Governor listens to other side

A closed-door meeting Thursday between Gov. John Engler and the mayors of Northville and Livonia made little obvious headway in the cities' fight for their share of some \$20 million in annual racetrack taxes.

But the governor's reaction to the mayors' comments, and the amount of time he gave them to make their case, gave Mayor Chris Johnson hope that the racetrack cities may have finally gotten their message across.

"What we were trying to do was make sure that the governor specifically knew what was going on in our communities, how it impacted us, and what the rationale for the 40-year racing history is as it relates

to the racetrack communities," Johnson said. "We wanted to make sure that the governor himself heard that, directly from us, and he did. Now we'll have to find out exactly what he does with that."

Michigan cities with horse racetracks are slated to receive a percentage of the money that the state takes off racetrack revenue, up to \$900,000, as mandated by the State Racing Statute of 1984. But Engler's decision not to return any money to the cities this fiscal year has cost Northville an anticipated \$735,000 in revenue and left the city's budget in a shambles.

Under Northville's recently adopted deficit reduction plan, the city will raise the city's operating mil-

Mac's officials rescind policy

Corporate officials at McDonald's say the ban imposed last week on Northville High School students from the lobby of the store at Eight Mile and Haggerty roads was the product of a store manager speaking without authority or the power to enforce a policy that was non-existent in corporate handbooks.

Mike Doonan — the senior area supervisor who oversees McDonald's restaurants in the region which includes Eight Mile/Haggerty — said Thursday the first assistant manager who refused dining-room privileges to Northville student Brandon Cuadra spoke out of turn and without corporate approval.

"We don't have a policy of that nature. This store was previously owned by a group of private franchise investors. The corporation now owns that store, and we don't have a policy like that. The manager was an employee of the former owners," Doonan said.

Corporate officials from McDonald's public relations and marketing departments have said manager Jim Taylor, who told Cuadra and his friends Northville students were being blamed for the recent vandalism problems and theft reports, has been reprimanded for enforcing a policy that is not a corporate initiative.

"Our policy is to treat all customers fairly. We treat incidents on a one-to-one basis," said Danny Howell, marketing manager for McDonald's Southeastern Michigan operations.

"He (Taylor) was out of line and it was not his responsibility to do what he did. We don't ban anybody from the restaurant," Howell said.

"If we have problems that can't be solved by asking the person to leave the store, we call the police. We have a good working relationship with the police," Doonan said.

Doonan said that despite what Taylor said about attributing incidents of vandalism to Northville stu-

dents, he couldn't point a finger at anybody because he wasn't there to witness to the incidents in question.

"I can't attribute that. I can't attribute anything unless they are caught; I wasn't there so I don't know who did it," Doonan said about the recent disappearance of a picture that hung inside the lobby, near the door, at the south side entrance.

"Our policy is if somebody is belligerent or if someone is vandalizing property, we request them to leave; if they don't, we call the police," Doonan said.

But for Peggy Cuadra, Brandon's mother, the treatment Brandon received last week from store managers deserves an apology from McDonald's — not only to Brandon but to the entire student body.

"I think the Northville students in general deserve an apology. They (McDonald's officials) painted them all with the same brush. And lumped them altogether with those who are doing the vandalizing," Cuadra said.

"The issue has been brought to the managers' attention at that store and discussed in detail. We are working at addressing that issue (an apology)," Howell said Friday morning.

Doonan said as soon as he got wind of the news, he contacted Peggy Cuadra at home Tuesday night. Regional corporate officials were tied up in meetings in the early part of the week, which accounted for the delayed response to the incident from officials Tuesday, Doonan said. Store manager Joe Steinman was unavailable for comment on the issue Tuesday because of the inclement weather conditions, Doonan said.

"No one knew about it until Tuesday, and as soon as I heard of it I called the Cuadras and explained our policies — at 9 o'clock Tuesday night — I called her, you can quote me on that," Doonan said.

McDonald's officials say the matter will be explored further and until it is resolved students will be allowed to eat in the dining room without prejudice.

Family recovers from fire damage

The New Year is off to an unhappy start for the Holland family.

A fire sparked by a faulty wood-burning stove destroyed on Jan. 15 the Eight Mile Road farmhouse they were renting, as well as all their possessions.

While none of the eight family members were injured, this was another slap of hard luck. The father, Donald Holland, is currently unemployed and the low-income family were already being assisted by Civic Concern of Northville.

Now, the American Red Cross and the Northville School District are also helping the Hollands through this tough time. The family has no insurance.

"We just lost everything we had. The Red Cross and the firefighters said everything was destroyed. We lost it and there was nothing we could do," said mother Maxine Holland, whose three children attend Northville schools.

Also living in the home were Holland's mother, a brother, a sister and her husband, Donald. Sister Janet Roberts, 16, a student at Northville High School, was awakened by smoke, Holland

said, and rallied the others.

The fire, apparently caused by a defective fuel pipe in a heating stove, broke out at about 12:30 a.m.

Flames leaped up in the living room, where the stove was located, climbing the walls into the second story of the house and out the roof through the attic.

An estimated \$80,000 in damage was done. Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan said. About 35 percent of the older farmhouse was destroyed.

The fire department had difficulty getting to the house and clocked up a 13-minute response time, due to bad road conditions caused by the severe snowstorm last week, Lenaghan said. They remained on the scene until 4:30 a.m.

Eight Mile Road remained icy and heavily snow-covered in the area as late as Thursday.

"Everybody was up most of the night. We had to cut through the walls to get through to the fire. It was a lot of work," Lenaghan said.

"Quite a lot of damage was done to the building ... The loss was quite high."

The Hollands are staying with family members in South Lyon.

As of Friday, so many clothes have been do-

nated by families of the children's classmates at Cooke Middle School, Moraine Elementary School and Northville High School, that Holland hasn't had time to sort through them yet.

But she does know that all her kids now have warm boots to wear.

Holland expects the family will be able to move today into a new rental house down the street from their gutted home.

Civic Concern has already paid the electric bills on the destroyed residence so the lights can be turned on at the new home. Plenty of food has also been supplied to the family. Civic Concern Director Marlene Kunz said.

The Hollands will need more than food and clothes, however. Civic Concern is gathering funds for a security deposit on the rental home.

At present, the Hollands have no furniture or household goods. Kunz said Civic Concern hopes that donors will be able to deliver these straight to the family's new residence.

If you wish to assist, checks should be made out to Civic Concern with a memo that the money is for the Holland family, Kunz said. Civic Concern's address is 215 W. Cady Street, Northville, 48167.

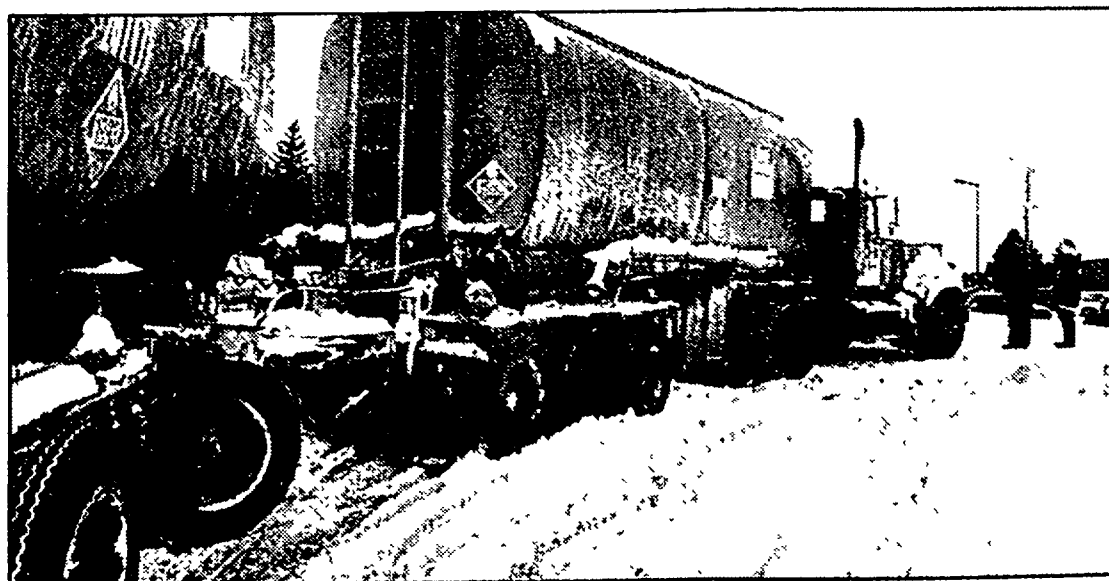

Governor hears the case of racetrack cities' mayors

lage by 4.2 mills and lay off two full-time and four part-time police officers, one clerical worker, one Department of Public Works employee, and one administrative staff member. Many pieces of aging city equipment will not be replaced, the city will not provide manpower or donations to several community events, and a deputy city manager's position budgeted for the current fiscal year will remain unfilled.

The deficit-reduction plan has been sent to the state Department of Treasury for its approval, in order to allow the city to sell more than \$1 million in tax and state-shared revenue anticipation notes needed to cover deficits in the city's general and capital improvement funds. Most of the deficit is due to the loss of state-returned racetrack revenue.

Whether Engler will change course and reimburse the racetrack cities is still questionable. But Johnson said the mayors' presentation did seem to open the governor's eyes to the extent of Northville's fiscal plight.

"We were scheduled for a 15-minute meeting, and we spent probably 45 minutes with the governor, and I took that as a very positive sign," he said. "It meant he was listening to all the items that we were presenting, and got exactly the flavor of what we were saying directly."

"That was important because I'm not sure whether the staff has adequately conveyed to him how bad it was in our situation specifically. For example, one of the questions that the governor asked me when I indicated that we had a 25-percent drop in revenue was, 'Was this 25 percent of your police department revenue?' And I made sure he knew that it was

25 percent of all our revenue."

Johnson said he also made sure to stress "the clearly dramatic impact (of the loss of racetrack revenue) on the city's bond ratings, and our fiscal integrity and health." The city has fine-tuned its deficit reduction plan to attempt to preserve its bond rating and maintain its ability to float bonds to finance future city projects. The bond rating firm Standard & Poors has warned city officials that too drastic a cut in city services or too high a hike in the millage rate could endanger the rating.

The mayors had several points to make to the governor, and Johnson said they made them all.

"We made the points of how it had hit our community specifically, and how we're the most dramatic example in the State of Michigan," he said. "We reviewed the policy choices that

the Legislature had made when they first established the racing law, and that was very significant because I don't know if that had been reviewed by the staff with the governor in any detail. . . . The staff of the Senate Fiscal Agency several years ago started off with the proposition that the \$900,000 is specifically and only for reimbursement to the cities for police, fire, traffic, that sort of protection. . . which is wrong."

"We made sure that (Engler) knew, and we could dramatically describe for the governor in both Livonia's situation and our situation, that the community could do better off by having something else located at that track, with an appropriate SEV that all the taxing units could have, rather than the state just taking the racing money. We described that as a re-

venue sharing, and I think he understood that."

The mayors also refuted the state administration's contention that racetracks provide much positive economic spin-off for their host communities. "I made it clear that we weren't receiving any benefits of that spin-off, but the kind of spin-off we were seeing were things that are problems for the community, like the traffic, like the potential for crime, that kind of issue," Johnson said.

