



Fiscal doubts played role in contract talks

The chief negotiator for this year's Northville teachers' contract will be the first to admit the wage freeze taken by 70 percent of the teaching force reflects a time of economic uncertainty.

"The mood (among teachers) is one of understanding," Barb Le Boeuf said. "These are the economic times."

The wage concession was agreed upon by members of the Northville Education Association (NEA) in hopes of preserving education.

"Everybody is going to lose if we don't fight together," Le Boeuf said, adding that the teachers are only too happy to take the community's cue after it approved 22 63 mills in June. She said the voters wanted to maintain the quality of education Northville is known for.

"I think it's really time to band together to save education as we know it in our community. I'm not going to be around forever, but I certainly care a lot about what goes on in the school. A lot of teachers' children are being schooled here so they

obviously care what happens. Or they live here so they obviously care about what happens to property values. I don't live here, but I'll always care about Northville."

Le Boeuf was elected by the NEA membership to be the chief negotiator for this year's contract. Besides Le Boeuf, the following level representatives were chosen: Judy Higbee, elementary; Pat Keeler, middle school; Ron Meteyer, high school; and Mary Mende, special education program (representing Bryant and Old Village schools). Wayne Saunders was appointed the recorder, responsible for taking the official notes of the meetings.

Although the almost 200 hours spent in negotiations between the

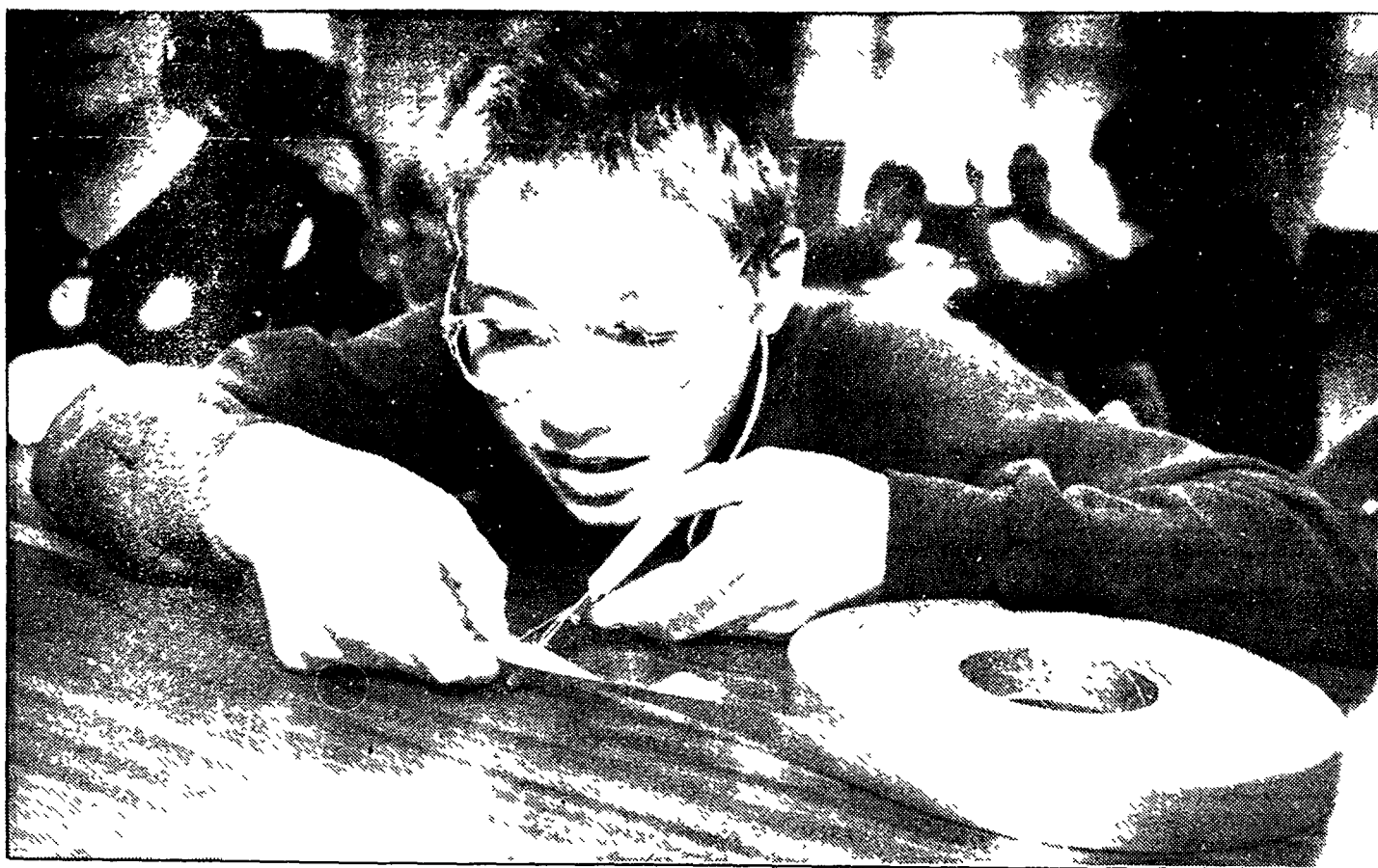

Despite wage freeze, teachers happy with pact

Just because 70 percent of Northville teachers accepted a salary freeze this year doesn't mean they walked away from the negotiating table with nothing.

"Last year we were miserable because of class sizes," said Barb Le Boeuf, chief negotiator for the Northville Education Association's two-year contract approved earlier this month. "So it's not as though we didn't get something that was very important to us."

Overall, the Northville School District will be spending about 8.1 percent more in salaries than last school year. However, \$700,000 of the \$900,000 increase in the salary budget accounts for compensation for 23.5 extra teaching positions, said John

Street, director of business and finance.

The board of education approved the positions this summer to fulfill its budget priority goal of reducing classroom sizes.

Last year, the district paid out \$11,013,000 in salaries while this year Street estimates an \$11,910,000 salary budget.

"The \$200,000 increase (minus the \$700,000 in extra teaching positions) is due to increments," Street said, referring to the seniority step scale. Not counting the salaries of the new teachers, those on the step scale will receive an average 1.81 percent increase in wages.

According to preliminary salary schedules provided by David Bolitho, assistant superintendent for administrative services, only one teacher will receive the highest wage in

crease of 8.7 percent for moving from Step one to Step two on the master's degree level of the scale. Projections were not available to figure the percentage of teachers and wage increases moving laterally across the scale (i.e. a teacher moving from the bachelor's to the master's level).

The lowest raise on the step scale would be 4.4 percent for a teacher with a bachelor's degree going from Step 10 to Step 11.

The step increments will increase from 11 to 12 steps in the 1994-95 school year with the introduction of a base step.

Northville teachers will be among few in the state accepting wage freezes. Le Boeuf said the teachers union in Ann Arbor was the only other bargaining unit accepting a wage freeze for the 1993-94 school year.

Troy teachers will take a salary standstill

for the first semester of the school year. Plymouth teachers were scheduled to get a 3-percent wage increase this year, but gave the money back. Essentially they're at a freeze also.

Comparing Northville teachers, the majority of them on the master's degree scale, to salary maximums in other Wayne County schools, the district will take a tumble in its previous ranking.

Last year, Northville ranked third, falling behind Grosse Pointe and slightly behind Livonia in the master's degree maximum salary schedule.

This year, however, the district will follow Allen Park, Dearborn, Garden City, Grosse Ile, Lincoln Park, Livonia, Redford Union, Romulus, Trenton and Westwood schools, according to Le Boeuf.

Northville ranked 31st out of the 524 school districts in Michigan based on 1992-93 average teacher salaries. Glenda Radner, an accountant in the financial management services unit for the Michigan Department of Education, said Northville teachers received an average salary of \$47,628 last year. The highest average wage was reported in the Warren Consolidated School District at \$55,396 while the lowest, at \$23,437 was reported in Burt Township, located in the upper peninsula.

Although Northville is sure to lose its spot on the state ranking, data for average wages for districts in the 1993-94 school year won't be collected until 120 days after the school districts' fiscal year ends. Annual fiscal reports are usually announced by school districts in November.

Another road block in paving project

A building standing in the existing right of way on Gerald Avenue may be the speed bump in the way of progress towards paving that road.

Northville Township Engineer Abe Muntah of Ayers, Lewis Norris & May said a manufacturing facility at Seven Mile and Gerald Avenue that was constructed years ago was built two

and a half feet into the existing right of way. Today, the encroachment is stalling progress on the project as engineers and property owners struggle to find some way to pave around the building.

"The project is really moving a lot slower than we hoped for," said Township Engineer Abe Muntah. "There is a building on the northwest corner of the Seven Mile and Gerald Avenue is fixed right into the right of

way."

Muntah said he learned of the overhang after he performed field studies in the area and after he had already asked each of the 32 property owners to donate five feet of right of way on either side of the street to make up a 10-foot shortfall.

In its present state, Gerald Avenue is 50 feet wide and is owned by the

Bill groups racetrack revenues in with funding for Silverdome

Race track cities like Northville and Livonia are in danger of losing their state aid because it's being dragged down by the Pontiac Silverdome.

The temporary winner is State Rep. Charlie Harrison, D-Pontiac. He persuaded a legislative budget committee last week to lump \$800,000 in Silverdome aid, which Gov. John Engler would like to veto, with \$450,000 each for Livonia, Northville and Hazel Park and lesser amounts for outstate cities with horse racing.

"They're setting it up so the governor will veto the whole thing," said Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Redford, whose

district includes Ladbroke DRC track in Livonia. "Last year Engler vetoed the Silverdome money."

"That money belongs to the race tracks," said Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, whose district includes Northville Downs. "They're all afraid of Harrison. It's typical dirty politics. They're not doing the right thing."

Under the Michigan Constitution, every appropriation must be a single line item. The governor may veto line items.

Harrison, who is running for mayor of Pontiac in November, wants to lump money for several cities into a single line item, hoping Engler will feel forced to sign it. The House and Senate are likely to act this week.

Bankes and Vorva fear Engler will veto the lumpy line item anyway.

"I'm preparing a one line supplemental appropriations bill with the race track money," Bankes said. But still she shook her head at the prospect of getting it passed. Engler and other lawmakers want to discontinue the 1980s practice of passing "supplementals" — money bills that come after the general fund budget has supposedly been engraved in granite.

Cities with horse racing tracks get special aid because they incur costs for police, fire protection and traffic control while the tracks generate millions in revenue for the state. The theory is that the race tracks — with a grandstand, barns and a parking lot — generate too little local property tax revenue. Former Livonia Mayor

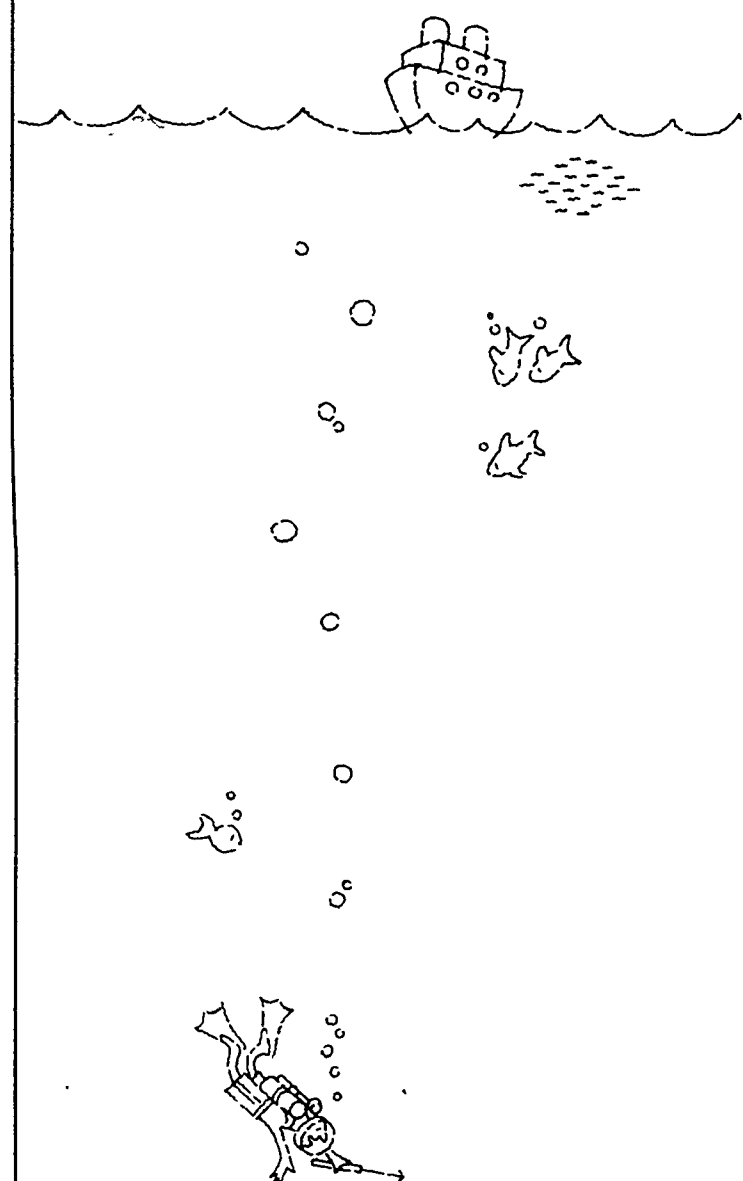

Hawthorn patient trashes room, strikes staffer

Michigan State Police from the Northville post took a report on Sept. 24 of an assault at the Hawthorn Center, 18471 Haggerty Road in Northville. The incident occurred on Sept. 17 at 10 a.m. A 17-year-old patient, who has lived at the center for several years, and is diagnosed as paranoid-schizophrenic and mildly mentally impaired, made a mess of a day room. When asked to clean the mess by a staff member, the patient refused and tried to leave the room. The staff member, an Ecorse woman, attempted to block the patient's exit. The patient took a swing at the woman, injuring the staffer's elbow. The patient refused to talk to investigators. No prosecution is being sought, but the report was taken for the center's records.

WALKAWAY: Northville Regional Hospital reported a patient as a walk-

away last Sunday night. The patient, a 37-year-old Redford woman, went home on a weekend pass, and did not return. Michigan State Police who took the report said the woman is not considered dangerous, and remains at large.

COMMOTION AT WINNER'S CIRCLE: City police responded to complaints of a commotion at the Winner's Circle rooming house at 111-113 W. Main St. just after 2 a.m. Sept. 25. They found a loud, intoxicated 32-year-old female resident. The woman was with her daughter, and a niece and nephew who were upset at the incident and wanted to leave.

Her sister was called and came to remove the children while the woman was advised to sober up and seek help when she did.

CHILD NEGLECT REPORTED: City police responded to a Sept. 25 report of child neglect at Tree Top Apartments, 987 Novn Road, and found a 6-year-old boy who had been left alone in his apartment. The boy had become frightened when he woke from a nap at 3 p.m. and realized he was all alone, and left the apartment to bang on a neighbor's door.

His mother returned with her 9-year-old son at 4:30 p.m. and told police she had gone shopping and left the 6-year-old because he did not want to wake up. She said they could not afford a babysitter. Their father was at work at the time.

Though the apartment was reportedly "very cluttered and disorganized," the children appeared to be in very good health and showed no signs of abuse.

Police notified Oakland Child Protective Services about the incident and turned the case over to the state's Department of Social Services. It was the second time city police had investigated a child neglect report concerning the family in recent weeks.

CURFEW VIOLATION REPORTED: City police caught five local youths violating the city curfew at 1:20 a.m. Sept. 25. The boys were seen coming out of the wooded area near the Northville High School football field on Eight Mile, and when they spotted the city patrol car they ran back into the woods. Two were picked up on Eight Mile and the other three at Cooke Middle School.

The boys, from Northville and Novi and between 13-14 years old, were taken to the station and turned over

to their parents.

RUNAWAY TEEN RECOVERED: City police recovered a 15-year-old Northville girl Sept. 26 who had failed to come home from work the night before. Her parents asked police to accompany them to the Sundowner Restaurant that evening, after they heard she was there. When they arrived, the girl was gone but they heard she had been seen at the Winner's Circle rooming house. Police found the girl in one of the upstairs rooms, and turned her over to township police.

SMOKE AT KITCHEN WITCH: City police and fire units responded to a Sept. 28 report of smoke at the Kitchen Witch, 118 E. Main St., just before noon. They found a burnt-out ballast in a fluorescent light.

LAWN JOB: Someone tore a 15-foot tire track into the front lawn of an Elmsmere home sometime between 10 p.m. Sept. 25 and 9:30 a.m. Sept. 26. Damage was estimated at \$50.

FENDER BENDER: A 16-year old Northville boy turning left onto Horton from Rayson the night of Sept. 25 lost control of his car and struck the curb and guardrail. He was cited for driving too fast for conditions, and his car had to be towed.

Fund-raiser chairman seeks non-profit groups to support

Northville businessman Brad Heureux has a great new fund-raising opportunity for local non-profit organizations.

He just can't understand why so few non-profits have signed on.

Heureux, owner of Bradley Advertising, boasts a new title these days as director of marketing and sales of Giftnet, Inc. Giftnet is a phone program that saves subscribers money on long-distance calls and donates 10 percent of their bills to the charity of their choice, provided that the charity has registered with Giftnet and agreed to accept the donations.

The program is a joint venture by veteran Detroit-area volunteer Josephine Kessler and entrepreneur Richard Kughn, former Chief Executive Officer for The Taubman Co. and current owner of Lionel Trains. The phone service is owned by Kughn and offered through the LogiCall network

of Communique Telecommunications, one of America's fastest growing privately-held companies.

At the heart of the Giftnet system is a computer that constantly scans the rates of five major long-distance carriers—AT&T, MCI, US Sprint, All net and IT&T—and routes callers through the least expensive carrier each time they place a call. The result is up to 30-percent savings over average rates charged by major long distance carriers and local phone companies.

"It offers corporate rates, really, and corporate savings to individuals who want to support a charity," Heureux said. "Our slogan is you save and give at the same time."

To date, only one local charity had signed on for the program—Northville Youth Assistance. Since the program just recently started up, NYA should start to receive its donations soon, Heureux said.

NYA is one of about four charities overall that have signed up for the

program, he said.

Heureux attributed the reluctance of other non profits to sign up on suspicion about the program, though nothing is required from them other than their agreement to accept the donations.

"I'd love supporters to sign up but I'm trying to get charities interested," he said. "In order to get people to be able to use this, we've got to get the charity's approval."

Part of Giftnet's problem may be that it is purposefully taking a low-key approach to advertising.

"One way to save money is by not advertising," Heureux said, noting that AT & T spends millions of dollars a year on advertising, and the cost has to be reflected in its subscribers' bills.

In Giftnet's case, the charities that join with Giftnet send letters to their patrons noting that they have joined and suggesting the patrons sign on.

NYA Director Mary Ellen King sent letters to many of her donors noting

that the program had joined, and about 25 donors signed on and indicated NYA as the charity where they would like to see their donations sent.





Board of ed piggybacks subcommittee, board meetings Monday night

In keeping with its recent decision to schedule sub-committee meetings on Monday nights, Northville Board of Education members will have their hands full this Monday.

Three meetings have been scheduled for the evening.

Both the facility and curriculum subcommittees will meet at 6:45 p.m. The facility subcommittee meeting will be held in the board conference room, located on the third floor of the central office building. Agenda items will include:

- The conclusion of a staff development program
- A review of the 1993 office of instruction budget
- An analysis of the 1993 supplemental budget (\$124,000)
- The 1993-94 schedule of meetings.

The facility subcommittee meeting will take place in the superintendent's office, also located on the

third floor of the central office building.

Subcommittee members are expected to discuss a property transfer with Novi Community Schools. Novi officials agreed to transfer property located within Mystic Forest, a subdivision located on Taft Road between Nine Mile and Ten Mile roads, to Northville Public Schools at a Sept. 23 board of education meeting. With the school boundary lines, it ended up with only 25 percent of the subdivision being located within the confines of the Novi school district.

In order to avoid neighbors attending different schools, Novi officials thought it would be better to transfer the property to Northville schools.

The transfer will have to be approved by both the Oakland and Wayne intermediate school district agencies as well.

At 7:30 p.m. the full board is expected to join the facility subcommittee in welcoming members of the new future facilities usage citizen committee in the board conference room.

Legislators need to clear the air

As the public spotlight glares on school finance, nervous business and highway leaders are asking that legislators pay a little attention to clean air standards.

