Trustees bail out park after cost overruns

Northville Township Trustees Monday reaffirmed their commitment to build Community Park on Beck Road by allocating \$73,000 to see the park through its last phase of construction.

The board held a special meeting Monday night and agreed to loan Northville Parks and Recreation Department \$73,000 to continue construction at the park.

Trustees granted the loan provided that the recreation commission find some way to pay it back.

Traci Johnson, Director of Parks and Recreation said she first learned the project had run into financial snags last week. She says after she realized the extent of the problem she called township officials and asked for help.

A Friday morning meeting with Township Manager Bill Richards

prompted the Monday night vote after Richards and Township Supervisor Karen Baja realized the commission needed the money to go forward with the project.

Johnson said she had no idea what the outcome of the meeting would be, but was glad to see the township's renewed interest.

"I'm very pleased that the township felt committed enough to the project to continue it," she said.

Awaiting the board's decision Monday, Johnson and Recreation Commission Chairman Ken Romine sat mute in the audience of four as Richards pled their case for the loan.

The township manager made his pitch for continued support of the project by telling the trustees of the unexpected expenses that have been incurred and resulted in the \$73,000 in over runs.

Those items and their related costs were:

vault, \$950; and installing asphalt around it, \$5,000;

• Increasing the water main tap from two to four inches and adding a booster, \$10,000;

• Filling in a wet area with stone, \$10,000;

• Constructing a new road lane to Wayne County's specifications, \$40,000;

• An additional load of aggregate to fill in the parking lot, \$4,000.

The township manager said several kinks thrown into the park plan at the last minute may have caused the hefty over runs. One of the biggest concerns and expenses was the county's mandate for the new road lane.

"The consultant said it was a last-minute change that came down from the county," Richards said with skepticism. While the township manager was careful not to point blame at one

Pay-to-play uncertain as budget priorities are set

The show must go on and it will, despite financial uncertainties in the Northville Public School District.

Board members agreed with Supt. Leonard Reznierski's recommendation that athletes involved in fall sports and members of fall co-curricular activities be notified to "pay to play."

"The Legislature allegedly met today but we still know nothing further about our financial situation that the board hasn't already heard this past month," the superintendent said.

"We can't let the athletes wait. I believe we're in a position . . . to go ahead and inform the coaches, etc. to start practices. There's little cost on our part until the season starts."

This, however, does not mean that pay-to-participate has been eliminated. Board members are expected to rule on budget priorities, including the pay-to-participate program, based on reaction from the July 8 public hearing, letters and telephone calls, at its Aug. 9 meeting.

"I have one concern," trustee Jay Dunkerley said about giving the go-ahead to start summer athletic and band practices. "That the public does

not perceive the conception that this does eliminate pay-to-play."

Board members agreed that a clearly-stated letter be sent to parents, informing them of the process.

"The process being that we're beginning practice, yet the issue of how it will be funded has yet to be solved," Reznierski said.

Written comments are still being accepted on what budget items the Northville Board of Education should prioritize.

Letters will be accepted until July 23 and should be sent to Northville

City contracts with township

Northville City will contract with the township for building inspection services when longtime City Building Inspector Joseph Attard's contract expires tomorrow.

The move follows the city council's narrow approval of a motion not to renew Attard's part-time contract at its July 6 meeting.

Under the agreement, which Mayor Chris Johnson praised as a symbol of greater cooperation between the two municipalities, the city will contract with the township's building department for its building inspection needs starting July 19 and will turn some administrative duties over to its planning consultant firm, Carlisle & Associates. Attard would continue to conduct electrical inspections for the city.

"I'm pleased to see that Northville Township is willing to work with the city to reduce the overall cost to the community," Johnson said. The cost for the new program is not expected to exceed the current building inspection budget.

Council ends inspector's 7-year tenure at city hall

The city's building inspector is trading in his blueprints for a golf bag.

Joe Attard, who moved into Northville City Hall in 1986, has seen his once full-time job contracted out of existence as the city's lots have gradually filled up and the need for inspection services has dropped off. The council voted last week not to renew his contract, which expires July 16, as that trend continues.

Attard, 63, ran an electrical business for 20 years before accepting an inspector's position in Plymouth Township. After 15 years there, he was named Northville City's building inspector in 1986. He is proud of the building department's reputation for promptly issuing building permits, and noted that builders often have to wait weeks for permits to be issued in other municipalities.

While the work has always been

enjoyable, dealing with irate would-be builders has not, Attard said.

"I've been in this business for 22 years and, I tell you, why I haven't had an ulcer I'll never know," he said.

Attard said he found that the biggest problem he has run into as a building inspector in any community was the strictness of the ordinances he was called upon to enforce.

"They give people no leeway; you can't use common sense," he said. "There's something that denies you from doing almost everything."

The city is almost fully developed now, with structures on the large majority of its buildable lots. The last big construction phase is drawing to a close as Abbey Knoll and Pheasant Hills near completion.

When both projects were under way five years ago, Attard recalled, his office was stacked high with the resultant rolled-up blueprints and he was working overtime to keep up

Festival founder cheers genetic discovery

The founder of Northville's annual Folk and Bluegrass Festival, a benefit for medical research into Huntington's Disease, really has something to celebrate this year.

Researchers in the United States and Great Britain have pinpointed the gene that causes the fatal disease.

That disorder claimed the life of Donna Jarski, festival founder Tom Rice's sister, in 1974. Rice held his first Folk & Bluegrass Festival outside his Gifford music store in 1977 to raise funds for the fight against Huntington's.

The annual event was moved to Ford Field the next year, where it has been held ever since. It is dedicated to Jarski and Woody Guthrie, the seminal folk singer and writer of tunes like "This Land is Your Land" who died of

Huntington's in 1967 after spending years in mental institutions due to misdiagnosis of his condition.

This year's festival will be held Sunday, July 25 between 1-8 p.m. Performers include renowned folk singers and songwriters Tom Paxton, Michael Smith and David Roth.

Rice said he hopes that the recent genetic discovery means a cure is much closer for Huntington's Disease and other gene-based afflictions.

"This is incredible. . . Now they're within five years of literally clipping the dysfunctional part of this gene and curing Huntington's," he said. "This is like a whole new era in human development and scientific development."

While movies like Jurassic Park paint alarming pictures of the dangers of genetic research, Rice said he believes the new technology will be a boon rather than a burden to

mankind.

"That's the only way you can approach a disease like Huntington's," he said, where the cause of the disease is imbedded in a person's genetic coding.

Rice noted that more traditional treatments of Huntington's patients using substances like L-dopa, a precursor to a brain chemical called dopamine, have proved ineffective. His own sister was treated with L-dopa before her death in 1974. While the treatments briefly eased her unsteady gait and slurred speech, the symptoms came back worse than ever within several weeks.

"People worry about tampering with the temple of the human body," he said. "Well, we've been tampering with this temple ever since there have been doctors."

Dr. Nelson Isada, a geneticist with Detroit Medical Center's Hutzel Hospital, said the recent discovery fol-

lowed 10 years of frustration since 1983 when researchers first narrowed the Huntington's defect down to Chromosome Four, one of the 46 chromosomes that act as the blueprint for the human body.

Since each chromosome contains thousands of individual genes determining everything from hair color to height, Dr. Isada described the subsequent task as "finding the proverbial needle in the haystack."

Researchers did not realize how difficult that task would be in 1983, he said. "People thought then that it was just going to be a couple of years before (the specific gene) was found."

Using a technique called gene mapping, researchers, including a team at the University of Michigan, finally found the specific gene that seems to trigger Huntington's, and announced their discovery in March.

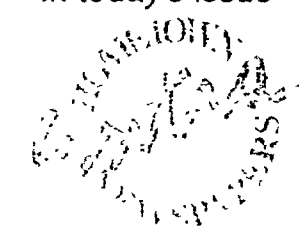

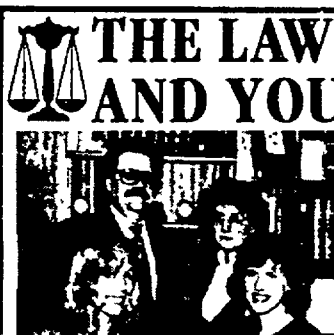

WORTH PURSUING**

Beyond investigating all the factors
surrounding a client's personal injury
claim, an attorney must also assess if a
client is about to litigate against a
defendant worth suing. That is to say
that it is one thing to sue and win, but it
is quite another to collect on a
judgment award. Generally speaking,
those seeking to redress the wrongs
done to them by others should only
pursue suits against insured individuals
or other "deep pocket" defendants. Even
when uninsured individuals seem to be
suit-worthy, they may not readily part
with their assets. Those assets held in
joint custody must be sold to satisfy an
award, and even then, the defendant's
share of the proceeds is limited. In other
cases, uninsured defendants may
deplete plaintiffs of awards by declaring
bankruptcy.

HINT: Deep-pocket defendants are
those whose ability to pay exceeds the
probable value of the suit.

the potential defendant is hiding assets

Township loans money for park construction

party tied to the project, he did suspect there were management problems that may have led to the budget shortfall.

Richards said parks personnel close to the project said the county originally agreed to the construction of a deceleration lane leading to the park's entrance on Beck Road. But now he said county officials are demanding a full-width traffic lane. The bulk of that \$40,000 expenditure is asphalt and culvert, he said.

It was Treasurer Rick Engelland's

suggestion that the board agree to everything but funding the construction of the road. He tried Monday to get his colleagues on the board to negotiate with the county in the hopes of sharing that expense.

"We can do everything but the road," he said.

But Baja said she didn't think that was an option.

"We had the county here today and they said 'sorry guys,'" she told the trustees. "But I can ask again."

The county's reported resistance annoyed trustee Mark Abbo.

"... I'm wondering if Wayne

County is our partner in government or our adversary in government," he said.

But deciding who's in whose corner has little to do with fixing blame for the park's shortfall. Richards said he didn't have all the details yet, but he knew somebody somewhere was to blame for the project exceeding its budget.

"It was really not a well-managed project from the onset," Richards said after doing some preliminary investigation into what led up to the over runs.

Since the Friday morning meeting

Richards said he has been scrambling to retrace the steps that have led to the park's progress thus far.

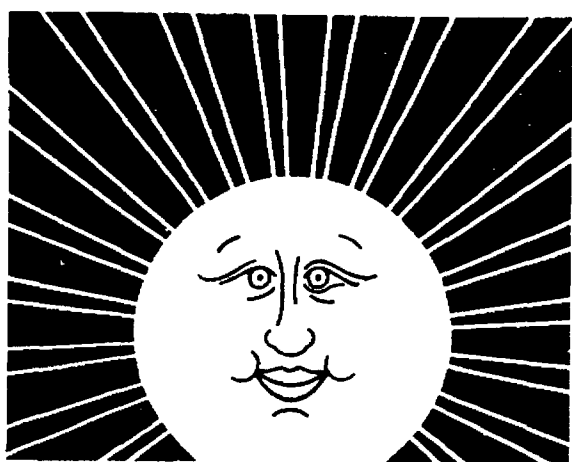
Richards said he has a lot of unanswered questions about how the park plans ran into the financial snag. He told trustees Monday he'll be working with parks personnel, consultants on the job, and the construction manager to get to the bottom of the problem.

Since the park is deeded to Northville Township, responsibility rests on the township's shoulders, Johnson said. For eight years the commission and the township have been

struggling to get the project off the ground. The parks and recreation department was instrumental in launching a financing campaign last year to get bonds sold to get construction underway. The commission sold \$253,380 in bonds on behalf of the township to get the park up and going.

Johnson assured the board Mon-

day that she and the commission could find some "creative" way to repay the township for the loan. She said a large percentage could be repaid to the township from a reserve account and the rest would be repaid through some other measure. She hinted that the commission may have to increase the surcharge to residents as one method of payment.

First Lt. Werner welcomes third stint at Northville post

Coming back to the Northville State Police Post constitutes something of a homecoming for First Lt. David Werner.

The new commander of the post on Seven Mile Road has served there twice before in various capacities, but came on board recently when the previous commander was placed on indefinite suspension.

"It's a pleasure coming back to Northville," Werner said. "It's not a new experience, but it's a new experience in this position. I hope I can make a positive impact on this post and the area."

Prior to his return to Northville, Werner served five years as commander at the Detroit Freeway post, and has served nearly 23 years with the State Police.

"That post was strictly a freeway post," said Werner. "Our mission there was to patrol the freeways within the city limits of Detroit, and I oversaw the total operation there."

There were 140 sworn officers on the staff of the Detroit Freeway post. But regardless of where he gives his orders, Werner said he shares something in common with the troopers on the road.

"I can tell you one thing about this job," said Werner. "No matter what rank you attain, you always keep the trooper at heart. You keep those memories from when you were on patrol. And there were so many good experiences. I think any command officer will tell you the same thing."

Werner now supervises a post with just 90 troopers, but he has the added responsibility of overseeing the Metro Dispatch, the command center for the dispatch of all State Police posts between St. Clair to the north and Monroe to the south, and west almost to U.S. 23 — and most points in between.

Emergency callers throughout that area talk directly to one of several dispatchers at the Northville post, each with a responsibility for dispatching cars in a separate district within the metropolitan area.

Computer terminals constantly feed information to the dispatchers about calls, road conditions, and the status of troopers and their cars.

"The Detroit Freeway post was less high tech," said Werner. "We were more in manual mode there."

Werner owes the upgraded digs to his predecessor, Lt. Jack Moulik, whom Werner was assigned to replace in May. Moulik is under investigation for manipulating a petty cash fund at the Northville post, and has filed for retirement. The investigation remains open, and Moulik is on indefinite suspension pending the outcome.

"Moulik was a computer whiz, and he helped develop all this," said Werner.

The Northville post is also home to a State Police crime lab, a detective bureau, and the district command headquarters.

But compared to Detroit, things are more the same than different at the Northville post, Werner said.

"Our responsibility and mission is

still primarily to patrol the freeways," said Werner. "But we do some criminal investigation other than patrol."

"It's still the Department of the State Police, and we still have the same mission."

Currently the post's attention has been turned toward the construction zone at the I-96/I-696/I-275 interchange. Troopers have supervised intermittent road closures at night for the erection of steel beams above the roadway. They are also watching the construction area closely for speeders.

"There are reduced speed limits in the construction zone, and we want people to abide by the proper speed limits," Werner said. "We want the public to know that we are going to vigorously enforce those laws. We are assigning additional patrols to that area."

Those patrols will continue for the duration of the construction project.

Werner enlisted with the State Police in 1970, drawing his first assignment as a trooper in Pontiac. In 1974, he returned to his native Upper Peninsula after having been selected and trained as a dog handler. Werner operated the K-9 unit at the Negawee post for four years.

His first stint in Northville came in 1978 when he was promoted to detective sergeant.

In 1982 Werner was promoted to lieutenant, and was assigned to the Detroit Post as a platoon commander. He then "lateralled," as he called it, to the district command in Northville as a detective lieutenant.

He achieved the rank of first

lieutenant in 1988, and was sent back to Detroit as assistant commander.

The post commander above him at that time was an inspector. When the department reorganized in 1989, the inspector was shipped back to district headquarters. With that, Werner became commander of the Freeway Post where he remained until his

current assignment.

"It's been a very rewarding career," Werner said. "The experiences of dealing with people at all levels and under all circumstances are unmatched in any other career I could have chosen."

He speaks from experience. Werner admits that, at age 27, he joined the State Police later than most. He

had already worked at a number of different jobs.

"None of them fulfilled my expectations the way this job has," he said. "It's a unique opportunity to help people. We can help law abiding people by arresting those who are not. And we can go out on the highway and help those who are in need of our assistance."

City awards deck to its consultants

The city's parking deck consultants, Rich & Associates of Southfield, have been awarded the contract to design Mainstreet '93.

City Manager Gary Word cited the consultants' five years of design work on previous incarnations of the city's proposed parking deck plan as the reason behind his recommendation that they be hired for the latest plan.

"Since Rich & Associates have been involved with the projects over a number of years and since they are familiar with the city's interests, it would appear that they could design the Mainstreet '93 decks more efficiently than another architect," Word wrote in his recommendation to the

council. "To change architectural firms might also delay the project."

Rich & Associates' proposed fee is based on 5.5 percent of the \$4.2 million project's construction costs, "which is within the range generally accepted for architectural work of this nature," according to Word.

Council members approved the recommendation by a 4-0 vote last week (Council Member Jerry Mittman was absent) but asked to be kept better informed of changes to the plan as it progressed.

The Mainstreet '93 plan calls for rebuilding the Cady Street parking deck, adding a tabletop deck south of MainCentre with leased parking on top for MainCentre residents and others, and paving a new 140-160 space lot on the south side of East

Cady.

It replaces the \$6.2 million plan to move Cady Street further south and replace the current Cady deck with a much larger three-level ramped structure.

The city already has spent upwards of \$700,000 on the Mainstreet plans, most of that for acquiring land that will be used in Mainstreet '93 but some for engineering and design work. City leaders argue that the work is not wasted since the rebuilt Cady deck can be converted into the larger deck envisioned in Mainstreet '92.

Council Member Paul Folino said last Monday that he hoped the city council would be kept apprised of changes to the latest plan, "because every change they make is

expensive."

Word said Folino's concern was well-founded given the scope of the project, and noted that the Downtown Development Authority already had expressed a similar concern.

Mayor Chris Johnson suggested that the city keep closer tabs on changes made before more detailed construction drawings are drafted for the project. "Then you're talking about serious changes," he said. "Up until that point, you're just talking about an eraser and a pen."

Johnson noted that Mainstreet '92 did get to the construction drawing phase before it was scrapped due to the city's fiscal troubles and opposition from school proponents about the size of the tax diversion required to fund the \$6.2 million project.

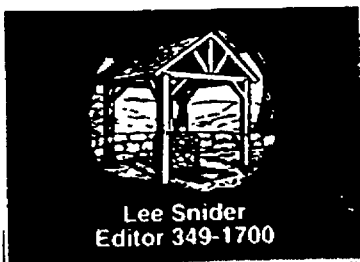

A dirt road solution should be permanent

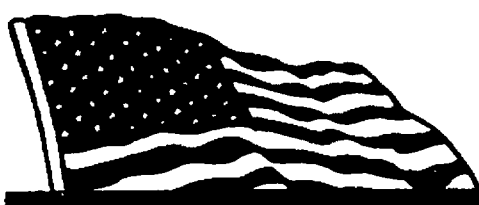
It's easy to sympathize with the Northville Township Board of Trustees' decision to bill Wayne County for the expense of applying calcium chloride treatments to the township's dirt secondary roads.

