Sales tax proposal gets little reaction from school heads

If there's only one thing Northville school officials are sure about in Proposal A, it's that they have nothing to do with it.

Yes, there will be a vote June 2 the state has called for a vote," Northville School Supt Leonard Rezmierski said of the proposal which would raise the state sales tax from 4 to 6 percent. "We have nothing to do with it as a school district. No, we can't tack on our millage question at that time and yes, June 14 will be our heard of education vote.

Proposal A would dedicate all revenues generated from the sales tax increase to a school fund. It would also promise a per-pupil dollar amount, limit annual property tax assessment increases and place a cap on possible mills levied by local school districts.

If Proposal A passes June 2, the state consititution would allow school districts to levy 18 mills without the approval of voters. Districts could levy up to 9 additional mills with the approval of local voters, bringing the total operating miliage to

However, if local school officials

are understanding the proposal correctly, the Northville district would only be allowed to levy 7.5 additional

We can't exceed the 3-percent growth factor from one year of our operating budget to our next," Rezmierski said. "So, we're assuming we could only implement 7.5 of the $\overline{9}$ additional mills. That's our interpretation. The next question is, should you ask for all 9 (mills) when you know you can only levy 7.5? Do we hold the rest at bay or do we have to come back and ask every year? . . . We're still chasing all these issues

Also, a per-pupil foundation grant of \$4,800 would be guaranteed for each student for the 1993-94 school year. Currently, Northville receives \$5,739 for each pupil attending classes in the district. Districts currently under the \$4.800 foundation would receive 10 percent increases until they reached the foundation level. Districts like Northville, now exceeding \$4,800 per-pupil in expenditures, would be held harmless, according to backers of the plan.

Trustees walk into study session with full plate

Talk of taxes, audits and personnel matters will be on the table at tonight's Board of Trustees study session.

The session will start right after trustees close a 7 p.m. special meeting which was called to approve the final plat for the Oaks of Northville subdivision.

The study session, the third of its kind for the board, will open with a status report on the township's audit.

Township auditors Plante & Moran have finished the audit and are expected to share

their findings with the board. The auditors have written a memo to the trustees recommending that they terminate a monthly sewer capacity lease with the city of Livonia now that a portion of the Western Township Utilities Authority system is up and running.

According to the memo from Plante & Moran, the township had leased sewer capacity from Livonia for \$5,400 a month. With Phase I of the WIUA system in full operation, the lease is no longer needed.

Township Supervisor Karen Baja said after meeting with the auditors last week that the township's financial picture was bleak. She hesitated to go into specificsk but did allude to a lower general fund balance than was expected.

Township resident Greg Arceri has also written a letter to the trustees to inform them that he intends to appeal his property assessment to the Tax Tribunal.

In a letter addressed to Baja and dated April 9, Arceri told Baja he thought he had a strong case for a partial if not full tax rollback this year. But his case fell through after one of the two township boards of review denied his request.

The Lakes of Northville resident said he plans to take his case to the state, but before he does he would like trustees to address concerns he had about the township's assessment.

In response to his denial, he wrote: "This unimaginative response would only be credible if everyone's prior assessments were fair and equitable. As we look over our tax rolls it's obvious 'certain individuals' again are not tapped 'in line with the general increase."

Even though the board is prohibited from taking any action at the study session, Baja said she will discuss it with trustees and see if there is any direction from the board on Arceri's request.

The board will also consider a revised re-

quest from Baja to proceed with hiring a previously approved deputy supervisor. Two months ago, the board gave Baja the okay to hire a deputy supervisor to help handle the clerical work in her office. The position was approved by the trustees at \$11 an hour and without benefits. But now Baja is seeking a \$3 raise in the hourly wage with a one-year contract. Benefits she is seeking for the clerical worker include personal business days, a

one-week paid vacation and paid holidays. The board will meet at township hall, 41600 Six Mile Road at 7 p.m. for the special meeting. The study session, which is open to the public, will follow the meeting.

The requirements for graduation are now official as the board of education held the final reading of its graduation policy Monday night.

In order to graduate from Northville High School, a student must: 1. Earn 23 credits in grades nine through 12.

• 2. Complete three credits in

science.

• 3. Complete two credits in mathematics.

 4. Complete four credits of English, which includes one credit of English nine and .5 credit of

composition. • 5. Complete three credits of social studies, including half credits in each of the following: U.S. in the 20th century, international issues and

American government. • 6. Complete one credit of physical education, which will include a half credit of physical education

fundamentals. 7. Complete two credits of either

fine or applied arts. Special education students have

two options in fulfilling graduation requirements. They can either complete the regular education standards or an adjusted schedule which includes: • 1. Completion of requirements in

approved special education courses, consistent with the recommendations of the Individualized Educational Planning Committee (IEPC). 2. Designation of appropriate vocational courses as substitutes for specific content requirements with the consideration and approval of the IEPC. For example, one semester of electronics could substitute for one semester of science, according to the

3. On the job training, such as work experience placements, or individualized vocational training could be substituted for specific course requirements with the approval of the



Board policy addresses comments

Policy sub-committee members will take another look at two proposals approved for first readings at Monday night's Northville Board of Education meeting.

Treasurer Robert O. McMahon questioned the title of the first policy. School Board Meetings." The purpose of the policy is to "provide for the orderly, concise and expedient conducting of regular school board meetings, while at the same time provide adequate and reasonable opportunity for citizens of the community to offer their views and opinions regarding their schools and the educational program of the district."

McMahon said he felt the policy should refer to citizen comment in its

This (title) really provides for citizen comments for meetings," he said. "I'm looking for a policy that states how board meetings are structured." Supt. Leonard Rezmierski said the structure of board meetings is in the board's by-laws, which are reviewed

every July. Trustee Patricia Custer also questioned the title.

"I do like Trustee McMahon's idea to re-phrase this to another particu-

lar title," she said.

The policy sets aside specific times for citizens to address the board; immediately following the adoption of the agenda and at the conclusion of the agenda, but prior to adjournment.

Citizens wishing to address the board are required to file a visitor's comment form with the secretary of the board.

The policy also allows the board president to limit citizen comment and discussion, including time per individual, per issue and/or number of persons allowed to speak on either side of an issue. A maximum of up to

30 minutes may be allowed for a particular agenda item, unless otherwise directed by the board. No agenda item will be brought before the board, unless agreed upon by a

majority of the board, after 11 p.m. Any citizen wanting the board to address a topic should notify the superintendent no later than noon on the Monday preceding the board meeting.

The other policy, titled "Board Study Sessions, simply reads: "Study sessions of the board of education may be held for the purpose of exchanging information, sharing viewpoints and developing understanding.

"1. During study sessions, board members may express their views without concern that they be considered a commitment on a particular issue. No formal position is assumed as a result of study session deliberations.

"2. Study sessions may be sche-

duled as the need arises."

McMahon asked if the policy should provide for citizen comments at the end of study sessions, as the

board already allows. "Do we want to acknowledge

that?" he asked. Trustee Jean Hansen said since the board sessions are open meetings and citizens are always welcome to give input, she felt it would be repetitious if placed in the policy.

An audience member, Steve Lloyd, asked if board study sessions could be announced in advance so more people would know about them.

We're governed by law to post (notices of meetings) at least 24 hours prior to the meeting," Carol Rahimi, board president, replied.

Lloyd asked if board study sessions could be announced with up to a week's notice to allow the times and dates to be placed in the newspaper.

Rahimi said the policy subcommittee would take up the issue at its next meeting.

Use caution when choosing asphalt paving contractors

As the Michigan weather gets warmer and the asphalt paving season begins, consumers are warned to be extremely cautious when choosing a contractor to pave a driveway or parking lot.

Each spring, bands of con-artists, often referred to as traveling criminals, enter Michigan in order to defraud unsuspecting homeowners and business people. Driveway and parking lot paving and maintenance scams are a favorite money-maker for many of these travelers.

Most often, the criminal will call on a consumer and claim that they have some ashphalt material left over from a job they've completed nearby. The consumer is offered special prices on this "left over ashphalt" if they "act now and pay now." This offer should be the first warning to the consumer that they may be the target of a paving rip-off.

Professional asphalt contractors will know, with great accuracy, how much paving material it will take to left over from another job."

Most reputable asphalt paving contractors will offer a price on a service that will be valid for a number of days. "Today only" sales are another sign of a rip-off. "If the great deal they are offering today is not available tomorrow or next week, it's probably a

scam, says Becsey.
"It is recommended that consumers request local client and bank re-ferences and receive bids from at least two contractors before allowing any work to be done," said Michigan State Police Detective Sgt. Bill Elliott. "Most importantly, the consumer should insist on a written contract specifying, in detail, the work to be performed and the agreed-upon price. Anyone who suspects an attempted paving fraud should contact their local state police post. If you feel

The foundation guarantee would be adjusted each state fiscal year. It would replace all state formula aid, including state payments for retirement and social security, and all other categorical aid except special education, early childhood education and special education transportation.

