Taxation hearing set in township

The township board has penciled in a Truth-In-Taxation hearing for 7 p.m. Sept. 10 at township hall.

Residents are invited to attend the hearing to speak out on whether the township should move to raise its portion of property taxes by .3598 mill, an increase of about nine percent on the township's current 3.8245-mill levy.

The board is slated to vote on the measure during its regular session immediately following the public hearing.

Truth-In-Taxation is a tool used by government to stymie the effects of inflation on revenues. If the plan is approved, the township figures to earn about \$168,000, according to township Finance Department statistics.

That amount would go a long way to bailing the township out of an expected cash shortfall that ranges from \$150,000 to \$250,000, said township Treasurer Jack Hoamer. Hoamer especially has spoken in concerned tones about the township's fund balance, the reserve funds called often upon for emergency expenses.

In addition to the Truth-In-Taxation move, the township this week adopted its \$4-million 1993 preliminary budget. Basically a state-mandated

housekeeping gesture, approval of the preliminary budget paves the way for active budget review.

The township has scheduled an all-day budget review affair on Sept. 29 at township hall. A team of officials, including Hoamer, township Manager Richard Henningsen, Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan, Supervisor-elect Karen Baja, and Treasurer-elect Rick Engelland will hear funding pleas from the township's department heads that day, and will cut and paste 1993's budget prior to the board's late October adoption of the new budget.

The Sept. 29 budget review begins at 8 a.m. and is open to the public.

City goals list dampened by finances

City officials updated their list of goals Monday night, hampered by tight finances which have put many projects on indefinite hold.

The City Council last updated its list of goals and objectives in July 1991, with individual items designated high priority, medium priority, lower priority, on hold, and ready to be finalized.

This year's update saw relatively few changes to last year's list. The major addition was the inclusion of a

resolution of the old Ford plant land — whatever that resolution might be — as a high-priority item.

Mayor Chris Johnson suggested the addition, reasoning that Ford itself wants the site's future settled by the end of the year. The land includes both the old valve plant site on Main Street and Ford Field off Hutton Street.

The number-one high-priority item from last year, final completion of the citywide street repair program, moved to the ready-for-completion list. City Manager Gary Word reported that work "is all but over."

The other 11 priority items from last year all kept their positions on the list, with little progress made since the city last reviewed its goals. The first item discussed in depth was police department consolidation between the city and township, which the council had set as a high priority a year ago.

The past year saw little movement on that front, however, and Council Member Paul Folino wondered aloud if township officials were still interested in exploring the idea. He pointed to a new dispatch radio in the proposed township budget as a pos-

sible signal that consolidation is not being considered.

But the council members quickly agreed that at least discussing the concept of consolidation should remain high-priority, with Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers pointing out that an entirely new Township Board will take office in November and the city should seek out those people's opinions.

Johnson said, "It still would seem to me to be a fairly significant possibility in terms of saving some dollars

Council tabs Cryderman

Mark Cryderman became the newest member of the Northville City Council Monday night in a unanimous appointment.

Cryderman, 46, is a salesperson and member of the city Planning Commission. The council selected him from a field of five applicants after a questionnaire and interview process.

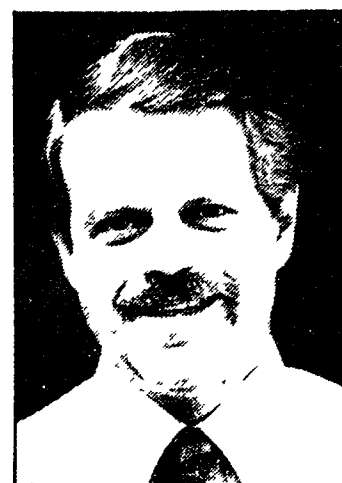
He was immediately sworn in Monday and took his place at the council table for the rest of the meeting.

Cryderman will fill out the unexpired term of G. Dewey Gardner, who recently quit the council when he moved to Brighton. The four-year term ends next November.

"I'm flattered that you chose me," Cryderman told the council just after the vote. "I hope I live up to your expectations, and the expectations of the citizens of Northville."

Each member of the city council — including the new one — said the quality of applicants for the vacant council post was particularly high. The others seeking the post were Jim Cutler, Kevin Hartshorne, Charles Keys and Dave Totten.

"I read all the interviews," Cryderman said. "There was a lot of commonality" among the applicants on

issues like teamwork and getting people involved. "I felt in good company," he added.

Cryderman's appointment came after Council Member Paul Folino nominated Cutler to fill the vacancy, but did not get a support to his motion. Council Member Jerry Mittman then nominated Cryderman, supported by Folino.

Mayor Chris Johnson said Tuesday he looks forward to working with Cryderman on the council. "I think Mark will be a fine addition," he said.

Motor carrier debate rages

Allegations of death threats, bribes, and canceled garbage-collection contracts highlighted a volatile Township Board session on Monday.

Players in this dramatic fare included the Township Board, the police chief, and Thomas Handyside, a board member who also works for a company considering a lawsuit against the township and its motor carrier enforcement ordinance.

Meanwhile, the board quashed police Chief Chip Snider's plea for \$33,000 to buy and equip a motor carrier enforcement vehicle. Board members noted that the car was an unbudgeted item and should be re-

quested during 1993 budget talks.

But the board's split vote on the vehicle request was overshadowed by Snider's ominous remarks. He told board members the township's motor carrier program — which features enforcement of safety, weight, and equipment restrictions on roads — has come under fierce attack by proponents of the trucking industry.

Truckers — including garbage and cement trucks, gravel haulers, and construction vehicles — account for most of the tickets issued by police motor carrier officers.

Some in the trucking industry are crying foul and claim the township has created a revenue-producing, selective enforcement hit squad.

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Recreation staff seeks park loan

A step toward a goal or the just the latest hurdle in a painful, two-year struggle?

Northville Parks and Recreation officials are mulling Monday evening's Township Board actions for the answer.

The board rejected a Recreation Department bid to borrow \$220,000 from the township's water and sewer restricted fund, but offered to investigate a possible commercial loan to pay for development of the troubled

Beck Road community park.

Recreation Director Traci Gottschalk and Recreation Commission Chairperson Ken Romine pitched — without success — a plan to borrow funds from the restricted fund, an account obligated for township water and sewer capital improvements, including the multi-million-dollar bond debt incurred through the Western Townships Utilities Authority sewer project.

Romine said recreation officials need a large infusion of cash if they

Man wants pols to face the nation

John Cooper figures if he puts a face on the nation's unemployment statistics, the White House might take a closer look at the problem.

That's why the Northville photographer is shooting a group portrait of unemployed residents today in Detroit's Hart Plaza and sending poster-size prints of the photo to the White House and to the Democratic campaign headquarters.

Cooper, who is self-employed as the owner of Exposure Photographic in Northville, hopes the picture he sends to the White House will trigger President George Bush to look harder at decreasing the number of unemployed people in the state and in the country.

"I want to bring the faces of the unemployed to the White House. So rather than looking at the numbers, the government can recognize them as

people," the 26-year-old photographer said.

"It's not like it's a president's thing. And I'm not trying to point fingers at anybody. All I really want to do is heighten the awareness."

Cooper said there are really no political motivations behind his wanting to photograph the unemployed. On the contrary, the idea came to him while lying in bed one night thinking about what he could do to help reduce the nation's unemployment rates. So he decided he'd do what he does best — photograph it.

"This is a... device to get the President's attention," he said. "It is something that always rides in the back of people's minds when they see it happening. I'm just hoping that when he (President Bush) looks at the photograph it will pique his consciousness for just a minute."

Even if his efforts don't turn the president's head, his idea has caught on with the local news papers and radio stations which have advertised

Cooper's plan and helped to get him some subjects for today's shoot.

Cooper placed a display ad inside the *Free Press* asking for volunteers to meet him at Hart Plaza today at 2 p.m. Six radio stations and television outlets have also carried the message looking for volunteers.

With all the media coverage, Cooper isn't sure just how many people might show up for the shoot today. But he's prepared for anything.

"I never intended for it to be as big as it looks like it's going to be," he said. "But I'll just adapt and see what happens."

Cooper will also be sending letters from concerned residents along with his photo. If anyone is interested in writing letters to the president and to the Democratic headquarters about the unemployment problem, Cooper asks that you send them to P.O. Box 724, Northville, MI 48167.

Vandals take Northville mailboxes by storm

City police logged several reports of damaged or stolen mailboxes over the weekend.

Hardest hit were Andover and Whitegate addresses. The following is a list of damaged or stolen mailbox complaints filed by city police:

Someone reportedly pulled mailboxes off posts at three Andover residences late Aug. 28 or early Aug. 29. Damages ranged from \$10 to \$75. Two Whitegate residences also were victimized early Aug. 29, with reporting parties estimating mailbox damages at \$25 and \$75.

In addition, a Jeffrey resident told city police that someone stole a black plastic mailbox with a cedar covering from the home late Aug. 28 or early Aug. 29. The mailbox was valued at \$60.

VEHICLE DAMAGED: A St. Lawrence resident told city police that someone shattered the driver's side window of his 1991 Pontiac Grand Am Aug. 26 while the vehicle was parked in the owner's driveway. Damage was estimated at \$180.

OVERDUE PARKING TICKETS LEAD TO ARREST: A 26-year-old Northville man was arrested last week on charges that he failed to pay 79 parking tickets issued between Feb. 1990 and May 1992.

City police said the man was issued 78 tickets for violating a 2:30 a.m. - 7 a.m. parking curfew near his Sherrie Lane address. The other ticket was written for the same violation on Randolph Street. Forty of the tickets were issued for a Pontiac owned by the man, while the other 39

tickets were issued to an Oldsmobile he owned.

The man posted \$334 cash bond and is scheduled for a Sept. 21 court date at 35th District Court.

WEAPONS VIOLATION: A 19-year-old Taylor man and a 26-year-old Belleville man were charged with possession of dangerous weapons after township police arrested them early Aug. 29 on Sheldon between Five Mile and Six Mile.

Police reportedly stopped the suspects' 1982 Plymouth Horizon after it made an illegal U-turn on Sheldon. Police eventually discovered two bayonets and two other knives in the car and in the occupants' possession. A passenger, an 18-year-old Wyandotte man, was not cited in the incident.

CAR DAMAGED: The owner of a 1991 Mazda Protege told township police that someone damaged the car while it was parked on Winchester near Rayburn late Aug. 28 or early Aug. 29.

The owner told police that someone struck and damaged both rear quarter panels with an unknown object. Damage was estimated at \$1,000.

OUILS: A 34-year-old Garden City man was charged with operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor after his arrest early Aug. 25. A Breathalyzer test indicated that the man's blood-alcohol level was .10.

Haggerty. Breathalyzer tests indicated the man's blood-alcohol level was .27 and .28, nearly three times the state's legal limit for OUIL offenses.

Mix a stolen car and rifle with a pair of wayward teenagers, and the combination reeks of impending disaster.

But a weekend jaunt across state lines proved a less tragic finale for two local 13-year-olds than the script may have called for.

Two youths—one from Northville, the other from Novi—turned themselves over to Monroe County sheriff's deputies early Aug. 29 after a 10-hour flight that saw them

pilot a stolen car into Ohio.

The youths, with a stolen .30-30 Winchester rifle and ammunition in tow, were turned over to their parents after they had abandoned the car and rifle near a field off US-23 in Monroe County.

Sheriff's deputies apprehended the youths without incident outside a Monroe County gas station after the teens called police and offered to surrender, said Sgt. Tom Scott, commander of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department Youth Bureau.

The wild ride began about 2 p.m. Aug. 28 in Northville,

according to township police reports.

Police said a 28-year-old Northville man reported that his nephew took his car keys without permission and drove away in the man's 1985 Ford Mustang convertible. Police then were contacted by the boy's 60-year-old grandfather, who said the teen had stolen a rifle and two boxes of ammunition.

Police issued a multiple-county alert and extended the lookout on the route between Michigan and Florida, police said. But at about 10:20 p.m. Aug. 28, the Novi youth reportedly contacted his mother, who passed on the in-

formation to Novi police.

Sometime around midnight, the car was disabled, Monroe County's Scott said. The youths reportedly hid the rifle among some weeds and brush and walked to a gas station to telephone home. Sheriff's deputies then were contacted, picked up the youths, and recovered the rifle.

Scott said he had no evidence the gun had been fired. Township police records did not indicate that the Northville teen's uncle and grandfather wished to press charges.

Abduction try prompts concern for school walkers

An apparent near-abduction of an 8-year-old Novi girl has Northville school officials and parents concerned about the safety of the increased number of children who will be walking to designated bus routes and to school this year.

As a result of recent budget cuts in district bus services, more children will be walking the streets this year than in years past. That, coupled with recent reports of a foiled abduction and a sexual assault complaint made by three different Novi residents, has parents, PTA members, local police departments and school officials on edge and on the lookout.

Adelyn Gonzales, the aunt of the 8-year-old Novi girl who was chased to her doorstep two weeks ago by two unidentified teen males, recounted the most recent incident for School Board members and parents Monday night.

According to Gonzales, the 8-year-old girl and her mother were terrified when two teenage males in a red car followed the girl to her home on Queenspointe in the Meadowbrook Glens subdivision at dusk two weeks ago. Reportedly, the girl was eating her dessert on the front porch and was one her way over to her neighbor's house. That's when she saw the two men come up in the car. Once she saw them, she ran to her home. When she reached the front door she turned around to see one of the men standing in her driveway.

Gonzales said the girl actually felt the hand of the intruder on her back just before she hit the front door. "All I want to do is get the word out," she told the board Monday. "Especially now with all the busing cuts. It is so important to remind your kids that there is safety in numbers."

Two other incidents reported to Novi police earlier this year involved similar circumstances.

Gonzales hoped that by sharing this latest experience with the board she would call attention to the problem

and prevent it from happening again.

Calling attention to what she did. School officials were quick to respond to her report and according to Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski, the district has contacted the local police departments and building principals to make them aware of the incident.

"We immediately responded to the Mrs. Gonzales' call," Rezmierski said. "Fortunately we had a staff meeting the following Monday after she called. So we've alerted our building principals and we will take it to the staff once they come back for the year."

"I don't want to panic the kids, but everyone is aware of it and now it's a matter of being vigilant."

Being vigilant is just what members of the district PTA council plan to be.

On Tuesday morning, following the special board meeting, the district's Coordinating Council met and discussed the Novi incident.

Barbara Flis, chair of the co-council's health and safety committee, said the parents' group is currently re-

viewing a neighborhood networking safety program that would provide shelter for children who feel they are in danger.

Patterned after the helping hands program, participants will be asked to display a sign in their windows to indicate they are participating members of the program. Once a child sees the symbol, Flis said, he or she will know it is safe place to duck inside. Parents who are home in the morning and in the afternoon when school starts and lets out will be asked to be watchdogs and keep an eye on the area, Flis said.

Flis said the program is just under review right now but hopes the council will have something worked out before the onset of school next week. She said she will work with the city and township police to get the neighborhood program implemented.

"I just wanted to warn all the other parents," Gonzales told the crowd at Monday's board meeting. "She (the girl) wasn't doing anything wrong. She was just eating her dessert outside."

Suspect in Meijer stabbing faces preliminary exam

Rodney Christopher Humber was belligerent and profane in the foyer of Meijer late Aug. 20 as two store detectives attempted to detain and question him on suspicion of shoplifting. And Humber refused to take his hands from his jeans pockets until he

wheeled and rammed a knife into the heart of one of the unsuspecting detectives.

Michael Bebeau, 28, clutched his chest and said, "Oh my god, I've been sta..." before collapsing in a pool of blood at the 20401 Haggerty store in Northville Township. Bebeau died a short time later.

That sequence of events was of-

fered by Lillian Roe, Bebeau's security partner, yesterday afternoon at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

Roe was testifying in Humber's preliminary examination. Humber, 16, is charged with one count each of first-degree felony murder and first-degree premeditated murder in the death of Bebeau, who had worked for Meijer since late 1989.

Humber, suspected of shoplifting about \$500 worth of jewelry, grudgingly returned to the store at Bebeau's request just before the fatal stabbing.

Roe said the youth argued with the store detectives before "he turned and took his hands out of his pockets... He hit him in the chest real hard with his right hand."

Roe saw Bebeau grab his chest and said she glimpsed a metallic object strike the floor.

Roe was one of three witnesses to testify in the preliminary examination. Julie Gragalis, another Meijer employee, and township police officer Matthew Mayes also responded to questioning from Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Gary LaBret and

defense attorney Robert Edick.

