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Committee reports on township perks

Township taxpayers plunked down tens of thousands of dollars for part-time elected officials' perks during the past decade.

Part-timers by design, supervisors, clerks, and treasurers in 1980s and 1990s Northville Township harvested financial add-ons ranging from township-paid meals to educa-

tional, health, vehicle, car telephone, and pension benefits.

Those perks, some masked, others more obvious, supplemented salaries that may have appeared to taxpayers more modest than facts bear out.

Starting tonight, that all may change.

The township board this evening (7:30 p.m. at township hall) is scheduled to hear recommendations from

a three-member committee charged with reviewing township elected officials' salaries and benefits. If adopted by the board, those recommendations would take effect in 1993, or after the 1992 general election.

Committee members would not talk specifics this week, preferring to first pass their findings to the board. But one committee member hunted

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Fuel leaks to drain city

Fuel leaks at Northville City's Department of Public Works yard may cost the city more than \$100,000.

That's how much the city has budgeted for fiscal year 1992/1993 for ongoing testing and cleanup of fuel that apparently leaked from an underground storage tank before its removal in 1989.

The 550-gallon diesel fuel tank, the apparent source of much of the contamination, was replaced that

October with a 6,000-gallon tank.

A 1,000 gallon gasoline tank had been replaced with a 10,000-gallon version in 1988.

The city, which has already spent more than \$20,000 on preliminary site testing this fiscal year, has projected \$30,000 in total expenses by June 30. An additional \$100,000 has been budgeted for testing and potential soil removal in the 1992/1993 fiscal year beginning July 1.

DPW Superintendent Ted Mapes said the problem was first unearthed in 1989 when the old diesel tank in

the center of the DPW yard at 650 Doherty Drive was removed.

"They found some problems in the soil," Mapes said. "We don't know where we're at yet until the testing is started."

Mapes added that the \$100,000 figure may be much more than required for the testing and cleanup. "We have no idea what it's going to cost, but we have to prepare to deal with it, whatever it is," he said. "We're waiting to hear from the DNR as to

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Schools scramble for vote answers

In the aftermath of last week's millage defeat, Northville schools barely have time to pick themselves up and dust themselves off before hitting the campaign trail again.

The district's Strategy 1 committee met Tuesday night for the first time since the millage defeat to discuss the vote and offer suggestions for restructuring the second millage proposal. The district is on a tight schedule as the new proposal must be finalized and approved by the school board this Monday in order to meet state guidelines for a June 8 vote.

"We are being blunt," Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said. "We have to be. We just haven't got any time to pussy foot around."

Even with the deadline for the ad-

dit language nipping at their heels, district officials are awaiting the results of their voter surveys before making a decision on the content of the second millage proposal. Committee members also refrained from making any more recommendations until the voices of the voters are heard this evening.

Tonight school board members will staff seven phone lines at the school offices for two hours to field residents' reactions to the failed millage.

"We are fighting the times and politics here," said David Bolitho, assistant superintendent for administrative services. "What's going on at the state and national level has put people in a 'no' mood. It's pretty clear that 'no' mood is our opposition."

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City assessing plan draws council fire

The Northville city administration came under fire from the city council Monday night for its hiring of a part-time assessor.

Council members expressed concern that they were not notified of the hire beforehand, while one blasted the assessing department as a whole for perceived cost overruns under Mark Christiansen's command.

Gail Zbranchik, an assessor with prior experience in West Bloomfield and Livonia, was hired by the city to perform field inspections of Wayne County homes. She began work Monday in Christiansen's direction.

The news came as a surprise to some council members, who had not been notified that the contract had been awarded.

Mayor Chris Johnson chided City Manager Gary Word and Chief Financial Officer Mark Christiansen for not informing the council in advance, saying, "In the event that the council didn't agree, you have a potentially serious problem."

Council Member Paul Folino took the criticism further, calling the hire another example of an assessing system that is costing the city much more than originally planned.

Folino charged that the city's assessing costs had gotten "completely

Businesses need to eye future — survey

Doing business the old-fashioned way may not keep Northville's downtown viable into the 21st century, according to local residents.

Respondents to a recent survey on downtown Northville and the city's business district cleaning and a good place to shop, but many cited the need for different types of stores and more parking spaces.

The survey, published in The Northville Record between March 12-23, was the work of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce's Business Development and Retention Committee. The BDRC's goal is

to draw new businesses into downtown Northville and help preserve those that are already here.

Most of the survey's 180 respondents said they regularly shop in Northville, and cite the downtown's convenience, selection and quality as part of its attraction. Unique gifts and friendly and courteous service were other reasons cited.

Those who do not like shopping downtown complained of limited parking, a lack of choice among different stores, and high prices. To encourage diversity, they suggested the addition of women's and children's clothing outlets, and video, music

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
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

Schools to share plans with state

Educators at the state level want to know the secrets behind the success of two school-improvement plans in the Northville system.

Both Cooke Middle School and Northville High School will be among districts across the state sharing their school improvement plans Monday in Lansing with state educators.

Sponsored by the State Board of Education, School Improvement Council and the Michigan Department of Education, Monday's round-table discussions seek to educate state school officials about what's going on in Northville classrooms.

Jeff Radwanski, principal at Cooke Middle School, said the invitation to participate in the program is an honor that recognizes the strides Northville's improvement plans have made in the classroom.

"The state is trying to find out about school improvement plans statewide," Radwanski said. "We've been chosen to participate and to share our plans with other districts and to generate ideas."

Under Public Act 25, districts were required to develop and implement a school-improvement plan. Since the reopening of Cooke Middle School, the 1991-92 school year was the first year Radwanski had to comply with the state mandate.

Radwanski said he plans to highlight the use of student assignment books as the core of his 10-minute presentation next Monday. Northville High School Principal Thomas Johnson said he and members of his school improvement team have yet to nail down the featured points of his presentation, but he thought it would center on outcomes-based education

and the school's plan to meet their desired exit outcomes.

At Cooke the use of student assignment books, supplied by Cooke's PTSA, required students to log daily homework assignments inside. Teachers and parents both monitor assignment books so each keeps abreast of students' workloads and progress.

For Radwanski, response to the books echoes the desired outcomes stated in the school improvement plan.

"Our effective goal was to improve student self-concept," he said.

A recent survey of CMS students, staff, and parents concluded that assignment books were doing just that.

According to the study, 50 percent of the school's staff said the books have increased students' academic performance. Less than half or 45.6 percent of the staff said the books increase the number of completed assignments. More than 60 percent of the teachers said the books kept teachers in touch with parents. And 63 percent of the staff want to use the books next year.

Students agreed that the books were useful. Sixty-two percent of them said it kept them more organized, and 64.2 of the said they used their books regularly. Sixty-one percent of the parents who responded to the survey said it helps them monitor their children's workloads. And more than half of the parents surveyed said the books help their students become more confident in their studies.

"With the assignment books students are more organized, they do better and they feel better," Radwanski said. "The books give kids a vehicle to take work with them at the end of the day."

Man found in bushes had eight arrest warrants

City police arrested a 27-year-old man found hiding in the bushes near a Novi Road property May 1, while responding to a report of a suspicious person.

A computer check turned up eight warrants for the man's arrest, including two stemming from charges filed by Northville City. The warrants were for failing to appear in court on charges including disorderly conduct, driving with a suspended license, and misuse of a phone.

The man was released after posting \$800 in cash bonds.

CONSTRUCTION EQUIPMENT STOLEN: A builder told city police that a contractor who worked for him stole nearly \$2,000 in construction equipment from a Pond Island Court job site April 13.

The contractor admitted taking the equipment, but told city police it was for nonpayment by the builder

DRUNKEN DRIVING ARRESTS: City police arrested a 47-year-old Novi man for driving under the influence just before midnight April 30, after stopping him for speeding on Eight Mile Road near Novi Road. The man staggered out of his car and stumbled as he walked toward police, then failed field sobriety tests. His blood alcohol level was measured at .14 percent. He was arrested, his license was destroyed, and he was held until he sobered up, when he was released on a \$100 cash bond.

A 28-year-old Southfield man was arrested by city police at 8 p.m. May 3 after being stopped for speeding on Beck Road near Elmsmere. The man, who admitted to having a couple of beers at a golf outing, failed field sobriety tests and was taken into custody. His license was destroyed after his blood alcohol level was measured at .16 percent. He was released after

sobering up and posting a \$100 cash bond.

TEEN ARRESTED FOR STASHING BEER: An 18-year-old Plymouth man was arrested by city police for possession of alcohol after his car stalled outside Northville Wine Shoppe. The man and his 16-year-old brother were reportedly leaving the store after he had purchased a case of beer from another man, when the car stalled at Eight Mile Road. The man was seen carrying the case into the woods by the store, where police later found it covered with a blanket.

MAN ARRESTED ON POT POSSESSION CHARGES: A 28-year-old Northville man was charged with marijuana possession April 29 after his arrest on an outstanding warrant charge, township police said. Police reportedly witnessed the

man standing in a driveway on Seven Mile near Naple, early April 29. Police said the man had an outstanding warrant for operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor, and arrested him on the spot.

A search of the man revealed a small amount of marijuana in a plastic bag, police said. Also discovered was a pipe used for smoking marijuana.

LAWN MAINTENANCE EQUIPMENT STOLEN: A 14-foot tandem trailer loaded with lawn maintenance equipment reportedly was stolen from a Meadowbrook address sometime April 27 or April 28, according to township police records.

Along with the trailer, items reported stolen included a lawn tractor, two tillers, a front loader, a six-foot mowing blade, a brushcutter, and a 28-inch cutting mower. The stolen items were valued at \$14,890.

OUIL: A 29-year-old Garden City man was charged with operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor after his arrest on westbound Five Mile May 1, township police said. Breathalyzer tests indicated the man's blood-alcohol level was .18, police said.

The man later filed a police report, claiming that two hubcaps had been stolen from his 1978 Ford LTD after the vehicle had been towed to Phil's, 19340 Gerald Avenue. The stolen hubcaps were valued at \$20.

RADIO STOLEN FROM CAR: A Livonia woman told township police that someone stole an AM/FM cassette player from her 1990 Pontiac Grand Am while it was parked in the lot at Meljer, 20401 Haggerty, April 29.

Police said the theft occurred when someone popped out the vehicle's door lock. The radio was valued

at \$150 and damage was estimated at \$50.

MEN CITED FOR DRUG PARAPHERNALIA POSSESSION: A 21-year-old Plymouth man and a 24-year-old Brighton man were charged with possession of narcotics paraphernalia after their arrest April 27, township police said.

Police approached the men after receiving a tip that the two may have been involved in a drug transaction. Police did not discover drugs on the men, but did confiscate a set of hemostat clips and two marijuana pipes with residue in the stems.

Both men were issued appearance tickets for paraphernalia possession, police said.

State develops hotline to deal with court questions

State court administrative offices have announced a new public information hotline.

Michigan citizens can now call 1-800-968-5669 (or 1-800-YOU-KNOW) and get information concerning more than 60 court-related topics — from victim's rights to traffic violations.

The public information hotline, called Tele-Court, was developed by the State Court Administrative Office (SCAO), the administrative arm of the Michigan Supreme Court. The toll-free recorded telephone messages offer information on subjects that local courts are frequently asked. Among the areas covered are: divorce; garnish-

ment; wills; adoption; victim's rights; landlord-tenant relations; restraining orders; and drunk driving violations.

Tele-Court callers will be able to select from a menu of subjects. The brief recordings, available 24 hours a day, provide essential information, with directions for where to get further assistance. The message will be updated

frequently to reflect caller interests and inquiries. Callers can also request brochures on a variety of the topics covered by Tele-Court. This service is available to callers using either a touch-tone or a rotary telephone.

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Lark of a driver leads to verdict

A 28-year-old Northville woman was found guilty Tuesday of driving under the influence of liquor during a chase that ended in a water-filled gravel pit off Beck Road.

Sandra Sue Byson admitted in 35th District Court that she led Northville City police on a two-mile pursuit just after midnight October 25, but she said she drove into the pit on purpose "because I didn't want to go through this . . . I just figured it would be an easy way out."

Byson had already pleaded guilty to charges of fleeing and eluding police and driving with a suspended license.

But her tearful testimony was not enough to dissuade Judge John MacDonald that she was driving under the influence that night as well.

His finding followed testimony from city police officer Glenn Stewart, who had chased Byson from the intersection of Main and Center streets to the Beck Road site south of Seven Mile Road where she swerved off the road and into the pit.

Stewart began tailing Byson after she left the Northville Eagles Club on Center at midnight and made an illegal left turn onto Main, past his patrol car. He said she turned south onto Wing Street where she swerved toward the curb at the post office and then back into the roadway, and continued driving.

Byson drove past several subsequent stop signs on Wing, Seven Mile and Beck before swerving off the road north of Blue Heron Drive, over an embankment and into the pit, Stewart said. The officer said he ran over the embankment after Byson's car, and saw it floating about 100 feet from the shore.

"I noticed that the front of the vehi-

cle was already submerged under water, and the vehicle was at about a 45-degree angle," Stewart said. "It's not necessarily department policy, but I felt I had to go into the water to check on the driver."

Stewart swam out to the car, where he saw Byson climb out the driver's side window and move to the front of the car, he said. "It appeared to me that she was still trying to hide from me," he said.

Stewart said he grabbed Byson and towed her back to shore, but he reached the shoreline that he had to be helped from the water by Sgt. Norm Kubitsky. "I couldn't do it on my own," Stewart said.

Byson was taken into custody by officer William Edgar, and refused medical treatment by a paramedic from Huron Valley Ambulance.

All three officers and the paramedic, Vincent Kouth, testified that they smelled liquor on Byson's breath. Stewart and Kouth attested that her speech was slurred.

Byson, who said she was depressed over the difficulty she was having getting her license restored, admitted drinking "two or three" beers at the Northville Eagles Club before the incident. But she said she had already decided to drive into the gravel pit when Stewart attempted to pull her over.

"My first reaction was to pull over, but I had made myself a kind of stupid promise that if I was going to pull over, it was going to be at the gravel pits," she said.

Byson's boyfriend, Bill Custer, told the judge that she had made a similar threat a week before the incident. "She'd decided that if she saw the (police) lights, she would head straight to the gravel pit," he said.

