City pitches DDA plan to schools

Northville's Board of Education tried to teach city elders a lesson last week, but the curriculum did not concern the three R's.

The two C's, "Cut and Cap," are uppermost on the board's mind these days.

City leaders appeared before a three-member finance subcommittee meeting of the School Board Wednesday night to hawk their plans for a new Cady Street parking deck. Six of

the seven School Board members attended the meeting.

Because the deck would use captured taxes as a funding tool from an expanded Downtown Development District, the school system would lose several years' worth of revenue increases from state equalized valuation (SEV) growth in the Downtown Development District.

City officials hope the new deck will encourage commercial growth along Cady, Center and Main streets.

The officials argue that a new deck would keep downtown from stagnat-

ing and spur growth throughout the city, not just along Main and Center streets. But school representatives, fearing that passage of a tax-cutting proposal on the Nov. 3 ballot will gut school finances, are not eager to back a plan that may deplete their fiscal resources even further.

"Both things will definitely impact, in a negative way, the district's financial situation, and the two in combination will definitely be devastating for us," said Board President Carol Rahimi.

"What we have to decide is how it

impacts the district and how it impacts the city, and weigh the two and decide whether it's appropriate at this time."

The board has no formal authority over the Downtown Development Authority plan, but Rahimi said board members will likely decide whether or not to declare their support for it at their Nov. 10 meeting. The board will wait to consider the comments received at the City Council's Nov. 2 public hearing on the plan, she said.

Old planning consultant is new again

A new consulting firm will grace Township Hall at the Planning Commission's Oct. 27 session, but the event will be a reunion of sorts.

Brad Strader will return as the township's planning consultant, a month after the township dumped WBDC Co., Strader's former employer. Strader left the Grand Rapids-based firm earlier this year for McKenna Associates Inc. of Farmington Hills.

The Township Board last Thurs-

day sided with a Planning Commission subcommittee and gave the nod to McKenna as the township's new planning consultant.

Planning Commissioner John Amos spoke on behalf of the subcommittee and pointed to McKenna's stability, location, and expertise as reasons for the selection.

The township sent out proposal requests to 19 planning firms after it became apparent that WBDC — hired in 1991 — had suffered key staff losses in the past year. Ten firms returned proposals, and a committee

consisting of Amos, Richard Allen, and Karen Baja whittled the list to three.

The three firms were grilled at a meeting last month and were asked to prepare and report on a township site plan, Amos said.

Amos said the committee tendered a unanimous vote for McKenna after that session. The full Planning Commission okayed the choice at its September meeting.

"(We) thought McKenna and Associates brought a number of things," Amos said. "They are professional

municipal planners, and we thought their 18 planner staff was very stable."

Amos also said McKenna's fee structure — in the \$65-per-hour range — was comparable to that of WBDC and other interviewed firms.

McKenna is set to sign a contract tomorrow, township Manager Richard Henningsen said. Allen, who holds a seat on the Township Board as well as the Planning Commission, said the choice was obvious.

"McKenna Associates came out the clear winner," Allen said.

BFI heads to trial with townships

Overzealous Northville and Plymouth townships' police officers are harassing Browning-Ferris Industries trucks.

That's one side of the story. The other is this: Overweight BFI trucks routinely travel to the waste collection giant's Six Mile and Napier site in flagrant violation of both state law and township ordinance.

They'll settle the dispute in court. BFI and Northville and Plymouth townships will lock horns in 35th District Court Nov. 5 over a lengthy list of overweight violations issued BFI trucks by local motor carrier enforcement officers.

Northville Township kicked off its motor carrier ordinance last April. Since then, township officers have written hundreds of citations for overweight and unsafe vehicles.

Among those ticketed were BFI trucks. Lots of BFI trucks. In fact, between April and the end of July,

nearly 50 BFI trucks were cited in Northville Township alone. Accumulated fines for those tickets top \$116,000, and BFI is upset.

BFI attorneys Michael Jacob and Daniel Rustmann were unavailable for comment Friday, but trial briefs filed with 35th District Court indicate that BFI claims a special permit it obtained from Wayne County allows its trucks to travel heavier than local statutes allow.

BFI also says township officers violate the firm's constitutional rights by selectively enforcing the ordinance.

"The ordinance officers of Plymouth and Northville townships position themselves on BFI's designated route and pick-off BFI's trucks on an almost daily basis as they near their final destination, obviously fully loaded," according to court briefs. "The complete lack of any exercise of discretion in enforcing the townships' ordinances against BFI indi-

Beck park takes two steps ahead

You'll have to excuse Northville Parks and Recreation officials if they're a bit skittish about the most recent development on the proposed Beck Road community park.

Years of false starts, unfulfilled promises, and a lack of funding have blighted the project, and officials seem perpetually prepared for the worst.

But the weedy, rutted plot located west of Beck between Five and Six Mile appears headed in a different direction — toward the Recreation Department's vision of a gleaming new soccer/baseball field complex.

The Township Board on Thursday took a couple of steps that soon could make the park a reality. First, the board approved a modified community shared services agreement which removed any city financial claim to the park property. The city recently okayed that move.

Second, the board agreed to use the township Building Authority as a vehicle to obtain an unsecured commercial loan of up to \$216,000 for park development.

The three-member Building Authority is scheduled to meet at 7:30 tonight to approve the concept, which would effectively obligate the

Schools iron out budget for year

Northville Schools Business Manager John Street said his itemized version of the 1992-93 school budget should lay to rest people's complaints about the accessibility and readability of financial information supplied by the district.

If the reception Street's first-quarter report received from five of the seven board members Wednesday night is any indication of what's to come, then he can rest easy.

The Finance Committee reviewed the budget Wednesday night with five board members. A sixth member,

Patricia Custer, came late to the meeting after the budget had already been discussed.

Copies of the 35-page itemized budget will be available to the public at tonight's board meeting. In it are a budget comparison from this year to last, a revenue estimate and expense summary by activity, and a detailed line-item list of expenses. Salaries for teachers, administrators, building principals and support staff are all itemized and broken out from their respective fringe benefit expenses. The report also includes a comparative analysis of staff benefits and a

Mainstreet '92 builds on '78

The Downtown Development Authority plan that has the Northville Board of Education so worried is an extension of Mainstreet '78, a program that provided the downtown streetscape and building facades with a face-lift courtesy of \$3 million in captured taxes.

The revised Mainstreet '92 plan is much more ambitious, encompassing a larger district and highlighted by a new 480-space, three-level parking deck that would replace the current crumbling Cady Street deck and extend farther south. Mainstreet '92's total cost has been pegged at nearly \$6.9 million, including the cost of land acquisition, deck construction and the relocation of Cady Street.

The bill, and the interest on it, will be paid over 20 years under the Mainstreet '92 plan, through a bond financed by \$14 million in captured taxes from an expanded district. The district would expand to include the Ford plant, properties along Main Street across from the plant, and properties on the south side of Cady between Center and Griswold.

City officials note that their plan is based on pessimistic fiscal assumptions including no private redevelopment of the Ford plant, no development of the proposed Long building on Main, and an annual 2-percent rate of SEV growth.

Beginning in the year 2000, or sooner if the city's fiscal assumptions prove overly conservative, taxing units including the schools could begin to see some increase in revenue from the district. That revenue would jump to \$178,000 of the \$880,000 in annual captured taxes by the plan's end in 2013, according to city estimates.

The School Board would not be so wary of Mainstreet '92 if it were not for the two tax-cutting proposals on the Nov. 3 ballot, either of which would impact on the schools.

Both proposals A and C would limit the SEV growth available to school districts. Proposal A would cap tax increases at either 5 percent of a property's current tax assessment or inflation, whichever is lower, while C would cut the school operating portion of a person's property tax by 30 percent over four years and then cap tax increases at either 3 percent or inflation.

The board members raised several questions about the plan themselves at Wednesday's meeting. Secretary Richard Brown noted that including the vacant Ford Valve Plant in an expanded district would cut the schools out of any property tax windfall from redevelopment of the plant.

Board Member Jay Dunkerley pointed out that the schools had been looking forward to increased tax revenues from the end of the Mainstreet '78 program, due to expire in 1993. Because Mainstreet '92 is an extension of that plan, the schools would not receive that increase.

"Part of our quandary is we were depending in part on getting somewhere in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars in 1993, and now that's not going to occur," he said.

City officials are anxious to pass the DDA plan this year and begin construction next year to take advantage of a low bond rate and favorable construction costs, said Mayor Chris Johnson.

The DDA plan will "permit the SEV of the entire community to grow and benefit," Johnson said.

"We feel that while the Northville DDA has already recaptured a significant amount of taxes, the long-term benefit is really hard to quantify. We still look at this as an investment in our whole community."

Johnson noted that property valued throughout the city have increased dramatically since the DDA was formed, and that Northville Township has grown as well.

Schools Treasurer Bob McMahon agreed that Mainstreet '78 was a boon to Northville.

cates that, for reasons, at this point, known only to them, the townships have targeted BFI."

Not so, said Northville Township Police Chief Chip Snider.

Snider said BFI is heavily ticketed because its landfill is a destination

for so many overweight trucks.

"They have recorded more individual violations . . . because of the frequency of trips," he said, adding that BFI has had more "leeway" and warnings because of the number of trucks into which township officers come in contact.

BFI is seeking a cap of \$500 for

each overweight violation, as opposed to the townships' stance of fining on a per pound overweight basis. Snider said officers could issue a ticket for each overweight axle — at \$500 a pop — which he said "seems redundant."

Snider said he was not surprised at the court action

"I think it substantiated our original feelings that BFI was not interested in complying (the the ordinance), only in circumventing it."

Judge John MacDonald is scheduled to hear both sides argue the issue at 9 a.m. Nov. 5 at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

commercial loan — with an additional \$109,000 in recreation-held park development funds — to park construction.

The proposed 10-year loan is to be paid entirely through recreation program user fees. No development funds will come from city or township coffers.

If the Building Authority process goes as expected, the township will publish legal notification of the move in the Oct. 15 issue of *The Northville Record*, thus starting the clock on a 45-day referendum period.

The 45-day window allows regis-

tered township voters an opportunity to oppose the park funding plan. To do so, opponents would have to gather a specific number of signatures and present the township an acceptable petition by Nov. 30.

An approved petition would force a township-wide election to determine if voters approved of the park bank loan plan.

Some recreation officials fear that a couple of key points were omitted from Thursday's board action. Recreation Commission Chairperson Ken Romine voiced concern that by not actually approving a bid award to DeAngelis Landscaping, the board may attempt to further stall park

development.

Romine also questioned why the township did not identify which lending institution would be tabbed to handle the loan.

Those worries are unfounded, said township Treasurer Jack Hosmer.

"They got the green light," Hosmer said of the Recreation Department. Hosmer called the official awarding of DeAngelis' bid "a formality" that could be addressed at the board's Oct. 28 special meeting.

Township officials put the park plan in overdrive last week after an indecisive past couple of months. Some board members reportedly had balked at the loan concept, hoping

other arrangements could be made to help pay the freight.

When it became apparent that the Recreation Department was not interested in waiting for potential gifts, the board forged ahead with the plan, especially when they learned that immediate action could save some cash.

Under the terms of DeAngelis' bid, the company would add \$30,000 to its development price if the township delayed construction approval until next spring. By moving now, the township saves that sum, and site grading can actually begin in December.

building supply and materials budget from each building.

As in years past, the Finance Committee met to review the first quarterly report of the general fund operating budget.

"It's a regular event of the finance subcommittee that we do this every year," said Finance Committee Chair Robert McMahon. "We pass the budget in June and review it three or four times a year. This is not something we've done only this year."

McMahon's comments came on the heels of the community's repeatedly requested for a more reader-friendly line item budget. In recent weeks several residents have charged that district officials have withheld financial information or made it difficult to obtain it.

School officials contend they've provided all the pertinent information to the people who requested it. They say the credibility problem rests

in the delivery of the information and the community's difficulty in understanding it in the form it's presented. Administrators and board members hope this new format for the line-item budget will rectify the situation.

"The purpose of a budget is to provide internal and external communication," McMahon said. "I think this will provide the external communication we need right now."

"It's a lot more reader-friendly," said Superintendent Leonard Reznierski after reviewing the document with the committee.

On the expense side, the budget indicates the district spending \$397,246 more this year than last year. A large portion of those expenses paid for an 8.61-percent increase in instructional staff benefits, which cost the district \$148,401 more this year. Another major factor in that increase is from the increase in state recapture of Social Security payments.

The district saw a \$9,474 drop in

the cost of its basic educational program, from its teaching staff reduction, while it will pay out a 6-percent increase in teacher's salary. The budget also includes \$68,909 less in support services this year a result of 300,000 cuts in busing and 10-11 people cut from operational and maintenance departments.

Street also pointed out that with the staffing cuts in operation and maintenance departments, the district will spend \$51,419 less this year on those expenses than last year.

There is also a \$135,125 reduction in expenses from the general administration account. Those items cover the superintendent's, assistant superintendent's and personnel director's salaries. That is coupled with central office clerical staff and business expenses.

