## Road work clogs up area streets

It wasn't easy to get around Northville last week — especially by car. No fewer than three main roadways in and around Northville were under construction by Thursday afternoon, spawning gridlock and motorist frustration at every turn. Considering a quick trip to township hall from the city? Not so fast. What usually is a five-minute, three-mile jaunt was slowed considerably by Western Townships Utilities Authority (WTUA) sewer construction at the Seven Mile/Sheldon Road intersection.

Traffic was backed up in every direction, and northbound Sheldon traffic stretched halfway to Six Mile by 4 p.m. Thursday.

Back-tracking down Main Street and out Northville Road didn't provide a quick fix, either. Main Street was closed near Griswold on Thursday, and work on the Wayne County Super Sewer has blocked traffic on Northville Road between Six Mile and Seven Mile roads for weeks.

When will it all end? At least one of the projects is due for completion today.

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## Budget group is ready to cut

The sheath comes off the budget-cutting knife Wednesday, at the first meeting of the township budget review committee.

Committee members are slated to pore over budget requests relating to offices of the township manager, finance director, and treasurer, as well as hall and grounds, general administration, and revenues categories, said Dwayne Harrigan, township finance director.

The meeting is scheduled for 2 p.m. in the township hall conference room, and will conclude by 5 p.m., Harrigan said.

The public may attend budget review sessions, but debate is limited to members of the review committee.

Wednesday's session offers the initial glimpse into the township's budget reduction strategy. With expected 1992 revenues totaling slightly less than \$4 million, and proposed expenditures topping \$4 million, the committee must recommend enough cuts to provide a balanced budget.

The township board will make the final determination on budget cuts, and must adopt a new budget by a state-mandated Nov. 1 deadline.

The committee must also mull the township's sagging fund balance situation. The fund balance — monies held in reserve as a buffer against non-budgeted expenses — has slipped dramatically in the past two years, currently holding at about

\$56,000.

That figure is but spare change when compared against a \$4-million proposed budget. Auditors generally recommend a fund balance of 5-to-10 percent for local government operations, but township finance officials say the reserve could completely disappear in 1992.

In fact, this year's fund balance is targeted to reduce the preliminary budget deficit from \$139,000 to \$83,000. Committee members may have to cut much closer to the bone if they wish to balance the current projected budget and restock fund balance coffers.

Harrigan on Thursday said expected revenue figures will probably hold at just under \$4 million. The township receives its revenues, or operating funds, from sources including property taxes, state returned revenues, local building permits, assorted township fees, licensing and law enforcement, and this year a \$360,000 transfer from a debt service account.

But financial requests and obligations quickly chew up the revenues. The combined departments scheduled for review Wednesday account for just under \$500,000 of the township budget.

Additional budget review committee sessions have yet to be scheduled, but Harrigan said the group likely would meet every Wednesday until the review process is completed.

"We're hoping to get this done by early October," Harrigan said.

## Co-op preschool marks 40 years

Lisa Engles fondly remembers her days as a student at the Northville Cooperative Preschool. So fondly, in fact, that she sent her own kids to the school.

Just starting its 40th year, the Co-op Preschool allows parents to get involved with the early education of their children.

"I had good memories of it, and I wanted to be involved with my child's education," Engles said. She now has two kids in the program.

The co-op requires parents to work in class two or three times each month. Besides allowing parents to get involved with their children's education, the co-op thereby manages to keep costs down.

Charges range from \$35 a month for 2-year-olds to \$60 a month for 3- and 4-year-olds. Classes are scheduled by age group so mothers

with two kids of different ages may have to make babysitting arrangements on their scheduled day at the co-op. Engles said she sometimes trades baby-sitting responsibilities with other mothers in the program.

Parents not only work in the classes and attend monthly meetings, they also help run the program, said board member Cindy Atkinson.

"Parents run the school through a governing board. Parents have a vote and a say," she said. Each class has one teacher. Moms and dads are both welcome to fill the requirement for working in the classroom.

Another bonus, Atkinson said, is the program costs less because not as many employees are needed.

"We're quite a bit cheaper than a lot of preschools because parents come in and work," Atkinson said.

In its 40 years of existence, the program has been held at the First Presbyterian Church of

Northville, 200 E. Main St., and in school buildings. It currently is held in the church, but the program is independently run and not affiliated with the church.

Atkinson said the program is fun for parents as well as their children.

Both of her kids will be in regular schools next fall. "I'm going to miss it next year," she said.

Atkinson got involved after sending her son to a program where parents were not allowed to participate.

"I didn't want to just drop him off. I didn't know what they were doing," she said.

Like Engles, Atkinson sent her kids to preschool to learn social skills.

"I thought they needed to be around other kids," she said.

The program emphasizes learning through play.

Students are taught skills like recognizing their name and counting in a relaxed and unstructured environment.

A somewhat-unusual aspect to the program, Atkinson said, is that 2-year-olds are welcome. And they don't have to be out of diapers.

# Police arrest suspect after series of incidents

Northville Township police charged a 26-year-old Northville woman with disorderly conduct and resisting arrest early Sept. 2 after a series of incidents at residences along Silver Springs Drive.

## Northville Opera House was good source of entertainment

An early ordinance said: "It shall not be lawful for any person, or persons to make or exhibit any show or shows, or to perform any plays, games, theatrical or other performances, or concerns — whatever, or to exhibit any natural or other curiosities, within said Village, for which pay or compensation shall be required or demanded of any kind, without having been previously licensed so to do by the Board of Trustees of said Village."

The penalty for violation of the ordinance was a fine of between \$5 and \$100 for every offense.

The village board also prohibited the use of fireworks without the board's permission. The penalty was \$1 for every offense.

In 1876, fund-raising began to construct a \$10,000 opera house at the corner of what is today Dunlap and Center streets. The opera remained standing until 1950.

Sam Little, founding editor and publisher of *The Northville Record*, was responsible for the opera house's construction.

The building was constructed piece by piece as money was raised, according to Jack Hoffman in his book *Northville — The First Hundred Years*.

Little often used the *Record* to ask readers for money to aid the project.

In 1877, benefit concerts were held to raise money for Little's endeavor.

Little, and Northville, attracted the attention of newspapers in Jackson and Detroit who praised Little for his efforts.

Little reprinted an item from the *Jackson Times* commenting on the opera house.

He followed with his own comment in the April 7, 1877, *Record*, writing, "What man can say after reading the above item that Northville is lacking in entertainment or money, when the sum of \$10,000 can be subscribed by its citizens. Few towns of this size can afford to be so liberal and, in fact, but few towns can compete with this in any way."

But the opera house construction was not trouble free. Village officials criticized Little for the "clutter" created on nearby streets as a result

of the construction.

When complete, the opera house was brick with a 22-foot deep cellar intended for use as the publication office for the *Record*.

In 1879, Little wrote: "If the editor of this paper keeps his health and can get a dollar now and then for those indebted to him, the obscure little village of Northville will soon boast of as fine an opera house as there is in the state outside of Detroit and capable of seating 800 or 1,000 people."

The Fourth of July in 1879 was celebrated with a dedication ball for the still-unfinished opera house.

Little left town the next year, possibly before the opera house was completed, Hoffman writes.

The opera house was torn down in 1950 although Henry Ford I had hoped to put the building in Greenfield Village. The building's owner, Sam Pickard, refused to sell the building for less than his asking price, according to Hoffman.

During the time it stood as a useful structure, the opera house was used not only to showcase opera singers, but also by local students who provided the Village of Northville with entertainment.

Northville schools attempted to avoid extra-curricular activities, according to reports gathered by Hoffman.

In 1908, teachers were forbidden by the superintendent to help students raise money for graduation expenses.

The students made arrangements to use the opera house and perform a play. They were trained by a local amateur actor, William Tinham.

When the play was performed, the students performed to a full house earning enough money to pay their expenses and purchase graduation invitations.

Similarly, early sports teams were not supported by the schools.

The first athletic teams had no coaches and the team was required to supply its own equipment.

No athletic teams at all existed for several years after 1899, Hoffman writes. In 1905 the superintendent forbade students from forming a football team, according to Hoffman.

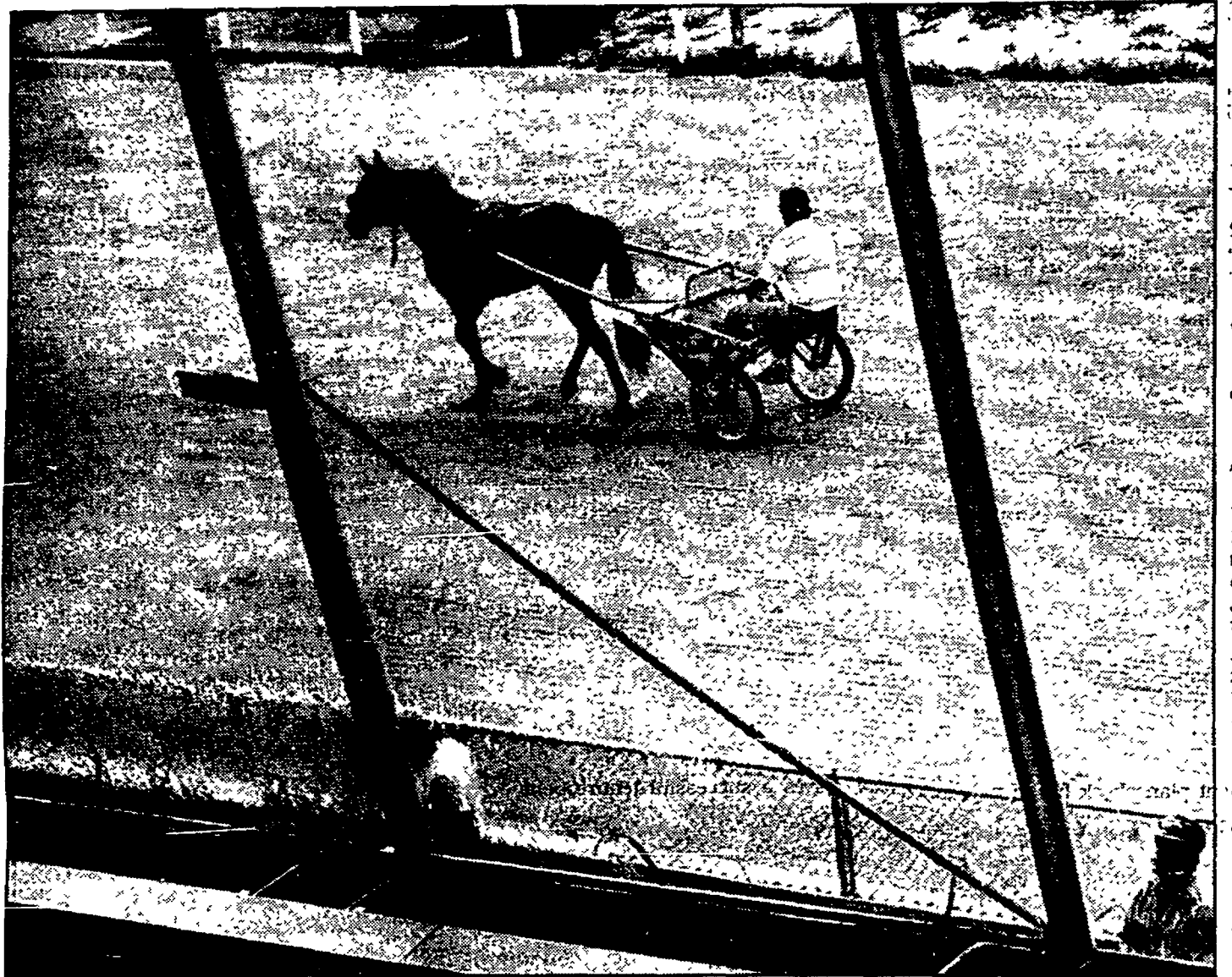

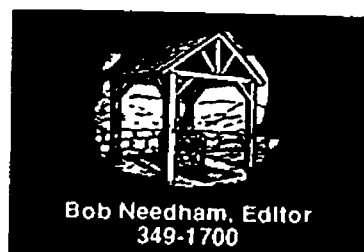

## Our Opinion

### Goss served township well as its supervisor

This evening at a ceremony at the Mayflower Hotel in downtown Plymouth, Georgina Goss will be sworn in as the new state representative for the 36th District. It marks the beginning of a new career for her, of course, but it also marks the end of a more than a decade of service at the township level.

Goss should have a productive career ahead in Lansing, but let's not forget her accomplishments at Northville Township Hall.

She first entered township employment as deputy clerk, moving up to clerk and being appointed supervisor in late 1986. At that time she outlined some of the issues she wanted to address, some of the problems she wanted to tackle. It's an interesting list.

The new supervisor's agenda included things like doing something about the prisons in the township; settling the question of where the township would get additional sewer capacity; and moving government-owned land onto the tax rolls, particularly that pesky thousand acres owned by Wayne County.

So, a quick check of the record: One of the two prisons in the township now sits closed, thanks to a deal which also brought new recreation land to the community and will free up some state-owned land for private development. The Western Townships Utility Authority will soon be sending sewage to Ypsilanti, as the recent sewer construction around the township attests. And the county land parcel is more or less in the hands of the R.A. DeMattia Company, which proposes a hugely ambitious development plan chock full of new tax base.



Add to that significant progress on other issues which have gained new importance during Goss' tenure: For example, the pressing questions of trash disposal and recycling seem well on track. And all the while she has made and helped make good appointments and good hires of key staff members and board/commission members who will continue to serve the township well.

In short, less than five years after becoming supervisor Goss has at least partially accomplished all her major goals and many minor ones. Although at times it seemed like progress on these fronts was snail's-pace slow or even nonexistent, the perspective of several years shows different. And while the township still faces enough challenges and problems to provide Goss' successor with an instant set of headaches, the outgoing supervisor deserves credit for accomplishing most of what she set out to do.

Goss will undoubtedly continue to serve the Northville community well in Lansing. She can move on to this new role secure in the knowledge that she leaves a successful tenure behind.

### NHS Jazz Ensemble does Northville proud

Today, the members of the Northville High School Jazz Ensemble are in school with the rest of the students, going to class and trying to learn something.

A week ago today, the picture was different: It was Labor Day, and the Jazz Ensemble was in Hart Plaza in downtown Detroit, playing its collective heart out before an appreciative audience.

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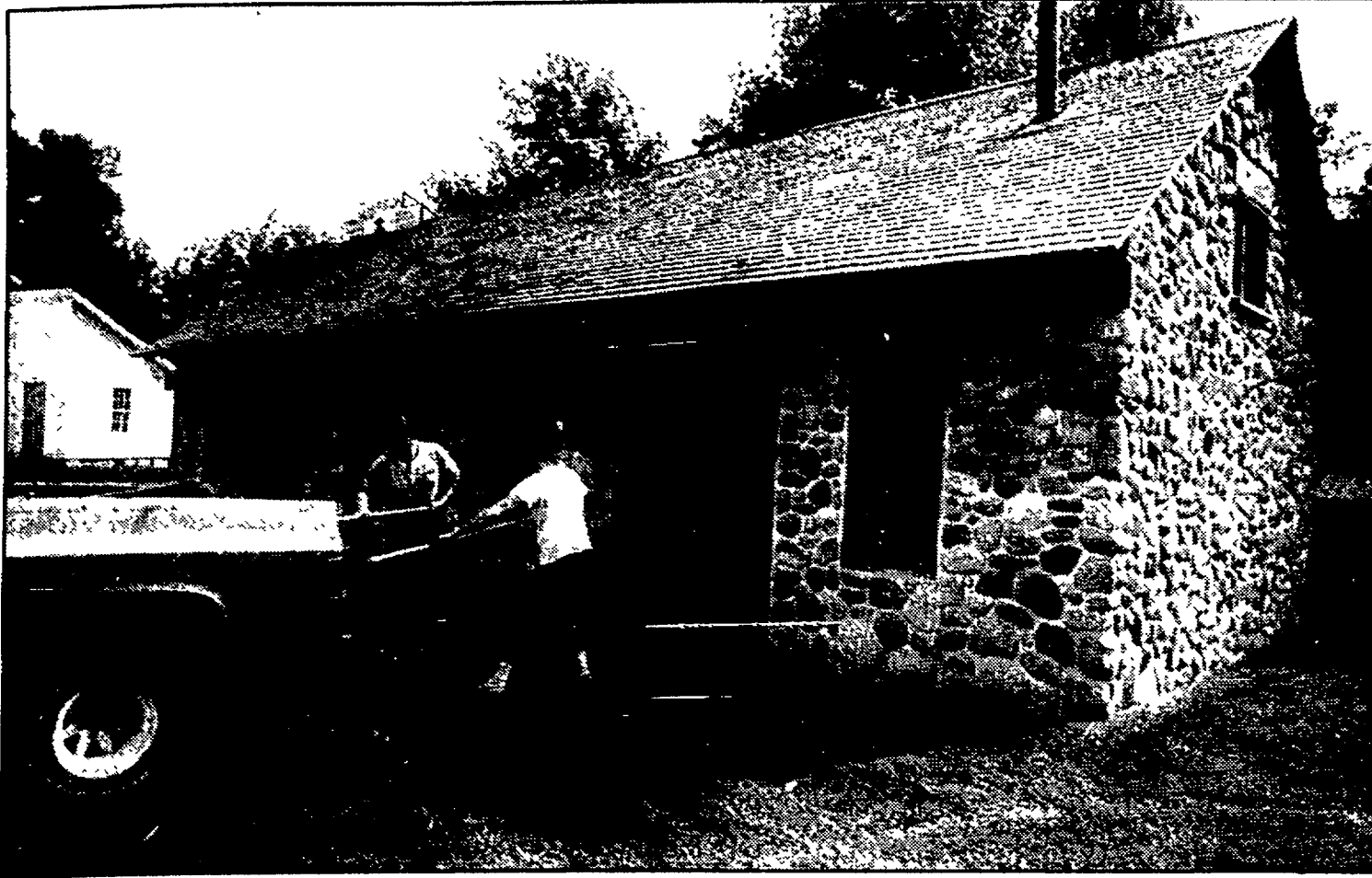

# Sprucing up Mill Race

Tree donation program is part of overall landscape plan for historic village

This summer may be coming to a close, but the Northville Historical Society continues to bring new life to Mill Race Village.

