Fire grant is less than expected

Northville Township is slated to receive state money to defray fire protection costs for state property here, but the actual grant is considerably less than anticipated.

Township coffers were supposed to be enhanced by \$20,359 for fiscal year 1991 with payoffs from the state's Fire Protection Grants Program. State legislators recently cut the grant to just over \$16,000, township

officials said Friday.

The grant is intended to help pay township costs for fire protection and emergency runs at several state facilities, including Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital, the Hawthorn Center, and Phoenix and Scott Correctional facilities.

Other state facilities, such as the state police post and the highway department on Seven Mile Road, and Maybury State Park at Beck and Eight Mile, are not included in the

state's grant program.

State facilities must include an administrative building of at least 10,000 square feet to qualify for the grant formula, Township Manager Richard Henningsen said.

The state is expected to cough up the fire grant by early December, said Dwayne Harrigan, township finance director. But Harrigan cautioned that the state has in the past issued late payments.

"Last year, it was supposed to be

paid in late November or early December (for fiscal year 1990)," he said. "Instead, the township was paid in February and March 1991."

State officials were unavailable Friday to answer questions about the grant amount and expected issue date.

The township budgeted \$18,000 in 1991 for the fire protection grants. Fire department officials on Friday

Recreation hikes fees, cuts events

Recreation in Northville just became a bit more stressful.

Dogged by budget cuts and escalating administrative costs, the Northville Community Recreation department last week announced it will increase fees in many of the programs it offers.

Other programs — including the annual "Rogue Rescue" river cleanup and a service that offers cut-rate prices for amusement park tickets — will be scrapped. Recreation department office hours are scheduled to be scaled back after Jan. 1, as well.

Fee increases and program reductions will directly affect thousands of residents who use the community recreation program. Most will notice user-fee hikes; others will be disenfranchised.

The move comes on the heels of recreation funding cutbacks by Northville city and township governments. Recreation Director Traci Gottschalk said a list of problems forced the de-

partment to take more of a profit-motivated stance.

"To balance our budget, certain programs are going to have to make money," Gottschalk said. "Excess revenue from those programs would be used to fund other programs."

Northville Township recreation department funding by 5 percent — from 1991 levels — when it balanced its 1992 budget earlier this month. The city is expected to follow suit with its 1992-93 budget.

City and township recreation department funding totals nearly \$175,000 annually. Revenues from user fees for recreation programs and community center rent tops the \$377,000 mark, according to department records.

An additional \$21,846 is needed to balance recreation books for 1992, Gottschalk said.

The bottom line? Recreation devotees are going to have to pay the freight.

Youth baseball and soccer prog-

Cable radio now available

As the advertising brochure for Digital Cable Radio says, Omnicom Cablevision's new service is like "cable for your stereo."

Get the picture?

Digital Cable Radio, which will cost \$8.95 a month, lets subscribers access 19 different audio music channels and hear digital surround sound simulcasts of stations including HBO, Cinemax, Showtime, MTV and VH-1.

The service, in effect, adds digital stereo sound to your cable-connected entertainment system. Digital stereo is the technology used to make compact discs sound so clear.

Musical selections range from a country and two classical channels to traditional jazz and modern rock. There's also a kids' channel complete with children's songs and storybook readings.

The service is being offered on 24 other cable stations around the country, but Omnicom is the first cable system to bring it to Michigan. The service will be available to basic subscribers starting today.

Omnicom General Manager Lisa Boland cited several advantages of DCR over standard radio broadcasts.

"It's 19 channels of narrow-formatted music and it's all talk-free and commercial-free and it's all CD quality," she said. "It's just music after music after music."

The simulcasts, Boland added, will add theater-quality sound to movie and concert broadcasts. "What it does, in effect, is turn your living room into a theater."

Another obvious benefit is crystal-clear reception regardless of atmospheric conditions or a broadcaster's distance from the listener's receiver.

Because there are no disc jockeys to tell listeners what they're listening

rams, plus adult softball, are charged with raising the bulk of the \$21,000 shortfall, Gottschalk said. Fee increases in those programs are intended to help pay field maintenance and preparation costs.

"The bottom line is that if they don't contribute, we don't have the money to (continue)," Gottschalk said.

Up to 850 Northville residents currently participate in youth baseball, said Donald Samhat, who heads up the local baseball program. Recreation's rate hike order means youth baseballers could be paying \$5-\$10 apiece more for the privilege of playing the national pastime.

Youth baseball fees now range from \$21-\$41 per player, Samhat said. Youth baseball and soccer organizers are not about to blindly accept a rate hike, he said.

"We're already paying a lot of money at this time," Samhat said. "We've been carrying our share . . . Traci has thrown out the (fee increase) numbers but Northville Junior Baseball is going to want to have some kind of breakdown of maintenance costs (before agreeing to hikes).

"I don't think Northville Junior Baseball is afraid of paying a user fee as long as the fee is legitimate," he said.

Samhat said representatives of Northville's baseball programs will discuss the increase this week.

Residents are sure to wonder what is and is not a legitimate cost. An expanding umbrella of recreation programs has prompted higher administrative and processing costs, Gottschalk said.

In addition, fringe benefits for three full-time recreation employees tops the \$46,000 mark, she said, and government funding is not sufficient to maintain current programming and employee needs.

Fee increases in some programs will not save other ventures, Gottschalk said. Recreation will drop its sponsorship of the annual local leg of the Rouge River cleanup, which costs about \$500 annually; cut its present ties to the Northville Victorian Festival; and close off amusement park ticket sale.

"Anything that costs us money, we have to eliminate," Gottschalk said. About \$7.50 per Northville resident is funneled to the recreation department, according to tax and census figures. That money helps pay administration costs and does little more than guarantee a resident the right to pay a user fee for recreation activities.

Some who cannot bear the increased burden may have to spend their free time outside of the realm of community recreation, although Gottschalk said exceptions will be made for young people who are not able to afford specific programs.

