

## Township board vote tomorrow

Township voters will troop to the polls tomorrow (Aug. 4) to select a new township Board of Trustees.

The Republican primary features a handful of interesting races. Voters will be asked to choose between current supervisor Betty Lennox and challenger Karen Baja in the Republican primary.

The clerk's position offers a contest between incumbent Tom Cook and opponent Susan Hillebrand, while Rick Engelland faces no competition in the quest for the treasurer post.

In both the supervisor and clerk races, the Republican primary will decide the election. No Democrats or independents filed for either post.

The trustee races appear to be up for grabs. Eight Republicans will vie for four trustee slots, with the top vote-getters slotted against Democrat James Petrie in the November general election.

Incumbent trustees James Nowka and Richard Allen boast a combined 30 years on the township board, but face stiff challenges from six Republican trustee hopefuls. Those seeking board seats are Mark Abbo, Gini Britton, Rebecca Connell, Russell Fogg, Barbara O'Brien, and Angela Thomson.

Indications are that township voters will turn out in larger numbers than usual for the Aug. 4 contest. Nearly 1,300 absentee ballots have been issued, said township Deputy Clerk Eunice Switzer. More than half of those ballots had been returned by Friday afternoon, she said.

"If the absentees are an indication of what to expect, I would think we would have increased numbers," Switzer said. Thirty percent or more of registered voters could cast ballots in Tuesday's primary, up from the standard 12-15 percent range, she said.

Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m.

## Many offices on primary ballot

One of the most crowded primary ballots in recent memory will face Northville voters tomorrow. In addition to Northville Township officials (see story above), the election will decide nominees and, in some cases, winners of several county, state and national offices.

Polls are open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. tomorrow. Below is a rundown of the offices up for election, broken down into Wayne and Oakland counties. The county line (Baseline Road) serves as the border for local districts in the state Legislature and Congress.

The election is a primary, but different from the presidential primary earlier this year. Voters must choose whether to vote in the Republican or Democratic primary, but that choice is not stated publicly. Both ballots will be in the voting booth, but stick to one side: Ballots with votes in both parties will be tossed out.

For the Northville Township, state House, Wayne County Commission, and U.S. House races, see pages 6-A to 8-A for summaries of the candidates' positions on a few key issues. The summaries are drawn from recent interviews with the candidates conducted by Record staff.

### WAYNE COUNTY County Commission

Four people will seek the Republican Party's nomination to the 10th District commission seat. The winner will face Democrat Michael Caffery in the November general election; he faces no primary opposition.

Tomorrow's primary showdown pits incumbent Maurice Breen against challengers Patrick Downes, Thaddeus McCotter and Clayton Stacey. Candidate summaries are on page 7-A.

### State House

State Rep. Georgina Goss won election to her current post last year in a special primary after the resignation of Gerald Law. The second-place finisher last year, Jerry Vorva, is back to challenge Goss along with two newcomers, Ronald Ambrose and Robert Bernard.

Barring a successful write-in campaign in November, the winner tomorrow will represent District 20 in the state House for a two-year term. No Democrat filed to run in the November general election. Candidate summaries are on page 7-A.

### U.S. House

Although the new 13th District in Congress will surely be a battleground in the November general election, the post has generated considerable heat this summer. Six people hope to get the Republican Party's nomination tomorrow.

Names on the ballot are Burt Adkins, Robert Geake, Glen Kassel, Herbert Scott, William Steele, and Raymond Tanter. Candidate summaries are on page 8-A.

The political makeup of the newly drawn district has been the subject of some speculation. The only Democrat running, William Ford, is an incumbent in Congress, but this district is considered less of a Democratic lock than his old district. Tisch Citizens candidate Paul Jensen will also be on the ballot in November.

### Partisan county offices

Several countywide offices will appear on tomorrow's ballot. No Republican filed to run for prosecuting attorney, but incumbent Democrat John O'Hair faces a challenge from Virgil Smith Jr. The Democratic primary will decide that race.

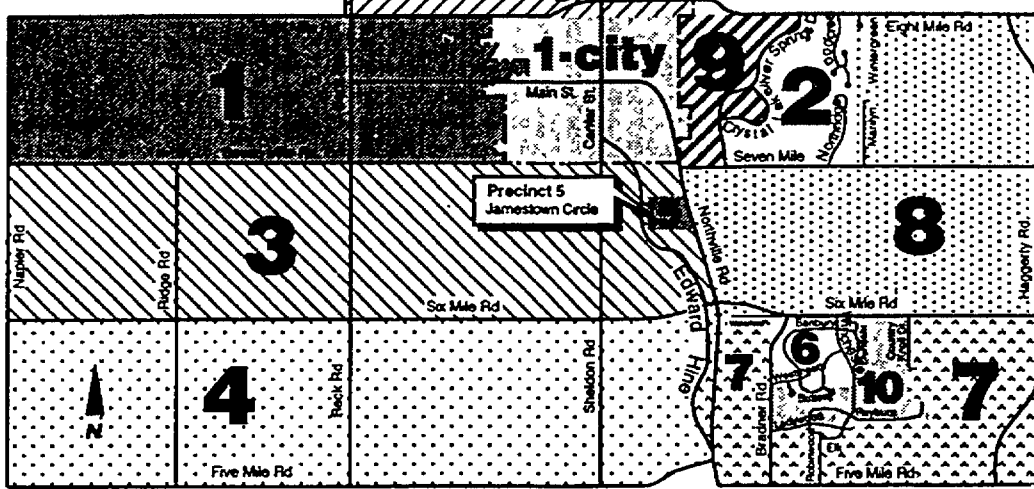

## Chamber board endorses six township challengers

Northville's business community has taken a stand in the township's Aug. 4 primary election, and it's decidedly anti-incumbent — though apparently not by design.

The Northville Community Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors last Thursday endorsed six township board candidates — and excluded the four sitting board members seeking election.

A seven-member chamber panel offered the following endorsements: Karen Baja, supervisor; Susan Hillebrand, clerk; and James Petrie, Gini Britton, Russell Fogg, and Mark Abbo, trustees.

Chamber members specifically chose not to endorse unopposed treasurer candidate Rick Engelland, said chamber board member Ann Willis.

The chamber previously has offered endorsements on local millage issues, but this is its first step at recommending individuals for political posts, Willis said.

"The chamber wanted to take a leadership position for the business community and the community at large," she said.

Willis said the endorsements were not prompted by anti-incumbent sentiments. Instead, the group researched candidates' records, observed the recent League of Women Voters forum, reviewed newspaper interviews, and discussed candidates' positions on issues that faced the business community and individual taxpayers.

"The decisions were based on the people we felt were most qualified," she said, adding that the "ability of the candidates to work with city government for the betterment of the

community" weighed in on the recommendations.

Recommendations for Baja and Hillebrand were unanimously supported with little discussion, Willis said. Trustee nominations took longer, but all but one of those votes were unanimous as well.

In addition to Willis, members of the chamber's board of directors who voted on the endorsements included Al Ferrara, Paul Foster, Margo Kramer, Greg Spinazze, Todd Knickerbocker, and Dave Beyer.

Willis said the chamber's vote was taken before members viewed Thursday's *Northville Record*, which listed almost identical trustee endorsements. The Record, however, endorsed four candidates in the Republican primary and did not include Petrie, who is running as the lone Democrat in the November general election.

## Lennox seeks police report

The police are not the only ones interested in a string of harassing telephone calls to a local political candidate.

The candidate's opponent has expressed an interest as well.

Township Supervisor Betty Lennox has ordered the township Police Department to give her a report on its investigation into phone harassment of Karen Baja, who is running against Lennox for her supervisor's seat.

Lennox gave no reason for the order, said Police Chief Chip Snider. Lennox could not be reached for comment.

Baja went to the police several weeks ago after receiving a string of harassing phone calls. The calls typically came at night and occasionally continued throughout the early morning, Baja said. The calls only came when her husband was gone, she said, leading her to believe that her house was being watched.

Snider said last Tuesday that the police department had not begun fill-

ing out a formal police report on Baja's complaint, which is being handled by Capt. Phil Presnell. "If my captain gets hit by a beer truck, all the secrets die with him, because it's all in his head," he said then. "My theory was if the report's not written, it can't be released."

But on Thursday, the department began drafting a preliminary report at the township supervisor's demand. Snider estimated that the report would be completed today.

"We were ordered to complete it as of yesterday," he said Friday. "She can't have what isn't done."

Lennox's motives in demanding the report are being questioned by her opponent. Karen Baja has filed a complaint against the supervisor to protest her order, said Baja's attorney, Don Samhat. "We're objecting to her attempting to obtain the report and that she's exceeding her authority and it will hinder the investigation," Samhat said. "We're demanding the purpose for which she's made the request. (According to Snider, it is) the first request she's ever made of this nature."

"We're satisfied with the efforts of the Police Department's investigation."

The investigation will continue whether Lennox's request is granted or not, Snider said. "We intend to keep this case open as long as calls are being received and some effort can be made to trace the responsible party... The investigation won't be complete until we have some good evidence of who's making the call. I'll consider it to be complete when we have information we can use to prosecute."

Snider described Lennox's request as "frustrating" but added, "What I'm really frustrated with is that... the one (phone harassment case) that has become so sensitive and such an issue for the community, and would answer a lot of questions, we haven't been able to solve."

Such cases typically are solved within three to five days of a complaint, Snider said, because the victim typically knows the culprit's identity.

## Authority releases some documents

Northville Record management has charged Western Townships Utilities Authority officials with violating the state Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) following a lingering public records dispute.

Record Managing Editor Michael Malott said WTUA officials continued a course of stone-walling the newspaper by refusing to release requested materials within time limits prescribed by state law and failing to provide all requested materials.