Humber sat quietly throughout the examination. Judge James Garber bound the suspect over for arraignment in Wayne County Circuit Court. An arraignment date is expected to be scheduled for sometime in the next two weeks. At the earlier district court arraignment, Humber pleaded not guilty.

Your move, council tells flooding complainant

The next move — if any — is up to a Novi homeowner in a running battle with the City of Northville over drainage problems on her land.

The Northville City Council Monday voted unanimously to deny Laura Lorenzo's request for a rehearing of her case before the Board of Zoning Appeals, and to take no further action on her complaints. In the past, she has said she would take the city to court if it did not provide some relief to her.

The Northville council met in a closed session Monday night to discuss the situation. After the private discussion, the council voted unanimously to consider the issue

finished. City Manager Gary Word said Tuesday he will write Lorenzo a letter informing her of the decision. Lorenzo's Galway Drive property — within the City of Novi, but backing up to the Northville city limits — suffers from flooding, and she points to undersized culverts in Northville's Pheasant Hills subdivision as the culprits. She has argued that the city violated its own ordinances in allowing the culverts.

The city engineers reviewed the case and city attorneys reviewed the engineers' review. The dispute created mountains of paperwork which have become the subject of a related dispute between Lorenzo and Northville over reasonable fees to receive copies of documents.

Early in July the city Board of Zoning Appeals rejected a request from Lorenzo to overturn approval of the Pheas-

ant Hills culverts. That set the stage for Monday's decision, in which the council effectively decided to drop the issue. A motion by Council Member Jerry Mittman, supported by Council Member Paul Folino, denied a Lorenzo request for a rehearing at the BZA. The motion specifically added that the council planned no further action in the matter.

Northville Mayor Chris Johnson said Tuesday that the city has looked at the issue from "45 different angles" and reached the same conclusion each time. He added that although he is not a professional engineer, the engineers' reasoning on the culvert issue seems to make sense.

"I think the critical question in the whole issue is whether or not the engineering firm is correct in their de-

termination. . . We feel they were correct," Johnson said.

"I think we just have to bring the issue to closure." Monday's decision may or may not have done that, however: After the July BZA decision, Lorenzo said she would take the matter to court. She could not be reached for comment by press time this week.

Johnson, who himself works as a municipal attorney, declined to predict whether Lorenzo would file a lawsuit. However, the council entered the closed session Monday for the specific purpose of discussing "pending litigation," one of a few permissible reasons to close a government meeting under the state Open Meetings Act.

"She's been persistent, so nothing would surprise me," Johnson said Tuesday of a possible lawsuit.

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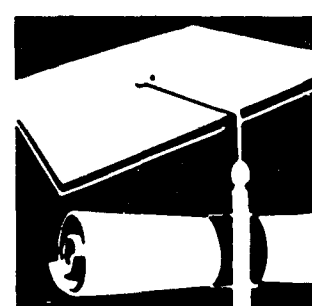
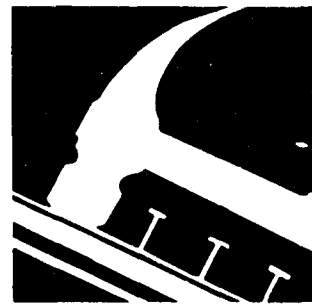
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Department goals feel the pinch too

City and shared-services department heads reviewed their goals for the year with city council members Monday, in many cases presenting "wish lists" of projects for better financial times.

Like the city council's overall goals and objectives, the individual departments' goals lists were tempered by the knowledge that the city's tight finances will delay most major new cash outlays.

Some of the goals require little or no direct cash outlay. Some repeat or dovetail with the City Council's overall goals. But if they have the money and time necessary, things the department heads would like to accomplish include:

City Manager Gary Word

Staff development: Develop and implement a performance appraisal program. Use an outside facilitator to promote team-building in a daylong or half-day seminar setting.

Organizational development: Complete and implement a personnel policy and procedure manual. Develop and administer a salary administration program. Develop and use an administrative operations manual. Develop and maintain a 10-year equipment replacement schedule. Develop and maintain a capital improvement program.

Productivity improvements: Return clerical personnel to full-time status as soon as financially prudent. Acquire and install state-of-the-art telephone equipment. Acquire and install new data processing equipment and more generic software.

Police Chief Rod Cannon

Complete a shift to using 9 mm pistols

Study possibility of, and possibly buy, computers for department records and word processing.

Review records retention and storage problems. Implement solutions such as disposal or microfilming; seek more office space

Department of Public Works Superintendent Ted Mapes

Replace dump truck, stake truck, and DPW garage roof

Water loss improvements.

Street repair items: Replace brick crosswalks downtown. Improve Center Street, improve E. Cady between S. Main and Griswold, and citywide program of sealing joints in streets.

Repave parking lots at city hall and the community center

Replace sidewalks

Replace Beal Street and Baseline Road bridges.

Beautifully entrances to city, restrain downtown bandshell, paint streetlights and tree grates.

Continue tree replacements.

Housing Director Fran Hopp
Maintenance: Create a smooth transition away from 14-year employee and streamline department.

Administration: Develop more formal annual report, refinance expiring sprinkler bonds for modernization, complete HUD management review requirements, and submit documentation to HUD requesting increase in fair market rent ceiling rate.

Assessing Department: Establish uniform residential assessment data base. Reinspect all commercial and industrial properties. Establish annual reinspection policy and create land value mapping.

between the two governmental units."

Hearing from the new Township Board members became a subtext for much of the discussion, as council members talked about other items like a possible communitywide survey, improving parking at the community center, and creating a corridor parkway to Maybury State Park.

Another high-priority item from last year was a statistically reliable citizen survey of both city and township residents. The year saw no real effort toward that, although council members mentioned that the township's Northville 2000 planning group had considered the idea.

New City Council Member Mark Cryderman suggested inviting a Northville 2000 representative to a council meeting to discuss any pending survey, an idea which met with favor from the rest of the council.

Yet another high-priority goal was replacing the city's decaying central parking deck, a topic of much discussion at recent meetings of the Downtown Development Authority.

"I continue to think that needs to be a high-priority project," Ayers said. "The current parking deck is in terrible condition, and it is not going to last too much longer." She suggested the deck should remain listed as high priority in conjunction with a study of the Cady Street area and expanding the DDA district, and no one on the council disagreed.

The final high-priority item was addressing the massive losses from the city water system, which preliminary reports estimated at more than 40 percent due to a series of weak spots.

The council agreed to leave that as a high-priority item even though a lack of money for repairs will delay any action indefinitely. Johnson suggested the city undertake a cost-benefit analysis to see if the water saved by repairs would actually make such a program financially worthwhile.

As council members moved on to last year's medium- and lower-priority goals, Johnson said the city's financial plight made many of them unrealistic for the next 12 months. "I think as a practical matter our deficit reduction plan has eliminated those as a possibility in the coming year," he said.

However, other council members said the city could at least plan for some of the goals for such time as the city has money available. Completing a sidewalk construction program, for example, needs a clearer policy as well as funding, Council Member Jerry Mittman said.

Other medium-priority projects included a review of the city's planning, engineering and legal consulting services. The past year saw a switch in planning consultants, but no formal review of engineers or attorneys.

A financial plan to renovate the Mill Pond was on last year's list; although council members agreed the city could not afford to do anything with that, a group of residents is meeting independently on the problem. A review of insurance packages is under way, and improvements to parking at the community center will probably wait for better financial times.

Cryderman suggested thinking of the lower-priority goals as "planning projects" to indicate a longer-term view. Those include improvements to

Center Street, a long-desired expansion of city Fire Department facilities, an overhaul of the city charter, the development of a public walkway along part of the Middle Rouge River, and a corridor from the city out to Maybury State Park.

Continued city beautification was a lower-priority goal, and Follino and Department of Public Works Superintendent Ted Mapes took the occasion to announce the beginning of a volunteer effort to maintain the South Main boulevard. Four local groups — Veterans of Foreign Wars, Rotary Club, Jaycees, and Early Bird Kiwanis — will keep up sections of the boulevard. If that works, volunteer maintenance efforts may expand.

The final lower-priority item was resolution of the Beal Street bridge, which has been closed for years because it was deemed unsafe. No funds have been available for repair.

Council members agreed to put the issue on a future City Council agenda for discussion of whether repairing the bridge is even desirable. If so, it will go onto the "on hold" list, along with a city hall elevator, recodification of the city ordinance books, and expanding the Historic District.

Items on the list of projects to be finalized were Northville Estates water and sewer and Elmsmere drainage. Ayers suggested adding to the list improvements to the Lexington Condominiums pond, a recent project just about complete.

Council members also agreed to add as a goal the establishment of a stronger non-residential tax base in the city. "That's something I'd like the city manager as part of his goals to be working toward. All of us, really," Mittman said.

Not content just to produce plays, Northville restaurateurs John and Toni Genitti are building a playhouse of their own.

The Genittis are busy turning Charles Freydl's former menswear store at 112 E. Main St. into a 115-seat theater. They hope to have the project finished by Nov. 1.

John Genitti and friend Ray Casterline were busy renovating the room last week, tearing down wallpaper and trim and chipping away at an inch-thick layer of plaster over the original brick wall. Their work revealed some surprises as well as the expected brick. A tile ceiling was uncovered when the false ceiling was torn down, and a beveled glass window discovered behind the wooden storefront.

By Thursday, with the help of restaurant employees, friends, and cast members from the Genittis' recent production of *Fiddler on the Roof*, the

brick walls were nearly bare and the room had been transformed.

Genitti said the new playhouse should compare in size to the recently renovated Gem Theater in downtown Detroit. "We won't have the surroundings they do, but it'll be nice and intimate," he said, wiping the plaster dust from his T-shirt.

The restaurateurs plan to stick with the vaudeville, comedy and operatic performances that have proven popular during dinner theater performances at their Hole-in-the-Wall restaurant.

"I'm not going into big productions," Genitti said. "We have our niche, and that's been working for us."

The theater will also be available for other productions and other uses altogether, he said. "There's a lot of people who don't need a 300-seat venue."

The new theater is not the only addition to the Genittis' Main Street locations, just the latest. Genitti's craft shop at 116 E. Main was recently joined by Christmas & A Whole Lot More at 118 E.

Main, an extension of the gift shop at the 108 E. Main St. restaurant.

"We needed more room," Genitti explained. "We did as much as we could in the confines of this building and just busted out at the seams."

"It's just a natural progression. What are you going to do? You can't sit still."

Sharing space at the new Christmas store will be Kitchen Witch owner Ronnie Cambra. Genitti predicted that such joint ventures will become more common between retailers with related products.

"It's certainly that way with antiques; there's safety in numbers," he said.

"I think a lot more businesses might take a look at that," he added. "When people shop, they just go and go and go. They probably don't even look at the name on the building . . . It's what's inside."

Genitti laughed when asked how many more of Northville's retail locations he planned to lease. "I'll quit when I get to Livonia," he said, smiling.

RideShare connects counties

Improvements in the RideShare carpool and vanpool matching service of the Ann Arbor Transportation Authority (AATA) are now making it easier for Wayne County residents commuting into Washtenaw County to share the daily ride.

"Improvements like the development of computerized matching, rather than matching by hand, and the inclusion of RideShare information in a new series of worksite employee transportation programs, are generating interest from more applicants, making it easier to match people successfully," said Lois Crawford, coordinator of the AATA RideShare program.

● **Free Matching** Carpool and vanpool matching is available free of charge to local commuters who deal every day with growing traffic and parking problems, particularly in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti area, and who understand the benefits of choosing to share rides rather than continuing to drive alone.

These benefits include saving money on the costs of gasoline, parking, maintenance and, in some cases, insurance, as well as the reduction in stress that is possible when driving responsibilities are shared.

● **Vanpool assistance** In addition to its matching service, AATA's RideShare program assists commuters interested in forming new vanpools in organizing their groups, finding riders, leasing a van through the state's MichiVan program and setting rules for the vanpool group.

In addition to the 15 passenger vans which have been offered through MichiVan for a number of years, smaller seven-passenger minivans are now available for lease for vanpool use.

RideShare also distributes maps of the locations of Michigan Department of Transportation commuter carpool lots and AATA Park-and-Ride lots, where carpools can park free and ride AATA buses to downtown Ann Arbor.

● **Mobility Plan** The improvements in the AATA RideShare program have been made as part of a larger plan to improve mobility in the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti urban area. The City of Ann Arbor, the University of Michigan and the Ann Arbor Transportation Authority worked cooperatively in 1990 to develop the city's 20-year Comprehensive Transportation Plan, which calls for a five-year effort to reduce traffic and parking demand through ridesharing, mass transit and other demand management strategies, Crawford said.

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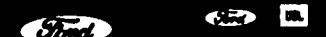

Board springs for fire washer

The Township Board on Monday agreed to spend almost \$6,000 on a Fire Department washer and dryer, but officials say they weren't taken to the cleaners.

A federal law requiring emergency services workers to use special cleaning methods to wash uniforms exposed to blood-borne pathogens prompted the unforeseen expense, fire officials said.

The cleaning of such contaminated clothing apparently requires more than a trip to the Jiffy Wash Coin-Op with a handful of quarters.

"If we have an accident where we get blood (on) our coats, we need to wash it out of there," said fire Chief Rick Rosselle.

Clothing soiled by potentially contaminated blood must be washed in a chemical-laced detergent in water reaching 160 degrees, said firefighter Guy Balok. The size, type, and durability of the washing machine is the reason for that item's \$5,200 price tag, Rosselle said.

Township Manager Richard Henningsen said the township considered farming out its laundry chores, but figured that move would be too costly — and potentially leave firefighters sans gear during emergency situations.

The township reportedly explored some cost-sharing possibilities with other communities. Henningsen said Plymouth Township showed little interest in joining a washer and dryer club, and mentioned that one unnamed community plans to ignore the federal guideline.

Audience member and Supervisor-elect Karen Baja asked if Northville city had been contacted about a possible washing machine co-funding plan. It had not, Henningsen said, although on Tuesday he promised to explore the idea with city officials.

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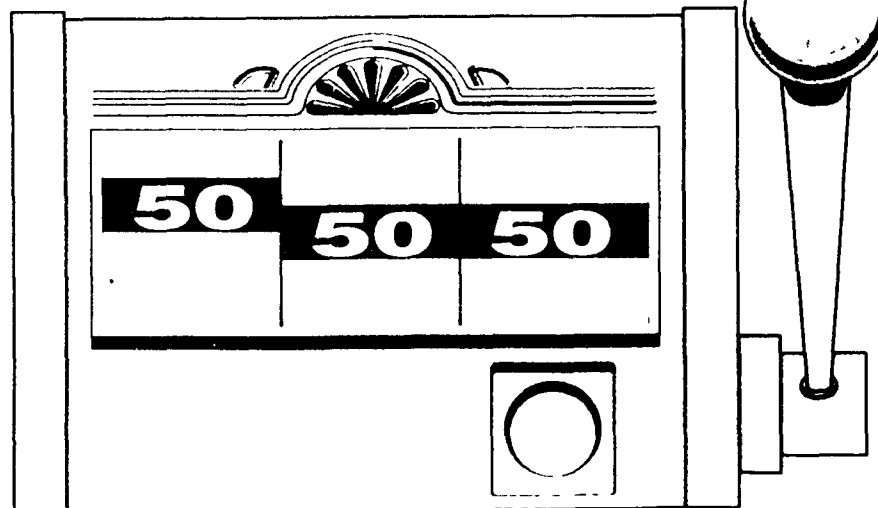

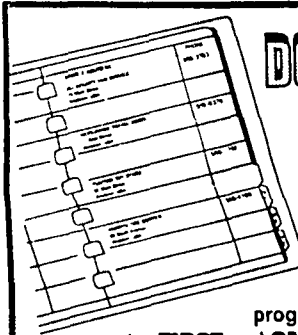

Libertarian wades into 11th race

Just when you thought the slugfest of the August primary election left two contenders for the 11th congressional district — a third has entered the fray.

Brian Wright announced recently that he will join Democrat Walter Briggs and Republican Joseph Knollenberg in the battle for the hearts and minds of the district, which includes the City of Northville above Baseline Road.

In an Aug. 17 news release announcing his candidacy, the 43-year-old Keego Harbor resident says he has spent his adult life witnessing the decline of the country and community under the leadership of the two leading political parties. He is urging voters to elect Libertarians "to free up the system and enable people to solve the myriad so-

cial and economic problems bequeathed to them through decades of Republican and Democrat rule."

