

### Emotions high at special meeting By MICHELLE HARRISON and STEVE KELLMAN Skinheads vs. blacks. Jocks vs. freaks. Us vs. them. This isn't the type of competition Northville expects among its high school students. But such confrontations apparently have become more common in the corridors of 775 North Center.

School officials took steps to quell the growing dissension last week at a special session in the high school's

More than 50 students began to hash out their differences at the Thursday afternoon session, designed to address racial and cultural intolerance and foster greater communication between peer groups. Students shouted and some cried as they grappled with past taunts, racial slurs and shoving matches that have threatened to divide the school.

The session was in preparation for Nov. 9 school-wide address by Jim Tuman, a student mediator of sorts whose business card identifies him as a national speaker and director of the Royal Oak-based Positive School Support Program. Tuman stopped by last week to hear some of the concerns being expressed by Northville students and tailor his Nov. 9 ad dress accordingly.

Thursday's session began at 1

p.m. as Assistant Principal Ralph Redmond asked students for their comments but admonished them to keep their remarks positive.

\*Primarily you are here and that says a lot for Northville High School," Redmond said. "I think if you are here, you are here because you are concerned. We welcome you and we want to hear what you have to say."

After a few moments of nervous hesitation, Meghan Cross held her hand up to ask the first question. She addressed it to the four students with shaved heads in the front row that she called "skinheads." According to students, some skinheads believe in the superiority of white people over others, particularly blacks.

"Why don't you tell us why you chose that path?" Cross asked.

Silence filled the room. \*Can't any of you talk?" she asked,

demanding an answer. "I don't believe everyone is equal," Jason DeSiro, one of the four, said

Brian McMillan, seated next to De-Siro, was less reserved with his comments when asked why he had a problem with black students at the

"I don't like them because of their color and because they're a-holes."

The remark caused a stir as one black student sitting only a few chairs away jumped to his feet.

Because we're what? he asked. Before the confrontation could turn physical. Tuman jumped in and told the students of his own youth as a gang member in a New York City school. He asked the students to analyze the exchange that had just taken place, and urged them to express their feelings and emotions without resorting to labels and without building up walls between each

"It's really tough when you start to divide up a school, and start pointing fingers and forming factions, to feel safe," he warned. "You've either got to figure out how to make it work, or you're going to have war in the school."

The exchange then took a twist, the topic changing from race to other labels placed on students.

# Detroit teen behind soured burglary, police say

A 16 year-old Detroit youth allegedly masterminded a foiled burglary that led Northville Township Police to a Pierson Road home early Thursday morning.

a heated exchange at Thursday's discussion.

The youth was helping a pair of men from Detroit and Farmington Hills steal stereo equipment from the Northville home when a township patrol car pulled into the driveway n a.m.

Township Detective John Werth said the 16-year-old and the 17-year-old Detroit man were in the process of replacing the screen on

the window they just crawled through to steal the stereo components from the home when police arrived.

The 23-year-old Farmington Hills man was in the garage attempting to steal two more radios when he dropped them and fled. The other two suspects also fled the scene. leaving behind the 1991 Mercury Cougar they'd used to pack the stolen merchandise.

The car's keys were left dangling in the trunk lock.

The officer, Bill Helke, got a glimpse of the suspects before he ordered them to stop, to no avail.

He then went inside the home to talk to the

woman who had called the station to report the suspicious noises she'd heard outside the home. Police found the point of entry and recorded the serial numbers of the stereo and television equipment that had been taken from the home.

They also impounded the car with a compact disc player, stereo receiver, pocket-size television, record player and double cassette player stored inside.

Later that morning, Sgt. Raymond Garbarino was on patrol when he noticed a suspicious looking man in the Meijer lobby near the pay phone. The man matched the description of one of the three suspects the midnight shift had reported being involved in

The sergeant approached the man and told him he matched the description of the suspect involved in the earlier crime. He was transported back the station around 7:30

Werth said interviews with the man and a phone number left illuminated on his pager led police to the Detroit homes of the other two suspects. The detective called the 17 year-old at home who eventually came to the station with his father to answer the charge.

The juvenile was apprehended at a party store in Detroit around 6 p.m. by police in the

8th Precinct. He was transported to Northville Township and held there until he was released to a juvenile home later that night, Werth said.

The detective said the other two men were released pending warrants which should come from the prosecutor's office today or

\*Our midnight officers did an excellent job and were very diligent in apprehending the subject," Werth said. "With their quick response and good police work a (suspect) was apprehended.

# Board delays acting on legal, car policies

In spite of all the hue and cry raised last week about Northville Township's legal bills and the debut of a vehicle-use policy, trustees had little to say about either agenda item Thursday night.

The board was expected to discuss both an attorney-use policy and a new-vehicle-use regulation, but opted instead to table talk on both issues until an Oct. 28 study session.

The proposed attorney-use policy would have limited township employees' and elected officials' access to the attorney while the vehicle-use policy sought to inventory the township's fleet and park the supervisor's township-owned car.

Neither policy got a reading Thurs-

day night. Instead both were tabled abruptly without no reason given by


Even though trustees shelved the policies, handling the township's \$183,000 legal bill fueled plenty of discussion.

It was Township Supervisor Karen Baja who broached the idea of having Township Attorney Leonard Krzyzaniak meet with the board to discuss the billings.

The supervisor said scheduling a meeting was the "polite" way to handle the situation and end the dispute over the legal bill question raised by Township Clerk Sue Hillebrand last week.

But while the clerk realized the magnitude of ending the dispute she

# Hearing focuses on future of city library

The first of two public hearings on the future of Northville's library services drew a sparse crowd to Northville Townshhip Hall Wednesday night

But the few who showed were treated to a primer on library services and a series of graphs a la Ross Perot depicting why Northvill 's level of service does not measure up to surrounding communities.

The Northville District Public Library Board, which is sponsoring the hearings, hopes to gather public opinion on its plan to seek voter approval of between 1-2 mills to fund the operation and possibly construction of a new library. The board is eye-

City Hall as the best location for a new 25,000 square-foot facility

The current library, in the lower level of city hall, measures just over 6,000 square feet.

Library Director Pat Orr. just back from two days in Lansing at a Michigan Library Association conference. noted that facilities across the state fear losing major funding sources from state aid to local appropriations. Northville's own sharedservice-funded facility is seeking district library status to guarantee it a dedicated voter-approved millage that would not be subject to the whims of township and city budgetcutters.

For the past several years, Orr noted, her library has seen its budget requests slashed and has been

ing a site on Cady behind Northville forced to cut its book budget and service hours in response. She demonstrated how Northville residents have increasingly turned to other libraries for their needs. While 77 percent of the 147,000 items checked out by Northville residents in 1989 were checked out of the Northyalle Public Library, that figure had dropped to 54 percent in 1992 while the number of materials checked out jumped to

171.000. When this much is happening outside your library. It tells you that your library is not meeting your needs,\* she said

The community's outlay for library services is far below its neighbors'. Orr added While the residents of Livonia, Farmington, Canton, Plymouth and Novi each contribute over \$33 annually to fund their libraries.

Northville's per capita contribution is \$15 66.

Orr also made some promises if voters do approve a district library millage next year, even if it's just for operating expenses alone. We will provide seven day a week access. We will provide more programs for children and young adults and senior citizens . . . We will buy enough books so that we won't have to limit insect books to one book per child when your seventh grader has a report due, she said

Wendy Gutowski, who heads the site committee that examined several sites before settling on West Cady. presented a revised conceptual drawing drafted by Northville resident and architect Ron Cieslak of



down from him what made a person a freak." One of the three, Marc Golden, dressed in a varsity jacket and basebali cap, said a freak was anyone who dressed or acted differently.

"So if I decide to start wearing a sweater and Jeans and Nikes or deck shoes to school every day for a month, am I not a freak anymore?" Galan asked.

Aaron Boyle, who labled himself as a freak, said the label didn't bother him as much as athletes picking on him just because of his appearance.

"It's really tough when you start to divide up a school, and start pointing fingers and forming factions, to feel safe."

"If you trap someone in a corner and call them 'freak, freak, freak,' you're being rude to people and you can do it, well, because you're big enough to," he said. "I don't care (what you call me). I'm a freak. You're a Jock. That's cool."

Tuman asked if anyone in the group would change his clothing styles for another person. The students responded with a resounding

Channan Chase, a black student. said it made her sad to listen to the comments from some of her

Just sitting here listening to this is the sadest thing in my life," said Chase, her voice choked with emotion, as she addressed the four students with shaved heads sitting in front of her. "I get along with just about everyone I meet, and for you guys to say you don't like black people. how wrong can you be . . . I feel sorry for you guys. You're the ones who are losing out because you're missing out on people."

Tuman asked the assembly to acknowledge the emotion in Chase's voice and the pain it expressed.

"That type of pain comes from really deep," he said.

Several speakers agreed that everyone was entitled to his or her own opinion, however offensive, but they said students crossed the line when they verbally or physically at-tacked others because of their race or choice of dress.

Others urged their classmates to ignore differences altogether and to accept each other as human beings.

"I just wish you could all respect each other and know that we're all different," said Cross, who is of Asian descent.

"I'm not a freak. I'm not a jock. I'm

Alexis, added Alexis Raney.
Al Qualman, president of A Community Organization Recognizing Diversity (ACORD), told the group he was surprised by the level of hostility

"A lot of people in this community see a lot of merit coming from this high school," he said. "They see a lot of awards. I don't think they're aware of the undercurrents going on here.

## Mixed emotions follow meeting

Students left Thursday's emotional cultural diversity session at Northville High School with mixed feelings, agreeing that the discussion helped air grievances but wondering

whether any good would result.

The meeting, held to make student speaker Jim Tuman aware of the school's unique ethnic blend and cultural tensions before he addressed the entire student body Nov. 9, resulted in accusations of racism, classism and several other -isms among the students.

Student Waldo Golan, sporting muttonchop sideburns and a purple shirt, noted that he's been confronted about his appearance by other students. "I get called a freak." he said. Twe been pushed into lockers once or twice. It's offensive when someone calls me a freak."

Galan, said everyone has a right to his opinion, but added that it shouldn't be forced upon others.

Who's to judge?" he asked. "I thought the meeting itself was a great idea and the speaker was great. but as far as productivity it accomplished nothing," said sophomore Pat McKinnie. People left the room more divided than ever before."

McKinnle himself was seen in the hallways after the meeting kicking a locker in frustration after an argument in the hall with Jeff Williams. one of the students identified as a "skinhead" and white supremacist. Williams wore a confederate flag bandana over his shaved head during the meeting but ducked most questions about his own racial beliefs.

McKinnie suggested that future cultural diversity meetings tackle tensions at the school from two fronts, one more serious than the other in his mind.



The freak problem is stupid and ignorant and can be changed, but the racism problem is stupid and ignorant and I don't know how it can be changed," he said.

If nothing else, McKinnie said, at least the entire school is aware of the tensions among students and can begin to deal with them.

"It's shocking that people think their school is perfect," he said. "Now everyone's aware of it . . . You can pretty much tell when there's a Nazi in front of you, or a white

Meghan Cross, whose Asian background makes her the member of a minority at the high school, has decided to take a stand against intolerance in general and is heading up a new student wing of ACORD (A Community Organization Recognizing Diversity). The first meeting is set for 2:10 p.m. Nov. 10 at the high school.

Cross hopes that the group can become a forum to address cultural and peer group differences in a more constructive way than they have been addressed in the past.

"It will be different people coming together to work out their differences in a non-violent way," she said.

# School officials see forum as a first step toward healing

Northville High School Principal Dr. Thomas Johnson hopes Thursday's student forum on intolerance was enough of an ice-breaker to cool down cultural tensions that threaten to boil over at his school.

