

## Several eye board seats in township

Stubborn winter temperatures continue to chill the state, but Northville Township's political climate already is generating some heat.

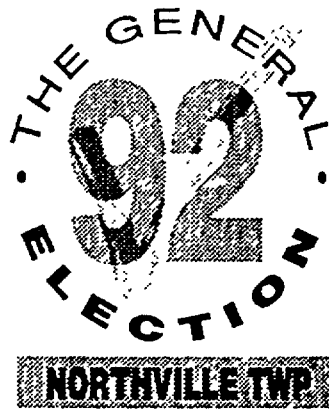
Incumbent township officials can expect serious challenges for their posts in the 1992 primary and general elections, based on a survey of possible township board candidates.

Three current township officials — Supervisor Betty Lennox, Clerk Tom Cook, and Trustee James Nowka — last week declared their intentions to run in 1992.

Trustees Richard Allen and Thomas Handyside and Treasurer Jack Hosmer said they were undecided about the 1992 elections, while Trustee Donald Williams failed to respond to requests about another run for the township board.

Incumbents most likely will face challenges, unlike past years, when officials largely ran unopposed. At least eight township residents are considering tossing hats in the ring for 1992.

Candidates for board seats must obtain signatures and submit petitions to the township clerk's office by May 12 in order to be eligible for the Aug. 4 Republican and Democratic primaries.



For now, some potential candidates are hedging their bets. Others make no bones about their intentions.

To a person, the possible candidates point to dissatisfaction with township government as their motivation for a run at public office.

"I'm not happy with the things township board members are doing," said Sue Hillebrand, who will challenge Cook for the clerk's position. "I'm not happy with the dishonesty of the township board."

Hillebrand, who has served on the Northville Commons homeowners association board, said she is at-

## Firms to show off wares

A host of local eateries, some familiar, some new, will offer samples of their finest fare at the second annual Business Expo this Wednesday at Northville High School.

The list of eateries participating in the expo has grown nearly twofold over last year's premiere event, said Laurie Marrs, executive director of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce, the sponsor of the event.

Good Time Party Store, Juan Carlo's, The Rose Cottage Tea Room and Sundowner Restaurant are on the list of restaurants debuting at the expo along with a host of old favorites like Genitti's, Crawford's and Crawford's Bakery Connection, Little Italy, Papa Romano's, Edward's Caterer, Heavenly Bakery and Subway.

"The purpose of the expo is to allow people to realize and understand the multitude of businesses that are in Northville," Marrs said. "There are a lot of people who don't know about many of the businesses here in the community."

This year, in addition to area businesses, the expo will feature a number of non-profit organizations that offer auxiliary services to the community.

Some 18 non-profit organizations have reserved booths at the expo in an effort to gain exposure and recognition in the community. Civic groups like the Northville Parks and Recreation Department, Northville Action Council, Toastmasters, ACORD (A Community Organization Recognizing Diversity), American Association of University Women, and the League of Women Voters, are among a list of non-profit booths scheduled to appear at the expo.

"There really is quite a diversity of business being represented," Marrs said. "We have attorneys, photographers, child-care businesses and florists."

Marrs said since businesses will be offering free demonstrations, samples, and giving away promotional packages.

"There is nothing for sale. It's really nice you don't have to come with your pockets full. Everything is free," she said.

After the expo's debut last year,

Marrs said the Chamber of Commerce realized there was a need for additional space and decided to move the event to the high school to accommodate the demand for additional space.

In planning for the event the chamber sent out notices to the 450 businesses in the community advertising the expo. More than 50 businesses responded and reserved booths that filled the limited space the chamber had planned for the annual event. A waiting list with additional businesses still interested in wanting to reserve space is still pending on Marrs' desk.

"We had limited space," Marrs said, "but that was quickly filled. We had so many requests we had to start putting booths up in the hallways."

The response for booths has prompted Marrs to start making plans for the third such event even before the second one takes place.

"We already have a waiting list for next year's expo," she said. She expects attendance records to mirror 1991's total and may even surpass the 600 people who went to the first expo.

"Over 600 people attended the first one. We expect that many or more at this one," she said.

There are many incentives for people to attend the expo, excluding the \$5 admission price. A bunch of giveaways, promotional packages, and free samples are just a taste of what's in it for patrons.

Raffle drawings for valuable prizes — including color televisions and jewelry — will be called all evening long.

The Networking Northville Business Expo is Wednesday, March 25, at Northville High School from 5 to 8 p.m. Admission is \$5 per person, \$4 for seniors. For more information call 349-7640.

## New restaurant, other spaces fill at MainCentre

MainCentre will soon gain an eatery and medical center, and all but three of the 15 retail spaces are spoken for, said the building's commercial leasing director.

Leasing Director Judy VanNewkirk said Tom Goulas of the Honey Tree restaurant chain plans a July 1 opening for his MainCentre Grille, while Providence Hospital is shooting for a July start-up date for its 4,500-square-foot medical center at

134 and 138 MainCentre.

Goulas, whose current food chain includes Greek restaurants in Novi and Farmington Hills, plans a slight change of taste for his new venture at the corner of Center and Cady streets. The MainCentre Grille at 146 MainCentre will boast a full-service mid-market restaurant and a separate saloon.

Providence Hospital's latest medical center in Northville, a 4,500-square-foot facility providing

## One store closes

Floods could not drive Glenn Drennan from her MainCentre store, but a famine of customers did.

Drennan, the feisty owner of Illusions Replica Jewels at 122 MainCentre, packed her faux gems and glass cases and closed shop Saturday, citing a lack of sales as her primary reason for leaving.

"Paying \$700 a week for \$300 a week in sales just didn't get it," she said.

Drennan said she began to consider closing when she sold only \$31.20 in jewelry Friday, March 13. By Saturday she had made up her mind.

"The end of the day, I just started packing up and said, 'Enough of this,'" she said.

Drennan's store, tucked under the MainCentre overhang on Center Street, seemed unable to catch the eye of Northville shoppers. She said many of her customers were people

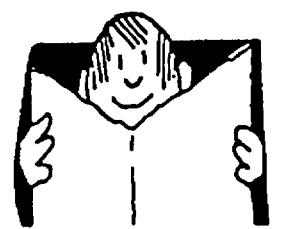

# Administrators get pay hike

The city council on Monday approved a 2.5-percent pay raise for eight non-union and supervisory personnel.

The raise was included in the council's consent agenda, a list of items considered routine that is passed with a single vote unless a council member or citizen requests that an item be placed on the main agenda.

The raise follows a 5-percent hike for city union personnel which took effect Jan. 1. It also follows an agreement by the city's clerical union members to cut their workloads and resulting salaries by 10 percent to save a position targeted to be cut under an employee reorganization.

In his report on the recommendation, City Manager Gary Word noted the unions' 5-percent salary

hike and "salary adjustments . . . made for other administrative personnel as a result of the reorganization process," but did not note the clerical union's agreement.

The city's personnel committee, made up of council members Jerry Mittman and Carolann Ayers, reviewed existing salaries March 3 and weighed any salary adjustments against the city's current financial condition, before making the 2.5-percent recommendation. Word wrote.

Mittman said the salary increases were based on hourly wages rather than the employees' overall paychecks, and noted that the clerical union's agreement to reduce its work hours was voluntary.

"Going 2½ (percent) was very responsible, we felt, based on the situation, but also based on the importance of people," he said.

Those slated to receive the 2.5-percent raises are City Clerk Cathy Konrad, departing Deputy City Clerk Tommi Burns, Police Chief Rod Cannon, Police Captain Jim Petres, Building Inspector Joe Attard, DPW Director Ted Mapes, Assistant DPW Director Paul Vertrees and Administrative Secretary Beverly Dennis.

The new salaries range from \$26,394 for the administrative secretary to \$53,215 for the DPW director.

The raises, which are retroactive to Jan. 1, will cost the city \$4,348 for the remainder of the fiscal year ending June 30. That figure includes the cost of fringe benefits.

City salaries are typically adjusted at the end of each fiscal year, but the city's union personnel had previously agreed to defer their 1991 / 1992 raises for six months to Jan. 1.

## Local primary vote totals released

Township officials said programming errors originally caused vote totals to be attributed to the wrong candidates.

The following are unofficial township totals based on the Board of Canvassers review:

Republicans: Bush, 1,436 votes; Buchanan, 494 votes; Duke, 41 votes.

Democrats: Clinton, 373 votes; Tsongas, 348 votes; Brown, 304 votes.

## Superintendent speaks to Congress

Northville school Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski told members of Congress at a hearing in Washington, D.C., last Wednesday that he could not support the idea of imposing national standards and assessments in education.

Rezmierski spoke before a committee charged with studying the creation of national standards and implementing a system of assessments.

He said he opposed implementation of national standards and testing because if such a policy were mandated for local districts, then assessment of students would have to be fair and test each child to his or her potential—whether gifted, challenged, or exceptional. In an effort to ensure testing standards are fair, Rezmierski urged the committee to examine the outcomes.

"There is much diversity among learning needs,

styles, and capabilities of students in our schools. As a result, we believe that the standards must be flexible in order to be realistic, in order for the student to be appropriately challenged, and in order to ensure that improved learning is recognized," he said in a written testimony he submitted to subcommittee members on elementary, secondary, and vocational education.

While Rezmierski was quick to urge tailoring testing procedures to meet the needs of all students, he said he was by no means supporting the idea of preferential treatment. Standards, if imposed, "need to be rigorous enough for gifted students, challenging enough for the majority of our students, and flexible enough for students with disabilities."

Hearings on the issue followed a recent report from the National Council on Education Standards and Testing, a committee charged with ex-

amining the feasibility of such national standards in education.

"I testified that I could not support the enacting of national standards and testing for three reasons," Rezmierski said Friday.

He said any such should be on a voluntary basis; second, he questioned whether funding for such mandates was readily available; and third, he thought the program layered another level of governmental mandates in which local districts have no real understanding of the value of the program.

All in all, Rezmierski said the experience was a valuable one for him both personally and professionally and a valuable one for Northville Public Schools.

"We had our moment in the sun and got a chance to plug Northville Public Schools at the same time."





## Livonia high school students report lot incident

An apparent confrontation between rival school students last week led to damages to a Livonia youth's vehicle, according to township police.

The Livonia youths said one of their alleged attackers was wearing a Novi Wildcat varsity jacket and the others were wearing brown leather jackets.

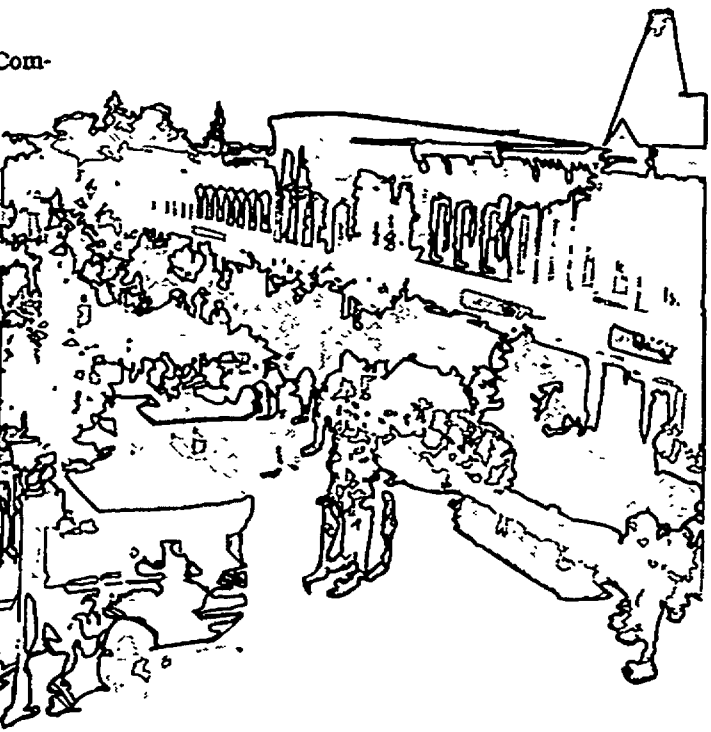

on-site X-ray facilities, will join Providence's existing medical centers in Novi, South Lyon, Milford, Livonia, Berkley and Southfield, and a new 150,000-square-foot, 24-hour center opening in Novi this summer.

on their way to or from Balardi's Hair Salon, the MainCentre beauty salon next door, to her shop.

"They'd come in and browse on their way to the beauty salon or while their nails were drying," Drennan said. "It was good just having people in the store, but there weren't enough sales."

"I have met hundreds of real nice people, who came into the store, praised the store and bought some jewelry. But of course they can't buy over and over again every week . . .

There's just not enough of those people to go around."

Drennan, who was the first shopkeeper to open her doors in MainCentre last April, also cited the lack of a directional sign on Main Street to publicize the shops on Center as a factor in her store's demise.

Officials from Singh, the developers of MainCentre, still plan to erect a directional sign for the Center Street shops, but only after more stores open so that the store owners can split the cost of their plaques on the sign.

"We were going to wait until Providence (Medical Center) and the re-

staurant and perhaps one other store opens before putting up the sign," said Singh, vice president, Michael Kahn, who is going to put it in. "Illusions opened last April 28 and was plagued with problems from the beginning, including broken water pipes, a break-in, and a major flood last Mother's Day weekend."

Leasing Director Judy VanNewKirk said Singh is unconcerned about Drennan's now-unfilled retail space, one of three unfilled spaces. "We have about four parties looking at that location, so we're not worried about it," she said. "In fact, it might work out for the best."

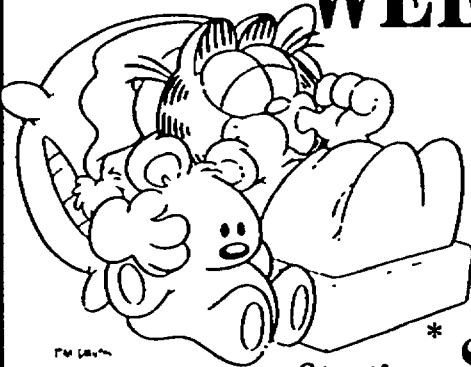

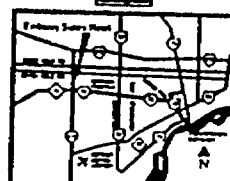

# Mental health officials speak on social work

They spoke from different political perspectives, but the state, county and city leaders who held forth at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital in a recent forum had one thing in common.

They all are social workers, and have the master's degrees in social work to prove it.

The cast of characters who spoke on behalf of social workers and their role in the Department of Mental Health's future, all with MSWs after their name, included DMH Director James Haveman, Detroit City Council President Maryann Mahaffey, and Jerrold Adams, deputy director of the Wayne County Community Mental Health Board.

All agreed that social workers will continue to play a vital role in the future of mental health care. Where they differed was on what the future will hold for the provision of mental health care itself, particularly the state's involvement in providing that care.

DMH Director Haveman, who is overseeing a controversial shift from residential to community-based mental health programs, insisted that forthcoming changes in the way all mental health programs operate will make them more efficient.

"Many of our hospitals are expense-based, and not revenue-based," he argued. "We are working in an atmosphere where it's financially very strapped (and) I've got to figure out how to use the limited resources we have."

Maximizing those resources will require "some new ways of management," Haveman said.

Though Northville and other psychiatric hospitals will continue to provide mental health services, Haveman said, their methods of operation may change.

"We want to build a system out there that has a continuum of mental health services for people," he said. "We have not said that we're going to stop managing state hospitals . . . I believe state hospitals are going to be part of that continuum, whether (with) private beds or public beds."

The changes will include closer ties between state hospitals and community mental health boards, and the mental health and corrections departments themselves, he said.

"We're not dismantling our public health system," Haveman insisted. "We are not getting out of the business of providing beds for people who need it . . . Look for a system that's going to change, and I believe it's going to change for the better."

Despite Haveman's high hopes for

the future of mental health, Detroit City Council President Mahaffey argued that no matter how efficient the current system becomes, more funds may be needed to meet greater needs.

Michigan's homeless population has been particularly hurt by recent

state budget cuts in welfare payments, and those cuts have impacted other costs, she said. "The shelters are holding people longer than they used to because the emergency needs program is not there like it used to be."

Mahaffey also cautioned against

the theory that government can totally turn over the mental health system to private providers.

"We have in our profession throughout the years, gone back and forth on the issue of privatization," she noted. But no matter how privatized the system becomes, she said

there will be a need for public support.

"There are people who cannot take care of themselves," she said.

While privatization can sound seductive in the short run, Mahaffey said that the long-term results may be worse.

tempting to put together a slate of candidates to challenge the board, a body she said has failed to respond to questions and concerns of the community.

"They seem to be so out of touch with the way the community is going (and) they're blatantly arrogant about it," she said.

Hillebrand's comments were echoed by several other potential candidates, including planning commissioner and Zoning Board of Appeals Chairperson Karen Baja.

"I'm thinking of running for supervisor," Baja said. "I think I could do a good job and I'd like to show that there can be honest people (in government)."

"Not everyone needs to be crooked, dishonest, or however you want to phrase it," she said.

Baja was one of four applicants who last fall sought to replace Georgina Goss as township supervisor. The township board sparked a controversy by short-circuiting its planned selection process and naming Lennox supervisor.

Two others who interviewed for the supervisor's post are interested in a 1992 campaign.

Maureen Oslecki, township planning department administrative assistant, said she is contemplating another run at a township post.

"I have not completely decided whether or not to pull a petition," she said. "Personal commitments, including career choices, are a big portion of this decision."

Osllecki said she believes "residents want change" and though she would not specify what office she may run for, she said, "There's only one position I was looking at."

Tom Watkins, former director of the state Department of Mental Health, also interviewed for the supervisor's slot. He said he would consider joining other candidates to challenge the current board.

"I'm going to be involved; there's no doubt at all," he said. "It's worse now than when I put my name in the hat for township supervisor."

"The important thing to me . . . is to put together a slate that you could work with," he added. "You need a clean sweep of people out of there. If nobody was going to run for supervisor, I would be compelled to do it."

Watkins said he will meet this week with other possible candidates to mull a run for the township board.

Others have expressed interest in a township board post, including former Northville Board of Education President James Petrie.

"I'm considering it, but I haven't made up my mind," Petrie said. "Some people are urging me to run."

Petrie said he would target a trustee position and said there "seems to be a need for new leadership and new ideas," and that "maybe we should try to be proactive instead of reactive" on issues such as ethics and potential conflicts of interest.

Rick Engelland lost a close battle with Lennox for the township treasurer's post in a 1990 special election. Engelland said he is still trying to decide what his next step will be.

"I've considered running for something, but I'm not sure what position at this time," Engelland said. "I take

issue with a lot of things that have been done in township hall, in township politics the last four years."