On the revenue side, the district expects to take in \$439,316 more this year than last year. Total revenues from local, state and federal sources amount to \$23,941,747. A large per-

centage was generated from local property taxes. Other, smaller contributions came from summer school, out-of-district tuition, interest on income, delinquent taxes and co-curricular fees.

The state contributes \$32,000, which is all earmarked for bilingual programs, driver education classes and for the gifted-student consortium of which the district is a member.

Line items indicate taxpayers will shell out \$11,104,757 to pay salaries for 211.2 certified teaching positions in the regular K-12 program.

Salaries for central office administrators are broken out and billed to the accounts they serve. In total and with all the amenities their contracts protect, the district pays its seven central office administrators a collective \$589,766. However \$75,970 of that figure, which is the salary of the executive director of special education, is paid for by the county.

Board to consider society waiver

The Policy Committee of the Northville Board of Education Thursday night recommended to exempt National Honor Society students from the pay-to-participate program.

The School Board will hear and may vote on the recommendation at tonight's meeting. A green light from the board would move the society to the list of class sponsor activities which exist this year without a fee. That would make it a self-supporting group independent of other co-curricular activities.

Board approval would put to rest a month-long study of charging students for membership in the National Honor Society. Parent Lonna Lemmon broached the issue and provided the board with evidence supporting her claim. She pointed out that school officials were violating the society's national charter by charging students more than the \$5 maximum membership fee allowed for society

members.

Northville's pay-to-participate program charges students \$100 per student, per term for co-curricular activities. The question was first raised at a Sept. 29 pay-to-participate citizens committee meeting.

Six members of the citizens advisory group which originally formulated the pay-to-participate plan met earlier and unanimously agreed the district was in violation of the national charter.

In response, subcommittee members are now trying to rectify the issue. Under the class sponsor category, class treasuries will be tapped to pay the society's \$1,697 shared sponsors' stipend. The society's allotted \$5 membership fee will be collected by high school administrators and used to defray the cost of the sponsor's stipend.

"Had we known there was a fee stipulation before, we would not have charged the pay-to-participate fee," said assistant superintendent David Bolitho, a key person in the solving the society riddle. "What will happen is that the National

Honor Society will pay for their own sponsors."

Bolitho said he met last week with one of the two high school sponsors of the society and together they determined that if the society didn't have enough money in its own treasury to pay the sponsor stipend, there were alternate routes its members could take.

"They could offer fewer scholarships or do whatever it takes . . . They'll find it somewhere, but it would be rather painful and it wasn't like the organization would fold up and go home."

High school Principal Thomas Johnson said he didn't think funding would be a problem considering the society's treasury had a "healthy carry over" from last year.

Students who paid the \$100 fee to participating exclusively in National Honor Society will be reimbursed by the district. Society members involved in other co-curricular activities subject to the \$100 fee will not be reimbursed. Those students will also be asked to pay their \$5 membership fee for the society on top of the pay-to-participate fee.

Students earn National Merit honors

Four Northville seniors have been recognized for their academic performance by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Three of the four have been selected from one million students and named as National Merit Semifinalists. The fourth, Emily Kniebes, came just short of qualifying as a semifinalist but still won a letter of commendation from the scholarship corporation.

The other three, Vinay Mohta, Parag Parikh and Julie Zwiesler, joined the names of more than 15,000 semifinalists who will com-

pete for the 6,500 Merit Scholarships, worth over \$25 million, that will be awarded next spring.

High school Principal Thomas Johnson said seeing these students being selected for the honor speaks volumes about the quality of the program Northville offers.

"They exemplify the quality of students and the quality of the teaching that goes on in Northville," he said.

As semifinalists, these students were among the top scorers on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test in the state.

To qualify as a finalist, semifinalists must have an outstanding

academic record, be endorsed and recommended by their principal and have SAT scores that mirror their qualifying test scores. In addition, students' applications should include some background information about his or her educational interests and goals and about any extracurricular activities in which they participate.

There are three types of scholarships the trio could be awarded. They vary in dollar value and in corporate donor and sponsorship and evaluative criteria.

The three semifinalists will be recognized at a breakfast reception in their honor at Schoolcraft College later this fall.

Northville voters unsure about AAA bill

Pssst. Hey, you. Yeah, you in the car. How would you like a big break on the cost of your auto insurance?

Sounds tempting, doesn't it? The state's largest auto insurer, AAA Michigan, is offering Michigan's 6.5 million motorists a 20-percent reduction in their auto insurance rates. While a majority seem to be snapping at the offer, known as Proposal D on the Nov. 3 ballot, some still feel they are being taken for a ride.

The truth falls somewhere in the middle of the road.

The proposal by AAA Michigan follows two years of legislative failure to replace the state's existing No-Fault Insurance Law. The plan would reduce auto insurance rates by an average of 20 percent, at the cost of the current system's guarantee of unlimited medical coverage.

Only policyholders accepting a \$250,000 limit in personal injury protection would receive the average 20 percent reduction. Those opting for more protection, up to the new limit of \$5 million, would see a smaller cut.

Actual rates of reduction would vary widely as well, as drivers with stripped-down policies would get a bigger break than those whose coverage is loaded with extras like a low deductible.

Also, there is nothing in the proposal to stop insurance companies from seeking rate increases six months after the new legislation takes effect.

A random survey found Northville voters divided over the offer, with many yet to make up their minds.

PROPOSAL D

The AAA Michigan plan for rolling back auto insurance rates, would do so by limiting the available amount of personal injury protection coverage, fees paid to health care providers, and a driver's right to sue. The proposal's exact wording on the Nov. 3 ballot is as follows:

A proposed legislative amendment would:

1. Reduce auto insurance rates by 20 percent (average) for policyholders accepting \$250,000 in personal injury protection. Extra coverage made available at added cost.

2. Require profit refunds when underwriting profits exceed 5 percent.

3. Permit Insurance Commissioner to waive company's obligation to reduce rates or refund profits if needed to assure fair rate of return.

4. Allow policyholders to waive residual liability insurance.

5. Limit fees paid to health care providers.

6. Allow rate reduction for five consecutive claim-free years.

7. Require coordination of benefits with health insurance.

8. Limit right to sue by setting higher standards for injuries and prevent drivers over 50 percent at fault from collecting damages.

Should this proposal be adopted?

When their underwriting profits exceed 5 percent.

Also under the AAA plan, would-be plaintiffs would have to meet a higher standard for injuries before they could sue, and drivers over 50 percent at fault for an accident would be barred from collecting damages.

Douglas Anderson agreed with those requirements, noting that huge legal settlements are one driving force behind ever-rising insurance rates.

"People should be compensated fairly, of course, but sometimes I think the judgments are too much," Anderson said.

When told that personal injury protection would be reduced under the proposal, Chris Donkers objected. "I wouldn't want that," he said. "I'd rather pay more insurance and collect more in case I'm injured."

Proposal D would require insurance companies to issue refunds

Joyce Eskra also worries that limiting medical coverage would place an unfair burden on the seriously injured.

"Nowadays, \$5 million isn't even anything," Eskra said. "My concern is that we have seen, when friends who have accidents require long-term hospitalization and rehabilitation, a million dollars is eaten up in no time flat."

Eskra does appreciate the proposal's attempt to limit lawsuits, criticizing the large awards made to people with relatively minor injuries. But the fact that the proposal was made by an insurance company gives her pause.

"The insurance companies are trying to control a lot, and I don't know if I really want them that involved," she said.

Eskra's sentiments were echoed, and amplified, by Josephine Johnston.

"I think I'll vote against it," Johnston said. "It looks like the insurance rates will go up, and being a senior citizen I can't afford any more increases."

Johnston, who said she has followed the issue in newspaper articles and through television advertisements, doubted the claims of big savings from Proposal D proponents.

"Has any insurance company done what they said they were going to do?" she asked. "You'd like to believe it, but I'm not sure I do."

Leaves force us to watch where we park cars

Fall had long been Don's favorite time of the year. The changing colors and the crisp feel in the air reminded him of his younger days, when fall signaled the start of a new school year and some welcome relief from the hot and humid days of summer. The falling leaves were a perfect excuse to get outside and do some work in the yard, and Don had spent the weekend raking his leaves to the curb. Happily occupied by these thoughts as he drove home from work on Monday evening, Don pulled his car to the curb in front of the house, gathered his belongings and went inside for dinner.

Like Don, many of us enjoy the pleasures fall brings. A hallmark of fall, dead leaves from the trees in our yards provide fun for children, a nuisance for their parents or, for folks like Don, a good reason to get out and enjoy the season. But whatever else the piles of fallen leaves may mean to us, they are also a fire hazard.

New concerns over the quality of the air we breathe have led to the banning of leaf fires in the fall, once the preferred method of disposal. In more recent times the leaves have been raked to the curb for pickup, or into piles for bagging and disposal. These piles of dry, dead organic matter are a perfect source of fuel for a fire. A cigarette, carelessly tossed out the window of a passing car, may constitute nothing more than litter in the summer time. In the fall, however, it can quickly become the match that

lights the fuse if a pile of leaves happens to be nearby.

Many people do not realize that a more serious hazard can be presented by their own car. New cars, equipped with catalytic converters, can experience very high temperatures along the exhaust systems. Since we do not routinely look underneath our cars, we are usually unaware of how hot it gets, and so do not think about the dangers that exist when we park our cars along the curb, on top of those dead leaves so carefully raked from our yards.

Don was enjoying his dinner when he noticed a strange odor. Shouts from neighbors, outside in front of his house, caused Don to look through his living room window where, to his shock, he found his car ablaze. Don quickly grabbed the phone and called 911 to report the fire.

The Fire Department arrived in a matter of minutes. Firefighters wearing self-contained breathing apparatus pulled a hose line and worked their way in close to the fire. The orange light from the fire quickly disappeared, replaced by billowing clouds of gray steam. The fire was extinguished without incident, but there was little that could be done to save Don's car.

As the remains of his car were towed away, the chief told Don that the fire had most likely been started by heat from the catalytic converter, which had ignited the pile of leaves which Don had inadvertently parked on top of. When he came home that evening, All Don could do now was to make a call to his insurance agent.

Legislative Action Network/Ballot proposals

Effects of Cut and Cap are many

Editor's note: This is the second in a series of articles presented by the Northville PTAs' Legislative Action Network. Last week's article provided an overview of the public school funding system in Michigan. This piece analyzes the "Cut and Cap" proposal on the November election ballot, Proposal C. Next week the LAN analysis of Proposal A will be presented.

Cut and Cap is the proposal on the November ballot which Gov. John Engler is supporting. Cut and Cap intends to do two things:

- Put a cap of 3 percent per year on all property (residential and business) tax assessment increases.
- Gradually reduce school property taxes by 30 percent over five years.

The cost to the state would be approximately \$420 million in 1994, rising to \$1.7 billion annually starting in 1996. This money would be used to reimburse local school districts for money lost due to the 30-percent reduction in school property taxes. For Northville this effectively transfers \$7

million from local to state control. Northville would initially be reimbursed this \$7 million. However, Cut and Cap does not prevent the Legislature from reclassifying portions of other grant monies and rechanneling it to other districts. In this way, Cut and Cap offers no protection from "Robin Hood" plans. A "Robin Hood" plan refers to legislative action which takes money from wealthy school districts and gives it to tax-base-poor districts.

Cut and Cap does not solve the funding inequity between wealthy and tax-base-poor school districts. Even after the reimbursement of the cut funds, the inequity in funding remains. This inequity is the reason legislators give for "Robin Hood" plans.

Cut and Cap would cause a decrease in tax money from commercial and industrial property since this plan caps all property assessments — business and home.

Gov. Engler expects that the plan would be funded by economic growth in the state. This growth is expected, in part, because lower property taxes will hopefully attract businesses to the state. If the tax cut is not replaced with economic

growth, Cut and Cap would have to be funded by program cuts in other areas or a state tax increase.

Cut and Cap would cause similar parcels of property to be taxed at different levels. For example, a recently sold home will be taxed at a much higher rate than a home which had been held for a period of time. This would impede sales of new and existing houses, since property would be reassessed upwards to 50 percent of its selling price.

Under Cut and Cap the Homestead Property Tax Credit program would continue but:

- Individual taxpayer credits would be reduced as property taxes are reduced.
- Individuals would pay slightly more state income taxes, which would increase the state's income.

Cut and Cap does not cap millage rates. Cut and Cap would limit assessment increases (which can occur without a vote), while allowing millage rate increases (which require a vote).

If Cut and Cap became part of Michigan's constitution, it could be changed by a vote of the people. The Legislature could not amend any provision of the new law.

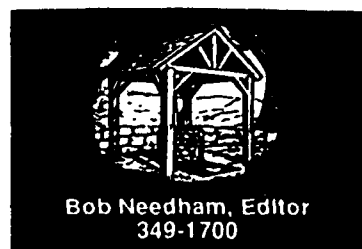

Ford plant deal seems tempting, but . . .

The development/donation plan put before the committee studying the old Ford plant's future offers some very attractive features.

Not all is well, however. And the strings attached to the plan could conceivably keep it tied to the realm of dreaming.