Byson is scheduled to be sentenced June 18.

Library wins grant

The Northville Public Library last Tuesday won a \$17,000 federal grant to assist volunteers with processing back issues of *The Northville Record* onto microfilm.

The library hopes to use a portion of the money to continue with its indexing project of back issues of the newspaper and to fund the costs for a printed index chronicling Northville's facts and personalities for use by library patrons.

Mernie Hines, a volunteer who has worked on the indexing project and coordinated the grant application, said Tuesday the money came from a federal program that is distributed through a state agency. Library officials wrote the grant application earlier this year and finally got word last week that they had been awarded the money.

"It's a great source for people, genealogists and local historians to use to get information about the community," she said.

A team of 20 volunteers sponsored by Friends of the Library have been microfilming the issues of *The Record* printed from 1869 to 1950, and from 1986 until the present. Until now the only existing issues of *The Record* dated between 1950 and 1986 were kept in bound volumes in the *Record* office. But now with the grant, the library will maintain its own copies for those years on microfilm.

As issues are being microfilmed volunteers have been compiling a printed index of names, people, places and things so genealogists and history buffs will have a handy cross-reference of who's who in Northville history at their fingertips.

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Plymouth man eyes county post

Add one more name to the list of hopefuls for the 10th District Wayne County Commission seat. Patrick Downes, a Plymouth Township resident, will square off against incumbent county Commissioner Maurice Breen and Schoolcraft College Trustee Thaddeus McCotter in the Aug. 4 Republican primary.

The 10th District includes Northville Township, the City of Northville south of Baseline Road, Plymouth city and township, and Livonia.

Downes, 24, a first-time candidate for public office, hopes to parlay Breen's role in a controversial sewer project as a winning formula.

"The more I looked into it, the more apparent it

became that there was abuse at the top levels of our elected officials," Downes said. "(Breen) has done some certain things that are questionable, and everybody's going to be talking about WTUA."

Breen served as chairperson of the Western Townships Utilities Authority from its inception in late 1986 until April 1991, when he was appointed to the county commission seat vacated by Susan Heintz. WTUA and its officials currently are under fire for allegations including nepotism, and no-bid professional services contracting practices.

Downes said a perception of power abuses by local politicians has hurt the community. A new face could prove refreshing to area residents, he said.

"It's time for ordinary people to get involved, not those cemented to Realtors, unions, or political or-

ganizations," he said. "There doesn't seem to be a better time for people who truly want to serve the community."

Downes, an employee of Pitney-Bowes, acknowledges that he is a long shot for in county commission race, but believes voters are looking for change in government.

"If I were to pick a theme, I'd have to say that I hope to impress on the voters that if you elect me, you will get real change," he said. "I'm not the typical candidate; I don't owe anybody any favors."

By Tuesday, no Democrats had stepped forward to challenge in the heavily Republican 10th District, the lone GOP county commission stronghold.

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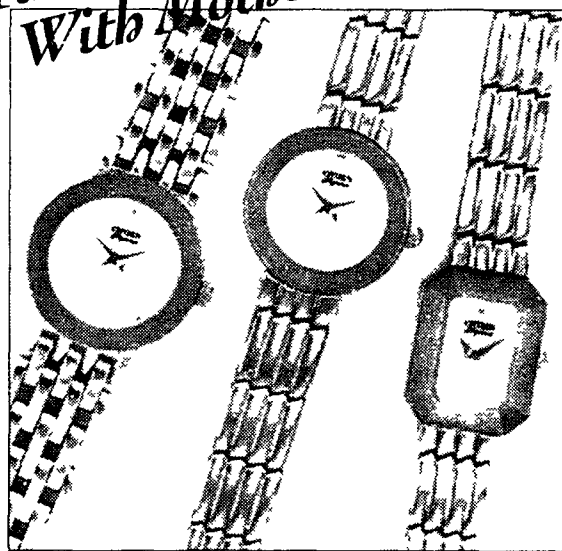
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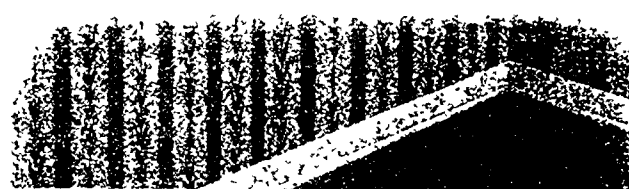

17 candidates crowd field for township posts

The jobs often are mundane, sometimes rigorous, and frequently frustrating, but the lure of elected office is stronger than ever in Northville Township.

No less than 17 township residents have pulled petitions for a shot at seven openings on the township board, as the filing deadline draws near.

Six incumbents — including the current supervisor, clerk, and treasurer — have pulled petitions, and must return signature-laden petitions to the township clerk's office by 4 p.m. May 12. The petitions are necessary to secure a spot in the Aug. 4 Republican and Democratic primaries.

Independent candidates must return petitions to township hall by July 16 for inclusion in the Nov. 3 general election.

Eleven new faces are eyeing board seats. Incumbents will face challenges for all township offices, although the trustee slot has garnered the most attention.

No less than 10 residents have requested petitions for four trustee positions. Incumbent Republicans Donald Williams, Richard Allen, and James Nowka apparently will try to

fight off challenges from office-seekers such as Barbara O'Brien, Rebecca Connell, Russ Fogg, Gini Britton, James Petrie, Mary LaCroix, and Mark Abbo.

Petrie plans to run as a Democrat. The rest are Republicans.

The township officer positions have not attracted as much attention as the trustee posts, but interest is still much higher than usual. Incumbent Supervisor Betty Lennox, appointed last fall, is scheduled to face off with Karen Baja in the Republican primary. William Brown plans a supervisor run as an independent.

Races also are shaping up in the clerk and treasurer areas. Incumbent Clerk Tom Cook and Sue Hillebrand will battle for that post, and Jack Hosmer, like Lennox appointed last fall, will face a challenge from Rick Engelland for treasurer.

All are running as Republicans.

As of Tuesday, Lennox, Cook, Hillebrand, Fogg, Connell, and Abbo had returned completed petitions, said Eunice Switzer, township deputy clerk.

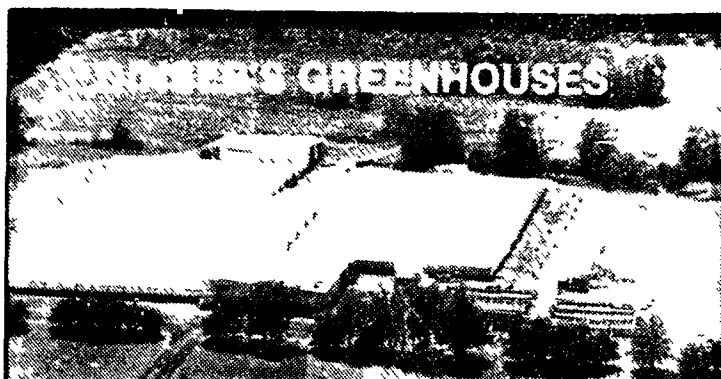
Township elected officials have four-year terms. The supervisor, clerk, and treasurer also sit on the township executive committee, an important decision-making body in township government.

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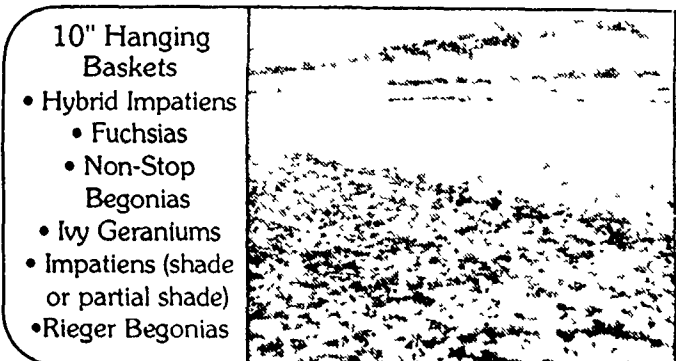

William Davidson, owner of Nine Mile Road based Guardian Industries, announced recently that he will donate an unprecedented \$30 million to the University of Michigan School of Business Administration. The money will be used to establish an institute to help Eastern European countries make the transition to a free market economy.

Davidson is now believed to be the largest donor to a public university business school.

Himself a U-M business school graduate, Davidson is now believed by some analysts to have assets of over \$1 billion. In addition to owning Guardian Industries, he is also the owner of the Detroit Pistons and part owner of the Palace of Auburn Hills and Pine Knob Music Theater.

In a statement released through the U-M, Davidson said he witnessed the need for such an institute four years ago when Guardian Industries began negotiations for a subsidiary in Hungary.

"As Guardian Industries has grown and spread around the globe, I have seen personally the hunger of people for an understanding of free-market

practices and the tools needed to build market economies," he said.

"When we began negotiations for our subsidiary in Hungary over four years ago, I experienced first hand the desire of key managers for change and their lack of understanding of market-oriented principles. Before we concluded our agreement, we had to educate our Hungarian counterparts on the key elements of business organization, financing and marketing."

Davidson said world events since then — including the fall of communism in Russia and Eastern Europe and the move toward market economies in India and China — inspired him to donate the money for the institute, which will be named after him.

U-M will receive \$1.5 million per year for the next 20 years from Guardian Industries. According to U-M business school dean Joseph White, the William Davidson Institute will be an independent educational institution that will not offer degrees.

U-M President James Duderstadt called Davidson's donation "a creative initiative that responds to one of the most exciting periods in modern

history.

"All over the world, the bells of freedom are ringing, as people reject totalitarian rule and seek to determine their own destiny. But without real enfranchisement, without capital and expertise, this freedom will be short-lived."

According to information released by U-M, the William Davidson Institute will have a twofold goal: to aid countries in transition to a market economy make that change smoothly and with the proper institutions in place; and to help businesses operate successfully in emerging market economies. Current targeted areas include Eastern Europe, the former Soviet Union, India, China and parts of Africa.

To accomplish its goals, the institute is expected to offer a yearly six-week seminar for business leaders, entrepreneurs and government officials from countries with economies in transition. It will also provide internships to students who will work in Poland or the former Soviet Union.

The institute is also expected to provide faculty development and fund research projects.

Guardian Industries' world headquarters is on Nine Mile Road just east of Novi Road.

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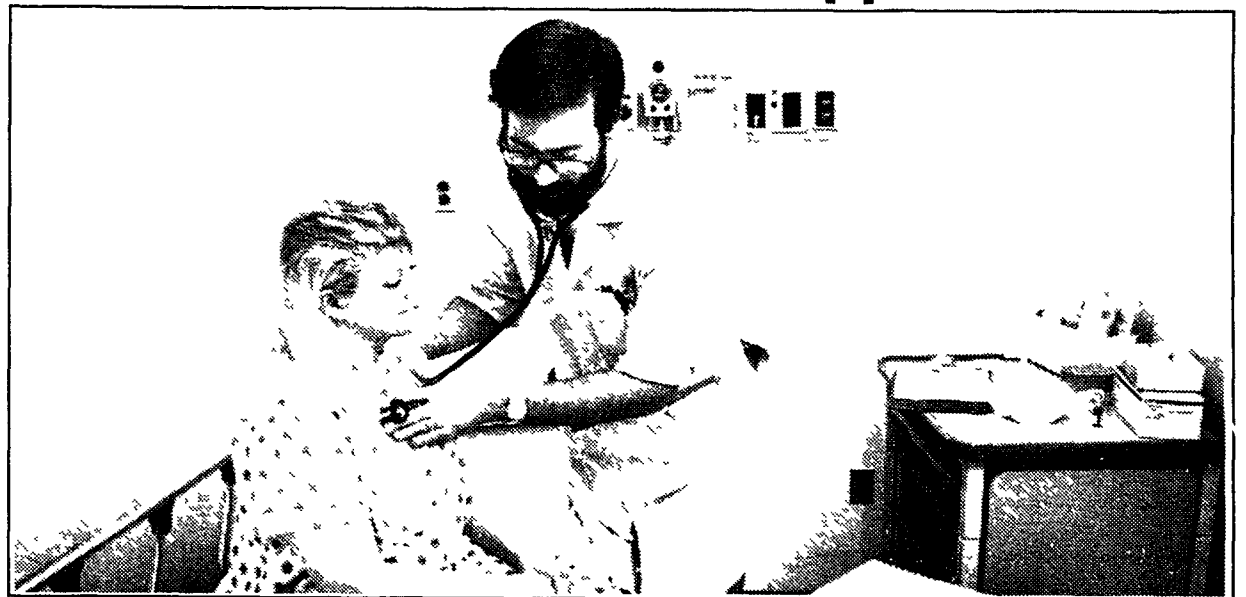

together. That way, every dollar of the ticket money goes to the Huntington's Disease Foundation of America.

Rice will still present the festival even without sponsors to underwrite the cost, he said. But that would greatly reduce the benefit to the foundation, since expenses will have to come from ticket proceeds.

"If I don't get a cent, I'm still going to run this festival. It's just going to be a lot less profitable," Rice said.

The festival's costs this year have already been cut to roughly half of what they've been in some past years. Rice has booked more regional names — including Michael Smith, Josh White Jr., and Ron Caden — instead of a nationally known headline act. Other performers this year include Tony Trishka and the group Just Friends, as well as perennial festival favorites Neil Woodward and the Fritts Family.

The base cost this year will be about \$4,500, Rice said. The Univer-

sity of Michigan Health Centers have pledged a donation of several hundred dollars. But now Rice hopes someone will pick up the other \$4,000 cost.

One major sponsor would be great, he said, but he'll take whatever he can get. If several companies make smaller donations, that's fine too, he said.

A major sponsor or co-sponsors will reap the benefits of considerable positive public relations, Rice said. The festival gets publicity each year on several radio stations, including extensive promotion on public radio's WDET-FM. Local newspapers and the Detroit dailies also run coverage. And the sponsor's name will figure prominently at the event itself, Rice promised.

"We've got a pretty good name. It's a good reputation," he said.

"This could be the beginning of a very good relationship."

This year's 16th annual Northville Folk and Bluegrass Festival will take place Sunday, July 26 at Ford Field, off Hutton north of Main. The festival runs all afternoon into the evening with a variety of folk, bluegrass and other acoustic music. The festival is dedicated to the memories of folk music great Woody Guthrie, who died of Huntington's; and his late second wife, Marjorie, who took up the disease as a cause and who once attended the Northville festival.

