## DARE proposal on tonight's board agenda

Approximately 20 parents left Thursday night's meeting of the curriculum sub-committee of the Northville Board of Education dissatisfied. "We layed everything we had on the table," Gini Patak said. "What we got back was innuendos and (we were) slammed."

Patak has been a proponent of the DARE (Drug Awareness Resistance Education) program and has been urging the district to implement the program for several months.

Northville Board of Education President Carol Rahimi, on the other hand, thought the lengthy meeting

was very productive.

"Both sides presented a lot of good information," Rahimi said. "The board has a lot to digest."

Rahimi said board of education members will discuss the DARE program at its Jan. 25 meeting, scheduled for 7:30 p.m. at Silver Springs. Patak objected, asking that the board make a recommendation on the program at its Feb. 8 meeting instead.

"They're going to bury this as item 25 on the agenda at a school where most parents are not comfortable," Patak said Friday morning. "That tells me they don't want any more input on this."

"I think we need to get on with this

issue and resolve it," Rahimi said Friday.

Rahimi added she felt DARE is a very good program; however, she questions whether it outweighs the district's current comprehensive health curriculum.

"I think what we have to wrestle with is 'do we at this time pull out the health curriculum and revamp it to put something in just for the fifth grade?'" she said.

At the sub-committee meeting, Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent of instructional services, and Betty Parker, science-health resource teacher for the Northville district, presented a comparison of DARE and the Michigan Comprehen-

sive Health Model. The Michigan Model was adopted by the Northville School District in June 1987.

In the Michigan Model, 298 of the 399 lessons are geared toward substance abuse prevention, according to McMaster. The comprehensive health curriculum is taught to students in kindergarten through eighth grades.

Patak and her husband George (a DARE officer in Ann Arbor) along with Dr. Carlos Ruiz of Fairlane Community Mental Health Centre and Suzanne Hanknecht presented the aspects of DARE. The program has four components, but the core of the program is 17 weeks of lessons for fifth graders. The first component is

taught to kindergarten-through-fourth-graders while another component includes 10 lessons to reinforce the fifth-grade core curriculum. The final portion of the program occurs in high school, which includes 10 lessons that combine the entire curriculum.

"Both are very fine programs," McMaster said Friday. "It's a shame because of the manner this got into the political arena rather than the curriculum development process. It appears one (program) is being pitted against another."

The development process McMaster referred to includes seven phases: orientation and readiness; study and investigation; concepts, objectives

and task analysis at each grade level; textbook and materials selection; presentation to board of education, professional staff orientation and support committee formulation; staff development and program implementation; and finally, follow-up evaluation.

"I tried to focus the board on the board's adoption process in terms of how the curriculum is reviewed," McMaster said. "It can be up to a year-and-a-half process. The key is phase two, and that could be three to six months or longer."

"The bedrock issue is not whether we have DARE or we don't have

## Search for twp. attorney narrows

Last month the township received 25 bids for a new attorney. Today a five-person committee will meet with the last of the nine finalists.

As a member of the committee, Township Clerk Sue Hillebrand said she and her four fellow committee members have been interviewing the candidates for the past few weeks and hope to bring a recommendation of the three finalists to the full board next month.

"We were really impressed with the amount and the quality of the firms that responded," Hillebrand said.

Hillebrand is joined on the committee by fellow township residents and officers Township Supervisor Karen Baja, Township Trustee Russ Fogg, Don Samhat from the zoning board of appeals, and township resident Bill Ponder.

Hillebrand said Ponder, who was the only resident-at-large to sit in on the process has proved to be an invaluable source.

"He has a lot of municipal experience because he was Livonia's city attorney," she said. "He brought a lot of experience to the process."

Hillebrand said the township's current law firm, Law, Hemming, Essad & Polaczyk, had made the committee's first cut. Before going out for bids,

Township Supervisor Karen Baja had cited some concerns she had about the law firm. At that time, she said she wasn't dissatisfied with the firm's service, but she had received complaints from residents about the Plymouth-based firm.

Whether or not the community's concerns about the current law firm were actual or perceived, Hillebrand said the current law firm had met the committee's criteria.

"We tried to be as objective as we could be based on the data that we got from the firms," she said. "I have some concerns about that firm in certain areas, but the five of us went in and tried to be objective."

## Area realtors foresee great year

Home sales were generally "flat" in '92, but local real estate agents are looking ahead to 1993 with considerably more optimism.

William Deacon, president of the 2,500-member Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors (WWOCAR), has predicted a five percent increase in sales of existing homes in '93, and that prediction is echoed by local Realtors.

"We're anticipating a good year," said Linda Anglea, sales manager of Century 21 Suburban's Northville office.

"We're really positive about [1993]," said Carol Mason of Carol Mason-Red Carpet Keim Realty in Novi. "Prices have fallen, so the seller is going to get a little bit less, but there will be good deals for buyers."

"Nineteen ninety-three will be a good year," agreed Jerry Delaney, broker-owner of the Northville-based J.A. Delaney and Co. "It won't be a boom year, but it should be steady ... solid."

"Nineteen ninety-three is going to

be a very good year," said Conrad Jakubowski of ERA Rymal-Symes which has offices in Novi and Northville.

Realtors are basing their predictions on a variety of factors, including:

- mortgage rates, which are expected to stay close to current low levels during most of the year;
- a favorable supply of available homes, brought about by the generally sluggish real estate market over the past two years; and
- anticipation of more stable economic conditions, with less uncer-

tainty about employment stability.

In fact, uncertainty about continued employment has been a major factor in the sluggish sales for the past two years.

"Job insecurity has definitely been a big factor in the slow sales over the past two years," said Mason. "I have several clients who were looking to purchase 'move-up' homes as far back as last April, but they were waiting to see about layoffs."

"In 1992, a lot of people, particularly those working with the Big Three (auto makers) didn't know if they were going to have a job or if they

were going to get laid off because of down-sizing," she continued. "Now, people know if they're going to have a job or not."

"Those who know they're going to be employed will be able to proceed with home purchases; those who don't will either size down or move out of the area."

All the Realtors agreed that most of the action in the residential market over the past two years has been at the low end of the price range, perhaps because, as Mason suggests, of job insecurity.

"The market over the last two years clearly has been driven by first-time homebuyers," said Jakubowski. "The move-up buyer has not been a factor in the market over the last two years."

Delaney agreed: "I call it a recovery from the bottom up," he said. "Sales of houses up to \$150,000 was very active; from \$150,000 to \$250,000 was very slow at the start of the year but became a little more active toward the end of the year; and houses priced over \$250,000 were the quietest price range."

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## City manager makes grade on evaluation

Northville City Manager Gary Word has earned high marks on his first City Council report card, despite a grueling 18-month grading period.

Council members formally evaluated Word on his performance Wednesday for the first time since he took the top administrative post at city hall in July, 1991.

Comments on Word's resulting six-page evaluation ranged from "Goes out of his way to enhance city's image" to "Achieved change and reduction in organization without major reduction in work completed," and "Focus has been on near term due to budget issues."

The organizational reductions came in response to the state's withholding of \$735,000 in anticipated racetrack revenue, a move that threw the city budget into turmoil shortly after Word's arrival.

Council members pointed to Word's adroit handling of the resulting cutbacks as proof of his effectiveness as an administrator.

"The council was very pleased with Gary's performance," said Mayor Chris Johnson. "We think he's done quite literally an excellent job considering the problems he walked into ... You can't do a whole lot of long-range planning until you meet your immediate needs."

Council Member Jerry Mittman agreed. "He's had to face a lot of adversity in that year and a half, and we feel he's made the right decisions."

Mittman sits on the city's personnel committee along with Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers.

Word's interaction with residents was one strong point, Mittman said. "They may not always get what they want, but they go away feeling that he's listened to them and considered what they had to say."

Word also earned praise for exceeding targets in the city's deficit reduction plan and overseeing the establishment of a new curbside refuse and recycling collection system.

He earned less than perfect scores in areas like long-range planning and intergovernmental relations. But Mittman attributed those to the crisis management that the administrator has been forced to practice at times.

"A lot of that was because he just didn't have time ... Long-term planning has been hard too, but we feel these are areas that will improve now that we're solving some of these other problems."

Mittman also worried that the council itself may have piled too

many projects on the manager's plate.

"We sometimes keep giving him programs to get done, and we may not realize the impact it has on other programs ... It's just a balancing act," he said.

Mittman hoped that Wednesday's vote of confidence will embolden Word to pursue his own projects.

"What we'd like him to be is maybe a little more aggressive in selling his programs ... We'd like him to speak up and go for it," Mittman said. "One area that he'll probably be thinking about is restructuring city hall. We may consider a study as to how we can operate more efficiently ... It may even involve office rearrangement or movement of walls."

Word himself said he wants to explore improving systems like the phone and computer networks, "to give our people the tools they work more efficiently without increasing the operational costs."

Apparently not content with just one evaluation, Word is also seeking input on his performance from department heads. He said the effort reflects policies he established as the top administrator in other communities.

"It gives the people we work most closely with the opportunity to give some confidential feedback that can be useful," he said. "We all have blind spots, things we think we're doing well that we're not, and things we think we're not doing well that we are."

Mittman noted that Word's review does not entail any immediate salary adjustment involved, though "we all agreed that some adjustment upward would be appropriate ... He's been here 18 months with no change."

Word's salary will be reviewed along with other administrative salaries during the upcoming budget review process.

# Deadline near for Safe Home sign up

The deadline is nearing to sign up for Northville Action Council's Safe Homes program.

NAC will publish the names of all respondents in a special directory. Their goal is to distribute the directories by Red Ribbon Week, the first full week in March when NAC members hang red ribbons throughout the community.

NAC Vice-president Maureen D'Avanzo said pledge forms are due by Jan. 31. "We're in the process of getting bids on the directory right now," she said.

Since sending pamphlets explaining Safe Homes to all Northville schoolchildren last November, the NAC has collected 362 forms "from families and businesses combined," D'Avanzo said. "Everybody was quite pleased with the turnout, and thought it showed real support from the

community for what we're trying to do.

"When it first went out, I was getting 10-15 forms a day . . . We've gotten nice notes, too." More than 90 percent of the respondents have sent donations in with their forms, D'Avanzo said, though a donation is not required to sign up.

"Most people have sent in \$10, and some have sent in more," she said.

Under the program, parents of school-age children agree to abide by a certain set of guidelines designed to provide an atmosphere and a place in which kids can relax and have fun while steering them away from substance abuse.

By signing the Safe Homes pledge, parents of elementary school students agree to supervise children visiting their homes, store alcohol, firearms, toxic chemicals and other potentially hazardous items in a secure place, and not allow people below legal age to use tobacco, alcohol or other drugs on their property.

High school parents pledge to discuss alcohol and other drug use with their children and set an example for them, forbid unsupervised parties or the illegal use of alcohol or other drugs on their property, and support school and legal policies regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs.

All participating Northville homeowners agree to inform the authorities of harmful or illegal activities within their neighborhood or community, and support responsible parenting practices by friends, relatives and neighbors.

"The goal is to reassure parents that it's OK to call and verify where their child will be playing or attending an event, and reassure them that it's a safe environment similar to their own home," D'Avanzo said. "We want to assure them that other parents have the same concerns and fears that they do."

The pledge is not legally binding, D'Avanzo noted.

