

Suspected torturer bound for trial

(Editor's note: The name of the alleged victim in the following story as well as her place of residence in Northville Township have been omitted in order to protect her identity.)

The man accused of abusing and sexually assaulting his ex-girlfriend, a Northville Township woman, was bound over for trial last week after an emotional day in court and some unsuccessful legal maneuvering by his lawyer.

Thirty-fifth District Court Judge John MacDonald on March 2 ruled that enough evidence existed to try Keenan Lewis Wells, 25, on four felony charges, three of which carry a maximum penalty of life imprisonment. Wells maintains he is innocent.

The Detroit man faces charges of first-degree criminal sexual con-

Report sees savings in partial consolidation

The two Northvilles and the two Plymouths could deliver better service for less money if they jointly operate some police and fire services, a new report concludes.

Released last week, the report comes from a committee made up of officials from Northville and Plymouth cities and Northville and Plymouth Townships.

It's the same group that spent 1993 and a good chunk of 1994 working on a five-community service agreement with Canton Township. Committee members say that the report is a preliminary one but express confidence in the numbers it presents because they're based on data from the five-community study.

The report favors having the Northvilles and the Plymouths combine their public safety radio dispatch, prisoner lockup and record keeping services (collectively referred to as "DLR") and house it all in a single-to-be-constructed building. Doing so, the report said, will substantially improve police

Township officials cool to merger idea

The chances are slim that Northville Township will be part of any Northville/Plymouth consolidation of police and fire services, events last week seem to suggest.

Despite Supervisor Karen Baja's strong support for the service merger most of the remaining six members of the board of trustees are cool to the idea.

What does win their strong backing is the proposal to buy a new police radio. The head of the township's Department of Public Safety (DPS) supports both their stands.

That purchase could effectively end chances for Northville Township to participate in any potential joint service agreement. That, Baja said, would mean the township passes up a chance for bet-

Aging dispatch radio finally gives out

Something that Northville Township officials have expected for quite a while took place last week - their police/fire radio communications system finally died.

Its crash has prompted the board of trustees to move quickly to replace it.

The March 1 fire at the Optical Imaging Systems (OIS) plant at Five Mile and Beck was the straw that broke the camel's back, Department of Public Safety Direc-

tor Chip Snider said.

The DPS radio is a quarter-million-dollar system that is used to coordinate the activities of police, fire and emergency medical service personnel. It's 17 years old.

Police union officials have called the radio a safety hazard. They've feared it could break down during a critical incident, causing a citizen or police officer to be hurt or killed. They and Snider have warned for months that the system could break down at any time.

That long-anticipated event hap-

pened at about 11 p.m. March 1. The OIS fire drew officials from more than a dozen area police and fire departments. The amount of radio traffic they generated "just pushed it over the edge," Snider told the board at its March 2 study session.

By prior agreement, Northville City's dispatch center immediately took over radio services for the township.

Technicians from Motorola Corp., the radio's manufacturer, worked through the night on the

dead system but were unable to revive it, Snider said.

"It's trash," he told the board.

The company installed a desktop "loaner" model so the township could resume dispatch activities but that's only a temporary solution.

Snider said that the loaner is constantly monitored. If a problem with it were to develop, he added, he will seek board approval to negotiate an interim dispatch services agreement with either Northville City or Plymouth Town-

ship.

The permanent solution, Snider told the trustees, is for the township to buy a new radio. Despite the expected \$300,000 to \$400,000 price tag, a majority of the board at the study session expressed support for the purchase.

Township officials on Tuesday will open the sealed bids which area companies have submitted for a new radio.

The trustees agreed to Snider's request to hold a special meeting

fire departments. The report stated that they will probably merge their DLR services "in the next few months" if a four-community agreement can't be finalized.

That seems less and less likely to happen, however, as Northville Township is poised to buy its own

on March 16 to review the bids and possibly give conditional approval to one of them.

If that happens, the radio wouldn't come on line until this summer because three or four months are needed to construct it and modify the space in police headquarters where it will be installed.

New count shows school population grows over year

The Northville School District student body has done some plumping up this year. District officials, however, aren't looking for any crash diet plans - that is exactly what they were hoping for.

The district's February student count showed that 40.7 pupils have been added to Northville classrooms this year, making a total head count of 4,341 kindergarten through 12th grade students.

The additional student population means more than just new bodies taking up desks in the classroom. It means more dollar signs for the district now that all Michigan public school systems are funded by the state on a per-pupil basis as a result of Proposal A - passed by voters in March of last year.

Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski, who is happy with the increase, said the growing student population means that Northville's

reputation as a quality school district is attracting new families to the area.

"I am pleased with the count," Rezmierski said. "This is promising for our school district."

Last month's tally will be averaged with the district's 1995-96 school year initial count, to be taken during the first week in October. The average of the two numbers will determine the per-pupil amount the district will receive during the upcoming fiscal year. Officials calculate a full-time equivalent (FTE) for the student population because some students attend Northville for a half-day while attending a technical school. The FTE number is what the state bases its funding on.

John Street, director of business and finance for the district, said he feels optimistic about Northville's financial situation next year. This year's student population increase is more dramatic than usual and a promising sign

Ramp challenges handicapper bowlers

Bowling for students at Old Village School just became a bit more challenging. Not that bowling isn't a challenging game in itself.

Thanks to Dave Bergman who designed the Bergman Bowleramp and Jerry Harris, the owner of Novi Bowl, who purchased five of the \$250 ramps for the students, they and other physically challenged people can now enjoy a game of bowling at Novi Bowl that was not possible before.

Old Village School in Northville wanted more student participation than was possible with the old ramp. The aides are less involved with the Bowleramp and the player has to do more thinking because the ramp can be aimed at specific pins.

The students, who are multiply impaired (physically and mentally), have just completed the leisure recreation skills section of their school program which included bowling with the new Bergman Bowleramp.

"The students don't have good carryover skills and need to actually practice in the community," said Cathy Shapero, Adapted Physical Education Teacher. Students were in the school's gym Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. working on bowling skills. They traveled to Novi Bowl for a morning of hands-on practice on Tuesday for walkers and on Thursday for wheelers.

"He's very animated when he comes home on Thursdays," said Andrea Baier of Redford, of her son Tom's bowling experience. "He enjoys the field trips and likes the opportunity to get out into the community."

There are 111 students over the age of 8 who get a chance to bowl. There were 18 students in wheel chairs and 55 walkers who attended bowling units.

In previous years, the students used a simple ramp designed just for the player's assistance with ball handling but not for interaction by the player. When the ball was placed at the top of the ramp, gravity took over and the ball went down the ramp before the player could do anything about it. Later rubber bands were used as a makeshift stop.

With the Bowleramp, the ball is stationed on the top of the ramp and held in place by an adjustable positioning stop until the player is ready to bowl. The player stands

or, if in a wheelchair, sits next to the ramp and with a sweeping movement of the arm gives the ball a push so that it goes down the ramp. The positioning stop can be moved depending on the user's capabilities.

The further back the ball is placed the harder or more challenging it is for the user. The targeting chart allows the guide rails to swiveled to aim at specific pins without moving the entire ramp. The previous ramp did not have a targeting capability.

A gutter guard was used with both ramps to keep the ball in the lane.

Bergman, a retired engineer, was at Novi Bowl when he saw the

students bowling with the previous ramp.

"They seemed bored," said Bergman who went over to talk to the group.

"I wanted to challenge the player," said Bergman.

"The old ramp was too easy."

Three to four prototypes were made before the final model became available. Goodrich Manufacturing out of Goodrich, Mich., developed the prototypes.

"The new ramp requires more effort and participation on behalf of the child," Bergman said.

"This ramp makes targeting possible. Before (the player) had to shift the whole ramp and repositioning was guess work."

The new ramp can be reset to the previous location.

"I couldn't have done it without the team work," said Bergman.

Bergman also invented Easy Bowler which was tested at Novi Bowl.

Man reports seeing his own car while riding down road

Northville Township handled a case which may or may not have been auto theft.

A 29-year-old Redford Township man came to police headquarters Saturday morning. He told the reporting officer in the case that his car had been stolen and that he had found it behind the Metropolitan Seventh Day Adventist Church on Haggerty Road near Five Mile.

He saw the 1988 Ford Escort parked behind the church while riding north on Haggerty in another car, the man said. He told the officer that he then contacted a "source" who verified that the Escort was his.

The man refused to identify the source, the officer said, claiming that he wanted to "invoke the First Amendment."

Police found the car, locked and undamaged, behind Seventh Day. The officer noted that a records check indicated that the man had been a patient at Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital in the past and expressed doubt that a theft had taken place.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT: Police responded to a call of a domestic dispute on Linden Street last weekend.

When police arrived at the home, the 21-year-old man, who had called the department about the dispute, and his live-in girlfriend appeared to be in a fight. When the police entered the home, the man became verbally abusive and repeatedly told the officers to leave his house. The man became more and more belligerent as police attempted to get some preliminary information from him. The woman was visibly shaking and crying.

The man decided he wanted to talk outside and left the home with the officers and his girlfriend following.

The officers tried again to get a statement and information from the man, who began to walk quickly around the side of the home. The officer ordered the man to stop. The man kept walking and one of the officers then attempted to grab him.

The man began to struggle with the officer in an attempt to break free. During the struggle they fell to their knees because of the icy

condition of the driveway.

The man then began to flail his arms and the other officer had to get involved to restrain him. The man continued to struggle with the officers despite their commands to stop.

The man was arrested and processed without further incident. At the station he submitted to a Breathalyzer test, which showed he had a .196 blood-alcohol level.

The man was released on \$100 cash bond after sobering up. A preliminary examination is scheduled for April 3 at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

VANDALISM: Township police got wet while working on Saturday.

An officer was passing by the Plymouth State Home building on Sheldon Road at about 10 p.m. He said he saw two individuals inside the abandoned building and called for backup to apprehend them.

When the officers entered the building they found no one but did find a number of fire hose valves opened and water everywhere, as much as two inches deep in some places.

They closed the valves and a Wayne County employee secured the building.

OUIL/ZERO TOLERANCE LAW: An 18-year-old Northville man was arrested for having alcohol in his system while driving - a new state law in effect since November. The law states that underaged drinkers who drive with a .02 or higher blood-alcohol level are in violation of the law.

The man was driving 70 mph on Eight Mile Road, a 40 mph zone, when Northville City Police pulled him over. The man, who had two passengers in the car who admitted to drinking, said he had only had a couple of sips of alcohol before driving. He registered a .079 blood-alcohol level.

