Township to treat roads once

Relief is on the way for dust bitten township residents.

The township board succumbed to public pressure last Thursday and agreed to spend about \$12,000 on one calcium chloride treatment for the township's gravel roads.

The dust inhibitor likely will be sprayed this week, following a planned road grading, said Township Manager Richard Henningsen.

"Right now, I'd say they'll do it by the middle of the week," Henningsen

said Friday.

Increasingly vocal attacks from residents preceded the township's decision. As recently as last week, the township board refused to pay for road treatments, and had pushed residents to form special assessment districts to pay the freight.

By last Wednesday, township officials had heard enough, especially when a majority of board members face potentially tough challenges in the upcoming primary and general elections.

Auditors okay WTUA books

The Western Townships Utilities Authority's auditing firm gave WTUA a clean bill of health Wednesday, but several rate residents were not so supportive.

Plante & Moran, whose auditing division works for WTUA, had been asked by WTUA officials to conduct an operational review of the authority. That review, together with a legal review conducted by Dickinson,

Wright, Moon, Van Dusen and Freeman, was presented Wednesday to the WTUA board by Plante & Moran's Mark Nottley.

"I'm sure there will be, at some point, questions relating to (Plante & Moran's) objectivity," Nottley said. He assured the board that he works for the firm's management consulting division, which is separate from its auditing arm.

Super Sewer also under construction

Two sewer systems running through the Northville community have become a study in contrasts.

The Western Townships Utilities Authority project that links Northville, Plymouth, and Canfield to an Ypsilanti

has been deluged with charges of no-bid hiring and conflicts of interest.

Recent work on Wayne County's Super Sewer project, in comparison, has proceeded with little fanfare and even less criticism.

While the WTUA project so far runs under its \$100 million price tag,

Northville Township and Holloway Sand & Gravel Co. are expected to face off in court Wednesday to continue a squabble over Holloway's proposed development here.

A show-cause hearing is set for 9 a.m. June 24 in Wayne County Circuit Court. Judge Richard C. Kaufman will ask the Charter Township of Northville and Michael Kruszewski, the chief building official, to defend the township's stance.

Holloway has filed a lengthy list of complaints and allegations against the township, including charges that officials wrongly denied the firm's applications to mine sand and gravel and operate an asphalt plant on 177 acres southwest of Six Mile and Ridge roads.

The township refuted the bulk of Holloway's charges and has asked the court to dismiss the complaints and award attorney fees and damages

Wednesday's hearing marks the first court foray since the end of April, when the township board rejected Holloway's applications. In March, Kaufman had ordered the township planning commission to rule on both applications.

The commission recommended denial of the proposals, in decisions applauded by a vocal throng of western township residents.

A handful of factors contributed to the recommendation, including township consultants' testimony that water, noise, property values, and future site development could be adversely affected by the Holloway plans.

The township board later unanimously backed its planning commission, and said Holloway failed to provide a considerable amount of information on the asphalt plant application.

Holloway officials responded by saying the planning commission could have approved its mining application with conditions, and that the firm's application should have been judged on

zoning laws in place in April 1991, when that proposal was first introduced.

Holloway likely will attempt to exploit the fact that the township struggled for months to adopt an asphalt plant ordinance. In fact, the asphalt ordinance was not approved until after Holloway filed a December complaint charging the township with foot-dragging on its plans.

The township's response to Holloway is filled with passages denying the firm's allegations. Township attorneys state that the two sides agreed that a decision on the asphalt plant would be deferred until the sand and gravel review was completed.

The township also pleads governmental immunity and alleges that Holloway violated a statute of limitations in filing its complaint.

The show-cause hearing is set for Room 701 of the City-County Building in Detroit.

Township grapples with budget worries

A tide of red ink is set to wash over Northville Township unless immediate action is taken to restock eroding revenues.

And supplemental taxes and fees may be the township's only financial life preserver.

That's the gloomy bottom line of a five-year budget forecast served up to the township board last Thursday.

The forecast is a first-of-its-kind document for the township, said Treasurer Jack Hosmer, who drafted the projection with township Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan and Deputy Treasurer Bill Butterfield.

Based on studies of the township's police, fire, and general funds, the forecast was developed to open township residents' eyes — as well as those of elected officials.

"This township needs some new revenues. I don't believe that new growth alone is our salvation," Hosmer said. "Our budget has been squeezed and squeezed."

"How much more toothpaste can you get out of the tube?" he asked.

Hosmer pointed out numerous cavities in the township's financial dental work. The township routinely has allowed uncontested tax rate rollbacks and has banked too much

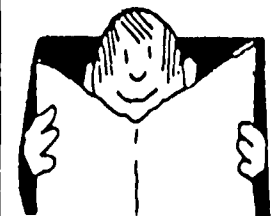

Township agrees to pay for application to gravel roads

Four board members running for re-election voted for the road treatment, including Supervisor Betty Lennox, Clerk Tom Cook, and trustees Richard Allen and James Nowka. The majority also included interim Trustee Richard Ambler.

Treasurer Jack Hosmer, who will not run for election, voted against the treatment plan, saying the township does not have money budgeted to pay chloriding costs. Trustee Thomas Handyside was absent.

Last year, the board dropped road treatments but opted to pay for one spraying after former Supervisor Georgina Goss announced her candidacy for state representative.

Township officials have faced a recurring theme the past month from residents troubled by dusty roads. Most residents expected the township to foot the bill for chloride treatments, and most ripped officials for not informing them about last fall's decision to chop treatments from the township budget.

That sentiment was evidenced again Thursday. "Nobody I spoke to was ever contacted (by the township)," said

Sunset resident Jeff Meinicke. "Do you feel you have no obligation to contact the taxpayer...?"

Township officials did not mention politics as a road treatment motivator. Supervisor Betty Lennox said a planned meeting with residents, Wayne County, and township officials may come too late to offer a breath of fresh air.

"We realize it's taking some time," Lennox said. "Due to the weather... we have a terrible situation with dust."

Lennox then said the township would comb its budget to locate the \$12,000 needed for spraying the township's secondary roads.

On June 1, Lennox said the township would not pay for spraying.

"We just don't have the money to do it," she said at the time. "Anyway, (spraying) would cost more per parcel than we're getting in taxes for general administration from those people."

But all that has changed. The township now will pay for one spraying and hope for the best in the meeting with county officials, although Henningsen said the county has indicated it will not pay for chloride treatments on secondary roads.

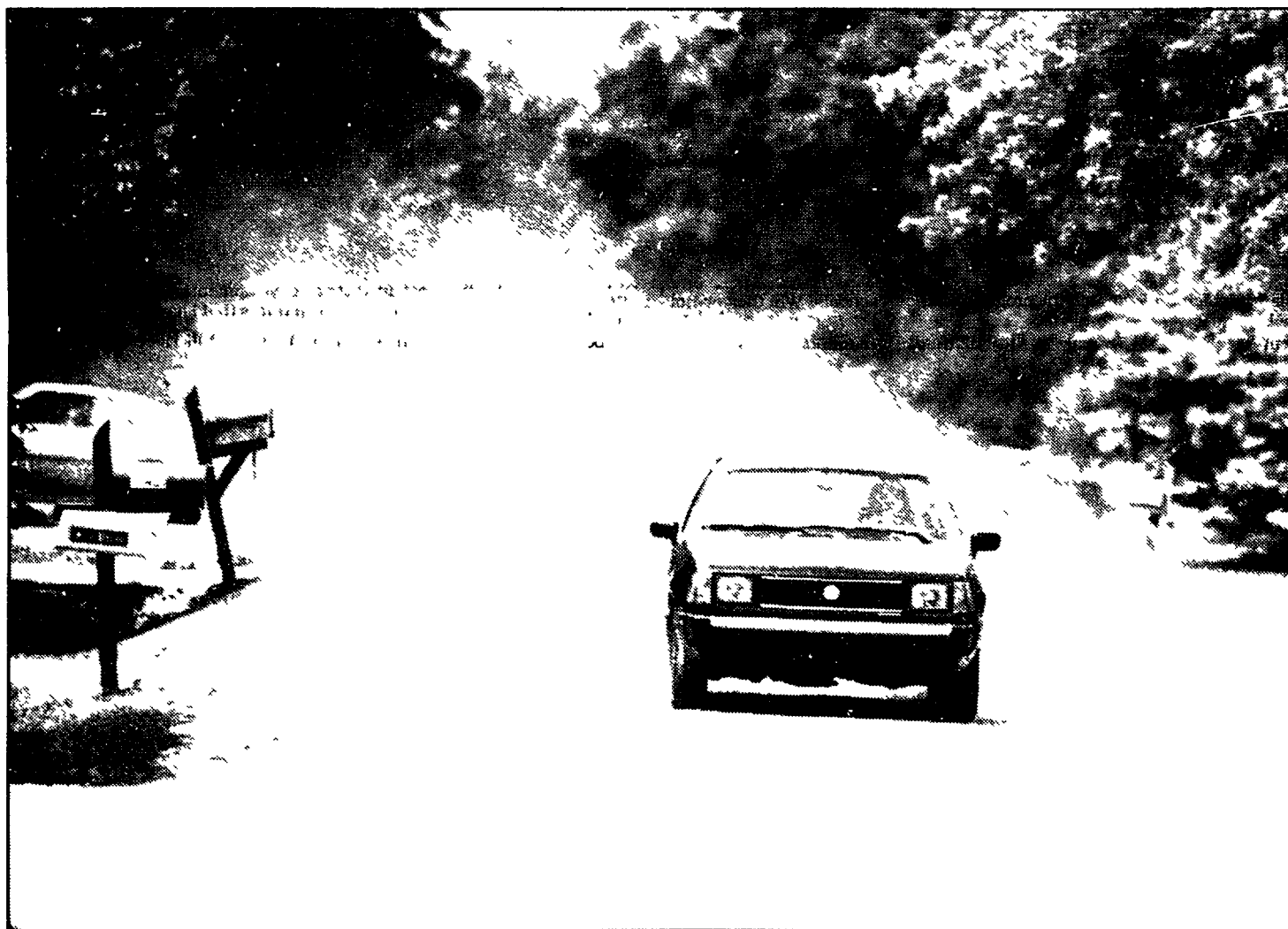

on residential growth, development that consumes services but generates little in the way of township-specific revenue, he said.

That belief might be news to tax-weary residents, but Hosmer said the township's millage rate falls well below average for similar communities in the area, including eight Wayne County townships.

Of the 52 mills on residents' tax bills, Northville Township's allotment is 3.8 mills, with the rest dominated by schools and Wayne County government.

In comparison, Northville city's millage rate is 9.48, according to the study.

The township's slice continues to

erode, in part because officials have refused to take unpopular stances on supplemental taxes, Hosmer said. If the trend continues, the township by 1996 could be faced with a \$2-million budget deficit, according to Hosmer's projections.

Potential remedies actually could be more painful to politicians than to residents, Hosmer said.

He offered a list of options that could generate new income without voter approval, including administrative tax fees (which could generate \$240,000), a special mid-decade Census (\$129,000), reworking employee health benefits (\$67,000), and Truth-in-Taxation hearings (\$168,000), a program that Hosmer pushed Thursday as a way to raise funds for gravel road treat-

ments (see related story).