In a letter dated July 24, 1992, but not released until July 31, WTUA Chairperson Thomas Yack said: "In responding to your request, the authority has conducted a thorough



and complete review of its records and has made full and complete disclosure in accordance with the Act." Malott disagreed and charged WTUA with a series of FOIA violations including:

- A failure to reply to an FOIA re-

quest within the deadlines set in state law.

- A failure to supply all requested public documents.
- Charging excessive costs, designed to discourage the Record or the public from pursuing the request.
- A failure to give an adequate explanation, under the law, of why requested information was withheld from release.

The Record on July 2 forwarded a comprehensive FOIA request to WTUA Executive Director Deloris Newell seeking copies of numerous public records.

WTUA waited five business days before responding that it needed an additional 10 business days to comply with the request. The state Free-

dom of Information Act allows such an extension for particularly large requests.

On Friday, July 24, at the end of the 10-day extension, WTUA notified the Record that it owed a total of \$267.50 for 905 pages of public records and demanded payment of \$133.75 prior to copying the pages. On Monday, July 27, the newspaper submitted a \$133.75 money order to WTUA.

The authority did not act on the payment until Friday, July 31, when it turned over 136 pages of records which WTUA said fulfilled the request. WTUA charged a total of \$202.68 for the 136 pages, including \$195.58 for employee retrieval and

## Group unveils pay to play

A study committee's recommendation that Northville students should have to pay to be on a sports team or involved in co-curricular activities next year met with a lukewarm reception from parents and students who packed the school board meeting room Thursday night.

The 14-member committee charged last month with studying the feasibility of a pay-to-play program recommended Thursday that the district adopt a variation of the idea for one year.

The plan has not yet received approval from the board but it is expected to be on the board's agenda at tonight's meeting.

The two-part plan submitted by the committee outlines separate pay-to-participate fees and rules for athletic and for co-curricular activities. It recommends eliminating all ninth-grade sports.

Under the plan for sports programs — if approved by the board — junior varsity and varsity level athletes would pay a \$158 participation fee per sport, per student next year. That figure includes the base pay-to-play fee of \$154 coupled with a \$4 fee for administrative costs needed to run the program.

Middle school athletes will pay \$108 per student, per sport. That figure also includes a \$4 administrative fee.

High school students wanting to participate in any co-curricular activity — outside of the sports program — will pay a separate \$100 fee per semester. That fee entitles a student to participate in as many co-curricular activities as he or she desires.

High school co-curricular activities that fall under the pay-to-participate umbrella include the spring musical, fall play, yearbook, Pep Club, National Honors Society, Drama Club, forensics, debate, Marching Band/Symphonic Band, Jazz Band and vocal music groups.

Activities that were not previously funded by the district will remain free of charge to high schoolers. Those no-charge programs are SAW (Students Aware of the World), SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving), Video Yearbook, Equestrians, German Clubs and Student Congress.

Students at the middle school wanting to get involved in yearbook, forensics, newspaper, Science Olympiad, music, drama, band and intramural sports will pay a fixed fee of \$25 per semester. That fee allows a student to be involved in any or all of the co-curricular offered that semester.

For families having more than two children involved in co-curricular programs at the high school and middle school, the committee has recommended capping co-curricular fees at \$200 a semester and \$400 a year per family.

There is no reduced family fee for athletes, however, nor is there a discount for students participating in

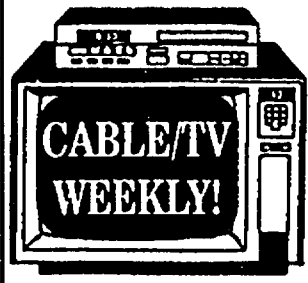

copying time.

A specific list of the Record's request includes:

- Each and every document relating to travel, entertainment and other expenses submitted by former and/or current WTUA commissioners, employees and/or contract employees, including but not limited to bills, invoices, account records, receipts, expense vouchers, phone bills, mileage requests, credit card chits, credit card bills, airline bills, rental car bills and restaurant receipts for the year 1988 to the present.
- Each and every WTUA annual report for the years 1986 through 1991.
- Each and every document which references the names of WTUA bondholders.
- Each and every request-for-proposal and proposals received relative to replacement of the original project engineer for the WTUA sewer.
- Each and every document including, but not limited to, correspondence, notes, proposals, memoranda, reports, invoices, and documents relating to travel and other expenses pertaining to the selection of Cassidy & Associates as WTUA's lobbying firm from 1987 to the present.
- Each and every bill and invoice submitted by Cassidy & Associates to WTUA from the date of hire of Cassidy & Associates by WTUA to the present.
- Each and every document including, but not limited to, correspondence, notes, proposals, memoranda, reports, invoices, and documents relating to travel and other expenses pertaining to the selection of the former and current law firms and/or individual lawyers representing and/or performing work on behalf of WTUA from 1986 to the present.
- Each and every bill and invoice submitted to WTUA by those law firms and individual lawyers who have performed work on behalf of WTUA from pre-formation of WTUA to the present time.

Malott said WTUA did not provide sufficient information.

WTUA failed to provide a complete list of invoices submitted by federal lobbyist Cassidy & Associates; expenses incurred by WTUA officials during a 1989 meeting in Traverse City with Cassidy & Associates; a complete accounting of bills and invoices submitted by WTUA attorneys, and other alleged FOIA violations.

Yack's letter said that WTUA does not have several of the requested items, including annual reports and any documents naming the authority's bond holders. Yack's letter also said some of the newly requested material had been previously supplied, although a clarification of the newspaper's July 2 letter — submitted at WTUA's request — specifically stated that the newspaper wanted new copies and would pay the standard fees

for them.

Malott called WTUA's response a "damned blatant" FOIA violation.

"But it does follow the pattern we have seen from WTUA over many months," Malott said. "They have apparently concluded they can just ignore the state Freedom of Information Act and get away with it."

"Well, we're not going to let them off the hook," Malott added. "We are very serious about making sure they follow the FOIA and release documents which clearly, under the law, are to be open to the public."

WTUA's Newell, the authority's designated Freedom of Information officer, was unavailable for comment Friday. WTUA Administrative Assistant Anita Crone was asked why the authority did not submit the materials within the time frame allotted under state law.

"I have no knowledge that is the

case," Crone said.

Under the FOIA, anyone who believes the law has been violated may pursue the matter in circuit court. According to state law, "If the circuit court finds that the public body has arbitrarily and capriciously violated

the (FOIA) by refusal or delay in providing copies of a public record, it may, in addition to any actual or compensatory damages, award punitive damages of \$500 to the person seeking the right to inspect or receive copies of a public record."

# Many districts have paid to play

Northville schools aren't the only ones having to resort to a pay-to-play system for athletics and co-curricular activities.

Over the years, countless districts in Wayne and Oakland counties have stumbled their way through numerous variations of the alternative funding solution to compensate for defeated millage requests and state aid cutbacks. And this year will be no different, according to Northville Athletic Director Dennis Colligan, who met with athletic directors from other districts to talk with them about pay-to-participate programs.

Livonia Public Schools just recently upped their charges for students to participate in sports programs for the upcoming year. After three increases in the last three weeks, that district has been forced to jack up the price again to \$160 per student, per sport, Colligan said.

After last week's second millage defeat, South Lyon students will pay \$256 per student, per sport, to participate this year. Plymouth-Canton schools sports programs this year are partially funded by the district and by still another variation of pay-to-play. This year athletes there will pay \$60 per person, per event. The district also offers students a \$120 maximum fee which allows students to play three sports for the price of two.

Districts like Farmington and Wayne-Westland have also experimented with different versions of pay-to-play options. Some have used a per stu-

dent, per event option with a ceiling fee for additional family members. Others have not.

At one point, South Lyon officials had assessed each team a flat fee and forced team members to hold fundraisers to pay.

Colligan said he talked with directors from neighboring districts and other schools in Northville's conference, the Western Lakes Activities Association, to see how they used the pay-to-play option. That information coupled with a recent survey about the issue was compiled and given to committee members studying pay-to-play options for Northville.

A 1991 survey conducted in Oakland County found 27 districts had used the program at some point to compensate for lost revenues. The survey, Colligan said, clearly points out some of the pros and cons of implementing such a system.

"The biggest advantage is that kids get to play and programs continue," Colligan told parents and students at Thursday's school board work session.

"It does keep programs going and keeps kids playing."

Losing lesser-skilled athletes who once played a supportive role on teams is a distinct disadvantage of the pay-to-play idea, Colligan said.

"You lose those athletes that aren't the high-point contributors on the team," he said. "Large numbers of them drop off."

Another major disadvantage of a pay-to-play situation is that parents and students expect that if

they pay their child's participation fee he or she should be guaranteed equal playing time on the field or court. Not so, said Colligan. That is the biggest fallacy about pay-to-play.

"Parents expect equal time for equal pay. It's really hard on the coaches," he said.

The study committee of which Colligan was a part identified six options for pay-to-participate programs at the high school and two for the middle school. But the one it settled on calls for a flat \$158 charge per student, per sport.

"The decision was not easy to come by. We tried hard to get the numbers down to a reasonable level," he said. "As hard as we tried we couldn't come up with a family maximum (for sports) or a two-for-three-sport incentive. The \$154 fee plus the \$4 assessment fee is something the committee could live with for one year."

Figures for the fees were reached by calculating students who participated last year and divided by the expense it cost to run all athletics. The \$4 administration fee was added on to that figure. Reductions were made in equipment and uniform expenses in an effort to keep the playing fees contained, committee members said.

The committee's recommendation still needs to win the support of Superintendent Leonard Reznierski, who will make his recommendation to the school board at tonight's meeting. The board then may vote on the issue.

