Township plan for garbage nears start-up

Waste is a terrible thing to mind, especially when your new garbage-collection program nears commencement.

Northville Township finds itself less than two weeks away from kick-off of its preferred-status waste collection plan, but a heap of questions still linger.

What is the exact rate residents can expect to pay for trash collection? When will pickups take place? Will the recycling truck come the same day as the solid-waste truck?

Who is covered by the preferred-status plan? And just what the heck is and what's not recyclable?

Even legal concerns between the township and Painter & Ruthenburg were not finalized by last Thursday's session of the township board.

Trustee Thomas Handyside and Township Manager Richard Henningsen on Thursday sparred over the status of the collection system, a program the township chose to implement under guidelines of Wayne County's solid-waste mandate.

Handyside questioned proposed billing rates, and expressed frustration that the township water and sewer commission had not reviewed the final proposals.

"We better make sure we do it the right way," he said.

Henningsen was frustrated, as well. He told the board that Painter & Ruthenburg will start collections Oct. 1, and that time was running out for the township to alert and educate residents on the radical changes ushered by the preferred-status program.

The board eventually decided to direct the water and sewer commission to review the solid waste con-

tract at its Sept. 18 meeting.

The township chose low-bidder Painter & Ruthenburg as its preferred-status solid-waste hauler, meaning the Inkster-based firm will pick up trash from approximately 3,200 township single-family residences.

The township meanwhile cut a deal with Browning-Ferris Industries to provide four years of free recycling services in exchange for excess sewer capacity in the Western Townships Utilities Authority sewer line.

This means that come Oct. 1, most township residents' old private haulers will be waylaid in favor of the preferred hauler. Individual collection fees reportedly will drop, although the township has yet to settle on a collection price.

The preferred-status garbage fee will appear on the township's water and sewer bills. Those without connections to township water and sewer will be billed separately.

While it has yet to determine a billing price, the township is expected to select a monthly rate by the end of next week. Henningsen on Thursday offered three monthly rate proposals — \$9.50, \$10, and \$11 — which include an administrative fee in addition to Painter & Ruthenburg's \$7.48 bid for solid waste and composting pickups.

The proposed figures were selected after reviewing Plymouth Township's fledgling collections program, said Dwayne Harrigan, township finance director.

Henningsen was not available Friday to answer questions on collection schedules, separation chores, and other issues. But Harrigan said the township is "hoping sometime next week" to mass-mail maps and other directions to help residents with the hauler switch.

Fifty years at the polls Mattison marks a half-century of helping voters

Fran Mattison celebrated a golden anniversary of sorts this summer.

The Northville Township resident didn't mark the occasion with elegant dining at a fine restaurant, and she wasn't surrounded by fawning relatives.

Instead, Mattison ate take-out food and worked long hours as the

chairperson of the township's Precinct One polling site.

Fifty years. Since 1941. That's how long Mattison has worked elections.

From FDR to Dewey defeats Truman to Georgina Goss' unchallenged triumph in the recent 36th District election, Mattison has checked off names, answered questions, trained a score of other workers, and kept a close eye on the democratic process.

Mattison's efforts at the polls were recognized last Thursday when the township board honored her with a resolution that read in part: "... Mrs. Frances Mattison has been an outstanding worker and Chairman of a precinct during elections and ... her knowledge of the election process and her friendliness with the residents has been an outstanding asset ..."

But for Mattison, it's all part of a

day's work.

"I've never really thought of it as volunteer work," Mattison said last week. "You are paid for the job."

But near-minimum wages and a board resolution in return for years of dependable service don't tell Fran Mattison's story.

Her own words are much more interesting.

"I had been working in Detroit,

Watkins mulls post

Add one well-known, highly placed name to the list of potential Northville Township supervisor candidates.

Tom Watkins, former director of the state Department of Mental Health, on Friday said he may apply for the supervisor position.

Watkins said "a number of people" have approached him about applying

for former Supervisor Georgina Goss' old job.

"I really like the community and want to maintain its viability," said Watkins, who moved his family to Northville Township in 1985. "There are issues all of us are concerned with."

Watkins served four years as mental health director in the James Blanchard Administration. He left office after Blanchard's defeat in the 1990 gubernatorial election, and

currently serves as a faculty member and assistant to the president at Wayne State University.

Watkins is a Democrat — township board members are all Republican — but says party preference should not be a barrier to community service.

"The issues are not partisan," he said, "when (ensuring that the com-

Selection process firms up

One supposedly done deal was denied and another finalized at the township board's Sept. 12 session.

The board cemented its supervisor selection process by scheduling interview sessions with potential candidates on Monday, Sept. 23 and Wednesday, Sept. 25, if necessary.

The successor to former township supervisor Georgina Goss will be tabbed Thursday, Sept. 26 at 7:30 p.m. at township hall, the board determined.

Supervisor hopefuls have until 4

p.m. today to forward their resumes to township Clerk Tom Cook's office. Cook last week said resumes would be accepted until Sept. 20 but announced the change Thursday.

Cook said he will distribute the resumes to the balance of the township board for review prior to the interview sessions. Each applicant will have 15-20 minutes to plead his or her case to the board, he said.

Treasurer Betty Lennox has turned in her resume, Cook said. Others expected to apply for the post are planning department administrative assistant Maureen Osiecki

and zoning board of appeals chairperson and planning commissioner Karen Baja.

The supervisor's post is a part-time, \$25,000-a-year elected position. The applicant appointed by the board would be up for re-election in 1992, as is the rest of the board.

Trustee Richard Allen concluded Thursday's session by taking exception with an editorial that appeared in that day's issue of the *Record*. Allen said he was "mildly incensed" by the editorial's suggestion that that supervisor's selection is perceived as a "done deal."

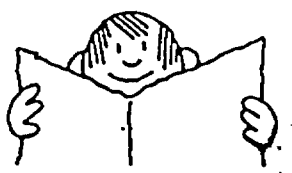

munity) is a decent place to raise a family.

"I have no problem working with people of a different political party," he said.

Watkins said he developed a sound working relationship with local Republican officials such as state Sen. Robert Geake, former Rep. Gerald Law and former Wayne County Commissioner Susan Heintz during his tenure in Lansing.

An application decision will come soon, Watkins said. If he does apply, the board won't be alone in asking questions.

Watkins said he also will look for answers, including what the board expects of the supervisor's role.

Whether or not he makes a run at the position, Watkins will remain anchored in Northville.

"I'm going to be involved in this community," he said. "It's a great community and can only get better."

Pair of head-on crashes injure 7

A 17-year-old Northville girl was hospitalized in critical condition Saturday, and six other people were injured, in two separate head-on collisions in Northville Friday evening.

The 17-year-old and two other Northville girls were injured when the Pontiac Grand Am in which they were riding was struck head-on by the driver of a Chevrolet Cavalier traveling westbound on Seven Mile Road near Innsbrook Drive.

Two of the Northville girls were driven to hospitals in Ann Arbor for treatment. The male driver and male passenger of the Cavalier were not seriously injured, police said.

Alcohol does not appear to be involved in the accident, which occurred at approximately 9:30 p.m., but police are investigating witness statements that the Cavalier was traveling at a high rate of speed, lost control, and struck the Grand Am after swerving into the eastbound lane, said township police Lt. Gary Batzloff.

Police are not releasing the names of the injured parties at this time.

A second head-on collision occurred on Sheldon Road approximately a quarter-mile south of Seven Mile where police could hear the screech of the first accident.

Police said a man driving northbound in a Ford van crossed the center line and struck a southbound Chevrolet van driven by a woman. Details were sketchy Saturday morning, but police believe alcohol was involved in the second accident.

"Officers had a reason to believe he had been drinking," Batzloff said. "Charges are pending results of a blood test."

Both victims were hospitalized after the second accident, but neither suffered life-threatening injuries, Batzloff said.

Northville Township and City rescue workers had to cut the driver of the Ford van from his vehicle. He was pinned in the wreckage for about two hours before he was freed just before 2 a.m. Saturday.

Witnesses painted troubling pictures of both accidents.

Northville resident Paul Stevenson was traveling westbound on Seven Mile near A & P at about 9:30 p.m. and slowed to make a left turn into In-

nsbrook Apartments. The Cavalier approached him at a high rate of speed, swerved into the right lane to avoid Stevenson's vehicle, lost control and swerved into the path of the Grand Am, Stevenson said.

"The white car (Cavalier) was hell-bent for leather," Stevenson said. "I really thought he was going to hit me."

Two Northville girls reportedly barely escaped injury prior to the second accident. Stacey Panos and her sister Nicole were driving southbound on Sheldon when a northbound red van swerved into their lane.

The two were shaken, but continued their trek to Burger King near Five Mile and Sheldon. On their drive back to Northville, they happened on the accident.

