Developers spring for golf fees

The links were alive with township officials on June 18 during a \$90-per-person Northville Chamber of Commerce golf outing at Fox Hills Country Club in Plymouth.

But taxpayers needn't worry. They weren't charged for golf, food, and drink consumed by a half-dozen officials and employees.

Local developers picked up the tab. Two developers currently building in Northville Township purchased tickets totaling \$450 for Township Supervisor Betty Lennox; her husband, Richard Lennox; Trustee James Nowka. Township Manager Richard Henningsen, and Chief Building Official Michael Kruszewski.

Henningsen actually split his gratis ticket and golf with Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen.

The tickets were purchased for township officials by Pulte Homes of Michigan, developer of Country Club Village on Six Mile and Haggerty, and by Beck Road Development, builders of Blue Heron Pointe on Beck Road.

The township's current and proposed ethics policies address the issue of gift offers to township officials. Both ethics policies offer passages forbidding some gifts, but other portions include exemptions to the rule.

Betty Lennox defended the gifts and said the township's building department arranged the deal.

"Mick (Kruszewski) got some tickets for us," she

said. "I think if (developers) are appreciative of what the township employees, the township department heads, are doing for them, it's a nice way of saying thank you."

Lennox at first denied knowledge that Pulte Homes of Michigan purchased the tickets, but later said she and Kruszewski "talked about it and decided it was acceptable."

Lennox said no strings were attached to the gifts and that perks offered by developers would not influence township decisions on developments.

"If that ever came to light, heads would fall," she said.

The golf outing was beneficial for the township because of "contacts" officials established on the course, Lennox said. Asked why she would not use her office holder expense fund (money gathered through political fundraisers) to pay for the golf outing, Lennox said: "What I've raised is not enough to pay for the expenses I incur in this position."

"I guess you have to use your own moral judgment," she added. "That's the first thing I've done in a long time that someone has paid for."

Kruszewski did not return a reporter's call Friday, nor did Pulte's Robert Halso. Rick Camann, a local Pulte representative, said he did not know about the arrangement.

"Boy, I don't know anything about it," he said. "I'd love to help you."

Asked if township officials talked to him about picking up the ticket costs, Camann said, "nobody approached me personally."

Nowka said he knew developers paid for the tickets, but did not question the arrangement.

"I don't have any problems with that, no," he said. "I guess (Pulte) decided they wanted to contribute to the Chamber of Commerce and that was how they did it."

The township's current ethics policy includes a section on the issue of gifts to public officials. The policy states: "A public officer, contractor, or employee shall not solicit or accept a gift or loan of money, goods, services, or other thing of value from persons receiving benefits from the township or performing services under contract to the township or otherwise in a position to benefit from public officer, employee, or contractor action."

"Gifts or loans for purposes of this subdivision do not include entertainment or commodities which conclude or can be consumed within a 24-hour period."

The proposed new policy includes the same passage, but then lists four exceptions in which officials may accept gifts. One of the exceptions states that the township can accept:

"Admission to events, regardless of value, to which they are invited in their official, representative capacity for the township, provided this is made a matter of public record at a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees. A record of such disclosure will be maintained by the township clerk."

The board held a special meeting the evening of the golf outing but did not mention the free tickets. The township's proposed ethics policy currently is under review by Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk, the township's legal consultants.

School aid bill rips Northville

If the latest version of the state school aid bill passes through the House on Tuesday, out-of-formula districts like Northville could share in a \$60-million loss of state money next year.

A legislative conference committee's report on the school aid bill released and passed by a mere two votes in the Senate (20-18) Thursday called for \$60 million in cutbacks to out-of-formula districts, along with plans to increase state "recapturing" of aid money and to further decrease

the state's portion of school employees' Social Security payments.

Rick Simonson, assistant superintendent for the Oakland Intermediate Schools, said the losses outlined in the committee's report are insurmountable to out-of-formula districts.

"The four senators in Oakland County opposed it because it increases the Robin Hood scheme and tampers with the state's contributions to school employees' Social Security," he said Friday.

Simonson said early estimates

Meeting will hit dusty roads

County and township officials will cross the dusty paths of residents tomorrow morning (June 30) in a meeting that could clarify the area's gravel roads picture.

Officials representing the county's roads and health departments will be on hand to mull increasing citizen complaints over the condition of the township's 13.2 miles of gravel roads.

Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen and township Supervisor Betty Lennox also will sit in on the 8 a.m. session at township hall.

Selected residents from four southeastern township gravel roads have been invited to attend. The roads in question are: Fry, Marilyn, Maxwell, and Park Lane.

Those roads are under the magnifying glass because "they're the most critical," township Manager Richard Henningsen said.

Reasons for concern include outraged residents who continue to chastise officials for cutting dust control spending from the township budget. Officials and residents will use the meeting to research short- and long-term remedies to the dust problems.

But the township faces other problems, as well.

The Wayne County Department of Health on June 19 issued the township two citations for violating the county air pollution control ordinance.

The citations were based on May 21 inspections of Maxwell and Fry roads and charge the township with causing or permitting "the emission of fugitive dust in such a quantity that it caused unreasonable interference with the comfortable enjoyment of property," according to the violation notices.

The township began road treatments last week, after the township board voted to pay for one application of calcium chloride. The decision to spray township roads should satisfy the county health department's concerns, Henningsen said.

Rain dampened plans to cover the entire township last week, said Randy Tillman, township Water and Sewer Department foreman and acting supervisor.

Tillman said the township sprayed about 7,500 gallons of treatment, or slightly less than a quarter of the application needed for township roads.

Areas sprayed included Portis, Meadowbrook and Pierson, Tillman said. The remaining roads are scheduled for spraying this week, depending on the weather, he said.

Superintendent gets high marks

School board members said after just nine months on the job, Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski is making the grade.

Just shy of completing his first year on the job, Rezmierski scored the equivalent of all As and Bs on his district report card graded by school board members last week.

With the glowing review came a one-year extension of his contract, but no salary increase. Rezmierski,

like all of the other district's cabinet members, agreed to take a pay freeze in response to the district's bleak financial picture. Forfeiting a raise, his salary will remain at the current rate of \$94,538.

The two-part evaluation form asked board members to grade Rezmierski on his performance as the district's chief executive officer and rate the district's performance overall.

On part one of the evaluation form,

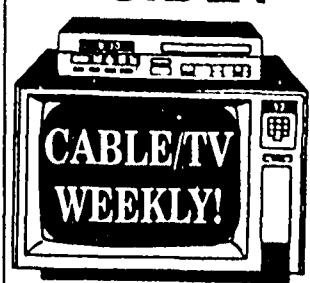

School aid bill increases negative local impact

suggest that under this legislation, Northville stands to lose about \$530,000 in Social Security and \$1,864,000 in recapture. This year the district lost \$1.7 million to recapture. To find the percentage difference between what the district paid this year and what it will pay next year in Social Security payments is a tad more confusing, and district Business Manager John Street said he won't be able to factor it out until all the figures are conclusive.

Superintendent Leonard Re-

zmierski said at first glance the figures suggest the losses might be a hair more than what the district had anticipated.

"It is as bad as we thought, but under the new formula it appears worse," Rezmierski said. "Unfortunately it is what we anticipated, but on first impression looks like slightly more than what we thought."

Rezmierski said he expects to delve into the impact the bill will have on state districts during a daylong meeting on Monday with other school superintendents.

Despite the bad news, Rezmierski

said he was glad to hear that the two local senators, with whom he had talked, voted against the bill.

"We are pleased that Senator Gagne and Senator Faxon voted against it. (The vote) was 20-18; that's awfully close, but no cigar."

Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills — whose district includes part of Northville, and who was a member of the conference committee charged with revising earlier versions of the House and Senate school aid bills — said its impact on local districts would be devastating.

"It's terrible," Faxon said Friday.

"The committee increased recapture by \$10 million and added FICA (payments) to out-of-formula districts. It is devastating to Oakland County schools. They're going to lose millions of dollars."

Faxon said out-of-formula districts aren't the only ones feeling a financial pinch from the state as a result of the pending school bill.

"It's terrible. Every district will lose — even the in-formula ones," he said. "Ferndale schools, an in-formula district, will lose about 20 percent of their whole budget."

The proposed school aid bill also calls for the elimination of adult education funding while paying for Gov. John Engler's mandated extended school year programs and foreign language incentives.

The bill shouldn't fail for lack of support, Faxon said. Since it contains many of the governor's own initiatives, he expects the bill to become law.

"He'll sign it because this is what he wanted," an angry Faxon said. "It (the bill) keeps in some of the governor's initiatives like the extended

school year for over \$6 million and the foreign language program for \$5 million.

"He's called himself the 'education governor,' but he's done more damage to education than any other governor."

"I think this is another example of the enormous breaking of faith in government on the part of the people of Oakland County by forcing millions of dollars of expenses on their budgets. It makes their situation worse out there and it is an incredible insensitivity (toward) the educators."

Superintendent earns good grades in board's evaluation

Rezmierski received a unanimous affirmation by the collective board members. They were asked to respond yes or no to a host of questions that evaluated his performance. Included were questions that grazed the surface of his relationship with the board, how well he communicated and kept board members abreast of district developments, and whether he supported board policies and administrative recommendations.

"He received a yes," said board Vice President Glenna Davis. "A resounding yes from all of us."

Part two asked board members to

rate Rezmierski's performance in improving district operations and its program. Community relations, financial obligations, safety and improving instruction were all areas in the second part of the annual review. Individual areas were rated on a scale of one to five, with five being the highest rating.

"We gave him five and fives in all of those areas," Davis said after reporting the scores of the review at Monday night's board meeting.

"There were many comments from board members in support of the job he's done," Davis said.

Rezmierski was hired by the district last August to fill the superintendent's job left open by the retire-

ment of former Superintendent George Bell. Prior to his promotion, Rezmierski occupied the executive director's chair in the district's special education department.

Davis said Rezmierski has achieved the goals set for the 1991-92 school year set forth in the district's Strategic Plan.

"We wanted him to pass a renewal and he did," Davis said. "We didn't get the increase, but the board thought he's done a fine job."

"He's been a leader at the state, reaching out to the contacts he's made in Lansing and in Washington for us. You've done a fine job and we are proud of you."

NEW LAW AFFECTS REFRIGERATOR DISPOSAL: Northville residents should be aware that effective July 1, 1992, it will be unlawful to dispose of any appliances that contain refrigerants. Refrigerators and air conditioners are included in this prohibition and can no longer be accepted for trash disposal unless the refrigerant is removed by a certified technician and the appliance is labeled to indicate that the removal has been performed.

Effective July 1, Painter & Ruthenburg, the community solid waste hauler, will only pick up and dispose of appliances that have had the refrigerants removed and are so labeled.

The council's action follows increased interest by private developers in the 13.7-acre property on either side of Griswold north of Main, since Ford dropped its asking price from \$2.5 million to \$1.75 million.

Since the price dropped in March, the automotive company has reportedly received more than 100 inquiries about the plant, five to six of which are considered serious.

The council wants to determine if there is public interest in city acquisition of the plant. Possible financing methods include a general obligation bond requiring a referendum vote, an installment purchase, or private acquisition with the city's agreement to purchase or lease part or all of the property later on.

REGISTRATION DEADLINE APPROACHES: Monday, July 6 is the deadline for registering to vote for the Aug. 4 primary election. Persons who want to register to vote may do so up until the close of business July 6 at any Secretary of State branch office or at their county, city or township clerk's office.

The Department of State's Bureau of Elections notes the July 6 deadline comes on the heels of the Fourth of July holiday weekend. Most government offices will be closed Friday, July 3, in observance of the holiday, but will reopen for business on Monday, July 6.

U.S. Citizens 17 years of age who will be 18 on or before Aug. 4 are eligible to register for the primary election.

As of March there were 5,793,029 registered voters in Michigan. This is 84.7 percent of Michigan's voting age population of 6,835,532.

Persons with questions regarding voter registration should contact their local clerk: Northville Township, 348-5800; City of Northville, 349-1700.

Developer gets an extension

The Selective Group, developer of St. Lawrence Estates, has been given more time to comply with two of three demands in a city administrative order.

The developer has agreed to comply with the third demand.

Selective had been charged April 24 with failing to show that St. Lawrence's roads and streetlights were properly installed, and failing to install sidewalks shown on the city-approved site plans.

The Farmington Hills-based developer was ordered to show, by May 15, that the specified number and type of streetlights were installed, or provide the city with a schedule to install them.

By June 2, Selective was required to submit a schedule for sidewalk installation or seek a site plan modification request if the developer and the St. Lawrence Homeowners Association agreed not to install them.

By June 19, Selective had to show that its roads comply with the construction detail in the approved site plans.

The city's administrative order stemmed from a long-simmering dispute between Selective and St.

Lawrence homeowners. Led by Homeowners Association President Jim Steckel, several homeowners had complained that the roads, streetlights and sidewalks were not installed to city-approved specifications.

Some also complained of construction defects inside their homes.

The city released the administrative order after an April 10 show-cause hearing at city hall, at which Selective attorney Dean Gould argued that the roads may meet the city's site plan specifications. Gould argued that even if they did not, they were equivalent in strength to what was specified.

Both Selective and city engineers agreed that more testing was needed to determine the roads' actual strength. Those tests were performed in May.

Selective was recently granted an extension until July 3 to show compliance with the road and sidewalk specifications, and the firm reached an agreement with the city over the streetlights, said City Building Inspector Joe Attard.

"They have performed their (road) testing but they have requested an extension so they can look into the results much more clearly," Attard said.

"They are going to be installing them (street-

lights)," he said.

All the lights have been installed in Phase I of the two-phase project, he said, while few have been installed in Phase II where construction continues.

"It's just a matter of waiting until all the truck traffic is done not to disrupt them, and all the landscaping is done," he said.

Selective and the homeowners association have also agreed to a compromise on the sidewalk dispute, said Selective President Mike Horowitz.

"The essence of the agreement is they asked us not to install the sidewalks and we in turn agreed to provide them the money it would have cost to put the sidewalks in, for them to use in other capital improvements in the complex," Horowitz said.

That agreement was narrowly approved by the homeowners, said Steckel. "The thing had passed by two votes, basically."

Steckel said the homeowners were given the choice between requiring Selective to install sidewalks, accepting Selective's cash settlement instead, or holding out for a larger settlement. Few people voted for the sidewalks, he said.

Steckel would not discuss the amount of the cash settlement.

Two rezonings in city move ahead

Parcels of land on Randolph and Rayson were recommended for rezoning to second-density residential (R-2) recently, to bring them more closely in line with the city's Master Plan.

The planning commission on June 16 agreed to recommend rezoning the parcels from third-density (R-3) residential, which would have allowed apartment buildings.

The recommendation now goes to the city council.

The proposed rezoning includes four plots of land on the west end of Randolph just east of Northville Green apartments, and seven parcels on the south side of Rayson west of Hutton.

The new zoning would prohibit multi-unit apartments but allow duplexes. Several homeowners had argued at a commission public workshop against rezoning the parcels to first-density residential, R-1B, be-

cause it would prohibit new duplexes and keep property owners with existing duplexes from replacing them if they were destroyed.

The homeowners had no objection to going from an R-3 to an R-2 designation.

The move is a partial success for the planning commission, which had sought to rezone the parcels to first-density status. The commission is still pushing to rezone a similar parcel on Cady Street, which is the sole

R-3 plot in that area.

That move is being opposed by the homeowner, Mrs. George Kohs, who renewed her protest against it at the commission's June 16 meeting.

"You want to make that a single dwelling?" she asked. "That's stupid, just plain stupid."

Kohs argued that the proximity of her property to Northville Public School facilities made it unfit for single-family development, and the rezoning would decrease its value.

Man admits harassing local woman over phone

A 60-year-old Southfield man turned himself in to city police June 25, for threatening and harassing a Northville woman over the phone.

The woman told police that the man had been harassing her because she would not give in to his sexual advances. The man had called the woman's home several times in April and left obscene and threatening messages on her answering machine.

The man threatened to have the woman investigated, get her fired from her job, and tell her ex-husband that she was an unfit mother. The former couple is involved in a child custody case.

The woman called city police April 26, and the man phoned the home while a police officer was present. The officer identified himself to the man, who did not believe he was an officer. The case now goes to 35th District Court.

WOMAN STRUCK WITH BOTTLE: A woman standing outside a street sweeper at Sheldon Road and Edward Hines Drive June 22 was reportedly struck by a glass bottle.

The woman told city police she was hit in the back of the head at 11 p.m.

while securing a steel door on the side of the street sweeper. The incident left a lump, she said. Her son, who was driving the sweeper, gave chase to a white Pontiac 6000 that was driving by the vehicle at the time. He followed the car to Novi Road near Allen Drive before losing sight of it.

