Latest denial may send flap into court

A Novi resident lost another round at Northville City Hall Wednesday, as the city's Board of Zoning Appeals rejected her request to overturn city approval of the Pheasant Hills subdivision.

Laura Lorenzo blames flooding of her Galway Drive property on undersized culverts under Pheasant Hills roadways. She has charged the city's building department with allowing an undersized culvert under Mill Pond Court in violation of city

Her appearance before the BZA was the latest move in a year-long battle against the city and Singh Development, builder of Pheasant Hills.

The move failed when the board yoted 5-1 to reject her request. She plans to appeal the BZA decision in circuit court.

Lorenzo had sought an admini-strative review of the development and building permits issued for Pheasant Hills, contending that the subdivision does not comply with the ordinance's Article 19 on flood ha-

One of the stated objectives of Article 19 is "to preserve the ability of floodplains to carry and discharge a base (100-year) flood."

City Attorney Richard Connors argued that Article 19 does not apply to Pheasant Hills.

When the interpretation of Article 19 was made by the engineering company, and the engineers determined that Article 19 did not apply, then they fell back to the next regulation that would apply, which were Oakland County Drain Commission requirements . . . which required the culvert to carry a 10-year flood," Con-

The intent is to protect public health, welfare and structures," he told Lorenzo. Your structure has

never been in danger of flooding."

The BZA seemed swayed by the city's expert testimony more than Lorenzo's appeal.

"Just because it was not designed to meet the requirements of a 100-year flood doesn't mean that the flood carrying capacity was not taken into consideration," said Chairperson Charles Ayers.

Resident protests documents' price

The price of city documents is too steep for one Novi homeowner.

Laura Lorenzo, who has argued for a year that the city improperly approved culverts at Singh Develop-ment's Pheasant Hills subdivision that cause flooding on her property, recently requested several related documents from the city under the state's Freedom of Information Act.

She was shocked when the city set a \$103.37 fee for collecting the 48 doments, and chose not them.

The Freedom of Information Act establishes procedures to give citizens access to government docu-ments. The act also allows a public body to charge a fee "limited to the actual mailing costs, and the actual incremental cost of duplication or pu-blication including labor, the cost of search, examination (and) review. . .

The Novi homeowner filed her Freedom of Information request with Northville May 26. She asked for copies of notices to adjacent communities and the state's Department of

City accuses man of illegal business

Complaints that a Grasmere resident runs a landscaping business from his home have prompted the Northville City Council to consider tightening city ordinances, and landed the homeowner in court.

Farmington attorney Allen C. Ingle, who owns the home at 47115 Grasmere, reportedly has allowed a landscaping firm to be run from the property for at least two years. The

resulting activity — piles of dirt and wood chips, pallets of brick pavers, parking of cars in the street and storage of a trailer on the property — has prompted a string of complaints from neighbors and several warning letters and citations from the city.

Ingle denies running a landscaping business from the home, but said his son Martin does operate a lawn maintenance business. Ingle said employees of his son's business regu-

Northville City Hall does not have either name registered as a city business, though firms located in the city are required by ordinance to register at city hall.

Natural Resources that the waterway through Pheasant Hills was going to be altered, and a description of the

extent of alterations. Northville City Manager Gary Word wrote Lorenzo that the request could not be filled within the five-day period specified by the Freedom of Information Act, so he extended it by the allowed 10 business days.

He also warned Lorenzo that she would be charged "reasonable costs associated with the request," as allowed under the act.

Lorenzo does not believe the city's fee is reasonable. "I thought it was not only unreasonable, I thought it was outrageous," she said.

Building Inspector Joe Attard said the city's fee is for copying 44 sheets of paper at 25 cents aplece and four line drawings at \$2 apiece, and for 31/4 hours of a clerk's staff time at \$22.50 per hour.

On an annual basis, that hourly clerk's wage represents a \$46,800 salary, nearly \$9,000 more than chief clerk Cathy Konrad's top salary before she left city hall.

My instructions were from our city attorney; he was the one that set the fee," Attard said.

Even so, Attard described the fees

as "very, very reasonable." Attard added that the city has always worked hard to respond to Lorenzo's concerns. "I don't think we have mistreated that woman whatsoever . . . We bent over backwards for her," he said.

As an example, Attard said he recently compiled a thick packet of information on Lorenzo's situation, used to brief the city's Board of Zoning Appeals before Lorenzo argued her case before the board Wednesday.

Pioneer home may take trip

Pioneer matriarch Sally Thornton might not recognize her modest clapboard farmhouse, if it's finally moved about two miles away from its current location, renovated and enlarged.

Owner Bill Garfield is hoping that he'll catch the spirit of old-time Novi if he succeeds in placing the house. which he calls a jewel, in its proposed new setting at Eleven Mile and Taft

He unveiled his updated plans for the home and asked for moral support at a June 22 Novi City Council

meeting.
The little 1830s-era building made local history - again - just two years ago, when a new group, *Friends of the Sally Thornton House, surfaced to save it from possible destruction.

While the group was sniffing about to find an alternative location for the structure - now on I-beams on Nine Mile Road at Novi Road — Garfield purchased it for an insubstantial sum from owner Irwin Arkin.

Arkin, reluctant to tear down this piece of local history, had spent several years trying to find a taker so he could use the land.

We feel this house is a gem of Novi's history. Way out in the wilderness, Sally Thornton had the thoughtfulness to create a beautiful house like this that architecturally still is remarkable," Garfield said.

Designs by Northville architect Gregory Presley call for enlarging the house to 3,000 square feet by extending it out from the rear and sides, in-

cluding the addition of a garage. In November 1990, Garlield had hoped to create a mini-subdivision with a historic ambiance. Old Novi Village, on six acres on Eleven Mile Road, east of Taft Road.


His partner withdrew financing due to a business downturn, Garfield told the Novi council. After a successful search for a new partner, he's talking about placing two Greek Revival-style homes on just under four of the acres.