Historical society members and volunteers spent the past several months planting period flower gardens and shrubs in Northville's Victorian-era village. And in October, dozens of trees will be installed along the lane that winds between the historic buildings and across the village's eastern edge.

The historical society is financing the plantings in part through an "Adopt-a-Tree" program, said society member Carolyn Stuart. For a donation of \$250 each, sugar and norway maple trees may be dedicated to a family member or friend. "We're hoping that in the future they can be tapped to make maple syrup," Stuart said.

"For smaller donations, we're going to be planting large amounts of certain bulbs like narcissus and crocus," she added. The flowers may be adopted for donations from \$50-\$200 a bed.

Specific planting locations are available on a first-come, first-served basis.

The fall program is a continuation of Mill Race's overall landscape plan, developed by historical society member Thom Holleman of Domas Construction.

This year's planting program has become a community event, with sev-

eral groups involved, Stuart said. "Our hope is to encourage local groups to become involved in the Mill Race village," she said.

"We have a number of volunteer groups that are adopting areas out there for gardening," she said. "The Country Girls branch of the National Farm and Garden Association already has an adopted garden area in front of the Hunter House for a number of years."

More recently, the Northville branch of same group adopted a perennial garden area in front of Yerkes House, while the Wayne County Master Gardener's Association has adopted a herb and dyeing garden at the Weaver's Cottage and a local senior Girl Scout troop under the direction of Carole Jean Stockhausen has decided to plant a day lily and bulb garden.

Pat Hibbard, a local authority on roses and a judge for the American Rose Society, planted a large garden of old-fashioned rose varieties on the side of the Yerkes House this spring. "That one's an established garden," Stuart said. "It's been growing all summer and it's quite beautiful."

The historical society has been assisted in its work by local landscapers including Mountain Top Green Ridge Tree Service, Happy Home Housecare and Rollin Landscape of Farmington Hills, and by Northville's public works director, Ted Mapes.

In May, the society held a Saturday morning planting bee in conjunction with its annual village cleanup.

day," said Deloris Newell, WTUA executive director on Friday. "The sidewalk will be replaced Monday and crews should be totally out of there after Monday."

WTUA's next concentration will be in the Fish Hatchery Park and Edenderry areas, said Ann Bollin, former WTUA executive director.

"They'll just about be out of Northville by the end of fall," Bollin said.

City commuters have several months worth of road construction to look forward to, as water mains are replaced and storm sewers are improved on East Main, Hutton, Dun-

lap, Wing and Fairbrook streets. The repairs are part of a \$585,000 public improvement project awarded in August to Thomson-McCully Co. of Belleville and are being coordinated by the city's engineering firm, McNeely & Lincoln.

McNeely & Lincoln engineer Robert Warner said the work could extend into December, depending on the weather. But at least one lane of traffic will be maintained through most construction areas, and the work on Main Street will be scheduled around upcoming events including the Victorian Festival Sept. 14-16.

"We'll get it cleaned up in time for

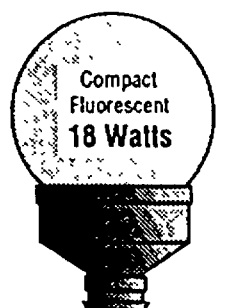
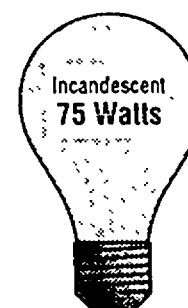
the festival," Warner said.

After the festival, Thomson-McCully will move its equipment to Hutton and Dunlap, and then Wing Street to repair a storm sewer there.

Bridge construction on Northville Road could drag on into October, a Wayne County official said Friday.

### Dry Creek Valley turns out wines of deep flavor

Separated by a range of hills, the American Viticultural Area known as Dry Creek Valley runs parallel to Alexander Valley in northern Sonoma County. The northern end is warm, and lacking a river influence, it is an ideal region for growing zinfandel and cabernet sauvignon with ripe berry flavors and melony sauvignon blanc.

The fertile, well-drained, valley-floor soils, influenced by morning fog in the south, are also well known for quality sauvignon blanc with a heightened grassy character.

The Dry Creek Valley benchlands have red soils and less fog influence. This is an area that boasts 100-year-old zinfandel vines and distinguished cabernet sauvignon exhibiting attractive herbal, dill and olive components.

Doug Nalle, co-owner and winemaker at Nalle Winery who has experience working with Dry Creek fruit, believes that the region should be divided into north and south.

"It is impossible to say that Dry Creek is best for one varietal over another because the boundaries are too general," he said. "When identifying best locations, north versus south must be considered, based on temperature differences as well as soil and site."

John Pedroncelli owns the oldest producing winery (since 1927) in Dry Creek Valley. "Even in Bordeaux, there are good sites and poor ones," he explains. "They're not all first growths!"

In the warmer, upper end of Dry Creek Valley, Preston Vineyards is demonstrating that southern Rhone varietals, such as syrah and mourvedre, are successful.

"When planted on gravelly soil, syrah achieves good flavor development and smoky, earthy, ripe plum characters akin to the northern Rhone," said Lou Preston, owner of Preston Vineyards.

"Typical Dry Creek zinfandel develops ripe fruit, jammy, raspberry and blackberry flavors and spiciness (cinnamon, clove, allspice). It's not heavy and tannic, but medium-bodied with a claret-like quality."

"When grown on well-drained benchland, Dry Creek cabernet sauvignon exhibits soft tannins with a combination of cassis and black currant fruit accompanied by a delicate herbal, cedary-spice quality. The wines are typically round and soft with medium body. They are accessible when young and do not require lengthy bottle age to be attractive."

In 1971, David Stare founded Dry Creek Vineyards in the Dry Creek Valley. "The Dry Creek sauvignon blanc is a very flavorful grape and produces a grassy, herbaceous style," said Stare. "The heavy, rich bottomland soil of the valley floor encourages vine vigor and a characteristic herbaceousness."

"When I started making sauvignon blanc from 100 percent Dry Creek fruit, it had a strong varietal character that I like in the wine. But this business is market driven, and the consumer

### For certified chef, learning never stops

Over the last four years I have been a chef-instructor at Schoolcraft College. Many things happened in those years.

During these last years, my association with professional chefs has been a learning experience. They are a group that is truly committed to the betterment of their field, and, equally as important, the education of the public.

# Setting the stage with appetizers

"As a youngster I was one of three boys in the family and we had to cook because our mom worked. Later, I worked my way through college working in dorm kitchens," he continued.

A former New Yorker, Burt is a designer who became so interested in cooking while taking classes at Perfect Pan school he became an assistant there.

The AIFW is a non-profit educational organization promoting a broad exchange of information and ideas to benefit all who care about wine and food — from chefs and restaurateurs to dedicated amateurs. Cooking expert Julia Child is one of the founders.

Here are some appetizer suggestions from four of the AIFW's male cooks.

## ANTIPASTO SPREAD AND DIP

2 pounds Japanese eggplant (5 to 6 eggplants)  
1 pound Roma tomatoes (5 to 6 tomatoes), peeled, seeded and diced  
3 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped  
2 tablespoons fresh parsley, chopped  
2 cloves garlic, minced or pressed  
1 teaspoon fresh thyme (or a half teaspoon dried thyme, crushed)  
1 teaspoon salt (optional)  
¼ teaspoon red pepper flakes (or to taste)  
¼ freshly ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons Balsamic vinegar  
2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Yields about three cups  
Steam or microwave eggplant until easily pierced with fork, 3 to 5 minutes. When cool enough to handle, remove skin and cube.

In medium bowl, combine eggplant with tomatoes, basil, parsley, garlic, thyme, salt and peppers. Add vinegar and oil and mix well. Allow to marinate for several hours or overnight in refrigerator.

Pour mixture into food processor with metal blade and process on high 3 to 5 minutes until smooth and well-blended.

Serve as spread or dip with celery and carrots, cherry tomatoes, and sliced and toasted bread rounds.

## TERRINE OF CHICKEN WITH HAZELNUTS

1 whole chicken  
2 carrots, cut into chunks  
1 onion (peeled and quartered)  
¾ pound lean ground pork  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 tablespoon white pepper  
¼ cup whipping cream  
1 cup whole hazelnuts (toasted)  
Mustard Dill Sauce

Yields 4 to 6 servings

Place chicken in a large stock pot. Cover with water, cover and simmer over medium heat until chicken is cooked through.

Remove chicken from liquid and bone. Set chicken meat aside. Return bones to cooking pot, add carrots and onion and simmer until liquid is reduced from 8 cups to 1.

Strain stock to remove carrots and onion chunks and bones; discard. Cool resulting rich stock.

Cut ¼ pound of boned chicken into small cubes and set aside. Combine remaining chicken (should be about ¾ pound) with pork in food processor and chop coarsely. Reserve ¼ of mixture to large bowl.

To processor add eggs, flour and pepper and process until creamy. Add to reserve mixture.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. To chicken and pork mixture, blend in cream, hazelnuts, cubed chicken and stock. Combine well.

Place into 5-cup terrine (preferably glass). Cover with foil. Place terrine in large shallow pan. Pour boiling water into pan halfway up sides of terrine.

Bake 1 ½ hours. Remove foil during last half-hour to brown slightly. Cool on rack. Refrigerate overnight. Serve with Mustard Dill Sauce.

## MUSTARD DILL SAUCE

4 Tablespoons Dijon Mustard (grained or plain — to taste)  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
3 tablespoons chopped fresh dill (half, if using dried)  
1 tablespoon sugar  
2 tablespoons white wine vinegar  
½ cup olive oil (preferable extra virgin)

Yields 4 to 6 servings

Place all ingredients except olive oil in blender. Blend few seconds un-

til mixture is pastelike. Slowly add olive oil in stream until mixture thickens.

## PARMESAN CRACKERS

1 loaf very thin sliced white bread  
2 cloves garlic  
1 stick butter  
¾ pound freshly grated Parmesan cheese (preferably parmigiano-reggiano, available at Italian specialty stores)  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Trim crusts from bread and cut in rectangular halves.

Coarsely chop garlic and add to butter. Melt butter. Remove garlic after it has flavored butter — 1 to 2 minutes.

Lightly brush jelly roll pan (cookie sheet) with some melted butter. Spread bread in single layer on top. Do not leave spaces between bread slices. Brush remaining butter over bread slices and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

Place pan in preheated oven. Bake until really browned and crustified. Cool on rack. Store in air-tight container.

## HERBED CHERRY TOMATOES

1 basket cherry tomatoes  
1 teaspoon olive oil  
Herbs: The dish tastes better and is more colorful when fresh herbs are used, but dried, crushed herbs can be used. You will need total of about 2 tablespoons. Use any combination: basil, rosemary, thyme, sage, marjoram, Italian parsley.  
Salt and pepper to taste

Yields 6 servings

Wash, hull and dry cherry tomatoes. Put olive oil in plastic bag large enough to hold tomatoes.

Place tomatoes in bag and gently roll to coat tomatoes with oil. Place tomatoes in bag and gently roll to coat tomatoes with oil. Set tomatoes aside, in bag.

Finely chop herbs and spread them evenly in flat dish that will hold tomatoes in one layer. (If fresh herbs are used, chop just before serving or they will turn black.) Add salt and pepper to taste.

Place tomatoes on top of herbs and gently swirl dish to coat tomatoes. (If too much oil has been used herbs will coat dish instead of tomatoes.) Use

your fingers or tooth pick to pick up tomatoes.

## EASY STYLE PICCOLO GOAT CHEESE PIZZAS

1 large (or 2 small) green bell peppers  
2 tablespoons olive oil, divided use  
1 (14- to 15-ounce) can tomato sauce with tomato bits  
¼ cup (or more) tomato paste  
1 garlic clove, peeled  
¼ teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons cornmeal  
Pizza Crust  
1 piece goat cheese (chevre), about 2 ounces or more

Yields 4 to 6 servings  
Core and seed green pepper, then cut into 32 or more strips 2 inches long by ¼ inch wide. Saute in 1 tablespoon olive oil in skillet over low heat until tender (not brown), about 10 minutes. Set aside.

Combine tomato sauce with tomato paste. Set aside. Mash into pulp garlic clove. Add salt, mix in remaining 1 tablespoon olive oil in skillet. Saute about 5 minutes. Set aside.

Combine tomato sauce mixture and garlic in shallow pan. Add dried basil, black pepper, mix together; cover. Simmer about 15 minutes. Set aside.

Prepare premixed pizza crust per carton instructions. After baking 5 minutes, take out of oven and cut 8 to 12 3- or 4-inch circles with cookie cutter and place circles on cornmeal-dusted cookie sheet.

Adorn pizza circles as follows: Spread tomato mix over each pizza to edges.

Arrange green pepper strips in square shape on borders of each.

Place square slices of goat cheese in center of green borders. (Shape goat cheese into oblong chunk to fit pizza border design, then slice off and place.)

Return completed pizza arrangement to 400-degree oven for 10 to 15 minutes, until cheese is heated through and soft.

Serve hot or warm. If desired, garnish serving dish with fresh basil leaves. Sprinkle few chopped basil leaf bits on top of each goat cheese for added decoration.

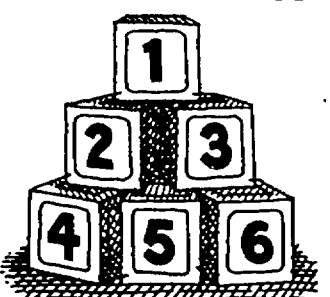
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# For true chowderheads

## Bostoner lends tips for afficionadoes

Folks in Boston take their chowder, or "chowdah" as they call it, very seriously. And we're not just talking about the Manhattan red vs. New England white controversy.

In Boston, there is only one chowder. It's white. It contains fish, salt pork, onions, potatoes and milk or cream.

Jasper White of the city's acclaimed Jasper's Restaurant knows how to make real chowder.

"It's a 'frame of mind' kind of thing," White said recently by phone from Boston, where he had been digging his car out under 14 inches of snow. "If you set out to make a soup, it won't work. If you set out to make a stew, you're in the spirit of what a chowder really is."

The best New England fish chowder starts with impeccably fresh fish, he said.

"The cod family is the best; if I had to pick just one fish, I'd pick haddock. On the West Coast, I'd use black cod. But any firm white fish with medium oil content will work. And salmon makes very good chowder."

Lean fish such as sole is not appropriate, nor is a firm, oily fish such as swordfish, he said.

White prefers to add the fish as whole fillets or in very large pieces. "It will get broken up somewhat as it's stirred. But it's nice to get a big chunk of fish when you dig in."

After that, it's a slow, gentle cooking process that results in a hearty, fragrant stew, thick with ingredients.

"But no flour," White hastened to add. "It gets thick from the potatoes. You shouldn't set out to make it thick; it will just happen."

The word "chowder" is thought to come from the French chaudiere, the iron pot or kettle that was hung over the open hearth of the Atlantic-hugging Brittany region. Fishermen from Brittany probably introduced the chunky stews here.

Today, they are as much a part of New England cuisine as brown bread, baked beans and fried scrod. And they should be appreciated as such.

White disdains the practice of ordering a tiny cup of chowder as prelude to a big feast.

"Most chowders should be served as a main course," he said. "They are hearty, satisfying soups."

He is equally disdainful about the idea of tinkering with a grand tradition in the name of "lightness."

"Without salt pork or bacon and cream, it's not chowder," White said with characteristic frankness. "I don't cut back on the butter, either; that's not what chowders are all about. If people are concerned, they should just eat a little less."

At Jasper's, White uses a blend of stock and cream to get a rich, but not cloying, taste and texture.

But chowders are not just restaurant fare, White hastens to point out.

"We make chowders all the time at home," he said. "And during the summer when we're in Maine (where the Whites have a summer home), we make chowders with the haddock and hake we catch."

White's favorite stew is his lobster and corn chowder, which he serves with homemade corn fritters. "It's such a logical combination," he said. "This chowder epitomizes the summer foods of New England."

In his introduction to the lobster-and-corn chowder recipe (contained in White's book, "Jasper White's Cooking From New England"), White explains how he uses native sweet butter and sugar corn, Vermont corn-cob-smoked bacon, Maine lobsters and unprocessed sweet cream from Guilford, Vt.