The man was arrested and posted a \$200 cash bond. He was released after sobering up. A preliminary examination was scheduled for yesterday at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

OUIL: A 24-year-old South Lyon man was arrested for drunken driving March 4 when Northville City Police clocked him driving 50

mph down Hines Drive, a 30 mph zone.

The man was weaving back and forth in his lane when police pulled him over.

When an officer approached the man, his eyes were blood shot and he was staggering when he stepped out of the car.

The man failed a number of field sobriety tests and registered a .109 blood-alcohol level after a Breathalyzer test. A blood alcohol level of .1 is the legal drunkenness threshold. He was arrested and processed at the station.

The man posted a \$100 cash bond and was released after sobering up. A preliminary examination has been scheduled for March 10 at 35th District Court in Plymouth.

OUIL NO. 2: A 41-year-old Redford Township man was arrested for drunken driving after he made a number of turns without signaling and was weaving within his lane.

Northville City Police pulled the man over after he turned off of South Main Street onto Seven Mile Road.

When the officer approached the man's vehicle, a strong odor of intoxicants emitted from the car. The man told the officer in a slurred voice that he was crazy for thinking he may be driving intoxicated because he was not weaving in his lane and he had only had two beers.

duct (CSC) during the commission of a felony, of using a weapon and causing personal injury during the CSC and of assault with intent to do great bodily harm.

Township police say Wells systematically beat, burned and otherwise abused the woman, 23, for nine hours on Feb. 8 after discovering what he thought was evidence of her seeing another man.

The three sexual conduct charges each carry a maximum penalty of life imprisonment. The assault charge carries a maximum penalty of 10 years.

Wells' chances of going to prison increased when his alleged victim agreed to cooperate with prosecutors, reversing her earlier stand.

A few days after her initial report to police, the woman told investigators that she wanted to drop the matter. Authorities made it clear, however, that they would pursue charges against Wells, relying on a taped copy of her interview with police as evidence, if necessary.

One week ago, however, the woman agreed to take the stand. A staff member from Haven, an organization that assists victims of domestic violence, accompanied her to court. The testimony became emotional at times, both for her and apparently for Wells.

Tears came to her eyes when she described how he burned her with the scissors, first heating the blades with a lighter and later suspending them over a candle flame.

"He said that every five minutes he'd burn me and he told me to watch the clock," the woman said. "And every five minutes he'd do it."

Wells told her it was her fault the whole time, she added.

and that he was only doing this because he loved me but that he didn't want to have anything to do with me because I was a whore," the woman said.

As she testified, Wells reacted emotionally, apparently wiping away a tear at one point.

His attorney didn't challenge the allegations during his cross examination. Instead Jack McColskey questioned the woman closely about exactly what took place, trying unsuccessfully to convince MacDonald that evidence to warrant the criminal sexual conduct charges was lacking.

Michigan law, he argued, requires that penetration of the genital area with the intent of sexual gratification take place in order for a suspect to be charged with first degree CSC. Neither element of that charge exists in this case, McColskey said.

"This wasn't about sex," he said. "It was a plain straightforward assault. Based on this testimony we have a heinous, brutal assault."

Prosecutor Daniel Pertella countered that the law says that any touching of the genital area merits the charge. He added that proof of Wells' sexual intentions came when he restrained the woman with handcuffs, a device that the couple had used in the past during consensual sex.

MacDonald also ordered that Wells' bond continue at \$25,000 cash despite McColskey's request for a lower bail. To date, Wells hasn't posted bail and remains in the Wayne County Jail.

The next stop in the legal process is Wayne County Circuit Court for Wells' arraignment, scheduled for one week from today.

Teaching focuses on drug resistance

Northville City Police Sergeant James Marks stands in front of the fifth grade classroom at Our Lady of Victory School with one of teacher Linda Okasinski's students.

"You want a cigarette?" he asks the quietly giggling pupil as he holds out his hand. "No," the student responds firmly.

"Oh, come on, just try it," Marks insists. "No," the student says louder.

"You sure?" Marks asks again.

"No," the student says emphatically and then walks away. The classroom applauds the student, who has shown the proper method of fending off peer pressure.

It would not seem that students at the fifth-grade level - kids who are 10- and 11-years-old - would be exposed to the pressures of experimenting with cigarettes, alcohol or drugs at such a young age. The unfortunate reality, however, is that if these children have not been faced with peer pressure situations yet, many of them will in the near future.

Such role playing to practice proper techniques and strategies to steer clear from situations that could lead to substance abuse is just one tactic Marks uses in his

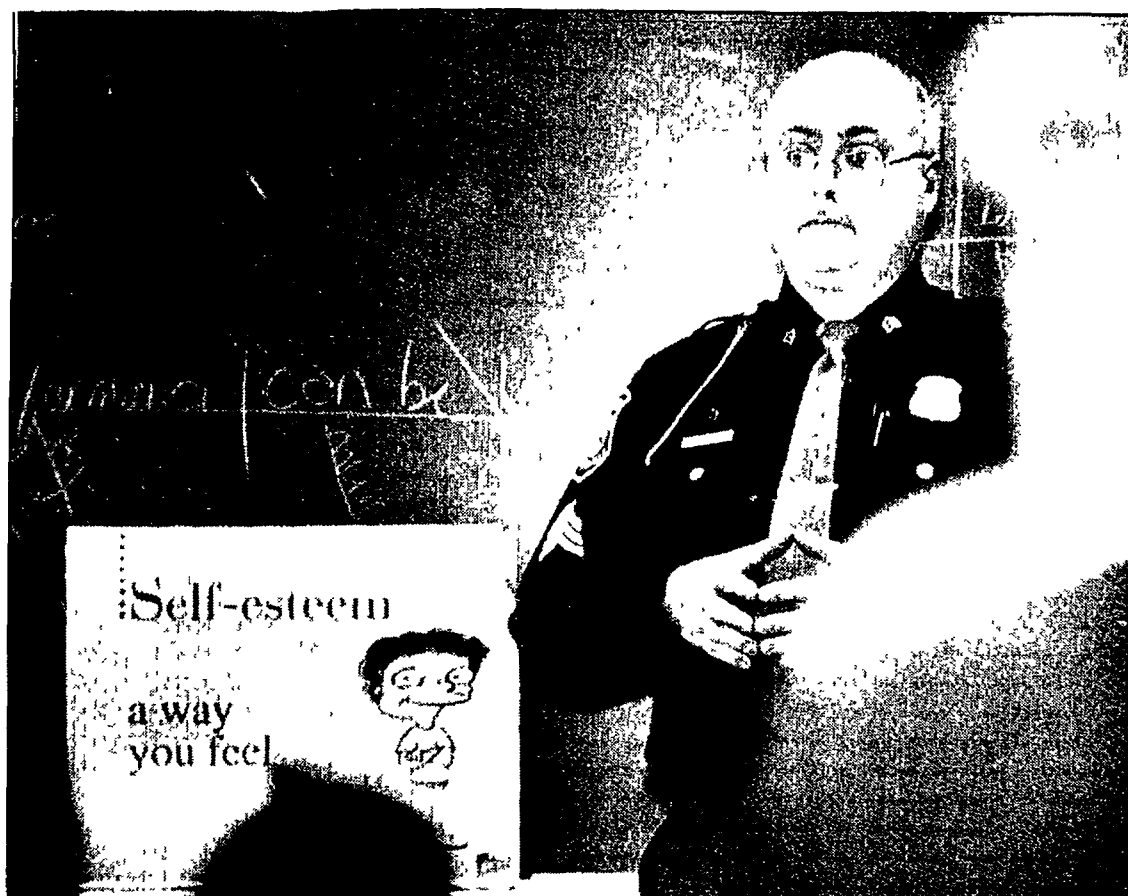

Drug Abuse Resistance Education classes. So far students have studied the effects of mind-altering drugs, how to say "no," changing beliefs about substance abuse, and self-esteem.

Marks, who works with fifth-grade students at OLV and St. Paul's Lutheran Elementary School, is entering his eighth lesson with students of the 17-week DARE program. Marks became DARE certified in December after

graduating from a two-week course taught by the Michigan State Police Department.

In addition to the vital information the kids in her classroom are learning, Marks serves as a positive role model, Okasinski said.

"The kids are fascinated with him. They ask just as many questions about his job as a police officer as they do about drugs," she said. "It's important that they have this positive exposure to a police

officer."

St. Paul's fifth-grade teacher Jennifer Beagan said the lessons help provide students with techniques to stay clean. The messages, she said, are lasting ones.

"It gives them an alternative to work with if they are ever presented with those situations," Beagan said. "I truly believe they will take it with them."

The students will go through a graduation ceremony in May.

Fire at plant was over soon, authorities say

Northville Township fire department officials say last week's fire at Optical Imaging Systems (OIS) was big but short-lived.

The March 1 blaze drew attention because a variety of hazardous chemicals are stored in the computer manufacturing plant located on Five Mile near Beck Road. Officials evacuated the 150 OIS employees and 25 nearby residents for several hours as a precaution in case a leak had occurred.

Township Fire Chief Bill Zhmendak this week said that no leak occurred, a fact he chalked up to the safety measures incorporated into the plant's design.

"OIS has done an outstanding job of securing their hazardous chemicals," he said. "It's a very safe building."

The fire began in a "flame hood," a small enclosed box that's designed to contain gases during experiments.

For reasons that still aren't clear, Zhmendak said, some gases in the hood interacted with each other and spontaneously combust-

ed.

The hood is connected to a 300-foot long fiberglass-lined "chimney" that takes fumes laden with gaseous chemicals into a water filter.

The filter then "scrubs" the gases out of the air before it's vented to the outside of the building.

A powerful ventilation fan which normally sucks fumes out of the flame hood pulled the fire into the chimney, Zhmendak said.

All of the fiberglass lining was afire within seconds.

"In effect we had almost instantly 300 feet of fire in there," Zhmendak said.

The flames then quickly burned themselves out. Fire officials expect to get an estimate of the damage cost of the fire by the end of the week.

OIS opened in November. The company will design and build flat-panel computer screens for a variety of uses, including military aircraft, at the Five Mile and Beck location.

The plant does house extremely hazardous chemicals, OIS President Rex Tapp said, but a variety of safety measures are in place to

make sure they don't leak in a fire or other disaster.

Because the plant isn't on-line yet, fire officials didn't have full details on what chemicals and

safety systems were involved. Zhmendak said that OIS officials are cooperating with the fire department to correct that.