The companion residence to the Thornton house would either be another historic house or a replica of one. A 200-foot gravel drive, lined with trees would lead to the houses.

People would turn off of Eleven Mile and move right back into the 19th century," Garfield said.

Garfield says he plans to move the house to the new home as soon as he gets the needed variance from the

The council has told us to do ev-

erything we can to help somebody preserve that house. We should consider that," City Manager Edward Kriewall told the council.

However, Kathy Mutch, founder of "Friends of the Sally Thornton House," said that speaking as a private resident, she felt the residence's historical value should not guide the city's decision on variances.

*Even the most worthy preservation plan should not be encouraged at the expense of community planning," Mutch said.

Garsield, a Realtor, is no newcomer to historic preservation. With his sons, he owns Garfield Building Company, in downtown Northville, which has restored a number of historic commercial and residential properties in this city.

He has a sentimental attachment

to the Novi house — it was once owned by his high school sweetheart's family, direct descendants of Sally Thornton.

Community colleges get similar aid

Michigan's two-year colleges are keeping their fingers crossed for a successful property tax drive Aug. 4 at Wayne County Community College.

If voters say yes to a 1-mill tax increase, WC3, the only community college district in the state without a local tax, would no longer be able to draw a special \$7.2 million subsidy from Lansing.

That \$7.2 million would help us all," said Schoolcraft College Vice President A.B. (Butch) Raby. "Of course, they (state legislators) don't say they will redistribute that to us."

For years state lawmakers have threatened to cut out WC3's special \$10-million subsidy that none of the other 28 community colleges received. Last year they cut \$1 million.

This fiscal year, a joint Senate-House conference appropriations committee cut \$2 million more, leaving \$7.2 million. (WC3 still gets a general fund appropriation of \$14 million like all the

Otherwise, state aid to community colleges is almost flat -\$240 million for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 versus \$241 million in the current

That's about equal to the state aid Michigan State University gets.

*Pretty slim pickin's, * said Oakland Community College VP Tony Jarson, who argues there's actually a hidden cut in the bill.

The worst part, if you look at our budget, is

what they did with retirement. "Ayear ago, we paid 9 percent of base salaries to retirement. In fiscal 1991-2, they (state) raised

that to 11.2 percent. As of Oct. 1, 1992, it goes to 12.03 percent. This is a \$1.2-million cost increase. We're do-

ing worse than two years ago.

The only segment of the budget that got nailed

with these increases is community colleges.

Schoolcraft's Raby was pleased that the final state aid figure was about what officials at the northwestern Wayne County college anticipated. "We knew it would be 1 to 1.5 percent," he said.

to \$8.7 million. "at-risk" students, Raby said.

The Legislature voted a 1.65-percent increase — There's also a restricted grant of \$163,000 for

Schoolcraft this year raised tuition per credit by \$3.50 to \$40 for residents and by \$4.50 to \$60 for non-residents. Total budget is \$31.4 million.

'Our property tax revenue will go up 1 percent - just new construction," because of the property assessment freeze, Raby said, referring to the oneyear moratorium the Legislature voted on raising property assessments to meet real estate inflation.

The new state budget will send OCC \$17 million, which on paper is a \$300,000 increase, not counting the pension cost increase.

"We also got the property tax freeze," said

OCC has raised tuition per credit hour by \$2 to \$41 for residents and by \$4 to \$69 for nonresidents.

Total OCC budget will be \$69.5 million, with less than 25 percent coming from state aid. "State aid used to be the biggest part of our budget." Jarson said.

"And we're not counting out an Engler executive order (mid-year cut in appropriations by the governor, permissible under the state constitution). We were exempt from an executive order last year. Jarson said.

Fire Safety

Local department marks a century of service

The heritage and traditions of our community are special, and that includes the fire department. The Village of Northville was organized on March 13, 1867, and it appears that in the earliest days there was no organized Fire

The village founders, however, did not completely ignore the problem presented by fire. Among the first ordinances adopted by the Village Trustees in April of 1867 was one entitled "In Relation to Fire," which provided that "every occupant of buildings on lots in said Village are required and ordered to keep constantly on hand ready for use three good pails and one ladder.

As the community grew, however, it became necessary to organize a dedicated firefighting force. The first Northville Fire Chief, Mr. A.M. Whitehead, looked back on the foundings of that department in a 1931 newspaper article: We got together way back in 1890 some time and decided to get some equipment and organize an efficient force." And so about 30 local citizens stepped forward and volunteered to operate the new equipment, which consisted of a 60-gallon, two-wheel, horse-drawn chemi-

Many local residents have stepped forward since then to take their place. But just as now they were a dedicated, if varied lot. Northville's earliest fire fighters included Peter Barley, described as Chief Whitehead's "reliable hydrant man. Joe Montgomery's prized team of horses was used to pull Northville's first fire rig. And A.K. Dolph, in addition to serving on the fire department, ran for Village Trustee on the ticket of "Workingman's Party."

When not working to protect the village from fire, Northville's early fire department seems to have been a focus of social life. The oldest known piece of memorabilia from the department is a 1891 invitation to a dance sponsored by the Fire Department. And one of the earliest references to the Department in The Northville Record is a Feb. 4, 1892, article describing the success of the "Fireman's Hop," at which 125 people were in attendance at the skating rink after having enjoyed a supper served by Carter Cady at his restaurant.

There were also fires to fight in those early days, per-

haps none more spectacular, or spectacularly described, than the Globe Company fire in the early morning hours of April 30, 1899. The factory, which employed about 200

people, was struck by lightning at around 3 a.m. In the style of the day, the fire and the efforts to contain it were described by The Northville Record in heroic prose: 'Nestled away among the hills, the village lay sleeping like a child in its mother's arms. The night was exceedingly dark, as if the sable goddess had drawn her somber curtains still closer about her ebony throne to more jealously and most dreaded, was now upn them. The factory building of the Globe Furniture Company had been struck by

Once it looked as if the boys were going to check it but the heavy pressure bursted a section of the hose and while it was being fixed the water was shut off from the hydrant and before it was turned on again the flames had bursted out anew and gradually the men were forced back inch by inch until they were assured everything was doomed and they gave their attention to saving the ajoining property.