Whether or not all the talk will sway Engler's opinion is unclear.

"We didn't come to a specific conclusion but he did indicate to us . . . that he and the budget director, Ms. Woodworth, would review all of the information that we had just provided to him," Johnson said. "He was

going to go back and review the statutory provisions of the racing act and the restrictions that are placed on that fund, and he indicated that he would definitely reconsider it. He didn't say that he would provide the money to the communities. He didn't say he wouldn't do it. He simply indicated that he would be reconsidering the administration's position and let us know as promptly as he could."

The meeting with the governor included Johnson and Livonia Mayor Robert Bennett, state Budget Director Paul Woodworth, Sen. Robert Geake (R-Northville), Rep. Georgina Goss (R-Northville) and Rep. Lyn Bankes (R-Livonia).

Two previously scheduled meetings had been canceled by the governor's office.

bers are wary of Canton Township's agreement with Municon, and seem to be in no hurry to climb aboard the bandwagon of an outfit they know little about.

"I'm pretty skittish about the out-

fit," said Trustee Richard Allen.

"What are we getting for the money?" "Northville and Northville Township shouldn't rush into this . . . There's too much at stake," added Trustee James Nowka.

Trustee Thomas Handyside asked

perhaps the most basic question.

"Do we know that our constituents want cable television?" he said. "If the people of Northville Township say they don't want cable television . . . the people out there are the ones we should ask."

Omnicon's basic rate tops north-ern neighbor MetroVision (Novi area) by four dollars per household. Rates are only one issue township residents are interested in, said Eunice Switzer, township deputy clerk.

Switzer on Friday said residents

have mailed in at least 250 cable television survey forms recently distributed by the township. Comments and complaints range from service problems to picture quality to cable wires strung across the ground, she said.

"And some say there are too many outages, poor quality service and high fees for comparable area (cable firms)," she said.

Lisa Boland, Omnicon's general manager, is expected to attend Tuesday's public hearing.

Township considers weighmasters

An attempt to kick-start a motor carrier enforcement team in Northville Township has run into a roadblock — the township board.

Board members on Jan. 9 tabled a proposal to implement a weighmaster program here, a project that apparently has the backing of some residents and some township officials.

Township police Chief Chip Snider told the board that his office has been contacted by residents concerned about truck traffic. Such traffic includes gravel haulers, garbage trucks and other heavy vehicles, and often travels the western portion of the township, including Beck Road and the western end of the three township mile roads.

The trucks, some say, pose safety hazards and contribute heavily to wear and tear on local roadways. Snider's plan would have used town-

ship police officers as a motor carrier enforcement team to check for overweight trucks and trucks operating with defective equipment.

Plymouth and Canton townships have moved to a weighmaster program, and Snider indicated that trucks have identified Northville Township as a safe haven, especially since Beck Road was paved between Seven Mile and Eight Mile roads.

A township staffer agreed with Snider that the plan could benefit residents in western Northville Township.

"It's certainly a need in that area," said Carol Maise, township planning and zoning administrator. Maise said complaints about truck traffic have increased, especially in light of Holloway Sand and Gravel's proposed development along Six Mile and Ridge roads.

But some members of the township board were not overly enthused with the notion of a weighmaster program. Board members noted that

the \$10,000 Snider anticipated as start-up costs was not in the township's 1992 budget.

The \$10,000 would purchase certified weighmaster scales and pay for training of three officers.

Snider countered by telling the board that anticipated revenues from fines would pay the freight for initial costs. He said Plymouth Township's similar weighmaster program — started last summer — earned the township more than \$60,000 in fines from trucks in violation of safety codes or weight restrictions.

Trustee Thomas Handyside asked if the program would unfairly target trucks, or lend to harassment of the trucking industry. He said "trucks have the right to go up and down the road" but did not have a "right to be in non-conformance."

He then asked Snider if the township was expecting to make a profit in the weighmaster business.

Snider replied that he was "not in the profit business" but did not want

to lose money with the proposed venture.

"But you've got to go out and get people," Handyside responded.

Trustee Richard Allen then moved to support Snider's plan, which prompted Handyside to abstain from voting on the measure due to a possible conflict of interest. Handyside recently took a job with Browning-Ferris Industries, a firm that operates a landfill just across the border from Northville Township at Six Mile and Napier roads.

BFI trucks use haul routes through Northville Township, and Handyside felt his relationship with the firm could create a conflict, although he did engage in the bulk of the weighmaster project discussions.

Treasurer Jack Hosmer asked Snider to research communities that have used a weighmaster program for at least three years. Snider agreed and is expected to have a report ready for next month's board session.

OLP, schools to join in education

Enrollment in Northville schools' special education program is expected to jump next year by at least 63 students if a 30-day trial placement program between Our Lady of Providence School, Northville and Livonia schools proves feasible this spring.

Edwin Page, interim executive director of special education for Northville, told district school board members last Monday night that the two districts and the school for mentally impaired students have reached an agreement and identified temporary placements for the center's 63 students in regional special-education programs. The program, a 30-day trial program slated to start March 2 and run through April 3, is being underwritten entirely by the Wayne County Special Education millage.

According to Page, children and young adults between the ages of 10 and 26 have been evaluated by the district's psychologist to determine the best place and level for their temporary placements. Under the temporary plan, at least 11 of the 63 students will be placed directly in Northville

schools — six at the Old Village School, two at the Bryant school in Livonia (which is operated by Northville), and three in the middle schools. That figure could change school administrators said because two students have yet to be assigned to temporary sites.

Page said the program is the result of a state mandate requiring districts to provide auxiliary services for handicapped persons living within the district's boundaries.

"We are required by law to provide temporary services for the residents who live in our area," Page said.

In addition to being required to provide speech and language therapy, and occupational and physical therapy services under the state's Auxiliary Act, the district will also be responsible for the transportation of all the students to and from the center at 16115 Beck Road to their temporary assignments.

Transportation arrangements should place no additional hardship on the district's bus system, Page said.

Sister Linda Willette, administrator at Our Lady of Providence Center in Northville, said the program is an exciting opportunity for the school and

its students.

"It gives us an opportunity for our kids to have more experience in the community. It prepares them to be better citizens and more productive members of the community," Willette said.

The center, which has been in operation since 1957, provides residential, educational, and vocational programs for mentally impaired females between the ages of 10 and 26. The school is diverting its educational programs from the center's infrastructure to the community. Willette said in an attempt to provide "more comprehensive educational programs and opportunities for the students. The temporary program will serve as a trial-and-error period for both students and teachers alike to adjust to the program before it becomes a full-time option for students in the 1992-93 school year.

Page said students will be evaluated at the end of February to ensure their placements are fostering a positive learning environment for each individual student.

"It is an excellent cooperative team effort with Northville schools, staff, and principals. We are all very excited, the staff and the administration alike," she said.

- (8) The court shall not order the secretary of state under subsection (5) to issue a restricted license that would permit the person to operate a truck, tractor, including a trailer, that hauls hazardous materials.
- (9) The court shall not order the secretary of state to issue a restricted license unless the person states under oath, and the court finds pursuant to testimony taken in open court or pursuant to statements contained in a sworn affidavit on a form prescribed by the state court administrator, that the person is unable to take public transportation to and from his or her work location, place of alcohol or drug education treatment, court-ordered community service program, or education institution, and does not have any family members or other individuals able to provide transportation.
- (10) The court order issued under subsection (5) and the restricted license shall indicate the permitted destination of the person, the approved route or routes if specified by the court, and permitted times of travel.
- (11) As used in this section, "work location" means, as applicable, either the specific place or places of employment, or the territory or territories regularly visited by the person in pursuance of the person's occupation, or both.
- (12) Immediately upon acceptance by the court of a plea of guilty or nolo contendere or upon entry of a verdict of guilty for a violation of MCLA 257.625 (1), (3), (4), or (5), or a local ordinance substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3), or the person shall surrender to the court his or her operator's or chauffeur's license or permit. The court shall immediately destroy the license or permit and forward an abstract of conviction with court-ordered license sanctions to the secretary of state. Upon receipt of, and pursuant to, the abstract of conviction with court-ordered license sanctions, the secretary of state shall suspend or revoke the person's license and, if ordered by the court and the person is otherwise eligible for the license, issue to the person a restricted license stating the limited driving privileges indicated on the abstract. If the judgment and sentence is appealed to circuit court, the court may, ex parte, order the secretary of state to stay the suspension, revocation, or restricted license issued pursuant to this section pending the outcome of the appeal.

SECTION 5.150 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.150. Implied consent, chemical tests.

- (1) A person who operates a vehicle upon a public highway or other place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of vehicles, within this Township is considered to have given consent to chemical test of his or her blood, breath, or urine for the purpose of determining the amount of alcohol or presence of a controlled substance or both in his or her blood, in all of the following circumstances:
- If the person is arrested for a violation of MCLA 257.625(1), (3), (4), or (5), or a local ordinance substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3).
 - If the person is arrested for felonious driving, negligent homicide, manslaughter, or murder resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle, and the peace officer had reasonable grounds to believe that the person was operating the vehicle while impaired by or under the influence of an intoxicating liquor or a controlled substance, or a combination of intoxicating liquor and a controlled substance, or while having a blood alcohol content of 0.108 or more by weight of alcohol.
- (2) A person who is afflicted with hemophilia, diabetes, or a condition requiring the use of an anticoagulant under the direction of a physician shall not be considered to have given consent to the withdrawal of blood.
- (3) The tests shall be administered as provided in MCLA 257.625a(3).

SECTION 5.154 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.154. Chemical tests, refusal, report to secretary of state.

