

City hires clerk

The empty city clerk's office at Northville City Hall will reopen Aug. 10.

That's when Delphine C. Dudick, Hazel Park's current city clerk, moves in to take over as the city's head clerk.

City Manager Gary Word offered Dudick the position Thursday, after sifting through 60 applications and interviewing the five finalists. Clerical workers from all over the state had applied to fill former clerk Cathy Watkins' shoes.

Word was pleased by the quality of the applicants, and said he had a difficult time choosing between the top three. "It was really a fairly tough decision," he said.

Dudick got the nod because of her 16 years of experience in government, he said.

"She has a lot of experience," Word said. "The background checks indicated that she was extremely technically competent. I needed someone who can hit the ground running, and I believe she can do that."

After three years as a clerk typist in Van Buren, and another three years as deputy township clerk, Dudick was elected township clerk in 1982 and served there until 1988. She was appointed Hazel Park's city clerk in December, 1991 after serving for six months as acting city clerk.

"She has virtually all of the skills I was looking for," Word said, including risk management, election coverage, clerical and computer skills.

Dudick said she is making the move west to be near relatives in Northville and South Lyon. "I need to be closer to my children and grandchildren," she said.

She recalled driving through Northville on the way to her son's house and thinking that the city would be a nice place to work. A week later, she received a notice mailed throughout the state that the city was seeking a new clerk, "and I said, 'This must be for me.'"

Dudick now lives in Hazel Park but said she plans to relocate. "I will plan on making that move to Northville, no doubt about that," she said. "It's going to be home."

Dudick will be paid a starting salary of \$35,500. She will remain in Hazel Park through the Aug. 4 state primary elections.

Committee eyes new plant ideas

A seven-member committee assigned to propose potential reuses of the Ford Valve Plant has come up with some novel ideas.

The most unique, and potentially most controversial, is to purchase the 13.7-acre property, move city and township municipal offices into the plant and sell off city and township halls. The plant would also have space for an expanded library.

"If the properties can be sold, they could be the long-term methods to fund the capital improvements," said Committee Chair Greg Presley.

While most committee members were intrigued by the concept, several warned that political differences may sabotage the plan.

"I think generally speaking the

concept is good," said City Manager Gary Word. "But I'll tell you something. You're talking about two governmental entities so it's going to be slow."

Committee member David Totten agreed, saying "It might take township residents months or years to agree to move (township hall) out of the township."

Under the concept first proposed by Presley and then refined by the committee as a whole, offices in the 17,800-square-foot city hall and 13,500-square-foot township hall would be consolidated into 34,000 square feet of the Ford Plant. The consolidation would relieve some of the current overcrowding at city and township halls by allowing the governments to share auditorium, meeting

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State hopefuls speak at forum

Four candidates for the new 20th District State House seat squared off Thursday night in Livonia.

The occasion was a debate sponsored by Livonia's League of Women Voters.

Current 36th District Representative Georgina Goss faces Plymouth City Commissioner Jerry Vorva, Northville computer software designer Robert Bernard and Livonia lawyer Ronald Ambrose in the Aug. 4 Republican primary. Because there are no Democratic candidates, the winner of the primary is virtually assured the seat.

Goss narrowly won the 36th District seat vacated by Gerald Law last August, in a race against Vorva and Deborah Whyman. Neither Bernard nor Ambrose has held political office in the past.

While Thursday's half-hour debate offered a good overview of the candidates, few surprises emerged. Vorva, as he has throughout the campaign, railed against political corruption and criticized Goss for what he termed misuse of the legislators' free mailing privilege (see related story).

"Mrs. Goss has abused the franking system privilege that she has,"

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Candidates for county speak

Contrasts marked last week's 10th District Wayne County Commission candidates forum.

Insiders versus outsiders. Youth pitted against experience. Low-key campaigning squaring off against a no-holds-barred approach.

The result? Look for three weeks of a tough, accusatory campaign.

Incumbent county Commissioner Maurice Breen and three challengers in the Aug. 4 Republican primary race met July 16 in a forum sponsored by the Livonia League of Women Voters.

Breen, Clayton Stacey, Thaddeus McCotter, and Patrick Downes answered questions, offered opinions, and managed to trade a few barbs be-

fore a sparse audience at Livonia City Hall.

Candidates discussed topics ranging from minority hiring and privatization to solid waste and recycling efforts to ethics in government. Few of the candidates' responses differed, and three of the county commission hopefuls refrained from personal attacks.

But Downes, a salesperson with Pitney-Bowes who is making his initial foray into politics, rejected that approach. He winged Breen with passing shots during the main portion of the forum, and went for the kill during his closing statement.

Downes had opponents and audience alike squirming in their seats with accusations that Breen has long

Crowded primary field seeks seat

The Republican primary for the new 13th District seat in the U.S. House of Representatives constitutes one of the hottest election contests in the state this year.

No fewer than six Republicans are scrambling before the Aug. 4 primary for the chance to run against incumbent U.S. Rep. William Ford, a Democrat with a long history in Congress.

Ford believes the new 13th District remains solidly Democratic in its voting, containing much of the same territory as his old district before reap-

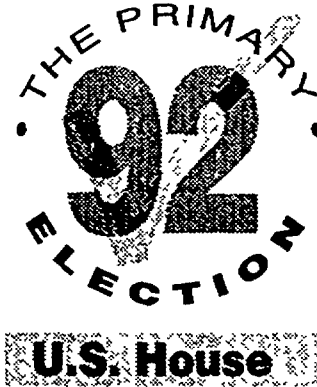
portionment. But all six Republicans believe the district is winnable for their party. The general election in the fall will also include Paul Jensen of Ann Arbor, on the Tisch Citizens Party ticket.

The Republicans in the race for this district, which includes the Northville community south of Baseline Road, pit three well-funded and well-known names against three less-familiar, but not unknown, candidates.

Area residents have seen the most

advertising from Robert Geake, a Northville resident currently serving as a state senator; Raymond Tanter, a University of Michigan professor and Republican adviser; and Burl Adkins, a business owner who has a history of running against Ford. The lower-profile candidates are William Steele, a stock handler; Glen Kassel, a real estate agent; and Herbert Scott, vice president of sales for a pharmaceutical company.

Lobbying firm part of network

A tight web of lobbyists, attorneys, and politicians developed a plan to hire a Washington D.C. lobbying firm that has billed local taxpayers \$1 million — without results — since 1988.

State Rep. Georgina Goss suggested in a recent interview (see related story) that Western Townships Utilities Authority attorneys recommended hiring Cassidy & Associates, a \$20,000-a-month federal lobbyist.

WTUA's legal counsel is Sills, Hemming, Law, Essad, Polaczyk & Gillary (formerly Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk). Robert Law, one of the firm's partners, is a registered Michigan lobbyist and legal counsel for

at least one other Michigan non-profit entity that retains Cassidy & Associates at a \$20,000 monthly fee.

Cassidy & Associates has not yet delivered on its 1989 pledge to attract federal dollars to the controversial

\$100 million WTUA sewer project. Congressional aides from at least three area districts have questioned the need to retain the lobbying firm.

State records shed light on an intertwined lobbying connection involving Robert Law, WTUA, three local townships, the former Law, Hemming group, and the federal lobbyist.

According to records obtained from the state Bureau of Elections, Robert Law is a principal in Government Affairs Consulting Group, a state lobbying firm that lists eight clients.

Among the clients are Northville, Plymouth, and Canton townships; WTUA; the Conference of Western Wayne; Schoolcraft College; Michi-

gan Materials & Processing; and Michigan Biotechnology Institute.

Michigan Biotechnology Institute is a Lansing-based non-profit "applied research organization," said Gretchen Smith, MBI public relations manager.

A number of similarities exist between MBI and WTUA. Robert Law serves or has served as legal counsel for both groups, and Government Affairs Consulting Group is a contracted state lobbyist for both agencies.

In addition, both WTUA and MBI hired Cassidy & Associates, which represents only a handful of Michigan agencies or businesses.

ing room and equipment storage space.

Space would be left over for a 22,600-square-foot library, a 10,000-square-foot community center and 5,000 square feet of storage.

Presley's initial proposal called for a leaseback arrangement whereby the city would purchase the property and then sell it to a private owner, who would lease it back to the city. The arrangement would give the private owner special tax credits for rehabilitating a historical building, keep the Ford property and put city and township halls on the tax rolls,

and allow public use of the facility and grounds.

But other committee members feared that a lease arrangement could leave the city in the lurch.

"So much of what we have in the community is leased or borrowed," said Steve Fecht. "If the owner pulls the rug out from under us, where are we?"

The committee agreed to propose either a leaseback or purchase arrangement. While the startup cost of leasing the property and making the necessary interior improvements was estimated at \$3 million, not including the ongoing cost to lease the property, purchase and renovation

costs were estimated at \$7 million. Millage impact of the two proposals was estimated at 1.99 mills for the leaseback arrangement, which includes the lease cost, and 1.62 mills to purchase the property outright.

The community center proposal headed the committee's list of preferred uses, because it met the committee's goals of providing public accommodation, improving the tax base and minimizing negative impact on the community.

Second on the list were a number of mixed-use proposals that would dedicate part of the plant to a new community library and the rest to privately-owned businesses like an

educational mall, medical fitness center, performing arts center, retail mall or light industrial reuse.

Last on the list were private reuses like the mixed-use ones but without a library.

Rejected uses included a retail mall that would compete with downtown businesses, or heavy industrial use needing the land west of Griswold. Committee members were adamant about retaining public access to Ford Field for recreational uses.

One lingering doubt among committee members was whether their recommendations would have an impact on Ford Motor Company if the city does not purchase the plant itself.

"Is there any way that we can influence who they pick?" asked Presley.

"How many shares of Ford do you own?" replied Word. "I can tell you that Ford has every intention of responding to the needs of the community, but they've also made it very

clear that they're going to be responsible to their shareholders."

Since March, when Ford dropped its asking price for the property from \$2.5 million to \$1.75 million, the automotive giant has reportedly received more than 100 inquiries about the plant. Several of the offers are considered serious.

The committee will meet one final time, tonight at 5 p.m., before its recommendations are presented to the city council at its 8 p.m. meeting.

Goss criticized for mailing plan

While some legislators are catching heat for using state funds to woo would-be constituents, a Northville representative faces criticism for forgetting part of the constituency she still serves.

36th District Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, has kept in touch with local voters by way of several state-funded mailings, saying, "The newsletters are a good communication tool. . . I have had good response from them, and residents do like to know what is going on in Lansing."

If that's the case, residents in Northville and Plymouth know more than those in Canton, which falls within Goss' current district but not within the reapportioned 20th district seat she seeks.

While voters in Northville and Plymouth have found five state-funded mailings from Goss in their mailboxes, Canton residents only have received two.

That discrepancy does not sit well with former Goss supporter Patricia Fatyma, a member of the National Organization for Women in Canton.

"We endorsed her the last time around," Fatyma said. "We know she's our rep until the

election in November and the new one gets sworn in in January, but we haven't heard anything from her."

"As of right now, she's still my elected state rep, so I think we should get anything that people in Plymouth or Northville get. . . I'd like to know what my state rep is doing for those of us in Canton."

Technically, Fatyma said, Goss still has NOW's support. "Our NOW PAC actually has endorsed her, because we have a standing policy of backing the pro-choice incumbent," she said.

But given Goss' failure to communicate, she said some Canton residents are regretting that endorsement.

"Since we can't vote for her this coming November, she's just totally forgotten about us," Fatyma said. "As far as I'm concerned, I feel like an illegitimate child."

Goss' mailings are paid for by a \$15,500 annual budget allotted to all state representatives. She had spent \$13,152 of that by July 8, according to the state's house purchasing section.

The newsletters are a regular attempt to communicate with her constituents, not an election-

year ploy, Goss said. "I send out quarterly newsletters and also this time I sent out a survey that is well-received and very interesting," she said.

But her mailings have increased in frequency as the Aug. 4 primary election draws near, at least for Northville and Plymouth residents.

According to Maureen Herstek, staff publications coordinator for the Republican Caucus, Goss sent newsletters in November and February to all registered voters in Plymouth, Canton and Northville. But an April newsletter was sent only to Northville and Plymouth, as was a legislative survey in May and another newsletter in June.

"After reapportionment, many of the reps typically do not mail into the (old) district because they're waiting for the new rep to come in," Herstek said. "It's about 50-50 both ways."

Goss had a partial explanation for the selectivity of her mailings.

"I did not send the survey into Canton, because after Jan. 1 I will not represent them, and whoever does represent them will want to do their own survey," she said.

She also agreed to make up for the lack of mailings to concerned Canton residents like Fatyma: "I will certainly send her anything she didn't get."

Vorva said. "She has deluged Plymouth and Northville with mailings, and only sent one to Canton in the same time."

While Vorva's figures were off — Goss has sent two mailings to Canton and five to Northville and Plymouth — the representative had a hard time defending herself against the thrust of his charge. She insisted that her mailings are done "in complete accordance" with rules laid down by House Speaker Lewis Dodak.

All the candidates agreed that the state's school funding methods need to be fixed, though they differed on how to accomplish the job.

"Tax-base sharing has got to go," said Goss. She said a bipartisan leg-

islative committee is needed to draft a plan for equitable funding. Bernard suggested raising the sales tax and lowering other taxes to fund schools, and would like to see a voucher plan to let parents choose their own schools. Ambrose agreed with Bernard's sales tax suggestion, and said "sin taxes" on items like cigarettes and alcohol could sweeten the pot. Vorva insisted that the schools should be made more efficient first, and then a blended tax should be instituted to fund them.

On the issue of rising health care costs, Ambrose noted that he has no health insurance "and it's scary." If the federal government cannot come up with a plan to provide comprehensive health care, he said, then it may be up to the state.

Bernard saw a two-pronged solution to the problem — capping liability charges against doctors to control liability insurance costs, and better administration.

"The system works fine if you have insurance or you have money," said Vorva. He believed tighter enforcement of laws against insurance fraud could improve the system, and opposed raising taxes for health care.