"My fear is that we're going to get this additional obligation (to fund pensions and social security) without the availability of obtaining the funds," Rezmierksi said

If approved, the state sales tax would increase from 4 percent to 6 percent effective July 17. All revenue raised from the 2 cent increase would go directly to a school aid fund.

Proposal A means good news for taxpayers by limiting annual assessment increases to 5 percent or the inflation rate, whichever is less. It could hurt the pocketbooks of new homeowners, though, as home assessments would be read-

justed to current market value when the property was sold or transferred.

The assessment limit would begin with taxes levied in 1993. As-sessments would still be adjusted for additions or losses to existing

property and new construction. Rezmierski said community informational meetings will be held in the future to keep residents abreast of Proposal A. The Northville PTA-PTSA Coordinating Council's Legislative Action Network (LAN) is busily studying the proposal and is expected to disseminate information on the plan.

This couldn't have come at a more complicated time for schools (because the statewide vote is) prior to local district voting." Rezmierski said. "It's going to require us to get some very efficient information to our residents."

John Street, director of business and finance, said even if Proposal A passes, it won't mean the Legislature will be done revamping the schools.

School activist threatens to file court complaint

By MICHELLE KAISER

School activist Robert Bernard has threatened the Northville Board of Education with legal action.

At Monday night's board meeting, Bernard asked the board for assurances in refraining from using taxpayer money in publishing information about the June 2 Proposal A issue in the district's newsletter, the 'School News."

"if I don't hear (what I want to hear tonight). I'll file a complaint in court tomorrow morning," he told board members

School Supt. Leonard Rezmierski told Bernard it was the opinion of the

school district's attorney that the district could publish concrete information about the ballot proposal in the newsletter as long as it didn't take a position.

"We've been advised that this is a course we can still follow," Rezmierski said. We've been advised by legal counsel that we've done nothing in violation of the law.

On Tuesday, Bernard said he would speak to the school district's attorney to see if the district would be willing to resolve the conflict before he filed an injunction in Wayne County Circuit Court.

"I know they've done this in the past," Bernard said, referring to the

district publishing information for or against a ballot issue. "That's what I'm basing my complaint on is that it's happened in the past. I asked for assurance that it won't happen again and they wouldn't give me that assurance."

Last September, Bernard submitted a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request, asking the district to send him a copy of its policy regarding publishing information in the School News.

Referring to a state attorney general's opinion that "school districts and other public boards and commissions lack statutory authority to expend public funds to influence the

electorate in support of or in opposition to a particular ballot proposal or candidate," Bernard was concerned about the content of material published last year by the Northville PTA's Legislative Action Network (LAN). In a Sept. 24, 1992 letter to Rezmierski, Bernard said he felt the information published about property tax proposals was "speculative, opinionated and exhibited a definite negative bias."

Bernard then inquired about equal access to the "School News." In a Dec. 10, 1992 letter, Rezmierski responded that the newsletter was limited to publishing school information submitted by district personnel, students and district-related groups

the "School News" did not accept or publish articles from other persons or groups.

Bernard felt his original FOIA request had not been answered and again requested a copy of the policy dealing with what information could be published in the newsletter.

Six days later, Bernard received a response from Rezmierski which stated the district had no adopted written policies so that the "free-flow of information from the school district to the community" would be encouraged.

Eventually, the district paid Bernard \$85 to cover his costs of filing a

such as the PTA. He further stated complaint in circuit court. Under the FOIA, a person may be awarded compensatory and punitive damages up to \$500 if denied the right to receive a copy of something considered part of

the public record. In early April, Rezmierski said the district opted to pay Bernard's court fees rather than drive up the district's legal fees trying to explain that the policy Bernard requested did not

When Rezmierski told Bernard Monday night the district would continue with its current procedure, Bernard was not satisfied.

"I'll guess I'll be in court tomorrow," he said.

Board policy to govern conference attendance

By MICHELLE KAISER

Board of education members approved the first reading of a policy governing board member attendance at education-related conferences Monday night.

The policy, originally adopted in April 1980, revised in February 1987 and reaffirmed in November 1991. had no changes except in its format.

"You'll notice that the purpose (of the policy) and the statement are no lon-

ger separated. The policy encourages board members to participate in educational workshops, seminars, conferences and other training opportunities which will help them to become better board members.

The following conditions for conference attendance apply:

• 1. Attendance arrangements should be made through the superin• 2. The district will pay for necessary expenses.

• 3. Board members must use the standard expense reporting

• 4. Budget conditions may limit or curtail out-of-district conference attendance. • 5. The board president will impose

conference limitations when necessary.

• 6. Useful information gained at conferences will be shared with

The board also held a first reading on a policy dealing with nondiscrimination.

The policy reads the district will not "unlawfully discriminate on the basis of handicap, race, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, height or weight. The district reaffirms its policy to comply with Title VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the

Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, the Michigan Handicappers' Civil Rights Act, and all other applicable federal and state laws and regulations prohibiting discrimination."

Supt. Leonard Rezmierski said he checked on the wording of "unlawfully discriminate because policy sub-committee members thought the term was redundant. However, the school attorney felt it was in the district's best interest the keep the term in the policy language.

There might be a case when we

have an opportunity for a specific gender," Rezmierski said. "For instance, we may need to hire a male to supervise the male locker room versus hiring a female for the female

locker room. Rezmierski also added that the proper federal and state laws regulating non-discrimination will be in-

cluded in the policy language. The policy concludes that any written inquiries regarding compliance of the laws should be directed toward the superintendent.

Downs said Reagan was relaxed and personable during the meeting. and told anecdotes about his early days as a life guard and sports

"He told me he broadcast a football game that Gerald Ford was in and I told him I knew. I read about it in his book. He was very impressed."







Schools should set example and keep newsletter neutral

School administration nemesis Bob Bernard threatened this week to seek a court injunction barring school officials from including information on Proposal A in upcoming editions of the district newsletter "School News."

At Monday's board of education meeting, Bernard said he would hold off on taking court action only if district officials provided assurances they would not use the newsletter to present onesided information about the June 2 ballot question which seeks to limit property taxes and increase the state sales tax. Hearing no such promise, he resolved to press ahead. As of late Wednesday morning, the Northville man was making plans to petition Wayne County Circuit Court for a restraining order.

For reasons no one seems to understand, himself included, Bernard has made it his life's mission to micromanage the actions of school administrators and monitor every penny of school district expense. Whatever his motivation, it's certainly his right as a member of the taxpaying public to keep a close watch on things, but his zealousness in trying to undercover any impropriety with which to hang officials sometimes leads to his seeing skeletons in closets that simply aren't there.

In spite of his tendency to cry wolf, however, on this one issue, at least, Bernard appears to have a point. Information on last year's ballot proposals A and *C included in an August 1992 edition of "School News" dealt at length with the negative consequences of those referenda while hardly mentioning the potential benefits to property owners. What the proposals would not have done (e.g. would not have equalized property taxes, would not have offered protection from Robin Hood measures, would not have erased funding inequities between school districts) was heavily emphasized, but very little was said about the tax relief that would have accrued to residents and businesses from passage of either A or C. Not surprisingly, a fineprint statement ran along the bottom of aying that, according to a Legislative Action Network analysis, "Proposal A and C could have significant negative effects on the Northville Community and its schools."

the legality of presenting biased informa-



tion in newsletters that are prepared and mailed by institutions deriving their funding from public sources. While the attorney general has said public boards "lack statutory authority to expend public funds to influence the electorate," the state's chief lawyer has also said that as long as specific wording recommending a "yes" or a "no" vote is not included, public bodies are allowed to discuss ballot issues in official publications.

Whatever the outcome of Bernard's forthcoming lawsuit, we think it is not asking too much to call upon school officials to refrain from using the "School News" as a propaganda vehicle to disseminate their position regarding the June 2 ballot question. Even if the court refuses to grant an injunction, it could still be seen as inappropriate for school officials to be presenting only one side of an issue in a publication which is prepared by people whose salaries are paid by the taxpayers of the district and which is mailed out at taxpayer expense.

Filling public mailings with select, incomplete information about controversial issues is hardly unique to Northville the practice, in fact, is quite commonplace among school districts. What's more, most people expect a slanted view and know enough to consider the source when reading such material.

Even so, residents who may hold an opinion that is contrary to that espoused by the school administration or who are simply offended at the idea of being preached to through the mail are entitled to know that their tax dollars will not be used to finance an information campaign of which they disapprove. Why not prove the exeception in this case and be the lone district in the state, perhaps the There is somewhat murky thinking on country, to keep its newsletter politically neutral this spring?

Where are the Democrats?

