Head of post speaks

Michigan's new fiscal year began last Tuesday. Belt-tightening under Gov. John Engler's administration has reduced state department budgets and forced many layoffs.

The Michigan State Police, of course, weren't spared the budget axe. The Northville Record recently sat down with Northville's state police post commander, Lt. Jack Moulik, to talk about the effect of budget cuts on the post.

Moulik, a state police officer for 23 years, has been commander at the post for more than four years. Before coming to Northville, he served as a commander in Romeo.

RECORD: What are the post's responsibilities?

MOULIK: Our basic responsibilities at the Northville post consist of patrolling 84 miles of urban freeway in the Detroit metropolitan area, furnishing support services to the local agencies in the area, and providing some primary response to rural areas in southwestern Oakland County.

RECORD: What about yourself: what are your responsibilities?

MOULIK: I'm commander of the Northville post, which has the responsibilities for road patrol and also the Northville Regional Dispatch Center.

RECORD: How many troopers serve under you?

MOULIK: Altogether, I've got 80 people working, between the dispatch center and the post.

That's supervisors, dispatchers and troopers. There are roughly 40 troopers assigned to road patrol and related functions.

Some of them are support staff. (We have a) court officer, youth services officer, Drug Abuse Resistance

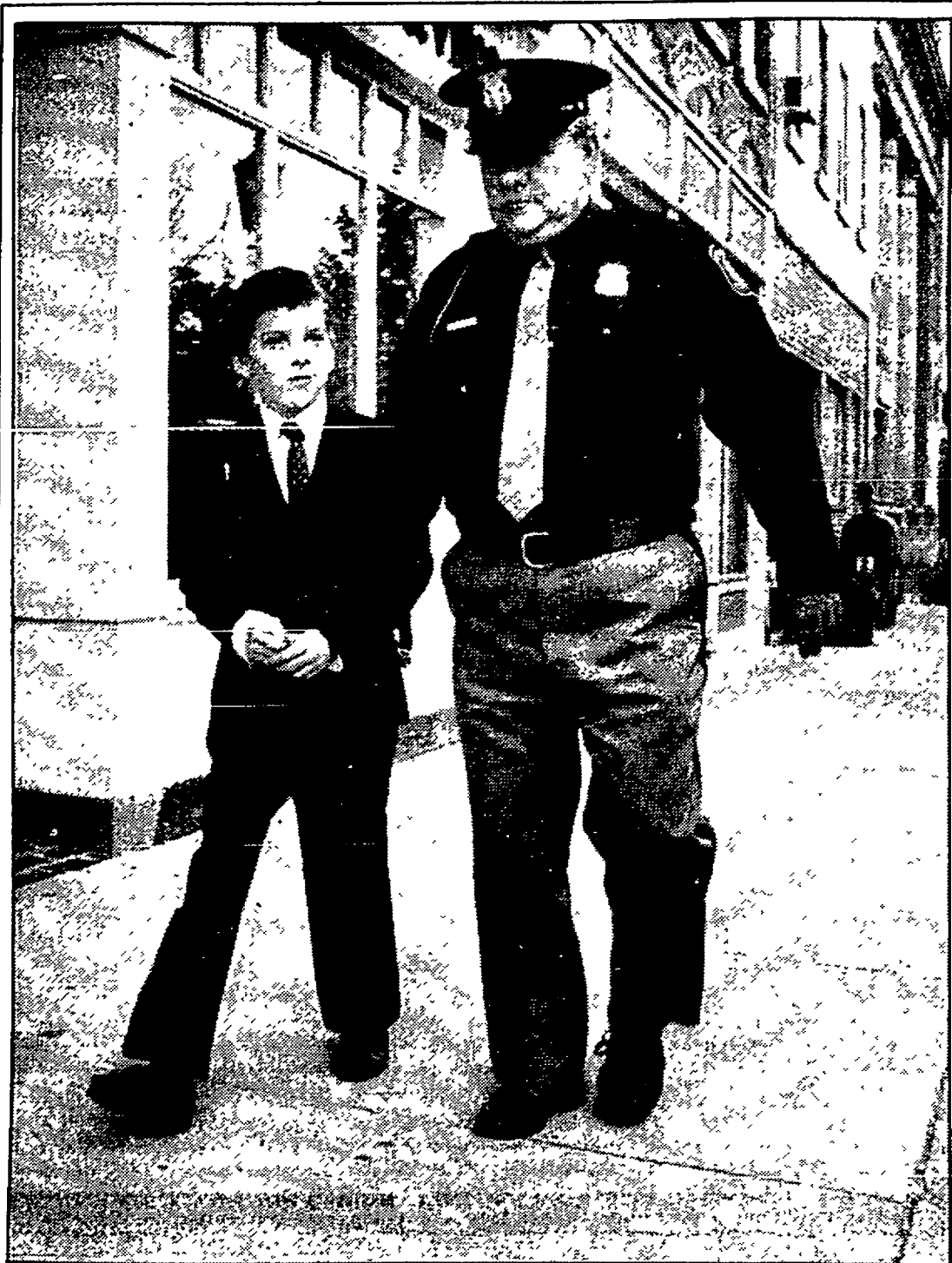

Leaving the beat Rathburn retires from city service

After more than two decades on the Northville City force, Patrolman Roger Rathburn has decided to hang up his policeman's uniform.

The Northville native, 52, has not decided exactly what to do with his new-found freedom, but does plan to spend more time with his son.

"I don't just plan on retiring and sitting back and doing nothing," Rathburn said. "I'm a single parent and I have my boy, and it'll definitely give us more time to spend together."

Nicholas, 10, lives with his father in Northville and attends Amerman Elementary School. Rathburn's daughter Tina is married and lives in New Mexico.

Other plans may include dabbling in the political scene, Rathburn said. "I've thought a little bit about getting into politics," he said.

"Over the years I've seen a lot of good things go on in the community, and a few bad ones. . . This is sort of my community, you might say."

Rathburn was born and raised in Northville, and actually delivered at the former Sessions Hospital where Star Manor is now located, at 520 W. Main St.

He began working with the city police department in the 1960s, as an auxiliary police officer covering Northville Downs. "I was an auxiliary in 1966, and then in '69 I joined the department for approximately a year, left for a short time and came back, and I stayed with them ever since," he said.

He cited as one of his favorite aspects of the job "being in the community, and coming into contact with the people."

And he fears that modern police departments may be losing that close contact.

"Now we're losing the touch, the closeness to the people," he said. "Maybe it's a sign of the times. . . I think that's one of the weaknesses of the departments (today.)"

Rathburn retired Oct. 1, using time served during his first stint with the police force and in the Army Reserve to round out his years of service to 25.

His retirement allowed the department to reinstate the second of the two junior patrolmen bumped down during budget cuts this year. The patrolmen had elected to become dispatchers under a union contract option rather than be laid off, resulting in the layoff of two dispatchers.

Patrolman John Shier was reinstated when Rathburn retired, following the reinstatement of patrolman Kenneth Evans earlier this year. Dispatchers Lori Boisvert and Monica Allenbaugh have been rehired as well.

Committee considers budget cuts

From the fat through the meat to the bone.

Township officials and budget review committee members are sharpening their knives as they ready spending cut recommendations for the \$4 million 1992 township budget.

After slogging through the bulk of individual department requests and hearings, the review committee is expected to begin earnest discussions on specific budget cuts within the next two weeks.

The committee is slated to forward a balanced budget recommendation to the township board later this month, and the board must adopt its new budget by Nov. 1.

Preliminary figures list expenditures at \$4.05 million for 1992. Total township revenues are estimated at \$3.92 million.

Toss in a \$56,000 beginning fund balance, and budget cutters must decide where to whittle just over \$83,000 to achieve a state-mandated balanced budget.

Additional cuts are expected to be recommended to generate a fund balance of 3-5 percent of the approved budget.

Review committee members already have heard from police, fire, planning, recreation, and building departments, among others, and are

scheduled to review library, water and sewer, youth assistance, the clerk's office, and elections departments next week.

Meetings are slated for 3:30 p.m. today and Wednesday at township hall, Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan said Friday.

Township Manager Richard Henningsen said it was "premature" to comment on specific budget cuts. The committee and township officials will have to roll up their sleeves after Wednesday's review session and make cut recommendations, he said.

"We can't run in the red," he said. "The big thing is to balance the budget and then get a fund balance."

Traci Gottschalk, acting Northville Community Recreation director, faced the review committee and their red pencils last week. The experience wasn't the heart-stopper that a department head might think, she said.

"I was very impressed; they asked intelligent questions," Gottschalk said.

Community recreation operates on a contractual basis with funds provided by both the township and city. Recreation's 1992 request from the township totals \$128,274, but reviewers did not indicate which portions of the recreation budget might be vulnerable, Gottschalk said.

Members of the budget review committee are Supervisor Betty Lennox, Henningsen, Harrigan, Wes Hennikson, Frank St. Louis, John Sassaman and Jack Hosmer.

Friends group introduces arts referral service

Dial-an-artist?

That's not what they're calling it, but that's the basic concept behind a new referral service being developed by the Northville Friends of the Arts.

As one of the projects of the new group, Julie Giordano — herself a local artist and owner/operator of the J. Giordano Gallery — will coordinate a network of information on artists and musicians in the area. The network will simply compile basic information at no charge; it will then be available to whomever wants it, for whatever reason.

"We want to hook up people who have needs with people who can fill those needs, artistically and musically," Giordano said.

Under the plan, artists and musicians will send a resume and other pertinent information in to the data bank. Then anyone who needs artistic services can call and get a list of

possibilities.

People might use the service to get live music for a wedding or store opening, to find an artist to paint a mural in a home, or to locate a fine artist to do a special business sign, Giordano explained.

The name of the new service is the Network for Promoting Art and Musical Services.

The first step is to establish the network in Northville, but it might expand to other areas like Plymouth and Novi, Giordano added.

"With the Friends of the Arts support, we can really get this off the ground," she said.

Paper gets honors in MPA contest

The Northville Record has been named "Michigan's Best" newspaper in its circulation class.

The "Michigan's Best" designation was one of 11 awards the Record won in the Michigan Press Association's annual Better Newspaper Contest.

The contest names "Michigan's Best" newspapers in six circulation divisions, based on the other awards won in the contest. The Record won the honor for weekly newspapers between 5,000 and 15,000 circulation.

Other awards to the paper were:

● First place for Special Section, awarded for the paper's guide to the 1990 Victorian Festival.

● First place for Sports Coverage, for the sports section produced by Staff Writer Neil Geoghegan. Geoghegan's work also recently earned honorable mention for Best Sports Pages among all weekly papers in the country over 5,000 circulation, in the National Newspaper Association Contest.

● First place for Feature Picture, for a shot by Staff Photographer Hal Gould of a Brownie visit to local nursing home.

● Second place for Photo Story, for a two-page spread by Staff Photographer Bryan Mitchell of local support for U.S. troops in the Persian Gulf.

● Second place for Lifestyle/Family Section, for the "Our Town" section produced every Thursday by Staff Writer Cristina Ferrier.

● Second place for Sports Picture, for a Bryan Mitchell photo of a Northville High School volleyball player in a vital moment at the net.

● Second place for Spot News Picture, for a shot by Staff Writer Mike Tyree of a firefighter battling the fire at Hollar's Bakery.

● Third place for Editorial Writing, for three editorials written by Mike Tyree.

● Third place for Feature Stories, for a piece on

"English as a Second Language" by Leslie Pereira.

● Honorable mention for Editorial Page or Pages.

Some 121 newspapers from across the state entered the contest this year and a record 1,955 entries were submitted. The entries were judged by members of the Kentucky Press Association. In all, 400 certificates were awarded. The contest period ran from April 1990 through March 1991.

The Record's sister paper, The Novi News, won both first and second place in the Spot or Breaking News category, first for coverage of a tornado last September and second for coverage of a gas main break in January.

Overall, the six newspapers of the HomeTown Newspapers chain took 34 awards in the contest. HomeTown Newspapers — which includes The South Lyon Herald, The Milford Times, The Brighton Argus and the Livingston County Press — swept three categories: Editorial Writing, Feature Picture, and Lifestyle/Family Section.

SADD increases awareness

The number of drunk driving arrests has gone down 36 percent in Northville since the Northville High School SADD chapter began in 1985, but SADD's work is still not finished.

Charles Stilec, the chapter advisor and the Student Assistant Program Coordinator at the high school, said although he is happy that the numbers are down, he feels the chapter has a long way to go.

SADD (Students Against Driving Drunk) has begun another school year of fundraisers and activities. Since the chapter began in Northville, its main goal has been to increase awareness about the dangers of drinking and driving through these activities.

Capt. James Petres of the Northville Police Department said the main reason for the decrease in drunk driving arrests is that people are becoming more aware of the problems. He believes that SADD has definitely contributed to increased awareness.

Petres said the number of drunk driving arrests in the city of Northville has gone down from 84 in 1985 to 28 in 1990. A Northville Township police spokesperson said their arrests decreased from 175 in 1985 to 138 in 1990.

Awareness is not the only thing that has increased. Stilec said that the size of the SADD chapter has greatly enlarged in the past few years, making it the second largest organization in the school after the National Honor Society. When the chapter first began, he said, there were only five to eight active members. "Now there is a good core of about 30 students who are very involved in the group and the activities."

Stilec explained that there are over 100 other students who are interested in the group, but because of sports and other organizations they do not have as much time to participate in SADD or attend the meetings.

Brit Davis, a senior and the chapter's treasurer, said that as many as 80 students attended the meetings at the beginning of last school year. He said he expects attendance to be about the same this year.

Stilec said he realizes 80 students only represents about 6 percent of the school and he wishes 90 to 100 students would attend each meeting. However, he said that with 90 percent of the high school students involved in after-school activities and 70 percent of them working, he knows that it will take a while to reach this goal.

Davis said the chapter meets every two weeks to discuss and plan upcoming events. The meetings are run by the seven officeholders, Stilec, and Jack Wickens, a high school counselor who helps facilitate the chapter.

Davis added that he is uncertain of what activities and fund raisers the group will sponsor this year, but he believes they will be similar to ones in the past.

Stilec said the group will again be participating in Maybury Madness, which is a haunted forest put on by Northville Recreation Department, M-Care and other local groups such as the Northville Action Council. Stilec said the event is held at Maybury State Park around Halloween,

and all the proceeds go to SADD. Last year the event raised almost \$1,000.

Stilec said the money SADD receives from Maybury Madness, donations and other fund raisers is all put toward positive drug-free activities.

