregnancy. The following are general guidelines:

- Dairy products — a source of calcium, phosphorus, riboflavin and protein. Four servings a day, preferably two glasses of milk and two servings of cheese or low-fat yogurt.
- Meat products — provide protein and nutrients especially important during the last trimester. Six to eight servings (6 to 8 ounces) daily of fish, poultry or lean meat — or substitutes, such as dried beans or peanut butter.

- Grains and starchy vegetables. Choose nutritionally dense foods (whole grains, whole-grain crackers or cereals, brown rice, baked potatoes) rather than those made with refined flour and sugar. Six to eight servings daily.
- Other vegetables. Select those that are dark green and leafy, and some that are deep yellow (Carrots, tomatoes, squash, sweet potatoes). Fresh is best; eat some cooked, some raw. Three to five servings daily.
- Fruit. Choose fresh whole fruit (apples, bananas, oranges, fruit in season). Two to three servings daily, including ½ cup juice.
- Fat. Some fat in your diet is necessary to aid the absorption of essential nutrients and calcium. Sources should be margarine, oils, salad

dressings and nuts rather than rich desserts, fried foods and snack foods.

- Vitamins and minerals. Because it is difficult to get all the iron you need from food alone, your doctor probably will prescribe a vitamin/mineral supplement.

EXERCISE OPTIONS

Your grandmother may have avoided all but the most necessary exertion during her pregnancy — and as a result, had a more difficult labor and a longer recovery.

On the other hand, it's probably not wise for you to run a marathon in your eighth month.

The added weight of pregnancy can put a strain on your circulatory system, and can throw you off balance. A rule of thumb: as your due

date approaches, reduce your levels of strenuous exercise.

Many health and fitness centers offer exercise programs tailored to the needs of pregnant women. An added bonus is the opportunity to meet others who share your fascination with the experience of becoming a mom.

Lamaze classes are also an excellent preparation — mentally and physically — for childbirth.

Don't underestimate the benefits of active exercise during pregnancy and the postpartum period. To name a few: control of excess weight gain; improved appearance and posture; less water retention; improved self-image and mental outlook; increased energy; tension relief; improved sleep.

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists guidelines for pregnancy/postpartum exercise include:

- Exercise regularly (three times a week) rather than intermittently, and avoid competitive activities.
- Don't exercise if you don't feel well or if the weather is hot and humid.
- If your lifestyle has been sedentary, begin slowly and gradually increase the level of physical activity.
- Avoid jumping and bouncing; exercise on a wood, carpeted or padded flooring for sure footing and to reduce shock.
- Spend at least five minutes warming up muscles prior to exercise; five minutes cooling down (slow walking and gentle stretching).
- Watch your heart rate, and make sure it doesn't go beyond limits set by your doctor.
- Rise gradually after sitting/lying-down exercises to avoid a sudden drop in blood pressure.
- Drink plenty of liquids before, during and after strenuous activity to prevent dehydration.
- Stop exercising and consult your doctor if you have any of the following symptoms: breathlessness, chest pains, dizziness, difficulty walking, uterine contractions, decreased fetal activity, vaginal bleeding or leakage of amniotic fluid.

Expect the benefits of good nutrition and regular exercise to extend into the postpartum weeks, when hormone-triggered emotions run high. But if you feel overwhelmed, consult your doctor, and consider getting whatever help you need — paid or otherwise — that will enable you to rest and savor the precious new little being you've brought into the world.

Vacation and second homes gain in popularity

A second or vacation home has become the dream and goal of an increasing number of families.

A vacation residence on or close to the beach, by a lake or in the mountains holds great appeal to families who can afford it, according to several brokers. An increasing proportion of brokerage business now involves second homes.

"When we're contacted by an out-of-town family, often referred to by other brokers, we 'smooze' them with information, giving them an overall perspective on our area and a realistic view of second-home opportunities," one broker said.

This is an active time of year for second-home sales. Many families recently enjoyed a summer vacation at a favorite resort location and are hot on the idea of acquiring their own vacation residence.

Nationally, 326 million people will take time for vacation trips this

summer, according to the Automobile Association of America.

Among that vast number of vacationers, only about 5 percent actually own a vacation home, according to the U.S. Travel Data Center. But that percentage is growing, particularly now with moderating prices and favorable financing opportunities.