- (1) If a person refuses the request of a peace officer to submit to a chemical test offered pursuant to MCLA 257.625a(3), a test shall not be given without court order, but the officer may seek to obtain the court order.
- (2) A written report shall immediately be forwarded to the secretary of state by the peace officer. The report shall state that the officer had reasonable grounds to believe that the person had committed a crime described in MCLA 257.625a(1), and that the person had refused to submit to the test upon the request of the peace officer and had been advised of the consequences of the refusal. The form of the report shall be prescribed and furnished by the secretary of state.
- SECTION 5.155 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
- SECTION 5.155. Chemical test, refusal, notification of availability of hearing, suspension.
- (1) If a person refuses to submit to a chemical test pursuant to section MCLA 257.625d, the peace officer shall immediately notify the person in writing that within 14 days of the date of this notice the person may request a hearing as provided in section MCLA 257.625f. The form of the notice shall be prescribed and furnished by the secretary of state.
- (2) The notice shall specifically state that failure to request a hearing within 14 days will result in the suspension of the person's license or permit to drive. The notice shall also state that there is not a requirement that the person retain counsel, and that the person may request a hearing and be permitted to represent the person at the hearing.
- SECTION 5.156 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
- SECTION 5.156. Chemical test, suspension, hearing, time limits, findings.
- (1) If a person who refuses to submit to a chemical test pursuant to MCLA 257.625d does not request a hearing within 14 days of the date of notice pursuant to MCLA 257.625e, the secretary of state shall suspend or deny the person's operator's or chauffeur's license or permit to drive, or nonresident operating privilege, for a period of 6 months, or for a second or subsequent refusal within a period of 7 years, for 1 year. If the person is a resident without a license or permit to operate a vehicle in the state, the secretary of state shall deny to the person the issuance of a license or permit for a period of 6 months, or for a second or subsequent refusal within a period of 7 years, for 1 year.
- (2) If a hearing is requested, the secretary of state shall hold the hearing in the same manner and under the same conditions as provided in MCLA 257.322. A person shall not order a hearing officer to make a particular finding on any issue enumerated under subdivisions (a) to (d). Not less than 5 days' notice of the hearing shall be mailed to the person requesting the hearing, to the peace officer who filed the report under MCLA 257.625d, and if the prosecuting attorney requests receipt of the notice, to the prosecuting attorney of the county where the arrest was made. The hearing officer may administer oaths, issue subpoenas for the attendance of necessary witnesses, and grant a reasonable request for an adjournment. Not more than 1 adjournment shall be granted to a party and the length of an adjournment shall not exceed 14 days. A hearing under this subsection shall be scheduled to be held within 45 days after the date of arrest and shall, except for delay attributable to the unavailability of the defendant, a witness, or material evidence, or due to an interlocutory appeal or exceptional circumstances, but not a delay caused by docket congestion, be finally adjudicated within 77 days after the date of arrest. The hearing shall cover only the following issues:
- Whether the peace officer had reasonable grounds to believe that the person had committed a crime described in MCLA 257.625c(1).
 - Whether the person was placed under arrest for a crime described in MCLA 257.625c(1).
 - If the person refused to submit to the test upon the request of the officer, whether the refusal was reasonable.
 - Whether the person was advised of the rights under MCLA 257.625a(3).
- (3) The hearing officer shall make a record of proceedings held pursuant to subsection (2). The record shall be prepared and transcribed in accordance with section 66 of the administrative procedures act of 1969, Act No. 306 of the Public Acts of 1969, being section 24.286 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. Upon notification of the filing of a petition for judicial review pursuant to MCLA 257.322, the hearing officer shall transmit to the court in which the petition was filed, not less than 10 days before the matter is set for review, the original or a certified copy of the official record of the proceedings. Proceedings at which evidence was presented need not be transcribed and transmitted if the sole reason for review is to determine whether or not the court will order the issuance of a restricted license. The parties to the proceedings for judicial review may stipulate that the record be shortened. A party unreasonably refusing to stipulate to a shortened record may be taxed by the court in which the petition is filed for the additional costs. The court may permit subsequent corrections to the record.
- (4) After a hearing, if the person who requested the hearing does not prevail, the secretary of state shall suspend or deny issuance of a license or driving permit or a nonresident operating privilege of the person for a period of 6 months, or for a second or subsequent refusal within 7 years, for 1 year. If the person is a resident without a license or permit to operate a vehicle in the state, the secretary of state shall deny to the person the issuance of a license or permit for a period of 6 months, or for a second or subsequent refusal within 7 years, for 1 year. The person may file a petition in the circuit court of the county in which the arrest was made to review the suspension or denial as provided in MCLA 257.323. If after the hearing the person who requested the hearing prevails, the peace officer shall file the report under MCLA 257.625d with the consent of the prosecuting attorney, file a petition in the circuit court of the county in which the arrest was made to review the determination of the hearing officer as provided in MCLA 257.323.
- (5) When it has been finally determined that a nonresident's privilege to operate a vehicle in the state has been suspended or denied, the department shall give notice in writing of the action taken to the motor vehicle administrator of the state of the person's residence and the state in which he or she has a license to operate a motor vehicle.
- SECTION 5.157 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
- SECTION 5.157. Refusal of chemical test, confiscation of license, temporary license, report to secretary of state, blood test.
- (1) If a person refuses a chemical test offered pursuant to MCLA 257.625a(3), or submits to the chemical test and the test reveals a blood alcohol content of 0.108 or more by weight of alcohol, the peace officer who requested the person to submit to the test shall do all of the following:
- On behalf of the secretary of state, immediately confiscate the person's license or permit to operate a motor vehicle and, if the person is otherwise eligible for a license or permit, issue a temporary license or permit to the person that is valid until the criminal charges against the person are dismissed, or until the person pleads guilty or nolo contendere, or is found guilty of those charges. The temporary license or permit shall be on a form provided by the secretary of state.
 - Except as provided in subsection (2), immediately do all of the following:
 - Forward a copy of the written report of the person's refusal to submit to a chemical test to the secretary of state.
 - Notify the secretary of state by means of the law enforcement information network that a temporary license or permit was issued to the person.
 - Except as provided in subsection (2), destroy the person's driver's license or permit.
- (2) If a person submits to a chemical test offered pursuant to MCLA 257.625a(3) that requires the withdrawal of blood and a report of the results of that chemical test is not immediately available, the peace officer who requested the person to submit to the test shall comply with subsection (1)(a) pending receipt of the test results. If, upon receipt of the report of a blood alcohol content of 0.108 or more by weight of alcohol, the peace officer who requested the person to submit to the test shall immediately comply with subsection (1)(b). If, upon receipt, the report reveals a blood alcohol content of less than 0.108 by weight of alcohol, the peace officer who requested the person to submit to the test shall immediately notify the person of the test results and immediately return the person's license or permit by first-class mail to the address given at the time of arrest.
- SECTION 5.158 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
- SECTION 5.158. Drunk driving prevention equipment and training fund.
- (1) The drunk driving prevention equipment and training fund is created as a separate fund in the state treasury. Money in the fund shall be expended only as provided in subsection (2). The state treasurer shall credit to the fund all money received for that purpose under MCLA 257.320e, and as otherwise provided by law. The state treasurer shall invest money in the fund in the same manner as surplus funds are invested under section 143 of Act No. 105 of the Public Acts of 1985, being section 21.143 of the Michigan Compiled Laws. Earnings from the fund shall be credited to the fund. Money in the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall remain in the fund, and shall not revert to the general fund.
- (2) The department of state police shall administer the fund. Money in the fund shall be used only to administer the fund, to purchase and maintain breath alcohol testing equipment, and to provide training to law enforcement personnel of this state in the use of that breath alcohol testing equipment.
- (3) The department of treasury shall, before November 1, of each year, notify the department of state police of the balance in the fund at the close of the preceding fiscal year.
- (4) The department of state police shall promulgate rules to implement subsection (2).
- (5) The drunk driving caseflow assistance fund is created as a separate fund in the state treasury. The purpose of the fund is to promote the timely disposition of cases in which the defendant is charged with a violation of MCLA 257.625(1) or (3), or a local ordinance substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3). Money in the fund shall be expended only as provided in subsection (7).
- (6) The state treasurer shall credit the drunk driving caseflow assistance fund with deposits of proceeds from the collection of

revenue from license reinstatement fees as provided for in MCLA 257.320e, and all income from investment credited to the fund by the state treasurer. The state treasurer may invest money contained in the drunk driving caseflow assistance fund in any manner authorized by law for the investment of state money. However, an investment shall not interfere with any apportionment, allocation, or payment of money required by this section. The state treasurer shall credit to the fund all income earned as a result of an investment. Money in the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall remain in the fund and shall not revert to the general fund.

- (7) The state court administrator, at the direction of the supreme court and upon confirmation of the amount by the state treasurer, shall distribute from the drunk driving case flow assistance fund the total amount available in a fiscal year to each district of the district court and each municipal court as provided in this section. The state court administrator, after reimbursement of costs as provided in this subsection, shall distribute the balance of the drunk driving caseflow assistance fund annually to each district of the district court and each municipal court in an amount determined by multiplying the amount available for distribution by a fraction, the numerator of which is the number of cases in which the defendant was charged with a violation of MCLA 257.625(1) or (3), or a local ordinance substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3) in the prior calendar year in that district of the district court or that municipal court as certified by the state court administrator and the denominator of which is the total number of cases in all districts of the district court and all municipal courts in which the defendant was charged with a violation of MCLA 257.625(1) or (3), or a local ordinance substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3) in the calendar year. The state court administrator shall be reimbursed annually from the drunk driving caseflow assistance fund for all reasonable costs associated with the administration of this section, including judicial and staff training, on-site management assistance, and software development and conversion.

SECTION 5.151 IS ADDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.151. Annual state police drunk driving audit.

- (1) The department of state police shall prepare an annual report which shall be designated the Michigan annual drunk driving audit. The secretary of state, circuit court, district court, probate court, municipal courts, and local units of government in this state shall cooperate with the department of state police to provide information necessary for the preparation of the report. A copy of the report prepared under this subsection shall be submitted to the governor, the secretary of the senate, the clerk of the house of representatives, and the secretary of state on June 1 of each year. The report shall contain for each county in the state all of the following information applicable to the immediately preceding calendar year:
- The number of alcohol related motor vehicle accidents resulting in bodily injury, including a breakdown of the number of those injuries occurring per capita of population and per road mile in the county.
 - The number of alcohol related motor vehicle accidents resulting in death, including the breakdown described in subdivision (a).
 - The number of alcohol related motor vehicle accidents, other than those enumerated in subdivision (a) and (b), including the breakdown described in subdivision (a).
 - The number of arrests made for violations of MCLA 257.625(1)(a) or (b) or local ordinances substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1)(a) or (b).
 - The number of arrests made for violations of MCLA 257.625(3) or local ordinances substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(3).
 - The number of arrests made for violations of MCLA 257.625(4) or (5).
 - The number of operator's or chauffeur's licenses suspended pursuant to MCLA 257.625f.
 - The number of arrests made for violations of MCLA 257.625a or local ordinances substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625a. This subdivision shall apply after December 31, 1992.
- (2) The secretary of state shall compile a report of disposition of charges for violations of MCLA 257.625(1), (3), (4), or (5), or local ordinances substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625(1) or (3) or MCLA 257.625a or local ordinances substantially corresponding to MCLA 257.625a by each judge for inclusion in the annual report. The report compiled by the secretary of state shall include information regarding all of the following:
- The number of dismissals granted.
 - The number of convictions entered.
 - The number of acquittals entered.
 - The number of licenses suspended, revoked, or restricted.
 - The average length of imprisonment imposed.
 - The average length of community service imposed in lieu of imprisonment.
 - The average fine imposed.
- (3) The secretary of state shall enter into a contract with the university of Michigan transportation research institute, in which the university of Michigan transportation research institute shall evaluate the effect and impact of the 1991 legislation addressing drunk and impaired driving in this state and report its findings to the governor and the legislature not later than October 1, 1994.

SECTION 5.160 IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.160. Possession or transportation of open containers of alcoholic liquor in a motor vehicle, violation, penalty.

- (1) Except as provided in subsection (2), a person shall not transport or possess alcoholic liquor in a container that is open or unsealed or upon which the seal is broken within the passenger compartment of a vehicle upon a highway, or within the passenger compartment of a moving vehicle in any place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of vehicles in this Township, if the vehicle is equipped with a trunk or compartment accessible from the passenger compartment, the container is enclosed or encased, and the container is not readily accessible to the occupants of the vehicle.
- (2) A person may transport or possess alcoholic liquor in a container that is open or unsealed or upon which the seal is broken within the passenger compartment of a vehicle upon a highway or other place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of vehicles in this Township, if the vehicle is equipped with a trunk or compartment accessible from the passenger compartment, the container is enclosed or encased, and the container is not readily accessible to the occupants of the vehicle.
- (3) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (4) This section does not apply to a passenger in a chartered vehicle authorized to operate by the Michigan department of transportation.

SECTION 5.62a IS ADDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.62a. Driving on suspended or revoked license prohibited, penalty, secretary of state license action, exception.