"We're trying to do a better job of identifying those people," she said. "We'll find a way to accommodate them; every kid's entitled to recreation."

Community residents opposed to recreation fee increases apparently have little recourse. Fee increases recently were approved by the Northville Recreation Commission, the department's oversight committee, and were strongly suggested by city and township governments.

"The city and township said, 'You have the ability to raise fees', and it was the only way to balance the budget," Gottschalk said.

Gottschalk said she is open to community comments and suggestions. The recreation department's telephone number is 349-0203.

Township gets fire grant for less than expected

were unable to nail down exact costs for fire and medical runs to state facilities, but said the cost probably topped the \$16,000 okayed by the state.

Fire Chief Rick Rosselle said the township spent 35 firefighting hours on state property from Jan. 1 - Oct. 31 this year. Almost 200 fire department personnel responded to calls on everything from grass and building fires to gas leaks and smoke and odor investigations, he said.

Figures for emergency medical runs were unavailable Friday.

"I think the township's spending more (than \$16,000), the way I see it," Rosselle said. "For all the runs, how can they put a price on it anyway?"

Township officials had to hustle to correct a state oversight, just to gain the grant approved by the Legislature. Henningsen said researchers originally had excluded Scott Regional prison from Northville's state property inventory, an omission which could have further lowered the township's share of the fire protection grant.

Communications between the township and state put Scott back in the township grant fold, and local officials are prodding state representatives to add the smaller state facilities to the grant recipe, Henningsen said.

State Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, said the state intends to modify the grants program to include the smaller facilities. Action may be taken on a revision plan in 1992, she said.

"[The township] can then look forward to being reimbursed for providing fire protection services to the state police post and smaller administrative buildings within the township," Goss said.

number, subscribers are given a toll-free phone to call to hear the names of the last three songs played, together with the performers and albums the songs came from.

The new system was unveiled last Thursday during a dinner and reception at Plymouth's Ernesto's restaurant. To the strains of classical music performed by the Plymouth / Canton High School String Ensemble, Boland introduced about 50 local officials and media types to the slim black DCR tuner that attaches to a subscriber's stereo system.

The tuner, which looks like an elongated cable box, comes with a re-

mote control that lets the subscriber flip through the 19 music stations and five simulcast stations.

The new service connects directly to the listener's stereo system through the tuner, rather than to the television. "You do need a receiver and speakers, and that's all you need," Boland said.

Though the service is currently available only for subscribers to Omnicom's basic cable service, the cable company is exploring the possibility of making the service available to non-subscribers.

"The cost may be prohibitive, but technically, there's nothing stopping us from doing that," Boland said.

Boland also took advantage of the

occasion to announce a donation to the Northville and Plymouth-Canton marching bands. Band boosters in each community will be handing out 5,000 coupons to potential DCR subscribers, and Omnicom will donate \$5 to the marching bands for every DCR subscriber with a coupon. The coupons will be accepted through Feb. 1, and the donations turned over to the marching bands in February.

Police News

Township sees continued rash of vandalism

Vandals damaged a number of vehicles parked outside Northville Township residences last week, according to township police. Police recorded the following damage reports:

A 1987 Chrysler LeBaron parked near Hickory Ridge was damaged when someone punctured the passenger side tires late Nov. 16 or early Nov. 17. Damage was estimated at \$200.

A Hudson woman told police that someone punctured two tires on her 1989 Ford Taurus late Nov. 16 or early Nov. 17 while it was parked on Steepleview.

A 1988 Olds Delta 88 was damaged late Nov. 16 or early Nov. 17 while it was parked in the driveway of a Sutters Lane Court resident. The owner said the vehicle's windows were smashed and two tires slashed. Damage was estimated at \$400.

A 1987 Chevrolet El Camino parked in the driveway of an Old Bedford residence was damaged when someone punctured the vehicle's left rear tire late Nov. 15 or early Nov. 16.

A 1984 Ford EXP was damaged while parked near the Scenic Harbour/Crystal Lake intersection Nov. 14. The owner told police the vehicle's window was shattered.

Someone reportedly smashed the windshield of a 1991 Ford Probe while it was parked in front of a residence on Banbury Court late Nov. 16 or early Nov. 17.

Police said they have no suspects in the rash of vehicle vandalism cases.

VEHICLES STOLEN FROM MEIJER LOT:

A Northville man told township police that his 1990 Chevrolet pickup was stolen from the parking lot at Meijer, 20401 Haggerty, Nov. 16. The owner said the vehicle was parked and locked in section E of the Meijer lot.

Police found no evidence of a break-in at the scene. The pickup was valued at \$15,000.

A 1991 GMC Sonoma valued at \$17,800 was stolen from the Meijer lot early Nov. 17, a Livonia man told township police.

Detroit police recovered the vehicle later that day in the area of Woodmont and Fullerton, according to reports. The vehicle's wheels, tires and radio reportedly were missing. The vehicle's dashboard was damaged, and the ignition and door lock were punched out, police said.

OUIL: A 30-year-old Northville man was charged with operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol after his arrest early Nov. 17 on southbound Haggerty near Five Mile, township police said.

MAN CHARGED WITH NARCOTICS POSSESSION: A 23-year-old Northville man was charged with possession of marijuana after his arrest on Silver Springs early Nov. 17.

Township police said they stopped the man for suspicion of driving while intoxicated.

Police asked the man to exit his vehicle to perform field sobriety tests, and a plastic bag reportedly was sticking out of his coat pocket when he emerged from the car.

Police confiscated the bag, which reportedly contained about a half-ounce of marijuana. The man told police the coat and marijuana were not his. He said he had borrowed the coat, but did not know the owner's name.

SUSPENDED LICENSE ARREST: A 24-year-old Northville woman was arrested for driving on a suspended license Nov. 19. City police stopped the woman at S. Center and Hines and found her license was suspended for failing to comply with a court judgment from Farmington Hills. She was released after posting a \$100 cash bond.