"It was a great fight. The firemen and citizens put up the battle of their lives, many laboring until they were completely exhausted. They could not save the factory but their efforts were crowned with a measure of success, for unquestionably their labor saved all the adjoining buildings of not only the Globe company but the Argo mills and many residences as well."

Fortuanately, modern construction and firefighting techniques have reduced the threat of conflagration that was of such concern to our ancestors. But there are still such stories to tell, as firefighters continue their efforts to protect their communities from fire.

A business owner who fails to register can be subject to a \$500 fine and/or 90 days in jail. City officials have not attempted to charge Ingle under this provision of the

Allen Ingle has been charged with violating other city ordinances.

He has been ordered to appear in 35th District Court at 9 a.m. July 7, in front of Judge John Garber, to face three charges: running a business out of his home, parking a trailer in his driveway more than 72 hours, and leaving tall grass and a pile of concrete in his back yard.

Under each of the ordinance violations, the homeowner could be assessed a \$500 fine and the city's costs to prosecute the case, and imprisoned for 90 days.

A defiant Ingle said he looks forward to his day in court.

"There's going to be a jury trial on it anyway, because I'm tired of horsing around with the city," he said. There's going to be a showdown."

The council is also considering recommendations made by Building Inspector Joe Attard in a June 12 memo, to revise city ordinances to crack down on such violations in the future. Attard recommended that wording be added to the city's home occupation ordinance to exclude the outside storage of equipment like

lawn mowers, snow plows and cement mixers. The ordinance as written allows (too) much leeway as evidenced by the condition of the

Grasmere property," he wrote.

The city's trailer parking ordinance, which allows loading and unloading for 72 hours, should be revised to exclude general utility trail-

Republicans square off for commission seat Incumbent Breen hopes to continue his service

Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen, who holds the 10th District seat, faces three Republican challengers in the Aug. 4 primary

A part-time attorney, until last year Breen was the long-serving Plymouth Township supervisor. He gave up that post and ran unopposed for the county commission when Susan Heintz took a new job as director of Gov. John Engler's southeast Michigan office. As Plymouth supervisor he was instrumental in developing the controversial Western Townships Utilities Authority sewer project. which he described as a worthwhile and necessary approach to meeting the area's sewer needs.

He believes he's done a good job in office his first year on the commission and hopes voters will return him to a full term in the county seat.

As the incumbent, Breen has come under fire recently from one political opponent for his involvement in the sale of land in Plymouth Township while he was township supervi-

sor. Breen answers the charge by saying he abstained from the vote on the rezoning of the land in question and made his conflict of interest a matter of the public record.

Why are you running again? Because it's there. I've been there one year and I think I've done a fair job of representation and I've learned body there who knows the way around the system and has the ability to enter into procedural-type things as well as the substantive issues that

What do you see are some of the biggest issues facing the county in the upcoming years?

The budget issue is always an ongoing problem. The various demands on the budget revenues from the various interest groups within the county. Given that you have 43 communities in the county with Detroit being the largest, it has approximately 50 percent of the population. but it has an influence on the commission that is disproportionate according to the representation set up. So there is always a great demand to take more of the county revenues and put them in this special program that (is) designed to help and lead Detroit.

It is a difficult issue because there are so many different demands, it is an impossibility to fund them all, so you have a problem of sorting out structural problems that have to be taken care of in order to maintain of desire to help Detroit but at the same time not destroy the basic structure. That's a great difficulty.

You said that Detroit a disproportionate representation. Would you like to see a different system if you were elected?

I say it is disproportionate simply because the way the districts are set up currently. You have basically nine commissioners that kind of float around and have Detroit interests and Detroit representation. It is difficult.

You say do I want different representation - No, it is just that it is a difficult situation of trying to allocate resources. That is a problem and with that is the reputation that Wayne County has an infrastructure problem, especially in roads. Roads are in terrible shape. Simply there are not enough dollars there to take care of it all.

Would you favor a regional transportation system as one means of reconstructing the road system?

My position on regionalism is fairly popular. Regionalism by itself will not solve any problems, but regional-

the system. I think it is in the best interests of the district to have some-of desire to help Detroit but at the sim is a good administrative concept if in fact you can come up with some way to make a region out of it. Right now we can't do it. We can't do it without the cooperation from Detroit. It's

a major player. If you could do that, then yes, I would favor regional transporation. How far I think it should go — I don't think anybody has a good handle on it. You go out to Macomb County; they have different demands. Same with Oakland County, because your roads are so much different, the question becomes: Can you meet all

What have you done for Northville residents since taking the (county commission) seat?

the different demands?

I consider myself to be an ombudsman, if you will, in terms of representing the district. I try to work with the elected officials to the extent that I contact them and ask them: Is there something that you want Wayne County to be doing that you are not able to do yourself, or something you don't want to do yourself? I've related to the people in the elected office and made myself available to them. And tried to represent their points of view,

and Ive done it through the Conference of Western Wayne, and everybody that belongs to that, as well as individual contact.

Talk about being the only Republican on the commission. How do you deal with that? Does it handcuff you and the communities you represent?

I don't think it handcuffs the communities in terms of getting any-thing. No. I think the only handcuff is that you don't get to be the commission chair. So you have less chance to initiate types of actions that get your name on press releases and that type of thing. So I think it is a political handculf, but only from that sense.

But the other part of it is, I don't think a one-party system is good. I think it is healthy for them to have at least one (Republican), because I work well with people but at the same time they recognize there is a different philosophy which I am able to respond to.