Then came a job in Grosse Ile where being a Democrat carries a stigma comparable to being an ex-con. Democrats are slowly becoming more accepted on the island, but I'm told

a closely guarded secret. I even heard that one person had a hard time getting a building permit from township officials because it was known he was in the habit of voting Democratic.

Democrats don't win seats on boards in Grosse Ile, where the local elections require a declaration of party affiliation. People moving on to the island who might have run for office as Democrats elsewhere often undergo a chameleon-like transformation when they cross the bridge with their furniture in tow. 
I must comment on the letter from Constance Conder concerning the Northville librarians.

Openness law should be amended



Governance of Michigan's public uniour state's most valuable asset, is today largely stymied.

Why? Because of a far-reaching dispute between the universities and the news media about how the Michigan Open

new president.

The universities claim that presidential searches should take place in secrecy. They cite research that shows most good candidates will not allow themselves to be nominated if their names become public. They cite scholar John Nason: "The best qualified individuals are often the least inclined to submit themselves to being dressed and undressed in public."

The news media, most recently last month in arguments at the Michigan Supreme Court in connection with a suit by Booth Newspapers against the University of Michigan Board of Regents, claim that the prohibition on closed meetings by public bodies is both correct and absolute. Picking a new president in full public view is an intrinsically good process, the argument goes. Not only that, but public universities are public bodies and, as such, are obliged to follow the Open Meetings Act, regardless of any inconvenience to them in the process of selecting a president.

How bad is the present situation? Plenty. The Michigan State University search for a successor to John DiBiaggio is, in the words of one insider, "a shambles." Trying both to con-

duct their search in private and avoid violating

the OMA, MSU trustees designated a subcommittee to run the search. Somebody leaked to versities, arguably The State News, the student newspaper, a secret list of 136 candidates nominated for the job. Whereupon most of the experienced university administrators on the list promptly withdrew.

The U-M Board of Regents last year abandoned its duty to advise President James Duderstadt in selecting a new chancellor for the U-M-Dearborn campus. The regents couldn't figure out any way to fulfill their duty of office without violating the OMA or some judge's nebulous order based on what the law might mean.

• Caught in the legal and political confusion. most university boards are either ducking important decisions until the Supreme Court rules or letting their presidents make decisions without their input.

The policy issues are tough, setting in direct opposition two important principles.

On the one hand, public universities are public bodies, clearly under the jurisdiction of the Open Meetings Act and therefore obliged to recognize the presumption that the best decisions are made in the full light of public scrutiny. Most newspaper editorials on the subject tolerate no deviation from this absolute position. Most university board members and legislators are scared of editorial criticism for incorrect thinking.

On the other hand, members of governing boards are obliged by their office to act in the best interest of their institutions. Nearly unanimously, they believe that a public search for a president inevitably will scare off the best candidates, thereby damaging their university. And most resent being hamstrung by a mixture of ambiguous opinions by judges who don't have to deal with the consequences of their rul-

ings and drumfire attacks from nosy editors.

Because I have a foot (firmly though uneasily) on both sides of the barbed wire of this debate - I'm both a regent of U-M and an active newspaper person — I am struck at both how sensible and yet how irreconcilable these positions have become.

Here's a solution to this dilemma, one that pays respect both to the principle of public conduct of public business and at the same time allows our universities to get the possible pool of presidential candidates:

Urge the Legislature to amend the Open Meetings Act such that searches for university presidents may be conducted in secret until the board has reduced the field of candidates to a short list of finalists, say no more than four. At that point, make everything about the process - background of candidates, interviews, votes — public.

This process would preserve the legitimate interests of the public by requiring all decisions with consequences to be taken in public. But it would also encourage good candidates to allow their names to be put forward without fear of premature disclosure. At the end, releasing their names would force nominees to fish or cut bait as candidates.

Fortunately, a bill to amend the Open Meetings Act already has been introduced by Sen. John Schwarz, R-Battle Creek. I encourage those readers who are interested in breaking the stalemate and allowing Michigan's great universities to get on with their business to write to Sen. Schwarz, Michigan State Senate, PO Box 30036, Lansing, MI 48909.

Novi fights to preserve heritage in developing world

Few people consider the City of Novi for its historical value.

On the contrary, most see it as a community rich in resources and ripe for development, as evidenced by its economic growth in the past 20

Few familiar with Novi really know of its past and even fewer know that before the opening of Twelve Oaks Mall, Novi was really nothing more than the small rural town that sprang from the intersection at the corner of Novi Road and Grand River Avenue.

What is even more frustrating to local historians, is the myth that some people still believe Novi was nothing more than the olispring of the shopping mall.

The conflicting tales have prompted Novi historians to take a bolder stance on preserving the city's past. Preservation efforts have tripled as city planners forge ahead with their vision of planned development.

Today as city officials continue to break new ground, historians are scrambling to exhume the city's past from its grave of new development.

What once was a small farming

community has exploded into a booming metropolitan area. Within minutes of hopping on any one of the local expressways, commuters can enjoy easy access to offices, airports and attractions in Detroit, Ann Arbor, Port Huron and Flint.

Nowadays, like the City of Troy was years ago, Novi is the city of tomorrow. Developers are flocking here, gobbling up large parcels of land to build upscale industrial, commercial and residential developments.

Therein lies the conflict. City planners are attempting to build a tax base while retaining the city's bedroom-community flair. The city is a macrocosm of the planned unit development with equal mixes of commercial, industrial and residential development.

The most recent trend has been a drop in the number of commercial and industrial projects due to the economic slowdown. Instead there's a bigger spurt from developers interested in building single family residential homes.

And there's a market for it. Many city residents have followed the road to Novi. They've left smaller homes in suburbs east, west and south of here to buy larger homes on bigger lots. leagues on the Preservation Novi


As city planners forge ahead with their vision, city historians are fighting behind the scenes to preserve a little of Novi's rich history. It's become a subtle tug of war between city officials with a vision for the future and city historians with a hope of sec-

uring the past. Subtle as the debate between development and historic preservation may seem now, it's bound to heat up.

Local historians are adding troops to their army. In addition to the Novi Historical Society and the Historical Commission comes Preservation Novi, a third dimension to the preservation puzzle.

Led by a trio of well-known historical gurus — local historians LuAnne Kozma, Kathleen Mutch and City Council Member Tim Pope — Preservation Novi is the latest addition to the list of historical groups yearning to protect Novi's past for the sake of its future. The non-profit group incorporated earlier this month.

cal circle in Novi, their mission in this latest historical endeavor is light years ahead of challenges they've faced in the past. Mutch said the new group incorporated after the city nearly lost one of its vintage keepsakes, the Methodist Church on Novi Road and Grand River Avenue.

The 117-year-old church appeared doomed last fall to meet the wrecking ball. But just before the demolition was to begin, city historians figuratively jumped in front of it and halted the destruction. Members of the city's Historical Society reminded city officials of a newly enacted state w. Under the Historic Preservation Act, local units of government are allowed to impose a moratorium while the city is undergoing a historic district survey.

The moratorium has given the Society six months to find a new location for the church.

Mutch said the church's impending demise was the impetus for the formation of Preservation Novi. But while its scope is similiar to that of other historical groups in Novi, its purpose is slightly different.

Preservation Novi is intended to be a non-profit group that seeks to encourage and promote historical preservation. It also plans to raise funds for educational and preservational programs in Novi.

Planning keeps town's friendly feel intact

"Keeping a small town atmosphere," said Stephen Ball, is one of the charges of the Northville Planning Commission of which he is a member.

"A five or six story building would destroy the character of the town," he said, as would one large single development.

Also of concern for the commission is the flow of traffic in and out of a property - residential and business property both.

So twice on the first and third Tuesday, he and eight others meet at city hall at 8 p.m. with a planning consultant and city council liaison to discuss requests for approval of new or renovated structures — business and residential.

"We each get a packet one week ahead of time," he said, typically with one to three cases, including blueprints to study. "If I don't know the property, I take

a look at it," Ball said. The Cady Street development across from MainCentre is much in discussion currently, he said. Proposals would move Cady Street south and connect it with the current Cady

But the parking ramp, Ball said, is the most pressing problem because "the community as a whole is interested.


There is a need for parking. The existing ramp will be torn down and a new one built. The problem lies in how to flow cars in and out without snarling traffic.

As a matter of fact, the flow of traffic in and out of all property, Ball said, is a concern for the commission in the interest of public safety.

Ball, a professor in marketing at Cleary College, said it is his first academic interest in architecture that prompted him to apply for a seat on the commission, an assignment that has provided him with an opportunity to give something back to the community.



A: The O.K. Corral was the site of the famous shootout in which the Earp brothers (Virgil, Morgan and Wyatt) and Doc Holiday battled infamous outlaws Ike and Billy Clanton and Frank and Tom McLaury. Indeed, it is still standing.

The corral can be found in

The corral can be found in Tombstone, Ariz., a place which during the 1930s became known as "the town too tough to die." Tombstone was a silver-mining town in the 1870s and '80s until the mines were flooded and abandoned in 1887.