DRUNKEN DRIVING ARREST: A 61-year-old South Lyon man was charged with operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol late Nov. 20 after being stopped by city police for speeding on northbound Beck north of Eight Mile.

The man at first denied drinking any alcohol. After he failed attempts to recite the alphabet and count backward to a specified number, he admitted drinking two beers, and during a preliminary breathalyzer test he admitted drinking four to six. His blood alcohol level was measured at .14 percent, well above the state's .10 limit for operating under the influence.

INCIDENTS AT NORTHVILLE DOWNS: A car parked at Northville Downs had its driver's side window shattered sometime between 9:20-11:20 p.m. Nov. 20, causing an estimated \$250 in damage. The window was found completely shattered but still intact.

At 11:25 p.m., a Northville police officer patrolling the racetrack found toilet rolls on fire in two stalls in the lower clubhouse men's room. They were extinguished before any damage was done.

FENDER BENDER: City police reported two accidents last week. A 19-year-old New Baltimore man driving south on South Main Nov. 19 hit a car waiting to turn east onto Seven Mile at 6:45 p.m. He was issued a citation. The driver of the stopped car complained of whiplash but refused medical treatment at the scene, saying he would seek his own treatment.

Accident injures two

This was the result of an accident on Eight Mile at 3:55 p.m. last Wednesday when a 16-year-old Northville boy turning from northbound Lexington Boulevard west onto Eight Mile lost control of his vehicle. It spun into the eastbound lanes of Eight Mile and struck an eastbound car. The boy's car ended

up in bushes on a landscaped berm on the south side of Eight Mile, while the other car spun around and stopped in the entrance to Lexington Boulevard. Both drivers and a passenger in the second vehicle were taken to Providence Hospital in Novi, and both cars were towed from the scene.

Trash plan implementation may be a long time coming

Oakland County is stymied in its plans to implement the solid waste program narrowly approved by voters recently.

The governor's plan to restructure the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and problems with the Oakland's 641 plan — the legal blueprint for its solid waste program — have made it impossible for officials to move, rapidly or otherwise, said Roger Smith, county deputy director of solid waste management.

"But we hope to get the revised IGAs (Intergovernmental agreements) out to the individual communities by the end of the year," said Smith. "They will have until April to act on them."

Smith and others had hoped to move more rapidly to implement the recycling portion of the solid waste program approved by voters 70,908

to 70,685. But changes in Lansing make it difficult.

"We can't just move ahead, even though we got a yes vote," Smith said. "We can't even get going on recycling."

Gov. John Engler surprised Oakland County officials — and others — last week by announcing he wants to reorganize the DNR. Among other things, the governor would eliminate the Air Pollution Control Commission, the agency that was to hold public hearings on Oakland's proposed incinerator before acting on its operating permit.

That's a significant change, said Smith. If only because county officials — as well as those still opposed to the incinerator proposed in Auburn Hills — don't know what agency would perform that function.

"We've been in contact with the

governor's office," Smith said. "They said the changes (in the DNR) are too extensive to fax and they'd mail them to us. So far (Wednesday morning) we don't have them yet."

Smith said he is also concerned about changes DNR officials have told him they want in Oakland's 641 plan. He hasn't seen the proposed changes. Furthermore, Smith said he is confident they can be made. "But it adds to the uncertainty," he said.

Residents concerned that Oakland might be forced to import trash to keep the incinerator operating will be encouraged by one change Smith said the DNR wants.

"They (DNR officials) want specifics on our import-export policies," Smith said. "They want specifics about the trash Oakland imports and exports."

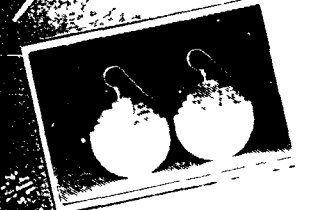

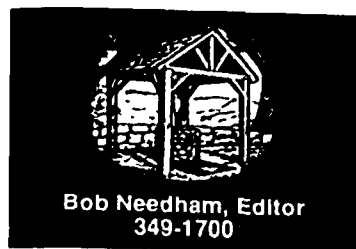

Drop elected officials from benefits plan

The revelation that Northville Township's part-time elected officials are eligible for and receive pensions and other benefits is very troubling.

Some full-time township employees are upset by this fact, especially when whispers of cutbacks in employee benefits may be more than mere rumor.

Taxpayers also should be concerned. With the township searching for spare change under every crack and crevice, and slapping new fees on a wide variety of programs, taxpayers should not take kindly to news of elected officials receiving non-essential perks. As the story of the township's financial obligations to politicians continues to unfold, the township board should move to dump this flawed, costly, and unfair system.

Members of the township board in 1981 voted to adopt a pension plan for all full-time employees. The plan included police chiefs, fire chiefs, building department employees, and all those who regularly worked 35 hours or more a week. In short, the plan was meant to cover full-time employees.

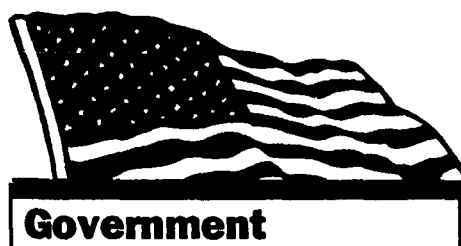
We have no quarrel with that premise. Obviously, those people serving in a career-type capacity should be afforded down-the-road protection.

The problem stems from the fact that members of the township executive committee — the supervisor, clerk, and treasurer — attached themselves, like a lampry to a salmon, to the pension plan. Those elected officials and their fellow board members took it upon themselves to provide politicians with perks afforded no other part-time township employee. That politicians looked after themselves first is evidenced by the township's two-year vesting period (meant to coincide with elected office terms).

With all the attention focused on the township's dismal financial outlook, it simply is inexcusable for politicians — not to mention those politicians with other jobs, pensions, etc. — to receive benefits other than their salaries.