Some of these past activities have included bringing in expert speakers, putting up a billboard, and inviting the US Customs Service to demonstrate their drug-sniffing dogs to the student body.

The chapter also gave \$300 to both Meads Mill and Cooke middle schools to begin SADD chapters. "We need to start them young," Stilec stated.

Stilec said SADD works closely with other organizations, the admin-

istration, and the community. "People know it's a good group working toward a good cause and they're willing to help," Stilec explained.

This past year, Stilec added, SADD got together with the senior class to promote a safe prom night. SADD donated keychains that read, "Friends don't let friends drink and drive," and they put flyers on the tables at prom, as last minute reminders not to drink and drive.

Stilec said that SADD is about kids helping other kids stop drinking and driving. He said he puts a lot of time and energy into the organization, but the students do all the real work. "I just hope whatever we do helps," Stilec said.

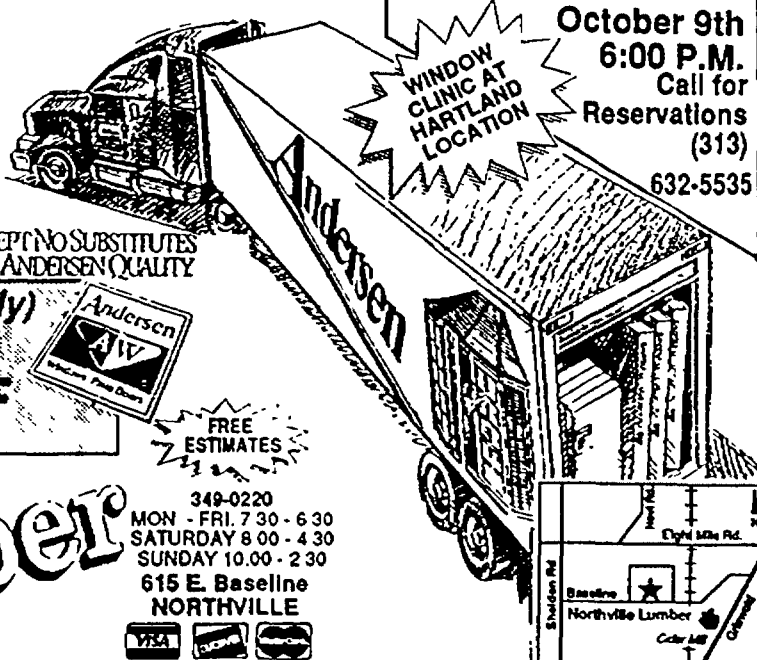

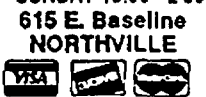

Police remove student's stun gun

A Northville High School student was arrested Sept. 23 for bringing a stun gun to school.

The 15-year-old Northville boy was charged with possession of a stun gun, a felony crime in Michigan. He was suspended from school and faces disciplinary action through the Oakland County Juvenile Court.

The stun gun, a plastic box with a switch on the side and four electrodes on the front, can deliver a 75,000-volt shock when placed against a person's body. The device is used by some law enforcement agencies to briefly incapacitate a person without causing permanent injury.

No students were reported injured during the Sept. 23 incident.

According to city police reports, a high school hall monitor saw the student hide something in his pocket while he was walking in the hall at noon that Monday, and questioned him about it. The student reportedly tried to drop the device behind him, but the hall monitor saw it, picked it up and escorted the student to the principal's office.

called police, who questioned the student at the school. Though he first claimed the gun was handed to him by another student, he later admitted taking it from a neighbor's apartment the previous Sunday. The neighbor told police her aunt had left the device in the apartment.

The student and two others were suspended for possession of the stun gun at various times during the school day Monday. The student who brought it to school "stated that there

was a zipper of students that were using the zapper on other students. (He) stated he was zapped but it did not hurt that bad. One of the other suspended students told police, 'While he had it, he along with others used it on each other.'

Weiner said all three students were put on indefinite suspension after the incident, and the 15-year-old remains suspended. The other two students had their suspensions lifted after five days.

But Weiner would not elaborate on the school's continuing investigation, if any, into the incident. "The code of conduct for the Northville Public Schools speaks to the community's and the school's disposition toward weapons, and we're following the code of conduct," she said.

City police are seeking charges against the 15-year-old student through the Oakland County Juvenile Court, and are considering filing charges against the other two.

Autos collide

Northville State Police Post commander looks to future

Education (DARE) officer, and then I've got 16 of those troopers assigned to the dispatch operation.

RECORD: What's your day-to-day contact with the troopers? Are you more of an administrator?

MOULIK: My role, personally, is as administrator or manager of this post.

Day to day, I have contact with the troopers in the squad room and things like that. But, the actual supervision of the troopers is done by shift supervisors — sergeants who work each shift.

RECORD: What are some of your administrative duties?

MOULIK: It entails personnel matters. Planning our operations here, what we are going to be doing and how we are going to be doing it — the overall strategy of our operations.

General control of both the post and the central dispatch.

I've got an assistant, Lt. Bob Clark, who is responsible for day-to-day operations; basically he supervises all the shifts.

All the administrative things that come through here. I make sure the bills get paid and that all the troopers have uniforms, equipment to do their jobs and make sure the troopers are doing their jobs.

RECORD: Changing gears, with the new fiscal year beginning (last) week, what is your budget?

MOULIK: I wish I knew.

I don't know what my budget for next year is going to be yet. I don't know if the Legislature has passed it at this point. Last I knew, the Legislature was still debating budget bills. I don't know if we have a final budget at this point (the state's budget was approved late last week).

Even if the department has a final budget, what my budget for this operation is going to be for the coming year, I don't know. I do know we will have enough money to pay the salaries of people that work here, to pay the heat and light bills and to get those things we have to have to function. Above and beyond that, I don't know.

RECORD: When will you know?

MOULIK: Hopefully by Oct. 1. But everything I've been told at this point would lead me to believe that we'll have a continuation budget. That means we'll be able to run at the same level we have this year.

RECORD: What was your budget this year?

MOULIK: In the past our budget has been limited to contractual services, supplies and materials. That's heat and lights and those kind of things.

Last year, that part of it was \$105,000.

Then the other part of the budget we have controlled in the past has been overtime. For this last year that was about \$112,000.

We are going into a "program" budget this year. I'll be allocated a certain amount to run my post. Some of that I don't have any control over

because unless we lose an employee, that money is committed to pay their salaries.

But money that's for the contractual services, supplies, materials, the overtime and the equipment is all one budget. So we (will) have the abilities to make decisions and expend those funds for the best of the post.

We may not need as much overtime as last year but we do need some materials or equipment or something. In the past it's been allocated for that particular purpose, that's what we had to spend it for.

RECORD: Do you anticipate, then, that you will have about the same amount of money to work with?

MOULIK: I expect a continuation budget, which means we will be able to operate at the same level.

It will be more money because the

prices of certain things have gone up. The troopers have gotten raises. It will be adjusted for inflation, basically.

RECORD: What is the main expense?

MOULIK: Salaries and wages, without a doubt.

The cost of running this particular operation is between \$4 million to \$5 million. That's salaries and wages and cars, heat and lights.

RECORD: What percentage of that \$4 million to \$5 million is wages and salaries?

MOULIK: Salaries, wages and overtime account for about 90 to 92 percent of that.

RECORD: How does your budget compare with other nearby posts such as Flat Rock or Romeo? Are they about the same?

MOULIK: Proportionate to the number of people they have, no.

The Romeo post, for example, only has about 23 or 24 people total. They've got about a quarter of the people I've got. So their budget is proportionately less. They've also got a smaller building, so their heat and lights are also proportionately less.

Generally, throughout the state, the budgets for the posts, in terms of how much they spend, is basically a factor of how many people they have. That's our major expense, people.

RECORD: You have one of the busiest posts in the state?

MOULIK: That's true. This is one of the top two or three posts in the state in terms of activity.

Right now, other than the Detroit freeway post, in terms of personnel, it's the second largest in the state.

RECORD: How has the budget cut affected this post?

MOULIK: The biggest impact this year is in our supply of materials that we would have normally purchased within the year.

We've gotten what we needed to operate. Operationally it hasn't had an impact on us. We've still been able to do the job.

What it has meant, more than anything, is managing the resources a little more closely than we have in the past. By that, I mean vehicle mileage. We basically lease our cars from the Department of Management and

Budget motor transport division. We pay them so much a mile for the privilege of driving the cars.

In past years, if we had a 30-percent increase in mileage or 30-percent decrease in mileage... It wasn't something we had to watch closely. This year, we had about enough money in the budget to drive our cars roughly the same number of miles we did the year before.

Only to the fact that we had about the same number of people here, it was relatively easy. Had we had an increase in people, but had to live within the same mileage budget, that would have created a problem.

But, basically it's a matter of monitoring it and making sure that we don't (go over). It's a matter of managing the resources.

What the budget situation has done is to make us manage our resources better. More closely monitor, make decisions about how we are to expend those resources and not just assume that they are available to expend.

RECORD: What is the outlook for your budget in the years to come?

MOULIK: I suspect they are going to stay tight as long as the economy stays tight.

Even though it's going to be a tight budget this year for the state police, we aren't going to have a whole lot of slack in it. From everything I've heard and seen, we are probably going to be in better shape than a lot of other agencies.

Some departments are still taking cuts. We are at least, at this point, (running on) a continuation budget. We aren't going to be able to improve anything, but at least the services won't deteriorate.

RECORD: Is there a point when services would be affected with continuation budgets?

MOULIK: The biggest thing that makes our services deteriorate is the number of people that we have. That's our main resource, our people.

We don't produce a product. Our main resources are people. Every year, as a department, we lose through retirement 50 to 100 sworn officers. If we don't have the ability to train new officers to take their places, ultimately that's going to have an impact on our ability to deliver service.

If we go a year or two or three years, depending on how many we lose through retirement, and we don't have the ability to replace them, yes our service is going to deteriorate, there is no question about that.

We've been fortunate so far, in that we haven't had to lay any people off.

RECORD: Administrative personnel were given several days off this summer to save money. Do you feel that was effective?

MOULIK: It probably did save some money. However, in my job as an example, when I'm not here the things I need to do don't get done. There is nobody to step in and take my spot when I'm not here to do my job.

RECORD: So these furlough days did have a negative impact?

MOULIK: They had a negative impact to the extent that we are in the throes, and have been for the past six months, of putting together the dispatch center. Obviously that robbed me and my assistant and my secretary of four days of doing those type of things.

Yes, it has an impact. It didn't have an impact that the person driving down the freeway would notice, but yes, it had an impact in trying to get what we need to do done.

RECORD: Have you heard anything about further furlough days in the new fiscal year?

MOULIK: It's been rumored anywhere from five to 25, but who knows. There are rules that (legislators) have to live by when they are deciding on those kinds of actions.

They have to declare there is a budget crisis. They can't say everybody is going to have to take days off next March because we are going to have a crisis. We don't know if there is going to be a crisis next March. That's something that has to be addressed if and when it happens.

RECORD: Is there a negative feeling among the state police officers the Engler administration because of the cuts?

MOULIK: No, I don't think so. Generally the people are pretty loyal and dedicated to what it is they do. They look upon themselves as state police officers and not just as state employees.

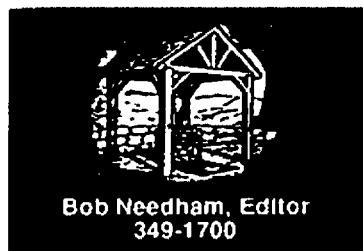

Committee review is positive step in city

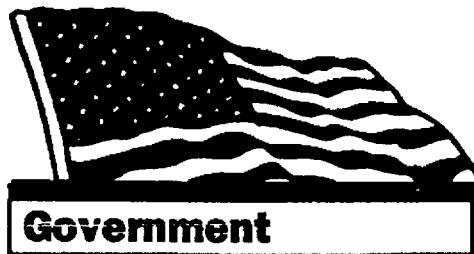
It's going to be very interesting to see the results of the city's finances by a group of local business people. Regardless of what the reviewers conclude about the city and its money, the process itself should prove a valuable step.

Mike Allen, Ray Casterline, William Demray, John Genitti, Chuck Keys, Jim Long, and Carol and George Miller have set themselves up as an informal, ad-hoc group to look over the city's finances. The idea grew out of the city council's recent adoption of new fees for trash disposal, at least until the council decides how to handle waste removal long-term.

The group recently submitted to the city a letter asking for information and documents relating to the trash-disposal issues. The city is preparing its response.

The committee is stressing that it does not intend to be antagonistic. It has questions, and it's looking for answers. That simple.

The committee may or may not satisfy the answer. Either way, though, the fact that it's taking the time and effort to



do the review is commendable. Most citizens, corporate or individual, do not take that kind of an interest in the government.

This entire process should result in an increased flow of information out of the city government. Perhaps it will get more people interested and involved in the budgeting process for all the local governmental units.

The more eyes that look over a financial matter of public interest, the better off everyone is. It certainly can't hurt. We're glad to see the review by the new committee, we hope the involvement continues, and we hope it spreads to others as well.

Everyone can't score 100 in the real world

We're here to warn you: the results of the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) math test this year might come as a shock to some Northville parents who have seen scores in the 90th percentile and higher in recent years.

This year, the state decided to change the test to more accurately examine the skills of students. The new test will include some standard computational problems, but it also will try to find out if students understand what they are doing when they calculate mathematical formulas.

It will attempt to uncover whether students will be able to handle basic math skills required by the basic, middle class jobs of the future. Not just college-bound students, but all students. Over 75 percent of today's jobs require proficiency in simple algebra and geometry, according to the National Research Council.

Scores usually drop on standardized tests when the testing procedures are changed. In this case, the test is longer

and its content will be more challenging. Scores can almost certainly be expected to drop significantly. Your fourth-, seventh-, and tenth-grade children will almost certainly relay the fact that they took a long, difficult test sometime in the near future.

But once you get past the lower scores and longer test, the new MEAP has a lot of benefits. It could be one of the first times kids in Michigan are tested on knowledge of skills they will need someday in the work force. Northville schools routinely work to change curriculum to address changing educational needs. But for many parents, this test will be the first sign that education is changing to fit the needs of tomorrow.

You can consider yourself warned about the MEAP scores your sons and daughters will bring home in a few months. We think the change in the test is a positive one. Scores may drop. But there is a little bit of the real world in this test. We all know everyone can't score 100 percent in the real world.