"Right away we thought it was the van," Stacey Panos said. "He had swerved into our lane and almost hit us."

Jeff Wernette was riding in a northbound car just behind the red van.

"The red van swerved over a couple of times," Wernette said. "When they hit, both of them went off the ground."

Contract gets an OK

The Northville School Board formally approved a contract to hire the district's executive director for special education as superintendent of schools.

The approved contract will bring Leonard Rezmierski a pay increase of nearly \$20,000 annually. Rezmierski earned \$75,216 a year as the special education director. His new contract provides a base salary equaling \$94,538 per year.

The new superintendent also will receive life insurance, 18 paid sick days a year cumulative to a total of 200 sick days, 22 vacation days, personal days when approved by the school board president, \$200 a month for out-of-pocket expenses, an automobile including maintenance and repair costs and an annual board-approved physical examination.

Rezmierski replaces former Superintendent George Bell who earned \$88,353 last year. The school board in advertising for a new superintendent said it would pay in the low \$90,000 range.

Residents address city council about barricade

One family's eyesore is another family's safety feature, judging from the reaction of residents to the removal of a barricade between Springfield and Coldspring drives.

Several Springfield residents requested that the recently removed barricade be reinstated, to reduce a sudden increase in traffic flow through their neighborhood. They said the traffic poses a safety hazard to their school-age children.

Mark Liska of Springfield Drive presented the council with a petition signed by 18 neighbors, saying the barricade is needed for their children's safety.

"We have all witnessed and have heard middle-of-the-night races coming up our street," he said.

"There's only one exit going east not on Eight Mile Road, and we're seeing a lot more traffic coming through here, and we're concerned it will only get worse."

Liska noted that a berm has been built along Beck Road in Northville Estates to keep the cars out, and steel barricades have been erected in North Beacon Woods.

"We're asking for the same consideration," he said.

Another Springfield Drive resident, Albert Iggi, asked whether the city commissioned traffic studies on the neighborhoods before they were developed. "We're concerned if there was actually a plan that got us where we are today," he said.

Council Member Paul Folino said studies were done, and noted that part of the reason that Beck Road was cut off from the neighborhoods to the east was to prevent traffic through there. But he noted that Springfield and Coldspring were joined to provide a link between the

neighborhoods in Lexington Commons and Pheasant Hills.

"You seem to be confirming the fears that we have about the history of actions that have been taken," Iggi said.

Mayor Chris Johnson noted that the barricade was always intended to be in place only on a "temporary basis."

"What you're requesting now is a more permanent situation of closing a road, and before we do that we should have more information," he said.

City Manager Gary Word recommended that the council wait for the results of a police department study on traffic through the area. "It's our opinion that a more informed, intelligent opinion could be made at that time," he said.

The council agreed, and decided to review the matter again at its Oct. 7 meeting.

Council Member Jerry Mittman urged that several options to control traffic be considered, including opening Elmsmere Drive to through traffic and placing stop signs at strategic locations to slow cars down.

In the meantime, the residents asked that the city take steps to assure safety on their streets.

"The police department has been very good at patrolling the neighborhood, and we'd only ask that that continue," Liska said. Iggi asked for stop signs at Fairfax Court and McDonald Drive, to slow traffic while the department conducts its traffic study.

"What we're concerned about is the interim," he said.

Another neighbor, John Stuber, asked for earlier patrols by the police department, to monitor the area between 7-9 a.m., when children are leaving to catch the school bus. Police Chief Rod Cannon acknowledged

Stuber's request.

The barricade was erected in the fall of 1987, to prevent construction vehicles from cutting through Lexington Commons from the Pheasant Hills subdivision. The barricade was

intended to be kept up until a majority of the homes in Pheasant Hills had been built, which has happened.

On May 6, Springfield Drive residents Urban Hubert and Sue Schwirring asked the city council to improve

the barricade or take it down, with Schwirring calling it "an eyesore."

The council assured the residents then that the barricade would be taken down by Sept. 1, to allow school buses to use a route through the

neighborhoods.

Iggi noted that the Northville Public Schools had used an alternate bus route for several years and that it remains "an option" according to school officials.

Post official recalls victims of area shooting incident

Reaction to the death of Det. Sgt. Janeece Vortman was one of shock Friday at Northville's Michigan State Police Post.

"It's a surprise," said Lt. Richard Duthler, a longtime colleague of Vortman's alleged killer, retired State Police Lt. Joseph Krease. "I suppose everybody has got the capability to do something like this."

Both Vortman and Krease worked at the Northville post.

According to state police records, Vortman, 46, worked in Northville from 1984 to 1988 as a detective

sergeant. She was stationed at the Ypsilanti post prior to her death.

Krease came to the Northville post in 1973 and stayed until his retirement in 1989. In that time he was promoted from detective sergeant to detective lieutenant.

Vortman and Krease met at the Northville post and subsequently dated for several years, beginning in the mid-'80s. Vortman's shooting is thought to be a result of the breakup of that relationship.

Duthler said state police are working in conjunction with the Farmington Hills Police on an investigation of the incident.

The 46-year-old was shot to death in her car at her Farmington Hills apartment Thursday morning. Duthler

said it appears that Krease waited for Vortman in the parking lot of the apartment complex.

After allegedly shooting Vortman, Krease turned the gun on himself. As of Friday morning, Krease was in critical condition at Botsford Hospital with a wound to the head, according to a hospital spokesperson.

"There are no winners in this situation," Duthler said.

Vortman handled general field investigation of criminal matters for the Ypsilanti Post. Duthler, who was Vortman's supervisor, described her as a dedicated detective.

"She was very proud to be a member of the Michigan State Police," he said. "She reflected that in her daily work."

Vortman was good at what she did, Duthler added.

"She was very capable of handling everything that came up," he said. "She did the whole gambit, from simple larceny to first degree murder."

Duthler said he has known Krease for more than 20 years. He said Krease was a "methodical" detective and worked on many important cases, including the Oakland County child killings of the mid-'70s.

"As an investigator he was very well respected," Duthler commented.

Funeral arrangements for Vortman were being made Friday. Duthler said the state police will honor Vortman at the ceremonies.

City votes to join association protecting TIFA districts

At the urging of Mayor Chris Johnson, the city's Downtown Development Authority has joined a lobbying group dedicated to preserving and promoting DDAs in Michigan.

The new group is known as the Tax Increment Finance Association, and was started in the City of Taylor in response to legislative threats to tax capturing.

Its chair, Michael Manore, also serves as the director of Taylor's Office of Development Services.

The Taylor group's stated purpose, according to a letter by Manore, is "to educate, promote, and advocate on behalf of tax increment financing in our communities and in Lansing."

Tax increment financing uses captured taxes to fund public improvements. The funds are taken from the amount that the revenue from property taxes increases over a given period.

In Northville, tax capturing was used to finance the downtown renovations known as MainStreet '78, and the Cady Corridor Redevelopment Study.

Manore said the new advocacy group began as a lobbying force earlier this year in response to the legislative proposals to end tax increment financing.

"Certainly, that (legislative threat) was one of the initial concerns that the City of Taylor had back in February, when we first contacted com-

munities," he said.

Since then, state lawmakers have backed off their attempts to do away with tax capturing altogether. Current legislative proposals include a plan by Gov. Engler to reduce the money available to TIFAs, and a Democratic plan to limit their ability to draw off a residential tax base, Manore said.

"In terms of eliminating TIFAs... that does not seem to be the case now. The important thing is (current proposals do) not eliminate TIFAs, it just cuts the cash flow available through them."

As the focus in Lansing has shifted from doing away with TIFAs to limiting the scope of their tax capturing, the group's role has shifted to an educational one, Manore said.

"It became quite apparent that there was not a great deal of information on TIFAs, how they were used, and it was apparent that there was no organization available to provide information," he said. The new association, formally started in August, now fills that informational role.

"There's a whole lot of things we're trying to accomplish. It's just not for the lobbying, though that was very important originally... and it might become so in the future."

Mayor Johnson said that the threat to tax capturing remains, whether or not it is an immediate one.

"A lot of groups in the Legislature are advocating the end of TIFAs throughout Michigan, including DDAs," he told Northville's Down-

town Development Authority.

Johnson said the anti-TIFA sentiment started as opposition to the tax incentives offered to lure commercial and industrial businesses to specific municipalities, which some legislators believed left other municipalities in the lurch. The tax incentives were originally intended to draw out-of-state businesses to Michigan.

"It's causing a lot of problems between local units," Johnson said.

But broadening their attack to include all TIFAs is unwarranted, Johnson said. "That might be a real blow, not only with what we have going on including the (expansion of the Cady Street) parking deck, but for public policy in general. It essentially would eliminate (tax) capturing as an

idea of funding public improvements, and I think that's a real problem."