Rice, who lost his half-sister to Huntington's disease in 1974, vows to continue the tradition regardless of funding. "I want to keep this thing going forever, and I intend to," he said.

that major changes could be in the offing.

"Yes, in every aspect," committee member Laurie Marrs said, when asked if the group would recommend alterations to current salary and benefit plans.

Marrs would not detail the committee's recommendations, but said the board will be asked to review its current system of employing a full-time township manager and a part-time supervisor.

"One of the things we came up with was that the board should analyze how much duplication there is between the township supervisor and the township manager," Marrs said.

No other Wayne County township uses the township manager system embraced by Northville Township. When implemented, the plan was supposed place most of the day-to-day operations on the manager's back, leaving the supervisor as a part-time official, with a part-time salary.

But the supervisor's salary climbed throughout the 1980s, peaking with the \$25,000 paid former Supervisor Georgina Goss in 1990. When combined with township manager Richard Henningsen's \$43,500 salary, the numbers stack up in excess of salaries paid to officials in comparable townships.

Marrs and fellow committee members Tom Killen and Larry Wood wonder why.

"Why are we having (to pay) a full-time manager and a part-time supervisor?" Marrs said. "Why is every other township employing one and we have one-and-a-half?"

The committee almost surely will focus on elected officials' salaries. Trustees earn \$900 a year, but the supervisor, clerk, and treasurer make \$25,000, \$15,000, and \$9,000 respectively.

Salaries for some positions may fall, while others could increase, under the committee's plan.

The committee likely will commit on pensions paid part-time township officials. The township supervisor, clerk and treasurer are eligible to receive an annual pension amounting to 14 percent of their yearly salary — after serving a 20-month vesting period.

Elected officials are the lone part-time township employees eligible for the township's pension plan.

Health and dental benefits also may be discussed at tonight's session.

Marrs said the township provided financial information on employee benefits and statistics from other Wayne County communities. Reviewing the jumble of figures was "like comparing apples to oranges," she said.

Township officials apparently did not provide the review committee with all benefits information, however. Marrs was surprised to hear the township paid Goss about \$7,000 in education reimbursements between 1984-91.

Goss was the lone township part-time employee to receive education

benefits, township records indicate. She also was the sole elected official to drive a township vehicle, a vehicle equipped with a cellular telephone.

Township records indicate Goss racked up nearly \$2,000 in cellular telephone charges between December 1989 and August 1991. The township board scrapped the supervisor's car telephone when Goss left the township in September 1991.

Some township officials also are reimbursed for business meal expenses. Taxpayers doled out about \$950 for Goss lunch tabs during her 1987-91 tenure as supervisor.

Goss was not the only official to take advantage of Northville Township's perks system. Like Goss, former supervisors John MacDonald and Susan Heintz accepted health and pension benefits, as did Clerk Tom Cook.

Cook dropped his health benefits in 1990, after he prodded the township to bump his salary from \$12,000 to its current \$15,000 mark. He also is vested in two pension plans outside Northville Township.

Current Supervisor Betty Lennox is vested in the pension plan and also receives pension benefits from other sources.

Lennox appointed the review committee said she is seeking "a recommendation we can adopt" prior to the May 12 filing deadline for township board elections.

Township officials hope to have new salary and benefits schedules in place by that date so potential board candidates can determine if they want to run for the positions, Lennox said.

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Investigation finds illegal contaminant levels

A 75-page report on fuel leaks at Northville's DPW yard details contaminant levels exceeding Michigan Department of Natural Resources requirements.

The report, by NTH Consultants of Farmington Hills, found both soil and groundwater contamination.

The NTH study revealed soil concentrations of benzene, a poisonous liquid associated with petroleum, at levels higher than DNR cleanup criteria at two locations.

Benzene levels exceeding DNR cleanup criteria were also found in two groundwater samples. Toluene, ethylbenzene and total xylenes were also found in some samples, though at levels below DNR cleanup criteria.

The report noted that the combination of benzene, toluene, ethylbenzene and total xylenes, also known as

BTEX, is often associated with gasoline, and less often with other petroleum-based fuels like diesel fuel and home heating oil.

The chlorinated organic compound trichloroethane (TCE) was also found in concentrations more than twice as high as the DNR's cleanup criteria.

Chlorinated organic compounds are often associated with petroleum solvents and degreasers from commercial and industrial uses, according to the report.

Polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons (PNAs) including naphthalene, acenaphthalene, acenaphthene and fluorene were also found at levels above DNR cleanup criteria. PNAs are often found following diesel fuel spills.

The NTH report showed soil contamination confined to the DPW yard, but it recommended further testing due to insufficient and inconclusive data.

The report did not estimate the extent of groundwater contamination.

While three of the five wells sampled by NTH showed contamination levels higher than DNR cleanup criteria, the report noted that the types of contaminants at the three different wells suggested different sources.

Relatively low BTEX levels and high PNA levels at a well near where the diesel tank was removed suggested diesel fuel as the contaminant source.

But a well near the DPW's storage garage showed measurable levels of benzene and toluene and no PNAs, suggesting "possible low level groundwater contamination by gasoline, rather than diesel fuel."

The third well, near the DPW's salt building, showed both BTEX and PNAs in the groundwater, suggesting that "both diesel fuel or home heating oil and gaso-

line are possible sources."

NTH analysts reviewed DNR files on contaminated sites within a mile of the DPW yard, and identified the Ely Fuel Bulk Storage Facility and General Oil Company to the north as possible contributors to the DPW site's contamination.

Ely Fuel's 185 Railroad St. site, which handles fuel oil and gasoline, has been the site of previous surface fuel spills, and the site is contaminated with BTEX compounds, PNAs and petroleum hydrocarbons.

General Oil, at 175 Railroad Street, operates an oil blending facility adjacent to Ely Fuel. That site has been studied to determine whether previous waste oil lagoons were responsible for oil seepage into the nearby Middle Rouge River. "Significant levels" of organic contaminants have been found in that site's soil and groundwater, according to the NTH report.

what the next step is."

Mapes added that the tanks were removed due to fiscal concerns, not environmental ones.

"We weren't changing them because we thought we had leaks. We were changing them to prevent leaks and to go to larger sizes so we could save money on fuel," he said.

The new tanks allow the city to take advantage of large-quantity discounts, he said.

Cleanup has already begun at the DPW yard, where 360 cubic yards of soil have been removed from the site. But preliminary tests have not de-

fined the extent of the contamination, the amount of fuel that leaked, or the potential source of some of the contaminants.

The cleanup is being overseen by city engineers McNeely & Lincoln Associates. Michael Dwyer, an engineer and partner with the firm, said preliminary tests have failed to pinpoint the source of all the contamination.

"There was another constituent found in the groundwater that is not typically associated with diesel fuel, and the source of that contamination has not been identified," Dwyer said. "It may be coming from somewhere else; it may be coming from site."

The city has already applied for

state funds to pay for site remediation efforts, under the Michigan Underground Storage Tank Financial Assurance Act (MUSTFAA).

"It's designed specifically for these, mainly gas stations, which encounter a lot of this," Dwyer said. "But anyone is eligible who has a registered underground storage tank, which the city did."

Under the MUSTFAA program, the city still would have to pay the first \$10,000 in cleanup costs.

The state's Department of Management and Budget denied the city's initial application late last month, but Mapes said the city will reapply.

The contamination has already been the subject of several studies,

the latest by NTH Consultants Ltd. of Farmington Hills (see related story).

The NTH report, from November 1991, noted that contamination apparently from the tank and "chlorinated organic compounds from an undocumented source" have been found in the site's soil and groundwater.

Two potential off-site sources listed were the Ely Fuel Bulk Storage and General Oil Company facilities north of the DPW yard.

An earlier hydrogeological study by Engineering and Testing Services of Plymouth (ETS) identified a groundwater contamination plume stretching 150-200 feet southwest of the DPW tank location, and found

several different contaminants. According to the ETS report, some of the contamination at the DPW site may have come from other sources.

But the DNR concluded that the ETS investigation did not sufficiently define the extent of the contamination. McNeely & Lincoln called in NTH Consultants to study the site in greater detail.

NTH used drilling tests, hand auger borings and groundwater monitoring wells to determine the nature and extent of soil and groundwater contamination.

The NTH report recommended that city officials meet with DNR representatives to discuss potential off-

site contaminant sources like Ely Fuel and General Oil, and "clarify the City of Northville's responsibilities and obligations with respect to the contamination identified at the Northville DPW Yard site."

The report also recommended that the city "defer development of a formal Corrective Action Plan . . . until the extent of contamination has been determined and the issue of contaminant sources has been settled."

The report also recommended further testing to more completely establish the extent of soil contamination, and to establish the extent of groundwater contamination south-west of the site.

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Assessing department charged with cost overruns, poor performance

out of hand.

"It seems to me that we're up another \$18,000," he said. "I'd like to know exactly what our assessing office is costing the city. . . It's costing us a lot more than we figured two years ago, a lot more."

Folino also expressed unhappiness with Christiansen's performance as head of the assessing department.

"We hired an assessor back in 1990, and the work was never done," Folino said. "I think we should throw out the whole assessing office."

Christiansen was hired in April 1990 under a two-year contract to reassess the city's commercial and residential properties. He complained during his first year that a lack of information from the county and commercial property owners was delaying the reassessments.

Christiansen was also named acting city manager for two months in

1991, and has overseen implementation of the city's new refuse/recycling system.

In January, Christiansen was promoted to the newly created positions of chief financial officer and office manager, positions which include his previous assessing duties and others.

Folino advocated hiring a private firm like Northville Township has, or contracting with Wayne and Oakland counties to use their assessing departments as the city has in the past, to replace the current assessing department.

But Johnson noted that the city presents a unique challenge to assessors because it straddles Wayne and Oakland counties, and added that the city never received adequate service from Wayne County.

Johnson also came to Christiansen's defense, saying, "I think administratively, he's done the work we've asked him to do. . . We've got a lot more out of that contract (with

Christiansen) than we originally

planned, in my opinion."

Johnson said assessors often draw criticism due to the nature of the position. "Just, on a personal note, I can't think of a position in the city that draws more heat and light and fire than an assessor," he said.

Council members also questioned how much the field inspector would be paid. Christiansen told them Zbranchik would be paid \$15 an hour, for up to \$18,720, under a proposed one-year contract.

"The contract calls for a maximum of 24 hours a week, and that's what's in the budget, but frankly we don't anticipate using that full (\$18,720) amount," he said.

Zbranchik had been into city hall to review assessing records, Christiansen said, but she had not begun her field inspections yet.

He promised the council a review of Zbranchik's performance at the end of her 90-day probationary period.

When Folino asked why Zbranchik would only be inspecting homes in Wayne County, Christiansen said, "For this year, that's where the focus is because that's where the problem is. . . The purpose of this work this year is primarily to get the Wayne County side on par with Oakland County."

The council approved Zbranchik's hire, but not under the year-long contract sought by the administration. Instead, it approved a six-month hire and planned to review the contract after six months, "to see whether the council feels comfortable with this whole process," Johnson said.

Johnson also noted that the city may be able to cut back on its assessing costs in the future.

"It was and still is a possibility with the council that if we got our records in shape, we may only need a maintenance-type of position rather than a full-time (assessing) office," he said.

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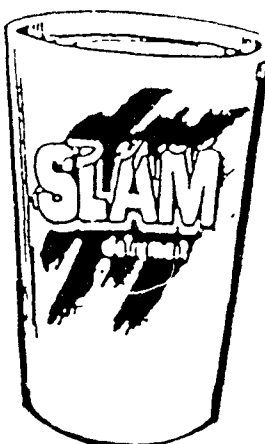
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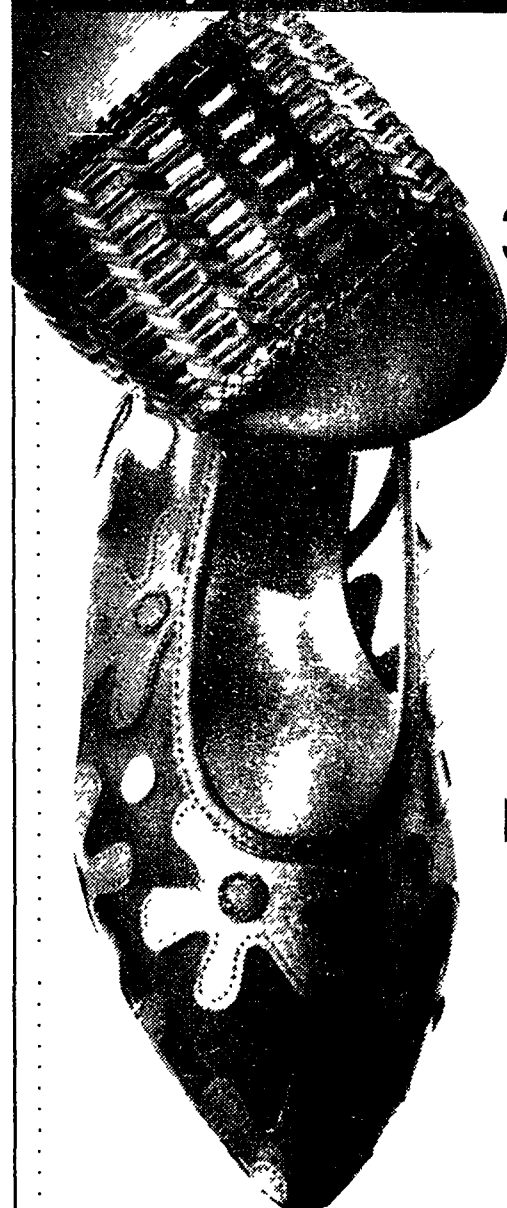

and book stores.

Some residents questioned the need for a major anchor store, citing the proximity of malls like Twelve Oaks in Novi. But department and sporting goods stores, chains like Eddie Bauer and the Gap, and hardware stores were considered suitable additions in their minds.

Chamber Executive Director Laurie Marrs said Hudson's and Jacobson's, the examples used in the

survey question asking about the need for an anchor, may have scared off some respondents.

"We gave them poor direction on that one," she said.

"People said they didn't necessarily want a large anchor. . . We've evaluated that and said we don't necessarily need something huge."