The town's gunlighting past is now its most lucrative memory. Tombstone has become a popular tourist attraction for Old West fans.

For \$1.50 people can visit the O.K. Corral and watch reenactments of the famous shootout on the first and third Sunday of every month

ery month.

The graves of the McLaury brothers and Billy Clanton (Ike fled the scene and was unharmed) are located at Boot Hill Graveyard. Plus, there are plenty of saloons, Western memorabilia shops and theme restaurants to

keep visitors busy.

Helldorado Days, which take place on the third weekend in October, began to be celebrated in 1929 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the town. Activities include mock fights and shootouts, a parade and

contests.

Small town attitude in a big city

From art museums to Camden Yards, Baltimore offers unique experience

Welcome to Baltimore, hon.
Baltimore natives liberally apply the term "hon" to friend and stranger alike. It immediately conveys something of the small-town mood that persists in Baltimore, despite the big city trappings.

For tourists Baltimore has recently become synonymous with the Inner Harbor, a waterfront development filled with shops and flanked by the National Aquarium and the popular Orioles Park at Camden Yards (the new "old-fashioned" baseball stadium now in its second season).

But beyond this shimmering mirage hides a gritty yet much more interesting city, buffeted by waves of renewal and decay. This Baltimore is a blue-collar, beer-drinking, industrial port.

At the same time it is a city filled with art — from outstanding collections amassed by 19th-century merchants to the Picassos and Matisses of the Cone sisters to innovative new works produced by national and local artists attracted by Baltimore's texture and diversity.

On balmy spring nights that come early to Baltimore, neighbors sporting bouffant hair styles or tattoos and leather sit out on stoops.

The endless blocks of row houses are punctuated by corner bars and the occasional window shrine to Elvis.

This is the quirky town that inspired the novelist Anne Tyler and the filmmaker John Waters; a town of ethnic neighborhoods, governed by a dynamic young black mayor, Kurt Schmeles

Each historical cycle of boom and bust has left behind entire neighborhoods of distinctive architecture.

In Fells Point and Federal Hill young professionals are buying up the narrow, 18th-century brick row houses.

In Bolton Hill and Mount Vernon 19th-century town houses abandoned by whites during the race riots of the 1960s have been renovated by artists and the gay community. Last year the Census Bureau offi-

cially declared Baltimore and Washington a single metropolitan area.

For Baltimoreans this may mean the beginning of the end, as the city is overwhelmed and homogenized by the spreading suburbs of the nation's capital.

Now is the time, therefore, to savor the pungent flavors of Baltimore, beyond the Inner Harbor.

Baitimore will be the only non-European city to host the traveling exhibit "Sisley, Master Impressionist," the first major retrospective of the French painter Alfred Sisley, organized by the Royal Academy of Lon-

SIGHTS

Cherry, pear and magnolia blossoms usher in spring throughout the city, but they are most striking amid the grandeur of Mount Vernon Square, at Charles and Monument streets.

Recently reopened after almost a decade of renovations, the Washington Monument at the center of the square is a neo-classical marble column completed in 1829 by the architect Robert Mills, who went on to design the Washington Monument

on the Mall in Washington.
Visitors who wish to climb the 228

marble stairs for a view of the city can do so Wednesday to Sunday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Admission is \$1.

On the east side of the square, classical music floats from the rehearsal rooms at the Peabody Conservatory of Music.

One of the most impressive rooms in the city is the stack room at the Peabody Library, built in 1878 and graced with five tiers of cast-iron balconies. The library is open Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; from 9 a.m. to noon on Saturdays

a.m. to noon on Saturdays.

A newly installed Asian art collection, including Chinese porcelains and Japanese armor, is housed in the Hackerman House, an 1850 mansion on the southwest corner of the square and part of the Walters Art Gallery, (410) 547-9000. The Great Blacks in Wax Museum, 1601 East North Ave., (410) 563-3404, situated in an old firehouse, features more than 100 figures of notable blacks from ancient Egyptians through Nelson Mandela. "We definitely have four solid guys in each one," he said. "Our talent is deep and above average.

The coach said it would be nice to break a few records this season. He added, however, that rewriting history books isn't his program's main

Breaking records in Northville has proven a difficult task. Out of 17 events, 10 still stand from the 1960s

The 300-meter hurdle mark was set by a teammate of Singleton's. Jim Nowka ran a 38.53 in 1977. Darling holds the 400 dash record

of 49.8 set in 1961. The mile run standard was set in 1977 by Bob Gould with a time of 9:30.80.

The 800- and 1,600-meter run marks are shared by brothers. Harry Couyoumjiam ran a 1:57.70 in 1979 in the 800-meter, while brother Clark set the 1,600 record in 1982 in 4:17.90.

The 1993 Mustangs could make hay in relay events.

Brian Dogonski, Matt Hemp, Jamie Miller and Ryan Huzjak grabbed the 400 relay record last year in 44.6. Northville was just more than a second behind that time on its first try this year with Bob Oiler, Farb Navi, Rick King and Dogonski. Faletti said he wouldn't be surprised if that group sets a new mark late this spring.

As the team continues to improve over the next few springs school records are sure to fall. Perhaps more accurately, Cindy Panowicz, who holds nine Mustang marks, will be forced to step aside

While Turnbull said she doesn't pay close attention to school records, many Mustangs do. "Wendy Forster had a dream she

was going to break the long jump record," she said. "They do pay attention to them. They are in awe of some of them." This current crop of Mustangs

have a chance to break as many as four records, Turnbull said. The twomile relay, discus, long jump and 400-meter relay marks are the most likely to go.
Denise McDermaid's record in the

shot put is one that should last for years to come. She set the school mark in 1976 with a throw of 43-8.

"Nobody has been within 11 feet of that in years," Turnbull said. "We won't challenge it." The discus record goes all the way

back to America's bicentennial. Linda Prom's 96-6 set the standard in 1976.

"That is breakable," Turnbull said. "We've been close."

Jenny Sekerka and Michelle Fetterman have the best chance at besting Prom's mark, she added.

The first of Panowicz' records is in the high jump. She cleared 5-4 in 1985. Turnbull said that would be a tough one to approach, but Tammy Cook has cleared 5 feet in the past.

In the long jump, Panowicz leaped 17-3 in 1983. Forster, who was a state qualifyer in the event last year. and Alana Bradley could eclipse 17-3, Turnbull commented.

Panowicz will likely keep both her



Rising litigation in home construction indicates trend

Developing or designing a con-dominium or townhouse project can be dangerous to a professional's financial health.

The risk of lawsuits targeted at the project developer or architect has been steadily growing in recent years. We live in a litigationprone era, and many opportunities to litigate often surface after the construction of a multiunit housing project.

In fact, about a third of all recently completed condo/townhouse developments become involved in a law suit, according to attorney Kelton Lee Gibson, who specializes in representing homeowners associations related to their legal concerns.

Unfortunately, more and more homeowners associations are finding that the common areas and individual units of their projects have been saddled with construction problems which are not attributable to the lack of ordinary maintenance." Gibson said. The problems can be caused by poor construction, poor design or poor choice of or defective materials.

Most of the construction problems now being litigated involve water leaks in roofs, walls, doors and windows, Gibson pointed out. Defective drainage and grading is also a frequent problem, as are fences and outside walls.

About 90 percent of problems involve water leaks or moisture," it was noted by Gibson who is a partner in the California law firm of Myers, Widders & Gibson.

One cause for the construction problems is traced to an over-zealous effort on the part of developers to keep costs down. Often, the lowest bidding general contractor will get the job even though his qualifications are minimal. And the developer will not pay for the architect's supervision of construction to be sure the contrac-tors are doing their job correctly.

This is clearly a case of false economy, according to architect Howard Leach. The developer is legally liable for ten years after the completion of his project. And he can be liable for damages even if the project was inspected and approved by a local building





Residential builders who work in the \$130,000 to \$200,000 price range say that they appeal to a broad spectrum of buyers. They could be interested in a "new" move-up or a first new buy from an existing home.
"They kind of overlap," said

Norm Finkelstein, partner in the Irvine Group of Farmington Hills. "Buyers at \$130,000 tend to be young families, first moveup, first-time buyers, some from apartments, others who had been living with their parents.

When you're talking \$190,000, \$200,000, very often those are people who are empty nesters in their late 40s and 50s, some with a child living at home down from larger houses," Finkelstein added.

"A typical buyer is really hard to define," said Deen Hyde, marketing director for Pulte Homes



of Michigan. "We probably have two main types.

"A transferee represents about 40 percent of our business. They stay three to five years on aver-age. They look for value, a good investment. They know they will turn it over in three to five years. They want the most square footage for the money.

The other type is the local move-up," Hyde said. "The motivation is a larger family or change in status. They're looking for the most home for the money in terms of amenities."

