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Candidates for school board address issues

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Meanwhile write-in candidate Phil Phillips, spokesperson for Citizens for a Better Northville, saw the forum as more of a spectator sport. He watched from the sidelines listening to more than 40 people publicly quiz his opponents.

Candidates will face off in the June 8 election for two seats that are up for re-election. Incumbents Donald Klokenga and Carol Rahimi are both seeking to retain their seats against newcomers Glen Meisel and Patricia Custer.

Their race will be accompanied on the ballot by separate requests for a 22.63-mill renewal and 1.4-mill tax increase. Voters will also be asked to cast votes favoring or opposing a

state's Schools of Choice initiative.

The candidate forum was sponsored by the League of Women Voters of Northville-Plymouth-Canton and was taped by Omnicon cable television to air Wednesday, May 27, Thursday, May 28, and Monday, June 1. Check local listing for times.

After a brief two-minute introduction about themselves, candidates fielded questions audience members had written down on index cards.

Not surprisingly, questions from audience members stuck to heated issues that have recently surfaced in the district — millage proposals, candidates qualifications, and conflict-of-interest policies.

Rahimi and Klokenga both backed the 22.63-mill renewal and 1.4-mill tax increase. Fellow candidate Glen Meisel — a teacher at Roosevelt high school in Wyandotte and a MEA union member — said he too supports both proposals. Candidate Patricia Custer, who owns a pri-

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At issue is a proposed parking management program that will first set up designated areas for downtown employees to park. The designated lots would be set aside in less prime parking areas, to make prime spaces available for shoppers and other downtown business customers.

The plan is the result of discussions at several DDA meetings, and surveys by the Northville Chamber of Commerce's Business Development and Retention Committee that labeled parking as a chief concern of merchants and shoppers alike.

The program's success, DDA and BDRC members noted, hinges on cooperation and enforcement by the merchants themselves.

If it fails, the DDA has proposed parking restrictions to forbid any cars from parking in certain prime customer spots in the morning, until

stores are open for business. The aim is to force employees to park in the less-prime spots when they arrive for work.

"There's two parts to the program, but hopefully we won't have to get to the second part," said DDA member Greg Presley. "We don't want to get to the second part because it means getting the police involved, putting up signs, etcetera."

The May 19 meeting at Edward's Caterer was the first of two to gather feedback on the proposed plan. The second is scheduled for May 26 at Genitti's Hole-in-the-Wall Restaurant, 108 E. Main St.

A dozen business owners and representatives showed up for the first meeting, and the response to the plan was positive. "I think that's very good," said Liquor Shoppe owner Joe Spagnuolo.

But not all the merchants were sure it would prove successful in the long run. "That's fine in the summer, but it's not going to work in the winter... You may need more (designated employee) spaces not so far away," said Grandma Betty's owner Betty Burch.

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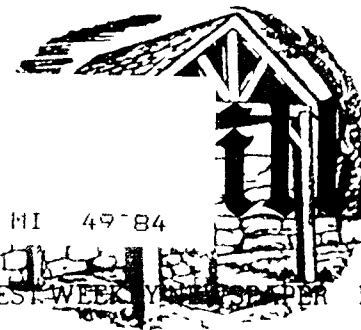
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Wyandotte has undergone some downtown renovations of its own, somewhat like Northville during the city's Main Street '78 project. DeSana said.

"We didn't have to dig up the roads, but we've buried our electric lines and redone the parking lots," he said.

In similar communities, DeSana said.

"That's what you learn from those things. That's the only purpose... I want to see what you're doing in your community that may have a positive impact on us."

The Wyandotte contingent arrived at Northville City Hall at 11:30 a.m., and were treated to a flag-raising ceremony and performance by the Northville High School Band. From there they headed to the First Presbyterian Church on Main Street for a luncheon with the Rotarians,

The two cities share a tie other than Mayor's Exchange Day. Wyandotte

bought a trolley in 1991 from local restaurateurs John and Toni Genitti and Al Valente. Known as the Northville Trolley, it had been insured by the city and used for Northville festivals and events, but the city council had threatened to pull its insurance because it was being rented out for other uses like weddings.

The Wyandotte city council approved that city's purchase of the trolley and since then it has been used for festivals and events there under the auspices of Wyandotte's Downtown Development Authority.

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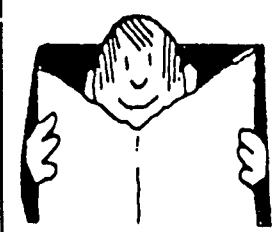

Downtown merchants will see spots

The designated spaces are planned for the southwest corner of the MAGS parking lot, the west and north edge of the public lot north of MAGS, and a portion of the public lot along East Dunlap east of Edwards Caterer. Also slated for employee parking are two gravel lots on the south side of Cady Street, and a paved lot across the street along the Hutton Street extension.

Those boundaries may change slightly in response to feedback at the meetings.

The designated spots will be marked with an orange dot, which prompted some word play by the speakers at Wednesday's meeting.

"When your employees go to look for a spot, all they'll have to do is park on the dot," Presley said. He also coined a slogan for the program: "When

you park on the dot, it means a lot!"

Mayor Chris Johnson noted that each space taken by an employee represents the potential loss of several customers. "One space taken by an employee may accommodate five, six, seven customers throughout the day," he said.

While all downtown employees will be subject to the plan, their employers are exempt.

"If we can get employee compliance, I think we'll get what we need," Presley said.

"We expect that business owners will have legitimate reasons to need a close-in spot," he said, leaving it up to the individual business owners to decide whether they wanted to take up a prime parking space that could be used by a customer.

Presley warned the businesspeople that the need for better parking management, and designated employee parking, will not end with con-

struction of an expanded parking deck on Cady Street. City officials plan to tear down the two-level Cady Street parking deck and replace it with a much larger three-floor version, but fiscal constraints have put the proposal on hold.

"(Parking management) won't be a temporary solution," Presley said. "It will be the way we park in Northville into the future."

While city police will note employee cars that repeatedly park outside the designated areas, the speakers noted that the business owners will be in a better position to monitor compliance.

"You're the actual eyes and ears of what's going on out there right now," Presley noted.

"Be your own watchdogs," said Chamber of Commerce Director Laurie Marrs.

Bill paves way for patient advocate notices

Michiganians will be able to designate a patient advocate on their driver's licenses next year under a bill approved by the House of Representatives.

"It would take just a sticker. And there's no need to have it witnessed," said Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington

Hills, the sponsor.

Her House Bill 5450 won 101-0 approval last week and was sent to the Senate.

"It's one of those things that had to be done. Organ donors were very supportive. So was the Michigan Hospital Association," she said.

Under current law, drivers who want to donate an organ in the event of their deaths may sign a sticker before two witnesses and affix it to the back of their licenses.

Last year the Legislature passed a patient advocate law, allowing a person to designate another to make

medical decisions when the principal becomes incapacitated.

Dolan's bill provides for listing the patient advocate's name and telephone number. She said hospital emergency room personnel would be able to find it faster on a license than looking through a patient's papers.

tension at city hall, Konrad said.

"It's frustrating," she said. "Some days you don't even have time to think around here."

Under a recent staff reorganization, planning commission minutes are now recorded by Building Inspector Joe Attard and compiled by the building department.

But other than that, most of her deputy's duties have fallen on her shoulders, Konrad said.

"We worked as a team, and then not being able to replace that position, it's been extremely difficult for me to do two jobs," she said. "I don't think they realized that no one else would have time to help me."

Assessor Mark Christiansen was named to the dual roles of Chief Financial Officer and Office Manager in the reorganization, but Konrad said Christiansen has had little time to fill both roles and train other employees to work between departments.

"Mark just doesn't have the time to spend finding a solution to cross-training," she said.

Konrad has a long list of duties of her own. The city's clerk is responsible for keeping city records and ordinances in order, recording city council and downtown development authority meeting minutes, preparing public hearing notices, handling the city's liability insurance, and tracking licenses and business registrations, for starters. Among the more daunting tasks facing the clerk is coordination of city elections, Konrad said.

"This is an election year, and it's the biggest election that we run," she said. "Usually we have a 75-80 percent turnout for a presidential."

The clerk also oversees the clerical staff, which requires a basic working knowledge of most of the city's departments.

City Manager Gary Word acknowledged the strains that cutbacks have made on Konrad and her staff.

"It's a strain for the entire organization," Word said. "Cathy and I, I

think, have to sit down and review what her job description is, and what the job requirements are . . . She does not currently have a well-defined job description."

"The job is a substantial one and will require the (incoming) person to be well-disciplined and have strong skills."

Word, who described Konrad as an "excellent, very knowledgeable employee," said, "It will be difficult if not impossible to replace her . . . You don't lose 20 years of knowledge and just replace it; it just doesn't happen. So we've got our work cut out for us."

A Plymouth native, Konrad graduated from Plymouth High School and studied at Schoolcraft College before entering the job market and working as a secretary for several firms.

She began working for the city in the clerk's department in 1972. She became executive secretary 1973, working for City Manager Steve Walters shortly after his arrival at city hall. She was named the head clerk, the position she now holds, in 1985.

While tensions may be flaring now, Konrad said her tenure at city hall has been a good one.

"This has been my life, the stability in my life, really," she said. "It's a small office, so you develop close friendships here . . . It's been quite a pleasant place to work."

Even so, the departure will not be overly traumatic.

"I'm not sad to leave, really," she said. "It was a hard decision to make but I'm quite comfortable with it."

Konrad does not plan to rush back into the job market either, preferring to spend her time redecorating the home she and her husband bought in Marshall, rediscovering interests like sewing, and getting to know Watkins' 11-year-old son Scott.

Konrad's ties to the Northville community will remain strong despite her change of employment. With parents and a grandmother in Plymouth, and a sister in Canton, she said, "I'm sure I'll be back a lot."

vate physical therapy practice in town, said she would support the renewal but stood as the sole opponent to the tax increase.

That pretty much set the tone for the rest of the forum, with the two incumbents and Meisel seeing eye to eye on most of the issues and Custer standing opposed.

"I represent the majority of Northville residents who opposed the millage," Custer said. This time, she said she's "in favor of the renewal but opposed to the increase. I find it insulting to us that the board threatens us with cuts to existing programs."

Despite that discrepancy, all four candidates concurred that a multi-year millage was the ideal way to operate the district. However, the three pro-millage candidates — Rahimi, Klokenga, and Meisel — recognized the difficulty of having a multi-year millage in today's uncertain school finance times.

"I favor a multi-year millage because it lets the board know what's happening," Meisel said. "It's a better benefit to the district and lets things flow a little easier."

Rahimi said, "None of us like to do this every year. It takes an enormous amount of time, time we'd rather be spending on educational programs. Hopefully next spring (school finance in Lansing) will settle down and we can go for a multi-year millage."

Klokenga said he favors a multi-year millage over annual tax rate requests, but added that the uncertainty of the state's budget coupled with a slew of state mandates being put on the district's shoulders makes forecasting beyond the year unfeasible.

"I support a multi-year millage so they (board members) could plan a budget without annual requests," Custer said.

Should voters reject the tax increase next month, candidates were asked whether or not they would support the proposed cuts, and if not, how they would change them. Rahimi, Klokenga, and Meisel said they supported the cuts suggested by the district's strategic planning committee, but Custer said the board needs to go back to the drawing

Candidate Custer knocks foes

The race between the four candidates for school board heated up Tuesday night as contender Patricia Custer drew harsh words against her three opponents concerning a board conflict-of-interest policy.

Custer's comments about the conflict controversy — on the surface — seemed to disqualify her three opponents from ethically seeking seats on the board.

"I'm an independent candidate," she said. "I'm not married to a teacher nor am I a member of a teacher's union." Custer also cited concerns she had about paid and unpaid positions current board member Carol Rahimi had held in the district prior to her election four years ago.

In a single statement, Custer

trashed all three opponents for what she believes are conflicts of interest. For Donald Klokenga, the allegation that he could not be an impartial member of the board was just a remnant of a complaint leveled against him earlier this month by members of a citizens group. Klokenga's wife is a teacher at Meads Mills.

"It's a political issue for the people of Northville to decide," Klokenga said in response to Custer's charge. "I fulfill the requirements for a board of education candidate. If the sole act of being elected to office puts me in violation of a board policy, then the policy cannot be valid. Board policy cannot contradict the laws of the state."

For Glen Meisel, a teacher at Roosevelt high school and a member of the teachers' union there, Custer's attack was a moot point.

"Yes I am a teacher and a union

member," Meisel said in his own defense. "But that doesn't necessarily mean that I'm a strong union member or a weak one and that has nothing to do with the teachers of Northville. If I'm elected there won't be a conflict of interest."

When Meisel was asked if he was elected would he resign his current teaching position, he answered with a quick no and added with the recent purchase of his home in Northville he couldn't afford to.

Custer alleged that since Rahimi has held paid positions in the district prior to now, she too opens herself up for potential conflicts.

"Board positions are volunteer positions," Rahimi said. "We are one of few boards that doesn't receive enumeration," she said in her own defense.

Shifting political wind is both good and bad

A gathering political storm in Northville Township already has knocked a few leaves from the trees, and indications are that by November, much of the current governmental structure could be swept away.

Three members of the township board — one fewer than a majority — have said they won't again run for office. Other incumbents are in serious trouble, though we wonder if they realize it.

Additionally, the township is seeking bids for legal, engineering, and assessing services. Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk, the township's controversial law firm, won't even tender a bid. As one trustee last week put it, "they saw the handwriting on the wall."

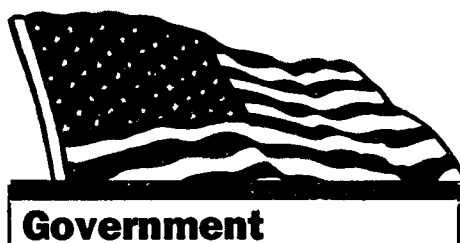
Trustees Donald Williams and Thomas Handyside, as well as Treasurer Jack Hosmer, will step down from the board in November. For Williams, the goodbye comes a year too late; he spends most of his time in Florida and has not been able to capably represent township residents.

Handyside and Hosmer are different stories, though each is unique. Handyside simply lost effectiveness when he took over a top management job at Browning-Ferris Industries, which includes handling the operations of BFI's Arbor Hills Landfill in neighboring Salem Township.

There were times when Handyside was the best township elected official. He's intelligent and is able, most of the time, to see through the transparent, petty politics fostered by current and former top-ranking township officials. He brought an understanding of water and sewer issues to the township, but ironically, his abilities landed him a job that does pose a conflict with his township duties.

When Handyside argued against the township's weighmaster program, it was, in part, because the trucking industry — a BFI staple — was effected. Real questions exist about a township/BFI agreement which supposedly would land the township four years worth of free recycling services, and other township/BFI issues remain unresolved.

For too long, BFI has maintained a cozy presence within township hall. Communication should continue between neighbors, but BFI's influence perhaps is too strong here. Handyside



made a wise choice when he decided not to again run for office.

Hosmer's decision to step aside is a disappointment. A studious, soft-spoken outsider, Hosmer has implemented a far-reaching study aimed at forecasting the township's financial future. No one in recent memory has attempted such a progressive approach to township finances.

But Hosmer recently called it quits, after the board rearranged its salaries and benefits packages for elected officials.

We're convinced this isn't a case of Hosmer being upset that his salary was cut. The more likely explanation, substantiated by his actions, was that he was bothered by a poorly-conceived salary review process that forced a three-member citizen's panel to offer a quick study of the township and its compensation packages. The study was hampered by township officials' spoon-feeding of facts and figures, including the outright exclusion of some perks afforded elected officials.

Hosmer felt a more thorough review was needed, and sided with a township resident who voiced that opinion at a recent board meeting.

When two trustees lashed into the resident, that, combined with the quickie review and other questionable township actions, was enough to push Hosmer out of board service.

It's tough to be a professional when surrounded by unprofessionalism and inability — traits that too often define the township's basic administrative structure.

Poor government continues to stick like discarded chewing gum to the collective shoe of township taxpayers. But Hosmer, who's been innovative and forward-thinking since assuming the treasurer's slot, found out later than most that old habits die hard in Northville Township.

Commission charges state's adoption rules too restrictive

Michigan will have a glut of children in foster care unless it can speed up adoptions, a state panel has said.

"People are going to be held accountable for the time it takes," said Don Marengere, president of the Adoption Option and a member of Lt. Gov. Connie Binsfeld's commission.

"The courts, the Department of Social Services and agencies may be slow processing paper. A child may be ready. The delay isn't good for the child, the system or parents-to-be," the Bloomfield Township adoptive father said.

"I learned a lot of questions I should be asking," said Oakland Probate Judge Joan E. Young, another commission member. Her court handles termination of parental custody rights.

"Once a child is available, what happens then? What has been done to place the child in a permanent, loving home? What should the department or agency be doing?"

"I don't take 'We're working on it' for an answer," said Young, a former social worker before turning to law.

Marengere and Young were among 10 people from government and the private sector appointed by Gov. John Engler a year ago.

Engler himself appeared with the

commission Tuesday in Lansing to say the purpose of speeding up adoptions "was not pure cost avoidance. Theoretically, these recommendations are cost-neutral. It's not a dollars-and-cents issue."

One unstated theme for Engler and Binsfeld, both pro-life, is to encourage adoption as an alternative to abortion for teens.

Michigan records about 136,000 births in a typical year, 65,000 abortions and some 4,000 adoptions. In recent decades, abortions and out-of-wedlock births have soared while adoptions have dropped.

Half those adoptions are "related" — a husband adopting his wife's children by a previous marriage.

The other half are "unrelated." About 1,000 of those are infant adoptions.

Some 1,200 are older children, many with handicaps or health problems called "special needs." Here is where the slowdown occurs.

"More teens need to be presented the adoption option, not fewer," said Marengere. "Everybody — the religions, counselors in school, doctors, nurses — can do a much better job."

In 1991, the Department of Social Services had 2,200 children waiting adoptive placement, said director Gerald Miller.

"The number of children becoming wards of the state and entering the

system is now 1,600 a year. The current adoption rate in Michigan for state wards is 1,200 adoptions a year.

"Projecting an incremental increase of 400 children annually who are not adopted, there will be 5,000 children awaiting adoptive families in the year 2000," said Miller, reading from the 125-page report titled "A Child Is Waiting."

He praised Engler for allocating \$3 million to help preserve and unify troubled families but joined the commission's call for more user-friendly procedures.

The goal, said Binsfeld, is that by 2000 "no child is waiting. The wait is over."

State Sen. Jack Welborn, R-Kalamazoo, said finding families for children now can avoid crime problems later.