But, Marrs said, the BDRC still sees the need for "a true drawing card into our downtown area."

Locals were divided over whether

to extend merchants' business hours to 8 p.m. every night, an issue that has proven somewhat divisive among the merchants themselves. But many did say they would like to see extended hours on Thursdays and Fridays, and Sunday hours between noon-5 p.m.

Most survey respondents do attend special events like the Victorian Festival and Tivoli Art Fair, and many said they buy items from local merchants when they do.

When asked what aspects of Northville make them proud, residents spoke most often of the service offered by the downtown's family-oriented and family-owned businesses, the historic buildings, and community events.

When asked what aspects of Northville they would change, suggested improvements included increased parking, extended business hours, the commercial redevelopment of Cady Street, a greater variety

of stores, and a large anchor store, among others.

The respondents said they would not mind walking two to six blocks from a parking space to a store.

"The major worry is the parking situation, and also we must address the (business) hours," Marrs said. "The merchants must realize they're in the '90s."

Marrs noted that today's shopping force is also the work force, so shops must schedule their hours around workers' time constraints to reach

the greatest number of customers

Several respondents urged the city's leaders to focus more on Northville's future, and the future of its downtown.

One recommended getting rid of Northville Downs and creating a larger business district and single-family homes.

Others said they wanted to see changes in city council spending habits, and greater support of local merchants by city hall.

District officials expect to work Friday and through the weekend to compile residents' comments from written responses and their phone survey to try to get a proposal together before Monday night's school board meeting.

While the committee had no intentions of devising a specific recommendation, members did sound off their concerns about criticisms made by Citizens for a Better Northville, press coverage preceding the election, and voters' reactions.

First and foremost, Rezmierski said he was intent on clarifying misinformation that surfaced regarding administrative salaries. A Detroit News article erroneously put the district's administration among Wayne County's most costly districts.

Committee members also discussed possible alternatives to re-

structuring the second proposal.

Group consensus was to split the renewal and the proposed increase into separate questions, in deference to complaints heard from voters. Committee members were also in agreement — despite comments they'd heard to the contrary — to ask voters to approve the request for one year rather than go for a multi-year renewal.

If committee members had any strong theories about how to restructure the millage question, they weren't freely throwing ideas out on the table. Most, like district officials, were waiting to hear from the voters.

"We have a short window of opportunity here to restructure this 2.78 mill," said Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional services. "We are hearing from parents that we need to protect our educational programs and that is first and foremost."



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
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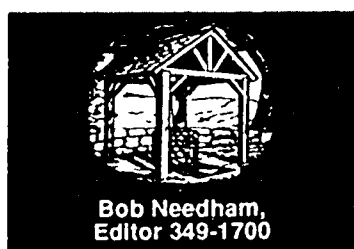

Engineer's questions demand attention

No question about it: Jack McNeely's a man with an ax to grind.

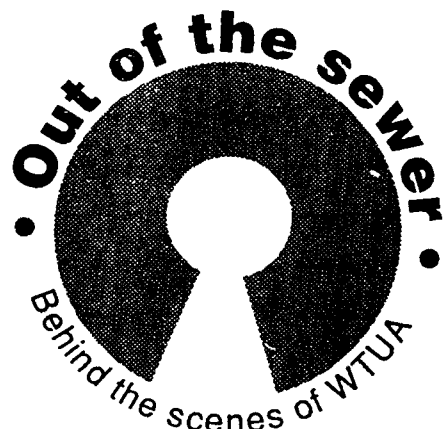
That's still no reason to dismiss everything he has to say.

The dismissal of McNeely's firm as Northville Township engineers in 1987 left a very bad taste in his mouth. The publicly stated reason at the time — that McNeely & Lincoln Associates wasn't big enough to handle the township's needs — clearly wasn't true, even then. (The Northville Record editorialized at the time that the township should come clean with the real reason. That never happened.)

So McNeely has some negative history with township government in general and then-Supervisor Georgina Goss in particular. We know this. He was, however, the first engineer to work on what would become the Western Townships Utilities Authority sewer project, and as such he has some interesting things to say. History or no, it doesn't make any sense to dismiss McNeely as a crank without giving his points a good, long hearing.

In a recently published two-part interview with this paper's Mike Tyree, McNeely asked some questions which merit answers. Like why the sewer authority did not use a special assessment district to construct part of the line which, in his opinion, called for one. Any why the ultimate bonding costs for the project went so much higher than his original estimates. And why the township's own Water and Sewer Commission only came into the discussions at the tail end of considering whether to move ahead with the project. And, most importantly, why officials with the authority and the township refuse to release McNeely from a confidentiality clause in his WTUA contract.

We don't even understand the need for the clause in the first place. The clause itself makes it nearly impossible for anyone not in the project's inner



circle to judge whether such an arrangement was needed.

But McNeely hints that bringing the sewer line into Northville Township at all might have been a mistake. He even says other options might still exist. Why? Where? Well, he can't talk about it.

This nonsense isn't serving anyone's best interests. If he's got legitimate points here, he deserves the chance to state them. Northville Township officials ought to demand that they and the public at large are able to hear all of what McNeely has to say. Keeping the cloak of silence might mean long-run harm to township taxpayers, and it only heightens the perception of WTUA as a behind-the-scenes operation with contempt for the public it's supposed to be serving. In a letter published today, Goss criticizes the newspaper for giving McNeely so much attention. The points he raised go unaddressed.

If there ever was any legitimate reason for the confidentiality clause, it's now long past. The points McNeely has made public, and the points he cannot make public, deserve a full airing in an open forum — perhaps a Northville Township Board meeting. His history with the township and the sewer authority isn't a reason to ignore him; it's a reason to listen.

Voters speak loudly

The result of last week's school millage election shouldn't have been a surprise to anyone, although the magnitude of the denial seemed to catch just about everyone unawares.

Rarely have Northville voters turned down a school millage proposal (the last time was 1981). Rarely have Northville voters spoken this convincingly — almost a 4-to-1 margin — on any election question. Rarely has a ballot proposal seemed to make people so angry.

The question school district officials must now wrestle with is why this happened, and it's our guess there's no simple answer. Among the reasons which probably contributed to the defeat are: the sheer size of the proposed increase; the ongoing recession; the combining of the renewal and the increase in one ballot proposal; the one-year term of the millage on the heels of another one-year term; a non-voted city tax increase to help cover a huge budget deficit; a certain mistrust of school administration and dislike for educators' salaries (present in any millage election); and a perception that the schools hadn't tried

hard enough to cut expenses.

The list could go on. Some district officials have blamed this millage failure on the nationwide frustration with incumbent politicians and the system in general. That may have played a part, but give people some credit. The election was on school property taxes, and the voters knew that perfectly well.

In the end, this was simply a proposal with too many strikes against it. Now, district officials face the daunting task of eliminating as many of those points as possible, without alienating the yes votes they did get. The public can help by participating in the phone survey being conducted this evening by school officials.

Without getting too specific (we don't yet know the results of the survey), it appears to us that the district ought to come up with as different a plan as possible for the June election. Lower tax rate, more cuts (maybe wage freezes), maybe a longer term. Anything other than a massively different proposal will mean that when Northville screamed its message last week, the schools didn't listen.

Good churches, good cities



The thing that surprised me most at the surprise party for the Rev. Dr. Richard Henderson at Novi's Faith Community United Presbyterian Church last Saturday night was how many people from the First Presbyterian Church of Northville were there.

I knew before I got there that the Rev. Lloyd Brasure, pastor emeritus at Northville Presbyterian, would be present. After all, he's the man who hired Henderson as an assistant pastor back in the early '70s and who had to deal with his shenanigans before packing him off to start the Novi church.

But I didn't expect to see so many others from the Northville congregation. Carl and Pearl Stephens. Tom and Lois Curi. Don and Barb Willoughby. David and Kathi Jerome. Irv and Ardis McLeod. Margaret Nauman. And that's only to name a few.

Jane Shillito, who organized the event, estimated the party was attended by approximately 230 people.

I can't explain why I was surprised to see so many Northville people at a predominantly Novi function. My family moved to Northville back in 1955 so I've been around these parts almost 37 years. And I'm abundantly aware that the ties between Northville and Novi run deep.

Back in the days when I got here, Novi had only the Methodist and Baptist churches. There was no Faith Community Presbyterian Church . . . no Holy Family Catholic Church. So Presbyterians and Catholics from Novi had to seek churches outside their community, and a lot of them

traveled south of Eight Mile to attend Northville Presbyterian and Our Lady of Victory.

Still, the large contingent of Northville people made me feel particularly good about last Saturday's party to honor Henderson on the occasion of the 20th anniversary of his ordination.

It may sound strange coming from someone like me, but the turnout made me think about the words "church family" and reminded me of how important churches are to the quality of life in our community.

There is a danger in the community newspaper business of thinking the world revolves around the city council or school board. And while I fully acknowledge the importance of the type of news generated in those meetings, it's also imperative to remember that the lives of a lot of people in Northville revolve around their respective churches.

A new pastor. A new assistant pastor. Construction of an addition to the building. Special services. Daily vacation Bible school. They're all important stories because they affect the lives of the people in the community. And they're the types of stories we should be covering.

The surprise party for Henderson? It was great fun. They even allowed me to make my speech without threatening to run me out of the building or the community.

And through it all . . . through all the gentle jabs at Henderson and the sordid revelations about his scandalous past . . . I sat there thinking about how nice the people were. About how the people from Northville and Novi getting together to honor this minister was a rather vivid demonstration of the meaning of the words "church family."

And most of all, I sat there thinking about how important churches are to the quality of life in a strong community.

Phil Power

Cost not the reason to change



My old friend, Maxine Berman, is an extremely able and smart state representative from Southfield. She has firm views, quite often backed up by volumes of pertinent fact.

After reading my recent column advocating a part-time Michigan Legislature, she shared a memo she prepared some years ago about the subject.

A worthwhile way of examining the costs of legislatures is to express them on a per-capita basis:

- Michigan's high annual legislative salaries look more reasonable when expressed per capita. We rank 22nd in the nation.

- In salaries plus legislative expenses per capita, Michigan ranks 25th, well behind penny-pinching states like Delaware and Vermont.

- In total expenses for the legislative branch per capita as a percentage of total general state expenditures, Michigan ranks 14th, not so good but still behind Pennsylvania and Maine.

Berman's point is that if you look at the expenses Michigan's full-time Legislature runs up on a per-capita basis, we don't spend so much.

True. But the main argument for a part-time legislature is not to cut expenditures, desirable as that may be.

A part-time legislature would provide less scope for the careerist ambitions of professional politicians. And a part-time legislature would be likely to pass less legislation and therefore less interested in top-down micro-management of things.

Here's an example of the latter point:

I gave a speech last week on job training up north in Clare. A woman in the audience asked about apprenticeship programs in the building trades.

"We used to have a lot of very high quality apprentices in the trades. But then Congress passed a bunch of laws, and the Labor Department issued a bunch of regulations. They forbade people going into apprenticeships who were children of people already in the trades. And they required slots to be set aside for blacks."

"Now that may be fine for you folks downstate. Nepotism is a big problem in the trades, and not enough minorities get into the programs. But the point is that up here we don't have many black residents at all, and we don't have many people who want to get into apprentice training who aren't related to people already in the trades."

"Our job training system suffered up here because those laws and rules were applied uniformly throughout the country, and they didn't really apply to us. Why is that?"

Why, indeed? Because the instinct of all legislators when they see a wrong is to remedy by passing a law with uniform application, regardless of local conditions. And it is the normal practice of regulatory bureaucracies to promulgate rules that apply uniformly, regardless of the underlying facts.

These devices are the fundamental instruments of the top-down, command and control style of public management which has done so much to bring into disrepute the very basis of effective governance in this country.

And they are stimulated by the instincts let play by full-time legislatures.

Respectfully, Rep. Berman, I still disagree.

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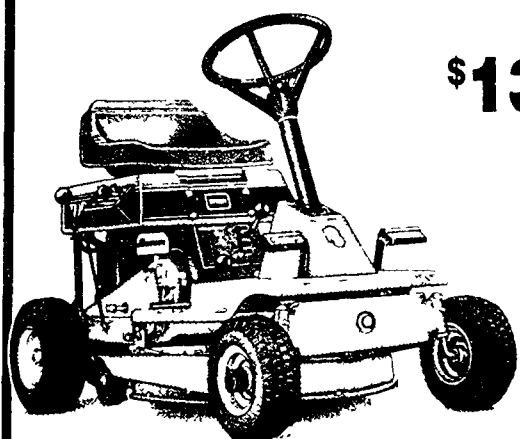

This owl requires a habitat that provides nesting space and escape cover.

