



# Christiansen winner in city shake-up

Northville City department heads and clerical employees will soon play musical positions and end up one clerical position short, under a reorganization proposal passed by the council Monday night.

The massive shake-up is designed to reduce the cost of the city's administration and clerical departments by about \$75,000 annually in keeping with the recently passed deficit reduction plan.

Under the proposal, the positions of assessor and finance director will be combined under the title chief financial officer, and current City Assessor Mark Christiansen will take the new title. Current Finance Director Beverly Walters will take a new non-department-head position titled

chief accountant / system manager.

The deputy city clerk's position now filled by Tonni Burns will be eliminated, and the position will be replaced with the new title of office manager. Christiansen will serve as office manager.

Christiansen's salary rises from the \$38,022 he was paid in 1991 to \$45,000, to reflect his new duties. Walters' new salary will be \$32,000, a reduction from her \$35,484 salary in 1991.

The city's 14 clerks — minus the city manager's secretary — will be combined into a clerical pool requiring cross-training so that the clerks could shift to specific departments during periods of peak demand in those departments.

Though one and a half clerks would be eliminated under the plan, Word said he is reviewing a clerical

union proposal that would offset one of the potential layoffs. He would not discuss the proposal's details.

Two full-time and four part-time police layoffs and one Department of Public Works layoff would continue as scheduled under the deficit reduction plan. One full-time police officer would be laid off April 1, and another would go if Northville Downs stopped paying for police services at the track. The other layoffs would take effect March 1. But council members have said that agreements with the various city employee unions may obviate the need for some of the layoffs, if employees agree to other cost reductions.

Not all the city council members were happy with Word's reorganization plan. Council Member Paul Folino blasted Christiansen's past performance and objected to giving him

more responsibility and a \$5,000 raise.

"I cannot see putting him into a position with the city that would pay him more money," Folino said. "We've been paying the man \$40,000 a year on a contract basis and the job has not been done."

Word disagreed, saying, "I admit the assessing function is not where it should be, but I feel that's due to other factors."

Mayor Chris Johnson also came to Christiansen's defense. "As a practical matter, I'd like to point out that ... in the first year we pretty much derailed his job by making him acting manager," he said. Johnson also reminded Folino that Christiansen is overseeing the city's still-evolving recycling program.

Johnson also backed Word's overall plan, saying, "I think that Gary's

done a very good job in evaluating his people ... I have faith in Mr. Word's recommendation here and support Mr. Word's decision to organize his staff in the way he sees fit."

Council Member Jerry Mittman asked how the new salaries were set and reminded Word that he and fellow Council Member Carolann Ayers, as the two members of the city's Personnel Committee, were responsible for setting salaries.

"Normally the salary committee would review the salaries ... At some point I would like for that committee to review these," he said.

The council voted 4-1 in favor of the reorganization, with Folino casting the dissenting vote.

The reorganization takes effect March 2, though the elimination of the deputy city clerk's position will be delayed until April 1.

## Careless smoker sparked blaze

The Jan. 21 fire that gutted the Wagon Wheel Lounge and Hotel is being attributed to a resident's careless smoking.

"It's been determined officially that the fire was caused by a discarded cigarette in the couch," said Northville City Fire Inspector Robert Turner.

Resident Greg Baber, who lived in the first-floor room where the fire began, declined to comment on the fire or its origins. He referred all questions about the fire to Turner.

Turner said two other factors helped delay a prompt response to the fire, the first being the fact that the fire detection device located in Baber's room was a heat detector and not a smoke detector.

While a smoke detector signals when it detects minute amounts of smoke in the air, a heat detector is not triggered until it experiences a sharp increase in heat or a constant high temperature.

A second delaying factor was building owner Robert Ronk's failure to call firefighters to the scene early, Turner said.

"The alarm did go off within the premises and the owner, upon his investigation of only the bar premises and basement, called the police department (at 1:42 a.m.) and said ... it was a false alarm," Turner said.

But police received nearly simultaneous calls about two minutes later, at 1:44 a.m., informing them of the fire. "The city got a call from not only the next-door neighbor, visually confirming the fire, but from the alarm company as well," Turner said.

The fire department was dispatched at that time. City firefighters first arrived on the scene at 1:52 a.m., according to police records.

Even so, Turner said, the confusion hampered the firefighters' efforts. "Two minutes and 10 seconds of delay had caused the fire to spread," he said.

# Ethics policy review crew ready for action

A committee appointed to review and recommend changes to Northville Township's ethics policy is expected to meet soon, and individual members are anxious to get to work.

Seven township residents — including one township trustee — were appointed to the committee by Supervisor Betty Lennox. Appointments were announced Jan. 21, on the heels of a raucous ethics and conflict of interest workshop earlier this month.

Outspoken township residents, many of them appointees to various township boards and commissions, used the ethics workshop to question the township board's commitment to its own ethics policy, a document the board adopted in 1990.

The ethics policy is a 10-page script which lists ethical behavior guidelines for township public officials, appointees, and employees. According to the policy, the township board sits as judge and jury of any possible ethics violation.

From the oft-heated debate of the ethics meeting came a rumbling from

some residents to review and possibly redraft the ethics policy. Lennox agreed and asked Trustee Richard Allen to work with residents Carol Graves Sassaman, Karen Baja, Leonard Kierszkowski, Judy Jambor, Barbara O'Brien and Maureen Osiecki to come up with possible revisions to the policy.

Committee members count ties to the township planning and beautification commissions, the zoning board of appeals, and township administrative staff, as well as residents with no previous experience in township government.

The township board must take real steps to remedy eroding public support and confidence, according to some committee members.

"They're going to have to gain back some confidence," said Sassaman, a beautification commissioner and chairperson of the ethics policy review committee. "That's what I stood up and said at that (ethics and conflict of interest) meeting."

Sassaman said township appointees gave the board a clear indication of their feelings during the workshop, and now the committee must tackle some difficult but basic policy

questions.

Questionable passages in the current ethics policy include the township board's role as a final say ethics board, and seemingly vague language that may provide escape hatches for policy abusers, Sassaman said.

For instance, a passage of the policy states: "(An official or employee) shall not solicit or accept a gift or loan of money, goods, services, or other thing of value from persons receiving benefits from the township or per-

## Township meets to discuss changes

Township officials huddled this week to discuss possible bid strategies for in-house engineers, attorneys and assessors, but already doubt they can meet their deadlines.

Three board members and Manager Richard Henningsen were assigned the task of readying requests for proposals for in-house consultants, a program which, if implemented, could trim the township's nearly \$300,000 reliance on outside professional advisors.

Hiring in-house legal, engineering, and assessing help would represent a radical departure from age-old township business practices. Supervisor Betty Lennox, citing a rough economic climate, said high professional services bills prompted a close look at cost-cutting measures.

Lennox appointed the request-for-proposal

committee last week, and directed the group to file a report within 30 days.

Good idea, but impossible deadline, said Trustee James Nowka, who is chairing the committee that also includes Henningsen, Trustee Thomas Handyside and Treasurer Jack Hosmer.

"We received the information last week and heard it first in large degree in the paper," Nowka said of Lennox's plan and 30-day time frame. "It's going to take 60-90 days to do a realistic study."

Nowka said committee members plan to brainstorm and develop ideas that will suit the township's future needs. Cost savings on consultants can play a key role, but the township cannot afford knee-jerk decisions, he said.

"The plan is not to just go out and serve up a request for proposal," Nowka said. "We're trying to do something that's productive."

Henningsen on Tuesday was busy rounding up figures on the township's consulting expenses, in

anticipation of the committee's initial meeting. Those dollar amounts would be used to compare with costs and services which could be provided by in-house professional staff, Henningsen said.

Any talk of a move to in-house staffing carries with it a thick layer of questions, Nowka said. He rattled off several concerns, including the number of additional primary and support staff and office space required to house new staffers.

"It's not a simple thing; obviously, we want to be covered and know what the down side is," he said.

Nowka said the committee does not have specific price ranges in mind for professional services at this time, but cost control is the bottom line of the study.

"The major focus ... is to find out what the possibilities are of modifying things or where we're going in the future," he said. "I think the supervisor's left it open to the committee to come up with some ideas."

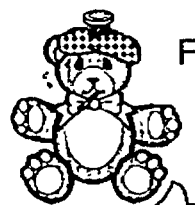

# Ward extension plea a breeze

The ease with which Ward Presbyterian Church gained an extension for its proposed Six Mile and Haggerty project was hardly reminiscent of past meetings with Northville Township government.

Residents used to flock to township hall during planning commission meetings to denounce or support the sprawling church site. Tempers would flare on the commission and in the audience, and disagree-

ments over the height of the facility eventually led combatants to court.

Apparently these really are kinder, gentler times. And Ward issues now pass so quickly that the players barely get a chance to exchange greetings.

"Well, that was the easiest one we did," said Ward attorney Harold Larson, after the planning commission on Tuesday approved a one-year extension to the church's site plan.

"I didn't even know you were out there, Mr. Larson," countered commission Chairperson Charles

DeLand.

Ward representatives should have stayed home. The commission simply reviewed a letter from The WBDC Group, its planning consultant, which recommended granting an extension of the site plan approved by the commission last year.

Issues such as parking and access for the planned site still conform to township standards, and a front-yard parking variance was okayed by the zoning board of appeals in December.

The extension request was

granted on a 5-0 vote of the planning commission, which is still short two members.

Ward had sought extensions to its ZBA variance and site plan approval because the recession stalled building plans, Larson said last December. He said the church was actively pursuing the Northville Township site, although the church reportedly still is interested in the St. Johns Seminary site south of Five Mile Road in Plymouth Township.

Ward's site plan extension is good for one year, or until Jan. 28, 1993.

# Former Northville bus driver guilty of UBAL

Former Northville school bus driver Lori Townsended Norsworthy pleaded guilty Tuesday to an unlawful blood-alcohol level while on the job Oct. 14.

Norsworthy accepted a plea bargain agreement from the prosecutor in which she pleaded guilty in exchange for dismissal of a second charge of leaving the scene of a property-damaging accident.

Under the old drunk driving law that expired the first of the year, Norsworthy was charged with operating under the influence of liquor and having an unlawful blood alcohol level, or OUIL-UBAL.

In her plea bargain, the first portion of that charge was dropped along with the second charge of fleeing the scene with property damage. The bus she was driving hit a "no parking" sign on Orchard Drive 20 feet north of Thayer Boulevard.

Prosecutor Daniel P. Ryan said even though she was charged with a reduced number of charges, Norsworthy

is still subject to the maximum sentence available for the drunk driving charge.

"We got the conviction. We got in effect what we charged her with because the sentence is the same for both OUIL and UBAL," he said after the pretrial hearing in 35th District Court before Judge John E. MacDonald.

A date for Norsworthy's sentencing has not yet been set. However, Ryan said, the maximum penalty for first offenders of UBAL is 90 days in jail with fines not less than \$100 and no more than \$500. Norsworthy's driver's license will be suspended for at least six months but not any longer than two years. In addition, she'll get six points on her driving record.

Norsworthy, under the advice of her attorney, had no comment on the charge. But Northville residents Barbara Flis and Eleanor Padak weren't mincing words about the incident as they went on record asking the judge for the maximum sentence.

"I feel that no leniency should be extended to her. Please do not plea bargain in this case," Padak, a grandmother of two children who ride buses in the district, said

in a letter dated Jan. 15 and addressed to the prosecutor's office.

Flis echoed that sentiment in court.

"My concern is will she be prevented from obtaining a license to drive commercial vehicles. I'm not trying to send her to jail, but there is obviously a serious problem here," said Flis, the mother of two children and the chair of the Health and Safety Committee with the Northville Council of PTAs.

Ryan, who represented the City of Northville in the case, said he was prepared to go to trial had the defendant not pleaded guilty.

"The people in Northville want a sentence that is appropriate to the facts and severity of the case," he said after the hearing. "Even the judge recognized the severity and gravity of the case. He went on record saying he was familiar with facts of the case."

Prior to accepting the plea bargain, Ryan said even though Norsworthy showed a .35 blood alcohol level on blood tests at Providence Hospital the day of the accident, he had no other physical evidence or eyewitness ac-

counts to prove she was drunk driving.

"I didn't tell her attorney this, but there is very little objective evidence that shows she was operating under the influence, other than the fact that she hit the sign. If you were driving behind her you may not have ever known she was drunk," he said.

Ryan said the only actual evidence is the word of David Bolitho, the district's Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Services, who met Norsworthy and her bus in the district bus garage that day after the accident. It was Bolitho who called the Northville city police to report the incident. After a report was taken, Norsworthy was taken to Providence Hospital where her blood alcohol level was tested at .35, police reports said.

Norsworthy was fired from her job with Northville Public Schools as a result of the incident.

The court probation department is assessing the situation and upon completion of Norsworthy's evaluation, a recommendation will be submitted to Judge MacDonald and sentencing will follow, Ryan said.

# Court decision closely watched

Governing boards of state colleges and universities are a year away from a final court ruling on how tightly they may shut the doors while interviewing presidential candidates.

"This matter concerns more than the University of Michigan. It concerns all universities and colleges in this state, particularly where there is an impending or existing vacancy in the office of president," said Court of Appeals Judge Glenn S. Allen Jr. last week.

Allen concurred when the state's second highest court enjoined the U-M Board of Regents from further use of the closed-door procedures it employed in 1988 when it picked

James Duderstadt as president. Attorneys for both Booth Newspapers (Ann Arbor News) and U-M agreed that whoever lost in the Court of Appeals would appeal to the state Supreme Court, a process that will take the better part of a year. The U-M regents made it official after the Court of Appeals' Jan. 21 ruling.

Allen's fellow judges — Kathleen Jansen and Harold Hood — said it was clear the regents violated the Open Meetings Act (OMA) in 1987-8 when they searched 14 months for a successor to Harold Shapiro.

"We hold that the use of overlapping, intercommunicating, sub-quorum committees of public bodies as a means of direct circumvention of the OMA is not legal, and is in direct contravention of the objective of the OMA, which is to promote openness

and accountability in the government," said Jansen and Hood.

Regent Paul Brown, chair of the selection committee, made the cuts from 250 candidates to 70, according to U-M's briefs. But the appeals judges said, "it is clear he did so after innumerable meetings between the advisory committees and sub-quorum groups of regents."

Regents used a series of five steps to pare a list from 250 to one, but never took a public vote until Duderstadt was nominated.

But Allen called the law "ambiguous" in allowing boards to "review the specific contents of an application" in closed sessions but requiring that "all interviews by a public body for employment or appointment to a public office shall be held in an open meeting."

Allen said "screening interviews for the presidency of a college or university should be exempt" from OMA. "I would urge that the Legislature take remedial action promptly."

But prompt legislative action is unlikely.

"It'll be another year before there's real pressure. I would oppose it," said House Judiciary chair Perry Bullard, D-Ann Arbor, father of the OMA's companion measure, the Freedom of Information Act.

"If other states can live with it (open interviews), why can't we?" said Bullard. Florida, Texas and Wisconsin are among the states with strict public interview requirements.

## Teacher pleads on exposure charge

A veteran high school teacher last week pleaded guilty to charges that he exposed himself in Hines Park last summer.

Charles Donald Scheer, 54, of Farmington, a shop teacher at North Farmington High School, pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct/indecent exposure charges at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

Scheer was placed on probation and must receive personal counseling. He also was ordered to stay away from Hines Park during his one-year probationary period, according to court documents.

Northville Township police arrested Scheer after a 24-year-old Plymouth woman reported that a

man had exposed himself to her Aug. 14 while she painted a watercolor in Hines Park. Scheer reportedly told police he was urinating and mistakenly came upon the woman.

