Ford Plant proposal leaves space for library

A development group and builder have joined forces to rehabilitate the Northville Ford Plant and lease part of the plant to the city for a new library.

But a looming deadline may close the chapter on this proposal before the end of the year.

City officials only have until Nov. 13 to agree to the plan, or the Ford Motor Co. may sell the plant to another bidder.

The development group's aim is to refurbish the plant at Griswold and Main as an office condominium pro-

ject, according to a preliminary proposal reviewed by city and township officials last Thursday. A 25,000-square-foot space on the main floor would be available to the community for a public library. The renovated plant would also have room for two other clients.

The library space would be leased for 25 years, and donated to the city when the lease expires. The city would also have right of first refusal on the purchase of any and all tenant space after 25 years.

Ford Field, the pond north of the plant and the Ford-owned land north of the pond would be donated to the city immediately, under an agree-

ment worked out between the development group and Ford Motor Co.

The proposal is a joint project between the Northville Development Group and the Zervos Construction Co. of Southfield. Construction company president Peter Zervos briefed city and township officials and members of the Ford Plant Study Committee on the details Thursday.

Zervos emphasized the community aspect of the project. "We're talking about spending over a million dollars on the exterior, on landscaping, seating and walkways, and making it part of the community," he said.

The company's plans include about 25,000 square feet on the main

floor for a public library, and 10,000 square feet in the basement for a community center that could house meetings, banquets and similar functions. At a proposed square-foot lease cost of \$13.42 annually, lease payments for the library and community center would cost about \$39,000 a month. An insurance company and medical facility reportedly plan to lease the remaining Ford Plant space. Zervos described the two as "triple-A tenants," and said they were attracted to the concept of a community center.

"The way we presented it originally

Survey says seniors do more drugs

A student poll taken last spring in Northville indicates seniors said they drank more alcohol and smoked more marijuana than their counterparts across the country.

The results of the Alcohol and Other Drugs School Survey, released at the School Board meeting Monday night, show Northville teens' drinking and drug habits are slightly higher than the national averages in most cases.

In the 1991-92 school year, 84 percent of the 278 seniors who participated in the poll admitted drinking alcohol in the last year. That's 3 percent higher than the national average for the same time period. Moreover, 69 percent of the seniors surveyed said they had used alcohol within the last month. That's 12 percent higher than seniors on the national average.

Results were similar with marijuana use and drugs other than steroids and tobacco. The poll indicates

there were 8 percent more pot users in Northville last year than the national average. Seniors' reported use of inhalants in 1991-92 was 10 percent higher than the country's average.

The survey was designed by researchers at the University of Michigan and given to eighth, 10th and 12th graders last spring. Results were compiled by people at Western Michigan University, where national averages among 12th graders were added for comparison purposes.


The survey indicates that students are using what's available to them. But school director of instruction told School Board members and parents Monday night.

Hamilton, who coordinated the survey, said he believes the frequency of teen drinking and smoking of cigarettes and marijuana is on the rise because students have access to them.

Budget scrutiny begins

A strikingly similar theme accompanied the township's various department heads as they marched through Tuesday's marathon 1993 budget review process.

These are tight budgets, they said — not some hopped-up, decked-out, frilly Christmas wish lists.

Members of this year's budget review committee nodded, thanked the department heads for their time, and said we'll be the judge of that.

With the township's proposed 1993 expenditures topping \$4.26 million and anticipated revenues set tling around \$3.8 million, something clearly must give Tuesday's session marked the first step in the giving process.

Budget reviewers are scheduled to meet three times in October to mull budget proposals, and Oct. 28 has been scheduled as the Township

Appraisal program proceeds

A controversial reappraisal of the city's residential properties has reached the halfway mark.

Assessor Gail Zbranchik, hired by the city last April, has inspected about half of the 1,000 Northville City homes south of Baseline Road. The appraisal is being done to assure that city hall's assessing records accurately reflect each home's size, quality and any additions or demolition since the last inspection.

City Manager Gary Word said the reappraisal is designed "to make sure the assessments are fairly applied throughout Wayne County."

"When we had Wayne County doing the assessing for the city, we're just skeptical that a thorough job was done," Word said. "There were a lot of improvements made that were never recorded, for whatever reason."

The assessment records have not

Players hold fate of Beck Park

The roller coaster ride that is the Beck Road community park was back on the upswing this week.

But there's no guarantee that near-future plans to develop the 38-acre park won't soon come hurtling back to earth.

Township planning commissioners on Tuesday kicked around the soccer/baseball complex's revised final site plan before granting conditional approval for the barren field located between Five Mile and Six Mile roads.

Commissioners okayed the park plan contingent upon approved Zoning Board of Appeals variances for front yard and gravel lot parking.


The Planning Commission decision came on the heels of last week's City Council approval of a developer's bid to handle park grading and seeding chores. Council members backed Parks and Recreation Director Traci Gottschalk's bid acceptance request and gave a nod to a to-be-announced loan arrangement which could spark development on the long-troubled site.

The City Council's action assumes the township will also climb on board the bid acceptance and loan plans.

Gottschalk intends to approach the Township Board Oct. 8 and ask for approval of DeAngelis Landscaping's \$314,000 bid to grade, seed, and improve the four-soccer-field, three-baseball-field park.

She also will want the board to lend support to a 10-year, \$220,000 loan to be repaid through park user surcharge fees. Recreation officials want to get the construction ball rolling by pooling the loan with \$109,000 already housed in a park development fund.

Therein lies the rub. Board members in past weeks have appeared reluctant to buy into a loan plan. Some board members have said the park

funding should come through a special millage, while others feel a millage try is useless, and favor loans of varying shapes and sizes.

No clear consensus exists, and board approval appears tenuous at best. Gottschalk is set to play a trump card, though.

She said DeAngelis Landscaping has offered to arrange short-term financing to get park development off the ground. And the company apparently is willing to stick to its bid until spring, the likely start-up time for grading and seeding.

At best, the park site probably will

not be playable until the spring of 1994, Gottschalk said.

The board has assigned the township attorney to review possible loan sources. Earlier this week, Gottschalk said she had not been apprised of the status of the attorney's loan investigation.

Suspicious person accosts swim team members

City police received a report of a suspicious person approaching several Novi girls at the Northville Cider Mill, 714 Baseline Road, between 3:30 and 4 p.m. Sept. 26.







Residential lot rezonings pass with little fuss

City officials had a much easier time rezoning rows of residential properties on Randolph and Rayson streets than a single home on Cady.

The council voted to rezone four lots on Randolph east of Northville Green, and six on Rayson between Main and Hutton. The rezoning, from R-3 (multi-family) to R-2 (one- and two-family), followed a relatively quiet Sept. 21 public hearing.

One of two residents to question the rezoning, Brookside Apartments owner Larry Sheehan, asked whether the rezoning would lower his property tax bill.

"If you lessen the zoning, don't you lessen the value?" he asked. "Shouldn't that lessen the taxes?"

"My only objection would be that if the city does take something that lessens the value . . . it should be reflected in the appraisal," Sheehan said.

According to Chief Financial Officer Mark Christiansen, zoning is just one of several factors used to determine property value, and not the largest one. "Zoning can have an ef-

fect, but use is more the controlling factor," he said.

Rayson resident Wayne Gabe said he did not mind the zoning being changed from R-3 to R-2. "If it's going to be moved at all."

The city's Planning Commission originally had considered rezoning the properties to R-1B (single-family), which would have prevented the conversion of existing single-family homes to duplexes. But residents objected to the proposal at a public workshop earlier this year, and the rezoning was changed.

The vote followed city approval of a rezoning on Cady Street that had drawn several meetings' worth of protests from the Kohs family. Property owner Mrs. George Kohs had objected to the city's proposal to rezone her home from R-3 to R-1B, saying its proximity to a school services center and cemetery made it fitting for an R-3 designation.

But council members called the original R-3 zoning an example of spot zoning, and agreed that the 2.12-acre property's potential redevelopment as a 32-unit apartment complex "would have a detrimental impact on the neighborhood."





Parents push board to end honors fee

There was a lot of talk at Monday's School Board meeting about National Honor Society fees, but little action.

Parents with students in the National Honor Society came in droves to the meeting to see the outcome of an earlier complaint alleging the district violated the charter of the National Honor Society by charging students \$95 above and beyond the \$5 membership dues fee written in the society's rule book.

The complaint was raised by Lonna Lemmon at the Sept. 14 board meeting. She said that membership dues are spelled out in the charter and anything beyond that is in violation of it.

At stake is the district's NHS charter as the board and the administration go through pay-to-participate and policy subcommittee meetings to rectify the issue.

Whether school officials will yank the honor society from the list of chargeable co-curricular activities remains to be seen. The issue was discussed Tuesday night with a handful of members from the pay-to-participate committee and is expected to be on the agenda of the policy subcommittee meeting sometime next week before it makes the Oct. 12

board agenda.

But parents who were at Monday's meeting see no reason for stalling. For them it's a clear-cut decision.

"To me the issue is real simple," said Steve Lloyd, a parent who questioned the board about the NHS fiasco Monday night.

"The national sanction has ruled that there is \$5 maximum. You are in a no-win situation. If \$5 is the max, it's only a matter of time," he said.

Lloyd urged school officials to voluntarily bring their policy in line with the national charter before the NHS revokes the charter for the violation.

"Get credit for doing it willingly," Lloyd said.

Sue Krupansky agreed. "Just do the right thing," she urged the board on Monday.

Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said it wasn't as simple as all that. Pulling the NHS off the list of chargeable activities will impact the district's co-curricular budget and possibly the feasibility of all the other co-curricular activities. Pulling one activity out could upset the apple cart for all those in the total budget.

That's what school officials say they are working to avoid.

"We have to look at all the issues," Rezmierski said. "One action could produce an avalanche of actions that we don't want to see happen."

Strategy shifts after millage loss

Members of the Northville School District's Strategic Planning Committee will sequester themselves for two and half days this weekend to realign the district's goals in the wake of last summer's millage defeat, and to assess the impact of budget cuts on the committee's five-year plan.

