Fire destroys inside of house

A Christmas visit turned tragic for a Northville family, but the family's late arrival home may have averted a larger tragedy.

Wayne and Mary Kay Pryce and their two young children were out visiting relatives Wednesday afternoon, Dec. 25 when a fire tore through their 225 South Ely Drive home. The blaze damaged much of the home's interior but extinguished itself without burning through to the outside of the house.

By the time the Pryces returned home at 9:30 that evening, the fire was out.

"Really, from the outside the house looks normal," said city Fire Chief Jim Allen. "Everything was in the front room and burned itself out. It used up all the oxygen in the house."

Though several windows were broken, the house's storm windows held firm and kept the fire from reaching fresh air.

Allen, in a bewildered tone of voice, said it was one of the most unusual fire runs his department has ever made.

"We didn't use a drop of water; the fire was out when we got there," he said. "And nothing had to be boarded up. To close up the house we just had

to lock the front door.

"I can't recall ever seeing anything quite like that, a fire of that magnitude that just burned itself out."

Before it died out, however, the fire claimed the life of the Pryces' dog, which was found in the basement. It also destroyed the family's just-opened presents and melted a just-constructed model railroad track that ran around the Christmas tree.

"The front room is totally burnt, the furniture, the Christmas tree, the walls, and there's smoke and soot damage throughout the house," Allen said.

But he said the toll could have been much greater.

"If (the Pryces) had come home earlier and opened the door (while the fire was still burning), they could have got the backdraft, and it could have blown them across the street," he said.

Firefighters searched for the origin of the blaze Dec. 25 and 26, but had not determined the exact cause by press time. The Christmas tree and a nativity set were ruled out because they were found unplugged.

A wall clock stopped at 5:30 p.m., Allen said, indicating that the fire was still raging at that point. "The heat melted the clock," he said. "It

was actually running, but the face had melted and the hands couldn't go around.

"The keys on the piano melted together. It got that hot in there."

For the Pryces, the tragedy has turned into a demonstration of neighborly goodwill.

"Luckily we have a lot of friends at the First Baptist Church, and a lot of good neighbors who were able to put us up for the night and take care of us," Wayne Pryce said.

Pryce was still sifting through the ashes of his home Thursday afternoon, Dec. 26, but he hoped to be done with the task soon.

"I've got an insurance adjuster over there now," he said. "I'll be leaving about four o'clock; I can't stand going in and out of there . . ."

Donations to the Pryces may be sent to the First Baptist Church of Northville, 217 N. Wing St., Northville 48167. Pastor Stephen Sparks said the family's main concern is finding a house to rent while their home is being rebuilt.

"The problem is the time lag," Sparks said. "I would assume that it may take them three months to get the place refurbished . . . The thing that they're hoping to avoid is staying in a hotel all that time with two little kids."

School head discusses 1991, 1992

Northville Public Schools Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski took over as the school district's superintendent in October after George Bell retired last summer. Rezmierski, the district's former executive director of special education, recently discussed his three months as Northville schools' top administrator, and the months ahead, with Northville Record reporter Suzanne Holter. The text of that interview follows.

RECORD: Finances have been a big issue in Northville schools this year. What have you been able to do to help cut costs?

REZMIERSKI: This is the only building (administrative offices at 501 W. Main St.) that will be open during the holidays under our cost-saving approach. All the people who are required to work and who choose to work, because some can take vacation, will work in teams in this building only. All the other ones will be closed.

RECORD: How much will that save?

REZMIERSKI: We don't know yet. We won't know until we get all the utility bills in and figure everything out. We're hoping that we're looking at maybe \$5,000-\$8,000. That's a rough guess.

RECORD: You're still going to have to heat the empty buildings.

REZMIERSKI: You just drop it down. You zone heat it. We can under our computer program, for example, keep it appropriate for plants and animals. Those that remain. We can do security checks from time to time.

But by and large, there will be minimal movement and loss of heat or electrical use or water use. We hope this will produce a savings. If so, we will continue it and look at other ways throughout the year that we can do cost saving measures that don't affect much of anything, frankly, as far programming goes.

RECORD: Are buildings usually open on weekends?

REZMIERSKI: Some are that are scheduled for activities. That's another thing we're looking at is what ways could we be more cost efficient, and not have every bloody building open but, in fact, maybe these two are open and can adequately handle everybody who has that evening where they want to do something.

We want to be responsible and respectful to those groups. But at the same time, if we can condense a few of them and you've got to drive a little bit further, we're not that far out. You go from Moraine to Winchester, it's

Downtown stores report break-ins

Nearly \$800 in cash and \$2,300 in clothing were stolen from city businesses the weekend before Christmas.

Freydl's clothing stores on Main Street and the Bookstall On The Main were broken into sometime between 8 p.m. Friday, Dec. 20 and 8:40 a.m. the next day, while the Cleanarama dry cleaning store on Dunlap was broken into sometime between 7 p.m. Friday and 3:30 a.m. the next day.

City police believe the break-ins are related, and have launched an investigation into the crimes.

At Freydl's, the someone apparently got into the two clothing stores at 112 and 118 E. Main St. by forcing open a window on the building's west side. A total of \$368 in currency was stolen from stores' safe and cash register, and six pairs of leather gloves valued at \$150 were taken from a display case at the front of the men's store.

While inside the Main Street building, the thief or thieves apparently

also entered the Bookstall On The Main at 116 E. Main, stealing \$174 from that store's register.

An estimated \$250 in cash and nearly \$2,000 in clothing was stolen from Cleanarama at 123 E. Dunlap, where the thief or thieves apparently got in by prying open the front door.

"The door was pried onto with so much force (that) the bolt and door was pulled away from the door jamb and the actual bolt was pulled out of the door," according to the police report.

Once inside, the intruder or intruders rifled through the cash register and counter drawer, netting \$250 in currency and \$4 in change. The currency included 50 \$1 bills.

Also taken were more than \$2,000 in customers' clothes. The clothing, all size 44 coats and size 36 by 32 pants, included a grey suit with blue pinstripes, a grey wool suit, a brown wool suit, a black tuxedo with silk lapels, and a brown top coat with fur lining.

A rear door was found unlocked, leading police to speculate that the intruder or intruders left the building that way.

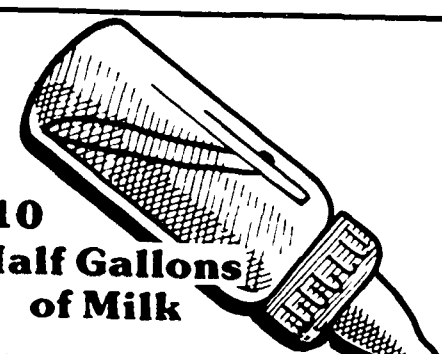

Heintz adjusts to new position

Susan Heintz made a big move up the political ladder when she left her job as Wayne County commissioner in April to work directly under Gov. John Engler.

Heintz was the only Republican elected official in Wayne County when she was a commissioner from 1987 to 1991. She had just started her third term when she was appointed as the director of Engler's Southeastern Michigan offices at 1200 Sixth Street in Detroit.

Heintz described her job as "the eyes and ears of the governor in Southeastern Michigan."

Much of her time is spent representing the governor at functions he cannot attend, such as meetings of New Detroit and the Southeastern Michigan Council of Government.

Heintz said she makes recommendations to the governor as to whom he should appoint to boards and commissions, and she also acts as Engler's spokesperson for the media.

The main difference between the two jobs is that she was elected to the position of Wayne County commissioner and was appointed to the Engler job, Heintz said.

"When you're an elected official, you set your own policy; when you're appointed, you represent the policies of the person you're appointed by," Heintz said.

Working under Engler, Heintz had to drop her membership on several boards and commissions. When she makes an appearance, "People know that I only represent one thing and that is Gov. Engler," Heintz said.

Even though she is working under a Republican governor, Heintz says she works just as much or more with Democrats as she did at her previous job. This is because Wayne County is her main concern as the director of Gov. Engler's Southeastern office, she said.

"People that I would have talked with once a month before, such as Mayor Young's office, I am dealing with on a daily basis," Heintz said. "A lot more interaction goes on than people realize between Democrats and Republicans."

Heintz said she has more responsibility at her new job than her previous one.

"It's a whole new form of government for me," Heintz said. "Even though Wayne County is the 13th largest county in the United States, it is nowhere near the size or complex-

ity of state government."

Heintz has been working on many social programs such as using public transportation to move the unemployed to the suburbs to find work.

She is also involved with County-Care, a managed health care system for people without insurance. The program tries to get poor people to visit health centers supported with county money instead of waiting until their condition is so bad they have to go to the emergency room and can-

not pay the bill.

Heintz was working for Chevrolet when she was appointed as a Northville Township trustee. She moved from township clerk to township supervisor before becoming Wayne County Commissioner.

Heintz was raised in a political atmosphere. Her father was the mayor of Mt. Clemens while she was growing up.

Although she "liked what she saw," Heintz said she did not ever think she would end up in government herself.

Northville residents are "not surprised" with Heintz's appointment to her new job, said Fry Road resident Regina Laramee.

"People have been expecting her to move up the political ladder because of her capabilities," Laramee said.

Northville resident Sharon Robinson said she was unfamiliar with Heintz's new duties. "But knowing her as I do, I'm sure she is out there doing her best and being involved with everything," she said.

Heintz said she is happy with her new job. "I just can't wait to get to work in the morning. I never would have dreamed I would ever have a job like this in my life," Heintz said.

Rider House buyer withdraws bid

It appears now the historic Rider House will not be moved from Salem Township any time too soon.

At the Salem Township Board meeting Dec. 3, Clerk Nancy Geiger read a letter from Sean Coyle withdrawing his bid on the historic landmark, located on the township hall property on Six Mile Road.

"When I placed my bid I did so in good faith. But due to the intense political controversy I withdraw my previous bid," Coyle wrote in his letter to the township board.

The township solicited bids for the removal of the house; two sealed bids were opened at the board's Nov. 5 meeting. The high bid — Coyle's bid of \$1,300 — was accepted by a 3-2 vote. Many residents and members of the township historical society objected to the fact that the Rider House would be taken out of Salem Township.

In an interview following that meeting, Coyle said he was not aware of the controversy surrounding the removal of the Rider House prior to placing his bid. He didn't attend the Nov. 5 meeting, and the first he heard of any controversy sur-

rounding his bid was when he came into Salem to drop off his check. At that time, the sales agreement wasn't ready for him to sign.

Following the meeting, Coyle said he wasn't sure if withdrawing his bid was legal and didn't know if he even wanted to.

After she read the letter from Coyle, Geiger read a statement of her own. Geiger said removing the Rider House is not a case of economics, as *The Ann Arbor News* contends, but a long-range planning issue.

Geiger made a motion to accept Coyle's letter of withdrawal, rescind the board's action of Nov. 5 accepting the bid, and plan a work session to determine goals for township properties and form committees to deal with the Rider House, compensation and other issues.

Trustee Thomas Homrich seconded the motion and the board passed it unanimously.

Treasurer Suzanne Withoff read a proposal from the Salem Area Historical Society which was given to her just prior to the meeting. The proposal stated that the historical society is interested in fixing up and maintaining the Rider House. The society asked that no action be taken until the

board's March 3, 1992 meeting so members and township residents can put a formal proposal together.

No action was taken on the proposal. Supervisor Michael Geary said the historical society's interest in helping maintain the building is covered in general under Geiger's proposal.