"Michigan must have a Clean Air Implementation plan to USEPA (U.S. Environmental Protection Agency) by Nov. 15 or face sanctions," warned the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

Their plan has been in trouble, attacked by service station dealers and wary lawmakers in the region's outlying areas. The state House soon may act on House Bill 4165, a bill intended to bring Michigan into compliance with the revised 1990 federal Clean Air Act.

Goal: to reduce emissions 15 percent from 1990 levels by 1996. Tools:

- Require motorists in seven counties to have their vehicles checked to reduce emissions. Currently only

Wayne, Oakland and Macomb vehicle owners must have \$10 AETs (auto emissions tests). The new bill would extend AETs to Livingston, Washtenaw, Monroe and St. Clair counties in southeast Michigan and to Kent, Ottawa and Muskegon counties in western Michigan.

- Require a \$30 test every two years.

■ Set up more centralized testing stations, a concept which bothers neighborhood service stations. They picture drivers traveling long distances and waiting in interminable lines for tests. Retired U.S. Sen. Barry Goldwater, 84, was quoted as fuming at having to wait an hour and 15 minutes in 115-degree heat to have his car tested under Arizona law.

SEMOG admits there is some question whether the EPA will change Michigan's designation to "attainment" from its current "non-attainment" of federal air standards.

But the seven-county regional planning agency argues that "the po-

tential redesignation does not eliminate the need for legislative action" on House Bill 4165.

Reasons: Re-designation may not occur; the bill allows the enhanced testing plan to be scrapped if Michigan air is OK; and the state must have a testing plan in place as a contingency.

Supporting the enhanced testing program are the Big Three automakers, Michigan Manufacturers Association, Michigan Chemical Council, state chamber of commerce, utilities and environmental clubs.

Bad things can happen, said SEMCOG, if the EPA continues to say Michigan has dirty air and hasn't moved to clean it up. The federal government can withhold transportation aid; it can put a lid on factory emissions permits, and thus stifle industry; and it can impose its own program on Michigan drivers.

Some Democratic lawmakers argue that socking motorists \$30 isn't the only way to clean air. They

say industrial smokestacks are part of the problem and should be part of the solution.

Meanwhile, Japan's new government is preparing to ease its stiff regulations on vehicles. *The New York Times* reported Sept. 12 — regulations that are seen as a boon to new car sales.

"Japan's 83,000 garages obtain 44 percent of their roughly \$60 billion in annual revenues as a result of mandatory inspections," the *Times* reported. "Automobile companies benefit because people replace their cars frequently."

Japanese consumers see car makers and maintenance shops as the chief beneficiaries — not people's lungs.

Moreover, Japanese law requires owners to have repairs made prior to inspection. This gives garages an incentive to "change everything, even if there is nothing wrong with the car," said a Japanese consumer advocate.

Senate package tackles leaky underground storage tanks

Taxpayers, through their legislators, must decide how badly they want to clean up leaking underground storage tanks.

"The costs of the program are pretty tremendous," said House Conservation Committee co-chair Tom Alley, D-Branch, after hearing governmental, industrial and environmental groups argue for 90 minutes. "A lot of groups are saying, 'We need some more money.' I don't know where you're going to get it."

"The dilemma is: Will funding be adequate?" said James Hill, a member of the state Natural Resources Commission, the appointive group which oversees the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). "Put a money figure behind the program, and either fund it or scale back the responsibilities."

The Sierra Club opposes the DNR cleanup standard proposals that are currently before the subcommittee, added Alison Horton, spokesman for the politically active naturalists. The Sierra Club wants the DNR to require double walls for underground storage tanks and other relatively costly steps to protect land and groundwater from leaks.

Here's the crux of the argument. The DNR's proposal shifts emphasis from protecting resources to human exposure control. As Skip Pruss, an assistant attorney general put it, "DNR prefers cleanups that don't clean up groundwater. It just wants to protect the public from exposure . . . The goal is to make cleanups cheaper."

Pruss said his department, "a co-

trustee of our natural resources" with the DNR, is concerned about the constitutionality of the DNR's proposed rules and their conflict with other laws.

Commented Alley: "The DNR wants to contain, and the attorney general wants to take it all out."

Michigan service stations and business users have some 40,000 "active" underground storage tanks, mostly for petroleum products, said Lt. Arthur Nash of the State Police fire marshal division. About 10,000 are relatively new, and 1,600 have double walls.

"The average cost increase of a double-walled tank is \$32,000 to \$35,000. Some 30,000 tanks need to be removed or upgraded by 1998. It will be a great cost to owners — substantial cost to smaller dealers and 'mom and pop' operations. We don't want to discourage people from upgrading tanks," Nash said.

Nash was cool to requiring double-walled tanks statewide. He said they can be pierced by stakes driven into the ground and thus aren't totally safe.

Trying to steer a middle course was Bill Rustem of the Michigan Economic and Environmental Roundtable, a group of industrial, union and environmental interests formed in 1992.

"The state's environment and economy are inextricably linked and must therefore be considered together if successful strategies for continued development and environmental quality to emerge," said Rustem.

Top principle, he said, is redeveloping urban land rather than developing greenfields. A general critic-

ism of Michigan's current "polluters pay" law is that it leads developers to seek new sites and abandon older cities where cleanups may be necessary.

The roundtable includes business interests such as Consumers Power, Farm Bureau, Dow Chemical, AAA Michigan, and chambers of commerce, unions such as the AFL-CIO federation and Steelworkers; and environmental groups such as Michigan United Conservation Clubs and Michigan Environmental Council — but not Sierra.

Meanwhile, lawmakers are trying to iron out differences in a package of bills to fund the cleanup of leaking underground storage tanks (LUSTs).

Gov. John Engler's budget director said last fall that the current fund, based on a tax of 0.875 cents a gallon on petroleum products, will be \$350 million in the red by 1995.

Lawmakers are working to update a 1984 law requiring registration of underground storage tanks by setting up a state authority to deal with cleanups.

The Senate version of the bills visualizes more "Type C" cleanups — which assumes the property will never be used for residences and future uses must be controlled.

In Type A cleanups, all contaminants are removed so that the land is cleaner than "background" (naturally occurring contamination). Type B cleanups make the land safe for residential use.

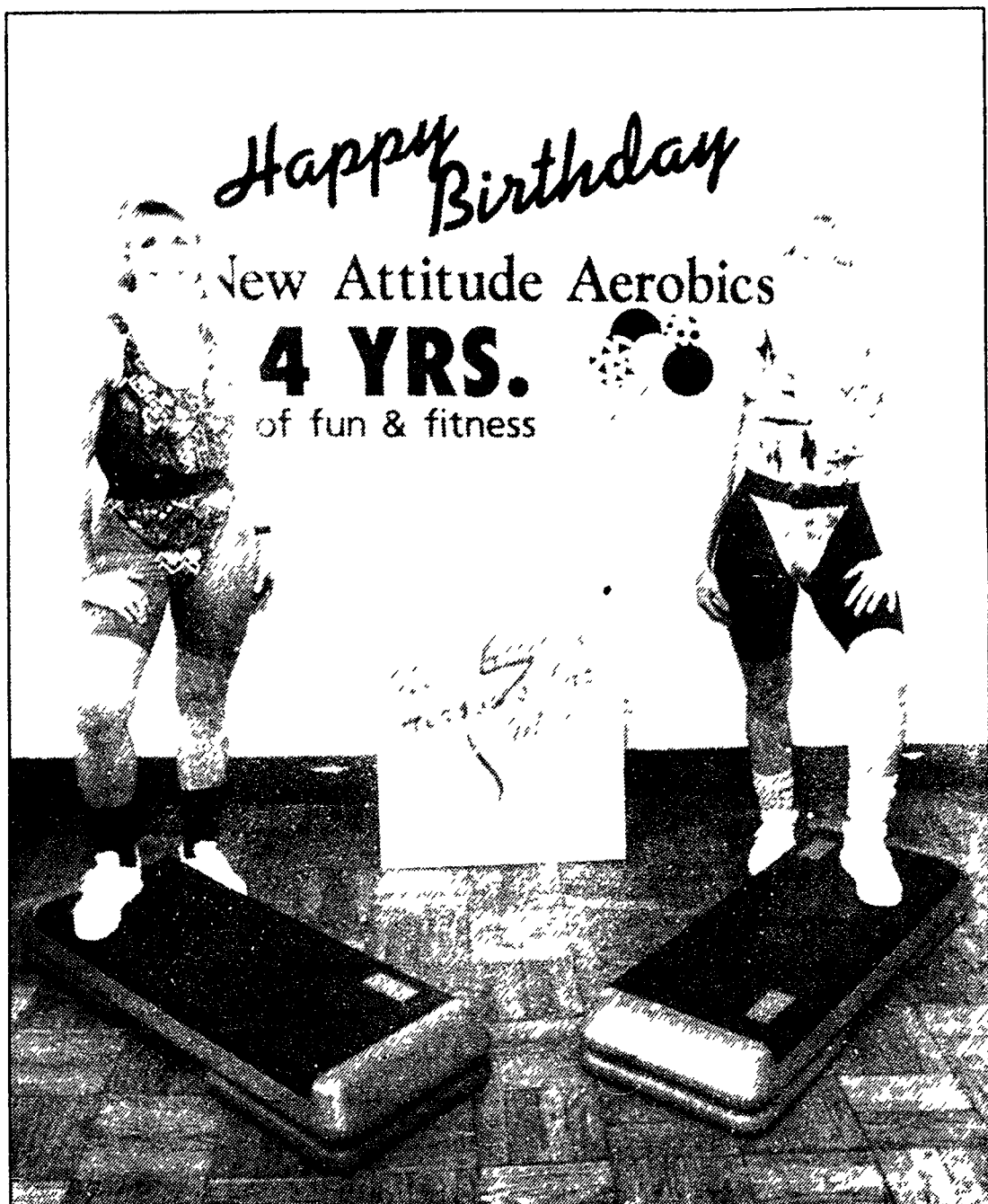

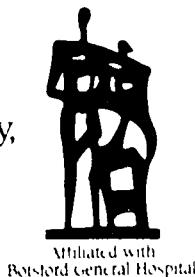

School personnel rally around education system

Teachers, administrators, trustees and students stoutly defended local public schools when a state House Democratic task force held a town hall meeting in Wayne.

They warned lawmakers against expecting big money savings in any school reform proposal coming out of the State Capitol. The idea of extending Michigan's traditional school year from 180 days to a Japanese style 240 days was panned by Dennis Kubas, a Michigan Education Association representative who lives in Novi and teaches in Woodhaven.

Kubas said, "180 days are adequate. But we will follow the legislative mandate if we are given the resources."

Kubas said educators favor teaching "critical thinking, problem solving and communication — free of cultural, racial and gender bias."

"It's not acceptable to fund education with fewer dollars," said Emmett Holmes, a Livonia resident representing the Michigan PTA Council. "The overall tax burden can't be reduced."

Eighteen of 20 speakers in Wayne Memorial High Monday evening directly represented school communities. Many lashed out against talk of a "voucher" plan, a constitutional

amendment that would allow state aid to go to private and church related schools.

Walter Warren, Westland member of the Taxpayers Union, inserted one note of dissent: "Just do it cheaper. Good luck."

Many criticized Gov. John Engler and the bipartisan group of legislators who in July repealed the \$6.3 billion of local property taxes that provide 65 percent of public school funding without having replacement taxes in place. Lawmakers have until Dec. 31 to find replacement funding.

"The Legislature and governor put the cart before the horse," added Bill Teevens, a Westland resident.

Wayne-Westland school board member Laurel Raisanen faulted the local property tax system, blistering "millage elections that turn into hate campaigns against public education."

Raisanen raised some Democratic hackles with criticism of "union hostility . . . growth of employee salaries beyond the rate of inflation . . . contracts the districts can't afford . . . a tenure law that protects bad teachers," and union opposition to merit pay plans.

The only idea for a new program came from Kathleen Chorbogian, member of the Wayne County Intermediate board: "Parents need to be taught how to be parents." She advocated

20 hours of parental instruction when children enter kindergarten and five hours per year afterwards.

Democratic task force chair William Keith of Garden City made it clear, in a pamphlet and videotape presented to the audience, that the Democratic agenda includes support only of public schools, equitable funding, local control and job preparation — no vouchers or major tax cuts. The Wayne hearing was one of 17 held simultaneously across the state. It was chaired by Rep. Justine Barns, D-Westland.

Bud Winters, Wayne Westland board president and a former principal, deplored "bashing" of education. "How can public education be held responsible for all social ills — crime, violence, social diseases, etc.?"

"It's not education's fault that industry ignored quality in the 1970s," added Larry Thomas, Wayne-Westland superintendent. "Schools are not the cause of problems but are the place where they become evident."

Memorial High School senior Kelly Chorbogian said that she already has seen evidence that schools are being short-changed when she had to pay \$167 for marching band, had to pay \$167 for cheerleading and had to drop orchestra after eight years. "When and where is it going to stop?"

We can't throw away education to save a few dollars," she said.

"Good education can't be bought on the cheap," said Memorial math teacher Walter C. Hunt, a 31 year veteran. The U.S. economy can't absorb all the graduating scientists, the U.S. has a top high school completion rate, test scores are improving, but state funding of schools has fallen from 70 percent to 40 percent of the total. "We spend 30 percent less than Japan," Hunt said.

Hunt said Republican presidents have advocated vouchers, "but private school teachers are no better than ours, and private schools don't have the equipment."

"Private institutions don't take children like my son," added Denise Thomas, a school bus driver from Inkster with a son in special education. "There's no place for him but in public education."

Agreed task force member James Kosteva, a former state representative from Canton who now directs House Democratic research. "Throughout Michigan, we do our best job in special education."

"Our (job) placement rate is 93 percent," said Diane Kennedy, vocational director of Lincoln Park schools. The Westland resident, who chairs the Wayne County vocational planning committee, said the group's mission is that "all students have ac-

cess to career technical education."

The building trades program at John Glenn High in Westland was warmly praised by Beatrice Gwydalk, a mother. She lauded the state for eliminating the property tax as the chief source of school funding because "When your back is against the wall, that's when you do something creative."

Defending public schools' claim on state taxes, Rick Hamrick asked lawmakers to remember the "fixed costs, job training technology, trained instructors and community good will" at 56 public school vocational centers across the state. The Westland resident is assistant principal of the William D. Ford Vocational-Technical Center.

Hamrick praised Ford and DuPont, among other industrial firms, for giving students plant tours, allowing them to do "job shadowing," serving on advisory committees and providing co-op programs.

The only confessed Republican to speak, Paul Reznick, a graphic artist who works in Troy, said there's "too much complaining and whining about public education." Reznick, who serves on a vocational advisory committee, said, "Business doesn't think with their brains. They think with their wallets."

Reznick criticized Wayne-Westland schools, which he at-

tended, for broadcasting athletic accomplishments in student announcements but neglecting the prizes won by students in filmmaking and culinary arts.

This brought a retort from Jake Henry, a John Glenn athlete. "Don't overlook extracurricular activities, including athletics," Henry credited athletics for teaching "responsibility, hard work, teamwork and leadership."

Jane Kuckel, assistant superintendent for instruction in Wayne Westland, cautioned lawmakers against mandating any more curriculum material. "We can't do an excellent job with everything, every day, with fewer resources" if schools must teach environmentalism, cultural awareness, foreign languages, portfolio preparation, the work ethic, AIDS and self-concepts in addition to the three R's.

She was supported by sixth grade teacher Don Halley of Wayne, who said "teaching time is diluted" by sex and drug education. He called pulling pupils out of academic classes for music "very, very disruptive. Scheduling changes need to be made."

Lynn Ehrle, retired Plymouth Canton teacher, said property taxes should be replaced with a graduated income tax, graduated single business tax, higher use taxes on hotels and higher taxes on restaurant food. He called Michigan's 4 percent sales-use tax on food and lodging too low in comparison to other states.

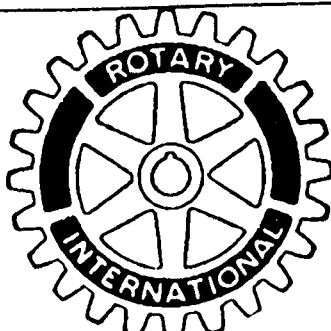

Citizen committee to meet Monday

Northville school officials are chomping at the bit, eager to get going on establishing a future facilities use committee.

"We need to get started right away," Glenna Davis, chairperson of the Northville Board of Education's facility subcommittee said at Monday night's board meeting.

Any resident of the school district interested in serving on the committee is welcome to attend a meeting scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday in the board conference room, located next to the superintendent's office in the central office building.

The charge to the committee will be:

- Review current building usage, size and location to develop optimal building capacities.
- Determine demographic trends and future school building needs.

● Examine future building usage and future grade level alignment to ensure that usage is consistent with the district's strategic plan.

● Develop a five-year, cost effective plan which includes consideration of: 1) financial implications of the committee's recommendations, 2) transportation costs, 3) bond election for possible school construction and 4) general fund expense for opening and operating new buildings.

Committee members will be expected to address the above items by maintaining or improving the current quality of programming and by assuming funding for 1994-95 will be similar to this school year's.

"We don't want to design a future program that decreases our quality," Davis said.

Davis added that the committee needs a geographical balance to represent the entire community. Those with only a special interest in mind aren't welcome.

"We want people that are concerned about the future, the next five years for all kids in Northville," Davis said.

The subcommittee suggested a five-year plan because just one year would not be far enough in the future.

"Unless you shoot for something in the future, you're not going to meet the needs of the students," Davis explained.

The committee will be expected to make recommendations to the board by mid December. The board will then schedule an attendance boundary hearing, tentatively scheduled for mid January before deciding on boundaries in early February.

Davis said she envisions the committee setting up subcommittees to address the charges while the board and administration will serve only as liaison and resource people.

"If people are intimidated by the scope of this charge, they shouldn't

with Dave's (Bolitho) office already having the facts and numbers together," Davis said. "The administration and board will only serve as resources to the people. We're not going to throw you aside."

Trustee Joseph Dunkerley said judging by the work he witnessed while serving on Strategy II of the district's strategic plan, the board will more than likely be quite impressed with the results of the committee. The goal of Strategy II was to develop and implement facility plans to meet enrollment increases and aging physical plants.

"I know our community is quite knowledgeable," he said.

tensive, delaying the actual agenda items of the board by over an hour from the start of the meeting.

"We need to keep people waiting the least amount of time," Wadsworth said.

Vice president Jean Hansen agreed, saying the board needed to set up some sort of time limit.

Superintendent Leonard Reznierski suggested the board allow 30 minutes for presentations, which would put the board back into session at 8:20 or 8:25 p.m.

The first 15 minutes of the meetings, which begin at 7:30 p.m., would include the call to order, pledge of allegiance and superintendent's report.

David Bolitho, assistant superintendent for administrative services, said the new time requirement would give building principals something "to shoot for" when planning the board presentation.

Other streamlining measures agreed upon by the board will include:

- Board members will arrive 30 minutes prior to the on-site meetings to tour the buildings and meet with parents and residents.

"That way we'll be available to the community to discuss issues before and after the meeting," board president Robert McMahon said.

● The board will also try to use the videotaping of the board meetings. Volunteers from Advocates for Quality Education will tape the first board meeting of the month for airing on cable television.

"We need to use more visuals, more overheads," Hansen said.

"We need to play to the camera, make our presentations to the camera," added treasurer Richard Brown.

Trustee Joseph Dunkerley suggested the board rearrange itself so the lighting would be better for the camera.

"And we need to be more careful about using our microphones," Hansen said.

Hansen also suggested the board continue to answer phone calls from residents an hour prior to the first

board meeting of the month.

● The board then began discussing communications received and how they should be presented at board meetings. Some board members felt letters addressed to any board member should be mentioned during the communications portion of the meetings. Others, however, felt those letters sent to a lone board member at his or her home address should not be for public consumption.

Dunkerley asked Reznierski to pose the question to the school's at-

torney for further advice.

● Regarding mail, Wadsworth suggested all letters received by the board or administration be answered.

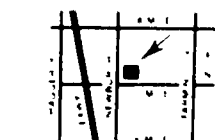

Educational reform still steers legislative agenda

Three months after the Michigan Legislature repealed local property taxes as a source of funding public schools, the issue of reforming education is coming to a head.

■ This month, House Democrats conducted 13 simultaneous public hearings around the state, taking public input on how best to raise replacement funds for public education.

■ Gov. John Engler will address a joint session of the Legislature at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 5, on his tax and reform proposals.

Engler is expected to ask for

"schools of choice" within public schools, competitive bidding on school district health insurance, speedier teacher tenure hearings, and a tax program to replace some of the \$6 billion in lost property tax revenues.

