

Council interviews hopefuls for choice tonight

It's not for the money, that's for sure. Five candidates for an open City Council seat gave varying reasons for wanting to sacrifice their Monday nights

to join the council, but the \$500 annual salary was not one of them.

Planning Commissioner David Totten cited his lifelong interest in government, while fellow Commissioner Mark Cryderman mentioned a political activism that grew out of his participation in homeowners' groups.

Board of Review Chairperson James Cutler said he

would like to give something back to the community that's given him so much, while former council candidate Kevin Hartshorne wants to inject some new ideas into the current council.

For consultant Charles Keys, a council position would be the culmination of his community involvement.

The council interviewed all five candidates for Dewey

Gardner's vacant council seat between Aug. 17 and 27. Summaries of the interviews appear on pages 3-A and 4-A.

Tonight, Aug. 31, the council plans to choose one candidate to take over the term that expires November 8, 1993. The meeting starts at 8 p.m. at Northville City Hall, 215 W. Main.

2000 group issues some conclusions

A long-awaited report on the present and future of Northville Township was served up by members of a residents' committee last week.

Some of the table fare offered by Northville 2000 delegates represented tasty morsels of promise and hope.

Much of the report focused on meat-and-potatoes township issues, while still other comments were as predictable as day-old bread.

All in all, most of the Township Board and assembled audience viewed Northville 2000's preliminary report as a satisfying first-course look at the township in the 21st Century.

Organized last January, Northville 2000 attempted to tap skills of assorted individuals from the township. Most of the two dozen or so delegates were selected from homeowners association boards, with a goal of increasing members' knowledge of township issues.

From a heightened knowledge base — which included presentations by various township staff and officials — delegates were to develop a document that possibly could blueprint township responses to key issues throughout the remainder of the decade and beyond.

The preliminary report offered last Wednesday isolated such issues as public safety, human services, recreation and leisure, construction, and finance. Committee members gleaned information from township reports, department heads, and other statistics from both inside and outside Township Hall.

The Public Safety Committee looked at the township's police, fire, and emergency medical services programs, and basically gave a thumbs-up sign to those programs. At first glance, that report seemed a department head's dream, but further examination revealed that the committee hinted at potentially radical changes in township public safety departments.

For example, the committee's report recommended the township take a close look at developing shared services programs for the police and fire departments and perhaps start-

ing its own EMS program.

Overall, public safety report presenter John Preston said "we're damn lucky" to have the current departments.

The story differed slightly for Human Services reporter Zo Chisnell, who praised Northville Youth Assistance, the community library, and senior citizens programs, but spoke gloomily about funding levels for those shared services programs.

Those programs, Chisnell said, are "at the mercy of township and city fluctuating budgets."

The Human Services group also touched upon the need to protect the township's environmental balance through ordinances and increased monitoring of those laws.

James Petrie, of the Recreation and Leisure Committee, urged the township to continue along the course set by the Northville Parks and Recreation Department's five-year plan, and Carl Sipple, of the Construction Committee, said "proactivity" was the key word for the township's future development picture.

Sipple's report noted that up to 35 percent of the land in Northville Township is publicly owned. That figure represents a double-edged sword, as the township suffers from limited control and a lack of tax base.

The construction committee also said the township should "vigorously pursue" industrially zoned development in the southwest portion of the township and obtain public-owned property for township and recreation use.

Finance Committee Chairperson Don Mueller said the township "is in

Band returns to festival

The Northville High School Jazz Band will once again be share the spotlight with national artists at the 13th annual Miller Lite Montreux Detroit Jazz Festival on September 3-7.

This is the second consecutive year Northville's band has been invited to participate in the festival, which offers more than 100 free open-air concerts on three of Detroit's Hart Plaza stages. Last year the band took top home the highest rating of any high school bands at the festival.

The festival, which attracts national and local talent, features

group ensembles and soloists. It also offers jazz academy clinics and late-night jam sessions.

Northville's 20-member band will perform Monday, Sept. 7 on the Pylon Stage from 2:45 until 3:45 p.m.

Northville Band Director Mike Rumbell said the jazz band has been practicing daily for the event, at which they will perform a series of standard jazz tunes including "Blues in the Fast Lane" and "How High the Moon."

Several of the band's members will perform feature solos at the festival, including sax players Ed Palares, Steve Vanduzen, Chris Davellillo and Tony Sievert.

Rumbell said the band has

worked hard to earn the recognition it has from the festival.

"We've had a lot of honors, and we've earned a lot of honors, he said. "There's been a long tradition of outstanding jazz bands at Northville and this band continues that tradition."

Cindy Nuttal, president of the Music Boosters Club, said the festival has gained a reputation for attracting only the best high school bands around.

"Only the best bands are asked to play here," she said. "So it truly is an honor. Only the creme de la creme of the (high school) bands are even asked to play. So it is a big deal

Signup differs at NHS

While high school students were busy passing the lazy days of summer away, Northville High School administrators were busy chipping away at course sections and limiting the number of options this year's high schoolers will have to choose from.

High School Principal Thomas Johnson said students registering for courses for the 1992-93 school year this week will find fewer alternatives on their class schedules than in previous years.

Seniors can register today from 9-11 a.m. in the high school gym. Schedule change requests will be considered from 1-3 p.m. Juniors will register Tuesday from 8-11 a.m. with schedule changes from 1-3 p.m.; sophomores on Wednesday from 8-11 a.m. with their changes, along with freshman registration, from 1-3 p.m.

As a result of the failed millage increase and teacher layoffs this year's high schoolers can expect to find larger classes, fewer course sections, and very few schedule adjustments made for them this year, he said.

Johnson said administrators have cut 7.3 teachers from this year. That equates to about 73 sections cut from the high school curriculum over the course of a year.

In spite of all the cuts made to duplicate sections of specific subjects or classes, school officials said they were fortunate enough to not have dropped any course electives from the curriculum because of the district's finances. If a class was dropped, school officials said it was because there wasn't enough student interest in taking the course or because the number of students that registered for it didn't match with the minimum required to keep it.

"We didn't cut any classes; just sections of courses where we had more than one section," Johnson said. "If a course was eliminated, it was only because that teacher was laid off. But in most cases, another teacher picked up the class."

For example, Bo Hall, a journalism teacher at the high school was one of nine teachers who were laid off. In that instance school officials saved the course by having another English teacher pick it up for the new school year.

While that's the good news, the bad news is that in spite of the district being able to salvage the course, they weren't able to do the same for the Mustanger, the high school newspaper. It will not be published this year, Johnson said.

In response to concerns from parents expressed earlier this year, the district did not cut any of the honors program course offerings, but did cut some sections to accommodate the

Township gets look at budget

The first screening of Northville Township's 1993 budget is coming tonight (Aug. 31) to a township hall near you.

And while it may not offer much in the way of pacing, editing, and cinematography, the proposed \$4-million budget promises its share of drama.

Will the Police Department get a \$150,000 communications system might fly in the face of potential city/township joint dispatching services?

Will the township recommend sweeping departmental cuts in anti-

cipation of a lingering recession, decreased state-obligated revenues, and a budget shortfall of nearly \$200,000?

And will a lame-duck board extend the bulk of its decision-making powers to its successors?

Tonight's Act 1 mainly will focus on a rough-draft budget offered by the township's department heads. Some might call it a compilation of wish lists, but some requested items — including a Fire Department hoped-for ladder truck — apparently were nixed before the preliminary budget was down on paper.

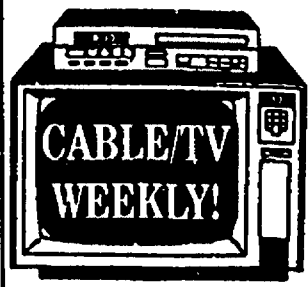

cap on student-teacher ratios, Johnson said.

In years past, students found average class sizes of 26 students. This year class size has jumped to an average of 30—and in some cases 31-33—students per class.

"We didn't cut the honors (math) program," Johnson said. "But we have cut sections of those classes. What we have done is taken the students beyond the caps on those classes and moved them into regular curriculum courses."

Johnson said the school used a student's grade in his or her last math class to determine which students would remain in honors classes and which would be moved into regular curriculum sections of the same courses. That system, he said, helped to alleviate the six- or seven-student surplus above the number of students allowed in the sections.

"We kept the core curriculum of classes throughout the program, but we cut sections. We were trying to preserve the integrity of the overall curriculum."

Johnson said in addition to limited class sections, students will see fewer schedule changes made this year.

"Kids will find fewer schedule changes. That's no longer a reality. We will be making some schedule changes in specific cases, but not like it was last year."

"Before, we could be more lenient for students who wanted a specific teacher, but those days are gone."

Johnson said students will be informed that relatively few schedule changes will be made this year. Only in isolated cases where a student needs a course to graduate or if he or she passed or failed a summer school course will changes be granted, he said.

"Before, it's been pretty much wholesale, but we just don't have that latitude to move kids around like we did before," he said.

City Council applicant interviews

Cryderman brings sales skills

Planning Commissioner Mark Cryderman believes his years as a salesman hearing customers' concerns make him a strong city council candidate.

"I believe that the strongest ability that you have to have (as a salesman) is to listen," said Cryderman, 46, during his Aug. 26 question-and-answer session. "You have to be able to listen to people, and I think I'm pretty good at that. In fact, I think that's my strongest suit."

Cryderman's sales positions with high-tech automotive industries frequently require him to act as an "arbitrator" between business and client, he said.

"I'm in the middle, and the idea is to make everybody happy in the end."

Cryderman is no stranger to the political process either, having served on several boards and com-

missions during his years in Northville. The political activism began six years ago when he and his neighbors complained to the council about a zoning issue, he said. "I stormed down here with all the other residents until (former Mayor) Paul Vernon got tired of me and stuck me on a committee," he said.

That assignment on the library site plan committee led to others on the Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Commission, where Cryderman has served since 1990. His Planning Commission stint, working with eight other commissioners with "strongly held and widely differing viewpoints," has been a real eye-opener, he said.

"I've learned an awful lot, about how the city works, about how people approach the city and about being consistent . . . It's hard to do, but I think it's important."

Cryderman said his job as an

elected or appointed official is to find the most rational solution to a problem. "I always try to take a rational approach, and a rational approach to me is to get the most facts I can," he said.

As long as people understand the issues involved, they should agree with that solution, Cryderman said. "If people don't understand, that's another job."

Cryderman shied away from supporting city acquisition of the Ford Valve Plant, but supported city involvement in its reuse. "I personally don't see how the city could buy that piece of property and own it," he said. "The city is not good at being a real estate developer." But he was intrigued by the idea of a community center at the site, including the one envisioned by the recent Ford Plant Study Committee, provided that the property remained privately owned and on the city's tax rolls.

When asked what he thought of

the actions taken by the city council recently, Cryderman said, "I understand, and I think a lot of people understand, the direction we're going. I agree with the deficit reduction plan . . . I think that under some very adverse circumstances, the council's come up with a good plan."

Innovation is another key to good government, Cryderman said. "You can never be too innovative; there's always an idea out there that somebody hasn't come up with yet."

To generate those ideas, Cryderman suggested setting up "citizen committees" to gather feedback from the city's residents. "We've got some good marketing minds in this city, some great marketing minds, and some great innovators."

Cryderman, who was born and raised in Michigan, holds a marketing degree from Michigan State and a master's in business administration from the University of Michigan.

Cutler wants to keep giving

For Board of Review Chairperson Jim Cutler, serving on the city council would be a way for him to contribute to his community.

"I'm just interested in the city that's made me a living and in giving something back to it," he told the council during an Aug. 26 interview. "I'd like to help this city grow and prosper."

Cutler, 71, a Realtor in Northville since 1960, is semi-retired since suffering a heart attack last August. He said the cutback in his working hours will allow him to devote more

time to city government. Cutler already has devoted 20 years to the city as a Board of Review member, and about 15 as a planning commissioner.

Not that the plain-spoken Realtor criticized the current council. "I do think you're doing the job you can to the best of your abilities," he said.

Cutler also saluted the performance of City Manager Gary Word, who was faced with empty city coffers and a sharp cut in racetrack revenue when he took the job.

"I think Gary's doing the best he can with what he's inherited," Cutler said. "I'm not being nasty; I'm just being truthful. I would hate to have in-

herited what he did."

To keep the city headed in the right direction, Cutler suggested polling the city's merchants and business people for their recommendations.

"I think you have to talk to the business people and say, 'What do you want? And what are you willing to give up to get it?'"

Parking is a problem in the city, Cutler said, even if it's just a problem of perception in the minds of the customers.

"At the mall, they walk a half-mile, but they don't want to walk 10 feet in the City of Northville," he said. "They want a carriage to pick them up and drop them off at the front door."

Of the proposed three-level Cady

Street parking deck, Cutler said, "I think it's a necessary item, but I don't think we can afford it now."

Cutler agreed with the need for increased shared services "by all means," he said. "But I don't think we're going to be able to convince the township, ever. There are too many people who don't want to consolidate with the city."

Part of his success on the Board of Review has stemmed from his ability to deal calmly with often-irate residents, Cutler said.

"Even though they come in with fire in their eye, it's a real pleasure to sit down and talk with them," he said. "I've made a lot of good friends on the Board of Review, believe it or not."

Hartshorne shows persistence

Two-time City Council candidate Kevin Hartshorne, 38, asserts that his idealism, tempered by the pragmatism of other council members, would make a good addition to the city council.

"I have radical ideas," he admitted freely. "I think I have different ideas . . . in regard to many of the things that are going on right now. I wouldn't say they were adversarial, but I think they're worth discussion."

Among those ideas is the thought that downtown Northville does not need a proposed Cady Street parking deck, Hartshorne said.

"I think it's putting the cart before the horse," he said. He worried that

not enough thought has been given to the increased vehicular traffic that such a deck may encourage.

"I think downtown is viable right now," he added. "I think it's doing very well. I don't think it needs any impetus."

Hartshorne saw better parking management as the key to the city's perceived parking problem. Restoring parking meters to on-street spaces might help scare off employees, he said, and leave the spaces available for customers who don't mind paying a quarter or so to shop.

Rather than a new deck, Hartshorne said he would rather see the city's resources directed toward acquisition of the Ford Valve Plant, perhaps for a community library and post office. If he's appointed to the

council, Hartshorne would make that his top priority, he said.

When asked whether he agreed with the council's present direction, Hartshorne hedged. "I think I failed this question when I ran for a commission seat," he said.

But after being assured there was no right answer, he suggested that correction of the city's 40-percent water loss rate should be a high priority. "You would think water mains would be one thing that should be taken care of by tax revenues," he said.

"I think the council's priorities are good; I'm just not sure they're in the right order."

Hartshorne also hoped that sitting on the council would give him greater

insight into how its decisions are made.

"The problem I have is that I don't get to see all the issues behind the issues," he said. "I think I would have greater access to information if I was a councilperson."

Hartshorne also argued that he had earned appointment to the vacant council seat when he ran for council in 1989.

"I ran for this very seat that is being vacated three years ago, and I got 730 votes," he said. "It would be hard for me to understand how you could turn your backs on 730 votes from this community."

Whether or not he is appointed, Hartshorne said, "I can assure you that I will be a candidate in '93."

Multi-tiered response system helps save lives

The dispatcher picked up the 911 line, and the frantic caller on the other end pleaded for help. "My father's had a heart attack," she cried. "I don't think he's breathing."

The dispatcher got as much information as possible from the caller, and immediately alerted the three agencies that make up our community's multi-tiered response to medical emergencies. Police officers already on patrol quickly headed for the scene, while the fire department's emergency medical technicians met at the fire station to pick up their rescue equipment. At the same time, an advanced life support ambulance staffed by paramedics started toward Northville.