The victim told police that the man masturbated in front of her, and stared at her while performing the act.

Scheer's attorney, Brian Herschfus, had expressed outrage at the charges. He said he felt Scheer's "reputation was impugned" because of the charges.

"Everything she saw was indicative of a man urinating and not of a man masturbating," Herschfus said of the victim. "Obviously we will seek my client's vindication (and) regain his once-sterling reputation."

Scheer's quest for vindication ended at his pre-trial examination. Herschfus asked the prosecu-

tor to accept a plea of guilty to urinating in public, a move the prosecution denied.

"We wouldn't accept that because there was an audience," said township police Det. Michael Wildt. "He was at Hines Park in the middle of the afternoon standing by a waterfall and staring at a girl painting a picture."

The defense next offered to plead guilty to disorderly conduct without mention of the indecent exposure charge, Wildt said. That request also was rejected and Scheer pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct/indecent exposure.

North Farmington High School suspended Scheer with pay after hearing of the charges. School officials this week were continuing their investigation of the incident and a decision on Scheer's status is due soon, said Susan Zurvalec, director of employee relations.

## MINIMAL INCISION SURGERY-LIXISCOPIC SURGERY

Many foot problems are treated by lixiscopic surgery or minimal incision surgery. We pre-numb the area, so you will feel nothing. Remember "We Cater To Cowards." Rather than making a large incision and opening up the entire affected area, tiny 1/6 to 1/4 inch openings are made in the skin of the patient's foot. 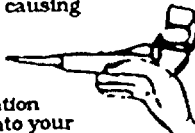

# Jackson man hired as chief of special education

Even though the office remains vacant until Feb. 17, there's a new nameplate on the door of the executive director of special education in Northville schools.

Robert Sornson will officially take over the Northville director's post Feb. 17 after he is released from his position as supervisor of special education in the Jackson County Intermediate School District.

The decision to hire Sornson over other candidates identified in a national search came earlier this month, but the official announcement was being held until he was released from his post in Jackson, school officials said.

Sornson will fill Northville's post, which was left vacant from the promotion of former executive director Leonard Reznierski to superintendent. Since then Edwin Page has held the office on an interim basis until a permanent replacement was found.

According to LucyLee Whiting, director of the special education program in Jackson and Sornson's immediate superior there, Sornson has been a supervisor since coming to Jackson's district nearly five years ago. Prior to his appointment there, Sornson was a special education teacher in Petoskey.

In Jackson, Sornson is responsible for supervising the special education program in the intermediate school district. He was responsible for working with teacher consultants, supported employment, maintaining general goodwill, and coordinating the vocational education branch of the county's program for youths.

As a supervisor, he oversaw 60 classrooms of students with learning disabilities and mental impairments, Whiting said.

Primarily, Sornson was responsible for the placement of students up to age 26, she said.

"We are very sad to see him go. It's a great loss to us," she said.

But Jackson's loss is Northville's gain, according to Page.

"He's a high-caliber individual and we are lucky to have him," Page told school board members earlier this month. Page said Sornson's reputation is well-known in special education circles across the state.

In his new assignment, Sornson will be doing much of the same type of work with additional responsibilities, school officials said.

Sornson was scheduled to be in the district today, meeting with district officials and getting acclimated to the district's program and its personnel.

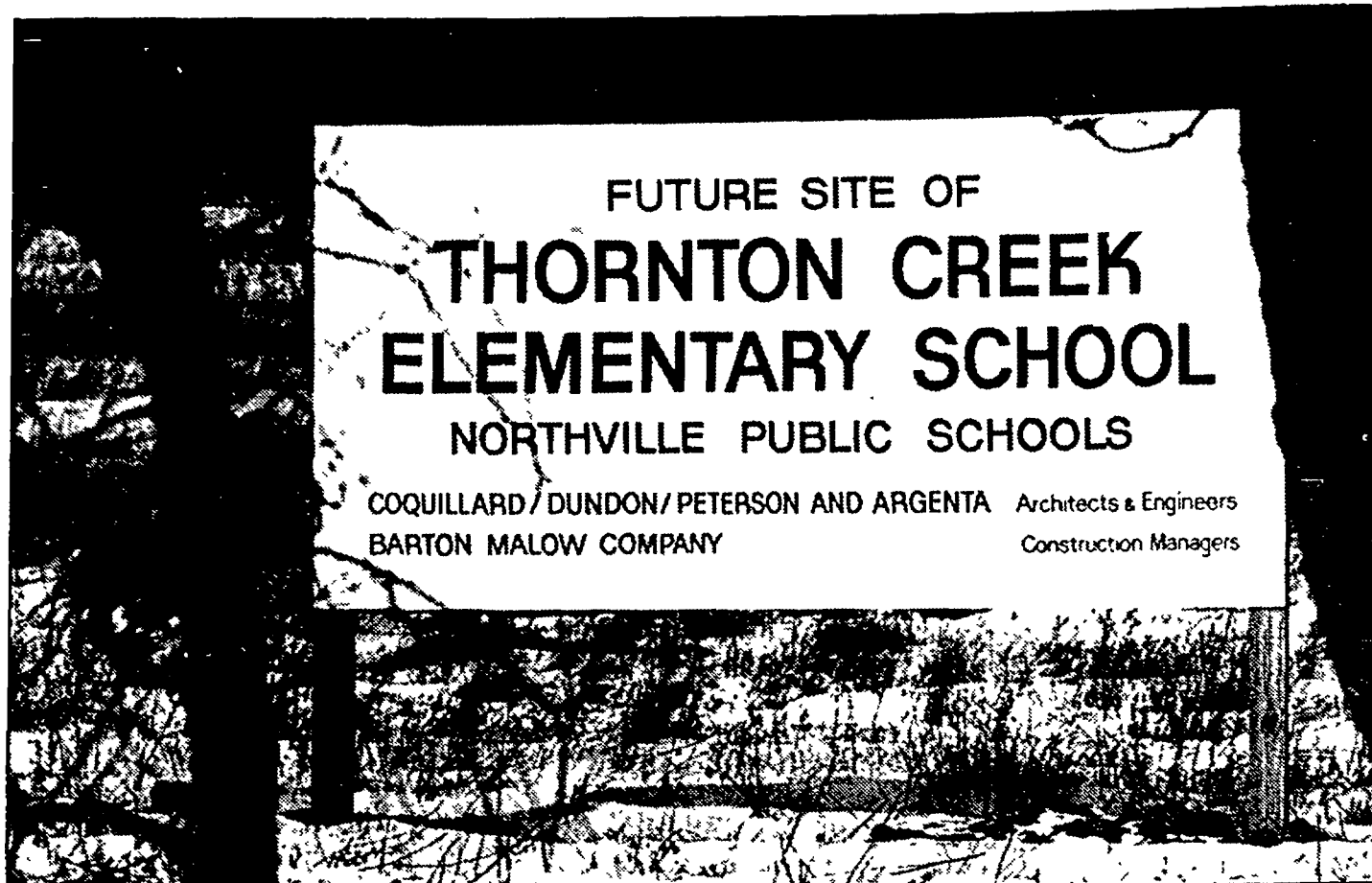

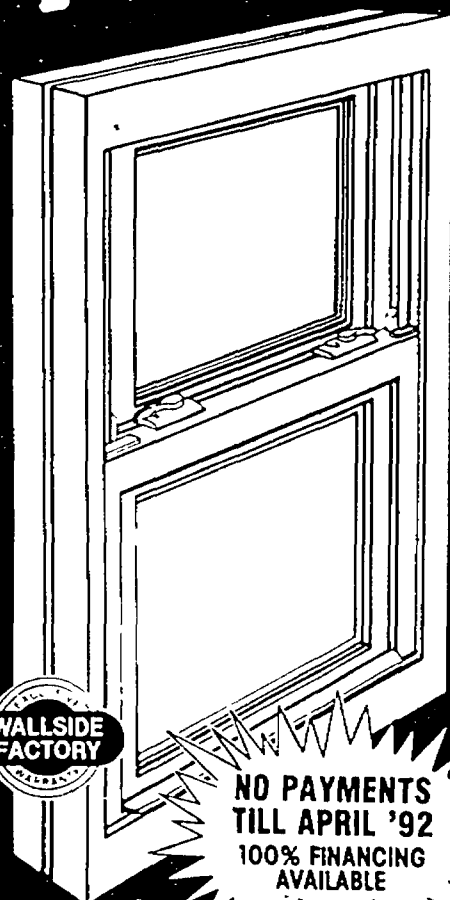

# City snaps up local home despite fiscal crunch

The Northville City Council agreed Monday night to purchase the property at 226 S. Wing St. for \$93,000.

The purchase brings to three the number of properties the city will own directly south of the Northville Post Office at 200 S. Wing.

The proposed purchase comes in the middle of what may be the city's most severe fiscal crisis. The city is selling more than \$1 million in tax and revenue anticipation notes and pursuing a radical downsizing of city operations to cope with the loss of \$900,000 in annual state-returned racetrack taxes. Five full-time and four part-time city employees are scheduled to be laid off under the city's recently adopted deficit elimination plan, and a budgeted position will go unfilled.

The deficit plan also calls for the city to sell one of several pieces of

property it already owns, and the council agreed to sell a plot of land on Cady Street east of Church Monday night (see related story below).

City Manager Gary Word admitted that the proposed Wing Street purchase seems to fly in the face of fiscal responsibility, but he said the deal was just too good to pass up.

"It does not seem wise and prudent to be purchasing a piece of property with the city's financial condition being what it is, however... I feel this is a very good deal that the city cannot afford to ignore," Word said.

"I feel this is a very good opportunity for the city to acquire a piece of property... for the future expansion of the post office," he said. The post office is in the middle of a five-year expansion plan to either enlarge its current facility or move to another one.

Under the agreement approved by the council, the city will pay \$93,000 for the 50 by 99-foot property under

a five-year land contract at 5.95-percent interest, with no down payment. The loan will require annual payments on the principal and semi-annual interest installments.

Word said Tuesday that the city's intent is to put off paying the bulk of the purchase price as long as possible. "I'm trying to avoid any cash outlay for the next year if I can avoid it, but it does appear we will have to pay some interest," he said.

Word said property owner Valerie Rapaport approached the city about the sale late last year.

"I originally told her, 'No, we weren't interested,'" he said. But the city reconsidered the offer based on the possibility of obtaining favorable financing and avoiding a large cash outlay early on.

The purchase price was negotiated with Rapaport based on assessing records and the previous market price of the home, Word said, adding that

the house was listed for sale in February 1991 for \$116,200. The city is still seeking an appraisal on the property, he said.

Payments will be made to Manufacturers Bank, which will hold the title to the property, Word said. "Manufacturers Bank is going to take everybody out, and we're going to owe Manufacturers," he said.

The property was previously owned by former city employee Marylyn Burns, and is now owned by Rapaport through a land contract held by Burns. Burns is the father of Deputy City Clerk Tonni Burns, who once lived at the address.

Word said he did not learn that the property had been owned by a former city employee until after negotiations had begun with Rapaport.

The proposed acquisition follows the city's 1990 purchase of 222 S. Wing for \$92,000, and the 1991 ac-

quisition of a plot of land just south of 226 S. Wing for \$40,000 as part of a lawsuit settlement.

The city is still making monthly \$800 payments on the 222 S. Wing property, purchased in July 1990 from owner Sheila Welch on a five-year land contract at 11-percent interest. The city made a \$22,500 down payment on the 95-by-195-foot property and will make a balloon payment at the end of the contract.

Richard and Marilyn Smith sued the city in 1990 for what they considered the illegal taking of a plot of land north of their 240 S. Wing home. The city had built a pipe across the land in the 1950s to drain the property, but no easement had ever been recorded. City officials agreed to settle the case in February 1991 by purchasing the land for \$40,000, paying a \$10,000 down payment and paying off the rest on a five-year land

contract. Then-City Manager Steven Walters said the 222 S. Wing property could be used as part of a potential community library site if the post office vacated its property, and if the township agreed to participate in the project. City officials now argue that the land may help convince the Northville Post Office to expand its current site rather than move to another one.

"I'd hate to see the post office out on Beck Road," said Council Member Paul Folino. "Plymouth's already is."

Council Member Dewey Gardner asked whether renting the property out could pay for the city's acquisition costs. Word said it would help, but likely would not cover all the costs. He said the city does plan to rent the property.

The council's vote in favor of the purchase was unanimous.

## Bids to be sought on city-owned Cady Street property

While one hand giveth, the other taketh away.

On Monday, the same night that the city council agreed to purchase a Wing Street property, it authorized the city administration to seek bids on the sale of a city-owned Cady Street parcel.

The proposed sale follows a request by a local business to purchase the parcel to expand its existing 335 E. Cady St. business farther west. Tri-County Title Agency President Charles Parrott first wrote the city Oct. 11, 1989, asking to acquire city property to build a new 7,000-square-foot, two-story office complex with underground and surface parking on the site. Half the building

would be used by Tri-County Title, and the other half would be rented out as professional office space.

Parrott and architect Richard Wolff discussed the proposal further with the Downtown Development Authority Dec. 17, 1991. They told the DDA that a lawyer and doctor have already expressed interest in the site.

Parrott's proposal was discussed during three DDA meetings, and the DDA eventually voted to recommend the sale. The planning commission, however, voted 5-4 against the sale Jan. 21. Commissioners cited the poor real estate market and the potential loss of city control over Cady's redevelopment as their concerns.

The city owns the three lots immediately east of Church Street on Cady and would sell the easternmost lot, the one that abuts Tri-County Title's property. The

lots were acquired during the 1980s to provide space for city developments and give the city leverage over the commercial redevelopment of Cady.

City officials originally considered selling the property to Tri-County Title outright, but City Manager Gary Word, and the Northville Record in a Jan. 9 editorial, raised concerns that the sale might violate the spirit and the letter of the city's ordinance requiring competitive bids on property valued at more than \$1,000.

Word said that at least one other developer has expressed an interest in the parcel.

"I as your city manager... reluctantly recommend that you seek an appraisal on this property and seek bids on it," he said Monday. "This is part of the deficit elimination plan and, quite frankly, we need the cash."

Council Member Paul Folino worried that the two other city properties might become landlocked if Cady is ever relocated, but Mayor Chris Johnson described the potential relocation as "concept ideas that have been tossed out." Johnson has said at a previous DDA meeting that the city could not afford to relocate Cady for at least the next three to five years, even if it wanted to.

Folino also agreed with a suggestion by DDA Member Greg Presley that the city sell all three of its parcels, but Council Member Jerry Millman expressed concern that the market may not be favorable now for selling all three properties.

Council Member Carolann Ayers moved to secure an appraisal and sell the lot subject to city approval of the resulting development.

# City awards \$1 million in notes

The city council awarded more than \$1 million in tax and state revenue-sharing anticipation notes to Manufacturers Bank Monday night, to stave off a looming million-dollar deficit.

The notes are needed to cover more than \$430,000 in deficits in the city's general and capital improvement funds, and the apparent loss of \$735,000 in state-returned racetrack revenue and \$33,000 in state-shared revenue.

The notes, an \$800,000 tax anticipation note and a \$275,000 state revenue-sharing anticipation note, represent the maximum amount that the city can borrow under state law. They will be repaid by future taxes and state-shared revenue.

The city already has adopted the deficit reduction plan required by state law to sell the notes. The 2½-year plan calls for a 4.2-mill tax

hike, layoffs of two full-time and four part-time police officers, one clerical worker, one Department of Public Works employee and one administrative staff member. A budgeted Deputy City Manager's position will go unfilled.

