





Primary polls open Tuesday

With Buchanan only leading Bush alphabetically, and the Democratic field growing smaller every week, Michigan voters now get the chance to put their own spin on the presidential primary.

Michigan's first presidential primary election in more than 10

years will determine which presidential candidates win the support of state delegates attending the national Democratic and Republican conventions this summer. The two candidates nominated at the convention will appear on the Nov. 3 general election ballot.

Polls for the primary will be open tomorrow, March 17, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Though the actual winners are anyone's guess, you can bet that the majority of Northville voters will side with the Grand Old Party.

Northville Township election workers expect fairly heavy turnouts for Tuesday's primary. After working out some serious kinks in the primary registration process, the township expects smooth sailing tomorrow.

About 930 absentee voters already have cast ballots in the township, which boasts almost 11,500 registered voters. Of that figure, about 6,200 have not declared a party preference, while 3,800 claim Republican colors and 1,500 have decided to cast their lot with the Democratic party, said Eunice Switzer, township deputy clerk.

Computer fouls party preferences

Evan Petrie's first foray into the political arena has left him a bit confused. Petrie, an 18-year-old Northville High School senior, had eagerly awaited Tuesday's Michigan presidential primary. The primary would allow

him to enter a democratic process that previously he could glimpse only through school government classes.

The first step was uneventful. Petrie registered to vote at a local Secretary of State office and declared no party preference. From then, he needed only wait for Northville Township to send

him a voter registration card.

Petrie thought this voting thing would be a breeze.

But a funny thing happened to Petrie on the way to the ballot box. When he received his voter registration card, Petrie found that the township

Board ends pensions for officers

Something needs to be done about elected officials' salaries and benefits, township board members concurred last week.

They just can't agree on what that something is.

After much debate, the board last Thursday voted 4-3 to suspend future pensions to elected officials and cast the fate of salaries and benefits to a citizens' committee.

The majority voters included three elected officials who would stand to lose benefits if a failed recommendation had been adopted.

The citizens' committee, built of delegates to the Northville 2000 study group, will be asked to offer a wages and salaries recommendation by May 1.

All moves adopted by the township board are scheduled to take effect in 1993.

Those steps represent the board's first official action on pensions and benefits, issues that became public after the disclosure that the township's elected officers — the supervi-

sor, treasurer, and clerk — were eligible to receive pension, health, and other benefits.

Those three elected officials are the only part-time township employees eligible to receive benefits normally reserved for full-timers.

Two of the people currently in those positions, Supervisor Betty Lennox and Clerk Tom Cook, receive pension benefits from multiple sources, including the township's pension perk of 12 percent of salary.

The township's 20-month pension vesting period also was questioned.

Trustee James Nowka chaired a committee charged with reviewing the perks plans. Nowka pushed hard for the board to adopt a program to scrap benefits for part-time elected officials.

"My intent is to remove some of these benefits for elected officials," he said. "(The plan) would remove financial contributions for life, health and pension benefits afforded regular township employees."

But Nowka's thoughts differed from those of the other two pension

Township adds disclosure rule

Amid the bluster of the Western Townships Utilities Authority controversy, amid local officials' denial of wrongdoing and their continued support of the sewer project, seeds of change are beginning to sprout.

Northville Township officials last week embraced a significant sprig of change when they unanimously endorsed a plan to place tighter scrutiny on consulting firms hired by the township.

Trustee Richard Allen floated a proposal that garnered nothing but praise from his fellow board members. The proposal was offered in response to continued scrutiny of some township consultants' roles in the WTUA sewer project, and reads as follows:

"Whenever consulting firms are employed, either directly or indirectly, by Northville Township, the principals of that firm shall be required to disclose financial interest 1 percent or greater in another firm they know to be doing business with Northville Township. This shall be done by the signing of a disclosure form stating who, if any, has a financial interest.

"Any disclosures on this form are not intended to prohibit that firm from providing services. It is to make Northville Township aware of any potential conflicts of interest."

Board members agreed that they have been haunted by questions of conflict of interest involving some of their consulting firms, including



legal representative Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk, and engineering consultant Ayres, Lewis, Norris & May.

Those two firms stand to make several million dollars from non-bid work on the WTUA sewer line. Some costs have come into question, especially bond fees paid to the law firm and ties between the law firm and related lobbying groups.

Board members agreed to pass Allen's proposal to a committee reviewing the township's ethics policy, a group that was formed to study holes in the policy before troubling questions about the sewer project broke.

"(Consultants would) have to state cross-relationships from the beginning," Allen said. "We got left hanging out there once, there's no reason to go down the dumper again."

Allen found ample support from the rest of the board.

"I think it's an excellent proposal," said Trustee James Nowka. "It needs to be an established policy."



NHS band plays sharp, looks sharp

Members of the Northville High School Symphonic Band brought home the gold in style.

For the third consecutive year the Northville High School Symphonic Band brought home top honors from the annual district band competition. But for the first year, band members went to the auspicious event dressed in black tie.

Band Director Michael Rumbell said the 80-member band took first

place in the annual Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association district competition and will go on to compete in the state meet May 2.

The competition, held in Ypsilanti, found band members decked out in new black tuxedos with tails, compliments of the high school's Music Boosters. That competition was the second time the band sported their new uniforms, which were paid for entirely by fundraising efforts of the boosters.

So they looked sharp and played

sharp, Rumbell said.

"The judges said they were excellent. They said it was the best playing they heard throughout the competition," Rumbell said.

A panel of four judges the band on its concert performance and its ability to sight-read music.

"We got the highest rating in the whole competition," he said.

Bands competing are required to play three numbers of their choice and then to play two pieces they've never seen before. Band members

are allowed to see the sheet music for seven minutes before they have to play it in the competition.

"They really came through and reached a new peak," Rumbell said.

The high school jazz and symphonic bands will perform with the Meads Mill Middle School band Tuesday, March 24 and again on Thursday, March 26 with the Cooke Middle School band. Both performances start at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium; tickets are \$2 at the door.



Residents there protested the plan, citing concerns over increased pedestrian and vehicular traffic and a desire to retain the residential feel of the neighborhood. The planning commission voted 5-2 in favor of the rezoning. Final approval rests with the council.



Invent Northville

Meads Mill students show imagination at work

Ross Baker is an avid basketball player. He'd play night and day if he could. And thanks to a little effort and a lot of ingenuity, Baker has invented a way he can play all night long.

Baker, a seventh-grader at Meads Mill, designed a basketball hoop with a night light above the backboard that allows him to slam dunk all night long. The invention, would, if on the market, retail for a mere \$75.99, Baker said.

It may not be the most practical invention, but it solves a problem. And that was the purpose of the interdisciplinary unit called "Invent America" taught at Meads Mill last month.

Seventh-grade science teacher Norm Hannewald said he — in conjunction with teachers from other disciplines — integrated their lesson plans to stimulate innovativeness and creativity.

"It was a team activity," Hannewald said. "It is a cross-curriculum unit. Kids have to see a relation

between math and science."

"Invent America" challenges kids to invent a product that solves a problem. Sounds simple enough, but the program requires students to take it three steps further. Once students have thought of an idea they manufacture it, market and advertise it, and put a patent on it.

The lesson plan, teachers said, integrates various subjects and encourages students to problem-solve and think creatively.

"This program gives students an opportunity to solve problems and relate science to other areas of study," he said. "The opportunity is there for creative minds to enter the real world."

The creative minds, the sixth- and seventh-graders who participated in the second annual program, came up with ideas that ranged from the sublime to the ridiculous: popcorn desecrators, soda can crashers, magnetic nail picker-uppers,

pillow alarms for sound sleepers, and velcro jeans.

For the most part, teachers said students enjoyed the project. For students in Shirley Klokenga's class, making inventions was fun.

"It was supposed to get your creative juices flowing," said Mike Bush, the inventor of an automatic fish feeder. While Bush admits his idea wasn't the most original, it was a fun assignment.

Jenny Madden, another of Klokenga's students, said the purpose of the program was to help solve a problem that is annoying to other people.

"They had fun with it," Hannewald said. A host of activities prefaced the finished product and taught students the importance of brainstorming, team playing, and problem-solving in the development process, Hannewald said. "They just came up with all different kinds of ideas."



CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE

ORDINANCE NO. 103

MOTOR VEHICLE SIZE, WEIGHT AND LOAD RESTRICTION ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO CONTROL THE SIZE AND WEIGHT OF MOTOR VEHICLES UPON ROADS, HIGHWAYS OR STREETS WITHIN THE JURISDICTION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE AND TO PROVIDE DEFINITIONS FOR CERTAIN WORDS; TO PROVIDE GENERAL PROHIBITIONS; TO PROVIDE FOR A MAXIMUM WIDTH OF VEHICLES; TO REGULATE THE TRANSPORTATION OF FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION OF THE LENGTH OF VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR REGULATIONS REGARDING THE TRANSPORTATION OF MOBILE HOMES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE GENERAL RESTRICTIONS OF WHEEL AND AXLE LOADS; TO PROVIDE FOR INFORMATION ON CERTAIN TRUCKS; TO PROVIDE FOR AUTHORIZATION TO STOP A VEHICLE; TO PROVIDE FOR FINES; TO PROVIDE FOR SPECIAL PERMITS FOR UNUSUAL VEHICLES; TO PROVIDE FOR THE DESIGNATION AND IDENTIFICATION OF WEIGHMASTER; TO PROVIDE FOR HIGHWAY RESTRICTIONS BY THE TOWNSHIP BOARD AND WAYNE COUNTY ROAD COMMISSION; TO PROVIDE FOR CITATIONS; AND FURTHER TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES, REPEAL, SEVERABILITY, SAVINGS CLAUSE AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

SECTION 1.0 SHORT TITLE AND CITATION

This Ordinance shall be known as the Motor Vehicle Size, Weight and Load Restriction Ordinance.

SECTION 2.0 DEFINITIONS

The following words and phrases, when used in this Ordinance shall, for the purposes of this Ordinance, have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section, and Act 300 of the Public Acts of 1949 as amended, being Section 257.1 through Section 257.82 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning.

2.1 Axle shall mean the common axis of rotation of one or more wheels whether power driven or freely rotating, and whether in one or more segments and regardless of the number of wheels carried thereon.

2.2 Civil Infraction shall mean an act or omission prohibited by law which is not a crime as defined in Section 5 of Act No. 328 of the Public Acts of 1931, as amended, being Section 750.5 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, and for which civil infractions may be driven.

2.3 Driver shall mean every person who drives or is in actual control of a vehicle.

2.4 Gross Weight shall mean the weight of the vehicle without load plus the weight of the load thereon.

2.5 Highway or street shall mean the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of public for purposes of vehicular travel.

2.6 Implement of husbandry shall mean every vehicle which is designed for agricultural purposes and used exclusively in agricultural operations.

2.7 Maximum axle load shall mean the gross weight over the axle which includes vehicle and load.

2.8 Person shall mean every natural person, firm, copartnership, association or corporation and their legal successors.

2.9 Peace Officer shall mean a person who is trained and certified pursuant to Act No. 203 of the Public Acts of 1965, being Sections 28 601 and 28 616 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

2.10 Roadway shall mean that portion of the highway improved, designed or ordinarily used for vehicular travel. In the event a highway includes two (2) or more separate roadways, the term "roadway", as used herein, shall refer to any such roadway separately, but not to all such roadways collectively.

2.11 Semi-trailer shall mean every vehicle with or without motive power, other than a pole-trailer, designed for carrying persons or property and for being drawn by a motor vehicle and so constructed that some part of its weight and that of its load rests upon or is carried by another vehicle.

2.12 Spacings between axles shall mean the distance from axle center to axle center.

2.13 Special mobile equipment shall mean every vehicle which is not designed or used primarily for the transportation of persons or property and which is incidentally operated or moved over the highways, including but not limited to, farm tractors, road construction or maintenance machinery, mobile office trailers, mobile tool shed trailers, mobile trailer units used for housing stationary construction equipment, ditch-digging apparatus, and well-servicing apparatus.

2.14 Tandem axle shall mean two (2) axles spaced more than 3 feet 6 inches and less than 9 feet apart.

2.15 Tandem axle assembly shall mean 2 axles spaced more than 3 feet 6 inches and less than 9 feet apart, one axle in front of the other and so attached to the vehicle wherein an attempt is made by connecting mechanism to distribute the weight equally between the two (2) axles.

2.16 Trailer shall mean every vehicle with or without motive power, other than a pole-trailer, designed for carrying persons or property and for being drawn by a motor vehicle and so constructed that no part of its weight rests upon the towing vehicle.

2.17 Truck shall mean every motor vehicle designed, used or maintained primarily for the transportation of property.

2.18 Truck tractor shall mean every motor vehicle designed and used primarily for drawing other vehicles, and not so constructed as to carry a load other than a part of the weight of the vehicle and load so drawn.

2.19 Vehicle shall mean every device in, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a highway, excepting devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

2.20 Weighmaster shall mean a peace officer designated by the Supervisor and approved by the Township Board to enforce the provisions of this

SECTION 3.0 GENERAL PROHIBITIONS

Unless specifically declared in this ordinance to be a civil infraction, it is a misdemeanor for a person to drive or move, or for the owner to cause or permit to be driven or moved, on a highway, a vehicle or vehicles of a size or weight or otherwise exceeding the limitations stated in this ordinance. The provisions of this ordinance governing size, weight and load shall not apply to fire apparatus, or to an implement of husbandry incidentally moved upon a highway, or to a vehicle operated under the terms of a special permit issued as herein provided.

SECTION 4.0 MAXIMUM WIDTH OF VEHICLES; EXCEPTIONS; OPERATION OF CERTAIN BUSES

4.1 The total outside width of a vehicle or the load on a vehicle shall not exceed 96 inches except as otherwise provided in this ordinance.

4.2 The total outside width of a farm tractor or farm implement or machinery shall not exceed 188 inches. An agricultural implement wider than 108 inches shall not be moved on the highway between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

4.3 The total outside width of the load of a vehicle hauling concrete pipe, agricultural products, or unprocessed logs, pulpwood, or wood bolts shall not exceed 108 inches.

4.4 Whenever pneumatic tires, in substitution for the same type or other type of tires, have been or are placed upon a vehicle in operation on a highway, the maximum width from the outside of one wheel and tire to the outside of the opposite wheel and tire shall not exceed 102 inches but the outside width of the body of the vehicle shall not exceed 96 inches.

4.5 The total outside width of a bus shall not exceed 102 inches.

4.6 A vehicle or farm tractor, farm implement or machinery shall not extend beyond the center line of any highway in the Township, except when authorized by law. If

the width of the farm equipment or machinery would make it impossible to stay away from the center line, a permit shall be obtained under Section 17.

4.7 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this section, the Township Engineer may designate a highway on which a person may operate a vehicle or vehicle combination, the operation of which would otherwise be prohibited under this section, upon the Engineer's determination that the highway is capable of being utilized for such purposes without injury to the public or the highway. The outside width of the vehicle or of each vehicle in the vehicle combination shall not exceed 102 inches including the load on the vehicle. However, the Engineer may require that the owner or lessee of the vehicle or of each vehicle in the vehicle combination secure a permit under Section 17. This subsection does not restrict the issuance of a special permit under Section 17 for the operation of a vehicle or vehicle combination.

4.8 A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. The owner of the vehicle and/or the driver may be charged with a violation of this section.

SECTION 5.0 RESERVED

SECTION 6.0 HEIGHT OF VEHICLES; POSTING OF CLEARANCE; LIABILITY FOR DAMAGES TO BRIDGE OR VIADUCT

Except as provided in Section 7, a vehicle unloaded or with load shall not exceed a height of 13 feet 6 inches. The owner of a vehicle which collides with a lawfully established bridge or viaduct shall be liable for all damages and injury resulting from a collision caused by the height of the vehicle, whether the clearance of the bridge or viaduct is posted or not. A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. The owner and/or the driver of the vehicle may be charged with a violation of this section.

SECTION 7.0 PROHIBITION AGAINST TRANSPORTATION OF FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS IN BULK; FLASH POINT; AND HEIGHT LIMITATIONS

A truck, truck tractor, semi-trailer, or trailer manufactured on or after July 27, 1978, shall not be used to transport flammable liquids, in bulk, having a flash point at or below 70 degrees Fahrenheit, if the truck, truck tractor, semi-trailer, or trailer exceeds eleven feet eight and one-half inches (11'8 1/2") in combination.

