



## Doors open on dispatch discussions

A failing radio system could force improved communication — and joint police and fire dispatching services — between Northville Township and one or more nearby communities.

Police Chief Chip Snider and Supervisor-elect Karen Baja were to meet today with Plymouth Township counterparts Carl Berry and Kathleen Keen-McCarthy to discuss the possibility of combined police and fire dispatching.

Talks also loom with Northville city officials on a joint dispatching plan that could involve as many as four or as few as two local governments.

Combined dispatching plans have been handled about here for years, but severe budget problems in both Northville city and township could clear bureaucratic static from the airwaves.

The township's police and fire dispatching radio is falling apart, Snider said, and township budget-cutters have all but ruled out his \$175,000 request for a new radio and modified dispatch center.

With an anticipated budget shortfall topping \$500,000, budget reviewers consider the radio an unaffordable commodity.

Fine, Snider says. But he wants it known that his radio is on its last legs.

"The budget committee better have a Plan B in mind," he said. Snider said a move to join dis-

patching forces with another community could be accomplished in 30 days, if necessary. He said the township could hook up with radio systems currently used by Plymouth Township or Northville city.

Issues such as location and who to hire and fire have stalled talks between Northville township and city officials in past years. Tight budgets — and a new township board — could force politicians and police chiefs to take a much closer look at consolidating.

Financial savings could result from using one radio system and by cutting back on the number of dispatching personnel, local officials believe.

City officials have said they are willing to relocate their dispatch radio to the township. But the city is not prepared to take the sole burden of dispatching staff layoffs. Any township/city talks are expected to include a proposal that dispatching staff be retained on a seniority basis.

The meeting with Plymouth Township leaders has prompted questions about the relationship between the Northville city and township police departments.

Snider and city Police Chief Rod Cannon say they are not aware of bad blood between the forces.

Today's chat with Plymouth Township is an attempt to familiarize Baja and Keen-McCarthy with police operations, and could open the door to further talks, Snider said.

## Deck financing plan hits a snag

The city's proposed amendment to Mainstreet '78 has run into another traffic jam, and its arrival will be further delayed.

The amendment — designed to fi-

nance a 480 space parking deck with captured taxes from an expanded downtown development district — must be reviewed by a Development Area Citizens Council. City officials now are scrambling to assemble that group, following a recommendation Monday by the city's bond counsel.

While city officials were aware of the requirement, they questioned whether it applied to their Mainstreet '92 plan. The city's bond counsel at Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, George Stevenson, advised that it did apply.

"It was discussed fairly early on,

but the question was whether it applied to an update of an existing plan," said City Manager Gary Word. "As it turns out, the answer is 'Yes.'"

Mayor Chris Johnson explained the situation to the Downtown Deve-

## Budget cutters hit township wish lists

Budget reviewers sharpened their knives on various departments throughout the township last week, but it was capital-outlay requests — the so-called wish lists — that suffered most of the cuts.

The township's first in-depth analysis of the proposed \$4-million 1993 budget offered an eye-opening glimpse of the township's current financial predicament.

The five member budget review committee's findings are preliminary, and the Township Board will have the final say at an Oct. 28 budget adoption meeting, but this year's cuts are deep.

About \$560,000 must be lopped to balance the 1993 budget. Budget reviewers targeted likely de-

letions at a marathon review session Friday.

Among the high-priced tentative victims: A police and fire dispatching system priced at \$175,093, and a selective-enforcement patrol car pegged at \$33,580.

The Fire Department will have to do without a \$64,037 ambulance and a \$7,153 mannequin CPR tool.

A computer and software requested by the Building Department was axed (\$7,000), as was software for the Elections Department (\$11,000) and a Planning Department analysis project (\$5,000).

In all, capital outlay requests were reduced by better than \$308,000, based on the review committee's proposals.

Capital outlay was not the only target. Other potential victims include \$6,000 in state lobbying

fees, and costs associated with various township seminars, conferences, and literature subscriptions.

Community shared-services programs such as library, recreation, and senior citizens went untouched, as of Friday's meeting. Budgets for those programs are dictated by both the city and township, and alterations of more than five percent must be discussed by a city/township blue ribbon committee.

The budget committee identified about \$500,000 worth of potential cuts at last week's session. Another round of talks is scheduled for this evening at township hall.

Budget review committee members are township Manager Richard Henningsen, Finance Director Dwayne Harrigan, Treasurer Jack Hosmer, Supervisor-elect Karen Baja, and Treasurer-elect Rick Engelland.

## Park plan crumbles at last moment

As late as Monday evening, the proposed Beck Road community park plan was on the fast track, slicing through layers of bureaucratic barriers, hurtling toward reality.

By Tuesday, the plan boomeranged and threatened the immediate life of the much-delayed project.

At the last moment, the township scrapped plans to kick off a 45-day referendum period with a legal advertisement in today's Northville Record. Township officials on Tuesday were

scurrying to find the answers.

Lack of preparation apparently is the culprit behind the most recent delay for the site west of Beck between Five and Six Mile roads.

Just hours after the township Building Authority approved a bank loan concept at a hastily called Mon-

day session, the park plan caved in.

Officials said township attorney Ernest Essad informed them that additional steps needed to be taken before the township could print the legal advertisement.

## WTUA will compete for \$5 million grant

A \$20-million pot of gold is out the window for now and WTUA officials must vie for a \$5-million federal kitty with 17 other sewer projects from around the country.

The U.S. House recently authorized a spending bill which put the Western Townships Utilities Authority in line for a \$20-million federal grant. The Senate reportedly was set to follow suit, but Office of Management and Budget officials gutted the measure, said David Geiss, administrative assistant to U.S. Rep. William Ford (D-Ypsilanti).

The end result hurt WTUA's

chances for federal dollars, local and federal officials said.

"The OMB was very involved in negotiations, (and) our language changed very significantly," said WTUA Chairperson Thomas Yack.

Geiss said the OMB demanded changes in the Senate version before President George Bush would sign the bill. Alterations mean "there's a competition" for the available grant money, he said.

"I don't want to infer (WTUA) will get \$1 million or \$200,000," Geiss said.

Bill wording which stipulated a \$20-million grant was diluted to the

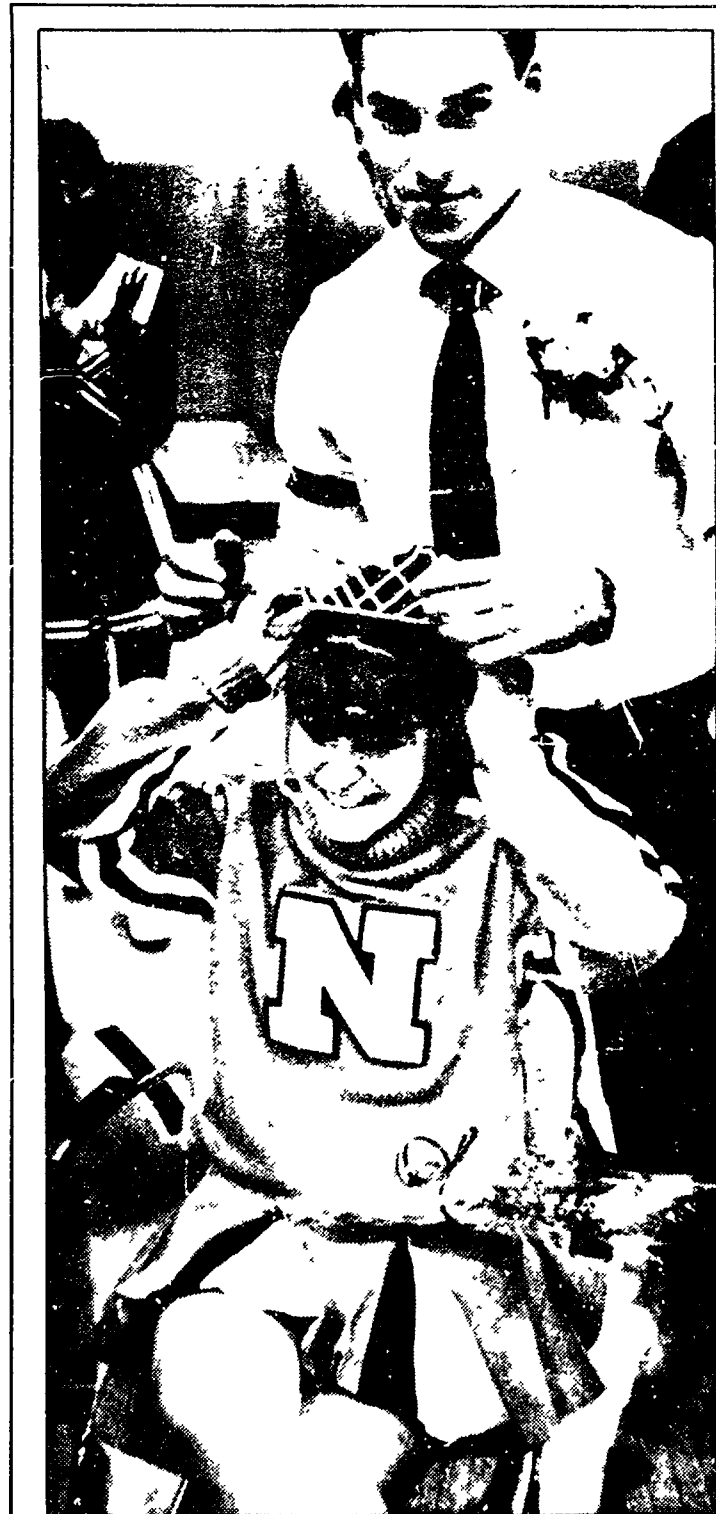

# Pay-to-be-honored scrapped

Hindsight is 20-20. If school officials had only known then what they know now, they would never have included the National Honor Society under the pay-to-participate umbrella.

But that wasn't the case. So School Board members Monday night accepted the recommendation of its policy subcommittee and the pay-to-

participate committee and yanked the honor society from the list of chargeable co-curricular activities.

In their own defense, school officials said they didn't know imposing the \$100 fee for honor society violated the society's charter at the time they conceived the pay-to-participate plan.

"This was a very concerning matter for a parent and students," said Superintendent Leonard Remmerski. "It wasn't a wrong decision. It was a right

decision with the information we had at the time."

With unanimous board approval, the society has been dropped from the list. Students who paid the \$100 fee to participate only in National Honor Society will be reimbursed. All others who are active in other co-curricular activities will not be reimbursed and will be subject to the \$5 membership fee allotted for society enrollment under the national sanction.

## Mill Race Matters

Many thanks to Margaret Zayt for the use of Northville Downs and for her assistance in helping the Northville Historical Society to experience another successful Tivoli Fair. Thanks this week also to: The Northville Public Library for a card catalog for our archives, Motor Vehicle Manufacturers' storage, Genittis for their donation, the Mill Race Basket Guild for their donation and lovely baskets, and to Helen Gilbert for her identification of the unidentified photograph which appeared in the September Mill Race Quarterly.

Other historical organizations have asked us to publicize the upcoming Great Lakes Lacey Group Love of Lacey III Nov. 21 at Livonia Civic Center Library and the Hartland Area Historical Society Antiques Appraisal Clinic on Saturday, Oct. 24, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Crompton Library, Hartland.

Michigan Pioneer Collections contained many stories and reminiscences from our state's earliest settlers. One of them comes from Abraham Markham, who originally settled on land bounded by today's Six and Seven Mile roads, Northville Road and a line just west of Sheldon Road. Portions of his memories garnered from his own diary appeared in Jack Hoffman's *First 100 Years* as well.

Markham recalls, "I will mention a few incidents that are not uncommon in the settlement of a new country like this. I think it was in the month of March that Mr. (Daniel) Lovejoy Cady came to my shanty and requested me to go with him to get the dimensions of some lots of land. These lands were the lands whereon the village of Northville now stands. We looked for an hour to find the stake to get a starting point. We followed the line to the river and started to cross on a log, when it gave way and in we went, thankful that the water was only two or three feet deep." This memory is from March 1826 and was presented to the Pioneer Society some 50 years later, yet it remained clearly vivid in his memory.

Another memory from the same presentation: "There were no mills nearer to us than Detroit on the one side and Pontiac on the other. All had to go or send to one or the other of these places for their groceries, nails, etc. or go without them, which many did. I built the first mill in this town and ground the first meal. I was two whole days building the mill, and it answered very well for grinding corn. Two boys or two women could grind a bushel of corn in one hour; two men could do it in less time. Many people ground their corn at this mill, but no toll was taken; each one did their own grinding. The mill made very good meal. . . . Mr. Lincoln built a sawmill the same autumn east of Plymouth corners on the river, but my mill was in full blast before he got his running."

In the following summer John Miller built a grist mill on the site of today's Mill Race Village. The mill became the first permanent business in the village of Northville. In weeks to come more memories of Markham and others will be shared through this column. The information gleaned comes from sources available in our own Northville Archives, Mill Race Village.

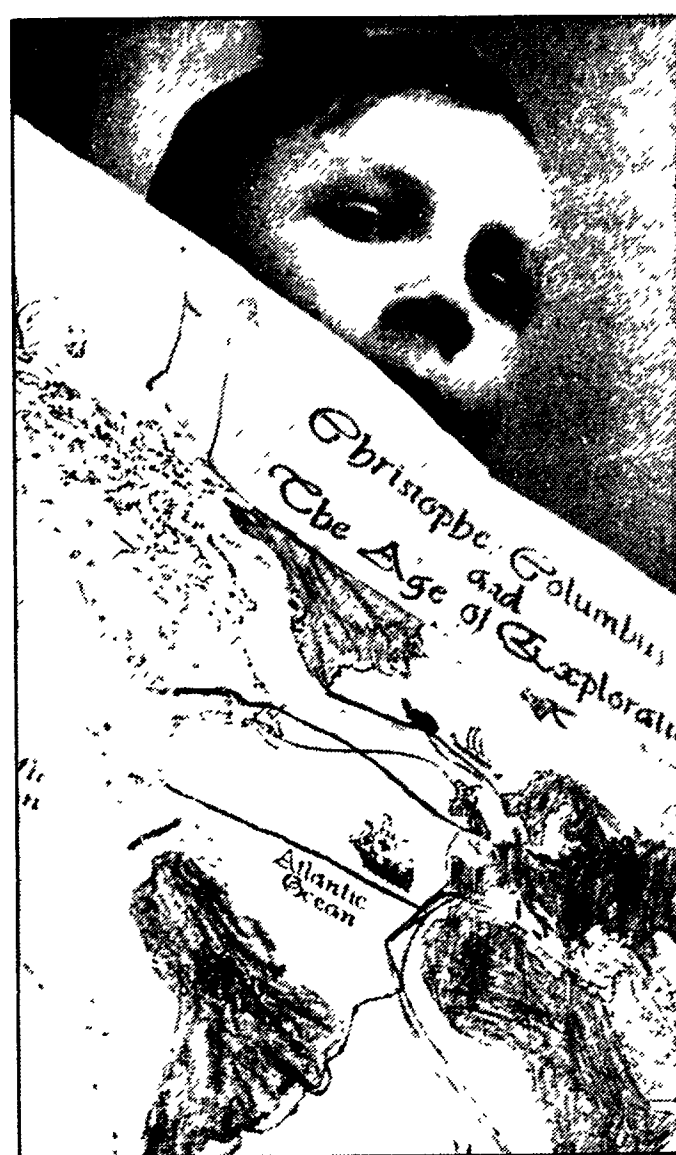

# Reward for tombstone vandals

Those who defile the resting place of the dead often rile the living as well.

An anonymous donor has posted a \$500 reward for the arrest and conviction of vandals who recently knocked over 15 headstones and three urns at Rural Hill Cemetery.

The damage was done sometime between Sept. 11 or 12. Damage estimates range between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

Jim Allen, whose family owns Allen Monuments, discovered the headstones the morning of Sept. 12. Many of the stones were broken, and several cylindrical markers had rolled into the street.

Allen Monuments is responsible for operating the cemetery, selling grave plots and maintaining burial records.

"We have not had a lot of vandalism at Rural Hill Cemetery, but when they go in there and knock over 15

markers, that's cause for concern," Allen said.

While most of the stones have since been repaired, Allen said such vandalism is often irreparable. When the top part of the headstone — called the die — falls over onto the base, a permanent stain mark is often produced, he said.

Extremely weathered marble stones are sometimes left lying on the ground after they fall or are pushed over, because they are too fragile to be reset, he added.

Anyone with information about the vandalism or those responsible is urged to call Northville City Police at 349-1234. All tips will be kept strictly confidential, and the information can be given anonymously.

Rural Hill Cemetery's origins are shrouded in time, though the cemetery is known to be at least 106 years old. The Rural Hill Cemetery Association transferred ownership of the graveyard to the village, now the city, in 1947.

## Society publications list local cemetery burials

The Northville Genealogical Society has published an all-new reading of Rural Hill Cemetery.

Entries in the book include burials through 1990. It includes those for which there are no stones, supplied by the Allen Monument Co.

Books are available through the mail from the Genealogical Society at 42164 Gladwin Dr., Northville, MI 48167. The soft, spiral-bound books cost \$20. Postage and handling for the 192-page book is \$2.50.

The society also has similar publications for the other local cemeteries.

What follows is the book title and the cost per book: Cady Cemetery, \$4; Knapp or Section 35 Cemetery, \$1; Thayer Cemetery, \$2; Yerkes Cemetery, 2.50; and Waterford Cemetery, \$4.

Society members say the books are excellent resources for tracking down family trees and tracing genealogies.

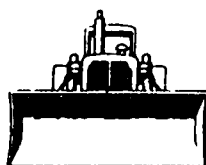

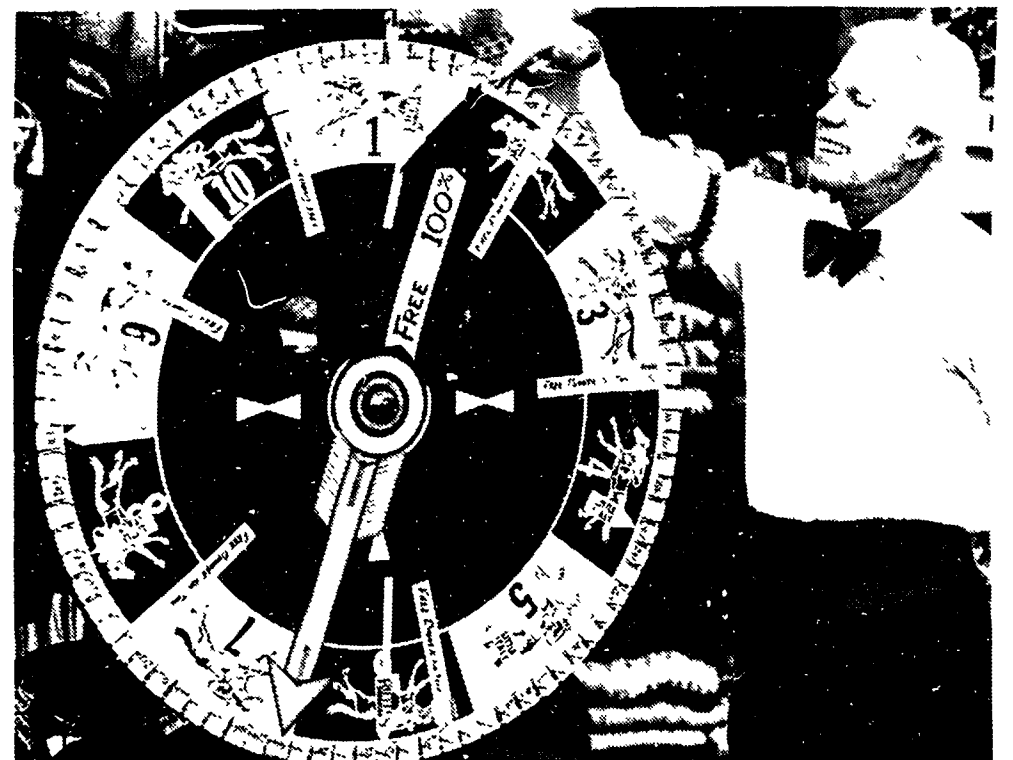



# Strategy team plots new course

Members of the Northville Public Schools strategic planning committee came away from this month's work session with a scaled-down, more-focused plan plotting the school's direction.