Under the plan, one full-time police officer would be laid off April 1, and another would go if Northville Downs stopped paying for police services at the track. The other layoffs would take effect March 1. But council members have said that agreements with the various city employee unions may obviate the need for some of the layoffs, if employees agree to other cost reductions. The clerical union is currently discussing one such option with City Manager Gary Word, though Word would not describe the option under discussion.

The deficit plan also calls for deep cuts in city contributions to civic events and the postponement of equipment purchases.

"Most everyone's aware that the city needs cash available to get through the current fiscal year, to compensate for the loss of racetrack revenue," Word said as he described the bid awarding process.

The city received two bids for the tax note, but only one on the revenue-sharing note. The city's financial consultant, Al Diebel, explained why.

"Revenue anticipation notes are not popular when sold in the Michigan marketplace," Diebel said. "You can still sell revenue anticipation notes but at a very high cost . . . RANs are just not sold very much to day unless it's a distressed city."

Diebel said the unpopularity stems from the early 1980s, when the state government withheld state aid to schools and hurt bondholders.

"The cash flow problems the city had probably scared away investors," he added.

This is the fourth year that the city has sought and obtained tax antici-

pation notes to cover fiscal shortfalls, though previous years' notes were typically for project payments while bonds were being issued to cover the project costs, or for delayed racetrack revenue that was subsequently paid. City officials are now operating under the assumption that the racetrack revenue is gone for good.

Ironically, the city's backing drew a better interest rate than the state's. Manufacturers Bank's rate to lend money on the tax anticipation note—which is backed by taxes paid by city residents—was about 3.40 percent, while its rate on the state revenue-sharing note was about 4.50 percent.

Michigan National Bank offered a 3.79-percent rate on the tax note but did not bid on the revenue note.

Diebel said he polled several other banks to see if they would be willing to bid on the revenue-sharing note, but got no takers. "Their concern was that it was not readily marketable to other investors with the state's name behind it," he said.

# Good news heard on bond rating

The city has heard a lot of bad news about its fiscal condition lately.

But Financial Consultant Al Diebel finally had some good news for a change.

Diebel announced Monday night that the New York bond rating firm Standard & Poors had decided to maintain the city's credit rating at BBB+. Much of the city's concern over its recently adopted deficit reduction plan was whether it would meet the concerns of Standard & Poors, the firm that rates the city's bonds, and in the process determines the city's ability to borrow money for projects like the proposed Cady Street parking deck.

Northville officials met with Standard & Poors analysts Jan. 9 to argue that the city is a good credit risk. That and the city's passage of a 2½-year deficit reduction plan incorporating a combination of tax hikes and layoffs may have saved the city's rating, considered barely investment-grade.

"This past Thursday afternoon, we received a

call from Kevin Taylor, the primary analyst at Standard & Poors," Diebel told a delighted city council Monday night. "The (bond rating) committee voted to confirm and maintain the city's rating of BBB+ . . . They felt that Northville's ability and willingness to respond to the deficit was very admirable and commendable."

Diebel said that Standard & Poors analysts were not without criticism of the city's financial habits. "The tax rate, they feel, was artificially low and there was some overdependence by the city on panmunicipal taxes," he said.

The city's operating millage rate, currently at 9.48 mills, will be raised 4.2 mills to 13.68 under the deficit reduction plan. Because the operating millage had been reduced every year since 1985, city officials could have raised the rate 6.51 mills to 15.99 without a Headlee override vote.

Even so, the New York firm gave the city a healthy prognosis for economic recovery.

"They feel you're ahead of the game for most cities, and they feel you're in a good position to move forward," Diebel said. He said the "move forward" could include receiving an upgrade in the city's

bond rating within several years.

Such an upgrade would garner the city more interest, and more favorable interest rates, when seeking financing for city projects.

Standard & Poors analysts may also be more optimistic about one of the city's long-time revenue sources than city officials.

"They felt that the problem with the panmunicipal (state-returned racetrack) taxes was short-term in nature . . . that it will probably be taken care of by state action in six to eight months," Diebel said.

The city has often had to fight for its share of Northville Downs revenue as guaranteed by the State Racing Statute of 1984. Yet despite a recent attorney general's ruling that the racetrack revenue slated to be returned to the racetrack cities cannot be used in the state's general fund, Gov. John Engler has continued to deny the revenue to cities including Northville.

Northville City is slated to receive up to \$900,000 in racetrack revenue yearly, and had planned on \$735,000 in such revenue for the current fiscal year. The loss of the anticipated revenue accounts for most of the city's current deficit.

# The kid has heart

## Former heart surgery patient will jump rope for fund raiser

Four years ago, Ashley Brazen may never have been able to jump rope for five minutes, let alone three hours. But today, after three heart surgeries, this 6-year-old can jump with the best of them.

For Ashley's classmates at Silver Springs Elementary School, the annual Jump Rope for Hearts fund raiser, sponsored by the American Heart Association, is simply an opportunity to jump rope.

For Ashley, who will be participating in this year's contest for the first time, jumping rope signifies much more.

Three days after she was born, doctors told her parents she suffered from a rare congenital heart condition called hypoplastic right heart syndrome.

The syndrome attacks the heart's right ventricle, making it smaller than others in the heart. As a result of the condition, Ashley has only three of the four chambers a normal heart uses.

Since she was born June 1, 1985, Ashley has had three surgeries to repair the thick-walled ventricle that causes the problem. At just 3 days old Ashley had her first closed-heart surgery; a similar procedure followed in a second surgery at three months. At age 2, she underwent a nine-hour open heart operation to repair but not correct the condition.

"Her last surgery was not a total correction. It was just a repair, but it had to be done because she couldn't have lived with it," said Ashley's mother, Cindi.

There is no known cure for the condition. It can be repaired, but never totally corrected, Cindi said.

But that doesn't seem to bother this exuberant 6-year-old, who claims to have no recollection of the

events prior to her third birthday.

"I'm special because I have a scar. But I don't remember any of that," Ashley said while practicing for the contest in her living room.

For all intents and purposes, she's a normal first-grader despite what routine checkups and chest scars symbolize.

"She does everything. She's taken ballet, tap, and now she's in gymnastics," Cindi said. "When she gets tired she sits down and rests like everyone else. She can hang with the best of them."

For other elementary students in the Northville district, Brazen is an illustration of the progress the American Heart Association is making, Cindi said. And her story is being used to teach classmates the importance of the association and the services it provides.

Sharon May, a teacher at Silver Springs Elementary and the coordinator for the annual fund raiser, has used Ashley as an example by reading newspaper accounts of the girl's ordeal in health classes. Students and fellow classmates, Ashley said, had no idea that she was the source of the article.

"Nobody knew it was me. A friend of mine thought it was another girl," she said.

The contest, which is 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Feb. 1 at Northville High School,

encourages participants to seek donations or pledges for the length of time they will spend jumping. Three hours is the maximum time teams of elementary students districtwide will be jumping.

Ashley said she's been practicing for the contest at which she intends to jump for the duration. She's collecting pledges from people who believe she's going to do it. Even her parents are jumping on the bandwagon.

"Her dad and I are having a contest to see who can raise the most money from co-workers and friends," Cindi said.

Nobody in the Brazen house is doubting Ashley's endurance and stamina to jump for a good cause.

"Her particular defect is a pretty rare one. We are hoping one day some of those dollars will go to help find a cause," Cindi said. "She's got lots of years for them to do research. Since she had her open heart surgery, the operating time has already been cut down to 6-7 hours because of discoveries they made in the field."

Cindi said she has explained to Ashley the importance of the AHA and the unique opportunity she has to make a contribution to an organization that has helped her.

"I'm jumping to help people do research and to help people who have heart surgery like me," Ashley said.

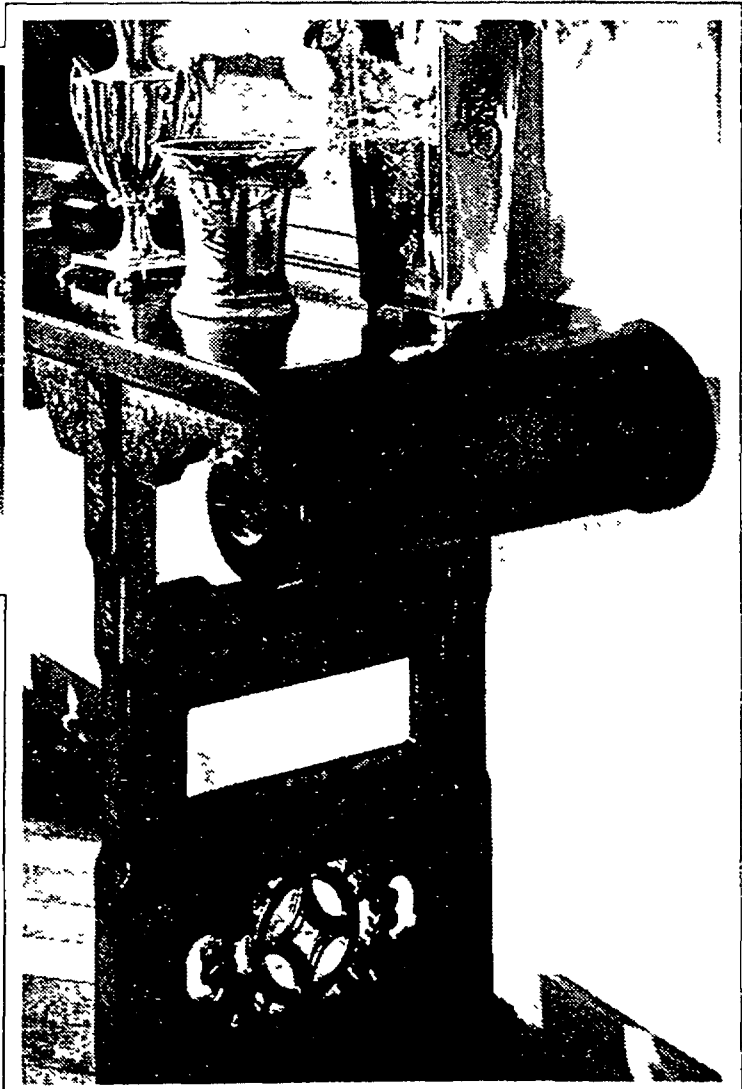

forming services under contract to the township or otherwise in a position to benefit from public officer, employee, or contractor action. Gifts or loans (to officials or employees) do not include entertainment or commodities which conclude or can be consumed within a 24-hour period."

A developer, politician, or some other person wishing to curry favor feasibly could fly township officials to Toronto or Chicago for serious winning and dining, as long as the officials were snug in the township within 24 hours of departure.

Such passages caught Sassaman's eye.

"Those types of things I'd like clarified," she said. "The policy gives you a whole list of reasons you don't have to follow [the guidelines]."

"I'd like to know why some of that stuff is in there," she added.

Sassaman envisions a reworked ethics policy as "a document to guide behavior, not a document to collect dust," a feeling shared by fellow committee member Maureen Osiecki.

Osiecki, a township planning department administrative assistant and founder of Northville Youth Assistance, said public distrust of bureaucracy — and politicians in general — can create a confidence crisis.

A strong, viable ethics policy could be a "consciousness-raising" tool that provides a message, "but not if it's put in the drawer," she said. "There are file drawers full of policy," Osiecki said. "It's up to every individual to have an ethical, moral policy."

Count Osiecki as one committee member who believes the township board should be scrapped as the ethics board.

"I think an ethics board should be made up of trustees, administrators and the public," she said. "I think we're looking for an objective viewpoint."

Sassaman said she plans to call a meeting of the ethics committee within the next week, and feels a couple of sessions should be sufficient to fine-tune the policy and recommend changes to the township board.

Section 12.03 — Special Land Uses Permitted After Review and Approval  
The following uses shall be permitted by the Planning Commission pursuant to Article 17 and subject to the following provisions:

Storage of Materials  
The location or storage of materials shall be regulated as follows:  
(1) The outdoor storage of materials within any right-of-way is prohibited.  
(2) The outdoor storage of materials shall be screened from adjoining public right-of-way or from adjoining residential uses. A five and one-half foot (5 1/2') screening wall, fence or landscape buffer shall be used to provide effective screening and shall conform with Section 16.09(b and c) of this ordinance.  
(3) Such storage shall not be located within the required front yard set back, or any required side or rear yard.

Section 13.03 — Special Land Uses Permitted After Review and Approval  
The following uses shall be permitted by the Planning Commission pursuant to Article 17 and subject to the following provisions:

Storage of Materials  
The location or storage of materials shall be regulated as follows:  
(1) The outdoor storage of materials within any right-of-way is prohibited.  
(2) The outdoor storage of materials shall be screened from adjoining public right-of-way or from adjoining residential uses. A five and one-half foot (5 1/2') screening wall, fence or landscape buffer shall be used to provide effective screening and shall conform with Section 16.09(b and c) of this ordinance.  
(3) Such storage shall not be located within the required front yard set back, or any required side or rear yard.

SECTION 15.04m, SMALL CAR PARKING  
m (4) The number of permitted small car spaces and stall configurations shall be subject to site plan approval by the Planning Commission.

SECTION 16.18.6, PERMITTED WALL SIGNS WITHIN THE CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT (CBD)

b. Permitted Wall Signs within the Central Business District (CBD)  
(1) Each tenant within a business site may have one (1) wall sign displayed on the exterior wall of that building.

(2) Total signage area per building or site frontage may be calculated in either of the following methods:

(a) Thirty-two (32) square feet for the single tenant, 50 square feet total for two tenants and an additional fifteen (15) square feet for each additional tenant, or  
(b) One (1) square foot of total building sign area for each lineal foot of building frontage with a maximum height of three (3) feet.

(3) A business site may erect an additional twelve (12) square foot wall sign to be placed on any other exposed building surface or wall other than the street frontage.

(4) A tenant with a second means of access directly onto a public alley or parking lot may, at its option, use the wall sign area allocation in 16.18.6(b) for the front, rear or combination thereof. The total rear or the total front may not exceed the maximum allowance for front.

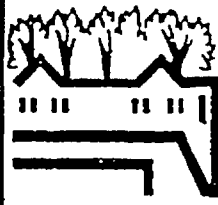

Continuing in our historical sketches of our buildings, this week the Hirsch Blacksmith Shop. The blacksmith shop is the only replica building at Mill Race Village. It was built from pictures and drawings to duplicate the blacksmith shop which stood originally on Hutton Street just north of Main (across from First Presbyterian Church). The original building probably dated from the 1850s and was built adjacent to the city's first school (Old Stone School), which is visible in some early pictures. Hutton Street in early days was identified as Wheelbarrow Avenue and Atwater.

Early ads in *The Northville Record* indicate that John Hirsch ran his shop at this location as early as 1870. In later years that building was used by Fred Wendt as an automobile repair shop. Ultimately it was torn down along with the stone school building.

When the building was reconstructed at Mill Race the decision to use Hirsch's name came about because of the availability of pictures from the time he operated the shop. In addition to a working blacksmith facility, the building houses our Mill Race Village Country Store.

# Wagon Wheel blaze blamed on smoker

Turner said alarm companies often take two minutes to transfer an incoming fire alarm message to a local fire department dispatcher, especially if property owners have instructed the company to notify them first. To avoid a delay, he said, a property owner should notify the dispatcher as soon as an alarm goes off rather than search for the fire himself.

"That's not his job, looking for a fire. That's nobody's job but the fire department," Turner said. "His job, with that sort of system, is to notify the fire department."

The firefighters' task was made more difficult by the 105-year-old building's "balloon construction," which consisted of uninterrupted spans of vertical space within the building's walls, Turner said. Modern construction techniques incorporate fire stops within the spaces to prevent flames from traveling as quickly within the walls.