It won't be business as usual, committee members said, heading into the deliberations. The \$2.6-million in budget reductions, 10-percent staff downsizing, cuts in programming and transportation, and larger class sizes may curtail goals the committee had set forth for the 1992-93 school year and years to follow.

Officials predict many of the committee's strategies will be put on hold as they try to deal with the financial impact of the millage defeat and the potential for further crisis looming with the tax proposals on the November ballot. That, coupled with the reams of state-mandated programs rolling down from lawmakers in Lansing, should keep the committee busy during the three scheduled meeting sessions on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

During the deliberations the committee expects to hear updates on the existing action plans, consider the

next millage campaign, discuss the options for structuring the high school day, and address student needs.

And in spite of the magnitude of the committee's assignment, there will be fewer committee members in attendance this year than in years past. Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski has asked 12 people to step down for this second annual update.

The reduction in committee members is due largely to comments made by the 42 members of the original committee. Those people told school administrators in August they thought the group was too large to

work efficiently, and there were too many administrators and board faces on the committee for them to feel comfortable expressing their opinions.

In response Rezmierski has asked that Early Childhood Center Administrator Mary Kay Gallagher, high school Principal Thomas Johnson, Meads Mill Principal David Longridge, School Board President Carol Rahimi, board Treasurer Robert McMahon, and board Secretary Richard Brown all step down. Others who were on the committee were either asked to resign or volunteered to step down, Rezmierski said.

Newly elected board member Pat

Custer will pick up one of the vacancies.

The configuration of the Strategic Planning Committee has recently come under fire from some residents who complain about its makeup and the selection process used to determine who sits on the steering committee.

Of the 25 committee members, five are central office administrators, two are school board members, two are high school students, four are teachers, one is a building principal, nine are business people from the community at large (two of which are Advocates for Quality Education members), one is a PTA member and one is a Northville Public Schools support staffer.

Rezmierski answered those critics by saying that by and large the makeup of the committee is the same as those who served on the original planning committee.

"First and foremost they are basically the same people, other than downsizing the group, which was the recommendation of the committee in August and agreed to by the folks at Cambridge."

Cambridge is the external facilitating group steering the committee.

"It's been the same process, by and large, only we've pared it down," Rezmierski said. "We ask people to sit on the committee who can work towards a consensus and are supportive of public education."

Township prepares

Flames and heat are not the only perils facing firefighters and other emergency services personnel.

Danger often lies in the form of the unknown or unseen. Chemicals, gases, and other potentially hazardous materials stored in a building can quickly turn a modest, seemingly controllable fire into a raging, sometimes lethal, inferno.

Local firefighters are hoping to avoid such scenes. Spurred by bulked-up state fire marshal's guide lines, firefighters in Northville Township are planning for tragic events they hope never occur.

Firefighters currently are mailing pre incident surveys to all township businesses and apartment complexes. The surveys ask business owners and operators to list all on-site hazardous chemicals and other materials that may pose danger when exposed to heat, fire, and other trying circumstances, said township firefighter Guy Balok.

State Firefighter-Right-to-Know laws dictate that firms handling hazardous chemicals provide the local fire department with a list of such agents. In the township, firefighters will send out a survey form that includes several typical chemicals that fall under possible hazardous materials guidelines.

Follow-ups — in the form of business pre incident survey inspections — are meant as a sort of safety blue print for firefighters, Balok said.

Balok said trained fire staffers will record information about each business. That data will be posted in fire vehicles for easy review on the way to an emergency scene. Much of the survey is based upon common-sense approaches to fire safety, he said, adding that firefighters would rather be prepared for an incident before it happens.

"The idea is to know about the building and chemicals and hazardous materials," Balok said. "We'll check on how large the building is, where and what the utilities are, and how easy it is to get in and out of the building."

Some items themselves are not considered dangerous, but fall into that category when exposed to hazardous elements, Balok said. He pointed to bromine tablets used in apartment complex pools as an example. He also said the syrup used in some soft-drink concoctions at restaurants can become dangerous under certain emergency situations.

With about 200 registered businesses in the township, fire officials will have plenty of research to do. Large retail shops could take a day to inspect and inventory, while firefighters can zip through smaller mom-and-pop outfits in about an hour, Balok said.

Those business owners wondering if their operations need to be surveyed should contact the township fire department for more information. Most businesses do fall under the guidelines, and the state is threatening non-compliers with a referral to the Department of Labor, Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA).

But the plain facts are this: Every-one gains by increased knowledge of buildings and on-site hazardous materials, Balok said.


"We're not looking for fire hazards, but we are looking for things that could cause problems during a fire," he said. "When we go to Meijer, we'll know where things are; if we're at Highland Lakes Shopping Plaza, we'll know where the fire walls are."

Balok estimated that the survey and inspection process could take 18 months to complete.

Property owners face new fines for overdue winter tax payments

The taxman cometh, and you'd better pay up promptly.

Under a resolution adopted by the council Sept. 21, the deadline for paying winter property taxes has been moved up from Feb. 28 to Feb. 14. Taxes collected after Feb. 14 will

now be subject to a 3-percent late charge.

The penalty date matches that used in many communities, according to City Manager Gary Word, and the 3-percent fee is set by state tax law. After March 1, overdue taxes are subject to a 3-percent late fee levied by the counties.

Council members spent little time reviewing the resolution, which was

first proposed at an April budget session during formation of the city's deficit elimination plan. The fee is expected to raise an additional \$3,000 in city revenue.

"What are we trying to accomplish here?" asked Council Member Jerry

Mittman. "Get two weeks of added interest?"

Mark Christiansen, the city's chief

financial officer, said the change will help the city make its payments to the county in a more timely fashion.

"It just allows us to do all the settlement procedures prior to March 1, so we can settle with the counties on that date," he said.

The change will be the subject of a note included in this winter's tax bills, and the new date will be highlighted on the bills themselves.

Schools face half-a-loaf recapture decision

Northville and many other suburban school districts won half a loaf of state aid in the Michigan Supreme Court.

The high court ruled 4-3 Tuesday that:

- The state was wrong to take away ("recapture") funds for categoricals — special education, transportation for special education students, bilingual instruction, and the lunch and supplemental milk program. The 1990 recapture cost more than 50 districts some \$72 million.
- The state doesn't have to pay school districts' Social Security taxes despite a 1956 agreement. "Social Security coverage is not a state-required activity or service within the meaning of the Headlee amendment," said the high court majority.

The case was filed by Gerald Schmidt, a Warren Woods School District taxpayer and trustee. It was joined by Northville and more than 50 other plaintiffs, mostly from the metropolitan suburbs and the Lake Michigan shoreline.

Among the co-plaintiffs were the Avondale, Birmingham, Farmington, Novi, Rochester, Southfield, Troy and West Bloomfield school districts in Oakland County, and the Livonia, Plymouth-Canton and South Redford school districts in Wayne County.

Reversing a bitterly contested Court of Appeals decision were Justices Patricia Boyle, James Brickley, Robert Griffin and Conrad Mallett Jr.

Dissenting — though for differing reasons — were Chief Justice Michael Cavanagh and Justices Charles Levin and Dorothy Comstock Riley.

Boyle's majority reversed a 1990 decision by the Court of Appeals' then-chief judge, Robert Danhof, who dismissed the suburban districts' case. Danhof, whom the suburbs viewed as their arch-foe, retired from the bench a year ago.

The case goes back to the Court of Appeals for further proceedings.

The complex decision revolves around two sections of the 1978 Headlee amendment to the Michigan Constitution.

Sec. 29 prohibits the state "from reducing the state financed proportion of the necessary costs of any existing activity or service required of units of local government . . . A new activity or service . . . shall not be required by the legislature . . . unless a state appropriation is made and disbursed to pay the unit of local government."

Sec. 30 requires the state to pay 41.6 percent of its budget to local units, the same proportion in effect in 1978.

Wrote Boyle: "The state is obligated to afford each unit providing the activity or service the same proportion of funding that the state provided on a statewide basis in the year that the Headlee amendment was ratified (1978)."

She added: "Social Security coverage is directly imposed by federal law and therefore is not required by state law within the meaning of Sec. 29."

Both then-Gov. James Blanchard, a Democrat, and his successor, Republican John Engler, supported "recapture." They and key lawmakers of both parties saw it as a method of closing the gap between rich (\$9,000 per

student) and poor (\$2,500) school districts.

The Supreme Court itself split across philosophical lines. The majority included Boyle and Mallett, both appointed by Blanchard, and Brickley and Griffin, with Republican backgrounds.

Chief Justice Cavanagh, in a lone dissent, upheld the state's position. Cavanagh said state aid should be calculated as a percentage of aid to all local school districts in the aggregate. "As long as the state is prevented from shifting its funding responsibilities onto local governments on an overall, statewide basis," Sec. 29 is satisfied, said one of the court's most liberal members.

Levin, an independent liberal, and Riley, a conservative Republican, teamed up in a second dissent. They said the state should pay both for mandated services and Social Security taxes.

Levin and Riley blistered the state's 1990 recapture as "a sham" and "a budgetary dissimulation that enables the state to avoid this ceiling on state spending by shifting to relatively wealthy school districts the cost of additional state spending to provide aid to poorer school districts."

Bill okayed

School districts would be required to make gender equity and multiculturalism part of their 3- to 5-year improvement programs under a bill passed by state representatives.

But majority Democrats shot down a Republican attempt to make public schools pay for the retraining of graduates whose first employers find them deficient in any basic skill.

The gender equity bill was passed 76 to 22 on Sept. 23. Favoring it were both of Northville's representatives, Republicans Georgina Goss of Northville and Willis Bullard of Milford.

Goss was a co-sponsor of the measure, sponsored by Mary Brown, D-Kalamazoo.

Some Republicans complained it didn't go far enough.

"It's fatally flawed," said Rep. Tom Middleton, R-Ortonville, "because it doesn't deal with equity for handicappers."

Rep. William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe, added that House Bill 5901 also should require schools to do something about gender and handicapper equity, not just "give reason or excuse for nonaction."