- (1) A person whose operator's or chauffeur's license or registration certificate has been suspended or revoked and who has been notified as provided in MCLA 257.212 of that suspension or revocation, whose application for license has been denied, or who has never applied for a license, shall not operate a motor vehicle upon a highway or other place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of motor vehicles within this Township. A person shall not knowingly permit a motor vehicle owned by the person to be operated upon a highway or other place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of vehicles, within this Township by a person whose license or registration certificate has been suspended or revoked, or whose application for license has been denied, or who has never applied for a license, except as permitted under MCLA 257.904. A person who violates this subsection is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable as follows:
- If the person's operator's or chauffeur's license has been suspended under MCLA 257.212a because that person has failed to answer upon citation of unlawful operation of a vehicle or judgment issued pursuant to MCLA 257.907, by imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or a fine of not more than \$100.00, or both.
 - For a violation, other than a violation punishable under subdivision (a), by imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or by a fine of not more than \$500.00, or both, unless the vehicle was stolen or used with the permission of a person who did not knowingly permit an unlicensed driver to operate the vehicle, the registration plates of the vehicle shall be confiscated.
 - For a second or subsequent violation punishable under subdivision (b), by imprisonment for not more than 1 year, or a fine of not more than \$1,000.00, or both. Unless the vehicle was stolen, the registration plates of the vehicle shall be confiscated.
- (2) The secretary of state, upon receiving a record of the conviction or probable cause disposition of a person upon a charge of unlawful operation of a motor vehicle while the license of the person is suspended or revoked or of the conviction, civil infraction determination, or probable cause disposition of a person for a moving violation of the vehicle laws of this state or a political subdivision of this state while the license of the person is suspended or revoked immediately shall extend the period of the first suspension or revocation for an additional 180-day period. This subsection shall apply if the violation occurs during suspension of definite length, or the violation occurs before the person is approved for a license following a revocation.
- (3) The secretary of state, upon receiving a record of the conviction, bond forfeiture, or a civil infraction determination of a person upon a charge of unlawful operation of a motor vehicle requiring a class 1, class 2, or class 3 endorsement, or vehicle group designation while the endorsement or designation is suspended pursuant to MCLA 257.319a or 319b, or revoked, immediately shall extend the period of suspension or revocation for an additional like period. This subsection shall apply only if the violation occurs during a suspension of definite length, or if the violation occurs before the person is approved for a

It's do or die time for the Fourth — again

Last year, Northville's Fourth of July celebration faced a crisis when the disbanding of the Northville Jaycees left the day without an organizer. In an amazing display of effort and energy, the local Michigan Military Family Support Group stepped into the breach as a sponsoring organization and, using the Gulf War as patriotic leverage, gathered enough cooperation and funding to pull off the community's biggest Independence Day ever.

This year, it's crisis time again. The military support group, obviously, is not as active this year as it was last year, so the new Kiwanis Club has taken over sponsorship. But that's only the start. Pulling the Fourth together requires an extreme amount of personal effort and hard cash, and the town will have to pull together once again if the tradition expects to continue.

You might not think of it while standing around watching the parade, but the Fourth of July is an expensive proposition. It takes money to put on the parade. It takes money to pay for police and public-works services required for the crowds which flood the downtown area. It takes money to pay for the fireworks. And so on.

The day also requires a lot of people to donate a lot of time. Organizing the parade is a tremendous chore. Setting up the fireworks takes work. Making sure the rest of the day comes together as

planned requires a lot of planning beforehand and more effort on the Fourth itself.

Independence Day has become a big tradition in Northville, of course. Last year only strengthened the community's ties to the holiday.

Just do it — whatever 'it' is



If you subscribe to *Sports Illustrated*, or even if you just watch a lot of sports on TV, you've probably seen the series of ads for Nike shoes with the slogan "Just Do It." Some of them are exquisite examples of the adman's art, but even if the ads weren't attractive, I'd still love the slogan. The message is that there's no excuse for not doing the right thing. If there's something you want to accomplish in life, don't make excuses, don't put it off, "Just Do It."

Three words. Eight letters and two spaces. And yet I've found them to be a great inspiration when fear and laziness try to hold me back. For everything from vacuuming the living room to asking out a lady friend, they seem to work.

A couple of years ago I decided I wanted to do some charity work, so I just did it. Twice I served on the allocation board for my local United Way chapter, and found it an incredibly rewarding experience.

When I moved to Northville I promised myself I would find a new charitable organization to be involved with. When I learned that the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America in Novi was forming a volunteer organization called SPARK (the Society for the Preservation of American Racing Knowledge), a 3,000-horsepower pulling tractor couldn't have kept me from Just Doing It.

Those who know me know that my reasons for being involved with the Motorsports Hall aren't entirely altruistic. Get me around cars, and I'm like a kid in a candy shop. Come to think of it, when I was a kid I spent more time hanging around garages and car dealerships in my neighborhood than at the candy shop.

Until this year, every dollar that the Motorsports Hall took in went to pay for the annual banquet where new members

were honored. SPARK's first order of business was to raise operating funds and help the Motorsports Hall settle into its new home in the Novi Expo Center.

Our first fund-raiser was Saturday's Pre-Grand Opening Celebration which featured a dance, a car show, a buffet and an auction.

It was no easy task to pull off. Planning began in September, but the serious work took place in the last month. We had to pull together 50 classic and modern race vehicles, send out hundreds of invitations, solicit donations of door prizes and auction items, and greet VIPs. On top of that there was manual labor: building a stage for the band, hanging curtains, and shoving 50 race cars and boats (some of them valued in the millions of dollars) into place.

At every work session, no one sat around with their hands in their pockets. The attitude was simple. Just Do It.

Last summer, when I attended the Hall's annual induction banquet at the Renaissance Center, I remarked in this space that the evening was a class act. Saturday's event sustained that reputation, and raised nearly \$20,000 in the process.

Maggie Champagne, chairperson of SPARK and a veteran of many years of work in nonprofit fund-raising, said earning \$20,000 in the first year of any nonprofit event is unheard of. And in a recession year, no less. The Motorsports Hall of Fame has hit the track at full throttle.

When we work all the bugs out and come back next year with another dance and auction, we could earn twice that much. As for the future, who knows? What can the Motorsports Hall of Fame of America and SPARK do for a topper?

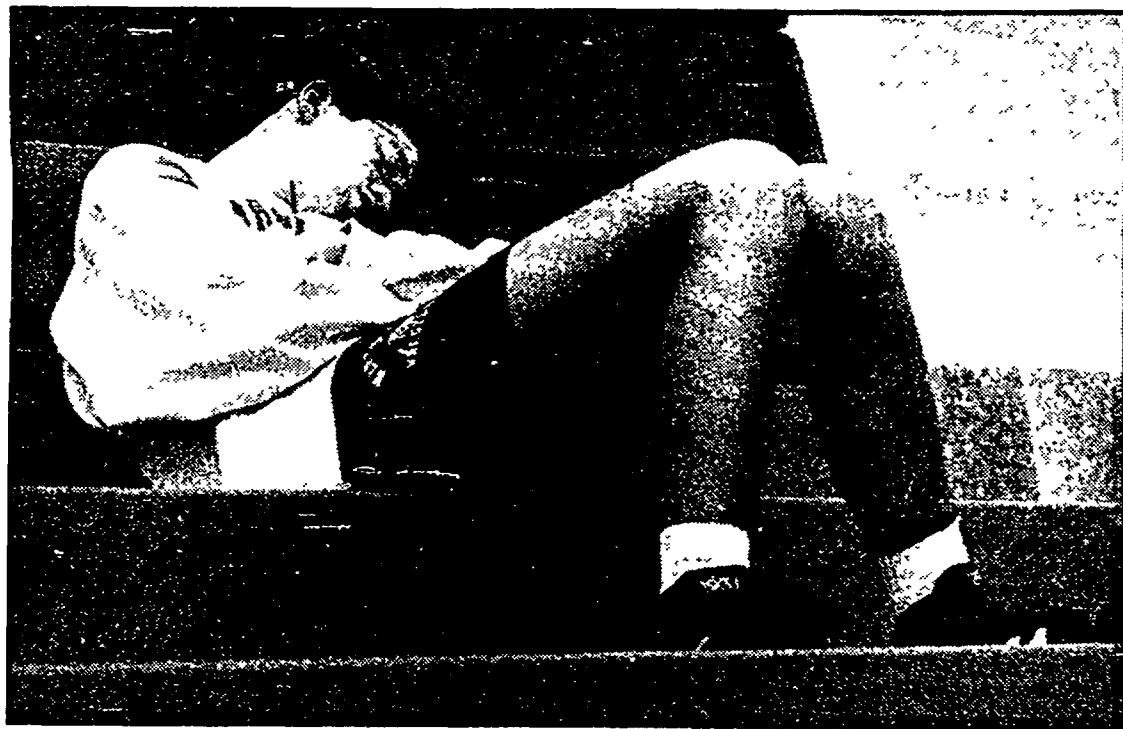

Here's why insurance rates go up



Bloomfield Hills were the majority. Dissenting was Judge Barbara MacKenzie of Petoskey.

Monarch v. Battle Creek — Loren Monarch, drunk and with a suspended driver's license, climbed on a motorcycle and led a city police officer on a chase at 80 mph in a 35 mph zone, the wrong way on a one-way street and through a stop sign. Monarch stopped in the middle of the road with no lights. The cop cracked into him. (Later, Monarch pleaded guilty to fleeing and evading police.)

Monarch sued the city and the cop. The jury found the cop negligent and 10 percent to blame. Monarch appealed, saying the trial judge should have granted his motion for summary judgment under the no-fault principle.

In a complicated ruling, Gribbs and Kelly agreed, affirming the damage award.

MacKenzie dissented, saying "the accident was caused by plaintiff's flight rather than the involvement of an automobile . . ."

A loss for the taxpayers.

Marzonie v. Auto Club — In Flint, Michael Marzonie got into a dispute with Vernon Oaks and chased Oaks home. Marzonie's passenger threw beer bottles at Oaks' car. Oaks emerged from his house with a shotgun, aimed at the radiator and hit Marzonie. (Oaks later pleaded guilty to careless discharge of a firearm.)

Marzonie sued his insurer under no-fault and got a \$43,000 jury award. The insurer appealed and lost.

Gribbs and Kelly said, "Here the jury expressly found that Oaks' assault was directed at plaintiff's automobile rather than at plaintiff . . . Accordingly, plaintiff is entitled to no-fault benefits."

MacKenzie dissented, saying it was a gunshot injury that merely occurred in an automobile.

Common sense would tell one to sue the guy who did the shooting, but lawyers look for the deep pockets. Score a loss of Auto Club members.

Schild v. Aetna — In Oscoda, Jack Schild was sued by a passenger in a May 18, 1986, accident. Schild said Aetna should defend or indemnify him. The jury agreed.

Aetna appealed, saying Schild's policy expired March 26 and that Schild had ignored eight documents saying it expired March 26. Somehow Schild was issued a certificate of in-

surance saying the expiration date was Sept. 26, 1986.

"An insured has an obligation to read the insurance policy and raise questions concerning coverage," said Kelly and Gribbs, but then comes the "However . . ."