Trustees voted to use \$40,000 in general fund monies to pay for two such treatments this year, then send the bill along to the county. The roads are owned by the county, after all, and a case can be made for why the county ought to use its own tax dollars, some of which come from township residents, to maintain its property.

The problem, of course, is that simply forwarding the bill will not assure payment. What's to stop Wayne County officials from resealing the envelope and sending it back to township hall?

Trustees have been showing so small amount of fortitude in standing up to Wayne County recently. The decision to send the road treatment bill to Detroit represents the second instance in which trustees have put their foot down in their dealings with county officials over the dirt roads. The first time came when the board decided to challenge a ticket the county issued the township for excessive contaminants due to dust on the roads. The township's response was that, because the roads are under county jurisdiction, the county had, in essence, ticked itself.

But, gumption notwithstanding, township trustees, we believe, have failed to arrive at a long-term solution of the problem. The action they took amounts to nothing more than a ban-

daid approach. At best, all that was accomplished was to delay a permanent solution for another year.

We think that a fair, albeit difficult, decision would have been to use general fund monies to pay for road treatments this year, then put dirt road residents on notice that they would be assessed for that expense beginning in 1994.

Dirt road residents would protest such action, of course, arguing that the roads are public thoroughfares and that their up-keep should be the responsibility of the public at large. However, if residents wanted to have their roads paved they would be required to pay for it themselves, based on the rationale that people whose property fronts onto the roads would stand to benefit most from such an improvement.

We know it would not be easy to tell the hundreds of dirt road residents who have spoken out on this issue that they should have to pay to prevent their roads from choking them. But trustees don't seem to be having any trouble standing their ground with the county, and could muster the conviction such a decision would require.

No harm in looking at fireworks for '94

The Northville City Council has decided to consider reinstating the city's appropriation for a Fourth of July fireworks display beginning next year. Due to financial constraints, the city broke with long-standing tradition last year in withdrawing its contribution of funding and services for the event.

Many have questioned the timing of the fireworks issue, coming as it does when the city is still trying to dig itself out of a deficit situation and is poised to ask voters to pledge the full faith and credit to bonds that would help finance a parking structure addition and renovation downtown.

The political implications of the timing

aside, we find no irregularities in what council is doing in giving the appropriation a closer look. It's plain from the number of inquiries that the fireworks were a highly popular offering, and there seems to be no harm in at least thinking about resuming the program if the money is there next year.

A fireworks exhibit might seem to be a wasteful expenditure during a time of fiscal austerity, but with as much effort as this community puts into its Independence Day parade, it is not inappropriate to at least give some thought to augmenting the celebration by reinstating something people have come to expect and look forward to.

Give credit where it's due

was Northville.

She was obviously impressed with the community and mentioned that she had children who were school-aged. As if responding to a cue, I took the occasion to trumpet the virtues of the local school district, mindful that the prospective resident lived in a place that had high academic standards of its own. Right or wrong, it felt good to be able to look her in the eye and stand up for the area I felt called upon to represent.

It's true that the Northville school district can hold its own against any in the state. The test scores and the number of individual honors the students receive bear that out.

Northville High School principal Tom Johnson provides further evidence when he tells us that a staggering 95 percent of the NHS class of '93 planned to attend two- or four-year colleges or vocational schools. I did some checking and found out that the statewide average for 1991-92, the last year for which figures were available, was right around 60 percent.

But, whenever I hear anyone — myself included — talk about the quality of a given school system, I have to pause and think about just what that means. What is it that makes a school district great? Dedicated teachers? Quality elected officials and administrators? Outstanding facilities?

All of these factors deserve some of the credit, but the real responsible parties, I think, are the parents. They're the ones who establish education as a priority in the home and stress the importance of learning to their children.

I remember not long ago hearing a group of education leaders defending themselves against the claim that it was the poor quality of classroom instruction that was causing the decline in the overall ability level of American high school graduates. The educators said it wasn't the schools but the lack of interest and involvement on the part of the parents that was contributing to the general ineptitude of diploma holders.

I agree. Today's parents were themselves television babies and products of a permissive upbringing, and many suffer from the same anemic sense of motivation and discipline that now handicaps their sons and daughters.

But if parents must shoulder the blame when their children fail to achieve, the parents also must be the ones to get the credit when the students excel, as they do, for example, in Northville. It can only work both ways.

Fine school districts ought to be given recognition for the good things that happen in their classrooms and resource centers, but taxpayers should also be on guard against claims that outstanding school systems always deserve increased funding because they "must be doing something right." Ultimately, the success of the student can be traced back to the home setting where the investments are of a non-monetary nature: namely time, care and effort.

I enjoy telling people where I work and I know that much of the prestige attached to this community comes from the public school system. But I think most of the credit for that excellence must be placed where it belongs, with the values of the parents and the hard-working children they raise.

Class size: Is bigger better?

There were several things about the Japanese educational system which I was particularly interested in, so I availed myself of the opportunity to ask them when Ray called to reschedule our luncheon meeting.

Several of my questions had to do with an interview I heard with an educational expert on radio recently. Sorry, I didn't catch the man's name, but some of his comments stuck in my mind.

Number one was class size.

I thought I heard the fellow on the radio say that typical class size in Japanese schools is right around 50 students per teacher.

"That's terrible," said the radio talk show host. "How do they manage to learn anything. Everyone knows that smaller class size means better learning."

"Aha," said the education expert. "You're guilty of believing everything the teacher unions want you to believe. It's not true; and the schools in Japan prove it."

And that was the question I wanted to ask Byers. Is it true that class size in the Japanese schools is about 50 students?

Ray Byers, the Novi school board president, and I were supposed to meet for lunch on Tuesday, but the meeting had to be rescheduled.

That did not, however, prevent Byers from telling me about his recent trip to Japan. Byers was among a contingent of Novi school officials and students who journeyed to Owari, Novi's sister city in Japan, to view Japanese life in general and the school system in particular.

"That's what it is in Tokyo," said the Novi school board president. "But where we were — Owari, the average class is only about 29 students."

That's still a lot higher than what the education associations around Michigan want us to believe. They generally preach that optimal class size is under 25, and educational quality goes down as class size goes up from that point.

"I'll tell you something else," said Byers. "A few years ago I had an opportunity to spend a couple of hours sitting in a class being taught by Jaime Escalante in Los Angeles when I was visiting California."

Escalante, in case you've forgotten, is the Hispanic teacher who is quite well known in educational circles for his success in teaching calculus and other advanced subjects to students in Los Angeles' inner-city schools.

They made a movie about him starring Edward James Olmos titled "Stand and Deliver" back in 1988.

"And he has about 50 students in all of his classes," said Byers.

But doesn't that fly in the face of everything the teacher unions want us to believe about the importance of low teacher-student ratios? I asked.

"There's a big difference," said Byers. "In Escalante's classes there's no funny business. You goof up and you're gone. They just send you out."

"Same thing in Japan," he continued. "They simply don't tolerate any acting out among the students. They are there to learn, and anyone who disrupts the process is booted right out."

What an interesting concept.

CBN pamphlet was accurate

To the editor:

You were right again in your edi-

torial on July 5th when you said "both sides were playing with meanings in order to suit their purposes." Just as the Northville Record places emphasis in order to sell newspapers, the Northville Public Schools (NPS) does it to raise taxes, and Citizens for a Better Northville (CBN) does it to increase voter awareness and voter turnout, but there are differences.

The NPS publications are proactive, establishing events. The Record and CBN are reactive, responding to the events established by the NPS (and others).

Being proactive means that you control the release of information and set the timetables and deadlines. Being reactive means that you have to do the best you can within the constraints of pre-established deadlines, and with the limited information available.

The NPS, with complete information at hand, published no less than two pieces which understated, by ten million dollars or more, the total financial impact of the millage question. The CBN flier pointed out this and other discrepancies, and did not hesitate to acknowledge and apologize for any errors. Rather than acknowledge the misleading nature of their claims, the NPS is now attempting to draw attention away from its \$10,000,000 shortfall on to CBN's \$360 shortfall.

Supt. Rezmierski justified paying an administrator's airfare to visit his family in Tucson because the NPS received a \$4,500 Micro-soft grant, stating "If that's not paying off our investment, then I guess I'm missing something." As I see it, paying personal airfare is an improper allocation of funds which, in this case, also happened to reap dividends. It was a crap shoot that is no more justified than allocating school funds to the purchase of lottery tickets with the hope of another big payoff.

He also said it would be "ludicrous" for the NPS to be charged for ice water at the Bryant Center. He's right, it is ludicrous, but according to their own documents, it happened. As the CBN flier said, "This is a constraint."

The NPS did, however, make one good point. There was no phone number listed in the CBN flier for people to call if they had questions about its contents. Perhaps future CBN fliers should list the NPS phone number so that the exposed discrepancies could be explained.

Test breakdown can be helpful

To the editor:

I read with interest your article and editorial regarding the building scores on the Michigan Education Association Program (MEAP) tests. I disagree with your suggestion that we need this comparison to provide "a little healthy school rivalry and interdistrict competition." However, I agree that the comparisons could get people thinking—as well it should. This is good information and could indicate many things:

- The particular student group may need to be taught the curriculum in a different way.
- Staff may be uncomfortable with the delivery method of material and require administrative flexibility to change the curriculum or delivery method.

The State of Michigan has required every school district to establish School Improvement Teams. The intent of these Teams is to increase each child's academic performance and social stability by evaluating information at each individual school within a School District. By analyzing data the School Improvement teams may be able to:

- Find more efficient use of buildings and personnel
- Create alternative programs to meet the needs of students and teachers at a particular school
- Implement curriculum programs to meet the needs of the children in a particular school.

I would encourage the Central Office Administrators to use this comparative data on the MEAP scores constructively and positively. Turn it over to your building principals, teachers and the School Improvement Team. Through analysis, this data could be used to strengthen our children's knowledge level — not encourage competition among the diverse entities within our community, but to implement any changes that may improve the data. Central Office Administrators will need to relinquish some control of their school principals. Surely, this cannot be too great a sacrifice to improve upon an already impressive MEAP performance — we can never get so smug as to assume there is no room for improvement.

Bad time for a parking deck

To the editor:

Like each other business in one of the three designated areas (A, B, and C) of the Northville business

district, I have just received my assessment against my property to help fund the planned new downtown parking "facility." Since my business already meets the parking requirements by having its own self-contained on-site parking lot and because we are located at the other end of the city farthest away from the facility site in a "C" area, our assessment is not large, and over an 11-year assessment period, while it is not a joy to pay, it will probably not create any significant burden.

The fact that we have no legal or real requirement for any additional parking and that this facility is so far from our business location that it provides no actual benefit to us deserves to be mentioned. The somewhat far-stretching theory that this facility will benefit other merchants closer to it and then that benefit will "trickle" down to us does have some merit; however, we perceive that merit to be small. The primary problem as we see it is that this new \$3.2 million parking deck is in the wrong location to serve the real needs of the majority of downtown Northville businesses.

What these businesses most desperately need is vastly increased parking spaces located conveniently for use by potential customers. The only site offering to fill that need is the current public lot site along Dunlap. This would fill a real need and have an immediate positive impact on virtually all the businesses in the downtown area.

I would feel a lot better if the money we are being assessed was going toward a deck more suitable to the actual needs of fellow businesses. I would feel even better yet if the City hadn't chosen this particularly bad time in the financial fortunes of many in its business community to spend some \$88,000 (about one third of the approximate \$250,000 it is assessing these same beleaguered business members for the parking facility) to face-lift and reorganize the interior of the city hall, some \$28,000 of which has already been approved for the front office area alone.

It is hard to argue against an "improvement" in efficiency and customer service, but to expect to achieve \$88,000 worth of increased efficiency by moving some desks and computers somehow just doesn't ring right; especially in these financial times when most businesses as well as residential citizens are going through a period of belt-tightening. These are simply not the financial times for "business as usual." I am reminded of Marie Antoinette's supposed admonition to her starving populace when they begged her for bread and she replied "Let them eat cake."

(Editor's note: The Northville City Council has approved a \$26,500 renovation of the front office at city hall, and that amount has been included in the 1993-1994 fiscal year budget. No dollar figure has been determined, budgeted or spent for an eventual reorganization of the entire city hall interior, though such a project has been discussed.

Mainstreet '93 is a \$4.2 million project funded by a \$3.5 million general obligation bond. The plan calls for rebuilding the Cady Street parking deck, adding a tabletop deck south of MainCentre with leased parking on top for MainCentre residents and others, and paving a new 140-160 space lot on the south side of East Cady.)

city's planning commission and zoning board of appeals. He had earned an annual salary of \$44,668 as full-time inspector.

Six months ago, in response to decreasing inspection needs, Attard's full-time post was reduced to a 20-hour-a-week contracted position.

He earned an annual \$26,000 under the contract and an additional \$25 an hour for "approved work performed beyond 20 hours/week."

Attard still will receive 75 percent of the permit fee for electrical inspections, the same reimbursement received by the city's contracted heating and plumbing inspector.

His seven-year stint at Northville City Hall followed 15 years as an inspector for Plymouth Township.



Attard's exit opens door to township

was among more than 30 received by the city in response to its advertisements to firms and queries to neighboring communities for part-time service providers.

The plan did not pass without some criticism. Council Member Paul Folino asked why any change was needed in the current set-up.

"If Mr. Attard is still good enough to be our electrical inspector, why can't he continue to be our part-time building inspector," Folino asked. "I've heard nothing but good comments about our inspector."

Folino noted that the change will mean more work for the city clerk and more bills from the planning consultants, and added that he feared pos-

sible conflicts of interest stemming from township officials conducting inspections for the city.

"I just don't see that this realignment here is in the best interests of the city," he said.

Other council members said the decision was not based on Attard's competence, but was due to the city's declining need for inspection services.

"I believe that when we contracted with Mr. Attard," Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers said, "we realized that the need would lessen over time and we would be looking at changing the way we do business. . . . The time has come to move back and withdraw from what we've done in the past."

The city currently has 13 residential units under construction, with an additional 15 vacant lots in the

last big residential development, Pheasant Hills. Most of the city's available commercial property is already in use.

The council passed Word's motion by a 3-1 margin, as Folino cast the dissenting vote and Johnson and Council Member Mark Cryderman voted with Ayers.

"I understand Mr. Folino's concerns, but I'm willing to try this," Cryderman said.

The city's building department now consists of one full-time clerk and three part-time inspectors for code enforcement, electrical, plumbing, heating and cooling inspections.

Attard has provided building and electrical inspection services, administrative and supervisory assistance, and recording duties for the

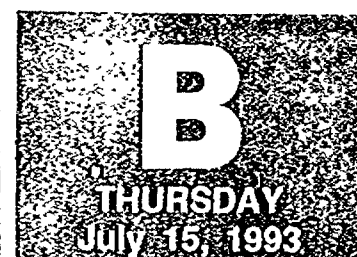

We'll learn to appreciate all the different kinds of cultures and different people. Apparently, they really love the U.S. and our people. That will definitely help."

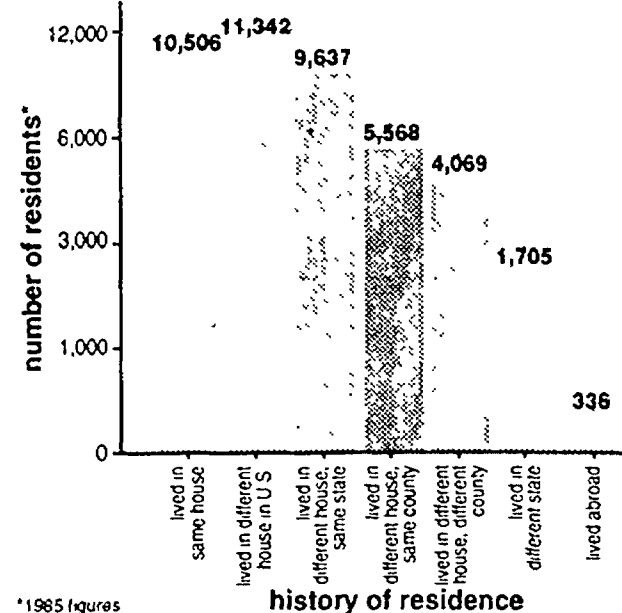

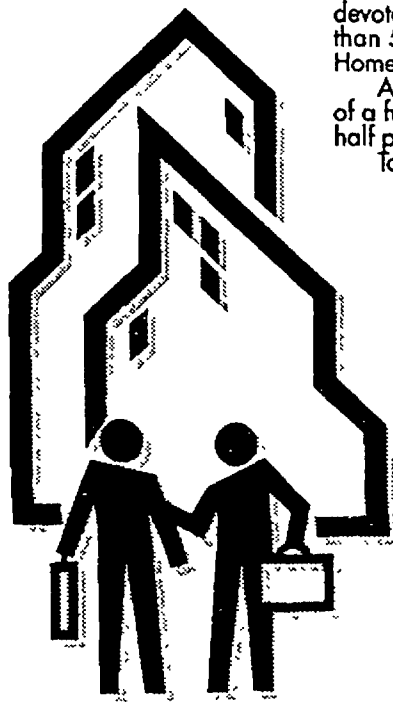

Even Ugly Ducklings can fly high

Sometimes not fitting in means you haven't found the right environment yet.

The quest for acceptance from oneself and others is the message of the children's musical "The Adventures of the Ugly Duckling." An adaptation of the Hans Christian Andersen fairy tale, the play was written by Novi resident and actress Theresa Weiss and her Birmingham partner, Mark Barrera.

The pair started up their professional touring company, September Productions, two years ago when they weren't quite satisfied with how another company they were working with was producing children's theater.

"Basically, it was wanting to do things our own way," explained Weiss, an Olde Orchard resident.

Weiss, who studied theater at Eastern Michigan University, doesn't just co-write the plays. She's playing the mother of the duck brood and a "persnickety old hen" in "The Ugly Duckling." The show features six actors and an accompanist.

"It's a lot of fun. We never stop. We're always taking one costume off and putting another costume on," she said.

This summer, "The Ugly Duckling" will be performed in weekend matinees at the Trinity House Theater in Livonia. They will then take the play on the road to schools, libraries, community theaters in the Detroit area and senior citizen centers.

