Kids take heart for health

Students at Moraine Elementary got a jump-start on learning about helping others last week.

The students participated in Jump Rope for Heart, an annual fundraiser in Northville to benefit the American Heart Association.

Extent of contamination at Cal's still unknown

Soil at the former Cal's Car Care service station has been sampled for contaminants, but the extent of contamination at the site will not be known for two weeks.

Preliminary tests indicate the contamination at 202 W. Main Street is not severe.

Five known underground storage

tanks were removed from the site Jan. 25 — one 8,000-gallon, two 5,000-gallon and two 500-gallon tanks. The tanks had been used for storage of gasoline, waste oil and fuel oil. Excavators also found a sixth, smaller tank that had not been used in years.

The excavators hauled away 80 cubic yards of soil, and filled the holes with clean fill.

None of the storage tanks had

leaked, according to Northville businessman Charles Lapham, who is monitoring the cleanup.

But, Lapham said, "there's definite contamination at the (fuel pump) island."

A Jan. 15 state police report filed with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources noted that "organic vapor" was detected during hand auger borings at the site.

An initial abatement report filed

with the DNR by ATEC Associates, Inc. of Novi found "no . . . vapors or free product detected in nearby sewers, basements, footings, utility trenches or other subsurface structures."

ATEC personnel took 21 soil samples from around the site, at depths between 4-12 feet. The samples are being tested for the presence of benzene, toluene, ethylbenzene and total xylenes (BTEX) commonly asso-

ciated with gasoline and other petroleum-based fuels, polynuclear aromatic hydrocarbons (PNAs) which are often associated with diesel fuel, polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) used in industrial processes, cadmium, chromium and lead.

ATEC will file a more detailed report with the DNR by March 1, including data on the nature and quantity of contaminants released, sur-

rounding properties that may be affected, and a cleanup schedule.

Ben Matthews, an environmental quality analyst in the DNR's Livonia office, said the testing seems to be proceeding properly.

"They submitted the required 20-day report on time (and) their 45-day report isn't due yet," he said.

"As near as I can determine it was all done accurately."

Manager issue to be discussed

The Northville Township board will hold a special meeting tonight to set parameters in the search for a new township manager.

The board will meet at 8 p.m. at township hall, 41600 Six Mile Road. Trustee Mark Abbo said the meeting is intended to "get the ball rolling" on the search for a new township manager.

"We want to figure out where we are going to place ads, review the job description and figure out who is go-

ing to be on the committee to review the applicants," Abbo said Friday.

Abbo said Treasurer Rick Engelland and Trustee Barbara O'Brien called the meeting late last week.

On Thursday, Township Supervisor Karen Baja said she had talked with Engelland about the request for

the special meeting but told him then she thought it could wait until the board's regular monthly meeting March 11.

But Abbo said "it's too important. We need to move as quickly as possible."

When asked what the hurry was to

get the position advertised, Abbo was vague but did say "a month is a long time to wait."

The township manager's issue ignited an angry outburst from Baja at the board's last meeting, Feb. 11. Baja balked at Abbo's motion to seek applicants for the job, and asked that the motion be tabled. Engelland called for a vote and the motion passed 4-3, with Baja, Clerk Sue Hillebrand, and Trustee Gini Britton opposing. That motion overturned an earlier one that sent the issue to committee for review and recommendation.

Baja thinks it over; decides not to resign

Township Supervisor Karen Baja said she's made a decision to stay on as the township's top elected official.

Earlier in the week it was still a toss-up as to whether she would remain in the position or resign after her temper flared at the Feb. 11 board meeting.

"I'm going to stick with it, but I'm going to do it a lot differently than I did it before. I'm certainly not going to put in 50-60 hours up here anymore," she said about the 20-hour a week, part-time elected seat.

Baja said she regrets calling township board members "incompetent idiots" at the meeting but has no other regrets.

"I make no apologies," she said. "My only regret is calling them idiots. I feel no shame. I have a temper and I need to learn to curb it."

"I would probably have resigned if I were hearing from department heads and staff that they didn't think I was doing my job. But that isn't the case and no citizens have said it either."

Baja got angry after the board voted 4-3 to seek applications to fill the township manager's position. Earlier this year, officials appointed a committee to study the post and determine if the township still needed a full-time manager.

Even though some of the board members and Baja have repeatedly clashed over the need for a manager, Baja said she's not one to hold a

grudge and will be open to the board's discussion of the topic tonight (see related story).

"With my temper, I blow and it's over," she said. "It isn't an excuse for my behavior, but it happened and it's over."

Baja said the bulk of her comments made at the Feb. 11 meeting were meant to criticize the behavior of all seven board members — including herself.

"Quite frankly all seven of us owe each other an apology. There isn't a single one of us that acted totally professional, appropriately or properly last Thursday," Baja said.

Baja: Attacks led to loss of temper

Northville Township Supervisor Karen Baja said Tuesday she lost her temper at the Feb. 11 township board meeting because she feels she's constantly being attacked, questioned, and criticized by other board members.

The township supervisor, who called her fellow board members "incompetent idiots" before storming out of the room, said she'd had it with the board's repeated attacks and scrutinization of everything she's done since taking the supervisor's seat in November.

In a taped interview, Baja shared her side of the story and talked about what's been going on behind the scenes that contributed to her outburst.

What follows is the text of the interview, with minor editing changes for length and clarity.

RECORD: What has happened with the board of trustees since the

new board took over?

BAJA: It becomes a male-female issue almost every time, unfortunately, in my opinion. It becomes the boys against the girls.

RECORD: Why is that? Let's go back for a minute. Did you know any of these people beforehand?

BAJA: No, I didn't. I didn't even know Clerk (Sue) Hillebrand. I had worked on the planning commission and on a couple of committees with Barbara O'Brien. That is the only one that I had really known before. But I have refereed (Treasurer) Rick Engelland in sporting activities over the years and know him as a member of the community. I did not know (Trustee) Mark Abbo. I did not know (Trustee) Mr. (Russell) Fogg. I knew who they were, but I did not know them personally in any way, shape or form.

I did not come out in support of or non support of anybody who was running or not running. I ran inde-

Baja says trustees attack but lack work ethic

penderly and I'm not doing anything differently now than I did then, or I've done on any of the boards I've ever served on.

I have always spoken my mind. Emotion has been involved, but I don't think to the point that it's obscured facts or made my decision-making process irrational. When pushed, I react. No doubt about it. And I will be the first to admit that it's an area that I could use work on.

RECORD: What happened Feb. 11 to bring you to that breaking point? It seems that it had been building throughout the meeting.

BAJA: I found the whole attorney selection process to be highly unprofessional and very rude to the committee the way it was handled. Not one board member that was not on the committee took the time to give us any questions they would like to have asked. (Trustee) Gini Britton came for a couple of the interviews. She is the only one who even came to any of the interviews or even submitted questions for us to ask. If cost was such a great big issue with Mr. Abbo and Mr. Engelland why wasn't that asked to be the number one criteria? It wasn't. I never heard at any public meeting that he would like a list of the criteria used so he could critique it. And if he was that concerned he should have asked to be on the committee or be kept up to date more so than they were. And believe me they were kept up to date, every step of the way.

The committee has met, formed a list of criteria and ranked them in priority. We had 24 responses. Using that criteria we short-listed to nine. That would have been the time for Mr. Abbo to say, "Excuse me, what were the criteria used?" If he didn't already know.

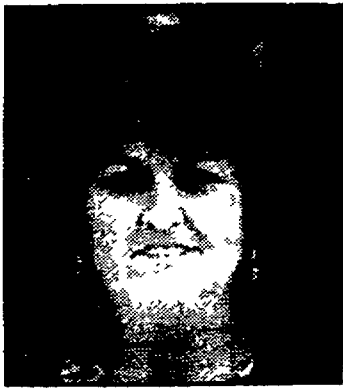
(Trustee) Mrs. (Barbara) O'Brien slipped a note, a hand-written note, during the meeting. First of all she wasn't supposed to hear what was debated. I left the room and removed myself from even hearing what took place. Mrs. O'Brien stood in the hallway and at least listened to everything. I guess that's a matter of style. Anyway, she came back and wrote a note to Mr. Abbo which I happened to oversee, which said Don Samhat (the head of selection committee) was Karen Baja's campaign manager, as if that somehow colored or made the process less valid. Don Samhat is the

gentleman who encouraged me to run for this position. He served in name only as my campaign manager. He was very busy with youth baseball league during the campaign and another lady basically took over and did the work. But Don was very supportive. When the committee was announced, the reason Mr. Samhat was chosen is because he is an attorney and because he serves on the zoning board of appeals. I tried to pick from the three main boards or commissions that would be using the law firm the most — planning commission, board of trustees, and the zoning board of appeals. And then I picked a citizen at large — which was, by the way — Mr. Fogg's recommendation. That particular citizen, again, was an ex-attorney with a municipal background and a township resident. I thought, great. I don't recall one board member voicing an opinion pro or con concerning the committee, other than to vote their unanimous approval. I don't remember a single committee member being upset that Don Samhat was on it because he was my campaign manager. I don't recall a single board member saying in a public meeting that they wanted cost to be the number one issue or criteria to be considered. But then for board members to critique their committee to me means that they don't trust what the committee has done. And that's where I have a real problem.

RECORD: Where do you think that mistrust is coming from? Do you feel it's personal?

BAJA: I don't know because frankly I don't think Sue (Hillebrand) and I have done anything to warrant this distrust. We have tried to keep this board informed more than any other administration has ever done. And it's all come back to haunt us, to be perfectly honest. Any memo we send out strictly for board of trustees' purview ends up in the (news) paper, ends up in a public format which it's not intended to be. I have board members calling you and giving you hours worth of their versions of what's going on. Mr. Abbo didn't call

me and say, "Karen, I'm asking that this (township manager issue) gets put back on Thursday night's agenda, and here's why. I don't want you to interpret it as I don't think you aren't doing a good job, or (that) I don't trust you. I think it should be readressed." If they had, I might have made sure it got put on the agenda earlier in the evening so it wasn't at 11:15 p.m. that it came up. But I was not given that courtesy at all. He called the clerk and asked for it to be put on the agenda. She asked for something in writing first and it never got delivered.

RECORD: Is that the normal process a board member would go through to get something put on the agenda: to go through the clerk's office and not through you?

BAJA: I don't know what the normal process is. I just hoped that even if they called the clerk they might give me the courtesy of calling me also. I am there almost 12 hours every day. I am not that difficult to get a hold of. No one else seems to have trouble getting a hold of me except Barbara O'Brien. And that's because frankly I don't think she's tried to get a hold of me. You and I sometimes don't do it as quickly as we'd like, but I think I've always followed up with a call back or tried to get back to you.

RECORD: That's not entirely true. There have been instances when phone calls have not been returned to us or to others right away.

BAJA: All right, I'm not saying it might not be as quickly as you'd like. I'm not denying that. We have a lot going on. Township manager or not, that is a full-time job. I can't even be at everything I'm by law committed to be at as a voting member and do it within 20 hours a week. It can't be done.

RECORD: What is your opinion on the township manager issue?

BAJA: I was angered Thursday because of Mark (Abbo) bringing it back up when we had already discussed it at the previous meeting for hours. I thought that he should have allowed the committee a chance to go forward with their function. I know for a fact that board members were polled by certain trustees to have that change in vote happen. I think that's very underhanded. You can ask every single trustee, and other than the township manager's contract not being renewed, I have never called and polled the board members and tried to get them to vote one way.

RECORD: Mark Abbo called all the board members?

BAJA: I'm saying one of our male board members polled the rest of the board.

RECORD: With the exception of you?

BAJA: Oh yes. I'm never polled. And very often Sue isn't either. We have a 5-2 battle, or situation that has turned into a battle, and I think part of that is just natural because Sue and I are there every day. So we bring a different perspective to it. I really resent someone who comes to one meeting a month dictating or criticizing what they don't know without doing more research and finding what does go on. I have said, how many times, "The department heads are available for you people to call and to ask questions. You get your packets the Friday before the meeting. At the very least you get them the Monday before. Call. Read your packets. If you have a question about the police budget call and ask the police chief. If you don't understand something about the fire department call and ask the fire chief. If you don't understand the zoning ordinance, call and ask."

RECORD: What you are saying is that in the instances like this month when Mark Abbo asked his question about the bills payable, you think that the time to do that is not at the regular meeting?

BAJA: No. If he still is unclear or he wishes to say "I think this needs more investigation," or "I'm not happy with this," but I know he hasn't called the police chief first. Often times when it's explained nobody has any further problem, and we've just spent 15-20 minutes shuffling through papers, first of all to find the question we wanted to ask. And we are paying those department heads to sit at those meetings to be available to answer a question that could be asked prior to that.

RECORD: Department heads are paid above and beyond their salaries to sit at board meetings?

BAJA: They get comp time for their meetings at night. Now I haven't heard one of our money-oriented board members being concerned ab-

out that happening.

RECORD: Why do you think the township manager's position has become such a divisive issue?

BAJA: I think it's become a matter for all the times I've been accused of being incompetent and unqualified. I think just the opposite has happened. I think that some of the members of the board feel that by my being as informed as I am and as knowledgeable as I am and being there every day, I am somehow becoming more powerful than they are and that my vote carries more weight than their vote. It's not true. But I think even on an unconscious level there's the feeling of that. I think they feel that having a township manager will keep me from being perceived as this powerful person, which is a fallacy because I still have one vote.

I think that they have not been up there on a day-to-day basis. They have not polled the department heads or staff. They have not asked them, "What do you think would best for the running of the township?" They are the ones running their departments. You don't need a township manager to run the departments. We have very competent, qualified people running their departments. And you need a supervisor to supervise if the department isn't being run. You don't need the middle man. You don't need the township manager to be in the middle of that process. Our history in Northville Township has shown that we have had more problems than pluses with the four managers that we've had under the three different supervisors.

RECORD: What kind of problems?

BAJA: Communication. I am not going to be willing to be the middle man. I am not going to be the one held accountable with my name being signed to all the official documents if I'm not part of the decision-making process. That's like asking me to go to the bank and sign a blank loan agreement and let them fill it in later. The township manager, Mark says "If we carefully define what the role will be..." OK, great. But I'm the one that has to work side by side with

that person — or the supervisor does. The supervisor should have veto power over who that is. This theory that it keeps it from being political is just plain horse pucky. If you read the contract of the township manager, they serve at the discretion of the Board of Trustees. There is nothing to prevent any board — new or otherwise — at the end of the election to decide if that person stays on as township manager or not. It's the way it is set up. It doesn't provide continuity anymore than the day is long. In theory it sounds great. You'll have this township manager that's really professional and they'll run everything and then when the administration changes it won't affect that. The day to day running of the township will just go on. That's just b-----. That's just not reality.