The team, which was sequestered for two and a half days on the first weekend in October, emerged from the work session with an almost entirely new plan. The draft of the team's efforts is now being circulated throughout the community and is expected to be approved by the School Board in February. This was the second annual update of the district's original plan.

Between now and February, board members, administrators, and members of the strategic planning team are looking for residents to sit on action plan committees to make the objectives and strategies they've identified a reality.

Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional services, presented the plan with members of the strategic planning committee to the full School Board and the community at Monday night's board meeting.

"We had a lot of candid discussion," she told her audience. "We have finally learned how to use a strategic plan. I think we've moved away from a strategic management plan to a plan that focuses on our customer."

But in actuality the document the team came away with was an entirely new plan from the one drafted in 1989. To reflect the changes the district has undergone since the first plan was adopted, the group has drafted a new mission statement, changed its belief statements, identified new guidelines and objectives, and reduced the number of strategies it intends to use to achieve its goals.

The mission statement is significantly changed from the original plan and team members are calling it a more focused, meaningful directive. It now reads: "The mission of the Northville Public Schools, a district committed to excellence, is to ensure all students demonstrate the skills, knowledge and attitudes to achieve personal success and to become responsible citizens through a partnership of staff and community in a caring, challenging environment."

Instead of the eight original strategies the team once had, they now have three firm strategies.

Those are defining and focusing on exit outcomes, noting appropriate benchmark standards, and developing a means to measure those standards. In addition, the team wants to design a partnership with parents that ensures planning and goal-setting and challenges students and minimizes bureaucratic and paperwork burden. The final strategy seeks to structure a quality organization that ensures each student learns to his or

her specific outcomes.

With all that identified, school officials and team members are pitching their plan at 24 various civic and community organizations in the hopes of getting people involved and active on action planning committees. That campaign kicked off this week with the board meeting and at various PTA meetings and gatherings of other local organizations.

Resident reaction to the strategic plan prompted a lively discussion at Monday night's board meeting. Some residents objected to language in the first objective addressed by team members.

That objective reads, "All students will meet district standards of performance on essential outcomes for each appropriate level of instruction by demonstrating identified skills, knowledge and attitudes."

The word attitudes raised a few eyebrows in the room and started a lengthy debate over its intended meaning.

Debbie Faber, along with others, quizzed the team members about the word choice and wondered about its connotations.

But team members who admitted being involved in a similar discussion over the word in their work session defended its use as it relates to promoting or instilling in students a positive attitude toward learning and toward citizenship.

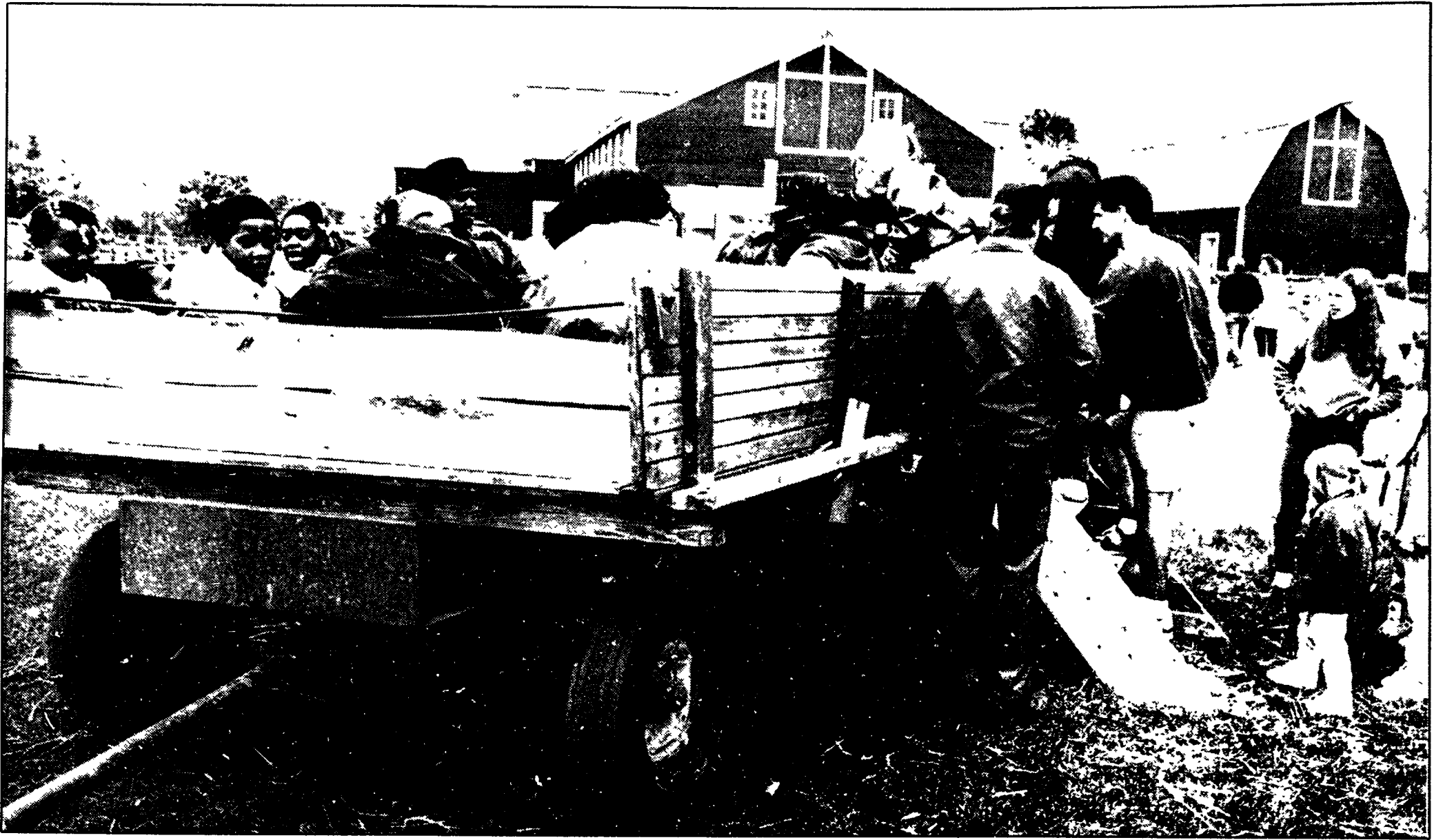

# Opposites attracted to county commission race

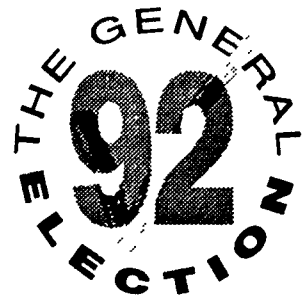
In the battle to see who'll represent Northville on the Wayne County Commission, voters may choose between, A) a 27-year-old Republican attorney who writes songs and plays an electric guitar, or B) a 68-year-old Democrat real estate agent who bills himself as "the Smiling Irishman."

Livonia resident Thaddeus McCotter is the young Republican who once played lead guitar in a band called the Flying Squirrels. Since 1989, McCotter, the son of Livonia City Clerk Joan McCotter, has been the youngest member of the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees.

Plymouth resident Mike Caffery is a Prudential real estate agent in that company's Plymouth office. He has no prior experience in government, but ran unsuccessfully for the Dearborn City Council 25 years ago.

Caffery grew up on the east side of Detroit, served as a mechanic in the Army during World War II (but never got overseas) and went into the real estate business shortly after the war.

McCotter grew up in Livonia and graduated from Catholic Central High School. He started clerking for a legal firm in 1989 and got his law degree from the University of Detroit the following year. Currently he works alone as an attorney, but promises to put his legal career on ice for now if elected county commissioner.



County Commission

McCotter and Caffery appeared last Wednesday at a League of Women Voters election forum in Livonia.

The candidates agreed that Wayne County doesn't need any new taxes, but McCotter seemed more aware of the relevant issues than Caffery.

For example, when asked about their positions on the county's three ballot proposals, McCotter had an opinion on all of them. But Caffery answered by just saying, "I'm

against new taxes." (Only one of the county proposals to appear on the Nov. 3 ballot asks for more taxes.)

When asked specifically about the ballot proposal that could return one-tenth of a 1-mill county tax to cities and townships, McCotter said he favors the proposal, but Caffery chose not to respond.

In a recent interview, Caffery was asked the same question. "I haven't heard about that one," he said. "I guess I haven't been keeping up-to-date."

In his closing statement at the debate, Caffery took a poke at McCotter for being a lawyer. "I'm not an attorney," he said. "I never tried to be an attorney. I always tried to be a salesman. They don't need another attorney up there at the county."

The following comments were taken from separate interviews with each candidate.

On county Executive Edward H. McNamara, McCotter said, "He's probably the most business-minded Democrat we've got. He's done a lot of things for the county. I'll work with him, but I won't work for him."

Caffery gives the opposite impression. Queried about the ballot proposal that asks voters to tax themselves half a mill for indigent health care, he said, "If McNamara thinks it's necessary, I'll go along with it."

When told that McNamara opposes the ballot prop-

osal, Caffery said, "Then fine; I'll oppose it."

Both candidates also agree that county government doesn't pay enough attention to communities in western Wayne.

McCotter said that the attitude Detroit defenders have toward the suburbs is, "Tax 'em. They can afford it."

Caffery declared that a lack of attention to western Wayne is his main reason for running, but he wouldn't answer when asked if the commission pays too much attention to Detroit.

"We need more representation in western Wayne County," he said.

As an example of the neglect, Caffery pointed to Edward Hines Park. "Make it a park (again)," he said. "All it is right now is an expressway for you and I to get down to Detroit."

On campaign spending, McCotter said he hopes to spend \$10,000, but it depends on how much he can raise. It's not easy for him to raise money, he said, because many potential contributors believe that he'll be an easy winner.

Caffery said he'll spend less than \$3,000, mostly on signs and handouts.

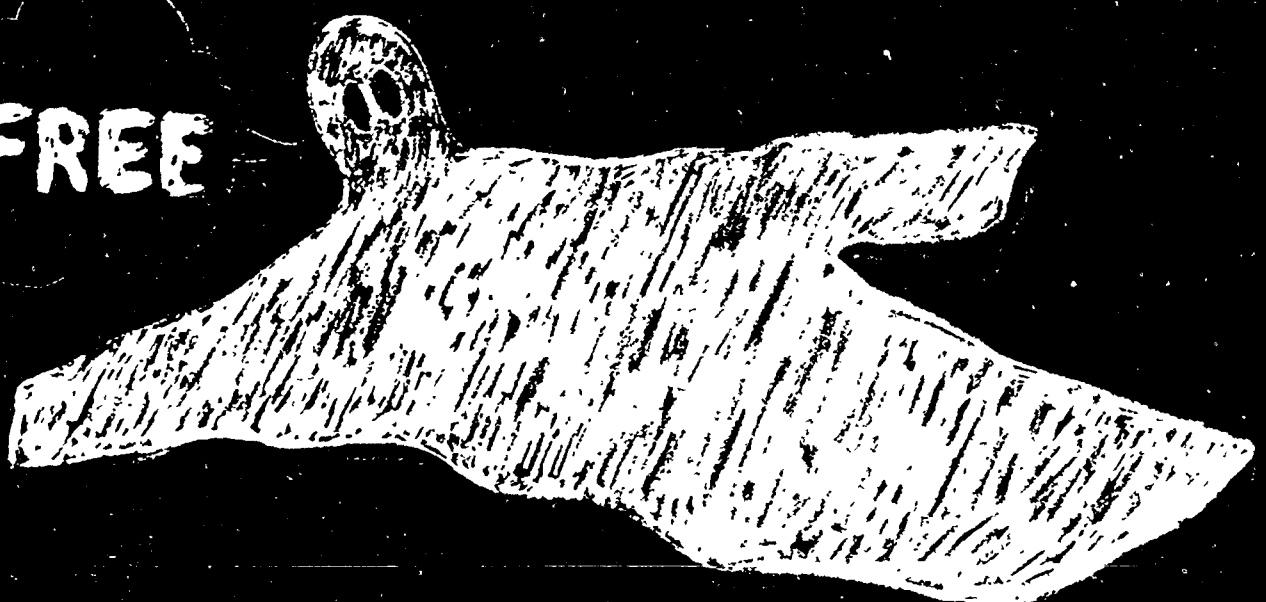

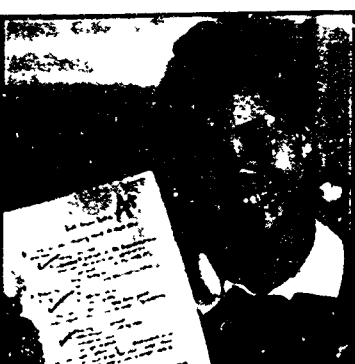

## Health Care Topics<sup>S.M.</sup>

### Recurring Sore Throat or Tonsillitis?

A sore throat is often caused by an inflammation of the tonsils located on either side of the pharynx in the throat. If this sore throat is accompanied by a high fever (105 - 106 ) with a headache, if it's painful to swallow and if the tonsils are large and red with white streaks, it might be tonsillitis.

If left untreated, tonsillitis can lead to diseases which affect the body as a whole, such as rheumatic fever or diphtheria.

Chronic tonsillitis can be recognized by frequent colds, sore throats, low energy, bad breath, low grade fever and, in children, lack of weight gain as they grow.

#### What About Tonsillectomies?

If the condition persists, a tonsillectomy might be recommended. Tonsillectomies are performed under general anesthesia. Tonsils are removed through the mouth and the area is cauterized to help stop bleeding. Overnight care is usually needed at a medical facility.

#### After The Operation

After you are discharged, expect some ear and throat discomfort. Drink plenty of liquids. Eat soft food. Anything cold (like ice cream) is soothing. Your physician may give additional instructions and arrange a follow-up visit to make sure you're healing properly.

If you experience bright red bleeding that lasts more than a few minutes, persistent pain that does not respond to prescribed medication, or a fever above 101, contact your physician immediately. Full recovery may take up to two weeks.

Downtown Development Authority members assigned to monitor the plan's progress reported Tuesday that most employees are complying with the voluntary plan that began July 1. Under the plan, employees are asked to park in designated spaces marked by orange dots, to free up close-in parking for customers.

Spaces have since been marked for 268 cars along the downtown area bordered by Dunlap, Hutton, Cady and Wing streets.

The plan was a joint product of the DDA and Business Development and Retention Committee, an offshoot of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce. DDA and BDRC members backed away from a mandatory parking plan entailing either time limits on on-street parking or early morning parking bans on prime spaces, to avoid angering customers.

"The short answer is that it's going great," said DDA member Greg Presley. "There are some things we need to work out."

Lynda Heaton, the DDA member assigned to keep an eye on downtown's northeast quadrant, reported that business owners were happy with its success.

"I've received very positive feedback," she said. "It's really made a difference in the number of spaces that are opened up to customers."

But shows at the Michigan Association of Gift Salesmen still turn the struggle to find a parking space into a real battle, Heaton said. "It does create a hardship for customers and people who want to park close-in," she said.

In MAGS' defense, DDA member David Larsen noted that the showroom has run into its own parking problems since Main Centre was allowed to fence off much of the MAGS parking lot for its customers' use.

"It's costing MAGS more and more to have people park down by the racetrack," he said, in limousine and insurance costs.

Larsen added that the lot has become difficult to navigate now because of the wrought-iron fences and traffic islands. People often ignore the "Do Not Enter" sign posted between Cady and Center streets to prevent cars from exiting onto Center, he said, "and there are a lot of fender-benders."

Perhaps the most positive change has been in the city's northeast quadrant. "In my corner, it looks like all the orange dots are used," said DDA member Dee Richardson. "Sometimes you can't find an orange dot; they're all filled."

Richardson, who has let scofflaws know in writing when they are taking up prime parking spaces, said she rarely has had to resort to that since the designated parking plan took effect. "I put one note on one car," she said.

The city's two-hour parking zones continue to draw criticism from shoppers who spend more than two hours in town, however. "It's caused some hard feelings," Heaton said.

Larsen agreed, saying, "That really does seem to be unpopular, no matter where it is."

If compliance with the designated plan remains high, DDA members said, the city ought to consider changing the time limit on its two-hour spaces to three hours.

# Paralympics coach spreads Olympic spirit

Brian Masi knows firsthand the triumph of competing in the Paralympics. Now he wants to share his experience as a coach for the United States Paralympic team with everybody.

The Northville physical education/health teacher coached nearly 400 athletes in the 1992 Paralympic Games in Barcelona, Spain, in September. The Paralympics are the games for physically disabled athletes that follow the regular Olympic games every four years.

Over 4,000 athletes with disabilities ranging from cerebral palsy to amputations, from spinal-cord injuries to sight impairments, come to the games from 87 countries. Akin to the regular Olympics, the Paralympics pit physically challenged athletes in similar sporting competitions and surround them with all the hoopla of the Olympic spirit. They have opening and closing ceremonies and light their own torch.

Masi said it was a sight to see. "It was incredible. There were over 1.2 million spectators, and we used

all the same stadiums and venues the United States teams used."

As a coach for physically challenged athletes for the past 12 years, Masi knows the struggle these athletes face.

"The feats all the athletes overcome are just incredible," he said after narrating a slide show presentation to Moraine Elementary and Center Program students last week.

Over the course of the two weeks when the Paralympics Games were held, Masi said he saw a one-legged athlete high jump 6 feet, 8 inches to bring home the gold. There were several inspiring tales of the same caliber as Masi recounted his experience to students at Moraine and

again to school officials and audience members at Monday night's School Board meeting.

The point of his presentation was to bring home a little of the Olympic glitz and to recognize the behind-the-scenes stories of the courage and strength these athletes displayed.

At paralympics, physically disabled athletes compete in as many games as regular olympiads. What varies is the methods, the form and the aids these athletes use to help them compete. Masi highlighted those differences with slides for the board and demonstrations for the students.