"I think it's humorous they have an ethics committee," he added. "They should look at ethics, but should have some ethical people on the board."

Ousted planning commissioner Barbara O'Brien said she may attempt another shot at township government life.

"I haven't really all the way decided," she said. "I go back and forth."

O'Brien said she would run for trustee if she does make a move. Her reason? "I think we need to clean up the mess."

Gini Britton, Lakes of Northville homeowners' president, also is in the contemplation stage.

"I'm still considering it, but there's nothing definite yet," she said. "I think there needs to be a change. There's too much cronyism, even though the Board of Trustees say the charges are false."

"The ethics situation is appalling up there," Britton added. "It's time to get involved."

Britton said she would seek a trustee position if she decides to run in 1992.

The seven incumbent township board members offer mixed reactions to another campaign. Lennox said she has decided to run for the post she was appointed to last year.

"Well, I think I'm going to run," she said. "I think we're doing a good job in the township now; we have a new planning commission and we're doing some other projects, and I want to keep doing those things."

Cook also wants to keep his seat. He said he probably would pull his petitions "around Easter."

Nowka is expected to again run for trustee.

"I haven't decided not to (run)," he said. "I will have to decide later."

Some incumbents clearly are weary of the strife and controversy that has swirled around the board the past several months. Trustee Richard Allen is one who has not decided on another possible term.

"I'm still procrastinating," Allen said. "I could think of as many reasons (against as for), and I have to ask myself if I really want to put up with all the baloney I put up with the last couple months."

Trustee Thomas Handyside said he is undecided about his political future, but hinted that he may seek a different position on the board.

"I've got an awful lot of time commitments, both at BFI and in the community," he said. "I'm undecided, but if I did run, I would not be running for the trustee position."

Asked if he might target the supervisor's position, Handyside said, "I'm not willing to say right now."

Jack Hosmer was appointed township treasurer last fall after the board boosted Lennox to supervisor. Hosmer said he has not made up his mind on a 1992 campaign.

"Right now I'm in neutral," he said. "I am thinking about it seriously, but I haven't made up my mind. For me, it's a big decision."

Trustee Donald Williams did not respond to a reporter's telephone calls seeking information about his political status.

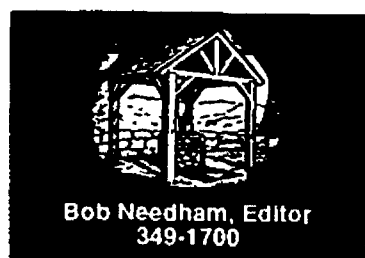

### Upcoming elections require participation

So you thought the presidential primary last week meant you'd get a breather from reading and thinking about elections for a while? At least until November? Sorry to bear the bad news, but think again.

Between now and the general election in November, voters in the Northville community will face three elections already scheduled, with the possibility of at least one more. And each one looms as vitally important for Northville.

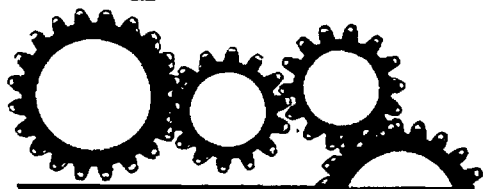
First up is a major millage election in the Northville School District. On April 28 — hardly a month off — voters in the school district will vote on a proposal for 25.41 mills, an increase of 2.78 mills over the current levy.

This translates to a lot of money, no matter your perspective. It's all of the school district's money for general operations. More important to individuals, it's the majority chunk of your taxes. Happenings in the township and city governments often attract more attention, but it's important to remember that the school district gets by far the largest share of your total property-tax bill. If your home is worth \$200,000, this 25-mill request is a matter of \$2,500 in taxes for the education of Northville's children. Important stuff.

Next up in the election derby is the school board election on June 8. Two seats are up for grabs, and the incumbents, Carol Rahimi and Donald Klokenga, both plan to run for re-election. Good for them. The school board, remember, is the body which oversees all those property taxes mentioned above. If anyone plans to challenge the incumbents, they've got until April 6 to file a nominating petition. It's a very simple process: Get a form at 501 W. Main, have 20 people sign it, and turn it in.

Assuming the schools don't come back for a revised millage request in the summer — which will happen if voters turn down the April question — the next election is the primary on Aug. 4.

As we've all seen in past township

elections, the primary — not November's general election — is the biggie to determine who will sit on the township board for the next four years. In addition, here's where any challenges to incumbent state legislators will begin, and you can bet there will be at least one. County commissioners Maurice Breen (Wayne) and Kay Schmid (Oakland) will also face expiring terms, and therefore possible August challenges from within their own party as well as Democratic opponents two months later. Judges at several different levels will also be on the August ballot.

All this before the general election in November, when we will vote for president and a host of other offices.

What's the point of this review? Simply our regularly repeated call for deep citizen involvement.

We know it gets tiring to try to keep on top of so many different public offices, so many different public bodies. But it's crucial. The decisions made in these next few elections will affect every person in Northville. Get informed on the issues and the candidates. Consider working on a campaign for or against the millage, or to support a candidate of your choice. If you don't like the way your representatives are spending your taxes, think about running for the school board or township board.

And above all, plan to vote. Vote in April; vote in June; vote in August; vote in November. It's nothing short of tragic that a voter turnout of 25 percent or so (as we had in the primary last week) appears good. We're very fortunate to live in this republic; let's exercise our right to help determine its course.

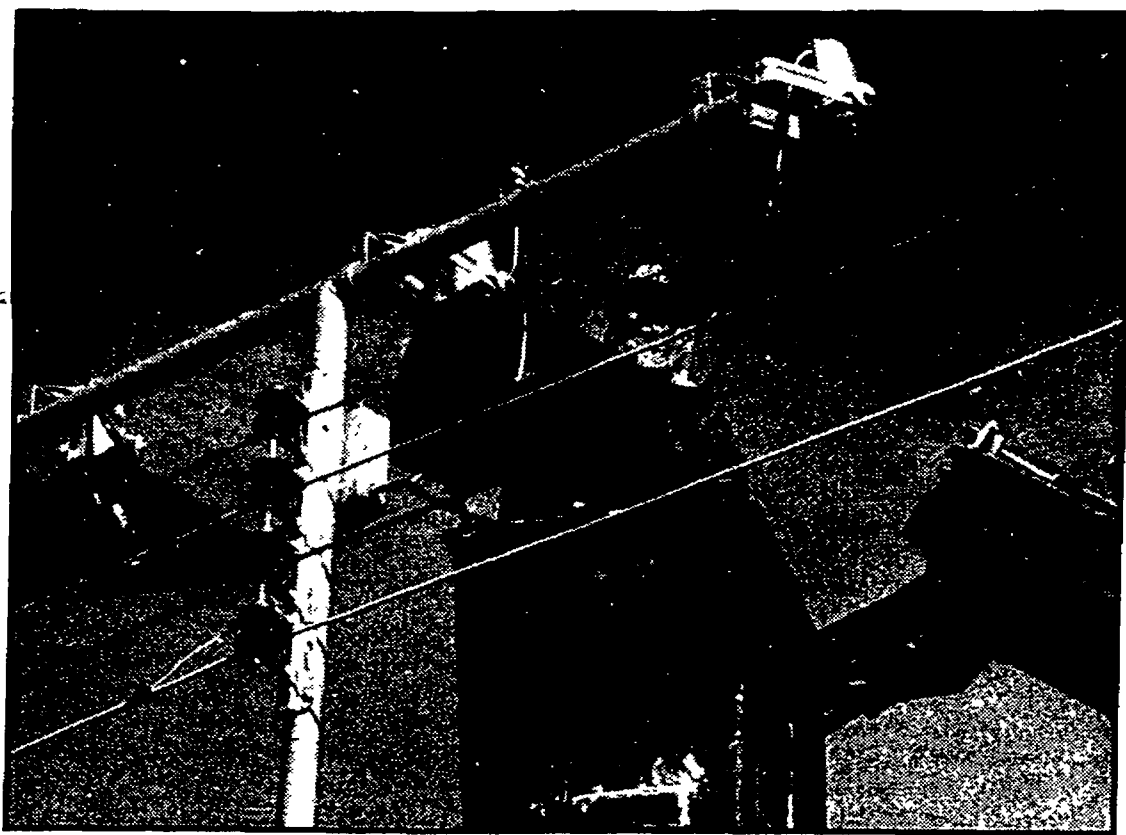

### There's more to Ireland than just green beer

Who invented the green beer served on St. Patrick's Day? Not the Irish. There are only two Irish beers (and they are not green) readily available across the United States. They are Harp Lager and Guinness Stout.

Harp Lager is amber-golden in color with intense barley aromas. It's a medium-weight brew that's fully flavored with a solid finish. Guinness Stout is a very dark, very malty tasting ale. Both the flavor and color come from the addition of roasted barley to the brew. Its appeal is the refreshing, slightly bitter finish.

The term whiskey is Gaelic in origin and there's no doubt that the Irish make some of the most distinctive. There is a common misconception that Irish whiskey is a potato whiskey. The Irish do refer to moonshine as poteen, but this word refers to the small, easily dismantled pot still, not potatoes.

Similar to Scotch whiskey, Irish whiskey is distilled from a fermented mash of grains such as malted and unmalted barley, corn, rye, wheat and oats. By Irish law, it must be aged for a minimum of five years in previously used cooperage (such as sherry casks).

However, it is usually aged for seven or eight years and up to 12 years or 15 years for the heavier distillates requiring extended time to achieve roundness, and the essential smoothness.

Prestige Irish whiskeys are pot still single malts with a small amount of single grain whiskey added to enhance the malt character. They are distilled three times as compared to the double distillation used to make Scotch whiskey.

Since 1608, in the small village of Bushmills, Ireland, the art of whiskey distilling has flourished in the Old Bushmills Distillery, home of both Black Bush and Bushmills Irish whiskeys. While they have the same home, they are different and appeal to different audiences.

If you are unfamiliar with either, our recommendation is to start with Bushmills. Drink it neat in a snifter. It's lighter and gentler with an elegant, finesseful finish. Once you've gained some experience, try Black Bush served the same way.

You'll notice the bigger, bolder aromas and flavors, many of which originate in the hand-picked sherry casks used during the aging year. If you like cognac, armagnac or single malt scotches, you'll take to Black Bush immediately.

Enhance the aroma appreciation of both of these whiskeys with a few drops of water added to the snifter after the whiskey has been poured. Irish whiskeys may also be served on the rocks.

The big difference in taste between Scotch whiskey and Irish whiskey stems from the fact that in Scotland the barley is dried over peat. The smoky or peaty character of Scotch whiskey is absent in Irish whiskey.

Irish Mist is a blend of spicy-flavored Irish whiskey and heather honey liqueur from Tulloch Mhor. In 1692, the tale goes, the original recipe was lost during an exodus of warriors. Some time later, it was discovered in Austria and returned to Ireland.

Today, Irish Creams originating in Ireland are very popular as after-dinner pours. Fresh cream is blended with whiskey and stabilized so that it does not need refrigeration on the shelf.

Bailey's is the original Irish Cream. After it was first released, it was so popular that new cream liqueurs were developed. They were made with imported spirits, mixed with American cream and bottled in the United States.

Besides Bailey's, there's Saint Brendan's, Em-mets, Carolans and O'Darby. Our favorite for its excellent chocolate malt, white chocolate and toasted coconut character is Saint Brendan's, easily recognized in the flagon-shaped bottle.

"Ireland sober is Ireland free!" James Joyce wrote. While this column speaks only of the Irish in terms of their famous alcoholic products, we maintain that the best celebration of St. Patrick's Day is one that enjoys the spirits of the Irish in moderation.

# Pear-ing off

## Sweet fruit makes the most of meals

A pear a day keeps the doctor away. Wait a minute. A pear? No, fooling. "If eaten daily, pears and other fruits containing pectin help prevent high blood pressure and atherosclerosis by preventing the uptake of dietary cholesterol from other foods," the Encyclopedia Americana tells us.

One medium-size pear contains only 95 calories, no cholesterol, and is virtually fat- and sodium-free. Each pear provides 23 grams carbohydrates, 194 milligrams potassium and 6 grams dietary fiber.

No one knows the origin of the pear, but Greek poet Homer described the fruit as "A gift from the gods." Ancient Greeks believed pears had medicinal powers; the Romans introduced them throughout Europe. European royalty and the wealthy grew pears — indeed, French emperor Charlemagne ordered his subjects to plant pear trees in their gardens.

California, Oregon and Washington state produce 95 percent of the commercially grown U.S. pear crop. Varieties include the Bartlett, California's premier pear, and its cousin, the Red Bartlett; the Anjou, Bosc, Comice, Nelis, Forelle and Seckel pears.

Unlike many other fruits, pears do not ripen on the tree and must be harvested green, though mature. (Maturity is determined by testing for appropriate natural sugar levels.) They then are held in cold storage to prevent ripening before reaching the supermarket.

When choosing pears, select well-formed fruit free of cuts and bruises and complete the ripening process at home. To do this, place pears in a loosely closed paper bag or ripening bowl and leave at room temperature for several days.

Check the fruit daily; at the proper stage of maturity, pears will yield to gentle pressure at the stem end. (Color changes do not always indicate when a pear is in the best condition for eating.)

Once they've ripened, store pears in the refrigerator, where they will keep from three to 14 days.

Pears pair beautifully with cheeses, for appetizers as well as desserts. Some cheeses that go particularly well with pears include blue, Brie, cheddar, Gouda, Gorgonzola and Swiss. Other quick treats include:

**Broiled Bartletts:** Halve and core fresh pears, sprinkle cut sides generously with orange juice and small amount of brown sugar; dust with ground ginger and dot with butter. Broil until browned and bubbly.

**Quick Salad or Dessert:** Fill cavities of cored pear halves with seedless grapes. Top with plain low-fat yogurt mixed with a bit of honey. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

**Toast Toppers:** Spread hot toast with a small amount of chunky-style peanut butter and top with thin slices of pears.

**The Sweet Sandwich:** Soften cream cheese or Neufchatel cheese with orange juice. Spread on date or brown bread. Cover with thin slices of pears and sprinkle with ground nutmeg or ginger.

**Pears to Go:** Halve and core fresh pears and pack cavities with cream cheese or Neufchatel cheese; place halves together, cover with plastic wrap and carry in lunch boxes or knapsacks.

**A reminder:** When cooking with pears, the fruit should be firm.

### FRESH START

1 medium Bartlett pear, peeled and sliced  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon lemon peel  
1/2 cup crushed ice  
2 eggs  
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
Dash ground nutmeg



Pears can be eaten alone, but the pair well with elegant dinners as well

3 ounces frozen apple juice concentrate, undiluted, defrosted (half a 6-ounce can)  
1/4 to 1 cup milk

Yields 2 breakfast drinks  
Blend pear, lemon juice and peel in blender until smooth. Add crushed ice, eggs, spices and apple juice concentrate; blend. While blender is running, add milk and blend until foamy.

### CHICKEN AND PEARS WITH MUSTARD CREAM SAUCE

1 1/2 pounds chicken breast, skinned and boned  
salt, pepper and paprika to taste  
2 firm Bartlett pears, cored and sliced (see note)  
water  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 tablespoon fresh chopped basil or 1

teaspoon dried, crushed  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 cup half-and-half  
1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

Yields 4 servings  
Season chicken breast to taste with salt, pepper and paprika. Arrange with pears in microwave-safe dish. Microwave, covered, on high 7 to 10 minutes or until chicken tests done and juices run clear.

Pour juices from chicken into 4-cup microwave-safe measure; add water to equal 1/2 cup. Add onion, butter and basil; microwave on high 3 to 4 minutes or until onions are tender.

Blend in flour; stir in half-and-half and mustard. Microwave on high 3 to 5 minutes or until thickened. Adjust seasonings. Pour over chicken and pears.

Note: Bosc and Anjou pears may be substituted.

### LEMON CHICKEN WITH PEARS

3 tablespoons vegetable oil

1 chicken breast, skinned, boned and cut into 1-inch cubes  
1/2 pound fresh Chinese pea pods or green beans  
3 green onions, green parts only, cut into 1-inch lengths  
2 fresh Bartlett pears, cored, sliced  
Cooking Sauce (recipe follows)

Yields 4 servings.

Heat 2 tablespoons oil in wok or large skillet. Add chicken and stir-fry over high heat 2 minutes or until chicken turns white. Transfer chicken to plate. Add remaining oil and stir-fry pea pods 1 minute over high heat.

Reduce heat to medium, add cooked chicken, onions, pears and Cooking Sauce. Stir-fry until mixture is heated through and sauce is glossy, about 3 minutes.

# Culinary team learns the value of practice



The phone call came Monday at lunch time.

It was from Mario Entemad, captain of Team Michigan, which is preparing for the World Culinary Art Salon in Frankfurt, Germany.

"We need to report to Schoolcraft Wednesday morning," he said.

This was three days earlier than first planned. Needless to say, I was a bit put

out. How could I possibly leave the restaurant for four days? It was bad enough that I had to be gone over the weekend, our busiest time.

I tried to negotiate a later starting time, but to no avail.

"Make your decision, Mary," he said. "You knew it may come down to this when you made the choice to be on the team."

Well, enough said. When the coach feels the team needs more practice, then so be it.

Tuesday was a scramble, tying up loose ends at work. Things like schedules, orders, payroll and bill-paying were all done in one day. My organizational skills were put to the test. Then I packed up my tools,

and food to take with me.

Organization is very important while competing, so we make lists of things that need to be finished within certain time frames. Part of the "fun" is to cross off everything on your list for that day. Anything not finished is put off until the next day.

and consequently you start off behind.

Part of the list is for helpers, or apprentices. They are at our beck and call to do what ever we need. Chopping vegetables, washing pots, making batters. Each day, as a labor of love, they work through their own lists, never complaining, and staying there to the end for us.

At the end of Thursday, about half of my work was completed. Already 35 hours had been devoted, and the hard part hadn't even started yet.

Friday was another long, long day. We were starting to get tired, but the excitement was on override. We couldn't wait to

- 1/4 pound mushrooms, cleaned and sliced
- 1 teaspoon Italian herb blend

- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon red pepper flakes
- 3 pita pocket breads, cut in half
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 package (10 ounces) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon pepper
- 1 cup (4 ounces) feta cheese, crumbled

Serve.

**Microwave preparation of filling:** In 2-quart microwave-safe dish combine onions and lamb (eliminate oil). Microwave on high power for 4 minutes, stirring several times to crumble lamb. Drain off excess liquid. Add spinach, mushrooms; herb blend, garlic powder, lemon pepper and red pepper flakes to lamb mixture. Stir to blend. Cover with plastic wrap, venting edge and microwave on high power for 3-4 minutes stirring twice, until heated through. Uncover and stir in feta cheese; cover and set aside. Place pita breads on paper towel and microwave on high power for 30 seconds to soften. Stuff with hot lamb filling and garnish with tomato topping. Serve. Makes 6 sandwich halves.