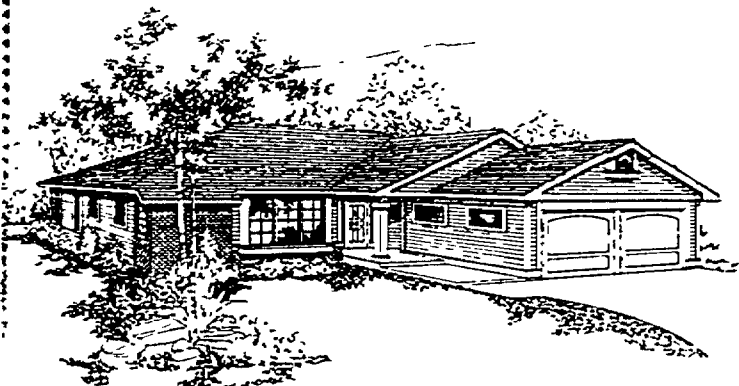
"We are seeing an aging of the baby boomers," said Scott Dring, a spokesman for the Travel Data Center. "As their level of income continues to rise, we'll see a continuing increase in the percentage of vacationers who own a second home."

The general trend is to establish a vacation residence in a locale accessible by auto and within one day's driving time.

The Travel Data Center estimates that the majority of vacations this year will include two or three nights and involve trips no more than 300 miles away. These practices also are reflected in second-

Azalea 1 offers easy care and efficiency

The Azalea 1 is equally well adapted to housing a family with young children, a couple with grandchildren who like to sleep over or a single person who wants a home that is compact and efficient to care for.

The master suite is far enough from the other bedrooms to provide a measure of privacy, yet close enough that a crying child won't go unheard for long. If no children are in the picture, these rooms could easily be used as a home office and a hobby room—or whatever.

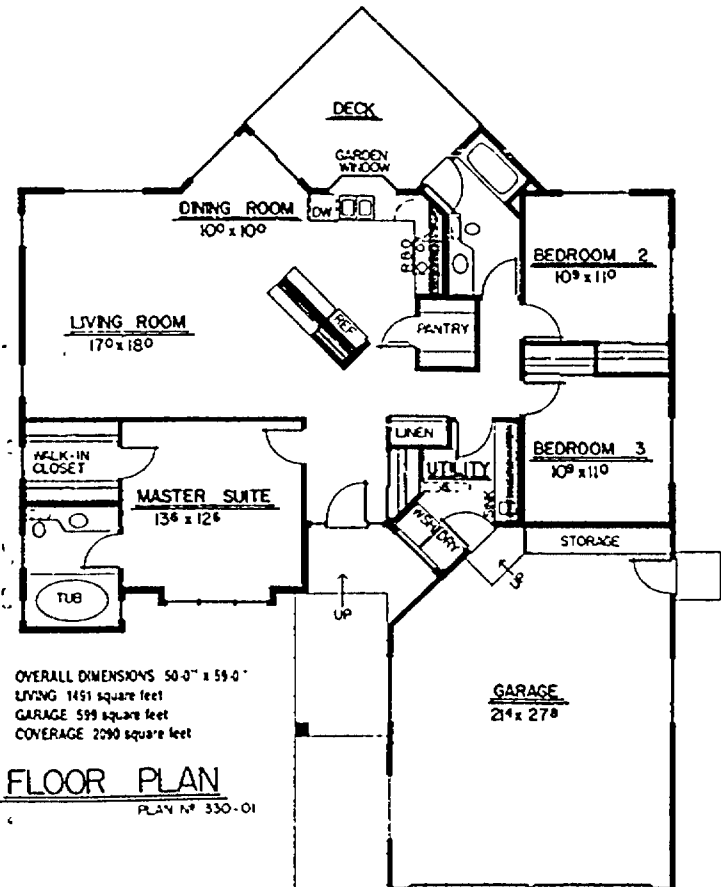
The kitchen, living room and dining area all are combined in one informal great room, giving a spacious feel to what is basically a