The candidates differed most sharply on the issue of abortion. When asked her view on informed consent, Goss labeled herself a pro-choice candidate but said, "I do believe a 24-hour wait before making a decision is not a problem."

Vorva called himself "the only true pro-choice candidate," saying "Mrs.

Goss, of course, has waffled, and will continue to do so." His insistence that "everyone has a right to self-determination" drew a round of applause from the 50-member audience, which drew a request from moderator Roberta Young that the crowd refrain from applauding.

Ambrose, saying his views "are largely irrelevant," said, "As a state legislator, I have to represent your views." His door-to-door canvassing had revealed a pro-choice tilt to the district's electorate, but he said voters object to Medicaid-funded abortions.

Bernard presented the strongest anti-abortion stance, saying, "I believe it's the right of that child, that fetus, to have a right to life."

engaged in lucrative, self-serving business deals while serving as Plymouth Township supervisor.

Downes cited a mid-1980s Plymouth Township land deal that netted a Breen partnership an \$850,000 profit. He told the audience that so-called negative campaigning was necessary to inform the voters about Breen, who was appointed to the county commission in 1991 and won an uncontested election to the seat later that year.

Downes even chastised McCotter, who moments before had trumpeted his refusal to engage in a finger-pointing campaign.

Saying he could not accept McCotter's "Pollyanna" stance, Downes claimed that McCotter could not stand up to Breen's wife, Mary, who like McCotter is a Schoolcraft College trustee. Downes then asked what chance McCotter had of holding up to Breen, a powerful, veteran politico.

"Breen and McCotter attempted to laugh off Downes' comments, and did

not respond to his challenge to debate them 'anytime, anyplace, anywhere.'"

For his part, Breen discussed his role as an experienced politician. He said the County Commission had begun to work more closely with the county executive's office since his appointment, and referred to his spot as chair of a county solid waste program.

He responded to a Downes comment that Breen passed out jobs and contracts to friends by saying Dow-

nes' father had once won a small contract in Plymouth Township.

Stacey, a retired businessperson with lengthy ties to Wayne County, spoke of returning the county to its glory days. Stacey said Wayne County was a good place in which to live and work 25 years ago, and he wished to restore that reputation.

McCotter cited his experience as a Schoolcraft trustee and said his refusal to attack opponents showcased his ability to work and achieve results through positive actions.

Downed wire means one simple rule: Stay far away

The approaching storm front was monitored throughout the early afternoon. Radar showed the front to be producing heavy thunderstorms as well as some tornadoes, and as the weather service's storm warnings were upgraded to warnings, Fire Department personnel were called in to stand by at the station.

The storm hit late in the afternoon, and the worst was over in less than a half hour. During the storm power was lost in several sections of town and the dispatch center and fire station were operating on emergency generators. Then the calls started coming in. Electrical power lines, brought down by strong winds and falling tree limbs, were on the ground and arcing in several locations.

It is not uncommon for power lines to come down in a storm. Sometimes the wires will sit quietly on the ground, while other times they will "dance" wildly, producing bright glowing arcs of electricity and noise to rival a Fourth of July fireworks show. There is one simple rule, however, whenever you con-

front a downed wire: STAY FAR AWAY. AND UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES TOUCH THE WIRE OR ANYTHING THE WIRE ITSELF IS TOUCHING. Call 911 to report the situation.

It is important to remember that a power line can carry thousands of volts of electricity, more than enough to kill anyone who comes in contact with the wire. Even if the wire appears quiet, it may be carrying electricity. Circuit breakers can recycle, causing a quiet wire to quickly erupt in a deadly arc. Arcing wires can roll and thrash on the ground, reaching out toward anyone who is nearby. For this reason it is important to stay well away from any downed wire.

An additional danger presented when power lines come down on metal fences or other objects which might conduct electricity. In these circumstances, electricity from the wire can charge the object it is touching, rendering the object as deadly as the wire itself. If there is any reason to suspect that an object around your house has been charged by a downed power line, stay away, and keep children and pets indoors.

Electrical heat from downed power lines can start fires in grass, trees, or even structures. These fires present special problems. Water is an excellent conductor of electricity and the stream of water from a hose, should it come

in contact with a power source, acts like a wire, conducting the electricity back to the person holding the hose. Fire fighters can work to extinguish fires as they spread away from the electrical source, but remember never to spray water directly on a power line, even if it is burning.

As the firefighters spread out to respond on the calls for downed wires, they cordoned off the area around each wire and advised local residents of the danger present. The curious were kept away, and calls were made to the power company to advise it of each situation. The Fire Department stood by until the power company could respond, which took a bit longer than normal since the severe storm had brought down wires across the entire metropolitan area. In a matter of a few hours, though, all of the downed lines were disconnected by the power company and rerederred safe. While it would take longer to completely restore power, the immediate danger was removed and the residents begin the task of cleaning up after another Michigan summer storm.

Amateur area publication includes graphic content

Warning to parents: "Big Boys on Little Toys" is not just a magazine about skateboarding.

Instead, the Northville-based publication is a combination of skateboard photos and sexually explicit material.

The copy that Novi Police Detective John Zimmer is holding as evidence — and intends to carry to the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office to determine whether it can be classified as pornography — contains the

following:

- Obscenities
- Explicit descriptions of sex acts
- A cartoon featuring a woman having sex with a dog
- A column titled "Mistress Michelle's Masturbation Messages"
- A feature titled "Tongue of the Month"
- A sexually suggestive photo of a woman described as a prostitute from Grand Rapids.

Another item in the publication, which Zimmer said disturbs him the most, is a photograph of several preschool-aged girls in bikinis.

Novi Police became aware of the magazine when the mother of a 14-year-old girl filed a complaint.

According to police reports, the girl was followed home from the 7-Eleven on Meadowbrook by a suspect believed to be in his early 20s.

The girl told police she saw the suspect at the store and later in the parking lot as she left the store. She said she rode her bike toward home and discovered the suspect again standing in the middle of Malott St.

She told police the suspect asked her if he could take her picture for a skateboard magazine, then gave her

a copy of "Big Boys on Little Toys" in a sealed envelope.

The envelope the magazine came in is decorated with a black-and-white photograph of a skateboarder. The entire publication, including the envelope, looks as though it was run off on a copy machine. Much of the copy is handwritten.

Inside the cover is a Northville post office box number as well as a telephone number.

Repeated calls to the number have revealed only a recorded message: "Yo, this is the Mac Daddy bolt man coming to you live from the pig pen."

Please leave your name and number after the beep — and address."

The girl told the suspect she did not want her picture taken, then took the magazine and went home. Her mother and uncle later opened the still-sealed envelope and discovered the magazine inside.

In addition to recognizing a photo of the suspect inside the magazine, the girl also identified a photo of another person in the magazine as someone she had a class with at Novi High School.

Zimmer said he has since identified several young males in the maga-

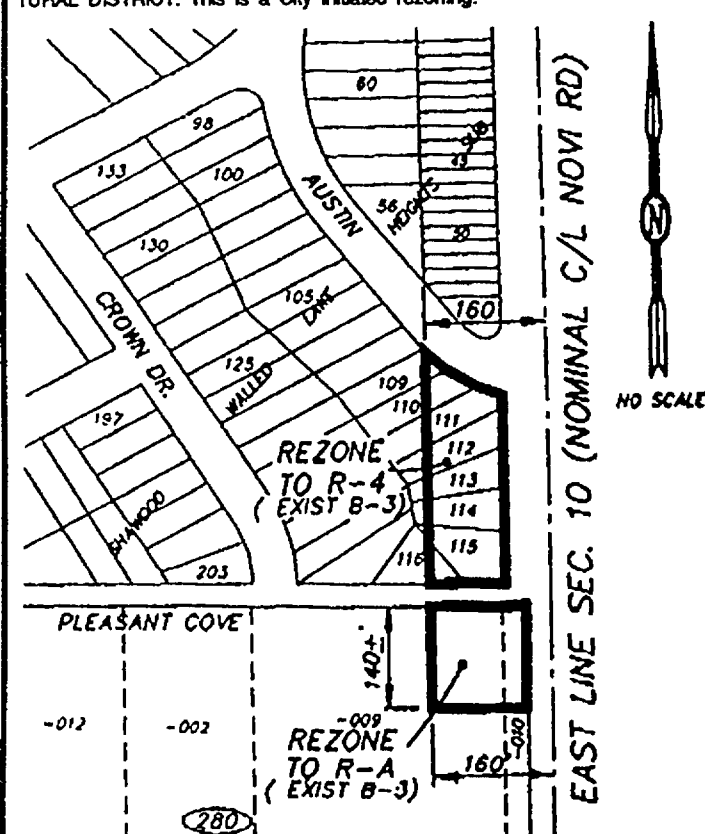
zine as local skateboarders. He said he spoke with one 17-year-old, who said the magazine used to be a regular skateboarding magazine without the sexually oriented copy.

If the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office decides that the magazine can be classified as pornography, Zimmer said, he intends to charge the suspect with dissemination of pornographic material to a minor. The charge can be either a felony or a misdemeanor, depending on specific circumstances.

"Either way, this is crap," Zimmer said of the publication. "And I don't want it in my community."

WTUA leaders discuss hiring of lobbying firm

The Western Townships Utilities Authority hired a Washington D.C.-based lobbying firm in 1988 to help wrangle a federal grant for the three-community sewer project, but the outlook for federal aid appears dim. By the end of 1992, WTUA will have paid lobbyist Cassidy & Associates \$1 million with no stipulation that the company deliver aid to the \$100 million sewer project. The potential for federal aid is in doubt, but may be less of a mystery than the actual hiring of the lobbyist, which has charged WTUA community taxpayers \$20,000 a month plus expenses since September 1988. Two of the WTUA commissioners who voted to retain Cassidy & Associates say they do not remember how the firm was brought on board. State Rep. Georgina Goss and Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen served on the WTUA board in 1988, when Cassidy was hired. Both Goss and Breen previously had refused Record requests for information on the Cassidy hiring, but were questioned again during recent interviews. The interviews were arranged in conjunction with can-

didate question-and-answer sessions with Record staff members. The Cassidy & Associates-related excerpts from the Goss and Breen interviews follow:

RECORD: (To Breen) I wanted to get to how Cassidy & Associates was hired.

BREEN: . . . Through conversation, it was suggested that (WTUA contract with) a lobbyist. And Cassidy's name came across the table. Quite frankly, I don't know exactly how. I interviewed them.

RECORD: When did you first talk to them?

BREEN: I don't know. I'd have to go to notes.

RECORD: Do you have notes somewhere —

BREEN: I don't have anything hidden away. They're all in the records you guys have been looking at. I don't have anything in my house; I haven't taken anything out of anywhere. I would say that whatever meeting, we may have had a meeting prior to the formal signing, something like that. My experience, fundamentally, these are standard type contracts. There's no magic to them. They happen all the time, at the state, Northville Township has had a contract with a lobbyist for years. Plymouth Township

never had a lobbyist. It's the same argument. Why would they have one . . .

RECORD: I just wondered how retaining that lobbyist came about. We've been able to find virtually no . . .

BREEN: He's not related to anybody.

RECORD: I didn't suggest that at all.

BREEN: Just kidding.

RECORD: Was anyone from WTUA ever on retainer to or receive any money from Cassidy & Associates?

BREEN: No. Not that I'm aware of.

RECORD: (To Goss) Could you tell us how Cassidy & Associates was selected?

GOSS: Do you think that there is a problem with WTUA hiring a lobbyist? We felt a lobbyist was necessary. University of Michigan has a lobbyist and Eastern Michigan University has a lobbyist.

RECORD: I guess that's kind of what I'm asking in a different way. You thought it was necessary at the time. With the perspective of today, would you do it the same way?

GOSS: Well, we still haven't gotten any money. I keep

hearing rumors that there is a \$20-million grant or some kind of a grant coming down through the pipeline, but I don't know that to be true. I believe that we needed a lobbyist, yes.

RECORD: I'm sorry, I had asked how Cassidy & Associates was selected, how that process came about. We've had a tough time getting any information on how that actual selection itself took place. You were on the board at the time, maybe you could enlighten us.

GOSS: Yes, I was. It was a recommendation by, as I recall, it was a recommendation by the then director, executive director, to, to the commission to retain Cassidy & Associates, and it was voted on by the commission.

RECORD: Who would have been the director at that time?

GOSS: Ann, what's her name?

RECORD: Ann Bollin?

GOSS: Yeah.

RECORD: Yeah, I don't think she came on until 1989.

RECORD: Oh, well, I'm not sure then. Then it was a recommendation by the attorneys, I would assume.



Lobbying firm had local tie

Ties between local attorneys, lobbyists and governments extend beyond the scope of Northville, Plymouth, and Canton townships.

Sort of. A state lobbying firm run by Robert Law also worked for Livonia-based Schoolcraft College until earlier this year.

Schoolcraft College terminated Government Affairs Consulting Group, a state lobbying agency connected with the former Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk law firm, effective March 1, 1992.

Economic issues keyed the split between Schoolcraft College and Government Affairs, said Sandra Florek, director of institutional advancement at Schoolcraft College.

Florek said Schoolcraft cut loose its lobbyist because it felt there was too little state money available to justify lobbying efforts.

Schoolcraft College hired Government Affairs Consulting Group March 22, 1989. Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk currently serves as Schoolcraft College's legal firm.

Law, Hemming and Government Affairs was hired by Schoolcraft after Mary Breen, the wife of Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen, was elected to Schoolcraft Board of Trustees in 1988.

Government Affairs also is listed as a lobbyist for Northville Township. Earlier this year, township Supervisor Betty Lennox was unsure about the role Government Affairs and Robert Law played with the township.

"He probably does something for us," Lennox said last May. "As far as I'm concerned, we don't send them any money, at least I don't see any bills coming through."

WTUA hired Cassidy in September 1988. State Freedom of Information Act requests forwarded to WTUA by The Northville Record have turned up no documentation that WTUA officials discussed Cassidy's hiring before the lobbyist was retained.

Goss and Wayne County Commissioner Maurice Breen served on the WTUA board at the time Cassidy was hired. Asked if Cassidy paid a finder's fee or retainer fee to any WTUA-related official, Breen recently said: "No. Not that I'm aware of."