The balloon construction, combined with the narrow crawl spaces within the building's several different

rooms, allowed the fire to travel throughout the structure and made it difficult for firefighters to get to it, the inspector said.

"That's where our heavy losses were, in the roof," he said. "It took us a long time to get up there and put the fire out. Though the fire traveled, we didn't know the extent of it. . . . To get into every tiny, fragmented roof space took a lot of man-hours."

Once on the scene, Northville City firefighters did not call for additional aid until more than 90 minutes later. Fire Chief Jim Allen said the reason for that delay was that the fire originally seemed small enough to be handled by city firefighters alone.

"When we first got to the scene it didn't look like anything that couldn't be handled. It was primarily in the one room," Allen said. "There was nothing to indicate that it couldn't be handled just by our people."

Plymouth's aerial truck was called to the scene at 3:30 a.m. once the fire broke through the building's second-story roof, while Northville Township was called in at 3:36 a.m. for "additional manpower," Allen said.

Baber, 22, first told City Police Officer James Marks that he had been driving around with a friend the morning of the fire and returned at 1:40 a.m. to find the room engulfed in flames.

"He said he opened the door to the room but had to back away due to the heat and smoke," according to Marks' report.

But the officer noticed a flaw in the man's story. "Greg was in stocking feet and was asked where his shoes were," Marks wrote. "He stated that when his friend dropped him off he left his shoes in his vehicle. He stated that he had his feet on the dashboard and when he got out of the vehicle he forgot his shoes."

In a later interview, Baber admitted that the first story was false.

City Police Lt. Gerry Ryan, Michigan State Police Det./Sgt. Gary Michalek and Turner interviewed Baber again later that morning. Baber, who told the interviewers that he was a "heavy smoker" said he was watching television when he fell asleep in chair and awoke to find his couch on fire.

"Baber wetted a towel and tried to put the flames (out) without suc-

cess," according to the police report on the second interview. "He states he took glasses of water and attempted to put out the fire without success. Baber says the flames spread to the bed which was located just west of the couch. At this time, he ran out of the room to the drive on the south side of the building, and into the rear door of the baryelling for help."

Police and fire officials also interviewed Ronk that day, who told them that the fire alarm first sounded about 1:45 a.m. "He states that he has been having problems with the system and checked the building personally," the report read. "Finding no signs of fire or smoke, he called the Northville Police/Fire dispatch and advised them that it was a false alarm. Shortly after, Baber came running into the bar in a T-shirt, pants and no shoes yelling that his room was on fire. Ronk responded to find the room in flames."

Police records peg the first call from Ronk advising them that the fire alarm was a false one at 1:42 a.m., and the second call advising them that there was a fire at 1:44 a.m.

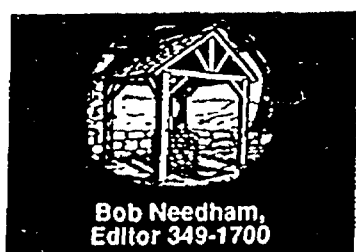

### Cable contract needs two long, hard looks

Okay, everyone who thinks we in Northville pay too much for cable television, raise your hands.

Looks like just about everyone! Well, that's what we thought.

The Northville Township board recently held a public hearing to gather public opinion on the service and rates of Omnicom Cablevision, the company which serves both the township and city along with the Plymouth community, Canton Township, the Belleville area and Hamtramck. The hearing followed a public survey also designed to gather opinion.

Meanwhile, both the township and city are considering a proposal from Canton to join together on paying for a special company to renegotiate the local contract with Omnicom.

All the activity arises because the local governments are getting close to the end of their original, 15-year contract with Omnicom. Under the agreement, the company provides exclusive cable TV service to local residents who fork over the monthly payments.

When the local governments and Omnicom first developed the cable agreements, it's worth noting, the world was quite a different place. Perhaps no one, Omnicom included, realized how important a cable franchise would quickly become.

During the first 13 years of the original franchise agreement, cable television has skyrocketed from novelty status into an essential fact of life for many households. In 1979, who knew what the acronyms MTV and CNN meant? Nowadays, who doesn't? Cable TV has dramatically altered our national culture, and it's important to have confidence in our monopoly-status local provider to offer the best possible service at the best possible price.

Right now, we're not prepared to say one way or another. Omnicom subscribers got a statement along with their most recent bill listing the charges for the company's various services. On a gut level, it just seems like an awful lot of money. On a slightly more objective plane, stories abound of people in neighboring communities who seem to pay less for comparable offerings and/or better customer service.

As we move through this window of renegotiation time, several questions seem to call out for answers before the city or

township ink any new agreement with Omnicom.

For one, just how does the company set rates? Obviously, the price it pays for the services it offers makes up the bulk. But what kind of profit does the company see? What kind of profit is reasonable for a cable company? Along the same lines, what exactly is the purpose of the franchise fee paid to local governments under the original agreement? Isn't this simply passing higher rates on to cable subscribers?

Continuing in the same vein, how often does the company consider changing its channel selection? We realize those decisions are based partly on cost and partly on subscriber interest, but what else enters into it?

In addition, a very important question is Omnicom's size. The company has said its rates are where they are in part because Omnicom is a relatively small company. Well, if a small company means higher rates (and perhaps fewer people for customer service?), isn't that a perfect argument for switching to a larger company?

We don't know the answers to these things, and we're not taking shots at Omnicom. Maybe it is the best value; but right now we just don't know that.

The township has given the process a strong start with its survey form and public hearing. The city would do well to follow a similar procedure; these are two good initial steps. (Some city residents were so hungry to be heard on the issue that they spoke at the township's meeting.)

With some feeling of subscriber opinion as a base, both local governments should then move on to a thorough study of costs, offerings and services, treating Omnicom no more or less favorably than any other potential provider. Cable television has become a very important issue for many households in our community, and deserves full treatment as such.

### Court brought welfare state



How did we get this way? How did Michigan and America get to the point where one person in five draws some kind of welfare and one baby in four is born to a single mother who likely will join the welfare rolls?

Agnes Mansour, once director of the state Department of Social Services, had her answer: "the media." Stories on movie stars showed girls it was OK to have babies without a

husband.

Coretta Scott King, widow of the civil rights leader, in a 1988 Oakland University talk, had her scapegoat: "conservative economists" of the '80s. She was blissfully ignorant that the trend started under John Kennedy in the '60s. (Happily, Gov. John Engler vetoed the program that paid for King's misinformation.)

A better answer to why welfare dependency is growing came in a 1987 report by U.S. Senate Republicans. They blamed a series of U.S. Supreme Court decisions, saying:

● *Loving v. Virginia* (1967) "strikes down law against interracial marriage. . . . This approach. . . limits the ability of the state to regulate any aspect of marriage, remarriage after divorce, cohabitation, or legitimacy — central matters in welfare debates over the following two decades."

● *King v. Smith* (1968) "strikes down Alabama law denying AFDC eligibility to households which include 'substitute fathers,' i.e., adult males unrelated to the mother by blood or marriage. Decision makes cohabitation more profitable than marriage in most states."

● *Weber v. Aetna Casualty and Surety Co.* (1972) says "workmen's compensation benefits cannot be limited to legitimate children, sets stage for barring any government preference for legitimacy."

● *New Jersey Welfare Rights Organization v. Cahill* (1973)

"forbids state preference for marriage over cohabitation in welfare programs."

● *USDA v. Moreno* (1973) "invalidates a provision of the food stamp program basing household eligibility upon ties of blood, marriage or adoption — the traditional definition of family."

● *Moore v. East Cleveland* (1977) "invalidate(s) municipal zoning ordinance based on the traditional family. . . . (T)he court found this effort by a black community to strengthen family life 'senseless and arbitrary.' " The court says government can't "standardize" people by "forcing all to live in certain narrowly defined family patterns."

● *Zablocki v. Redhail* (1979) strikes down Wisconsin law that had required people obtaining a marriage license to show that "remarriage would not prevent them from continuing to support their children. Right to marry is given precedence over responsibility to spouse and children of former marriage."

The bottom line is that the U.S. Supreme Court prohibited states from showing preference to people who marry over people who cohabit.

By 1983 the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights was reporting that increases in marital disruption and illegitimacy "are responsible for essentially all of the growth in poverty since 1970. . . and that they show no signs of abating as the unwed birth and divorce rates continue to climb rapidly."

So today we have 52 million people soaking up hundreds of billions of tax dollars in 59 major programs — with no end in sight.

OK, some states overdid it by outlawing contraceptives and interracial marriage. But do the justices make fiscal impact studies of what their narrow legal decisions cost taxpayers, businesses and other social needs like education? We don't know. The justices meet in secret.

### Governor's hidden agenda



I've been reflecting on Gov. John Engler's state of the state speech last week. The guy who wrote, "If you liked me in 1991, you'll love me in 1992," hit the nail on the head.

This was a political speech, as was the slick videotaped Democratic rebuttal afterward. Themes for the 1994 election are already coming into focus.

Education first. Engler pledged to continue to shovel money at

K-12 schools, colleges and universities, despite cuts in other areas of state spending.

He gave some worthwhile statewide exposure to the idea of an "education warranty" that would require schools that graduate students who lack minimum skills to re-educate them without charge.

Premiered in Plymouth-Canton schools, the plan seems to be working fairly well, if only because it concentrates on outcomes — what kids actually learn, instead of process — how many years they sit in classrooms.

Engler emphasized his proposal to cut school property taxes by 30 percent and cap the rate of future annual increases in assessments to 3 percent. With 400,000 signatures in hand, it seems clear this proposal will join a competing Democratic one on the ballot this fall.

Most readers of this newspaper have seen the assessed value of their property — and, consequently, their taxes — skyrocket in recent years. Trying to pay the taxes on a paycheck hard hit by the recession — or, worse, on a pension and Social Security — is very tough. On the surface, Engler's proposal will have a lot of appeal.

That will fade once people figure out just what it will cost. The proposed 30-percent tax cut will cost schools something like \$2.25 billion per year by 1997. The plan requires the state to reimburse an equal amount to the schools.

So, other things equal, in a total state budget which will be something around \$8 billion by 1997, the cut-and-cap proposal requires shifting \$2.25 billion to schools from somewhere else.

That's a big shift, with big political stakes attached.

First example: job training. Other than what's required by federal law (the Job Training Partnership Act, for example), there is no serious job training taking place in Michigan today.

Why? Because Gov. Engler wasted no time dismantling the job training system erected by his predecessor, Jim Blanchard. Gone are the Youth Corps, the Job Start anti-welfare program and the Michigan Opportunity Card.

Now that thousands of Michigan workers are being laid off, the need for job training has never been greater. Yet there is no state initiative in place. And even if the Engler administration gets around to developing one, there won't be any money to pay for it after the \$2.25 billion is shifted to the K-12 system.

Second example: Reaganesque budgetary shenanigans. It now seems clear that the real reason lying behind our national deficit crisis is a political miscalculation made in the early years of President Reagan's administration.

Conservatives erected the following chain of logic: Federal spending is too high. Let's reduce government spending by reducing government income. Therefore, cut taxes.

What happened, however, is that the White House and the Congress got into a feeding frenzy of tax cutting. The resulting revenue slash was far larger than anyone ever intended. It was never balanced by expenditure reductions. Our towering national debt is the result.

Sometimes I wonder whether John Engler doesn't have a similar scenario in mind — and will force Michigan to face similar risks — with the cap-and-cut property tax proposal.

O'Brien. So instead of receiving gross negligent manslaughter, Loveday is getting away easy with the verdict of negligent homicide. What message are we sending to our youth with this verdict, besides the fact that our judicial system seems to protect the guilty? We're telling them that if they kill someone after smoking a little dope, they'll only have to spend six months to two years in prison. They won't be held accountable for their actions, they will easily get off on a lesser charge.

I thought we sent our children to school in "drug free school zones". I thought we educated them about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. I thought that we were raising our families in an area where we all cared about the future of our children. With this decision, all of these things suddenly seem ridiculous and so hopelessly false.

Loveday's sentencing is Feb. 5. The only thing we can do to express our outrage at the sparse punishment that he is receiving is to write letters to Judge O'Brien before Feb. 5. He needs to hear from all of us in this community and elsewhere to know that we think his actions and the decision of the jury are deplorable and that we can't tolerate the message that he is sending to our youth. # Self-esteem presents a challenge



Over and over again we hear that one of the main problems with many of the youths today is that they have poor self-esteem. I see the problem daily in my office with many of the children that are involved with Northville Youth Assistance. For the next couple of articles, I will be giving parents practical ways to build their child's self-esteem. Parents have a strong impact on their children and how their kids feel about themselves.

Children need to know that their parents are interested in what they have to say, value their opinions, and respect their views. As a parent you can...

**LISTEN AND TALK**

- Tell your children that you love them no matter how old the child is or how awkward it may feel to you. Often children don't believe their parents love them because their parents yell at them and punish them.
- Listen intently when your child has a story to tell. This can work wonders for your children's self-esteem since it helps them to realize that their thoughts and ideas are important to you.
- Listen without prejudice. Try not to let preconceptions interfere with your ability to hear what your child is saying.

- Listen to the underlying meaning of your children's concerns. Sometimes children are trying to tell you something but aren't able to find words. Maybe they're afraid to say exactly what they mean.

- Remember that children often hear you, even when they're paying attention to something else like the television. Seemingly innocent comments to a friend like "I can't wait until

vacation is over so I can have some peace around the house" can harm your child's self-esteem.

## BE POSITIVE

- Parents sometimes get caught in the trap of "labeling" — using harsh, judgmental words. Refrain making negative comments like "You're a bad girl" or "You're so clumsy." When a child needs to be corrected do so in a constructive way. Emphasize that the action, not the child, is wrong.
- Accept your child's individuality. Just because they may not do or act in the manner you expect doesn't mean you have failed.

To summarize, show your love for your child. Hug them, touch them, talk to them and let them know how much you care for them.