Supervisor Betty Lennox and Clerk Tom Cook receive pension benefits from other sources, in addition to their township salaries. Cook also holds a full-time position at Ford, and by his estimation works 10-20 hours a week as township clerk. Additionally, the township employs a full-time deputy clerk, who is responsible for the bulk of the department's leg work.

Fifteen grand and a 12-percent pen-

sion for 10-20 hours a week makes the clerk's position perhaps the most attractive in the township.

Potential benefits to part-time elected officials are substantial. Politicians' salaries are augmented by an annual 12-percent pension contribution from the general fund. Employees are not required to match or supplement the township's contribution, so the salary for a part-time supervisor actually is closer to \$28,000, the clerk \$16,800.

When the politicians cut their ties to the township — and several have — they take along a chunk of general fund money from the pension plan. Payoffs for pension-vested politicians seem to be an unreasonable expense incurred by taxpayers. The policy simply needs to change.

The township should take an extremely close look at its pension policy for elected officials and either extend those benefits to all part-time employees or scrap the pension plan for everyone but full-timers. With the budget in shambles, it's easy to guess which way we think the township should go.

Several members of the township board said they were surprised that the executive committee is eligible for benefits. But two of those members, James Nowka and Richard Allen, along with Cook, voted for the pension ordinance in 1981. It's a bit frightening to think they approved a benefit plan they now don't recall.

Very few people actually knew about the existence of the executive committee pension agreement until recently. That's not hard to believe, given the jumble of numbers that comprises the township budget. The practice of obscuring employee benefit expenditures in the budget needs to change immediately, as does the political perks program.

The township board recently has suffered some well-deserved written and verbal shots. It can save face somewhat by repealing the right of its executive committee to receive benefits not extended to other hard-working township employees. This is a cut-and-dried case, and the cutting should begin now.

Rider home future still debated

Although the Rider House in Salem has been sold to a Livonia physician, members of the Salem Area Historical Society aren't quite ready to throw in the towel.

Until Tuesday, Nov. 5, the historic landmark at 7912 South Street was owned by Salem Township. The board of trustees advertised for bids last month, voting to accept Sean Coyle's high bid of \$1,300 at its November meeting.

Donald Riddering, president of the historical society and member of the planning commission, has asked Coyle to withdraw his bid. At this point, Coyle said he doesn't know if he can legally do that and isn't sure he wants to. Salem Township board members said they aren't sure if withdrawing the bid is legal either.

The Livonia resident said he was not aware residents opposed the sale of the Rider House until recently, when he visited the township hall to show the house to his wife. Although he hasn't paid the township yet, Coyle said he bought the home intending to move it to a piece of land in Livonia. He plans to use it as his residence and is currently checking into the cost of moving it from the township property.

Neither of the two bidders for the Rider House attended the Nov. 5 board meeting, during which historical society members offered to form a historical commission to seek state or federal grants for the upkeep of the house.

Coyle said the historical society has not formally discussed the Rider House with him and feels he can't comment further on the matter.

"It's my feeling the township would have sold the house to the historical society even if they had bid only \$5," said Coyle. "I can't be certain — it's just my feeling."

Riddering said the historical society did not bid on the home because they believe it should be left where it is to preserve the integrity of the 19th-century hamlet of Salem.

However, later he did question whether not bidding on the house was the right decision for historical society members to have made.

Until the evening of the Salem board meeting, Riddering said, he thought no bids had been submitted, since two Salem Township residents had decided not to bid on the house after they talked to the historical society.

The home, built in 1897 by Fred Rider, currently stands on the township hall property, which is located at 96000 Six Mile Road. Fred Rider's grandfather, Capt. Ira Rider, was one of the first settlers in Salem, coming to the area in 1831.

John Lewis, the first black settler in the area, constructed the stone foundation of the home. Because these early families are tied to the Rider House, members of the historical society feel the home should stay put. They've even offered to help find an acceptable public use for the home and form a historical commission to help solicit state grants for its restoration.

Their offer was declined by township board members when they approved a motion to sell the Rider House to Sean Coyle.

At the Nov. 5 meeting, clerk Nancy Geiger and trustees Thomas Homrich and Ferman Rohraff approved a

motion to sell the home because they believe it would cost too much money to bring the house up to current building codes. The township's estimate was around \$75,000. The two problems that need immediate attention are a leaky roof and broken furnace.

Trustee Ferman Rohraff, who cast the deciding vote last week, was unavailable for comment.

Supervisor Michael Geary and Treasurer Suzanne Withoff joined with residents last week saying the leaking roof should have been taken care of last year.

Minutes from the trustee's Oct. 2, 1990 meeting read that the board received a roofing bid from ARK Enterprises in the amount of \$2,917.

Withoff said this week she made a motion to reject the bid in 1990 because the bidder did not mention doing the underlying work, only re-shingling the roof. As a part of her 1990 motion, Withoff stated that the township should readvertise for bids. Clerk Nancy Geiger seconded that motion.

It is up to the clerk's office to readvertise, Withoff said, adding that, for one reason or another, perhaps feeling that November was too late in the year to be re-roofing the home, that did not happen at that time or in the spring when the weather was warmer.

Without checking the minutes of those meetings, Geiger said later, she could not comment on the matter.

Withoff noted that the re-roofing of the Rider House should have appeared on the board's November 1990 agenda under old business and been discussed at that time. However, that did not happen.

The roofing situation of a year ago

was brought up at the meeting, as well as apparent hard feelings between the township and historical society dating back 15 years. Rohraff mentioned at that time that the township was responsible for the formation of the historical society.

Riddering refutes that statement, saying the township simply donated money 15 years ago to the historical society for a bicentennial celebration. Riddering this week said he obtained, under the state's Freedom of Information Act, the minutes from the meeting approving that donation.

Riddering said Geiger, Rohraff and Trustee Thomas Homrich's discussion at the Nov. 5 meeting "centered on some vague dissatisfaction with the historical society in 1976." According to the minutes of Salem's June 1, 1976 meeting, the board contributed \$100 to the Salem Area Historical Society and the Salem Bicentennial Entertainment Committee.