More than 50 students selected by parents and staff members were invited to the sometimes-heated forum, which was called to address racial and cultural intolerance among the students. Those in attendance were encouraged to ask questions and share feelings about what was happening in the hallways, and they made ample use of the

Also present at the forum were several staff members, administrators and Jim Tuman, a troubleshooter of sorts when it comes to building harmony in high schools around the world. Tuman will return to the school Nov. 9 to address the entire student body.

You need to create a forum where people can vent and get their frustrations out without fear of retaliation," Johnson said after the hour-long forum was finished.

"When we started, I think we realized the first meeting would never be perfect," he said. This was the icebreaker. At the next meeting, hopefully we'll be able to sit down and get

Charlie Stilec, Student Assistance coordinator, felt the forum was an extremely positive move for the school.

Assistant Principal Ralph Redmond agreed, saying. There was some hurt that came out, some pain that came out, some anger and sadness. When those feelings come out, that's healthy."

Johnson said he hopes the student forums will help to put a halt to the racial slurs and insults that are traded inside and outside the high

This is just a mini-segment of society that's going on around us," he said. We have to teach (them how to deal with this) or they'll never make it out there in society."

# City, township police combine to find runaway



# VFW scam might involve former members of club

My, what tangled webs we weave when we set out to raise funds.

The latest installment in the ongoing VFW fundraiser scandal brings word that people soliciting \$25 donations on behalf of Northville VFW Post 4012 may be former employees of the Department of Michigan Veterans of Foreign Wars branch in Livonia.

An assistant district manager at the Livonia branch says that several employees there were fired recently for misrepresenting themselves while collecting funds.

If you're just now tuning in, complaints started pouring in to the local post and city police department last week as callers asked area residents to donate \$25 apiece to a Thanksgiving dinner for the needy at Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4012. That surprised Post 4012 members, who had planned no such dinner.

Turns out the "scam" may be the work of some overzealous phone solicitors claiming things they should not have claimed.

City police investigating the incident discovered that the state VFW was indeed conducting a fundraiser in the Northville area, though their solicitors had no authorization to use the local post's name or claim to be

funding a Thanksgiving dinner. Said Sgt. Gary Callender, "As far as we can tell, it is legit. It's just that they're misrepresenting themselves by saying they're with Northville Post

But Assistant District Manager Les Merrill of the VFW's Livonia branch office said Wednesday that he's not sure where the funding requests have been coming from. The Livonia branch covers Livonia, Northville, Farmington, Southfield, Redford, Westland, Dearborn and Garden City.

The branch is now investigating several former employees to see if they were involved. Merrill said.

I've just been here 10 days and I had to fire a bunch of people," Merrill said. I had to get rid of two or three of them because they wouldn't do what rascals," he added.

I told them to do. You can't misrepresent things in any way . .

"People who were fired could be operating out of their home."

Merrill noted that the Livonia branch is conducting a fundraising campaign in which donors are asked to buy products ranging from trash bags to fire extinguishers and first aid kits. But the branch is not seek-

ing donations alone.
"We don't ask for donations, we sell products," he said.

Officials at the state VFW office in Lansing also have heard of phony donation requests, State Adjutant Glenn Carnes said Friday. One complaint involved requests to raise funds for a bus to transport the disabled, he said.

Tve heard some rumbles about this too, and nobody seems to know where it's originating . . . If we find out, we'll notify the attorney general's office," Carnes said.



# Sentence in sex case puts kids in danger

A lot happens between the time that a despicable crime is committed and the time the offender is sentenced in a court of law.

Time intervenes. The suspect cleans up his appearance. Attorneys and prosecutors alter reality by picking selectively from a grab bag of facts. The memories of witnesses become dulled by anger and

Perhaps most critically, judges fail to appreciate the damage done to the victim or grasp the importance of criminal deterrents.

Consequently, many times justice is not served, as appears to be the case in the trial of David Broad.

Broad was arrested March 10 in Northville Township after the mothers of two 8-year-old girls accused him of abusing their daughters.

Police went to the home where Broad lived with his girlfriend and the woman's child and found sexual devices and other evidence of a possible crime. The evidence helped substantiate the little girls' claims and Broad was eventually charged - big time.

County prosecutors indicted Broad on six counts of criminal sexual conduct, four in the first degree and two in the second. If found guilty of all charges, the 25-year-old man could have been sentenced to life in prison. Instead Broad was convicted of lesser counts and walked out of the courtroom Oct. 19 a free man, having received a five-year probationary slap on the wrist.

"The system is failing," a frustrated township officer Fred Yankee said. "People like that shouldn't be allowed to get

What happened? In a bench trial, Judge Claudia Morcom found Broad guilty of two counts of assault with intent to commit criminal sexual conduct in the

second degree, far less severe crimes than the original charges.

It is hard to know what caused the relatively light conviction. The determination of guilt or innocence is supposed to be based on the facts presented. It could be that Morcom simply didn't agree that the facts of the case warranted the heavier charges. It could be that Morcom didn't think police and the prosecutor proved their case.

Nonetheless, Broad still could have served time. Assault with intent carries a possible sentence of six months to two years in prison.

But Judge Leonard Townsend saw fit not to incarcerate Broad, choosing to give the offender probation instead. Broad is supposed to serve the last year of his probation in jail, but as a practical matter, both police and the prosecutor say he won't. If he makes it through the next four years without subjecting yet another child to the trauma of sexual molestation, experience has shown the court will likely forgive the sentence, and Broad will be sent off to spend the fifth year as he pleases.

But that's a big "if." Broad tends to gravitate to situations where children are present. He served as an aide in the Northville public schools' latch key program before being fired in May of 1992.

Whether Broad got the message about the legal - if not the moral - consequences of criminal sexual abuse is doubtful. Assistant County Prosecutor Ralph Elizondo asked that Broad be given a term at the upper of the sentence scale: a year or two, at least. "I wanted him to go to jail," he said.

But, somehow, Townsend felt all the man needed was a good talking to. As a result, Broad is free to contemplate more criminal activity and to think that if he follows through with his designs little will come of it.

Mike and Monica are my girlfriend's kids. He's 10, she's 6.

For the better part of a year now, I've treated them as though they were my own. Although I sometimes feel like I've parachuted into parenthood without pulling the ripcord, I'm the closest thing they've got to a male influence.

While the lessons they learn aren't quite as simple as the list from Everything I Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten, it be-

comes more and more apparent to me that many of our lifelong lessons are learned by the time we leave elementary school.

Included among the ones we're teaching them right now are taking responsibility for your own behavior and respecting other people's property. As near as Patti and I can tell, the lessons have sunk in. I wish I could say the same for some of the adults I run across.

Last week I made a trip to the hardware store, and borrowed Patti's car. I made my purchase, and while getting into the car, I decided to double-check my bag to make sure I'd gotten everything.

As I sat there, engine running, an older woman got into her car next to me, ramming her door into the mirror on the passenger's side. I then watched as the woman hoisted herself into her car. I got out and confronted the woman about the damage. "Well, there's other scratches on that door," were the first


Explaining the incident to Patti's kids that night, it became clear. New mirrors come cheaply, but opportunities to set a good example for the kids oftentimes do not.

# Awards spark greater effort

A few years ago, the Novi school district received a very distinctive honor.

The Wall Street Journal did a special section on education. As part of that section, Journal editors asked two prominent educators to list 10 of the best public schools in the nation. And one of those educators listed the Novi schools as one of the nation's 10 best public school systems.

We carried the story in The Novi News, of course. Right on the front page where it deserved to

But we were a little less exultant on the editorial page. Former Northville Record Editor Bob Needham suggested in his column that, sure, the recognition was nice, but that it shouldn't be taken too seriously. And I made similar comments in an editorial.

Our less than enthusiastic response was not well-received by Novi school officials, who wondered aloud why we felt it necessary to rain on their parade . . . why couldn't we join the rest of them in acknowledging Novi's fine school district?

There was a decent point to be made in both Bob's column and my editorial. But neither of us did a good job of it because the point didn't get through.

The point we were trying to make was that the honor was very subjective and should have been accepted as such. Take a few moments to pat yourselves on the back, we suggested, and then use the recognition as a springboard to improve further the quality of education.

All of this is by way of introduction to the fact that I'm going to do a little bragging about our newspapers right now.

This has been a good year for both The Novi News and The Northville Record in various newspaper contests.

The Record won eight journalism awards from the Michigan Press Association (MPA) this year. The Novi News was close behind with six MPA awards.

The Fifties Festival tab we publish every summer was judged the best special section in the country by Suburban Newspapers of America. And The News and The Record each picked up awards from the National Newspaper Association (NNA). Northville even picked up 3rd place honors in the NNA's general excellence category, meaning the judges felt it was the third best weekly newspaper in its circulation classification in the country.

All six HomeTown Newspapers won a grand total of 55 awards this year - 41 from the Michigan Press Association. eight from Suburban Newspapers of America and six from the National Newspaper Association.

To be sure, the awards are nice. That's one of the reasons I'm bragging about them. But we also take every award we get with a grain of salt.

Was the Fifties Festival tab really the best special section in the country last year? Was The Northville Record really the third best weekly newspaper in the United States?

Maybe. Maybe not. We think we publish very good newspapers. But nobody is more aware than we are of how much room there is for improvement.

We've decided not to argue with the judges. We're going to keep the awards. At the same time, however, we plan to use them as an springboard to try to improve your hometown newspapers even more in the future.





# Dairy process turns out fine micro brews

Half of Michigan's breweries are at Canfield and Second in the shadow of Wayne State University. You read that correctly. OK, here's the

If you discount Stroh Brewery which today, although fully licensed, is not operating com-mercially, then Michigan has only four breweries, but two are in Detroit at Canfield and

Selling kegs only since the end of May 1992, is The Detroit and Mackinac Brewery, brainchild of creative restaurateurs Ben Edwards and Richard Vincent who've operated the Traffic Jam and Snug Restaurant at Canfield and Second since summer 1965. East-side attorney, turned brewmaster. Tom Burns is turning out 60 kegs weekly. It is sold in about 100 restaurant/bar locations in metro Detroit and as far north as The Grand Hotel on Mackinac

The second microbrewery at the Cansield and Second location is Michigan's first Brewpub, selling its ales on draft at the Traffic Jam. known affectionately by its patrons as TJs. On Dec. 18, 1992, after many years of discussion in the state legislature. Michigan became the last Midwest state to enact a brewpub law.

Edwards, a home brewer all his adult life, planned for this day for many years. In the early 1980s on a trip to Europe, he learned about a common practice in Belgium. For centuries, monks brewed beer and made cheese with the same equipment at one location. In 1988, Edwards licensed The Midtown Dairy and made his first commercial cheeses. Today, he makes about 20 different varieties that are sold only in the restaurant or the on-premise Take-Away Case counter. These cheeses are delicious and bargain priced between \$1.50 and \$4.50 per

For two years running, Edwards has claimed the Grand Prize at the Michigan State Fair for his cheese. This year, it was for Svecia, better known as butter cheese. He also won blue ribbons in four out of five categories.

After brewpubs became legal in Michigan. Edwards applied for the necessary inspections and licensing. That's right, the cheesemaker put on his brewmaster's hat and began making America's only dairy-brewed beer. This year, tappers began dispensing at TJs in July.

Current brews include Altbier, Autumn Amber Ale and Gold Rush Ale. But these will change," said Vincent. "The whole idea of a Brewpub beer list revolves around the brewmaster."

Ben has plans to make Red Eye, an alco-holic Ginger Beer, hard cider, a smoked beer, and for the holidays, a Christmas Ale.

"Anybody who's into brewing and doesn't make a Christmas Ale is out to lunch," said Edwards. "At TJs, we never make the same bread, so why would we make the same beer?"