In medical emergencies, particularly life-threatening emergencies, time is crucial. As a result, the goal of any emergency medical system is to manage the available resources in such a way as to ensure that patient treatment

is started as soon as possible. Because the hospital emergency room may be many minutes away, modern emergency medical response brings much of the emergency room to the patient.

In many communities such as our own there is usually a direct relationship between response time and level of training. Bystanders, police officers or others with first aid training are often at the scene within a matter of seconds. Fire Department personnel, trained as emergency medical technicians qualified to render what is called "basic life support," can usually arrive in a few minutes. Paramedics, trained in "advanced life support" techniques, ordinarily are coming from farther away and take a few additional minutes to reach the scene. Working together as part of a multi-tiered response, each agency plays an important role in managing the emergency, and in ensuring that the patient receives the best care available in the shortest period of time.

In the State of Michigan, as in most parts of the country, emergency medical personnel beyond those with

basic first aid training are licensed according to the level of training they have received. Those with advanced first aid training are licensed as "medical first responders" capable of initiating treatment for trauma patients or those suffering from medical ailments of various types.

Emergency medical technicians are more extensively trained in basic life support procedures and the use of various medical devices. An emergency medical technician specialist receives additional training in some of the most essential elements of advanced life support, including airway management and IV therapy. Paramedics undergo extensive training in advanced life support procedures, including cardiac monitoring and IV drug administration.

Two police officers responding on the heart attack call found a neighbor performing CPR. Confirming that the patient was indeed without pulse or respiration, the officers took over. A little more than four minutes after the call the fire department's emergency medical technicians arrive, established an artificial airway and began ventilat-

ing the patient with 100 percent oxygen. Meanwhile, the patient was hooked up to the Fire Department's semi-automatic cardiac defibrillator and a series of cardiac shocks were administered.

The paramedics arrived just as the third shock succeeded in restoring a normal heart rhythm. Two IV lines were established and drugs administered to assist the patient's heart, and an endotracheal tube was inserted to assist with breathing. The patient was quickly loaded into the ambulance while emergency responders continued to administer oxygen. One of the first firefighters continued to work on the patient in the back.

The patient still had a long road ahead, but the multi-tiered response system had done its job. Early, effective CPR, followed by rapid defibrillation and the timely administration of medications by the paramedics, had given this patient a fighting chance.

Keys stresses importance of civic involvement

Business consultant Charles Keys cited his years of community involvement, and his ability to work with people and understand their concerns, as effective training for the city council.

Keys, a former Detroit police officer and head of the local Quindunc Corp., said his work with community groups through that position marked the start of his civic involvement. "I like working on a team, and I like

helping people," Keys said. "My whole career has really been community-involved, and I've been successful, fortunately, with just about everything I've tried."

As a council member, Keys said one of his goals would be to foster increased civic participation.

"I would just like to increase people's participation in the process, and open up the mystery and mystique of city government," he said.

To increase community involvement in the City of Northville, Keys suggested the use of "focus groups"

made up of appointed officials and community leaders.

"It's better than wasting money on a survey," he said. "You have these people. Use them. . . . You'd get some real good input."

Keys was enthusiastic about the council's current course. "If all of you were up for re-election tomorrow, I think you'd all be re-elected," he said. "I think the council has done a real good job with the pressures the city has had."

"If I had any criticisms of the council, it would be in terms of communi-

cating with the business community and the homeowners."

Keys went on to praise the entire municipal operation, mentioning how helpful DPW Supervisor Ted Mapes was when he asked about replacing the Rotary Club's rusting signs around the city.

Mapes offered to drive Keys around to inspect the signs, and work with him to choose replacements, Keys recalled.

"This is the way city government should be — user-friendly," he said. Though it might not match the

majority opinion, Keys said, he opposes city acquisition of the Ford Valve Plant. "I would be against the city touching that project," he said. "I think the city needs the tax base."

Keys also feared that moving city and township municipal offices to a larger facility could lead to a larger staff. Besides, he said, "I don't think the township will ever go in with the city on that development."

Though he originally opposed a new parking deck, Keys said that proposed retail/office buildings like CadyCentre and the Long project on

Main Street will create the need for new parking.

But for now, "I still think it's largely a problem of perception," he said. "I talk to the businessmen and I don't hear, then complain."

A newly implemented employee parking plan has also helped free up prime parking spaces, he said.

When asked whether he had any political ambitions beyond the council, Keys said, "I don't really consider this a political thing. To me, this is community involvement. . . . I am a local, community person and that's where my interest is."

Totten offers teaching, government experience

In a wide-ranging Aug. 17 question-and-answer session before the City Council, Planning Commissioner David Totten said winning the vacant council seat would continue his lifelong interest in government.

"I've always been interested in government, ever since the election of 1932 when my father started yelling things about some candidate or other," said Totten, 68. "In those days government was an exciting thing, with the New Deal and so forth, and politicians weren't thought of as crooks and thieves."

After three years in the Army, stationed in Europe during World War II, Totten worked as an employment counselor and math teacher. In 1953, he earned a master's degree from Wayne University (now Wayne State University) in government. He retired from his 34-year teaching career in 1990.

Locally, Totten became involved in the Cabbagetown neighborhood association shortly after its inception, and helped form Concerned Residents of Northville. He praised those local examples of civic involvement.

"If an organization complains, they do get heard a little better than an individual, he said. "You can bring

people around and channel their feelings or channel their anger or fears, and I think that's good."

Totten listed the fate of Northville's downtown as one of the city's primary concerns, particularly with competition from shopping centers like Meijer and Twelve Oaks Mall. It's important to "keep the downtown full of stores, and stores other than boutiques," he said.

With the city's parking problems, he added, "If people get too much of a feeling that it's hard to get out of your car in Northville, then they just might go to Novi."

The Ford Plant's fate is another item of interest to Totten, who sat in

on a study committee reviewing potential reuses. "I think that is such a beautiful setting that it would be a very nice centerpiece for the city," he said.

With a new slate of township trustees heading for office, Totten predicted that the two municipalities may be more likely to cooperate on some reuse of the plant, to increase shared services and save both municipalities some money.

"Poverty makes strange bedfellows, and both Northvilles are poor now," he said.

For governmental positions like the city council, Totten listed patience and the ability to compromise as

important qualifications. "I think everybody needs to be Henry Kissinger, Kissinger had his faults, but he certainly could get an agreement," he said.

Totten would be available to his constituents as well, he said, and act as a middleman between residents and department heads to answer the residents' concerns or complaints. "I think if you're a city official, you do have an obligation to be user-friendly," he said.

Totten noted that the current council has faced several challenges recently. "This has not been the easiest year or two to be a council member. . . . and I commend you on the

way you've been able to keep relatively civil relations," he said.

In particular, he praised the council's handling of last year's million-dollar deficit with a series of cutbacks and a 4.2-mill tax increase.

"I think that was a pretty courageous thing," Totten said.

When asked about any particularly positive or negative experiences with city government, Totten said, "I was disappointed when (Deputy Clerk) Tonni Burns was let go."

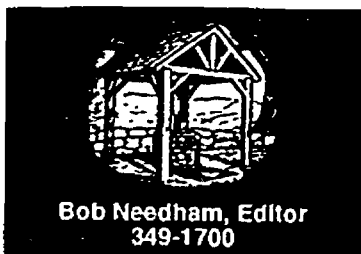
But overall, he saw the changes at city hall as necessary. "It's tough. . . . but in general, I think you've managed to do that without hurting service."

WTUA should delay choice of law firm

What's sauce for the goose is sauce for the joint venture of three geese.

A few weeks ago in this space, we offered the opinion that it didn't make much sense for the outgoing Northville Township Board to settle on a final choice for a new township legal firm. The process to replace the former Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk began long before the recent primary election, which brought about a clean sweep of the current board members from their seats.

After controversies which involved Law, Hemming, Northville Township decided to review its legal representation and seek proposals from other law firms. The renamed Silks, Hemming, Law, Essad, Polaczyk & Gillary did not submit a proposal for continuing service.

With the prospect of seven brand-new board members entering office just over two months from now, it's really not appropriate for the outgoing board to select a new law firm. When the timing falls like this, it's only logical that the new board make the decision on who it will use for legal work. Although it's a little awkward to slow a process already well under way, the outgoing board members do indeed seem poised to let the final decision on a new law firm rest with their successors.

Meanwhile, the Western Townships Utilities Authority is going through essentially the same process as Northville Township, and in very similar circumstances. Law, Hemming, served the sewer authority as well as all three of its member townships, Northville, Plymouth and Canton. The review of legal services came about in a similar manner, and Silks, Hemming again did not submit a proposal for continuing service.

And similar to the Northville Township Board, the WTUA board faces a somewhat similar upheaval in membership. The authority board consists of the supervisors of its three member townships. In addition to Northville, Plymouth Township will also get a new supervisor come November. That means — although Canton Township Supervisor Thomas Yack, current WTUA chair,



will stay on the board — the WTUA group will see two-thirds of its membership turn over.

While the continuity provided by Yack's situation makes some difference, the fact remains that the majority of the WTUA board will change in a couple of months. And that's good reason to put the authority's selection of a new law firm on hold until then.

It makes sense for WTUA the same way it makes sense for Northville Township. If the incoming officials are to have confidence in their legal representation, they should be the ones making the selection.

The key difference between the situation of the two public bodies is that while the township shows signs of waiting, the sewer authority forges ahead. The WTUA board interviewed law-firm candidates in a marathon session last week, and gave every indication that it plans to make a selection with the current membership intact.

That's just silly. The incoming WTUA board members may well have different concerns and different priorities for legal services than the outgoing ones. Voters in Northville Township have already selected a new supervisor; in Plymouth the race will be settled in November, although either way that township will also send someone new to the WTUA board.

The voters elect their representatives specifically to make decisions like this. When we know that two of three current representatives are on their way out, it makes no sense to choose new attorneys now.

WTUA board talks to law-firm applicants

Western Townships Utilities Authority officials are scheduled to announce the hiring of a legal representative Sept. 3.

WTUA, the organization formed in 1986 to develop a sewer system for Northville, Plymouth, and Canton townships, reportedly will choose from among seven firms interviewed last week.

One of the law firms apparently would replace Sills, Hemming, Law, Essad, Polaczky & Gillary, the outfit that devised the WTUA concept but fell under increasing criticism this year for its web of financial involvement in the project.

WTUA Chairperson Thomas Yack last week said the authority was looking to clean its legal slate.

"I believe we need to move forward with the process we began several months ago," Yack said.

But the Sept. 3 decision will be rendered by a three-person WTUA board which consists of two lame-duck members, Plymouth Township Supervisor Gerald Law and North-



ville Township Supervisor Betty Lennox.

Yack defended the position of having the current board decide on a new law firm — as opposed to waiting until November, when two new commissioners will assume seats. He said WTUA could terminate a contract with a new firm if the new members had problems with the hire.

Yack added, though, that the two new board members would have to gain the third vote — his — to make a change.

Northville Township Supervisor-elect Karen Baja attended the inter-

views, as did Kathleen Keen-McCarthy, winner of the Plymouth Township Republican primary, and Ron Edwards, an independent who will face Keen-McCarthy in the November general election.

Baja, Keen-McCarthy, and Edwards have been invited to offer their comments on the firms prior to Thursday's scheduled hiring.

Representatives of the seven firms discussed background, philosophy, areas of expertise, and rates with the commission. Most of the firms' hourly charges fell in the \$100-150 range. Some of the firms specialized in developer representation, while others boasted considerable experience with municipalities and work with similar project authorities.

WTUA commissioners quizzed the firms on their experience working with the state Department of Natural Resources, and understanding of combined sewer overflow problems that face much of Wayne County.

The commissioners did not state when a new firm would take over WTUA's legal chores. Yack said Sills, Hemming has not been informed of any pending termination.

the midst of a crossroads financially. Most residents believe they are being overtaxed, but the township's 3.8-mill levy represents a small fraction of total tax bills in the township, he said.

The township should investigate

ways to raise additional revenue and shore up some areas, the committee agreed, and emphasized the need to aggressively approach shared services with Northville city, especially in police and fire services.

Most of the board appeared accepting of the group's study and

agreed to view the report as the "living document" Northville 2000 originally insisted upon. The group's next chores will include developing a final document, exploring the possibility of a community-wide survey, and discuss an ongoing long-range planning group.

This evening's state-mandated preliminary budget adoption is a preview of more cutting times to come. After reviewing the document, the board will hand the paperwork to a budget review committee.

The 1993 budget committee will operate differently from past years, said Township Manager Richard

Henningsen. The committee — Henningsen, Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan, Treasurer Jack Hosmer, Supervisor-elect Karen Baja, and Treasurer-elect Rick Engelland — does not contain any residents without government affiliations.

attempt a feeding frenzy of departmental reviews on a single day — Sept. 29 — with roll-up-the-sleeves committee meetings to follow.

Possibilities with peaches get out of hand

Peaches were first grown in China several thousands of years ago and were regarded as a symbol of immortality.

There is even a story about a French woman in the 19th century who was gravely ill and refusing all food. But her life was saved by a dish of peaches in syrup and cream that restored her appetite and will to live.

This is all hard to believe, since the first peaches were small, very sour and had a very fuzzy exterior. They were brought to the Americas by Spanish explorers in the 16th century.

Peaches may not be magic, but the numerous modern varieties are certainly larger, sweeter and less fuzzy.

There is nothing like a ripe peach eaten out of hand for breakfast or as a snack. Sliced peaches can be added to salads, sugared for shortcake or soaked in white wine or champagne for an easy summer dessert.

They can be baked in a cobbler, or pureed for sherbet or ice cream. Grilled peaches served with grilled chicken adds an interesting twist to a picnic. To grill, coat all sides of the peaches with lemon juice and grill until brown (six to eight minutes).

There are two categories of peaches, freestone or clingstone. This refers to how the flesh adheres to the pit. Clingstones are not generally sold in markets, they are used for commercial canning.

Michigan peaches are freestone or a semi-freestone. Popular varieties available at the local farmer markets are Redhaven, Cresthaven, Glohaven, and Red Kist. These are all versatile and can be used for baking, canning or eaten fresh.

One pound of peaches is about three medium or two cups sliced. If you are interested in preserving them, a lug weighs 22 pounds, makes 16-24 pints frozen or 7-11 quarts canned. A bushel of peaches is 48 pounds and will yield 32-48 pints frozen or 16-24 quarts canned.

While eating peaches out of hand, they need no peeling, however, most peaches are peeled for use in cooked dishes. If the peaches do not peel easily, dip them in boiling water for about 30-seconds, then plunge into ice water and the skins will slip right off.

To prevent browning, coat exposed surfaces with lemon juice or ascorbic acid or vitamin C tablets. Use one teaspoon pure powdered ascorbic acid to one gallon water. If you prefer, use 3,000 milligrams of vitamin C tablets crushed and dissolved in a gallon of water. The procedure is easy: Slip the skins, dip into one of these solutions, drain them and continue to use.

Canning or freezing peaches is very simple. Slip the skins, cut into halves or slices, dip into the anti-browning solution, put into jars or freezer containers.

Peaches can be canned or frozen in a syrup (sugar) pack, a water pack, a juice pack or a sugar-free pack. If you're concerned about sugar, do them the sugar-free way. To get the best results for a sugar-free product, put the cut peaches in a saucepan, add water and heat slowly on the burner. Don't cook them; just heat to activate the natural peach sugar.

Doing them this way you won't have a watery taste to the end product, just a light peachy flavor. For exact canning times, call the Cooperative Extension Service, Food Hotline, 858-0904.

Peaches are a source of Vitamin A and potassium and have virtually no sodium. They are fat free, and if you eat the peel, that's extra fiber. A medium size peach has about 50 calories.