The answer isn't tax increasing. Our communities have always been that way. We have moderate taxes

Downes wants to push economic development



have problems, especially if you have the urban problems of Detroit. That has forced a lot of businesses to leave the county . . . The problem is we don't have class A roads.... There is no magic bullet, but that is what the county needs to compete with our surrounding counties; we have to offer the same service those counties

I think the county commission in essence is a mini-Congress. Over the course of the years their (commissioners) pay has escalated. I document that fringe benefits have increased 29 percent from 1989 to 1990. I think essentially they work part-time, collect full-time pay, have lease cars, have an office both downtown and in their district. And essentially offer no leadership for the county or no programs or no sugges-

tions about what needs to be done. In turn they'll (let) Ed McNamara have his project at the airport, which I think has some considerable merit to it, and their end of the bargain is he looks the other way when they have

It is exactly what happened. Although in Breen's case it was different, because he wasn't challenged

There is also the consideration if you go through his records you'll find a nice \$625 contribution from (County Executive Ed) McNamara's Band . . . I know how the system works. I don't necessarily like it, but that's how it works. And they could just do that - they did just do it and they get away with it. So far.
If you are elected, what do you

How do you think the sale was handled in terms of business between the county and the township?

It seemed like it went all right. It's the county that didn't work too well with the township, it seems to me, because there is still the fight over the tax dollars that (township officials) feel like they are being cheated out of.

And one of the things that they could have done to that was to say that if he does default on it, then they could have said that the township can have some of it or they could have worked out a cut between the down payment he put up . . . But I don't think the township and the county

a business person comes into play

Yes, because like I said before. when you are in business for yourself you get the most done for the cheapest amount of money spent. When you are a public authority there is no incentive for them to save money. The more they spent the more they'll tax you. Just like a utility company they don't either. They just get higher rates. And they need some people on there (on the commission) who are used to running corporations. That's why I'm a firm believer in privatizing a lot of the operations the county's got.

Like what? Like they are talking right now about a contract next month for privatizing the maintenance and cleanup on the expressways. Granted, the contractor will pay higher per hour. per man, but he gets more work out of him. They are used to pushing their

people because if he (the contractor) doesn't get it done for the price he bids, it comes out of his pocket. If the county doesn't get it done for what they say they will, they just raise your

What do you think you will be able to do for the Northville district as a county commissioner representing the area?

I would hope personally to keep their property taxes down. Because it's (tax increases) going to happen in the Plymouth, Livonia and Northville areas: At the rate the taxes keep going up the young generation won't be able to buy a house here and live in these areas. I know what it costs to live in Northville and Plymouth, and you start adding \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year in property taxes - Well, that's bigger than your house payments. They've got to come up with an alternative method of taxation. Of course I'm a believer in the sales tax. Then everybody pays. Get rid of property

Do you support or oppose the .5-mill tax increase on the ballot for indigent health care?

I'm a firm believer in that. Because you have to respect the older people. Of course, unfortunately, I'm getting up there in age too. Some people can't afford to have care but they shouldn't be thrown out into the streets because of it. The state, the county, and the city should take care of them. Out of respect for their age.

What is your opinion of the way the sale of the county's property here in Northville was handled between the two governments?

Well I never did think that was very fair or the right way to handle it. The county put up very little money up for it and it (the deal) was dependent on getting a whole bunch of federal funds. And what they did was take an option on the purchase for 300,000 bucks. Since that time I think they've reneged on their option and that's fine, because the developer couldn't put the money up. They shouldn't have let it be that big a parcel. I believe in controlling the growth because this is the last growth area -Northville, Plymouth and up to Ann Arbor. This area is the last growth area in all of Wayne County and it should be controlled. But I don't think one builder should do that by

What would you like to see happen down there and how should the county government get involved in some of the offers?

They should take maybe three to four hundred acres at a time. And if you do this one right and things look good, then you do the next four hundred acres. It is just sad that they let all those buildings down on Five Mile deteriorate down to nothing. It gradually decayed just like a cancer, letting those beautiful buildings just

go to waste. It could have made a heck of a senior citizens complex out there. In fact I wouldn't mind seeing one out there. You couldn't save those buildings, but basically you have the grounds for it.

In the interim, until the county decides what to do with the property, whose repsonsibility is it to monitor and patrol the property?


The county owns it so therefore they have their own police department. I personally think that they should patrole it themselves. It is their property; Plymouth and Northville shouldn't be involved at all.

Bullard leads a weak field of candidates

In the Republican primary for the new 38th District in the state House of Representatives, we're frankly not enamored of any of the three candidates. Given the choices, though, we feel incumbent Rep. WILLIS BULLARD provides the best.

For someone with his years of service in the state House, Bullard isn't very well known - not statewide, and not in Northville. People around here often forget that the Northville community has two representatives in the House; with Bullard as one of them, that's easy to do.

More than half the population of Northville city now lives in Oakland County, according to the new census, and therefore falls within this House district. Although Northville is still a fairly small part of the district, we wish Bullard would have had more of a presence here. (He's extremely visible in his home area of Milford/Highland.) And in spite of the fact that his local visibility might not be high, if people seek him out he is definitely accessible.

It just seems that Bullard could be more of a leader in the Legislature. Two years ago he spoke to us of the need for ethical reform in the House; where was his proposal? Where is Bill Bullard, the lighter for racetrack tax money?

We don't think anyone here could find much fault with his voting record, how-ever. On issues of school funding, he al-ways votes the "right" way — the way which would be of benefit to Northville and the rest of the out-of-formula school districts he represents. His positions on abortion (pro-choice with restrictions) and other state issues probably fairly reflect the majority opinions of his constituents.

Bullard's challengers in the primary provide some interesting angles, but

don't seem to be fully realized candidates.

Jim Ash is a business owner whose top priority would be legalized casino gambling. He makes a decent argument for its benefits, but we're not sure Michigan - and this district in particular are ready to support such a plan. For voters who may put abortion rights at the top of their agenda, Ash takes the most clearly pro-choice stand.