"I was proud to see three department heads involved — Mental Health, Public Health and Social Services," Welborn said. "The fourth human services department — Corrections — was not involved."

"If we don't do something now, they (unwanted children) will be into another human services department down the road — Corrections," said Welborn, pledging to start hearings soon on the legislative changes recommended by Binsfeld's panel.

Immediate insurance urged for kids

Health insurers should be required to treat adopted children just like birth children — cover them the day they enter the home, Lt. Gov. Connie Binsfeld's panel on adoption says.

"That will take legislation," said Binsfeld. "We have children with special needs. They're not covered by insurance companies in the first year until the adoption is final. It will add an expense to insurance."

Children with pre-existing conditions would also be covered under the proposal.

State Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, has sponsored bills to require health insurance coverage of adoptive children. They have been resisted by some insurers. Endorsements by Gov. John Engler and Binsfeld should help move the bills.

Only a few of the 67 recommendations by the Binsfeld Commission will require changes in state law.

Here are some:

- Adding computers to avoid paperwork in the children's services systems.

- Prohibiting for-profit adoption agencies. "I have a problem with people placing children for financial gain," said panel member Don Marengere.

- Making DSS rules to regulate adoption "facilitators" — doctors, attorneys, clergy, etc.

- Expanding efforts by placing agencies to recruit relatives and family members for adoption placement.

- Encouraging colleges to train counselors, social workers and psychologists in child welfare issues, particularly the need for adoption.

- Training of all adoption workers in "homestudy" — the assessing of potential adoptive parents.

- Training caseworkers about adoption subsidies. Oakland Probate Judge Joan E. Young called ignorance of such subsidies "a barrier to completion" of adoptions.

- Recruiting families for foster care

and adoption to reflect the ethnicity of the children. But it urged that "placement practices assure that children bonded with a family not be removed based on race. We strongly oppose children waiting unnecessarily for a family of like-race."

- Supporting present law protecting the confidentiality of the birth parents by not disclosing identifying information until the adoptee has reached age 18.

- Allowing placing agencies to provide prospective families with non-identifying medical, genetic and health history information about the child and the biological parents.

Marengere said the commission wasn't unanimous, but there was no minority report.

"When you have 10 people in a room to decide, you're going to come up with different ideas. I agree with a majority of the recommendations but not all."

"I thought she (Binsfeld) did a marvelous job, considering all the personalities involved."

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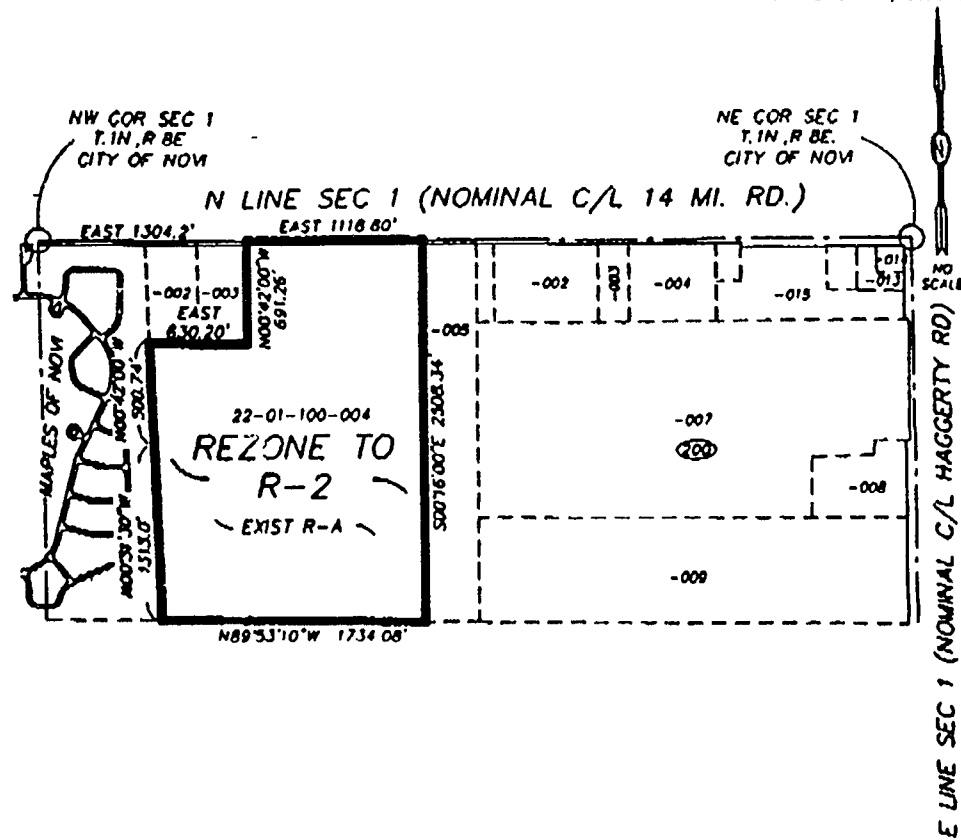

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Sight, smell and taste are all involved in total wine enjoyment. To a wine aficionado, the proper wine glass is a tool used to harmonize the three elements. This tool should be transparent, colorless and unadorned.

According to legend, the first wine glass was fashioned by Aphrodite from a bubble of sea-foam she cut in half coming forth from the sea. Amusing possibly, except for one point made by the myth — wine glasses should be crystal clear.

The Bohemians and Venetians had a secret formula for tinting glass, and until the turn of the century, use of colored wine glasses was both fashionable and practical. Since winemaking techniques had not yet been perfected, wine of that era was cloudy and lacked eye appeal.

A basic all-purpose wine glass should have a minimum 8-ounce volume. This size allows placement of 2-3 ounces of wine in the glass allowing adequate volume for swirling the wine to volatilize aromatic components. Connoisseurs prefer larger sizes, particularly for red wines.

Sparkling wines have the most eye appeal. They should be served in a 6-ounce tulip or flute. These shapes allow the bubbles to rise slowly through the wine from the stem. Watching the tiny bubbles and formation of mousse (the slight head) is part of the total enjoyment.

Pink champagne is very popular. Pinot noir, used in all champagne, except Blanc de blancs, is a red grape. If the winemaker allows a period of skin contact prior to fermentation, or for a short period during fermentation, the resulting wine will have a slight blush. A hollow-stem flute is the perfect glass for pink champagne.

A wine carafe is utilitarian. Some older red wines need decanting. If the wine has been properly stored on its side, the sediment formed during bottle aging has collected there. The bottle should be turned upright several hours prior to decanting. Hold the bottle over a candle and pour the wine into the carafe. When the sediment approaches the neck of the bottle, decanting should be terminated.

The Overture series is priced around \$8.50 per stem; the Vinum series begins at \$15 and the Sommeliers series, the ultimate in fine, hand-blown stemware with a thin, polished lip can range as high as \$70 per stem for the largest goblets. In phoning various merchants who carry Riedel glasses, we found widely disparate prices, so shop before you purchase.

Slades, Southfield; Studio 330, Bloomfield Hills; Cloverleaf Market, Southfield; and all Merchant of Vino locations carry Riedel stemware. It may be special ordered if not immediately on hand.

"The balance of these glasses is perfect," said Bloomfield Hills Studio 330 owner Randy Forester. "No other stemware showcases wine so well." We have used these glasses and we agree.

LUSCIOUS LEMONS
Citrus puts zest into everything it touches

There was a song that was popular a couple of decades back: "Lemon tree, very pretty, and the lemon flower is sweet, but the fruit of the poor lemon is impossible to eat."

While it's true that eating a raw lemon might make your mouth pucker, adding lemon to a recipe can yield mouth-watering results.

The lemon tree is native to Southeastern Asia, but it has made its way all over the world. Now, lemons are grown commercially in the small countries flanking the Mediterranean Sea and in California — the world's leading producer of this versatile citrus fruit. And while other fruits are seasonal, lemons are abundant all year.

Surprisingly, commercial growers do not start their orchards from lemon seeds, as you might expect. Instead, they graft lemon buds to the seedlings of other types of citrus trees, like orange and grapefruit.

Lemons have a long and fascinating history: included in shipboard supplies on long sea voyages, they provided vitamin C that helped prevent sailors from developing scurvy.

Lemons even served in the U.S. military in World War II. Pectin, a powdery substance derived from lemon skins and peels, was used by soldiers to stop wounds from bleeding.

Lemons also pulled double duty during wartime when paper cartons were sprayed with their pulp to resist oils. Such cartons were used to hold gasoline safely for months at a time, freeing metal for more important military uses.

In these health-conscious times, lemons provide a nutritious and weight-wise alternative to other flavor enhancers. Instead of drenching your salads in high-calorie dressings, try a sparkling of fresh herbs, a dash of fresh lemon juice and olive oil. Wedges or thin slices of lemon can provide a flavorful garnish to beverage and many of your favorite dishes, while grated lemon zest adds intense lemon flavor. Use a small hand grater or "zester," scraping only the outer layer of peel and avoiding the white "pith" underneath (this has a bitter flavor).

Lemons might be sour and impossible to eat on their own — but add lemon to recipes like one of these easy-to-prepare microwave dishes, and you've got a lusciously lemony winner.

Recipes in this column are tested in 625 to 700-watt microwave ovens.

Micro-tip of the week:

You'll get more juice from fresh lemons if you pick the skin several times with a fork, then microwave at HIGH (100 percent power) setting 15 to 20 minutes apiece. Let fruit stand one to two minutes, then roll on countertop, pressing down with the palm of your hand before squeezing. When juicing several lemons at a time, arrange them in a circle on the floor of the oven before microwaving.

MIDDLE EAST MEATBALLS FOR TWO

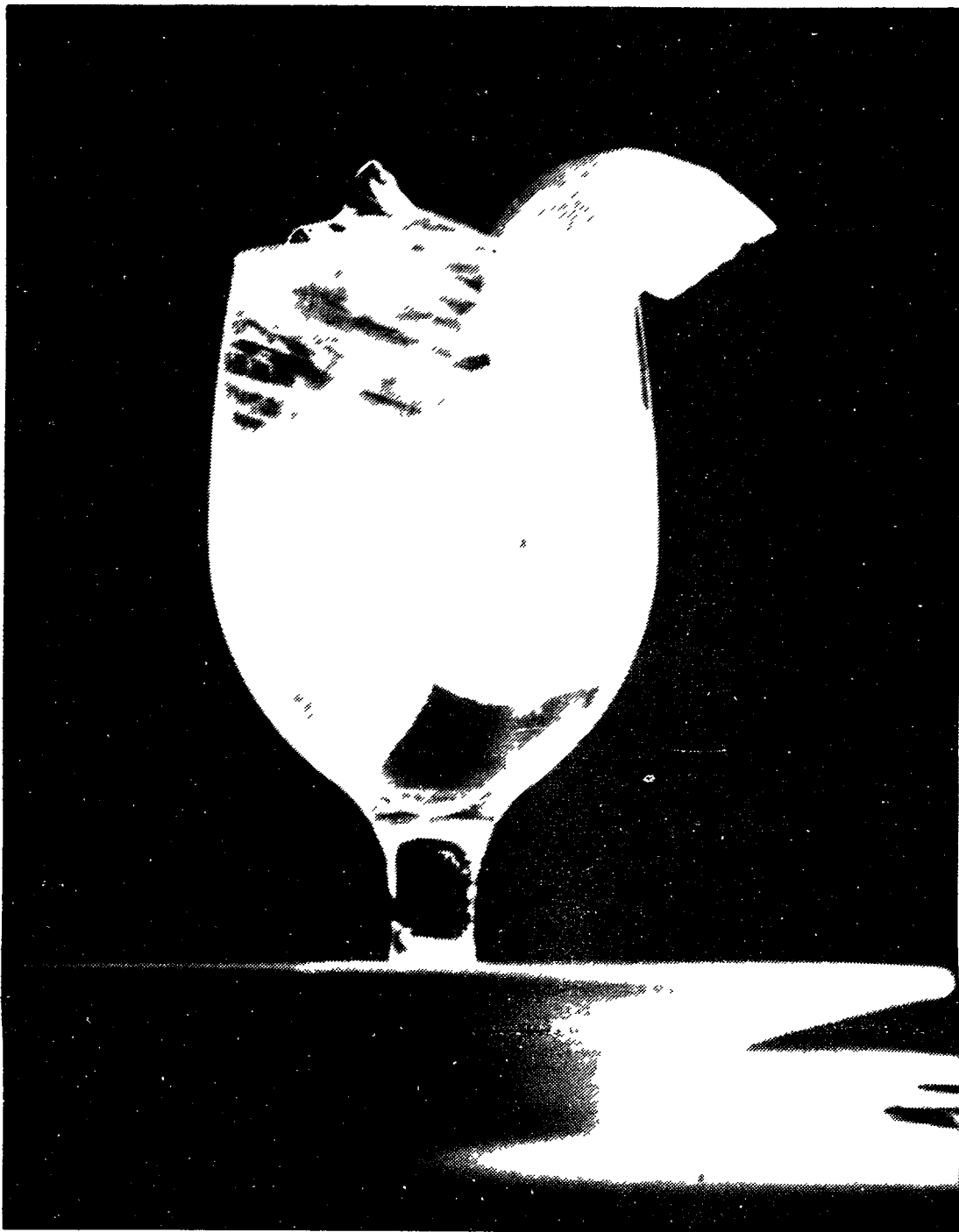
1/4 cup canned chicken broth
1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
3/4 pound lean ground beef
1 clove garlic
2 tablespoons minced onion
1 1/2 teaspoons dried mint leaves, crumbled
1 tablespoon flour
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon fresh parsley
Hot cooked rice

Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 8 to 10 minutes
Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)
Combine chicken broth, lemon juice, cornstarch and salt in one-cup glass measure; stir. Set aside.

Beat egg until frothy in medium-size mixing bowl. Add ground beef, garlic, onion, mint leaves, flour and pepper. Blend well, then shape mixture into a dozen meatballs.

Arrange meatballs in circle around edge of large microwave-safe plate. Cover loosely with wax paper and microwave five minutes. Drain off juices. Turn meatballs over and rearrange; cover with wax paper and microwave one to two minutes longer, or until meat in center is no longer pink. Set aside.

Stir in lemon mixture well. Microwave 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 minutes, or until bubbly and thickened, stirring every minute. Add parsley and microwave 30 seconds longer.



A slice of lemon adds elegance even to a simple glass of water.

Arrange meatballs on serving platter over hot cooked rice. Drizzle lemon sauce over all. Serve immediately. Yields two servings.

**CREAMY LEMON SAUCE
OR FISH OR VEGETABLES**

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup half-and-half or light cream
1 egg yolk
3/4 cup chicken broth
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon each dried parsley flakes and dried dill

Preparation time: 10 minutes
Cooking time: 2 to 4 minutes
Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Place butter or margarine in 1-quart microwave-safe casserole. Microwave 30 seconds to 1 minute, to melt. Add flour and salt, stirring to blend, then stir in half-and-half. Microwave 30 seconds to 1 minute, just until bubbly; stir.

Beat in egg yolk, then add chicken broth, lemon juice and seasonings; stir. Microwave one to two minutes, or until heated through and thickened. Serve with fish or vegetables. Yields 1 1/4 cups sauce.

LEILANI LEMON BARS

1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup light brown sugar, packed
1/4 cup flaked dried coconut
3 eggs
1 1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup flaked dried coconut
1/4 cup lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon zest

Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes
Cooking time: 7 1/2 to 10 1/2 minutes
Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power).

Place butter or margarine in 8x12-inch microwave-safe baking dish. Microwave about 1 minute, to melt. Stir in 1 cup flour, brown sugar and 1/4 cup coconut, press into bottom of dish. Microwave 2 to 3 minutes, to set.

Crack eggs into medium-size mixing bowl. Beat well, then beat in all remaining ingredients, in that order, blending thoroughly. Cover bowl loosely with wax paper and microwave 3 to 4 minutes, or until mixture bubbles and thickens.

Pour filling over crust, spread out evenly with spatula. Microwave 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 minutes longer, or until set. Let stand on heat-proof surface until cool, then cut into bars. Dust with powdered sugar, if desired. Yields about two dozen bars.

Family gets a kick out of this dish

Eating midweek, and even on the weekends is catch-as-catch can for Jan Weicksel of Northville.

With two boys ages 12 and 9 — both very active in soccer — and two girls 4 and 2, Weicksel definitely fits the role of mother on the go.

"We have four kids, with two very involved in soccer as well as my husband," Weicksel says. "And it all happens at meal time. That makes it hard to make some real food. We eat a lot of hot dogs."

That's where her recipe for Pork Chops in White Wine comes in. Not only is it a simple recipe with a short list of ingredients that everyone is sure to have. It cooks up with very little effort.

After quickly searing the pork chops and browning the onions, they are seasoned and tossed into the oven for an hour and a half.

"It's very simple," she says. "It doesn't take much time to prepare it. You can fix it and have everything cleaned up before dinner."

Served over rice, with a tossed salad, and a green vegetable like peas or green beans, Pork Chops in White Wine can be part of a well-balanced meal.

The recipe came from a cookbook assembled by a local school group when the Weickseles lived in New Jersey. When the family moved west, the recipe came with them. And Weicksel has since spread it around here too.

"We belong to the First Presbyterian church, and it's in their cookbook. I've put it in other community-type cookbooks, too," Weicksel says.

The dish offers another big advantage for this big family. Even the finicky eaters in the clan like it.

"When you have four kids, and four kids like it, that's an endorsement," Weicksel says.

pepper
½ cup white wine
1 teaspoon soy sauce

Combine white wine and soy sauce and set aside. Brown pork chops on both sides in butter or margarine. Remove to casserole dish. Sauté onions, place on top of pork chops. Sprinkle with flour, salt and pepper. Over this pour the combined wine and soy sauce. Cover and bake at 350 degrees F for 1½ hours. Serve over rice. Boneless, skinless chicken breasts may be substituted for the pork as well.

Flavorful garlic has its drawbacks

The ancient Romans and Greeks referred to garlic as a "stinking rose" with powerful healing powers. In 1550 B.C., the Egyptians thought there were 22 different garlic-based formulas to cure ailments from body weaknesses, headaches to throat tumors.

The Romans treated garlic as a source of power and proposed 61 garlic cures. Garlic could supposedly cure ailments from hemorrhoids to snake bites. Probably the most interesting use for garlic was to use it to keep away vampires and other evil spirits.

Is garlic really an ancient wonder-drug? Today there are medical studies suggesting that eating garlic may reduce the chances of a heart attack, reduce cholesterol and blood pressure. These medical studies done in Europe used a highly concentrated dried garlic powder, and, according to their findings, very few over the counter garlic supplements contain the herb's active ingredient, allicin.