The benefits are obvious and large: a chance for a 25,000-square-foot library, which would be a reasonable expansion of the community's current cramped facility; outright public ownership of Ford Field; continued public access and enjoyment of the grounds at the old plant; restoration of the historic building and water wheel; and an improved tax base through commercial use of some two-thirds of the old plant.

Wow! In some respects, this is more than the community could reasonably expect. A worst-case scenario could see the entire Ford site, including Ford Field, sold off to a private concern which would end all public use. This new plan is very far from that eventuality, further than could be reasonably hoped.

But, there has to be a but, doesn't there? And here, as outlined in the most recent study committee meeting, there are several. And they are not insignificant.

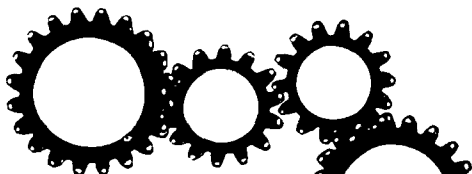
You could distill the worries into two simple words: time and money.

On the first, time: The Ford Motor Co. has been sitting on the land for years now, trying to find some permanent resolution to the plant site. It's starting to get impatient. Recently the company started a new push to sell the plant and land, at a fire-sale price. That has resulted in a couple of fairly solid offers, of which this proposal from the Northville Development Group seems to be the preferred option.

But if the city is going to jump on board the new redevelopment plan, Ford wants an answer soon — by Nov. 13. Although Mayor Chris Johnson said recently Ford doesn't consider that an "absolute deadline," it's something pretty close to that. If the city isn't well on its way to agreement within a few weeks, a sale to another party becomes very likely.

For a project of this size, that's not much time. Certainly not enough time to schedule and hold any time of public referendum; hardly enough to hold a public hearing. While a district library proposal, currently in the development stages, might provide a way to work out the Northville Development Group plan, such an idea won't go before voters until next February or later.

As to the money: The proposal has the

city paying \$39,000 in monthly lease payments, while the developers shoulder the burden for renovating the library space. After 25 years, the library and community center would be donated to the community.

Finding a source for this money seems almost impossible. The city has cut its budget time and again, and yet still levied a significant tax increase this year. Meanwhile, its use of tax-anticipation notes — an unpleasant, but necessary, means to maintain cash flow — not only continued but actually increased again this year. It would be unwise to take on such a major financial commitment in today's climate, even if the money could be found.

In addition, as study committee chairperson Greg Presley rightly pointed out, the proposed lease payments over 15 years would more than pay for the estimated total value of the entire site after its improvements.

Now, of course the developers have every right in the world to put together a deal ensuring them a profit. But if the city hands them the profit at the expense of its taxpayers, it's time to seek other options.

The committee briefly discussed the idea of funding this project instead of a new parking deck. (The city couldn't really handle the debt on both projects at the same time.) This would be a mistake, and almost certainly will not come to pass. Important as the Ford site is, the parking deck has been considered a top priority for years, and to delay it now would stop many months of work. And Singh Development, of the Main Centre building, would probably explode if this happened. Rightly so; it expected the deck to be done by now.

Another alternative may present stronger possibilities. Presley offered the concept of the city working in more of a partnership with the development group, and that concept may well prove to be the way to get around the problems.

We anxiously await future developments. With continued discussions and more creative thinking, perhaps, just perhaps, the community can end up having its Ford plant and selling it, too.

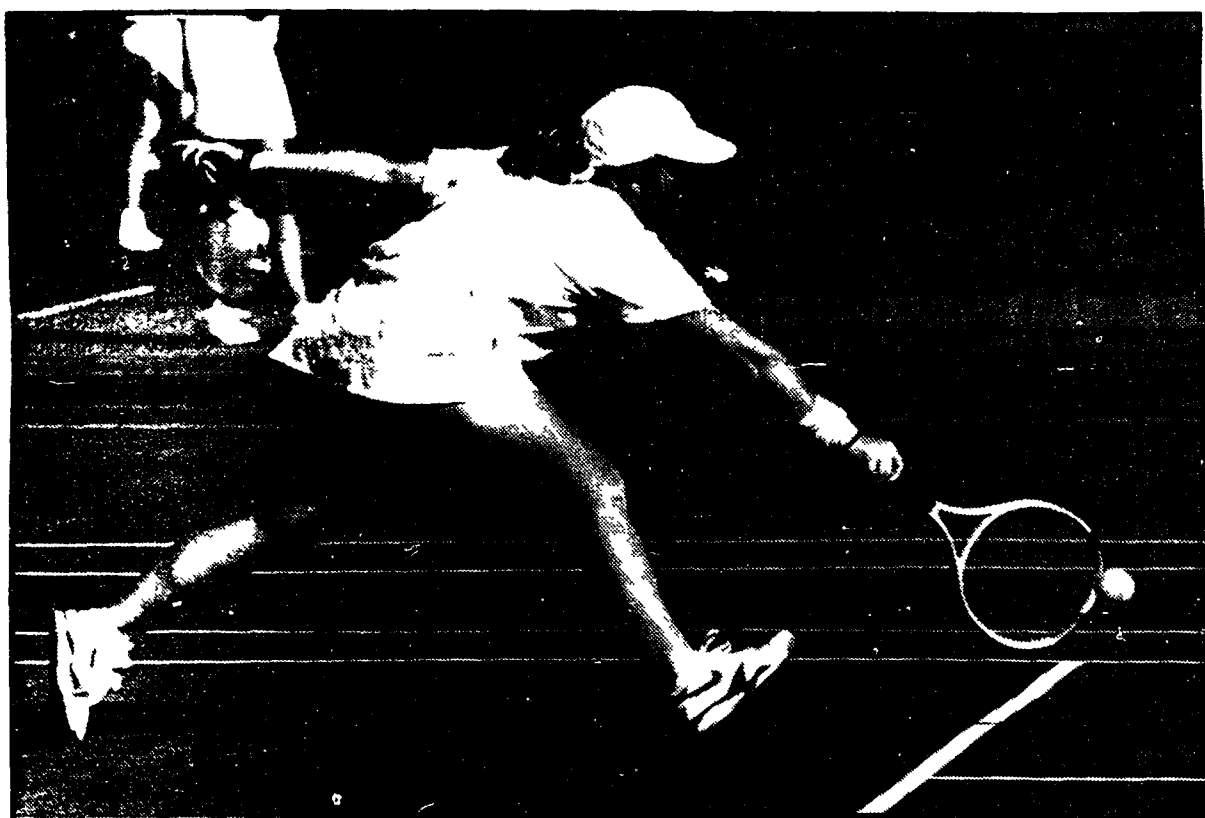

Learning a Girl Scout trick



I had an opportunity to see what newspapers look like from a different perspective last week.

What happened is that I was invited to speak at a conference in Livingston County to tell representatives of service groups how to get their announcements in the paper.

Another speaker was Margaret Szymanek, head of the Livingston County United Way, and it was Margaret who gave me the different perspective. Even though the conference was in Livingston County, the principles are the same for The Record, so I thought it might be valuable to repeat them here.

First, she suggested that you get to know the editors, reporters and photographers from the local paper. "Some people are wary of calling up the local editor," she said. "But they're usually very nice people. And you'll find that they really want to help you."

Rule Two: "Always stay friendly," she advised. "You'll accomplish a lot more by establishing friendly relationships."

Rule Three: Know the different ways of telling your story and which to use when. Margaret listed four different ways of "telling your story": news releases, public service announcements (PSAs), community events listings, and letters to the editor.

Frankly, the PSAs are more applicable to radio and television stations than they are to newspapers because our papers are filled with PSAs in the form of stories or community calendar listings for upcoming events.

Rule Four: Timing — when to alert the media about an event or issue. "This was a good one because a lot of people

have very little idea about our production schedules. As a general rule, I advise people that the best time to contact us is one week before the paper they want the item to be printed in. If you would like us to get a picture to accompany the article, I recommend two weeks in advance.

Generally, speaking Wednesdays and Thursdays are the best time to call editors and reporters at The Record.

Margaret's suggestion that you talk to local editors and reporters about the best time to contact them is a good one, however, and I recommend it. Some days of the week are busier than others, and it's good to learn what days and times are most convenient and least convenient.

As for deadlines, I have one piece of advice. Remember that deadlines are deadlines — not due dates. The earlier you get your materials to us, the more time we have to give them the attention they deserve.

Rule Five: "Follow-up. Say 'thank you' when the paper responds."

Margaret suggested various ways you can thank us for getting your announcement in the paper: a thank-you letter, a phone call, a public announcement at the event that's been publicized or a letter to the editor.

I think this was a particularly valuable piece of advice. I'm not including it because I want to encourage everybody to be nice to us. And I'm definitely not including it to solicit your outpourings of esteem. I include it because it works.

We like being treated nicely. And we appreciate it when somebody thanks us either individually or publicly for what we've done.

The foremost practitioners of being nice to newspapers are the Girl Scouts. If you've ever wondered why Girl Scouts get such good publicity for their annual cookie sales, all you need to know is that they always send along five or six boxes of cookies with their press releases.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 94-05-92

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ZONING ORDINANCE BY AMENDING THE TEXT THEREOF
THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS

PART I. The Charter Township of Northville Zoning Ordinance No. 94 as amended is hereby further amended by amending Article XVIII, Sections 18.13 OFF STREET PARKING SPACE LAYOUT, STANDARDS, CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE, Section 18.16 LANDSCAPE STANDARDS, Section 18.17 WALLS AND BERMS and Article XII GENERAL BUSINESS DISTRICT B-3, Section 12.3, USES SUBJECT TO SPECIAL CONDITIONS, 9 Automobile Service Station, P. (Used Oil Recovery)

PART II. Conflicting Provisions Repealed

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 94, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

PART III. Effective Date

The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effective immediately upon publication.

PART IV. Adoption

This ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Northville, pursuant to authority of Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended at their meeting of October 8, 1992 (10-12-92 NR)

Section 1 Amendment to Section 18.13 OFF-STREET PARKING SPACE LAYOUT, STANDARDS, CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE:

- 12 The parking area shown on the site plan shall include landscaping as described in Section 18.16 LANDSCAPING STANDARDS

Section 2 Amendment to Section 18.16 LANDSCAPING STANDARDS:

1. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this section is to promote the public health, safety and welfare by establishing minimum standards for the design, installation and maintenance of landscaping in parking lots, as buffer zones between uses, along and within roadways, and adjacent to the building. Landscaping is viewed as a critical factor to protect the character and stability of the township and to conserve the value of land and buildings. This ordinance is also intended to integrate the various elements of the site; preserve and enhance the identity of the site; improve and enhance the character of the site; screen or filter views, when necessary; help unify the various parts of the site; blend inharmonious land uses; buffer incompatible uses; define and articulate outdoor and architectural spaces; control soil erosion by slowing the effects of erosive winds or water; moderate harsh or unpleasant sounds; remove air pollutants; control glare and reflection; slow the effects of erosive winds or water and promote storm water retention, thereby helping to prevent flooding; assist in directing safe and efficient traffic flow at driveways and within parking lots; to insure adequate sight distance; insure sufficient access to fire hydrants; to reduce the impacts of glare from headlights; to distinguish and separate vehicular and pedestrian circulation; to block, divert, or channel winds; to moderate the effects of climate and to create a more desirable microclimate. The standards of this section shall apply to all projects subject to site plan review.

The landscape standards of this section are considered the minimum necessary to achieve the objectives noted above. In several instances, the standards are intentionally flexible to encourage flexibility and creative design. Applicants are encouraged to provide additional landscaping to improve the function, appearance and value of their property.

It is recognized that applying these standards fully to pre-existing sites undergoing improvement or expansion is difficult and more burdensome than applications for new developments. Therefore, the intent of these standards is to gradually bring pre-existing sites into compliance with the minimum standards herein in relationship to the extent of change on the site. In any case where the building and/or parking area is being increased by at least twenty five percent (25%) over the originally approved site plan, the site shall be brought into full compliance with the landscape standards herein. In instances where the increase in building and/or parking area is less than 25%, the extent of new landscaping shall be equal to 4% of compliance for every 1% of increase in building or parking footprint (for example, a building or parking area increase of 10% requires a 40% compliance with the landscape standards).