Company and fire officials are

developing a plan to respond to a fire or other emergency in the future, he said. Zhmendak added that OIS is considering putting in new equipment to reduce the

chance of a future fire. Those include replacing the fiberglass insulation with specially coated stainless steel and special fire sprinklers for the chimney.

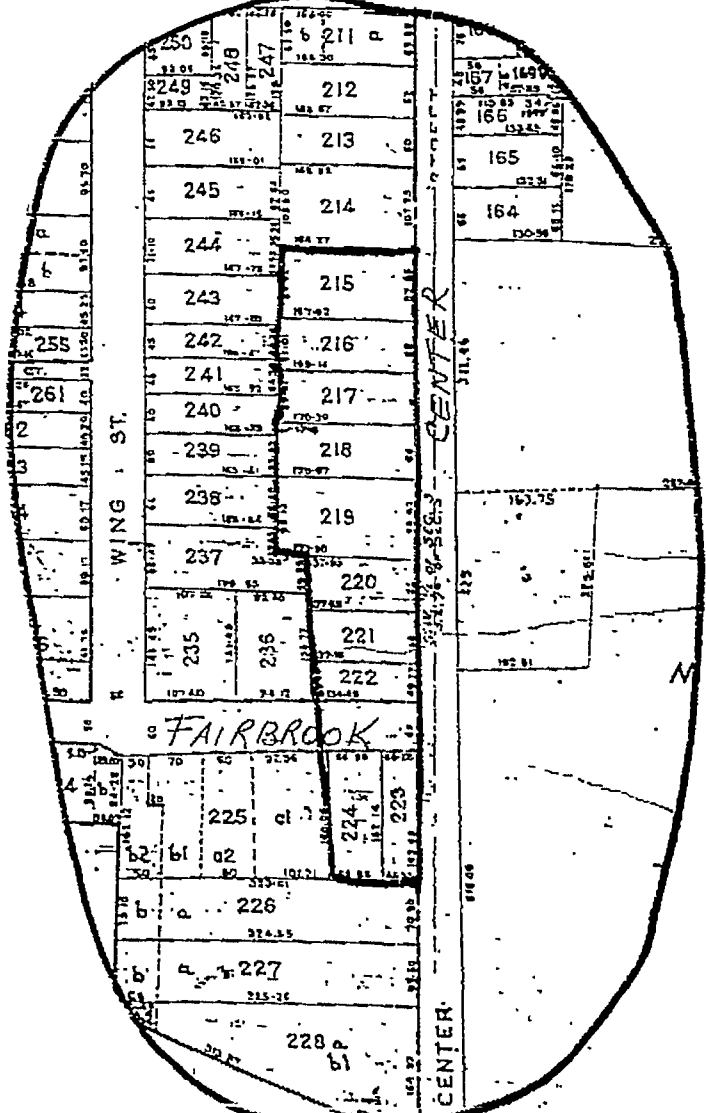

Board to wrap up tax appeals hearings

Sand is quickly running through the hourglass for city and township residents and property owners who plan to appeal their tax assessments.

There are two more board of review dates set for the city - Wednesday, March 15, from 1-9 p.m. and Tuesday, March 21, from noon-7 p.m. City residents must make an appointment for a hearing no later than March 15.

Call the city offices at 349-1300. Township residents have two options available to them with walk-in dates and appointment-only dates scheduled. The walk-in dates are set for Saturday, March 11, from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. and Wednesday, March 15, from 1-5 p.m. and 6-9 p.m.

Appointment-only dates are Monday, March 13, from 9 a.m.-noon and 1-5 p.m., and March 14 from 1-5 p.m. and 6-9 p.m. Appointments can be made anytime with the township offices at 348-5800.

To make an appeal, residents must have more than just a complaint with the rate of taxation, said city assessor Mark Christiansen.

"If someone comes in just to say taxes are too high, that's not why the board is there," he said. "It's there to evaluate the assessment that was made."

In asking for an assessment change, the board of review is bound to consider the assessor's decision as correct unless a resident can provide "firm evidence to the contrary," the guidelines say.

Although it is not mandatory, Christiansen said, most people come into the hearing with some proof or documentation supporting why they think their assessment was too high.

There are two main reasons a resident would appeal an assessment, Christiansen said.

- The assessed value exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the property.

- The homeowner's assessment was higher than similar properties in the area.

Assessments on township homestead property will increase by an average of 1.81 percent this year. Assessment increases for city residents average 4 percent for Oakland County homeowners and 8.5 percent for Wayne County.

The aggregate totals, however, mean little to individual homeowners, as increases will vary. County increases are based on sales trends and home values within each community.

Overall, residents are seeing much smaller increases this year compared to other years thanks to Proposal A - passed in March 1994 by voters. The new law gave homeowners a substantial cut in property taxes but a 50 percent sales and cigarette tax increase to provide revenue for public schools.

The law set a cap on property tax increases at the cost of living - 2.6 percent this year - or 5 percent, with the lower of the two establishing the ceiling for increases.

Two factors play into a home's value now: market value and taxable value. The assessed valuation of a home - half the property's market value - will still increase each year. The taxable value, however, will increase at a much slower rate due to the cap. So, in coming years, homeowners can expect to see a widening gap between a property's actual cash value and its taxable value.

Assessments for residents who have not built additions onto their homes in the past year will stay below the 2.6 percent cap. For residents who have made additions, the new portion of the home will be taxed based upon its market value the first year with the cap going into effect the following year.

Also, the year after a property transfer or if the home is sold, the cap will be lifted from the home and taxed at its full value. The year after that, the cap will be reinstated.

Residents who hope to be suc-

cessful in lowering their taxes have some work to do, Christiansen said.

"It's not easy," he said. "I do this (assessing) all year, so if they are going to refute this, they had better do their homework too."

City sets guidelines for poverty exemptions

Northville City Council members officially adopted guidelines for the board of review when considering poverty exemptions in property tax assessment appeals.

The new law requiring local governments to adopt guidelines was passed last December. Formerly, local boards of review had total discretion in granting hardship reductions with no regulating standards.

"I think the state in reviewing appeals has found that the act (poverty exemption) has been somewhat abused," said City Assessor Mark Christiansen.

Poverty exemptions, also known as hardship reductions, are granted by the community's Board of Review to residents who apply on the grounds that their tax assessments will cause an undue burden on them.

There were 51 property owners in the city of Northville, with annual incomes ranging from \$5,000-\$30,000, who received reductions last year.

Under the adopted guidelines residents must not have total assets exceeding \$50,000 in value in addition to a car and the home and the home cannot exceed \$200,000 in value.

In addition, residents must

meet these requirements to be considered for an exemption.

- Applicants must provide copies of 1994 or 1995 Homestead Property Tax Credit Form MI-1040 CR and could be required to provide other proof of income, such as W-2 forms or current pay stubs.

- Must obtain an application from the assessor's office.

The annual income guidelines for hardship reductions are:

- No more than \$25,000 for a single resident

- No more than \$30,000 for a family of two

- No more than \$34,000 for a family of three

- No more than \$36,000 for a family of four

- No more than \$40,000 for a family of five

The Board of Review adopted its first formal guidelines last year, which established the maximum income levels and also established a formula which set the assessment at a level so the net property taxes did not exceed 5 percent of the resident's net income.

The deadline for poverty exemption applications in March 17. Exemptions are valid for the year they are granted only. A resident must apply each year for the assistance.

RUNNER'S KNEE

The athletic injury known as runner's knee is not a problem solely restricted to runners. Legislators finish work on tax cuts

Lawmakers of both parties found satisfaction as they completed work on \$186 million in tax cuts by March 1, just 13 days past the one-month deadline set by Gov. John Engler.

"Families and job providers will reap significant benefit from these tax cuts," said House Taxation Committee chair Willis Bullard Jr., R-Milford, emphasizing the effects on both business and individuals.

Bullard, who represents the Oakland County part of Northville, guided the package through the House, which sometimes refused to concur in Senate amendments, and through the House-Senate conference committee.

"Our efforts were geared toward the middle class," said Rep. Kirk Profit, D-Ypsilanti, whose district includes Salem Township. The ranking minority member on the House panel added, "We achieved those efforts through the tuition credit and the higher (personal) exemption."

Sen. Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield

Township, said the decision to allow a college tuition credit against the income tax "helps our middle-income taxpayers more than just a straight deduction."

Some House Democrats and a few Republicans, however, voted against the income tax cut bill.

Senate Bill 237 allows residents to claim a 4 percent credit for undergraduate tuition and fees paid to Michigan community colleges and universities. The colleges must limit tuition hikes to the rate of consumer price inflation for residents to obtain the income tax credit. The credit may be claimed for just four years.

SB 237 was adopted on a 58-45 vote that split the two parties.

Republicans voting yes included Willis Bullard and Gerry Law of Plymouth.

A few House Democrats held out unsuccessfully as the House approved 76-26 a cut in the single business tax (SBT). Senate Bill 235 cut unemployment insurance and workers compensation from the base on which SBT is figured.

Republicans voting yes again

included Bullard and Law.

House Democrats withheld enough votes to keep a cut in the intangibles tax from taking immediate effect. House Bill 4233 increases the intangibles tax exemption from \$5,000 to \$8,000 for singles and from \$10,000 to \$16,000 for couples.

Here is Bullard's outline of other bills that passed:

- HB 4231, raising the personal income tax exemption from \$2,100 to \$2,400 this year and to \$2,500 in 1997. An additional \$250 will be added to the exemption if 1995 state revenues exceed estimates by \$80 million.

- HB 4232, indexing the income tax exemption to inflation starting in 1998.

- HB 4230, eliminating social security contributions from the single business tax base.

- SB 29, exempting intangible property from real and personal property taxes.

- SB 233, repealing the intangibles tax in 1998.

Gov. John Engler is expected to sign all bills.

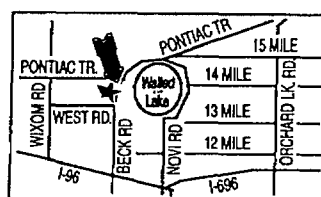

On April 2 the Mid-Michigan Antiquarian Book Dealers Association is again sponsoring its Genealogy and History Book Fair at Lansing Center from 10 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Admission is \$1.50. The show features new and used books offered by genealogical and historical organizations as well as commercial dealers. Items available include local, state, regional, foreign and military histories, biographies, research and reference guides, genealogies and family histories, crests, ethnic studies and cookbooks, atlases and maps, pins, foreign language dictionaries, "How to" guides, travel guides, charts, forms, stationery, bibliographies and more.