Riddering said he believes the board, dissatisfied with the way that money was spent 15 years ago, is allowing this to cloud its judgment on the Rider House issue.

Geiger said this week that the board's decision to sell the Rider House has nothing to do with the donation made 15 years ago.

She added that accusations that the township boards wants nothing to do with the historical society are not true.

Homrich said this week he was not involved in township government 15 years ago and had nothing to do with that donation. Joining the board just a year ago, after serving eight years on the planning commission, Homrich said the only current board members who served 15 years ago are Geiger and Rohraff.

Just what do they mean when label reads reserve

Value-laden descriptors adorn the modern-day, domestic wine label. The consumer is faced with *Reserve*, *Proprietor's Reserve*, *Private Reserve*, *Private Selection*, *Cellar Selection*, and *Special Selection* to name a few. If vineyard designations and proprietary names are added, the array of descriptive words borders on bewildering.

Do the host of wines bearing such designations merit the mark of distinction they confer? Are these loaded terms persuasive marketing devices for the uninitiated wine drinker?

Italy has particular laws governing the use of the descriptors *riserva* and *riserva speciale* on the label. *Riserva* wines are aged in wood one year longer than a non-reserve wine. *Riserva speciale* wines receive two to three years' additional aging in wood before bottling.

Domestic wine laws do not regulate the use of reserve label designations and only a few wineries employing them make an effort to inform consumers of their meaning. Are these phrases a guarantee of high quality or merely a sales gimmick?

Sonoma County's Simi Winery looked to Webster's to define their focus. "Reserve means to set apart or to hold for the future," says president Zelma Long. "This clearly expresses our intention — to create wines of exceptional quality that will age well."

Jim Clendenen, winemaker at Au Bon Climat Winery, Los Olivos, Calif., says, "The concept of a reserve wine is always relative to the producer's regular line of wines. It means nothing in relation to products produced by other wineries. The only thing a well-intentioned winery can guarantee is that their reserve wine will be closer to an optimal expression of their stylistic intentions than will any of their regular bottlings."

Beringer Vineyard's winemaker Ed Sbragia says, "Private Reserve has traditionally designated our best wine. We want to be able to put our best lots of wine into a blend in order to make the best wine possible in a particular style."

Winemaker Paul Dolan of Fetzer Vineyards says, "Developing reserve wines gives us a chance to take small quantities of the very best wines we produce and craft them into special wines with no compromises. Instead of just disappearing into our regular wine program, they provide us with a challenge and enhance our image as a winery producing a super-premium product."

If the reserve designation does not correspond to a special quality in the wine, then it is just a marketing tool, successful or not, depending upon the public's gullibility.

Certainly, the term reserve has been degraded by some wineries seeking to justify a higher price rather than greater quality.

Special designations have been overused on wine labels, and the public has been misled in certain cases. How about Reserve White Zinfandel or Reserve White Grenache? Give us a break!

"Let the consumer beware!" says one winemaker. "The consumer paying \$5 a bottle for a reserve wine is having delusions of grandeur. The customer paying \$20 plus buys by the reputation of the individual product."

Understanding of what reserve wines mean has been lost in large volume, inexpensive wines that use the same designations. If they haven't been lost, they've been debased.

WINE SELECTIONS OF THE WEEK

1990 Mitchelton Coldridge Estate, Semillon-Chardonnay (\$6). This Australian white wine is the best value we have tasted recently. Made principally from semillon, the most widely planted white variety in Australia, it boasts fresh fruit character and good body with no oak to mask the fruit.

1987 Beringer Private Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon, Napa Valley (\$35). Speaking of reserve wines, here is one of the very best in California. Elevated aromas emphasize spice and blackberry with hints of cranberry and leather glove. Everything promised on the nose is delivered on the palate.

1987 Creston Vineyards Cabernet Sauvignon, Paso Robles (\$12) represents a delicious example of what is being produced on California's Central Coast. Blackberry and black cherry characters are enhanced by attractive oak in a complex mouthful for the money.



The choice is yours: go for the traditional trimmings, or try turkey with a new twist

Turkey two ways

Follow these steps to cook a traditional bird

Here are directions from turkey-cooking pros on preparing and storing a flavorful, golden brown bird.

1. THAWING

(If turkey is not frozen, begin with step 2.) Do not thaw poultry at room temperature. Leave turkey in original packaging and use one of the following methods:

No hurry: Place wrapped turkey on a tray in refrigerator for 3 to 4 days. Allow 5 hours per pound of turkey to completely thaw.

Fastest: Place wrapped turkey in sink and cover with cold water. Allow about 1/2 hour per pound of turkey to completely thaw. Change water frequently.

Refrigerate or cook turkey when it is thawed. Refreezing uncooked turkey is not recommended.

Commercially frozen stuffed turkeys should not be thawed before roasting.

2. PREPARATION

All equipment and materials used for storage, preparation and serving of poultry must be clean. Wash hands thoroughly with hot soapy water before and after handling raw poultry. Use plastic or acrylic cutting boards to prepare poultry, instead of wood, which can harbor bacteria.

Remove plastic wrapping from thawed turkey. Remove giblets and neck from the body and neck cavities.

Giblets can be simmered separately on top of the stove for addition to giblet gravy, if desired. Use small pan to which water has been added.

To remove neck, it may be necessary to release legs from band or skin or wire fastener. (Wire fasteners can be hard to remove; use pliers, if necessary, to unhook.)

Rinse turkey inside and out with cool water, pat dry with a paper towel and re-

turn legs to wire fastener or band of skin, or tie loosely.

Tuck tips of wings "akimbo" under back of turkey. Neck skin should be skewered with poultry pin or round toothpick to back of turkey to provide a neat appearance for serving whole at table.