Eight Mile takes the fun out



Sometimes I think I'm a truck driver who just got too darned much education. For some inexplicable reason, I just love to drive.

I'll drive ridiculously long distances, like a recent 800-mile trek to North Carolina that I covered solo. I regularly drive to New York City to visit Mom.

But any driving I have to do on Eight Mile road is too much. I know I've covered this subject in this space before when a chunk of the roadway the size of a telephone book leaped up and mauled my tire.

However — and this is no news to anyone who travels Eight Mile — things have gotten worse.

First, let's take another look at the pavement. Chunks continue to come up like hair off a shedding dog. Road crews have gone through and cold-patched the deepest craters, though there is no truth to the rumor that they found a guy in a Volkswagen driving aimlessly around the bottom of one of them.

Just east of Meadowbrook Road, a couple of "speed bumps" have sprung up out of the pavement in the last few months (despite the fact that we haven't gone through any freeze-thaw cycle during that time). Someone with a twisted sense of humor has since come along and painted them white. Not a bad idea, really.

I learned to drive in New York City, where potholes are such an accepted part of the landscape that people give them pet names.

I spent the better part of the last 10 years in Ann Arbor, where they imported a device from Brazil that used lasers to measure the severity of the bumps in the streets — and the streets broke the machine.

Never — NEVER — have I seen any road as broken up and neglected as Eight Mile in Northville and Novi.

Lately, though, Eight Mile has become not just an annoyance. It's become a hazard. And if things keep going as they have been, it could turn fatal.

We've previously said on this page that the intersection of Eight Mile and Beck needed a traffic light. With the paving of Beck between Seven and Eight Mile, the volume of traffic has grown faster than spring crabgrass.

And now accidents are starting to increase. There've been five at the Beck/Eight intersection since the completion of the paving. The most recent appears in this edition. For all of last year, there were just two accidents at that intersection.

In a coming edition of this paper, we'll be taking a deeper look at the traffic situation at Beck and Eight Mile, with comments from all the communities involved. It should be an eye-opener.

As for me, I can say that if things don't improve, the next time I use Eight Mile will be to move out of town.

National Newspaper Week



This one's for me, folks.

Most — almost all — of the time, I try to write columns which (hopefully) are interesting and amusing. But every so often I take advantage of the 10 inches I get on the editorial page every Monday to write something for myself. And one of the weeks I write something for myself comes just about this time every year.

What's happening is that Oct. 6-12 is National Newspaper Week — a week for celebrating the role of newspapers in a free society. You know. Freedom of speech. Freedom of the press. All that heavy stuff.

The thing is that I feel really good about my chosen profession . . . that what I do for a living is really important to the people of Northville and really important to this rather remarkable concept of government called democracy.

And I feel particularly good about community newspapers — particularly the one you're reading.

Does that mean I think we're perfect? That we're doing as good a job of covering government, schools and the community as well as we ought to be? Not by a long shot. That's not a put down, merely an assertion that I want us to constantly strive to improve.

There are some pretty alarming trends out there in the journalism business. And, even though they've been developing over a long period of time, they seem to have become more pronounced.

What I'm talking about is the trend toward sensationalism, best illustrated by the popularity of such television shows as *Hard Copy*, *Inside Edition* and *A Current Affair*.

What's disturbing is that the same emphasis on sex and violence appears to have permeated Detroit television news and has just about taken over the front pages of the Detroit dailies as well.

With all the important things going on in the state and the world right now (or any other time for that matter) does the Pee Wee Herman story rate above-the-fold coverage? Does the Liz Taylor wedding merit front-page exposure? What made the editors decide to run that story about the prostitute/nymphomaniac from Florida on Page One?

The answers, I'm afraid, are not very pretty. They answer, have a lot more to do with market share, finances and economics than they do with journalism or the public's right to know.

Which brings me back to what I was saying about feeling particularly proud about working for a community newspaper in general and *The Northville Record* in particular.

Look at last Thursday's paper, for example. The front page alone had stories about business conditions on Main Street, the upcoming city election and problems associated with the township's new trash collection system. Not to mention a follow-up on the controversy surrounding the township's supervisor selection process.

Not a single Pee Wee Herman story among them.

I don't mean to suggest we're not concerned with "market share, finances and economics." We have to be. If I had my way, there would be ordinances requiring every resident to subscribe to the *Record* and every merchant to advertise in the *Record*.

But that's not likely to happen and, in the meantime, I will settle for the comfort associated with being a part of a newspaper which treats people like responsible citizens instead of leering pervers.

Hey, it's National Newspaper Week, and I'm celebrating.

Township pleased with HVA

"Actually, I'm quite pleased," Zhmendak said Friday. "I'm very satisfied with their performance."

HVA ambulances averaged an 8.5 minute response time to approximately 200 township emergency calls between March 14 and Sept. 5, according to fire department records.

Those figures are consistent with numbers racked up by CEMS, and are expected to improve as HVA learns the community, and as construction projects clear along major Northville transportation arteries, Zhmendak said.

"I hope with the opening of Northville Road and Beck Road that the times (will decrease)," he said. "I expect the response times will be lower over the next six months."

Zhmendak said fire department rescue workers and HVA staffers work well together, something that fire officials say was lacking with CEMS.

"We're working together, actually doing training together," he said. "We haven't even had any raised voices (at accident scenes) that I'm aware of."

Zhmendak said fire department surveys of those who have used HVA

services in Northville Township indicate widespread satisfaction with the firm.

Seventy-eight of 80 survey respondents gave kudos to HVA, Zhmendak said.

HVA usually operates two units out of a fire station in Plymouth. Some local residents were worried that response times — and those in need of emergency medical service — would suffer.

But HVA often parks vehicles at the township's Fire Station 3 on Sheldon Road and at the Sheldon Road/Five Mile Intersection, Zhmendak.

Discussions on a permanent home for an HVA unit in Northville Township have yet to bear fruit, Zhmendak said. The township and HVA are still mulling options on that front, he said.

HVA President Dale Berry was unavailable for comment Friday on placement of a township-based ambulance.

Zhmendak said ambulance location has not played a major role in the township/HVA relationship.

"I'm pleased with their coverage," he said. "They're trying to protect themselves and us."

Lead content is no cause to be alarmed

Since early August, there has been significant misinformation in the press about lead levels in wine. Together with totally misleading statements, there have been insinuations that leave the reader questioning.

"Even the lead capsules on bottles are under scrutiny," one writer remarked. This is poor journalism because the issue was not explained in the story.

As a health-conscious consuming public, you should be aware of the facts that put the lead issue into perspective.

Nearly all foods contain trace amounts of naturally-occurring lead introduced predominantly from ground water, soil and the atmosphere.

The Food and Drug Administration is concerned about levels of lead in food products, but has yet to establish specific standards for regulating lead content.

The FDA Total Diet Study lists fresh and processed foods that contain lead. These include green leafy vegetables, legumes and root vegetables, fresh fruit, grain and cereal products.

Studies currently in progress suggest that California wines have less lead than many commonly-consumed foods and much of the nation's drinking water. The Environmental Protection Agency standard for environmental water has been 50 parts per billion of lead, based on the consumption of one-half gallon of water per day over a 70-year period.

California wine contains about 21 parts per billion of lead, about the same as an average-size chocolate chip cookie! By comparison, a navel orange contains 33 ppb and fresh or frozen spinach has 39 ppb.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, the national regulatory agency for wine, beer and spirits, has performed tests on over 500 foreign and American wine samples over the past two years.

The agency released its study findings in August with a disclaimer (that we rarely saw in press commentary) stating that the survey was incomplete and no inference should be made about a product because it was selected to be analyzed.

Consumers do not risk ingesting harmful amounts of lead from wine. A wine drinker is exposed to less lead from wine than from many other foods and drinking water. Wine is not consumed by infants and children — the groups thought to be at greatest risk from excessive lead exposure.

1989 Robert Pepl Colline di Sassi, Sangiovese Grosso (\$30) represents one of the best wines in California's new Italian varietal craze. Expensive, due to its rarity, it will be released on Columbus Day, Oct. 12. If you are a collector or just inquisitive, get your request in with your favorite retailer now. Bright fruit is the dominant feature of the wine that receives solid structure from 12-percent cabernet sauvignon in the blend.

Comfort foods come on like a warm blanket

Hot homemade soup, old-fashioned pudding, fresh-from-the-oven bread or biscuits, or anything chocolate are all comfort foods.

These seem to evoke fond memories of foods you loved as a child. We never seem to outgrow the taste for these delightful comfort foods as we think of the simple pleasures in life. Take care making your comfort foods memorable.

In a hurry for your pudding comfort? Use the microwave. Microwave cooking of pudding occurs from all sides rather than only the bottom. This eliminates the possibility of scorching. For added convenience, measure, mix and cook pudding in a four-cup glass measure.

You may have given up on pudding thinking it is too fattening. Make some changes. Use skim milk, egg substitutes, cut down on sugar by adding more vanilla and use reduced-calorie margarine. The pudding will

still be good and smell as wonderful as you remember.

The "queen" of old-fashion pudding is bread pudding, blending lemon and vanilla flavors. Old favorites also include rice, tapioca, vanilla or chocolate puddings. (Homemade, of course.) Basically, pudding comes in two versions, top of the stove or baked.

For a top-of-the-stove pudding, use a double boiler, being careful that the heat is not too high or the egg will toughen. Baked versions are set in hot water in the oven. Bake until they are "set." The water allows for a gentle heat to avoid the break or curdling of the pudding.

When fresh from the oven, steaming-hot bread or biscuits say, "Welcome!" The aroma alone gets the memories going. Yeast breads are easy to make and now you can use the microwave to cut the rising time in half.

Place the yeast dough in a well-greased microwave bowl, grease the top and cover

loosely with wax paper. Set the bowl in a baking dish and pour hot water to the depth of about one inch in the bottom dish. Microwave at medium-low (30 percent power) two minutes, let stand in microwave for five minutes. Repeat this procedure three times or until dough is doubled in bulk. Give the dish a quarter turn after each microwaving period. If the top looks dry, carefully turn the dough over in the bowl.

Fiber-rich whole grains give breads and biscuits a robust flavor. For a light and flaky biscuit, handle the dough as little as possible. Too much mixing makes them heavy and tough. The most tender biscuits are made with solid fat such as shortening or butter. Biscuits should be cut close together, leaving as little dough as possible to re-roll. Do not knead the scraps. Simply press together, re-roll and cut. Too fattening for your diet? Try to serve steaming hot. There is no need for additional butter and jam.

A simmering pot of soup is a welcome, comforting sight any day. Serve soup in mugs to spark appetites and offer comfort. The secret to flavorful soup is the broth or stock. A tasty broth can be prepared with little effort. To make a great broth let the mixture simmer slowly. If the liquid boils the broth will be cloudy.

Add vegetables and herbs for extra flavor. Carrots and onion deepen the color of the broth and add sweetness. Remember to strain several times and remove fat to make a lighter and healthier broth. Chilling helps to degrease broth and stock. The solidified fat can be easily removed before reheating. Soups make large batches, so the enjoyment can continue, especially since many taste better the second day.

The above comfort foods are healthier than the following one but certainly not tastier. Small amounts once in awhile. What

can it hurt? Just like kids, many of us will eat anything as long as it has chocolate on it. A real chocolate fantasy would be not only a bar but a chocolate dessert filled with chocolate and frosted with chocolate. That's comfort!

Chocolate scorches easily, so take care to melt slowly over hot water. When moisture gets into melting chocolate (even a drop of water), it hardens, stiffens and turns grainy. Then you have a problem. Keep containers and utensils bone dry and melt uncovered so no steam can condense and get into the chocolate. Whether you eat the chocolate chips right out of the bag or wait for the chocolate product to get done, there is no doubt chocolate is a comfort food.

Everyone seems to have a food or foods that mean comfort by representing a fond memory of childhood. On a stress-filled day, try one of your favorite comfort foods.

Let's be honest here. The best thing about fall in Michigan isn't the changing of the leaves. Oh, the Fall Colors get a lot of hype, but in reality, the leaves change color pretty quickly and they're on the ground within about two weeks of the first frost. Don't blink or you'll miss 'em.

No, the best thing about fall in Michigan is the apples. Whether its trees are green, or orange, or bare, Michigan's apples are always big, fat and juicy come harvest season. That's when it's time to head for the cider mill.

This area is privileged to be home to two operating cider mills — Foreman's Orchards and Cider Mill at 50050 W. Seven Mile Road in Northville Township, and Parmenter's Northville Cider Mill at 714 Baseline Road.

This season, Parmenter's is under new ownership. Rob and Cheryl Nelson and Mel and Diane Jones took over the mill at the end of August from the Bodker family who had owned it for 24 years.

In fact, the Nelsons and the Joneses are old family friends of the Bodkers, so it's almost like the mill is staying in the family.

"Our parents all went to high school together," Diane explained. "Mr. and Mrs. Bodker will be staying on with us through the first year to

see us through.

Before the Bodkers bought the mill in 1967, it was owned and operated by generations of Parmenters, dating back to 1873. It is believed to be Northville's oldest retail business. And the original building, with various additions, was used until 1977, when it was destroyed by arson.

The Bodkers rebuilt the mill from the ground up, since very little was salvageable. Drawing on his experience as a dairy operator in the Redford area, Vern Bodker designed and built the clean and efficient cider mill that you can see in operation today.

"The important thing is keeping the cider cool," said Rob. "It will turn to vinegar if it's not refrigerated. Refrigerated cider has a shelf life of seven to 10 days, depending on a number of factors. But if it's not kept cool you'd be lucky to have it last two days."

So from the minute the cider is squeezed from the apple pulp and sent into a holding tank, to the time it's handed across the counter to a customer, Parmenter's cider is refrigerated at a temperature between 30 and 40 degrees.

Bodker's machinery makes pressing cider look fairly simple. In fact, the whole operation fits in a space about the size of a two-car garage. Everywhere you look, there is stainless steel and spotless concrete.

Company's coming? Try fresh ham

Ham—for most of us this old-time American favorite conjures up mental tastes of the briny, smoky flavor traditionally associated with a cured pork leg. Its appeal is one many of us have foregone in this day of paying attention to calorie and salt intake.

But now hear this from the it-ain't-necessarily-so department. There's another ham on the market that doesn't depend on salt for its flavor. It's called fresh ham (or sometimes fresh leg of pork), and it's unique in that it isn't cured.