John Riley, a former Milford Village Council member, might make a capable representative. He's not as fully informed on some state issues as we'd like to see, however. On abortion, he's the clear pro-life candidate, for voters who may consider that a litmus test. Otherwise, he just doesn't provide a compelling argument to replace Bullard.

To summarize, Bullard does a good job of reacting to what's in front of him in a way that probably falls in line with most of his constituents. He's not a major source of leadership or legislative initiatives, but we don't see the challengers being significantly different in that respect. In one of the less exciting races next month, it's a somewhat reluctant nod for the incumbent.

When, after the first millage proposal marks from the school board on his first falled, a surprised Rezmierski commented that no one had told him they were going to vote against the plan, that was a signal. There's some communication lacking here, and the board should have taken note of it in this review.

Everyone involved agreed after the Community relations is a difficult first election that the district did not do a good job communicating. It was also true, though less so, during the second campaign. The superintendent is the point person in these matters. We do not mean to suggest at all that better communication would have brought different results; we're quite sure it wouldn't have. But if the consensus is that communication should have been better, this really ought to be factored into the evaluation of the main communicator.

The superintendent has had a challenging first year, and has met most of the challenges well. He could use more non-school-related contacts within the community, though, to keep more in touch. And going hand-in-hand with that, he could do more to demonstrate a commitment to openness in

with efficient services, and you don't overload your governmental services with people in order to provide jobs. Whereas the other party tends to create jobs by adding bureaucracy. I think it is healthy for them to have a voice down there that says, "Take a look at your internal structure and see whether or not you are doing the best job you can."

Do you support or oppose the 5-mill increase on the ballot for indigent health care?

I opposed it when we brought it forward, and now I actively oppose it. Because the only reason they are putting a half-mill is because ... they want more revenue in to deal with the problems they perceive need to be dealt with.

One of those is the county's health

plan for indigents. They don't like the idea that there is less involvement by the County of Wayne in the apportionment of the care. So they prefer to have more money to deal with that and run it their own way. You only get \$13 million on the half-mill so you are not going out to take care of the entire problem; they just want to have more money to deal with.

What's is your position of the county opting to parcel the county land in the township out, and how do you feel about the way that sale was negotiated?

See, I sit on (the) Economic Development (Committee), and they have never come to us. So as far as the county's status is right now — the option to parcel everything out — it is in the Economic Development Department and they have not come up with a plan. They have not submitted a

plan. They have not come to us. Does that sound like a workable plan, to sell it out by chunks if you can, and maybe develop a golf course?

That was their initial plan years ago. I was opposed to it at that time when I was a township supervisor because I didn't want to see it happen in Northville. I don't think you get a good, solid development.

Since the land is such a drain on township services, how does the township get representation to the county?

Since Ive been down there what Ive tried to do is when the subject matter has come up, Ive tried to make the economic development people deal directly with the township people in order to make sure they have a sign-off in whatever comes up. I think the problem with

all this is that government is not a good developer and it never has been. s never shown any track record. Whose responsibility is it to pat-

rol the land?

They aren't paying taxes on it. I can make an argument that it is the county's responsibility and the county can make an argument that it's the township's responsibility. Given the special circumstances, the county patrol is really spotty. That is the sad part of it, because it has taken so long it is an impossibility to secure that property unless you wanted to station people there 24 hours a day.

Your opponent Thaddeus McCotter has criticized you for maintaining your law practice while sitting on the County Commission. Do you have any reaction

It (County Commission) has never been designed as a full-time job. You can complain that they are paying you too much for a part-time job. I think that depends on the individual and how much time and energy you devote to whatever activity. That is something I started back in the township in 1968.

I don't think we need full-time commissioners in the sense that they have no other activity . . . other than county commissioner. The real issue is, what is the role of the county commissioner vis-a-vis the running of Wayne County. There is no administrative responsibilities. So your job is to develop policy and work within the system to ensure services get delivered. We don't need to be down there eight hours a day, five days a week, 52 weeks a year to do that. In fact you should be out doing other

things in order to get a feel for what the people think.

I don't think full-time representatives are the answer to anything. I think you have to be able to understand what the system demands and what the job demands and do that well. You spend the time with your constituency so you understand what they want.

What is your reaction to the political battle that has stirred up in the Sheriff's Department and do you think it is harmful to the morale and image of the department?

ducted business dealings with regards to the sale of the county land in the township?

I think the issue is getting that land back on Northville Township's tax rolls. As for the specifics of how the deal went, I'll be honest with you; I'm not the most knowledgeable person on it. I know what the results have been and I know what the motivations were . . .

The question is: To what use is this land going to be put? It could either destroy Northville's character or keep you any reaction to that

Northville's unique identity or help the township with revenues. It is county land; I think the county should monitor it . . . To me it's very clear. The county owns the land; the county should take care of it.

If elected, what do you hope to be able to do for the residents of

I would hope to keep taxes at their current level; obviously, Wayne County balancing their budget. Once they eliminated County General Hospital, balancing the budget has not been a problem for them.

I would hope to maintain Northville's unique identity. Essentially with 1,000 acres in the southern part of the township. That is going to be the biggest impact the county has on the Northville residents...But whoever is elected has got to be a watch-dog for Northville Township, and I think I've demonstrated an ability to blow the whistle when I see something that I don't like instead of trying to work behind the scenes or keeping my mouth shut. If I see something that I don't like, I'm going to scream about it. I've done it and I'll certainly do it if I see something I don't like going on in Northville Township in that 1.000 acres.

Do you have opinion about the political battle that has surfaced in the Wayne County Sheriff's race?

I've met and spoken with Kevin Kelly. He helped me when I got started . . . But running strictly because disagreeing with how the command structure is set up — I support and I think for good reasons the way it is presently done. 