To make topping: In small bowl combine tomato, cucumber, and Italian dressing; set aside.

**Conventional preparation of filling:** In large skillet with cover, heat oil. Add onion and saute until well browned. Add lamb, stirring to crumble lamb and saute until no longer pink; drain well. Stir in spinach, mushrooms, Italian herb blend, garlic powder, and red pepper flakes; mixing to blend well. Cover and cook 8 to 10 minutes; stirring occasionally. Add feta cheese mixing well, allow to melt slightly. Warm pita bread to soften. Stuff pita with hot lamb filling and garnish with tomato topping.

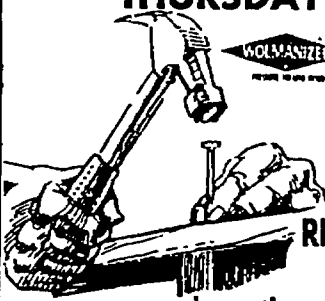



## AVOCADO SALAD

½ pound cooked tiny shrimp meat  
Dressing (recipe follows)  
2 fresh Bartlett pears  
1 avocado  
lemon juice  
1 large head butter lettuce

Yield 4 servings.

Marinate shrimp in dressing in refrigerator for about 1 hour. Halve, core and slice pears (to get about 2½ cups). Cut avocado into lengthwise slices. Coat both pears and avocado with lemon juice to prevent browning. Shred crispier (center) leaves of lettuce and put into center of 4 salad bowls lined with large outer leaves. Spoon marinated shrimp onto lettuce and arrange pears and avocado

around shrimp. Serve remaining dressing on the side.

Dressing: Combine ½ cup white vinegar, ¼ cup vegetable oil, 4 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon sugar, ½ teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon crumbled basil, and ¼ teaspoon pepper in a jar. Shake to combine.

# Betty Crocker makes potpourri plans

Real gardeners never feel cold in the winter. They have already plunged into spring with seed catalogs as their ticket to a sunny outlook.

Although many gardeners have strong ideas of what they want to put into the ground, there are the more accommodating types who ask what other members of the family might like. That is the moment to think ahead, and a recently published book can be a big help.

*Betty Crocker's Book of Flowers* by Jane Newdick (Prentice Hall) is brimming with ideas of how to enjoy your flowers inside the house as well as outside. No purchased flower ever has the aroma of those grown in your own garden, since you pick each bloom at its peak of perfection. Now, then, is the time to decide what to plant for eventual indoor enjoyment.

The *Book of Flowers* is full of inspiration. There are clear instructions of how to pick and dry flowers, cooking with flowers, decorating with flowers, flowers for special occasions and making your own potpourris. The lush photographs provide good graphic guides.

The suggestions are not so chic and difficult that you need a florist's training and tools to accomplish the finished arrangement. In the chapter on decorating with flowers, one is encouraged to "forget those great, hotel foyer set pieces put together like a painting by numbers. Instead, simply use what you have and try to

look at everything with a fresh eye."

A surprisingly modest assortment of flower containers are used for the arrangements — pitchers, tumblers for small posies, tureens, baskets, fish bowls, even metal milk cans from the farm. In short, if it can hold water, it can hold flowers.

It is instructive to see how in some cases the flowers are massed together for dramatic effect. In others, a few flowers of a single color are chosen for their complementary shapes. One white example combines lilies, tobacco flowers and foxglove in a white pottery pitcher.

Flowers appear more and more on the table in both trendy restaurants and adventurous home kitchens. In bold-face type the book warns that one should beware of poisonous flowers. But instead of citing them, suggests the reader turn to a reliable reference book. Flowers to be eaten should never be sprayed, another very good reason for growing these blooms that will be taken into the kitchen.

For your easy information, note that among the most common flowers, the toxic varieties are African violet, begonia, bleeding heart, buttercup, daffodils, delphinium, larkspur, Dutchman's breeches, foxglove, hydrangea, iris, lily of the valley, lily, azalea, rhododendron, star-of-Bethlehem, sweet pea and wisteria.

The photograph of flowers frozen in ice cubes will inspire many to prettify their drinks this way. It is

easy to do: "Put a tiny flower in each section of an ice tray. Half-fill each section with water and freeze solid. Top up with water and freeze again. Doing the freezing in two stages means that the flower will end up in the middle of the ice cube, its natural tendency being to float to the top of the water."

The section on making your own potpourris will prove especially helpful. It is explained that there are two kinds of potpourri, moist and dry.

The moist is not very attractive, though its scent is much longer-lasting. For this reason, the dull-colored mixtures are put in containers that allow the aroma to escape. This no doubt explains the name pot-pourri, which is French for "rotted pot."

Newdick explains that commercial potpourris often stint on fixatives, which are costly but vital for a good result.

"Many ready-made potpourris are nothing more than pretty mixtures of flowers and leaves with essential oils added for fragrance."

The basics of combining various flowers, spices and herbs into a deeply scented blend are explained, and the pages of beguiling photographs of potpourris will inspire you to have your gardener plant plenty of the sweetest blossoms there are. Here is one selection to consider.

## SPRING POTPOURRI

1 cup chamomile flowers  
¼ cup marigold petals  
¼ cup lemon verbena leaves  
1 cup mixed yellow flowers, i.e., tulip, mimosa, daffodil  
2 teaspoons ground coriander  
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
4 teaspoons powderedorris root  
4 drops vetiver essential oil  
A few whole dried yellow chilies, marigold heads or cinnamon sticks, for decoration

Measure petals, flowers and leaves into large bowl. Add fixative (orris root) and ground spices, plus any other dry ingredients. Mix them very well with your hands or a wooden spoon.

Add drops of essential oil and mix again. Put mixture into paper bags, loosely seal and place somewhere cool and dry to cure for 4 to 6 weeks, shaking occasionally. When potpourri is ready, add chilies, marigold heads or cinnamon sticks for decoration. The potpourri will then be ready to use.

Note: The fixatives and essential oils can generally be bought at craft shops or shops that specialize in scented products, such as Laura Ashley or Crabtree & Evelyn in Twelve Oaks Mall. With the current vogue for dried floral arrangements, you might also check with your florist for local suppliers.

# Put some spring into entertaining

Winter is not going to go out like a lamb, you can bet on it. But when March is on the calendar, we all begin to get itchy to move on to the next season. Winter may not have been so blah, but still, let's get on with spring.

But we don't have to wait; we can make it happen. Just announce that you are having a Spring Dinner. This is the opposite end of the spectrum to the Farewell-to-Summer parties that have become so popular.

What makes a Spring Dinner? A spring menu, of course. This means foods that come into abundance in the spring. These are predictable products, so give a clever twist to your dinner with one or two dishes that give the impression of being springlike — a matter of color and presentation.

Begin by deciding on the main course. Shad and shad roe are beginning their peak season right now. There are people who can't get enough of them, and then there are others who would rather not, thank you. Know your guests.

Sauteed shad and its roe are often served with crisp bacon, a pairing I find strange since the roe is quite rich, and so is bacon. Small steamed potatoes (plain please, no melted butter) complement the fish perfectly.

If you feel more comfortable with meat, think of lamb, the most traditional of all spring meats. This is when the flavor is mildest. That, of course, means fresh spring lamb which, alas, is not always available.

Pork, because of its mild flavor, would also work very well at a spring dinner. An especially attractive cut is the tenderloin. The long, thin strip of meat is usually no larger in diameter than a skinny French baguette loaf. Once sliced, these small rounds of pale meat have a delicate air that is very fitting for the light mood you want to create.

Just now, asparagus is coming into its glory. It could be served along with the pork tenderloin or lamb. If it's a shad dinner, serve the asparagus as a separate course following the fish.

March is not a great fruit month. Winter citrus fruits are still holding in there, and local berries are a few months away. Of course, now that we have become used to berries the year-round, the old seasonal rules don't seem to apply.

But let's face it, berries that have been picked underripe and shipped long distances just don't hold a flavor patch to regional varieties picked at their full sweetness.

But taking berries or other soft fruits and turning them into sherbets gives a very refreshing and delicious twist to these not-quite-ready species. Garnish the pretty scoop of sherbet with some sliced fruit or drizzle on a fruit liqueur, preferably the clear distilled liqueurs such as kirsch, which is made from cherries.

Believe it or not, that old standby cauliflower can make the perfect first course. No, it's not especially springlike in itself, but when presented with a delicately speckled coating, it fits the March bill of fare.

Simple cauliflower takes on a rather floral appearance in the following preparation. The sauce

that covers it has a pale creamy tone, then the sprinkled egg adds a sunny color note. An extra hard-cooked egg yolk could be used to emphasize the sunshine.

## SUNSHINE CAULIFLOWER

1 large head cauliflower, trimmed  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup mayonnaise  
¼ cup plain yogurt  
1½ tablespoons prepared mustard  
Juice of ½ lemon  
Salt and pepper  
1 hard-boiled egg

Bring large quantity of water to a boil while preparing the cauliflower. Add salt to water and plunge in cauliflower. Cook until cauliflower is rather soft, but do not overcook; about 15 to 20 minutes. Drain at once and cool in cold water. Drain thoroughly and refrigerate.

Prepare mustard sauce by beating together mayonnaise, yogurt, mustard, lemon juice, salt and pepper. Push hard-boiled egg through a sieve to reduce it to small pieces.

To serve, place cauliflower in deep serving bowl and spoon sauce over it. Spread sauce with rubber spatula, then sprinkle with sieved egg.

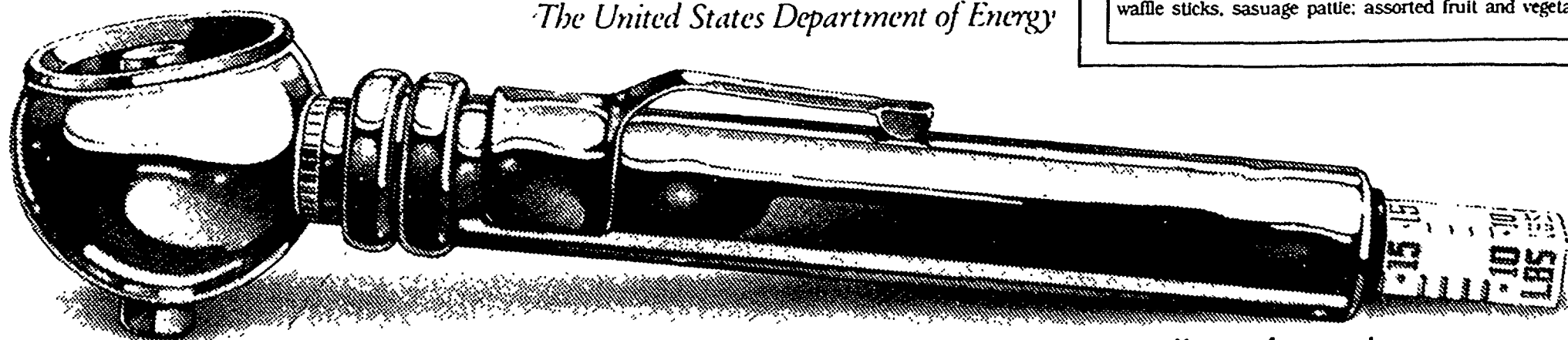
By the time it was all done, we were awestruck. All of our toil had been worth it. There was so much adrenaline flowing it could have been bottled. Many obstacles were overcome

# Dutch treat: Tulip Time dazzles!

## Holland, Michigan—

It's estimated that only about 35 percent of this west Michigan city's residents are still of Dutch ancestry in 1992. But for 10 days this spring, May 6-16, this town and its citizens magically transform into 100 percent "Dutch."

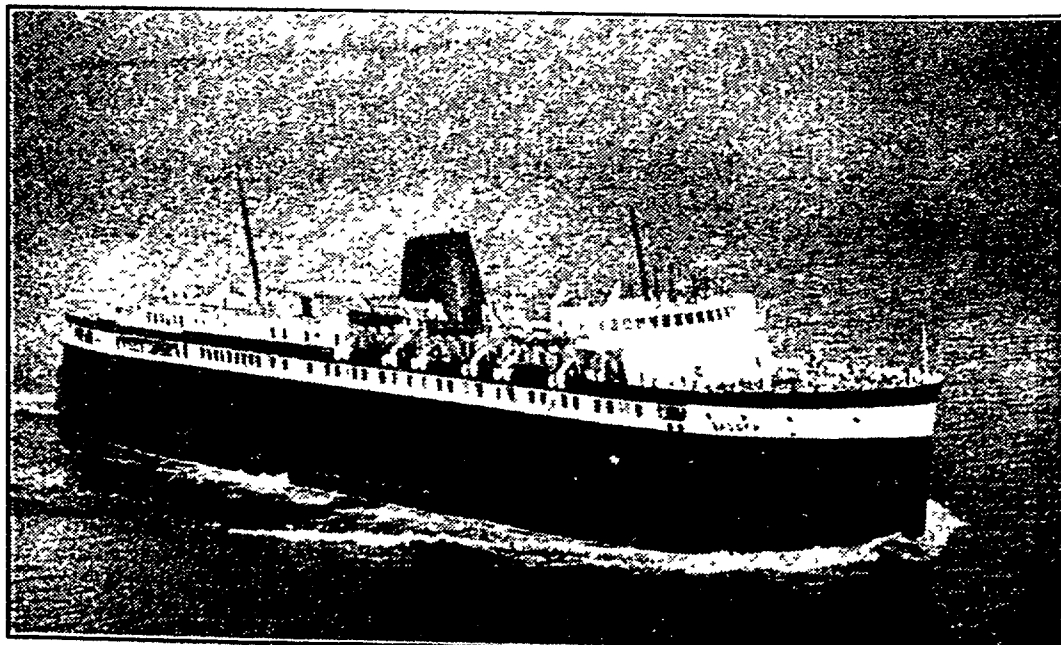

# Clare: Where wild things are

## Clare, Michigan—

The Michigan Great Lakes Wildlife Festival, an annual event in Clare since 1985, has grown to become a national event and, in the process, changed even its name to the "First of America Wildlife Festival."

The eighth annual festival, to be held Memorial Weekend, May 23 and 24 this year, has a new name to reflect the partnership with First of America Banks.

The name of the festival, however, is not the only thing that is new this year. The Michigan Ducks Unlimited Artist and Carver of the Year contests will give way for an all new First of America Wildlife Artist of the Year and First of America Wildlife Carver of the Year. Both contests are sponsored by Ducks Unlimited, and both invite top national artists throughout the United States to compete in these completely new and first-of-a-kind contests. Even the Artist of the Year categories have expanded with not only waterfowl, but mammals and birds included as allowable entries.

There's more contests. A Michigan Great Lakes Photographer of the Year and Carver of the Year will be selected. Also intermediate and novice divisions of carvings of songbird, fish, and ducks will be judged.

Entries in all of the contests,

including the two all-new ones this year, will not only add to the enjoyment of the festival, but provide revenues for a variety of conservation projects in mid-Michigan that the festival supports.

Each year proceeds from the wildlife festival are used to promote area wildlife, including Ducks Unlimited; a Department of Natural Resources project to introduce Hungarian Partridge into the area; a habitat program for the Ruffed Grouse Society and a DNR non-game project, the return to the state of Michigan's only native swan, the Trumpeter. Festival proceeds have already purchased three of the beautiful birds which reside with several others at the Kellogg Bird Sanctuary.

Many events are featured during the two day festival. Each year, the committee has commissioned a special feature artist and feature carver for the festival. The 1992 talent includes Arkansas native Zettie Jones who was commissioned to paint "Frozen Splendor," with limited edition prints available, and Bay City's own Randy Clarke, whose companion carving of Buffle Heads will be displayed and raffled during the weekend.

Top artists and carvers from across the country will be included in the festival's art show and sale both days. The festival will also host

sporting events including clay and trick shooting, archery, gun safety, wildlife calling and even fly tying.

Visitors will enjoy everything from wildflower identification to whittling.

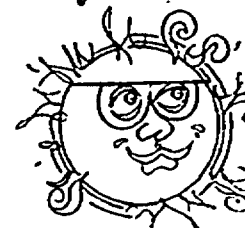

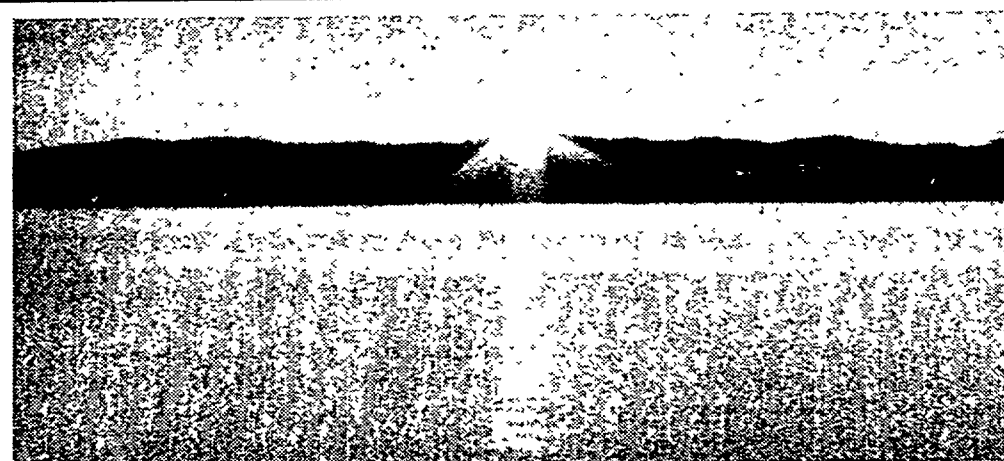

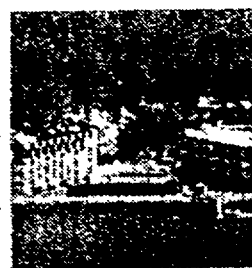

# Flock of birding sites put in focus

If you're a fledgling birdwatcher, having scattered birdseed and crumbs for feathered visitors to your backyard during winter's cold months, perhaps you're ready for a more intense birding experience - especially if you found yourself intrigued by the various species you attracted to your feeders.

Or, if you've already progressed from being a birdwatcher to being a birder, (signifying a more intense interest in things avian), you probably already have your own binoculars or spotting scope, a slightly worn copy of Peterson's guide, and a not-too-long life list of species sighted. Either way, you're interested in locating a larger concentration of birds to watch...

There are plenty of places in Michigan to give you a stiff neck from peering skyward, tired eyes from focusing quickly, and a hoarse voice from exclaiming at almost-rare

species.