Visit your local farmer's markets and enjoy fresh Michigan peaches. Bite into a fresh juicy Michigan peach. Let the juice dribble down your hand and chin — enjoy this sweet treat that's good for you.

Pick a peach for pleasure

"The Peaches are gorgeous this year," said Sharon Ashton of Ashton Orchards in Ortonville. "But the flavor is down a little. On a scale of 1 to 10, I'd say they're an eight or a nine."

If you like to can peaches, expect to spend a little more time preparing them this year. Because of the cool weather the pits are sticking, Ashton recommends canning quarters as opposed to halves.

Not all the farmers are feeling peachy keen. A May frost, hail storm and cool summer hurt the peach crop in some parts of the state. Some of the farmers I talked to bought peaches from other farmers to sell at their markets.

Ashton has peaches for sale at Ashton Orchards, 3925 Seymour Lake Road, Ortonville, (313) 627-6671. Juicy Red Haven peaches are available locally at Foreman's Orchards, 50050 Seven Mile Road in Northville.

Foreman's just recently opened under new ownership. After about 60 years of operating their farm market, the Foreman family turned it over to Jack Pereira and his clan.

Pereira, a longtime friend of the Foremans, often supplied them with pumpkins and other produce over the years. He and the family will sell whatever is in season, including bushels of Red Haven peaches. Call 349-1256.

More Red Havens are available at The Strawberry Patch, one mile east of Millford between Burns & Duck Lake roads, 2375 Wixom Trail, (313) 685-1393; and at Blake's Orchard & Cider Mill, 17985 Armada Center Road, three miles north and four miles east of Romeo, (313) 784-5343.

We found a couple of u-pick farms nearby for people who prefer to pick their own fruit. Blake's Big Apple Orchard, N. Ave at 33 Mile Road, call (313) 784-9710; Brookwood Fruit Farm, north of Romeo on M-53, six miles, right on Bordman, 1/4 mile to apple storage building, (313) 798-8312, and Sylvan Orchard, one mile north of I-94 between Kalmbach Road, (exit 156) and Pierce Road (exit 157), on Cavanaugh Lake Road, (313) 475-1943.

Never buy soft peaches, said Ashton. Look for peaches that are yellow with a red of golden blush background color.

Avoid any that are extra hard or greenish, said Lois Thieleke extension home economist for the Cooperative Extension Service, Oakland County office.

"Picked green peaches will just get soft and wither. Peaches don't become any sweeter after they are picked, but ripening makes mature fruit softer and juicier," said Thieleke.

To ripen peaches, Ashton recommends putting them in a paper bag or open air basket. Close the bag and check it every day. Peaches will ripen evenly in a paper bag.

"Peaches are fragile," said Ashton. "After they're ripe, refrigerate them. They'll last about a week. Buy them as you use them."

1 cup peaches, fresh diced 1/4-inch cubes
1/2 cup red onion diced 1/4-inch
1 teaspoon jalapeno pepper diced 1/4-inch
1-2 Tablespoons cilantro minced
1 teaspoon granulated sugar

Combine ingredients and chill for 24 hours.

PEACH COBBLER

4 cups peeled and sliced ripe peaches
1/2 cup plus 3 Tablespoons granulated sugar
1 teaspoon grated lemon zest
1 Tablespoon fresh lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 1/4 cups unbleached all-purpose flour
1 Tablespoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup vegetable shortening
1 egg, lightly beaten
1/2 cup milk
1 cup heavy cream, chilled
3 to 4 Tablespoons peach brandy or cordial

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter a 2-quart baking dish. Arrange peaches in baking dish. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar, the lemon zest and juice, and almond extract. Bake for 20 minutes.

While peaches are baking, sift flour, 1 tablespoon of the remaining sugar, the baking powder and salt together into a bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles cornmeal. Combine the beaten egg and milk and mix into dry ingredients until just combined.

Remove peaches from oven and quickly drop dough by large spoonfuls over surface. Sprinkle with remaining 2 tablespoons sugar. Return to the oven for 15 to 20 minutes, until top is firm and golden brown.

Whip cream to soft peaks. Flavor with peach brandy to taste. Serve cobbler warm, accompanied by whipped cream.

PEACH COBBLER WITH FRESH GINGERROOT

Filling:
6 medium ripe peaches, peeled, pitted, and cut into thick slices (about 4 cups)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar, or to taste
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1/2 cup boiling water
1 1/2-inch piece of fresh gingerroot, peeled and finely minced (2-teaspoons)
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 tablespoon cold butter, cut into small pieces

Dough
1 cup flour
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 cup salt
1 1/2 teaspoon softened butter, cut into small pieces

1/2 cup milk

Yields 6 servings

Preheat oven to 400 degrees and butter round 9x3-inch oven-proof baking dish, preferably earthenware. Put peaches in large bowl, sprinkle lemon juice over them, toss and set aside.

In small saucepan, mix sugar and cornstarch. Add boiling water and ginger. Cook for 1 minute, stirring constantly. Pour over peaches and combine. Transfer to prepared baking dish.

Sprinkle with cinnamon and dot with butter, then set aside prepared dough.

In medium-sized bowl, mix together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder. Add butter and stir with wooden spoon, pressing butter into flour. Add milk all at once, and stir only until dough forms. Do not overmix. Drop generous tablespoons of soft dough on top of peaches.

Bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until top is slightly golden. Serve warm, topped with vanilla-flavored whipped cream or a scoop of vanilla ice cream, if desired.

HOME CANNING TIP: Here's a tip for canning tomatoes from Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service. The acidity level of varieties of tomatoes may be too low to assure a safe canned product. Therefore the USDA recommends adding 2 tablespoons bottled lemon juice or one-half teaspoon citric acid to each quart of crushed, whole, halved or juiced tomatoes. Add directly to jars before filling them with tomatoes.

For pints use one tablespoon bottled lemon juice or one-quarter teaspoon citric acid.

Do not forget to process all tomatoes according to the latest USDA recommendations. The Ball Blue Book 32nd has the latest recommendations and can be purchased at stores carrying canning supplies.

The following recipes were created with fresh California peaches by the California Tree Fruit Agreement to be quickly prepared desserts. They say the recipes take less than 20 minutes to prepare. (Time doesn't include prep work, such as homemade preparation of pie crust.) Number of ingredients also is limited.

PEACH PIE WITH TOFFEE TOPPING

1 (8-ounce) package light cream cheese, softened
 1/2 cup powdered sugar
 1/2 cup light sour cream
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons English toffee candies
 3 fresh peaches, thinly sliced
 1 graham cracker crust (6-ounces)

Yields 6 servings
 Beat cream cheese, sugar and sour cream until smooth. Stir in vanilla extract and 1/2 cup toffee. Place half the peach slices in pie crust. Spread cream cheese mixture over fruit. Arrange remaining peaches over cream cheese and sprinkle with 2 tablespoons toffee.
 Serve with extra toffee on the side if desired.

PERSIAN PEACHES

1 (8-ounce) carton fruit-flavored, low-fat yogurt (Strawberry, raspberry or boysenberry)
 5 fresh peaches, cut into bite-size pieces
 1/2 cup orange juice
 1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh ginger
 2 tablespoons honey

Yields 4 servings
 In bottom of 4 stemmed glasses, spoon 3 tablespoons yogurt. Divide peaches among glasses. Combine juice, ginger and honey. Pour over peaches. Top with spoonful of yogurt.

PEACH CREAM BAVARIAN

6 fresh peaches, coarsely chopped (reserve 3 beautiful slices for garnish)
 1 egg white
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/4 teaspoon orange zest
 1 cup light sour cream, lightly beaten

Yields 8 servings
 In mixing bowl at high speed, beat 2 cups peaches, egg white, sugar and zest until peaks form, about 5 minutes. Fold in sour cream, set aside.
 Spread about 1/2 of remaining peaches into bottom of 1 1/2 quart serving dish. Top with 1/2 of mix-

ture. Spoon remaining peaches on top. Mound remaining mixture in center. Garnish with reserved peach slices. Chill.

CHOCOLATE-AMARETTO TOPPED PEACH SUPRISE

1 package (10-ounce) frozen pastry shells
 8 ounce light cream cheese
 1/2 cup sliced almonds, toasted, divided use
 4 fresh peaches, halved
 1/2 cup prepared chocolate fudge sauce
 2 tablespoons Amaretto liqueur, or to taste
 Mint for garnish (optional)

Yields 4 servings
 Remove 4 pastry shells from freezer. Let thaw slightly. If necessary, on lightly floured board, roll out further to make a larger opening to accommodate fruit. Bake according to package directions. Top may be discarded.

Form about 2 tablespoons cream cheese into ball slightly larger than peach pit. Roll cheese balls into 1/2 cup almonds and press between peach halves.

In small saucepan, combine fudge sauce and Amaretto. Warm over low heat, stirring occasionally.

To serve, place peaches in cooled pastry shells, ladle chocolate sauce over peach and top with remaining almonds. Garnish with mint, if desired. If desired, pastry can be baked ahead of time.

 2 teaspoons Italian seasoning
 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
 2 medium onions, cut into eighths
 2 yellow, red or green bell peppers cut into chunks
 2 large zucchini or yellow squash cut into thick slices

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Lightly spray cookie sheet with no stick cooking spray. Wash and scrub potatoes. Cut lengthwise into eighths. Dip potatoes into combined egg white and water then into combined remaining ingredients. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until potatoes are done. While potatoes are baking, combine first six ingredients for meatballs; mix well.

Shape into 1 1/4 to 2-inch balls. On four skewers, arrange meatballs, onions, peppers and zucchini alternately. Grill over medium hot coals or

broil 4 to 5 inches from heat source, five to eight minutes per side or until desired doneness.

Serve two kabobs with potatoes, covering and refrigerating remaining kabobs for second meal. Two servings plus extras for second meal.

For second meal: Remove meatballs and vegetables from skewers. In skillet, combine meatballs and vegetables with prepared spaghetti sauce; heat through. Serve over hot cooked pasta.

MDA Telethon to Entertain, Educate

TUCSON, Ariz., July 24, 1992—For the 27th year, American TV viewers will be treated to an annual Labor Day labor of love—the MDA Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon. Beginning at approximately 9 p.m. EDT Sunday, Sept. 6, and continuing for 21½ hours, the live broadcast will feature its traditional blend of stellar entertainment and information about neuromuscular diseases and MDA's battle to defeat them.

Starring show business legend and renowned humanitarian Jerry Lewis, the Telethon's entertainment lineup will offer some of the brightest stars of film, stage, nightclubs, television, music and sports, as well as some surprises. The show will originate from the Sahara Hotel in Las Vegas, with satellite feeds from other locations across the country.

The Telethon will also feature profiles of adults and children who are served by the Muscular Dystrophy Association's programs, and will update viewers on scientific advances achieved by MDA's worldwide research program during the last year.

More than 80 million viewers annually watch the Telethon, which is carried by more than 200 "Love Network" stations across the United States and Canada. In addition to enjoying great entertainment, viewers phone in pledges of support for MDA's programs of research and services to benefit more than a million Americans with 40 neuromuscular diseases. Last year's Telethon garnered a record \$45.1 million in pledges and contributions.

Lewis is considered the most effective fund-raiser in history for his more than four decades of volunteer leadership of MDA. He's best known for hosting the Telethon each Labor Day, but works for the Association year-round.

World-renowned as an actor, comedian, director, writer, producer and headline entertainer on stage, screen and television, Lewis has starred in nearly 50 films, including "The Nutty Professor," "The Bell Boy," "The Errand Boy" and "The King of Comedy." He wrote and directed many of his comedies. His television acting credits include the dramatic series, "Wiseguy," and the movie, "Fight for Life."

Box office gross receipts of Lewis' films total about \$800 million, making him one of the most successful performers in show business history. The Disney Channel this year broadcast a series of programs based on the "Colgate Comedy Hour," the TV show in which Lewis and Dean Martin starred in the early 1950s.

The only entertainer ever to be nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, Lewis has also received the Jefferson Award from the American Institute for Public Service; the Legion of Honor and Commander in the Order of Arts and Letters, France's two highest awards; the U.S. Department of Defense Medal for Distinguished Public Service; and numerous other humanitarian awards.

The first MDA Labor Day Telethon was broadcast by one TV station in New York in 1966. Lewis was joined by stars including the Muppets, Joe Namath and Sammy

Davis Jr., who would become a Telethon stalwart. Ed McMahon, still Jerry's Telethon co-host, made his first appearance in 1968.

The Telethon was aired coast to coast for the first time in 1970. Noted performers in the next decade ranged from John Lennon to Mickey Mouse. In 1976, Frank Sinatra surprised Jerry by bringing Dean Martin on stage for a touching live reunion of the former partners.

Show business's biggest names continued to grace the Telethon in the 1980s. In 1986, comedian Billy Crystal's moving monologue about a friend who used a wheelchair brought in the greatest telephone response in the show's history. Ringo Starr brought his All-Star Band, featuring classic rock stars, to the Telethon in 1989.

Leeza Gibbons became a co-host in 1990 for the 25th anniversary show, which Jerry dedicated to the memory of Davis.

On a night when anyone old enough to have a driver's license is elsewhere, Nickelodeon offers Snick, or Saturday Nickelodeon, two hours of prime-time programming for kids. The second of Snick's four distinctly different series is *Roundhouse*, a bare-bones variety show that makes up for a small budget with big energy.

Call it *Sonny and Cher* with oversampling, *Donny and Marie* sans disco, but a more appropriate label might be *In Living Color* for pre-teens. *Roundhouse* producer Buddy Sheffield, a former *Color* writer, doesn't discount that comparison.

"I created a lot of the sketches that some of you probably hate," Sheffield recently said of his old job at a press gathering, "and ... a lot of kids watch (*In Living Color*). If they're going to watch that kind of show, we might as well give them one that has the right kind of values and is planned for them and not pick them up by accident."

True to at least one trait of its Fox ancestor, *Roundhouse* is peopled by an extremely talented ensemble cast that delivers both deft humor and dance moves with synchronous timing and acrobatic vigor. Wedged between established Nick faves *Clarissa Explains It All* and *The Ren & Stimpy Show*, *Roundhouse* makes a solid case for a new Saturday night fever.

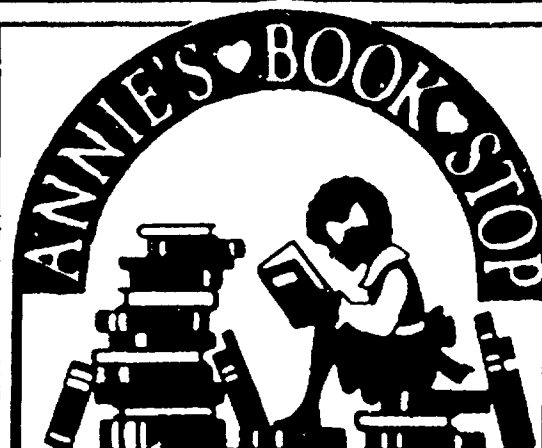

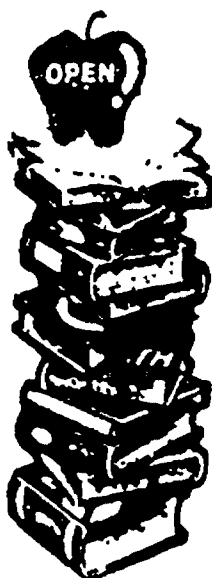

T-birds drummer Texan by any standard

"I've lived here longer than I have anywhere else," says drummer Fran Christina of the Fabulous Thunderbirds, "so I feel like a Texan." The lanky, Rhode Island native laughs and adds, "But I know Texans won't go for that."

Christina needn't worry, for he's earned his Lone Star credentials with the propulsive beat he provides for the state's best known rhythm and blues band. He's been a T-bird since the mid-'70s, with time out for a stint with Western swing curators Asleep at the Wheel.