"I think the board should stand up and pass a resolution and hold a Truth-in-Taxation hearing," he said. "We could do that in a month."

A Truth-in-Taxation hearing would allow the township to tax at a level adjusted for inflation. Hosmer said public school districts routinely use the Truth-in-Taxation hearing.

Other board members indicated that the township would hold such hearings in July or August.

Despite his projection of troubled financial times, Hosmer said the township's situation is preferable to older, fully-developed communities.

"(With expansion) I think the township is dealing with positive problems in the future," he said.

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News Briefs

FORD PLANT FORUM: The Northville City Council has called a special study session to consider potential acquisition and reuse of the Ford Valve Plant property.

The session will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, June 29, at Northville City Hall.

All interested residents are invited to attend.

The council's action follows increased interest by private developers in the 13.7-acre property on either side of Griswold north of Main, since Ford dropped its asking price from \$2.5 million to \$1.75 million.

Since the price dropped in March, the automotive company has reportedly received more than 100 inquiries about the plant, five to six of which are considered serious.

The council wants to determine if there is public interest in city acquisition of the plant. Possible financing methods include a general obligation bond requiring a referendum vote, an installment purchase, or private acquisition with the city's agreement to purchase or lease part or all of the property later on.

REGISTRATION DEADLINE APPROACHES: Monday, July 6 is the deadline for registering to vote for the Aug. 4 primary election. Persons who want to register to vote may do so up until the close of business July 6 at any Secretary of State branch office or at their county, city or township clerk's office.

The Department of State's Bureau of Elections notes the July 6 deadline comes on the heels of the Fourth of July holiday weekend. Most government offices will be closed Friday, July 3 in observance of the holiday, but will reopen for business on Monday, July 6. U.S. Citizens 17 years of age who will be 18 on or before Aug. 4 are eligible to register for the primary election.

As of March there were 5,793,029 registered voters in Michigan. This is 84.7 percent of Michigan's voting age population of 6,835,532.

Crowd supports program

Politicians, parents, students and alumni of Northville high school gathered Thursday night at city hall to praise Charlie Stilec and to brainstorm ideas for keeping him and the Student Assistance Program in the school budget for next year.

Stilec's job and the high school's Student Assistance Program have both been identified as possible programming cuts as a result of the failed millage request on June 8.

At Thursday night's Northville Action Council meeting, alumni, recent graduates, upcoming seniors and underclassmen packed the meeting room to share their experiences with Stilec and to rally support for retaining him. Joining them in their crusade were state legislators Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville; Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills; Rep. Willis Bullard, R-Milford; and U.S. House hopeful Burl Adkins. School Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski, Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services Dolly McMaster, and Director of Instruction Bill Hamilton also sat in.

Five students set the stage with opening remarks about the importance of the program and provided examples of the ways Stilec has touched many lives through his counseling program.

Stilec's Student Assistance Program offers student substance abusers a comprehensive school-based support system. The program, which offers 15 different support groups involving over 88 students, helps stu-

dents cope and recover from substance abuse, divorce, smoking cessation, stress at home and in school and other problems and issues affecting them.

For Kelly Kearney, Stilec was there to help her through the long and difficult road she and her parents traveled while her sister Meghan was left comatose from a near-fatal car accident.

"I knew him," Kelly said. "He seemed like one of the kids. He would give me positive things to think about that would get me through my day while Meghan and my parents were at the hospital."

For Meghan, Stilec was a real lifesaver.

Meghan Kearney with courage and pride told the crowd how she man-

aged to bring a drug dependency problem she struggled with for nearly half her life under control, thanks to Stilec.

"I was dependent on drugs for almost half of my life," she said. "I started with alcohol, then hash, then pot, then LSD, then PCP, then cocaine and crack. It was very terrible."

In October 1991, Kearney went to Stilec for help.

"He got me into the chemical awareness group. He pushed me to go to the meetings and I did. He had me talk in front of students and he helped me realize I didn't need to take drugs to have fun."

Kearney is celebrating nearly two years of sobriety.

"Charlie is needed. Kids here in Northville can afford it and that is the thing, Charlie's very caring and many more kids need him."

Roxanne Casterline, president of NAC, said Stilec sees about 400-500 students like the Kearney girls a year and about 40-45 a day.

"The loss of the Student Assistance Program would be devastating to the students who use this program to make a decision," she said. "It isn't to minimize the importance of other programs that will have to be cut . . . but we have an immediate responsibility to keep this program alive in the schools."

And the students echoed her sentiments.

"Charlie has created an atmosphere . . . for students to work together and use creative problem-solving," said Katy Murphy, who in the fall will be a senior at the high school and vice president of the Stu-

dent Congress.

Laura Whiteley, a recent graduate, said even though she never sought substance abuse counseling from Stilec he was always a friendly face.

"He's a friend," she told the crowd who packed the meeting room in support of Stilec. "There aren't many adults that you feel you can talk to as a friend. He's your equal and he treats you like a friend — He doesn't judge you."

"It's hard for me to comprehend that program not being there," she said.

One by one students filed to the microphone sharing their stories and recounting the role Stilec and the program has had in curing them.

For alumnus Jonah Sharkey (91), Stilec and his program are lifesavers.

Sharkey had a drug dependency problem while he was a student at the high school.

"During that time I had someone to go to for support and someone to show me what's out there," Sharkey said.

The hardest part about losing the program, and resuming it when it can be funded, is that time will erode at the trust that has built up between Stilec and the students, Sharkey said.

"I've returned to talk to others now going through it to help them build that trust."

"It took a long time to build up that trust," he said. "You are going to lose a lot of kids and I hate to see it. I hate to see kids go through what I did — to come to the edge of sanity and fall off."

Alternative funding considered

Can't you see it now? In the year of multiple heats of political races, the onset of the "Save Charlie" campaign.

It could happen — if the local legislators who attended Thursday's night's Northville Action Council meeting heard what their student constituents were saying about Charlie Stilec.

State Sen. Jack Faxon, R-Farmington Hills; Rep. Bill Bullard, R-Highland; Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville; and U.S. House hopeful Burl Adkins all came to hear students plead their case about cutting the high school's Student Assistance Program and its coordinator, Charlie Stilec.

The outcome of the meeting and the discussion could lead to possible fund-raisers hosted by local legislators which could snatch the program off the school district's chopping block.

Tom Watkins, a member of the district's Strategic Planning Committee, proposed Thursday that state legislators take an active role in preserving the program by hosting the fund-raising events.

"Would the four of you be willing to hold fund-raisers to raise \$5,000 apiece so we can save Charlie and the program?" he asked. "That would bring us \$20,000. That's half a year to keep the program running and it gives us time to breathe."

After hearing some of the students' comments, Bullard said he would be open to organizing and

hosting a fund-raiser to pay a portion of Stilec's salary if the district board approved the idea. He said it is possible he and others could set up a matching fund program.

"I support you in your goals and if there's anything at all I can do, I'll do it," he said. "I'll be willing to work with Georgina and anybody else. My idea is that we have a target and goals."

The student assistance program and Stilec were both identified as budget cuts by the district prior to the June 8 millage vote. District officials said then they couldn't fund the program with the renewal tax rate alone and since the 1.4-mill increase didn't pass, the \$45,000 program is scheduled for the chopping block.

Despite funding problems, Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said the board has yet to make final decisions on the fate of programs in the schools. Whether or not the Student Assistance Program gets axed altogether or it suffers from a reduction in services remains to be seen. With the success of the program since its inception five years ago, school officials say they don't want to abandon the idea completely.

"I want to let the students know how proud I am that you've come forward," Rezmierski said. "It's important for us to hear from you. You have my assurance that the board has not given up on the Student Assistance Program. We will continue to solicit input and keep the door open."

The forthrightness of the students shocked Faxon, who voiced disbelief at the availability of

drugs for youths in today's society.

"This has been very informative," he said before departing. "Although I could never have believed it to the extent that the students acknowledge such a high level of the existence of drugs. It's hard for me to understand how it could be so prevalent. I never saw it when I was a teacher. It's very alarming and I'm not sure I can believe it."

Faxon's comments prompted Manpreet Bagga, a '90 graduate of Northville High School, to step forward and respond.

"There's a lot of money in the homes around here," she said. "It's frightening that there could be problems and I'm just appalled at Sen. Faxon's comments that it is unbelievable."

Rezmierski was quick to compliment the legislators who attended for their concern and interest in district developments all year long.

"In the nine months that I have been on the job, Sen. Faxon and Geake and Goss (and Bullard) have always been available to meet with and talk with about the issues being raised."

"But they are four in a bigger body," he said.

And that bigger body of state legislators is expected to meet Thursday and decide on the K-12 appropriations, Bullard said.

The presence of state legislators also offered students and school officials little hope that state recapturing acts, tax-base sharing, and deeper cuts in education wouldn't be mirrored in next year's budget.

Firefighters bring varied backgrounds to their job

Bill was hardly eighteen. His birthday was in a week and he could almost wait. His application to join the Fire Department was already on the Chief's desk, and Bill had spent a lot of his free time recently hanging around the fire station. He felt he already knew how to operate the engine, and some of the fire fighters had let him try out the self-contained breathing apparatus.

Bill had just graduated high school, and like many of his friends his plans for the future were still a bit uncertain. He was thinking about enrolling in a couple of courses at the community college, and had a part-time job in town while he considered his options. One thing Bill was certain about, however, was his desire to join the local fire department. His uncle had been on the depart-

ment, and he could remember all of the big fires in town since he was a kid. He even thought he might like to get a job on a full-time department in one of the nearby cities.

George also has put in an application, but his story was different from Bill's. George was in his early 30s, married with a couple of kids and a nice job. He was new to the community and was looking for a way to get involved, but wasn't particularly interested in putting his name forward for one of the citizen committees that were very active in town. As a younger man George had lived in a big city, and had been fascinated by the work of the Fire Department. He had chosen another career for himself, but thought the time was now right to become involved. He had talked to the Chief, and filled out an application.

The stories of "Bill" and "George" are just examples. Those who volunteer to work with the fire department in our community come from all kinds of backgrounds,

each bringing a unique contribution to this essential job. There are, of course, many things they have in common: dedication to community service, interest in fire and emergency medical services, and the willingness to learn. The last element is particularly important. When hired, Bill, George and other new fire fighters would have to complete about 260 hours of classroom and practical training to earn their Fire Fighter II certification from the state, plus another 200 hours if they elected to get an Emergency Medical Technician license.

While the work is often hard, the rewards are great. The sense of accomplishment that can only come from working together as part of a team to accomplish a goal in the face of adverse circumstances makes fire fighting a rewarding experience. And while the job is only a part-time, "paid-on-call" position, it brings a paycheck as well. Any community which provides fire protection

through an on-call department needs a mix of people who are available to respond at different hours of the day and week. Our department has fire fighters who work in town and are available during the day, but who may live many miles outside of town. Others have traditional day jobs, but live closer to the station and are readily available during evenings, the early morning hours and on weekends. And the background of our fire fighters are just as varied. Local business people, workers in various skilled trades and professions, and those with full time jobs in other governmental agencies can all be found on the Fire Department. It is the willingness and desire to serve that bring these people together, with the goal of providing efficient emergency response to their friends and neighbors.