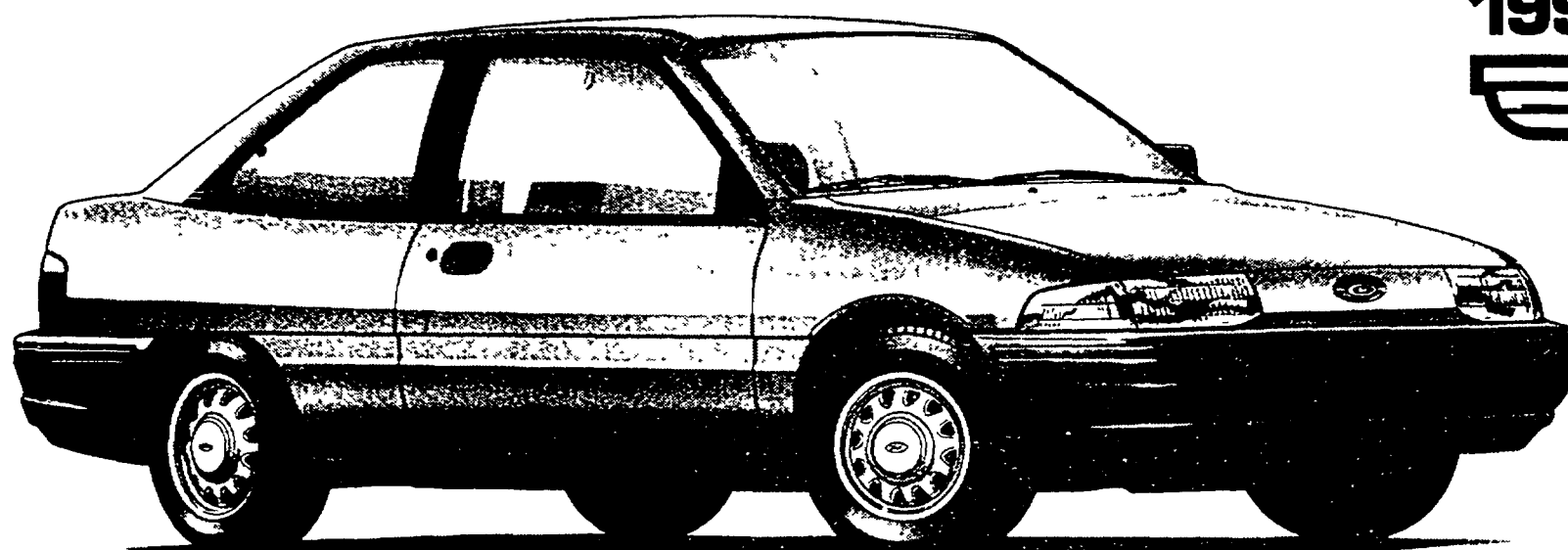

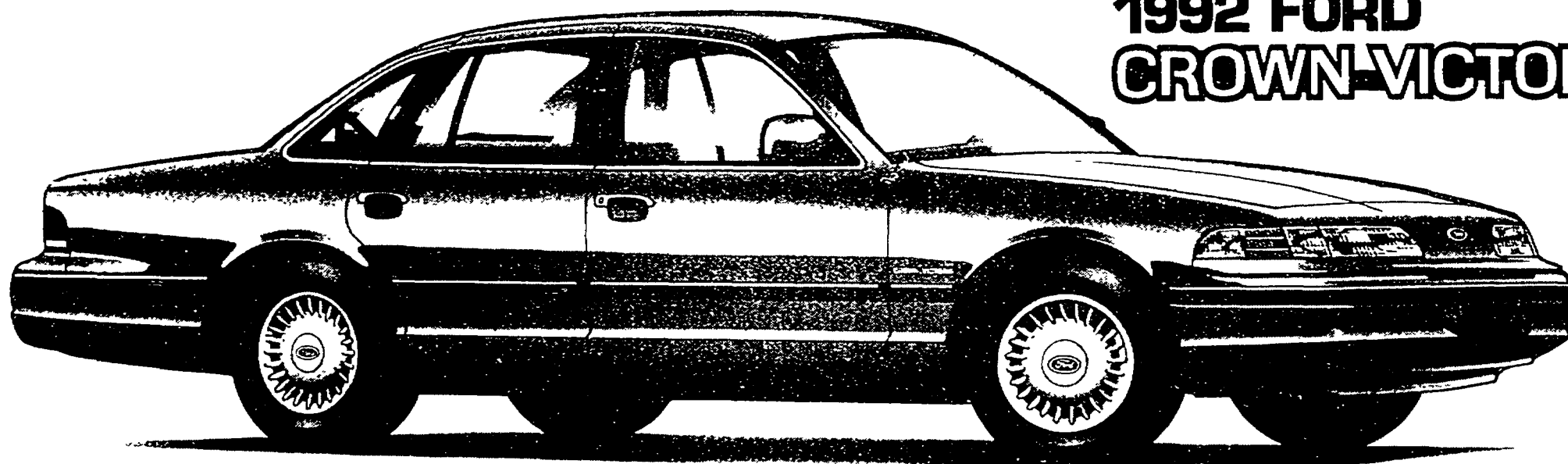

### Lincoln life mask offers view of past

Fourscore and 52 years ago President Abraham Lincoln made good on a promise to a sculptor and sat in a Chicago studio for five days having plaster moldings made of his face.

Today, two of the original masks that sculptor Leonard Wells Volk created in April 1860 — the only two believed to still exist — sit on display. One is in the Smithsonian Institution, and the other is in a Southfield rare coin gallery owned by Northville resident Charlie Jarrait.

Jarrait bought the mask, a striking, eerie likeness to the 16th president, at a private, pre-auction sale from a world-renowned art dealer in Beverly Hills, Calif.

Through art circles and insider information, Jarrait heard of the mask being auctioned off as part of the annual exclusive "Manuscript" sale, sponsored by Superior Galleries of Beverly Hills. Jarrait's mask was acquired through the estate of the descendants of Gideon Wells, the former Secretary of the Navy under Lincoln.

Art dealers believe the plaster cast is authentic. However, since Jarrait acquired the piece from the consigner on behalf of a Wells descendant last October, a letter of authenticity has yet to surface.

But for Jarrait and Larry Goldberg — president of Superior Galleries, who sold the mask to Jarrait and his partners for a hefty \$200,000 — legitimacy isn't a concern.

"It's totally legitimate. It has been verified by one of the most well-known authorities on autographs, manuscripts, and all this kind of stuff in the country," Goldberg said.

Apparently a letter of authenticity from the actual descendant who put the mask on the auction block is in the works but is being delayed to Jarrait, Goldberg said.

"We need to obtain a letter from the consigner who gave the mask to the dealer, but that is just a formality because the mask had been verified by several sources," he said.

The validity of the mask takes secondary importance to its beauty. The plaster piece, on display in the window of the Richard Charles Rare Coin Galleries in Southfield, is a haunting expression of the man who changed the course of history in the five short years he was president before his untimely demise April 15, 1865.

"I remember when we got it. I set it up and it was haunting. There is so much detail. Then to think it's not just an artist's impression, but rather it was taken just right off his face," Jarrait said about the original plaster mask.

Since then, Jarrait is seeing Lincoln's face everywhere — almost literally. The coin dealer has begun reproducing the mask in limited bronze castings atop an Italian marble base.

The marketing ploy — selling the statues at \$5,500 apiece — serves a dual purpose: one as a fund-raiser for the Detroit Institute of Arts and another as pocket money for Jarrait and his partners. While he was hesitant to name the exact figure he and his backers would net from the sale, he did say both entities could see six-figure profits.

The reproductions, which will be in limited to 1,000, are selling remarkably well already. Manufactured by the Fine

What responsibilities does Walsh have as president? "I conduct the meetings," she said.

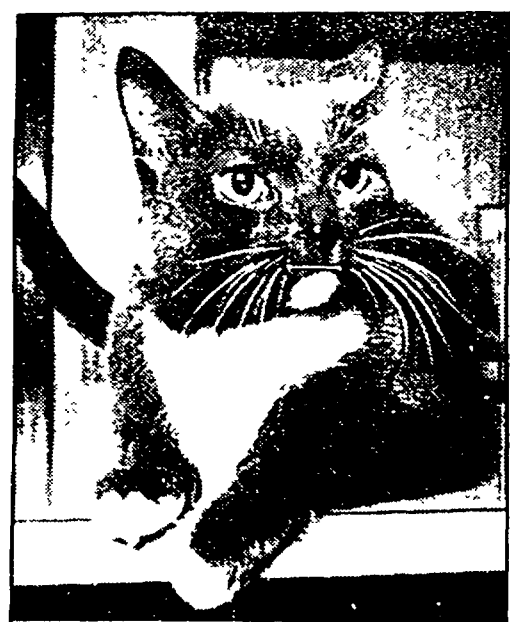
How much time does being president take? "Not much. There is some telephoning, and I help read proof on the catalog."

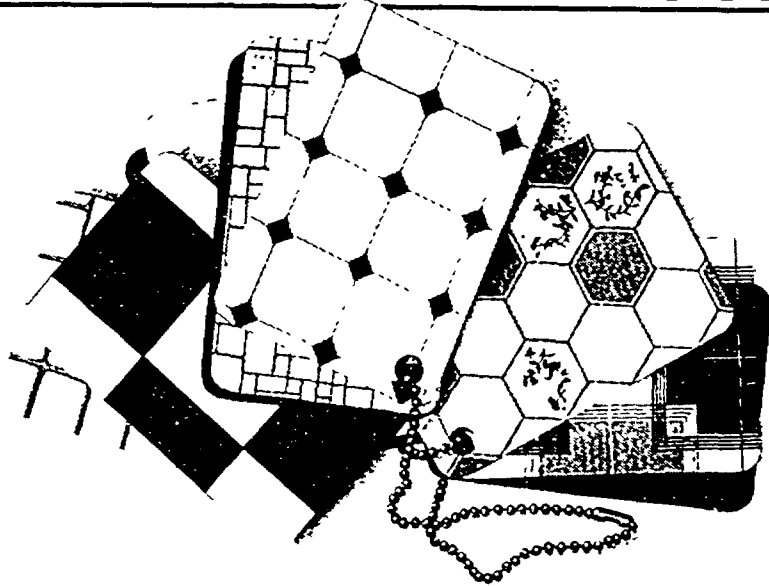

all the parent volunteers who worked in the shop and in the classroom.

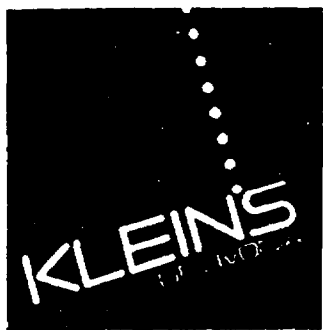

# Theater group goes to Camelot

The 45th season of the Plymouth Theatre Guild is off and running with the season's second production, "Camelot," a medieval musical which takes place at the site of King Arthur and his court. The show runs through Feb. 8.

Curtain time for this weekend's performances is 8 p.m. on Friday and Saturday with a matinee performance Sunday at 6 p.m.

## Local man preserves Lincoln mask

Fine Arts Sculpture Center in Clarkston, the bronze castings have a certain appeal to art collectors and history buffs.

"Honest Abe Lincoln — the attorney for attorneys," Jarrait said.

And that's who's buying the bronze castings. Since the dealer started reproducing the masks in December, he has sold 23 limited-edition statues not only to lawyers but to Lincoln collectors and others who pay high prices for presidential paraphernalia.

"Certain presidents — Lincoln, Washington and possibly Kennedy — stick out in most people's minds as being true changes and really played significant roles in the history of our

country," Jarrait said.

Each one, with its own identification number, has been reproduced with the finest detail.

The Clarkston company is using a "lost wax" method of reproducing, a method Jarrait said produces the most accurate reproduction available.

"All the detail is correct; every crease, every wrinkle. It creates the most exact duplication," he said.

According to Jarrait, bronze castings are made by first taking a mold of the original mask. That mold, an exact reverse of the original, is covered with 1/4-inch wax coating. Once removed, the wax mask is dipped into liquid ceramic and then dried for 24 hours. That process is repeated 10 times, creating a hard shell exterior.

The shell is then baked at 2,000 degrees for two hours. The heat causes the wax to dissolve, leaving a ceramic mold, into which the molten bronze is poured. After the bronze cools, the ceramic shell is destroyed, leaving an exact duplicate of the original mask. The process takes three to five weeks for one reproduction.

Once the 1,000 reproductions are completed, Jarrait said he intends to donate the original mask to an art museum. While he hasn't quite decided which museum — either the Detroit Institute of Arts or the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art — will house the mask, he is certain of one thing.

"They (the museums) have a real special historically significant item and we have a tax write-off," he said.

"Rather than just profiling ourselves, we've found a way to work together so the entire community benefits."

Jarrait said he initiated the project so he could find a way to help the struggling arts community in light of recent budget cuts, give something significant to the community, and make a little money.

"The community benefits by having the original and by having it in a public place. We aren't doing it just because we are nice guys, but by using the museums to market this thing it enables us to help the museum and us at the same time," he said.

The mask and bronze castings are both on display in Jarrait's showroom, 4000 Prudential Town Center, Suite 110 in Southfield.

## 'Snowbirds' make winter getaway

### Mature travelers migrating to special RV parks in the southwest

The nation's highways are now filled with mature travelers in recreational vehicles — residents of the United States and Canada heading south to escape winter's bitter cold.

The major routes are I-95 along the East Coast into Florida, and I-35, the wintering Texans' highway, connecting the Upper Midwest and the Rio Grande Valley.

But many popular roads lead to the Southwest — Arizona, New Mexico and Southern California — where travelers find spots in giant resorts to park their rigs.

Many of the RV parks are full-fledged destinations in themselves — self-contained homes away from home. Most are posted with "Adults Only" signs. Some limit residents to those age 55 and older and permit youngsters only for brief visits.

"Our grandson was here for a week over Christmas," says Chris Geary, who spends the winter months just outside Tucson at the Rincon Country West RV resort.

"We had a good time, but he doesn't square dance or do quilting or play cards. The only thing that really interested him here was a Wildcats (University of Arizona) basketball game."

Some of the bigger Southwestern resorts have more than 1,800 spaces for recreational vehicles.

Rincon West, with areas for more than 900 vehicles, is typical. It's one of the largest resorts in Tucson, an adults-only park with facilities to shelter transient travelers, winter vacationers and full-time residents.

Rincon West's winter-season schedule lists more than 100 different activities each week — ranging from professional bands to bingo to Bible study. There's a golf league, a poker circle, a singles club, a computer club, a wine-tasting club, an investment club and fully-equipped workshops for arts and crafts.

Travelers can go on organized tours to nearby sites such as Laughlin, Nev., Phoenix, Las Vegas and the Grand Canyon.

A typical winter weekend in Tucson, about five miles from Rincon West, may include a rodeo, an Indian arts fair, a concert by the Duke Ellington Orchestra or performances by the Arizona Theater Company and the Southern Arizona Light Opera.

Residents at Rincon Country West can even get daily copies of The New York Times or Wall Street Journal home-delivered (well, actually, space delivered).

No culture shock here.

Many mature travelers opt to make Rincon West their permanent home base.

The largest van that legally can be put on a conventional recreational-

vehicle-park lot is a "park model." Larger than a mobile home, a park model is a roomy van for those who want to remain permanently at the resort.

Once a park model is towed onto the lot it is jacked up, the wheels are removed and skids are installed. The owners can erect a carport and work shed — all temporary structures, which are permissible under the law.

Then some owners add what are called "Arizona rooms" — sunny, glassed-in porches that serve as family areas and make the vans even

more spacious.

Don and Bev Schessler, formerly of St. Louis, live full-time in their park model at Rincon West. They are former winter vacationers who "chanced in here," according to Bev, then came to nest.

All the park's regulars know the Schesslers, who square dance, help host newcomers and play in the band. Bev Schessler also sings in the gospel choir.

"We liked it here right off the bat," she says. "We bought a small park model, then found it wasn't big

enough. So we bought a bigger one that already had an Arizona room. We spend most of our time out there when we're not running around. This is our home now."

Hal Baumgarten, a retired teacher from New York's Columbia University who now lives year-round at the park, enjoys writing about life at Rincon West.

"For full-timers," he says, "the only home is their RV. They usually plan to travel around for as long as they are able."

Full of enthusiasm at first, many

full-timers soon find it's a tough life and eventually come to rest.

"They have to be concerned about the three Ms — mail, medicine and money," Baumgarten says.

Then there are the "part-time full-timers."

"Again, their only home is their RV," says Baumgarten, "but they spend a half year in a park like Rincon West, then spend the rest of the year in travel to cool and beautiful areas."

The part-timers are people who live in a house in the summer and travel in a recreational vehicle in the winter. These are the "classic snowbirds," says Baumgarten.

From his own permanent perch at Rincon West, he sees the snowbird migration as a growing lifestyle.

"The trend is from east to west," he adds. "Florida, with its older, less well-equipped, overpriced and crowded campgrounds and roads, is losing out to the Rio Grande Valley of Texas, Arizona and Southern California."

"At Rincon West we see an increasing number of people from New England and the mid-Atlantic states."

Wintertime residents at Rincon West — the snowbirds — pay \$355 a month for a space with cable television and a full electrical hookup. Some stay all year and pay a more economical fee, up to \$1,745 per space. Transients pay \$19.75 per day. In the winter reservations are needed.