A baseball star since his Little League try-out (he hit it out of the park), Christina had his eye on playing in the major leagues but loved drumming just as much. "I was bangin' on oil cans when I was 10," he recalls, "and got my first drum set when I was 12." Eventually, music won out and Christina says he has no regrets.

Christina and the rest of the Thunderbirds will be featured in an episode of TNN's *The Texas Connection* airing Saturday, Sept. 5. The drummer reports the band was allowed to assemble the show, and the rousing, music-filled hour features songs by Texas blues greats Delbert McClinton, W.C. Clark and original band member Lou Ann Barton ("a Thunderbirdie," Christina laughs). The band is also currently touring the nation in a blues revue featuring Buddy Guy and B.B. King.

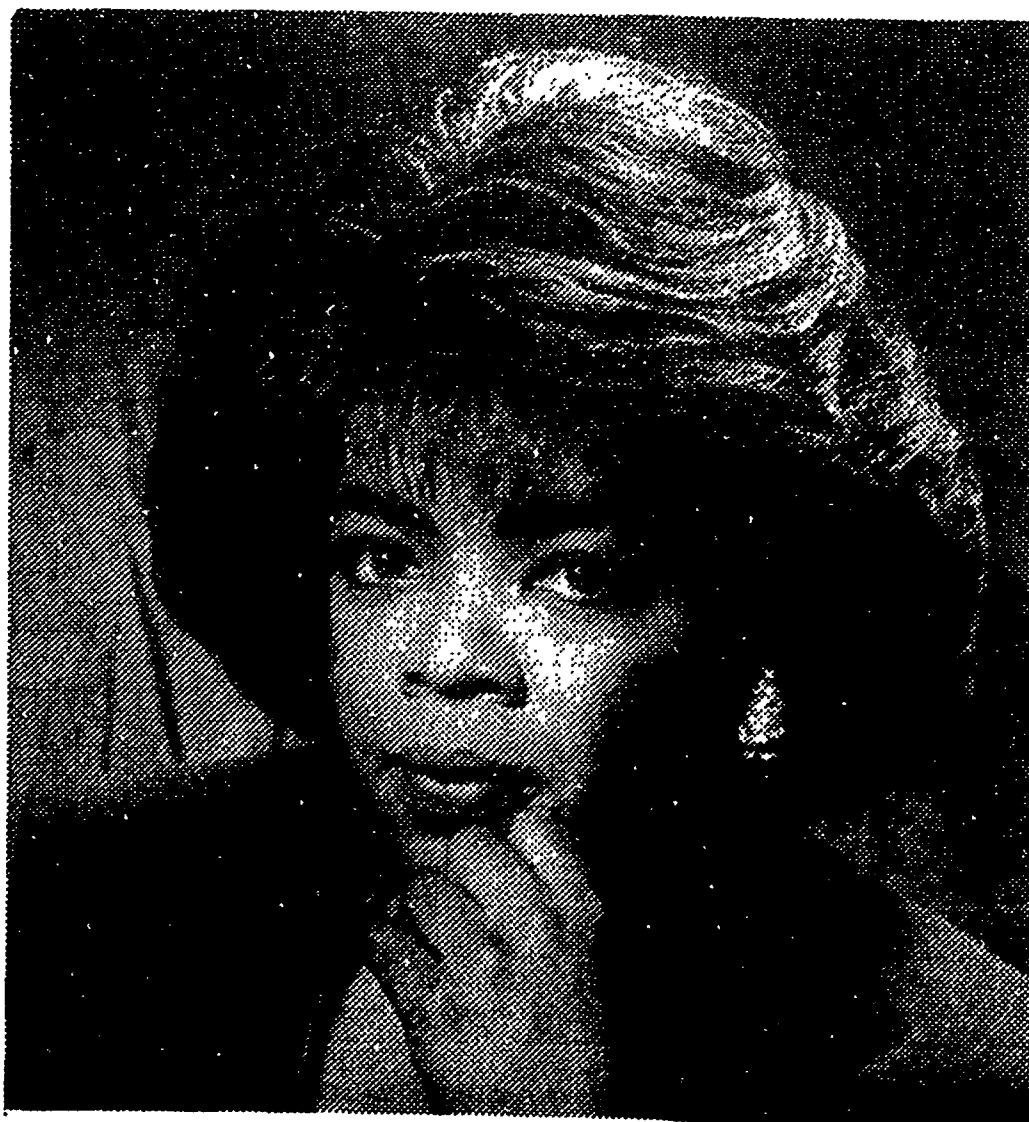

A: The name of that 1955 gem is *Summertime*. The film was loosely adapted from the stage play *The Time of the Cuckoo*. Hepburn is perfectly cast as an independent yet lonely woman who flirts with true happiness for the first time in the form of a married Italian man. The picture was wonderfully directed on location by David Lean (*Lawrence of Arabia*, *Great Expectations*). Incidentally, the film's "controversial" theme narrowly escaped the iron fist of the then powerful Legion of Decency in the United States. Most video stores with a good selection should have it.

Q: Please settle a bet I've had with my husband for some time. He thinks that Elizabeth McGovern (She's Having a Baby) and Elizabeth Perkins (He Said, She Said) are the same person, but I am positive they are not. (He thinks she changed her name!) —Tracy W., Portland, Ore.

A: It's been said that love conquers all, Tracy, and I hope your devotion to your husband will allow you to forgive him for believing the two Elizabeths are the same person — they aren't. For further comparison, check out McGovern in *Ordinary People*, *Ragtime*, *The Bedroom Window* and *Racing With the Moon*. Other films with Perkins include *About Last Night*, *From the Hip*, *Sweet Hearts Dance* and *Big*.

Q: Since returning from a trip to the British Isles, I've been looking for a video of the movie *How Green Was My Valley*. I have a vague memory of seeing this movie about life in Wales, probably in the '40s. Can you tell me if this is available on video? —Lois Scott, Fredonia, Kan.

A: Released in 1941 in slightly differing British and American ver-

sions, this masterful drama concerning the plight of a large Welsh coal-mining family was directed by John Ford and starred Walter Pidgeon, Donald Crisp and Maureen O'Hara. Told through the eyes of the youngest son (Roddy McDowell), the film won five Academy Awards for Best Picture, Director, Supporting Actor (Crisp), Cinematography and Art Director. It is available, but only on laser disc, according to *Leonard Maltin's Movie and Video Guide 1992*, and may only be for sale in some stores.

Q: What happened to the show ALF? I know it was cut, but they left ALF surrounded by the Alien Task Force and "To Be Continued," and that was the last I saw of the show. Did I miss something? —J.D. Stolk, Gresham, Ore.

A: If you saw "Consider Me Gone," the last original episode of ALF to air, you've probably seen the last one. The one-time top-10 program continued only in reruns and syndication. ALF debuted on Sept. 22, 1986, and was a surprise hit for NBC. The cat-eating alien life-form inspired a successful line of merchandise and a Saturday-morning cartoon version of his adventures. The series was canceled in 1990.

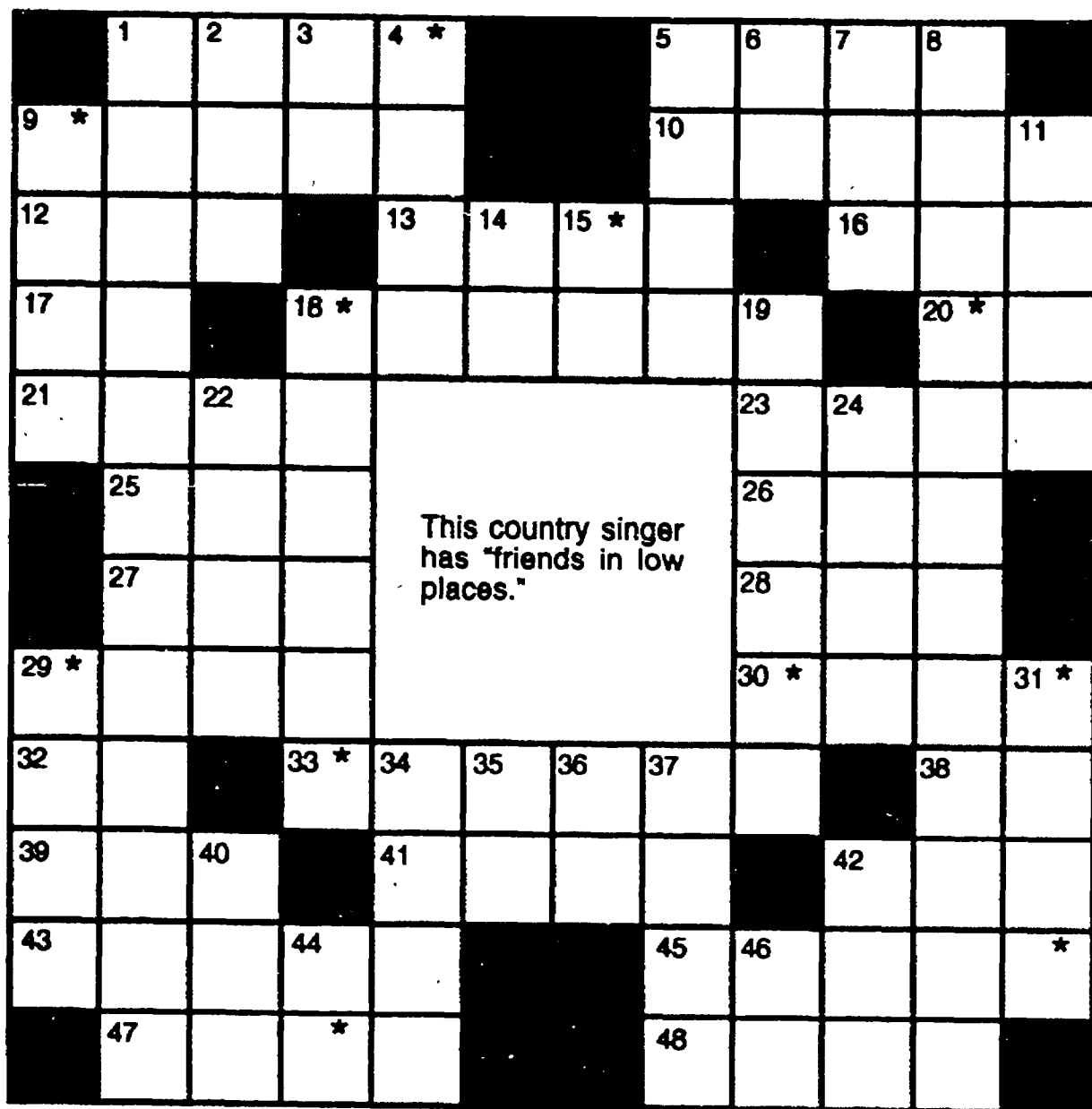

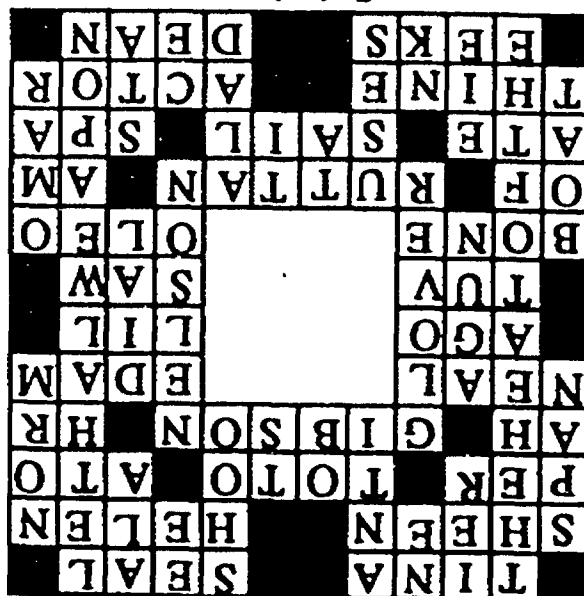

Crime doesn't pay ... as well as show business. On a recent edition of BET's *Live from L.A.*, Keenan Ivory Wayans, executive producer and star of *In Living Color*, commented on his brother Damon's new film, *Mo' Money*. "It's sort of an autobiographical sketch of Damon. There was a period when Damon thought he was the smartest guy in the world, and that got him into a little trouble (with the law). After HBO Pictures acquired the production rights, Joel Schumacher, who directs the trashy *2000 Malibu Road* for CBS, was to direct, but he, too, backed out. Now Roger Spottiswoode (*Under Fire*, *Shoot to Kill*) has accepted the assignment, working under executive producers Aaron Spelling and E. Duke Vincent (*Melrose Place*).

The muppets take Orlando? Jim Henson Productions and The Disney Channel have struck a major distribution deal, it was announced recently. The agreement provides for Henson's live-action series *Fraggle Rock* to air on Disney; the animated version was already airing on the channel. The Disney Channel will also begin airing the popular Henson films *The Muppet Movie*, *The Great Muppet Caper* and *The Dark Crystal* and will extend the channel's window for the Emmy-winning series *Jim Henson's Mother Goose Stories*.

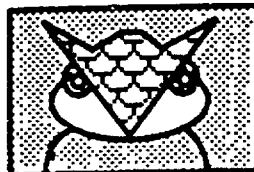

NBC flies away with '92 Emmy nods

Kirstie, Dennis, Tim and no Gilbert

NBC got 100. CBS received 70, and ABC followed close behind with 63. The next closest recipients, ahead of networks like HBO and PBS, were producers Joshua Brand and John Falsey with a whopping 30.

What they got were nominations for this year's Emmy Awards. The trophies presented by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences will be handed out on Sunday, Aug. 30. For the sixth year, the Fox network will carry the star-studded special, scheduled to run about three hours ... but don't bet on it.

"I'm your long-form awards show director," laughs Walter Miller, recalling his experiences producing big awards programs, including this year's Tonys and a memorable Emmy telecast that ran 4 hours, 15 minutes. Executive producer Miller admits there's really no way to insure the show will stay on course because of variables like acceptance speeches and unscripted banter between presenters. He also declares "there isn't any protection" from unexpected (and unwanted) incidents like that of last year, when comedian Gilbert Gottfried took advantage of the live broadcast to launch into a vulgar comedy routine. In minutes, the switchboards at Fox affiliates lit up like Christmas trees.

Miller says the key is to keep the show moving and keep it funny, a job primarily in the hands of the program's three hosts: Dennis Miller, Kirstie Alley and Tim Allen. The trio will appear in rotation throughout the show, with Miller kicking off the evening with a monologue that's sure to touch on the presidential race and the recent demise of his syndicated talk show. Alley will anchor a segment saluting television's "Women of Comedy," and Allen will likely contribute some of his trademark male-oriented humor.

Other highlights of the show will include appearances by Jerry Seinfeld and Richard Lewis (sure to bemoan the cancellation of his *Anything But Love*), a final fanfare for several long-running series that came to a close this season

and the presentation of the Governors Award to cable mogul Ted Turner. Longtime Turner-watchers will surely expect the controversial entrepreneur's acceptance speech to contain some of his well-known, irreverent wit.

Falsey and Brand netted their nominations with just two shows: NBC's critically acclaimed period drama, *I'll Fly Away* and the quirky *Northern Exposure*, one of CBS' brightest success stories in the last few years. Both shows are up for Outstanding Drama series, as well as trophies in the writing and directing divisions. Leads Sam Waterston and Rob Morrow will compete for a prize in the acting category.