Republicans bashed Democrats for refusing to report an educational warranty bill out of the House Education Committee for a floor vote.

The GOP pushed an amendment that would require local districts to retrain high school graduates who were found by their first employers to lack basic skills. It lost, 47-51, with 11 not voting.

Bullard and Goss both voted yes. "If you want this bill to go down in flames, then adopt this amendment," warned Democrat William Keith of Garden City, chair of the Education Committee.

"We had a hearing on it. The Michigan Association of School Boards, the Michigan Education Association, the Michigan Federation of Teachers — all are against it."

Keith said the warranty measure should be amended, as educators wish, to let the employer see the graduate's attendance record and grades.

"You (Republicans) call them interests, but they're on the cutting edge of what takes place in education," Keith said.

But GOP minority leader Paul Hill, egotist, who hopes to become House speaker if his party takes control after Nov. 3, said a majority of the House is continually frustrated at the Democratic leadership's refusal to take up bills.

"This issue isn't allowed to happen. There's a majority for no fault (auto insurance) reform, for medical liability reform."

"But the folks who control the procedure don't allow it to happen. I hope the public understands that."



using, it correlates to how easy they think it is to get it," he said.

A majority of the seniors surveyed said it was very easy for them to get alcohol and cigarettes. More than half said it was just as easy for them to buy pot in the community, too.

While alcohol, cigarettes and marijuana use is on the rise here in Northville and across the country, more students here seem to be shy away from the hard narcotics like crack, cocaine and heroin. But even so, Northville's stats for the last year in some cases beat out national averages in LSD, heroin, inhalants, sedatives and other narcotics use.

"What we are beginning to show in the past year is a higher frequency rate," Hamilton said. "Almost half of our seniors said they had drunk five or more drinks in a row in the past two weeks, compared to 33 percent of

the national average.

"What that means is that they are basically drinking on the weekends and drinking to excess," he said. "You can see how pervasive the alcohol is and how it keeps coming up."

Students were also asked where they used drugs and alcohol. The majority of seniors — 60 percent — said they use alcohol at parties and at friends' homes. Thirty-six percent drank at home and 40 percent in cars. Concurrently the majority of students who answered a similar question about drugs said they used at parties or friends' homes before they did it in their own homes or at or near school grounds.

That was good news for Hamilton, who's been trying to sell the community on the idea that teen substance abuse is a community problem and not the sole responsibility of the school district.

"What this is saying is that it is ap-

parent that students have not escaped the problem. It is also apparent that while the school must do its share, it is a community-wide problem," he said.

Sharon Ferrara, president of Northville's PTA Coordinating Council, backed Hamilton.

"I think the results of this survey are going to wake up a lot of people in our community," she said. "This is not an isolated issue to the schools."

"I think our schools have had a number of programs in effect for years that have helped out students."

And what Ferrara said is supported by the survey. An overwhelming majority of students at all three grade levels surveyed said they have had drug education courses, seen films or heard lectures that have swayed their decision to not use drugs.

What Hamilton and others like him from Northville Action Council

and Northville Youth Assistance are hoping for is a community-wide response to the problem that is now clearly before them. In years past, Hamilton and NAC President Roxanne Casterline both have said the community wasn't willing to admit students in Northville had a substance abuse problem. But the survey tells a different tale.

Hamilton and members of NAC are taking the initiative to correct the problem by trying to create a safe environment for students through the Safe Homes program. Under the provisions of the program, parents sign a pledge form and agree to chaperone parties and prohibit the consumption of alcohol and drugs at their homes.

With the implementation of Safe Homes, school officials and civic leaders hope to reduce the students' use inside and outside of the home.

Group hears budget pleas

Board's budget hearing and adoption meeting.

More than likely, a few dollars will be discovered here and there in several of those austere budgets. But some significant chunks of change must also be located and axed. Possible victims include major capital outlay requests, including the Police Department's plea for a \$155,000 radio dispatch unit.

Other probable areas of review include legal fees, some employee benefit packages, vehicle purchases, computer equipment, and proposed personnel additions.

Budget reviewers covered the spectrum of township operations Tuesday. From the police and fire departments through the library and the Clerk's Department, reviewers heard the big (\$2.9 million proposed for the Water and Sewer Department) and the little (\$1,050 proposed for township constables).

Some facets of township operations are in better shape than others. The Building Department, for example, has boasted revenue increases due to fee hikes and a warming trend

in housing starts. That department covers its expenses and kicks excess dollars into the township general fund.

For other departments, mere survival is the issue.

Department heads representing the city and township's shared services each chimed in with tales of woe. The community senior citizens and Northville Youth Assistance programs seem most vulnerable.

"Putting it mildly, this program's in trouble," said Traci Gottschalk, parks and recreation director, speaking on behalf of the senior citizens program. "The city and township pride themselves on the senior programs they provide, but they really don't fund them."

Grants traditionally have funded the seniors program. But those sources are drying up, and the seniors are looking for about \$10,000 more in 1993 from city and township government than they did last year.

The youth assistance program also appears troubled. Although Director Mary Ellen King is holding her city/township funding requests at last year's levels, a shortfall is expected by late next year. Proposed

1993 receipts total \$27,646, while expenditures are pegged at near \$40,000.

Recreation and library department heads also want more money than last year, when they suffered 5-percent cuts from 1991 totals.

Big-ticket staples like police and fire services drew considerable attention from the budget reviewers. Police Chief Chip Snider is pitching a \$1.7 million budget for 1993, and is anticipating more than \$300,000 in revenues to help offset costs.

Funded largely (\$1.3 million) through a voter-approved police millage, the department is looking to promote two officers in 1993, while adding another officer and an administrative assistant position. Other funding requests include five new police cars and the dispatch radio.

Salary increases for township employees was one common thread that weaved its way through the budget reports. From shared services to the Fire Department and general administration, the plea for wage hikes rang clear.



been kept up to-date for at least the last 11 years, and there's some evidence they were not kept up-to-date before that."

The assessor is finding both errors of omission and inclusion in the city's records, Word said. "We are finding some things that were not recorded, and some things that were recorded that have been demolished. It works both ways."

Word and Christiansen sought to hire Zbranchik in April under a one-year, \$18,720 contract. But the council only approved a six-month hire, and will review Zbranchik's performance at the end of October. Council members were upset that Zbranchik began working before they approved her contract, and one member charged that the hire was indicative of an assessing department that had run amok and was costing the city much more than originally planned.

The hire also was criticized by city employees who have been hit by a se-

ries of wage freezes, work reductions and layoffs.

Since the reappraisal has begun, some residents have objected to letting the assessor into their homes. Mark Christiansen, who heads the city's assessing department as chief financial officer, said he is not surprised by the complaints.

"Any mass reappraisal/reinspection is going to instigate complaints," Christiansen said.

"People don't want people on their property or in their houses, even more so than when I started doing this 20 years ago. Nobody wants to see anything done to raise their taxes."

Christiansen said he has heard several complaints regarding the city's request to make internal inspections of the homes. "That's a controversial issue," he admitted. "People don't want us in, for obvious

reasons."

But, he added, "If we're going to do an accurate job, we've got to get into the home."

From an assessing standpoint, the reappraisal is needed to spread the tax burden fairly among property owners, Christiansen said.

With two assessment-capping proposals on the November ballot, Christiansen said the field inspections are a way to get Northville's assessing files in order before new limits are placed on the city's property tax revenue. "Not knowing exactly how things are going to turn out, I'm trying my level best to get things as equitable as possible before that happens," he said.

The inspections will also help the city comply with a recently adopted state law requiring municipalities to make field appraisals of every property every five years.

The chief financial officer estimated that 20 to 25 percent of the city's Wayne County residential assessing records contain errors, because of the lack of reappraisals done

In the past. Aside from the unrecorded additions, common mistakes include two-story homes listed as 1½ stories and homes whose quality of construction has been graded too low, he said. Those errors are magnified over the years as the faulty data is used to analyze entire neighborhoods, he said.

"It's critical that you have accurate data on file when you're using the data for statistical analysis," he

added.

Once the inspections are completed later this year, it will be Christiansen's job to analyze the data and update the city's records. When that task is complete some time in January or February, he'll be able to figure the resulting change in city's tax base. "That's the hardest number to come up with at this point," Christiansen said.

Facts About Cholesterol

Your body needs cholesterol. But too much of a good thing is not good for you. Too much can cause heart disease and heart attacks.

What Is Cholesterol?

is that the city would be involved, and they liked the idea of community involvement," he said.

The proposal has been in the works for the past six months, said City Manager Gary Word.

"I think the concept is great," Word said, but he added that the proposal would be expensive. "It really boils down to financing. It probably should be a joint agreement between the city and township to cover the lease payment . . . It would probably more than double our contribution to the library if we relocated to that facility."

While the city may have room under its millage cap to raise that money without an election, the township does not, Word said.

"Township officials made it very clear to me that they cannot do it at this time without a millage vote of some kind," he said.

Member Dave Totten said. "But whether the city can afford it, I think, is questionable. I feel that the city

fathers are probably not going to be interested in going that deep in the hole."

With the current Township Board expressing little interest in a joint city/township venture, and the new board not being sworn in until Nov. 20, the chapter may already be closed on this proposal, Totten said. "We certainly can't do anything without a commitment from the township board, because the city can't swing it alone," he said.

Study Committee Member Michelle Kelly favored the concept of a private developer retaining control of the plant. "I think this is a well-established private developer who's looking to move very quickly," she said. "They have proposed tenants to move in September of 1993."

Library Director Pat Orr also was impressed by the proposal but concerned about the limited time for the city to respond.

"It's an incredible opportunity," Orr said. "It would meet the library's needs and then some."

The one sticking point in Orr's mind is the Nov. 13 deadline.

"My big concern is that the library's involvement may not be possible due to the time element," she said. "I just don't think the government can react that quickly and satisfy the public's concerns."

"There's not enough time to educate the community between now and mid-November."

A proposed district library is still too far off to provide the answer, Orr added. Under the current timetable, a vote to establish a district library will not be held until February.