Mill Race Village will reopen the first Sunday in June. On that date the Northville Historical Society plans its own area book sale. The event will feature books for local area historical societies as well as handcrafted birdhouses which the Historical Society Stone Gang has been working on all winter.

Currently the Society has four publications of its own which will be available for purchase. They are: *Northville - The First Hundred Years*, by Jack Hoffman; *Early Northville*, by Laura Hixson Smyth; *Step-by-Step Through Northville*, by Barbara Louie and Diane Rockall; and *Northville - The Ideal Suburban Village*, a reprint.

March serves as National Women's History Month so for the next few weeks this column will feature short excerpts on some of the ladies from this community's past.

Dr. Mary Lapham is probably the community's most famous late female. She was born in 1860 in Northville. Her mother, Mary Gregory, was also born in this community. Her father, Jared Lapham, arrived as a young man and opened a mercantile business.

The Gregory family home was located at Main and Wing where city hall stands today. At the time of Dr. Gregory's death it became the Lapham home and eventually Mary donated it and the adjoining property to the village. For many years that structure served as the Village Hall.

Mary operated Lapham State Bank for her father until leaving Northville just before the turn of the century to become a physician. She was 40 when she received her medical degree from the Medical College of Pennsylvania. She introduced a Swiss treatment for tuberculosis to this country after extended study in Europe.

Upon her return to America she resided in North Carolina where she established a clinic at Highland. During the first World War she returned to Europe to assist refugees. Later she returned to America and did research at John Hopkins and the University of Pennsylvania. She died in Florida in 1936.

In her earlier days, Mary established the Northville Ladies Library Association, forerunner to the district public library of today. She wrote the constitution and bylaws for that group, donated the first books for its collection, and provided the organization with a building.

That building was known as the Lapham Library for the 72 years it served as this community's library. In 1972, the building was relocated to Mill Race Village. It is known now as New School Church.

Mary served as second president of the Northville Women's Club just before she departed the area for medical school. This Saturday the Northville-Novl branch of the American Association of University Women will acknowledge her contributions to the community and the nation by recognizing her with their first historical community enrichment award.

Traffic accident injuries two locals

Two Northville residents suffered injuries from an alcohol-related accident on Seven Mile Road in Salem Township Monday night.

Mandy McLmurray, the passenger, was listed in serious condition at University of Michigan Hospital as of Tuesday afternoon. She was initially listed in critical condition.

Jeffrey Zayti, the driver, was listed in fair condition at St. Joseph's

Mercy hospital in Superior Township as of Tuesday afternoon.

State Trooper Sean Tinkle said the police were unable to confirm their ages. He said McLmurray is approximately 25 years old and that Zayti was born in 1967.

Tinkle said the car, heading east on Seven Mile just east of Pontiac Trail, slid off the road in icy conditions then skidded for approxi-

mately 100 feet along the ditch before hitting a tree.

"It is believed that they lost control due to the road conditions," Tinkle said, estimating that the car was traveling approximately 50 to 55 miles per hour when it slid off the road.

Tinkle said the tires locked after the car went into the ditch.

Tinkle said that Zayti told him

he had drunk three beers that evening and that officers found an open liquor container at the site.

The officers did not get blood alcohol information at the site but would rely on information obtained at the hospital, Tinkle said.

The report will be forwarded to the Washtenaw County prosecutor, Tinkle said.

Senate passes unemployment comp reform

Michigan's employers will save \$439 million over five years, and the state will move down from second place in unemployment compensation taxes, under a bill passed last week by Senate Republicans.

"We'll still be in the top 10 in unemployment insurance taxes as a percentage of payrolls," said Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, sponsor of the reform measure "So we're still very generous."

Senate Bill 322 was adopted by a 20-17 vote and sent to the House of Representatives, where the GOP has a narrower majority - 56-53.

Republicans, facing rebellion in their own ranks, stripped out a section that would have instituted a "waiting week" before a laid-off worker could receive benefits. "How'd you like to wait a week? The bills keep coming in. Why hammer the unemployed?" said Sen. Jon Cisky, R-Saginaw, who led the fight against the waiting week.

Eliminating the waiting week would have cut total costs by \$50 million a year, according to Honigman's analysis. But he went along with it.

Area senators voted along party lines.

Republicans voting yes: Michael Bouchard of Birmingham, Loren Bennett of Canton, Mat Dunaskiss of Lake Orion, Robert Geake of Northville, Honigman, Mike Rogers of Howell, John Schwarz of Battle Creek.

Democrats voting no: George Hart of Dearborn, Alma Smith of South Lyon, Gary Peters of Bloomfield Township.

around who are Michigan's "competitor" states.

To Republicans, they are Wisconsin, North Carolina, Kentucky, Alabama and Arkansas - states whose commerce departments solicit moves from Michigan employers. They said Michigan employers pay \$500 per worker annually while North Carolina employers pay \$67 and Arkansas \$140.

"A concocted comparison," said minority floor leader John Cherry, D-Cllo. To Democrats, competitors are the high-wage industrial states of Minnesota, Illinois, New York, the New England and the West Coast states. "Michigan's maximum benefit is not even in the top 10. We're next to last among Great Lakes states," said Cherry.

State AFL-CIO president Frank Garrison denounced the bill as "economically and morally indefensible ... an economic kick in the teeth to Michigan workers when they are most vulnerable."

Michigan adopted its UI law in 1936, as required by federal law. Current tax collections are about \$1.2 billion a year. New employers pay a basic rate of 2.7 percent. After two years experience, the rate can vary from one to 12 percent.

Honigman called UI "a payroll tax. We tax creation of jobs. When you tax something, you get less of it. That's one of the iron laws of economics." The second-term sen-

ator proposed what he called "modest cuts in one of the most generous unemployment systems in the nation."

Items:

- End automatic indexing of benefits to the state's average weekly wage, a system which currently takes control of benefits away from the Legislature and gives it to the market place. Savings: \$18 million a year.
- Reduce the minimum UI tax to 0.5 percent permanently for employers who have had no benefit charges in five years. That would reduce the minimum tax from \$95 to \$47.50 compared to Indiana's \$50, Ohio's \$63 and Wisconsin's \$46. Savings: \$10 million a year.
- Cut UI taxes when the UI trust fund, currently at \$1 billion, has a balance equal to 1.2 percent of aggregate payrolls. No savings estimate.
- Eliminate the "alternate earnings qualifier," which allows high-wage workers to collect benefits if laid off after 14 credit weeks instead of 20 weeks that others must work. Said Honigman: "The law should treat all unemployed workers alike and certainly not discriminate in favor of high wage workers." Savings: \$2 million a year.
- Raise the amount a worker must earn to get a credit week from 20 times the minimum wage (\$67) to 30 times (\$100 50). Sav-

ings: \$7 million a year.

- Reduce benefits from 70 percent (maximum of \$293) to 65 percent. The actual wage replacement would then be 50 percent instead of 53 percent, which Honigman said "would bring Michigan into line with federal policy and our competitor states." Savings: \$65 million a year.
- Prohibit retroactive UI tax increases. Currently MESC can go back 10 years to re-compute a tax rate if it thinks too low a rate was charged - "fundamentally unfair," said Honigman.
- Allow designated "seasonal" employers - such as food processing - to opt out of the UI system. UI is supposed to help workers who lose jobs unexpectedly and through no fault of their own, not those who "knowingly choose employment which has a set duration." No savings estimate.
- Tighten misconduct rules by denying benefits to a worker who has failed a drug test or has stolen any amount (current limit: \$25 theft). No savings estimate.
- Reclassify some sales employees (Amway, Avon) as independent contractors, ineligible for UI benefits. No savings estimate.
- Reduce benefits faster where a worker finds alternative but lower-paying work.

If it were possible, Honigman would like to design a system of "negotiated benefits," where employees could choose alternatives to UI benefits: bigger paychecks, more vacation, individual unemployment accounts owned by the workers, or other benefits.

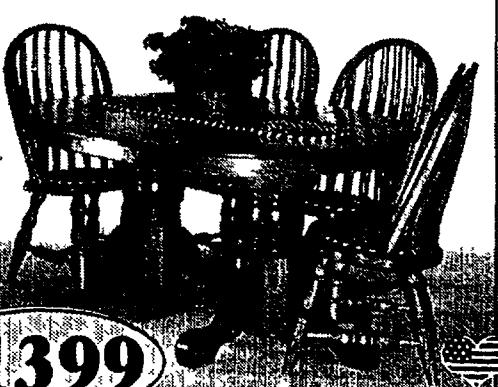

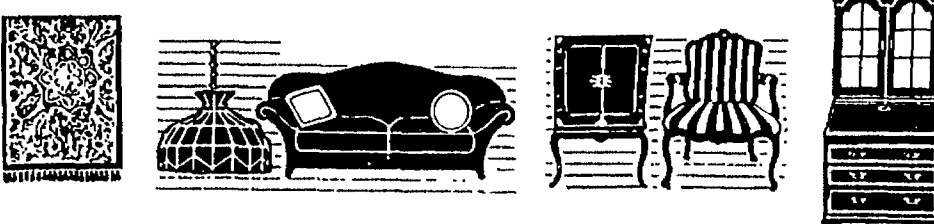

Counties want state to foot bill for courts

It would cost the state budget \$371 million to pay for full funding of all trial courts, the Michigan Association of Counties says.

"That's only one percent of the state's total budget," said Betty Witt, Mecosta County commissioner and MAC chair. MAC made its case March 1 for full state funding before a joint Senate-House panel in Lansing investigating court funding.

MAC executive director Tim McGuire vowed "to fight until all counties get courts subsidized."

Outstate counties are suing the state to enforce a 1980 law in which the Legislature funded Detroit Recorders and District courts and Wayne County Circuit Court with a promise to fund the other 82 counties' courts by 1988. The promise never was kept. The Michigan Supreme Court is scheduled to hear oral arguments today.

Sen. William VanRegenmorter, R-Jenison, co-chair of the panel, said the special joint committee,

scheduled to disband at the end of March, will be able to recommend only further study by the Senate and House Judiciary committees.

Part of the solution, MAC's Witt said, will be to cut the net cost of court operations by consolidating some courts and raising revenue.