### LOBSTER AND CORN CHOWDER

4 (1 pound) lobsters  
6 ears corn on the cob (3 1/2 cups kernels)  
8 sprigs fresh thyme  
1 teaspoon whole black peppercorns  
4 bay leaves  
1 onion, peeled, for stock  
3 medium onions, cut in large (1/2-inch) dice (3 cups)  
1/2 pound slab smoked bacon, with rind  
4 tablespoons unsalted butter  
8 small new potatoes (1 pound), red or white, cut in 1/2-inch slices  
1 1/2 cups heavy cream  
Salt and freshly ground pepper  
Chopped chives or parsley for garnish  
Yields 4 servings  
Bring generous amount of fresh sea water or salted water to boil, enough to cover lobsters completely when they are added. When water is at rolling boil, add lobsters. When water comes back to boil, cook lobsters 3 minutes exactly. Drain. When lobsters have cooked enough, break off tail and claws.  
Crack claws and arms and carefully remove all meat. Cut tails in half lengthwise and remove intestinal tracts. Cut meat into large bite-size pieces; set aside in refrigerator. Put all shells and bodies in large kettle and add to kettle. Pick leaves off fresh thyme and set aside; put stems of thyme in kettle. Add peppercorns,

bay leaves and whole onion to kettle. Simmer for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Strain stock (you should have 6 to 7 cups).

Cut bacon into small (1/4-inch) dice and render in soup pot until crisp. Add diced onions, thyme leaves and butter and cook until onions are wilted and tender (about 6 minutes); do not brown. Add corn, potatoes and stock. Simmer about 2 minutes or until potatoes are cooked through. Add cream and lobster meat. Season to taste with salt and pepper and simmer 2 minutes more. Serve in soup plates with chunks of ingredients sticking out above broth. Sprinkle each bowl with chopped chives or parsley.

### NEW ENGLAND FISH CHOWDER

3 1/2 pounds fresh cod fillets, skinless and boneless  
1/2 pound meaty salt pork, cut in 1/4- to 1/2-inch dice  
4 tablespoons unsalted butter  
2 medium to large onions, cut in large (1/2-inch) dice (3 cups)  
3 bay leaves  
1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme leaves  
3 or 4 large Maine or other boiling potatoes, peeled and cut lengthwise in half, then into 1/4-inch slices  
3 cups strong fish stock (recipe follows)  
2 cups heavy cream  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley and/or chervil  
8 tablespoons (1 stick) unsalted butter  
Yields 8 to 10 servings.

Prepare fish by removing any excess skin and picking out any bones with pair of tweezers. If you use a knife to cut out bones, be sure to leave fillets in as large pieces as possible.

Render salt pork in large soup pot until it begins to crisp. Add butter, onions, bay leaves and thyme. Cook for 5 minutes or until onions become soft. Add potatoes and fish stock and simmer for 20 minutes or until potatoes are tender.

Remove bay leaves and add cod fillets and heavy cream. Simmer slowly until fish is cooked through and begins to flake (about 8 to 10 minutes). Season to taste with salt and pepper. Stir in chopped parsley and/or chervil. Remove from heat.

Using slotted spoon, transfer chunks of fish, onions and potatoes to soup plates; then ladle over piping-hot broth. Put dollop of butter into each plate of soup and serve with crackers or biscuits.

### FISH STOCK

2 1/2 to 2 pounds fish bones  
2 tablespoons unsalted butter  
1 large leek, washed well and chopped small  
1 medium onion, chopped small  
3 stalks celery, chopped small  
2 carrots, peeled and sliced thin  
3 bay leaves  
2 sprigs fresh thyme  
4 or 5 parsley stems  
1/2 teaspoon whole black peppercorns  
1 cup dry white wine  
Salt (optional)  
Yields 1 quart.

Cut bones into pieces 2 to 3 inches across. Trim bones of any excess skin or viscera that may still be attached. Rinse or soak if necessary in cold water to completely remove any traces of blood.

Melt butter in stockpot on low heat and add leek; onion, celery, carrots, bay leaves, thyme, parsley stems and peppercorns. Cook for about 5 minutes, stirring a few times.

Add wine and place fish bones on top of vegetables. Cover pot and allow bones to sweat in the aromatic steam. After 2 minutes, remove lid and pour in 4 cups water, enough to cover fish bones.

Raise heat and bring stock to boil. Skim top, then reduce to slow simmer. Simmer for 10 minutes. If you like, you can lightly salt the stock.

Gently strain stock through fine strainer and chill as quickly as possible.

### CORN FRITTERS

3 ears sweet corn  
1/2 cup yellow cornmeal  
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
1 tablespoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper  
2 thick slices of bacon, cut in small (1/4-inch) dice  
2 eggs  
1 cup milk  
1 red bell pepper, cut in small (1/4-inch) dice (1/2 cup)  
1 small onion, grated  
1 tablespoon chopped chives  
Corn or other vegetable oil for deep-frying  
Yields 8 servings.  
Husk corn and blanch it in plenty of boiling salted water. Drain and cut off kernels (you should have about 1 1/2 cups). Set aside.  
Mix together cornmeal, flour, baking powder, salt,

pepper and cayenne pepper. Sift into mixing bowl.

Cook bacon until crisp. Add bacon as well as fat to dry mixture. Add eggs, milk, bell pepper, onion, chives and corn and mix well. Chill batter for at least 1 hour.

Heat oil to 350 F in pot appropriate for deep-frying. Using serving spoon, drop spoonfuls of batter quickly into oil so all cook equally. Do not crowd pot. Check first fritters. If necessary, batter can be adjusted slightly (thinned with milk or thickened with flour). Drain fritters on paper towels and serve while still very hot and crisp.

### NEW ENGLAND CLAM CHOWDER

1 pound quahogs or other clams  
Scraps of onion, celery, thyme and bay leaf (optional)  
1/2 pound smoked bacon or salt pork, cut in small (1/4-inch) dice  
2 medium onions, cut in medium (1/2-inch) dice (2 1/2 cups)  
2 bay leaves  
1 tablespoon chopped fresh thyme  
2 tablespoons unsalted butter  
5 or 6 red or white new potatoes, roughly cut in 1/2-inch dice  
2 cups heavy cream  
Freshly ground black pepper  
2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley  
Yields 8 servings.

Scrub clams thoroughly and place in large pan with 2 cups water and any scraps of onion, celery, thyme and bay leaf you may have around. Cover and place on high heat until quahogs are steamed completely open.

Pour off liquid and reserve. Remove clams from their shells; roughly chop (about 3/8-inch pieces); set aside. Carefully pour liquid (about 3 cups) through fine strainer; set aside.

Slowly render bacon or salt pork in soup pot until slightly crisp. Add onions, bay leaves, thyme and butter. When onions are translucent, add potatoes and broth from quahogs. Simmer until potatoes are cooked (about 12 minutes).

Add chopped clams and cream and simmer 5 minutes more. Season to taste with pepper and add chopped parsley. Ladle into soup plates or cups. Serve with crackers, cream biscuits or clam fritters.

US-27, is rightfully famous for its cider and serves it up with a helping of down home activities—an arts and crafts show Sept. 14-15, old time craft demonstrations Sept. 21-22, Rambling Rose cloggers Oct. 6, and a Halloween Fun House Oct. 12-13, 19-20 and 26-27. Uncle John's huge orchard is

open for strolling or hop on board a tractor-drawn wagon for a tour. You won't want to pass by the country bakery without trying a piece of pie...

...Herbruck's Cheese Counter, 2343 N. US-27, has been a favorite of hungry travelers since 1946. With delicacies and 150 types of cheese from around the world, it offers something to tempt every taste. Jilbert's ice cream, made in the Upper Peninsula, is a specialty. The Moose Tracks flavor comes highly recommended...

...south of St. Johns, Andy T's farm market wins the ultimate Golden Globe Award. Owner Andy Todosciuk holds the state record for the heaviest pumpkin, a 543-pound behemoth, and he fills his lot with hundreds of monsters each fall. Besides the giants, Andy grows and sells pumpkins ranging from 100-pound jack-o-lantern varieties down to decorative miniatures, with plenty of mid-size pie pumpkins

thrown in for good measure...

...of the hundreds of cider mills in Michigan, this one may be the most unusual: Hitchpoint Cider Mill in Williamsburg, east of Traverse City at 11274 Munro, is literally horse-powered. On weekends, Norwegian fjord draft horses can be seen powering the machinery that presses apples into cider...

...in southwest Michigan's fruit belt, Historic Bowers Mill near Middleville is an 1864 water-powered grist and cider mill that still presses apples into cider. It has on its 17-acre grounds a cobbler's shop and several nineteenth century buildings. Cider sippin' festivals are offered on weekends this fall. Take exit A 42 from US-131 between Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids...

# Lake Huron shores ablaze in fall color

When summer leaves and autumn leaves start to show their true colors, Michigan ushers in a whole new season; it's just like summer, but with a few added attractions.

The sparkling blue of the seemingly endless Great Lakes and the vibrant greens of the more than 10,000 fairways on nearly 600 public golf courses are set off by millions of acres of brilliant leaves. (Some 18 million acres--virtually half the state--is still forested.)

Almost all summer activities continue through the long, mild autumn: charterboat, lake, and stream fishing--especially since the salmon are spawning; canoeing, hiking, and camping; boating, sailing, swimming, golf, and sightseeing.

The season makes its way across and down both peninsulas gradually, extending from mid-September at the northern end of the Upper Peninsula to late October at the southern end of the lower. And color tours remain a favored autumn activity from the top of one to the bottom of the other.

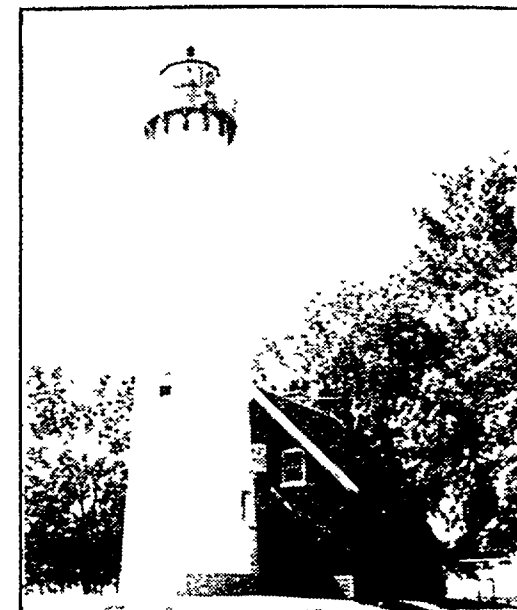
The Lake Huron Circle Tour, a two-nation, two-peninsula, three-bridge tour, starts at the American end of one international bridge and ends at the approach to another some 345 miles away.

Much of this tour puts the traveler well within view of the second largest of the Great Lakes--Lake Huron--and fifth largest in the world. This inland sea is 206 miles long, 183 miles wide, and covers 23,000 square miles. It contains 850 cubic miles of water, reaching a maximum depth of 750 feet.

This tour can begin at the northern end in Sault Ste. Marie in the Upper Peninsula or at the southern end in the Lower Peninsula at Port Huron.

### LIGHTHOUSES

Some 104 lighthouses dot Michigan's Great Lakes coast, and many of the most accessible are along Lake Huron. They range from the lightship *Huron* (literally a portable light) to museums in former lighthouses like the old (1840)

Presque Isle Lighthouse to working lights like the new (1870) Presque Isle Light. Some of them offer tours by appointment during the autumn months. Michigan's east coast lighthouses include:

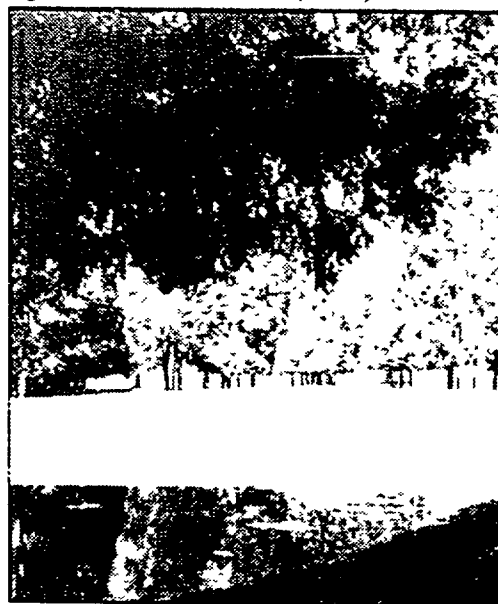
#### Port Huron to Bay City

Where Lake Huron flows into the St. Clair River, the Blue Water Bridge connects Port Huron, Michigan, to Samia, Ontario. It is the starting point for the Port Huron to Mackinac Island Yacht Race each July and for the lakeshore drive that traces the outline of the Thumb of Michigan's mitten shape.

At the tip of the Thumb, Huron City is a museum town whose buildings date to the logging boom of the late nineteenth century. Costumed interpreters take visitors through the

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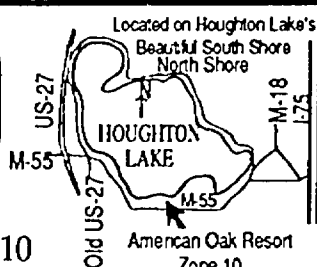
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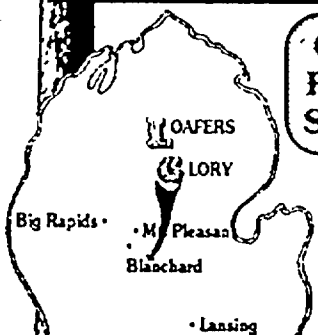

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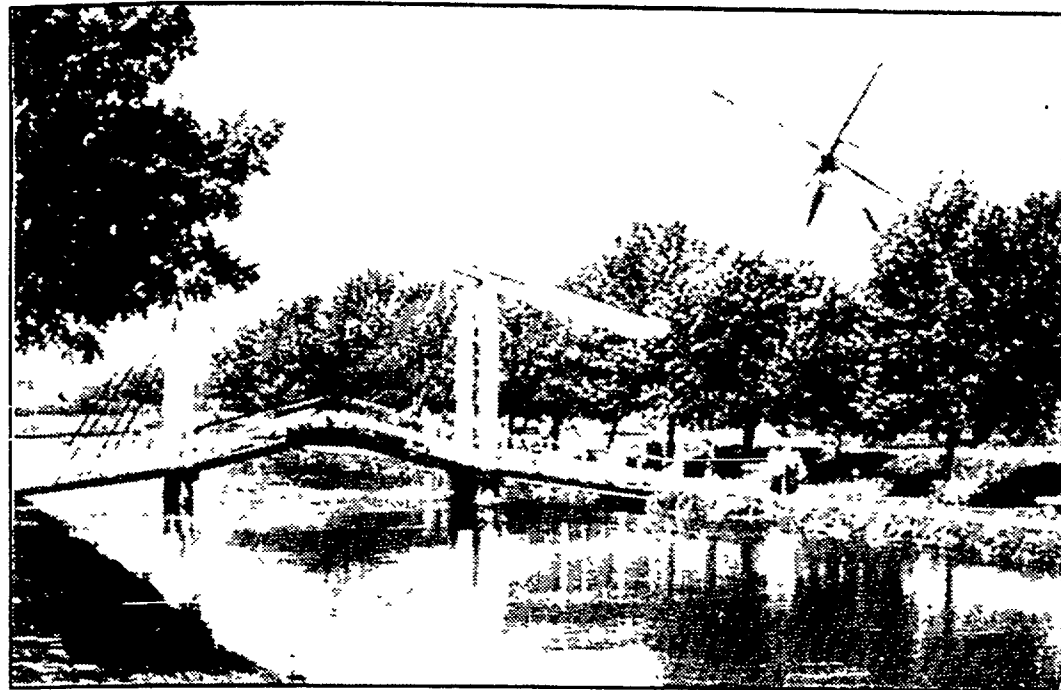

## Autumn hues unfold along Lake Michigan

Imagine a Riviera that stretches nearly 575 miles. Better yet, drive its hundreds of miles of sand beaches, charming villages, sweeping panoramas, fruitful orchards and vineyards, towering dunes, harbors, inlets, or 1 marinas--and always the sparkling blue of Lake Michigan stretching to the western horizon.

Lake Michigan is the sixth largest freshwater lake on earth, and the third largest of the Great Lakes. It is 307 miles long and 118 miles wide, and it stretches 923 feet down at its maximum depth. It contains 1,180 cubic miles in volume and covers 22,400 square miles of surface area.

The Lake Michigan Circle Tour often splits off into well-marked parallel scenic routes that follow the shoreline closer than the main route. In the southwest one such route takes visitors closer to the lake, dunes, and villages, while inland routes take them to farms and wineries. Fine restaurants are tucked into out-of-the-way corners. A tour can begin in the western end at Menominee in the Upper Peninsula or at New Buffalo at the southeastern end.

### **HARBOR COUNTRY** New Buffalo

New Buffalo introduces travelers to Michigan with the newest, busiest highway Welcome Center in the state and Marketplace of Michigan, the largest Michigan products store in the state. Railroad fans can investigate the New Buffalo Railroad Museum and its roundhouse, while visitors seeking a different lodging experience sample one of four bed-and-breakfast inns in Union Pier.

### **WARREN DUNES STATE PARK** Sawyer

At Warren Dunes State Park a sand beach fronts a backdrop of spectacular sand dunes that loom 240 feet above Lake Michigan. Hikers enjoy 200 acres of forest; hang gliders soar from the cliffs; and wine connoisseurs taste the products of three vintners.

