Officials to meet about Ford plant

A bold proposal to combine city and township offices under one roof will be presented tomorrow night to both governments' leaders.

All interested residents are invited to attend.

The township board has agreed to meet with the city council at city hall at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow, to discuss the recommendations of the Ford Plant Study Committee for reuse of the 13.7-acre property at Main and Griswold. The seven-member committee was appointed in June following increased interest by private developers in the property.

After several meetings, the committee proposed a series of potential reuses, with a community center labeled the highest and best use. Such a center would provide space for an expanded library and city and township offices, allowing the existing city and township halls to be sold to defray the cost of purchasing and renovating the plant.

Committee Chairperson Greg Presley hopes the joint meeting will demonstrate whether there is consensus between the two municipalities to consider such a move.

"We would like to see if there is the possibility of cooperation on the

Group to help hardship cases

Even though Northville school officials hope higher fees in the district's pay-to-participate program won't deter students from partaking in athletics or co-curricular activities next year, they know it will limit some.

In an effort to provide all students with an equal opportunity to participate, the school board last Monday waived a district policy that prohibits the district from accepting money to fund specific programs or activities. Waiving the policy for the 1992-93 school year allows community groups and individuals to contribute money to the school for athletics or co-curricular activities.

Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said Friday since the district announced it would be moving toward a pay-to-participate program, he's had numerous phone calls from local groups — like the athletic and music boosters clubs and the Northville Rotary Club — who want to make donations to the school for that program.

School officials also intend to create a committee to identify hardship cases and to distribute donated

funds to pay participation fees for those students.

Rezmierski recommended the policy waiver along with a requirement to establish that committee, all in the context of a more expensive version of the pay-to-participate plan, at last Monday's meeting.

While the policy allowed the district to accept donations, it mandated that those contributions be dropped into the district's general operating fund and distributed as the district sees fit, unless the donor makes a special request.

"We need to waive that policy so we can take in money for pay-to-play," Rezmierski said.

Rezmierski's plan — which was approved by a reluctant board — restores the ninth-grade sports programs and reinstates the athletic director and trainer's positions to full-time jobs. The approved plan ups participation fees for high school athletes to somewhere in the range of \$158-\$250. But it does not interfere with middle school athletes' fees nor alter co-curricular charges at the high school or middle school levels. As recommended by an ad-hoc com-

Dumpster dilemma

New system an improvement, but it's not flawless

Most Northville business owners agree that the city-provided refuse collection program is an improvement over the system it replaced.

But they say there are still a few bugs left in the trash bins.

The downtown portion of the city-provided program faces continuing charges of scofflaws skirting the system, while several businesses outside downtown Northville have left the program because of its cost.

Steve Crawford of Crawford's Restaurant on Main Street said the computerized trash bin he uses in downtown Northville has occasionally experienced technical difficulties. "It seems to work fine — except when it doesn't work," he said. "Last Friday we tried to take the garbage out and it was broken. So we had a lot of garbage in the restaurant over the weekend."

Crawford said that has happened at least twice. Department of Public Works spokesperson

Becky Dozier attributed some technical difficulties to confusion over the computerized bins. Downtown merchants pay \$2.50 for each "push," or load of trash, fed into the city-owned bin. The user must enter a code sequence onto a keypad to gain access to the bin.

"Mainly the complaints are, 'Gee, I've got it jammed,' or, 'It's not pushing for me; can you help me?' A lot of people forget to push the proper sequence," Dozier said.

The computerized bins will accept four to six trash bags per "push," she added. "Where it runs into problems is where there are apartment dwellers in the downtown area and some of the apartment dwellers can't hold onto the trash for that long."

Chuck Lapham, owner of Lapham's Clothing & Tailoring Shop on Main Street, faulted the city for making no provisions for apartment dwellers. Lapham's building, like others downtown, houses apartments as well as the store.

"There's a little bit of inequity there, because I think the government expected the store owners to

take the apartment dwellers' trash," he said.

Lapham added that he keeps a watchful eye on the bin behind his downtown business, and has seen the system abused.

"It's right out in back of our store, so we do have a handle on them," he said. "We've noticed that, without mentioning any names, people will come out and set their little black bags of trash by the side of the Dumpster."

DPW Foreman Paul Vertrees said he has also seen trash set outside the bins. "That happens once in a while," he said. "I've gone through them and gotten addresses and a lot of it's from out of town . . . Some are from Novi and some are from Farmington."

Vertrees has called such offenders and warned them of the city's \$500 fine for illegal dumping, he said, though no fines have been levied yet.

Downtown Northville is also rife with rumors of people breaking into the bins and dumping their trash for free. Vertrees said he has heard those re-

Foreign student returns to town

Most graduates probably return to their hometowns at some point in their life. For most, where they went to high school is where their roots are.

When they do travel back, they visit friends and family and drive by old hangouts and talk of the past. They pass their old high school and reminisce about the good ol' days.

That's what Hank Penseel was doing in Northville recently. He was trying to reminisce.

But for Penseel, a 1965 graduate of Northville High School, remnants of his high school days — outside of the physical evidence — were hard to come by. Former classmates have moved, married, and some even have died. Others were hard to track down because they didn't have published phone numbers and some didn't return his phone calls.

But it didn't stop him from seeing Northville and telling his family about his glory days.

In the mid-'60s, Penseel was an ex-

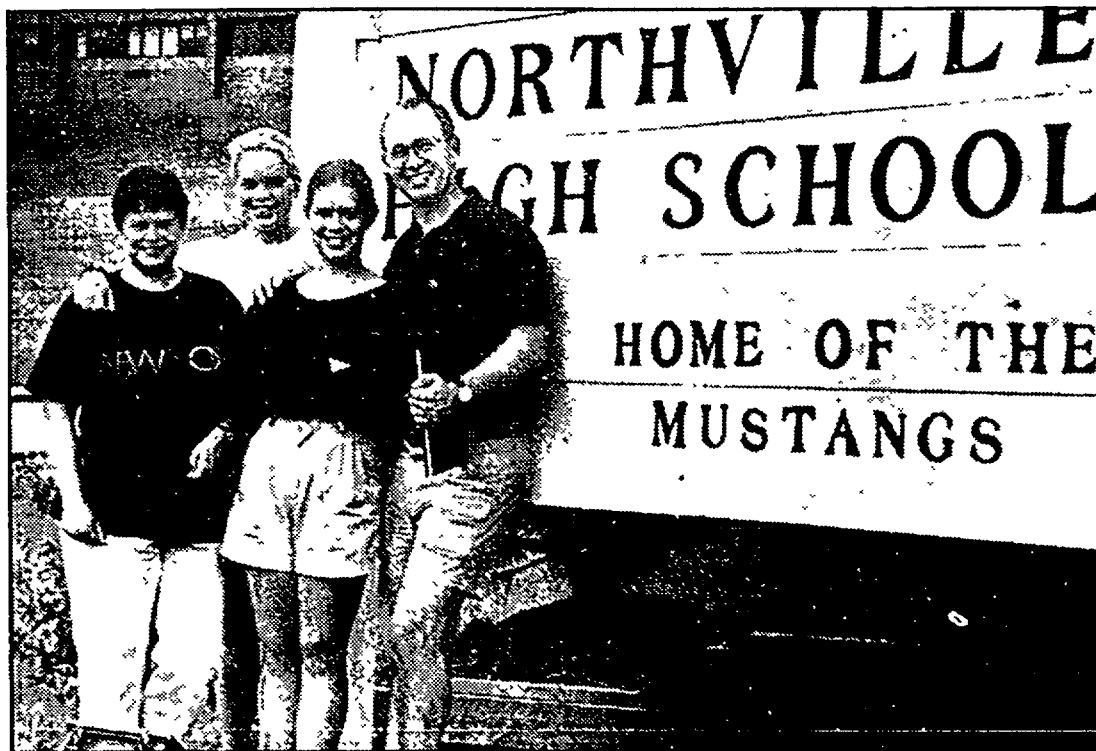

change student from Holland, where he lives now. As part of the Youth for Understanding foreign exchange program, Penseel was afforded the opportunity to spend his senior year in America as a student at Northville High School.

That senior year, he said, was filled with all the laughter, tears and cherished memories high school has to offer. So with memories in mind and a 1965 edition of the *Palladium*, Penseel hopped on a plane with his wife, Joke, and their daughters, Laura, 14, and Selma, 17, and came

to America to see his alma mater.

"It was very difficult to find my classmates," he said. "Some people aren't in the phone book and the girls have married or moved. So it was hard to find any of them."

Penseel said he started to track down some of his former classmates six months before he left his home in Holland, 10-15 kilometers south of Amsterdam, to make this trip.

With little or no success he came anyway hoping once he got here he'd have better luck. But that wasn't the case. Even though he didn't get to see

any of his buddies, he did visit members of the Heintz family to hear what some were doing now. He also was "fortunate enough," he said, to hear the voice of a former classmate on her answering machine the four times he left messages for her during his three-day stay.

"I kept in touch with some of my classmates after graduation. I wrote to some, but that faded to just Christmas cards, but now even that's gone."

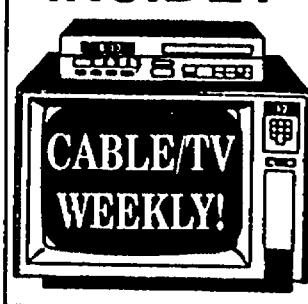

purchase of the Ford Plant, at least as far as the possibility of a joint library," he said. "If the two governments would be willing to consider

the possibility of living together, we would like them to consider that as well.