These scientists warn that taking garlic is not enough to control

cholesterol, on its own. If you're borderline it may be useful but not for those with severe cholesterol problems.

Beware of claims that garlic cures athlete's foot, hay fever, arthritis and many other disorders until more medical evidence is available. Large amounts of garlic can cause gas, stomach irritation, body odor and bad breath. Until all the evidence is in, keep the garlic in the kitchen cupboard and not in the medicine cabinet.

Fresh garlic is available all year, along with granulated garlic, instant minced garlic, instant garlic powder, garlic salt and minced garlic in oil.

Preserving garlic from the garden can be very easy. The key to keeping it fresh is proper air circulation while it is hung to dry. Several plants with the leaves still attached can be braided together or tied together and then hung to dry. The garlic heads can be easily broken off for use in cooking.

When purchasing garlic, select heads that are large, plump, firm, crisp and free of soft spots or

shriveled cloves. Buy heads that are sold loose rather than boxed; it is an easier way to tell if the head is fresh.

Store garlic in a cool, dark, well-ventilated spot rather than the refrigerator. Refrigeration tends to make them sprout. Garlic with soft, yellowed cloves or green sprouts should be tossed out.

Don't peel the cloves until you are ready to use them. Unpeeled, a head of garlic will stay fresh for weeks or can be frozen indefinitely in an enclosed freezer bag or freezer container.

Peeling the papery skin off the garlic clove is easy. Press the clove with the flat side of a broad knife or give it a good whack with the knife handle until it breaks the skin. Then, it will slip right off.

The pungency of garlic is determined by how finely chopped and how long its been cooked. The smaller the pieces, the hotter the flavor; while the longer the cooking time the milder it becomes.

Baking garlic heads for about an hour drizzled with olive oil, butter and a little water will make them

taste very sweet with the soft texture of butter. It can then be used as a spread for French bread or turned into a garlic sauce for beef or lamb.

Whisk some fresh garlic into leftover soups or sauces for a flavor boost. Drop a peeled garlic clove into French salad dressing and leave for about 24 hours, remove the clove, you'll enjoy the new flavor treat.

It has been said that if you rub garlic on the heel of your foot, it would be absorbed through the pores and eventually show up on your breath, so keep a check on the amount of garlic you use in foods. Friends may be offended by the odor.

Use lemon juice or salt to get rid of the garlic odor on your hands, utensils and counter tops. For garlic breath, you can try eating parsley, (lots of it) the chlorophyll it contains acts as a mouthwash, or make sure everyone around you eats lots of garlic then maybe no one will notice the odor.

Grains ease dependence on fats

In today's kitchen, vegetable shortenings have replaced lard. Foods are pan-fried in vegetable oil versus butter. And margarine is the everyday spread of choice.

Many of us have made changes like these in an effort to reduce animal fats, which are primarily saturated and, thus, have the potential to raise blood cholesterol. However, when vegetable fats are hydrogenated, they also become saturated and, thus, have cholesterol-raising potential, says Mary Helen Gunkler, registered dietitian and staff nutritionist for Total cereal.

Hydrogenation is a process of solidifying vegetable oils to form fats that are harder at room temperature, such as stick margarines and shortenings. Hardness of fat is important in preparing many food items, such as baked goods, sauces and desserts, because it provides a pleasing taste and texture. And a fat, such as margarine, is far more appealing than oil as a spread for toast. At the same time, however, fats that are hydrogenated, or made more solid, become more saturated and act similarly to other saturated fats in the

body.

Hydrogenated vegetable fats vary in their degree of saturation. The softer the margarine or shortening, the less hydrogenated it is. For example, tub margarines are less hydrogenated than stick margarines. Squeeze margarines are even less hydrogenated.

Highly hydrogenated vegetable fat needs to be accounted for in the diet as saturated fat, concludes Gunkler, and no more than 10 percent of total calories should come from this type of fat.

The growing popularity of whole-grain foods is a positive change in the diet of America, says Gunkler. Here are some easy ways to make sure you're getting plenty of whole-grain foods in meals and snacks throughout the day.

- Lunch — Use whole-grain pasta in soups and main dish salads. Make sandwiches with whole-grain bread and buns.
- Dinner — Include whole-grain pasta and rice in side dishes and main dishes. Serve whole-grain rolls.

And for dessert, try this simple recipe featuring

a delicious crunch topping. Layer cut-up fresh fruit, yogurt and Cereal-Crunch Topping (below) in each of 6 parfait glasses.

CRUNCH-TOPPED PARFAITS

Cereal-Crunch Topping
3 cups whole grain Total cereal, slightly crushed

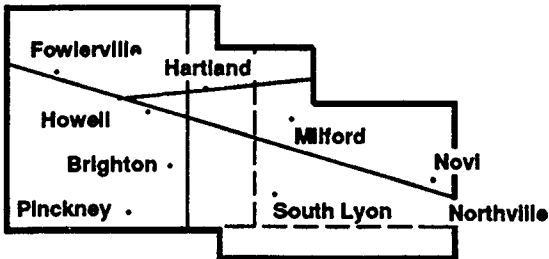

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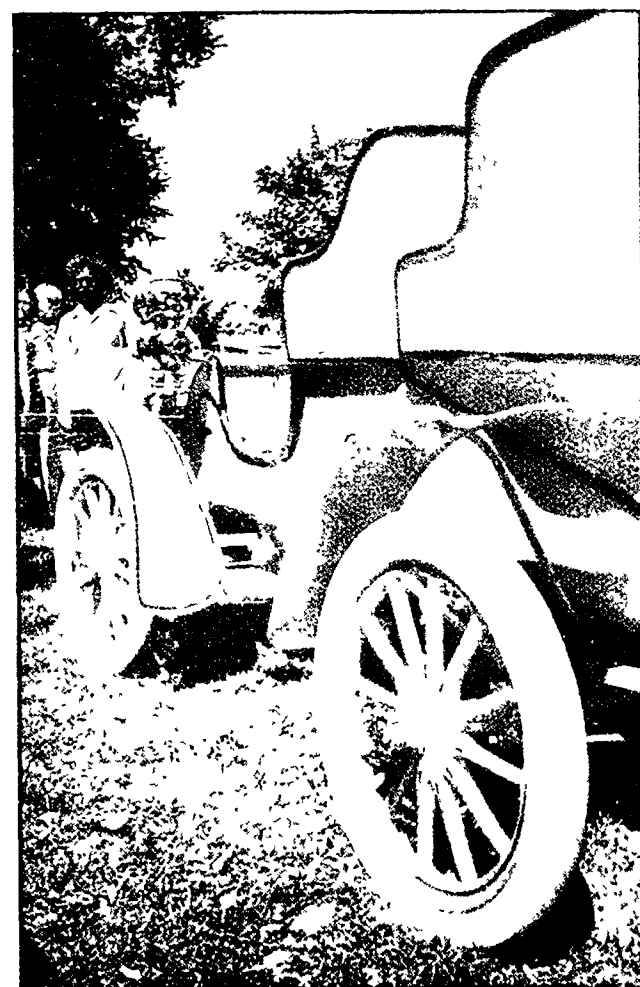
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Michigan Fest: More stars, more fun!

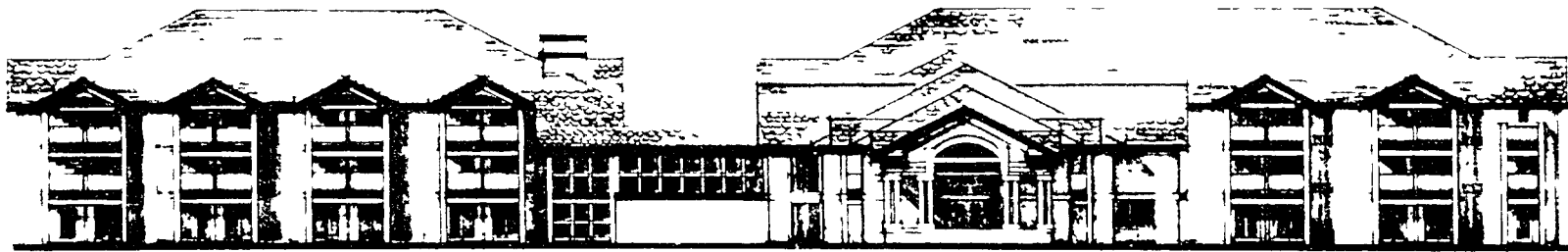
contemporary jazz.

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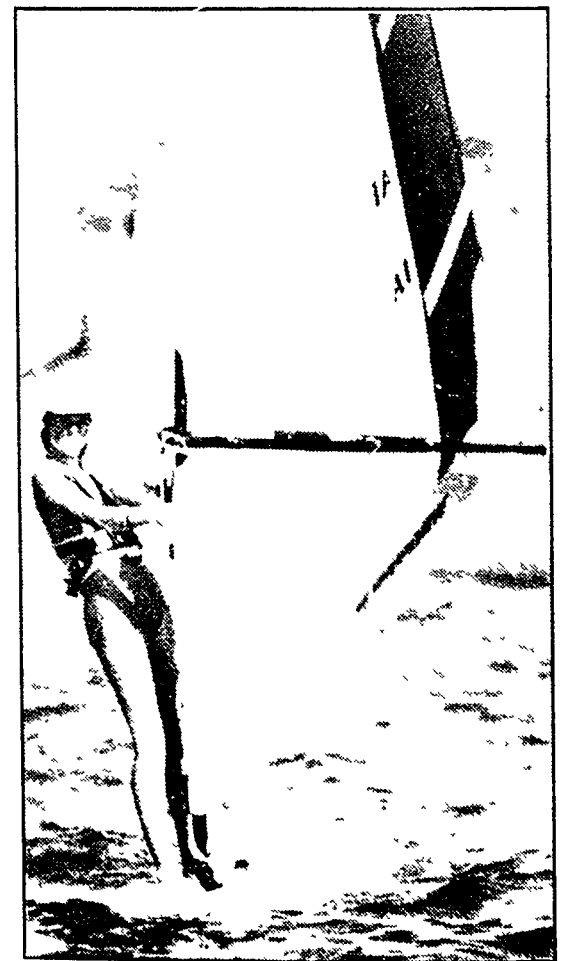

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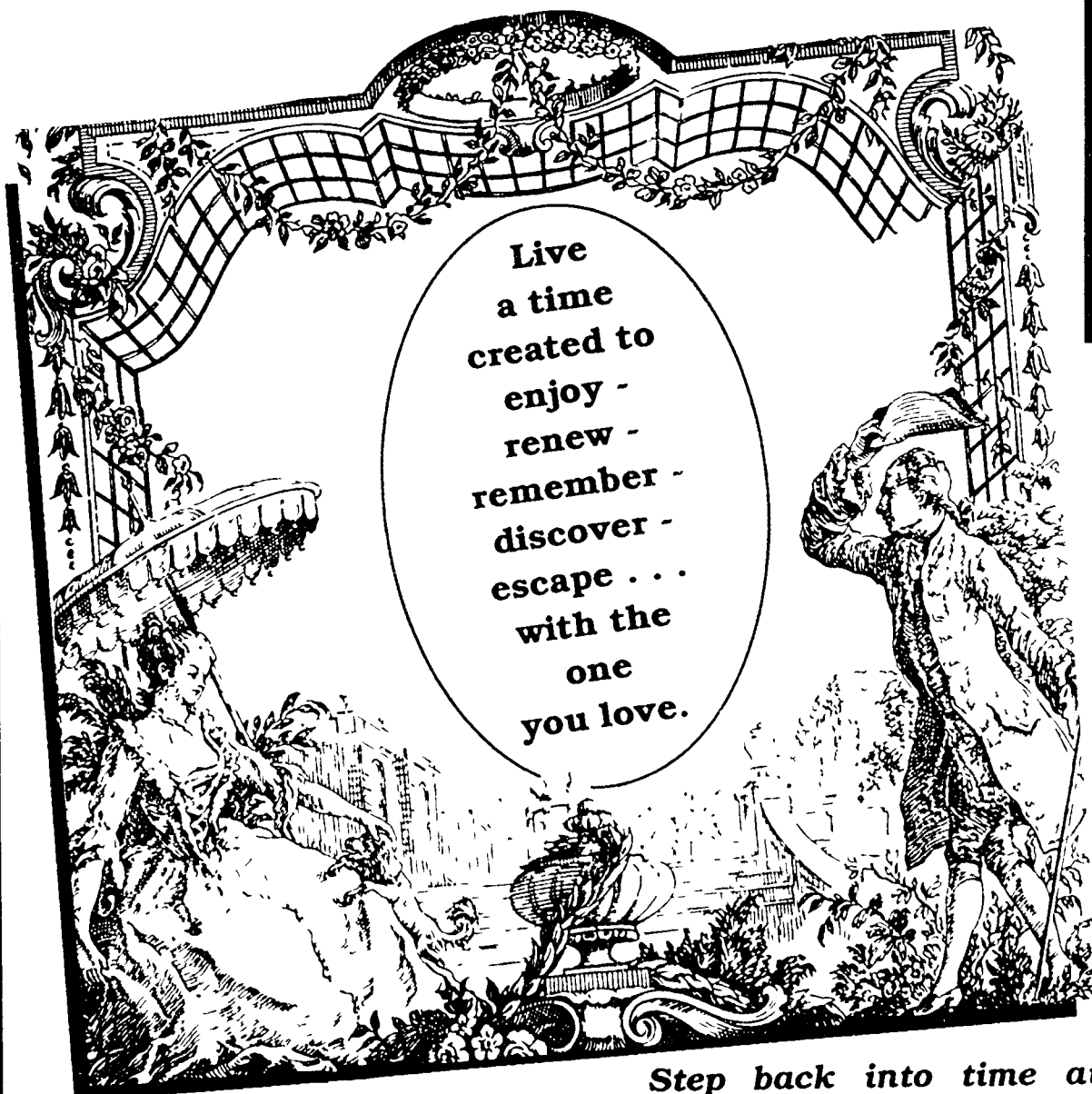

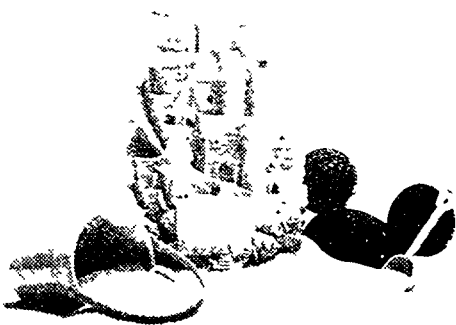

Set free by an inquisitive archeology team, they escape to the present and dazzle the crowd with daredevil moves and high-flying antics. These ancient acrobats bring the tale to a close by creating a fitting climax... a breathtaking pyramid.

Guests can also revisit the excitement of 776 B.C., when ancient Greeks held their first Olympic games. During Sea World of Ohio's 1992 season, "The Olympic High Dive Show" honors this age-old tradition at the Nautilus Theater, where world-champion divers plunge into a fast-paced, high-energy show of athletic talent. 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Etched in glass

A scene from Greenfield Village? Well almost.

The Warsaw (Indiana) Cut Glass Co. is more than a museum — it's a working factory where turn-of-the-century craftsmanship is practiced and preserved.

Owners Randy and Linda Kirkendall operate what they believe to be the last original cut glass factory in the United States. The husband-and-wife team purchased the business in 1980 and are just the third owners in the firm's storied history.

Up-scale department stores such as Marshall Field's and G. Fox and Co., as well as luxury hotels across the country, asked for Warsaw Cut Glass originals in the early 1900s. Today, the equipment, technique and product remains virtually unchanged.

Domestic and imported crystal takes on an added brilliance when touched by the hands of Warsaw craftsmen, who carve nearly 50 standard designs, from floral patterns to depictions of aquatic life. Custom orders are welcome and the artists can match patterns from old glass, china, even wall paper.

Linda encourages guests to browse through the showroom, resplendent with sparkling stemware and gleaming glasses. Pitchers, bowls, candlesticks, cookie jars and vases are also prominently displayed.

Typical prices for popular designs are \$4.50 for a drink glass, \$26 for a pitcher and \$75 for a punch bowl. Special orders turned out by the Kirkendalls have included a \$300 bowl commissioned for President Ronald Reagan and a \$500 golf tournament trophy.

Visitors may view the actual glass cutting process. Plank flooring, original to the building, leads down a narrow corridor to a work area seemingly frozen in time.

Randy says the circa 1911 brick building and venerable machinery so impressed Greenfield Village staff that

negotiations were begun to move the factory to Dearborn. In the end, Jackson Dobbins, who owned the company from 1955 to 1980, couldn't bear to see it depart his beloved Warsaw.

But he was willing to pass down his knowledge to new owners who shared his reverence for cut glass. Enter the Kirkendalls, Warsaw natives and trained artists searching for a studio.

His discipline was silversmithing and furniture design; hers was Plexiglass sculpture and print making. A 10-month crash apprenticeship taught them the art of glass cutting and set them on a new career path.

"We thought the building would make a good studio for our other mediums," Randy says. "As it's turned out, neither of us have worked in our chosen mediums. All we have time to work with is glass."

Warsaw Cut Glass Co. showroom and manufacturing facility tour hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Call 219-267-6581 for more information.

Warsaw is located along US-30 in north-central Indiana, about two hours drive from Chicago, three hours from Detroit. Visitors to Indiana's Amish country will find Warsaw about 30 minutes drive south via SR 15.

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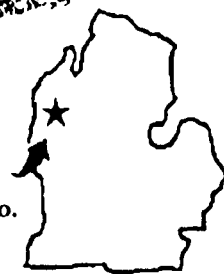
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Thunderbirds to roar in final salute

The small lakeside community of Oscoda, Michigan always appreciates the crowd of travelers who arrive each July to participate in Wurtsmith Air Force Base's annual Visitors Day, but this July 1, the event will be particularly poignant: the base will close next year, so this is the last Visitors Day, and the last chance to

view giant aircraft up close - even to walk through some of them.

It may be the last chance to see the renowned two-war groundshaking B-52G bomber, the Vietnam/Persian Gulf veteran aircraft that celebrates its 40th birthday this year and is slated for retirement.

"With the impending closure of Wurtsmith in June 1993, we want to show our appreciation to the people of Michigan and the surrounding areas for the support they've given us through the years, and especially during Desert Storm," says Colonel William Campbell, 379th Wing Commander.