# Realtors looking ahead to good '93

Jan Jones, owner/broker of Remerica Village Square in Northville, expressed similar comments, noting that prevailing market conditions had a particularly strong effect on the Northville/Novi area where the abundance of homes are in the higher price ranges.

"The \$80,000 to \$120,000 range was the only range that would sell with any regularity," she said. "The higher range, which is Northville/Novi, was pretty slow."

Jones characterized the housing market in Northville/Novi as "pretty stagnant" in 1992.

As for interest rates, local Realtors believe they will stay close to current levels or rise slightly.

Deacon, the 1993 WWOCAAR president, predicted mortgage

rates would stay close to present levels and indicated that they may even drop off fractionally at times.

Delaney, a former WWOCAAR president, noted that mortgage rates are hovering in the 8-8 1/2 percent range currently and predicts they will increase slightly in small increments up to about 9 1/2 percent at the end of the year.

Delaney also believes, however, that a more stable employment picture and the favorable supply of existing homes will more than offset the effects of a modest increase in interest rates.

"I expect to see minor improvement in the market, both in terms of the number of sales and the unit prices," he said. "But it will be gradual. I foresee slow steady growth, and that's healthy. Slow, steady, continued growth can be a lot more healthy than a boom market."

**Residents hope for county support**

Highland Lakes residents hope for township board backing when they attempt to change Wayne County's stance on parking along Silver Springs Drive.

The county recently announced it would halt all parking on Silver Springs after years of allowing parking on the east side of the street.

"We have prepared a resolution asking Wayne County to reverse the decision on the parking situation," said Highland Lakes Property Manager Ray Thompson. "We are hopeful for a positive action by the Northville Board of Trustees."

The township board is expected to consider the resolution at Thursday night's special board meeting. The board will meet at 7:30 p.m. at the township hall, 41600 Six Mile Road.

A copy of the county's traffic survey report for Silver Springs Drive indicates the county's decision was based on the number of accidents and the need for movement of emergency vehicles. The report also claims the heavy pedestrian traffic and other traffic flow added to the potential hazards in the area. Based on those statistics the county's assessment of the situation said that "allowing parking would unduly interfere with the free flow of traffic and be dangerous for those using the roadway."

Highland Lakes residents argue that the county's traffic order poses more safety concerns than it actually solves. They say eliminating street parking will force residents — who are largely senior citizens — to park on either Crystal Lake Drive or at the Highland Lakes clubhouse and walk

a half mile to their homes.

Highland Lakes resident Joe Sattler pleaded the association's case at the township board meeting two weeks ago. At that meeting, Sattler and two other residents explained the situation from their vantage point.

"There are only two parking places per unit," Sattler said. "Where do our guests park? There is no place on the street now so our guests will have to park at the clubhouse and walk a half mile."

"We feel we have been good community citizens," Sattler told the board. "And we are all concerned about the safety of Silver Springs Drive."

Follow Highland Lakes resident Anita Mitzel echoed Sattler's concerns.

"It's the usage of our guests and of people coming and going," she said. "It's when we have to unload our groceries. It's the times when the schools have functions. It's inconceivable to me as well — and I'm young and healthy — to deal with only two parking spaces. Where do our guests go? Where do they park?"

We have no other options. We can't all be in the school parking lot."

Thompson said residents are asking the county to reverse its decision and allow the parking situation to remain as it is now.

"We don't really care on which side of the street we can park we are just interested in getting at least one side to park on," he said. "We just didn't want to muddy the waters by introducing a new issue by asking to put it on the west side of the street."

At the Jan. 14 board meeting Township Supervisor Karen Baja said she has asked the county to defer posting "no parking" signs until the board looks into the matter.

"We have asked the county that since they took five years to make the decision that the signs not be put up for another couple of weeks to allow this board and the powers that be the chance to look into it further and respond," Baja said.

"I believe that request was made I haven't heard anything from them but I'm assuming they are willing to wait," she said.

In spite of the residents' concerns Baja said she holds out little hope the

order will be overturned.

"Our attorney said since the county owns the road it has the ultimate decision-making power over county roads . . ." she said.

Wayne County Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter was at the board's last meeting and said he would relay the township's concerns to the proper county officials.

"I've been in office nine days and this is the first thing on my plate and I understand the residents are very upset," he said. "But in all honesty I have to defer to the judgement of the board because as a practical matter it is the executive branch of the county government that is making this decision now; not the legislative branch which are the commissioners."

"If the Board of Trustees does not consent to asking for parking on Silver Springs it will be effectively impossible to overturn that decision," he said.

Thompson said he sent a copy of the resolution to McCotter and to the chiefs of the fire and police departments.

"Our next step is if we get favorable results, we are going to form a committee with Mr. McCotter, members of the Board of Trustees, people from Silver Springs Elementary and representatives from Highland Lakes. Then as a committee we are going to appear before the Wayne County Road Commission to ask for an appeal."

"We know that the law itself is in favor of the county," he said. "It is our opinion it's political, and if we want this thing it has to be approached from the right angle."

"We think that by going through our public officials we can get this thing rescinded."

Marc Lisnov had no idea what he was getting into when he agreed to visit his friend's classroom at Meads Mill.

Teacher Roslyn Steiman asked Lisnov to show her students how to make a key chain he had made over the summer. So he brought in the materials and the class made the key chains.

It was only the beginning of what Lisnov referred to as a "bonding" experience.

"I liked the kids," he said. "I liked the atmosphere."

And the kids liked Lisnov, too.

The PTA-PTSA Council will hold its next meeting at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 26, in the board of education office, third floor of Old Village School.



## Schools to review DARE proposal

DARE, whether we have SMART or we don't have SMART, whether we have IGNITE or we don't have IGNITE, whether we have QUEST or we don't have QUEST, whether we have THINK or we don't have THINK. And that's just a sampling of the programs available out there. That's not the issue. The issue is the process that protects the board of education and school district. It allows everything to be looked at and gives time for professionals and parents to give their input. It's free of fads, emotions and special interest groups. As good-intended as they (DARE proponents) may be, the community hasn't looked at what else there is."

Patak disagreed with the lengthiness of the curriculum review process, adding DARE is a program in prevention.

"I say this (drug abuse) is like cancer," Patak said before Thurs-

day's meeting. "When you find a lump you don't sit around for three years wondering whether you should do something about it. You go in and you take care of it immediately. This (DARE) is a win-win-win situation."

Patak added that she would admit she does have a special interest in mind.

"My special interests are my children," she said. "I'll admit that. I think their special interest should be my children, too."

McMaster said parents need to give the comprehensive program a chance. Its effectiveness will be tested during the 1993-94 school year when students will be given another Alcohol and Other Drugs School Survey. The survey will include eighth graders who will have completed four objectives taught in the Michigan Model.

"These (DARE advocates) are parents of young children and they're scared (about drug abuse)," McMaster

said. "I don't blame them. They want the school district to do everything it can do so their kids won't get into drugs. That's just not the school's (entire) domain."

McMaster said she would fully support DARE if it could be used to enhance the Michigan Model.

"(DARE) is a very exciting program, there's no two ways about it," she said. "It's just that the requirements of the DARE grant are that you teach the 17 lessons and an officer teaches them the way he was taught, or you don't have it at all."

Currently, students receive Michigan Model lessons from a certified health teacher. The weekly lessons range from 30 to 45 minutes.

"We wanted to do it (DARE), but as an enhancer, not a supplanter," McMaster said.

McMaster also questioned future funding if DARE was adopted. According to her information, support depreciates after the first year.

On Thursday, Patak said a local DARE advisory board would be established and fund-raising would be done to cover what the grant wouldn't in future years. Other communities are very successful, she said, citing Plymouth's Community Federal Credit Union's "Flip for DARE" pancake breakfast.

Grants are awarded on the basis of a willingness to comply to the DARE program, community need and the community's adjusted gross income, Patak said. DARE grants also cover the cost of workbooks for children, she said.

"In no case would we ever come to the school board with hat in hand saying we needed (money for DARE)," Patak said.

If the district were to be eligible for grant monies this year, it would have to have a grant application submitted by March 3.

## Credit case heads to circuit court

A Hong Kong citizen arrested for credit card fraud at Northville Downs Jan. 9 was bound over to Detroit Recorders Court Friday.

Ming Wal Leung, 22, had been charged with possessing a fraudulent financial transaction device and fraudulent use of a financial transaction device for trying to use a fake credit card to withdraw cash through a racetrack teller. The teller noted that the numbers on his Chase Manhattan Bank credit card were incorrect, and notified city police stationed at

the track.

The card apparently had been manufactured by forgers, using the account number of a Bank of Montreal account. Leung had six others in his possession when he was arrested, all with accounts belonging to different banks. More than \$10,000 had been charged to one of the other cards in the previous two days.

City police worked with U.S. Secret Service agents in the ensuing investigation. The suspect told police that he lived in Windsor, but further investigation revealed his Hong Kong citizenship.

Laung was arraigned Jan. 11 and

taken to Wayne County Jail on a \$25,000 cash bond. He returned to court Friday morning for an appearance before 35th District Judge James Garber.

Leung, with a Cantonese translator at his side, agreed to waive his right to a preliminary examination and have the case bound over for trial at Detroit Recorders Court. He will be arraigned there Feb. 5.

Judge Garber granted a motion by Leung's attorney, John Gates Jr., to reduce his bond and allow Leung's family to post a \$2,500 cash bond for his release. Gates argued that posting bond will allow Leung to answer

to federal charges stemming from the case.

"We want to expedite the entire matter," Gates said after the hearing.

Since the city's charges, the U.S. government has issued a warrant for Leung's arrest for the six other fake cards in his possession Jan. 9. That case would be tried at the U.S. Court-house in Detroit.

Because Leung has remained in jail since his arrest, "he has not made his initial appearance on the arrest warrant," Special Agent Donald Husted said Friday. "If he makes bond, then he'll be brought before a magistrate and charged."

## DARE should follow curriculum process

The Drug Abuse Resistance Education program has been widely touted around the state as an exemplary way to teach kids to stay away from drugs and alcohol.

The program forms a cooperative relationship between the schools and police, and helps hundreds of schools around the state to discourage students from abusing alcohol and other drugs, and to avoid the peer pressures to do so. A specially trained officer from the local police department comes to the schools to teach students in elementary grades through high school.

The Northville Township Police Department got wind of the program from township resident George Patak, a DARE officer in Ann Arbor, and volunteered to get the program off the ground into Northville's classrooms. From there it's been a tortuous trail to get to the point where DARE could get a fair hearing from the Northville Board of Education.

The stalwart advocates of DARE would not be denied, however, and tonight their cause will come before the school board. George Patak's wife, Gini, has led the charge, and through her dauntless efforts she's aroused the community's concern.

And rightfully so. The recent Alcohol and Other Drugs Survey in Northville showed that students here are abusing drugs with a greater frequency than the national average.

There's little doubt, based on those figures, that Northville needs DARE—or at the very least something like it.

The merits of DARE are obvious. Not only does it teach children early and often about the dangers of drug abuse. It adds the bonus of techniques to avoid peer pressure, which young people find the most difficult aspect of the problem to overcome.

The police come out winners, too. Placing a uniformed officer in the classroom, interacting with the students on a very human level, is a boon to community relations for the host department.