"We're not asking them to get married. We're only asking them to consider living together to save rent."

City Manager Gary Word hopes the meeting will indicate whether the study committee's proposal is worth pursuing.

"What I'm looking for . . . is some

consensus of opinion as to whether that facility can reasonably be reused for government offices for the city and township," Word said. "If not, then I don't think we ought to consider that any longer, at this time anyway."

Word also noted that the council is extending an invitation to all interested parties, including the present and future Township Board, library commission and interested residents.

"I kind of see it as a community discussion, not limited only to the City Council and Township Board," he said. "I hope what will emerge from that is some sort of direction, what our next step should be."

mittee, middle school athletes will pay \$108 to play sports next year.

High-schoolers will pay a fixed fee of \$100 per semester to participate in any number of co-curricular activities while middle schoolers will pay \$25 a semester for the same.

Under Rezmierski's plan the committee will use the federal school lunch program as a guideline for identifying hardship cases and develop a general form to process requests for help. All the committee's work will be done in strict confidence, Rezmierski said.

All funds used to support hardship cases will be generated from fundraisers, charitable contribu-

tions and donations from individuals, civic groups and clubs like the athletic and music boosters, he said. No district funds will be used to support individual students or the pay-to-participate program.

While most of the board members were opposed to the pay-to-participate concept in theory, all concurred to the plan and fully supported the idea of establishing the committee.

"I will support the plan but I do it very reluctantly," said board member Joseph Dukerley. "I'm opposed to the financial burden . . . and I think it limits those who need it the most."

Board Vice President Glenna Davis and Secretary Richard Brown both questioned representatives

from the ad-hoc committee about provisions in their plan for hardship cases.

That discussion is what prompted Rezmierski to consult the district's policy and eventually led up to the decision to create the committee.

"We need some kind of mechanism in place to ensure equality," Brown said.

The board is expected to have a firm figure on the fee high school athletes will pay to play at tonight's meeting, Rezmierski said he's been waiting to see how much money the clubs would commit to before deciding on a final figure.

The board meets at 7:30 p.m. in Old Village School, 405 W. Main.

Amidst looking for classmates, Penseel and his family toured Northville. They visited the home where Penseel lived while he was here and took a family photograph in front of it. The home at 18525 Sheldon Road was then owned by a Mrs. Chabut, a woman who had adopted all of her children. But she has since died and the children have all moved out of the area, a neighbor told Penseel.

In spite of all the empty hopes, Penseel still had good memories about the year he spent in Northville. "The town is still so lovely," he said. "It was always nice and cozy and still is. It was a nice American town to live in."

Penseel said he was surprised to see how much the face of the town had changed since he lived here. The bowling alley that used to be across the street from the Northville Downs and was a frequent hangout then had been razed and replaced by Main-Centre. Walking past the racetrack brought back fond memories of the job Penseel held cleaning tables in

his spare time, which he said was rare then.

As a member of the student body, Penseel led an active senior year. He was a member of the debate and forensics teams, helped with the yearbook, and participated in sports.

"I tried to participate in as many things as possible. Sports, after-school activities and the school play. I was Teddy Roosevelt in *Arctic and Old Lace*, the school play," he remembered with a smile on his face.

He said the best memories he has of high school were of those uniquely American things that the typical senior in Holland might never see in his or her high school years.

"I tried to do the things that we didn't have. Things like Homecoming and all the after-school activities. Those were the best for me because it was things that we didn't have at home. There were always so many things happening, but being in the school play was the best for me."

Being invited to a New Year's Eve party his senior year was also a memorable event for him.

Nowadays Penseel is a marketing

manager for Sony. This is the first time he's returned to the States with his family. Together they traveled to New York and came to Northville via the northern route through Canada with a short stop in Niagara Falls.

"We drove through Niagara just to see Northville and then we stayed three days to try to get ahold of people."

Penseel wasn't sure whether his perception had changed or the proximity of Northville to Detroit had changed.

"It seems that Detroit has come closer to Northville. In my memory you had to travel a lot further to get into Detroit. It is still a very neat, white, clean, green suburb but now it seems like it is more part of the outskirts of Detroit than I remembered it."

"I remembered it was near Detroit because there was always lots to do there. But now I see there's a new mall in Livonia and close to the interchanges for I-96 and I-275. It is still a perfect spot to live. It still has greenery and lovely, beautiful houses."

Beginning Aug. 15, the recycling center will no longer be open Wednesdays between 3-7 p.m. Weekend hours will be cut from every Saturday to the first and third Saturdays of each month, between 11 a.m.-5 p.m.

The move is due to reduced use of the center since the city initiated curbside collection of recycling materials, and is intended to reduce the need for overtime by DPW workers. Since curbside recycling started in February, average use of the center has dropped to 35 cars on Wednesdays and 55 cars on Saturdays.

The center is available to City of Northville residents only, and identification is checked at the gate.

The center accepts clear, green and brown glass, plastic types 1 and 2, tin cans, household and car batteries, paint, used motor oil and antifreeze, compost material, scrap metal, and newspapers. Liquids should be in sealed, clearly labeled containers. Newspapers should be stacked in brown paper bags or tied into bundles. Telephone books, magazines and road maps are not accepted.

NEW LAW AFFECTS REFRIGERATOR DISPOSAL: Northville residents should be aware that effective July 1, 1992, it is unlawful to dispose of any appliances that contain refrigerants. Refrigerators and air conditioners are included in this prohibition and can no longer be accepted for trash disposal unless the refrigerant is removed by a certified technician and the appliance is labeled to indicate that the removal has been performed.

Effective July 1, Painter & Ruthenburg, the community solid waste hauler, will only pick up and dispose of appliances that have had the refrigerants removed and are so labeled.

'Cabaret' plan raises questions

The proposal is for a 13,700-square-foot facility to host comedy, square dancing, silent movies, country music and cabaret.

The site is Northville Plaza Mall. The name is Cheetah Entertainment Center Inc.

For the township Planning Commission, questions abound.

Planning commissioners last month raised a collective eyebrow and tabled a site plan for Cheetah Entertainment Center Inc., pending discussions between township staff, attorneys and business

representatives.

There is a simple reason for the delay: The township does not know exactly what they are being asked to buy into.

"Right now, we want to find out what it's all about," said Carol Maise, township planning and zoning administrator. "We're trying to find out where it falls under the ordinance."

That seems to be anyone's guess. Hyman Weinstein, Cheetah's president, described the business as a six-room entertainment center slated to house comedy, a game room, souveniers, square dancing, carry-in food and — of special note to commissioners — a room for a cabaret with tables

and chairs and live entertainment. Exactly what is cabaret and live entertainment? The township isn't sure.

"(Weinstein) explained it as tables and chairs," Maise said. "It was never clearly defined."

Weinstein denied that his proposed cabaret included topless entertainment, but the township may be caught with its pants down in that regard. It currently has no ordinance on the books which would prohibit various forms of nudity in a commercial enterprise, Maise said.

"However, there may be something

on the Township Board agenda this month," Maise said.

Maise said commissioners are concerned that Weinstein plans to implement a metal detector-based security system and that the proposed business will open its doors to those 17 and older, with a \$5 cover charge. No alcohol will be served and smoking is forbidden, and the business would open its doors from 8 p.m. until midnight Wednesday through Thursday.

Weinstein was unavailable for comment Friday. Maise said the Planning Commission is unlikely to review the proposal this month.

ports, but has not seen any examples himself. "No one's really seen it, but we've got a computer chip coming from our contractor (to correct the problem)," he said. "It is possible. The police are watching for it and so are we."

Outside the downtown district where businesses own their bins and pay the city to empty them, some business owners have switched to private trash collectors.

Jim Roth, owner of the Good Time Party Store on Seven Mile, said he made the switch to Browning-Ferris Industries for financial reasons. "When I got the first bill (from the city), I was

shocked... It really was outrageous," Roth said. "It was a dollars-and-cents situation."

The city's monthly rate for commercial accounts outside the downtown area is \$76.36 for weekly emptying of six-yard front-loading trash bins.

While he had no problems with the city's service, Roth estimated he is paying BFI 30-40 percent less than the city, and BFI allows him to recycle cardboard for free as well. "It's really making sense because we're collapsing our cardboard down," he said.

Roth was uncertain why the city's system seems more expensive than BFI.

"Maybe they're just paying too much for the ser-

vice," he said. "I don't think they really want to be in the garbage business."

Despite all the bugs in the city's system, Lapham said, "It's a great improvement over what was legislated before."

During the switch from a millage-based to fee-based system, downtown business owners were originally charged a flat fee based on their property's assessed value. Some business owners criticized that system as unfair because it did not take into account the amount of trash generated.

"I think the (new) system is about as fair as you can get it on the surface," Lapham said. "I've been one not to complain unless I have a better idea, and I don't have one right now."

Salvage and overhaul are part of firefighters' job

The fire already had a good hold in a room on the second floor as the fire department arrived on the scene. Flames blowing out the windows were lapping up the side of the building, toward the roof. It was after hours and the business on the first floor of the building was closed, so firefighters had to force open the front door to gain access. Once inside the building they located the stairway to the second floor and advanced a hose line down the hall. Fortunately, the door to the room on fire was closed, keeping most of the smoke and heat from spreading to other areas of the second floor. With the hose line in place and water flowing, firefighters forced the door to the room where the fire was, and the hose team advanced. In a matter of a few minutes the fire was out.

Or so it seemed to the people on the street below.