The car's license plate was traced to a Northville family's home, and the car owner's 17-year-old son was questioned about the incident. He admitted driving by the sweeper but denied throwing a bottle out the window. He told police his was one of several vehicles in the area at the time, but the victim and her son said the Pontiac was the only vehicle around. The bottle could not be located.

THIEVES NABBED AT BIKE STORE: Employees at Town & Country Cyclery, 148 N. Center St., foiled two attempted thefts last week. A 16-year-old Canton boy caught an employee's attention the evening of June 23 while trying to smuggle out a \$45 skateboard deck tucked inside his pants.

According to the city police report, "It was the way the subject was walking that caught (the employee's) attention. The suspect was sort of shuffling his feet and as he came closer,

(the employee) heard an unusual clacking noise from the suspect's pants."

The boy took the deck out of his pants once he got out of the store, and showed it to friends on the sidewalk. The employee told him to bring it back into the store and he did. He said, and his friends agreed, that he took the deck on a bet and planned to return it. He was arrested by city police anyway, and released to his mother. The case was turned over to Wayne County Juvenile Court.

A Town & Country employee saw a 17-year-old Northville boy put a pair of \$30 cycling gloves into his pocket and walk out of the store the morning of June 24. The employee apprehended the suspect outside the store and brought him back in, and called city police. The boy was subsequently released to his mother.

MICHIGAN BELL VAN ROBBERED: Thieves reportedly stole a \$1,850 computer and other items from a van parked at Michigan Bell's 1045 N. Center St. facility just before 5 a.m. June 24.

A neighbor told city police he heard two or more men talking near the vans, scaling a fence and driving off. One van's window was subse-

quently found smashed and its door unlocked.

The computer, a grey Itron Tele-tech, is used by phone company workers to check phone lines. Its charger was left behind, rendering it useless, according to a Bell official.

Other items stolen included an AC/DC power supply, first aid kit and computer entry card.

Medical first response an important function

Dave had been on the Fire Department for about two years. He had put in his time and had been certified as a Fire Fighter II by the State, and was confident in his abilities as a fire fighter. But things were about to change. Dave had finished his Emergency Medical Technician training, and had just been notified that he passed the state exam. Beginning today, Dave would also start responding on emergency medical calls.

In our community the fire department provides "first response" emergency medical service. In that role, the fire department works together with private ambulance companies who usually transport patients to the hospital. Because the ambulance companies serve many different communities, there is often a delay in response to the scene. For this reason, medically trained personnel from the fire department respond to begin patient care, and

then assist the ambulance personnel in preparing the patient for transport.

Dave was sitting in the living room. The TV was on, but his mind was occupied with going over all of the things he had learned to become an EMT. Just as he was wondering how he could remember all that he had learned, his thoughts were interrupted by the alarm tone, dispatching the Fire Department to a call for a man who had fallen and who had a possible broken leg.

Arriving at the station, Dave climbed on the rescue truck with two experienced EMTs and immediately began to review his training on the care of skeletal injuries. The dispatcher advised the ambulance was coming from about 10 miles away, so Dave and his partners knew they would be first to the scene.

As the truck pulled up to the address given, a small crowd of neighbors had gathered around the patient, who was lying on the sidewalk in obvious pain. The senior EMT on the crew talked to the patient to obtain informa-

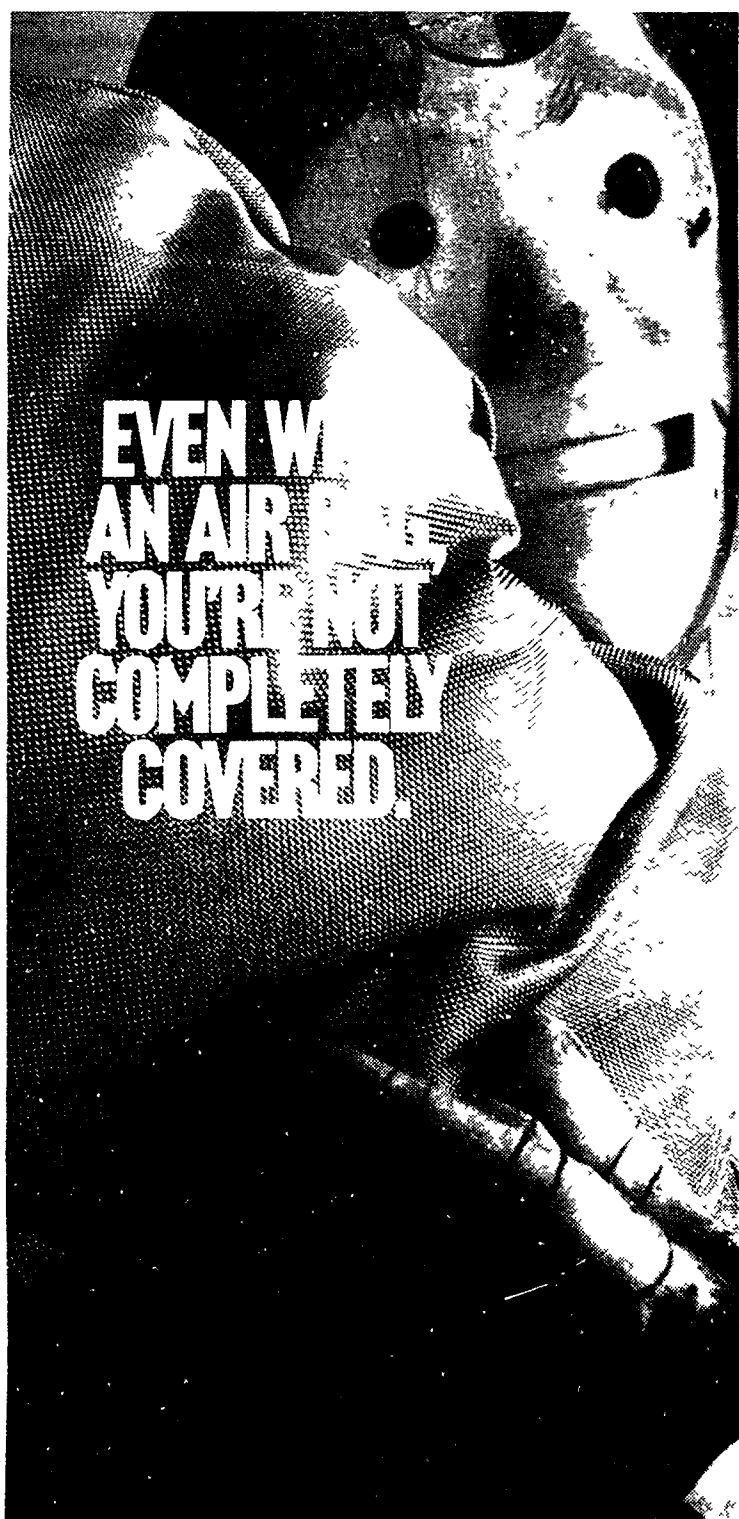
tion about what had happened, and to begin assessment of the patient, while Dave and the other EMT examined the leg. There was an obvious deformity at the ankle, which Dave knew suggested a fracture of the distal tibia or fibula. Meanwhile, the patient was checked for other injuries.

The senior EMT learned that the patient had fallen from a ladder he was using to trim a tree, and that he may have hit his head in the fall as well. The patient was administered oxygen, and placed in a cervical collar. Dave helped splint the lower leg, and the patient was put on a backboard as further protection against possible spinal injury. A full set of vital signs were taken, and Dave got a chance to take his first blood pressure reading "in the field." Other pertinent information about the patient and his medical history was obtained, and as the ambulance rolled up to the scene Dave and the other members of his team transferred care of the patient to the paramedics,

along with a report of their findings. The patient was quickly loaded into the ambulance, and taken to a nearby hospital for treatment.

All in all, it had been a rather routine call. But Dave and his team had arrived promptly and provided quality care for the patient until the ambulance arrived. In the months to come, Dave's training would be tested in other areas, including cardiac defibrillation, CPR, dealing with medical emergencies involving strokes, serious trauma cases arising from auto accidents, and even assisting with childbirth. Not all of the patients would survive, and Dave would learn what it is like for someone working in the medical field to lose a patient. But from that very first run Dave also knew that, no matter what the outcome, he would always help to make a difference.

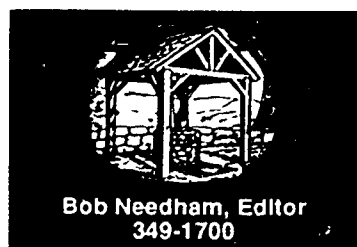

Roads get a bandage, but need more care

The Northville Township Board stopped the bleeding of its difficult gravel road situation recently by agreeing to apply a single treatment of dust-controlling chemical to the gravel roads within the township. But while the bandage will help for a while, the wound remains essentially untreated.

Not to be too cynical about things, but the decision to spring for one application of calcium chloride had the distinct flavor of election-year appeasement to a crowd of increasingly angry, and increasingly vocal, residents.

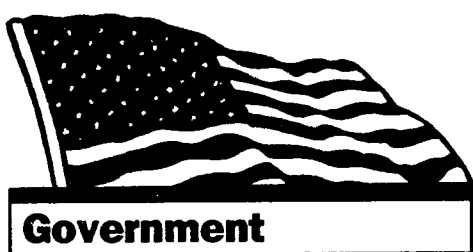
Just a couple of weeks ago, the township was denying the treatments because it didn't have the money, and officials were essentially uniform in saying the township had no responsibility to provide the service. That was before officials realized just how many people were upset about this issue, and just how upset they were.

There was no explanation offered for the quick turnaround at the last township board meeting; the money is still not in the budget, and its source is uncertain. And it's interesting that the only vote against the plan came from Treasurer Jack Hosmer, who isn't seeking reelection. (Interim Trustee Richard Ambler sided with the majority.)

We've got no particular quarrel with the actual decision to provide the road treatment; something most certainly needed to be done. But something will again need to be done in the near future, and that's the sticking point here.

The dust raised on gravel roads can become a tremendous problem for those people living nearby, and even for anyone simply driving on them. When the weather is dry, the dust can make it almost impossible to spend any time outside.

The road application solves that for the time being, but the underlying issues remain. And they'll return, all right: One

good rainstorm, and the benefits from the calcium chloride treatment will wash right away.

Governments — county and township — have in the past assumed the responsibility for treating the roads at least occasionally. What's been said lately is that the governments are no longer willing to do that as a matter of course. Residents, quite naturally, assumed that the service would continue as long as the roads remained unpaved.

By agreeing to fund a single treatment, we don't think the township board was agreeing to assume maintenance of the roads on a continuing basis. That means the overreaching question — who will take care of this later this year, and next year, and the next? — remains untouched.

Meetings with Wayne County officials might provide a solution; we're not holding our breath. Earlier we suggested a joint venture approach to ongoing maintenance, with the township and gravel road residents sharing expenses.

That still makes sense to us. But right now, the exact solution to the problem is not as important as finding a solution which is at least livable for all involved parties.

The situation this year has gotten completely out of hand, and it's up to the township, with cooperation from the residents, to make sure that doesn't happen again. So far, we're on a clear course for an exact repeat. And soon.

Airports, Kroger, and Ernie



A couple of weeks ago when I was playing chauffeur for the Motorsports Hall of Fame, I had to pick up a couple of guests who were arriving by private plane.

They were arriving in a twin-engine Piper and came in to Oakland-Pontiac Airport. In talking to them, I learned that they were unsure as to what airport to use when coming to Novi.

Oakland-Pontiac, with no real direct route to get from here to there, was a half-hour drive down the back roads. On the ride back, they asked, "Is there an airport that would have been more convenient for us to land at?"

I honestly couldn't think of a closer airport that would be big enough to handle their craft. Willow Run? Ann Arbor? Detroit City? Livingston County? All of those were surely big enough, but they were as far away (if not farther) than Oakland-Pontiac. Spencer Airport in Wixom and the New Hudson airstrip were too small, as was Mettetal in Canton Township.

This raised an issue in my mind. For non-commercial flyers, there is no really close airport to Northville or Novi.

When I was working at the *Livingston County Press* I often heard from business people how important Livingston County Airport was to them. And as Livingston County's business profile grew, the airport was expanded to accommodate

the traffic.

There has been a proposal to expand Wixom's Spencer Airport, but it faces several obstacles, including environmental concern over the nearby blue heron rookery and that aviation officials don't like to mix fixed-wing aircraft with the helicopters that already use the airstrip.

There has also been a lot of talk in recent years of a joint consortium of local municipalities purchasing Mettetal Airport in Canton Township. The goal was clearly to meet the needs of area businesses.

I had my doubts, but after my recent experience, I'm a believer. Mettetal, with a 2,500-foot runway, might need some expansion, but it is the only decent-sized, non-commercial field within a half-hour drive of here. Business people would be wise to look into it.

● I have to admit that twice during the Kroger strike, I dropped in the store in West Oaks and bought some groceries there. Meijer is still always my first choice, but there are just some things Meijer doesn't stock, and I'll be damned if I'm gonna pay what Farmer Jack charges for groceries. I'm from New York City where only suckers and out-of-towners pay full price for anything.

Recognizing a valuable asset



Downtowns fascinate me. And, no doubt because I live here, none fascinate me more than Northville's.

I'm one of those people who are concerned about the future of downtowns. The automobile's to blame, I suppose. But that's an oversimplification.

The fine, old traditional downtowns — like Northville's — evolved in the days before the dominance of the automobile. People in those days needed a variety of clustered retail outlets so they could come into town and take care of their shopping needs.

The automobile changed all that. I heard a speech once that suggested regional shopping centers were a logical evolution of traditional downtowns. A primary difference between regional centers and old-fashioned downtowns is convenient parking.

Because traditional downtowns evolved before the heyday of the automobile, they did not have adequate parking. A primary concern of those attempting to maintain the viability of traditional downtowns is to provide adequate parking.

Adding to the problems faced by traditional downtowns has been the advent of strip centers and the proliferation of one-stop shopping centers (Wal-Mart, Meijer, etc.) on the outskirts of population centers.

The threat facing traditional downtowns was highlighted in a story titled "The Two Sides of the Sam Walton Legacy" in the April 20 issue of *Time*.

The sub-head on that article was: "Stack it deep, sell it cheap, stack it high and watch it fly! Hear those downtown merchants cry!" According to *Time*, that little ditty is a chant

used by Wal-Mart employees.

What brings all this to mind is two developments reported in recent issues of *The Record*. Neither should pass without comment.

First, Charlie Freydl is retiring, closing his men's and women's clothing stores on Main Street to spend some time fishing and golfing.

Freydl's has been a fixture on Main Street as long as I can remember. In fact, Freydl's has been a part of Northville since Charlie's grandfather opened a clothing shop here back in 1894. Almost a hundred years later, Freydl's will cease to exist.

Charlie has earned the right to retire. I wish him well, but that does not mean I won't feel more than a twinge of sorrow when Freydl's is gone forever.

Second, the Open Door Christian Church at the corner of Center and Randolph is up for sale, and one of the interested parties is the Singh Development Company, developers of MainCentre.

Bearing no ill-will toward Open Door whatsoever, the sale has the potential to be important to the future of Northville's downtown. Additional stores and/or residential units filled with people who will live and shop downtown are positive signs.

The *Time* article about Wal-Mart concluded on a positive note. It suggested that people who drive to a Wal-Mart and thereby contribute to the decline of their town will end up paying higher taxes, a premium for the merchandise they get.

"Eventually," the article said, "the pendulum will swing, the market place will adjust."

My hope is that downtown Northville will continue to flourish. That suitable replacements will be found for Freydl's. And that people will recognize downtowns as the valuable assets they are — and continue to support them.

Parting of the ways for Partners

Seeing sparks ignite in the eyes of students as they learned through hands-on experience provided by business men and women was well worth the two years Jan Purtell spent at the helm of the district's Partnerships for Education program.

"This job has truly been a joy for me," Purtell said between cleaning out her desk and reminiscing "To see an idea spark from either a teacher or business person and to be able to fan the flames so that it develops into a fire that lights up in the face of a youngster."

The June 8 school millage defeat may have eliminated the partnership program and Purtell's job as coordinator of it, but it can't erase the memories she has.

"I liked the creativity involved in it," she said. "I enjoyed matching the businesses and the schools up and then letting them come up with wonderful ideas that kids are benefiting from."

The best example of the ingenuity

fueled by the partnership program was when a truck driver from Meyer, one of the 22 business partners, drove an 18-wheeler up to an elementary school and each of the classes used the truck to develop a math problem.

"The kindergartners counted lug nuts and fifth-graders measured the truck in cubic feet," she said. "That was one of our first and really was a wonderful experience."