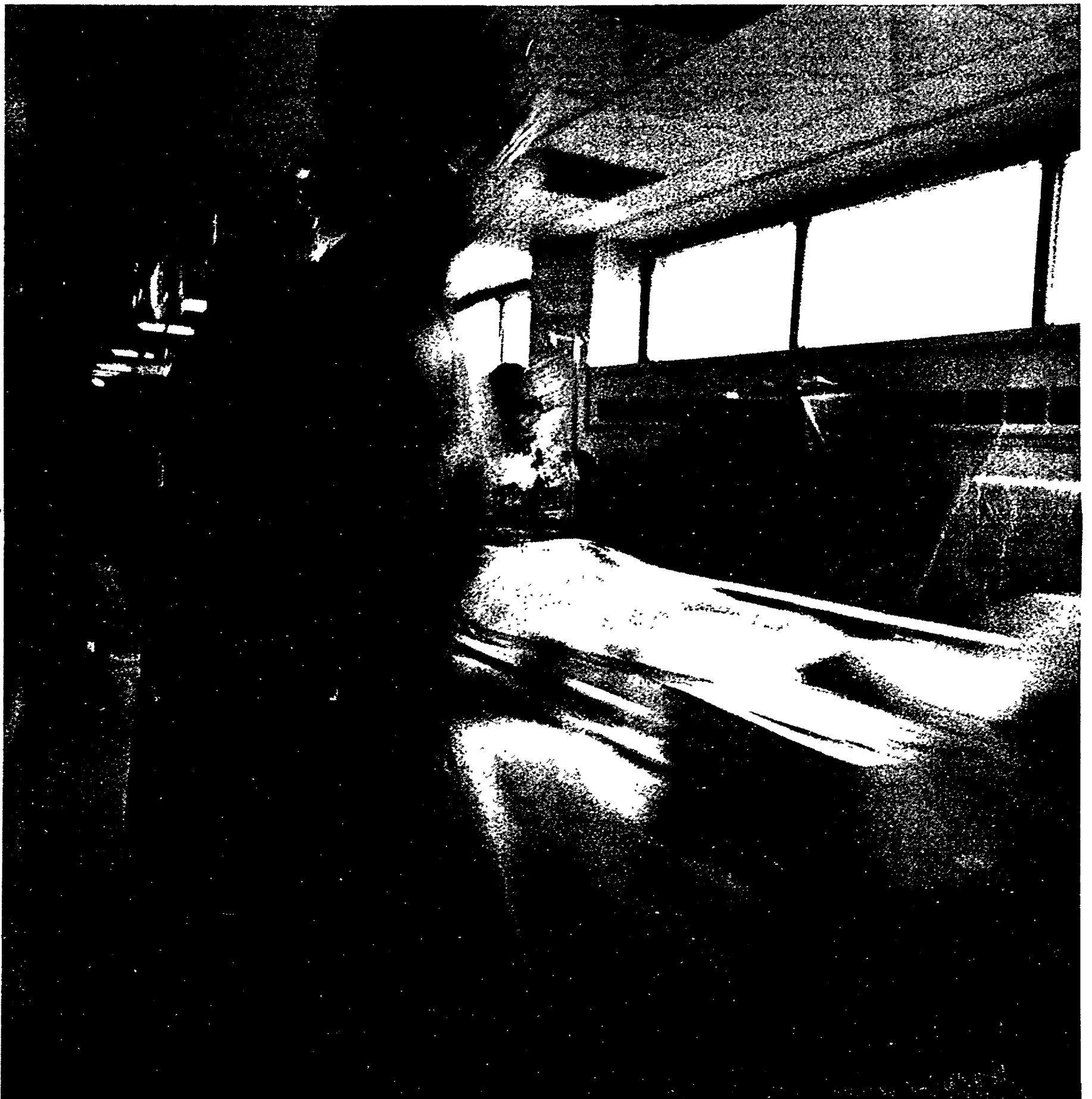
Cassidy & Associates officials in Washington have not returned repeated telephone calls from a Record reporter.

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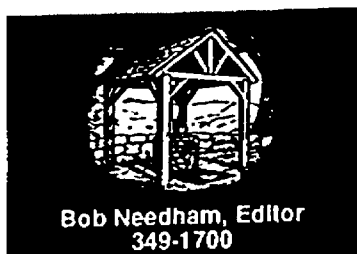

Honigman offers best option for Congress

As expected, the race for the Republican nomination for the 11th District seat in the U.S. House has generated some fireworks. Advertising budgets are large and campaigns intense. Most of the heat has flown between Alice Gilbert, until recently a circuit court judge, and David Honigman, a state senator. Past Republican Party official Joseph Knollenberg, to his credit, has managed to stay out of most of the furor.

All three candidates will find their supporters come Aug. 4. But clearing aside all the sound and fury, signifying nothing, **DAVID HONIGMAN** appears as clearly the best option for Republicans in this district, which includes Northville above Baseline Road.

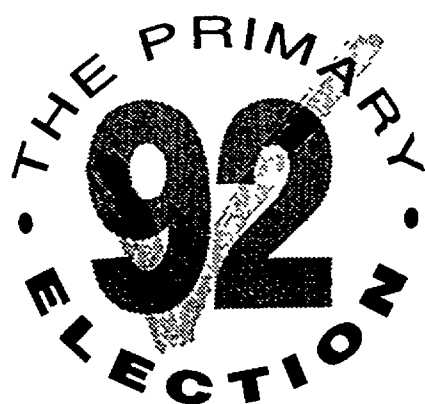
For Republicans who believe this really must be the year to add more women to Congress, Gilbert is the one. She has pledged her support to the Freedom of Choice Act and says she will support the Equal Rights Amendment.

She has experience in the judicial branch of government, and left her post as a circuit judge with the purpose in mind of providing voters with the pro-choice option.

She is well-informed about the problems facing this country, but Honigman, her opposition, has well-thought-out plans for many of the nation's crises. While Gilbert attacks, Honigman — amidst the defenses — has put together a campaign of substantial weight and independent thought.

Honigman's much-advertised plan to lower congressional salaries 5 percent each year the budget is not balanced is not one of his most brilliant ideas, verging on the silly. How does he expect a gridlocked Congress to agree to such a concept?

But in other areas Honigman offers strong approaches. His health care plan is particularly noteworthy. Instead of following the typical Republican line that a national health care plan is simply too burdensome an idea, Honigman has devised a plan that would cost the government little while insuring many of the currently uninsured.

His position on abortion has been criticized as fence-straddling, but for the moderates on the abortion issue, Honigman is a good choice. He believes in restricting abortion, but says it should be legal in the first five months of pregnancy.

Honigman's abortion position represents his best quality — he appears to be a compromiser. Congress is in a state of gridlock. In a good compromise, both sides feel like they have lost. But right now, no one wants to give up anything, so as a result, nothing is getting done. Congress needs someone with original ideas who is willing to compromise in implementing those ideas.

He also has a proven ability to get things accomplished, much more so than almost any politician you'd care to name. In both the state House and Senate, Honigman is one of, if not the, top person in actually shepherding legislation through the system into law.

The third candidate in the race, Joseph Knollenberg, has been largely dismissed by the other two candidates in their ads. Knollenberg has never held political office, and is billing himself as the consummate outsider. We have to disagree. Knollenberg's positions sound like they are taken right from the Republican Party platform. We see little in Knollenberg's ideas that would do anything to get Congress moving again.

Truth comes in unlikely places



If there's one truth I've learned as a journalist, it's that the brightest nuggets of truth are always found in the last place you look.

In recent weeks I conducted question-and-answer interviews with Republican candidates for the 13th U.S. Congressional District. Six men came into our office, and we quizzed each with a round of carefully selected questions. Some of the candidates got pretty windy, and by the time the last one came

around, my eyes were glazed over and my brain was a mass of static.

Glen Kassel, a real estate agent from Wayne, rolled in early on a Friday. With his white hair, blue blazer and tan cap, he looked like he'd be more comfortable watching from the rail at DRC than running for Congress. But at this point, Bullwinkle could have walked in the door, and I wouldn't have blinked.

The interview was uneventful. I questioned, he answered. But as things wound down, and I ran out of questions, I asked if there were any issues important to him that I didn't bring up.

He chose to discuss the abortion issue. Abortion remains an pivotal matter to most people, but in this election year the budget, trade, defense and health care seemed to outweigh it. When we selected questions to discuss with the candidates, abortion didn't make the cut.

Kassel came right out and declared himself pro-life. But in his very next breath he said the one thing that I've always thought was true. It was also the one thing I never thought I'd

hear a politician say.

"I... feel that this should be taken out of the political arena," he said. "There's no reason why that abortion issue should be there. I think this should be resolved by people. And I think it could. Get the leaders together that are fighting and resolve it, negotiate it."

It's always been my theory that abortion would never reach a point where it was completely banned or completely legal. Why? Because it's an issue that politicians in neither camp want settled.

Kassel likened the divisive nature of the abortion issue to "a Civil War," which isn't the first time I've heard the two terms in the same sentence. And as long as the war continues to rage Republicans (the majority of them, anyway) will be able to wrap themselves in the mantle of the Right to Life banner (and count on campaign contributions from that group's monster till). Likewise, Democrats (again, most, but not all, of them) will be able to entrench themselves in the voting bloc created by Planned Parenthood, NOW, NARAL and others.

But here was Kassel, a candidate for the U.S. House, saying he wanted the leaders from both the pro-life and pro-choice sides to sit down at the table and bring an end to it.

"Half of them are one way, half of them are the other, and doing more harm than good," he said. "They're fighting, they're picketing, and that's B.S. There's no need for that."

Kassel's admitted he's working on a limited budget, and comparing him to the triumvirate of Bob Geake, Burl Adkins and Ray Tanter, I'd say he doesn't stand a snowball's chance of getting the GOP nomination.

Even if he doesn't, it would be nice if somebody besides me would listen to him.

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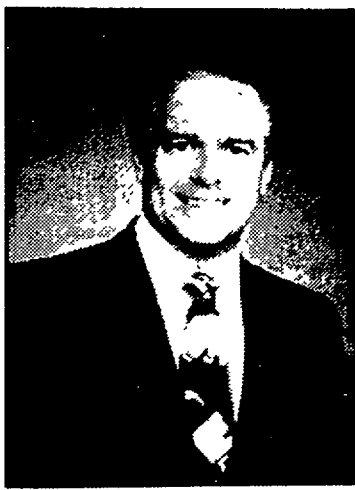
Adkins would take business to the U.S. House

Burl Adkins is hoping to parlay his first-hand knowledge of the business world into reform for the U.S. economy.

Adkins' attempt at the GOP nomination for the 13th U.S. Congressional district is his fourth shot at a seat in Congress. He was a Democratic challenger in 1986, and was the Republican nominee in 1988 and 1990 in the old 15th District.

Adkins, 40, is the founder of Global Technology Associates, an engineering and consulting firm which serves the auto industry. A resident of Southgate, which is outside the new district boundaries, Adkins is home-shopping in Northville.

Do you support a balanced budget amendment? Why or why not?

Yes, I support a balanced budget amendment because this year alone, the interest on the debt alone has cost us over \$200 billion. It's because there's no accountability in government. We have a bunch of foxes watching the chicken house and they're not going to be accountable until they're made to be accountable by law.

I think one of the worries about a balanced budget amendment is that it would exacerbate the gridlock that we hear so much about. If you can only spend X money, the competition between the various special interests might be so much the worse in getting things done.

I think there are various avenues

to take toward balancing the budget. Certainly there's going to have to be some cuts made. I believe we need to run our government the way we have to run our businesses. . . and I think that we have to apply solid business principles. And one of those is accountability and responsibility for the decisions that we make. . .

I think other areas we can cut include defense spending. We're spending over \$100 billion dollars a year to finance the defense needs of Europe and Asia. Specifically Japan. We've been doing that for 50 years. We can't afford to do it anymore. I think we need a congressman that will stand up and say, "The free lunch is over. You want us to protect you; here's the bill."

I'd also like to add that we need to

cut the government waste. It's unbelievable the waste that's going on in the United States government. I'm sure you folks know some of the things that are going on. We just spent \$250,000, as an example, to determine why wild hogs attack exotic plants in Hawaii. I'll give you another example. Last year, a Japanese firm lost a payroll contract for U.S. servicemen. The United States government paid them \$200,000 apiece, 141 people, \$200,000 apiece in severance pay. That's unacceptable to us. That's our hard-earned tax dollars. The government is an institution among itself, because they have a 96 to 98 percent re-election rate. They've institutionalized corruption, and we can get into that as we move on to other questions.

What ideas do you have to rein in the U.S. trade imbalance?

Well, we need to stop the revolving door of our trade officials representing foreign interests after leaving office. That is something that I have talked about for six years. Our trade and economic policies, as far as I'm concerned, are determined by the hundreds of millions of dollars the Japanese are spending on ex-trade officials and government officials to represent their interests in Washington, D.C. We have to change those laws, and we have to do it immediately. I have for the last five years circulated petitions demanding a five-year hiatus from the time they leave office as a federal official to the time they can represent foreign interests.

We need to eliminate sub-zone trade status. That's where they lower

tariffs for parts coming in, to transplants and the Big Three.

So that's where I'd get started. I'd restructure our tax system to give us a fair chance to compete. Currently for every dollar collected on a foreign car, an import sold here in the United States, approximately \$4.80 is collected on an American car in taxes. The rest of the world doesn't work like that. I believe our trade policy should be based — I'm to the point where I think it should be reciprocity. When a car that is designed, engineered and manufactured by the Big Three goes over to Japan, over \$12,000 is added to the sticker price. That's because they inspect our cars individually. They have standards and certifications three inches thick. They have four middlemen. They have a special expediting process. Bottom line is over \$12,000. When they ship their cars here, we have no inspections, we have no standards and certifications. They come off the boat, go into the showrooms, and many times — and I have documentation that I can show you — they sell their cars cheaper here than they do in Japan. Free trade doesn't exist. All these issues are intermingled as far as the deficit, as far as trade. We need reciprocity on our trade laws, I'm convinced of it now. . .