At his Moraine presentation, he pulled students from the audience

and had them race in special wheelchair racing. He tied a blindfold around their heads and covered their eyes to show how blind athletes compete with the help of seeing athletes in track and field events. He showed

students wheelchair basketball, table-top tennis, and sit-down volleyball as alternatives and avenues through which Paralympians can compete.

He said he does it all because he wants to teach the kids and the

adults a little something about Paralympics and a lot about life.

"I had hoped to introduce kids to the differences between mental and physical disabilities. We are not the Special Olympics. We are the Paralympics. There's a difference."

# Seven libraries secede from regional consortium

Ticked off because of what they claim are poor service and unequal representation, seven libraries in Wayne and Oakland counties have picked up their football and gone home, so to speak.

All seven are currently members of the Wayne-Oakland Library Federation, a consortium of suburban library systems which includes the Northville Public Library.

The breakaway libraries — in Canton, Farmington, Rochester, Southfield, Birmingham, Bloomfield, and Independence — are forming their own library cooperative called Metro Net.

The seceding libraries will stay with WOLF until Metro Net goes on line, probably in October 1993. Service is not expected to be interrupted.

The 14-year-old WOLF provides all kinds of library services to all the libraries in Wayne and Oakland counties except Detroit, Highland Park, Troy and Dearborn. The

main benefit to library users is that they can check out books throughout the system, as opposed to just books in the Northville library. WOLF also does computerized tracking of books, orders books for its members and provides computer terminals to libraries.

Metro Net will theoretically be cheaper to run than WOLF and more responsive to the individual needs of member libraries, largely because representation on the Metro Net board will be based on population.

Among the raps on WOLF is that libraries serving large populations don't get any more say on the nine-member WOLF board (one vote) than little libraries serving a couple of thousand people. In a sense, the little libraries (if they band together) can control WOLF policy and often do, said Southfield library director Doug Zykowski. The 15 big libraries in WOLF's 58-library system don't like that because their state aid makes up half of WOLF's state aid. Zykowski called it "taxation without

representation."

At a meeting last Wednesday, WOLF officials offered the dissatisfied libraries an additional representative on the WOLF board and help in getting their computers interconnected.

But that's not enough, Zykowski said. "[The WOLF] offers didn't carry enough substance. Both sides agreed to start thinking about coexisting with each other. We think the dispute process should be avoided."

The participants agreed to meet again Oct. 26, but only to work out ways that WOLF and Metro Net might cooperate.

Other large libraries may ultimately join Metro Net, but just the seven mentioned above possess the computer power necessary to do so.

Metro Net will ostensibly be scaled down at least in terms of the money sucked up from member libraries.

While WOLF takes two-thirds of the member libraries' annual state aid (about \$47,000 in Southfield's case),

Metro Net would require just one-third, Zykowski said.

WOLF interim co-director Doug Whitaker said that WOLF's \$1.5 million in state aid (funneled through the member libraries) would fall to \$1.2 million if the dissatisfied libraries leave.

That loss of money, Whitaker said, would translate to a loss of services for libraries remaining in WOLF. Should that occur, big libraries, such as those in Livonia and Redford, may leave WOLF for Metro Net, which has the welcome mat out for any other area library that wants to join it.

Zykowski also criticized WOLF for not having borrowing agreements with library cooperatives in Detroit and Macomb County. Metro Net, he said, would not only try to get those borrowing agreements, but provide faster and more reliable service than WOLF. "We experience a great deal of down time (with the WOLF system), and when the system is up, it's very, very slow," he said.

## Gifted students focus of session

A prevalent myth about gifted children is that being bright enough, they can simply "make it on their own." Gifted children have clear characteristics and resulting social and emotional needs which often result in problems if they aren't understood, experts say.

This session describes frequently occurring social and emotional needs along with emotional and interpersonal patterns and difficulties. The workshop's information provides a foundation to better understand gifted children who underachieve, challenge traditions, or who show patterns of perfectionism or depression.

James T. Webb, Ph.D., the featured speaker, is the director and developer of SENG (Supporting the Emotional Needs of the Gifted) and a professor and assistant dean for special programs at the School of Professional Psychology at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio.

Webb, the senior author of the award-winning book *Guiding the Gifted Child: A Practical Source for Parents and Teachers*, will share his insights and knowledge on Saturday, Oct. 31, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Northville High School.

# Township forges ahead to select sewer head

Northville Township plans to forge ahead with an interview process for a new Water and Sewer Department superintendent, despite the protests of some incoming board members.

Outgoing Supervisor Betty Lennox reaffirmed the township's plans at last Thursday's board meeting.

"The Water and Sewer Commission will interview . . . candidates," she said. "I think that probably (the commission) will make a selection of the best qualified candidate and make a recommendation to the board."

"I think we should proceed with the interview process," Lennox said.

Former Water and Sewer Superintendent Walter Holm died earlier this year after being placed on medical leave 16 months ago. Questions have arisen about the township's intentions because of the timing of the superintendent search.

Incoming board members like Supervisor-elect Karen Baja and Clerk-elect Sue Hillebrand have spoken out against the interview plan. They are concerned that the lame-duck board will not only allow interviews, but make a last-minute selection of a new department head to serve

under the new administration.

That choice should be left to the new board, Baja and Hillebrand said.

Last week, township Manager Richard Henningsen said the township had received resumes from 13 people interested in the job, which could pay \$32,000-\$42,000 annually. Among those applying is William Maguire, a current member of the Water and Sewer Commission.

Henningsen, ordered last week by Lennox to get hopping on the superintendent search, said he will serve on an interview committee with Water and Sewer Commission members Austin Marshall and John Morley.

"We're going to meet on (Oct.) 19th, and review the can-

didates as we have them," Henningsen said. "If we find some we like, we'll have them in for an interview."

Oct. 24 has been set aside as a possible interview date, Henningsen said.

The interview committee will pass on its recommendation to the Water and Sewer Commission for its approval, Henningsen said. The commission's next scheduled meeting — after the Oct. 24 interview date — is Nov. 18.

Barring a special Water and Sewer Commission meeting, it probably would be difficult for the current township board to tap a new superintendent. The new board members take office Nov. 20.

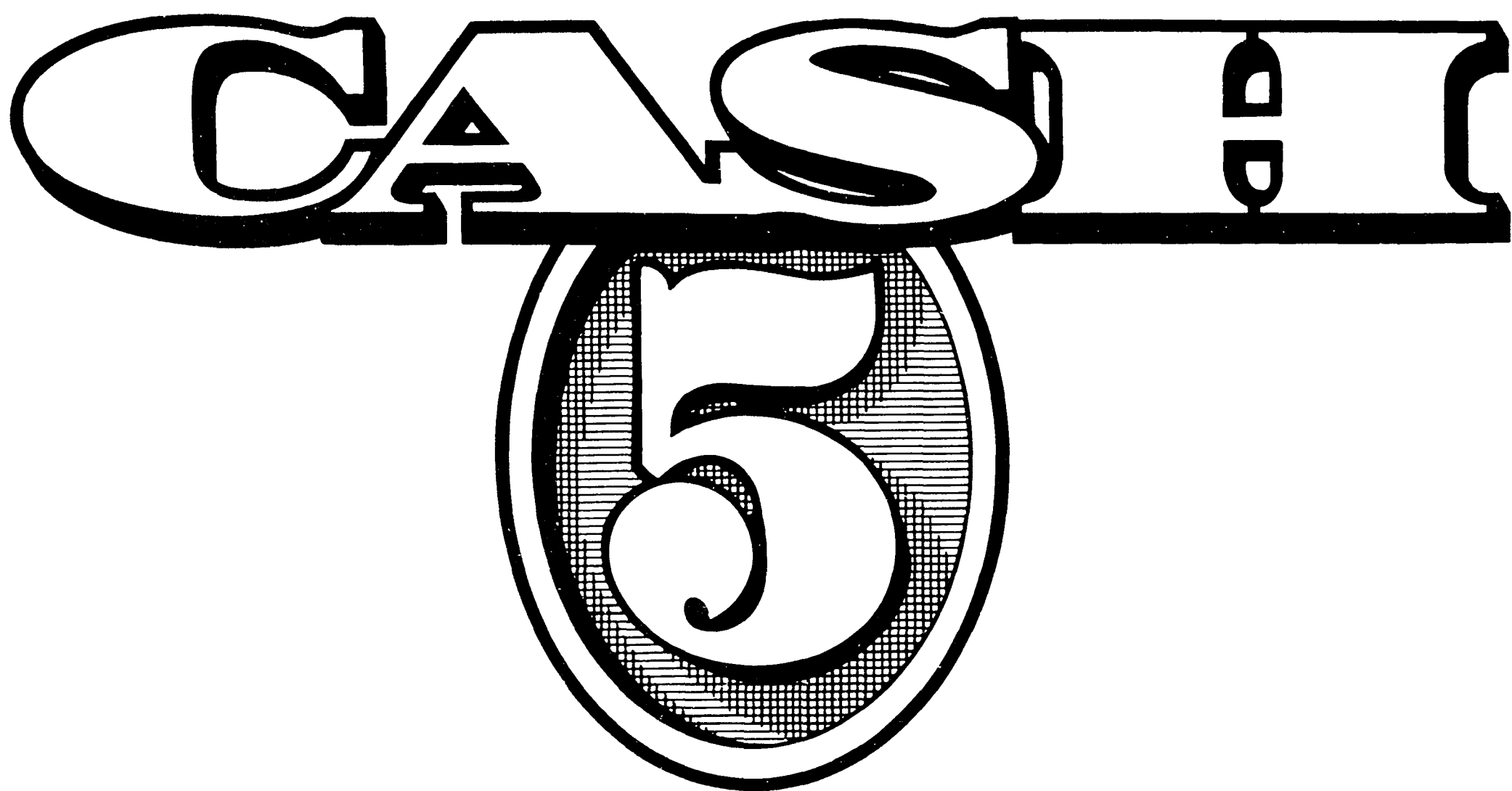

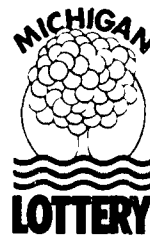

# School budget cuts through fiscal confusion

School officials promised and delivered a user-friendly budget at Monday night's School Board meeting.

The 1992-93 revised school budget was passed by the board 6-0 after a presentation by Business Manager John Street. Board President Carol Rahimi was absent.

Board members commended Street for a job well done

Prior to this presentation, some in the community had criticized the board and the administration for not being forthright with district financial information. But those hostile voices were either silenced or absent in the board room Monday. The audience, which seemed preoccupied with a separate agenda item, had relatively few comments to make about the budget despite complaints

voiced at a recent Advocates for Quality Education meeting.

Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski offered his support for the work Street had done and once again reiterated his position that he was only aware of two requests made through his office for budget information from residents.

In an effort to downplay recent complaints, district officials are offering residents an opportunity to meet with

them and discuss the budget one-on-one.

Street and Rezmierski will be available to answer any questions residents may have about the budget after reviewing it on Oct. 26. For an hour before the regular board meeting at the high school Forum, both school officials will be on hand to field questions. Until then, administrators and school board members said they are willing to answer any specific questions people have about the budget.

# Natural Law candidate enters 11th District race

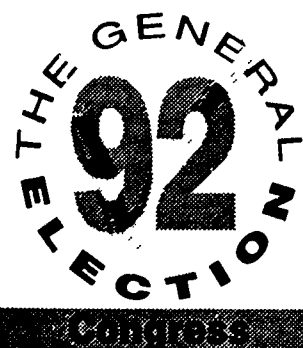

Who is Henry Ogden Clark? And why does the Traverse City resident want to represent part of Northville in Congress?

Clark, a member of the six-month-old Natural Law Party, is the fourth candidate to jump in the fray currently dominated by the 11th District's Republican candidate Joseph Knollenberg and Democrat Walter Briggs.

He joins Libertarian hopeful Brian Wright in an attempt to make a dent in the local two-party system.

Clark says he chose the 11th District, which extends from Southfield and Bloomfield Hills to Lyon and Highland townships — and includes Northville north of Baseline Road — because his twin brother, Lyman, was already running for U.S. rep-



representative on the Natural Law ticket in their hometown's congressional district.

"They asked me to run here because it was a last-minute application," Clark said Tuesday, adding he'll move to the district if he wins in

the election.

The Natural Law Party was founded by scientists and business leaders "to bring the light of science into politics," Clark, a University of Michigan-educated architect, explained.

"What we are referring to are the laws of nature that govern everything in the universe. . . . The idea is to get back to some of the original principles the government was founded on. We're trying to evoke the image of the founding fathers," he said.

The party's printed platform calls for education to spread the understanding of the fundamental laws of nature, as revealed by modern science and the ancient Vedic science of Maharishi Mahesh Yogi. Stress-reducing techniques such as transcendental meditation are recommended to bring life back in harmony with the natural law.

If successful at the polls, the party platform vows a group of 7,000 experts will be established in Washington to revive the natural law in the national consciousness. In addition, a non-partisan council of scientific experts will be set up to recommend legislation.

Clark, 47, was a founder of the Natural Law Party, which organized on April 20 in Fairfield, Iowa. The party's presidential candidate, Harvard-educated quantum physicist Dr. John Hagelin, is on the ballot in 30 states.

The party fulfilled Michigan's ballot access requirements on July 16 when its leaders delivered over 43,000 signatures to the Michigan Bureau of Elections. Their state headquarters is in Flint.

Hagelin contends that one of his best qualifications for political office is that he is not a career politician.

Clark echoes this, saying that America needs to return to a government ruled not by career diplomats and politicians but by part-timers who take time out from their daily careers.

"All the candidates say they'll cut taxes. You can't cut taxes unless you cut spending. It would be a sad thing to cut taxes if you don't have any solutions," Clark said.

Natural Law Party leaders say they can save the federal government \$700 billion annually, while breaking the partisan deadlock in government.

One way of doing this, Clark explained, is to use scientific solutions to crime, health care, the decline in education, pollution and the economic recession which exist "but have been ignored or under-funded by government for purely political reasons — causing untold pain and

suffering and costing taxpayers hundreds of billions of dollars every year."

For example, he says health care should concentrate on keeping people well, thereby cutting medical costs. The party also suggests that introducing inner development practices such as meditation into the prison system will reduce the number of repeat offenders.

Clark says that he hasn't raised much money yet — but he's holding a \$1,000-a-plate dinner this week.

"We're having a lot of success. We're the largest growing party in the U.S. Our biggest problem is to get the media to tell the people out there there is a choice besides the Republicans," he added.

A published author, Clark is an associate professor of the Maharishi International University.

## Briggs up for debate

What do Walter Briggs and Bill Clinton have in common, besides the fact that they're Democrats angling for a new job in Washington, D.C.?

Both have had some difficulty pinning down their opponents to a debate. While Clinton and company corralled George Bush — and Ross Perot — this week, Briggs, a congressional candidate for the 11th district which includes Novi, says he's having no luck roping his Republican opponent, Joseph Knollenberg.

"I think it's important that we get an opportunity to debate the issues. A real debate, not just appearances. I think, basically, that that's what our democracy is all about," Briggs said Tuesday.

"Frankly, I think Mr. Knollenberg is more of the same old 'politics as usual.'"

Briggs challenged Knollenberg to a public debate "any time, any date, anywhere" in a Sept. 28 letter and says that he stands ready to clear his schedule.

Briggs' campaign manager, Marsha McVicker, contends that Knollenberg has turned down 11 joint appearances, including stints with the American Association of Retired People; the Oakland County Business Consortia and Jewish Business Network; Adot Shalom Temple; the League of Women Voters in Birmingham; and the Farmington Hills Homeowners debate.

The Republican candidate sends stand-ins to some events.

Briggs says the only time Knollenberg accepted an invitation to an open forum was on Yom Kippur. The Democratic candidate said he was forced to decline that occasion, because his wife, as well as many of his constituents, are Jewish.

The charge that Knollenberg's dodging a debate is old news, his campaign manager, Carol Morlan, says.

"We've already had several joint appearances. Sometimes we sent surrogates. We're not able to attend each and every event. I'm sure they can't. He's (Briggs) late for a lot of them," Morlan said.

"We'll do three or four joint appearances. It's not like we're hiding from him."

She said a WLIV cable television show the candidates taped in a Livonia studio was comparable to a debate because each candidate could respond to the other's comments.

"This was not that much different from a debate," Morlan added.

But that's nowhere near to the give-and-take of a live debate before an audience, according to Briggs.

"In a real debate, I get to answer the questions. Joe gets to answer the questions, and we get to rebut each other's answers. It's easy to put out something that's vague and doesn't really answer the questions and only by a challenge and a rebuttal will we get the truth out," he said.

Briggs says he's also prepared to debate his remaining two opponents, Libertarian Brian Wright and Natural Law Party candidate Henry Clark — both of whom entered the race in July — but that the two have not been invited to all of the local candidates' nights.

On the national level, the Democratic Party eyes the 11th District as a can-win seat, McVicker says, and has offered its assistance.

With redistricting, the 11th District encompasses over half of the old 18th District but loses the GOP strongholds of Troy and Rochester Hills and gains the Democratic-leaning Southfield and Redford. The district includes Northville north of Eight Mile Road.

Knollenberg was campaign manager for former U.S. Rep. William Broomfield, who represented the 18th District for 36 years until he retired this year. Broomfield is the honorary campaign manager for Knollenberg, who owns an Allstate Insurance Agency in Troy.

Briggs, a CPA, is an audit supervisor for Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan. He has pledged, if elected, not to seek re-election to Congress in 1996 if the \$333 billion federal deficit is not cut in half.

Both candidates say they will run a clean-cut campaign.

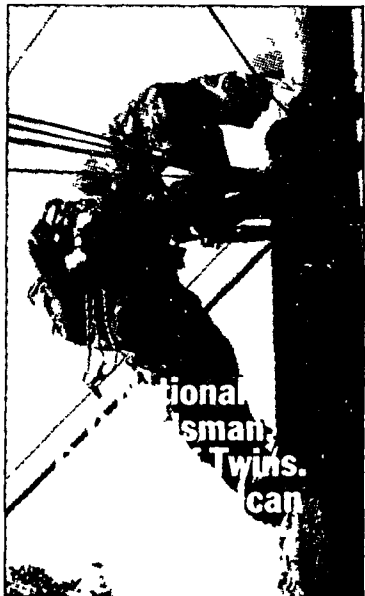
## Pizzeria gives to class of 1995

# Parents urge city to put DDA expansion on hold

Northville residents are telling city officials there's just no room in the school district's budget for Mainstreet '92. Not this year anyway.

Few residents were shy in expressing their views about the city's downtown development expansion plan and the impact it would have on the schools at Monday's School Board meeting.

While most thought the plan had good intentions, few if any believed the district should shoulder the burden of the project and suffer the loss of tax revenues. While the funds for the project would not come directly out of the schools' budget, new tax dollars from rising assessments downtown would be diverted from the district to the

Downtown Development Authority for the purpose of improving the downtown area. The city and the DDA have proposed an ambitious plan that would expand the current downtown district, created in 1978, to include the Ford Valve Plant property and Cady Street area.

The big-ticket item in the plan is the construction of the Cady Street parking deck. City officials believe the deck would trigger additional commercial growth that would add to Northville's tax base.