Whether Engler will agree to an income tax as partial replacement is unknown. So far the governor has said he won't.

Ever since the Legislature in July suddenly repealed the source of 65 percent of public schools' funding — "we cut the Gordian knot," in Engler's words — leaders of both parties have been floating tax and reform ideas. Everyone's goal: "a world-class

education."

Rep. William Keith, D-Garden City, said parents in particular were heard at the Democrats' hearings. "Over the last several weeks, the task force has traveled around the state hearing from educators, business people and school administrators. Now we want parents to tell us what is on their minds," said the veteran chair of the House Education Committee.

"The U.S. education system is miles behind foreign countries," Albert Shanker, president of the American Federation of Teachers, told Keith's task force recently.

Shanker called for better paid and

better trained teachers, higher standards, a more defined curriculum, more relevant textbooks and better methods of assessing students.

Rep. Lyn Jondahl, D-Okemos, listed revenues from 14 existing taxes that might be increased to make up the \$6 billion loss in local property tax revenue. Jondahl, an announced gubernatorial candidate, had voted against the property tax cut, arguing that the state constitution permitted only a \$3.8 billion increase in state replacement taxes. On his list:

■ Sales and use tax — \$927 million per 1 percent; voters would have to amend the constitution. The rate has

been 4 percent since the 1960s.

■ Personal income tax — \$1.18 billion per 1 percent. It's now 4.4 percent.

■ Single business tax — \$806 million per 1 percent. It's now 2.35 percent.

■ Cigarette tax — \$8 million per penny.

■ Liquor tax — \$5 million per 1 percent.

Meanwhile, Sen. Jack Welborn, R-Kalamazoo, applauded a state insurance commissioner's investigation into the activities of the Michigan Education Special Services Association (MESSA), an arm of the MEA which acts as a third-party admini-

strator of health insurance.

MEA union contracts designate that school districts must deal with MESSA. Engler's program likely will call for mandatory competitive bidding rather than direct dealings with MESSA.

"I am concerned about possible collusion, violation of insurance laws, anti-trust laws, and conflict of interest," Welborn said last May when he called for the investigation of MESSA. He argued that school districts pay \$1,000 more per employee to buy through MESSA than if they bought identical coverage from Blue Cross/Blue Shield.

Lawmaker's plan would tie track money to 'Dome

Ed McNamara used to say he would like the DRC property re-developed for industry.

The race track cities used to get up to \$900,000 each in state aid each year. Their current allotment — if they get it — would be half that. In Northville, the \$900,000 had come to represent about 25 percent of the city's total revenue. Past cuts in the allocations helped cause a million-dollar deficit that the city still is paying off, and forced city officials to write the aid out of future budgets.

Key lawmakers also are glaring at the race track aid.

"This is an industry in decline," said Rep. Bill Bobier, a Republican farmer from Manistee County. Bobier is a co-chair of the Appropriations subcommittee on the agriculture budget, which covers horse racing. "There is a de-emphasis on horses in agriculture and a decline in 4-H fairs."

"The basic security of the track could fall on track owners. It's not mandated in law that cities do it," Bobier said.

Sen. Jack Welborn, R-Kalamazoo, targeted the agriculture budget "pork barrel" for slashing to provide more money for schools. He accused Harrison of "holding hostage" the entire

agriculture budget to keep in his Silverdome subsidy.

Horse racing generated \$21 million in state revenue last year — \$19 million in wagering taxes, the rest from uncashed tickets, fines and license fees. The cost of running the racing commissioner's office is \$2.8 million.

Welborn also wants to kill the \$6 million the state spends on prizes for races and aid to cities with tracks. "If the public safety costs to cities with racetracks is outweighing the benefits they get from horse-race tourism, then perhaps these cities should get out of the gambling business," he said in a series of position papers.

"Some of that money is needed for regulation of the industry, but about \$15 million is spent on horse and racetrack promotion. It would be better spent on K-12 education."

"I am willing to accept the criticism that comes from those who have become dependent on government grants. It is a small enough price to pay for the education of our kids," Welborn said.

The 1950s were horse racing's glory days in Michigan.

Ladbroke DRC, where thoroughbreds run, saw its peak attendance of 29,570 on Memorial Day in 1952; Northville Downs' record was 9,610 in May of 1950; Hazel Park lured

28,726 on Memorial Day 1965, according to state records.

Ladbroke DRC's wagering last year was \$149 million, up 4.8 percent from 1991; attendance was up 4.4 percent.

But the standardbred tracks, which feature harness racing, saw only a .12 percent increase in wagering, to \$227 million, and a 2.7 percent decline in attendance during 1992. In Northville, the average daily attendance dropped an alarming 6.6 percent between 1991 and 1992.

Newsletter editor Bill Ballenger, who was racing commissioner until

1983, recommended increased state promotion of horse racing, arguing it was a better payoff (in the 80 percent range) for bettors than the state lottery (45 percent).

Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, a member of the budget committee, deplored the fact that Michigan is considering casino gambling while horse racing declines. She was the only member of the panel to oppose the agriculture bill.

Road plan is stalled once again

township. Before it is paved and improved, the street needs to be widened to meet the 60 ft. road width restriction of Wayne County, Munfah said.

"We have only 50 feet of right-of-way now to build the road," he said. "But we need 60 feet to meet the county's standards."

So it appears property owners or at least one in particular may have to donate more than five feet to get the road paved.

"We know for a fact we need more than five feet," Munfah said. "Because it is almost impossible to move the building."

Munfah said there are several alternatives the township is exploring to resolve the encroachment problem. He said he hoped to have at least two or three firm alternatives to present to the township by the middle of next week.

"That could be anything from acquiring more land or realigning the street to go around the building," he said. "I think by next week me and my staff are going to have enough alternatives so we can be ready to go with the project," he said.

Township Manager Bill Richards has been working with Munfah to find a solution to the problem.

"We need 60 feet of right-of-way to meet the County's requirement for the new road which we intend to take over after it is paved," Richards said. "What we really need is more land on the east side."

The manager said they are exploring every option available. Richards said no decision has been made, forcing the cancellation of a second public hearing on the issue tonight. It will, he said, be rescheduled when the land issue and the special assessment rolls are more defined.

"We have some new information that we are looking at," Richards said. "And there are other options and problems with the engineering and with the amounts of land that would have to be acquired."

"We need to meet with the property owners and ask the engineers to come up with more options."

Last week, Township Trustee Russ Fogg, who has been instrumental in the paving project, was concerned that if the township didn't get the paving project under way, a \$530,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Transportation to help defray the costs of paving might be in jeopardy. But Fogg said this week township officials have since then learned that they have until October of next year before the grant could expire.

Munfah confirmed that.

"We won't lose the grant as long as we are under construction by October of 1994," Munfah said. "It is crucial that we be at least under contract with a contractor by then."

Township trustees have moved tonight's public hearing to Thursday, Oct. 21, at 6:30 p.m. in the board meeting room, 41600 Six Mile Road.

Bills may tighten animal torture laws

There's a chance Leslie Williams might not have turned into a serial killer of young women if the law had stopped him earlier when he was abusing animals, state senators believe.

The name of western Oakland and Livingston counties' most famous lifetime inmate came up last week as the Senate Judiciary Committee approved two bills designed to tighten laws against people who torture, neglect or maltreat an animal.

"There is a correlation between extreme cases of animal abuse and human abuse," said an aide to Sen. Virgil Smith, D-Detroit, sponsor of one bill. "Both (animal and human abusers) come from dysfunctional families."

Smith's bill would provide mental health treatment as one option when a judge sentences an animal abuser.

"The thrust of my bill is an animal in a neglected state," said Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, sponsor of the other.

The committee sent both bills to

the Senate floor after hearing heart-breaking testimony from humane society and county animal control officers.

"Leslie Williams is a striking example of what animal abusers are capable of," said Gary Tiscornia of the Michigan Humane Society. Tiscornia said he is a resident of Milford, where Williams performed one of his four 1991-92 serial killings.

Tiscornia told of dogs and cats starved to death, with owners put on probation; puppies whose collars became embedded in their necks as they grew to adulthood; a neglected cocker spaniel whose leg rotted off; a dog shotgunned to death for "chewing up a few things" in a house; a cat named Chico set on fire, whose owner escaped with a misdemeanor charge; and a German shepherd struck by 20 blows from a hatchet and thrown down a sewer whose assailant got only 30 days in jail.

Walter Rodabaugh, Lapeer County animal control officer, told of a woman who was paid to care for six horses but neglected all and let two starve to death. "We supplied \$5,000 of treatment at county expense. The

woman got the horses back at no cost," he said.

Rodabaugh told of an owner who let an 88-pound Doberman pinscher waste away to 28 pounds. After the county spent \$1,000 restoring the dog to health, the owner was neither fined nor required to make restitution, Rodabaugh said.

A man who used a baseball bat on a 15-pound dog was later sent to prison for child abuse. "SB 605 would have let us give that man some treatment. That's what he needed," Rodabaugh said.

Bouchard's bill would amend the penal code to prohibit a person from willfully and cruelly killing, maiming, mutilating or sexually assaulting an animal.

A violator could get a year in prison, be fined \$1,000, ordered to perform 240 hours of community service and be prohibited from owning an animal.

Bouchard noted his bill also covers transporting an animal with its feet tied together (except for taking it for medical care); failing to provide a rack so the animal could stand or lie down; abandoning an animal; and al-

lowing an old, diseased or disabled animal to suffer unnecessary torture or pain.

A Senate Fiscal Agency analysis said there was no way to determine how many more convictions, more jail time and more fine revenue would result from Bouchard's bill. In 1992 eight persons were convicted of feloniously destroying an animal.

Smith's bill would expand the list of animal cruelty violations. Exposing an animal to poison would be covered. The bill would apply to "an animal" and owners. Current law covers "any horses, cattle, or other beasts of another." The bill would not apply to lawful hunting or farming.

Smith's bill would provide for minimum sentences of 90 day days in jail and a \$2,000 fine, along with mental health treatment. The maximum four-year prison sentence would be unchanged, but the result could be more inmates because of more convictions.

Novi man charged in murder of his wife

Friends and relatives of the Watkins family of Novi huddled outside the courtroom after the Monday arraignment, sobbing and repeating the same question.

What could Frederick "Skip" Watkins have been thinking early Sunday morning when his wife of 47 years was murdered?

Watkins, 76, could not answer the question. He only looked bewildered after Judge Harold Bulgarelli formally charged him with first degree murder in Walled Lake 52-1 district court.

His attorney, Dennis Szokolay, said Watkins does not remember the early morning hours before Novi police found him holding a bloody knife that was plunged into the chest of his wife, Theresa, 68.

Police were responding to Theresa Watkins' frantic 9-1-1 call for help. The call came in shortly before 5:25 a.m. Police were immediately dispatched to the Watkins' condominium on Broquet in the Country Place condominium complex. They arrived within four minutes and found the victim still alive, but less than an hour later she died.

During the seven minute call, a Novi 9-1-1 operator listened help-

lessly as Watkins allegedly stabbed his wife with a 7-inch butcher knife. The Oakland County Medical Examiner's office later reported that Theresa Watkins was stabbed over 20 times.

She can be heard screaming at her husband on the 9-1-1 tape. "Why? Why did you do this? ... Look what you've done to me ... I'm gonna die ... No more, Skip. No more."

"It's a very poignant tape," said Novi Police Detective John Zimmer, who is in charge of the case. "It'll tear you up if you listen to it."

Police broke through the locked front door of the Watkins home, then had to kick open the bedroom door to reach the grisly scene. Theresa Watkins had apparently been stabbed twice in another part of the home before she ran into the bedroom and called for help.

"When they broke into the bedroom they saw Mr. Watkins with his hand on the knife, and the knife was in her chest," Zimmer said. "He pulled the knife out of her chest and, with the knife in his hands, he turned and looked at the officers."

Police, with guns drawn, ordered Watkins to drop the knife. He was arrested and his wife was transported to Botsford Hospital, where she was pronounced dead at 6:15 a.m.

The officers had a right to shoot

the man," Zimmer said. "But they talked him down."

Near Theresa Watkins' feet, police found the bloody telephone that she had used to call 9-1-1. The phone was still off the hook, but the line had been pulled off and disconnected.

Stunned relatives told police that Frederick and Theresa Watkins had been at an anniversary party with them until 1 a.m. that same morning. They said he drank only diet cola at the party, and there was no sign of trouble between him and his wife.

A neighbor who had driven the Watkinses home that morning said the couple even danced together at the party, and Frederick Watkins was not known for dancing. She said he appeared to be in good spirits when she dropped them off at home, and that the couple had a very loving relationship.

Some relatives speculated that the incident may have been related to numerous prescription medications that Frederick Watkins was taking. His attorney noted that Watkins suffered a head injury in a recent car accident. Police noted that he may have also been taking medication for depression related to a stroke he suffered earlier this year. And Watkins is a diabetic on insulin.

Information on the exact types of medication prescribed to Watkins

was unavailable at presstime.

"We are still investigating that with the physicians," Zimmer said.

Szokolay said his client was unaware of his wife's death until Monday afternoon, before he was taken to court for the arraignment.

"He didn't know why the police were holding him," Szokolay said. "I told him murder, and he didn't understand." Szokolay continued to explain and "Watkins" finally said "You mean my wife, Theresa, is dead?"

Zimmer said Watkins appeared unable to answer police questioning about the murder.

"He seems to have no recall of what happened," he said.

During the arraignment Szokolay attempted to waive the preliminary exam, but Bulgarelli noted that "the people have a right to preliminary exam, also" and ordered one scheduled within 12 days.

If the case is bound over for trial and Watkins is convicted of first degree murder, he will receive a mandatory sentence of life in prison without parole.

Visitation and rosary for Theresa Watkins were held at O'Brien Funeral Home yesterday. A funeral mass is scheduled for 10 a.m. today at Holy Family Catholic Church in Novi, with burial following at Roseland Park Cemetery in Berkley.

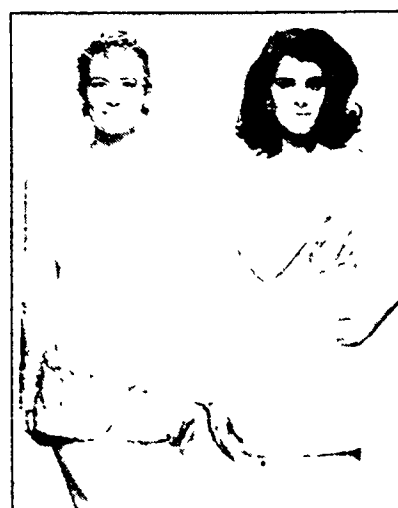

Teachers see wage freeze as a sign of the times

NEA and district negotiating teams "seemed like a million," there were also a lot of individual team meetings, Le Boeuf said. NEA representatives began working on the contract in February, surveying teachers on what "were important issues to them."

"I think a lot of people don't hear what the issues are," Le Boeuf said. "A lot (of the issues) are from day-to-day things that go on in the school."

For example, an unfair transfer may become a contract issue or a teacher who becomes ill and learns he or she has no long-term disability may also create an issue.

"It's the events that occur in that school year that determine the issues," Le Boeuf said.

The NEA negotiating team decides on the issues and then presents them to the school district. When each issue is "T.A.d" (tentatively agreed upon) or dropped, a contract is born.

After examination of the proposed contract by the executive council, made up mostly of officers of the NEA, the proposal is then passed on for review by the representative assembly, building representatives and finally on to the total membership. "It is a completely local process,"

Le Boeuf said.

The Michigan Education Association (MEA) plays no part whatsoever in the negotiating process, according to Le Boeuf. Although it is the NEA's parent organization, the MEA collects dues from teachers to provide a staff person for arbitrations and grievances, provide educational programs and lobby for educational issues.

Of the 27 years Le Boeuf has been with the district — she currently teaches a government class at the high school — she remembers six strikes by the teachers. Two were long strikes, a three-week walkout in 1969 and an eight-day strike in 1982. The issues were over salary and fringe benefits as well as merit pay in the latter strike, while the determining factor in 1969 was classroom size.

"Class size is always an issue," Le Boeuf said. "A lot of districts have class size language in their contracts."

Le Boeuf has also never seen a wage freeze during her tenure at Northville. However, teachers seem to be optimistic despite the first-ever freeze.

"People are always happy to be back to work," Le Boeuf said. "I think

strikes are miserable for both sides."

Le Boeuf credited the current administration for the way it acted in this year's contract negotiations.

"I must say this was the first time I negotiated with what I consider the new regime," Le Boeuf said. "Although they were very knowledgeable, none of the attacks were personal. It was all very civil. We even laughed. You just fought hard for your side."

"I can remember the days when it was an all-out personal battle, but for the last 15 years we've had a very good relationship (with the district). There's a mutual respect back and forth. I was very impressed with Roy Danley (the district's chief negotiator)."

This was the first contract Le Boeuf negotiated since serving as NEA president for 10 years. She had several reasons for taking a shot at this year's contract.

"I think the organization is important and I think it is important to protect all the members of the organization," she said. "And because I've had a lot of experience."

The current contract is set to expire in 1995. Teachers are scheduled to receive a 3 percent increase during the 1994-95 school year.

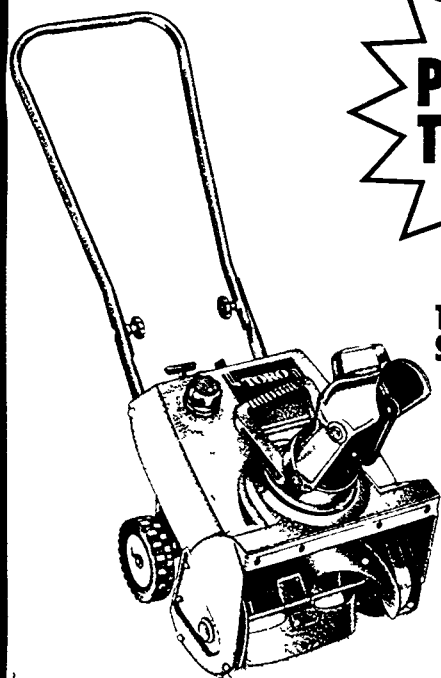

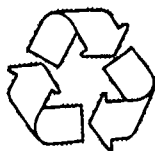

Juried art exhibit at local church

The "Juried Fine Arts Exhibition," to be held at First Presbyterian Church in Northville, will feature multi-media works of Southeast Michigan artists, including painting, sculpture, clay, photography, drawing and fiber displays.

Bill to charge crooks for labwork

Crooks will find that paying for laboratory analysis of evidence will become part of the cost of crime under a bill approved by the state House of Representatives.

The bill was sponsored by Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, whose district includes Northville. It would require courts to charge convicted offenders \$150 to help defray the cost of bringing them to justice. The bill

establishes a state treasury fund for forensic laboratory charges.

"This is part of my continuing battle to make the people who run up criminal justice system costs carry a share of the monetary burden," said Vorva, a former police officer. He said costs are rising to equip forensic labs with the latest technology.

Michigan State Police estimated

\$2 million in annual revenue would be raised, based on a forensic lab workload of 50,000 cases. Courts would retain 10 percent of the money collected.

All area representatives voted yes.

School board compromises on building adoption plan

It started out as two against five, but in the end a compromise was reached among Northville Board of Education members.

Trustees Joan Wadsworth and Patricia Custer were in favor of a program in which board members would "adopt" a school building. The two pushed the idea at the board's recent idea session.

The idea behind the program was to give board members a chance to learn more about the building, its staff, students and parents. The board member would also attend events such as open houses and an occasional PTA meeting at the school.

Other board members balked at the idea.

"With all the other community organization things I attend, it's getting to the point where I'm not at home one night of the week, hardly," board vice president Jean Hansen said.

"I'm in favor of it, not for the perspective of adding to my calendar,"

Custer said. "It would just be an easier method of knowing to whom I was responsible. It's not that I would have to make every dog and pony show. It would just give me a chance to get to know the principal better, to get to know the maintenance people better, the staff..."

"We should actually know that about all the schools," Hansen countered.

Treasurer Richard Brown asked what role the board member would play in such a program.

"It would be just one way of connecting a name and a face," Wadsworth replied.

Brown said he felt the program's impact might be superficial.

"Am I going to be there just for show, to say, 'Hey, I'm Dick Brown?'" he asked. "If I'm going to be there, it needs to be for a reason to do any good."

Board President Robert McMahon suggested the board make a more concerted effort to attend events at all the schools as it has done in the past.

"I'm not going to force the issue," Wadsworth said. "I can see the idea is

not a popular one. We just need to come up with ways of listening to parents in the buildings."