Gov. John Engler has vowed to veto the addition of any trial judges (circuit, recorders, probate and district) until a more efficient system is designed. So far, however, the governor hasn't backed any

reform plan. His 1996 proposed budget calls for only a one percent increase in court funding.

The chief "reform" plan discussed in Lansing was proposed by a committee of the Michigan Bar Association - consolidating all four types of courts into a single "trial court." But the Bar's Representative Assembly refused to endorse that plan.

Wayne County Budget Director Patricia McKinnon backed MAC's proposal for full state funding of the courts.

"There is a perception that Wayne County is getting preferential treatment in financing its courts. The truth is the county still spends around \$100 million a year on the trial court system," she said.

Report says merger would realize savings

new radio system and Northville City is holding DLR merger talks with Novi.

Critics also charge that the report isn't inclusive, leaving out how costs would be shared, how fire department dispatch activities would be handled, staffing levels and how the four communities will agree to major decisions.

Despite the difficulties, the report claimed that the joint agreement would give each community access to better equipment and facilities than any one of them could afford on its own. They also would get that for less money than each of them would spend if every-one handled DLR services individually.

Together the four communities would spend about \$9.9 million over the next 10 years for joint DLR, the committee calculated, compared to an estimated total

cost of about \$12.6 million when it's done individually. Besides the \$2.76 million savings, the report stated that another benefit is that the quality of service provided through joint DLR would be better than what each community could give its residents on its own.

The \$9.9 million estimate covers both annual operating expenses (\$620,000 a year for 10 years) and the cost of building the new DLR facility and stocking it with state of the art equipment (\$1.9 million), paid for via a bond issue.

The DLR operation could be located in a number of places, the committee decided. The members' first choice was to house it in the basement of 35th District Court in Plymouth Township, an idea that got a "no" from the court. A second alternative identified in the report would be to put it in a free-standing building next door to the court on land Plymouth City owns.

Officials leery of consolidation

ter service at less cost.

A special committee released a report last week on four-community service consolidation talks among the two Northvilles and the two Plymouths (see related story). It favors joint operation of public safety radio dispatch services and prisoner lockup and record keeping facilities (DLR for short).

Also last week the DPS radio broke down (see related story) and the board appears ready to buy a new one as soon as possible. The \$300,000 to \$400,000 purchase could cause the trustees to decide that there's not much to be gained from DLR merger talks - an attitude several took anyway at a board study session one week ago.

At the meeting Baja asked the board to hold off on buying the new radio for six months while discussions on the DLR merger continued. Most of the trustees expressed opposition to that. They also opposed her request that they pass a resolution authorizing township administrators to negotiate a DLR agreement and bring a written contract back to the board within 60 days.

That resolution states that the board has decided that "a joint communications center will result in an improvement in service, provide state of the art equipment and save each community a substantial amount of money versus

the status quo."

Most of the trustees didn't agree, questioning the report's data and conclusions and calling for further study. Support was also solid for buying the radio.

"What you need to do is to be prepared to answer to the citizens that you're going to go ahead and spend \$400,000 on a stand-alone radio that isn't the 21st century, that isn't what everyone around us is going to," Baja said. "That's fine if you don't want to do that but I think we ought to have some pretty good reasons why."

"We're not closing the door on any options," Trustee Gini Britton replied.

DPS Director Chip Snider this week also criticized the report.

"I feel that the report reflects the ideas and philosophies of electeds representing the four communities," Snider said. "The report was not prepared in conjunction with input from the practitioners," Snider said. "I feel that a report of this nature should involve input from the respective unions, middle management and administrations of the departments involved."

Baja said that the report's data comes from an earlier five-community DLR merger study done with Canton Township and that public safety officials' input was incorporated into that.

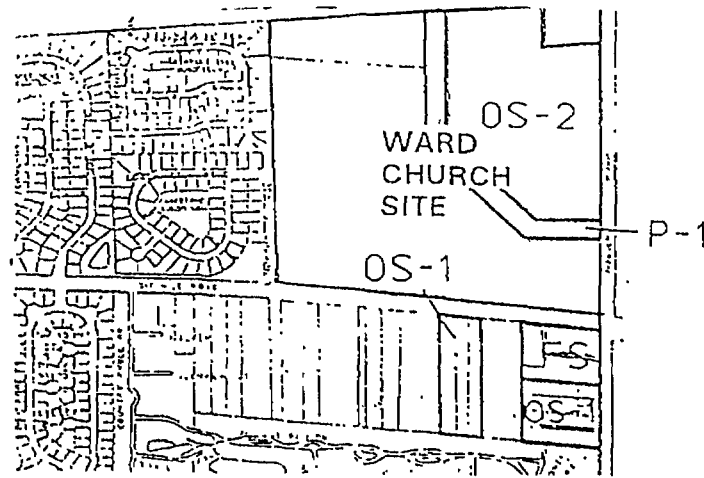

Student population jumps by 40-plus

for the district, according to Street.

"Normally we have an eight to 10 student increase, so this is a jump," he said.

The district's October student count this year reached 4,304 and was averaged with the February count of 4,163 from the 1993-94 school year to determine the district's current per-pupil funding. Northville has about 176 more students this year than last.

Currently, Northville is awaiting the results of its appeal of the \$6,528 per-pupil grant it received this year from the state. The amount was \$9 less per student than officials had estimated. The discrepancy amounts to a some \$36,000-\$40,000 loss for the district.

Northville was one of three districts in the state that appealed its per-pupil figure.

Northville officials were scheduled to state their case in Lansing Feb. 10 but the meeting was canceled because Livonia Public School officials, who had appealed

earlier in the month, were challenging their per-pupil total based on the same argument.

The issue the state and the districts are butting heads on centers around an interpretation of how FICA and retirement expenditures for the districts' center program employees should be reimbursed.

The state contends the county should be reimbursing the districts for the expenditures. The two districts, however, say it should be the state.

Whichever way the state finally rules on the subject, it will not adversely affect the district, Street said, because officials were not counting on receiving the money this year.

"It's not going to have a material effect on the district," Street said. "The budget has gone well this year."

Rezmierski said he is eagerly awaiting his chance to state his case to officials in Lansing.

"We are still waiting for our chance to physically appeal," he said.

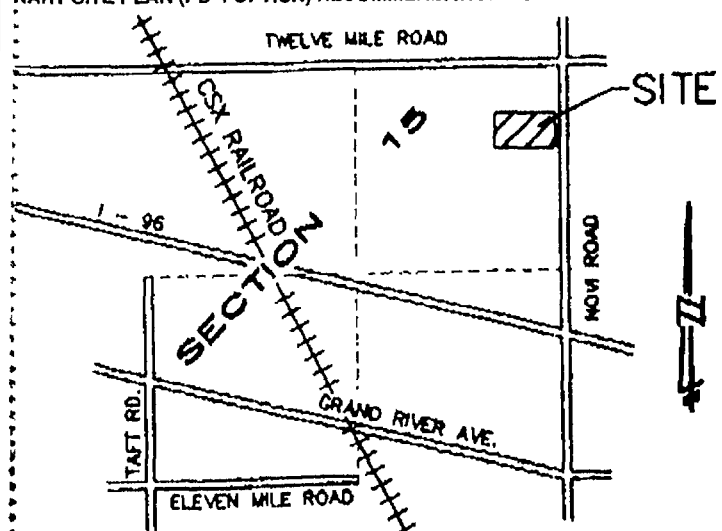

Our Opinion

Report is transparent pro-consolidation study

Northville's elected leaders have spent a lot of time and money in the last couple of years talking consolidation of public safety radio dispatching, prisoner lockup and record keeping services (collectively referred to as "DLR") with each other and with our neighboring communities. The latest attempt came to a head last week and proves that it's time to end DLR merger talks altogether.

A committee made up of elected officials from Northville and Plymouth cities and Northville and Plymouth townships released a report outlining a joint DLR agreement last week. This is the same group that spent 1993 and a good chunk of 1994 working on a five-community service agreement with Canton Township which fell through in December.

The report strongly supports DLR consolidation, claiming that it will mean better police and fire services to residents while collectively saving the four communities about \$2.76 million over the next 10 years.

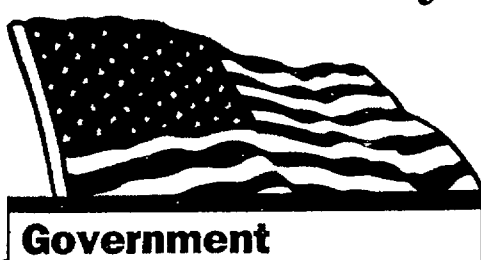
We doubt that conclusion and believe that Northville's involvement in the consolidation talks should end. To achieve that, we recommend that Northville Township's board of trustees formally vote to do just that.

That could happen, as a number of other things could to kill the talks. For one, Plymouth City and Township have already completely merged their fire departments. The report stated that they will probably merge their DLR services "in the next few months" if a four-community agreement can't be finalized.

A deal couldn't be reached quickly if at all, however, given the fact that Northville Township is poised to spend more than \$300,000 to buy its own new police/fire radio dispatch system and Northville City is holding DLR merger talks with Novi.

The report appears to be an attempt by its authors to head all of that off. It has the look of a hurried document slapped together so that the committee's members could shove something in front of their boards and councils to keep them from rejecting consolidation outright.

The report doesn't address key issues such as cost-sharing, fire department dispatching, staffing, command and control or how the four communities will make major decisions about the



DLR services, such as budget approvals. Other critics take aim at the report's numbers, claiming that the cost of the new DLR building (\$900,000 including furnishings) seems low.

It's also noteworthy that Chip Snider, Director of the township's Department of Public Safety (DPS), is a strong critic of the report, especially because public safety officials were left out of the talks. Snider also doesn't think much of the concept of centralized DLR in general.

It's true that the director could just be grinding his own axe here, fearing that a joint operation would cause him to lose part of his turf in Northville Township. However, he is a law enforcement professional of 25 years' standing and that means that his opinions deserve close scrutiny.

Something that also raises our suspicions is Supervisor Karen Baja's attempted spin control of the report. She's a member of the committee and in her comments to the board last week paid a lot of lip service to the notion that (a) the talks are very preliminary and (b) she has no opinion one way or another about the DLR merger.

We don't buy either contention. Read her comments carefully and you'll see that the between-the-lines message is that she clearly supports the idea.

Second, Baja asked the board to approve a resolution included in the report which gives township administrators the go-ahead to negotiate a DLR deal among the four communities and bring back a written contract to the board for approval within 60 days.