While parents who attended the meeting said it sounds like a good plan, they said it's just the wrong time to be taking any more tax dollars away from the schools. State recapturing acts, the defeat of the millage increase earlier this year, and staggering budget cuts districtwide have parents up in arms about the quality and the reputation of the district. They feel the DDA's plan comes on

the heels of a trio of legislative blows that have dealt the schools a bad hand and could only add insult to injury.

Irene Fleming was the most vocal parent, saying she opposes the plan at this point because of the dire straits in which the district finds itself.

"It's pretty clear to me that the district is going to lose out on a lot of money," Fleming said. "And it's money the schools can't afford to lose — especially now."

Fleming urged city officials who were at the meeting to reconsider their plan. She also stressed the importance of maintaining the quality of the school district, which she believes is one means of attracting people to Northville and the surrounding areas that are served by the district.

"I truly feel we have to look at this as a community-wide issue. We also all need to realize that the school district is a critical factor in creating a place where people

want to come," she said.

"I moved for the schools and left a thriving downtown for that reason. At present the schools are in a precarious position. . . Homes are for sale and where I live, people are looking at homes and saying, 'We don't want to live here in the Northville district because we hear the schools are going down.'"

"My friends and neighbors say, 'Oh, I'm sorry to hear about Northville Public Schools.' That's not a healthy trend."

Fleming's thoughts were echoed by several other parents in the room who believe the quality of education here in Northville could be at risk for the sake of the continued rejuvenation of the downtown district and the feasibility of the parking structure earmarked in the DDA's plan.

ment Authority Tuesday morning.

"If there's anyone that you know that might be interested, let us know," Johnson said. "Otherwise, we're going to start knocking on doors."

The nine-member citizens committee will be appointed by the city council from people living within the downtown development district bounded by Wing, Griswold, and

Cady, and properties on either side of Dunlap and Main. The committee is required because there are now more than 100 people residing within the district.

The citizens committee will act as an advisory body to the DDA and city council in their adoption of the financing plan.

The requirement will push back a scheduled Nov. 2 public hearing on the tax increment financing plan by more than two months, since the citi-

zens committee must be formed at least 90 days prior to the hearing. Since the plan cannot be approved until January 1993 at the earliest, construction on a new deck may not begin until 1994.

A Nov. 2 public hearing on expanding the district is still planned. The expansion will include the Ford Plant and Main Street properties across from it, as well as Cady Street properties between Center and Griswold.

The newly discovered requirement is the latest twist in Mainstreet '92's

circuitous progress. City leaders have twice briefed Northville's School Board on its financing plans, since the schools and other taxing units will lose out on most of the property tax growth from any increase in property values over the 20-year life of the bonds that will fund the deck (see related story).

Board members will not decide until Nov. 10 whether to support the DDA plan, but several have questioned its timing and its potential impact on the schools.

The plan was stalled at the DDA for two months while DDA member Glenn Long complained that it could lead to the loss of parking spaces alongside his family's business, Long Plumbing and Fancy Bath Boutique. It was finally passed despite his opposition, after a subcommittee reviewed his concerns.

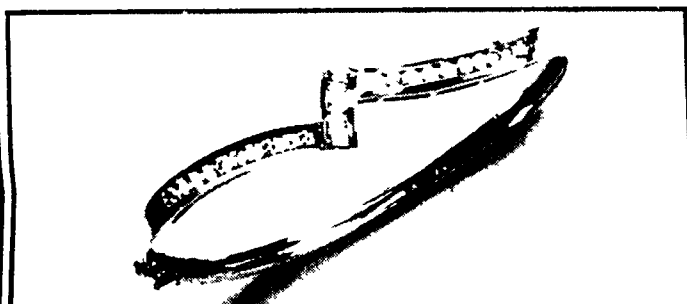
City officials had hoped to pass the complete plan this year, to take advantage of favorable interest rates and construction costs.

But the delay does give the city

council time to consider putting the financing plan before city voters. An affirmative vote by city residents to put their "full faith and credit" behind the plan could shave half a percentage point off the interest rate on its bonds, Johnson said, and save the city \$300,000 in interest payments over the life of the financing plan.

Word hesitated to estimate when the city might seek a vote on the plan. "If you get into the speculation game, it seems like there's one curve after another," he said.

### Northville cooperation takes precedence

Let's begin with this statement: We strongly support shared-services concepts and ventures that can benefit tax-weary Northville residents.

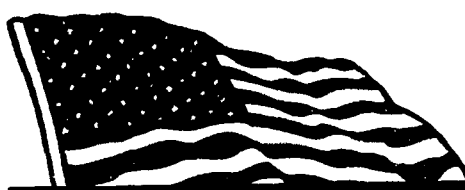
And we think any move to consolidate all or part of the community's two police departments is an idea that's long overdue. But it's tough to know how to react to word that Northville Township appears just as serious about pursuing shared services with Plymouth Township as it does with the City of Northville.

On the one hand, it's hard to argue with anyone seeking creative solutions to the organizational and budgetary confusion which burdens the Northville community.

The more pressing question, though, is why a summit meeting with Plymouth Township? Why right now? It's known that Plymouth Township also is eyeing more bang for its buck through shared services, but we think the overriding concern should be opening a solid line of communication between — and we hate to put it this way — the two Northvilles. Township Chief Chip Snider is concerned because he says his police and fire dispatching radio is on its last legs. He wants more than \$155,000 to replace the system, but isn't likely to get the new radio because the township is strapped for cash.

If the radio really is near death, doesn't it make this the ideal time to forge an agreement with the City of Northville? The city has a compatible radio and Snider says dispatching consolidation could occur within 30 days, if necessary.

That's a telling statement. If consoli-

dation could happen in 30 days under an emergency situation, why has it taken years for local officials to move beyond the chatting stage?

The answer, quite simply, is that township and city politicians and police officials have had little incentive to give up portions of their respective mini-empires. Without a financial gun to the head, they could afford to quibble about side issues and not address the solid reasons to support consolidation.

Well, the gun's firmly planted now, and probably cocked and ready to go off. Everyone says they're ready and willing to work toward joint dispatching, and that's a good thing.

The logical step, though, is certainly to combine Northville township and city before looking elsewhere. The two governments already tie themselves together with a shared-service contract; it would almost certainly be easier to add one service to an existing arrangement than to start entirely new talks with a different community.

Beyond ease, though, joint dispatching for Northville just makes sense. Put the egos aside the way and get it done.

### Speaking the M word

Wow... He actually said it, right out loud, in a public meeting with a newspaper reporter in the room.

The mayor said the M word. Merger.

That's merger in the sense of Northville city and township. Merger in the sense of one local government, not two, serving the Northville community. Merger in the sense of unity, cooperation, and eliminating needless duplication.

Actually, it was City Council Member Jerry Mittman who said it first, although he was just asking a question about whether the issue came up during the township's Northville 2000 meetings. Mayor Chris Johnson then made this statement: "We haven't talked about a merger for a long time, but we recognize the financial situation that we're all in, and maybe a combination of all our resources, including the dreaded M word,

should be discussed."

Maybe, indeed. If you've been paying attention to this space, you already know we like the idea. The paper has a long, proud history of supporting township/city consolidation, and lately you may have noticed we've been doing an awful lot of prodding in that direction again.

We don't want to get into all the pros and cons here; we know the concept failed twice before, and we understand why. But with so many new residents, with budgetary pressures so difficult and mounting all the time, it only makes sense to look for permanent solutions. A merger may well be one.

The specifics, as always, would be mind-bogglingly complex, and they could doom the idea. At the very least, though, the M word merits some serious new discussion. And soon.

### Seeking law or deep pockets?



One can understand why many insurance companies give up and leave Michigan. Look at what our state Supreme Court majority did in a recent no-fault benefits case.

The court last month split 4-3 against Meridian Mutual in an auto insurance benefits decision. It leaves one wondering whether the majority was reading law or looking for a set of "deep pockets" to provide a payoff.

Renee Priesman's car was insured with Meridian. While she slept one night in 1986, her son, Corey Warfield, then 14, took her car joyriding with pals. Corey didn't have permission and was unlicensed.

There was a bad accident, a friend was killed, and Corey was badly injured.

Meridian's action is a bit confusing. It paid off on the friend's death and covered Corey's hospital billings for six months, then said it was cutting them off because Corey had taken the car without permission.

Mom sued Meridian in Ingham Circuit Court and lost. But the Court of Appeals reversed, saying Corey was covered under his mother's policy because he was living in her household and had never been convicted of an unlawful act. Meridian appealed.

On business issues, the Supreme Court's liberal wing consists of Chief Justice Michael Cavanagh, Justices Charles Levin, Conrad Mallett Jr. and Patricia Boyle. Levin wrote the opinion in favor of the mother.

Looking at the legislative history, Levin said the purpose was "to except from no-fault coverage thieves while driving stolen vehicles... and not necessarily to except joyriders from coverage." In one horribly written, 82-word sentence with three negatives, Levin seems to say Michigan's law does not exclude "teenagers who 'joyride' in their parents' automobiles..."

Dissenting were Justices Robert Griffin, James Brickley and Dorothy Comstock Riley, who come from the other side of the political spectrum.

Griffin pointed to "clear and unambiguous" language in the no-fault law: A person may not collect if "he or she had taken (the vehicle) unlawfully, unless the person reasonably believed that he or she was entitled to take and use the vehicle."

Griffin noted the trial judge found Corey's use of the car unlawful under the joyriding law — hence he shouldn't collect.

"Nor could he have had a reasonable belief that he was entitled to take and use his mother's car, since he was not licensed and had never been allowed to use the car," Griffin wrote.

Chalk up a win for the "deep pockets" syndrome and a loss for plain, unlearned English.

By the way, ballot Proposal D would end both Meridian's and the court's confusion by saying health insurance benefits should be paid before auto insurance is tapped.

### PACs run out-of-touch Congress



Michigan's congressional delegation returned home last week after the 104th Congress came to its grumpy, increasingly partisan and largely inconclusive end.

Sunday's New York Times called it "the Gridlock Congress" and blamed its lackluster achievements on divided government, partisan wrangling between a Republican president and a Democratic House and Senate. The president vetoed legislation 36 times; he was overturned only once.

The anger felt by most Michigan folks found focus in two public embarrassments. The House cashed members' checks, regardless of whether there was money in the bank to cover them. And the Senate, populated by a bunch of old white males, was unable to admit that women are often harassed in the workplace.

For most people here in Michigan — out of work, scared about job security, or just worried that the country is headed in the wrong direction — the overwhelming sense is that Congress is out of touch with the daily concerns of ordinary people.

This sense was heightened by last weekend's reports in The Detroit News of the overwhelming amount of political action committee (PAC) money going to congressional incumbents.

Now running at a record pace, PAC contributions to the 11 Michigan congressmen running for re-election totalled \$2.8 million as of the July contribution reports. The News estimates that around \$4 million will be donated before the election, where "much of the money comes from out-of-state interest groups with business pending before committees on which the congressmen sit."

Challengers are essentially shut out.

U.S. Rep. Bill Ford, D-Ypsilanti, the powerful chair of the House Education and Labor Committee, reported \$282,950 in PAC money out of \$365,941 in total contributions as of July. His opponent, state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, had raised just \$1,650 from PACs, out of a total \$37,650.

Running as an incumbent state senator two years ago, however, Geake collected \$67,000 from PACs. That's conclusive evidence of what really interests PACs. Who cares about principle when there's serious access to incumbent legislators to be bought?

The pattern is about the same for other Michigan members. U.S. Rep. Sander Levin, D-Southfield, picked up just under half of his total of \$834,091 from PACs. U.S. Rep. Bob Carr, D-East Lansing, took a little more than half of his total from PACs.

I believe that one reason President George Bush is trailing so badly in the polls is that he has been inside "the presidential bubble" so long that he had no idea how many people were in so much economic trouble. "Too many limousines for too many years" was how Molly Ivins, a Texas columnist, put it.

In Washington, congressmen are surrounded by staff, by lobbyists, by special interest pleaders, by sycophants. PACs fund their re-election campaigns based not on philosophical stands but on the utility of incumbency.

As I have argued before, as long as members consider the quest for office as acts of their professional career rather than an interlude of public service, the question continues to arise: Are our representatives in Congress more interested in special interest PAC money than in the overriding concerns of folks back home?

# Holiday shop teaches poor lesson

To the editor:

For the past two years, since I've had children attending Silver Springs Elementary School, I've become increasingly uncomfortable with its annual "Holiday Shop." Even though the school year has just begun and Christmas seems distant, the need to plan ahead has prompted me to bring the issue up for early discussion. Holiday Shop has been scheduled for discussion and debate at the next Silver Springs PTA meeting at 9:15 a.m. Oct. 20. A vote will be taken at that time to determine whether Holiday Shop should continue to be held during school hours, as it will be this year and has in the past. My purpose in writing this letter is to make those concerned aware of these plans so that they might contribute by attending the meeting or writing letters to the school.

Holiday Shop was devised to give elementary school children the opportunity to buy inexpensive gifts for members of their immediate family. Those items not crafted by parent or grandparent volunteers are carefully selected by a PTA committee chairperson. Before the event takes place, a list of the items for sale goes home with each child to discuss with their parents. The children bring their money in an envelope with the number of family members and desired items indicated. One class at a time visits the Holiday Shop, helped through the process by a group of volunteer parents.

Those children who do not have their envelope with them, for whatever reason, must accompany the others, but are directed to remain against the wall while their classmates shop. Although these children are given a small gift to help them feel included, I have personally witnessed how painful this experience can be for them. One kindergarten was inconsolable last year when he was the only one from his class excluded because, for whatever reason, he showed up without his envelope and his money. The gift given to the non-participant is a charity that would be unnecessary if the need were not created in the first place.

One argument in favor of holding the Holiday Shop during regular school hours is that it allows for greater participation since many parents would either forget to, or simply not bother to, attend after hours. Other perceived benefits are that children can shop independently of their parents and this teaches them responsible consumerism, and, while not designed as a fund-raising event, it does generate some revenue.

On the other side, many parents feel pressured into allowing their children to participate because the Holiday Shop is held during class time. This event affords the family no non-penalized option. Some parents don't want their children to feel left out, but they are uncomfortable with the other lessons this activity teaches.

It is my view that Holiday Shop inappropriately emphasizes our economic disparity. It encourages our kids to define each other in economic terms rather than in terms of their creativity, generosity and natural capabilities. The exercise does not teach them to give of themselves, and it reinforces the idea that those who cannot afford to buy have less to offer.

Holiday Shop could still be staged exclusively for the children if it were held after hours, perhaps in conjunction with another optional event like an ice cream social. Having it after hours would also open it up to participation by working parents who cannot participate during working hours. The event would be simplified and shortened, as it would eliminate the need to have each class come at separate times. But most importantly, it would not penalize the children of parents who cannot or choose not to participate.

Finally, I would prefer that we parents donate our time, energy and knowledge to programs more compatible with teaching children how to feel good about themselves. We could do this by helping them learn how to make simple gifts — their own creations of which both they and we can be proud. We need to signal to our children that we cherish their personal creative efforts more than their purchases.

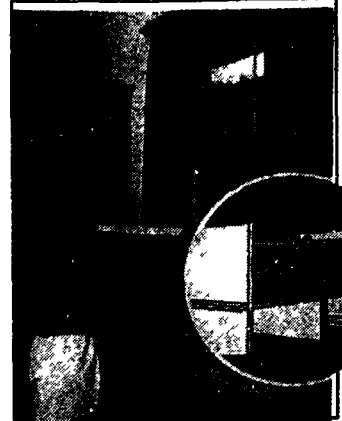
Editor's note: This is a copy of a letter sent to Mark's Small Engine, 16959 Northville Road.

# Encourage children to make friends



As parents, there are times we have to watch our children go through things that make us sad. One of the things that hurts us as parents is watching our children come home from school each day and not going out to play because they do not have any friends.

Parents can help their children make friends by encouraging them to follow these few helpful hints:

- Smile — Smile at everybody with whom they come in contact. Be sure when they say hello to someone they smile when they say it. Even if they don't feel like smiling, do it anyway.
- Be interested in others — It is important to be interested in others, not just yourself. Being interested in others will create more friend-

ships for your children than trying to make others interested in them. Listen carefully when someone talks, and don't interrupt them.

- Help others — Suggest they offer a sincere hand when they can see it is both needed and wanted.

- Encourage them to look their best — If they let themselves go, they won't respect themselves and no one else will either.

■ If your lost love is going on a job interview, hire a stripper to show up in the middle of the big event and sing "Happy Birthday" while getting down to the business.

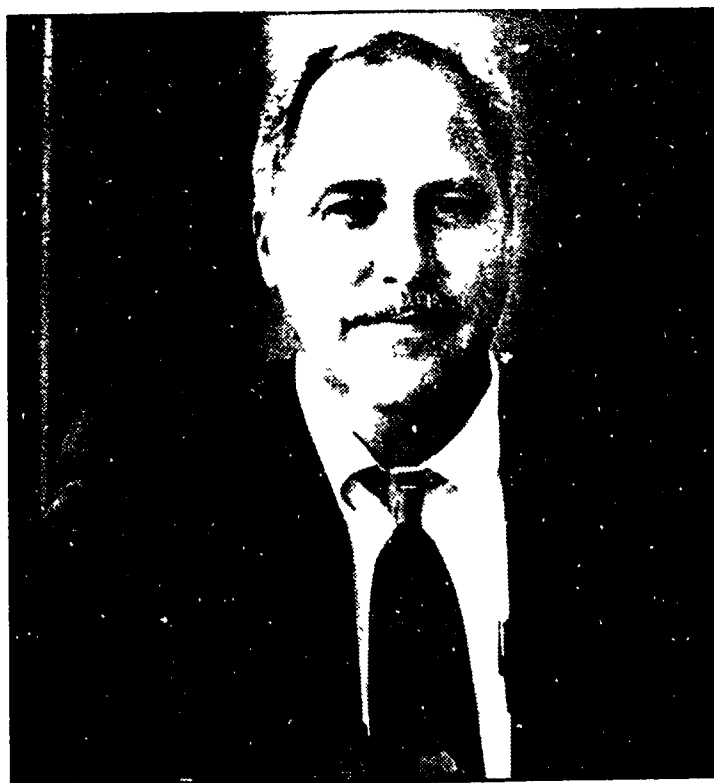

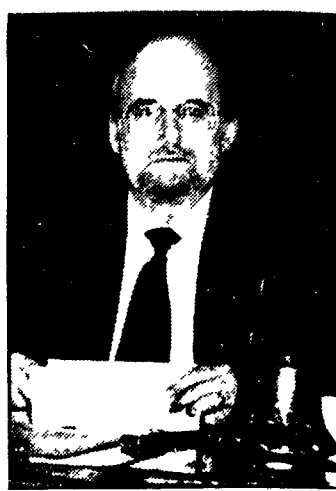

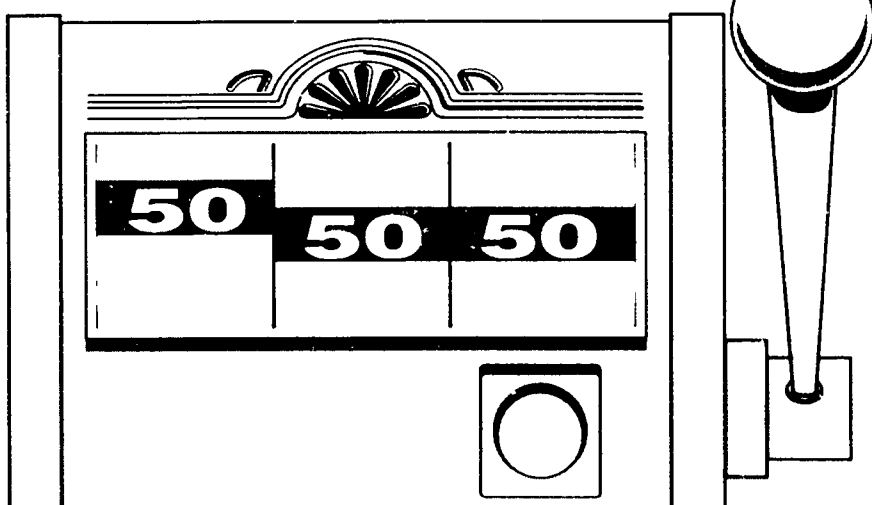

# Adams pushes students to explore

Newscaster Catherine Adams brought more back from her trip to Egypt than just souvenirs and videotape. She brought home a glimpse into Egyptian culture that she hopes will illustrate the similarities between life here and lifestyles there.