Donald Riddering, a member of the historical society, urged the board to accept the group's help, give them the time to study possible uses for the house, and establish a historic district commission to protect the hamlet.

"We need to develop a sensitivity and appreciation for what we have," said Riddering.

Although the board took no action on Riddering's suggestions, board members agreed to pursue a grant application from the Michigan Department of Commerce. Geary said he received a letter from the department advising him of Salem's eligibility for a grant. Over \$1 million has been awarded to communities with a population under 10,000 for cultural projects.

Friday, following the meeting, Riddering said he planned to work with the board filling out the application in an effort to meet the department's Jan. 15 deadline.

not that far.

RECORD: When you rent the buildings to groups, do you make a profit?

REZMIERSKI: We're looking at that, but we know the plight they're in. We don't charge enough to make a profit. In fact, our costs impede in some cases. We try to minimize it by asking how many custodians do we need, can we zone the time, can we zone the location of the building, do we need the whole building up. For example at the high school, if we're going to have a number of events, we would rather keep them in one wing of the building rather than keeping the whole, bloody place open.

Not only can we patrol the building correctly, but then we've got to light and heat everything as if it has 1,000 people in it. That oftentimes isn't the case. We're trying to look at practical ways that are cost-saving measures that really are common sense. That's what we want to implement, common-sense thinking that saves us money.

Even if we didn't have this dilemma we're in, we would still move to these common-sense measures because it just makes sense.

RECORD: What other big issues have you dealt with since taking over as superintendent?

REZMIERSKI: I would say from the personal point of view, the ones that first took me were the injuries to our kids and our staff in a car accident. (Three students and a district employee were injured in two separate automobile accidents in early September.) Having the opportunity to visit them, our students and our employee, in the hospital, that was one of the hardest things.

Things were just getting started, and here was this tragic situation. Thank goodness it didn't get worse.

That was the first and most traumatic thing that happened this year. It's not like you're talking about arguing legislation and budget issues that are important, but you see people going through a tragic situation.

RECORD: On the budgetary side of your job, what have you had to deal with since taking on the superintendency?

REZMIERSKI: That would be all of the understandings and misunderstandings with the State Aid Act, and the resolutions and the tax base sharing and the recapture. Really, if you will, getting the facts from the fantasies.

I think I've mentioned to the board, we've received three different quotes on what we are going to be out in money and what we would be responsible for. And really they were absolutely all over the place.

(The Northville school district loses money out of its budget each year because it falls out of the state funding formula. Because the district is considered out-of-formula, it is does not receive per-pupil funding, and it is required to pay for state-mandated programs with local property taxes.)

It turned out, when we finally got the facts from (Director of Business and Finance John) Street's investigative work and the reports we got, to be whittled down to a quarter of a million dollars.

That probably was one of the first months. That's an interesting thing to get into as superintendent, cutting out a quarter million dollars. With the goal to protect programs and people. We were able to accomplish that because we have people that are creative.

The lawsuits would be next. The most recent one being the tax-base sharing lawsuit. (A suit was filed in early December against six school districts in Wayne County to prevent them from making their payment to a

state tax base sharing law.)

Just the whole litigious society we're in, it's amazing how much litigation comes to a school system just by the nature of being a school system.

We're probably the most accessible governmental unit. You can't get to Lansing or Washington, D.C., but you certainly can find the board of education and the superintendent.

RECORD: How many lawsuits is the school district involved in?

REZMIERSKI: We have the continuation lawsuit with the (Michigan Out of Formula District Association) on the recapture.

RECORD: That's a case where you are suing the state. (Northville and other school districts that fall out of the state's funding formula are suing the state to stop a Legislative move to "recapture" money that was allocated to fund state-mandated programs. In recent years, the Legislature has stopped funding certain programs in out-of-formula districts. The lawsuit seeks to stop recaptures.)

REZMIERSKI: We're suing the state, right. That's time-consuming. There's the one on tax-base sharing filed in the last few weeks. There's the SIBIS case, although that's a hearing and we hope that is coming to a conclusion. (A Westland boy's mother has sought to use a Self-Injurious Behavior Inhibiting System to prevent her son from hitting himself in the head. The boy has a disability that causes him to hit himself. But the school district has refused to allow the SIBIS, which administers shocks to its wearer, to be used in the district.)

We have the ongoing cases that deal with workers' compensation claims, and situations where we're tangentially involved in civil suits with parents who are getting divorced.

There is clearly more of that than I ever recall. There is just a whole battery of those.

RECORD: Do you think Northville and other out-of-formula school districts will ever reach some kind of

consensus with the state regarding how school districts should be funded?

REZMIERSKI: No. I don't think so. I could honestly say that my wish would be the turn of the century. I would be more realistic to say (something could be worked out) in my lifetime.

I think the matter is prefaced on the fact that people can't agree, bodies of people can't agree, on how to fund schools. However, I think we are fast approaching the time when we have exhausted the property-tax method. The present funding is not at all equitable, nor fair, nor easily understood. It causes us on the business side of education to always go bananas over whether we have enough funding and will it be there.

What I've heard most recently is income tax will be used. That would require, I believe, a constitutional amendment. That would have to be on the ballot and force the issue legislatively.

My ideal is that would happen before the turn of the century.

RECORD: Do you really think school funding issues cannot be worked out in the next decade?

REZMIERSKI: I'm giving you 26 years of hoping it would change, and it would not. People have come close to it. The closer they got, it vanished. I think we're beginning to crush under the weight of the financial dilemma that we find ourselves in. Something is going to have to break. We can't keep putting more Band-Aids on the problem.

RECORD: Where does that leave Northville schools in the interim?

REZMIERSKI: We will be struggling clearly for the next two years. If it's not tax base sharing, it will be some other form of recapture such as the (social security payments that the state stopped making for Northville employees in 1990.) There are rumblings that Lansing is looking at our pension funds or some other categorical aid being tampered with. We can't count on it, and to be fair with a bad revenue picture in our

state, we don't see it ending.

I think, my judgment, at least two years of rocky roads are ahead before we get to a better financial picture for the state and therefore all programs like schools.

RECORD: Do you expect Northville to ever sink to the level of funding seen in inner-city and rural school districts?

REZMIERSKI: I hope we will always be able to maintain the standards that this district has strived for. That's what our citizens provide us. That's what they expect, and that's what we deliver.

I suspect that mindset is so solid in this district that we aren't going to give in. I think there is a limit as to how much we can ask for. I feel that being honest with people and approaching it that way, they will want to maintain quality as they have seen us display.

I think it's just how much further can we keep going.

RECORD: You will need to renew your old millage in 1992. When do you expect to come to the voters with a plan?

REZMIERSKI: It will have to be in the spring. . . Hopefully, it will be to the board at the second board meeting in January. (The school board meets Jan. 27 at 7:30 p.m. at Silver Springs Elementary.) My hope is we can bring the proposal with our recommendation to the board of education for approval, then we can move on a timeline for the proposal.

RECORD: Are you looking at a tax increase?

REZMIERSKI: We don't know yet. It really depends on what happens with the tax-base-sharing lawsuit, although we don't have any fantasies that it will be overturned. But you never know.

Between the tax-base-sharing lawsuit and the (lawsuit attempting to stop future recaptures), it's possible there will be some reconsideration. Whether we will get an answer by the time we go to voters, I'm not sure.

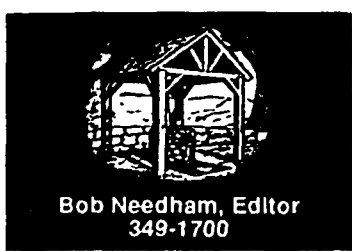

Our Opinion

School district faces a difficult year ahead

Northville schools recently received its scores on the Michigan Education Assessment Program tests, and the scores appear to be well above expected state averages. But don't open the champagne and begin celebrating yet. The school district has a difficult year ahead.

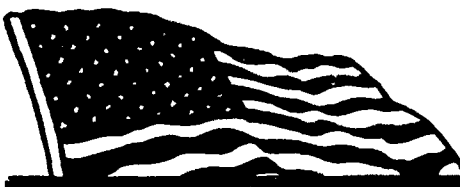
The past year has been one of change in education, on both the local and state levels. Personnel changes in the Northville school district's administrative ranks were frequent. More and more eyes began looking toward U.S. student performance compared to students in other industrialized countries this year. The result was laws addressing education reform. School finance was another highly legislated issue this year. The combination was a busy year for Northville Public Schools.

Longtime Superintendent George Bell retired in July. Assistant Superintendent Burton Knighton retired soon after. Executive Director for Special Education Leonard Reznierski took over in Bell's position. Reznierski's old job is expected to be filled soon. High school principal David Bolitho took over in Knighton's job, and former Troy Administrator Thomas Johnson took over Bolitho's old job.

On the legislative front, schools of choice and requirements for students to graduate are issues the school district will be required to examine next year. Education reform acts have forced school districts statewide to act on issues Northville educators were already addressing. And Northville school leaders were forced this year to stop a few projects temporarily to avoid overlapping state-mandated education reform programs.

Next year will be a busy one for Northville's administrators — many of whom are new to their jobs. But the biggest hurdle faced by local school officials in the upcoming year is financial. As state government seeks to balance its budget and provide equitable schools for all students, school districts like Northville are put in jeopardy.

The state's funding formula is fair if it is funded properly, local administrators say. But the formula has not been fully funded by state budgeters for years, and a large gap has grown in education spending between the rich and the poor.



Government

By shifting money from wealthier school districts to poorer school districts, the burden for funding education falls on the local taxpayer in the form of property taxes.

In the end, no one wins. Poorer districts don't gain much on average as a result of shifting money. And, ultimately, no one is happy with the way education is funded. That is no secret. A new system of funding education is somewhere in the future.

Northville Superintendent Leonard Reznierski said the district cannot expect to see that new system in place in this decade. In the meantime, Northville schools have to muddle through whatever legislation the state comes up with in the name of equality in education.

On the books for the upcoming year is a continuation of tax-base sharing and "recapture." Both programs, called Robin Hood measures by critics, take money from wealthy school districts and distribute it to poorer school districts.

These measures have forced the Northville school district to do some belt-tightening and fat-trimming. School buildings are closed for the holidays, field trips have been cut for this school year and administrators will be attending fewer conferences in the upcoming year.

In 1992, Northville school administrators must continue to look for creative ways of cutting their budget without hurting the educational program. At the same time, educators are required by state law to begin looking at ways of improving education. All this will happen while three central office administrators are adjusting to new jobs. The year ahead will be difficult for Northville schools. And 1992 will be a year when new district administrators can prove their mettle.

We can fight the salt vampires



There was an episode of the old "Star Trek" TV show where the creature battling the Enterprise crew was a kind of vampire.

It seduced its victims by taking a non-threatening form, and then reverted to its true configuration at the moment it attacked. Only this vampire didn't suck your blood. Instead it placed its suction cup fingers on your

face and sucked all the salt out of your body.

Imagine that. A salt vampire. One of those could do pretty well around here, judging by the streaks running down the sides of my car.

Maybe it's just me, but I don't think there's anything healthy about the fact that we in Michigan salt our roads so heavily in winter. I'm told Michigan uses more road salt than any other state.

If there was one thing I did get out of my college chemistry class (and my prof would contend that there is only one thing), it is this: Road salt (either sodium or potassium chloride) combines with water (the main component of ice) to make sodium hydroxide, which is the, and hydrochloric acid, one of the most corrosive substances known to man.