The school board meets in the board meeting room tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the Old Village School, 405 W. Main St.

more than two sports during the year.

Bruce Christenson, chair of the athletic arm of the study committee, said the athletic committee tried to come up with the cheapest way to maintain the most programs.

"We tried to make it as good as before and impact as many students as we could," he said. "But when it came right down to it, it turned out to be nothing more than a math problem. I know that sounds callous, but that's the way it worked."

Athletic Director Dennis Colligan,

who worked with the committee, agreed.

"We worked as hard as we could to get the numbers down," Colligan said. "We worked hard and cut where we thought we could cut. We were as soft as we could be without cutting programs."

In presenting the committee's recommendation, David Bolitho, assistant superintendent for administrative services, said the district had to factor in custodial and maintenance staff in addition to staff to manage the program. The \$4 fee was added to cover those expenses.

Program management costs in-

clude part-time salaries for three people to manage the program. Bolitho said. That fee will pay for a co-op position for three hours a day to handle inquiries about the program, employ a temporary bookkeeper to log the fees, and reinstate Colligan as athletic director on a part-time basis to oversee the program. The AD position had been eliminated due to the schools' budget crunch.

Under the plan the ninth-grade athletic program will be dropped and the tennis, soccer, and wrestling varsity assistant coaches' positions will be eliminated. The district's athletic trainer would also see a reduction in services.

The plan is just a Band-Aid for the crisis the district finds itself in after two defeated millage-increase requests earlier this year, Bolitho said. He and district officials said they hope the plan is a one-year remedy for the funding problem, but in the interim it gives students an opportunity to play.

"The responsibility for funding these programs is the community's and not that of the individual family," he said. "It does limit some, but it is the only way we were able to find... the only way we could have an option or an opportunity for kids to get involved."

## Spill ties up traffic at busy intersection

A 50-pound canister of swimming pool chlorine pellets appears to have bounced off a trailer Thursday morning, leading to the temporary closing of the Haggerty Road/Eight Mile Road intersection.

The concern was that the granular chlorine would liquify in the rain, creating a hazardous sludge or liquid as it reacted with the dirt and oil

already on the road, Novi Fire Chief Arthur Lenaghan said.

"You get a little bit of rain and you've got a highly concentrated chlorine liquid. It's listed as a skin irritant," he said.

The fumes are also dangerous to breathe. But the rain was light. And the product's manufacturer, the Novi-based Steelcrete, sent workers over to assist in the cleanup.

"It created quite a mess at the intersection. It blocked it all four ways. We have no idea what hap-

pened. Nobody apparently saw it happen. There was nobody there. We don't know who had it or where it came from," Lenaghan said.

The spill was reported at 5:58 a.m. The road was cleared by 10:15 a.m.

The Steelcrete Company, located on Twelve Mile Road, had already sold the product to the unidentified customer, Lenaghan said.

The Wayne County Road Commission and state Department of Natural Resources were also called to the spill.

# Fire Safety House helps teach valuable lessons

The children had learned their lessons well. They quickly dropped to the floor as the smoke detector blared and smoke began to fill the room. Crawling low to avoid the searing heat and choking smoke, the children crawled to the door, reached up, and felt the surface of the door with the back of their hands. Finding the door hot to the touch, they crawled along a wall until they located a window exit. Opening the window on their own, all of the children climbed through to the arms of waiting firefighters.

Fortunately, this scene did not take place in a burning building, but in the Northville/Plymouth Community Fire Safety House. Built with donations of money, material and labor, the Fire Safety House is a cooperative

undertaking by the fire departments in Northville, Northville Township, Plymouth and Plymouth Township. The house is constructed on a trailer frame which allows it to be towed to schools and community functions throughout the area, providing local firefighters with an important tool with which to convey their fire safety message.

Most people think of fire fighters as people who put out fires or respond to other emergency calls for assistance. But fire safety education is one of the most important parts of the firefighter's duty. Like preventive medicine, fire safety education aims to stop fires before they have a chance to get started, or to limit the risk of life should a fire break out.

The basic fire safety lessons have not changed much in recent years: Don't overload electrical circuits, unplug appliances when not in use, keep combustible materials well away from heat sources such as furnaces and stoves, keep a home fire extinguisher handy and in working or-

der, and make sure to install smoke detectors and change the batteries when you change your clocks in the spring and fall.

If you do find yourself caught in a fire, stay low. The air will be clearer near the floor, helping you to breathe and see. Find and follow a wall if you become disoriented, until you come to a door or window. Don't open a closed door without checking to see if it is hot, as it may be your only protection against a fire raging on the other side.

The Fire Safety House provides a new tool for the teaching of these lessons to young and old alike. Before you enter the house, television monitors show videos demonstrating the fire safety message. As you go up the stairs and into the front door, you enter one of two rooms and find a seat. Each room has three windows, each of a different type, and you will have the opportunity to become familiar with how to open the type most closely related to the windows in your house.

Firefighters will take you through the essential points of safely exiting a building on fire. Then, when all questions have been answered, the room will begin to fill with a light, non-toxic simulated smoke. This smoke can be safely breathed by people without respiratory problems, and is lighter than the smoke you would encounter in a real fire, but it serves to demonstrate a point of which many people are not aware: In a fire, you will not be able to see. Your only choice is to stay low, and get out.

As children left the Fire Safety House with their parents and teachers, the lessons they had learned, and practiced, had already made a big impression in their young minds. As the smoke was cleared from the room the firefighters prepared for their next class, a senior citizen's group. The fire safety message is for all ages. It is never too late to survive.

# Late filing of finance statements may result in fines

Despite her boasts of support for campaign finance reform and enforcement of existing laws, a local representative's own adherence to financial disclosure rules is less than perfect.

Incumbent 36th district Rep.

Georgina Goes (R-Northville) failed to file her pre-primary campaign finance statement with the state until Thursday afternoon, four business days after the July 24 deadline. The Northville Record was unable to obtain the report by press time due to the late filing.

Thaddeus McCotter, running for the Republican nomination for the

local seat on the Wayne County Commission, also missed the filing deadline. He had filed by Friday, but a county employee could not say exactly when the filing took place.

McCotter supplied a copy of his filing report to the Record last week. Candidates missing the deadline will be assessed a \$25 fine for each business day after the July 24 dead-

line that they did not file, according to state campaign finance analyst Evelyn Quieroga.

Candidates who fail to file statements by the deadline can be fined up to \$500, Quieroga said. Nine business days after the deadline, she said, the elections bureau alerts the state Attorney General's Office of a candidate's failure to file. "After that, it's up to them to handle it," she said. Assistant Attorney General Gary

Gordon said his office writes late candidates to "demand immediate compliance with the (campaign finance) act and payment of any fines."

"Generally that's effective," he said.

In a recent newsletter titled "Sweeping changes proposed to end business as usual in Lansing," Goes declared her support for a package of proposed bills to establish a code of ethics for lawmakers, demand more accountability of government and re-

form the campaign finance system. Among the recommended campaign finance reforms cited in the newsletter was "authorizing and requiring the Secretary of State to enforce all laws concerning campaign finance."

Goss wrote, "there is a serious need to improve the election process itself."

Goss did not respond to repeated requests for information about her campaign finances.

Incumbent Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano has two primary challengers, Kevin Kelley and Charles Nemeth. The winner will face Republican Dennis Malin and Tish Citizens candidate Daniel Tackett in November.

No fewer than 11 Democrats, three Republicans and one Tish candidate are seeking to become the new Wayne County Clerk. The candidates are: Democrats, David Cavanagh, Ethel Fiddler, William Griggs, Teola Hunter, Nathaniel Lee, Robert Miller, Thomas O'Rourke, Arthur Sumner, Sigmund Szczepkowski, and Ed Wilson; Linda Chuhman, Carl Edwards Sr., and John Reilly, Republicans; and Renrick Hume, Tish.

Incumbent Treasurer Raymond Wojtowicz faces a Democratic primary challenge from John Graziani; the winner will run against Republican Elaine Tuttle in November. Similarly, Forest Youngblood has a Democratic challenger, Paul Citekowski, to remain register of deeds; the winner will face Republican Evin Fobbs.

## Nonpartisan judicial offices

In the Court of Appeals, 1st District, voters will choose one of nine candidates: William Cahalan, Michael Callahan, John Gillis, Renee Loidas, Martin Maher, Edward Plawewski, Cynthia Stephens, George Ward, and Helene White.

Voters will also pick three of 12 people running for Circuit Court judge. The candidates are Thomas Beck, Joseph Brennan, John Callahan, Robert Costello, Kathleen Donahue, Diane Hathaway, Denise Hood, Daniel Ryan, Jeanne Stempien, Brian Sullivan, Deborah Tho-

mas, and Robert Ziolkowski.

Five candidates are running for one opening on the Probate Court bench. They are Nancy Diehl, Cathie Maher, Robert McClinton, Kathryn O'Grady, and Nicholas Tsalis.

## OAKLAND COUNTY

### State House

Incumbent state Rep. Willis Bulard Jr. was redistricted away from most of his former constituents earlier this year, but he moved from Milford to Highland to run for re-election in the new 38th District. He faces challenges from James Ash and John Riley for the Republican nomination.

The winner faces a November general election showdown against Robert Havey, the only Democrat in the race. Candidate summaries of the Republicans are on page 7-A.

### U.S. House

The Republican nomination to represent the new 11th District in Congress has been perhaps the most attention-getting congressional race this year. With the retirement of longtime U.S. Rep. William Broomfield, who represented much of this territory, three Republicans are making hard runs at the nomination. The Republican candidates are Alice Gilbert, David Honigman and Joseph Knollenberg.