Weiss started acting as a child and

appeared in professional productions at Greenfield Village while she was still a teen. After marriage and kids, she put the stage on hold, for awhile.

While the theater company was not meant to be a full-time job, she says it has become one.

"I don't punch a clock," Weiss added.

Now, September Productions puts on one new show a year, but the goal is to eventually run four new shows a year.

The roles are cast through open auditions.

It's clear that the writers hope children will take home a lesson with them after they enjoy "The Ugly Duckling." Because, as a baby swan, he is so different from his duck peers, the so-called "Ugly Duckling" wings

away from the nest to find a place where he fits in.

According to Weiss, some of the adventures are fun, some are scary, but they serve to illustrate the theme of the play, that "we all have a beautiful swan inside of us just waiting to come out."

Performances of the 45-minute play are on Saturdays and Sundays from July 10 through August 8. Saturdays, show time is at 11:30 a.m. and at 1 p.m. The Sunday matinee is at 2 p.m.

Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$4 for children.

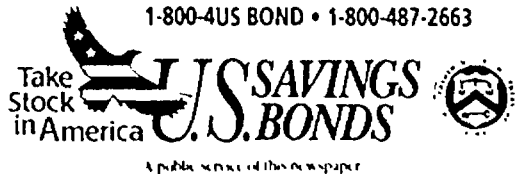

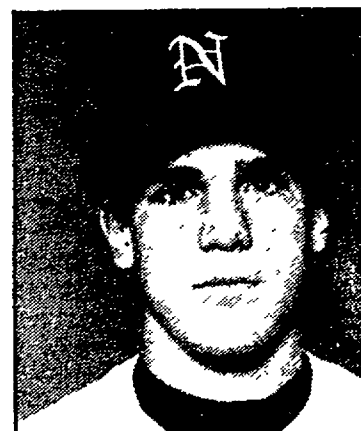
The Mantle squad pounded out 17 hits en route to a July 7 victory at home.

Pumped up Northville resident wins bodybuilding title

Nobody's kicking sand in the face of Sean Kolassa.

With a Great Lakes National championship and a top showing in the Junior Mr. Michigan contest, the young bodybuilder will be doing the kicking. Well, probably not.

The Northville resident is as soft-spoken and well-mannered as he is big. And instead of hitting the beach, Kolassa would rather be in the gym.

"I love the feeling I get when I train," he said last weekend. "It has changed everything for me."

The 19-year-old began working out four years ago at the urging of some friends. In about six months time, Kolassa said, he became hooked on the sport.

Training five and six days a week and working towards a definite goal helped to bring his life into focus, he added.

"I lacked discipline really bad," said Kolassa. "This gave me discipline. To keep coming in here every day... teaches discipline."

Shortly after he began lifting weights, he joined Novi's Vital Power Gym. It was there that Kolassa really began learning about the sport and decided to go into competition.

The Northville High graduate gave credit for much of his progress to friend Gary Noble. A former manager at the gym, Noble took Kolassa under his wing.

"He taught me how to train," said Sean.

Now, Kolassa teaches others the proper way of working out. That's not to say he doesn't find plenty of time to work out himself.

The 19-year-old lifts on a four-day on, one day off cycle. In that training

cycle, Kolassa works on each major muscle group at least once.

Trouble areas like forearms and calves are worked nearly everyday. Kolassa said he enjoys working his upper arms the most.

"They've always been the easiest to train for me," he commented.

Unlike many top and even intermediate bodybuilders, Kolassa doesn't take steroids or any other physique-enhancing drugs.

"You get bigger a lot quicker," he said. "But for me it's not worth the (health) risk at all."

Kolassa said he views weight lifting as one part of a healthy lifestyle. He added that he's looking past any short-term benefits that steroids might produce.

Sean's natural gains in the gym have led to success in bodybuilding competitions.

Kolassa entered his first contest, the Great Lakes National, in August of last year. Competing at middle-weight, he took first place.

He described it as a learning experience.

Besides lifting for the contest, Kolassa had to drastically change his diet. No salt, no sugar, little or no fat.

Shortly before the competition his meals consisted of egg whites, chicken and turkey. Oh, and lots of

Links' south course offers fun

Take one piece of advice before playing the Links of Novi south course: lose your driver.

Unless hitting it straight down the fairway is your strong point, which for most of the golfing population it isn't, you'll be better off letting the big stick stay in the bag. Even from the blue tees, the nine-hole course measures just 2,805 yards.

Although the south nine isn't long, Plymouth resident Wade Stevens said it's more than challenging.

"If you're on your game you'll score well," he said. "If you aren't, you

won't."

The Links of Novi, now well into its third season at 50395 Ten Mile Road, consists of three nine-hole courses. The south is the shortest of the three while the longest, the west nine, is under 3,300 yards from the blue markers.

Management at the Links of Novi bill it as a "golfer-friendly" course. Nowhere is that more evident than on the south nine.

Many courses give golfers severe tests on the first hole. Long par-5s aren't uncommon, for example.

Not at the Links. The par-4, 376-yard slight dogleg left eases players into their round.

One of the more open holes on the nine, golfers should tee off with whatever club is most comfortable to them. A decent 3- or 5-wood or even a long iron should set up an easy shot to the green.

A large, well-maintained green awaits. Par or even birdie is a realistic score on the first hole.

At 210 yards, the par-3 second hole provides the first real test.

The hole heads slightly uphill, making a fairway wood off the tee a must. Don't hit a hook on your first shot, though. Trees line the left side

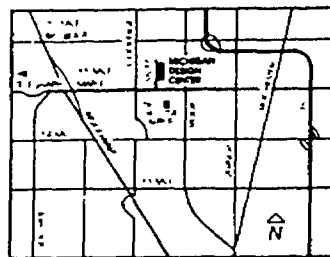

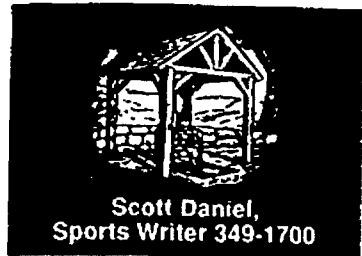

Group plans awareness campaign

The Northville Community Task Force on Drug and Alcohol Awareness was developed in February. The following is an update on what has taken place since then. Residents are encouraged to get involved in the process.

The task force steering committee planned two strate-

gies for the 1993-94 school year. First, the task force believes in substance abuse awareness. Parent involvement is extremely important because recent research shows that parental attitudes towards alcohol and drug abuse play a significant part in whether a student will become involved with it.

A Community Awareness committee was developed to work on ways to involve parents and the community at large in substance abuse education. This committee needs your help! If you want to help impart the above messages or you have a desire to carry out prevention work, we need you. Please contact me at 347-3470.

Second, the steering committee created a

teen task force to develop positive teen activities and possibly a teen center. This is exciting because we believe that we cannot change kids' attitudes about alcohol and drug abuse without their being part of the solution.

Two task force sub-committees have been created. If you would like to work with the newly-created teen task force, come to an open meeting July 28, 1993 at 7 p.m. at the Northville Township Hall. Without community involvement, it is difficult to move some very good ideas forward. Your input and experience may be the key needed to put Northville on the cutting edge of substance abuse prevention.

A recent survey of 15,000 students in grades 6-12, conducted by the Minneapolis-based Johnson Institute, found parental permissiveness a more important risk factor to alcohol and drug abuse among teens than peer pressure. The problem is that too many parents give kids mixed messages about drinking and drug abuse. Research suggests parents need to take a firm stand against teen-age use. This includes not allowing adolescents to drink at home or at family events even though the parents are assured that they will not drive.

David Wilmes, author of *Alcohol is a Drug*, suggests that parents do six things:

1. Establish clear limits with your children. When kids are told that drinking may be appropriate for them in certain situations, they infer that permission has been granted for almost any situation.

2. Set reasonable punishments. These include taking away "wants" that the child has such as car privileges, allowances, concerts, camp, etc., not needs.

3. Talk to your kids early. Because elementary students already feel pressure to drink, teach them how to resist pressure and tell them exactly what to say to get out of uncomfortable and inappropriate situations.

4. Listen to your kids. The data suggests that supportive parents are less likely to have a child who drinks than a child who feels alone.

5. Unite with other parents. The kids are organizers. They know which houses they can party at, but the parents do not.

6. Be a responsible role model. Wilmes suggests that your behavior matches your values and messages.

of the hole starting about 100 yards from the tee. A slice will cause fewer problems, but makes a tough second shot onto the green.

By the fourth hole, accuracy should become the golfer's main focus.

A 311-yard dogleg right, the hole penalizes errant drives to the left. A small slice may actually be helpful here as the ball cuts around some brush and down a steep declining fairway.

Hole No. 5 is rated the most difficult on the south nine. The par-4, 410-yard hole calls for long tee and second shots.

The second shot, in fact, might be the toughest on the course. Even a long drive will leave a medium to long iron shot into the green. Missing in any direction means a quick trip into the woods. Bunkers protect both front sides of the green.

Holes six and seven are cut through the woods, and nearly mirror each other.

Both are par-4s, 319 and 335 yards, respectively. A smart play at each hole is to use a 2- or 3-iron off the tee. Hitting it straight on these holes is critical.

The 99-yard eighth hole is the final par-3. A modest wedge shot gives an excellent chance at birdie.

The south finishes with its only par-5, a 495-yard dogleg right. Again, accuracy is needed off the tee as a hook sends the ball into a pond in the next fairway. Big hitters may be able to reach the green in two.

"I think it's a fair course," Stevens said. "It's forgiving."

He added that the south nine is pleasing to the eye.

"I think it's one of the most beautiful courses in the area — bar none," Stevens commented.

MLS policies update

Major changes emerging in Multiple Listing Service (MLS) operations was the subject addressed in this column recently. Since then, new operational policies have been instituted for all MLS systems across the country operated through the National Association of Realtors (NAR).

Beginning July 1, these MLSs may choose the type of relationship they want to establish with other cooperating brokers, including buyer's agents and transaction facilitators. All these MLS systems must now offer the choices.

Most real estate brokers technically and legally represent the property seller, as clarified in their listing contracts with owners. Other brokers who cooperate in finding a buyer and participating

in the sale are subagents of the listing broker. They, too, represent the seller.

However, an increasing number of "buyer agents" are becoming active in the marketplace—those who exclusively represent a property buyer.

Also, there is a move to change the status of brokers from an agent for either the buyer or seller to that of a "transaction broker" or facilitator. No agency relationship would be established, thus minimizing the broker's liability exposure. But generally, his role would remain unchanged. The basic difference is that facilitators won't take on an advocacy role in a transaction.

One state, Colorado, has enacted a law that will allow real estate brokers to work with homebuyers

The Bristol offers Texas-sized open spaces

Families with a hankering for wide-open spaces can relax in the Bristol. This Texas-size Southwest contemporary house offers a wide selection of spacious environments, inside and out.

It includes 3,600 square feet of living space, with an additional 800 in the three-car garage and shop combination.

The Bristol's front facade is at once stately and informal. Two colossal columns support a regal, high-gabled porch, creating an elegant entrance portico. But off to the right, luxuriant greenery spills down graceful sloping planter walls that surround a dining patio.

Inside, rectangular rooms are clearly in the minority here. Only the two bedrooms have four right-angled corners. Interesting angles abound throughout the rest of the plan.

The vaulted, sky-lit dining room is octagonal in shape. The parlor and kitchen are modified octagons, and the rest of the rooms defy classification. No room is small. Even the children's bedrooms are large—about the same size as the parlor.

The vaulted family room is the largest. It has a fireplace, entertainment center and sliding glass doors that open onto a formal deck.

Kitchen features include a work

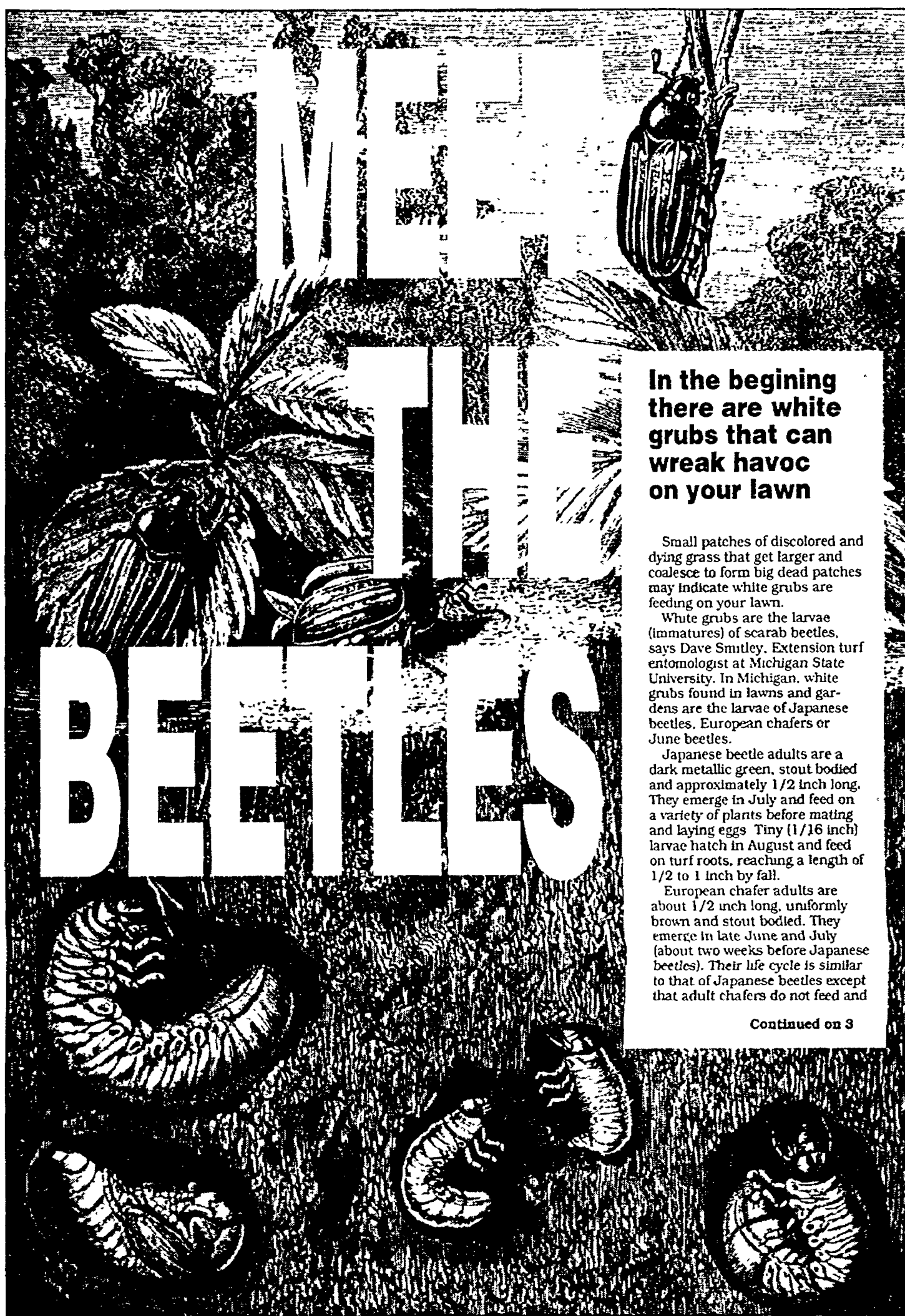
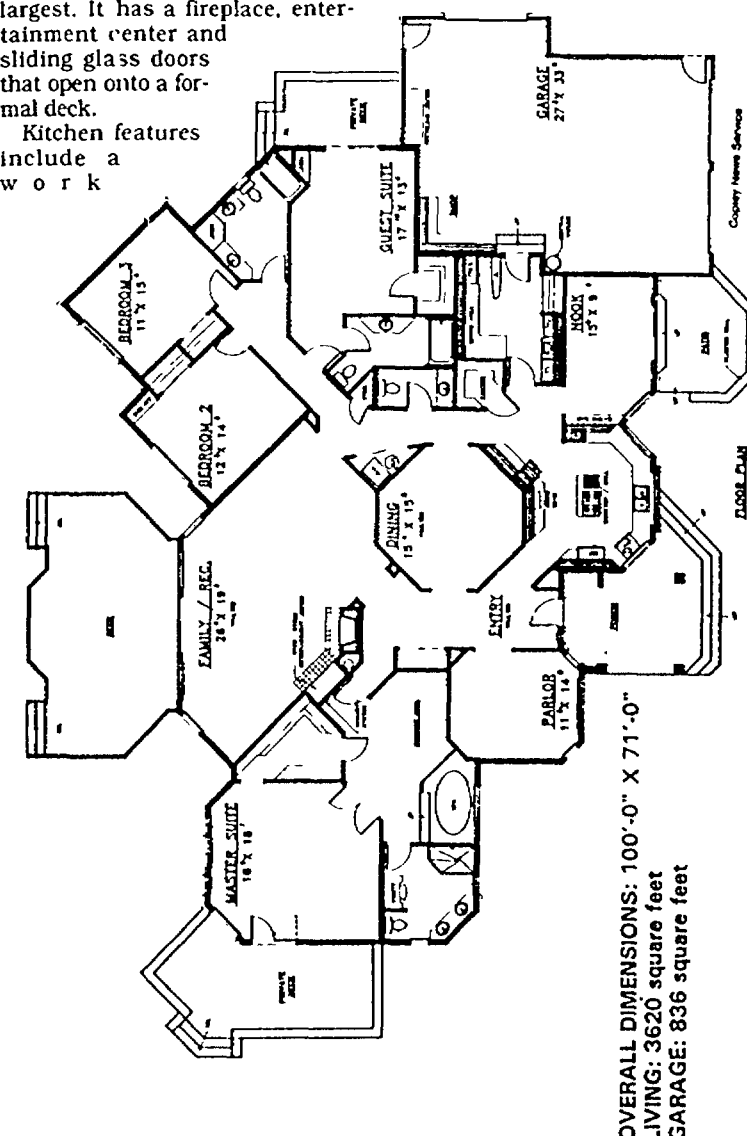
island with cook top and grill, an eating bar with an extra sink, built-in ovens, microwave and dishwasher, and a step-in pantry. The eating nook has a high ceiling and is brightened by sliding glass doors that open onto a landscaped dining patio.