3. ROASTING

Place turkey, breast side up, on flat rack in shallow roasting pan, about 2 inches deep. Insert meat thermometer deep into thickest part of thigh, next to body, not touching bone.

Brush turkey skin with vegetable oil to prevent drying. Turkey is done when meat thermometer registers 180 F to 185 F and drumstick is soft and moves easily at joint.

When the skin of the turkey is golden brown, shield breast loosely with rectangular-shaped piece of lightweight foil to prevent overbrowning.

(Turkey can be placed in a commercial browning bag following manufacturer's directions, or completely enclosed in foil, which is opened and folded back just before turkey is done so bird can brown.)

4. STUFFING

Spoon prepared dressing loosely into body and neck cavities of turkey just prior to roasting. The stuffing should reach an internal temperature of 160 to 165 F to be sufficiently cooked.

Remove stuffing from turkey immediately after roasting. Extra stuffing can be cooked separately in a covered casserole in the oven.

5. STORAGE

Refrigerate turkey as soon as possible to prevent spoilage, no more than an hour or two after removing from the oven. Cut turkey meat from bones before storing. Cooked turkey will keep several days in covered containers when refrigerated.

Wing it with progressive '90s-style Thanksgiving

Only in America — a holiday dedicated solely to eating! But even in America the Thanksgiving picture is changing.

Fewer get-togethers resemble the Norman Rockwell ideal — the extended family gathered around the groaning board: Grandma dishing out her secret recipe dressing, Aunts, uncles, cousins — apple-cheeked, shiny-eyed, knives and forks at the ready.

Families today tend to be smaller and more mothers work outside the home and don't feel like spending the whole day in the kitchen while Dad watches football games. All that work just for the sake of the traditional feeding frenzy.

And there are more singles now than ever. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, more than 73 million adults were single in 1990, "a stunning increase of 35 million from just two decades ago." In fact, the percentage of adults who are not married has increased from 28 percent in 1970 to 41 percent today.

So, if you are a small, busy family or a single person, or just want to do something more simple for your Thanksgiving celebration and a big bird doesn't fit into your holiday picture, consider preparing a meal starring turkey portions. Put your microwave to work and pare your menu by using turkey parts.

If you want to do something radically different from the turkey, dressing, cranberry routine, how about a Thanksgiving barbecue? Turkey portions (drumsticks, wings, thighs, breast) can be partially cooked in the microwave and then transferred to the grill for final cooking. Precook pieces by microwaving 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of parts for 15 minutes at medium high (70 percent power). Then grill for 20 to 25 minutes, basting frequently with barbecue sauce.

A bone-in or boneless breast is all white meat, if that is your preference. Or try turkey breast tenderloins, the muscle from the center breast; they're boneless, skinless, tender, practically fat-free, and a snap to microwave.

If you have fond memories of gnawing

on the drumstick at family gatherings in days gone, you no longer need to buy the complete bird in order to indulge in this nostalgic feast. Drumsticks can be purchased separately, as well as hind quarters (thigh and drumstick attached), perfect for dark-meat aficionados.

How much to order? Allow about 1/4 pound boneless turkey meat per person. If serving in meat, figure on about 3/4 pound per serving.

Refrigerate turkey parts at 40 F one to two days after purchase, or freeze up to 6 months. Because you can't tell exactly how long meats will stay fresh, these are conservative, short-time estimates. You may keep the turkey longer, but risk spoilage. Vacuum-sealed packages should keep for two weeks in the refrigerator, but use within several days after opening.

This year, microwave your way to a new tradition.

Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.

MICRO-TIP OF THE WEEK:

For best results, before cooking any turkey in the microwave, always defrost thoroughly, trim excess fat, rinse well and pat dry with paper towel.

Beer lover's simmered drumsticks
2 1/2 to 3 pounds turkey drumsticks
1 cup bottled barbecue sauce
1/2 cup beer
2 tablespoons dark brown sugar, packed

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Yields 4 servings
Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 1 hour and 15 minutes to 1 1/2 hours.

Oven setting: High (100 percent power); Low-Defrost (30 percent power)

Wash thawed drumsticks and pat dry. Arrange in oblong microwave-safe baking dish with meatier ends facing outward.

Spoiled bird can spoil holiday

Defrosted on the counter, pre-stuffed, slow-baked, partially cooked, stored whole without carving, ...?

If any of these situations sounds like your usual Thanksgiving dinner preparation plans, you may be putting your turkey in jeopardy.

Over the last six years, USDA's staff on the Meat and Poultry Hotline have faced many challenges trying to save Thanksgiving turkeys that have been prepared in questionable ways. "It's difficult to advise consumers on Thanksgiving Day that the turkey they have worked so hard to serve may not be fit to eat," said Susan Templin Conley, Hotline manager.

According to Conley, there are six basic problems that Hotline staff members hear every year. Read on to see if you may unknowingly be creating any of these scenarios.

● **MISTAKE 1. Defrosting at room temperature.**

"We've always done it that way. . . There's no room in the refrigerator. . . We forgot it in the trunk of the car. . . It's in the cold basement." While there are many reasons why consumers find themselves with turkeys defrosted at room temperature, some planned and some unplanned, the result is the same — a potentially unsafe turkey. Bacteria grow rapidly at room temperature. Bacteria will begin to grow on the outside portion of the bird that defrosts first. These surface bacteria can multiply to dangerously high levels that cooking may not destroy.

Instead, plan on one day of refrigerator defrost time for every 5 pounds of turkey. A 10-pound turkey will take approximately 2 days to defrost in the refrigerator, a 15-pound turkey 3 days and a 20-pound turkey 4 days.

Some callers worry that a frozen turkey will spoil if left in the refrigerator for four days. Don't be concerned. Even after a turkey fully defrosts, it is safe in the refrigerator for an additional 1-2 days.

If you forget to take your turkey out of the freezer early enough, don't panic. You're not in hot water yet, especially if you remember to use the Cold Water technique. Even a 20-pound frozen turkey can be defrosted in 10 hours using the cold water defrost method. Submerge the wrapping bird in cold water, adding ice or new cold water ever 30 minutes.