### **ORCHARD COUNTRY**

St. Joseph and Benton Harbor

St. Joseph and Benton Harbor are at the heart of orchard country. Nearby are cider mills and U-pick farms, including Tree-Mendus Fruit Farm where you can rent your own tree. The Boulevard All-Suite Hotel, (616) 983-6600, in downtown St. Joseph, offers a view of Lake Michigan.

### **HOLLAND**

One look at the names on the mailboxes and the 200-year-old, ten-story windmill turning on the horizon and you know that this community on the south shore of Lake Macatawa was founded by the Dutch. The fields of tulips surrounding the town, the Dutch Village, the Veldheer Tulip Gardens, and the DeKlomp Wooden Shoe and Delftware Factory confirm the impression.

### **P. J. HOFFMASTER STATE PARK**

Between Grand Haven and Muskegon

The park, like most on Lake Michigan, has miles of shoreline and acres of woodland and sand dunes. It also has the Gillette Nature Center, Michigan's premiere center for the ecological study of dunes, their plant life and wildlife.

Just south of the park, Grand Haven combines a large charter-boat fleet and cruises on the *Harbor Steamer* with boutique shopping, the world's largest musical fountain, and, in winter, the Polar Ice Cap Golf Tournament played on the frozen bayous of Spring Lake. To the north, Muskegon, which once produced 800 million board feet of lumber in a year, is home to the World War II submarine, *USS Silversides*. Half-hour tours of the submarine are available through October.

### **SLEEPING BEAR DUNES NATIONAL LAKESHORE**

Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore protects some of the highest freshwater sand dunes in North America. It takes its name from a Chippewa Indian legend about a mother bear and her two cubs who

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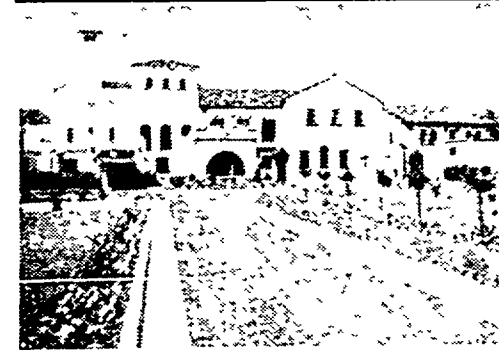

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# Johnny Appleseed Festival recreates Indiana frontier

Fort Wayne, Indiana—

Each year, the people of Fort Wayne invite visitors from throughout the nation to celebrate the pioneer spirit of John Chapman, better known as "Johnny Appleseed," a beloved character of the Indiana frontier in the early 1800s.

The national folk hero spent his last years planting orchards in the Fort Wayne area, and his grave site in the city's Archer Park has been designated a national historic landmark.

Other crafts and trades projects on display include: the village blacksmith, metal smiths, potters, leather workers, cooper, broom makers, dulcimer makers and herbalists.

The festival draws many band

with an historic bent, including the Voyagers Fife and Drum Corps, 7th Regiment of Michigan Volunteers Company B, Thistle and Heather Pipe Band, Fort Wayne Scottish Pipes and the Tippecanoe Ancients. At 2 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, there will be a joint rendition of *Amazing Grace* by the regimental and pipe bands.

Step back into time to the days of the American Civil War, the War of 1812 or the days of the American Revolution. Several different time periods are represented on Living History Hill. The demonstrators are volunteers who purchase replicas of the uniforms and equipment to reveal the past.

What would life be like without possum stew, a clay pipe, a dog with horns, or a memory bag with a buckeye in it? Join Buckeye 'n Molly for tales of the early pioneer days when simple times were filled with fun and a devotion to the out-of-doors. Young and old alike will be thrilled with this charming pair and their tales of fun and mischief.

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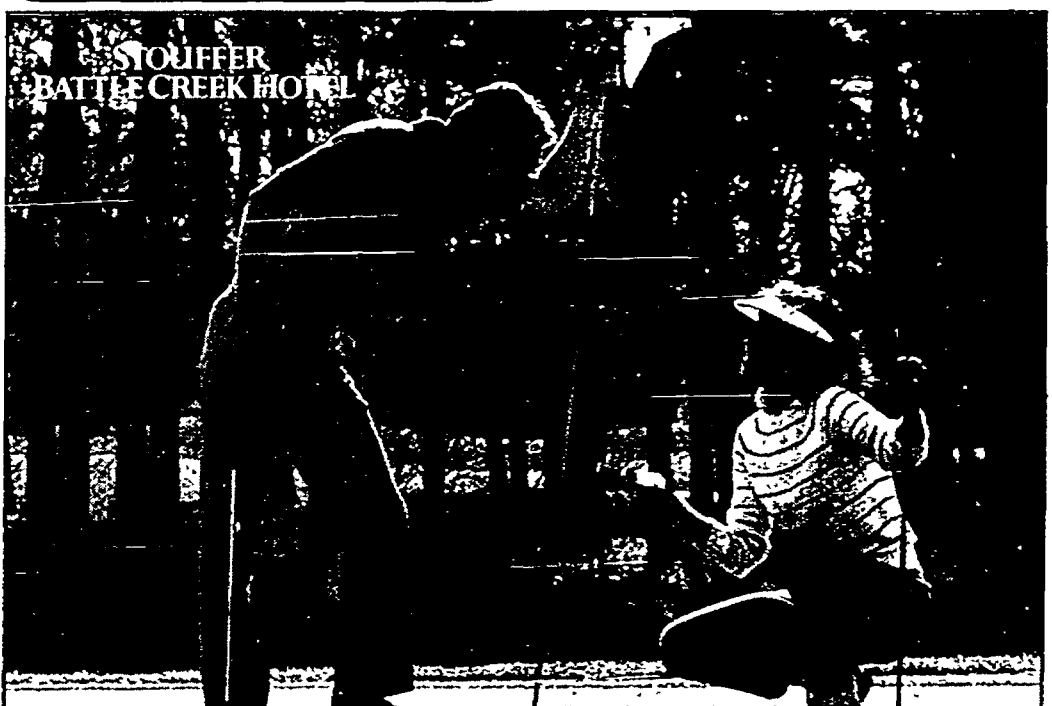

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# Clothes that extend your boating season

On a clear cool day in October, 1989, Michael Clow jumped into Lake St. Clair from the deck of a sailboat. He was wearing three layers of high-tech synthetic cold weather gear designed to keep active people comfortable in the coldest and wettest of conditions.

Air and water temperatures that day were 50 degrees. Clow stayed in the water for 10 minutes. Then he climbed into the boat and went for a comfortable three hour sail without changing anything.

This exercise in apparent self-torture had a purpose. Clow is co-owner of The Yachtsman, a Royal Oak, Michigan shop specializing in sports apparel. He was testing the gear that he and other specialty merchants sell.

Products like Clow's are letting owners enjoy their motorboats and sailboats for longer seasons. The new synthetics can keep active people, including boaters, warm and dry despite the chill winds and cold sprays of October and November.

A true believer in the synthetics

is veteran sailor Frank Cliff of Bloomfield Township. "The first Mackinac race I ever sailed was in 1956," he says. "I borrowed my brother-in-law's World War II Navy foul weather gear. Wearing that stuff on the weather rail was about a half-step warmer than just wearing a T-shirt."

"Before the synthetics came along, all the foul weather gear did was keep out the big chunks of water," Cliff adds. "But water found its way through any little opening, until pretty soon you were wet all over."

Allan well remembers one cold night during a Mills cup race when he was stationed forward on the high-side rail, wearing the old-fashioned gear he owned at the time, including cotton long-johns underneath. Every wave the boat punched into hit him with a couple of buckets of spray, which worked its way through his outer layer. Soon he began to feel icy little trickles on his skin. He felt like a wick gradually filling up with icewater.

When water evaporates it sucks the heat out of your body. That's why you're chilled when you come out of the water after swimming, and stay cold until you towel off. Before the days of electric refrigeration, they chilled champagne by repeatedly wrapping the bottles in wet cloths and letting them dry.

Sweating under heavy outer clothes has the same effect.

Perspiration condenses within the garment and causes the wearer to feel cold, damp and uncomfortable.

Adding layers doesn't necessarily keep you warm. Your ability to move around is restricted, and you look like the Abominable Snowman. You feel like a 4-year-old whose mother has bundled him up so well that he can't lower his arms, which stand straight out from his body. It's not easy to get both hands on the steering wheel in this condition.

With synthetics, according to Clow, you can wear half as many layers and be twice as warm. Most experts recommend a three-layer system of synthetics. It suits many activities besides boating---cycling, skiing, hiking, jogging, watching football, or just being downtown on a blustery day. You can add or subtract layers according to weather conditions.

The primary function of the inner layer, or underwear, is to keep you dry. It should fit snugly, like a second skin, so that the maximum number of fibers contact the skin and "wick" the moisture to adjacent layers, where it will evaporate. The farther from the skin the evaporation takes place, the less the cooling effect on the body.

Frank Cliff describes wearing a high-tech undershirt under a light pile jacket when jogging in cold weather. At times, he says, the sweat actually passes through the jacket and freezes

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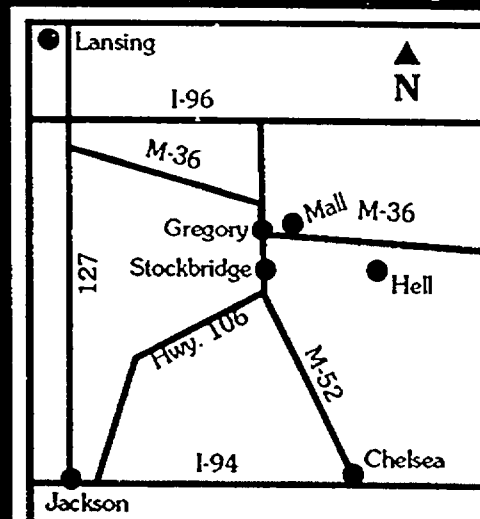


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on the outside, leaving him comfortable.

Cliff is enthusiastic about the warmth provided by a Capilene neck gaiter, which is like a wide footless stretch sock. It keeps wind and water off his neck, and especially prevents water from dripping down his back. "It's the single best piece of gear they've come up with," he says.

Examples of synthetics used for modern inner wear are Patagonia's Capilene and Pro-Lite 5000 by Helly-Hansen. There are different weights for different conditions.

The middle layer provides insulation. At the same time, when worn in conjunction with synthetic underwear, the middle layer continues to move moisture away from the skin.

Synthetic piles, such as Polar Fleece, Polar Pile, Synchilla and Retro Pile, are recommended for middle layers. These materials both insulate and provide moisture transport. (Wool provides insulation but does not provide moisture transport, according to Mike Clow. He points out that it takes days for a wool sweater to dry, but synthetic pile comes out of a spin cycle almost ready to use.)

Synthetic pile maintains its air-trapping ability when wet, but is about half the weight of wool. It is also delightfully soft to the touch, like a baby lamb.

The outer layer's function is to protect from rain, snow, wind and abrasion. It should also have the ability to ventilate. It can be tailored to many different types of outdoor

activities, such as skiing, fishing and hunting.

Motor boaters don't need rugged outer wear, because even in terrible conditions they can usually operate their boats from inside a cabin. For cold weather cruising in a motor boat, Clow's partner David Urban recommends something light and comfortable, such as a Patagonia Imshore Foul Weather jacket of waterproof nylon, hip length for freer movement.

Its polyester mesh lining disperses moisture over its fibers, so the jacket stays comfortable when worn over bare skin. It has a streamlined hood that stuffs into the jacket to form a soft collar. He also wore lightweight, waist-high Patagonia storm pants.

Mike Clow put on a sailor suit to have his picture taken. His outer layer was a Henri-Lloyd Ocean Racer Jacket made of heavy duty nylon. It was lined with a lightweight, breathable nylon that reduces condensation. The jacket's seams are triple layered for waterproofing.

For foul weather pants, he wore an Ocean Racer bib with high tenacity yarn patches on large areas of knees and seat. Sailors like chest-high bib pants because they limit the intrusion of water at the waist.

(There are also women's foul weather pants with a side zip drop seat arrangement, which Julie calls a great step forward in civilization.)

Among other manufacturers of synthetic wear for boaters and other active people are Omega, Musto, Atlantis and Douglas Gill. (See

sidebar for a partial list of Michigan shops carrying one or more of these brands.)

Stores carrying the Patagonia line offer free copies of a stunning catalogue filled with fabulous boating and skiing pictures.

As to the costs, Clow gives some ball-park figures. A good pair of unlined or lined bibs is \$95 to \$250. A set of synthetic underwear is \$50 to \$90 depending on weight and quality. Foul weather jackets are \$95 to \$500. Middle layer pile pants are \$50 to \$90, and a pile top is \$70 to \$145. Foul weather boots are \$25 to \$90.

A quality apparel system is a good investment both as to comfort and safety. Boaters who are cold, wet and miserable make bad decisions.

As Mike Clow says, "There is no bad weather, only bad apparel. Think of embracing the cold. Look at it as stimulating the largest organ in your body---your skin."

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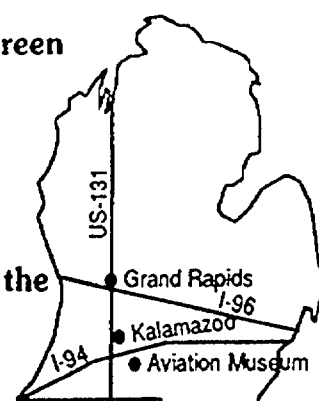

# Toledo Museum of Art acquires Persian vessel

Toledo, Ohio—

The Toledo Museum of Art announces the acquisition of a rare bronze vessel made in ancient Persia in the late 11th or early 12th century. The vessel is an incense burner made in the form of a plump bird.

The body is decorated with an openwork pattern of vines through which scented smoke swirled from inside the body of the bird. Such vessels graced the courts of the Islamic rulers of the Near East at the time of the Seljuk Turks.

Incense burners in the form of animals were a prized form of this luxurious metalwork, and often these vessels took the form of plump birds such as partridges or quail. Among these, the Museum's newly-acquired incense burner is thought by scholars to be unique.

Instead of having a tiny drawer or door in the bird's breast for inserting the pellets of incense, the Museum's vessel has an ingeniously weighted egg on its underside. When the vessel is tilted, the egg pivots to expose an opening into which the incense can be placed and lighted. The thickness of this bronzed egg was so carefully calculated that it returns to a horizontal position when the incense burner is set upright. The engineering of this device shows the sophistication not only of Islamic metalworkers, but also of science in the Muslim world.

The Seljuks, who originally lived in the northern regions of the Caspian and Aral Seas, converted to Islam in the 10th century.

The Museum's newly-acquired incense burner will be specially exhibited in the Museum's Libbey Court during September. Thereafter, the incense burner will be featured in the Museum's first gallery of Islamic art scheduled to open in November.

The Toledo Museum of Art is a privately endowed, non-profit arts institution. Admission to the Museum is free. It is open Tuesday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-4 p.m.; Sunday, 1-5 p.m.; closed Mondays and major holidays. The Museum is located at 2445 Monroe Street at Scottwood Avenue, just west of the downtown business district and one block off I-75 with exit designations posted.

Sixteen west wing galleries, which have been closed for extensive renovation, will be reopened the first week of November with a number of gala events. Currently, these galleries are being reinstalled with a reorganized presentation of the 17th, 18th, and 19th century American and European works of art. One of these galleries will present the collection of Islamic art.



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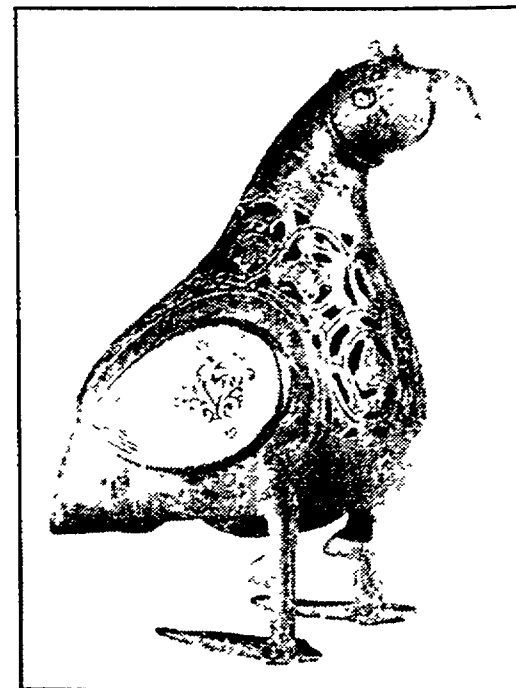
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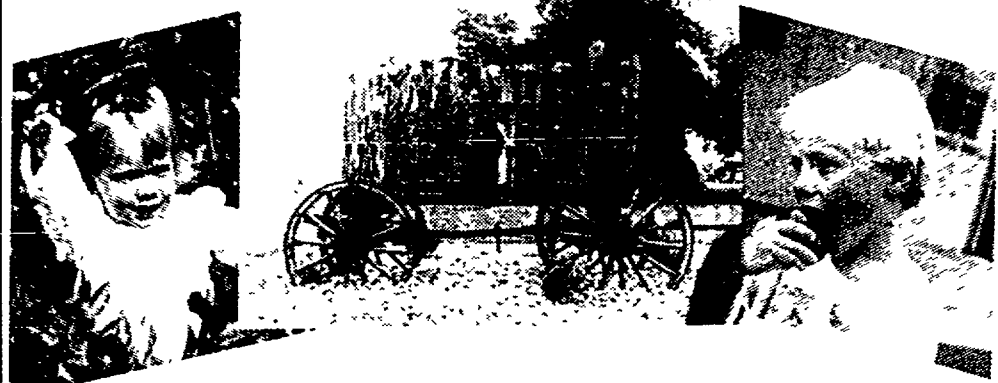
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**RARE BIRD**—In the form of a bird, the museum's bronze incense burner dates from the Seljuk Period (1038-1194).