They found a "special relationship" between Schild and his local agent in which the agent would call Schild when premiums were due. Schild would pay in person, and the agent even helped Schild pay premiums. Gribbs and Kelly upheld the jury award.

MacKenzie dissented: "An insurer should not be estopped from denying coverage simply because an insured decides to ignore the terms of coverage. Yet that is precisely the result of the majority's opinion."

In all three cases, Gribbs and Kelly stretched as far as possible to find ways for the "deep pockets" to be tapped.

The winners were a drunken, speeding motorcyclist; a guy chasing someone and looking for a fight; and a chap who wouldn't read.

Losers are taxpayers and other insured drivers.

I keep stories like that in mind when the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association babbles that there's no "crisis" in Michigan and that greedy insurers are to blame for everything.

Reapportionment hearings set

A three-judge state Court of Appeals panel will hold public hearings next week in Detroit on plans to reapportion the Michigan Legislature.

Judges Harold Hood, T. John Lesinski and William Peterson will meet in Detroit in public sessions to hear arguments Monday through Wednesday, Jan. 27-29.

The Legislature itself was unable to agree on new districts by the Jan. 15 deadline, as required by the Michigan Supreme Court.

"It's still real early," said Rep. Willis Bullard, R-Highland, a GOP point man on the House reapportionment panel.

"Our (Republican) technical experts think we have a plan that meets the court's criteria better. We could have come up with a politically gerrymandered plan to help us take control. But it would be rejected by the court."

The Court of Appeals panel has until Feb. 15 to make a recommendation to the Supreme Court. It may choose one of the parties' plans, pick another plan or draw up its own plan.

Hood is a sitting Court of Appeals judge; Lesinski is a former lieutenant governor and retired chief judge of the Court of Appeals; and Peterson is a former northern Michigan circuit judge.

"Our plan came up with six Republicans in each others' districts (none

locally)," Bullard said.

Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia, agreed the GOP plan is mathematically better. "The Democrats wrote incumbent-protection plans. The Republicans wrote computer plans," she said.

She said Republicans Georgina Goss of Northville and Barbara Dobb of West Bloomfield seemed safe under either plan.

Bankes said she would have a more difficult time under her own party's plan because it threw her into the same district as a Democrat from Redford.

Bullard said population growth in western Oakland means "I have to lose something." Under the GOP plan, he would lose three northern

townships (Groveland, Holly and Rose), retain the Milford area and pick up the city of Walled Lake.

Two maverick lawmakers — Sen. John Kelly, D-Grosse Pointe, and Rep. Tom Power, R-Traverse City — tossed their own plans into the hopper.

Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, chair of the House panel on legislative redistricting, said she expects more plans to be presented by such groups as Common Cause or minorities.

The number of state legislators will remain the same: 38 senators and 110 representatives. But population shifts are expected to cost Detroit one of its five Senate seats and four or five House seats.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Novi City Council has adopted Ordinance No. 92-37.13, an Ordinance to add subdivision VII to Division 4 of Article II of Chapter 34 of the Novi Code of Ordinances, to provide a Debt Service Charge for Users of the Novi Road Water Main Arm.

The provisions of this Ordinance shall become effective fifteen (15) days after its adoption. The Ordinance was adopted on January 13, 1992 and the effective date is January 28, 1992. A copy of the Ordinance is available for public use and inspection at the office of the City Clerk.

license following a revocation, or if the person operates a commercial vehicle while disqualified under the title XII of Public Law 99-570, 100 Stat. 3207-170.

(4) If the secretary of state receives records of more than 1 conviction, civil infraction determination, or probate court disposition resulting from the same incident, all of the convictions, civil infraction determinations, or probate court dispositions shall be treated as a single violation for purposes of extending the period of suspension or revocation under subsection (2) or (3).

(5) Before a person is arraigned before a district court magistrate or judge on a charge of violating this section, the arresting officer shall obtain the driving record of the person from the secretary of state and shall furnish the record to the court. The driving record of the person may be obtained from the secretary of state's computer information network.

(6) This section shall not apply to a person who operates a vehicle solely for the purpose of protecting human life or property, if the life or property is endangered and the summoning of prompt aid is essential.

SECTION 5.62b IS ADDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 5.62b. Driving while license suspended, Impoundment of vehicle, expenses, redemption.

(1) When a person is convicted under section 5.62a of operating a motor vehicle while his or her license to operate a motor vehicle is suspended, revoked, or denied, the motor vehicle, if it is owned in whole or in part by that person, shall be ordered impounded for not less than 30 or more than 120 days from the date of judgment.

(2) An order of impoundment issued pursuant to subsection (1) is valid throughout the state. Any peace officer may execute the impoundment order. The order shall include the implied consent of the owner of the vehicle to the storage of insurance coverage purposes.

(3) The owner of a motor vehicle impounded pursuant to this section is liable for expenses incurred in the removal and storage of the vehicle whether or not the vehicle is returned to him or her. The vehicle shall be returned to the owner only if the owner pays the expenses for removal and storage. If redemption is not made or the vehicle is not returned as provided in this section within 30 days after the time set in the impoundment order for return of the vehicle, the vehicle shall be considered an abandoned vehicle and disposed of as provided in MCLA 257.252.

(4) Nothing in this section affects the rights of a conditional vendor, chattel mortgagee or lessor of a motor vehicle registered in the name of another person as owner who becomes subject to this Ordinance.

SECTION 9.4 IS ADDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 9.4. Nolo contendere plea, treatment as guilty plea or finding.

A conviction based on a plea of nolo contendere shall be treated in the same manner as a conviction based on a plea of guilty or a finding of guilt for all purposes under this Ordinance, except that neither the plea nor the conviction shall be admissible as substantive evidence of conduct at issue in a civil case arising out of the same occurrence.

Section 2. Savability. If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph, or part of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons, firms, corporations, legal entities or circumstances by said judgment shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, section, paragraph, or part of this Ordinance thereof directly involved in the case or controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered and to the person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances then and there involved. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provisions not have been included in this Ordinance.

Section 3. Repeal. All other Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such inconsistencies, hereby repealed.

Section 4. Savings Clause. The balance of Chapter 50, except as herein amended, shall remain in full force and effect. The repeal provided herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending fee, assessments, litigation or prosecution of any right established, occurring prior to the effective date hereof.

Section 5. Penalty. Except as provided in sections 5.15, 5.15a through 5.15i, and 5.62a, any person, corporation, partnership who shall violate or fail to comply with any provision of this Code, shall be punished as provided in Chapter 1 of the Township Code.

Section 6. Publication. The Township Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be published in the manner required by law.

Section 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance is to be given immediate effect upon publication.

Snowboards reported stolen from bike shop

An estimated \$5,729 in snowboards was stolen from Town & Country Cyclery sometime between 1:40-5 a.m. Jan. 12. The snowboards, including two Burton Craig Kelly Air models, a Burton A 6.1 and Burton A 5.1, two Burton Asym Alirs, a Burton PJ 7.1, two Burton PJ 6.2s, a Sims 161 Freestyle and a Sims 157 Half Pipe.

A city police officer driving by the business at 5 a.m. noticed a smashed rear door window and stopped to investigate. The store owner was called

to the scene but did not notice anything missing at the time. He called back at 6:30 a.m. and reported that the 11 snowboards were missing off a rack inside the store.

MAN RETURNED: A 70-year-old Northville man reportedly afflicted with Alzheimer's disease was located on Beck Road south of Ten Mile late Jan. 9, some 12 hours after he left home, according to township police records.

The man's wife told police that he

left home at noon Jan. 9 to drive to the Novi Bowl; he never reached that destination and the woman filed a missing person's report with police at about 5:45 p.m.

Novi police found the man unharmed, driving along Beck Road just before midnight.

WOMAN STRIKES EX-ROOMMATE WITH SHOVEL: A 28-year-old woman was treated for injuries she received early Jan. 11 after her ex-roommate reportedly

struck her in the back of the head with a shovel.

According to police records, the suspect apparently was distraught and arrived at her former roommate's home on Seven Mile to spend the evening. The victim told police the woman then became disorderly and was asked to leave the residence. The suspect reportedly left for a short time but returned and struck the victim on the back of the head with a shovel.

The two then grappled, reports

said, and the suspect suffered several cuts and abrasions. Township rescue workers administered first aid to the combatants and neither party wanted to press charges, police said.

HOCKEY EQUIPMENT STOLEN FROM VEHICLE: A Pickford resident told township police that someone stole about \$1,050 in hockey equipment from an unlocked vehicle parked in the resident's driveway late Jan. 10 or early Jan. 11.

Reported stolen were hockey

skates, pads, a helmet, a jersey, a garage door opener, and a case of beer.

GIRLS CHARGED WITH LARCENY: Two Westland girls were charged with larceny last week after they reportedly attempted to steal jewelry, makeup and other items from Meijer, 20401 Haggerty, township police said.

The girls, ages 16 and 14, were charged and released to their parents, police said.

Teacher prepares to fight charge

The attorney for a North Farmington High School teacher charged with indecent exposure is angry with the charges, saying his client only stopped in Hines Park last August to relieve himself.

Farmington resident Charles Scheer, 55, a shop teacher at the school, was "willingly interviewed by police" the day after the incident and had only stopped in the park because a restroom he tried to use was closed, said Farmington Hills attorney Brian Herschfus. Scheer was charged after a woman who saw him, and believed he was masturbating, reported the incident to police.

"We feel my client's reputation was impugned because of this charge," Herschfus said. "Everything she saw was indicative of a man urinating and not of a man masturbating."

"Obviously we will seek my client's vindication" and "regain his once-sterling reputation."

Scheer is suspended from his teaching job with pay, pending court action on the criminal charge and a school district investigation surrounding the Aug. 14, 1991, incident in Hines Park in Northville Township, said employee relations director Susan Zurvalec.

The incident reportedly occurred in a section of Hines Park off Northville Road between Five Mile and Six Mile roads, according to police.

A preliminary examination is scheduled Thursday, Feb. 6, on the indecent exposure charge in 35th District Court in Plymouth. Preliminary examinations are held in criminal cases to determine if there is enough evidence for that person to stand

trial.

Charges were filed after a 24-year-old Plymouth woman told Northville Township police she was in the park and saw a man standing across the river fondling himself.

After completing their own investigation, school administrators will decide whether any disciplinary action should be taken. That would be referred to the board of education, where Scheer would be entitled to a hearing. The investigation could take several weeks to complete.

Herschfus said the incident and subsequent charges have devastated his client, who has lived in the Farmington community for more than 20 years. He said he does not believe charges would have been filed if Scheer were not a teacher.

Wine writer puts emphasis on enjoyment

Success hasn't spoiled Robert M. Parker Jr. He is the most-read wine writer in America. Even with the rigors of European travel, daily tastings and publishing the wine newsletter that started it all, he remains enthusiastic, upbeat and excited about wine.

We spoke with Parker while he autographed 600 books for people attending a tasting of 1989 Bordeaux sponsored by the Cloverleaf Market of Southfield at Detroit's Rattlesnake Club.

"I am a product of the Ralph Nader generation and I never tire of the chase," Parker said. He states emphatically that wine is pleasure and meant to be enjoyed. "If it isn't, you're drinking the wrong wine."

Until 1984, Parker practiced corporate law in Monkton, Md. He followed the love of his life to Europe, married her and fell in love with French wine. By 1978, his love of wine had blossomed into a wine newsletter that he called "The Wine Advocate."