Several veteran performers compete in this year's Emmys. Kirk Douglas' guest performance in an episode of HBO's *Tales From the Crypt* is nominated in the Lead Actor in a Drama series category, and Edward Asner, winner of seven Emmys (a record) is going for his eighth trophy with a nod for his supporting role in CBS' defunct *The Trials of Rosie O'Neill*. Marion Ross, twice nominated for her work in the long-running *Happy Days*, will compete for the Outstanding Lead Actress in a Comedy Series award for her work in CBS' critical favorite *Brooklyn Bridge*. Among her competitors is *The Golden Girls'* Betty White, an 11-time nominee facing her third win. 4 TV Listing Inc

of "the worst winter in years." As the story is told in Cedar Springs, a New York feature writer bemoaned the lack of warm under-garments to cope with the cold: "Here we are in the middle of an old-fashioned winter and there are no red flannels in the USA to go with it."

The local newspaper, *The Cedar Springs Clipper*, owned and edited by "Clipper Girls" Nina Babcock and Grace Hamilton, reacted angrily to the affront: "Just because Sak's Fifth Avenue does not carry red flannels, it does not follow that no one in the country does. Cedar Springs' merchants have red flannels!"

Uncle John's Cider Mill (517-224-3686) north of town is rightfully famous for its cider and serves it up with a great big helping of down home activities: wagon rides on Sept. 5; antique car show Sept. 6; square dancing Sept. 12; old tractor show Sept. 13; arts and crafts show Sept. 19-20; pony rides Sept. 26-27; Rambling Rose cloggers Oct. 3-4; kids spook house Oct. 17-18 and 24-25. Uncle John's huge orchard is open for strolling or hop on board for a tractor-drawn wagon tour...

...down a road a piece closer to St. Johns is Beck's Market (517-224-2351), where fresh apples, squash and pumpkins are spread out in a kaleidoscope of brilliant fall hues. Fresh Polish sausage and Swedish potato sausage is made on-premises, along with bologna, smoked hams and bacon. Beck's Market buys directly from mid-Michigan farmers to guarantee the freshest supply of produce...

...south of St. Johns, Andy T's farm market (517-224-7674) is over-run with pumpkins, ranging in size from decorative miniatures to 500-pound behemoths, with plenty of mid-size jack-o-lantern and pie varieties thrown in for good measure. Market owner Andy Todosciuk holds the state record for the heaviest pumpkin so you know there's something special in store...

...of the hundreds of cider mills in Michigan, this one may be the most unusual. Hitchpoint Cider Mill (616-264-8371) in Williamsburg (northeast of Traverse City) is literally horse powered. On weekends, Norwegian fjord draft horses can be seen powering the machinery that presses apples into cider. Hitchpoint also hosts a Norwegian Pumpkin Rolling Festival Oct. 3-4...

...the pies at Crane Orchard and Cider Mill (616-561-2297) are probably better than grandma made. Crane's orchard, restaurant and bed and breakfast is set in gently rolling terrain west of Fennville on M-89.

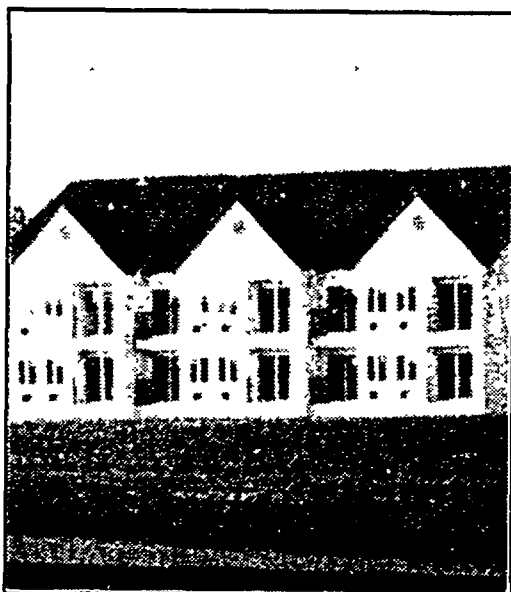
Several greens are large, tiered and undulating, adding to the challenge.

'Michigan Masters' adds to golf lore

Add another ornament to Northern Michigan's reputation as a vacation/sports destination.

The inaugural Boyne tournament of Champions was a resounding success on all fronts. A tournament bringing together the state's greatest golfing names for prize money totalling \$100,000 turned out to be substantially more than just bogeys, birdies and even a spectacularly-timed hole-in-one.

It turned out to be the ultimate vacation for golfers and spectators alike, which isn't at all contrary to what Steve Kircher had in mind.

Kircher is the son of Boyne USA

founder Everett Kircher and a budding young executive in his own right. Steve and Ken Devine, executive director of the Michigan PGA, couldn't have scripted a better finish when they dreamed up the most novel championship of the Summer of '92.

Kircher's notion was to build a social/family/vacation event featuring all the things Northern Michigan has to offer as a supplement to a top golf tournament. The Boyne Mountain resort, site of the popular Alpine and Monument courses, is located in the little village of Boyne Falls.

"My goal for the tournament was not only to have a tournament but to

have something the golfers and their families and even their friends could start planning for and around each year," Kircher said.

By all accounts, the Boyne Tournament of Champions was a huge success.

The golf was unmatched for drama. Dan Olsen, a 25-year-old native of Okemos, Michigan put together an unlikely 3-1-3 finish on the difficult Monument course -- that's birdie-ace-birdie -- to earn the \$25,000 winner's check and the Walter Burkemo Trophy.

Down the stretch, he outduelled Bob Proben, teaching pro at Indianwood Country Club in Lake Orion, and Gary Domagalski, a reinstated amateur who is a golf company rep from Okemos.

The peripheral activities were fun for all.

The pros competed in a hotly-contested nine-hole par 3 tournament on Boyne Mountain's executive course.

Dave Van Loozen of Edgewood Country Club won \$1,000 with Steve Brady and George Bowman splitting another \$500 in prize money put up by Roy Gaddey of Sportsmark in Bloomfield Hills.


The par 3 tournament proved to be so much fun it was opened to amateur contestants and will be open to all again next year.

Services sponsored the contest.

And, there was target practice...with golf clubs and balls. The bullseye was an inner tube anchored some 100 yards out on Deer Lake.

"All those were a barrel of fun," Kircher said. "The ones who participated had a great time. It knitted everyone together, made it a really good experience."

"At least, that's what people are telling me."

The tournament was played on Boyne Mountain's two courses -- the Alpine and the Monument.

Next year's tournament - also a five-day event - is tentatively scheduled for July 24-28. July 24 and 25 are the pro-am dates, with the tournament running July 25-28.

Kircher said the tournament might be altered to an

Alpine-Monument-Alpine schedule. This year, two rounds were played on the Monument, only one at the Alpine, which again proved to be very popular among the contestants.

The format for the BTC is unique. The invitation-only event brought together the all-time champions of the Michigan Open and PGA and the Michigan Amateur, plus champions of the last 10 years in assorted other state events - including women's and juniors competition. So it matched men and women, pros and amateurs, juniors and seniors. Each grouping played from a different set of tee markers to equalize the factors of age and gender.

All the best players in Michigan, regardless of age and gender, teed it up with the professionals. As a group, Michigan's club pros are recognized as the best of any section in the country.

"We don't know how much we owe these seniors who made Michigan such a great section," said Brady, two-time Michigan Open winner.

"Plus all those great amateur names on the scoreboard."

The senior group included Alex Redmond, Larry Mancour, Tommy Deaton, John Molenda, Nick Berklich, Ray Bolo, Sam Kocsis, Bob Gajda and Ben Lula among the pros, and five-time state amateur champion Glenn Johnson, Fred Behymer, Tommy Watrous, Lloyd Syron and Jim Briegel among the amateurs.

Proben, a native of Redford and one-time touring pro, was preparing to deliver an acceptance speech when the tournament took a sudden, unexpected twist.

With three holes to play, Proben led Domagalski by two strokes and Olsen by four.

What happened next was amazing. Olsen birdied the 350-yard 16th hole at the Monument with a six-foot putt. It hardly seemed momentous.

Then lightning struck in earnest on the next hole, the 186-yard par 3.

Olsen's 6-iron tee shot covered the flagstick, hit behind it and spun straight back into the hole for an ace.

Olsen finished it off with a birdie on the last hole, with its famous island green, for a 54-hole total of 213.

"I looked at the leaderboard and (saw) the names of guys I idolized when I was a kid," he said, mentioning the likes of professional Buddy Whitten and veteran senior amateur

Watrous of Oakland Hills.

"This is a great tournament," he said.

Domagalski added, "They could almost call this the Michigan Masters - it was first class all the way. It takes a while to develop a tradition but for a first-time try, this was an absolute blast."

Adding to the festivities, teaching pro Jim Flick, a Boyne regular, and touring pro Ed Humenik conducted a series of clinics and the Masters touch to which Domagalski alluded was further enhanced when Olsen slipped on a green jacket.

Olsen's finish grabbed the attention of golf fans all over the state, a fitting conclusion to a new event destined to become a fixture on the Northern Michigan landscape.

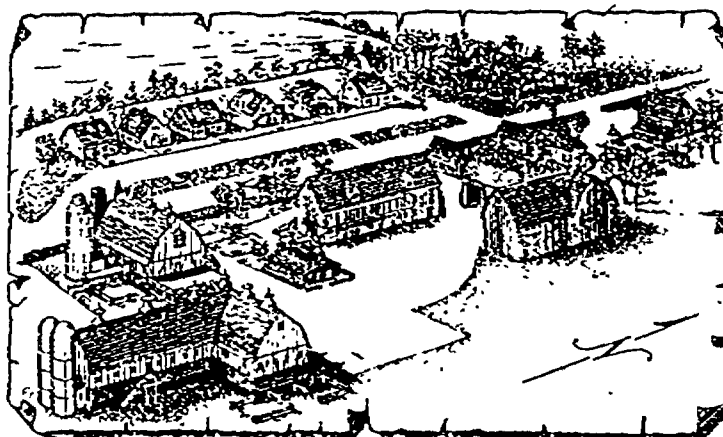

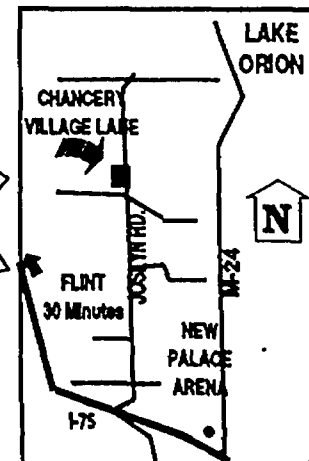

Wood shafts make 1-day comeback

Hoot Mon, it wouldn't be difficult to imagine that you've been transported across the ocean to a Brigadoon of 70 years ago as golfers led by a kilted Scottish piper appear carrying their wooden clubs in skinny canvas bags.

But the locale actually is Michigan's oldest private golf club,

the Ann Arbor Golf and Outing Club, located in the shadow of the University of Michigan football stadium at 400 E. Stadium Boulevard, and the scene is the annual Old Hickory Invitational with 70 participants.

This year on Sept. 16 club pro Mike Robson will be setting out log tee marks capped with tartan tammies made by members for an early tournament and saved for the annual outing. This is the ninth year the Old Hickory tournament has been held.

Mike explains that the wood shaft tourney originated nine years ago under then-pro Doug White with

member Dan Duncanson. Duncanson had amassed 50 sets of wooden clubs years ago when it was no problem to find them and loaned them for the tournament. Now, he notes, they have become very collectible.

While encouraging members to acquire their own sets and to practice beforehand, the club does furnish a complete set of woods, including a putter and two woods, to each five man team.

In addition to putting linseed oil on the hickories in preparation for use, it is a definite advantage for players to practice a slower swing with their wood-shafted putters and to make sure they can stay on the fairway.

"It's amazing the difference when you hit the ball solidly with the old clubs," says Robson.

"We open the event up to anyone who wants to play," Robson points out, saying he has a list of about 200 collectors of hickory-shafted clubs who would like to play in the event. The previous year's participants have priority for entry up to a deadline date. Then Robson goes to his waiting list. Because many are busy or out of town, most who have asked to play get the chance, he says.

Tee-off is a colorful sight as some members like John McCollum arrive carrying their hickories and wearing their tartan kilts.

"They usually go back and take them off after the start to play in

something more comfortable," Robson notes.

Robson has his own set of woods and played in early tournaments but finds himself too busy tending to details to do so now. Dan Duncanson officially runs the event.

In the early years of the tournament the club allowed golf professionals to participate but has changed to a format of amateurs only which, Robson says, has worked out better.

Rules stipulate that the clubs used must be genuine and that only wound balls may be used to protect the clubs. Participants may make up their own five-man teams to play 18 holes. After the afternoon of play, contestants stay on for team and individual prizes after cocktails and a steak dinner.

The skirl of the bagpipes will be heard before dinner as the Scottish dish of haggis is piped in ceremoniously. Current piper is Herm Steinman who teaches bagpipes in Ann Arbor. He's quite a sight in his full kilt and sporrans, says Robson.

The haggis, of course, is the traditional dish served at Christmas and on other special occasions in Scotland made of heart and liver of a sheep or calf minced with suet and oatmeal, seasoned and boiled in the stomach of the animal.

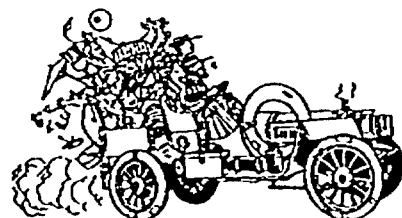
Conversation is sure to turn to the inevitable losses incurred by players.

"They usually break six or eight woods a year," Robson reports although Duncanson tallied only three broken woods in 1989.

That's why these collectors search out old woods in antique shops and at garage sales. The latter, says Robson, offer the best opportunity to buy at reasonable prices. They're also a source for old canvas bags.

"The bad part is that some sellers think the old hickory-shafted club are very, very valuable today," says

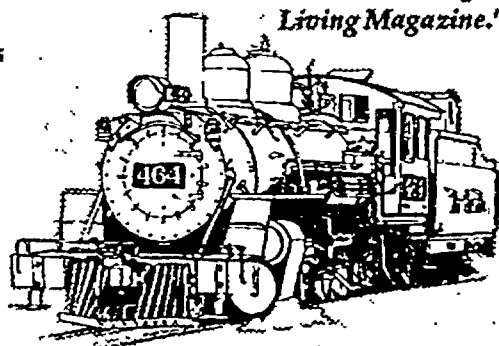

Robson, noting that some collectors still are finding them priced reasonably, about \$10.

Gene Boldon, owner of Golf Trends at 56 Forest in Ypsilanti, a shop that sells golf memorabilia, classic, vintage and antique golf items, declare that \$10 is "the bottom price" at which you'll find a hickory.

"I have a few priced that reasonably," he says but explains that he stocks clubs for collectors rather than for play and notes that he has golf items that date from 1890.

Clubs made by famous Scottish makers or those that have been declared illegal will command premiums.

"The ones that people buy to play with will have a butterknife blade or an early 1900 flange - they tend to look for a heavier blade," Boldon says.

He breaks clubs down into four categories: Antiques that are pre-1935; Vintage with sheath shafts from the '20s to the mid-'30s; Classics (his specialty) from the forties to a peak in the early 1960s with good chrome; and from the mid-1970s to the present High Tech with graphite shafts "for those who can afford them."

From bags to tees and score cards, golf collectors collect anything, Boldon emphasizes. He was interrupted in his conversation by a call from a Japanese collector interested in some of Boldon's old tees.

The dealer mentioned that Japanese purchasers have set the price tones in collecting but, with Japan's economy down at present, prices seem to be stabilizing.

Writing in Golfweek earlier this year, Pat Seelig cautioned that a major problem in golf collecting today is a lack of education, both by novice dealers and buyers.

"If you are interested in collecting antique golf clubs, he wrote, there are clubs that are worth \$300, \$500 and on up to \$50,000. In fact more than \$1.2 million was paid for the Auchterlonie collection of 23 clubs used by British Open champions from 1860 to 1930. Even though there was no documentation of ownership, the Auchterlonie family name had enough credibility to garner such a price."