With the state's abundance of water, both in the large open stretches of the Great Lakes themselves and the multitude of smaller inland lakes, rivers and marshes, and the unique configuration of the landmass itself - the two peninsulas, numerous jutting fingers of land into open water and short stretches to navigate, the state is a haven for birdwatchers of all levels.

During the spring and autumn migration of birds, those times when they're winging toward winter feeding grounds or summer breeding areas, birders literally have a field day.

Just as human "snowbirds" return north from warmer states in spring, so too do their feathered counterparts, but north to them may mean returning from Michigan to the Arctic Circle, as the snowy owl does some winters. So, from almost any spot in the state, you'll see birds flocked in flight or flying singly - north. From Lake Superior's Whitefish Point to Lake Erie's Metropark at the mouth of the Detroit River, you'll see concentrations of birds.

At the peak of birding activity,

when watching becomes a serious spectator sport, you'll also see some interesting human species: heads tilted skyward, binoculars or scopes glued to eyes, sensibly dressed in serious outdoor clothing, bird guides at the ready, backpacks bulging with lunch and thermos, and always, an eager and expectant look until the last ray of sunlight settles down for the night. Birder or birdwatcher - they're all the same in the field.

**WHITEFISH POINT:** One of the most spectacular spots for birding, spring migration means 230 species recorded, but it's renowned as hawk-watching territory. The spring migration begins in early April (and the weather on Lake Superior can be a severe test of one's enthusiasm) and extends through mid-June. You'll see flocks of winter finches and some hawks early, then numbers of birds build as raptors move through the area. Seven species of owls, including the great gray and the boreal owl have been spotted.

You might see peregrine falcons, merlins and goshawks. Waterfowl seen here include 3,000 to 5,000 loons in April and May. You may catch sight of bald eagles, golden eagles, the red-necked grebe, and even a three-toed woodpecker.

Some rare birds have been sighted: Clark's nutcracker, white-eyed vireo and the black-billed magpie.

It's not unusual for bird observers to record 15,000 to 25,000 raptors at Whitefish Point during spring migration, as the land is a broad

peninsula jutting into Lake Superior towards Canada - a natural concentration area for birds winging northwards.

From the Mackinac Bridge, drive north on Interstate 75 to M-123, then north to Paradise, where you'll be able to find lodging and food. North again on Whitefish Point Rd. to the very end - at the old Coast Guard station, and you'll be at the Whitefish Point Observatory. Remember, in early spring, dress warmly!

**SAULT STE. MARIE:** There's a warm flow of water from the Northern Power and Light generating plant near downtown Sault Ste. Marie that attracts boreal species south to the open water. Gyrfalcons are reported here almost every winter and spring. Snowy owls frequent the area and harlequin ducks are also seen.

From downtown Sault Ste. Marie to Sugar Island, along the St. Mary's River is prime birding territory. Watch for LeConte's sparrows.

Drive south toward Neebish Island, take the ferry and be alert for nesting great gray owls. You may catch sight of three-toed woodpeckers, northern shrikes, and Bohemian waxwings in the area.

Head south and then west on M-29 to M-48, then west toward Rudyard and see if you can spot the snowy owls that frequently roost on fencepost tops and the high peaks of barns. In autumn, along I-75 near Rudyard, you might see sandhill cranes.

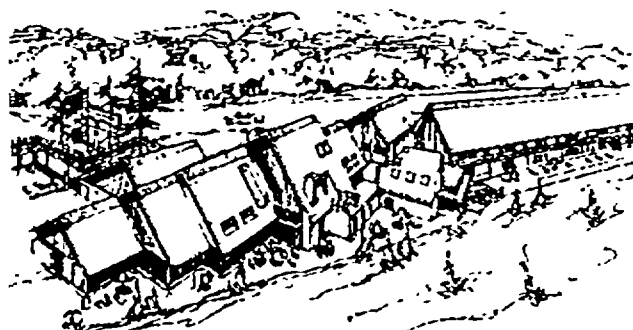

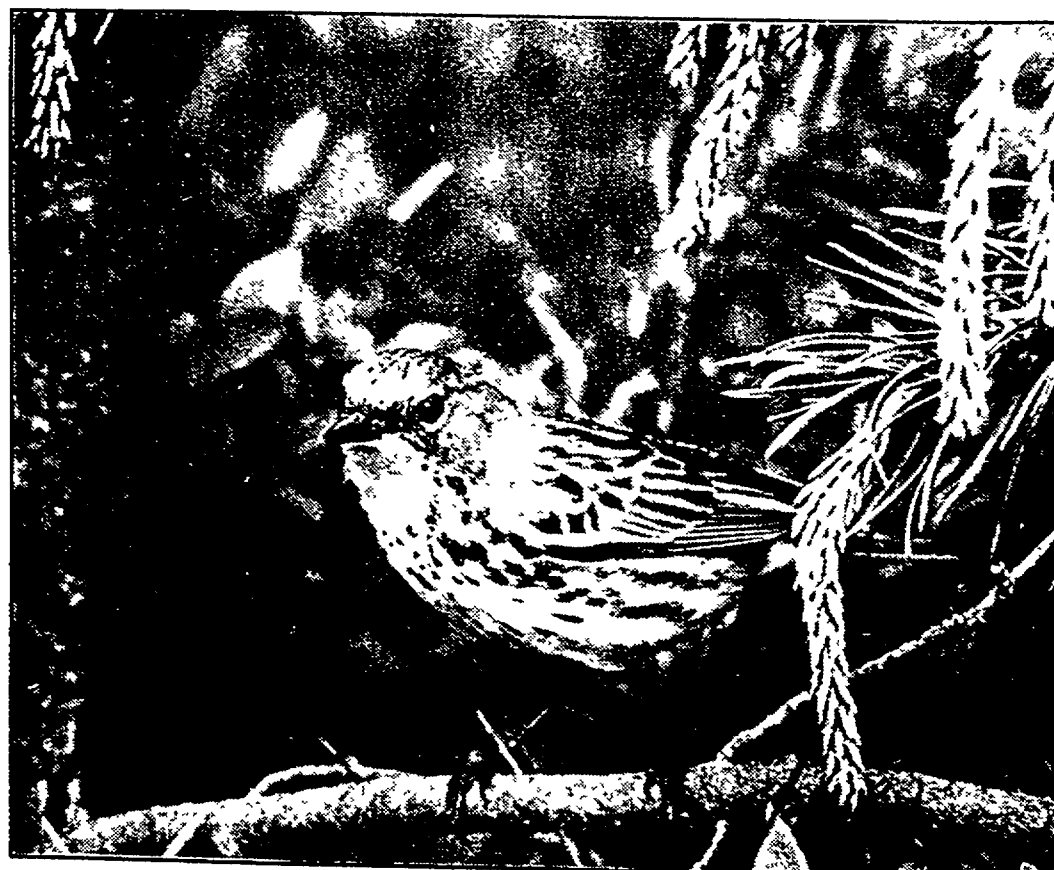

Bridge to fly across the straits together. To see them, drive west to near the high school, turn right along Wilderness Drive - about 1 mile west of Mackinaw City.

**WILDERNESS STATE PARK:**

Eleven miles west of Mackinaw City, you'll discover a thirty-mile stretch of beach and woodlands. Wilderness State Park encompasses 8,035 acres and includes Waugoshance Point. Expect sandy shoreline, gravel bars, beach pools, some conifer stands and low dunes. You'll see a variety of shorebirds, including piping plovers. Bald eagles have been spotted and you'll catch sight of a number of duck

species and mergansers on the water.

The area, with its variety of tree cover, is prime breeding and nesting habitat for birds.

**GRAYLING:** There are only about 135,000 acres of suitable nesting area for the small Kirtlan's warbler, and they occur in Oscoda, Alcona and Iosco counties in Michigan's Lower Peninsula, east of Grayling. In the Pine River Area, the Grayling sand provides an ideal growing medium for jackpine seedlings, that rapidly reforest the areas burned over - which opens the jackpine cones and releases seeds.

The birds winter in the Bahamas

and usually migrate back to their Michigan nesting areas in late May or early June. While it's rare to see them during migration, they're sometimes seen at nesting sites. A small bird, they're less than five inches long, with distinct black streaks on their gray backs and along their yellow sides.

The unique endangered species may be seen through binoculars or spotting scopes on special tours arranged each spring. Contact the Michigan DNR office, P.O. Box 507, Grayling MI 49738 or the U.S. Forest Service District Ranger, Mio, MI

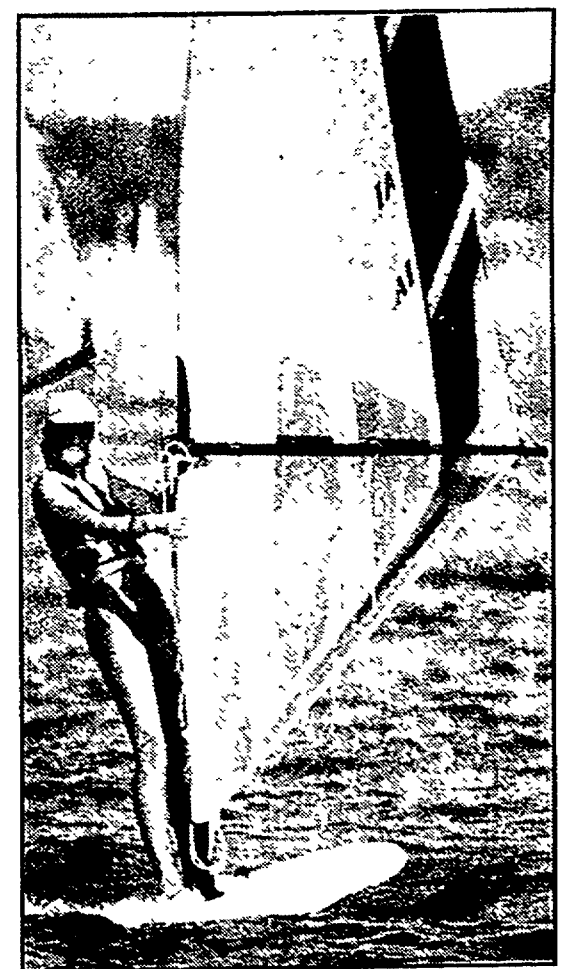

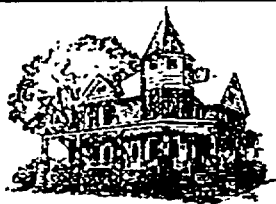

# Prize pewter pieces perused

His talk is one of three mini-lectures being given before the second annual Birmingham Antiques Festival at the Birmingham, Michigan, Community House April 10-11. The Wolfs will have a booth in the show.

Since Bette Wolf bought the couple's first pieces of pewter 25 years ago, the couple continued buying and studying as they filled their Flint home with literally thousands of pewter candlesticks, tankards, trenchers, chalices - all the best quality available.

In fact, the Wolfs explain, their home was built to showcase their collections with shelves and cupboards in almost every room holding their treasures. In addition the Wolfs have bought painted furniture, especially fine blanket chests, as well as early portraits, wooden boxes and bowls, coverlets and brass and copper to complement their pewter antiques.

While Mrs. Wolf bought the initial pewter pieces, she points out that "It's really my husband who would say, 'Shall we buy it?'"

Melvyn Wolf, an orthopedic surgeon, is chief of orthopedics at McLaren Hospital in Flint and also heads an orthopedic training program affiliated with Michigan State University.

Dr. Wolf thinks that many men are pewter collectors because there is much written documentation of early pewter, and pewter markings and shapes allow a scientific approach to collecting.

"It's an easy field if you want to study and there's security in knowing a piece was old," he notes.

Not only have the Wolfs studied pewter, but they have generously shared their knowledge. He served as president of the Pewter Collectors Club of America 12 years ago, and she is the current president.

He also writes articles for the organization's bulletin and has been a consultant for museums. The Wolfs' collections have been pictured in

magazines. They mention that "a lot of books use our collections" during the last 10 years.

More than 100 of their antique pewter pieces were photographed for a book, "Pewter of the Western World," written by Peter R. G. Hornsby, a definitive work covering pewter from 1600-1850.

Their porringer collection, displayed on shelves in the family room, shows examples of the various styles of handles being produced in the 18th and 19th centuries in the silvery material that is often 60 percent tin and 40 percent lead.

"Color," Bette Wolf says, "has a lot to do with the content."

The porringer collection also illustrates why the Wolfs became dealer as well as collectors in 1975.

Dr. Wolf explains that, because the pewter items were cast in molds, there were only so many designs created. When you have examples of each kind and you still want the "thrill of the hunt" then you go into business.

"It (becoming dealers) was a natural evolution, we love to travel in the East and can see a lot of stuff there in one building.

"Selling enables us to continue buying," he explains. The Wolfs also find early pewter at auctions.

Bette Wolf stresses, however, that they don't sell from their collections.

The items sold at the 15 shows they customarily do a year are kept in a storage room in the basement.

"We do a big mail order business as customers list their wants with us," she says. She is the business part of the enterprise, keeping lists of customers and their interests in a nearby computer.

Every purchaser receives a written documentation of what the piece is, its condition, origin, markings, age and price paid and evaluation of worth along with a color photograph of it.

Dr. Wolf is the one who cleans and polishes each piece as it is

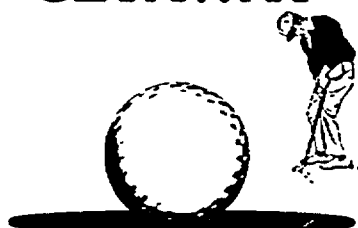

acquired. While their collections gleam in cupboards and on shelves painted in faded blues or reds, they only receive the initial cleaning, a lasting one.

For those who wonder how pewter is cleaned, Dr. Wolf says he uses lye.

Lest anyone think of early pewter as a "poor man's silver," as a friend commented to me, realize that choice pieces are costly. A fine teapot may have a \$2,800 price tag.

Really rare items, such as a large 30-inch plate can command \$15,000. Dr. Wolf relates that one that came on the market was purchased by Colonial Williamsburg for that sum.

Bette Wolf says you won't find a \$500 piece in their shows for \$100, but neither will you pay \$500 for a \$100 piece. Over and over, both stress the importance of condition. "Buying quality is the only way, she says. That philosophy is evident in all the collections in their home.

"We don't collect many things breakable," she says, noting that three sons and a daughter grew up in the midst of their collections. The exception might be the stoneware jugs displayed on specially made shelves in the dining room. Now they are welcoming eight grandchildren, the oldest of whom is four as the count includes triplets.

The Wolfs say they think collecting pewter is ideal as it doesn't need maintenance and "you always can find room for another piece."

Dr. Wolf has a warning, however:

"Don't think of pewter as an investment. Invest in enjoyment. A decorative item can be functional around the house."

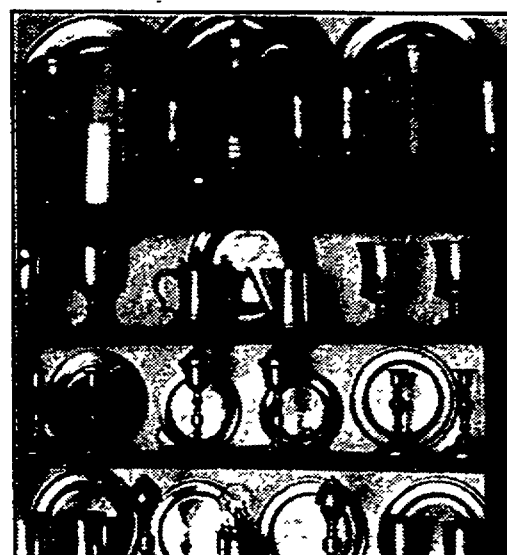
Touring the rooms of their home, a saltbox adaptation, shows how the couple has combined their interest into their living. From breakfast room, to library, family room, living room and bedrooms collections are on display.

The Wolfs do shows from March each year through the Junior Goodwill Show in Detroit in November. After the Birmingham Antiques Festival April 10-11, they will show at three or four of Margaret Brusher's Ann Arbor Antiques Markets held at 5055 Ann Arbor/Saline Road. This year's shows will be April 12, May 17, June 21, July 19, Aug. 16, Sept. 20, Oct. 18 and Nov. 8.

You'll also see their distinctive booth of dark red cupboards holding gleaming pewter at shows in Winnetka, Illinois, Indianapolis, Indiana, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

When we visited, Dr. Wolf was eagerly getting ready for the new season by giving the cupboards a fresh red touch-up.

Catherine McClung and John Felsing produced the two color

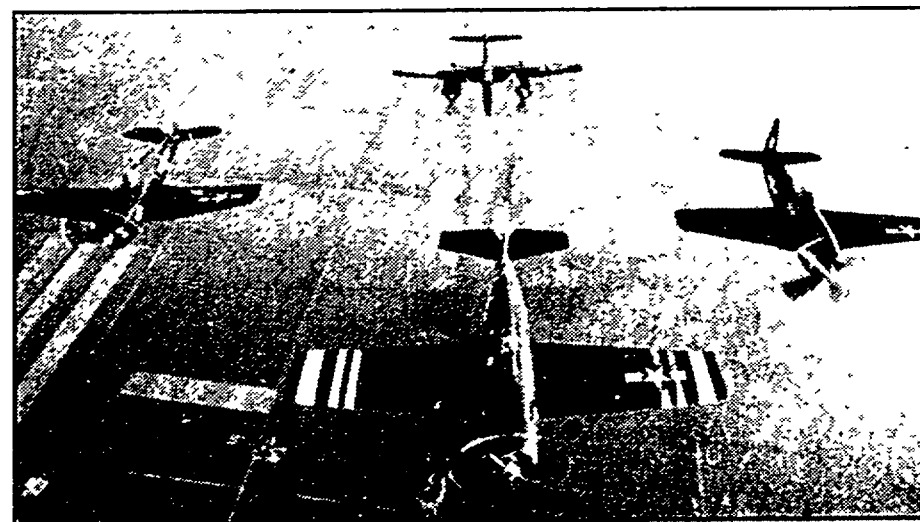

# New Northern Michigan courses rated among the best in nation

Two of Northern Michigan's newest golfing jewels, Black Forest and Elk Ridge, joined a distinguished group of outstanding courses when they were honored recently by the game's leading publications.

Black Forest at Wilderness Valley in Gaylord made Golf Magazine's list of "Top 10 You Can Play" resort courses. In its February, 1992, edition, Golf Magazine raves about the course designed by Tom Doak for owner Dave Smith.

The folks at Elk Ridge in Atlanta have also picked up a coveted honor. Their layout was named by Golf Digest as the 1991 runner-up in its "Best New Public Course" category. Golf Digest selects the best new private and resort courses in the nation.