"There are many things that are the same," she said during a recent visit to Meads Mill Middle School. "Their boys go to school just like you do, and they have the same kinds of things there that we have here. They have video games there, too; they aren't as sophisticated as ours, but they have them."

"What's important is to teach kids that there's life beyond Novi and Northville and that all the world is their neighborhood," Adams said.

The Channel 4 newscaster was in Northville to share video footage and a firsthand account of the two-week trip she and her son took to Egypt this summer. While there, she and her sixth-grader, Dean, shot footage of the ancient pyramids and the Sphinx, of Cairo and its zoo, and of Egyptian culture and lifestyles.

What she brought back was a kaleidoscope of Egyptian culture and custom, and a vivid look at the civilization that's unmatched by any textbook.

Adams said she is using her experience to broaden students' horizons and to encourage them to see the world around them. As part of her presentation and to bring all the flavor and flair of the experience home, she shares unedited video footage of her and her son riding camels, touring Egyptian museums and landmarks, and at home with the Egyptian family they stayed with.

Using trinkets of her travels and volunteers from her sixth-grade audience, Adams demonstrated Egyptian head and body wear and allowed students to sample precious Egyptian oils that are used as bases for some of the world's most popular fragrances.

Video footage of her visit to King Tut's tomb, through the winding halls of the pyramids, and the shopping centers known there as bazaars, provided students with a thorough look at the many facets of Egyptian lifestyles.

"The pyramids are an awesome sight to see," she told students. "There are two million stones in each pyramid, and they are about 480 feet tall. It's a very special sight to see."

Beyond the obvious landmarks, Adams talked of customs and rituals. She told students about the Egyptian ways of life, their beliefs and of their gracious hospitality.

"The Egyptian people were very lovely and loyal," Adams said. "They are very respectful and honorable, and they pride themselves on that above anything else."

The power of prayer was evident, Adams said. People there pray several times throughout the day. They kneel down in prayer just about anywhere, she said. And they meditate.

"Prayer is very important to them and God is very important to them," she said. "People meditate there because they think the pyramids have special powers."

Adams said she intended on sharing her trip with schools around the area in an attempt to gain an awareness of the cross cultures. Both she and her son are giving concurrent presentations about their trip.

Society members say the books are excellent resources for tracking down family trees and tracing genealogies.

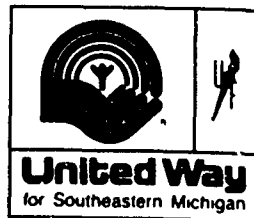

## Marquis Theater presents 'Arsenic'

Over the past 50 years, *Arsenic and Old Lace* has earned a place in American theater history as an old, moldy, done-to-death classic.

It's hardly sexy, this 1941 stage comedy, yet it's much-revived by schools and amateur theaters, to say nothing of a return to Broadway four years ago starring Jean Stapleton and Marion Ross (the national tour visited the Fisher Theater in Detroit.)

But its status as a familiar chestnut does not discount the craft or intrigue of the show.

*Arsenic and Old Lace* continues through Sunday at the Marquis Theatre in Northville.

Everything about Joseph Otto Kesselring's play seems unlikely, including its long run during World War II and its lurid subject matter.

Beginning in January 1941 and continuing for several years, the story of spinster sisters Abby and Martha Brewster kept theatergoers howling on Broadway, where it ran for 1,444 performances.

The show was not your usual wartime diversion: The dear Brewster sisters invite elderly gentlemen into their parlor and kill them off with arsenic-spiked elderberry wine.

Their nutty brother, Teddy, who thinks he's Teddy Roosevelt, gladly buries the bodies in the cellar because he thinks he's digging up the Panama Canal.

Enter drama-critic nephew Mortimer, who is called to learn the truth. Later comes another nephew, Jonathan (originally played by Boris Karloff), a murderer who hopes to stash a victim of his own in the basement.

Reputedly, the play began as the

thriller called *Bodies in Our Cellar*, but producers Howard Lindsay and Russel Crouse encouraged Kesselring to shape it into a comedy.

"I've heard rumor, too," says Joseph French, who directed the Marquis Theatre production. "I find nothing to support it. I think it was just a publicity story somebody made up for the original production."

Kesselring, a teacher and actor, never had another hit, but he saw his

play realized as a successful film directed by Frank Capra and starring Cary Grant as Mortimer. Kesselring died in 1967.

French, artistic director of the Henry Ford Museum Theatre in Dearborn for the past 27 years, says *Arsenic and Old Lace* is so popular because it's so solidly written — and so unique in its mix of homicide and humor.

Perhaps partly because the show

has become staged so often, some directors have superimposed a casting concept to keep revivals from feeling stagnant.

Several seasons back at the Grand Theatre in London, Ontario, two men were cast in the roles of Abby and Martha, a take that suggested this kind of deviant behavior — serial killing — is linked closely with the masculine personality. At the very least, the idea made for a funny drag show.



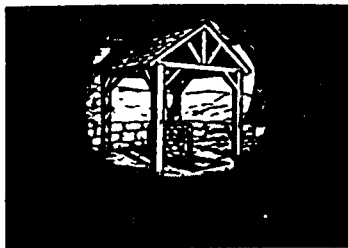

**Q: Where can we learn more about the native American Indian settlements in New York?**

**A:** A new permanent exhibit at the New York State Museum has a sophisticated re-creation of a 17th-century Iroquois village.

## 'Study vacations' gaining favor

### Educational travel tours offer wide variety of experiences

For vacation, not everybody goes to the beach to bask in the sun, read glossy best sellers and sip pina colodas.

Some folks want to explore the archaeological sites of the American Southwest, participate in a photography seminar in Paris, watch humpback whales off the coast of the Dominican Republic or muse over Russian art treasures.

It's all part of a growing phenomenon—educational travel or the study vacation.

"These are people who've done all that run-of-the-mill stuff," says Ann Walgand, editor and publisher of The Educated Traveler, a newsletter devoted to special-interest and educational travel.

"They'll take a behind-the-scenes museum tour in Europe or visit European opera capitals or go bird-watching in Costa Rica.

They've been to England many times, but they'll return just to visit English gardens, for example.

"But these travelers are not specialists. If all they want to do is watch birds, for example, then they probably already belong to bird-watching organizations.

"Our readers are renaissance travelers who want to broaden themselves in many directions. And they want a certain amount of style and luxury on these trips.

"These people are not interested in backpacking it—they did that when they were kids."

A wide range of study tours is offered year-round by groups such as the Smithsonian Institution, the American Museum of Natural History, the Art Institute of Chicago, the World Affairs Council and the National Audubon Society, not to mention dozens of university-alumni organizations.

One example, a trip called "Art and Architecture of St. Petersburg," is offered by the National Trust for Historic Preservation from Feb. 14 to Feb. 24, 1993.

Among the highlights are three visits to the Hermitage Museum, trips to three palaces, several theater performances, special evening banquets and lectures by Russian museum curators.

The cost for this trip—\$3,595 per person—includes hotel accommodations, all meals and airfare from New York.

Participants must join the National Trust: A single membership is \$15, a family membership is \$24.

Joining the sponsoring organization is almost always a prerequisite of going on their trips. But membership fees are often nominal and tax

deductible.

The Smithsonian Institution, which offers a wide range of tours and programs, has a \$20 membership fee that includes a subscription to Smithsonian magazine.

One upcoming Smithsonian tour

is "Cultural Traditions in the Heart of Japan," from Oct. 25 to Nov. 7.

It includes visits to the cities of Kyoto, Nara and Kanazawa and stops at such sites as Oriental gardens and craftsmen's studios. The price of \$5,445 per person includes hotel ac-

commodations, some meals and air fare from Los Angeles.

"Many people take these tours because they like having the insights an expert can provide," says Karen Ledwin, director of marketing for Academic Travel Abroad, Inc.

"But probably the single biggest reason is that they can have experiences that they cannot have on their own."

"They can go behind the scenes of a museum to watch a textile restorer at work. They can go to a sheep farm and learn about shearing wool. They can visit a men's choir in Wales that isn't a show for tourists."

Academic Travel Abroad organizes and customizes tours for the Smithsonian Institution, Harvard Alumni, World Wildlife Fund and many other groups.

The average age of participants, says Ledwin, "is about 55, professionals and retired professionals who are continuing their education through travel. As the American population grows older, this area of travel is becoming more popular."

Ledwin gauges the average cost of such trips as "\$3,000 to \$4,000 for 12 days of all-inclusive travel. Cruises are more, averaging \$7,000."

Many journeys are timed for off-season or shoulder season; participants arrive when the natives, and not tourists, are predominant.

Academic Travel Abroad has prepared more than 140 trips for its clients in 1992 and 1993.

Its Smithsonian Institution tours include "Tuscan Countryside" from Oct. 15 to Oct. 28, "Tibetan Epic" from Sept. 23 to Oct. 16 and "The Tropical Treasures of Panama" from March 14 to March 20, 1993.

The National Audubon Society is sponsoring an "Arctic Lapland Adventure" from March 7 to March 16, 1993. The World Wildlife Fund is offering "Whale Watching in the Dominican Republic" from Feb. 20 to March 2, 1993.

## Resorts touting ski classes for all skill levels

The skiing season is just around the corner.

Now's the time to check out the condition of skis and poles, shop for a fashionable parka, plan a ski vacation and, above all, pray for snow.

But before heading down the slopes this winter, every skier should take a lesson, regardless of ability, ski professionals say.

"The most important thing is to build your confidence on the slopes," says Cindy Clement, manager of marketing and sales for the Vail and Beaver Creek Ski School in Vail, Colo.

"People come out here for a week and decide to just go right out on the slopes. Gosh, get acclimated! Why struggle for even half a day?"

"We recommend an all-day lesson or at least a half-day lesson at the level you already ski. Get back into the right technique and make sure you don't fall into any bad habits. You've got to get your legs back under you."

The Vail and Beaver Creek Ski School is the largest of its kind in North America. More than 1,000 instructors are prepared to take enthu-

siasts of all ages down the slopes—at Vail or at Beaver Creek, 10 miles away.

All Vail instructors are members of the Professional Ski Instructors of America (PSIA), the group that governs ski instruction in this country.

Having PSIA certify instructors, says Clement, means that "the teaching philosophy is the same in Colorado, Vermont or California—that you learn by doing, not by lecturing."

"You learn by gaining confidence. Instructors are taught that skiing is about 'recreation' and they're trained to work with skiers so they enjoy the sport."

"If you think ski school means (someone) barking at you on the slopes you're 20 years out of date!"

Vail and Beaver Creek have a variety of ski-school classes designed for skiers of all levels.

In fact, PSIA has designated nine ability levels: beginners are levels one to four, intermediates are levels five to seven, advanced classes and experts are levels eight and nine.

The sessions range from half-day to all-day, for 3-year-olds on up, with an average size of eight participants.

There are "Bump or Powder Workshops" designed for high-energy

skiers, "Style Workshops" for those who wish to ski more elegantly and "Race Workshops" for racing enthusiasts.

A half-day class, which offers three hours of intensive training, is \$45, plus the cost of a lift ticket. A three-day "Introduction to Skiing" program "teaches the basics and instills confidence," says Clement.

"In general, average beginners will find themselves at level five at the end of the program, which means they can ski the easy green slopes on their own with ease and confidence." The cost is \$211, which includes a daily lift ticket.

Even if new skiers don't opt for immersion, they need to take some lessons, Clement says.

"If you don't learn the right methods, and this is true for any sport, you'll get into bad habits. And it's harder to break those habits than to learn fresh."

On the East Coast, Stratton Ski School at Stratton Mountain, Vt., offers 250 PSIA-trained instructors,

bringing it closer to the average-size American ski school.

"We urge skiers to take lessons throughout the season," says Myra Foster, a spokesperson for the Stratton school.

"You've got to keep yourself tuned up just like you keep your equipment in top shape. Even advanced skiers can benefit because minor adjustments in technique can really help."

Foster is also adamant about beginners taking lessons the first time they set foot on the slopes.

"Lessons are essential if you're going to have any enjoyment of the sport and build confidence, which is a big part of skiing well."

"I see beginners come up here with friends who try to teach them to ski and they end up struggling. Even if your friend is a good skier, it doesn't

mean he or she is a good teacher. Teaching skiing goes way beyond patience."

Group Lessons for levels one to nine, which run for one and a half hours, are \$20. They do not include a lift ticket, which is an additional \$34 midweek and \$39 weekends and holidays. The average group size is between six and eight students.

Private lessons begin at \$48 an hour, an additional skier is \$25. There are "Championship Skiing Clinics," "Club 62" for skiers age 62 and over and a wide range of children's ski programs for kids age 4 to 18.

## Golf team shoots up its division

The Northville golf team's season hit a peak last week with the clinching of a division title and the breaking of a school record.

A win over North Farmington put the Mustangs atop the WLAA's Western Division at the close of the regular season. The team didn't add any more accolades in the conference or regional meets, but first-year coach Trish Waldecker is more than satisfied with the season.

"I think that winning the division was definitely the highlight," she said.

The team started slowly, but quickened its play midway through the season. Waldecker expressed no surprise that the golfers ended up winning the division.

"I never put anything past these kids," she said. Even while losing matches, the coach said she couldn't help thinking, "We're going to wake up and get going, and we did."

The Mustangs defeated North Farmington last Tuesday 210-226. Northville's Joe Staknis, medalist in the meet, shot a school-record 35 for the back nine at Tanglewood near South Lyon.

Other top Mustangs were Matt Telepo, 40; Daisuke Ishikawa, 44; and Tom Busard, 45.

That was the final dual meet of the season, putting Northville squarely on top of the Western Lakes Activities Association's Western Division.

Last Thursday brought the conference meet, at which Northville finished fourth with 428. The format was to play six golfers and count the top five scores for 18 holes.

Livonia Stevenson won the meet with 414, followed by Farmington with 424 and North Farmington with 426. Only four strokes separated second place from fourth.

Northville's Matt Telepo was No. 2 medalist with 39-40-79, earning All-Conference honors. Staknis shot 39-43-82, good for All-Division recognition.

Northville's other leaders were Anthony DeBenedet, 43-44-87; George Lemmon, 43-45-88; and two with 92, Ishikawa (48-44) and Busard (42-50).

The conference meet was played at Hudson Mills Metropark, the first time this season the golfers had seen that course. "It's fairly wide open on the front," Waldecker said. "The back nine's a little tighter."

Friday saw the golfers travel to Oak Pointe in Brighton for the regional meet. Only the top three teams — in a play-five, count-four format — advance, and Northville tied for sixth. Brighton, Ann Arbor Huron and Milford advanced toward the state finals.

Northville scored 334, with Telepo leading the way with 42-37-79, a sixth-place finish of the 90 golfers playing. The Mustangs had three golfers shoot 85: Staknis with 43-42, DeBenedet with 40-45, and Ishikawa with 43-42.

Waldecker said that although more post-season play would have been nice, "I'm not disappointed at all," with the division title providing a great accomplishment.

Although a couple of seniors will leave next year, Waldecker sees a good future for the Mustangs. "I really feel that this team has a lot of depth," she said. "We'll be strong next year too."

Novi scored at about the 15-minute mark, but the Mustang defense could not be penetrated again after that. The Wildcats' goal was the only score of the first half.

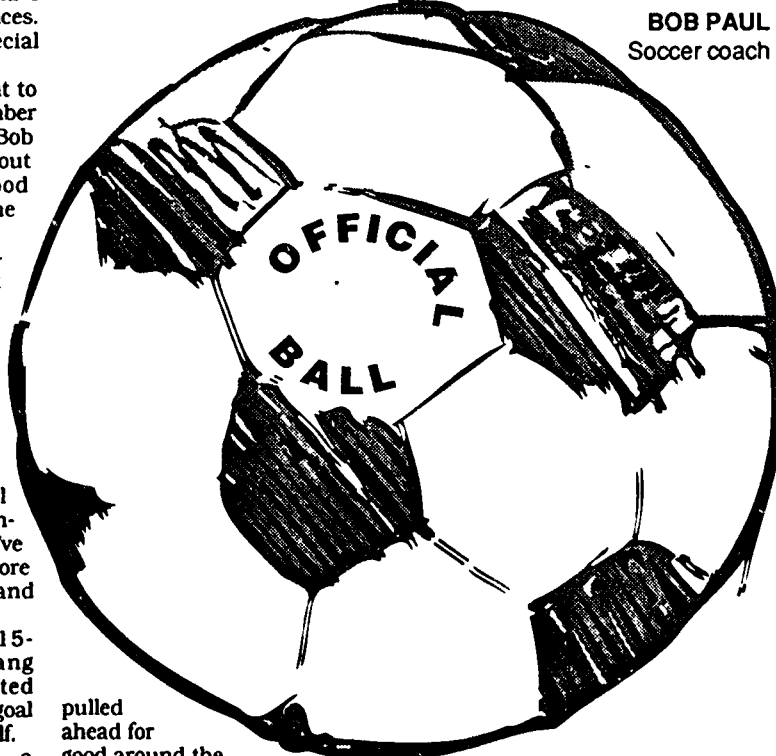
The second period saw a Northville team somewhat more used to the field conditions and with the wind at its back. Things started to click and Northville evened the score about 20 minutes into the half.

## Cross country squads place fifth at invite

The times have started dropping for the Northville boys cross country team.

The only question is whether they can drop quickly enough for the Mustangs to place in the top half of the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Northville put on a fine display at meets last week. In fact, at Tuesday's Redford Union Invitational, nine of the top ten Mustang runners logged career-best times. Though the team had the added advantage of running the meet on its own home course at Cass Benton Park, Northville finished fifth of the 11 teams participating.