Actually, fresh ham is an old-fashioned pork cut that was in demand years ago when folks still did their own curing and smoking. Now fresh ham is seeing a resurgence of popularity as cooks discover this lean pork roast makes a spectacular "company's coming" centerpiece and also takes to the grill happily for barbecue.

Fresh hams are reasonably priced compared with other pork cuts. Boneless fresh hams average 6 pounds but can be cut to order into smaller roasts. They are wrapped in a meshlike netting to hold the meat firmly in place and assure uniform shape during cooking.

Another benefit is fresh ham's slim yet rich makeup, offering about 200 calories per 3-ounce serving but having a nutrient profile that includes protein, B vitamins and essential minerals.

And fresh hams lend themselves to many cooking styles. From traditional roast pork garnished with rosemary to glazed with fruit or seasoned for a spicy stir-fry, fresh ham handles it all with aplomb.

Here are some fresh ideas for incorporating fresh ham into your spring menu plans.

ORANGE-GLAZED FRESH HAM

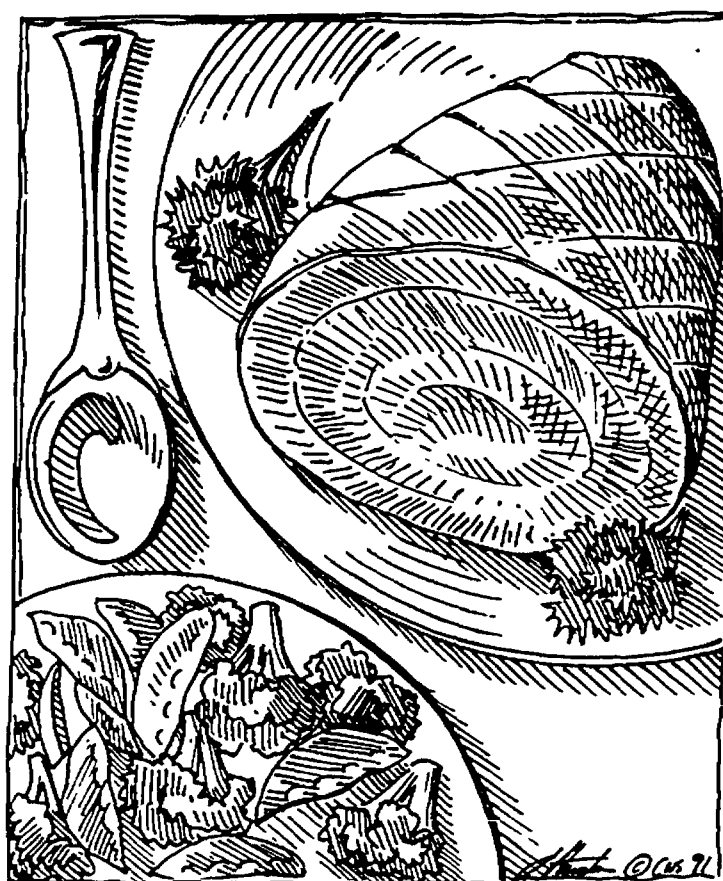
- 1 (4- to 5-pound) boneless fresh ham
- 1 (12-ounce) jar orange marmalade
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- Steamed fresh vegetables (optional)
- Fresh parsley sprigs (optional)

Yields 12 to 15 servings; each 3-ounce serving has 224 calories.

Place ham on rack in open roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer in thickest part of ham, not touching fat. Combine marmalade, soy sauce, ginger and cloves. Mix well.

Bake ham, uncovered, in 325-degree oven for 2 to 3 hours (allow 25 to 30 minutes per pound) or until meat thermometer registers 155 F. Brush with marmalade mixture several times during last 45 minutes of cooking time. Let ham stand 10 to 15 minutes after removal from oven. (Temperature will rise approximately 5 degrees to reach recommended internal temperature of 160 degrees and juices will set.)

To serve, remove netting from ham and carve. Serve with fresh steamed vegetables and garnish with parsley, if desired.



FRESH BAKED HAM WITH PINEAPPLE SAUCE

- 1 (4- to 5-pound) boneless fresh ham
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1 (15 1/2-ounce) can crushed pineapple (juice packed)
- 2 tablespoons frozen orange juice concentrate
- 4 teaspoons soy sauce
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon curry powder
- 1/4 teaspoon grated ginger-root

Yields 12 to 15 servings; each 3-ounce serving has 218 calories.

Place ham on rack in open roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer in thickest part of ham, not touching fat. Season with garlic salt. Bake, uncovered, in 325-degree oven for 2 to 3 hours (allow 25 to 30 minutes per pound) or until meat thermometer registers 155 F.

Meanwhile, for sauce, drain pineapple juice into medium saucepan; set pineapple aside. Add orange juice concentrate, soy sauce, cornstarch, brown sugar, curry powder and gingerroot to saucepan; stir and bring to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer for 3 to 5 minutes or until thickened. Remove 1/4 cup of sauce, set aside. Add pineapple to remaining sauce; cook and stir 3 to 4 minutes more.

Brush ham with reserved 1/4 cup sauce during last 30 minutes of cooking time. Let ham stand 10 to 15 minutes after removal from the oven. (Temperature will rise approximately 5 degrees to reach the recommended internal temperature of 160 F and juices will set.)

To serve, remove netting, carve and serve with remaining pineapple sauce.

GRILLED FRESH HAM

- 1 (4- to 5-pound) boneless fresh ham
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 clove garlic, minced

Yields 12 to 15 servings; each 3-ounce serving has 220 calories.

Prepare coals in covered barbecue. Place ham in center of grill over drip pan. Close grill hood. Grill over slow coals for 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until meat thermometer registers 155 F.

For sauce, combine chili sauce, vinegar, lemon juice, dry mustard and garlic in small mixing bowl; mix well. Brush ham frequently with sauce during last hour of grilling time.

Let ham stand at least 10 minutes before carving to allow juices to set. (Temperature will continue to rise to reach recommended 160-degree internal temperature.)

COCO KIWI PORK

- 1/4 cup soy sauce
- 1/4 cup dry white wine or chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1 tablespoon lime juice
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon dry ginger
- 1 pound boneless fresh ham, sliced for stir-fry
- 1 tablespoon cooking oil
- 1/2 onion, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup cashews
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut
- 1 kiwifruit, peeled and sliced

Yields 4 servings; each serving has 393 calories.

In medium bowl, combine soy sauce, wine, honey, lime juice, corn-

tarch and ginger. Add fresh ham strips, marinate for 20 to 30 minutes. Drain ham, reserving marinade. Heat oil in large skillet over medium-high heat, add ham and stir-fry 3 to 4 minutes. Add onion and stir-fry 1 minute longer. Add marinade to skillet, cook and stir until sauce thickens. Stir in cashews and coconut, heat through.

Serve garnished with kiwifruit slices.

- PEACHY PORK PICANTE/**
- 1 pound boneless fresh ham
- 1 tablespoon taco seasoning mix
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley
- 1 tablespoon cooking oil
- 8 ounces bottled salsa, chunky style
- 1/2 cup peach preserves

Yields 4 servings; each serving has 308 calories.

Cut fresh ham into 1-inch cubes. Combine taco seasoning and parsley; coat ham cubes with seasoning mixture. Heat oil in heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Add ham, cook and stir to brown, about 3 to 5 minutes. Add salsa and preserves to pan, lower heat, simmer until tender, about 15 minutes.

Serve over rice, if desired.

TUSCAN PORK WITH PEPPERS

- 1/2 cup olive oil, divided
- 2 pounds boneless fresh ham, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 cups (29-ounce can) tomatoes, undrained
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/4 teaspoon dried rosemary, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1/4 cup dry white wine
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 1 sweet red pepper, seeded and sliced
- 1 green pepper, seeded and sliced

Yields 8 servings; each serving has 296 calories.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in large heavy skillet or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add fresh ham and garlic, cook and stir to brown ham, about 4 to 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, seasonings and wine. Reduce heat, cover tightly and simmer until meat is tender, about 12 to 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, saute onion and peppers in remaining oil in large skillet, about 3 minutes. Add to meat mixture, blend gently and simmer for 3 to 5 minutes.

CAJUN-STYLE SEASONING

- 3 tablespoons paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon red (cayenne) pepper
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 2 teaspoons oregano
- 2 teaspoons thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

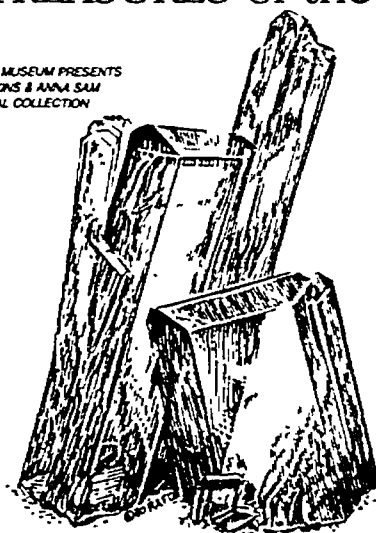

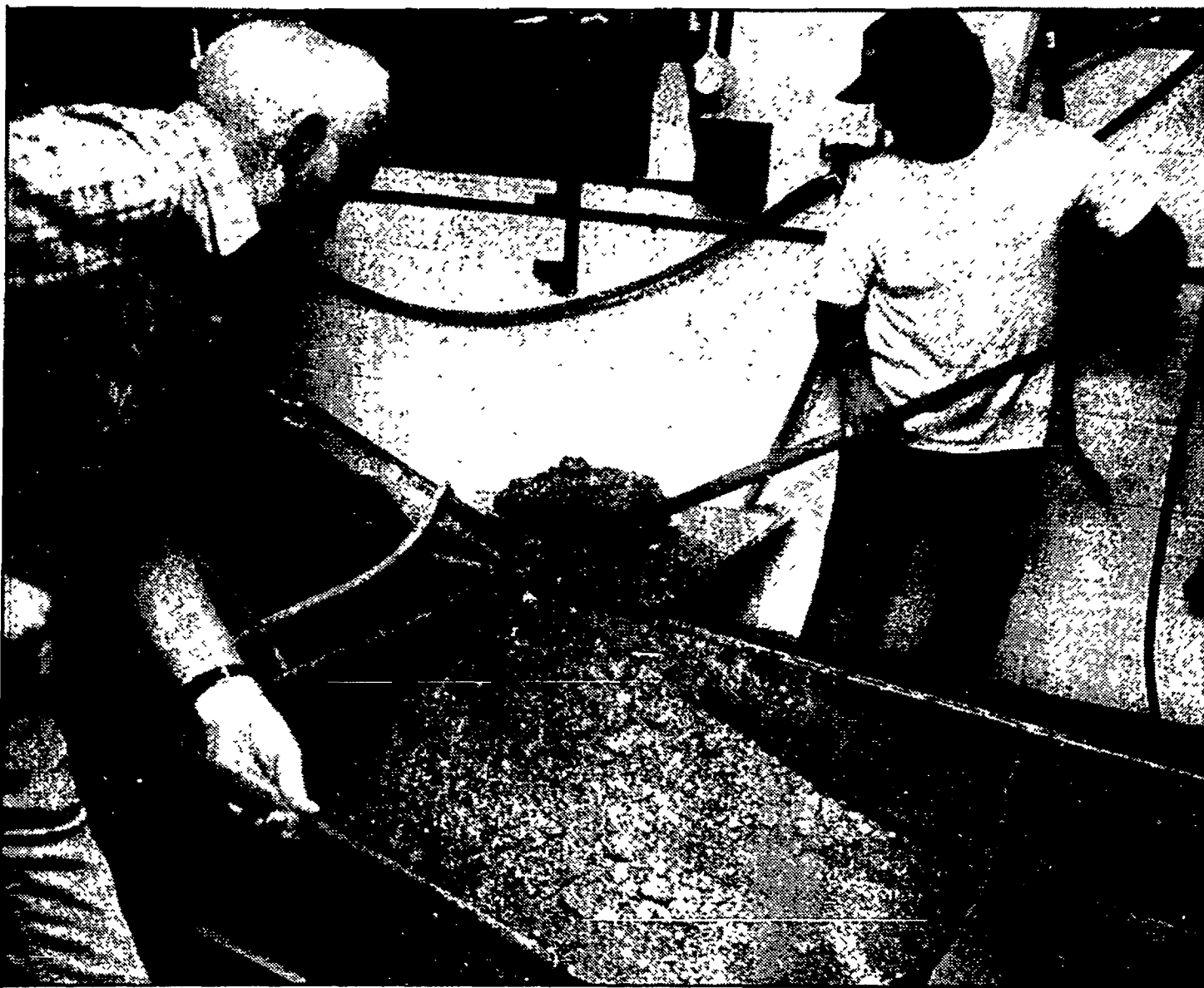

Cider mills are pressing to please

"People like to reminisce about the old building," said Diane. "But really, the new building has the cleanliness factor, and it's so much more efficient."

Jonathan, Macintosh and Delicious apples are trucked in from the old Knopf Orchards in the Grand Rapids area, and arrive in pallet boxes that hold 18-20 bushels apiece. A box is tipped with a hydraulic lift, spilling the apples onto a conveyor table, where they are sorted and guided through a washer — one of the few items to survive the fire in 1977.

Jets of water and nylon brushes scrub the apples, and send them on their way to the grinder. When they come out, the apples are a pulp the consistency of thick applesauce. The pulp spills into a hopper, and from there it is pumped into the large, cylindrical press.

Mixed in the press with the pulp are pure, food-grade rice hulls. Why are rice hulls added?

"If we didn't, the pulp would just kind of squish around inside the press, and no juice would come out," said Rob. "The rice acts as a vehicle to squeeze the juice out."

The pressing takes about two hours as the apples are pressed and repressed seven or eight times. The juice spills into a collecting tray below, where it is pumped into chilled holding tanks, and later bottled in a refrigerated room.

Demonstrating the rotating bottler, Rob explains that speed can be of the essence on busy days at the mill.

"Sometimes we get going like Lucy and Ethel in here," he said.

As you might expect, the most popular items sold at the cider mill are cider, caramel apples and doughnuts. But there are plenty of other

FRESH APPLE CAKE

3 eggs
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup oil
4 apples sliced thin
1 cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Beat eggs to a lemon color. Add sugar, beating well. Add flour, cinnamon, baking soda, and salt, mixing well. Add vanilla, oil, apples and nuts. Bake in a greased 9-by-13 pan for 45-50 minutes.

When cake cools, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Serves 10-15

nibbles on sale as well.