There are several problems, however. DARE supporters have placed the schools under the gun. While they've vowed that the DARE program will never be funded from the school board's budget, they're facing a deadline of March 3 to submit requests for grants to pay for the program. School board approval to add DARE to the curriculum must be given by then.

Also, it must be noted that Northville Schools already has in place a program that teaches children the dangers of drug abuse. As part of the Michigan Model for Comprehensive Health Education, the state-endorsed health curriculum which Northville has used since 1987, lessons discouraging drug and alcohol abuse play a large role.

Furthermore, as Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional

services, pointed out when DARE came before the curriculum sub-committee, any changes in lesson plans must go through a curriculum development process. It's time consuming, to be sure. As we are now discovering with the proposed changes in the language arts curriculum, it can take many months. But it's there to assure the quality education that Northville residents expect.

Therein lie the reasons why we must reluctantly ask the board of education to turn down the DARE program, at least for this year.

Let it never be said that we thought the DARE program was not worthy of inclusion. Indeed, it is our hope that by sending DARE through the curriculum development process, it may be blended with the Michigan Model curriculum.

DARE advocates have pointed out that a few other districts — Dearborn and Utica to name a couple — do blend DARE with the Michigan Model. Dearborn and Utica do not use certified health instructors to teach Michigan Model courses, however, which Northville does.

Were there another district combining Michigan Model and DARE curricula that Northville could mimic, we might advocate putting the DARE program on a fast track through the curriculum development process. But there are no apples and apples to compare to where Northville is concerned.

Adding the DARE program to the existing Northville curriculum would be no easy task. In order to qualify for the previously mentioned grants, DARE has strict guidelines.

Furthermore, the schools have already scheduled another Alcohol and Other Drugs Survey for the 1993-94 school year. It will be the first survey to include students who have completed the existing Michigan Model anti-drug curriculum. School officials have pinned their hopes on a better showing from those students.

Should that survey show a marked improvement in levels of drug and alcohol abuse, there would be no need to add DARE to the curriculum.

Like those who advocate DARE — and school officials as well — we wish there were no need for any of these programs. But if something is worth doing, it is worth doing well. In the case of keeping students away from drugs and alcohol, those words were never more true.

## Word earns high marks during challenging term

Wednesday's city council evaluation of its manager makes clear what the employees at 215 W. Main St. have known for some time now — Gary Word has had his hands full for the past 18 months.

But the manager's dexterous juggling of a tax hike, city hall reorganization and layoffs in the face of a million-dollar deficit has earned him praise from the city council.

Word, a strong believer in performance evaluations, received an informal review six months into his job. Wednesday's more detailed evaluation, done during a special public meeting, was in keeping with the manager's desire for plenty of feedback on his strengths and shortcomings, from both his superiors and employees.

The council listed many strengths, including Word's organizational and fiscal management techniques and his relationship with the public and the city's governing body. Council members tempered their criticism of Word's long-range planning and intergovernmental relations with the observation that the manager's performance in those areas

should improve as the city's fiscal situation improves, and his time is freed up.

The formal evaluation process itself, instituted at Word's prodding with support from Mayor Chris Johnson, also deserves some praise.

Such an open and thorough airing of the top administrator's performance was unheard of during Steve Walters' 17-year reign. Even more unthinkable would have been an upward evaluation of Walters' performance by those who serve under him, something that Word is undertaking now.

We applaud both moves wholeheartedly. Who better to review your performance than the people whose policies you are implementing, and those through whom you implement them?


As Word himself has noted, "We all have blind spots, things we think we're doing well that we're not, and things we think we're not doing well that we are."

The trick is to be aware of those blind spots, and the best way to become aware of them is to ask those around you.

That seems to be a technique familiar to Northville's city manager.

## Northville's not like the others



Last week I took an informal survey.

I pulled together a few newspapers and compared the Michigan Education Assessment Program scores for the entire metropolitan Detroit area.

School officials and the State Board of Education try to discourage one-on-one comparisons of the numbers because they might lead to false conclusions. The thing to keep in mind is that schools, their administrators and their students vary from community to community, and a district's quality is best judged subjectively.

But you have to admit that there's a strong correlation between the quantitative measure of the MEAP scores and the qualitative reputation of a given school district.

Knowing that, I made a discovery that's worth noting. What I found brought to mind that old Sesame Street jingle, "One of These Things is Not Like the Others."

Across four counties — Wayne, Oakland, Washtenaw and Livingston — just eight school districts out of 77 failed to make their MEAP scores available to the press. Coincidentally, all the districts that withheld their MEAP scores were in Wayne County.

Perhaps not so coincidentally, the eight that withheld their scores, though they didn't exactly have the worst reputations in the state (it would be hard to outdo Ecorse with 0.0 percent of its 10th graders earning satisfactory scores in math), weren't exactly among the state's elite either. With one exception.

Lumped in among Dearborn Heights (Ann Arbor and Robichaud), Garden City, New Boston-Huron, Inkster, Melvin-

dale, River Rouge and Romulus school districts was our own Northville.

Now, you can probably guess why districts like Inkster, River Rouge and Garden City withheld their scores. They're areas with comparatively low property values, underfunded districts that fall in-formula under the state's funding system. It would be a fair guess to say that their MEAP scores reflect that fact.

Northville, on the other hand, is one of the most desirable school districts in the state. Ask any real estate agent. They'll tell you. Property values are high. The district is out-of-formula. Not like the others.

The MEAP scores for Northville were phenomenal. They rose across the board. In the four-county region I surveyed, Northville's scores were the highest in two categories, and eighth or better overall in the other seven. Northville is right up there with the Birminghams, Bloomfields, Grosse Pointes and Grosse Ile.

Why, then, did Northville try to withhold the scores from the press? Why play it like the Northville Public Schools is some secret society?

It was a pointless exercise. MEAP scores are public information that have to be produced upon request. Michigan's Freedom of Information Act says so.

And we at this paper invoked the act to get them. We filed a Freedom of Information request and got the scores last Monday.

If I were a school official and it were my call, I'd be trumpeting those numbers from the top of the water tower the minute they hit my desk.

If you look at the MEAP scores, Northville really is a district that's not like the others.

But instead of a Sesame Street song, some in the district want to play Mickey Mouse games.

## Sensors, censors and words



I got one of those calls I absolutely love last week.

The fellow on the other end of the line identified himself as Theodore Bucher. Said he's (a) seventysomething; (b) a neighbor of an old friend of mine, Ernie Aruffo in the Country Place Condominiums off Eight Mile; (c) an avid reader; and (d) something of a purist as far as the English language is concerned.

Ted said his father was a college professor, and his father used to put him to work checking students' papers for spelling and punctuation when he was only seven years old.

It was a friendly call, even though what he wanted to talk about was what he considered improper word usage in a story about the Big Boy in the Jan. 21 edition of *The Novi News*.

The word Ted objected to was included in the following sentence: "It's our position they in turn owe us financial remuneration for the construction easement."

"Do you really mean remuneration?" asked Ted. "Don't you really mean remuneration?"

"It's my understanding," he continued, "that remuneration has something to do with compensation, while remuneration means something more along the lines of renumbering something."

I had to agree with him — it certainly looked like we had used the wrong word, although I had not checked with the reporter to ascertain exactly why we used the word we did.

But it really wasn't important in the overall scheme of things because we then began a fairly lengthy conversation about semantics, syntax and other grammar/word usage issues.

And I also tried to explain how mistakes happen in newspapers.

"One of the problems we're having right now is that we still haven't selected an editor to replace Bob Needham, even though he left Dec. 11," I explained. "The result is that the copy editor is filling some of those functions and not every story gets copyedited as many times as it would if we were at 100 percent staffing."

"Another problem can be that the reporter or even the editor doesn't know," I continued, shifting from Ted's specific complaint to a general discussion of how wrong words sometimes get in newspapers.

"And sometimes, even though the reporter or editor knows the correct meanings of words, mistakes do happen. Sometimes it's because of deadline pressure. Sometimes it's because you just goof up."

And then I proceeded to tell Ted that I considered myself fairly knowledgeable in proper word usage, but had made more than my share of mistakes in stories over the years.

I recalled a story I had written several years ago from a planning commission meeting. Commissioners had been talking about traffic volumes at a certain location, and during the course of the meeting someone suggested that it might be a good idea to place a sensor in the road.

That was all fine and good except that when I wrote the story I reported that someone had suggested that a censor be paved into the road.

In case you haven't noticed, there's a big difference. A sensor is a device that responds to a signal or stimulus; a censor is a person.


Only one person, Bill Briggs, ever said anything about it to me, but he said enough for everybody.

*Land costs push up the price of good Burgundy*

How much attention do you offer a wine label when you buy wine in a shop or restaurant? Do you care who imported the wine or who selected it for import? You should. This may be the most important bottle information attached to the label or the neckband.

Over the years, we've come to respect the knowledge of Robert Haas and his son Dan at Vineyard Brands in Chester, Vt. Bob Haas made his first trip to France to select wine in 1954.

"When I visit in spring, the smell of the smoke coming from the burning vine prunings in the vineyards of Burgundy remind me of how some things have not changed," he said.

"Many things have changed, however," said Dan Haas, who now selects the Burgundies imported by Vineyard Brands. "The economics of grape-farming in Burgundy have improved dramatically in the last decade, and the purchase price of a grand cru vineyard has escalated to a million dollars for a 2.50-acre parcel. There was something slightly off about each of the better vintages in the decade of the 1980s, but 1990 may be described as a perfect vintage. Buy 1990 or don't buy red Burgundy."

With the high cost of land in Burgundy, many producers are overcropping and we believe there's a lot of high-priced junk on the market masquerading as top-quality 1990 Burgundy. Recently, we tasted 11 estate-bottled red Burgundies imported by Vineyard Brands. All the wines were superior to exceptional and worth your consideration.

Look for the following Domaines: Mongeard-Mugneret, Trapet Pere et Fils, Rossignol-Trapet, Henri Gouges, Joseph Matrot, Jean-Marc Bollot, Pierre Biltouzet and Erenne Sauzet. Expect the starting price of the best state-bottled Burgundies to be around \$25. They quickly escalate to between \$50 and \$100.

How can you tell the Burgundy is estate-bottled and not a negociant wine? In addition to the French phrase "mis en bouteille au (or par) domaine," the words "proprietaire or proprietaire-recoltant" must be on the label. The translation is "bottled at (or by) the property" with the additional words roughly meaning "by the owner" or "by the winegrower."

"In a great vintage such as 1990, the terroir (a French word denoting the sum total of site, soil and microclimatic influence) is showcased and more pronounced differences are evident among the specific sites," said Haas. "The wines have deep color and supple fruit; they are drinking well now, but will also age well for 10 to 20 years."

Cloverleaf Market in Southfield sells more estate-bottled Burgundies than any other retailer in the nation. Jim Luty of the Cloverleaf agrees with Haas' assessments.

"Negociant Burgundies carry the stamp of the producer," he said. "Among negociant bottlings, there's very little taste difference between a Pommard and a Nuits St.-Georges. This is because the negociant treats all the wines similarly in the cellar, regardless of their origin."

"Estate producers take pride in individuality. These wines have soul. Negociants manipulate wines. I buy as many estate-bottled Burgundies as I can and I still don't get enough. If consumers don't buy the outstanding 1990 red estate-bottled Burgundies now, within two months they'll be shut out."