The study committee was scheduled to review the proposal in greater detail yesterday evening, after the Record's deadline.



Our Opinion

Study makes it clear that drugs are here

Northville has a drug problem. That's not an alarmist statement, and it's not a criticism. It doesn't mean that Northville is a bad place, or that its young people are bad people. It just means a problem exists, and we hope that no one will deny it any more. Because when you've got a drug problem, you have to fight it.

The just-released study of drug use among students in the Northville Public Schools is an eye-opener of the first order. Anyone who's been paying attention knows that some people in Northville abuse drugs; the evidence is everywhere: stories about drug busts in the paper, hearsay about some out-of-control party or other, and sometimes visual proof right in front of us. Those few who say it doesn't happen here have been kidding themselves, and most people knew it.

The University of Michigan/Western Michigan University study, though, took things to a new level. Now we've got quantified data of reported drug use among local students. For the high school seniors questioned, the study even provides comparisons to national averages.

The news is not good. In more than half the categories, last year's seniors reported incidents of drug use higher than the national average. This was true whether you looked at use in the past month, past year, or lifetime. It was true whether you looked at the more common drugs, like alcohol, or the somewhat less common, like inhalants. In lower grades, where no reliable national means are available for comparison, the reported use nonetheless appears frighteningly high.

Now, anyone determined not to believe these results could come up with a lot of rationalizations for them which might reduce their impact. For example, maybe Northville students answering the survey were more honest than those elsewhere in the country; that could mean actual use here is lower than normal. Or maybe Northville students were in a particularly playful mood when taking the survey, reporting use when there was none and exaggerating use when there was. After all, in a couple of instances the results show minor conflicts within the survey. Or perhaps there were statistical problems here which haven't come to light, like skewed samples loc-

ally or nationally. Maybe there were even simple mistakes in tabulation.

All these things are possible. None of them is likely.

No, the strongest interpretation of the survey results is simply that they're accurate, or close to it. And that means the community has a problem.

The community, notice, not the school district. This survey was run through the public schools and presented to the School Board only because the schools are where teenagers spend the most time. The results should be just as important to the City Council and Township Board as the School Board, if not more so. It's the local police departments, after all, who have to deal with the consequences of this abuse and try to prevent it in the first place.

And naturally, the survey should concern every citizen of the Northville community. These are our friends, neighbors, relatives. On a different level, it's local tax dollars going to support police efforts and counseling programs. In a very real sense, it's the future of this community on the line.

Sound like we're being too dramatic? We're not. The community has done a lot to try getting at the root of the drug problem, but it's clearly not enough.

In the local governments, the Northville Youth Assistance program and the Student Assistance Program provide critical services to at-risk students. But both programs are often among the first to feel the pinch from tight budgets (see editorial below); perhaps this survey tells us it's time to rearrange some priorities.

The Northville Action Council heads up the community's volunteer efforts on the drug-abuse front, and its members deserve strong commendation for their consistent dedication to raising awareness of the problem and to fighting its existence. The forthcoming "Safe Homes" program, for example, could well serve as a significant step in the anti-drug effort.

The rest of the community needs to do more, though. We don't pretend to know what that is, of course. We just hope this survey will help focus people's attention on the problem. It's time — past time — for more community discussion about the situation and possible solutions. This is not a survey to be forgotten.

Dodging the bullet

Charlie Stilec, coordinator of the Student Assistance Program at Northville High School (and a regular contributor to our op-ed page), is back at school this year. But he almost wasn't.

When tax-hike denials forced the School Board to trim its budget this year, the Student Assistance Program — in essence, Stilec — was among the cuts. It wasn't the first time he faced such a situation; a few years ago, changes in grants put the post in jeopardy until the district picked up its funding.

This time, it took some hard work and creative thinking to find more grant money to use for funding the position. Northville Action Council leaders Roxanne Casterline and Al Qualman,

together with the school district's Bill Hamilton and Dolly McMaster, read the fine print in some funding rules and came up with a way to return Stilec to work part-time now, later becoming full-time.

The recent drug survey results help show the need for programs like this. But before they came out, the numerous testimonials from students Stilec has helped should have convinced everyone of the value he and his job hold for the schools.

The people who resolved the funding difficulty deserve thanks from not only people involved with the schools, but the community as a whole.

Suburbs transform politics



Michigan, like the rest of the country, is becoming suburbanized. Chrysler's decision to move its corporate headquarters from urban Highland Park to suburban Auburn Hills merely symbolizes the fundamental demographic transformation that has been taking place for the past 35 years.

It's no surprise that politics, too, is being transformed. Today's suburban electorate is unlike either the rural voters who dominated American politics in the 19th century or the urban voters who largely ran the show in the first half of the 20th.

Suburbanites in general:
● Own their own houses and therefore pay property taxes. They might be the first demographic group ever to be defined by their taxpaying status.

● Are skeptical of activist governments that take their tax money but use it to benefit somebody else.
● Tend, therefore, to oppose social welfare programs.
● Support, however, what might be called public works — i.e., governmental activities that benefit most folks.

These tendencies lie behind the major turning points in modern American politics. Political scientists call them "watershed elections," because they set the course of politics for the next 15 or 20 years.

Lyndon Johnson was forced from office in 1968 in part because the war in Vietnam was deeply unpopular with many of his liberal, younger constituents. But just as important, LBJ stood for the Great Society, a series of governmental prog-

rams that took tax money from suburbanites and used it to benefit minorities.

Suburbanites were persuaded to take a chance on Ronald Reagan because he represented a way out of Jimmy Carter's Great Inflation that eroded the incomes and inflated the property taxes of suburbanites. "Are you better off now than you were four years ago?" is not only great political theater; it's solid suburban political economy.

And now 12 years of Republican control are held hostage by the Great Recession that is hurting more white-collar workers (i.e., folks who live in the suburbs) than any other recession in our history. President Bush's nightmare is that those same suburbanites who sustained his party for so many years will be the same folks who find it in their interest to turn against him.

To win back suburbanites, Democrats must persuade them they can manage the economy better than Republicans have.

This would not be easy for a traditional, urban-centered Democratic politician who advocates social welfare programs and income redistribution.

But success might come to a politician who argues that America's troubles are rooted in failure to train and educate everybody in the workforce and who explains that the real reason for the erosion of our national competitiveness lies in an ideological fascination with trickle-down passivism.

It's a strategy focused on folks who live in the suburbs. And it explains just why Gov. Clinton was in suburban Macomb County two weeks ago and why President Bush began last Sunday's Michigan train trip in suburban Plymouth.

Beck park development vital

To the editor:

I am writing in response to a letter in the Sept. 24 *Record* written by William C. Soelner. In his letter Mr. Soelner objects to the city financing of the Beck Road Park. I imagine that he is not alone in his beliefs that this is not a necessity, so I would like to give a few facts.

This park must be developed now. True, it is two and a half miles out of town and located next to a prison. It is also the only large piece of property being given to a financially hindered Parks and Recreation Department. There is not another 39-acre plot of land closer to town.

The Parks and Recreation department only owns three sites used for recreation, those being Henningsen Field behind the Township Hall, Fish Hatchery Park on Seven Mile and the 39 acres on Beck Road. All other areas are leased or borrowed for recreation uses. Even the Recreation Building is owned by the school system, although the Parks and Recreation Department pays for all upkeep maintenance and improvements.

Did you know that only 39 cents of every \$1,000 in taxes in the city and 26 cents of every \$1,000 in tax dollars in the township goes to support the Parks and Recreation Department?

Since February I have been involved with a core group to form the Friends of Northville Parks and Recreation. We have studied the needs of the department and ways that private citizens can help to improve our parks. In July we had a reception with a slide show of parks conditions and questions and answers. This slide show is available to all groups interested.

We also had a workday in July where a group of about 20 volunteers painted, stained, cleaned and upgraded facilities both owned and leased.

During the recent Victorian Festival the fund raising committee did a game booth and information booth to help raise money for new tot lot equipment at Fish Hatchery Park.

We need more interested people to join our group because the more people we have the more we can do. Our next general meeting will be held at the Recreation Building Nov. 10 at 7:30 p.m.





It's called a salon, and about 30 area residents gathered at Borders Book Shop in the Novi Town Center Sunday to listen to Barbara Masters, a retired Plymouth teacher who was once the subject of censorship attempts.

The purpose of the salon is to share ideas — to argue, to support and to discuss the many ways of looking at a given subject.

The Borders Sunday Salon has become a monthly event in Novi, with a sign up list that is nearly always full long before the scheduled date.

This month's salon, held on Sunday, Sept. 27, had a banned books theme in honor of the annual Banned Books Week.

"Every day someone, somewhere attacks a book, or a piece of art, or a piece of music — and tries to make it unavailable for the rest of us to read and enjoy," said Borders publicist Wanda Freeman.

This particular salon followed a slightly different format than usual, Freeman explained, because of a larger than usual group.

Normally Sunday Salon hosts two speakers with different ideas on a given subject, then the listeners break into groups to share their own thoughts and ideas.

This time, Masters was the sole speaker, standing

behind a podium before a group that was arranged like a small classroom or lecture hall. After she addressed the group about her censorship concerns, a question-and-answer period ensued.

But, keeping with the salon format, the question and answer period soon became a rollicking discussion as participants tossed their thoughts about and agreed — or disagreed — with each other.

Masters' own experience occurred when a Plymouth-based Christian group called Citizens for a Better Education (CBE) attempted to ban the alternative newsweekly *The Metro Times* from the schools after learning that she was using it in her classroom. She was using it because it contained an article on rainforests.

"They tried to ban it because there are romance ads in the back. And what if one of the students answered one of those romance ads, and what if a student got AIDS as a result of answering that ad?" Masters explained.

Masters said she was also criticized for using a student-written paper that she felt was an example of very powerful writing.

"The paper was about divorce and they objected because it was depressing and they felt we should be using upbeat materials in the schools," she said.

But Masters said she is far from an expert on the topic of censorship, and said she feels other people in America have more powerful tales to tell.