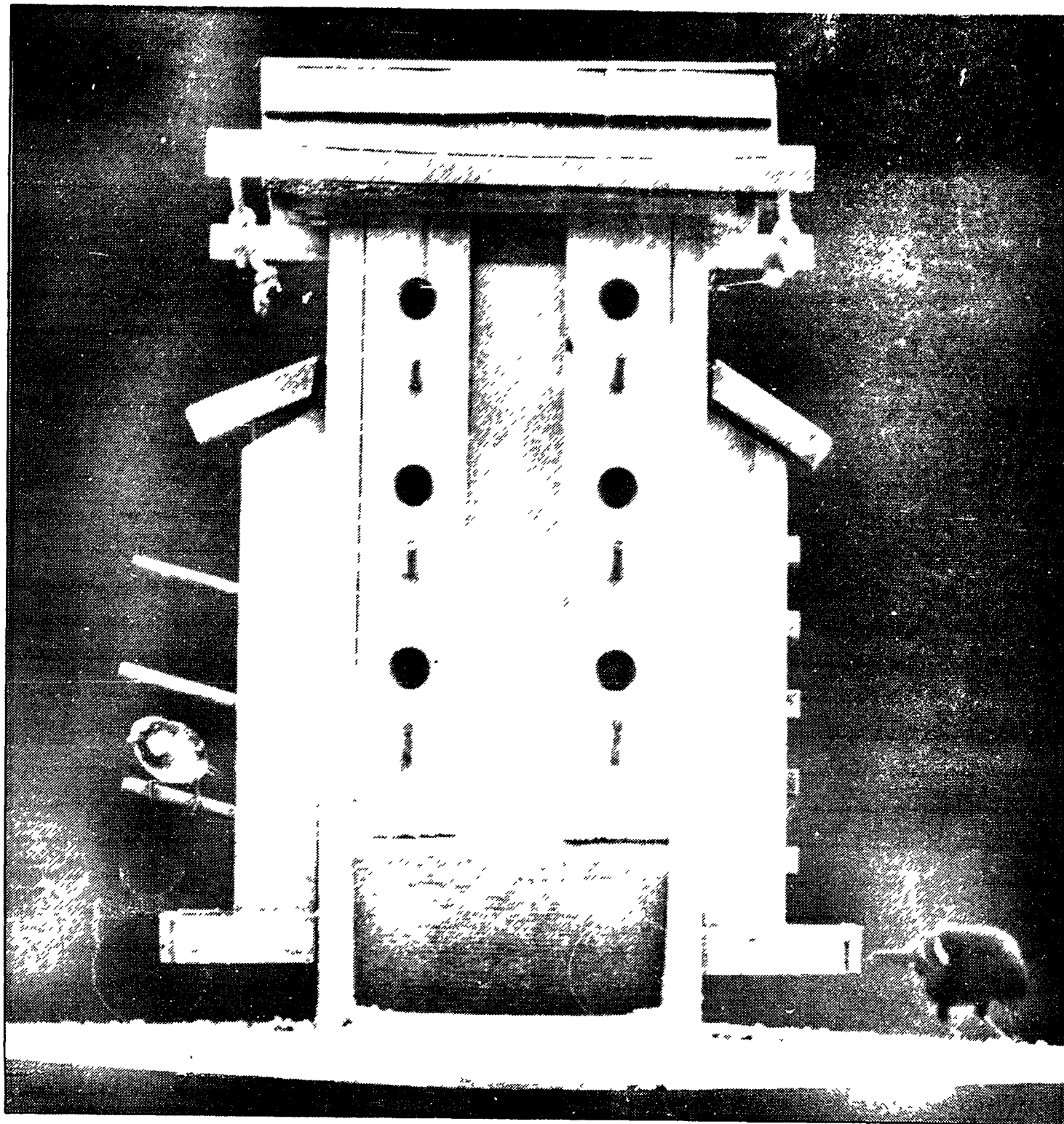

This is the time — right now — that bird watchers love. The warming weather brings in all kinds of feathered friends migrating from the south, creating a wide variety of color and song. At the same time, the leaves have not fully returned to the trees so it's easier to see them perched on branches or building nests.

Local wildlife aficionado and veteran bird watcher Margaret Schmidt, who developed the wildlife habitat at the Novi Library, said she has seen a wide variety in her own back yard over the past few weeks.

"Right now is just a great time to get out and watch the birds," she said. "Myself, I've seen rose-breasted grosbeaks, bluebirds, Myrtle's warblers and yellow warblers and what I think is a wood thrush."

At the library, she said, there has been an influx of more common birds, such as robins, blue jays, cardinals and sparrows, as well as ducks and geese. The wildlife habitat, which has been in place for about a year and a half, will need more time before it develops into one of the level she has at home.

Michigan Department of Natural Resources Wildlife Biologist Mark Sargent said there are three basic necessities for attracting and retaining wild birds in your yard. Those are having food and water available, providing a habitat, and correctly spacing the food and the habitat so they are in the same area.

Further, he said, there are two ways of providing food: with feeders, or planting trees and shrubs that provide good bird food.

If you want to attract birds with a bird feeder, Sargent suggests using a diverse selection of foods.

"It's like taking a large family out to dinner," he said. "You go to a buffet and everyone's happy."

To develop a backyard bird habitat with lots of happy birds, he said, you "give the birds a buffet."

To attract many different birds, put out black sunflowers, thistle seed for finch, and a mixed birdseed that contains millet, corn and sunflower seeds. Provide some bread crumbs and suet for woodpeckers and some citrus — maybe half of an orange — for the orioles.

Schmidt said she has been attracting birds to her backyard habitat by providing food that is "heavy on the sunflower seeds and thistle." In the winter she puts bacon grease out for insect-eating birds.

Not only is diversity important when it comes to bird food, it's important for bird feeders, too.

"Some birds, like doves, quails and pheasants, like to eat off the ground," Sargent said. You can put the food on the ground or, he said, some people like to build low-level feeders for these birds.

Other birds — most of them, in fact — like to eat a little higher up. "A lot of the ones we're used to seeing around here like to eat up in the trees," he said. For these birds, any structure that can be hung from or mounted to a tree is fine.

Schmidt has a platform feeder for high-eating birds, and allows the feed to fall to the ground for ground-eating birds. She also has a round ball-type feeder filled with sunflowers and a tubular-shaped one for thistle, as well as a

homemade feeder made from a recycled Cnsco bottle.

To attract hummingbirds, you need a specific type of feeder. Hummingbird feeders must contain a sugar and water solution, and the feeder must have a red color, to which hummingbirds are attracted. Some people even color the solution red. The variety concept also holds true for feeding birds by planting natural vegetation, Sargent said. Different birds are attracted to different types of trees and shrubs. A good bet is a collection of shrubs that produce a berry or some type of nut.

"Individuals with larger lots might want to plant sunflowers and corn, and just let it grow there for the birds," he said. "If you leave 10 or 15 sunflowers standing, you'll get bluejays and doves."

Speaking of bluejays, some birds are higher on the natural "pecking order" and might scare away smaller birds. A good way to get around that problem is to simply provide more

than one feeding location in different areas. While the bluejays eat in one area, the sparrows can eat in another.

To keep the birds around once you've attracted them with food, your yard must also provide a friendly habitat.

"Birds need cover: shrubs, trees, bushes, grasses. Provide a place for nesting and a place for them to stay out of the weather," Sargent said.

Providing the necessary shelter doesn't mean having an unattractive yard. Juniper bushes and other shrubbery that is popular for landscaping also attracts wildlife. And the different heights and colors that are attractive to the human eye are attractive to a bird's lifestyle.

But, said Schmidt, "you can't expect to have this perfectly mowed, uncluttered lawn and also have a lot of birds."

Good trees for birds are the white pine, Norway spruce, white spruce, cedars and junipers. Good shrubs are crabapples, dogwoods, high-bush cranberries and mountain ash.

Birds are also attracted to many different flowers and wild grasses.

"Food is a good attractor, but if you can provide shelter for their other needs, you are really doing something for the wildlife," Sargent said. "They need nesting cover, and a place to get out of the wind, snow and rain. They also need escape cover."

Escape cover to get away from creatures like Morris the Friendly Cat, that is.

"Some cats are birders and some aren't," Sargent said. "I have one cat that likes to kill birds, and another that couldn't care less about them. We keep (the birder) indoors." He said cat collars with bells work well, too.

At the Schmidt home, raccoons have been a problem. One solution she has found has been to raise the feeders to a higher level and smear grease on the poles to keep the critters from climbing.

Finally, make sure the feeders and the shelter are all in the same area for the birds, so they don't have to travel far to provide food for their young.

At the Novi Library, Schmidt has

been working on special plantings for the birds to create a variety of habitats. Already in place are pines and cedars, and she is adding bird-friendly shrubbery.

"We want to provide more shelter because birds like to fly to the shelter, make sure it's clear, then go to the food," she said. "We are providing food, water, shelter, and space to live and raise their young."

"The better we make the habitat there, the more birds we're going to start seeing."

Schmidt suggested that anyone interested in developing a bird habitat visit the one at the Novi Library and, while there, check out the videos on bird feeding there that the Novi 4-H has donated.

Sargent suggests a mail-order book published by the State of Minnesota titled *Landscaping for Wildlife*. For information on ordering it, call (800) 652-9747.

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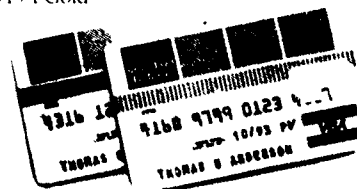
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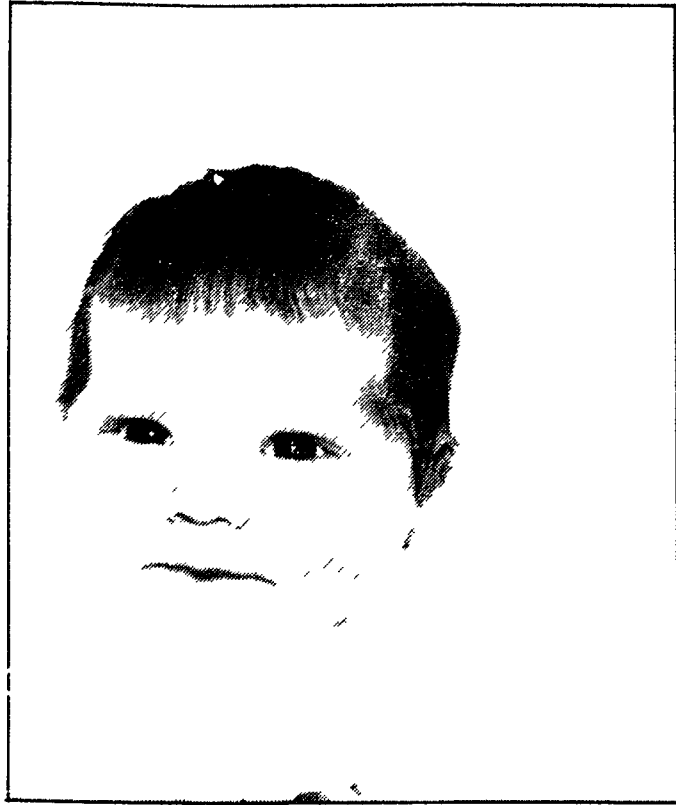

Exploring Savannah in the spring

Historic Georgia city is all abloom with azalea and wisteria

Early spring, when the azalea and wisteria embroider the elegant grid of downtown squares of Savannah, Ga., may be the best season to visit one of the South's most historic cities.

Founded in 1733, Savannah began as a rather audacious vision — an attempt to create a vibrant urban environment built around a symmetrical network of urban squares out of Georgia swampland.

Today the city is still a work in progress. It has not gone as far as neighboring Charleston in putting all the pieces together, but its inviting urban geometry, rich sense of history and compact downtown make it an exceptionally inviting place.

This is a good time of year, before the summer heat really sets in, to explore Savannah on foot.

There are at least four focal points for visitors: the restored waterfront, scene of music and arts exhibits the first Saturday of each month; the leafy grid of squares full of intriguing architecture and history; the restored City Market, where old warehouses have been restored into restaurants and shops; and Tybee Island, 18 miles east of downtown Savannah, which offers beaches, fishing and boating for those who have had their fill of downtown.

For a city its size, Savannah has an extraordinarily rich selection of inns and hotels to choose from. Repeat visitors who have liked where they've stayed in the past would do well to take a chance on another place they might like even more.

SIGHTSEEING

You don't need a tour guide to see Savannah. All you need is a sturdy pair of walking shoes and a good guidebook. For the latter the best source for reading material on the city is E. Shaver, Bookseller, located at 326 Bull Street, on Madison Square. Call (912) 234-7257.

The best way to wander around is to view each square as a discrete community with its own personality. Johnson Square is the city's commercial center, with symbols of power ranging from the major banks to the commanding Christ Church. Madison Square may be the most vibrant, full of students from the Savannah College of Art and Design. Troup Square feels the most like a friendly neighborhood park.

Be sure to meander over to Forsyth Park, with its moss-draped oaks and riot of spring color, and to Colonial Park Cemetery, Oglethorpe Avenue and Abercorn Street, with its weathered headstones and monuments dating to Colonial days.

For those interested in a tour, one of the most popular is the two-hour excursion along the waterfront and historic District with Green Trolley

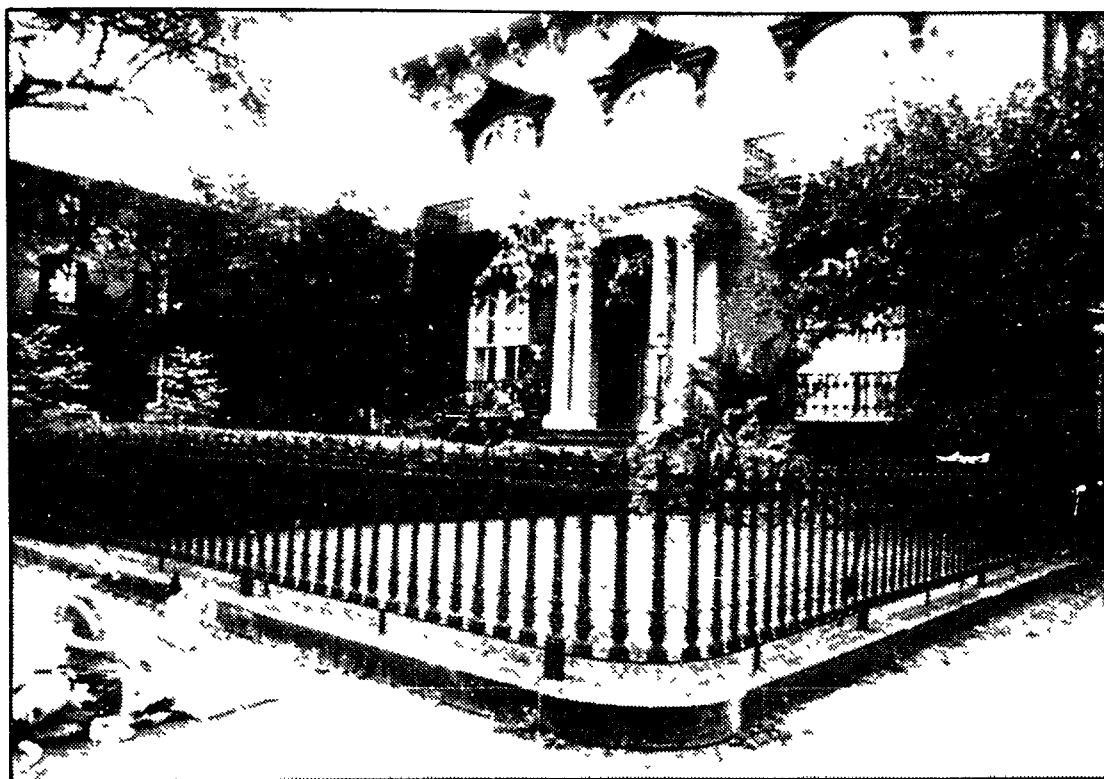

Tours. The price is \$8.50; \$5 for children under 12. For more information call (912) 233-0083.