SECTION 8.0 LENGTH OF VEHICLES; HEIGHTS

8.1 A vehicle, except a truck tractor, trailer or semitrailer, including load, shall not exceed a total length of 40 feet. The total length of a semitrailer operating in a truck tractor and semitrailer combination shall not exceed 53 feet, including load. All semitrailers longer than 50 feet shall have a wheelbase of 40.5 feet plus or minus 0.5 feet, measured from the kingpin coupling to the center of the rear axle or to the center of the tandem axle assembly if equipped with 2 axles. A combination of truck tractor, semitrailer, and trailer, or truck and semitrailer or trailer, or a combination of truck tractor and 2 semitrailers, including load, shall not exceed a total overall length of 59 feet except as provided for on routes designated and approved by the state transportation department and by local authorities with respect to highways under their jurisdiction on which a person may operate a combination of a truck tractor, semitrailer, and trailer or truck tractor and 2 semitrailers with no limit on the overall combination length, if the length of each semitrailer or trailer including load does not exceed 28 1/2 feet. A truck tractor and semitrailer combination with a semitrailer length longer than 50 feet shall not be allowed to operate with more than 2 axles on the semitrailer. All truck tractor and semitrailer combinations with a semitrailer length longer than 50 feet shall travel exclusively on highways designated by the appropriate road authority. Township authorities shall have the option of prohibiting stops within their jurisdictions unless the stop occurs along appropriately designated routes, or is necessary for emergency purposes or to reach shippers, receivers, warehouses, and terminals along designated routes. A trailer or semitrailer in actual and lawful use in this state on December 1, 1982, may be operated in this state for the life of the vehicle in a combination with other vehicles in actual and lawful use in this state on December 1, 1982, if the combination was in legal length under the law of this state immediately preceding January 24, 1984. In calculating the length of a trailer or semitrailer under this subsection, the length shall be based on the cargo carrying portion of the vehicle only, including load. A truck tractor or other motor vehicle shall not haul more than 1 trailer and 1 semitrailer or more than 2 semitrailers in combination at any 1 time, except that a farm tractor may haul 2 wagons or trailers or garbage and refuse collection haulers, during daylight hours, haul up to 4 trailers for garbage and refuse collection purposes, not exceeding in any combination a total length of 55 feet at a speed of not to exceed 15 miles per hour. In determining the length of a vehicle or a vehicle combination under this subsection, the length shall not be considered to include safety and energy conservation devices including, but not limited to, impact absorbing bumpers, rear view mirrors, turn signals, lamps, marker lamps, splash and hand holds for entry and egress, flexible fender extensions, mud flaps or steps and spray suppressant devices; load induced tire bulge; refrigeration or heating units; or air compressors. A device shall be excluded from a determination of length only if it is not designed or used for the carrying of cargo.

8.2 If a combination of 2 semitrailers is pulled by a truck or truck tractor, a fifth wheel connecting assembly which conforms with motor carrier safety rules promulgated by the Michigan public services commission pursuant to the motor carrier safety act of 1963, Act No. 181 of the Public Acts of 1963, as amended, being Sections 480.11 to 480.21 of the Michigan Compiled Laws shall be used on each semitrailer.

8.3 A train of vehicles or a vehicle operated alone shall not carry a load extending more than 3 feet beyond the front of the train of vehicles or vehicle.

8.4 A motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer whose frame or body extends more than 60 inches beyond the rear of its rear axle and is more than 42 inches above the roadway shall not be operated on the highways of this state unless equipped with a fender or bumper on the extreme rear of the frame or body. The bumper shall extend downward from the rear of the frame or body to within 30 inches of the roadway and be of substantial construction.

8.5 A truck tractor and semitrailer combination with a semitrailer length longer than 50 feet whose frame or body extends more than 36 inches beyond the rear of its axle and is more than 42 inches above the roadway shall not be operated on the highways of this Township unless equipped with an underbody guard on the extreme rear of the frame or body. The underbody guard shall meet all of the following requirements:

(a) Provide a continuous horizontal beam having a maximum ground clearance of 22 inches, as measured with the vehicle empty, and on ground level.

(b) Extend to within 4 inches of the lateral extremities of the trailer on both left and right sides.

8.6 A truck and semitrailer combination with a semitrailer length longer than 50 feet shall not be operated on the highways of this Township at the times specified in MCLA 257.684 unless equipped with all of the following lamps and reflectors, in addition to any other lamps and reflectors required under this act:

(a) Two side marker lamps which display an amber light, 1 on each side of the semitrailer, located at 1/4 the distance from the front to the rear of the semitrailer.

(b) Two reflectors which reflect an amber light, 1 on each side of the semitrailer, located at 1/4 the distance from the front to the rear of the semitrailer as practicable.

(c) Two clearance lamps, 1 on each side of the semitrailer, located at 1/4 the distance from the front to the rear and as near to the top of the semitrailer as practicable.

8.7 A lamp required under subsequent (B) shall be lighted at the times specified in section MCLA 257.684 and shall be visible when lighted at a distance of 500 feet from the side of the semitrailer on which it is mounted. A reflector required under section (B) shall be visible at the times specified in section 684 from all distances from 50 to 500 feet from the semitrailer when directly in front of lawful upper beams of headlights.

8.8 A combination of vehicles shall not have more than 11 axles.

8.9 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this section, a number of motor vehicles, wholly or partially assembled, may be transported over the highways of this Township in combination, utilizing 1 tow bar or 3 saddle mounts with full mount mechanisms and utilizing the motive power of 1 or 3 vehicles in combination. The combination shall not exceed the maximum length of 65 feet for the transportation of assembled motor vehicles, and the vehicles in the combination shall be adequately and securely lashed together in compliance with regulations of the state and of any federal agency having jurisdiction over the transportation. If motor vehicles are towed by means of triple saddle mounts, the towed vehicles shall have brakes acting on all wheels which are in contact with the roadway. A combination exceeding 55 feet in length may be operated only on highways approved and designated for that operation by the state transportation department and by local authorities with respect to highways under their jurisdiction.

8.10 The total gross weight of a truck tractor, semitrailer, and trailer combination or a truck tractor and 2 semitrailers combination which exceeds 59 feet in length shall not exceed a ratio of 200 pounds per engine net horsepower delivered to clutch or its equivalent specified in the SAE handbook published by the Society of Automotive Engineers, Inc. (1977).

8.11 A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. The owner of the vehicle may be charged with a violation of this section.

SECTION 9.0 MOBILE HOMES; LENGTH, WIDTH, HEIGHT; PERMITS, OVER-LENGTH AND OVER-WIDTH; EXCLUSION FROM HIGHWAYS PERIODS; LIGHTS, SIGNS, ESCORTS, AXLES, TIRES; DEFINITION

9.1 Notwithstanding any other provisions of this ordinance a person shall not operate a towing vehicle, having attached mobile home having a body length in excess of 45 feet and having a combined length of over 60 feet, a realistic body width of over 100 inches at base rail, and a height of over 12 1/2 feet in the roadways of this Township. However, the jurisdictional authority may issue permits to mobile home transport companies, or to mobile home manufacturers or dealers, for the movement, in the ordinary course of their business, of mobile homes to home transport companies or to mobile home manufacturers or dealers, for the movement, in the ordinary course of their business, of mobile homes to a width of 14 1/2 feet plus normal appendances not exceed 6 inches; of mobile homes to a realistic body length of 80 feet and having a combined length of 95 feet, of combinations of prebuilt housing modules or mobile homes having a total length not to exceed 80 feet and having a combined length of 95 feet; or of prebuilt housing modules or mobile homes to a width of 14 1/2 feet plus an eave not to exceed 2 feet in width; over all highways, including interstate and defense highways. Special permits for the movement of prebuilt housing modules or mobile homes, whose width including an eave of 2 feet exceeds 14 feet and are transported on interstate highways, may be issued on a single trip basis only in accordance with section 17. A prebuilt housing module or mobile home whose width including an eave of 2 feet exceeds 14 feet, shall be moved only on the lane furthest to the right of the operator of the vehicle moving the module or mobile home shall be moved in a manner so that the eave portion of the module or mobile home shall overhang on the shoulder of the highway on which the module or mobile home is moved. The permit shall provide the days and the times of the day, but not on Saturdays, Sundays, holidays or the noon before until the noon after a holiday, during which the movement shall take place. The permit shall be issued only upon condition that the permittee comply with permit requirements and limitations of law, to insure the operation of a mobile home under permit in a manner which will not impede traffic on the highways and with safety in the movement of a mobile home, and only at a safe speed and when the pavement is not slippery. A 14 feet wide mobile home shall not be moved when the wind velocity exceeds 25 miles per hour. On units exceeding 80 feet in overall combination length, or 12 feet in overall width, the permit shall provide that the mobile home be equipped with 2 flashing amber lights on the rear of the mobile home and 1 flashing amber light on the top of the towing vehicle and the back of the mobile home. The signs shall be of durable material, in good condition, with black lettering on interstate yellow background. Each letter shall be of block lettering not less than 12 inches high at the front and not less than 16 inches high at the rear of the unit. A vehicle escort shall be required on those roads where the state police consider escort vehicles necessary for highway safety. The distances between mobile home axle centers shall be not less than 34 inches. The axles and tires shall meet standards established by the state transportation department. This section shall not grant or give authority to the state transportation department that did not exist on May 1, 1982, in accordance with section 1 of Public Law 85-767, 23 U.S.C. 127.

9.2 As used in this section, "mobile home" means a prebuilt housing module or a home which is designed to be transported by a motor vehicle upon a public highway and designed, equipped, and used for sleeping, eating and living quarters, or is intended to be so used.

9.3 A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. The owner of the vehicle may be charged with a violation of this section.

SECTION 13.0 WHEEL AND AXLE LOADS; GENERAL RESTRICTIONS

13.1 The maximum axle load shall not exceed the number of pounds designated in the following provisions which prescribe the distance between axles:

(a) When the axle spacing is 9 feet or more between axles, the maximum axle load shall not exceed 18,000 pounds for vehicles equipped with high pressure pneumatic or balloon tires.