"Nobody's ever broken into my garage and smashed my printing press," she said. "Nobody's ever arrested me on phony drug charges because I wrote against the Vietnam War. Nobody's ever threatened to take away my job. I've never received phone calls in the middle of the night."

"Those are things that have happened to many writers who published material that didn't fit into what may be called the mainstream."

Masters said that, during the last school year, there were 376 reported attempts at censorship in the United States. The incidents occurred in 44 different states, and 41 of the attempts were successful.

She pointed out a variety of other forms of censorship in the United States, ranging from FCC regulations barring radio stations from reading Alan Ginsberg's poem "Howl" on the air, to current legislative attempts to bar doctors in federally funded clinics from discussing the option of abortion.

But later in her presentation, Masters seemed to get off her own subject and began to talk about a type of "news" show for teenagers that is being shown in some high schools. The shows include advertising for various products, like candy bars and blue jeans.

It's a controversial program because of the advertising, which comes at a fast pace in large quantities, and Masters is opposed to it.

"I wouldn't worry so much about the promotion of Twinkies and Levis as I would the lifestyles being advo-

cated in these ads," she said. "Some states have banned it."

Audience member David Seemann challenged the speaker. "How can you be opposed to a banning of ads in school, yet be opposed to censorship?" he asked.

After some thought, as well as further discussion by several other audience members, she responded "Because the public school is not a place for commercial messages." Some people agreed with her. Some didn't.

Other teachers in the audience shared experience with censorship. Another Plymouth teacher, Kathy Thompson, is picketed every year by CBE because she uses the movie *Excalibur* in her classroom. She has also been challenged on several other books she uses, including one that mentions Lucifer in the prologue.

Another told of a parent objecting to his use of a book on eskimos because it contained a chapter where a group of hunters drank blood.

Still another experienced parental objections to *The Grapes of Wrath* and *Huckleberry Finn* because they present a negative view of America's past.

The discussion flowed on. "Why are people so upset about words?" one person asked, when someone commented on profanity in books and films.

"It's the relationship between words and behavior," responded another.

"But at what point does a human learn the



Pottery expert to visit Northville

La Belle Provence at 119 Center Street in Northville welcomes Paul Janssens on Friday, Oct. 2, from 2-7 p.m. and Saturday, Oct. 3, from 11-4 p.m.

Janssens is president of Quimper Faience Inc. and of HB Henriot Faience De Quimper, names known wherever fine pottery is prized. Janssens visits as representative of the factory, located in the little village of Quimper in the French province of Brittany. There, one of the oldest factories in Europe keeps the potter's craft alive, as one of the few remaining in France that continues to hand paint its pottery.

This Quimper Faience pottery, known simply as Quimper (pronounced kam-pair) has charming provincial patterns depicting Breton country life, peasants in traditional garb, flowers, cocks and birds. Each piece is hand painted by artists who train for at least three years to achieve the brush strokes characteristic of the ware.

Quimper pottery is stored only in selected, fine specialty stores in the United States. And one of them is right here in Northville. In a visit to La Belle Provence this weekend you can meet Janssens, view the 300-year-old hand painting process and enjoy wine, hors d'oeuvres and a special preview of the newest Quimper pattern, "Campetre." "Campetre" is available first in Michigan at La Belle Provence.

Collectors of antique Quimper are encouraged to draw on Janssens' knowledge by bringing in their collections. Experienced and new collectors won't want to miss this rare opportunity. Additionally, other selected Quimper pieces will be available at a special savings of 10-40 percent in honor of Janssens' visit. "La vie campetre" is country life. This decor captures the essence of French rural, pastoral living. The cockerel, symbol of France, struts through the countryside, master of all he surveys. The original decor was created in the early 1920s by the Henriot factory. This pattern is being reintroduced and is available first in Michigan at La Belle Provence.

The plates and accessory pieces have been fully handpainted in beautiful, brilliant colors on a white glaze. The decorations on the pieces present a coordinated look, the large piece with the full cock decor, medium sized pieces with floral and fence, and the smaller pieces are floral.

The handpainted French faience known as Quimper dates back to 1690. It is earthenware fired with a tin-based glaze. The pottery takes its

name from the town of Quimper, where potter Jean-Baptiste Bousquet built his kilns. Although the area had long been associated with pottery as far back as Gallo-Roman times, Bousquet is credited with being the founder since he was the first to hire other artisans and form a factory.

Each piece is hand painted with the use of decal or stencil by one of 48 painters. The majority of the patterns are painted on top of raw glaze, which is a formidable process. Signed by the artist and completely painted by one person from start to finish, it reflects the individual touches which make each piece unique.

Painting Quimper is a true folk art which has been passed down for generations. Each pattern requires a combination of different strokes and brushes. Artists spend two to three years learning the quick flicks of the wrist, a painting technique known as "coup de pinceau," creating distinct native designs that have come to be cherished by collectors around the world. An experienced painter decorates a plate in 25 minutes to one hour depending upon the intricacy of the pattern.

Decor Henriot is the most traditional pattern showing the Breton figures. It has been made continuously for 100 years, and has been exported to America since the late 1800s. Over

the years, thousands of molds and over 100 patterns have been created by the artisans at the factory. Patterns featuring peasant figures in bright traditional costumes, birds and roosters (the symbol of France) and botanical scenes were designed for the various pieces. Slowly, these are being revived, and today the atelier produces 30 patterns as well as special orders for decors presently not in production.

Antique Quimper is sought after by collectors throughout Europe and America. Desirable pieces have recently sold at auctions for as much as \$5,500.

Janssens, 60, is a Dutchman who came to America 34 years ago, and his wife, Sarah, 40, is a native of New England. Paul first discovered Quimper in 1955 when he worked as the European buyer for an American importer. In 1978, they bought an old department store in Stonington, Conn., to start a business and at the same time heard that the importer of Quimper, Carbone, a Boston-based company, was going out of business after 100 years. They immediately went to France to become the importers of Henriot Quimper and, in 1979, opened the Quimper Faience shop in Stonington and began a mail-order business.

When the Janssens heard about the bankruptcy situation, they realized that unless they purchased the

factory, they would have been out of business also. Paul had the marketing skills that were lacking at the factory and Sarah had retail experience, so they submitted a bid to buy the factory.

In a presentation to the French bankruptcy court, Paul Janssens was able to use his intimate knowledge of the factory and the couple's experience in merchandising to convince the court to award them a contract to buy the factory for 10 million francs (\$1 million). The Janssens sold 49 percent of the company to 33 American investors, most of them devoted collectors of Quimper. Seventy-thousand shares were purchased at \$10 per share.

The Janssens hired Pierre Henriot, a 36-year-old great grandson of the original Henriot family, along with 50 former employees and set about rejuvenating the ancient landmark.

They initiated vigorous merchandising and public relations programs and within a few short years the payroll at the old factory rose to 100 employees. In the renovation of the building, hundreds of old molds were rediscovered and the delightful expanded Quimper ware is being introduced throughout the United States and the continent.



Q: Is it possible to see the Komodo dragon in its natural habitat?

A Travelers can get to Komodo Island, home of the lizards which can grow up to 10 feet long, aboard cruise ships and fishing boats that depart from the Indonesian coast.

The snake-like dragons with razor-sharp teeth can easily eat a goat or deer in three or four chunks. And one of the tourist attractions on Komodo Island involves rangers feeding 20 or 30 dragons. A sheep tossed into their pit will be devoured in minutes.

Exploring Komodo Island for wild boars, cockatoos and other wildlife is also popular.

A visit conducted by Aerotours International includes stops at Runa Island to see wild horses, wild pigs and monkeys and, sometimes, more dragons.

En route, travelers dive among the coral gardens, see exotic fish and explore underwater caves. They sail aboard a comfortable motor cruiser with air-conditioned cabins, a lounge, a library and a dining room.

The four-day adventure costs \$744 per person, which includes all accommodations, meals, sight-seeing tours and local flights to and from the coast.

Q: Can you recommend a good place to learn about the history of Wyoming?

A: The Homesteader's Museum in Torrington, Wyo., is a quaint place to study the history of the 44th state. It is about midway between Cheyenne, the capital city, and Casper, the second-largest city.

The museum houses historical items from the state's settlement period, roughly 1830 to 1940. This era is full of lore about mountaineers, trappers, early stagecoaches and freight lines and Indian treaties.

Visitors can see how rough life was for the early settlers. They tour a reconstructed homesteader shack with old furniture, tools, clothes and written documents. Photographs and materials excavated in archaeological digs are also on display.

The nearby town of Little Torrington (population 5,650) was a way station for the Oregon Trail and the pony express. It is now one of Wyoming's centers for marketing livestock.

Fall color tour — southern style

Asheville welcomes visitors to the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains

For many people a getaway in North Carolina's Blue Ridge Mountains means a remote campsite or cottage, a place where the pileated woodpecker is the biggest noise-maker around.

Travelers who take smaller doses of wilderness may prefer Asheville. Hiking trails, whitewater rivers and the meandering Blue Ridge Parkway are all within easy reach, yet so are out-of-town newspapers, imported beer and the occasional foreign movie.

Not by accident is Asheville's professional baseball team called the Tourists. The city has catered to visitors since the mid-19th century, when it began to be known both for lavish hotels and sanitariums.

A number of its present-day attractions were built by people who visited first, then decided to stay: George Washington Vanderbilt was so enchanted with the sight of Mount Pisgah that he bought 125,000 acres surrounding it, then situated his 285-room estate Biltmore to give him an unblemished view.

In turn, some of Biltmore's most talented designers and craftsmen also settled in the city and continued to contribute to a body of architecture that is strong in the Art Deco and Gothic Revival styles.

Created by and for outsiders, Asheville, with a population of 60,000, has an unusual sophistication for a city in the southern Appalachians.

SIGHTS

For a visual introduction to the city drive west through the clutter and chaos of Tunnel Road. You'll pass through Beaucatcher Tunnel, then emerge to a stately view of the downtown skyline.