Flames burning out the second floor window had ignited the roof overhead and burned into a small concealed crawl space between the second floor ceiling and the roof above. Fire had also burned into the walls in the second-floor room where the fire had started, and moved up into the roof area.

At any structure fire, once the main body of the fire has been "knocked down," a good deal of work still lies ahead. Fire can enter concealed spaces and burn undetected, erupting hours later in what firefighters call a "rekindle." To prevent this from happening, firefighters would "overhaul" the structure to find hidden fire and make sure that, once out, the fire stays out.

A variety of tools are used in the overhaul process. Axes, power saws and sledge hammers are used to gain access to walls to check for fire extension, or to remove trim which may conceal fire. "Pike poles," with metal hooks and points, are used to pull down burned ceilings to check for extension into concealed spaces between

floors. Shovels are used to remove burned debris to the outside of the building, where it can be wetted down without causing further water damage to the structure. The most destructive parts of the overhaul process are typically carried out in the area where the fire started, but it is sometimes necessary to perform overhaul in areas not touched by the fire itself, if heat in the walls or other indicators suggest the fire may be spreading in concealed spaces. The damage caused by overhaul is, in the end, less destructive and easier to fix than the damage that would be caused by the fire, if left unchecked.

While some of the firefighters are involved with overhaul, others will be working on "salvage," the process of assisting the owner or occupant of the building with saving as much property as possible. Salvage starts right away. As the hose team made its way to the second floor, other firefighters entered the first floor and moved goods and furniture together where they could be covered with protective tarps, called "salvage covers." This would help

protect the items from smoke, heat and water damage produced by the fire and the efforts to contain it. Once the fire was knocked down, such items were moved to areas of the building unaffected by the fire, protecting them from further damage.

Seeing that the fire had burned up the roof line of the building, the chief directed overhaul crews to immediately check the concealed space between the roof and ceiling for fire extension. Crews on the second floor were directed to pull the ceiling, to see if there was any indication of the fire had spread. Access to the concealed space was quickly gained, where fire was discovered to be still burning. Hose lines were moved into position, and the fire extinguished before any further damage could be done.

Fire fighters remained on the scene for almost three more hours, carefully checking to make sure all of the "hot spots" were out. Their thoroughness ensured they would not have to be called back to fight this fire again.

Man charged as suspect in burglary

A man suspected of breaking into a Grace Street home Aug. 4 turned himself in to city police two days later.

Frank David Keipp, 29, of Farmington Hills, was arraigned on a charge of breaking and entering with intent to steal at 35th District Court the morning of Aug. 7. A not-guilty plea was entered on his behalf. Keipp will be back in court for an Aug. 14 preliminary examination in front of Judge James Garber.

Keipp's arrest followed a tense night in which he allegedly talked his way out of a Grace Street home with a gun pointed at his chest.

The homeowner told city police he had just returned to the house when

he heard noises upstairs. He called police, grabbed a shotgun and saw a prowler on the stairs holding a box of ammunition and another of his guns in a case. The prowler reportedly kept walking down the stairs despite the man's orders to stop. He darted out the front door after throwing the gun and ammunition at the man's feet, and the man followed him outside, firing a warning shot in the air.

Keipp was an employer of a roofing firm that worked on the Grace Street home about a month before the break-in.

City police tracked him to his sister's house through the roofing company, and Keipp appeared at the police department Thursday, Aug. 6, to answer their questions.

He was arrested and held until his arraignment Friday morning.

Parole reform to crowd prisons

Most state representatives wouldn't talk out loud about the down side of a popular parole reform bill they adopted on a 99-2 vote.

But a staff memo to House Republicans spelled trouble ahead:

"A direct consequence will be more inmates within Michigan's prisons and a higher budget for prisons," warned the House GOP legal counsel. "As of July 1, 1992, there were 32,606 male prisoners in space designed for 24,885 — 7,721 over capacity . . ."

The staff predicted more prisoners because: "The rate of parole is likely to drop because an inexperienced and politically accountable board is going to be more cautious and afraid to make a mistake."

All area lawmakers voted yes. House passage was preceded by a week of news conferences and rallies at which lawmakers deplored the fate of rape and murder victims.

House Bill 4130, which goes to the state Senate for concurrence, will:

● Set up a parole board appointed by the director of the Corrections Department (himself an appointee of the governor) instead of career civil

servants.

● Give members staggered four-year terms.

● Expand the board to 10 members from the current seven.

● Require the Legislature's Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR) to approve the department's parole guidelines.

● Require lifers to serve at least 15 years (instead of the current 10) before qualifying for parole.

● Allow a crime victim or prosecutor to appeal a prisoner's parole to a court.

● Allow streamlining of parole interview procedures. Lifers would be interviewed less frequently. Low-risk prisoners can be denied parole without an interview. High-risk prisoners can be denied parole without an interview. Purpose: to allow closer attention to more important cases.

● Require the Corrections Department to ask a probate court for involuntary commitment for discharged or paroled prisoners who require mental health treatment, either because they are threats to themselves or others.

The new parole board is established Oct. 1. The old one is abolished Nov. 15, so there will be six weeks overlap.

Trooper Mac — a walking, talking police robot — will make a special appearance to teach kids about safety.

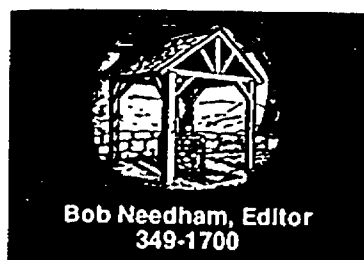
Stevens said complimentary hot dogs, popcorn and soft drinks will be available throughout the day along with balloons for the children.

Parole system cries out for some changes

Michigan's parole system has been the subject of a great deal of criticism lately — well-deserved criticism, we might add.

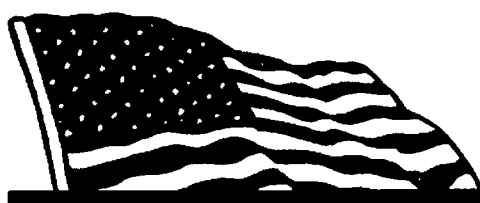
State lawmakers apparently agree the system needs to be reformed. In fact, they've just passed legislation they say would do the job. But we question whether the legislation will really fix the problem, or just make a change so lawmakers can say it's fixed.

The local case which showed the need for reform was the Kenneth Loveday case. Loveday — convicted on a charge of negligent homicide after he drove his car into two joggers along Eight Mile Road last year and killed them — started serving a 15- to 24-month sentence in February. But on June 6, the state Parole Board voted to put him back on the streets Aug. 20, even though he'd served only six months.

His parole has since been revoked, of course, as a result of an agreement reached after the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office challenged the decision before Circuit Court Judge Hilda Gage. The Parole Board had admitted it erred in reaching the decision. According to executive secretary Kay Eyer, the decision was made less than two weeks before family members of the victims were scheduled to testify to the board about Loveday's parole. That violated the state Crime Victims Rights Act. And now Loveday won't be eligible again until November.

What really led to the Legislature's so-called reform of the parole system wasn't the Loveday case, but the Leslie Allen Williams case. Williams was out on parole himself when he committed the four murders in Oakland and Livingston counties to which he has since confessed.

What's troubling about the Loveday

case is that there was an error, an admitted error on the part of the Parole Board, and the county still had to go to court to get agreement to overturn the decision. One gets the feeling that if it hadn't been challenged, if a stunk hadn't been made about it, the Parole Board would have just let a clearly erroneous decision to let a convict out early stand.

The parole reforms lawmakers drafted supposedly make the panel more accountable. A new panel will be formulated, with 10 members instead of seven. The terms of office have been shortened and they will report directly to the head of the state department of corrections. There are also several changes to the procedures for reviewing parole for prison lifers.

Fine, but neither Loveday nor Williams were lifers at the time.

Deeper changes are needed. Reviews for the accuracy of the information on which the board makes its decisions are apparently needed. Better notification procedures are needed to make sure the board gets the input of victims, the prosecutor, the original judge in the case and police before it can make any decisions. Tougher standards for letting out anyone early are needed.

The parole system failed in the Williams case. It nearly failed again in the Loveday case. We need to make sure it is working properly before it produces any more tragedies.

Just want to sell newspapers?



There's a favorite comment about the press that gives me, and most community journalists, a chuckle every time it's uttered.

"You just want to sell more newspapers."

It usually appears in letters to the editor, reserved for those moments when the writer has run out of arguments, or perhaps doesn't even have one to begin with.

Invariably, the "you want to sell more newspapers" statement

comes when we uncover scandalous wrongdoing, or print words or photos that some find offensive.

So my reaction to the "sell more newspapers" comment is usually, "You must have us confused with some other paper."

First off, accusing us of wanting to sell more newspapers is like trying to accuse Todd Knickerbocker of wanting to sell more securities, or John Genitti of wanting to sell more sandwiches. It's a cheap and easy shot.

Of course we want to sell newspapers. That's capitalism, God bless it.

But we're also committed to good journalism that's tough, but fair. The reporters on this staff have been trained as journalists, and to be honest, most of them probably couldn't sell their way out of a wet paper bag.

But the question does arise of whether we really can sell more newspapers. Our coverage area is limited to Northville

and Northville Township. That's a pretty limited audience. According to the most recent census, there are 8,600 households within the city and township.

Now compare that to our latest circulation figures which show that we sell around 6,600 papers a week. The percentage of total households we reach in our given circulation area is called "penetration." As you can see, our penetration stands at 77 percent, and that's an excellent figure.

Plus, independent study shows that the average *Record* is read by 2.5 people.