Gravel pit driver receives sentence

A 28-year-old Northville woman, rescued by police from a Beck Road gravel pit after leading them on a two-mile chase last October, faced sentencing in 35th District Court Thursday.

Sandra Sue Byson was sentenced to nine days in Hillsdale County Jail, five days of community service and a year's reporting probation for fleeing and eluding a police officer, driving under the influence, and driving with a suspended license.

Her license was suspended for a year, and she was ordered to seek counseling and attend at least two Alcoholics Anonymous meetings a week.

She also was assessed \$685 in court fines and costs, and \$375 in probation fees.

Failure to comply with the sentence will result in 26 additional days at Hillsdale County Jail.

Byson admitted during a May 5 trial that she led Northville City police on a two-mile chase through the city. But she said she drove into a water-filled gravel pit off Beck Road not as the result of a drunken accident but "because I didn't want to go through this . . . I just figured it would be an easy way out."

The chase began just after midnight Oct. 25, when Byson made an illegal left turn past officer Glenn Stewart's patrol car at Main and Center. Stewart turned around to pursue her and followed her as she ran several stop signs on her way to the

gravel pit.

Byson swerved off Beck Road just south of Seven Mile and drove over an embankment into the pit. Stewart pursued on foot, swam out to Byson's car about 100 feet from the shore and towed Byson to shore, where he had to be pulled out of the water by another police officer.

Byson admitted drinking "two or three" beers at the Northville Eagles Club just before the incident, but she refused to take a Breathalyzer test, and police did not seek a search warrant to take a blood sample.

Judge John MacDonald found her guilty of driving under the influence of liquor anyway, based on testimony from a paramedic and three police officers, including Stewart, who said they smelled alcohol on Byson's breath.

Stewart and the paramedic also testified that her speech was slurred.

Stewart had also noted that Byson swerved toward the curb and back into the road at the Northville Post Office.

But Byson said she started to pull over and then changed her mind. "I had made myself a kind of stupid promise that if I was going to pull over, it was going to be at the gravel pits," she said.

Byson's boyfriend told the court that she had made a similar threat to him the week before the incident. He said Byson was depressed that her license was still suspended from a previous incident, and frustrated over efforts to get the suspension lifted.

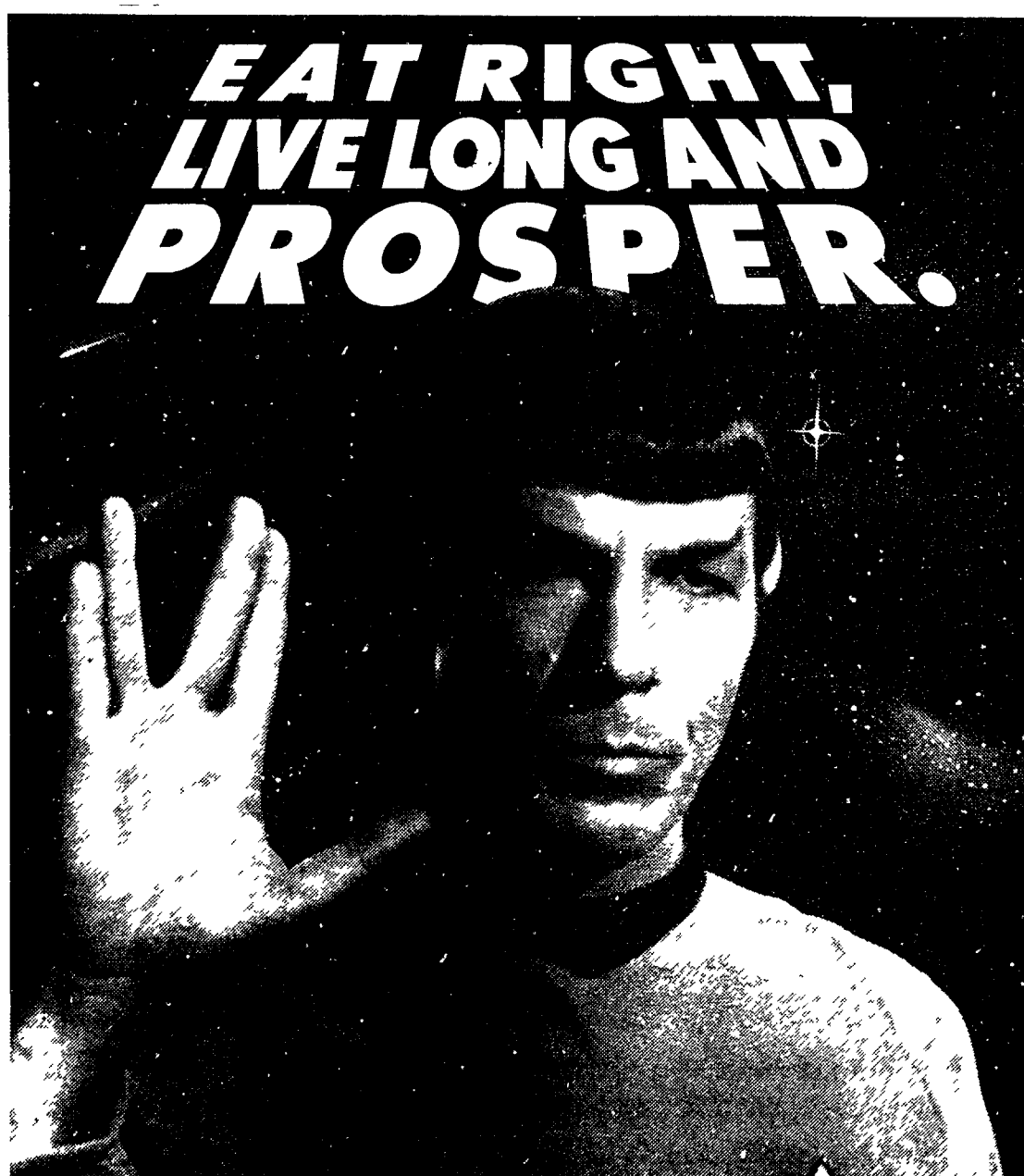

City passes ordinance for planned unit developments

The city council on Monday passed a revision to the city's planned unit development ordinance that will change the way developers can build in Northville.

The revision gives developers the ability to shift building density between areas on their site, allowing them to build residential or other units closer together on one part of their parcel provided that the parcel's overall density remains the same.

The ordinance was designed to encourage diverse types of residential housing and preserve a site's natural features. Builders could avoid destroying natural features, or provide open spaces for residents, without losing building density.

But the previous ordinance was limited to

single-family developments of at least 80 acres, duplex developments of 40 acres, townhouse developments of 20 acres and apartment developments of 10 acres.

The restrictions made it nearly impossible for developers to take advantage of the ordinance in the city.

The new ordinance follows a recommendation in March by Planning Consultant Don Wortman, who found the previous one "overly restrictive."

Wortman noted that many communities pass PUD ordinances that allow a greater overall building density on a PUD site to encourage use of the ordinance. His proposed revisions relaxed the acreage requirement but did not allow greater overall building density, he said, following Master Plan recommendations that the city's building density not be increased.

The ordinance now allows planned unit developments in commercial and industrial districts, and does away with the acreage requirement.

The planning commission settled on a final draft version April 7, after revising it to assure that a developer could not create a PUD, build to the higher density on a portion of the parcel and then sell off the undeveloped portion for redevelopment at a normal density level. The revisions stipulate that a PUD's open space will be dedicated as an easement and recorded with the city.

The commission held a public hearing May 19, at which no public comments were received.

The council held a first reading on the ordinance June 1, and scheduled a second reading for June 15. The ordinance was passed without comment by a 4-0 vote at that meeting. Council member Jerry Mittman was absent.

Zaytis ask for court ruling on horse manure

The issue of a noxious horse manure pile on an Eight Mile Road site in Novi — the bane of Northville residents downwind — has hit the legal fan.

Margaret and James Zayti June 9 filed a lawsuit against the City of Novi, seeking a court decision on whether it is legal to use the fecal material for composting to create topsoil on their farm just west of the family's Zayti Trucking Co. site at Beck Road.

Also sought, along with court costs and attorney fees, is a temporary restraining order to prevent Novi from issuing any further tickets until Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Fred Mester interprets several city ordinances and state laws.

Novi will fight the suit, City Attorney David Fried said. "Composting with this horse manure is not a use permitted under the zoning ordinance. We intend to uphold our interpretation of the ordinances."

Neighbors in Northville Estates began complaining when the Zaytis started hauling the goods in from Northville Downs in December 1991 and depositing it on the trucking company property. Margaret Zayti, executive director of the racetrack, has said competition from Chinese mushroom growers squashed the local industry, which previously purchased the racetrack's fertilizer.

Some Northville residents found the aroma downright unbearable this past winter and spring. Calls to Novi led to the tickets for depositing litter on private grounds, odor emissions and for a non-permitted use of property.

The Zaytis pleaded guilty in the Walled Lake 52-1 District Court May 14 and agreed to remove the horse hooves as a condition of having the three tickets dismissed. At least 15 loads of manure and horse bedding, with 28 cubic yards per load, had been deposited, Novi Assistant City Attorney Lou Bugbee said.

Because city tickets were issued to Zayti Trucking, they do not cover the adjacent farm site, Novi Ordinance Officer Steve Babinchak said.

"There's still a lot of manure there (on the farm.) The only thing the judge would allow us to do is remove the manure from Zayti Trucking. If we wanted to do something, we could issue another violation," he explained.

"Before we did that, we felt it would be prudent for them to find out if this was a legal use . . . Most people would say that horse manure from your own horses would not be a problem. Do they have the right to contract with race tracks and bring in one or two loads every day? Is this an agricultural use?"

The farm was once the old Twin Pines dairy, a former Detroit-area landmark. The family has owned the property since 1949, James Zayti said.

"I can understand the people of Northville Estates. But we're not doing anything we shouldn't be doing," Zayti said.

"We removed the stuff. The judge didn't want to get involved in the whole thing. I've never had any problems here in my whole life."

The goods have been hauled to Salem Township, James Zayti said June 12. Novi is now investigating this assertion.

The evacuation was good news to Northville Estates resident Cheryl Cassidy.

"If he does it again and we smell it, we will take issue with it again. We will regroup," Cassidy said.

"They were talking about some kind of system where they put something on it so it doesn't smell."

The horse farm is zoned for residential-agricultural — R-A — and the Zaytis' attorney Barry Steinway argues in the complaint that Section 301 of Novi's zoning ordinances permits farms and greenhouses in this category.

The suit also contends that Novi's composting ordinance allows the by-products of the equine digestion to be used as compost material. The complaint further alleges that the 4-foot-high and 6-foot-diameter size restriction placed on composting by the city only applies in platted subdivisions. As it is not in a subdivision, Steinway argues, the Zayti farm is not subject to composting size restrictions.

The lawsuit states that under the Michigan Right to Farm Act, a farm shall not be found to be a public or a private nuisance or a violation of a zoning ordinance as long as it conforms to "generally accepted agricultural and management practices" and that the Michigan Department of Agriculture guidelines for manure management recognize the legitimacy of composting.

Chances look dim for change to water board

They're putting up an optimistic front, but suburban politicians are dismayed at what has happened to their bill to regionalize the Detroit water system.