With many Americans not adequately covered by health insurance and health costs spiraling upward, what changes do you think are needed in our health care system?

Some of the best minds in the world are working on that, and I don't claim to be in that group. I think all of

us as Americans feel that all Americans should have some basic form of health care. It's how you get there, and who's going to pay for it. The Republican party is working on some very good ideas that might include a voucher type of system that might include if you pay X amount a year as an employer you can hand out things in the form of tickets for physicals on up to major operations. And if you don't use that and hand them in at the end of the year, as an individual you get X amount of money back. That will encourage people to take better care of themselves, and keep our health care costs down.

I think I need to do more research into that, but common sense tells us that might be a good idea. Give people an incentive to take better care of themselves.

There are other ideas floating around that include allowing small businesses to band together. I have a brother that owns his own company. He has a small construction company. And for him, his two children and his wife, he's paying over \$700 a month. Whereas a major employer who can be self-insured or get with a bigger group, the costs come down substantially, so I believe that is an idea whose time has come. I also believe that malpractice needs to be capped, that we need to reform our malpractice laws. . .

The Western Townships Utilities Authority is building a \$100-million sewer to serve this portion of the 13th District, to include Plymouth Township, Canton Township and Northville Township. Would you support federal

grants for that sewer line, and if so how would you go about getting them?

I think that is an issue that I would have to study. I'd have to look at the various ramifications. On the surface I would say that if it was done in a responsible manner, and if it was needed and necessary, that's something that I'd take a serious look at. But I haven't studied the ramifications. I think I'm smart enough to realize that there are three sides to every story: your side, my side and the truth. And we need to look at these things. Again, look at it like a business and make a determination at that point.

Any other items we didn't cover that are important to your campaign?

I'm for term limitations. I want you guys to know that because I think we have institutionalized corruption.

I have ideas such as I would support the concept of students having a high school diploma before they can get their driver's license. When they're 16 they can get a permit, and for X amount of period of time they have the opportunity to get their GED or a diploma. If they don't get it then they get their license taken away. I think we need some ideas like that.

I believe that in the area of crime and drugs that for hard drugs we should have a \$10,000 mandatory fine, and if they can't afford the \$10,000, whoever it is, they should do 2,000 hours of community service, working on the roads and streets.

Geake seeks move from state to national arena

State Sen. Robert Geake is considered by many observers to be one of the front-runners in the Republican nomination for the 13th U.S. Congressional District.

Geake has a long political history behind him, having served in Michigan's House and Senate since 1977. He currently serves on the Senate Labor Committee, the Family Law, Criminal Law and Corrections Committee and is vice chair of the Appropriations Committee.

The Northville resident is making his first run at a national office.

Do you support a balanced budget amendment? Why or why not?

Yes, I strongly support a balanced budget amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The state of Michigan has such a provision in its constitution and it's worked well for us. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee I've lived with that amendment these many years, and it's kept the state disciplined. And I feel that we need the same on the federal level.

Should the president have a line-item veto?

Exactly, yes, for the same reason. It's worked well in Michigan. It's a very irresponsible system to give the president a budget at the last minute which he either has to veto the whole thing or sign the whole thing. It's one of the things that's led to the Congress over spending by, this year it's \$400 billion, a \$400 billion deficit this year alone.

What plan do you have to tackle the nation's budget deficit?

Body, but it's true. This can save money by reducing our defense commitments. In light of the reduced cold war tensions we should re-examine all of our foreign aid commitments. We should probably look at our security budget. For instance the CIA budget is \$31 billion this year. You wonder if that's entirely necessary when we're running such a deficit.

Reducing spending then is your primary focus?

Yes. In government there's only two ways to balance the budget. One is to raise taxes, the other is to reduce spending. I'm totally committed to reducing spending.

What about the income tax structure? Would you push for anything there? Any major changes or minor alterations?

My first priority for income tax would be to create an IRA type personal account for health care. Right now it's very unfair in this country that someone who works for government or a large corporation has totally paid health care. Whereas a person that works for a small business or for themselves has to buy their health care or insurance with after-tax money. So I would amend the Income Tax Act to have personal health care accounts. They're like IRAs except of course you could draw on them when you need them and not have to wait until you're 59½.

What ideas do have to rein in the U.S. trade imbalance?

I believe that we should work to increase exports, and I do not support passing legislation to limit imports. When we limit imports we reduce

consumer choices and we drive up prices of goods, but by increasing our exports, we can improve our economy and at the same time provide more jobs.

Do you have any specifics on ways we could increase our exports?

Well it depends on what it is we're trying to export. There's no question but that we could increase our exports of foodstuffs — grain, meat, that sort of thing. And also manufactured goods, partly by winning trade concessions with other countries that are not (open) to our exports and partly by just concentrating on those things that are needed by other countries.

We touched on this just a moment ago, but with many Americans not adequately covered by

health insurance and costs spiraling upward, what changes do you think are needed in the health care system?

In addition to the individual health care accounts I mentioned, I believe that we need malpractice insurance reform. Tort reform. This is so that we can do away with frivolous lawsuits and so we can do away with the millions of dollars of so-called defensive medicine, unneeded laboratory tests. I feel I've been a leader in this issue at the state level. I've cosponsored several bills on it, but it's a national problem. We also need to make medicine, both outpatient and inpatient medicine, more competitive. Lately there have been some proposals in the newspaper about having doctors post their fees, that sort of thing. I think we're going to see more of that. I think we need it.

At the same time there are large parts of this state and other states that are underserved and cannot attract physicians or hospital care, and I think that we need to create some incentives at the federal level for practitioners to work in underserved areas.

This is a local issue for us. The Western Townships Utilities Authority is building a \$100 million sewer to serve this portion of the 13th District. Would you support federal grants for that sewer line and how would you go about getting them?

Yes, I believe that this area is entitled to federal help on that project. You get it by writing it into the appropriation bill.

Do you think it's possible for a Republican to win this district?

Yes, we studied it carefully and did extensive polling before I committed to enter. You may remember that I entered rather late because we were studying it carefully to make sure it was not only feasible but practical to mount a campaign.

If the political balance between the parties in Congress remains roughly the same after the election can you talk about being a member of the minority party and what that might mean?

Yes, I've had experience in the Michigan House of Representatives, and so I'm familiar with both the minority role and the majority role, and I'm here to tell you that it's better to be in the majority. But in my experience minority members can have a great deal of influence on policy and on appropriations by sticking together, by studying the issues, by hard work. A number of the liberal Democrats who are running the Congress now have grown lazy and complacent over the years, and new, aggressive, capable, intelligent members can win the day over lazy, complacent, entrenched members a fair amount of the time, and I base that on experience.

There's a lot of anti-incumbent feeling, of course. If you win your party's nomination, you'll be going up against an incumbent in the Congress, although not the incumbent in this area. At the same time you've been a holder of public office for many years yourself, though not in Congress. Do you see the anti-incumbent sentiment as

likely to work for you or against you, or just a wash?

In the primary I don't think it will be a problem, and I base this on my public appearances and my door-to-door work. I always start out by telling them I am a state Senator from Northville whether I'm in Ann Arbor or Westland or Garden City or wherever, and people seem to accept that. They want to know what I've been doing, so, these 15 years, and they want to know what my stand is on the issues. But they do not seem to feel that because you've been at one level that they don't want you at a higher level. In the general election, clearly the anti-incumbent mood will help us because it's mostly focused on Congress anyway.

Your background is in child psychology?

School psychology really. **Do you spend any time actively in that?**

No, I'm not as able to anymore, because being a legislator and being available to your constituency is really a full time job.

Do you ever see yourself going back to that?

Oh, yes. I never envisioned myself as a career politician. And sometimes I'm surprised that I've been here this long. But there always seems to be something more that needs to be done legislatively. And I'd go back one more term at a time to further our objectives and goals. But I still look forward to the time when I can go back to being in private practice as a psychologist or to work in the school system.

Kassel campaign grounded in anti-tax stance

Though he has voiced his opinion on a number of issues, he takes particular pride in tax-fighting. He has signed the Taxpayer Protection Pledge of the Washington-based Americans for Tax Reform.

Kassel, a past Grand Knight of the Northville Knights of Columbus, has been active in Scouting, the American Legion and the Westland Republican Club.

Do you support a balanced budget amendment? Why or why not?

Well, I do support a balanced budget. The obvious reason is that our grandkids are going to be paying for the deficit. Somebody made a comment the other day I might throw in. How can we expect Congress to work with a balanced budget when they can't even balance their own checkbook? So much for that.

What plan do you have to tackle the nation's budget deficit?

One of the thoughts I have in mind, first of all, our problem on the economy, and that's dealing with the budget, is really the voters. They're buying these foreign cars. They have

no business buying as many as they have. Consequently we should encourage buying American products.

I'm thinking on the lines of a national lottery. I know people have put it down and it comes up every now and then when there is a presidential election. But I believe that if we come up with a national budget, we can knock off that \$3-trillion-plus (debt) in three years. Every state could oversee it. They could get a percentage of the action. All 50 states would participate, and I say that in three years, we could clear the line out. I wouldn't want congress to touch that money. We would have outfits like Price Waterhouse and others that would handle some of the lottery operation. In other words it would be someone that's not involved.

How about other revenues, like taxes?

I'm raising taxes. I'm against raising taxes. If anything I want to decrease it very strongly. I'm in the marketplace every day and it's sad how they're hitting us.

The state probably makes as much or more than the people selling the car because they sell that car over and over again each time they get that 4 percent. I think that's a good level; there's nothing wrong with that if it fills the coffers of the state. But somewhere along the line we've got so much bureaucracy on our backs it's got to stop. That balloon's going to break wherever you want to put it.

What ideas do you have to rein

in the U.S. trade deficit?

I think on that one, there's some other information on that that I'm getting. I would have to answer it at a later date. I was at the library yesterday on a part of that. I don't think that can be answered that easily. I don't know whether I'm getting off the subject, but you know American cars really aren't American. There's so many foreign parts in them, it's sad.

Well, without offering solutions, what do you see as the problems with our trade situation?

I don't think it's fair. I think it's got to be equalized in some direction. You've got to sit down and lay out what we've got, how much we're bringing in as opposed to what we're sending out. The headlines yesterday said we're sending Russia \$24 million. That's a lot of cabbage. That's going to affect us.

I don't know if this is the proper place to throw it in, but I've also been doing a little study on the Soo Locks. You know the ships coming in from the Atlantic Ocean going through the St. Lawrence Seaway go through the locks. Many of them are too big to go through the locks and they have to empty them into smaller ships to bring them through here to Michigan, Ohio and some other places. It's my feeling that we should widen the locks enough. Canada's already done that. I talked to the Army engineers in downtown Detroit, and they've been trying to get that for a number of years, but they can't reach the con-

gressmen to push it.

With many Americans not covered adequately by health insurance and costs spiraling upward, what changes do you think are needed in our health care system?

There's a lot of people that are sick on the street right now, and when I say on the street, I mean in the metropolitan areas. We can't go the way we're going. I checked out the national health care program they have in Canada, and they tell me that if you need an operation in Canada, sometimes you've got to wait two or three years to get it. If that's the case, you could die before that.

We've got to come up with some kind of common denominator. I believe it's Hawaii that has it set up now where employers put X amount of

dollars in the pot, and they're pretty well covered over there consequently. Again, that's one that really needs to be studied. But it can't go on the way it's going. You go in the hospital now if you're sick or hurt, they'll give you a couple of pills or first aid and they'll run you out if you don't have the bucks. "Where's your Blue Cross card, or keep movin'."

This is a local issue for us. The Western Townships Utilities Authority is building a \$100-million sewer line to serve this part of the 13th District to include Northville Township, Plymouth Township and Canton Township. Would you support federal grants for this sewer line, and if so how would you go about getting them?

The bonds are the most common way of getting them. Again, before I'd be a party to something like that I'd really want to look into it. There's a lot of hanky panky when money's coming in on a project like that. I'd really have to look into that before I could give an intelligent answer.

What issues didn't we bring up here that are important to you?

I might mention to you that I don't ask for any of the endorsements from any of them. I turn them back. I fill out the questionnaire, but I'm not asking for endorsements. I'm talking like gun control, the abortion groups, pro-choice or pro-life.

I had an article last Monday that was running through the Observer, that was on the abortion issue. I feel

that most of the candidates shy away from it. I think of the six of us, there were two of us that came out straight against abortion, but I am the only one that really came out and said, "But —"

I am contacting the leaders of both the pro-choice and pro-life people and we should sit across the table like this and get the matter resolved. It's splitting our country up, almost like a Civil War. Half of them are one way, half of them are the other, and doing more harm than good. They're fighting, they're picketing, and that's B.S. There's no need for that. I also feel that this should be taken out of the political arena.

There's no reason why that abortion issue should be there. I think this should be resolved by people. And I think it could. Get the leaders together that are fighting and resolve it, negotiate it. And I think it can be done.

Any other issues that are important to your campaign?

I'll tell you what somebody once said. You can't be everything to everybody. I sort of like that. But you try your best, and I want to be a people servant. This is why I want to stay away from the endorsements. I feel like you're selling your soul to the devil if you're taking an endorsement. How the hell can I represent you if I've got a guy that gave me \$5,000 for my campaign. I'm operating on a limited budget, but I'm not complaining about that.

Scott seeks changes in country's health care

Herbert A. Scott was a late entry into the race for the 13th U.S. Congressional District, but his name is not totally unfamiliar to western Wayne County Republicans.

The Canton resident has been active in the Republican party at the local level, and his experience includes state and county Republican conventions dating back to 1986.

Scott, 44, is vice president of sales for the Northern Division of Major Pharmaceuticals, which is based in Auburn Hills. As such, health care reform is one of his pet projects.

He has said that he was prompted to run for office because of the fresh, new faces that he has seen elected in recent years. This is his first attempt at political office.

Medicare benefits. It just shows that they really need to be willing to make serious cuts or at least make serious decisions without fear of reprisals for their jobs, and I think that's what they haven't had in the past. That's not to say that Medicaid and Medicare need to be looked at to be cut. I'm just using that as an example.