Michigan-made products are a specialty, and Parmenter's sells white cheddar cheese, apple chutney, peanut butter caramel topping and honey from local suppliers. Parmenter's also sells its own apple butter, hot cider, hard cider (for the over-21 crowd) and apple pies.

Oh, yes. They also sell plain, old

"We'll go through 1,700 apples on a Sunday," said Cheryl, "and a semi-truck full a week. Last week, we sold out late Sunday evening and had to order more."

Apple pizza makes for unique dessert

APPLE PIZZA DESSERT

1/2 loaf (8 oz.) frozen bread dough
1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 egg

2 egg whites
1 cup skim milk

from the waste disposal chain beginning in 1992.

Currently, tin-lead capsules are being phased out. This is not because they contribute to lead content in wine — it's because of the concern about the good earth.

Virtually no lead (from tin-lead capped bottles) is introduced into wine as it is poured if the capsule is cut below the lip of the bottle and removed. The bottle top should be wiped with a damp cloth before removing the cork.

Local makers sure can cut the mustard

"This is the right mustard," she proclaimed in her distinctive, warbled voice, "Dijon mustard, not hot dog mustard" as Julia demonstrated a favorite salad dressing recipe with co-host Joan Lunden of TV's "Good Morning America" recently.

Most professional chefs will agree a Dijon mustard is by far a better choice when preparing salad dressings and sauces. Why? Most Dijon and Dijon-style mustards are prepared with white wine (for traditionally, made in France with the juice of unripe grapes known as "must").

On the other hand, those mustards which fall into the category of hot dog mustard or the so-called ballpark mustards are made with a mild flavored mustard seed, lots of vinegar, and lots of turmeric in order to achieve that brilliant, yellow color.

Ah, now if there were only two varieties of mustard to choose from this story would come to an abrupt halt. The fact is that after a recent, gastronomic tour of specialty food shops in Ann Arbor, Birmingham and Detroit, the last count was just over 100 different jars of prepared mustard to delight (or in some instances, revolt) your palate.

There is a plethora of mustards readily available from a piquant Dusseldorf from Germany to a creamy Wisconsin mustard blended with crushed cranberries.

There are strong, full-strength English mustards blended with whole mustard seeds, vinegar, chilies and black peppercorns, and some made in the mountains of Maine or the lake shore of Wisconsin enriched with beer, ale or imported Guinness stout.

Honey mustards, herb mustards from Provence and others blended with lemons and limes are all packaged attractively in painted crocks or in glass jars with fancy fabric covered tops and cutesy labels designed to confuse all of us.

Shopping for a few good mustards can be quite a chore. So before venturing out on your own here's some advice from the experts, and some personal recommendations after extensive tastings, lots of discussion and more tastings.

Bryan Smith, who is responsible for the huge array of mustards at Birmingham's Merchant of Vino, said Mucky Duck — made in Sylvan Lake — "is our best mover." With 89 other mustards to choose from Michele Marshall's Mucky Duck outsells them all.

"When I first started the business, eight years ago, there weren't many gourmet mustards on the market," said Marshall. Mucky Duck is made from a family recipe. "I used to give it for presents during the holidays. Then, my friend Beverly Boos who later became my partner suggested we market it and see if anyone would buy it," Marshall added. Today, Mucky Duck is available in 600 stores in Michigan and in 15 states.

Besides honey mustard, Smith suggested Rothschild, Raspberry Crunch, a whole grain mustard made at the Rothschild Berry Farm in Urbana, Ohio, and Southwest, a creamy, red chile and honey mustard made in Phoenix, Ariz.

The Big "10" party Store in Ann Arbor has sold 90 cases of Honeycup mustard in the past six weeks, according to Theresa Montag, the shop's manager.

"Honeycup has been our No. 1 seller followed by Grey Poupon and then Mucky Duck," she said. The trend is going away from the simple or bland mustards toward the more exotic mustards. Big "10" carries a large selection (over 90) of mustards from England, France, Sweden, the Virgin Islands, the United States and Germany.

"We have a big German community here and when we run out of Dusseldorf mustard we really hear about it," Montag added. Among the exotic favorites at the Big "10" Party Store are Bech's Rum Flavored Mackinac

MUCKY DUCK FRENCH ONION SOUP

From the Mucky Duck Cookbook by Michele Marshall

1/4 cup butter or margarine
6 onions, sliced thin
6 garlic cloves, peeled, sliced
1/4 cup dry white wine
3 1/2 cups chicken broth
3 1/2 cups beef broth
1 rounded tablespoon Mucky Duck mustard
6 slices toasted French bread
6 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
12 tablespoons grated Swiss cheese

Although it may appear overwhelming, all mustards can be divided into varieties:

● English or English-style (made with mustard flour and water such as Colman's).

● Dijon or Dijon-style (a smooth mustard made with wine or vinegar and ground mustard flour from brown or black seeds). Coarse-grained (made as it was before the invention of smooth mustards in 1702, with vinegar, salt and other seasonings).

● German (a mild, creamy mustard made from the flour of yellow seeds) or Bavarian, a bit sweeter taste made from brown seeds, or Flavored mustards (generally made from a mild, smooth base to which herbs, fruit or onions have been added).

All the mustards sampled for recommendation were tasted alone with a spoon. A good tasting mustard should taste good on its own. The ingredients should blend nicely and one flavor should not overpower the others. Above all, it must be palatable. Most of the herb mustards sampled did not resemble the herbs listed as an ingredient.

Generally, herbs which have been sitting in mustard for more than a week lose their freshness and become acidic. It's quite easy to prepare an herb mustard at home by adding either fresh or dried herbs to a small amount of basic, smooth Dijon or French champagne mustard.

Two of the fruit flavored mustards sampled, Wisconsin Wilderness Cranberry Mustard and Middlesex Farm Orange and Hot Mustards, were surprisingly pleasant although neither had a distinctive, fruit flavor.

Again, fruit flavored mustards can be made at home by adding finely chopped orange or lemon peel or zest to a basic Dijon, French champagne or honey mustard. Two tablespoons of grated peel to 1 cup of mustard should do it.

Although mustard never goes bad in the refrigerator, its flavor and zest diminish. A shelf life of six months is recommended.

When cooking with mustard there are no rigid rules, just a little advice. Since the pungency of mustard intensifies with heat, you may want to add it toward the end of the preparation. The smooth, mild, prepared mustards are recommended for salad dressings, sauces and soups. The coarse-grained mustards usually contain a high vinegar content and should be reserved to accompany ham and sausages.

The last element of the lead and wine issue is the tin-lead foil capsules. As part of the traditional wine package, tin-lead foil (lead sandwiched between thin layers of tin foil) has been used on fine wine bottles throughout the world for decades.

Governmental and public concern over the disposal of heavy metals, such as lead, in solid waste sites has led to legislation and proposals in several states to eliminate these elements

I wouldn't blame you for wondering: "Can Spanish food really be as great as its billing?" "Can any food be that good?" "If it's so great how come I never heard of it until a few years ago?" The answers are "Yes!", "Yes!!" and "I'm not sure, but better late than never!" It's been seven or eight years since Zingerman's got involved with the foods of Spain. At the time, real Spanish food was almost unknown in this country. People used to assume it was pretty much the same as Mexican cooking—burritos, tacos and the like, which couldn't be farther from the truth. So it's been great to see how much that's changed over the years. At Zingerman's, we've built up quite a regular following for the wonderful cheeses, olives and olive oil, sherry vinegar, almonds, peppers, and other wonderful Spanish dishes. And, around the country, the foods of Spain have begun to get the attention they deserve: Spanish restaurants, Spanish cookbooks, Spanish recipes have popped up almost everywhere. It's great to see.

This year's Fiesta de España (Zingerman's sixth!) will, of course feature all of the most popular of foods from Spain at Zingerman's. Antonio Buendia will again travel from New York to cook paella on our patio (Oct. 12 and 13—see opposite page for details). All the great cheeses of Spain—Manchego, Cabrales and the like. Plus the great extra virgin olive oils and vinegars. And olives and saffron and chorizo.

Still, as much of Spain's fine food as we've brought to the fore in recent years, there are even more great things to eat yet to uncover. It's kind of like that "the older you get the less you know" thing. The more I learn about the foods of Spain, the more of them I find there are left still to try. Spain to me is like this wonderful culinary grab bag. Every year I reach in and find a couple of incredible foods that I didn't even know existed the year before! This year's discoveries include "boquerones"—wonderful little fish in vinegar that the Spanish eat at tapas bars in huge quantities. Some amazing cheese from the town of Guzman in Castilla y León. Handpicked Manzanilla olives (infinitely better than the ones in the bottles on supermarket shelves). And for the first time this year Zingerman's is exploring the cooking of Sephardic Jews, rooted in the foods of Spain eight or nine centuries ago.

Foods from Spain keep getting better. I hope you will enjoy them as much as I have!

Orange Dill Potato Salad

The potato, of course, didn't arrive in Spain until Columbus and his crew brought it back from the Americas. But the Spanish have adopted a convert's devotion to it. They eat dozens of potato salads. This is one of my favorites, and it is a unique, typically Spanish combination of flavors. Potato salad dressed with extra virgin olive oil, fresh orange juice, capers and parsley. It's hard to imagine it without actually trying it. So don't just take my word for it. Stop by and ask for a taste.

Spanish Garlic Potato Salad

Another chapter in the Spanish love of potatoes, this has become one of Zingerman's most popular potato salads. Dressed with mayonnaise (which is probably Spanish in origin, by the way), lots (and lots) of fresh chopped garlic, a bit of sherry vinegar. If you don't like garlic, this salad isn't for you.

Spanish Fiesta Salad

Spaniards eat lots of rice, especially in the eastern parts of the country. This is a rice salad seasoned with plenty of Spanish saffron, Spanish chorizo, chicken breast, fresh vegetables and Spanish almonds. Great hot as well as cold.

Swordfish in Saffron Sauce

(from *Tapas: The Little Dishes of Spain* by Penelope Casas)

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons skinned and finely chopped tomato
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/4 cup brandy, preferably Spanish brandy or Cognac
- 1/4 cup strong chicken broth
- Salt
- Freshly ground pepper
- A grating of nutmeg
- Several strands saffron
- 1/4 pound swordfish or shark, in 1 1/2-inch cubes

Heat the oil in a shallow casserole and sauté the onion and the garlic until the onion is wilted. Add the tomato and bay leaf and cook for one minute. Stir in the brandy, chicken broth, salt, pepper, nutmeg and saffron. (May be prepared ahead.) Add the fish, cover, and cook for 10 minutes.

How many people in this country know how great Spain's cheeses are? Perhaps because, from a standpoint, Spanish cheesemakers have done "everything wrong." Just look at all these cheeses they're making:

Spanish cheeses are so hard

Most of the best cheeses are still made by relatively small dairies. Some are made only by independent artisan cheesemakers who are practicing what modern technologists would call, a "hopelessly outdated" craft. On the one hand, it makes Spanish cheese difficult to get a hold of. At times, we've gone through untold frustrating phone calls and faxes trying to get Spanish cheese to Ann Arbor. You've got to really want to get Spanish cheese to go through that much aggravation. And at Zingerman's we really, really want it. Because, on the other, more important hand, when we get our Spanish cheese, it tastes great!!!

* Spanish cheeses are full-flavored!

I don't mean "strong"—I mean "flavorful." Instead of producing bland, mass market cheeses, Spanish cheesemakers are turning out lots of traditionally made cheeses, that are full of character and flavor. Spanish cheese doesn't taste like the bland processed stuff there's so much of these days. "Not bland enough," say the mass marketers. I say "Bravo!". This is what good cheese is all about.

* Spanish cheeses look funny!

The mass market wants "consistency," "uniformity," "nice neat lines." Spain's cheesemakers seem to be going in the other (more interesting) direction. Spanish cheeses tend to come in cones (San Simon and Tetilla), wrapped in leaves like Cabrales (definitely not conducive to mass distribution). A lot of people think it's not worth the hassle. I think it adds character.

* Nobody's ever heard of Spanish cheeses!

On top of that Spain's cheeses have to deal with near anonymity. Everyone's heard of Brie. But Cabrales? And, yet, Cabrales is one of the finest, most delicious cheeses made anywhere in the world today.

* So what's the bottom line?

Spain makes some great cheeses. But they don't quite seem to fit in with the mainstream. But hey, this is Ann Arbor, right. We can appreciate character and not fitting in. So let's give these great cheeses a break. Give 'em a taste this month.

CHEESES OF SPAIN



Manchego

reg. \$10.99 lb. **Save \$1.00 pound**
The best known among the unknowns. Manchego is the cheese of Spain. Made on the central plains around Madrid, in the land of Don Quixote, from pure sheep's milk. Manchego has a gutsy, piquant flavor unlike any of the world's other great cheeses. Great on sandwiches, for cooking, or best of all, just for eating. The Spanish often eat Manchego after dinner with a slice of "quince cheese" ("membrillo" in Spanish) which is a really great treat. Try it out.



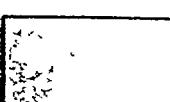
San Simon

reg. \$10.99 lb. **Save \$1.00 pound**
One of the best smoked cheeses I've ever tried. Made from cow's milk in Galicia in the northwest corner of Spain (that's Spain's Celtic region, and they really do play the bagpipes up there). Smoked over local birchwood, San Simon has a rich, smokey flavor that almost anyone who likes smoked cheeses will love (and it may seduce some people who thought they didn't like smoked cheese as well).



Mahon

reg. \$10.99 lb. **Save \$1.00 pound**
Everyone's heard of Majorca? Well, in the tradition of Spanish cheese anonymity, Mahon comes from Menorca, which, of course, you've probably never heard of. Bad break for Mahon, right? Well, if for some reason you end up on Menorca instead of its better known cousin, you would find Mahon cheese in practically every home. It's the local specialty. Made from cow's milk and nicely aged, Mahon has a slightly piquant, nutty flavor, perhaps a bit like an aged Gouda.



Monasterio

reg. \$9.99 lb. **Save \$1.00 pound**
This cheese comes from the western part of Spain, the land of the conquistadores. Made from goat's milk, it is unlike any of the soft creamy goat cheeses most of us in this country are used to. Monasterio is aged to achieve a texture more like a cheddar or other hard cheese. Yet, it has a flavor that is surprisingly mild, and very tasty.



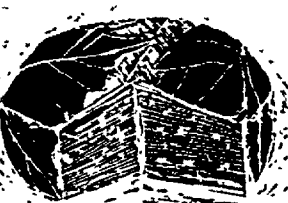
Idiazabal

Another smoked cheese, this one from the Spanish Basque country. Made from unpasteurized goat's milk in small cooperative dairies up in the mountains. Smoked over beechwood, Idiazabal is a distinctive and delicious cheese. Great flavor, easy to like. Fine cheese.