House Speaker Lewis Dodak, D-Birch Run, sent the Senate-passed bill to the Housing and Urban Affairs Committee, where it has a strong chance of dying. Four of the 10 members, including chair Nelson Saunders, are from Detroit.

"I was shocked," said the bill's sponsor, Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.

"I'm very concerned. I was left with strong assurances" it would be sent to the House Towns and Counties Committee. That panel is led by Roland Niederstadt, a Demo-

crat whose district is in the suburbs of Saginaw. Most of the seven members are from townships and small cities. None is from Detroit.

"I spoke to Niederstadt by telephone, and Dodak was there with him. I've been trying to call Lew," said Honigman.

"Maybe it can still come out of committee," Honigman added.

Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn and his deputy, Bob Fredericks, also were unhappy.

"It was sent to Housing and Urban Affairs. But it's not a housing bill, and it's not urban affairs," said Fredericks. "It didn't seem to us to be appropriate."

"We haven't canvassed that committee and the chair. It's likely there won't be any action until after the Aug. 4 primary."

"We're very pleased it got through the Senate. The bill deserves a (House) hearing. We had several people contacting Dodak."

Both suspected that Detroit Mayor Coleman Young influenced Dodak to send the bill to a hostile, Detroit-dominated committee.

Young has been vehement in his opposition to regional control of the water and sewerage system that serves more than 100 neighboring communities as far north as Flint.

Kuhn has been fighting the battle for more than a dozen years. Rep. John Bennett, D-Redford, Sen. Gilbert DiNello, D-Clinton Township, and Sen. Richard Fessler, R-Commerce, all took cracks at sponsorship.

Honigman's bill was the first to get through one chamber of the Legislature. If it doesn't get through the House,

it dies at the end of the year. And it can't get through the House until it gets through Saunders' committee.

Suburbia's case is that Detroit overcharges its customers, by loading its own general government costs into water rates; fails to collect from its own retail customers, shifting more costs to the suburbs; and generally mismanages the system, by giving contracts to political favorites rather than through competitive bidding, and by stonewalling requests for information.

Detroit contends that its leadership and bonding ability made the system possible; its willingness to deal made suburban growth possible since the 1950s; and its rates are the lowest big-city rates in the country.

Detroit contends it owns the system and would have to be paid billions for it. Suburbia contends federal aid and customer charges paid for the system, not Detroit's tax money, and that Detroit's "investment" is almost nil.

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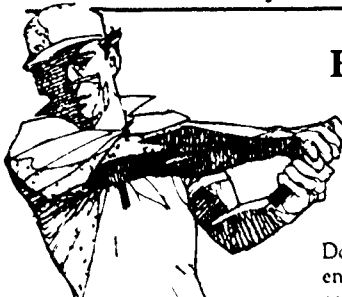

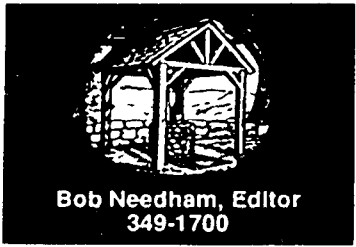

Failure of plan puts land back at the start

From hope, to elation, to something approaching downright despair. That's pretty much the tale of Northville Township's famous white elephant, almost 1,000 acres of vacant land owned by Wayne County, over the last couple of years.

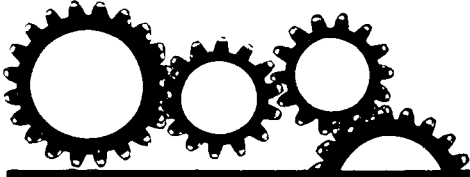
Basically everyone concerned has long hoped for a high-quality development on the site which would improve both the township's housing stock and tax base. When the county got serious about taking specific development proposals, the situation really started looking up. And when local developer R.A. DeMattia Co. won the right to develop the land — with a great-sounding mix of residential, clean industrial, and recreational purposes — it seemed like the best possible solution.

Well, it probably would have been, had it come to fruition. But after a lingering recession and a steadily eroding chance that DeMattia could pull together financing for the plan, the land is pretty much back where it was before all this.

The DeMattia plan, of course, was not the only serious effort to develop this site; only the most recent, but also the best. That's why the failure of the plan hurts so much.

Now, all that's left is the head-scratching. Why didn't it work? Conventional wisdom has it (and we tend to agree) that if anyone could have pulled this size project off, it was DeMattia — a person and a company which could combine strong local roots with worldwide reputation and connections. As a bonus, his company pledged a willingness to work for the preservation of the historic buildings on the site wherever possible.

The recession obviously played a part in the plan's apparent failure. But, disturbing to the development climate though it is, the recession has not

brought all local projects to a screeching halt. There seems to be more going on here, and it's important to try to figure out what that is — because if some factor afflicts this property which hasn't really been considered, any future efforts will be just as likely to fail.

Perhaps DeMattia's plan was just too grand. He offered the most money for the site, and promised to do the most with it. Maybe this proposal was more than the combination of site and market could bear; it could be that the plan put stars in the county's eyes and partially blinded it to the more realistic scale of other proposals.

Having tried and failed to get the "grand plan" approach off the ground, the county now sits poised for a different strategy. The official who acts as point person for the site now says the county will sell off the land a chunk at a time, to whoever is interested in a given piece for a single purpose.

Maybe this will indeed be the way the land finally gets developed, which is the primary concern. But it likely won't end up with as high-quality — or as cohesive — a development as DeMattia had planned. And dealing with a series of developers, rather than one, will make the task of the preservationists far more difficult, if not impossible.

The county land development is dead. Long live the county land development.

Once again, public participation vital

We at the paper seem to find ourselves making an awful lot of calls for public participation in various things lately. Filing for elections, voting in elections, speaking out on funding for the library, and so on. Maybe it's getting a little stale, but it continues to be an urgent need. And here we go again.

A week from tonight — at 8 p.m. Monday, June 29, at Northville City Hall, 215 W. Main Street — the city council will hold a special meeting to discuss the future of the former Ford valve plant on Main Street.

In this space, time and again, we've discussed various aspects of the site and the possibilities for its future. It's an intriguing question, and one vital to the future of downtown Northville in particular and the community in general.

That's why this meeting is so impor-

tant, and why it's important for interested residents to attend. Have a thought of your own on what could happen there to benefit the community best? Have a worry about what you're afraid might happen? Or just want to listen in on what the members of the city council think?

Here's your golden opportunity. Everyone's welcome at the meeting, and the more people turn up, the better representation the council will have of the will of the people. There are many, many considerations which will play into the ultimate future of the Ford plant, but chief among them should be the interest of the citizens of Northville.

Try to come to the meeting, to speak out or just to listen. The Ford site is one of the most important in Northville, and its future is definitely worth your time.

Big storm leaves little damage



"Quick, turn on the Weather Channel!"

Now I must admit, that's a sentence I never thought I'd hear uttered by anyone. But in this case it was my roommate Bryan, who also happens to be the staff photographer for this paper, asking me to forgo the evening news.

It was Wednesday evening, and storms were rolling in from the west in a hurry. Not your average garden-variety thunder boomers, we were told. The weatherman said the clouds were 17,000 feet tall. That's 3 miles of storm, going straight up. And the clouds were spitting out tornadoes the way a kid at a picnic spits out watermelon pits. This was Mother Nature with PMS.

Earlier in the day we'd heard reports that tornadoes had wiped out a subdivision in Minnesota, and wreaked destruction from Kansas on east.

But now Bryan wanted to see where the storms were on the local radar. As he and I sat glued to the Weather Channel, memories of past storms came to mind.

Tornadoes had hit Novi twice in the last four years. Then last July, heavy thunderstorms rocked the state, leaving half a million people without power for as much as a week.

"Before I die I want a picture of a tornado," said Bryan.

Interesting choice of words, but I knew what he meant. Like most journalists, we both want to be there when the big story hits. Storms are big stories around here, so we wanted to be in the eye of the storm, both literally and figuratively.

Bryan headed for the Novi fire station, and I went to the of-

fice to sit by the police scanner. About 8 p.m. traffic on the radio started to pick up. The winds preceding the storm clouds were knocking down tree limbs and power lines.

Then the clouds rolled in. In the space of 5 minutes, downtown Northville went dark and all the street lights came on. The leading edge of the storm came through, bringing down sheets of rain and harsh, whipping winds.

Here in the office, the lights flickered on and off on three different occasions.

The radio reported the sighting of two funnel clouds, both near Wixom. Neither touched down. Bryan saw one of them from his post near I-96, but got no pictures.

There was also a report of a tree fully engulfed in flames. There was some confusion over which street it was on, and the fire department never did find it. A report of a house fire in the township turned out to be minor, and there were about a half-dozen reports of downed or arcing wires.

As things died down, reporter Steve Kellman and I headed for the only interesting report left. Novi police said a tree had fallen on a vehicle and was blocking West Road.

As we learned later, the tree had fallen in front of the car, and the driver, with no time to react, drove right through the limbs, and almost came out the other side. He wasn't hurt, and even the car looked driveable were it not for the leaking gas tank.

Channel 7 was already there with a camera crew when we arrived. Reporter Mike Holfeld was gathering information from the Wixom police, and we made small talk as we waited for a chance to talk to the driver.

"You know, as big storms go, this one was a flop for news," he said. "This was the biggest thing we had."

Us, too. It would have been more exciting to watch the weather channel.

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Super Sewer line has long, checkered past

The long-awaited Super Sewer project may be running smoothly as it heads for the finish line, but the project has had a checkered past.

Though its recent quiet progress contrasts with the star-crossed Western Townships Utility Authority plan, Wayne County's Super Sewer has run into more than its own share of snags since it was first proposed in 1958.

In the past decade alone, the project was pronounced dead and revived more than once.

In 1984, Super Sewer was a \$120-million project serving Northville Township and 16 other communities in Wayne and Oakland counties, but not Northville City.

The project faced an upstream battle in its fight to win approval and funding from state and federal agencies. It was rejected by the state's Department of Natural Resources more than once before finally approved.

More costly, though, was the federal Environmental Protection Agency's rejection of a Wayne County application for 75-percent federal funding for Super Sewer, in September 1984. The EPA found insufficient information

on potential floodplain pollution and the capacity of the Detroit plant to handle the increased flows.

Wayne County officials sought a court injunction against the EPA and state Department of Natural Resources to prevent disbursement of the funds to other projects, but the injunction failed.

That December, Wayne County sought to revive Super Sewer amid charges that Detroit officials had helped kill the project to halt further development in western Wayne County.

Northville City, which had been left out of the previous version, was included in a 1985 version — much to the city council's surprise. Impetus for the new version followed threats from the DNR to curtail further development by denying sewer permits to communities sending sewage to the Detroit plant.

By then, because of the project's failure to gain federal EPA approval in time to qualify for 75-percent federal funding, its estimated local costs had risen from \$32.57 million to \$49.67 million. The new figure reflected revised 55-percent federal funding, revised population figures and the elimination of Commerce Township from the plan.

Northville Township's share at that point went from \$2.16 million to \$3.14 million, while the city's was estimated at \$860,000.

City officials, facing threats of \$10,000-a-day fines for exceeding the city's allotted sewer capacity, formally joined Super Sewer in September 1986. Northville Township remained uncommitted.

Northville cost estimates for the then-\$103 million project rose to \$3.3 million for the township and \$908,000 for the city by 1986, provided the project qualified for 55-percent federal funding.