## Brussels' Grand Place features Belgian lace

Grand-Place is a magnificent city square in the center of Brussels, Belgium, ringed with medieval guild halls and dominated by a 15th-century Gothic city hall.

Tourists and residents alike sit in cafes along the Grand-Place, admiring the Italian-Flemish architecture and consuming two of Belgium's best-known specialties — beer and mussels.

Among the shops in these stately buildings is F. Rubbrecht, which sells yet another Belgian specialty — lace.

The shop windows are artfully arranged with tablecloths, skirts, handkerchiefs and dollies.

But despite F. Rubbrecht's grand display on the city's most resplendent square, the lace is made in cozy Belgian homes.

"Real Belgian lace is always made at home," says Anne Rubbrecht, who has run the business with her husband Frans since 1957.

"We have anywhere between 50 to 100 people making lace for us in their homes, using our designs. Of course, they are not working at once and they may not work at it every day."

F. Rubbrecht is an old-fashioned shop with a chandelier and a quietly attentive staff speaking a melange of languages and serving customers from all over the world.

They expertly unfold and refold large lace tablecloths in an instant for eager customers.

Lace-making dates back to the ancient Greek civilization. It enjoyed a 16th century boom in Venice and, in the 17th century, migrated across Europe to Belgium.

Linen remains the main ingredient in most lace, although hemp, cotton, sisal and acrylic fibers are used in some contemporary lace.

"Needlework is how all lace used to be made," says Rubbrecht. "It's very painstaking, but the results are very beautiful."

Examples of needlework include a pattern called Roses Point, which features raised-relief roses.

An example of bobbin work is the Malines Point pattern, with hexagonal stitches and designs outlined in silky thread. A very fine bobbin lace, Chantilly, is largely black.

"Lace patterns and methods are often combined in a single piece made in several stages," says Rubbrecht. "So it's not uncommon to have two or three workers on a single piece doing what they are best at. Then the final piece is assembled by a

single person."

Most all the new lace in the store is bobbin work, while the antique lace is largely needlework.

Pocket handkerchiefs cost \$12.50 to \$15 (with 31 Belgian francs to the U.S. dollar) — a fine price for a memorable gift in a country that has few bargains. Among the most popular items are lace collars for women's blouses, at prices ranging from \$13 to \$20.

"The finer the work, the more expensive it is," says Rubbrecht.

Indeed, lace dollies the size of coasters range from \$3.50 to \$7.40, but much finer 8 inch dollies range from \$15 to \$50.

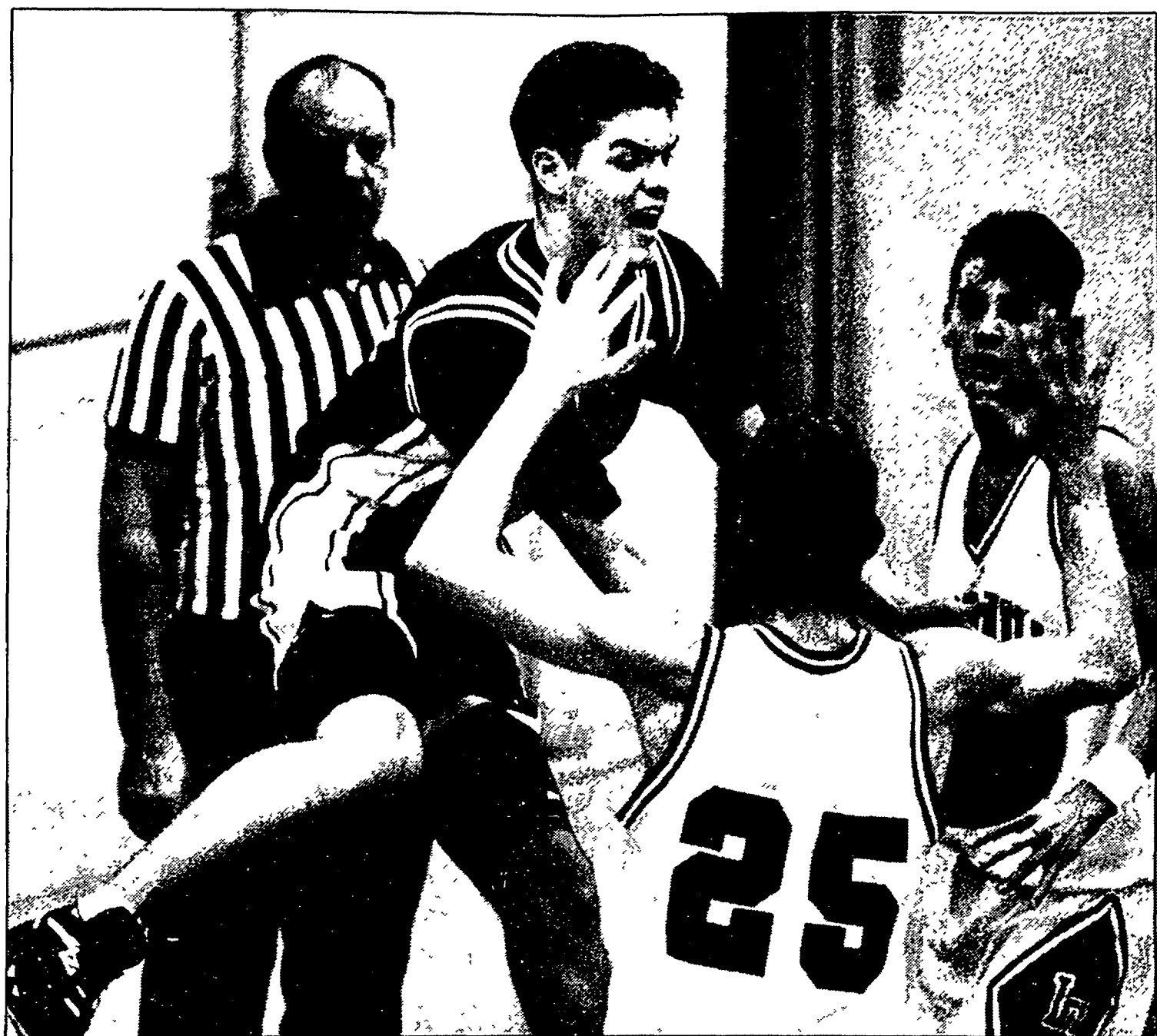

## Hoopsters fall to WLAA rival Harrison

When the season concludes for the Mustang basketball team, the hoop gods will probably etch a new law in stone:

"As thy go in the third quarter, so shall thy go in the ball game."

Farmington Harrison laid down the law in the third period Friday night to put a 74-53 victory over Northville in the books. The loss dropped the Mustangs to 5-4 overall and 2-2 in the WLAA.

The Mustangs trailed by just one going into halftime. But the Hawks, led by standout Paul Gilydis, out-gunned Northville by 19 to seal the victory.

"We always find it tough to play over there," said coach Omar Harrison. "We felt we could play with them. But that third quarter killed us."

"It was the story of the ball game."

The teams played a tight first quarter. The Mustangs used a combination of man-to-man and zone defenses to keep the Hawks in check for the opening eight minutes.

Despite that, Northville trailed 12-11 after one. As a sign of things to come, the Mustangs' Matt Schramm came out gunning and scored eight points.

Harrison said one other key factor helped his team to play the Hawks even in the first quarter.

"We played with a lot of emotion," he said.

The coach listed Harrison as one of the better teams in the WLAA. He said, perhaps with the exception of Gilydis, his squad did match up with the Hawks well.

"They aren't that tall," Harrison said. "But they have a lot of good athletes."

Northville used another strong quarter from Schramm, who added seven more points, and steady performances from Ryan Huzjak, Chris Lehr and Mike Maschek to match Harrison's 18. The Hawks took a slim 30-29 lead into the lockerroom.

"We were very pleased at that point," said Harrison. "We felt we could win the game."

Gilydis had other ideas, though. The Hawk player scored 12 of his 18 in the game to lead Harrison to a 29-point explosion in the third. Guard Jeremy Teachman also had 11 in the period.

Harrison said Teachman was the key in the period as he drove baseline and either scored or dished off to Gilydis for easy inside shots. He said as well as those two performed, the play of his team was a little lacking.

"It reflects that we played sort of passively in the third," Harrison said.

The coach added that he has been unable to determine exactly what the problem is in the third. He said the games his team has lost this year usually stem from a bad third period.

"We really don't know what it is," Harrison said. "We aren't doing anything differently."

Harrison increased its lead in the fourth by one.

Schramm led Northville with 24 points in the game while Huzjak added nine with 12 assists. Lehr finished with six.

Heiden said that win set the tone for the rest of the meet.

"Winning the medley relay always helps," he commented.

In the 200-yard freestyle, the Mustangs' Wesley again came in a winner in 1:55.22. Novi's Mike Speerschneder and Clark weren't far behind with times of 1:55.40 and 1:55.63 respectively.

Derek Speerschneder got the 'Cats' first victory in the 200IM. The senior posted a time of 2:04.76. Northville's Matt Handyside was a distant second at 2:19.87.

In the 50 freestyle, the Mustangs' Holdridge took the event in 23.67. Novi took second and third as Matt Mutch came in at 23.83 and Clark

at 25.34.

Fee and Fisher tallied six points for Northville with a one-two showing in the 100-yard butterfly with times of 57.03 and 58.47. Matt Mutch came in third for Novi in 59.73.

Wesley won the 100 freestyle in 53.21. The Wildcats managed a third-place finish as Suchyta swam a 55.08 race.

In the beam, DeHart took an 8.5 for Northville. Kosman scored 8.4 while Kolb had an 8.05 and Allen 7.85.

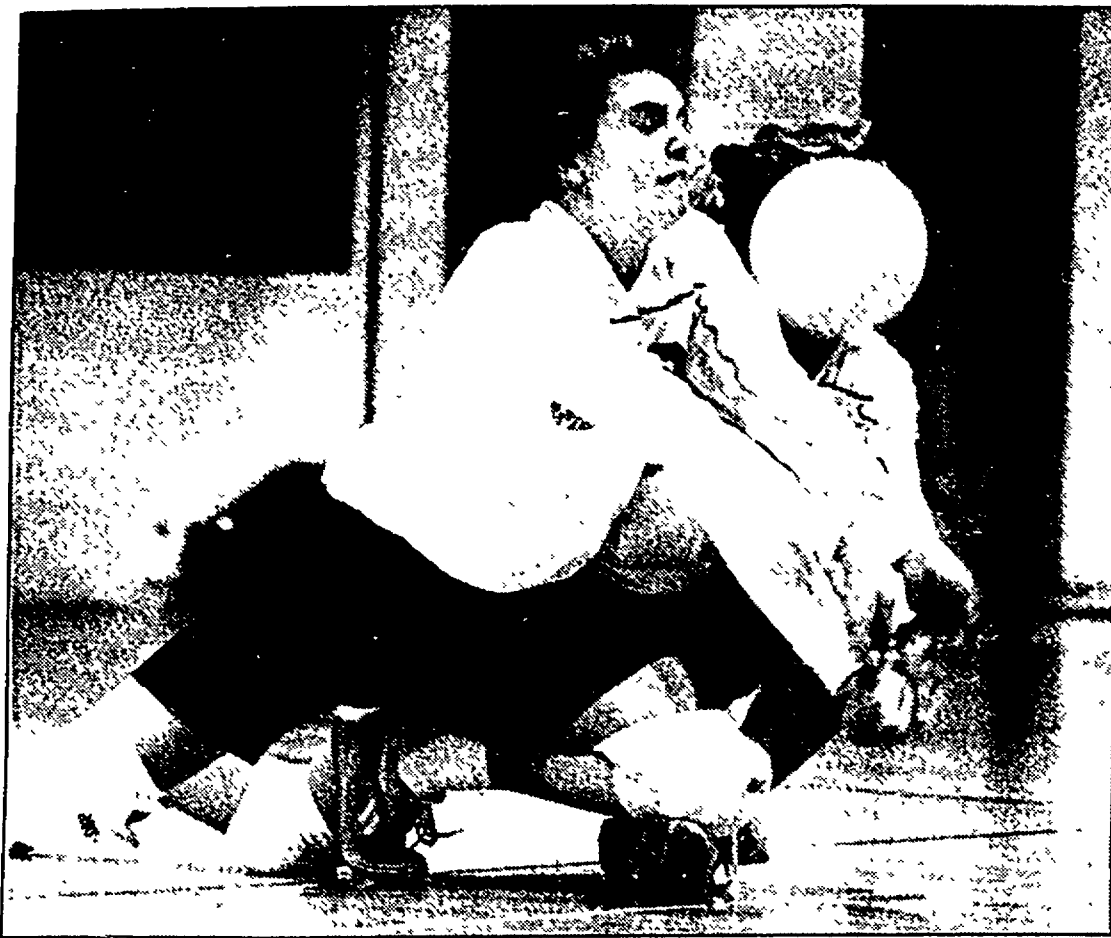
Northville posted its second best total of the dual meet in the floor exercise.

Northville gave itself all the margin it would need in the first event of the dual meet, the vault.

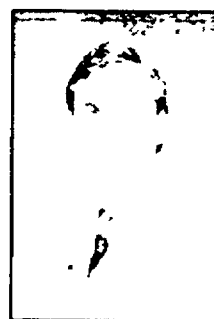

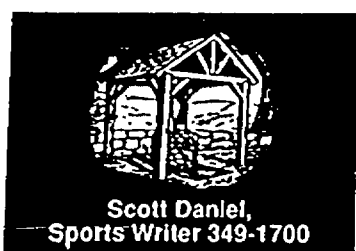

## Improvements abound in dentistry

A trip to the dentist, orthodontist or periodontist really is something to smile about these days.

Dentistry in the 1990s isn't just about filling and drilling, pain and punishment. Having worked hard to shed its "shop of horrors" image, the oral health profession now has become one of the most progressive and upbeat in the entire health-care industry.

When you take a seat in the dentist's chair, not only can you expect the experience to be far more comfortable than it was in the past, but you also can look forward to more effective treatments geared toward a mouthful of problems.

New cavity-prevention and filling techniques, cosmetic whitening and bonding, high-tech, low-pain equipment and inconspicuous braces are just some of the ways today's oral health experts are promoting healthy teeth and gums that are beautiful to boot. Just consider the following examples:

### A BETTER TOOTHBRUSH

Preventive dental care can be an adventure in itself, thanks to the astounding array of flosses, brushes, pastes and mouthwashes on the market today.

With toothbrushes, you can choose your color, size, bristle texture and shape, and even select from ergonomically designed handles and brushes fashioned to meet your teeth at the proper angle.

With toothpastes, flavor is no longer the only option — you can select from those with whiteners, fluoride, tartar control or those especially for kids or sensitive teeth.

Mouthwashes not only taste better than they used to, but also fight plaque with fluoride. Flosses can be waxed or unwaxed, wide or string-thin, and may be purchased on a special holder that makes getting in between teeth even easier than doing it by hand.

The newest electric toothbrushes have bristles that rotate while the stem remains still for optimum cleansing power, while dental water sprayers clean plaque from beneath the gum line, where it can accumu-

late and cause gum disease and bad breath.

When it's time for your regular checkup, you're likely to find some surprises in the dentist's office as well.

For instance, your dentist might use a tiny TV camera to record the goings-on inside your mouth and transfer the images to an overhead screen. Such live coverage lets the dentist locate areas of decay more easily, while you get to see just what he or she is doing inside your mouth.

A computerized screen also can illustrate the before and after for patients considering cosmetic procedures. One-half of the screen shows your present smile, and the other illustrates how grand you'll look after the proposed treatment.