Thanks to a recent rejuvenation, downtown is spirited and hospitable. There are narrow, angled streets and spacious open squares filled with cafes, galleries and boutiques.

At Pack Square, the heart of downtown, the recently opened Pack Plaza Education, Arts and Science Center, 704-252-3866, has provided a new home for several of the city's small museums.

Architecture enthusiasts will want to seek out the pink-roofed Art Deco City Building at 70 Court Plaza, and the Gothic Revival Jackson Building, a pencil-thin skyscraper at 22 South

Pack Square. For a more comprehensive look a two-hour guided walking tour begins at the Downtown Welcome Center, 14 Battery Park Ave., 704-255-1093, and costs \$7.50.

Biltmore Estate should certainly be visited, even considering the \$21.95 admission charge. Built in the 1890s and designed by Richard Morris Hunt after 16th-century French chateaux in the Loire Valley, the splendid stone mansion is filled with original furnishings and art objects collected by George Vanderbilt in Europe.

The 8,000-acre grounds, designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, and a conservatory. Lunch at one of the two restaurants on the estate and a winery tour can extend the visit to nearly a full day. The house, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. (tickets must be purchased by 5), grounds closed at 8 p.m., 800-543-2961.

The rough boulders of the Grove Park Inn in Asheville stand in sharp contrast to Biltmore's gargoyle facade. The rustic hotel was built in 1912 of stone carved from the mountain on which it sits, and the original structure remains largely intact despite the addition of two new wings. The terrace has dozens of rockers

and a sweeping view of distant mountains; it is especially pleasant at sunset. On chilly days, comfort can be found by two huge stone fireplaces in the lobby.

Visitors who are not staying at the hotel can sit on the porch and in the lobby. Many of Grove Park's original fixtures and furnishings were made by the Roycrofters, a well-known name in the American Arts and Crafts Movement; in addition, an impressive collection of arts and crafts furnishings now decorates the public areas of the new wings. At 290 Macon Ave., 800-438-5800.

At the Folk Art Center on the Blue Ridge Parkway, 15 minutes from town, one can finger a hand carved bowl or chat with a broom maker as he works. The shop sells works by members of the Southern Highlands Handicraft Guild, and an exhibition gallery is on the second floor.

WHERE TO STAY

Reservations can be hard to find during the height of the leaf season, mid-October.

All glass and steel, the Radisson Hotel Asheville at One Thomas Wolfe

Plaza, 800-438-3960, is a jarring sight next door to the Thomas Wolfe Memorial, built in 1883.

Even so, the 281-room hotel is conveniently situated and offers views from its upper-floor rooms and restaurant. One complaint, the carpets were annoyingly stained during a recent stay. A double room costs \$79 (\$52 for people attending the Wolfe Festival).

The Swiss Chalets, 5 Delano Road, 704-253-6062, are all but hidden by the woods on Beaucatcher Mountain. They are 600 feet above downtown but still only moments from Pack Square.

The six modestly furnished cottages have one to three bedrooms and all are equipped with kitchens, cable television and a deck with grill. A one-bedroom chalet costs \$75 a night.

In addition to being a historic and aesthetic landmark, the Grove Park Inn is a full fledged resort hotel. It has 510 rooms, three restaurants, golf course and indoor sports center. Rooms in the oldest section retain their original furniture, they are smaller but more appealing. A room for two costs \$115 to \$185.

Richmond Hill Inn, 87 Richmond

Hill Drive, 704-252-7313, is among the most carefully restored and handsomely furnished of the city's inns in old homes. A bit out of the way, it sits alone on a steep hill over the French Broad River.

The century-old house has a paneled hall and library, and some of the 12 guest rooms have fireplaces. Nine cottages, also with fireplaces, have been built around a nearby croquet court. Rates for a double room, \$115 to \$275, include a full breakfast. The inn's restaurant also serves dinner, afternoon tea and Sunday brunch.

WHERE TO EAT

One of Asheville's most ambitious and successful restaurants is 23 Page, 1 Battery Park Ave., in the Haywood Park Hotel, 704-252-3685. A recent menu included fried quail on a savory lentil cake with pineapple and scallion salsa, beet ravioli with lobster beurre blanc, and Thai pork with papaya and peach salad. The stylish dining room is open and airy, despite a lack of windows. Dinner for two, including a modest wine and a tip, costs about \$80.

The thoroughly improbable Windmill mutes Italian, German and Indian cuisines in a grotto like setting under the Innsbruck Mall, 85 Tunnel Road, 704-253-5285. A popular item on the regular menu is chicken schnitzel with sour cream and cheddar cherries. A frequent special is the German sampler. Dinner for two with wine costs \$50 to \$60.

The Latin Quarter at 76 Haywood St., 704-252-6602, offers dishes inspired by the cuisines of Spain, Cuba and the Caribbean. Paella, a Jamaican jerked pork are popular, as are plantains stuffed with black beans, and chayote squash baked with cheese. Live jazz on weekends. Dinner for two with wine or beer costs about \$45.

Stone Soup, at both 50 Broadway, 704-255-7687, and 8 Wall St., 704-254-0844, offers soups, salads and hefty sandwiches on whole grain breads. Even the desserts seem healthful. Only the Broadway restaurant, by far the more laidback of the two, is open for dinner. Stir-frys, omelets and other special entrees are added to the self service line in the evening. Dinner for two \$20, wine by the glass \$1.30.

A savvy travel agent or a cruise-only agent will take one look at a cruise price and immediately slice off another 15 percent to 20 percent. And last year's hefty discounts of 25 percent to 35 percent are back with a vengeance.

"We've seen a 35 percent drop in

the cost of the average ticket in the last five years," says Mike Grossman, president of Cruises of Distinction, a New Jersey-based cruise-only travel agency.

"That's staggering. They can't go much lower because it's cheaper to lay up the ship."

In past years only consumers who booked very early or waited until the last minute could get a major bargain. Now it seems everyone has a chance.

With the economy in recession,

rebates — for example, slicing an additional 5 percent off their already-discounted price.

"The cruise lines may say that rebating doesn't occur, but it happens a lot," says Grossman of Cruises of Distinction.

"Instead of waiting until the last minute, we now see some cruise lines selling their whole year at discount," says Larry Fishkin, president of The Cruise Line, a Miami-based cruise only travel agency.

Clients are now lured with various

options. It could be a second week at sea for a rock bottom price or a special two passengers for the price of one rate.

It could be a low standby fare offered three weeks before sailing. These options come and go. But a knowledgeable travel agent should be aware of them.

To attract more clients, some cruise only agencies will offer a part of their own profits by consuming the real price from the consumer. For further information contact



The locals took care of business Friday night.

"They ran it right down our throats," Schumacher said.

At the start of the second quarter, Canton put together another long drive. This time the Chiefs used 12 plays before finally taking the lead on a 17-yard TD pass. Canton took a 13-7 lead into halftime.

Northville started the second half by taking the kickoff and returning it to their own 36-yard line. At the 8:41 mark scored the tying touchdown on an 11-yard run. Mike Hirvala's extra point provided the winning point of the contest.

Schumacher said a key play of the drive was a 27-yard pass play from Walsh to Justin Cataldo. Three plays later, Walsh scored.

On Northville's next possession, Walsh made several important plays.

The Mustangs started their final scoring drive on their own 24-yard line. On second down, Walsh threw a beautiful long pass to Eric Shaw for

45 yards. Eight plays later, the senior capped the drive with a one-yard keeper.

For the game, Walsh completed three of seven passes for 80 yards. He also ran for 57 yards.

With time running out in the fourth, Canton had a chance to tie. The Chiefs moved the ball to Northville's 6-yard line, but subsequently were penalized for an illegal pass and turned the ball over on downs.

Canton converted on four of seven fourth-down chances in the game.

Schumacher said he was proud of his team's effort in the game. He said the Mustangs' lack of size, especially on defense, may hurt them in the coming weeks.

"Right now we don't have any bigger bodies," he said, "and our big bodies are getting pushed around."

Northville was able to hold the Chiefs to just 232 yards of total offense. But, Schumacher said, they were often able to pick up yardage on the ground when they needed it.

At any rate, the Mustangs were also able to roll up offensive yardage. The locals had 273 yards of total offense.





The Mustangs nearly accomplished that feat against Churchill Thursday.


Nate Kirmis set a personal best and won the race with a time of 18:13. Nursing a sore hamstring, Jeff Zwiesler finished third overall in 18:34.

Tie health insurance rates to weight?



In today's sluggish economy, many people are concerned about the money spent on certain government give-away programs. However, I suspect that the dollars spent on these federal programs would pale next to the money put out by

the insurance companies for medical problems that could have been prevented.

I see a parallel between these two situations. The government give-away programs discourage the spirit and work ethic of America's economically disadvantaged. In a similar vein, today's health insurance practices perpetuate unhealthy American lifestyles. Neither offers any incentive to people to do better. Let's look at the problem of insurance.

Picture a man, 50 pounds overweight, who

spends evenings on the couch eating junk food and watching the tube. The same man, two months earlier, was told by his doctor that his lifestyle was putting him at a great risk of heart disease. He was told his cholesterol, blood pressure, weight and resting heart rate were all going up, and he was basically risking his life.

Now, two months later, he has a heart attack and receives a triple bypass. His medical bills for the 10 weeks he will be out of work, along with his disability pay, comes to about \$160,000.

Who takes responsibility for this situation? Why does this man's health insurance cost him the same as a physically responsible person? Does today's health insurance system contribute to the tendency for us to not take responsibility for our actions?

Here's a way to get at and deal with these issues. Let's set measurable standards to determine the cost of medical insurance. How about a 10-percent surcharge on insurance costs

for individuals who weigh more than the national height/weight standard?

Just to make it more fair for starters, we'll add 20 pounds to the average weight charts since many people complain the charts are low. Then additional surcharges could be added in based on factors over which people, not heredity, have control. A misery-index based on a score of several predetermined health standards could be developed.

And, just as a bad score raises the cost of insurance, a lower score would lower the cost.