So the air base has scheduled the crack U.S. Air Force precision flying team, the Thunderbirds Squadron, to perform their daring aerial maneuvers in the hour-and-a-quarter show. The squadron (eight pilots, three officers and 130 support enlisted crew) will fly F-16 Fighting Falcon aircraft to the usual delight of family groups that view the air show.

"July 1 will be our last Visitors Day, so we're going to make sure it's the best one," says 1st Lieutenant John Tillis, base public affairs officer.

Other flyovers are planned by Wurtsmith's own KC-135 Stratotanker, the T-37 Tweet and the B-52s. On display, there will be the F-16 Fighting Falcon, C-141 Starlifter,

C-130 Hercules, several vintage planes, including the B-25 and C-47 as well as many other aircraft.

Tillis also says he expects the Persian Gulf War stealth fighter, the F-117, to "appear" for Visitors Day, and hopes that another crowd-pleaser, the B-1B Excalibur, will arrive. This multirole, long-range strategic bomber currently holds 36 world records for speed, payload and distance.

Past Visitors Days at the air base have been wonderful family entertainment, and those groups that come for a longer vacation will find good area fishing, golf, wide, clean sand beaches, riverboat trips, great picnicking spots, and some interesting shopping.

The Oscoda-AuSable area is billing itself "AuSable River Country" these days, and indeed, the river has been central to the area's development, first attracting traders, fishermen and lumbermen and today attracting tourists and retirees who seek quiet spots to enjoy the outdoors. Rated by Rand McNally in "Retirement Places Rated", the community ranked No. 1 in Michigan and No. 34 in the nation, using such criteria as cost of living, community safety, health facilities, and recreational opportunities.

One of only 98 such designations in the country, the River Road Scenic Byway is a year around delight. It offers visitors panoramic views of the famed waterway from forested banks 200 feet above water level. You might catch a glimpse of bald eagles, spawning salmon, myriad birds and wildlife - and almost certainly whitetail deer at dawn or dusk. The Byway runs west from downtown Oscoda (take River Road), and covers 22 miles along the scenic south banks of the AuSable River, once the home of fabled grayling that brought sportsmen by the hundreds early in the area's development.

At the junction of River and Monument Roads you'll spot the impressive bronze Lumbermen's Monument. The nine-foot landmark has been a symbol of the area since it

was dedicated in July 1932. Depicting three figures, a sawyer with an axe and saw, a river driver with a peavey, and a timber cruiser with a compass, the sculpture was designed and made by Robert Aitkens of New York City and originally cost \$50,000. Look closely at the monument and you'll see the words "Aitken Fecit", simply meaning "Aitken made it", and is not the actual name of the sculptor.

In 1982, a three-year reconstruction project was finished with a formal rededication. A visitors center sells mementos of your visit, and there's a good spot for picnicking, with tables and grills nearby. The theme of the center is early days logging, but occasional slide shows present current views.

You'll have an excellent view of Cooke Pond from the visitor center area and a stairway will take you to the water's edge. Just west of the visitor's center, is Eagles' Nest overlook. It's been used by a pair of bald eagles since about 1985, and you'll usually see eagles soaring over Cooke Pond. Bring binoculars, because this is worth a half-hour of your time.

Iargo Springs lies adjacent to River Road and has been used since pre-settlement times as a drinking water source. Early Native Americans believed the springs held mystical powers.

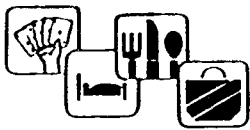
The long trail to the springs might be too much for anyone with health problems, but others will enjoy the trip down.

Along the Byway, you'll see four hydroelectric dams operated by Consumers Power as part of the utility's generating system and together they supply enough power for a city of about 35,000 people. They also have created thousands of acres of tree-lined lakes that are home to bass, walleye, northern pike, tiger muskies and other fish.

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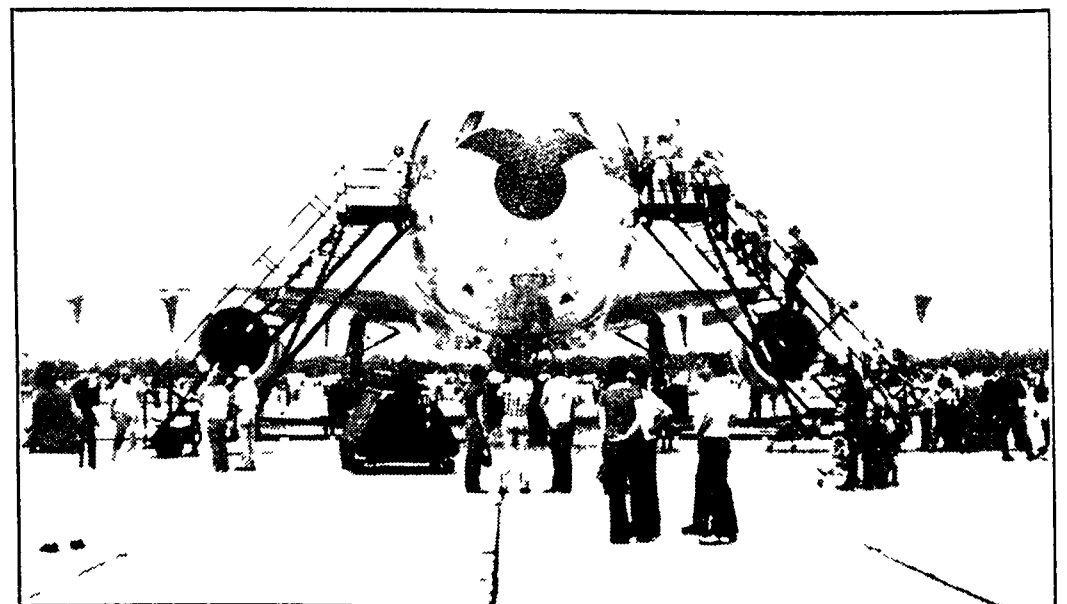
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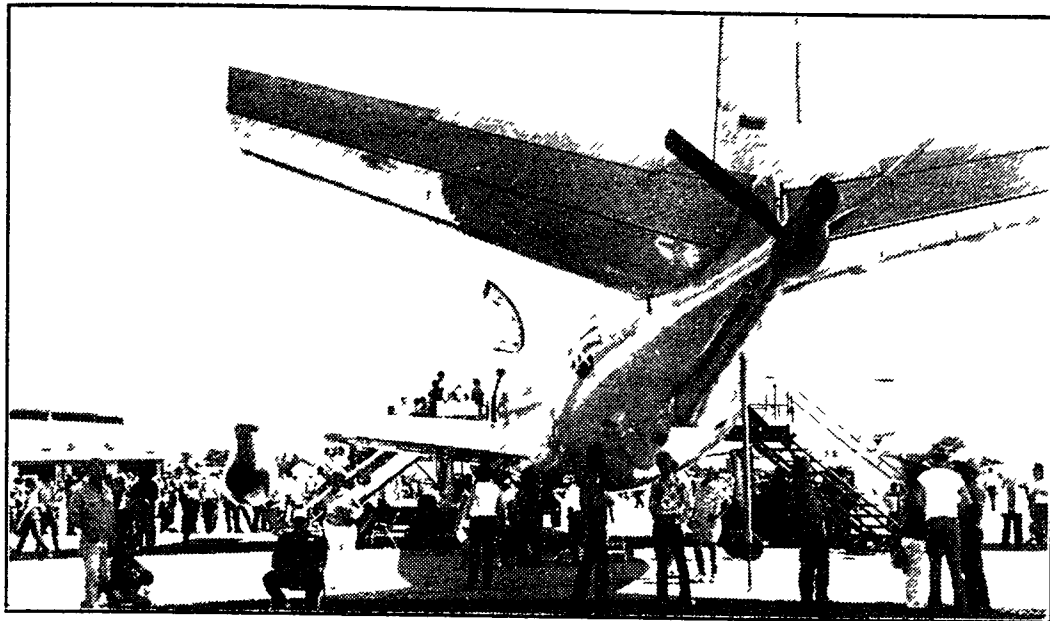

Downtown Oscoda boasts an interesting glimpse of art along walls of many buildings. A mural project started a few years ago depicts scenes from early lumbering and fishing days along the AuSable River and storefronts from the turn of the century. The State Street Art Gallery at 119 S. State Street offers contemporary art works, ceramics, gifts, wildlife prints and art supplies. Telephone 517-739-9591 for hours and to find out if there's a special exhibit.

You'll be able to shop for teddy bears and even have tea at The Pack House just north of the Paul Bunyan statue on State Street. Call

517-739-0454 for hours.

In late July, the world famous AuSable Canoe Race is held and exhausted paddlers finish near the mouth of the river after an all-night endurance race of over 200 miles. Beginning in Grayling, teams of paddlers are aided by "bank runners" who wade into the dark waters of the river at pre-arranged locations, offering food and perhaps dry clothing as well as moral support for their teams.

It's a time of celebration for the community, with a Native American Powwow, a circus, Las Vegas Nights and all sorts of festivities. If you plan on attending, make your reservations well in advance.

The canoe race will begin Saturday, July 25 this year. Telephone the Oscoda/AuSable Chamber of Commerce at 1-800-235-GOAL for more information.

Almost anytime is a good time to fish the AuSable River, or be part of a charter on Lake Huron. There's an Oscoda-AuSable Charter Boat Association (telephone 517-739-2649) that will tell you what's biting and put you in touch with a captain who can invite you aboard for a day or half-day of fishing on either Lake Huron or the AuSable River.

There are also plenty of boat launching sites and picnicking spots along Lake Huron as well as on the river.

For a pleasant stop, pause at Three-Mile Park (three miles north of Oscoda on US-23) to stroll the wide sandy beach and perhaps have lunch. It's a shaded spot with picnic tables and grills, toilet facilities (primitive) and good drinking water (you pump it). A small stream winds through the area and it's a good spot for children to play.

In late June an Art on the Beach show draws shoppers to Oscoda Township Beach Park, just two blocks east of downtown. (Turn east on River Road at the traffic light in the center of town). In September, an antique car show holds way for a weekend.

During the summer months, a cruise on the AuSable River Queen offers a trip aboard an old-fashioned paddleboat. Located six miles west of

Oscoda on the Scenic Road Byway, they're open from the end of May through mid-October. Telephone 517-739-7351 or 728-5713 for prices and times of departure.

You'll find plenty of golf courses in the area, campgrounds, lodging and all the usual restaurants. Hunan's Chinese Restaurant on US-23 just north of the bridge over the AuSable offers a nice change from the standard fare, while Wiltse's Restaurant on F-41 just northwest of town (and near Wurtsmith Air Force Base's main gate) has excellent family dining at reasonable prices.

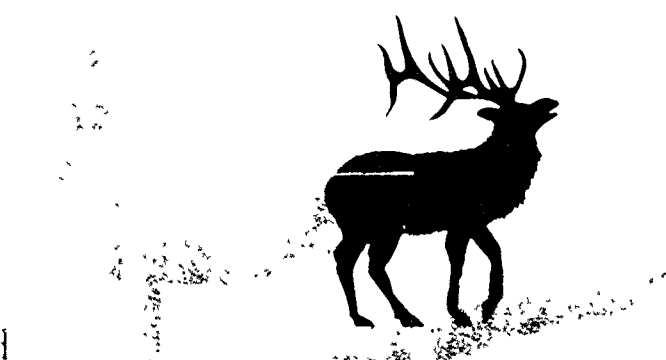
If you're planning a trip to Northeast Michigan this summer, perhaps you'll want to come and savor the last glimpse of famed aircraft at Wurtsmith's last Visitors Day this July 1. Besides airplanes, there will be demonstrations of the military working dogs, bomb loading and the base fire department. It's a great way for a family to spend a day, and there are plenty of concession stands with tasty treats on the grounds.

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By the old mill stream

Linden, Michigan—

There's a lot to like about this little river town, where the tallest building used to house a water-powered grist mill.

It's the kind of place where summer concerts are performed at the river front gazebo, where the Presbyterian Church dates from 1863, where shoppers have to step around a

sleeping dog in an antique store.

It's a trip back in time, but one that's easily accessible. Linden is just five minutes drive west of US-23, about 15 minutes from Interstate 75.

And here's something you just might not expect from a rural village: first class dining. Broadstreet, a restaurant that draws diners from as far away as the Detroit suburbs, serves up the type of exotic dishes not found for miles around.

Chef Luis Fernandes learned his craft at the Hong Kong Hilton and has created a menu that includes Tea Smoked Chicken and Spicy Steamed Mussels as appetizers, entrees like Grilled Pepper Crusted Beef Tenderloin and Baked Chicken Breast Wellington, and a dessert tray that includes Banana Tartlettes with key lime sauce and Whole Wheat Carrot Cake.

The luncheon offerings are no less impressive—Dual Fettucini San Remo, London Broil Stroganoff, Grilled Chicken Breast Italienne. Once a month, Broadstreet presents a themed dinner which features the cuisine of a selected country.

Cocktails and a full wine list are available. Call 313-735-5844 for reservations.

The restaurant's brick walls are original to the 130-year-old building and in keeping with the town's character.

Colleen's Collectibles and Antiques is housed in the old town fire hall. Proprietress Colleen Auld, a former Brighton, Michigan resident, saved the building from impending destruction and has converted it into an emporium showcasing oak, wicker, china, glass, quilts and Victorian furniture.

A large and extremely docile black lab makes its home at Thimbleberry Antiques, surrounded

by highly desirable china, glass, furniture and linens. This shop makes good use of an old home dating from the turn of the century.

The Tangled Vine features antiques and gifts in a decorative setting right out of *Victoria* magazine. Pine furniture, primitives, china, wicker, lace, linens and quilts make up the majority of the stock.

You can't beat the view at Country Daze, a gift shop in the Historic Linden Mill. The Shiawassee River spills forth from a dam right outside the window of this carefully crafted shop, which specializes in wall decor, furniture, lace table coverings and pewter.

Linden is also home to a number of country craft shops offering accent pieces in wood, cloth, flowers and tin.

On the weekend of June 19-21, Linden celebrates its history with Olde Mill Days, featuring nostalgic events such as horse drawn carriage rides, arts and crafts sales and a re-creation of an 1800s village. Other activities planned include a Friday fireworks display, an antique show on Saturday, Las Vegas style games and bungee jumping.

Linden is located about 25 miles south of Flint and is easily accessible off US-23 via the Silver Lake Road exit. From Interstate 75, take the Holly-Fenton exit and drive west about 15 miles.

Boat taxes foment Great Lakes mutiny

Our forefathers protested a tax by boarding a British ship and throwing a cargo of tea overboard at the Boston Tea Party in 1773. Today, American boaters are indignant enough to rebel against two new federal taxes aimed specifically at

them.

It started with the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990, intended by Congress to help slice the horrendous federal deficit. Casting desperately in all directions, they established an annual "user" fee for recreational vehicles operated on navigable waters of the United States where the Coast Guard has a presence.

They also imposed a ten percent excise tax on the portion of the sale price of luxury boats in excess of \$100,000, effective January, 1991.

The "user" fee requires the annual purchase of two decals. They

are to be attached within six inches of the vessel's registration number on starboard and port sides. The cost is \$25 for boats of more than 16 feet but less than 20 feet; \$35 for 20 feet but less than 27 feet; \$50 for 27 feet but less than 40 feet; and \$100 for boats 40 feet and longer.

The decals are valid through December 31 of the year for which they are purchased. The Coast Guard says that renewal notices will not be mailed. It is the boat owner's responsibility to purchase the decals for every calendar year through 1995. Maximum penalty for non-compliance is \$5,000.

The fee won't apply to boats operated on inland waters, but does apply to "internal waters of the U.S. from which an individual can travel (by connecting waters, canals, locks etc.) to tidal waters in a 16-foot powered vessel with a displacement hull during most of the boating season." This, naturally, encompasses all of the Great Lakes. The law does not apply to manually-powered vessels such as canoes, kayaks rowboats, or to sailboards and unpowered houseboats.

When the fee was announced, an immediate scream went up from the boat-owning public. A tidal wave of calls inundated the phone lines at radio host J. P. McCarthy's popular morning show on WJR.

Boat owners started scheming to avoid the charges. The law became effective July 31, 1991, and the Coast Guard set a date of September 1, 1991, for compliance. Many evaded the fee by pulling their boats early in 1991. Where federal budget planners had expected the tax to raise \$127 million for the 1991 fiscal year, it actually netted about \$15 million.

Meanwhile, the Boat Owners Association of the United States (Boat/U.S.) filed suit in July, 1991 to have the fee declared unconstitutional. The suit is still pending. Michael Sciulla, the group's vice president,

declared that the fee "deserves to be jettisoned and buried at sea with all deliberate speed." He added, "The average boat already has four or five decals on it. Everyone's got their hand out. Boaters are saying, 'enough is enough'."

As the Coast Guard admits, "The boat owner does have a myriad of expenses---sales tax, annual property tax, registration fee, insurance, trailer registration and taxes, marina and dock fees, various local water use fees, required safety equipment, navigational aid equipment, fuel costs, and more."

The noisiest objection to the tax---the government doesn't call it a tax, but we do---is that the money is not earmarked for the Coast Guard, or other services to boaters, but goes into the general fund. Critics claim that Congress can spend the money however it sees fit, or not at all, while continuing to reduce the Coast Guard budget.

According to the final rule adopted by Congress, however, the fees deposited in the treasury are "ascribed to Coast Guard activities...The revenues received from those funds are taken into consideration during the budgetary process."

The rule also adds, "Congress specifically required that these fees be imposed on recreational boaters to share in the costs of programs that provide benefits for which direct fees cannot be charged."

The fees, the rule states, will cover Coast Guard services such as search and rescue, aids to navigation, and recreational boating safety programs. The revenue raised by the fees, the Coast Guard claims, is well below the costs for these programs.

There's strong sentiment in Washington for repeal of the tax. For Congress to do away with it, however, it has to find new ways to replace the money.