RECORD: Don't you see Mark Abbo's point that it would be inappropriate to make a change in structure during your current term. The voters didn't vote you in as a full-time administrator.

BAJA: That's why it would go for public hearing to get the voters' reaction. You are right, we shouldn't do this without going through the public process. That is why that memo wasn't meant for the public yet. We were polling the board — or Sue was. I was asked to give my opinions also. It was the first step in what I saw as a very long process to take the time to look at things. In the meantime, I was willing to pick up the extra load and not be asked to be compensated for it. That's a separate issue even if there is a township manager or if there isn't.

I still feel that the supervisor is full-time and should be compensated accordingly. That may not happen within my term, but I don't think that means you can't look into it. Many things are changed within a term, and as long as you've done the public process and you've allowed the very voters that put you in power to give their opinion on it or voice their opinion, great.

I have never once asked for my position to be made full-time and to raise my pay. I have never said that. I don't think we need a township manager. The department heads are qualified to do the day to day operation of the township, always have been, and, if we continue to pay ap-

propriately, always will be. We don't need that \$40,000-50,000 township middle job. It's a waste of money in my opinion.

RECORD: Where do we go from here?

BAJA: There are a lot of things. There is another point I wish to go on the record with. When the question is called point of order, that's it. The vote is taken. No further discussion. Going back over the tapes (from the last meeting) Sue Hillebrand called the question more than once during the attorney debate and was totally ignored by her fellow board members. Had I been in that room, that

would not have been allowed to have happened. And that was totally unprofessional, totally rude, and totally inappropriate by the members of that board. It's part of what's making me very frustrated. And when you ask me how did I get to that point, I had been scolded earlier that day by one of our trustee members because he didn't care for something that I had said in a public meeting. I had his finger shook at me to the disgust of everyone else in the room that was involved in that meeting.

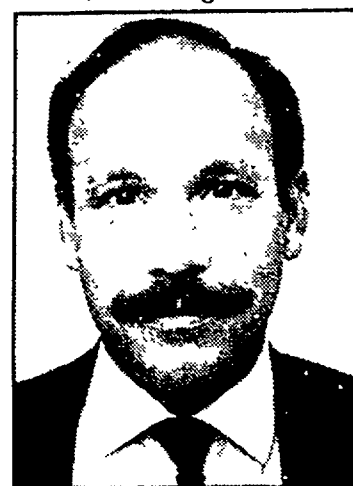
I feel we have a couple of board members that are in over their heads. I'm not going to name names but I think that they probably do not have the skills to be a board of trustee member.

RECORD: What skills, specifically?

BAJA: Ability to do homework, ability to process information, ability to take a packet home, read it, understand it, get their questions answered if they don't understand it, and come to a meeting professionally, on time and prepared. And this is not based just on one incident. This is based on repeated incidents.

I have never come to a board meeting and critiqued my fellow board members unless I am pushed. If I am pushed by Mrs. O'Brien when she repeatedly has no problems slamming me publicly, I will respond. I try to do it without swearing or getting emotional. Believe me if we want to start slinging dirt I think my arsenal is little bit fuller, and she'd end up being the muddier of the two. I have really tried very hard to not get into a mud-slinging match with her or anyone else. Or to come into a public format and go, "So and so didn't do this, and so and so didn't come prepared for that, and so and so came 45 minutes late to a professional meeting." I haven't done that, but I'm not afforded the same courtesy.

I would like to see us change, move forward, make change in an informed

way. I've been out on patrol with the police, I've gone to fires, I've tried to be at every commission meeting. I've tried to learn as much as I can. There is only maybe one other person, maybe two, that is approaching this with the same enthusiasm, time, vigor or commitment.

RECORD: Are those other two Clerk Hillebrand and Trustee Gini Britton?

BAJA: Yes. That is not to imply that the other board members aren't equally capable of doing that. I just personally haven't seen any evidence of that to date. And so for me then to go to a meeting when three of us have spent hours of unpaid, personal time to do things to sit and be critiqued from a non-basis of fact through a process that's been defined, and then at the very last step of the process a board member starts to critique the process, I find that highly frustrating. I sit back and think, "Wait a minute I have a young family. I have an opportunity to be living somewhere else and I am choosing to stay here because I think I can make progressive, forward change in this township." I'm not feeling that way anymore. I'm feeling that this has become the let's-tear-Karen-down-hour every Thursday night.

I am not a glutton for punishment. I could go out into the private sector and make a lot more money than I'm being paid at Northville. I made more refereeing volleyball than I make at Northville Township being supervisor. I did it as my four years of community service. However, I'm not doing the township of Northville any favors to do that job and be underpaid. Because then they will think they can always get someone and underpay them. And you will not get competent, qualified, people if you continue to underpay them.

I don't think we act in a professional manner, and when I get pushed, I'm equally as guilty. I feel I start out in a very professional manner and maybe my expectations are too high of my fellow board members. Maybe I'm guilty of expecting them to come prepared and ready to react from a basis of fact and rationality.

I have had no public outcry. They aren't lining up outside my door to tell me what a schmuck I am or how emotionally immature I am or how unprepared I am. I'm getting the opposite, not to toot my own horn. I'm getting people who are very impressed with the way I'm handling meetings, at the way I'm dealing with the county, at the way I'm conducting business during the day, at the open format there at township hall now, at the way staff is included in things and their input is asked for.

You limit your pool to draw from even for someone to run for this position by it being part-time and underpaid. It's underpaid as a part-time position. It pays \$23,000-\$24,000 something. It's nothing I count on. I'm not supporting the family on it. I know people have to, there are some

people in the world that have to. But they can't live in Northville Township. Not anywhere.

That's where I was at. I was truly frustrated. I was trying to let my frustration be known in a somewhat professional way. We all understand each other. This second-guessing and Monday-morning quarterbacking has got to stop.

We had three law firms now that are looking at us like, "Wait a minute. I was one of the top three firms a week ago and now I'm not one at all. I was one of the top two according to the paper. What happened?" What happened is you had a board member totally change his mind in less than a week. Now I didn't go to the board meeting and critique that person. And I'm not going to. So if you want to call me emotionally immature that's when you call me emotionally immature, when I start going and pick, pick, pick at these people like they do me. Yes I'm angered, I'm frustrated. I'm willing to ask, "Why am I doing this? Why is it, for fame? Is it to get my name in the paper every week in such a wonderful, adoring, beautiful way? Is it to make friends?" That's what that comment was, that I was going to take the long weekend to reconsider. I don't need to get beat up every Monday and Thursday and at every Thursday night board meeting.

I always give 150 percent to things. Do I resent not being compensated for it? Yes. Do I resent being told that I'm unqualified and I have no business trying to run the township? Yes. Not a single voter was saying that when they pushed my name.

RECORD: Yes, but did the voters vote for you as a part-time supervisor or full-time township manager?

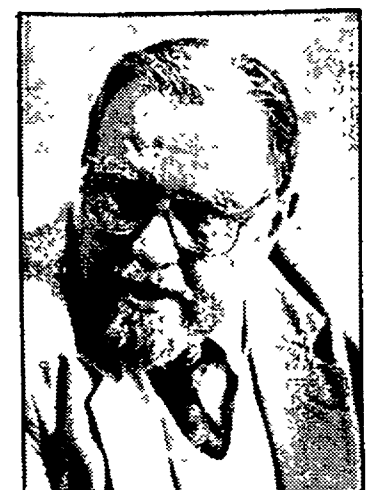
BAJA: I'm not trying to be the township manager. I already am the chief administrator even if we hire a township manager. I will still be, by law, the chief administrator, people. That's the fact, Jack. I didn't realize that was up for debate. That's by charter, that's by law. I'm the top dog. Whether you like it or not. Whether you make me part-time or full-time. Whether you pay me accordingly or you don't. Whether you have six township managers or you don't. Whether you have the department heads report to the township manager or you don't. I'm still the top dog for the next four years unless I get recalled, impeached or I resign. That's just a fact.

RECORD: Have you talked with any of the board members since the incident?

BAJA: I've spoken only with Mrs. Hillebrand because I value her opinion very much. She is an extremely intelligent woman, hard-working woman. I think we share a similar style. We are so very cautious to take everything back to the board because it is so nit-picked to death. I don't think it's from a basis of fact or reality either. It's like it's nit-picked just to be nit-picked. I don't think that's the case with the township

manager's position. I really think we have a division of philosophy here. I was not expecting to have all seven of us agree on everything. I have no problem with Mr. Abbo, Mr. Engelland or anyone else disagreeing with me or having a different point of view.

I'm certainly not going to come back with any new ideas because I'm very tired of the ideas I represent being automatically treated with suspicion. I have yet to say something in a public format — and I think the tapes and record would show that it's true, that I'm not paranoid here — I have yet to suggest something that isn't just lambasted up one side and down. For

no better reason than the fact that I am the one suggesting it. I have a real problem with that.

I think the BFI thing, again that might have been politically stupid if I was looking to get reelected, but I wasn't there representing Karen's private interests or the Napier Road residents' interests. I was trying to look at it for discussion purposes only for everyone in Northville Township.

We just went to a board of review conference in Riverview. Their town hall, their parks are absolutely gorgeous. They are a landfill host community. So is Canton. I don't think we need that. I'm not for monuments to government. I really would hate to see something like Canton has in Northville Township. I think it's unnecessary.

RECORD: I would like to highly encourage the residents to start coming to these meetings, or calling me, or writing me, or directing their homeowners associations to do so. Because I would like to know how they feel. I know how my board members feel and I quite frankly don't think it's a representation of the township. I think we have separate personal agendas going on up there. I think we have a lot of special interest kinds of things going on.

RECORD: Looking back on the last board meeting, do you regret anything you said?

BAJA: Yes, I regret calling the board members idiots on my way out. Otherwise, no. I fully thought we had adjourned before I got up to leave. I was not going to sit and get into a shouting match with Trustee Fogg. I just wasn't going to do it because I know I would have said things I would have regretted the next day. The hour was late. I had tried to get us to end at 11 p.m. before the township manager position even came up. Again, I don't know what more I can do. I'm not trying to run the meeting my way. But when I'm pushed, when I'm critiqued personally which happens every meeting by Mrs. O'Brien, I am going to react. I am not a perfect person. I realize my temper is quick and it gets me into trouble.

There are seven very strong personalities and that is good — if we are willing to work as a team. (But) we have a board member going on record saying, "Hey, I was only supposed to be here four hours a week and that's all I'm going to do." That's disgusting. Yes, I will be very vocal about that not only as a supervisor but also as a taxpayer and a resident. I would like to see the residents not rely so heavily on the (news) paper. Call, write, offer suggestions. Come up and sit in my office all day if you want and see what I do, and if you're getting your tax dollars worth. I highly encourage it.

Meads Mill offers religion research

A religion research center has been set up in the Centrum of Meads Mill Middle School. Well, at least temporarily.

Students in Brenda Irish's seventh grade class are currently getting an extra lesson in cultural diversity. They're studying the five major religions of the world.

"I'm trying to get the kids interested by using terms like 'research,'" Irish said. "It sounds more adult."

Students visit the "research" center and study religion books Irish has selected. Last week, they were finishing taking notes on Hinduism and Buddhism.

"The books are all out on the tables, and they can read magazines," she said.

The students have also been studying Christian, Islamic and Judaism faiths and beliefs.

Irish said the unit on religion fits in nicely with lessons of cultural diversity.

"It tells the kids that there is a comparison, looking at the religions, with our study of three different areas of the world," the teacher said.

The students study Third World countries located in Latin America, Africa and Asia.

The students not only learn the differences between the five major religions of the world, but also discover there are common themes.

"I try to educate that religions have some real similarities between them rather than emphasize the differences," Irish said. "Most (religions) have beliefs that deal with what happens when we die—the afterlife, and they all have a code of conduct."

Irish has taught the unit on religion for the 15 years she has taught. She said she thinks the students are enjoying the lesson, or at least part of it.

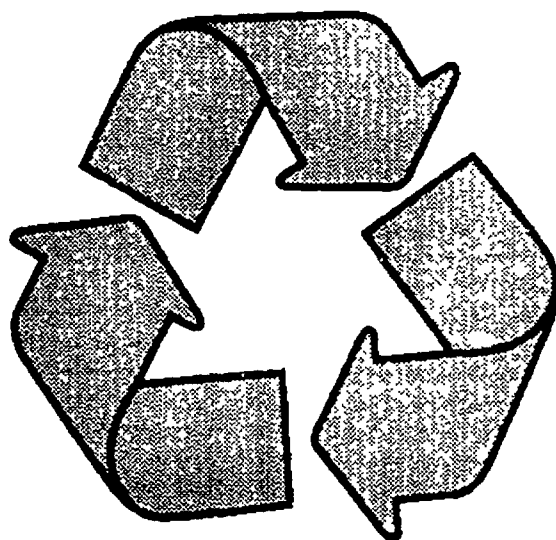

Brenda Irish teaches the comprehensive religion unit at Meads Mill Middle School.

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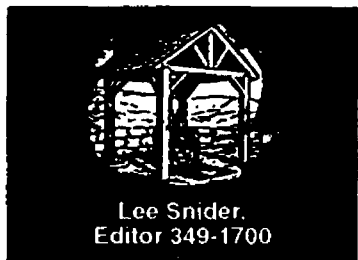

Township trustees are just not trying

Northville Township Supervisor Karen Baja's display of temper at the Feb. 11 Board of Trustees meeting was unbecoming an elected official, and represented yet another instance of the supervisor's anger getting the best of her.

Baja, it will be recalled, became upset after her colleagues on the board voted to begin advertising for candidates to fill the vacancy in the township manager's position. Baja called her fellow representatives "incompetent idiots," and stormed out of the board room without adjourning the meeting.

Baja acknowledged in an extensive interview with *The Record* that she had a temper problem and that she needed to learn greater self-restraint. She added in her own defense, however, that several members of the board were driving her to the breaking point of frustration by their continual ignorance of the issues.

We believe that Baja was out of line in the way she reacted to the Feb. 11 vote. Her conduct set a bad example and confirmed the suspicion that she'd prefer to eliminate the manager's position and make herself full-time supervisor. She should, we think, issue an apology to the public and the officials she offended.

But, the outburst notwithstanding, we believe that Baja makes a valid point when she says that many members of the Board of Trustees seem to have a habit of voting on issues they don't understand. On no less than three occasions in recent weeks, trustees cast important votes, only to turn around a short time later and express confusion over what it was they had decided. When, for instance, a controversy erupted over the board's unanimous decision to eliminate a contractual clause prohibiting Browning-Ferris Industries from constructing a landfill in the township, some trustees acted as if they hadn't realized their vote gave the go-ahead to the company to pursue a new refuse site in the community. When this was brought to light, Trustee Barbara O'Brien, for one, seemed to shrug her shoulders

uncomprehendingly.