It also appears that Edwards will make the champagne of bottled beers. He recently purchased 560 champagne bottles from winemaker Larry Mawby and plans to produce a bottle conditioned beer that will be available about Nov. 1. And what will he name it? We're still working on that," Vincent said.

At TJs. "Triple Play," a sampler of all three beers, is \$3.50. A 7-oz pour is \$1.50, 14-oz shell is \$2.50 and a 60-oz pitcher is \$8.95. All beers have a table tent description, so you can choose between light and fuller and dry to

While the brewpub idea is new to Michigan, it has been a west coast phenomenon for some time. 'Until 20 years ago, all beer was made the way we do it." Edwards said. "If beer is fresh, it will always taste better. It ages about as well as lettuce."

Restaurant patrons can view the dairy and brew room from the observation balcony in the Big Room at any time. If you've not home brewed or tasted at a Brewpub, then you might be surprised to learn that the beer is unfiltered

# Chefs fire back

# Restaurateurs tout healthy Chinese food

Linda Parker and Jack Dai shake their heads in disgust when they talk about the recently released study by a Washington. D.C., consumer group.

The study, which analyzed 15 popular dishes from mid-price Chinese restaurants in Washington, San Francisco and Chicago, alleged that high fat, cholesterol and sodium counts were found in the dishes. The study was widely reported, primarily because Chinese food is America's favorite ethnic choice, and because it seemed to contradict the perception that Chinese food is healthy.

But since the release of the report in early September, Chinese restaurants all over the country have reported dropoffs in business of 25 to 35 percent. The slump was remarkable enough to earn coverage by no less than The New York Times, and has fueled public relations campaigns by Chinese-American associations and restaurant owners' groups in New York and

Chicago, among other places. Parker and Dai consider themselves fortunate. The Novi residents are coowners of the Hunan Palace on Ten Mile Road near Grand River. They thank the sophistication of their customers for the fact that they haven't seen an appreciable

drop in business since the report. Ours has stayed pretty steady." says Parker, who runs the front of the restaurant while Dai tends to the kitchen. "Our people are all educated, and they've got the common sense to know this is healthy food. It's in the way we're cooking, which is homestyle stir-fried. There's not a lot of gravies, not a lot of starches. Even if they're not (aware of that) we can educate them about the menu."

Parker and Dai, like their peers in other

cities, challenge the results of the survey. The Times report said a Chicago restaurateurs' group had conducted its own analysis of popular dishes and found contradictory results. Indeed, even the creators of the study, the Center for Science in the Public Interest have allowed that their

results may have been misinterpreted. Parker says she didn't put much faith in the results of the survey. Judging from the way Dai prepares dishes at their restaurant, she finds it hard to understand where all the supposed fat, cholesterol and sodium came from. If you think about it, Parker says, the only fat Chinese you see are the Buddahs, who are mythical anyway. It is known that cancer and heart disease rates are lower in China than in

"All of our chicken is skinless - always," said Parker. "And we have a veg-etarian menu all the time. We use bok choy (a chinese cabbage), pea pods, onions, mushrooms. We start with all vegetables practically."

Dai uses a low-sodium soy sauce. In fact, he brews his own. And though he can't speak for other restaurants, he uses no MSG in his kitchen.

His most common method for preparing vegetables is to steam them first, then toss them into the wok to blend them with

his sauce mixture. \*On most of the dishes, we use chicken

broth," he says. "it's skimmed. Not to say that oil is never used in Chinese cooking. At least two huge woks are always going at Hunan Palace for stirfrying of food that calls for it. Cholesterol-

free oils are always used. But those unfamiliar with restaurant cooking may be surprised with the speed at which Chinese stir-fried food is prepared. It takes just thirty to forty seconds in the oil to completely cook virtually every

dish. Thanks to industrial-strength burners, the woks are kept at a consistent 500 degrees F. Dai said this is one reason Chinese food can't be duplicated well at

'It cooks so fast, there's no time to absorb much oil." says Parker. "You look at the plate when you're done. There's no grease there.

Indeed, Dai and Parker are two shining examples of good health themselves. Both of them attribute their good health to diet. At 52, Dai doesn't look a day over 35. Though he's been diabetic since childhood, he's never needed insulin injections. He's a firm believer in the power of

"Jack, he taught himself how to cook for that," says Parker. "He looks up in his Chinese books to see what herbs he needs. He needs no shots.

"Jack works 12 and 14 hour days," says Parker. She leans over to whisper, "And he goes and plays cards in the night. The way you're eating has a lot to do with

The Chinese in general believe herbs contribute to good health. For example, the orange and tangerine peel cooked into Hunan Orange Flavor dishes (with pork, beef, shrimp or chicken) is intended to be eaten, and has a soothing cough-drop effect going down. Chinese herbalists believe it promotes circulation of what they call "chi." directly translated as "vital energy." Nowadays, we call this concept of chi cardiovascular fitness.

When I was a kid, I would steam (the orange peel) with rock sugar in water for a cough, she says. When you eat it, it's like Drano for the body. It's roughage."

Parker, a native of Taiwan, is a fresh. slim and energetic 42, "and I eat three or four times a day," she says.

"All my aunts and uncles back in Tai-

wan lived into their 90s, and my ma, she's 83. She wears no glasses, and threads my needles for me when we sew together."

Some of the fault of the study. Parker believes, lies in the choice of the dishes analyzed. Many, she says, were deep fried, like fried rice, or had thick sauces like lo mein, almond chicken or shrimp with lobster sauce.

Many shellfish - and lobster in particular - are high in cholesterol, no matter what the nationality of the chef, she says. Further, deep frying will boost the fa tent of any dish, Chinese or not. The same goes for dishes which include

nuts in the recipe, though fat from nuts is the monounsaturated, or "good" fat.

George Chew, a Chinese lawyer with an office in New York's Chinatown, told the Times, The Chinese food they cite in the report is what they serve on the West Side of Manhattan, not the Chinese food Chinese people eat."

Jayne Hurley, a nutritionist for the Center for Science in the Public Interest also told the Times, "Our intent wasn't to stop people from eating Chinese food, but to have them eat healthier by eating more like the Chinese do, which is more vegetables, less sauce and less meat."

Parker concurs, pointing out that her menu features traditional homestyle dishes like Rose Scallops and Hunan Chicken in Spicy Orange Flavor, which use no fat in their preparation, and Vegetarian's delight, which contains no fat in anywhere.

The key, she says, is to be an educated diner. For that, she recommends asking your server questions, and stating clearly your needs whether for low sodium, low fat or even level of spice.

"We're here to serve customers in what they need," she says. "Because we want to make everyone happy."

# Seafood month has best shellfish catch

month. It eases us from summer into -winter with its cooler weather, football games and falling leaves. And, surprisingly, perhaps the greatest variety of fish and shellfish (350 species) are commercially available throughout the country during October when National Seafood Month .is celebrated.

If prepared with little or no added fats, seafood is virtually guilt-free. It is low in calories, yet contains a variety of vitamins and minerals. And, it is one of the most digestible all foods, making it perfect for very young people and elderly people.

When you're really pressed for time, try "Fish-in-Flash" rubs and sauces. What follows is the basic recipe which always serves as the base for variations. All you need to do is add seafood, pasta and seasonings.

### SAVORY ONION SAUCE BASE

- 2-3 tablespoons olive oil
- 11/2 cups finely chopped onion 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1/2 to 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- % cup fresh lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon minced lemon zest
- 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon black pepper

To prepare sauce base, heat oil in 12-inch heavy skillet on medium-low heat until hot. Add onion, garlic and cayenne; cook uncovered until onion

### INGREDIENTS ADDED TO SAVORY ONION SAUCE

% pound cooked spaghetti, linguine, penne, curly pasta or curly

1 to 14 pounds cooked seafood 1/2 cup minced fresh parsley

While preparing the base, bring a large pot of water to a boil: salt to taste. Cook pasta until tender, 8-10

Drain pasta and place in large, warm serving bowl. Add onion sauce base and toss to coat. Taste and adjust seasonings. Sprinkle bite-sized chunks of cooked and warmed seafood over pasta with parsley and serve. Makes 4 servings.

Scallops with Linguine and Spinach - About 1 minute before pasta is cooked, add 5 cups cleaned, shredded, loosely packed spinach or 1 package [10 ounces] frozen, chopped spinach, thawed.

To Savory Onion Sauce Base add: I cup slivered red pepper and cook until tender, 10-15 minutes. Toss with scallops and pasta. Omit parsley and sprinkle scallops and linguine with % cup coarsely chopped feta cheese. Serves 4.

# Eating out need not be fattening

When munching foods on the move or impulse eating, it's very hard to keep track of what you actually ate. Pastries, ice cream, hamburgers, luncheon meats, high fat cheeses, fried or breaded foods are just a few foods that we seem to grab for a quick snack or lunch.

First rule is to allow time for yourself to eat whether at home, at the office or in a restaurant. Eating out does not have to mean empty calories.

A buffet or all you can eat restaurant can bring out the worst in most of us. Don't try to be a martyr, you do not have to taste everything! If you know you are going to a buffet, don't skip the previous meal. Facing all those foods on an empty stomach can be disastrous. Circle the buffet table before picking up a plate and mentally note what you want to eat before

getting in line. Always dish up small portions of the foods you want to try, because of the variety it may surprise you how little it takes to satisfy hunger. Best advice for a buffet is to put some distance between you and the food.

Sit down once your plate is full. Standing near the food table can result in continuous nibbling. When your plate is empty. get rid of it or put your napkin on it so you won't continue to eat as the conversation lingers. Don't go back for seconds at buffets or you will overeat.

At a Mexican restaurant, order com tortilias instead of flour tortilias. The flour kind often contain lard. Watch out for the extra fat in deep fried tortillas used for tacos, taco salads or chips. Ask if they are fried or baked. Ask for salsa instead of high fat guacamole and don't fill up on the

Enjoy chicken or bean burritos, chicken fajitas, rice, chicken taco or tostados, with lots of shredded lettuce and tomatoes. Mexican cuisine offers many dishes that are high in complex carbohydrates and good for you.

Chinese cooking relies on vegetables, rice and noodles but learn to read menus carefully being observant of cooking methods. Avoid deep fried, breaded and heavy sauces like a lobster sauce. Enjoy stir-fried vegetables. fish or chicken and all the vegetable dishes. The mushrooms, broccoli. water chestnuts, bamboo shoots, bok choy, squash, snow peas and lotus root are all good choices.

The local Italian restaurant can help keep you on track, but avoid pasta dishes loaded with fatty cheeses or meats. Choose pasta with a marinara (tomato) sauce. clam sauce or a little olive oil. Go easy on meatballs, Fettucini Alfredo, lasagna and especially the dessert cream pastries and cannoli. Italian ice is a cool, low calorie. delightful dessert that will not add inches to your waist line.

Order pizza with extra vegetable toppings such as green pepper and tomatoes instead of fatty toppings of pepperoni and

Southern and Cajun style dining are gaining in popularity, and have many good dishes available that have not been fried. Enjoy seafood gumbo, grilled seafood, rice

and pinto beans, and com bread. Even blackened fish is usually cooked with less oil then traditional Southern fried food. Go: easy eating crab cakes, hush pupples, corn or fish chowder, gravy and mudples and other rich Southern desserts.

If you are hungry for fast foods, make simple choices. Skip fatty dressings, mayonnaise, cheese and bacon hamburgers, request lettuce and tomato toppings, mustard and ketchup. A simple hamburger with regular fries has about 40 percent of calories from fat while a superburger and large fries has about 50 percent.

Other foods with more than 50 percent calories from fat are spareribs, corned beef, hot dogs, sausages, and eggs. Olives, herring. New England Clam Chowder, chocolate and buttery crackers are also just a few of the foods on the "fat" list.