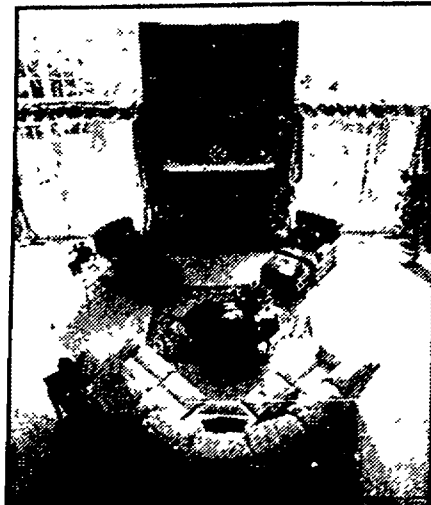
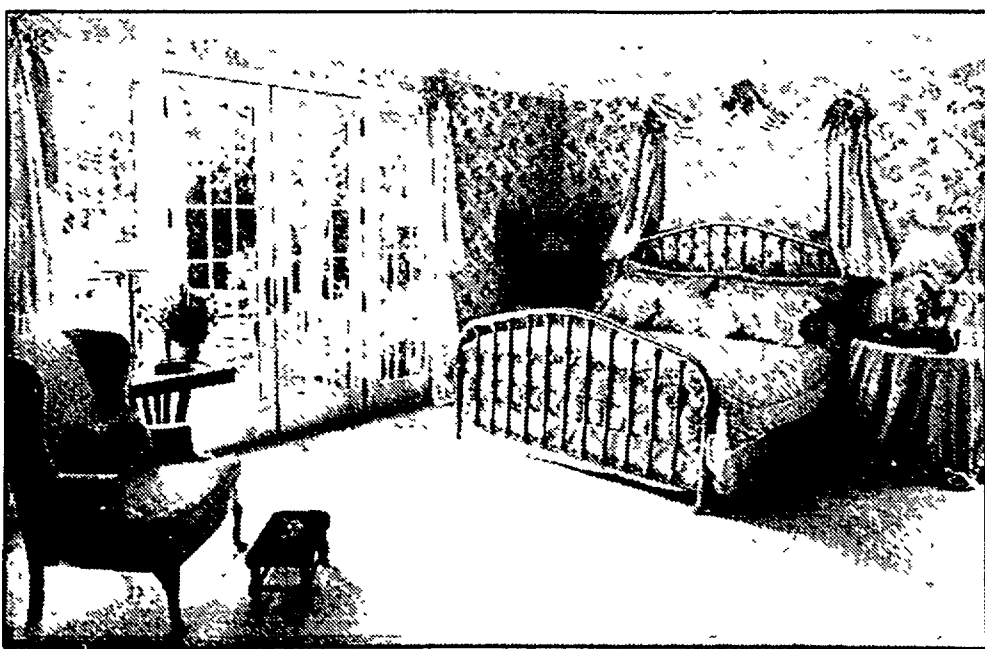

Old bisque doll could bring lots of big bucks

Q. Enclosed is a picture of my old doll. Please give me your estimate of its value.

A. She stands about 30 inches tall and has a bisque head and shoulders. Her hair and eyelashes are real, and she has blue sleep eyes. The body is jointed composition, but the hands and feet are bisque. Her mouth is open, showing her teeth. She is dressed in a 1900-style costume. The back of the head is marked "Halbig-Germany."

A. Your doll was made by Simon & Halbig in Grafenbad, Germany, about 1900. In good condition, it should sell in the \$1,750 to \$2,000 range.

Q. The enclosed mark is on the bottom of a 10-inch dinner plate with a scalloped gold rim and a paneled border with a stylized garden motif. The colors are red, green and blue. Can you tell me anything

about its origin, age and value?

A. This plate was made by Shore & Coggins in Longton, England, about 1900. It is fine-quality bone china and probably worth \$50 to \$60.

BELLEEK

Let's eliminate the confusion about Irish Belleek and American Belleek.

The Irish version is a beautiful, lightweight, translucent porcelain made in a factory founded in Ire-

land by David McBirney. It has a creamy iridescence like a sea shell. All kinds of articles were made—tea sets, figurines, centerpieces, etc.

Irish Belleek enjoyed such popularity in America that there soon emerged imitators in this country. Ott & Brewer in Trenton, N.J.; Ceramic Art Pottery, later Lenox China; Willets Manufacturing Co., also of Trenton; and Knowles, Taylor & Knowles of East Liverpool, Ohio, were prominent among the American manufacturers of Belleek-type porcelain.

The American version is heavier and less translucent and is not likely to be mistaken for Irish Belleek.

The Irish Belleek is easy to identify by its marks, which show some combination of a hound, tower, harp and shamrock. The American marks are also easy to recognize—they all are marked "Belleek" for obvious reasons. In addition, they usually include their own name, such as Willets, Lenox, Coxon, etc.

Strangely enough, American Belleek brings as high and sometimes higher prices than Irish Belleek. In the first place, there has been much more of the Irish Belleek made than all of the American versions combined.

Irish Belleek bearing the first mark (hound, harp and tower over Belleek) was made between 1863 and 1891. It is the most desirable and brings the highest prices.

American Belleek hasn't been made in almost 100 years and brings higher prices than Irish Belleek made in the last 50 years.

and-home purchase preferences.

Some units in new second-home developments are expensive. For example, a new residential resort community is being developed on

Catalina Island, 26 miles west of Los Angeles Harbor. The development, Hamilton Cove, will include 330 housing units—single-family residences, town houses and condominiums.