Glenna Davis, secretary, said she felt the "adopt a building" idea would indicate favoritism on the part of the board members. For example, her children attended Silver Springs, so if she were assigned Silver Springs, it might look like she was playing favorites.

"I want parents from all buildings to feel comfortable enough to contact me," she said.

Board members unofficially agreed to readopt a past practice of arriving at on-site board meetings a half-hour earlier.

"The purpose of those meetings were to let us get to see the buildings and how the walls were decorated," Hansen said. "It was more for us to see the schools."

This time, however, the earlier arrivals will allow board members to visit with parents and residents of the school community.

"This will be another outreach to the community in an attempt to be available," McMahon said.

Geake comes to township's aid

Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, used his muscle in Lansing Tuesday to try to get the State Legislature to deed a former state hospital and the 13 acres of land on which it sits to Northville Township.

A committee of the State Senate met Tuesday afternoon with the Senator and representatives from Northville Township to hear their collective pitch to bequeath the five-story building and parcel near Five Mile and Sheldon roads to the township.

The building currently houses Wayne Community Living Services, but that non-profit agency will be moving its operations from Northville to the city of Wayne on Oct. 4 and leaving the building vacant.

Township Manager Bill Richards said the township could put the building to good use.

"We are hoping to move all of our township operations to that building," Richards said. "We are really interested in it for a new township hall."

Richards said the building might prove to be a viable solution to the existing "severe space" and storage problems in township hall.

"We've really outgrown this facil-

ity," he said. "We need the additional space to expand our staff to meet the needs of the community."

"The township will continue to grow and expand services. To have that facility would be a big benefit to the township and the community," he said.

Richards said township officials began eyeing the building after they heard the tenants were moving out. The manager said the sheer size of the building offers Northville Township a lot of flexibility in accommodating all of its divisions.

"To have that facility would be a big benefit to the township and to the community," he said.

Richards said there is ample room in it to house township officials and staff, and police and fire personnel. There is also enough land around the building for recreational and park use.

Initially, the township may not be able to fill all of the floors, Richards said, but officials have tossed around the idea of loaning out space for a municipal library and for other shared services.

"The annex that is there now is currently being used as a library," the manager said. "This building would give us space for a library without having to build a new one."

"It would also be a great central location for the consolidation of the five communities' police services," Richards said. "And it could house Northville Youth Assistance. They could finally have a permanent home that could accommodate them."

But before township officials begin packing boxes, state lawmakers need to approve the land transfer to the township for a nominal fee.

The manager said it was up to lawmakers to decide what the cost would be to the township if they granted the land transfer. He said in the past the State has surplus state-owned buildings that have been vacated. The buildings are then transferred to the Department of Management and Budget.

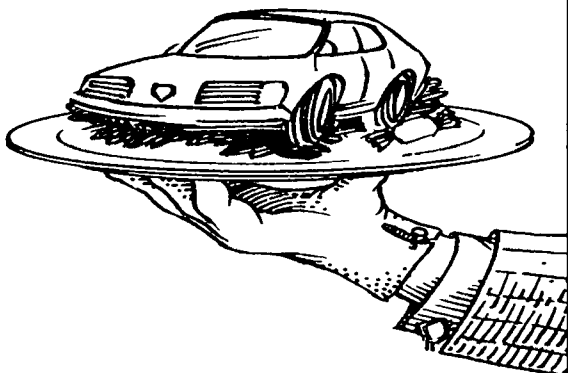
Parties interested in acquiring the buildings are then asked to find a sponsor in the Legislature to introduce a bill to have the property deeded to a specific owner. Geake was the one who introduced the bill the Senate committee reviewed Tuesday.

"A bill has to be introduced to the Senate and then to the House when the state is being asked to convey land for far less than its market value."

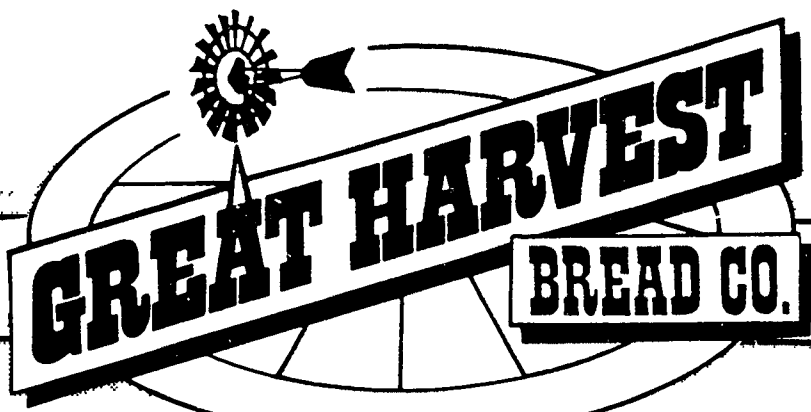

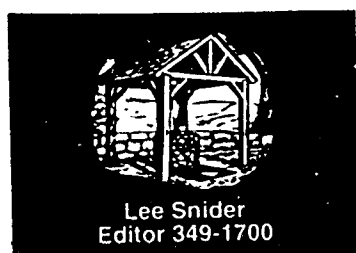

Contract terms show awareness of economy

Northville school district officials and members of the Northville Teachers Association should be commended for the restraint they showed in arriving at contract terms for the district's instructors.

The two sides approved a two-year contract earlier this month that calls for no salary increase in the first year and a 3 percent hike in the second. The first-year terms can't be said to represent a freeze because a one-step increase in the salary grid that determines salaries was included. But even with the incremental award, only 30 percent of NEA members will see raises this year, and those increases average out to a tiny 1.81 percent.

Moreover, an escape provision was included that permits the two sides to reopen negotiations in the event actual revenues exceed projected funds by at least five percent or fall short by three percent or more. Given the fact that \$6.3 billion in public education monies were lost under repeal of the school millage last summer, the latter is the more likely scenario.

The current mood of the taxpaying public is obvious to anyone paying attention. The first sign that business as usual was a thing of the past came in 1992 when a millage increase request failed, a rare occurrence in Northville. The signals continued last June when a request for 22.63 renewal mills passed by a relatively narrow margin.

In developing this most recent contract, teachers and district officials demonstrated sensitivity to taxpayer sentiment. The terms of the two-year pact compare very favorably to those of other

Michigan districts, and the first year zero percent increase was matched locally by only Ann Arbor and, after a generous give-back, by Plymouth-Canton. The upper end of the Northville teacher scale now ranks below the same levels of Allen Park, Lincoln Park, Dearborn, Garden City and Romulus, among others.

When one carefully examines the Northville faculty pay scale, there is little reason to feel that teachers are experiencing hardship. Fully 70 percent of the district's instructors have seniority that places them beyond the salary schedule, and the least one can make and not be on the scale is \$48,983.

That means that 70 percent of the teachers in the district make roughly \$49,000 or more. Throw in benefits, longevity pay, tuition reimbursements and bonuses, and you've got a very attractive compensation package indeed.

Nevertheless, the new contract is evidence that teachers and school officials are coming around to the realization that there is no deep pocket they can continue to dig into and that the times demand fiscal conservatism. Our hope is that the point has been made on a lasting basis.

Job is one big balancing act

It's not easy telling someone you don't entirely trust them but you'd like to stay on good terms with them just the same.

Yet, when I think back on it, that was essentially what I ended up doing when I had breakfast last week with school Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski and Board of Education President Bob MaMahon.

The idea for the get together wasn't mine, but I was glad to accept the invitation and meet with the two most visible individuals in the school district. I was a little apprehensive, figuring I was probably in the dog house with a couple of high-powered public officials. Two against one is the way I saw it, and both of them know their P's and Q's about school operations better than I ever could.

As it turned out, the conversation was relaxed and I felt comfortable enough to level with them about the approach I take to my job.

Reporters, I found myself explaining, are inherently mistrustful of public officials. We have to be, I insisted, because officials only tell us as much as they want the public to know. No offense, you understand, it doesn't have anything to do with you or with Northville per se. It's just human nature for people who speak on the record to tell you only those parts of a story that reflect their position. The rest they manage to keep to themselves.

I offered an example I thought they could understand, one that's been in the news lately. School district and labor union officials, for instance, tend to disclose only the salary aspects of new teacher contracts. The other major economic benefit — the step increase on the salary schedule — usually doesn't

get mentioned. Many reporters don't know enough to ask about step increases, so the full package the teachers receive, and its impact on the taxpayers, often goes unreported.

It's up to the reporter to ask about the step schedule because school officials and teachers can't be counted on to volunteer the information. They like to hide the full extent of their generosity with tax dollars. They don't lie, I intimated, they just don't tell the whole truth.

Despite the rather harsh tone of the comment, neither the superintendent nor the board president took issue with me. I expected some sort of denial, but, instead, they nodded in agreement, and seemed to acknowledge that journalists have to look beyond the surface if they're to do their jobs right.

That, I'm glad to say, is pretty much how it went that morning. They had valid concerns and so did I. Both sides spoke with candor and listened with sympathy. I came away from the meeting feeling that I had both stood my ground and given in a little. And that's how it should be.

Reporting on the policy decisions of elected officials and public employees is a tricky business. It's easy to become friendly with such people because you talk to them on a regular basis and, generally, they're as likeable as anyone else. Usually, mutual respect develops. Often, a degree of personal fondness follows.

But, at the same time, you can't get too close. Eventually, you know you're going to have to put something into print that they're not going to like, and when that time comes you can't let personal feelings interfere.

The ideal relationship between a reporter and his or her sources is one of skeptical trust, friendly adversity. It's not an easy thing to pull off because you tend to have one overriding feeling about people, whether positive or negative.

Yet it's the nature of the business. For good or ill.

Time for state to act on assisted suicide

Say what you want about Dr. Jack Kevorkian. He's given the public and policymakers a lot of fodder with which to criticize him.

When an Oakland County Circuit Court judge ordered him not to use his suicide machine, he defied the order and assisted in another suicide. Now that the state Legislature has banned assisted suicide temporarily so that the Death and Dying Committee can study the issue, he defied that law to assist in the suicide of a Novi man. And on the same day he was let out on bond for the Hyde suicide, Kevorkian allegedly went to the Redford home of Donald O'Keefe and assisted in a suicide for the 18th time.

Clearly, Kevorkian has no respect for the law. At the same time, lawmakers have given him little reason to have respect. Members of the state Legislature seem to be doing just about everything they can to avoid confronting this nettlesome issue head-on.

Society can't actually stop someone from committing suicide if they are determined to do so. But suicide has remained illegal precisely so that the courts can compel those who try and fail to get treatment. So it should be.

The question at hand is whether a doctor should be allowed to help a patient commit suicide. Incapacitated and terminally ill, the patient may not have the physical wherewithal to obtain the tools needed and set them up to end his or her own life. The patient may be able to "pull the trigger" him or herself, but Kevorkian's procedure has been to set things up so that patients could do that.

The state Legislature has only two options really. It can ban the practice, barring physicians from helping the terminally ill and leaving the patients to their own devices, or it can recognize the practice and regulate it.

Most of the arguments against allowing assisted suicide rely on the "slippery slope" theory, which says that once you allow assisted suicide you open the door to all kinds of other things, like euthanasia of the elderly or the handicapped. Those fears are not unjustified.

But all law is a matter of setting limits. You can drive a car, but you can't drive at 66 miles per hour. You can play your hunch on the stock market, but you

can't trade on inside information.

So, the key is to define when assisted suicide is appropriate and allowable, then enforce the law so that doctors do not stray outside those limits.

We reject the view that suicide should be allowed for those who are not terminally ill. Society clearly has an interest in preventing the mentally impaired from harming themselves or doing themselves in.

But where the patient is terminally ill, a system should be in place to allow assisted suicide, yet assure the process is not being abused.

State Representative Ted Wallace, D-Detroit, has offered a proposal that would regulate assisted suicides. The Wallace proposal would require the patient to ask for assistance in writing twice. A waiting period would be required. The patient would have to have a psychologist certify that the cause was not depression or mental illness. The physician would have to certify that the patient was likely to be dead within six months and that the pain was untreatable or would require too much medication to be relieved.

Wallace has an idea here. But there are several possible additions we'd like to see.

The state, for example, should create a commission to review such applications, allowing commission members time to interview the patient before the suicide. The commission could then approve or reject the application.

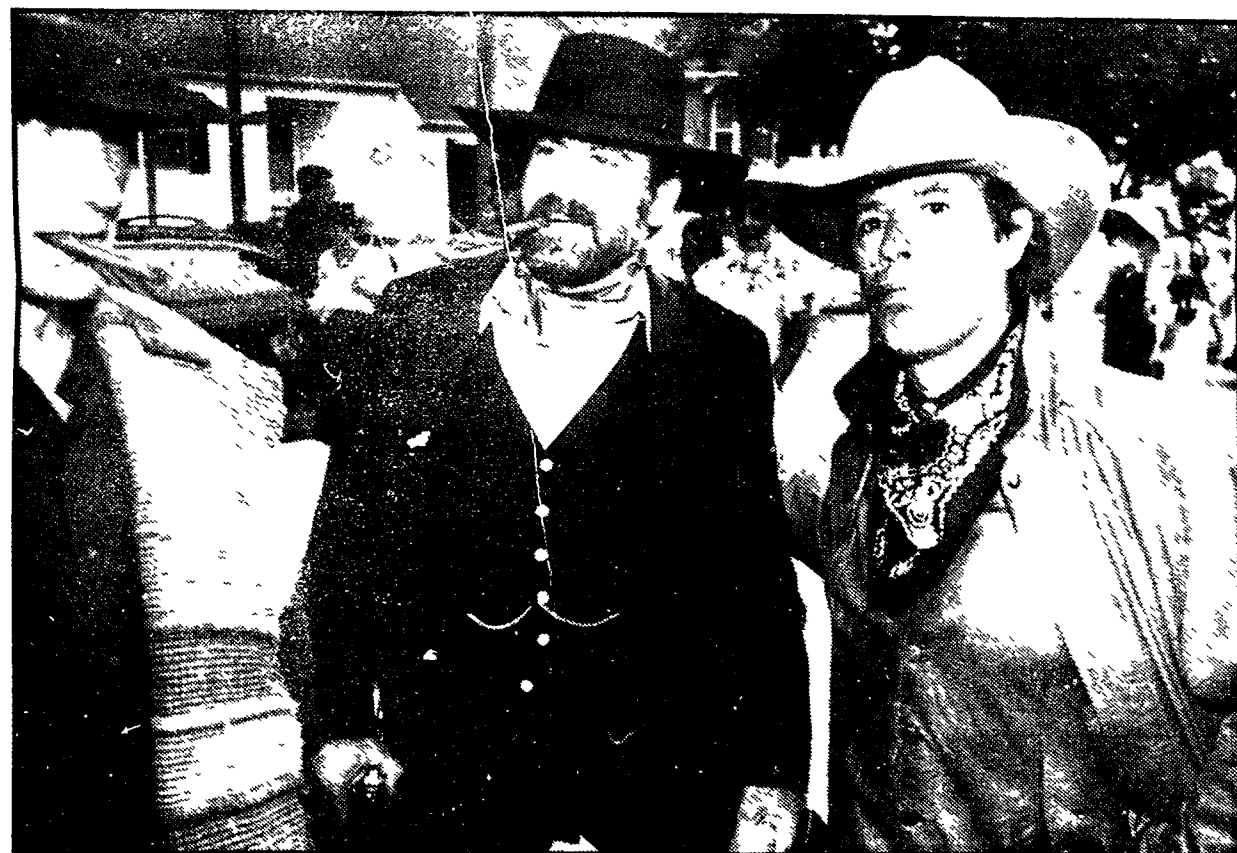
Of course, decisions would have to come quickly. The law would have to provide a deadline for the commission to act, allowing the patient and doctor to proceed if the commission did not object.

The rules would clearly have to bar outside groups, those who have no standing in the case, from opposing the patient's application.

And such a law should clearly ban euthanasia, mercy killing and pressuring or influencing patients to commit suicide.

No solution is going to be perfect or satisfy everyone who has an interest in the issue. But doing nothing and forcing the terminally ill and incapacitated to suffer may be the cruelest course of all.

Brinksmanship spurs action

"You people in Michigan deserve a lot of credit," said the man at the resort, putting down his gin and tonic with an admiring smile. "You blew away the entire property tax! Now you can get something serious done!"

Ever since the Legislature this summer obliterated the property tax supporting public schools, virtually every non-Michiganian I have met has said much the same thing.

In part, it's people looking for a subject to start a conversation. But behind their slightly surprised admiration lurks an important public perception about our politics.

Most people now believe it takes a full-blown crisis to force our paralyzed political system to act.

Why? Evidence, for one.

In Michigan, for example, our politicians have been dithering about school financing for a quarter of a century.

During this period, property taxes have soared, per-pupil funding differences between districts have grown, total spending has shot up, and our kids still leave school largely unprepared for the competitive world of work.

And what have we received from our political leaders? Wringing of hands and flapping of gums, that's about all.

Why is this so? Blame the system.

Because they regard holding office as their life's profession, our politicians are terrified of doing anything that might make anybody mad — which means they're scared of doing nearly anything.

More to the point, the political system is infested through-

out by special interests acting through lobbyists who grease the permanent re-election campaigns with contributions. In return, they demand a veto when something comes up that affects their turf.

In the case of the schools, the interlock of the special interests is so total as to earn the nickname "the Iron Quadrilateral." It works like this:

In one corner are the teachers unions, whose interest in the status quo is matched by the school superintendents and their organization in the second corner.

Both these corners are connected to the third, solidly dominated by more than 500 locally-elected school boards in the state. And all three of these corners are linked to the publishers of school books and other instructional materials, whose profits are most effectively safeguarded by resisting change (and the costs of putting out new editions).

To move any one point in this closely interlinked system requires moving all. That's why the political outcome in matters regarding education, school finance and student performance has been nothing more than a kind of grudging incrementalism.

From this analysis arises the hope of today. With the entire basis of school financing eliminated, the political system will be forced to take some definitive action or face chaos.

We will hear Gov. John Engler's initial proposals for school reform Oct. 5. As the debate kicks off, let's hope that the "action in the face of crisis" theory holds true.

Otherwise, all of us — especially our children — will be in deep trouble.

Parents should be better informed 'customers'

To the editor:

The key to continual improvement is the availability of good information. In a discussion with my wife last night I found that only the word-of-mouth method is available for parents to become more informed about the past performance of teachers. This is a problem. If there is a void of information available to the parents which can be used to understand an individual's strengths and weakness in conducting a class, then systematic improvement cannot occur. As a parent I want to know that my children are being educated better than I was and I want the information to choose the best school-teacher combination.

I am in the automotive business and performance tracking is a requirement of business. We require our supplier to maintain records of equipment, supplied material, methods used and the environment of the performance for all of the key characteristics of the product. Our suppliers are very proud of their quality, too. They have learned that when they are more open with themselves, and us, everybody wins.

In the education process, the parent is the customer. And well-informed parents are the cause of a good education system. This is clearly the case in Northville where well-informed parents communicate to the school system when their expectations are not met. They also maintain an environment in the home which communicates to their children educational goals.

The opportunity now exists with school system reform to increase the available information to the parents of all school systems, and this is what I would like to see happen on a statewide basis:

- Individual teacher folders which contain all comments from the parents of the students who have been taught by the teacher. Parents want to protect their children from poor teachers. They have a right to know what other parents have said. Poor teachers can become better teachers if they are properly motivated and instructed by their mentors but they need to know that performance improvement is required, not desired. The parents will be the motivators.

- Individual teacher statistics of the compiled performance of the students in the class. The performance measures I am interested in are knowledge and self-esteem. I would like to know if the class as a whole met or exceeded the goals of learning and I would like to know if the methods used encourage further learning and enhanced each child's self-esteem. Since numbers don't communicate very well this should be done graphically using means, variations, and predictions showing long term performance. This should also contain the teacher's plan and method used.

- Individual school statistics of the compiled performance of the school to determine if the administration of the school is providing the environment for the teachers to improve their performance. This should be done graphically using means variations with predictions showing long term performance. This should also contain the administrator's plan and method used.

Education is a public business. Knowledge is good. Fear of airing problems in a system should be balanced by the excitement of finding what is working better than expected. Barriers on access to information do not belong in an open society and should be removed so that parents can be informed to make responsible choices. The customer makes the choice, not the supplier. Since I am interested in continual improvement and the schools are interested in providing better education, the raw data should be made available in a usable format at no cost. (I like computer files.)

Change is always more difficult than the status quo, so write a note now. You will never have a better opportunity to make a difference.