The adjacent utility room includes a sewing area, pull-down ironing board and space for a freezer. And it can be entered from the garage as well.

The master suite is nothing short of elegant. Luxury amenities include a generous exercise area, controls for a security system, raised spa tub, oversize shower, twin basins and a huge walk-through closet. French doors separate the vaulted sleeping/sitting area from the bathroom and another set opens on the private deck.

This plan also includes a spacious guest suite, complete with private bathroom, walk-in closet and deck.

In the begining there are white grubs that can wreak havoc on your lawn

Small patches of discolored and dying grass that get larger and coalesce to form big dead patches may indicate white grubs are feeding on your lawn.

White grubs are the larvae (immatures) of scarab beetles, says Dave Smitley, Extension turf entomologist at Michigan State University. In Michigan, white grubs found in lawns and gardens are the larvae of Japanese beetles, European chafers or June beetles.

Japanese beetle adults are a dark metallic green, stout bodied and approximately 1/2 inch long. They emerge in July and feed on a variety of plants before mating and laying eggs. Tiny (1/16 inch) larvae hatch in August and feed on turf roots, reaching a length of 1/2 to 1 inch by fall.

European chafer adults are about 1/2 inch long, uniformly brown and stout bodied. They emerge in late June and July (about two weeks before Japanese beetles). Their life cycle is similar to that of Japanese beetles except that adult chafers do not feed and

Making sense out of hardiness zone maps

Gardeners should be aware that a number of hardiness zone maps exist—all differing from one another.

These differences are especially important when considering the hardiness of a specific plant because a zone number from one map cannot be paralleled with that of another without comparing the maps themselves.

For example, a United States Department of Agriculture Zone 4 winter low temperature is minus 30 F to minus 20 F, while an Arnold Arboretum (Boston) Zone 4 low is only minus 20 F to minus 10 F.

The differences between these two most commonly used zone maps are compared below.

USDA

- Zone 1: below minus 50 F.
- Zone 2: minus 50 F to minus 40 F
- Zone 3: minus 40 F to minus 30 F
- Zone 4: minus 30 F to minus 20 F
- Zone 5: minus 20 F to minus 10 F
- Zone 6: minus 10 F to minus 0 F
- Zone 7: 0 F to 10 F.

ARNOLD ARBORETUM

- Zone 1: minus 50 F and below.
- Zone 2: minus 50 F to minus 35 F
- Zone 3: minus 35 F to minus 20 F
- Zone 4: minus 20 F to minus 10 F
- Zone 5: minus 10 F to minus 5 F
- Zone 6: minus 5 F to 5 F.
- Zone 7: 5 F to 10 F.

Use a zone map to select the best plants for your growing area. The first step is identifying the zone in which you live. Then, use that zone number as a reference when ordering your seeds.

Most of the trees, shrubs and perennials offered in garden catalogs will grow over a wide region of the country, and for that reason, a range of hardiness ratings is often given.

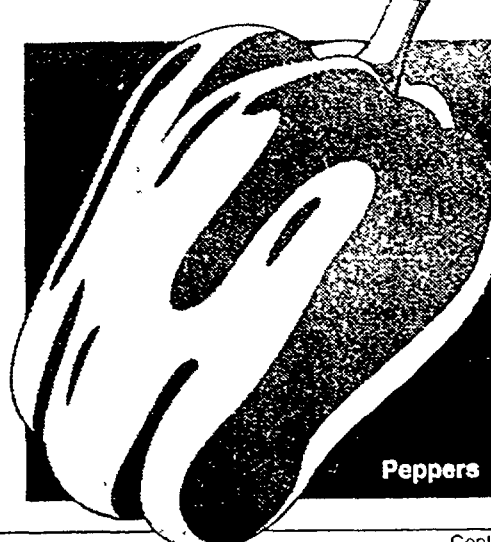
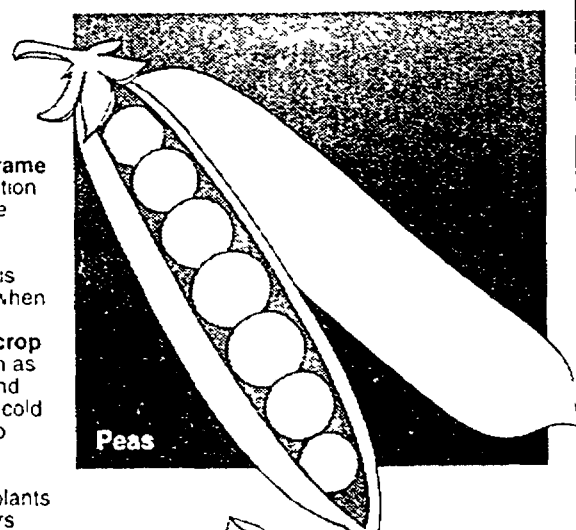

It would probably be worth about \$365 to \$385.

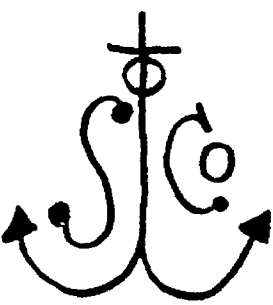
Q. Enclosed is the mark on the bottom of my porcelain creamer and sugar.

I'd never sell it, as it's appreciated for its sentimental value, but I'm curious as to how old this might be, and its value.

A. Each piece is marked on the back with the words "Royal Rudolstadt."

A. This berry set was made by a company founded by Ernst Bohne in Thuringia, Germany, in 1854. Your berry set was made in the early 20th century.

It would probably sell for about \$225 to \$235.

Q. I've had a porcelain plate for many years. It is marked "Royal Bayreuth, Bavaria" on the back. It is 7-1/2 inches in diameter, and has a scene of "Jack and the Beanstalk" on the front.

Can you provide me with information about the value of my plate?

A. Your plate was made by Royal Bayreuth, Bavaria, Germany, around the early 1900s. It currently lists for \$145.

Q. I have my great-grandmother's

silver basket. I think it is sterling. It is about 12 inches long with a scalloped edge decorated with flowers. It stands on four feet and has an ornate handle. On the bottom it is marked "Barbour Silver Co.—Quadruple."

Could you please give me a date and value of this piece?

A. Barbour Silver Co. was in business from 1882 to 1898, when it was taken over by International Silver Co. This is not sterling. Quadruple means it was silver-plated four times.

It might sell for \$125 to \$135 in good condition.

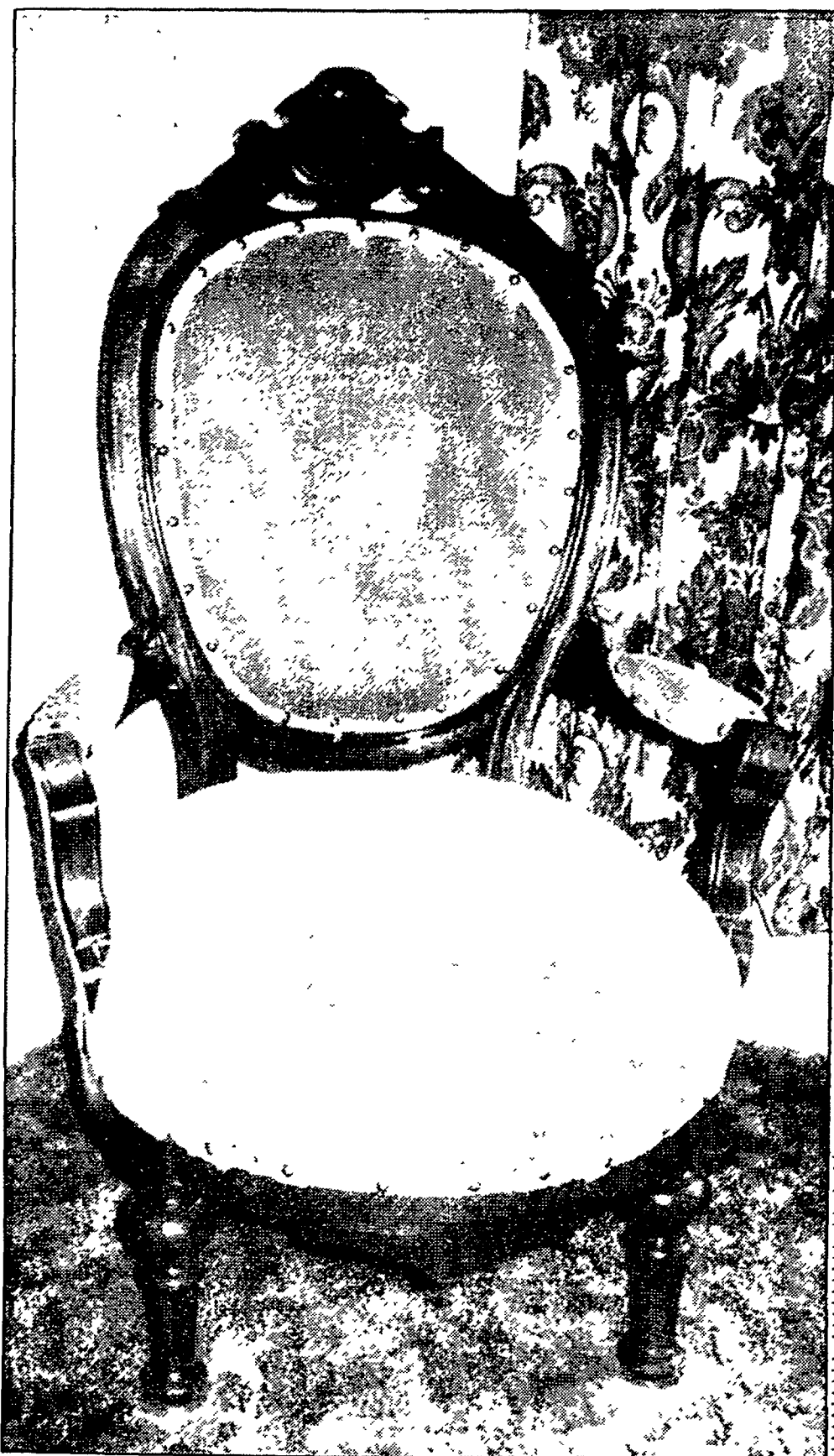
Q. My husband and I own a six-piece Wedgwood plate collection of Bicentennial of American Independence 1776-1976. All six of the plates are in excellent condition.

Pruning is the key to azaelas

azalea problem, not fertilizing. If the top growth is extra vigorous at the expense of the side growth, simply prune immediately after blooming.

Make your pruning cuts slightly below the top shoots.

With the dominant top growth removed, side growth will be stimulated, hopefully noticeable by next spring.

Q. I know pumpkins have two kinds of flowers, male and female, which appear in early July. How do you know which is which?

A. The male flowers show up first, followed by the females. A female is easy to recognize because she has a baby pumpkin at the base of each flower.

To grow a large one, you've got to spot that female right before it's going to open.

You also have to keep an eye on the male blossom and decide whether to self-pollinate or whether you have a male blossom from another plant that you can transmit over to that female.

Q. How do I use a cold frame to harden off my seedlings? How long does it take?

A. Using a cold frame to "harden off" seedlings is easy if you use my guidelines. Most of the time it's best to keep the cold frame open so the seedlings get proper ventilation. If you keep it closed you can burn them.

Keep the seedlings moist but never overwater them, and be especially careful about letting in too much rain.

For early crops, such as peas, lettuce and radishes, put the seedlings in the cold frame two to three weeks before it's time to plant them in the garden.

Allow at least two weeks in the cold

frame to harden off flowers and warm-season plants, such as peppers and tomatoes.

Keep the cold frame cover wide open during the day unless temperatures fall below 50 F or it rains hard. When daytime temperatures are below 50 F, just open the cover a bit.

Close the lid at night, but if temperatures aren't going to drop below 50 F at night, keep the cold frame open.

If nighttime temperatures are forecasted to dip close to freezing, you can put a rug on top of the frame for protection and insulation.

For best results, place a thermometer inside the cold frame to monitor temperature.

Grubs can kill a lawn through extensive root damage

the grubs feed into November.

Adult June beetles are large, brown beetles that are active at night in mid- to late May through June. They are attracted to light and can often be observed bumping into screens on doors and windows of lighted rooms. Adults lay eggs in the soil. The eggs hatch in a few days and the small grubs begin to feed on grass roots. They move down in the soil to overwinter. The second summer, they feed vigorously, moving down in the soil again to overwinter. They complete feeding the third summer, overwinter as adults and emerge the

next spring to mate and start the cycle again.

Large numbers of grubs — five to 10 per square foot — can damage or kill unirrigated turf by destroying the roots. Even irrigated lawns can be damaged when grub numbers exceed 20 per square foot.

"Other problems can cause similar symptoms in lawns," Smitley notes. "It's fairly easy to determine whether white grubs are responsible, however — simply check the soil around the grass roots for grubs."

Look for plump, white, C-shaped insects with brown heads and three pairs of short

legs immediately behind the head. Japanese beetle and European chafer grubs feed in April and May and August through October; June beetle grubs, from May through October.

Often the first sign that you have grubs in your lawn is damage caused by raccoons and skunks, which tear up the turf searching for the grubs. Check for grubs where animal damage has occurred.

If grubs are present in destructive numbers, your lawn is in high risk of dying from drought stress due to root damage. Smitley says the best way to save an infested lawn is to irrigate daily with 1/10 inch of water per day. This is enough to

prevent damage even when grubs exceed 20 to 30 per square foot, he says. Anytime grubs number more than 20 per square foot, your lawn is in risk of dying from drought stress due to severe root pruning if it dries out for more than a few days. Smitley warns. Therefore, for badly infested lawns, he recommends combining an insecticide treatment and frequent irrigation.

You can contact your county MSU Extension office for a list of recommended pesticides for white grub control on turf.

Irrigate immediately after applying a recommended insecticide, Smitley advises, and continue to water every four or five

days. This gets the insecticide down into the soil where the grubs are and helps the grass roots recover.

If the weather has been hot and dry, grubs may have gone deeper than usual into the soil. In that case, apply a pretreatment irrigation of 1/2 inch of water 48 hours before you plan to apply the insecticide, he advises. This should bring the grubs closer to the surface and increase the chances that your insecticide treatment will succeed in reducing their numbers to tolerable levels.

MLS update; the changing face of new home design

To accommodate these changes in the evolving real estate market, NAR has hammered out new policies for its MLS operations. The action responds to concerns and questions often asked by today's brokers.

Examples: Whom do I represent? What are my obligations to clients? What must I disclose, when and to whom? How do I educate clients about all this?

Under the new MLS policy, when participating brokers submit listings, they will have a choice of three offers they can make to cooperating brokers.

The offer can be for subagency only (brokers who serve as a subagent to the listing broker), buyer's agency only or both subagency and buyer's agency. All offers of subagency or cooperation must include detailed information on how participants will be compensated.

In states where real estate brokers are authorized by law to act in a defined non-agency capacity, as in the role of facilitators, the MLS may adopt special rules and procedures to enable listing brokers to offer cooperation opportunities to those individuals and firms, according to a recent NAR report.

"The change is designed to give the MLS more flexibility in response to changing market conditions," said Stephen Hoover, chairman of NAR's Multiple Listing Policy Committee. "Also, the change will expand marketing opportunities for brokers and their clients."

Q. How are new home designs changing in the 1993 market?

A: One change is in size. New single-family homes are bigger and offer more amenities like extra bathrooms and two-car garages than those built last year, according to data reported by the U.S. Census Bureau.

There are more move-up buyers

who are demanding bigger homes with added features this year," said Roger Glunt, president of the National Association of Home Builders. "Also, buyers today want homes to fit their lifestyles and that means more spacious and efficient kitchens and bathrooms."

The median size of a new single-family home built last year increased by 30 square feet to 1,920 square feet over the previous year. And the growing trend is continuing.

It's not uncommon for upscale homes today to have two baths in the master bedroom — his and hers. And today's baths are bigger to accommodate whirlpools, bidets, skylights and linen closets.

It's interesting to note that homes with two or more stories are also on the increase. In 1978, only 28 percent of new homes had two stories or more. By 1988 that share climbed to 49 percent, and it's still climbing.

Household size may be shrinking but garage size is growing. In 1978, the number of homes built with garages for two or more cars was just 52 percent. Last year it reached 75 percent. And in areas where basements are not prevalent, like California and many southern states, buyers want bigger garages for extra storage space.

Fireplaces continue to be a very popular amenity, according to a NAHB report. They are now includ-

ed in over two-thirds of new homes. And central air conditioning is included in 77 percent of new homes.

The size of multifamily development units (apartments, condominiums) is not growing much these days.

It has remained at the current median size of 985 square feet for the past couple of years. Its growth period was during the decade of the 1980s.