2. Definitions:

For the purpose of this Section, the following definitions shall apply:

- BERM:** A continuous, raised earthen mound with a flattened top and sloped sides, capable of supporting live landscaping materials, and with a height, width, and slope which complies with the requirements of this Ordinance.
- BUFFER ZONE:** A strip of land often required between certain zoning districts reserved for plant material, berms, walls or fencing to serve as a visual barrier.
- COMMON OPEN SPACE:** Designated areas unoccupied and unobstructed from the ground upward except for living plant material, recreational facilities, sidewalks, bikeways and necessary drives within a RD, FRD, One Family Cluster Option projects, subdivision or condominium projects designed and intended for the use and enjoyment of the public or residents of the development and/or for the protection of natural features.
- GRASS:** Any family of plants with narrow leaves normally grown as permanent lawns in southern Michigan.
- GREENBELT:** A strip of land of definite width and location reserved for the planting of a combination of shrubs, trees, ground cover to serve as an obscuring screen or buffer for noise or visual enhancement, in accordance with the requirements of this Ordinance. In some cases a wall or fence may be permitted as part of the greenbelt.
- GROUND COVER:** Low-growing plants (including grass) that form a dense, extensive growth after one complete growing season, and tend to prevent weeds and soil erosion.
- SHRUB:** A woody plant of one (1) to thirteen (13) feet in height with several erect, spreading or prostrate stems and a general bushy appearance.
- TREE:** A woody plant with an erect perennial trunk, which at maturity is thirteen (13) feet or more in height, which has a more or less definite crown of foliage. For purposes of this Ordinance the following definitions of types of trees shall apply:

- DECIDUOUS TREE:** A tree which has foliage that is shed at the end of the growing season.
- EVERGREEN TREE:** A tree which has foliage that persists and remains green throughout the year.
- ORNAMENTAL TREE:** A deciduous tree which is typically grown because of its shape, flowering characteristics, or other attractive features, and which grows to mature height of twenty five (25) feet or less.
- CANOPY TREE:** A deciduous tree which has a mature crown spread of greater than fifteen (15) feet and a mature height of forty (40) or more feet in southern Michigan, and which has a trunk with at least five (5) feet of clear stem at maturity.

Incentive for Preservation of Existing Trees Not Regulated by the Woodlands Standards:

The standards below are intended to encourage the preservation of trees not protected by Section 18.34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION, defined herein as "nonregulated trees".

- In instances where healthy nonregulated trees exist on a site prior to development, expansion, redevelopment or change in use, the Planning Commission may adjust the landscape standards to allow credit for such trees if such an adjustment is in keeping with, and will preserve, the intent of this Section.
- All existing nonregulated trees must first be inspected by Township Staff to determine the health and desirability. In the event trees are to be saved, prior approval must be obtained from the Township before any delimbing, root pruning or other work is done.
- Nonregulated trees intended to be preserved shall be indicated with a special symbol on the site plan and be protected during construction as noted in Section 18.34 TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION.
- Credit shall not be provided relative to existing trees required to be preserved pursuant to Section 18.34, TREE AND WOODLANDS PROTECTION.
- To obtain credit the preserved nonregulated trees shall be of a high quality.
- The credit for preserved trees shall be at the following rate:
Diameter of Trunk of Preserved Tree * (Inches) = Numbers of Trees Credited
8.0 - 11.9 = 2
2.5 - 7.9 = 1
Measured at a height of four and one-half (4.5) feet above the natural grade. (Diameter at Breast Height, D.B.H.)
- To protect and encourage the continued health of the preserved trees, the ground area within the dripline of the trees shall be maintained in vegetative landscape material or pervious surface cover. The township may allow sidewalks, bikeways, vehicular lanes and parking within the dripline upon determining the setback from the trunk is suitable to

reasonably ensure protection of the tree and the public. Storage of soils or other materials during or after construction is prohibited within the dripline.

4. Required Greenbelt Along Public Street and Private Road Frontage:

- A greenbelt shall be planted along the right-of-way of any public street and any private road serving more than two (2) nonresidential buildings or more than four (4) dwellings. The greenbelt shall include one (1) canopy tree per forty (40) linear feet of frontage. The frontage calculation shall include any openings for driveways, sidewalks or easements, with the number of trees required rounded upward at twenty (20) foot increments.
- The Planning Commission may approve substitution of evergreen trees for up to fifty percent (50%) of the required greenbelt trees.
- All greenbelt trees shall be arranged to simulate a natural setting such as massings or staggered rows where a fuller screening effect is desired (refer to figure 18.16 a). The township encourages using a variety of species and sizes. A greenbelt area surrounding the trees shall include only living materials except for planting beds, approved sidewalks, bikeways, walls or fences.

5. Landscaping in Out-De-Sacs, at Entrances and Within Medians:

- Out-de-sacs, site entrances and boulevard medians shall be landscaped with species tolerant of roadside conditions in southeast Michigan. The landscape plan shall be approved by the Planning Commission in consideration of sight distance, size of planting area, location of sidewalks, maintenance of adequate overhead clearance, accessibility to fire hydrants (see Northville Township Ordinance, Chapter 61.390), visibility to approved signs and compatibility with the visual character of the surrounding area. Plantings within fifteen (15) feet of a fire hydrant shall be no taller than six (6) inches.

6. Landscaping as a buffer zone:

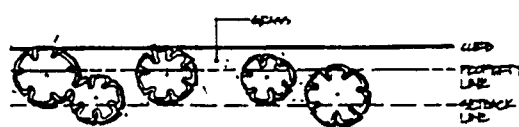
The Planning Commission may require landscaping along the periphery of any development to serve as a buffer zone from adjacent uses. This buffer zone may include trees, berms, walls or a combination.

7. Parking Lot Landscaping:

Off-street parking areas shall be provided with landscaping in accordance with the following:

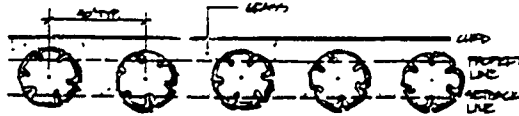
- All of the required parking lot trees shall be placed within the parking lot envelope, described as the area including the parking lot surface and extending 18 (eighteen) feet from the edge of the parking lot, as illustrated in Figures 18.16 b. and 18.16 c. A minimum of one-third (1/3) of the trees shall be placed within the interior of the parking area.
- In an I-1 Industrial District one canopy tree shall be required for each three thousand (3,000) square feet of the total of the paved driveway and parking lot surface. In all other districts, one canopy tree shall be required for each two thousand (2,000) square feet of paved driveway and parking lot surface, provided that in no case are less than two (2) trees provided.
- Each tree shall be surrounded by an open land area a minimum of one hundred fifty (150) square feet to provide for adequate infiltration of water and air, and surrounded by a minimum unobstructed area of six (6) feet around the diameter of the trunk for protection. If irrigation is provided, the open land area can be reduced to a minimum of seventy five (75) square feet. Tree plantings shall also be protected from automobiles with curbing or other suitable device. Canopy trees shall have a minimum clear area between the ground and a height of four feet, six inches (4'-6") at maturity.
- In no case shall the required parking area landscaping be credited toward required woodland replacement trees, greenbelts, or buffer yards.

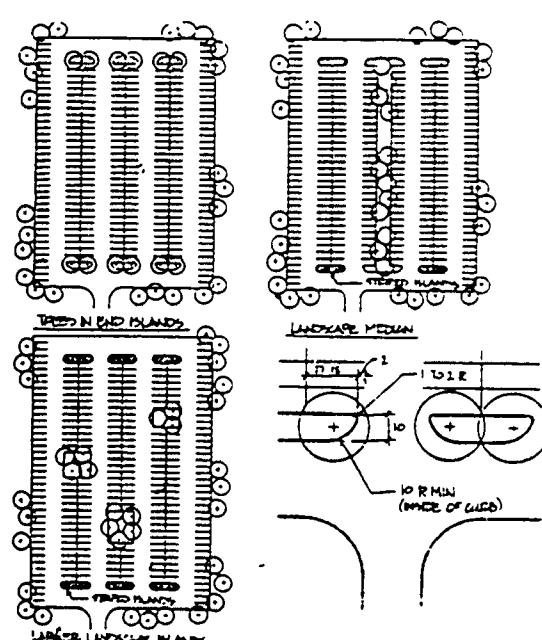
GEOMETRIES OF A VARIETY OF PLANT MATERIAL

NOT PREFERRED



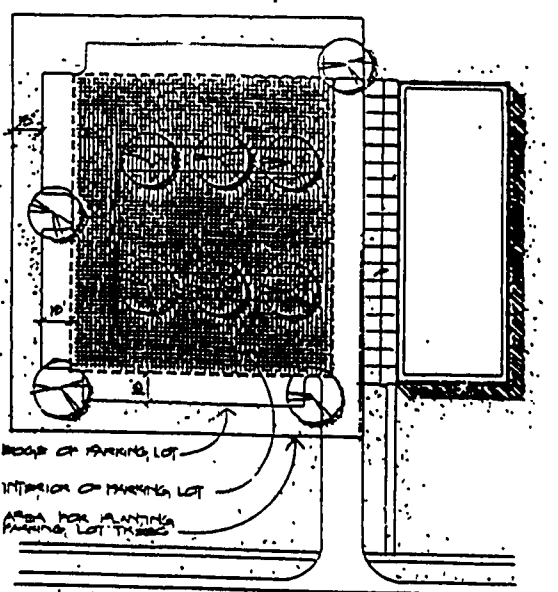

- Landscaping shall be installed such that, when mature, it does not obscure traffic signs or lighting, obstruct access to fire hydrants (see Northville Township Ordinance Chapter 61.390), interfere with adequate sight distance for motorists, nor disrupt drainage patterns on the site or adjacent properties.
- Landscaping shall be dispersed throughout the parking lot in order to break up large expanses of pavement and help direct smooth traffic flow within the lot.
- Landscaped areas shall be covered by grass or other living ground cover. A minimal amount of woodchips or similar material is permitted for planting beds, but should be identified on the landscape plan.
- Design of Islands: The minimum standard for landscaped islands are provided below:

Minimum Width	Minimum Length
ten (10) feet	One hundred-fifty (150) square feet
Required Depth	seventy-five (75) square feet if irrigated
Required Radii	two (2) feet shorter than adjacent parking space to improve maneuvering
	Minimum Ten (10) feet at ends facing main aisles, fifteen (15) feet preferred. Minimum one (1) foot for radii not adjacent to main circulation aisles.

- Wall/Berm Area Landscaping** (see also Section 18.17 WALLS AND BERMS, which describes which type of buffer zone, A or B, is required for specific conditions):

Landscaping for required Wall/Berm Areas shall comply with the following minimum standards. The Planning Commission may waive or adjust these standards as they relate to Section 18.17 WALLS AND BERMS.

- Wall/Berm Landscaping Type A:** Two canopy trees and four shrubs, or one canopy tree, one evergreen tree and four shrubs per each twenty (20) linear feet along the property line, rounded upward.
- Wall/Berm Landscaping Type B:** One canopy tree and four shrubs, or one evergreen tree and four shrubs per each twenty (20) linear feet along the property line, rounded upward.
- At least 50% of the shrubs shall be twenty four (24) inches tall at the time of planting, with the remainder over eighteen (18) inches. All shrubs shall be at least thirty six (36) inches high within four (4) years of initial planting.

9. Minimum Plant Material Standards:

All plant material shall be hardy to Northville Township, be free of disease and insects, and conform to the American Standard for Nursery Stock of the American Association of Nurserymen.

10. Minimum Sizes:

Minimum plant sizes at time of installation (see Figures 18.16 d and 18.16 e) shall be according to the following:

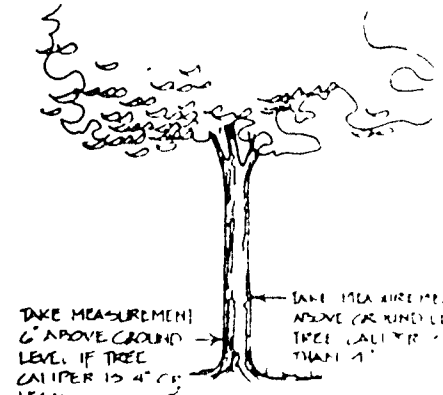

11. Plant Material Spacing:

Plantings in informal groupings to create a naturalistic appearance is desirable, to relate to Northville Township's semi-rural visual character and goals of the Master Plan. Plant materials shall not be placed closer than four (4) feet from the fence line or property line. Plant materials used together in informal groupings shall meet the following on-center spacing requirements:

- Mixing of Species:** The overall landscape plan shall not contain more than 33% of any one plant species. The use of trees native to the area and Southeast Michigan, and mixture of trees from the same species association, is encouraged. Botanical genus containing trees native to southeast Michigan are identified with an asterisk (*) in the list of suggested plant materials.

g. Tree Substitutions

The following trees are not permitted as they split easily, their wood is brittle and breaks easily, their roots clog drains and are a fire hazard and they are unusually susceptible to disease or insect damage. 15. Waiver or Modifications of Landscaping and Screening Requirements:

The Planning Commission, during Site-Plan review may determine existing landscaping or screening intended to be preserved would provide adequate landscaping and screening. The Planning Commission may also determine that dimensional conditions unique to the parcel would prevent development of required buffer zones, off-street parking area landscaping, greenbelts or required buffer zones. If such determination is made, the Planning Commission may waive or modify the landscaping provisions of this Section in consideration of, but not limited to, the following:

- Existing natural vegetation
- Topography
- Existing wetland, floodplain and poor soils areas
- Existing and proposed building placement
- Building heights and views
- Types and distance to adjacent land uses
- Dimensional conditions unique to the parcel
- Provision of adequate sight distances for motorists
- Health, safety and welfare of the Township
- Future land use proposed in the Township Master Plan
- Drainage conditions

16. Installation, Maintenance, and Irrigation

- Parking lot trees, required greenbelts, or plantings shall be planted within six (6) months from the date of completion of the building or improvement. A Final Certificate of Occupancy shall be withheld until planting has been installed and approved. A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy shall be issued in the interim.
- The following requirements for projects developed in phases: If a project is constructed in phases, the landscape may also be constructed in phases. The Township shall determine the extent and timing of landscaping within each phase based on: the necessity to buffer the proposed development from adjacent uses, anticipated commencement on subsequent phases, building heights and physical characteristics of the site such as topography or existing vegetation.
- Landscaped areas and plant materials required by this Ordinance shall be kept free from refuse and debris. Plant materials, including lawn, shall be maintained in a healthy growing condition, neat and orderly in appearance. If any plant material required by this Ordinance dies or becomes diseased, they shall be replaced within thirty (30) days of written notice from Northville Township or within an extended time period as specified in said notice.
- Tree stakes, guy wires and tree wrap are to be removed after one year.
- All landscaped areas shall be provided with a readily available and acceptable water supply, or with at least one (1) outlet located within one hundred (100) feet of all planted material to be maintained.