If this system sounds unfair and unreasonable, maybe it is today. However, I hope it has at least got you thinking about the situation. Maybe at some future time, there will be incentives for people to live a more healthy lifestyle.

Okay. It's time to put the paper and doughnut down and go for a walk.



A range and oven are built into a large work island in the center of the kitchen. A wide window in front of the kitchen sink looks out over a wood deck, easily accessed


through French doors in the adjacent dining area. Other amenities include a triangular step in pantry and a long eating bar.

Some people are baseball fans, and some are fans of old cars. You can call Esther Churella of Novi a fan of architecture.

"I've been a subscriber to Architectural Digest since 1960," she said. "I've collected floor plans for years."

She's no armchair fanatic, though. Armed with her collection of floorplans — but no formal architectural training — Churella took on the task of designing the home she and husband Bob now own.

Even if you never got to see the Churella home from the inside, you'd know it is something distinctive.

From the outside, a visitor is immediately intrigued by its white brick and beveled glass entry door, and his curiosity piqued by a bi-level garage. Nestled in a scenic Novi subdivision, this home speaks well for the creativity of its owners before you even set foot inside.

The white brick and beveled glass are just an enticement for what lies inside. Nearly all the surfaces inside the home are white. The woodwork and mouldings are done in pickled hardwoods, giving them

a pale cast as well.

Yet the white is not overwhelming because it is so well balanced with black and colored accents. Nowhere is this more

evident than in the great room.

Though it features a 15-foot ceiling, and huge a bay window that towers over the scene, a black piano and an Oriental screen serve to offset the vast expanses of white and light. Even the lush carpeting,

The stairs to the lower level are guarded by etched glass, and there are glass door-

Plant spring bulbs now

The falling leaves of autumn announce the coming of winter just as crocuses, daffodils and tulips blooming in the yard proclaim that warmer weather is on the way. To gardeners, the normal conditions of fall signal the time to plant spring-flowering bulbs.

In order for bulbs to develop properly, they must endure a long, cold winter. The bulb will begin to grow and blossom in response to gradually warming weather. So flowering bulbs must be planted in fall to ensure a colorful spring.

Plant bulbs in perennial borders, lawns, rock gardens, under trees or anywhere else a splash of color is desired. The flowers will come back year after year if they are given a good start in life with an environment composed of fertile soil, garden sand and peat moss. The sand provides drainage while peat moss holds air, moisture and nutrients at proper levels.

The most difficult part of planting bulbs is choosing among the hundreds of species and hybrids available. Gardeners tend to favor the following types.

• **Allium:** A showy relative of the onion, this lilac, pink or yellow flower grows on stems 9

inches to 3 feet tall, making it an excellent ground plant.

• **Chionodoxa:** Commonly known as "glory-of-the-snow," this early spring flower produces 4- to 6-inch sprigs of white, blue or pink starlike blossoms, making it ideal for borders and rock gardens.

• **Crocus:** Harbinger of spring, the crocus blooms in white, yellow, purple and blue. Plant in clumps for drama or naturalize in the lawn.

• **Muscari:** Nicknamed the "grape hyacinth," these tiny, bright purple flowers multiply quickly and make excellent borders.

• **Narcissus:** Commonly called daffodils, this large group of flowers comes in many shapes and shades.


• **Tulips:** The most popular of all spring flowering bulbs, tulips offer a wide range of choices in height, color, shape and bloom time.

Unless spring bulbs are to be "naturalized" (scattered) throughout the garden, which requires individual holes for each bulb, it's best to plant them in mass, using a large trench for each group. Whatever the design, follow these steps to guarantee bulbs that

Plant flowering bulbs

■ Turn soil over to a depth of 10 inches, recondition by mixing equal parts peat moss, garden sand and soil



- Plant bulbs to a depth of three times their overall height
- Make sure bulbs bloom again the following year by allowing leaves to wither. When flowers have faded, work a layer of 5-10-5 fertilizer around each bulb.
- When bulbs show signs of overcrowding, replant excess flowers in another part of the garden.
- Crocus is a harbinger of spring and blooms in white, yellow, purple and blue. Plant in clumps for drama or naturalize in the lawn.

ways connecting the dining room, family room and kitchen. Kathy Dinkel of Walled Lake created the etched pieces.

Such uses of glass are not just an artistic gesture, however. When combined with the mirrors that line the walls throughout the home, they allow clear views from one room to the next.

But just as important is the view to the outdoors. Not wanting to waste the lovely landscaping that surrounds the walkout lot, Churella designed windows on all sides of the home.

"Coming in here and looking out at the trees makes me happy," she says from the bright dining room, with its glass (what else?) table.

The kitchen of the home is striking. Not only is everything —

counters, cabinets, hardware and appliances — in the same gleaming white that adorns the rest of the house. It is outfitted with state-of-the-art appliances from the General Electric Monogram Series that beg you to push their buttons and turn their knobs.

But you can push all the buttons you want on the stove: It

won't come on until there's a pan on top of it. This safety feature senses the metal of the pan and shuts off when it is removed.

"I used to cook a lot," said Churella. "It was my creative outlet. But now I come in here and say, 'What a pretty kitchen,' and make reservations."

Gadgets and conveniences pop

up where you least expect them. In the family room, a single switch lights a fireplace and a blower heats the room. On the lower level, a swim spa allows Bob to get in frequent workouts by swimming against the jets. In the utility room, shelves and drying racks make laundry a breeze.

Esther even designed her own entertainment center in the same

pickled wood that appears elsewhere in the home. It houses a large-screen TV, surround-sound stereo, and even the controls for the electric piano.

It just goes to show that sometimes you can judge a book by its cover. From its white brick exterior to the surround-sound speakers, this is a home of the unexpected.

Prepare soil properly and plant bulbs now for spring flowers

will thrive year after year.

• **Prepare the soil.** Turn the soil over to a depth of about 10 inches to give roots room to grow. Recondition the soil and improve drainage by mixing equal parts of peat moss, garden sand and soil.

Rake in a top layer of bone meal (use about 5 pounds per 100 square feet), and let the natural fertilizer work its way slowly down into the soil.

In addition, use a complete fertilizer, such as 5-10-5, to increase bloom size and vigorous growth. This can be added while the soil is being prepared or applied to the ground surface shortly before bulbs bloom.

• **Plant at proper depth.** The rule of thumb is to plant bulbs to a depth of

three times their overall height. Remember, if bulbs are planted too shallow, they will be in danger of freezing or having their period of dormancy interrupted by the freezing and thawing of the soil.

To plant a large formal bulb garden, remove the soil to the required depth, press bulbs into place (the flat side is the bottom) and return the amended soil — water well.

For smaller spaces or a lawn, use a bulb planter or trowel to dig holes. Place the soil in a bucket, mix with equal parts sand and peat moss and add a dash of bone meal as described above. Nestle the bulbs in the mix at the recommended depth and water well.

• **Groom with caution.** Make sure the bulbs will bloom again next year by allowing the leaves to wither. After the blossoms wilt, the stem and leaves begin to

make and store food for use the following spring.

Therefore, "deadhead" the bulbs, but let the leaves and stems remain until they turn yellow and shrivel. When bulbs are planted in grass, do not mow until leaves are brown. When flowers have faded, carefully loosen soil and work a handful of 5-10-5 fertilizer in and around each bulb.

• **Divide when crowded.** Most bulbs can be left in place to multiply and flourish for a number of years. When they show signs of overcrowding, simply divide and replant them using the same directions listed above.

The waiting, they say, is the hardest part, but rest assured that after a long winter's snooze, the bulbs will fill the garden with color and, of course, inspire a dose of spring fever!







Antique pump organ is a prizewinner

Q. I have a walnut Mason and Hamlin parlor pump organ. It has 12 gold medallions impressed with "Paris, 1876," "Sweden, 1878," "Philadelphia, 1878," etc. Stamped in gold inside the music rack is "Style 269" and "No. 106897."

It plays perfectly and no restoration of any kind has been done on it.

Any history and value will be greatly appreciated.

A. Your pump organ was made in the late 1800s. The gold medallions represent prizes that were awarded to the company, not to this particular organ. It should sell in the \$1,200 to \$1,500 price range. However, there is a very limited market for antique pump organs.

Q. This mark is on the bottom of a hand-painted jardiniere. It is 5 inches high and 9 inches in diameter. It has yellow roses, purple flowers, green leaves and four floral feet.

Would you please tell me who made it and what it is worth?

A. This jardiniere was made by Martial Raynaud in Limoges, France, for Tressemanes & Vogt in New York in the early 1900s. It would probably sell for around \$165 to \$185.

Q. I have an old Ives train. It is an electric model engine with three coaches and observation car. The number on the box it

came in is No. 237.

What do these go for now?

A. The Ives Co. was founded in 1868 by Edward Ives in Bridgeport, Conn. He began manufacturing electric train sets in 1910.

Your train set was made in the 1920s.

I find No. 237 listed in "Antique Price Guides" for \$200 to \$300.

Q. I have an 8-inch Dresden figurine of a girl with a lamb at her feet. The following mark is on it: a crown over the monogram "RK" and under that "Dresden."

What is the age and value of this figurine?

A. The mark on your figurine was used by the Richard Klemm Co. in Dresden, Germany, about 1900. The original maker of Dresden china was the Royal Porcelain Manufactory, now located in Meissen.

Your figurine is worth about \$135 to \$150; a similar Meissen figurine of the same vintage would fetch about four times as much.

Q. I have a Royal Doulton figurine: "Uncle Ned," No. HN 2084. Can you give me some information about its vintage and value?

A. Your Royal Doulton figure seated in a brown and-belt chair, holding a blue mug with a black-and-white dog sitting at his feet was made between 1952 and 1965. It is currently selling for \$400 to \$500.

Q. I bought a teapot at an estate sale. The mark on the bottom is an dragon and "China, O.P. Co."


I would like to know something about when it was made and its value.

A. The mark you describe was used by the Onondaga Pottery Co. in 1893 to 1895. At that time the company was renamed Syracuse China Co.

Your teapot would probably sell for around \$75 to \$85.