Dave Gerish, vice president of Gerish Building in Plymouth, had similar observations.

"I've got some customers who have a house costing \$300,000plus moving down because they don't want the maintenance," he said. "Another customer who is a move-up will come in three or four years later and say, 'Build me a new home.'

Spacious master bedroom suites and basements — some used for additional living space, others for storage — are high on the list of buyers' priorities, builders said.

"They all want an impressive master suite as a retreat, more or less," Finkelstein said.

"We are finding a big trend away from contemporary to traditional, especially a country-look with big porches, large win-dows. Yet for interiors, they like to have contemporary openness with traditional moldings," he

First-floor laundries are still preferred, Finkelstein said, even though some builders have designed utility rooms on upper levels where the bedrooms are.

"Older people want a first-floor master bedroom," Gerish said. Younger people are looking for the most rooms they can get for the kids.

Hyde also notices that many buyers today want the master suite on the main floor — older owners to avoid stairs, younger to get some space away from the

The litigation trend has grown to the point where many builders, developers and architects won't participate in new condo/townhouse projects. And this could result in a serious housing shortage in future years for persons desiring the lifestyle offered in this type of hous-

A key problem is the rising cost of liability insurance, according architect Leach. As in the medical aeld, the increasing number of lawsuits has pushed up the cost of professional liability insurance dramatically.

Most architects carry errors and omissions insurance to cover their liability risks," Leach said. But recently, the cost of that coverage has become so high many architects feel they can't afford it. They drop the insurance and stay away from high-risk projects like condo or townhouse developments."

This trend reduces the number of skilled designers available for this specialized area of development, resulting

in the increasing use of "fringe designers" for new projects, Leach pointed out. This scenario often leads to poor designing and subsequent problems. And this, in turn, results in more problems to be litigated. It's a dangerous

Q. With the economy improving and mortgage interest rates at record low levels, what's the prognosis for the home selling market?

A. Here's a revealing quote from a report to realtors throughout the United States from the National Association

Look for an explosion of buyers during the spring home buying season this year. In most areas of the country, the months of April, May and June will generate the highest volume of resales seen during these months over the past 14 years.

Residential resales during the second quarter of 1993 are predicted at an annual rate of 3.6 million. This compares to an annual rate of 3.9 million recorded during the second quarter of 1979, the last time spring sales exceeded 3.6 million.

Factors that are expected to drive the spring market include low interest rates, increased consumer confidence and an improving economy."

Q. I know home sales are improving, but how about farmland?

A. The value of farm land in Iowa has long been considered an excellent barometer for agricultural land in the United States, according to Murray R. Wise, president of the Westchester Group, a farm research, marketing and management firm.

"The average value of lowa farmland on a per acre basis has risen for the past six years," Wise noted. The average per-acre price has risen from \$786 in 1987 to \$1,165 at the end of last year. And it's still rising.

A. This fish set was made by the Tielsch company in **ANTIQUES**



Altwasser, Germany, during the early 20th century It might sell in the \$325 to \$335 range.

Q. This mark is on the bottom of a 9-inch-diameter ironstone plate. It is off-white with a black scenic pattern.

Who made this, when and where?

A. This was made in 1850-51 when the firm of Charles Meigh, Sons &

Square One gives straight talk

Those who say they don't know enough to start investing can now start from Square One.

Highland Township resident Amy Rauch-Bank began the Square One newsletter, which is geared to novice investors, in March.

Bank, the newsletter's editor and publisher, said she can't overemphasize the importance of investing early in life.

Bank works out of her new Highland Township home. Bank and her husband Brian moved to the area in October.

The weakness of most of the financial publications out there today is that they assume that their readers have some basic knowledge of investing," Bank said. "If no one makes this information available, where do you

terial they included. A friend suggested, "Why don't you do it yourself, anyway?" Bank decided to start her own publication. In November of 1992, she left full-

time employment with Better Investing to pursue her dream. It was difficult for Bank to make the decision to move on — she had worked for the magazine since her 1990 graduation from Oakland Uni-

Getting started was difficult at first, but Bank said she was glad she did not procrastinate

"Taking things out of their daily lives is often the first step to finding something (to invest in)" about 100 more started was glad she did not procrastinate.

did not procrastinate. "A lot of people really want to do something, but they don't do it. . . . I just started immediately and got the ball rolling," she said. "Half of success is just starting — putting your idea into action."

Preserving flowers

There's just one problem with fresh flowers: They don't last. Fortunately, you can preserve them— by drying and via photography.

HOW TO DRY FLOWERS

Organic Gardening magazine recommends these steps:

- Cut flowers in late morning (or when the moisture on the plants has dried). Choose those that are just beginning to open.
- Prune or strip most of the leaves, then group together in small bunches. Use a rubber band to bind the stems together, then tie with a string for hanging.
- Dry the bunches upside down in a well-ventilated, shaded location out of direct sunlight. Use rafters, wooden pegs or a hanging rack, allowing space for air circulation.

Drying time will vary from a few days to several weeks, depending on humidity and type of plant.

• When flowers have dried, gently separate bunches for arranging. Replace weak stems with florist's wire (bind flower head and 1 inch of stem to wire with floral tape).

PHOTOGRAPH FLOWERS

This advice is from the Photography Information Council: Create images with flowers, not just images of flowers. Use form, color, texture and pattern as a basis for composition, and structure the image around lines, diagonals, radials, curves and shapes.

Fill the frame with the flower, or shoot only sections of a flower. Don't include background unless it adds to the final image, and check the edges of the frame so that only what's important is included.

Analyze light in terms of intensity, direction and color. Translucence requires that light pass through the flower from behind. Side lighting brings out texture, line and form.

Early morning and late afternoon light bathe a scene in a wash of color. Misty light after a rain saturates and enriches colors.

Filters are useful for creating different looks. A polarizing filter removes unwanted reflections and glare, and helps deepen the blue of the sky. A soft-focus filter helps create a romantic effect; an 81 A or B filter will "warm up" the flower.

Be prepared to go the extra distance to get the shot you want. Get down on the ground, wade into water, get up before dawn.

Garden gadgets

Gardening is a lot of work, no matter how much you love it. But using the right tools can make it less arduous.

Veteran gardeners often have amassed a collection of their favorite gadgets—a tiller they couldn't live without, or the perfect wheelbarrow. Novice gardeners, however, can be at a loss, getting by with just a few tools and probably working harder than they have to.


If that sounds like you, talk to the sales staff at a nursery or chat with an experienced gardener. Describe the task you are doing and they can probably tell you which tool is best to use.

Here are just a few must-have tools for every gardener:

- · Gloves.
- * A wheelbarrow or sturdy cart. It's a must for mixing mulch, hauling soil and plants and transporting anything else you need around the garden.
- Long-handled tools. These reduce bending and reaching. Try a shovel, spading fork, hoe (squareblade and sharp-edge), grass shears or claw cultivator with long handle.
- A wheeled hose carrier. This keeps the hose neatly coiled and makes it easy to transport.
- Hand pruners.
- · Garden rake.
- · Weeder.

Your life also will be easier if you keep tools organized. Try carrying them in a bucket or wearing an apron with large pockets.

Keep tools cleaned and oiled after each use by dipping them in a bucket filled with sand and used motor oil.



News from the stars of the floral front

If flowers are the stars of your garden, no doubt you have favorites you look forward to each year —perhaps a purple perennial, a showy bed of petunias or an aromatic English rose.

Yet as faithful as you are to the tried and true, you may find it hard to resist a few flashy newcomers. You know the ones. They're variegated, miniature, scented, bugproof or come in amazing colors. They seduce you because you've never seen-or grown-them before.

Don't feel guilty. You're a gardener, they're flowers, and it's spring. Besides, when it comes to blooms, isn't there always room for one more?

NEW AND NOVEL

Novelty daffodils can be found in larger nurseries. Varieties include Ice King (yellow-and-white ruffled center) and Palmares (white flower with pale peach cup). Plant where they're prominent and protect from sneaky snails.

Speaking of bulbs, tulip lovers are tickled by new fringed varieties and showstopping "parrots" (multicolored blooms with petals that resemble feathers). The latest parrot tulip from Jackson & Perkins blends pale apricot yellow, creamy white and rose pink.

Easy to grow and tolerant of neglect, geraniums (pelargoniums) are the tramps of the garden. Just break off a stem, stick it in the ground, and away we go. But true pelargonium fanciers pamper their plants and cultivate unusual varieties — such as those with scented leaves.

Popular perfumed pelargoniums are those with a rose aroma; others have the scents of fruits (Prince of Orange, lemon, apricot, strawberry, apple and lime) or spices (nutmeg, ginger, coconut, apple cider, cinnamon and mint).