Don't wait; refrigerate to keep food safe

Food poisoning, not a very pleasant thought! Maybe it sounds better if we call it a food borne illness — no matter, you're sick. Approximately seven million Americans suffer from a food borne illness a year and 85 percent of them could have been avoided if food were handled properly.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, these numbers have been escalating since 1980. At the right temperature, bacteria you can't see, smell or taste can multiply to millions in a few short hours and cause illness.

There are naturally occurring bacteria in the air and water, as well as on plants, animals and people so there is a chance for contamination at any stage of food production. However, the statistics show that improper handling of cooked food, under-cooking and poor sanitation are the leading cause of food poisoning. That means that virtually all food borne illnesses are preventable. Prevention of food poisoning starts at the supermarket.

Rule Number One: Buy cold foods last and get it home fast! Grocery shop and take the food straight home to the refrigerator or freezer. Don't buy foods in poor condition. Make sure when you buy refrigerated food at the store that they are cold to the touch and frozen food is rock-solid. If you live more than 30 minutes from the store bring an ice chest to keep foods cold.

Rule Number Two: When you store food, keep it safe, refrigerate! Check the temperature of your refrigerator with an appliance thermometer. The refrigerator should run 38 degrees-40 degrees F and the freezer should be 0 degrees-10 degrees below F. For the most efficient operation, keep the re-frigerator fully loaded but with enough space for the air to circulate. Freeze fresh meat, poultry or fish immediately if you can't use it within a few days. Put packages of raw meat, poultry or fish on a plate before refrigerating so their juices won't drip on other food. These raw juices can contain

Rule Number Three: When you prepare food, keep everything clean and thaw in the refrigeratori Since bacteria live all around us, wash your hands with soap and hot water before touching food. Bacteria live on kitchen towels, sponges and cloths so launder them frequently. Always use clean utensils and wash them between cutting different foods. Plastic or glass cutting boards are :: , preferable to wooden ones because wood can harbor bacteria in the grooves.

Wash the lids of canned foods before opening to keep dirt from getting into the food. Also, clean the blade of the can opener after each use. Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator, where bacteria can't multiply. Bacteria can grow in the outer layers of the food before the inside thaws. Microwave thawing is okay but the food has to be cooked thoroughly and then used right away. Never thaw food on a kitchen counter unless you want to be sick!

Rule Number Four: When you're cooking, cook thoroughly! To kill harmful bacteria, foods need to be cooked thoroughly. Eating raw or partially cooked meat, poultry, lish and eggs is taking a nsky chance. Do not partially cook a food, stop and then finish cooking later as bacteria can grow between the cooking steps.

Rule Number Five: When you serve food, never leave it out over two hours! Never leave perishable foods out of the refrigerator over two hours. Bacteria that cause food poisoning grow quickly at room temperature. Discard any cooked or chilled food that has been sitting out. If you are having a party, keep cold foods on ice or in the refrigerator. Hot foods need to be kept hot to be safe, otherwise you'll have served food potsoning to your

Rule Number Six: When you handle leftovers, use small containers for quick cooling! Divide large amounts of leftovers into small, shallow containers. Don't pack the refrigerator, cool air must circulate around the food container to keep them safe. Store leftovers in the refrigerator as soon as possible. Do not let food cool on the counterl

Rule Number Seven: Reheated foods should be brought to a temperature of at least 165 degrees F. Sauces, soups and gravles need to be brought to a boil before serving. Microwave leftovers using a lid or vented plastic wrap for thorough heating. The steam this creates aids in the cooking of the

Rule Number Eight: If you have kept the food too long, throw it out! Never taste food that looks and smells strange. The cardinal rule for all food is, when in doubt, throw it out!

was good enough, I sent it in." Halprin's entry was named a state winner. The winning entry from each ard tuition at Johnson and Wales, and was invited to a final cookoff at the school.

As he was not planning to attend Johnson and Wales, Halprin chose not to compete in the cookoff. The cookoff winner received a full fouryear scholarship to the school, and runner-up prizes of \$5,000, \$4,000

How can you keep fish down on the farm?



We are all familiar with the nursery song of Old McDonald and his farm. All of the traditional farm yard animals were included chicken, cows.

pigs, and sheep. Today's age requires

another verse to be added, *and on that farm he had some fish." Aquaculture, the farming of fish and shellfish in a controlled environment, is an

industry on the rise. In fact, it's a good investment, as it is growing by leaps and

Eleven percent of total seafood consumption is a direct result of aquaculture. By 1995, 30 billion pounds will be produced by fish farmers. Developed initially for replenishing our streams and rivers with endangered species, aquaculture is a commercial spitball.

Catfish, trout, salmon, and shrimp are the principle species grown in the U.S. The popularity of catifsh is due to aquaculture. Improved availability, consistent flavor and a guaranteed quality product are all

Twenty-five to 30 percent of all shrimp

is farm raised. This is a true help in some elimination of price fluctuations. Speculation as to supply or availability of sizes is diminished. Lesser-known species now farmed include carp, sturgeon, hybrid striped bass, most shellfish and tilapia, a personal favorite.

Farming starts by "stripping." or removing the eggs from selected breeder fish and then fertilizing them in controlled hatcheries. The hatched eggs are called "fry" and fed flake food. At approximately 2 ounces in weight they are moved to different tanks or ponds and are referred to as "fingerlings."

They are then raised to maturity by a variety of methods depending on the specles. Some are easier to raise than others, but some similarities exist.

All are fed specialized feeds, protected from disease and maintained in water that is stabilized throughout their life cycles. We once had beautiful pink-fleshed trout that had been fed tomatoes. Many of the farms contract their crops out for the year, much like the land farming of earlier days.

So, who are these fish farmers? Virtually a new generation. This is not a selftaught art, but a very exacting and scientific profession. Most are highly trained marine biologists. They are the primary reason that U.S. aquaculture production has gone from zero percent of the nation's seafood supply in 1976 to over 12 percent

However, the majority of aquaculture production takes place outside of the United States. As good as this all sounds, aquaculture is not without its problems. The captive fish are prime targets for natural prey and because of their confinement are sitting ducks.