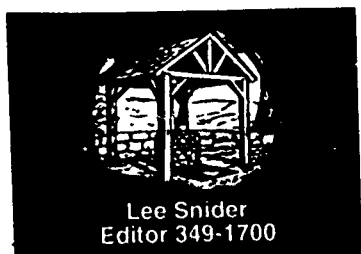

Contract terms show awareness of economy

Northville school district officials and members of the Northville Teachers Association should be commended for the restraint they showed in arriving at contract terms for the district's instructors.

The two sides approved a two-year contract earlier this month that calls for no salary increase in the first year and a 3 percent hike in the second. The first-year terms can't be said to represent a freeze because a one-step increase in the salary grid that determines salaries was included. But even with the incremental award, only 30 percent of NEA members will see raises this year, and those increases average out to a tiny 1.81 percent.

Moreover, an escape provision was included that permits the two sides to reopen negotiations in the event actual revenues exceed projected funds by at least five percent or fall short by three percent or more. Given the fact that \$6.3 billion in public education monies were lost under repeal of the school millage last summer, the latter is the more likely scenario.

The current mood of the taxpaying public is obvious to anyone paying attention. The first sign that business as usual was a thing of the past came in 1992 when a millage increase request failed, a rare occurrence in Northville. The signals continued last June when a request for 22.63 renewal mills passed by a relatively narrow margin.

In developing this most recent contract, teachers and district officials demonstrated sensitivity to taxpayer sentiment. The terms of the two-year pact compare very favorably to those of other

Michigan districts, and the first year zero percent increase was matched locally by only Ann Arbor and, after a generous give-back, by Plymouth-Canton. The upper end of the Northville teacher scale now ranks below the same levels of Allen Park, Lincoln Park, Dearborn, Garden City and Romulus, among others.

When one carefully examines the Northville faculty pay scale, there is little reason to feel that teachers are experiencing hardship. Fully 70 percent of the district's instructors have seniority that places them beyond the salary schedule, and the least one can make and not be on the scale is \$48,983.

That means that 70 percent of the teachers in the district make roughly \$49,000 or more. Throw in benefits, longevity pay, tuition reimbursements and bonuses, and you've got a very attractive compensation package indeed.

Nevertheless, the new contract is evidence that teachers and school officials are coming around to the realization that there is no deep pocket they can continue to dig into and that the times demand fiscal conservatism. Our hope is that the point has been made on a lasting basis.

Time for state to act on assisted suicide

Say what you want about Dr. Jack Kevorkian. He's given the public and policymakers a lot of fodder with which to criticize him.

When an Oakland County Circuit Court judge ordered him not to use his suicide machine, he defied the order and assisted in another suicide. Now that the state Legislature has banned assisted suicide temporarily so that the Death and Dying Committee can study the issue, he defied that law to assist in the suicide of a Novi man. And on the same day he was let out on bond for the Hyde suicide, Kevorkian allegedly went to the Redford home of Donald O'Keefe and assisted in a suicide for the 18th time.

Clearly, Kevorkian has no respect for the law. At the same time, lawmakers have given him little reason to have respect. Members of the state Legislature seem to be doing just about everything they can to avoid confronting this nettlesome issue head-on.

Society can't actually stop someone from committing suicide if they are determined to do so. But suicide has remained illegal precisely so that the courts can compel those who try and fail to get treatment. So it should be.

The question at hand is whether a doctor should be allowed to help a patient commit suicide. Incapacitated and terminally ill, the patient may not have the physical wherewithal to obtain the tools needed and set them up to end his or her own life. The patient may be able to "pull the trigger" him or herself, but Kevorkian's procedure has been to set things up so that patients could do that.

The state Legislature has only two options really. It can ban the practice, barring physicians from helping the terminally ill and leaving the patients to their own devices, or it can recognize the practice and regulate it.

Most of the arguments against allowing assisted suicide rely on the "slippery slope" theory, which says that once you allow assisted suicide you open the door to all kinds of other things, like euthanasia of the elderly or the handicapped. Those fears are not unjustified.

But all law is a matter of setting limits. You can drive a car, but you can't drive at 66 miles per hour. You can play your hunch on the stock market, but you

can't trade on inside information.

So, the key is to define when assisted suicide is appropriate and allowable, then enforce the law so that doctors do not stray outside those limits.

We reject the view that suicide should be allowed for those who are not terminally ill. Society clearly has an interest in preventing the mentally impaired from harming themselves or doing themselves in.

But where the patient is terminally ill, a system should be in place to allow assisted suicide, yet assure the process is not being abused.

State Representative Ted Wallace, D-Detroit, has offered a proposal that would regulate assisted suicides. The Wallace proposal would require the patient to ask for assistance in writing twice. A waiting period would be required. The patient would have to have a psychologist certify that the cause was not depression or mental illness. The physician would have to certify that the patient was likely to be dead within six months and that the pain was untreatable or would require too much medication to be relieved.

Wallace has an idea here. But there are several possible additions we'd like to see.

The state, for example, should create a commission to review such applications, allowing commission members time to interview the patient before the suicide. The commission could then approve or reject the application.

Of course, decisions would have to come quickly. The law would have to provide a deadline for the commission to act, allowing the patient and doctor to proceed if the commission did not object.

The rules would clearly have to bar outside groups, those who have no standing in the case, from opposing the patient's application.

And such a law should clearly ban euthanasia, mercy killing and pressuring or influencing patients to commit suicide.

No solution is going to be perfect or satisfy everyone who has an interest in the issue. But doing nothing and forcing the terminally ill and incapacitated to suffer may be the cruellest course of all.

Job is one big balancing act

It's not easy telling someone you don't entirely trust them but you'd like to stay on good terms with them just the same.

Yet, when I think back on it, that was essentially what I ended up doing when I had breakfast last week with school Superintendent Leonard Rezmiński and Board of Education President Bob MaMahon.

The idea for the get together wasn't mine, but I was glad to accept the invitation and meet with the two most visible individuals in the school district. I was a little apprehensive, figuring I was probably in the dog house with a couple of high-powered public officials. Two against one is the way I saw it, and both of them know their P's and Q's about school operations better than I ever could.

As it turned out, the conversation was relaxed and I felt comfortable enough to level with them about the approach I take to my job.

Reporters, I found myself explaining, are inherently mistrustful of public officials. We have to be, I insisted, because officials only tell us as much as they want the public to know. No offense, you understand, it doesn't have anything to do with you or with Northville per se. It's just human nature for people who speak on the record to tell you only those parts of a story that reflect their position. The rest they manage to keep to themselves.

I offered an example I thought they could understand, one that's been in the news lately. School district and labor union officials, for instance, tend to disclose only the salary aspects of new teacher contracts. The other major economic benefit — the step increase on the salary schedule — usually doesn't

get mentioned. Many reporters don't know enough to ask about step increases, so the full package the teachers receive, and its impact on the taxpayers, often goes unreported.

It's up to the reporter to ask about the step schedule because school officials and teachers can't be counted on to volunteer the information. They like to hide the full extent of their generosity with tax dollars. They don't lie, I intimated, they just don't tell the whole truth.

Despite the rather harsh tone of the comment, neither the superintendent nor the board president took issue with me. I expected some sort of denial, but, instead, they nodded in agreement, and seemed to acknowledge that journalists have to look beyond the surface if they're to do their jobs right.

That, I'm glad to say, is pretty much how it went that morning. They had valid concerns and so did I. Both sides spoke with candor and listened with sympathy. I came away from the meeting feeling that I had both stood my ground and given in a little. And that's how it should be.

Reporting on the policy decisions of elected officials and public employees is a tricky business. It's easy to become friendly with such people because you talk to them on a regular basis and, generally, they're as likeable as anyone else. Usually, mutual respect develops. Often, a degree of personal fondness follows.

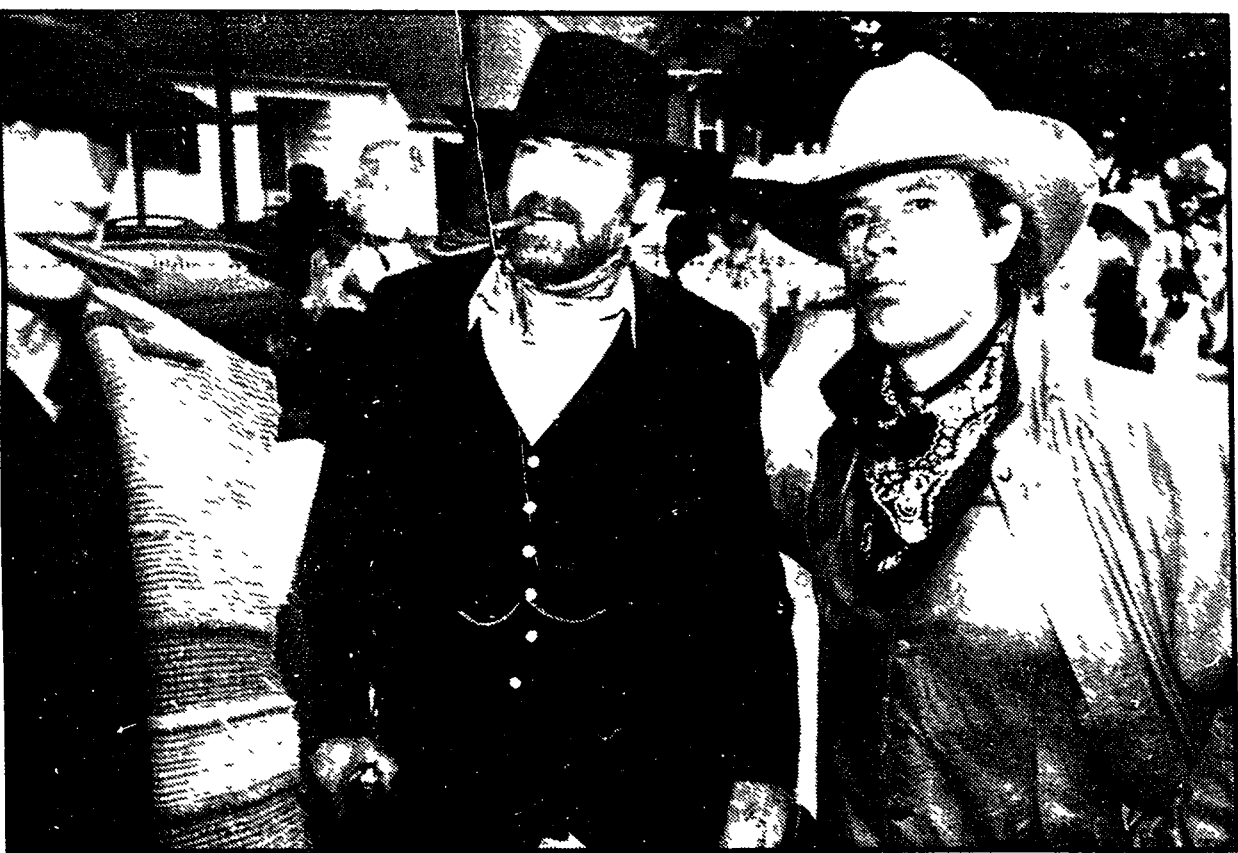
But, at the same time, you can't get too close. Eventually, you know you're going to have to put something into print that they're not going to like, and when that time comes you can't let personal feelings interfere.

The ideal relationship between a reporter and his or her sources is one of skeptical trust, friendly adversity. It's not an easy thing to pull off because you tend to have one overriding feeling about people, whether positive or negative.

Yet it's the nature of the business. For good or ill.

Brinksmanship spurs action

"You people in Michigan deserve a lot of credit," said the man at the resort, putting down his gin and tonic with an admiring smile. "You blew away the entire property tax! Now you can get something serious done!"

Ever since the Legislature this summer obliterated the property tax supporting public schools, virtually every non-Michiganian I have met has said much the same thing.

In part, it's people looking for a subject to start a conversation. But behind their slightly surprised admiration lurks an important public perception about our politics.

Most people now believe it takes a full-blown crisis to force our paralyzed political system to act.

Why? Evidence, for one. In Michigan, for example, our politicians have been dithering about school financing for a quarter of a century.

During this period, property taxes have soared, per-pupil spending differences between districts have grown, and our kids still leave school largely unprepared for the competitive world of work.

And what have we received from our political leaders? Wringing of hands and flapping of gums, that's about all.

Why is this so? Blame the system. Because they regard holding office as their life's profession, our politicians are terrified of doing anything that might make anybody mad — which means they're scared of doing nearly anything.

More to the point, the political system is infested through-

out by special interests acting through lobbyists who grease the permanent re-election campaigns with contributions. In return, they demand a veto when something comes up that affects their turf.

In the case of the schools, the interlock of the special interests is so total as to earn the nickname "the Iron Quadrilateral." It works like this:

In one corner are the teachers unions, whose interest in the status quo is matched by the school superintendents and their organization in the second corner.

Both these corners are connected to the third, solidly dominated by more than 500 locally-elected school boards in the state. And all three of these corners are linked to the publishers of school books and other instructional materials, whose profits are most effectively safeguarded by resisting change (and the costs of putting out new editions).

To move any one point in this closely interlinked system requires moving all. That's why the political outcome in matters regarding education, school finance and student performance has been nothing more than a kind of grudging incrementalism.

From this analysis arises the hope of today. With the entire school financing eliminated, the political system will be forced to take some definitive action or face chaos.

We'll hear Gov. John Engler's initial proposals for school Oct. 5. As the debate kicks off, let's hope that the "action in the face of crisis" theory holds true.

Otherwise, all of us — especially our children — will be in deep trouble.

Parents should be better informed 'customers'

To the editor:

The key to continual improvement is the availability of good information. In a discussion with my wife last night I found that only the word-of-mouth method is available for parents to become more informed about the past performance of teachers. This is a problem. If there is a void of information available to the parents which can be used to understand an individual's strengths and weakness in conducting a class, then systematic improvement cannot occur. As a parent I want to know that my children are being educated better than I was and I want the information to choose the best school-teacher combination.

I am in the automotive business and performance tracking is a requirement of business. We require our supplier to maintain records of equipment, supplied material, methods used and the environment of the performance for all of the key characteristics of the product. Our suppliers are very proud of their quality, too. They have learned that when they are more open with themselves, and us, everybody wins.

In the education process, the parent is the customer. And well-informed parents are the cause of a good education system. This is clearly the case in Northville where well-informed parents communicate to the school system when their expectations are not met. They also maintain an environment in the home which communicates to their children educational goals.

The opportunity now exists with school system reform to increase the available information to the parents of all school systems, and this is what I would like to see happen on a statewide basis:

- Individual teacher folders which contain all comments from the parents of the students who have been taught by the teacher. Parents want to protect their children from poor teachers. They have a right to know what other parents have said. Poor teachers can become better teachers if they are properly motivated and instructed by their mentors but they need to know that performance improvement is required, not desired. The parents will be the motivators.
- Individual teacher statistics of the compiled performance of the students in the class. The performance measures I am interested in are knowledge and self-esteem. I would like to know if the class as a whole met or exceeded the goals of learning and I would like to know if the methods used encourage further learning and enhanced each child's self-esteem. Since numbers don't communicate very well this should be done graphically using means, variations, and predictions showing long term performance. This should also contain the teacher's plan and method used.
- Individual school statistics of the compiled performance of the school to determine if the administration of the school is providing the environment for the teachers to improve their performance. This should be done graphically using means variations with predictions showing long term performance. This should also contain the administrator's plan and method used.

Education is a public business. Knowledge is good. Fear of airing problems in a system should be balanced by the excitement of finding what is working better than expected. Barriers on access to information do not belong in an open society and should be removed so that parents can be informed to make responsible choices. The customer makes the choice, not the supplier. Since I am interested in continual improvement and the schools are interested in providing better education, the raw data should be made available in a usable format at no cost. (I like computer files.)

Change is always more difficult than the status quo, so write a note now. You will never have a better opportunity to make a difference.

MALAYSIAN EXPERIENCE

Couple returns
after 3-year
tour of duty

The first time Sharon Buell visited Malaysia about all that impressed her were the old Chinese temples in the cities.

She mostly remembered the lack of sanitation systems, with waste dumping into open sewers and ditches in the backlands of the southeastern Asian country.

On a return trip, however, the visit wasn't so bad. It was probably a good thing, seeing how Sharon and her husband Alan were going to make their home there for several years.

Alan Buell, a Ford Motor Co. employee, was transferred to the country as part of a joint venture with Mazda and Sanyo to start a new plant.

The Buells just returned to Northville, getting their furniture out of storage after almost three years in Malaysia.

As the second American family to arrive in the independent country in September 1990, the Buells helped select an office building for Ford. Sharon and the other American woman even picked out the office furniture.

"When your husband works for Ford, you never get that close to the action," Buell said, adding she even got to conduct surveys regarding housing allowances for the automobile manufacturer. "I got to have more input in my husband's business than normal."

But since the Malaysian gov-

ernment does not allow wives to work, Buell decided to become active in the American Women's Association. The association is made up of members of between 23 and 25 nationalities, all of whom volunteer for a host of charitable organizations. Formed by a group of American women 12 years ago, the group is now composed mostly of Australians while American women are in the minority.

When Buell arrived in Malaysia, the group was looking for people to take office.

"They asked me to be treasurer and I said only if they wanted to become bankrupt," she laughed. "They asked me to be the secretary, but I told them my secretarial skills were nil."

But when she was asked to be the community services representative between the association and the charities, she knew it was her type of role.

"That's where I really had a ball," she said. "I expanded it into more of a volunteer organization."

She said her job was easy since all the charitable organizations were near each other on the island of Penang, located off the coast of the mainland where the Buells resided.

"The whole island was about 50 miles around," she said. "It took about an hour and a half to get around all of the island. Here, a lot of the charities are in downtown Detroit. Some people are afraid to drive down there."

One of the first things Buell did

was to help organize a tour so when new people came to the island, they were introduced to all of the charities.

"It brought a little closer the relationship between the community and the organizations," Buell said. "A lot of the time, organizations are separate from the people they serve. They hand checks over and don't really know about them."

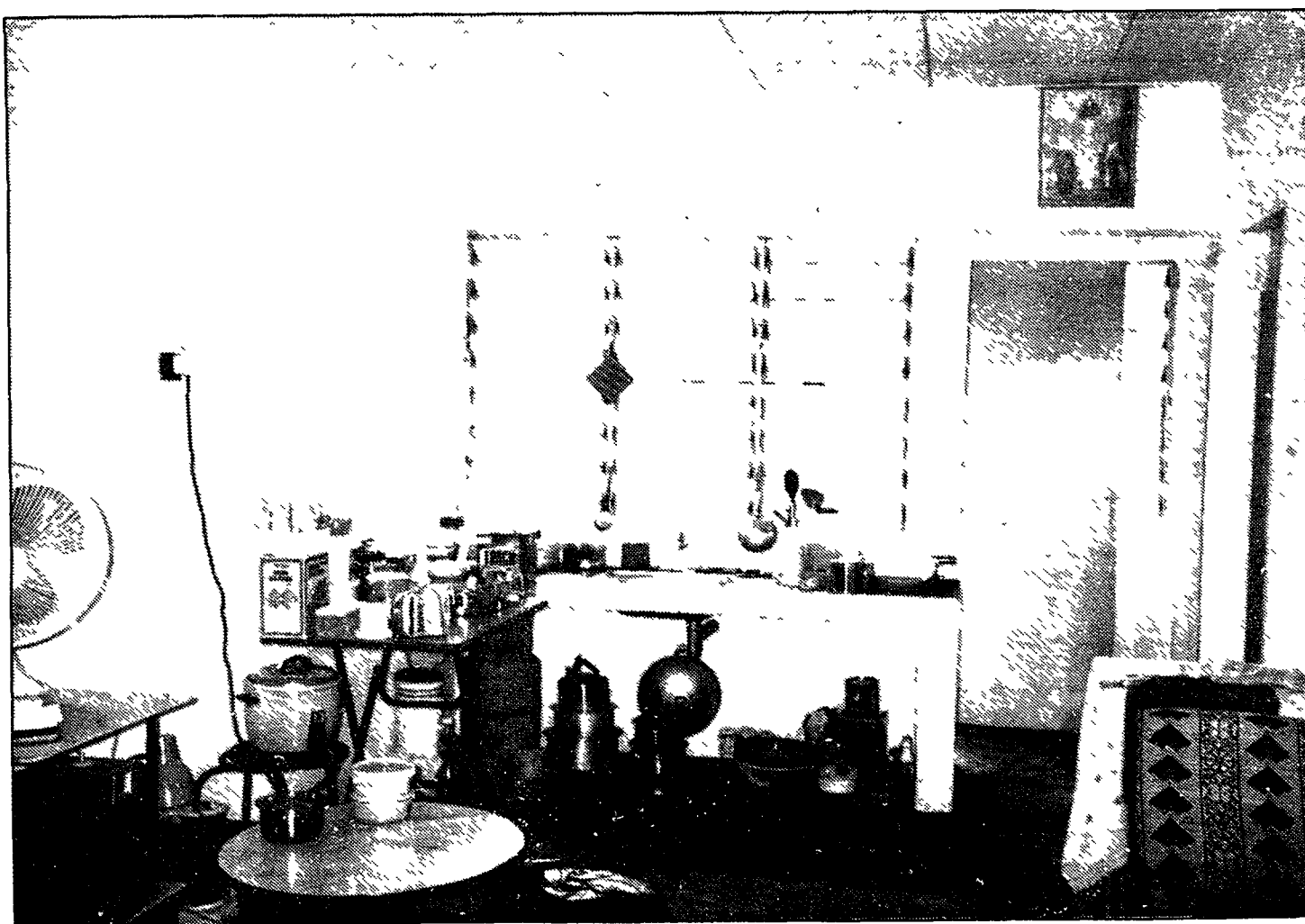
"I actually got to know the organizations very well. I miss that. It was fun becoming involved."