How about on the revenue side?
I'm not in favor of any new taxes at this point. I believe that we can capture just by cuts and without expending new programs — and I don't mean that exclusively because there may be some programs. But I think as we look at new programs, we should be looking at cuts as well.

What ideas do you have to rein in the U.S. trade deficit?

There again I have to be very careful. I consider myself a moderate on most issues. I don't want to put stringent trade policies in force. I do feel that we do need to stop blatant dumping of overseas products on America. I think there is a middle ground that needs to be looked for, and I think the dumping is the problem, more than anything else, and I think that needs to be examined and worked on from that perspective.

With many Americans not covered adequately by health insurance, and costs spiraling upward, what changes do you think are needed in our health care system?

I have agreed to sponsor the Health Care Reform Act of 1992 when elected in November. Some of the basic points on it, it will allow a self-employed worker to be able to deduct the whole 100 percent of their insurance premiums, rather than

the 25 percent now. That will put me and me with large corporations. It will reform insurance laws to stabilize premium costs for small businesses, and remove the fear of losing insurance because a single employee may become ill. It'll cap malpractice lawsuits, liability disputes. They'll have a mediator involved at the beginning before it even goes to court. It will have a program called Medi-save, which is a kind of tax-free account, which if you can save on your premiums — I'm talking about from tax credits — it will allow you to keep that money and either expend it for other co-pays, or it can actually even be extracted for personal use and taxed at that point.

It's an alternative to the Democrats' package — they have about five or six different fragmented packages at this point. I'm definitely adamantly opposed to a Canadian type system that will only bring tons of government control back into the marketplace which I think is unneeded.

This is a local issue for us. The Western Townships Utilities Authority is building a \$100-million sewer to serve this portion of the 13th District, to include Northville Township, Plymouth Township and Canton Township. Would you support federal grants for that sewer line, and if so how would you go about getting them?

At this point, I would say that I would support federal grants. I'm not real familiar with the situation other than I am aware that it is being put in place at this time. I guess I would have to look at the ramifications of what these federal grants would be.

I've spent a lot of time involving myself with the national issues at this time, and I don't feel qualified to give a complete analysis of that program.

After the November election, there's a possibility that there would still be a Republican minority in Congress. How would you work within that framework?

One of the reasons that I got interested in becoming this district's representative was because I saw that Congress was just starting, and I mean that in its infancy, to reform some of the old ways; that people were demanding there were changes to be made. And I thought that was really starting, and that was what I was excited about.

I feel there's a core now, and I'm not just speaking about Republicans. I think there's a core of young, ambitious, honest gentlemen that have been elected, either freshman or second-term congressmen that are really concerned about changing America and putting it on the right track. I think there needs to be a bipartisan agreement because nothing is going to be solved otherwise. We've got to forget about our agendas. We've got to quit running for reelection the day we're elected, and just put all that aside and look for the betterment and future of America rather than the betterment and future of ourselves.

Are there any issues we didn't cover that are of importance to you that you'd like to talk about?

I've got four issues that I really named, and we've covered the first three. The budget I believe is the top

issue, health care reform being the second. I think the third was government reform. The fourth, of course, is crime and drugs.

I'd pretty much gotten my ideas set forth in the first three. The fourth was a little bit more difficult because I just don't feel that there's any short term answer. I think we've got to look at the overall picture and we have to attack the root causes rather than just the surface problems of crime and drugs, the breakdown of the family, the willingness to get involved in greed, I guess it would come down to, other people's greed. And I think we need to attack these root causes of those crimes and see if we can't solve them that way, rather than just throwing more money into new programs and new jails.

That's not to say that I don't think that we need to put money into institutions to take care of felons and so forth, but I don't think that's the entire answer, is the point I'm trying to get across.

So you propose going after this problem through educational programs, through the schools, that sort of thing?

Well, schools is another part. I'm for schools of choice and I think our schools as a whole need to be revamped and I think that education is important. I think that there needs to be an understanding that at the youngest level, that education process begins, in first grade even. And we must look at informing the young citizens because they after all will be someday leading the country themselves.

Steele offers a detailed plan to reduce budget

With the budget and international trade coming to the fore as election issues, Bill Steele is hoping his background in economics will earn him the GOP nomination in the 13th U.S. Congressional District.

Steele, 49, earned his bachelor's degree in economics from Monmouth College in Illinois, and served as an economic analyst with the state of Michigan for five years. More recently, he's been a blue-collar worker for Nabisco Brands in Farmington, where he's been a union negotiator and union steward.

This is his first run for political office.

Do you support a balanced budget amendment? Why or why not?

No, I don't, and I am alone amongst the candidates in the Republican primary in this district who does not. Basically I think its my training and background as an economist. I should point out that every major association of economists do not favor a balanced budget amendment. I am absolutely in favor of balanced budgets; let me get that point out. In fact this is a very crucial part of my campaign, the fact that the federal deficit must be eliminated and reduced. I also want to point out that I do favor David Honigman's proposal that the pay of Congress be cut by 5 percent a year until a balanced budget is achieved. And I've been on the record favoring that proposal since the beginning of the year.

There are times when an unbalanced budget can be necessary, perhaps even beneficial. That's the major reason that I would hate to strait-jacket Congress into a particular position. But as I say before, this issue of obtaining a balanced budget

is absolutely critical to our country, not only in terms of its cost to the taxpayer for having to fund the deficit, but also in the fact that it's having an adverse effect on our capital markets, and the ability for private business and industry to obtain necessary financing.

Under what circumstances might a budget deficit be acceptable?

In cases of situations such as back in the Depression where the economy is undergoing a severe contraction, I was going to say basically a free fall, but I don't think I need to go that far. But basically I agree Alfred Gaines and his analysis of pump-priming and so forth. The problem is that we've been running a deficit for between 15 and 20 years, and there's been absolutely no excuse for it, given the situation with our economy over that period of time. There's no excuse for running that type of deficit.

What plan do you have to tackle the nation's budget deficit?

First of all, I favor giving the president the line-item veto basically to cut out the pork that Congress can't seem to divorce itself from. Also I favor a return to the original Gramm-Rudman anti-deficit law. When that was originally passed, there was to be no deficit spending. Mandatory cuts across the board if Congress couldn't agree on a budget, and in the 1990 budget summit, Congress changed that. So that what they said was as long as we come up with the funding for any new appropriations, that's sufficient and should tax revenues fall short for say an economic recession like we've had, then we're not responsible for that.

I favor cutting a number of agricultural subsidies such as sugar, and I would say also in the agricultural area, certain trade restrictions such

as for peanuts and peanut farmers.

As far as in the area of defense, I believe the Sea Wolf submarine program should be dropped, as well as the Peacekeeper Missile program, the Peacekeeper Missile being a strategic missile. Really we're in an area now where our defense needs are tactical rather than strategic. Also I favor elimination of ground forces abroad, except that I favor the maintenance of air force bases and logistical supply abroad. But other than that I think what we need is ready deployment forces rather than standing forces in Europe or elsewhere.

I also favor means-testing Medicare. I believe very firmly in keeping with what I feel was the original social contract of Social Security back when it was passed originally under Roosevelt's administration in the 1930s, which set up individual retirement accounts and that's the way it was sold to the American people and I still feel that the government is

beholden to maintain that. I don't believe in means-testing basic Social Security payments.

There are certain other areas where I think we can help. Revenue enhancement has become a euphemism for taxes. For instance, I would favor eliminating the deduction for interest paid for new leveraged buyouts.

Also I would favor delaying the NASA space station.

I would impose growth-rated caps on mandatory spending programs. In other words entitlement programs. There should be some limits on the degree to which they can expand so that they just aren't skyrocketing. For instance the Pell grants for education.

Something that's very controversial, and I know it's going to be controversial. I think we're spending too much on the war on drugs. We are past the point where we're reaching diminishing returns. We're spending above \$25 billion a year on this effort.

Let be firmly on the record that I do think drugs are a scourge, and certainly I don't want to be perceived as being soft on drugs. But I would like to see more of it focused again at the state level as opposed to the federal level, with the federal government acting more as support to the state and local governments in terms of helping them implement state policy rather than having federal law supercede state law. Basically it's concurrent, but most states yield to the federal guidelines in terms of penalties and such.

What ideas do you have to rein in the U.S. trade imbalance?

We really have lacked a comprehensive trade policy to promote economic growth and development. We basically had a laissez-faire attitude towards foreign trade partners which unilaterally opened our market

and has really deeply hurt, particularly in Michigan various industries, particularly the auto industry.

We really have to address this problem of structural barriers. For instance, Japan's requiring that our cars transported there for sale must be tested individually rather than receiving type-category testing where a certain sample is tested and then if those pass, the entire category is passed. I understand that this is beginning to happen. What I'm trying to say is I believe in free trade as long as it's fair trade. I'm not in favor of this idea of free trade in the sense that we're opening up our markets. It's a matter of reciprocity. If the Japanese are going to demand each model be tested, then why not have each car they import here be tested? What's the sense of giving their market that protection while we're opening ours?

Another matter I take issue with is our most-favored-nation trading policy whereby we will accept any other favored nation's tariffs as long as those tariffs are applied equally against other countries.

I am in favor of a trade agreement with Mexico. I have no problem with it being on a fast track. I would most definitely want to make sure they have not only on their books but being enforced, comparable standards in terms of environment and workplace safety regulations.

One thing I wouldn't want to see, though, is Mexico developed into a means by which let's say, Japan, can take those low-paying assembly jobs that they've been farming out to Hong Kong and wherever and put those jobs in Mexico and use those as a back door by which to enter the U.S. market. Provisions need to be established to prevent that.

I wish I had better answers, to be quite honest. It's a very unbalanced market structure. My preference would make their presence more responsive to normal market forces. One of the big problems is that as long as people have health care coverage, they don't care what it costs as long as it's covered. And if you try to give responsibility of paying those costs directly from the patient many people aren't knowledgeable.

Well, I have to admit I know the basic controversy. I don't feel I really know the in-depth aspects of the controversy.

And frankly, no, I don't favor a grant in a situation like this. You know, they wanted it, let them pay for it. Let them wallow in their own mess is basically what I feel about it. And again, I made a point I'm not going to favor any special interests.

Is there anything else you wanted to raise that we didn't bring up?

I have tax program that is part of this. I have a rather bold proposal. I favor eliminating income tax, capital gains tax and corporate profits taxes and replacing those taxes with consumption taxes, a value-added tax and a government goods and service tax.

Basically I am pro-choice. I'm delighted with the Supreme Court decision. It came down right where I'm at. Basically I believe in the fundamental right of a woman to an abortion.

Tanter positions self as experienced outsider

Though he's never sought elective office before, Ray Tanter, one of six Republicans vying for the nomination for the 13th U.S. Congressional district, is no stranger to Washington.

Tanter, a University of Michigan political science professor, may be best known for his expert commentaries during Operation Desert Storm. He worked on Ronald Reagan's 1980 presidential campaign, and later served as Reagan's foreign policy advisor, and was on staff at the National Security Council. He was also co-chairperson of the Middle East Task Force for Reagan-Bush.

Do you support a balanced budget amendment? Why or why not?

I think in the long term a pro-growth platform will reduce the budget deficit and bring the budget in balance. In the mid-term a budget balance amendment is the correct signal to give to the American people that both the Congress and Executive Branch will get their acts together. In the short term, however, there are no quick fixes that will result in a balanced budget.

What plan do you have to tackle the nation's budget deficit?

Okay, I have an economic growth plan which involves first capital gains tax reduction from 28 to 14 percent. Secondly, export promotion for job creation rather than import restriction for job elimination. And thirdly, tax credits for first-time home buyers, and fourthly car mortgages. That is, make consumer interest for financing automobiles tax-deductible again. I think that kind of package focusing on the housing industry and the auto industry especially relates to the needs of the 13th Congressional District.

Do you want to go into a little more detail on those areas you just brought up?

Capital gains tax cuts are a little more straightforward than is export promotion, so let me say something about export promotion. The Commerce Department of the U.S. government spends less than any other comparable agency in the industrialized world for export promotion because of the laissez-faire type approach in the United States. The executive branch, irrespective of party, has allowed industries to fend for themselves when they go abroad.

What ideas do you have to rein in the U.S. trade imbalance?

The best way to improve the trade balance is to, one, push American exports abroad, and two, defeat import

restrictive legislation. And three, equitably enforce American antidumping laws. That is a free and fair trade position.

The International Trade Commission enforces an anti-dumping law that is out of date. The commission followed the letter of the law without making the recommendation to Capitol Hill that the law ought to be changed. So there's this gap between what Commerce found. . . . And the Bush administration has been slow at asking for a change in the legislation.

Let me say one last thing on the trade deficit. The House just passed an amendment to the trade bill in which autos and auto parts have to have at least 77 percent American parts. Domestic content legislation. I think this is not job creation. It is job-destruction legislation. What it will do is to allow, in the general agreement on trade and tariffs negotiations, for European countries to come up with reciprocal domestic content legislation.

You're right, costs are spiraling. Americans spent about \$750 billion last year for health care, and many

Americans are not covered. One of the ideas I have is generations growing together where there would be universal access to health care without having a national health plan. I think access is the key, and one means of access is through tax credits so that people can use the savings from what they would have paid in the tax system to purchase their own health insurance. That idea is one which George Bush has played around with but he hasn't pushed very hard.

Well, I am not as familiar with that particular issue as you are. I have a general principle that Michigan needs to fight for the tax dollars that it sends to Washington. I mean fight hard. Michigan is 49th in getting money back. And Michigan has one of the highest averages with respect to length of tenure of its representatives. So the Broomfields and Fords, Republican and Democrat respectively, haven't brought home the bacon. They haven't done the job. So this notion that you should re-elect an incumbent because the incumbent will do a better job bringing the bacon home is just not true.

The way you get that grant for the sewer is that you are familiar with the Washington system. You have to know how to bargain and trade, and that's one of the things I think I can do. I know many of the people in Congress, and the people who work the sewer issues in the executive branch. I'm sure I know some of them, either through the party or through my two stays in Washington. So my friend

Bob Geake has legislative experience in Lansing and I think that legislative experience is important unless what you have to do is know that the Washington subway is not called the subway, it's called the Metro. You have to know what that town is about. I think I have the best of all possible worlds. I have the experience, but I'm a fresh face.