In late September, Canton, which was to pay 32 percent of the local cost, pulled out of the project and left its future in doubt once again. A refigured cost structure for a smaller project hiked Northville Township's share of the now-\$84.5 million project to \$3.8 million, and the city's share to \$1.8 million. City officials agreed to stay with Super Sewer while those in the township remained undecided.

In October, Northville, Plymouth and Canton township officials sent Wayne County a nine-point ultimatum for their participation in Super Sewer, and Novi officials met to discuss other options. The townships wanted the

cost allocation to be based on added sewage capacity, not population, and they sought a promise from Wayne County that the costs of combined sewer overflow elimination and other capital improvements would be borne by others. They also demanded written DNR approval of Super Sewer and service agreements with Wayne County, before they issued final approval, and assurances from the DNR that they would not face enforcement actions if they went with Super Sewer.

That November, Northville City considered joining either the townships or Novi in a separate system from Super Sewer, and the possibility of 55-percent federal funding was threatened by President Ronald Reagan's veto of the 1986 Clean Water Act.

Plymouth and Canton townships settled a long-running lawsuit with Wayne County, Detroit, the DNR and EPA as well that year, clearing the way for the townships to form WTUA and contract with the Ypsilanti Community Utility Authority wastewater treatment plant.

The lawsuit, ironically, was for prohibiting the two townships from joining an earlier version of Super Sewer in 1983.

the latest cost estimates for Super Sewer decreased from a projected total of \$66,816,000 in 1988 to \$64,864,000 in 1992.

Jim Murray, director of Wayne County's Department of Public Works, attributed the slight drop to the soundness of the Super Sewer project and tight economic times.

"I'd like to say it's just good management, but it's a combination of factors," Murray said.

"I think there's some good administration in it and some circumstances with the recession," he said. "The project was well thought out, and we estimated (the cost) pretty good."

Super Sewer, more formally known as the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project, will replace existing sewer pipes and connect 12 communities including the cities of Northville and Novi to the Detroit Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The project has been on the drawing boards for decades, and has gone through several incarnations (see related story), but the latest three-segment plan is well on its way to completion.

"Segment one essentially will be complete this year," Murray said, with segments two and three scheduled for completion within the next 18 months.

While WTUA officials were trying

to refute criticism of their own project, they leveled several charges at Super Sewer, charges Murray said are unfounded.

In a 10-page "rebuttal" of a Feb. 22 Detroit Free Press article charging cost overruns and potential conflicts of interest, the WTUA board asserted "we will be the first communities in Wayne County to come into compliance with the Rouge River Remedial Action Plan, created by an international consortium to end pollution of the Rouge River (while) Super Sewer communities will still be polluting the Rouge River whenever it rains . . ."

Murray charged WTUA with making "apple and orange comparisons" regarding Rouge pollution, and the combined sewer overflow (CSO) systems that carry both stormwater and sanitary sewage and leak into the river during heavy rainstorms.

"They talk about CSO, and how the CSO's uncontrolled and you're not going to have any control of this, and how WTUA's moved ahead and solved its sanitary sewer problem," Murray said. "Well, the whole Rouge valley has moved ahead to solve its sanitary sewer problem . . . and the CSO problem has not been addressed by any community, and that's part of what's being addressed now."

"And there are still CSOs in the WTUA area, specifically Plymouth Township. So I think they're mixing

apples and oranges. All the other communities in the Rouge valley including the City of Detroit are in compliance with the federal law, and they are on a construction program to assure that they stay in compliance, and that construction schedule, in some cases, is ahead of the WTUA project."

"So when they say that they're going to be done and nobody else in southeast Michigan is, I think that that's really misrepresenting the facts."

WTUA Executive Director Deloris Newell said WTUA was being misrepresented, not the other way around.

"We have never said that our project is more environmentally sound than the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley project," she said. "What we have said is that for the three townships, we will remove all the combined sewer overflow problems . . . With our sewers, Canton Township, Plymouth Township and Northville Township will have all the capacity they need, so there will be no more dumping of combined sewer overflows."

While Super Sewer was not designed to correct CSO problems, Wayne County officials have been involved in a project to study the CSO issue, Murray said.

"In fact," Murray said, "Wayne County got a (federal) grant for \$46 million to implement this program that we have proposed should be the

way you should go for CSO control in the Rouge valley, and we are passing through a significant amount of that money to Plymouth Township for their design costs, to do what they need to do to get in compliance and correct their CSO discharge problem."

Another distinction between the two projects is in the way they have sought outside grants and funds for their projects.

While WTUA communities are still paying a Washington-based consulting firm at least \$20,000 a month to secure federal funding for that project, all three segments of Super Sewer have qualified for 55-percent federal funding, Murray said.

Wayne County does use lobbying firms to push for or against legislation that would impact the county, but Murray said county employees themselves apply for the grants needed to finance construction projects like Super Sewer.

"I have not had any lobbying firms working on grants," Murray said. "We do not have lobbying firms do that . . . These grants are pretty well described and proscribed."

Murray predicted that Super Sewer will beat WTUA to completion of its sewer system.

"They're saying they've got their project going and it's going to be done before everybody else. It's just not true," he said.

"We're still on schedule and within

budget . . . In fact, the county part of the project will probably be done before anybody else is done."

Despite the charges and countercharges, Wayne County and WTUA officials have worked together to save costs. One example of that cooperation saved the WTUA system millions of dollars.

The savings involved a stretch of sewer pipe that WTUA avoided having to build by paying Wayne County for an existing stretch of pipes.

"They would have had to build another (pipe) to pick up (sewage from) Northville Township and part of Plymouth Township, that they avoided building," Murray said.

At the request of WTUA officials, and with WTUA footing the bill for extra bidding costs, Murray said, Wayne County sent a portion of its own Super Sewer project out for bids two ways — one to build the system as planned, and the other to sell WTUA a portion of pipe in Plymouth Township to allow WTUA to avoid building some of its own.

The returned bids showed that WTUA officials could save money on their own project by buying the pipe from the county.

"We at WTUA paid Wayne County \$5 million for those pipes; in turn it saved WTUA approximately \$3 million because it would have cost WTUA approximately \$8 million to build its own pipes," Newell said. "It was beneficial to both governmental

entities."

Wayne County's public works director hopes that those examples of cooperation will continue, to every community's benefit.

"One of the things we can do is manipulate the system to benefit everybody," Murray said. He pointed out that better regulation of the rate at which sewage is pumped into the system can allow communities to pump more in without exceeding their maximum flow.

"We can save several hundred million dollars in my estimation by avoiding building new facilities, just by better management," he said.

"By having that kind of manipulation going on, we can all avoid some costs."

Also, WTUA has little choice but to cooperate with the county, because WTUA communities have not completely severed their ties with Super Sewer by building their own system.

For all their claims of independence from the county's sewage problems, the three communities still have contracts with the Detroit Wastewater Treatment Plant requiring them to send a certain amount of sewage to the Detroit plant and pay the resulting fees, or obtain Wayne County approval to sell their capacity to someone else.

"They are part of this system until the year 2011, no matter what," Murray said.

sess the sewer authority's bonding procedures, professional service arrangements and operational practices.

Nottley noted that bonding costs for WTUA's \$100-million sewer system was complicated by several factors. The fact that WTUA was a new governmental entity, the complexity of the project and the large size of the bond all contributed to the risk, he said.

"All of those kinds of things would tend to make this more complex . . . You would expect the costs on this bond issue to be much higher than a general bond issue."

Even so, Nottley's analysis of similar bonds found that WTUA's underwriting and other costs were similar. "It's a pretty fair indication . . . that those overall costs, whether you're talking financial, legal or otherwise, seem to be in the ballpark," he said.

Nottley also noted that the bonds were refinanced in 1991, during a period when many government bonds were refinanced to take advantage of more favorable interest rates. The refinancing will save WTUA nearly \$10 million over the life of the bonds.

"When you see that level of bond activity, it's a pretty good indication that the decision was appropriate," Nottley said. "I think anybody has to look at 10 million bucks and say that's a fair chunk of money."

WTUA has also come under heavy criticism for failing to obtain competitive bids for a range of professional services. Engineering, legal and public relations firms contracted by the authority have been linked to each other and the three townships served by WTUA, and its members by campaign contributions to political figures in WTUA and the townships.

Nottley noted that competitive bidding was not required for professional contracts, and that Michigan municipalities often rely on "longstanding professional relationships" for their legal, accounting and engineering services.

"There is no desire on the part of a municipality that is getting good service, at what seems to be a fair price, to change providers," he said.

"We've concluded that the authority has been generally effective in negotiating for services, irrespective of how they were awarded."

WTUA board members seemed satisfied with Nottley's review, and

spent little time questioning him about it. He faced tougher questions from the audience.

Bob Zaetta, chairperson of Plymouth Township Concerned Citizens, asked why Plante & Moran's study did not examine the \$20,000 monthly retainer fee and expenses being paid Cassidy & Associates, a Washington, D.C.-based lobbying firm seeking federal funding for WTUA.

"I can say that Cassidy is a very qualified firm," Nottley said, "but in terms of the actual dollars, are they going to materialize it, that's somewhere down the road."

"They're not cheap," he observed. "Ultimately, if the grant does not materialize, I believe you're going to have some questions about the expenditure. It's certainly a significant expenditure . . . As a resident, I think you'd look at the ultimate payoff."

WTUA Chairperson and Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack said he doubted the project would have received federal funding without Cassidy's assistance. "I would be skeptical of us being able to get to our congressmen on our own . . . and sell the project," he said.

But he added, "I'm not sure we're going to get it anyway, to be honest with you."

Plymouth resident Tom Kalis asked why insurance costs were not considered in the cost of bond issuance, and criticized the 13-year break-even point for the project's bonds.

Audience member Liz Bryl criticized the project's lack of competitive bidding for professional services, and the web of relationships uncovered between WTUA and township officials and the firms working for the authority.

"I'm still uncomfortable because it seems to be all in the family," she said.

When Yack responded that a local school board relies on a particular firm for professional services, rather than seeking bids every time, Zaetta asked, "Who are they related to?"

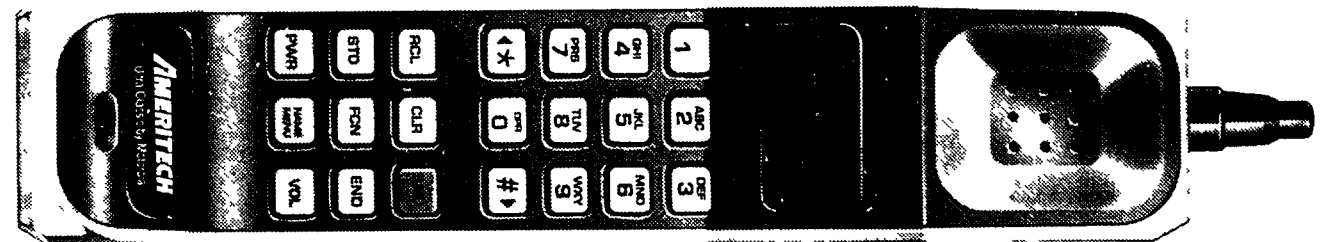
"Nobody," Yack said.