A similar vacillation occurred this month when Trustee Mark Abbo, on the night the vote was to be taken, raised a series of questions about the procedure for searching for a new township attorney. Abbo's questions were pertinent, but why had he waited until the procedure had run its course before asking them? The committee that had been appointed to interview firms had gone through nine weeks of effort before coming up with a recommendation. The time to raise questions about the criteria they were using was toward the start of their deliberations, not at the very end.

Yet more paradoxical policy-making took place when trustees first established a committee to look into the possibility of eliminating the township manager's position, then decided, at the Feb. 11 session, to begin accepting applications to fill the post left vacant by the decision not to renew the contract of former Manager Richard Henningsen.

It seems clear that, whatever political alliances are being formed here, many trustees are not doing the homework they should be doing in order to make informed decisions for the township. This practice does not excuse Baja's temper tantrums, but it does make them easier to understand.

Our hope is that trustees will begin to take their positions more seriously and start to study their background materials the way they should, not so much for the sake of Baja's nerves as for the quality of governance in Northville Township.

Our pizza's no pie in the sky



We publish so much material in this paper that causes controversy that sometimes I just feel like writing about something that everybody can agree on. And I think I've found the right topic.

It's pizza. Have you ever met anybody who didn't like pizza? I never have. I've known some who could take it or leave it. But someone who steadfastly refuses to eat it? No such animal.

It's a topic that's near and dear to my heart. When I was a freshman in college, being from out of state I had no idea there was such thing as Domino's. What a concept. A place where you could order a pizza well after midnight and have it delivered to your door in 30 minutes or less.

And Domino's was not alone. There were Dino's and DJ's and Cottage Inn and Little Caesars (But never Omega. Ichi). I was hooked.

Nightly pizza deliveries were such a habit with me that I became known in my dorm as The 'Za Man. Words did not even need to be exchanged when I came calling after 10 p.m. All my friends knew that just poking my head in the door and arching my eyebrows said, "Wanna split a pizza?" Arched eyebrows and a grin said, "I've got a coupon."

Despite the fact that they're not college towns, Northville and Novi have some good pizza options available.

You can go the traditional route and find some fine pizza at places like Cottage Inn, Pizza Cutter and Papa Romano's. And of course there's good ol' Domino's. I hadn't had one in a while, and tried a piece recently. I'd forgotten that they were

that good.

Shield's is just slightly out of the mainstream, but it's still great stuff. Shield's bakes its Sicilian-style crust and cheese with two racing stripes of sauce on top.

But for traditionalists, I'd advise you try the goods at the Northville Wine Shoppe on Eight Mile at Randolph. I tried some while working on a story there, and haven't found any better in the area. I passed the word to our photographer Hal Gould, and now he's a regular there.

I'm branching out into slightly bizarre toppings now, though. When I was in college, you were a real radical dude if you ordered ham and pineapple pizza. When I went to work making pizza, we experimented with an ersatz greek pizza — feta cheese, black olives, hot peppers. None of us who worked there would eat it, though. We were distressed at the idea that our feta cheese didn't melt after 13 minutes in a 600-degree oven. We suspected it was made of tungsten steel.

But if you frequent Edward's Caterer, you'll find garden vegetables, sundried tomatoes and artichoke hearts mingling with asiago cheese and other variations, depending on the day of the week. On a particular day last week, I tried a crabmeat rustica that I passed around the office.

It prompted quite a bit of conversation. Steve Kellman liked it, but said it didn't compare to the seafood alfredo pizza he'd had in Key West. Tina Ferrier reminisced about the aforementioned Greek variety. Jan Jeffries wondered aloud at when I was going to make another of my pesto pizzas to share. Randy Coble watched us sample the crabmeat version, arms folded, shaking his head.

OK, so maybe pizza is more controversial than I thought.

Battle for the downtowns



I was talking with Kriewall recently. That's Garth Kriewall, editor of *The Port Huron Times* — not Ed Kriewall, the Novi city manager.

The occasion was the Michigan Press Association convention in Grand Rapids, and we were attending a reception in the DeVos Suite atop the Amway Grand Hotel.

Maybe we should have been talking about newspapers, but we weren't . . . at least not directly anyway. What we were talking about were issues that affect the cities we try to serve with our respective newspapers.

And, quite frankly, we weren't finding a lot in common. Kriewall (Garth) liked the idea of sharing tax revenues from new construction among school districts. I was opposed.

He thought the concept of equalizing funding behind each student was admirable and something that should be done. I agreed on that point, but suggested it was patently unfair to require areas which build up their non-residential development to send those tax revenues elsewhere because of the additional burden that development causes on school and city services.

I did make one concession, however. I said the only aspect of the revenue-sharing concept that I found admirable was that it had the potential to slow urban sprawl.

And that's where we found a common ground . . . an issue we both agreed upon.

"Why would anyone promote non-residential development after the tax-base benefits have been removed because the new revenues have to be split and shipped somewhere else?"

I asked.

"Before, tax base was always a good reason to permit development in your community; but it's not anymore. Tax base has been substantially diminished as a reason for allowing cornfields to be converted into shopping centers."

And from there we went on to talk about cities . . . downtowns, if you will, and the considerable threats they are facing to remain viable.

We talked about Wal-Mart and Meijer's and strip shopping centers. About how short-sighted planners have permitted them to spring up on the outskirts of established downtown areas; and how established downtowns not only in Michigan but across America are fighting for their lives.

We talked about Birmingham. About how Birmingham was one of the first beneficiaries of the flight from downtown Detroit. And how Birmingham officials are now deeply concerned because they are beginning to face the same problems Detroit had when retailers started to leave Detroit to move to Birmingham.

Only now the retailers are leaving Birmingham for megamalls in Auburn Hills and points north and west.

Same thing is happening in Port Huron, Kriewall said.

Same thing in downtown Northville, I offered. Novi's a little different because Novi with its regional shopping centers is one of the locations that's drawing shoppers and retailers away from the traditional downtowns.

We never did figure out a solution to the problem, but we agreed that the Port Hurons and Northvilles and Plymouths and Birmingham of southeastern Michigan are really a lot like Detroit . . . they're all microcosms of Detroit, battling to keep retailers and shoppers downtown. Battling to prevent them from heading for the suburbs, whether suburbs of Detroit or suburbs of their own communities.

New curriculum puts reading in all subjects

Move over Dick, Jane and Spot and make way for the new language arts curriculum for Northville Public Schools.

Approved by the board of education at its Feb. 15 meeting, the new kindergarten-through-sixth-grade curriculum will integrate reading into all subject areas making it more exciting for students.

"We grew up reading Dick and Jane and Spot," said Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional services. "It was so very contrived and restrictive vocally for children. If children won't take risks in reading, how can we expect them to take risks in writing?"

Beginning with five parents — Kathi Jerome, Diana Stadtmiller, Angela Thomson, Joan Wadsworth and Sue Hillebrand, (who later resigned from the committee because she was elected clerk of Northville Township) — the language arts curriculum committee also included several educators: Verna Birk, Mary Anne Bourne, Joanne Colligan, Chrissy Curvin, Gayle Fountain, Mary Kay Gallagher, Karin Hardin, Karen Harning, Janice Henderson, Linda Hojnacki, Bill Lenz, Cathy Lenz, Celeste Maticic, Kathy Morhous, Laura Schmelter, Barb Sixt, Robert Stover, Jan Tiplady, Diane Vanston, Pamela White and McMaster.

"By naming these people, it is my opportunity to recognize these people as well as showing the exceptional dimensions parent involvement can bring to the curriculum process," McMaster said.

The curriculum is introduced with the school's belief statements as well as anticipated program outcomes.

Those include:

1. Utilize language and technologies to manage, integrate and communicate information to help improve one's life and the lives of others.
2. Investigate and relate others' points of view to gain insights and to increase sensitivity about self, cultures and issues.
3. Select and use strategies to construct and communicate meaning from diverse sources for many purposes.
4. Use personal experiences and objective criteria to analyze ideas, issues and information.
5. Make choices for personal growth and enjoyment by exploring and respecting the works of self and others.

The curriculum further breaks down the anticipated program outcome process by addressing each grade level.

"The position statements help teachers and parents who weren't on the committee and who are not privy to all the research and debate," McMaster explained.

The entire theme, however, of the curriculum is integrated learning.

"Now, students have reading (class) from 9 to 9:40 (a.m.)," McMaster said. "Instead, reading should permeate everything we do."

"The idea is taking reading, writing, speaking and listening — you don't teach them by themselves, you integrate it into the curriculum," said Joan Wadsworth, one of the parent committee members. "In science, students can read trade books and combine that with the science curriculum."

Another example would be assigning students to read *The Diary of Anne Frank* so students can learn about World War II, and also work on their reading skills.

Such tactics will make kids want to learn more, said McMaster. For example, at Meads Mill Middle School, four literature circles were established after an Indiana educator demonstrated the group idea to Northville teachers. Students were allowed to join one of four groups after reading their choice of four historical novels.

"It (the groups) caused kids to start investigating (about their topic) more," McMaster said. "They started checking dates and verifying circumstances of history. It just got contagious."

The parents on the language arts curriculum committee also produced a 12-minute video about the new curriculum and wrote a handbook for parents. The handbook is designed in a question-and-answer format.

"It's totally parent-written," McMaster said. "We'll be handing it out at open houses next fall."

Although the curriculum was adopted, there are two remaining steps in the process. One is to select the instructional materials so the curriculum will be ready to be taught in the fall. Parents and educators had the chance to browse over such materials at a vendors fair, held recently at the high school.

The last step will probably be just as lengthy as devising the curriculum itself.

"We'll need to devise an assessment system for the children," McMaster said. "Whether that will be by grades, portfolios, performance assessments or pencil and paper tests, we don't know yet."

"We want to raise the water level of expectation for our kids, but at the same time, we want to be appropriate knowing our clientele."

Spice up your winestyle for Mardi Gras

A most interesting history of the celebration of Mardi Gras (Feb. 23) is woven by Errol LaBorde in "Mardi Gras," published by Picayune Press. In the beginning, Laborde elaborates, "Mardi Gras was sanctioned by the Christians and was named by the French." He goes on to describe primitive man's celebration, and that of the Greek peasants just 50 years ago.

Christian religions consider the late winter rites an acceptable fasting before the Lenten season's abstinence. Whatever the details, Mardi Gras conjures up the idea of fun and celebration.

LaBorde does not detail how the celebration became associated with the word carnival, only that it did. The root word, however, gives us some clue. In 18th century Venice, he says, the celebration lasted on and off for six months, and a majority of the population adopted the habit of masking.

It appears that compared to their Latin neighbors, the French got a late start in celebrating carnival but "they quickly made up for lost time," LaBorde writes.

Some early French customs were quite uncivilized. As time went on, they adopted many culturally civil traditions still practiced today.

"They made masquerading at balls popular and they introduced the boeuf gras, a huge bull, either real or manmade that came to symbolize the celebration," LaBorde narrates. "Fat Tuesday," a direct translation from the French, became the French name for carnival day and is now known in every language as Mardi Gras.

By the late 19th century, the celebration of Mardi Gras waned in France. Ironically, this is the time it began to flourish in New Orleans and it is there that the feast is most celebrated today.

History lesson over, let's get down to celebrating and matching wine with Cajun and Creole cooking. The heart of Cajun food is southern French country cooking. Cajuns use the bounty of local crawfish, as well as chicken and pork, which is often smoked.

Chili powder, parsley, bay leaves, cayenne, black pepper and hot peppers are the principal seasonings. All preparations are accompanied by rice.

Rice balances hotness from the seasonings and allows solid wine harmonies. Unlike Cajun, Creole food originated in New Orleans and is a mixture of French, Spanish, Italian, American Indian and African traditions.

Louisiana's renowned chef Paul Prudhomme contends that "Today, in homes, there is still a distinction between Cajun and Creole cooking: in restaurants, little distinction remains." That's why Prudhomme refers to the two together as Louisiana cooking.

With Louisiana-style crabmeat, crawfish, shrimp or oysters, champagne or sparkling wine works well against well-seasoned preparations as long as they're not too hot.

A grassy-style sauvignon blanc can't be beat. You can stick with French and use a Sancerre from the Loire Valley or choose one from California. These are some of the best: 1990 Paul Thomas Sancerre, Chavignol "Les Comteses" (\$16), 1991 Lockwood Sauvignon Blanc (\$7).

A little slice of heaven
Bakery turns to main meals too

Rich Willerer knows how to make a good thing even better.

Starting with the family bakery, Heavenly Bakery in Northville, this Schoolcraft College graduate has created a place where locals can come for a meal that is at once wholesome yet unique. He mingles high quality ingredients with some Continental influences and a little of his own ingenuity to create sandwiches and entrees that are building a strong following.

Willerer's mother made Heavenly Bakery a Northville staple for years, before he took over seven months ago.

Heavenly Bakery has now become a destination, the kind of place where you'll find people who'd drive a half hour for a corned beef sandwich. And why not? The corned beef is the Boar's Head brand — among the best anywhere, but difficult to find around these parts.

Despite the changes, customers have remained loyal.

"We get clients who come in here five days a week," Willerer said. "Ninety percent of the people who come in here, come in regularly."

They come in for the pinwheel lasagna and the mu-faletta, a sandwich of ham, provolone cheese and marinated vegetables. They also come in for the sandwiches which are served on tasty homemade breads made from good European style flours. The store even smokes its own meats on the premises.

"It's not a really big deal to do," said Willerer. "We smoked some of our own turkey last week. People loved it."

Even kids like the chicken pot pies, made with Amish-style chicken. Amish chickens are raised in the Old World way; no growth hormones are used to fatten them, and they are raised in less confined housing.

"I keep things real lean," Willerer said. "People are becoming more aware of what they put into their bodies. For example, I do a Caesar salad, but I do it without the eggs. It's close to what you are familiar with, but it's tough to get it exact without the yolks."

It's a challenge to combat the convenience foods with something healthy and creative. But then Willerer isn't one to shy away from a challenge. He performs catering service on the side, and has catered in such unique locations as a hot-air balloon and the back of a limousine.

"This gentleman wanted to bring his wife home from the hospital in a limousine. He wanted seven courses served in the limo, with a flambeed dessert," said Willerer. "I pulled it off."

In developing the new style at Heavenly Bakery, Willerer hasn't abandoned the bakery end of the store, though. Quite the opposite is true. Heavenly Bakery boasts a fine tira misu and fabulous cheesecakes. It's not unusual to see a customer come in and order one cookie to munch on, then walk back in the door five minutes later and order a whole bag to take home.