The Downtown Development Authority agreed, voting 7-0 to join the Taylor-based group.

The City of Northville now joins the ranks of others like Southfield, Romulus, Traverse City, Bay City, Garden City, Munising and Sault Ste. Marie in advocating for tax increment financing.

Cost to join the advocacy group is one tenth of one percent of a DDA's budget, from a minimum of \$200 to a maximum of \$3,000. Northville, with its relatively tiny DDA, would pay \$200 a year for at least three years, provided that the group retains at least 15 members for the second and third years.

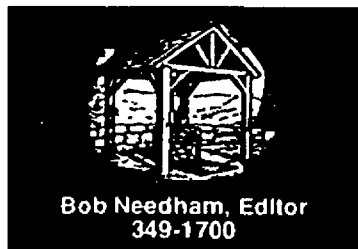

Our Opinion

Mine seems inevitable, but plant may not be

Is there any support for a gravel mining operation and asphalt plant in Northville Township? Aside from Holloway Sand and Gravel employees, stockholders, and a handful of Wayne County bureaucrats, the answer is a resounding no.

The township planning commission is scheduled to meet tomorrow evening with Holloway representatives to debate the future of the proposed Six Mile/Ridge roads gravel pit. Planners are considering Holloway's special-land-use permit request, approval of which would allow the Wixom-based firm a 10-year lease to carve aggregate from the 177-acre site.

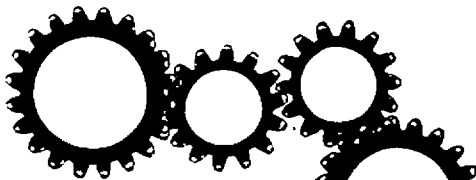
Holloway also wants to construct an asphalt processing plant on the site, and planners surely face a stiff challenge on both fronts.

State law requires that communities provide zoning measures for all uses. As unseemly as gravel pits and asphalt plants are to commissioners and residents, the township must offer Holloway the opportunity to comply with township standards before they approve or reject the land-use request.

Finding sufficient reason to shut the door on the operation is the big issue.

Planners in July tabled a review of the Holloway plan, and asked the developer to provide more information to concerns raised by commissioners and the public. Tuesday's meeting is the first since that session, and could go a long way to determining both the legitimacy of the proposed operation and the viability of organized township opposition.

Development concerns are many, and benefits to the community appear few. But unless the planning commission can isolate and exploit potential problems such as groundwater contamination threats, traffic problems caused by gravel-hauling trucks, what to do with a resulting 55-acre lake, and more innumerable woes such as noise, dust, and appearance, Holloway likely will gain approval for their mining operation.



Development

Planners tomorrow can choose to recommend special-land-use approval to the township board, recommend denial of the permit, or table the issue again and send the developer off for additional information. Township officials say it's too soon to guess the outcome.

The feeling here is that it will be difficult to deny the special land use request for gravel mining. Holloway is a wealthy, powerful outfit that likely would shrug at rejection and file suit at the earliest possible convenience. Township ordinances then could face legal system dissection, a thought that must send a collective chill up the spine of planners and other officials.

The mining operation may be a grudging lock, but the asphalt plant — the most troubling feature of this development — does not have to be. There are precedents for quarries here, but not raw materials processors. And while the township won't suddenly transform into another Gary, Ind., the sights, sounds and smell of an asphalt plant definitely would not meld with the character of Northville Township.

We feel the planning commission should ask tough questions on the mining operation, and recommend development approval only if there is no defensible recourse. But the asphalt plant is a different matter. The township does not need an asphalt plant; it simply does not belong here, and planners would do well to dig their heels deeply, roll up their sleeves, and get ready for a fight.

Residents need to join the fray. Tomorrow's meeting is set for 7:30 p.m. at township hall.

Farmington Hills vs. Edison



Watching the Farmington Hills city council take on Detroit Edison is kind of like watching a beauty queen taking on Mike Tyson — and beating the pulp out of him.

Michigan.

The city is demanding Edison provide priority to hospitals, nursing homes and the like when restoring power after an outage. It also wants adequate warning of anticipated outages, a plan to put wires underground, and a list of trouble spots (with proposals to reduce outages in those areas), to name just some of the requests.

Considering the number of customers the Farmington area offers, I'd bet Edison is as nervous as a long-tailed cat in a room full of rocking chairs.

Too bad we in Northville and Novi don't have such an ax to dangle over the neck of Edison. Everyone around here knows that, hundred-year thunderstorms aside, the power goes out whenever a fat bird sits on the wire.

I've lost count of the number of times I've had to reset my

clock radio and VCR in the six months I've lived in Novi, and I'm fairly certain that it was a power surge that zapped the receiver on my stereo.

Even in downtown Northville, at the Record office, we experience outages every couple of months. Local legislators react to Engler education plan

Everyone saw something different to applaud or criticize in Gov. John Engler's "Michigan 2000" plan for achieving excellence in the \$8-billion public school system.

"It is a plan that gives people — parents, students and educators — the freedom, the power and the options to achieve excellence," the Republican governor told the Legislature and State Board of Education Wednesday.

Engler's most-used words: "teachers" and "parents." His least used: "administrators."

Engler's emphasis on new kinds of publicly funded, competitive schools was criticized by Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, whose district includes the City of Northville north of Eight Mile Road. He called charter schools and federally funded "new American schools" just "a proliferation and expansion of an already inefficient system. He'd allow individuals to organize their own schools, pull in the ones (students) they want, take the money and leave the residue."

Faxon blistered Engler's failure to advocate consolidation of the smaller of Michigan's 562 districts.

But Sen. Robert Geake, who lives in Northville Township and represents the rest of the Northville community, said charter schools "are probably the most dramatic idea and could do a lot for low-income areas of the state, though they wouldn't do much for western Wayne County." Under the plan, groups of teachers or a university could receive a charter from a local school board to start a school with emphasis, for example, on phonics in reading.

Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, gave Engler "credit for raising standards and quality and saying we don't make the grade internationally. But he gets a failing grade for 'How are we going to pay for it?'"

Although Engler proposed \$300,000 for 200-day school years in 12 pilot districts, Pollack said the total cost of providing 20 additional days of schooling statewide will be upwards of \$200 million. Pollack, an Appropriations Committee member, called for an alternative revenue source to get more money out of the state general fund because "the rock just won't yield."

Serving her first day in office, Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, said "charter schools sends alarm bells ringing. I agree with competition in schools. But it's such a new concept that I'd have to see more." Scholarships for potential teachers are "a wonderful idea," said Goss, who also liked the idea of having high schools warranty their graduates to employers.

"I agree 100 percent with his emphasis on parents and teachers," said Rep. Barbara Dobb, R-West Bloomfield. "Our system is not working. We need drastic change."

Engler underscored his values not by introducing an outstanding scholar or favorite teacher, as his predecessor, James Blanchard, might have done, but by introducing "two very special teachers — my mom and dad."

His message: "Parents must be the guides, the homework helpers, the role models and the decision-makers that motivate Michigan's students."

Engler's proposals covered five main areas:

- Quality — optional new schools, countywide schools of choice and 200-day school years in pilot districts.
- Equity — tax base sharing by richer districts — extremely unpopular among most area lawmakers except Keith, its architect.
- Teacher improvement — doubling aid for professional development, bonuses, easier certification for professionals with non-teaching backgrounds.
- Job skills — guarantees to employers of graduates' competence, school-employer partnerships with state aid to businesses who promise to provide jobs to graduates, more math and science centers.

- Pre-school — tutoring and extended kindergarten hours for at-risk youngsters.

Dorothy Beardmore, R-Rochester, president of the State Board of Education, "liked his focus on parenting" and "the recognition that children need to be ready for school." She praised Engler's emphasis on teacher development and tenure reform.

ment and tenure reform.

Annetta Miller, D-Huntington Woods, 20-year member of the State Board, found nothing new. "I'm personally not sure the 'charter school' can work," she said of Engler's plan, borrowed from Minnesota, to let local school boards grant charters to a certified faculty that would determine curriculum.

year of effect Northville would see \$1.7 million lost through "recapture" of state aid reduced to \$1.4 million; but \$546,000 is lost through sharing. Total loss would be nearly \$2 million.

The House of Representatives last week approved 68 to 35 a House-Senate compromise of the controversial bill.

Majority floor leader Pat Gagliardi, D-Drummond, routinely moved to give the bill "immediate effect," which requires a two-thirds vote (74).

But Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, demanded a roll call. Gagliardi, seeing a shortage of green (yes) lights, called out "clear the board" — a parliamentary tactic for halting the vote and avoiding embarrassment.