I'm not a career politician and he is. I'm a problem solver. I intend to go in and come back. That's why I believe in term limitations. Four terms for the House, two terms for the Senate. It's enough. Creating and disseminating knowledge are my callings, and I intend to continue to do that. I'll retire as a University of Michigan professor, not as a member of the Congress.

Talk some more about the return of tax money if you would. It's not only Broomfield and Ford. Michigan has a very senior delegation. And yet there are so many others from the delegation in leadership positions. Why aren't we getting the return?

I don't think they've engaged in horse trading adequately. People from Arizona get tax dollars because they are building infrastructure. Michigan has crumbling infrastructure and ought to be building infrastructure.

Summer salad deserves better than a bowl

Summer salads are much more than lettuce in a bowl. In the hot days of summer, salads are easy, satisfying one dish meals that the entire family will enjoy. There is no end to the possible combinations for salads. After the salad is made, all you need is a loaf of crusty bread.

Select and combine greens, choose from many flavors and appearances. Romaine and iceberg lettuces provide crispness. Butter and oakleaf provide softness and variety shapes. Red-leaf or radicchio brighten a salad. Shredded sorrel leaves add tartness while curly endive adds texture and bitterness. Spinach adds interest. Belgian endive, watercress or arugula will add a sharp bite.

Edible flowers that are free from chemical sprays add another dimension to the salads. Nasturtiums, chrysanthemums, violas, violets, alyssum, daylilies, roses and dianthus can all enhance salads. Herb flowers can add flavor and color, however can be intense in flavor so use sparingly.

When using just "greens" in a salad, chill them and mix at the last possible moment. The cold helps to crisp the greens and numb your taste buds so you'll be satisfied with less salad dressing. If you wet the greens, the dressing will not cling, and the flavors are diluted, so dry thoroughly after washing. Greens can be torn ahead and placed in a plastic bag or covered bowl and refrigerated for several hours before serving. Greens should be handled gently to prevent them from wilting.

Be creative and make interesting salads using frozen, dried, canned or leftover vegetables. Frozen corn, peas, dried tomatoes and mushrooms, canned water chestnuts, bottled artichokes or roasted peppers are just a few options. Potatoes, onion, sweet green peppers, cabbage, carrots and celery, of course, are old stand-bys for salads. Try some different vegetables in the salad such as sweet potatoes, yellow squash, kohlrabi, green beans and asparagus.

To enjoy the taste and texture of the vegetables, don't obscure them with an overabundance of oil dressing. About one tablespoon of dressing will coat a cup of salad.

Choose an oil with lots of flavor. Extra virgin oil is a great choice for flavor, while canola oil has a milder taste. For a stronger flavor, try peanut or sesame oil.

Take care in choosing a vinegar for a dressing. A malt or distilled white vinegar is too pungent for salads. Fruit flavored, apple cider, sherry, balsamic or white wine are good choices for mild flavoring.

Chop fresh herbs to add to your dressings. Parsley, basil, cilantro, mint, oregano or tarragon will add an interesting twist. Horseradish and Dijon mustard in the mixed salad dressing will add some zest. Don't forget the garlic.

Presentation is also very important with a salad. Garnish with lemon wedges, walnut halves, toasted sesame seeds, unsalted dry roasted peanuts, fresh mint leaves or with a few dilly beans to add a tart, crisp flavor. A garnish of fresh oranges or grapefruit slices will add another dimension to a salad. Shave or make thin ribbon strips of summer squash to garnish the top when serving. Homemade croutons are much fresher and flavorful and will accent any kind of a salad. Once you make your own you'll probably never buy them again.

For a very nutritious, satisfying, easy one dish meal, consider a hot or cold salad. Be creative and imaginative, put your own signature on a salad and everyone will want you to bring it to the next picnic or party on those hot days when only a salad will satisfy.

Getting to the root

Follow your nose with flavorful favorite

In the festival's Gourmet Alley Alone — where they serve garlic-laced pesto and pasta and scampi, garlic bread and pepper steak rolls — they use up more than 5,000 pounds of garlic, 7,000 loaves of French bread, 24,000 rolls, 1,400 pounds of onions, 5,190 pounds of butter, 14 bins of bell peppers, 4,000 pounds of mushrooms.

And this doesn't include the food served in dozens of booths, where they sell Greek and Thai cuisine with garlic as well as novelties, such as garlic ice cream and chocolate-covered garlic candy.

And when festivalgoers aren't eating, they're watching the annual Garlic Festival cook-off for any one of a number of cooking demonstrations by celebrity chefs ranging from local Gilroy standouts to public television chefs and cookbook author Martin Yan.

The bottom line is, if you're going to reek, you might as well enjoy it.

Here are some winning recipes from past Gilroy Garlic Festivals.

GRILLED TURKEY TENDERLOINS IN GARLIC-ANCHO CHILI SAUCE

4 dried Ancho or Pastilla chilies
1 cup water
1 tablespoon olive oil
1 onion, chopped
8 cloves fresh garlic, minced
2 tomatillos, chopped
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon sugar
1 tablespoon chocolate chips
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon cumin
salt and pepper to taste
4 to 8 turkey tenderloins, about 1 1/4 to 2 pounds
1 cup fresh cilantro, chopped.

Yields 4 servings.

Stem and seed chilies. Heat water and pour over chilies. Let stand for at least 30 minutes.

Heat oil in large saucepan. Sauté onion and garlic until tender, not brown, about 5 minutes. Add tomatillos, chilies and 1/2 cup of chili liquid. Add Worcestershire sauce, sugar, chocolate chips, cinnamon and cumin. Simmer 20 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Pour into food processor or food mill and puree, then strain through a medium sieve. Sauce should be thick. (May be made two days ahead of serving.)

At least 2 hours before serving, trim turkey tenderloins and pour sauce over them in container with tight-fitting lid to marinate. Remove turkey from sauce. Reserve all sauce; set aside 1/2 cup for basting. Grill turkey tenderloins until just done, about 4 to 5 minutes per side, over hot charcoal or under broiler, basting with 1/2 cup sauce. Heat remaining reserved sauce and pass with cooked turkey. Garnish with chopped cilantro.

SKEWERED CHICKEN AND GARLIC

Marinate:

1/4 cup white wine
1/4 cup lime juice

Grilled Turkey Tenderloins in Ancho-Chili Sauce is a sure-fire hit with garlic lovers.

1/4 cup chopped fresh basil leaves or 4 teaspoons dried basil
2 jalapeno chilies, seeded and minced
2 tablespoons olive oil
6 cloves fresh garlic, peeled and finely chopped
1 tablespoon peeled, minced gingerroot
1 tablespoon soy sauce
2 teaspoons sugar

Other ingredients:
24 whole cloves fresh garlic
6 chicken breast halves, skinned and bones
2 red bell peppers, cut into 1-inch chunks
2 cups seeded, diced Roma tomatoes
1/2 cup sliced green onions
2 tablespoons chopped cilantro
Salt
Basil leaves, cilantro springs and lime slices for garnish

Yields 4 to 6 servings
Combine marinade ingredients in small bowl; pour into large plastic bag.

Drop whole garlic cloves into boiling water; boil 10 minutes. Drain; cool slightly. Peel garlic cloves and add to marinade. Cut chicken into 1 1/2-inch cubes; add to marinade. Seal bag and refrigerate at least 1 hour or overnight.

Thread chicken, garlic cloves and bell pepper chunks alternately onto skewers. Grill or broil 4 inches from heat for 6 minutes, or until chicken is browned and cooked through. Meanwhile, pour marinade into saucepan; bring to a boil over medium heat. Stir in tomatoes, green onions, cilantro and salt to taste; remove from heat. Serve with chicken. Garnish with basil or cilantro sprigs and lime slices, if desired.

Note: Parboiling the garlic cloves leaves them mild enough to eat but still firm enough to skewer.

Learning the terms can make you an expert

fresh cloves in a garlic press, being certain not to include any of the flesh. Juice blends easily for uniform flavor.

We all know the pungent smell of garlic, but in case some of the terms used to describe it and the type available are unclear, here's a primer.

Bulb. The name for the usable portion of fresh garlic made up of as many as 15 or more individual cloves.

Clove. One of the several segments of a bulb, each of which is covered with a thin, papery skin.

Dehydrated. Any of several forms of garlic from which the moisture has been removed. Dehydrated garlic is available minced, powdered and granulated.

Crushed. A term that refers to fresh garlic that has been smashed by a broad side of a knife or cleaver on a chopping board or with a rolling pin between several thicknesses of wax paper.

Fresh. The term used to describe garlic that has not been dehydrated. Actually "fresh" garlic is allowed to "cure" in the field before harvesting just until the papery skin, not the cloves, becomes dry.

Granulated. A dehydrated form of garlic that is five times stronger than raw garlic. Its flavor is released only in the presence of moisture.

Juice. Garlic juice may be purchased commercially or prepared by squeezing

Minced. This term is used for both dehydrated and fresh garlic. Generally called for when small pieces of garlic are desirable as in soups, sauces or salad dressings. Fresh garlic may be minced using a sharp knife on a chopping board. If the recipe calls for salt, add it to the garlic when mincing. It will prevent the garlic from sticking to the knife and absorb the juices otherwise lost in the mincing process. Finally minced garlic, as called for in most French recipes, tends to disappear into the finest dish. For a more robust flavor, mince more coarsely, as called for in many Chinese dishes. Large amounts of garlic can be minced using a blender or food processor.

Powdered. Powdered garlic is available commercially. When using powder in recipes with a high acid content, mix with water (two parts water, to one part powder) before adding. Powdered garlic can be made from fresh by slowly drying peeled garlic cloves in the oven. When very dry, pound or crush until fine and powdery. Pass through a sieve and pound any large pieces, then sieve again. Store in sealed jars in a dry place.

'50s were revolutionary era in food world



The '50s Festival is coming to town. Or should I say the Town Center. The activities planned are phenomenal.

Why are we so infatuated by the '50s? The music, the cars and, yes, even the food. This was the beginning of a new era. The war was over and extravagance abounded. Gourmet magazine premiered in 1941 and was followed by dozens of other publica-

tions about food. The days of Coke, burgers, TV dinner and ketchup were over.

Gourmets were considered "snobs" who would have nothing to do with a good hot dog or casserole. Pate, whole roasted garlic cloves, sukiyaki and cassoulets were the new breed. Beef Wellingtons, moussaka, fondue and souffles found their way into American's lives.

Food took on a character of its own. Cocktail parties became the fashionable way to entertain. Hors d'oeuvre was just one of the French words to appear. "En croute" (in pastry), "au vine" (with wine), "a l'orange" (with oranges or orange essence), and "au poivre" (with pepper) all became part of the new culinary language.

Mateus and Lancer's were the wines of

choice and the popularity of napkin rings abounded. James Beard was the force behind much of the new wave cooking. He was partial to raw beef, anchovies, strong cheeses and sweetbreads, all of which, until this time, were not considered the "usual" bill of fare.

Beard's major complaint was with the rigidity of American cooking. Strict measurements and inflexible procedures were not acceptable to him. One of my favorite quotes of his is as follows, "For so many years, fun was lacking in our kitchens. The home economists approach their tasks with so much solemnity. I want to say, to hell with all their rules."

Enjoyment became Beard's chant and

one of the vital principles of America's food revolution.

Along with their newfound food, gourmets' kitchens filled with new equipment. In 1949, the first self lowering toaster was introduced. Mixers, blenders, electric grills and automatic bean pots filled the shelves of department stores. It was hard to keep these new appliances in stock. Demand out-weighted supply.

In 1940 2 1/2 million refrigerators were sold. By 1950 over 6 million, mostly aqua, boxes adorned kitchens. For the real serious cooks freezers were available to hold their lobster tails mail-ordered from the East.

The '50s were the start of a new revolution, although much of the food served

then is no longer popular. We have gotten back to more simplistic and simple fare. As a reminder though, and in conjunction with Kitchen Glamour and the Novi Town Center, I will give two demonstrations on '50s food. They will be held on Thursday and Friday at 2 p.m. at the Novi Kitchen Glamour.

Thursday will feature a '50s hors d'oeuvres sampling and Friday a 50's dinner party. Recipes and samples will be distributed. Everyone is welcome.

We'll "eat, drink and be merry" in the '50s tradition. See you there!!!

WARM VEGETABLE SALAD

4 small zucchini, about 1 pound
4 medium carrots, about 10 ounces
4 stalks celery, about 6 ounces
5-6 scallions
1 small head cauliflower, 1 pound, washed and separated into 1 1/2 inch flowerets
6 large radishes, washed and cut into 1/4 inch slices
2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard
1/2 cup peanut oil
1 tablespoon cider vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Bring 4 cups water to a boil. Meanwhile trim and wash zucchini. Cut crosswise into 3 inch chunks, then into 1/4 inch sticks. Peel the carrots and celery, cut both into 2 inch by 1/4 inch sticks. Trim scallions and cut into 2 inch sticks.

Add the carrots and celery to the boiling water. Cook for 2 minutes, add cauliflower and boil for 5 minutes. Add zucchini and cook for 1 minute. Stir in the scallions and radishes and cook for 10 seconds. Drain reserving the vegetable stock for soup.

Prepare dressing: Mix together the dressing ingredients in a large bowl, add the hot vegetables and toss to coat with dressing. Serve lukewarm or at room temperature. Serves 6.

STRAWBERRY SUMMER PUDDING

1 1/2 pints fresh, ripe strawberries
1/4 cup sugar
6 ounces bread
1/2 cup strawberry jam
1 cup sour cream

Clean and hull the berries. Cut 12 of the berries into thin slices, about 1 1/4 cups and mix with 2 tablespoons of the sugar. Set aside.

Place the bread in the bowl of a food processor and process a few seconds to make coarse bread crumbs to make 2 cups. Set aside.