Those who follow the golf industry know those honors are as prestigious as it gets.

They also know Northern Michigan has mined a lion's share of golden reviews and major awards in recent years. Other courses honored by Golf Digest and Golf Magazine include The Legend at Shanty Creek, The Monument at Boyne Mountain, The Donald Ross Memorial at Boyne

Highlands, Treetops at Sylvan Resort and the Michaywe Lake Course.

Grand Traverse Resort, home of The Bear, and Boyne Highlands have

earned Golf Magazine's Silver Medal for achievement at the resort level.

In addition, Doak's first Michigan course - High Pointe - is among the top 75 public courses in the country, as selected by Golf Digest.

The honors bestowed upon Black Forest and Elk Ridge are substantial, and the builders and their staffs have every reason to be bursting with pride.

"The reaction to the Golf Magazine recognition has been overwhelming," Smith says. "The phone hasn't stopped ringing with people looking for information about Black Forest. They're calling from everywhere. It really has been quite amazing.

"This will be the first full season Black Forest will be open. We were looking forward to it and now our anticipation has soared."

Black Forest and Elk Ridge are open for public and resort play and both should be high on any list of "must-see" Northern Michigan courses.

More than 80 bunkers dot the par 73 layout at Black Forest, several of them large enough to hide a hot-air balloon.

Smith, president and owner at Wilderness Valley, knew what he was getting when he hired Doak. Smith gave the young golf course designer cart blanche to create, and Doak certainly has.

Black Forest, south of downtown Gaylord on County Road 38 west of Interstate 75, has a special charm. At this point, it goes without saying that the course is terrific. The question, then, is what makes it so? It's long. The bunkers can be intimidating and they're certainly not for weak stomachs. If this is beginning to sound

like one of those, "Oh, sure, we know, a course only Jack Nicklaus and Fred Couples can play and break 80 on," stop it right there.

That's the wonder of the course. For all its intensity, there is a joy to playing Black Forest whether you play like a pro or recreational golfer.

It's an experience well worth the time and trouble. Unlike so many new golf courses, there are a few gimmicks. It's straight-forward and earnest. There is no double jeopardy. What you see is what you get.

That's something even the most casual golfer will discover halfway down the fairway on the par 5 first hole. The crested green sits alone. There are no bunkers acting as sentinel.

No. 2 is a long, rolling par 4 with a fairway that dips from left to right. The card tells you that. What you find out the first time you play the hole is that it's unique in its simplicity.

Two reasonable wood shots by a mid-handicap golfer places the ball just beneath the deep green where an up-and-down is eminently possible. It's not a hole too many golfers are going to reach in regulation but neither will pars be impossible. Many of the greens accept, even encourage, bump-and-run approach shots, which will also delight mid to high-handicap golfers.

If you're into shot values, Black Forest has some dandies. The par 5s require three well-placed shots - especially at No. 16 where water runs down the entire right side - to small, sloping greens.

But if you negotiate the first two shots at the 16th, you're not then standing in the middle of the fairway facing an impossible third shot.

Elk Ridge, owned by Lou and Mary Schmidt of Troy, Michigan based Honey Baked Hams, is located 30 miles east of Gaylord. It's on M-33, just north of M-32 (that's the Gaylord exit on I-75).

The course has four sets of tees, stretching from 5,380 from the red markers to 7,055 from the golds. The middle range is between 6,200 and 6,700.

The Schmidts purchased 2,500 acres of wilderness surrounding Valentine Lake. Lou and architect Jerry Matthews collaborated on the design, and they missed very few elements. Matthews is no stranger to Golf Digest: Elk Ridge is his third "Best New Course" (or runner-up) in the last four years. The others were the Lakes Course at Michaywe and Timber Ridge in East Lansing.

"It's by far Jerry's best effort," says Dan Bialk, Pro Shop manager at Elk shop.

He adds, laughing, "But, remember, I work here."

"It's so beautiful. Every hole is out of the woods. We've had nothing but compliments from people who have played it, people who have played courses all over the country compare it favorably with the best they've played from the standpoint of enjoyment."

There's a lot to talk about Elk

Ridge and the folks sitting in the clubhouse begin by noticing the greenside bunker at the par-3 10th hole. It's in the shape of a pig, in honor of the Schmidts' Honey Baked Hams.

"Everybody gets a kick out of it," Bialk says.

Elk Ridge has it all - water, wetlands and terrain. Some holes follow the 400-acre Valentine Lake, others cut across a trout stream and three holes skirt a 140-acre duck marsh.

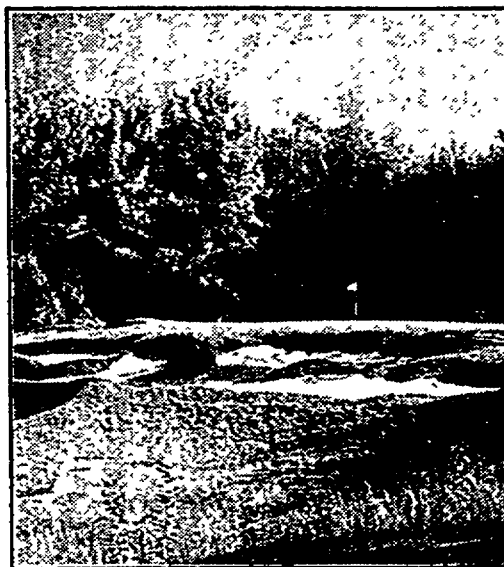
It's all set amidst red and white pines and hardwoods and sheltered wildlife is as much a part of the backdrop as flagsticks and greens.

The signature 16th hole - 381 yards from the tips - bends around the duck marsh and keynotes the impressive stretch of four closing holes, called by some of the finest and most difficult in the midwest.

The 15th hole is a par three from an elevated tee to an elevated green over wetlands its entire length of 184 yards.

At No. 16, the two longest sets of tees require a carry over the duck marsh. You can cut off as much as you like around the dogleg left. A long carry over wetlands on the second shot is the challenge at the 413-yard 17th hole.

The 18th is long and strong at 600 yards, with a double dogleg, and a third shot that will measure at least 150 yards, again over wetlands the final 90 yards or so. It's a handful and a marvelous fishing hole by any measure.

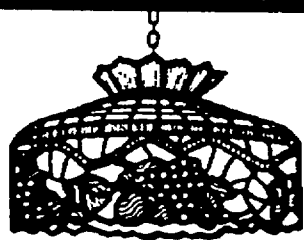

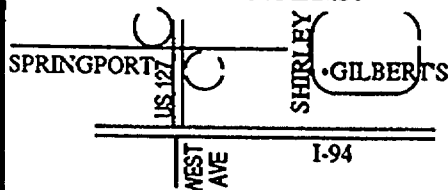

# Fazio-designed course opens in June

## Gaylord, Michigan—

The northern Michigan golfscape will add another jewel to its sparkling crown with the opening of the Tom Fazio-designed course at Treetops Sylvan Resort in Gaylord on June 26.

Treetops golf director Rick Smith said the Fazio course should be in perfect playing condition for the much anticipated opening.

"We had a tremendous grow-in period last summer and this fall, and players will find the Fazio course in splendid condition," Smith said. "They're really going to enjoy playing it."

The 18-hole Fazio design will join the Robert Trent Jones Sr. masterpiece at Treetops, acclaimed as one of the most challenging and beautiful courses in Michigan since its opening in 1987.

Together, the Jones and Fazio courses make Treetops Sylvan Resort one of the premier golf destinations in the country.

Treetops is the first Michigan course built by Fazio, the golf-design superstar, who was voted architect of the year by the American Society of Golf Course Architects in 1990 and 1991 and recently was Golf Digest magazines' overwhelming choice as the game's best modern-day architect.

Said Golf Digest: Fazio designs "courses we all can play and enjoy. He's able to make a hard course into a fun experience. His are dramatic, playable courses."

Playability is the hallmark of all Fazio courses, and that certainly will be the case with Fazio's Treetops design.

Smith says the average golfer will find the Fazio course extremely playable, as well as challenging and memorable in its natural beauty.

The par 72 Fazio design won't be a pushover for the scratch golfer, Smith assured, measuring 6,871 yards from the championship tees, 6,280 from the men's, 5,821 from the middle and 5,045 from the women's tees.

"Treetops Fazio easily could be set up for competition for the Tour player," said Smith, a top teaching professional whose students include PGA Tour winners Rocco Mediate and Billy Andrade.

According to Smith, Treetops Fazio should join some of Fazio's recent designs which already rank among the top 25 courses in the United States (Wade Hampton Golf Club, North Carolina, 17th; and Black Diamond Ranch, Florida, 24th, in Golf Digest's "America's 100 Greatest Golf Courses" rankings).

"I think Treetops Fazio will be ranked in the same category as Wade Hampton and Black Diamond," Smith said.

The Fazio design is located on an 1,100-acre site, Treetops North, in the majestic Pigeon River Valley, just 3 1/2 miles from Treetops Sylvan Resort, site of the Jones masterpiece course.

In addition to the Fazio course, more golf is on the way at Treetops in 1992.

"It will be challenging, dramatic and spectacular," Smith said. "Par will be an exceedingly good score. And your round should only take 1 1/2 hours to complete."

Treetops North also will be the

site of a two acre putting course, The Himalayas, patterned after the one at St. Andrews, Scotland, and also will be home for the Treetops Golf Academy, which features instruction by Smith and academy director Henry Young. Both are scheduled to open in 1992.

And also under construction at Treetops North is another 18-hole championship course, this one designed by Smith, scheduled for play in 1993.

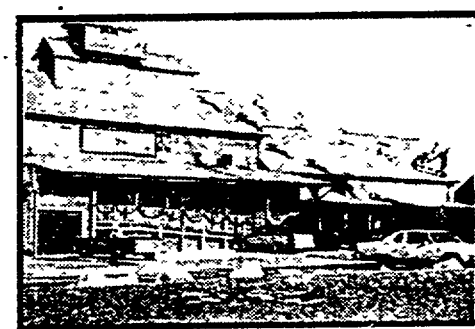

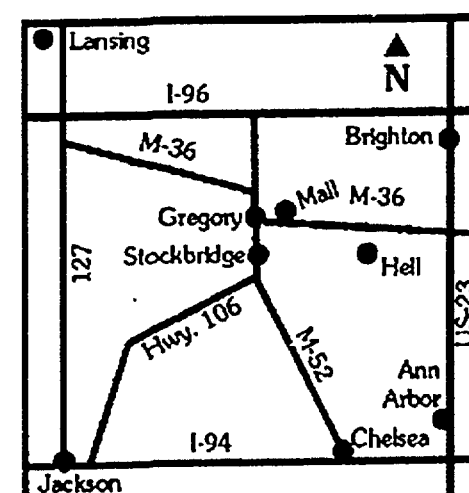

## PGA Seniors tournament secure in Grand Rapids

### Grand Rapids, Michigan—

The Grand Rapids Jaycees, organizers and producers of the First of America Classic, announced an agreement with Grand Rapids Elks Lodge #48 extending the parties long-running relationship.

The new contract secures The Highlands as the PGA Seniors tournament's host course through 1995. The four-year deal is the lengthiest in the 13-year partnership of the two organizations.

"Our relationship with the Elks has been defined and refined over the years," said Terry Roach, chairman of the tournament's Steering Committee. "Such a long-term agreement is evidence we've reached a solid level of comfortability with each other."

# Nothing artificial about duck carver

I met Jim Berryhill last summer at the Cheboygan County Fair. I was hawking raffle tickets for the Northern Michigan Walleye Association and he was on the opposite side of the midway attracting spectators with his duck carving.

A carver myself, I've met and admired a lot of duck carvers over the years, but none has impressed me more than this smiling, retired Air Force colohel who is a regular centerpiece at many of the fairs and craft shows in our neck of the woods. Friendly, articulate, and talented, he now calls one of the Les Cheneaux islands his home. It also happens to be his carving studio.

During a ticket break, I strolled across the midway to watch him work. "That's an interesting duck. What kind is it?" I asked after observing him a bit.

Jim smiled and replied quickly, "I call it a 'Ten Foot Duck.'"

My interest climbed another notch. "Ten Foot Duck? Never heard of it. Kind of looks like a redhead to me."

"It is a redhead...but it's also a Ten Foot Duck," he said. "I call it that because at ten feet it looks life-like. Get any closer and you can see it isn't real, that it's just a carving."

That's another thing about Jim Berryhill that impresses me: he's an honest carver. His ducks may be artificial but not the carver. He doesn't hide flaws. "What you see is what you get."

His style of carving is impressionistic or, as he prefers to call it, "Gist Art." It's the essence, not the detail of the duck, loon, goose, or swan that he tries to capture in his carvings. "In those split seconds that a duck flies past you know instantly that it is a duck, and if you are more observant you may even identify its kind...a mallard, a redhead, bufflehead or whatever. You've quickly identified it because of some general coloration and because of the general shape of the bird. Not because of detailed feathering or intricate colors."

"That's what my style of carving is all about. You can identify it and enjoy it and not get lost in intricacy."

But Berryhill quickly added: "By no means do I suggest the 'gist' style is the best. Each carver has his own style and all of these styles can be appreciated and enjoyed. What pleases the carver is what counts; if others like

it that's a bonus."

Jim Berryhill grew up in the farm country of Iowa, accepted an invitation to go to Wisconsin to temporarily help his brother, an airport manager. But the "temporary job" stretched into years. While helping his brother, he attended college and while in college he joined the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) "to escape the draft." Following college, he became a pilot in the Air Force. He served in a variety of places, including a helicopter air-rescue stint in Vietnam, before retiring 28 years later as a colonel and, ironically, as a director of the ROTC program.

One of Colonel Berryhill's assignments was at Kincheloe in the Upper Peninsula. It was while serving there that he and his family fell in love with Northern Michigan's pristine environment, eventually choosing it as their retirement home.

The solar energy house in which he and his wife, Madge, are now living, is on an island in northern Lake Huron. Berryhill designed and built the house. He's still in the process of finishing it. It's taken longer than his wife and their six grown children expected because, along the way, his joy of carving turned into a thriving business.

The house is on one of the two beautiful islands in the 36-island Les Cheneaux chain that can be reached by car. The Les Cheneaux islands are rich in history. Here more than three centuries ago the explorers and fur

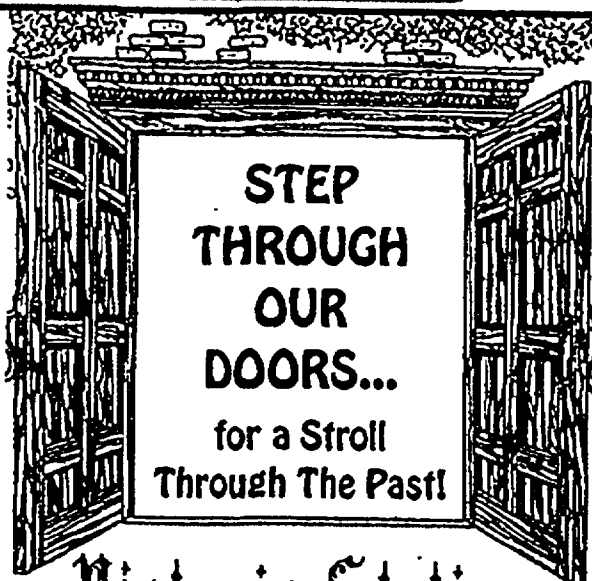

traders used these protected waters in their travels, just as do today's recreational boaters.

Another of the many attractions in this island paradise region at the southeastern edge of the U.P. is Hessel, a tiny but fascinating town where the annual antique wooden boat show is held the second weekend of August.

Although he did not begin carving waterfowl in earnest until 1979 or selling them until six years ago, Berryhill has been carving since before he entered the Air Force. He wears a still visible scar on one of his hands from those early carving experiences.

It was an Air Force friend who interested him in carving ducks.

Soon carving ducks became an obsession. "I traveled a lot with the Air Force and wherever I went I took along my carving tools. I carved half-size ducks then because the smaller size fitted nicely into my briefcase," he explained.

The open briefcase also proved to be an excellent carving platform. "Whenever I was at a terminal waiting for my plane, I would carve to pass away the time. And I was able to do it without creating a mess. All the wood chips fell into the briefcase. I remember one time I even did some carving aboard a commercial plane, letting the chips fall into the briefcase. You should have seen the double-take of the stewardess when she walked up the aisle and spotted me."

Today, in addition to frequent demonstrations and shows, Berryhill regularly teaches carving classes. He attracts students--adults and youngsters--from throughout Northern Michigan. This month, for example, he is teaching classes at Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie. His classes emphasize these three basic elements: Joy of carving with a very sharp tool; how to sharpen tools; and how to carve to a plan.

Most students take his classes to

learn a hobby. Some, however, have gone on to become professional carvers.

Berryhill uses basswood for his ducks. It is a relatively soft, tightly grained wood that carves easily.

He uses his own plastic templates (discarded X-ray film) of plans by the nationally renowned master carver, A. M. Ponte.

Berryhill carves principally with gouges. No power tools. No knives. No files. "I recommend to my students that the tools they use should be big enough so both hands are on the handle while carving. If both hands are on the handle, neither can be in the way of the blade."

He continually stresses sharp tools. "Dull tools are not only difficult to use, they produce poor carvings. With a sharp tool the chips will really fly...almost as fast as the duck."

Unlike some carvers, Berryhill does not carve the head and body of the duck separately. He cuts out head and body blanks, glues the wood blanks together, attaches the now single piece of stock to his bench, and then begins the carving. "By carving the body and head as a single piece I find it easier to form the body; this way the bird has more natural lines and it doesn't end up having a block look about it."

The gouge marks of his tools remain in the wood, forming what appears to be feathers. The gouge marks are purposely made of different sizes to approximate the size and shape of real feathers.

He places a little wood filler into the eye holes, inserts the glass eyes, then covers the entire eye and cavity with wood filler. Once the filler has dried he uses a gouge to remove enough of the filler so that the edges blend into the wood and the area about the eye pupil takes the shape of an eyelid.

Once his carving has been completed, he lightly sands it to remove the sharp edges of the gouge marks. He then coats the entire bird with a thin primer, preparatory to painting. The primer is thin enough so that the grains of the wood are still visible.

"There's nothing artistically professional about my painting," Berryhill insisted. Most of it is done with bold strokes using a one-inch wide brush. The acrylic paint, which dries quickly, is applied in very thin layers. Additional coats are used to darken the paint. After the paint has dried he uses a wet brush to vigorously work the entire duck to lighten the tips of the gouge marks, thus giving the finish an antique appearance.

The final two steps are signing and numbering the duck and then applying a coat of wood wax over the entire bird.