These Mediterranean-style villas are not attainable second homes

for the average family. Prices range from \$500,000 to \$1 million. Homeowners' Association dues are now estimated at about \$550 per month. That includes maintenance of moorings, 24-hour staffed gatehouse and a variety of recreational facilities.

What happened to the simple little low-cost cabin on the beach, lakefront or in the mountains.

Q. Which direction is the sales curve taking for previously owned homes?

A. Nationally, home sales have

been increasing for the past five consecutive months, according to a report from the National Association of Realtors.

"The increase in home resales, which came on the heels of a rise in housing starts, provides evidence that the housing industry is

leading the nation's economy out of an overall recession," said Harley E. Rouda, NAR president.

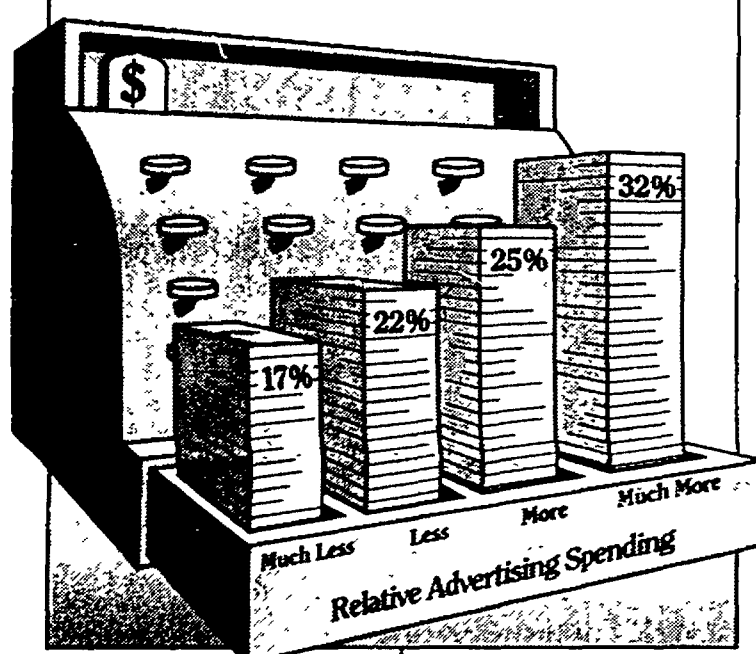

UNTIL NOW, THE VALUE OF ADVERTISING WAS SOMETHING EVEN ITS STRONGEST SUPPORTERS COULDN'T PUT INTO NUMBERS.

They could cite success stories of advertising going into a market, how this was followed by a shift in purchase patterns, in market share, in immediate sales.

But no one expressed the value of advertising as return-on-investment until The Strategic Planning Institute did its study* called PIMS (Profit Impact of Market Strategy) with the Ogilvy Center for Research and Development.

Effects of Advertising on Return-On-Investment



The study found that advertising nearly doubled return-on-investment! The graph on the left makes it perfectly clear.

Brands that advertise much more than their competitors enjoy an average return-on-investment of 32 percent. Brands that advertise much less than their competitors average 17 percent.

The PIMS study provides the first systematic evidence that links advertising, profitability, and growth. It draws on more than 700 consumer businesses in North America and Europe, spanning the years 1970 to 1986—years of both rapid and slow inflation, both good and bad years of the business cycle.

The graph on the lower right shows further evidence. It represents the competitive performance of two actual

brands over a 10-year period, as analyzed by Robert M. Prentice, a management consultant in advertising and marketing. He distinguishes between consumer-franchise-building (CFB) activities (whether advertising or promotion) and non-CFB activities.

Brand A used predominantly price-incentive promotions. Brand B spent approximately the same amount. However, most of the money went into consumer-franchise-building activities—particularly advertising and promotion.

In the first year, the two brands were nearly even in their category. But after 10 years in which they took dramatically contrasting approaches to the spending of marketing funds, they ended up in remarkably different positions.

Brand B had become a resounding success, not only in terms of its sales performance versus Brand A, but also in terms of its contributing profits to the company.