Wright, a technical writer at a Livonia software company, favors a repeal of the personal income tax, a limit to legislative terms, making payments to Social Security voluntary, ending all government subsidies to business and agriculture, and turning welfare, private education and transportation over to the private sector.

Libertarians are "pro-choice in everything," he says in his campaign flier, which is written in blank verse. This includes reproductive freedom.

"Our homegrown American neofascists would also hold pregnant women in bondage, forcing them to bear children for God or the fatherland, just as they once drafted young men to fight, kill and die in foreign lands," he contends.

As Wright sees it, the government has failed in

its economic and social programs and has no business in imposing ethical standards on its citizenry. "Considering the substantial number of sleazy characters in government, one immediately sees the idea of government legislating morality as ludicrous. Further, government attempting to do so represents a serious violation of the U.S. Constitution."

The Libertarian Party of Michigan is running 25 candidates statewide this year for offices ranging from state Supreme Court to the state House of Representatives.

On the party's presidential ticket is Nevada business person Andre Marrou and Nancy Lord, a Washington, D.C., physician and lawyer.

The 11th District, with approximately 400,000 registered voters, spans Southfield and Bloomfield Hills west to Lyon and Highland townships.

Historic house on move

Bill Garfield is packing up and moving, but it'll take more than a van to haul his goods.

Garfield, one of the owners of the historic Thornton House, says the building will likely be transferred to a new location by mid-September.

The small 1830s era house currently sits on Nine Mile Road, not far from Home Sweet Home restaurant. Garfield and another member of the Thornton House Partnership plan to hire a firm specializing in moving buildings to take it to a new spot on Eleven Mile near Taft Road.

The Greek Revival farmhouse, once owned by Novi pioneer Sally Thornton, will be trucked north on Novi Road, west across Ten Mile Road and through Cedar Springs subdivision to its new home.

"It would have been cheaper to build a replica of the house, but then it wouldn't be the real thing. It costs thousands and thousands of dollars to move a house like this," Garfield said.

Overhead utility wires must be lifted as the house cruises down the road. Traffic must be stopped by police.

Garfield already has the building permit to place the 1,500 square-foot house on a new foundation and double its size with a new wing, he said. The addition will be placed to the rear and off to one side of the antique structure. The interior will be modernized but will keep its historic presence, Garfield said.

But the exterior will look closer to its original condition than the home has for years, he added. This includes attaching copper gutters, replacing asphalt shingles with cedar shake shingles and adjusting the screening in of the porch so the Grecian style columns will again be visible.

The old doors will be kept, as will the original wood floors and stairs — treads and all.

"They've (the treads) been walked on by millions of people over the years. They're curved. You can feel the ages walking down those stairs. As people step into this house they will have the feeling of the 19th century all around them," Garfield said.

Garfield says his target is to have the Thornton home and its companion, a replica of another 19th century house, completed by early 1993.

The second house will be modeled after the Hawthorne House in Northville Township. The historic building on Haggerty Road south of Seven Mile Road — just across from Schoolcraft College — is currently owned by the state and prey to vandals, Garfield said.

"I'd like to get more history of the thing. It just reeks of 19th century atmosphere," he said. "A couple of years ago I was driving around there and the leaves were off the trees and I said, 'wow.'"

"It'll complement the Thornton House real well."

Together, the two homes will create "Old Novi Village" on 3.5 acres of land.

The once modest Thornton house will be reincarnated as the Thornton Estate. Garfield said that tennis courts, a swimming pool and a riding stable could be accommodated on the lot. The house will be available for purchase for under a half million dollars.

A new owner hasn't been found yet. But tight economy or not, the buyers are out there in that price range, he said.

"It will be an expensive item. We're creating an estate," Garfield added.

"I am creating something that will be a delight to a family for decades to come."

The Thornton House Partnership is in no way connected with the Garfield Construction Company, Garfield said. The Northville-based firm specializing in historical restoration and owned by his sons recently filed for bankruptcy.

To build the Hawthorne House, Garfield will need a lot split from Novi.

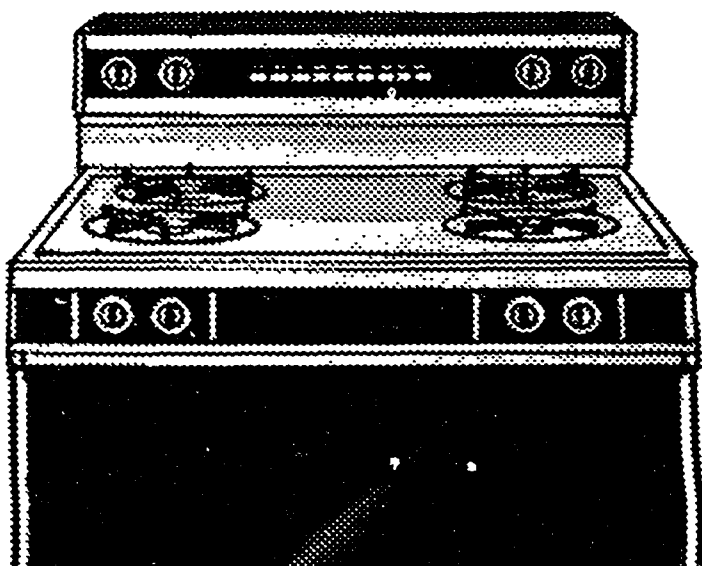
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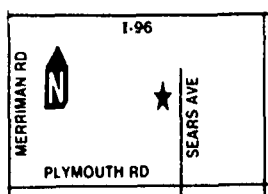

hope to develop the Beck Road park site. The department was willing to top the 3.3-percent interest rate currently earned by the water and sewer fund, he said.

"In my mind, we're giving water and sewer a chance to invest their money at a . . . higher rate," Romine said.

Estimates offered by Recreation Department consultants place the cost at about \$300,000 for grading, seeding and developing soccer and baseball fields on the Beck site between Five Mile and Six Mile roads.

Almost \$110,000 now rests in a Recreation Department park development fund, and Romine and Gottschalk projected that a \$220,000 loan could be repaid within 10 years through park surcharge fees.

But the township refused to bite. Trustee Thomas Handyside, who also serves as chairperson of the township Water and Sewer Commission, discouraged the loan idea, saying the \$8-million account was spec-

ifically designed for water and sewer activities.

"We didn't feel that specific use included loans to other entities," Handyside said. "We didn't feel parks and rec was a government unit in the first place. You are not a group of us," he told Romine and Gottschalk.

Handyside also said local voters sent a clear message when they rejected a 1989 recreation millage request. He said the Recreation Department "could go to hell in a hand-basket next year," making a water and sewer loan a risky proposition.

Romine said recreation officials were seeking "creative ways" to finance the park, which has sat dormant and weed-choked since it was obtained from the state in the early 1980s.

While the board voiced no enthusiasm for a restricted fund loan, it did throw a bouquet of sorts to a commercial loan proposal.

National Bank of Detroit has expressed interest in lending the township the \$220,000, Romine said. Terms would include an interest rate

of between 5.7 - 6 percent for a five-year balloon loan with an actual 10-year repayment schedule.

Most board members said the township should investigate the commercial loan. Others, like Handyside and Clerk Tom Cook, did not.

"I personally can't see it," Cook said. "I'd rather see you go for a millage on it."

But trustees Richard Ambler and James Nowka, Treasurer Jack Hosmer and Supervisor Betty Lennox voted to ask township legal representatives to lay the groundwork for a possible loan. That chore will include meeting with city officials, bank officials, and township financial consultants.

Time is of the essence if the park is to take shape this year, Romine said. The recreation department is set to receive bids from park development hopefuls Sept. 8, and must decide soon what to do with the park.

"We are now at the 11th hour," he said. "We should have known all these problems eight years ago when we received this property from the state."

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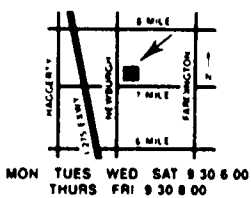
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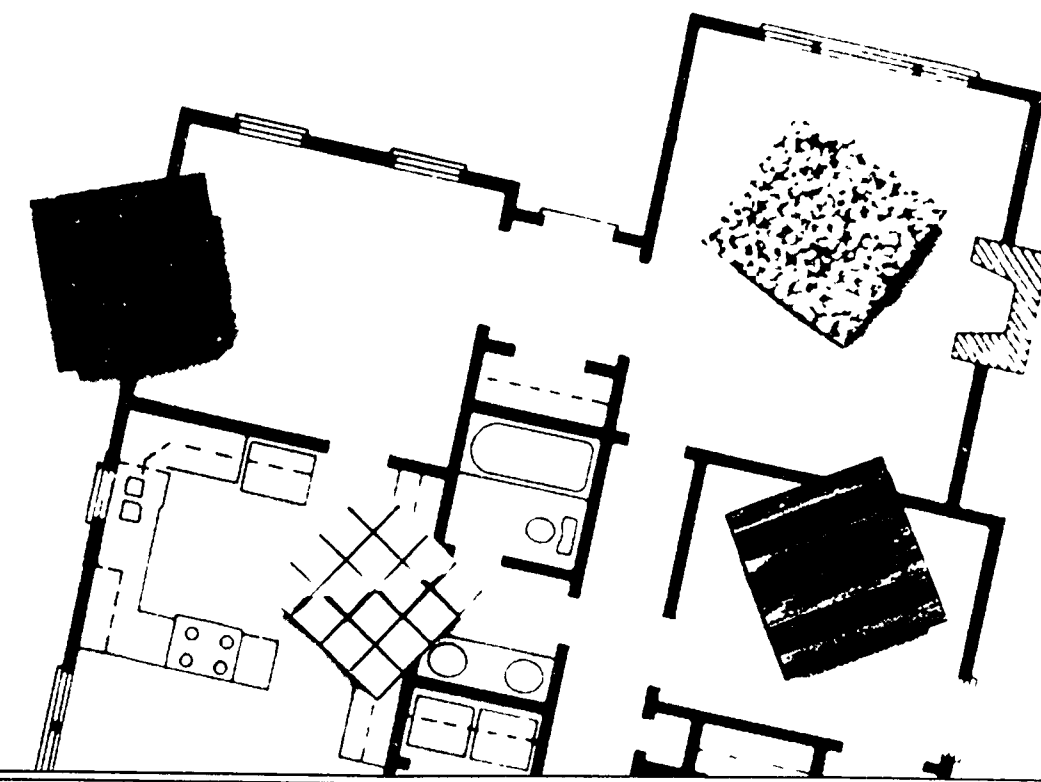
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District readies for challenging school year

In what seemed to be a state of the district address, school administrators Monday night reported out the progress their departments have made in readying for the new year. At the close of 1991-92 school year when the June 8 millage request failed, school officials knew they were in for a long, sticky summer.

They weren't kidding. In an effort to trim the budget and make ends meet in the 1992-93 school year, officials suffered through a 10-percent staff reduction which claimed the jobs of 17 teachers, eight custodians, two central office staffers, 4.5 secretaries, seven bus drivers, one mechanic, one operations supervisor, a parking lot attendant and a slew of high school hall monitors.

With those cuts came the demise of 73 course sections at the high school, district funding of athletic and co-curricular programs, and existing bus stops. They were replaced with larger class sizes districtwide, a pay-to-participate plan for both athletics and co-curricular programs,

and 1.5-mile magnet bus stops. "We suffered a 7.3-percent cutback in teachers at the high school, which equates to 73 sections," said Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for Instructional Services. "That's a major blow to what we are all about."

To make matters worse, the district will see an increase in enrollments this year at every grade level, school officials said. Even though they don't have actual enrollment figures yet, school officials anticipate seeing about 175 new students' faces

in the schools this year.

Summer school enrollments provided a glimmer of hope. Enrollments in the summer school program jumped 28 percent and the percentage of Northville's contracted teachers involved with the summer program has grown to 83 percent from 30 percent in the last three years. While class sizes have remained relatively the same since 1990, revenues from the summer program generated a total of \$4,521, a marked increase over the 1991 (\$1,316) and 1990 (\$623) revenues.

R. Roy Danley, director of personnel, was optimistic as he announced that the district had finally settled on a contract with the International Union of Operating Engineers Local Number 547. The one-year agreement, which won unanimous support of the board, grants a 3.5-percent raise for food service, maintenance, transportation and custodial employees for the 1992-93 year.

That union is one of the four collective bargaining units with which the district has contracts. The other five employee groups are non-affiliated groups that don't have the leverage to bargain for itemized contracts.

The district has settled with its administrators union (NASA) earlier this year and with its central office administrators group. Both those groups agreed to a pay freeze for the upcoming year.

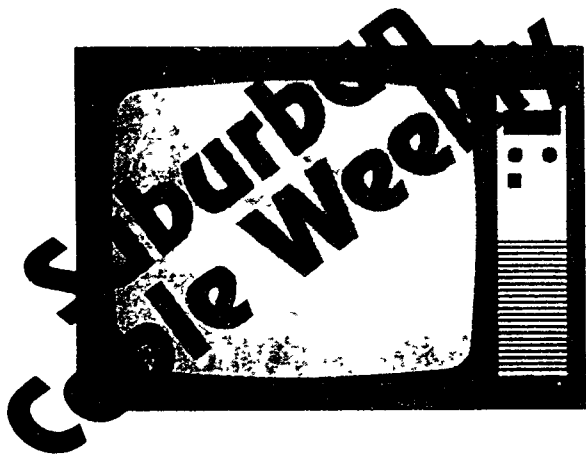

they hold with the district now, plus "step" increases for longevity. That contract expires June 30, 1993. District officials will begin to negotiate a new contract with their teachers in February.

There are still two employees groups that have yet to settle contracts. Those are the Northville Federation of Paraprofessionals and the Michigan Federation of Teachers (AFT, AFL, CIO). Each group has requested state mediators, Danley said Monday.

All the other employee groups — with the exception of the district nurses in the center program — that had contracts expire this year have all been granted new contracts for one year.

Last month the board unanimously accepted contractual agreements with the non-bargaining unit of secretaries and with its occupational therapist in the center program. The 31 secretaries were granted a 3-percent raise for the year, while the district's occupational therapist was granted a 3.5-percent raise.



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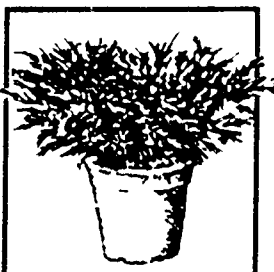
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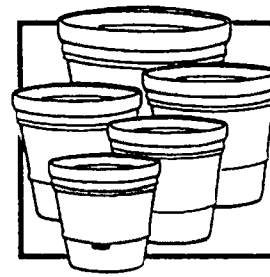
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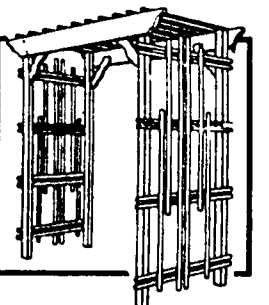
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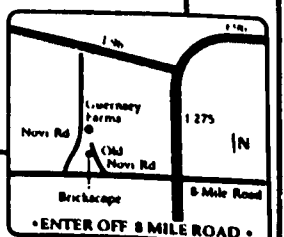
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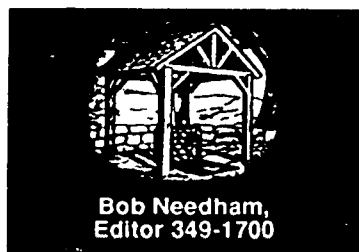

Strangeness reigns, but decision correct

When the going gets near, the weirdness gets going.

Trust us, if you were at the lame-duck Township Board's Monday evening session, you'd understand perfectly that opening line.

In a flashback sequence, let us retrace it for you:

In April, the township kicked off a motor carrier enforcement ordinance. The idea was to obligate a pair of township police officers to a motor carrier/weightmaster program that would enforce safety, weight, and equipment standards on trucks traveling through Northville Township.

Lots of trucks use township-situated highways and byways. Browning-Ferris Industries operates a huge landfill just across the township border at Six Mile and Napier. Also located there is an asphalt plant operated by Holloway Sand and Gravel. The site attracts trucks like flies to a bug zapper.

Overweight trucks, too, as well as those with faulty taillights, bad tires, roaring mufflers, etc., although the overweight trucks are what this current ruckus is all about. In all, a sensible and sound program.