What followed was two years of growing and learning. In the two short years the partnership program thrived, growing from 15 to 22 partners. Each partnership, unique in itself, challenged students to reach their potential by seeing math, science, and nature at work in real-life situations.

Involving nearly 10,700 contacts with students by nearly 700 staff members, more than 300 business participants, parents, and community members, the partnership program started in 1990 was a two way success story.

"There were a lot of people involved in ways they never would have been

involved before. Single people who don't have kids, people who have raised all their kids, and people who don't even have children in our district, all worked together. It's a link between the schools and the community that just has so much to offer."

School officials are hoping that the program cut is more of commercial interruption rather than an end to a good idea.

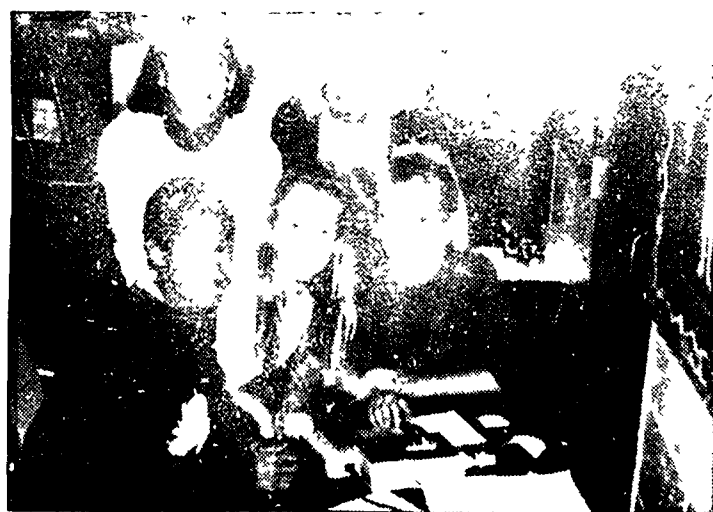
"We are looking at this as a hiatus for one year and we are hoping the community does the same," said Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Dolly McMaster. "The good news is that Jan walked into our lives; we are all better for that. We hope that she will still be around after being so marketable, and we hope she will give Northville a second chance."

Purtell agreed that for the sake of the students, the program should be rejuvenated.

"There's been a lot of community awareness and more starting to kick in," she said. "Lots of good ideas, but unfortunately we've run out of time."

Hurry-up eating without giving up on nutrition

Busy, busy, busy — good intentions to eat healthy often get pushed aside in the course of a typical "on the run" kind of day. Eating on the run doesn't have to be hazardous to your diet or health. The key is to plan ahead for these kinds of days.

Some of the tempting pitfalls that can trip you up into attempting to save time is skipping meals. This usually backfires because it frequently triggers gorging in the form of one single large meal at the end of the day. Don't rely solely on frozen dinners for good nutrition. Most frozen entrees are not complete meals. They lack vitamins and minerals such as A and C and are low in fiber. Always include fresh fruits and vegetables as a part of the meal.

Staying out of the grocery store will not save time nor your waistline. Bare cupboards will cause a quandary over what to eat and cause you to grab anything.

In the long run having a plan saves time and money and helps you survive nutritionally. Try to eat breakfast or a mid-morning snack. Running on empty causes "brain drain," and you need energy. Prolonged hunger creates a one-track mind and that is a food track.

No time for breakfast? Well, eating last night's leftovers would be better than nothing. Combine leftover rice, macaroni, stale bread, lowfat milk, beaten egg white and seasonings of your choice. Bake it until set. Refrigerate overnight and in the morning scoop up a quick dish, microwave to warm slightly or eat cold. Bake an extra potato in the evening, split and fill with leftovers, re-heat in the morning. A breakfast pizza made from an English muffin or bagels with mozzarella cheese and Canadian bacon are always a big hit for a busy schedule. For those with little time in the morning, stir crunchy, high-fiber cereal right in the lowfat yogurt or cottage cheese carton and you have a portable breakfast.

Try "grazing" — eat small nutritious snacks or mini meals throughout the day. Stockpile your desk or kitchen cupboards with mini bagels, boxed raisins, pop-top tuna packed in water, low-fat crackers, boxed juices and durable fruits such as oranges, grapefruit, apples or canned vegetable juice.

Don't rely on vitamin pills or supplements as a nutritional crutch. No vitamin supplement will resolve the problem of too much fat and cholesterol when you eat. Refrigerator-ready snacks could include nonfat or lowfat yogurts, lowfat cheeses or maybe just a carton of low-fat or skim milk.

When time is a premium, use time-saving cooking methods such as one-dish recipes or microwave meals you put together. Use a slow cooker (crock pot) to let meals simmer all day and be ready to eat when you come in the door. Buy prepared foods such as grated lowfat cheese, chopped produce, plain frozen vegetables and boneless, skinless chicken breasts. Needless to say, these conveniences do cost more.

Keep quick staples on hand such as canned beans, water-packed tuna, frozen vegetables, turkey breast, spaghetti with canned pasta sauce, rice and lentils. When time allows you to cook, take advantage of that and plan the leftovers. Double or triple recipes for future use. Stocking your freezer with homemade frozen dinners or entrees help save time. To retain crispness and prevent overcooking when reheating, undercook dishes slightly. Use arrowroot or cornstarch rather than flour to thicken sauces. This will make the sauces less likely to separate when frozen.

For ready-to-go salads, prepare a large batch of greens, cover with a paper towel and store in an airtight bowl or plastic bag. It should stay fresh for three to four days. Use as a dinner salad or add tuna, crab, leftover meat for a meal. Adding kidney or garbanzo beans to the salad greens adds additional fiber.

Busy days need not mean there is nothing to eat nor no time to eat. Long hours and unexpected meetings can easily cut in healthy eating plans but by planning ahead and keeping the cupboards stocked with good food choices, eating on the run will not be a problem.

July sparks interest for red hot lovers

With the Fourth of July coming up, barbecue grills in this area will be getting a workout.

If you're like most Americans, hot dogs will likely be on the menu. Indeed, the National Hot Dog and Sausage Council has declared July "National Hot Dog Month." And the folks there tell us it's OK to call them frankfurters, franks or wieners.

There's little doubt about the hot dog's popularity. Just ask Zef Dresevic, owner of Joseph's Coney Island in downtown Northville. At lunch time, it's hard to find an empty table at Joseph's, and the carry-out orders are shutting in and out like an assembly line.

"It's a favorite food for a lot of people," said Dresevic, dishing up a pair of chili dogs. "They'll get tired of any other kind of food before they'll get tired of these."

Dresevic admits that he goes through 1,000 hot dogs a week. They come in cases of 80, and he'll go through a dozen or more in that time.

"I'll go through four boxes in a day, once in a while," said Dresevic. "I just got another shipment of six boxes today."

Though Joseph's dishes up hot dogs plain, with cheese, with chili, with onions, with practically anything you care to throw on them, Dresevic says the secret isn't in the toppings.

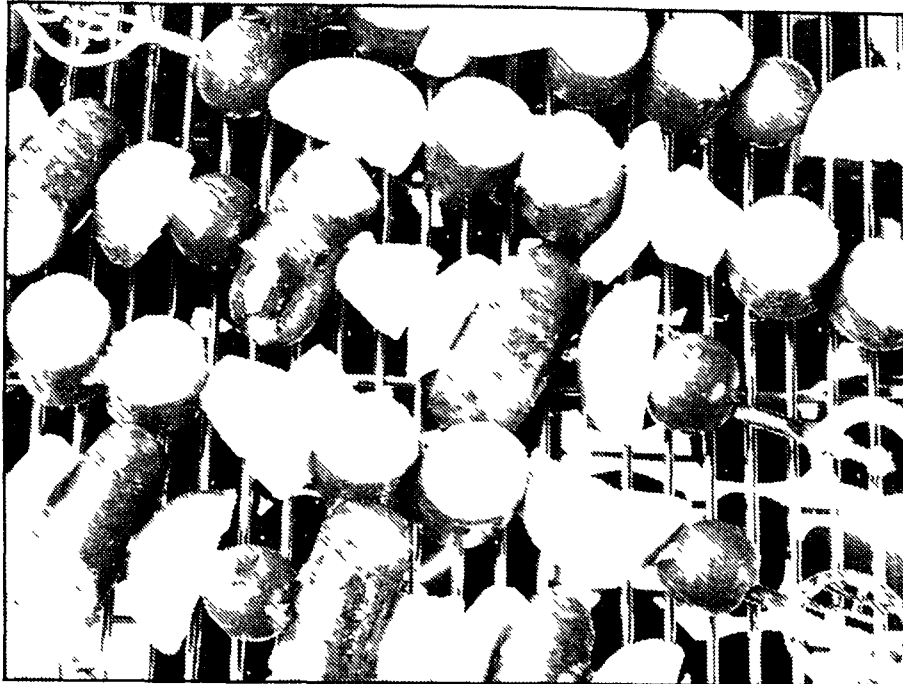
"It's the hot dogs," he said. "We use A-1 quality hot dogs."

And in keeping with the red, white and blue spirit, Dresevic points out that the meat in his hot dogs and chili is all from American farms. Concerns over the use of meat from farms in South America, and the resulting annihilation of tropical rain forests, have caused people like Dresevic to make certain they are buying American.

From a nutritional point of view, hot dogs don't rate high on the list of necessities.

"Hot dogs are notoriously high in fat, and that's a concern," said Sylvia Treitman, home economist with the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service. "They're tasty, though, and quick and fun. They do have turkey and chicken ones available now, though, and they are lower in fat. The other concern is that they are high in sodium."

Treitman added that like most

GET A RISE FROM YOUR CAKE: Ever wonder what makes cakes fall? According to Betty Crocker, cakes fall for many reasons, usually related to an unbalanced proportion of ingredients. Excess sugar makes the cake too tender to support itself in the middle. Too much shortening makes flour's gluten strands too slippery to hold cake up. If there's excess liquid, it won't evaporate enough to let the cake rise. Too much baking powder or baking soda will cause the cake to rise quickly and then fall because there is not enough flour to support the structure.

Do breakfast? It's not for everyone

As the backbone of a new campaign to generate more revenues at its non-mall restaurants, Troy-based Olga's Kitchen has opened its doors to the highly competitive morning crowd.

Olga's breakfast menu is geared to heart-smart diners: smoked turkey hash, fresh fruit platters, natural granola cereal, a yogurt cooler with protein powder and three-egg omelettes prepared with a non-cholesterol alternative.

"Since we were traditionally open for lunch and dinner, the morning represented idle time for us, so it was a natural evolution to open for breakfast," said Michael Sadofsky, vice president of marketing and advertising for Olga's, which opened its first restaurant in 1970 in downtown Birmingham.

"But knowing the level of competition out there, from fast food to sit-down diners, we felt the only way to compete was to offer something different. That means fresh ingredients cooked to order in under five minutes."

Still, even healthy food served in a wisp of time doesn't guarantee success.

Jeff Gabriel, a chef and instructor within the culinary arts program at Schoolcraft College in Livonia, said if given a choice, he would never go into the breakfast market.

"A restaurant which opens for breakfast is basically breaking even," said Gabriel. "How many dollars can you bring in when the average customer spends only \$3 or \$4? If you have 100 customers each morning, that's \$300 to \$400."

"If you have six or seven employees making \$5 to \$6 an hour, you may make a little bit of money. Personally, I would never go into the breakfast market. The dinner market is where you make your money, because there people are spending \$18 to \$20 apiece."

Because Olga's already has an established lunch and dinner crowd, offering breakfast isn't likely to make or break the company. Last year, Olga's reported \$50 million in revenues from 53 restaurants across the nation, 20 of which are in Metro Detroit.

What's more, since the morning represents idle time at Olga's, a break-even breakfast campaign could help boost its profit margin if the new money coming in is enough to pay the respective share of rent and utilities, which are costs generated whether a restaurant is open or not.

But Olga's doesn't plan on breaking even. To lead the breakfast campaign, which began in February, the chain brought aboard William Pickett, former executive chef and co-founder of the Beverly Hills Grill as well as executive chef at the Richard & Reiss Restaurant in Birmingham.

"We didn't want to do just an omelette wrapped in a piece of Olga bread and call it breakfast," said Pickett, who left the former restaurants last December due to time constraints. "Knowing the level of competition we were up against, we had to make a statement and set ourselves apart from fast food and the \$1.99 breakfast served at places like Denny's."

Enter the smoked turkey hash, which Pickett said was a healthier alternative to corned beef hash, which is often prepared from the fatty portion of a brisket. The chef also created a cinnamon coffee, fritters, muffins, french toast, Belgian waffles and a yogurt cooler made with honey, bananas, orange juice and strawberries.

Still, there are deep pockets to challenge. From the beginning, fast-food competitors like McDonald's and Burger King have offered breakfast with convenience and taste in mind, with little

thought for nutritional value. The strategy has worked out well.

Breakfast brings in about 20 cents of every dollar McDonald's cash registers ring up, even as a recent issue of Consumer Reports found that fast-food egg sandwiches with cheese and meat like McDonald's Egg McMuffin and Burger King's Croissan'wich pack between 700 to 850 calories per serving. The Croissan'wich contains 40 grams of fat, close to two-thirds of a day's fat quota.

While convenience has always been high on the list of breakfast eaters on the go, only recently, with the advent of healthier diets, has nutrition been a consideration.

Pickett said his biggest challenges in bringing breakfast to Olga's was creating a healthier menu while working out time, logistic and training factors. Prices were also kept low. The most expensive item by far on the menu, smoked turkey hash, is \$4.25.

"In preparing the menu, most of my time was spent measuring how long it took to prepare, cook and serve an item," said Pickett. "If an item took too long to prepare, we dropped it. On the week-days, people are often in a hurry to get to work, and the last thing you want to do is make them late."

While Sadofsky declined to reveal how much Olga's spent bringing the breakfast campaign up to speed, he said the company hired over two dozen new employees to complement existing staffs. To date, breakfast is available 7 to 11 a.m. every day except Sunday, when hours are 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Only the Birmingham, Lathrup Village and West Bloomfield restaurants serve breakfast, though Sadofsky said the chain will expand portions of the menu to most of its outlets over the next few years.

Put zip in salads with flavored vinegar

If you're looking for a way to add some zip to your summer meals, try flavored vinegars.

"Everybody is fat-conscious, and trying to reduce their intake of fats and oils," said John Jonna, merchandising manager, product develop-

ment, Merchant of Vino. "Oil adds flavor. If you cut oil, you kill flavor. What I'm recommending is use less oil; add water and flavored vinegars."

Jonna gave a quick lesson in flavored vinegars at his Merchant of Vino shop. Three of the best-known

flavored vinegars are the French Orleans, Italian balsamic, and Spanish sherry.

French Orleans adds a brisk, sharp flavor to salad dressings. It is also absorbs the flavor of herbs. "Balsamic means to improve your

health in Italian," said Jonna. For nearly 1,000 years, balsamic vinegar has been made in Modena, Italy from the Trebbiano grape. "It has an amazing flavor," said Jonna. He sprinkles balsamic vinegar on vegetables, pasta, fresh fruit, and salads.