To summarize, we're reaching just about everyone we want to reach in the Northville area. So we don't feel compelled to "sell more newspapers."

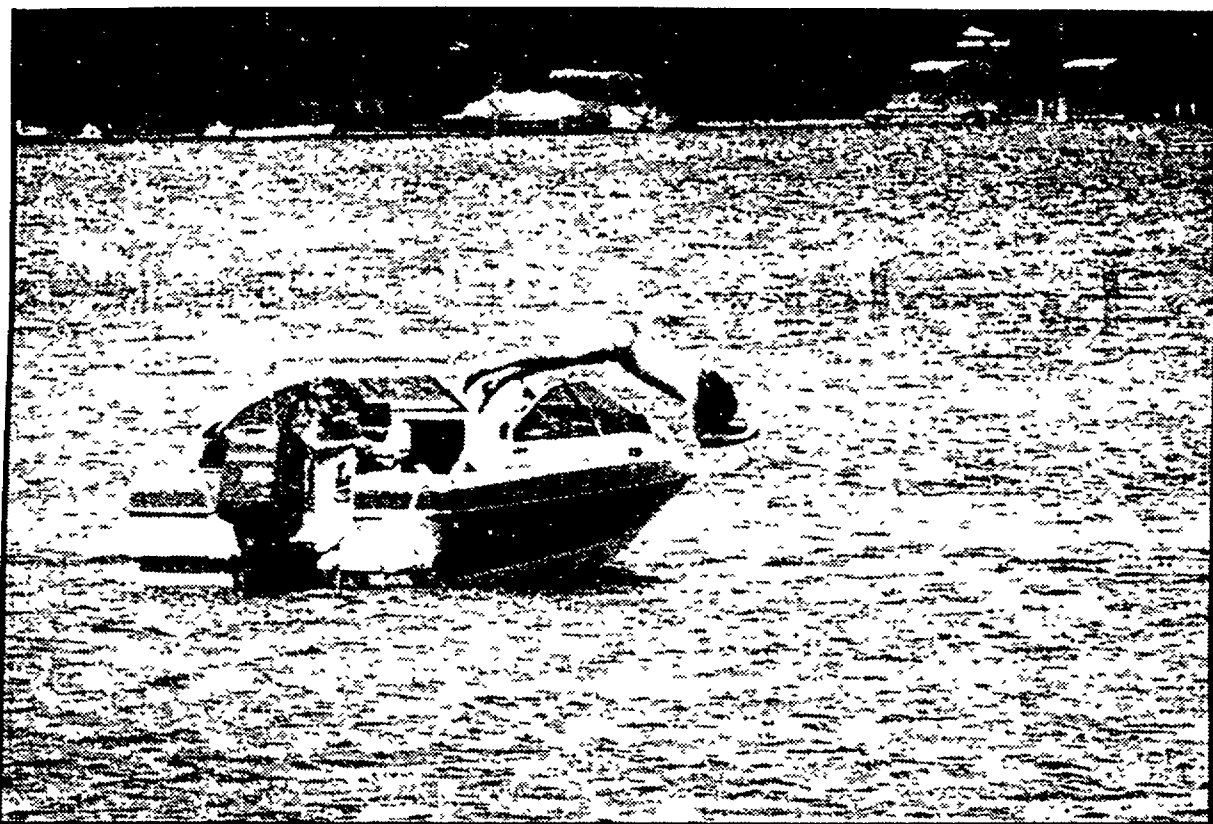
That's good news for you, the reader. That means we can put our noses to the grindstone and do the best job we know how, without the pressure to sell, or other bottom-line problems.

And here's another fact for you. Of our weekly sale, only a couple hundred are sold off the newsstand or through the vending boxes you find downtown. If indeed we were going to "sell more newspapers" with sensational stories, that's where the extra sales would occur. At 50 cents a copy, no one is going to get rich even if we sell a couple hundred more papers at the newsstand.

The fact of the matter is our staff lives in this community, and works there every day. If we printed stories that were unfair, untrue or offensive, it wouldn't be long before none of our sources would talk to us, and none of the merchants would buy ads from us.

And then we'd be selling no more papers.

Broadway bound?

Scholarship winner pursues singing, dancing

Amy Frankel hasn't yet decided how she'll spend the money she was awarded as this year's recipient of the Jody Schwartz Memorial Award.

Frankel, who will be a freshman at Northville High School in the fall, said she plans to use the \$200 scholarship money to help further her dancing and singing careers. An active dancer and performer, Frankel had hoped to use the money to pay for a brief stint at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camps in Interlochen this summer, but her busy schedule nowadays could prevent that.

"My summer's really filled up," she said last week.

An avid dancer, Frankel practices tap, jazz, ballet and lyrical dance five days a week. That is what made her a prime candidate for the award, which is a living testimony to the energy and motivation Jody Schwartz showed.

After recently competing in a national dance competition in Orlando, Fla. and with plans to perform in Italy next summer, Frankel is a busy girl and is reflective of what the award and the scholarship fund serves to preserve.

The scholarship money is designed to pay for a summer enrichment program for an eighth-grade student meeting the criteria for the award. Under the terms of the endowment fund set up by Schwartz's parents in their daughter's memory three years ago, recipients must be active and well-rounded. Frankel fills that bill.

"Amy is an outstanding student," said Martha Nield, an English teacher at Meads Mill Middle School who had a voice in selecting Frankel as this year's recipient.

"She's just very compassionate. All along she's helped other students and she herself is a good scholar. She's thoughtful, compassionate, concerned and really cares for other people."

Schwartz, to whom the scholarship fund is dedicated, died suddenly from an asthma attack three years ago on July 19. Her memorial fund is dedicated to keeping her memory alive.

"I felt really special winning the award. I was really honored and surprised . . . I cried," Frankel said.

The award recipient is announced annually at the Meads Mill honors banquet. Prior to the awards banquet, recipients are not notified.

"I was really surprised. My Dad knew. He kept hinting at it all night long," she said.

Frankel just returned from a trip from Orlando, where she — along with other members of the local dance company, Piazza Dance Company — competed for national honors. At the competition she fared well in individual and team competitions.

While there, Frankel danced her way to a silver medal in the tap solo contest — falling just five points shy of the gold. In group jazz and tap numbers, Frankel was one of the reasons the local dance company collected silver and gold medals at the American Dance Spectrum National Competition held earlier this month.

The dance company has been invited by the Italian government to show-tour Italy next year.

While Frankel believes she has the talent to perform, it is permission

from her parents that will decide whether or not she travels abroad next year.

"I have to persuade my Dad first," she said.

Frankel's been dancing since she was 2½ years old.

"I was really dancing before I could walk. My mom used to put music on and I would climb up on the coffee table and start dancing. I've always liked music a lot and dancing to it."

"I want to be a dancer and go on to Broadway to sing and dance. It will be really hard, and I know that there's a lot of competition."

In spite of her love for the limelight, Frankel's been known to lack confidence and often has to be chided or

persuaded to audition.

"I lack confidence even though I really love to perform. My family and friends have to push me into auditioning," she said.

As far as auditioning goes, Frankel has been a cast member in church and school performances. At the age of 8 she was on stage at the high school in a production of *Fiddler on the Roof*. She is also a member of the performing arts group "Artisan" and has studied piano for nine years and voice for one year. She and her sister sing at nursing homes monthly and have landed some gigs at local clubs.

"We've played at the Novi Hilton. I played the piano and she played the guitar. It was great; we invited all of

our friends and we had a lot of fun," she said.

Despite her lack of confidence, Frankel said she wasn't shy about working the crowd at a place in Japan a couple of years ago when she and her family lived there.

"We were in a country-western bar in Japan and we asked if we could perform and they let us. It was really fun," she said.

The busy life she leads this summer isn't really any hindrance to her, she said, because the faster the summer passes the sooner high school comes.

"I can't wait to get to high school. There'll be more freedom, more people and more guys," she said.

Mill Pond area seeks solutions

Neighbors of Northville's scenic Mill Pond are anxious to see their waterway cleaned up after two years of effort.

But they're not waiting for the city to do the work.

"Our objective is to take care of it both from an aesthetic viewpoint and an ecological viewpoint," said Horton Street resident Mike Anusbigian. "Long-term, we feel it has to be dredged. Obviously we have a vested interest in it and obviously the city has no money."

The residents held an educational meeting July 16 to hear presentations by a water management expert from the Department of Natural Resources and the owners of two water restoration firms, Clean Lake Improvement of Michigan and Midwest Marine Services.

Twenty-five residents had sought city support two years ago for a dredging program to restore the seven-acre pond, which is filling with sand and silt. Residents blamed the silt on construction upstream in Novi.

The dredging was delayed while the pond's silt was tested for contamination to determine where the dredged material would have to be dumped, and while the city's engineering firm reviewed potential disposal sites for the dredged material and funding sources for the project.

An engineering report by McNeely & Lincoln in April 1991 noted that an

island had formed at the upstream end of the pond due to sand and gravel accumulations, and trees and brush were growing on the island. Finer silt had begun to fill up the downstream end of the pond.

The engineering firm suggested two alternatives for disposal of the silt. A \$400,000 proposal called for dredging the entire pond, removing about 15,000 cubic yards of dredged material and disposing of it off-site. A more limited, \$119,000 proposal called for dredging about 3,700 cubic yards of material from a 120-by-300-foot area around the pond inlet, to remove the current delta and island formations.

The firm also sought information on potential county, state or federal funding sources last October, with little luck.