If you're tired of your tireless yellow Stella D'Oro day lily, divide it and replant in combination with new miniature and double varieties, or perhaps with those in hues that range from magenta to peach.

creamy pastels like ivory, cream, lemon vellow, lilac, pink and salmon, as well as vivid purple, red, scarlet, coral and orange."

Also for gardeners who prefer pastels is a new Peaches and Cream verbena. It's heat-tolerant and blooms all season long; the florets are a delicate blend of apricot

Making headlines is Tropical Rose, the first canna grown from seed. It has tropical canna flowers about 3 to 4 inches

across; soft rose blooms are produced on spikes held above wide, lush foliage.

To obtain what Countryside magazine calls "treasures of our botanical past," request a catalog from Select Seeds (send \$2 to 180 Stickney Hill Road, Union, CT 06076).

Intriguing offerings include cherry pie, balsam, painted tongue and love-in-apuff. Perfect for beds, hardy vinca is a dependable bloomer.

This season many garden centers stock

a new variety, Pretty in White, which produces crisp white flowers — and does it in abundance.

Dianthus fans will want to look for Ideal Violet. Strong and tolerant of temperature extremes, it was bred by crossing a Chinese pink dianthus with a perennial sweet william. Blooms, are a dense purple-grape.

If you live in a warm climate, you might jazz up your garden with a passion. flower vine. The creamand purple blooms are waxy and otherworldly. Another spectacular vine is clematis and Wayside Gardens (1 Garden Lane, Hodges, SC 29695-0001) offers a variety that looks like two flowers in one.

The center of Florida Sieboldii resembles a purple carnation or chrysanthemum; the outer petals are large and creamy white.

SHADE FLOWERS

When it comes to lowlight areas, most gardeners think of azaleas and impatiens but don't realize many native wildflowers prefer shade — provided the soil is rich and moist.

Among the best of these is creeping phlox, a ground-hugging evergreen. Clusters of flowers in white, lavender and pink bloom on 6-inch stems in spring. Attractive shadelovers that blend well with creeping phlox include wild blue phlox, Virginia bluebells and fringed bleeding heart.

For appealing texture, and to hide bare spots left after blooming, combine ferns or broad-leafed hostas with shade flowers. Best bets: vase-shaped cinnamon fern, lacy maidenhair fern, plantain lily (hosta plantaginea) and hosta Frances Williams.

HYBRID TEASE

It's hard to uproot a healthy rose bush. But yank you must if you're not happy with the blooms (because of color, longevity or size).

How else are you going to find room for one of those new varieties that sounds; so fabulous? These hybrid teas are bound. to tempt you:

The splashy attractions of the '90s home are the most public and private of rooms — the kitchen and the bathroom.



How to draw buyers to your doorstep

It's often said there's a buyer for every home—but that buyer often can be elusive, especially in a slow real-estate market. Here are some tips to help draw potential buyers to your doorstep.

WHAT'S IT WORTH?

One of the most important factors in selling a home is the sales price. Sellers want to maximize their return, but buyers will be turned off by a price that's too high.

The best bet for determining a fair price is to seek the advice of a real estate agent, as he will have access to a computerized Multiple Listing Service of hundreds of comparable homes for sale in the area. the prices owners are asking — and the prices for which the dwellings actually sell.

Compare your home to those on the listing—in terms of number of bedrooms, baths and other amenities unique to your home that could enhance or diminish desirability, such as lot size or location, pool and overall condition—and you're well on your way to knowing what your home is worth.

CHOOSING BEST AGENT

Selling a home is no easy task, so most folks opt to work with a real estate agent—relying on his expertise to guide them through complicated procedures such as listing agreements, structural inspections, purchase offers and escrow, and also to prequalify and negotiate with potential buyers.

It's wise to interview at least three top real estate agents familiar with your neighborhood before listing a home for sale. To get names of the best agents, ask friends and business associates for recommendations and phone nearby real estate brokerages to ask for the name of their most successful agent the previous month.

Ask each agent lots of questions to ensure that his selling philosophies match your personality. Before making that final selection, phone a previous client or two to ask: "Were you in anyway unhappy with your agent and would you list another home for sale with the same agent?"

MARKETING MANIA

Besides posting the standard "For Sale" sign in the front yard and advertising in newspapers and house-for-sale magazines, a real estate agent will put the home in the computerized MLS so that other agents can become aware of the property and bring prospective buyers to view it.

Depending on your locale, agents can recommend several other advertising avenues including radio and TV spots and perhaps an MLS-related phone number that allows potential buyers to request that the latest listings be sent to them via fax or in the mail.

keting events, such as open houses on the weekend for the public or during the week for brokers — the more they know about your property, the more likely they'll be able to match one of their buyers to it.

COMPELLING DWELLINGS

First impressions count with potential buyers, so make sure the house is orderly, welcoming and in tiptop shape before that first prospect ever passes through the doorway.

To create curbside appeal: keep lawns mowed and shrubbery neatly trimmed; freshly paint at least the trim of the house; make sure doors are clean and hinges are well oiled: store all garden equipment out of sight.

To make the interior shine with appeal: brightly polish all brass and metal door and bathroom fixtures; replace worn or faded curtains with mini blinds; replace old shower curtains with new.

To create a cozy environment while showing the home to potential buyers: turn on all lights, even on sunny days; make sure the house is neither too hot nor too cold; create inviting aromas such as freshly brewing coffee or baking bread; play the stereo softly; ask a neighbor to sit pets.

Finally, neatness counts. Make rooms appear more spacious by removing that extra table, chair or chest. Store out of

sight all magazines, newspapers and bills. Remove all non-essentials from kitchen counters and store in cupboards.

SELLING IN A SOFT MARKET

When selling times are tough, there are several savvy strategies to help get that "sold" sign hammered in. Among them:

• Invest in a home inspection before putting the property on the market. This not only can win a prospective buyer's confidence in any claims made about the house, it also can speed up the purchase process since you won t have to wait for a potential buyer to have an inspection made on his own.







Design professionals also have a knack for making everything old new again through artful rearranging and the reintroduction of forgotten objects and furnishings that were relegated to the closet or back room.

In most cases they have insiders' access to merchandise, labor and materials sources that are out of reach for the average consumer.

RENTERS RIGHTS

So you ve rented a drab pad. You don't have to spend a fortune on furnishings to compensate for the obvious lack of aesthetic appeal. And you don't have to just live with it, either.

Instead, say design pros, why not focus on simple, inexpensive, adaptable pieces that you can take with you once you're ready to move on?

Some examples: Cover dull, worn carpet with area rugs; replace unsightly window treatments with inexpensive miniblinds, lace panels or balloon shades; and pull slipcovers over couches and chairs.

Throw pillows can add splashes of color, ugly drawer pulls and cabinet knobs can be replaced with prettier versions from a nearby do-it-yourself emporium. and makeshift furnishings—such as a table made from a wooden crate and circular piece of plywood—can be camouflaged with patterned sheets or fabric.

Another thought. If your landlord won't allow paint or wallpaper, rent furniture that works with the apartment's existing scheme. When you're ready to move, you can leave the furniture behind.

DO-IT-YOURSELF

From wonderful window dressings to fabulous floor coverings, many home accessories are just a hammer, scissors or a few yards of fabric away.

Home projects abound for do-it-your-

self decorators. You can. for instance, find patterns galore in a range of skill levels for converting designer sheets or decorator fabrics into folding screens. dining room appointments, decorator pillows, cushions, bedroom ensembles, window treatments and slipcovers.

Ditto for patterns and explanations in magazines, books and on video that offer instruction on subjects such as how to construct a lampshade, drape a valance. stencil an unfinished bench or spongepaint a wall.

CREATE YOUR OWN ART


When culled from an uptown gallery, art can take a big bite out of your decorating budget. So why not save a pretty penny by creating your own masterpieces?

If you've a spare art book, for instance, you could dismantle prints or photographs, then mat and frame them for a unified presentation in a hall or entryway.

Flea markets, garage sales and estate sales often are meccas for interesting prints, drawings and paintings that might mesh with your decorating scheme.

If you've an artist in the family, why not put his or her works in the spotlight?

• Offer a home warranty. This guarantees that the house will be free of defects over a defined period of time. If a defect should surface during that time. the warranty policy pays for repairs.

• To increase the pool of potential buyers, check to see if your loan is assumable. Older loans often will be at lower rates than new loans, and lender criteria for assuming a loan is not as stringent as

criteria for qualifying for a new loan.Sellers also can offer to supply the


down payment for a buyer as an additional loan. This is contingent on the seller's willingness to receive a portion of the sale in monthly installments and on the buyer's ability to afford an additional note.

• If there's a glut of similar homes for sale in a given area, offering an agent incentive is one way to distinguish the listing. In these cases, the real estate agent who brings in the eventual buyer gets a bonus of some sort — whether cash, cruise, or fax machine.





New finishes are fancy and fun

According to product styling specialists at Armstrong Floors, shades of one particular color are especially popular.