Obtaining the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds for the sixth consecutive

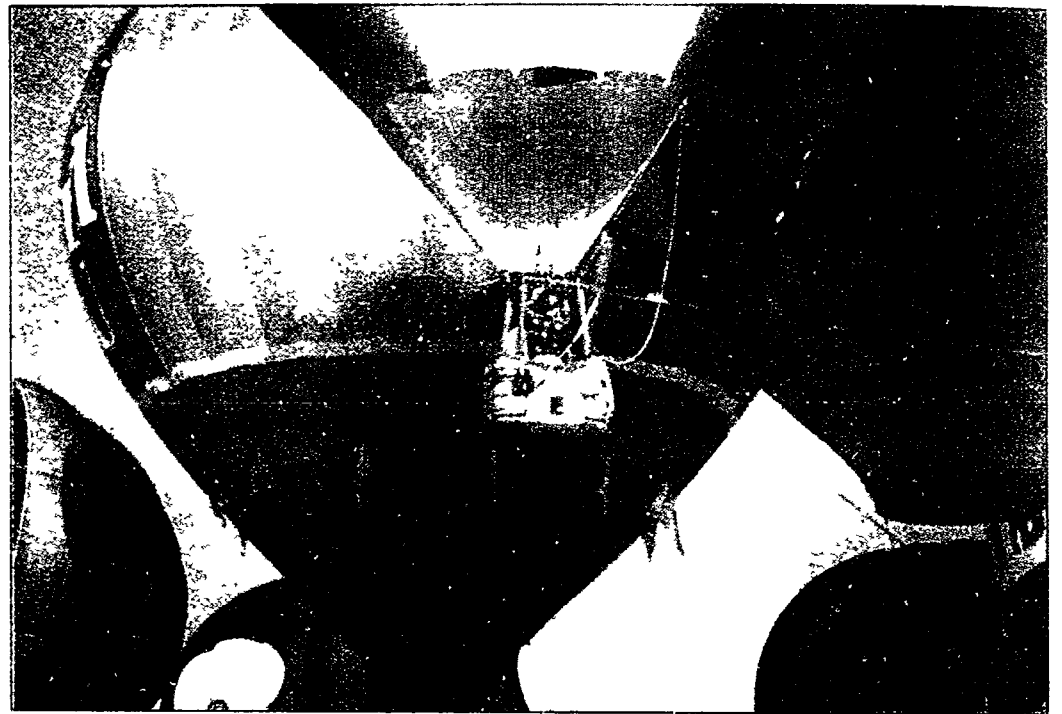

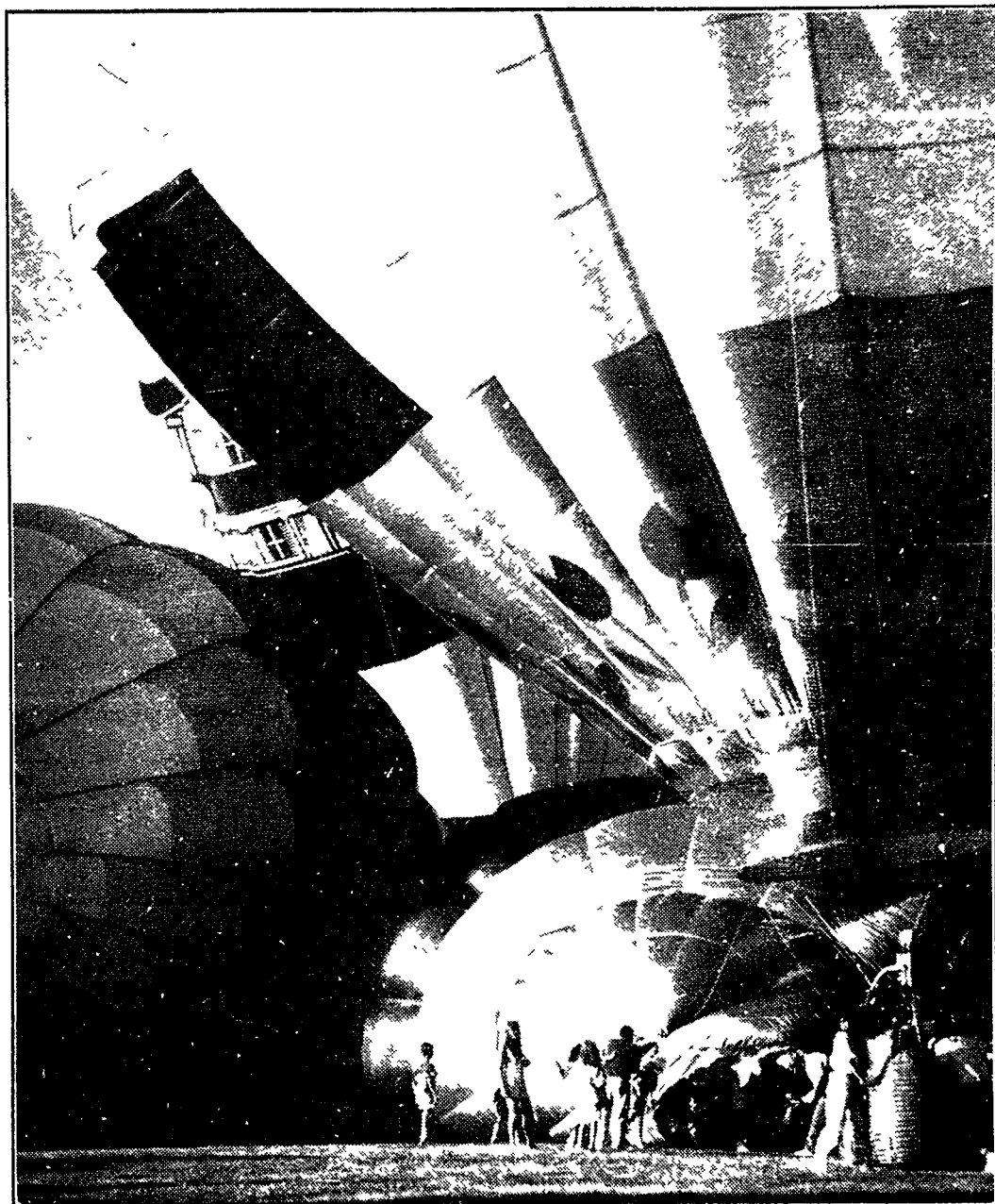

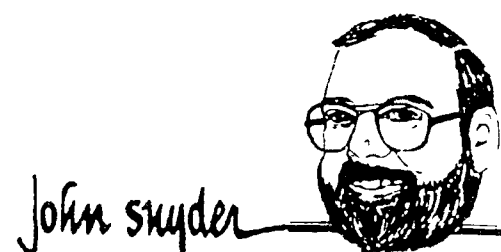

Quaint and quirky



The road to Rockford unfurls like a rolling ribbon, crosses west Michigan's Rouge River, and leads to a treasure trove of shops and eateries.

Squires Street Square, a crazy quilt collection of specialty shops, offers everything from Baskets in the Belfry to Tanzanian coffee. Many of the store fronts date from the 1870s, and formerly saw service as barns, chicken coops and a grain warehouse.

Here's a sampling...

There's a strong accent on Victoriana at Baskets in the Belfry, where Crabtree and Evelyn toiletries are featured. Wicker baskets of every size and shape, dried flowers of all varieties and nature-inspired accent pieces help create a soothing shopping atmosphere. (Phone 616-866-2890)

Refined country crafts are offered at the Great Northern Trading Co. The framed and matted Charles Wysocki prints, hand-forged wrought iron floor lamps and braided rugs and chair pads on sale here would add a rural touch to any decorating scheme. The shop's weathered wooden siding and hand-painted signs raise the concept of rustic to a new level. (616-866-9232)

Coffee drinkers in all 50 states know about The Melting Pot, and Rockford visitors should too. It's the place for hungry shoppers to woof down a piping hot raisin bagel and chase it with a cup of chocolate hazelnut brew. The Melting Pot roasts and grinds beans from around the world and sells "just above wholesale." Call 616-866-2900 for a price list.

Squires Street Square is also home to a variety of other gift and antique stores, restaurants and snack shops. The Rockford Rotary Club has erected a pavilion for picnicking and shoppers may rest their weary feet on the cast iron benches conveniently placed around the district.

You have to like a town where the

corner bar is named The Corner Bar. The sign outside this watering hole brags that it has "sold 995 miles of hot dogs since 1965" and it's easy to see why.

Steaming hot coney dogs slathered with the works are the top sellers. The Corner Bar sells a "couple hundred dozen on a busy day," a waitress says, and they're served from an outside walk-up window too.

Rockford is headquarters for Hush Puppies shoes, and a former shoe warehouse has been converted to the Rockford Antique Center. Nearly 50 dealers offer old furniture, glassware, pottery, pattern glass and vintage wearables. (616-866-1224)

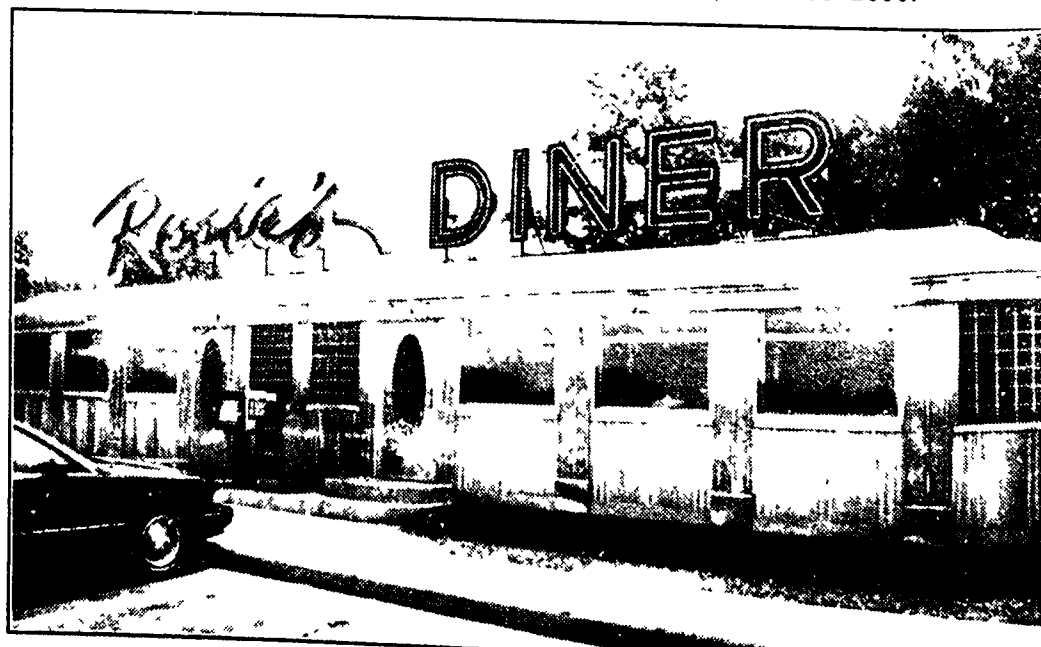
For a trip from the quaint to the quirky, take the short jaunt north to Rosie's Diner and The Diner Store. These vintage 1940s diners have been rescued, relocated and lovingly restored by avowed diner fan and ceramics artist Jerry Berta.

Rosie's Diner, made famous by the Bounty paper towel commercials starring the late Nancy Walker as Rosie the waitress, has all the classic diner features — curved glass-brick corners, rounded roof, vintage Formica, and all the classic diner fare — burgers, meat loaf and blue plate specials. Backyard Monsters: The World of Insects, a new exhibit featuring giant, robotic insects, hands-on activities and more than 1,000 real insect specimens, is on a national tour and has made its way to Michigan where it is on display at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Six larger-than-life insects and arachnids are featured in the exhibit, including the Emperor Scorpion, Black Widow Spider, Unicorn Beetle, Praying Mantis, Carpenter Ant and a 16-foot suspended Dragonfly. The insect replicas are up to 96 times their actual size and are presented in oversized backyard settings that include colossal blades of grass and giant water sprinklers.

The five robotic creatures are anatomically correct and exhibit life-like movements including darting eyes, creeping legs and waving antennae. Sound effects and dramatic lighting transport visitors into a world

that resembles the settings in the hit movie, "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids." The robots were designed by California-based Creative Presentations, the makers of the extra-terrestrial being for Universal Studios' "E.T.'s Great Adventure Ride." The exhibits, developed in consultation with leading entomologist, David Evans, Ph.D., represent the latest in scientific and environmental research.

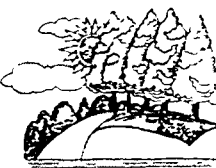
"Children are fascinated with insects and this exhibit will stimulate their interest," said Ellen Jacobowitz, acting director of Cranbrook Institute of Science. "The exaggerated size of the insects in the exhibition allows us to present children with a close-up look at these creatures for enhanced enjoyment and observation."

Visitors also get to experience a bug's perspective through 14 hands-on displays. They can follow an ant's

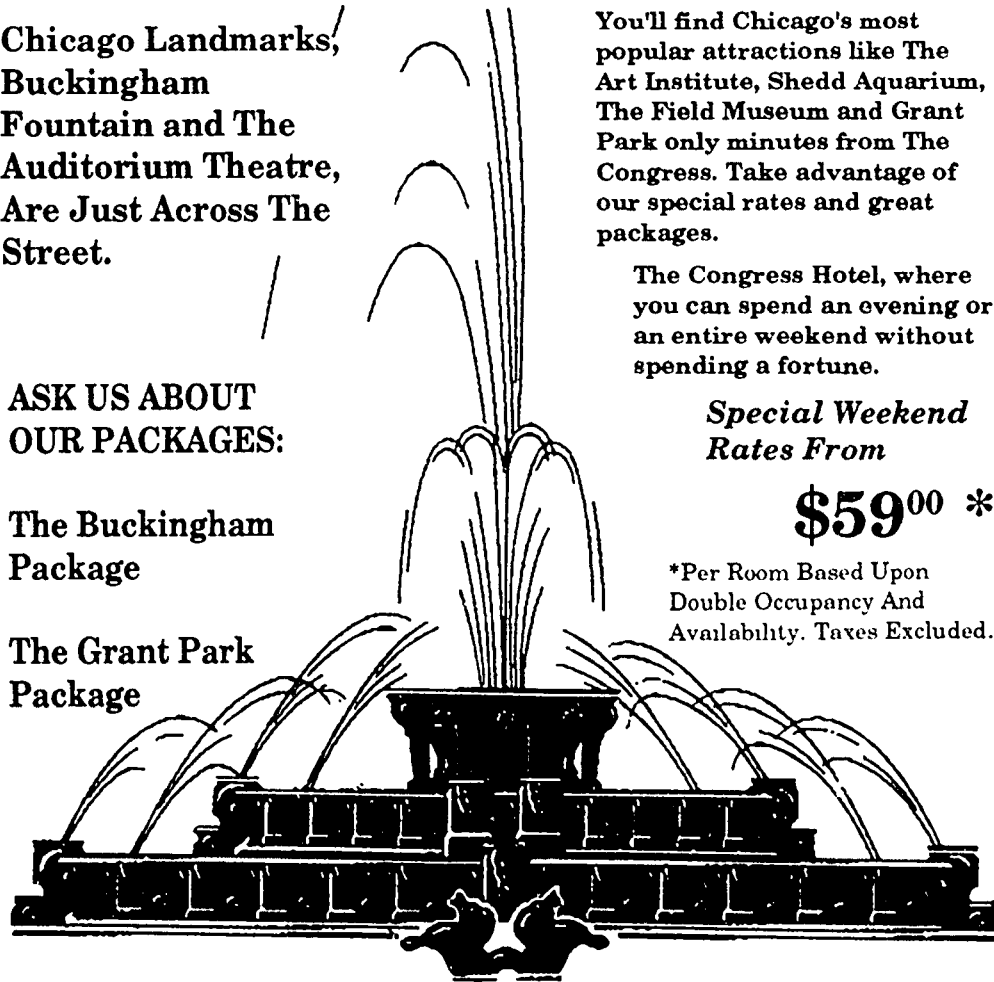

scent trail at the "Scent Maze;" build, and climb through honeycombs at "Honeycomb Construction;" look at their friends through an insect's compound eyes at "Bug's Eye View;" or, build their own bug using interchangeable color-coded body parts to learn the differences between insects, spiders and centipedes. Museum-goers can observe hungry insects at the dinner table to discover their eating habits.

The final component of the exhibit, the specimen display, contains more than 1,000 exotic insects and arachnids from around the world. Visitors can see the courtship dance of the scorpion, the world's largest beetles, and many other insects with unusual features or behavior patterns. "The beauty of the specimens alone make this an extremely popular section of the exhibition," said Jacobowitz.

Prepared under the guidance of Dr. Andrey Sharkov of the American Museum of Natural History's department of entomology, the specimens are displayed in life-like dioramas and detailed collections that offer a glimpse into each insect's natural surroundings. Insect preservation, social relationships and environmental impact are covered, along with the uses of insects in everything from agriculture to jewelry.

The museum has planned a number of other summer programs in conjunction with Backyard Monsters. The daily auditorium program, "What's Bugging You?," provides a detailed look at the lifestyles of bugs. The "Snug-As-A-Bug Sleepover" includes an activity-filled overnight stay at the museum among the Backyard Monsters; and, special-event weekends, "Going Buggy," July 18-19 and "Without Insects," Aug. 8-9 feature opportunities for youngsters to catch and study insects and arachnids.

Volunteers are needed to staff the Backyard Monsters exhibit through Sept. 7. Volunteers participate in a short orientation program which includes a tour of the museum and helpful guidelines on interacting with visitors. Volunteers are eligible to receive a number of benefits including free museum admission and discounts on entry to major exhibits, a monthly newsletter, discounts on gift shop purchases, and more. Volunteer hours also can be reported for income-tax purposes. To learn how you can become a volunteer, call 313-645-3233.

Backyard Monsters: The World of Insects, will remain on display through Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 7. Museum hours (including holidays) are Monday-Thursday, 10 a.m.-5 p.m.; Friday-Saturday, 10 a.m.-10 p.m.; and, Sunday, 12-5 p.m. Summer admission during the exhibition is \$5 for adults, \$4 for senior citizens (65+) and children (3-17), free for children under 3. 