In the meantime, the Mill Pond neighbors have reviewed their own options for improving the body of water. The neighbors have circulated a list of options including pulling weeds from the pond, using chemicals to eliminate the weeds and algae, aerating the pond, or using a new inversion/aeration system known as Clean Flo.

The residents have scheduled another meeting for this Thursday, Aug. 13, at 7 p.m. in city council chambers at Northville City Hall, to review their options.

"Hopefully . . . we can get all the people who attended last time and a few more, and get a lot of opinions," Anusbigian said.

Legislators eye expanding bills to local officials

A bill banning legislators from taking gifts should be extended to local officials, too, a citizen told a state Senate panel.

"You might as well fight for local officials as well," said Kathy Scruggs of St. Clair Shores. "The potential for wrongdoing is immense."

Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, agreed. "We should expand it (ban on gifts, trips and meals) to all elective officials. They (local officials) have the opportunity to steer contracts," said Bouchard, a former village official.

But the author of a 12-bill ethics package, Sen. Phil Arthurhultz, said not in his bill. "It will have the opposition of the Michigan Municipal League and Michigan Townships Association. I encourage you to introduce a bill to apply to local officials," he told Bouchard.

Thus did four-term Arthurhultz, R-Whitehall, teach freshman Bouchard a lesson in practical politics: If you make a bill too broad, you develop too many enemies, and they gang up to sink it.

Arthurhultz wants a narrowly focused bill to improve its chance of passage. Arthurhultz chairs the Senate Government Operations Committee, which held a public hearing in the Birmingham school board office. Bouchard is a member.

Scruggs liked the bill calling for bigger fines for failure to file campaign expense reports. But she asked for more follow-up work to enforce the law.

Bouchard and Sen. Gil DiNello, D-Clinton Township, also want to expand Arthurhultz's bill prohibiting state elective officers from becoming lobbyists for two years following their departure from office.

"We should expand it to all state employees," said Bouchard.

DiNello said assistant attorneys general may prosecute cases against utility companies one day and then go to work for utilities the next.

Arthurhultz said such a ban would be similar to one being considered whereby a state insurance commissioner would be barred from working for an insurance company for two years after leaving office.

But again he told Bouchard and DiNello: "Draft a companion bill."

Other bills in the package would: bar legislators from sending out state-paid bulk mailings prior to an election; halt receipt of honoraria for speeches; eliminate officeholder expense funds; require reporting of all campaign contributions, even those below \$20; and require reporting of income-producing assets.

The panel gave much of its time to a bill setting up a Legislative Ethics Commission. The bipartisan, bicameral LEC would answer questions and hear complaints about ethical practices.

"The LEC would parallel the Attorney Grievance Commission," said Arthurhultz, calling on Phil Thomas, administrator of the AGC, which investigates complaints against lawyers.

"Confidentiality is extremely important," Thomas said — at least until the LEC is ready to make a formal complaint.

"Confidentiality protects the complainant," said Thomas, citing legal secretaries who have accused their bosses of ripping off clients.

"Confidentiality protects the person complained against who should not be subjected to headline news" until formal charges are filed.

"There is a strong movement to have total opening of the disciplinary process," he said, citing Oregon's and West Virginia's grievance procedures. "I believe total openness is not necessary. There should be a balance."

Arthurhultz said his 12 bills would be revised over the next two weeks for final committee action Aug. 24 in Lansing. He wants them ready for action when the Senate reconvenes for a four-week session Sept. 15 through Oct. 8.

Pine Ridge's consistency is no snow job

"The first time I tasted wine was 1967, at a banquet during the pre-Olympic ski trials in Europe," said Pine Ridge's owner and former U.S. ski team member Gary Andrus. "I didn't know anything about wine because I was raised as a Mormon and being a top-flight skier was more important to me than anything else at that time. I was completely amazed that wine was so commonplace at the European dinner table."

Now you know the genesis of Andrus' love affair with wine. Curiosity elevated quickly to the passionate level, and by harvest time, Andrus was in Europe working as a grape picker for several Bordeaux chateaux including the renowned Ducru-Beaucailou and Lynch-Bages.

Future ski travels took Andrus to Switzerland, the Rhone Valley and Germany, where he was fascinated with the steep hillside vineyards. While his romance with wine was growing, Andrus' affection for skiing prevailed. Armed with an MBA, he opened three ski shops in California and became one of the developers of the Copper Mountain ski area in Colorado. Because of the seasonal nature of the ski industry, he spent the summers of 1975, 1976, and 1977 working in several Bordeaux wine cellars.

"My French winemaking experience taught me that you have to respect traditions," Andrus said. "All the tastings proved to me that to have consistency from vintage to vintage, it's vitally necessary to control the source of grapes. That's the greatest fault in California today. Many wineries do not have consistent grape sources to allow definition of a recognizable winery style."

"I first came to understand French wines; now it's a natural focus for me. However, after my first trip to the Napa Valley in 1969, I became aware of the potential of the region. If it weren't for the Copper Mountain project, I would have purchased some Napa Valley land in 1971. As things evolved, I had to postpone that purchase until 1978."

In addition to the initial purchase of one of the oldest chardonnay vineyards in the Napa Valley, Pine Ridge owns or manages vineyards in the Stags Leap District and the areas of Oak Knoll, Rutherford, and Diamond Mountain.

Andrus believes that the main focus of the California wine industry in the late 1970s and early 1980s was trying to figure out how to make clean, quality wine.

"Now, there's a second revolution," Andrus contends. "It's in the vineyard. Virtually every piece of Napa Valley land is planted. We're not trying to pioneer new areas and we're taking a good look at what the French are doing with chardonnay and cabernet sauvignon and merlot in their vineyards."

Watermelon drinks turn a summer favorite into a real thirst quencher

Quench Time

The right drink beats the heat

For out-of-doors summer dining, a refreshing drink can add the right flavor to the occasion.

A cool drink in a wet glass on a warm evening can yield some of the best feelings known to humankind. It might just quench a thirst that's been building all day long, or it could bring back memories of summers past.

Now, you could stick to the traditional favorites like iced tea and lemonade (the Simple Syrup included in this week's recipes makes a great sweetener for either), or alcoholic drinks like gin and tonics. Or you could widen your repertoire with something special.

At Mr. B's Farm in Novi, dining and socializing on the outdoor deck usually means ordering up some Grand Gold Margaritas, or better yet, an Iguana Margarita, according to manager Vickie Burks.

The Grand Gold Margarita, she says, is a high-end drink, served frozen, using premium tequila. Grand Marnier, an orange-flavored liqueur, gives it a unique twist.

The Iguana Margarita was first developed at Monterey's restaurant, which is owned by the same family as Mr. B's. It uses the same traditional tequila/triple sec/lime juice formula as an ordinary margarita, though with a premium brand of tequila. Then a splash of Midori melon liqueur is added, for a blast of color.

Mix up a batch of refreshment

GRAND GOLD MARGARITA

1 1/2 ounces Salsa Commemorativa tequila
1 ounce Grand Marnier
1 ounce lime juice
splash of soda

Prepare a salt-rimmed margarita glass or 10-ounce cocktail glass. In a blender, pour 1 shot tequila. Pour Grand Marnier and lime juice together, then add splash of soda. Add ice and blend until slushy. Strawberries may also be blended in for variety.

IGUANA MARGARITA

1 1/2 ounces Salsa Commemorativa tequila
1/2 ounce triple sec
1 ounce lime juice
splash of Midori melon liqueur

Prepare a salt-rimmed margarita glass or 10-ounce cocktail glass. Measure tequila, triple sec and lime juice into a shaker, and shake with crushed ice. Pour into

glass and add splash or Midori.

WATERMELON SMOOTHIE

2 cups seeded watermelon chunks
1 cup cracked ice
1/2 cup plain yogurt
1 to 2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
1/4 teaspoon almond extract

Combine all ingredients in blender or food processor; process until smooth.

Yields 2 to 3 servings.
Note: Frozen watermelon desserts do not keep well. They are best eaten the same day they are made.

WATERMELON FROST

3 cups cubed watermelon
1/2 cup orange liqueur (see note)
3 tablespoons lemon juice
2 1/2 tablespoons sugar
additional watermelon cubes for garnish

In blender or food processor, process watermelon, liqueur, le-

mon juice and sugar until smooth. Sugar should completely dissolve. Pour into shallow baking dish, preferably metal, and place in freezer. Stir from time to time until firm. Garnish with cubes of watermelon.

Note: Instead of liqueur, use orange juice and an additional tablespoon of sugar.

NASTURTIUM WINE COOLER

1 1/2 liters (6 cups) dry red wine, preferably of a pronounced flavor
12 nasturtium blossoms, well rinsed

1 cup Simple Syrup (recipe follows)
1 cup water
juice of 1 large orange
1 stick cinnamon
4 bay leaves
1/2 teaspoon cracked black peppercorns

Place 1/2 liter (2 cups) of wine in large glass container. Add nastur-

Alcohol class yields helpful information



Each week when I sit down to write my mind spins with ideas. It is hard to pick and choose. So today I've decided to compose a column that is "all over the place."

Now all these little tidbits that wouldn't fill a page — only together. Last week I wrote about liquor liability. Our battle cry each day has become "check I.D.s." Sometimes it is amusing to those asked. The new adults that are just 21 are proud to show that they are old enough to legally imbibe. Almost boastful. And those that are "30 something" are happy to be mistaken for one much younger.

I had mentioned the class, Training for

Intervention Procedures (TIPS) by Trainers of Alcohol that we took in June. Today it was my delight to receive our "grades." We all passed.