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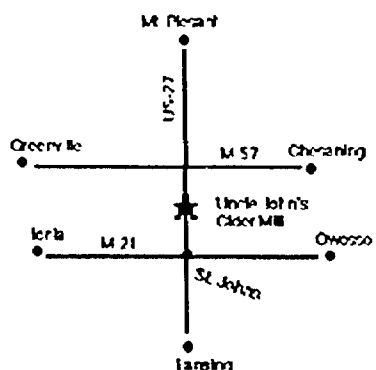

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# MSU showcases Old Master prints

features new acquisitions including works by Anthony Van Dyck, Claude Lorraine, Ferdinand Bol, and Fragonard.

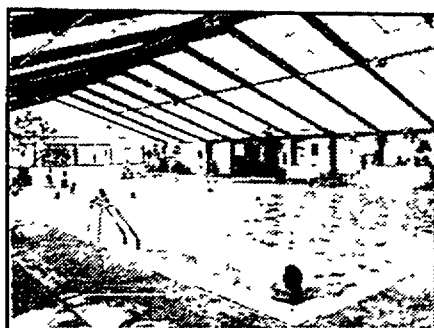

Rachel Hostetter, Kresge Art Museum graduate assistant 1990-91 who curated the exhibit with Susan

Bandes, director, KAM, explains, "Highlighting this diversity, the exhibition includes landscape, portraiture, genre or scenes from everyday life, classical allegory, Biblical and religious subjects, and caprici or 'inventions' by the artist which are often whimsical, sometimes biting and always fascinating. By mounting the prints thematically, the exhibition offers comparisons across time and national boundaries, inviting a leisurely perusal in keeping with original practice."

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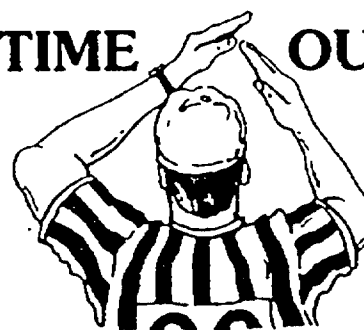
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# Rail tour click-clacks over historic track

Blissfield, Michigan—

Rail buffs and the public will have a rare opportunity on Saturday, Oct. 12 to enjoy a train adventure into Michigan's historical past. The Adrian & Blissfield Rail Road Company will operate a special fall color excursion over its entire line from Blissfield. Most of this trackage has not seen passenger service since 1956.

Called the "Old Road Extra" the trip is intended for the entire family to enjoy the rich farmlands of

southeastern Michigan during the fall harvest season with the fresh scent of autumn in the air. The excursion departs at 9 a.m. sharp from the old site of the Blissfield depot on highway U.S. 223 and returns about 2 p.m.

This historic trackage originally was part of the Erie & Kalamazoo Railroad completed in 1837 between Toledo and Adrian. This was the first railroad in the Old Northwest Territory. Later the line was extended to the Elkhart, Indiana, where a

connection was made into Chicago in 1852. Since those times the railroad has been known as the "Old Road." For 99 years, from 1869 the Old Road was part of New York Central System, until that railroad merged with the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1968 to form the ill-fated Penn Central.

New York Central System Historical Society members from southeastern Michigan and northwestern Ohio with assistance from Detroit's Bluewater Michigan Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society have arranged for the Adrian & Blissfield Rail Road to run the trip. Proceeds will go to support local rail history preservation efforts of the NYC Society.

From Blissfield, the Old Road Extra passes through the River Raisin girder bridge and heads northwest crossing over the old Canada Southern Railway right of way and goes on its way to Lenawee Junction, once the meeting place with the Michigan Southern Railroad. At Adrian the train crosses the Norfolk & Western's former Wabash main line, where the famed "Wabash Cannon Ball" once ran. Beyond Adrian the train travels four miles to the lines end before returning to Blissfield.

Blissfield, a historic small town, offers many attractions. The highly

regarded Hathaway House restaurant was built in 1851. Near the restaurant, the "Main Street Emporium" shops feature gifts and collectibles. Not far away is the Blissfield Antique Mall. Nearby, the Old Blissfield Hotel features 50 quality artisans and antique dealers.

Coffee and doughnuts will be sold aboard the train in the morning. A box lunch prepared by the Hathaway House consisting of an excellent turkey sandwich, cole slaw, vegetable sticks and a fruit costs \$6 and must be ordered with train tickets by Sept. 30. Soft drinks and snacks will be sold on the train.

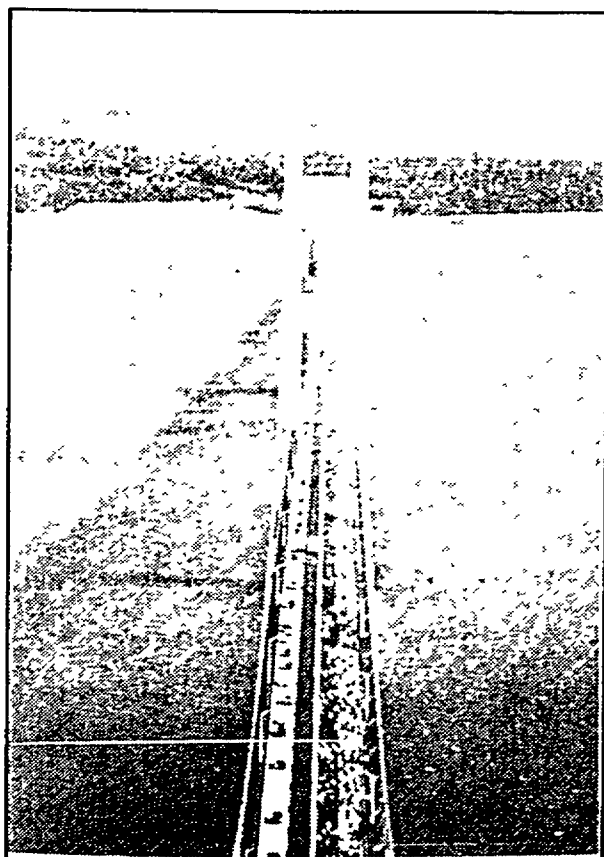
Ticket prices for the Old Road Extra excursion are \$17.50 for adults and \$12 for children through age 12. Children 5 and under not occupying a seat ride free. Seating is limited and tickets should be ordered in advance.

Virtually every visitor to the area marvels at one of Michigan's most treasured accomplishments: the spanning of the Straits of Mackinac by the Mighty Mackinac Bridge. This engineering feat took many years of planning to complete.

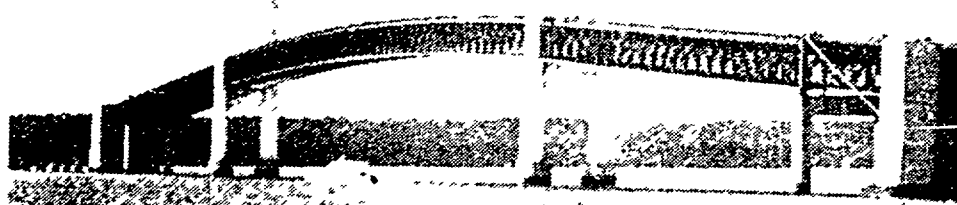
Plans were pursued after World War II to develop a span. Under new leadership and a plan designed by the best structural engineers in the world, a financing package including two revenue bonds was issued on Feb. 17, 1954 for \$96,400,033.33. Michigan, a geographically divided state, was finally joined by the world's longest and most graceful deep water bridge in 1957.

Two main towers of the bridge rise 552 feet above the water level and, in the center, the main span provides 150 feet of clearance allowing passage beneath. Each of the two supporting cables measure two feet in diameter and stretch across most of the 4.1 miles from shore to shore.

The bridge represents the single most important development in the Straits regarding today's tourism industry. It has opened transportation to the Upper Peninsula and provided more access to the region's historic and natural attractions.

Thousands come throughout the year just to ride over the bridge's incredible span. As part of our Michigan tradition, an annual bridgewalk is held during Labor Day weekend, attracting tens of thousands to participate with the Governor in celebrating this accomplishment and the unification of Michigan's upper and lower peninsulas which it represents.

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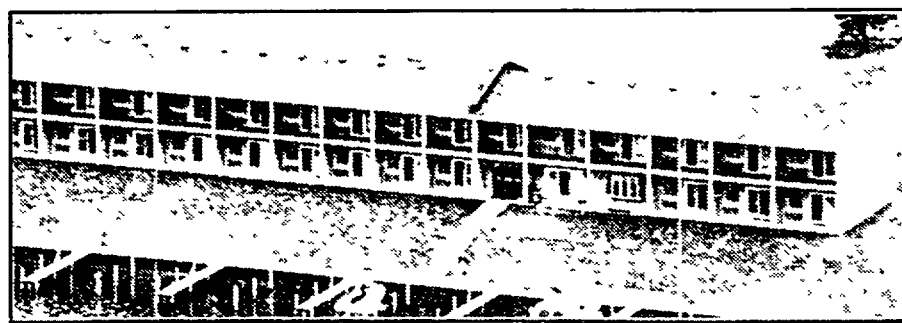
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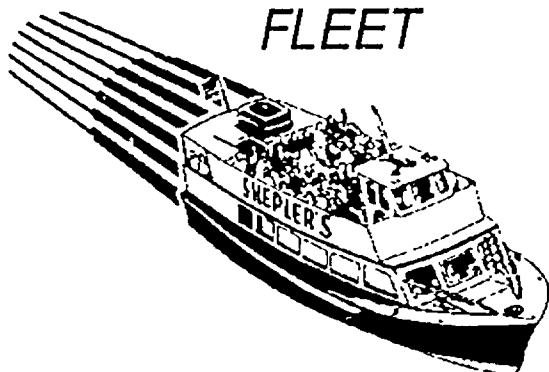
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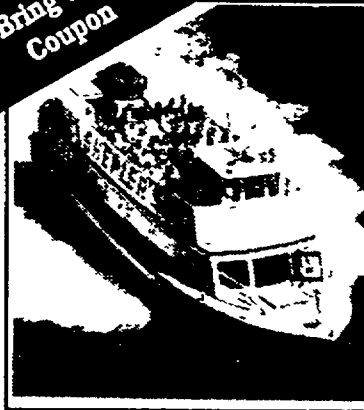
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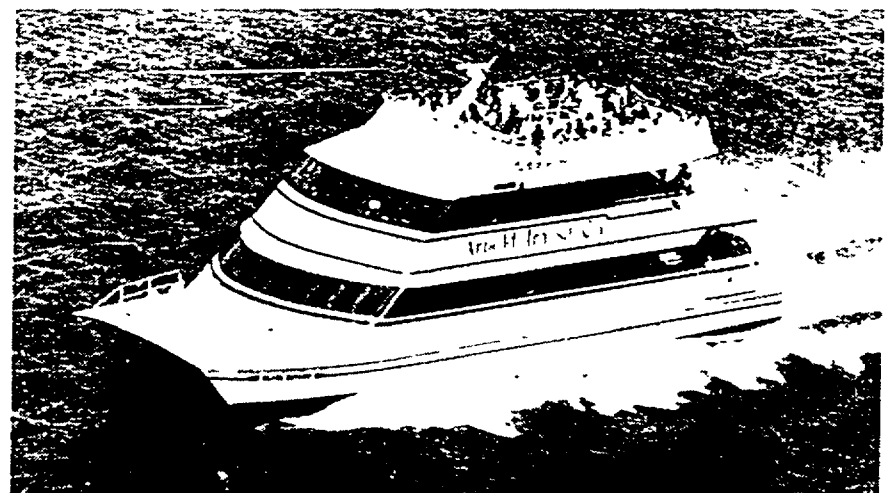
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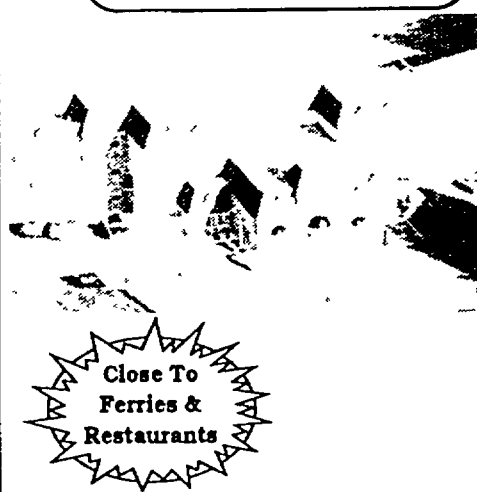
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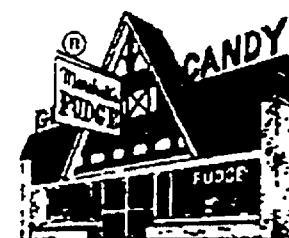
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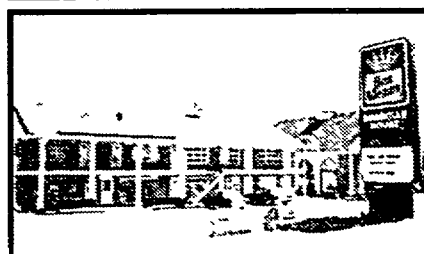


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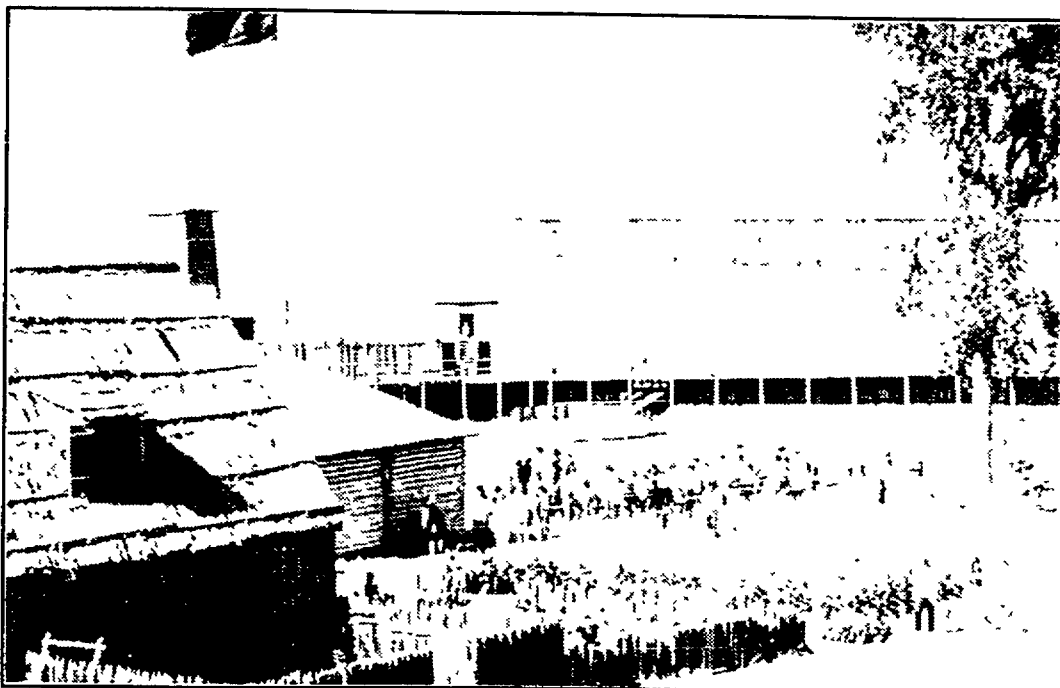

## Mac parks in autumn are a traveler's bliss

With summer's hectic schedule past, the four parks seem restful. Visitors savor the sights free of bustling crowds. From the soldier at guard to the strolling military musician, costumed interpreters have ample time to weave yarns of yesteryear.

Along the Lake Huron shoreline, three miles southeast of Mackinaw City, lies Mill Creek State Park. Surrounded by 625 wooded acres, Mill Creek recreates the spirit of pioneerism with an authentic, water-powered 18th century mill.

Watch as interpreters release the overflowing waters of Mill Creek. The water rushes down the chute and a large wooden water wheel begins to churn. The log moves slowly towards the blade. Inch by inch, it is transformed into rough hewn board, sawdust spilling on the wide planked floors.

Centuries ago, the cool fall air reminded colonial sawyers of winter's advance. The lumber they produced built nearby homes, sheltering villagers from harsh northern winds.

In the background, Mill Creek's emerald pines, scarlet maples and golden oak are a contrast in color. Under their canopy, hike soft paths blanketed by autumn leaves. Watch for bear paw prints embedded in the soft bark or toppled trunks, the busy work of resident beavers.

In Mackinaw City, offshore winds

buffet the weathered gray walls of Colonial Michilimackinac. White caps nod towards shore. The Indian Summer sun warms the sand.

Climb the palisaded catwalk of the 18th century fur-trading village and hear the boom of a cannon echo across the Straits of Mackinac. Imagine late fall in the year 1770 - voyageurs in swift birch bark canoes paddle southward, a busy summer of fur trading complete.

Skim across the Straits to Mackinac Island, home of historic Fort Mackinac. Up the limestone walkway, blue-coated soldiers re-enact life in the 1880s with blazing muskets and booming cannons. Stride in soldiers' steps through original military structures more than 200 years old.