That's why you're replacing exhaust pipes in your car every two years and wiper blades twice a year. That's why after 10 years, most cars in Michigan have aeration along the bottoms of the fenders. That's why a new stretch of roadway will disintegrate in about the same amount of time.

Salting also does some pretty unfriendly things to the environment. If you've ever taken a close look at the vegetation

alongside an interstate, where all that salted snow and ice piles up, you'll get the idea that we're doing something wrong.

Now, I understand very clearly why it is that we salt the roads. It's so that we don't do pirouettes in our Corvettes and snap-turns in our Saturns every time the roads turn slick. Salt is also cheap, and since Michigan is cheap . . . well, you get the picture.

But there are alternatives. We're not the only state that gets snow and ice, you know. I've driven in Oklahoma and northern New Mexico and Arizona in midwinter. Out there, they use a combination of grit and salt, or just straight grit. Minnesota, home of the nation's coldest temperatures each winter, uses grit only, but does a very thorough job of plowing.

Surely by cutting our salt with grit, and upgrading our plows, we could reduce some of the damage being done to our environment and our property. Unfortunately, this is a more costly alternative, a hard sell during these recessionary times.

An idea that has some merit, though, is allowing the use of studded snow tires and chains. They're allowed in the Northeast, the Northwest and all the Rocky Mountain states. With careful regulation, they're no worse for roads than applying layers of salt.

The best thing this idea has going for it is that it fits right in with Gov. Engler's call for privatization of government services. By allowing chains and studs, he could reduce the workforce in the various road commissions. The responsibility for safe winter driving would be taken out of the hands of government and placed in the hands of the individual.

And it would keep away all those pesky salt vampires.

At last count, I think we had something like 14 nieces and nephews to buy Christmas gifts for.

Even if you manage to get away with \$10 per gift, you're talking about \$140. And, if you don't want the nieces and nephews to think Uncle Phil and Aunt Diane are a couple of cheap skates, you shoot for gifts in the \$20 range — which, of course, lifts the bill up to around \$280.

Superintendent reviews year, looks ahead to '92

RECORD: Will schools of choice be on the ballot by that spring election? (The district is required to have voters' approval before opting out of schools of choice. Northville's open enrollment policy meets all legislative requirements for choice. But the district does not provide transportation for parents who take advantage of the option. Therefore, the district must opt out of the choice requirement with voter approval or provide transportation to parents involved in open enrollment.)

REZMIERSKI: No. I don't think we will have it done by then. Schools of choice might be on the ballot in the June election. I think. There are so many people working on that issue.

RECORD: As the former executive director of special education in

Northville schools, how much time do you find yourself spending in that department now that you are the district's superintendent?

REZMIERSKI: About 5 percent. I think we are very fortunate, and we've been very wise in bringing on Dr. (Edwin) Page, who has a vast amount of experience as the executive director in Plymouth-Canton.

Our choice was a good one. Dr. Page has come in running. He knows the program, knows the laws both at the state and federal level, knows budgeting, knows staffing. We're very fortunate, and I'm very delighted because it gives me time in all these new areas.

RECORD: Page is a temporary staffer. When do you expect a permanent executive director of special education to be in place?

REZMIERSKI: We just finished the interview process. We hope to have all the recommendations and references checked out by the week of Dec. 16. It could be any day.

RECORD: What do you see as the big issues facing the school district next year?

REZMIERSKI: The millage election clearly will be No. 1 because everything hinges on that. I'm very confident that with a reasonable approach with facts being explained clearly to our community, they will be supportive.

I would then see that our next major area and continuing area would be analysis of funding and bills passed by our legislative body along with the federal level.

I think then we will be moving

quickly to our Strategic Planning areas where we have an awful lot of work to do in areas like outcomes-based education and all the new evolution and revolutions in education. All the things that we're getting ready to do will slowly change over where we can and when we can.

I think that will be the lion's share. Then we start the bidding on the new Thornton Creek Elementary School in January 1992. As soon as we have enough time, that will immediately garner all the rest of the time.

RECORD: What would happen if that millage election failed? Do you have a plan in place for a second election?

REZMIERSKI: Yes. Unfortunately, we have to look at a fall-back plan. We would have to come back to

the electorate 45 days after. That would be around the June time, and then we could come back in August. Hopefully, that is not what we will have to waste time and money on.

RECORD: When will Thornton Creek Elementary be ready for students? (The district is building an elementary school on Nine Mile Road between Beck and Taft roads.)

REZMIERSKI: We are told by the contractor and the architect if all things go well we should take ownership by June 1993. It is on line to be opened for students and staff by September 1993. Obviously, we would have to get in a month before to put the desks, the books, the welcome sign up.

RECORD: Other issues?

REZMIERSKI: I think there are a number of them. The schools of choice issue is still there. How we're going to do some educational programs is still there. For example, incentives in the School Aid Act for mandatory graduation requirements, student portfolios and core curriculum.

There are a variety of issues, but we're not ready to get into depth with them because we have a variety of our staff and community working to come up with a plan.

You can make book on the fact that by June 1992 we will have to have all of those in proper sequences, answered and dealt with. They are there. They are just around the corner.

Thank goodness we have a Strategic Plan or we would be whipped by this.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 94-11-91

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ZONING ORDINANCE BY AMENDING THE TEXT THEREOF.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

PART I The Charter Township of Northville Zoning Ordinance No. 94 as amended is hereby further amended by amending Article XVIII, Section 18 29 USES NOT OTHERWISE PERMITTED WITHIN A SPECIFIC USE DISTRICT to add 8. Concrete and Asphalt Plants.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

Section 1 Section 18 29 USES NOT OTHERWISE PERMITTED WITHIN A SPECIFIC USE DISTRICT

8 Concrete and Asphalt Plants

Concrete and asphalt plants where material produced is intended primarily for construction activities off the site may be permitted in the I-1 Industrial District as a Special Land Use if the Planning Commission and Township Board determine the following criteria and design standards are met. These standards are intended to acknowledge a potential demonstrated need for concrete and asphalt plants in the area but recognize the impacts of such a use demand careful consideration of site selection and design. The standards of this Section are intended to minimize significant negative consequences on existing land uses and promote realization of planned development patterns in the vicinity.

a Plants For On-Site Construction

A temporary concrete or asphalt plant producing materials solely for construction within the site may be permitted through a Special Land Use Permit in any zoning district for up to one (1) year by the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission may establish regulations regarding the location and operation of such a plant in consideration of the impact on surrounding properties or the environment.

b Procedures

Upon receipt of an application for a concrete or asphalt plant, the Township shall follow the notification procedures specified in the Township Rural Zoning Act for "Special Land Uses." The Planning Commission shall review the request and make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall either approve, approve with conditions or deny the request. The decision on the request shall be incorporated in a statement containing the conclusions relative to the Special Land Use request which specifies the basis for the decision and any conditions imposed.

c Required Submittal Information

A request for a concrete or asphalt plant shall include the following:

(1) A site plan in accordance with Section 18 24 SITE PLAN REVIEW

(2) An IMPACT ASSESSMENT in accordance with Section 18 30 IMPACT ASSESSMENT which also includes analysis of the "evaluation criteria" items listed below.

(3) In addition to the "minimum contents of traffic study" listed in Section 18 30 IMPACT ASSESSMENT, the traffic study shall also analyze levels of service for thoroughfare intersections along the route within two (2) miles of the site, impacts on school bus operations and potential impacts on safety of pedestrians and bicyclists along all haul routes.

(4) A fiscal and market analysis describing expected impacts on property values in the vicinity, expected tax benefits to the Township, anticipated costs to provide municipal services and the need for such a facility to serve demand in the surrounding area.

(5) If the manufacture, use or storage of any hazardous materials is proposed, the applicant shall describe the types and quantities, storage areas, secondary containment measures and a spill response plan.

d Licensing

An annual license for the operation certifying the capability to meet the standards of this Section and any additional standards of the licensing ordinance must be approved by the Board of Trustees.

e Evaluation Criteria

The Planning Commission and Board of Trustees may issue a Special Land Use Permit only upon finding that all the following conditions are satisfied:

(1) The plant will be designed, operated and maintained to be compatible with the general character of surrounding land uses and zoning in terms of noise, traffic generated, air quality and hours of operation.

(2) The plant will be compatible with the goals and objectives of the Northville Township Master Plan and shall not discourage short or long term realization of the expected development pattern on properties within the vicinity.

(3) The plant will not infringe on adjacent property owner's right to a reasonable rate of return on their property or have a significant negative impact on the market value of properties in the vicinity. The Township shall consider information provided by the Township Assessor, staff from communities with a concrete or asphalt plant and information provided by appraisers.

(4) Air Quality

A complete description of the types and quantities of pollutants expected to be emitted into the air shall be provided. The applicant shall provide information on prevailing winds and other documentation necessary to clearly demonstrate the plant and accessory operations comply with all local, state and federal requirements for air quality. Necessary mitigation measures shall be described.

(5) Information on hazardous materials, secondary containment measures and a spill response plan that is satisfactory to help protect the public and the environment.

(6) Activities associated with the concrete or asphalt plant will not contaminate or degrade the quality of water courses, lakes, streams, wetlands or aquifers and shall demonstrate strict compliance with all requirements of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and other appropriate agencies.

(7) The plant shall comply with the performance standards of Section 18 15 PERFORMANCE STANDARDS and the Township Noise Abatement Ordinance, Chapter 37. The type, frequency of occurrence and duration of noise generated shall not be disruptive to other uses in the vicinity.

(8) The traffic impact study shall demonstrate expected truck traffic will not have a significant negative impact on levels of service, accident potential, school bus operations or safety of pedestrians and bicyclists along all routes.

(9) The market analysis shall demonstrate the need for the facility to serve demand in the local area. The study shall also demonstrate why the subject site would have less negative public impacts than other potential sites in the local area, with local area being defined as within a ten (10) mile radius.

(10) The fiscal impact analysis shall demonstrate the tax benefits afforded by the facility will have a positive impact on the community in consideration of the anticipated impacts on property values in the vicinity over the long term and anticipated costs to provide necessary municipal services.

(11) The Board may establish limits on the duration of operation of the impacts on land uses in the vicinity and anticipated local reserve of sand, gravel and aggregate materials for the plant.

f. Design Standards

The site plan and operations for the plant shall meet the following standards, in addition to the applicable standards from other Sections of this Ordinance:

(1) Plant Setbacks

All potential locations of the plant shall be setback six hundred (600) feet from any adjacent residential district or occupied residence including those across a right-of-way. In addition, all potential locations of the asphalt plant shall be at least three hundred (300) feet from any other property line. If the plant is to be moved periodically within the site, the area in which the plant is to be confined shall be illustrated on the site plan.

(2) Setbacks From A Shoreline

The plant, stockpiles, storage, parking and all operations and accessory buildings shall be setback at least one hundred fifty (150) feet from all running water courses, lakes, ponds and wetlands regulated by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the United States Environmental Protection Act.

(3) Setbacks For Accessory Buildings And Operations

The minimum setbacks for accessory buildings, internal roads, parking, stockpiles, storage and other operations shall be provided in accordance with the following Required setbacks shall consist only of living plant material unless otherwise approved by the Planning Commission.

a) along any property line adjacent to a residential district including across a right-of-way: Five hundred (500) foot wide setback which shall include a minimum one hundred fifty (150) foot wide landscaped greenbelt.

b) along any property line abutting a non-residential zoning district, Minimum fifty (50) foot wide setback which includes a minimum twenty five (25) foot wide greenbelt except for an approved drive leading to the public street.

c) abutting street rights-of-way, but not across from a residential district; minimum fifty (50) foot wide landscaped greenbelt except for approved drives leading to the public street.