Brought to mind were some of the points stressed. BAC, or blood alcohol content, is a direct measure of the amount of alcohol in your system. Most of the blood's content — 97 percent — is water. The remaining 3 percent includes all other necessary chemicals.

When the BAC level is .05, or one part alcohol to 2,000 parts blood, the person feels relaxed. A 150-pound man will reach this point with two drinks in an hour period. Four drinks in an hour doubles the BAC to .10 and judgment becomes impaired. Coordination begins to lapse.

This number increases proportionally with the drinks. But it is not just the number of drinks. Alcohol is unique in the sense that it can be absorbed into the bloodstream from the mouth, the stomach and the small intestine without being di-

gested first. In just a few minutes much of the alcohol in a drink will be circulating throughout the body.

A straight drink will get into the system much faster than one diluted by water. Soda and carbonated mixers actually speed the absorption of alcohol into the blood.

The size of a person, height and weight, must also be taken into consideration. Women, because they are smaller with more body fat, will reach higher levels quicker. And food in the stomach will slow down the absorption rate.

Mood is also a factor. Stress and exhaustion will affect absorption.

And, finally, medications and booze don't mix.

Along with the above scenario comes yet another view. Americans are becoming overly concerned about drinking. For centuries other cultures have been partaking of libations with little effect, other than that they are more relaxed and suffer less illness related to stress. Now there are

medical people that advocate a daily sip.

I'd agree. Food tastes better with a glass of wine and the occasional cocktail has its place. A good example was last week's beer and food pairing. It was a sell-out. It was fun.

The beers picked were done so with the type of food in mind. The Chimayo with the Caesar was wonderful, and the onion soup made with Duvel Ale rich and tasty.

The biggest hit, however, were the black velvets — half stout and half champagne. A big surprise. Not only were they light, but the Oysters Rockefeller tasted even better.

In all we sampled seven beers with a five-course meal. No one left feeling hungry or thirsty. I enjoyed it much more than a wine tasting. More relaxed and enjoyable.

A final note. Recently, I've been involved with the Tollgate Center in Novi, the big green farm located on Twelve Mile and Meadowbrook. The purpose of the prog-

ram is to provide horses and instruction for handicapped children. Next weekend they are holding their annual polo match at the Millford Polo Club. Several different types of tickets are available, as are food and beverages. This is a good cause! A fund raiser that helps keep the program going.

Consider spending the day with your family in a beautiful setting and helping others at the same time. These kids are great.

I recall a quote, "Those that bring sunshine to the lives of others can't keep it from themselves." They certainly put some sun into my life each week. And believe me, they are radiant.

Culinary team aims for gold

The chef painstakingly arranges baby carrots, caramelized pearl onions and spaghetti squash around slices of cooked pheasant.

Then, with a fine brush, he daubs a glaze of natural juices onto the creation to preserve its glistening appearance.

Welcome to the culinary-arts kitchen at Schoolcraft College in Livonia, where the chefs are practicing for the Culinary Olympics.

In early October, teams of chefs and individuals from 32 nations will converge on Frankfurt, Germany for the competition. The event, called World Culinary Art salon, is held every four years, always in Frankfurt.

"We have been practicing for two years, and we have competed several times," said Mario Etamad of Rochester Hills, captain of Michigan's team. "We're ready to go."

Like their athletic counterparts, Culinary Olympians dream of capturing a coveted medal.

"You have to wow the judges," said Jeff Gabriel, 39, head of Schoolcraft's culinary arts department and a past competitor.

"You have to be a strong, productive chef," said Gabriel of Plymouth, a certified master chef. "Presentation is very important — second to taste."

Michigan's team includes working chefs, culinary-arts instructors and apprentices. Renowned local chefs serve as advisers.

Etamad, 36, is executive chef at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac. As team captain, Etamad assigns tasks

and handles other duties in addition to being a competing chef. He also works closely with team manager Daniel Hugeller, a Schoolcraft culinary arts instructor and certified master chef.

Contestants must prepare platters of festive cold food, appetizers, full-course luncheons and formal dinners. Food is prepared on-site, using ingredients either brought from home or purchased in Germany.

The team will showcase Michigan specialties, such as morel mushrooms, game meats such as pheasant, trout and dried cherries.

Elaborate desserts will be prepared. Pastry chefs will prepare platters of petit-fours and tea biscuits. Team member Joseph Decker, an instructor at Schoolcraft College, is scheduled to create a marzipan confection themed to a boy's eighth birthday celebration.

Dishes prepared at the international event will influence food-preparation trends, Gabriel said.

Spearheading Michigan's contingent is Chef de Cuisine, an association of chefs which supports culinary-arts education.

Team members, selected by try-outs and track record, must be able to work under pressure and come up with winners. All have won previous awards.

During practice, apprentice Joseph Morin glazed a tray of vegetables under Etamad's watchful eye. Morin, a graduate of the Oakland

HONEY-GINGER GRILLED PORK TENDERLOIN

2 pork tenderloin, about ½ pound each
2 Tablespoons fresh ginger, minced
1 green chili pepper (jalapeno), seeded & minced
¼ cup honey
¼ cup soy sauce
3 Tablespoons sesame oil
¼ cup sherry
1 Tablespoon garlic, minced
1 Tablespoon onion powder

Place pork tenderloin in a heavy

plastic bag. Mix all ingredients in a bowl and add to the bag. Seal and refrigerate overnight. Heat grill. "It's bright green," says Burks. "And we were selling these T-shirts to go with it that said, 'Get bit by the Iguana.'"

Burks adds that the new Jack Daniels Country Cocktails have been popular throughout the summer, and the restaurant offers homemade versions of the same.

Further widening the summer drink repertoire can mean dipping into some extraordinary ingre-

dients — nasturtiums, ginger, even carrot juice.

Of the drinks offered here, the yogurt-based Lassi boasts the longest history. Diluted yogurt is an ancient favorite thirst-quencher in the heat and dust of India. It can be served as is with mint and spices (such as cardamom and red pepper), or, as here, with mango.

Nasturtiums are quite edible. They impart an interesting peppery taste and make a fascinating addition to a salad — or, in this case, a wine cooler.

CARROT COOLER

¼ cup grapefruit juice
½ cup carrot juice
¼ teaspoon celery salt
crushed ice
carrot or celery stick for garnish

In the winery, barrel and malolactic fermentation as well as sur lie aging techniques are employed for the production of chardonnay. Only Burgundian French cooperate is used.

"Proper barrel aging enhances the creamy, mouthfilling character of chardonnay and makes the wine rounder at lower alcohol levels," said Andrus. "The taste of yeast is another complexity level in the wine that adds depth of flavors and additional nuances to the bouquet."

Cabernet sauvignon and merlot production of the Pine Ridge is heavily influenced by Bordeaux winemaking traditions. A fan of cabernet

franc, Andrus blends this variety in all his cabernet releases.

Andrus recently announced declassification of all 1988 Cabernet Sauvignon and most of the 1989. He believes that the quality was not there to offer it under the Pine Ridge label.

"I don't want to make massive, tannic, hillside wines. I also don't want to make wines so delicate that there's no interest," Andrus concludes. "I'm looking for balanced elegance and finesse. Wine should have a soft entry in the mouth, but show rich flavor complexities and a lengthy finish like fine Burgundy and Bordeaux wines."

Whip up potatoes for your favorite spud muffin

When I was a child, one of my favorite fairy tales was "Potato, Potato," about a little peasant girl who loved potatoes. She lived with her mother in a humble hut in the forest. One day her mother had to leave her alone and cautioned her that the last remaining potato in the sack was for their evening meal.

The little girl got hungrier and hungrier and reached for the potato, which jumped out of the sack and ran off crying, "Catch me if you can." After many a mishap, of course, she caught the potato and her reward was a sack of potatoes whose supply never dwindled.

I rather think the fascination of the story was my own liking for spuds—a continuing love affair and one I was happy to find had good nutritional basis.

Spuds are a great source of nutrients and fiber. And now, with winter closing in, it's reassuring to know that one medium potato provides 50 percent of the recommended daily allowance of the sunshine vitamin.

It used to be that dieters felt they had to eschew the lowly tuber, but actually potatoes have no more calories than an apple of a corresponding size. The embellishments are the

culprits, calorie-wise. Potatoes can be as plain or fancy as you choose in order to fit into your daily calorie count.

In fact, a baked spud can easily constitute a meal in itself. To garnish baked potatoes, try serving small side dishes of condiments, such as shredded cheddar, crumbled cooked bacon, chopped red onion, pimiento, fresh parsley sprigs, and of course, the ubiquitous but always delicious sour cream and snipped chives.

For best results, choose baking potatoes of a uniform size and shape. To ensure even cooking, try this trick: Arrange several rows of wooden chopsticks on oven floor. Cover with paper towels and set pierced potatoes atop chopsticks. They will raise potatoes off the oven floor, allowing microwaves to more easily reach all sides, and paper towels will absorb any moisture that might cause the bottoms to go soggy.

Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.

Micro-tip of the week: If twice-baked potatoes have been prepared in advance and refrigerated, increase warming time for each potato by half a minute.

TWICE-BAKED POTATOES

4 medium russet potatoes
8 tablespoons butter
8 tablespoons sour cream
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
Snipped chives for garnish (optional)

Yields 4 servings
Preparation time: 10 minutes
Microwave time: 17 to 23 minutes (plus three minutes standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)
Pierce potatoes well with fork and place on floor of microwave. Microwave uncovered for 13 to 19 minutes, or until tender, rearranging and turning potatoes over every 6 minutes. Let stand 3 minutes.