On the other side, the Democratic Party also has a primary race for its nomination to represent this district. Walter Briggs IV and Michael Meyer are seeking their party's nomination.

The two winners will square off in the November general election. Can-

didate summaries for these races are on page 8-A.

## Oakland County Commission

The real election for the local seat on the Oakland County Commission won't come until November, since each party has one and only one candidate on the ballot tomorrow. In the fall, incumbent Republican Kay Schmid will face a challenge from Democrat William Brinker.

### Partisan countywide offices

County Executive Daniel Murphy is retiring, and L. Brooks Patterson is the only Republican running to replace him. Democrats will choose between Elizabeth Howe and Philip Marcuse to face off against Patterson in November.

For sheriff, incumbent John Nichols is running against Republican primary opponent Paul Molin. The winner will face Democrat Seymour Hudley in the fall.

Similarly, incumbent Republican Drain Commissioner George Kuhn has a primary challenge from Rick Patterson. The winner will face Democrat M. Kay Brady in November.

For prosecutor, treasurer, and county clerk/register of deeds, the situation is the same: Incumbent Republicans have no primary opposition, and one Democrat is running for each post as well. The candidates are, for prosecutor, incumbent Richard Thompson and challenger Steven Kaplan; for clerk, incumbent Lynn Allen and challenger Martha Blom; and for treasurer, incumbent C. Hugh Doherty and challenger Thomas Werth.

Oakland County does not have any countywide judicial offices or ballot proposals on the primary ballot.

# Responding to the challenge



The building that houses The Northville Record news and advertising offices dates back to before the turn of the century.

With such a long history, this pile of bricks and mortar houses some pretty amazing fossils (though former Managing Editor Phil Jerome is not one of them, regardless of what you may have heard).

Here's one that was unearthed last week, typed onto a yellowed 4-by-6 index card. It's a sonnet to The Northville Record dated Feb. 3, 1872, when the fledgling paper was but three years old. Its author was the Rev. Luther Lee:

Dear Record if true to thy trust,  
Firm for the right, never unjust,  
Thy life shall be long;  
New friends shall rise up by the way,  
And wider and wider thy sway  
And thou shalt grow strong.  
Use ever a sharp pointed pen,  
Spare never the vices of men,  
At folly ne'er wink;  
Throw broadly the sheen of thy light,  
Put error and falsehood to flight,  
The foe never blink.  
Speak loud for the poor and forlorn,  
The cause of the weak never scorn,  
Be faithful and true;  
The erring turn from their way,  
Be guide to the feet gone astray,

To all give their due,  
Intemperance condemn as a foe,  
For drunkards have sorrow and woe  
It bringeth to harm;  
Tell men if they drink they will fall,  
It conquers the great and the small,  
O, sound the alarm!

And so 120 years later, here we are, still printing. And did we get from there to here by following the words of the Rev. Lee? Well, let's see.

Fully a quarter of the poem encourages us to support "temperance" and discourage drunkenness. We regularly publish every report of drunk driving we can find, and frequently run a column by Charlie Sulec, the high school's substance abuse calendar.

"To all give their due," we regularly publish school honor rolls, scouting achievements, sporting events, college honors and military service news. We also have a weekly feature on volunteers in the area. Promotions regularly appear in the business pages.

As for the six lines that begin with "Use ever a sharp pointed pen..." I think it's fair to say that we've lived up to the Rev. Lee's standard. We uncover and report inequities, injustices and negligence in government and business wherever we find them.

We continue to "Speak loud for the poor and forlorn." The cause of the weak never scorn." When Paul Diels had his car stolen and destroyed, it was our reports that roused people to pitch in and replace it.

"If true to thy trust, / Firm for the right, never unjust, / Thy life shall be long."

One hundred and twenty years later, it looks like the same old formula still works.

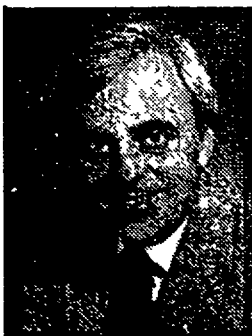

# Safari time in Maybury Park

### BIO

Karen Baja, 38, has served six years on the Northville Township Zoning Board of Appeals, chairing it the past three. She also has served on the Planning Commission the past three years. Baja applied for the supervisor position last year that eventually went to Betty Lennox.



Betty Lennox, 70, was appointed Northville Township supervisor last September and previously had been appointed to the treasurer position in 1989. Lennox also served a two-year appointment as township supervisor in 1975-76. She also worked 10 years as the City of Northville's finance director.

### GROWTH/DEVELOPMENT

Says no clear consensus exists on what type of development township residents favor. Says development strategy will be up to township residents and would hold public hearings and offer surveys to seek answers.

Favors controlling residential growth in western portion of township, while encouraging research and development-type industry as zoned along Five Mile Road.

### BUDGET CRUNCH

Said she was appalled to see that township's general fund has been "mishandled" and says township did not put funds in reserve during development boom times. Asked if she would consider raising taxes if elected, Baja said, "yes."

Asked at a candidate forum if she would raise taxes if elected, Lennox said, "yes, some." Campaign literature pledges "no new taxes." Voted to cut gravel road treatments because of cost.

### WTUA SEWER

Calls information dispersed to residents by WTUA officials very hard to decipher. Would ask WTUA why the authority took the approaches it did and why it hired who it did.

Calls sewer a "very good project for our community" and says consultants have had negative portrayals of their services by the media. Compares lack of bidding for professional services with that used by cities and universities. Currently sits on WTUA commission.

### GRAVEL ROADS

Wants more information on why township took over gravel road maintenance from county. Thinks township may have responsibility to treat roads and is not sure that's the area of the budget that should have been cut.

Affirmed opposition to township-paid gravel road treatments during a June board meeting; a week later, voted to pay for one treatment. Helped arrange meeting between residents and township and county. In July, Lennox voted with board majority to end road treatments.

### SHARED SERVICES

Eventually wants to see one Northville fire department and police department and says it is time to stop think of city and township as two separate communities. Calls district library a possibility and is not opposed to city and township governments operating out of same building.

Says heightend city/township shared services is "a distinct possibility" and says combining city and township police dispatching is more likely than combining fire departments. Thinks a district library is a good idea but does not hold out much hope for the plan.

## NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP CLERK • REPUBLICAN PRIMARY • VOTE FOR ONE



### BIO

Thomas L.P. Cook, 58, was elected to the township board in 1980 and won re-election in 1984. He was appointed clerk in 1987 and won election for the post in 1988. He also serves on the township Zoning Board of Appeals and the Economic Development Committee.

### ROLE OF CLERK

Responsible for "every piece of paper that comes in and out of the township." Clerk's office handles land searches for special assessment district residents and is responsible for minutes from all board and commission meetings.

Says clerk's office has to be aggressive to improve communication with residents. Does not believe that has taken place in the past.

### WTUA SEWER

Calls project a good concept. Voted for project and wouldn't change that now. Says decision to join WTUA opened township for development. Says board listened to consultants extensively and said board "had the opportunity to ask questions ... and not many questions were asked."

Worries about future cost to individual property owners. Says she had doubts about the way the authority was formed and calls project the "Mercedes Benz of sewers." Process "seemed squelched, hidden, secretive."

### GRAVEL ROADS

Favors special assessment districts for gravel road treatments. Said board sought resident input at last fall's budget talks, "but nobody came." Agrees with paved road residents who do not feel they should have to pay to have gravel roads treated.

Says she would put more pressure on Wayne County to pay for road treatments and maintains that options may exist, including dead-ending roads leads out of Northville Colony Estates subdivision. Does not feel the township should pay complete cost for treatments and says special assessment districts might be an option.

### SHARED SERVICES

Says "people in the township don't want to have that much to do with the city" because of higher city tax rate. Says township needs to look at financial bottom line and said power struggle erupted after initially encouraging talks of joint police dispatching.

Says city and township can't afford to continue separate ways. Would push for review of combining city and township police and fire departments. Shared services should increase.



Susan Hillebrand, 40, is a former personnel director of a medical supply company and has been active in the Northville 2000 citizens group. She also has served on the Northville Commons Homeowners Association board.

## NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES • REPUBLICAN PRIMARY • VOTE FOR FOUR



### BIO

Mark Abbo, 39, is a certified public accountant employed by a Plymouth-based automotive supply company. He is making his first run at public office.

### GROWTH/DEVELOPMENT

Wants to maintain character of community, but wants to create incentives to attract business, including possibility of tax abatements. Reasons that getting that limited tax revenue is better than none at all.

### BUDGET CRUNCH

Is concerned that five-year financial plan does not include water and sewer fund, which he sees as one of the township's biggest problems. Says funds to pay off WTUA bond debt may run out in three or four years and "unless something's done, we're going to have some big problems."

### WTUA SEWER

Calls "dealing with the situation of the bond requirements for WTUA" the township's most pressing issue. Said officials needed to give better guidance concerning sewer project.

### GRAVEL ROADS

Would find out if county should have responsibility to pay for gravel road treatments. If not, he would favor special assessment districts. Opposes spending general-fund money on services that provide benefits for just a few.

### SHARED SERVICES

Favors shared services that increase efficiency and cut costs.



Richard Allen, 60, has been a township trustee since 1980. He also serves on the Planning Commission. The Record was unable to contact Allen for an interview, but his past positions on topics will be noted when possible.

Allen has said he has "a problem with development for development's sake." As a planning commissioner and Township Board member, he "absolutely" believes the township is following its planning and zoning master plan.

Allen says the Truth-in-Taxation process should be "re-evaluated" to see if the township can raise revenue from that source.

Voted for and continues to be ardent supporter of sewer. Has called some media reports of sewer controversy "half-truths."