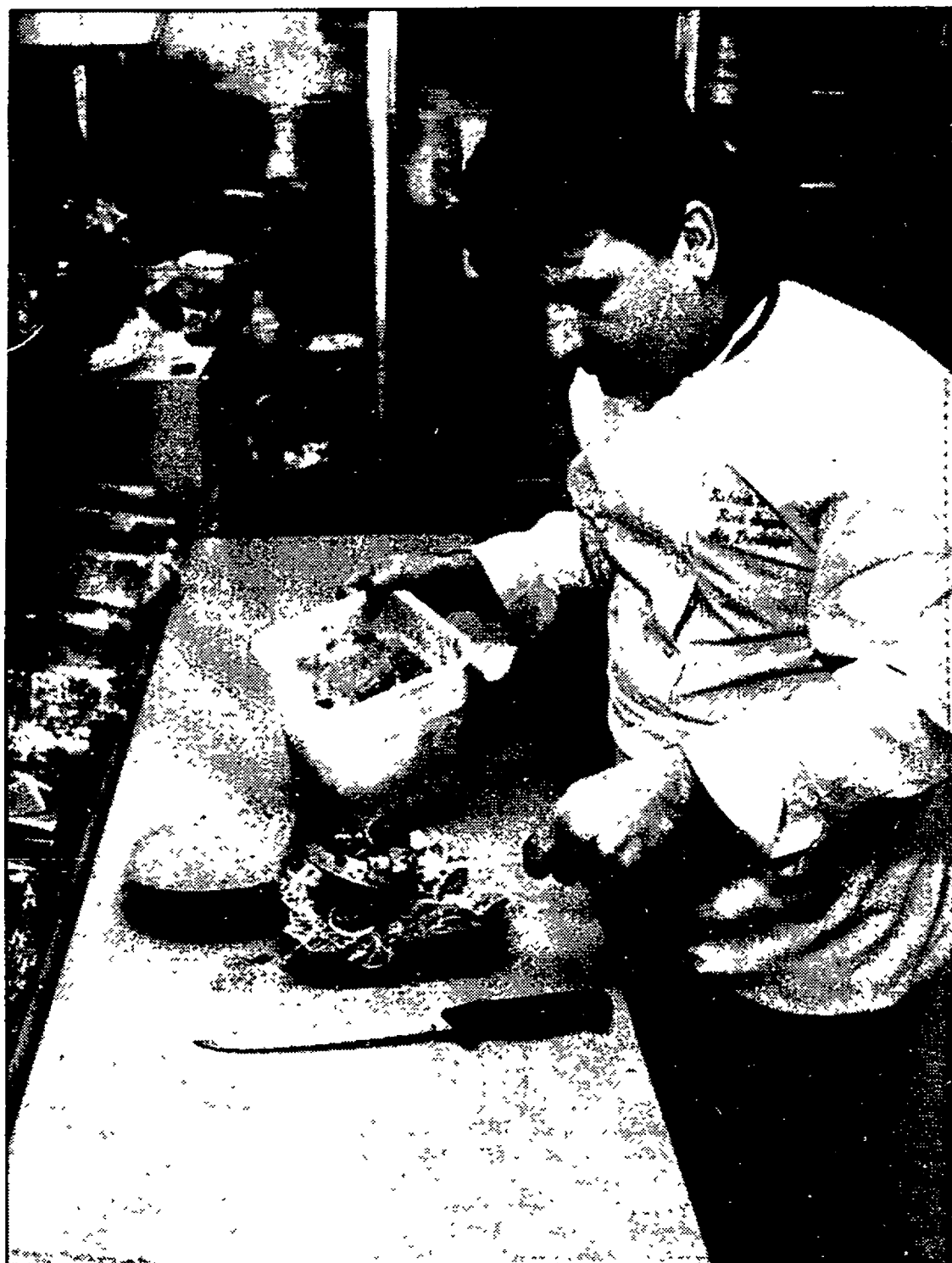
For his entrees, Willerer stresses the big picture in creating a meal.

"What separates us from other places is how the meal comes together," he said. "You get a side dish that's compatible with the main dish. For example, we have a southwest-style pasta, with diced veggies on that create something like a salsa. Then we add some blackened chicken in a southwest style, and finish it with some fresh cilantro."

Much of Willerer's influence comes from his Italian and German heritage. He owes his attention to detail to his ancestry as well.

"If you have an Italian mother, you know how demanding they can be," he said.

"I use a lot of German influences," he added. "But I

studied under two strong American chefs. So I use some American ingenuity and mix it with a European accent. In the last few years, everybody's been talking about American-style cooking. But with me, it's getting to be old hat. I like to use a lot more European ideas."

Willerer served his apprenticeship under Certified Master Chef Jeff Gabriel, and worked 12 years in the Detroit area before taking a job with a New York-based food supplier.

"Being involved with a company in New York was a great inspiration," Willerer said. "There are so many professionals in that area. I only worked there for two years, but I learned more in that two years than I did anywhere else."

The job involved frequent travel to food shows, and Willerer competed in food salons as well.

When he decided to get married, though, Willerer had to change his ways. His wife-to-be didn't much like the idea of him constantly traveling, so he vowed to settle

down and start his own place. But not before he had one last fling.

"Two weeks before I got married, I was in Germany," he said with a grin.

Heavenly Bakery was a natural for what Willerer had in mind.

"From a bakery, I'm moving into more of a gourmet shop," he said.

For example, the coffee isn't just your garden variety Colombian roast. You can get unique flavored coffees, and even cappuccino and espresso. The coffee supplier is a high-quality outfit based in Iowa that imports the beans green, and roasts them there. Admittedly Iowa isn't known as a hotbed of coffee production. It was one of those unique places Willerer ferreted out in his many travels.

"They're a bunch of old hippies who got real motivated," he said. "They're into herbs and aromatherapy medicines too. Their coffee, well, it's hard to find something that's organically produced. But it's good, honest stuff."

If the idea of gourmet coffee made by Iowa hippies sounds a little too far out of the mainstream for you, rest assured that Heavenly Bakery isn't trying to shock anyone with eclectic foods. Most of what's served gets the Grandma Test before it's put on the menu.

"I ask myself, 'Would my grandmother eat it,'" Willerer said. "We want to be a small place where you can come get something different every day. But we don't want to be pretentious. I don't want to be a yuppie cook. I want to have something people can feel comfortable with."

This was, after all, a family operation from the beginning. If you walk in the door, you're likely to be waited on by Rich, his wife, his mother or his best friend.

"We work well together because we all know each other, we trust each other, and we all think alike," he said.

1/2 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped green bell pepper
1 clove garlic, minced
2 teaspoons vegetable oil
2 cans (14 1/2 ounces each) stewed tomatoes or Cajun-style stewed tomatoes, undrained
1 can (13 1/2 ounces) low-salt chicken broth
1 to 2 teaspoons Creole seasoning
1/2 package (4 ounces) No Yolks cholesterol-free noodles
1/2 pound shrimp and deveined medium-size shrimp
1 cup frozen cut corn

2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley

Saute onion, pepper and garlic in oil in Dutch oven over medium-high heat 3 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Stir in undrained tomatoes, broth and creole seasoning. Bring to a boil. Add noodles, lower heat to medium; simmer 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in shrimp, corn and parsley.

1991 Simi Sauvignon Blanc (\$9), 1991 Fetzer Barrel Select Sauvignon Blanc (\$10).

With Andouille, the most popular Cajun smoked pork sausage, a spicy southern Rhone wine, such as a Chateaufort-du-Pape, is in order. Dry Creek Vineyard's owner Dave Stare, the grandson of a former Louisiana governor, is a Louisiana cooking aficionado. Wherever possible, winery events are centered around his food preference.

Dry Creek Winery chef Richard Nolleaux makes the best Duck and Andouille Gumbo we've tasted (see below). Dry Creek Zinfandel is used in the recipe and a glass of it makes a great match at the table.

With gumbo and duck preparations, we also like pinot noir. Here again, you can elect a French or red Burgundy or one of the bottlings from the Carneros region of California.

Ham dishes or tasso call for a rose or light red wine from Provence or one of the newer market entries from the Languedoc-Roussillon region of southern France.

The strong flavors of jambalaya and the fact that it often contains tomatoes make it difficult to pair with wine. Here the recommendation is a dark premium beer or Bass Ale.

DUCK AND ANDOUILLE GUMBO
Recipe provided by Richard Nolleaux

Seasoning mix:

1 1/2 teaspoons garlic powder
1 teaspoon dried thyme
1/2 teaspoon ground sage
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon each black pepper, white pepper and cayenne
1 teaspoon ground juniper berries

Roux:

2 cups vegetable oil
2 cups flour

Remaining ingredients:

5 cups minced white onions
2 cups minced green onion (white and green parts)
1 1/2 cups minced yellow bell pepper
3 cups minced celery
4 cups duck meat (from breast, leg, thigh)
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
2 andouille sausages, diced 1/2 inch (approximately 1 1/2 cup)
1 1/2 cups dry red wine, Dry Creek Zinfandel

5 quarts rich duck stock (or chicken stock)
1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons finely minced garlic
2 tablespoons salt
1 1/2 teaspoons cayenne
1/2 cup tomato puree

Saute andouille in a large frying pan for about 10 minutes until slightly brown. Remove with slotted spoon and set aside. Pour off any remaining grease. On medium high heat, add 3 tablespoons vegetable oil and brown off the duck meat that's been mixed with all of the seasoning mix. Stir for about 7 minutes until duck cooks slightly. Remove duck to same plate as andouille; deglaze pan with 1 1/2 cups dry red wine.

In large heavy bottomed pot make a roux with oil and flour. When it turns a mahogany color, add white onions, green onions, yellow bell pepper and celery. Stir constantly for about 8 minutes, add duck stock, deglazing liquid from above and bring to a boil. Re-

duce to medium heat and add garlic, duck/andouille mixture, salt, cayenne, Worcestershire and tomato puree. Stirring occasionally, let cook over medium heat for about 2 hours. Skim surface occasionally.

Refrigerate overnight. The next day, remove any fat that remains on top. Reheat for service.

Serve in large soup bowl, add 1/2 cups cooked rice. Gumbo can be made hotter with your choice of Tabasco, etc. This gumbo is even more flavorful after freezing and reheating.

Makes approximately 20 10-ounce servings.

Chef's note: Andouille, a Cajun smoked pork sausage, is a staple in New Orleans meat markets, but not widely available outside Louisiana. The Polish smoked sausage — kielbasa, can be used as a substitute.

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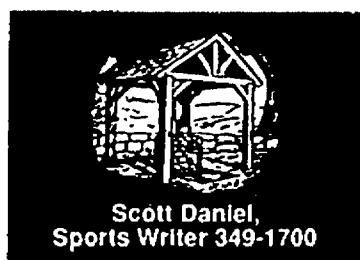

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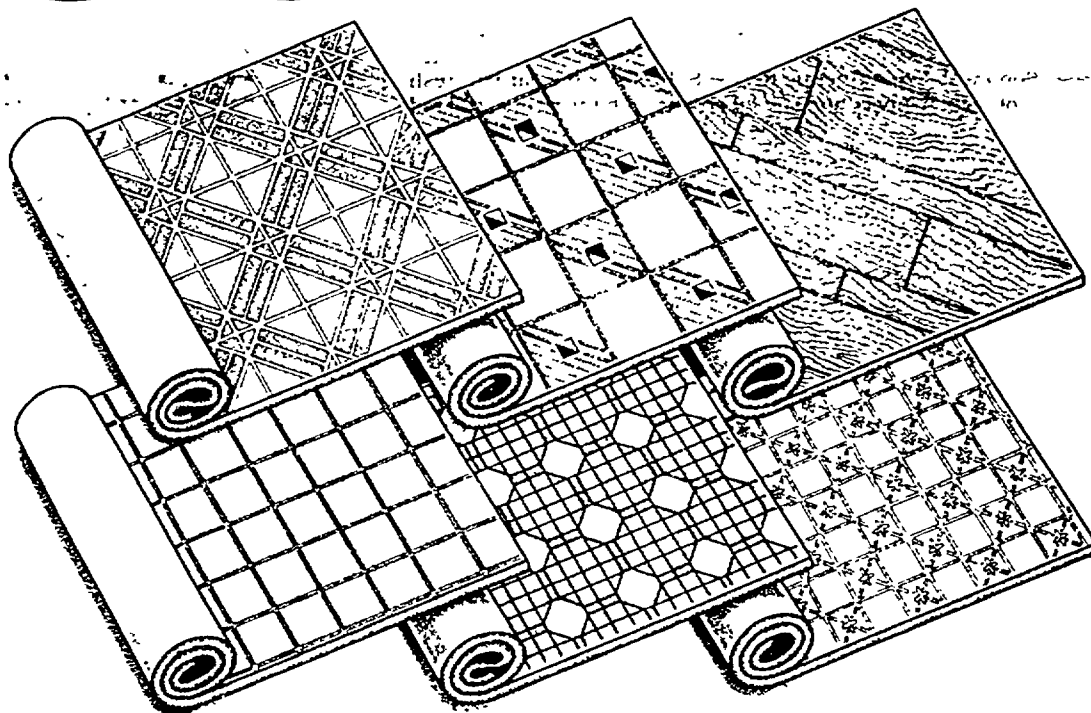
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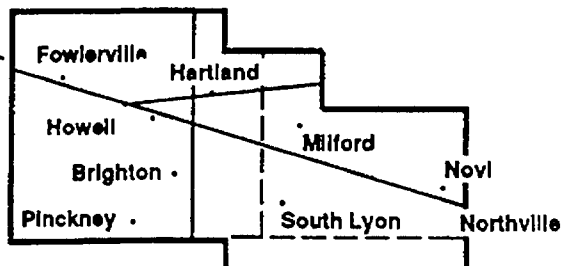

As an example, I am presently planning a trip to the southwest coast of Mexico, on the Pacific Ocean about 200 miles south of Acapulco. The Mexican

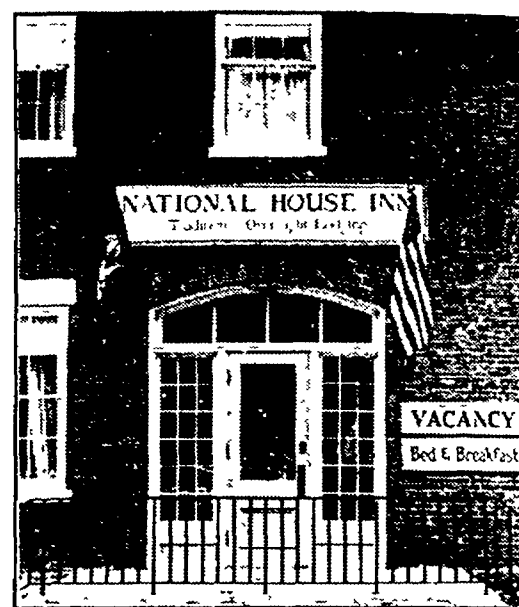
government is building a new "Cancun" on that coast, at a place called Huatulco.