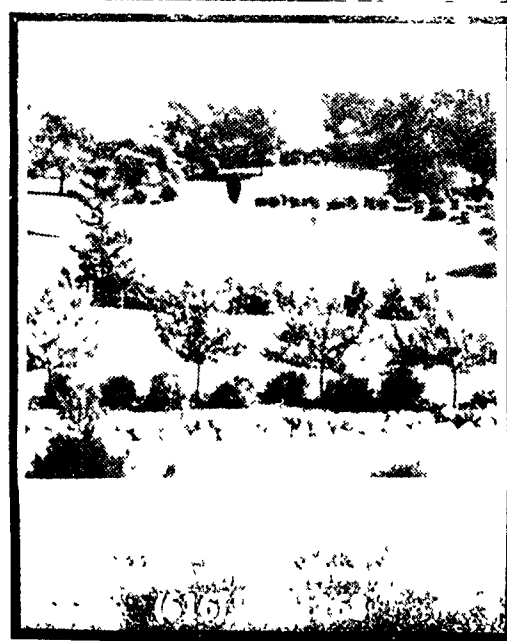

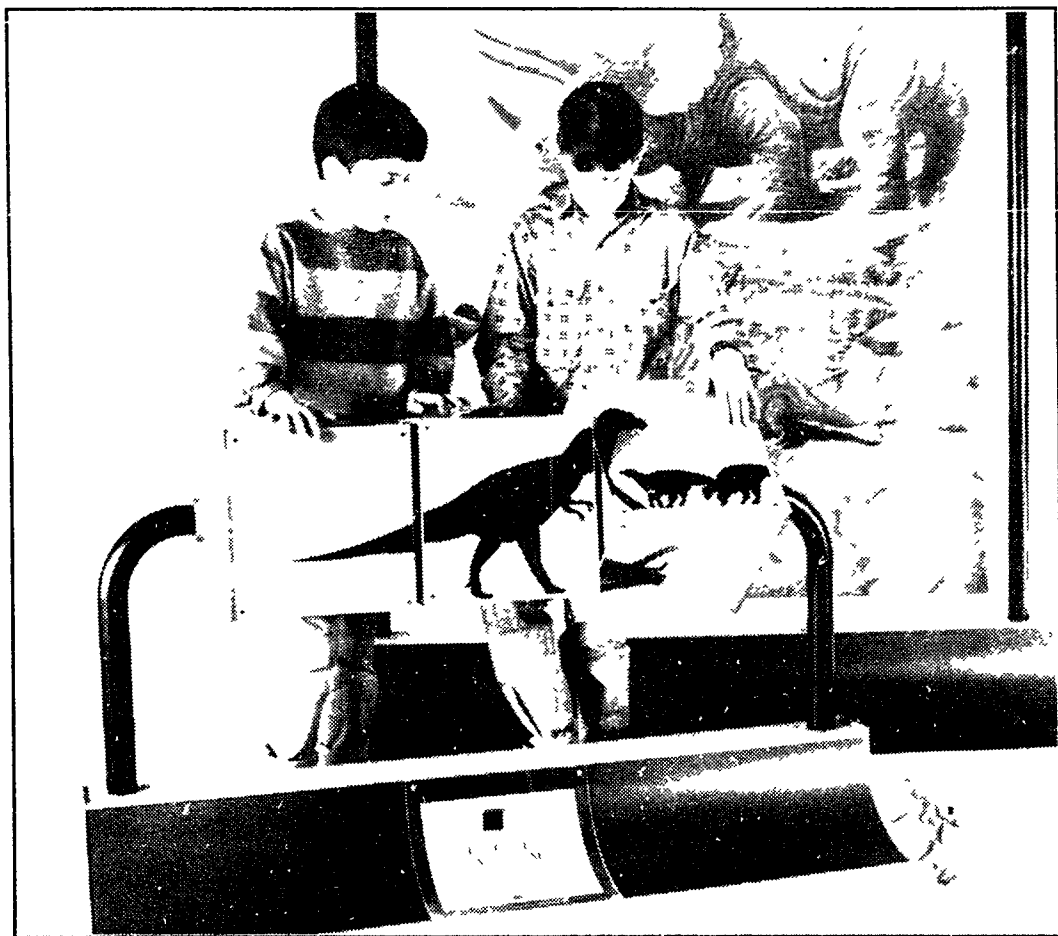

Summer in Stratford: Love's Labour's Found

I was driving along Highway 401, on my way to Stratford, Ontario, when I thought about a famous restaurant owner I met many years ago. I asked him to tell me the secret of running a highly-rated restaurant.

He said "when a light bulb burns out, change it." Pay attention to small details and the big things look after themselves.

I thought about that because I was rehearsing a speech to be given at a seminar the next day in Stratford, a seminar called Hospitality is the Key. The audience would include employees from hotels, bed-and-breakfasts, restaurants and shops. We would talk about important details like saying hello, smiling, serving hot coffee and clean sheets.

Cathy Smith of Tourism Stratford had paid attention to detail by sending me a map of the city, with a red dot marking Baker House Bed and Breakfast. Fred Baker was on the pillared front porch of Baker House when I arrived, his shirt making blue and white stripes against the yellow brick house built in 1879. Bernice was inside attending to all the details that make a fine bed-and-breakfast work.

Baker House is in a good location. It's a two-block walk down Brunswick Street to the distinctive city hall that marks the downtown square, just around the corner from the Avon Theater. It is five blocks down Nile Street from Baker House to the Kiwanis Community Center, home of the Tom Patterson Theater. Picnics and Festival Theater are upstream, Visitor Information Booth and

Shakespearean Gardens downstream from there on the Avon River.

The keynote speaker of our seminar was Bill Dover, vice chairman of General Mills, Canada, which owns Olive Garden and Red Lobster restaurants in Canada. Another proponent of the "change the light bulb" theory. Fill the salt shaker. Listen to complaints. Have umbrellas ready to bring customers in out of the rain.

Dover carries two umbrellas in his car and on rainy days he drives to any of his restaurants that are nearby, causing the "Aw Sh--" response. "The employees look out the window and see me ushering customers in with my umbrella and they say "Aw Sh--, Dover's here!"

The people of Stratford have paid attention to a lot of small details over the last 40 years, converting this old railway town into one of North America's premier theater towns. When you pick up the 1992 Visitors Guide, take time to read the introduction by Robertson Davies, a fine Canadian novelist with a 40-year love affair with Stratford.

Davies talks about how the Stratford townfolk listened with caution to Tom Patterson, and with astonishment to Tyrone Guthrie, when they brought Alec Guinness to star in their first theater tent 40 years ago. How the locals, "who thought actors must be fly-by-nights and fallen women", found beds and hot coffee for travelers in a town that had no tourist structure.

World of Wonders, adapted from a Robertson Davies novel, is the new Canadian play of the season at the Avon Theater, which also presents HMS Pinafore and Entertaining Mr. Sloane.

The Stratford Festival people pay attention to detail too, especially

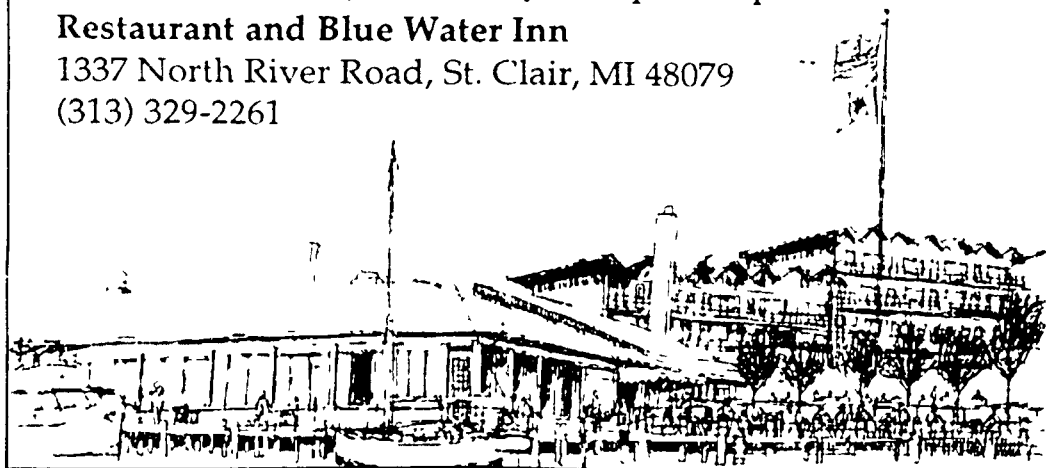

when it comes to staying in contact with local hospitality professionals. They brought models of this year's stage productions to the seminar and gave inside information about how the plays will look.

This year's Shakespeare plays, at the Festival Theater, are *The Tempest*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Love's Labour's Lost* and *Measure for Measure*. Tom Patterson Theater, where our seminar was launched, will present *The Wingfield Trilogy*; *Uncle Vanya*; *Bonjour, La, Bonjour*; *Shirley Valentine*; the *Two Gentlemen of Verona* and a series of six poetry, prose and chamber music recitals.

Where should you stay if you go? Check Tourism Stratford, P.O. Box 818, 88 Wellington St., Stratford, Ontario, N5A 2L2 or telephone (519) 271-5140. Look in the visitor guide for B&Bs that are members of the Stratford and Area Bed and Breakfast Assn.

I can vouch for Baker House, 129 Brunswick St., Stratford, N5A 3L9, but there are many others. I have also stayed at and highly recommend the historic Queen's Inn, beautifully restored and moderately expensive. And the the Festival Inn, a good roadside motel east of town, next door to Krebs Restaurant.

Also consider the Stone Maiden Inn on Church Street, the Forest Motel, or stay outside of Stratford at the Westover Park 15 minutes south in St. Mary's or Jakobstetzel Guest House, north in the town of St. Jacobs.

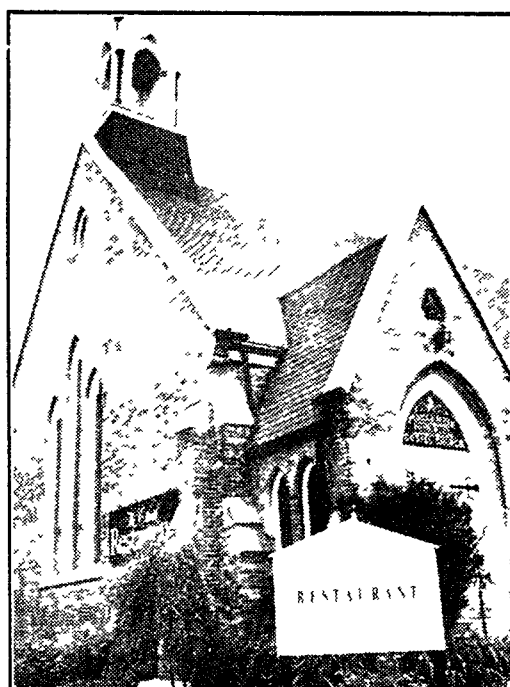
Two of the more interesting shops in town are VS Galleries, with its collection of Canadiana, and Bradshaws, with its wide collection of china and crystal.

Most people dine at least once at the Church Restaurant, a slightly self-conscious place in an old church; consider the Belfry upstairs, especially after the theater.

The food is mediocre at Olde Englishe Parlour but the setting is nice. Locals go to Bentley Bar and restaurant (ask about the upstairs lodging). Rundles comes highly



CITY SYMMETRY— Stratford's imposing City Hall was designed to reflect a strong sense of order.

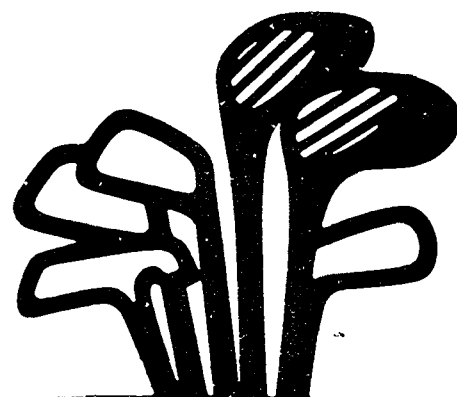


CROWD PLEASER— The Church Restaurant is popular with Stratford theatre patrons before and after the show.

recommended. I've heard good things about the Sun Room. Next time I go, I plan to try the Keystone Alley Cafe. And late night dessert on the patio at Anna Banana's.

Or buy a picnic lunch from one of the places listed with Tourism Stratford and eat on the bank of the river. That's the kind of detail I like.

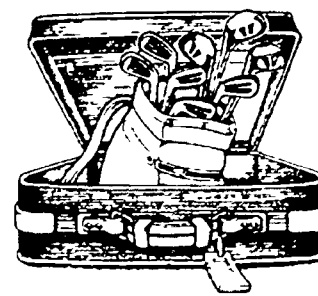

Cereal City secret: Feast for golfers

Battle Creek, Michigan—

Some secrets are meant to be shared.

Here's one: Battle Creek is for golfers.

Admit it. Battle Creek conjures up images of cereal boxes, the drive from Detroit to Chicago, perhaps even a sense of history, but until now you've never thought of it as a golf destination. Time to change that perception.

A group of inviting golf courses and a package few resort areas can match for value has turned the Battle Creek area into a bustling golf mecca less than two hours from Detroit's western suburbs. The metropolitan Detroit area is the hub market, providing for 70 percent of the Battle Creek area's golf package business.

Bill Knopp, general sales manager for the Stouffer Battle Creek Hotel, says a combination of factors are responsible for the success of the golf packages.

"We are oversupplied in golf holes in Calhoun and Kalamazoo counties," he says "The local population cannot support all the fine golf courses we have here so the nice thing is people can get good tee times very easily and it's very affordable. So

when golfers come here, they get accessibility, fine courses and value."

Now in its sixth year, the golf package idea had an inauspicious beginning. Knopp was approached by an assistant professional from Bedford Valley who was looking to fill some empty tee times.

"It was already May when we talked about it," Knopp says. "That year we generated probably less than 100 packages."

The following year, Marywood and Binder Park joined Bedford Valley and the promoters passed out flyers and put up signs at public courses in Detroit.

"We sold 300 packages," Knopp says.

More significantly, the die was cast for something special to start happening, and it did.

In 1991, the fifth year, over 3,500 golf packages were sold and more than 4,000 are expected for 1992.

The current lineup of courses is Marywood, Bedford Valley, Gull Lake View East and West, Stonehedge, Binder Park, plus two additions this year - Lake Doster and Cedar Creek.

Lodging at the centrally-located Stouffer Battle Creek, plus two rounds of golf (including cart), begins at \$112.50 per person, with reduced rates for additional nights.

"We'll adjust packages according to what a golfer wants, whether it's playing 36 holes or allowing for golf widows," Knopp says.

There are plenty of restaurants in the area, including two at the Stouffers, shopping and various tourist attractions, like the Binder Park Zoo. Summer activities include Battle Creek's hot air balloon show (July 4-11).

Among the popular dining spots are Bayview Gardens on Gull Lake, with traditional American fare of steaks and prime rib. The Waterfront Inn is 1½ miles south of downtown Battle Creek, on Goguac Lake.

Each of the eight courses in the Battle Creek group has its loyal followers. All offer challenge and uniformly excellent conditions, as exemplified by Marywood Golf Club,

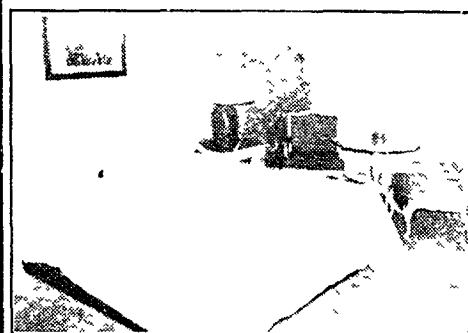

which is about 12 miles north of downtown Battle Creek.

Marywood, built in 1926, has bloodlines. It was a private course until the late 1960s and its breeding is obvious. From the first moment it turned public, Marywood was special, the kind of course public fee players aspire to but seldom realize.

Today, Marywood has a niche all its own. General Manager Chip Iceberg calls it a "presort."

"We're fitting into something that isn't entirely public and it isn't resort," Iceberg says. "Combine the two. It doesn't fit public golf, even though it is. The amenities, from the time you drive in and your golf bags are taken for you, put on carts and everything is taken care of for you the day, it's a far cut above public."

One measure of Marywood's popularity is the repeat business.

"It's almost 100 percent, it has grown so much," Iceberg says. "In

fact, it's more than 100 percent when you consider the people who have gone back and told their friends about how nice it is and have had their friends come here."

Iceberg estimates Marywood did between 14,000 and 15,000 rounds on the packages last summer, a whopping increase from 300 rounds just three years earlier.