Section 2 Amendment to Section 18.17 WALLS AND BERMS:

- For the use districts and uses listed below, there shall be provided and maintained on those sides abutting or adjacent to a residential district, an obscuring wall or landscaped berm as required below, unless otherwise determined by the Planning Commission under paragraph 6. below. The height of the wall or berm shall be measured from the surface of the parking area or land on the nonresidential side of the wall: (Note also the requirements of Section 18.16 LANDSCAPING STANDARDS)

- In the case of variable wall or berm height requirements such as in (a), (c), (d) and (h) above, the extent of an obscuring wall or berm shall be determined by the Planning Commission on the basis of land usage.

- Required walls shall be located on the lot line except where underground utilities interfere and except in instances where this Ordinance requires conformance with yard setback lines. Required walls may, upon approval of the Planning Commission, be located on the opposite side of an alley right-of-way from a nonresidential zone that abuts a residential zone when mutually agreeable to affected property owners. The continuity of the required wall on a given block will be a major consideration of the Planning Commission in reviewing such request.

- Required walls shall have no openings for vehicular traffic or other purposes, except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance and except such openings as may be approved by the Planning Commission. All walls herein required shall be constructed of face brick or comparable nonporous facing materials on the exterior sides facing a residential district and shall be approved by the Chief Building Official to be durable, weather resistant, rustproof, easily maintainable and wood or wood products shall be excluded. Masonry walls may be constructed with openings which do not in any square section (height and width) exceed twenty (20) percent of the surface. Where walls are so pierced, the openings shall be so spaced as to maintain the obscuring character required and shall not reduce minimum height requirement. The arrangement of the openings shall be reviewed and approved by the Chief Building Official.

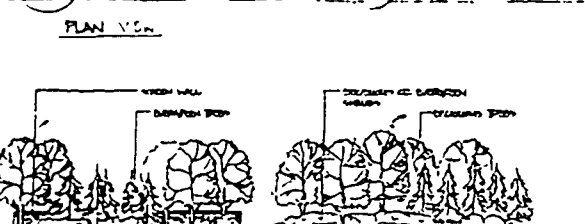
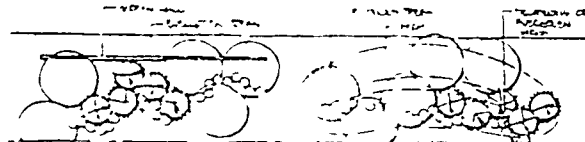
- Required berms shall be constructed as landscaped earth mounds with a crest area at least four (4) feet in width. The exterior face of the berm shall be constructed as an earthen slope. The interior face of the berm may be constructed as an earthen slope or retained by means of a wall, terrace or other means acceptable to the Chief Building Official. Whenever an earthen slope is provided, it shall be constructed with a slope not to exceed one foot of vertical rise to three feet of horizontal distance (1:3).

Berm slopes shall be protected from erosion by sodding or seeding. If slopes are seeded, they shall be protected, until the seed germinates and a permanent lawn is established by a straw mulch, hydromulching or netting specifically designed to control erosion. The berm area shall be kept free from refuse and debris and shall be planted with shrubs, trees or lawn and shall be maintained in a healthy, growing condition.

A planting plan and grading plan shall be prepared for the berm and shall be reviewed by the Planning Commission. Plant materials within the berm area shall be installed in accordance with the requirements for greenbelts and plant material as set forth in Section 18.16 LANDSCAPING STANDARDS.

- In those instances where the following conditions occur, the need for the wall or berm shall be determined by the Planning Commission.

- The abutting or adjacent land is proposed on the Township Master Plan of Land Use as a use other than residential.
- The abutting or adjacent land is developed for a use other than residential.
- The Planning Commission determines that the abutting or adjacent residential district will become nonresidential in the future.
- The abutting or adjacent residential district has physical characteristics which preclude the necessity of a wall or berm. Such conditions include but are not necessarily limited to:

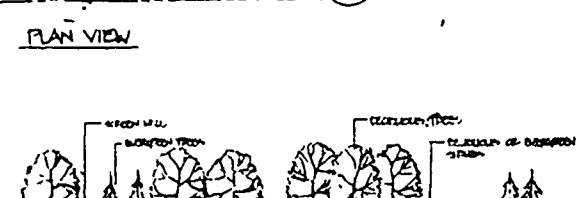
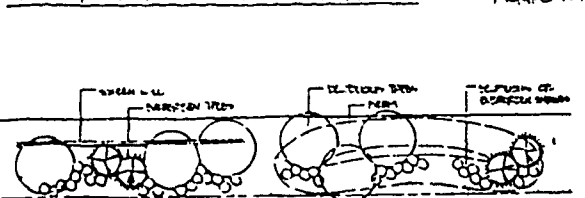

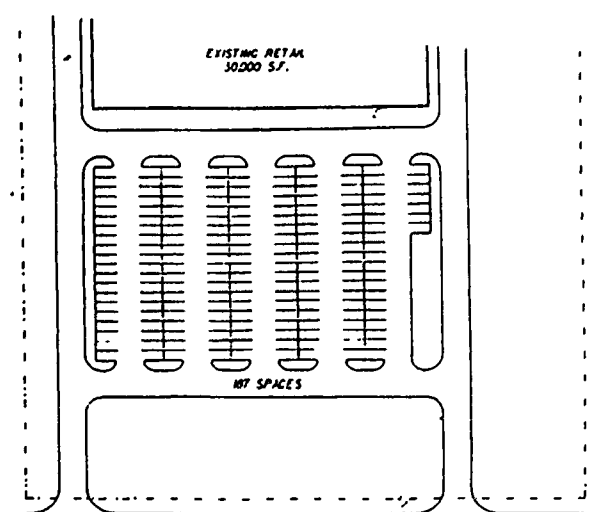

WALL/BERM LANDSCAPE - TYPE A FIGURE K17A

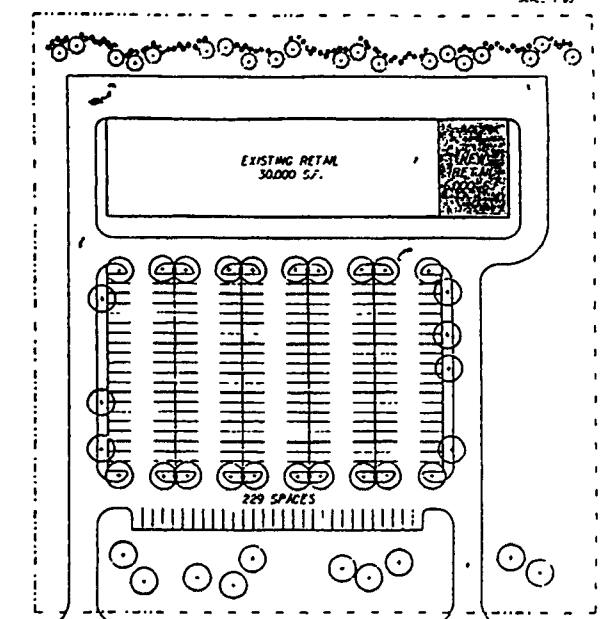


WALL/BERM LANDSCAPE - TYPE B FIGURE K17B

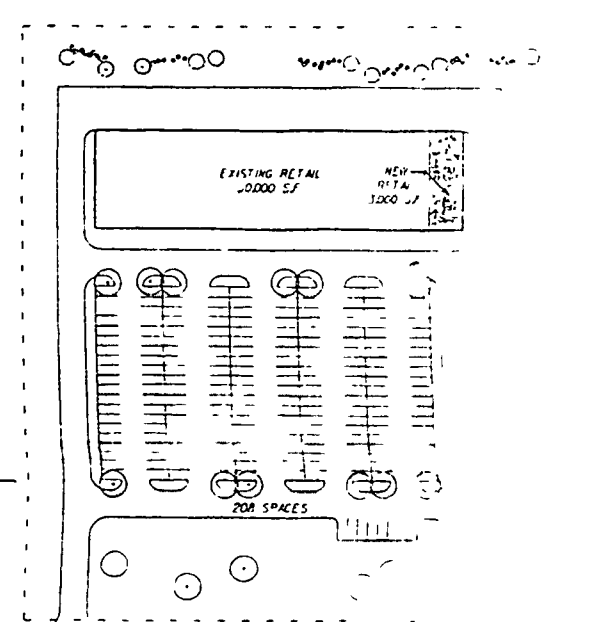
- An abrupt rise in grade on the abutting or adjacent district.
- Existence of heavily wooded or landscaped areas, or wetlands protected by state or federal laws, on the subject site that will buffer as effectively as a wall or berm. Such features on adjacent properties may only be considered if their preservation is ensured through a recorded EASEMENT or Cluster Agreement or a conservation easement.
- Other natural or man-made features that will buffer the abutting or adjacent residential district as effectively as a wall or berm.

12.3 USES SUBJECT TO SPECIAL CONDITIONS Paragraph 9. to add subparagraph p.

- Automobile service station, as defined in this Ordinance subject to the following.
 - Driveways shall be in accordance with the standards of Section 18.36 DRIVEWAY STANDARDS. Only one (1) driveway shall be permitted from any street unless the Planning Commission determines an additional driveway would meet the intent of Section 18.36 DRIVEWAY STANDARDS.
 - The minimum lot area shall be one (1) acre, (43,560 square feet) with one street side equal to at least two hundred fifty (250) feet in width and so arranged that ample space is available for motor vehicles which are required to wait.
 - All automotive repair shall be conducted within an enclosed building.
 - A four feet and six inch (4'-6") obscuring wall, landscaped berm and/or landscaping in accordance with the standards of Section 18.17 WALLS AND BERMS shall be provided where abutting or adjacent to a residential district.
 - All lighting shall be shielded from adjacent residential districts and shall be in accordance with Section 18.19 EXTERIOR LIGHTING.
 - The operations shall be limited to the terms of the definition in Section 2.2 DEFINITIONS, 6. Auto Service Station.
 - Sufficient parking for vehicles to be repaired shall be provided in the rear yard. The Planning Commission may allow parking in the front or side yard if the rear yard abuts a residential district and landscaping is provided to screen the parking area in addition to that required by Section 18.16 LANDSCAPING STANDARDS.
 - All outside storage must be reviewed and approved by the Fire Department for compliance to the National Fire Prevention Code. Vehicles, equipment or other materials for rent, sale or display shall not be permitted.
 - The location of gasoline storage and sales shall be reviewed by the Fire Department for compliance to the National Fire Prevention Code.
 - Pumps or other equipment used in servicing of motor vehicles shall be placed and used only inside the lot lines and shall be set back not less than eighteen (18) feet from any property line and not less than forty (40) feet from any residential boundary line.
 - Overhead garage doors shall have a minimum front yard or seventy-five (75) feet or face the side yard.
- The site plan shall illustrate the height, proposed clearance, materials, colors and signs for any canopy. The Planning Commission shall approve the canopy only upon finding architectural and aesthetic compatibility with the surrounding area.
- The applicant shall submit, for Fire Department review and approval, a Pollution Incident Protection Plan (PIPP) which describes measures to prevent groundwater contamination caused by accidental gasoline spills or leakage such as special check valves, drain back catch basins and automatic shut off valves.
- The project shall comply with the fire suppression regulations of Section 16 of the Township Code of Ordinances, "Self Service Gasoline Stations."
- In the event the automobile service station use is abandoned or terminated, all underground storage tanks shall be removed from the premises in accordance with the National Fire Prevention Code.
- The applicant is encouraged to provide a used oil recovery facility on site for use by the public for the purpose of recycling.

Leaders discuss issues on cable

Town Talk won't be mistaken for the MacNeil/Lehrer News Hour.

But three local pundits held their own under the glare of camera lights last Tuesday during their live cable television debut.

City Council Member Paul Folino, Township Manager Richard Henningsen and Greg Presley of Northville's chamber of commerce were the featured speakers on Omnicom's Town Talk program Tuesday, moderated by Omnicom's community affairs and program director, Maria Holmes.

With microphones clipped to their ties, the three business and government representatives discussed topics ranging from the potential acquisition of the Ford Valve Plant for community use to the start of Northville Township's curbside recycling program. Other hot topics included discussion of the township's new weighmaster program to crack down on overweight trucks and the chamber of commerce's Business Development and Retention Committee (BDRCT), called "Bedrock" by Presley.