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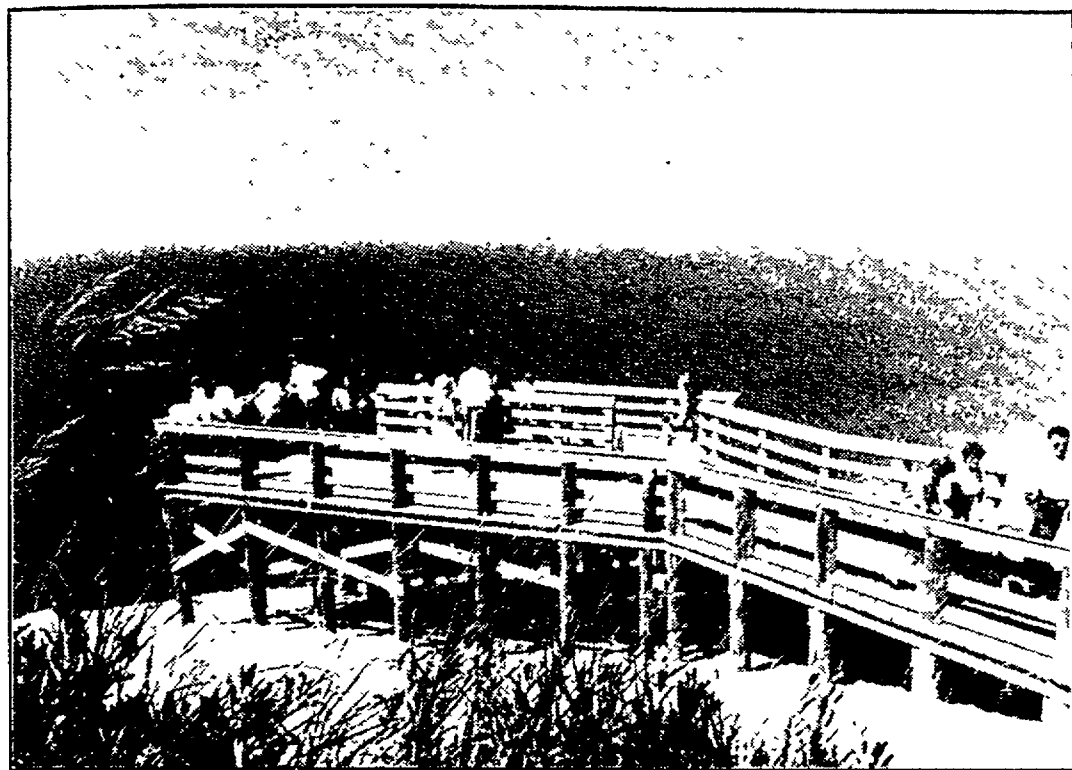

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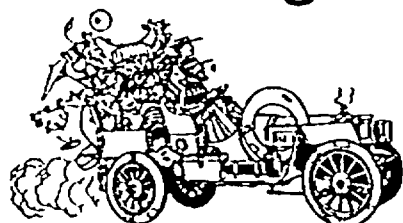
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Matthews and Doak: Breathtaking designs are par for the course

Michigan golfers and Michigan golf course owners certainly have gained from the golf boom in recent years, and so have a couple of golf course architects with Michigan ties.

Jerry Matthews, a name familiar for years in Michigan, has become even more familiar in the state and the Midwest.

And Tom Doak, a Connecticut native, made his start as an independent here and is now making a national name for himself.

"We felt a need to broaden our base some," said the 58-year-old Matthews, who heads Matthews & Associates in Lansing. He is the son of architect W. Bruce Matthews who started the company in 1929 and nephew of W. Bruce III, another golf architect in the family.

Together they have designed almost 70 courses in Michigan, and several in other parts of the midwest.

Most Michigan golfers have played one of their courses. Need convincing? Find a golf nut who has not played one of the following: Antrim Dells in Atwood, Candlestone in Belding, Salem Hills, Birchwood Farms in Harbor Springs, The Lakes at Michaywe, Timber Ridge near Lansing, Grand Haven Country Club, Wolverine in Plymouth, Godwin Glen in South Lyon, Forest Akers in East Lansing, L.E. Kaufman in Grand Rapids, Tyrone Hills in Flint and the new hot place, Elk Ridge in Atlanta near Gaylord.

Sounds impossible doesn't it?

"Michigan is our home, and we've always felt there are ample wonderful sites for courses here, and our clients seem to feel the same way," said Jerry.

So why the move to get a little more national recognition? Jerry, who is vice-president of the Society of Golf

Course Architects, said they don't want to be perceived as working only in Michigan.

"We feel we have a lot to offer clients from just about anywhere," he said.

Plus, Matthews has watched other architects from other parts of the country come into Michigan and take advantage of its lovely natural golf terrain.

"You want to make sure people still know you are doing good work here," admitted Jerry, who is happiest up to his knees in dirt working on a golf course or fishing. He plays golf, but his passion is designing the course and then finding a nice pond to throw a line.

"I'm not real comfortable with the public relations part," he said.

Public relations aside, he stays busy. Current projects include a third set of nine holes at Old Channel Trail near Montague. Ironically, his father built the first nine on the site in 1966.

Another current one that should draw attention is a new nine holes at The Grand Hotel in Mackinac that should open in the spring of 1994. It will be short, about 3,100 yards, but in a wonderful setting and fun to play, said Jerry.

Greystone near Romeo, another new layout, shows Matthews skill. They turned a moon scape gravel pit into a golf course.

Timber Ridge in Lansing won awards out of the box, and as a high-profile public course is very busy.

At Elk Ridge he had 2,400 acres to pick and choose sites for holes, and he picked winners. It has become a must-stop for the golfers who head north to play the growing wonderful myriad of resort courses in Michigan.

Matthews figures the recent fuss about him is nice. He hopes it translates into more opportunities to build great golf courses.

"Maybe I was quiet for so long, that it was time I emerged and made a little noise," he said.

In contrast, making noise has not been a problem for Doak.

The 30-year-old, who once worked for Pete Dye, did his first course near Acme. High Pointe, a cherry orchard golf delight, sent the message that a new star had arrived. National magazines pointed to him and his design.

And that pattern has not stopped.

He is currently working on a re-design job in New York, a private course near Philadelphia called Stonewall, and a public site in Charlotte, N.C.

It has kept him hopping around the country, even though he is calling Traverse City home.

"Actually, the idea of getting back to Michigan to do another course appeals to me," he said. "It would be nice to be home."

After High Pointe, he went to Myrtle Beach, as all fine architects seem to do sooner or later, and then came back to Michigan to do Wilderness Valley near this state's self-proclaimed golf mecca, Gaylord.

He doesn't seem to have one style to lock on. He admits, he likes to be different.

At High Pointe, he has two contrasting nines of orchard links and tree-carved challenges. At Myrtle Beach he took nothing land and made it something to talk about. At Wilderness Valley, the bunkers will grab your eye and maybe your shots, and he took great advantage of lovely northern Michigan.

"I've traveled extensively, seen most of the great courses in the world, and the one thing I've noticed is that they are all so different," he said.

"They all are playable, and interesting on every shot, but everything else is so different. That's what I like to try and do."

Studious by nature and certainly a

student of golf architecture, Doak likes to work just a few projects at a time. He does not want to be a name architect with several projects and several architects under him.

He wants to be a name architect on his terms, hands-on, professional and with respect to golf architecture's history.

At this time it is no surprise that he is considering a project in Ireland, on a cliff site.

"Those opportunities are attractive, but I wouldn't mind coming home to Michigan either," he said. "Michigan has so much great terrain, so many natural sites for golf courses."

For a while, Doak thought he might spend a majority of his career going around and fixing courses

designed by golf pros who had dabbled in course design. He figures some of that is ahead for certain, but feels his name has become known for his work too.

"Most of the work I've done has come about because of somebody I met years ago, or worked with years ago," he said. "That's my style I guess. I want to be in there taking care to be a real part of the design, doing the best I can."

Matthews and Doak have clearly made their mark in Michigan, and will likely continue to do so because Michigan golfers like what they have done in the past.

It shouldn't hurt us to share them just a little bit.

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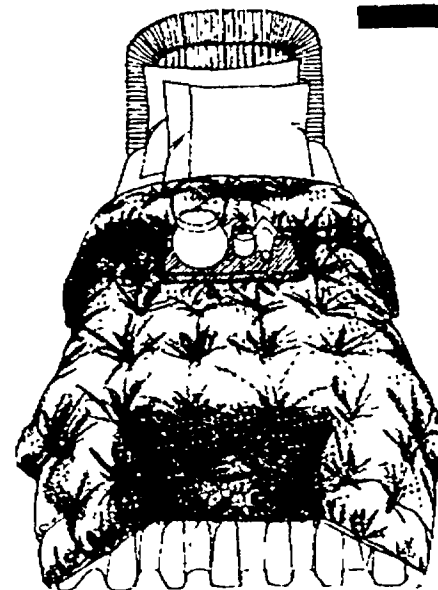


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Old barns dot West Bloomfield

While historic homes and, more especially, barns are becoming almost daily casualties of subdivision developments in the former countryside of West Bloomfield, Jim Laarman is working to preserve them -- at least on film.

The president of the Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society has been photographing and cataloging old buildings throughout the area and has compiled a collection of slides of vintage buildings from West Bloomfield, Orchard Lake, Keego Harbor and Sylvan Lake. In some cases Laarman has been just ahead of the demolition.

Barns which once were part of area farms have disappeared even though the houses have been saved.

"Little structures have survived, such as stone milk houses," says Laarman, pointing out they, like old barn foundations in the area, often were true cobblestone structures.

"Watch for them on old farms and note how the stones were laid in

straight lines," he suggests.

Laarman's slide tour of many of the area's earliest buildings gives a viewer a new awareness of historic construction throughout this part of Michigan. Laarman points out that the fieldstone houses and foundations used stones deposited on glacial moraines. He urges listeners to note the "impressive stonework" on early buildings.

A civil engineer, Laarman works summers in shoreline, pond and lake regimen engineering. During the winter months he is a substitute teacher in the Birmingham schools. He also is a willing lecturer, showing his slides to groups such as those attending his lecture prior to the St. James Winter Antiques Show in Birmingham.

With longish, white hair and a quiet manner, Laarman seems more professor than engineer. His interest in identifying historic area buildings was helped when he acquired an 1835 map of Oakland County.

During the past few years he has located historic buildings and sites throughout the Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society's area and has divided the region into four tours. Sadly, more and more of the listings have become "sites only" due to home developments.

With Fourteen Mile Road as the township's southern boundary, a landmark barn can be seen by traveling north on Haggerty Road, the western boundary of the township. This is the Mona Lisa barn located at the southeast corner of Maple and Haggerty. The large, but fading face of the Mona Lisa is visible on the south end of the barn. It is one of several in Oakland County painted with the help of government grants during the Bicentennial, Laarman says.

But Laarman sees more than the painting. "Look at the windows," he says, mentioning that typically windows were randomly placed in barns.

The heavy traffic on Haggerty Road here is in contrast to the farm and offers further evidence of the area's change from country to suburb.

By continuing east on Maple Road to Halstead and turning north we passed the Johns-Dodge farm which Laarman dates as pre-1872. At Walnut Lake Road we turned right (east) to travel along the edge of Pleasant Lake, which Laarman notes, is the highest elevation lake in West Bloomfield. The area also was the site of West Bloomfield's first mercantile store, his map shows.

In this area, Walnut Lake Road is lined with pre-1872 houses as well as upscale subdivisions on former farms. However a stack of old barn beams on

the north side of the road near Drake Road testified to the recent razing of an old barn that Laarman remembers as being the Browning farm.

One gem of a barn nearby is well worth driving by to view. Just east of Middlebelt Road on the north side of Walnut Lake Road is the handsome Shenandoah round barn. Now a residence, Laarman cautions that the owners do not wish to be disturbed. The exterior alone, however, is impressive. The foundation is native fieldstone with the dark green-painted frame structure towering three stories to a dome top. Laarman dates the barn between 1910 and 1920.

He says the origin of the name, Shenandoah, is unknown but thinks it might be the valley-like setting of the area.

He mentions that round barns were an efficient way of keeping and feeding animals.

Retracing to travel north on Orchard Lake Road, we come to the home of the Greater West Bloomfield Historical Museum at the intersection of Long Lake Road and Pontiac Trail. The building is the former City of Orchard Lake Village Hall, dating to 1939.

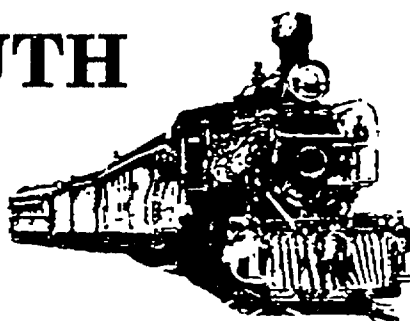
In the northwest section of the township stands what Laarman calls

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the "king of barns." It is found by traveling north off Commerce Road on Hiller to Greer Road. It is located on the northwest end of the road on the Oliver farm, previously known as the Watchpocket Farm. It features a rain hood over the hay door.

Also on Hiller Road, Laarman suggests watching for a farm with twin silos, somewhat a rarity.

Laarman's map has been printed by the West Bloomfield Chamber of Commerce in its promotional brochure. A new edition was going to press last month and will be available at the chamber office at 6668 Orchard Lake Road.

The Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society Museum at 3951 Orchard Lake Road is open on the second Sunday of every month from 1

to 4 p.m. and welcomes anyone interested in seeing its historical maps and photographs. Laarman may be contacted at 313-851-1440 for information about the society.

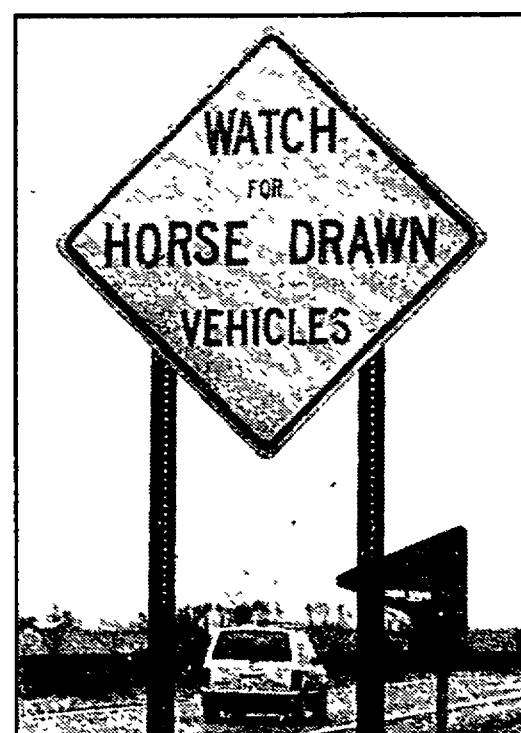
I thought not.