"Actually, I wanted to use the French word, *avocat*," Parker said, "which translates as lawyer or barrister. At first, I sent my newsletter free to my friends and anyone who was interested. When I retired from law, I made wine my full-time occupation. I am proud that I remain an independent critic, paying my own way on all European trips and paying out of my own pocket for 75 percent of the wine I critique."

"The Wine Advocate," with a circulation over 28,000 (including 4,700 foreign subscribers), is completely subscriber-driven. It is remarkable that Parker has been able to survive publishing an independent newsletter without one shred of advertising revenue.

It is evident by the twinkle in his eye and the pride in his voice that Parker is pleased that he is not a part of the wine trade, as are the British Masters of Wine, who have set wine opinion for the last 100 years. He is also happy that he, as an American (not British) has become one of the world's foremost wine critics.

Parker, a prolific author of wine books, has written six books in as many years. His first book on Bordeaux, published by Simon and Schuster in 1985, was recently updated to include 2,700 tasting notes on the wines of 677 chateaux from the 1961 through 1990 vintages.

"I learned about the wines of Burgundy and the Rhone Valley first, but I established my credentials more easily by writing about Bordeaux," he said.

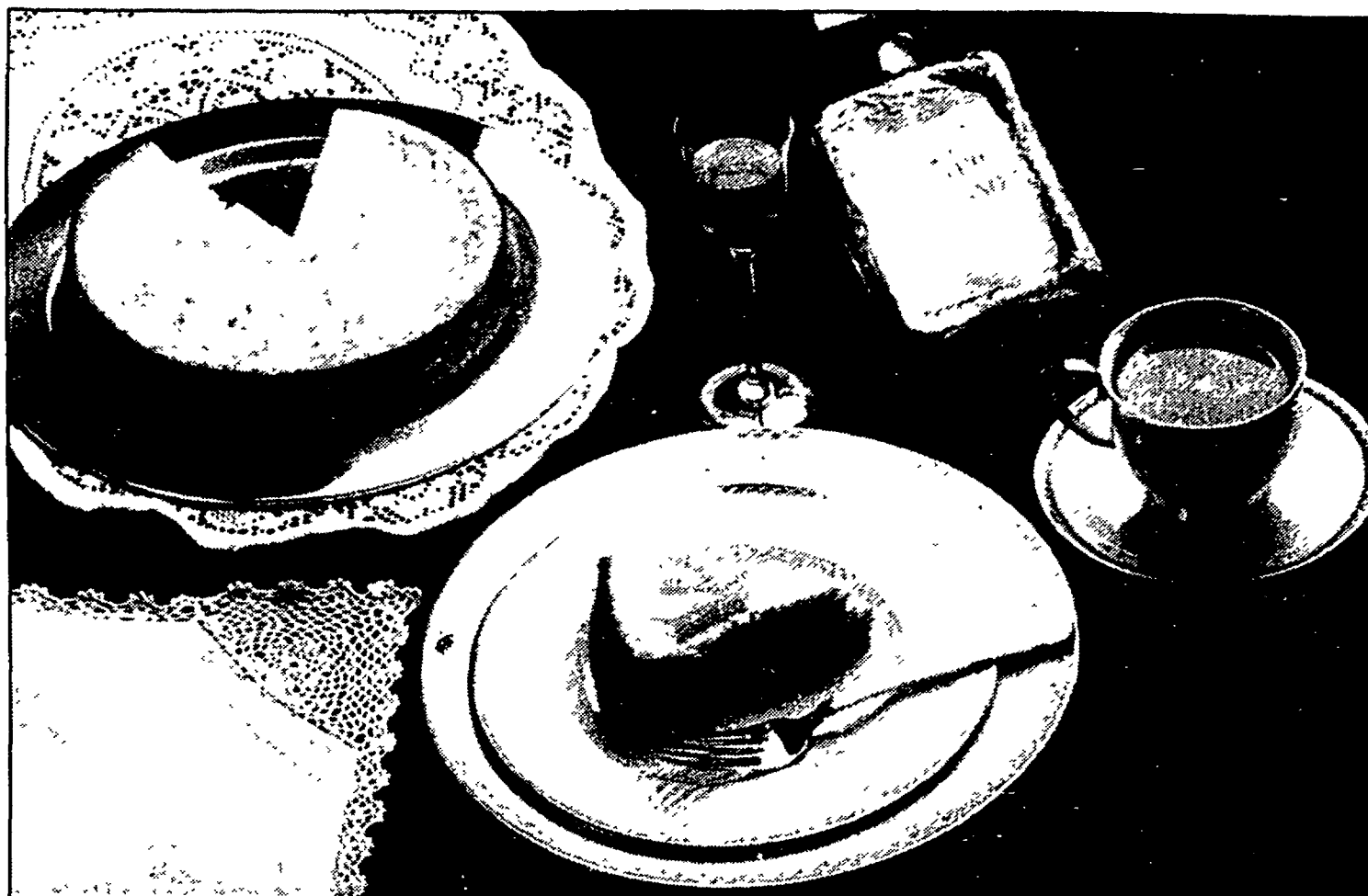
Parker has also published books on the wines of Burgundy, the Rhone and Provence.

"Bordeaux vintages can be divided into heat-wave years producing wines with richness and early drinkability (1961, '82, and '87) and years producing hard, concentrated wines (1986) that require patience," said Parker.

Parker is well-known for his opinion that there are "too many disappointing California wines." However, he does find many distinctive California zinfandels. Perhaps this is because there is no French counterpart for comparison!

WINE SELECTIONS OF THE WEEK

Although Parker ranks the 1989 Haut-Brion (\$79) as one of the best of the vintage, at half the price we'll take the 1989 Cos d'Estournel (\$38). Not all Bordeaux wines are this expensive. A visit to your wine shop will attest to that. Several values taken from the Parker tasting include: 1989 Bonjeaux (\$16), 1989 La Dominique (\$22.80) and Phelan-Segur (\$15.40). The best buy has to be the 1989 Grand-Mayne (\$14.80), a rising star whose price has not caught up with its quality.

A splash of liqueur puts dash in your dinners

Cordials — those sweet, syrupy spirits that come in a seemingly endless variety — have moved from the back of the liquor cabinet to a prominent place in the kitchen. Chefs are using cordials to flavor everything from fruit salad to entrees to desserts. So get out those bottles, blow off the dust, and get ready to start cooking with cordials.

What exactly are cordials? Cordials are spirits that are created with extracted flavors that are added to a base of alcohol and then sweetened.

According to U.S. law, cordials must contain at least 2.5 percent sugar. Although cordial is the preferred term in the United States, cordial and "liqueur" have become synonymous.

You might think cordials got their name because they are served in a friendly, cordial atmosphere or because they put you in a cordial mood. Actually the word is derived from the Latin stem "cor," meaning heart, and the original cordials were created for medicinal uses. One of the oldest known cordial recipes dates back to Hippocrates, about 420 B.C.

Most American cordials are very sweet and are made from various fruits, beans and herbs, ranging from cherry to chocolate to mint.

The use of cordials in your kitchen can be as simple as a topping for ice cream, flavoring for a glaze or sauce, or to replace an extract such as vanilla in your baking.

For example, the next time you make cheesecake, add a bit of

Bailey's Original Irish Cream or Kahlua instead of vanilla to the cream cheese blend. Then, drizzle a bit of the cordial over each slice as you serve the cake.

Cordials, with their intense sweetness, are a natural ingredient to add to desserts. But don't be afraid to try them in the main course, with vegetables, or just to sip after dinner.

Some matches are obvious: a bit of fruit cordial added to a fruit salad, Calvados (apple cordial) sprinkled over a pork and apple dish. Cordials are especially good for barbecues. The sugar in the cordial caramelizes, coating the food with a sweet, thick glaze.

Dishes with cordials can have dramatic flair, and cordials are often used in flambes. Flambe is French for flaming the food with a liqueur during preparation or when brought to the table for serving. The alcohol evaporates during flaming, leaving your food with the subtle flavor of the liqueur without the calories of alcohol.

Never pour cordials directly from the bottle into a flaming dish! And for easy lighting, always warm the cordial in the pan first before you try to light it.

Have a fire extinguisher nearby, just in case. A long stick match is also helpful when flambing.

Drambuie is the oldest and probably the most famous whiskey-based cordial. The recipe for Drambuie originates from Prince Charles Edward Stuart, Bonnie Prince Charlie.

Drambuie — Gaelic for the "drink that satisfies" — has a rich flavor that is tangy and honey-smooth. Combined with a bit of honey and

mustard, Drambuie adds extra "punch" to this easy-to-prepare recipe.

BROCHETTE DJON FLAMBE

4 garlic cloves
1 teaspoon dried thyme
2 tablespoons lemon juice
½ cup plus 4 tablespoons
Drambuie
1 cup Dijon mustard
1 tablespoon honey
2 pounds lamb or chicken, cut into
1 ¼ inch cubes
Salt and pepper
Yields 6 servings

In saucepan, combine garlic, thyme, lemon juice and Drambuie. Cook over medium heat about 10 minutes until reduced slightly. Stir in mustard and honey and simmer for a few minutes.

Sprinkle lamb/chicken with salt and pepper and toss with mustard mixture. Thread meat on skewers and grill or broil 8 to 10 minutes on each side.

Flambe by heating 4 tablespoons of Drambuie until warm. Light Drambuie and pour over meat.

Some of the best-known herbal cordials contain aniseed — dried anise fruit used to flavor licorice. Said to have stomach-soothing qualities, these cordials include the Italian-produced Sambuca and French Pernod.

Many popular oyster recipes use aniseed-flavored cordials, including Oysters Rockefeller. This simplified variation on Oysters Rockefeller can be served as either an appetizer or light main dish.

OYSTERS WITH SPINACH AND PERNOD

24 oysters
1 pound fresh spinach in bulk, or
1 package (10-ounce) fresh spinach.
¼ cup dry white wine
3 tablespoons finely chopped
shallots
1 cup heavy cream
1 tablespoon Pernod
Salt and Pepper
Yields 4 servings
Have oysters opened and loosened from their half-shells. Leave them on half-shells. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.

If bulk spinach is used, break off and discard any tough stems and blemished leaves. In any case, wash spinach well in cold water. Bring enough water to boil in saucepan to cover spinach when it is added.

Add spinach and cook about 1 minute. Drain and run under cold water to cool. Squeeze to extract excess moisture. Chop spinach with a knife, or use a food processor. Set aside.

Arrange oysters close together in large baking dish in one layer. Sprinkle with equal amounts of wine. Place in oven and bake about 5 minutes. The oysters should be barely heated through.

Put shallots in a skillet. Remove oysters from the oven and carefully pour onto shallots liquid that has that has accumulated on half-shells around oysters. Cook briefly, then add cream. Cook down over high heat, stirring, to about ¾ cup. Add spinach and stir. Add Pernod and salt.

Long cooking foods are a reminder of home



It seems very appropriate that after writing about whiskey punch, we get the nastiest weather in 20 years. I hope you've tried it.

Actually, I'd rather be in the damp cold of Ireland than this bitterness.

Usually, I am very defensive about weathercasters and their sensationalizing. Nine times out of 10, they urge people to stay home unnecessarily. Obviously that is not good for business.