That doesn't sound very preliminary to us. It's more like the committee's members are doing whatever they can to get consolidation accomplished as soon as possible.

One way of doing that is to keep anyone who might oppose it as much out of the loop as possible. We think it's time that process stopped.

You don't want to live there

Contrary to what a lot of people might think, the job of a newspaper editor doesn't come with a lot of perks.

At the community level, at least, we editors are a pretty modest lot. We haul boxes of bathroom supplies up the stairs ourselves, climb onto chairs to change the fluorescent light tubes when they burn out and catch heck from our receptionist when we leave dirty dishes in the sink of the kitchenette.

But there are a few privileges that come with the territory and I cashed one in last week when I got a tour of Scott Correctional Prison. No less a personage than warden Joan Yukins guided me, staff writer Randy Coble and state Rep. Gerry Law through the grounds of the compound on Five Mile near Beck in the township. It was strictly an informational walk through, and we had nothing in mind other than getting a real-life glimpse of the closed culture of incarceration.

It was truly a learning experience and my very first time seeing a prison from the other side of the fence. We spent almost four hours at the place, getting a lesson in corrections policy from Yukins and taking a first-hand look at the buildings inside the complex.

Scott is a women's prison, you probably know, with around 850 offenders doing time at all levels of security. There are only four women's correctional facilities in Michigan and Scott, I'm told, has the distinction of housing some of the most difficult and violent of our state's female convicts.

I don't know what I expected, except that I guess I thought I'd see a bunch of rifle-equipped, goose-stepping guards and sneering, foul-mouthed inmates making cat calls while staring out between the bars of their cells.

Hollywood-inspired preconceptions are rarely on target, though, and this was certainly no exception. Rather than coming across a boot camp-style discipli-

nary environment and snorting, rage-filled inmates, I was amazed to find the atmosphere relaxed and civilized. The staff members don't carry guns (they could get snatched away during group escape attempts), the prisoners wear casual clothes and the women often move about on their appointed rounds without any noticeable guard presence.

Inside the education building there was a computer room where inmates were learning graphics design and a kitchen where the women were developing food preparation skills. Inside the recreation center was a gym with basketball courts and a weight room.

The interior walls of the buildings were covered with pictures and displays of Black History Month and, instead of signs reminding inmates that they'd better think twice about breaking the rules, there were posters with positive messages about the future.

Educators come into the prison to teach classes and inmates are given the chance to earn GEDs and college degrees. They even get paid for attending school, though the amount is just pennies a day.

The inmates we saw chipping ice off the sidewalks and making license plate tabs inside the prison industries building were talkative and polite.

But that, of course, is only part of the story. A visit to the housing units is where reality sinks in. The individual cells are claustrophobia-inducing, shoe box garrets, with cinder block walls and heavy metal doors. Tiny windows provide scant views of the outside and in the corner is a small desk barely large enough to rest a portable radio on. It gave me the creeps just standing inside one of the cells with the door wide open.

Prison officials were candid enough to tell us that scrapes between inmates are commonplace and that drugs, property theft and fierce jealousy are more the rule than the exception.

The visit held both surprises and stark indicators of the nightmare you suffer through when your life isn't your own.

I decided a prison might be an OK place to visit, but I wouldn't want to live there.

Student head count takes on new meaning

The second school district head count is in and it shows there are some 40 more students attending Northville schools than there were back in September. The new population figure for K-12 is 4,341.

The count will be combined with the first student body survey of the 1995-96 year, yielding an average figure on which the district's per-pupil state grant will be based.

It must feel odd for Northville administrators to hold their collective breath when asking for a show of hands in the classroom. Before the passage of Proposal A last year, Northville was known as an out-of-formula district, meaning it received funding directly from local property tax collections.

What determined the number of dollars flowing into district coffers was the amount of money property owners paid in taxes, not the number of students enrolled in the schools. People could pull their children out of the public schools and transfer them into non-public institutions with no loss of revenue to the district. When that would happen, in fact, it would mean only that the district would have fewer students to educate with the same amount of money. Paradoxically, the per-pupil spending level could go up with the transfer of each student. Only when parents would move out of the district would a loss of revenue result.

All that has changed, however. Proposal A did away with the state aid formula and now the funding levels of all districts are set by Lansing.



Though the final verdict is still out, it appears that Proposal A is a mixed blessing for Northville and other former out-of-formula districts. On the one hand, all districts must now be more competitive with the non-publics because transfers hit the public schools directly in the pocketbook. It also places all districts on the same footing in terms of seeking dollars from the state. Before, fully one-third of the state's public school districts were out-of-formula and effectively independent of state financing.

On the other hand, Northville and other hitherto out-of-formula districts must for the first time rely on the decisions of state officials in setting per-pupil expenditures. This is potentially problematic both because Lansing is subject to the fickle winds of political expediency and because there is no assurance that the state treasury will in future years provide adequate funds for the operation of its public schools.

For now, the new state financing scheme appears to be working well for Northville. It remains to be seen, however, if the change will prove a wise one over the long run.

'At risk' describes every child

It has become quite common to talk about targeting "at risk" students for substance abuse prevention programs. I submit that all students are at risk and that we need to convince parents and the larger community as well as educators that this is our real challenge.

One of my favorite topics to speak to is what factors make kids at risk for harmful involvement not only with alcohol and other drugs, but also a variety of other problems - suicide, teen pregnancy, criminal activity, dropping out.

The following is a list of risk factors that have resulted from years of experience and input:

- Alcoholic parent(s), grandparents, sibling(s), or other close members
- Divorced parents
- Abuse in the home - physical, mental, emotional, sexual
- Neglect in the home
- Living in a blended family
- Being new to a school
- Being handicapped or chronically ill
- Having learning problems
- Having a chronically ill parent or sibling, or having a parent or sibling or close family member who has died
- Having an emotionally distant father
- Living in a emotionally repressive family
- Being the child of a workaholic

- Being the child of a perfectionist
- Being a latchkey kid
- No role models
- Dependent on others - few independent skills
- Not meaningful, "I don't make a difference"
- Can't cope with problems
- Escapes/withdraws
- Impulsive - no self control
- Poor listening skills
- Won't share
- Argumentative
- Inflexible
- Compulsive
- Complaining

There is not a student who is not "at risk" at some time in their lives. My hope is that friends, concerned others or an adult will be there for them to listen, to support and to be there.

I was surprised not to find an article by our Northville Township or city officials defending our community's excessively high water rates. I was even more surprised not to read or hear of a public outcry at the township or city offices.

The *Detroit News* published an article ("Water users in suburbs get soaked; more hikes planned") pointing out the exorbitant water rates virtually every Wayne County community pays to the city of Detroit. And as bad as it is for most, Northville Township leads the pack, a full 10 percent higher than the dubious runner-up, Plymouth Township, \$60.68 vs. \$54.24 for 30,000 gallons of water and sewage disposal. The next three positions belong to other neighbors, Canton, Northville (city) and Plymouth (city).

Hopefully the phones have been ringing off the hook of our communities' water boards and government offices. In the article, some officials "explain" the reasons for the added "extra charges," but the differences to places like Southgate (\$16.04), Riverview (\$18.68), Gibraltar (\$7.64), and others are too great to explain away.

tax breaks aimed at companies that expand or locate in Michigan and create at least 75 jobs in the process.

Supporters say Michigan needs to be able to offer tax breaks to keep companies from bolting to other states and to attract new companies. Officer furniture-maker Haworth Co., for example, will build its new \$30 million, 300-job parts plant in Indiana unless it gets an incentive from state government to stay at home.

I remember what Senate leader Engler (then in opposition) said in the 1980s when Gov. Jim Blanchard tried to play an activist role in job creation. Engler argued that tax incentives were a fraud, an expansive lesson why government could not - certainly should not - "pick winners and losers" in the economic market place.

And you should hear the snarls from Engler's free market cronies now. Talk about loss of ideological purity!

Item: Gov. Engler unveiled at last week's Society of Automotive Engineers convention a proposal for the Michigan Auto Partnership. Intended to replace the 100,000 skilled auto workers who will retire over the next

seven years, the Partnership will link the state, its leading industry and educational institutions to provide skills for young people.

"What industry has been telling us is that the skill base is very, very critical to long-term location decisions," said David Cole, director of the University of Michigan's Office for the Study of Automotive Transportation. "It's like the movie *Field of Dreams*: If you build it, they will come. And what we need to build is a manufacturing base. People will come to that."

Doug Rothwell, chief executive of the Michigan Jobs Commission, argues: "The state or region that fills this need first will have an advantage for job growth. We're told by industry that if we're successful, this would be a significant determinant as to where they make future investments."

Evidently the Engler Administration proposes to expand the idea to other key Michigan industries facing a labor shortage, such as plastics and food processing.

Back in the 1980s, I chaired the Michigan Job Training Coordinating Council in the Blanchard Administration. We tried to do much the same sort of thing. And, of course, the ideologues attacked the program as an unwarranted governmental intrusion on the forces of the free market.

Today, I think Gov. Engler is absolutely right with MEGA and the Michigan Auto Partnership. When you're running a state, you have to do what you have to do, regardless of ideological purity.

We're at a very interesting juncture in our politics. The Republican Party just now is full of ideological passion, brimming with new and interesting ideas, while Democrats are defensive and dispirited, if not brain dead.

The thing to watch now is the way the GOP initiatives mesh with the recalcitrant inertia of actually governing. Some will thrive; some will fail. But all will be tempered in the fire of reality.

Such is life.

Battle heats up in Lansing over intangibles tax

It's an obscure tax, yielding less than half of one percent of Michigan's \$25 billion total revenue.

But the intangibles tax has become a major battleground in the partisan war in Lansing. And it has caused a stalemate.

To Republicans, the intangibles tax amounts to "double taxation" of retirees' incomes; it punishes savings and investment in a nation that has the lowest rate of personal savings in the industrialized world. "It punishes entrepreneurial risk-taking," says Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, and should be repealed.

To Democrats, Michigan's tax structure already is regressive. Says Sen. Gary Peters, D-Pontiac:

"By repealing the intangibles tax, we made a bad tax policy worse. A person with \$25,000 income pays double the percentage that one earning \$200,000 pays."

There's a stalemate and a deadline. The Headlee Amendment to the Michigan Constitution limits total state revenue to a percentage of people's incomes. In this boom year, the treasury will collect an estimated \$300 million over that limit.