When Buell attempted to become involved in the Catholic church, however, she met some resistance.

"There isn't as much lay participation," she said. "And women have less importance (in the church)."

The majority religion practiced is Islam, however, there are Christians, Buddhists and Hindus as well.

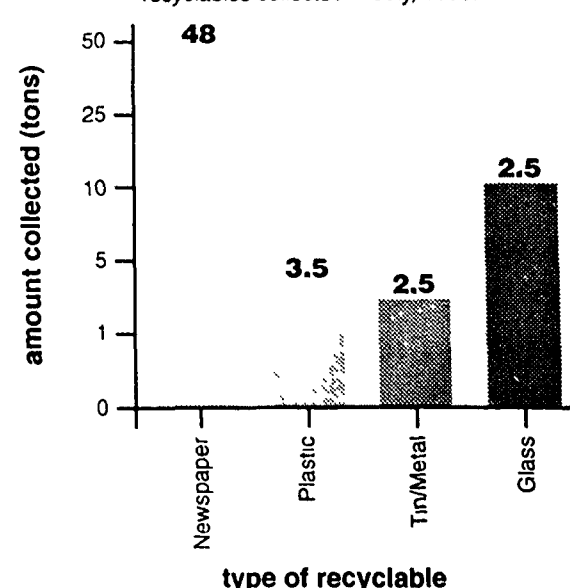
"And we want to do more, more to promote culture in the community," he said.

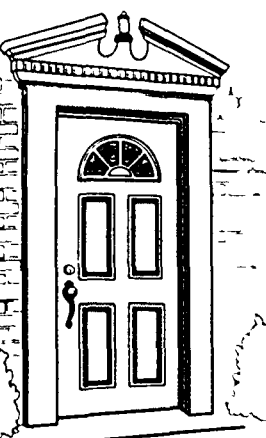

Crop Walk set for Sunday

The CROP walk for hunger — an annual event that provides thousands of dollars to food aid programs both locally and around the world — will take place in Novi and Northville Sunday, Oct. 3.

"It starts at the Novi Civic Center and winds through Novi, then winds around Northville and concludes at Our Lady of Victory church," said the Rev. Chuck Jacobs of Novi Methodist Church. Jacobs, along with David Black of Northville First United Methodist Church, is co-organizer of the event.

The 6.2-mile, or 10-kilometer, walk attracted 400 walkers and raised over \$16,000 in pledges last year.

"This year we're striving for 500 walkers and raising \$20,000," Jacobs said.

Of the money raised locally by the Novi-Northville CROP walk, 25 percent goes back into the local area. The other 75 percent goes to Church World Services, an interdenominational hunger aid program.

"Church World Services works with many, many different churches

and many countries seeking to help provide education to people to help them raise their own food," Jacobs said.

Locally, 10 percent of the funds raised go to the Novi Emergency Food Fund; 10 percent goes to Northville Civic Center; and 5 percent goes to Focus: Hope in Detroit.

"We want to get our two communities first, then the larger metropolitan area," he said.

The money is raised by people who help sponsor individual walkers by pledging a given amount of money per kilometer.

"We are inviting people to sign up to walk. When they do they receive a pledge envelope, and they seek pledges from people willing to support them," Jacobs explained. For example, if a sponsor pledges 50 cents per kilometer, they would be making a donation of \$5 for walking the entire route.

Each local church has a walk coordinator who then collects the pledge monies and turns them over to a CROP walk treasurer, who then passes them on to the Michigan CROP office in Lansing.

All area churches are involved, Jacobs said, although six churches are

on the "steering committee" organizing the event. They are Holy Family, Spirit of Christ Lutheran, Faith Community United Presbyterian and Novi United Methodist churches in Novi. In Northville, the organizing churches are Northville First United Methodist, Northville First Presbyterian and Our Lady of Victory.

This is the second year that the two communities have teamed up for the event, and Jacobs said it has been a financial boon for area food banks.

"In previous years Novi did it alone," he said. "Last year when Northville joined us we just blossomed."

Registration for walkers will begin at 1:30 p.m. Oct. 3 and the walk begins at 2 p.m. The walk will take place rain or shine. Anyone is welcome to participate.

"We look to the churches for their involvement but we also invite service groups or any individuals who want to take part," Jacobs said.

The walk will end at Our Lady of Victory church, where vans will be available to transport people back to the Novi Civic Center.

"Later I was able to do more things (in the church)," Buell said. "I started a women's support group for battered women and children."

Buell said the Indian culture especially tends to think the men are superior.

"It's taken for granted that they keep the women in line and beat them," Buell said. "But that was open to change."

With a little hesitation at first, the bishop at Buell's church came to support the women's group.

After spending some time in Malaysia, you get used to the confusion of the crowds and the humid, hot weather, according to Buell. She and her husband traveled the country, oftentimes by elephant, exploring little villages. Sometimes seeing the poverty in some of those places was almost more than Buell could handle.

"Some were lucky to have one tap of water for the entire village," she said. "I don't think most of us realize how important tap water is."

For those villages not having a water tap, dirty ditch water was used for washing clothes and drinking.

"Children die," Buell said. "There is a lot of infant mortality. I don't have any numbers, but they don't have medical care or anything."

Buell pulled out a picture of two little girls she met in Bangkok, the capital of Thailand known as a hotbed for prostitution.

"Do you know what's going to probably happen to these two little girls?" she asked, holding the picture up. "They'll go into (Bangkok) looking for factory work and end up in prostitution."

"It's just sad to see these cute, little innocent children who will probably be one day into prostitution."

Traveling the country, whether it be by elephant or foot, was like looking at something out of National Geographic, Buell said.

For instance, Buell can remember hearing the "thud, thud, thud" sounds made by women every morning crushing grain for the day's bread.

Elderly people stay with the children during the day and younger children usually don't wear clothing because there aren't such things as diapers.

When Buell returned home to Northville, she said the first things she noticed were the big homes.

"We've got so much to be thankful for," she said. "Even in times of recession, we still have so much."

Buell said it was hard for her to sleep on a bamboo bed in the jungle with "who knows what running across us at night" and then visit a fancy restaurant the next day.

"It almost felt like we were back in time," she said. "We need to bring those two civilizations back together."

When she was in the remote villages, it was hard to believe there was

a modern world. On the other hand, when she was back in the modern world, it was hard to believe there were remote villages such as the ones Buell visited.

"It's very difficult to sit back with pictures and try to relive it," she said. "Some people live so primitively. Stores here almost insult me. There's too much."

"Our needs are so much less than our wants. When you get in a different part of the world, your needs and wants are so much closer together. It's bothersome to me when I hear people complain."

Though Buell wouldn't trade her overseas experiences (her husband had an assignment in Brazil from 1979 through 1983), she's glad to be back near her family. The Buells' two sons and one daughter reside in Houston, Texas. Both Alan and Sharon are natives of Traverse City.

"We've visited about 35 countries and lived in three," she said.

Since returning home, Buell has helped recruit walkers for the annual

CROP Walk through her church, Our Lady of Victory.

"That's been keeping me out of trouble," she laughed.

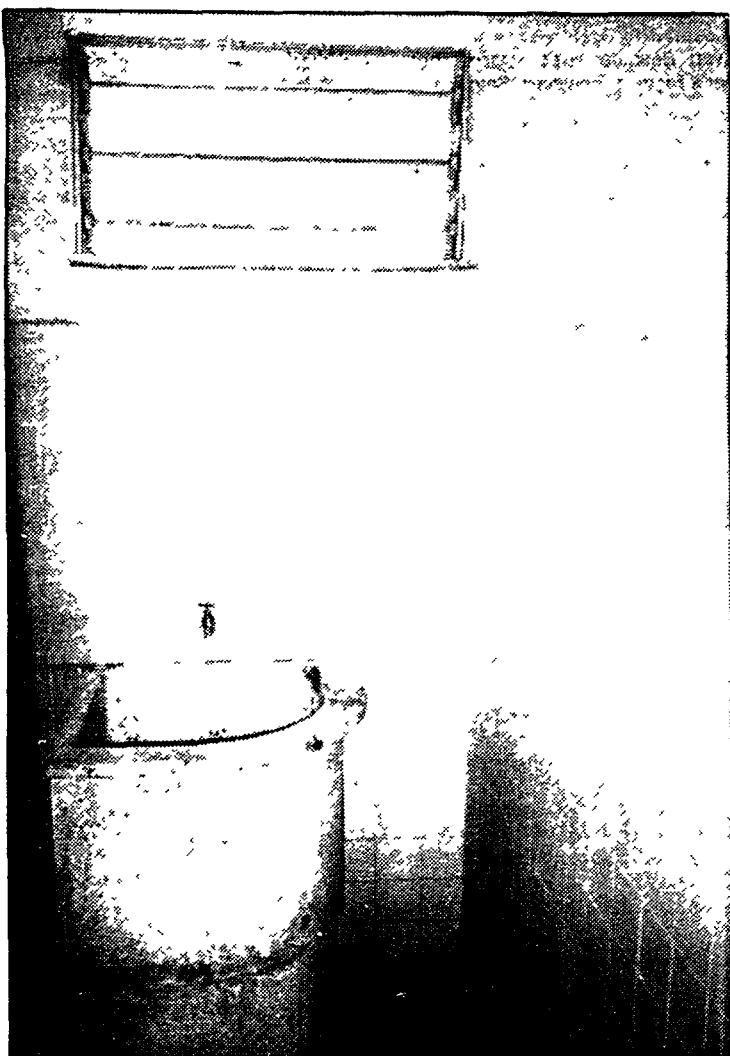
Next, she plans on continuing her work with domestic violence, helping both women and children victims.

A nurse by profession, Buell doubts if she'll return to the work force, but she does plan to use her skills on a volunteer basis. She'll probably even pick up on her work at the Refugee Coalition of Detroit and Windsor, she said.

"That will bring back that cultural mixture," she said. "It's kind of comfortable to go back and be around people who are struggling, yet have a good attitude."

Above all, Buell said it's important to realize people are just people, no matter where they come from.

"I've met enough people to know that they're people just like us," she said. "They may have a different religion. They may dress differently than us, but underneath it all, they're just like us."

Bill Barr will 'leave 'em laughing'

Comedian Bill Barr hits the stage this weekend at Novi's "Home Sweet Home" and he hopes to leave 'em laughing... or at least with the hiccups.

Barr, a former Novi resident and the father of 6-year-old Jessica explains, "When my daughter was young, I spent a lot of time playing with her, making her laugh... When she was about 4, I got her laughing so hard she developed the hiccups. When I came home that night from a show she asked, 'Daddy, how was your show? Did they get the hiccups tonight, Dad?' All of a sudden, she began asking me this after every show." Somehow, this strange measure of success seems almost logical for Barr.

A 1975 graduate of Novi High School, Barr's ties to the community include father William, retired last year from a 20-year stint as Assistant Superintendent of Novi Public Schools. His sister Cindy, also a Novi resident, is a mother and is active with the Novi Youth Assistance Program.

Barr's comedy career began overseas at the University of Warwick in Coventry, England. "It's the place where Lady Godiva rode," said Barr, describing the area north of London known as the "midlands." On exchange from Eastern Michigan University, it was England where he first began doing comedy on stage. Although he had previously performed as a mime back home, it wasn't until he and a roommate performed a two-man mime and magic show that he realized he may have found a career path.

The mime and magic show led to his involvement with a "barnstormer," something Barr describes as a "glorified talent show." The show was led by the son of a famous English television star, and that was only the beginning.

"We started doing some basic 'improv' comedy exercises and the people loved them. After the shows, I had people clapping me on the back, buying me drinks, telling me I was great. I knew I wasn't, but that put the hunger in me," said Barr. He is quick to point out the differences between "improv," the style of his show, and "improvisational" comedy.

"It's like splitting hairs, but I do improv from the formal style. There are very intricate rules about how to perform certain scenes," Barr said.

Without divulging any secrets about Friday's performance, he will say

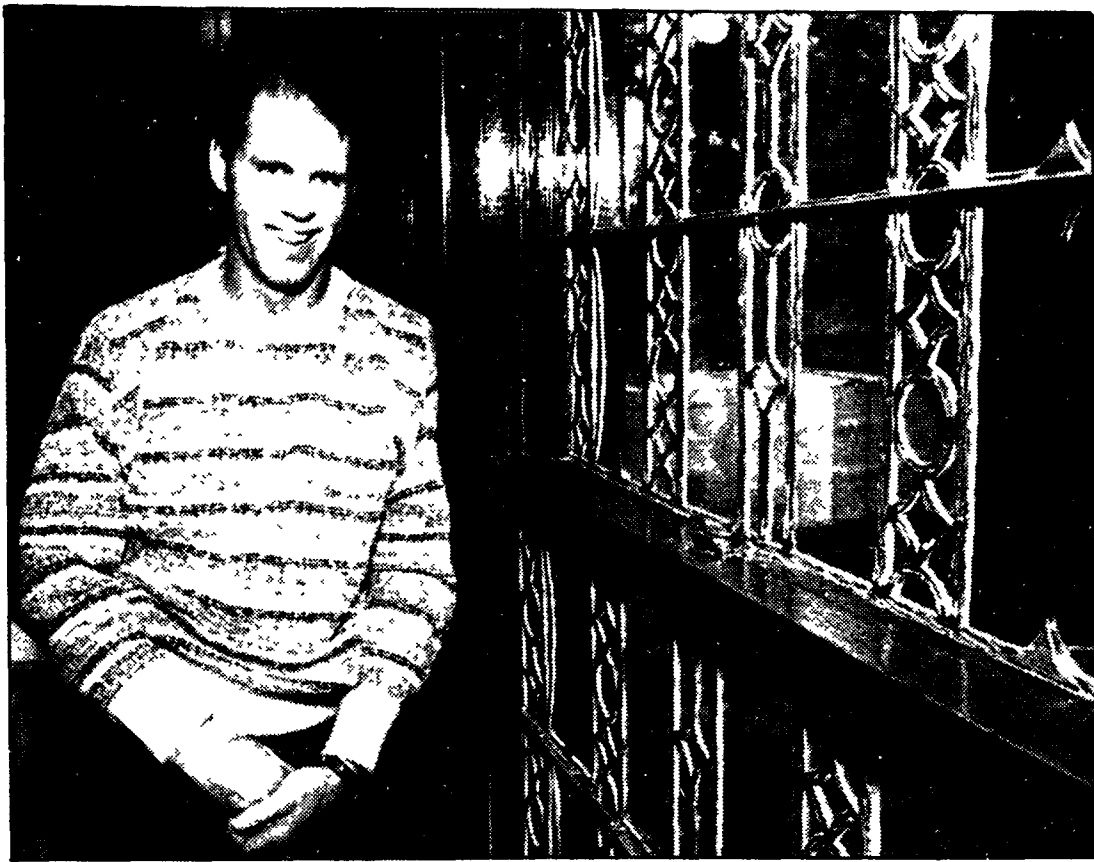

that it involves some improvising, spontaneity, ad-libbing and audience participation. "I create a lot of stories from audience suggestions. (Improv) is almost like a mathematical formula," said the performer.

His foray into "improv," may come as a surprise to some. For those who knew him growing up in Novi, his stage act is a bold departure from the quiet student who spent most of his free time on the football field.

"I was pretty quiet in high school. People raise an eyebrow when they hear I am up on stage," something he terms an "unnatural act." Explains the former football star, "Playing sports is very similar. It is partly a performance." So the progression from football field to stage may be more natural than one first suspects, Barr believes.

Although it is clear that he loves comedy, his route to England and the stage was not a direct one.

"I attended six universities in five years looking for the right program," said Barr, half joking. After turning down a football scholarship from

Eastern, Barr decided to attend the school and played football for two days. A chance encounter with a "house with arms" stopped his college football career short and he left Eastern after one semester, heading to the fishing boats off the coast of Alaska. After six months of extreme cold, he returned to Michigan and eventually wound up at Michigan State where he proceeded to "enjoy myself a little too much."

Boasting a .002 grade point average, Barr left after a year and a half with only a few credit hours. "I learned how to drop classes," said Barr of his short-lived career as a Spartan.

It was only a short while later, while attending Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills that he "got on track" and found that he really enjoyed English. He transferred back to Eastern and graduated with a degree in English.

His steady humor and ability to perform without off-color humor has made him favorite for large corporate clients. Barr has performed at special

events functions for Ford, Chrysler and Hiram Walker as well as a variety of festivals around the state. He has also performed at large comedy clubs around the country including "Catch a Rising Star" in Las Vegas.

In addition to building a steady base of corporate clients for his performances, Barr still spends time writing and attending voice and dance lessons to help his stage performance. All of this is juggled around raising Jessica, a first-grader, as a single father.

"She's great. I couldn't be in a better position to raise her," said Barr.

Even Jessica isn't spared her father's humor, however. Said Barr, "For six years, her name was the No. 1 chosen name for girls... and then Jessica Hahn came along. I guess a good moral scandal has that effect. Maybe that's why you don't find too many Judas' around."

Barr is looking forward to his show this weekend. "It's the first time I've performed around here in a long time. It's nice to be back."

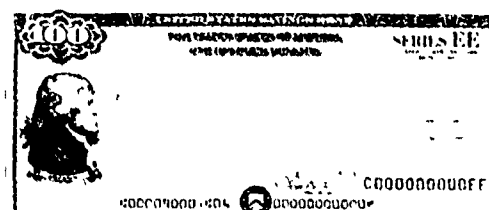

'The Good Son' a chilling tale of hidden evils

Henry Evans (Macaulay Culkin) is a boy with secrets.

On the surface a bright child who is loving to his parents, protective of his sister and loyal to his friends, Henry has a deadly sense of play which would horrify those around him if they knew the thoughts he keeps hidden behind that angelic face.

But what an adult cannot — or will not — see is often visible to another child. When Mark Evans (Elijah Wood), Henry's cousin, comes to live with his relatives following the death of his mother, Mark quickly comes to learn that evil has many faces.

But will anyone believe him?

That's the question in Twentieth Century Fox Presents' "The Good Son," a Joseph Ruben film starring Macaulay Culkin and Elijah Wood. The film is directed by Joseph Ruben, produced by Mary Anne Page and Joseph Ruben, and written by Ian McEwan.

Ruben said one of the most challenging aspects of making the movie was that Culkin, typically sunny and upbeat, plays a character with a horrible dark side. "It helped that Mack does have a very mischievous streak. He loves playing pranks, although nothing as severe as in this movie."

The opportunity to take the audience's perception of Culkin and turn it inside-out was a major lure for Ruben. "If he were playing the good kid, I wouldn't have been nearly as interested," said the director.

Another major lure was his own decision to film the story from a child's perspective, shooting wherever possible from low angles and portraying the action with an amplified sense of fear.

"Everything is heightened when you're a kid; you wake up in the middle of the night and the shadows become monsters," said Ruben. "And, when you're a kid, one of your biggest worries is that you won't be

believed. We take that worry to its extreme — Mark knows what Henry is up to, but no one will listen because what he's accusing Henry of is impossible to believe."

An original screenplay by prominent British novelist Ian McEwan, "The Good Son" came to the attention of producing partners Mary Anne Page and Daniel Rogosin in 1988 and is their first film to be produced for Twentieth Century Fox under a recently signed first-look, two-year overall deal.

Page, who produced the film with Ruben, said the tension of the story lies in the dynamic between the two boys. "Mark is a very trusting child who believes in the power of truth. He wears his heart on his sleeve, making him very vulnerable. Henry does not; Henry hides everything."