Especially in autumn, the view from Fort Mackinac is as colorful as its costumed interpreters. From the towering bluff, peer over the Fort's thick white walls. Sapphire waters shimmer, broken only by small islands ablaze with shades of ruby, crimson, gold and apricot.

Mackinac Island State Park, radiant in autumn, comprises 80 percent of the island. Venture by foot, bicycle or horseback and explore the miles of trails. Head inland to tiny forest paths draped in warm hues. Finches and flycatchers, wrens and warblers may be hiding in the foliage - look closely. Back to town, follow the 8.2 mile shoreline drive that hugs the waters of Lake Michigan.

While parks maintain a more abbreviated schedule than at the peak of summer, activities do continue through Oct. 15. For more information, contact Mackinac State Historic Parks, Box 370, Mackinac Island, MI 49757. (906) 847-3328.

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# 'Thumbs up' for tip of mitt antiquing

Since long before Labor Day, maple trees in northern Michigan have been creating a crimson splash of color against the deep green of the pines that line the I-75 and other highways and byways to remind us of the fall beauty our state offers.

An autumn color tour is an exciting way for antiquers to explore

the tip of Michigan's "mitt" because there are a few shops with antiques of as high quality as you'll find anywhere. There also are plenty of shops with desirable collectibles.

Interestingly, not all of the quality shops are listed in Northern Michigan antique guides.

One of my favorites is located in INDIAN RIVER, which is a good place to leave the I-75 to begin a browsing trip around the top of the state.

For 32 years Carriage Trade Antiques has been open from mid-June to the first of October half a

block north of S. Straits Highway (Indian River's main street) on South Avenue. Owners Edward and Lela Arnell return each year from Florida to open the shop where you are almost certain to find a copper mold or two, brass candlesticks, Currier and Ives prints and, most satisfyingly, a drop leaf table or two as well as a fine cupboard.

When we visited the shop this summer, it had only been open a couple of weeks but the choice tiger-stripe drop leaf table in the center of the room already had a "sold" sign on it.

Edward Arnell explained that the table was sold the second day the shop was open for the 1991 season and that the purchaser was to pick it up shortly.

The Arnells always try to have something unusual to offer buyers. Among Lela Arnell's favorite items this year are several divided wooden boxes ranging in price from \$40 to \$55.

"They have so many uses," she noted, "from holding silverware or napkins to carrying supplies."

But by far the most different offering is a collection of American Indian sweet grass baskets, including two fitted sewing baskets. Lela Arnell says the baskets were made by the Penobscot and Passamaquoddy tribes.

In fine condition, the baskets were distinguished by braided handles and side detailing. The most expensive

basket was the large sewing basket priced at \$90.

Lela Arnell explained that each year after they unpack at their cottage home/shop on their return from Florida they tour Maine for a week or more. This year they were able to buy the baskets reasonably, from a woman who was selling her entire collection.

Even if you don't find an antique to buy in the shop, it's worth a stop to admire the massive pub sign over the mantel of a colorful Scotsman in painted cast iron on wood. Carriage Trade Antiques is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Closed Sunday.

At the other end of Indian River's main street in the community's historic Michigan Central Railroad Depot built in 1882 you'll find Of Cabbages and Kings. Now owned by Karen and Jim Stankevich, the sign explains this is "a shoppe of unusual things and antiques."

Antiques share space with a wide line of gifts ranging from table coverings and china to jewelry.

Dominating one corner is an old Garland "world's best" stove priced at \$900.

An attractive stereoscopic for viewing picture slides of the past was decorated with a Victorian floral design. It was a reasonable \$38; an English brass bed warmer was \$95 while a silver-rimmed ice bucket was \$18. The depot shop is open seven days a week through October.

Also in downtown Indian River is A Touch of Glass and Antiques featuring depression glassware, a variety of china and furniture as well as country decorating items.

Open all year from Monday through Saturday, the shop was closed from 2 to 3 p.m. when we were there this year, but last summer I was delighted to discover a piece of my daughter's thistle pottery.


Bearly Used Antiques and Treasures is a newer shop located at the edge of Indian River on M-68 between the I-75 (exit 310) and M-27. It was pointed out to us by Joan Hoffman. She and her husband, Jack own the Inland Straits Resorter, which in the five years of their operation has become an award winning weekly. Jack also writes for Great Lakes Getaway.

Open from mid-May until Oct. 30 the shop has assorted antiques and collectibles.

Head west on M-68 to ALANSON from Indian River to continue a circle tour of mitt shops.

At the Second Hand Man shop in downtown Alanson on U.S. 31 we were surprised to find a goodly amount of collectible Rittenhouse furniture manufactured in the 1940s in Cheboygan. The log furniture is more popular than ever to furnish Michigan cottages. It is easily identified, as the firm marked its pieces on the bottom with a blue and silver pasted label that reads "Genuine Rittenhouse Furniture, Cheboygan, Mich."

The day we visited the Second Hand Man, the Rittenhouse collection

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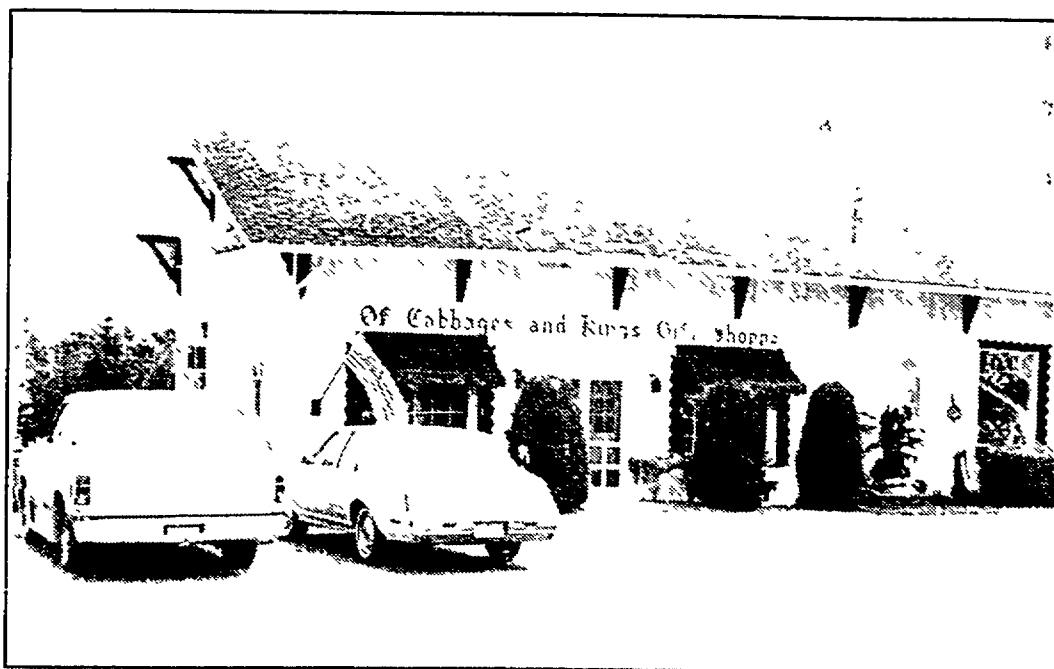

included a double bed, a set of dining room chairs two drop-leaf tables and an arm chair. Prices reflect the furniture's collectibility: the arm chair was tagged at \$250. The woman at the desk observed, "It's so popular it goes right out of the shop when we get it."

The shop is crowded with glass, books, hunting and fishing collectibles and tools. It is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Next door is a new shop filled with Forest View Farms foods. In the back room are antiques.

Next stop on the U.S. 31 north was Adams Antiques in BRUTUS. This shop has existed since 1953, and you notice immediately its clean, spruced up appearance. The china and glassware sparkle. There's lots of both, including popular tea leaf pattern ironstone.

When we visited, a couple was in process of selecting an antique brass ceiling light. Antique lighting fixtures is a shop specialty with a variety of fixtures and shades available.

Between Brutus and PELLSTON on U.S. 31 watch for Graham's Antiques sign by the Dam Site Inn. Turn right and go a mile and a quarter to 1812 Gregory Road if the "open" sign is out.

A specialty in Sandy and Tim Graham's barn shop is Irish bealeek china. After admiring the flower garden leading to the door, we entered to find a china closet filled with a variety of bealeek on the landing leading to the loft.

The shop is filled with primitives, toys and collectibles. I now wish we had purchased a brass oil lantern with round magnifiers on all four sides. It was priced at \$95.

On the main street of Pellston is Town and Country Antiques with a general line of collectibles.

In LEVERING three blocks west of U.S. 31 is Levering Antiques and Collectibles featuring Rittenhouse, hickory and birch bark furniture. Owner Charles Copeland custom makes rustic furniture. He also carries a general line of antiques.

**CROSS VILLAGE**, our next stop, is west of Levering on C-66. At the junction of M-119 is the Red House Antiques. Eight dealers have filled the house with a varied assortment of antiques, including jewelry.

The shop is open every day from

June 15 through Oct. 15 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Looping south to **GOOD HART**, you're on one of the state's prettiest highways. M-119 is known for its curving road through woodlands edged with ferns and trillium, a sight worth traveling to see in bloom in the spring.

Good Hart Antiques is located next to the general store and has a small annex across the road. The general line of collectibles include dolls. The shop is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

TLC Summer Place is south of Good Hart 11 miles north of Harbor Springs on the M-119. Open seven days a week in the summer season the shop features a general line of collectibles.

When we visited, an eye-catcher was a huge copper jelly bowl priced at \$240.

Continuing south into **HARBOR SPRINGS**, you'll find a host of antique shops.

Three quarters of a mile before M-119 joins M-31, we visited Joie de Vie, a shop full of French antiques, European pine furniture and decorative accessories. Prices can range into four figures, but the looking is wonderful.

Open all year, Joie de Vie also has a shop in Birmingham.

A stop at the long-established Mauritshuis shop in Harbor Springs concluded our "mitt" tour royally. (This is another of the fine shops not listed on the antique maps).

There always is a quality selection of British furniture and accessories.

When we visited last month two pairs of silhouettes were displayed. One set was of the heads of a man and woman, priced at \$180 for the pair; the other, a couple in full figure, had a price of \$380, reflecting their rarity.

As with antiquing everywhere, new shops appear and old ones vanish; so when you make your tour the mitt look for free guides available in many shops to discover your own favorite stops.

## College campuses gird for invasion of alumni

They're coming.

They're tramping through the cornfields to Bowling Green. Following the St. Joseph River to Notre Dame. Marching through the maple leaf splendor of Michigan, banners high, in waves of blue-and-gold, green-and-white.

The martial music gets louder as the legions get closer. "Hail to the victors valiant." "Cheer, cheer for old Notre Dame..." You can see the banners rising, the crimson and grey of Ohio State, the maroon and white of Indiana University.

Things may have changed a little since the medieval knights rode onto the tournament grounds 500 years ago, but they haven't changed much. If you think they don't tell lies around roaring campfires any more, wait until the 1966 Michigan State University team gets together for its 25th anniversary this year and talks about "The Game of the Century," when they tied with Notre Dame for the national championship.

Some schools don't start classes until late September, but the football season begins in August: Penn State will play Georgia Tech Aug. 28, the flags will be flying over the stadium at the University of Illinois Aug. 31. By the time U of M plays MSU on Oct. 13, the season will be in full cry.

It's tournament time in the midwest and the alumni are coming, in funny little peaked hats, in sweatshirts with the arms cut out, with streamers in their hands and a flask on their hip. Not quite as many flasks as in the "Good Old Days" when they didn't spot check coolers coming into the stadium.

Your tourist bureau may tell you

that fall leaves and apple cider are the main travel attractions of autumn, but what do they know. Thousands of us travel through time tunnels to the parade grounds of the college campus in fall, pennants high, ready to relive the good old days at tailgate picnics and college reunions and football games.

Any dictionary will tell you that the original meaning of the word leaguer was "the camp of a besieging army."

If you're going to the old alma mater, "we never stumble, we never fall..." there are a few lessons you could learn from the medieval knights that started these tournaments:

**Ride your horse to the game but never ride home.** Get there early for the tailgate picnic. Let your kids sneak in after half time, when they probably won't have to pay, but don't follow them to the student section unless you want to help pass a girl uphill hand-over-hand to the top row.

Here's Denise Bahs, who graduated two years ago from Michigan State University: "In the student section, you find painted bodies all over the place. Whole sections wave white gloves on cue. And then there's the guy who steps into a yellow garbage bag, ties it over his head and carries a sign that says "Mr. Condom."

Here is Doris Scharfenberg, who graduated 40 years ago from Hillsdale College. "I'm usually on the decorating committee for the Kappa Kappa Gamma house. We do very academic things like digging a graveyard into the front lawn and painting a sign that reads 'BURY OLIVET!'"

"My favorite homecoming memory is the year they planned a parachute jumper. He was supposed to land in the middle of the football field during half time. We saw him heading for the arboretum, where he landed in the pond.

"By the time we got to him, he



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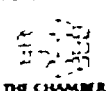

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was dragging his parachute out of the water and cursing at the top of his lungs."

If you want practical tips about returning to college campuses, of course I can give them to you. A graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston reminds me that you get the best fast food and the cheapest beer hangouts on college campuses.

A MSU graduate assures me that the best cider mill on the planet is at St. Johns, Michigan. An alumni of Bowling Green advises you to limit those old memories when the kids are around. "Remember when Joe got drunk and fell down the stairwell? He didn't even know what happened to him!" Present day-students get

glassy-eyed in a hurry when you start talking about the good old days.

Young students have their own advisors, usually older students who have been on campus for a year and know the ropes. "Register a week before classes start, show your folks the dorm and then get rid of them so that you can party all week."

They are still new to the battlefield, their horses are fresh and they know where the knaves hang out.

## College towns offer excellent adventures

So put on that college T-shirt and strap on a backpack. Dozens of university and college towns offer excellent excuses for autumn adventures. To get you started, AAA Michigan suggests these college communities:

**Adrian--**This industrial city on the River Raisin has two colleges--Adrian and Siena Heights. An impressive historical district with 79 homes, the Croswell Opera House and Lenawee County Historical Museum can be rest stops on a tour.

**Albion--**The city at the forks of the Kalamazoo River includes Albion College. The 135-acre nature center can provide a respite from touring with hiking trails through meadows and woodland. Outside of town is the Brueckner Museum and Gladstone Cottage, which house fine arts and antiques.

**Ann Arbor--**The University of Michigan campus covers more than 1,300 acres in the city. Highlights include Gothic buildings in the Law Quadrangle, Michigan Stadium, Burton Memorial Tower, Kelsey Museum of Archeology and the Museum of Art. Nearby, the Hands-On Museum, Kerrytown retail district and Gallup Park are worth a visit.

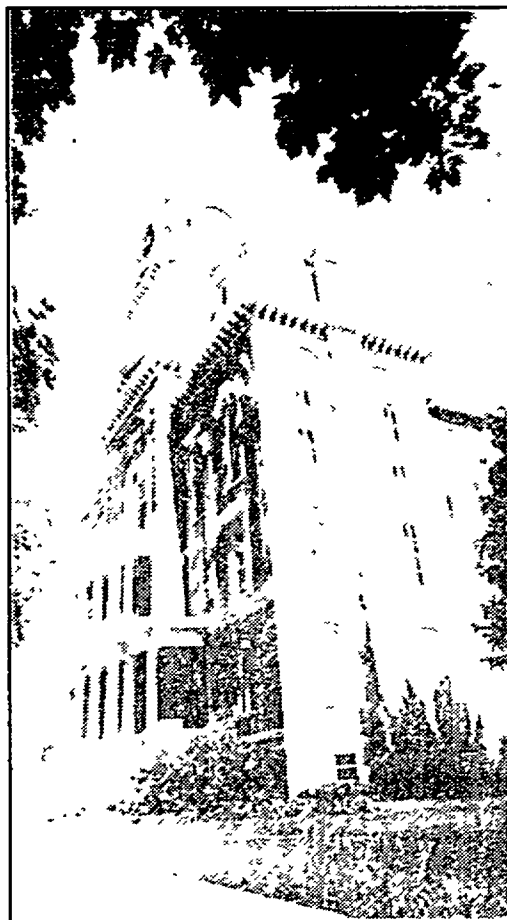
**Big Rapids--**Nature is the attraction around Ferris State University. A short bike trip from the campus leads to a refreshing canoe or tube trip down the Muskegon River.

**East Lansing--**Michigan State University's campus is a bike rider's delight. With more than 5,000 park-like acres, cyclists can roll along the banks of the Red Cedar River and visit the Beal Botanical Gardens, Kresge Art Museum or the MSU Museum. Grand River shops and restaurants are right off campus and Lansing is a short distance west.

**Hillsdale--**A renovated Victorian shopping district and 350 lakes and streams surrounding the community make this an interesting destination. Along with Hillsdale College, include stops at the Hillsdale County Poorhouse Museum and Slayton Arboretum.

**Holland--**Hope College is just a short distance away from the Netherlands Museum, Windmill Island and the Baker Furniture Museum. The Wooden Shoe Factory and Dutch Village require a longer ride.

**Kalamazoo--**Western Michigan

University and Kalamazoo College are in the middle of a variety of city attractions. Possible stops include the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts, Kalamazoo Public Museum and the historic districts on Vine, South and Stuart streets. The 38-mile Kal-Haven biking and hiking trail also starts west of Kalamazoo.