Here are some more eating out Don'ts: Don't eat with out some advanced

planning. Don't use eating out as an excuse to

overeat. • Don't order desserts until you've fin-

ished your meal. Don't use holidays and vacations as an excuse for weight gains.

Instead Do: • Do learn to say "no" to seconds.

• Do choose plain vegetables and salads. • Do eat the bread but ignore the butter.

Do eat slowly.

# Service advises care with green tomatoes

"Green tomatoes lend themselves to a variety of tasty relishes and side dishes, and they can be safely canned as long as they are not from dead or frost killed vines," said Treitman. Solid unblemished tomatoes which have not been frost-bitten can be safely canned, if proper process-

once. They will deteriorate rapidly

# Thorough cooking will avoid e. coli poisoning

that hamburger or any other meat your family eats is thoroughly cooked, said Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Oakland County

Cooperative Extension Service. It should not be pink inside. The reason for the concern is the recent outbreak of e. coli poisoning in the western states.

The easiest way to protect against this strain of e. coli is cooking food thoroughly. Here are some simple tips to help protect yourself:

When eating out send back any undercooked dish made from ground meat or poultry. Wash hands with hot soapy water

"It is very important to make sure before preparing food or eating, particularly after using the bathroom or diapering a child.

- Wash hands and utensils and work areas before and after contact with raw meat poultry or fish.
- Cook all ground meat and all poultry until the center is no longer pink and juices run clear.
- Make sure microwave cooked foods are thoroughly cooked. Rotate food and turn dish frequently.

# Ski scene: What's new up north

Even before the first snowfall, the Northern Michigan ski season is off to a roaring start.

Things are hopping at a lot of

Take, for example, the excitement up at Boyne Mountain and Boyne Highlands. The popular resorts scored a big triumph when SKI magazine readers named Boyne Mountain the No. 1 snowmaker in North America. Boyne Highlands ranked near the top at No. 4.

"We're ahead of killington (Vermont), ahead of Sunday River (Maine), totally regarded as the best in New England; we're ahead of Hunter Mountain in New York, touted as the snowmaking capital of the world," says Boyne's Steve Kircher.

"All the big snowmaking operations out East and one in California we beat out. That's awesome. It's really great for us and our staff, too. We feel pumped about it. The best part about the survey is that it's the customers saying it."

Both the Highlands and the Mountain have 100 percent snowmaking on all their 50 runs.

Boyne's emphasis leading up to the winter season has been on a major systems reorganization for all guest-related functions and services.

"A lot of our efforts this season are on guest services, behind the

scenes, streamlining the operation to make Boyne a more user-friendly resort," Kircher says.

Boyne is coming off an 8-to-10 percent increase in skier visits at the Mountain and expects a similar jump during the 1993-94 ski season.

New features include a beginners' area, a terrain park at both properties and a new groomer at the Highlands. Kircher calls it the "next generation" groomer.

"It's going to have substantial ability to cut up the ice so grooming should take another step forward at the Highlands," he says.

As for Boyne's snow guns, they've enabled the resort to have 100 percent of its trails open every holiday season for the past seven years. The resort has been open every Thanksgiving except one during the past 20 years.

The guns, developed by Boyne founder and owner Everett Kircher, are now in use around the world,

Boyne also has instituted a Frequent Skier Card which gives everyone discounts of \$7 on every lift ticket.

"The gist of it is if you like to ski, we're creating a vehicle to save quite a bit of money through the course of the season," Kircher says.

The news at another top Northern Michigan ski destination, Crystal Mountain in Thompsonville, includes the opening of a new outdoor ice skating rink.

Crystal's Cannon Corps is being increased by four new snowguns. Snowmaking capacity already covers 95 percent of the resort's skiable

terrain and this year's \$100,000 upgrade will keep the winter season even whiter.

Over 65 percent of Crystal Mountain's cross-country trails have been re-routed and lengthened to provide a total of 30 kilometers of skiing this season, including the first-ever "double diamond" expert

Formerly consisting of 26 kilometers, the resort's trail network has been extended to include two new trails plus an extension of the lighted trail. A new beginner's loop, Jack's

Rabbit, and a new intermediate trail, Doe's Delight, have been added.

For nighttime Nordic touring, lights will brighten six kilometers for one of the longest lights cross-country trail systems in the midwest.

"With this trail restructuring we'll be able to better accommodate all ability levels," says Brett Hood, Crystal's Nordic Director.

The entire system is groomed with a powertiller for both freestyle and traditional styles of skiing.

# Snowmaking science reaches new heights

Harbor Springs, Michigan-

While most people are looking for ways to remove snow during the winter, Nubs Nob in Harbor Springs can't get enough of it. Man-made snow makes the downhill ski season. And at Nubs Nob, making snow is an ever-evolving science that combines the most effective technology with the know-how of professionals who have been making snow for years.

"Many people don't realize that almost all of the snow that makes up our base is man-made snow," says Nubs Nob General Manager Jim Bartlett. "You can't count on real snow, which is more subject to being windblown and pushed down the hill."

"Man-made snow is much more able to resist the daily wear and tear of skiers and Mother Nature."

Nubs Nob begins making snow as soon after Nov. I that temperatures reach the 28 or 29 degree mark. And the colder it gets, the better, explains Bartlett. "As it gets colder, we can make more snow in an hour," he says.

Nubs Nob boasts over 100 snowguns, including 17 new this year, of its own patented design. Many of these are located on towers that can be manipulated and directed to specific target areas. That's more snowguns per acre than at other northern Michigan resorts, Bartlett says, adding that the design makes Nubs' technology more productive and energy efficient than most.

The resort has also made a substantial investment in the rest of its snowmaking technology. Annual expansion projects have resulted in the current capacity of pumping 5000 gallons of water per minute through more than 10 miles of underground pipe, 30 miles of underground electrical wiring and 195 snowmaking stations spread over 170 acres.

Snowmaking continues all season. The first big push is geared toward preparing the slopes for the Christmas-New Years' crowd, with many of the resorts' snowguns operating daily. Call 800-SKI-NUBS

for skiing and lodging information.

After that, snowmaking follows a regular weekly schedule through the end of February. Throughout the season, a fleet of three large groomers with flex tillers often operates around the clock to shape the snow until the surface is just right -- for day as well as night skiers.

"We have only one thing to sell around here and that's snow," says Bartlett. "We also put a lot of care into our cafeteria, our customer service and ski school."

"But we know that if we don't have the white stuff, nobody's going to drive to northern Michigan to eat our hamburgers, as good as they are. We put a lot of effort into making sure we've always got good snow -- it doesn't happen by accident."



# Michigan slopes welcome winter!

Ski areas across Michigan are currently gearing up for the winter. Many are adding new slopes, snow guns and chair lifts. Some are contouring their slopes and all are working hard to make the upcoming ski season successful, says Jim Bartlett, president of the Michigan Ski Industries Association and general manager of Nub's Nob in Harbor Springs.

Snow Runners, the ski boots with mini skis as soles, are becoming a hot ticket at many ski areas across the state. The Homestead and Riverview Highlands have added these novel apparatuses to their stable of rental equipment.

Snowboarding also continues its popularity, with many ski areas improving their snowboard ski terrain. Mount Holiday in Traverse City has gone one step further and added unusual obstacles, including a couch, for the "shredders" to jump and maneuver around.

In Western Michigan, Bittersweet Ski Resort in Otsego (616-694-2032) added a double chair lift to service a new beginner run. In addition, they remodeled their lounge. adding a glass sun area overlooking the slopes. Snowmaking equipment has been improved with the addition of eight new "Top Gun" snowmakers and a new flex tiller.

Caberfae in Cadillac (800-678-2931) has virtually doubled its vertical drop with the addition of another chair lift to service the North Peak area that was introduced last year. All rope tows are now gone. In their place are five chairs.

The Hometead in Glen Arbor (616-334-5000) has added two new runs, "Sarsaparilla," an intermediate trail and "Stinking Benjamin" for advanced skiers. They also enlarged their parking area and entrance and lengthened the beginner pony tow.

Up at Indianhead Mountain in Ironwood, (800-3-INDIAN) they have added a new "bump run" and a snowboarder's terrain garden, including a half pipe.

In addition to the aforementioned unusual snowboarding terrain garden, Mount Holiday in Traverse City has doubled its snowmaking capacity and improved its racing hill with video capabilities. For the cross country skier, they have added a one-kilometer lit trail which includes an advanced training course.

Skiers will spend less time at the bottom of the slopes this year at Nubs Nob in Harbor Springs (800-878-NUBS). They are currently replacing a double chair lift with a quad. In addition they have created a new 10-acre intermediate run and also added 450' to the length of two other slopes. To make sure all this new skiing terrain has plenty of good snow, the facility has added 17 new Nubs Nob snow guns and Power Harrow attachments for their grooming machines.

This season Sugar Loaf Resort (800-748-0117) in the Leelanau Peninsula will treat young kids to "Fort Whippersnapper," a complete new ski area where adults are not admitted unless accompanied by a child. They've also added a new half pipe for snowboarders, contoured by the "Pipe Dragon" grooming machine. Upgrades in the lodge will add comfort after a hard day on the slopes and this year both indoor and outdoor pools will be open all winter.

Down in the southwest corner of the state, Swiss Valley Ski Lodge (616-244-5635) added 14 new snow-making towers and now has rear-entry ski boots in their rental department.

In Southeast Michigan, Mt. Brighton (313-229-9581) added 450 new pairs of rental skis and increased their already powerful snowmaking capacity. Mount Holly (800-582-7256) has embarked on a major hill expansion, that includes adding 50 feet of vertical to the top of the hill and a new quad chair lift. The intermediate run "Woodward" was widened 50 feet and lengthened 200 feet. To make snow on this new terrain, eight "Top Gun snowmakers were added. Four Hundred sets of rental equipment are also ready and waiting for the snow to fall.

Top Gun snowmakers are also going in at Pine Knob in Clarkston (313-625-0800). Their snowmaking will be improved by more water and air lines too. And both Pine Knob and Mount Holly have added Flex tillers to their grooming equipment to ensure softer, more pliable snow.

Riverview Highlands in Riverview (313-479-2080) is working on a tentative expansion program for ski school operations, racing program and lessons.

According to Bartlett, more slopes, more snow and more terrain for the snowboarders all combine to make Michigan's ski slopes more enjoyable this winter.

# Ski industry rebounds

Coming off a series of four to five years of flat or very small revenue gains, Michigan's ski industry showed marked increases for the 1992/93 season. According to a survey by the Michigan Ski Industries Association (MSIA), ski business was up an average of over 14 percent for all aspects of the industry, including retail sales, wholesale sales and ski-area business.

Jim Bartlett, MSIA president and general manager of Nubs Nob Ski Area in Harbor Springs, said that wholesale sales were up 17.5 percent, retail sales up 15.6 percent and ski-area sales 11.8 percent from the previous year. Most respondents to the MSIA's questionnaire attributed the increase to a cold, snowy winter and increased efforts by the industry to provide the types of services and products that their customers desired.

"For the second consecutive year, the ski industry pulled together to offer Discover Michigan Skiing, a statewide learn-to-ski program that is both affordable and service-oriented," said Bartlett. "Providing first-time skiers with a pleasurable experience is a vital part of our industry's growth."

Bartlett added that "Mother Nature certainly helped last season with a marked increase in snow, especially in the lower part of our state around the Detroit area. When snow is on the ground, people think skiing." However, he was quick to mention that most of Michigan's major ski areas have extensive snowmaking capabilities and even if the snow isn't in your driveway, chances are it will be on the slopes.