"Never before have we offered so many greens, and in such a diverse range," savs Armstrong's Ann Miller.

But whether green gives you delight or vertigo, it's certainly not the only option for your home's walls, floors and ceilings.

In fact, never before have there been so many choices, from unusual paint techniques and wallpapers to durable and beautiful carpets and flooring.

WALLS

Paint suppliers can mix any hue for you. You might, for example, match a color found in the patterned fabric you've chosen for drapes or upholstery.

Textured walls with a marbleized or sponge finish can lend a sophisticated, contemporary look. And now there are kits that contain everything you need, including step-by-step instructions.

It's also possible to apply stenciled designs anywhere paint will adhere, even to textiles. Readymade patterns abound. and simple designs are easy to cut.

Consider a mural for a windowless wall; perhaps a ready-made wallpaper scene. You might have an artist create a custom landscape—or, for the ceiling, a faux sky, complete with cottony clouds and mischievous cherubs.

Wallpapers range from abstracts and crisp geomet-

rics to beautifully rendered florals. Stripes come in fresh color combinations, such as black, gray and white with tomato red.


Wallpaper borders can be applied in just a few hours for minimal expense; the results can be dramatic.

You might use a floral- or fruitpatterned border against a striped wallpaper or solid-color wall. Or apply a border with carpenter's glue to edge your floor; seal with polyurethane.

"Juxtapose crisp checks and stripes in a child's room." suggests Home magazine. 'It is easy to cut striped wall-paper crosswise into strips and then to reassemble them into a checkerboard."

Another idea from Home. decoupage. You cut out design elements from wallpaper (flowers, bows, tassels, stars, patterns, animals, whatever) and use them to punctuate walls—in clusters or at random.

Lincrusta and Anaglypta are high-relief embossed wallcoverings, luxurious plasterwork friezes and gilded leather wallcoverings.



In kitchens and family rooms, vinyl flooring is durable and attractive.

The popularity of embossed coverings derives from their intricate designs, versatility and durability; they're perfect for adding a "period look" to any interior.

Go ahead and write on the walls, advises Metropolitan Nome magazine. But rather than graffiti, choose words in flowing, elegant script or lettering reminiscent of ancient Greece. As for content, consider poetry or philosophy (Plato, Socrates, Shakespeare).

FLOORS

No wonder vinyl tile flooring is popular—it's comparatively inexpensive and easy to install or repair.

Resilient flooring products, both sheet and tile, also offer myriad design options. Not only are there numerous ready-made textures and styles, you can create custom patterns and borders.

Newly popular are custom patchwork quilt designs made from vinyl squares, triangles, diamonds and rectangles. Armstrong offers nine classic quilt patterns for instant country style."

Hardwood flooring lends beauty and warmth; it's

durable, an excellent insulator and comes in light colors such as soft white and natural golden. New no-wax finishes ensure long-lasting beauty and minimal maintenance.

Glazed ceramic tile is ideal for high-traffic areas. such as foyers and hallways. You might choose a dark, mottled surface that is unobtrusive and blends well with adjacent carpeting. Make sure the tile has a non-slip satin glaze.

Also popular for entryways, kitchens, bathrooms and patios is handcrafted stone. It's waterproof, durable and much less expensive than the real thing; styles include faux flagstone and slate, as well as "cement" pavers.

On the high end is natural quartzite stone. It has a shimmery, variegated surface; colors range from silver gray to blends of silver and gold. Quartzite stone is especially attractive when used in combination with wood or marble.

If you have a concrete floor, perhaps in a cellar. patio or breezeway, you should coat it (for practical as well as aesthetic reasons). Check paint and hardware stores for sealants that range from high-gloss urethane to epoxy-reinforced latex.

To cozy up a large room, choose a dark-colored carpet in a warm hue. Light-colored carpeting. on the other hand, gives an illusion of spaciousness to a small room.

A carpet with an uneven texture will lend vitality. Options include frieze, multilevel loop, cut loop and

random shear. Visit a supplier to see and experience textures.

Use rugs to define areas. A fine Oriental rug is more than a functional floor cover: it's an investment and a work of art. You'll find an extensive range of patterns, colors, materials and prices.

Custom area rug makers can create designs as simple as a rug with a contrasting border, or as complex as the yellow-gray-andwhite geometric abstract Robert A.M. Stern created for Metropolitan Home's annual Show-House. Rug patterns are given dimension with "carved" edges, and virtually any design is possible—including florals, sports logos and family crests.

Another option: Have a rug maker inlay roses and vines (to match your upholstery or wallpaper) into your wall-to-wall carpeting.

If all this seems overwhelming and you don't know where to begin, consult an interior designer. With professional advice, you'll fine-tune your preferences and avoid costly mistakes.

Spruce up your home at winter's end

The days lengthen. At the first opportunity, we throw open the windows to breathe something besides torcedair heat. Eureka! Spring is bursting out all over.

Want to bring the outdoors inside in some way other than on your shoes? Start with spring cleaning. Reveal fresh surfaces and chase winter cobwebs out of corners. Scrub winter must out of the season with lemon or herbscented ammonia.







How to enhance your yard's ambience

A yard can be a disorganized jumble of bushes, trees and flower beds and still be beautiful. But one that does more than cover bare ground, that offers a sense of serenity or purpose, is more than lovely. It's a treasure.

As you enlarge or renovate your garden, consider following an overall theme. Or incorporate several themed areas within one landscape—for different moods and uses.

Here are a few suggestions:

• An heirloom garden. Imagine a part of your garden dedicated to ancient and antique plants, perhaps ornamentals that date back to the 1600s. It would be like cultivating living pieces of history.

According to "The Heirloom Garden" by Jo Ann Gardner (Garden Way Publishing), there are several types of heirloom gardens, among them an Early Settler's Cottage Garden (1600-1699) and a Native Flora Garden (1700-1850).

Each has its own mix of perennials, shrubs, vines and annuals—such as cowslips, lily of the valley, feverfew, hollyhocks, apothecary roses, hop vines and

more

• A rose garden. "You can make even the smallest area spectacular with the right rose," advises Better Homes and Gardens' "Complete Guide to Gardening" (Meredith).

Formal beds blend best with period architecture. To keep colors from appearing spotty, plant varieties in pairs or trios.

If your garden is informal, incorporate roses into a breezy, romantic rose arbor. An arbor will also add shelter and a sense of seclusion to a newly planted and/or sun-filled garden.

• A butterfly garden. Does the idea of attracting insects as beautiful as flowers appeal to you? Cultivate plants that nurture butterfly larvae and provide nectar.

In addition to butterfly bush, blooms that draw butterflies include ageratum, sweet alyssum, cosmos, verbena and pincushion flower. Provide a water source, such as a shallow pool or birdbath.

• A hummingbird garden. Plants that attract these flashy little fliers include clematis, delphinium, pinks, sweet william, day lily, trumpet vine, bee balm, mimosa, columbine, lobelia, salvia, snapdragon, red cardinal flower and cleome.

Add several hummingbird feeders for

good measure; keep themfilled with sugar syrup tinted with red food coloring.

• A cutting garden. This is an area set aside for growing flowers to be used in arrangements and bouquets. Since the point of a cutting garden is to harvest blooms, cultivate the area like a crop. You might locate it in or near your vegetable garden or in any sunny, secluded spot; plant in rows.

And since the appearance of the cutting garden is not of primary importance, you needn't trim yellowing foliage, but deadheading (cutting off spent blooms) will keep new flowers coming.

Tulips and daffodils are ideal for a spring cutting garden; for summer, consider dahlias, chrysanthemums and statice

• A woodland garden. If your yard borders a forest, you may find deer munching your tender ornamentals and rabbits raiding your cabbage patch. An ideal solution is to encourage and enjoy the wildlife.

According to "Outdoor Living Spaces" by Susan Rademacher Frey (Rodale Press), it's possible to make your property "rich with plants for food and shelter, an especially attractive home for wild crea-

tures" — while also being friendly to people.

Include trees and shrubs with berries, evergreens for shelter, plants that add color and fragrance, and pathways for leisurely strolling (and wildlife watching).

- A desert garden. If your climate and terrain will accommodate cactus and other succulents, you can create an unusual, lovely garden that is virtually maintenance-free. Landscape-enhancing plants for a desert garden neight include saguaro, yucca, ocotillo, creosote bush and Western honey mesquite. For color, choose drought-adapted flowers, such as evening primroses, firecracker penstemon, sweet marigold or capeweed.
- A country garden. Whether you live in a rural area or in the heart of a city, your garden can be a haven of billowing outlines, soft fragrances and gentle colors. Among the plants that create the feel of a country (or cottage) garden are shrub roses, lamb's ears, Irish yew, foxgloves, honeysuckle, English ivy, sweetbrier, valerian, chrysanthemums and holly.