Supporters will try again this week, then send House Bill 4267 to the Senate. Seven members were absent Thursday.

"A Robin Hood scheme . . . hypocritical . . . it will reduce the quality of education," said six suburban Republicans in a written protest explaining their no votes.

First-year total loss to affected districts: \$87.4 million.

The bill bears the sponsorship of Rep. William Keith, D-Garden City, though it was advanced by the partnership of Rep. James O'Neill Jr., D-Saginaw, and Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron.

While praising the tax-base-sharing concept, Keith, whose district includes Inkster, dislikes its companion feature — returning some categorical aid (such as special education) to well-heeled districts.

Gov. John Engler is certain to sign the bill. "It will make sure every child has an equal educational opportunity," Engler said Sept. 11 in his special message on school quality.

Both of Northville's representatives in the House — Republicans Georgina Goss and Willis Bullard — voted no.

Months ago both chambers produced different versions of the bill, which were ironed out in a six-member conference committee last week. Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, and an outstate Republican representative refused to sign.

The bill would work like this:

- Fifty-nine of the state's 562 school districts would share half their growth in commercial and industrial property taxes for schools. Existing business tax base would not be affected, nor would homes, farms, forests and mines. In the first year, they would send about \$27.2 million to other districts.

- The state's recent practice of "recapturing" (taking back) \$72 million in categorical aid from those districts would be phased out. In the first year, recapture would be reduced \$1 for every \$2 shared; the second year, \$2 for every \$1 shared; thereafter, \$1 for \$1 shared.

- Michigan's 83 counties would be split into two regions. Region 1 would be Oakland, Macomb, Genesee, the Thumb area, northeastern lower Michigan and the Upper Peninsula. Region 2 would be Wayne, Washtenaw, Livingston, Kent, the southern tiers of counties and the Lake Michigan shoreline up to Grand Traverse.

The statewide impact looks like this, according to the House Taxation Committee staff:

Without the bill, affected districts lose \$72 million a year.

and when I went to register to vote — you had to be 21 then — the gentleman I was working with urged me to fill out an application to be an election worker," she said.

The city approved her application shortly thereafter, and Mattison began a task that would stretch to a half-century and counting. Her recollections of those early years point out the vast changes in the voting process.

"In those days, they had little green sheds all around the city (of Detroit) to which people would go to vote," she said. "Of course we used paper ballots, and we'd work until all the votes were tallied."

Sometimes workers would count votes all night and well into the next day, Mattison said. Sometimes conditions were difficult in the little

green voting sheds.

"In the wintertime, they used pot-bellied stoves to keep the workers warm," she said.

Mattison and her family moved to Northville Township in 1955, the first year the city and township became "different entities," she explained.

Mattison worked the first township election at the makeshift township hall, an old school building that once was located where Meads Mill Middle School currently stands.

At that time, Northville Township had but two precincts; they were separated by a Sheldon Road boundary. Mattison settled in at Precinct One, which covers the northwestern portion of the township.

She became chairperson of the precinct in the 1960s, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Mattison's name has been a constant on the community volunteer list, in addition to her election duties. She's been active with the local library commission and the Town Hall series.

But elections always proved a source of excitement and a sense of duty. She fondly remembers late evenings working presidential elections and being treated to refreshments from Black's White House, a restaurant that sat on the spot now covered by the Methodist church's parking lot.

She's also proud that Precinct One voters always turn out in large numbers, regardless of the issue or scope of the day's election. Mattison has no plans to step down from her election role, despite her golden anniversary status.

"I've really enjoyed it and worked with a lot of nice people," she said. "It's been a long time, and I probably won't give up yet."

Generally, we don't bite when we see these marketing gimmicks. Beringer wines — OK, they're consistent top quality. Packaged pasta and sauces? Not for these two purists who make them at home from scratch using authentic Italian recipes.

Since they were introduced, we've pushed the shopping basket right past the Contadina Fresh pastas and sauces. We've resisted the convenience because we "knew" they wouldn't be at all similar to homemade.

A wise man once said, "Don't knock it 'til you try it." The current promotion caused us to do just that. We were more than pleasantly surprised.

The store displays of Beringer wines attract attention with eye-catching neckhangers. Some stores couple this with cross-merchandising displays in the refrigerated section near the Contadina Fresh pastas and sauces. Whichever you find, do capitalize on the mail-in, \$2-off coupons good on the Contadina products and the wines.

Featured wines include Beringer Chenin Blanc, White Zinfandel and Gamay Beaujolais. Since sweet-edged wines (chenin blanc and white zinfandel) don't pair well with red sauce, you need to consider your purchasing choice in advance for a proper food and wine harmony.

A white sauce such as the Contadina Fresh Alfredo Sauce will work with the off-dry chenin and the slightly sweet white zinfandel, if you want to keep it light and white.

We concentrated on the red sauces with various pastas since this is our preference. Following the package directions, we prepared the Angel's Hair pasta and sampled it with each of four sauces (Plum Tomato with Basil, Fresh Garden Vegetable, Bolognese and Marinara), heated according to the microwave directions, and a slightly chilled bottle of Beringer Gamay Beaujolais.

The best wine and food harmony was achieved with the Fresh Garden Vegetable and the Bolognese sauces. The first sauce should please any vegetarian. The vegetables are crunchy and the sauce is piquant, enhancing a slightly spicy element in the wine.

The Bolognese meat sauce is richly flavored and sticks to the pasta — a sign of quality. The balance between the wine's fruitiness and the richness of the sauce is a tempting taste treat.

Part two of the taste test consisted of preparing both the Contadina beef and chicken ravioli and sampling each with the same four red sauces evaluated previously with the Angel's Hair pasta. To introduce a note of creativity, we added a bottle of zinfandel to the taste arena.

The Gamay Beaujolais stood up to the challenge, but the zinfandel was a clear winner. Again, our preference was the Fresh Garden Vegetable sauce with the chicken ravioli and the Bolognese sauce with the beef ravioli.

Zinfandel served with the Bolognese and beef ravioli enriched the taste experience. The sauce's richness was complexed and the beefy flavor of the ravioli came forward.

What's been discussed so far is an under 15-minute dinner preparation. Buy the pasta and sauce of your choice, prepare according to package directions, open a bottle of wine and you're done.

Grate some Parmesan cheese and assemble a fresh green leaf basil garnish while the pasta is cooking. No more prep time is added, but a note of elegance is.

Being vegetarian requires a change in lifestyle

Eating healthy may be "in," but like most things that are "in," it doesn't require a long term commitment.

There are lots of good reasons to consider a vegetarian, or macrobiotic, lifestyle (see sidebar), but if you really want to make the lifelong commitment to eating healthy, it's the way to go.

When most people think of vegetarians, they think of emaciated earth mothers (and fathers) in sandals. That stereotype is nowhere near the truth. Many professional athletes and high-powered corporate executives have recognized the energizing effect of eliminating meat from their diets. Heck, we even know vegetarians with weight problems.

Dave Scott has won the Ironman Triathlon six times, making him the only person to win the event more than twice. He adopted a vegetarian lifestyle, with the competitive motto, "Outsmart him. Outrun him. Outlive him."

Of course, before you make any changes in your diet, radical or not, the Oakland County Department of Health strongly recommends that you consult your regular physician.

The biggest roadblock to adopting a vegetarian lifestyle is often not knowing what to cook.

A good health food grocery store can help you get started. Most offer high quality and good-tasting products from meatless hot dogs (made from tofu) to chocolate chips made with no animal products (such as butterfat).

Up-to-date methods for old fashioned canning

Whether it's fresh picked from the garden, or bought at a farm market, there's nothing tastier than locally grown fruits and vegetables. You can't stop the temperatures from falling, but you can save some of the harvest for later by canning or freezing.

Home food preservation is again gaining popularity with consumers concerned about sugar, salt and additives. Canning is not a time to express your creativity, however. Strict methods and procedures must be followed to ensure a safe product.

The first step is to buy a new canning book. Don't use a book that is older than five years. If you're using grandma's 100-year-old pickle recipes use the same ingredients, but update the preserving method and procedure.

Foods fall into two categories, high acid and low acid. High-acid foods are generally all fruits plus tomatoes, sauerkraut, and pickled vegetables. Acid in these food products guard against growth of bacteria, and can be safely canned using the hot water

bath method.

Use any kettle large enough so the jars are completely immersed and surrounded by water. The jars should be held off the bottom of the kettle to prevent breakage and so the heat can thoroughly penetrate the product.

Low acid foods are all vegetables, meats, poultry, seafoods, soups or combination foods. These must be processed in a pressure canner. Harmful elements of certain bacteria thrive in low acid and cannot be destroyed at boiling temperature of 212 degrees Fahrenheit. Low acid foods must be superheated to 240 degrees. Botulism is the deadly food poisoning caused by the clostridium botulinum. If the spore of the botulism is not killed by a high temperature, the risk of fatal food poisoning is very great.