Also, as with humans, the denser the population the more serious the spread of diseases. Even though the atmosphere is designed to be disease free, this is not always the case. And, because of the loose controls, unscrupulous operators may be using additives in the feed. As time goes on these obstacles will work themselves out and supplies become closer to demand.

Don't mock this food of the future

The era of fake, mock, and phony loped for use in hot foods as well as in foods has arrived. Depending on your point of view, this can be a good or a very bad situation for nutrition in the

The vision of food in the future may include hot dogs that contain all the nutrients you need, fish that tastes like steak, tomatoes that stay ripe for weeks and edible packages - plus dinner that cooks in the car on the drive home.

Even the food futurists have a difficult time envisioning food and nutrition issues of the year 2010. But here are some things happening now.

Meat analogues made from vegetable sources such as tofu, nuts, seeds, brown rice and other grains are making their mark in the supermarket.

Because the number of dieters, non-meat eaters and those with health risks has grown, these foods have regained popularity. These tend to be lower in protein than the redmeat equivalent, but the fat calories are lower too.

There are some problems with vegetable substitutes because they do not contain all the amino acids. Amino acids are essential for building muscle and for keeping the blood, brain and organs healthy. The iron is not absorbed as easily by the body when it comes from vegetable sources.

Not all meat substitutes are diet food. Some of counterfeit varities can contain as many as 380 calories, compared to 231 in a real threeounce patty. The fat in analogues are mostly unsaturated, so they are good for the heart, but not the waistline.

Since some analogues are also lium, eliminate salt during preparation. Read the labels very carefully to determine fat, calories and nutrition.

A fake food of the future is Olestra, manufactured by Proctor & Gamble. It is a sucrose polyester that is a fat substitute which cannot be digested or absorbed. It passes through the body, contributing no calories, no

cholesterol and no fat. The hope is that it will replace conventional fats in everything from home-baked foods to fast foods to corn chips. Proctor & Gamble says its product looks, tastes, feels and behaves like fat. Olestra is being deve-

cold and is almost a carbon copy of regular fat. The NutraSweet Company has al-

ready introduced Simplesse, an "all natural fat" substitute. Simplesse is made from egg whites and milk protein blended and heated to make it feel like a creamy liquid with the texture of fat.

The drawback to the product is that it cannot be heated so will only be found in refrigerator foods.

Fat contributes nine calories per gram, so fat substitution can significantly reduce the calories in food products. These fat substitutes are not magic potions that melt pounds away.

Care will still have to be taken to cut calories. There have been many delays in getting FDA approval, but eventually all fat substitutes will find their ways into foods we purchase.

Another fake food just new to the list is fluffy cellulose, a noncaloric replacement for flour. It is made from sugar-beet pulp or other agricultural byproducts and can replace up to half the flour in a cake or bread

Tomatoes, cucumbers and melons are not fake, mock or phony foods, but new technology has changed them. Biotech tomatoes, cucumbers and melons that feature controlled ripening will probably be available in the next three to five years.

These will be able to be picked at the peak of ripeness and will stay firm for three weeks or more. Biotech will make some crops more resistant to pests and are now being engineered

to have improved nutritional quality. Major changes in food packaging are also on the horizon. In the future, ou will be able to buy fresh meat that keeps for two weeks when refriger-

Oxygen in the package would be replaced with an inert gas or the sous vide technique. This is when uncooked food is packed in a vacuum bag, then cooked and chilled. Packaging of the future will actually preserve food so it won't need added preservatives.

Some packages will have a natural, ingestible cover, which is an interesting way of getting rid of waste.





Lights, camera, action: Democrats in New York

Cable coverage swells, networks cut back

Every four years, competitors from around the world gather to test themselves against each other. Politics and nationalism are inextricable from the event, but the core of the thing, the competition, is relatively pure. The contests are called the Olympics, they're in Barcelona this summer and the world will surely watch with excitement and admiration.

On the same schedule, two separate groups, numbering about 4,000 each, meet in major American cities to test their endurance and shove each other on the floor of a large arena. Politics is the core of the thing, but many windy exhortations are made about the "national interest" and the future of life as we know it. Little about the event is perceived as pure. These two gatherings are the Democratic and Republican National Conventions, and they occur, respectively in New York and Houston. The opportunity exists for the nation to watch, with a likely mixture of curiousity, confusion and ennui.

The Democratic National Convention, the next stepping stone toward the 1992 presidential election, begins on Monday, July 13, in New York City. Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton is expected to be officially ratified as his party's presidential nominee, but there are many other questions waiting to be answered.

"No. 1 is definitely, 'who's going to be the vice presidential candidate?," says Jacquielynn Floyd, a journalist assigned to cover the convention for "The Dallas Morning News." Other issues, Floyd says, include outlining a

comprehensible economic plan, how the campaign will appeal to women and younger voters ("a crucial component") and uniting the sometimes-fractious Democratic party itself.

Asked who the key personalities of this convention are likely to be, Floyd mentions Mario Cuomo, Jesse Jackson, and California senatorial hopefuls Diane Fienstein and Barbara Boxer. "But it's hard to say," the journalist admits, adding, "every convention seems to create one new star, like Ann Richards in '88," referring to the now-Texas governor's hilarious "Poor George" speech.

In all, about 15,000 media persons will attend the convention, but television viewers used to watching the Big Three networks may be surprised at the paucity of primetime coverage. NBC will air onehour summary of convention activity each night, the rest of the time pooling its resources with those of PBS. The result is an impressive team in the broadcast booth, consisting of Robert MacNeil, Jim Lehrer and Tom Brokaw. While the peacock network is apparently downsizing its coverage, rivals CBS and ABC offer even less: one hour of prime-time coverage nightly, with no second broadcast alternative. All three are sure to collect armloads of sound-bites for use in their nightly news shows.