(4) Required Greenbelt Landscaping

Landscaping within the greenbelt shall consist of a combination of evergreen trees, deciduous trees, shrubs, berms and walls. The location and extent of landscaping required shall be determined by the Planning Commission in consideration of the height of the plant, topography, current and planned adjacent land uses, and the extent of existing vegetation on the site. Any maximum height limits for berms listed elsewhere in this Ordinance shall not apply.

(5) Height

The plant shall meet the height restrictions of the Industrial District.

(6) Air Quality

The site, including internal roads, parking areas and access routes to the site, shall be designed or treated to prevent drifting or airborne transmission of dust particles or debris from any open storage area.

(7) Woodlands

The site plan shall comply with Section 18 34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION.

(8) Truck Routing

Truck routing to and from the site shall be approved by the Township and Wayne County. In determining appropriate truck routes, the Township shall consider the potential impacts on property values along the routes, safety and traffic operations. All truck routes shall be Class "A" roads, roads bonded as Class "A" or County Primary Roads. The applicant shall demonstrate capability to enforce routing.

(9) Access

The site shall have direct access to paved public roadways.

(10) Paving

All internal roads, parking and storage areas shall be paved.

(11) Security

The site shall be fenced to prohibit vandalism and illegal access, with the fence provided on the interior side of the required greenbelt.

(12) Operating Hours

All operations associated with the concrete or asphalt plant shall occur between the hours of 7 00 a.m. to 7 00 p.m. and shall not be operated on Saturdays, Sundays and all State legal holidays.

(13) Environmental Protection

The site and operations shall include measures to minimize and control potential negative impacts on soil conditions, water quality, stormwater runoff and air quality.

g. Review Assistance

The Township may obtain reports from qualified technical consultants of the Township's choosing, analyzing potential impacts and capability to comply with the standards of this Section. The cost for the reviews shall be borne by the applicant.

h. Financial Guarantee

The Board of Trustees may require the posting of a performance bond, cash deposit or other financial guarantee acceptable to the Township to ensure compliance with the standards of this Ordinance. The amount of the financial guarantee shall be equal to the total valuation, as determined by the Township, of all construction work required to comply with the approved site plan including pavement, driveways, drives, landscaping, parking, lighting, drainage improvements, erosion protection, fences, woodlands replacement and similar items, plus at least ten percent (10%) for contingencies. The Township, upon

written request from the applicant, shall rebate portions of the performance guarantee upon determination the improvements have been satisfactorily completed. The portion of the rebate shall be consistent with the portion of applicable improvements.

PART II Conflicting Provisions Repealed

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 94, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

PART III Effective Date

The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effective immediately upon publication.

PART IV Adoption

This ordinance may be adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Northville, pursuant to authority of Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended at their next regular/special meeting (12-30-91 NR).

Eleanor & Ray Heald/Wine

New Year's toast derives from spiritual tradition

Holiday toasts have long been used to ring in the New Year, honor friends and relatives, and heighten the spirit of the season.

In France at the end of the 16th century, it was customary to place a piece of toast in the bottom of a wine glass. The glass was passed from hand to hand until it reached the honored person whose health was being drunk. This custom gave rise to the expression, "to drink a toast."

Superstitious people clinked glasses because they were afraid the devil would enter their bodies with the wine, so they made a noise to scare the demon away.

Today, lovers in France often intertwine forearms while sipping champagne after a toast.

"To paraphrase Mark Twain, too much of anything is bad, but too much champagne is just right," is a favorite toast of Smitty Kogan, director of the Champagne News and Information Bureau in New York.

Many Americans associate champagne with the holidays because its bubbles convey conviviality. Indeed, a New Year celebration with champagne seems appropriate.

Champagne and sparkling wine is easily understood since there are only a few basic styles and types. Non-vintage champagne is a blend of wines from one harvest with reserve wines of varying ages obtained from previous harvests.

Vintage champagne is blended only from wines of a single year's harvest. No reserve wines are used, and the year of the crop appears on the label.

Blanc de blancs is a wine made only from white grapes. Blanc de Noirs is produced only from red grapes. Rose derives its color from the skins of red grapes. Superior (expensive) champagnes are blends of rare, costly wines and represent a producer's best effort.

There are two principal designations of dryness: Brut (very dry) and Extra-Dry (slightly sweet).

The house of Louis Roederer offers these tips for champagne and sparkling wine service.

Serve well-chilled. The best and fastest way to bring champagne to the proper serving temperature is to place the bottle in a bucket filled with half ice and half cold water. About 30 minutes should do it.

Use caution when opening a bottle of sparkling wine; there are 60 pounds of pressure per square inch in there! Remove the wire cage with the bottle facing away from you and your guests. Then, using a towel, slowly rotate the bottle while easing the cork from the neck, releasing it with a soft sigh. A loud pop is festive, but not desirable.

Use tulip-shaped glasses or champagne flutes, not wide shallow glasses. A tall, slender glass allows the fine bubbles to rise without disappearing quickly.

For party planning, figure on pouring six glasses per bottle.

What to do with leftovers? An old French trick says putting a sterling silver fork into the bottle will keep it fresh and bubbly. One of the new champagne stoppers, available at gourmet or wine shops, is recommended. Another option: Use it in cooking and open another bottle to enjoy with your meal.

WINE SELECTION OF THE WEEK

Domaine Carneros Brut (\$21) is a stellar California sparkling. The parent French company is Champagne Taittinger and the Domaine Carneros bubbly is reminiscent of the Taittinger Brut "La Française" style while exhibiting the distinct fruit elegance of the Carneros region.

Produced by the *methode champenoise* (French method of making champagne), it has attractive lively fruit aromas with toasty, creamy, mature flavors and crisp, full body. It is a perfect accompaniment for foie gras, salmon pate or canapés, soft cheese such as Brie, duck pate and mildly spiced dishes.

While Americans use sparkling wines and champagnes primarily as toasts, they are perfect throughout the meal. Subtle and delicious changes in the Domaine Carneros bottling occur as it is paired with multiple courses.



Bartenders are the toast on New Year's Eve

With a smile and a friendly "Happy New Year," George Petrides sets a drink upon the copper-clad bar at the Red Timbers in Novi.

A bartender for seven years at the restaurant and lounge on Grand River Ave., Petrides has seen his share of New Year's Eve celebrations. This year again, Red Timbers will be open through the midnight hour.

"We'll be serving our regular diners until 9 p.m.," he says. "Then after that we'll have our New Year's Eve celebration and people will be here until 2, 2:30, maybe 3 in the morning. At midnight we pass out the party favors and open champagne and everybody has a good time."

But to Petrides, who claims to have been a bartender "all my life," there is

no real secret to making sure everyone has a good time.

"All you do is please the customer," he says. "You do it in a prompt and efficient way. That's what does it."

When people flock to the bars to share in the celebration and camaraderie, some of them can lose control. For Marty Meyer, Petrides' partner behind the bar at Red Timbers, taking care of the customer means knowing when not to serve him, just as much as knowing when to serve him.

"People are more careful now, and we have to be careful," he says. "You've got to take care of them. Look around here now (it's a little after 11 p.m.). I've got a bunch of coffees going already."

"New Year's Eve has always been neat, though. People start off with their highballs, Manhattans and

fuzzy navels, and then around 11:30 or quarter to 12 they start ordering bottles of champagne."

And he should know. The veteran bartender hasn't had a New Year's Eve off in 25 years. He even got married in the Red Timbers on New Year's Eve for the first time at age 50.

Down the road at Diamond Jim Brady's, Karen Hyland, a nine-year bartender, says people order a different batch of drinks on New Year's Eve.

"People go for champagne cocktails, of course," she says. "But they also order a lot of whiskey-and-waters or seven-and-sevens, and not so much of the real frou-frou drinks. They want something they can spend the whole night drinking without feeling filled up."

A healthy kitchen is not just a clean kitchen

As I begin to write, I realize that today is our three month "anniversary" in Novi.

It seems much longer than that. It's nearly a year since Tom and I started this project. And it's been a year since we were in Ireland. Ah, the good old days. We were able to travel at the drop of a hat. Not now. It will be a while before we can do that again.

We are still going through our breaking-in period. Nearly daily we change a procedure or method — for the better. Luckily everyone is open-minded and flexible. We are all in this together. Anything that can be done to make the work easier and expedite service is to our advantage. Of course, this does not come without expense.

A second ice machine was purchased for behind the bar. We were consistently running out of ice, not because the machine wasn't good, but because of the demands put on it. One thing that we hadn't counted on was the amount of ice that the kitchen would

use — believe it or not, as much if not more than in the front of the house. Every time that fish comes in, it is put into perforated "hotel" pans that fit into a drainage container. Then it is covered with Saran wrap and iced down.

The ice is changed twice daily and the drainage pans emptied. Fish is so perishable that a one degree rise in temperature steals a day of shelf life. We treat it like a baby, constantly watching.

When stock or soup is made, it must be cooled before it can be put into the walk-in cooler. This is done to prevent bacterial growth. So each bucket is put into a large sink and surrounded with ice and water. It is stirred every few minutes until it reaches the proper temperature. We make tremendous quantities — gallons of chili and chowder. If it was put into the cooler before lowering its temperature, disaster could strike.

Several things can happen. First, the temperature in the entire walk-in could rise,

putting all the other food in jeopardy. Also, if a large amount of food is put away hot and not stirred, the center stays hot while the sides cool. Then there is great potential for food poisoning. The idea is frightening.

At home, especially with leftovers, follow the same rules. Cool food before placing it in the refrigerator. Each kitchen employee was given a pocket thermometer when we opened. It wasn't to make them look like doctors, but to ensure that proper temperatures were adhered to. Most of them have been through a food sanitation class. Those who haven't will.

The proper storage and handling of food is imperative. The health department requires an employee hand sink. We have three. At each one is an antibacterial lotion that is to be used after washing. It's a wonderful invention. A lotion that is harmless chemically, yet kills bacteria. It's such a great idea that we installed two in the front of the house.

It gives me great pleasure to see the staff walking around and rubbing their hands, especially during the flu season. It is amazing that people in this business don't get sick more often, considering their exposure to colds and such. We should wash our hands a thousand times a day.

About a month after opening, Morris our health inspector came in for an inspection. I learned a long time ago not to try to fool the inspector. Rather, do it right in the first place. Still, every time he walks through the door I wonder, what could we have overlooked? There is always something.

Once in Southfield, we scored a 99 out of 100. This time the verdict was a 96. I wasn't unhappy. The goal now is to keep up the good work. Interestingly enough, the emphasis isn't on a perfectly spotless kitchen. It is on proper storage and handling of food, and clean and healthy food workers.

The same things are important in your

home. Bacteria need certain conditions to grow: food, moisture, time, temperature, proper pH, and in most instances, air. Take away any of these, and you reduce your chances for growth. The designated temperature "danger zone" for food is 45 to 140 degrees. Bacteria grows best in this temperature range. The rule of thumb is, keep hot food hot and cold food cold.

Do not handle food unnecessarily. The less you handle it, the fewer chances of transmitting bacteria in the first place. Wash your hands whenever and every time you think of it.