**Marquette--**The third Olympic Training Center is on the campus of Northern Michigan University. Nearby Presque Isle Park features a water slide, outdoor pool and views of iron ore docks.

**Mt. Pleasant--**Central Michigan University's Center for Cultural and Natural History details human interaction with the environment. Other possible stops include the Clarke Historical Library and the Michigan High School Coaches' Association Hall of Fame.

**Ypsilanti--**Eastern Michigan University's hometown includes the historic Depot Town, an assortment of shops in renovated buildings, along with an antique car and historical museums.

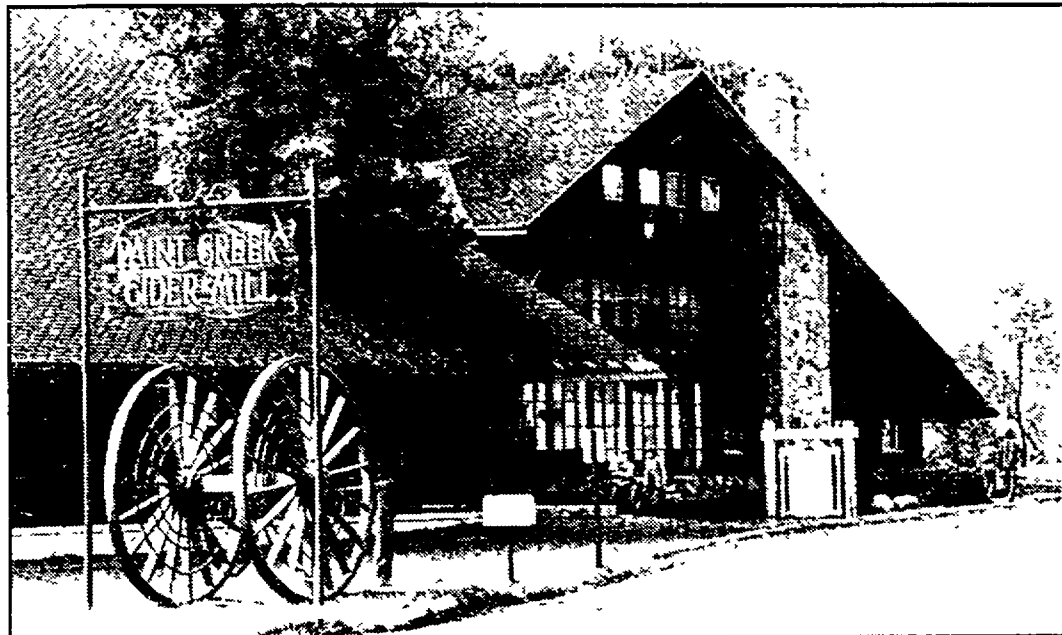

tried to escape a forest fire on the west side of the lake. She reached the shore, but the cubs drowned. The mother fell asleep and died while waiting for the cubs. The Great Manitou marked the mother's resting place by a mound of sand and raised two islands in the lake where the cubs died.

The Visitor Center at Empire guides travelers to Pierce Stocking Scenic Drive, a 7.1-mile paved road with several overlooks. Farther north is a dune climb. At Glen Haven, the Sleeping Bear Point Coast Guard Maritime Museum, an old lifesaving station, recalls feats of heroism on the lakes. The two islands that are part of the lakeshore can be reached by ferry from Leland. North Manitou is a 15,000-acre wilderness enjoyed by backpackers and hikers. The smaller South Manitou is more accessible and features a lighthouse and historic sites. In its Valley of the Giants is the largest white cedar tree in the world (17.6 feet in circumference, 90 feet tall, 528 growth rings). The waters around the islands are part of the Manitou Passage Underwater Preserve. One of its more than 50 shipwrecks, the *Francisco Morazan*, is visible above the water (contact Jed Jaworski, Northwest Michigan Maritime Museum, 616-352-7251).

Sprinkled throughout the area

south and east of the Sleeping Bear Dunes are art galleries (Tamarak Gallery in Omena, known for its contemporary fine crafts and folk art); gourmet restaurants (La Becasse in Burdickville and Hatti's Grill in Suttons Bay); golf, skiing, and lakeshore resorts (the Homestead near Glen Arbor, Crystal Mountain in Thompsonville, Sugar Loaf near Leland). To the south, hang gliders soar in the air currents around the bluffs at Elberta and Frankfort; and between Frankfort and Benzonia, 87-year-old Gwen Frostic carves the nature around her studio for her small printing presses. In Leland, many of Fishtown's shanties now house boutiques, but visitors can still buy fresh and smoked fish or catch a fishing charter.

### GRAND TRAVERSE BAY Traverse City

Grand Traverse Bay and Little Traverse Bay are the twin anchors of a Midwest "riviera"—a band of shoreline that includes sugar-sand beaches, charming villages, wineries, fine restaurants, marinas, sophisticated resorts, nationally ranked golf courses, panoramic Lake Michigan views, bed-and-breakfast inns, sparkling inland lakes, lighthouses, and spectacular sunsets. At its center is Traverse City, which celebrates Michigan's production of 75 percent of America's sweet and tart cherries with orchard tours and an annual Cherry Festival. Travelers can golf and relax at the Grand Traverse Resort. **LITTLE TRAVERSE BAY**  
Petoskey

The resort community of Charlevoix guards the entrance to Little Traverse Bay; and Petoskey, Bay View, and Harbor Springs cluster around it. Area gourmet restaurants include the Rowe Inn and Tapawingo in Ellsworth. Petoskey's three-block-long Gaslight District features more than 60 shops and Stafford's Perry Hotel, a renovated turn-of-the-century railroad hotel. Just down the road, Stafford's Bay View Inn welcomed its first guests in 1886, and Bay View's Victorian "cottages" are a National Landmark. They form the largest grouping of Victorian buildings listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

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#### THE UPPER PENINSULA

This nine-million-acre forest, floating between three of the world's largest lakes, guards the southern edge of the North American wilderness. Larger than Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island combined, it is dotted with small

towns; laced by rivers with names like Big Two-Hearted, Tahquamenon, Yellow Dog, Sturgeon, and Fox; bejeweled with lakes and 150 waterfalls; and outlined by sandy beaches and towering limestone cliffs. With the highest hills between the Alleghenies and the Black Hills and with annual snow depths that average about 200 inches, the Upper Peninsula offers the best skiing in the Midwest--along with more than 2,000 miles of snowmobile trails. Bear, moose, dozens of varieties of fish, ghost towns, abandoned iron and copper mines, Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore, and America's only island national park--134,000-acre Isle Royale--add

to the utterly unique character of this place.

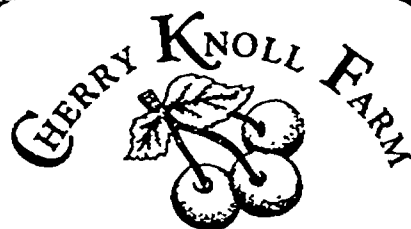

general store, church, boarding house, hotel, lifesaving station, and Seven Gables--home of the town's founder. Just a few miles away, at Grindstone City, relics of the giant wheels still dot the shore. On the Saginaw Bay side of the Thumb, Michigan's eastern sand dunes crown Albert L. Sleeper State Park, near Caseville; and at Bay Port, fishing tugs still arrive and depart daily.

Bed-and-breakfast inns add to the Thumb's small-town charm. At Port Sanilac, the Raymond House Inn (313-622-8800) entertains visitors in Victorian style. And at Port Austin, visitors to the Garfield House Inn

(517-738-5254)--where President Garfield once courted a lady friend--and the Lake Street Manor (517-738-7720), which combines hot tubs, VCRs, and old-fashioned photography equipment, can watch the sun rise and set over the lake.

### SAGINAW BAY

#### Bay City

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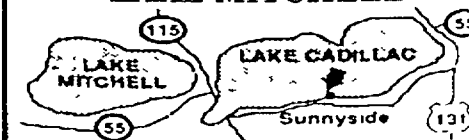
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#### TAWAS CITY

Tawas City and nearby Huron National Forest offer lakes, beaches, streams, and trails. The area's pioneers are commemorated by the Lumberman's Monument, a bronze sculpture representing a landlooker, a woodsman, and a riverman. The Perchville U.S.A. festival in February and Tawas Point State Park reflect the area's diversity.

#### RIVER ROAD NATIONAL SCENIC BYWAY

##### Oscoda

River Road runs 22 miles inland from Oscoda along bluffs overlooking the Au Sable River. Its scenic views include eagle-nesting areas and river traffic ranging from canoes to a pair of paddle-wheel steamers. Oscoda, home of Paul Bunyan's creator, James MacGillivray, harbors a Paul Bunyan statue and more than 80 charter-fishing boats.

#### BIG PAW RESORT

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Individual family cottages nestle in the cedars along 1,300 feet of sandy Lake Huron beach. This extremely popular resort offers lodging, breakfast, dinner, and recreation facilities along with blueberry pancakes, fresh white fish, and stuffed pork chops. Activities include tennis, water sports, walking on trails, sailing, and charter fishing for lake trout and salmon. All accommodations have log-burning fireplaces. (517-724-6326).

#### SUNRISE SIDE GOLF

##### Alpena

Alpena is at the heart of Sunrise Side golf, which stretches from Tawas City in the south to Drummond Island in the north to Garland (with its own charter jet and airstrip) in the west. The Sunrise Side's 12 courses, with 198 holes, help make Michigan the state with the most public-access golf courses. The 12 courses, banning together as "Discover Golf on Michigan's Sunrise Side," have established a toll-free reservation and information number--(800) SAY-YES-3.

Alpena is also the location of the Thunder Bay Underwater Preserve (517-354-2880). Some 80 shipwrecks lie within this 288-square-mile preserve--one of the highest concentrations in the Great Lakes. Charter boats are available for scuba divers as well as anglers. Alpena also hosts Michigan's oldest fishing tournament, the Brown Trout Festival.

#### OCQUEOC FALLS

##### Rogers City

Ocqueoc, the largest waterfalls in Michigan's Lower Peninsula, is 12 miles west of Rogers City. Its twin streams cascade seven feet over fossilized limestone into natural wading pools in a municipal park. In Rogers City, visitors can watch operations at the world's largest (2 by 3 miles) limestone quarry from the rim of the pit at Quarry View.

#### CHEBOYGAN OPERA HOUSE

##### Cheboygan

Cheboygan's elegant restored Victorian Opera House was built in 1877. It once welcomed Mary

Pickford and Annie Oakley and now boasts a year-round playbill that includes such stars as Florence Henderson, Roy Clark, and the Detroit Symphony. Cheboygan is also the terminus of the Inland Waterway, a 40-mile chain of lakes and rivers that runs across the northern tip of the Lower Peninsula almost to Lake Michigan. Pleasure boats take the waterway through Torch and Burt lakes, past resorts and marinas, state parks, campgrounds, cottages, and motels with dock spaces.

#### MACKINAC ISLAND STATE PARK

##### Mackinaw City

The park is actually several sites--Mill Creek and Colonial Michilimackinac in Mackinaw City, and Fort Mackinac and six restored buildings on Mackinac Island. The 625-acre park at Mill Creek features a working, reconstructed waterpowered sawmill like the one that supplied lumber to the island 200 years ago. Costumed staff operate the mill and demonstrate pioneer woodworking crafts. Colonial Michilimackinac is a reconstructed fur-trade village surrounded by a log palisade. Costumed guides conduct tours, demonstrate black-powder weapons and reenact a French wedding.

#### MACKINAC ISLAND

Step back in time and experience an island where motorized vehicles are banned and the only means of transportation are horse-drawn carriages and bicycles. Mackinac Island became Michigan's first state park in 1895: serene, inspiring, unspoiled. Rich in history and full of natural beauty, the island draws nearly a million visitors each year. Some come for the day, and some stay in island accommodations that range from the luxurious Grand Hotel to cozy bed-and-breakfast inns.

The island is accessible by boat or plane. For those who arrive by car, there is frequent ferry service from Mackinaw City or St. Ignace, with ample parking facilities for day and overnight visits. A marina is available on the island; and commercial airlines from Detroit and Chicago provide daily service to the Pellston Airport, about 30 minutes from the island. Mackinac Island has its own paved and lighted runway capable of handling charter and private aircraft.

Once on the island, visitors move with the leisurely pace of horsedrawn carriages; many bike around the island on M-185--an eight-mile-long paved highway on which automobiles are not allowed. (The road is level, but the scenery can take your breath away.)

#### MACKINAC BRIDGE

The Mackinac Bridge is the \$100 million fulfillment of a century-old dream of bridging the Straits of Mackinac and connecting Michigan's two peninsulas. It was dubbed the eighth wonder of the world and the bridge that could not be built. But after four years' labor by 10,000 men, the four-lane span was completed in 1957. Covering the five miles between Mackinaw City and St. Ignace, the "Mighty Mac" is one of the four longest suspension bridges in the world. Its twin towers rise 552 feet above the straits.

#### LES CHENEAUX ISLANDS

##### Hessel and Cedarville

Les Cheneaux, an archipelago of 36 islands hugging the Lake Huron shoreline, are dotted with cabins, cottages, motels, and resorts. On the

second Saturday in August, wooden boats, with vintage hulls and brass deck cleats glistening, sail through the islands for the Antique Boat Show and Arts Festival.

#### DRUMMOND ISLAND

Drummond Island is the largest island in United States waters of the Great Lakes. A hunter's and angler's paradise surrounded by 150 miles of shoreline and more than 50 outlying islands, it has 40 inland lakes and 135 square miles of untamed forest. At Domino's Lodge, the island's golf course, "The Rock," has seven water holes and has been blended into the forest and literally carved out the rock in places to create a long, narrow, scenic challenge. The island is accessible by auto-passenger ferryboat or plane. (800-999-6343).



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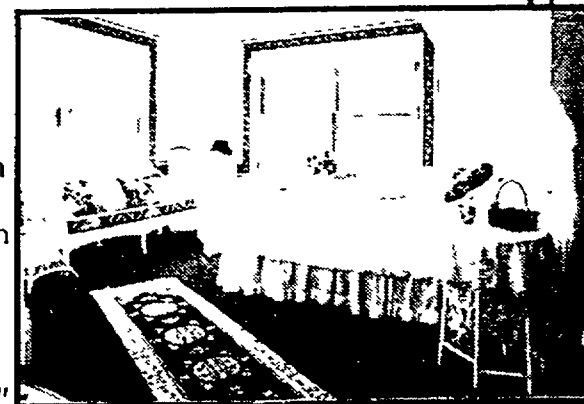
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# In hot pursuit of the perfect pasty

These days, the Straits of Mackinac lie quiet and peaceful under brilliant blue skies - until you mention that regional taste trademark, the pasty. Then, you'll witness either a lively conversation or a heated argument, depending on how widely personal opinions differ, for pasties are taken seriously here at the crossroads of the Upper Great Lakes.

Purists insist that you'll only find a "real" pasty above the bridge, in the Upper Peninsula. After all, they argue, that's where they were first introduced by Cornish miners in the mid-1800s. Those who will gladly eat any pasty placed in front of them strongly disagree. They point out that it's not where the pasty was baked, but who baked it.

"It takes a good cook to bake a good pasty" is a widely held belief in the North. In the Keweenaw peninsula, they'll insist it takes a good Cornish cook, but that's still another story...

These simple "hot pyes" mentioned by Chaucer in "Canterbury Tales", and by Shakespeare in "The Merry Wives of Windsor", were probably the first convenience food. With meat, potatoes, onions, and either rutabaga, turnip, or carrot enclosed in a flaky crust, they were easily eaten out of hand in those days when knives and forks were only owned by the rich. And, of course, they're just as popular today when "finger" foods are eaten routinely.

During the past few months, I've conducted a thoroughly unscientific taste test spanning three generations - myself, son Andrew (a 6'5" former state champion discus thrower with a

build to match who's been trained as a cook by the U.S. Coast Guard), and grandson Eric (a tall-growing teenager who will eat anything, anytime, anyplace). We are all what used to be called at Beebe Farm "hearty eaters" who could hold our own with anyone at the long table during threshing season. We simply love good food.

We all agreed that pasty making is thriving at the Straits of Mackinac - on both sides of the bridge. But it did come as a surprise that each of us chose our personal favorites from pasty shops in St. Ignace - on the Upper Peninsula side. And we each chose a pasty from a different shop, which just goes to show you...

Just as you can't expect three family members to agree on who makes the best pasty, you probably won't find two cooks who agree on all the variables involved in their production. While the filling may be beef and pork, or just beef (round or flank steak, or, originally, leftover roast beef); the vegetables always include potatoes (the variety will vary), onions (the amount will vary) and rutabaga or turnip or carrot or maybe two of the three.

Some cooks, depending on their temperament and inclination, we suspect, add a dot of butter or a dribble of gravy atop the filling before sealing the crust. And seasonings? Well, start with salt and pepper; then some cooks get creative. Seldom will cooks agree on how the vegetables should be cut (diced, sliced or cubed) or how they should be added to the crust (mix 'em all up, layer carefully, or add the potatoes last).

Once they have everything in the crust, a controversy begins as to how it will be shaped. All agree that a round circle of dough is a start. Some fold it to one side, turnover style, while other fold it toward the middle before sealing the edges.