Slice top from each potato. Use a spoon to scoop out pulp. Remove pulp to mixing bowl, leaving shells intact.

Add butter, sour cream, salt and pepper to bowl and mix with electric mixer until smooth. Divide potato mixture evenly among shells. Sprinkle with snipped chives, if desired.

Arrange potatoes in circle on microwave safe serving dish. (Potatoes may be refrigerated at this point, if desired). Microwave 4 minutes, or until heated through, rotating dish ¼ turn after 2 minutes.

CHEESE 'N' CHILL SPUDS FOR TWO

2 medium russet potatoes
4 tablespoons milk
4 tablespoons sour cream
2 teaspoons chopped green chilies
2 tablespoons shredded cheddar

Yields 2 servings
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes
Microwave time: 9 to 13 minutes (plus 5 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)
Pierce potatoes well with fork and place on floor of oven. Microwave, uncovered, for 4½ minutes. Turn potatoes over and microwave 1½ to 4½ minutes more, until they give slightly when squeezed. Wrap in foil and let stand 5 minutes.

Slice tops from potatoes, scoop out pulp with teaspoon into mixing bowl. Leave shells intact. Add milk and mash. Stir in sour cream, green chilies and cheddar. Divide potato mixture between 2 shells.

Place on microwave safe dish (may be refrigerated at this point, if desired). Microwave 3 to 4 minutes, or until heated through.

TWO-CHEESE STUFFED POTATOES

4 medium russet potatoes
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
¼ cup milk
¼ cup shredded Swiss cheese
¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon freshly grated black pepper

Yields 4 servings
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.
Microwave time: 17½ to 24½ minutes (plus 6 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: HIGH (100 percent power)
Pierce potatoes well with fork and place on the floor of the oven. Microwave, uncovered, for 13 to 19 minutes, rearranging and turning over every 6 minutes. Let stand 3 minutes.

Cut potatoes in half; scoop out cooked potato carefully, leaving shells intact. Combine potato with butter in 1½-quart mixing bowl, add milk and mash lightly; potatoes should remain somewhat lumpy. Stir in remaining ingredients. Fill potato shell with potato mixture and place on microwave-safe serving dish. (May be refrigerated at this point) Microwave, uncovered for 4½ to 5½ minutes, or until heated through. Let stand 3 minutes before serving.

Get jammin' by canning at home

"Fess up! How many of us are closet jar savers, hoarding against the day when we're going to make jam, jelly or preserves? Who doesn't have a box of jars tucked under the sink, or boxes of jars in the garage, behind the bikes waiting to be filled with plum conserve or strawberry jam?"

There's no time like the present. Stores and farmer's markets are loaded with Michigan fruits, fresh and juicy. Peaches and plums are ripening as we speak. Sugar is selling for half price at many area supermarkets. This is the Christmas to amaze and delight your friends with gifts of your very own preserves.

"Jam making really isn't a lot of work, and it doesn't take a lot of time," said Jean North of Redford. "I really enjoy the process of preserve-making. It's relaxing, and there's such a great feeling of accomplishment when you have six or eight jars of sparkling strawberry jam or currant jelly."

North also likes that she controls the ingredients when she makes the jam, and knows everything is natural and pure.

Strawberries have no natural pectin so preserves made without added pectin are likely to be thin. "But, if you add pectin, you need a lot more sugar. A thinner jam is versatile," said North. "It can be used over ice cream, as well as on toast or buttermilk scones."

A neighbor gave her some red currants a few years ago, and North made currant jelly out of necessity. "Talking all the little green things off the ends is rather time-consuming. But the good thing is you can save the juice and make the jelly whenever you feel like it. I like to make it in the winter-time. It's such a cozy thing to do then."

For Jan Winship of Novi, making her famous plum conserve and peach marmalade means Christmas in July. She's not even deterred by an imminent move from Novi to Farmington Hills. "Everything's packed

but my jars, my canning kettle, and my wooden spoon," she said.

"Preserving keeps me out of the malls in December. While other people are fighting the crowds and making decisions, I'm putting together festive little ribbon-trimmed baskets of 'Jan's Jams.'"

"If I feel like it, I might add a few homemade cookies. For one friend, I buy a special British 'shelter' magazine and box of salt-free crackers."

Winship always tries to buy Michigan fruit to make jam. "Maybe it's just my imagination, but it seems to have more flavor and juice, possibly because it's closer to home than California fruit."

When it's jam-making time, Winship buys two or three kinds of plums—Italian plums, red plums, and a round charreuse tart Japanese plum. Unlike peaches, plums don't have to be peeled. Just cut them off of the pits into pieces about the size of a nickel.

"An interesting side of recycling jars donated by your friends is that you find out a lot about their eating habits," said Winship. "Turns out I have one friend who devours jars of olives while she watches TV. I never would have known that if she hadn't given me a big box of empty olive jars."

Winship's philosophy of cooking is never read a recipe that begins with the word "mince," but, for her peach marmalade, she'll go through the trouble of peeling peaches.

When you open one of those jars in January, and the fresh peach aroma fills the kitchen, the little bit of effort is all worthwhile.

Christine Venema of the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service recommends using a two-piece lid with standard canning jars to make preserves. Process in a boiling water bath.

The Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service is also offering a correspondence course on home canning. There is a \$15 charge. Call 858-0904 for information.

JEAN NORTH'S BUTTERMILK SCONES

3 cups sifted flour
3 Tablespoons sugar
2 Tablespoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ cup butter
¼ cup currants or raisins
1 cup buttermilk

Mix dry ingredients, add ¼ cup butter and blend in with pastry cutter. Add ¼ cup currants or raisins. (Hint: if you bring raisins or currants to a boil and cool before adding to scones or cookies, they won't get hard).

Add 1 cup buttermilk, mix lightly with fork, and knead gently for about 1 minute. Dough should be crumbly. Roll out ¼-inch thick on a floured surface. Cut into diamond, triangles or rounds. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 15-20 minutes, until tops are golden. Makes 24-36 depending on size.

STRAWBERRY JAM

1 quart strawberries
4 cups sugar
Juice of ¼ lemon

Put stemmed berries in a 10-inch heavy cooking pot (not aluminum). Cut a few of the berries to release a little juice. Add four cups sugar (North uses ¼

cup sugar to 1 cup strawberries).

Stir the mixture very gently with a wooden spoon over low heat until it has "juiced up." When it is bubbling, cook for another 15 to 20 minutes over low heat. Stir occasionally to make sure the mixture isn't sticking to the bottom of the pan. Remove from heat, and sprinkle surface with juice of ¼ lemon. Let set for a few minutes, spoon into jars and seal.

JAN WINSHIP'S PEACH MARMALADE

1 dozen medium peaches, 4 cups sliced
2 or 3 thin-skinned oranges
6 cups sugar
Boiling water
Dash of cinnamon

Pour boiling water over about a dozen medium peaches. Peaches should be a little firm, and not too ripe. (You want to end up with 4 cups of sliced peaches). After a few minutes, the skins will loosen and will slip right off the fruit with the help of a small paring knife.

While the peaches are soaking, quarter two or three thin-skinned oranges and remove the seeds. Grind the oranges, including the rinds, in a food processor. Put the ground oranges and 6 cups of sugar in a very heavy cooking pot (not aluminum), and bring to a boil. Turn the heat down, and simmer for about 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, skin the peaches and slice them. After the orange has cooked for 15 minutes, add the peaches, bring to a boil, and simmer for another 20 minutes.

Remove from the heat. At this point, you may add a tiny amount of ground cinnamon, if you prefer. Spoon into sterilized jars, add paraffin, or seal.

Fun food breaks bored-kid blahs

In the summer, the days are long—sometimes too long for energetic youngsters. A rainy afternoon or a restless rut can be rough going for kids and parents alike.

So plan ahead! One place to begin is your kitchen. Though the kitchen isn't usually thought of as a "play" room, it can provide plenty of opportunity for good times with good friends.

Bake at 375 degrees about 20 minutes or until lightly browned. Cut into eight wedges. Top each wedge with 1 scoop about ¼ cup frozen yogurt. Serve immediately.

CRISPY FRUIT BASKETS

¼ cup margarine
1 package (10 oz., about 40) regular marshmallows or 4 cups miniature marshmallows
6 cups Kellogg's Rice Krispies cereal

2 cups sliced fresh strawberries
Vegetable cooking spray
Colored construction paper
Toothpicks

Orange glaze:
1 cup orange juice
½ cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch

To make glaze, combine orange juice, sugar and cornstarch in small saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Remove from heat. Cool completely. Spoon glaze evenly over each fruit basket. Write names on a flat made with colored construction paper. Attach to a toothpick and insert in each basket. Yield 16 baskets.

CIRCUS MIX

LEMON TURKEY STIR-FRY WITH PASTA

1½ pounds turkey cutlets or slices, cut into ¼-inch strips
1 Tablespoon soy sauce
1 Tablespoon white wine vinegar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1 teaspoon lemon pepper
2 Tablespoons olive oil
6 medium green onions, sliced
1 medium fresh lemon, cut into 10 thin slices and finely sliced
1 clove garlic, finely minced
1 bag (10 ounces) fresh spinach, washed, drained and chopped

1 pound linguine, prepared according to package directions, and drained
parsley for garnish

In self-closing plastic bag combine turkey, soy sauce, vinegar, cornstarch, and lemon pepper; shake bag to coat turkey thoroughly. Refrigerate 30 minutes to allow flavors to blend.