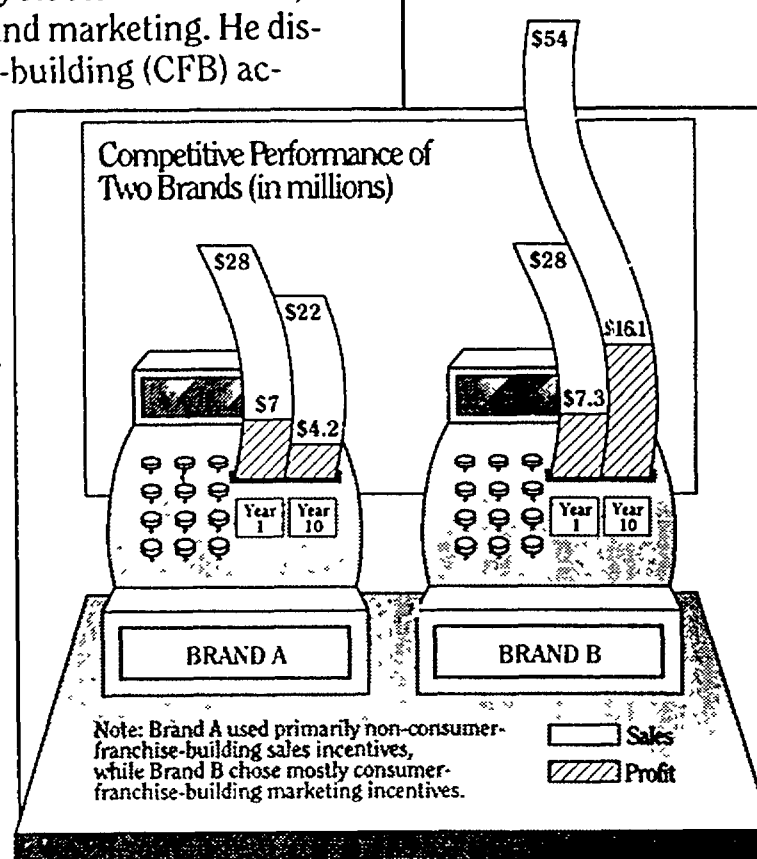
For brand franchise owners and managers, the insight into how advertising contributes to profitability will be as interesting as how much it contributes.