This time I'd have to agree with them, though. We didn't get a snow day last Tuesday. Only a few employees were unable to make it in, so we opened up the

doors. Thankfully, some people ventured out and dinner business was brisk.

It seems that heartier, basic meals are the most popular in this weather. Pot roast, short ribs, pot pies, lamb shanks and my favorite, osso bucco. These dishes bring to mind Mom's cooking. Warm and tasty sit-on-the-stove-all-day food. Better-the-second-day stuff.

The cooking methods and the cuts of meat are what make these dishes unique. Both dry and moist heat are applied to less tender, and thus less expensive, cuts of meat. These dishes are often referred to as "peasant" dishes, and traditionally have a robust, hearty flavor. They are truly winter meals.

Combination methods are most often used for foods considered flavorful, but only after long cooking times. The first step in most cooking of this type is to sear the main item. This would not be the case in, say, a chicken pot pie. Searing serves as a sealer for the meat's juices. As the protein

touches the hot pan, the surface is seared, or closed, preventing any of the wonderful juices with all the flavor from escaping.

When searing, always have a very hot pan, and use a little bit of fat. Be careful of the splatters of fat that will pop out at you.

When braising, the item is then cooked in a liquid medium. Braising is used for the cuts of more exercised portions of an animal, or older, mature birds and fish. The main benefit is that the less tender cuts become tender as the liquid penetrates the tough connective tissues. A relatively small amount of liquid is needed in relation to the size of the main item. Stocks, vegetable juices and wine are examples of good braising liquids. Mixing and matching is permissible.

A bed of vegetables, called a mirepoix, is placed on the bottom of the pan first. This provides additional flavor and moisture to the product. Although braising has been a traditional cooking method for tough cuts,

chefs today are using braising on delicate seafood and fish. It is important to reduce the oven temperature, cook for a shorter period of time and decrease the amount of liquid.

Braising is a nice, low-calorie cooking technique. The steps to follow are simple: sear the meat, remove from the pot, and sweat a mirepoix of carrots onions and celery, at least. Add other vegetables as you see fit. Add the cooking liquid, cover the pot, and place in a moderate oven until tender. The longer the item will need to cook, the larger the cut of the vegetable should be.

Tomatoes are often included in braises as a natural tenderizer. Add other vegetables to cook with the meat as it nears readiness. Save the liquid. Strain and thicken with arrowroot or cornstarch in a cold liquid, or as a healthful alternative, puree the mirepoix and return to the liquid.

Stewing is similar to braising and uses the same cuts of meat, but cut into bite-sized pieces. The technique is nearly identical, with differences mainly apparent in the origin of the stew. For instance, a blanquette is a white stew made from white meat, veal or chicken, and is garnished with mushrooms and pearl onions. The sauce is thickened with egg yolks and heavy cream. Bouillabaisse is a Mediterranean style fish stew. Fricassee is a white stew often boasting dumplings, and goulash is a Hungarian stew colored and seasoned with paprika. Ragout, a French term for stew, literally translates as "restores the appetite."

Writing this column has gotten my mind and taste buds stirring. Gotta go cook. Stay warm.

School puts the art in culinary arts

Just as an artist works with brushes and paints, chefs work with pastry brushes and frosting.

As in creating beautiful paintings, there's a lot of planning involved in creating elegant desserts, appetizing platters, crystal-clear ice sculptures and intricate vegetable carvings.

Culinary arts can be learned, but to be a true artist, "you have to feel it," said Bob Kozak, executive chef at Fellows Creek Golf Club in Canton Township.

"It comes to you, it flows. You're working under a lot of pressure in the kitchen. You don't have two hours to put something together. Sometimes the only gratification a chef gets is seeing that platter leave the kitchen."

Then there are those like pastry chef Joe Decker, an instructor at Schoolcraft College, who believe culinary arts are like other arts—10 percent talent and 90 percent hard work.

"You acquire skill on how to hold the pastry bag," said Decker.

To make desserts look picture perfect every time, chefs use Plexiglass or cardboard templates to trace and transfer their designs. A pastry chef might put Plexiglass over a drawing, trace it, let the chocolate set and then place it on the dessert.

Melted chocolate can be poured on to a baking sheet, chilled in a freezer and cut into shapes or formed into curls with a teaspoon or the blade of a knife held at an angle.

But unlike other arts, culinary arts are fragile. "There's chemistry involved with artistry to make sure everything is in sync," said Decker. "It's important to know the functionality of the ingredients. You need to get used to how to work with things."

Food has a limited lifespan. If a sauce sits too long it loses its shimmer. Vegetables wilt, and fruit turns brown.

When making elegant chocolate desserts, success depends on the pliability of the chocolate. "If it is too cold and hard, it will break. If it is too soft, it will not curl up and will stick to the spoon," writes Helen S. Fletcher in her book *The New Pastry Cook* (William Morrow and Company, \$24.95).

Chefs spend a lot of time thinking about food presentation. "To make food appetizing and eye appealing, you consider compatibility of flavors, and contrast of texture, color and taste," said Jeff Gabriel, certified master chef and chief instructor of culinary arts at Schoolcraft.

"The trend is toward functional garnishing. Nothing should be on the plate if it's not to be eaten to contribute to the taste of the food."

"Close your eyes and think about what would taste good with a certain food. Nine times out of 10

Chef's tips can help jazz up ordinary plates

Here are some tips on plate and platter arrangement from Gerald Chesser's *The Art and Science of Culinary Preparation* (Educational Institute of the American Culinary Federation, \$32). Call (800) 624-9458 for ordering information.

Keep the food off the rim of the plate. The well of the plate is where the food is meant to be. If there is too much food for the well of the plate, get a larger plate or reduce the amount of food.

Arrange food in unity. Do not have food spread to all parts of the plate. The eye should focus on the center of the plate, not the edge.

Serve sauce under or around food. Be careful not to oversauce. Sauce is meant to complement and enhance the flavor of food, not hide the flavor.

Variety in platter arrangement is as important as color variation.

Garnish only when necessary. A garnish is only added to a plate or platter for balance and

must be functional.

Simplicity is the key. In food presentation, it is more attractive to have a simple plate presentation rather than an overworked, complex one. Elaborate designs often cause confusion.

Think of flavors. To place shrimp in cream sauce on the same plate with sweet-and-sour cabbage creates an unpleasant flavor for the guest. The acid in the cabbage dish curdles the cream in the shrimp as they meld in the mouth.

Serve food at the correct temperature. Serve cold foods on chilled plates, platters and serving dishes.

"Use the highest quality, freshest ingredients available," said Joe Decker, a pastry chef at Schoolcraft Community College in Livonia.

"Don't be afraid to experiment," said Bob Kozak, executive chef at Fellows Creek Golf Club of Canton. "Try cooking with flavored vinegars. Use dried apricots instead of apples in stuffing."

you'll be right. Design the menu around taste," said Gabriel.

There are lots of ways to present the average meal of meat, potato and vegetables to turn an ordinary dinner platter into a work of art.

"Combine crunchy and soft food. Instead of three piles of food on a plate, serve the meat on a bed of pasta, put the sauce under the meat instead of over it," said Gabriel. "Ring a platter of fish with asparagus or cucumbers instead of putting it on a bed of lettuce."

Consider the shape of the items being served. "As with color, variety is the key. A plate of meatballs, new potatoes and Brussels sprouts may taste good and have pleasing color, yet it is boring. Everything is round," writes Gerald Chesser in *The Art and Science of Culinary Preparation*, (Educational Institute of the American Culinary Federation, \$32).

"Try replacing the Brussels sprouts with green beans and the new potatoes with mashed potatoes. You now have not only a variety of colors, but of shapes. The effect is pleasing to the eye."

Sometimes culinary arts aren't meant to be eaten, only appreciated, as is the case with ice sculptures.

In the days before refrigeration, ice sculpture kept food cold, and made it look pretty. Dishes were incorporated into the design.

Dan Hugeller, a certified master chef, teaches ice carving, sausage making, and butchering at Schoolcraft Community College. His craft requires a lot of planning.

"Chefs like to build things, put things together, but you can't take a chain saw and start wacking away at the ice," said Hugeller.

"You need a knowledge of architecture, you have to sketch your design and work from a blueprint."

Like drawing, painting, sculpting, and writing, most ideas undergo numerous revisions. A chef will often redraw and redefine plans.

"Simplicity and elegance are the keys," said Decker. "Sometimes it's better to take away. Overly garnished items lose something."

1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup honey
2 tablespoons margarine or butter
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Mix popcorn, cereal and raisins in large bowl. Heat corn syrup, honey, margarine and cinnamon to boiling in 1-quart saucepan; remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Pour over cereal mixture; toss until evenly coated. Spread in ungreased jelly roll pan, 15 1/2 by 10 1/2 by 1-inch. Bake 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Spread over waxed paper; cool. Economy foods take healthy turn

It's the beginning of another new year. If your resolutions include getting both body and checkbook off the road of excess and on the road to moderation, it's a good time to change the way you've been cooking.

Economy cooking used to be time-consuming because the mainstays—soups and stews—took a long time to cook. Today, convenience and health are just as important as the budget. Fortunately, a few shortcuts and ingredient substitutions can make these and other thrifty main dishes both nutritionally sound and weeknight quick.

Light yet satisfying Shanghai Meatball Soup, for example, is ready to eat in only 30 minutes. Convenient canned chicken broth and quick-cooking meatballs save time. Healthful additions to the soup include lots of low-calorie vegetables and ground turkey in place of the more traditional ground pork.

The meatballs owe their soft, moist texture to quick or old-fashioned oats. Whole-grain oats also add fiber and several important vitamins and minerals to ground meat and poultry. By broiling instead of frying the meatballs, you eliminate excess fat and the need for turning.

Like soup, meat loaf is another budget-wise main dish that's easy to modify to make it lower in fat, calories and sodium. Meat Loaf With Creole Vegetable Sauce takes advantage of the leaner ground beef that's readily available in the supermarket. And, healthful extenders—¾ cup of whole-grain oats and 1 cup of lightly cooked vegetables—stretch a pound of beef to serve six hungry adults. To cut cooking time in nearly half, the meat mixture is shaped into a long, narrow loaf.

Here are other tips from the Quaker Kitchens that can help you eat healthfully, save money and get you out of the kitchen in a hurry:

- Buy seasonal produce; it's less expensive and at its peak of ripeness. Serve with the peel for extra fiber.

- Stretch more expensive ingredients like meat and poultry with vegetables and grains such as barley, oats and rice. For speed, opt for stir-fries and one-dish skillet meals. Use cooking spray and a nonstick skillet to cut fat and calories.

- Follow recommended guidelines for portion sizes. A 2- to 3-ounce cooked, trimmed serving of meat, for example, is plenty for one person.

- Make a shopping list, clip coupons (but only for items you need) and watch for unadvertised specials. Use unit pricing (the cost per ounce or cup) to compare brands and the cost per serving of foods that come in several size packages.

- Cook double batches of soups, stews and casseroles on the weekend and freeze in meal-size portions.

- Make your own fruit-flavored yogurt by stirring cut-up fruit into plain nonfat yogurt.

- Don't skip breakfast. Oatmeal is nutritious, inexpensive (just pennies a serving) and quick to fix in the microwave oven. Top with fruit and lowfat milk for a complete breakfast.