Many people who do not want to deal with the pressure canner opt to freeze their produce. Freezing is probably the simplest and least time-consuming way to preserve foods.

Freezing retards growth of microorganisms, slows down enzyme activity, and

oxidation. However, there are some other food spoilers to be aware of in freezing.

Formation of ice crystals can be prevented by drying food better before freezing, and freezing food quicker. Freezer burn is caused by improperly packed foods. Packaging is very important for good results.

Blanching vegetables before freezing stops the enzyme action, locks in color, flavor and nutrients. Blanching does not mean cooking. It means giving food a short heat treatment. It can be done in the microwave; just follow the directions in a microwave cookbook.

For top of the stove blanching, have a large kettle of water boiling, add the prepared vegetables, count the exact time of starting when the product hits the boiling water. When the time is up, quickly submerge the product into cold water to stop the boiling action. The quicker this can be done, the better product you'll have later.

Blanching times vary, depending on the amount you want to freeze. Follow the direc-

tions in your favorite cookbook.

There are certain vegetables that are best completely cooked before freezing. These are beets, pumpkin, winter squash and sweet potatoes. Cook as you would to use; then cool, package, and freeze.

Cooked or raw tomatoes can be frozen. Core tomatoes for freezing. Freeze raw tomatoes whole or cut in pieces. Pack into containers leaving one-inch head space. For cooked tomatoes, peel, cover, core and cook till tender. Place pan in cold water to cool. Pack into containers and allow one-inch head space, label, and freeze.

Fruits and flavoring products such as pepper, onions, horseradish, mint and other herbs do not need to be blanched before freezing. Cut into desired sizes, package airtight and freeze. Spread packages out in single layers to freeze quicker.

There is no need to can or freeze with salt or sugar except when making pickles or jams and jellies. The teaspoon of salt added to a jar of vegetables does not help preserve the pro-

duct. It only adds to the flavor. Sugar can also be deleted from the canning of fruits.

Cut fruit into desired size, put in a kettle, add a little water and heat slightly before filling the jars. The heat activates the natural sugars in the fruit so the product ends up tasting very natural, and very sweet.

Ascorbic acid or lemon juice added to the product before canning or freezing will help keep the light color.

The keys to safe food preservation are to follow up-to-date canning and freezing procedures exactly. Don't waste your time, money and energy having to throw out food that has spoiled. Just think how good that food will taste when the snow is piled up to the windowsill.

New recipes for cooking vegetarian

You'll also need to learn some new recipes. It's really not that hard. If you're a good experimenter in the kitchen, try using things like beans and tempeh (a bean by-product) where you once used meat.

Tofu (bean curd) is an excellent meat substitute, and comes in consistencies from soft to firm. The firm variety can be sliced and substituted for chicken breasts or veal cutlets in most recipes.

If tinkering with your old recipes doesn't work, you'll have to pick up on vegetarian cookbooks. Bookstores and health food stores stock plenty of good ones.

One of my personal favorites is called "The Gradual Vegetarian." Each chapter is another step toward vegetarianism, and is packed with appropriate recipes. The first chapter eliminates red meat from your diet, the next poultry, the next fish, the next dairy products, and so on. The final chapter is for total vegans.

You can stop at any chapter you like. Vegetarianism—and all healthy eating in general—is not just something you do. It's a lifestyle that requires you to make a choice and a change. No one makes choices or changes unless they're ready to.

So whenever you're ready, start taking the steps toward healthier cooking.

VEGETABLE PITA

This is a fun, flavorful lunch that even kids can enjoy.

4 pita bread
1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon safflower mayonnaise (Kraft cholesterol-free, fat-free mayo)
2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
16 slices fresh tomato
4 thinly sliced zucchini
8 lettuce leaves
Pinch alfalfa sprouts

Slice each pita in half. Spread each pita pocket with mayo and mustard.

Layer with tomatoes, zucchini, lettuce and sprouts. Yield: 8 half-pita sandwiches.

Hint: If you're having a hard time opening the pita pocket without tearing it, microwave it on high for about 15 seconds.

RICOTTA LASAGNE SWIRLS

This is an attractive dish which is much lighter than most Italian fare you may be used to.

8 cooked lasagne noodles

Filling

2 bunches spinach, finely chopped
2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese
1 cup ricotta cheese (about ½ pound)
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
salt and pepper to taste

Sauce

2 cups tomato sauce
2 cloves garlic, minced and sautéed
¼ cup onions chopped and sautéed
¼ teaspoon basil
salt and pepper to taste

Steam spinach until it is quite limp, but not mushy. You don't need any water to do this. Just put the washed spinach in a pan with a tight-fitting lid and cook over low heat for about 7 minutes. Mix the spinach with the cheeses, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Coat each noodle with 2 to 3 tablespoons of the mixture, spreading it along its entire length. Roll up the noodle and turn it on end so that you see the spiral, and place in a shallow baking pan.

Mix all of the sauce ingredients together and pour over rolled-up noodles (or substitute your own favorite meatless tomato sauce recipe). Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Variation: You may want to use part of the spinach in the filling and

part in the sauce.

Makes 4 servings.

SPANISH BULGUR

Talk about easy, just dump it all in the pot and cook it. Bulgur, by the way, can be found at ethnic and natural food grocery stores, or you can substitute your favorite kind of rice (in which case you may need to add some water or tomato juice).

1 cup bulgur wheat
1 bunch green onions, chopped
1 green pepper, chopped
2 cups canned tomatoes with juice
1 cup cooked beans (great northern or something similar)
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon tamari soy sauce

Combine all ingredients in a large pot. Cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer over a low heat 20 minutes, or until all liquid is absorbed.

LIGHT CORNBREAD

This recipe is extremely low in fat, and tastes better than any mix. Try slathering it with a meatless chili made with beans and big chunks of vegetables.

1 cup whole wheat flour
2 cups cornmeal
1 teaspoon baking soda
¼ cup honey
1½ cups plain lowfat yogurt
¼ cup oil

Mix together dry ingredients. In a separate bowl, mix wet ingredients. Add wet to dry, combining just until evenly moistened. Spread in oiled 8-by-8-inch square pan and bake at 350 degrees for one hour, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

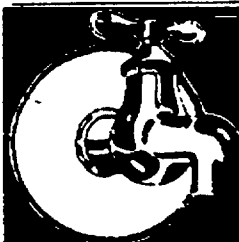

Ancient fruits are sweet treats

Figs, dates, prunes and raisins: What do these fruits have in common? All are candy sweet, all can be dried, all can be eaten out-of-hand and all are referred to as "sweet treats from the Gods".

Whether you believe that or not, these international "four" have been around a long time and add a classy touch to snacks or meals.

Figs are at least 5,000 years old, one of the most ancient edible plants.

The soft, plump, succulent figs are produced by the ficus tree. Some of the original fig orchards were planted in California during the 1880s, and the ever popular fig bars were first sold in the United States nearly 100 years ago.

Choose fresh figs that are soft and ripe as possible. If a fig is over-ripe, it will have a sour odor.

Store underripe figs at room temperature until ripe. After they are ripened they are highly perishable. Use within one to two days.

Figs are high in dietary fiber, potassium and calcium, and low in sodium. Their skin is edible, their inside flesh moist, but they are also intensely sweet. Figs can be purple, green, yellow or white skinned depending on the variety.

Calimyrna (or Smyrna) are light brown or amber in color, with seeds that have a nut-like flavor.

The Mission variety is dark purple or black in color with very small seeds and a thin skin. Kadota figs are yellow-green and thick-skinned with very small seeds.

Dried figs are a delicious out-of-hand snack available year round.

Mincied figs add sweetness and a chewy texture to cookies, cakes, breakfast cereals, yeast and quick breads, stuffings and steamed puddings.

Picking healthy snacks

Sylvia Treilman, home economist for the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service, offers several suggestions for healthy snacks.

- Keep low-fat crackers, boxed juices, microwave natural popcorn, fresh and dried fruits and nuts and seeds on hand at work for healthy snacking.

- Use microwaves and slow cookers to make easy one-dish meals instead of buying fast food from restaurants.

- Keep plastic bags of cut vegetables in your refrigerator for easy snacks.

- Stay away from vending machines unless they offer fresh fruit or yogurt.

as a snack or a dessert. To sweeten cakes, cookies, stuffings, breads, muffins, cereals or salads, add chopped dates.

Dates make wonderful stuffed, candy-like treats, or stuffed with sausage and broiled for an appetizer. Place dates in the freezer for a couple of hours before chopping. It makes chopping easier.