Square Routes offers historic Savannah, including a breakfast walking tour (\$16), an afternoon architecture and gardens tour (\$12), and an evening haunted house tour (\$13, \$11 for those under 12). For more information call (800) 868-6867.

For a more grand experience there is a cruise on the Savannah River Queen, a 325-passenger reproduction of a historic riverboat. Tours range from one-hour daytime cruises, \$7.50, to a two-hour dinner special, \$27.95. For more information call (912) 232-6404.

Among the buildings particularly worth seeing downtown is the Isalah Davenport House, located at 324 East State St. Admission is \$4. Its restoration in 1955 gave birth to Savannah's historic preservation movement. For more information call (912) 236-8097.

The Owens-Thomas House, located at 124 Abercorn St., is considered one of the finest examples of Regency architecture in America. Admission is \$5. For more information call (912) 233-9743.

The King-Tisdell Cottage, located at 514 East Huntingdon St., is now a museum of African-American history of Savannah and the Sea Islands. Admission is \$1.75. For more information call (912) 234-8000.

Most people gravitate toward the

waterfront, but better shopping and browsing can be found at the City Market on Ellis Square, which offers antique and crafts shops, art galleries, a sports cafe, Hard-Hearted Hannah's jazz club and three restaurants. For more information on Ellis Square call (912) 232-4903; on Hard-Hearted Hannah's jazz club, (912) 232-3470.

WHERE TO STAY

The most inviting and atmospheric place to stay on the river is the River Street Inn, located at 115 East River St., which has 44 rooms with doubles ranging from \$79 to \$135, including Continental breakfast and a daily wine-and-cheese reception.

In this old cotton warehouse, the first two floors of which were built in 1817, the rooms are all individually decorated with Victorian furnishings. For more information call (800) 253-4229.

One of the most elegant older inns is the Gastonian, located at 220 East Gaston St. Rates for two are \$98 to \$225, including full breakfast. The Gastonian has 13 rooms in two 1868 Regency-Italianate homes, with a garden courtyard in between the two. For more information call (800) 322-6603 or (912) 232-2869.

At the other extreme, just opened in January on the waterfront is the Radisson Plaza Hotel, located at 100 General McIntosh Boulevard, with 384 rooms; doubles are \$109 to

\$159. The hotel features a heated pool and Jacuzzi. For more information call (800) 333-3333 or (912) 233-7722.

Another venerable inn with antique furnishings and modern amenities is the Ballastone Inn, located at 14 East Oglethorpe Ave. It has 17 rooms in the main building constructed in 1835 and restored 12 years ago and six suites in Ballastone Townhouses, from 1838, about four blocks away.

Here, doubles are \$95 to \$175, including Continental breakfast served either in the room, the parlor or the courtyard. For more information call (800) 822-4553.

Another popular inn is the Eliza Thompson House, located at 5 West Jones St. The 25 rooms are \$88 to \$108 for two people, including Continental breakfast and daily wine-and-cheese reception. For more information call (800) 343-9378.

Budget choice: A lovely inn in a budget price range is the Bed and Breakfast Inn, located at 117 West Gordon St. The 14 rooms, \$48 to \$75 in spring and summer and \$38 to \$65 in fall and winter, are in two row townhouses. WHERE TO EAT

The most acclaimed restaurant in town is probably Elizabeth on 37th, located at 105 East 37th St. It is in a

turn-of-the-century mansion and it specializes in innovative Southern cuisine.

Elizabeth Terry's fare includes Vidalia onions stuffed with sausage, cream of asparagus soup with oysters, and fresh fish dishes such as snapper marinated in sesame oil and soy sauce, then pan sauteed and served on a bed of Oriental cabbage with fresh ginger, apple and bacon. A typical meal for two with a modest wine is \$60 to \$70. For more information call (912) 236-5547.

The 17 Hundred 90 Restaurant, located at 307 East President St., is a popular high-end restaurant that's part of the 17 Hundred 90 Inn. Ulie Wildinger's specialty is the rack of lamb Dijon, served with mint and vegetables.

The restaurant, with a spiral staircase up to the inn, also specializes in seafood such as a poached Norwegian pink salmon or red snapper Parisienne. A typical meal for two with appetizers and a modest wine would run around \$70. For more information call (912) 236-7122.

A more modest but equally popular Savannah institution is the Crystal Beer Parlor, located at 301 West Jones St. The building, in operation since 1933, first housed a grocery store, then a pub.

In 1981 American Airlines launched American AAdvantage, the world's first frequent-flyer program. It was supposed to be a short-term promotion, but the plan began a new era in travel.

By simply getting on an airplane, travelers could accrue "miles" that they could exchange for free flights and upgrades. Soon hotel chains and car-rental programs got in on the act. So did the other airlines.

Travelers began to plan unusual routes between destinations — sometimes picking connecting flights over direct flights — in an effort to accrue more mileage.

But the awards and offers became complex. Each airline developed various requirements which had to be met in order to exchange miles for rewards.

In addition, they had short-term offers that gave additional bonus miles for flying certain routes at certain times or staying at particular hotels during a specific time period.

Keeping track of all the deals began to take more time than most frequent flyers had to spare.

That is why Randy Petersen, a former corporate marketing director, decided to enter the scene.

"I was one of those guys who read the fine print, who figured out how to get to the beach in Hawaii as quickly as possible. Friends would turn to their friends and say, 'Call Randy, he knows everything about this.'"

"I saw a marketing niche," Petersen says. In October 1985 he

put together a newsletter called "Frequent." In an entrepreneurial spirit, he stood at New York's John F. Kennedy and La Guardia airports and handed it out for free.

"People said they'd be willing to pay for this kind of insider information," Petersen says. "So I left my job and moved to Colorado and began to publish 'Frequent.'"

"Frequent," which became a monthly newsletter, kept readers up-to-date on short-term promotions and helped them spot the angles that would earn more frequent-flyer miles.

Last January Petersen went upscale, turning his publication into a glossy magazine. He changed the name to "Inside Flyer."

"This is no longer an industry that can be served by a newsletter," he says. "It gets a lot of press, a lot of controversy and a lot of interest." The cover story of the April "Inside Flyer" is an eye-opener about how all the airlines "abruptly scuttled their (frequent-flyer) programs in a frenzied one-hour period late yesterday afternoon."

Not until the reader comes upon a reference to "Trans-Worth Airways" is it clear the article is an April Fools' Day joke.

"The point is that with billions of miles and millions of members, managing these programs is often a major headache for the airlines," Petersen says.

American AAdvantage, for example, now has 16.1 million members, signs on an average of 143,000 new members every month and issued 975,000 free-travel awards in 1990.

"There have been doomsayers on Wall Street since the 1980s saying frequent-flyer programs are just a fad. Believe me, they're going to be around for a long time. I call it the 'greed factor.'"

"First of all, it means 'brand loyalty' for the airlines. A guy with a lot of miles on United will want to fly with United, no matter what. And frequent-flyer programs have provided the airlines with a powerful data base on their customers' traveling and spending habits."

Petersen cites the new "Air Miles" program, set up in conjunction with such companies as Frito Lay, Hyatt Hotels and Time magazine in the United States and Holt Renfrew and Bell Cellular in Canada.

This program rewards "frequent buyers" with domestic airline trips on participating airlines such as Air Canada, American, United and USAir.

By taking out a subscription to Time, for example, a subscriber could earn 100 of the special air miles. For every \$5 spent with Hyatt, one air mile would be earned.

Petersen encourages travelers to join every frequent-flyer program offered by the airlines.

But what happens to the frequent-flyer miles if an airline, such as Eastern or Pan Am, goes bankrupt?

In October 1991 Petersen set up a special mileage-protection program called AwardGuard. For a \$79 per year membership fee, travelers are

assured their frequent-flyer awards will be honored if an airline goes under.

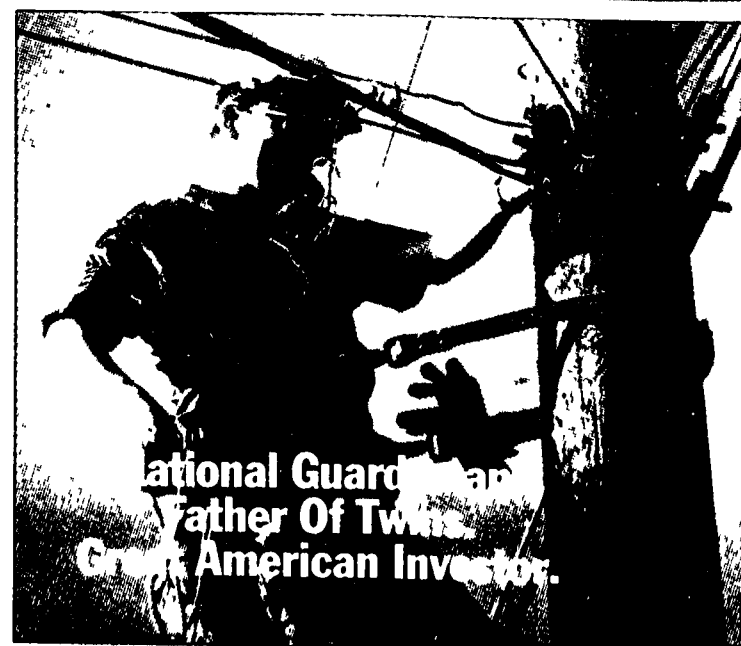
"Close to 700,000 people lost their awards when Midway went under," says Petersen, whose program honored several thousand of those claims. His partner in AwardGuard is Thomas Cook Travel.

Petersen claims a membership of 50,000 people in AwardGuard, which includes a subscription to "In-

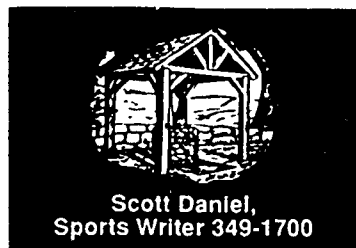
side Flyer." The magazine alone, which has 70,000 subscribers, is \$33 per year.

"We have members in the Soviet Union, Afghanistan and a bunch down in Tahiti," Petersen says. "I guess that's where people with a lot of miles go to retire."

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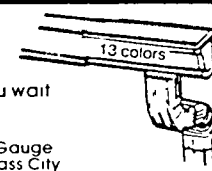
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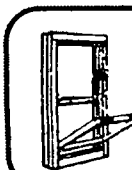
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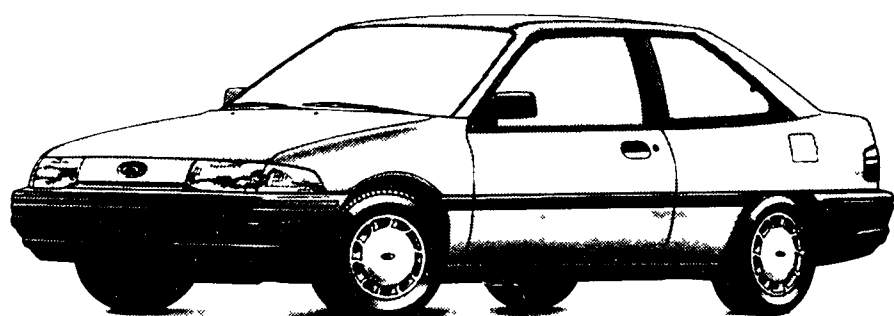
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Kickers beat Salem, Central

Causes of mellitus diabetes discussed



An ancient Greek described diabetes mellitus as a disease where the body was slowly consumed and converted into urine. Although wrong, the idea describes what appears to happen in uncontrolled diabetes — the patient eats and drinks large amounts without gaining weight, while constantly urinating large amounts of fluid.

In the early 20th century, it was discovered that the pancreas produces a hormone called insulin to lower blood sugar. This was a unique finding since all hormones previously studied caused the blood sugar to rise. Insulin was found lacking in deceased people with diabetes mellitus.

At last many problems faced by diabetics could be explained. The blood sugar was high and there was not enough insulin to lower it. The patient's blood contained too much acid during a bad diabetic episode because the body could not correctly utilize its stored energy without insulin. Diabetics urinated large amounts because huge amounts of water were consumed to handle the high sugar load that reached the kidneys. With these discoveries and the mass production of insulin, many people thought diabetes had been cured. They

were wrong.

Although insulin corrects diabetic problems, physicians have not been able to give it to an individual with anywhere near the control the human pancreas does. In a normal person the pancreas continuously changes its insulin output based on the patient's need at that moment. A diabetic cannot monitor his blood sugar every second and therefore does not receive the precisely correct dose of insulin from moment to moment.

The degree to which a diabetic's blood sugar varies from normal is referred to as how well the diabetic is in control. If the blood sugar is in a normal range most of the time, it is well-controlled. If the blood sugar fluctuates widely or is consistently elevated, the patient is poorly controlled.

The major problem facing diabetics today is how to keep the blood sugar under control while avoiding complications. Fortunately, many developments have made a profound impact on treatment. A proper combination of long- and short-acting insulin makes it possible to achieve better control than with a single insulin type. Some diabetics produce insulin but not in sufficient quantities. For these people, new oral medications are effective.

Diabetic control is important because the chance of developing other problems increases as the control worsens. Blindness, cataracts, heart attacks, kidney failure, infections, nerve damage, gangrene and impotence are more likely to occur in poorly controlled diabetics.

In the past 20 years there have been many

developments that have improved both our knowledge and treatment of diabetes mellitus. First has been our improved understanding of genetics in diabetes and the role heredity plays in how diabetes develops. For instance, in certain populations, such as some Indian tribes, about 35 to 50 percent of adults develop a certain type of diabetes. Among Indians the prevalence is only about 1 percent.

Second has been our understanding of the two types of diabetes mellitus — one that requires insulin for therapy and is more difficult to control and one that can be managed with oral medications. Also there is a greater appreciation of the role of obesity, aging and factors such as ongoing drug therapy for other conditions.