Walled Lake Western was the overall winner with 47 points, Plymouth Canton was second with 51, and Farmington Harrison coasted in third with 64. Northville accumulated 166 points.

"We had excellent times," said Northville coach Ed Gabrys. "Our packing time was within about 90 seconds for the top seven. I would like to get one through five down in the 45 second range. We didn't quite get that, but they were all personal bests."

Jeff Zwiesler was the fastest of the Mustangs, finishing the five kilometers in 17:53 for 22nd place. Right on his heels was Nate Kirmis in 23rd at 17:56. Chris Smith finished 34th for Northville in 18:30, and Mark Ritter was 42nd at 18:53. Rob Kukainis in 45th (19:09) and Jim Hansen in 48th (19:40) rounded out the Mustangs' scoring.

"It's the time of year when we start to taper, so should see some drops (in our times) coming," said Gabrys. "Those times were excellent, and the meet was a good one because we got a look at next couple of opponents."

Indeed, the meet's top three teams, Western, Canton and Harrison are the next three on Northville's schedule. The Mustangs visited the Chiefs on Thursday.

Despite some sound running and more personal bests, Northville was defeated 15-48. Canton runners earned the top five spots.

"They are a big school, and a really good team," Gabrys said of the opposition. "We ran some good times; we ran very credible times."

Zwiesler completed the course in 18:00, the first Northville runner across the line in sixth place. Next was Smith at 18:06 in ninth. Smith beat his Tuesday personal best by 24 seconds.

In 10th was Kirmis (18:27), followed by Ritter in 11th (18:48). Also in the scoring for Northville were Kukainis (19:07) and freshmen Jim Hansen (20:09) and Dwight VanTuijl (20:15).

Canton and Walled Lake Western are the Western Division's likely 1-2 finishers in the Western Lakes Activities Association, according to Gabrys.

"We face Western (this) week," he said. "Our strategy for the next couple of meets will be to work on our pack, and bring down our individual times."

"We'll see what happens in the conference meet. We're fourth in our division, so we're hoping for a top half finish in the conference meet Oct. 28th."

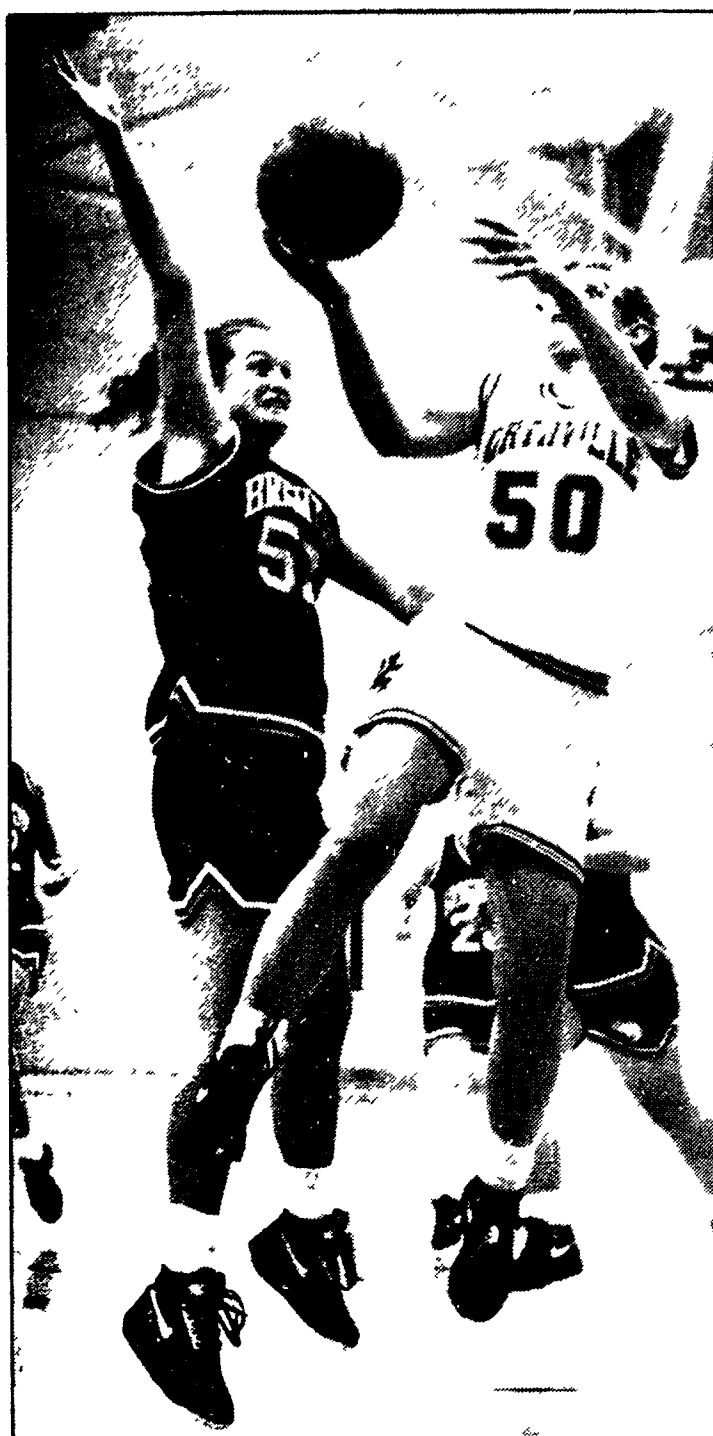

# Cagers play well, but drop two games

The nights are long and the scores often lopsided, but everyone had an inkling it would be one of those years for Northville's girls basketball team.

Last week's games were no exception, as the Mustangs watched their record dip to 1-8 after losses to league rivals Livonia Stevenson and Farmington Hills Harrison.

Halfway through the 1992 basketball season, and with a tough schedule looming, many teams could be eyeing an out — ready to throw in the towel at a moment's notice.

But that won't happen to the Mustangs, a buoyant coach Bob Shoemaker declared Monday. In fact, the first-year coach seems fairly happy with some of the things he's seeing.

"Our goal should be to play hard and play together," Shoemaker said. "I told the team the other day that we are 1-8 and I couldn't have been any more pleased."

"I'm getting the best I can get out of them. I'm pleased with them," he added.

Shoemaker said the Mustangs played their best offensive game of the year Oct. 6, despite losing 66-42 to Stevenson. And while 17-of-54 shooting (31 percent) isn't anything to write home about, the team was more effective than usual at putting the ball through the hoop.

Four Mustang players neared double figures in the Stevenson game, a feat that hadn't been approached this year, Shoemaker said. Top scoring honors went to Nicole

Hayden, Krista Howe, Julia Bermingham (eight points each) and Lindsay Bacon (seven points).

Hayden nailed a pair of three-point shots among her eight points.

Shooting woes and numerous turnovers doomed the Mustangs in the Oct. 8 matchup with Harrison. Mustang gunners hit only seven of 50 floor shots for a paltry 14 percent. Toss in the team's 3-14 foul-shooting mark, and it's easy to see why Harrison ran up a 53-18 score.

Howe led the Mustangs' attack with four points.

The final score didn't tell the whole story, Shoemaker said. The team worked hard and for a group dominated by underclassmen, it's easy to feel better about next year.

Shoemaker outlined his expectations to the team prior to this year's first jump ball. His goal: Just keep working.

"Before the season, I got the parents and kids together and basically told them the truth," Shoemaker said. "We're fundamentally poor, and need an off-season to improve our skills."

"To their credit, the parents and kids have stuck together," he said.

Shoemaker is looking to add two or three more wins to the team's total, but won-lost records won't be this year's bottom line.

"They're a good, fighting group," he said. "Success is measured by doing the best you can, and I don't see those kids quitting."

Next on tap for the Mustangs are games at Livonia Churchill (Oct. 15) and North Farmington (Oct. 20).

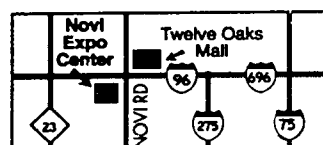

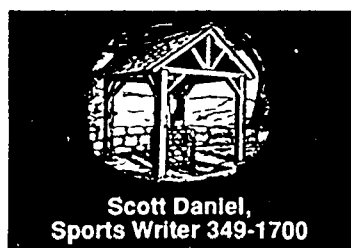

## America offers camping variety

The best outdoor trips begin in the imagination. From a seat behind that desk, visions of mountainous landscapes and scenic trails teem with energy and life.

When vacation time arrives and Mother Nature beckons, the outdoor reality often surpasses the most vivid imaginings.

There is no limit to the kind of outdoor excursions available to the serious vacationer. North America's disparate topographies and regions provide everything from sub-sea-level desert hiking to high-altitude camping and everything in between.

America's national parks provide some of the best outdoor resources for campers, hikers and backpackers. The convenient national park system offers top-notch facilities to both novices and experienced outdoors people.

Basking alongside Virginia's Blue Ridge Mountains rests Shenandoah National Park. Only 60 miles away from Washington, D.C., Shenandoah is famous for its backpacking trails and lush greenery.

For \$1.95, you can purchase the American Park Network's visitor's guide to Shenandoah ((703) 743-5108). The network also publishes guides to various other national parks, including Grand Canyon, Yellowstone and Yosemite.

Another good source of ideas for camping vacations is the Go Camping America Committee. The committee offers details on national parks, as well as state and regional preserves. Write P.O. Box 2669, Reston, Va. 22090, for a free guide.



North America offers an enormous variety of camping options.

If the sometimes-crowded national park campgrounds are too confining for you, consider some truly secluded getaways.

Sequestered away to the east of metropolitan southern California is the Joshua Tree National Monument. Here, two vast deserts — the Colorado and the Mojave — meet, and this beautifully desolate region

offers a genuine escape from the rest of humanity.

Be warned: temperatures in the area soar up into the 110-to-115-degree range during summer months, so you would be better off planning a trip before May or after September.

Further up the Pacific Coast, British Columbia offers close-up looks at wide-open rural expanses. Several

parks offer heli-hiking trips, ventures where helicopters deliver individuals to remote areas, give them time to hike around, and then return the folks to civilization.

The Coast Range Mountains, located just north of Vancouver, are a choice setting for heli-hiking. A hint: The best trails are accessible only during warm-weather months.

## Stains on teeth can be removed

Is your smile less perfect than you would like it to be? Do you wish your teeth were whiter? Do you cover your mouth with your hand when you talk? Or do you laugh with your mouth closed so people will not see

Stained or discolored teeth could be the reason. Teeth stains can be caused by things you eat or drink, such as coffee and tea. Smoking is another cause of yellow or brown stains. The more one smokes, the darker their teeth will become.

Severe trauma to teeth, such as falling from a bike or getting hit in the mouth by a ball, can affect one or more teeth, causing them to darken. Certain drugs, such as tetracycline, taken during the development stages of the tooth,

can cause the teeth to become yellow, brown or gray.

Whatever the cause, stains or discolorations can be changed by tooth bleaching. Today's dental technology offers us a variety of tooth bleaching methods. In fact, dentists have been bleaching teeth since the turn of the century.

Today's most popular and advertised method is the "home bleaching method." Using this method, the patient does the bleaching at home for several hours a day under the supervision of their dentist. The dentist must first take impressions (molds) of the teeth to make a custom, clear bleaching tray that fits over the teeth. At the second appointment, the dentist gives the bleaching gels and the custom bleaching trays to the patient. Complete instructions are given on the length of time the appliance must be worn each day, the amount of gel to use and the number of days or weeks the whole process will take. The patient must carefully follow the instructions and the dentist will monitor the progress.

Depending on the type of the bleaching agent used, the whole process could take from two weeks to two months to complete. This varies because the amount of bleaching solution tooth enamel absorbs differs from person to person. Also, most bleaching cases require a short retreatment within one year or up to three years later.

Today, tooth bleaching systems are available in stores. However, these systems tend to be weak and give poor, if any, color change to teeth. The bleaching gels from the dentist will give much greater color changes.

So, if your teeth are discolored, they can be brightened through the simple process of tooth bleaching. The rewards of greater self-esteem and improved appearance will be yours.

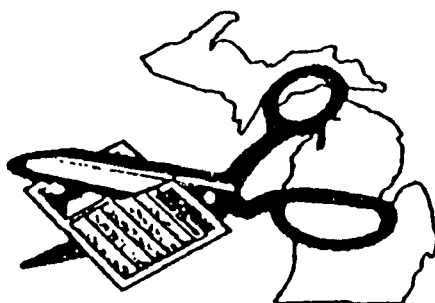

## Home values still seem to be on the decline

The value of homes continues to slide downward in many areas of the country. And the resulting impact on owners extends far beyond a loss of equity.

Many home sellers just can't adjust to the fact that they may have to accept a price that is less than they paid for their home. It's not supposed to be that way. And owners often equate their total financial well-being with the amount of equity they have in their home.

"The primary purpose of buying a home should be for shelter and the personal benefits of ownership," said Cathy Mims, a Realtor and chairwoman of a California Multiple Listing Service. "A home should not be acquired as an investment for future retirement income. And when the time comes to sell that home, the asking price should be competitive in the current market."

"Many owners insist on listing their home for sale at a price that's just too high for the current market. Then they wonder why it doesn't sell."

However, in an increasing number of cases, sellers are willing to accept a lower price than they paid for the home, and make other concessions they wouldn't make in a more active seller's market.

In a couple of recent transactions, the home seller agreed to pay all closing costs. These costs — with selling prices of \$147,000 and \$165,000 — amounted to nearly \$5,000 for each transaction. In

another case, the seller agreed to pay closing costs up to a maximum of \$3,500.

These were cases where the buyers had marginal qualifications and were financing their purchases with 95 percent loan-to-value mortgage loans.

Realtors also go the extra mile to market a home in today's market. One Realtor recently took three days to enhance the appeal of a listed home by painting its interior. During the same time, she held it open for inspection.

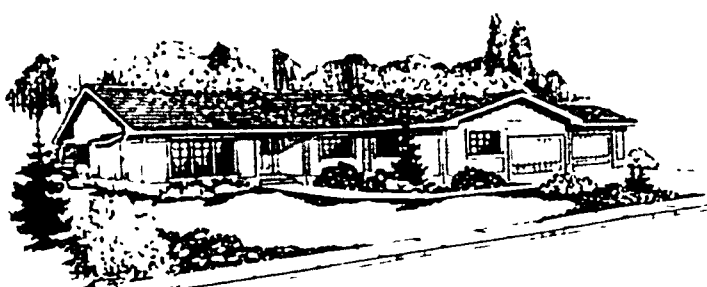
"I don't think we've seen the bottom of the home price curve yet," Mims said. "No one can accurately predict the future direction of that value curve. But regardless of that unknown factor, people want to own their own home and a lot of them are taking action to make this happen."

Another Realtor, who owns a multi-office residential brokerage firm, agrees that home values are still declining, but are beginning to stabilize.

Owners need to be more educated about establishing a realistic price. This is accomplished by reviewing recent sale prices of comparable homes, not adding profit to the price originally paid for the property.

Despite the problem of lowering values, the home selling market is increasingly active in most areas. With mortgage interest rates at a 20-year low and reduced home prices, many families are deciding this is a good time to act on their dream of owning their own home.

The country kitchen opens into

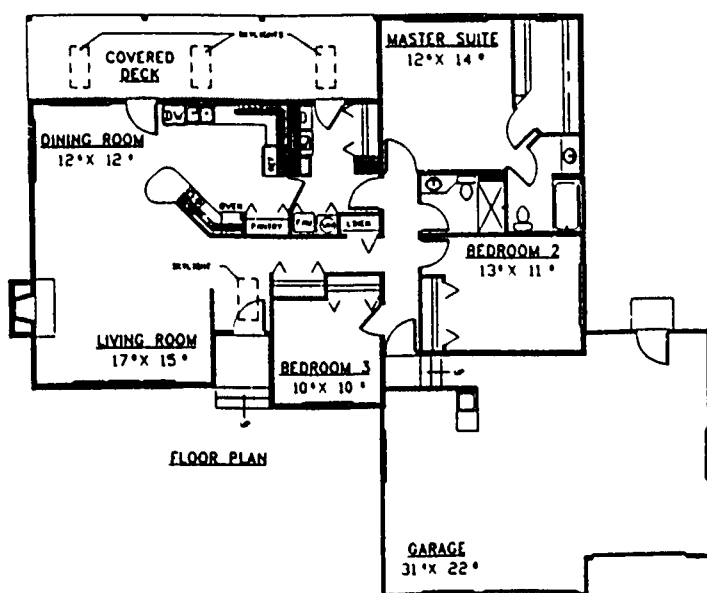
a great room with a fireplace. Although designed to serve the functions of living room and dining room, less formal families might prefer to use the space as one large family room.

# MOLE & HOLES

One of the hilarious subplots in the movie "Caddyshack" featured Bill Murray playing a greenskeeper embraced in an unending battle with a gopher which was tearing up the luxurious country club golf course.

Murray tried everything from a shotgun to water to, finally, dynamite, to rid the pesky creature from the course. In the end, though, the gopher survived while much of the course was blown to shreds.

While the film makes fun of Murray and his strategic plans of ridding the gopher, many lawn-keepers, gardeners and homeowners know all too well the frustrations which go along with trying to eliminate pesky ground creatures.

Moles, specifically, are a problem in this area. The burrowing animals not only create unsightly tracks across lawns, but their habits also lead to the damaging of roots and tubers in plants.

The main diet of the animals is insects, grubs and worms found in the soil. According to the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources (IANR), many people blame moles for eating roots, tubers and bulbs.

The claim, however, is false. In reality, other rodents such as voles (meadow mice) and common house mice use the moles' burrows and do the damage to plants.