If your dentist uncovers a problem, you needn't clench your fists and close your eyes in anticipation of the pain. Today's oral anesthetics stay confined to a given area, rather than dissipating throughout your system and thus diluting the effectiveness.

Another procedure, called intraligamentary anesthesia, is designed to anesthetize specific areas of the mouth for short periods of time, so you don't have to go through the remainder of the day with a numb mouth. And, water-cooled, high-speed, air turbine drills are more wand than machine because they operate smoothly and quickly without giving off heat.

As lasers move into the dentist's office, the pain factor promises to be reduced even more. These intense beams of light are now used to remove small oral tumors, cysts and superficial infections in the mouth, and soon will be used to zap cavities, repair fractures, seal pits and fissures and perform a variety of cosmetic procedures.

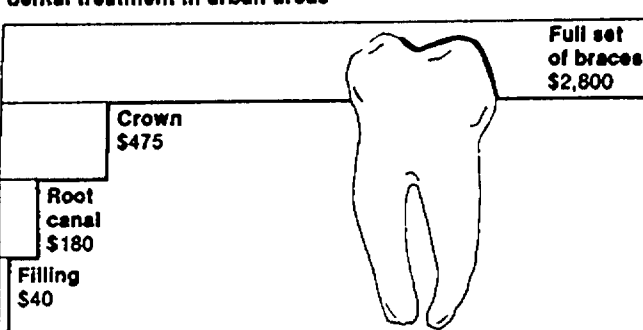
Lasers also are now used to treat periodontal disease, one of the most common dental problems that can lead to eventual tooth loss.

Periodontal disease starts when bacteria burrows down between teeth and gums, and causes the gums to pull away from the teeth. Instead of using scalpels and scraping instruments to rid the tooth root of bacterial deposits, a periodontist can now vaporize inflamed or infected

gum tissue via laser, which is a much more efficient approach.

### BRACE YOURSELF

Think braces are just for kids? Think again.

Today, adult patients generally make up from 20 to 50 percent of most orthodontic practices for dozens of good reasons.

If you're 20-something or beyond and succumbing to braces, chances are good that they will be far less noticeable than the silvery "railroad tracks" of yesteryear.

Instead, there are tiny tooth-tinted ceramic and stainless-steel brackets that adhere directly onto teeth instead of encompassing them in silver. "Invisible braces" that are bonded to the back of the teeth to avoid the "metalmouth" look, and even removable braces that can be worn for up to 18 hours a day to alter the position of one or two teeth.

Orthodontics can take longer in adults than in children because adult jaws are no longer growing. But oral health professionals say grown-ups have one big thing going for them: They're practically perfect complier in terms of treatment.

And, soon, the time factor may not even be a problem given the development of "electronic braces" that now

are in the experimental stages.

As these braces apply pressure to the teeth, tiny batteries deliver a low electrical current to the gums. The current accelerates the adjustment of the bone anchoring the teeth, thus allowing them to be moved more quickly.

### BRIGHTER AND WHITER

If you weren't blessed with a glittering set of pearly whites, take heart. Given the dramatic rise in cosmetic dentistry practices, there's an excellent chance that your dentist can take over where Mother Nature left off.

With resins, porcelain and ceramic, dentists can whiten, brighten, cover, rebuild and fill in what's needed for a stunning smile.

If it's brighter, stain-free teeth you're after, check out the latest tooth-whitening treatments such as White and Bright, Night Guard Vital Bleaching or Rembrandt, all of which remove deep stains from tooth enamel and in many cases take the place of caps, tooth enameling and bonding.

Such products are designed to be used under a dentist's supervision, but there also are some over-the-counter tooth brighteners for lesser problems.

## Mouth guards provide protection



Children and adults involved in certain sports need more than quick reflexes for protection against elbows to the chin or airborne hockey pucks. They need the protection of an athletic mouth guard that can prevent traumatic injuries to the teeth when used faithfully. Research shows some 250,000 dental sports injuries a year can be prevented by using mouth protectors.

Mouth guards not only sharply lower the incidence and severity of injuries to the teeth and mouth, but they also act as a buffer against more serious injuries such as concussions, jaw fractures and neck injuries.

Although they are traditionally associated

with football, mouth guards can prevent injuries in a wide variety of activities. The American Dental Association recommends that athletes playing hockey, boxing and basketball and other rigorous sports wear mouth guards at all times during training and competition.

Dental and sports medicine studies indicate that almost any vigorous activity can result in injuries to the teeth, lips, cheeks, tongue and jaws — not just sports involving body contact. Sudden falls and accidental collisions during many sports can lead to dental injuries.

One such incident occurred not too long ago. The mother of a Northville High School student rushed into my office at 8 p.m. as we were closing. Her son received a serious soccer injury during a game and was being rushed to my office. During two hours of intensive surgery, I repositioned the fractured bone that holds the teeth in place and bonded the two replanted teeth to his stable teeth for temporary immobilization and

healing. After all of this, I sutured his very swollen, lacerated lip.

After several days, he required root canal therapy in his two front teeth because of the severity of the injury. Today, this soccer player is doing very well, with little visible evidence of his severe sports injury. But it's disheartening to think that this all may have been prevented by the use of a sports mouth guard.

Which type of mouth guard is best? There are two major types of mouth guards available. The first is the custom-made mouth guard fabricated by a dentist. This type is made from a cast of the athlete's upper teeth and fitted by a dentist. This type exhibits the best fit, comfort and ease of speech. The second is the mouth-formed protector, made of a soft material that easily molds to the athlete's teeth. It is less expensive but may not fit as well or last as long.

Even the least expensive mouth guard is better than no guard at all. Mouth guards minimize sports injuries regardless of the type used.

# Ice, ice, baby

Lake lovers love the water,  
but stress common-sense safety

People who live along lakes in Livingston County in summertime will tell you there isn't anything quite as nice.

But living on a lake in winter has advantages as well, they are quick to add.

There are plenty of chances for sports and activities like skating, playing hockey, ice fishing, snowmobiling, sliding, cross-country skiing and others.

Linda and Dominic Parlove and their four children have lived in a cottage on Pleasant Lake in Marion Township for nine years.

"I love it all the time," Linda Parlove said. The Parlove children, who range from 4 to 9 years old, especially enjoy skating when the lake freezes.

An important part of any winter lake activities is ice safety.

Because Pleasant Lake is shallow, it freezes quickly. Still, Parlove is always aware of the dangers of thin ice, she said.

"Just the thought of it, my whole body just cringes," she said, adding her children learned ice safety at early ages.

"They are allowed to go down (to the lake edge), but they are not allowed on the ice until it's been checked," she said.

Neighbors cooperate with one another by checking ice in their area and letting others know its condition, she said.

Bob Krichke, Hamburg Township police chief, said people should be wary of ice when temperatures have fluctuated greatly as they have this winter. Also, people need to be aware of springs or rivers that run into lakes because they often result in weak spots in ice.

"I think most people who live on lakes know the lake they live on," he said, adding that people who fall through ice are often on lakes unfamiliar to them.

The Hamburg Police Department has its own diving team, and all police cars are equipped with life preservers, buoys and about 100 feet of rope, Krichke said.

Sgt. Fred Devine of the Livingston County Sheriff's Department, said most reports of people falling through ice occur in early winter and early spring, although people should be on the alert for thin ice at all times.

Lake ice should generally be at least four inches thick before activities like skating are safe, said Devine, who is dive master of the sheriff department's diving team. The thickness of ice is best checked by using a "spud" or sharp instrument, he said.

Barb and Gary Saum have lived on Coon Lake in Marion Township since 1968. They have two grown children. Over the years family members enjoyed skating, hockey and some ice fishing and cross-country skiing on the lake, she said.

Though Coon Lake freezes five or six inches thick during a cold spell, ice safety continues to be a concern.

Often people wrongly assume a lake that is frozen at its edge will also be frozen in the middle, Saum said.

She saw people walking out on the lake's ice three days after she saw geese swimming in the same area. "Most people are careful but I would say some are careless about lakes," she said.

Common sense plays an important part for families who live on lakes in the winter. Police advise that people play it safe and stay off the ice if in doubt of its safety.

Despite the safety issues, both Parlove and Saum sing high praises of lake life, winter and summer.

"We wouldn't trade it for anything," Parlove said.

Saum described what she feels is the best part of living on a lake in winter: "It's sitting inside with a fire in the fireplace," she said, describing a beautiful scene of snow-covered trees and peaceful ice. "It's like you have this giant backyard because you can see so far."

## Grow great garlic

Only the most educated connoisseur knows that there are two classifications of garlic (hardnecks, which bolt and flower, and softnecks, which don't), four varieties (rocamboule and continental, which are hardnecks, and silverskin and artichoke, which are softnecks) and hundreds of named strains that differ in taste, appearance and other qualities.

If you have devoted some of the space in your garden to growing delicious garlic, the following tips will ensure success:

- Use good soil. The ideal garlic soil is rich, loose loam with balanced nutrients, a slightly acidic pH (between 6 and 7) and good drainage in full sun. A heavy soil may limit bulb size.

- Be mindful of disease. Because garlic is asexually propagated, disease can spread via contaminated cloves. Be sure the ones you plant are firm and unblem-

ished.

- Be an early bird when planting garlic. In areas with cold winters, plant garlic in the fall about four to six weeks before the ground freezes. It needs a good root system to give it an early start in the spring.

- Try the fridge. Cloves must be exposed to temperatures between 32 and 50 degrees for about two months to break dormancy. If your winters are milder, chill the cloves in the refrigerator for a few weeks.

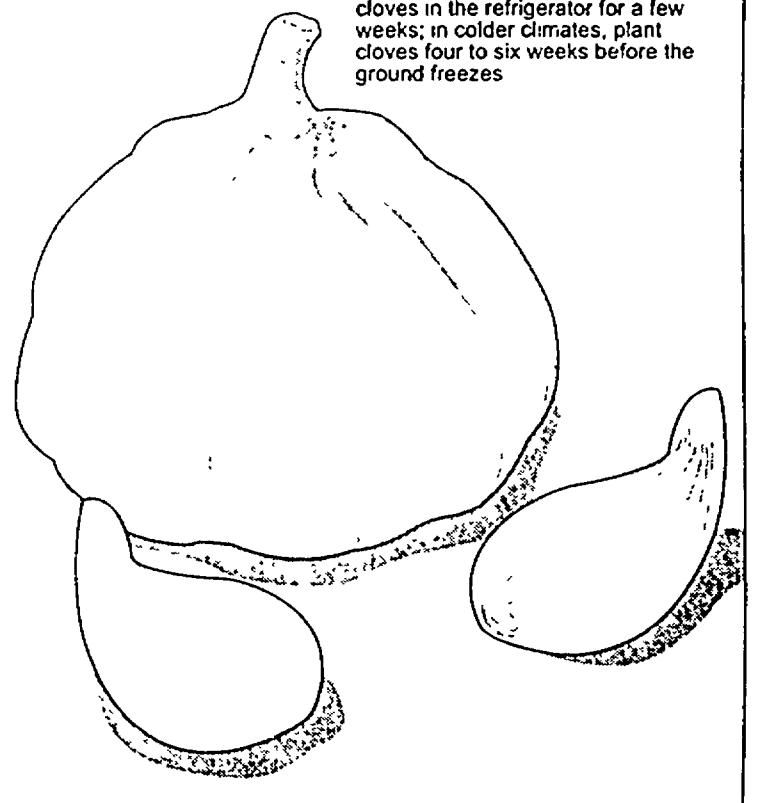
- Give your garlic room. Press the root end of the cloves into the bottom of a shallow trench 4 to 5 inches apart and 2 to 3 inches deep. Space rows 8 inches apart in beds or 16 to 18 inches apart elsewhere.

- Protect the garlic from the cold. Mulch your garlic at planting time to keep it warm over the winter. All it takes is a severe winter to ruin your garlic crop.

### Great Garlic

- Plant garlic in full sunlight in loamy, slightly acidic soil with good drainage.
- Plant firm, unblemished cloves; disease spreads via contaminated cloves
- Press the root end of the cloves 4 to 5 inches apart into the bottom of a 2-inch trench; space rows 8 inches apart in plant beds.
- Cloves must be exposed to temperatures between 32 and 50 degrees for two months to break dormancy. In warmer climates, chill cloves in the refrigerator for a few weeks; in colder climates, plant cloves four to six weeks before the ground freezes

# New commonwealth learning to appreciate U.S. marketing system

"network" in this country. She attended meetings of a Board of Realtors, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club and other groups. She hopes to promote this type of communications in the business arena in her country.

The opportunity for Zetta to observe and learn from an active real estate business operation in this country was afforded by the Enterprise Development Program, organized by the Center for US-USSR Initiatives in San Francisco.

The program was created to help stabilize the economic re-forms now sweeping the former Soviet Republics—now the Commonwealth of Independent States—as

they move toward a free economy.

To help these countries understand what free enterprise is about—and teach them how to launch a successful enterprise—the program matches Commonwealth entrepreneurs with seasoned business and professional people in the United States. It's a positive educational experience for everyone involved, Hill said.

The primary goal of the program is to give the Commonwealth entrepreneur the basic knowledge needed to establish and develop a private enterprise in his own country.

"The greatest need of these people is to learn how to develop small, private enterprises," it was stated in an EDP newsletter. "Their centralized economy left no room

for individual initiative. Soviet citizens have been forbidden to engage in work that resulted in private profit. This legacy leaves the Commonwealth people without models, textbooks, classes or conditioning to start an enterprise at a time when privatization is being urged to counteract massive economic problems."

EDP expects to arrange hundreds of matches between Commonwealth entrepreneurs and American small-business owners and managers during the next three years.

It's interesting to note that the primary subject taught by Zetta at colleges and universities in Kazakhstan was the communism form of government. In contrast, she recently completed an in-depth thesis for her Candidate's

Degree on "The Formation of a Small Enterprise."

She plans to open an educational facility in Alma-Ata where her people can learn and develop business skills.

"The only way for our country to succeed and prosper is for our people to develop business expertise," she said. "But we have not enough experience in this area. I hope to help provide this education. My future prosperity is in the prosperity of our country."

Real estate marketing in her country will be particularly difficult. It contradicts many key principles and policies, established for decades. But progress is under way.

**Q. Is it true that real estate appraisers must now be state**

**licensed or certified?**

A. No. The legislated requirement for appraisers to be licensed or certified in their state before they can participate in federally related real estate transactions was postponed from Jan. 1, 1992 to Jan. 1, 1993.

The extension gives appraisers more time to complete new educational requirements and be tested for their license or certification. At this point, only a small proportion of appraisers would qualify for licensing or certification.

**Q. What's the prognosis for home sales during 1992?**

A. Here's a typical assessment from real estate industry leaders. This is from a recent report issued by Better Homes and Gardens

**Real Estate Service:**

"With interest rates dipping to single digits and housing costs, in much of the country steady to declining, we now have some of the best housing values since 1977. But, a strong increase in home buying activity seems to be dependent upon the nation's economic recovery."

"Brokers are generally optimistic, yet realistic for a resurgence in home sales, with lower interest rates and housing prices leading the recovery of the housing market."

## Candy dish disclosure

### ANTIQUES

Q. Enclosed is 8 photo of a beautiful candy dish; it is marked "Royal Winton Chintz, Hand Painted, Made in England." It was purchased in the early 1900s. Can you tell me how much it might sell for?

A. This was made by Grmwades Ltd. in Stoke, England, during the mid-20th century. It would probably sell for about \$35 to \$45.

Q. I have a 9-inch vase that has a picture of a deer in a field; in the background are a building and trees.

It is marked "Royal Bayreuth" and dated 1794. Please evaluate this for me.