Plans are for condominium-style accommodations very near the golf course in the future.

Marywood is popular as a banquet facility for golf outings, corporate meetings/outings and a variety of conferences. Iceberg and his staff pay attention to all the details, on and off the course.

"When you come here, we take pride in how we take care of you," he says. "You don't have to join a private club to be taken care of in a private club manner."

Walk-up greens fees are \$36 weekends, \$32 weekdays, and Marywood gets plenty of one-day drive-up business from Detroit. It's a straight shot west on I-94 to exit 98B, north 12 miles to St. Mary's Lake Road, left two miles to North Avenue, and, finally, a right turn to the entrance a quarter-mile down.

The measure of Marywood is a combination of playability, exquisite conditioning and just plain enjoyment. The variety of holes is tremendous, as is the rolling venue.

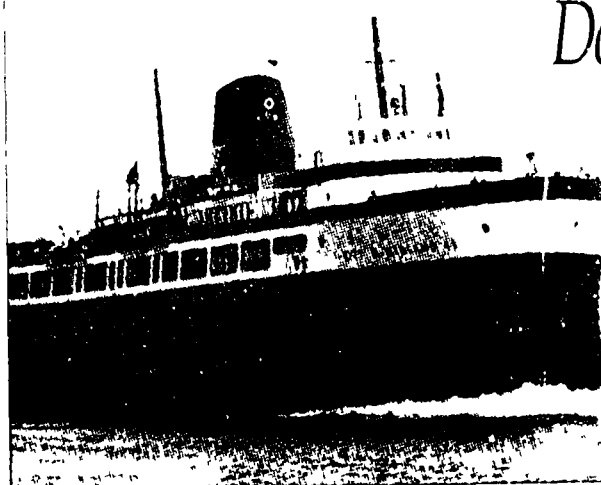

Menominee, Aug. 6-9, entices visitors with entertainment, fireworks and a parade.

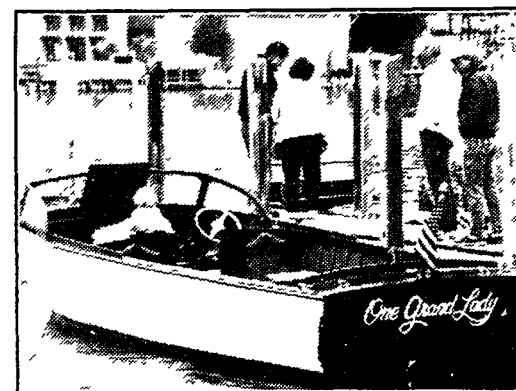

Detroit boating: What's new

The wonderful boating in the Detroit River and Lake St. Clair is inspiring a surge of new nautical services and facilities, despite recession.

It can even be argued that some of

this catering to Detroit area boaters was brought on by the recession.

Here's a wrap-up of what's new for anyone boating in this area. We're also including recommendations for good Detroit area cruise destinations.

"Businesses that provide services to boaters in the rest of Michigan make their profits from tourism," says Jane McGraw. She is the self-described "Charter Lady" for The Boat Rental Club, a time share and boat charter service operated out of Jefferson Beach Marina in St. Clair Shores.

"In the Detroit area, our tourism is our boaters," says McGraw. "With I-696 to shorten the drive time, people come here from Brighton, Milford, even Flint and Lansing. We treat them with TLC, as tourists should be treated."

McGraw's headquarters houseboat is close to the center of the Nautical Mile, a stretch of shoreline between Nine and Ten Mile Roads on East Jefferson in St. Clair Shores. The strip is crammed with marinas, shops and restaurants, and contains slips for more than 4,000 boats.

"This is the boating capital of the world," she says. "We have more boat wells in this short stretch of land than anywhere else."

The Nautical Mile Association of 61 area businesses got started as a response to the downturn in the economy.

"Its purpose is to make and maintain this as a fun place to go boating," says Curt Dumas, president of the association and harbor manager of Jefferson Beach Marina.

"A lot of this area is 40-some years old. We're making it new again. All the marinas have gone through major renovations. With the city's help, we're going to repave some streets and hang signs welcoming guests to the Nautical Mile.

"We put almost \$5 million into Jefferson Beach Marina. We have all new catwalks, dock boxes, rewiring. We've put thousands into landscaping, including a park by the lake where people can grill a dinner, and sit and watch the boats come in.

"People have broken out of the old cliques of powerboaters and sailors and are having dock parties and just having fun together."

Ambitiously, he adds, "We want to make this the Disney World of boating---a clean, fun family place where you can go and stay."

Jane McGraw agrees. "When times were good, if somebody wanted to take a vacation they went to the Caribbean. Now they're more likely to come here for weekends, and use their boats as cottages. So the marinas are making facilities nicer. There are saunas, swimming pools. They are opening them to transients. There are beautiful showers. Here at Jefferson Beach Marina you can plug in cable TV at the dock, so you don't even have to miss your favorite shows.

"We have sea dogs and sea nannies. Broadway Pet Grooming will groom your dog for you while you're out on the lake. The sea nannies will go out on your boat and watch the kids for you. They're all experienced boaters who can help with the docking lines.

"We started this service when we noticed more customers with small children. Women will have their babies and a few weeks later they're down here carrying them, with little life jackets for them. It's amazing how young some of these boating kids are.

"Bobby Moore's Blind Fish restaurant will cater your dinner and bring it to your boat. If they're not too rushed, they will send a car to pick you up at the dock."

Jefferson Beach is also the home of the famous and popular Brownie's On The Lake, a restaurant with transient slips for guests.

"There are so many slips," says Dumas, "that we can probably find you a place to dock near any of the restaurants, if you'll just call ahead. And most of them will pick you up at your boat and take you back afterwards."

But for most boaters, the real fun is out on the water, not at the dock. From the Nautical Mile it's an easy seven-mile run to Metropolitan Beach. A favorite spot to anchor and swim on a hot day is a few miles east of the Clinton River at uninhabited Strawberry Island, where the sand is soft and the water shallow.

"On the old St. Clair Flats canal," recounts McGraw enthusiastically, "there's a neat little cut on Seaway Island where you can tie up to a tree on an embankment. It's a safe anchorage protected from the wind. You can follow a path over the top of the island to a sandy white beach on the other side, on the main channel.

"A lot of boats anchor around Gull Island," McGraw goes on. "There are a lot of old sunken fishing shanties on the bottom there, so you have to be careful."

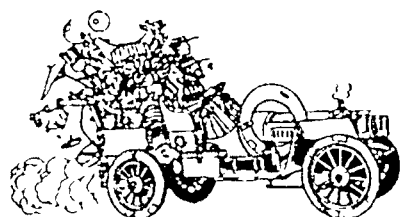
For a delightful evening after work, Joe Kennedy of Birmingham and Amy Fisher of Bloomfield Hills like a dinner cruise down the Detroit River with four or five couples. They leave Jefferson Beach Marina about 7 p.m. aboard the 34-foot Wellcraft Gran Sport that Joe leases on time-share from the Boat Rental Club. When they reach the Renaissance Center, they have drinks and a carry-out dinner, watch the sun set and the lights come on in the city.

"This kind of an evening," says Joe, "costs a lot less than it would cost to go out for drinks and dinner."

"And it's a lot more fun," adds Amy. "Sometimes, if there's a concert at Chene Park, we just idle along and listen to the music. We use the boat horn to applaud."

You can hear the music from the Chene Park concerts from next door at the new, modern St. Aubin's Marina,

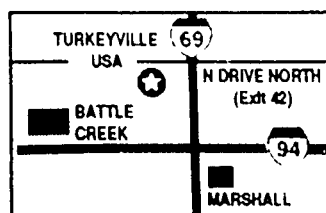

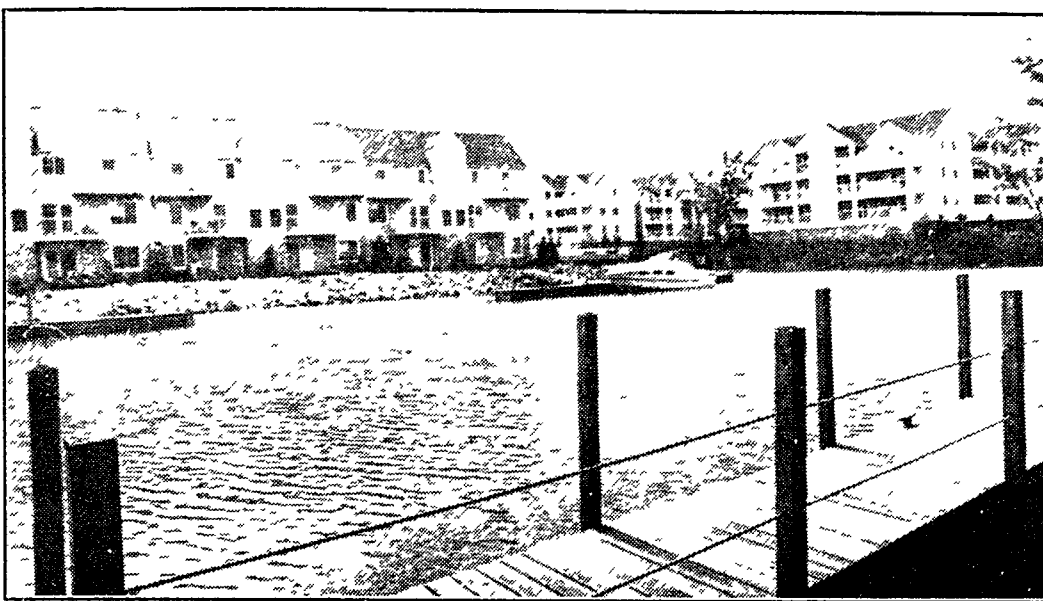

which has 50 transient docks. It's a Michigan Harbor of Refuge operated by the City of Detroit, with a 24-hour harbor master. The security is impressive. One evening about 10 p.m. we tried without success to enter and take a look around. If a guest is invited to come to the boat, the guard must call on the PA and have the owner come to identify the guest.

Good restaurants near St. Aubin's Marina include the Rattlesnake Club, within easy walking distance. The club's shuttle bus will pick up any diners within three miles and take them back after. For a small delivery charge they will also deliver carryouts, including a \$5.95 box lunch. They will even shuttle diners downtown or to the theater.

Near the Rattlesnake is Dunleavy's (z is intentional) River Place, popular with sports fans and theatergoers. Dunleavy's also ferries diners to and from downtown.

From the marina, a two-block walk north on St. Aubin brings you to the popular Woodbridge Tavern, which also has carryout service.

Cruising back upriver (to the east) is the new 70-acre riverfront development called Porterfield's Marina Village, another prize in Detroit's commendable campaign to foster recreational use of the Detroit River.

Its 479 boat slips include wiring for phones and TV. There is ample transient dockage at current rates (about \$1 a foot per day). While you're a guest, "you're a member of the club", says Marcille Fresard, a marina representative. Membership in the club gives you the use of the private pool surrounded by lounge chairs, two parks with picnic tables, two tennis courts, the private clubhouse including red, white and blue tiled locker rooms and showers, and the gas dock and store—all brand, spanking new.

Farther to the east is the Lawrence Fisher mansion on the Grayhaven Canal, where you can tie up your boat, dine at Govinda's vegetarian restaurant or tour the mansion.

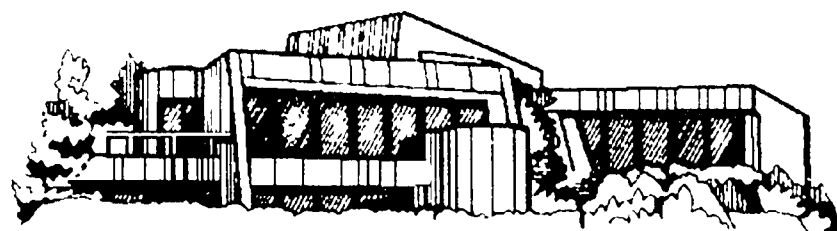

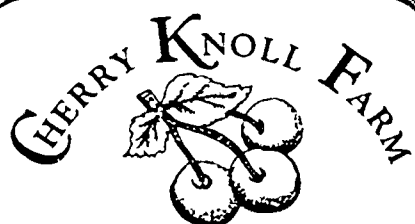

Blossoms brighten Cheboygan

Cheboygan, Michigan—

For the seventh year, 40,000 petunias will add color and cheerfulness to US-23 and M-27, the main routes through this northern Michigan city, thanks to efforts by progressive chamber of commerce

volunteers.

Larry Badgerow, owner of the Best Western River Terrace motel, is just one of the "Petunia Project" members who rises daily at dawn to water the blossoms - with the aid of a tanker truck they acquired to make the task easier.

In the past, if you weren't already aware of attractions that aren't apparent from the highways, you probably passed the place by, continuing to drive 15 minutes north to the Straits of Mackinac and Mackinac Island. These days, with new signs directing you to beaches, parks and marinas, you'll probably make Cheboygan your destination.

You can explore the downtown area, Rivertown, with interesting shops, a wonderful bookstore called the Log Mark, several good restaurants (try the whitefish at Pappas'), convenient spots to pause along the Cheboygan River, and a chamber of commerce below the old-time band shell (complete with restrooms and showers).

Watch the drawbridge in action, stopping traffic along US-23 to allow tall-masted sailboats through, photograph the U.S. Coast Guard cutter Mackinaw (largest icebreaker

on the Great Lakes that's homeported in Cheboygan), and view the frequent ferry boats to and from Bois Blanc island, just offshore.

If you're interested in Lake Huron, drive out to Gordon Turner Park (at the rivermouth) after picking up a sandwich at the Subway Shop (US-23 and M-27, right downtown). If you haven't tried one, the friendly waitresses will explain them to you and make up a monster sandwich to amply satisfy you - after you've walked the interpretive boardwalk and seen the osprey nest and perhaps strolled to the charming lighthouse near fisherman's walkway.

The interpretive walkway has an elevated platform among the cattails and you'll be able to see red-winged blackbirds nesting, swans gliding along the shoreline, and gulls wheeling overhead.

Gordon Turner Park has changing rooms for swimmers, restrooms, picnic tables, and playground equipment for children.

At the mouth of the Cheboygan River, you'll see two lights offshore - Fourteen Foot Shoal Light, built in 1930, and Poe Reef Light, built in 1929 to replace the last of four lightships which had warned sailors of

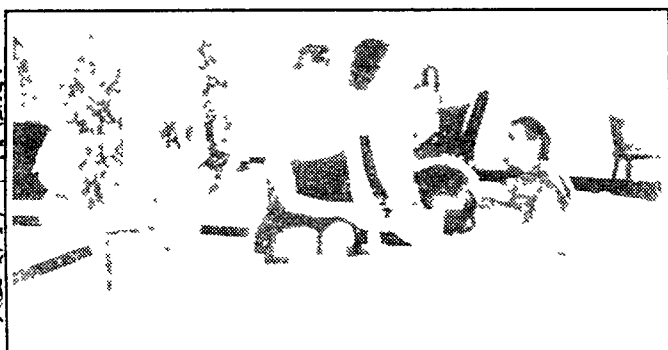

this dangerous reef since 1893.

Upriver, between the river mouth and the drawbridge, is the Cheboygan River Range Front Light, built in 1880. Originally it had a Sixth Order Fresnel lens made in Paris by Henri LePaute, but it now exhibits a pair of locomotive-type headlamps. The building is two stories, gable roofed, with the light tower attached to the dwelling. The lantern housing is six-foot square with a hipped roof.

Berthed nearby, you may see the Grayling or other Coast Guard vessels. Sadly, across the river, the sloop Welcome (a replica of a ship that sailed these waters long ago) lies waiting for a buyer, its timbers in bad condition. It was proudly launched at Mackinaw City in the 1980s and travelers snapped hundreds of photographs of it.

Downtown, you might lunch at the Boathouse Restaurant, outdoors if the weather's good, or, if you're stopping at one of the motels that line the river and provide docking areas, you might cruise to the Hack-Ma-Tack Inn upriver. The turn-of-the-century restaurant provides good food and a glimpse of life long ago. (The restaurant, at 8131 Beebe Road, phone 616-625-2919, can also be reached by road).

You might want to stay in one of the area's two state parks. Cheboygan

State Park off US-23 east of town covers nearly 1200 acres on Lake Huron and provides 78 camp sites, each with electricity, a picnic table, a fire circle and trees. A modern restroom and shower building, with hot water, is centrally located in the campground. There are also three rustic family cabins available by the day or week. Located close to the shoreline of Lake Huron, they offer a unique experience.

The park has several well marked hiking trails, both inside the park and along the shoreline. You might see rare wild flowers, such as the pitcher plant and wild orchids. For additional information, telephone 616-627-2811.