Most of the initial birds carved by Berryhill--perhaps a couple hundred--were not numbered. Most were gifts for friends and many were donated to various organizations for fund-raisers. His carvings have helped boost Red Cross blood donations at Cedarville. It worked this way: each

time during a six-months period someone gave a pint of blood the donor could fill out a raffle ticket for a Berryhill loon. At the end of the six months, a winning ticket was drawn. The more blood donations, the greater chance of winning. And folks in Cedarville rolled up their sleeves often to win Berryhill's carving.

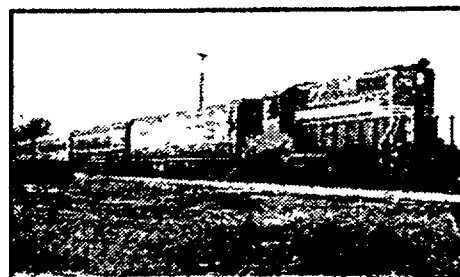

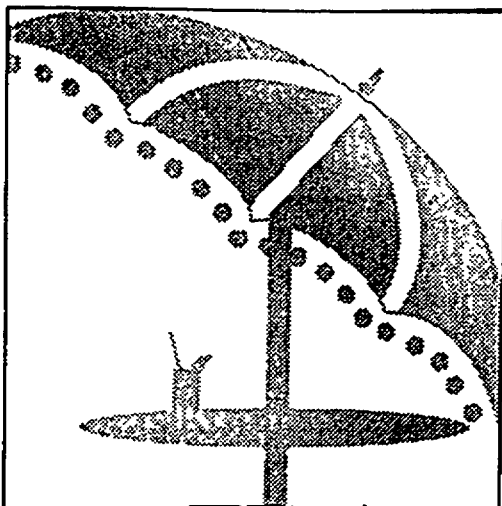

They started off as party boats, to  
be used when the sun crossed the  
yardarm. They were railed platforms

welded to floating aluminum tubes,  
with comfortable seats and small  
outboard motors for putt-putting  
around rivers and inland lakes. They  
were perfect for toasting the sun as it  
set over calm waters during the  
cocktail hour. Pontoon boats, they  
were called. Or, more derisively,  
martini boats.

But now they are evolving into  
something more, and multiplying like  
fruit-flies. Not only have they  
developed some surprising amenities,  
but a more seaworthy derivation of  
them has come along, called a deck  
boat.

"The pontoon market when I  
started was five percent of our  
business," says Dale Chapman, of  
Chapman Sports Center in Lapeer,  
Michigan. "That was 21 years ago.  
Today it's about 35 percent."

Bob Nixon, of Wonderland  
Marina in Mt. Clemens, is a dealer for  
the Starcraft line. "We're going to see  
20 percent more pontoon boats on the  
lakes this season," he says. "They give  
you much more for your money. It  
would cost you \$30,000 for a regular  
cruiser with the same amenities as a  
pontoon boat. They're a great boat for  
families, or two or three couples going  
in together."

They are becoming a lot more  
elaborate than the simple party rafts  
they started out to be. Two of the  
Tracker line of pontoon boats, for  
example, the Party Hut 30 DL and the  
Party Cruiser 32, have fixed cabin  
areas as well as open deck spaces.  
They have stereos, cooking facilities,  
comfortable fold-out beds and toilet  
arrangements similar to the  
accommodations on small houseboats.

Like many other such craft, all of  
Tracker's pontoon boats, from their  
18-foot Bass Buggy fishing boat to  
their 32-foot Party Cruiser, have  
fold-away camper enclosures available  
as options. They can all be turned into  
snug little sleepers, whether afloat or  
on the trailer.

"A lot of people," says Chapman,  
who sells the Tracker boats, "are going  
to screen enclosures, and use the  
pontoon boat like an RV, taking it for  
weekends and the RV life. They have  
little gas grills and portable potties, so  
they can use them for a whole  
weekend. It used to be you had to live  
on a lake to own a pontoon boat. Now  
30 percent of our sales are to transient  
people who buy a trailer and travel  
with them."

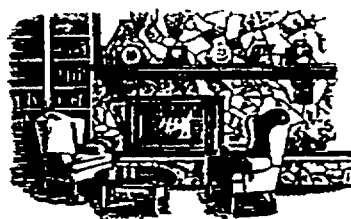
To give you an idea, a standard  
24-foot Suntracker Party Barge with a  
25 HP electric-start Johnson or  
Evinrude outboard can be bought for  
about \$7,500, excluding trailer.

Tracker also has a full line of  
fishing boats, some of which ride on

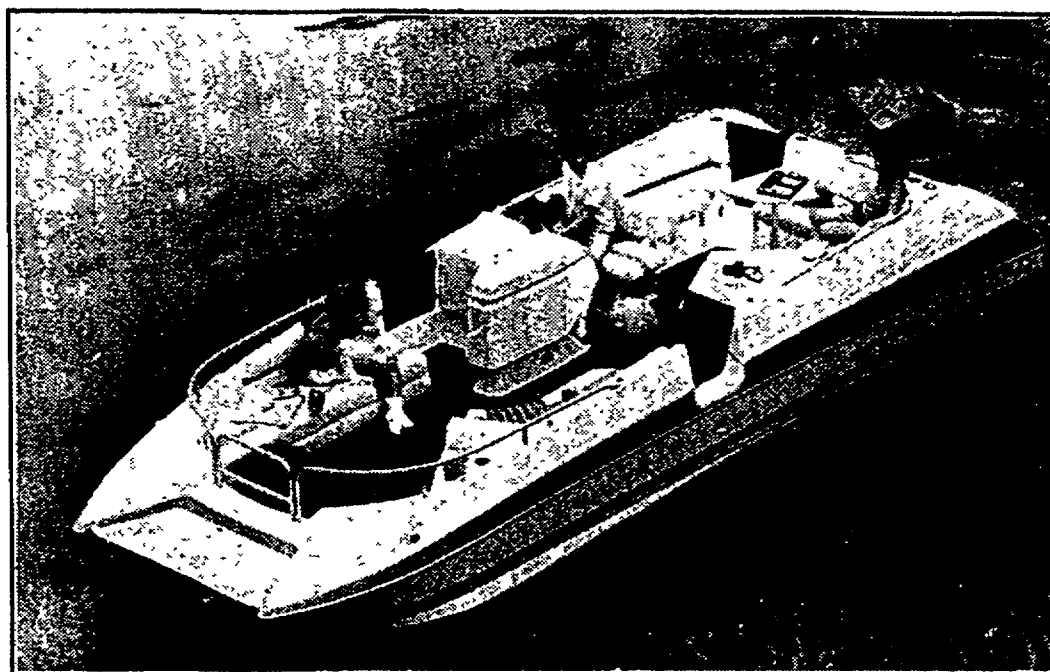
producing them.

Outboard Marine Corporation acquired the Sea Nymph line for its Aluminum Boat Group a few years ago, and sells pontoon boats under the Suncruiser Pontoon label. They are powered, naturally enough, by OMC's Johnson and Evinrude outboards, or by OMC Cobra Stem Drives.

Suncruiser's 24-foot Sundeck 240, they claim, is easily driven at speeds up to 18 mph by a 40-horse outboard, although according to the literature you can use an outboard of up to 115 HP on it, thereby raising maximum speed to about 28 mph. If you are interested primarily in speed, however, you might be better off with some other kind of boat.

Pontoon boats are designed primarily for comfort. The Sundeck 240 features two large front sofas, a sliding bucket helm seat, and a full-width rear sofa that wraps around and comes up the port side. The portable potty is inside a changing enclosure that pops up on a rear sun pad, a common arrangement with pontoon boats. Among other available items are a wet bar with a sink and removable 36-quart cooler hidden underneath. The bar has hand-pumpable water and a built-in ice chest.

OMC has a reputation for sturdy construction, and has carried that tradition into the Suncruisers. The 24-foot Sundeck 240, for example, has 23-inch diameter flotation tubes (sometimes called "logs"), which are at the high end in the industry and furnish superior flotation. They are

made in several separate sections, so if one gets punctured it's the only part that takes on water.

A 24-foot Sundeck with a 40 HP Johnson but excluding a trailer was offered at a boat-show price of \$11,900 at the recent Detroit Boat Show at Cobo Hall.

Like other 'toon-boat manufacturers, OMC has a line of pontoon boats especially designed for fishing.

Starcraft, a division of Brunswick Marine, has come out strong with pontoon boats in the past few years, according to Dale Chapman, one of its dealers. At the moment there are two pontoon fishing-boats in the line, the

Starfish 200 at 20 feet, and the Starfish 240 at 24 feet. They feature, among other comforts, swivel pedestal fishing seats, a trolling motor plug, an aerated livewell, rod holders and a Humminbird LCR fish-finder. The boat show price for the 20-footer was \$5,495 including a 25-horse outboard motor.

Like the others, Starcraft also offers 20 and 24-foot pontoon boats designed for fun other than fishing, although you could certainly fish from them. The Stardeck 240 had a boat-show price of \$9,898 including a 40 HP outboard

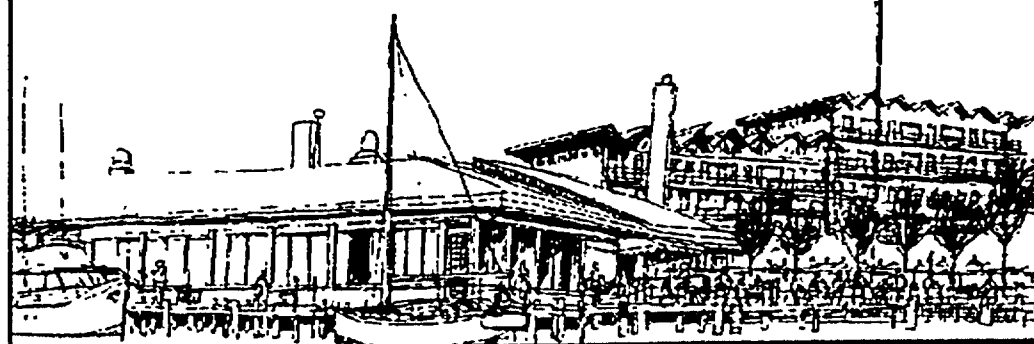

# Betsie Bay marinas are boating hot spots

Frankfort, Michigan—

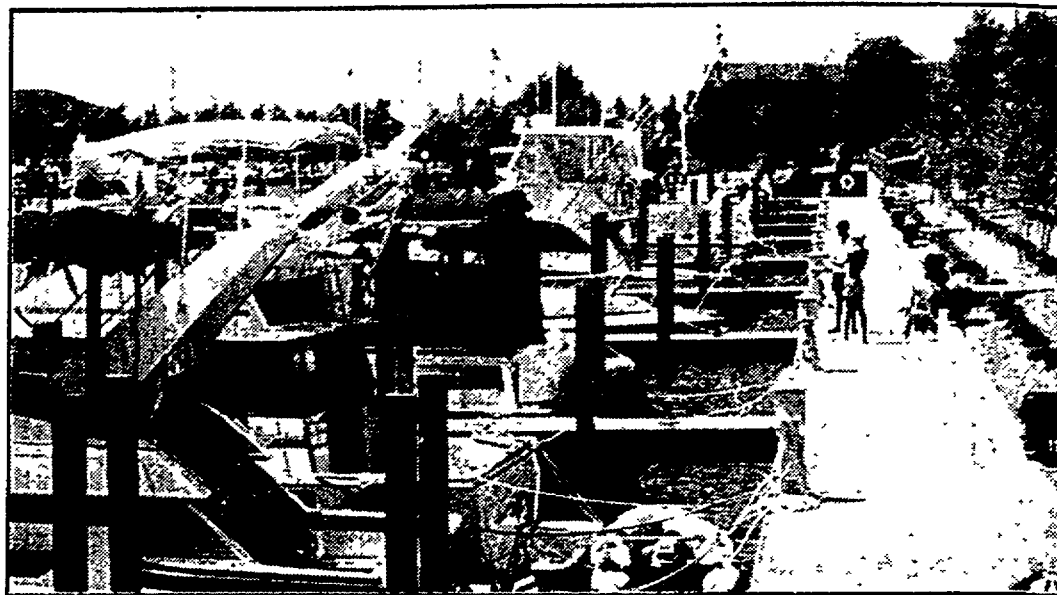
It doesn't take a mathematics whiz to realize that the Betsie Bay harbor of Frankfort-Elberta in beautiful northwestern Michigan is busier than it's ever been before.

Fifteen years ago, only 752 cruisers or sailboats used the harbor, generally regarded by sailing experts as the most protective port on the Great Lakes. Last year, in June, July

and August alone, there were 1700 boats in the newly built Jacobson Marina.

In fact, in the past decade, four new marinas have been built and two others refurbished as there are now over 400 slips, seasonal and transient, in the harbor, says Pete Sandman, Frankfort Industrial Park Development Corp.

The marina development in the

past few years centers around three marinas on the Frankfort side including the Jacobson Marina, a multi-million dollar complex that is setting a new standard for accommodating transient boaters cruising the Great Lakes.

"The transient type of boater is unique to the state of Michigan," says Jacobson Marina manager Buzz Hejl, who explains that the state helped finance a number of municipal boating facilities to cater to the transient yachtsman.

"What makes us unique is that we are a private transient marina and we built a facility to provide every financial feasible amenity that we could," Hejl says of the marina which has been featured in national boating

magazines recently, citing the elaborate bathhouse, lounge and valet assisted boat docking. Fifteen of the 49 slips at Jacobson Marina are 60 feet or more and all have more than capable shoreside power available.

Betsie Bay is also home to the lovely Mitchell and East Shore Marinas.

Mitchell Marina, built by Owosso industrialist William Mitchell, is one of the best landscaped marinas in Michigan and is home to 46 seasonal boaters each year. A second bathhouse was added last year. In 1987 Captain Mike and Rose Bradley opened East Shore Marina featuring 70 lighted boat slips, a multi-purpose building, a display board for the "day's catch" and a pavilion for cleaning fish, Sandman notes.

The Frankfort Municipal Marina, with 69 slips, caters to both seasonal and transient boaters and is a favorite with families as the marina is adjacent to Mineral Springs Park with its many playground and picnic areas. The bathhouse is being greatly enlarged this spring.

In Elberta, one mile to the south, the Betsie Bay Marina has expanded to 101 slips and includes a full service facility including winter storage while the Elberta Village Charter Basin is home to a couple dozen of the best charter boat fishermen on the Great Lakes.

One block from Betsie Bay is the downtown Frankfort shopping district, which has undergone a major face lift recently, with six stores built by Frankfort entrepreneur Bill Walter, and others participating in Cranbrook Institute's Design Michigan program. More than 15 businesses took an active part in reshaping their store fronts during the three year program. New clothing, gift, and antique shops, along with delicatessens, are featured in the expanded downtown section. And whether one is in the mood for a family feast, an elegant dinner or a fireside repast, the area is plentiful in delightful dining options, Sandman notes.

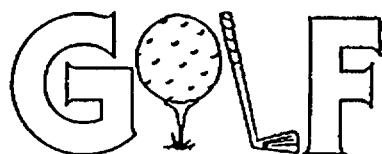

Stardeck 240 on fishing trips up the St. Mary's River with his wife and in-laws, who live near there. "A few years ago we were the only ones up there with a pontoon boat. Last year when we went up there we saw a lot of pontoon boats. You also see a lot of them around AuGres and Caseville."

He adds, "These boats lend themselves to a lot of night time running. You watch the sunset, putz along, turn the stereo on and everybody has a good time. You can raft up four or five pontoon boats and go from one to the other."

In short, they're still good party boats.

Next question: how seaworthy are they?

"You have to hug the shore, that's all," says Starcraft dealer Bob Nixon. "In mild water, for comfort I would just as soon be on a pontoon boat as a cruiser. They can be trailered and are easy to get in and out of the water. But they're not advisable on rough water. You would get water splashing on board."

In an effort to improve performance and safety in choppy waters, J C Manufacturing of North Webster, Indiana, has developed a three-hulled pontoon boat called a Tri Toon. JC also makes a more conventional two-pontoon (Twin Toon) line. The three-logged vessels function as trimarans, for which a

speedier and softer ride is claimed. Topside, they are similar to the two-pontoon variety.

"The Tri Toon is a planing boat with non-symmetrical hulls, which give it more lift," says John Schuch, a representative of the company. "It's the only pontoon boat made as a rough water boat."

Tri Toons come in 22, 26 and 30 foot lengths, and are powered either by Mercruiser Inboard-Outboards or Mariner outboards. The 22-footer runs about \$18,000 equipped with a 130 HP IO, and \$15,200 with a 75-horse outboard. The big 30-footer sells for about \$21,800 equipped with a V610 155-horse IO, and for \$19,150 with a 135-horse outboard.

Another new kid on the block is the deck-boat. It has a topside much like a pontoon boat, but a fiberglass hull underneath. One of the more attractive examples is the 2609 Rendezvous, a 26-footer by Bayliner that rides on a molded stepped catamaran bottom. It has all the comforts seen in the better pontoon boats, plus a portable john enclosed below in one of the molded hulls, an arrangement impossible in a true pontoon boat.

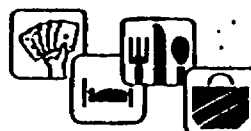
Says Ron Wilson, of Wilson Marine in Brighton, Michigan. "It's got the only portable john I'd feel comfortable using. It's two steps down, a much better arrangement than a shower curtain."