In another telling sign of skiing's resurgence, equipment and apparel sales are rising. Nationally, sales of skis, boots, bindings, clothes and accessories were estimated at roughly \$1.25 billion last season, the first growth since 1989. Retailers, finding

their inventories thin, ordered for this season at quantities manufacturers say they haven't seen in years.

So far, the retail ski clothing and equipment sales during the summer and early fall months is heavier than it has been for the past few years.

"I think there was a pent up demand for both hard goods and soft goods," says Richard Held, vice president of marketing for the 13 Bavarian Village Ski and Golf shops across the state. "A lot of people skied last season that hadn't been on the slopes for some time. They realized their clothing and equipment needed updating."

Don Thomas, president of Don Thomas Sporthaus in Bloomfield Hills said sales in all departments, from hard goods to women's clothing, are up. "We are extremely pleased so far."

# Fashion and equipment that's new and notable

Michigan's cool fall weather generated considerable early interest in winter sports.

"It always does when you have the kind of weather we had in September," says John Barich, manager of Bavarian Village International Ski & Golf's Bloomfield Hills store.

Barich and his staff are ready for what they expect will be another banner season for Michigan's ski industry. The resorts are gearing up and so are the folks at Bavarian Village.

Here's a rundown on some of the new ski-related equipment and soft goods you can expect to see this winter:

SKIS: There's a new ski construction called monocoque, or cap. Essentially, the skis provide a higher degree of torsional rigidity. That means a better edge hold, more security in the turn and an easier initiation.

The technology has been in developmental stages for several years. It came onto the marketplace a bit last year and now is spreading across all manufacturers.

"It gives you a lot more stability and confidence," Barich says. "With more stability and confidence you're going to become a better skier because you're going to be more relaxed."

The monocoque, or cap, ski is at the top end of the price point, which works itself down to under \$300 for a set of skis.


BOOTS: The big thing is mid-entry boots, instead of the traditional or rear-entry models.

"The comfort level has been maximized in ski boots," Barich says. "I would say, on the whole, the trend is toward manufacturing equipment for the recreational skier.

"There's greater specificity. Ski boots and bindings used to be designed by expert level skiers who had performance criteria in mind and used advanced techniques. Today they're being designed by engineers trying to make it easier for novice or recreational skiers. Not everything is performance oriented, so comfort and ease of skiing is brought down to us."

BINDINGS: Flex controls allow skiers to change the ride of the ski by stiffening the flex. Some bindings have multiple settings for various snow conditions.

POLES: Lighter, graphite fiber poles reduce fatigue and enable easier flex and smoother transitions.
Graphite absorbs more energy than

other materials, so it's not as harsh on the upper body.

CROSS-COUNTRY: There's a Revolution in cross-country-the new Fischer Revolution ski.

"It's a short ski, one length fits all," Barich says. "Structurally, it holds the weight in the center of the ski. It shortens the lift of the ski. Obviously, it's easier to move when the ski is shorter. It allows new cross-country skiers to grasp the sensation much more easily and it makes cross-country skiing much less cumbersome and more enjoyable."

SNOWBOARDING: This is a fast-growing segment of the ski industry.

"It's growing by leaps and

bounds," Barich says. "Young kids who skateboard have the built-in technique to snowboard. It's another way for them to have fun.

"And I'd have to say it's for all ages because we had a 60-year-old man come in here and buy one for himself last year. For would-be surfers or skateboarders, it's very similar in terms of motion."

The cost of snowboards runs about \$350-\$600.

Advancement in high-tech, waterproof and windproof materials continue to enhance soft goods. Heavily weighted linings are being replaced by thinner, more resilient materials.

# All downhill after Ski Fest

Auburn Hills, Michigan-

An historical perspective may be necessary to understand Ski Fest '93 but the future holds no mysteries.

The state's biggest winter sports extravaganza is destined to become bigger and better.

Ski Fest - to be held Nov. 1-3 at The Palace in Auburn Hills - is the kickoff for Michigan's ski and winter sport season. The dates have been moved forward two weeks from last year's inaugural event.

The Ski Fest is growing rapidly. More than 125 exhibitors had committed to attend this year, compared to 76 in 1992, with plenty of time left.

Richard Held, vice president/advertising for Bavarian Village International Ski & Gold, expects the final number to double last year's figure. Attendance should also top last year's 15,000 figure.

The success of the show reflects a coming together of various groups within the local ski industry, in contrast to previous ski shows held at Cobo Arena and, in 1991, at Detroit Race Course.

The out-of-town promoters of those events failed to generate excitement or enthusiasm for the concept. The 1991 show tagged the ski industry as something of a second-rate enterprise and raised the ire of local entities. The rift between the promoters and industry officials was irreparable.

That's when The Palace and the folks at Bavarian Village took charge. The Palace invited Bavarian Village to become involved as the title sponsor and the event has soared to new heights.

The "Ski Fest" title reflects the concept behind the affair.

"It's more than a show - it's a ski party." Held said. "We wanted to create a ski party atmosphere, not that of just a show.

"We want everybody to get together and talk about skiing. We want everybody to get excited, get enthused. We want the setting to be conducive for that and The Palace is a perfect environment. You can't go to a

better place than The Palace.

"My whole driving force is to get people excited about skiing. If we do that, everyone wins. And unless everyone wins, it doesn't make sense."

Count on a complete triumph.

Held's advertising and marketing skills are raising the ceiling on participation at Ski Fest. The numbers grew substantially for this year and likely will continue to grow by getting others in the industry from around the country involved.

Party hours will be 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. each day.



**Continued From Page 10** "It's an active sport, you don't need to be all bundled up," Barich says.

"What you'll find is manufacturers going to materials which are as good and easier to work with for fashion. The end result is the same. It stops moisture from coming in."

Among those materials is Thermal-Lite, a new synthetic insulation material with lightweight properties which effectively stores body heat.

As for fashion, there's plenty of it in ski wear.

"We're back into neutral colors, more earth tones," he says. "Bright seems to have hit quickly a couple years ago and ended. Skiing is still function vs. function. Underlayering and polar fleece are replacing sweaters because of insulation and weight factors."

And how much does all this cost? One outfit - enough for any ski weekend - consists of one jacket and pants, with a couple of polar fleece tops or sweaters and will run in the \$500-\$600 for "real good, high-tech

The equipment - skis, boots, bindings and poles - ranges from \$500 or \$600 in the mid-range up to a top end of \$2,000. The low end is \$300.




# Chapel commemorates beloved hymn

Frankenmuth, Michigan—
This year is the 175th anniversary
of "Silent Night," the most beloved
and widely known Christmas hymn in
all the world. "Stille Nacht" (Silent
Night") was first sung on Christmas
Eve, 1818, in St. Nicholas Church in
Oberndorf (near Salzburg), Austria.

On that Christmas Eve in 1818, church organist Franz Gruber discovered that the organ would not play and could not be repaired before the Christmas Eve service. Knowing Christmas wouldn't seem like Christmas without music. Gruber asked the priest Josef Mohr to write a Christmas song which could be sung easily without the organ. Mohr wrote the verses and Franz Gruber wrote the melody. The song was sung for the first time that evening by Mohr, who was a tenor, and Gruber, a bass, with the church choir singing the choruses. The accompaniment was played by Mohr on a guitar.

Both Mohr and Gruber were in their late twenties, and little did they realize that they had given the world one of the most loved Christmas hymns. The peaceful music and words convey the Biblical Christmas message proclaiming the birth of Christ the Savior. From that night the song spread all over the world, mainly through the help of missionaries. It is known as Austria's Christmas gift to the world, and has been translated into

more languages than any other Christmas carol.

Oberndorf's St. Nicholas Church, where "Silent Night" was first sung, was damaged by the annual high waters of the Salzach River. The church was rebuilt on higher ground, and the Silent Night Memorial Chapel was erected on a landscaped mound over the original designers site of the church altar. Construction of the

chapel began in 1924, and it was dedicated in 1937.

In 1992, with special permission from the government and tourist association of Oberndorf's, Austria, a replica of Oberndorf's Silent Night Memorial Chapel was built at Bronner's CHRISTmas Wonderland in Frankenmuth, Michigan. The chapel at Bronner's was erected in thankfulness to God and as a tribute to the Christmas hymn "Silent Night" from the Wally and Irene Bronner family. It was dedicated on Nov. 20,1992.

Visitors to Bronner's Silent Night Memorial Chapel can see information about the hymn and composers as well as the original chapel in Oberndorf. Plaques with Silent Night" in over 70 languages, and the Biblical account of the Christmas story in 33 languages are also on display. Built as a memorial and following the wishes of Oberndorf, the chapel is not intended for worship services or ceremonies.

The octagonal shaped building is nestled in the rolling mounds at the south end of Bronner's property. Outside the chapel, plaques with the hymn "Silent Night" in over 70 languages are along a tranquil lamppost-lined walkway featuring a Silent Night" musical score arch, and an inspiring white life-size Nativity.

The peaceful chapel interior consists of a walk-through area from where visitors can view the chancel area through a glass wall. Looking

into the chancel area, visitors can view an altar with a replica of Oberndorfs hand-crocheted filet altar cloth, a crucifix made in 1818, pews, a majestic Nativity scene, a Christmas tree decorated in early Austrian motif, garlands, a wreath with a guitar cradled in it, information about the hymn and composers, and a reproduction of the original musical score.





## Marshall: Santa's second home

#### Marshall, Michigan—

Now here's a town that goes all out for Christmas! Consider:

-It takes municipal workers two weeks to hang all the holiday decorations, many of which are vintage examples probably not seen anywhere else.

Christmas decorations are officially turned on at 6:45 p.m. The parade steps off at 7, resplendent with elves, floats, high school bands and Old St. Nick himself. More than 100 parade entries are expected to add to the merriment along the downtown route.

Holiday activities continue through December. Merchants in Marshall's historic business district host an open house Friday, Dec. 3. Carolers will stroll the streets, raising their voices in celebration of the

## Holiday spirits take to the skies

Dearborn, Michigan-

Ninety years ago in December, the Wright brothers gave the world the gift of flight.

Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village is celebrating that significant anniversary - and honoring the human spirit that has long made us reach for the skies -- with a special program called "Holidays Take Flight," Nov. 26 through Jan. 2.

Throughout the holiday season, special hands-on activities, performances, and tours will highlight the museum's collections of flight-oriented artifacts and structures,

including the Wright brothers home and cycle shop (where the first powered flying machine was built), the first helicopter, and an assortment of airplanes.

"There's probably no better place to take a close-up look at the origins of human flight," said Mary Lynn Heininger, leader of the team that developed the holiday program.

"And since this season is traditionally a time for wishing and dreaming, there's no better time to celebrate the fulfillment of a dream that all humanity has shared."

Inside Henry Ford Museum, a

corridor illuminated by runway lights will lead the way to a gigantic holiday tree decorated with ornaments of flight from angels to zeppelins. Nearby, model planes will zoom over a gingerbread village where model trains clickety-clack in an endless journey of delight.

Daily activities, designed to engage even young visitors, will help everyone get into the spirit. Kids can find temporary "employment" on an assembly line to make an airplane, and can also create paper decorations.

Performances and storytelling will bring to life traditional tales exploring

flights of fancy from numerous cultures and eras.

And, of course, Santa will be on hand -- well, actually, on wing. He'll welcome kids to join him in his special airplane as they express their holiday wishes.

Music will fill the air as carollers from Opera Lite entertain in both the Museum and Village daily.

The historic houses and workplaces of Greenfield Village depict holiday traditions from three centuries of American life.





## Used boats put wind in sales

Favorable winds are beginning to blow on the boating industry, especially in the used boat segment.

"Used boat sales have been higher than usual in the past 90 days," says Don Pettenger, president and publisher of National Boat Listings, Power and Sail, headquartered in Alpena, Michigan.

