## Helsinki celebrates independence

Finnish capital maintains unique Nordic-Baltic-European outlook

| By ANN ROSTON <br> New York Times Trevel Syndicate <br> A good many visliors to Helsinkd this August will antive by boat, skdmming into the deep South Harbor on one of the huge pleasre ships that crulse dally between Finland and Sweden. Germany. Poland and Estonia. <br> A few days - or even hours - later they will reboard and head for Russtan waters. The trafic is about as heavy in the opposite direction. <br> Helsinkd remalns a litte cousin to St. Petersburg in the minds - and travel patterns - of many forefgners. <br> Some wor't even realize that Helsinkd celebrates its 75 th anntversary of independence in December: typically. the city has refralned from publicty that might be deemed Im modest. provocative or overcommercial. Although several risk factors have been Idenuified, both the exact cause of breast cancer and reasons for the increased cases are not known. wo-uirds of all breast cancers occur in women atter menopause. If your sister or mother had breast cancer, you have two to three times the average risk, especially if your relatve was Earty onset of menstrual ackes age 110
and late menopause (after 55) increase your risk So does having no pregnancies or late pre gnancies (atter 30). Some other possible factor include estrogen replacement after meno pause, birth-control pills and a high-fat diet The exact role of each of these is not clear. A major effort is going toward the early diagcancer screening has three components: self breast exam, exam by health professionals and mammograms.

It is important for women to do monthly self breast exams. Exams should be done durin the same part of the mensinual cycle each month. Most breast lumps are discovered by the patient or her spouse.

The current re commendations for mammogram screenings in low-risk women are: a baseline at age $35-40$ : 40-50; and every year after age 50 For high risk women, for example, if a sister had breas cancer, yearly screening should begin sooner Several advances have been made in the reatment of breast cancer. Breast surgery can by local madiation. Lumpectomies are not used for advanced cancer.

## Fall Fest has

The biggest change in this year's Plymouth Community Fall Festival is that it's been trimmed - from the traditional four days to three.

The festival takes place Friday through Sunday. Sept. 11-13, in downtown Plymouth and at Central Middle School.
"We see that as a positive move," said Marilyn Alimpich, president of the fall festival.
"The last couple of years we've been talking to the merchants, they thought closing the streets a day later would be helpful, and we wanted to be cooperative," Alimpich said.

Also, "Some of the organizations felt that dropping the Thursday schedule wouldn't cut into their profits," Alimpich said.
"I know we're planning to have more rides for the children this year - we're trying karaoke this year, and that will be a little different," Alimpch said.

Also, a jazz band has been scheduled to perform at the festival.

Gone this year is the dunk tank on Penniman run by the Plymouth-Canton Rockettes pompon squad.
"For one thing, the insurance rates were just astronomical for them," Alimpch said.

Still, there will be plenty of activities for kids, including New Morning School exhibits, face painting, rides and the Optimists Pet Show from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday.
While the fall festival is traditionally the biggest event in a community where there are several big events, fest coordinator Joe Bida points to another standout feature of the fall festival.
"The money that's derived from the Plymouth Community Fall Festival is put back into the community," he said.

That's because a slew of civic groups have booths or run other activities at the festival to raise money - which is put back into activities they sponsor in the community year-round.

The festival was founded in 1956 by the Plymouth Rotary Club, to raise funds for play-

ground equipment at Jaycee Park, and 500 chicken dinners were sold.
The chicken barbecue continues on fall fest Sunday. An expected 12,000 dinners will be sold, each consisting of a half-chicken, ear of corn, roll and drink for $\$ 7$.
The dinners can be picked up in Kellogg Park or behind the Michigan National Bank at Ann Arbor and Sheldon roads.
Another main food event is the Kiwanis pancake breakfast Saturday morning.
Another festival tradition is the Plymouth Community Arts Council artists and craftsmen show at Central Middle School. It's scheduled from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday and noon to 6 p.m. Sunday.

Also at Central Middle School, the Plymouth Symphony League sponsors an antique show from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Friday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday.
The tentative list of entertainment includes a
junior and senior high school karaoke contest 4 6 p.m. Friday with trophies for the first three places.
Next comes the opening ceremonies and the pop music group Innovations.
On Saturday, a science show is scheduled from noon to 1 p.m.. the Polish dancers 1-1:30 p.m., Canton seniors kitchen band 1:30-2 p.m., kids entertainment $3-4$ and $6-7$ p.m., the Metro Jazz Orchestra 4-6 p.m. and another karaoke contest 7-9:30 p.m.