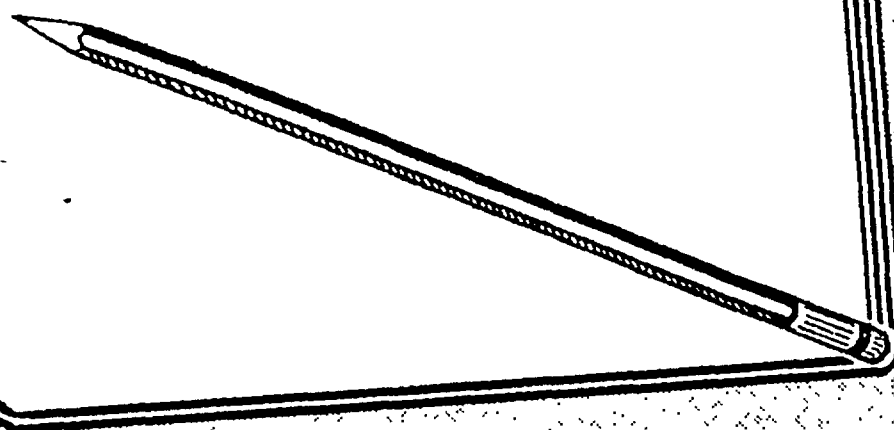

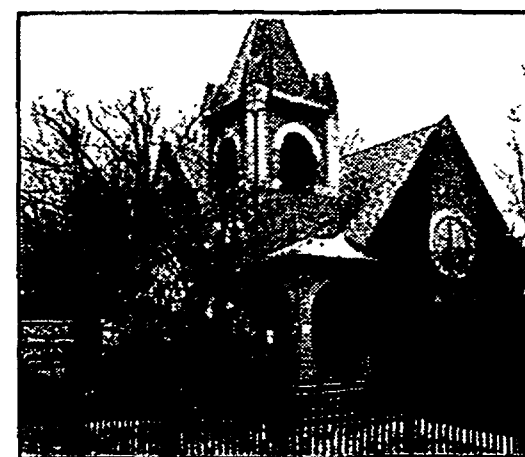

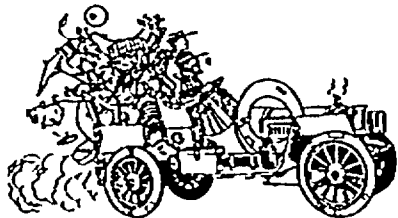

Development of Harbor Village at  
Manistee Beach, Michigan's newest  
waterfront resort, is moving forward  
with construction of the 360 slip

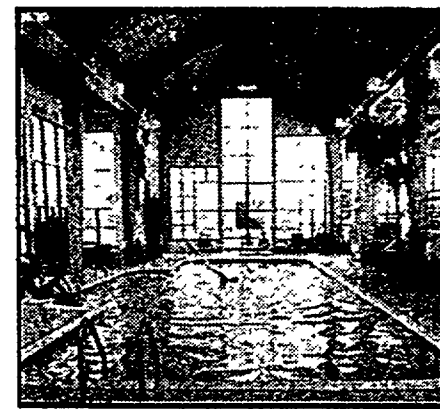

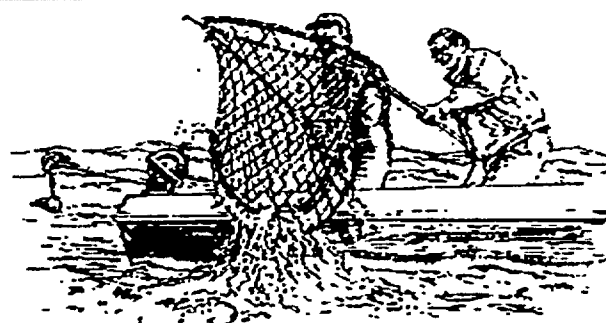

# The foreign destination next door

If you are one of the thousands of Americans who visit Canada every year, you know the travel pleasures offered by our closest "foreign" neighbor. You had to learn a few things about crossing the border,

changing money, driving at 100 kilometers an hour and buying gasoline by the liter, but it was worth it.

In exchange you got the Stratford and Shaw festivals, Niagara-on-the-Lake, historic inns, Victorian B&Bs, lush flower gardens, the changing of the guard and a civilized refuge from the stark realities of the nightly news.

If you travel to Traverse City and

Florida but seldom visit Ontario, you are missing travel experiences you cannot duplicate in the United States.

I've been thinking about that recently because of a seminar hosted by the Canadian Consulate for representatives of Ontario resorts. They came from southwestern Ontario, Georgian Bay, the north woods of Muskoka and the Niagara Peninsula, because they wanted to learn more about you, the American traveler.

My assignment was to tell them why you do or do not want to travel in Canada, and what you expect to find when you get there.

My first response to this invitation was "I can't possibly tell them that," but as I searched the data bank in my head I found several interesting facts that Canadians might not know about Americans.

Ever since we whipped the Redcoats we have been fascinated by anything British and we think of Canada as "a little bit British." (The British think of them as a little bit

American.) Americans and Canadians both love the wilderness, but Canada has more wilderness and fewer people, so they have more access to it. Toronto residents go north to Muskoka lake country; most of us have never heard of it.



We haven't had quite as much experience in "foreign countries" as they do. Most Canadians live within 100 miles of the U.S. border, and their natural directions of travel are either east/west or south, so they start crossing the border as small children. They learn early about miles-per-hour, gasoline by the gallon and changing money.

I explained all this to the resort representatives who attended my seminar at Radisson-on-the-Lake in Ypsilanti, and then I asked them to answer these six questions about their resorts.

Do you offer something my readers can't get in the U.S.? Is it within easy driving distance? Is it part of a destination where travelers can explore other things? Are the costs reasonable? Do Americans know about it? Can you make us comfortable with the idea of crossing the border, changing money, paying what seems like high prices and overcoming the dreaded Goods and Service Tax (GST)?

Is it different? The streets of Stratford and Niagara-on-the-Lake don't look a bit like home. Neither do the rooms in the old mill converted to a hotel in Elora or those in the pillared grandeur, straight out of *Gone With the Wind*, of Langdon Hall in Blair.

Can we get there? Most of southwestern Ontario is within four hours drive of the Detroit-Windsor border crossing. Places like the Delawana Inn, in Honey Harbor, on Georgian Bay, are for those who go and stay for a week. Places like the Viamede Resort, outside of Peterborough, are accessible if you are traveling east on a longer trip, maybe to celebrate the 250th anniversary of Montreal this year.

Is the destination interesting?

From the Grandview Inn, in Huntsville, you can drive Highway 60 through the campgrounds, inns and attractions of Algonquin Provincial Park, which covers 3000 square miles. You can canoe its lakes and rivers or hike its thousand miles of trails.

"Do Americans know about your resort or your area?" I asked. Let me ask you, dear reader, do you know about the Millcroft Inn in Alton, Ontario? Did you know that Langdon Hall is a Relais et Chateau hotel? Have you ever heard of or visited the Muskoka area? Gone east as far as Ottawa or west into Lake-of-the-Woods country. That is all in Ontario.

#### TIPS BEFORE YOU GO:

Gasoline is cheaper in the U.S. so fill up before you go. Don't run out of gas, as I once did, because the Canadian gas pump read 10; I forgot I was putting in 10 liters and not 10 gallons!

Ask your chosen destination to quote you a package price that includes all taxes. When you enter Canada, ask for a brochure that tells you how to get a refund on the GST paid on accommodations and purchases; you can process it at the border on the way home.

Most shops in an area give the same exchange, but bank rates differ. Ask. Save money by drinking good Canadian beer or rye instead of imported American bourbon.

Telephone toll free (800) ONTARIO for more information about Ontario inns, tourist attractions and special 1992 events.

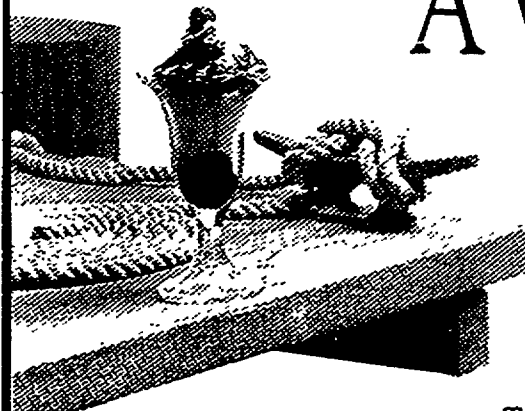

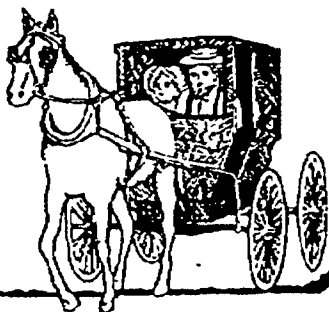

48647 for details on this year's tours.  
There's no special effort made for photographers, and you're not allowed to tape record their calls, but seeing the habitat, learning about the massive effort being made to save these shy birds, and understanding their link in the great circle of life is a rewarding experience, and sometimes a humbling one.

Grayling is located on I-75. You'll drive east on M-72 to reach Mio.

There are plenty of accommodations and restaurants in Grayling, fewer in Mio. If you're near Fairview, be sure and have a meal at the Fairview Cafe, owned by a Mennonite couple, that features hearty meals and homemade bread and pies.

**FLETCHER FLOODWATERS:**  
Situating on the border of Alpena and Montmorency counties in northeastern lower Michigan is a haven for osprey. The flooded over area, thick with tree stumps and shallow in depth, is the site of an osprey banding study that's gone on for several years. The "fish hawks" as they're sometimes called, can be seen at their nest sites as well as hunting over nearby waters. From I-75, drive east from Gaylord on M-32, or from Alpena, drive west on M-32.

The large, somewhat untidy nests are visible from a distance.

**SAGINAW BAY:** This is a very large, sheltered bay encompassing several smaller bays, with a variety of habitat, ranging from marshy lowlands to sandy spits jutting into the Lake Huron waters. Located on lower Michigan's east side, look for the state's distinctive Thumb on the map. On the east side of the bay, the Thumb side, travel to Fish Point in Tuscola county for glimpses of shorebirds and waterfowl. Fish Point is a small peninsula across from Sebewaing. Expect to see Canada geese, whistling swans, greater yellowlegs, redheads and maybe a ruff in the cattail marshes and flooded fields.

On the bay's westerly side, near Linwood in Bay County, you'll find Nayanquing Point Wildlife Area, along old US-23. Take Kitchen Rd. to the very end and you'll be in the parking lot. You may add various gulls, terns, shorebirds and maybe a black-crowned night heron to your life list from these vantage points.

A bit north, at Tawas Point (the northernmost edge of Saginaw Bay), follow signs to Tawas State Park off US-23 north of East Tawas. You'll drive out to the point, a sandy spit into the waters of Lake Huron near the lighthouse and the Coast Guard station.

You might see a Bonaparte's gull, piping plovers, warblers, orioles, hummingbirds, flycatchers and even red knots.

This is a lovely spot for a picnic lunch, and there are plenty of accommodations and restaurants in the Tawas. You'll also find one or two piers into the lake and a nice beachside walkway between the twin cities.

**WARREN WOODS AND**

**GRAND MERE:** If the elusive and rare pileated woodpecker is one you're seeking, try Berrien County's Warren Woods Natural Area. It's a virgin forest known as the place to see warblers and other songbirds that are generally found a lot farther south. You might also sight a barred owl or a whip-poor-will.

During spring migration, look in the area where the Galien River crosses Lakeside Rd. You might glimpse a Kentucky warbler.

Grand Mere, along Lake Michigan, boasts three small lakes, forested sand dunes and beaches. Watch for loons during migration, and you may also see cormorants, herons, ducks and various gulls. Among songbirds, warblers are common.

From Interstate 94 take the Stevensville exit and go west a half-mile to the north and the middle lakes as well as Lake Michigan beaches. Dunes and trails through the woods are a bit south of this area. About three miles south of Livingston Rd., and six miles east of this road is a marshy area where you might see various shorebirds during migration.

Almost anywhere you combine lightly wooded cover, a sandspit into open water, and springtime, you'll find birds in Michigan. Enjoy them!

# Treasure trove of gift shops unearthed in southern Michigan

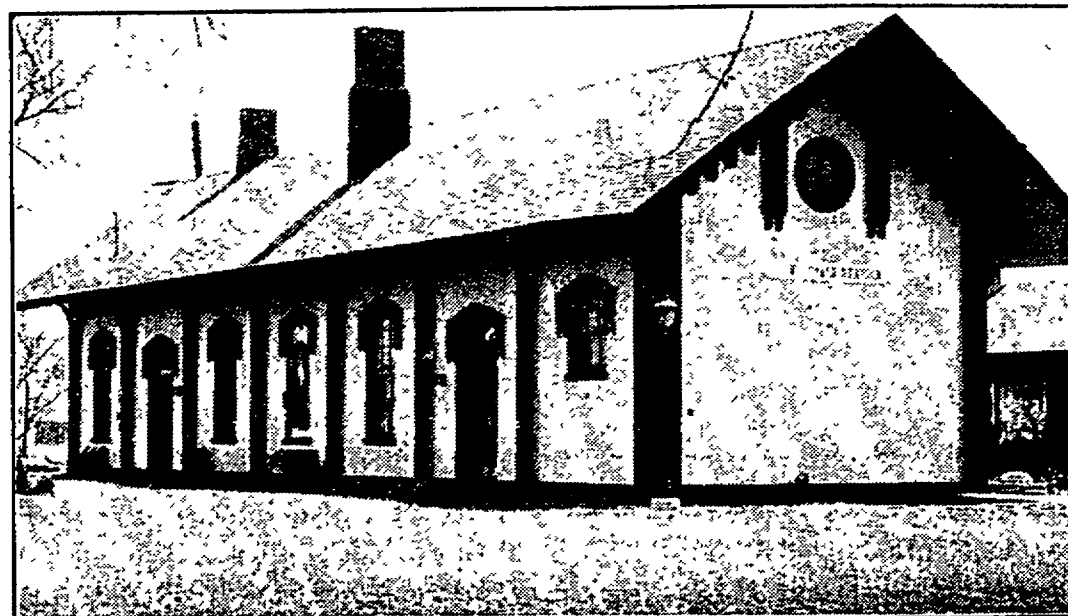
So far, March hasn't exactly been coming in like a lion. In fact, March 3 was such a beautiful day I just had to get out of the office. And what better way to spend a warm, sunny day than driving around, looking for new and unique places to shop!

*Keepsakes* is a fairly new shop located in Homer, Michigan at the intersection of M-60 and M-99 South. The two-story building is blue with raspberry trim.

I arrived a few minutes early. Owners Sharon Cubbon and Heidi Brown and mascot Shelby the dog were just getting ready to open shop for the day, so I had a few minutes alone to talk with them.

They told me the story of how they got into the antique business (Heidi was into selling them and Sharon, buying them). And how they started *Keepsakes* (they fell in love with this building, an old gas station and garage, and opened up shop a year later). "We spent the whole year before we opened collecting things for the store," Heidi said.

And are they ever good at collecting things! They've got things in every nook and cranny, which makes for fun shopping! I enjoyed walking around finding things, picking them up for a closer look.

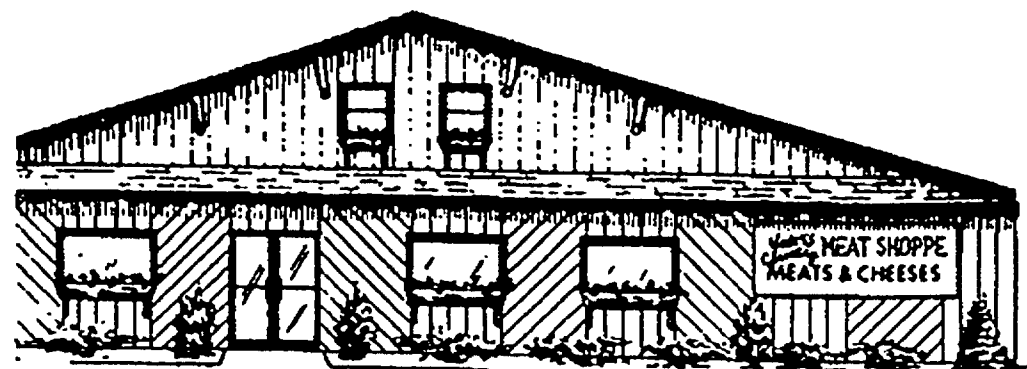

ornaments; a kitchen corner with a collection of special spice and cookie mixes and kitchenware; toys, including popular troll dolls; furniture; woven blankets and quilts; glassware; candles; tinware and much more. Keepsakes' hours from January through April are Sunday, noon to 5 p.m. and Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Summer hours begin in May and are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday through Saturday.

There's plenty of parking in the rear—you could park a bus back there! If, in your travels, you find yourself in the area, stop by and say "hi!" If you're hungry, Sharon and Heidi will tell you how to get to Bernie's for the best burger in town, or to Cascarelli's for their favorite pizza. For more information, call (517)568-3629.

Victoria Station is located in downtown Coldwater, Michigan. From I-69, take exit 12 (Coldwater) west into town. Turn left at South Monroe Street. That'll take you straight to it.

Victoria Station was the Coldwater train depot in 1883. When Nancy Vanderbosch-Smith found the depot two years ago, it had been vacant for many years, and according to Nancy, it was a real mess.

Nancy and her husband Stephen bought the depot in June, 1990, and spent the summer restoring it. It was an intense effort, "seven days a week, 12 hours a day," said Nancy, who wanted everything authentic, right down to the paint job (light green with dark green trim). Victoria Station opened its doors that September.

What will you find at Victoria Station? Victorian atmosphere, including pretty music, the sweet smell of herb and flower potpourri, and a feast for the eyes on beautiful things that you aren't likely to find anywhere else. Like fairies, for example!

Associate Theresa Rice is the master fairy crafter at Victoria Station. It's amazing what she can do with moss, twigs, fur and imagination! During my visit, I witnessed a fairy creation and found out just how easy it is to get caught up in the enchanting world of fairies! The upper loft is full of her magical creations, and you'll find others throughout the store.

During the summer, children can explore the Fairy Knoll outside Victoria Station. This year, Nancy and Theresa will hold their first Fairy Festival on May 30. Children are invited to enjoy story tellers and dancing, find hiding fairies, and munch on tea and cookies. Of course, there will be fairy dust in the air!

Also unique to the shop are elegant wreaths and other dried floral arrangements created with lace and silk, dried flowers and herbs, grape vine and moss, grasses and straws, berries, bows and just about anything else you can think of. You can choose from a selection of creations at the shop, or have an arrangement created just for you. "We grow most of the herbs and roses we use ourselves," Nancy mentioned.

With Victor and Victoria, the official Victoria Station cats, I toured the shop. Among the interesting things I found were a 6-foot-7-inch Santa with a sculpted face, clad in vintage fabrics and furs (along with decorated Christmas trees and a collection of Santas up in the loft); pewterware, including gin bottle neck medallions; a good selection of framed drawings of fruits and flowers; gourmet preserves and vinegars, flavored coffees and teas and herb seasoning mixes; copper pots and pans; bird houses; and hand-painted porcelain Easter eggs.

Victoria Station's hours are from noon to 5 p.m. on Sunday, and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. For more information, call (517)278-4947.

If you're traveling in the area, consider staying at Coldwater's Chicago Pike Inn, a bed and breakfast housed in a turn-of-the-century mansion.

Bretty's, the shop with the Colonial lean, is the Americana collectors dream. Located four miles east of Jonesville, Michigan on U.S. 12 at the blinker, it's easy to get find.

And well worth the trip. The building itself is interesting. According to owner Cynthia Broesamle, Bretty's home is a fieldstone school house dating back to 1854.

Cynthia got the idea for her shop when she was trying to decorate her home. She had trouble locating the

Americana and folk art designs she wanted. "I said 'if I ever have a shop, I'm going to sell everything I can't find,'" she said. Now that she has her shop, she does just that. "We do get a number of people in here who are looking for something specific. If we don't have it, we help them find it," she added.