(b) When the axle spacing is less than 9 feet between 2 axles but more than 3 1/2 feet, the maximum axle load shall not exceed 13,000 pounds for high pressure pneumatic or balloon tires.

(c) When axles are spaced less than 3 1/2 feet apart, the maximum axle load shall not exceed 9,000 pounds per axle.

(d) Subdivisions (a), (b), and (c) shall be known as the normal loading maximums.

13.2 When such normal loading is in effect, the Wayne County Office of Public Services may designate certain highways, or sections of those highways, where bridges and road surfaces are adequate for heavier loading, which designation may be revised as needed, on which the maximum tandem axle assembly loading shall not exceed 16,000 pounds for any axle of the assembly.

13.3 Except as provided in subsection 13.8 on a legal combination of vehicles, only one (1) tandem axle assembly shall be permitted on the designated highways at the gross permissible weight of 16,000 pounds per axle, and no other tandem axle assembly in the combination of vehicles shall exceed a gross weight of 13,000 pounds per axle. When the maximum gross weight of a combination of vehicles with load does not exceed 73,280 pounds, 2 tandem axle assemblies shall be permitted on the designated highways at a gross permissible weight of 16,000 pounds per axle.

13.4 The normal size of the tires shall be the rated size as published by manufacturers, and the maximum wheel load permissible for any wheel shall not exceed seven hundred (700) pounds per inch of width of tire.

13.5 During the months of March, April and May of each year, the maximum axle load allowable on concrete pavements, or pavements with a concrete base, shall be reduced by 25 percent from the maximum axle loads as specified in this Ordinance, and the maximum axle loads allowable on all other types of roads during these months shall be reduced by 35 percent from the maximum axle loads as specified. The maximum wheel load shall not exceed 525 pounds per inch of tire width on all concrete base or 450 pounds per inch of tire width on all other roads during the period the seasonal road restrictions are in effect.

13.6 The Wayne County Office of Public Services may suspend the restrictions imposed by this section when and where, in its discretion, conditions of the highways so warrant, and may impose the restricted loading requirements of this section on designated highways at any other time as the conditions of the highway may require.

13.7 For the purpose of enforcement of this ordinance, the gross vehicle weight of a single vehicle and load or a combination of vehicles and loads, shall be determined by weighing individual axles or groups of axles, and the total weight on all the axles shall be the gross vehicle weight. In addition, the gross axle weight shall be determined by weighing individual axles or by weighing a group of axles and dividing the gross weight of the group of axles by the number of axles in the group. Pursuant to subsection 13.8, the maximum individual axle putting the gross weight of the group of axles and dividing the gross weight by the number of axles in the group. However, when determining the gross vehicle or combination of vehicles weight in accordance with the provisions of subsection 13.8 axles spaced 9 feet or more apart shall not be considered in the same group.

13.8 The state transportation department or Wayne County Office of Public Services with respect to highways under its jurisdiction, may designate a highway, or section of a highway, for the operation of vehicles having a gross vehicle weight of not more than 80,000 pounds which do not exceed any of the following:

(a) 20,000 pounds on any one axle.

(b) A tandem axle weight of 17,000 pounds per axle including all enforcement tolerances.

(c) An overall gross weight on a group of 2 or more consecutive axles equaling:

$$W = 500 \times \frac{(N-1) + 12N + 36}{N}$$

where W = overall gross weight on a group of 2 or more consecutive axles to the nearest 500 pounds,

where L = distance in feet between the extreme of a group of 2 or more consecutive axles, and

where N = number of axles in the group under consideration; except that 2 consecutive sets of tandem axles are not less than 36 feet apart, and the gross vehicle weight does not exceed 80,000 pounds including all enforcement tolerances. Except for 5 axles truck tractor, semitrailer combinations having 2 consecutive sets of tandem axles, vehicles having a gross weight in excess of 80,000 pounds or in excess of the vehicle gross weight determined by application of the formula in this subsection shall be subject to the maximum axle loads of subsections 13.1, 13.2 and 13.3.

13.9 A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.

SECTION 14.0 INFORMATION PAINTED ON CERTAIN TRUCKS AND OTHER VEHICLES AS TO OWNER OR LESSEE

14.1 All motor trucks, tractors, trailers or semi-trailers, except as provided in subsection 14.2 of more than three thousand five hundred (3,500) pounds weight in operation upon public highways in the Township of Northville shall have painted upon them information relative to name and address of the registered owner of the vehicle, and lessee of vehicle if the vehicle is being operated under lease, in letters of not less than 3 inches in height. This information shall be conspicuously placed upon the vehicle.

14.2 This section shall not apply to trucks eligible for and equipped with farm commercial license plates.

14.3 A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction.

SECTION 15.0 WEIGHING OF VEHICLES, WEIGHMASTER AUTHORIZED TO ORDER VEHICLES STOPPED

15.1 The Weighmaster, having reason to believe that the weight of a vehicle and load is unlawful may require the driver to stop and submit to a weighing of the vehicle by means of either portable or stationary scales approved and sealed by the State Department of Agriculture as a legal weighing device and may require that the vehicle be driven to the nearest weighing station of the Department of State Highways and Transportation for the purpose of allowing an officer or agent of the Wayne County Office of Public Services to determine whether the conveyance is loaded in conformity with this Ordinance.

15.2 When the Weighmaster, upon weighing a vehicle and load, determines that the weight is unlawful, the officer or agent may require the driver to stop the vehicle in a suitable place and remain standing until that portion of the load is shifted or removed as necessary to reduce the gross axle load weight of the vehicle to the limit permitted under this Ordinance. All material so unloaded shall be cared for by the owner or operator.

15.3 A driver or owner of a vehicle who knowingly fails to stop at or who knowingly bypasses any scales or weighing station is guilty of a misdemeanor.

15.4 A driver who fails to obey the instruction of any official traffic control device prohibiting the use of streets by trucks or other commercial vehicles, or imposing limitations as to the weight of vehicles on designated streets, which is placed in accordance with the traffic ordinance of the Township of Northville or the Wayne County Office of Public Services, is responsible for a civil infraction.

15.5 The Weighmaster shall not stop a truck or vehicle in movement upon a road or highway within the Township for any purpose unless the Weighmaster is driving a duly marked vehicle, clearly showing and denoting the branch of government represented.

15.6 A driver or owner of a vehicle who knowingly fails to stop when requested or ordered to do so by the Weighmaster who is authorized to require the driver to stop and submit to a weighing of the vehicle and load by means of a portable scale is guilty of a misdemeanor.

15.7 A driver or owner of a vehicle who knowingly fails to produce a current driver's license and current vehicle registration when requested or ordered to do so by the Weighmaster is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 16.0 OVERWEIGHT FINES

16.1 An owner of a vehicle or a lessee of the vehicle of an owner-operator who causes or allows a vehicle to be loaded and driven or moved in a highway, when the weight of that vehicle violates the provisions of this ordinance is responsible for a civil infraction and shall be assessed a civil fine in an amount equal to 2 cents per pound for each pound of excess load over 1,000 pounds when the excess is 2,000 pounds or less; 4 cents per pound in excess of load when the excess is over 2,000 pounds but not over 3,000 pounds; 6 cents per pound for each pound of excess load when the excess is over 3,000 pounds but not over 4,000 pounds; 8 cents per pound for each pound of excess load when the excess is over 4,000 pounds. However the court shall have discretionary power as to the amount of the civil fine within the schedule provided by this section and may impose the civil fine provided in Section 21 for a civil infraction where at the time of the violation either the motor vehicle, motor vehicle and semitrailer, or trailer did not exceed the total weight which would be

SECTION 19.0 RESTRICTIONS AS TO USE OF CERTAIN COMMERCIAL VEHICLES ON POSTED HIGHWAYS BY LOCAL AUTHORITIES

19.1 The Township Board and the County of Wayne with respect to highways under their jurisdiction, except state trunk line highways, by ordinance or resolution, may do any of the following:

- (a) Prohibit the operation of trucks or other commercial vehicles on designated highways or streets.
- (b) Impose limitations as to the weight of trucks or other commercial vehicles on designated highways or streets.
- (c) Provide that only certain highways or streets may be used by trucks or other commercial vehicles.

19.2 Any prohibitions, limitations, or truck route designations established under subsection 19.1 shall be designated by appropriate signs placed on the highways or streets. The design and placement of the signs shall be consistent with the requirements of Act 300 P.A. 1949 as amended Section 608, being section 257.608 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

19.3 A person who violates a prohibition, limitation, or truck route designation established pursuant to subsection 19.1 is responsible for a civil infraction.

SECTION 20.0 CITATIONS

20.1 Weighmasters may issue citations for violations of this ordinance in accordance with the procedures set forth in sections 741 to 750 of the Michigan Vehicle Code, Act 300 of the Public Acts of 1949, as amended, MCL 257.741 to MCL 257.750.

SECTION 21.0 PENALTIES

21.1 A person found to have committed a civil infraction under this ordinance shall be ordered to pay a civil fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), costs and excess weight fines as identified in Section 16.