Presley, borrowing techniques

from the movie *Broadcast News*, cut a dashing figure as he sat on his coat-tails and leaned forward into the camera. But he blew his cool midway through the show by turning to the camera and saying "Hi" to his 6-year-old daughter, Emily.

Folino, in the meantime, regaled the viewing audience with tales of Northville's history.

Though the show was billed as a call-in program, panelists faced no questions from viewers at home because the station's few callers asked questions that already had been answered.

Tuesday's show also was supposed to provide a forum for education officials, but Holmes said local school board members were unable to attend due to other meetings. Holmes hopes to host another Town Talk session concerning Northville's educational system before the end of the month.

Holmes declared Tuesday's show a success.

"I think it was successful in that it brought together the elements of business and government, and gave them the chance to hear what each other is saying," she said.

The Town Talk series itself de-

buted last year at this time to commemorate Local Cable Programming Week. Programs on Wednesday and Thursday focused on Canton and Plymouth, other communities served by Omnicom.

Holmes said local programming is a growing field, and an alternative media outlet.

"There are more people becoming aware of it," she said. "You don't have to be very experienced. . . . It provides that forum to the average citizen."

Omnicom offers classes that teach local residents how to operate audiovisual equipment, and will loan cameras and other equipment to residents free of charge so they can videotape events on their own.

"Our classes are always filled," Holmes said. Local groups that have taken advantage of the service include the PTA Legislative Action Network, Northville Action Council, and Advocates for Quality Education.

"This is another outlet for giving information to the community," Holmes said.

Northville's Town Talk episode will be repeated on Channel 8 at 9 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 17, and several times thereafter.

Clay to cap Plymouth's Salem Township landfill

The City of Plymouth has begun mining clay which it will use to cap a landfill in Salem Township.

Ken West, City of Plymouth engineer, said the mining started Sept. 17 at the 70-acre private property, which is bounded by Brookville, Gotfredson and North Territorial roads.

West said the approximate 150,000 cubic feet of clay will be used to cover a landfill it owns in Salem on Chubb Road. The resulting hole will be turned into a lake. In addition to the two feet of clay, he said, six inches of topsoil will be deposited to complete the cap, which prevents water from seeping down into the garbage.

Plymouth has a Nov. 1 deadline from the state Department of Natural Resources to complete the landfill cap but is expecting an extension. Steven Walters, Plymouth city manager, said a request for an extension was sent to the DNR.

During a meeting with DNR officials last month, Walters said, "We worked out an understanding" about the project. He added that the DNR has shown a "general openness" to extending the project.

An extra 60 working days, Walters said, was requested to finish capping the landfill. He said, "It (the project) will take us into the first or second week of December."

Adding the 20 normal rain days expected for the next three months, he said the completion date would be around Dec. 25.

The final DNR inspection of the landfill, he said, will be in May or

June of 1993 to allow for the grass seedlings to grow and make any adjustments after the spring thaw.

The Salem Township Planning Commission approved the project on Aug. 31, allowing Plymouth to mine clay on up to 4.9 acres of the property. Commissioners listed several conditions to ensure the work complies with township ordinances and leaves Salem with no liability for ensuing problems with the lake or landfill.

The Plymouth City Commission complied with one of the conditions by approving a \$160,000 performance bond Sept. 21. Walters said the city and township attorneys are working out the wording on the bond.

The two-year bond, Walters said, is "not critical until we get to the end of the project." He said Salem has given the city two years to completely finish the project.

Rainfall and runoff, he said, will be used to create most of the lake.

The landfill, West said, has not been in use since 1965. He said city records indicate the landfill was capped when it closed, but that officials from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) did not think it was adequate.

He added that a clay dike was built north of the landfill and has kept the garbage "completely dry." The dike consists of an underground pipe that takes water around the landfill.

Aphid emerges as scourge of U.S. vineyards

If you haven't heard about phylloxera, the microscopic louse that is devouring California's vineyards, you soon will. The devastation resulting from this ancient nemesis may eventually increase the price you pay for wine.

It may cost up to a billion dollars to replant vineyards. The good news is that by the end of this decade, wine quality should be significantly improved.

Phylloxera is a microscopic vine louse indigenous to the United States. It kills vines by sucking life-giving nutrients from the roots. European grape varieties known as *Vitis vinifera* are particularly susceptible to this louse, but native American concord varieties (*Vitis labrusca*) are not.

In the mid-19th century, as shipping between the United States and Europe improved, this louse was exported from the U.S. to France in a sample of experimental vines. By the 1870s, evidence of phylloxera damage began to spread through the famous vineyards in Bordeaux, Burgundy and throughout Europe.

A vineyard infected with phylloxera produces less fruit, unripe grapes and the vines' leaves yellow and fall prematurely as though the plant was under stress. Since this pest has no known predators and is unaffected by pesticides, the vineyards of Europe were eventually destroyed.

Two solutions were suggested through agricultural research. The first was to develop phylloxera-resistant varieties by crossing American and French varieties. These crosses, known as French-American hybrids, eventually found homes in the eastern U.S., including Michigan, because in addition to phylloxera resistance, they also proved to be winter-hardy.

The second solution was to plant resistant American grape varieties as rootstock and graft the preferred European varieties onto them. This is the method that was used to replant vineyards throughout Europe. In a sense, America provided the solution to the problem it created by exporting phylloxera to France in the first place.

Although rootstock has no effect on grape or wine taste, some rootstocks are better than others because of their ability to limit the quantity of fruit a vine can produce.

There's a large variety of rootstocks available for use when planting vineyards. Most of the vineyards in California, Oregon and Washington are planted on a rootstock known as AxR No. 1, a cross between a European vine and an American varietal. And there's the rub. The rootstock's European heritage is probably the reason for the current problem.

The University of California at Davis recommended AxR No. 1 for many years because it seemed to be a resistant rootstock with the added advantage of promoting higher yields. On the other hand, European academics discouraged its use since 1913 because of its European parentage.

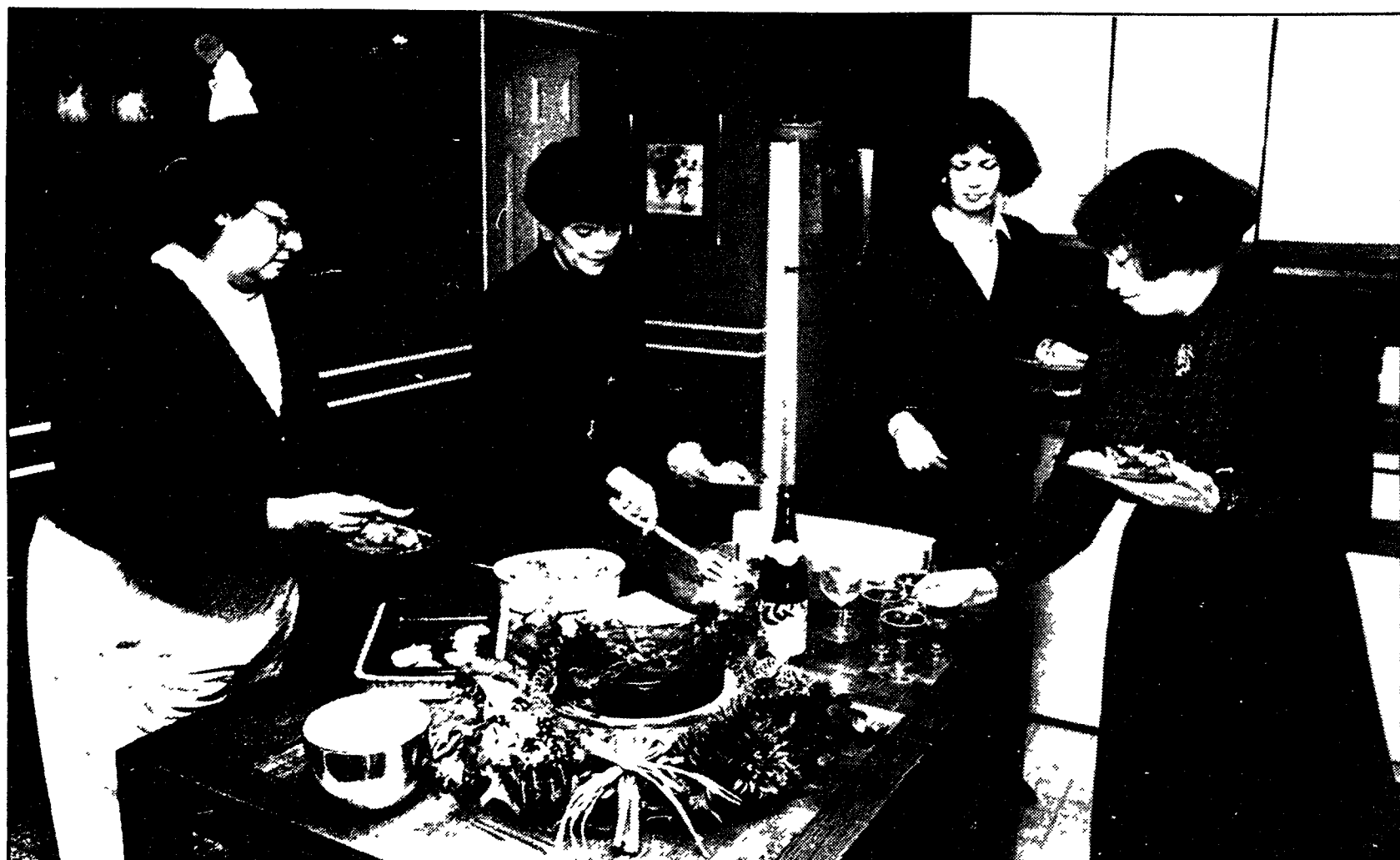

Tender lovin' cookbook Mothers' Club compiles favorite recipes

Some say that the best kind of cooking is that done with a mother's loving hand.

If that's true, then the newest cookbook from the Northville Mothers' Club is filled with love enough for everyone. The book, entitled *Hometown Favorites*, is the combined work of the 35 active members of the club.

The Mothers' Club, a service organization born in 1936, raises funds to support the Northville schools. It has published a number of cookbooks in its 56-year history. The first was issued in 1939, and the most recent came out in 1988.

Thanks to sales of the cookbook, as well as fund-raisers like the Holiday Open House, the Telephone Directory, and the Ski, Sport and Skate Sale, the Mothers' Club expects to donate \$20,000 to the schools this year. Last year, they gave \$15,000 which was applied to "wish lists" supplied by various school principals.

"We began collecting recipes in January," said Gini Patak, who used her desktop publishing prowess to edit the text. "The bulk of it was done by summer, and we went to press in the end of July at a small shop in Chelsea."

Copies were on the shelves of local bookstores by September.

"It really was like giving birth to a baby," said Sue Shepard, who chaired the 1992-93 cookbook committee along with co-chair Karen Hooper. "It took just about nine months."

"The final phase of our labor was the easiest, though," said Patak. "We were more like fathers at that point. We just waited around."

Each member of the Mothers' Club supplied 10 recipes. Naturally there was some duplication, but even so, the mothers wanted more recipes. They then went out into the community for submissions.

Scattered throughout the book, you'll find contributions from local restaurateurs, like Chef Tom McKinnon; shopkeepers, like Ronnie Cambra of the Kitchen Witch; school officials, like Superintendent Leonard Remziarski; and local government officials, like Northville Mayor Chris Johnson and outgoing Township Supervisor Betty Lennox.

There are pleasant pen-and-ink drawings of down-

town Northville homes in each of the chapters. These were drawn by local artist C. Phelps Hines. His illustration of the long-gone Crow's Nest graces the cover of the book.

The mothers definitely had some fun of their own in compiling and testing the recipes. Take, for example, the Three-Wine Chicken submitted by Sue Shepard.

The note at the beginning of the recipe is telling: "The directions for this recipe are definitely for the 'over-21' crowd. Depending on the type of day you've had, you may prefer to omit, or perhaps increase the wine."

The list of ingredients for Three-Wine Chicken calls for, among other things, ¾ cup of white wine. Reading

Over 800 sets have been sold and are available at Kitchen Glamour and at each of the chefs' restaurants — including yours truly. It's a fantastic idea that has received nationwide recognition.

through the directions you learn, however, that none of this wine goes into the meal. It goes into the cook. Spaced out every two or three sentences is the command, "Test white wine in small glass," and then finally, the coup de grace, "Test white wine in any size glass."

We sampled the recipes given here, but the ingredients of these recipes go deeper than the words on the page.

"It was fun doing this book," said Patak. "A recipe is a real personal thing, and people shared them so willingly. A whole lot of love from everybody went into that book."