"That's the point," Zaetta replied.

Whether or not governmental entities are legally required to seek bids and avoid potential conflicts of interest, members of Wednesday's audience called it an ethical requirement.

Said audience member Patty Schmidt, "Maybe the public is becoming more aware of the procedures, and maybe the procedures should be changed."

Senior softballers keep up the Pace

The legs, though willing, don't move quite as fast as they used to. And it's a little tougher to bend over for the two-hoppers through the infield.

But on a glorious, sunny morning in Northville, a gang of guys with a few years under the belt once again became the boys of summer.

Senior softball is the game, and Northville has placed an enthusiastic, talented entry in the men's 65-and-over division.

Last week, the Northville 11 (one of the modifications to the grand old game) outhit, outhustled, and outhustled a Dearborn seniors team en route to an 11-7 victory.

The win was the fifth against four losses for Northville, one of six teams in a league that includes squads from Taylor, Canton, Livonia and Redford. The teams travel from site to site, and met last week at Fish Hatchery Park, where the home field advantage held for the Northville Pacers.

Seniors play twice weekly in a 25-game schedule that runs from mid-May until mid-August. Games last seven innings, unless one team racks up 15 runs and wins by a "mercy" decision.

Some rules differ from standard slow-pitch softball — baserunners attempt to score by dashing for a line near home plate, eschewing the possibility of dangerous collisions; defensive line ups feature five infielders, four outfielders, a pitcher and catcher — but the game looks and feels much the same as any league.

Batters spray hits to all fields, make an occasional wild throw to first, and carry on with banter that would plant a smile on the face of any little leaguer.

And the seniors are always ready with the verbal needle.

"Boy, we've got to get you some oxygen," shouted Pacers' catcher Russ Rathbun to a teammate who had wheezed from first to third on a base hit.

"Okay, nobody die on base now," someone else said.

When Rathbun yelled out "let's go, grandpa" to Pacer Ed Taylor, nearly everyone on the team looked up.

Taylor responded by banging a line drive over an outfielder's head and motoring around the bases for a home run. The Pacers' bench erupted when he scored.

Little heed is paid to age in this league. The seniors prove they love to work and play hard. They run out the fly balls and grumble if a teammate doesn't take an extra base on a hit.

Players are competitive and don't mind tossing a derogatory comment or two at the umpire.

"It's a lot of fun," said Pacers manager Bob Lattin, who doubles as the right fielder. "Where else can you have so much fun without paying anything?"

All but four members of the 20-man Pacer roster hail from Northville, said team scorekeeper Henry Judge, who cheered as Charles Cox fielded a deep grounder to third and made a strong throw to first to nip the Dearborn runner.

"It's a lot of fun, and creates a good friendship," Judge said.

Wine maker produces in war-torn land

Serge Hochar, owner of Chateau Musar in Lebanon, explains the dedication necessary to produce wines in his war-ravaged Middle East homeland.

"I have been producing wines in Lebanon since 1958, when I took over for my father. For years, 90 percent of my wine was sold and consumed in Lebanon, but because of the war, I now export 90 percent of it."

Chateau Musar was founded in 1930 by Gaston Hochar, Serge's father, in an old Moorish castle named Mzar. The name was changed to Musar because of the strong French presence in Lebanon at that time.

War has plundered Lebanon and local demand for Musar wines. Hochar was happy to sell most of his production in Lebanon, but when circumstances changed, he was forced to change his tactics in order to stay in business.

"This all turned out to be a blessing," Hochar said optimistically. "By entering the world market, I discovered how good my wines were compared to the great wines of the world. I showed my wines for the first time in 1979, in Bristol. They were a hit because no one expected to taste such fine wines from Lebanon."

Michael Broadbent, writing in "Decanter," the prestigious British wine journal, described Musar wines as a "full soft — a bit of claret and a touch of Burgundy."

Others have debated whether the wines are more like those of Saint Emillion or Pomerol. Let's just say Chateau Musar is akin to the Middle East's Chateau Lafite.

Today, Hochar is lauded globally for overcoming the obstacles of war and producing wines that rival some of the world's best. "We made a wine every year except 1976 and 1984 because the war prevented us from trucking the grapes from the vineyards to the winery," said Hochar. "The winery is located 15 miles north of Beirut and the vineyard is in the Bekaa Valley south of Beirut — a distance of 50 miles."

In 1976, fighting cut off electricity to the winery making it impossible to process the harvest. Hochar has since installed a Diesel generator as insurance.

The Bekaa Valley is an ideal site for wine growing. An old alluvial river valley at 2,500 feet elevation, the Bekaa is watered by the rains and melting snows from two mountain ranges. There are 300 days of sunshine a year, with little or no rain between June and October. The altitude plus overcast summer weather act to moderate the extreme heat.

Moslem farmers also grow apples, pears, peaches, cherries, and melons in the Bekaa, but because of religious laws they do not drink the wines produced.

Chateau Musar wines are a blend of cabernet sauvignon and cinsault (a variety usually associated with the southern Rhone Valley in France).

RED and READY

Demand is high for Meyer's berry treasure

Strawberry fields may be forever in the Beatles' song, but in Southeast Michigan they're getting to be fewer and farther between.

That's one reason Larry and Carol Meyer are a little overworked these days. The couple owns the Meyer Berry Farm on Eight Mile Road, Northville's headquarters for picking your own strawberries for over 20 years.

This year, however, it's become more like a strawberry Mecca, drawing visitors from all over. On June 8, the farm's opening day, cars were lined up out the driveway and all the way down Eight Mile to Beck Road.

"We had about 500 cars on Monday," said Carol. "It was amazing. The fields are getting picked pretty clean."

Several factors have contributed to the run on strawberries this season, but perhaps the biggest is the number of other

berry farms that have closed.

"Five farms closed this year," said Carol. "We had some people come to us and say they drove to this or that strawberry patch, and now it's all condos. Or they drove to another, and they've retired."

Fortunately, berry customers are a patient and understanding lot.

"They really are a different breed," Carol said. "We have some wonderful customers. We're doing the best we can, but there's no way we're set up to handle 500 cars."

Roughly five to six acres of berries are planted and ripening now. Said Carol, "I wish we had five more acres."

Another contributor to the demand is the late crop of berries this season. Because of the frequent early rains and the dry, sunny weather that followed, there are not only a lot of berries out there, but they came about a week or two later than usual, thus building the anticipation for devotees.

"There's a time and a season to every-

thing," said Carol, "and now is strawberry time for most people."

Carol's son Tim, who also works at the farm, agreed.

"Strawberries just taste good this time of year, as you can imagine," he said. "We get a lot of people, though, who come out from the city and just like to be in the country. They like to get away."

Not surprisingly, Carol said the slump in the economy may also have added to the bushels of customers that have visited the farm.

"We sell our berries for 80 cents a pound," she said. "That's about half of what you pay in the grocery store, and it works out to a big savings."

Those in the know can tell you that fresh-picked berries beat the taste of the store-bought variety hands down. Though they may be smaller, they pack in more of that sweet tingle on the tip of your tongue. And the smaller sweeter ones are the best for jam, Carol said.

At the Meyer farm, four different varieties

of berries are available. Though the one early variety has already peaked and is fairly well picked out, other varieties are late bloomers and should be available for another week or two.

To accommodate the ripening process of the fruit, the Meyer Berry Farm keeps varying hours, and on some days doesn't open at all. Your best bet is to call the day you want to go (349-0289) to see if they are open, but remain flexible.

Even in a well-picked-over field, a veteran berry picker can come out with a trayful.

"You've got to know where to look," said Carol. "The best place to look is under the leaves because that's where they grow. It really is like a treasure hunt. You lift up the leaf and there's the little red jewel."

When you find the fruit, pluck it gently. If it doesn't come right off the plant, the berry probably isn't ripe. If the tips of the berry are white, that's another sign of

Imagine if everyone in your home put dishes or utensils away wherever they pleased. Or food was pushed into the refrigerator with no established categorization. Eggs in the butter dish or meat in the vegetable tray or spills not wiped.

Picture that large-scale. We can't afford to have it happen. Nothing makes me more angry than wasting food. Thankfully, very little is disposed of unnecessarily. Both Laura Merglewski and Pat Wzolek, my sous chefs, have done an excellent job over the last eight months.

But I'm losing Laura as a sous chef. Her skills as a chef are extraordinary. We all respect her a great deal. I especially appreciate her dedication to our business. She has gone above and beyond the call of

Microwave a boon for defrosting

The convenience of freezing means that you can keep a variety of foods on hand — and frozen foods are even more convenient when you have a microwave oven.

The power to defrost frozen foods in just minutes is one of the most widely appreciated benefits of owning a microwave oven. With a microwave, even when time is short and food is still in the freezer, you can get dinner on the table without waiting hours to defrost.

Most ovens have a "DEFROST" setting, but if your oven does not, the 30 percent power setting is generally the best one for defrosting. You can defrost at any level, but the 30 percent setting is best because it defrosts evenly, so food doesn't start cooking on the outside while the center is still frozen.

At lower levels, microwave power surges on and off, and it's during the "off" cycles that heat has time to equalize through food for more even defrosting.

It's important that all food (especially meats) be completely defrosted beforehand to ensure even cooking. To determine whether foods are completely defrosted, insert a knife point in center to check for remaining ice crystals.

Frozen foods should be stored at between zero and minus-10 Fahrenheit in your home freezer. Food should be properly packaged (in closed containers or tightly wrapped) and not stored too long — store no food longer than one year. When packaging foods for freezing, wrap as tightly as possible; freeze in uniform, round shapes for more even defrosting. Corners will defrost first, so round is better. (Doughnut shape is best, when possible.)

Divide meat to be frozen into 1- or 1½-pound packages, since most recipes call for these amounts. Freeze foods in shallow containers since deep containers are hard to defrost.

Breaking up and removing defrosted portions means more even and quicker defrosting. Flex plastic pouches and bags as soon as possible when defrosting to break up ingredients that cannot be stirred. Stir vegetables, sauces and casseroles partway through defrosting time; turn over or rotate other foods that

cannot be stirred (meats, layered casseroles, etc.).

Separate pieces of meat, poultry or seafood as soon as possible to let microwaves reach all sides. Arrange so that there is space between pieces and place thicker portions toward outside.

Pay attention to directions for defrosting and check food frequently so that vulnerable spots, such as edges and thin areas, won't start to cook before centers or thick areas are defrosted. Remove thawed portions as soon as possible so that microwave energy is directed at still-frozen pieces.

(Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.)

MICRO-TIP OF THE WEEK

Besides defrosting, the 30 percent power setting is also great for warming pies, coffee cakes and breads for just-baked flavor.

TERIYAKI FISH FILLETS

½ cup water
½ cup soy sauce
¼ cup dry sherry
1 tablespoon rice wine vinegar
2 tablespoons packed brown sugar
¼ teaspoon ground ginger
¼ teaspoon garlic powder
12 to 16 ounces frozen fish fillets
Paprika

Yields 4 servings.
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.

Defrosting time: 3 ½ to 6 minutes (plus 5 minutes standing time).

Cooking time: 5 to 7 minutes (plus 1 hour to marinate).

Oven setting: DEFROST (30 percent power); HIGH (100 percent power).