The 1990 wines have been compared to the exceptional 1947 vintage, except the 1990s should prove to be more cellar-worthy, considering improved winemaking technology employed in Burgundy today.

**\$35...Do I hear \$50?**  
Northville couple builds on auction success

At their Fifth Annual Wine Tasting and Auction for Charity held on Jan. 9, Northville residents Mike and Jan Mnich raised \$24,000 for charity!

What started out as just a fun party with about 15 of their friends back in 1989, when they raised \$500 for the American Cancer Society, has now blossomed into a very serious fundraising event. The Mnichs netted \$18,000 for the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, \$5,000 for the Michigan Special Olympics and \$1,000 for the Michigan Humane Society.

"Tonight was quite overwhelming considering we only had 79 people attend this year's auction... or an average donation of \$300 per person," said Mike.

The Mnichs' original concept for their auction, since the beginning, has been simple. Invite your friends over for a party, serve them good wines, outstanding food, cater to them all night long, and don't charge them any admission. Then when everyone is feeling a bit guilty for receiving such royal treatment, auction off a few bottles of wine. Everyone who is successful in securing a bottle writes their check out directly to the charity.

Mike and Jan provide the format for the evening by underwriting the entire cost of the party (food, drinks, party favors, hall rental, etc.) and hope that their charitable efforts will rub off on their guests when they write their checks to charity that night. "So far this combination has worked well," exclaimed Mike.

"It wasn't just dollar amount of donations that surprised us," said Jan. "Since we don't charge our guests anything for attending our auction, we do ask them to bring a durable good for a specific charity each year. This year we asked every couple to bring a bag of pet food and toys for the Michigan Humane Society as everyone's 'ticket' to get in. Our guests went bonkers! At the end of the evening, it took Mike and four of our guests 15 minutes just to load up the van with the donations!" said Jan.

Their Dodge minivan was loaded to the top with just enough room for Mike and Jan to fit in. Jan and her three children, Jeff, Steve and Amy, delivered the animal supplies to an unbelieving Westland Humane Society Staff on Tuesday.

"They were speechless," said Jan. "When we opened up the van, they couldn't believe their eyes."

Jan and Mike also encourage their guests to participate at different events planned throughout the year. "To some of our guests, writing a check is the easy part. It's getting someone to donate their time to a worthy cause that is the tough part," says Mike.

The Mnichs had guests signing up for three different functions: giving blood to the American Red Cross in Fe-

bruary, helping the Special Olympics in May or helping 40 homeless people in Detroit in July.

This year is the first year that Jan and Mike had to move their auction out of their home due to a lack of space. "Last year with 54 people in our home we were at our maximum," said Jan.

So when the Mnichs added up their guest list this year and realized 79 people were attending their auction, a decision was made to move it. "Everyone knew this was coming, but they were concerned that it wouldn't be cozy, warm and exclusive... something to pump up our guests and excite them!"

Mike and Jan made a wise choice when they settled on "Carail," the private club of millionaire Richard Kughn, retired executive of the Taubman Company and owner of Lionel Trains, The Whitney Restaurant and Upper Deck Cards. 

"It's truly the only interactive auction that I know of that allows its guests to choose the charities," Jan said.

Most of the auctioned lots were donated by Mike and Jan's friends. Corporate sponsors threw in \$25,000 and even local celebrities got in the act. Carmen Harlen from WDIV donated two backstage passes to one of her newscasts. Bill and Ellen Cornelius from Northville were the highest bidders at \$200 for the package.

Dick Purtan from Q95 FM donated his time to make a five-minute video (for the second year in a row) that acted as a "pep talk" to all of the guests just prior to the live auction beginning. "He even aired our results on the radio that Monday morning after the auction," said Jan.

In total, there were 50 lots drawn. Competition among the guests was fierce, so say the least! The highest bid of the night was secured by Bob and Karla Williams from Bloomfield Hills. They paid \$2,000 for a

**Center fundraiser to fight domestic violence**



Several months ago I was approached by the Director of Schoolcraft's Women's Resource Center, Nancy Swanborg, to host a fundraiser with the center as a recipient. It took me about two seconds to say yes.

The WRC is an extremely important part of the school and the community. It is a non-profit organization that has been helping women for the past 18 years.

Just how does it assist those in need? Glad you were wondering. The original focus of the program was to offer emotional support and information on community, career and educational resources for women.

Over the years, the needs have remained the same but with a greater need for economic support. There are many functions held throughout the year — at no cost to participants — that cover a variety of subjects.

A Single Parent's Day with speakers and workshops is held in January; the Women's Health Conference regarding women's health issues in April; Thinking About College, a day exploring educational opportunities at Schoolcraft in August and November; and a Healing Grief Seminar in November for those women seeking resolution of profound grief.

Additionally, fundraisers are held regularly via luncheons and the annual spaghetti dinner. But it doesn't stop here.

Divorce support, displaced homemaker programs and seminars on business are very much a part of the on-going activities.

Nearly 40 volunteers serving anywhere from one to 13 years are the backbone of the program. It could not be done without

them.

And they are busy. From July 1991 to June 1992, 15,000 women were helped either by phone or in the center. That averages 375 per volunteer. Between 45-50 women a day look to the WRC for assistance.

Great work ladies. Your devotion to fellow women in need is admirable.

Some further interesting facts should be brought to light. The percentage of employed women holding more than one job has increased significantly, from 2.2 percent in 1970 to 5.9 percent in 1989, according to statistics provided by the U.S. Labor Department.

Also, "according to a recent study by the National Association of Women Business Owners, women-owned firms will employ more workers than all of the Fortune 500 companies combined by the end of this year," *Newsweek*, August 24, 1992.

In 1991, the WRC updated the monetary value of the housewife based on the Michigan Occupational Wage Informa-

tion, the Civil Service Commission Compensation Plan and that the minimum wage is \$4.50 per hour. The job "description" includes the following occupations: Dietician, launderer, cook, housekeeper, nurse's aide, secretary, gardener, maintenance, medication aide, tailor, dishwasher, chauffeur, and telephone answering for a total of 96 hours per week for a gross income, if actually paid, of \$43,000 per year.

That does not include any child care hours. Not much money for a very important job. But I've never met a housewife making that kind of money unless she worked outside the home.

My mom, with seven children, couldn't have a wage assigned to her role. She would have been priced out of the market. At the end of 1991, 39 million women were in the workforce representing 42 percent of the full-time wage and salary labor force.

And finally, in Michigan, the number of individuals requesting shelter because of

domestic violence has increased 251 percent since 1978. Repulsive.

So I leave you with several thoughts. The fundraiser at Brady's will be held on Sunday, Feb. 7. We are serving a heart healthy brunch and I will give a short speech and hand out recipes.

Also another fellow woman chef, Kelli Lewton, will be available to answer questions and mingle with the crowd. I'm proud to say that my staff is donating their time so that more money can go to this worthy cause.

And, a few quotes... "Socialized to love, the woman holds together the fabric of society by busily giving of herself," Mercy Oduyoye.

# Getting the salt out of your diet

We are a nation addicted to salt. The average American ingests more than 10 pounds of it in a year — more than twice as much as necessary. But the taste for salt is an acquired one and can, with a little effort, be unlearned.

If you resolved on Jan. 1 to cut down on salt, then you're probably finding it's beginning to get a little easier by now. But it will get even easier in the months ahead. According to experts, it takes about three months before your taste buds really get used to a less salty diet.

How to cut down on sodium intake? Aside from reducing the amount of salt you use in cooking and at the table, you can use unsalted butter or margarine, read labels of processed foods, resist fast foods (which are generally high in both fat and salt).

Use herbs and other low-sodium seasonings instead of salt, or blend your own no-salt shake for use at the table: Combine 1 tablespoon garlic powder, 1 tablespoon paprika, 1 tablespoon dry mustard, 5 teaspoons onion powder, 1 teaspoon ground thyme, 1/2 teaspoon celery seed and 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Add only a little salt to a dish during microwaving (or none at all) and then season sparingly, if necessary, at the table.

Never salt food without tasting it first — it might be perfectly seasoned already (how do you know until you taste it?). Besides, many dishes already have plenty of sodium in the ingredients — especially if you use any prepared or processed ingredients, like canned or bottled soups, sauces, etc.

Add no salt while preparing August Moon Chicken. There is plenty in the canned condensed soup and soy sauce (which contains about 1,300 milligrams of sodium per tablespoon!). When shopping for ingredients for this recipe, remember that lower-salt soy sauce is now widely available, and Campbell's makes a condensed cream of mushroom soup with 1/3 less sodium.

The ingredients in both Scalloped Carrots and Celery and Hearty Manhattan Chowder (like saltines, cheddar cheese, canned tomatoes) should make them plenty salty without your table to add any during cooking or at the table.

The National Academy of Sciences (affiliated with the National Research Council) recommends a daily sodium intake of between 500 and 2,400 milligrams. To give you an idea of the amount of sodium content in some common foods, here's a listing of several vegetables, in milligrams: one stalk

of celery (50), 1 cup raw spinach (49), one medium carrot (34), one medium tomato (2), seven slices cucumber (14), one baked potato (5).

If you have any problems associated with high blood pressure, you should check with your doctor about restricting sodium intake.

(Recipes in this column are tested in 625- to 700-watt microwave ovens.)

#### MICRO-TIP OF THE WEEK

Salt distorts microwave patterns and can result in a drier and tougher finished product. If you wish to salt microwaved foods, dissolve in liquid ingredients or add after cooking.

#### AUGUST MOON CHICKEN

- 1 (10 3/4-ounce) can condensed cream of mushroom soup
- 2 (5-ounce) cans fully cooked chunk chicken
- 1 cup chopped broccoli
- 1 cup carrot coins (about 1/4-inch thick)
- 1 (4-ounce) can mushroom stems and pieces, drained
- 1/4 cup sliced water chestnuts
- 1/2 teaspoon soy sauce
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Cooked rice
- 1 to 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro (optional)

Yields 3 to 4 servings.  
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.  
Cooking time: 5 to 8 minutes (plus 3 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: High (100 percent power).  
Combine all ingredients except rice and cilantro in 1 1/2-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover and microwave 5 to 8 minutes, stirring every 3 minutes, until heated through. Let stand, covered, 3 minutes before serving over hot cooked rice. Garnish with chopped fresh cilantro, if desired.

#### SCALLOPED CARROTS AND CELERY

- 1 cup diagonally sliced carrots (slice thin)
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
- 1/4 cup diced onion
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter or margarine
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1/4 teaspoon dried basil leaves
- Dash pepper

- 1 tablespoon flour
- 2/3 cup half-and-half
- 1/3 cup shredded mild cheddar cheese
- 5 saltine cracker squares, crushed
- Paprika for garnish

Yields 3 to 4 servings.  
Preparation time: 10 to 15 minutes.  
Cooking time: 7 to 10 minutes (plus 2 minutes standing time).

Oven setting: High (100 percent power).  
Combine carrots, celery, onion, butter, water, basil and pepper in 1-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover and microwave 5 to 7 minutes, stirring every 3 minutes, until vegetables are crisp-tender. Drain off liquid. Sprinkle flour evenly over vegetables and stir gently to blend in flour. Stir in half-and-half.

Microwave, uncovered, 2 to 3 minutes, or until sauce thickens. Stir in cheese; let stand, covered, 2 minutes. Sprinkle with crushed saltines and dust with paprika before serving.