Meanwhile, the law is in effect. To

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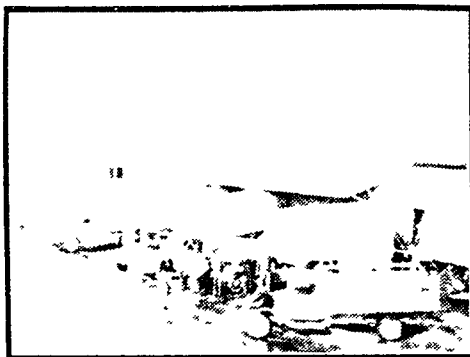
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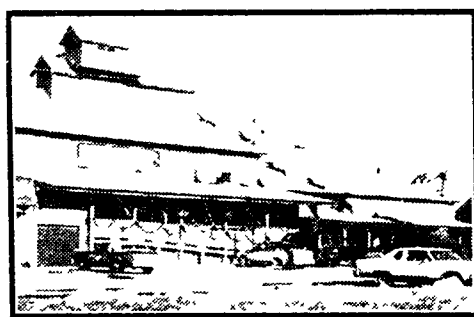
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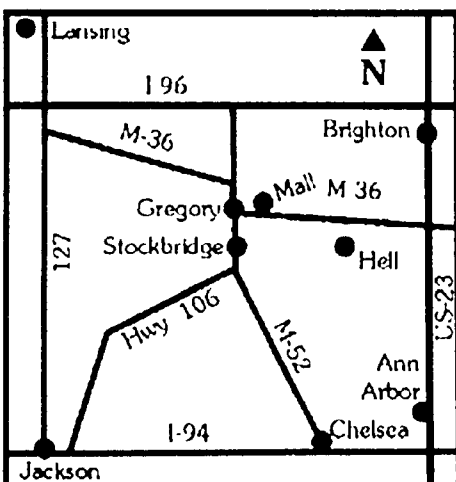

order your decals, call 1-800-848-2100. You may use your Master Card or Visa, or request an application to pay by check through the mail.

Irritating as it is, the user fee probably won't start a revolution. "People gripe, but they'll get used to it," says Larry Collier, of National Boatland in Farmington, Redford and Mt. Clemens. "Then the federal government will think of something new to tax---maybe night crawlers!"

"People complain, but I don't think the user fee is going to stop them from boating," says Bill Brennan, a partner in Brennan Marine, of St. Clair Shores and Bay City.

But the luxury tax is a different broadside, Brennan believes. He says, "Most manufacturers are no longer building boats over 36 feet long, because of the tax. Carver has closed its big plant in Rocky Point, N.C. And Viking, Hatteras and Bertram are way down."

"Today, 30,000 people are out of jobs in this industry," says Greg Krueger, vice president of Jefferson Beach Marina in Mt. Clemens. "The recession probably caused 20 to 25 percent of that, and the rest is caused by the luxury tax. It's been a nightmare. They put the final nail into a lot of coffins. We've had to cut back our own personnel by 30 to 40 percent."

"Hatteras went from 1,400 employees to 650. Viking went from 750 to 60. The revenues Congress thought they were going to generate, they have lost ten times over."

Brennan sees a threshold for paying the luxury tax at about the \$5,000 mark. "There are some buyers out there for boats costing \$150,000 or less," says Brennan, "but the tax has just about stymied the market for boats costing more than that."

"Even a dual-income couple feel they are paying enough taxes now. If they buy a \$250,000 boat, they would have to pay \$10,000 in Michigan sales tax and \$15,000 federal luxury tax. They're already paying 33 percent on their income tax. They won't pay

\$25,000 in taxes on a boat."

"It has devastated us totally at Jefferson Beach Marina," says Krueger. "In 1990 our volume in new boats over \$100,000 was 30 units that sold for \$8.7 million. In 1991 we sold five new units over \$100,000 for a total of \$643,000---over an \$8 million drop."

"Even though we are having a much better year in '92, people won't buy anything over about \$140,000. Today we sold a \$210,000 boat. It was the first one in six months that cost more than \$150,000."

Adds Krueger, "We thought the used boat market would come back strong, but it hasn't because it has taken almost a year to educate the public that the luxury tax isn't affecting used boats."

"It makes more sense to buy used these days," says Sue Zettel, co-owner with her husband of Pier 49 Yacht Brokers in Mt. Clemens. "More people are interested in used boats because the luxury tax doesn't apply."

"A lot of people are holding off purchases waiting for repeal of the tax," says Krueger. "The House and Senate have the repeal bills written. We thought we had it pretty well handled and that it would be a done deal. All of a sudden people in Congress are getting cold feet because they are up for re-election. Now we hear there's about a 30 percent chance of getting it through in the next 40 days."

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Cyclists learn to love the mountains

Midwesterners, like millions of people across the U.S., are taking to this country's fastest growing outdoor sport: mountain biking. Easy to ride and environmentally sound, mountain bikes have spurred a resurgence in bicycling for fitness and recreation.

A mountain bike, or all-terrain bike, is characterized by its stable frame geometry, durability, large tires, multiple gears and up-right rider position. Many riders find them easier to maneuver and more comfortable than the traditional European-style touring or road bike.

Mountain bikes got their start on

the rugged hiking trails of Marin County, California, when a group of recreational cyclists began adapting gears, brakes and derailleurs from road bikes to their old balloon-tire "clunkers". The concept quickly spread.

Today there are over 16 million mountain bikes, accounting for over 64 percent of national retail adult bicycle sales in the United States, according to the Bicycle Wholesale Distributors Association.

This success has fueled a resurgence in the bicycle manufacturing industry in America. Companies such as Schwinn and Huffy have quickly joined newer mountain bike manufacturers such as Fisher, Diamond Back and Specialized in producing models priced from \$400 to \$5,000.

Mountain bikes are not exclusively for the mountains of California and Colorado, two centers for the sport. Bicycle commuters in America's cities are finding mountain bikes excellent for the daily ride to work, as the fat tires and sturdy frames provide the stability necessary for handling the bumps and traffic of city riding.

In addition, savvy resorts across the Great Lakes area are offering Mountain Bike rentals, specially-marked trails and biking packages. Searchmont Resort, located

north of Sault Ste. Marie Ontario, (which is one hour north of the Mackinac Bridge) is perhaps the most aggressive when it comes to marketing to the mountain biker.

Best known for its ski slopes, Searchmont is now open year-round to accommodate hiking and biking enthusiasts looking for unique wilderness terrain. They provide 250 kilometers (155 miles) of mapped

trails through some of the most beautiful mountain terrain this side of the Rockies. Bikers ride past granite rock faces, waterfalls, rivers, lakes and streams where moose, deer, and elk reside.

Special excursions include a train/all-terrain trip, where bikers ride the Algoma Central train from the Searchmont station and bike back to the resort; a peddle/paddle outing to a

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remote lake; and combination bike/hike trips. Two night packages begin at \$169 per couple and include four breakfasts, four packed lunches and a welcome package. For those without a mountain bike, rentals are available at the resort. More information is available by calling Recreation Algoma at 1-800-245-8553.

Another resort that is catering to the mountain bike enthusiast is Sugar Loaf. Located in Michigan's Leelanau Peninsula, 18 miles northwest of Traverse City, the trails of Sugar Loaf Resort take riders through hardwood forests, evergreens and up to the top of the mountain for breathtaking views of Lake Michigan, Little Traverse Lake, Lime Lake and the surrounding countryside. Last year Sugar Loaf was the site of the Sleeping Bear World Cup Mountain Bike Race, one of the largest mountain bike races in the world. Riders from across Europe and the U.S. came to Sugar Loaf to compete for world championship points.

This summer Sugar Loaf will again host one of the largest and most prestigious mountain bike races in the Midwest, the North America Championships. From June 12 through 14, bikers will race in a variety of events including the cross country, a grueling 36-mile pedal up and around Sugar Loaf Mountain. They will also race down in a dual slalom event similar to those found in ski racing.

But perhaps the most thrilling event is the Kamikaze Downhill, a

gut-wrenching race from the top of Sugar Loaf's ski slopes. There are categories and age classifications for just about everyone who ever wanted to race and for those who don't, the spectating is exciting and free.

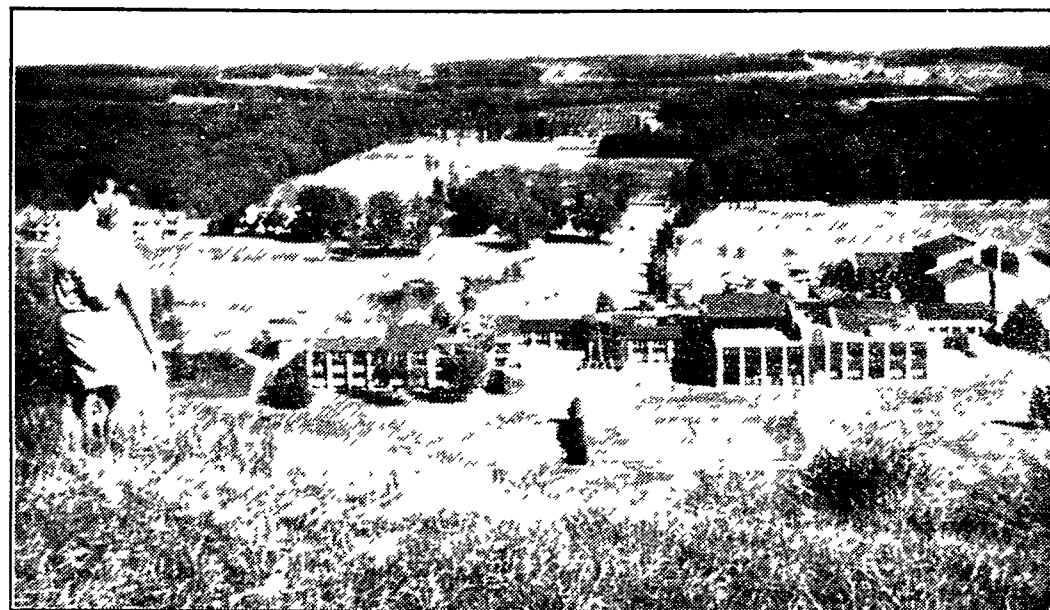
You don't have to be a world-class rider to take on Sugar Loaf's trails. Although some are difficult, with steep inclines and a sandy base, there are also many gentle trails for relaxing rides. Paths are marked and area maps are also available at the front desk.

Pete Edwards, Sugar Loaf's marketing director, says that mountain biking is a popular family sport. Like Searchmont, Sugar Loaf Resort also has mountain bikes available to rent.

Family travelers who like to bike together may be most interested in Sugar Loaf's Great Lake Family Package, which includes lodging, breakfast, dinner and dining gratuities. Best of all, kids 18 and under sleep free and kids 12 and under sleep and eat free when staying in the same room with two paying adults. The rate is \$69 per adult, per night, based on double occupancy. Sugar Loaf also offers special reduced room rates during summer holidays. For more information call 1-800-748-0117.

A few miles down Lake Michigan's coast from Sugar Loaf is the Sleeping Bear National Lakeshore, home of the Sleeping Bear Sand Dunes. Bicycles are allowed on the Pierce Stocking Scenic Drive and all motor vehicles roads within the park system.

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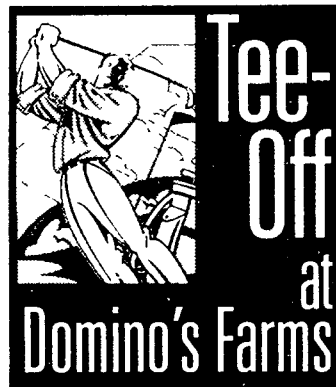

Another great place to mountain bike is down the VASA cross-country ski trail. Located off Bunker Hill Road just outside Traverse City, across M-72 from the Grand Traverse Resort, the trail system is now maintained year-round. There are 10, 25 and 50-kilometer loops and terrain suitable for just about every level of rider.

Bikers will also enjoy the new Traverse Area Recreational Trail (TART). This asphalt path is eight-feet wide and passes by both East and West Grand Traverse Bays, away from the city streets. The path leads from Downtown Traverse City to the State Park.

Other scenic mountain bike paths: Sand Lakes Quite Area, off M-72 in Williamsburg; the Muncie Lakes Pathway, southwest of Traverse City and Old Mission State Park, at the top of Old Mission Peninsula.

Because mountain bikes are so versatile, the places to ride them are limitless. However, if you want the most scenic spots it's best to ask the pros. Making a call or visit to a local bike shop can prove to be well worth the time. Two of the best are Brick Wheels (616) 947-4274 and McLain Cycle (616) 941-8855. Although both are located in Traverse City, they can provide information about many places to ride all over the state.

In less than 15 years, mountain biking has gone from an obscure activity developed by a handful of California cyclists to a mainstream sport with participants in all parts of the world. And no wonder, it's fun, it's great exercise and it's something most people can do. After all, learning to ride a bike is a skill most of us never forget.

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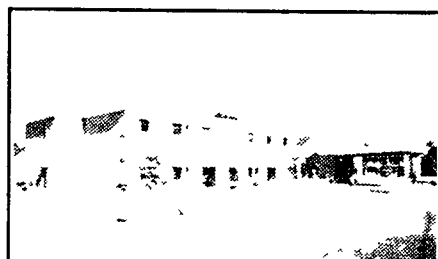
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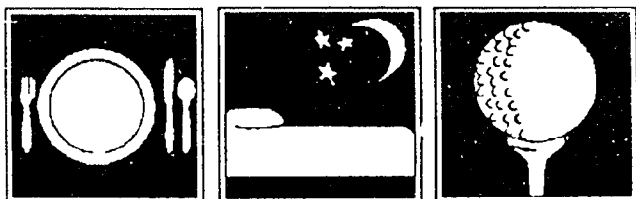
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RUSTIC ELEGANCE— The accommodations at Garland carry the log cabin theme throughout 63 magnificent holes of golf.

Log cabins put golfers in the swing of things

Formerly known as Domino's Lodge, The Rock is located on Drummond Island in the middle of Lake Huron and provides a different style of golf getaway. With the restructuring the Domino's Pizza dynasty, The Rock with its lodge and other facilities is currently in the process of changing ownership.

"Transition in ownership is imminent at this point," said Larry Ledy, director of marketing for The Rock. "We hope that we will be able to make announcement soon regarding the new owners."

"Meanwhile, the excitement of The Rock continues to grow as we move into the 1992 season."

The 40-unit main lodge is set in the log cabin style, featuring a half-log construction. According to Ledy, it is more conventional by today's standards but keeps the old-fashioned concept.

The Rock provides one of the most unique 18-hole golf courses in northern Michigan. Designed by Harry Bowes, The Rock is a very playable, straight-forward golf course that does not require a lot of carry for the average player but is very enjoyable.

It is probably Michigan's closest golf course to nature. As you play through the woods of Drummond, you will see deer and other animals. One veteran player stated that he has never played a round without seeing deer on the course.

"We are very pleased with the development of the course," said Ledy of the course cut out of the rocks of the Island. "It has matured nicely and the greens are softening up and gaining speed. The course is greening so fast that we cut the grass this spring four days after the snow disappeared."

Ledy is quick to point out that the island destination provides much more than golf for the visitor. Lighted tennis and platform tennis courts are available along with pool, jacuzzi and log cabin sauna at the main lodge as well as an eight-lane bowling center with automatic scoring.

"Overall," he said, "The Rock is a resort that is peaceful, restful and a great place to play quality golf."

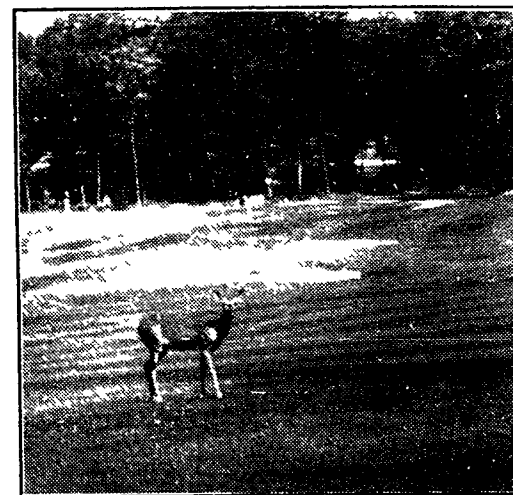

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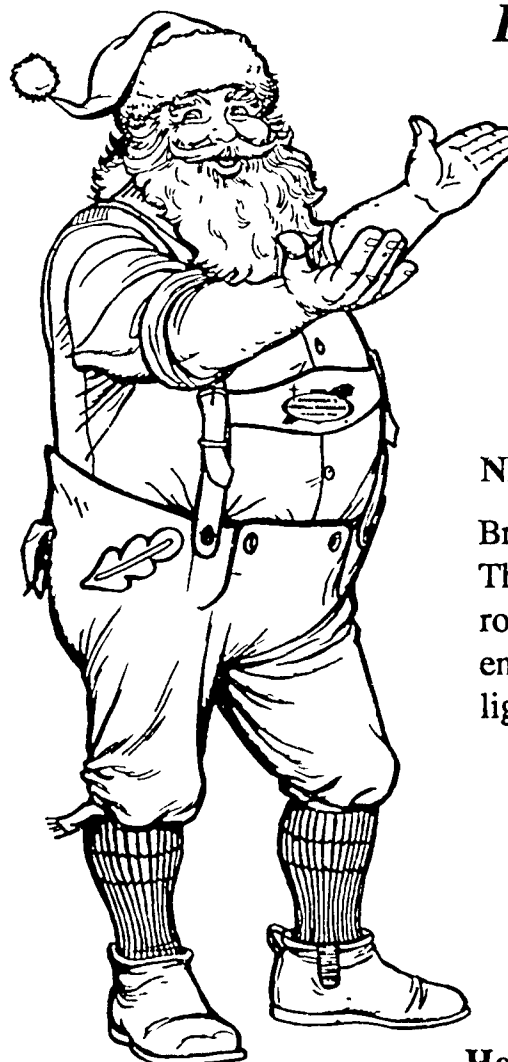
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Frankenmuth course in class by itself

Frankenmuth, Michigan—

Sporty. Challenging. Picturesque. Aesthetically appealing. Nothing like it around here.

Frankenmuth's new resort golf course, The Fortress.

When the 6,825-yard Dick Nugent-designed course officially opens on July 4, this championship-caliber layout will be like no other in the Saginaw Valley. It will be in a class by itself.

I doubt there's another course like it within 75 miles. Golfers would need to travel south to the Detroit area or 150 miles north to the numerous top-notch resort courses in northern Michigan to find a course of this quality and design.

"This is the best (grass) growth I've ever seen on a new course," said Nugent. Seeding on the 140-acre course began in the last week of July '91 and was completed in early September.

"Yes, I like the outcome here. I'm very pleased," Nugent said.

"What we have basically done is move nearly a half-million cubic yards of earth and totally changed the landscape from flat to a rolling links course."

To get a rolling terrain, three

good-sized lakes, ranging from 12 to 20 feet in depth, were dug and the dirt used to construct berming between fairways. The mounding isolates golfers on the hole they are playing, giving the effect they are the only players on the course. Golfers on adjacent fairways aren't often seen.

Players who miss the fairway will be faced with a variety of uphill, downhill and side-hill lies.