Seelig's point is to be careful what you buy and to learn something about antique clubs before investing. He values most wood-shafted antique clubs at \$30 to \$50 or less.

A Golf Collectors Society, founded in 1970, now has 1,500 members and sponsors an annual two-day golf show where members sell and trade. This year's will be held in October in Atlanta. With the show is a Hickory Hacker tournament played with antique hickory-shafted clubs.

This is the only other hickory tournament we've heard of. Robson's sure that the Old Hickory at the Ann Arbor Golf and Outing Club is the only such event in Michigan. Entry fee is \$55 and includes cocktails and dinner afterward.

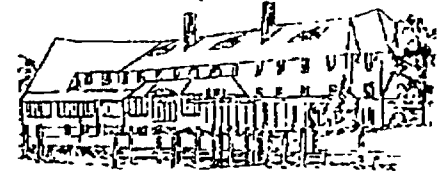

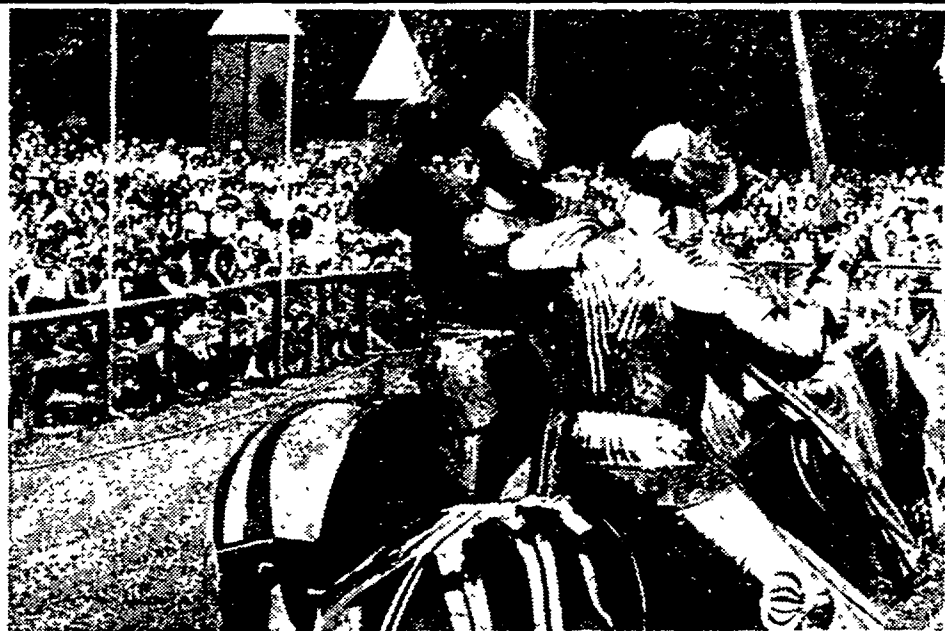

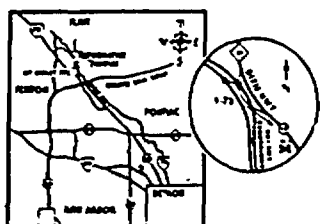

Treetops ranks with Fazio's best work

Gaylord, Michigan—

Tom Fazio, whose 18-hole design opens this summer at Treetops Sylvan Resort in Gaylord, had to be convinced to leave his southern base to create his first golf course in Michigan.

"Initially, I didn't want to go there," said Fazio, the superstar architect recognized for designing visually spectacular and highly playable courses. "It was too far away from where I was based (in North Carolina and Florida). Most of my work has been in the south, and I didn't want to go that far away. Maybe someday, I thought, but not now."

That was three years ago, but Treetops golf director Rick Smith kept telephoning Fazio and selling him on the Treetops resort and the property he would be working with.

"Rick kept calling me and said I really needed to come up to Treetops to see the land," Fazio said. "So I had some business in Chicago and from there went up north to see what Rick was talking about."

On a late October day three years ago, Fazio visited the Treetops site for the first time.

Said Fazio: "We walked the land. I

remember it was bright and sunny and then in the afternoon there were some snow flurries. Afterward, I could not believe what I had just seen. Hundreds and hundreds of golf holes out there. I was hooked. In fact, it may be the best site I've ever worked with.

"I remember going back home and telling my staff that they weren't going to believe what I had just seen—the site was that impressive."

"There were so many layouts for golf holes, so much flexibility. There were so many places to put golf holes that we had alternates for our alternate holes."

From a construction viewpoint, Fazio knew he had an excellent site, even by northern Michigan standards—rolling terrain, vegetation for framing and definition, a vast variety of trees and sandy loam soil for good drainage.

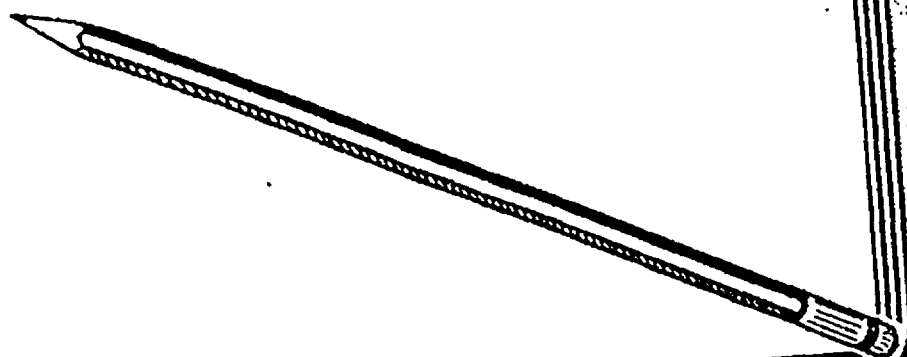

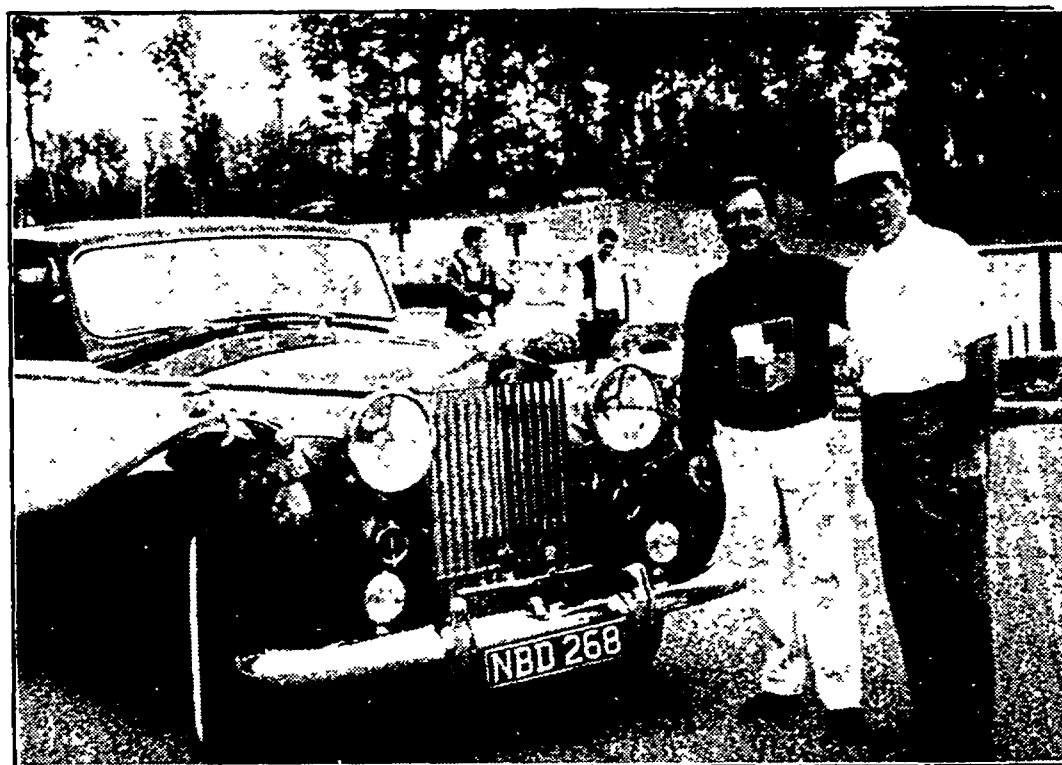

Fazio thinks the end result, the 6,832-yard Treetops Fazio, will stand with the best of his work--a registry of great courses that have earned him the reputation as the best architect in the game today.

Fazio says his Treetops course should rank with his best designs, including Black Diamond Ranch (Florida), rated 24th in Golf Digest's America's 100 Greatest Golf Courses," November 1991, and Wade Hampton (North Carolina), 17th in Golf Digest's rankings.

"I really couldn't pick my best course," Fazio said, "but I've designed about 10 courses--and I include Treetops in that list--that if you wrote down their names and had to pick one out of a hat, I'd base my whole

reputation on the one selected."

Fazio believes his Treetops course is strong from start to finish. There's no signature hole. From the blue tees, the par 4s on the front nine measure 399, 396, 281, 327 and 382 yards; the par 3s 143 and 167 yards; and par 5s 494 and 462 yards. On the back nine, the par 4s measure 362, 373, 405, 334 and 458 yards; the par 3s are 183 and 177 yards; and the par 5s are 465 and 494 yards.

Smith has high praise for the Fazio

course: "There's no doubt that it will be ranked among the top 50 courses in the country. In terms of visual drama and playability, the Fazio design is second to none. People will want to play it again and again."

Golfers will find Treetops Fazio in excellent condition. "We had a tremendous grow-in period last season," Smith said. "The course is in immaculate shape."

Smith also pointed out that Treetops Fazio is the first Fazio course in the midwest open for public play. "Normally, Tom has built exclusively private courses," Smith said. "I think players will be anxious to come up to Treetops and see for themselves why Fazio is considered the best architect in the business today."

Cincinnati—

In Cincinnati they say "we're the south end of The North." In Covington they say "we're the north end of The South." Any way you look at it, The North ends and The South begins when you cross the Ohio River between Ohio and Kentucky.

Most northerners get only a glimpse of the two river cities as they race south on Interstate 75 on their way to Florida. The expressway goes right through downtown Cincinnati before it crosses the river, so a glance over your shoulder gives you a snapshot impression.

The high-rise skyline of Cincinnati, Ohio, lifts on the north side of the river. The low-rise skyline marks Covington, Kentucky, on the south side of the river. Riverboats move under the bridges connecting the two.

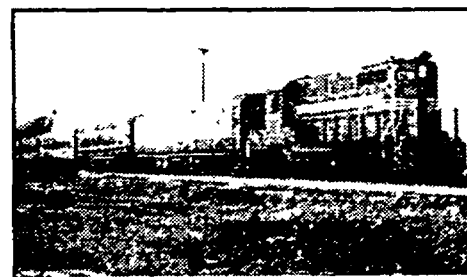

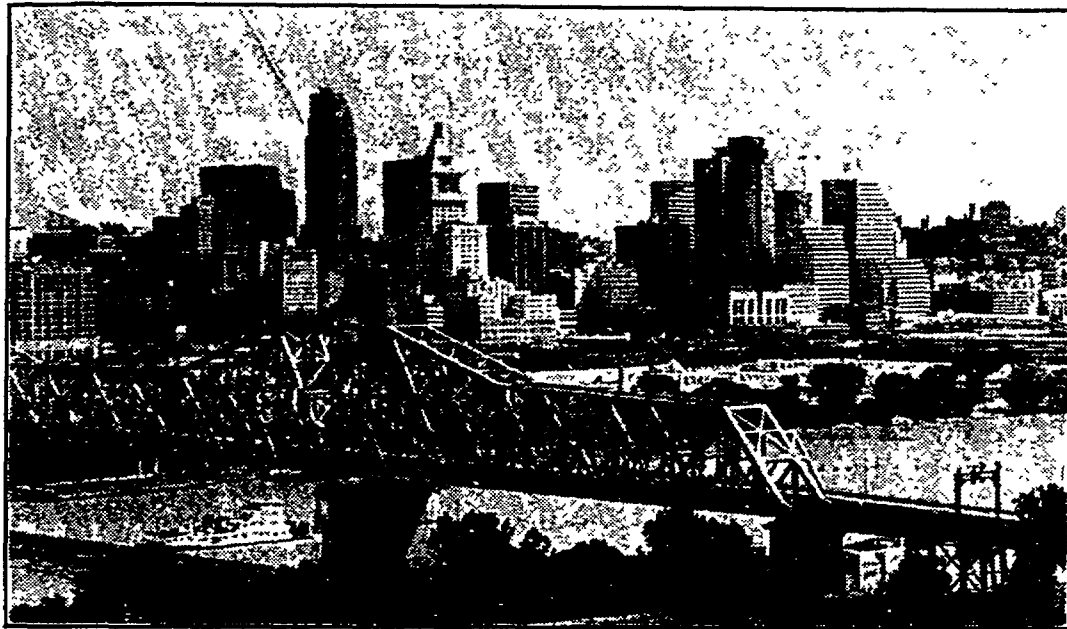

Cincinnati or in riverboat restaurants on the Covington side.

You can exit I-75 at Cincinnati, but I go in by the back door through Covington. The settlers who came downriver by flatboat were mostly Germans so when you turn off at the Covington exit, you see a gemütlichkeit bell tower near the Covington Visitor Center in Goebel Park, solid-looking restored houses and shops on Mainstrasse and along the dozen blocks to the Kentucky end of the "blue bridge."

I highly recommend The Amos Schinkle Townhouse Bed and Breakfast in the Riverside-Licking historic district a few blocks away. Amos Schinkle is the man who hired John Roebling to build that blue suspension bridge, a swag of cables that looks for good reason like the famous Brooklyn Bridge; Roebling duplicated the blue bridge in New York City a dozen years later.

Don Nash and Bernie Moorman run the Amos Schinkle Townhouse Bed and Breakfast on Garrard St. You'll probably find one of them in the kitchen making "goetta", ham mixed with onions and spices, cooked scrapple-style into patties and served with their typical breakfast menu: eggs, pancakes, French toast, muffins, fresh orange juice.

After a breakfast like that, you can walk 10 blocks to downtown Covington and the Basilica of the Assumption, modeled after Notre Dame in Paris. Or walk a few blocks to Covington Landing, a new complex of restaurants, bars and shops set on riverboats at the Kentucky end of the Roebling bridge.

Five more minutes of walking takes you across the bridge to downtown Cincinnati and the glass skywalks that connect shops and hotels. Or take the steps down at the Ohio end of the bridge to the river walk.

It's great fun to follow the river past Riverfront Stadium, where the Cincinnati Reds play baseball, and the Riverfront Coliseum, where special performances are held. Join the local lunchers on the steps of the Serpentine Wall; the Delta Queen may be tied up at nearby Public Landing; the Showboat Majestic, last of the original floating theaters in the U.S., will be

there.

A few more steps to Bicentennial Commons, built for Cincinnati's 200th birthday in 1988, and you can walk along a model of the locks that make the 981 miles of Ohio River navigable. It's a hands-on, well maybe a feet-on, experience.

Hardy walkers might find their way up Mount Adams, but most of us drive to the art museum, conservatory and theater playhouse of Eden Park. Easter worshippers climb on their knees up the 82 steps to Immaculata, the Church of the Steps, and a fabulous view.

You can see the whole river from there, pick your dinner boat from those lined up below, have a fine hamburger at a restaurant built into the historic Rookwood Pottery or return downtown to the newest and most interesting tourist sight in the city: Museum Center at Union Terminal.

The Art Deco center, covering half a million square feet, had a 39-year life as a railway terminal, a brief reincarnation as a festival hall and was saved from demolition when the Cincinnati Historical Society and the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History moved in.