GINGERED NECTARINE PILAF

2 tablespoons orange juice
¼ cup frozen peas, thawed
2 nectarines or peaches, peeled, chopped

In medium saucepan, bring chicken broth and water to a boil. Stir in rice. Cover; simmer 15-20 minutes or until rice is tender and liquid is absorbed. CHOCOLATE-RASPBERRY CHEESECAKE WITH RASPBERRY SAUCE

2½ cups chocolate wafer crumbs
½ cup butter or margarine
¼ cup sugar
1 package (8 ounces) semi sweet chocolate squares
¼ cup strong, hot coffee
3 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese at room temperature
1 cup sugar
1 cup sour cream
2 tablespoons heavy cream
¼ cup raspberry liqueur

Raspberry sauce
1 package (10 ounce) frozen strawberries, thawed
2 teaspoons cornstarch
Optional garnish: whipped cream and mint sprigs

For Cake: Preheat oven to 350 F. Lightly grease 9-inch springform pan. Combine crumbs, softened butter and sugar. Press into bottom of pan and up sides approximately 1½ inches. Combine cream cheese, sour cream, sugar and beaten eggs. Melt chocolate with heavy cream. Combine with sour cream, coffee, liqueur and cheese mixture. Pour into springform pan. Bake 55 minutes. The cheesecake will be creamy and a little runny in the center. Let cool and chill.

For Sauce: Drain raspberries, reserving juice. Crush berries and strain seeds. Combine raspberry juice, puree and cornstarch, stirring until smooth. Cook over medium heat, stirring until smooth and thickened. Let cool. Yields approximately ¾ cup. Serve cheesecake slices on a pool of raspberry sauce with a garnish of whipped cream and mint sprigs. Serves 10-12.

Why has this pest become a problem recently? U.C. Davis maintains that the louse currently rampaging the vast coast vineyards is a mutation called Bio-type B. It has adapted to the AxiR No. 1 rootstock through evolution. This theory seems to have some validity because grape growers we talked to say that the original phylloxera would destroy a vineyard in 10 years, but it takes only three years for the new strain.

Motto, Kryla & Fisher, wine industry consultants, estimate that the grape supply in Napa and Sonoma counties will decrease from 284,000 tons in 1991 to 180,000 by 1997, a decrease of 37 percent. This will have the biggest effect on prices of chardonnay and cabernet sauvignon since 50 percent of the best chardonnay and over 90 percent of the high-end cabernet is grown in Napa and Sonoma.

The MFK report also suggests that phylloxera will eventually be given credit for better wine quality if replanted vineyards incorporate new technology.

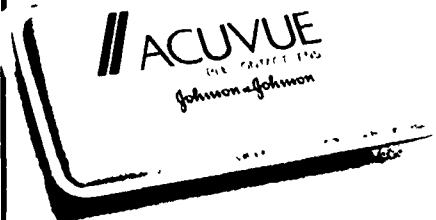

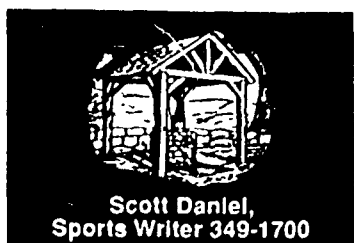

Walled Lake Western spoils Mustangs' bid for division title 30-27

In the end, a dry eye couldn't be found on Northville's sideline.

For four quarters Friday night, the Mustangs battled favored Walled Lake Western to a standstill for the WLAA's Western Division title. But it was the Warriors, behind an Arnie Gillert five-yard touchdown run, who emerged victorious in overtime to spoil Northville's homecoming 30-27.

"The kids played extremely hard," coach Darrel Schumacher said. "I'm proud of them."

Western forced the overtime when placekicker Travis Ilacqua connected on a 28-yard field goal with 1:31 remaining in the game. The score was 24-24 heading into OT.

Under Michigan High School Athletic Association rules, both teams are given four downs to score from the opponent's 10-yard line. The squads continue to play under that format until one team has more points after an equal number of possessions.

Northville took the ball first. After two losses and a penalty, the Mustangs faced a third down on Walled Lake's 23-yard line. Quarterback Danny Walsh looked for Eric Shaw in the end zone, but had his pass tipped away by the Warriors. On fourth down, however, kicker Mike Hirvala nailed a 41-yard field goal to give Northville a 27-24 lead.

Western took over on the Mustangs' 10-yard-line for their chance.

On first down, quarterback Dave Watkins fumbled the snap from center but quickly pounced on the ball. The QB then bootlegged a run for five yards to Northville's 5-yard line. Finally on third-and-goal, Gillert took the handoff and knifed his way through the middle for the winning touchdown.

"He's a strong boy," Schumacher said of Gillert, who checks in at 5-foot-10 and 201 pounds. "And, one whale of a back."

Gillert ran for 284 yards on 42 attempts.

Schumacher made no excuses for the defeat. He said his team didn't lose the game. Walled Lake won it.

"They earned it," the coach said. "Every inch."

Western coach Chuck Apap pointed to his team's unity as a key factor.

"We've shown that in every game," he said.

The loss ended Northville's hopes of a first-ever Western Division title. Walled Lake (4-0 in WLAA) must only tie or win its final division game Friday to take the crown. The Mustangs are 3-1 in the WLAA and 4-2 overall.

Big plays and Western miscues led to a 17-7 Northville halftime bulge.

Walled Lake took the opening kickoff and moved to its own 42-yard-line. On a second down play, defensive end John Gatti sprinted into the Western backfield and hit Watkins, forcing a fumble. Brent Medaris recovered at Western's 39-yard line.

Northville advanced to the 15-yard line on a Walsh completion to John Farrar and a Walled Lake penalty. After picking up a first down, Kevin Shaw scored from two yards out to give the Mustangs a 7-0 lead with 4:58 to go in the first.

The Warriors then put together a 65-yard drive of their own to tie with 1:40 left. The quarter ended with the game tied 7-7.

The teams traded possessions in the second. With 8:22 left in the half, Northville took over on its own 15-yard line.

Kevin Shaw ran the ball for a yard to start the drive. Walsh decided to

take to the air on second down as he rolled to his right but found receivers covered. The senior then tucked the ball under his arm and took off, cutting back to the middle of the field and scampering 84 yards for a TD.

A 38-yard Hirvala field goal at the 2:15 mark closed scoring in the half. The three-pointer was set up on a Marc Golden interception and run-back to the Western 18-yard line.

Northville got its final touchdown in the third quarter.

Gillert first cut the Mustang lead to 17-14 with 7:31 remaining in the period. On the ensuing kickoff, Walsh worked a little of his magic.

He took a good Western kick at his own 2-yard line and broke up the middle in a flash towards daylight. At the 20-yard line, Walsh leaped over a downed Warrior defender and was long gone. The senior ran 98 yards to give a 10-point lead back to Northville at 24-14.

It was downhill from there for the Mustangs.

Walled Lake opened the fourth quarter by scoring in five plays. With 10 minutes left in the game, Northville led 24-21.

The Mustangs started with the ball on their own 45-yard-line after the score but could do nothing with the big Western defense. After three downs, Northville punted.

After trading possessions, Walled Lake started the tying drive on its own 30-yard line.

On the third play from scrimmage, Watkins faked a hand off to Gillert and then sprinted 52 yards to the Northville 14-yard-line. Four plays later, Ilacqua tied it.

NBC's got a gem in 'Jewels'

Steel's story mines drama, romance

With the World Series in full swing, the folks at NBC realize that CBS has a lock on a large, predominantly male audience. But where does that leave the many women and non-sports fans who wouldn't know a home run from a homing pigeon, and don't care, either?

On NBC, that's where. For viewers unconcerned with fastballs and the like, the network proudly presents *Danielle Steel's 'Jewels,'* a five-hour miniseries airing Sunday and Tuesday, Oct. 18 and 20.

Jewels, Steel's 41st novel, was published in April, and sales quickly went through the proverbial roof. No surprise, though, since Steel is in the *Guinness Book of World Records* for the feat of 400 weeks aboard the *New York Times* best-seller list.

As a source for successful movies and miniseries, Steel's qualifications are just as impressive. *Danielle Steel's Daddy*, for instance,

broadcast last October during the Series, ranks as the season's highest-ranked made-for-TV movie. Three notches down that same list, *Palomino* proved a formidable opponent for one night's broadcast of *Monday Night Football*. Other winners in the Steel catalog include *Kaleidoscope*, *Fine Things* and *Secrets*.

The winning tradition should continue with *Jewels*, a glittering showcase of romance, glamour and powerful human drama. Like past Steel dramatizations, *Jewels* is brought to the screen with top-notch writing, superlative acting and the highest of production values.

Annette O'Toole (*Stand by Your Man*) stars as lovely Sarah Thompson, a wealthy young American taken to Europe in 1938 by her parents in order to help her recover from a tragic first marriage. At a London cricket match, Sarah meets dashing William, Duke of Whitefield (Anthony Andrews). Although reticent at first, Sarah cannot resist William's easy charm and self-deprecating wit and agrees to spend her remaining time in England with him. At the train station, they share a romantic goodbye, Sarah fully

believing their relationship is at an end.

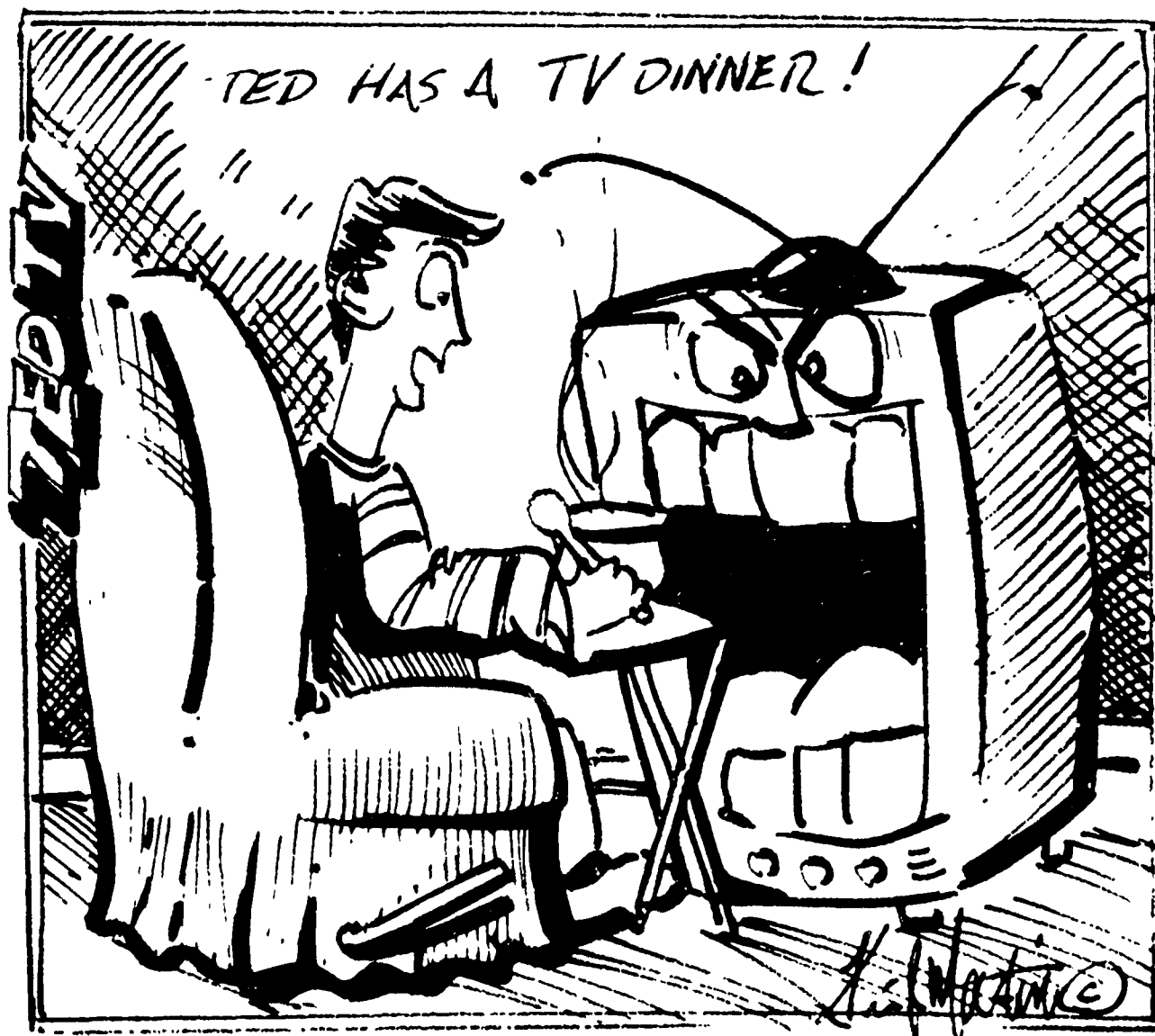
Imagine her surprise when she opens the door of her Italian hotel room to see dazzling banks of red roses and William standing among them, grinning like a schoolboy. "I couldn't let you go," he says.

After a brief courtship, Sarah and William are married. They purchase an abandoned chateau in the French countryside, and Sarah busies herself with its renovation. On the very day of their first son Phillip's birth, England enters the war and William is called into service. Months later, the chateau is taken over by the Nazis for use as a field hospital, and Sarah is not allowed to leave with her son. By war's end, the Nazis are gone and William is home once more, now confined to a wheelchair by injuries suffered in a brutal German prison camp.

Sympathetic to the appalling poverty of their French neighbors, William and Sarah charitable start buying their jewelry and reselling it in the city. As the business expands, stores are opened in London and Rome. All the while, Sarah must cope with the increasingly independent ways of her children (now numbering four) and William's sadly failing health. Through it all, Sarah remains strong and fiercely dedicated to her principles.