21.2 A person convicted of violating a provision of this ordinance not consisting of a civil infraction shall be punished by a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fines and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

SECTION 22.0 REPEAL

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 23.0 SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION 24.0 SAVINGS CLAUSE

The repeal provided for herein shall not abrogate or affect any offense committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending litigation or prosecution of any right established or occurring prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

SECTION 25.0 EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall take full force and effect upon publication. This ordinance was duly adopted/considered by the Township Board of Trustees of the Charter Township of Northville at its regular meeting called and held on the day of 1992, and was ordered given publication in the manner required by law.



Questions, concerns linger after decision

With its vote to deny a special land-use permit, Northville Township's planning commission last week cast the official first stone in what had been a long standoff with Holloway Sand and Gravel Co.

Guaranteed it won't be the last.

Nearly a year had passed since Holloway tendered its request for the permit — to develop a gravel mining operation — for a 177-acre parcel at the southwest corner of Ridge and Six Mile roads. The second half of the double whammy came later, when Holloway announced it wanted to slap an asphalt plant on the same property.

Township residents, especially those residing within earshot of the proposed businesses, recoiled in horror, and visualized huge, rumbling gravel trucks, pounding rock crushers, and black smoke belching from a foul-smelling asphalt plant.

(This clearly was not what owners of pricey Blue Heron Pointe homes — or anyone else in the area, for that matter — had in mind when they settled in the western part of the township.)

But Holloway had other ideas. The industrially zoned parcel they targeted is rich in sand and gravel material, and their proposed haul route coincides with similar haul routes for the nearby landfill.


As stated before, the site holds an industrial zoning label. But before Holloway could develop, it had to submit and gain approval of a request for a special land-use permit, no easy task, especially for a project that so riled township residents and some officials.

The review process for both Holloway plans dragged, quite frankly, with the township moving rather laboriously through various stages of contemplation. Holloway became annoyed with the township's perceived slothful approach, and rattled some cages last December when it filed a complaint in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The township was caught off-guard, and the planning commission hastily met and hammered out an asphalt plant ordinance, just days after suit was filed. Township attorneys and officials claimed that no damage was done, but residents should be concerned that township decision-makers attempted to close the barn door after the horse hit the highway.

A circuit court judge recently ordered the township to make a decision, any decision, on the two proposals, and on March 10, the planning commission unanimously agreed that four portions of the land-use permit request did not comply with township ordinance.

Commissioners cited expert commentary on noise levels, groundwater stability, post-mining development, and the potential for reduced property values as primary reasons for their thumbs-down vote. Although commission Chairperson Charles DeLand said the decision would be based solely on technical evaluations,

we think emotionalism — a serious negative when it comes to court battles — crept into some facets of the decision.

For instance, commissioners relied heavily on a hired-gun noise and dust expert who said the mining operation would violate township noise standards. The consultant tossed a few figures around, added some fancy concepts like attenuation, and convinced the commission that the noise problem was indisputable.

In reality, after factoring various phases and elements of the project, the estimated noise level weighed in at a scant one decibel over township standards. When Holloway was not allowed to modify such a slight problem, the township perhaps put itself in a precarious position.

We also question the claim that property values will fall 5-10 percent for homes within a quarter mile of the proposed development. The figures sounded somewhat shaky, though the township's appraiser cited a similar project in Milford Township as evidence.

The township seemed on firmer ground with its determination on groundwater stability and future site development. As showcased by the Shores of Northville disaster, the area's groundwater system is precarious, to say the least. Township experts last week were quite convincing in predicting that digging a deep, 55-acre lake could well upset that fragile water table, possibly causing flooding in some off-site spots and lowering water levels in other nearby lakes.

Future site development is another true concern. Trustee Richard Allen hit the nail on the head when he said the removal of millions of tons of sand and gravel would strip township residents of a resource — a large plot of undisturbed property in which to build some form of industrial complex and resulting tax base.

Holloway will appear before the township board to argue its case, claiming that its plans should be approved with conditions, but that's a mere formality. The board will back the planning commission, and the two parties will tangle in court. Holloway has some excellent arguments, but the planning commission had to make a decision.

Despite the upheaval and turmoil surrounding that group, we think the commission did a decent job with its final analysis. It may not be enough to keep Holloway off the doorstep, but considering the task, the effort was there.

With 4,347 registered voters, the city's declared Republican-to-Democrat ratio is 848 to 368, with 450 voters who declared no preference. The other 2,681 did not respond.

City Clerk Cathy Konrad said she expects a solid turnout for the primary. "We might be as high as 20 percent," she said. "I've had 280 (absentee) ballots go out, which is more than I expected."

But Konrad also predicted little waiting for those who elect to exercise their constitutional rights. "It'll be a quick vote for the electorate because there's only one selection," she said. "There won't be any lines."

Democrats will find a crowded field on their ballots, but the field has been narrowed with the withdrawal of Tom Harkin and Bob Kerrey in recent weeks. Edmund "Jerry" Brown Jr., Bill Clinton, Lyn-

don LaRouche and Paul Tsongas remain.

The GOP ballot lists Patrick Buchanan, George Bush and David Duke.

For those voters unimpressed with the declared candidates, each ballot contains categories for the uncommitted and those who would rather fill in the blank with the candidate of their choice.

Party rule changes adopted by the Democratic and Republican parties within the last few years will keep things interesting for both declared and undeclared voters.

Those who have already declared their preference for the Republican Party cannot vote Democratic, but declared Democrats can obtain a Republican ballot.

Undeclared voters who wish to cast a ballot in the Republican primary do not have to declare a party preference to vote, but those

who wish to vote Democratic must declare themselves Democrats.

Confused? Wait until you read the part about residency and eligibility to vote.

To vote in the primary you must have registered to vote on or before Feb. 18.

If you moved within the same city or township after registering and did not change the address on your voter registration by Feb. 18, you can still vote at your previous residence's precinct. You will be asked to complete a change of address form when you vote.

If you moved to a different city or township after Jan. 17, and did not register to vote in your new city or township by Feb. 18, you can still vote at your previous residence's precinct. You will be asked to complete a voter registration cancellation authorization form when you vote.

But if you moved to a different

city or township on or before Jan. 17, and did not register to vote in your new city or township by Feb. 18, you are not eligible to vote in the presidential primary.

Absentee voters have their own list of rules and responsibilities. You can obtain an absentee ballot if you are 60 or older, unable to go to the polls without assistance, will be out of town when polls are open election day, cannot attend the polls due to religious beliefs, have been appointed election inspector in another precinct, or are in jail awaiting arraignment or trial.

If you have already obtained a ballot, it must be received at your city or township clerk's office by 8 p.m. tomorrow, March 17.

Though the deadline to apply for an absentee ballot has passed, you can still vote in your city or township clerk's office in person before 4 p.m. today, March 16.

apparently had taken it upon itself to plunk him in the Republican camp.

"When I got my card and it said Republican, I wondered, 'What's up?'" Petrie said. "I'm studying government now, and I just wanted to vote."

Petrie will get that chance to vote, according to township officials. He was, however, one of perhaps 2,000 township registered voters to receive faulty voter registration cards.

A programming error randomly tossed those who had declared no party preference into the

Democratic and Republican parties, said Clerk Tom Cook. The total count of those affected by the error was not known by Thursday, Cook said.

"How many got registered as something else, we don't know," he said.

Cook said the clerk's office had run a test of the voter registration cards before sending them to voters, but the sample did not reveal the error. The township did not realize the mistake until early last Monday.

"(Republican Supervisor Betty Lennox) came in at two minutes after 8 and asked why she was registered as a Democrat," Cook said.

Cook's staff scrambled to fix the snafu, but voters were not amused, as evidenced by a flood of angry calls to township hall last week.

But some, like Petrie, apparently were not given the opportunity to question the error.

"I tried calling, was put on hold, and no one ever answered," he said. "I'll try to call again."

The call really will not be necessary, Cook said. Election workers sifted through every registered voter to make sure the proper party affiliations — or no affiliation — were up-to-date.

"Everybody is in the books right," Cook said. "When they come to the polls they will be registered as they had intended."

review committee members, Cook and Trustee Thomas Handyside.

"Mr. Cook and I recommended the pension alone be dropped, (with the) balance studied by Northville 2000," Handyside said.

Treasurer Jack Hosmer presented a study of 10 Wayne County townships and the corresponding wage and benefits paid elected officials. The study ranked Northville Township's package near the bottom of several wage and benefit-related issues.

Northville Township is only one of two 18-square mile townships in

Wayne County, however, and the township features a township manager system unique to this community.

Still, wages for supervisors, treasurers, and clerks are much higher in communities where those officers act as full-time employees. In communities where those officers are considered part-time, Northville Township's salaries and benefits are at or above average in most cases.

Handyside and Cook asked that Northville 2000 review statistics before further alterations to elected officials' benefits and salaries were approved.