Treatment of diabetes has changed drastically. We can now give genetically engineered human insulin to diabetics when we could once give only beef or pork insulin. In addition, there has been the development of new oral medications for diabetic control. We also have technology that allows diabetics to measure their own blood sugar any time using inexpensive machines that can be carried in a handbag.

On the horizon are further developments such as immunotherapy, pancreas transplants and new drug delivery systems that indicate this very common but devastating disease may be conquered.

Real estate firms going high-tech

Real estate brokerage firms are becoming larger and better equipped with sophisticated high-tech marketing capabilities. That's good and bad news for consumers.

The increasing use of computers in real estate offices is greatly enhancing the broker's efforts to find a particular type of home for a prospective buyer and establish a realistic market price for a property. And that strategic data can be accessed in seconds.

Most real estate offices are now equipped with computers, according to a recent survey by the National Association of Realtors. The use of these high-tech marketing tools has tripled during the past decade.

Another current trend that impacts the quality of service received by property buyers and sellers is the increasing size of brokerage firms.

There are still many small firms out there. In fact, more than half of the firms throughout the country have a sales force of five or fewer associates.

But overall, just 8 percent of all associates are now affiliated with small firms. The rest are "hanging their license" with large, multi-office organizations.

At the same time, there has been a drop in training and education programs offered by firms for their associates, the NAR survey said. The small single-office firms tend to rely on informal training—individual counseling with new associates.

Recent years have been tough on brokerage firm owners. Sales have been sluggish or, at best, sporadic. Overhead costs have been rising.

Commission rates have been edging down in some areas. And sales associates are demanding a larger piece of the commission pie.

To survive, some firms are rapidly expanding, adding offices and sales associates. And, where possible, they are cutting expenses, such as costs related to in-house educational programs.

"Real estate firm management has undergone a tremendous change in the last 10 years," said Bobbi Coursele, a longtime Realtor and executive with the multi-office firm of R.R. Gable, Inc. in Southern California.

"Tomorrow's company owners and managers must draw on the history of yesterday for answers. An environment of creativity must take over from the way we've always done it." The answer lies in better service to the client, including the use of such high-tech aids as computerized time planners, client follow-up and client match programs."

Q. Does the law require sellers to disclose the condition of their home in writing to prospective buyers?

A. It depends on the state. An increasing number of states have passed laws requiring a written home condition disclosure from sellers.

The most recent states to enact such legislation are Wisconsin and Virginia. A seller disclosure law was first passed by California and Maine in the late 1980s.

Q. What's the most popular type of home mortgage financing—a fixed-rate or adjustable-rate loan?

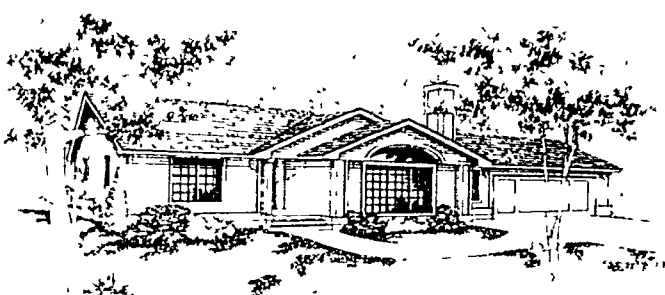

Designed as a starter home, the Justine is well-suited to meeting the needs of a young family. The master suite is located within earshot of the other two bedrooms, while the sound separation provided by two bathrooms and closets, offers an element of privacy.

No need to fight over closet space in the master suite. The huge walk-in closet has enough to go around and then some.

Family living areas are centrally located. Shelves flank the wide, open fireplace in the window-rich living room. An open-style kitchen is separated from the nook and dining areas by nothing more than a work island.

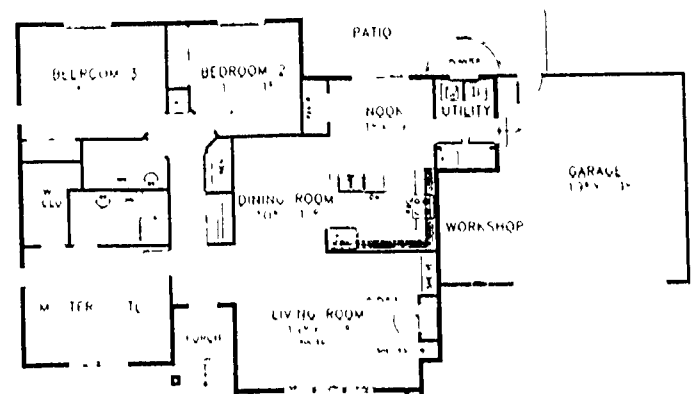
Placement of the sink in the work island eliminates the isolation

often experienced by cleanup crews when the work area faces a wall.

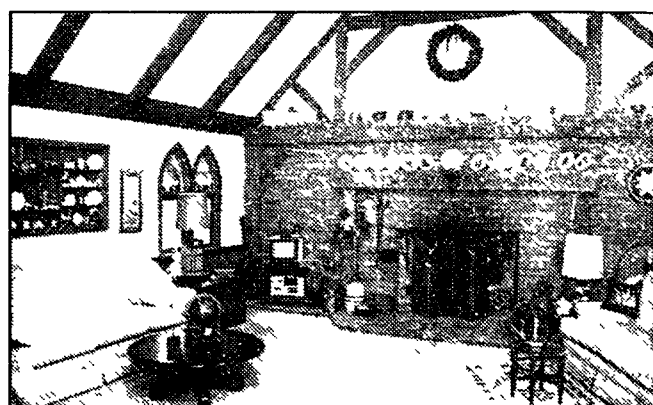

Fragrant houseplants

Q. I have several south- and west-facing windows and would like you to suggest some flowering houseplants that are also fragrant. Please, only easy ones!

A. There are lots of flowering houseplants to choose from that will give fragrance to a room. The only requirement is several hours of full sun in a south, east or unobstructed west window.

Here's my beginner's list: orange jasmine, citrus trees, such as Calamondin orange or Meyer lemon, and sweet olive (most fragrant). All have white flowers that will fill a room with their intoxicating scent and, best of all, they are easy to tend to under average indoor conditions.

GERMINATING TIPS

Once you know the germination requirements for the seeds you wish to plant, all you have to do is find a good location around your home for germinating almost any type of seed.

Many tiny seeds like steady warmth, so for the best outcome I suggest the top of a refrigerator. It has given me great results.

Another ideal spot is under a grow lamp, though a counter

top in your bathroom or kitchen also works well if these rooms are kept warm. The use of a heating cable, one strand under each tray, can provide bottom heat for speeding the germination of warmth-loving seeds. These cables come in various lengths, with or without thermostats.

Other seeds like a cool spot. A cold frame or raised, protected bed outdoors during cool weather, an attic in winter, a closed room (during cold weather), a basement or a north windowsill all have worked marvelously well for me.

These locations also can be used to satisfy any initial chilling or freezing that is required by a specific type (this fact appears on the seed packet). Of course, your freezer or refrigerator can do the same.

Once seeds have been sown, check the moisture of your planting medium daily. If it feels dry, sprinkle the top gently or, better still, water from the bottom with water at room temperature. Allow the water to soak up until the surface becomes moist for a constant moderate degree of moisture.

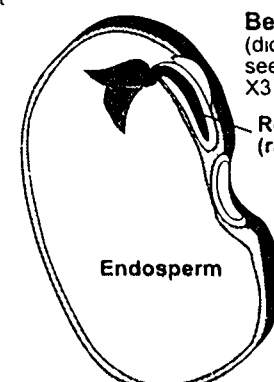

Germinating seeds

- Germinate seeds that like warm conditions on top of a refrigerator, under grow lamps or with heating cables under each tray
- For cool-germinating seeds, try a raised, protected bed outdoors or in a cool attic or basement
- Keep seeds out of direct sunlight
- Check moisture of the planting medium daily. If it feels dry, sprinkle with room-temperature water, allowing water to soak until the surface feels moist

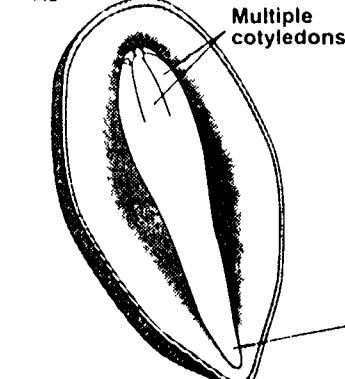
Seed types

A seed consists of an embryo plant and some or no stored food for it (endosperm). Most seeds fall into three seed types

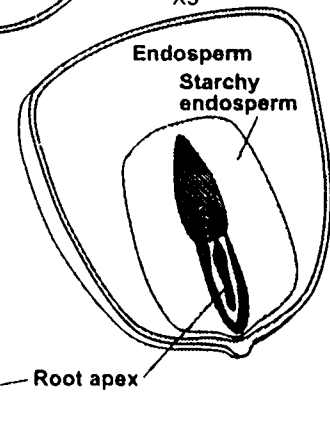


Bean seed (dicotyledon, two seed leaves) X3

thatched cottage in an enchanted forest. Through the front door, which is located at the rear, is a sort of fanciful yellow brick road that almost magically winds through the main floor of the house and ends at the kitchen. It is actually a handsome brown and white Italian ceramic tile.

"Hamill suggested it," Wright said. "It saves on the wear and tear of the rug. You don't see the traffic pattern."

The focal point of the pitched-ceiling great room is the massive brick fireplace which covers an entire wall. Wright said the handmade red bricks from an old schoolhouse and the wooden beams, positioned above, were retrieved from a barn. Both added to the overall warm-hearted character of the home. A curi-

ous cubby hole door next to the fireplace leads to an exterior firewood storage area that is built into the stuccoed fireplace.

This detail is just one example of the imaginative carpentry skill evident in the home.

Norman Rockwell plates are displayed above the mantel. Antiques, family heirlooms, in excellent condition, and souvenirs from trips show Wright's flair for harmonizing her treasures into the decor. Interesting souvenirs are a hand-painted ox cart from Costa Rica, brass table and carafe from Morocco, and miniature rug loom from Turkey. A shadow box, built by Hamill and hung behind the sofa, provides additional space for displaying smaller travel artifacts.

The open kitchen is a cheery blend of the new with the old. Custom-made cupboards and built-in appliances provide convenience. A coordinated wood cover

for the refrigerator door lends an easy-to-clean feature as well as an upbeat tone to the room. At the same time, a vintage butcher block and overhead pegs for hanging baskets and utensils offer old world charm.

The adjoining dining room is flanked with a prominent bay window allowing sunlight and a grand view of the mature evergreens standing in the front yard. A teacup collection is showcased on a specially crafted shelf above the window. The maple wide-planked flooring and the rough straw plaster walls are noteworthy in contributing to the storybook effect.

The master bedroom and bath are in the loft. In this bath, Wright chose a free-standing pedestal sink, claw-footed contour tub, and a draw-string toilet. A lamb fur rug adorns the floor.

This second story also highlights Wright's great

grandparents' Victorian black walnut parlor furniture, an 1873 pump organ, antique brass organ lamp, yarn weasel, an 1895 quilt handmade by her grandmother, lace curtains from a trip to Sweden, collection of handmade muslim dolls, and lovingly framed portraits of her five children.

This storybook home, which offers a delightful escape into another time and place, was deservedly included in the 1986 Milford Home Tour.

"I'm very content with how everything turned out," Wright said. And as this story draws to a close, may she continue to live happily ever after in this Hansel and Gretel house because.

A 19th century Windsor rocker

G. Enclosed is a picture of an old rocking chair. It appears to have the original finish and all original parts.

I would appreciate your comments in regard to its origin, age and value.

A. This is an American Windsor-type rocker that was made in the early 1800s. It would probably sell for \$500 to \$600.

G. This mark is on the bottom of my set of china. It is an 82-piece service for 12 decorated with flowers around the edge and a line of gold on the rim.

Can you tell me anything about the maker and what this set of china would be worth?

A. Your china was made by the Porzellanfabrik in Tirschenreuth, Germany, during the early 1900s. It might be worth around \$500 to

CLOISONNE

Basically, cloisonne is created by soldering a metal wire to a metal base, forming a decorative pattern. The spaces between the wire are filled with various colored enamels and then fired in a kiln. The metals commonly used are copper, brass and silver.

Cloisonne was first made in China in the 14th century. Designs consisted of stylized florals, dragons, geometrics, etc.

One type was Openwork cloisonne. The design was accomplished by applying the colors to the florals, etc., while leaving the background with the base metal exposed.

In Pigeon Blood cloisonne the background was stamped in a stippled effect, then coated with a transparent red enamel. The details of birds, bamboo, etc. were enameled in conventional colors.

In an effort to achieve the effect of silver economically, a sheet of silver foil was wrapped around a brass or copper body. The details were coated with opaque enamels while the background was covered with a transparent enamel revealing a silver effect.

Cameo cloisonne was achieved by piling on

additional enamel to create figures in relief.

At times, a ceramic body was used instead of metal, however, this type of cloisonne is rarely seen today.

Much of the cloisonne seen on today's market was made in Japan. It is usually the brass- or copper-base variety and was made from the late 1800s to the present.

One will encounter cloisonne made in France. Most of the cloisonne jewelry on the antique market was once made in France.

Germinating seeds to become healthy and productive plants

Keep your seed trays out of direct sunlight, which is often too hot and drying, until the seeds have emerged. Then be sure to furnish additional light. Emergence occurs as the baby plant embryo breaks out of its seed coat and the first stem rises out of the soil.

The first leaves that appear on most seedlings are the so-called seed leaves (cotyledons), which

often bear little resemblance to the later leaves. Shortly after the first true leaves (which are more or less typical of the plant) appear, the seed leaves will drop off—don't worry when this happens. It's a natural procedure.

With some types of plants, such as lilies and corn, the first part to appear is a true leaf, which will continue growing.

Growing on to garden-size plants may take only a week, or it

may take several months, depending on what you're sowing. Your seed packet instructions and cultural index on most seed catalogs will give you detailed information about each variety of plant.