Roc' begins second season on the air — live

Series' outspoken star seeks greater challenge

Broadcast networks can be difficult to characterize. Last year, CBS was No. 3; now it's No. 1. Once proud as a peacock, General Electric-owned NBC looks like a dim bulb since losing a Perot-sized fortune on the Summer Olympics, while scrappy ABC is now the most profitable of the bunch.

And then there's Fox. For the most part an unabashed purveyor of sleaze, the fourth network occasionally distinguishes itself with programming that's good by any standard, and the impulse to wholesale condemnation is frustrated.

Yet it doesn't make much sense to find *Roc* alongside *Vinnie and Bobby*, a comedy entertainment chief Peter Chernin has publicly admitted he was ashamed to air. *Roc*, with a Yale-trained cast plucked from a Tony-winning Broadway play, has more than enough on-camera talent to tell the story of a Baltimore sanitation worker, his working wife, shiftless brother and retired dad.

After just half a season, star Charles Dutton sounded restless. "I wish we were doing *King Lear* every week," he said in January. The adrenalin began flowing again the following month when *Roc* aired live during the first week of the February sweeps. That theatrical turn evidently pleased both network

and viewers, and Fox is credited with the idea of an entire season of live performances beginning Sunday, Aug. 16.

"When I thought about it," Dutton says now, "it thrilled me and juiced me up because it was an opportunity to make television history (that) hasn't been done since 1955."

That's how long it's been since a prime-time drama or comedy series aired live each week. Most Fox viewers, who are commercial television's youngest, weren't even born then, and the rest probably didn't have a TV set. For the next 22 weeks, *Roc* will be performed live at 5:30 in Los Angeles so that it can air at 8:30 in living rooms on the East Coast.

"I think what will happen," Dutton predicts, "is that after two or three weeks, it'll smooth out. It'll be what we do—what this cast does. And it will be the same as if we were working on a stage play."

In fact, a live broadcast has one complication a stage show lacks: the necessity to perform each show in exactly 30 minutes, with time out for commercials. Executive producers Vic Kaplan and Jeff Abugov will cope by clocking rehearsals and having a couple of filler announcements on hand, as well as a short version of the show's closing credits.

Meanwhile audiences will be kept on their toes by the possibility of a flub—or outright disaster—inherent in the live format.

It's a challenge Dutton obviously craves, and when it comes to his feelings about working in traditional television, he doesn't mince words.

"When I say there's no challenge (in taping a series), I mean you can stay there till four in the morning, shooting that stuff. You don't have to learn your lines.

"I'm more than sure that we had one of the sweetest (taping) schedules in Hollywood. We started at 7:30, and we were finished by quarter after nine. In my opinion, 22 minutes of television doesn't deserve any more than that, if you have a conscientious cast, and a profession cast.

"You go through life wanting challenges, and I certainly do, and that just wasn't challenging enough. It wasn't fulfilling enough."

Dutton expects the behind-the-scenes staff to have the most challenging job.

"It's going to be on the production staff and the writers because we can't afford to crank out a script and then say, 'Oh, this script doesn't work, so let's just take a day off to make it—you guys go shopping, and then we'll work on the script.'

"The writing staff will have the hardest task in cranking out, at least, shootable scripts from day one. And from that point on, hopefully, the scripts will get better.

"And I think next year, this time, we'll say, 'Aw, man, live is no problem.'"

Supernebbish: Alexander over the top

Balding and bespectacled, Jason Alexander looks a lot like George Costanza, the insecure nebbish he plays on NBC's *Seinfeld*.

"People come up and go, 'You remind me of me,' and I have such pity for them," he jokes.

"I always thought on the evolutionary scale George was kind of low. But apparently everyone knows one, and I'm delighted."

At the moment, Alexander has plenty to be delighted about. In addition to the soaring popularity of the show, he and his wife, writer/actress Daena Title, have recently become parents.

Alexander was inspired by his teenage idol, *Star Trek*'s Capt. Kirk.

"I know it sounds like a joke. I became an actor because I wanted to be William Shatner commanding the Enterprise.

"Who knew? I thought that was great acting."

But he learned, thanks to a scholarship to Boston University, and his range broadened to include singing and dancing, which led to a 1989 Tony Award for his performance in *Jerome Robbins' Broadway*.

Of *Seinfeld*, Alexander says, "From the moment I saw the script, I thought it would be the most brilliant thing I'd ever be part of, and that it would not run for even a day, because, I thought, 'The audience for this show is me, and I don't watch TV.'"

More fame for Haim; Who was Liberty Valance?

Q: Back in 1986 or 1987, there was a TV movie on NBC titled *A Time to Live*. It starred Liza Minnelli, and her dying son was played by Corey Haim. I am an avid fan of Corey's and wanted to know if it was possible to rent or see this film on cable. Also, if you have an address for him it would be appreciated. —Faith Lee, Erwin, N.C.

A: Actually made in 1985, *A Time to Live* marked Minnelli's TV-movie debut in an emotionally rewarding performance as a mother trying to care for her son (Haim), who is stricken with muscular dystrophy. The movie is available on video, and if you have no luck with local stores, try the Video Library of Philadelphia at 1-800-669-7157. You may write to Haim in care of APA — Los Angeles, 9000 Sunset Blvd., 12th Floor, Los Angeles, Calif., 90069.

Q: In the movie *The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance*, who played the part of Liberty Valance? I believe the same actor was in Donovan's Reef opposite Dorothy Lamour. —Irene Shaw, Adams, Mass.

A: Lee Marvin played the title role of a Western town bully who gets his from forthright young lawyer James Stewart and macho rancher John Wayne. Both Marvin and Wayne starred in *Donovan's Reef* alongside Lamour.

Q: I am very curious to know whether Shannen Doherty, who plays Brenda Walsh on *Beverly Hills, 90210*, was ever on *Little House on the Prairie*. Watching the reruns of that show, I'm almost positive that Shannen was on a few episodes. —Lois Johnson, Red Wing, Minn.

A: At age 11, Doherty indeed appeared on a number of episodes of *Little House on the Prairie: A New Beginning*, which originally ran only a single season from 1982-83. Her first TV job was in two-part episodes of *Father Murphy* alongside Merlin Olson, a longtime sidekick of Michael Landon's on the original *Little House*, which probably had something to do with her brief stint as Jenny Wilder on *A New Beginning*. Many may have gotten their first glimpse of Doherty opposite Christian Slater in the wickedly hilarious 1989 film *Heathers*.

Q: Bobby Darin and Sandra Dee

made a movie together in which her character's mother was French and gave her a book on how to train a dog, which she used in trying to train her husband (Darin). Could you tell me the name of this movie and what happened to Dee? —Pat Hansen, Portland, Ore.

A: The name of the movie is *If a Man Answers*, released in 1962, two years after Darin and Dee were married in real life. The marriage ended in divorce in 1967.

Dee probably was not ready for all the demands placed upon young teen idols; she modeled in grade school and made her film debut before she was 15. Her private life away from films became an unhappy mess, and only recently on the talk-show circuit has she declared she is free of her past insecurities.

Q: I watched the movie *You'll Like My Mother on TV* this weekend and would like to know where it was filmed. Patty Duke was one of the stars, but who else starred with her? —Mrs. Harry Timm, Goodhue, Minn.

A: If you're wondering if this tale of psychological suspense was filmed in your home state of Minnesota, your guess is right, though *Variety's* archives don't specify exactly where. In reading the original 1972 review, I noticed the trade mag had nothing but raves for Duke's performance, as well as for co-star Rosemary Murphy, as Duke's deranged mother-in-law. Sian Barbara Allen and Richard Thomas, in an uncharacteristically evil role as a rapist, also lend fine support.

The two-hour programming block will be given over to a foursome of original Nick series: two established hits and two new ventures.

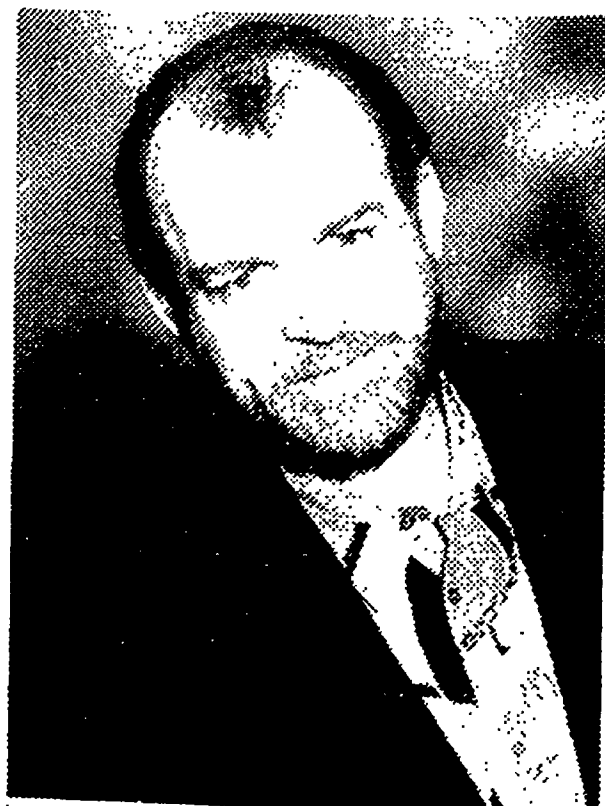
Snick begins with myth-buster *Clarissa Explains It All*, a show about kids that parents like, and, even more unusual, a show about a girl that boys like.