There are no perfectly straight fairways as they serpentine to wide landing areas, then to narrower pathways weaving toward large, undulating greens. The greens average 7,000 square feet in size.

The greens are sectioned, most with two levels, various contours and shapes that make for a wide variety of pin positions.

Green undulations are "not severe," according to Nugent, "but subtle enough that players will have to pay attention."

"The course is not overwhelming. It will yield to the good player. It's designed to be a player's course and that will reward the good shotmaker," Nugent said.

Most holes will have four sets of tees and the course may be played from 5,063 yards to a maximum 6,825

yards from the championship tees.

There are 75 sand bunkers of all shapes and sizes, two of them beach bunkers around the 5th and 13th lakeside greens.

The Fortress features four excellent par-3 holes, ranging from 163 yards to 213 yards in length, two of them playing over ravines and one over water.

There are four demanding par-4s over 425 yards in length.

But three other par-4s are under 375 yards, which offers a nice balance.

The four par-5s measure 527, 513, 527 and 526 yards, which are average length par-5s.

Par is 36-36 - 72.

Nugent has designed numerous championship courses.

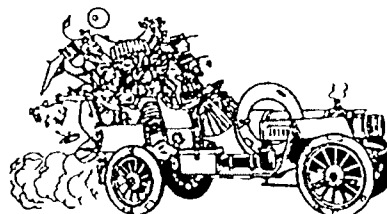
One of his gems is Kemper Lakes in the Chicago suburbs where the 1989 PGA Championship was held.

He also has three courses listed in Golf Digest's "Top 50 Golf Courses in the U.S." listing.

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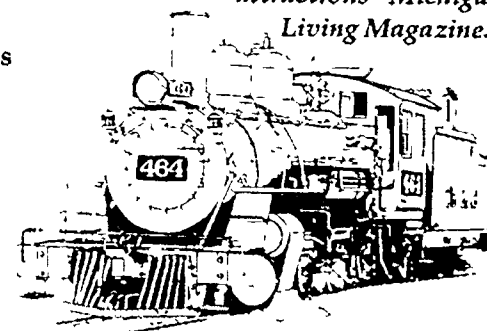
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For many, Traverse City is the quintessential family vacation spot.

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Included are such world famous offerings as the National Cherry Festival ... the Interlochen Center for the Arts and its Festival with dozens of concerts, recitals, musicals and a variety of other productions performed by students and special guests from the entertainment world ... the natural wonders of the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore, plus the many scenic drives, such as the trip around Old Mission Peninsula.

Fishing? All you want.

Para-sailing? Sure enough.

Beaches? Sun worshippers galore.

Golf? Thought you'd never ask.

The Northwest Michigan Golf Council has merged with three convention and visitors' bureaus in the northwest quadrant of Michigan's Lower Peninsula to better promote

golf. The council has 19 golf courses and 11 resort/golf course members.

"It represents a new level of marketing," says Bill Arnold, council president. "We've got everything from public courses to The Bear, we've got golf packages and now we're developing a more sophisticated marketing program"

"We're combining our efforts to promote golf, travel and the hospitality industry up here. There's so much to do and our long-range goal is to make this area an international golf destination, like Myrtle Beach, which it is fast becoming. Our slogan is "America's Summer Golf Capital."

The range of existing courses is impressive and there are more on the way.

The mainstays in the Traverse City area include Grand Traverse Resort, with its two courses - The Bear and Spruce Run. Grand Traverse again will be the site of the AAA Michigan Open this year, June 29-July 2.

The Northern Michigan golf boom began in earnest when Grand Traverse developer Paul Nine hired Jack Nicklaus to design and build The Bear. That decision set the tone for the transformation of a largely rural area into a golfer's haven. The Bear became symbolic of the outstanding golf available in the region and put Northern Michigan on every avid golfer's must-see list.

Across the road from Grand Traverse, just a par 5 away, is High Pointe Golf Club, a public course with thoroughbred breeding. Arnold is

director of corporate development at High Pointe.

High Pointe has a new Class A professional, Dave Dolengowski, a graduate of Ferris State's nationally-prominent golf management program. Dolengowski has the dual title of director of golf/general manager.

The tees at the 12th and 18th tees have been expanded but the really big news this season is the conversion of High Pointe's undulating greens from fescue to bentgrass. The fairways remain fescue.

Arnold calls the idea of fescue greens a noble experiment that didn't quite cut it."

High Pointe was designed by young Tom Doak, fast becoming one of the nations top course architects. Doak is a historian who incorporates characteristics from renown courses world-wide in his designs and High Pointe provided him with plenty to work with.

The front nine meanders through open fields and orchards and offers no hints of the hilly, forested inward nine. High Pointe, with fescue or bentgrass greens, is a joy to play.

Crystal Mountain Resort awaits the opening in August of a new nine, bringing the total at the resort in Thompsonville to 27 holes.

Designed by Bill Newcomb Jr., the additional nine is called Mountain

Ridge and stretches over 3,604 yards from the back tees.

We average 28,000 rounds yearly so you can see tee times are at a premium and we really need to offer more," says Nancy Story, public relations director at Crystal Mountain.

"It will give our course a whole new dimension in that there are dramatic elevation changes and quite a view of the Betsie River valley below."

Thompsonville is just south of Traverse City and a short hop from Interlochen. Further south, a mile beyond Cadillac, is McGuire's Resort Center, the southernmost member of the Northwest Michigan Golf Council.

McGuire's started as a roadside restaurant along the Mackinac Trail in 1949. In time, it added a few guest rooms and nine holes of golf. Today, it has 123 rooms, including 15 suites, and 27 holes.

Continual change is a constant at the resort owned by Jim McGuire, who annually adds amenities for his guests. McGuire's hosted 18,000 rounds on the 18-hole Spruce layout last year and about the same number on the 9-hole Norway course. Golf packages begin at \$97 a night.

"It's interesting that we've had so many people return for five, 10, 15 years," McGuire says. "So we must be doing something right."

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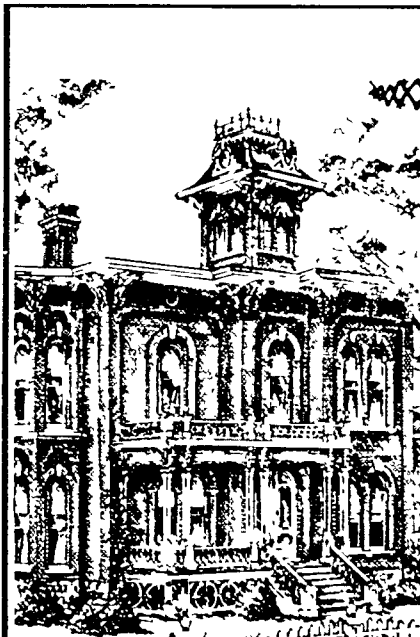

The trek northwards includes a stop at Sugar Loaf Golf Club in Cedar. Jim Gernhofer, formerly general manager at Grand Traverse, took over the reins at Sugar Loaf in May.

"We just finished one of the best ski years ever," Gernhofer says. "With that, we're obviously looking forward to the upcoming summer season."

There's a lot more going on at Sugar Loaf than people realize. In its own right, it has a really nice little golf course. The course is pretty popular and there are plans to add a second

course.

"The entire area is so fantastic. Leelanau County is a jewel. The big thing is we need to push and create awareness of the area and what it has to offer. The same goes when you talk about the Traverse City area. There are a lot of attractions and things to do, all the way from Bellaire over to us. Shopping, lakes, water, nature, golf - all of us are constantly pushing those things."

Gernhofer would like to see more golf courses in Leelanau. "When you get right down to it, there really isn't enough golf in Leelanau," he says. "We're hoping to change that."

And, it already is changing, with the addition in the area of Matheson Greens near the tip of the Leelanau Peninsula, with all 18 holes open this year.

Of course, A-Ga-Ming, with its marvelous views of Torch Lake, remains one of the favorites in the public course sector.

A-Ga-Ming is an unpretentious gem. It is challenging yet comfortable, and an ideal respite for both the wallet and a golfer's fragile psyche. Greens fees are under \$30 with special packages starting at \$40 per person for lodging, 18 holes of golf and cart.

Located in Kewadin, nine miles north of Elk Rapids, off US-31, the 6,572-yard course offers plenty of

If you stand on the sidewalk facing Heather House bed and breakfast, you see all the clutter and grandeur of a Victorian house in the Queen Anne style. A conical tower, off-center windows, pink and grey and green shingles climbing in a soft

palette of colors up a three-story house.

Turn around and you'll see another "wall", only this one is moving. A 1000-foot-long lake freighter slides silently by a few hundred yards offshore, going south on the St. Clair River between Lake Huron and Lake St. Clair.

This little strip of river life is a great weekend destination, if you are the kind of traveler who enjoys taking a funky ferry boat from the U.S. to Canada, or standing in a park watching the "lakers" and "salties" go

by.

If you are on Interstate 94 when it curves north from Detroit towards Port Huron, you should get off where M-29 curves around the top of Lake St. Clair in the direction of New Baltimore, Anchorville, Fair Haven and Algonac.

You'll find anglers lolling in their boats with their lines in St. John's Marsh or fishing the flats where the St. Clair River flows into Lake St. Clair near Algonac.

Take the ferry to Harsen's Island, swim at the end of the island or just explore the funky bars of this popular weekend cottage retreat.

You can also take the ferry from Algonac to the Walpole Island Indian Reservation, where poverty is a stark reminder of the plight of North American Indians today.

Keep driving north and you will find yourself in Marine City, which was a major ship building center, building wooden freighters, until steel hulls put them out of business.

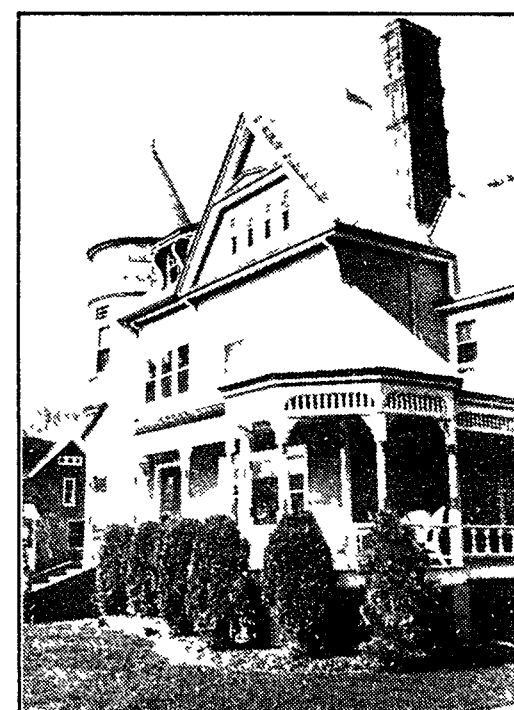
It was a Prussian riverboat captain who built what is now called Heather House in 1888; he lived there and sailed his wooden freighter through lakes and locks until the ship sank in Whitefish Bay.

The grand gabled house looks across the road to the river. It had been divided into apartments, the rooms chopped up, when Bill and Heather Bokram bought it and made it into a bed-and-breakfast two years ago.

Bill is a tool designer. Heather, 20 years out of Newcastle, Northern Ireland, was getting restless in their contemporary home in Grosse Pointe, a suburb of metro Detroit, when the house came up for sale.

"It fits perfectly with the things I love to do," Heather says. "I love to decorate, to cook and to entertain. And I am a painter who wants a lifestyle that allows me to paint." She plans to give up her job as a therapist soon so she can "B&B full-time."

The house has large rooms, sunny windows, an eclectic collection of antiques, plus Heather's touches. An

antique lamp with a fringed shade. A round table and chairs in the half landing up the curved staircase. Florals in plum and rose in the Holland Room. A view of the river from the Blue River Room. Lavender and green in the Elizabeth Room. Rooms range from \$70 to \$95 depending on the season.

All bed-and-breakfasts serve breakfast, but Heather's matches the grandeur of the house. Loose sausage in a pastry pouch, scrambled eggs and fresh fruit on her beautiful china service. Fresh-squeezed orange juice. A home-made apple tart. Baskets of current scones and brioches. Baskets of small iced cakes. A thermos jug of coffee. A china tea pot. The works.

When you waddle away, your major decisions are "what'll we do today" and "where will we eat tonight." Best to keep things in perspective.

Antique lovers will find shops up and down this river drive. There are two in Marine City (tip: try the one in the gas station first) and two behind the main shopping center in St. Clair.

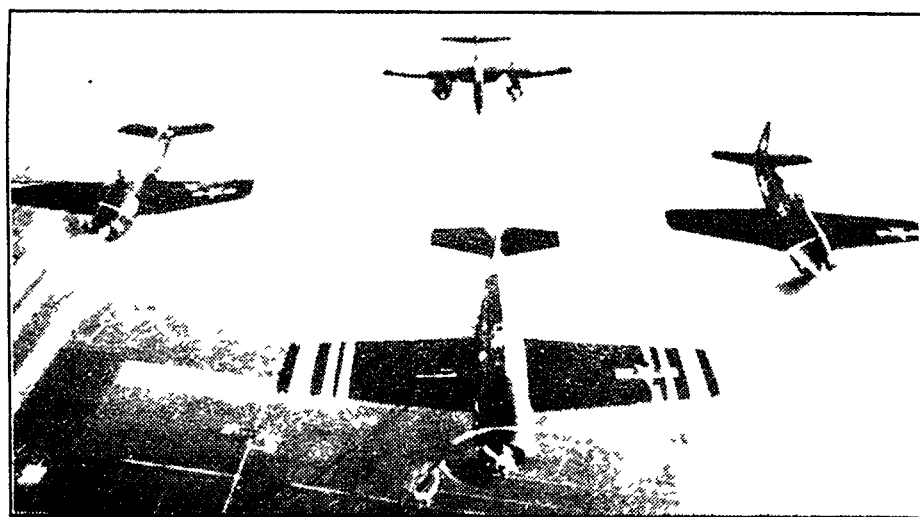

Follow the river north past the million-dollar river view to St. Clair, the main town on this side of the river. As you cross the small bridge into town, you'll see Rachelles Restaurant on the left (Heather's favorite), the Voyageur Motel beside the river on the right and the shopping mall that is the center of "downtown" St. Clair straight ahead.

When it comes to that essential question, dinner, there are several choices. The St. Clair Inn is the

elegant historic center of town, where you can eat on the porch and watch the boats go by. You can also watch the boats at Chuck Muer's River Crab two miles north; and stay in one of the individually decorated motel rooms where they serve a continental breakfast and a newspaper every morning in your room.

When it's time to go home, take the small ferry across the river from Marine City to Sombra and drive up the Canadian side to Samia or down

the Canadian side to Windsor.

This trip is not for people who like high rises and casinos, but people who like to mosey and poke usually drive home with a satisfied smile on their faces.

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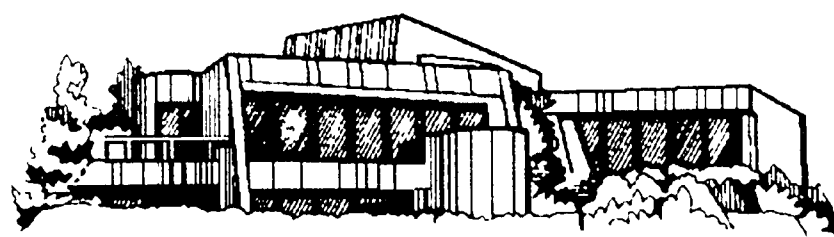
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Skydivers drop in at balloon fest

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
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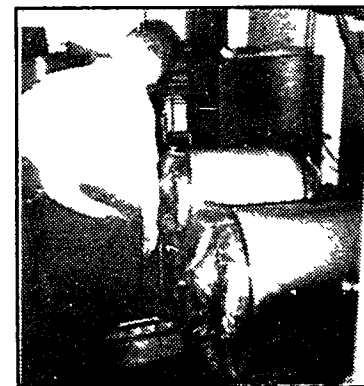
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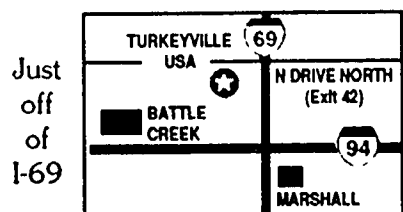
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50 golden years for antique jewelry dealer

It's been 50 golden years for Pauline Work. The veteran dealer and acknowledged expert in the antique jewelry field opened her first shop in Lansing, Michigan in her home in 1942.

"It was just a sideline then. I sold by appointment," Work recalled recently at her Farmington Hills home as she was asked about her long career in a business that often is fleeting.

However, in her family, dealing in antique jewelry is nothing transient as it is on the way to becoming a fourth generation business.

Work's mother, Della Bowman, was one of the first dealers in the state when she began selling antiques on her front porch in Nashville, Mich.

"We were really pioneers," Work noted, relating how her mother sold glass and china and then bought a little case of jewelry which Pauline took over as it was hard to tend with the other stock.

Pauline Work took it over and thus began what was to be a lifetime specialty - one that those in the business recognize. Museums have bought her jewelry, Lord and Taylor had a special exhibit of 100 of her pieces, and she had a showing at a tea given by Helen Milliken in Lansing.

In 1988, a tribute to the veteran dealer was organized by Margaret Brusher and featured in the Michigan Antique Trading Post. Pauline Work and her daughter, Jacki, who works fulltime in the business, show at Brusher's Ann Arbor Antiques Markets at 5055 Saline Road.

"We do all of Brusher's shows - we started with Margaret shortly after she began the market and now always have booth A-16 in the first building on the grounds," Work said, noting she was getting ready for upcoming shows scheduled for June 21, July 19, Aug. 16, Sept. 20, Oct. 1 and Nov. 8 this year. She added that the Brusher markets will be 25 years old next year.

Work, whose enthusiasm and love for her business is evident as she talks, admits to being 78 years old. At that age, her schedule of shows is amazing - 23 to 24 a year. She said it helps to have daughter Jacki in partnership and granddaughter Della working at the Ann Arbor shows. Granddaughters Laura and Valerie also help out.

Recalling that 50 years ago there was little information about antique jewelry, Pauline Work said it has been a constant learning process.

Her reputation proves it has been a successful one. She is a member and

past director of the National Association of Dealers in Antiques, Inc. She is an antique jewelry appraiser as well as a respected dealer.

The latter must be due partly to her philosophy: "Everything should be marked and include firm pricing."

Pauline Work explained that she makes a special effort to give information about every purchase on the sales slip and prices her merchandise fairly so that customers know the value.

When Livonia dealer Agnes Barnard retired from the antique jewelry business recently, she sold her collection to Work. "She's one of a dying breed - so knowledgeable," she declared.