Nowka and Trustee Donald Wil-

liams, back from a lengthy Florida sojourn, continued to lobby for immediate changes.

"We're elected officials; we're supposed to be here for public service," Nowka said.

"I didn't know people were getting these kinds of salaries and getting benefits," Williams added. "In my opinion, it's an honor to serve here; (elected officials) don't need to be double- and triple-dippers."

"I don't see the clerk making \$15,000," Williams added.

Handyside agreed that some costs were too high.

"If we don't control our wages, benefits, and costs . . . if we don't grab

and get this under control, we're in very serious trouble," he said.

Nowka made a motion to drop all elected officials' benefits and received backing from Williams and Trustee Richard Allen. But Lennox, Handyside, Hosmer and Cook voted against the plan and a resulting motion to hand the ball to the study group passed, following the same 4-3 voting lines.

Lennox was expected to select the citizens' committee over the weekend. A May 1 deadline was extended to allow potential political candidates to be aware of any salary and benefit changes prior to the May 12 political office filing deadline.





Chalk Hill vineyard makes a big comeback

In June 1989, we read a clip from the Santa Rosa Business Journal, a publication serving the greater Sonoma County California business community. It was an interview with Fred Furth, nationally known attorney, energetic businessman and owner of Chalk Hill Winery.

"Chalk Hill is in the midst of an expansion that will raise wine production levels from 40,000 cases to 60,000 cases," Furth said.

"Whoa," we remarked. If you remember the Chalk Hill wines from the mid-1980s, you know they were undistinguished at best.

Sometime in early 1990, Furth must have come to this conclusion also. A new era of Chalk Hill wines was ushered in when Furth hired David Ramey as winemaker.

Ramey brought 10 years' international wine-making experience with him. As the former winemaker at Matanzas Creek, he put that winery on the map with exceptional sauvignon blanc, chardonnay and merlot releases.

Ramey, who turns a good French phrase, has always been interested in what the French winemakers were saying and what they were actually doing. Between his tenure at Matanzas and accepting the Chalk Hill position, he worked for the Moueix family at several of their Bordeaux estates, including Chateau Petrus.

The first French influence we noticed at the winery was the considerable investment in French oak barrels Furth was encouraged to make.

It's less than two years since Furth hired Ramey at Chalk Hill. "Dr. Dave," as we affectionately call him, has worked miracles on the Chalk Hill wines. The 1990 releases have the Ramey touch from vine to bottle.

The 1989 Chalk Hill Cabernet Sauvignon and 1986 Late Harvest Semillon that were still unbottled at the winery when Ramey arrived, have been "doctored" (very legitimately) and the Ramey prescription blend was crafted.

Fred Furth will see his dream of case production expansion come true, but not as quickly as he predicted in his 1989 statement to the press. Ramey bulked out much of the wine he inherited, talked Furth into scaling down, holding the line on prices and launching a major vineyard replanting.

The Chalk Hill estate has 1,100 acres of which 275 are planted. "Because Chalk Hill Winery has such large vineyard plantings, there's a multiplicity of soils, clonal selection and vine ages," Ramey said. In new and replantings, soil profiles will be better matched to varietals.

"When I came to Chalk Hill in 1990, the vineyards were about 85 percent white grapes. Over the next five years, red plantings, particularly merlot, will increase and some vigner (a Rhone white varietal) will be planted."

Ramey tasted us through a sampling of previously released Chalk Hill Sauvignon Blancs. They were grapefruit and grassy, totally lacking fruit elegance — nobody's favorite style.

The complete 360 is evident in the newly released 1990 Chalk Hill Sauvignon Blanc (\$10.75). To open the vine to light and eliminate the grassy elements, leaf pulling in the vineyards was practiced during the growing season.

Showin' cheesecake

Have something creamy and dreamy

For those gloomy days, when everything seems to be turning into dross, I have this note of encouragement to offer: We are living in the great age of cheesecake.

It's a minor consolation, to be sure, but it's the best I can come up with at the moment.

The decade of the '80s, notable for so many epochal events, also managed to bring cheesecake to new heights. The fashion for culinary Americana that set in during the mid-'80s brought cheesecake, always a popular standard, to high-profile dining.

It's always been the dessert of choice at places like delis, diners, steakhouses and seafood dives. But now it shows up in any setting, regardless of price range, and there's probably more cheesecake around these days than ever before.

If you're so minded, you could argue that tiramisu, a dessert that nowadays is hard to avoid at Italian restaurants, counts as a kind of cheesecake, seeing that a primary ingredient is mascarpone, the Italian version of cream cheese.

Among standard baked types, variations have blossomed forth in endless profusion. A popular Southern California restaurant chain called the Cheesecake Factory regularly stocks some 35 flavors.

Two recent books on the subject — *Cheesecake Extraordinaire* by Mary Crowner (Taylor) and *Mother Wonderful's Cheesecakes and Other Goodies* by Myra Chanin (Holt) — up the ante to more than 200 possibilities.

Despite this profusion of choices, I tend to feel about cheesecake much the same as with other dishes: The simplest and most direct version is the best. The real test, it seems to me, comes with the most fundamental incarnation that disdains elaborate flavoring, save for vanilla and the accent of citrus that goes so well with the slight tang of the cream cheese.

The origins of what we know as cheesecake are pretty clearly Eastern or Central European. The Austrians like their Topfentorten, and the Hungarians go for Turos Rascos, both made with pot cheese; similar fillings show up in strudels.

The Germans are fond of using Quark, a fresh cheese somewhat similar to ricotta but only distantly related to the subatomic particles of the same name. The lavish Russian cheesecake, Pashka, is traditional at Easter.

Still, there's nothing quite like our cheesecake, which seems to have been developed by Jewish delicatessens, particularly those in New York. This is an uncompromising rich and luscious creation, actually more of a cheese custard than a true cake.


Another ancestor of the American cheesecake, particularly in the lighter variations, would be the Italian ricotta puddings and pastries.

Then there's the kind of "cheesecake" that reached its apogee with the pinups of World War II.

According to the most commonly accepted story, James Kane, a photographer for Hearst's New York Journal, first applied the term to leg art in 1912. He posed a model on the railing of a steamship, and when the shot revealed more of her than intended he remarked, "That's what I call real cheesecake." It must have been the right word, for it stuck.

The kitchen version of cheesecake is among the easiest of desserts to prepare, essentially a matter of beating the ingredients together and baking. No-cook versions have long since made their appearance, and so have those with less than the usual load of calories.

Preliminary note: Authorities agree that the quality of finished cake depends a lot



Tempting your tastebuds with a creamy slice of cheesecake requires a little seductive reasoning

on the quality of the cream cheese. Choose a good brand, such as Philadelphia; the fewer additives, the better.

In addition, cheesecakes baked in a pie pan are flatter than those baked in a springform pan, and therefore take less baking time. When a 7-inch springform pan is used, baking times are longer, but the cake is taller and servings look bigger.

The classic among cheesecakes must be the one served at the legendary New York restaurant *Lindy's*. The original restaurant has long since departed, but recipes for the cheesecake abound, including one at a successor house of the same name.

Of four published versions, three agree that this is the original. In any case, it is very much a cheesecake in the classic New York Style — impossibly rich, heavy as lead, and quite irresistible. We have adapted the crust to the food processor.

LINDY'S CHEESECAKE (Consensus Version)

Pastry:
1 cup flour
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon lemon zest (see note)
1 stick (8 tablespoons) butter, softened
Dash vanilla
1 egg yolk

Filling:
2 1/2 pounds (40 ounces) cream cheese, room temperature
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 tablespoons flour
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon zest (see note)
1 1/2 teaspoons grated orange zest (see note)
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
5 eggs
2 egg yolks

1/4 cup heavy cream
In a food processor, place flour, sugar and lemon zest. Pulse together. Add butter and pulse until mixture resembles a course meal. Add vanilla and egg yolk. Process until dough just clings together. (Add a very little cold water if necessary.) Working quickly, form into ball, wrap in plastic and refrigerate.

By hand, mix together flour, sugar and lemon zest. Cut in butter. Add vanilla and egg yolk, mixing until dough just clings together, adding a very little cold water as necessary. Form into ball, wrap in plastic and refrigerate.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter base and sides of a 9-inch springform pan. Remove sides. Roll out 1/2 of dough about 1/4 inch thick; place on base and trim to fit. Bake 15 minutes or until golden. Let cool.

lamb stew or corned beef and cabbage. Ireland is a country of limited resources and a peasant background. Economic factors dictated the use of inexpensive and simple food products.

Tomorrow is St. Patrick's Day.

In years past, it was a time to honor Ireland's patron saint. It is said that St. Patrick drove all of the snakes, which were of tremendous population, from the Emerald Isle. Today, the day is an excuse to drink a few stouts and eat

An Irish proverb says "the newest of food and the oldest of drink." Only the freshest of food has been used throughout the years. Potatoes and oatmeal are staple items in an Irish household. Rich butter and flower-sweet honey are traditional accompaniments. Suddenly, the simple food becomes simply splendid.