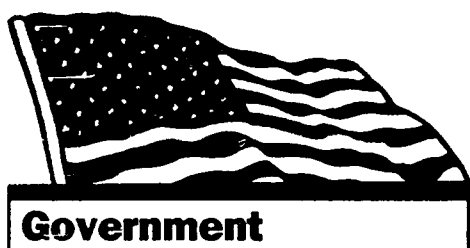
Seems the trucking industry didn't take too kindly to receiving tickets and fines that can reach \$5,000, however. It takes a few bags of garbage to equal that amount.

According to township officials, including Police Chief Chip Snider, some segments of the trucking industry were so put out by the motor carrier ordinance that lawsuits and other not-so-civil, but well-placed, threats were issued. Snider told the board that the township's preferred-status garbage collector is willing to dump its contract if its trucks continue to be stopped.

We don't know if that's true, because a Midwest Sanitation official did not return our call Tuesday.

But other issues demand attention. Snider, speaking as forcefully as he has with the board, told of an alleged bribe offer from someone in the industry to the local police union. He also said one of his officers had been the target of a death threat. But he says he doesn't wish to follow up with a criminal complaint or investigation, for reasons we don't completely understand.

From its standpoint, the trucking industry apparently feels the township is selectively enforcing its ordinance, and is picking out big, juicy, overweight trucks to pump ticket revenue into its depleted coffers. Maybe, maybe not. But the fact remains that if an ordinance — based on state law — limits weights to a certain amount, trucks shouldn't be hauling at that weight. The law's the law. Anyway, Snider appeared before the

board Monday and asked for \$33,000 for a new decked-out, combination motor carrier and traffic enforcement vehicle. After considerable debate, the board said no. Not because of a lawsuit threat, or because it doesn't approve of the weightmaster program, but because this was an unbudgeted expense and a lame-duck board shouldn't be tossing around those dollars.

Bravo. But the weirdness that preceded that proper decision is worthy of mention.

Trustee Thomas Handyside sat in on the discussion and voted against the vehicle funding proposal, even though Handyside is the big wheel at BFI's Salem Township landfill. He said he secretly was voting on a proposed vehicle expense, and that his position had nothing to do with the issue.

That's absolutely ridiculous. Handyside had stepped aside during several previous motor carrier ordinance sessions. His tenure on the board is nearing completion, and he cast a vote against a vehicle — and a program — that has been a thorn in BFI's side. Handyside's refusal to step aside was almost surreal, so pronounced was his conflict of interest.

And guess what? Not one board member spoke up to challenge Handyside. Not Betty Lennox, the supervisor, who should have pushed the point, or any other of the attending board. And this is the group that chafed at the thought of giving up its role as the township's ethics committee?

Despite the strangeness of the motor carrier case, some credit is due the board for shelving the vehicle expense. That's the next board's call, and Snider shouldn't have attempted to push through an unbudgeted expense at this time.

As in the past, taxpayers have Treasurer Jack Hosmer to thank for watching over their tax dollars. While the rest of the board was swept up in Snider's dramatic commentary, Hosmer was compiling excellent questions and points that effectively diffused the urgency of the request.

Come back at budget time and ask for it next year, Hosmer said. And in a meeting riddled with strange behavior, he was right.

Watch for upheaval in 1994



Politicians always tell you, "This election is crucial — a turning point in history." No so. The big one is coming up in 1994, and there is reason for moderates to be nervous.

You scratch your head. 1994? Governor? U.S. senator? We elect those all the time.

Ever since Michigan became a state, we have voted every 16 years on whether to revise the state constitution. We held a Constitutional Convention in 1961-2, rejected a Con-Con by 3-1 in 1978 and vote again in 1994.

For three years, there's been much talk about "choice" in education. So far it has been either choice between public schools — inter-district or intra-district.

The fundamentalist 1992 Republican national platform, however, talks about choice involving public and private schools. At last weekend's Republican state convention, the Mackinac Center began peddling the notion of "full" choice — a state voucher that parents could take to any school — public, private, proprietary or parochial.

The barrier to this proposed raid on the treasury is — you guessed it — the state constitution's ban on parochial aid (Art. VIII, Sec. 2).

Well, shucks, you might shrug, that's just one arch-conservative group. Think again.

The GOP's religious right wing, including the Right to Life folks, had 45 percent of the convention delegates. Silently, they put forward candidates without trotting them around the caucuses, giving out resumes or handing out signs.

They blistered PA 25, calm breathing, problem solving.

critical thinking, globalism and teacher accreditation. They praised McGuffey's Readers, Latin and parochial schools. Away from the microphones, I heard mutterings about creationism.

Don't scoff. This group practically put Michigan in the Pat Robertson camp in 1986-88 without mainstream Republicans being aware they were at work. In this year's primary, without big TV buys or literature drops, but with plenty of organization, they nominated Right to Life-backed candidates in half of Michigan's congressional districts. They are on a holy crusade to "take back our culture."

If a Con-Con is called, delegates will be elected in 1995, when most voters are asleep. The religious right could pull it off.

Meanwhile, there are a lot of other ideas, from both left and right, floating around that could come to the fore in a Con-Con:

- "Equity" in school funding, from both the conservatives and liberals who tried to bring us tax-base sharing. The idea is to write constitutional language that would invite a lawsuit. Suburbia would be a big, big loser.

- Civil service. The current constitution limits the number of state jobs that come under patronage. I have it on excellent authority that civil service will come under severe attack.

- Abortion. Besides a right to life proposal, we'll see plans to prohibit abortions in public hospitals. The left will have a no-holds-barred abortion rights plank.

- Regionalism. Weak as they are, regional planning and public transit agencies could be eroded.

- Expression. "Every person may freely speak, write, express and publish his views..." It says now (Art. I, Sec. 5). But two members of the state Board of Education think students should be left out.

Both inclusion and exclusion



I remember the good ol' days when presidential candidates strode down flag-decked, jam-packed Woodward Avenue to rouse the troops on Cadillac Square. In those days, the Labor Day weekend kicked off the campaign in Michigan.

This year will be no different, although everything will be sadly diminished: the flags fewer, the crowds sparse, the streets dirty, the candidates somehow less

mythic.

But the stakes will be just as high, maybe higher. Michigan, the archetypical example of the hollowing out of America's manufacturing might, will be one of the key states where the vote will determine the next president.

Following the state Republican and Democratic conventions last weekend, the Labor Day break offers a time for a few reflections before we are overwhelmed by political hype and pander.

Any political party defines itself by determining "what to keep in, what to keep out," as the Bob Seger song says. Whom you try to attract and whom you repel serve to define what your party is, what it stands for, to what swing groups it can appeal.

In these recent days of wholesale TV-driven politics, both parties have tended to bring in as many people as possible, to fudge the differences between them, to occupy the middle of the spectrum. Lee Atwater, the late national GOP chair, put it best when he talked about the necessity of the Republican Party's being "one big tent" in the context of the abortion issue.

Which is why I was so surprised to listen to the different rhetoric coming out of the national and then the Michigan

state conventions last weekend.

Republicans were full of talk that I can describe only as exclusionary. At times it almost seemed as though speakers were defining the party in terms of what it was against.

Homosexuals and lesbians, certainly. Mothers who chose to work rather than staying home with the kids, probably. People who had been divorced or had a single-parent family, maybe. Taxers and liberals, by all means.

The litmus test, of course, was opposition to abortion. Gov. John Engler won the major fight of the convention when his candidate for the University of Michigan Board of Regents was opposed by Right to Life of Michigan because she was insufficiently ferocious in her opposition to abortion rights.

By contrast, the Democrats (for once thinking seriously they might win the presidency) were full of inclusionary talk. I heard the phrase "one big tent" more than once last weekend in Detroit.

Why the difference? History, as usual. It looks as though the Republican coalition that has dominated American politics for the last 20 years is beginning to fall apart.

Southern conservatives, Bloomfield Hills business types, anti-abortion blue-collar families from western Wayne and Macomb counties all could rally behind a program featuring social values, opposition to taxes and anti-Communism. But now that the Cold War is over and the spiraling deficit has gutted traditional economic theory, splits are starting to show up between the component groups.

And any complex group whose constituents are pulling and hauling in different directions is likely to value highly doctrinal purity. This entails defining who and what are out, which means exclusionary rhetoric.

Whether that gets votes in November remains to be seen.

Old system just not cutting it

To the editor:

As a Northville resident of seven years, with one child entering NPS kindergarten and two other children remaining at the Christian school they've attended for the past three years, I had to chuckle a little (although it really wasn't funny), at the difference in the orientation I attended at the public school versus the Christian school orientation.

NPS was a poorly organized and negative experience as a sense of "feeling sorry for ourselves" due to the millage defeat, permeated every conversation.

The Christian school orientation, however, was overwhelmingly positive and encouraging. The curriculum, advanced studies, clubs, sports, and community services being offered at this school was more than I've ever seen anywhere, public or private.

The attitude of parents was so positive. There was no grumbling about needed participation in homework, playground, or activities, as well as no complaining about no busing available or the cost of tuition.

Witnessing the difference in education when people have a say in where and how their money is spent showed me that real "schools of choice" is not far behind. Editor's note: This is a copy of a letter sent to Brian Breslin, vice president of public and consumer affairs for Meijer Corp.

Dear Mr. Breslin:

The high rate of crime at the Northville Township Meijer store including car thefts, assaults and most recently the murder of Michael Bebeau has promoted this letter.

Incident after incident have been reported and printed regularly in our local newspaper, The Northville Record. Our township police force continues to bear this burden. Our generally otherwise peaceful community continues to be disrupted by repeated crimes committed at the Eight Mile and Haggerty Road location.

Meanwhile the Meijer Corporation has done very little to discourage these offenses.

Until the store provides obvious security personnel at both the

Steps not taken to provide uniformed security at the Northville Township store have proved neglectful.

A few weeks ago I was helping distribute food and a young man came in asking for assistance with his rent. I was assigned to find out more information about Joe (not his real name).

Joe was raised in Northville and went to the school system until he was 12 years old. At that time he got into "trouble" and was placed outside of the home in youth homes, foster homes and military schools. When I inquired about the type of "trouble" he got into, he said, "nothing worse than what my friends did." I did not probe any further.

Once he graduated from high school from

one of these institutions, he enrolled in college and completed two years at a junior college. He was able to support himself with part-time jobs and a full college scholarship. Approximately a year ago he decided to return to Northville to reunite with his family, but they did not want to begin a relationship with him. They basically let him know that he was on his own.

Since coming "home" he has worked odd jobs, lived in a room in a sub-standard apartment building and eaten very sparingly at local restaurants. When he came into Civic Concern he was not only thin and in need of rent money because he was between jobs and couldn't make the week's rent, but he also had a difficult time seeing.

He told me he had worn glasses in the past but they had gotten broken. Knowing that glasses are definitely a necessity, my wheels starting turning and I told him I would see what I could do about his dilemma.

I really wasn't sure what I was going to do about Joe's problem, but I told him I would get back with him. On my way home I thought it couldn't hurt to ask Northville Vision Clinic if they could help Joe.

A few days later I stopped in the clinic and told Joe's story to a woman who works there,

and she immediately let me speak to the optometrist. I began telling him Joe's story and without hesitation he said, "Tell him to come in for a free exam and glasses." I hadn't even completed my explanation of Joe's need and he generously volunteered their donation. It was one of the most heart-warming experiences I have encountered, and it brought tears to my eyes that there are people in this community who truly care about others.

A whole hearted thank-you goes out to Northville Vision Clinic, to the people who have helped so generously with their time by being Northville Youth Assistance volunteers and those who have donated financially to this community.

One of the things that Joe said to me that has stuck in my mind was that "many people in Northville don't believe people like me exist here." Well, Joe, I know you're here and so do the good folks at Northville Vision Clinic, and we are willing to help you.

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Debate rages on township motor carrier plan

Snider agrees that the program has earned the township thousands of dollars in fines, but says truckers are paying because they operate illegally.

"All we've done is enforce the law," he said. Trucks that once "ran free and ran easy" are now being stopped for safety, weight, and equipment problems, he said.

And threats are close companions to the tickets, Snider said.

He said township Supervisor Betty Lennox and Manager Richard Henningsen have been targeted with "psychological intimidation" since the program began last April. The township's garbage hauler allegedly threatened to pull the plug on its collection services contract, an issue Snider alluded to and Henningsen supported.

Henningsen said he was contacted earlier this year by a representative of Midwest Sanitation, the township's preferred-status garbage collector. The firm reportedly was incensed by costly overweight vehicle tickets written by township officers.

A Midwest Sanitation employee, Robert Matzo, reportedly told Henningsen the firm might drop its contract unless the township scrapped the motor carrier program.

"He said the boss was so mad he

thought that might be happening," Henningsen said.

Matzo could not be reached for comment and did not return a reporter's call by deadline Tuesday.

Fines for some overweight vehicle tickets reach as high as \$5,000, Snider said. Apparently, that cost is sufficient to prompt other threats.

Snider said the Police Department

has learned that one of the trucking firms may have made a death threat against one of the township's two mo-

tor carrier enforcement officers. Snider also alleged that a bribe was offered through him to the Police Of-

ficers Association of Michigan (POAM), in exchange for abandonment of the motor carrier ordinance.

Despite the alleged threats, the Police Department has not moved to investigate the charges, Snider said.

Concerning the alleged death threat, Snider said, "I want to (investigate), but the police officer involved is emphatic; he doesn't want to place (individual trucking sources) in jeopardy."

Snider said he had been offered a bribe, but he refused to reveal details. "I'm not going to comment on that, (but) it was made very clearly to me," he said.

Snider said he did not direct his comments at Handyside, who earlier this year approached the township about granting his employer, Browning-Ferris Industries, a variance on the weight restriction portion of the motor carrier ordinance.

Handyside said he was unaware of any threats to the township or its officials.

"There's nobody that I know of that's made any bribes or attempted bribes to the police chief," he said.

Handyside has stepped down from his Township Board position each

time the motor carrier issue has come before the Township Board. In the past, Handyside has abstained from commenting and voting on motor carrier issues because of a "perceived" conflict of interest.

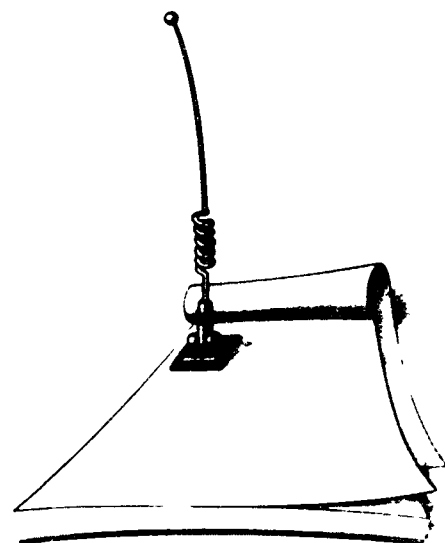
But not Monday night. He did not abstain and voted against the purchase of the motor carrier vehicle.

"The issue last night was whether to expend money for a police car," Handyside said. Asked if the proposed new motor carrier vehicle had any impact on BFI trucking operations, Handyside said, "I don't know if that's an issue. I looked at it as the guy's trying to buy a police car."

Handyside also confirmed that BFI is considering a lawsuit against the township, and will argue that the motor carrier ordinance is unconstitutional. He said that decision could follow an October court hearing set to measure the amount of fines against overweight BFI trucks.

Four board members — Lennox, Handyside, Treasurer Jack Hosmer, and Trustee James Nowka — voted against the motor carrier vehicle request. Clerk Tom Cook and Trustee Richard Ambler voted to purchase the vehicle.