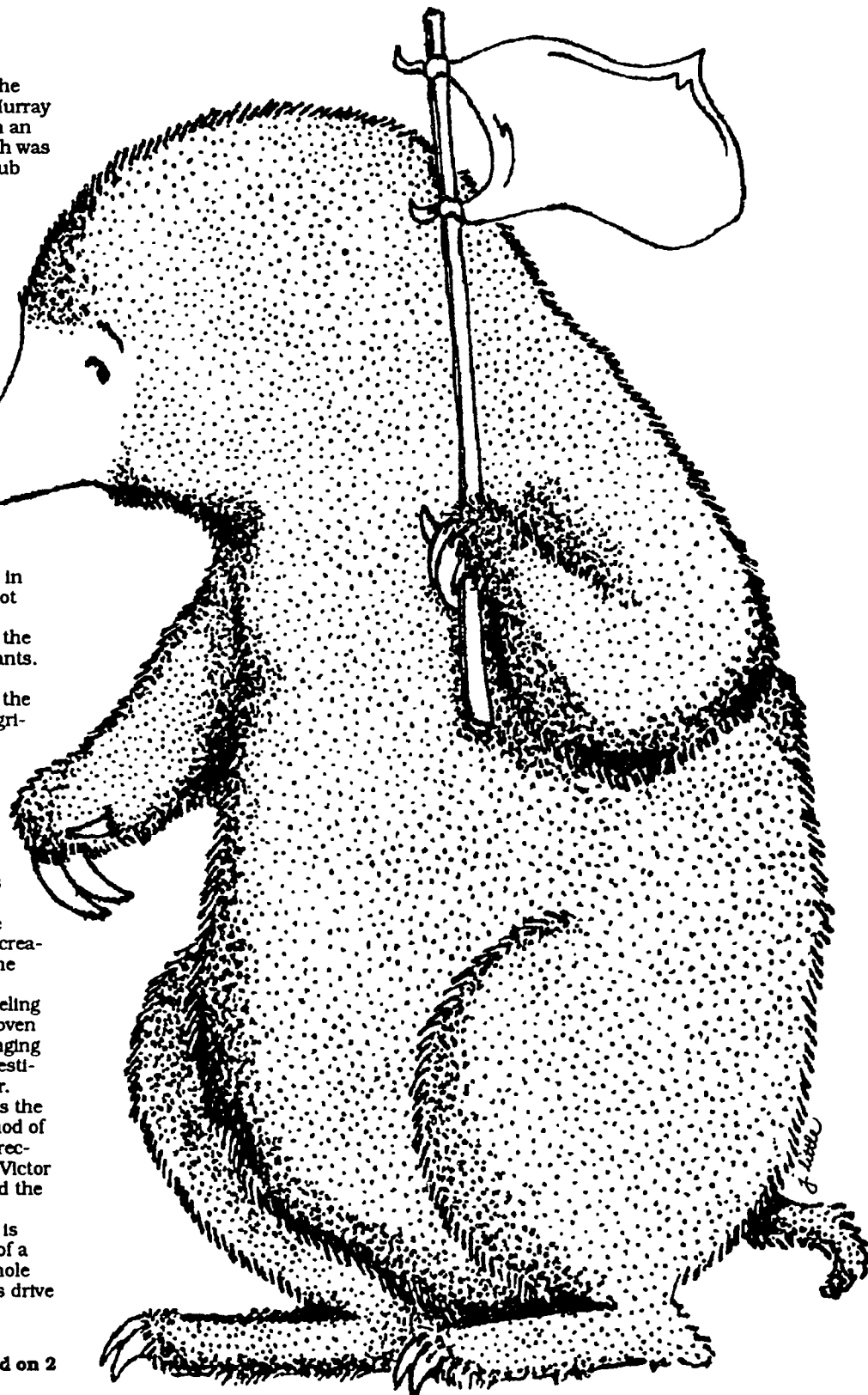
In any event, the moles make the roots of plants accessible for other creatures to feed off. For that reason, the furry animals are frowned upon.

As a deterrent to the moles' tunneling activities, there are a number of proven and unproven techniques used, ranging from harpoon and choke traps to pesticides, shovels and even human hair.

According to the IANR, trapping is the most successful and practical method of ridding moles. The top-three traps recommended by the institute are the Victor mole trap, the Out O' Sight trap and the Nash choker loop trap.

The Victor trap, or harpoon trap, is effective in that it sits over the top of a closed-down burrow and, when a mole passes below it, a set of steel spikes drive down into the creature.

## Decorations by nature

Look around for nature's free, attractive materials for the holiday season and fall arrangements, both indoors and out. Favorites that make you think of fall include gourds, pumpkins, corn stalks, ornamental corn and brightly-colored autumn leaves.

These are just a few of the many interesting and colorful plant materials. So keep your eyes open; you need only a little time and imagination!

For example, gourds can be turned into drinking ladies, birdhouses, containers for sewing kits, and brightly painted gourds can make lovely presents. Of course, they must be properly dried first!

### DRYING FLOWERS

Long after the gardening season is finished, flowers picked from the garden can remind us of the summer and the many happy times spent outdoors.

Some flowers can be picked at the peak of perfection and dried to last for months. If picked at the right time and dried correctly, the colors, shape and form of the flower remain as perfect as the day it was picked.

Here are a few tips for picking flowers to dry. In general,

it's best to pick at midday, when the flowers are driest.

- **Chives:** Pick before they go to seed.

- **Astilbe:** Pick when the pink or bright-red color first appears.

- **Allium:** Can be picked before or after they go to seed, depending on the form desired.

- **Yarrow:** Pick when flowers first open.

- **Glove thistle:** Pick when blue hue first appears.

- **Celosia:** Pick smaller side shoots. The earlier, larger flowers are harder to dry.

- **Statice:** Pick when buds first open.

- **Blue salvia:** Pick when buds first open.

- **Teasel:** Pick when pods are naturally dried on plant.

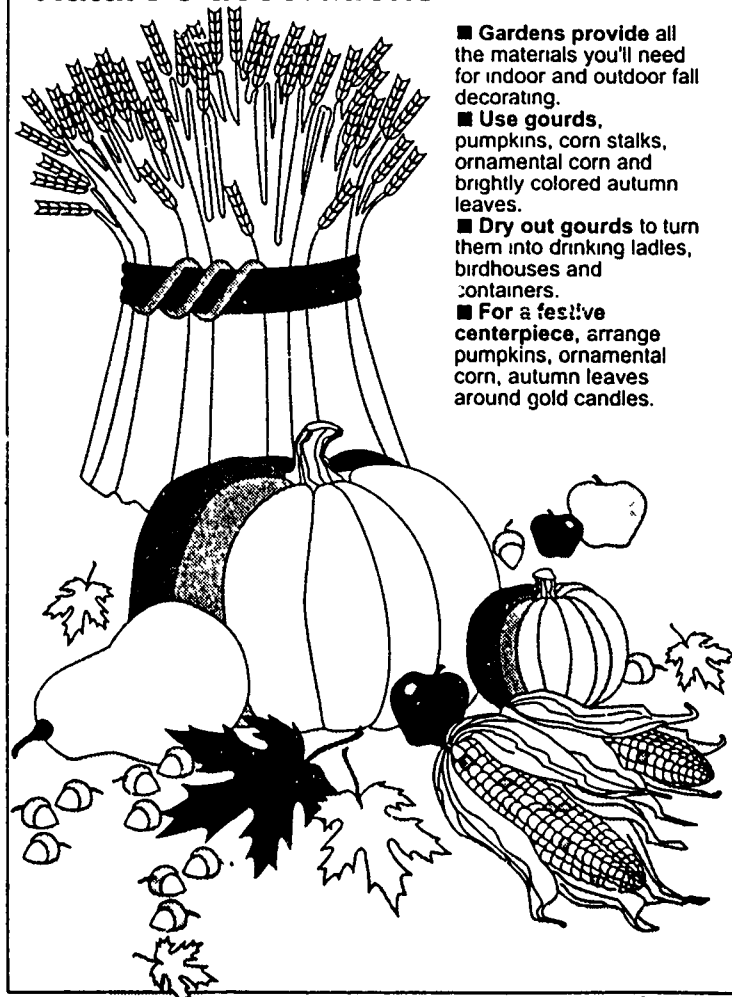
- **Strawflower:** Pick varieties with long, slender, abundant petals, when only one ring of petals has opened and color is scarcely visible. For those varieties with shorter petals, two rings of petals may be open before they are picked. Pick flower heads only, not the stems.

- **Gomphrena (globe amaranth):** Pick anytime when heads are still moist.

- **Ageratum:** Pick flower

# Fighting mole holes conventionally

The Out O' Sight trap features scissor-like jaws which close firmly across the runway and clench the moles. The choker trap, meanwhile, tightens around the animal bodies.

Dick Vontersch, the manager at Leppik Nursery & Garden Center in Brighton, said his favorite device is the choker loop trap.

"[The choker loop trap] scares me to death when I'm just holding it," Vontersch said. "It's a real good one. It pulls up hard on the mole and kills it pretty instantaneously."

Vontersch said moles have been a constant problem on his various lands for more than 15 years. Though they keep returning, he said the traps are still a source of satisfaction.

"The traps seem to be the most rewarding because you get something back for your efforts," he said.

Another preventative technique which has been used for some time is the application of human hair in the area where the moles travel.

Jack Vandenberg, who owns Vandenberg Bulbs Co. in Howell, said moles are a common problem for people in the bulb industry, as the mole burrows allow other creatures to feed off the roots of bulbs. While the plants aren't immediately killed, their ability to survive over the winter is decreased considerably.

Vandenberg said he "swears by" the effectiveness of the choker traps, but he said in order to deter moles from coming around, more has to be done.

"For the past few years I've been recommending people to use human hair," he said. "It's best in the long run. There's something about the hair—the oil or the fragrances—that moles don't like. It also deters rabbits,

squirrels and deer."

Vandenberg said barber shops and hair salons are usually very cooperative in giving away hair.

"I felt funny the first time I asked for it," he said, "but the [hair salon staff] said other people have asked for it for the same reason."

In order the hair treatment to work, Vandenberg said one should mix it in with the dirt around plants or directly into the burrows.

While there are different techniques and devices to ridding the pests, some people still prefer their own methods.

Brighton resident Cliff Emery has given up on using mechanical devices after several years of trying.

"The traps don't work for me," he said. "What I do now is stand and wait [the moles] out. When it's light out, I find out where their tracks end and then I go out at dusk when they start digging again. I wait for them with

a shovel and flip them up out of the ground."

Before implementing a control program for moles, the IANR and other wildlife and agricultural organizations stress that there first be a need for the animals' elimination.

The moles play an important role in the management of soil and of grubs which destroy lawns. One of the most abundant of small mammals, the mole has been working over the soil and subsoil for ages.

A part of the work is visible at the surface, but much of it is not. The tunneling and shifting of soil particles permits better aeration of the soil and subsoil. The mole can also benefit plants as it carries the humus further down into the earth and brings the subsoil nearer the surface where the elements of plant food may be made available.

bunches that have just opened and are still deeply colored.

Some flowers, such as gomphrena and ageratum, can be hung upside-down until dried. For best results, choose a cool, dry place to hang them.

Other flowers do best with a drying compound to create realistic results. Sand and borax are far superior for petal texture and shape. Silica gel makes more vibrant petal colors.

In using either of these compounds, cut flower head with about 1-1/2 inch stem. Place flowers carefully in the compound in a tightly covered tin can. Cover the flowers thoroughly with enough drying compound to bury the flower heads.

When dry, wires can be carefully inserted into the flower heads to

simulate a stem. The wire can be camouflaged with floral tape.

**G. How can I correctly over-winter dahlias?**

A. After the first hard frost in fall, cut the main stems about 6 inches above ground level. Using a spading fork, carefully loosen the soil about 1 inch away from the stem on all sides; then dig under the roots. Lift the plant with care and dry the clump slowly in a cool, dry area.

Dahlia clumps can be stored in a box in open air using dry peat moss or vermiculite in a cool, dark area until springtime.

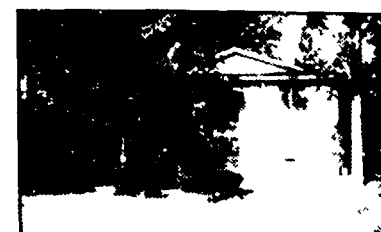

# Inherited toilet set is in good condition

**Q.** Please evaluate my bathroom toilet set. I have enclosed pictures of the set. The mark on the bottom is "Kermit" and "N.C. Co." All of the pieces are in perfect condition. It is very unusual to not have any broken pieces since my grandmother used this set.

**Would you tell me who made it and its value?**

**A.** This toilet set was made by the National China Co. in East Liverpool, Ohio, around 1900 to 1910. "Kermit" is the pattern. It should sell for \$365 to \$385.

**Q.** I have a chocolate pot and four cups and saucers. They are decorated in light green with gold trim. The enclosed mark is on the bottom of all the pieces.

**Can you identify the maker and give me any information about this set? I also would like to know if it is valuable.**

**A.** Your chocolate set was made by the Martial Redon Co. in Limoges, France, during the 1890s. It would probably sell for \$250 to \$275.

**Q.** I have seen quite a few country and kitchen antiques in my visits to antique shops lately. I think I might be interested in this field of collecting.

**I am wondering if you could give me some typical items to watch for and some prices.**

**A.** Some items and prices:  
• Wooden potato masher — about \$25 to \$35.  
• Tin kitchen cabinets—\$500 to



\$600.

- Round wooden boxes—\$100 to \$125.
- Washboards—around \$75.
- Spice cabinets—about \$500.
- Wooden bowls—around \$75 to \$85.
- Butter molds—\$100 to \$125.
- Wooden rolling pins—about \$50.
- Stoneware foot warmers — \$65 to \$75.
- Cast-iron bread and muffin pans—\$25 to \$35.
- Coffee grinders —\$50 to \$65.

**Q.** I have a clear pressed-glass plate with a picture of President Garfield in the center. I think it is called a bread plate. It also has "Memorial" across the top rim of the plate.

**Can you tell me when this was made and its value?**

**A.** Your bread tray was made in memory of President Garfield, who was assassinated in 1881. It would probably sell for \$50 to \$75.



This toilet set was made in East Liverpool, Ohio, around 1900 to 1910.

**Q.** I have a 1-liter Mettlach stein, No. 2956. The scene is an old-time bowling alley. One man is bowling while other men are watching.

**What can you tell me about its vintage and value?**

**A.** Your stein was made in Mettlach, Germany, during the late 1800s. It would probably sell for

**Q.** How would reducing capital gains tax on real estate investments increase tax revenues?

**A.** Here's what Richard Robinson, CPA, a noted expert on real estate-related taxes, says on that subject:

"A reduction in capital gains taxes back to the pre-1987 level would increase tax revenues by creating new jobs and restoring the values to real estate embezzled by the Tax Reform Act of 1986. Congress cannot get it through their collective heads that it's not higher taxes that generate higher taxes. Higher tax collections are generated by increased business

activity and its related higher income.

"Our politicians would do well to remember you cannot have a successful system of capitalism without capitalists."

**Q.** Besides the VA program, is there any home financing plan available that covers the entire price of the home?

**A.** At least one firm, Northern Trust Co., now offers a conventional 100 percent home loan financing program. But to qualify, a relative or friend must deposit an amount equal to 20 percent of the home's purchase price in a time-deposit account.

The deposit is used to secure the loan until the balance drops

to 75 percent of the property's appraised market value.

At a time when new car sales have been making a slow recovery from an extremely soft market, sales of light trucks have continued to outpace the market, particularly in the utility and minivan segments.

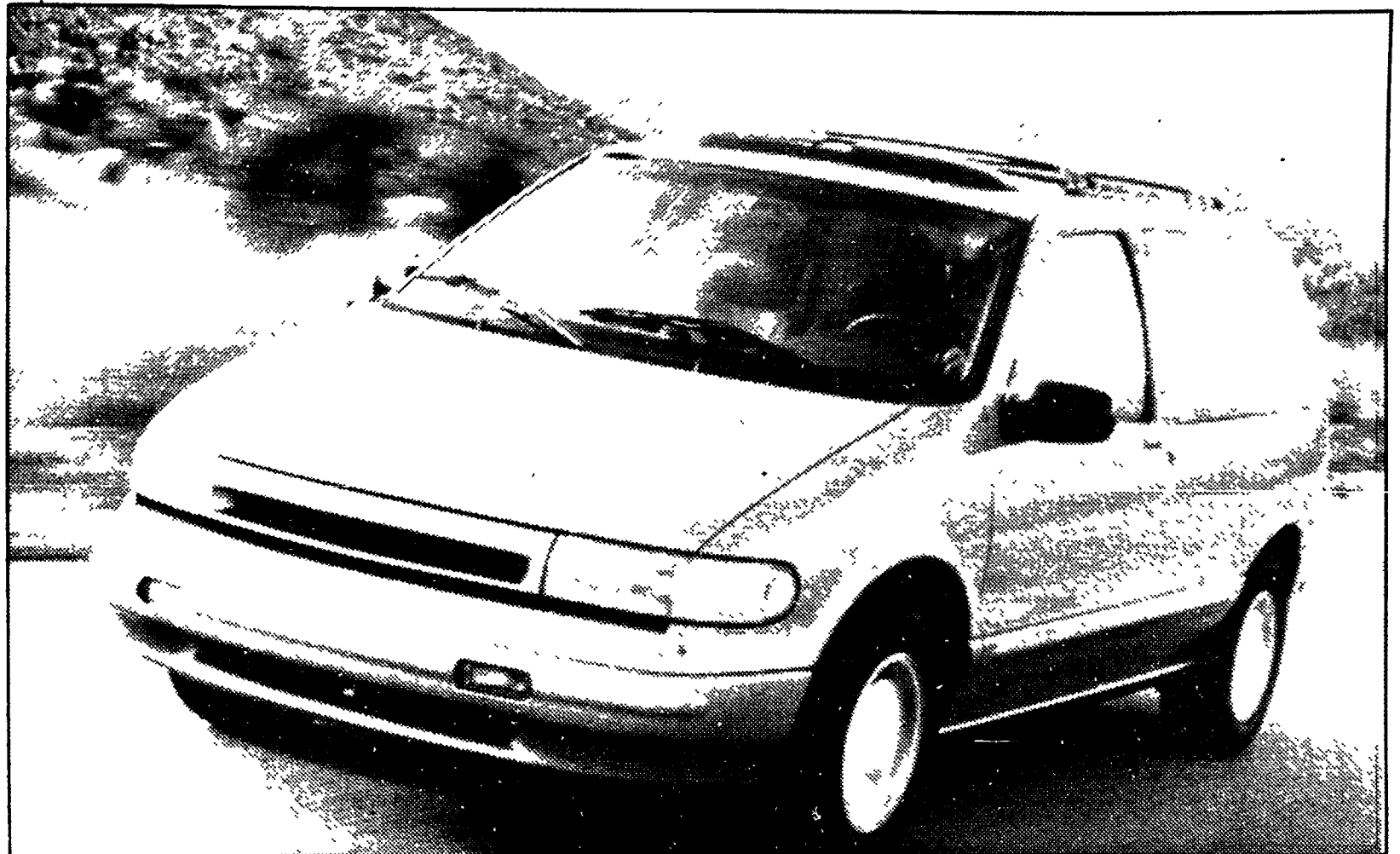
This really isn't surprising, though, since the modern utility vehicle and minivans fit almost perfectly into modern lifestyles.

## New car features, skill can save your life

Car buyers have done an about face. Until several years ago, questions asked during a visit to a dealer were all about performance. The buying public was turbocharged, fuel-injected and multi-valve crazy.

Now it's air bags. And anti-lock brakes (ABS). And built-in child seats. In fact, zero-to-60 numbers might be the last thing a car buyer asks about in this age of heightened safety sensibilities.

Car makers have responded by building safer cars. By 1997, every car made in the United States will come with air bags as standard equipment.

Anti-lock brakes have followed a similar path. Soon all cars will have them as standard equipment because of their ability to prevent out-of-control skids.

The move to safety is startling. Air bags are standard equipment on 89 different 1992 model cars. ABS is standard on 80 models. About 120,000 Chrysler minivans have factory-installed child safety seats.

The innovations have been paying off. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, fatalities in 1991 were 1.9 for every 100 million miles driven, the lowest ever.

So cars today are much safer than just a decade ago, but Detroit has yet to engineer a way to perfect the one piece of equipment that is still the major cause of injuries and death on the nation's roads—the driver.

Remember, 41,150 people were killed on the roads last year.