Invest in a thermometer. It's a good idea to have a hanging thermometer in your refrigerator and keep an eye on its temperature. Avoid extensive use of leftovers. The more you reheat and cool a food product, the greater the chance of bacteria growth.

The Refrigerator Door

STORAGE TIPS: "Lots of people have been calling the Food and Nutrition Hotline to find out how long that leftover turkey can be safely used," says Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service. "Cooked turkey or other meat or poultry can be safely kept in the refrigerator for three or four days, providing it has been handled correctly."

It is very important to separate turkey meat from the bones and remove all stuffing and separate it immediately. The turkey should not be left out of the refrigerator more than two hours. If the turkey or meat is left in gravy or a cream sauce in the refrigerator, this shortens the storage time to one or two days.

Leftover turkey can also be frozen, but it must be frozen promptly. Do not wait until you are doubtful of the food's safety before you freeze it. Cooked turkey meat will keep about three months; if wrapped in small packages, it makes excellent sandwiches for brown bag lunches.

Some foods don't freeze well, however. They may become mushy, soft or too salty; some separate when defrosted.

Foods that should not be frozen include cream or custard fillings, sour cream, mayonnaise or salad dressing, gelatin, meringue, cooked eggs, whites, raw salad vegetables and fried foods.

Festive dinner offers a break from leftovers

Holiday time is often a busy time — with shopping, trimming the tree, party planning and out-of-town guests. It's no wonder that many cooks find preparing an elegant dish a daunting task. Yet preparing a festive meal for friends and relatives need not be difficult.

Here's a dish that's perfect for a sit-down dinner after shopping, a buffet main course for that get-together among friends, or as an alternative for a family tired of turkey leftovers. The recipe combines penne (Italian for pens) pasta with Norwegian smoked salmon and roasted leeks in a winter pesto cream sauce.

This simple recipe brings together several wintry elements in one dish — the winter pesto is an unusual, yet inexpensive, combination of olive oil, parsley, walnuts, Parmesan cheese and garlic. The pesto, as with most of the ingredients, may be prepared a day or two in advance. The final step is a simple reduced cream sauce, prepared just before serving.

Traditionally used as a holiday hors d'oeuvre, here Norwegian smoked salmon is laid on top of the pasta and sauce, where the vapors below gently heat the delicate slices of smoked salmon. The visual contrast between the soft green of the pesto and the rich pink of the Norwegian smoked salmon provide for a festive table.

Many people are reluctant to use smoked salmon in a recipe because they think it's salty, smoky, or has a dry texture. But because Norwegian smoked salmon is produced from mild tasting, farm-raised Atlantic salmon, it has a smooth, buttery flavor.

Norwegian salmon also contains an ideal fat content that keeps the flesh moist through the smoking process and voids the salty taste that other smoked fish may have. For nutritionally conscious people, the fat content of Norwegian salmon holds other benefits beyond enhancing the good taste.

It contains the health-promoting Omega-3 fatty acids that have been shown to reduce blood cholesterol levels. Wild Pacific salmon, because it has a more strenuous life cycle in the open ocean, is leaner than its farm-raised cousin, and often results in a fishier tasting, drier-textured

smoked salmon.

To complement the flavors of the pesto and smoked salmon, choose a light, dry white wine, such as Ernest & Julio Gallo North Coast Chardonnay.

PENNE WITH NORWEGIAN SMOKED SALMON AND ROASTED LEEKS IN A WINTER PESTO CREAM (Serves 6 — Can be doubled)

4 cups lightly packed parsley leaves
4 cloves garlic
½ cup chopped walnuts
1 cup olive oil
1 teaspoon salt
¾ cup grated Parmesan cheese

3 leeks
1 tablespoon olive oil
salt and pepper to taste

3 cups heavy cream
1½ pounds dry penne pasta

12 slices Norwegian smoked salmon

To prepare Winter Pesto (can be prepared up to two days in advance):

In food processor, combine parsley, garlic, walnuts, olive oil, salt and pepper. Process with a metal blade until all elements are finely chopped. Stir in the grated Parmesan cheese. Store in refrigerator in a tightly covered container, until ready for assembly.

To prepare roasted leeks (can be prepared several hours in advance):

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Trim off and discard leek roots and green leaves, leaving about one inch of green on the white stalks. Split the leeks in half lengthwise, and slice the leek halves into ¼ inch slices. Wash the sliced leeks thoroughly in several changes of water to remove sand. Drain and dry completely.

In a bowl, toss the leeks in olive oil and lightly salt and pepper to taste. Spread the leeks out in an even layer on a large roasting pan, or cookie sheet with a rim. Roast in the oven for

20 minutes, stirring frequently, until the leeks begin to brown. With a slotted spoon, remove the leeks and drain on paper towels. Reserve until ready to assemble dish.

To prepare Cream Sauce (can be done one hour in advance):

In a heavy-bottomed saucepan, bring the heavy cream to a boil. Boil, stirring frequently with a whisk, until the cream has been reduced in volume by one-third.

To Assemble:

In a large pot of boiling salted water, cook the penne until tender. While the pasta is cooking, bring the reduced cream to a simmer, and stir in the winter pesto sauce and the roasted leeks. When the penne is done, drain the pasta and return it to the pot. Add the pesto cream and toss it quickly with the pasta.

Arrange the pasta on a serving platter, or large bowl and lay the slices of Norwegian smoked salmon on top. The heat from the pasta will warm the salmon. Serve immediately.

Most delicatessens and specialty shops carry Norwegian smoked salmon vacuum-sealed in plastic to maintain the absolute highest standard of freshness. Look for the Golden Guarantee label of freshness in the package, which tells you that Norwegian smoked salmon is of the highest quality, with a mild, buttery flavor.

Use any smoked salmon left over from the pasta recipe to prepare simple hors d'oeuvres. The mild taste of Norwegian smoked salmon combines well with many kinds of foods. Here are some suggested finger-food combinations:

- Fill fresh endive spears with fresh dill guacamole topped with Norwegian smoked salmon slices.
- Roll up slices of Norwegian smoked salmon with a filling of cream cheese, chopped black olives and fresh mint.
- Open up chilled, blanched snow pea pods and make "sandwiches" with a mixture of feta and cream cheeses, and wrap them up with strips of smoked salmon.

Chocolate does grow on trees

If you think a chocolate tree sound like something out of an old Walt Disney movie, think again. Chocolate — or at least the raw materials for it — really does grow on trees.

Chocolate, explains Michigan State University horticulturist Tom Stebbins, is made from the beans of the cacao plant, an evergreen tree that lives in moist tropical climates. Most of the world's cacao production occurs in the Ivory Coast and other African countries and eastern Brazil.

The first part of the cacao plant's scientific name, Theobroma cacao, means "food of the gods," a description that dedicated chocophiles might readily agree with.

The cacao is believed to have originated in the Amazon area of South America. The Incas used its beans as currency, and the Aztecs brewed a bitter-tasting drink from the roasted beans.

The seeds occur in large pods. The pods grow to 10 to 14 inches long and resemble elongated acorn

squash, Stebbins says. Each pod contains 20 to 40 white seeds.

The first step in producing chocolate is to ferment the seeds for several days. This causes them to turn brown and develop a bitter chocolate taste. After drying, the beans are shipped to a processing plant where they are cleaned, roasted and ground into a thick, dark paste. The paste is the basis for all chocolate and cocoa products.

Hardened, the paste becomes unsweetened baking chocolate. Heated, it yields cocoa butter. The dry material that's left after the cocoa butter is extracted is ground into cocoa powder. Blending the paste with additional cocoa butter and sweeteners turns it into chocolate candy. White chocolate is made of cocoa butter and sweeteners without the dark paste.

A product that looks and tastes more or less like chocolate candy but it labeled "confectionary coating" contains other fats in place of cocoa butter. It cannot be labeled "chocolate."

City loses at the track, rallies around flag

The City of Northville began the year fighting for more than \$700,000 in state-returned racetrack revenue, and ended it fearing that the funds might be gone for good.

Earlier this year, budget woes due in part to the state's delay of racetrack revenue payments to the city forced the elimination of two police officers' positions and the layoff of two dispatchers. Both positions were reinstated by year's end, and both dispatchers rehired, when the state finally released most of the racetrack funding for Fiscal Year 1990/91.

But that delay was nothing compared to Gov. Engler's decision to cut all state-returned racetrack revenue for Fiscal Year 1991/92.

The decision not to return any of the state's revenue from racetracks to the cities that host the tracks forced the city to cut police services to Northville Downs in early December and dashed hopes for a balanced city budget in the coming year.

The council was still assembling a plan to deal with the resulting \$1 million deficit by the year's end, and was considering a combination of wage freezes, fee increases, service cuts and other budget reductions to eliminate the deficit over several years.

Throughout the year, grand goals were put on hold while city officials dealt with fiscal

crises.

Little apparent progress was made toward consolidation of the city and township police departments by year's end, though officials met in January to begin discussing a union of the two dispatching centers at the township police department as a way to cut costs.

The proposed replacement of the current Cady Street parking deck with a three-level, 462-car version continued to stymie the city council and administration, who sparred with a recalcitrant planning commission before winning preliminary site plan approval in November, held their breaths while state legislators considered killing the method that the city planned to use to finance the deck, and negotiated with current property owners for the land needed to build the expanded deck and relocate Cady Street further south.

Along the way, the proposed deck's design changed several times. The latest version has most of the first floor fenced off as secured parking for MainCentre residents and others who purchase leases for the spaces. The deck plan was extended west to Center Street to shorten a controversial pedestrian bridge to Singh Development's MainCentre project and serve as the base of Singh's proposed CadyCentre project, a three-story retail/office building.

Several members of the city's planning commission were none too happy with the

height of the proposed CadyCentre or the configuration of the parking deck, particularly in light of the complicated property exchanges necessary to make the combined projects work and the fact that the city had not worked out all the necessary exchanges before approaching the commission for preliminary deck approval. Plans for CadyCentre were rejected in August amid concerns that the building and MainCentre would create a monolithic view on the south side of downtown. The commission was in the process of drafting a new building height ordinance for downtown Northville when Singh Development officials first sought approval.

Both site plans, however, eventually gained preliminary approval in November, after CadyCentre's height was reduced and the necessary property exchanges made.

City officials still hope to break ground on the new deck within the next two years.

The city was bedecked in bunting and bows in January as a tribute to U.S. troops serving in the Persian Gulf during the conflict with Iraq. Local resident Ginny Hathorn and her group, the West Side Chapter of the Michigan Military Family Support Group, drew national attention when Northville was declared a model support city. The recognition culminated in the community's largest Fourth of July celebration ever, complete with a rally for returning troops and an expanded fireworks

display by an internationally-known firm.

On a more ominous note, about 30 members of a neo-Nazi group marched through town March 23, frightening children and angering local residents and shopkeepers. The marchers carried U.S. and Confederate flags and red flags bearing black swastikas, the banners of Nazi Germany.

The MainCentre mixed-use development finally snared its first commercial tenant in April, and several other stores followed suit in the next several months. But as of last count, only four of the development's 15 retail spaces were occupied. More than 50 of the building's 74 apartments, however, did house tenants by Christmas.