Why the cutbacks? "Politics now is viewed as a bitter medicine," says Floyd. "In the '60s, it was our civic duty. The networks aren't buying that anymore, there are too many other options. If people don't want to swallow the medicine, they'll go somewhere else."

"Somewhere else" could, however, be cable. CNN, under a yearlong banner of "Democracy in Action," promises extensive reporting of the conventions and all election-related activities.

Information junkies will naturally be riveted to C-SPAN's customary gavel-to-gasp coverage.

"We offer our viewers a seat in the convention hall itself," says Steven Scully, C-SPAN's political editor.

cnbc will have representatives at both conventions, as well as its weekly series, "Money Politics: Campaign '92." The Monitor Channel will produce a series of "American Issues '92" specials in association with Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government.

Lifetime calls its "Women and Politics: A Lifetime Challenge" an "election year public awareness program" about issues of particular concern to women. American Movie Classics is busily promoting voter registration through on-air announcements. Viewers in search of the lighter side can tune in "Indecision '92" on Comedy Central.

One important new player in the field of election coverage is MTV. With its highly touted "Choose or Lose" campaign headed by reporter Tabitha Soren, the music video network has embarked on a vigorous project to bring the election to younger voters. Becky Cain, national president of the League of Women Voters, praises the effort. "Young people need to become more involved. They're the most under-represented group of voters," Cain says.

Floyd agrees, adding, "They've not been very good about voting, but maybe part of the reason is that they don't feel like anybody is speaking to them."



Bob Saget, star of Full House and America's Funniest Home Videos, will serve as host Monday, July 6, when ABC presents the first Jim Thorpe Pro Sports Awards.

awards the Presenting achievement in football, baseball, basketball, boxing, hockey, auto racing and other pro sports are Hollywood stars and sports celebrities including Dyan Cannon, Leeza Gibbons, Wilt Chamberlain and Bo Jackson.

The awards fall into 10 categories, with special tributes for the recipients of the Lifetime Achievement, Individual Achievement and Thorpe Legacy awards.

Judging is done by a "blue-ribbon panel" of sports heroes and distinguished sports journalists. The combination of athletes and journalists on the judging panel is intended to ensure the credibility of the awards.

Named for Jim Thorpe, the awards honor the memory of the man widely considered the best all-around athlete of the first half of the 20th century. Thorpe (1888-1953) was an American Indian who endured bigotry in the sports world long before Jackie Robinson's time. Thorpe is one of only two athletes ever inducted into four sports halls of fame, but he is most widely remembered for having been stripped of two Olympic medals after it was revealed that he played a season of semi-pro baseball in exchange for room and board. **O** TV Listing Inc





Abby on 'Homefront'; Clara Bow remembered

Q: My husband and I love the ABC show Homefront. Recently, my mother told me she read in another column, Dear Abby, that the show is being canceled. Please tell me it's not true! If it is, why? I know it's very popular in our area. —J. Rucinski, Esmond, Ill.

A: It's refreshing to know that Abby is branching out. Once satisfied with dispensing advice on party etiquette, she must have realized life's true happiness comes from television criticism. However, the plain truth is that Homefront has not been canceled and is only on summer hiatus while new episodes are being developed for the fall, when it will move to Thursday nights. Homefront was a successful show for ABC this year in their prime-time Tuesday lineup.

Q: I work in a retirement home for merchant marines. A resident there was once the shipmate of (actor) Cliff Robertson during World War II. When Ralph Edwards recalled Mr. Robertson's life on This Is Your Life in 1971, this man was invited to participate. He is so proud of that experience. He is not in good health. Could you tell me where to write to Cliff Robertson, in hopes he might consent to write this man? —Dee Bryson, Newport, N.C.

A: You may write to Robertson in care of his agent at ICM, 8899 Beverly Blvd., Los Angeles, Calif., 90048.

Q: I've been trying to recall the name of a western I saw on TV with Robert Preston. He and his family were traveling in a covered wagon and Preston kept rattlesnakes in a bag. Can you help? —Jessie Snyder, Fort Worth, Texas.

A: The Chisholms first aired on CBS as a miniseries in 1979. The story of a family's arduous journey westward co-starred Rosemary Harris and Ben Murphy. It proved so popular that the network brought it back as a series the next year. But when Preston's character passed away, so did the series.

Q: Can you tell me what Roy Rogers' real name is? I saw it on TV but can't remember what it was. It's the name of a wild animal but I can't think of which one. —Jennie Reese, Halfway, Mo.

A: A leopard can't change its spots, but Leonard Slye can and did change his name to Roy Rogers.

Q: I'm interested in knowing what happened to Clara Bow and her husband, Rex Bell. I'm an oldie, and she was my favorite — she was so pretty. I

know she made Hoopla, The Fleet's In, Dangerous Curves, Wings and a couple of others. —M. Semenak, Ironwood, Mich.

A: Clara Bow passed away in 1965, three years after husband Rex Bell. Bow's film career was a bittersweet testament to the end of an era, where many silent-film stars were lost in the shuffle to movies with sound.

The daughter of an impoverished Coney Island waiter, Bow won a bit part in a movie through a fan-magazine contest in 1921 when she was 16, and it launched her screen career. Her most famous role was in 1927's It. "It" was what we now call sex appeal, and Bow had it. She became a symbol of the flapper era and was known as the "It Girl." (The animated vamp Betty Boop was supposedly modeled after Bow.) But her sexuality fell out of favor with the public in the more conservative Depression era, and romantic scandals combined with her physical and mental fragility to bring her career to an end shortly after the advent of talkies. A meager comeback attempt failed, and Bow finally retired in 1933 after Hoopla, the last of her 55 films. Bow spent much of the next three decades in sanitoriums.

After eloping with Bow in 1931, Rex Bell's career as a Western star slowed but didn't end until 1961 with a bit part in *The Misfits*, which starred Clark Gable and Marilyn Monroe. Bell was elected lieutenant governor of Nevada in 1954 and ran unsuccessfully for governor in 1958.