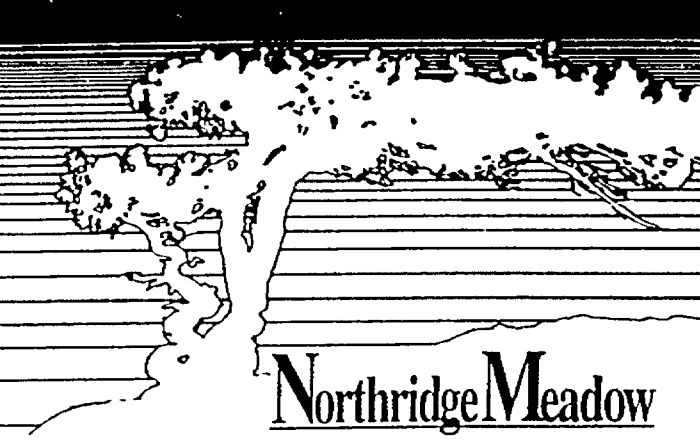

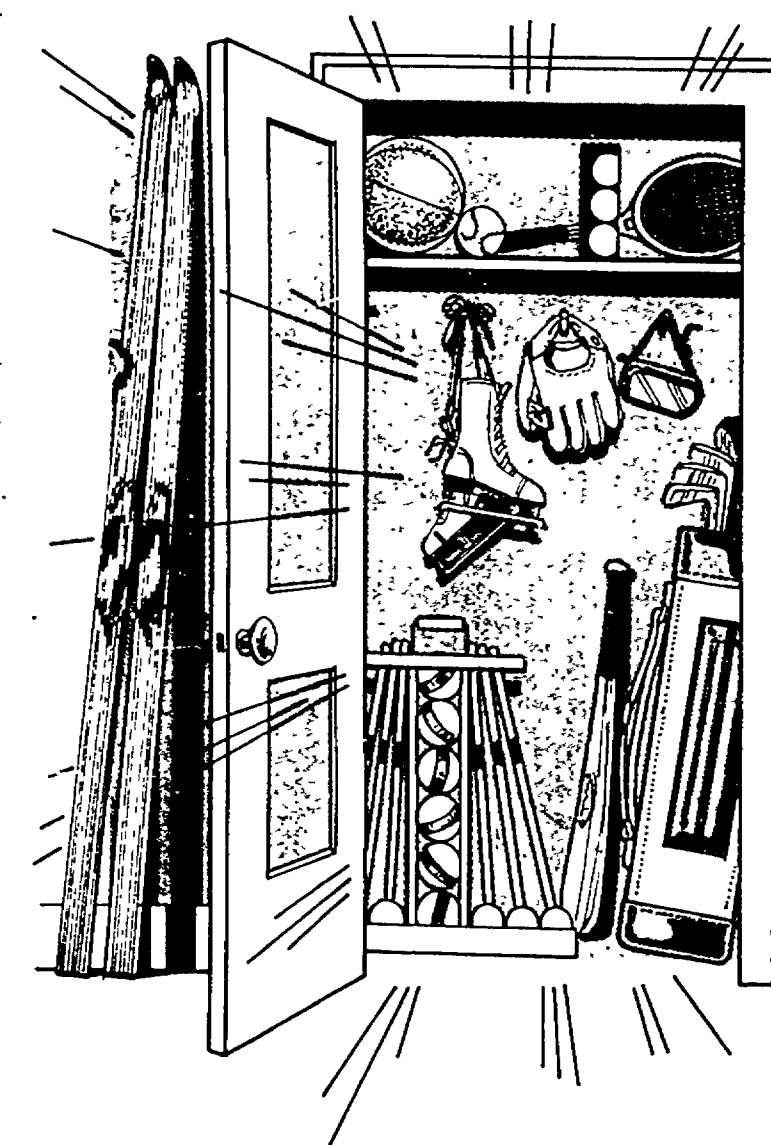

With a little help from Peggy Williams, anyone can "Create-a-Craft." Williams is the owner of a new South Lyon craft specialty business, located at 127 E. Lake St., Suite B. "Crafts are so much fun," Williams said. "I've been doing crafts for over 20 years. There is nothing nicer than making something special for someone. It is a part of you and a part of them."

Williams, 41 and a lifetime resident of South Lyon, is a very busy woman. She is the mother of four children ranging in ages from 8 to 21 years old, she works part-time as a beautician, co-owns with her brother-in-law a ceramics company in her basement, and still finds the time — and the love for crafting — to operate a business and greet each customer with small-town warmth and much expertise. Create-a-Craft opened in July of this year.

The shop stocks basic craft supplies, bridal accessories, ceramic supplies, finished and unfinished items. It also carries novel miscellaneous items such as decorated miniature cowboy hats, plastic mystic masks that are painted and decorated and country hat barrettes.

Browsing through the shop, shoppers will find ribbon, lace, plastic decals, decorative rubber stamps, craft instruction books, dollies, silk and dried flowers; also Victorian hats, straw wreaths, potpourri, wood and ceramic kitchen magnets, jewelry

supplies, wooden beads, floral pins, picks, tape, and much more. Williams said most of her stock comes from Boutique Trims in South Lyon.

The ceramic merchandise consists of greenware, bisque ware, the finished product, and the accompanying paints, glazes and brushes. Williams said she expects more ceramic supplies to be available as Christmas draws near.

The shop also designs denim jackets to the customer's specifications. Applique, pearls, studding and lace are possible options. The customer should bring in his or her own jacket.

For the most part, Williams' specialty is her line of bridal accessories. "I want to take care of the bride. I carry every bridal accessory with the exception of the wedding dress," she said.

She designs bridal veils, cake tops, table pieces, ring bearer pillows, and all bride's flowers. Williams said she works with silk flowers only. A how-to class for brides-to-be who want to make their own accessories is being planned.

In the upcoming months, the shop plans to carry more gift items, Christmas supplies, and homemade can-

dies. How-to classes for adults and children will be announced soon. Three projected classes include making your own earrings, the punch ruffle technique, and children's ceramic painting are three projected classes. The children's class is geared for ages 5 and up.

Create-a-Craft also sells Barbie doll dresses sewn by Gladys Kilbride, better known as "the Barbie doll lady." Kilbride, age 92, is a South Lyon resident.

Her handmade, carefully detailed dresses are priced under \$4 and occasionally a bridal outfit, complete with slip, is available, priced at around \$8.

And how has the shop's business been so far? "I have been very pleased," Williams said. "The economy has been so bad. But I believe that nine out of ten craft items are cheaper to make yourself. And it is so much fun."

Create-a-Craft is open Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Thursday, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., closed on Sunday. Parking is available in the rear. There is a rear entrance door as well. The telephone number is 486-9133.

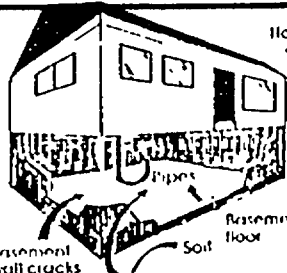

The U.S. EPA attributes as many as 20,000 lung cancer deaths each year to radon exposure, which is second only to cigarette smoking as a cause of lung cancer. The U.S. Surgeon General warns that radon gas poses a serious health threat.

900 telephone services boom

You've been presented a golden opportunity, the chance for a romantic interlude in beautiful Carmel, Calif., and you want reservations at the perfect restaurant, preferably close to the ocean, soft candle light and exquisite cuisine.