In the principal role of Susan Evans, Wendy Crewson (The Doctor) portrays Henry's mother and the one person Mark views as a kindred spirit in the Evans house. But Susan silently carries a huge burden of guilt, believing that the accidental drowning of her youngest child was her fault.

"She can't get out from underneath her guilt about the death of her youngest child," said Crewson of her character. "When she meets Mark, she sees in him the son she has lost, just as Mark sees in her the mother he has lost."

Principal photography for "The Good Son" began in November 1992. Set in Maine, the story takes place principally in and around Henry's home, a large traditional New England house. Finding the ideal structure in the perfect setting proved challenging. Countless homes on the east coast from Maine to Massachusetts were scanned before the perfect house was discovered in the quaint village of Manchester-by-the-Sea on historic Cape Ann in northern Massachusetts.

"It was a wonderful-looking house requiring minimal modifications and was situated in an ideal place — on a small point with the ocean on all three sides," said executive producer Ezra Swerdlow.

Filming was also carried out in many towns surrounding Cape Ann.

For the boys' dramatic climb up to Henry's treehouse, a group of towering trees behind the Evans house location were utilized. A large section of scaffolding was erected to support the film crew and allow the suspenseful sequence to be shot from numerous angles without the use of stunt doubles. By employing a specially-designed pulley system, it was possi-

ble for a hand-held camera to follow the two boys on their 40-foot ascent.

"I wanted to make everything as real as possible in this movie," said Ruben. "Culkin and Wood are both very athletic, gutsy kids and they loved doing it. I was more worried about them on the ground because they were always playing touch football and knocking into each other."

The cliff sequence, the most thrilling sequence in the movie, was shot in Minnesota on Palisade Head, a major scenic attraction created by the eroding waves of Lake Superior. The drop measured 120 feet.

As with the Evans house, the cliff sight was not easily found. The cliff

had to have a combination of height and sheerness, a combination quite unique. It required the ability to look straight down from the edge and see water.

Usually, cliffs are not sheer even though they may look frighteningly steep.

And "frightening" — scaring the movie-goer — is Ruben's goals in "The Good Son."

"I hope this movie gets under people's skin," said Ruben. "I hope it affects them. For a pop thriller, there are some powerful — maybe even controversial — themes at work in this movie."

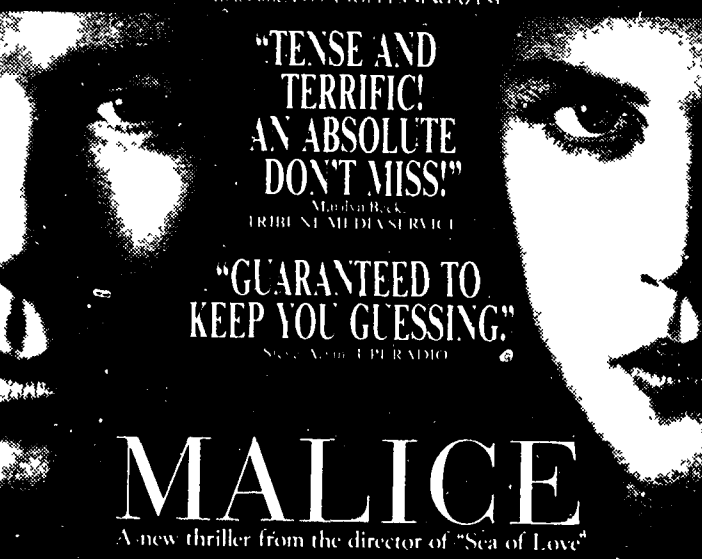

The Mustangs made it 20-0 by the end of the first quarter.

Schumacher said he wanted to get an early lead on Churchill.

The second half went by very quickly," Schumacher said.

Northville was able to add a final touchdown. Jackson scored on a 63-yard run off of a reverse in the third quarter.

Churchill scored its only TD late in the fourth on a 12-play drive.

"They just weren't ready for what we had," said Schumacher.

The Mustangs' dominance showed statistically.

Chuck Apligan had 82 yards rushing while Kersey finished with 41 and Kelley 36. Northville had more than 300 yards on the ground. Golden hit two of five passes for 34 yards in addition.

Livonia had less than 200 yards of total offense.

Justin Cataldo had his best game defensively with nine tackles. Schumacher mentioned defensive linemen Scott Hartsough, Adam Davis and Nick Bowersox as having solid performances as well.

"We played really good defense," the coach said.

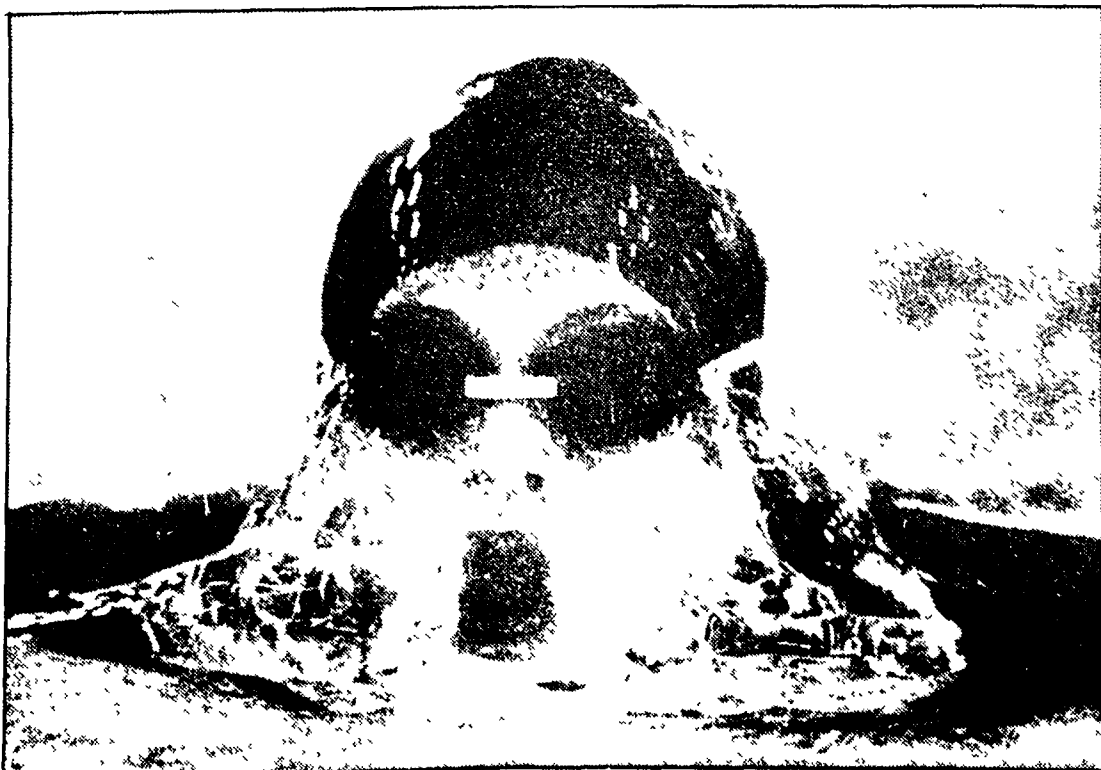
Brown finished first in the 50-yard freestyle by less than a second in 27.22. Carney took a win in diving with 202 points and Amy Christoff was third with 161.8.

Children need positive role models

In the drug and alcohol prevention field, a lot of talk has occurred lately about four resiliency factors that help protect a child against peer pressure and other things that lead to drug or alcohol abuse, gang membership and school failure. These factors are:

- **Social competence:** Does the child have an ability to be flexible, empathize and care about others, communicate easily and keep a sense of humor? If so, these children will have positive relationships with their peers throughout their school career. Individuals who experience problems with crime, delinquency, alcohol/drug abuse and emotional problems consistently lack social competence qualities.
- **Problem-solving skills:** Can the individual think abstractly, reflect back what they've heard, problem-solve at school as well as attempt to find alternative solutions to everyday problems? Studies show that the ability to solve little dilemmas is present during early childhood. Children not able to solve problems are

more likely to have negative consequences in the future.

- **Autonomy:** Does the child have a strong sense of independence, good self-esteem, self-efficacy (getting needs met in an appropriate manner), self-discipline and good impulse control? Can the child act independently when the crowd goes in a direction that may not be the smartest?

Researchers have also identified "the ability to separate oneself from a dysfunctional family environment and to stand away psychologically from the sick parent" as the major characteristic of resilient children growing up in families with alcoholism.

If the child can clearly distinguish between themselves and their own experiences and their parents' illness, the "opportunity" for them to repeat the cycle is less likely, and helps them realize that they are not the cause.

- **Sense of purpose/future:** Does the child believe he or she has some control over his or her life? Children who do also have personal goals for themselves, a success orientation, achievement motivation, educational aspirations, persistence, confidence that their life is predictable (things will probably work out as well as can be expected), hopefulness and a sense of anticipation about their future.

In Judith Brook's book "Influences on Ado-

lescent Drug Involvement," she notes an adolescent with a high achievement orientation has a protective influence to offset the effects of alcohol use by peers.

In summary, the protective characteristics that can offset the abuse of alcohol and drugs can be summarized into three categories: (1) care and support, (2) high expectations, and (3) opportunities for children to participate.

Can we as parents make the difference? You bet! One parent alone can make the difference. Here's something you can do: Be a confident and positive role model to your children; convey clear expectations and beliefs to your children; give them the support they need in all situations; let them take responsibility for their own actions; treat them as responsible, bright and capable young people; involve them in meaningful activities and roles (those involving problem-solving, decision-making, planning, goal-setting, and helping others).

These things can help determine whether a child gets involved in life-compromising problems such as school failure, gangs, or substance abuse.

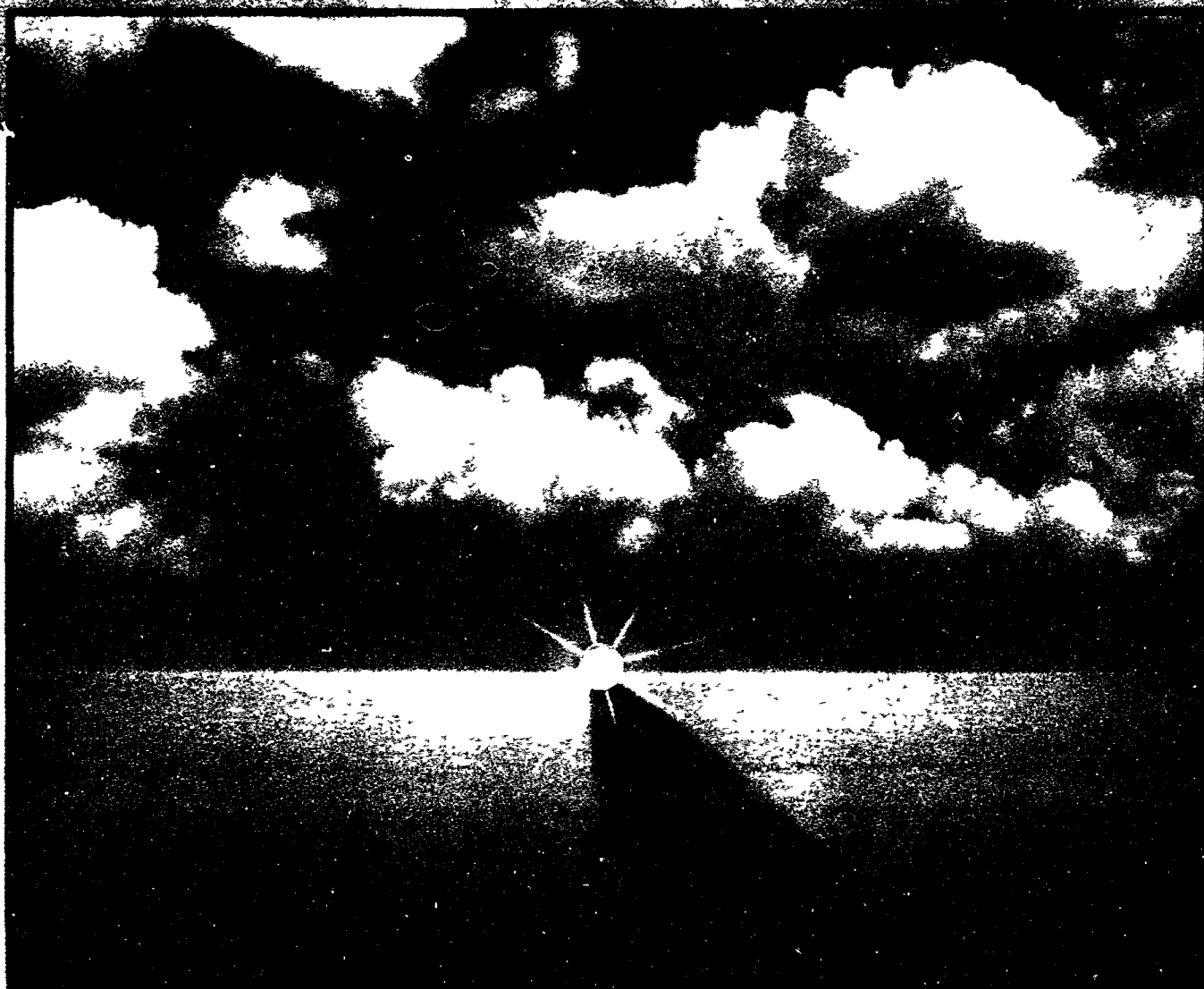

In rats, a significantly higher incidence of hepatocellular tumors (combined adenomas and carcinomas) was observed in males given 10 mg/kg and males and females given 25 mg/kg. The clinical significance of these findings during long-term use of CLARITIN Tablets is not known.

In mutagenicity studies, there was no evidence of mutagenic potential in reverse (AMES) or forward point mutation (CHO-HGPRT) assays, or in the assay for DNA damage (Rat Primary Hepatocyte Unscheduled DNA Assay) or in two assays for chromosomal aberrations (Human Peripheral Blood Lymphocyte Clastogenic Assay and the Mouse Bone Marrow Erythrocyte Micronucleus Assay). In the Mouse Lymphoma Assay, a positive finding occurred in the non-activated but not the activated phase of the study.

Loratadine administration produced hepatic microsomal enzyme induction in the mouse at 40 mg/kg and rat at 25 mg/kg, but not at lower doses.

Decreased fertility in male rats shown by lower female conception rates occurred at approximately 64 mg/kg and was reversible with cessation of dosing. Loratadine had no effect on male or female fertility or reproduction in the rat at doses of approximately 24 mg/kg.

Pregnancy Category B: There was no evidence of animal teratogenicity in studies performed in rats and rabbits. There are, however, no adequate and well-controlled studies in pregnant women. Because animal reproduction studies are not always predictive of human response, CLARITIN Tablets should be used during pregnancy only if clearly needed.

Nursing Mothers: Loratadine and its metabolite, descarboxylorloratadine, pass easily into breast milk and achieve concentrations that are equivalent to plasma levels with an AUC₀₋₁₂/AUC₀₋₁₂ ratio of 1.17 and 0.85 for the parent and active metabolite, respectively. Adverse event rates did not appear to differ significantly based on age, sex, or race although the number of non-white subjects was relatively small.

In addition to those adverse events reported above, the following adverse events have been reported in 2% or fewer patients: Autonomic Nervous System: Altered salivation, increased sweating, altered lacrimation, hyposensitivity, impotence, thirst, flushing.

Body As A Whole: Conjunctivitis, blurred vision, earache, eye pain, brucellosis, asthenia, weight gain, back pain, leg cramps, malaise, chest pain, rigors, fever, aggravated allergy, upper respiratory infection, angioneurotic edema.

Cardiovascular System: Hypotension, hypertension, palpitations, syncope, tachycardia.

OVERDOSAGE

Somnolence, tachycardia, and headache have been reported with overdoses greater than 10 mg (40 to 180 mg). In the event of over dosage, general symptomatic and supportive measures should be instituted promptly and maintained for as long as necessary.

Treatment of overdosage would reasonably consist of emesis (ipecac syrup), except in patients with impaired consciousness, followed by the administration of activated charcoal to absorb any remaining drug. If vomiting is unsuccessful or contraindicated, gastric lavage should be performed with normal saline. Saline cathartics may also be of value for rapid dilution of bowel contents. Loratadine is not eliminated by hemodialysis. It is not known if loratadine is eliminated by peritoneal dialysis.

Oral LD₅₀ values for loratadine were greater than 5000 mg/kg in rats and mice. Doses as high as 10 times the recommended clinical doses showed no effects in rats, mice, and monkeys.

Partnering workshops help solve construction snags

Major construction projects — residential, commercial or public agency projects — are infamous for the problems that emerge with the team players. General contractors fight with subcontractors, engineers trade barbs with the architect.

The problems usually stem from a lack of cooperation and positive communications between the participating individuals and firms involved in the working team. And that results in the loss of productive time and money.

A new concept called "partnering" is being implemented throughout the country to minimize those problems from the beginning of a new project. It's an innovative method of smoothing

out wrinkles in a major construction project before they appear. The process works surprisingly well in many cases.

The process involves facilitated workshop sessions lasting a day or two. All key players in a planned construction project participate, candidly discussing their role, how it relates to others and expressing ideas that could result in a more successful construction process.

These participants usually include the sponsoring agency or developer, the prime (general) contractor, subcontractor firms, engineers, etc. They are all potential team players — or potential adversaries.

The objective of the partnering workshops is to show how all stakeholder participants can work

The Ascot's tudor styling gives complete image

Brick walls and half-timbering in the gables would be enough to establish the Ascot's Tudor styling. But massive medieval chimneys, ribbons of small-pane windows and an oriel window at center on the second floor complete the image.

Once inside, you're clearly in the '90s. A large kitchen packed with modern conveniences is at the heart of the Ascot. Features include double ovens, microwave, dishwasher, walk-in pantry, and an island with a cook top and grill. Breakfast in the sunny octagonal nook starts your day on a cheerful note.

Formal dining takes place in the spacious vaulted dining room. A second-floor balcony overlooks this bright space and French doors open onto a dining deck.

The elegant lobby also is vaulted. Stairs lead to a second-floor landing with a railed balcony facing the entrance. A small den or office is to the left and a stately vaulted living room with fireplace is to the right.

Stairs in the lobby aren't the only access to the second floor. Another staircase is in the family room. Basement stairs are below, accessible from a unique octagonal hub, open to the kitchen, garage, utility room, powder room and master suite, all at the same time.