Feels that roads are Wayne County's responsibility but says that "short of a lawsuit (against the county), I don't know what you do." Like Lennox, in June affirmed opposition to township-paid road treatments, then voted for one treatment a week later. Now opposes township-paid treatments.

Voted for current city/township shared services agreement.



Gini Britton, 41, is president of the Lakes of Northville Homeowners Association and a member of Northville 2000. This is her first attempt at public office.

Says township must decide if it wants to be a bedroom community with higher taxes or more diversified and encourage commercial and industrial. Thinks officials need more input from residents.

Believes this is an inappropriate time to think about additions to township hall because of the tight budget. Would support reinstatement of administrative fee on tax bills and holding Truth-in-Taxation hearings "as a last resort."

Britton said she is "very upset with the WTUA" plans to run sewer pipe lines to Brown-Ferris Industries Salem Township landfill. Said the township and WTUA are in "cahoots" with BFI.

Said the issue needs more research but said "... as much as I think a lot of people don't want taxpayer money going to help a few, you still have to consider the health, safety and welfare of the residents."

Does not understand why "a community of this size needs two complete fire departments, two complete police departments." Thinks recreation may turn into a "pay to play" system.



Rebecca Connell, 34, is an administrator of a private outpatient psychiatric facility. She is attempting her first run at public office.

An outspoken opponent of the Holloway Sand and Gravel project, Connell was not pleased by the lengthy process involved in developing the township's asphalt plant ordinance. Believes the township could use more industrial tax base. Says the township should hold more meetings to learn what residents want.

Said a recent budget forecast was "very well done" but left questions in her mind. "People never like to vote in higher taxes, but if we want more services, want things done, that's the way we've got to go."

Believes the current situation is "a mess," but thinks original idea was good. Thinks \$1 million spent on a federal lobbyist is a "waste of money, time, and energy."

Believes township should at least be co-funding gravel road treatments but says Wayne County should also share responsibility. Says that creates health and safety problems which demand attention.

Would like to see the city and township "get more together." Thinks shared services is "a fantastic idea" that saves money and does not understand how wide separation of communities occurred.



Russell Fogg, 59, has served 10 years on the tax Board of Appeals, was appointed to the Planning Commission earlier this year, and is vice-president and treasurer of the Highland Lakes Condominium Association.

Is concerned about developing western portion of township and feels the township may be banking too much on expensive homes in areas close to a landfill and prison. Questions the county land deal and minimal downpayment the county accepted from the developer.

Likes the idea of reinstating the administrative fee and holding Truth-in-Taxation hearings to avoid deficit. Thinks residents would pass a millage for a specific demonstrated need.

Says he still does not know if it's right or wrong, but is worried that a continuing recession will force local taxpayers to pick up bond debt obligations, as opposed to the current plan of having bonds paid by tap-in fees.

Since the township allowed feeder roads to be built connecting Northville Colony Estates subdivision to several gravel roads, feels the township should accept responsibility.

Thinks government — including state, county, and city of Detroit — should provide more access to public lands. Would consider supporting some type of millage for a library and/or recreation departments.



James Nowka, 57, has served 18 years on the Township Board, as well as tours with the Planning Commission, and Zoning Board of Appeals. He currently serves as a recreation commissioner.

Wants to see county land parcel developed by one developer, saying the county doesn't realize the problems in trying to develop smaller parcels. Said development will perk up when sewer starts to flow.

Says financial woes can be remedied by bumping the township's millage rate to one mill and reinstating the one percent administrative fee on tax bills. Calls the township well-run and inexpensive.

Believes the law firm is involved in too many ways. Says project was put together for the right reasons and will eventually be viewed as "very significant."

Like Lennox and Allen, Nowka initially stood against gravel road treatments but recanted in June and voted to pay for one treatment. Voted to shut off treatment payments during July board meeting.

Did not address question of possibility of combining police and fire services but says differing millage rates would work against further unification attempts. Cites recreation program as a positive to the community.



Barbara O'Brien, 63, was a founder of the township Beautification Commission and served on the Planning Commission from 1988-91. She is a Realtor.

Concerned about "condo-izing" and advocates large lot sizes. Wants to take another look at the township's cluster development ordinance. Pushed township to develop its woodlands ordinance.

Thinks township should do better budget preparation. Said she thinks "it's kind of shocking that we've just bumbled along" without a budget forecast, a document she calls "long overdue."

"I think we need to put all the sunshine we can on that whole thing. Everybody is concerned about it." Wonders what will happen if development does not pull its weight when bond payments are due.

Thinks county should have more responsibility and is concerned about health and safety issues. Did not specify if she thought township or special assessment districts should pay treatment costs.

Says it is "kind of remarkable that we can afford to do things separately." Would support extending shared services to police and fire departments.



Angela Thomson, 39, is an attorney and worked 10 years as a nurse. She is making her first foray into public office.

Does not think township's development picture is bright for the next few years. Says residents must choose between bedroom community or more balanced approach toward development.

Would listen to proponents of Truth-in-Taxation and administrative fee. "From reading the five-year plan, it looks like we're in real trouble." Says she can't come out in support of fees, but may have to look at it.

"My biggest concern is the \$3 million we're going to have to start paying in 1993." Says she "can't even believe" that the same law firm represented all three townships and the sewer authority.

Does not have complete information on gravel road situation but says "it sounds to me that they should be treated by the township." Wants to hear all sides of issue more thoroughly.

Will push for "much closer" shared services relationship with city. "I would work toward ending ... polarization" with the city. Does not understand why there are two police, fire, and governing bodies.

**TERM LIMITS**

Opposes term limits because he believes it would penalize effective politicians. Believes the solution to any problems of perceived poor representation is more voter participation.

Would limit the state representative's terms to two or three, to maintain representation from ordinary citizens. Would prefer to see term limits passed in every state so that all states would be on an equal footing in terms of seniority in Congress.

Supports term limits, saying six years is long enough for both senators and representatives. Procedural changes will be needed to control the influence of unelected legislative staff members with the long-term knowledge and influence.

Has promised to serve no more than three terms himself, and will push for three-term limits for representatives and two-term limits for senators and the governor. Also seeks a unicameral state legislature.

**ABORTION**

Vows to support the consensus beliefs of the constituents in the district. Believes in the right to an abortion but does not believe abortions should be eligible for Medicaid funding.

Opposes abortion in any case, including rape, except to save the life of the mother. Believes it would be wrong to punish the fetus because someone else committed a crime. Would favor a law requiring a rapist who fathers a child to pay for child support.

A declared "pro-choice" candidate, but believes abortion should not be a means of birth control. Believes minors should be required to have parental consent for an abortion, with the option of a judicial waiver.

Labels himself a "pro-choice" candidate, saying that follows from the Republican philosophy of limiting government interference. Does not oppose the state paying for an abortion if the payment is a loan.

**PROPERTY TAX REFORM**

Proposes an increase in the sales tax to allow a property tax cut, and limiting property tax hikes to something other than inflation. The standard of living may be a better index because inflation sometimes outperforms the standard of living.

Favors property tax cuts, which could be offset by an increase in gasoline taxes that would be earmarked toward road repairs. Increasing the sales tax is an indirect way to tax the underground economy of drug sales and other illegal activity, plus revenue from tourists' spending.

Has called for a "total reform of the property tax system," and said the problem is intertwined with school finance reform. Described tax base sharing as "illegal." Favors a bipartisan committee to develop equitable funding for all schools.

Believes greater efficiency could leave money to provide property tax relief. For school funding, suggests a blended tax combining different types of taxation to affect everyone as equally as possible.

**EDUCATION REFORM**

Does not favor schools of choice, but said a proposal to make the entire state "one big school district" deserves consideration. Sees need for school finance reform, believing that educational opportunities should be equalized, but not with property tax.

Supports a voucher system to create a free-market system among schools. Would eliminate the need for state school funding formula, establishing a dollar amount for every student.

Described schools of choice as "an administrative nightmare for school districts," and a moot point until the state provides adequate school funding. Would do away with the state board of education, to promote local autonomy.

Believes school administrations can be trimmed to save expenses and improve education. Education funding should involve a statewide minimum, with the option for voters in local districts to fund "extras" themselves.

**TERM LIMITATIONS**

Believes that about 10 years of service in the House or Senate should be enough because of burnout. Favors the term-limit proposal on November ballot.

Does not believe terms can legally be limited at the state level, only federally. Limiting congressional terms would put Michigan at a disadvantage in Congress. Opposes ballot proposal: elections should limit terms.

Believes it should be an individual choice. Supports the November ballot proposal personally, but believes there are arguments to be made against it.

**ABORTION**

Supports right to choose; believes abortion is an individual's decision. Morality should not be legislated.

Believes abortion should remain legal option with restrictions, including no Medicaid funding, requiring parental consent, and a version of informed-consent legislation without a picture of a fetus.

Shuns labels but says he is probably considered pro-life. Believes Supreme Court action on Roe v. Wade is almost irrelevant, since actually stopping abortion is probably impossible. Current Michigan restrictions on abortion are reasonable.

**PROPERTY TAX REFORM**

Allowing casino gambling statewide will eliminate need for high property taxes. Give tax abatements for businesses. Favors a 1-cent sales tax increase to help senior citizens.

Supports "cut and cap" proposal to systematically cut school property taxes and limit property assessment increases to 3 percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less.

Not ready to fully support any current plan to cut property taxes. Wants more information on governor's plan; does not favor Democratic plan.

**EDUCATION REFORM**

Supports increase in length of school year to 200 days. Schools can be equitably funded with revenue from taxing legalized casino gambling.

Opposes longer school year because of lack of funding and lack of evidence for its benefits. State should reimburse schools for revenue lost to property tax cuts.