The sale of used (euphemistically called "previously owned") boats at Pier 33 in Muskegon is up 30 percent from last year. "We sell three used boats for every one new boat," reckons Terry Wheeler, sales manager. Wheeler's firm is headquartered at St. Joseph, where a 100,000-square-foot building stores 600 or more boats every winter. Approximately 20 percent are used boats up for sale.

"For every ten boats that we sell these days, nine are used," estimates Chuck Rancour, broker with the Saginaw Bay Yacht Brokerage in Bay

With the economy improving and interest rates low, many boat owners are ready to upgrade to bigger and better models. But they have to get rid of their present boats first.

Another reason for the growth in the used boat market is that fiberglass hulls turned out to be more indestructible than anyone guessed when they were introduced in the

"I have seen some 1965 fiberglass boats that look like new," says Chuck Rancour. "If a boat is taken care of, it will still be usable and looking good for many years."

Used boat sales are strong, he adds, because "prices of new boats have gone up. There's a \$1 million dollar new boat for sale right now in the Detroit area," he says. "I can find a comparable boat, a used Hatteras, for \$200,000."

In a used boat, especially power, says one expert, one key to its value is the number of hours of use it has had. Boats don't get a lot of use during Michigan summers like the cold one in 1992. That year, he guesses, many owners took their boats out no more more than 12 or 15 times.

Among the hundreds of used boat offerings in Michigan as of October, 1993, are a 22-foot 1983 Bayliner 2270 Explorer for \$16,900. It's listed by Pier 33, headquartered in St. Joseph. Other offerings from Pier 33 include a 14-foot Boston Whaler Rage, a 1992 model, for \$10,900; and a 1969 River Queen houseboat, 1969, for \$14,500.

Sun & Sail, Mt. Clemens dealer. offers a 24-foot S-2 sailboat, built in 1980, for \$10,900.

Through the October issue of National Boat Listings, you can find a 25-foot Carver Santa Cruz, built in 1977, with a flybridge, trailer, 235 horsepower OMC engine, Loran and galley, for \$14,000.

Rancour recently sold a 42-foot Chris Craft wooden boat for \$24,000. The buyer was a wooden boat enthusiast who had the time to devote to the necessary sanding, painting and upkeep of a wooden hull.

Rancour believes the sailboat market is building back up, based on a pickup this year in sales of used models.

If you are getting ready to trade up (or maybe down), or you are looking for a good used boat for Santa Claus to bring, help is available (for a fee) from local dealers and from computerized boat listings.

National Boat Listings, Power and Sail, has been published monthly by Don Pettenger for the past 11 years. It's a major source of information to boat-buyers and boat-sellers. The publication costs \$2 per issue, or \$15 per year by subscription, and less if ordered at boat shows. Carried at major book stores such as Barnes and Noble, and also at drug stores and other retail outlets, it reaches about 270 newsstands in the Detroit area alone. It is also sold throughout the Midwest, East Coast and Florida.

Although the publication carries many dealers' and manufacturers' ads for new boats, it sells used boats through a computerized feature called The Boat Locator.

The system depends on both buyer and seller.

If you're an owner (or broker) trying to sell, you craft an ad (20 words or less) and submit it with a picture of the boat and \$125. Or you can order a pictureless classified ad for \$50. Your ad is published in Nationwide Listings monthly for a year (or until the boat is sold). Furthermore, you can renew the ad annually for as long as you wish, without additional charge.


"We run the ads all year," adds Pettenger, "so there is no particular season when a boat is more likely to

As a prospective buyer, you can order The Boat Locator service to search its computer files for the exact boat you want. The charge is \$5 per

Once he gets the parties together, says Pettenger, the prices are usually negotiable. "People often reduce their prices after they first list their boats," he says. "They realize that what they might want is not exactly what they are going to get. But from the responses I get from brokers and dealers, I know this method of publishing listings sells boats.

"I had one couple tell me they had so many calls they had to put a message on their answering machine saying their boat had been sold."

A similar computerized system is offered by American Boat Listing, Ltd. They will send their nationwide directory of listings free if you write P.O. Box 660, Oceanside, NY 11572 or call (800) 875-BOAT. For sellers, a \$190 fee keeps a boat in the system until sold. It's a "for sale by owner" system, with no brokers fees or commissions.

Among the dozens of publications that run boating want-ads is the Cycle, Boat & RV Trader, published weekly by the same company that publishes Tradin' Times. You can write to Trader Publishing, P.O. Box 580, Farmington, MI 48336 or call (313)474-1800. It is circulated on newsstands throughout Michigan. Photo ads run \$21 for three weeks, with a renewal rate of \$15 for another three seeks.

BUC-NET (also known as Boats United Corporation, which has its mainframe computer at Fort Lauderdale, Florida) is a national computerized listing network for brokers and dealers only. BUC-NET

was founded in 1961 and has more than a thousand members.

"If you came into my office and said you're looking for a certain type of boat," says Chuck Rancour, "we could tap into the BUC-NET computer and locate one for you."

Rancour's company, the Saginaw Bay Yacht Brokerage, both stores boats and sells them at the former Pier 11.. "We store about 300 boats over the winter, and about 125 of them are used boats for sale."

"I don't see how anybody in the used boat business can get along without being connected to BUC-NET's computer," Rancour goes on. "They created it to broaden the market for sellers and buyers of used boats. There are other systems now, but BUC-NET is the oldest and most extensive listing system in the world. It can give you a complete equipment list for every boat in its computer."

Another useful service that members get is their BUC-NET Bluebook, where current market values are listed.

"Every time we make a sale we furnish information about it to BUC,"

says Rancour, "and it goes into the Bluebook to update their price records. It's a lot like the automobile bluebook that insurance companies and banks use to determine what used cars are worth.

"What we pay to BUC-NET is part of our overhead as brokers. The advantages go to our customers."

Saginaw Bay Yacht Brokerage and Service Center is the only broker north of Detroit (on the Sunrise side, that is) on the BUC-NET system.

Used boats are ordinarily purchased "as-is." No warranty is likely if you're buying from an individual seller. Dealers sometimes give a limited short-term warranty, usually for an extra charge.

Used boats are now featured, along with new, at the annual fall in-the-water boat show at Metropolitan Beach in Mt. Clemens, Michigan. This year, for the first time,

the show set up a special "Used Boat Corral", where dealers displayed choice offerings taken in trade or listed for sale.

We were charmed by a sign we saw on a used boat at a show recently---a 1984 15-foot bowrider Thundercraft which had gone for

The sign said, "Sold to a Nice Family."

Towables include folding camping trailers, truck campers, travel trailers and park trailers. Folding trailers are the least costly and provide the fewest amenities -basically, eating and sleeping. Truck campers and travel trailers provide a few more comforts -kitchen and bathroom facilities -however, park trailers are usually the largest of the towables and are often used for seasonal or temporary living. Towables cost as little as \$2,500 for folding camping trailers. Roomy travel trailers sell for an average of \$12,150.

Motorized RVs include motorhomes and van conversions. Motorhomes are exactly that -- homes on wheels that are drivable. Smaller models start at \$29,000; top-of-the-line luxury can be had for

an average of \$64,000.

A customized, full-size van is called a van conversion. Typically, it is modified to include assorted accessories for travel and recreation. Costs start at \$15,000.

RVs take families everywhere -from rural to metropolitan, from mountains to beaches -- all the while providing all the amenities of home.







## Inn towns on the Canadian Grand

Picture this: a gurgle of water makes a swimming hole in Dundalk, holds fly fishermen up to their hips in Grand Valley, tumbles over limestone ledges beside the farmers market in Fergus, cuts a gorge beloved of rubber rafters in Elora, irrigates Mennonite farms in St. Jacobs and winds past the big cities of Waterloo, Kitchener and Cambridge on its way towards Lake Erie.

Where are you? Half an hour off Highway 401 on your way to Toronto.

Why detour? Canadian inn lovers could tell you about the Breadalbane Inn, a stone inn on a stone street in Fergus; the Elora Mill, where the rapids rush towards the gorge in Elora; the Jakobstettel Guest House and the craft shops in the old grain silos of the flour mill beside the river in St. Jacobs. All within half an hour on one another beside the Grand River.

#### **BREADALBANE INN**

I don't recommend that you arrive at the Breadalbane as I did, newly released from the Fergus hospital. I was driving around researching a book called Country Roads of Ontario, to be published by Country Roads Press next spring, when I learned more about country roads than I care to

My car hit a patch of gravel, went out of control, dive bombed into a ditch and I ended up staring at the ceiling of an ambulance. When the hospital discharged me, I was hours from home with a car that was almost totally demolished.

That's how I arrived, no reservation, at the Breadalbane Inn, a two-story stone inn facing the main street of the town of Fergus, population 8,000.

Jean and Phil Cardinal and staff drew me into their charming inn, fed me in my room until I could walk to their popular dining room, and then set me out, on foot of course, into the town of Fergus.

There is a better way to approach Fergus: take Highway 401 past Kitchener to Exit 295 and go north through Guelph on Highway 6. When you turn right at the first of two traffic lights on St. Andrew Street, you will notice at once that many of the commercial buildings, as well as houses that climb uphill from the Grand River, are built of large blocks of stone.

Many exhibit small signs beside

their front doors. "Samuel Small, Shoemaker" or "William Rennie. Farmer." These are the names of tradesmen who lived in these houses when the town was founded in the 1830s. You can find 125 of them with a walking map.

City founder Adam Ferguson had a son who lived at the corner of St. Andrew Street West and Breadalbane Street, in what is now the Breadalbane Inn. The sign on the inn says "Gentleman" although history books say George Ferguson was in real estate and that the locals didn't like him much.

The Inn serves the best known table in town now. There are five rooms with bath upstairs, but I stayed in a large room with a separate entrance behind the main building. It had a seating area, a small kitchen, a tiny garden and was a wonderful place to hide for a few days.

For reservations, contact the Breadalbane Inn, 487 St. Andrew St. W., Fergus, Ontario, N1M 1P2, or telephone (519) 843-4770. Rates are about \$US55 for two. Ask about the August Scottish Festival and the schedule at the new Theater on the Grand.

#### ELORA MILL COUNTRY INN AND RESTAURANT

When you drive the 2-3 kilometers along County Road 18 from Fergus to Elora, stop midway at the Elora Quarry Conservation Area, known to everyone in the area as The Quarry. It's been a wonderful swimming hole to generations of kids in both towns.

CR 18 becomes Mill Street, which leads to the small town square and the Elora Mill Inn. It is only a fluke of nature that makes the Grand River stumble downhill in a roar of rapids in front of the Elora Mill. In the mid-nineteenth century, those rapids turned the wheels so that pioneers could crush grain for bread at the edge of the wilderness.

The Taylor family, English

distillers and brewmasters, came to Upper Canada, now Ontario, in the 1830s to brew beer near the Niagara River, in 1977 their descendants bought the Elora Mill. The dining room, banquet rooms, bar and most guest rooms are in the stone grist mill that looms 100 feet above the river. There are other guest rooms in the historic James Ross House across the street and in the Mill Cottage.

If you stay in a room high up in the five-story stone grist mill, you can look downriver, where the Grand River has cut an 80-foot gorge into the cliffs, or down the village street, where small shops sell antiques. candles, paper goods and other things

The dining room is busy lunch and dinner. It is popular because it has most of the things you want in an historic house: candlelight, the warmth of ceiling beams and stone walls, little elegance that can be enjoyed in a sweater instead of jacket and tie.

For information contact the Elora Mill, 77 Mill St. West Elora, Ontano, N0B 1S0 or telephone (519) 846-5356. Rates range from \$US75 to \$US150. Ask about rafting through the gorge at the Grand River Conservation Area just downriver from the inn.