Gov. John Engler has proposed a series of single business, income and intangibles tax cuts that would be permanent - \$1.5 billion over five years. Democrats, with a 22-16 disadvantage in the Senate and a 56-53 disadvantage in the House, have taken their lumps on everything but the intangibles tax.

Democrats have used a tool that is legal but which Republicans say is ungentlemanly - one they never used in the decades when they were in the minority.

The tax cuts must take effect this fiscal year. That means both chambers must give them a two-thirds majority for immediate effect. Otherwise, the measures don't take effect until about April 1 of 1996, half-way through the next fiscal year.

But Democrats refused immediate effect on the intangibles tax cut. All 22 Senate Republicans, joined by one outstate Democrat, voted for it, with 26 votes needed. All area senators voted with their parties.

The House tally was 59 to 45, with 73 needed. All area represen-

tatives voted with their parties except the absent Penny Crissman, R-Rochester, and Kirk Profit, D-Ypsilanti.

Veteran Rep. Gerry Law, R-Plymouth, just smiled at the snafu. "It'll go to conference committee," he said. There is a bottom-line figure in taxation that the state must reach, and everybody knows it.

The intangibles tax is a kind of property tax. Passed in 1939, it is levied on interest and dividends from savings deposits, stocks, annuities, land contracts and mortgages. Its rate is 3.5 percent.

It raises \$118 million a year for the general fund. Of that, \$9.5 million is earmarked for cities, villages and townships.

The Republicans' bills would repeal it gradually.

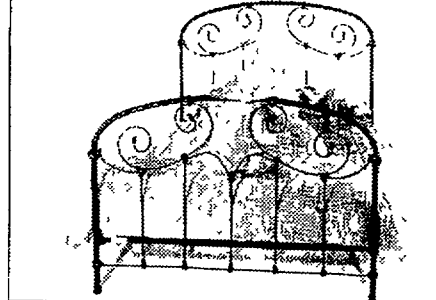

Detroit man struck and killed on tracks

The body of a Detroit man was found in Northville Township last week. Police say he died after being struck by a train but it's not known exactly when the accident happened.

Robert Louis-Leon Beard, 51, was found dead at about 1 a.m. the morning of March 1.

A train conductor discovered the body on the CSX railroad tracks that lie just south of the intersection of Five Mile and Northville Road.

The train the conductor was operating did not strike Beard, Detective John Werth said, but it was evident that one had at some point.

"This individual was dead before the conductor found him," Werth said.

"It was apparent that he'd been there for some time. He was definitely hit by a train but we can't be sure of when. What we

found says it wasn't going very fast, though."

The Wayne County medical examiner's office autopsy report found injuries to the skull consistent with a train impact.

Police think Beard fell asleep next to the tracks and was then struck by the overhanging edge of an oncoming train.

The body was found near a heating element that keeps the rails from freezing.

Investigators suspect Beard lay down by it to keep warm that night and didn't hear the train because of the loud humming noise the element makes.

Beard was a patient at Sinai Hospital in Detroit until Feb. 26.

Members of his family filed a missing person report with Detroit police Feb. 28, just hours before Beard's body was found.

Police say they are continuing to investigate.

Study sites losses if horse racing dies

An estimated 32,000 farm jobs worth \$181 million in income will be endangered if the horse racing industry dies, according to a study by Public Sector Consultants of Lansing.

PSC's study, commissioned by the Save Michigan Horse Racing Coalition, puts the value of the industry at \$1.2 billion to local and state governments, workers, farm operators and even 4-H Clubs.

Eight Horse racing tracks, spearheaded by Ladbroke DRC in

Livonia and joined by Northville Downs, Jackson Raceway and Hazel Park Raceway, say they are desperate to bring in gambling in order to compete with Windsor casinos and Indian-operated casinos across Michigan. Ladbroke owners have threatened to close their mile track in Livonia if they don't get gambling.

"The results indicate a significant economic rippling effect which begins at the tracks ultimately affects an intricate network of farms, vendors and suppliers through the state," said PSC senior economist Robert Kleine.

"We're definitely talking about an industry which reaches beyond Michigan's eight tracks."

The tracks suffered a combined loss of \$2.3 million in 1993, and Kleine predicted 1994 will prove to be worse because of Casino Windsor's competition with the three metro Detroit area tracks. Among the "ripple effects":

- \$20 million in lost taxes, which supported regulatory operations, 4-H, breeding programs and rebates to local governments for police and fire protection.
- \$10 million in sales and income taxes from direct and indi-

rect horse industry purchases.

- \$4 million in exhibitor prices, physical improvements and racing purses at county fairs.

Edward Draugelis, spokesman for the Save Michigan Horse Racing Coalition that hired the PSC study, said the legislation sought by the industry will be introduced soon in Lansing. The bills would allow tracks to have:

- Electronic gaming terminals, like casino betting machines.
- Increased simulcasting of races. (Between live races, races from other tracks would be televised for bettors.)

Bills would ensure right to farm in Michigan

Michigan farmers would have greater protection from neighbors' complaints about nuisances under three bills passed by the state House and on their way to the Senate.

Rep. Carl Gnodtke, R-Sawyer, sponsored the bills. They aim to

expand the list of farm operations, lengthen the list of farm products and empower the Department of Agriculture to recover its investigation costs from neighbors who file more than three unsuccessful complaints against a farmer.

Rep. Howard Wetters, D-Kawawlin, objected to the last cost-recovery feature. "The depart-

ment can collect unlimited fees and expenses to investigate civil cases. It tips the scales so far toward the farmer that it may violate the equal protection of laws in the Constitution," said Wetters, a farmer and former Bay County extension agent.

Replied Gnodtke: "It's not that you have to pay for making a

fourth complaint; you pay if nothing (on the farm) is wrong. It's up to the judge's discretion."

Wetters' amendment to remove the section about charging complainants who lose was rejected March 1 on a vote of 37 yes to 67 no.

The House passed all three bills March 2.

"This is a test. This is only a test. Had this been a real emergency, you would have been advised to take cover ..."

And this is one test you don't want to fail.

When the 162 emergency sirens in Oakland County go off March 30 at 1 p.m., it is just a test. But it is you who should be taking the test.

Passing the test means having a "safe place" plan ready as we head into tornado season.

A safe place plan includes knowing where to go and when.

If a tornado watch is issued, conditions are favorable for a tornado, but one has not been spotted yet. In this case, stay close to a battery-operated radio or television for further instructions.

When a tornado warning is issued, it means that a tornado has been sighted, either by a human observer or on radar. It's time to implement your safe place plan.

A safe place at home is in the basement away from outside walls and windows and under something sturdy. At work or school, interior hallways or small rooms on the lowest level are considered the safest place.

One of the biggest myths about tornadoes is that you should open the windows. "We used to teach people to open the windows to equalize pressure," said Leanne Robinson, Emergency Management Coordinator. "Since the '70s, we have come along way. There's no pressure build up to equalize. Windows or walls have no effect on a tornado."

If you're in your car, get away from it and lie in a ditch or low area, protect your head with your hands, and hold onto something on the ground if possible.

Manufactured housing without a basement is not a safe place. "People that live in this type of housing need to do preplanning," said Robinson. "They need

to know where to go during the thunderstorm warning. They don't have time to wait until the tornado warning."

Avoid areas with glass and wide free-span roofs. Supermarkets and gymnasiums are not good choices because once the roof comes off, there is no protection, according to Robinson.

After a tornado, do not leave your safe place. Wait until an all-clear has been issued.

The three minute siren tone means a tornado warning is in effect. Oakland County Emergency Management Division has declared March 26 through April 1 as Severe Weather Awareness Week which culminates with the county wide test that will enable everyone to have a dry run while there's still time.

"There have been an average of four tornado warnings per year in Oakland County, each lasting an average of 45 minutes," said Robinson. Nationally, Michigan has the third highest average number of tornado deaths per year.

Novi has twice been hit by tornadoes in recent years. The worst was in June of 1987 when a small twister touched down in the Chateau Estates mobile home park at Thirteen Mile and Decker roads. The result was one dead, six injured and 227 homes damaged.

More recently, a fast striking cyclone hit the Yorkshire subdivision at Ten Mile and Taft roads in

September of 1990, destroying one home and damaging six others. The twister passed over and damaged the Novi Library, Civic Center and police headquarters. Novi High School had just let its students out for the day when the warning was issued, and staff hustled students back into the building, but

stragglers still in the parking lot were pushed to the ground by the winds when the tornado passed. Still, no one was injured.

If a tornado warning has been issued, it's too late to start thinking about a "safe place" plan. The time to put a plan in place is now.

Between now and March 30, companies can train their employees, schools can educate students, homeowners can develop a safe place plan and know how to use it.

During the siren test, businesses, schools, hospitals and homeowners can test the effectiveness of their "safe place" plans. Oakland County Emergency Management Service sends out information to all schools and to 700 major businesses, hospitals, and governments in Oakland

County.

"Parents should have two plans in effect," said Robinson, "a fire plan and a tornado plan. They should teach children the difference between the two."

Oakland County has 162 tornado sirens, the largest number in the state. "They were never meant to penetrate a building," said Robinson. "They were meant to get people off the streets and into a safe

location." People inside need to rely on an internal communications system, such as television and radio.

If you hear a thunderstorm, turn on the radio and television, advised Robinson.

"With the new Doppler radar, we are getting better at picking up tornadoes, especially smaller tornadoes," said Robinson.

Most tornadoes occur in the United States in the spring or early summer. Although they usually occur in the late afternoon, just after the temperatures have reached the highest levels of the day, they have been known to form at anytime of the day or night after a thunderstorm.

"You can't tell how long it will be before it hits," said Robinson. With a slow moving storm you have more time, and with a faster moving storm you have less time.

Tornadoes occur at the end of a severe thunderstorm.

A tornado starts forming inside a severe thunderstorm. A tornado-producing thunderstorm creates wind shear, which causes the normal updrafts and downdrafts in a thunderstorm to spin, creating a vortex.

The invisible vortex works its way downward through the middle section of the severe thunderstorm. When it dips below the base of the thunderstorm cloud, it is called a funnel cloud. When this funnel cloud touches down, it is called a tornado.

Once the tornado touches down, the vortex can lift anything from dirt to people and animals to a railroad car.

There are common characteristics to listen for. The air is often calm just before the tornado hits. The sound of a roar of a passenger freight train can be heard from a nearby tornado.

MYTH VS FACT

MYTH: The southwest corner of the basement is the safest.

FACT: A basement away from outside walls and windows under something sturdy is just as safe.