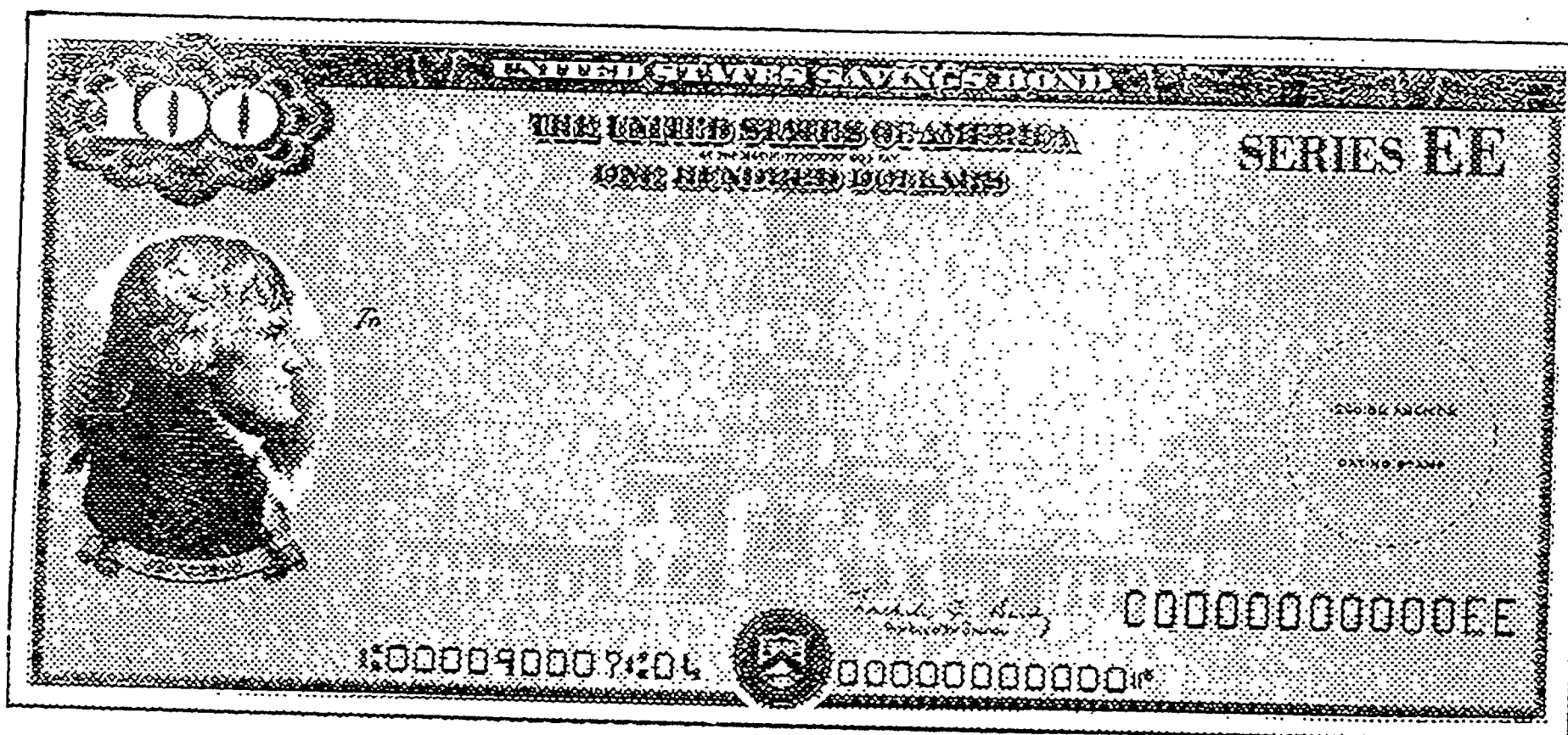

Blind luck Shop has solutions for windows

Will and Linda Sperlberg opened Blind Sensations, a custom window blinds shop, in downtown Milford with the belief that they could provide knowledgeable and prompt service to customers — a type of service that the Sperlbergs found was rare among home contractors.

And they ought to know. Last July the couple moved from Canton to Commerce Township with their three children and another on the way. They were building their new home.

Will remembered some of the things that happened. "A few of the contractors were very unprofessional. One, who promised a crew, didn't show up when he said he would. When he finally did come the 'crew' he had promised consisted of a 12-year-old boy," he said.

"My wife and I thought, 'Hey, if these guys are making it, we can do a lot better job working with people than they can,'" he said.

Before they opened Blind Sensations in April, Will had been a window-blind installer in Livonia.

The Sperlbergs now sell and install their custom blinds. Their walk-in shop hours are Monday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

What makes them unique is their shop-at-home service, which is available before the shop opens or after it closes, to accommodate the schedules of working people.

If you call Blind Sensations for an appointment the Sperlbergs will meet you in your home and bring a selection of sample books for you to look over.

They will measure your windows, help you match your blinds to your room furnishings and they will provide you with a price quote. Most orders take a maximum of 10 days until delivery.

Once the blinds have been delivered to Blind Sensations, the Sperlbergs will then promptly install the blinds for you for \$25 on orders of less than \$350. For orders over that amount, installation of the blinds is free.

The days of those ugly blinds so popular in school classrooms years ago are gone. Blind Sensations carries all types of blinds, most notably

the Hunter Douglas Silhouette Window Shading that appear to be as sheer and gauzy as butterfly wings but which "control light like a blind while yielding an elegant softness even when completely closed," according to the Hunter Douglas sample book description.

"Vertical blinds are our biggest sellers," said Will. The average price for custom doorwall verticals ranges between \$92 and \$312. This includes the PVC free-hanging style with weighted cloth, and the type with cloth inserted into the louvers.

Prices go higher for designer-name blinds. But Will adds that a custom designer look can be achieved in any price range. "I don't do PVC mini blinds," Will cautions, "Kmart does that. All the vertical blinds I sell have head rails with lifetime guarantees. The cheap ones you see advertised in the newspaper I don't carry because I could not guarantee them."

"People have moved toward verticals because mini-blinds get dusty and people hate to dust them."

For pleated, honeycomb and verti-

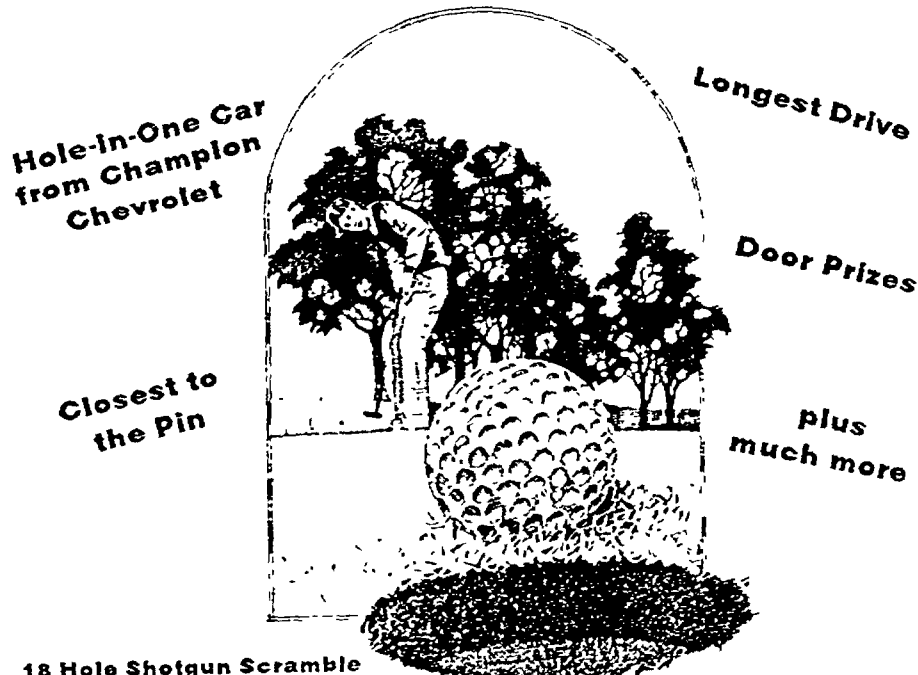

Organizing records can save tax dollars

Good financial records can make preparing your 1993 income tax return less difficult, points out the Michigan Association of CPAs. In addition, organized records may help to minimize your tax bill, reduce fees paid to tax preparers, and verify your tax claims if the IRS selects your return for an examination.

REVIEW PAST RETURNS

If you're unsure of the information you'll need to complete your 1993 tax return, take a look at last year's return. Note the kinds of documentation necessary to support the return. Then make a list of the deductions and tax credits that you qualified for last year, as well as any other deductions you may be eligible to take on your 1993 return. Establish files for each of the items on your list and begin sorting your records accordingly.

COLLECT ALL INCOME STATEMENTS

First locate items that identify your sources of income, such as your Form W-2, provided by your em-

ployer. This form indicates how much you were paid during the year and how much was withheld for federal income tax, state income tax, and FICA (Social Security) and other amounts deducted from your pay.

Important forms to put in your income file include 1099 forms, provided by banks and financial institutions, showing interest earned on your accounts. Your state government may also send you a Form 1099 indicating any tax refunds received for the prior year. If you sold securities over the past year, you'll also need to locate Form 1099-B, issued by your stockbroker.

Don't forget to collect documentation for other sources of taxable income, such as unemployment compensation, dividends, Social Security or pension benefits, alimony, and income from self-employment, trusts, partnerships or S corporations.

LOCATE MEDICAL AND DENTAL BILLS

Medical expenses that exceed 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income are deductible. To see if you can

exceed this floor, pull out all your bills for medical expenses and the receipts that show the date they were paid. Don't overlook bills for expenses such as new eyeglasses, prescriptions or medical insurance premiums. Transportation costs that were necessary for you to obtain medical care are also deductible.

DOCUMENT CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS

You'll need either receipts or cancelled checks to support cash contributions to qualified charities. If you donate a total of \$500 or more of property, you must fill out Form 8233, Non-Cash Charitable Contribution. If one single donation of property exceeds \$500, you need to provide more information on the form. Additional requirements apply if you make a donation of property exceeding \$5,000.

GATHER IMPORTANT HOMEOWNER DOCUMENTS

Mortgage interest and, in most cases, home equity interest are deductible. Set aside statements, notes

and cancelled checks that document these interest payments. In addition, review your cancelled checks for such expenses as property and real estate taxes as well as points paid to obtain a mortgage on your primary residence.

Owners of rental properties should also set aside cancelled checks related to their operating costs, including advertising fees, house-cleaning expenses and repair costs. Failing to locate these important documents may cost you valuable tax deductions.

CALCULATE OTHER MISCELLANEOUS EXPENSES

Finally, review your checkbook and credit card statements for miscellaneous expenses, such as amounts paid for uniforms and tools required for your job, union dues, unreimbursed employee business expenses, as well as job-hunting expenses. Generally, your miscellaneous expenses are deductible to the extent that they exceed 2 percent of your adjusted gross income.

CPAs point out that by documenting deductible expenses such as these, you may discover that your tax liability is lower than you originally thought. 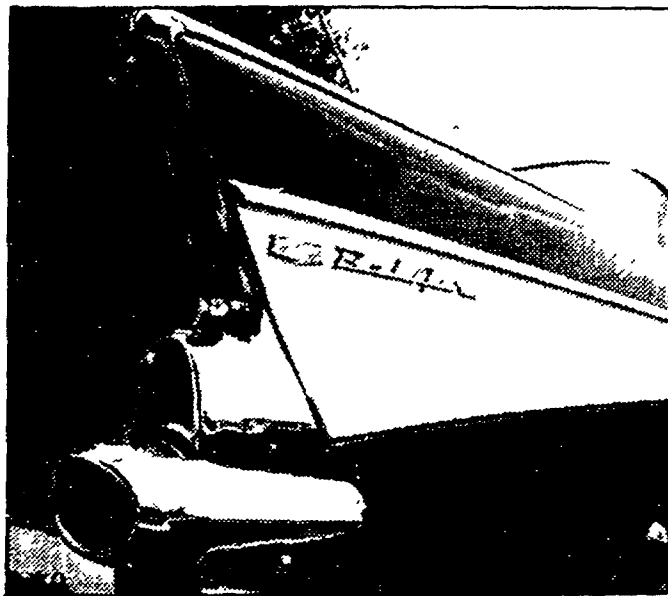

Fifties come alive at Novi's festival

Novi's sixth annual Michigan '50s Festival is slated to get underway Wednesday, July 21, and run through Sunday, July 25, with activities and events at the Novi Town Center, West Oaks Mall, Twelve Oaks Mall and the Novi Civic Center.

This year's festival promises to be even bigger and better than last year, when the festival shattered all records for attendance. While the festival has grown each year, attendance figures for the five-day event jumped 40 percent last year when attendance at all locations for festival activities were counted.

Attendance last year bounced to an estimated 100,000, up from 60,000 the previous year. Festival officials said they believed some 86,400 showed up at the main festival site in the Town Center last year.

At the same time, the Grand River Cruise on Sunday evening grew from 1,000 cars the previous year to more than 1,100 cars, and attracted an estimated crowd of up to 8,000. Revenues from the festival have increased too, reaching the \$170,000 mark last year. This year, festival officials expect to net some \$215,000. That's important because the '50s Festival Committee last year agree to donate profits from the festival each year to the Novi Parks and Recreation Department until it has enough to purchase a mobile stage, worth \$50,000.

According to festival committee vice president Gary Wyatt, the festival this year will concentrate on expanding and capitalizing on successful programs it has had in the past.

For instance, the Family Show Tent, a new addition last year, was such a success that it will be re-

vived again this year with an expanded entertainment lineup. Main attractions of course will still be the Lip Sync contest Thursday evening, Danny Vann's Tribute to Elvis Friday and Saturday, and the Bobby Sox & The Greasers show Wednesday night. Additions will include a Sock Hop for Kids Friday afternoon, and a Lip Sync show for kids only Saturday afternoon.

Also this year, Sock Hop Night in Novi returns to the '50s Festival activity lineup. Cancelled last year due to transportation problems the previous year, Wyatt explained the transportation difficulties have been solved.

With seven buses (three city buses, two airport vans and two trolleys) scheduled to be in operation during the traveling sock hop program, Wyatt said he believed there should be room to spare and more buses than needed for the event.

Sock Hop Night, of course, involves a series of sock hop events at hotels throughout the city and it always counted as one of the festival's most popular events. For one price, partygoers can attend all four sock hops, and ride the buses from one location to the next.

Included in the event will be the Hotel Baronette, featuring the Saxophones; the Sheraton Oaks, featuring Steve King and the Ditties; the Novi Hilton, with Rocky & the Rollers; and the Wyndham Garden Hotel, which will have karaoke music.

The price is \$10 per person in advance; \$12 at the door. Sock Hop Night will run from 8 p.m. to 1:30 a.m.

Another featured attraction will be the Ice

Cream Social, sponsored by downtown Merchants, Friday afternoon at Marcus Glass. The event, free to those who attend, is a great event for children. Downtown merchants provide the ice cream and entertainment and the kids provide the smiles.

Marcus Glass is located at 25914 Novi Road. The Ice Cream Social will run from noon to 3 p.m. Friday.

Of course, all the favorite events of '50s Festivals past will be back this year — from the '50s Festival Car to the Grand River Cruise, from the Entertainment Tent concerts and shows to the Twelve Oaks Mall sponsored fireworks show Saturday after dark.

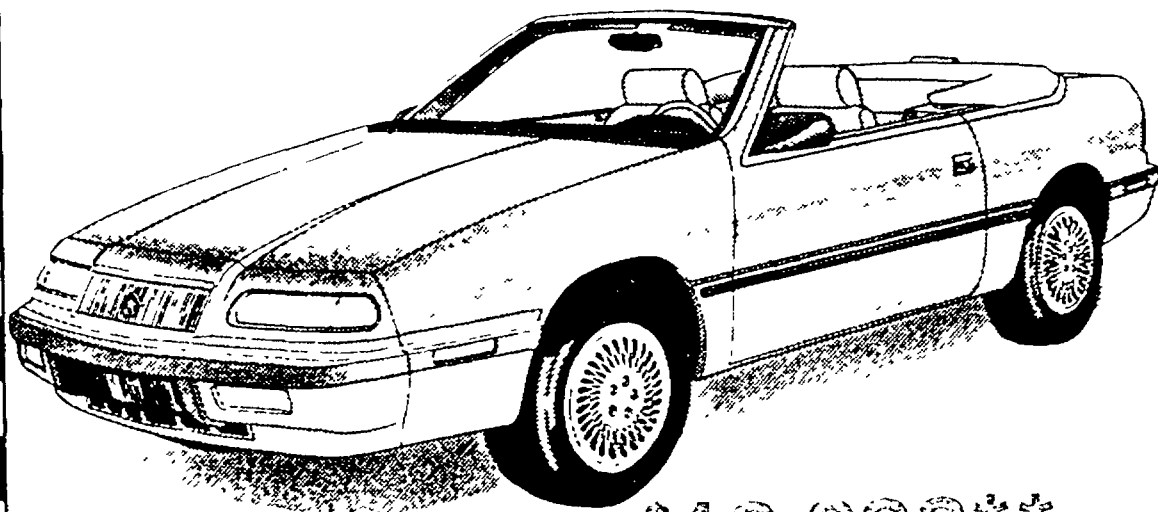
The fun starts Wednesday morning when the festival office information booth and sales booths open. The concessions will begin offering traditional and ethnic foods at 6 p.m. The entertainment starts at 7 p.m. when Sheryl's School of Dance, with music provided by the L.C. Brass Quintet, performs its Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy routine in the Entertainment Tent. According to Wyatt, the festival this year has add provided more slots for performances by such local groups.

Later Wednesday evening, Counter Clockwise will be perform in the Entertainment Tent and Bobby Sox & The Greasers will get things rolling in the Family Show Tent.

On Thursday, the arts and crafts tents open at 10 a.m. Midday, there will be Bingo and a 5K run. The Saxophones perform in the Entertainment

The petting farm will also be back on Sunday, as will the clowns at the Family Show Tent. The Dancing Di-

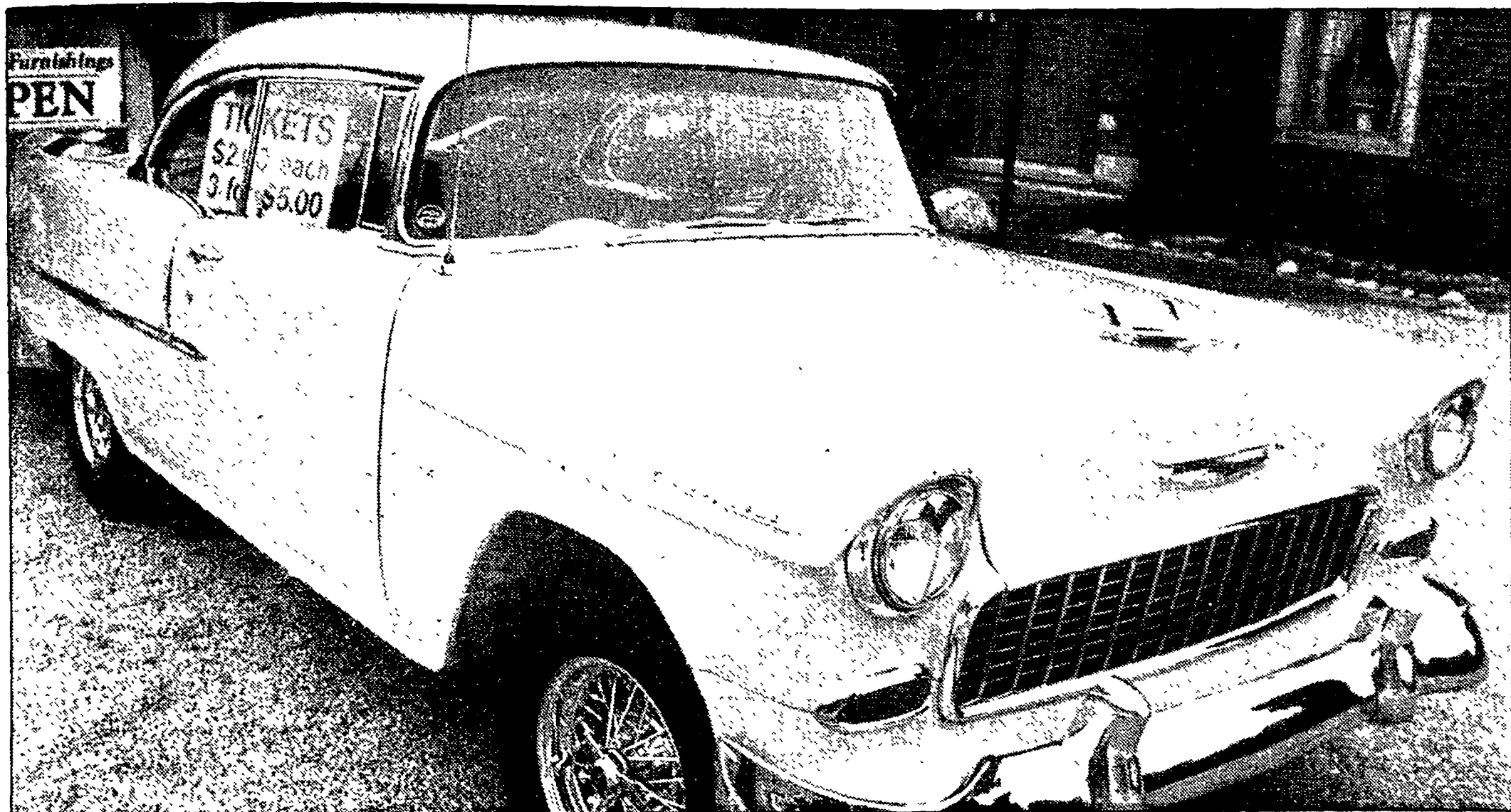
nosaurus will perform there Sunday, as will Ilene's Dance Electric, Zemo, Max the Moose, The Dance House, and the Performing Arts Academy.