#### JAKOBSTETTEL GUEST HOUSE

The Grand River winds soutn a few miles to the village of St. Jacob. well-known for its Mennonite history. Drive across the bridge on Highway 86 and you will see at once that St. Jacobs, once known as Jakobstettel. has a main street well developed for tourists.

Although photographers highlight the horse and buggy life of Old Order Mennonite, it is the daily culture of mainstream Mennonites like Ellen Brubacher that dominates the town. Ella is the innkeeper of the Jakobstettel, a three-story bed and breakfast inn on five acres of land two blocks from the main street.

Guests rooms are on the third and



fourth floors. The main floor is dedicated to public rooms set behind the tiny check-in desk at the foot of the stairs: a large common room and a cheerful kitchen, actively open to guests. A continental breakfast is served here every morning. Coffee is brewed and available near the big glass cookie jar day and night. The teakettle is ready to be boiled as you

Elia, Beth and staff are happy to point you to area attractions, especially if you are willing to walk, or to follow their biking map, so that you slow down and see their world. There are craft shops all over town, but if you walk back down Albert Street to King Street you will find the most interesting places in the block or two between there and the river.


The Meeting Place tells you the story of the Mennonites. Crafts people, especially glass makers and potters, are found in the silos that rise above the old flour mill. Walk back as far as you can go at Riverside to see furniture and antiques, and to watch John Davenport make corn brooms.

One of the most interesting shops in town is Artifacts, which sells antique architectural prices: fluted columns, corbel brackets, newel posts, church pews, terra cotta pediments.

You should browse the craft and bake shops, but the most exciting activity in the area is the market two kilometers south. The older Waterloo market is open Wednesdays. The large produce and craft market across the road is open Thursdays and Saturdays. Thursday is cattle auction day. Parking is difficult but worth it.

Ask Ella about the nearby pubs where you can order pigtails and ribs. Contact her at Jakobstettel 16 Isabelia St., St. Jacobs, Ontario, NOB 2NO. Rates are \$U\$75 to \$U\$140 for two.

## Happy trails to you

Of Michigan's 4000 miles of groomed snowmobile trails, more than 2200 are in the Upper Peninsula. The eastern Upper Peninsula snowmobile trails system includes the 36 Les Cheneaux Islands, Tahquamenon Falls, and Drummond Island.

In the western UP, the Keweenaw Trail at the northernmost point in Michigan includes Brockway Mountain Drive, the highest drive between the Rockies and the Alleghenies.

The five-mile Straits of Mackinac that separates Michigan's two peninsulas is no barrier either: for \$1, the Mackinac Bridge Authority will transport a snowmobiler and one machine from one peninsula to the other.

In the Lower Peninsula, the Miss-Kal Line, just north of Cadillac, is the hub of a system that can take snowmobilers from Traverse City on Lake Michigan to Alpena on Lake

The West Michigan Trails in the southwest Lower Peninsula cover 252 miles from northern Kent County to northern Van Buren County.



From 1951 until 1982 he had been in charge of the furniture program for Goodwill Industries, coming from the Goodwill of Washington, D. C., to head the program in the Detroit Goodwill building at Brush and Grand Boulevard where handicapped workers learned to refinish, re-cane and upholster furniture donated to the program.

This program went out of existence when Hunter retired. Then he began volunteering for Junior Goodwill as well as other organizations, such as Habitat for Humanity.

"I began (the dollhouse) for something to keep me busy in winter," recalls Hunter. The project was supposed to take about three months to complete, but Hunter became so involved in it that it was completed in less than three weeks as he worked on it 12 to 1 4-hours a day. He also completed a dollhouse kit that someone else had begun three years ago and had given up.

"I enjoy working with the girls,"
Hunter remarks as he relates how
members of the Junior Group have
been meeting at his Grosse lle home
on Tuesdays and Thursdays to strip
and refinish furniture donated to
Goodwill

Goodwill.

"I have all the power tools here," he explains, "so they come here to work with me to get ready for the show."

"He makes so many contributions." says Junior Goodwill volunteer and show publicist Isabelle Smith, "that we call him "Mr. Goodwill."

Smith reports that a 150-year-old armoire will be among the offerings in the Goodwill booth.

She adds that the silent auction will include a handmade four-poster doll bed and an antique brass doll bed "dressed in damask and lace."



## Alpena saloon recreates lumbering era

Alpena, Michigan-

"Don't be put off by the word 'saloon', it's really a restaurant-saloon," says Connie VanSchoick. "We serve lots of non-alcoholic drinks as well as imported beers and wines."

The John A. Lau Saloon on Alpena's north side in "Old Town", a neighborhood refurbished to meet today's traveler, is a bright light in the area's future. It's built on the site of the original saloon that served lumberjacks in the 1880s; indeed, most of the original walls are still standing.

"We did a lot of the work ourselves," says Connie, who, along with her husband, John, own another business, The Display Case, in the historic district. They've fought to preserve the best of the past, add what new things are needed to attract visitors to the area, and have finally achieved their dream.

Brick inlaid sidewalks, period lighting, an old town clock, a pocket park, and attractive signs mark the neighborhood, which is emphasized

by Thunder Bay Theater on the corner. It's northeastern Michigan's only live, year around theater, and it helps draw tourists as well as townsfolk to the district.

The saloon itself presents a well-designed entrance, a VanSchoick trademark. Two 71/2-foot high antique doors feature broad-axe handles that open into a small entry with period photographs of the saloon as it was in the 1800s. A portrait of John A. Lau himself, and correspondence from his daughter, line the walls. Turn the corner and you find yourself in an eclectic mix of old-time pub, antique stores, fine dining, and wonderful service.

It's well worth a special trip up the Sunrise Side to sample the bucket of beef ribs (lumberjack size), that's been slow-cooked for 12 hours in a special

The rest of the menu is both fun and tasty, too.

I started with a wonderful potato and bacon soup served in freshly baked French bread boule at \$2.95, and followed that with a Wannigan burger featuring premium ground beef topped with melted cheddar cheese, crisp bacon and grilled onions. It came served in a bucket of thick, skin-on fries, a cup of cole slaw, and the wrapped burger was topped with a huge dill pickle slice.

The presentation was unique and

the food was everything it should have been - and more. The bun, actually made in France, shipped to Chicago for baking and rushed to the saloon, was the best I've ever had firm, tasty, and different from what you'd expect.

An interesting drink was Sioux City sasparilla, just right with the luncheon burger. In its dark brown bottle, the beverage, which tasted like a sophisticated root beer, was icy cold. The Wannigan burger was \$4.50, the sasparilla \$1.25.

Other menu offering that looked interesting were the Kıller Chicago Hot Dog featuring a lb. beef frank from Plath's Meat Market in Rogers City, a local landmark, with the works...shredded cheddar cheese, onion, tomato, relish, ketchup and mustard on a freshly baked French sandwich roll. (Alka-seltzer on request, the menu whimsically adds); Honey-Dipped Chicken, country style featuring four chicken pieces dipped in sweet honey batter and deep fried.

Dinners run from \$7.95 for the chicken to \$16.95 for Alaskan king crab legs. The signature entree, the John A. Lau BBQ Beef Bones at \$11.95 come served in a big bucket and resemble brontosaurus ribs, they're so large. Dinners include a choice of cole slaw (very good) or a tossed salad, your choice of a baked potato or the thick steak-style fries that are a restaurant trademark.

Service is great. Jon Benson, the head waiter, answered every question about how dishes were prepared, suggested beverages, and made sure this diner had everything she needed. I wish there were more like him in restaurants all over the state!

On Saturday nights, prime rib is the specialty and Friday features all-you-can-eat batter dipped cod at

But a big part of the attraction here is the decor. There are general store-type items from all over the country and local artifacts add an authentic air.

"We nearly cleaned out a place in Gatlinburg, Tennessee," says Connie.

The VanSchoicks purchased an old high-wheel bicycle, a propeller, and even a chain-saw alligator that casts a benevolent eye from the tin ceiling. Local hay bales and crosscut saw share space with feed bags from local mills that operated at the turn of the


A deep hunter green dominates the color scheme, with cloth napkins to match, a decorator touch that reflects Connie VanSchoick's taste.

"We tried to do everything well." she acknowledges. And the couple have succeeded. The saloon bespeaks thought, devotion to authenticity. sparkle, verve and whimsy. It's warm woods and shining brass bar with suspended glassware add a bright

You'll also find tacos, burritos, nachos, chips and salsa, as well as deep dish pizza, on the menu.

There's also something else at the John A. Lau that's sometimes spoken of in whispers, sometimes with chuckles, and sometimes with skepticism. For some visitors, and indeed, even guests, swear there's a resident ghost.

"I don't know if you believe in things like that," says Connie VanSchoick, leaning across the table and speaking softly. "But I believe in her."

"Her" is a sound of a woman walking in high-heeled shoes or boots, sounding as if she's walking up or down the stairs, or sometimes it's just a presence that's felt, as one customer said, "I know there was someone else there!" in the restroom with her.

Indeed, John A. Lau's young wife died and some believe that Agnes still treads the thick plank floors. "After

In those days, Alpena was a rough town, with a reputation that reached far into the woods. There's even a bit of doggerel, framed in the entry, that tells of a beating revenged that begins, "One frosty night in Lau's old saloon...."

These days, the atmosphere is carefully preserved while appealing to a broader, and, we hope, a more sedate type of patron.







## Personal accounts of WWII on display at Ford Musuem

Grand Rapids, Michigan-

The Gerald R. Ford Museum presents World War II: Personal Accounts Pearl Harbor to V-J Day, an exhibition that is part of the museum's commemoration of the 50th anniversary of America's participation in World War II. The exhibition will be on display through Jan. 3.

Personal Accounts brings to life the drama of the War from the personal perspective of the Allied and Axis soldiers who served in both the European and Pacific theaters of operation, to the perspective of their generals -- Eisenhower, MacArthur, Patton, Montgomery, Rommel and others.

War engages all walks of life; it is not selective. Personal Accounts reflects several facets of the War and the lives of the people it touched. War snatches many more privates than generals from real life and this exhibition is about the privates, and the corporals and the lieutenants; it is about real people - some famous, but most unknown - caught in the turmoil of the battle.

Drawing on rare and unique materials, the majority of which have never been on display before, Personal Accounts recalls the human experience of history's most devastating war. It shows how Americans waged their war, how they went from innocence and defeat to knowledge and victory, and what they saw, thought and felt as they experienced one of the most challenging events of their lives.

The multi-media exhibition includes popular music and sounds of World War II, as well as diaries, letters, personal effects, photographs and documentary film from

participants and witnesses. Among the nearly 250 items on display are:

A rare six-minute film depicting the actual Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor,

Letters and diaries from soldiers, sailors and marines, recounting their experiences at Pearl Harbor, Guadalcanal, Coral Sea, Normandy, Iwo Jima and other major combat areas of the War;

Captured photographs from the "Bataan Death March;"

Letters from Prime Minister Winston Churchill, President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Generals Charles DeGaulle, Hideki Tojo, J.H. Doolittle and George S. Patton;

Photographs of General Erwin Rommel's operations in the North Africa desert and excerpts from his letters home describing the campaign:

General Eisenhower's personal campaign jacket;

The sword of the Japanese commander of the River Kwai prison

Hitler's will and political stament;. Entries from the diaries of Nazi propaganda chief Joseph Goebbels;

The Gerald R. Ford Museum is one of nine Presidential libraries nationwide administered by the National Archives and Records Administration. The museum is located at 303 Pearl Street, NW in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Hours are 9 a.m. - 4:45 p.m., Monday through Saturday, noon 4:45 p.m. Sunday. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1.50 for seniors and free for children aged 15 and under. All veterans will be admitted free of charge to the museum during the Personal Accounts exhibition.