Believes longer school year is probably a good idea to help U.S. students be more competitive with the rest of the world. Anything to increase our educational competitiveness is good.

## Guests all love variations on food on a stick

Surprise your friends and family at the next backyard get-together and serve "food on a stick." Fire up the grill, grab your chef's hat, your skewers and some food, and you're ready to make kabobs.

Kabobs are a do-ahead meal with finger-food appeal. I am not just talking about roasting marshmallows on a stick, but appetizers or the main entree, the vegetables and desserts, the entire meal. Think of this as a stir-fry on a stick or a new twist to fondue. Kabobs are hands-on fun and healthy for the diet-conscious.

Grilling is one of the oldest methods of cooking and by taking the heat out of the kitchen everyone will enjoy the summertime meal.

Forget the foil for the vegetables; cook them directly on the grill rack above the coals. Vegetables directly on the grill have a wonderful smoky flavor that enhances their natural taste so the old standby potato or onion take on new character.

Make sure the grill rack is clean, and remove the grill rack and spray with a vegetable cooking spray so the food won't stick. Do not spray rack over hot coals; the spray could cause a flame.

When grilling small or fragile food such as seafood, place a wire cake rack parallel to the grill rods. This will prevent food from falling through and on the coals.

Choose skewers that are long and sturdy, that are either square or oval so that when the food softens during cooking, it will not fall off. Metal, wood or bamboo skewers work fine.

Soak the bamboo and wood skewers in water several hours before using so they do not burn. For a backyard cocktail party, make the appetizers on a stick; they are easy to handle for guests. These can be all fruit, all vegetables or a combination with a meat. Choose foods that cook at the same rate; not some large pieces and some tiny. Keep them uniform in size.

Try bananas, kiwi fruit, pineapple, watermelon, strawberries or fresh peaches on a stick. For a marinade to brush over grilled fruit use orange juice, lime juice or a maple syrup or honey glaze. Use just enough so the fruit does not dry out. Fruit just needs to be heated, not cooked mushy.

Seafood appetizers such as one or two shrimp with fruit are fun for dipping in sauce or melted butter.

On a hot day and you don't want to stand over the grill, let people thread their own skewer and cook the kabobs themselves. Set out fruits, vegetables, meat, seafood and the skewers; everyone can select what they like.

Vegetables are simple to grill and require little treatment beyond cleaning. Almost any vegetable can be cooked on the grill, but you may need to parboil some vegetables that require a longer cooking time. Tomatoes and mushrooms skewered together with chunks of meat cook too quickly and tend to fall off before the meat is cooked.

Skewer soft vegetables separately and add to the grill just a couple of minutes before the meat is done. Good vegetables to put on a stick are zucchini, asparagus, carrots, eggplant, snow peas, sweet potatoes, green onions, squash, leeks and bell peppers.

Generously brush the vegetables with melted margarine, butter or olive oil for flavor and to prevent sticking. Cook directly over medium hot coals until fork-tender and slightly charred. (A little char is tasty, but a lot of char is nasty).

Place food on the skewers, leaving space between each piece to allow for heat penetration and thorough basting.

Meat kabobs are generally marinated to help tenderize. The acids in vinegar, wine, fruit juice or commercial marinades break down the protein in the meat to make them more tender.

# Campfire Cooking

## Creating comfort food without comforts of home

Though Paul Kemp bears a striking resemblance to a somewhat slimmer James Beard, it's unlikely that the two ever crossed paths, not even in the kitchen.

While the Master did his cooking in the great kitchens of the world, the Novi Boy Scout leader and technical printing consultant has done most of his in the great outdoors. Now Kemp and Beard have one more thing in common: they are both published cookbook authors.

Kemp's compendium, which was just released this spring, is titled "Outdoor Cooking for Enjoyment: The Musings of an Amateur Chef." And borrowing an idea from Jeff Smith, The Frugal Gourmet, Kemp dubs himself The Tenderfoot Gourmet.

Though the Boy Scout motto is "Be prepared," Kemp, once a scout himself was thoroughly unprepared for the modern youth's idea of cooking. When Kemp's son Brian advanced from Cub Scouts to Boy Scouts in 1983, he was shocked to discover that the boys' idea of cooking was adding hot water to instant oatmeal.

Kemp decided that it would be wise — and at least more nutritious — if the adults did the cooking on campouts and passed out samples. This would heighten the kids' interest in cooking.

While the scouts' interest in cooking grew (so much so that a weekend campout for Troop 407 now usually includes a cooking school on Saturday afternoon) so did Kemp's reputation. He drew on years of experience at home to emerge as the campfire culinary champion for the 30-plus scouts and their leaders.

"On one campout one of our father's told me 'I don't eat this good at home,'" he said. "He thought we'd be eating hot dogs on a stick."

"Another time, we cooked for the Webelos — you know, the little kids. And I made a beef stroganoff. And a kid's father came up to me and say, 'My kid doesn't eat sour cream, onions or mushrooms at home, and he's on his third helping.'"

That, for Kemp, was the only inspiration he

needed.

"The thing that I've gotten so much satisfaction from is cooking things for a bunch of adults and having them tell me how good it is," he said.

That Kemp took naturally to cooking is no accident. He gives credit to three generations of maternal cooks in his family: Mary Baker, his great-grandmother; Della Husted, his grandmother; and Nona Belle Kemp, his mother. They taught him most of what he knew, and some of their recipes appear in the book.

"There are a couple of my great-grandmother's, one was my grandmother's, and there's even one from a U.S. Army cookbook, which was thrown in kind of tongue-in-cheek," Kemp said. "The rest of them are my own."

Kemp's father was more like his young scout, however.

"My father couldn't boil water without scorching it," he said. "His ice cubes were pretty good, but I figured I'd better learn to cook."

"I've been in boy scouting since 1942. That's about when I started cooking, when I was 12 years old."

Through the years of campfire cooking for Troop 407 and others, few if any of Kemp's recipes were written down. He admits to an adventurous nature in the kitchen, and was always somewhat imprecise — which was fine with him as long as everyone enjoyed what they ate.

Eventually, the other leaders and parents convinced him to set some of them to paper.

"They were afraid if something happened to me, they'd be lost," he said.

So last summer, Kemp began codifying his recipes. Progress was slow, however, and by winter, he had only a handful done. It was an unlucky break that helped him complete the book.

"I broke my leg in February, while we were camping," Kemp said. "That enabled me to finish the book. And it gave new meaning to the words 'Tenderfoot Cooking.'"

## 'Tenderfoot Gourmet' offers up favorites

### INDIVIDUAL MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 pounds ground beef chuck  
1/2 pound ground pork or sausage  
1 egg  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 large clove garlic, crushed  
4 slices bread  
1/2 cup barbecue sauce  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper  
4 tablespoons prepared horseradish  
1/2 teaspoon dried basil  
sprinkle olive oil

Combine all ingredients, including bread broken into small pieces. Mix thoroughly and divide into 6 equal portions. Form into individual loaves. Place each on a square of heavy duty foil and wrap securely. Place packages on charcoal and cook about 45 minutes, turning at least twice. The meat loaf is guaranteed to stick to the foil, so serve it in the foil and you can avoid using a plate.

### BROTHERHOOD POT ROAST

Beef bottom round steak roast (about 6 to 7 pounds)  
2 large onions  
8 medium potatoes  
8 medium carrots  
8 ounces (1 cup) beef consommé  
8 ounces (1 cup) tomato juice  
8 ounces prepared horseradish  
3 cloves fresh garlic  
1 teaspoon dried basil  
1 teaspoon dried rosemary  
1/2 cup olive oil  
salt  
pepper  
flour

Trim beef roast of excess fat. Make small cut all over roast (approximately 12). Insert slivers of fresh garlic into cuts. Sprinkle meat with salt, pepper and flour. Rub into meat with heel of large spoon.

Heat olive oil in dutch oven and sear meat to seal in juices. Add consommé and tomato juice, and sprinkle roast with rosemary and basil. Slice onions about 1/4-inch thick and put around and on meat. Cook covered on extremely low heat for about 2 hours. This can be done on a coleman stove with the flame turned down to the point where it just stays lit. After this initial 2 hour cooking, add peeled potatoes cut in half. Cook for approximately 1/2 hour. Add peeled carrots and spread the horseradish over the top of the roast. Cook for an additional 1/2 hour, or until carrots are done. Remove roast to carving board and allow to rest about 20 minutes. Slice approximately 1/4-inch thick. Serve with potatoes and carrots, using liquid from dutch oven as gravy if desired.

### HATTERAS STYLE CLAM CHOWDER

1 dozen large clams, shucked  
1/4 pound thick sliced bacon  
2 medium onions, diced  
3 medium potatoes, cubed  
2 tablespoons cornmeal  
salt  
pepper

Dice bacon and cook until soft. Add to 6 cups of water in a kettle large enough for all the ingredients. Bring water to a boil and reduce heat to a simmer. Add onions and potatoes and simmer about 20 minutes. Chop clams fine and add to kettle. Add more water, if necessary, continue simmering for 10 to 15 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste.

# Restaurant's responsibility is chief concern



Last Thursday we received a letter from the Novi Chief of Police, Douglas Shaeffer. The same letter was sent to all Novi holders of a Michigan Liquor License.

It was timely, as the '50s Festival weekend was upon us. The letter reminded us that no alcohol sales are made to underage youths. Also, he assured us that the police department would be prepared to assist the enforcement of these regulations if we needed.

Just over a month ago any of our staff that handles liquor, or serves it, was required to take an alcohol management class. During this four-hour session we were taught techniques for dealing with different problems that may arise. There were several things that, I think, stuck in all of our minds.