Aloha State Park, located on the shores of Mullett Lake, boats 4,300 feet of lake frontage. You can enjoy walleye fishing, swimming and boating at this 95-acre state park and camp in the 294 site campground. It's located eight miles south of Cheboygan on M-212, off M-33.

If you cruised north in your own vessel, or trailered a boat, you may need marina facilities. The City of Cheboygan Marina features 600 feet of broadside mooring on the Cheboygan River. In the center of the city, the marina has walking distance access to restaurants, shops and lodging as well as restrooms, showers, Please Turn To Page 26

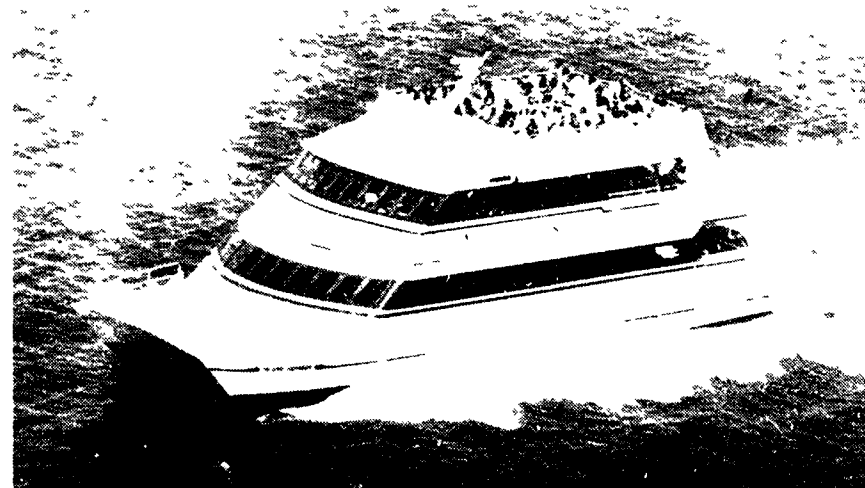

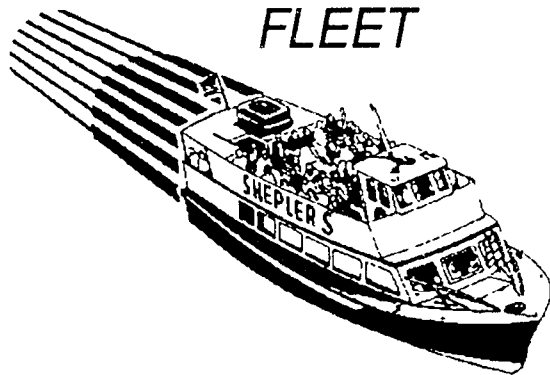

electricity, water, and a harbor master.
Gas and marine repairs are available
through private marinas and boat
yards.

The Cheboygan County Marina,
near the river mouth, has 35 seasonal
and 49 transient boat slips, four launch
ramps, pump-out facilities, restrooms,
showers, gas and diesel fuel,
ship-to-shore radio, a harbor master,
electricity and water as well as special
features such as phone hook-ups at the
dock, cable television and night
security.

If you're a boater, you probably
already know about the Inland

Waterway, running from Lake Huron
to Crooked Lake, near Traverse City.
This 40-odd mile stretch is justly
famous for interesting locks, lovely
homes with manicured lawns to the
water's edge, miles of superb fishing, a
variety of wildlife including swan
families asking for handouts as you
drift by, the 12-mile stretch of Mullett
Lake where boaters and anglers have
plenty of elbow room, shoreline
motels and restaurants with tie-up
facilities, and a sense of quiet and
peacefulness.

While the late 1880s saw
steamboat excursions along the
waterway, today you'll need to have
your own boat or hire one for the day.
Pleasure boats enjoy a channel 30-feet
wide and five-feet deep along the
route. You'll find 17 species of fish,
including trout and bass, perch and
walleye. In the winter, ice fishermen
spear record size sturgeon from the
deep waters of these inland lakes.

If you've packed your golf clubs,
expect some fine courses in the area.
Three public courses, the Cheboygan
Golf and Country Club features an
18-hole championship course and is
home to the Northern Michigan Open.
Mullett Lake Golf and Country Club,
located in Mullett Lake Village, is a
challenging nine-hole course.

In the evening, you might want to
enjoy live theater at Cheboygan's
Opera House (616-627-5841) in
downtown. The restored 1877 theater
once hosted Mary Pickford and Annie
Oakley, and now features pop and
country stars as well as symphony
orchestras. In July, Michigan Opera
Theatre presents "Little Red Riding
Hood" matinee and "Broadway Four"
at 8 p.m. on the 10th. July 24 at 8 p.m.
the National Shakespeare Theatre
presents "The Taming of the Shrew".
Check with the opera house for other
events.

Summer events abound in the
area. In Cheboygan, look for an art
fair in Washington Park July 11, and
the county fair Aug. 1-8. At nearby
Mackinaw City, a Voyageurs
Rendezvous is held July 4-6, and an
antique show Aug. 4.

Contact the Cheboygan Chamber
of Commerce at 616-627-7183, the
Mackinaw Area Tourist Bureau at
616-436-5664 or 1-800-666-0160 for
details and further information.

There's more to the Cheboygan
area than motels, restaurants, marinas

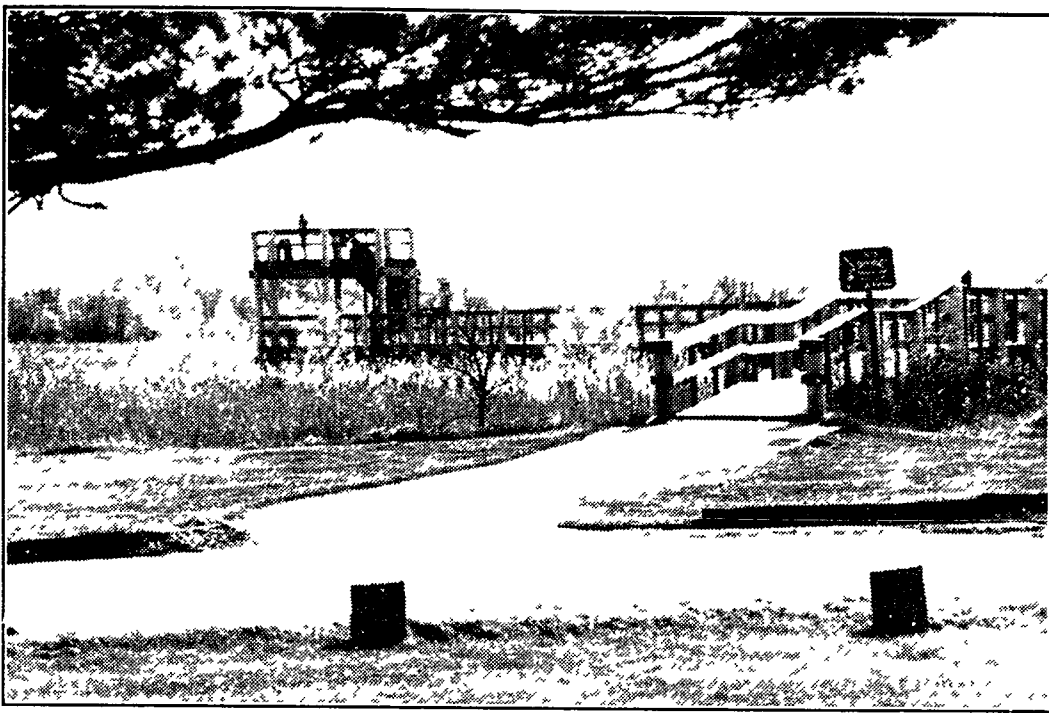

With Windsor, the Canadian city across the river from Detroit, celebrating its 100th birthday this year what better time than this summer to spend a day (or more) antiques in a foreign country?

Located only minutes from Michigan via the Ambassador Bridge or the Detroit-Windsor Tunnel, this city welcomes visitors and offers a variety of antiques experiences. There also are many fine restaurants, some with spectacular views of the river and the Detroit skyline.

In planning a day of antiques and sightseeing in Windsor, I checked with Beverly Cyr, a Windsor coordinator for Questers, an international antiques/preservation study organization, to make sure not to miss the best antique shops. She highly recommended the four chosen

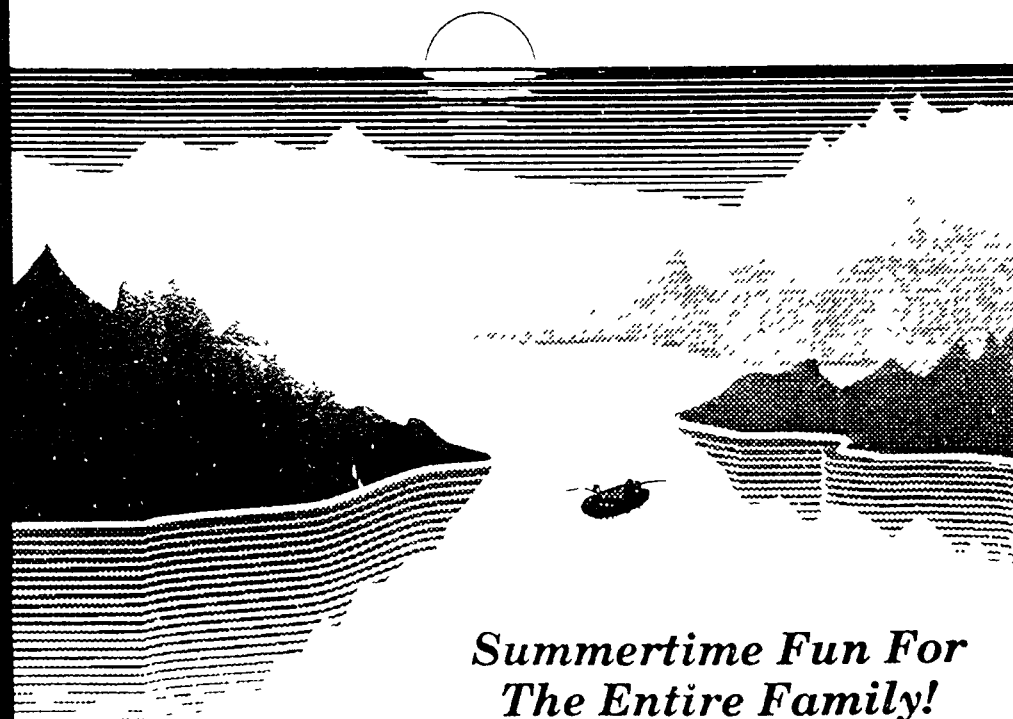
for this tour; she also suggested our outstanding luncheon stop.

Although most visitors who are U.S. citizens have no trouble at the border crossing and are waved on without difficulty, regulations do state that visitors should have proof of citizenship - a birth or baptismal certificate or a passport.

From the bridge take Wyandotte east to Pelissier Street, turning left to our first stop at 256 Pelissier, the shop of *Peter K. Ryan, Ltd.*, an established antiques dealer and authority, in business for 30 years. From the tunnel visitors will take Ouelette Avenue and go west one block to Pelissier, which does not intersect Riverside Drive at the river.

In addition to fine silver, crystal and china, Ryan's shop also offers European objects of art and unusual gifts as well as interior design service. We admired the antique garden pieces

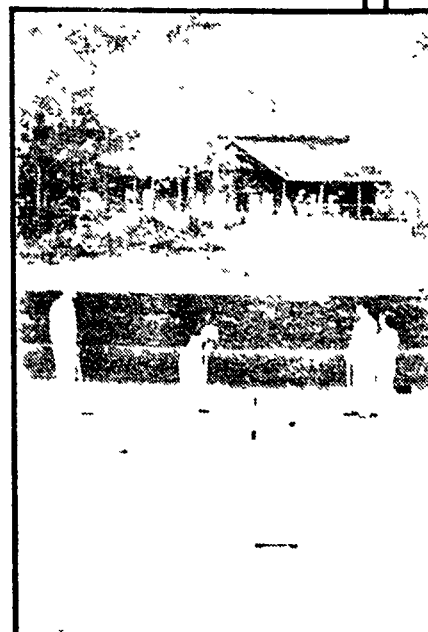

available last month.

One block east in the middle of the 300 block of Ouelette is the long-established *Gold Shop*. The narrow shop of Ian M. Henderson is a landmark on downtown Windsor's main street. For as long as I can remember, I have browsed in the windows, admiring collections of antique jewelry. Last month the Gold Shop offerings included a selection of old gold zodiac charms as well as two eye-catching jade pendants.

Shops along Ouelette feature linens, woolens, jewelry and china.

Many restaurants are in walking distance in this area, including The Old Fish Market at 156 W. Chatham, Tugboat Restaurant right on the river at Riverside and Ouelette, Ye Olde Steak House at 46 W. Chatham and The Auberge with French Canadian specialties at 149 W. Chatham.

However, our recommendation for this outing would be the *Gallery Restaurant* on the third floor of the Art Gallery of Windsor located at 445 W. Riverside Drive. Parking is available behind the gallery.

Open from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Sunday, the restaurant features outstanding views of the Detroit River and Detroit skyline. The moderately-priced menu includes sandwiches, main course

salads and hot entrees. The Caesar salad served here is one of the best I've tasted. It was \$5.95 Canadian. (U.S. money may be exchanged at banks or at the Ontario Travel Information centres to receive about a 15 percent premium.)

Hot entrees included Chicken Cordon Bleu for \$8.25 or traditionally done liver and onions for \$6.95. Leave room for such desserts as chocolate caramel nut flan or an assorted pastry plate with four offerings.

The restaurant has bar service and will reserve river-view tables. For larger groups, reservations are asked. The number is 519-255-7511.

Exhibitions at the Art Gallery of Windsor encompass a range of subjects, themes and periods in history with the "unifying focus on the work of Canadians," curators note. The Rodzik Gallery generally feature work of artists who have worked in the Arctic. Gallery tours are available Tuesday through Friday and should be booked well in advance by calling 519-258-7111.

Don't leave without browsing in the Art Gallery's *Uncommon Market Gift Shop* located on the first floor. It features work of Canadian designers and craftspeople and has an exclusive collection of Inuit art. Many of the items will not be found elsewhere. The shop is open the same hours as the

restaurant, except on Sunday when it opens at 1 p.m.

To continue our antiquing tour, travel south on Ouelette Avenue to the end of the 1500 block to Hanna, turning right to *The Olde Shop* of Gerta Wagner at 134 Hanna.

Quester Beverly Cyr's recommendation of this shop was seconded by the staff at Peter K. Ryan's who emphasized how "very reputable" this dealer is. The Olde Shop is sought out for fine china, crystal and jewelry. Hours are 1 to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday. To be sure the shop is open it's a good idea to call ahead. The number is 519-254-7225.

Final shop on our Windsor tour is for Oriental antiquing at the *Japanese Shop* of David Pepper. It is reached by traveling east back on Riverside Drive through town, making a right turn at the end of the

Peabody railroad bridge onto Devonshire. The shop is three blocks up at 709 Devonshire in a handsome yellow brick house. David Pepper opens by appointment, which he gladly arranges. Number is 519-254-4363.

He relates that his interest in Japan as a teenager in 1959 resulted in three visits there and, eventually, opening the shop three years ago.

On display are laquer trays, dolls and temple lamps.

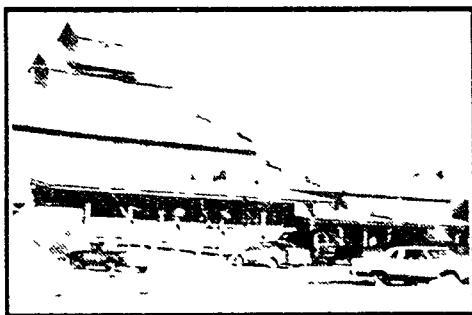

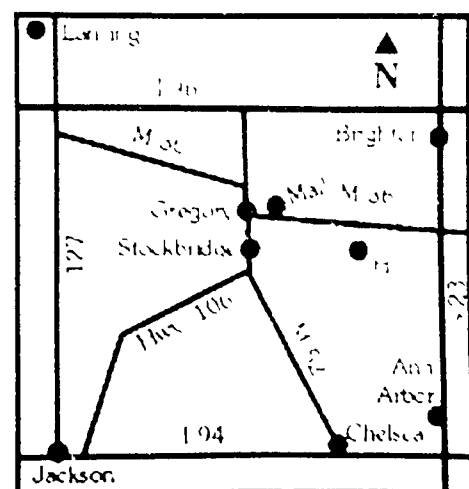

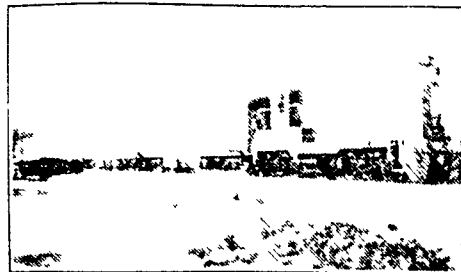

originals. An 1890 bird print caught our eye. His collection also includes silk kimonos. We've seen these displayed as striking wallhangings.