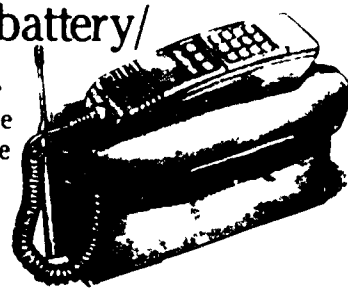

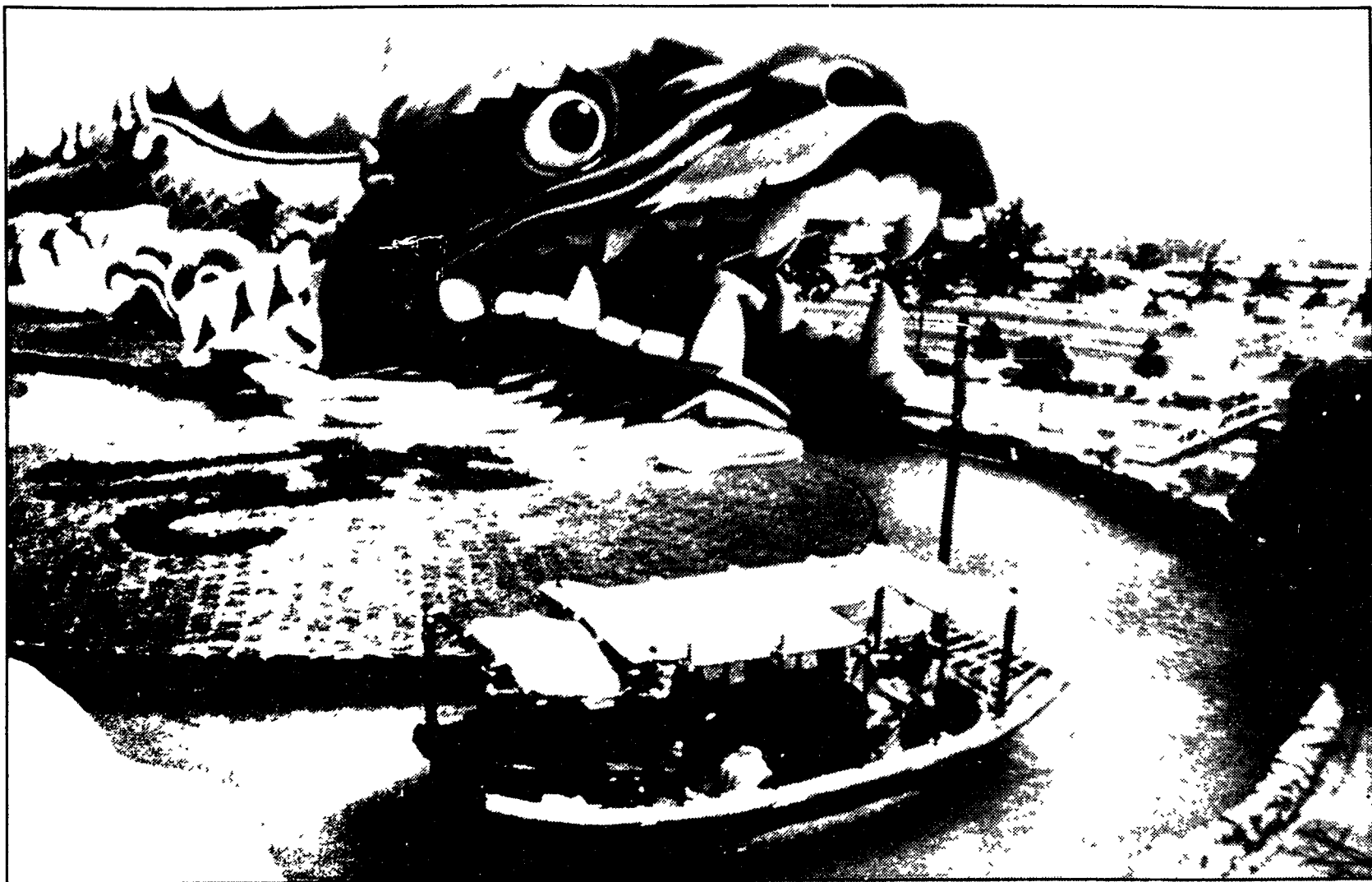

Back to the old, on with the new

Singapore hopes blend of restored past with new attractions will lure tourists

Some years ago officials at Singapore's Tourist Promotion Board noticed that most visitors found little to keep them on the island for longer than three days.

One of the main problems was that rapid development coupled with an almost fanatic preoccupation with cleanliness and order had leached the city of the exotic atmosphere that tourists flew to Asia to find.

Large parts of the city looked like a tropical version of any one of hundreds of indistinguishable mid-sized cities spread across North America and Europe.

Pragmatic as ever, the island-nation's planners decided to do whatever was necessary to increase the length of the average visitor's stay. The fruits of that decision are just beginning to blossom. Visitors will find not only a whole range of new attractions that take much from the designers of the various Disney worlds, but also clusters of turn-of-the-century or older buildings that have been restored, giving a breath of historical soul back to this sometimes spiritless city.

One of the finest examples of the time and money lavished on the city's architectural heritage is the 126-year-old neo-classical Empress Place Museum, at the southern end of the Cavenagh Bridge in the heart of Singapore's colonial center. It reopened as a museum in 1989.

The museum is showing, through October, a dazzling display of artifacts from Tang Dynasty China and the Silk Road trade route through Central Asia that connected China to the West. It is open daily from 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission is \$3.65. For more information call 3367633.

Just a short walk from the museum are the other main remnants of the colonial administration, which lasted from the early 19th century until 1959: the Supreme Court, the General Post Office, the Victoria Memorial Hall, the Cricket Club and City Hall, all built around the central padang—the cricket and rugby field that was the invariable centerpiece of British colonial town planning.

Two other preservation areas, at Emerald Hill just off the Orchard Road shopping district, and at Tanjong Pagar, adjacent to Chinatown, feature row upon row of restored pastel shop-houses—two- or three-story structures with living quarters above and shops at ground level that were the chief feature of old Singapore's architecture.

A stroll through the narrow alleys of Chinatown and into Tanjong Pagar—Temple Street, Pagoda Street, Smith Street, Sago Lane and Neil Road—past the Chinese medical halls with their sacks of spices and dried roots wafting out heady, unidentifiable smells, past the riot of characters scrawled over every surface in bright red and green paint, cannot help but conjure up the spirit of Singapore's colorful past.

SIGHTSEEING

Tang Dynasty City, located at 2 Yuan Ching Road, is a combination historical re-creation and movie studio in which copies of Tang Dynasty (A.D. 618 to 907) buildings are occupied by actors playing the parts of artisans, travelers, warriors, judges and the like.

Though only 40 percent complete, the complex is still worth a visit for its presentation of life during China's most glorious dynasty. The complex is open from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. Admission is \$9. For more information call 2611116.

A similar idea is at work in the recently refurbished Haw Par Villa, located at 262 Pasir Panjang Road. It is a kind of Chinese Disneyland, though on a smaller scale, woven around the presentation of Chinese myths and legends and complete with rides, dance and acrobatic performances and audio-visual shows.

Haw Par Villa is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission is \$3.75. For more information call 7740300.

Sentosa Underwater World, located on Siloso Road, Sentosa Island, opened its doors last spring. It centers around a huge tank containing many of the bizarre inhabitants of tropical reefs—the angelfish, stingrays, sharks, moray eels, the comical clown fish, the huge grouper.

An acrylic tunnel that winds around the bottom of the tank allows visitors a view that comes as close as possible to duplicating the experience of scuba diving without getting one's feet wet. It is open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Admission is \$5.65. For more information call 2750030.

Another natural attraction is the Jurong Bird Park, located on Jurong Hill. The park houses an astonishing variety of birds from all over the world, some 5,000 altogether, and puts on a bird show several times a day. The park is open daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission is \$3.75.

RESTAURANTS

The best introduction to the food of Singapore is at one of the many markets centers where Singaporeans do most of their eating at small stalls offering a dazzling variety of local dishes and excellent value.

The central Telok Ayer Food Center on the corner of Cross Street and Robinson Road has just reopened after an extensive restoration of the

beautiful cast-iron grillwork that covers its balconies, columns and high vaulted ceilings.

The area was previously one of the city's main markets and remains open air, cooled only by the numerous overhead fans and the breeze blowing in from the harbor.

There are two sit-down cafes on one side of the large hall offering Chinese dishes and seafood. On the opposite side is a series of counters offering favorite local dishes priced from \$2 to \$4.

Particularly good is the Hainanese specialty of boiled or roast chicken accompanied by rice cooked in chicken broth and chili and soyabased sauces.

Another famous food center is at Newton Circus, just around the corner from the city's main shopping district, Orchard Road. The vendors here are more aggressive than their brethren at the Telok Ayer market, but the huge number of stalls makes a visit well worthwhile.

Hokkien mee (noodles fried with shrimp) char gwei tiao (flat rice noodles fried with lots of chili) and fish coated with shrimp paste and grilled inside pandan leaves are all recommended and shouldn't cost more than \$2 to \$3 apiece. Don't order the lobster, however, it is far more expensive.

For seafood one of the region's great treats, the eight open-air restaurants clustered in the Seafood Center on the East Coast Parkway, are much more reasonably priced and consistently tasty. The chili crab, one of the island's great specialties, and crabs fried in black bean sauce both run about \$2.70 a pound.

Another local cuisine, prepared by descendants of immigrants from south India, the Tamils, can be found in a row of restaurants clustered

together on Racecourse Road in Singapore's Little India section.

All are of similar quality, but Banana Leaf Apollo, located at 56 Racecourse Road, has proved consistent over the years. Fish-head curry—about \$10 for a small head, enough for three—is delicious. For more information call 2938628.

HOTELS

Singapore's top hotels are consistently rated among the best in the world and the competition seems to have permeated downward so that almost the entire spectrum from luxurious to budget offers attentive service and comfortable facilities.

The Oriental in the Marina Square complex, located at 5 Raffles Ave., is certainly a top choice; many repeat visitors swear by its extraordinarily attentive service and central location. It costs about \$225 a night for a double. For more information call 3380066.

The nearby Westin Stamford in the Raffles City complex, located at 2 Stamford Road, is in a tower 72 stories high and bills itself as the tallest hotel in the world. The rooms are comfortable and the location—directly over one of Singapore's biggest malls—is ideal for shoppers. It costs approximately \$180 for a double. For more information call 3388585.

Just across the road is the gloriously restored dowager empress of Singapore hotels, Raffles, located at 11 Beach Road. Some \$100 million was spent on the restoration and, with a minimum price of around \$395 for a double, the management is apparently trying to get that money back in a hurry. A veteran Wildcat team used a fast start to throttle the rebuilding Mustangs 61-23 on the road. Christine Edwards led the way for Novi with 18 points including a pair of three-point bombs in the first quarter.

The 'Cats jumped out to a 14-2 lead with less than half of the first frame gone by. All doubts to the outcome of the game were gone by half-time as Novi lead 40-8.

Wildcat coach John Hoffman was thrilled to get a victory right out of the shoot.

"To say the least, I was very pleased," he said. "We played well and the girls were in the right spots."

The Wildcats finished the quarter by outscoring Northville 9-1. They led 23-5 after the first as Edwards pumped in 10 points.

Novi continued the domination in the second.

The Wildcats tacked on seven more points to start the quarter as four different players scored. Freshman Nicole Hayden, one of the Mustangs' bright spots in the game, scored on a quick baseline move to the basket and gave Northville its first points of the period.

Balanced Novi scoring and poor Mustang shooting put the 'Cats up 40-8 at halftime.

Edwards had 15 in the half followed by eight from Kelley Barton and six from Kenny. Birmingham led Northville with three points in the half.

"We don't expect Edwards to hit the threes," Hoffman said, adding

that Novi usually looks for higher percentage shots. "We like to move the ball around a lot and take the best shot."

After some Shoemaker adjustments at halftime, Northville came out more aggressive.

Pressure defense, including woman-to-woman and full-court pressing, gave Novi problems in the third. The Wildcats made a number of turnovers leading to Northville baskets.

Mustangs ready to tame South Lyon

Beating South Lyon tomorrow night will come down to one thing for the Mustang football team: stopping the run.

The Lions, kings of the Kennington Valley Conference jungle last year, run around, through and over opponents on the gridiron. Led by Billy Porter and Ken Nelson, South Lyon ran up close to 3,000 yards on the ground a year ago.

Northville coach Darrel Schumacher makes no bones about it: Those two Lions have to be tamed.

Schumacher will have one big surprise for South Lyon.

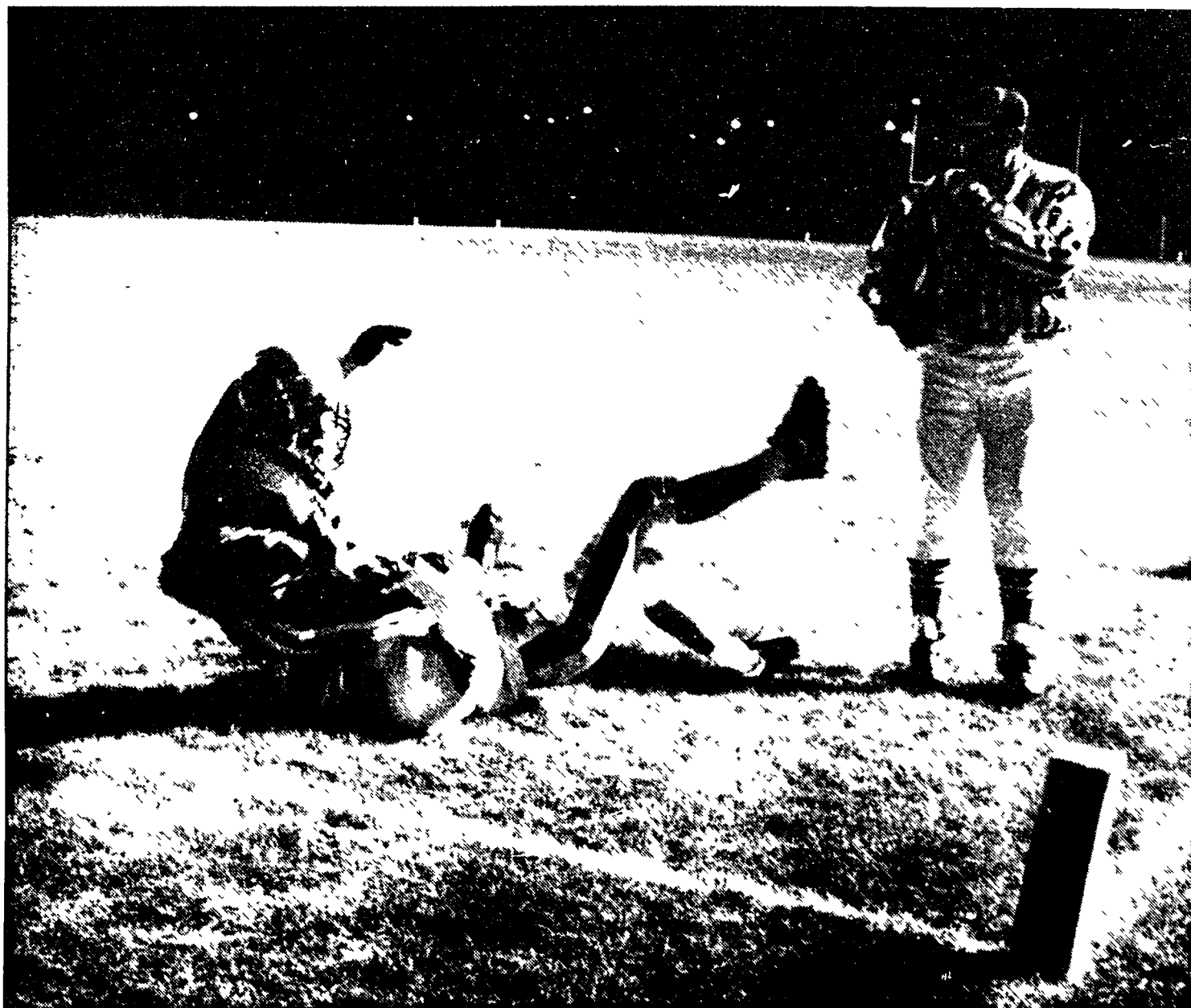
Senior Danny Walsh will start at quarterback over junior Marc Golden. The coach said Walsh had simply made more progress at that vital position to warrant the start.

Chris Parry and Katie Rompel.

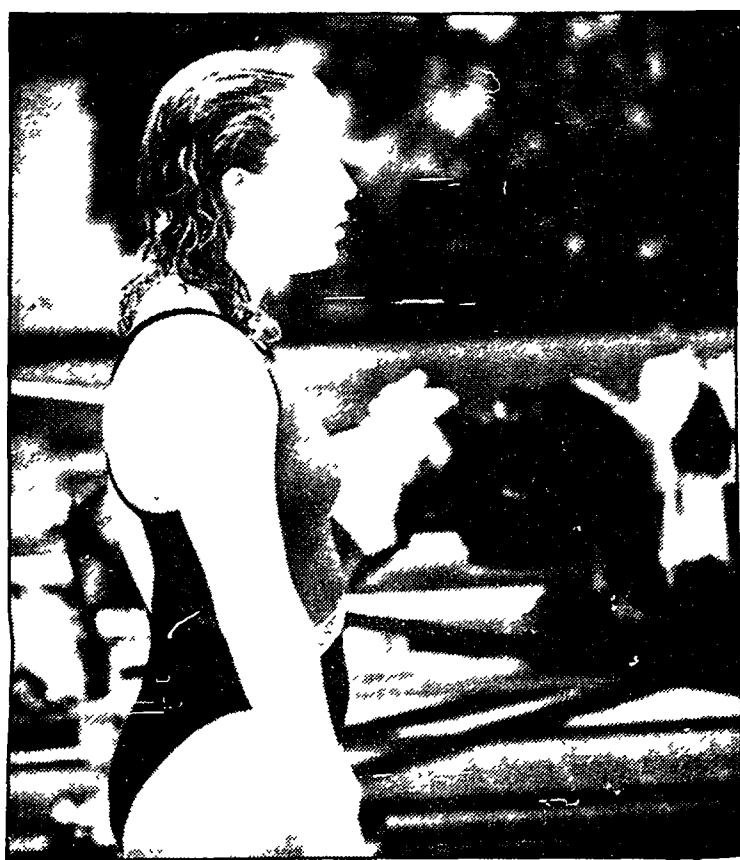
If conditioning counts for anything, the Mustangs will dunk most of their foes.