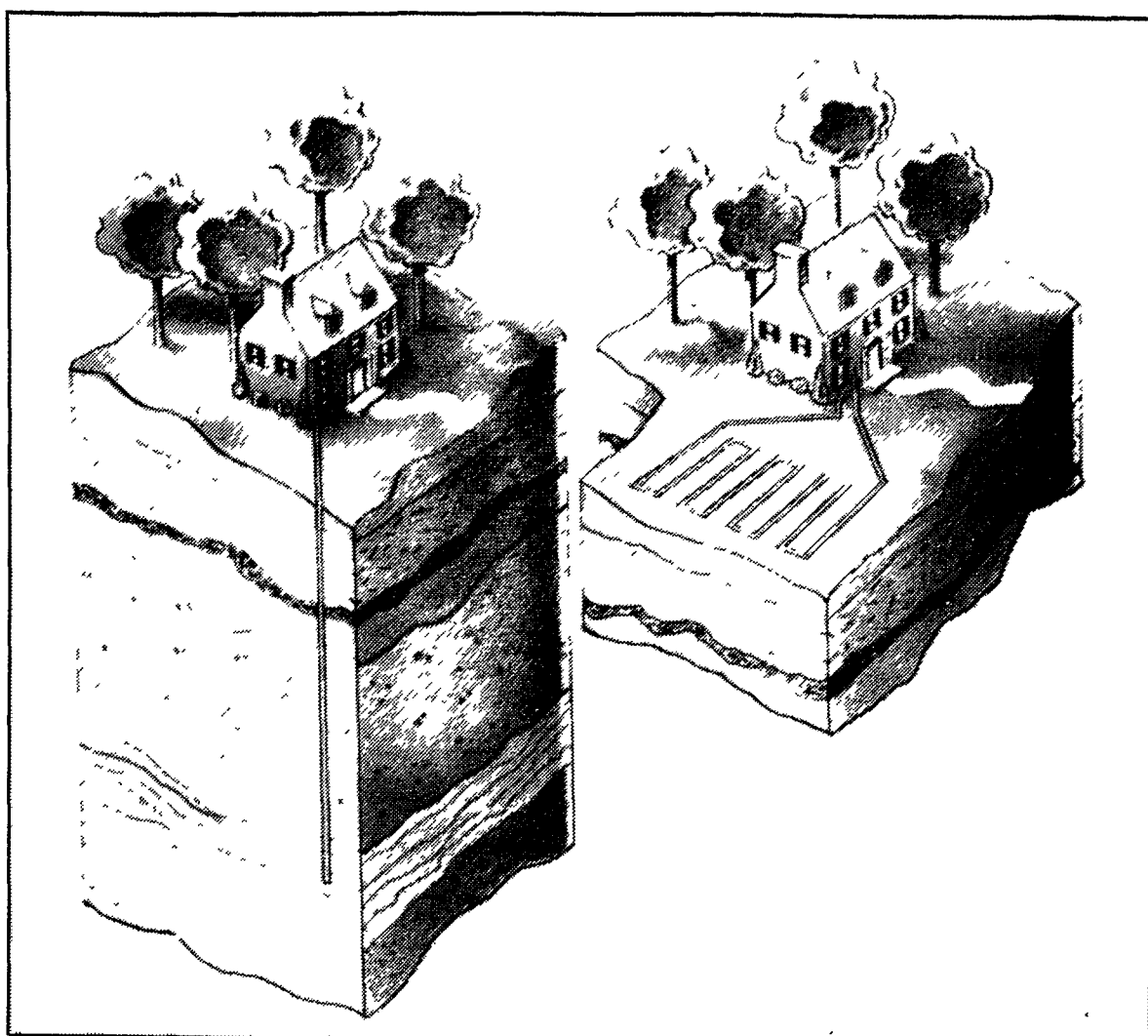
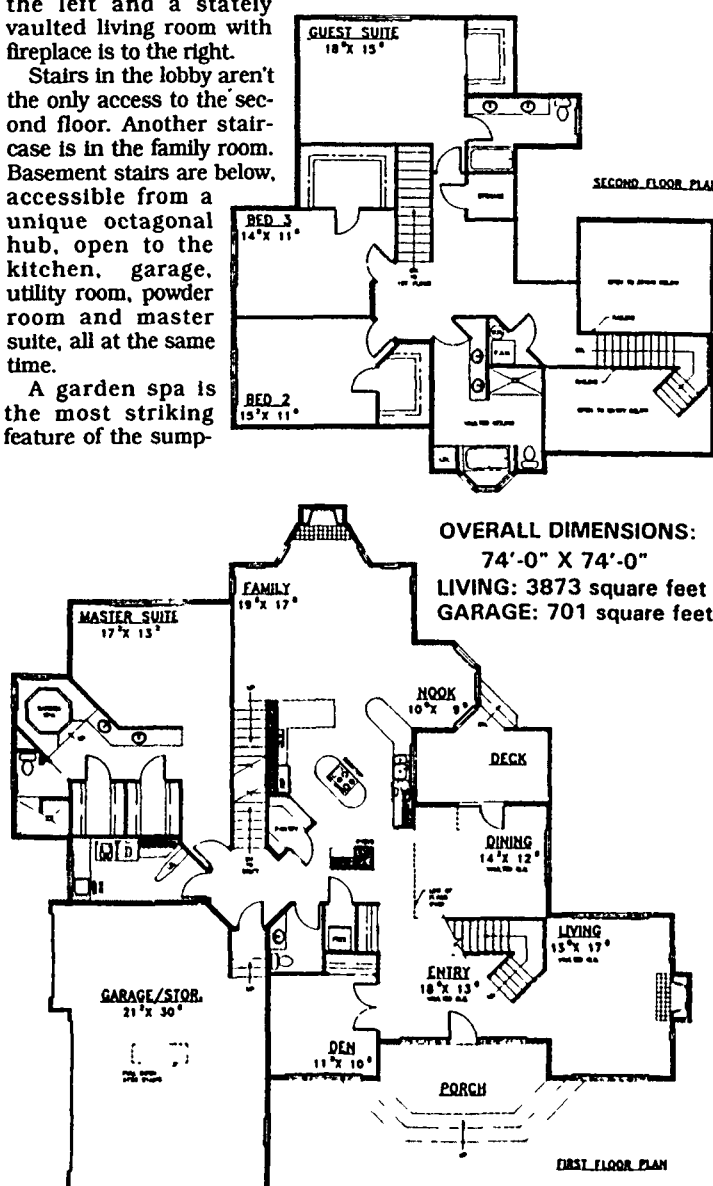
A garden spa is the most striking feature of the sump-

tuous owners' suite. Tropical plants will thrive in this moist, bright environment. Other amenities include an enclosed toilet and oversize shower, his and hers walk-in closets and twin basins in an extra-long vanity.

Storage space and three more bedrooms are upstairs. Each has a large walk-in closet. The back bedroom is intended for use as a guest suite, but could be a den or office. It is larger and has a private bath with two basins.

Occupants of the other two bedrooms will have to share a bathroom — but what a bathroom! How luxurious it feels to bathe in a tub nestled into the nook created by the diamond-pane windows in the oriel-style projection.

This cross section illustrates open and closed loop geothermal systems. Open loops use ground water pumped from a well. After the heat transfer is made, the water is discharged to seep back down to the water table. Closed loops circulate an antifreeze solution through polyethylene pipe. The solution absorbs or disperses heat, pending upon the season. Closed loops can be buried in the ground or submerged in a lake or pond.

GEO THERMAL

If you're building a home, the law requires that you install a furnace with a minimum 78-percent efficiency rate. But if you want maximum savings, you don't have to settle for minimum efficiency.

Geothermal heating and cooling — the technology on the threshold of replacing conventional systems — is more than three times as efficient as the most efficient oil or gas furnace.

"This results in substantial savings for homeowners over the lifetime of the equipment," said Jerry Goetz, a Detroit Edison heating and cooling expert.

In the air conditioning mode, the system performs at a seasonal efficiency rating of 16; federal law requires a minimum of 10 for air conditioning.

Operating costs are up to 30 percent less than those of a high-efficiency natural gas system, and up to 60 percent less than those for high-efficiency oil or propane systems, when used in conjunction with Detroit Edi-

son's low time-of-day rate, according to Goetz.

"Homeowners in a well-insulated 2,400-square foot home could expect to pay \$527 annually to operate a geothermal system, compared to \$801 for natural gas, \$1,315 for oil or \$1,420 for propane," Goetz said.

Geothermal, like refrigerators and conventional air conditioners, is a heat transfer system. The system uses an electrically powered heat pump to collect and concentrate heat from the water in your well or from piping buried in the ground.

In the winter, the concentrated heat is transferred indoors through a forced-air heating system, Goetz explained. In the summer, the system reverses the cycle. It extracts heat from the air inside the home and moves it, via the well water or piping buried in the ground, back into the earth. The earth's temperature remains constant year-round. The system also can supply hot water.

"Since geothermal systems use the earth's natural resources as a renewable source of energy, they help protect the environment,"

Goetz said.

The initial installation costs for a geothermal system are typically higher than those of a conventional furnace or central air conditioner, he added.

"But with the low operating costs, combined with Detroit Edison's low time-of-day rate, the payback period can be from 2 to 10 years," Goetz said.

Goetz said that homeowners who qualify for Detroit Edison's Energy Efficient New Home Construction Program can close that gap. The program offers up to \$3,400 in cash incentives for energy-efficient insulation, windows, lighting, major electric appliances and central air conditioning.

The geothermal technology will be displayed at an open house in Howell, October 2-3, and at the Horizon of Homes home show in Mayfield Township near Lapeer, September 24 - October 10. For more information, call Detroit Edison at 1-800-833-2786.

Attracting bug-eaters

GARDENING

Not all birds and insects are unwanted pests in your yard and garden. Among them voracious bug-eaters abound.

When attracting and maintaining populations of beneficial birds and insects, it's important to minimize use of pesticides. Provide appropriate conditions of food, shelter, nesting material and water to encourage insect-eating birds.

In rural areas, chickens, guineas and other domestic fowl can be allowed to eat grubs and insects in the garden.

• Plant bushes and trees that bear edible fruits. Provide seed in feeders throughout the year.

• Add a birdbath to your garden. After all, everyone loves to bathe.

• Install birdhouses designed for beneficial species. Consult the Audubon Society or The National Wildlife Federation for publications on attracting birds to your garden and for birdhouse plans.

• Use alternative ground covers instead of lawn grasses, and don't rake the area clean. The leaves that build up under the groundcover plants and under shrubs provide an excellent hunting ground for

birds that feed on worms and insects.

• Vary vegetation heights to accommodate birds with different feeding and nesting-level preferences.

• Drive stakes 3 to 5 inches above ground level in and around your garden to serve as perches for flying insect predators, such as phoebes.

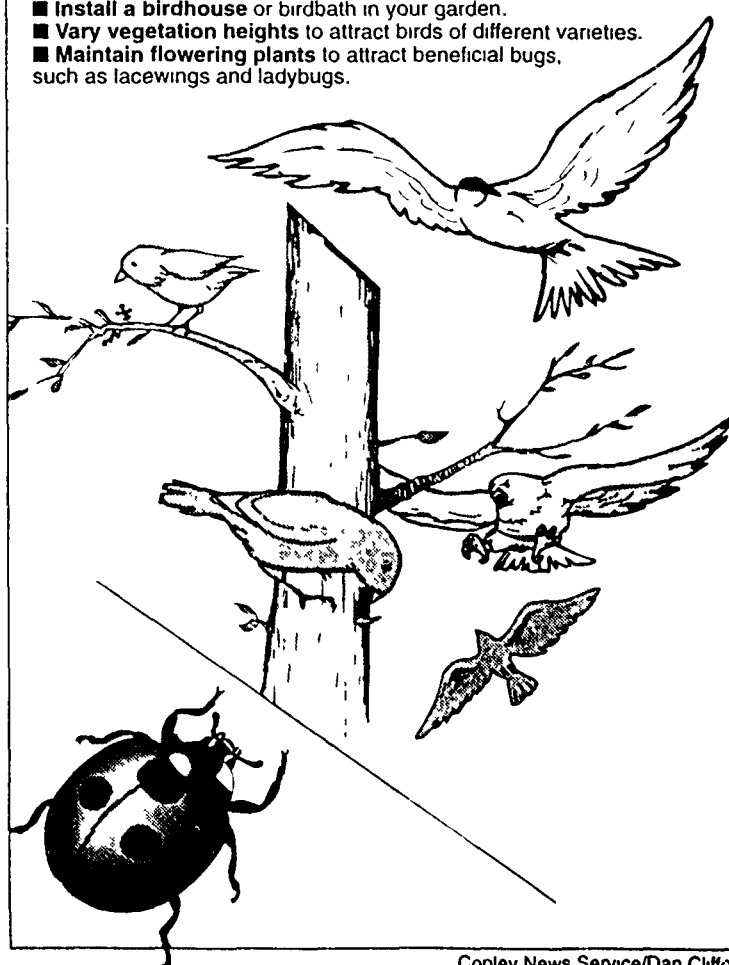
By conserving a population of beneficial insects, you help support a naturally occurring pest-maintenance program in your garden. Tiny parasitic wasps are aggressive beyond their size when it comes to pursuing aphids and caterpillars. Lacewing larvae, ladybug larvae and adults make inroads on aphid populations. Ground beetles prey on a variety of ground-dwelling pests.

These various beneficial insects consume large numbers of pest insects, but their diets are not limited to other insects. In fact, many of the beneficial species have periods in their life cycles during which they survive only on nectar and pollen.

Therefore, a little planning for insects can pay off. Planting a variety of flowering plants, especially those of the

Beneficial bug-eaters

- Plant fruit-bearing bushes and trees to attract insect-eating birds.
- Install a birdhouse or birdbath in your garden.
- Vary vegetation heights to attract birds of different varieties.
- Maintain flowering plants to attract beneficial bugs, such as lacewings and ladybugs.

Silencing 'singing' pipes; cleaning throw rug stain

Q. The pipes in my home seem to be "singing" loudly. This happens when the faucets are turned on, the washing machine is going and even sometimes when the sprinklers on the hill behind the house are on. Sometimes it seems that the pipes actually shake.

A. My neighbor said that this is caused by air in the pipes and all I have to do is bleed the pipes, and that this is something I can do myself. I am not sure what this means. I am a widow living

alone without much plumbing knowledge. Can you tell me what causes this noise and how to go about fixing the problem? I don't want to hire someone to do it if it is something I can do myself.

A. Your problem is probably more complicated than just "bleeding" the air out of the pipes. However, you can try this as a remedy. Simply open all of the faucets simultaneously just enough to assure that water is running through each tap. If you hear a sputtering of air, wait until this clears and the water runs freely. Then close down each faucet.

HERE'S HOW

Include outdoor faucets as well as indoor. It will be helpful to get someone to assist you.

In a municipal pressurized system it is doubtful that this is your problem. If you hear banging when the water shuts off, it is probably water hammer. A back-pressure noise occurs in some pipes or fixtures when rapidly moving water is suddenly stopped. Worn washers can also cause noise problems.

Water under moderate pressure flowing across a loose washer will cause it to rattle. If the problem is

the washers, an inspection of the system and tightening or replacement of faulty washers will correct the problem.

If the problem is water hammer, it is possible that you need to install air chambers in the supply lines. An air chamber is a device that acts as a muffler, absorbing the water shock with a column of air. Some air chambers are simple sections of capped pipe 12 to 18 inches long, installed vertically at the ends of supply lines near fixtures or inside walls.

Special tank-like chambers containing rubber bladders to hold the air are also available at some

plumbing supply stores and are fairly simple to install. A single chamber to cover the entire plumbing system also can be installed in the main water-supply line. You may already have air chambers in the system, but they can become faulty if they become waterlogged.

Your best bet would be to have a reputable plumber check out the system and find the cause of the problem. Although this project is not beyond the capability of a do-it-yourselfer with basic maintenance and plumbing skills, it does not sound like it is a problem you

will be able to handle by yourself.

Q. I bought a rubber-backed throw rug to use on my kitchen's vinyl floor, but it left a yellow stain that I can't scrub off. What will remove this stain?

A. The stain is caused by a chemical reaction between the backing on the rug and the wear layer of the flooring. I'm afraid it may be permanent.

together successfully as cooperating team partners. It's a way to start the project with a prevailing spirit of cooperation and positive communications among all players, thus greatly enhancing the chances for overall project success.

"It sure beats the costly and frustrating situation of working in a group where each individual or firm considers the others to be adversaries," said James Eisenhart, president of a firm specializing in producing partnering workshops. "And during tight-money periods, it's particularly important that projects progress in a smooth and cost-effective manner — and

on schedule."

An example of a recent partnering workshop focused on a new freeway interchange construction project. The \$10 million, 17-month project involves the realignment of the freeway interchange, including a new bridge and ramps.

The 24 workshop participants met for a one-day session. Eisenhart planned the session and served as facilitator.

"I thought the partnering session went very well," said Everett Millais, director of community services for the city in which the interchange was located and one of the workshop participants. "It starts us all off on the right foot on this major project."

Millais noted that this was the second

partnering session involving his city, the first being a \$3 million project.

"The first session was not totally successful. We had some problems along the way. But overall the workshop was well worth the time, effort and cost. I think this project is starting out better. Our city will probably start all major construction projects in the future with a partnering workshop."

Mark Watkins, senior construction engineer for the city also left the workshop with a positive view of its effectiveness.

"It removes a lot of potential stumbling blocks at the start, making everyone aware of other players' concerns," Watkins said. "It's a win-win situation—a method that will help produce a smoothly progressing project that will make more money for everyone involved."

The cost of the one-day part-

nering workshop was \$2,000, equally shared by the city and general contractor.

While conducting a workshop, Eisenhart goes through a variety of exercises with participants to keep everyone focused on the subject under discussion. Some are lighter than others, like the "games we play" exercise.

The purpose of this exercise is to identify those games that are played during projects when people are not engaging in open and honest communications. Here are a few quotes from participants in past workshops related to construction projects:

- "They (drivers) will never know the difference at 55 miles per hour."
- "Go ahead and sue. We've got two floors full of attorneys."
- "I don't know how that 'Made in India' tag got on this piece of pipe."
- "I assume you've done this work just

for practice."

The partnering concept was the subject of a recent survey conducted by the Western Council of Construction Consumers.

Ninety percent of respondents thought projects started with a partnering session turned out better than those without such a session.

Also, 90 percent said they learned some new innovative ideas from the workshops. And 80 percent thought the sessions prevented many players from taking advantage of others.

Eisenhart has so far planned and facilitated 63 partnering workshops over the past three years.

family umbelliferae (caraway, coriander, parsley, Queen Anne's lace and dill) will ensure an adequate supply of nutrients to keep beneficial insects healthy.

Some plants also provide shelter for beneficial insects, another critical requirement.

It's also possible to control mosquitoes naturally:

- If you have a pond for water plants, maintain a collection of goldfish or frogs to devour mosquito larvae.
- Install a bat house to attract bats that will control mosquitoes and other night-flying insects. Guess what, six to eight bats are all you'll need—bats will consume 10,000 flying insects each night!

Q. I have some aloe plants, and they look as if they are trying to die. I don't know what to do for them, when to fertilize, and how many times to water a week.

A. Somebody told me not to water often, but if I don't water them, it looks like the plants are dying. I can't find anyone that can tell me anything about aloe. Can you please help me out?

A. This succulent ought to be cultivated in every household since it's extremely easy to grow under ordinary house conditions. Further-

more, it's useful. When a leaf is broken off, the gelatinous pulp that oozes from it is the perfect treatment for skin burns.

While the aloe plant can take all the sun you can give it outdoors in winter, be careful if you move it outdoors in warm weather because all-day sun can burn unsightly spots on the leaves.

- Light: ideal is a sunny east, south or west window, will survive in a northern light.

- Potting soil: A cactus mixture is a must!

- Watering needs: Water well; one hour later pour off any excess that has collected in the saucer. Water again when the soil surface feels nearly dry.

- Problems: Soggy, wet, poorly drained soil, especially in winter, is likely to cause roots to rot. Fertilize with an all-purpose plant food, following directions on the container. Use standard clay or plastic pots; root offsets in any season.

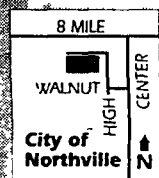

A new version of a Jacobean wainscot chair

Q. Enclosed is a photo of a chair I bought at an auction. It looks like it is made of oak and has been refinished.

I would appreciate any information you can provide on this piece.

A. This is a relatively modern version of a 17th century Jacobean wainscot chair.

Originally, the word wainscot was used for the oak planks used in the Middle Ages for the construction of wagons or wains. Eventually, the word also was used for paneled chairs and walls. The wooden arms and seat, along with the paneled back and carving are typical of this style.

Your chair was made around 1900. It would probably be worth around \$400 to \$500 in good condition.

Q. I have a Rookwood vase that is 6 inches tall. It is marked with a reversed "R" placed back to back with the letter up... which is surrounded by flame points. Beneath the mark are the Roman numerals "XI" and the letters "C.S.T."

The vase is a soft blue-green with violet flowers. I think it has a matte finish.

Since I would like to sell it, I won-

der if you might help me price my vase?

A. Rookwood Pottery was founded in 1880 by Maria Longworth Nichols in Cincinnati, Ohio. Rookwood was the name of her family estate.

Many of her designs were Japanese inspired. The flame mark was first used in 1886. One flame point was added around the mark for each year.

After 1900, the firm added a Roman numeral beneath the mark, which represented the last two digits of the year of production.

C.S.T. are the initials of the decorator, Charles Stewart Todd.

Since the vase is marked XI, it was made in 1911. Your Rookwood vase is probably worth about \$165 to \$185 in good condition.

Q. I received a pair of opera binoculars from my grandmother that have been in the family for a long time. The case is of leather, has brass trim on the outside, and has a purple silk lining.

The binoculars are made of mother-of-pearl, have brass trim and are marked with the words "Lemaire F1 Paris."

When were they made, and do

they have any value?

A. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, when attending the opera and theater, it was fashionable to use small binoculars known as opera glasses. They frequently were decorated with mother-of-pearl.

Your opera glasses were made in France sometime between the late 1800s to the early 1900s. They would be valued around \$75 to \$85.

Q. The enclosed mark is on the bottom of a creamer and sugar bowl that I have. It is decorated with pink roses, green leaves and gold trim.

Could you please tell me their value, where and when they were made?

A. Your creamer and sugar bowl were made by Richard Eckert & Co. in Volkstedt, Thuringia, Germany. The mark indicates they were manufactured around 1900.

This firm has had various names and owners. It is still operating and is presently known as Oldest Volkstedt Porcelain Manufactory.

Your creamer and sugar bowl set is probably worth about \$100 to \$125.