● **MISTAKE 2. Prestuffing a turkey the night before.**

It's okay to prestuff Christmas stockings, but not Thanksgiving birds! Stuffing a turkey the night before is risky business. The cavity of the bird actually insulates the stuffing from the cold temperatures, and can keep the stuffing in a temperature range that encourages bacterial growth.

Instead, prepare dry stuffing ingredients the day before. Tightly cover and leave at room temperature. The perishables — butter, or margarine, mushrooms, oysters, cooked celery and onion, broth — should be refrigerated. Combine the dry and wet ingredients and stuff the bird immediately before the turkey goes into the oven.

● **MISTAKE 3. Cooking at low temperatures overnight.**

Cooking below 325 F is unsafe because low temperatures permit the bird (and the stuffing) to remain in the "danger zone" (40-140 F) too long. While in this "zone" bacteria can grow and some produce heat-resistant toxins.

Instead, cook parishable foods at an oven temperature no lower than 325 F.

● **MISTAKE 4. Partially cooking a bird the day before.**

Some time-savers are safer than others. Partially cooking a turkey is not one of them. Interrupted cooking can actually increase the possibility of bacterial growth. The turkey may be heated long enough to activate bacterial growth, but not long enough to kill it.

Instead, cook the turkey completely in one operation. Several other ideas for SAFE time saving include using oven cooking bags, baking stuffing separately from the turkey, cooking and carving the turkey 1 to 2 days before the holidays, and storing it in the refrigerator for reheating on the big day.

● **Mistake 5. Cooking a turkey ahead of time and leaving it whole in the refrigerator.**

Cooking the turkey a day or two before the holiday is fine, but refrigerating the bird whole, without carving,

will take approximately 2 days to defrost in the refrigerator, a 15-pound turkey 3 days and a 20-pound turkey 4 days.

Every year Hotline staff members worry about "how low consumers will go" when it comes to the oven temperature settings. On Thanksgiving Day in 1990, Hotline staff talked with numerous families who calmly slept the night away while their turkeys were busily multiplying on their turkeys in 200 F ovens. Christmas gifts galore in Canton, Plymouth

Those shopping for special Christmas gifts don't have to travel far. There's plenty to choose from in the Plymouth-Canton community.

"Hopefully, it's the charm and the fact that we have some different, unique things to offer," Dodson said. She likes the friendly shopowners and relaxed pace of the Plymouth community.

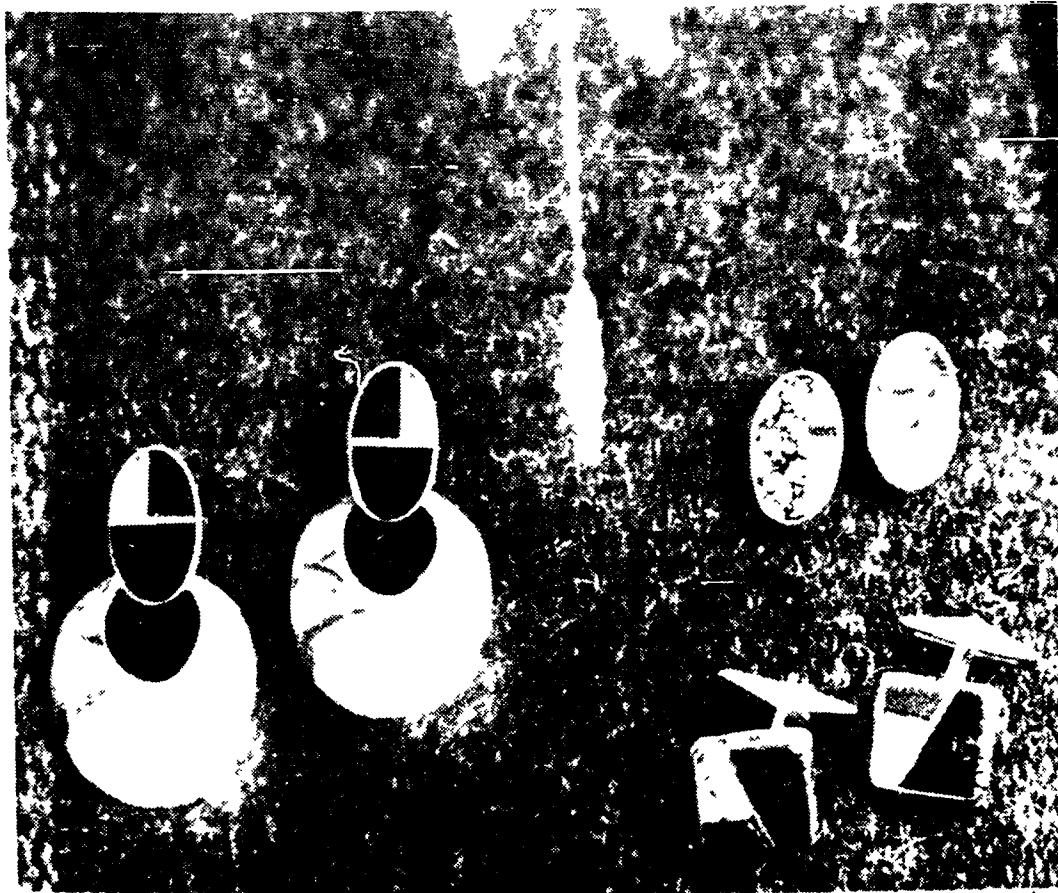

Bishops Oast House! What is an Oast House?