Place fish in 8x8-inch microwave-safe baking dish. Cover with waxed paper and microwave at DEFROST setting 3 ½ to 6 minutes, turning over once. Let stand 5 minutes, then rinse in cold water and pat dry. Let stand another few minutes, if necessary, to defrost completely. Remove from baking dish and set aside.

Combine all remaining ingre-

dients in same baking dish. Stir until blended. Add fish fillets, turning to coat. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate 1 hour. Arrange marinated fillets on microwave-safe roasting rack. Sprinkle each lightly with paprika. Microwave 5 to 7 minutes, or until fish flakes easily, rotating dish ¼ turn every 3 minutes.

BEEF SUKIYAKI STRIPS

1 pound frozen sirloin steak
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
1 large clove garlic, minced
1 (8-ounce) can bamboo shoots, drained
1 (8-ounce) can sliced water chestnuts
6 ounces fresh mung bean sprouts
6 ounces fresh mushrooms, sliced
1 medium onion, chopped
3 stalks celery, sliced diagonally into ¼-inch strips
¼ cup water
¼ cup soy sauce
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 beef bouillon cube or 1 teaspoon beef bouillon granules
¼ teaspoon powdered dry ginger

Yields 4 servings.
Preparation time: 15 minutes.
Defrosting time: 4 ¼ to 6 ¼ minutes.

Cooking time: 11 to 14 minutes (plus 3 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: DEFROST (30 percent power); HIGH (100 percent power).

Microwave steak at DEFROST setting 4 ¼ to 6 ¼ minutes, turning over halfway through defrost time, until almost thawed. While still partially frozen, slice steak diagonally across grain into very thin strips. Combine beef strips, oil and garlic in 2-quart microwave-safe casserole.

Microwave at HIGH setting 5 to 6 minutes, stirring halfway through cooking time, until meat is no longer pink. Add bamboo shoots, water chestnuts, bean sprouts, mushrooms, onion and celery; stir and set aside.

Combine water, soy sauce, cornstarch, bouillon, sugar and ginger in 1 cup measure. Microwave at HIGH setting 1 minute, or until slightly thickened. Stir and pour over con-

tents of casserole. Microwave on HIGH setting 1 minute, or until slightly thickened. Stir and pour over contents of casserole. Microwave on HIGH setting 5 to 7 minutes, stirring every 3 minutes. Let stand, covered, 3 minutes before serving over hot cooked rice.

ZESTY SPAGHETTI SAUCE

1 pound lean ground beef
1 medium onion, chopped
¼ medium bell pepper, chopped
1 stalk celery, with leaves, finely chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1 (16-ounce) can tomatoes, chopped
1 (6-ounce) can tomato paste
¼ cup dry red wine
¼ teaspoon each ground oregano and dried crumbled basil leaves
1 small bay leaf
¼ teaspoon sugar
¼ teaspoon each salt and pepper
Grated Parmesan cheese
Yields 6 servings.
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.

Defrosting time: 5 to 8 minutes (plus 5 minutes standing time).

Cooking time: 23 to 37 minutes.
Oven setting: DEFROST (30 percent power); HIGH (100 percent power); MEDIUM (50 percent power).

To defrost beef, remove packaging and place on microwave-safe plate. Cover with waxed paper and microwave at DEFROST setting 5 to 8 minutes. Check meat frequently, using fork to scrape off and remove cooked portions. Let stand about 5 minutes to defrost completely.

Crumble thawed beef into 2-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover and microwave at HIGH setting 4 to 7 minutes, or until meat is no longer pink, stirring several times to break up. Stir in onion, bell pepper, celery and garlic. Cover and microwave 4 to 5 minutes at HIGH setting, or until vegetables are just tender, stirring once.

Stir in all remaining ingredients except Parmesan cheese. Cover and microwave at MEDIUM setting 15 to 25 minutes longer, stirring occasionally, until flavors are blended and sauce is thickened. Serve over hot cooked pasta and garnish with grated Parmesan cheese.

Tortilla soup makes a flavorful change

For a south-of-the-border treat, try these prize-winning recipes from the Pace Picante Sauce Young Cooks Recipe Contest. The teenager-only search for original recipes drew an enthusiastic response. West Texas Tortilla Soup, created by 17-year-old D'Lynn Masur of Texas, is richly flavored with a chunky, hearty texture. This savory soup takes only 10 minutes to prepare for a 30-minute siesta-like simmer.

WEST TEXAS TORTILLA SOUP

2 cloves garlic, minced
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 teaspoons ground cumin
2 cans (about 14 ounces each) chicken broth
2 cans (14½ ounces each) stewed tomatoes, undrained, coarsely chopped
1 cup Pace Picante Sauce
¼ cup coarsely chopped cilantro
8 ounces provolone or Monterey jack cheese, cut into ¼-inch cubes
4 corn tortillas, cut into 2 x ¼-inch strips

Cook garlic in butter in large saucepan or Dutch oven 2 minutes. Add cumin; cook and stir 1 minute. Add broth, tomatoes and picante sauce; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 30 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in cilantro. Place ¼ cup of the cheese in bottom of each

of 8 soup bowls. Ladle 1 cup soup over cheese; top with tortilla strips. Make 8 servings, about 8 cups soup.

PICANTE HERB CHEESE BREAD

1½ cups all-purpose flour
¼ cup quick or old fashion oats, uncooked
¼ cup (ounces) shredded mozzarella or monterey jack cheese
¼ cup (1 ounce) grated romano or parmesan cheese
1 tablespoon sugar
1 tablespoon baking powder
1½ teaspoons basil leaves, crushed
1½ teaspoons oregano leaves, crushed
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon garlic powder
¾ cup Pace Picante Sauce
¼ cup vegetable oil
2 eggs, beaten

In large bowl, combine all ingredients except picante sauce, oil and eggs; mix well. Add picante sauce, oil and eggs; mix just until dry ingredients are moistened. Spread into greased 8 x 4-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. 50 to 55 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. MEYER STRAWBERRY FARM PIE

1 1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons cornstarch
pinch salt
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 1/2 cup water
1 3-ounce package of strawberry gelatin
4 cups fresh strawberries
whipped cream
cooked 9-inch pie shell

Boil sugar, cornstarch, salt, lemon juice and water together until clear. Remove from heat. Add package of strawberry gelatin. Stir until dissolved. Cool. Place 4 cups of fresh strawberries in cooked pie shell. Pour mixture slowly over berries. Chill until firm. Top with whipped cream.

Optional: Spread 3 ounces softened cream cheese on bottom of cooked pie shell before putting in berries.

STRAWBERRY APPLESAUCE BREAD

3 cups applesauce
1 cup coarsely pureed strawberries
5 jumbo eggs
5 1/2 cups cake flour
1 3/4 cups raisins
1/4 cup melted butter
3 cups granulated sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon plus 1 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
3/4 cup chopped pecans
1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon baking powder
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine all ingredients in the bowl of an electric mixer and stir with paddle —

or by hand — just until all ingredients are combined thoroughly. Do not overmix.

Fill three loaf pans a little over half full. Bake in preheated oven about 20 minutes, then quickly rotate pans in the oven to ensure even cooking. Bake another 20 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Remove pans from the oven and transfer to a baking rack to cool. Turn loaves out of pans after 5 minutes, and continue cooling right side up. These freeze very well if wrapped tightly as soon as they are cold. (Makes three 9-by-5 inch loaves)

PEPPER-BERRY FOOL

2 pints strawberries
2 cups lemon yogurt
1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
1/2 cup heavy whipping cream, whipped until stiff
Reserve four of the prettiest strawberries for garnish. Hull and chop the remaining berries. In a medium bowl, use fork to thoroughly crush one cup of the berries. Stir in yogurt and pepper. Fold in whipped cream and remaining chopped berries. Spoon into four stemmed glasses; garnish each serving with a whole strawberry. Cover and refrigerate for at least three hours.

FRESH BERRY PIE

5-6 cups fresh blueberries, blackberries or strawberries, picked over
1 cup sugar
3 tablespoons cornstarch
2-3 drops food coloring (optional)

1 (9-inch) conventionally baked pie crust

Whipped cream
Place 2-3 cups berries in a food processor and puree. Transfer to 2-quart bowl, add sugar to taste and cornstarch, stir, and microwave on high 2-3 minutes, or until mixture reaches a boil. Stir and microwave on 70 percent power 5-7 minutes, or until thickened, stirring several times. Stir in food coloring, if desired. Cool fruit glaze to room temperature.

If using strawberries, halve or quarter remaining ones, if large. Spread about 1 cup glaze on bottom of pie crust and arrange remaining berries in shell. Spread remaining glaze over berries. Garnish generously with whipped cream. Serves 6-8.

STRAWBERRIES ROMANOFF

1 quart fresh strawberries
3 tablespoons superfine sugar
2 large oranges
2 tablespoons Grand Marnier
2 tablespoons Cognac (optional)

Remove the stems from the strawberries and rinse them quickly under cold running water. Do not let them soak in a bowl of water or they will become waterlogged and tasteless. Dry the berries on paper towels, arrange them in a serving dish, and sprinkle them with the sugar.

Peel the oranges and cut between the membranes to remove the orange segments. Add the orange segments to the strawberries; squeeze the orange juice remaining in the pulp over the berries. Add the liqueurs, toss lightly, and serve while chilled. (serves 4).

underripeness. Underripe berries don't taste as sweet.

The Meyers recommend wearing long-sleeved shirts when picking, as the berry plants may irritate your arms. It's also a good idea to wear a hat for protection from the sun. To

protect yourself from back soreness, crouch when you're picking berries instead of bending over.

Once you've got the berries home, resist the temptation to wash them right away. It will only make them spoil faster. Store them in the refrigerator, and only wash the ones

you use.

Tim said the Meyer family's favorite way of eating berries is simply sliced over ice cream. But he's also a big fan of the strawberry pie recipe the farm hands out for free. It's included here, along with some other ideas for your berry treasure.

Fire the coals before the fireworks

No doubt about it, fireworks are the centerpiece of any Fourth of July celebration.

The day can be spent picnicking, playing ball, going to the movies or just plain lolling about. Come sundown, however, excitement runs high awaiting the starry night.

People lucky enough to have a good vantage point for fireworks watching usually invite friends to come share the great view. Other groups gather together and go right down to where the action is, or to some other panoramic seat.

In most communities, the fireworks explode around 9 o'clock, when the sky is an appropriately dark background for the many-colored sparkling configurations. So whatever the viewing plan of the evening, food and beverage are needed to fill in the waiting time.

There are several ways to plan the evening, but a very logical strategy is to split the food service. Serve the main part of the meal before the fireworks, and save dessert for later. There is nothing to do after the fireworks, but everyone is still excited and in a party mood. How sweet then to finish off the evening with a dessert buffet.

Barbecue grills are major to Independence Day celebrations. Some get stoked early in the morning for breakfast bacon, continue on to lunchtime hamburgers or hot dogs, and get a real work-out with evening steaks, chickens, kebobs — both meat and fish.

If you have invited very good friends, you can ask them to bring the food of their choice to be grilled. You prepare the fire bed in advance, and all the grill chefs have to decide is how well done they like their food and start cooking accordingly. The host and hostess provide the garnishes, side dishes and beverages. But it must be emphasized, only very good friends receive such an invitation.