SHANGHAI MEATBALL SOUP

1 pound ground turkey
¾ cup oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
2 tablespoons lite soy sauce
1 tablespoon dry sherry (optional)
2 teaspoons sesame oil (optional)
1 ½ teaspoons minced fresh ginger or ground ginger
½ teaspoon pepper

2 14-½-oz. cans reduced-salt chicken broth
1 cup water
1 ½ cups halved pea pods or one 6-oz. package frozen pea pods, thawed, cut in half
1 cup thinly sliced carrot strips
1 ½ cups bean sprouts
¼ cup thinly sliced green onion

Spray rack of broiler pan with non-stick cooking spray or oil lightly. Combine first 7 ingredients and ¼ cup chicken broth; mix well. Shape into 1-inch meatballs; place on prepared rack. Broil 6 to 8 inches from heat 7 to 10 minutes or until cooked through. In 4-quart saucepan or Dutch oven, combine meatballs with water and remaining two cans broth; bring to a boil over high heat. Add pea pods and carrot strips; cook 1 to 2 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Turn off heat; add bean sprouts and green onion. Serve immediately. About six 1-cup servings.

¼ teaspoon red pepper sauce
1 6-oz. can no-salt-added tomato

paste, divided
1 pound lean ground beef
¾ cup oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
2 egg whites
¼ teaspoon salt (optional)
1 16-oz. can stewed tomatoes
1 cup water
1 bay leaf

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Spray large skillet and rack of broiler pan with non-stick cooking spray or oil lightly. In skillet, cook first 6 ingredients over medium-high heat five minutes or until vegetables are tender, stirring frequently. Remove 1 cup of vegetables to large bowl. Add beef, oats, egg whites, salt and ¼ can of tomato paste; mix well. Transfer to prepared rack; shape narrow 10-inch long loaf. Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until cooked through. Meanwhile, add stewed tomatoes, water, bay leaf and remaining tomato paste to vegetables in skillet. Bring to a boil; reduce heat. Simmer 18 to 20 minutes or until sauce is thickened, stirring occasionally and breaking up large pieces of tomato with spoon. Remove bay leaf; serve with meat loaf. Six servings.

VARIATION: For meatballs, shape into 1-inch meatballs. Bake on prepared rack 18 to 20 minutes or until cooked through. Cook sauce as directed above, increasing water to 1 ½ cups. Add meatballs to prepared sauce. Serve with rice, if desired.

To make glaze: Combine all glaze ingredients and mix thoroughly. To make vegetable medley: Boil water and blanch vegetables, except onion, for 5 minutes. Drain and pat dry. 3 eggs

¼ cup Cointreau
4 tablespoons butter
¼ cup apricot jam
1 orange, thinly sliced

Yields 8 servings.

Cut currant/raisin loaf into 8 slices. Break eggs in dish, add sugar and half of Cointreau. Whisk together as for an

omelette.

Melt butter in non-stick pan over moderate heat. Dip slices of bread into egg mixture and sauté in the frying pan, browning each side for approximately 2 minutes. Place slices in serving dish.

Warm apricot jam over low heat with remaining ¼ cup Cointreau. Pour over slices of fresh toast. Garnish with thin slices of fresh orange.

Fix this cheesecake for someone you love. It, too, is a work of art.

AMARETTO DI SARONNO CHEESECAKE

1 ½ cups coarse graham cracker crumbs
¼ stick butter, melted
1 (15-ounce) carton ricotta cheese
1 (9-ounce) package cream cheese
4 eggs, lightly beaten
½ cup sugar
½ cup Amaretto di Saronno
1 teaspoon vanilla
¼ teaspoon salt

Yields one 9-inch cheesecake.

Combine crumbs and butter; press over bottom and sides of greased 9-inch spring-form pan. Chill.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Beat together ricotta and cream cheese until smooth. Add remaining ingredients; beat until smooth. Pour mixture into pan.

Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until firm in middle. Cool 20 to 30 minutes in pan before removing. Cool completely before serving.

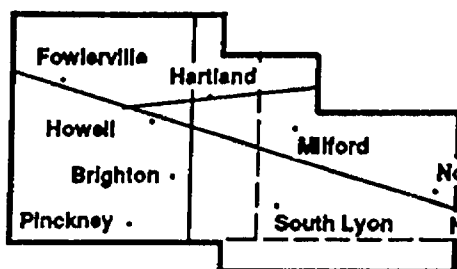

"American Music Awards" come 'round again

Hammer is host, Brown gets his due

When Dick Clark and the production company bearing his name announced the creation of "The American Music Awards" in 1973, it may have been easy to question the motives behind the show. After all, the Grammy Awards existed, didn't they? So did the annual presentation of trophies from the Country Music Association, the Rolling Stone Reader's Poll, the Playboy Music Poll, and year-end salutes from industry magazines like Billboard and Cashbox. Surely, that was enough, without adding another prime-time TV special. Was it love or music that fueled this new kid on the block, or merely cynical grubbing for advertising dollars?

Audiences responded, however, making the show a success and questions of merit and motive irrelevant. The awards have become a tradition, a significant dot on the music industry calendar and a reliable ratings success. The 19th presentation of "The American Music Awards" will air live on ABC

on Monday, Jan. 27.

The AMAs and their presentation still have their critics and naysayers, of course. What's more interesting is the level of acceptance and significance the AMA trophies have achieved in a relatively short time. One barometer is the calibre of artists who consistently agree to appear on the above, as performers or presenters. Based on ballots distributed to record buyers, the awards appear to have, in public perceptions and among the industry as well, at least as much legitimacy as the Grammys.

The issue of legitimacy is an important one. There's a strong argument that no one set of awards can accurately reflect and acknowledge the width and complexity of contemporary music. Perhaps it requires several such endeavors, each filling a slightly different agenda. If so, the AMAs have done their part, leading the Grammys in recognizing the fields of rap and heavy metal.

This year's show promises once again to offer a well-executed, fast-paced thumbnail sketch of the face of popular music. The show is

relatively slick, perhaps, but often wildly spontaneous by normal network standards. Serving as hot for this year's show is Hammer (hold the M.C., please), the smiling rapper who's gained unlikely entry into America's living rooms. The list of performers continues to fluctuate, but audience can trust that the fields of rap, heavy metal, country, dance and adult contemporary will all be amply represented.

C&C Music Factory and Color Me Badd lead the pack in nominations, with six each. Veterans like Rod Stewart and Luther Vandross join newcomers such as Boyz II Men and Mariah Carey in competition for AMA trophies. "Unforgettable," Natalie Cole's tribute album to her father, is nominated for several awards, while Extreme's moving "More Than Words" seems a favorite for Favorite Pop/Rock Single.

The highlight of this year's show, however, will surely be the moment when James Brown steps up to receive the 1992 Award of Merit. The last few years have not been easy for the Godfather of Soul, and this type of recognition is long overdue.

'Dynamo Duck' will (ouch) quack you up

Nestled amid Fox Children's Network's Saturday morning programming ore, a tiny gem of a program glimmers among the layers of animated adventure and breakfast-cereal commercials. Lasting only two minutes at a time and starring a cast of live, strangely cooperative animals, *The Adventures of Dynamo Duck* is prepared to strike unsuspecting funny bones without notice.

In *Dynamo Duck*, Fox has pieced together footage acquired from French animal trainer Jean Tourane to create an original and highly entertaining

interstitial, or connecting, programming device. The down-feather detective waddles in and out of tiny sets inhabited by villainous hamsters, rabbits and guinea pigs, all plotting to trick him with their clever disguises and ceaseless jabbering. Like the great Homo sapien detectives before him, Dynamo Duck allows a string of *femmes fatales* and double agents to believe he's been fooled, then dashes their evil plans at the last minute, which, on this show, actually takes only a minute.

Dan Castellaneta, a talented comedian who will forever be known as the voice of Homer Simpson, again hops aboard the Fox voice-over gravy train, this time as the voice behind the duck. His circa-1940s gumshoe banter sounds like it was lifted right off the soundtrack of *The Maltese Falcon* and really, er, fills the bill.

'MTV Sports' has its highs and lows

The music and sports worlds collide this week when *MTV Sports*, the latest in a proliferation of cable magazine shows, makes its debut.

What is supposed to be an MTV approach to reporting sports, from the conventional to the bizarre, comes off as choppy and disjointed, and the coverage is so superficial that it does little more than whet the viewer's appetite. It's unfortunate, too, because the segments on Building, Antenna, Span, Earth (B.A.S.E.) and bungee jumping and the profile of sky-surfer Patrick de Gayardon merit better treatment.

However, the first episode has its highlights. The feature on de Gayardon includes breathtaking footage of him "hanging ten" on waves of air over the French Alps. And when one bungee jumper gasps and sputters, "It's good to be alive," after she takes the plunge, real insight into the adrenaline rush daredevil athletes experience comes through in the biting audio track.

On the other hand, the time devoted to the World Mud Bowl could have been better spent expanding one of the other segments. There's also the obligatory weekly vignette on "Rock 'n' Jock" style events, featuring celebrities from the music, movie and television industries that begins with a racing school attended by Donny Osmond and Poison's Rikki Rocket.

Reader admires stage, screen actor Hal Holbrook

Q: *I'd like to know about Hal Holbrook. I have always admired him. I'd like to know where he was born and anything about him. Also, where could we write to him?* —Audrey Clark, Park Falls, Wis.

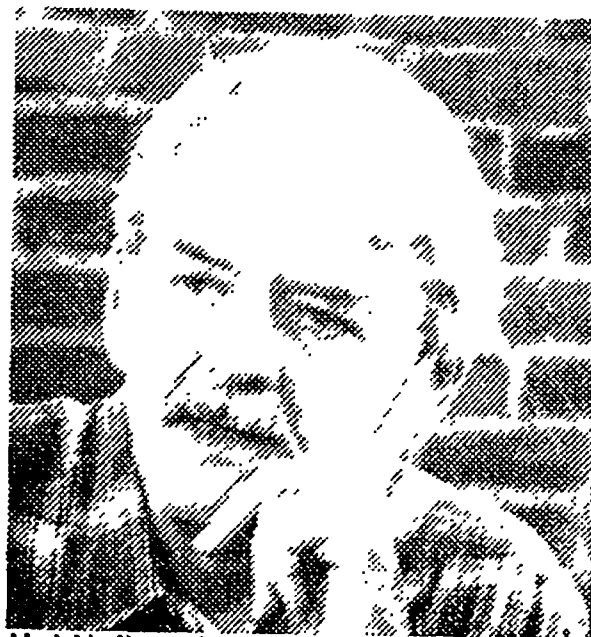
A: Holbrook was born in Cleveland, Ohio, on Feb. 17, 1925. His parents abandoned him when he was two years old and he spent what he calls "Huck Finnish summers" growing up. Perhaps it gave some special insight into Mark Twain; at any rate, his one-man show about the 19th-century humorist, *Mark Twain Tonight!*, is one of the most successful solo theatrical productions in history. Holbrook has performed it more than 2,000 times in the United States and abroad. The actor conceived the idea for the show during leaner years to give himself an alternative to working at Macy's. He performed it in 1955 in San Francisco and made a hit with it off-Broadway in 1959. Holbrook has appeared in numerous other stage productions, films and television programs, including *Designing Women*, on which he appeared with his wife, Dixie Carter, and the current hit *Evening Shade*. The marriage to Carter is his third; he has two children from previous marriages. Holbrook's agent has asked that his address not be published.