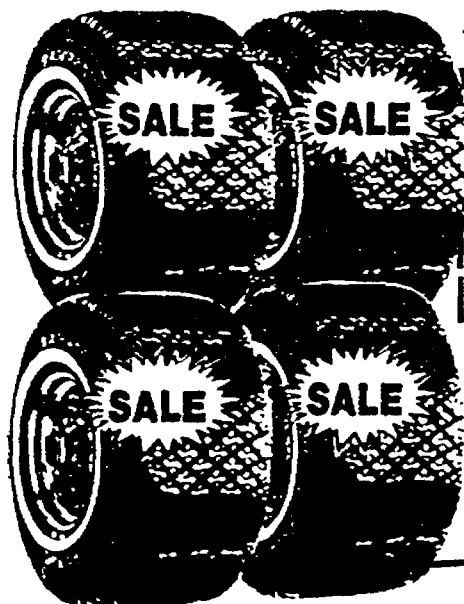

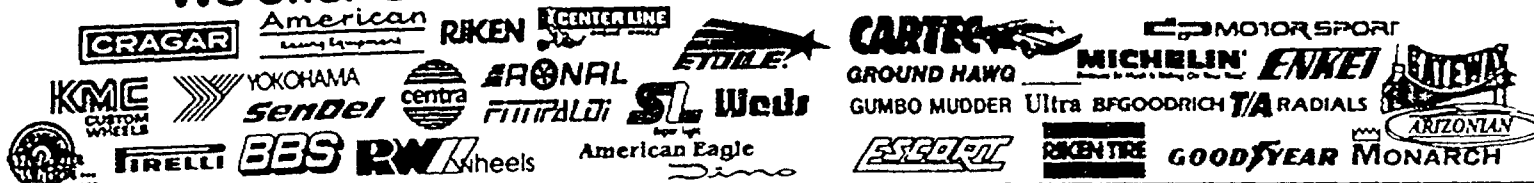

Festival revives the classics of rock

At the time, no one considered it to be a distinctive style of music. In the 1950s, it was just good rock 'n' roll. Only later, when rock became compartmentalized into a variety of formats was it given a name and referred to it as "doo-wop" music, a label taken from the nonsense syllables often used by background singers as they harmonized behind the lead.

A leader in the "doo-wop" field was the group The Platters, which sold some 90 million records and set the standard for choreographed performances which would come to characterize the vocal groups to follow.

The group originally consisted of Paul Robi, David Lynch, Zola Taylor, Tony Williams and Herb Reed. Robi is credited with creating the Platters' sound, arranging and conducting all of the group's hits. He also choreographed all the group's dance steps and served as emcee during its shows. Williams is credited with further stylizing the group's music, allowing it to cross over from the R & B charts to the pop charts, a move that significantly improved the group's early success.

"Only You," recorded on Mercury Records, which sold more than five million records and was sung in more than twenty languages, was the group's first hit. "The Great Pretender" was the first Platters tune to reach number one on the charts. But those songs were quickly followed by other million-record sellers like "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes," "The Magic Touch," "Harbor Lights," "Remember When," "My Prayer," "Twilight Time,"

"You'll Never Know," "Red Sails in the Sunset" and "Enchanted."

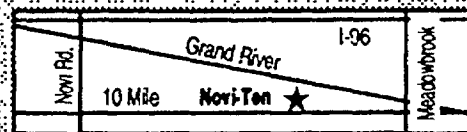
The Platters were still producing records in the '80s, including the *Candlelight Music Selection of the 50 Gold Hits of the Platters* and *Encore to Golden Hits*. The group has been inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

And the group is still going after 40 years, in large part because of its efforts to ignore that labeling of its style and simply perform. According to the group's promotional literature, the Platters "represented a logical development of the pre-rock vocal music of such groups as the Ink Spots. They soon proved they were not confined to any one 'bag' by turning to the standard pop repertoire and showing in recordings that they could handle any kind of material in distinctive and original style and still keep their mass following. They have, more over, always firmly believed in performing live as much as possible. And so professional have their world wide stage performances been, that they are in constant demand. This policy has paid off well, for just as stage work arose originally from record popularity, a new public who came to know them through stage work has become devoted fans for their records."

Robi died in February of 1989 of cancer, just at the end of 20-year court case over ownership of the Platters' material. In the case, Paul Robi and his wife, Martha, won the right to sole use of the Platters' name. Today, Martha runs the show for the

new Platters.

The new Platters, formed in 1989, consists of Elmer Armstrong, Chico Lamar, Lynn Brown and Larry Tate.

The Platters will be featured as the headline attraction in the Entertainment Tent Saturday night from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. with Rock & The Rollers. Admission will be \$5.

Rocky & The Rollers of course is a perennial favorite at the Michigan '50s Festival, having performed in all five previous festivals, most often backing up the main act Saturday evening in the Entertainment Tent.

And if truth be known, in past festivals it has often been The Rollers that really made the Saturday evening performance special, rocking the audience well into the night long after the headline act has left the stage.

The band likes it that way. According to Gerry Seader, drummer and vocalist for the group, the Rollers would like to become known as virtually synonymous with the '50s Festival. The group is well on its way to that distinction.

The rest of the group includes Dave Parker, lead guitar and vocals; Greg Cellini, keyboard and vocals; and Corby Anderson, bass guitar and vocals.

The group performs classic rock hits from the '50s, '60s and '70s. It has been together and performing for 15 years. The Rollers have worked with Dick Clark and toured to support 150 recording artists including Chuck Berry, Fabian, Peter Noone, Bo Diddley, the Shirelles, and Little Anthony.

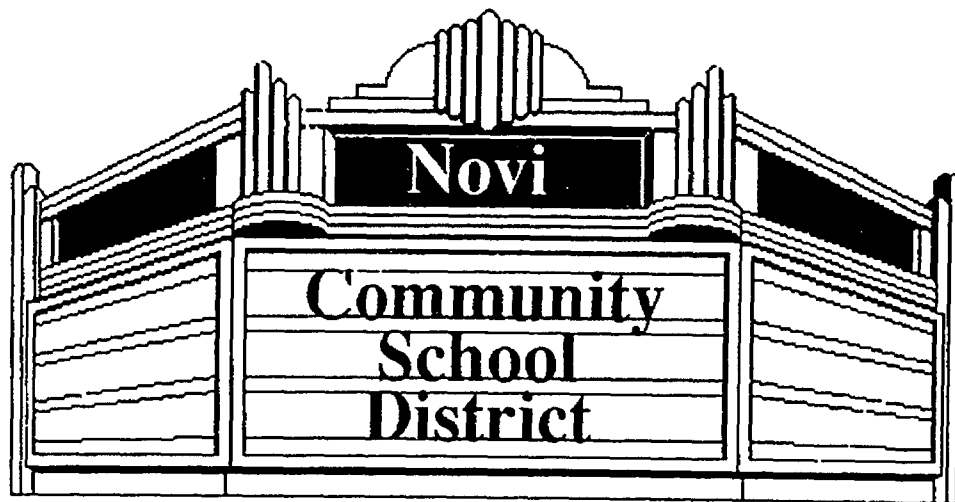

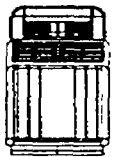

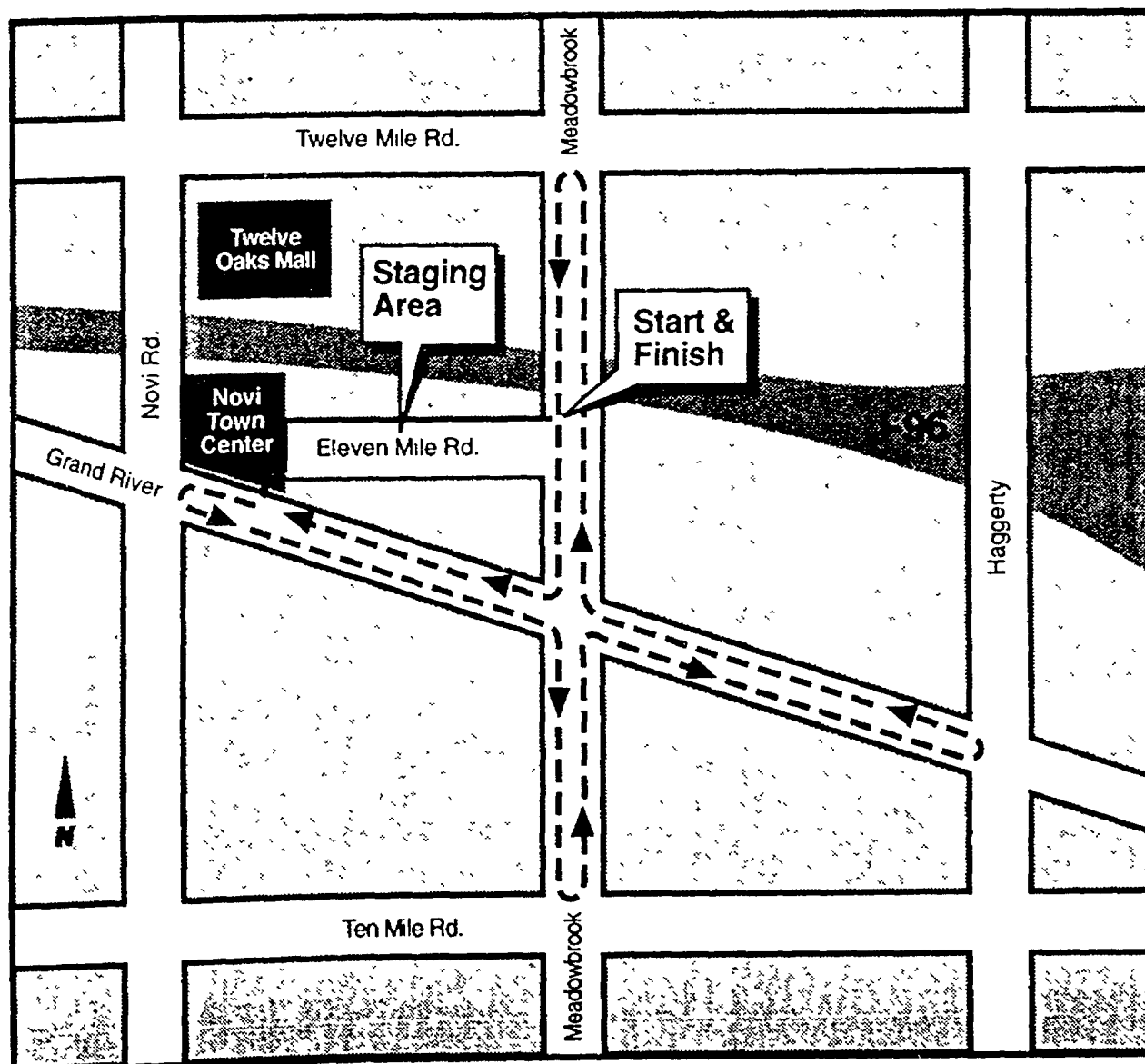

The cruise begins at 6 p.m. and runs until 9 p.m. Entrance to the cruise route will be via Eleven Mile Road.

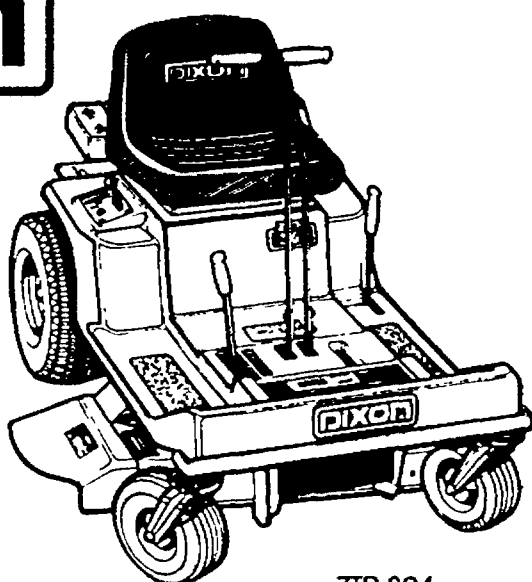

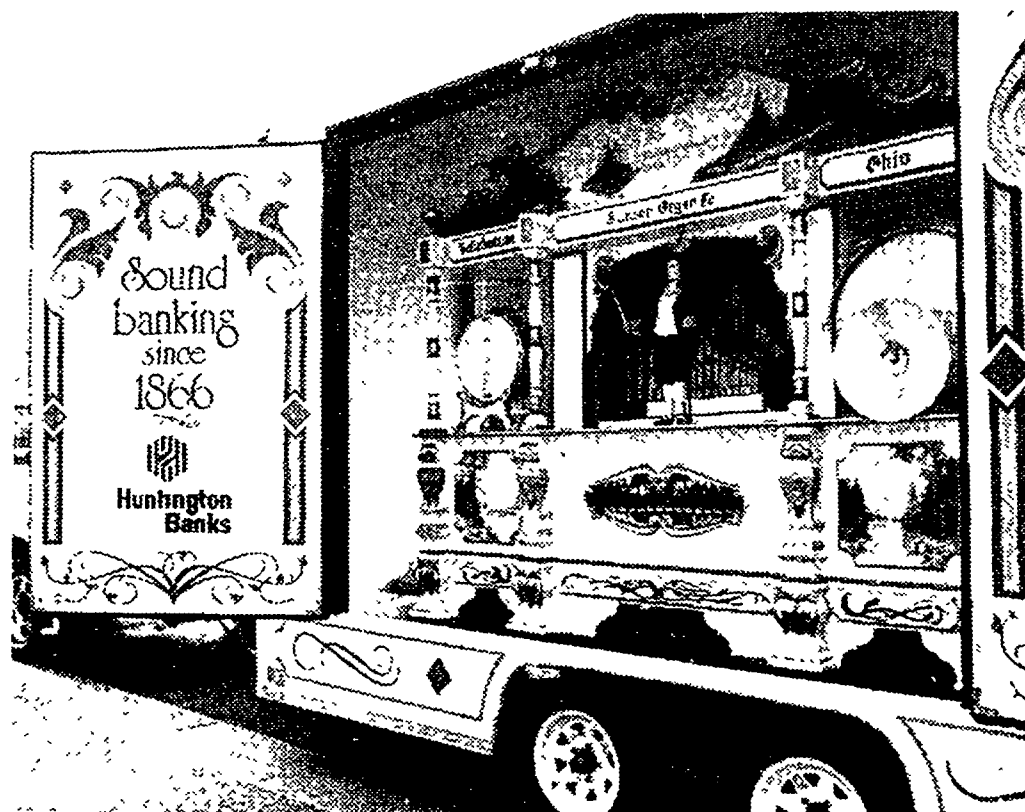

Rules of the road

Police want to keep the Grand River Cruise safe

Showing off will have to be limited to cruising slow this year.

The '50s Festival Board voted not to sanction a specified burnout zone, and the Novi Police Department will be more than happy to write a ticket to anyone who tries to "light 'em up" during the Grand River Cruise Sunday evening.

Burnouts have been a controversial issue at past '50s Festivals. The drivers want to demonstrate their cars' horsepower, and the crowds tend to egg them on by dousing the pavement with water and whatever other fluids are handy.