Admire the original mosaic murals in the rotunda, which boasts the largest half-dome in the western hemisphere, check out the Rookwood pottery tiles in the ice cream parlor, see the film in the OMNIMAX theater and allow time for the wonderful exhibits of the two museums.

Enjoy an Historical Society recreation of Cincinnati's 1850 Public Landing and you will have a new insight into Ohio River life when you cross Mr. Roebling's suspension bridge back to the Covington side.

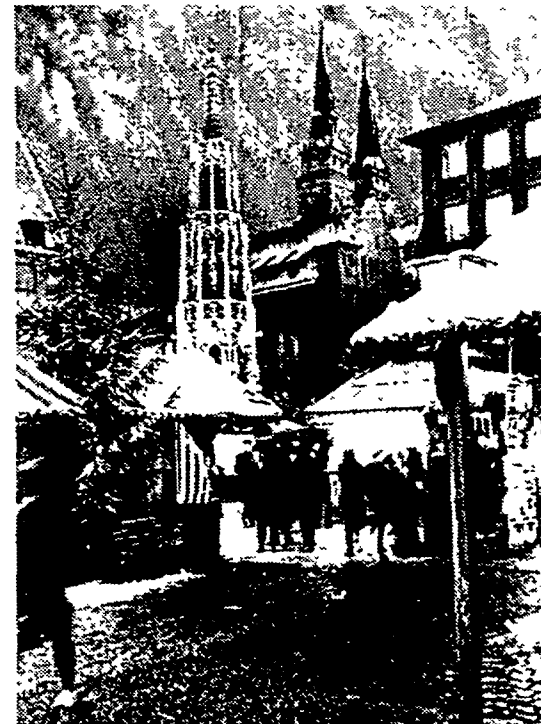

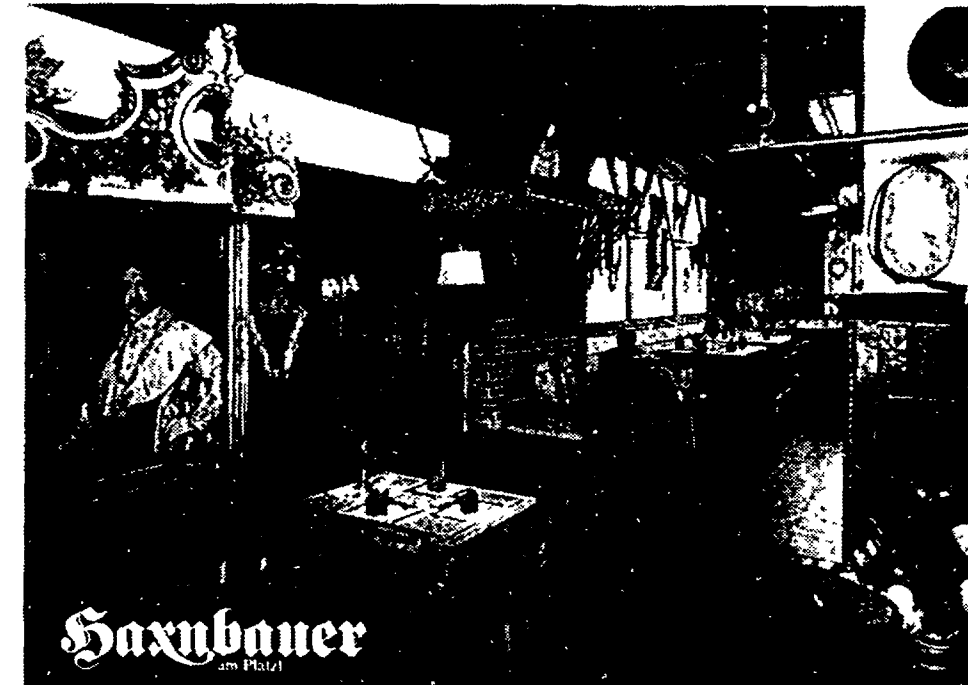

"There wasn't a leaf on the trees when we started...but by the time our trail ride ended the forest was ablaze in buds and flowers."

And, adds Don Bowen of Indian River, Michigan, it was an exhilarating experience "that none of us will forget."

Bowen, a relatively new member of the Michigan Trail Riders Association (MTRA), echoed the comments of many members who have participated in one of the cross-country horseback rides in Northern Michigan.

MTRA conducts four such rides each year--in May, June, September and October.

What makes the trail rides especially appealing to Bowen, who is hard-pressed to get away from his real estate sales, is that all are within easy access of his Indian River home and horse ranch. What's more, most of them include a trek through his favorite playground, the Pigeon River Country Forest northeast of Gaylord and just 15 minutes southeast of his home.

"We're really blessed to live in this forested area," he says. "Most of the riders are from downstate and have to spend several hours on the road before the trail ride begins. On the other hand, living in urban areas as they do, they generally are more appreciative of the seclusion of Northern Michigan than are those of us who live with it daily."

The association formation grew out of an idea that a horse trail be established across the state--from Lake Michigan to Lake Huron. Fitch Williams, one of those who proposed the idea, helped write the bill introduced in the Michigan legislature by the then senator, William Milliken. Subsequently, Fred Haskins of the Department of Conservation (now the DNR) laid out the first section of the trail--from south of Traverse City 33 miles to Kalkaska.

A year later, in 1963, Fitch Williams formed the Michigan Trail Riders Association. And from that time on, many different people helped in completing the trail to the east side of the state. A spur extends north to Elk Hill Camp near Vanderbilt, the association's permanent camp on the trail in the Country Forest. Today the trail stretches 220 miles across the state.

MTRA's chief goal is to help people "enjoy the sport of horseback

riding and (their) love of the outdoor world in a unique way, by riding the Michigan Riding-Hiking Trail," much of which provides nearly unlimited riding in wilderness areas.

The spring or "Blossom Ride" is Bowen's favorite. He's ridden it twice in the past two years.

It's a relatively short ride, covering about 150 miles in 10 days. "I really like it for a couple of main reasons," explains Bowen. "It happens in the birthing of a new season when everything in nature is new and vigorous, it takes in the 'Country Forest,' and it has fewer participants, mostly adults. The summer rides, which occur after schools are out, attract the most participants many of whom are children. I like quieter rides."

"I'd really like to try the October ride, when our northern colors are at their peak, but it's a time of year when I usually have other pressing business."

Riders come from all walks of life. They are doctors, lawyers, salesmen, students, housewives, factory workers, farmers, "and just about any field you want to name." Most are from downstate Michigan; some are from adjacent states.

While MTRA rides are carefully organized, they allow for a maximum of independence. "You'll meet and enjoy a lot of people, but you ride at your own pace," says Bowen.

"Usually, in the Blossom Ride, you'll travel along with six or fewer riders. The whole party is stretched out for miles, and once out on the trail you may not see everyone until reaching camp in the late afternoon."

"Trails are marked; few get lost."

A "trail boss" is in charge of each

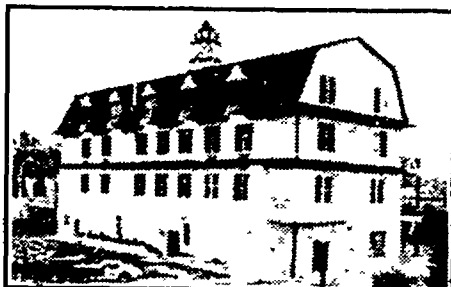

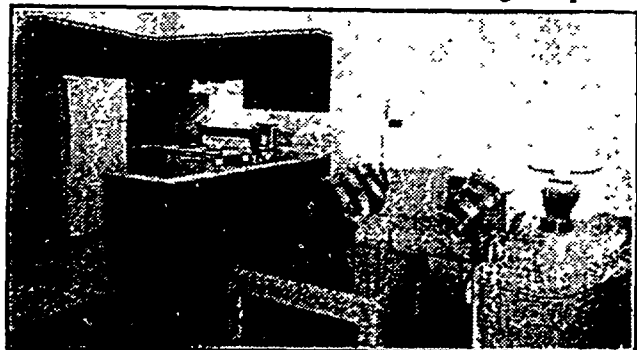

ride; his principal role is to advise, usually at camp each evening in discussing the next day's ride. "He doesn't ride herd on any one."

Each rider is responsible for his or her own horse, food for horse and rider, camping accommodations, and trailering rigs.

Some sleep in tents; some in horse trailers; some "just under the stars"; and some in luxurious motor homes.

Riders and horses arrived at an assembly area with an array of trailering and camping rigs. In the morning, fully saddled horses are left behind in someone's care, and all of the rigs are driven to the evening camp site and left there. Riders return by a MTRA bus, mount their horses and head off down the trail.

What's a typical day like?

"I'm usually up by 5:30 a.m. Some may sleep in and not get up until the sun is up. It's up to you. Nobody tells you what to do. First chore is to feed and water the horses. Then, wash and eat breakfast. Horses are saddled, and the saddlebags are filled (with first aid kit, sandwiches or whatever for lunch, camera, water canteen, map, compass, etc.).

"Out on the trail, you may ride along with several different riders during the course of the day. If you're like me, you may explore a little, stop get off your horse and walk into the woods, always alert for wildlife. In the woods, especially the Country Forest, you'll see all kinds of animals, especially on horseback. I've seen elk and deer, no bears yet, but lots of smaller critters, and all kinds of bird life.

"You'll ford a number of streams, maybe stop and fish, water your horse, and some—even in spring—may go swimming. I haven't braved that yet.

"By late afternoon you'll arrive at the camp site. These are for riders, not normal campgrounds. Accommodations are primitive. Maybe a latrine, a pump, if you're lucky, and not much else.

First chore in camp: unsaddle the horses and tie them to a picket line, water and feed the animals. Once

that's done, you'll want to feed yourself. You may have something special in the trailer you want to eat, or maybe you'll share a meal with some of the other riders. Again, you're on your own. Some riders, if they are close to a town, will drive in for a hamburger or pizza, and some may stop someplace for a shower.

"A private caterer will provide meals in camp for those who desire something a little more exotic, like 'finger-licking' spare ribs, grilled steak or even T-bone.

"After supper, you'll probably join some others around a campfire, enjoying conversation or guitars well into the night. I enjoyed the Northern Lights this past spring; they were spectacular."

Bowen beds down in the horse trailer pulled behind his truck. "I just spread some hay on the trailer floor and it's about as comfortable as you could ask for. Some, however, prefer sleeping in luxurious mobile homes. To each his own!" Quiet time begins at 10 p.m. All generators and vehicle engines must be off by. Noise must be kept to a minimum.

Trail meetings are held each evening at 8 p.m., conducted by the trail boss.

Participants must adhere to a few rules, most of which represent "common sense" advice. Here's some examples:

Do not leave litter on the trail or in camp; build campfires only in designated areas and put out all fires before turning in; obey all "No Trespassing" signs; don't canter your horse in the camp; if dogs are brought into camp they must be securely leashed; all riders must sign a "Hold Harmless Agreement"; riders under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult at all times; close all gates on the trail.

A trail ride in spring or autumn will likely attract fewer than 150 riders; in summer the numbers increase.

Riders may take in the entire planned ride, or they may spend only a weekend on the trail and then return home. All riders, however, are advised

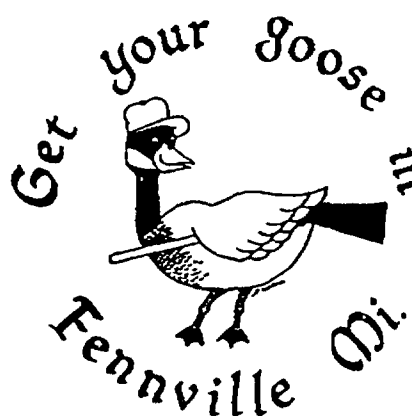

MTV knows Saugatuck, hip boaters should too

When the location manager of hip MTV went looking for a site for one of its "BeachMTV" parties this summer, he settled on Saugatuck. Pete Tombekis figured the quaint town on Michigan's southwest shore had enough charm and pizzazz to interest the millions in MTV's young audience.

When Roland (Rollie) Peterson drove up in a motorboat in 1938 from Gary, Indiana, he intended Saugatuck to be a stepping-stone to northern Michigan resort spots. After Peterson saw the town's good harbor and sandy beaches he decided to vacation there instead.

"Why go way up north," he said at the time, "when everything you could possibly want is right here?" Now he is one of the area's major developers and owner of the S.S. *Keewatin*, another Saugatuck attraction.

The ship is the last of the passenger steamships that cruised the Great Lakes during the grand era of lake travel. She crossed the Atlantic after she was launched in Glasgow, Scotland in 1907. Now the *Keewatin* and the *Queen Mary* in San Diego are the only oceangoing steamships that are open to a public hungry for a glimpse of life in another time.

An enthusiastic promoter of Saugatuck, Peterson was not sorry to see the popular MTV turn its lenses on the town. The visit in July attracted news video cameras from nearby cities.

They came to record MTV's camera crews, host Dan Cortese and

celebrity guest Edward Furlong of "Terminator II", for their local newscasts. Gawkers came to watch, hoping the cameras would focus on them. Everybody wanted to be on TV, according to the local townfolks. Some of the visitors brought their camcorders.

"It was people taking pictures of people taking pictures," says one resident. "It was crazy, but fun."

"They shot half the day at Oval beach," says Mike Johnson, "and the other half at Coral Gables. It was great exposure for Saugatuck." Johnson is the owner of Coral Gables, a venerable and popular Kalamazoo River waterfront combination of restaurant and bars. Its familiar gabled roof practically says "Welcome to Saugatuck" to boaters arriving via the channel from Lake Michigan.

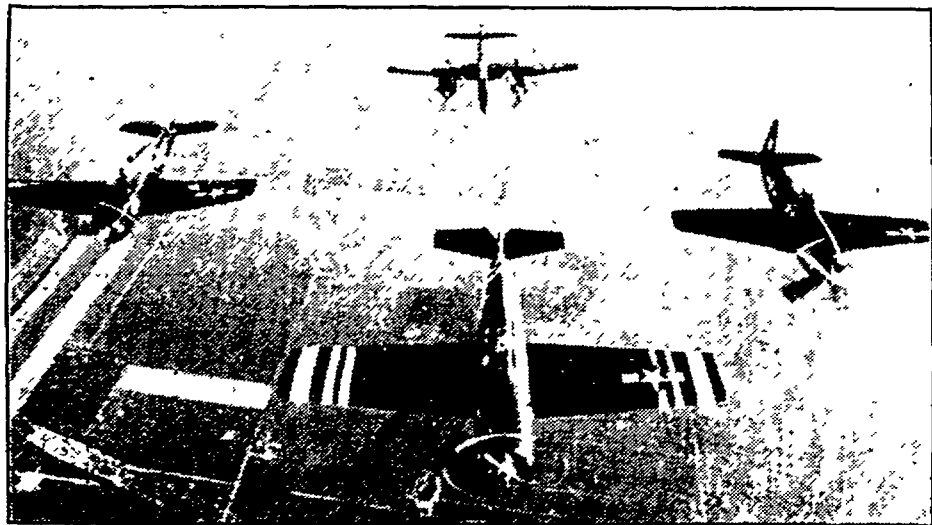
"We had a band playing outside," says Johnson, "and a volley-ball tournament, and bungee jumping. MTV got it all."

The MTV show has already been aired twice, in August.

The bungee jumpers were still there, necks unbroken, the August weekend we visited. While strollers on the world's longest freshwater boardwalk stopped and looked skyward, the triumphant daredevils leaped to a point a few feet from the river, then dangled at the end of their tethers like freshly caught fish.