One was to check I.D. if in doubt. Only "legal" I.D.s are acceptable. There must be a picture and a birth date. A driver's license is the norm. We do not have to serve anyone who we feel doesn't have proper identification. The law states that we are responsible for serving underage youths even if they present us with fake I.D.

The serving of an already inebriated person is another fear. Generally speaking, for an average sized person, one ounce

per hour is the limit. It takes the body that long to metabolize the alcohol.

Thankfully, we have had minimal problems with any abuse on either count. My staff is to be commended for this. They are very aware of who and how much they are serving.

The letter went on to warn that within the next three months the department will begin decoy liquor enforcement operations. Youths under 21 will be trying to purchase alcoholic beverages. They will not try in any way to influence the establishment other than to come in, sit down and buy a drink.

I've posted the letter and read it during our meetings. We are very much behind a program such as this. There is nothing more senseless than an alcohol related accident. There is no reason for one to

happen.

Ironically, there were two unpleasant instances over the weekend. Both involved I.D.s, or lack of proper ones. In one case the young man, who "looked" old enough to drink, had lost his driver's license and only had a paper with his name. I said no.

He was irate. Yelling and screaming that he would never come back. It was totally unexpected. By the time the confrontation was over I was shaking and a nice evening had been ruined. He didn't deserve to be served. Frankly, he should think about charm school.

Later that evening there was a similar incident. In this case the young adult had a Michigan Department of Corrections picture I.D. He had just gotten out of jail the day before. I really didn't know what to do. Luckily there was a number on the

back to call. As it turns out, anyone on parole is not allowed into a bar, much less to drink. And, by the way, that card is not proper identification. He wasn't happy either.

The message I would like to convey is that we are liable for our actions as Michigan liquor license holders. Please, don't be upset with any bar or restaurant that is just doing their job. This is our way of making a living. The state owns the license and can revoke it at any time. We do everything possible to avoid a tragedy. Not only is it the law, we care.

¼ teaspoon garlic powder  
6 tablespoons grated parmesan or cheddar cheese

Split bread lengthwise. Butter each half, sprinkle with garlic powder and cheese. Place halves together and wrap in heavy duty aluminum foil. Place on charcoal for 6 to 9 minutes, turning frequently. To serve, unwrap and cut bread crosswise in 1-inch slices.

Serves 6 to 8.

## BARBECUED BANANAS

8 large bananas  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
¼ cup brown sugar  
1 tablespoon cinnamon  
3 tablespoons margarine  
¼ cup Hershey's chocolate syrup

Peel bananas. Put each on a square of heavy duty aluminum foil. Brush with lemon juice, sprinkle generously with brown sugar and cinnamon and dot with margarine. Wrap each banana securely in the foil, twisting the ends. Cook on charcoal for approximately 4 to 5 minutes, turning frequently. Serve by opening the foil and adding a line of chocolate syrup to the banana top.

## 'Tenderfoot' kicks out cookbook

You'll find that most of the recipes use dried herbs rather than fresh. That may be only a temporary situation, however. Kemp says the boys in his troop now carry a garlic press in their patrol box.

"You don't find that too often," he said with a wink and a smile.

Many of the recipes call for cooking in foil, owing to the nature of cooking over coals and open flames. Kemp insists on using heavy duty foil. The light stuff won't hold up, he says, and double-wrapping with it only adds to your cooking time.

A lot of the recipes also are adapta-

tions of recipes you may already be familiar with, but didn't think you could cook outdoors.

"I'm afraid that no cook is totally original," said Kemp. "But it's something that is creative enough that the kids enjoy it. It's something that's not rote, like using a computer. It's ex-

pressive, and I think it's an art form."

Recipes from "Outdoor Cooking for Enjoyment" can adapt to the campfire, the backyard grill, or even the home oven or stove. It is published in a limited run, so if you would like a copy, you can call Kemp at 349-4184.

## New canola could yield margarine

Ameri-Can Pedigreed Seed Company, a wholly owned subsidiary of Calgene, recently announced that the world's first canola genetically engineered to produce a modified oil has advanced to the second stage of field testing with trials currently under way in Michigan.

The varieties being tested produced a novel oil with dramatically increased levels of stearic acid, making them suitable for margarine and confectionery markets.

In addition to testing the high stearic acid varieties, the company has established in Michigan the first stage of field tests for new plants engineered to produce lauric acid. Lauric acid is widely used in the manufacture of detergents, soaps and shampoos and is contained in coconut and palm oil, which are imported into the U.S.

The genetically engineered canola plants are the first commercial temperate zone plants to produce lauric acid. While canola plants do not normally

produce lauric acid, Calgene scientists transferred a gene responsible for lauric acid production into the canola plants from a native California plant, the California bay laurel.

"This year's Michigan trials are an important step along the way in the development and commercialization of these two new products," says Eric Rey, General Manager of Ameri-Can. "We successfully completed our first set of field tests for the high-stearic-acid plants in Georgia and California during the past winter and the current spring tests in Michigan will give us additional information and increased seed quantities," he said.

"The first field tests for high-lauric-acid plants are both important for the development of this product and a strong indicator of the rapid rate of new product development in genetically engineered canola," Rey added. "For each of these products we could be in pilot commercial production within the next year or two," he said.

Canola is a type of rapeseed, the world's third largest oilseed crop with 44 million acres planted world wide. Introduced in the U.S. in 1985, domestic canola acreage has increased to an estimated 200,000 acres in 1992.

Canola oil has received widespread attention recently because its 6-percent saturated fat content, the lowest of any vegetable oil, is believed by many experts to make it the most healthful edible oil available to consumers.

U.S. canola oil imports have increased from virtually nothing in 1985 to over 700 million pounds in 1992. Current canola oil usage would require approximately one million acres of production in order to achieve self-sufficiency.