## Air Zoo adds jet birds

Kalamazoo, Michigan-

The Kalamazoo Aviation History Museum has entered the "Jet Age" in a big way! Though the Air Museum has concentrated its efforts on preserving World War II aircraft, as time marches on fewer of these rare warbirds are available and more later era aircraft become valuable examples of post-WW II aviation.

The "Air Zoo" Board of Directors realized the Museum had no obligation to its patrons and to history to expand its mission statement to areas of more recent aviation. Though the "Air Zoo" has had two jet propelled planes for some time, the Air Museum has recently acquired seven new jets including an F-86 Sabre Jet, a TF-9J Cougar, an F-11 Tiger, a B-57 Intruder, a F-104 Starfighter, and both a T-33 and P-80 Shooting Stars.

The seven planes were delivered to the museum during the summers of 1992 and 1993 and have since been undergoing restoration. The first three of the aircraft have been restored and are now on display in the museum's 43,000 square foot exhibition area. The B-57 is just about finished in its restoration while the other jets still have quite a bit of work to be done on them.


Of the three completed aircraft on display, probably the most famous, and most recognizable, is the F-86 Sabre jet. This North American Aviation product was the premier Allied jet fighter of the Korean War.

Using the same German technology which made the Me.262 the fastest plane in the skies, the swept wing Sabre fortuitously came on the scene shortly after Soviet MiG-15s went into combat over war torn Korea. The MiG had superior performance to America's earliest jets, the F-80 and F-84, but the F-86 was to become a life saver.

Though the MiG was marginally better than the Sabre, the skill of American pilots allowed the North American product to regain control of Korean air space though the Sabre was out numbered 3:1 by the number of MiGs in Korea. The F-86 is usually associated with the U.S. Air Force, but the paint scheme of this jet is that of Marine Corps Major John Bolt who as a six plane ace flew a similar craft during an exchange program with the Air Force.

While the Air Force was striking back at Soviet, Chinese, and North Korean flown MiGs, the U.S. Navy was doing its share with the F9F Panther. This aircraft was the first jet aircraft produced by Grumman for the Navy. Continuing in the long line of "cat" traditions, the Panther would become an impressive fighter as did its predecessors: the Wildcat, Hellcat, Tigercat, and Bearcat.

Though the straight wing jet was holding its own in Korea, it was obvious that a swept wing design was needed and about a year after the Panther entered service, proposals

were made for the swept wing version of the plane, the Cougar. However, the war in Korea ended before these new planes could enter combat. The Museum's Cougar is a two seat trainer version of the fighter.

The F-II Tiger was a "next generation" jet, designed as a step up from the Cougar. This Grumman aircraft employed a unique feature in its fuselage design. It had a very obvious constriction in the center of its fuselage, at the wing roots, which reduced the drag of the plane due to the "area rule." The unusual design was called the "Coke Bottle" effect as the plane's body took on the appearance of the soft drink's glass containers.

Though the F-11 held the high altitude record and a variant of the plane reached Mach 2, the fighter was hampered by its inability to carry sufficient fuel to make combat missions practical. The plane in the "Air Zoo" collection was used by the Navy's Blue Angels during their performances in the late '50s.

The Martin B-57 Intruder at the "Air Zoo" has a villainous black body as it is painted in the night attack scheme that would have been on the plane during the Vietnam Era. This particular aircraft, however, only went to Germany on overseas assignment.

Originally designed by British Electric and called the Canberra, the B-57 was of an early design but proved to be an extremely adaptable aircraft and has been used well over 30 years with 1,385 total variants being produced.

You can visit the Kalamazoo Air Zoo by either car or plane. By car, take Interstate 94 to the Portage Rd. exit (#78). Take Portage Road south two traffic lights. At Milham Road turn left (east) and the Museum is at the end of the road.

By plane, simply fly to the Kalamazoo/Battle Creek International Airport and taxi up on the Museum's flight deck.



## Museum has Saxe...and lots of it

Toledo, Ohio--

Contemporary Crafts and the Saxe Collection continues through Nov. 14 at The Toledo Museum of Arts.

Featuring 123 contemporary craft objects in glass, clay, fiber, metal, and wood primarily from the 1980s, the exhibition explores the dramatic flourishing of art patronage in America during this decade through the well known craft collection of Dorothy and George Saxe of Menlo Park, California. It includes works ranging from whimsical figurative sculptures to powerful abstractions to highly refined vessel forms.

Organized by The Toledo
Museum of Art, the exhibition and
national tour are sponsored by Philip
Morris Companies Inc. After its
premiere in Toledo, the exhibition will
travel to St. Louis, Newport Beach,
California, and Washington, D.C.

Since 1980, the Saxes have focused primarily on contemporary glass and ceramics, buying current work from commercial galleries and juxtaposing objects by emerging talent with those of more recognized artists.

Drawn from their extensive holdings, the exhibition analyzes the Saxes' enterprise as a case study to gain insight into the dramatic changes that have occurred in the art marketplace, especially in crafts, during the 1980s. More important, it captures the exciting changes that have occurred within the crafts


themselves during one of the most critical decades for the arts of this century.

Studio craft was one of the visual arts to benefit most from the increased art patronage in the 1980s. Established fine arts collectors, as well as those who pursued only handcrafted objects, increasingly sought those works in craft media that increased the conceptual ideas of contemporary painters and sculptors, rather than the traditional concerns for function and material.

The exhibition features works of art by 98 artists, including key works of contemporary glass by such international figures as Howard Ben Tre', Dale Chihuly, Dan Dailey, Stanislav Libensky, and Jaroslava Brychtova'. Ceramics are represented with significant examples by Robert Arneson, Jack Earl, Viola Frey, Robert Turner, and Peter Voulkos. The work of Olga de Amaral, Lia Cook, Diane Itter, Jane Sauer, and Cynthia Schira represents fiber and baskets.

The exhibition also features turned-wood bowls by Melvin and Mark Lindquist and Bob Stocksdale; furniture by Sam Maloof and Alphonse Mattia; and jewelry by metalsmiths Deborah Aguado, William Harper, and Earl Pardon.

The exhibition will be open during regular Museum hours: Tuesday-Thursday, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.;

## Robotic whales spouting in Lansing

Lansing, Michigan-

The largest creatures ever to have lived are swimming, diving and spouting at Impression 5 Science Museum, named one of the top 10 science museums in the country.

Following the museum's smashing success with 1992's "Colossil Fossils: The Living Dinosaurs"—for which almost 70,000 visitors turned out in just over three months—Dinamation International of Irvine, California, chose Impression 5 as the site of 1993's "World of Whales," its next generation of robotic creatures.

Visitors will be able to walk among the whales and literally come face to face with some of the most extraordinary creatures known to humankind. From their territorial ancestors to today's acrobatic humpback, this must-see exhibit is an in-depth exploration of these magnificent mammals.

Other special events scheduled during this marine extravaganza include: Flipper Flicks, a showing of whale-related documentaries and films presented regularly on the exhibit floor, Breakfast with the Whales, sponsored by McDonald's, to acquaint young children with the whales while they enjoy a breakfast treat; Why a Whale?, an enchanting, original hour-long children's musical performed daily throughout the

exhibit; Classroom Cetacea, workshops for educators who want to incorporate whales and ocean environmental issues into their classrooms; and Scary Deep Sea Snooze, a special fun-filled Halloween camp-in at the museum that includes workshops and movies.

"World of Whales" is Dinamation's amazing next generation of robotic exhibits, featuring 10 spouting, swimming, tail-swishing replicas of the ocean's giants. The exhibit, appearing for the first time in Michigan, continues through Nov. 28 at Impression 5 Science Museum.

On the outside, Dinamation's whale robots look, act and sound like real whales, but on the inside they have absolutely nothing in common with the real thing. A skeleton of bone is replaced by a robotic structure made of steel and aluminum. This framework is constructed to allow the smooth movements of a whale—swimming, diving, twisting.

These movements are not controlled by a brain in the whale's head, but rather by a computer located in the base of the robot. The movements are a result of pushing compressed air into cylinders that

contain a piston. The piston, sliding in and out, causes the large movements of the body. For the whales, some of the compressed air is released at the top of the robot, resulting in a life-like blowhole and spout.

Robotic technology can create the movement of a whale, but making it look like a living creature is another matter. The musculature of the animal is foam rubber formed in a mold, cast from a full-scale clay sculpture of the animal

Skin is a special challenge. Artificial skins tend to wrinkle and crack when they are bent. Dinamation researched for months to develop a skin that would react with the elasticity of real skin. In the end a special polymer was developed.

Impression 5 Science Museum is located at 200 Museum Drive in downtown Lansing, three blocks east of the Capitol off Michigan Avenue. Call 517-485-8116 for more information.

## 'Double, Double' gives Leachman two roles for Halloween

#### By JOHN CROOK

Cloris Leachman is fending off an asthma attack on an October afternoon, but her spirits lift as she talks about her upcoming dual roles in a Halloween special. The multi-award-winning actress plays both a wicked witch, and her sweet sister in "Double, Double, Toil and Trouble," an ABC TV movie airing Saturday, Oct. 30.

Mary-Kate and Ashley Olsen ("Full House") star as twins Lynn and Kelly Farmer, who discover that their Aunt Agatha (Leachman) is a black-hearted witch. In the course of trying to help their financially troubled parents, they learn that Agatha has placed her own twin, Sophia, under an evil spell. Unless the girls can save Sophia by midnight on Halloween, their kindly aunt will remain trapped in a magic mirror forever.

Helping them in their mission is a small circle of unlikely friends headed by Mr. Nofziger (Meshach Taylor of "Dave's World"), a homeless eccentric. But Agatha is an evil force to be reckoned with.

"She's the best witch ever,"
Leachman says with relish. "When
you first see my character, I'm
studying deeply from a big tome on

my desk. And it's obvious I'm muttering in Latin. Now, children won't know what I'm saying, but I'm going" (she drops her voice into a deeper, spookier register). "Per diem. Ad nauseam." She laughs at the memory. "That's the kind of thing I do to amuse myself."

The six-time Emmy winner, who also holds an Oscar and a Golden Globe, is well known for her prodigious knack for inventing memorable bits of business—"doing things under the story," she calls it—and she says she was delighted with the way her producers and directors, Stuart Margolin, gave her more or less free rein to work her inspired brand of lunacy.

She happily shares a catalog of the rich silliness she invented for the TV movie. For example, the producers wanted her to have gray hair during most of the movie, but black hair when she attends the witches' ball. What to do?

"I said, 'I have an idea. I'll shine my witch's boots and I'll have a strand of hair hanging over my eye, and finally, I just push it back with my hand—and (the polish) will get on my hair. Then I catch myself in the mirror and get the idea: Oh! So I do a couple of more strokes, then (there's) a quick cut to me all ready."

Leachman says she found the Olsen twins "amazing...very normal, responsive children," although their presence did require some adjustments in the acting process.


"These kids, of course, couldn't read. Well, they're just learning. So their coach stands off-camera and says a line, and they just parrot it after her. So you wait for that. It's like skiing, where you're traversing down a slope...and as you do the turn, you lift your ski a little bit, you 'unweight' it. So it was like that. You unweight your ski while they say (their lines), then you keep sliding along in the snow, then on another line you do another traverse—and it just slides right along."


Leachman says she hopes "Double, Double" becomes an annual Halloween staple, pointing out elements of "The Wizard of Oz" in the story of misfit companions trying to help a child, or children, on a dangerous mission.

"I think it's a marvelous, wonderful achievement. I haven't seen such care, such detail, going into something. We were like little kids," she laughs. "It's the most fun I've ever had for Halloween. And I think being on the night before Halloween, you could have...parties around this, use this as a centerpiece.

"It's scary. Very scary! These things I've been talking about, these are just my little heh heh heh," she chuckles softly, still very much in character.