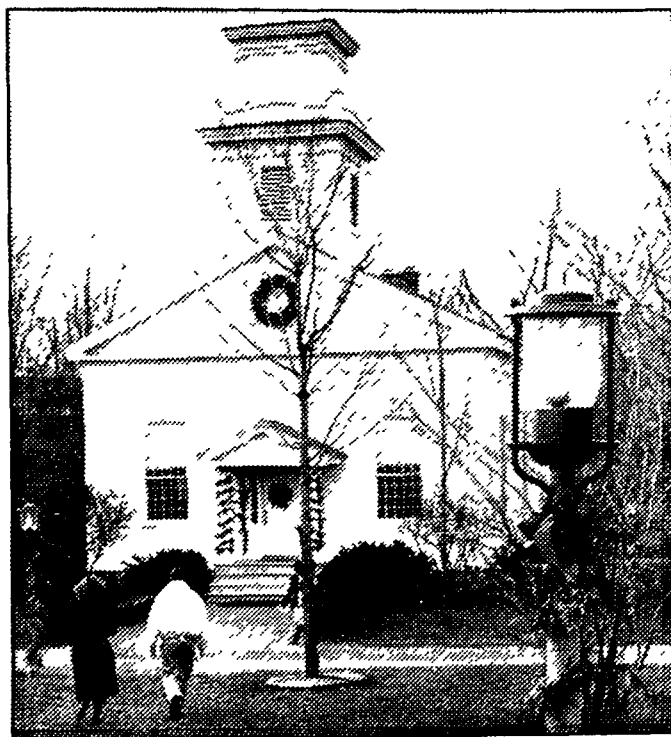

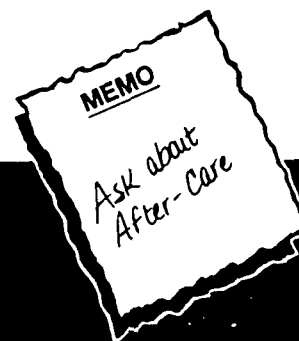

Word after a two-month search by the city council. Word, one of 95 applicants for the position, served as city administrator of South St. Paul, Minn., before coming to Northville.

Tragedy struck on Eight Mile Road June 5 when two joggers were hit and killed by a Jeep just east of Beck Road. Yusuf Hanania of Novi and Albert Abdelnour of Livonia were killed when they were struck by the Jeep Wrangler driven by Kenneth Loveday, a 19-year-old Novi resident at the time. Hanania was marketing director for Singh Development, builders of the MainCentre mixed-use development.

Loveday was charged with two counts of manslaughter in July after city police discovered that he had smoked marijuana just before the crash, and reportedly had a history of swerving toward other vehicles while driving.

His trial, after being delayed twice due to a backlog of cases at Oakland County Circuit Court and a change in defense attorneys, was finally scheduled for Jan. 6.

Hundreds of city residents were evacuated from their homes for several hours July 3, after a backhoe operator punched a hole in a high-pressure natural gas line at Center Street and Edward Hines Drive. Traffic was diverted around the intersection while police and fire personnel evacuated residents living up to a quarter-mile from the leak, and a Consumers Power crew repaired the six-inch-wide steel pipe. Fortunately, the gas never ignited and no injuries were reported.

City officials and the local media alike were taken in by a southern-fried scam in August as Cy Holley Jr. of Louisiana brought Cajunfest '91 to town. The organizer of the three-day

festival, which promised authentic Cajun cooking and Bayou music, skipped town after writing bad checks for nearly \$10,000 for services ranging from the use and cleanup of the Northville Downs racetrack to the rental of 30 portable toilets from Porta-John. Holley had bounced checks during Cajunfest productions in other cities as well, including Norfolk, Va. Jersey City, N.J., and Chicago, Ill.

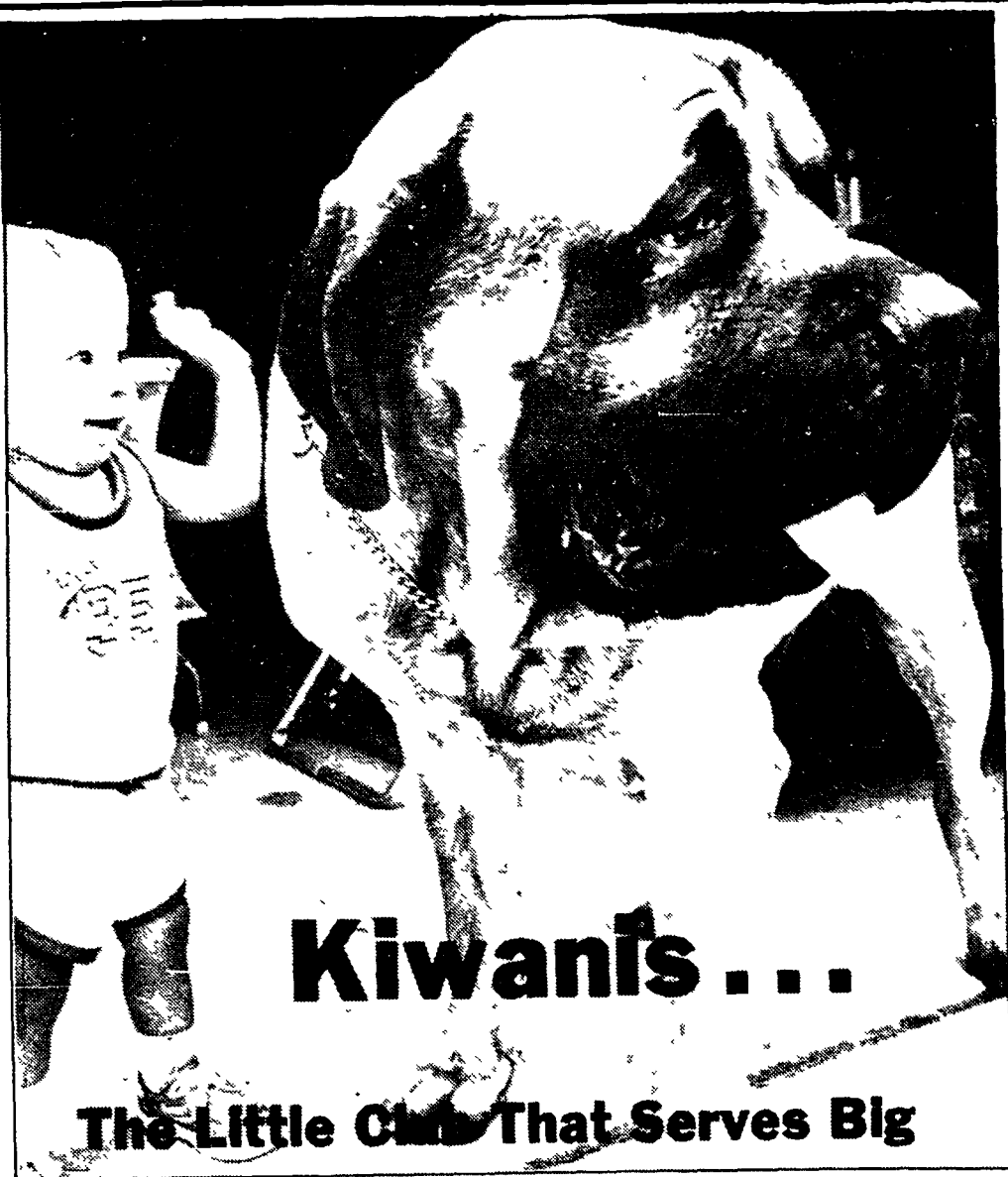
A much more successful event returned to town in September, as the community hosted its third annual Victorian Festival. Record crowds attended the weekend's worth of events, including the Victorian Parade and Costume Ball, a juried Art Market, and the Victorian Review featuring unicyclists and acrobats Sem and Teresa Abrahams. An estimated 10,000 visitors attended the three-day event.

On the refuse and recycling front, the coun-

cil voted early in 1991 to switch from a milage-based to a fee-based curbside refuse collection system, though the final form of the new program was still under discussion at the end of the year.

An interim fee system had both residents and commercial property owners steamed, and resulted in a heated informational meeting in July and hints of fiscal mismanagement. Eight downtown businesspeople formed an ad hoc committee to research city finances in August, and the council decided to charge the businesspeople for their "excessive" request of an estimated 4,000 city documents in October.

By year's end, the council had agreed to begin charging a base \$4 fee and a \$1.50 per-bag charge for curbside residential refuse starting Jan. 1, 1992, though curbside recycling may be delayed for several weeks or months.

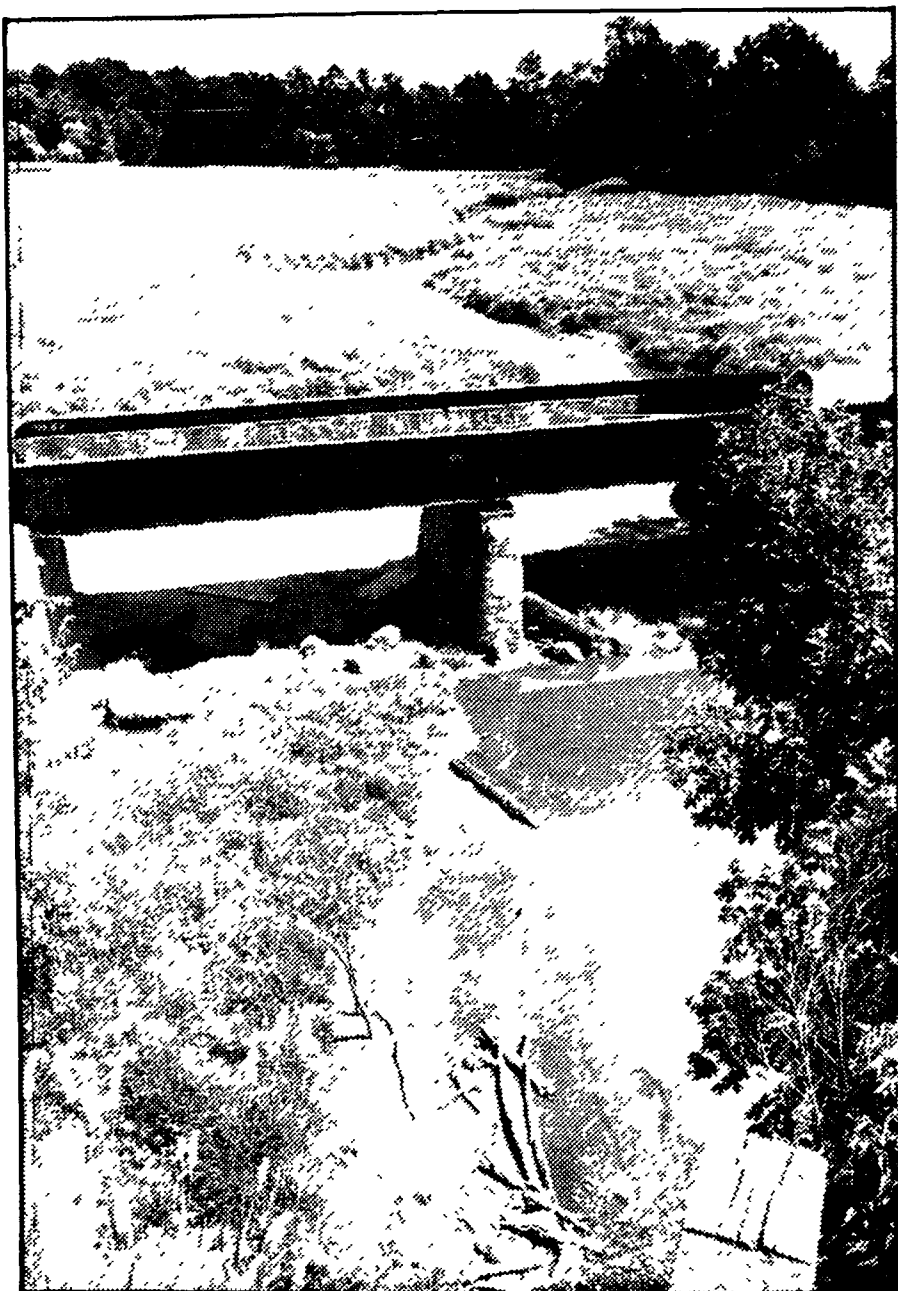

Township experiences many problems, few solutions

Frustrating.