Work noted that she has been fortunate to be able to buy many collections from those who may have inherited them and from lawyers who don't want to put fine items in an estate sale.

Her daughter added that she is proud of her mother's policy of dealing very fairly with those who part with collections.

"I think it is because she has been so honest that people come from word of mouth recommendations."

Pauline Work feels she has been "blessed with a sixth sense." She mentioned buying collections at the beginning of trends, using as an example a purchase of a large hat pin collection of some 800 pieces and 163 holders. She said she now has only a half dozen. She was pleased as she recalled the seller came to her, saying, "I trust you."

She also remembered buying a collection of mourning jewelry assembled by the late William Siebert, a well-known dealer who at one time had a case of antique jewelry in Hudson's downtown store. "He was the first-ever (jewelry expert) in the Detroit area, and he helped us a lot," Pauline Work said.

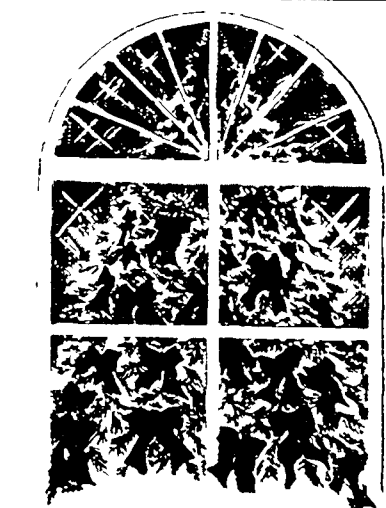

jewelry, the Works noted. Some brooches and rings were designed as sentimental ways to hold a lock of hair of a relative or sweetheart.

Pauline Work displayed a favorite little brooch holding woven strands of hair in gold encircled with tiny pearls. On the back was inscribed: Mary Venin Venn, died 19 Oct. 1787, aged 45. She estimated its value at \$350.

Some Victorian pieces in her mourning jewelry collection run as low as \$95 for a hair ring.

Work noted that quite a bit of her antique jewelry is English in origin. She usually also has some German, French and Scottish jewelry.

"Antique charm jewelry goes in and out of fashion, but bracelets always are popular," Work said displaying two versions in gold. The wide gold-filled bracelet would sell for about \$150 while a solid 14 K. bracelet would bring \$600, she said.

Is her personal collection of antique jewelry large?

"No, because the name of the game is buy and sell," Work answered this question, relating that she wears a favorite piece for a while and then sells it. She mentioned that the diamond ring she was wearing was an old mine-cut style and confessed that the striking pin on the collar of her

blouse was gold-filled with the stones of glass, not amethyst.

"I wear what I like," she stated.

However, she also displayed a museum-quality portrait pin in her collection and a shell cameo ring of a cupid. She dated the ring about 1800 and said, "I'll sell it soon."

How does one date a piece of old jewelry?

"You can date a brooch by the catch," Work explained, as an example because before 1910 jewelry did not have safety catches. She warned, however, that it is important to determine if such a safety catch might have been added later when evaluating the age of a piece.

Such know-how comes from years of inspecting, studying and researching.

And Pauline Work has spent her years doing just that. After her husband died in 1968, Work bought the Detroit Antiques Show from Ora Stout and managed it at the Masonic Temple.

Now she only does shows and has a full schedule ahead, including the September show at the Plymouth Cultural Center where she has exhibited ever since the first show there. In October the Works will be at the Cross of Christ Show in Bloomfield Hills and then at the Helen Meisel's Northville Antique Show. On the first of November the Works will be at the Scorpio Show in the Gustavson Pavilion at Meadow Brook Hall.

In the early years, Work recalled, there were many fewer shows with the first annual one after the Masonic Temple Show being a Redford Show, with Plymouth and Ferndale shows following.

"Everything you buy is a learning experience," Work summed up, confiding that right now she's researching buttons after buying an antique collection.

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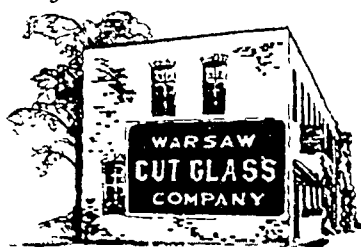
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Food and song take a definite Grecian turn

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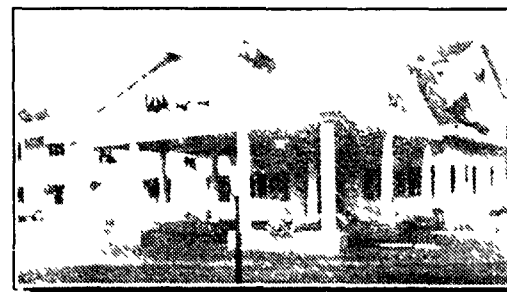
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Festival awash in 'Gemuetlichkeit'

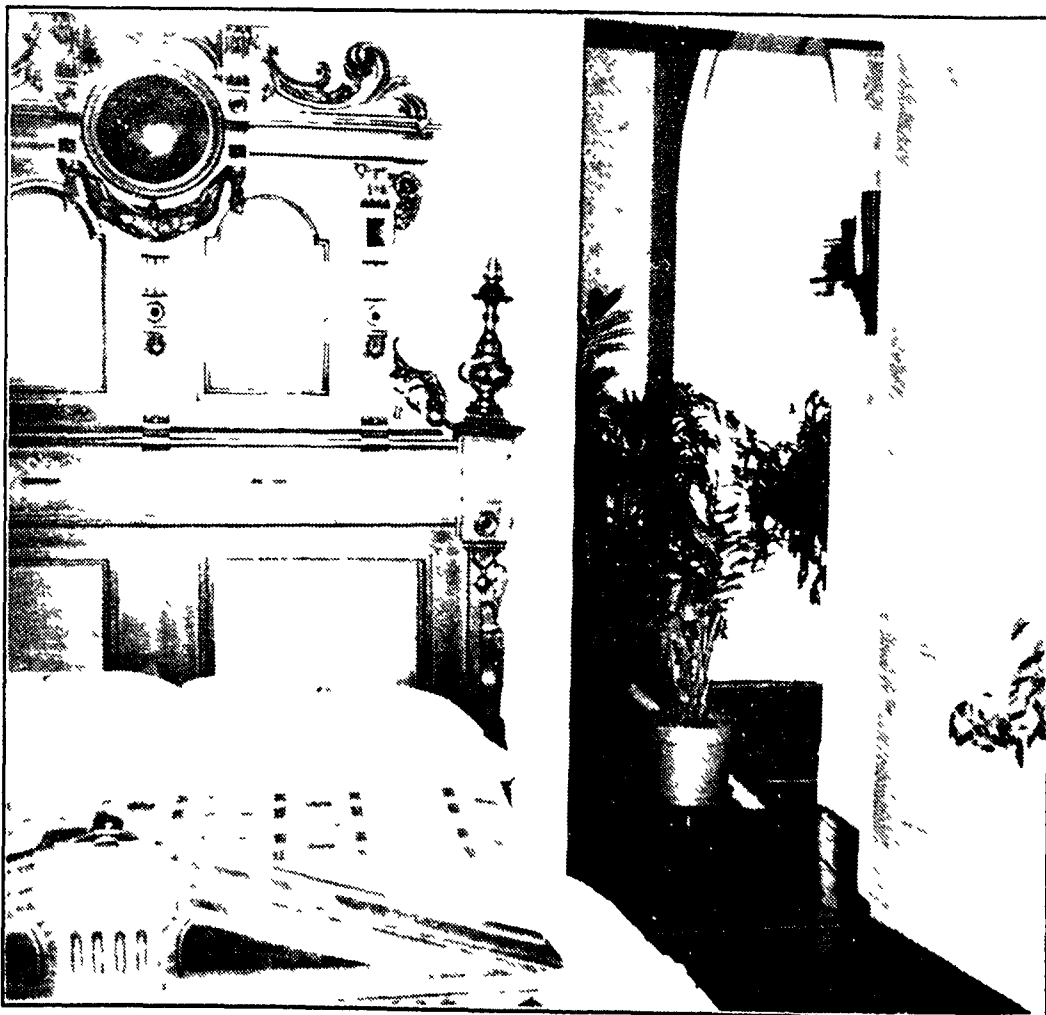

When Rilla Plyley set out a pan of chocolate fudge to cool one day 75 years ago, she changed the family's fortunes forever.

Three generations later, the Plyley name is synonymous with candy throughout northern Indiana.

As great-grandchildren Jack and Sue Plyley recount the story, Rilla and husband Milo were proprietors of the LaGrange general store, specializing in the sale of Watkins patent medicine products. Customers in the store to buy remedies for the croup and such spotted the fudge, gobbled it down and demanded more. A few years later, the Plyleys were out of the medicine business altogether.

Today, Plyley's Candies produces 40 varieties of chocolate, from milk to dark, and 36 flavors of hard candy, including old fashioned horehounds and sassafras. Visitors to the factory on South Poplar Street are invited to view the candy making process and take home a sample. (Hint: The milk chocolate SandySues are especially tasty.)

Plyley's Candies is a popular stop for travelers on the way to Shipshewana and other northern Indiana Amish country attractions. Call ahead (219-463-3351) to see if

production is scheduled for any particular day. Candy fanciers can see the entire production, which begins with raw ingredients being steam cooked in copper vessels, to the final forming line and wrapping machine.

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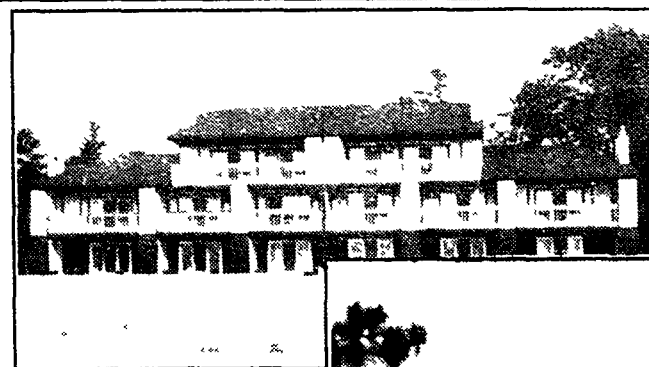
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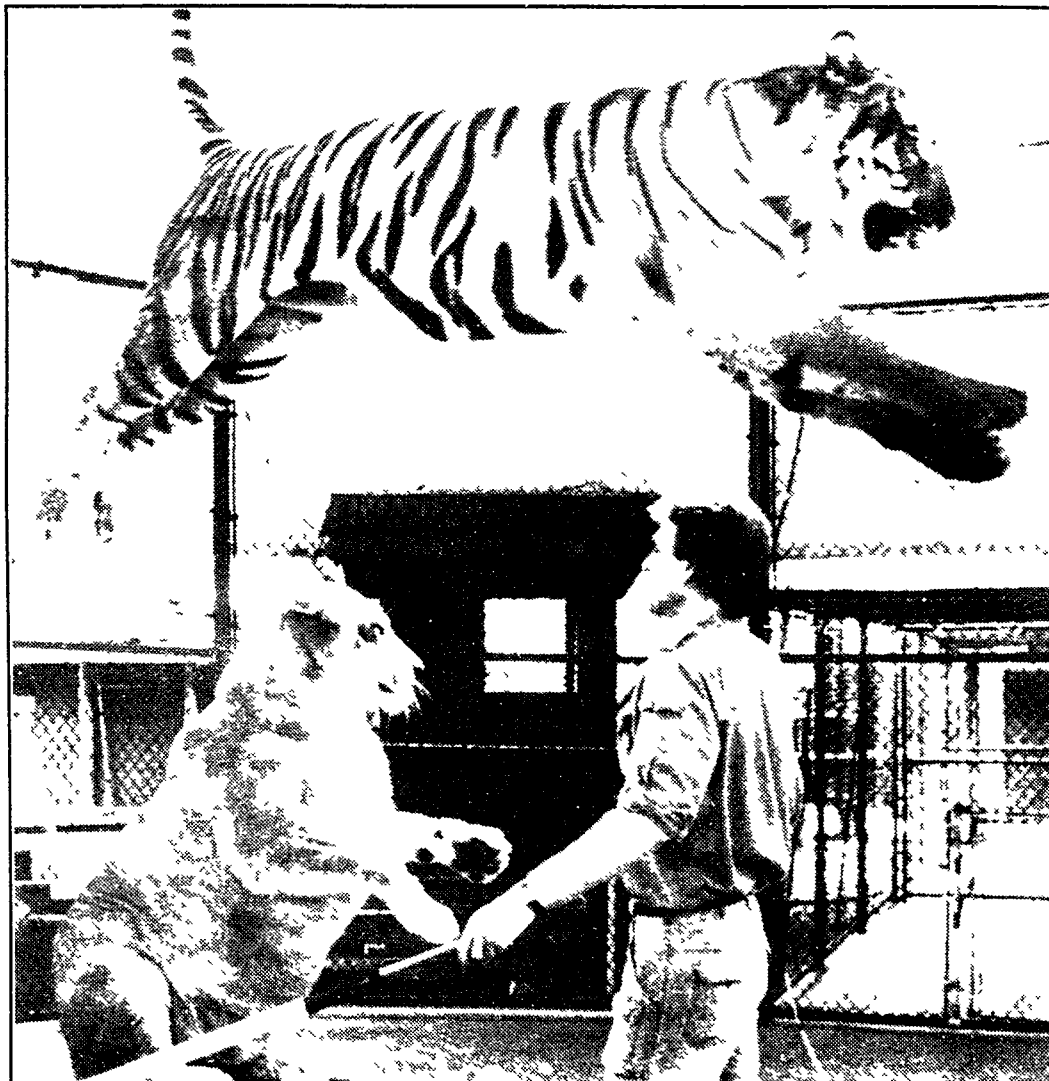

Middle Bass Island.

Once on the islands, you may prefer to take a narrated tram tour to familiarize yourself with the island. After the tour, shop at boutiques, explore the historical sights, taste test wines or dine at island pubs. If you don't have all day to spend, consider taking a ferryboat to one of the islands, where you can spend three or four hours before returning to the mainland.

If you'd just like to spend some time relaxing on the lake, try taking a cruise on Sandusky Bay or a luncheon cruise complete with on-board entertainment. Your options also include sunset cruises, fall foliage cruises with big-screen football and mid-week evening cruises.

The Inland Seas Maritime Museum in nearby Vermilion answers your quest for more information about the Great Lakes. This waterfront museum includes exhibits and displays which trace man's exploration of the Great Lakes. While in Vermilion, travel through the quaint old New England style village of Harbor Town 1837 filled with shops and restaurants.

The area's most famous native is Thomas A. Edison. Edison's 1847 boyhood home in Milan is open for tours. You can also tour a museum displaying many of Edison's inventions and sketches. Nearby, the

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Milan Historical Museum includes a tree-lined street of restored homes, a blacksmith shop, a general store and an art gallery.

Other museums in the area focus on the history of the Civil War and the renaissance of carousel art. The Follett House Museum in downtown Sandusky has three floors of Victorian clothing and antiques as well as memorabilia from the Johnson's Island Confederate Officers Prison.

Relive childhood with a visit to the Merry-Go-Round Museum. Located in downtown Sandusky, this museum includes the original Dentzel carving

shop, an operating carousel and displays of carousel figures. An artist will also demonstrate carving methods and restoration techniques.

If shopping is in order, fill your bags at the Lake Erie Factory Outlet Center where you are sure to come home with bags of bargains. Stores include American Tourister, Mikasa, Bugle Boy and more.

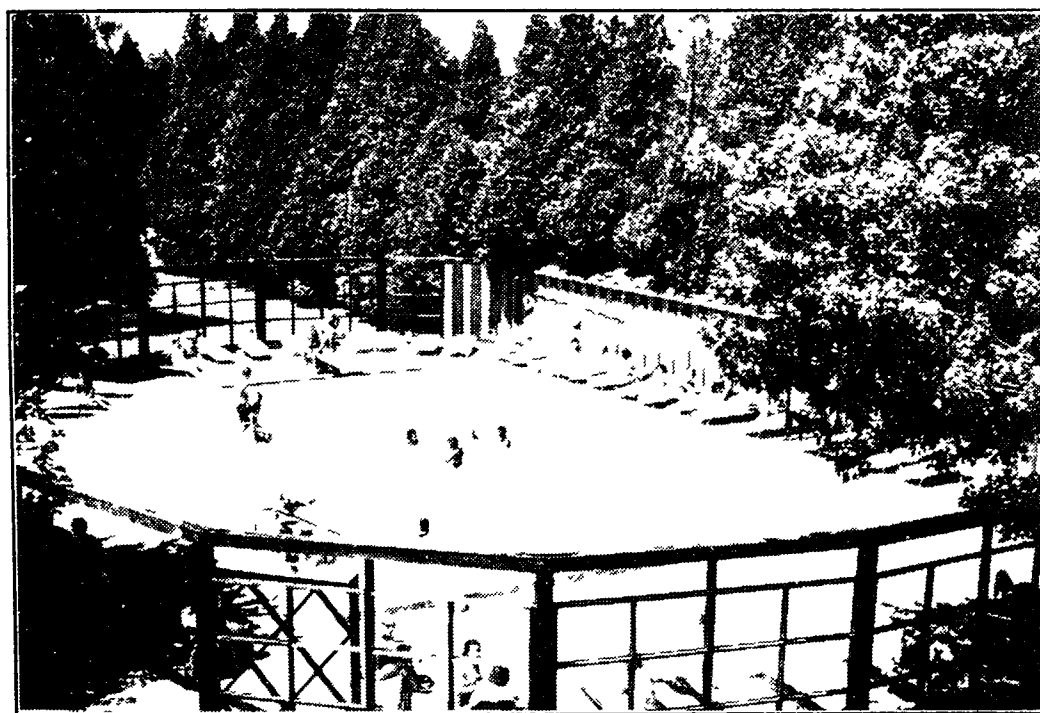

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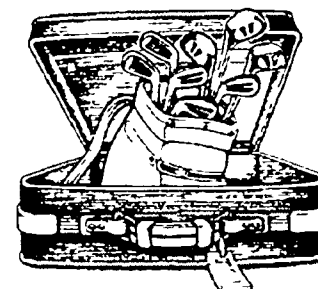
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Grand Rapids dishes out art, food

Grand Rapids, Michigan—

It's called "Festival"—a short name for a big event that captures and captivates nearly everyone's attention in Grand Rapids during the first weekend in June. This year's Festival is set for June 5-7.

Organizers say almost anyone can find a "Festival attraction." It really amounts to an extravaganza of performing arts, food, and visual artistry, and family involvement.