Place the whole berries, the jam and remaining sugar in processor bowl and process until smooth. Transfer to a bowl and lightly fold in bread crumbs. Divide the pudding into six, 1 cup containers. Refrigerate for 2-3 hours.

To serve, spoon the reserved berry slices onto 6 dessert dishes. Unmold the puddings on top of the berries and serve with the sour cream. Serves 6.

MACARONI BEAUCAIRE

1 pound elbow macaroni
1/2 cup olive oil
2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
1/2 cup minced chives
1/2 cup canola oil
2 eggplants about 1 1/2 pounds,

cut lengthwise into 12 slices 1/4 inch thick
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 ripe tomatoes cut into 1/4 inch slices
1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Bring 3 quarts water to a boil. Cook macaroni until just tender 15-20 minutes. Remove 1/2 cup of the cooking liquid, and place in a serving bowl large enough to hold macaroni. Drain elbows. Add olive oil, grated cheese, salt and pepper to the reserved cooking liquid in the bowl. Mix well and add the drained elbows and chives. Mix well. Set aside.

For vegetable garnish: Heat the canola oil in a large skillet. When hot, add the eggplant slices in one layer, sprinkle them with the salt and saute them for 2 1/2 to 3 minutes on each side until nicely browned. Remove and drain on paper towels.

Reserve the 6 nicest slices of eggplant and half of the tomato slices and arrange the remainder of these vegetables in a 14 inch by 10 inch gratin dish to completely cover the bottom of the dish. Distribute elbows evenly on top and arrange the reserved eggplant and tomato slices alternating over the elbows. Sprinkle with shredded cheese.

Place the gratin in a preheated 400 degree oven for 20 minutes until cheese has melted and is heated through. Serves 6.

FBI FRIED CHICKEN

BOB AND LEE'S THREE-GARLIC PASTA

1 whole chicken breast
2 large heads fresh garlic, divided
1/2 cup red onion, chopped
1 1/2 tablespoons olive oil
1 1/2 tablespoons butter
1 large fresh tomato, peeled, seeded and chopped
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/2 teaspoon white pepper
Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
1/2 cup dry white wine
1/2 cup chicken stock
1/2 cup heavy cream
8 to 12 ounces cooked pasta (spaghetti linguini, etc.)
Parsley, finely chopped

Yields 2 servings.
In smoker, using hickory chips, smoke chicken breast and 1 head of garlic for 2 to 3 hours, depending on size of chicken breast. Or substitute already smoked chicken and roast 1 head of garlic (recipe follows).
In cast-iron skillet, saute 8 finely chopped garlic cloves and onion in olive oil and butter until golden. Shred smoked chicken; combine with sauteed garlic squeezing cloves out of peel; discard peels. Add tomato, thyme, white pepper, salt and pepper to taste. Add white wine and chicken stock. Cook over medium heat for 5 minutes, uncovered.
Add heavy cream and cook over low heat for 8 minutes, uncovered. Add 3 (or to taste) finely chopped raw, fresh garlic cloves. Serve over pasta. Garnish with finely chopped parsley.
Roasted Garlic: Peel outer skin layers from head of fresh garlic, leaving cloves and heart intact. Place head on double thickness of foil; brush with 1 teaspoon olive oil. Fold up and seal. Squeeze cloves from peel and set aside. Discard peels.

4 pounds chicken thighs

2 tablespoons granulated garlic
1 teaspoon coarsely chopped dried oregano

Rinse and pat chicken dry. Combine flour, granulated garlic, oregano, salt and pepper. Coat chicken with flour mixture. Heat 1 cup olive oil to moderate high heat and fry chicken until skin is crisp. (Chicken should not be thoroughly cooked.)
Meanwhile, chop fresh garlic. Heat butter in large covered skillet; add chopped garlic, rosemary and mushrooms and simmer for 5 to 10 minutes. Add chicken to garlic butter and cover. Continue to cook over low heat for 45 minutes. Stir occasionally. Garnish and serve with heated or grilled bread slices.

Pressed. A term for garlic that has been put through a garlic press. There are many different types of presses available, some even are self-cleaning. When using a garlic press, it isn't necessary to peel the garlic clove. Simply cut it in half and place in the press. Then squeeze. The skin will stay behind making the press easier to clean. Remember to clean your press immediately after use before the small particles that remain behind have a chance to dry.
Puree. A term for garlic that has been cooked at high heat and then pressed through a sieve. Available commercially or made at home. It

is excellent to have on hand to blend into soups, sauces or to spread on slices of bread to serve as hors d'oeuvres.
Garlic salt. Available commercially, it is usually a blend of about 90 percent salt and about 9 percent garlic and about 1 percent free-flowing agent. When using garlic salt in recipes calling for fresh garlic decrease amount of salt called for.
Fresh peeled cloves. Whole cloves, with the papery peel already removed. This is the fastest growing segment of the garlic market. Now sold mostly to commercial chefs, soon they'll be on the market in 4-ounce containers, a handy size for use in the home kitchen.

4 tablespoons olive oil
3 (1 pound each) cans julienne-style green beans, drained (see next ingredient)
1/2 cup liquid reserved after draining beans
1 teaspoon dry oregano
1 teaspoon dry basil, or 1 tablespoon fresh basil, chopped

Saute garlic and bacon in olive oil until garlic turns amber in color. Remove pan from heat and add beans, liquid, herbs and salt and pepper and cook over medium heat until beans are warmed through.

Harvest time for herbs upon us

Let's hear a big hurrah for herbs. This is the time of the year when lucky home gardeners are picking from luxuriant bushes. Even apartment dwellers with pots on the windowsill are snipping away at the aromatic greens and adding an extra snap to their cooking.
Herbs are at their flavorful peak when fresh. All of the culinary impact of herbs is stored in the oils that are released when crushed or cooked. There are a few exceptions, like bay leaves and oregano, that get stronger when dried.
Now is the time to take full advantage of these marvelous greens, before autumn's chill assaults them. Before going into the kitchen with your harvest of herbs, let's look around the house and see to what other uses they can be put.
These pretty leaves are nature's own best air freshener. If your crop is abundant thrust a generous bunch into a vase and put at a strategically busy passageway. Everytime anyone passes and brushes against the arrangement the fragrant oils will be released.
Especially good at perfuming rooms are mints of all kinds, lemon balm, lemon verbena, basil, thyme, bay, rosemary, and lavender among the most common varieties. But as you walk through the garden, crush a leaf or two of other kinds and decide if its fragrance is to your liking. Mixing up a variety is a fine idea. The different characteristics of each will play together like a complete melody instead of a single note.
Little pots of herbs also make very appealing and relevant table centerpieces. This is especially

true if the same herb has been importantly used in the food served. One good example is the Steam-baked Zucchini With Pesto.
Stems that will stay perky are the best bet. Count on basil, mint, tarragon, thyme and rosemary. Willow dill is particularly attractive. Used singly, chives tend to flop over gracefully, but nevertheless they've flopped. Instead, tie together a dozen or so and place them for spiky effect among other branch herbs.
If you want to really give a good sudden zing of aroma to the house, throw a sprig of rosemary, thyme, or lemon balm in a hot skillet, or the oven, if it happens to be on.
Once in the kitchen herbs really come into their own. If you want to follow the trendy crowd, make a selection of herb-infused vinegars. Just put two large sprigs of tarragon, chives or basil in a bottle of white wine vinegar. Put aside for two weeks then splash onto steamed vegetables or add to sauces instead of cream or butter.
But the most fun in using herbs is to see how their fresh, lively flavor changes the characteristics of foods. Stir snipped chives, basil or tarragon into scrambled eggs, or sprinkle over the top of poached or fried eggs.
Chives and dill added to yogurt or buttermilk makes a snappy and low-calorie sauce for steamed potatoes. No wine sauce should be spooned onto meat, chicken or fish until it has had a good scattering of parsley, sage or rosemary.
To taste the full impact that a single herb can bring to a simple vegetable, try this easy-to-do and

delicious pairing. Zucchini, also currently at its peak in home gardens, is transformed in this method. The green squash is not so much baked as steamed in its own juice. The resulting sweet flavor far surpasses regular steaming, in which the vegetable juices fall into the steaming water and are lost.

STEM-BAKED ZUCCHINI

8 medium or 16 small zucchini
2 cups fresh basil leaves
2 tablespoons chopped garlic
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
Approximately 1/2 cup virgin olive oil.

Yields 8 servings.
Preheat oven to 350 F. Cut off root and stem ends, and place zucchini on large sheet of aluminum foil. Seal edges of foil, and make an airtight package. Place foil package on baking sheet and bake for about 20 minutes, or until zucchini are soft.
Meanwhile, put basil leaves, garlic, salt and pepper into food processor or blender. Process in short bursts to chop leaves and reduce their volume. With motor running, slowly add oil in thin stream. Makes about 1 1/2 cups pesto. The sauce can be made in advance and refrigerated. Bring back to room temperature before serving.
Serve steamed zucchini whole; each guest splits it in half lengthwise and garnishes with pesto.

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If it's Saturday it must be 'Today'

NBC trades cartoons for news, sports, weather

It's a new day at NBC. The peacock network, which was beaten in the ratings this season by a resurgent CBS, has started shedding its old plumage and is putting out new feathers, all in the hopes of wooing the under-30 crowd for its advertisers.

Gone are "The Golden Girls," "Matlock" and "In the Heat of the Night." Once proud enough to strut with plumes such as these, NBC has dropped them all. Gone, too, are Saturday-morning cartoons. The new NBC is for those 9 and up—viewers in their pre-allowance years need not apply. The network is grooming itself for a young, hip, decidedly urban audience.

That means the news. And the weather. And cooking segments, health tips and movie reviews. After launching an overnight news service in November and (finally) getting a workable news magazine off the ground in March, NBC is ready to call it "Today" every day of the week.

The 40-year-old "Today" show

floundered a couple of seasons ago when the news division underestimated viewer devotion to co-host Jane Pauley, who left the show in January 1990. Audiences fled the upheaval at "Today" for the dependability of "Good Morning America," only to be lured back late this spring by the smart, bubbly style of Katie Couric.

Riding the tailwind, "Saturday Today" premieres on Aug. 1, smack in the middle of NBC's coverage of the Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain. (Talk about your flight insurance). With "Sunday Today," the Saturday edition makes NBC the first broadcast network to present morning news and information seven days a week.

Hosts of the Saturday program, who will occupy the customary "Today" show set, are Scott Simon and Jackie Nespral. Simon is a public-radio veteran who has earned two Peabody awards and an Emmy and currently anchors "Weekend Edition, Saturday" for NPR. On television, Simon has served up the quarterly series "American Pie" on

PBS for two years.

Nespral comes to "Today" from Spanish-language network Univision, where she anchored "Noticias y Mas" (News and More), a live, hourlong report, for two years.

The pair will spend one third of each hour giving news and weather updates. In addition, there will be feature stories and informational segments on travel, cooking and other topics of interest to viewers planning weekend activities.

According to Karen Curry, executive producer of morning news programming, there will be "more emphasis on what people are actually doing on a Saturday."

Nespral and Simon, she adds, were chosen for their diverse talents and backgrounds and for their versatility in moving from hard news to lighter stories. Curry notes that while neither will be pigeon-holed with particular stories, each will bring outside interests to the show. Simon, a big kid from the streets of Chicago, is a sports enthusiast. Nespral, a wife and mother, has an understandable interest in family matters.

Curry's overall aim is to appeal to weekday "Today" viewers while attracting working people who may not have time to watch the show

until week's end.

"It will have a little bit of everything," she concludes—with not a little panache.

NBC goes for the gold — and the royal blues. The peacock network has announced a fall 1992 air date for *The Royal Divorce*, a docudrama about the separation of the Duke and Duchess of York. Production on the woeful tale of Sarah Ferguson's split from Prince Andrew is currently under way in England. Martin Poll, executive producer of the project, is also working on a miniseries about Fergie's sister-in-law. Based on the Andrew Morton biography, *Diana: Her True Story* is expected in time for the May 1993 sweeps.

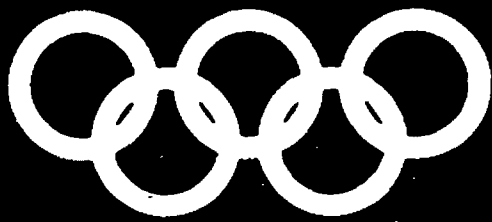

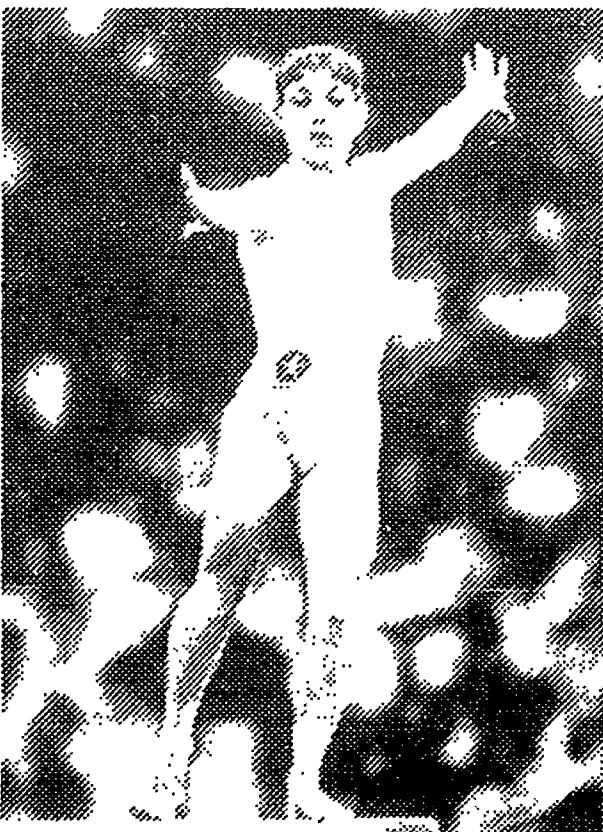

Ellerbee, Nick write news that can't lose

For most kids, TV news provides a 30-minute breather, a great opportunity to rake in supper while the TV set illuminates an empty living room. But Linda Ellerbee intends to change all that.