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Whitefish Point: Near to Paradise

Nearing Whitefish Point, that jutting finger of the Upper Peninsula pointing toward Canada, you'll pass through a village that's aptly named - Paradise. Ask anyone who lives here if it's paradise all year long and they'll grin at the pun, for they're an independent, self-reliant and hardy lot.

If, as I am, you are invigorated by wild weather, hope that your journey to Paradise is taken on a day when Lake Superior is rolling high with whitecapped waves, when the sky is lowering and grim, and as storm clouds are building on the distant horizon. For on such a day you'll sense just a glimmer of the power that lies within this broad expanse of awesome water - the biggest, the deepest, and sometimes, the deadliest, inland lake in our hemisphere.

It was just such a day last October that I visited Whitefish Point - amid flashes of brilliant sunshine interspersed with almost-blinding snow squalls - that demonstrated the constantly changing weather conditions of the northeast region of Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Because Whitefish Bay is the approach to Sault Ste. Marie for shipping, the freighters and ore boats are easily observed off these waters. With gale-force winds bending observers almost double on the beach in mid-October, it was easy to imagine the November storms that send so many ships to the bottom. And it's just 17 miles NW of Whitefish Point where the *Edmund Fitzgerald* lies in 520 feet of Lake Superior water - with all 29 crewmen.

While the conditions that cause sailors grim-lipped anxiety may be hard to imagine during summer's sunshine, they're sampled safely at the tail-end of the season.

There are several attractions at Whitefish Point besides the grand views of Lake Superior and its wide beaches dotted with smoothly washed stones and twisted driftwood. There's a historic lighthouse that at first appears ungainly and cumbersome. But observe closely the economy of utility, and you'll appreciate its sparseness, and the neatness of newly sided keeper's quarters, shining with fresh paint.

Long known as the Graveyard of the Lakes due to numerous dangerous shoals in the area, Congress authorized \$5,000 to build a lighthouse of "split stone or hard brick and laid with good lime mortar" in March 1847, and contracted with

Ebenezer Warner of Ohio to build it. An additional \$3,298 was needed to complete the structure in late 1848, and it was placed into service early in 1849, at the same time the light at Copper Harbor became active, so each claims to be the first light on Lake Superior.

The tower was replaced with today's "iron pile" structure to better withstand severe winter weather at the point. The pyramidal skeletal frame has horizontal and diagonal bracing supporting a cast iron watch room and lantern, which are reached through a round cast iron stair tower standing 42 feet tall. The Fresnel lens was installed in 1857 and in 1913, the Lighthouse Service installed a 1,000 watt Aladdin incandescent oil vapor lamp. The light was automated by the Coast Guard in 1970 and still serves as a lifesaving beacon.

Among the complex of buildings at the point is the Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Museum which documents stories of shipwrecks through displays, artifacts, written interpretation, sound and video. It's informative and impressive and eerily provokes a somber mood as the strains of Gordon Lightfoot's ballad of the *Edmund Fitzgerald's* sinking filters through the subdued lighting.

Over 170 years of shipwreck history is detailed here and includes the enormous lens from White Shoal Lighthouse as the centerpiece. Don't miss the story of Amos Stiles, the man who "never smiled again" after surviving a boiler explosion when he was blown skyward. Grim tales, these.

Early and present diving apparatus is displayed, along with artifacts recovered from underwater wrecks.

Nearby, a museum gift shop carries items of nautical interest, including books, brass, prints and cards.

There's a small fee for the museum, which includes entrance to the video theater. Both are open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. from Memorial Day through October 15. For more information, telephone

the Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society, Inc., (906) 635-1742.

As interesting as the maritime lore is, there are travelers of another sort to Whitefish Point - the birders. Just across the parking lot from the lighthouse and museum is the Whitefish Point Bird Observatory's visitor center and gift shop. Inside, you'll learn about a dedicated band of researchers who man the site from April 1 through October 15, watching and recording many of the 299 species that have been noted here since 1978.

Spring and autumn migrations are the highlights here. Due to the point jutting into Lake Superior, and being close to Canada, birds fly across the short distance heading north in the spring to their breeding grounds and returning southward to spend the winter in milder climates.

Hawks, owls, waterfowl and songbirds of all types are seen in the area. Spring migration begins in late March, builds dramatically through April and May, then continues to mid-June.

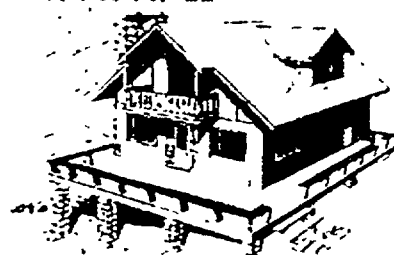
The group's newsletter, "The Migrant," observes: "Hawks and finches are the initial migrants. In late March look for Gyrfalcon, Northern goshawk, Golden Eagle, Red Crossbill, and Hoary Redpoll. By late April, the hawk migration is in full swing; over 3,500 Sharp-shinned Hawks were seen on an April day in 1992. Whitefish Point's specialty, northern owls, are typically in top form, including Great Gray, Boreal, Northern Saw-whet, and Long-eared. The spring of 1992 was particularly productive and included several Northern Hawk Owls."

Massive flocks of Blue Jays, Black-capped Chickadees, and Evening Grosbeaks in May are only rivaled by the waterbird migration. Loons, ducks, geese and gulls are seen daily and incredible rarities such as the Mississippi Kite, Swainson's and Ferruginous Hawks, White-winged Dove, Townsend's Solitaire and Sprague's Pipit were noted.

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migration lull, the autumn migration begins in early August and continues into mid-November.

The Observatory offers a variety of programs and outings - summer and winter - for birders, ranging from informal bird walks at Whitefish Point to trips across the country. Programs at the Point, a series of interactive bird talks and walks are open to the public free of charge. Another series, Birding Excursions, are 1-4 hour trips, each in the eastern Upper Peninsula. Others have broader objectives, perhaps at Seney's National Wildlife refuge. Identifications Workshops round out the offerings and most concentrate on the bird migration at Whitefish Point.

There are other events, the major one being the Spring Festival, held on the last weekend in April.

Information is available to all members of the Whitefish Point Bird Observatory, and by telephoning (906) 492-3596. The newsletter is included as part of the membership and is published in February, July and November.

Just beyond the museum is a hawk watching platform - a short walk through the dunes and up stairs to look out over a wide expanse of dunes and the lake. It's an inviting place and one can see ore boats plying Lake Superior's waters, jack pines and low dune plants.

Within easy drives are Tahquamenon Falls State Park and the Seney National Wildlife Refuge. There are a number of state, federal and private campgrounds not far from Whitefish Point, and the village of Paradise boasts several motels and a Howard Johnson's.

After spending a day at the point, you'll understand why it's a birder's mecca attracting visitors from all over the United States.

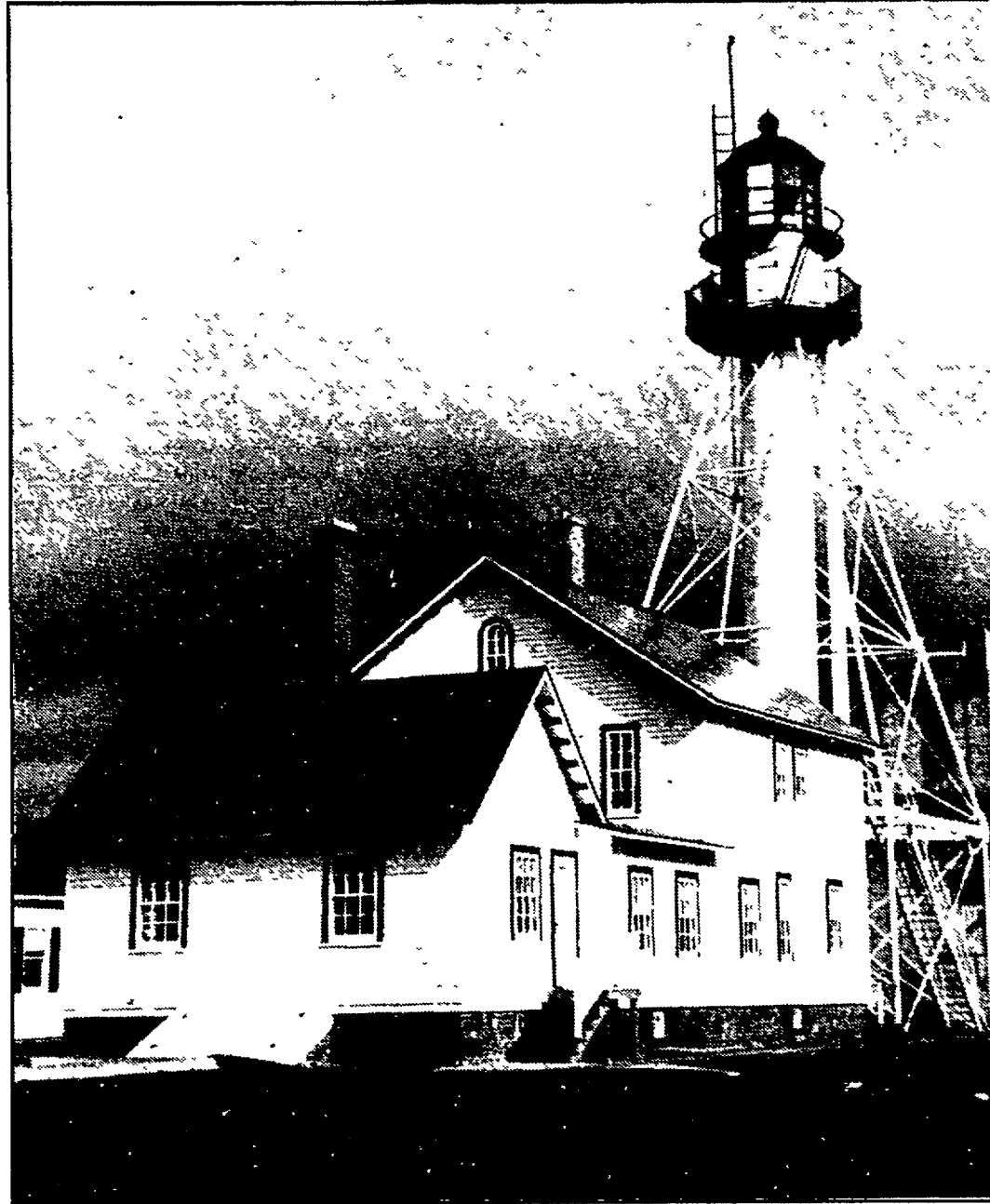

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Photo exhibit focuses on buildings

Lansing, Michigan—

Photographs of many intriguing buildings express the architectural diversity of Michigan from the French exploration period to the growth of the automobile industry in *Focus on Photographers*, the new temporary exhibit at the Michigan Historical Museum.

The museum exhibit reflects "Buildings of Michigan," a book that portrays Michigan's architectural history by featuring significant buildings from Detroit to Copper Harbor. The book, which has just been published by Oxford University Press, was written and edited by Dr. Kathryn Bishop Eckert under the auspices of the Society of Architectural Historians. Eckert, Michigan's State Historic Preservation Officer, is also a member of the board of directors of the Society of Architectural Historians.

Specially featured in the *Focus on Photographers* exhibit are 28 black-and-white photos by Balthazar Korab, a master photographer from Troy, who was the primary photographer for "Buildings of Michigan." 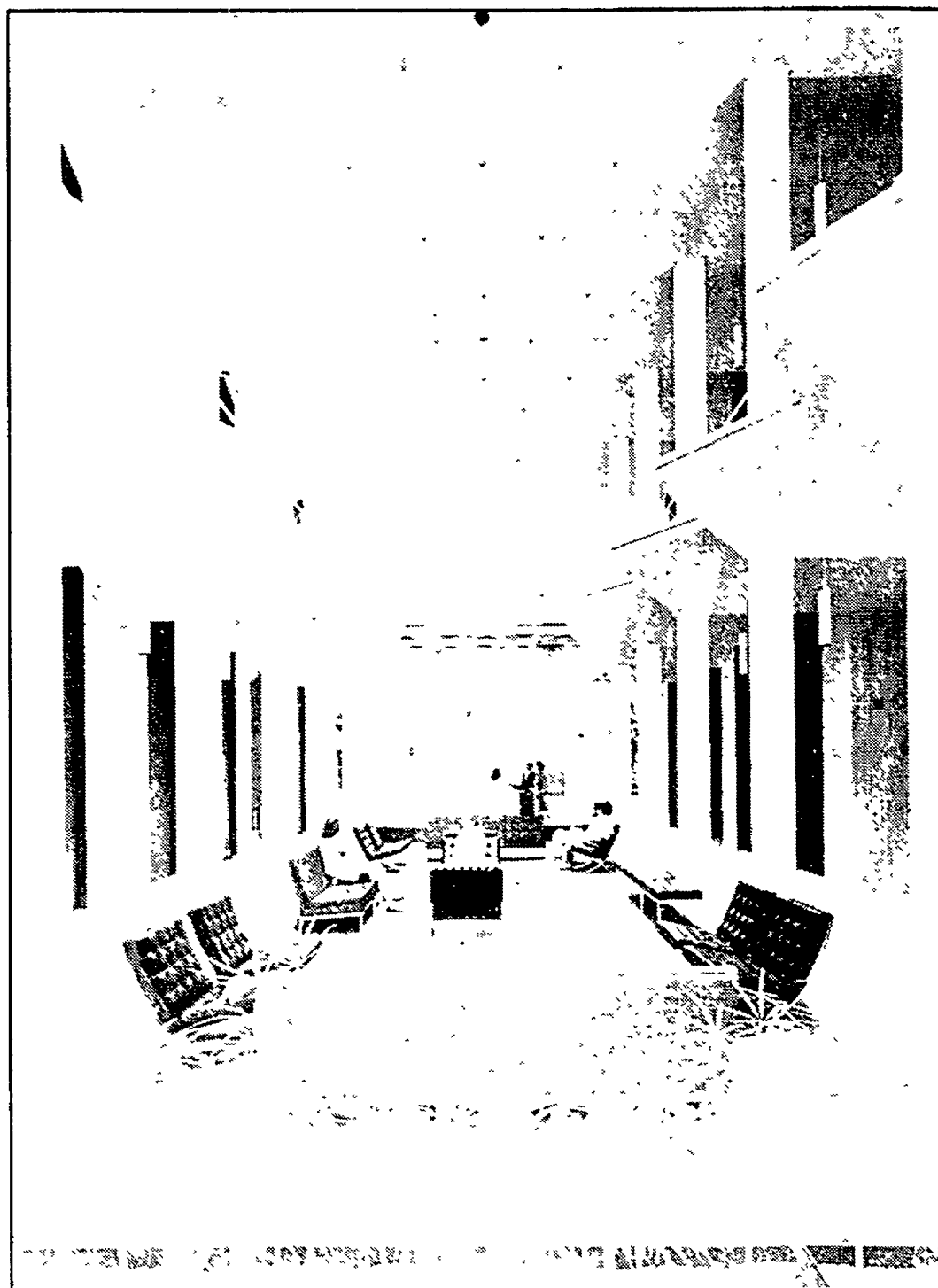
Focus on Photography will be on display through spring 1993.