Spanning an area roughly five blocks square in the city's center, the activity surrounds the city's heart: Alexander Calder's 1969 sculpture, *La Grande Vitesse*. One of Festival's performing stages is set up at the foot of the bright red stabile, which stands 43 feet high. Here, you'll catch a glimpse of the Grand Rapids Civic Ballet performing excerpts from classical ballet, or feel a bit patriotic as the Grand Rapids Symphonic Band plays Sousa. Sit there long enough and rock and roll, gospel and country tunes performed by local musicians will make their way to your ears.

Three stages feature local dancers, musicians, pantomimes and other talented performers. You'll find a change of the stage offerings at least every half-hour during the 12-hour days of Festival.

For those whose latent creativity activates during Festival, there are immediate outlets. Kids can go the the "Paint-In" area where volunteers will suit them up, put them in front of a clean easel and let them dive into poster paints. Many of Grand Rapids' furniture companies donate their wood scraps for another children's activity—"Glue-In." Reuse of a grab-bag of items help the "Mad Hatter" volunteers fashion some creative caps for young and old. Adults can learn origami, clogging or contra-dancing as part of the Adult Involvement programs offered.

Visual art also finds an outlet at Festival. There is a juried exhibit of paintings, sculpture, and photography. A film and video competition features some of the best in local artistry in these media. Native American arts and crafts also are exhibited.

For those who are inspired to collect some art, there is an Art Sales and Demonstration area, offering work of local artists. Demonstrations of jewelry making, painting, and other art forms are regularly scheduled throughout the weekend.

Even the U.S. Post Office is involved, offering a philatelic connection for those who want to have their postcards and letters cancelled with the winning entry in Festival's philatelic design contest.

And then there's food. Volunteers from local non-profit organizations compete to "run a food booth." This means they set up a temporary restaurant on the Festival site, each agreeing to serve nearly 10,000

portions of their fare each day. Each of the 35 booths offer a particular ethnic cuisine, suiting the palate with everything from Dutch strawberry tarts and Lebanese baklava and Italian sausage sandwiches and Mexican "lonches de bistec."

About 150 volunteers will work at each booth, either preparing the food or serving it to hungry (or tempted)

Festival-goers.

One of the longest lines can be found at the booth of Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church, which cooks up souvlaki at every Festival. However, food booth committee chairs say the Vietnamese specialties of the Linh Son Buddhist Association gave them some hardy competition over the past few years.

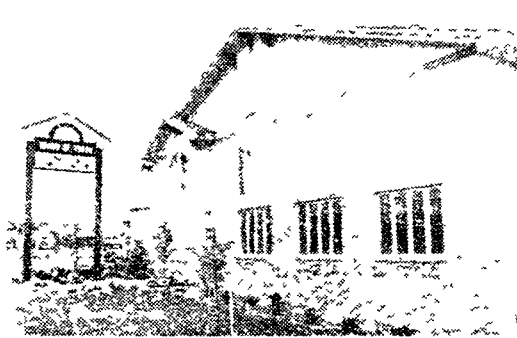
Saturday morning features the Festival parade, with floats sponsored by organizations, businesses and other groups. Antique autos have also been used to carry special dignitaries and

past Festival Co-Chairs.

Festival planners try to make certain everyone is welcome. Festival is completely barrier free (except for the crowds that seem to gather for the Festival "favorites"), with volunteers available to assist people with handicaps. Also, signers are present for many festival performances, and braille programs are available.

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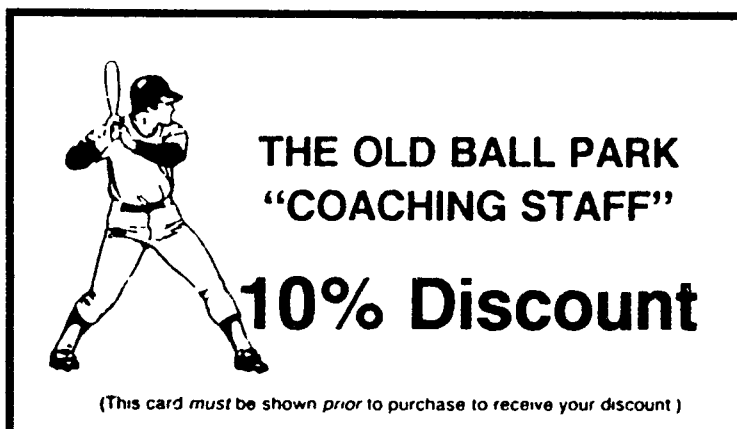
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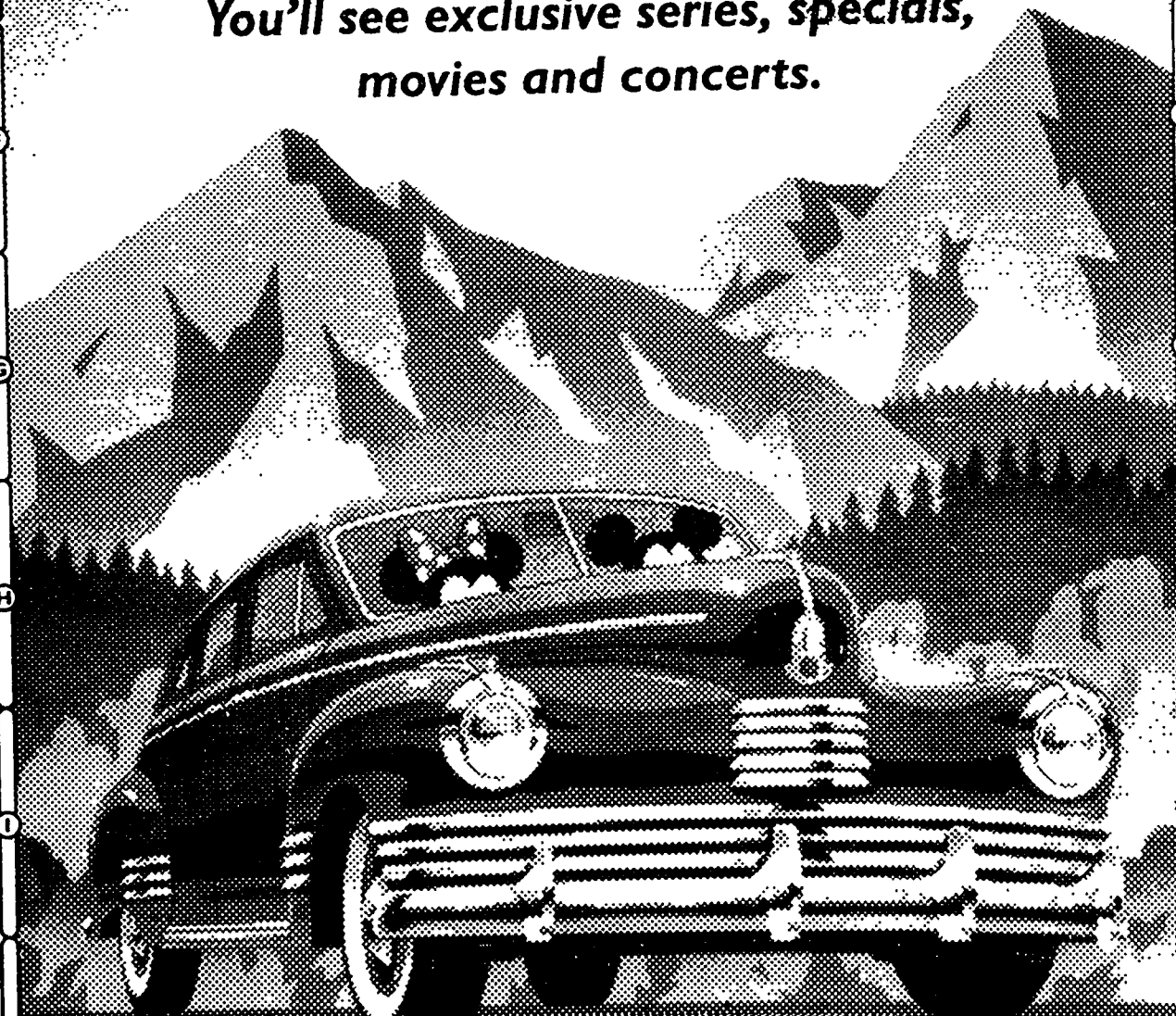
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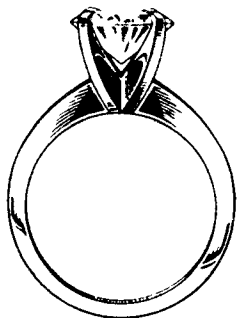
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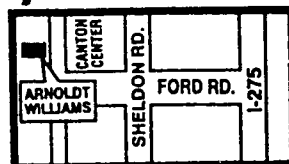
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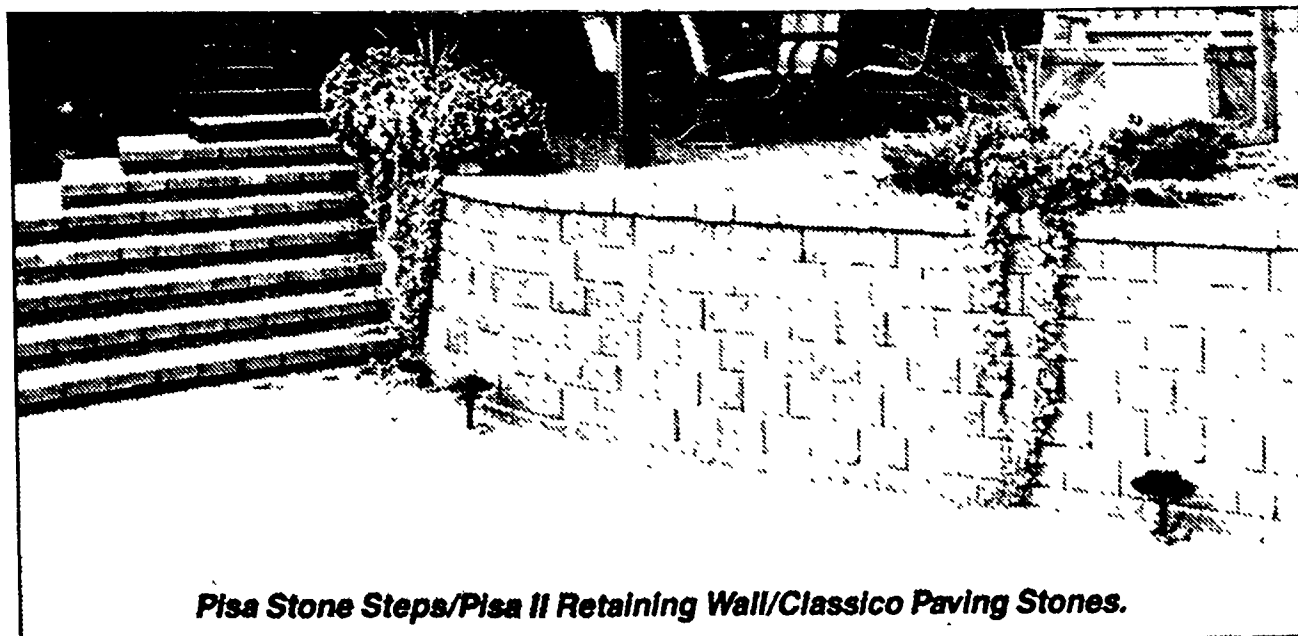
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A tradition continues in Sunday's "Tonys"

The first Antoinette Perry, or Tony, awards were presented on April 6, 1947, in the ballroom of New York's Waldorf Astoria Hotel. Serving as host was Vera Allen, Perry's successor as chairwoman of the American Theatre Wing, the awards' sponsor, and entertainment was provided by Ethel Waters, Mickey Rooney and David Wayne.

On Sunday, May 31, CBS will air "The 46th Annual Tony Awards" from the stage of the Gershwin Theatre in New York City. Glenn Close, a Tony-winner in 1984 for "The Real Thing" and nominated again this year for her performance in "Death and the Maiden," will serve as host for the awards, and celebrities likely to appear in the show include Broadway veterans Hal Linden, Linda Lavin, Carol Channing, Patti Lupone and Matthew Broderick. Among the nominees are Gregory Hines ("Jelly's Last Jam"), Jane Alexander ("The Visit"), Alan Alda ("Jake's Women") and Judd Hirsch ("Conversations With My Father"), all of whom will probably attend the prestigious ceremony designed to honor Broadway's best.

The American Theatre Wing has served the community in a variety of ways since 1917, a full 30 years before the first Tony was handed out. The group first coalesced as Stage Women's War Relief, designed to aid the war effort (and they did, selling over \$10 million in Liberty Bonds); men joined the group in 1920. The Wing's ranks swelled during World War II, and its projects diversified, from entertaining troops with the stage, radio and film versions of "State Door Canteen" to establishing a regular cadre of volunteers to contribute time and good cheer to hospitals housing returning veterans.

Peacetime brought a new agenda. For many years, the Wing operated a school, training vets and others in all areas of the theater. Former students included Charlton Heston and James Whitmore. Ray Bolger, Alfred Lunt and Martha Graham lent their skills as instructors. And always, the Wing has worked to nurture the theater for the

participants and the public.

"To serve the community, that's the point," says Isabelle Stevenson, the Wing's president since 1966. Stevenson believes the Wing meets the challenge with a variety of programs. "Our hospital program, for instance, sends live, professional theater to hospitals, nursing homes and AIDS centers all over the city," she says, also pointing with pride to the Wing's Saturday Theatre for Children program and the twice-yearly "Working in the Theatre" seminars. These sessions, conducted by working professionals from all areas of the industry, are carried on cable TV in the New York area and available on video to schools and universities throughout the country.

A new program instituted last year enables high-school students to see Broadway shows at greatly reduced prices. Afterwards, the young playgoers, many of whom are attending their first production, are taken backstage and introduced to the cast and crew.

"The cast and technicians give of

themselves so freely," Stevenson says, "and when I go to thank them, they answer, 'Well, it's for the Wing. Thank you for asking.'"

Stevenson admits she feels the Wing is sometimes overshadowed by the Tony Awards ("We do so much all year long") but loves the excitement and anticipation of Tony time. "There's a real electricity in the street," she says.

CBS hopes the electricity will translate to the screen. With musical numbers from nominated rousers like "Jelly's Last Jam" and "Five Guys Named Moe" and the anticipated presence of publicity-shy nominees like Alec Baldwin ("A Streetcar Named Desire"), there should be more than enough energy in the Tony telecast, traditionally the most punctual and fast-paced of awards shows.

Stevenson adds that great care has always been taken to preserve the integrity of the Tonys and not just turn the awards into another TV event. "It wasn't created for that; in the early days, it was a warm, family atmosphere," she recalls.

A: Whenever possible, the colorization companies research the original costumes, sets, etc. used in the film (major studios keep a great deal of these in storage) or consult color photographs, sketches and/or written descriptions of the same. If there is nothing to go by, a computer program matches the varying shades of gray in each black-and-white frame with a

corresponding shade from a color chart. Each frame is tinted individually, again by computer programs.

Colorization is a touchy subject in Hollywood, and some films, such as *Citizen Kane*, have anti-colorization protection under written contracts. A move is under way to label all "altered" films as such upon their release.

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Regional games come home on pay-per-view

The once-icy relationship between cable and broadcast television got a little cozier this month when ABC Sports and Showtime Event Television (SET) announced plans to air selected college football games on pay-per-view cable next fall.

ABC tried to put together a pay-per-view package last year, but lack of time and affiliate reluctance nixed those plans. This year's package, however, looks like a win-win situation.

Under the terms of the agreement, ABC will offer affiliates and local cable systems a two- or three-game regional package featuring an over-the-air "local" game plus other games from outside the region as optional pay-per-view telecasts priced at about \$10 each.

Initially, affiliates feared that pay-per-view telecasts would hurt the ratings of the over-the-air game. But ABC has offered assurances that it will always offer the market's most attractive game to the broadcast affiliate. Meanwhile, the homesick Michigan fan living in Texas can watch the Wolverines take on Ohio State.

The ABC-SET venture is being called an experiment, but if this and NBC's pay-per-view Olympics package are successful, it won't be long before pay-per-view becomes a standard part of sports programming. Let's just hope it continues to be a win-win proposition.

'Tonight Show' staffer recalls Sam Kinison

Sam Kinison, who died in an April 10 car crash, was remembered recently by Jim McCawley, who has booked comedians on *The Tonight Show* for 15 years.

"When I first saw him," McCawley says, "he was a very different fellow than he was at the end. He was very mild, trying hard to please everybody. He showed us some material, and it was quite funny. But when we pulled (six minutes out of his act), it wasn't funny. It was very strange. So I said, 'Sam, you're not ready for us. We have to wait on this.' After a time, he went over to HBO and he became the Wild Man. And he wouldn't listen to any censorship. It took several years before he finally came back and (performed on *The Tonight Show*) he did a musical piece, Elvis Presley's 'Are You Lonesome Tonight?' And that was a big hit on the show. He came back the next time, and again we had worked out material, but Sam wasn't able to stick with the plan, and we ended up editing two minutes out of Sam's piece because he went too far."

Earlier this season, Kinison, who developed his loud vocal skills as a preacher before taking up comedy, struck an uneasy middle ground in broadcast standards with his role as Tim Matheson's wisecracking alter-ego on Fox's *Charlie Hoover*.

'Assignment' makes the grade

McFarland stresses that "none of the programming is meant to be a substitute teacher. Our program is really more of a snap-on tool for an already-devised lesson plan," she says.

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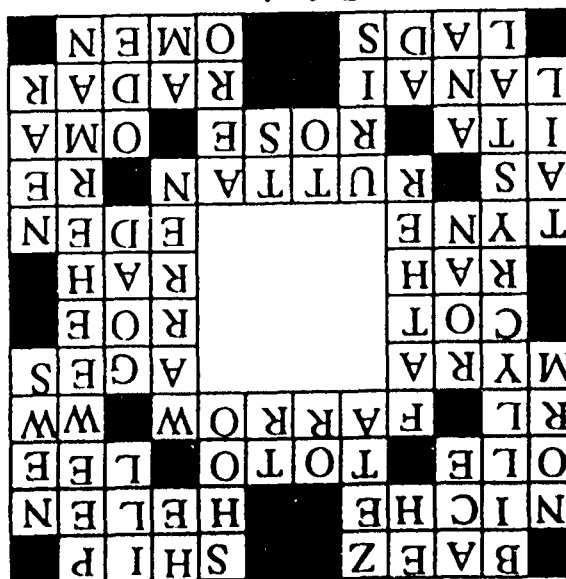