#### HEARTY MANHATTAN CHOWDER

- 1 pound fish fillets (cod, haddock)
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter or margarine
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 green pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1 stalk celery, chopped
- 1 small carrot, peeled and diced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 (16-ounce) can stewed tomatoes, undrained
- 1 (8-ounce) bottle clam juice
- 1/4 teaspoon each dried basil and dried parsley
- Dash pepper
- 1 (10-ounce) can minced clams, undrained
- 2 tablespoons red wine

Yields 4 to 6 servings.  
Preparation time: 15 to 20 minutes.  
Cooking time: 15 to 20 minutes.

Oven setting: High (100 percent power).  
Cut fish into bite-size cubes and set aside. In 3-quart microwave-safe casserole combine butter, onion, green pepper, celery, carrot and garlic. Cover and microwave 4 minutes, stirring after 2 minutes. Add all remaining ingredients except canned minced clams and wine. Cover and microwave 9 to 12 minutes, stirring every 5 minutes, until vegetables and fish are tender. Stir in clams and their liquid and red wine; microwave 2 to 4 minutes longer, or until heated through.

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

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

# State museum livens up winter



"Live from the Michigan Historical Museum in Lansing, it's Saturday Morning!"

Educational activities that are fun — and free — await visitors who preregister for "Saturday Morning Live!" at the downtown Lansing museum.

\* **Copper Mine Adventure.** Learn how early miners located





# Shows can cure golf fever attack

The popular mid-winter golf show in Southfield and Grand Rapids are being joined this year by a brand, spanking new addition in Novi.

The Golf and Sport Show will be held March 12-14 at the Novi Exposition Center, with about 125 exhibitors expected.

The Southfield show, operated by Roy Rasmussen and Jerry Hauser, will be in its third year at the Southfield Pavilion. It debuted at the Novi Hilton and moved to the Hyatt Regency in Dearborn before settling in at Southfield.

The dates are Feb. 5-7. Show times are Friday 4-9 p.m., Saturday 10 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Sunday 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Cost of admission is \$6 with group discounts available by calling 313-582-8860.

"We had 130 (exhibitors) last year and expect the same this year," Rasmussen says. "The reaction always has been favorable."

Visitors to the show are invited to bring in their antique clubs for appraisals.

"The antique dealers encourage it," Rasmussen says.

Events scheduled for show-goers include computerized long drive and closet to the pin contests, with portions of the proceeds (and of admissions) going to the Hollywood Golf Institute - Detroit Selena Johnson's program which encourages inner-city youth to play golf.

There are drawings for golf vacations and other golf-related prizes throughout the show's run.

The inaugural Novi show has a heavy emphasis on golf but allows for other sport and leisure activities, according to Blair Bowman, vice-president of Show Promotions Inc.

Some 125,000 square feet will be devoted to the show. The Novi Expo Center is located at the southwest

corner of I-96 and Novi. Show hours are Friday 4-9 p.m., Saturday 10-9 and Sunday 10-5.

"We're expecting 120 to 125 (exhibitors), not including bulk sale displays," Bowman says. "That's a conservative, realistic number, and we're encouraging retail sales."


Typically, travel destinations from Northern Michigan; Myrtle Beach, South Carolina; and Florida will be represented, along with major manufacturers of golf equipment and an assortment of retail and antique exhibitors.

"It will be similar to what you might see at the Chicago or Toronto shows," Bowman says. "That's what we are aspiring to be. We have the

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space to become a major national show and that's what we want to be. We feel the Detroit area merits a show of that stature. We're looking to take it to the next level."

The Grand Rapids show is sponsored in part by Michigan Golfer, a statewide golf magazine. Editor Terry Moore is the owner/president of the show, which is held at Ford Fieldhouse at Grand Rapids Community College. Show dates are Feb. 26-28.

Moore will have 100 exhibitors - manufacturers, resorts, golf schools, specialty golf companies, golf art, artifacts and supplies.

"My goal always has been to make it kind of a winter golf happening for western Michigan," he says.

"Six years ago I saw the phenomenon of golf shows developing in the midwest. Our winters seemed to get longer and TV coverage of golf seemed more tantalizing. Golf nuts have to find a way to get through the winter ... and a show was a natural tie-in for our magazine. So here I am getting a Ph. D. in golf show management."

The Grand Rapids show's attendance topped 15,000 last year.

"We're kind of a major sports happening here in one week," Moore says. "Our exhibitors are pretty pleased with the numbers we give them."

A feature of the show is free golf lessons provided by PGA professionals from the western part of the state. Six pros provide around-the-show instruction.

Two nationally-noted instructors also will be on hand: Wally Armstrong, a former PGA Tour pro, is making a return visit; and Bill Strasbaugh, 1992 PGA Teacher of the Year.

The Michigan High School Golf Coaches Association also will conduct a winter clinic in conjunction with the show.



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
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


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# State courses earn awards

Chalk up another banner year for Michigan golf courses: Four of the newest gems on the state's golfing landscape earned national honors in 1992.

Golf Magazine honored two courses - the Tom Fazio design at Sylvan Resort's Treetops North in Gaylord and the Gailes at Lakewood Shores in Oscoda - among its top 10 new courses any golfer can play, meaning resort or public.

Golf Digest names Dunmaglas Golf Course in Charlevoix No. 3 in the Best New Resort category and Wilderness Valley's Black Forest Course in Gaylord No. 4 among the Best New Public.

All four are magnificent additions to a state bursting with wonderful northern resort courses.

"The whole concept behind the Gailes was to build a golf course as you'd see it in Scotland, down to every last detail, down the sod-faced bunkers (there are 132)," says Craig Peters, general manager/golf pro at Lakewood Shores.

"The mounding is probably one of its greatest features, and it's something that's hard to describe. It's quite a unique golf course."

The reaction to the Gailes course since its opening last July 4 has been enormously favorable, according to Peters.

"We're getting a lot of people who want to play the course," he says. "Golf enthusiasts may never get the opportunity to go to Scotland - the Gailes is the closest they may ever get. There's nothing else like it in Michigan or the Midwest and that goes to the lengths we went to get as close to a Scottish links course as you can."

The Golf Magazine award topped off the year for owner Stan Aldridge and the folks at Lakewood Shores.

"We're very excited," Peters says. "We were anxiously waiting to see what might happen ... we feel it's a

great golf course and we were hoping others would feel the same way."

Fazio's design at Treetops North - soon to be joined by a third 18-hole course designed by pro Rick Smith - is an absolute delight. It has been called "user friendly" since its inception but it's more than that - it's just downright enjoyable.

Golf Digest describes Dunmaglas, designed by longtime Michigan pro Larry Mancour and the late Dean Refram, a former PGA Tour pro, as "an eclectic collection of holes ... (which include) encounters with stands of birch and pine, fields of waist-high rough, a cedar swamp, a towering dune of sand and gravel and the year's weirdest hazard, the basement bunker."

Wilderness Valley owner Dave Smith is thrilled with the recognition handed Black Forest - the second major kudo in two years. It opened just under the wire in 1991 and made Golf Magazine's "best new" list in the resort category last year.

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"To be considered by both Golf Magazine and Golf Digest is terrific," Smith says of the rare double. "We're tickled."

Tom Doak, who is working on a new course at the southern tip of Ireland, on a bluff overlooking the sea, designed Black Forest.

"That's why we hired Tom - we knew he could provide a world class golf course given the chance," says Smith, a Birmingham resident.

Smith's favorite holes are No. 7, a par 5, and No. 13, a par 4.

"I love to look at No. 13 and the

strategy of No. 7," he says. "No. 13 sort of typifies the style of course Tom does, where you have unmaintained areas off the tee and bunkers set off the fairway at an angle."

Two new courses that will be much-talked-about in 1993 aren't in Northern Michigan - one is in the western part of the state, the other in the southeastern hub area.

The Thoroughbred, designed by Arthur Hills, will open at the Double JJ Resort in Rothbury, 20 miles north of Muskegon.

The championship course is the focal point of a \$20 million expansion which includes a hotel and condominium complex at the popular dude ranch.

Construction on The Thoroughbred began in March, 1992, and "it happened very fast," says Double JJ owner Joan Lipsitz of Bloomfield Hills. The course, which stretches from 6,900 yards from the tips to 4,851 yards from the front tees, will open this spring to house guests and to the public sometime in the summer.

The ranch, which opened in 1938, is almost booked to capacity (200 before the current expansion) from May to November. It offers ranch-style accommodations and activity-oriented programs.

"We have a large female clientele, and a lot of golf widows," Lipsitz says. "We decided we'd like to involve the other half as well. When we asked what kind of activities people would like for us to add to the ranch, golf

was very much on top of the list."

But it become more than just another golf course when Hills came aboard, she explains, and now The Thoroughbred is poised to make a spectacular debut.

The other new course worth tracking is The Orchards in Washington Township, northeast of Detroit in the Romeo area. Designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr., it will become the centerpiece of developer Ron Dalby's project.

The premium daily fee course will be totally public and veteran observers who have seen the course in various stages of completion believe it will be the standard by which all other public facilities in southeastern Michigan will be measured in the future.

Ted Woehrle, longtime former superintendent at Oakland Hills Country Club in Birmingham, has been hired as superintendent which tells you all you need to know about the level of conditioning that will be maintained. There will be four sets of tees (some holes have five) and a wide range of looks from rolling, wide open fairways to wetlands and woods. The course is at 29 Mile and Campground Roads.

"We broke ground in October, 1991, and we're looking at a mid-summer opening," says Project Manager Mike Mutter. "We're not going to rush it. We're going to make sure it's ready for play. It's going to be unmatched in southeast Michigan."

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Guests can drive their carts to the adjacent Gull Lake View Golf Club's two 18-hole courses. Golf-lodging packages are also offered in cooperation with other nearby courses — some 126 holes within a 20-minute drive.

Gull Lake Inn, a Best Western affiliate, can accommodate up to 75

guests. Some rooms feature whirlpools and two deluxe suites are scheduled to open this summer. All rooms have a refrigerator and coffee maker.

Spring and fall weekday packages are a particularly good bargain, ranging from \$55 for one day of golf and one night's lodging to \$189 for four days of golf and three nights lodging. Spring rates run through June 1 and fall rates begin Sept. 1. Call 616-731-4131 for reservation information.



It's boat show time in Michigan. That means interesting and innovative new boat models to look at, covet, and possibly even buy.

The premiere showing of new boats for the current model year will be the 1993 Detroit Boat Show, Jan. 30 through Feb. 7 at Cobo Convention Center. Its sponsors, the Michigan Boating Industries Association, say it offers one-stop shopping for everything from sleek racing yachts to cabin cruisers and paddle-boats, not to mention fishing lures and Mackinac Island fudge.

The show will be followed by others at Saginaw, Pontiac and Grand Rapids.

But the biggest display is in Detroit, officially at the 35th Annual Boat and Fishing Show. Allan hasn't missed it in over 30 years.

More than 1000 boats will be displayed by approximately 300 exhibitors. To comparison-shop this many dealers on your own would take many weeks of driving. In addition to showing new engineering, design,

materials and colors, the exhibition will feature the latest services, accessories, engines, trailers, electronics, fishing gear and more.

"It's the best place for people to go, whether they already own a boat, are considering owning a boat, or are curious about the sport," says Van Snider, executive director for the Michigan Boating Industries Association (MBIA). Snider emphasizes that boat show prices are the lowest boaters will see for new model products throughout the year.