What to do? Dial DINE AMERICA on the telephone and select your restaurant of choice, not only in Carmel but most anywhere in the continental U.S.

Say there's opportunity for the perfect tryst but you lack cash enough to finance it.

Dial FINDOUT and maybe you big as a participant in a game show or sweepstakes competition.

Or say the setting for an ideal interlude is within reach but a willing participant is nowhere in sight.

Try dialing LOVELINE. Surely, someone out there fits the bill.

Whatever the interest, whatever the need, dial 1-900 on the telephone and chances are an answer or at least a useful tip is but a finger touch away, provided by the myriad of 900 services now available to the discerning consumer.

Consider these examples:

- Want to escape Michigan's winter? Dial 1-900-USA-RENT and locate a new apartment in San Diego.
- A troublesome divorce? Dial 1-900-230-JUSTICE for advice and counsel.

- Suspicious that the family cat has campylobacter? Dial PetLine, 1-900-420-6738. Or maybe you've contracted the dreaded disease from the cat. Call LIFE QUOTE for competitive prices on life insurance.

- Let's say you dial FOOTBALL SWEEPSTAKES or McMillions and win big. Prizes of up to \$10,000 are possible.

- How about a donation to Second Harvest, the nation's largest food bank. Dial 1-900-468-GIVE and help feed the hungry.

Not into poverty? Then consider a donation to your local public broad-

casting station via a local 900 number.

This and much, much more is available over the telephone — fast, easy and sometimes inexpensive service, billed monthly to your regular telephone bill.

"It's just exploded," said Linda Whiteley of the 900 industry. Whiteley edits InfoText, the industry's first trade magazine.

"This is the marketing tool of the 21st century. I liken it to the early days of the movie industry," she said of the nation's newest promotional tool with seemingly unlimited advertising capacity.

Indeed, a decade ago 900 service was unknown, first exploding on the American scene during U.S. presidential debates between Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan. Viewers were invited to dial 900 and indicate candidate preference. A half million viewers responded.

Paul Davies of Telesphere Communications, an Illinois-based firm that sells 900 service, offers a brief history of the industry since.

The response to Carter and Reagan set in motion a virtual tidal wave of 900 use. In addition to political polling, the number became a means of broadcasting information.

Since 1982, for example, each time a space shuttle is launched the National Aeronautic and Space Agency makes conversations between astronauts and mission control available through 900 service. During the Challenger disaster in 1986, thousands were listening.

In time, questionable entrepreneurs jumped in and 900 service gave rise to dial-a-porn and high-priced children's services, stirring controversy, negative press and a tarnished image. Laws were enacted, presumably to protect the innocent and naive, but most were later declared unconstitutional.

The industry has since been forced to police itself but because it is new, there are problems. Whiteley of In-

foText said.

"The industry is far more advanced than are regulations to govern it," she explained. "There are no guide books to tell us how to do things."

Three years ago the infant industry revolutionized yet again, with the introduction of "interactive" technology that allows callers to participate in conversations by selecting information from a menu of options, responding to questions and speaking to operators.

Interactive has led to an entirely new advertising medium, accountable for a projected jump in industry revenues from \$500 million this year to some \$2 billion by 1992.

National Dateline, a dating service offered throughout the country by Number One in Los Angeles, exemplifies interactive dialing. The firm also offers 200 other services.

Dial 1-900-468-4687, select potential dating prospects from a variety of personalized choices and then interview preferred candidates from recordings in their own voices. Or, select another option and list yourself in the directory. (If Jewish, reduce efforts by simply dialing YENTA DATELINE.)

Voice mailboxes, accessible by code known only to the caller, records all messages.

"Recording your own ad in your own voice definitely beats three lines in the newspaper," said Alex Bass of Number One. "Plus, you don't lose control of your telephone line when you advertise in the newspaper."

Dateline is meant to make money for Bass. But whether intended to reap profits or disseminate information, he believes 900 is the wave of the future and predicts free 800 services will eventually be replaced entirely by 900.

"Any business that brokers information should be in 900; nobody should be giving information free," he said, citing the travel industry.

Only one of every 10 inquiries

leads to a sale and commission for the travel agent, according to Bass. If inquiries came via 900 numbers, time on the phone with the other nine would at least pay for the agent's time.

All 900 calls are automatically charged to the caller's phone bill. But therein lies one of the major problems of 900 service, according to Sharon Lundeen of Sprint Gateways, one of the nation's largest 900 operators.

"Many callers claim they are unaware of the price of a call," Lundeen said, adding that pricing is mandatory in all advertising of 900 services.