Soda bread, made with flour, buttermilk, soda and salt is still an Irish favorite. In the old days, it was cooked in a portable oven over a turf fire with turf pods placed on top to give it an all-around brown crust. The Irish have perfected bread. There is little comparable that I have experienced.

Onions, leeks, garlic, cabbage and carrots are some of the very few crops that are produced with grace in Ireland. Watercress and sorrel are used with the same frequency as iceberg lettuce in the United

States. What a delightful difference: greens with taste.

As always, there is seafood, some of the best in the world. Ireland is noted for its salmon. It commands a high price throughout the world.

Irish cooking differs in another respect, in that it is the same all over the country. In the United States, we have "regional" specialties. Southern, East Coast, Cajun, to name a few.

The only dish that changes from area to area is lamb stew. The base is lamb, onions and potatoes. From there, the stew changes from town to town, or even house to house, with the variations being limitless.

Potatoes were brought to Ireland around the 1600s. The Irish were the only people in Europe that ate the vegetable.

Other countries grew them as a curiosity. The mild climate of Ireland proved to be a perfect match for the tubers.

Irish cooking today is much different than yesteryear. As little as 10 years ago, peas, carrots, cabbage and potatoes were about as much a culinary experience as you could get. Now anything we get here is accessible in Ireland too.

Irish foodstuffs, particularly dairy products, meat and fish, are top quality. The bacon is meaty — not all fat. The oatmeal is incomparable, and the lamb has a special sweetish flavor.

Although the Irish are still big meat and potato eaters, the trend is gradually shifting. Breakfast is heavy. Eggs, sausage, bacon, bread, potatoes, juice, cereal. Who would want lunch after all that? But they eat it; not a big lunch, but a sandwich and

chips.

Dinner is a major meal. There is a growing trend to eat fish. The Irish, like us, are gravitating to one-pot cooking. Vegetarianism is on the rise, with the salad bar craze just now catching on.

What should you serve on this St. Patrick's Day? There are some great Irish cookbooks around to help you decide. *Cooking Irish Style* by Kinney, *Traditional Irish Recipes* by John Murphy, and *The Ballymoe Cookbook* by Myrtle Allen are a few worth seeking out. Now I must go check the pot of stew and throw a few more turfs of sod on the soda bread. "Erin Go Bragh."

Make the cake of your dreams

Heat oven to 550 degrees F. Make filling by beating cream cheese with an electric mixer until smooth. Add sugar, flour, lemon and orange zest and vanilla; beat well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each, until just incorporated. Add yolks in same way. Lightly beat in cream.

Fit sides of pan over base. Roll out remaining dough, cut in strips and line sides of pan almost to top. Pour in filling. Bake for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 200 degrees F; continue baking for one hour. Cool on rack.

To serve, carefully loosen and remove sides. If you are careful, you can slide cake from base of pan. Otherwise, leave it on base and serve from there. Yields 12 to 16 servings.

Note: Instead of grating rind you can use this method, provided that the blade of your food processor is sharp: Shave zest from fruit and combine with sugar called for. Process together until zest is finely ground into sugar. Then proceed with recipe.

Most no-bake cheesecakes are mousses, made with gelatin and beaten egg whites. Myra Chanin has another approach. She depends on the fact that acidic substances — she calls for Fruit Fresh, a commercial form of ascorbic acid or Vitamin C — thickens milk protein. This is the way it works, in a fanciful flavor:

MOTHER WONDERFUL'S NO-BAKE CARIBBEAN BANANA CHEESECAKE

2½ teaspoons unsalted butter
8 ounces white chocolate
1 teaspoon banana flavoring
¾ cup finely ground vanilla wafer

crumbs
¼ cup banana chips, chopped
¼ cup pecans, chopped medium fine
1 pound cream cheese
1 can (about 1½ cups) sweetened condensed milk
4 teaspoons Fruit Fresh
½ cup frozen pineapple-orange-banana (or pineapple-orange) juice concentrate, thawed but undiluted
2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
2 teaspoons dark rum
1½ very ripe bananas, peeled and mashed (about 6 ounces)
½ banana, sliced thin
½ cup sliced pecans
Orange slices, lime zest stripes for garnish

Melt butter and 5 ounces of white chocolate over simmering water a top double boiler or in microwave oven. When melted, remove from heat and whisk into a smooth mass. Beat in ½ tablespoon of banana flavoring.

Measure cookie crumbs into a food processor. Add ¼ cup banana chips and nuts. Process in bursts, until fine and dry, not mushy. Add crumb mixture all at once to butter mixture. Mash together with fork until well blended. Use to line bottom and sides of 10-inch springform pan, going no more than 1½ inches up sides. Press and smooth down with back of a soup spoon. Reserve 2 tablespoons of crust to sprinkle on cake.

Melt 3 ounces of white chocolate over simmering water or microwave oven. Reserve. In mixer, whip cream cheese on high speed for five minutes. Add condensed milk and beat on medium speed for two minutes, until creamy and well blended.

Dissolve Fruit Fresh in juices. Add to cream cheese along with remaining banana flavoring, rum, melted white chocolate and mashed banana.

Beat briefly until blended. (The same things may be done in a food processor, but don't overbeat mixture. Process only until blended.)

Fold in sliced banana and pecans. Pour into crust and spread batter evenly, until it is well pressed against crust. Garnish with orange slices of lime zest. Refrigerate until set, about four hours or overnight. Yields 12 servings.

Among reduced calorie cheesecakes is this version, made with low-fat cottage cheese. It comes from "A Year of Diet Desserts" by Joan Brigham (Rodale).

PINEAPPLE FROMAGE

Vegetable Spray
1½ cups low-fat cottage cheese
3 eggs
¼ cup honey
1½ teaspoons vanilla extract
1 teaspoon cinnamon
6 unsweetened canned pineapple rings, drained
6 unsweetened frozen cherries, thawed

Preheat oven to 325 F. Spray a non-stick 9-inch layer cake pan with vegetable spray.

In food processor, blend cottage cheese, eggs, honey, vanilla and cinnamon until smooth. Pour into prepared pan. Bake on middle shelf of oven for 45 minutes.

Put one slice of pineapple in center of cake; arrange other slices around rim, overlapping if necessary. Put a cherry in center of each pineapple slice. Bake another 10 minutes. Cool on rack in pan. Chill. Yields eight servings, 140 calories each.

The following is a favorite of the Northville Record/Novi News staff. It's a low-fat cheesecake made with drained yogurt instead of cream cheese. It's adapted from "Not Just

Cheesecake," (Triad, 1988).

CHOCOLATE MINT CHEESECAKE

32-ounce carton vanilla flavored low-fat yogurt, drained (see note).
5 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
¼ cup unsweetened cocoa
1 tablespoon creme de menthe
¼ to ½ teaspoon mint extract
2 eggs, lightly beaten (for substitutes, see page 16)
1 9-inch Keebler chocolate Ready-Crust

The day before you plan to make the cake, drain yogurt by placing it in a draining device.

(Note: to drain yogurt, spoon it into your draining device and allow the liquid to run out for anywhere from 8 to 24 hours. Discard the liquid and use the remaining cheese as you would cream cheese. Yogurt funnels are on the market, but if you can't find one, just spoon the yogurt into a cheesecloth and suspend it over the kitchen sink overnight.)

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Place yogurt cheese in a medium-size bowl. Add sugar, cornstarch, cocoa, creme de menthe and mint extract, stirring gently with a fork or wire whisk until well blended. Do not overbeat. Stir in eggs.

Four into prepared crust and smooth the top with a spatula. Bake until top turns lightly golden around the edges, but center is still jiggly (about 25-30 minutes).

Remove from oven and cool slightly on a wire rack. Refrigerate until chilled. Makes 8 servings.

The leg of lamb, called for in this Festive Leg of Lamb with Orange Marmalade Ginger Glaze requires only a few minutes of preparation to create a distinctively spicy taste using orange marmalade, ginger, vinegar and garlic.

To avoid a strong odor as the meat cooks, always roast leg of lamb in a moderate oven, no hotter than 325 degrees. For optimum eating, never overcook this succulent roast but re-

move from the oven while the meat is still pink.

FESTIVE LEG OF LAMB WITH ORANGE MARMALADE GINGER GLAZE (8 Servings)

2 cups orange marmalade
¼ cup minced candied ginger
¼ cup cider vinegar
1 fresh American leg of lamb (5-7 pounds)
2 garlic cloves, slivered
In medium bowl, blend marmalade, candied ginger and cider vinegar; set aside.

Using a roasting pan with rack, place lamb on rack, fat side up. Make slits in surface of lamb and insert garlic slivers.

Roast lamb in preheated 375-degree oven for 20 minutes, lower temperature to 325 degrees and roast to desired degree of doneness: 17-20 minutes per pound or 140 degrees for rare, 21-24 minutes per pound or 150 degrees for medium, 24-27 minutes per pound or 160 degrees for medium-well.