'ARM' yourself with the right rate; home sales prediction for next year

When shopping for the best possible home financing loan, the current low interest rates offered for adjustable rate mortgages may appeal to you. But take special note of the index used to determine the future ups and downs of the loan's interest rate.

One index could be 100 times more volatile than another according to a report from Great Western Financial Corp. Translation: Some indexes are much more likely to zoom up or down than others, significantly increasing your risk. Those rate adjustments will directly affect the amount you pay in monthly mortgage payments.

• The certificate of deposit index is probably the most volatile of all the indexes. And this index can increase or decrease by as much as 20 percent.

"An ARM loan tied to a CD index is much more volatile than one using a Federal Cost of Funds Index," the Great Western report stated. "This can result in serious payment shock for borrowers."

Generally, these loans do not offer annual payment caps, as do loans using other indexes. If interest rates increase an average of 2 percentage points a year over four years, borrowers could see their monthly mortgage payments increase 56 percent, the report pointed out.

During the same period, if the borrower had a loan tied to a Cost of Funds Index, the increase would have been about 24 percent.

On the other hand, when you take a high risk CD index mortgage loan, you can usually benefit from a lower initial interest rate than other ARMs offer. That index also could potentially go down as fast as it goes up. But with today's mortgage interest rates at a 20

year low, it's more likely the interest rate curve will go upward.

Consider the history of index rates. The 6 month CD index rose about 14 percent for a total of 21 months between October 1980 and June 1982. The highest Cost of Funds index was 13.6 percent for one month (October 1981).

More recently, the CD index was 10.53 percent in March 1982. The Cost of Funds index at that time was 8.8 percent.

"If I were buying and financing a home at this time, I would prefer an adjustable rate mortgage tied to the one year Treasury Bill index," said Tom Cross, a regional sales manager for First Nationwide Bank. "This index is comparatively stable and calculates interest rate changes only once per year."

"And it limits increases to a maximum of 2 percentage points per year. There's no possibility of

'negative amortization' with these loans."

Loans tied to a Cost of Funds index can change interest rates monthly, but the total payment stays the same for one-year increments. So if the interest rate increases to the point where the interest amount is greater than the payment, the overage is added to the loan balance, thus creating negative amortization.

"It's vitally important that borrowers learn and understand all aspects of the adjustable rate loan they are considering, including information about the index that will be used to determine future rates," Cross said. "A lot of people just don't understand these loans. It's always a good idea to consider a worst-case scenario."

Cross noted that most of his current loan applications are for fixed-rate mortgage loans.

"About 70 percent of our recent applications are for fixed-rate loans, and about 40 percent of

those applications are for 15-year loans (as opposed to the more conventional 30-year loans).

"With today's low interest rates, most people want to lock in a firm rate on their new home financing or refinancing mortgage loan."

If you do select an ARM loan, be sure to periodically check your changing interest rate against the index used as the loan matures. Several recent surveys have revealed an alarming number of cases where lenders miscalculate their loan rate adjustments.

These surveys have been conducted by such credible groups as the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., National Credit Union Administration and Office of Thrift Supervision. They have determined miscalculations in rate adjustments have been made in from 20 percent to 38 percent of ARM loans.

Q. Are home sales increasing or decreasing?

A. At this writing, sales are on the increase. The growing activity is due, in part, to first-time home buyers who are discovering they can take advantage of today's super-low mortgage interest rates and keep their loan payments lower than their previous rental payments.

Q. What's the predicted volume of existing home sales for the rest of this year?

A. About 3.49 existing single-family homes will be sold this year, it was predicted by the National Association of Realtors. That would be 8.3 percent greater than 1991's volume.







Service for 12? Heslops' offers service that knows no bounds

If there's one thing that's true about weddings, it's that they never go exactly according to plan.

But if the plan includes a bridal registry at Heslops, gifts of tableware won't be a source of worry. The Novi firm, which has been called the largest independent retailer of dinnerware in the U.S., specializes in speedy service that fits into just about anyone's plans for the big day.

Which is ironic, since owners Ron and Barbara Heslop will tell you they don't attribute much of their success to sound business planning.

The Heslops started with one small store in 1975, and today own a string of 14 shops around Michigan, in addition to their 80,000 square-foot headquarters in Novi.

"I'd like to say that we had a great business plan and it just clicked along like a Swiss watch from the beginning," said Ron. "Nothing could be farther from the truth. We kind of got into it by accident."

The Heslops had been looking to start a family business, but were uncertain as to what it should be. They considered everything from a book store to an unfinished furniture store.

A friend who was a sales representative of a greeting card company told them about a card shop in Livonia, Jean's Cards & Gifts, that was up for sale.

"We took one look and said 'no way,'" Ron said.

The shop was run down, and in need of major renovations. But after some thought, the couple decided to give it a try. Those early days weren't without their headaches.

"We went into it knowing nothing about retail," said Ron. "Neither of us had even run a register before. We'd never even been behind a counter of a retail store."

Indeed, Ron can laugh now about the harrowing tales of having to make

change for customers from his own pocket because he couldn't figure out how to open the cash register.

"We had nowhere to go but up," he said. "You could not go into the business greener than we did."

The little shop bloomed with vitality in the months that followed, however. The first time they did \$100 in sales — their break-even point — the couple went out and celebrated with a fancy dinner. But before long they were celebrating the opening of stores in Westland and Southfield.

It wasn't until they purchased the former Cricket Box in Plymouth that the two realized the opportunities that awaited them in fine dinnerware. In acquiring the store, they had acquired its stock of fine china.

"We actually stumbled upon the opportunity to enter the tabletop industry," said Ron.

They began stocking all their stores with china and collectibles, and followed just one simple rule: If either Ron and Barbara detested a specific pattern or gift item, they didn't sell it.

In developing their tableware business, the Heslops realized that there were more patterns and variations than they could possibly hope to display in one store. They converted their basement and garage into a storage facility, but even that didn't suffice.

"We finally decided that we wanted to offer the absolute best selection of dinnerware anywhere," said Ron.

Therein lies the key to the success that Heslops now enjoys: If there is a pattern made, Heslops almost certainly has it. If they don't have it in the store, they have it in stock in their Novi distribution center, and can deliver it overnight.

And when they say they stock a pattern, they're not just talking about dinner plates and saucers.

"There are as many as 100 pieces behind every pattern," said Ron. "We built this facility just to house all that."

Admittedly, it's a strategy few business prognosticators would recommend. But then, for a couple that had no background in retail, the rules of keeping a small inventory didn't apply.

"Most company's won't make the kind of inventory or space commitment that we do," Ron said. "We threw Retail 101 right out the window, and it's worked. A customer can't beat that kind of satisfaction."

Other special services at Heslops include the Platinum Club, where brides can register for service for 12. Then if guests purchase 11 sets of

their dinnerware, the 12th is free. The Platinum Club also offers a lifetime replacement guarantee. If any piece is broken — no matter what the cause.



Money Management

Charities can be savvy deduction

Making charitable contributions is one of the few tax moves over which you can still exercise substantial control. But you need to know the rules. According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, a slight twist in your gift-giving strategy can mean the difference between a tax break and a disallowed deduction.

QUALIFIED ORGANIZATIONS

To be eligible for a tax deduction, your gift must go to a qualified organization—that is, a nonprofit charitable, religious or educational group that meets IRS standards. Almost all churches and nonprofit hospitals and schools are qualified, as are such diverse organizations as your local volunteer fire department, the Girl Scouts and the March of Dimes.

If you're not sure whether a charity is qualified, ask your CPA, the organization itself, or the IRS, which maintains a master list of qualified organizations.

OUTRIGHT CASH DONATIONS

When you make an outright donation to an organization, the rules are pretty straightforward. The amount you donate is the amount you deduct. However, the amount you deduct cannot exceed 50 percent of your adjusted gross income for the year, computed without regard to net operating loss carrybacks. When you receive something of value in return for your gift, you must subtract the fair market value of the benefit you receive from the amount you paid to arrive at your deductible amount.

OUT-OF-POCKET VOLUNTEER EXPENSES

The unreimbursed expenses you incur as a volunteer to a qualified charity may also qualify as a charitable contribution. If you drive your car to volunteer at church, hospital or school, you may be able to deduct your transportation costs. You can claim either a standard mileage rate of 12 cents a mile plus parking tolls, or your actual expenses. If you use public transportation, your fares are deductible. Depreciation and insur-

ance are not deductible as part of the contribution.

Other deductible out-of-pocket expenses may include the cost and care of any special uniform that you are required to wear while performing your volunteer duties, any materials and supplies you pay for, and the cost of telephone calls you make on behalf of your charitable endeavors.

TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY

Making a gift of appreciated property—a work of art or some other valuable collectible—can also make sense because you can generally deduct the full-market value of the property and avoid paying tax on the capital gain. But the deduction of long-term capital gain property depends on the type of charity you donate to and how it uses your gift.

If you give a gift of tangible personal property, such as antique furniture or jewelry, you can deduct the appreciated value as long as you have held the property for more than a year and the organization uses the gift for its express purpose. However, if your gift is sold for cash or used for

techline is constructed of 5/8" high-density wood particleboard, with scratch and heat-resistant melamine surface. **Furniture Panels** are joined with metal cam locks and 8mm hardwood dowels throughout, insuring precise alignment and structural integrity. **Edges** are finished with PVC banding eased with a 2mm radius to achieve a slightly rounded edge. **Metal Hinges** are concealed cup style, nickel plated to prevent corrosion. They permit 92 degree opening and are four-way adjustable with a self-closing feature. **Pulls** are available in nickel, brass and bronze finishes and natural oak as well as epoxy powdered enamel in the following colors: white, black, gray, brown, blue and red. Units are packaged with matching color pulls. **Drawers** are an overlay design of 5/8" high-density particleboard. Drawer fronts are secured to side panels with glued, hardwood dowels and metal cams. Drawer bottoms are laminate finished hardboard. Drawer Glides are zinc/chromate plated steel with steel ball bearings. The glide features a stop action in the closed position.