All prunes are plums but not all plums can be prunes! It takes special qualities to allow plums to dry into quality prunes.

These special plum cuttings came from France to the United States around 1856. Now, more than two-thirds of the world's supply and 98 percent of all the prunes grown in the United States are from California.

Prunes are small, purplish black, freestone plums high in sugar and firm, to dry successfully.

Prunes are filled with dietary fibers, vitamin A, potassium and iron and low in sodium. They can be eaten hot or cold, for breakfast or desserts.

Add chopped, pitted prunes to quick breads, muffins, pancakes, cookies, fillings and stuffings, for a natural sweetness and chewy texture. Serve in fruit compotes, added to salads or to complement rabbit, duck, chicken or pork dishes.

Prunes can also be dipped in melted dark or white chocolate for a dessert or candy. Store prunes six months or longer in a cool, dry place. Once a package is opened, keep it tightly closed.

Prunes are available year round and are making a comeback because of the limitless eating possibilities.

Not all grapes can become raisins. Some grape varieties are grown for wine, others are better suited for juice or jelly and some are grown for raisins.

California now supplies about half the world's raisins. Most raisins are made from Thompson Seedless, Muscat, Black Corinth or Sultan.

Grapes are convenient and a portable source of energy. They are also 70 percent fruit sugar, a source of iron and fiber, potassium, calcium, vitamin B and other nutrients.

Raisins add natural sweetness and flavor to cakes, cookies, stuffings, breads, muffins, breakfast cereal, salads and desserts.

If they do lose a little of their moisture, soak in warm water to soften or in brandy or fruit juice to flavor and soften.

For additional storage time, freeze; raisins thaw very quickly and will be just as fresh tasting.

With renewed interest in fiber, these famous "international four" are being rediscovered. Add them to meals or eat as snacks, sweet but nutritious.

To add greater notes of elegance to quick and easy meal ideas, the following recipes have been suggested by Contadina.

TORTELLINI BROCHETTES IN PESTO SAUCE

Makes 12 servings as an appetizer

¾ cup (7-oz. container) Contadina Fresh Pesto Sauce
3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
1 pkg. (9-oz.) Contadina Fresh Cheese Tortellini (Egg or Spinach) cooked and drained
1 ½ cups green pepper, cut into ½-inch pieces
12-15 button mushrooms
20-24 small cherry or yellow plum tomatoes
12 wooden skewers

In small bowl, combine pesto sauce and 2 tablespoons olive oil. Set aside.

Alternate tortellini, pepper, mushrooms and tomatoes on skewers using 7 to 8 tortellini per brochette. In shallow glass dish, marinate brochettes at room temperature in pesto and olive oil mixture for one hour, turning occasionally.

In large skillet, saute brochettes, a few at a time, in 1 tablespoon

olive oil until golden brown; about 30 seconds each side.

Arrange on platter; spoon remaining sauce over brochettes. Serve immediately.

SPINACH FETTUCCINE WITH SMOKED SALMON IN FOUR CHEESE SAUCE

(A tasty first or main course serving eight)

¾ cup whipping cream
2 ½ cups (two 12-oz. containers) Contadina Fresh Four Cheese Sauce
3 pkg. (9-oz. each) Contadina Fresh Spinach Fettuccine
2 cups (10-oz.) thinly sliced smoked salmon, cut into ½-by-4-inch strips
2 tablespoons fresh chopped chives

In medium saucepan, heat cream and four cheese sauce over low heat for 2 minutes or until heated through, stirring constantly. Keep warm. Cook fettuccine according to package directions. Drain. Divide sauce, pasta and salmon evenly between two large bowls. Toss gently. Arrange contents of bowls onto a large serving platter. Garnish with chives. Serve immediately.

Cookbook brings out Italian's lighter side

An appetite for the robust flavors of Italian cuisine led Viana La Place away from her first love of art and into the kitchens of Los Angeles' trend-setting restaurants, where she received high acclaim as a chef.

Now she continues her success in translating her culinary talent onto the printed page, this time exploring her personal passion for vegetable cooking in "Verdura: Vegetables Italian Style" (William Morrow & Co. Inc.; \$22.95, hardcover; May 22, 1991).

"Verdura" awakens the senses with 250 recipes for salads, soups, bruschetta, fritters, risotto, tarts and pasta. The cream of the crop includes Broccoli and Tomato Salad; Fresh Pasta with Tomato, Eggplant, Ricotta and Walnuts; Baked Red Pepper Frittata; Gratin of Artichokes and Potatoes; and Radicchio with Cream and Parmesan.

The recipes in "Verdura" require minimal preparation time. For example, raw sauces for Spaghetti with Italian Parsley and Mozzarella or Tubetti with Diced Tomato and Avocado Sauce can be prepared while the pasta cooks.

Natural ingredients and simple presentations are the basis of "Verdura" cooking, totally keeping it in sync with the changing eating habits of Americans. Most of the savory dishes are either sauteed, roasted, grilled or steamed.

The author writes, "As we turn our focus away from meats and heavy meals and toward the fresh flavors and beauty of vegetables, we can learn from the Italian style of eating." La Place provides menus for all occasions from Lunch in the Country to Sicilian Summer Dinner. To round out the vegetarian menu, fresh fruit and cheese, dessert recipes such as Marinated Watermelon with Bittersweet Chocolate Shavings, and Coffee-Flavored Ricotta are included. A chapter on Pantry Recipes contains basics to have on hand, including Black Olive Pesto and Olive Oil from Hell.

"Verdura" also contains an in-

depth guide to selecting and preparing vegetables and herbs and a glossary of ingredients.

La Place is co-author of "Cucina Rustica, Pasta Fresca and Cucina Fresca." She earned her experience as a great chef at such Los Angeles restaurants as Verdi and Mangia. She is a restaurant consultant and cooking teacher.

POTATO-TOMATO SOUP WITH ROSEMARY

A simple amalgam of potatoes and tomatoes, perfumed with rosemary, cooked until the potatoes break down to a coarse yet creamy purée. The tomatoes provide bright color and tart-sweet flavor. For a smoother texture, put the soup through a food mill. It is quite refreshing served at room temperature with a drizzle of fine olive oil over the top and a few grindings of coarse black pepper.

4 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
1 small onion, finely diced
6 Roma tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and puréed not too fine
2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh rosemary leaves

Salt to taste
3 medium russet potatoes, peeled and cut into dice
Water
Freshly grated imported Parmesan cheese, optional

Place the olive oil and onion in a soup pot. Cook over low heat until the onion is tender and golden. Add the tomatoes, rosemary, and salt to taste, and cook at a gentle simmer for 5 minutes.

Add the potatoes and stir. Cook for 5 minutes. Add 2 cups of water. Bring to a boil and adjust to a simmer. As the potatoes become tender, break them up with the back of a wooden spoon until a coarse puree forms.

Cook the soup for about 45 minutes, or until it is thick and the flavor deepens. Ladle into soup bowls. If desired, sprinkle each serving with a little grated Parmesan cheese.

Okra is OK for more than just gumbo

Okra is one of those vegetables you either love or hate. Surprisingly, this has nothing to do with the flavor, which is mild and innocuous, but rather with the texture. Some people find the rather slippery quality of okra to be unappealing.

Yet it is this very property that makes okra the perfect ingredient for rib-sticking gumbos, since its mucilaginous quality thickens this traditional Southern dish.

(When okra is heated in water, its starch granules release gums and pectin substances that cling to water molecules, thickening gumbo.)

Gumbos are thick soups (or thin stews, depending on how you look at it) newly popularized with the recent interest in Creole cookery of New Orleans and Louisiana. Highly flavored, they may contain shrimp and other shellfish, chicken — even rabbit.

Known as "ladies' finger" in England, okra is a native of tropical Africa. It's very popular in African cookery, in some Arab countries and in the Deep South region of the United States. A green, slightly furry pod, it looks like a legume but is really the immature seedpod of a plant of the hibiscus family and is closely related to cotton. All okra pods are elongated, but some are short and chunky, others tapered.

While canned and frozen okra is available all year round, peak season for fresh okra runs from May to October. Look for young, pods, bright green or white in color, from 2 to 4 ½ inches in length. Pods should be tender enough to bend under gentle pressure. Avoid dull, dry or shriveled pods. Okra past its prime may be fibrous. Refrigerate in a perforated plastic bag; okra will stay fresh up to four days.

Rinse in cool tap water just before cooking and trim off ends. Cut into uniform ½-inch slices for soups or stews. One pound of fresh okra will serve four.

Okra is always eaten cooked and is particularly tasty when teamed with corn, tomatoes, green pepper and onions.