During last 30 minutes of roasting, brush on ½ cup glaze. When lamb is done, remove from oven, cover and let stand 10 minutes.

Slice and serve. Heat remaining marmalade ginger glaze and serve with lamb.

Know your way around spice rack

Cooking with spices makes meals "something special." There is hardly a food made that can't be made better by adding a dash of spice. Use spices in small quantities until you get to know their flavors.

One dish, well seasoned, can "make the meal." Don't use the same spice in several dishes at the same meal and don't serve heavily spiced foods in every course. The supermarket shelves are filled with dozens of spices and spice blends to tantalize your taste buds, but remember to start out with a "dash," you want to enhance the food, not disguise it.

Curry powder is a blend of coriander, turmeric, cloves, black pepper, red pepper, garlic, cumin, fenugreek, ginger and can contain many or more varieties of spices. Curry is considered exotic, an inspiration to Indian cooking.

For a mild flavor, use one teaspoon curry for each four servings. The chief use, of course, is making meat, fish and chicken curries. It is also good with rice, veal, shrimp, eggs, vegetables, seasoned sauces, soups and stews. Try a dash in mayonnaise, French dressing or in a can of mushroom or tomato soup.

Cardamom is one of the most aromatic and pungent on the spice shelf. It is the dried fruit of a plant in the ginger family and native to India. Cardamom pods are packed in jars or plastic bags or sold in bulk.

To use the whole cardamom pods, gently crush and remove seeds. The whole seed can be added to dishes or grind in a pepper mill or clean coffee grinder. Custards, rice puddings, cookies, breads and fruits get a "nippy" new flavor from cardamom. Try a dash in green pea soup, sweet potatoes or sprinkled on pork or beef roast. A real taste treat is dropping a carda-

mom seed into a cup of strong black coffee. Mace is a cousin of nutmeg; in fact, mace is the lacy covering around the nutmeg seed. The two do have similar aromas, but mace is more pungent and less sweet. Mace adds this pungent flavor to sweet breads, pound cake, cherry pie and puddings. Mace is probably at its best with chocolate, in cakes, puddings and other desserts.

Great cooks also add mace to oyster stew, creamed eggs or Welsh rarebit, fish sauces and meat stuffings. Adding a sprinkle of mace on whipping cream gives it more flavor.

Cumin is the secret ingredient in exotic oriental flavorings. However, it is probably most familiar in chili con carne and hot tamales. Cumin has a distinctive aroma and flavor, spicy and sharp with a slightly bitter taste so start with a dash. It can also be used in seasoning soups and stews, flavoring bread or rice and a peppery addition to meat loaf.

Coriander seed was one of the first spices used by man but is actually the dried ripe fruit of an herb in the parsley family. To many it tastes like a combination of lemon-peel and sage, and has a mild, fragrant odor. It is used commercially in many meat products especially hot dogs.

In the ground form it is added to curry blends, rolls, pastries, cookies and cakes or sprinkled in applesauce or gingerbread.

Fennel is an aromatic seed that has a pleasant odor and sweet taste somewhat like anise. The flavor of fennel blends well in baking for rolls, breads and pastries; and seasons fruits, soup, fish dishes and sauces. Sprinkle on pizza topping, apple pie filling or on pork before roast-

ing. Actually, fennel is an ancient herb that was thought to be sacred and could counteract causes of some diseases.

Paprika is bright red in color yet mild in flavor and garnishes pale foods such as potatoes, cream sauces for vegetables and lemon butter sauces for fish. It is widely used in sausages, salad dressings and condiments. In Hungarian cooking of course paprika is used very liberally.

White pepper is more aromatic but less biting than black pepper. It is used basically the same as black pepper but preferred where black specks might mar the appearance of soups, sauces and fish.

Cayenne pepper is made from capsicum hot peppers and the most pungent of all spices with a fiery bite. Experiment cautiously with very little as it adds a real tang to most dishes. Red pepper is another spice to "proceed with caution" when using for spicing up dishes, as it is hot and biting.

All these spices maintain flavor and intensity if kept in a cool, dry, dark place. Keep spices away from heat so do not store over the stove. Spices will stay fresh in tightly resealed packages for several months, but they don't improve with long aging.

If you're not sure if the spice is fresh, rub a bit of the spice between your palms and breathe the aroma. No aroma, then it's time to replace your spice.

Spice up your foods, but remember a pinch goes a long way!

Vegetable cooking spray
1 medium onion, chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 can (16 ounces) black beans or pinto beans, rinsed and drained
1 can (14 1/4 ounces) no salt added stewed tomatoes, undrained
1 can (8 ounces) whole tomatoes, undrained, chopped
1/4 teaspoon chili powder
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon red pepper flakes
1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
1/2 teaspoon dried oregano, crushed
2 1/2 cups instant rice

The wine was 60 percent barrel fermented (1/3 in that new oak we saw). During the barrel aging period, the wine remained on stored lees for four months (very French) with a minor portion going through malolactic

fermentation (to reduce harsh acidity and round out the palate impression).

We've known Dave Ramey for nearly 10 years. He has always had three major perspectives in winemaking: pleasing himself, making a flavor statement and being severely

critical of the result.

The 1989 Chalk Hill Cabernet Sauvignon (\$14.75) has big, blackberry, currant and spicy aromas with matching flavor dynamics. If you like red Bordeaux and you'd like to experience something similar in a California cab, this wine's for you.

While we like the 1989 Cabernet Sauvignon, the yet-to-be released 1990 which is a Ramey-all-the-way

rendition was handsome from the barrel. Who said wines are made in the vineyard? Whoever it was, never met Chalk Hill's winemaker Dave Ramey.

"Broadway Bound" a real gift to viewers

Skillful cast hits perfect note

Neil Simon turned a corner in 1983, as a playwright and, one suspects, as a man. That was the year his nostalgic, emotionally centered "Brighton Beach Memoirs" debuted on Broadway. His well-known skill for rapid-fire one-liners was still in evidence but balanced with a serious, wistful story line. Eugene Jerome, a 14-year-old in love with radio, writing and the Yankees, reflected the young Simon, and the play offered a window to the writer's youth.

Next came "Biloxi Blues," as the 18-year-old Eugene found himself in the blazing Mississippi heat, learning a little about the Army and a lot about love. Like the earlier play, "Biloxi Blues" was made into a movie and reached a wide, appreciative audience, if slightly diluted from Simon's original dark, often melancholy drama.

Now, the third installment of Eugene's saga is set on film, this time for the home screen, and it's the best of the lot. Billed as an "ABC

Theater" presentation, "Neil Simon's Broadway Bound" debuts on Monday, March 23. Simon himself has adapted his play for the intimacy of television, and it's a perfect match of medium and material.

"Broadway Bound" takes place in 1948, once more in the Jeromes' worn Bronx household. Eugene and his older brother Stan, each in their 20s, are struggling to make a name for themselves as comedy writers. Thus far, their success has been limited to a few monologues sold to a man who plays weddings and bar mitzvahs. Then Stan hears of an opportunity... to show their work to someone at CBS. There's only one problem: The brothers have just one night to write the sketch.

Stan and Eugene are not alone in the house. Their irascible, socialist grandfather Ben is likely to be found asleep somewhere or covering his failing health with off-putting bluster. The boys' devoted, sharp-tongued mother is always ready to offer something to eat, but less generous with disclosing the sadness of her loveless marriage. Jack Jerome is almost a stranger in the house, distanced from his wife and sons by his own disillusionment.

As the boys wrack their brains for comedic inspiration, they realize not only the depth of their ambitions, but what the inevitable source of their humor will be. Out of their own lives, their own troubled, contradictory family, the jokes will almost write themselves. The brothers have inherited their mother's gift of humor, of displacing her own pain and unrest with a fresh and funny viewpoint. Laughter is not flight from reality, but the best way to wrestle with it.

Matthew Broderick created the role of Eugene Jerome on Broadway, with understudy Jonathan Silverman stepping in for the screen portrayal in "Brighton Beach." Broderick then reclaimed the role for the big-screen adaptation of "Biloxi Blues." Now, Corey Parker plays the thinly disguised Simon alter ego and he's

every bit as good as his predecessors. Silverman now takes the role of Stan, in a performance that's alternately charming, angry and hilarious.

Anne Bancroft is luminous as Kate Jerome, the mother whose humor and toughness inspires her sons more than they know. Hume Cronyn is hilarious and touching as Ben, and Jerry Orbach makes a tragic hero of the boys' largely unsympathetic dad. Michele Lee delivers a brief but excellent performance as Blanche, Kate's sister, whose marriage to a rich man is a source of ceaseless irritation to her leftist father.

"Neil Simon's Broadway Bound" is television at its best, in every aspect. The direction, by four-time Emmy winner Paul Bogart, is taut and sure, and the costumes and art direction hit the period mark perfectly.