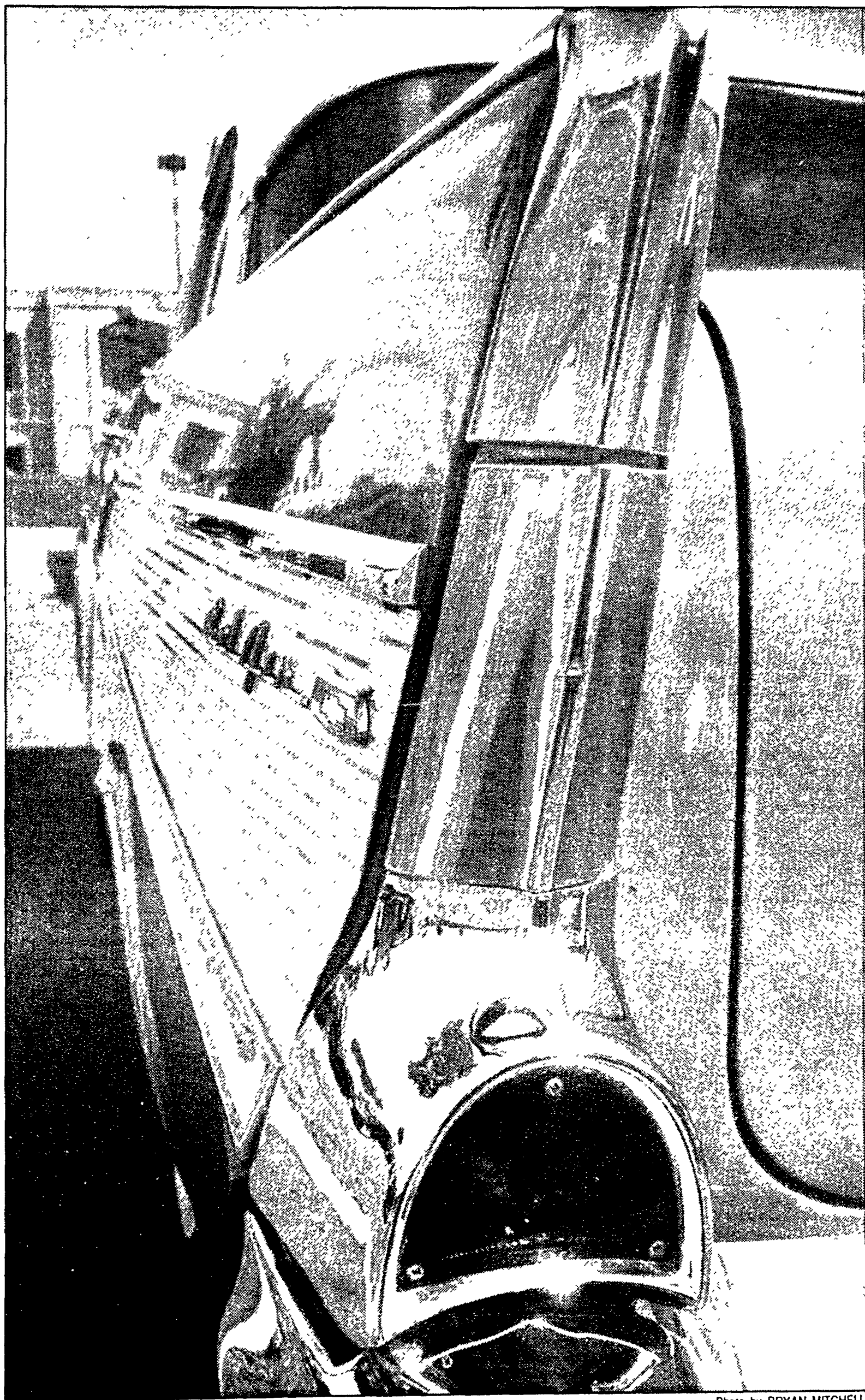
A suggestion had been made to provide a safe and separate area for burnouts, but the '50s Festival Board voted against it for this year, but the possibility still remains for future '50s Festivals.

The police have written tickets to drivers in the past, to the chagrin of crowds and drivers, but you can expect more of the same this year. And officers won't be accepting any excuses like "I thought we were allowed to do burnouts."

"Literature that will be handed out to the drivers will state that burnouts will not be allowed and violators may be ticketed," said Novi Police Chief Doug Shaeffer. "At the staging area where they exit onto the cruise route there will also be a sign that states that."

As the chief (himself a car buff with a pretty hot '66 GTO) explains it, restricting burnouts is a matter of public safety.

"We just simply have crowds so close to the cars, that we can't allow it," he said. "Also, there are various states of driving skills, and various states of equipment of vehicles in attendance. Not being able to do (burnouts) in a controlled environment, we choose not to allow them."

The folks who put on the '50s Festival

"Here's the Mr. Microphone lady!" yell 20 or so Cruisers as Skip Tuck ambles into the room.

Like Norm Peterson walking into "Cheers," Tuck's arrival at the Cruisers organizational meeting is expected, comfortable. And like Cheers patrons' attitude toward their favorite regular, the '50s Festival volunteers' affection for Tuck, whom they've dubbed "Queen Cruiser," is obvious from the way they tease her.

"The Mr. Microphone thing is because my husband Don worked the Sock Hop bus . . . and went around with this thing that looked like a microphone," Tuck explains later. "He got everybody to sing in it and was a big hit."

The microphone story is just one of many recalled by different Cruisers in the midst of planning their work schedules for this year's event.

Most of those at the meeting have made the donning of red T-shirts and festival-working experience an annual tradition since the event's inception six years ago. Their work includes everything from blowing up balloons and decorating tents to taking tickets and answering visitors' questions. But in between duties during the 12-hour days put in by some dedicated volunteers, it is apparent a very good time is had by all.

"It's so fun," repeats Sue Rafferty, also a sixth-year Cruiser, at about ten-minute intervals during the meeting. "You get to meet people, watch what's going on, it's not really like work."

Cindy Kopcinski, the '50s Festival board member who coordinates the Cruisers agrees, noting that, "it is definitely not hard labor."

She emphasizes that Cruisers can declare preference for when and what events they would like to work. Though some volunteers, herself included, spend up to 15 hours a day at the Town Center site, the group only asks members for an eight to 10 hour commitment over a five-day period.

The fact that so many of the Cruisers "never do go home," as Rafferty puts it, and return each year (Kopcinski says there are 50-60 volunteers this year compared with 20-25 the first year) is testimony to the amount of fun this group has — both at the festival and in the planning stages. In fact, not only do Cruisers not get paid for their efforts, but they actually shell out a \$10 fee to cover the cost of their shirt.

"Remember when Lorna took the guy's license at the Sock Hop and told him if he didn't come out, she'd go in and find him!" laughs Cindy as they discuss how to handle hotel guests or

passersby who want to join the Sock Hop in mid-party.

"Well he was the same one who stole my sign the year before," retorts Lorna in self-defense, overhearing the remark.

If there's one thing the Cruisers agree upon, it's that the Sock Hop is the highlight of the festival. "It's more fun to work it than to go," insists Rafferty.

The Cruisers all meet at 3 a.m. for breakfast after the progressive hotel parties and compare stories. In the past there have been tales of stranded partiers whom Cruisers had to drive home, and then there was one man who stole the "Bus is here" sign and used it to clear a table in the crowded ballroom so he and his guests could find a seat.

At the end of the week, says fellow Cruiser and vice president of the '50s Festival board, Gary Wyatt, a lot of the volunteers are exhausted. De-

spite their jovial demeanors and insistence that working the festival is fun, the Cruisers are the entire volunteer force of the festival and are instrumental in ensuring that everything runs smoothly all week.

"They're the backbone of the festival," says Festival Coordinator Rhonda Gage. "I worked for seven years for the Three Rivers Festival in Fort Wayne and they had a great group of volunteers, but not as well organized as the Cruisers."

And the group of old-timers is more than encouraging of new volunteers. "We have something special for the first timers!" booms one Cruiser passing out T-shirts to the group.

Most first timers this year, as in the past, heard about the group through

word-of-mouth.

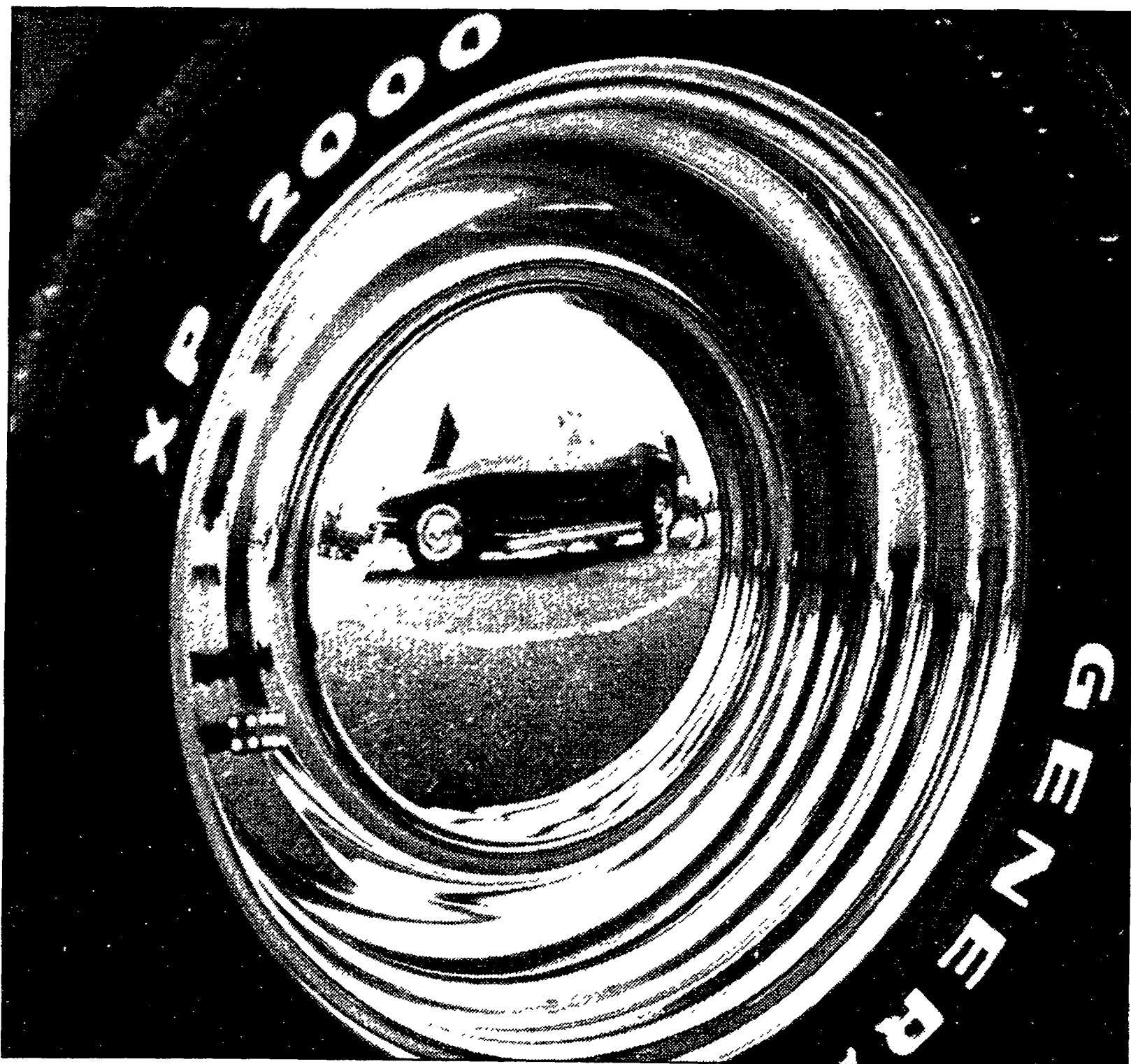
"It's kind of hard to spread the word," says Kopcinski, who herself recruited a large portion of the returning Cruisers from her bowling team six years ago.

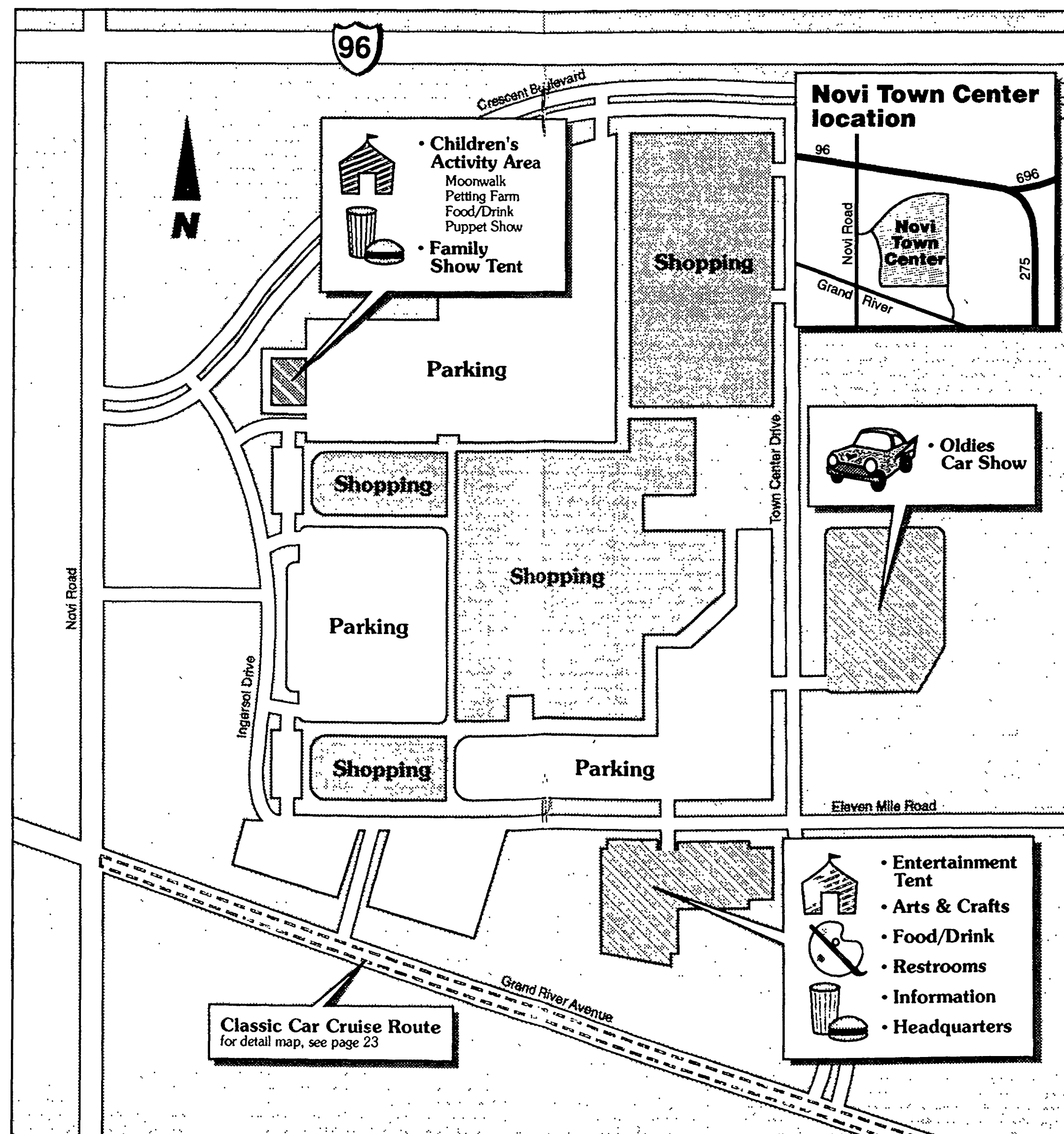

The history of Michigan rock 'n' roll

State's given contributions to rock scene

Sure, everyone knows Madonna grew up in Bay City and graduated from Rochester High School. She offended many by calling her hometown a "smelly" one.

It's also no secret that Bob Seger hails from Michigan and his "Like A Rock" hit is synonymous with Chevy truck commercials.

And we all know Ted Nugent's loincloth helped him to get his "Motor City Madman" dubbing.

Then there's the famous Motown era, which put Detroit on the map by turning out such hometown stars as Stevie Wonder, Aretha Franklin and Diana Ross.

But what about the lesser known musicians that call Michigan their home? Some have been labeled one-hit wonders while others have disappeared quietly after enjoying their success.

A little research turned up the following Michiganian rockers and crooners:

■ Iggy and the Stooges, a heavy metal band hailing from the Detroit area in the 1970s. They never achieved the success of such similar groups as KISS and Alice Cooper but did have one hit titled "I Wanna Be Your Dog."

■ MC5, dubbed a "revolutionary band" in the same heavy metal era as Iggy and the Stooges. According to Lester Bangs, who authored an article in Jim Miller's *The Rolling Stone Illustrated History of Rock & Roll*, MC5 was one of the best bands in the country but toned down just enough to allow Grand Funk Railroad, another Michigan born band, to take over in its place.

Popular hits of the MC5 included "Kick Out The Jams" in 1969 and "Back In The USA" in 1970 and "High School."

■ ? and the Mysterians. Question Mark, a.k.a. Rudy Martinez now reportedly lives north of Flint and south of his native Saginaw. The lead singer's sunglasses — and how he never took them off — were his trademark.

Hits of the group in 1966 included "96 Tears" and "I Need Somebody," and in 1967, "Can't Get Enough of You, Baby" and "Girl (You Captivate Me)."

■ Amboy Dukes, another Michigan-bred group, was dubbed as a heavy

metal garage band of the late 1960s. Probably the group's only hit was "Journey to the Center of Your Mind." But the group did produce one other contribution to rock and roll — Ted Nugent.

■ Aretha Franklin's hey-day was from 1967 to 1970 where the Detroit native came to symbolize the sounds of soul. Franklin's most popular tunes include "Respect," "A Natural Woman" and "Ain't Nothing Like the Real Thing."

Another important part of Michi-

gan's historic musical background is that of Motown. It all began in Detroit in the 1950s under the direction of Berry Gordy, whose jazz record store had gone bankrupt. He decided to write songs and record amateur singing groups, calling his company Motown Records, short for Motor Town.

It was there that the Supremes, three high school girls who had won first prize in a singing contest, and Stevie Wonder, a 13-year-old blind singer and harmonica player, were discovered. Motown has also re-

corded Michael Jackson and the Jackson Five.

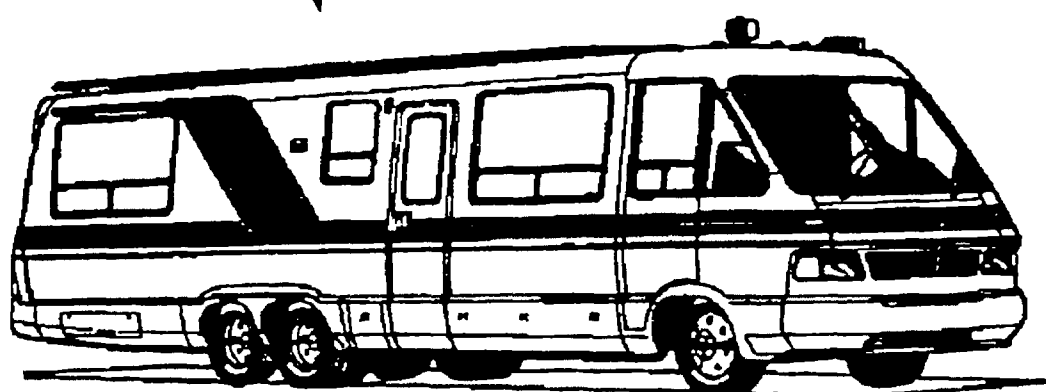
Most of Motown's talent were Detroit acts, discovered at local talent shows. Some familiar ones: Smokey Robinson's The Miracles, Four Tops, Temptations and Martha and the Vandellas.