To avoid the sliminess that can come with overcooking on a conventional range, microwave fresh okra in just a bit of water. To microwave 1 pound fresh okra, place trimmed okra in a 1 ½-quart microwave-safe casserole. Add ¼ cup water; cover and microwave on HIGH (100 percent power) setting five to six minutes, until tender, stirring once. Let stand, covered, one minute. Drain and serve.

To microwave a 10-ounce package of frozen whole okra, place okra in a 1-quart microwave-safe casserole with 2 tablespoons water and ¼ tea-

spoon salt. Cover. Microwave at HIGH (100 percent power) setting seven to nine minutes. Rearrange after four minutes. Drain and serve.

(Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.)

MICRO-TIP OF THE WEEK

When cooking conventionally, avoid cooking okra in brass, copper or iron, since these metals can cause discoloration of pods. Non-metal microwave containers work particularly well for cooking okra.

CREOLE OKRA WITH CORN

¾ cup butter or margarine
¼ cup chopped onion
1 small clove garlic, minced
2 (10-ounce) packages frozen okra
1 (16-ounce) can stewed tomatoes, chopped
1 cup frozen corn kernels
¼ teaspoon beef bouillon granules
¼ teaspoon ground black pepper

Yields 6 servings.

Preparation time: 10 minutes.

Cooking time: 10 to 15 minutes (plus 3 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power). Combine butter, onion and garlic in 2-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover and microwave 3 to 4 minutes, stirring halfway through cooking time, until onion is tender.

Stir in all remaining ingredients. Cover and microwave 7 to 11 minutes, stirring every 5 minutes, until okra is tender.

Let stand, covered, 3 minutes before serving.

SKID-FREE OKRA SALAD

1 pound whole fresh okra, stem ends snapped off but not cut
¼ cup water
¼ teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
3 tablespoons vinegar
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
2 green onions, white part and first 2 inches of green, sliced

Yields 4 servings.

Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.

Cooking time: 5 to 6 minutes (plus 1 minute standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Put okra, water and salt in 1 ½-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover. Microwave 5 to 6 minutes, until tender, stirring once. Let stand 1 minute; drain.

In 1-cup measure or bowl, whisk oil, vinegar, salt and pepper. Gently toss with okra. Refrigerate, covered, for at least 1 hour.

Serve sprinkled with green onions.

JUMBO GUMBO

2 tablespoons olive oil
1 cup each chopped onion and celery
¼ cup chopped green pepper
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 whole chicken breast, skinned, boned and cut into bite-size pieces
1 pound raw shrimp, shelled, deveined and rinsed
1 ½ cups sliced fresh okra (about ½ pound)
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 teaspoon chicken bouillon granules
2 cups water
1 tablespoon mixed fresh parsley
¼ teaspoon crumbled dried oregano leaves
¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper
¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
1 bay leaf
1 ½ cups fluffy cooked rice
1 medium tomato, cut into 8 wedges

Yields 6 servings.

Preparation time: 20 to 25 minutes.

Cooking time: 18 to 23 minutes.

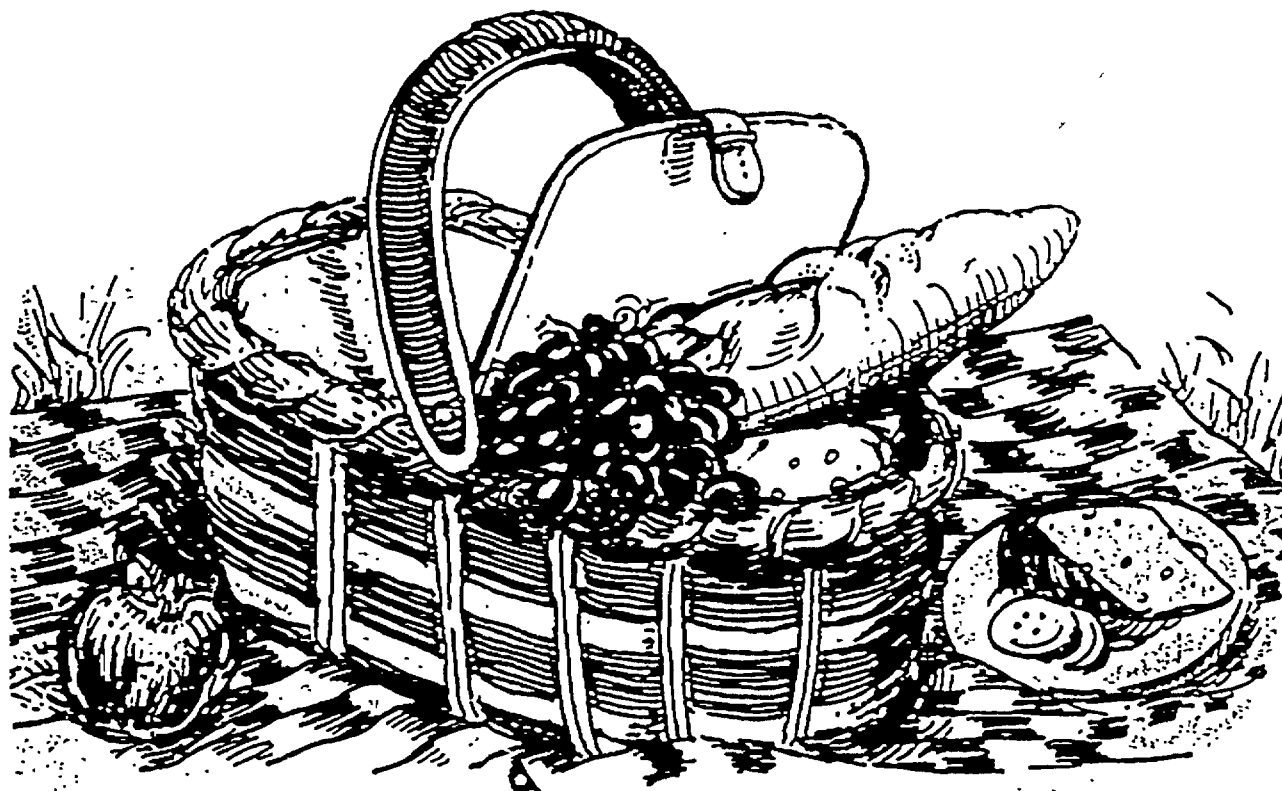
Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

In 3-quart microwave-safe casserole combine olive oil, onion, celery, green pepper and garlic. Cover and microwave 3 minutes, stirring after 2 minutes.

Add chicken, shrimp and okra. Cover and microwave 5 minutes, stirring once.

Dissolve cornstarch and chicken bouillon granules in water and add to a casserole with parsley, oregano, cayenne pepper, black pepper and bay leaf. Cover and microwave 10 to 15 minutes longer, uncovered, stirring every 5 minutes. Vegetables and meat should be tender and gumbo should be somewhat thickened.

Remove bay leaf. Serve gumbo in individual bowls over hot fluffy rice and garnish with tomato wedges and additional minced fresh parsley, if desired.

These French baguette sandwiches feature sliced Genoa salami, fully cooked ham and provolone cheese — all from the deli case.

The deli meats are seasoned in European fashion with a mixture of canned roasted red pepper, rip or Niçoise olives, green onion and pesto sauce, all equally available, ready-to-use. Choose the rest of the menu so it's just as simple — ready-made salads, bakery-fresh cookies or pastries and fresh fruit.

HAM AND SALAMI BISTRO BAGUETTES

Preparation time: 25 minutes

4 ounces each sliced Genoa salami and "fully cooked ham"

¼ cup chopped jarred roasted red pepper

2 tablespoons each prepared pesto sauce and chopped ripe olives

1 tablespoon finely chopped green onion

Spinach leaves

4 ounces sliced provolone cheese

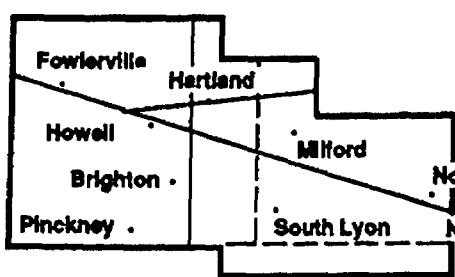
4 individual French baguettes (each 5 to 6 inches long), split

Combine red pepper, pesto sauce, olives and onion. Spread bottom half of each baguette piece with 1 ½ tablespoons red pepper mixture. Layer with equal amounts of spinach, leaves, cheese, Genoa salami and ham. Top with an equal amount of remaining red pepper mixture. Close sandwiches with baguette tops. Sandwiches can be served immediately or packed to go. (Wrap sandwiches individually in plastic wrap and refrigerate up to 4 hours; carry to site in an insulated cooler.) 4 sandwiches.

Pitted and chopped Niçoise olives may be substituted for ripe olives.