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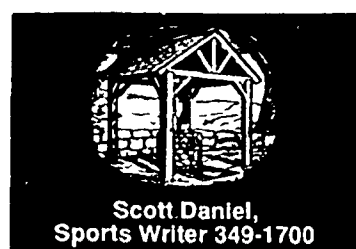

Step aerobics hits town

"Steppin' Up" is the hottest new program addition being offered by Northville Parks and Recreation and New Attitude Aerobics, beginning Sept. 8 (See "Other Program Options" at conclusion of this article).

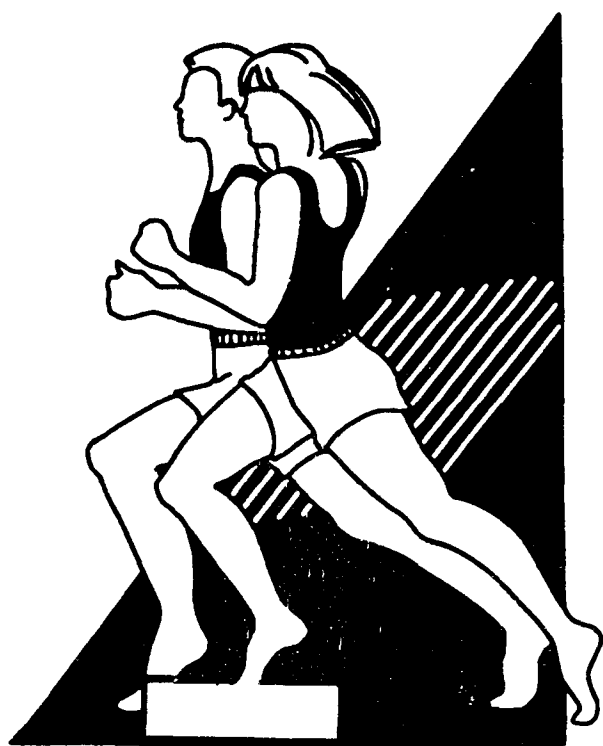
"Step bench" may be just THE fitness alternative for which you've been looking.

For those who want to strengthen their hearts, but shy away from traditional aerobics classes because of the dance or choreography elements often associated with them, this is a great option. The moves are basic, fun and easy to learn.

And if jogging doesn't appeal to you, San Diego State University studies on step bench workouts show that it provides the same cardiovascular benefits as running at seven miles per hour. The impact on your bones and joints, however is equivalent to walking (high intensity, low impact workout).

Step bench can be an excellent "toner" for those problem areas so many of us struggle with (hips, thighs, buttocks). At the same time it provides an opportunity to improve your upper body areas (where muscle mass tends to decrease with time), through the use of hand-held free weights.

With boredom being one of the most commonly mentioned reasons for cessation of exercise, step class offers variety, stimulation and fresh interest. Adding a new dimension to your personal fitness program can mean the difference between a short-lived or lifelong commitment to a

healthier you. Remember, however, that step classes should not be done exclusively. Rather, they should be part of your fitness equation.

Here's how step aerobics works:

Utilizing an adjustable platform, participants step up and down, over and around it, throughout the workout. The exercise intensity remains constant and YOUR body provides the resistance for increased effectiveness.

The height of the bench (4-8 inches) recommended by instructors depends on the individual participants' needs and goals. All beginners should start off with the lowest height. Other influencing factors include: the length of your legs, any history or predisposition to knee or

back problems, and your immediate level of physical fitness. In any case, the bench should never be so high that your knees must bend more than 90 degrees when stepping up.

New Attitude instructors are individually certified for teaching by the Aerobics and Fitness Association of America, with continuing education being mandatory. As with any of the New Attitude fitness classes, step bench workshops and regular review of professional literature is required, keeping the safety and well-being of participants at the forefront. Each class hour is carefully planned and designed around appropriate music (average of 120 beats per minute), basic, controlled, simple-to-follow movements (no dangerous jumping

or intricate patterns), with special emphasis on proper posture, body alignment, correct technique and use of the bench.

As with any new fitness activity, the first "step" in the right direction begins with caution. That means checking with your doctor about any existing, or predisposition to, knee or back problems. Feasibility may simply be a matter of strengthening and exercising key muscles (i.e. quadriceps, hamstrings, and calves), before ever attending classes. In any event, be sure to follow and consider any physician recommendations. And, most of all, listen to your body. Its messages to you, both positive and negative, are in your health's best interest.

Other program options: New Attitude Aerobics and Northville Parks and Recreation also offer the following fitness opportunities: Low-Impact Fatburner Aerobics (30 minutes of aerobics, with modified floorwork). Tops & Bottoms Toning (for those problem areas). Early Bird Workout (Combination class offered at 5:45 a.m.) and Hi/Low Aerobics (Offering two instructors "team teaching" for the ultimate in supervision and guidance).

Coming in November: Fit-N-Fun Club (aerobics, games and fitness stations designed for children grades three, four and five).

One of the outstanding features of the New Attitude fitness program is its "Flex-Scheduling." Participants may attend any of the 16 classes being offered each week, mixing and matching to fit their individual needs. (This differs from many programs, where clients may be restricted to specific days and hours, and must commit to them at the time of registration.) What a great option for today's busy, sometimes unpredictable, schedule and lifestyle.

Prevention best to avoid tooth decay



A common misconception is that a tooth doesn't have a cavity unless it hurts or is sensitive. This is actually far from the truth. Most decaying teeth have no unusual sensation at all. It is when the decay is in the advanced stages that the person feels the sensitivity to hots, colds, sweets or pressures.

When a tooth becomes painful or sensitive, a large cavity may already be present. At this point, the dental treatment becomes more involved than a simple filling. When the decay gets near or into the tooth nerve, the tooth may need a root canal, post, crown (cap) or a very large filling. The tooth could also fracture or break off below the gum line to the extent that it

cannot be restored and the only alternative is extraction.

Dental X-rays are a valuable key in early diagnosis of tooth decay. With X-rays, decay that might otherwise go unnoticed can be diagnosed. Today, dentists rely on X-rays to spot problems that aren't evident to the eye or probe during a visual clinical examination of the teeth. By discovering tooth decay in its early stages, a simple routine filling can be done, thus preventing serious irreversible damage.

The best way to deal with decay is to prevent it. Most people spend from 30-60 seconds brushing their teeth. However, that is simply not enough time to effectively remove plaque to maintain oral health. And most people floss sporadically, if at all. Yet floss removes much of the plaque at the gumline and between the teeth where it is most likely to decay.

Dental health is relatively easy to achieve and maintain by spending a few minutes a day brushing and flossing and having regular checkups and cleanings. You can avoid dental problems.

Dentists today are more skilled and sophisticated than ever before, having benefitted from important discoveries about disease and decay prevention. Your entire dental team is committed to providing you with the best possible oral care. But your dentist alone can't give you good dental health. Oral health is a gift you give to yourself. So think enough of yourself to invest a few minutes each day to keep your mouth healthy. You will have something to smile about for a lifetime.

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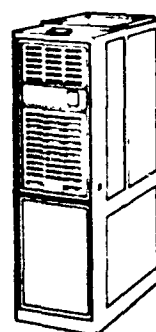


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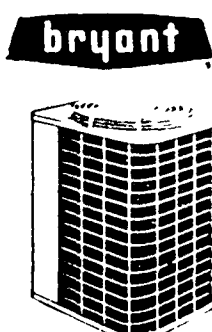

Country styling is featured in the Jeffs

Country styling is clear in the wide wrap-around porch of the Jeffs. But inside, this one and a-half story home is totally contemporary.

Another set of French doors opens into a parlor with a Colonial fireplace, a long mantel and built-in bookcases, while the entire area is illuminated by a wide bay window.

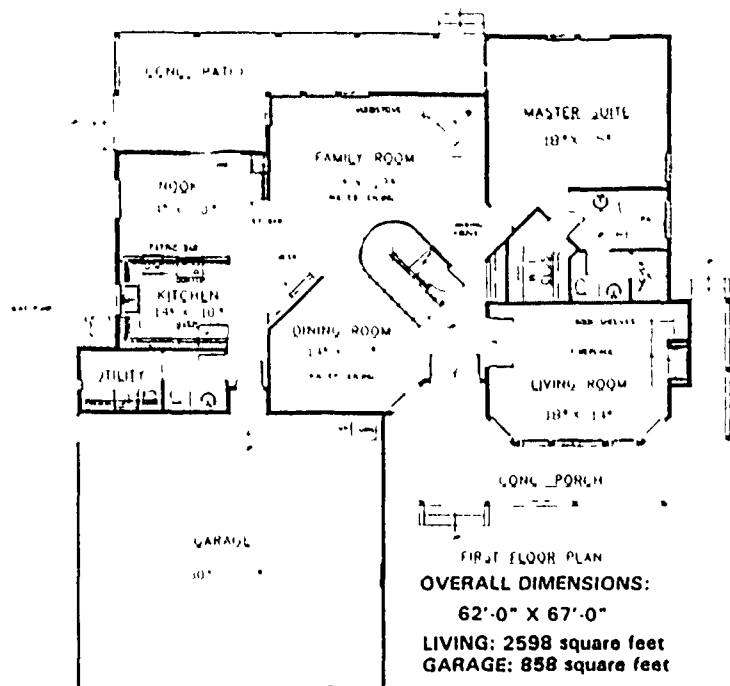
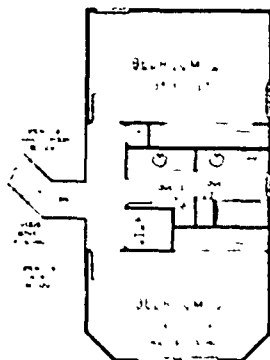
Sliding glass doors fill the nook with light and offer easy access to the patio for outdoor dining when the weather is inviting. A wood

Herbs are easy

Every day someone finds a new and innovative use for easy-to-grow, multipurpose herbs. In fact, there are nearly as many herbs as there are uses for them.

Everyone knows that herbs are ideal for spicing up soups, stews, vinegars, jellies and relishes and that the right herb can add zest to fish, meat and poultry. Quite frequently, a common herb is the "secret ingredient" your grandmother talked about at the dinner table.

But herbs—actually parts of herbs, such as flowers, leaves, roots, seeds and bark—can be counted on for more than improving the flavor of food. Many doctors suggest eucalyptus herbal rubs or balms for their patients with strained muscles or mild back problems.

Herbs often are used for cosmetic purposes or artistic endeavors. People love to drink chamomile or scented geranium herbal teas and unwind from a hard day's work in a relaxing bath accentuated with sweet flag or sweet violet.

The appealing fragrance of dried herbs entices many either to buy or make their

own potpourris, sachets and wreaths, which boast a long-lasting herbal aroma. Mint and rosemary are among the most popular herbs for this purpose.

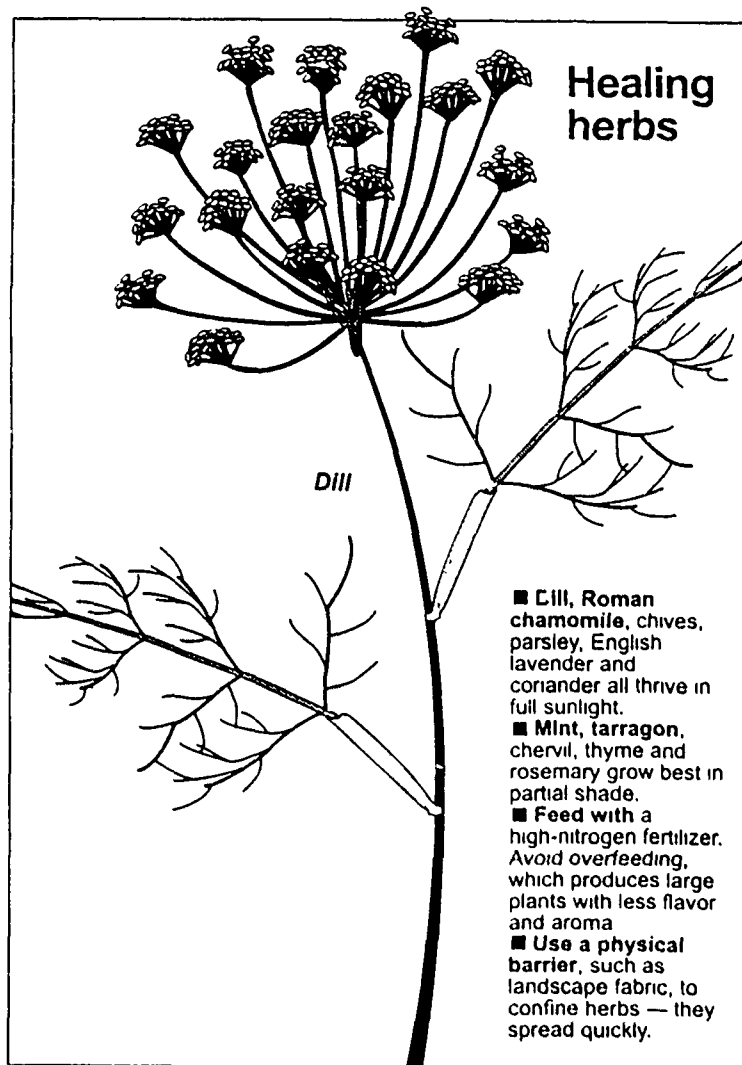
In fact, the only thing most people who use herbs don't seem to know about them is that they are among the easiest of all plants to grow.

Gardeners appreciate the variety of shapes, sizes and colors in which herbs come and put them to use in decorative containers or rock gardens or as ground covers. When matched with annuals and perennials, herbs make eye-catching additions to beds and borders. Many herbs spread quickly. A physical barrier, such as landscape fabric, helps confine them.

Some herbs take less effort to grow than others, so it's important to decide before starting how much effort you intend to put forth. If you have time to spend, begin the frugal way, from seed; otherwise, purchase started seedlings or rooted cuttings.

When planted, these tend to take root quickly, enabling the gardener to reap their benefits early.

The first phase of 115 lots is selling out quickly. Phase two, which comprises 103 lots on the north end of the property, features some heavily wooded areas, walk-out lots, and a meandering river which creates a number of river-front lots. Sidewalks line every street in the subdivision.

The homes are definitely aimed at the upscale buyer. They start at \$275,000 for something in the neighborhood of 2,600 square feet. Homes of up to 3,500 square feet are available.

Superb Homes Inc., Potach Homes, Scaccia Building Co. and PaulMark Building Co. have all decided to shoot the works with gourmet kitchens, nine foot ceilings, whirlpool baths, name-brand

hardware and fixtures and completely drywalled side-entry garages.

Indeed, the interaction between the companies brings out the best in each. Michaelson said it wasn't unusual for builders to help each other out by loaning out materials and the like. Bette Kessler, who is organizing the grand opening, called it "friendly competition."

"The builders are all working together on a pleasant level," she said. "There is a sense of community here. That's why they're doing it as a community. It's challenging, but they're all high quality builders."

There are homes with three, four and five bedrooms. Some have two-car garages, others three. Walkout basements can be fin-

ished or not.

As a result, the only common thread among prospective buyers has been that they are family people. There are young couples with new children, empty-nesters, near-empty-nesters, and everything in between.

For example, Michaelson noted that even though his homes have a younger feel to them, he's seen interest from families in all age groups.

"My homes are more of the new type," he said. "It's a traditional style home, but with all of the newest features."

Some features of the Stewart line include the latest appliances, state-of-the-art floor coverings and 42-inch overhead cabinets.