In many ways, that was the key word in 1991 for township residents and government officials alike.

Problems were many in 1991; solutions were few. Environmental mishaps — including the failure of Waterford Dam and the disastrous creek erosion which spread from a troubled development site to the home of an unassuming township couple — made headlines.

The plight of Ann and James Malecki and the continuing saga of the Shores of Northville development dominated local conversation throughout much of the year. Bickering between attorneys, developers, and township officials did little to mend the Malecki's ravaged property, but did serve to fatten the wallets of several attorneys.

Frustration and fear also swept residents of a township subdivision. Highland Lakes area residents loudly protested a plan to move a state adult foster care home into their corner of the township. The township board opposed the state's plan, and eventually spent thousands of dollars in legal fees to fight the proposed move.

Today, the group home sits quietly in the midst of Highland Lakes. Residents' fears of increased accidents, crime, and decreased property values thus far seem unfounded.

A game of political musical chairs extended from the state level on through Wayne County government and eventually manifested itself squarely in Northville Township.

Widespread political job-swapping began last spring when Wayne County Commissioner Susan Heintz resigned her post to take a job with the Gov. John Engler administration.

Heintz' departure opened the door for Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen to head to the Wayne County commission, and state Rep. Gerald Law stirred the pot by resigning to take Breen's old job.

Tag-team politics continued when Northville Township Supervisor Georgina Goss declared her interest in Law's former state job. Goss and Heintz claimed the whole scenario was coincidental, but the job-jumpers pledged unerring support for one another throughout the blitz of position-switching.

Questionable politics did not cease when Goss defeated two other candidates in the 35th District Republican primary. Goss' resignation left an opening in the township supervisor's seat, and four candidates expressed interest in the job.

Township-wide rumblings of a supposed "done deal" that would propel Treasurer Betty Lennox to the supervisor's post were met with bombastic denials by individual members of the township board.

But the board promptly voted Lennox into the job, changing at the last moment — without warning — its announced interview and selection process. Lennox voted for herself without hearing the other candidates' interviews, and Trustee Donald Williams raised eyebrows when he asked: "What was the question?" just prior to a vote that could have disqualified Lennox from voting for herself.

Many in the community expressed outrage

at the selection process, but the board ignored the firestorm by tapping — sans an interview process — Jack Hosmer as the new township treasurer. Several in the attendance at that evening's board meeting offered blistering criticism of their elected officials.

Frustrations mounted in other key township areas, especially on the development front. Residents bitterly fought a proposed Six Mile/Haggerty McDonald's Restaurants site plan. The township planning commission quibbled with McDonald's for months, and finally, hesitantly, approved a "softer look" McDonald's. The restaurant is due to open this month.

Perhaps more ominous is the gravel pit and asphalt plant proposed for the western portion of the township. Industry heavyweight Holloway Sand & Gravel has targeted a 177-acre parcel at the intersection of Six Mile and Ridge roads, but township officials and neighboring residents have thus far expressed absolute opposition to the plan.

Look for the gravel pit and asphalt plant controversy to land in court in early 1992.

There were bright spots in Northville Township in 1991. Voters passed a police operations millage by a comfortable margin; a switch to Huron Valley Ambulance was heralded as a positive step by the local fire department; and the township and state swapped local prison cap guidelines for several perks, including a 16-acre parcel of state land on Seven Mile Road.

The township also entered into an agreement with Browning-Ferris Industries that supposedly will guarantee residents four years-

worth of free recycling services. The recycling deal was to stand alongside the township's new preferred status solid waste plan, which got off to a rocky start but has smoothed-out of late.

Confusion still exists over whether or not condominium and apartment dwellers will receive free recycling services. A final contract between BFI, the township, and other agencies had yet to be signed by early December.

The township did not dodge a nationwide economic downturn. Revenues and spending both showed increases in the township's 1992 budget, but some departments — shared services programs, in particular — suffered cutbacks in government contributions.

The local recreation department sought to buffer city and township cuts by increasing rates in several of the activities it offers. A last minute grant receipt helped the senior citizens program avoid sharp cuts, and the township board agreed to exempt youth assistance from a 5-percent rollback demanded of other community shared services.

The community library is still pondering the direction it will take in 1992 to comply with mandated budget cuts.

The township's first shooting death in nearly a decade was recorded in April 1991 when undercover narcotics officers working under the command of the Michigan State Police shot and killed a suspected drug dealer in the parking lot at Meijer.

The shooting occurred after a pre-arranged drug deal soured and the suspect struck and slightly injured two officers with his car. The Wayne County Prosecutor's Office later ruled that the shooting was justified.

Financing is the school system's key issue

Mounting financial problems continued to grow this year for the Northville Community School District.

Finance was the key issue for school officials as state school legislation continued to follow a trend toward decreased funding to school districts like Northville.

A September 1990 millage increase got the district through the 1990-91 school year without cuts in programs.

In June, that increase was renewed by voters. District officials expected to have enough money to get through the 1991-92 school year.

But a tax base sharing plan was signed into law in October costing Northville schools some unexpected cuts in funding for the current school year.

To balance the budget the school board approved in November some cuts, including a reduction in field trips and in the instruction budget. A millage proposal is expected to be brought to the voters next spring.

The Northville Public School administrative staff underwent several changes this year with administrators shifting jobs to fill openings.

George Bell ended nearly a decade of service to Northville schools and retired from the superintendency in June.

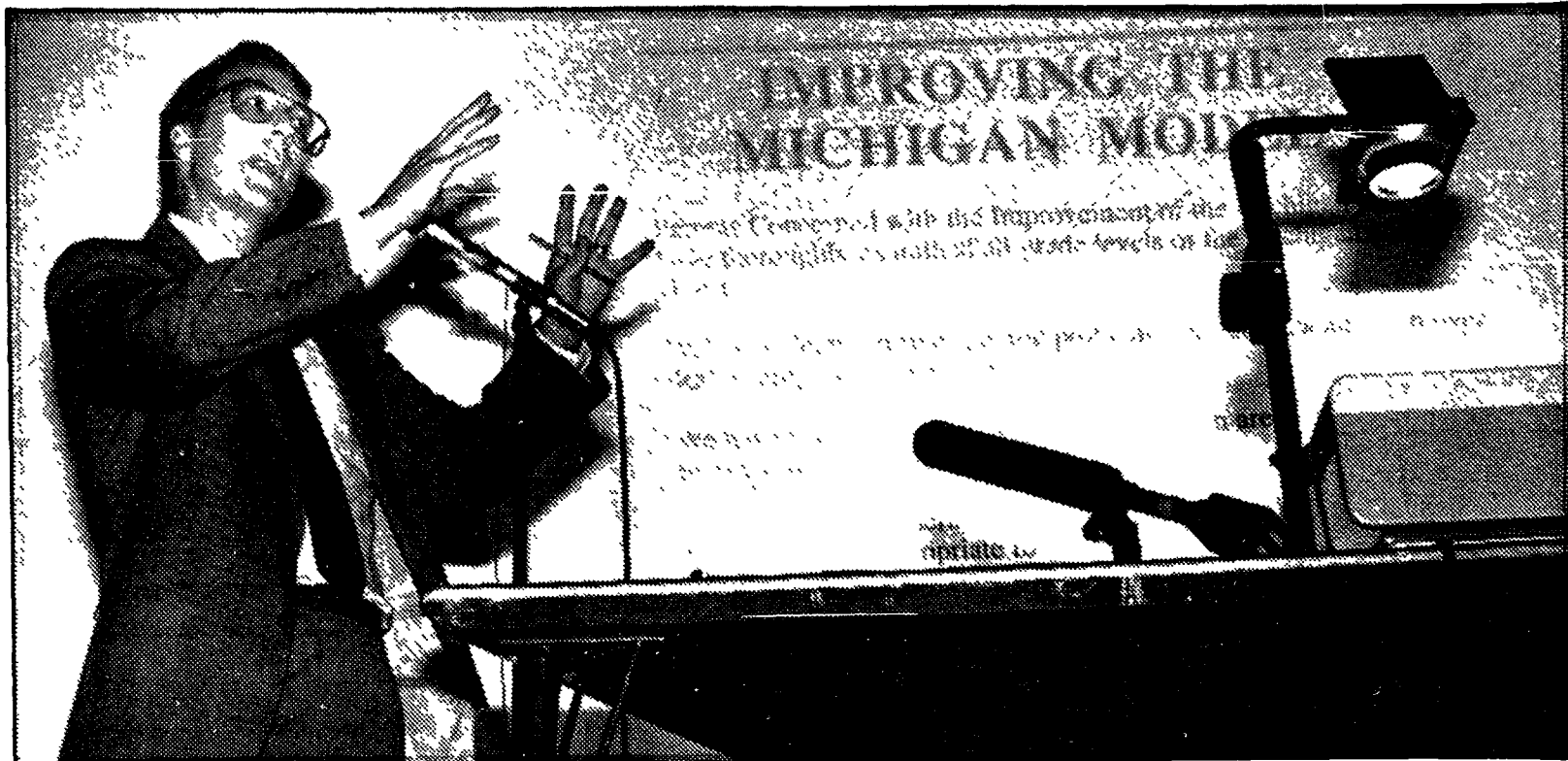

Knighton's position was filled by high school principal David Bolitho.

Bolitho was replaced by Thomas Johnson, a high school administrator from the Troy school district.

Executive Director for Special Education Leonard Rezmierski was selected to fill the shoes of Bell, and he moved into the superintendent's office this fall.

In early December, only Rezmierski's position was not filled with a permanent staffer. Interviews for the position were scheduled for Dec. 11.

A new school building moved closer to opening this year. Thornton Creek Elementary, located on the north side of Nine Mile Road between Beck and Taft roads is scheduled to open in the fall of 1993.

The school was named after Thornton Creek, which runs through the north end of the property.

Thornton Creek is named after the Thornton family, which once owned property to the east of the school's property.

Sally Thornton was one of the first settlers of Northville. An early pioneer, Thornton came to the area with her children in the

1830s.

Construction on Thornton Creek Elementary is expected to begin in the spring of 1992.

A conflict over the Michigan Model for Comprehensive Health Education died down somewhat on the local level this year.

The health model is a series of lesson plans used in Northville and other areas to fill a requirement that school districts have a health curriculum.

The model has been criticized by some parents in Northville who said it violates their rights to privacy and induces altered states of consciousness in children.

A district health committee in April examined 227 specific written complaints gathered by the group Parents Concerned with the Improvement of the Michigan Model.

The parents vowed to take their complaints, now totaling more than 400 specific problems, to the state level and in July testified before a senate committee investigating the model.

Northville parents and school administrators also testified in favor of the model at the July hearing.

Following the hearing, which was held in Plymouth, Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, was appointed to the committee.

In December, the committee had not yet finished investigating the model.

Schools of choice was a big issue this year

that became less of a focal point as the year progressed.