Allow plants to blend together, cover

Art, accessories, antiques and more

Stare at a bare wall or an empty tabletop for long and the stark realization will set in.

Home accessories aren't just optional, excessive trinkets to mindlessly toss about the house. Instead, they're essential elements that can instantly make a humdrum room interesting and fashionable.

Accessories offer pizzazz, power and personality—and help promote the overall ambiance a room's decorator is trying to convey.

And, because they're more affordable than major furnishings, accessories can easily update or change a room's feeling without blowing the bank account.

There are as many ways to accessorize a room as there are rooms themselves. Following are some tips and trends to consider:

FINE THINGS

Workmanship, investment potential, heirloom quality, styling and function are just a few of the many reasons why china trinket boxes, pewter fruit bowls. porcelain clocks and silver tea services are well at home in humble abodes of the unpretentious 1990s.

If Grandmother didn't leave them to you, find these timeless treasures in the china section of your favorite department store or in specialty boutiques. Antique emporiums and estate sales are the prime spots for treasures with a few valuable years on them.

FINE ART

You can't afford a Julian Schnabel, much less find room in your house for one of his colossal creations. Never fear—fine art— which always ranks among the hottest home accessories—is still within your reach.

When it comes to fine art, price is often a factor with would-be buyers.

Thus, whether they're shopping for a full-scale watercolor to hang over the fire-place, a sculpture for the entryway, a small photograph or a piece of art furni

ture for a specific nook or pottery for the sideboard, many home owners are forsaking the bright lights and big prices of metropolitan art markets for the oftentimes more affordable wares of regional artisans.

Find out about the Van Goghs and Matisses in your own neck of the woods by scouting out nearby galleries and art shows. Once you find a favorite, ask to be put on the mailing list for any private showings.

Another popular trend among art-conscious home decorators lies in the area of reproductions. One can find virtually everything —from graceful reproductions of Grecian statuettes and works of the old masters to artful copies of botanical prints

and contemporary sculpture—through retailers specializing in home decorating.

COLLECTIONS

Somewhere between pastime and passion lies the art of collecting, and many home decorators aren't content to hide their accumulations in shoe boxes under the bed anymore.

Thus explains the current trend of accessorizing the home with beloved collections. Everything from kitschy saltand-pepper shakers and breezy seashells to sparkling piles of junk jewelry and shiny enameled boxes are showing up all around the house.

And, new acquisitions are gleaned from frequent jaunts to estate sales, flea mar-

kets, garage sales and antique emporiums.

For collectors, the key to good display, say experts, depends more on how a collection is displayed than it does on the individual objects of the groupings themselves. A collection is just a series of disjointed objects when scattered about a room. But, when like objects are placed together, dramatic impact ensues.

So much impact, in fact, that home decorators often play up collections by using spotlights or specially designed display lights.

Open shelves and bookcases are prime spots for less fragile collections, while glass-enclosed display cases and tables await valuable collections or those made up of small items, such as jewelry.

FOLK ACCESSORIES

A Western-style room just wouldn't cut it without a few Indian blankets, a rawhide lamp shade and a 10-gallon cowboy hat hanging on a weathered coat stand.

And a Victorian room wouldn't have the same appeal without a needlepoint pillow, blossom-filled

vases and a delicate antique wroughtiron bird cage.

The growing popularity of theme and period decor has resulted in accessories that fit right into the ambiance at hand—accessories that play up the decorating music without drowning out the melody.

Examples range from handmade baskets, colorful quilts and wall-mounted platters that are quintessentially country to the kachinas, ristras and cactus indigenous to Santa Fe chic.

Rag rugs and splatterware say farmhouse style, stacking boxes and antique butter churns lend Shaker appeal and candlestick chandeliers and framed stitchery samplers offer colonial charm.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- All things green: Whether it's a lush, live fern atop a freestanding plant stand, cut flowers in a hand-blown vase, a potted tree situated in a corner or a tiny faux topiary sitting on a mantle, the right plant can play an important supporting role in any room.
- Reading up: Books are as much of an aesthetic pleasure as they are an intellectual one these days. Stack art books on or under the coffee table, and use rare, valuable or just plain pretty books in object groupings.
- Comfort accessories: Throw pillows and rugs, afghans and quilts are just a few of the many accessories that offer both comfort and charm. Drape them over the sofa. toss them on a chair or display them on free-standing racks.
- Wonderful wicks: Candles and their accompanying holders can add a glowing touch to any room. Scented candles, clusters of votives and elegant tapers are just a few of the many choices.







Your child's kindergarten masterpieces or cousin's wondrous watercolors take on new importance when they are given a frame and a well thought-out place to rest.

A recent issue of Sunset magazine featured two colossal works by three small artists who delightfully applied four colors to the canvas with foam brushes and sponges. Commissioned by their parents, these sentimental and abstract pieces were designed to fill the empty walls of the family's new home at minimal cost.

With a little imagination, you can even create art from objects you already own. Prop your pictures and photographs instead of hanging them for a new twist, or fill a ceramic bowl with fruit for a still life study.

ADD INTEREST

Weary of four square walls and rectangular doorways? You can change your

home's geometric proportions without months of expensive remodeling.

It's easy, for instance, to add inexpensive decorative moldings or chair rails to a ho-hum room, or to create divinely draped window treatments with the installation of tiebacks in interesting shapes such as stars and circles.

Paint in contrasting tones can bring out the best in trim, enliven dull rooms or enhance flow throughout the house. Freestanding screens can help define boundaries in open floor plans.

WATCH FOR BARGAINS

To make your decorating dollar go the distance, scan the classified ads for secondhand furnishings, attend auctions and estate sales if you're looking for antiques and keep abreast of the sales.

Bargain buys that have seen better days often can be revitalized through refinishing or reupholstery — with the total price still coming in at a fraction of the cost.

walls, grow among paving stones and climb fences.

• A water garden. "A single feature in a garden can provide an anchor to its overall design," says John Brookes, editor of "Garden Planning" (RD Home Handbooks).

"Water, for example, is a powerful visual element, and

a pool or pond can determine both garden style and planting."

One bonus of a water garden is the number of showy plants that thrive in an aquatic environment —such as waterlilies, water poppies, plantain lilies, water hyacinth, lotus and marsh marigolds.

• An Oriental garden. This is a serene retreat for quiet contemplation; the landscape in corporates grace, beauty

and simplicity. A key characteristic of Chinese and Japanese gardens is that the whole is rarely revealed; they are instead a series of views, one hidden from the next.

Put away those cozy throws. Toss crisp, light slipcovers over those nubby dark fabrics that were so comforting in winter. Made of stripes, florals, cotton duck and poly-cotton damask, slipcovers are easily laundered.

Dismantle heavy drapery, leaving cornices or valances in place. Swag light mesh muslin, linen or lace over rods. Fabric or straw window shades are also more summery. If window coverings won't move with the breeze, remove them.

Ruffled chintz pillows and dust ruffles make furniture look like flower beds. It's not an aesthetic everyone can support, but it looks comfy and springy in a cottagestyle home.

Bring out the cotton tablecloths, the

starchier the better.

Roll up dark, rich carpets and store them until autumn. Try sisal or handpainted linoleum "rugs." Hooked area rugs are made from fabric scraps, old neckties or, the latest recycling material, plastic bags. Angling a carpet bares more floor space and adds openness.

You might want to stencil patterns onto bare wooden floors that can be covered with rugs when cooler weather kicks in again. If rooms need a permanent lightening up, try bleaching or "washing" the hardwood with a light stain.

Dispense with the clutter that was so comforting in colder months. Clean lines and minimal accessorizing shift the focus to outdoor panoramas. Furniture made of wrought iron. birch. rattan, Adirondack and wicker lends an indoor-outdoor feel.

Without overdoing it, juxtapose your summery collectibles on furniture, in windowsills and near doorways. Folk art animals, botanical prints, gardening accessories such as homey watering cans. and seashells are a few ideas.

Bright vases made of glass, ceramic and frosted glass celebrate the season.
Antique bird cages filled with finches bring warmweather noise indoors.

Put spring in your home with planting." counsels Los Angeles designer Cheryl Brantner. Start seedlings early and indoors. Marigolds, coreopsis, Johnnyjump-ups, calendula.

Fill containers with an abundance of flowering branches — dogwood, forsythia, quince and cherry. Bunches of pussy willows can linger until they sprout. Prod trays of jonquil and tulip bulbs into

blossoms. Mossy pots tucked with miniature roses, lilies or flowering orchids bring earthy aroma to tables and next to chairs. A terra-cotta trough filled with sedge makes a small sill lawn.

Settle your herb garden onto sills. The fragrance will fill the room. Nestle pots in shallow wooden produce crates. Let lilacs and peonies nod over tables.

Leave bowls of strawberries and young apricots or baskets of tubers around here and there. Wherever possible, encourage the garden's creeping greenery to freshen indoors.