Our visit included delightful talks with Rollie Peterson and his wife, Diane. When we asked her why her husband bought the monstrous, 350-foot-long ship docked like a beached white whale outside her office, she replied, "Because it was the last one of a kind." She sighed and smiled. "And because he is who he is. He also bought the last sawmill from Lakota, Michigan and an old coal-firing tugboat and an antique

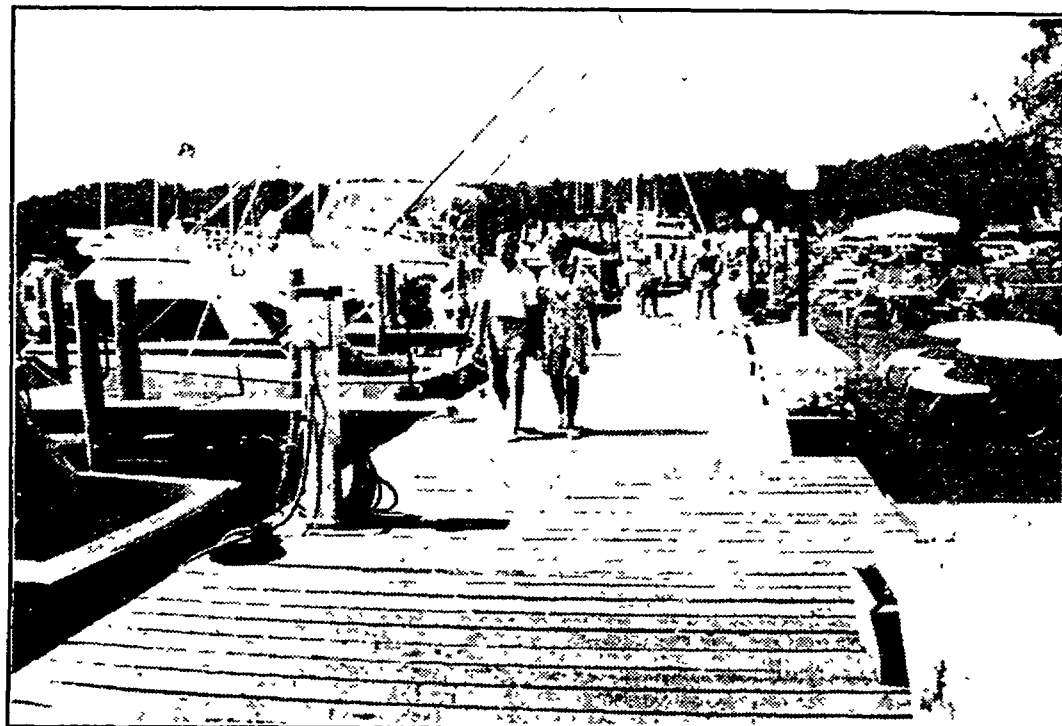

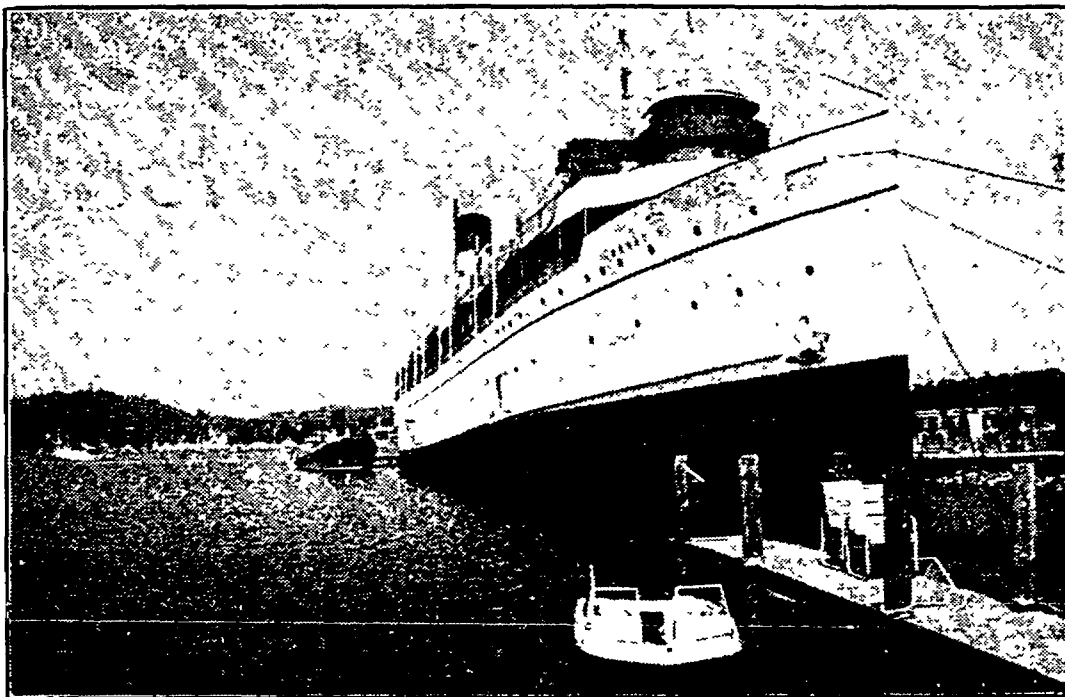

American LaFrance fire engine."

Peterson's answer to that question is simple and vigorous. "Hell, the *Keewatin*'s the only one left," he says. "She represents a time that's gone, that's all. When I bought her, I got two big payment books along with her."

The *Keewatin*'s resting place is now in the City of Douglas on the shore of Lake Kalamazoo, which is essentially a wide spot in the Kalamazoo River. Peterson had her towed here by tug in 1967 and opened her as a floating museum. Ever since, she's been showing off her historic charm.

She is moored at Harbour Village, where a busy launching ramp serves boaters who want to park their trailers. A 550-foot boardwalk alongside the *Keewatin* leads to the Red Dock Patio, where guests can have soft drinks or cocktails and snacks while viewing the harbor. Also available from the ticket office near the *Keewatin* are lunch, brunch and dinner cruises aboard the *City of Douglas*, and trips aboard the *Ary Lou* perch fishing boat.

Our tour guide on the *Keewatin* is Tom Zimmerman, who takes us back to the luxurious heyday of steamship travel. The *Keewatin*, he explains, was built five years before the *Titanic*. Experts say many of the *Keewatin*'s lamps and fittings are identical to the *Titanic*'s.

The *Keewatin*'s upholstery is faded and some of her paint peeling, but beneath it you can see the opulence she once displayed. You notice it in the glassware and silver in the dining room and the mahogany-paneled first class cabins. It's still there in the Flower Well, a salon where tea was served daily at 4 p.m.. You can visualize people luxuriating in their 1907 fashions.

Zimmerman tells us the *Keewatin* spent nearly 60 years steaming along on 20 tons of coal a day. She transported passengers and freight on a two-and-a-half-day trip between Port McNicoll in Ontario's Georgian Bay and Thunder Bay on Lake Superior. Eventually, the

automobile destroyed her usefulness. In 1967 the Petersons (Roland, Diane and his father Rolland) read that the last survivor of those times was about to be scrapped, and rescued the grand old girl.

Daily guided tours of the *Keewatin* are \$3 per person, \$1.50 for children six to 12, and free for younger visitors.

Our guide, we learn, teaches fourth grade in Leslie, Michigan, and his attractive wife, Cindy, teaches fifth grade. For the past three years, they have spent their summers working aboard the *Keewatin* and living aboard their 27-foot O'Day sailboat, docked at nearby Tower Marina. "We planned it that way," says Tom, because they both like the boating and the resort life at Saugatuck.

For boaters who want to give it a visit, many transient slips are available at Saugatuck. They may be harder to find in the downtown area, although Mike Johnson says he will even raft boats outside Coral Gables if skippers will call ahead. Tower Marina, Saugatuck Yacht Service and West Shore Marina all have transient slips.

The city furnishes a "Dial-A-Ride" type of bus service called the Interurban. Call from your boat any day between Memorial and Labor Day weekend, and a little blue bus with wheelchair lifts will pick you up and take you anywhere in town for \$1 (seniors and children, 50 cents). "Boaters use it a lot," says Rollie Peterson, "and you can walk anywhere."

That's a feature that attracts many Chicagoans, who can cruise to Saugatuck in about six hours. Jack Weglarz and Frank Mungo of Chicago, for example, visit three times a year aboard Weglarz's 53-foot Cape Hatteras, *Wanderin' Star*.

"We bring the boat and our wives drive because they don't like boats," says Weglarz. But the women like to join their husbands in walks along the boardwalk and into town for ice cream cones, lunches and dinners. "We like the Loaf and Mug," says Mungo. "They hollow out a loaf of crusty

to dress appropriately for changing weather conditions, and they ought to have had enough saddle time to minimize soreness and blistering. Horses should be in good condition.

"I broke in my horse, Blondie, a quarterhorse, on the first trail ride. It went well, but the going was much easier the second time out," says Bowen. He's ridden enough to know that bringing along a "duster" (long coat) is a must. "You never know what kind of weather you'll encounter. Last

spring we had rain only once; the weather was just great."

Bowen says "you're with some really friendly people...people who will go out of their way to help you if you encounter a problem. I lost a favorite jackknife deep in the forest, never ever expecting to see it again. But when I got into camp, it was waiting for me; a woman had found it on the trail."

Usually, a farrier and vet are nearby to help out with the animals, and "in emergencies, if someone falls and gets hurts, you're only a rider away from medical assistance."

To take part in a ride, participants must be members of MTRA 30 days in advance of a specific ride, and they must be registered. New membership dues are \$30, renewals \$20; including those for families.

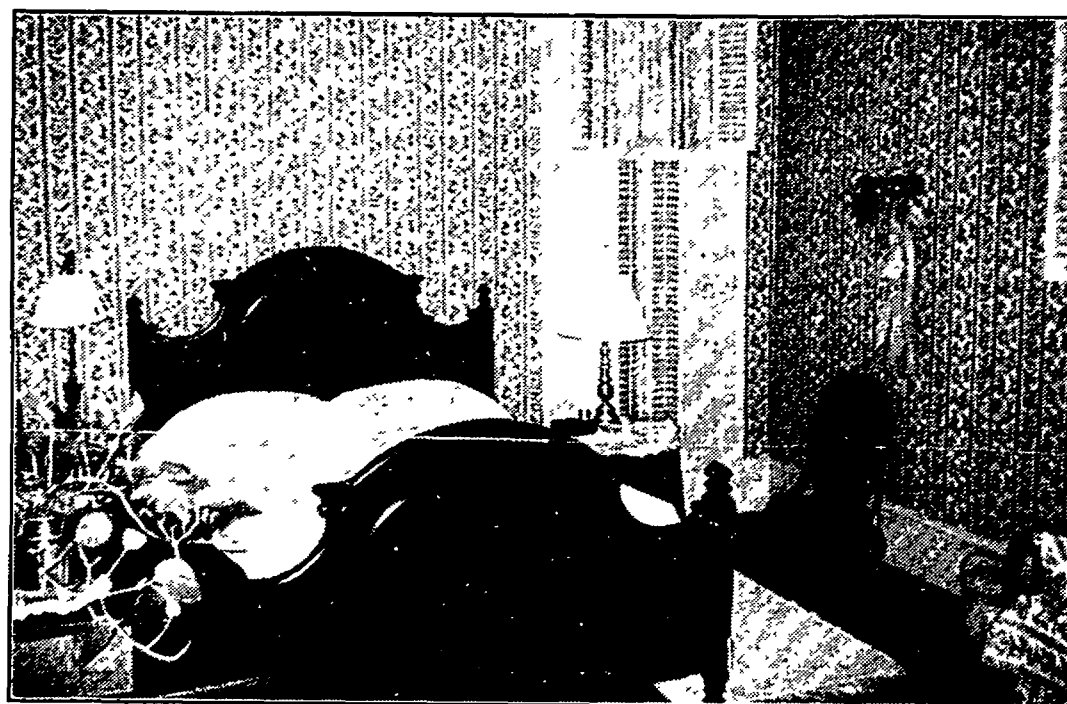
Three guest room each have a private bath and air conditioning. "Because we are small, we are able to give personalized attention to our guests," Barbara says.

Aside from festivals, the area offers island-hopping cruises to Kelleys Island, Middle Bass Island and Put-in-Bay on South Bass Island through Oct. 11. Transportation to each individual island is available year-round by either airline or ferryboat.

"Fall is one of the best times to visit Kelleys Island or Put-in-Bay," said Van Offeren. "There is a relaxed atmosphere not found at any other time of the year."

Local wineries, however, are far

from relaxed, as fall signals the harvest of their vineyards and the production of their award-winning wines. Two Sandusky wineries are open year-round with tastings. Firelands Winery also has self-guided tours of their bottling facility and production rooms, while Steuk's Country Market and Winery has fall cider pressing.

Cedar Point amusement/theme park, the nation's largest ride park, is open daily through Labor Day, and then Saturdays and Sundays through Oct. 4. Bonus Weekend discount rates are available for \$16.95 on Sept. 12-13, 19-20, 26-27 and Oct. 3-4. Further discounts for seniors and children are available. Hours for the park during these weekends are noon to 8 p.m.

Getting back to nature is easy to do. Nine parks or nature preserves are open all year. From autumn hikes through woods and marshlands to cross-country skiing, nature-lovers will find a variety of species and landscapes to enjoy.

Several local museums are also open throughout most of the year. These include Das Shafer Puppen Haus, Edison's Birthplace, the Follett House Museum, the Inland Seas Maritime Museum, the Merry-Go-Round Museum and the Milan Historical Museum.

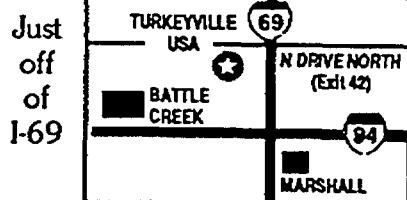

bread and serve it filled with delicious, thick clam chowder."

On a summer weekend the town teems with visitors, strolling from the boat-lined boardwalk to its downtown art galleries and stores. They browse through stores whose owners make it a point to offer unusual merchandise. There's everything from Tiffany-type shops to mom and pop toy stores. An ice cream store invites visitors on nearly every block, and many of the pedestrians are licking on cones.

Every street is lined with restaurants. The city fathers, however, have fought to preserve Saugatuck's atmosphere by rejecting all requests for fast food operations amidst their quaint Victorian houses and shops.

We recommend The Butler, alongside the boardwalk. It began life as a grist mill in 1892. Its owners claim its delicious "All-American Burger" made Saugatuck famous. They grill the burgers on a deck outside, where guests sit under umbrella tables and listen to a guitar-playing folk singer.

We also liked our salad at Toulouse. Its charbroiled slices of

chicken breasts over a spinach salad were flavored by honey herb dressing. The Country French restaurant at 248 Culver Street serves entrees from \$10.50 to \$18.50. Like most Saugatuck restaurants and stores, it is open all year.

Because Saugatuck thrives even after Labor Day. Jazz festivals, an Oktoberfest and other events throughout the year, as well as great shopping, art galleries and places to eat draw thousands of visitors, in addition to MTV, to what Saugatuck enthusiasts call "The Cape Cod of the Midwest."

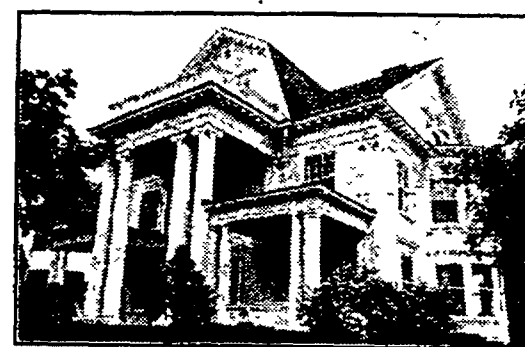