School administrators in Northville were outspoken critics of open enrollment between school districts, which Gov. John Engler endorsed.

But as the year came to a close, Engler had backed off his support of choice somewhat. The 1991 State Aid Act provided incentives for school districts to implement choice pilot programs.

Northville is not eligible to receive money for the choice plans.

Northville already has an open enrollment policy that allows parents to enroll their child in any building in the district.

But under the 1991 state law, the district was required to establish a committee to examine the choice option. Northville schools must develop a choice plan that includes a means of transporting students to the school of their choice.

If the committee, which must be comprised of two-thirds parents, determines the district will opt out of the choice plan, then the issue will be on the June 1992 ballot.

In the meantime, local choice advocate Jeffrey Hampton is working with a group that hopes to put the issue of choice between school districts on the 1994 ballot.

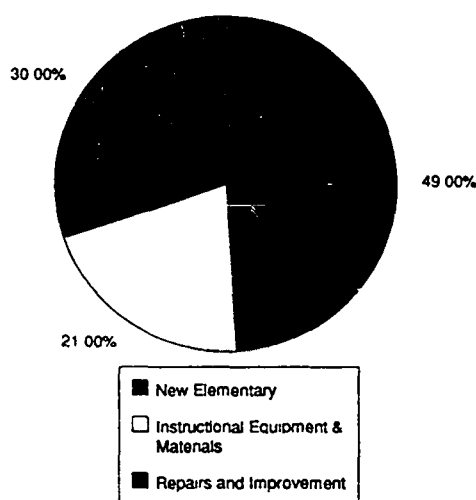

"RECAPTURE" Overturned by Supportive Electorate

In June of 1990, the Board of Education adopted a balanced budget to implement the goals of the Strategic Plan. But, within a few short weeks, the State of Michigan took legislative action intended to equalize school funding by taking money provided to out-of-formula school districts and giving it to in-formula districts. Thus, Northville Public Schools was faced with a loss through "recapture" of \$885,000. The Board of Education, Administration, Strategic Planning Steering Committee and other interested citizens ultimately arrived at a decision to ask the community through a millage question their preference on meeting this crisis. The community answered that question by voting 2 to 1 to support this millage request. Jim

Petrie, the School Board President during that period, said, "To me this vote is a referendum by the Northville Community that recognizes the quality of our program and their unwillingness to compromise that quality for the students of this school district..."

One-Year Millage Renewal Approved June 10, 1991

All of the voted millage levied during the 1990-91 school year for operation of the NPS expired in June, 1991. Voters renewed the current millage rate of 22.63 mills for one year due to legislative action freezing 1992 property taxes, making future school finance decisions tentative at best.

Superintendent George Bell stated, "The high plurality of the vote on the two elections sends a clear message to the school district that there is community confidence in and approval for the job we do."

'Davis Rules' leaves ABC, Murphy's Law behind

Comedy finds new home at CBS

Funny thing about ABC. They seem to have more comedies than sense. The network has four half-hours in the Nielsen top 10, but with dogs like "Baby Talk" and the rapidly deflating "Who's the Boss?" and "Growing Pains" still on the air, there hasn't been room for several other series the network still has in production. A case in point has been the Randy Quaid-Jonathan Winters comedy "Davis Rules," about a junior-high-school principal, his dad and three kids, which had the red-carpet treatment just last January, being introduced in the prime half-hour following coverage of Super Bowl XXV.

A similar situation existed two years ago for "Coach," the series starring Craig T. Nelson and Shelley Long, which was put aside after a well-received spring season in favor of "Chicken Soup." When the "Soup" soured, "Coach" came off the bench. Since then, the series has become a top-10 hit.

This season, the loss of "Good & Evil" and the semi-retirement of "Sibs" made room for a drama, "Civil Wars." So Carsey-Werner, the producers of "Davis Rules," who were completing production of their second set of 13 episodes in December, agreed to let the series be sold to CBS, where a time slot could be found on Wednesday nights. After a Dec. 30 preview, "Davis Rules" officially debuted on its new network Wednesday, Jan. 1.

"I was really happy to hear that CBS picked up the show," says Quaid. "It was sort of languishing over at ABC. We were making these shows week after week, but we never knew when we were going to be on the air, and they couldn't

really find a place for us.

"So when Marcy (Carsey) announced that we'd been sold to another network, and that we were going to be on the air on Wednesday nights, it was just great news for everybody."

The sale makes sense for CBS, struggling to be thought of as a purveyor of quality comedy, and struggling even more since Redd Foxx's death put "Royal Family," one of the darlings of its new season, into the shop. While not a breakaway hit for ABC, "Davis Rules" has established name value, and it provides a much needed partner for "Brooklyn Bridge," another CBS property still seeking an audience.

With the move, Quaid becomes one of the few actors to have worked for all three major broadcast networks. (He spent a season on NBC's "Saturday Night Live" in the mid-'80s.)

The Texas native's career started with a part in "The Last Picture Show," which led to two other films for director Peter Bogdanovich, "What's Up, Doc?" and "Paper Moon." Of those early days, Quaid says, "I've had a lot of self-doubts. The first time I ever saw myself on the screen was in dailies for 'What's Up, Doc?' and I thought, 'Oh, my gosh. My ears are too small, my nose is too big' — all these really critical things. I couldn't understand why they had me out here doin' movies. But I've been really pleased with the way my career's turned out," he reflects.

And no wonder. In 1972, he earned an Oscar nomination for his portrayal of a kleptomaniac sailor in "The Last Detail," with Jack Nicholson and Michael Moriarty. He

has Emmy nominations for "A Streetcar Named Desire" and "LBJ: The Early Years," which also netted him a Golden Globe.

"I've done a lot of different things and played a lot of different characters. I've played leading men as well as character roles. I really consider myself more of a character actor than a leading man."

Quaid's other credits include "Midnight Express," "Fool for Love," "Days of Thunder," the cable movie "Dead Solid Perfect" and, on the stage, "True West," which co-starred his brother Dennis. Last year he took on the comic role of Feet Samuels in PBS' "Bloodhounds of Broadway," a Prohibition-era romance in which he was paired with Madonna. "I liked working with her," Quaid says. "I think she's just wonderful."

For all this, Quaid was initially reluctant to make a series, partially because it is so easy to be struck in a bad show. "I had been resisting television series for a long time," he says. "When Carsey-Werner offered this to me, I told them no and hung up the phone and thought that was it, but they came back. They asked me to come to their office, and they presented the idea.

"They were so enthusiastic about it, and the character sounded like a character I would like to play, and Jonathan Winters playing my dad — he's always been a real idol of mine, ever since I was a kid. So it felt right, and I decided to do it.

"I had just done about 13 movies back-to-back over a three-year period, and I was burned out on movies. I thought it would be nice to have a place to go to work every day here in town."

What more could an actor want — except to see his show finally get on the air?

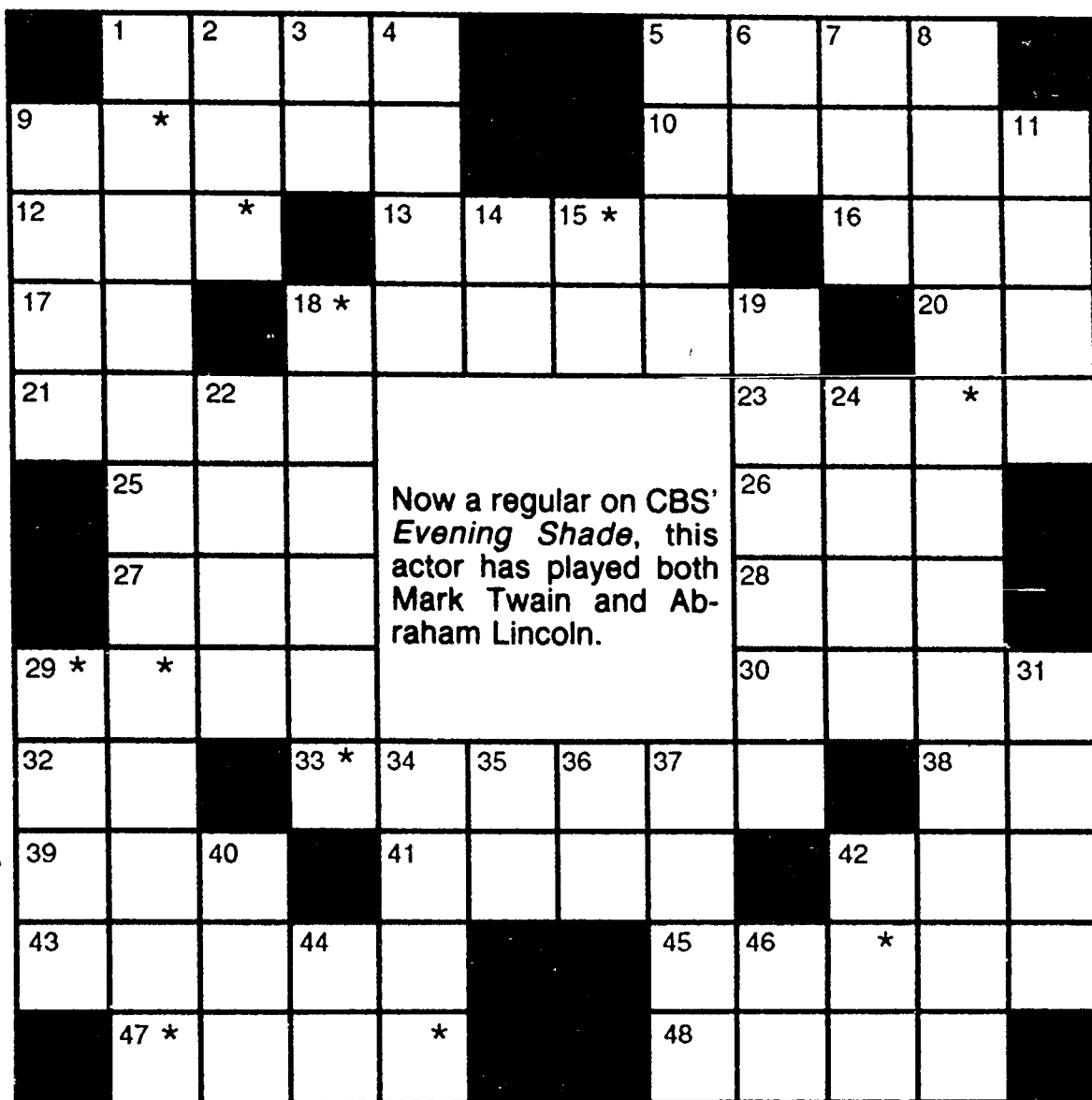
While still in her teens, Saldana began her career on the New York stage, working summer stock and dinner theater until her first feature-film role in *Nunzio*. Her big TV break came with a starring role in the series *Kojak*.

Saldana moved to Los Angeles and, in just six weeks, was starring in *I Wanna Hold Your Hand* as Grace. Her next major film was *Defiance* with Jan-Michael Vincent, then came the role of Jake LaMotta's sister-in-law in *Raging Bull*.

In 1982, the actress was brutally assaulted. During her recovery, she founded Victims for Victims, a self-help group that received recognition as one of the leading victims' groups in the United States. Her efforts earned her a Presidential Commendation and, in 1984, the lead in NBC's *Victims for Victims: The Theresa Saldana Story*. Her book, *Beyond Survival*, which deals with the experiences of victims (her own included), won the Christopher Medal.