Most calls, she added, cost up to \$10 each, either charged as a flat rate or by the minute. Calls may cost more, but are the exception, and the majority of services provide information and are not intended to generate revenue.

The firm's DOW JONES JOURNALPHONE, for example, provides stock quotes and news updates. RADIO HOTLINE lists current job opportunities. NATIONAL HOTROD gives daily auto racing results.

The real problem, according to Lundeen, is the absence of 900 directory information. While interesting bits of information on virtually every subject are but a finger touch away, a complete listing of what is available is non-existent.

Each service advertises itself and unless one chances upon promotional information, there is no way of knowing what is available.

Unless you chance upon promotions by DINE AMERICA, the perfect restaurant during the romantic Carmel interlude may well remain but a wish.

Unless you already know about LOVELINE, the ideal partner may remain little more than a vision.

And unless you stumble across 1-900-INFOTEXT, chances are you'll never know of the tremendous employment opportunity now available within the burgeoning 900 industry.

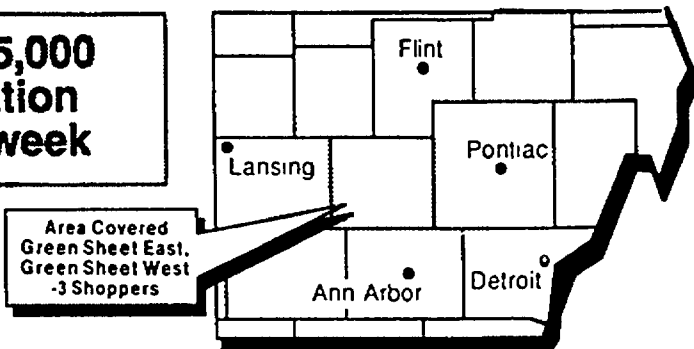

Fall Festival's roots were in picnic

Thirty-five years ago, members of the Plymouth Rotary Club decided it would be nice to host a community picnic at Hamilton Park.

The idea was to raise money to buy playground equipment for children who used the park. Rotarians served up 500 chicken dinners at their one-day event at Hamilton Park, which ironically is now known as Jaycee Park.

Little did the Rotarians know what they'd started.

Five hundred dinners would amount to a drop in the bucket at the modern-day Plymouth Fall Festival, which evolved from that chicken dinner in 1956.

It's expected that 12,000 plates of barbecue chicken will be served up Sunday, Sept. 8, the last day of the festival. The event gets under way Thursday, Sept. 5.

The fall fest is sponsored by local non-profit organizations and coordinated by the volunteer Plymouth Community Fall Festival board of directors.

Proceeds are used to fund charitable activities sponsored by the community's non-profit organizations.

Fall Festival President Zan Kafila says the 36th annual festival will feature everything last year's did, "hopefully improved upon."

"We have some wonderful entertainment coming up. Due to the generosity of the eight car dealers in the area, we were able to provide some real quality entertainment. It's wonderful, considering that economic times haven't been so good," said Kafila, who succeeds her husband Gene as festival president. The Kafilas are the second couple to have served in the volunteer office. First were Sue and Larry McElroy.

RESPONSE FROM area business people was overwhelming as well, said Kafila.

"Twenty-seven local merchants contributed funds to help us with our expenses. Response was terrific," she said.

The Plymouth Fall Festival is put on without the involvement of commercial entities, she added. "We are the only festival totally run by volunteers. The volunteers represent the service clubs for which they volunteer," she said.

"Because we are not professionals in doing this, we have to rely on our instinct and hope to do a job," said Kafila, past president of the Plymouth-Canton Civitan Club. "We hope the community enjoys, understands and is proud of the festival."

Here are some festival highlights straight from the prez:

"Friday night, we have a wonderful band, Innovation. They play all kinds of music, all kinds. They can go from '50s and '60s to current music," said Kafila. "They're a real audience pleaser. They're a wonderful listening

"We'll have more entertainers strolling around the park this year. On Sunday we will have the Sweet Adelines, and on Saturday, the Dixieland Band," she said.

"On Saturday and Sunday, we'll have the Clowns Around Redford and gymnastics demonstrations. A dance troupe called Sidekicks and karate experts will do demonstrations Saturday and Sunday. We'll have speakers set up on Main Street to project the sound

"It's going to be fun. The board this year has been very organized and has worked hard," added Kafila. Kafila also had praise for residents and businesses who good-naturedly put up with disruption caused by the festival.

"The festival manager, Joe Bida, and the assistant festival manager, his son John Bida, have gone above and beyond with the things they're doing," added Kafila.

"They're a terrific team."

"It's been a lot of work, but it's fun. We want everyone to be part of it and have fun. We just hope the weather cooperates."