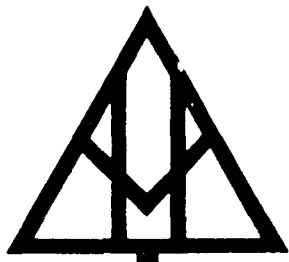
Oast houses ("oast" means "to burn") were used to dry hops and sometimes malt on the hop farms in England. The hops were hand-picked, measured, and transported in coarse-woven sacks, called "pokes", to the oast house for drying. Oast houses were constructed from ragstone, a beautiful stone quarried in England since Roman times. The round structures had conical, shingled roofs that were topped by white wooded cowls that guided the smoke from the drying fires out over the countryside. Inside, a slatted wooden shelf was raised 12 to 16 feet from the ground. The still-moist hops were spread out on a horse-hair cloth to dry in a current of warm air from an open coal fire. Oast houses were an important part of hop farming in England from 1850 to around 1950.

“One Against the Wind” recalls wartime heroism

Davis, Neill solid; script, direction excel

The name of Mary Lindell may mean little today, even for students of history. But for hundreds of Allied soldiers and airmen downed in occupied France during World War II, the name “Marie Claire” meant everything—it meant freedom.

Defying Nazi threats on her life, Lindell was unswerving in her commitment, even after a dismal nine-months' imprisonment. By war's end, her “Marie Claire” line had helped hundreds of otherwise-trapped Allied servicemen to escape from German hands.

Now, the prestigious Hallmark Hall of Fame, in its 170th production, brings Lindell's dramatic story to life in “One Against the Wind,” airing Sunday, Dec. 1, on CBS. Assembling the production team for this project was a labor of love for executive producer Karen Mack, who resolved in 1987 to bring this dramatic story to the screen. Larry Elikann, known for the powerful “I Know My First Name Is Steven,” directed the movie from a script by Chris Bryant (“Young Catherine”). Judy Davis (“A Passage to India”) heads the cast as Lindell, with fine support from Denholm Elliot (“A Room With a View”) and her co-star from 1979's “My Brilliant Career,” Sam Neill.

Neill, who is known for his taut performances in films like “Dead Calm” and “The Hunt for Red October,” plays James Leggatt, the

first man whom Mary Lindell helps to escape. Later an intelligence officer in the British army, Leggatt aids Lindell in her efforts, and their obvious mutual attraction only increases their devotion to their cause.

In preparing for the role, Neill did the usual amount of research, reading the archival materials the filmmakers had prepared for him. He also had an advantage in his personal life. “People asked me, ‘How did you prepare to play a British army major?’ I said it wasn't difficult—I grew up with one.”

Neill's father had, indeed, been a major in the British army, but had never discussed his experience until shortly before his death. “He finally did describe that critical period of his life to me,” the actors says gratefully. “It was an accident, really,” he says, that his father's reminiscences dovetailed with work he would shortly begin on “One Against the Wind.” The information was especially helpful, says Neill, because the real James Leggatt is deceased. “I couldn't find out a lot about him,” he says.

Davis' preparations for playing Lindell were aided by the presence of Lindell's son, Maurice (played superbly in the film by young Christien Anholt). Davis particularly treasures Mr. Lindell's reactions after first watching a scene she was in. When the cameras stopped, he rushed forward to say how accurately she had portrayed

his mother. “It was a very emotional moment,” says Davis.

Filmed in Luxembourg (“a slightly schizophrenic country,” jokes Neill, “It doesn't know if it's Belgium or France or Germany.”), this latest Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation is full of very emotional moments, all the while retaining an accurate historical atmosphere and never feeling contrived. Bryant's teleplay does a masterful job of compressing a lot of information into a brief period of time.

It is the performances of the actors, however, that give the film its strength, especially Davis' rich, human Mary Lindell. Neill is quietly powerful as Leggatt and Elliot's portrayal of a pragmatic priest passionately dedicated to Lindell's work is up to his usual standard of excellence.

Amid a constant barrage of “searing, true-life dramas” and “sweeping historical epics,” it may be easy for viewers to miss projects such as this. That would be a shame, for “One Against the Wind” is first-caliber filmmaking. Both entertaining and educational, it sheds light on the life and work of a woman fiercely dedicated to the idea, and the reality, of freedom.

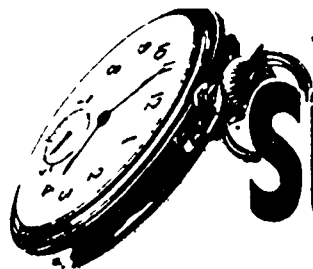

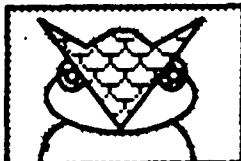

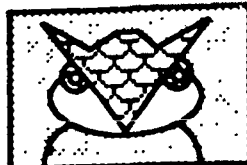

Free curriculum-support materials will also be provided to schools.

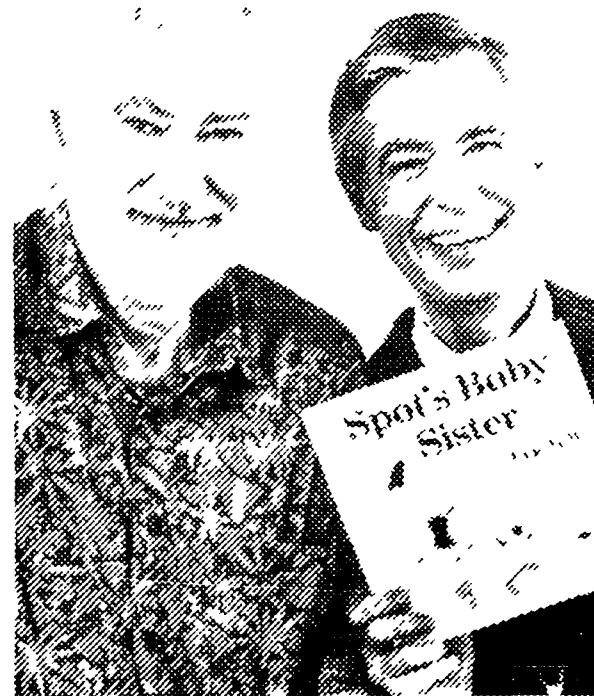