In fact, Cynthia and her associates take the whole month of February to find things. They close up the shop and comb the East Coast looking for the unique, quality merchandise Bretty's is known for.

Expanding current lines is another way Bretty's serves its customers. Merchandise being expanded this spring includes pottery, rugs, lampshades, stencils and lanterns.

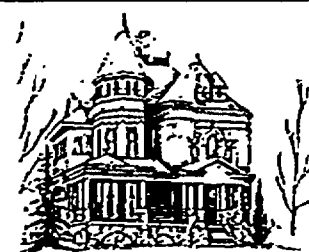

# Lake State looks great from bicycle

There is no better bicycling country than Michigan's scenic and gently rolling two peninsulas located in the heart of the Great Lakes Basin.

Michigan has four national forests, three national parks, 96 state parks, and 29 state forests, which together cover more than 12 million acres and contain 383 campgrounds. There is plenty of space for bicyclists to rest and camp.

Because tourism is one of the state's top three industries, private accommodations are available everywhere for touring cyclists. Many counties and townships also provide parks and camping facilities.

Michigan's total coastline length is second only to Alaska's. The state of Michigan has 11,000 lakes and 36,000 miles of rivers and streams, always putting bicyclists within twenty minutes of water. The state's more than 700 registered historical sites and historic Mackinac Island (with no motor vehicles) offer an unhurried view of the past. Autumn color, fishing, swimming, and boating are all within range of the bicyclist.

Although many state highways carry volumes of motor traffic too heavy to be practical for bicycle riding, the state's counties maintain a system of approximately 88,600 miles of county roads throughout both peninsulas, many of which make

excellent bike routes. These roads not only promote opportunities for scenic bike riding, but also provide access to recreational areas.

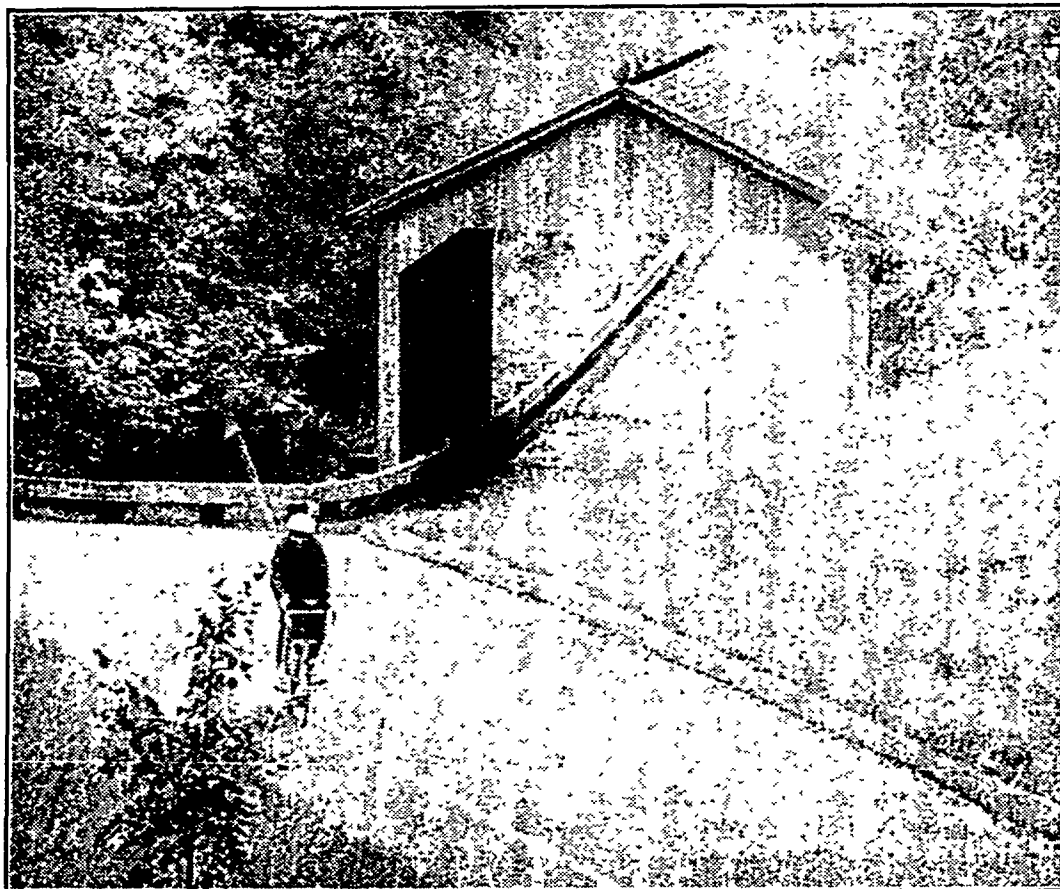
Each year more and more people are discovering the advantages of exploring Michigan by bicycle. Quiet rural roads, fall color tours, scenic bikeways, beautiful historic homes, miles of shoreline, white beaches, lakes streams, woodlands, farms and backwoods areas are all a part of biking in Michigan.

# Ballyhooed and battered, Oscar marches on

## Documentary nods draw controversy

The Academy Awards. They've survived world wars and depressed economies, the birth of television and the demise of the studio system. They've endured streakers, long acceptance speeches and even Rob Lowe's singing.

The much-criticized, highly prized and seemingly indestructible Oscars make their annual appearance on Monday, March 30, when ABC presents "The 64th Annual Academy Awards." Billy Crystal returns as host and his quick-witted irreverence is sure to alleviate (though not eliminate) the show's trademark dull spots.

Though no one film dominates the nominations, hits like "Silence of the Lambs" and "JFK" have several chances at grabbing a statuette. Jodie Foster is favored to win Best Actress, particularly "Thelma and Louise" fans split their votes equally between stars Susan Sarandon and Geena Davis. In the Best Actor category, Anthony Hopkins seems sure to win for his chilling "Lambs" performance.

There's no consensus in the directing division, however. Politics could make or break Oliver Stone, perhaps clearing a path for Jonathan Demme ("Lambs") or even John Singleton, director of "Boyz n the Hood."

One category that annually draws fire is Best Documentary Feature. The controversy started in 1988 with Errol Morris' "The Thin Blue Line." Audiences and critics raved, but the Academy was cool, allegedly because of the film's re-enactment and high-drama approach. Then came Michael Moore's "Roger & Me," another surprisingly popular film for a genre that normally can't get bookings. Yet it, too, was snubbed by Oscar.

This year, three more films are notable for their absence from the nominees list: "Hearts of Darkness," about the stormy making of Francis Coppola's "Apocalypse Now"; Jenny Livingstone's "Paris Is Burning," examining gay nightlife in New York City; and Errol Morris' latest, "A Brief History of Time," based on

the popular book by physicist Stephen Hawking. As a result, the media and the movie community have been sharply critical of the Academy.

"Unfair," says veteran filmmaker Sy Gomberg, co-chairman of the committee that issues the nominations. "In 27 nights, from October to February, we see more movies than the general membership sees in a year," says Gomberg. He explains that the committee, whose 50 members boast expertise in all areas of filmmaking, considered 64 films this year. People who decry the eventual list of nominees, says Gomberg, "didn't see the 15 other movies that were absolutely great."

Gomberg points with pride to the range of topics examined in this year's spate of Oscar hopefuls. "Death on the Job" (which has aired on HBO) looks at companies that have placed their employees in dangerous, sometimes fatal, situations. A chilling portrait of prison life is offered in "Doing Time: Life inside the Big House," while "The Restless Conscience" sheds light on resistance activities within Hitler's Germany. "Wild By Law" chronicles the efforts of three men who fought to preserve portions of America's vanishing wilderness. The fifth nominee is "In the Shadows of the Stars," a look behind the scenes at the hopes and dreams of those who sing in the chorus of The San Francisco Opera.

The real problem, Gomberg declares, is the paucity of outlets for documentary films. "We all feel that we're dealing with a very important film art form that is not being seen," he says. Noting this year's 50th anniversary of the documentary category, Gomberg adds, "It's a shame...these films must be shown."

Billy Crystal once more takes the reins as host for "The 64th Academy Awards" airing live on ABC on Monday, March 30. A highlight of

this year's ceremony will be the presentation of the Irving G. Thalberg Memorial Award to filmmaker George Lucas.

## WLAFL finds more fans in Europe than U.S.

Last year, the United States staged a successful cultural invasion of Europe with the debut of the World League of American Football. However, the troops weren't as successful on the home front where they faced competition from baseball and basketball as well as having to contend with America's annual migration to outdoor activities.

But, since Americans have an insatiable appetite for sports, the WLAFL is back for a second season, with Saturday games on the USA network and Sunday matches on ABC. This week, ABC viewers will see either the Ohio Glory taking on the Orlando Thunder or the New York/New Jersey Knights against the London Monarchs.

The biggest challenge facing this made-for-television league is the absence of a grass roots following in the United States. In contrast, the WLAFL exploded onto the European sports scene where the fans are discovering this American game without the league being saddled with a September through January viewing tradition or superior competition from the NFL. The Barcelona, London and Frankfurt, Germany teams averaged over 33,000 fans a game, and London's 21-0 victory over Barcelona in the first World Bowl drew 61,108 in attendance, just slightly less than the first Super Bowl.

### Peck and Bacall together on film again

In what promises to be a great rematch, Lauren Bacall and Gregory Peck have been signed for the film adaptation of Tina Howe's stage play *Painting Churches*, which will premiere on TNT in 1993. Peck and Bacall have not appeared together in a film since 1957's *Designing Woman*. *Painting Churches* will mark the first TV-movie assignment for director Arthur Penn (*The Miracle Worker*).

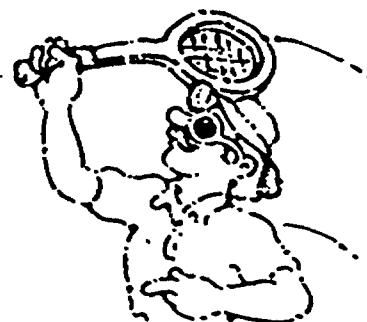

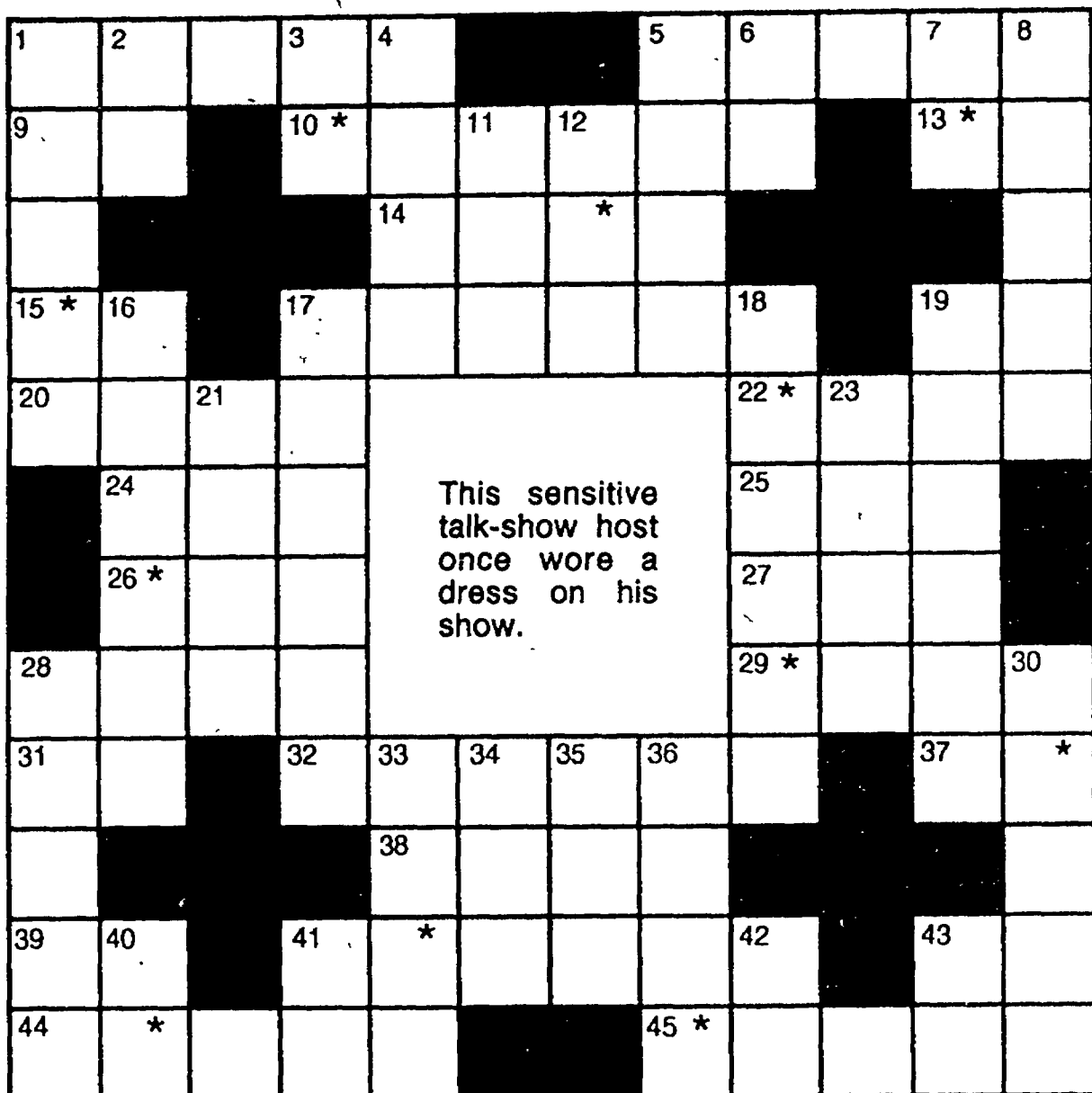

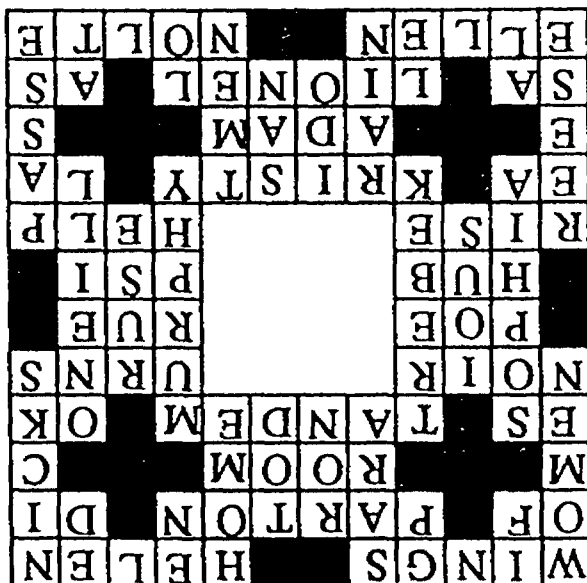

## Boys tune in to see 'Clarissa'

Flying in the face of conventional network wisdom and into the hearts of young male viewers, *Clarissa Explains It All* basks in the ratings sunshine each Sunday afternoon on Nickelodeon.

Although girls seem willing enough to watch programs with male heroes, shows featuring female lead characters traditionally haven't appealed much to schoolboys. With *Gidget* and *Punky Brewster* to choose from, who could blame them?

But Clarissa Darling (Melissa Joan Hart) is changing that image. The 14-year-old heroine of *Clarissa Explains It All* has plenty to say for herself, and a clever way of saying it as well. Frequently facing the camera and using a visual aid or two to get her point across, Clarissa is an oasis of wit and irony in a family where mom consistently cooks up tofu-string bean casserole and little brother pleads his case for a new bike with Chinese proverbs.

The show's dialogue moves at a brisk pace, and young Hart does an admirable job of delivering her lines. The topical conversations and jack-in-the-box visuals give *Clarissa Explains It All* a fresh, up-to-the-minute feel. Anyone who thinks boys wouldn't tune in to see a smart, pretty girl like Clarissa needs to let her explain a few more things to them.

### Lavin returns to TV in dual role

Linda Lavin spent the first part of her life making music — first as a would-be concert pianist, and from high school onward, as a musical-theater actress. After years in New York and a stint with Chicago's Second City players, Lavin earned a recurring role on *Barney Miller*.

In 1976 Lavin won the lead in *Alice*, which was a top-10 hit on CBS for nine seasons. During that time she turned her hand to directing and producing as well.

After the end of *Alice's* run, Lavin returned to New York, where she won several awards, including a Tony, for her performance in Neil Simon's *Broadway Bound*. Last season, she was executive producer of the critically acclaimed "Sunset Gang" on PBS' *American Playhouse*.

Lavin returns to series television Tuesday, March 24, as star and executive producer of *Room for Two*. She plays Edie Kurland, the widowed mother of a Manhattan career woman (Patricia Heaton). Edie leaves Dayton, Ohio, to take a job on the TV wake-up show her daughter produces, and the two get to know one another in a new setting. Thirteen episodes of *Room for Two* have already been taped.

Ironically, ABC's version of *Broadway Bound* also airs this week. Lavin isn't in the cast, and though critics may deplore the loss, this mellowing star says she's content.

## African-American art accessible to all

### 'Kindred Spirits' offers invigorating insights

"I found the art to be in the people," says sculptor/painter Charles Searles, describing the 1970 trip to Nigeria, Ghana and Morocco that changed his life and work. "It was a living art."

Searles is one of 48 artists whose work was featured in the 1989 exhibit "Black Art — Ancestral Legacy: The African Impulse in African-American Art." Assembled at the Dallas Museum of Art, the exhibition traveled to other American museums where it met enthusiastic public and critical response.

PBS captures the spirit of those vibrant artworks in *Kindred Spirits: Contemporary African-American Artists*. The special airs Wednesday, March 25, on most PBS stations.

Though it cannot to recreate the experience of viewing over 150 works of art in 30 minutes of TV time, *Kindred Spirits* introduces us to the artists themselves and the ways in which their heritage informs their

creative work. "They've made contact with something that has grounded them," says Dallas art curator Alvia J. Wardlaw of these artists. They're asking us, she says, to think about what is in our past, our background, that has made us what we are.

Writer and professor Maya Angelou (*I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*) also participates in the program, offering insights on art and the universality of creative work.

"What one really is brought to see," says Angelou, "is this statement: 'I am a human being; nothing human can be alien to me.'"

Artists featured in the program include 74-year-old Bessie Harvey, who uses birds to symbolize the freedom of the spirit in surprising, playful pieces made from tree stumps and limbs found near her Tennessee home. Also profiled is John Biggers, whose enormous murals combine striking, ancestral images with scenes from modern life. Of the black artist, Biggers says, "His medium is not primarily visual. Consciousness is his permanent reservoir."