Annette O'Toole anchors the miniseries with her strong portrayal of Sarah, though one wishes at times for greater variety in her performance. Anthony Andrews (*Brideshead Revisited*, *Under the Volcano*) is perfectly cast as William, a model of British charm and polish. Jurgen Prochnow is memorable in the small role of the Nazi commandant with whom Sarah shares a startling (but chaste) romance.

The supporting cast in *Jewels* is almost uniform in its quality, from Benedict Taylor's engaging Julian (Sarah's second son) to Corinne Touzet's well-developed portrayal of Emmanuelle, the French peasant girl who becomes one of Sarah's closest allies. One performance, however, stands out for its weakness. Yvonne Scio, though beautiful, is dismally wooden as Julian's treacherous wife.



'Lifestories' offers truth in strong doses

HBO series pulls no punches

Although entertainment programming has always been the mainstay of HBO's schedule, the No. 1 premium channel has long recognized there's another audience out there as well, responding with acclaimed specials such as *How to Raise a Street-Smart Child* and the award-winning *America Undercover* documentary series. Now, HBO addresses the problems and perils facing young adults in *Lifestories: Families in Crisis*, a series of six monthly installments premiering Tuesday, Oct. 13.

HBO vice-president Sheila Nevins says the network sought to create "reality programming that spoke to families." Noting the current buzzword status of "family values," Nevins asserts, "This is not a reaction to current controversy. But we all have family values, we all care about children and young people."

The first episode is *Public Law 106: The Becky Bell Story*, about an Indiana schoolgirl who resorted to an illegal abortion rather than comply with state law and ask her parents' permission. (She died of a massive infection just days later.) The events are dramatized, but Bell's real parents appear at the end of the program, urging young women to know their options and parents to keep open the crucial lines of communication. "Remember," says Mrs. Bell, "what it was like when you were young."

November's unnerving episode is *The Secret Life of Mary-Margaret: Portrait of a Bulimic*. Other shows focus on date rape, pediatric AIDS, drunk driving and teen suicide.

Lifestories is intended as family viewing and material for later discussion, but parents should be advised this is strong stuff. Some scenes are almost alienating in their intensity, and younger viewers may well be frightened.

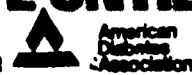
"But it's not dishonest," counters Nevins. "We didn't want to cut away to the sunset at the crucial moment. The story has to be on the screen."



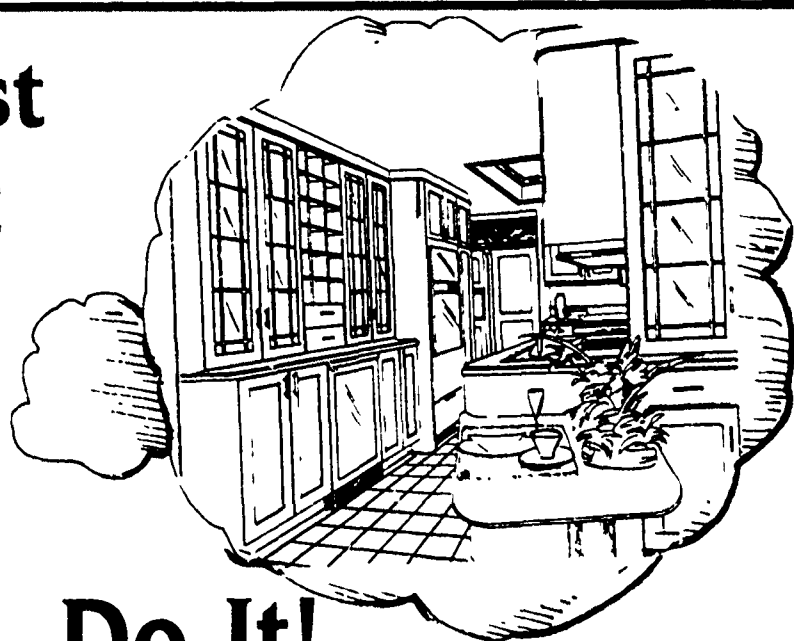

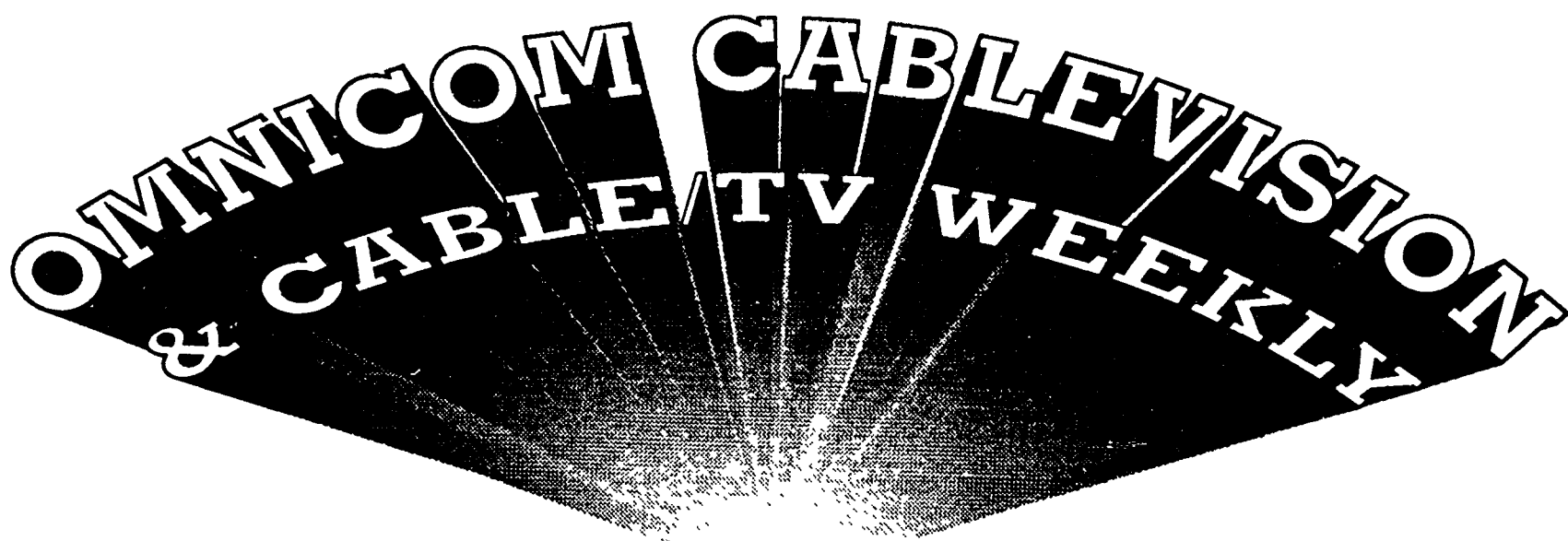

Screen gems set in friendly confines

America's fascination with baseball and baseball movies is the subject of *Diamonds on The Silver Screen*, a special debuting Thursday, Oct. 14, on AMC. The show, narrated by James Earl Jones, uses clips and commentary from baseball enthusiasts and filmmakers to trace the history of baseball in the movies from its earliest beginnings to today's big-screen blockbusters.

Jones, who appeared in both *Bingo Long and the Traveling All-Stars* and *Motor Kings* and *Field of Dreams*, guides viewers through a history that includes over 100 films and spans all genres.

Baseball's history in film began in 1898 with *The Ballgame*, Thomas Edison's documentary look at two local amateur teams. The silent films of the early 1920s were famous for their cameo appearances by actual players. Baseball films made a strong comeback in the 1940s and '50s in a series of "biopics," which dramatized the lives of some of the greatest baseball heroes of the day, including Babe Ruth, Dizzy Dean and Monty Stratton. Perhaps the most well-known was *Pride of the Yankees*, in which Gary Cooper played Lou Gehrig.

More recent films, such as *Bang the Drum Slowly*, *Eight Men Out*, *The Natural* and *Field of Dreams*, focus more on the human element of the game and are, as Jones points out, "not so much about baseball players as about people that happened to play baseball."

'Stunt Dawgs' deliver professional-strength fun

For every 1,000 showbiz hopefuls who've had pet projects chopped up, put down, stepped on and put off, there's one Hal Needham, the rare breed whose ideas look better on film than they probably did in his head.

Needham's experiences as Hollywood's premier stuntman and director of stuntpersons (*Smokey and the Bandit*, *Hooper*) are transformed in *Stunt Dawgs*, 40 original cartoon capers airing weekdays in nationwide syndication.

"Once we decided to make this thing a few months ago," Needham says of the *Stunt Dawgs* brainstorming period, "I sat down one Saturday morning to watch some cartoons. I watched turtles, I watched it all — none of it made much sense to me. But is it supposed to? I'm not 8 or 9 years old."

Armed with the belief that cartoons should appeal to more than one age group and brimming with filmmaking anecdotes, Needham soon had *Stunt Dawgs* on the storyboards.

These pooches aren't passive. In one frenzied stunt after another, the *Dawgs* rip through 30 minutes worth of thrills and spills — with more than a few pokes at filmdom's foolishness — to a hard-rocking soundtrack.

Kids may find more esoteric entertainment elsewhere down the dial, but they'll be hard-pressed to find anything more explosive.

Drop-out teacher lives to laugh about it

It helps to have a sense of humor when playing a character called "Gooshie." Dennis Wolfberg, who has the role of the odd-named scientist endeavoring to repair the time accelerator on NBC's *Quantum Leap*, certainly qualifies. The winner for "Best Male Stand-up" at the 1990 American Comedy Awards, Wolfberg has logged more appearances on Fox's *Comic Strip Live* than any other comedian.

The native New Yorker attended Queens College (which he describes as "a school that academically ranks up there with the American Bartenders Institute") before becoming a sixth-grade teacher in the South Bronx. After switching to a career in comedy, he met and married fellow comedian Jeannie McBride, also a former teacher. The couple worked the comedy circuit as America's only husband and wife stand-up tandem.

Wolfberg tells of the casting call for *Leap*'s Gooshie: "You get sent out according to type — leading man, boy next door, strange uncle. I was startled when I looked into the casting waiting room and saw the most motley collection of misfits and miscreants — it was human flotsam. I thought, 'I obviously don't belong here,' until the secretary saw me and said, 'Come in and have a seat with the rest of them.'"

When asked what life he would like to "leap" into, Wolfberg replies, "Richard Burton in 1964, because that's the kind of guy I am."

Eastwood at girls' school; Spacek in her 'Prime'

Q: I saw a Clint Eastwood movie some years ago — after his *Rawhide* days. He was very young, and he played a soldier who came upon a girls' school. The girls all fell in love with him but, after having to amputate his leg, in the end they poisoned him with mushrooms. Can you tell me the name of the movie and what year it was made? —Pat Cresseveur, Bardstown, Ky.

A: This slightly offbeat Eastwood outing is titled *The Beguiled* and was made in 1971.

Q: I'm writing for some information on the Ford supermodel Fabio Lanzoni. He recently appeared on Maury Povich and is a frequent model for Avon publications.

I'm interested in details on how he was "discovered" and what his first jobs were. Has he done any acting? Does he reside in the States as well as Italy? What are his agents' or publicists' names? —Lori Gaines, Kilgore, Texas.

A: Lanzoni's publicist, Nadine Johnson, is quick to point out how "very hot" he is right now, and that he is too busy working to grant many interviews.

The son of Milan mechanical engineer Sauro Lanzoni and his wife, Flora, Fabio moved to New York City when he was 21 (he's 31 now) and claims to have signed a modeling contract with Ford "15 minutes" after barging into their offices. It's been wine and roses ever since, as he's modeled for over 300 romance novel cover illustrations (at about 45 minutes and \$3,000 a pop) and had cameos in *Scenes From a Mall* and *Exorcist III*. He hopes his future will include more beefy film roles, but in the meantime, he's busying himself with a six-figure deal to write (as well as pose for) a few romance novels. For exercise, Lanzoni lifts weights and goes cycling. He lives in West Hollywood with four Great Danes. A: Another reader, Sylvia Cotton from Carthage, Texas, has also inquired about Davis, and I'll try to answer all the questions.

Tragically, Davis' life was cut short earlier this year by complications arising from AIDS. He was probably best known for his brilliant turn in 1978's *Midnight Express*, which garnered a best-screenplay Oscar for Oliver Stone. His intense portrayal of American Billy Hayes, who was tortured in a Turkish prison for years after being caught drug-smuggling, was most effective. As mentioned, he also portrayed the late Robert Kennedy in a 1985 miniseries titled *Robert Kennedy and His Times*.

Q: Many years ago, possibly in the late '70s, I saw a Lee Marvin movie in the theater, but I have never seen it again. He played a mobster who was in conflict with another gang. Much of the war was in Kansas, and people in large combines chased others around in a wheat field, and also in a packing plant where butchered cattle hung. Can you tell me what the title was? —Charlotte Anderson, Metropolis, Ill.

A: That film was 1972's *Prime Cut*, a nifty little actioner starring Marvin, Gene Hackman and Sissy Spacek, in her film debut. The movie is available on video.