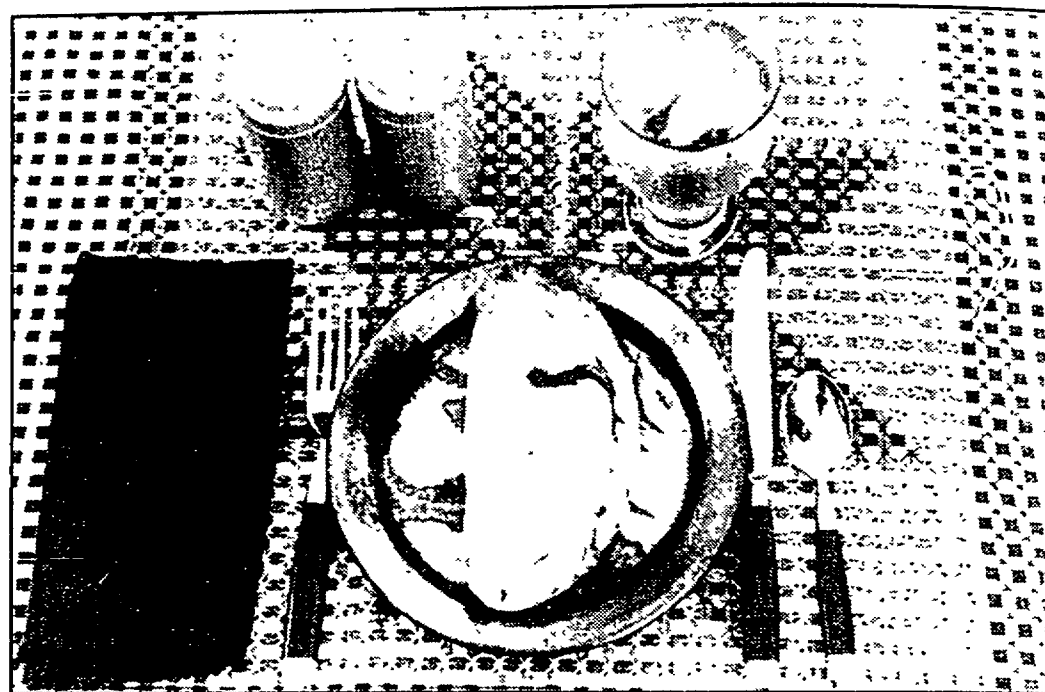
You'd think there could be agreement on sealing the edges. Not so! Some fold into pretty sort of scallops, while others use a fork to firmly crimp it together.

It doesn't stop there. Some cooks daintily pierce the top with a fork (traditionally, wives poked the initial of their husbands so any leftovers wouldn't be eaten by another miner), while other, perhaps more dashing souls, slash the top with a sharp knife to let the steam escape.

Thankfully, all agree it should be baked in an oven, although some now use convection ovens, while purists still insist a wood range is best.

Once the piping hot pasty is served, oozing a nice brown juice from its crust, the arguments continue. What's best to eat with it?

I confess I feel guilty every time I add gravy, remindful of the staunch soul in Laurium who once said scornfully, "Why, I wouldn't even sit to table with anybody who poured gravy on his pasty!" Ketchup, some

believe, is good. Cole slaw is a fine accompaniment. Personally, when not adding gravy (making it a knife and fork meal), I prefer a simple side dish of freshly gathered tomatoes, dressed with salt, pepper, wine vinegar and oil. Bread and butter pickles are good, as is an old-time relish called "chow-chow."

While I am personally an advocate of the "with rutabaga" school of thought, I was surprised that my favorite pasty has carrots instead. Andy, who was raised on rutabagas, (but suddenly in adulthood doesn't remember them as "bashed neeps") prefers his pasty with them, while Eric, who isn't fond of the flavorful root vegetable, chose a pasty that includes the "beggies."

The pasty shops? In neutral alphabetical order: Bessie's Original Homemade Pasties, Jenny Lynn's Pasties, and Lehto's Pasties, all in or near St. Ignace.

Understand one thing: these are commercially-made pasties. While old-time recipes call for cubed meat, most shops now use round steak, coarsely ground, as it's simply too time consuming to cube all the meat by hand when they may sell dozens (or more) daily. Unfortunately some places also grind the vegetables, resulting in a mushy-tasting pasty. We prefer a "toothsome" meat pie, with an interesting texture to the filling.

Bessie's Original Homemade Pasties, 1106 N. State St., St. Ignace, (906) 643-8487. Located on the business loop, you drive through downtown St. Ignace and mindful of the on-going road construction, look for a red-sided small building with a profusion of daylilies surrounding it.

Started in 1958 by Bessie Phelps, her son, Richard now operates the shop, with the help of his wife Karen. Originally, Bessie's husband was a cook on the old state ferry boats that crossed the straits prior to construction of the Mackinac Bridge. Enterprising Bessie sold hot dogs to occupants of automobiles lined up to get on the

ferries.

The pasties, all made by hand, contain round steak, diced potatoes, onions and grated carrot. The crust is made with all vegetable shortening and shaped turnover style. It's flaky and tasty and sells for \$2.95 plus tax. A pasty plate with gravy and a side order of cole slaw is \$4 plus tax. Frozen pasties (and very good they are, too) cost the same. Some customers order them by the dozen to take back Down Below.

Richard shares some secrets with us: he lets the vegetable mixture sit awhile to let the juices drain off before adding the meat. Then pasties are baked in a convection oven for 25 minutes. They're still the same as his mother made, he says.

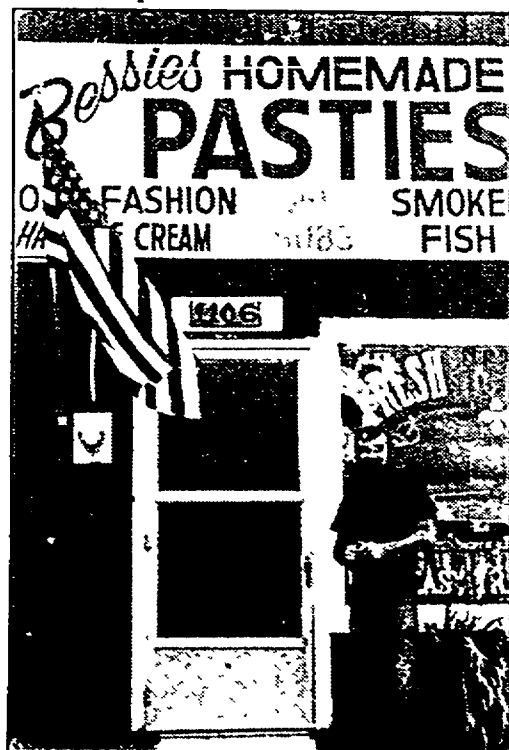
"We'd hate to change. Our customers tell us this is the best pasty they've tasted and we want to keep it that way," he confides.

Using Texas sweet onions and California long white potatoes, Richard adds plenty of meat. "The meat's the most expensive ingredient, but it should flavor the pasty," he adds.

This was my favorite pasty. Others came very close, but the diced potatoes gives this filling something extra. The gravy was hot and plentiful, the cole slaw tasty and tart. I bought some frozen and after a few minutes in the microwave, they tasted just as good, which perhaps is the ultimate test. And I hate to admit it, but I didn't miss the rutabaga.

Jenny Lynn's Pasties, 2725 Mackinac Trail, St. Ignace, (906) 643-9381. Named for her daughter, Linda Novenske's pasty shop is also hard to find but worth the trouble. Drive beyond Bessie's, but be careful not to turn onto the I-75 freeway ramp, instead continue right, around the bend, and you'll spot the sign.

Recommended by some locals who declare it to be "the best pasty shop east of Capt'n Jack's in Ironwood," Jenny Lynn's pasties are the favorite of my grandson, Eric.

Linda chooses potatoes carefully, declaring russets too dry and crumbly, and seeks rutabagas from California during summer before the Michigan crop is ready. Her pasties are filling. "We use about 14-16 oz. of filling," she says. With beef chuck, coarsely ground, potatoes, onions and rutabaga (no carrots), and simple salt and pepper seasoning, these pasties are sealed toward the middle and have a flaky tender crust. They sell for \$3 each and can be ordered in advance if you want to take a cooler full back downstate. Some travelers order five or six dozen, Linda says.

Studying for her nursing degree at Lake Superior State College keeps Linda busy in the winter, but her husband may keep the shop open through hunting season this year.

There's attractive outside dining at a picnic table under the trees, and even though the shop is hard to locate, Linda says they have a loyal following.

"Word of mouth is important for us. Most people are sent here by our steady customers," she comments.

This is an excellent pasty.

Lehto's Pasties, 2048 West U.S. 2, St. Ignace, is located west of St. Ignace along the highway leading to Escanaba. It's not far, perhaps five miles and worth the drive.

In their 44th year, Lehto's pasties are widely known. They're so used to being featured in magazine and newspaper articles that they offer their recipe for sale in response to requests from customers. (Send \$5 to Lehto's Original Pasty Recipe, c/o deRich's Licensing Co., 2048 US 2, St. Ignace MI 49781).

My son, Andy, who is now the U.S. Coast Guard recruiter for this area, frequents Lehto's whenever he's in the neighborhood. These are his favorites and it's hard to argue with their goodness.

Counterman Gary Revort told us one customer ordered 17 dozen at one time.

These are large, tasty meat pies with coarse ground round steak, sliced rutabaga, thinly sliced potatoes and minced onions. They are \$3.25 each and there's no gravy available (which probably signals they don't hold with it).

The crust is excellent and due to the size, they're very filling. Gary said a hungry man can sometimes eat two, but he's never seen anyone finish three at one sitting.

However delicious commercial pasties are, arguments about where to find the best one are sometimes settled with a sigh followed by, "Of course, my mother's were the very best". We suspect childhood memories have a strong hold on our taste buds.

These meat turnovers, humble in their beginnings, haven't lost their appeal through the years, and we wonder if the first Cornish housewife, thrifty soul that she was, who filled a pastry round with Sunday's leftover roast beef, potatoes and carrots, had any idea what she was starting.

In case you'd like to try your hand

at concocting a traditional Cornish pasty at home, here's a recipe to try. Winnie's Cornish Pasties

**Crust:** 8 cups of flour sifted with 2 tsp salt. Cut in 1 lb lard with blender and add 2 cups of ice water to make a soft dough (the less handling the better). Cut into 12 circles on a floured board.

**Filling:** 1 lb. lean beef or flank steak and 3/4 lb. lean pork, all cut into small pieces. 8 small potatoes, 1 small rutabaga or turnip and 3 small onions, all chipped.

Place onions on crust first, then meat. Salt and pepper. Add potato and rutabaga or turnip. Add dab of butter.

Bring the top of the crust over and seal edges with water. Crimp and roll at bottom. Cut slits in top crust.

Bake on lightly greased baking sheet with room between each pasty at 425 degrees for 45 minutes. Remove, cover with towel and let stand 10 minutes before serving.

This recipe, brought to Michigan by a Cornish miner from Penzance in the mid-1840s, was used to attract diners to church suppers, paying off a church mortgage in just 10 years.

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## Walter Cronkite tells big 'Dinosaur!' tale

It seems no one, whatever their age or ancestry, is immune to the lure of the dinosaur. The current giant-critter craze has left the big beasts adorning everything from museums to film sets to kitchen cupboards all over the world.

Even former CBS anchor Walter Cronkite gets into the action this week when he serves as the host and narrator of one of the biggest stories ever told — the anxiously awaited, four-part series *Dinosaur!*

The first of the installments, "The Tale of a Tooth," premiering Sunday, Sept. 8, shows how the discovery of a giant tooth in 1824 changed scientific and religious thought.

On Monday, Sept. 9, "The Tales of a Bone" takes viewers to the "bone rush" of the 1870s, where digs around the world had collectors blowing apart mountains, stopping at nothing to find these priceless relics.

As the dinosaur mystery deepened, at least one question still remained: Which came first — the dinosaur or the egg? "The Tale of an Egg," airing Tuesday, Sept. 10, chronicles a 1922 American expedition that uncovered a strange new fossil, the dinosaur egg.

The series' final episode airs Wednesday, Sept. 11. "The Tale of a Feather" ponders the possibility that birds are the true descendants of the dinosaur.

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River Phoenix received an Oscar nomination for *Running on Empty*, Wednesday on HBO.

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# Networks roll out new-season shows

At broadcast networks ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox, the 1991 fall season marks the beginning of a battle for survival. With more and more viewers turning to cable, home video and other entertainment outlets, the networks see their audiences dwindling as never before. Only weeks ago, the "Big Three" set an ominous Nielsen precedent: They finished a ratings period in a dead heat. Almost simultaneously, network executives were facing hard questions about survival into the next decade: No more are the possibilities mere whispers; the possibility of one or more of the broadcast networks folding or merging with another is getting attention in the boardroom and on the business page.

So what's to set the winners apart from the losers? Network entertainment chiefs are betting their jobs that the fall slate of shows — which began appearing in previews as early as Aug. 25 and will continue to debut through Nov. 1 — will make the difference.

Fox was first out of the starting gate with "Roc," a promising comedy that was previewed on Emmy night. The series is a departure for the fledgling network, a mainstream marvel featuring a cast of Broadway veterans. Tony-nominee Charles Dutton stars as Roc Emerson, a Baltimore sanitation worker who dreams of a better life — in the heaven of a semi-detached home — with his wife Eleanor (Ella Joyce). They're saving their pennies and furnishing their row house with secondhand treasures Roc finds on his garbage route. Sharing their home are Roc's father (Carl Gordon) and ne'er-do-

well brother (Rocky Carroll). From the producer of "Taxi" and "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "Roc" is Fox's most solid contender in the new season.

Another newcomer to series television is stand-up comedian Tim Allen, whose "Men Are Pigs" routine is the crazy-glue version of male bonding a la Robert Bly. Allen's ABC series, "Home Improvement," which debuts Tuesday, Sept. 17, finds him the happily married father of three sons. He supports the family with his weekly TV series, "Tool Time," a send-up of "This Old House" and "New Yankee Workshop" in which he demonstrates simple household repairs and ruminates on man's universal struggle to understand himself, a battle that's best waged with a toolbelt on his hip. Patricia Richardson ("FM," "In Country") co-stars as Allen's wife Jill, who must defend her hearth and home from his sometimes ill-conceived repairs. Slated in a family slot between "Full House" and "Roseanne," the series will appeal to both men and their children.

CBS goes nostalgic this season in the comedy "Brooklyn Bridge," starring Marion Ross ("Happy Days") as Jewish grandma who's the center of the universe for two brothers in late 1950s Brooklyn. Producer Gary David Goldberg ("Family Ties," "American Dreamer") mines his past for this warm and witty look at an extended family in a close-knit neighborhood "at a time when everyone believed the world was getting better." If you never got over the Dodgers leaving Brooklyn, here's your "Bridge" to a kinder, gentler past. The series debuts with a special one-hour

episode on Friday, Sept. 20, and moves into its regular timeslot following "Princesses" another newcomer, the following week.

The fall's strongest slate of new series comes from NBC, which looks like a winner with Sam Waterston in "I'll Fly Away," a drama from the creators of "Northern Exposure," "Eerie, Indiana," a wickedly funny show about a too-normal town, and "Man of the People," starring James Garner, one of prime time's most bankable stars. In "Man of the People," which debuts Sunday, Sept. 15, Garner stars as Jim Doyle, a charming, smooth-talking huckster who leaves his spot on the rail at the racetrack to answer his mayor's call for a city-council appointee. As it turns out, he's perfectly suited to a career in politics — as corruption and double-dealing might be his middle name, and smoke-filled backrooms are certainly his milieu. Vintage Garner, "Man of the People" will be a Sunday-night mandate for millions. Kate Mulgrew ("Heartbeat"), George Wyner ("Hill Street Blues") and Corinne Bohrer ("Free Spirit") co-star.

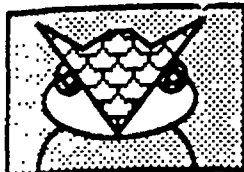

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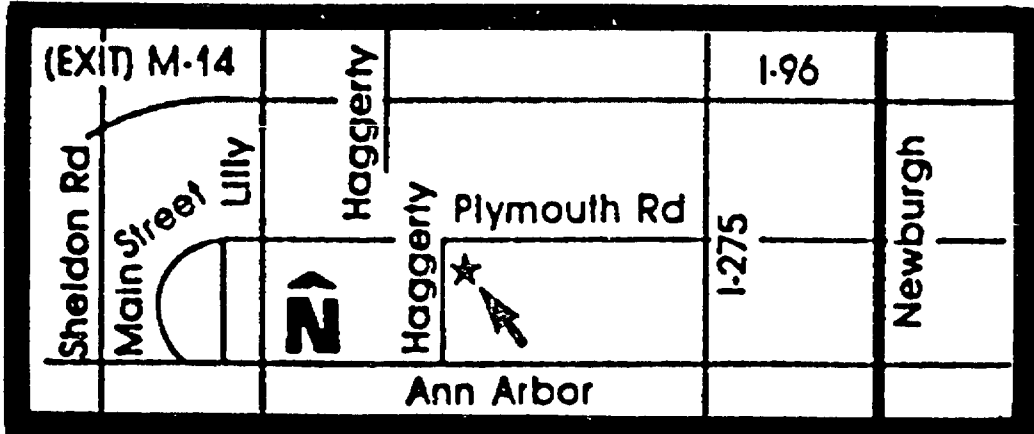
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