Cabrales

reg. \$10.99 lb. **Save \$1.00 pound**
Spain's classic blue cheese. Made by hand in tiny dairies in the region of Asturias on Spain's north coast, from a mixture of cow's, sheep's and goat's milk. Cabrales is aged in mountain caves to develop its blue veining. Each wheel is hand wrapped in maple leaves. If you like blue cheese, Cabrales is not to be missed. Very full, pungent, rich flavor. In Spain they eat it with fruit, on steak (very good!), on salad.



Paramo di Guzman

reg. \$22.00 lb. **Save \$2.00 lb.**
Though I've saved this one for last, don't let me mislead you. This is really an outstanding piece of cheese. Paramo di Guzman is so anonymous I discovered it by chance in London (thanks to Monica Lavery who discovered it in Spain). It's also the most expensive cheese we've ever sold at Zingerman's. Makes me a little nervous just putting it out on the counter. When I met with Ambrosio who makes the cheese, I had to ask him, "What makes this cheese so expensive?" He just shrugged his shoulders and said, as if it were the most obvious thing in the world, "It costs a lot of money to make great cheese." "But Ambrosio," I said, "this is really expensive." He kind of rolled his eyes at me and said "Well it's really great cheese!"



Paramo di Guzman

Ambrosio makes Paramo di Guzman cheese at his family estate in the village of Guzman in north central Spain. Ambrosio remembered his grandmother making it when he was a kid. And he set out to keep the tradition alive. He makes his cheese from the fresh, unpasteurized milk of his own herd of churra sheep. The cheese is made completely by hand, the curd is cut into tiny, tiny pieces in order to get rid of as much of the liquid whey as possible (this adds to the cost, of course—less water, less weight). Each wheel is then pressed to expel even more moisture then aged in a special stone "cave" Ambrosio built for expressly that purpose. And then when the first aging is completed, each wheel of the cheese is submerged in extra virgin olive oil and aged for an additional six months.



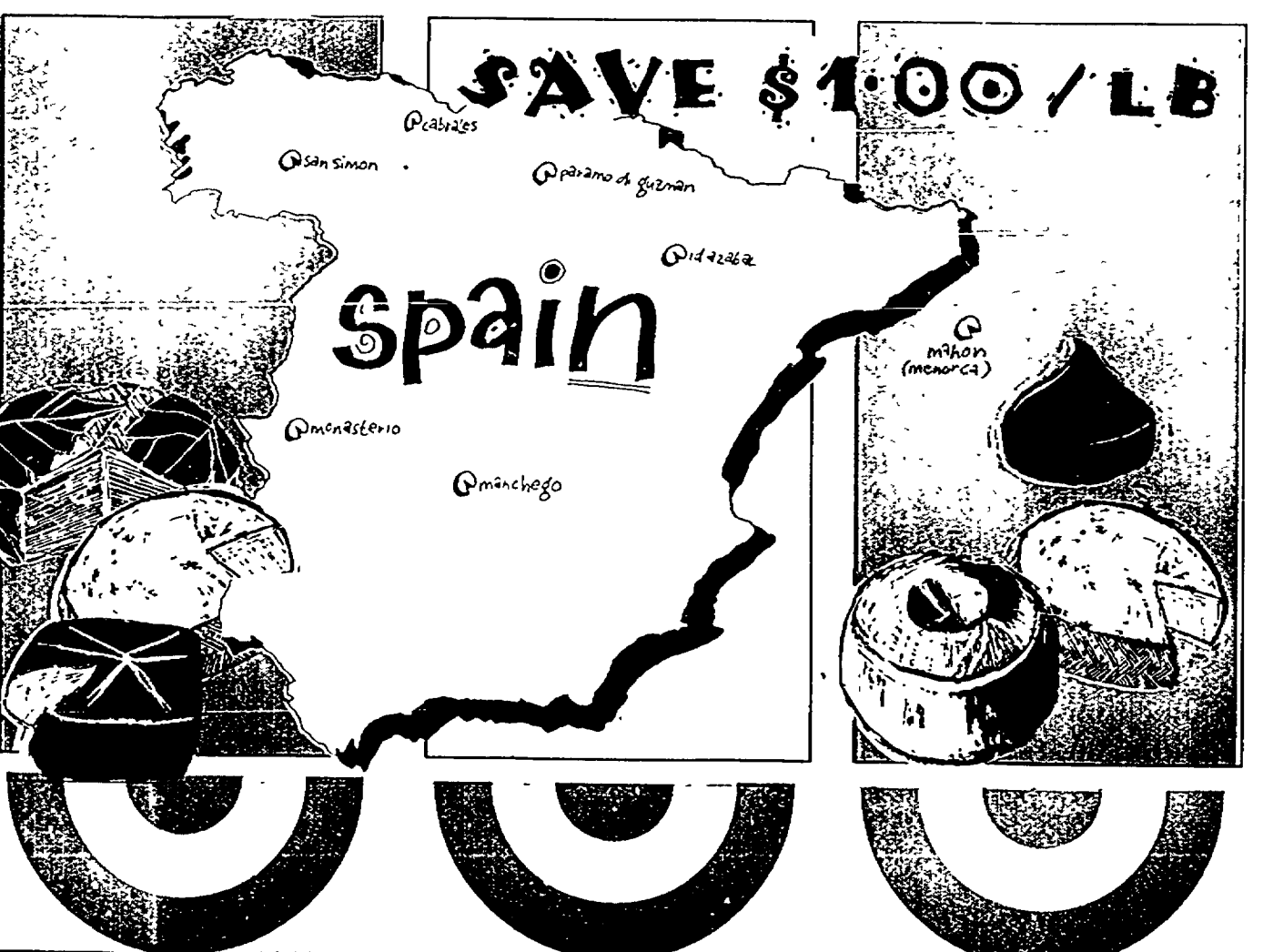

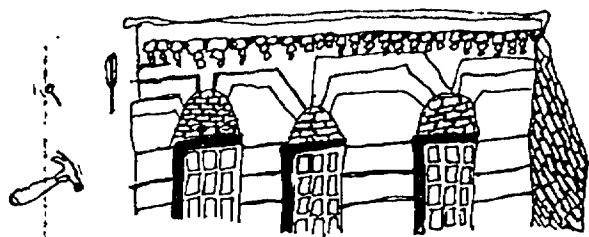

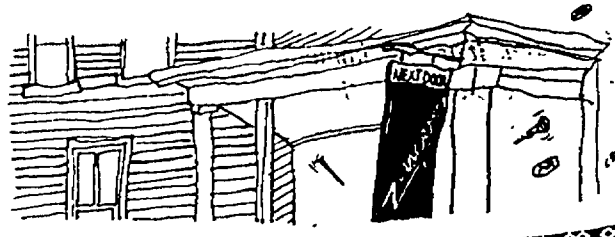
Buy a couple of ounces and savor it after dinner. It really is amazing cheese.





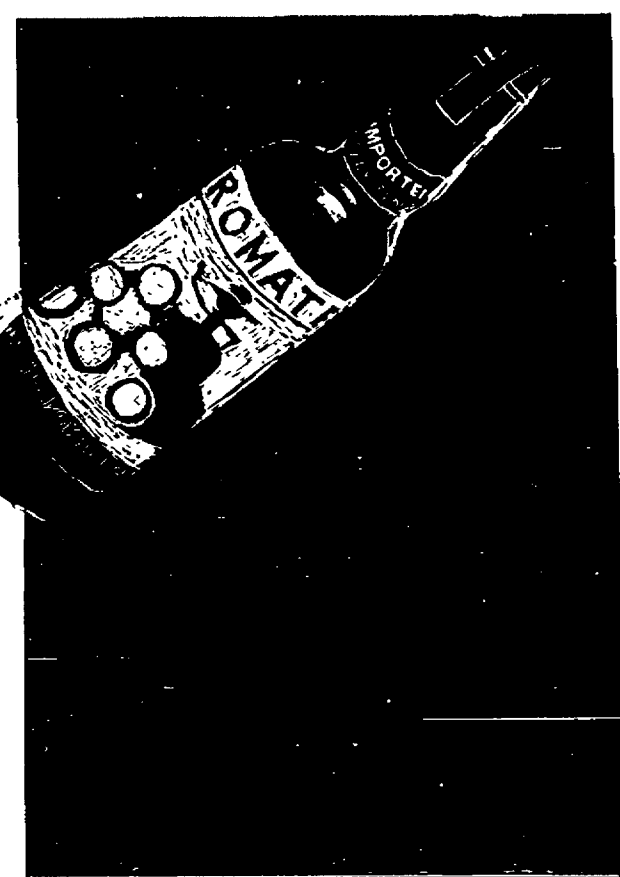
Zingerman's Next Door Update

While extra virgin olive oil has gotten tons of attention in recent years, great vinegar has kind of stayed hidden in the shadows. But enough with the anonymity. Most of our experience with sherry in this country is with the sweet "cream sherry" the Spanish make for export. Sanchez Romate sherry vinegar is made from fino sherry—the stuff Spaniards drink. Fino is dry, not sweet, and it has an amazing delicious, nutty, oaky taste with hints of vanilla and other flavors.

Sherry vinegar is at the top of my 1991 list for "most underrated foods." So many of us have come to know the pleasures of cooking with balsamic vinegar. Well, sherry vinegar is every bit as unique and flavorful as its Italian cousin. In fact, its flavor and character are so unique, so special, that sherry vinegar, like balsamic, isn't for everyone, or for every dish. But if you find that you like it as much as I do, you may end up using it for all sorts of things. It's particularly great on salads, especially with ripe tomatoes. I like it in bean salads too. And it's great with chicken, beef, lamb. Like balsamic vinegar, when you use a little sherry vinegar in a dish, it adds a whole new character and flavor.

To help get the word out about sherry vinegar we'll be sampling it at Zingerman's all month long. And don't miss the Sanchez Romate Sherry Vinegar VO-aged for 25-30 years it is really amazing stuff! Support Sherry vinegar!

Pulling these great olives out of the grab bag of fine Spanish foods has been one of our most exciting finds! Though few people outside of Spain get to try them, there are some truly incredible olives being cured on the Iberian peninsula. Makes me hungry just thinking about them. Marinated Spanish (Sevillano) Olives

Arbequina Olives

The spiritual and physical opposites of the Sevillanos. These come from the north of Spain in Catalunya. They're small, lean, firm, nutty, brownish green in color. Americans are often put off by small olives. But, I'll tell you, if you dismiss these on size alone, you're missing out on one of the olive world's greatest treats. They're really something special. P.S. These are the olives from which the L'Estornell olive oil is made. Try dressing them with a little of the oil before serving. It's great.

Farga Aragon Olives

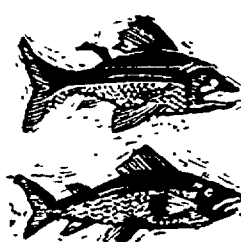
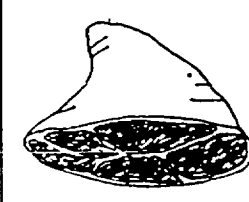
Spanish Sausage and Ham

Sephardic Jewish Cooking— an introduction

Is this really happening? Thirteen years after I graduated from U of M here I am sitting down to write, what, when it really comes down to it, is a history paper on the cooking of the Sephardic Jews. Sorry, that's "The Cooking of the Sephardic Jews." Boy, I thought I was done with that stuff. Sitting up late in the grad library taking notes from book after book about obscure subjects like Russian anarchists. Faithfully following that classic "introduction-body-conclusion" format that some grade school teacher whose name I can't remember taught me many years ago.

So... I've spent much of the last month sitting next to a stack of cookbooks trying to put together as much information as possible about the cooking of these "Spanish" Jews. I guess it's not inappropriate since we've chosen to tie this study of the foods of Sephardic Jewry into a U of M-sponsored conference on Jews in Spain. But since I'm a "food person with an interest in history," as opposed to "a historian with an interest in food," I'm going to try to condense a couple hundred pages of information into a dozen or so paragraphs. And with apologies to all my old (I guess I should say "ex-") professors, I'll dispense with the footnotes!

History papers and footnotes aside (I never liked footnotes anyway), now that I've probably got you wondering who, and what Sephardic Jews are—not to mention what they ate—let's get to the "body" of this thing.

What is a Sephardic Jew?

Like any other social, political or religious issue, there are entire books on the subject. But since we're in this for the food, not the philosophy, we can keep things simple without too much risk. The vast majority of Jews in this country today are known as "Ashkenazim," from the Hebrew word for "Germany." The term is applied to nearly all Northern and Eastern European Jews.

"Sephard" is the Hebrew word for "Spain." And "Sephardim," or Sephardic Jews, were, quite simply, Jews from Spain. Things would likely have stayed that simple too, if not for the Spanish Inquisition and, in 1492, the expulsion of the Sephardim from Spain. From 1492 on there were—and are—Sephardim in nearly every country in the world. In its strict definition then, Sephardic Jews are descendants of Spanish Jews. (Where things get a little more complicated is that in our American Jewish, "Ashkenazic" world, there is a tendency to refer to all non-Ashkenazim as Sephardim. In this way, Indian Jews or Ethiopian Jews, who did not come from Spain, are still frequently referred to as "Sephardim". But for our purposes—which again are culinary—we'll keep the definition in its strict form. Sephardic Jews are Jews of Spanish Jewish descent.)

Sephardic Culture

Though they differ on some religious interpretations—Sephardim eat rice at Passover while Ashkenazim don't—they are not separated theologically as are, say, Protestants and Catholics. Historically, the two have always viewed themselves as one people, sharing essentially the same religious values and beliefs. The differences are primarily cultural ones. They show up in the organization of the respective communities, in their practical interpretations of the Torah, etc. The lifestyle and attitudes of Sephardic culture are frequently more compatible with those of Spain. Living near the Mediterranean, Sephardic culture pays much more attention to colors and textures, a much greater appreciation of the sensual and much greater orientation toward the outdoors and nature.

Sephardim also have their own language. My Ashkenazic ancestors spoke Yiddish, a blend of German with Hebrew, and a bit of Russian, Polish and other Eastern European languages thrown in for good measure. Sephardim spoke (and in Europe some still speak) Ladino, also known as Judesmo or Judeo-Espagnol, a combination of Spanish and Hebrew with a little Arabic, Greek or other Balkan languages thrown into the mix.