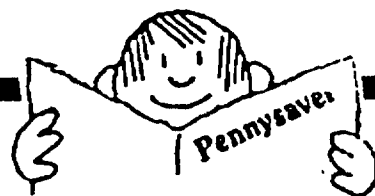

Strange bedfellows make TV magic in 'Eerie, Indiana'

Film's Joe Dante directs pilot

Each fall, there's at least one show that's the darling of the critics. Even in uninspiring TV seasons, one or two gems somehow find their way to the air. Such is the case with "Eerie, Indiana," a Sunday-night series debuting on NBC this season.

At first blush, the premise for "Eerie" seems too glib. An adolescent boy moves with his family from the comparative normalcy of New Jersey to a suspiciously perfect Indiana town that's half "Donna Reed," half Amityville. It's a cute piece of shtick for National Lampoon, but is it a series?

The show's mongrel bloodlines offer no guarantees, either.

"Unsolved Mysteries" producers John Cosgrove and Teri Meurer, who have no apparent experience with comedy (unless you take your humor very black indeed), are executive producers of the show, which Meurer says means they read scripts and show up at tapings. More to the point, "Eerie" is the co-creation of writer/producers Karl Schaefer and Jose Rivera. Three years ago, Schaefer produced the clinched "TV 101" (forerunner of the clinched "Hull High"), a mediocre effort at best. Playwright Rivera's resume is more promising and includes the provocatively titled "Each Day Dies With Sleep," a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts and a stint as playwright-in-residence at London's Royal Court Theatre. To this spark is added the wicked genius of director Joe Dante, who leavens "Eerie" in a limited role as

creative consultant and occasional director.

As Marshall Teller, the series' main character, 15-year-old Omri Katz moves from the adult dream world of "Dallas" (where he played J.R. Ewing's son) to a fantasy land kids can appreciate. Marshall loves his cookie-cutter-generic family — a mom, dad and teenage sister — but can't help thinking they're a little naive about Eerie. After all, where else does the mailman carry a sidearm or Elvis Presley live on the paper route? Marshall and his younger friend Simon (Justine Shenkarow) are collecting evidence of the town's abnormalities (watch closely for props from Dante's films), which they keep locked in Marshall's attic. (For your own evidence that "Eerie, Indiana" is a hit, listen for kids to start quoting

Simon's signature battle cry, "I was BORN for this!")

Whether in spite or because of its premise and pedigree, "Eerie, Indiana" delivered a strong, memorable pilot episode — a tough assignment that's rarely completed. Full of satire, sight gags and just the right amount of tension, the episode found Marshall's mom being wooed by one of Eerie's most enterprising housewives, a widow with twin sons who supports herself by peddling Foreverware, her late husband's invention, to ladies in the neighborhood. With his reliably sloppy mom in a defrosting frenzy and about to mortgage the house to a woman in a pink shirtwaist dress

and a flip, Marshall discovers the twins are trapped in a time warp that has kept them in the seventh grade for 30 years. Anyone with any sense of justice — or any experience with the seventh grade — would be sympathetic to their plight. And thereby hangs a tale that, if you missed it in the premiere episode, should be saved and savored in a repeat.

The second episode, airing Sunday, Sept. 22, involves another eerie, or rather, Eerie event. One of Marshall and Simon's chums is fitted for a retainer that picks up sound waves in the dog spectrum. From this, he learns Eerie's canines are plotting to take over the town... just as soon as they can figure out how to work a doorknob. Future

shows include "The Jolly Rogers," in which Marshall meets seventh-generation pirates who've become landlocked in a Winnebago, and "The Lost Hour," in which Marshall rescues himself and a lost girl from a parallel Daylight Savings Time universe. Eventually, there must surely be an episode featuring the Eerie raven, who appears in the show's opening plucking out the eyeballs from postage stamps.

NBC deserves credit for putting "Eerie, Indiana" on the map this fall; the series is strong enough to overcome its ill-advised lead-in, "The Adventures of Mark and Brian," and entertaining for quick-witted viewers of all ages. It may even change the way you look at your own hometown.

In my estimation, Don Knotts is a one-of-a-kind comedian. I, personally, would like to see more of those good, clean movies. —Meg Scott, Prescott, Ariz.

A: Don Knotts' movies are on video: *No Time for Sergeants*; *It's a Mad Mad Mad Mad World*; *The Incredible Mr. Limpet*; *The Apple Dumpling Gang*; *No Deposit, No Return*; *Hot Lead and Cold Feet*; and *The Apple Dumpling Gang Rides Again*.

Q: My Aunt Zelda told me about three blooper movies called *Star Trek Outtakes*, *Bambi vs. Godzilla* and *Bambi's Revenge*. Would you please send me the address where I can write

to order these movies? —M.C., Denton, Texas.

A: I had to consult our resident movie expert on this one, and here's what he had to say: According to our sources, *Bambi Meets Godzilla* is available on videotape (VHS and Beta), but we're not sure where. Your best bet is to check with Movies Unlimited, whose catalog includes *Star Trek Bloopers*. *Bambi's Revenge* is a new one on me, but there's reason to suspect it might be on the same tape as *Bambi Meets Godzilla*, since the latter is only two minutes long. Q: I've been hoping they would revive the series *The Law and Harry McGraw*, but so far ... no luck. I thought it was a good series, well written, acted, directed, etc. No doubt the vice president who canceled the series is mopping the floor at the CBS building, as well he should. Your advice to write the networks about the shows is good, but every letter I sent in was returned unopened and, of course, unread. It seems to me the networks are not viewer friendly. —Robert Lind, Hibbing, Minn.

A: I've talked to several people who have written letters to the networks about various shows. Whether or not they got results, they never had their letters sent back. You didn't say how many you had written, but if it's just one, I would say write again.

The concern networks have is just one — money. ABC, CBS and NBC tend to cancel a program if it looks like it will slow them down in the ratings race and, therefore, lose their money. So far, Fox seems to be less apt to do that. They tend to keep shows on to see if they can build an audience. The other networks, while claiming to be trying to put "quality programs" on the

air, seem to measure quality by how much money it makes. And who really knows what quality shows are? Look at PBS; they're constantly asking for money to put educational, documentaries and how-to shows on the air. In one day of viewing PBS, you can pick up a few Spanish phrases, hear what it was like to be in World War II, make dinner using a recipe you got from a cooking show, and serve it all on plates you made from wood while watching *New Yankee Workshop*.

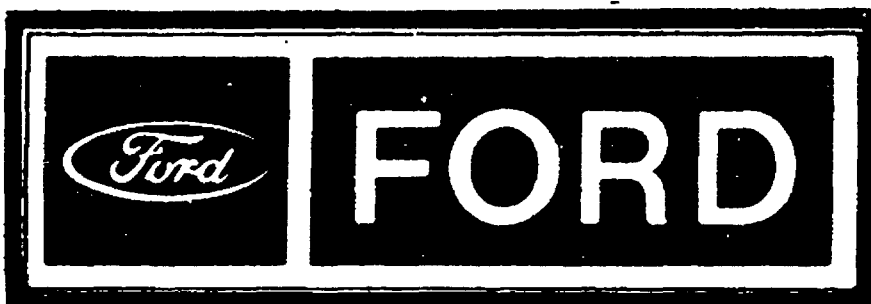

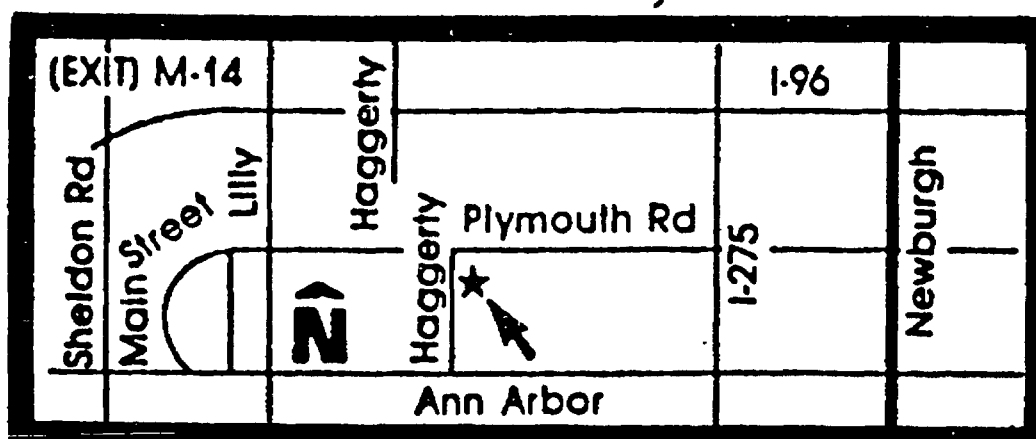