A more usual invitation is for a community supper. The hosts plan the meal and provide the steaks, filets or chops to be grilled. They then assign particular all-American dishes to the guests: clam chowder, potato salad, coleslaw, baked beans, biscuits or corn prepared for the grill.

The corn is easily done. Pull down the husks of the ears of corn, being careful not to detach them. Remove all of the corn silk, replace the husks, and tie with string in two or three places to keep the corn packages compact.

About 15 minutes before grilling the corn, soak in cold water to prevent the husks and string from catching fire. Grill the corn for about 15 minutes, turning with tongs occasionally. A bit of butter, a sprinkling of salt and pepper, and jubilation. Now turn attention to the eagerly awaited dessert buffet.

The centerpiece could be the brilliantly colorful Summer Berry Bowl from Lisa Yockelson's delightful new book "Fruit Desserts" (HarperCollins, \$14.95). This refreshing dessert is a snap to do since no cooking is involved. Its restrained flavor-

ing highlights the succulence of the berries, now at their peak.

The guest who receives this assignment and recipe will thank you forever.

Other celebrants can bring sugar cookies, angel food cake, pound cake or any favorite cake. Place the multicolored Summer Berry Bowl as the centerpiece, surround it with the other sweets and, for once, everyone will be anxious for the fireworks to conclude.

SUMMER BERRY BOWL

1/4 cup honey, or to taste (according to sweetness of berries)
1 cup white grape juice
1/2 cup apricot nectar or apple juice
2 cups cherries, stemmed and pitted
2 cups blueberries, picked over
1 1/2 cups red or golden raspberries, picked over
1 1/2 cups black raspberries, picked over
1 cup blackberries, picked over
1 cup small strawberries, hulled

Yields 6 servings.
Whisk honey, grape juice and apricot nectar in small mixing bowl. Place cherries and all berries in large serving bowl. Pour honey-nectar mixture over fruits and toss carefully.
Spoon fruits into bowls and serve.

Thanks from all of us, Laura. For being patient when it's been hard to, for being a wonderful teacher, for caring the way that you do. You've been a great role model.

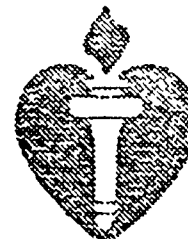

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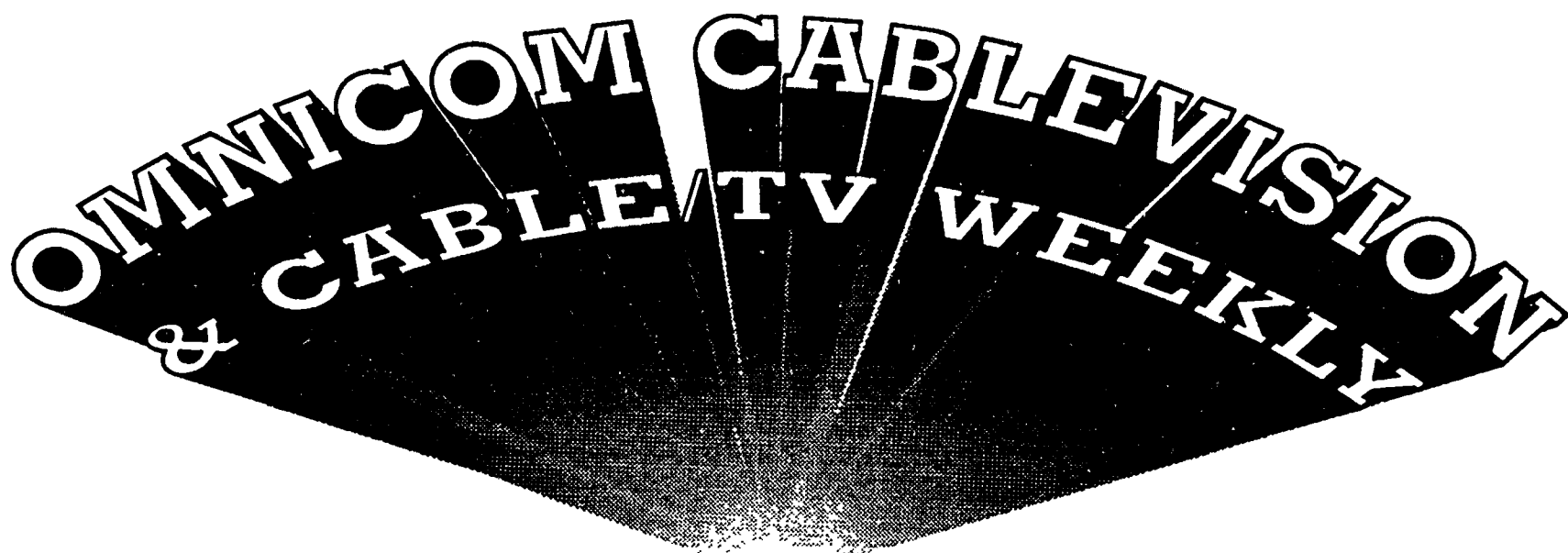

'Twin Peaks' with a sense of humor

Lynch-Frost comedy lights up Saturday night

There hasn't been a really good reason to stay home and watch television on Saturday night since the mid-'70s, when "All in the Family," "Mary Tyler Moore" and "Bob Newhart" reigned on CBS. The NBC lineup has been strong in recent years, but without a must-see hit. In recessionary times, a comedy with cachet could bring a chic sheen to the necessity of staying home on date night.

Enter "On the Air," the first comedy from David Lynch and Mark Frost, who were probably laughing at us in "Twin Peaks" and have decided to let us in on the jokes. "On the Air" debuted June 20 on ABC with one of the funniest pilots in recent memory.

Set in 1957 New York on the soundstage of a live, weekly variety show, "On the Air" sounds rather like a knock-off of Richard Benjamin's "My Favorite Year," which starred Peter O'Toole and Mark Linn-Baker, but it quickly

develops a personality of its own. "On the Air" pokes fun at television's so-called Golden Age by showing how little has changed in 35 years: Audiences still watch most anything that moves, sponsors still have undue influence and it's anybody's guess what makes a hit.

The ensemble cast features Ian Buchanan ("Twin Peaks") as fading matinee idol Lester Guy, the intended star of the Zoblotnick Broadcasting Corporation's "Lester Guy Show"; Miguel Ferrer as ZBC executive Bud Budwaller; David L. Lander (remember Squiggy?) as German-born director Vladja Gochktch (pronounced just like it looks!); and Nancy Ferguson as Ruth Trueworthy, Gochktch's smiling translator and spin doctor.

Also starring are Tracey Walter (Joker's assistant Bob in "Batman") as visually challenged sound technician Blinky Watts; longtime character actor Marvin Kaplan ("Top Cat," "Alice") as Dwight McGonigle, a hand-wringing nebbish and the show's nominal producer; and newcomer Marla Jeanette Rubinoff as Guy's hopelessly dumb blonde co-star, Betty Hudson, whose

fragile innocence makes her America's TV sweetheart. And yes, there's a dwarf: Irwin Keyes plays stagehand Shorty.

Once or twice in each episode, there are glimpses of "Lester Guy" viewers, happily transfixed in their bathrobes, curlers and muscle T-shirts, enjoying the show no matter what. The apparent prisoners of dreary, meaningless lives, they leave one to wonder whether Lynch, Frost, et al. would want to claim any viewer who would willingly watch their show.

Among the pitfalls of any TV-industry spoof is the tendency for the jokes to become too inside. With a combination of physical comedy and insanity-by-any-standard, Lynch and Frost avoid this trap. Angelo Badalamenti, who scored "Twin Peaks," has composed a dreamy theme for "On the Air" that defies the bebop cliché and transports the viewer to a time and place that probably never existed. Though the comedic payoff of the pilot is not matched in subsequent episodes, this is a summer series to win the heart.





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

'Mad Math' doesn't compute

Here's a quick story problem: If an educational show has a cast of three, how many fashion outlets are necessary to provide them with one costume per episode? If your answer is one, you're a smart shopper. If you say three, you cherish individualism. But if the answer is 12, you have your priorities confused.

Fashion overkill (the credits list a dozen providers) is just one of the problems with *Mad Math*, a series airing Saturday mornings on The Learning Channel. In a rumpus-room setting, its three young characters, all alarmingly stereotyped, gather to eat and watch TV — a practice child experts discourage.

Geeky, bespectacled Geraldo, who obviously reads his lines from cue cards, uses his remote control to punch up video math lessons for dumb jock Mike, while Geraldo's big sister Bianca flirts with their guest. (It doesn't take a feminist to disapprove of Bianca's role as bimbo-in-the-making.)

The video segments, often introduced with a rude "Now get this!," are technically plain, but often confusing in their arrangement. Rather than teaching concepts, *Mad Math* offers problem-solving tricks that will only perpetuate the crippling syndrome of knowing it for the test and forgetting it a week later.

For a truly educational and lively math series, try *Square One TV* on PBS.

PBS' 'Lost Language' speaks with grace

Author Leavitt pleased with uncompromising film

When David Leavitt's first novel, *The Lost Language of Cranes*, was published in 1986, the book received the kind of praise writers dream about. One critic stated, "Leavitt possesses a direct line to the heart."

Now, *Great Performances* brings Leavitt's compelling story to the screen, debuting Wednesday, June 24, on most PBS stations.

The story concerns Philip, a young Londoner who has long concealed the fact that he is gay from his conservative parents, Rose and Owen. When he confronts them with the truth, his mother is upset and concerned about her son's future.

His father's reaction, however, is far more intense, for it makes inevitable the very thing he has so long sought to avoid: the admission of his own homosexuality.

Brian Cox (*Manhunter*, A&E's recent *Acting in Tragedy*) is moving as Owen, a middle-aged man facing himself for the first time. Eileen Atkins is equally

effective as Rose, whose entire world seems in flux. Angus McFadyen is engaging, if a bit mild, as Philip.

The strong supporting cast includes Corey Parker (*thirtysomething*) as Elliot, the rich American with whom Philip is involved, and film director John Schlesinger (*Midnight Cowboy*) as Derek, an eccentric children's author. Rene Auberjonois plays Geoffrey, Derek's companion.

Leavitt says he's "quite happy" with the film and scriptwriter Sean Mathias' adaptation, which relocates the action from New York to London. "The spirit of the book is there," Leavitt adds.

Director Nigel Finch has taken an unflinching approach to the subject matter, and some viewers may be put off by this. That's fine with Leavitt, who says he creates his sensitive, densely woven stories for an open-minded audience.

"I write — and read," Leavitt says, "on the assumption that other people's lives are very interesting ... especially lives different from mine."

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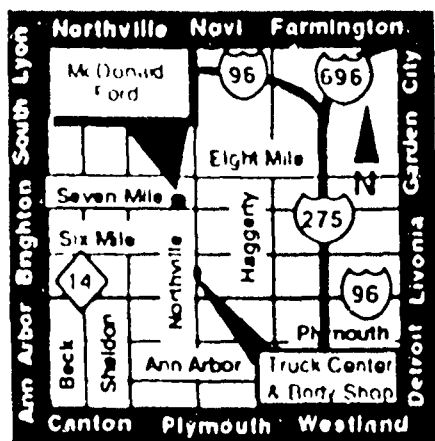