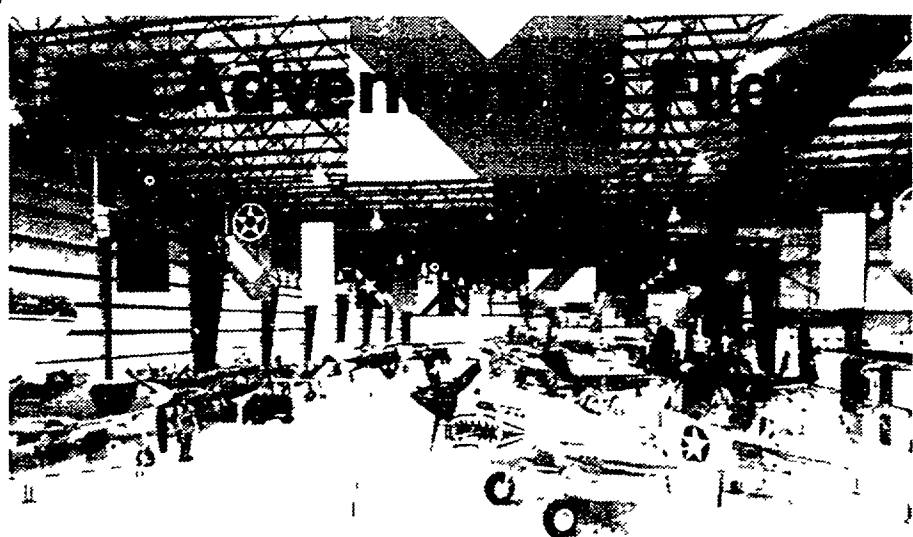

SELF PORTRAIT— Edward Curtis produced only 270 sets of 'The North American Indian,' one of which is on loan to the Muskegon Museum of Art.



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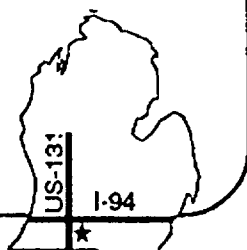
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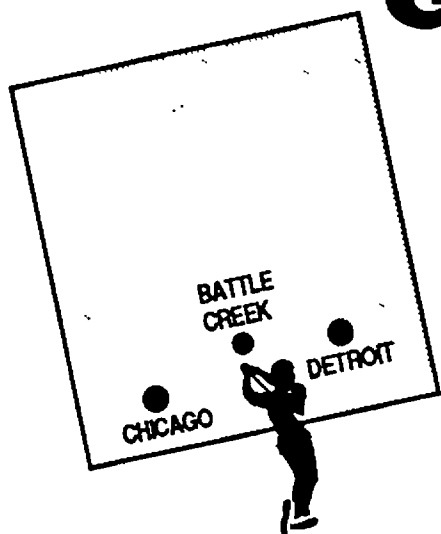
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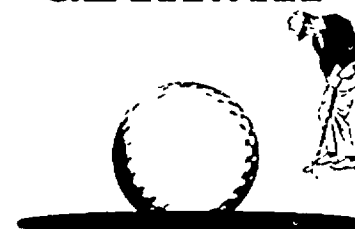
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High-tech comes to life jackets

Wearing one of the old kapok life preservers while trying to navigate a boat is like doing aerobics in a snowsuit.

If life jackets were easier to wear, many more boaters would put them on before heading out.

Soon, shipmates, all of us may be wearing the new crop of inflatable life jackets. Most are so light and thin that a fisherman (or woman) can wrestle a muskellunge on board without necessarily feeling like Bigfoot.

We don't want to alarm boaters unduly, but all of us should protect ourselves from "man overboard" possibilities from the moment we shove off from the dock or the beach. According to the United States Coast Guard, four out of five people who die in boating accidents aren't wearing life jackets at all. They also say that more than 50 percent of boating fatalities occur in small, open boats, many of them under 16 feet.

In emergencies on the water, even

the best of swimmers may need help to survive. The ability to stay afloat for a long time until rescue comes can mean the difference between life and death. A PFD (personal flotation device) can keep you from going under until you are rescued. It can also help protect you from hypothermia, which can be fatal within minutes in cold water.

The trouble is, a lot of us hate to wear a PFD. Inflatables - - jackets (or vests) that you can wear on deck and that inflate only when immersed in water - - seem like a logical compromise.

As of today, only one of the current inflatables has been approved by the Coast Guard for recreational use. Others now on the market may soon receive Coast Guard approval, however. The OK could be based on results of a recent series of exhaustive tests conducted by the non-profit Boat/U.S. Foundation for Boating Safety.

Present-day inflatables are svelte descendants of the bulky old Mae Wests familiar to WWII aviators. The new ones are inflated by carbon dioxide cartridges activated manually by a pull on a lanyard, or automatically by submersion in water. Most of those on the market also have a standby inflation tube that can be used to blow them up by mouth, like a

party balloon.

According to Samuel Wehr, a civilian in the Survival Systems Branch of the U.S. Coast Guard, the landmark study in this area was conducted about 12 years ago by the USCG, with assistance from its Auxiliary.

"The more recent studies," say Wehr, "pretty much confirmed that one. All of the studies showed that for about 20 percent of the time recreational boaters didn't maintain their inflatables in serviceable condition. In other words, they failed to check the condition of the cartridges and replace those that were no longer operable. That's what worried the Coast Guard and why inflatables weren't approved for recreational use at that time."

Obviously, anyone depending on an inflatable that doesn't inflate is in deep water, if you'll pardon the expression.

According to Wehr, by about 1985 the Coast Guard had standards in place for inflatables that resulted in approval for a "hybrid." (Hybrid refers to a PFD that doesn't depend totally on its capacity to inflate, but has some inherent buoyancy even when not inflated.)

Several other inflatables have since come on the market, but they are not hybrids and have not as yet received USCG approval. And that's where the current test by the Boat/U.S. Foundation may come in. "We're waiting for the results right now," says Wehr. "Boat/U.S. had our cooperation all the way."

"The results aren't ready to be made public yet," says Diana deLaurentis of the Boat/U.S. Foundation for Boating Safety, "but we were very encouraged by the level of cooperation from the participants."

To conduct the tests, the Boat/U.S. Foundation asked actual boaters to use inflatable PFDs in real-life situations. Devices were sent to 520 boaters whose names were drawn from boat registrations in 50 states. The participants were told to use these life preservers as they would any other. An amazing 85 percent of them completed the study.

Eight inflatables from five different manufacturers were tested. One-fifth of them were recalled at unannounced intervals for examination by the Foundation and submission to independent laboratories for testing features such as buoyancy, air retention and inflation time.

Of those who water-tested the inflatables, 91 percent said they would rely on them in an emergency. According to 75 percent, the devices did not hamper their boating activity or ability to move about in the water. Most found the inflatables not too complicated to use and felt qualified to service them.

Lab testing found 94 percent of the jackets inflated fully within 10

seconds, 92 percent retained acceptable amounts of air after 12 hours, and 97 percent provided adequate buoyancy, according to preliminary findings.

Jim Ellis, the Boat/U.S. Foundation's director, says results seem to show that although some concerns remain there may be hope for non-hybrid inflatables as Coast Guard-approved devices.

So far, Boat/U.S. has not revealed the names of the inflatables tested. "We can't do that," says deLaurentis, "until we're ready to publish the report this spring."

Inflatable PFDs are expensive. But when those PFDs with inherent buoyancy are not readily available in an emergency, they are of little value. Some of the inflatables are:

A USCG-approved hybrid mentioned by Wehr is the Stearns Type V inflatable Performance II, which has 7.5 pounds of built-in buoyancy uninflated and 30 pounds of inflated buoyancy. It is manually inflated by pulling a ripcord to activate the CO₂ cartridge. It's a full wrap-around vest, making it slightly more bulky and potentially warmer than others. Price is about \$100, including three additional back-up canisters. (Hybrids must be worn while boating to be considered regulation. They aren't intended to be put on in the water.)

The Crewfit (fully automatic) and the Seavest (manually operated by a ripcord), are made by Crewsaver Ltd., a British manufacturer. These were considered unbeatable by the Boat/U.S. Foundation in a report published in 1988. Both inflated fully within two to three seconds, brought the wearer face-up, and gave 35 pounds of buoyancy.


The Crewfit runs about \$200 and the Seavest about \$125. They weigh only about two pounds. Add an integral harness to the Crewfit model and it runs about \$260, with a shipping weight of three pounds.

SOSpenders, made by Sporting Lives Inc., of Meridian, Idaho (208) 888-4184, also come in automatic and manual models. The manufacturer claims the automatic inflates five seconds after immersion, that the manual model inflates instantly following a jerk on the ripcord, and that both models provide 35 pounds of buoyancy. They also have models for children who weigh between 40 and 80 pounds. Rearming cartridges are about \$20 for the adult size.

Both the Crewsavers and the SOSpenders are worn over the back of the neck and look like extra-wide suspenders. They are, therefore, cooler to wear than the Stearns Type V hybrid. They include a safety whistle and a pocket for a strobe, or man-overboard light, with each model. Both brands are available through Boat/U.S. (1-800-937-BOAT) and other dealers. Boat/U.S. in Michigan is located at 2212 East 14 Mile Road,

Inflatables are not intended to be put on in the water. To be safe, you must already have them on when you go overboard.

A Warren, Michigan triathlete has invented and is marketing an inflatable Hydro Belt, intended for distance swimmers to use in an emergency. Mark Supal designed the eight-ounce belt to be worn around the waist. It has no buoyancy when not inflated, but one pull activates a replaceable gas cartridge providing approximately 15 pounds of buoyancy. He recommends Hydro Belts for surfers, wind surfers, fishermen and canoers. The belt costs \$49.95 with two gas cartridges. Contact N.A.E.C., P.O. Box 171, Warren, MI 48090-0171.

There is also a Stearns inflatable waist-pouch PFD providing 22 pounds of buoyancy. It's available for about

\$70 and inflates automatically, by ripcord, or orally before being slipped over the head. It is available at Boat/U.S. outlets and other marine dealers.

The safest protection of all is to watch your feet so you don't stumble and fall overboard.

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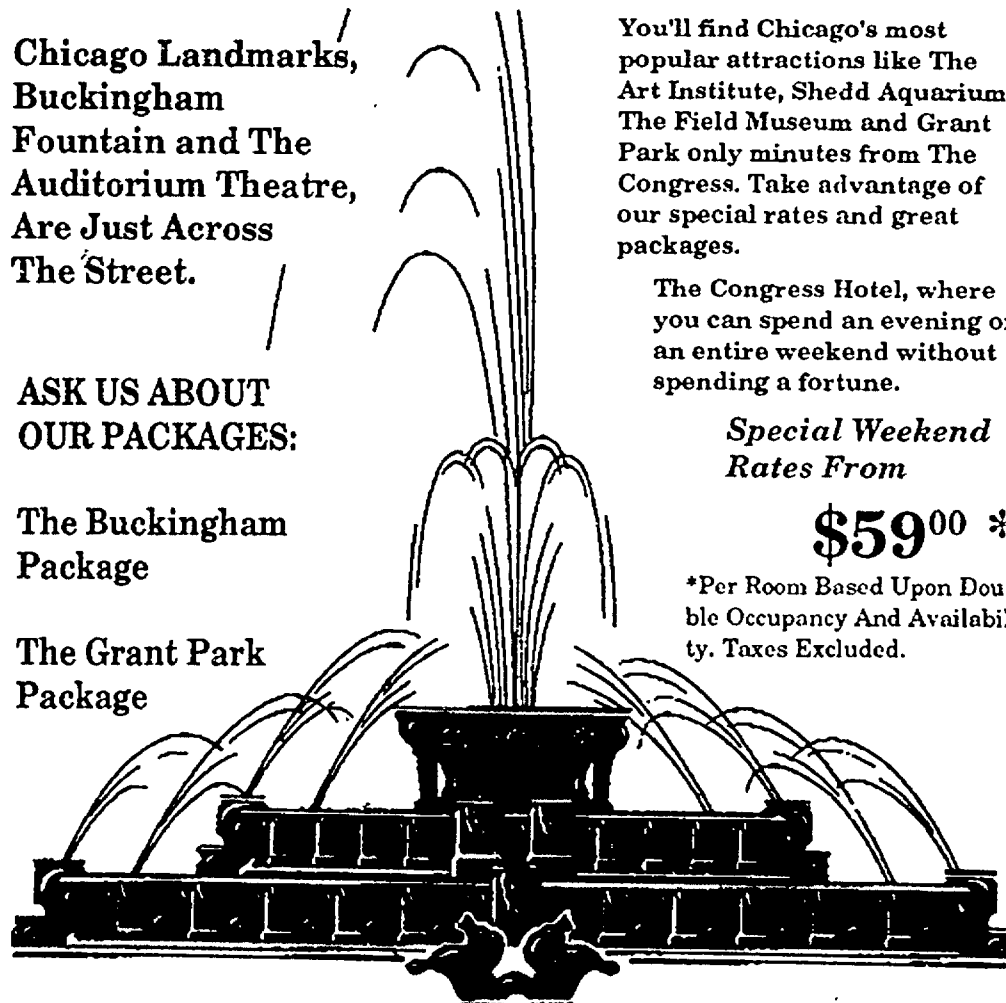
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Art exhibit: From bizarre to beautiful