After your seedlings are established with healthy roots spreading through the pro-mix, they will need a drier medium and less frequent but more concentrated feedings. Let the surface pro-mix become dry to the touch between

waterings (lower layers should never be allowed to dry out). Fertilize once a week increasing the dosage to 1/2 teaspoon per gallon of water. If plants get too tall before it's time to plant them outdoors, pinch them back. Leave plenty of foliage and some branches so growth can continue, but pinch off just

above a lower leaf or branch. A small pair of pruning shears does a better job than fingers. Sow your seeds in Park Starts, from Park Seed Co. They are the product of the most up-to-date plant growing practices and will enable you to grow strong, healthy seedlings

with minimum effort.

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Money Management

Couples must talk finances

When it comes to money management issues, love cannot afford to be blind. The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants recommends that newlyweds discuss their financial goals and consider how those goals may affect their current and future lifestyles.

SHARE DREAMS AND GOALS

Most couples enter marriage with dreams about their future. However, none of these dreams can be comfortably realized unless you and your spouse set specific goals. Make a list of some short-term and long-term financial goals that you each would like to achieve. Then take a look at your spending and saving habits. Ask yourself if your habits will have to change in light of the new goals you have set.

You should discuss if and when you plan to have children and how this may affect your finances. Don't blithely assume that one of you will be able to stop working or that you can maintain the same lifestyle when children come along.

THE IMPORTANCE OF A BUDGET

The best way to control your spending and plan for the future is by developing a budget. Begin by tracking your monthly expenditures. Identify your fixed expenses such as mortgage or rent payments, commuting costs and car payments. Then determine how much you are spending on nonessential items such as clothing, vacations and gifts. Flowery firm branches out

It's fair to say that people think of flower arranging as a "soft science." If they even think of it as a science at all.

But for Carolyn Arlen of Northville, flowers are better therapy than any medicine. Her flower arranging business, Carolyn's Creations, brings joy to people through custom designed silk and fresh flowers. She can do custom arrangements in silk to match wallpaper and decor in homes and offices, and provide fresh flowers for weddings, parties and funerals.

"It started just as a hobby when I was a kid," Arlen said. "Later on people used to tease me and say I should make it into a business. I used to be a secretary, and I was in a job where it was just driving me over the edge. So I said 'That's it, I'm going to floral school.'"

She completed her training from the DePatis Floral School and earned her accreditation from Schoolcraft College.

Now that she's in the business, and operating from a shop in the basement of her Northville home, the most difficult aspect of Arlen's job is maintaining credibility.

"But I feel I conduct myself professionally. With the brides, I send them cards — which people have told me nobody does — and I think they're impressed with the time I spend with them. This is not just a hobby."

Corporate clients have been impressed with Arlen's work as well. She has created indoor floral arrangements for area businesses and office buildings.

"Silk flowers are great for low light areas, and they're ideal for offices where the temperature fluctuates and no one pays attention to watering," Arlen said.

Indeed, Arlen has gotten her greatest satisfaction and stretched her creative tendrils to their limits on commercial jobs.

"When I did Fair Lane (the Henry Ford estate) that was my single highest achievement, because I did it all myself," she said.

And Arlen truly was by herself at Fair Lane. Each floral artist decorated one room of the mansion with flowers. While other decorators brought in staffs and helpers, Carolyn's Creations had a staff of Arlen and her husband.

Despite exercises in large jobs, her favorite part of the job is the personal contact she maintains with bridal clients. To her, it's more important to listen to the bride than to try to sell her something.

"It's a part of somebody's special day," said Arlen. "I enjoy consulting with the bride, trying to reflect her personality and capturing the mood of the day."

Arlen gives back to her profession, too, by teaching classes in floral arranging at local community centers. Students are often amazed at how creative they can be.

"Most people feel they're not that talented," Arlen said. "Everybody leaves with a finished product, and they feel like they've accomplished something."

YEARS AGO, both Calvin Coolidge and Herbert Hoover promised "a chicken in every pot" in their campaign slogans. William McKinley's slogan touted "a full dinner pail."

Homearama Spring 1992 builders start with a minimum three-car garage, considered basic, in this custom buyer's market and end up with a promise that "the sky's the limit" to their designs.

Times have changed in the custom home market.

Some builders add features that they personally prefer in their own homes.

Double staircases — one formal and one in the kitchen area — are common in Homearama Spring 1992.

"We want to create value," said David Robertson, of Robertson Brothers Co. Bloomfield Hills.

He's offering "The Lexington," priced in the range of \$285,000 to \$325,000, with a drivet exterior with quoin corners.

Before Drivit, Michigan frost played havoc with stucco.

Brothers David and Paul Robertson are following in father Paul Sr.'s footsteps. He started Robertson Brothers Co. in 1946.

David calls his Homearama display a sort of "research and development" into a new market, different from the condominium construction they've been involved with.

MARK MATTA of Pinnacle Residential Homes, Inc., Rochester Hills, is responsible for selling the idea of holding this Homearama in Oakland Township, says township supervisor Joan Buser. Matta has owned a home for 3½ years in the adjacent phase-one development and is president of his homeowners association, Buser said.

His "The Franklin" is a traditional colonial, 3,818 square feet, in the \$329,000 to \$374,900 price range.

"This is a high-end buyer," Matta said. "This is a second- or third-move family, young executives or transferees. This market has slowed down, but it's unlike the first move-up buyer market, which has dried up. These are people who are secure in their jobs, who are taking advantage of a new growth area. Oakland Township is a sleeper community, growing slowly."

"It's far enough removed from the city with some wildlife and a country atmosphere. I see a good future in Oakland Township. They're slow to issue permits and are controlling the growth. There's a mix of individuals and a lot of families."

The exterior of "The Franklin" is brick and fieldstone with cedar lap siding and shake. The fieldstone required a stonemason "so that it fits like a jigsaw puzzle," Matta said.

Homearama builder wins peers' plaudits

THE SUCCESSFUL, soon-to-be successes and dreamers will dot the Homearama Spring 1992 showgoer list.

Lovers of luxury will delight in the amenities afforded by the 10 new homes at Meadows At Oakland Farms, developed by M.J.C. Construction, Mount Clemens, and S.R. Jacobson Development Corp., Birmingham.

The Oakland Township homes are valued at \$300,000 to \$500,000 each.

The show is sponsored by the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan. Dual-income young professionals, in the 35-50 age group with families, are targeted as buyers.

Builders are quick to assert they welcome browsers, too.

"Homearamas are marvelous marketing tools," said Robert R. Jones, president of Robert R. Jones Associates, Inc., West Bloomfield. "People come back four or five years later (when they are ready to buy). We have what we call our 'followers.'"

NEWS-WISE, Jones, 55, headlines the parade of builders in Homearama Spring 1992.

He recently earned a gold medal in the Builder's Spotlight Business Excellence

Awards. Only three gold medals were presented in the competition sponsored by the National Association of Home Builders, Builder Magazine and Marvin Windows.

Jones won in the small-builder category. He stands out because he copyrights his designs, doesn't negotiate prices and deplores debt.

According to the January issue of Builder Magazine, Jones has "in six years built without any leverage, a company with \$4.5 million in assets and a net worth of more than \$2 million."

Jones doesn't like to borrow money to build. Instead, he banks money from previous sales to fund current and future projects.

"We don't like debt and that's putting it succinctly," Jones said in an earlier interview. "In real estate, it's always popular to be leveraged, to use someone else's money. I've always believed you have to have things under control. Debt permeates a lot of things."

IN HIS seventh Homearama, Jones is presenting "The Knorrwood," a 3,732-square-foot home in the \$350,000-\$495,000 price range.

"The price range has to be in the range that we build in," Jones said. "We're not in starter homes. These are attainable, not affordable, homes."

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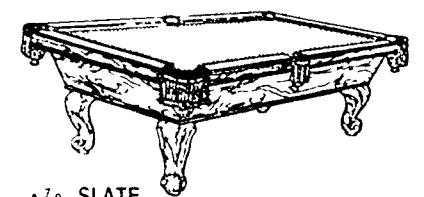

Parade of homes showcases house with a brain

IT'S THE end of a long, stressful day and you're headed home. Imagine walking into an empty house and finding that dinner is warming in the electric oven, the air conditioner is cooling and a relaxing bath is waiting with warmed towels.

Too good to be true? No, it's all made possible by the home's computerized brain.

A house with a brain is difficult to imagine.

To help consumers get the picture, Detroit Edison Co., Wake-Pratt Construction Co. of Troy and the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan will showcase Michigan's first automated, all-electric Smart House May 7-25 at Homearama Spring 1992, a display of new homes built by BASM members.

The 4,900-square-foot Smart House is one of 10 Homearama homes at Meadows At Oakland Farms subdivision on Gunn Road, west of Rochester Road, in Oakland Township.

THIS SMART House is one of only five operable Smart Houses in the world. All are in the U.S.

The first Smart House, built with a

limited amount of SMART-REDI technology, was built in 1991 in Atlanta, Ga., said Bill Steele, Detroit Edison Co. builder liaison.

Other Smart Houses followed, in order, in Columbus, Ohio; Baltimore, Md.; Washington, D.C.; and Las Vegas, Nev. Each one improved upon the one built before, Steele said.

"The computerized Smart House is the home of the future," he said. "It's the Jetsons — 1990s style."

The house features convenience and efficiency, Steele said.

"For example, it lets you operate

appliances when you're away from home, monitor the baby's room by switching the television channel and draw the bath water or turn on the shower without getting out of bed."

A videotape, or laser disc, can be played in one room and watched in any room in the house, Steele said. The homeowner can connect a telephone in any room and talk to a person in another room.

THE HOUSE also features a high-efficiency geothermal heat pump, which can save homeowners up to 50 percent on air conditioning and 30 percent on heating costs, Steele said.

Detroit Edison is financing the special wiring in the demonstration house that links together the home's energy, security, lighting, entertainment and other systems.

Three types of specialized electric cables tied to a centralized computer controller — the brain — create the integrated wiring network that makes the house "Smart." The home's various systems can be controlled by using a touch-tone telephone, keypad or touch-screen monitor.

All this wiring adds about \$9,500 to the cost of a 2,500-square-foot house. It costs about \$11,500 to \$12,000 to make a 2,500-square-foot house fully "Smart," Steele said.

DETROIT EDISON teamed up with Wake-Pratt and Smart House Limited

Partnership to bring this technology to Michigan.

Smart House Limited Partnership, based in Upper Marlboro, Md., is a cooperative research and development effort begun in 1984 by the National Association of Home Builders.

"Detroit Edison is presenting this house to the public because we believe our residential customers are looking for cost-effective and energy-efficient alternatives in home management," Steele said.

Added Donald L. Pratt, president of Wake-Pratt: "Smart House is an exciting trend in residential housing."

Homeowners have been waiting for something new, he said.

Detroit Edison will show Smart House by guided tour during Homearama Spring 1992 and then Thursdays through Sundays during June. Wake-Pratt will then sell the house in July.

"Fifteen to 20 people will be brought in at one time (during Homearama)" Steele said. "There will be five groups in the house at the same time, 100 people at one time, at nine stops."

Detroit Edison is a co-sponsor of Homearama, together with Consumers Power Co. — which is promoting an all-natural gas house directly across the street by builder James Rutkowski of James Joseph Enterprises, Inc., Rochester Hills — and Standard Federal Bank.

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
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
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

"The Albertville," a 4,288-square-foot French chateau style, in the \$399,000 to \$469,000 house.

Named for this year's Winter Olympics, the home has seven skylights. There's also a sauna in the exercise room, said Klapp, a first-time Homearama builder.

There's a fireplace in the master suite, living room and family room, a recycling center in the kitchen, marble in the foyer and hall, and cherry cabinets with granite tops in the kitchen.

Bill Kamego of Kamego Building Co., Sterling Heights, offers a garage large enough for five vehicles.

This is his third Homearama and he's presenting "The Devonshire," a 3,600-square-foot home in the \$315,000 to \$435,000 price range. The home has octagon balusters and a newel post on the foyer stairway and decorative English pelmets.

His wife, Mary, is the interior designer. "People get personal services," she said. "There are no supervisors. They talk to Bill, Bill Jr. or me."

The home is replete with closets, another much-demanded feature. One of the main features Mary designed is a walk-in shower so deep it doesn't need a door to stop the spray from coming out. She designed it this way because she dislikes cleaning shower doors.

PROJECT DEVELOPERS Michael Chirco of M.J.C. Construction, Mount Clemens, and Scott Jacobson of S.R. Jacobson Development Corp., Birmingham, who also are showing homes in this Homearama, wanted to stress creativity.

They both drew upon their travels to

Georgia and California. They enjoy the country atmosphere in Oakland Township with nearby amenities in Rochester and Rochester Hills.

"We're stressing that in this marketplace, you have to be more creative to get your piece of the pie," Jacobson said. "People are much smarter and more demanding."

In his 3,700-square-foot house, "The Sussex," priced at \$395,000, Jacobson features a Georgian-style exterior and four fireplaces, one in the master bedroom.

Instead of the traditional center entry, the entry of "The Sussex" is to the right. An open stairway leads to the four bedrooms on the second floor.

Chirco's "The Stratford" is a 4,100-square-foot colonial with a French country elevation. It's priced in the \$324,900-\$420,000 range. A circular stairway in the foyer leads to a bridge overlooking the family room and foyer. There's a vaulted ceiling in the family room with a marble-paneled fireplace. The master bath features a whirlpool tub and an oversized shower with a seat and glass on two sides.

JAMES RUTKOWSKI of James Joseph Enterprises, Inc., Rochester Hills, features a full theater in the lower level of his 4,400-square-foot home, "The American," priced at \$499,000. The theater is part of a '50s theme complete with a bar, a Coke machine and an entertainment center.

Every room in the house has a different ceiling design — cathedral, pan, barrel, stepped, cone, pyramid and arched. There's two marble fireplaces and one brick fireplace as well as a two-island kitchen.

"It's important to give all the appeal

possible for a good dollar amount," Rutkowski said.

Rutkowski's house is powered by all natural gas.

"The Porto Fino II," priced at \$390,000 is a 3,750-square-foot home with a neo-classic exterior. Offered by Michael Mocer of Capitol Homes Associates, Mount Clemens, the home has a

mini-balcony overlooking the front entrance. "We have an open style with lots of windows," Jones said.

Jones has a surprise — an old-fashioned phone booth, complete with a glass door — in the kitchen.

He believes in the team approach, with emphasis on doing work in-house. Among his staff of 13, he employs a civil engineer and a designer. He also owns a computer-aided design (CAD) system.