Many of them were the result of plain old bad driving, and most were preventable if a few common-sense tips had been followed, especially among target age groups—small children, teenagers and seniors.

Small children, those under 4 years old and/or less than 40 pounds in weight, should always ride in an approved child safety seat.

But just because it is the law doesn't mean parents always obey. They might if they knew that the seats can cut child fatalities, estimated at more than 700 last year, by up to 70 percent.

Also, many parents do not use the seats properly. Parents should always follow the manufacturer's directions and fully harness the seat in the back seat of the car.

There is a reason why insurance rates for teenagers are so much higher than those for others. Teens wreck lots of cars and kill lots of people, more than any other age group. There's more bad news. While driver's education programs are helpful for teach-

ing teens the basics, studies indicate they do not cut the rate of fatalities and accidents.

That's where parents come in, say the experts. A few easy ground rules can help keep your teenager safe.

**First**, don't let your child drive a car with more muscle than he or she can handle. High-horsepower cars are an invitation to speed, and when an inexperienced driver speeds, it's just that much easier to lose control in a tight turn or on a slick road.

**Second**, most teen accidents happen at night. While it may be unpopular, restricting your child's driving hours to daytime or at least into the early evening can pull him or her out of harm's way.

**Third**, be strict about drinking and driving. Act fast if you suspect your child has had a few beers at a party and driven home. Revoke driving privileges and make it stick.

**Fourth**, ride with your child once in awhile to see how he or she is driving. Tentative and unsure drivers can be as much of a hazard as speedsters. If your child is not confident behind the wheel, maybe a little more training is called for.

**Fifth**, don't put your child in an unsafe car. Many parents tend to allow children to drive clunkers because "it's just a kid's car." While you needn't run out and buy a

new car for your child, you should be sure the automobile your child drives is in perfect working order.

Older people present a different set of problems. They, too, are often the cause of accidents because of diminished sensory abilities, rusty skills or slow reaction times. Sometimes they drive too slowly for road conditions. On the other hand, seniors often depend on their cars for a sense of independence and even their own wellbeing. This is especially true of rural seniors who need to drive to see friends and relatives and to shop.

Adult children of senior drivers can greatly enhance the safety of their parents. First, as with teenage drivers, it helps to ride with your parents and make a note of any driving difficulties like driving slowly, not signaling for turns or tailgating.

Be sure your parent is still physically able to drive. Sight is crucial. If you have any doubts about your parent's vision, schedule an eye exam, and test for night vision, as well.

Find out if your parents regularly take medications that may hinder their driving ability. Look for combinations of medications that can interact to dull senses.

Have your parent's car regularly inspect-

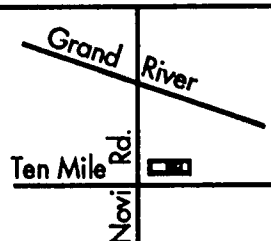

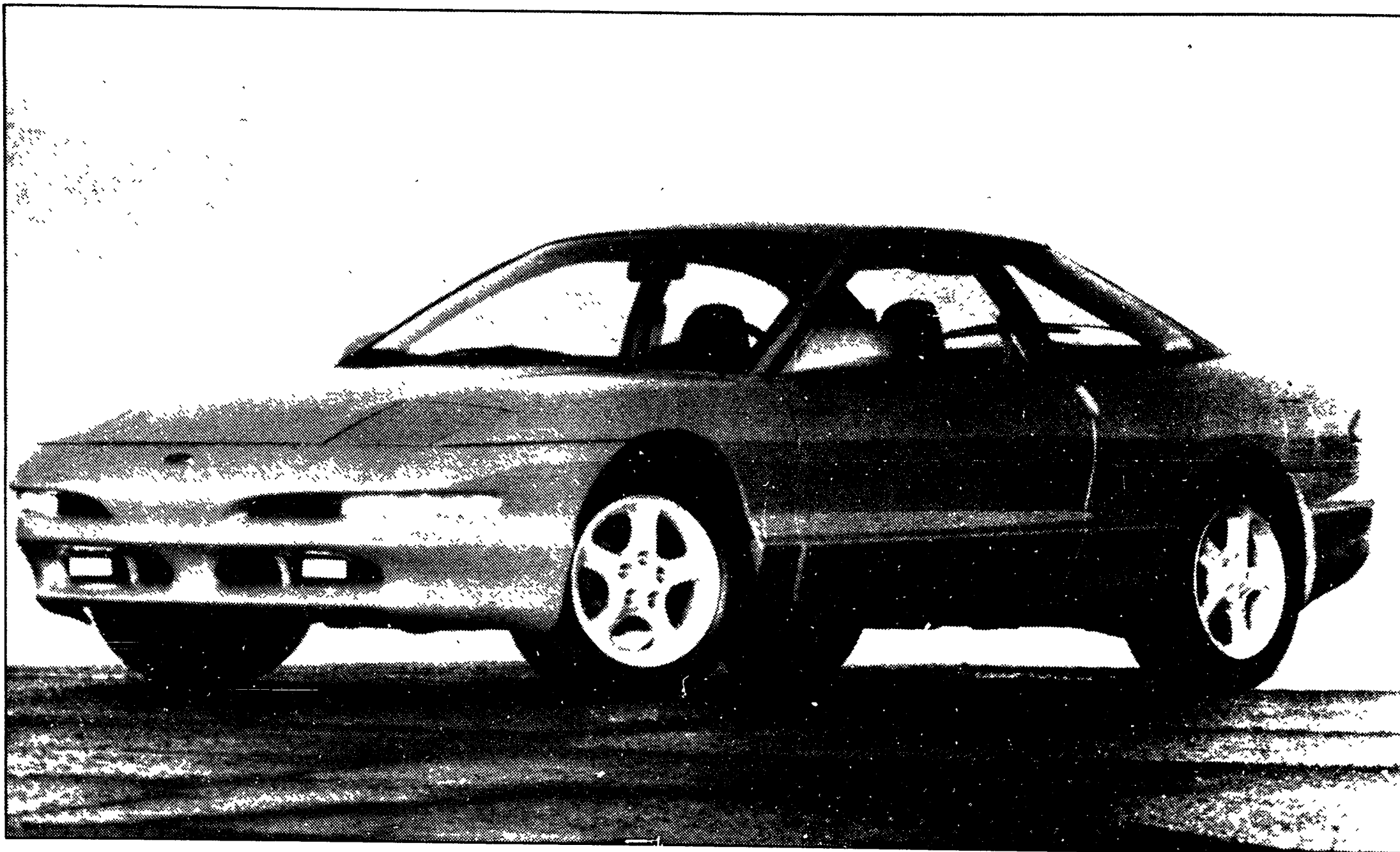

# Luxury and sports cars for all tastes

If one word had to be used to describe the new cars, that word would have to be excitement. A new bumper crop of cars is just starting to hit the streets for the new model year, and there's something for everyone in this year's offerings.

The following is a brief look at some of the various manufacturers' more interesting products.

## CHRYSLER

Of all the manufacturers, Chrysler Corp. currently has one of the strongest lineups for 1993, with four all-new cars and a new Jeep.

Topping the list for excitement is the Dodge Viper, a \$55,000-plus sports coupe that everyone is talking about. Powered by a 400-horsepower V10 engine, the Viper is capable of incredible acceleration and braking—from zero to 100 mph and back to zero in just under 15 seconds!

But don't rush out to buy one. Chrysler's Dodge Division is only making about 200 cars for '93 and they've already been spoken for. However, they plan to build around 1,300 Vipers in 1994.

Aside from killer street machines, Chrysler has developed a new line of family cars — Chrysler Concorde, Eagle Vision and Dodge Intrepid. These vehicles, dubbed the "LH series" by Chrysler, are all-new designs that feature the latest in technological advances in manufacturing and design.

Geared to go against such vehicles as Acura, Lexus (Concorde), Taurus, Accord, Camry (Intrepid), Grand Prix and Bonneville (Vision), the new cars mark a complete turnaround and change of direction for Chrysler Corp.

Powered by a zippy V6 coupled to a four-speed automatic overdrive transmission, the LH series promises to bring mid-price motoring to new horizons.

The cars come complete with standard driver and passenger air bags, automatic temperature control with non-CFC air-conditioning refrigerant, integrated child seat (optional) and adjustable-height front seat belts. But apart from being safe, the cars are good-looking and fun to drive.

The Jeep Grand Cherokee is the largest and newest sport utility vehicle available from Chrysler's Jeep Division. It offers levels of luxury and comfort, combined with 4-wheel drive ability and sport sedan handling.

It comes with a choice of 6-cylinder or V-8 engine, has a towing capacity of 6,500 pounds and is larger than any vehicle in its class, including the Ford Explorer.

## FORD MOTOR CO.

New from Ford this year is the all-new Probe, Ford's midprice sports coupe. Since its introduction in 1989, Probe has consistently captured the lion's share of this segment and the swoopy, sexy design of the new Probe will certainly assure Probe's king-of-the-hill position in the market.

The car features a modern cabforward design, curvy exterior, seats four and is powered by a choice of engines. Base models come with a 115-hp, 2.0-liter 4-cylinder, and performance-oriented GT models are equipped with a peppier 164-horsepower, 2.5-liter engine.

With either version, there's a choice between a manual fivespeed transmission or a fourspeed overdrive automatic. The car is built in the United States but shares its running platform with the Mazda MX-6.

## GENERAL MOTORS

Although GM has had its share of problems lately, and is saving most of its new designs for introduction in 1994 and 1995, they are introducing a new Pontiac Firebird

and Chevrolet Camaro early in 1993.

The Chevrolet version is slated for introduction at the 1993 Los Angeles International Auto Show in January.

While not much information is currently available about the replacements for GM's sports coupes, we do know that the design is more rounded and radical than the 1992 version. Power will probably be supplied by a V6 (though a small V8 might also be used), and both cars will continue to be rear-wheel drive.

## HONDA

Although Honda has marketed the CRX and Prelude as sports coupes, they have never had a sports coupe that hit the emotions and imagination like the new Del Sol targa. This replacement for the CRX is larger, more comfortable and more powerful than its predecessor. Additionally, it's cuter, rounder, and has a removable top and is reasonably priced, around \$14,000.

The small specialty coupe niche, where the Del Sol is slated to do battle, has become increasingly competitive and this new Honda is that company's answer to competitions such as the MX-3 V-6 and NX2000. Powered by a 125-horsepower,

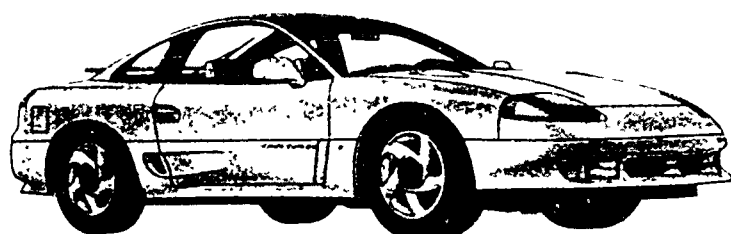
built in the United States by Mazda's manufacturing facility.

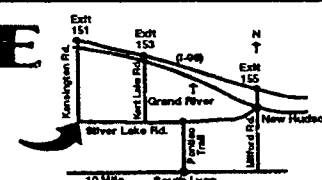

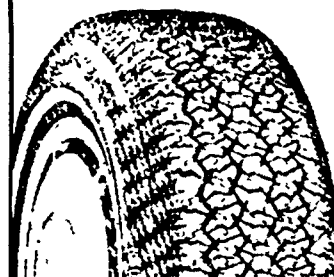

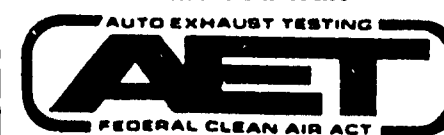

# TUNE-UP TIPS

## Cool-and warm-weather upkeep advice

Winter and summer, every time there's a big change in the weather we've got new chores to do. That goes double for our cars, which run differently in the winter and the summer, suffer with extremes of temperatures and climate, and just generally need a good going over from time to time.

So whether you live in the great white north or in a place that barely notices a difference, the change of the seasons is a good time to open the hood and go through a maintenance checklist. A few minutes spent now can save you dollars; in some winter climates, it can save you a good deal more than that.

### SUMMER CHECKLIST

• **Cooling System.** The cooling system used to be the biggest concern of summer driving. Cars on the side of the road, hoods up and belching steam, were once a common sight.

Improvements in materials and design over the last 20 years have nearly erased that sight from the highways, but you still need to have your cooling system flushed every year or two, and make sure your coolant is up to snuff: It should be replaced annually to replace depleted additives, and should consist of a 50-50 mixture of antifreeze and water.

• **Oil** Check your owner's manual for recommended engine oils. Some manufacturers suggest a heavier oil in the summer than in the winter 10W-30 is probably the most commonly suggested oil.

• **Transmission fluid.** Winter can be very hard on transmissions. Check the transmission fluid level while the

engine is running. Pay attention to the color and the smell. If it looks dirty and/or smells bad, have the fluid replaced.

• **Gasoline.** Some gasoline additives used to increase octane are very volatile—they don't like to stay liquid. This isn't much of a problem in the winter, but in warmer weather, they form a gas that can over-pressurize your fuel tank and cause all sorts of problems, especially if your engine has a carburetor.

If your engine acts erratically after you've parked it hot for a while, or if it misbehaves while waiting at traffic lights but runs fine on the highway, you might be experiencing vapor-pressure problems.

The easiest way to get around this is to try another brand of gasoline. Some cars are more susceptible to this than others, and different brands use different additives.

• **Belts.** Your engine's "fan" belts are more likely to squeal in the winter and break in the summer. Look on the belt's inside area for signs of cracking or other wear. Pay special attention to loose belts; it's usually a good idea to replace an old belt that's loose rather than tighten it, since the extra tension often causes old belts to fail.

The new serpentine "accessory drive" belts are more durable and are usually self-adjusting, but still need to be inspected on the inner, "toothed" surface for cracking and wear.

### WINTER CHECKLIST

Cold weather almost always makes existing problems worse. A driveability problem that is only irritating in the summer can strand you someplace awful in the winter. So maintenance is especially important here.

• **Battery.** If you've got a weak battery, the problem will show up in the winter. The only way to troubleshoot the capacity and output of a car's battery is with professional equipment.

If your battery has been around for a long time and you're not sure about it, it might pay to have it checked out. There are some things you can do yourself, though.

Make sure the connections are nice and tight. If there's a wet, gooey coating on top, clean it off with a solution of water and baking soda, and flush with lots of clean water.

If the battery has removable caps, be careful not to get any of the baking soda inside. Also, avoid all contact with the acid inside the battery. It's very corrosive.

• **Windshield wipers.** Replace old blades, and make sure you have plenty of windshield washer solvent. If you've filled the reservoir with water, run the wiper pump until most of it is out, and refill with solvent. Water will freeze and break the plastic reservoir.

• **Engine.** You're more likely to have engine driveability problems in cold weather. Engines hate winter. Make sure your engine is in good tune, and that all your filters are in good shape.

Check all your fluid levels. If you're not sure where to check them, look in your owner's manual; it's in there. Pay particular attention to the coolant. An inexpensive gadget called a hydrometer will let you check the antifreeze protection, to make sure you're safe from freeze-up.

It's a good idea to keep your fuel tank filled as much as possible, so freezing condensation won't form as readily.

Make sure your exhaust system is in good condition. Include the exhaust pipe hangers in your inspection: They should be nice and tight, but not touching the body or frame.

• **Tires.** Check your pressure. Cold tires have even less pressure than warm ones. You can get a perfectly serviceable pressure gauge at any auto parts store. Worn tires are of almost no use on slick pavement. If you've been putting off new tires all year, this is the time.

But if you do not replace your tires, have a look at the condition of the old ones. Uneven wear patterns, scalloped or cupped spots indicate poor wheel alignment, worn parts, or both. Get it fixed before you send expensive tires to their deaths.

# A motor home that suits your pursuits

A person's home is his castle, a reflection of his lifestyle—and so, too, should be his motor home.

No longer are recreational vehicles seen just as big gas-guzzling boxes driven by retirees.

As a point of fact, RVs simply are self-contained vehicles that house all the necessities of home with the locomotion to travel anywhere the highway leads. Beyond that basic, however, RVs come in a variety of sizes and styles—from trailers and micro-mini homes to camping vans and top-of-the-line motor homes—that suit a wide range of pursuits, whether camping, hunting, tailgating or sightseeing.

Some RVs focus on offering aerodynamic design or diesel-powered driving oomph; others focus on enhanced storage space that almost always results in a boxier frame. Some interiors sport leather and genuine hardwood cabinets; others opt for polyester slipcovers and vinyl-covered cabinets. Some floor plans emphasize sleeping areas, others living space for dining and

playing games.

With the wide variety of options available, it takes some serious thought about how the RV will be used in order to choose the one that's right for you.

For example, young families seeking the economy of RV travel for short vacations may want a unit that provides generous sleeping accommodations and convenient mealtime preparation facilities.

Or, if one family member tends to spend a lot of time in the bathroom, a floorplan with ready access to the rear bedroom when the bathroom is occupied might be preferable to a walk-through bath.

A smaller coach may offer a choice between a sofa bed or a dinette table and a pair of seats. If your meals are standard sit-down affairs, or if you have a couple of kids who spend time playing table games a regular dinette may be a better idea.

Tailgaters may seek good gas mileage above all else, while snowbirds who park their RVs in community campgrounds for months at a time may need more storage and floor space than other RVers.

Choice of campsites is another factor to consider when making your motor home

selection. If you typically camp at primitive sites, you will need to be fully self-contained for water and waste and may want a down-sized home that will maneuver more easily into tight campsites. If, however, you generally hang your hat at luxury RV resorts with every possible hookup—including cable TV—such capabilities will not be as important.

Most RV amenities are available in a wide spectrum of models.

At the low end of the spectrum are folding camping trailers with collapsible canvas sides, ranging in price from \$2,000 to \$9,000.

Truck campers, which fit into the bed of a pick-up truck or are mounted on a pickup chassis, range from \$2,900 to \$13,500.

Travel trailers, designed to be towed by a car, van or pickup, cost \$4,000 to \$55,000.

Motor homes start around \$20,000, with the average price of a top-of-the-line model about \$60,000. In general, financing for such motor homes frequently is spread out over 10 years or more.

Once you have a general idea of what type of RV you want, it's time to shop around for the best buy.

To sample among competing brands and styles as easily as possible, the Recreational Vehicle Industry Association suggests going to an RV trade show. There are many RV shows throughout the year in most major metropolitan areas. In some areas, there are large, multiple-dealer RV sales lots, as well—similar to an automall—where shoppers can conveniently peruse many different vehicles.

Whatever your reasons for choosing a particular motor home, one procedure is essential before making that final decision. Test drive not only the vehicle, but also everything in it. Walk through the unit and pantomime your daily routine—making beds, preparing meals, taking showers, using the bathroom. It's the best way to be certain that the unit matches your habits and lifestyle.

One final shopping note: Look for units with a seal indicating that the RV was built according to codes and standards established by the RVIA.

Those who have little or no experience with an RV may want to consider renting one first to get an idea of what it's like to drive or tow and live in one.