There are tensions between the two groups in modern day Israel but that's a story for another time.

The Jews in Spain

Before I can tell you what Spanish Jews once ate for dinner, I think we need to back up a little and talk about what Jews were doing in Spain in the first place. It's a story of incredible highs and horrifying lows.

Jews first arrived in Spain in Roman times, about 2000 years ago. For much of the first 700 years of the modern era, Spain was ruled by the Visigoths, whose attitude toward Jews in the country fluctuated between tolerance and intolerance. The beginning of the 8th century saw the start of the Muslim invasion of the Iberian peninsula. In 694, Visigoth rulers declared Jews to be traitors, which led the Jewish communities to welcome the Muslim invasion with open arms. By 718, Muslims controlled nearly all of Spain. At the end of the century, the entire population of Spain—including the new Muslim rulers—hovered around 4.5 million. Spanish Jews accounted for 6-10% of that total, and up to 20% of the population in some urban centers.

From the beginning, Jews in Spain fared better under the Muslim Caliphate than they had under Christian rule. Over the years, Spanish Jews became more and more involved in the country's political and cultural life. The role of Spanish Jews peaked between 900 and 1200, the Golden Age of Spanish Jewry. The role of Spanish Jews in that era is most often compared with that of Jews in North America in the 20th century. Jewish cultural life flourished through scholarship, both religious and secular. Jews frequently held high positions in government. There were dozens of works of poetry and religious documents, while Biblical interpretations of fasting significance were produced during these years.

The tide began to turn for Spanish Jews in the 12th century when the Moslem-Alhomades took control of Spain. Jews were forced to convert, or face exile or death—an omen of things to come. This was the beginning of the end for Spanish Jewry. As Christian leaders began to retake the country from the Muslims, things for the Jews grew worse. The Inquisition was formally convened in 1478 to hunt heretics from the kingdom. Rabbi Joseph Telushkin describes the Inquisition as, "a perverse attempt to save people's souls by torturing their bodies." Thousands of Jews converted to save themselves. Many of these *conversos*, or New Christians, continued to live as secret Jews.

Without going into all the details, the work of the inquisition culminated in 1492 with the order of expulsion. Spain was hardly the first country in Europe to expel its Jewish community. At one point or another during the Middle Ages, Jews were banished from nearly every country in Europe. Surprisingly to many of us today, England was the first to expel all Jews, in 1066, and did not allow them to return until the 1650's. In Spain, the order of expulsion was issued on March 30, 1492, to take effect four months later. All Jews were ordered to leave the kingdom, face death, or convert. On July 30, 1492—the same month that Columbus sailed for India (or so he thought)—some 200,000 Jews fled Spain; while tens of thousands died in the exodus. Those who reached safety settled in North Africa, Italy, Greece, the Baltics and other countries around the world.

Many of the *conversos* who had become Christians stayed in Spain, and the Inquisition went after them with a particular vengeance. Any sign of being a secret Jew—not eating pork, not cooking on the Sabbath—was taken as heresy. The term *marrano*, used to refer to these "secret Jews" was a derogatory term meaning "swine." Many *converso* families continued to hide their Jewish identities for centuries after the Inquisition, parents keeping it secret even from their own children—until a time when their offspring grew older and strong enough to bear the legend onto the next generation. Even into the 20th century, *converso* families have kept their identity secret, including a large community on the Balearic islands which only now has begun to admit its identity. There have been *conversos*, or *marranos*, families in Spain continuously from 1492 until today.

Today there are about 12,000 Jews in Spain.

The Expulsion of the Jews & Sephardic Cooking

The expulsion of the Jews from Spain had culinary consequences as well as political and geographical ones. Hundreds of thousands of Spanish Jews left the Iberian peninsula and brought their rich cultural and culinary traditions to practically every other country of the Mediterranean. As they settled in each new area, the Sephardic Jews came upon local Jewish communities that had already been in these new places, thriving for generations. In Italy, for example, there was a community of Romaniote Jews with traditions as old as those of the newly arrived immigrants from Spain. Of course, each community had its own style of cooking. And, so, as the Sephardim settled into each new setting, they incorporated the local ingredients and styles of cooking into their own, well-developed cuisine. In so doing, they created not one, but a dozen, varied styles of Sephardic cooking. Each retains the same basic set of Sephardic ingredients and flavors—lots of vegetables, rice, spices, nuts, etc. But, to those, they added many local specialties. In Italy, pasta and artichokes. In Bulgaria, yogurt. In Turkey, more nuts and more spices. In Greece, feta cheese and phyllo dough. And, so, today we have Bulgarian Sephardic cooking, Greek Sephardic cooking, Italian Sephardic cooking, Egyptian Sephardic cooking, Moroccan Sephardic cooking. It's a long list. Each has its unique features. And each is built upon the same set of ingredients that are common to most of Spanish cooking—good olive oil, wine vinegar, olives, roasted peppers, almonds, fish, saffron, lots of fresh and dried fruits, and dozens of different fresh vegetables. A Sampling of Sephardic Jewish Cooking

The more I learn about the cooking of the various Sephardic communities the more intrigued I become. I'd like to take a trip around the Mediterranean and sample the dishes of each. But since neither I nor you can do that right now, we'll have to settle for bringing a bit of Sephardic cooking to Ann Arbor. Here's just a sampling of a few of the dozens of the different Sephardic cooking styles out there.

Italian Sephardic Cooking

Probably because I have come to love Italian food in general, the cooking of the Italian Jews appeals to me more than any other. There have been Jews in Italy for over 2000 years. Both their culture in general, and their cooking in particular, have been influenced by the arrival of Jews from Palestine, North Africa and, most importantly, from Spain at the end of the 15th century. Throughout the centuries Jews in Italy have played a significant role in the cooking and eating habits of Italians, both Jewish and non-Jewish. There is an old Italian saying, "Dress like a Turk, and eat like a Jew," which comes from the generally accepted belief that Jews cooked and ate well. Eggplant and fennel, two staples of Italian cooking as we know it, were in fact first used by Italian Jews. In 1910, author Pellegrino Artusi mentions that even as late as the middle of the 19th century, the two vegetables had been generally derided in Italy as, "vile foods of the Jews." Artichokes (certainly not something I grew up eating) are to this day associated with Jews in Italy. Practically every Italian cookbook has a recipe for "carciofi alla Giudia" (artichoke, Jewish style), or artichokes fried in olive oil.

Italian Sephardic cooking is perhaps a combination of the best of all worlds. A cuisine based on onions, fennel, eggplant, garlic, basil, rosemary, sage, saffron, pepper, anise seed, lemons and oranges, pasta, polenta and rice. That's a far cry from the Jewish cooking we're familiar with in this country. Instead of gefilte fish, the holidays brought out plates of *Muggine al Bianco*—striped bass cooked and cooled in its own juices which formed a natural aspic. At the end of the Rosh Hashanah meal, there are *Sfratti*—"sticks" of honey and nuts. *Sfratti*, like the eastern European apples and honey, are "sweet" for a "sweet new year." But they also represented the rods with which Italian Jews were evicted from their homes, and were served to help ward off future evictions. (*Sfratti* were adopted by non-Jews in Italy, and are frequently served at weddings to ward off marital battles.) At Purim, instead of the hamentaschen that we are familiar with, there were "*Orecchi di Aman*" ("ears of Haman"), sweet twists of fried dough, much like the Spanish *churros*. *Cianciis* is an ancient Jewish Roman recipe for marinated zucchini. *Tagliolini alla crocia* is a baked pasta (a la "noodle kugel") dish of pasta, raisins, almonds, pine nuts, tomatoes and spices. Not everything is different. *Torta mascarpone*, or mascarpone cheesecake, is a staple of Italian Jewish cooking. And *crostini de legatini*, a pate of chicken livers spread on toasts, were a must at most festive meals.

Greek Sephardic Cooking

It seems to be unclear as to when Jews first arrived in Greece, but it may have been as long as 2500 years ago. After the Maccabean revolt against Greece, many Greek-oriented Jews fled back to Greece from Palestine. From there, they spread to most every part of the Greek Empire. As in Italy then, there is a solid Jewish tradition in Greece that predates the arrival of the Sephardim. But, at the end of the fifteenth century, the expulsion of the Jews from Spain brought thousands of Sephardim to Greece. The sophisticated politics and culture of the Sephardim soon won them an important place in Greek life. By the nineteenth century, Salonika had such a Jewish character to it that Ladino became the language of much of daily life!

Greek Sephardic cooking, like the cooking of both Spain and Greece, emphasizes fresh, seasonal foods. A typical Sabbath lunch included fresh tomatoes, cucumbers, cheese and olives. There were dozens of eggplant dishes, lots of stuffed vegetables and stuffed filo, stuffed grape leaves, wonderful sounding dishes like "fresh fish with a sauce of greengage plums." Again, a far cry from the heavier eastern European food of my upbringing.

A look at the Passover meal shows the character of Greek Sephardic cooking. *Haminados*, hard-boiled eggs colored with saffron, were served. *Charoset* for Passover—made in northern Europe from apples, nuts and cinnamon—in Greece was made from an array of dried fruits and nuts including dates, currants, raisins, walnuts, almonds and pine nuts. Artichokes—a major spring crop in Greece—were a common Passover vegetable. A main course, especially in Salonika, might have been carp or other

fresh fish in walnut sauce.

At Chanukah, fried foods were traditional as they were in Jewish cooking everywhere. In Greece, sweet pancakes fried in olive oil were served. But since Chanukah celebrates the victory of the Jewish Maccabees over the Greeks, Jews in Greece have never celebrated Chanukah with the same importance it has received elsewhere.

Sephardic Cooking in the Balkan

Although the Balkans were likely the sight of the first Jewish communities outside of Palestine, the Balkan Jewish community really peaked with the influx of Sephardim after 1492. While the ruling elite in Spain was forcing Spanish Jews to leave the country, the Sultan of the Ottoman Empire was welcoming them. Hundreds of thousands of Jews came from Spain to the Balkans, and within a few generations had built a flourishing Jewish culture. Sephardic Jews quickly became integral parts of Ottoman politics, finance and culture. "Can you call such a king [Ferdinand of Aragon] wise and intelligent? He is impoverishing his country and enriching my kingdom", said Sultan Bajazet, the Ottoman ruler.

Sephardic cooking in the Balkans combined the peppers, tomatoes, and other ingredients from Spain with the feta, yogurt and beans native to the area. The cold *Bulgarian Cucumber Soup* we've been making at Zingerman's for years is essentially a Sephardic recipe—cucumbers, yogurt, walnuts and dill. Purim in Balkan Sephardic communities called for *Rosca di Alhasu*, or walnut crescents shaped like Haman's ears. There are, in fact, dozens of Turkish style walnut, almond and honey, baklava-type sweets that are typical of the cooking of the community. Lots of roasted eggplant, feta, filo, beans, stuffed grapes leaves (known in Ladino as *Yaprakes*). Also, a number of dishes with clear Spanish origins such as "*Albondigas con Merendena*"—the meatballs Spaniards love, but made from eggplant instead of meat—and "*Fideos con Domates*"—thin Spanish noodles with tomatoes and olive oil.

Jewish Cooking in Spain

Before the expulsion, the Jews of Spain had quite a well-developed cuisine. Perhaps the most famous Spanish Jewish dish was *Adafina*, the forerunner of modern day Spain's *cocido*. Because cooking on the Sabbath was prohibited by Jewish law, Jews everywhere seem to develop some type of one dish casserole which could be put on the stove on Friday and left to heat overnight to be eaten on Saturday. In Eastern European Jewish cooking that dish was *cholent*. In Spain, it was *adafina*. The name *adafina* comes from the Arabic "*dafana*", or "to cover". Like the *cocido*, *adafina* is a long cooking stew of many ingredients including chickpeas, cabbage, sausage, lamb, chicken and much, much more. *Cocido* also includes pork sausage (chorizo) and ham. *Adafina* also includes a pelota or meat dumpling. After 1492 when cooking food overnight or cooking without pork were considered signs of being a "hidden Jew," conversos possibly added pork to their *adafina* in order to throw off the Inquisition. Today, *cocido madrileño* is a classic Spanish dish. *Adafina* is still made by Sephardic Jews in North Africa and elsewhere.

Sephardim in the New World

There is, of course, a good deal of speculation—not to be resolved here—that Columbus himself was from a *marrano* family. Regardless, Sephardic Jews were members of Columbus' crew, and were a part of the European settlement of the Americas right from the beginning. Many *conversos* came to the Caribbean, South and North America in an attempt—frequently unsuccessful—to escape the Inquisition. Portuguese *conversos* settled in Curacao in 1634. The first open Jewish community in the Americas was established in 1634 in northeast Brazil, after the area was taken by the Dutch. And the first Jewish community in North America was established by a group of 23 Sephardim, who arrived in New Amsterdam, New York, in 1654. In fact, Sephardim were the dominant Jewish community in the Americas for nearly three hundred years. The first Ashkenazic synagogue was not established until 1795 in Philadelphia! Though they have become a small minority after the influx of eastern European Jews in the nineteenth and 20th centuries, there remain Sephardic communities throughout the hemisphere today.

Sephardic Foods at Zingerman's

As I researched the cooking styles of the Sephardic Jews, I was surprised to find that many of the dishes we regularly prepare in our kitchen were also staples of Sephardic tables. *Spanada*, *plate manchego* and other Mediterranean vegetable stews are found in nearly every Sephardic community. Zingerman's *Bulgarian cucumber soup*, *Tarator* in Ladino, is a Bulgarian Sephardic classic. *Rice pudding* is made in one form or another by Sephardim in most every country in the Mediterranean region. Stuffed grape leaves—*dolmas* in Greek, *yaprakes* in Ladino—are traditional on Greek Jewish tables. The squash-filled tortelloni we've been selling for years turned out to be a regular holiday item among Italian Jews.

Born in Darrington, Wash., Barker spent most of his youth on the Rosebud Indian Reservation, S.D., where his mother was a teacher. Later, he enrolled in Drury College in Springfield, Ill., on a basketball scholarship. World War II interrupted his education, but following his discharge from the Navy, where he was a fighter pilot, Barker returned to Drury to finish his studies.

It was while he was putting himself through college that he discovered his calling: audience participation shows. A year after college graduation he moved to Los Angeles. Within a week, Ralph Edwards, who was developing the idea for *Truth or Consequences*, heard Barker on his car radio and knew he had found the host for his show. Barker stayed with the show for 18 years. On Sept. 4, 1972, he took a new job as host for *The Price Is Right*.