The '50s decade was a troubled time

*"I was born in '49
A cold war kid in McCarthy time,
stop 'em at the 38th parallel
Blast those yellow reds to hell . . ."*

So sings Billy Joel in his 1990 song "Leningrad" — a ballad about the escalation of the cold war, the red scare and the nuclear fear which plagued the 1950s.

Some might call it revisionist history. After all, songwriters of the time wrote about no such grim social issues. They were more concerned with laying off those Blue Suede Shoes and doing the Twist than lamenting the twisting social and political currents in our nation.

Why would Billy Joel, who as a songwriter is often viewed as a voice of the '80s, write of events happening forty years ago? And why the focus on the politics of the decade when *American Bandstand* and *Happy Days* are what most of us recall when thinking of the era?

Many might ask David Halberstam the same thing. The prize-winning journalist has written a 700-plus-page chronicle of the decade called *The 1950s* and has staked out a place on the *New York Times* Best Sellers List for weeks.

His book calls the 1950s the preeminent decade in recent American history — one which laid the groundwork for the revolutions of the 1960s and transformed American society from a pre- to post-war culture. He claims the era was much more important politically and socially than most Americans realize and through meticulous description of the events and characters of the times he casts a new and interesting light on a time many may have discarded as devoid of the tension and excitement of the decade which followed.

Bill Burke, a political science professor at Schoolcraft College, agreed that Americans often over-simplify the '50s and that the decade deserves the recent attention its gotten. He said that at any given time in history there are often important events taking place, movements taking root, that don't become actualized until some time later.

"Often times, what's getting our attention may not be anywhere near as important as what's going on . . ." he said, also explaining that we now have a tendency to focus on the 1960s because so much of our population lived through that time and is interested in those issues.

"Unless you've lived through a decade it's not as likely to capture your attention," he explained.

Lately it seems the '50s are capturing a lot of attention — both in the areas we usually think about: rock and roll and cars, and in the issues lying below the apple-pie surface of the time.

John Chancellor once said, "Before we got to the '50s, we had lived in one kind of country. When the decade ended, we were on our way somewhere else."

Some of those transforming events include:

THE KOREAN WAR. This war's legacy is often seen as little more than the hit TV series *M*A*S*H*. But 53,000 men died in Korea, just 5,000 fewer than died in Vietnam, and in many ways, Korea was a precursor to the Vietnam War. Both were undeclared "police actions" fought against "communist aggressors" in distant Asian lands and under much different conditions than the American military was used to.

THE RED SCARE. Certainly, the freezing of relations between the Soviet Union and the United States, the two superpowers emerging in the post-war era, had a profound effect on American society of the time and on later generations. Not only did

the fear of communism lead to such phenomena as the McCarthy hearings and the ugly phenomenon known as blacklisting, but the Cold War began the arms build-up and nuclear movement which still has significant political and economic ramifications on society today.

CIVIL RIGHTS. The '60s are almost always considered the years of the black and women's movements. But the '50s laid significant groundwork for both those revolutions. Despite the existence of segregated facilities and widespread discrimination against African Americans, Eisenhower's appointment of Earl Warren as chief justice of the Supreme Court, the 1954 school desegregation decision, 1957's passage of the Voting Rights act, and the calling in of National Guard troops to enforce desegregation in Little Rock schools were all important events and precursors to what was still to come in that movement. Likewise, some women were beginning to question the traditional roles characterizing the times, especially with the 1953 publication in translation of Simone de Beauvoir's book *The Second Sex*.

Along with these issues come a myriad of other important events in the '50s, from the beginning of U.S. involvement in Vietnam to the technological impact of television and the mass production of goods and culture.

It's a wonder more songwriters aren't following Joel's lead in writing about the turbulent times — even if it did come some 40 years after the fact.

'50s softball tourney returns this year

Fifties Festival goers will have a pair of sporting events to either participate in or watch this year.

The second annual Michigan '50s Festival Softball Tournament will be held July 24-25 while a brand new event, the "Power Slam" three-on-three youth basketball tournament, will be held July 22-23. Both events will be at Novi's Power Park behind city hall on Ten Mile Road.

McNish Sporting Goods and Trophies is sponsoring the softball tournament.

Teams must pay a \$130 entry fee to play. The price includes umpires, awards, scorekeeping and softballs.

Peterson said the bulk of tournament games will be played Saturday, July 24, starting at 9 a.m. Semifinal and final games will be played the following day.

Awards for first and second place will be handed out. Tournament champs will receive sports bags while second place finishers get a jersey.

In addition, offensive and defensive most valuable players will be selected. The top slugger gets a bat and best glove man a baseball glove.

A Home Run Derby will be held in conjunction with tournament on Saturday. The derby is limited to tournament participants. For \$3 each, participants get about a dozen swings. The batter with the most dingers wins a top-notch softball bat.

For the first time, the Festival will play host to Power Slam.

The three-on-three basketball tournament will be held for children ages 10-17. Teams can consist of three or four players and registration deadline is 5 p.m., July 16.

Eatery development means festival may move

Rock and roll is here to stay.

But the site the popular Michigan '50s Festival now calls its home base may not be as permanent a fixture.

The land at the east side of Novi Town Center — with its desirable Grand River Avenue frontage — has been snapped up by the Fuddrucker's restaurant chain.

Organizers of the festival, which will not be displaced this year, are too busy at this point to look ahead to 1994, Cindy Stewart, president of the Michigan '50s Festival Committee, said recently.

That worry is on hold until August. It's not like the event lacks appeal for Novi Town Center merchandisers,

who typically welcome the fest with open arms and open cash registers.

"I don't know what we're going to do. We're going to be having meetings after this one. They (Novi Town Center) haven't told us we can't use another part of the Town Center and we're looking at the Expo Center, too," Stewart said.

"We're not going to worry about it at this moment."

Fuddrucker's, which is known for its make-your-own-hamburgers menu, may not even be built by 1994, she added.

The restaurant has already unveiled its plans at a meeting of the city's Town Center Steering Committee.

Proceeds from the event have been

used by the festival committee to install an electrical transformer at the current location, which is one of several sites set aside for restaurants by the owners, the Trammell Crow Corp. Stewart said an electrician is examining the equipment to see if it can be moved to the new location, wherever that will be.

The opposite side of the town center, which is south of Crescent Boulevard, remains a possibility, she explained. That area is already used by Novi Town Center for an annual carnival.

"The merchants do love (the '50s Festival). That's why it's not out of the question," Stewart added.

"Everything's still up in the air." In 1992, the festival's Family Entertainment Tent was set up on the

north side of the shopping center.

One thing the Michigan '50s Festival will need is plenty of room. Last year, planners estimated that at least 85,000 people attended the five-day party — a far cry from the about 10,000 1950s enthusiasts who attended the inaugural Michigan '50s Festival in 1988.

The Linder Company, which manages Novi Town Center, would like to keep the Michigan '50s Festival there. Lise Locklear, office manager for the shopping center says. Exactly where the festival could be moved within the Novi Town Center is still up in the air.

"First of all, all the people are used to it being here. We're the perfect location to have it and it attracts customers to our mall," Locklear said.

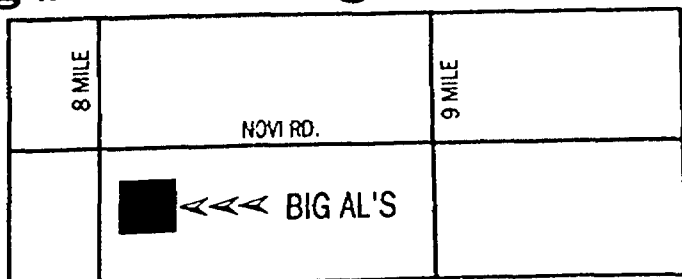

The books that shaped the '50s era

Every generation has its literary heroes.

The 1950s, an era of conformity, are remembered for the Beat Generation, the poets, writers and playwrights who rebelled against mindless conformity. They tried to shock readers and playgoers with extremes in language, theme and characterization which, by today's standards, might appear only slightly daring or offensive.

In an era that was marked by the patriotic fervor of Senate investigators and a religious revival, books were banned.

Writers like Ginsberg, Burroughs and Salinger had a notoriety that may have provoked discussion, but literary works do not usually find great success in the mass-market and theirs did not either, initially. Norman Mailer and Jack Kerouac are '50s-era writers whose reputations were built over many years.

Ironically, the era saw the birth of *Playboy* magazine and its many imitators. Many "men's magazines" and crime and adventure paperback books became more available and somewhat more acceptable.

Photoplay and *Modern Screen*, magazines for movie fans, pursued the celebrities of the day — the residents of Hollywood and TV-land (not wayward government officials). The ma-

gazines protected stars' secrets and wrote acceptable fantasy versions of their lives.

Peyton Place by Grace Metalious, scandalous when it was published, eventually became one of the first nighttime soaps when adapted for television some years later.

The decade of the 1950s was a period of peace, prosperity and promise. With the postwar economy booming, Americans were embarking on a quest for the American Dream. The period was one of great optimism and home-centered values.

The top-selling books of the decade reflect the attitudes of that generation.

American men and women had met the challenges of the war years, in battle and on the homefront. There wasn't anything that they couldn't do. There was every reason to think that the American Dream was within reach of any American who worked hard to achieve it.

Readers were spurred on by the advice of Norman Vincent Peale in *The Power of Positive Thinking*, a best-selling book of the '50s. Peale's book was billed as a practical guide to mastering the problems of everyday living.

It sold well enough to make Peale a celebrity and attract the attention of Richard Nixon who, some would say, was an example of the effects of too much positive thinking. The multi-

tude of self-help books, tapes and videos that are available today are direct descendants of this book.

The non-fiction best-seller lists of the decade were headed by books of advice, *Betty Crocker's Cookbook* (1950), *Look Younger and Live Longer* (1951), and *Arthritis and Common Sense* (1956) and books of inspiration. The Holy Bible was at the top of the list for 1952, 1953, and 1954 followed by *Gifts from the Sea* by Anne Morrow Lindbergh in 1955.

By the end of the decade the emergence of teenagers in the marketplace was confirmed by the 1959 bestselling advice book for teens, *Twist Twelve and Twenty* by Pat Boone.

On the non-fiction lists, *The Sea Around Us* by Rachel Carson was a forerunner of the environmental movement that developed two decades later. Later, Carson's *The Silent Spring* set a standard for environmental investigation and activism.

Vance Packard had a series of books that explored the ways in which the changes in media influence were changing the structure of society itself. *The Hidden Persuaders* (advertising) and *The Status Seekers* (class structure) were bestsellers that spawned a series of sociological studies.

James Baldwin was one of the few black writers to draw attention to the discrepancy between the public im-

age and the private reality of what life in America was like for minorities.

With the horrors of World War II safely behind them, Americans were willing to revisit the era in novels. Unlike the many romantic and patriotic versions of war that had been published in the '40s, Americans were buying *From Here to Eternity* by James Jones (1951) and *The Caine Mutiny* by Herman Wouk.

Despite the boom in movie production and the new programs available on television, the book-buying public was snapping up huge volumes of saga and adventure. *Kon-Tiki* by Thor Heyerdahl was one of many man-against-the-elements novels that sold well.

Many of these novels saw a second life in Hollywood and, a generation later, as made-for-TV movies. Herman Wouk was an author with a string of best sellers, *Winds of War* and *War and Remembrance*, for example. These and his novel, *Marjorie Morningstar*, which led sales in 1955, were reincarnated on film.

The end of the decade showed a growing interest in the world beyond the continental United States. *Doctor Zhivago* by Boris Pasternak (1958) and *Exodus* by Leon Uris (1959), both made into movies that enjoyed enormous popularity, let readers into the lives of Russians and Israelis caught in the turmoil of a changing world order.

MICHIGAN 50'S FESTIVAL 1993

A brief look at fashions of the 1950s

The Fabulous '50s!

The era was not just pegged jeans and poodle skirts, wide-striped button-down shirts and shirtwaist dresses. The fifties was a decade of tremendous variety in fashion design.

Bubble skirts and cartwheel hats. Trapeze dresses, bell suits, sack-backs and capri pants. A-line skirts, pencil-thin sheaths and blousey chemises. Opera coats and toreador jackets.

When wartime restrictions on fabrics and sewing materials were lifted, European couturiers turned the world of fashion design upside down. Out went the practical and durable, in came the frivolous and fun!

Dior had launched his "New Look" and Americans still looked to Paris for direction, but the growing influence of movies and television was being felt in the marketplace. Dior began the practice of announcing a new "line" every season and discovered the profitability of hemlines that rose and fell with each announcement. Only Chanel offered stability in a decade that swung wildly from the very long and slim to the short and bouffant.

The Parisian designers who previously sold their designs to others to manufacture and sell, began to produce directly for the mass market. American women no longer had to go to New York or Paris to buy the latest fashions. Local department stores had their own designer "salons." By mid-decade, led by English designers, small outlets — boutiques — could be found in major American cities. With mass communication, consumers could stay at home in small-town America and be influenced by the latest styles worn by the stars of movies and television.

The English "Teddy Boy" look of the '50s would not arrive until the British musical invasion of the '60s, but the fashion influence of rock 'n' roll, like the music, was already here to stay. The rebel look of the '50s may have been set by James Dean and Marlon Brando in films, but bands were still wearing suits and ties until the '60s. The look that dominated the fashion of the '50s generation was "cleancut," not rebellious at all.

It would take the rebellion of the next generation to bring the rebel look of the '50s to the fashion forefront.

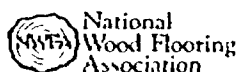

Fifties artifacts make great collectibles

Thomas Wolfe wrote that you can't go home again, but there is a way to revisit the past if you're willing to pay the price.

According to Harry Rinker, a recognized authority on antiques and collectibles, items that evoke our own past are those which have value to us as collectors. The market value is seldom the driving factor in starting a collection, it is the personal nostalgia value.

Members of the Baby Boom generation, especially those who were children in the '50s, are now at an age where many of them remember the icons of their childhood and can afford to collect them.

Boomers are collecting the toys and memorabilia of their childhood and paying record prices.

Often price is not an obstacle, availability is. The items we most remember are those we associate with our everyday lives — household items, toys, children's books, cereal box giveaways, movie theater premiums, sports equipment, and ephemera.

Ephemera describes all those perishable items like concert ticket stubs, autographs, postcards, baseball cards, posters, theater programs, movie fan magazines and product labels that people collect.

Collectibles do not have to be old or rare or in any particular condition to be valuable. A Mickey Mouse watch made in the '50s may have more value to a collector than one made recently, but to the investor in collectibles, anything made now will eventually be collectible later.

So, what is especially hot? Anything that is unique to a particular period or place or associated with a particular person who is linked to that era. Items that have not been continuously reproduced or reintroduced are likely to be in demand.

Look for products no longer made or ones made of materials that are no longer available.

The primary rule for collectors is collect what you like at a price you can afford. Unless you are willing to be a slave to your collection, and are willing to part with any of it, the market value should not affect your decisions.

The fads of the '50s

A conservative time spawned the silliness of fads

The '50s was a conservative time, therefore the perfect time for the silliness that produces fads.

In the '90s we have the promise of virtual reality, the awesome sensations of I-Max, film projected from multiple sources on a six-story screen, and convenience of hand-held televisions.

In the '50s, a more simple time, viewers were shocked by the power of 3-D images produced by wearing special glasses. At movie theaters moviegoers received cardboard eyeglasses that made monsters leap off the screen and box office profits soar.

But the fad was short-lived. No movie could be plotted that could transcend the silliness of the glasses.

One '50s fad that has made a comeback is the Hula-Hoop. A plastic hoop that the wearer spins around his waist by swaying his hips, originally sold for \$1.98. Within six months after it was introduced, over \$60 million had been paid to Wham-

O, the originator of the Hula-Hoop. Today's version sells for around \$6.

While Wham-O had yet to let fly the first Frisbee, flying objects were seen in the skies over all the United States. Perhaps it was the launch of the first space satellites or maybe the numerous science fiction shows on television, but Americans were seeing little green men and silver, saucer-shaped disks at an alarming rate. Over 600 sightings were reported, on average, per year throughout the decade.

Fashion fads included poodle hairstyles for women which featured a uniform mass of short curls. Men had the extreme options of the crew cut, a shaved look, or the swooped back ducktail haircut. Sideburns were still kept high for a conservative look.

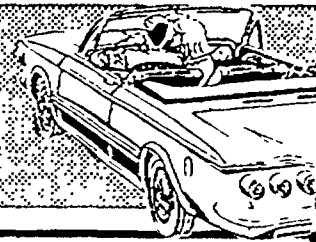
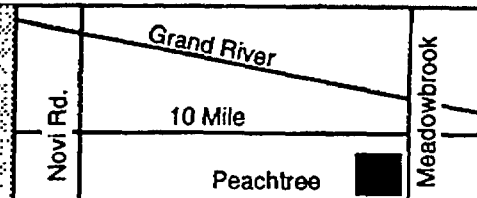
Marketing experts, a new professional class, were beginning to see an emerging market — children. One of the first television spin-off products was the coonskin cap worn by Davey Crockett of television fame. TV fads didn't always last as long as the shows did. But, the Disney people, for

example, were soon on the road that led to Mouse ears and T-shirts and millions of dollars in profits.

The '50s were a decade that was made for the *Gutness Book of World Records*. Young people, on college campuses in particular, were setting records regularly for the most bizarre and pointless activities. How many people can fit into a telephone booth? It would be hard to do today with the changes in public telephone facilities. How many guys can be stuffed into a Volkswagen Beetle? "Bugs" have all but been exterminated.

A more serious concern led to the fad of fallout shelters for the home. During the build-up of nuclear weapons and the Cold War, families began to stockpile canned goods and first aid supplies in "bombproof" shelters preparing for an anticipated nuclear war. The cinderblock structures still can be found in the backyards or basements of '50s era homes. A decade later, survivalists made similar efforts in a retreat from the perceived threats of urban life.