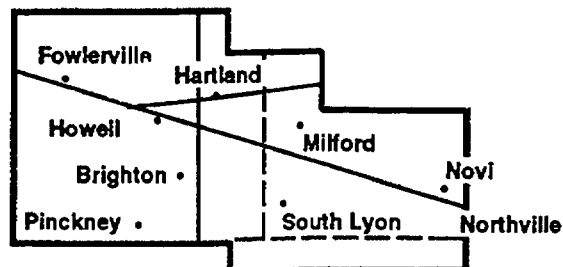

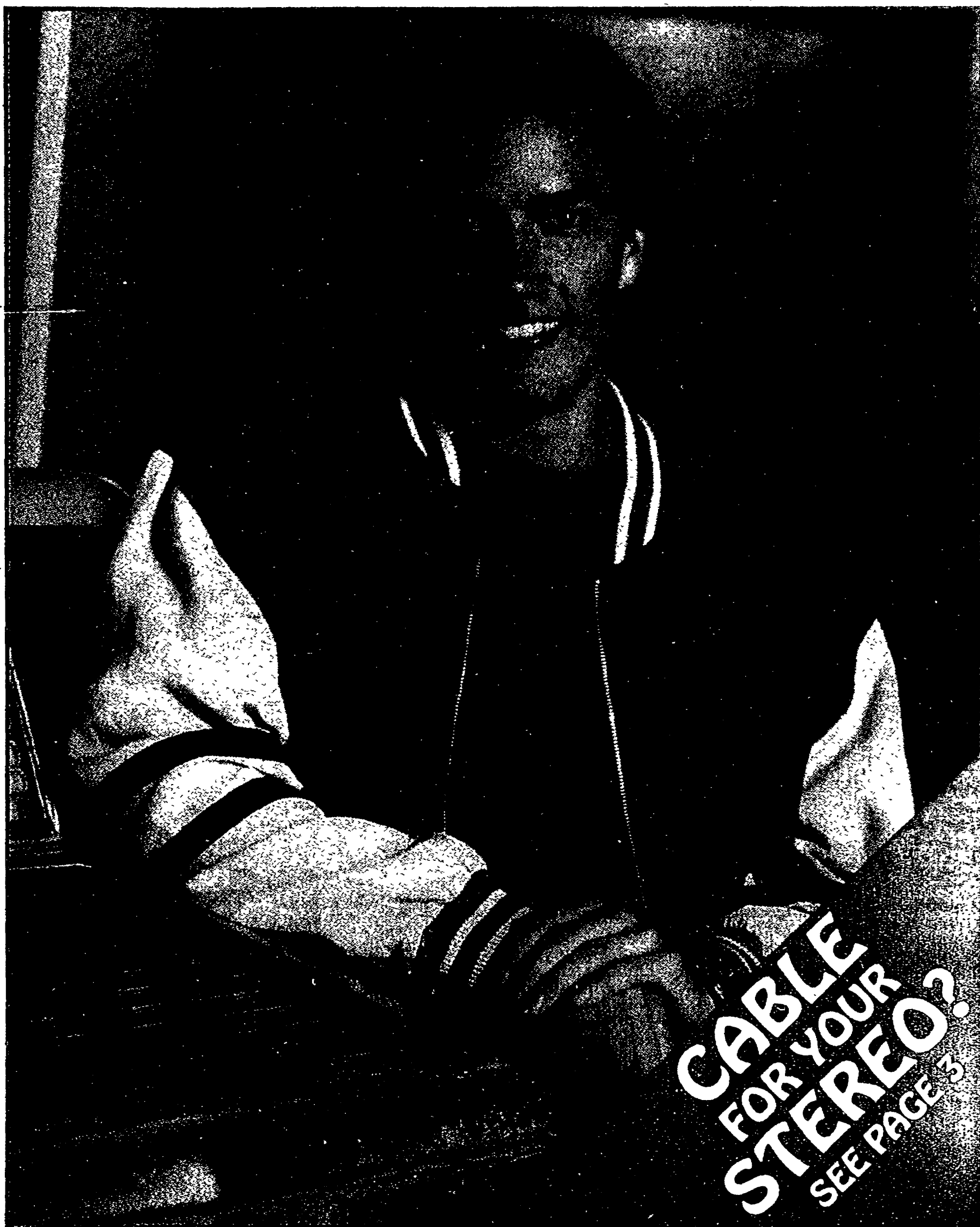

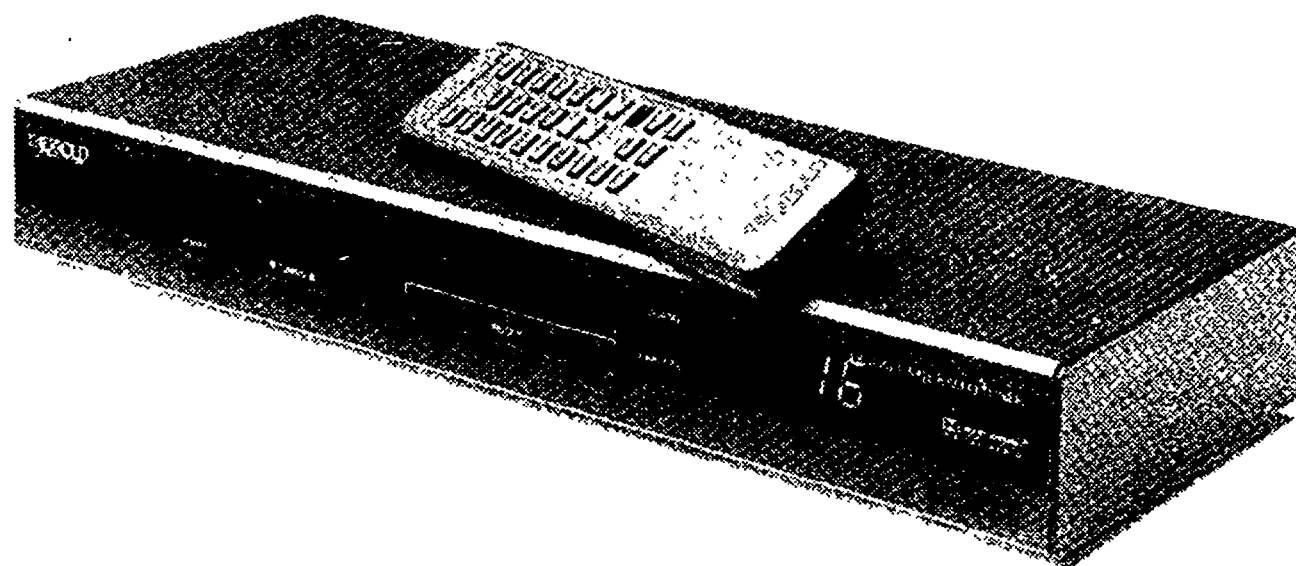

# TV's most sought-after address? 'Melrose Place'

## Other series Home to move in on Spelling's turf

Wanted: Millions of young viewers to frequent bohemian Hollywood apartment complex with pool. Shown by appointment on Wednesday nights. Vicarious pleasure guaranteed.

That's *Melrose Place*, the *Beverly Hills, 90210* spinoff that won the ratings race in its second week on the air. The Fox series, airing on Wednesdays, features an ensemble cast of eight attractive actors playing a group of men and women in their 20s who live in a Los Angeles Courtyard apartment building.

*Melrose* is but the first of a glut of such property set to hit the market this summer and fall. But if creator Darren Star and Executive producer Aaron Spelling (*Beverly Hills, 90210*) have their way, you'll already have a long-term agreement with their show, which debuted July 8, that precludes success for the competition.

It doesn't take an accountant to see how calculated the series' early success has been. First, brooding lead actor Grant Show was introduced to audiences as Jake Hanson, the older man who taught *90210*'s also-brooding ladies' man Luke Perry everything he knew—a sort of resume by inference. In May, Show appeared on two episodes of *90210* and an equal number of national magazine covers. The Fox network made it clear that we could address any further inquiries to *Melrose Place*.

Who is lucky enough to share an address with Jake? Also paying rent are: an aspiring designer (Josie Bissett) and her medical-intern husband (Thoms Calabro, at 33 the oldest cast member), a Southern bombshell (Amy Locane), an aerobics instructor (Vanessa Williams—no, not the former Miss America), an entry-level office worker (Courtney Thorne-Smith) fresh out of college, a social worker (Doug Savant) and an

aspiring writer (Andrew Shue).

After these announcements, the publicity machine shut down, waiting for demand to build. Interviews were kept to a minimum, and no advance copy of the show was available for screening by critics, who usually help to spread the word about new series. One national magazine even contacted Los Angeles-based reporters with offers of cash for interview tapes. Meanwhile portraits of the cast—by top art photographer Annie Liebowitz—went on display at The Gap stores everywhere.

The plan was a success. Viewership of the 90-minute premiere was exceeded only by that of the second episode, which drew more viewers than the competition on ABC, CBS and NBC, which were covering the third night of the Democratic National Convention.

If *Melrose Place* continues to establish itself in these still-early weeks, it may doom the competition, which ranges from libidinous *Freshman Dorm* to soft-porn *200 Malibu Road*. On Fox alone, the

fall-season competition includes a campus drama, *Class of '96*, and *The Heights*, a drama about a garage band.

"Our show is setting the standard for what these other shows are about," says Star, who based *Melrose* on his own early experiences living in Los Angeles.

One of the show's most unusual elements is the presence of a gay character, Savant's Matt Fielding. Spelling thinks it's important for his young audience to see others accepting a gay friend on his own terms,

and the actor agrees, adding, "I think we have an opportunity to present a very positive role model for a lot of gay teens."

Locane is not so sanguine about her character, Southern vixen Sandy Louis Harling, who works as a cocktail waitress while waiting for her big break in show business.

"I really don't like anything about Sandy," the New Jersey-bred actress insists.

Shue is more excited about his character, Billy Campbell, who is Thorne-Smith's roommate.

"I'm going through the same things that my character's going through, as far as making career

choices, figuring out who I want to go out with, who my friends are gonna be...things like that," Shue says. He's pragmatic about the chances of success for any of the look-alike shows.

"I haven't seen any of the other shows, (but) I've read a couple of the scripts. I have a feeling they're all going to be a lot alike. I think it will come down to the specific writing, and the actors in each one. I can't imagine that they will all last."

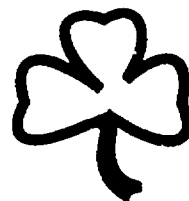

## Synchronized swimmers in last competition

In sports, the term "natural" usually refers to an innate, extraordinary ability to perform. It can also mean a special physical endowment, say, excessive height for basketball players. In either case, the synchronized swimming duet team of identical twins Karen and Sarah Josephson is definitely a natural. The United States team members are highly favored in this year's Summer Olympics.

The 28-year-old sisters started competing in synchronized swimming shortly after they entered the sport at age 6. By the time they were sweet 16, they were international competitors. Sarah, who is seven minutes younger than her sister, downplays the advantage they have in the sport as twins.

"When we first do things they're usually more matched, but we have to work at being synchronized just as hard as anyone else," she says.

Work hard they do, and it has certainly paid off for them over the years. Last year the Josephsons won the first-ever World Championship duet title in Australia, having the highest overall score ever recorded in international duet competition. They've won gold medals at the 1991 Rome Open, the Pan-Pacific Championships, the 1987 Pan-Am Games and were champions of the 1990 Goodwill Games. On the home front, they have been national champions seven times.

But it is the Olympic Games the two have yet to conquer; they were silver medalists in the 1988 Games in Seoul, Korea, finishing behind a Canadian duo. This week marks their last chance at Olympic gold; the Josephsons are retiring from competition. Even if they had gone on to the 1996 Games, their natural edge would have been lost, for the duet and solo synchronized swimming events will be eliminated then in favor of eight-women team events. "Personally, I'm kind of sad that the solo and duet events are gone," Sarah laments, "especially the duets, because that's been our specialty. But I think it'll be a good move for the sport."

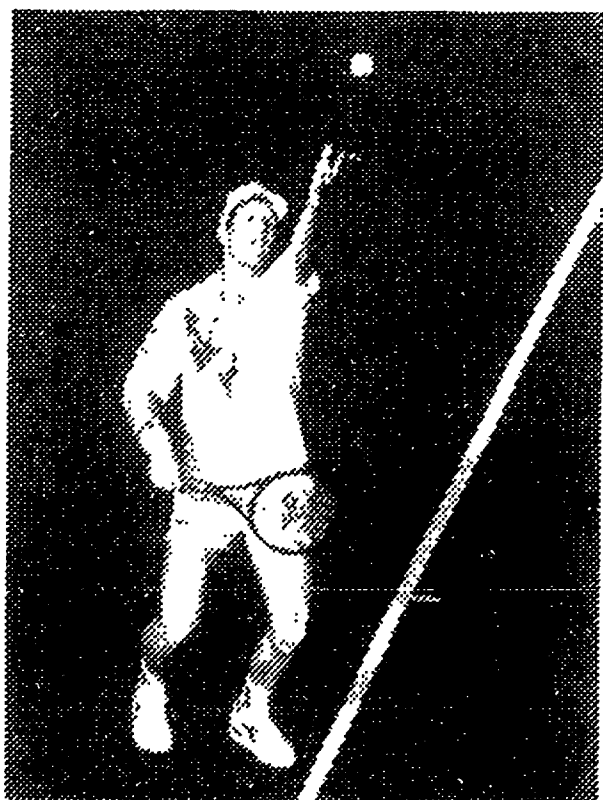