According to MBIA statistics, the 110,000 attendees at last year's show bought 2575 boats. It was a 69 percent increase in number of boats sold over the previous year's show.

Probably 70% of those sales were to fishing enthusiasts who take advantage of Michigan's reputation for having the best freshwater fishing in the country. At this year's show, some of the nation's top fishermen will present daily seminars on how to use your fishing equipment. Detroit News columnist Dave Richey will be emcee. There will also be product demonstrations of casting and fishing.

Other interest areas include an antique boat display, offshore racers from the APBA Gold Cup races, boating and beach attire fashion shows, plus waterskiing and boating tips from the experts. A fully landscaped Nautical Village will feature historical lighthouse displays and new nautical art and craft demonstrations.

But the boats themselves are the main attractions.

One of the most popular innovations to be seen at the show is the speedy, affordable jet boat. The jet set was pioneered by Boston Whaler in 1992 with a 13 and a half foot five-seater named Rage. The jet boats have a strong safety appeal, as there is no propeller, or drive leg. They are powered by an enclosed impeller that sucks in the water and then jets it back out a nozzle in a high-pressure stream that moves the boat forward. As the jets are mounted on the bottom of the

transom, boats powered by water jets can run in a foot of water or less. Properly handled in flat conditions, they are virtually unflippable. As they have no prop to cut you up if you swim too close, they are ideal for water skiing. There is nothing new about jet motors, only this use of them. Their only down side is that they are less fuel-efficient.

But the jets have caught on, and for 1993 Sea Ray introduces the SeaRayder, also 13 and a half foot long. It attains a top speed of 38 to 40 mph powered by a Mercury Sport Jet 90. It's a four-seater with a wider beam (6 foot 8 inches) than any other boat in the jet set. Along with a custom-built trailer, the SeaRayder costs \$7995.


Meanwhile, Bayliner offers its new Jazz, also powered by Mercury's Sport Jet 90, which the company says will take it to 40 mph with one person aboard. It has seating for three, and costs \$7995 with trailer.

The Rage attains a speed of 32 mph from its 50-hp Yamaha two-cycle engine. Its price is \$9995.

Evident on larger 1993 boats is the continuing trend toward more efficient use of space. "Boats coming out this year are showing the results of lots of time and energy being spent on research and development," says Rick Wilson, of Wilson Marine in Brighton. "Materials are lighter and stronger and interior construction is focused on unitization and better space allocation."

A good example is the new addition to the Four Winns Sundowner line, the 215. It's a 21-foot, 6-inch cuddy cabin sportboat with a choice of two hot engines, priced in the \$23,000 range, including trailer and warranty. It includes an innovative wraparound swim platform that lets you step aboard from a dock without climbing over the gunwale. The seats in the cuddy cabin are tilted to increase headroom. Four Winns is a Michigan company.

Another good example of efficient space utilization is Sea Ray's Laguna

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29. Its 29-foot, 2-inch overall length is ideal for families who like to fish, cruise and party together, and is designed for the dedicated sportsman who also wants comfort in his environment. It has a roomy head with vanity and sleeps four, two forward in the V-berth and two in the mid-berth area. In a pinch it can accommodate another sleeper in the cockpit. The galley is well-equipped for meal preparation at sea, with roomy upper and lower storage places. Standard power is twin 5.0-liter Mercs. It retails at \$72,794. "We hope to have it at the Cobo show," says Colony Marine's Pete Beauregard, "if we get it on time."

There's also an efficient use of space in the trend toward substituting deck boats for pontoon boats. The new 19-foot Stinger Sport Deck boat by Sea Nymph Boats, is an example. "Without pontoons running the length of the boat, the Stinger gives you usable space below," says Arthur Krause, a Sea Nymph dealer who owns Northwestern Boat Company in Southfield.

The boat's spacious deck can carry up to seven people and includes two pedestal fishing seats forward and two aft. Among the features in its recessed cockpit are a large upholstered lounging area, a deluxe console-top helm, an AM-FM stereo with four speakers, and a dinette table with base. The price is \$12,730, including a Johnson 70 outboard, a fishing package, trailer and canopy.

One of the most innovative uses of space we've seen is on the new 1993 Tiara 25. This bowrider neatly tucks an enclosed head, complete with portable potty, underneath the helmsman's console. An adult, Tiara claims, can actually fit inside. Molded into the passenger console is a sink. With two 260-horsepower Mercs, this made-in-Michigan 25-footer is \$43,990, built by S-2.

Somehow the 1993 Maxum 2700/SCR manages to fit three double berths into its 26-foot, 9-inch length. Maxum Marine, of Everett, Washington, claims there's extra ceiling height throughout the salon. It contains a streamlined galley with an electric refrigerator and stove that separate the dining and V-berth

arrangement, plus two hanging lockers, and an enclosed head with shower. Price: \$45,990 with a 300 horsepower Merc engine.

The new 1993 boats are environmentally sounder. Their streamlined design creates better performance with less horsepower or smaller engines. That also means less weight, which makes for better towing conditions.

The 1993 boats are also built to take the punishment of winds, storms and waves, and make old-fashioned wooden boats seem like throwaways. "Protective resins which guard the hull of the boat continue to get stronger and more durable," says Rick Wilson. "Interior materials are also especially designed with non-fading, high durability products."

So be sure to choose a boat you will like, for it will last you a long time.

Last year's event was the most successful ever, with more than 200 boats, a thousand fishermen and five steelhead and salmon fishing clubs competing.



FRESHWATER FANS— Fishing enthusiasts account for about 70 percent of boat show sales.

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
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# Dolls are her life-long passion

In a deeply wooded spot between Oscoda and Alpena, Michigan, Alcona County's "Doll Lady" continues an interest that began when she was just eight years of age: she makes, collects, refurbishes and designs dolls.

In a specially constructed room of

what was intended to be an attached garage, thousands of eyes greet visitors who enter the doorway. Dolls in glass cases, dolls in carriages, chairs, in bassinets and at tables with doll-sized tea sets they look amazingly lifelike and interested in their surroundings.

Betty Chase makes finely crafted porcelain dolls, collects many varieties, and restores "orphans", those neglected characters that were relegated to attics as children grew up.

The mother of six adult children

has been married 43 years, but she's collected dolls even longer.

"I made my first two dolls when I was about eight years old. They were made of cloth and I suppose they'd look rather crude to most people, but I loved them," she recalls. Yes, she still has them.

The two examples of a child's first sewing efforts sit alongside more than a thousand other dolls in the shelf-lined display room Betty and Delton Chase built several years ago.

The space contains a workroom where the porcelain dolls are crafted and repairs are made to other dolls, and the carpeted, period feeling display area where dolls can be shown in comfortable surroundings.

Betty's workroom contains her kiln, used in firing the porcelain dolls of all sizes and doll parts in various stages of finish. There's a surreal feeling when viewing arms, legs, heads and bodies jumbled together.

The display room contains floor-to-ceiling dolls - baby dolls, kewpie dolls, DyDee dolls that wear diapers and actually wet, character dolls like Elvis, Shirley Temple dolls from an earlier era, French and German porcelain dolls, and a complete set of dolls from The Wizard of Oz.

Even the one inch tall penny dolls from the 1800s smile determinedly. They are so tiny that a dozen of them fit easily in their creator's hand.

Other dolls are more than three feet high, elaborately dressed in silks and satins, with human-hair wigs and finely detailed faces. They're all placed in settings that comprise a world fashioned especially for the tiny toys.

Betty Chase began collecting seriously in 1964, starting with dolls

passed down to her from her mother.

"She had quite a few dolls. She started to collect them, then gave it up. She gave some to me and from that beginning, the collection just grew," she says.

In 1978, Betty began making her own dolls when a friend gave her two molds.

"After I learned to make porcelain dolls from those molds, I began creating my own designs and making my own molds," she recalls.

"The bisque-head jointed dolls that I got from my mother are probably the most valuable," she continues. "But my own favorites are the baby dolls and the Shirley Temple."

There are quite a few Shirley Temple dolls dressed in their original clothes-- dolls that bring a wave of nostalgia to now-gray haired women who remember owning them in the 1930s when they were the Barbie dolls of their day. It was practically every little girls' wish that they would find a Shirley Temple doll under their Christmas tree.

"It's a wonder that some of them look this good. I used to comb their

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

hair a lot when I was little," Betty says, remembering the dolls that were her girlhood favorites.

The dolls are often on display at Alpena's Jesse Besser Museum, where the Northeast Michigan Doll Club has two permanent display cases filled with seasonal arrangements of dolls.

Betty's collection and the collector are featured in a short television production made by her granddaughter, Connie Higgison of Midland.

"Grandma's Dolls" includes a look at the collection, and interview with Betty and a demonstration of her restoration methods.

"Most of what I now know about restoring dolls, I learned by doing and making mistakes," she says, adding that she's always reading books and articles to increase her knowledge.

When an "orphan" comes to her, she carefully washes, painstakingly repairs and freshly dresses it - and to the grateful owner, it's better than new.

Their faces reflect days gone by, and Betty very carefully researches the era, to be sure the new clothing coincides with the correct dates - and even the fabrics themselves may be from that era.

"I've got a huge rag-bag," Betty chuckles.

Chase doesn't purchase new fabrics for the dolls' clothing but collects adult garments appropriate to the period and uses salvaged pieces to dress the dolls.

Watching her at work, one marvels at the infinite care she lavishes on each doll.

"The hardest part is peeling the old paint off. Each doll is different and each type of construction varies. Rubber disintegrates as it gets older, composition cracks and porcelain breaks.

You have to learn to repair all kinds," she says.

To make a new porcelain doll,

Betty begins by pouring liquid slip into a hollow mold. When that's dry, the mold is removed and the form is sanded with a nylon stocking - very delicately, then the piece is fired in the kiln. Finally, the face's features are added with small brushes, and another head smiles from it's place on the assembly table. Perhaps painted-on hair, or maybe a wig will be added later, depending upon what type of doll it is she's making, Betty says. The wigs may be made of human hair or perhaps mohair.

Finally, the dolls are dressed, usually from patterns Betty creates herself.

And why does she do it?

"I enjoy creating something that will last long after I'm gone," she says simply.

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
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## Heading south for sun? Get off the beaten path and savor real America

near Lexington and the food and crafts of Beria, but I asked Mary Augusta Rodgers for an insider's itinerary.

Mary is the author of *Country Roads of Kentucky*, which will be published by Country Roads Press this spring, so she's my local expert. You may not want to divert down the Ohio River to her favorite Kentucky town--- Maysville --- but how about these suggestions:

\*The Dinsmore Homestead, 10 miles south of Covington near Florence and 6.5 miles west on Kentucky-18, gives you an intimate look at turn-of-the-century farm life and the virgin forest nearby.

\*Fort Boonesborough State Park, off Exit 95 has a replica of the fort built by Daniel Boone when he came through the Cumberland Gap. Enjoy the crafts and a video of the fort's pioneer days.

Interstate-75 is like a narrow tunnel running through America from the Canadian border to the Gulf of Mexico, although you won't see much of it if you stay in your car, listen to the rumble of traffic and watch those green highway signs go by.

If you want to savor the river towns of Ohio and Kentucky, the mountains of Kentucky and Tennessee, the historic villages of Georgia and the warm pleasures of Florida, you must put your turn signal on.