"We like to bring people into the

model and show them the features," Michaelson said. "We can get them out of the dark, stained wood, and get them into the painted woodwork, which is nice."

Dealing with a sophisticated buyer is a challenging, but not impossible, task, Michaelson said.

"These people have owned two, three, four homes before," he said. "They've had everything the old ways. So we have to show them something new to get them to move."

Perhaps the best draw for Chase Farms is the fact that the property itself has a rich history. Georgianna Chase, widow of the former property owner, told how the land and the adjacent farm came to be Chase Farms.

William Yerkes, one of the first settlers of the Northville area, chose this site for his family's homestead in 1826.

In 1922, George B. Yerkes, a blood relation of William Yerkes and former prosecuting attorney for Wayne County, purchased the property. Upon his death, the par-

cel was handed down to George's son, Robert.

In 1937, William Chase and his first wife, Pearl Jane Chase — who were the inventors of shatterproof glass — fell in love with the main house and bought it, along with all the surrounding land for \$38,000. Nowadays, that figure would barely buy the garage for one of the homes being built on the property. The main house still sits just south of the new subdivision, on Baseline Road.

The Chase family also tells the tale that, before agreeing to buy the home, William slept on the floor of the empty house in a sleeping bag for a night, just to make sure the neighborhood wasn't too noisy.

Chase farmed the land from 1937 to 1960. He had a large herd of cattle and a sizeable apple orchard, and constructed a huge barn in which to store the corn and hay he grew for the cattle. Chase also processed maple syrup from the maple trees on the property.

When he retired from farming, Chase decided to lease the land. Unfortunately, the state also split

the land in two by building Eight Mile Road through the farm in 1959.

In 1970, Chase married his second wife, Georgianna, with whom he enjoyed many a Sunday skeet shooting and pheasant and partridge hunting on the property.

William Chase died in 1985, and in 1989, it was sold to Larry Bennett. The following year, the development of the Chase Farms community began.

Kessler noted that visitors are intrigued by the idea that there really is a Mrs. Chase who lends her name to the property.

"She was pleased to see how beautiful the community is," said Kessler. "She was very proud."

"People who live in this area tend to be very nostalgic. We've been very well received in this area."

While many Novi residents have come through looking for a "move-up" type of home, Kessler pointed out that people come from surrounding communities, and have come from as far away as Canton and even Canada.

designed for the event.

Block parties of this type, where traffic is stopped, usually must be approved by the city. In fact, each application is normally reviewed and approved by both the city Police Department and Traffic Engineering Department. The application also must be signed by a majority of all residents on the blocked-off street.

These festive neighborhood social get-togethers are not only fun for kids and adults, they also enhance security for area homes. When families know each other well, they're more apt to keep an eye on other homes in the neighborhood and report anything suspicious.

All these special benefits impact home values. A quality cul-de-sac home — particularly in communities

that show solid pride of ownership — will typically cost more than other comparable homes, and they tend to retain their value better than others.

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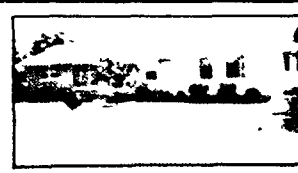
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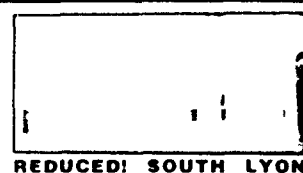
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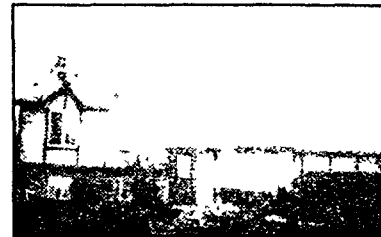

Q. Any information you may have concerning the plate in the enclosed picture will be greatly appreciated.

The mark on the back is CFH over GDM. The plate measures 9 inches.

A. Your plate was made in Limoges, France, by Charles Field Haviland. The GDM stands for Gerard, Dufrasseix & Morel, a company taken over by Haviland. Your plate is from the late 1800s.

It would probably sell for \$75 to \$85.

Q. I have inherited a beautiful cut-glass punch bowl. It is so lovely I would like to find a sterling-silver punch ladle. It doesn't necessarily have to be an antique. What can I expect to pay for one?

A. Fine sterling antique ladles can run more than \$1,000. You should be able to buy one made in the last 50 to 75 years for around \$200 to \$300.

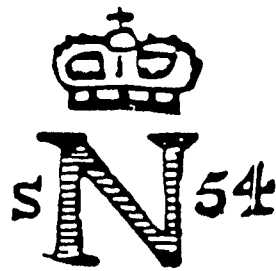
Q. I have a teapot made by John Maddock & Sons Ltd. It is the Indian Tree pattern.

What information can you give me about the Indian Tree pattern? I also would like to know approximately when it was made and its value.

A. The Indian Tree pattern features a gnarled tree with various flowers in an Oriental style. It was produced by several British potters in the early 1800s. It is still being made today.

Your teapot was made in the early 20th

century and would probably fetch \$75 to \$85.

Q. I have an antique plate that is said to have belonged to Napoleon. It is decorated with crowns and trimmed in gold. The attached mark is on the bottom of the plate.

What can you tell me about its history and what it might be worth?

A. The Sevres porcelain factory in France used this mark in 1854 during the brief reign of Napoleon III. It did not belong to him or the original Napoleon I.

Your rare plate would sell in the \$225 to \$235 range.

Q. Vincent van Gogh's painting, "Iris-es," sold for more than \$50 million, yet

you told me my print of the same picture was worth very little. I don't understand this. It doesn't make sense to me.

A. A print of a famous painting is about the same as taking a picture of it with a camera. A photograph of a BMW isn't more expensive than a photograph of a Volkswagen.

Q. The antique shops never seem to offer any military medals from World War II. Are they collectible? Are they very expensive?

A. They are collectible, and some are expensive. However, it is illegal to sell them. Here are a few examples:

- Distinguished Service Medal—\$50-\$60
- Bronze Star—\$10-\$15.
- Distinguished Flying Cross—\$20-\$25.
- Air Medal—\$20-\$25.
- Medal of Honor—\$500-\$600.
- Silver Star—\$65-\$75.
- Purple Heart—\$15-\$20.
- Navy Cross—\$75-\$80.

Most herbs are sun lovers

Planting seedlings is a relatively simple process. Most herbs prefer full exposure to sun, though some require shade. For instance, dill, Roman chamomile, chives, parsley, English lavender and coriander all thrive in full sun.

Among the herbs that grow better in partial shade are mint, tarragon, chervil, thyme and rosemary.

Specific planting directions should come with seedling packages. If not, ask the nursery sales person.

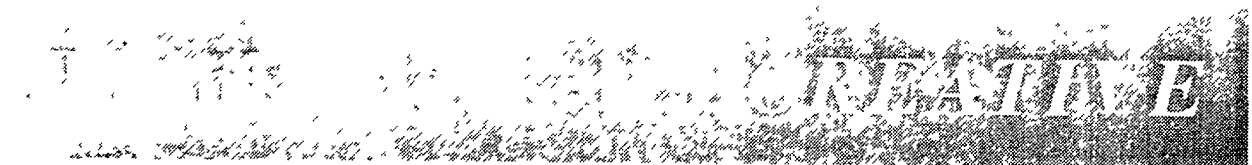
Once your herbs are growing well, parts can be pruned as needed as long as enough foliage remains to allow regeneration. Herbs are best pruned on a cool, shade-filled day. This enables the plant to recover before it must face full sun again.

Leaves for drying should be pruned just prior to the plant's flowering. Toss away damaged or diseased leaves and wash the good ones in cool water. Store them on a tray or rack out of the sun. Too much light ruins the flavor and bleaches the color.

Next, crush the dried leaves and store away from light, perhaps in a freezer until needed.

Herbs have been around for a million years and hopefully will be for a million more. They are versatile and hardy and, with a little preparation, easy to grow. Whatever your need, there's bound to be an herb that's perfect for you.

The neighborhood was cleaning itself up. The local 4-H Club even helped set up garden clubs where kids, teens and adults could work together on plants and flowers while talking over ways to raise awareness.

Palm Beach Patio helps enjoy outdoors at home

If experience were the great teacher it's cracked up to be, Jane Fedrigo would probably still be in the business-person's equivalent of first grade.

But her sly smile and wisecracking nature implies a quick wit. It's not hard to understand how one with little retail training could become the successful owner of Palm Beach Patio, a Novi store which sells a wide selection of outdoor furniture. In fact, the store in the Novi Town Center is just one of two locations. A second Palm Beach Patio is on M-59 in Waterford.

As Fedrigo explains it, she got into the business almost by accident. "We had just bought a house in Livonia, and we put a deck in the back," she said. "I needed furniture for the deck so I went looking around. I ended up going to Florida to get what I wanted, and ended up buying a truckload. So I thought I'd open a store to get rid of it."

What she had bought was patio furniture made from PVC (polyvinyl chloride) tubing. At the time, it was hard to find outside of the Southeast.

"I fell in love with PVC, but there wasn't any up here," Fedrigo said. So she went into business, working directly with suppliers in Florida, and trucking the merchandise to Michigan.

Before she opened her doors, Fedrigo had no formal training in how to run a business.

"I had done some accounting," she said. "I had gone to college and dropped out. I had no retail experience outside of odd jobs."

But Fedrigo feels that her lack of experience, combined with a little creative ingenuity has been the secret to her success.

"It works because I don't have a closed mind," she said. "If I had a heavy retail background, I probably wouldn't be so willing to try new things."

Take for example, her origins as a seller of PVC patio furniture. After a few years as the choice of the trendy, PVC furniture slipped out of the mainstream just as quickly.

"I don't carry much of it anymore," said Fedrigo. "It's the best stuff on the market, but there's not much eye appeal. It's bulky. They have to use thicker tubing for strength, so they can't do any thin, graceful designs."

So Fedrigo has moved on to steel, aluminum and wrought iron furniture. With more structural rigidity than the PVC, the metal designs can be more intricate. They also can withstand the stresses of motion furniture; that is, anything that swings, swivels or rocks.

"The business really grew," Fedrigo said. "People don't like to sit still now. You can get high backs and tables. People like all the bells and

whistles.

"The category really has expanded beyond the traditional redwood."

In addition to deck chairs, chaises, love seats and tables, Palm Beach Patio stocks indoor bar stools. The store also stocks those little accessories you might not think of like free-standing ashtrays; it also has the big stuff like party canopies.

There is a selection of rattan and wicker furniture, and Fedrigo may offer dinette sets in the fall.

The new designs fit well with the wood decks and brick patios so favored in this area.

"Wrought iron on a brick patio looks gorgeous," said Fedrigo. "It really achieves that decorator look."

Another practice at Palm Beach Patio that flies in the face of common business practice is the wide selection, not only of styles, but of colors as well. Looking around the brightly lit showroom, you can spot the same furniture in several colors and fabrics. The splashes of color aren't just a simple tribute to Fedrigo's creative side.

"We seldom offer a set on the floor in just one color," Fedrigo said. "Many of them are in five or six or more. It's harder to inventory that way, but it's one of our biggest benefits."

"It's what I call the 'doughnut shop syndrome.' When you go into a

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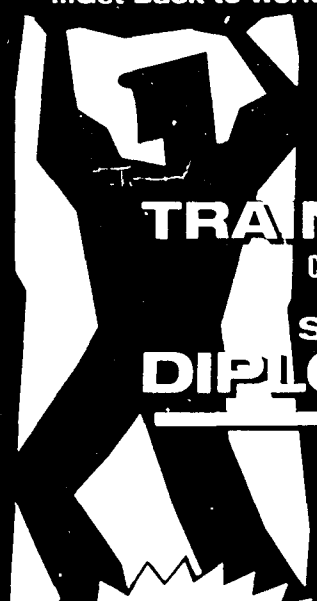
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Change can be good for business



All of us have a tendency to become locked into standard ways of doing things. This "locked in" approach is the result of finding a comfort zone in which to conduct our daily lives, be it personally or professionally.

As a result, "change" can come to represent a threat that individuals avoid like the plague. Instead of viewing change as a positive or necessary step toward growth, people prefer to maintain the status quo no matter what the long-term consequences.

Business owners and managers who cling to the "comfortable" ways of conducting business often do so long after they become outdated, inefficient and detrimental to the future of the en-

terprise. Regardless of the type of business, owners and managers will focus attention of whatever needs to be done immediately. Most will say they are open to and encourage change, yet when faced with the reality of doing so, it threatens what they are doing today.

All too often we permit ourselves to be bound by real world constraints. Before we have a chance to anticipate what might be better or different, we quickly avoid new ideas based on real world. If you hear yourself constantly saying, "it won't work," or "that's not practical," or "we can't afford it," before you've had a chance to think a new idea through, then you've developed a reactive rather than a proactive philosophy towards your business.

All creative, progressive thinking that results in effective change starts with the "what-if" process. Asking yourself what-if questions is an ideal way to get your imagination going. It forces you to think beyond the immediate confinements of an operating business.

The purpose of the what-if process is to force yourself to think differently. If you question a situation that is an immediate concern to you or your business, the process won't be as effective.

To become skilled in the what-if creative-thinking process, go away by yourself for an hour or so and write down on paper what-if questions. Talk to yourself and record your answers on paper. Let your imagination go. Look for new possibilities in any situation and refrain from appraising your answers. Be as free with yourself and your thinking as possible. By doing this, you will begin to remove many of the deeply ingrained and often inaccurate assumptions you have about yourself, your work or your business.

What-if thinking is not new and will help you to find new possibilities. By doing this, you will generate ideas that can later be realistically evaluated for further consideration.

doughnut shop do you order a dozen glazed, or do you say, "Give me one of these, and one of those, and one of those?" I don't know about you, but I can't walk out with just a dozen glazed doughnuts. So how can I walk out with a truckload of furniture in just one fabric?"

The Waterford location adjoins a warehouse which allows Fedrigo to keep a variety in stock. Everything is delivered from that location.

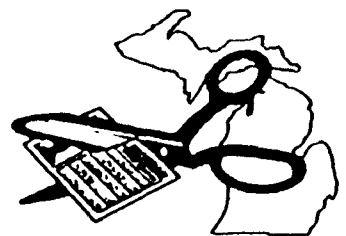
Fedrigo's delivery system is something you won't find elsewhere either. "It's our policy to make specific ap-

pointments for delivery," she said. "That's unheard of in the furniture delivery or any other service. That's one of my big nasties. I hate it when someone tells me I have to sit home between 8 and 5 for a repair call or a delivery."

"We give the people a specific time, and if it's going to change 15 minutes one way or the other, we call. Ours isn't a foolproof system, but we try really hard. Radio dispatching is our next step, but it's worked pretty well even without that."

Help your family: plan estate now

Don't put your family's future on the line. Put your estate in order now.

Failing to develop an estate plan can be costly. No matter how modest your estate, the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants recommends that you develop a master strategy to minimize the tax bite and adequately provide for your heirs. To help you get started, CPAs offer the following advice.

Write a will
Writing a will is the most fundamental part of any estate plan.

A will specifies how your property and valuables will be distributed and can designate guardians for your children. If you die without a will, you forfeit the right to have your estate distributed according to your wishes. A court-appointed administrator will distribute your estate in accordance with the state law of succession. If you have children, you face an even greater risk: the court may not appoint the guardians who you would like to raise your children.

What constitutes an estate?

Your estate is probably larger than you think. It includes all your assets — savings account, real estate, stocks and bonds, savings bonds, mutual funds, pension rights, employee death benefits and Social Security. Also included in your estate are collectibles, such as antiques and artwork, as well as valuable jewelry, furs and cars. Be sure to include the face value of all insurance policies you hold.

To arrive at the value of your estate, you need to subtract from your total assets all outstanding debts, as well as charitable bequests, any estimated costs for selling your estate and funeral expenses.

If the value of the estate is more than \$600,000, a federal estate tax return must be filed with payment of estate taxes by nine months after the date of death. Taxes are usually based on the value of the assets at the time of death.

Gifts help minimize taxes.

One of the best ways to reduce your estate without incurring high taxes is by making gifts to family members. Single filers can make an

annual gift up to \$10,000 to any person and joint filers can make a gift up to \$20,000 annually without any gift or estate implications. What's more, gifts to your spouse — no matter how large — are not subject to any estate or gift taxes, as long as your spouse is a U.S. citizen.

You can also make a lifetime gift of your life insurance policy. As long as you transfer complete ownership of the policy more than three years prior to your death, the insurance proceeds payable to the beneficiary will not be included in your estate.