'A Woman Named Jackie' is a bad call for NBC

A compelling life becomes TV pulp

"A Woman Named Jackie?" "A Fish Called Wanda?" A book and movie of those titles, respectively, were products of the late 1980s. The latter was intended as a farce; the former has become one.

With baseball playoffs the sole province of CBS, NBC executives consider October the optimum time to offer counterprogramming for women. Translation: Here come the lives of the luscious and tawdry.

First up is a six-hour miniseries about Jacqueline Bouvier Kennedy Onassis. Based on C. David Heymann's book, "A Woman Named Jackie" airs over three nights beginning Sunday, Oct. 13.

Like kids playing dress-up, TV-moviemakers just can't seem to resist a chance to restage a glamorous or tragic moment from the canon of real life. A favorite subject, of course, is the Kennedy family.

If we didn't know they were real, it would be easy to believe they had sprung fully formed from the mind of Judith Krantz or Danielle Steel. Their saga spans the 20th century and includes the key elements of money, ambition, heroism, adultery, politics and premature death. It takes place in glittering locales, and there are enough characters for a soap opera.

But we do know they're real, and there is still a majority of viewers (albeit a shrinking majority) who remember the original Kennedys and their times.

Twenty-eight-year-old Roma Downey, born in Northern Ireland in the year John Kennedy died, can be forgiven for the miscalculation of taking the title role in "A Woman Named Jackie." It is harder to overlook the bad judgment of executive producer Lester Persky ("Poor Little Rich Girl: The Barbara Hutton Story"), who cast an actress of insufficient range for the part and allows several important narrative errors and omissions.

A primary irritation is Downey's

failure to age past 30. Even as a 59-year-old grandmother-to-be, Jackie looks more like her son's date than a mature woman.

Scenes involving the deaths of Marilyn Monroe and John F. Kennedy (both in part two) actually border on the obscene. Monroe is, as usual, a pathetic sex object for the voyeuristic camera. Kennedy, on the other hand, seems to have died of a flesh wound. With irresponsible callousness, Persky and director Larry Pearce actually give us shots of actor Stephen Collins' head—intact—after the shooting.

Compensations are few in "A Woman Named Jackie"—even Downey's 170 costume changes eventually lose their appeal.

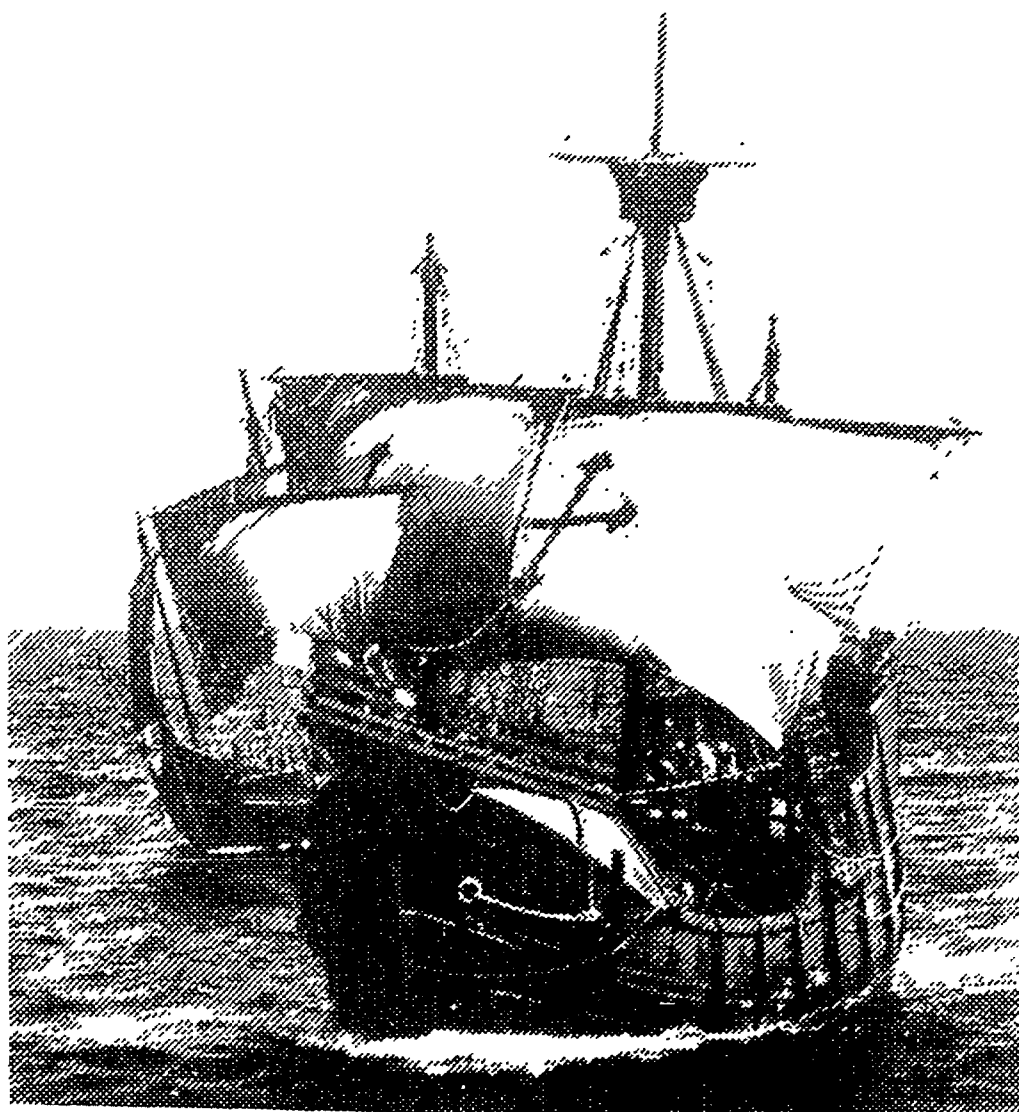
William Devane, in a scenery-chewing role as "Black Jack" Bouvier, has one fine speech in

which he gives his young daughter a pep talk that must last her the rest of her life. Collins gives a respectable reading in the almost unmanageable role of John F. Kennedy, and Josef Sommer is believable as the machinating Joe Kennedy. Billionaire Aristotle Onassis is almost sympathetic in the hands of actor Joss Ackland ("Shadowlands," "Lethal Weapon 2"), who politely refuses to steal scenes from Miss Downey.

Take us out to the ball game, CBS.

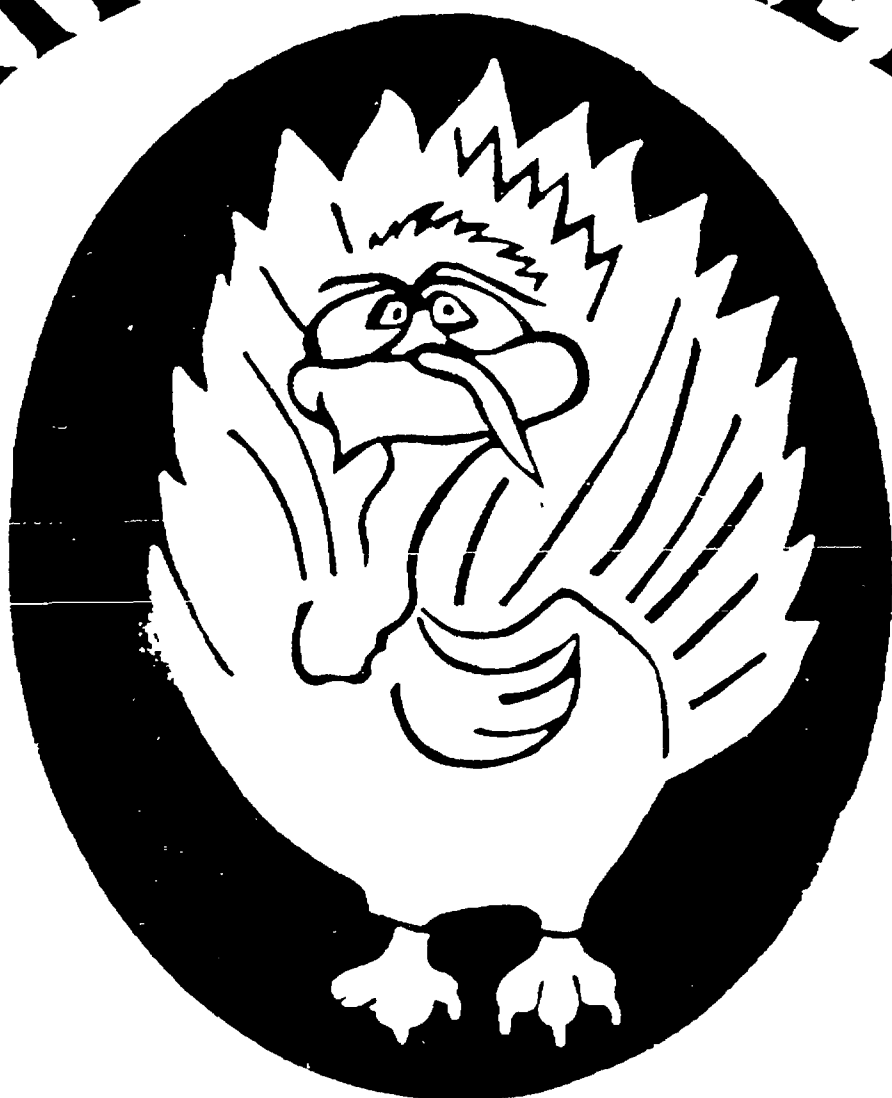

NBC is Notre Dame's best recruiting tool

When executives at NBC Sports made the decision to bring regular-season college football back to the network after 26 years, they decided to do things in a big way. And they did, signing an exclusive five-year agreement to broadcast all "Fighting Irish" home games.

Who can blame executive producer Terry O'Neil, himself a Notre Dame alumnus, for acting giddy about the deal? After all, five of the top six all-time highest rated college football games involved Notre Dame. Over the last three seasons, TV audiences for Notre Dame games have been 52 percent higher than the average for college football telecasts, and, in the last decade, Notre Dame has played in the three highest rated college games.

The partnership between the university and the television network was forged in a struggle involving the College Football Association and a court battle between the NCAA and the universities of Georgia and Oklahoma

over rights to negotiate television deals. But, by taking advantage of the situation, NBC and Notre Dame have set what could be a dangerous trend in college football recruiting.

In making a major financial commitment to one school, NBC's fortunes have become irrevocably linked to the success of that school's football program. Pandora's Box is open.

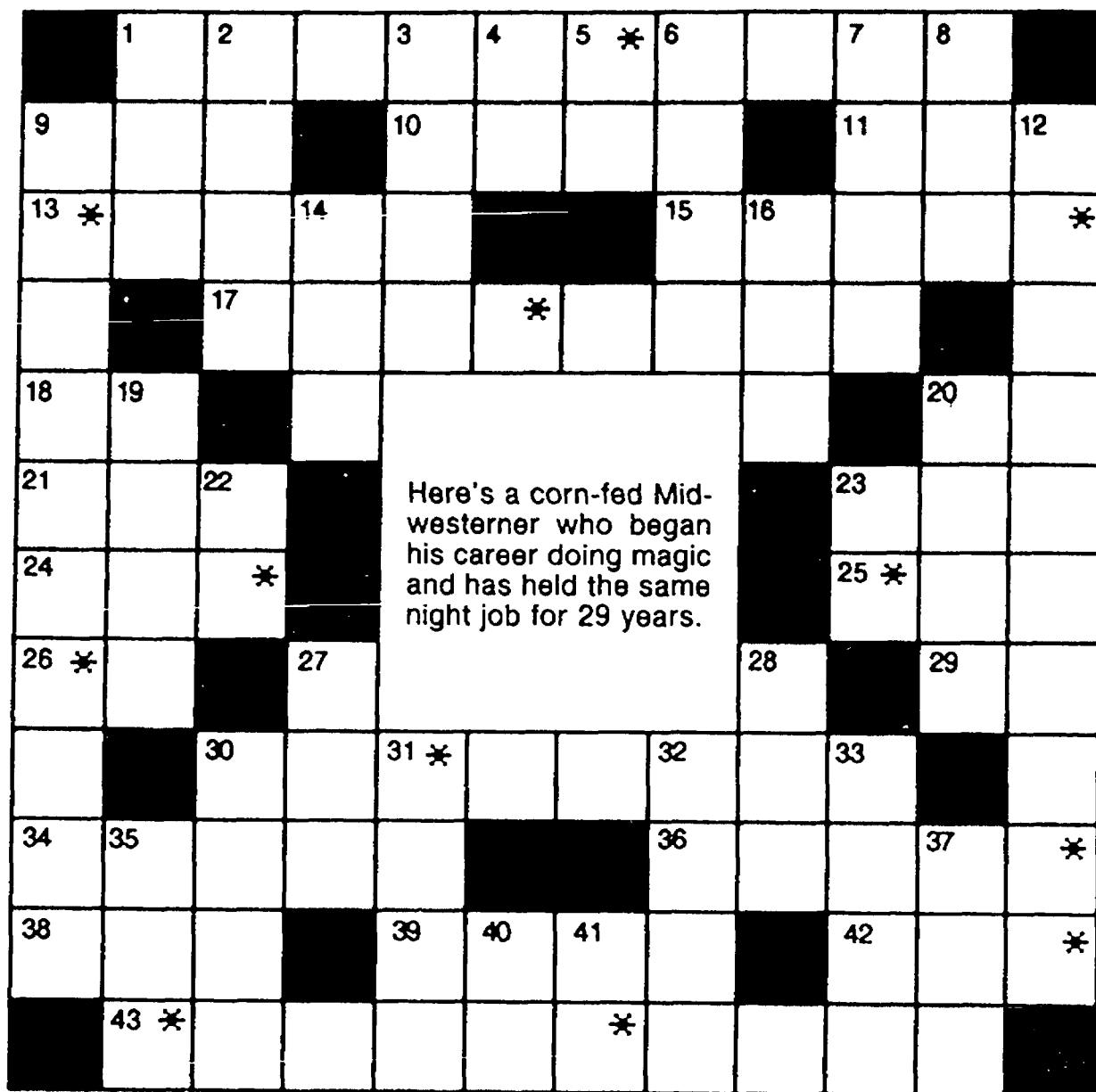
A Branford, Conn., native, Mailhouse had a successful New York career appearing on commercials before moving to the West Coast.