There are some obvious pleasures right on I-75: the Neil A. Armstrong Air and Space Museum, two hours south of Detroit in Wapakoneta, Ohio, and the Air Force Museum in Dayton, for example, but you probably won't be ready for a major stop until you approach southern Ohio.

That's when it's worth a detour, 10 miles east to the Golden Lamb in Lebanon, oldest inn in the state. Whether you enjoy the old fashioned dining room and bar, or stay overnight amid the Shaker furniture, you'll probably take a second detour...to the antique shops in Warren County.

It's a half hour drive straight south into Cincinnati. If you've never had Cincinnati chili, here's your chance. Cross the Ohio River on the Roebling bridge and stop in Covington, Kentucky, before you resume your drive down I-75.

I know some of the obvious pleasures of roadside Kentucky, including the Kentucky Horse Park

\*The White Hall State Historic Site, home of Cassius Marcellus Clay, lawyer and anti-slavery activist under Abraham Lincoln.

\*Richmond, a charming old town with a strong southern flavor, the home of Eastern Kentucky University and several Civil War battles. Take exit 90A. Bybee Pottery is worth the nine-mile detour on Kentucky-52.

\*Activate those turn signals at Corbin for Cumberland Falls State Resort Park, 30 miles away via US 25 W and Ky-90. You'll find a "wild river, a thundering waterfall that produces one of the only two 'moonbows' in the world; smaller waterfalls, a lake, a wilderness area; all this surrounded by the Daniel Boone National Forest and some stunning mountain scenery."

Harlan Sanders Cafe and Museum is also off exit 29 in Corbin, the birthplace of Kentucky Fried Chicken.

\*Take exit 11, 11 miles north of the Tennessee border, to Bailey's country store, what Mary calls "a quick mix of country, gospel and bluegrass music, weather and fishing reports, jokes, comments and items for sale or trade."

You are only in Tennessee for 175 miles, with a sharp left turn at Knoxville, but don't go too fast. It's only 50 miles west to the Cumberland Plateau, which cuts a 50-mile-wide swath through the state.

There's Fall Creek Falls State Park near Pikeville. The wonderful Cumberland General Store at the junction of highways 68 and 127; that's four miles south of Crossville and Cumberland Mountain State Park.

Forty miles north of Crossville you will find the English Colony of Rugby, founded in 1880 by the author of "Tom Brown's Schooldays" and still the site of 17 of the original 70 buildings.

Go on another 35 miles northwest on Highway 127 and you will find the Alvin C. York Grist Mill, tended by a son of the famous World War One hero made famous in the movies by Gary Cooper. When you finally wander back to I-75 at Chattanooga, it will be time to visit the Chattanooga Choo-Choo, a railway station turned into a food-drink-shopping center with hotel rooms in train cars nearby.

You won't even know that you've crossed the border into Georgia when you climb the road to Lookout Mountain and Rock City, with its breathtaking panoramas, underground caves and ancient rock formations.

Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee and Georgia all offer a bonanza in many of their state parks: lodges and cabins ranging from rustic to almost elegant. You can exit at Dalton, Georgia, for the 25-mile run to the cottages of Fort Mountain State Park, for example, or to the rustic hilltop lodge called Cohutta Lodge.

The Obvious Pleasures Department obviously includes Atlanta, but if you are turning off-road, do it by following the Andersonville Trail off highway 49 to the Andersonville National Historic Site and other places. You can eat at Yoders and take the last river ferry in Georgia free at Marshallville, visit the American Camellia Society gardens in

Perry.

A longer detour via I-85 and I-15 will take you to Columbus and other places. Other Places mean Calloway Gardens, 2500 acres of gardens, wilderness, pond, resort accommodations, golf course and other amenities 30 miles north of Columbus. And it means Warm Springs, where President Franklin D. Roosevelt had his summer cottage hideaway.

You started for the sun and eventually you will be in Florida. Stay on I-75 and you'll hit Tampa and the Obvious Pleasures of the gulf coast. Less obvious might be some of the beautifully restored hotels around St. Petersburg or the 'inland' pleasures of Polk County.

When you get to Walt Disney

World in Orlando, the most obvious pleasure of all, please note: Disney offers a new length of stay pass to those who stay in hotels within the vacation kingdom.

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We both know you are too grown up for the Magic Kingdom but you can always find a kid to take you to the newest attraction, Splash Mountain. Take a towel.

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# Victorian designs still make scents

basically began after the Civil War and flourished because of our ties to England.

It was in this period that lace-edged nosegays and Tussy-Mussys, tight hand-held arrangements of flowers, were carried by fashionable Victorian ladies.

"They served a practical purpose," Morgan pointed out, "for Victorians walked around sniffing them to cover up the scents of the streets."

Speaking on "Victorian Floral Arrangements" in the first lecture of a week-long series being held in conjunction with the fourth annual

antiques show at St. James Episcopal Church of Birmingham last month. Morgan reminded those attending that sanitation and sewers were non-existent in the period.

He also noted that before 1867 roses had lots of fragrance. "They had fewer and smaller petals but were more fragrant than roses of today."

As he talked, Morgan created a Tussy-Mussy of deep red roses by criss-crossing their long stems as he held the arrangement right at the blooms.

"It's really a swirling motion," he explained as the stems fanned out. The completed Tussy-Mussy contained 21 roses. Morgan then cut the stems short and placed it in a small-neck crystal vase and tied a length of deep green organdy ribbon around the neck in a bow with flowing streamers.

"Organdy or chiffon ribbons are a way to make your arrangements look very romantic and Victorian," he suggested.

Acknowledging that most people want a larger, "showy" arrangement if they are spending as much as \$50 for it, Morgan illustrated how to fill a silver epergne of three small cone-shaped vases, using different flowers in each. Tea roses, lilies and other flowers grown in their greenhouses would have been used by Victorians, Morgan related.

Morgan noted that, as a florist,

he finds the Victorian period interesting because the industrial revolution made it possible to mass produce greenhouses with iron and glass so that they became very popular. Prior to this, he added, greenhouses, which existed from Roman times, were only for the very

Dale Morgan, a partner in the Blossoms flower shops of Birmingham, Berkley and Grosse Pointe, Michigan is a young man who has been researching and recreating floral designs from the romantic Victorian period.

In the United States, he says, this

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rich.

One of the most popular plants to be grown in the greenhouses, he said, was the palm tree. "Virtually every Victorian house had one," Morgan noted. "Orchids also became popular in the period," Morgan continued, noting that today there are 18,000 varieties. He used six miniature orchid sprays to create another arrangement in a single silver cone vase, adding a few green bear-grass sprays to complete it. "For about \$10 worth of miniature orchids you can have a Victorian centerpiece," he noted.

Morgan said he liked using the bright orchid sprays because "Victorians liked strong color - their houses were often gaudy. The brightly painted Victorian houses in San Francisco are closer to the truth than the conventional white usually seen."

Acknowledging that most households probably don't have antique silver containers for flowers, Morgan mentioned that silver plate imports from India are available. "India is doing a great job manufacturing good quality silver plate at reasonable prices," he said, citing the silver vase he was filling, which was priced at \$10.

Another inexpensive container for a Victorian arrangement was a watering can made of wood twigs. "It's priced at \$9 at our shop - a similar one was on the cover of *Architectural Digest* in a green Tudor revival house's plant room last year," he

mentioned.

He suggested using a glass liner and filling it with cascades of ivy.

Morgan also completed a larger arrangement in a reproduction dolphin-base container with the flowing ivy. This he filled with forsythia branches.

Branches of forsythia in the garden can be brought inside now for forcing as forsythia needs only one frost and can be forced in about two and a half weeks, the florist said, noting that quince also can be forced in four to six weeks. Forsythia bushes benefit from being cut and should be cut back yearly to about one third of their size as the blooms come on the new growth, he advised.

As he demonstrated, Morgan offered many practical suggestions for making and preserving arrangements:

\* Mash the stems of woody flowers such as forsythia and lilacs so they can absorb water - they will last much longer.

\* Pull all the leaves off your roses and most flowers so they don't take water away from the bloom (Tulips are an exception).

\* Use a liner in your container to make arranging easier - horseradish jars are great, just the right shape.

\* Make your table arrangement low enough to see over, a rule of thumb is to place your elbow on the table and have it no higher than your fingertips.

\* Always cut your stems on an

angle to best absorb water.

Put a dot of bleach in the water of an arrangement to keep bacteria from growing and turning it dark.

Consider using three small matching containers of arrangements along your table in place of one large one.

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




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# What's cooking at Walloon Lake

Walloon Lake Village, Michigan — Grab your whisk, apron, and measuring spoons! They're serving up good times along with instruction at cooking schools throughout the Midwest.

Besides joining in classes that range from learning basic cooking techniques to creating delicate French pastries or preparing elegant desserts with chocolate, you'll relish the food, camaraderie, and fun. If you choose your school carefully, you also can turn your culinary adventure into a memorable winter getaway.

Plunging his hand into a bowl of chocolate cake batter, Chef David Beier quips, "It's more fun to mix it this way."

The 40-year-old, self-taught chef brings his cooking students right into his restaurant kitchen. "Talk till you're blue in the face, but unless you've *tried* something, you won't learn it," says David, owner of the 95-year-old Walloon Lake Inn, 60 miles north of Traverse City in northwestern Michigan.

Classes are small - three to five students - so everyone has a chance to whip, chop, knead, and taste. Students get their own ducks to truss and fish to fillet. Messy hands prove there's plenty of bowl licking and finger dripping.

"Take a taste, stick your fingers right in there," says David, encouraging class members to sample

the hollandaise sauce. "How is it? Does it need more salt? More lemon?"

As snow swirls outside and the kitchen warms up with aromas of bubbling stock and chocolate cakes, David swiftly moves from range to countertop, his rapid fire lecture peppered with anecdotes about knife-throwing chefs and 300-pound bakers he's known.

Looking out on the frozen lake, the group sits down to feast on its creations and to toast its accomplishments. Students leave with

recipes, bags of bones (for making stock), and David's hot-line number (in case the mousse flops).

David started his school in this Michigan resort area in 1986. Vacationers combine classes with schussing down nearby slopes or cross-country skiing. Classes run Tuesdays-Fridays (4 hours a day) and cost about \$400 per person with lodging at the inn (\$220 without).

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
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

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# NASA exhibit lands at Cranbrook

Bloomfield Hills, Michigan—

From the time when space travel was nothing more than imaginative tales to the first step on the moon and beyond - the story of space exploration is documented in Cranbrook Institute of Science's newest exhibit: *The Space Story*.

The exhibit, on display from now until May, includes more than 70 photographs tracing the history of space travel and miniature replicas of the Space Shuttle and Launch Pad, Skylab, the Hubble Space Telescope and liquid-fuel engines used in the Apollo-Saturn program all on loan from NASA. In addition, the exhibit includes two actual heat tiles, used to protect the shuttle's exterior from high temperatures when it re-enters the earth's atmosphere, and an Apollo moon suit.

The color and black and white photographs highlight a variety of historical moments, including the three-day flight of Russian Valentina Tereshkova, the first woman in space, America's first attempt at a satellite launch which quickly ended in an explosion and, America's first walk in space taken by astronaut Ed White. The collection includes breathtaking photos of planets and moons never seen before with ground-based telescopes.