Kicking off a three-year deal between Ellerbee's studio, Lucky Duck, and Nickelodeon, the first program, *Special Edition*, premiered in the midst of the Persian Gulf War. More recently, *Special Edition* presented a frank interview with basketball hero Magic Johnson.

This spring, *Nick News W/5* joined *Special Edition* in Nickelodeon's lineup. Also from Lucky Duck, it gives kids their own half-hour report each week.

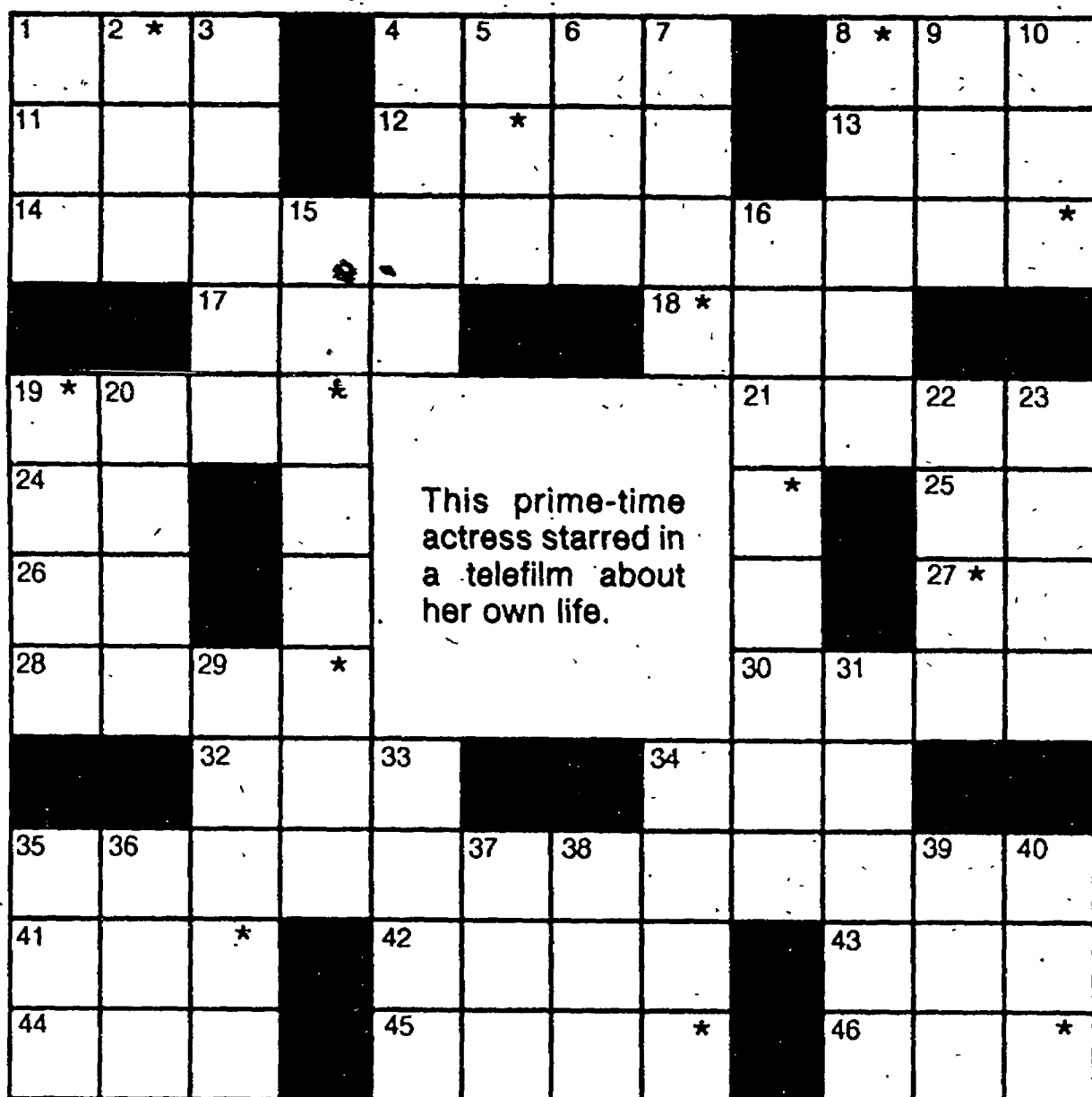

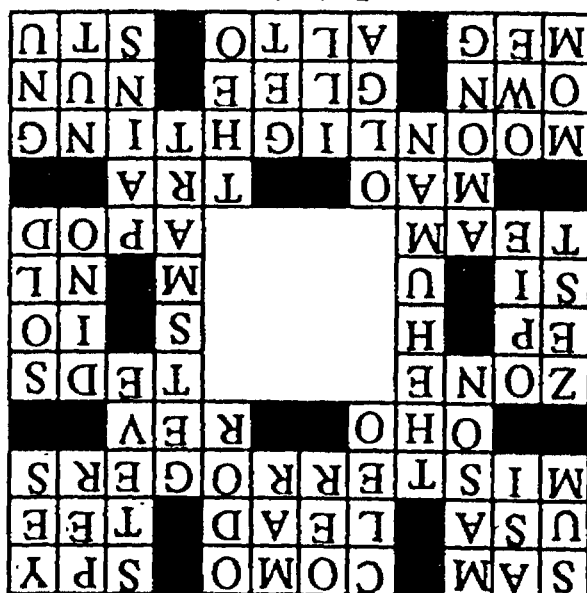

Daytime Emmys; remembering Riley

The elusive Emmy passed Susan Lucci (Erica, *All My Children*) by again, and it was a darn shame. Instead, Erica Sleazak (Viki, *One Life to Live*) won the award for Outstanding Lead Actress, although Jessica Tuck (Megan) and Lucci were much better and had a lot more to work with this past year. In a recent interview with Lucci, she said it was great to be nominated 13 years in a row and though she would like to win, it doesn't make much difference to her.

Emmy night wasn't a total loss; there were quite a few surprises and well-deserved awards given. Thom Christopher won for his devilish portrayal of Carlo Hesser on *One Life To Live*. The Outstanding Supporting Actress category had some tough contenders but it was appropriate that Maeve Kinkaid won for her portrayal of Vanessa on *Guiding Light*.

Kristoff St. John won the Emmy for Outstanding Younger Lead Actor, but his performance simply did not compare to that of Patrick Stuart (Will, *All My Children*). A sad note is the death of the actor Larry Riley. Several readers have noted that he did not look well last season on *Knots Landing*. On June 6, the actor died of kidney failure as a complication of an HIV infection.

Riley was best known for his role as Frank on *Knots*, but he also played Calvin Barnes on *The Doctors* for three years, and guest-starred on *Miami Vice*. He appeared in the feature films *Crackers*, *A Soldier's Story* and *Bird*. Riley was also in the TV movies *Muggable Mary* and *Blind Side*.

Women's basketball team looking for gold in Barcelona

All-star men's team may have to share spotlight

Olympian Clarissa Davis understands all the fuss being made over the United States' men's Olympic basketball team. In fact, she and her teammates on the women's squad may be the biggest fans of America's "dream team."

"Just being around guys like Michael (Jordan) and the others is exciting," says the three-time University of Texas All-American. "The whole world wants to see them play and all of us want to see them win the gold as much as anybody."

Despite their admiration for the men's team, it's clear the women wish that some of the spotlight falling on their male contemporaries would shine on them. "There are no commercials for women's basketball, but what can you do?" Davis asks philosophically. "I think we'll get more publicity if we fail to win the gold medal than if we win it."

Nobody disputes that the men's team is by far the best ever to take the court in

Olympic competition, and there are some who feel that the U.S. team also has the best women players ever. But, unlike the men, the women won't find the road to the gold a walk in the park.

"It's definitely going to be harder for us than for the men," Davis says. "(The teams from) Cuba and Brazil are playing very well and there are some good European teams. But we've assembled a great group and we're just going to concentrate on winning the gold."

Just the anticipation of participating in the Olympics is exciting for Davis. She is also thrilled at the prospect of playing before American television audiences once again. After graduating from Texas in 1989, Davis, like many American women, had to go to Europe to find a professional team to play for.

"It's kind of a contradiction that the best individual players have to leave their home country where the game was founded in order to be recognized," Davis lamented. "It's weird that the people overseas seem to appreciate us more than our own people."

NBC covers Summer Olympics in a big way

Though the Summer Olympics won't get under way until Saturday, July 25, NBC is beginning its coverage nearly a week earlier.

On Sunday, July 19, the United States Olympic team leaves Tampa, Fla., for its trans-Atlantic flight to Barcelona, Spain, site of the Games, on NBC's *Olympic Sendoff*.

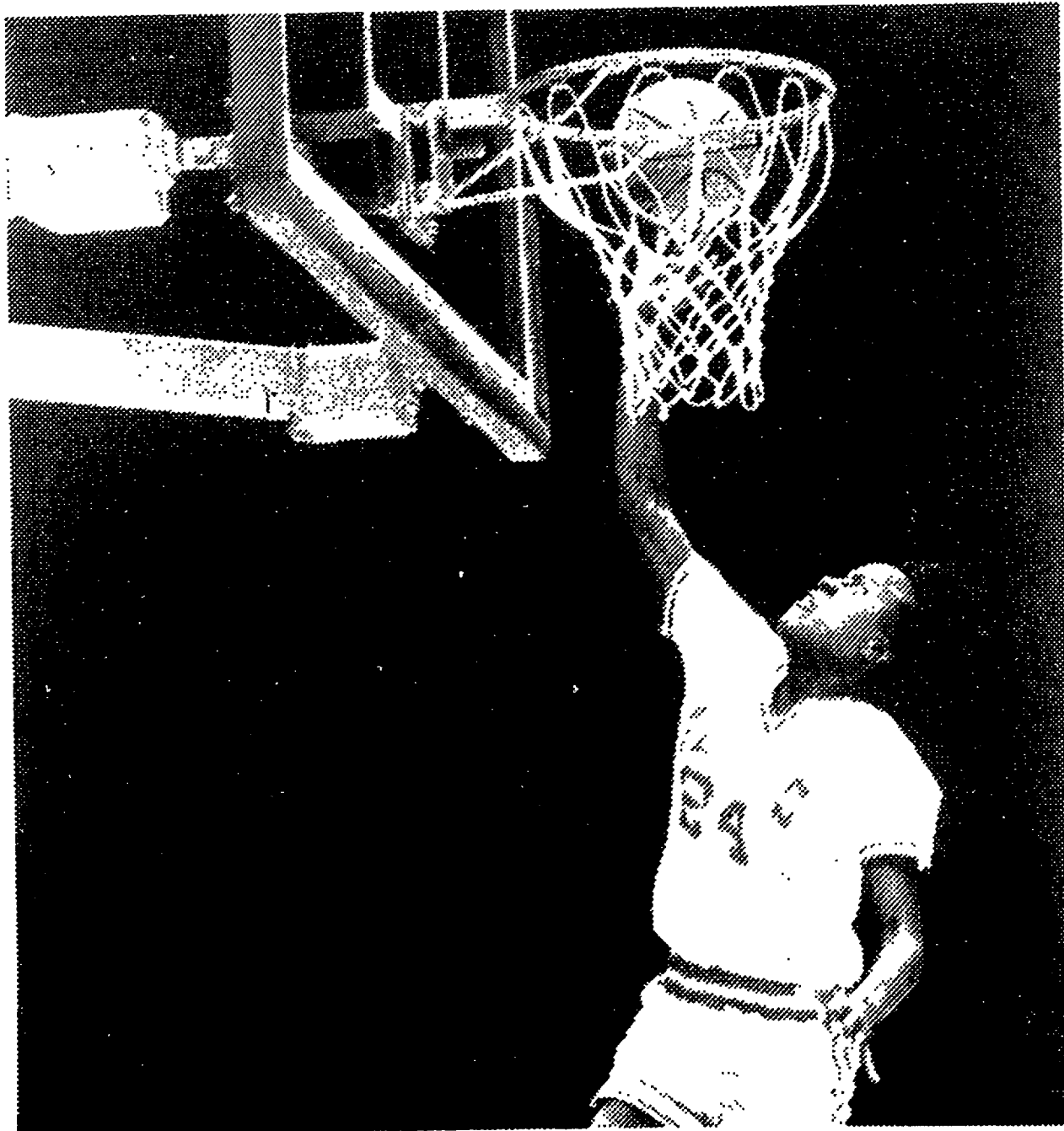
Friday, July 24, on the peacock network, tune in for a two-hour primer to the Games, *Barcelona '92: A New World Gathers*. According to spokesman Ray Stallone, the special will focus on the U.S. team, with additional reports on the changes wrought by political upheaval in Eastern Europe. There will also be a feature on the host city itself, which this year marks the 500th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' historic departure.

At midday on Saturday, July 25, NBC offers the *Sports Illustrated for Kids Olympic Special*, a "kid's-eye view" profiling several of this year's Olympians. Later in the afternoon, the network presents *Guardians of the Flame*, a half-hour documentary about the work of the International Olympic Committee and this generation's renewed Olympic spirit.

After that lengthy prologue, the Games get their official start with NBC's prime-time presentation of the Opening Ceremonies on the 25th.

Coverage of the competition begins on the afternoon of Sunday, July 26, and continues on weekday mornings, in prime time and late night through Sunday, Aug. 9.

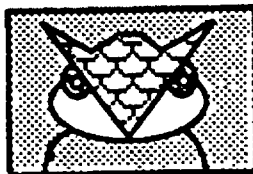

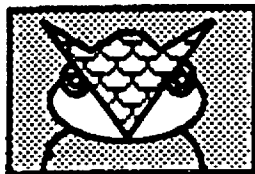

Q: Could you please tell me where I can have a videotape made of Sybil, starring Sally Field and Joanne Woodward? I've been to many video stores, and they say it's not available. —Rose Luyando, Astoria, N.Y.

A: Sybil has been widely available for rental for years. Though many made-for-television movies are never released to video and don't deserve to be, Sybil, made in 1976, won wide acclaim and an Emmy for Field, establishing her as a respected actress (not just the grown-up Flying Nun).