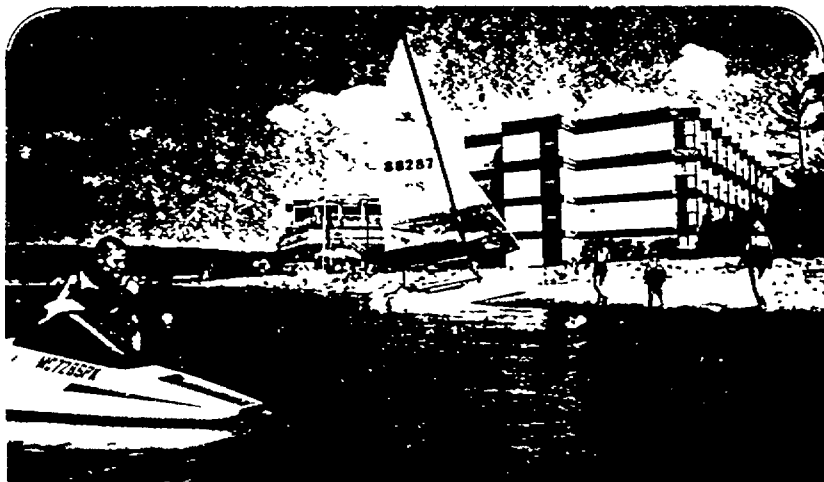
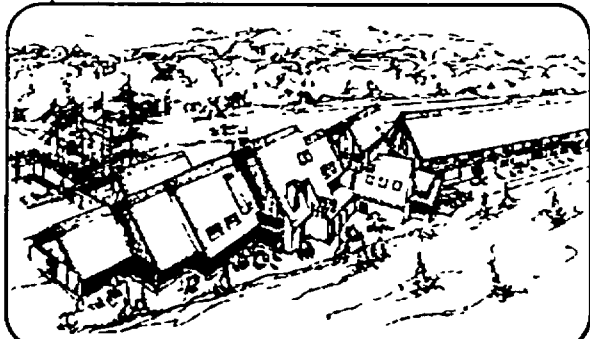
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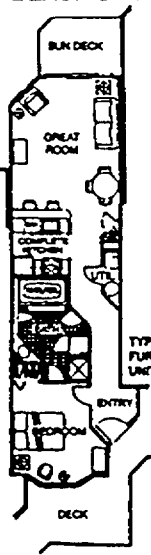
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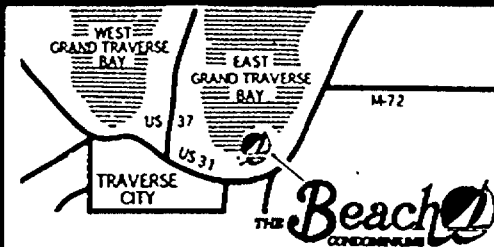
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Balloon contest set for June

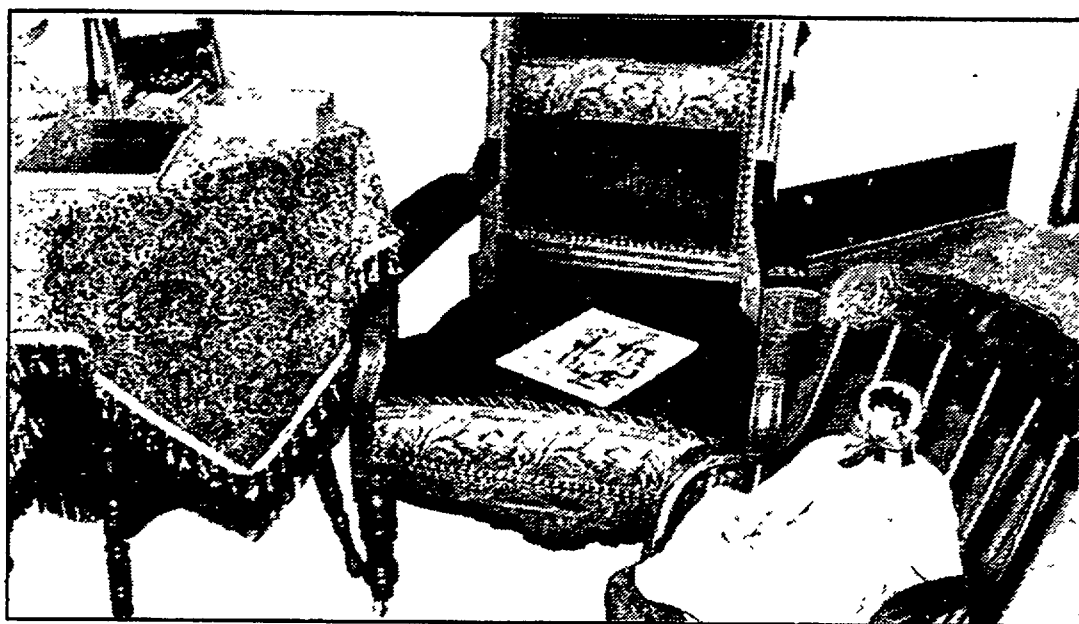

Victorian Era highlighted in Lansing exhibit

Lansing, Michigan—

In March a dramatic, new permanent exhibit, *Growing Up in Michigan, 1880-1895*, will be unveiled at the Michigan Historical Museum. The exhibit explores the fabric of small town life in Michigan during the late 19th century.

The opening of this exhibit coincides with the museum's fourth anniversary in its new home, the Michigan Library and Historical Center, and represents a major step toward completion of its permanent exhibits.

Growing Up in Michigan revolves around the lives of five young Michiganders who were born and came of age during the last half of the 19th century. 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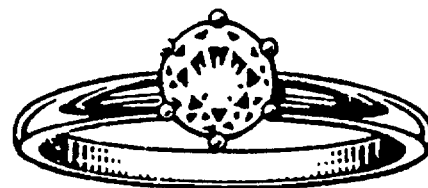
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Rogers turns mean in 'Rio Diablo'

Singers Tritt, Judd co-star in Western

Attempts to transform country-music stars into Western-movie heroes usually don't pan out. Willie Nelson succeeded in 1982's *Barbarosa*, but fired blanks when teamed with outlaw buddies Waylon Jennings, Johnny Cash and Kris Kristofferson in the 1986 TV remake of *Stagecoach*.

Fortunately, *Rio Diablo*, starring Kenny Rogers, Travis Tritt and Naomi Judd, transcends a familiar story line to become a watchable Western that would stand on its own even if its principle players had never found fame for their singing. The CBS movie airs Sunday, Feb. 28.

Rogers, who saddled up for four tele-films as his mild-mannered

Gambler character, says his *Rio Diablo* role as the cold-blooded bounty hunter Quinton Leech is another kind of hombre altogether.

"The difference between this character and Brady Hawks is that this character can hit first," he says.

In the story, Benjamin Tabor's (Tritt) wedding day is interrupted when a gang of bank robbers takes his beautiful bride (Laura Harring) hostage. Leech, on the kidnappers' trail for the bounty, reluctantly takes Tabor along. The younger man, who believes his wife is dead, has revenge on his mind.

The trail takes them to a bawdy house run by Flora Mae Pepper (Judd), an old friend of Leech's who knows the tragedy in his past that motivates his life. One other character they must reckon with is Kansas (Stacy Keach), a ruthless rival bounty hunter.

Rio Diablo makes the acting debuts of both Tritt, winner of the Country Music Association's Horizon Award in 1991, and Judd, whose chronic hepatitis led to her retirement from her highly successful act with daughter Wynonna. Judd, now busy writing her autobiography, ad-

mits that acting was a challenge for her.

"I'm so used to being Naomi Judd," she says, "that it was real hard...to come out of all the beliefs and value systems and personality that you've been for a long time and be somebody else."

Judd gives a believable performance despite what she describes as Rogers' unwillingness to rehearse.

"I think that's what made it so much fun," Rogers says. "I love to see people under the pressure. Because people...do much better if you put them under pressure."

Now a veteran movie actor, Rogers was apparently unsympathetic to the jitters of the first-time actress.

The result of their efforts is far better than Rogers' last *Gambler* adventure, which dredged up a herd of old TV-Western stars for ridiculous cameos. *Rio Diablo* gets high marks for its scenic locations in Texas' Big Bend Ranch Natural Area, engaging pace and Rogers' pleasing turn in a less-than-likable role, but the film's noble intentions bite the dust with an ending that is pure country corn.

'Days' special precedes 'Soap Opera Digest Awards'

Imagine you've been in a coma for a couple of years, you awaken and find yourself on a remote island. You make your way home only to see your husband is in love with another woman. Or at least the man you thought was your husband. Actually, he is an imposter with amnesia, and your real husband has been imprisoned on the same island you were.

You locate your husband and children, and everything is going well until you realize you still have feelings for the imposter you thought was your husband. So are the *Days of Our Lives* for the popular character Marlena (Deidre Hall).

Everything comes to a head on Friday, Feb. 26, when *Days* makes the jump to prime time in a special to be shown before the ninth-annual *Soap Opera Digest Awards* on NBC.

"As fate would have it," says Hall, "Roman (Marlena's husband, played by Wayne Northrop) is out chasing the bad guys, and John (the imposter, played by Drake Hogestyn) and I are accidentally

locked in a time vault. After weeks of trying to stay apart, suddenly we are thrown in this situation and ... well, you'll just have to watch to see what happens. We have had a great time doing all this, and it is a great story."

Hall is hoping the show will do as well in the ratings as it did last year.

"I'm not sure why the show did so well [in 1992], but I hope it happens again," says Hall.

Following the prime-time special, Hall will serve for a second year as co-host of *The Soap Opera Digest Awards*, this time with comedian/actor Paul Reiser.

"I'm looking forward to working with Paul," says Hall. "I've watched his new show [NBC's *Mad About You*] with Helen Hunt, and he's a very funny guy."

The Soap Opera Digest Awards are a little different from other awards shows in that the fans pick the winners. It doesn't matter what show is No. 1 in the ratings or what an actor's "TVQ" [a measure of recognizability] is. Here, the fans rule, and quite often the results are surprising. Almost as surprising as Marlena's love life.

Hexum died from gun mishap; Lila lots but no Alice

Q: I need some information about actor Jon-Erik Hexum, who appeared in the television series *Voyagers*. I read several years ago that he had died. Could you tell me how he died and what other series he starred in? —Shawn Harrison, Haworth, Okla.

A: Hexum's only other television series was a dramatic adventure titled *Cover Up*, wherein he played a male model who was also a secret agent. Tragically, soon after the filming of *Cover Up* began, Hexum placed a gun loaded with blanks to his head and fired, believing it a harmless joke. However, the blast shattered his skull, and he died soon after, at the age of 26.

Q: Anna Lee, who plays Lila Quartermaine on *General Hospital*, starred, I believe, in an old version of *Alice in Wonderland* as Alice. Other characters were played by Cary Grant and W.C. Fields. When was this movie made, and is it available on video cassette? —Sabina Bolbot, Oaklawn, Ill.

A: That version of *Alice in Wonderland* was made in 1933 and starred many of Paramount's top stars of that era, including Grant, Fields, Gary Cooper and Edward Everett Horton. However, it was Charlotte Henry, not Anna Lee, who played Alice in the film, which is not on video according to my sources. Look for Lee in *Bedlam* (1946), *How Green Was My Valley* (1941) and *King Solomon's Mines* (1937).

Q: Lloyd Nolan and Jeanne Crain starred in a movie made in Southern France during 1961 or 1962. The working title was *We Joined the Navy*. A shipmate of mine had a small role in this movie, but I have been told that the title was changed. Can you tell me the name under which the film can be found? —C.R. Bartholomew, Miles City, Mont.

A: Look for that 1962 British-made film under the title *We Are in the Navy Now*. As you scan the background in search of your old Navy buddy, you'll also notice it was Joan O'Brien, not Jeanne Crain, who co-starred with Nolan.

Q: Recently, I saw a TV movie called *The Last Frontier*, starring Linda Evans as an Australian rancher. Just as her husband's sister was pouring gas around the house and striking a match, the TV blacked out. How can I find out how it ended? —J.M. Muffler, Clarksburg, W. Va.

A: I don't want to give away the ending to other readers, so I'll simply suggest you watch it again. According to Lifetime Television's advance March schedule, the movie will run in two two-hour segments the night of Saturday, March 13.

Q: I'm in search of a movie made during the 1940s that starred Margaret O'Brien and, I believe, Roddy McDowall. I recall that they were playmates who discovered a secret garden behind a locked gate and began to replant it. I believe it was originally planted for a man's wife, who died at an early age. What's the name of this movie, and is it available on tape? —Lynn Beauchamp, Plymouth, Ind.

A: The name of the 1949 movie is, appropriately enough, *The Secret Garden*. The male juvenile actor you remember was not Roddy McDowall, but a pre-*Quantum Leap* Dean Stockwell. Margaret O'Brien's uncle, whose garden it was, was played by Herbert Marshall. The movie is available on video.

Q: Years ago, I saw a movie titled *Jonathan Livingston Seagull*. Was the music by Neil Diamond? If so, is the soundtrack available? Is the movie on video? —R. Byrd, High Point, N.C.

A: The answer is yes, on all three counts.

ABC heads north for Junior Iditarod

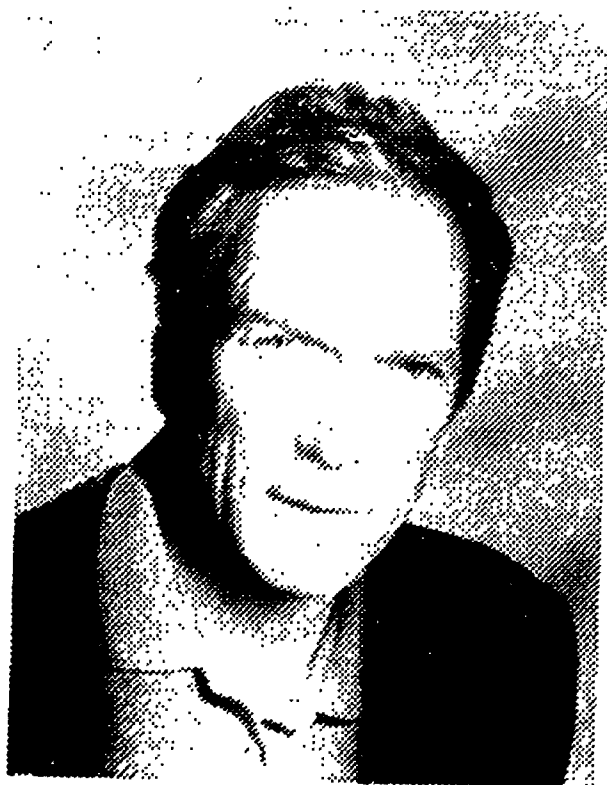

Each winter, one dogsledder and his team traverse the Iditarod Trail, a 1,000-mile-plus route from Anchorage to Nome, Ala., more swiftly than the rest, though many may try. Retracing the fabled route a brave few Alaskans forged with serums needed to combat a diphtheria epidemic in 1925, the Iditarod has since become synonymous with endurance and fortitude.

The Great Alaska Sled Dog Race, airing Saturday, Feb. 27, on ABC, is a closer look at the Junior Iditarod, a downsized version of the historic event for those who are too young – under 18 years – to mush the full trail. David Kiviat, who produced the show for ABC Sports, says the junior race prepares the young mushers in many ways.

"They go by the same rules, there's mandatory gear they have to carry, and they have to spend at least one night on the trail," Kiviat says. "The purpose of the show is not only to present the Junior Iditarod, but to explain what Alaska is, what sled dogs are, how to care for sled dogs and so on. I feel, as producer of the show, there are aspects you need to hit on to explain what viewers are about to see."

Youngsters are sure to enjoy this vivid visual handshake from their neighbors to the north – kids who count Iditarod champions like Joe Runyan and Susan Butcher in the same company with Michael Jordan.