Futuristic photos of Space Station Freedom, a permanent laboratory stationed in space where astronauts will one day live and work for up to six months, completes the collection.

In addition to NASA, other collectors contributing to the display are the International Plastic Modelers Society-Livonia Chapter, the Smithsonian Institution, Space Commerce Corporation, GW Aerospace, Boeing Defense and Space Group, the European Space Agency, Arianspace and some private collectors.

*The Space Story* is an extension of Cranbrook's *Destination: Space*, a life-size simulation of a space station. Visitors can see what its like to eat and sleep in a Crew Module, gather important scientific data in an Exploration Module, and monitor navigation and oversee operations in a Flight Control Module.

*The Space Story* and *Destination: Space* are open to the public until May. Museum admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for children and seniors. Children under age three are admitted free.

Cranbrook Institute of Science is open Monday through Thursday 10 a.m.-5 p.m., Friday and Saturday 10 a.m.-10 p.m. and Sunday 1-5 p.m. For




**MOON MODULE—** *The Apollo Command/Service Module was created by a member of IPMS-Livonia. Astronauts travel to the moon seated in the front section.*

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## View surface of Venus at Midland exhibit hall

Midland, Michigan—

The Hall of Ideas is pleased to announce the presentation of *Venus Unveiled: Images From the Magellan Mission*, a photographic exhibit featuring dramatic radar imagery of the Venusian surface gathered by NASA's Magellan spacecraft.

The exhibit will be in the Hall of Ideas through Feb. 15, and includes images of the "Tick," a volcanic structure of a type never before seen in the solar system. Also see the "Crater Farm," a region of young craters probably formed by meteors slamming into the planet's surface, and "Arachnoids," peculiar geological features resembling giant spider webs 30 to 142 miles in diameter.

Because the sulphur-yellow clouds enshrouding Venus were too dense for an ordinary camera to "see" through, Magellan used a radar system that penetrated the clouds to reveal the surface of the planet below. Scientists are particularly interested in the surface of Venus because of what it reveals about the planet's past. Some theorize that in the distant past, Venus may have had large bodies of water, but that events in the planet's geological history may have contributed to a runaway greenhouse effect, leading to vast changes in the

planet's climate and the ultimate loss of the planet's water. There are concerns that a similar process could someday take place on Earth spurred on by either human or geological activities.

The Magellan spacecraft was launched from the Space Shuttle *Atlantis* on May 4, 1989, and arrived at Venus on Aug. 10, 1990. During the first 8-month mapping cycle, the radar instrument obtained images of 84 percent of Venus's surface. Mapping continues, filling gaps in coverage from the first cycle and covering Venus's south pole for the first time. Taken together, Magellan's data will permit the fit global geological analysis of Venus.

People of all ages are urged to view *Venus Unveiled* to get their first close-up look at earth's twin planet. The Hall of Ideas, located inside the Midland Center for the Arts at 1801 W. St. Andrews, is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays and from 1 to 5 p.m. weekends. Phone 517-631-5930 to schedule your group tour. There is no charge for tours booked two weeks in advance.


Co-curators of "Perpetual Campaign" are Howard Morrison, museum programs specialist at the

# Women's Center puts nurses in spotlight

Lansing, Michigan—  
From the Civil War through today, nursing's history and its social, economic and cultural context have been largely overlooked.

"Inside Michigan Nursing", a new exhibit at the Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame, will focus on the invisible history of nursing in Michigan. It will highlight

the connection between women's history and nursing history.

On display through February, the exhibit will focus on nursing's contribution to society. It will also address its struggle to achieve higher standards of education, greater social and cultural recognition, and more autonomy in work.

The display focuses on different aspects of nurse's work including private duty, public health, military and hospital work. Photos, uniforms and documents from the early history of the Sparrow Hospital's School of Nursing (1899-1961) will be included in the exhibit.

The exhibit strives to increase the awareness of larger issues surrounding the history of nursing in Michigan through the use of photographs, documents and artifacts collected by nursing historians throughout Michigan.

Involved with the development of this project are the following: Peggy Kahn, the exhibits Project Director and Department of Political Science, University of Michigan - Flint; Sheila Abood, Director of Government Affairs, Michigan Nurses Association; Lu Ervast, Department of Nursing, Northern Michigan University; Elizabeth H. Giese, Education Director, Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame; Pat Jennings, member of the Education Committee of the Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame and nurse in the 1950s trained at the Grace Hospital School of Nursing; Eleanor Smith, a registered nurse who served in the Navy Nurse Corps and was a member of the Sparrow Hospital Woman's Board for 25 years; Louise Selanders, College of Nursing, Michigan State University of

Michigan; Linda Strodman, School of Nursing, University of Michigan; Paula Stofer, Lawrence Technological University humanities professor specializing in the history of midwives in Michigan; and Kathy, registered nurse and assistant professor, Michigan State University, School of Labor and Industrial Relations.

The Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame is located at 213 West Main Street, Lansing, (517) 484-1880, six block south of the Capitol. Special tours may be arranged for groups of 10 or more. Regular visiting hours are Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, from noon to 5 p.m. and Sunday from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

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
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# Musical performances add to Super Bowl's appeal

The long and winding road to Super Bowl XXVII ends at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif., on Sunday, Jan. 31, when NBC presents the spectacle and pageantry that is the NFL's championship game. This year's game features performances by several popular music stars, as the league hopes to keep viewers tuned to what has often become a lopsided game.

Dick Enberg and Bob Trumpy provide play-by-play and color commentary for the game, while Bob Costas, O.J. Simpson, Will McDonough and Bill Parcells handle pregame duties.

More than 101,000 fans will pack the Rose Bowl to view the game while another 1.3 billion watch on television from a record number of almost 100 countries around the world.

Country music star Garth Brooks is scheduled to sing the national anthem as actress Marlee Matlin signs for the hearing impaired. Fleetwood Mac regroups for part of NBC's two-and-a-half-hour pregame extravaganza, and the "Gloved One" himself, Michael Jackson, highlights the halftime show.

The league apparently felt the need to land a big-name superstar like Jackson to prevent a repeat of last year's ratings fiasco, when many switched to Fox's *In Living Color* halftime special and never returned for the second half. Jackson appears in the production without compensation, although the NFL will make a charitable contribution to his Heal the World Foundation.

"What appealed to Michael is that in one (performance) you reach so many people," says Don Mischer, producer of Jackson's halftime show. "No other show on television can equal that in terms of potential impact or reach."

Getting Jackson's message across will be a logistical nightmare for Mischer. His production team has exactly five minutes to set up a full-blown 75-square-foot concert stage, complete with audio, lighting and pyrotechnics. The stage, which will be divided into 22 pieces to fit through the stadium's nine feet high and 12 feet wide door, will have to

be put together in three minutes and 10 seconds. A crew of nearly 1,500 people has practiced the maneuver many times at a local high-school field to perfect the timing. A large tarp protects the field for the second half. After Jackson's 10-minute show, the crew will have five minutes to remove the stage.

And don't forget there is a game to be played amid all the hype and hoopla, a game that is the culmination of a long NFL season.

"This is the year of the teams that refused to quit," says Steve Sabol, president of NFL Films, who has spent the last few weeks reviewing over 600 miles of film to prepare his annual *Road to the Super Bowl* special, which airs in syndication. "This season had all the determination, the resolution, the believing in yourself and staying the course. It's been a laborer's season of dirty hands, broad shoulders and hard work.

"You can see that, not only in teams like the Bills and their remarkable comeback against the Oilers in the playoffs, but in a team like the Chargers, who started out 0-4 and came back to make the playoffs," says Sabol.

Sabol also cites the individual performances of players like Steve Young of the San Francisco 49ers, who this year has emerged from Joe Montana's shadow to become the league's Most Valuable Player and highest-rated quarterback. He sees it in the Pittsburgh Steelers' Barry Foster as well, the seventh-round draft choice who led the AFC in rushing this year. That same spirit is embodied in Foster's coach, Bill Cowher, the NFL's Coach of the Year, who, because of his own enthusiasm, was able to shape the team in his image and turn the Steeler program around.

San Francisco's Jerry Rice continued his Hall of Fame march to Canton, Ohio, by becoming the NFL's all-time leading receiver in career touchdowns, and the Washington Redskins' Art Monk surpassed former Seattle Seahawk Steve Largent to become the league's all-time reception yardage leader. The Dallas Cowboys' Emmitt Smith was the NFL's leading rusher for the second-consecutive year, while Green Bay's

Sterling Sharpe led all receivers in yardage gained in 1992.

This season will most likely be remembered for the Buffalo Bills' amazing 32-point comeback victory over the Houston Oilers in the AFC wild-card game.

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

## A man, his school and his sport



Sports fans who don't normally tune to PBS won't want to miss *Knut Rockne and His Fighting Irish*, airing Monday, Jan. 25, on PBS' *The American Experience*. The show profiles one of the master motivators in the history of sports and the man given credit for bringing football out of the dark ages.

The special, narrated by Joe Mantegna, uses vintage newsreel footage along with interviews with historians, biographers, coaches and former players to separate the man from the myth. Viewers will discover the facts behind Rockne's "win one for the Gipper" speech and whether or not he invented the forward pass or was the first to put numbers on players' jerseys.

Rockne was first and foremost a coach, leading Notre Dame to 105 wins, 12 losses and five ties during his 13-year tenure. His record boasts five undefeated seasons, three national championships and a .881 winning percentage that still stands as the best in college football history.

When Rockne went to Notre Dame as a student in 1910, it was just a small, Catholic school of only 400 students. The football stadium had wooden bleachers, no bathrooms and seated only 2,500.

## Versatile Holbrook has Twain to thank



Combatting rumors, Mark Twain once wrote that "reports of my death have been greatly exaggerated."

Since 1959, actor Hal Holbrook has delivered the subtle, biting remark over 2,000 times in performances of his acclaimed one-man show, *Mark Twain Tonight*. But from Broadway to television, critical praise for Holbrook's talent has required no exaggeration at all.







### Wayans may part from Fox; more comic-book heroes on film

Keenan Ivory Wayans, creator of the sketch comedy show *In Living Color*, is reportedly ending his exclusive TV and film contract with 20th Century Fox. Sources say Wayans is not happy with the censorship of the series and the network's decision to run repeats from the first season without his consent. The move means giving up his position as producer of the series, which features Wayans siblings Damon, Kim and Shawn in its cast.

Happy happy, joy joy. *Ren & Stimpy* creator John Kricfalusi, who was fired from the animated series by Nickelodeon, has been talking to Warner Bros. about producing theatrical shorts. The cartoons would star George Liquor, a character who appeared once on *Ren & Stimpy*, and Jimmy the Hapless Boy, whom he had unsuccessfully pitched to Nickelodeon years ago.

Marvel comic-book heroes will come to life in Hollywood for several live-action films. Director James Cameron (*Terminator 2*) is spinning the web for a *Spiderman* flick, while Oliver Stone (*JFK*) is plugging an *Electra Assassin* project and Wes Craven (*A Nightmare on Elm Street*) will conjure up *Dr. Strange*. Other live-action films in development will present the exploits of the X-Men, the Incredible Hulk, the

Fantastic Four and Ghost Rider.

Censorship in the media is the focus of the one-hour E! Entertainment Television news documentary *In Censors We Trust*, airing Sunday, Jan. 24. 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