To finish our day tour, continue along Devonshire a few blocks to Old St. Mary's Gate Church opposite Willistead Manor, built in 1904-1906 in the historic area known as Walkerville by Edward Chandler Walker, second son of Hiram Walker, founder of the world-famous distillery.

From 1943 until 1975, the Art Gallery of Windsor was located in the Willistead Manor. After it was moved to its present location in a former brewery warehouse, restoration of the mansion was undertaken from 1978-1981.

Architect for the manor house, coach house and the gate house was noted Detroit Albert Kahn. Designed in 16th century Tudor-Jacobean style of an English manor house, the main structure was begun in 1904 with no expense spared. The exterior gray limestone from nearby Amherstburg was cut on the site by Scottish stonemasons imported for the project.

Tours may be arranged to view the Great Hall with its Elizabethan

fireplace and great staircase of oak, the dining and drawing rooms and the conservatory as well as the morning room, billiard room and library. For information, call Windsor Department of Parks & Recreation, Willistead Manor, 519-255-6545.

But for our one-day trip, do drive by the Willistead properties and St. Mary's churchyard across the street on Niagara where Edward Walker was buried after his death in 1915, having lived in the manor only nine years. Five years later, his widow, Mary Walker, and other heirs deeded Willistead to the Town of Walkerville. Upon amalgamation in 1935, it became part of Windsor.

Even from the outside, it's possible to envision a way of life enjoyed in the past by a very few. It's the kind of view antiquers can imagine existing in 100-year-old Windsor.

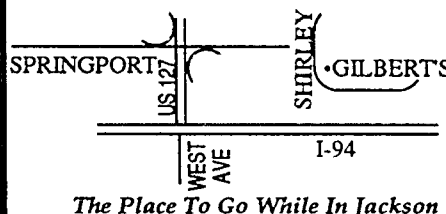

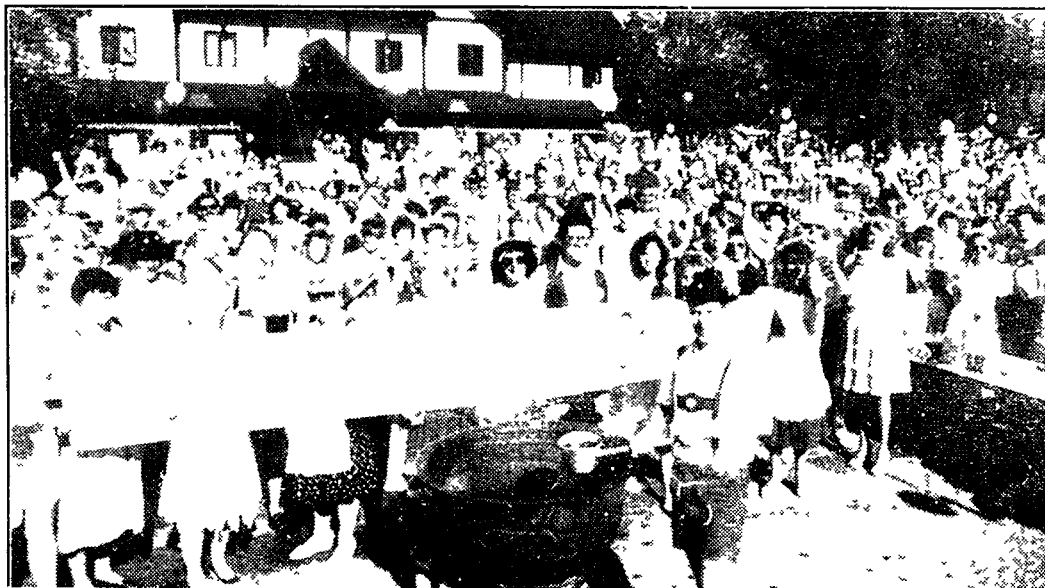

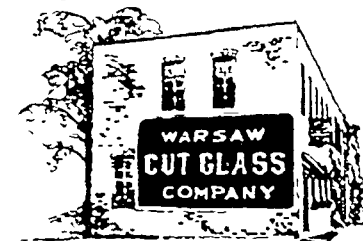

Guests at the Cragwood Inn bed and breakfast live like the richest man in town. The replacement value of this opulent home, commissioned by a banker who truly was the town's wealthiest citizen, is now put at a cool \$3 million.

Built in 1903, this three-story Queen Anne style manse measures 50 feet high to its turrets and widow's walk, has four stone wrap-around porches, and more leaded, beveled and stained glass windows than

Stars turn out for AIDS awareness special

Advertising profits go to charity

This spring, tennis star Arthur Ashe felt media pressure to go public with information about his own health that he had kept private for four years: He is infected with the HIV virus, which leads to AIDS.

By keeping his own counsel, Ashe had hoped his life would not be overshadowed by AIDS. Yet only weeks after his forced announcement, he is a participant in a television special conceived to focus attention on the disease. "In a New Light," airing Saturday, July 11, on ABC, is a star-studded, emotional appeal to individuals to take part in the fight against AIDS.

"In a New Light," as executive producer Joe Lovett points out, is a new approach to AIDS education and fundraising. The special features a variety of performers calculated to appeal to all audiences — from Anita Baker, Paul Rodriguez and Clint Black to Carol Burnett, Joel Grey and Dustin Hoffman. Some sing or give dramatic readings; all offer personal reflections on the impact of AIDS in their lives. They are not always eloquent, but they wage a war of attrition on our emotional defenses. Their backdrop is the AIDS Memorial Quilt, which now includes some 20,000 panels representing one tenth of those who have died in this country from the disease.

Lovett did not set out to make this special. The former "20/20" producer, who worked on a series of AIDS reports in his years with that

program, was — and is — producing a documentary about "Heart Strings," a touring musical show that gives audiences a sense of the spiritual toll of being or loving a person with AIDS. But "Heart Strings," with its cast of unknowns, was turned down by ABC's prime-time chief, Robert Iger, when his late-night counterpart Don Beuth approached him with the idea. It needs stars, Iger reportedly said.

Fourteen months later, "In a New Light" is packed with stars, beginning with Elizabeth Taylor, who briefly introduces the show, and Linda Lavin, Robert Guillaume and Bruce Davison, who are its hosts. A celebrity edition of "Heart Strings" was staged in February and taped for the special.

According to Lovett, everyone involved has been more than generous. Barry Manilow paid all costs associated with his appearance, including musicians' salaries. Gloria Estefan is allowing two of her songs, "Coming Out of the Dark" and "Get on Your Feet," to be "repositioned" in viewers' minds as themes for AIDS awareness. There's even film footage of Disney's "The Little Mermaid" and "Beauty and the Beast" in a tribute to the late lyricist Howard Ashman.

With star power to spare, "In a New Light" was offered to advertisers at full rates, and ABC has earmarked the show's net profits for an AIDS charity.

In its two hours, the special offers a number of messages. First, there's no reason for anyone not already infected ever to contract the disease; its spread can be halted through changed behavior alone. Second, it's a subject people need to talk about, not hide from. (In an ice-

breaking comedy routine, Andrea Martin puts a condom over her foot.) Third, women contract the virus more readily from men than men do from women. Worldwide, half of all AIDS patients are female. Fourth, children are at risk, not only for prenatal transmission but through prostitution, which preys on ever younger recruits because they are more likely to be healthy.

Two toll-free telephone numbers will be provided during the show. Both are hotlines of the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. The first directs callers with general questions, while the second is a source of information about government drug studies available to those already infected with HIV. With only 40 operators to respond, however, viewers are asked to write down the numbers and phone in later. Though Lovett applauds the government agency's involvement in his show, the phone bank is a meager commitment to a quarter billion citizens.

For all the party atmosphere, brave smiles and star turns of "In a New Light," one stark fact remains: We live in an age of complete disclosure, when no detail of life is too personal or private to be hidden from the camera's eye. As Arthur Ashe discovered, our appetite for such information is insatiable; we do not even wish to go to the movies without knowing the background and personal habits of the stars. It seems an age of idolatry, but it is an age of distrust. We dare trust no one; our very lives are at stake if we do. In this way, at least, AIDS has affected all of us.

'Sesame Street' teaches in day care

In hopes of offering preschoolers a little more sustenance than cookies and Kool-Aid, North Texas public television station KERA launched the Preschool Education Program (PEP) Initiative in the spring of 1990.

Using *Sesame Street* episodes in a structured, video lesson plan, over 700 day-care and home-care facilities in the Dallas area are now entering their third year of PEP. Based on their success, 123 other public television stations have followed suit.

Ralph Rogers, president of the Dallas Foundation of Health, Education and Research and founding father of PBS, has fronted the project since its inception, noting that "the first five years are the most important in children's lives. If we can make a difference in those years... we will have helped them realize their potential."

To cultivate this potential, PEP providers read to the children and supervise fun projects that reinforce

social, verbal and problem-solving skills. Supplementing (but not supplanting) the usual day-care drill of playtime, snacks and naps with enjoyable video lessons and stimulating activities, PEP allows kids to be kids while offering an exciting new resource to adults who hope to influence their future for the better.

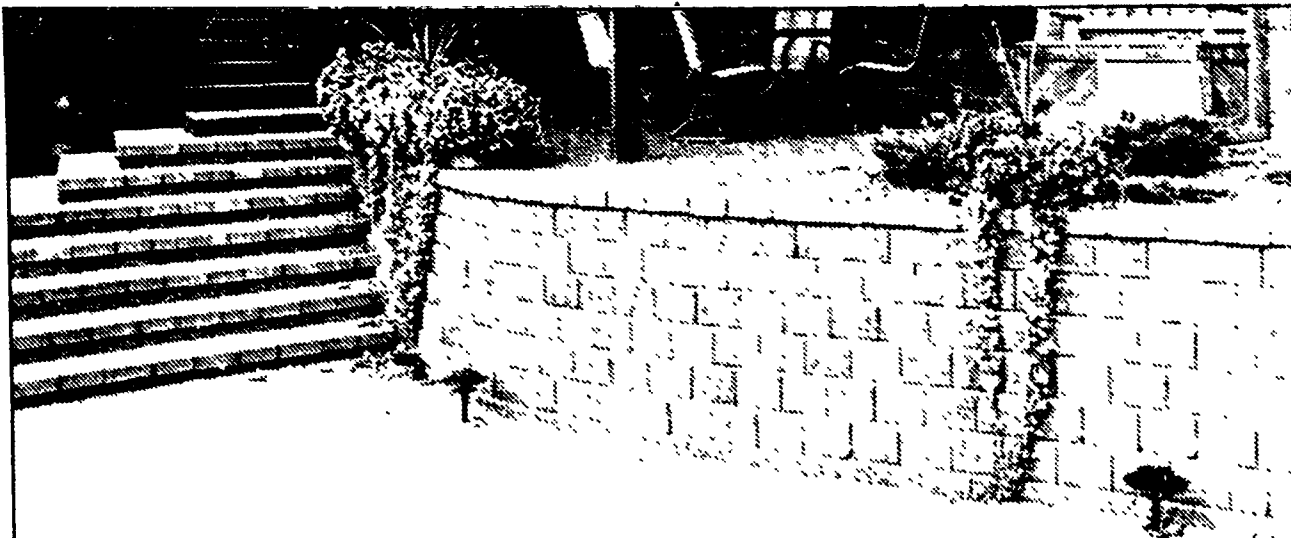

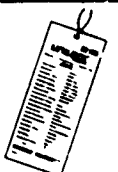

Western swing lives in tribute to Bob Wills

Texas Playboys reunite for two-part concert

When country and western music underwent a progressive renaissance during the mid-'70s in Texas, mighty efforts were made to shake up the complacent "Nashville Sound" and introduce new elements of musical and personal style. But while those "outlaw" performers distanced themselves from the rhinestone suits, they clung fast to the legacy of the rebel innovators who came before them. As Waylon Jennings sang in his song of the time, "It don't matter who's in Austin, Bob Wills is still the king."

The bridge between the two camps is once more safe to tread, for The Nashville Network's Lone Star import, *The Texas Connection*, pays tribute to the creator of western swing with a salute to Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys, airing in two parts on Saturday, July 4 and 11.

Host Jerry Jeff Walker welcomes Wills' brother Luke and former Texas Playboys including Johnny Gimble, Joe Ferguson, Smokey Dacus, Joe Ferguson, Buddy Spicher, Herb Remington, Leon Rausch and Tommy Allsup for a concert of songs popularized by the late Wills and his band. Ray Benson, Floyd Domino and Chris O'Connell of Asleep at the Wheel, a band that continues to perform Bob Wills songs, also join in on stage.

A native Texan, Wills was an established professional fiddler in 1933 when he formed Bob Wills and the Playboys in Waco, Texas. After moving to Tulsa, Okla., the band's name was changed to the Texas Playboys. (One of Wills' trademark songs, "Take Me Back to Tulsa," was first known as "Take Me Back to Texas" during this Oklahoma stay.) Wills continually refined his band, adding new players and new instruments such as drums and horns, which were unheard of in country music at the time. His Texas Playboys became a national sensation, selling many records, appearing on radio and in movies. By the early '40s, people across the country knew his catch phrase "Ah, ha! San Antone."

After his death in 1975, the bands that Bob built reunited here and there, most using the name Texas Playboys.

Ray Benson says that western swing is "essentially a cross between popular swing music of the day and a cowboy band instrumentation." Wills "really kept an element of grit or funk or realness in his music, because a lot of western swing slicked up the music. Bob always had that raw blues feel to his music," Benson says.

Fiddler Johnny Gimble, who joined the Texas Playboys in 1949, defines the style as "happy, good time music. Even when you play a sad song like 'Faded Love' it's got a beat that makes you want to dance. It's a dance beat — makes you want to pat your foot and grin."

Besides leaving behind cherished standards like "San Antonio Rose" (which Gimble says was a simple Wills reworking of "The Spanish Two-Step"), Wills was responsible for hundreds of musicians having the title of "former Texas Playboy" because of his perpetual reorganization. The best of the survivors were gathered for the *Texas Connection* concert, and it's obvious they're still touched by that Bob Wills magic. As Gimble says, "He (Wills) had such charisma, when he'd step on stage the band turned on and played twice as good as it'd been playing."

McEnroe serves court commentary

As a player, John McEnroe earned a reputation for brashness and irreverence — some would say insufferable egotism — on the court. The same qualities that made him one of the most controversial athletes of the 1980s are making him the latest star of the broadcast booth.

When McEnroe joins Dick Enberg in the booth for the Wimbledon lawn tennis tournament this week, his performance will be scrutinized almost as closely as that of Grand Slam hopeful Jim Courier. Earlier this month, McEnroe received high marks for his debut commentary at the French Open.

"Being on the court and being in the booth are two totally different things," the 33-year-old says, admitting "the call doesn't mean nearly as much when it's someone else."

With Jimmy Connors failing to show the same aggressiveness as a commentator as he does as a player and Chris Evert's sharp tongue dulled somewhat since she returned from maternity leave, the door was open for McEnroe, who now has a two-year contract with The USA Network and a three-year deal with NBC.

"With this ... deal, I can see if I like broadcasting and if it likes me" he says with the familiar self-confidence. "I can see myself doing this for 10 or 15 years, but if after three years they feel a change is needed, we can do that and I'll just go on to something else."

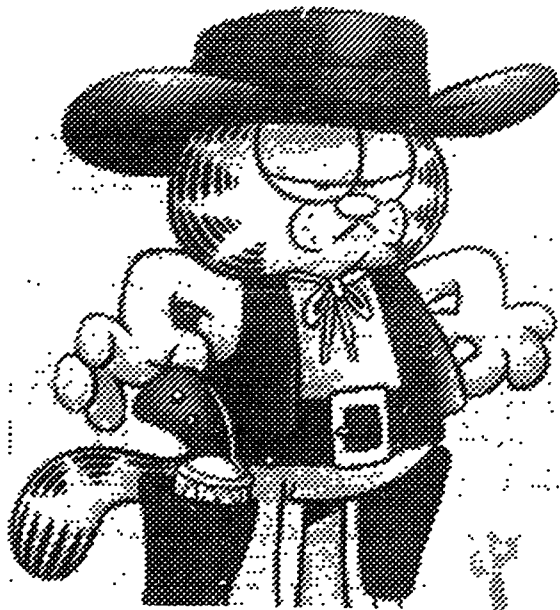