A. Your porcelain vase was made in Teitau, Germany, in the mid-20th century (the company was founded in 1794). It would probably sell for about \$100.

Q. Some people say that my can of Billy Beer is valuable. I know this was made when his brother (Jimmy Carter) was president of the United States in the 1970s.

What is your opinion?  
A. My opinion doesn't count. The last time I checked, the price was

about \$3; a current price guide lists the empty Billy Beer cans at 50 cents to \$1.

In some states it is illegal to sell a can of beer without a license.

Q. My antique hand-painted porcelain vase is 10 inches tall and is decorated with orange and yellow flowers on a black background. It is marked "Czechoslovakia."

Can you tell me when this was made and what it might sell for?

A. Since Czechoslovakia was founded in 1918, your vase was probably made between then and 1939, when the country was taken over by Germany. It would probably sell for \$65 to \$75.

# How to clean the fireplace and hearth

Q. The brick and grout surrounding the opening in our fireplace is black and sooty due to very large fires. Now that the pyromaniacs in our family have grown up and moved out, I would like to know how we can clean this area.

A. Smoke is a difficult stain to remove from masonry. A thorough scrubbing with scouring powder containing bleach, using a stiff brush, will sometimes do the job.

Rubbing alcohol also can be effective. Use a soaked rag or paintbrush to apply the alcohol and wipe the smoke stains off.

Another method is using a paste of powdered pumice and concentrated ammonia. Apply heavily to the smoked area with a brush and let set for two hours, then scrub with hot water and soap and rinse with clear water.

For more stubborn stains, a poultice using trichloroethylene will pull the stains from the pores. Precaution should be taken to ventilate a closed space in which trichloroethylene is used, as the fumes are harmful.

There are also good masonry cleaners on the market. Check with your masonry dealer for products specifically recommended

for the removal of smoke stains. Be sure and follow manufacturer directions carefully and give the cleaner plenty of time to work. More than one application is often necessary.

If you still can't remove the staining, there are a number of stronger chemicals on the market for cleaning bricks. Choosing the right one depends on whether the brick is glazed or unglazed.

Avoid acid cleaners on glazed brick and light-colored brick. On glazed brick use a non-acid degreaser. You'll probably have to wire brush the grout to remove all carbon traces.

For non-glazed and darker-colored brick, use a cleaner with an inhibited muriatic or hydrofluoric acid formula. Test these solutions in an inconspicuous area first since minerals found in brick vary from area to area, and some cleaners can react with them in unexpected ways. For example, an acid used on bricks with high copper content could turn them green.

Many of these products will not be available from retail stores and must be obtained through a masonry dealer or janitorial supply house. When dealing with any of these strong chemicals, take special care and protect yourself with adequate ventilation. Wear old clothes, goggles and gloves.

Another option is having your

brick cleaned by a professional—a masonry contractor who has the special equipment to deal with your specific cleaning problem.

Q. We have a terrazzo fireplace hearth, which is very dull and spotted. The numerous cleaners we have tried have been ineffective. Any suggestions about cleaning and restoration of the surface would be appreciated.

A. First give your hearth a good cleaning, scrubbing with a nylon scouring pad (or stiff brush) with warm to hot water.

While the surface is still damp, apply a poultice 1/2-inch thick made as follows: Using an abra-

sive cleaning powder, preferably one containing a bleach, make a thick paste with hot water, about 1 pound of powder for each 1-1/2 square feet of surface to be covered.

Let the poultice remain on the surface for 48 hours or until completely dry. Then remove with wood paddles to prevent scratching the surface. Rinse well.

If this fails, make a poultice of whitening and hydrogen peroxide, to which a few drops of household ammonia is added. Spread over the stained areas and let dry.

A third suggestion: Use a "flushoff" paint and varnish remover. After the stains have been removed, give the surface two coats of terrazzo sealer, which should help resist further staining.

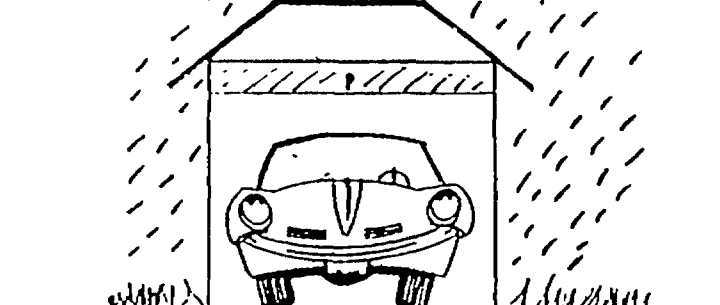

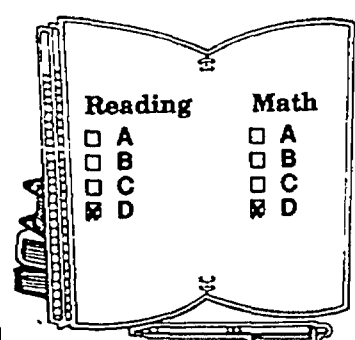

# Don't just manage; be a real leader

As managers "manage," leaders do what they do well. A leader has the ability to know what he does particularly well and where his weaknesses lie. If you're a top-notch salesperson, share your sales secrets with your sales force; if you are not a "numbers cruncher," develop someone within your business who is. A good leader realizes that he cannot be all things to all people, so he develops key people to cover his weak

areas.

Although managers are honest most of the time, leaders make a point to always tell the truth. When you find it necessary to tell small "white lies" to the people you work with, you might as well pack it in. When they find you out, you will have ruined your credibility with them. Leaders realize that people can accept and respect the honest truth, no matter how difficult it may be to swallow at the time.

As praise may be used by managers to manipulate people, leaders use praise to develop a person's self-esteem. Leaders know that the most effective method of encouraging people onward and upward is self-motivation.

Leaders praise people for a job well done immediately and sincerely. Unlike managers who sometimes lavish their people with cheap praise in an effort to push them harder, leaders help foster self-worth, value, and importance among their employee staff.

Managers work their required schedule. Leaders work whenever their leadership support is needed. How many times have you asked your employees to work an extra weekend, or stay late to fill an important order? An impor-

tant rule of great leadership is never to require someone to do something you wouldn't be willing to do yourself.

This doesn't mean that every time you ask somebody to work late, you must work yourself. Rather, it means that you must have the sensitivity to know when it is important for you to be there reinforcing and supporting the efforts of your employees.

Last, but not least, a manager evaluates his employees' performance, while a leader evaluates his own performance as well. Managerial ego is a lot like the steam that fogs your bathroom mirror. . . . It distorts reality. To avoid self-analysis is a symptom of personal weakness, mediocrity, or both.

## Economists see slow growth this quarter

A leading bank's index projects persistent economic weakness through the first quarter of 1992.

Real gross domestic product growth will average only 0.3 percent in the fourth and first quarters, including the likelihood of negative growth in the current quarter, according to November's Advance Economic Barometer.

The AEB fell to a level of 0.1, the third consecutive month the leading business index has been near the zero mark, according to Manufacturers National Corp.

"Over the past six months, the AEB has fallen from a level of 2.5 in May to 0.1 in November," said David G. Sowerby, vice president and economist. "The decline for the AEB provided a signal in the late spring that the economy would remain 'stuck in the mud' with lower interest rates."

Recent cuts in the Federal Reserve discount rate — combined with monetary stimulation — should lead to faster money growth. Any meaningful rebound will not occur until the second or third quarter of next year, Sowerby concluded.

The AEB combines three series into a single, balanced and comprehensive leading indicator: (1) inflation-adjusted money growth, (2) yield-curve spread and (3) Commerce Department's index of leading indicators.

Adolescence is a time of change for both the teen-ager and the family. A teen-ager, positioned somewhere between a child and an adult, feels torn in both directions. Teen-agers need approval, yet they fight for independence. They want guidance, yet they need to start making their own decisions.

As a teen-ager seeks to define his or her own identity, peer groups grow in importance. Sometimes, family members feel left out. However, family members play a crucial role in a teen-ager's life.

Partnerships for Education Task Force since early 1985, partnerships are formal voluntary relationships between the schools and their communities—businesses, industry, labor, government, civic groups, churches, individuals, etc.—to improve the educational system. Partners match available resources, primarily human resources, with identified needs to meet mutually agreed upon goals and objectives. Both partners should benefit.

Partnerships are win-win arrangements for everyone. For the students, partnerships make the world more understandable. By interacting with business people and doing practical projects, students understand how classroom learning can be applied to real life. Partnerships also enrich the curriculum, motivate students to perform, increase awareness of career opportunities and give young people a better understanding of their community.

For the businesses, involvement in a partnership program is an investment in tomorrow's leaders, employees and consumers. It's a rewarding and satisfying experience for employees that instills a sense of teamwork and mutual achievement. It improves community relations through increased visibility and recognition for the partner throughout the community. Finally, there's the personal satisfaction employees feel when they make a positive contribution to the community.

For the community, partnerships mean a stronger public school system, a better prepared work force, improved economic vitality, increased civic awareness and cooperation, and a maintained or improved standard of living.

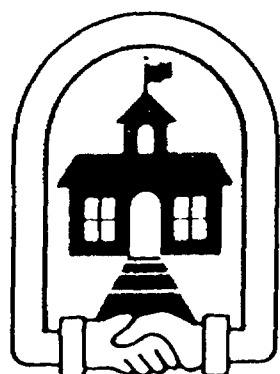

*said Jan Purtell, Partnership director for the Northville Schools. "When the U-M Health Centers sponsored a Haunted Forest Walk for children at Halloween, they needed to have 100 pumpkins carved to decorate the walkway and paper skeletons made to decorate the concession stand. We put our heads together and called in other partners to help.*

Part of that role is to remain flexible and to communicate effectively.

To help your whole family adjust to adolescence, here are a few suggestions.



#### • Set limits

Clearly stated expectations will help your teenager adjust to the realities of the adult world. Let your teen-ager know you expect certain behaviors, such as contributing to household chores and keeping reasonable hours. Remember that positive reinforcement and the withholding of privileges work better than punishment.

#### • Avoid overprotecting

A teen-ager needs to practice managing his or her life, including school work and finances. Be there to offer help, but avoid taking over.

#### • Avoid demanding too much

A teen-ager needs his or her own dreams and goals. Perfect grades, a starring role in the school play or becoming a doctor may be your goals for the child, but not his or hers.



#### • Give clear feedback

Approval and acceptance are still important to the adolescent, whose self-esteem can waiver easily. If you disapprove of your teen-ager's behavior, say so clearly. However, avoid sending the message that the teen-ager is a bad person. Instead of saying "You're a slob," try saying, "I don't like it when you leave your clothes on the floor." Criticize their behavior, not the individual.

#### • Empathize

Each person's adolescence is unique. While events and circumstances in your own adolescence may have been similar, individual reactions and feelings are often different. No one likes to feel like a rubber stamp. Listen to and discover the unique, developing person that is your teen-ager.

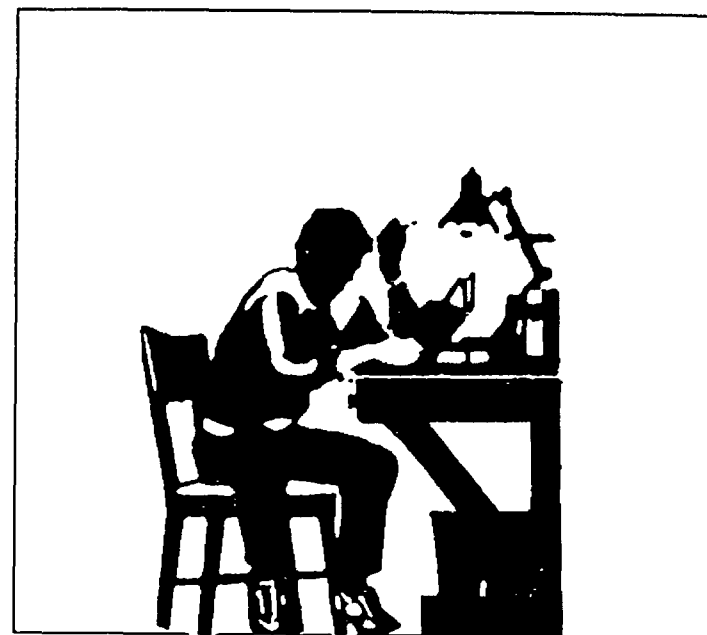

#### • Resolve family conflicts

Ongoing family strife may be more than "just a phase" for your teen-ager. Each member of a family influences the mental health of the other members. Resolve difficulties as a unit.



#### • Watch for warning signs

Teen-agers can be changeable and moody. However, a drastic change in behavior may indicate the need for professional assistance. Warning signs include frequent angry outbursts, cruel behavior to peers or pets, a change in sleeping or eating habits, trouble at school, fear of weight gain, secretiveness about eating, self-imposed isolation and feelings of hopelessness. A preoccupation with death or suicide, or any suicidal threats, are a serious warning sign.

When additional help is needed, the best results come from early intervention and the cooperation of family and friends. Often the best place to start is by discussing the problem with your family physician.

# Safety Tips for Teen-agers

### Good news

Injury prevention works. From 1978 to 1988 we saw a 28 percent decrease in injuries. If we try to learn from this experience, we can do even better in the '90s. One way to do this is work with adolescents to make sure they understand what the risks are and mobilize their efforts to make the world a safer place for them. We can begin by looking at a few of the facts.

For adolescents, the No. 1 risk they face is an automobile crash caused by themselves or a friend. And it gets more specific if we look behind the headlines. The typical automobile crash that claims the life of teen-agers involves a single, high-speed vehicle on a rural road at night.

### So what can you do to make your teen-ager safer in today's world?

One of the strengths of adolescents is that they can and will relate to parents who are willing to listen, show concern and spend time with them. Demonstrate that you care about their safety. One of the best ways to do this is to encourage open discussion about the use of seat belts, designed-driver programs and curfew times.

Make sure your teen understands the importance of seat belt use and is aware of the risks of drinking and driving. Explain why you worry if they are not home at curfew. During these discus-

sions, work with your teen to develop a plan to prevent riding with an impaired driver. Many schools have designated-driver or safe rides programs to prevent drinking and driving. Provide cab fare or promise to pick up your teen if he or she calls because their driver is judged to be unsafe. Teen-agers need to know you trust them, support them and will not ask questions if they call for your assistance.

Teen-agers need to have an annual health supervision visit to the doctor's office. The examination should be more than certification for athletic participation. The modern health supervision visit includes a full investigation of factors that could impair health, safety or normal behavioral development.

### Education is important, too

Teens need to know that:

- Seat belts prevent 50 percent of fatalities and 65 percent of hospitalizations.
- Bicycle helmets reduce brain injuries by 88 percent.
- Motorcycles are frequently involved in crashes, but 92 percent of motorcyclists in crashes had no training.
- Helmet use by motorcycles decreases fatalities from 36 to 11 per 1,000 collisions.
- All-terrain vehicles cause 80,000 injuries a year because their safe operation requires skill, judgment and experience.

## Personal Safety Advice

*From the American Academy of Pediatrics*

### Protect personal safety from physical or sexual assault

- Do not hitchhike or accept rides from strangers

### Drive responsibly

- Always wear a seat belt
- Drive defensively
- Do not speed
- Never drive when drinking, under the influence of marijuana or other drugs, or when angry
- Never ride in a car whose driver (including a parent) has been drinking, is on drugs or drives recklessly
- Wear a helmet when riding a bicycle or motorcycle

### Participate in sports safety

- Wear protective equipment made especially for that sport
- If unable to swim, take swimming lessons
- Don't swim alone
- Don't swim after eating a heavy meal, drinking alcohol or taking a new or sedating medication