Finally, you can reduce your estate by giving some of your property to charity. When you donate cash or property, you may qualify for two tax benefits from one gift: you remove the property from your estate and can deduct your charitable contribution on your current income tax return.

Establishing trusts
Another way to minimize your estate tax burden and to ensure that your estate is distributed according to your desires, is to establish trusts. A testamentary trust is established in your will and goes into effect during your lifetime.

Living trusts can be revocable or irrevocable. An irrevocable trust enables you to shift income to a beneficiary during your lifetime. Such trusts are worth considering if you are at a high income level. If the income is shifted to children 14 years of age or older, the income will be taxed at their tax rate. However, for children under age 14, any investment income above \$1,200 is taxed at the parents' top tax rate.

The advantage of revocable trusts is that you can manage the distribution of the estate and have the option of changing your plans at any time. The assets of revocable trusts, unlike those of irrevocable trusts, are considered part of the grantor's estate for estate tax purposes. Also, during your lifetime, you will be taxed on the trust's income.

Finally, be aware that estate planning can be a complicated process and that laws vary from state to state. For assistance, the Michigan Association of CPAs suggests you contact your CPA.

Schoenherr, said developer Dominic J. Mocerì Jr. of Mocerì Development, Grand Blanc.

Builders covet the M-59 corridor, which follows the natural progression and population growth pattern.

The Vineyards represents some of the last available, buildable land in Sterling Heights, which became a city in 1969. Utilities only came to this area of the city last year. "The site is pristine with 55 acres of wooded area, ponds and creeks," Mocerì said.

More than 25 percent of the site will remain natural with wildlife, woods and a stream. Two spring-fed lakes boast lit fountains and stocked fish. Brick and limestone privacy walls surround the site's perimeter berms. Colorful greenbelts flourish. Each entrance is marked by a brick monument with a handcarved redwood logo lettered with gold-leaf.

"The landscaping will rival anything in Bloomfield Hills," said Mocerì, who in 1989 participated in the Homearama

held at the Hills of Oakland in Oakland Township.

The Vineyards offers move-up homes — a family's second, third or fourth home — as well as maintenance-free condominium living for singles, couples with grown children, first-time buyers and smaller families.

"The Vineyards neighborhood represents some of the most appealing styles in residential design today," Mocerì said.

The homes "share a casual elegance" and many, he said, "feature multiple levels, dramatic rooflines and flexible interiors that welcome the use of high-volume ceilings, window walls, sunrooms and decks."

"This will be one of the first cluster developments in the city to include detached and attached condominiums, single-family homes with open spaces and retention basins used as landscape amenities," said Jerry Verongstraete, Sterling Heights community development director.



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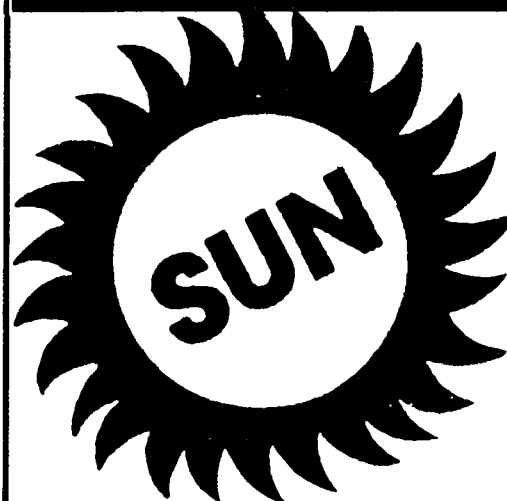


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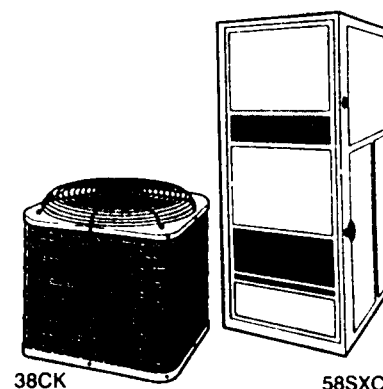
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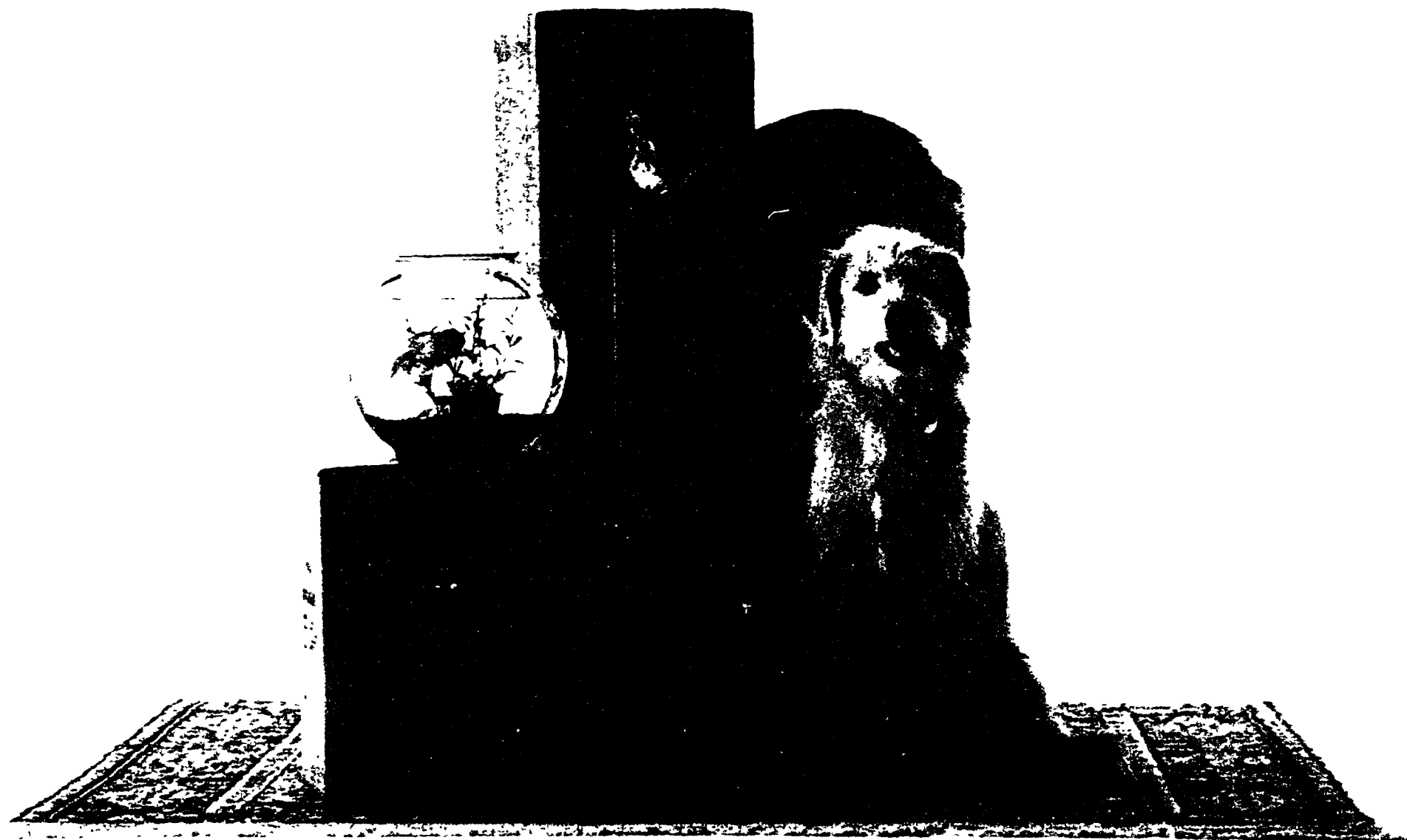

Health Centers Celebrate Five Years in Your Community



Serving the medical needs of communities for the past five years is something to celebrate. And that's exactly what four of the six University of Michigan Health Centers are doing as they reach their fifth anniversary in 1992. The centers, located in Plymouth, Northville, Briarwood and Northeast Ann Arbor, opened in 1987 as M-CARE Health Centers. The health centers in Brighton and Chelsea were models for these sites.

The Brighton Health Center opened in 1982 and was an important venture for the University of Michigan Hospitals because it was one of the first off-campus, community locations for U-M Medical Center satellites. The Brighton Health Center offers primary medical care for all members of the family provided by physicians from the specialties of internal medicine, pediatrics and obstetrics/gynecology. The health centers in Northville, Plymouth and Northeast Ann Arbor were adapted from this model.

The Chelsea Family Practice Center opened in 1978 through the Department of Family Practice.

(See story on Page 3). Physicians trained in family practice provide primary medical care to individuals and families within the community. The center is also the site where family practice residents pursue advanced education under the guidance of faculty physicians. Briarwood Family Practice was developed from this model.

Family practice physicians began serving Northville and Plymouth this year. Patients at these sites are now offered the services of all the primary care specialties. The listing on Page 6 outlines the various services offered at each center.

The health centers are committed to community programs. A pictorial summary of past activities is on Pages 4 and 5. In keeping with this commitment, a community anniversary celebration is planned jointly with the Partnerships for Education programs in the various communities. The following story highlights the celebration. **M**

Family Practice as a Medical Specialty

The American Board of Family Practice defines family practice as the medical specialty concerned with the total health care of the individual and the family. It integrates the biological, clinical and behavioral sciences. The scope of family practice is not limited by sex, age, organ system or disease entity. The family practice physician serves as the patient's or family's advocate in all health-related matters, including the appropriate use of consultants and community resources.

The purpose of the ABFP, like other medical specialty boards, is to conduct examinations measuring the competence of family practice physicians and to grant certification based on their examination performance.

Officially recognized as a specialty in 1969, family practice not only has an exam to certify its physicians, it re-examines them every seven years to maintain certification. Family practice was the first medical specialty to have this requirement.

The board exam occurs annually. Board-certified physicians are called "diplomates." In 1991, more than 37,000 diplomates were certified. In 1990, 7,268 residents were in training in 382 approved programs. Since January 1970, more than 32,500 residents have graduated from three-year family practice residency programs.

The family practice department at the University of Michigan annually accepts six residents into its three-year training program, for a total complement of 18 residents. **M**



Family Practice at Four Locations

Family practice physicians are now available at four of the U-M Health Centers. The family practice model, originally developed at the Chelsea Family Practice Center, was used later to develop the Briarwood Family Practice Center. Now, family physicians see patients at Northville and Plymouth—along with other primary care specialists in pediatrics, obstetrics/gynecology and internal medicine.

Family physicians diagnose and treat a broad spectrum of illness and do not restrict their practice based on age, gender or body organ. In fact, the same doctor can care for every member of the family, integrating all aspects of medical care. From the newborn to the elderly, regardless of age, they treat 90 percent to 95 percent of patients' health care needs.

Specific situations that family physicians treat include routine prenatal, obstetrical and newborn care. They also provide pediatric and well-child care. Adult patients receive gynecological as well as routine medical care. With older adults, the emphasis is on geriatric health maintenance in addition to the treatment of acute and chronic diseases. They perform a variety of office surgical and diagnostic procedures. These include minor skin surgery or biopsy, sigmoidoscopy, vasectomy, simple fracture and colposcopy.

Furthermore, family physicians fulfill a variety of office counseling needs. They integrate medical care and advise patients on topics ranging from life changes and family events to emotional adjustment to chronic disease. They provide guidance in situations involving psychiatric illness. They discuss issues of medical ethics surrounding terminal care or advance preparation of a living will. **M**

Preconception Counseling

Prenatal care should begin before the pregnancy

The first 56 days of a woman's pregnancy are the most important. By the time a woman sees a physician for prenatal care, it is often too late to change or improve the conditions of her pregnancy.

Obstetrician and gynecologist Lauren Zoschnick, M.D., says the period of greatest environmental sensitivity for a developing fetus is between days 17 and 56 after conception.

"An injury during this time, whether it is nutritional, drug-related or an infection, can affect the developing fetus," he says. "Most structural abnormalities develop by the end of the eighth week after conception."

That's why Zoschnick believes it is important to educate couples not yet pregnant about the potential influences of their lifestyle and general health on the developing fetus. "Preconception counseling is a relatively new idea," he adds. "It addresses issues of nutrition, smoking, alcohol and drug use, exposure to toxic substances, medical illness and genetic conditions in both parents."

The major goal of preconception counseling is to provide the facts to help people make an informed decision about having a baby. With the appropriate information, a decision can be made to accept the increased risks a pregnancy poses, to modify the risks or to forgo childbearing.

"Preconception counseling has three components," Zoschnick continues. "It helps the people identify their individual risks, it provides personalized and non-judgmental education and finally,

if appropriate, it facilitates access to complementary services such as genetic counseling or diet and behavior modification programs."

Zoschnick suggests another benefit to counseling is that people can confront, in advance, any potentially difficult decisions they may face. It gives them time to work through the moral and ethical dilemmas associated with a fetal malformation. If such a situation occurs, people are more likely to be at ease with any decision they eventually make says Zoschnick.

Although there are many advantages to preconception counseling and health promotion, Zoschnick points out there are disadvantages as well. "Counseling may heighten anxiety, reinforce guilt, lead to false guarantees and detract rather than enhance personal decision-making," he says.

Zoschnick considers this planning a very important part of the pregnancy. He says offering these services has the potential of making childbearing a more rewarding experience for a woman, her family and society.

Premarital Health Certification

Sexually transmitted diseases affect at least one in 20 Americans each year. Eighty-five percent of people with sexually transmitted diseases are between the ages of 15 and 30. Regardless of age, it is important that couples planning to marry understand the implications of sexually transmitted diseases on relationships and childbearing.

In Michigan, marriage license applicants are required to have counseling on the transmission and prevention of sexually related diseases and AIDS, and to have testing offered to them.

Each health center has a team of nurse practitioners and physicians available for appointments to discuss sexually transmitted diseases, their signs and symptoms, prevention and treatment. Certificates to obtain a marriage license are issued at the consultation. The consultation fee may be covered by insurance. Check with your insurance carrier about coverage. Call the health center nearest you to make an appointment.

of the partnership programs; raise awareness concerning handicaps and help families learn their fitness level and what they can do to improve it.

Improving fitness levels is important since results of a U-M study released in June shows that 33 percent of Michigan girls and 34 percent of Michigan boys are heavier than children from the rest of the nation. Equally important is that parents can play a key role in helping their children control body fat and weight by encouraging their children to be physically active; modeling an active lifestyle; providing good, wholesome food; and assisting their children in adopting healthy lifestyle programs.

The Expo will be held at the MedSport facility at Domino's Farms in Ann Arbor, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 7. Activities scheduled throughout the day include fitness testing, celebrity guest speakers, demonstrations, health education information, open house and tours of the MedSport facility and Domino's Fitness Center, refreshments and displays by area health and fitness organizations. U-M Hospitals helicopter program, Survival Flight, will provide tours of the aircraft. As part of the salute to people striving to overcome handicaps, there will be exercise classes, simulations and people can watch the filming of "Walk This Way," the story about Ron Bachman, a double amputee.

The Expo will demonstrate what businesses and schools have done as partners. The Partnerships for Education is a national program to improve schools and strengthen young people's skills to help them become more effective contributors to society. Hepatitis B Vaccine Recommended for Infants

One of the newest vaccination recommendations among the medical community is for immunizing newborns with the hepatitis B vaccine. The vaccine has been available for adults but now the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta recommends it for infants.

Hepatitis B virus affects the liver and symptoms include nausea, loss of appetite, fatigue and weakness. Some people develop chronic hepatitis, liver cancer or die of the acute illness.

Transmission of hepatitis B occurs by exposing an infected person's blood or blood-contaminated fluids to a non-immune person through breaks in the skin or through the mucous membranes. Immunization is the key to prevention and can be much more cost-effective than dealing with the overall costs of treating the disease.

The vaccine is easy to tolerate and no serious reactions were seen in the study group. Occasionally soreness or redness may occur at the injection site. Adults receive immunizations in the upper arm and infants and toddlers receive immunizations in the thigh.

Many hospitals now immunize newborns before discharge. A second injection is given one to two months after the first dose and a third injection is given six to 18 months after the first dose. The schedule coincides with regularly scheduled visits for other routine vaccinations.

Hepatitis B vaccine is now universally recommended for all ages. The American Academy of Family Physicians and the American Academy of Pediatrics recommend this vaccine for newborn infants, with a goal of universal immunization because of the frequent occurrence of reported cases. At least 20 other countries now recommend the vaccine for infants. Check with your health care provider about this vaccine for your infant. **M**