MYTH: Open windows to equalize pressure.

FACT: There is not enough pressure to equalize, so don't go around and open the windows.

MYTH: A car can go faster than a tornado.

FACT: A tornado's direction and speed is unpredictable. If you're in a car, get away from it and lie in a ditch or low area, and protect your head with your hands.

having a fund from which to draw, and to build this up, Kochyan said, AFOTH makes craft items to sell at arts and crafts sales in both Novi and Northville.

Also, Kochyan said, an area department store has let AFOTH committee members raise money for the cause by bagging at holiday time. The money earned is sent to AFOTH.

Another service which committee members provide is semi-annual assistance at a soup kitchen in Detroit.

"We provide the food for anywhere from 50 to 100 persons," she said, "cook it and serve," the money coming from crafts sales and donations.

Pat Kochyan, who is a housewife, mother, and a nurse in home health care, said, "I have worked with people living hand to mouth," and volunteering on this committee "makes me appreciate even more what I have."

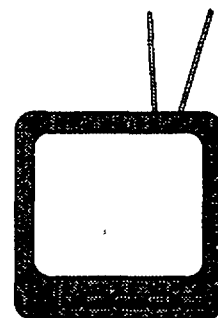

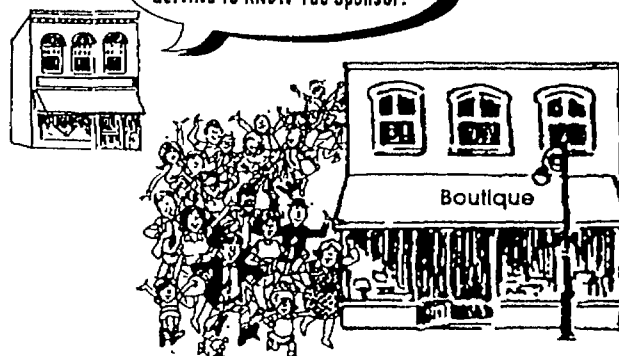

'Disclosure' explores sexual harassment

Is power the ultimate aphrodisiac? Or sex the utmost power play? Which is more effective in corporate politics: betrayal or alliance?

Caught in cutthroat competition, can we control our destiny without sacrificing our humanity?

Michael Douglas and Demi Moore star in a taut drama about corporate power at the top. Directed by Barry Levinson, and based on Michael Crichton's best-selling novel, "Disclosure" looks at what happens when Tom Sanders (Douglas), a high-tech executive who thinks he's about to receive a promotion, learns, instead, that it will be given to a woman — and what's more, she's Meredith Johnson (Moore), someone he had a torrid affair with 10 years before.

As Sanders struggles to absorb this disturbing twist of fate, he is further stunned to be seduced, then accused of sexual harassment, by Johnson, who seems to be receiving the support of the company's senior management.

As Sanders attempts to defend himself, protect his reputation and salvage his family life, he discovers evidence of a sinister corporate plan involving an impending takeover and an exciting new breakthrough in virtual-reality technology. He faces off with Meredith, a woman whose sexual charisma has fueled her rapid career ascent, and whose drive for power has turned her into a most formidable opponent.

Today, a stone-faced and utterly in-control Meredith is challenging Tom across the ebony conference table of the legal mediation center.

The lawyers play back a tape of a potentially incriminating seduction scene, full of panting and

innuendo, but Meredith deflects their judgment with the defiant justification that, "I'm a sexually aggressive woman."

She demands to know, "How would you define consensual sex?"

Suddenly, the issue of sexual harassment becomes rivetingly complex.

Said Levinson, known for such character-driven films as "Avalon," "Rain Man," "Diner" and "Good

Morning, Vietnam," "to me, what's so fascinating about it is that if you turn this kind of harassment upside down and put the man in the situation, it gives us a chance to really analyze the dilemma we

face today and the lengths people will go to in pursuit of power."

"It's a valuable story," said Douglas. "I thought the idea of revers-

ing roles was a great idea. Not to undermine what is a real issue amongst women, but to take away the existing polarities of the whole thing."

As Crichton's book climbed the best-seller charts, a timely film adaptation became imperative.

The project was put on, in Hollywood lingo, the "express track." Numerous crews were hired so the hammering and painting of set construction could continue uninterrupted, seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

Corporate suspense and sexual innuendo are intertwined in "Disclosure."

"Corporate America is intriguing," said Levinson. "It very much has palace intrigue, everyone talking behind everyone's back, everyone jockeying for power."

While Douglas and Moore parry DigiCom's top executive, played by Donald Sutherland, observes their machinations with detached bemusement.

Moore believes of her character, "She enjoys the power of sex and the dynamics of sexual relationships with her in the position of power."

Yet Sutherland is certain. "She uses sexuality and the framework of sexual harassment, but her intent is not to take advantage of her power by getting sexual favors. Her intent is to get him out of a job."

"The story isn't really about sexual harassment," added Sutherland. "It has to do with intrigue and the utilization of sexual powers to advance oneself."

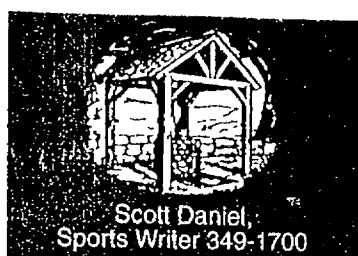

Cagers fall to Novi in district opener

Salem got hot after DeKoker's streak ended. The Rocks, in fact, closed the game out 15-4.

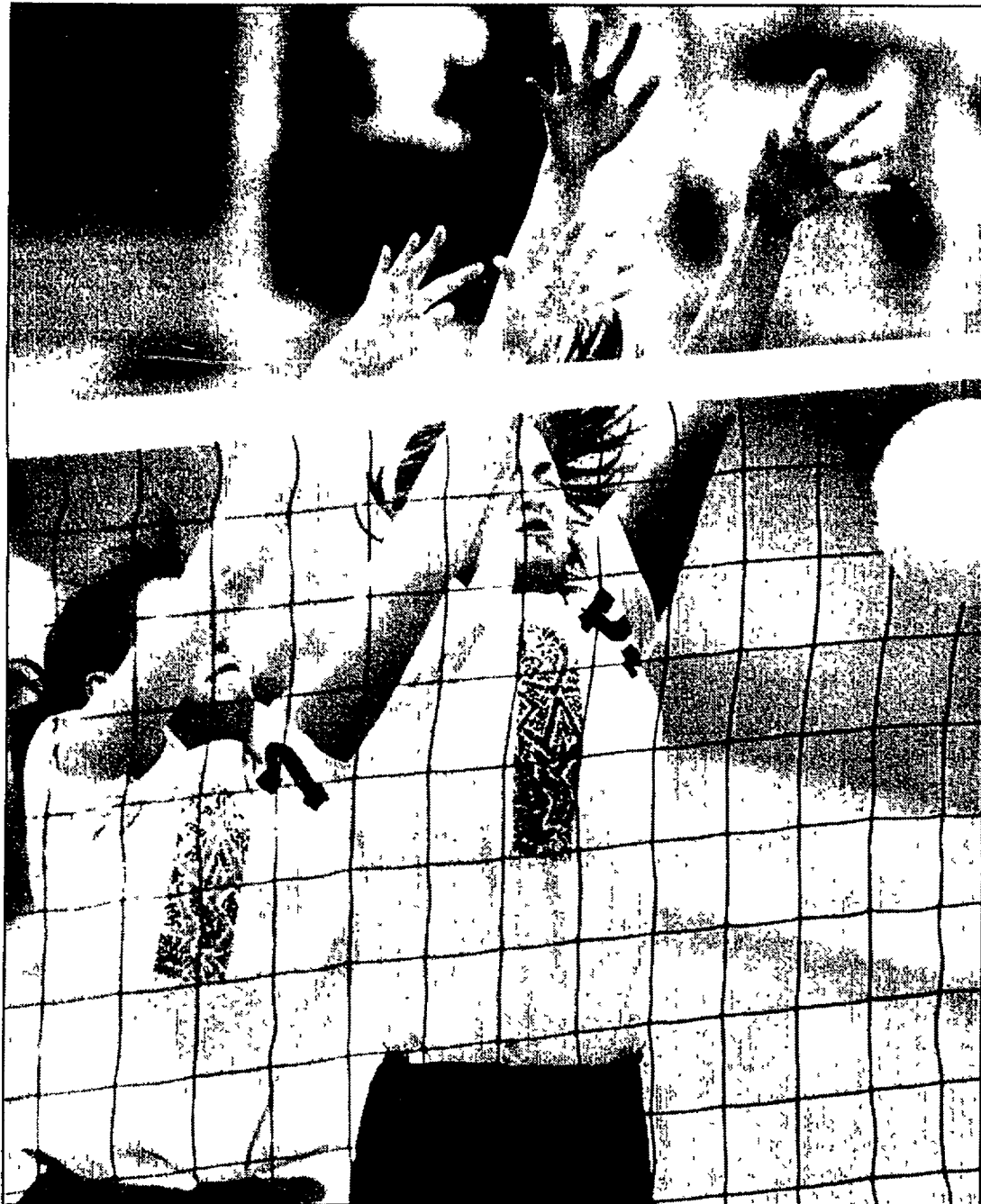
Salem got 11 straight points by its fifth server then quickly finished Northville out. The Rocks won the game, but Northville didn't give it to them.

Exercise for fun, help raise money

Are you looking for a way to have fun, be healthy and help out a worthy cause? Well Novi Parks and Recreation has just the activity for you. The sixth annual "Exercise for Heart" Aerobic-thon will be held at the Novi Civic Center on Saturday, March 18, from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

The Exercise for Heart Aerobic-thon is a three-hour fundraiser to benefit the American Heart Association of Michigan. The event consists of warm-up exercises, an aerobic workout, muscle repetitions and a cool down with floor stretches. Fitness instructors Terry Snurka, Judy Mau, Sherry Williams and Gail Morad will lead the aerobics. The program is formatted into two 90-minute segments so that participants can do either one 90-minute workout or keep going for the entire three hours.

Snurka began this event in Novi in 1990. As a Fitness Factory instructor, she was familiar with Novi Parks and Recreation programs and the department is always receptive to offering new programs. The annual Exercise for Heart is just one more example.

A variety of Fitness Factory classes are offered at the Novi Civic Center, Monday through Friday, mornings and evenings. Step Aerobics is the newest addition added to the list of classes offered year-round through Novi Parks and Recreation and it has been well-received.

"Due to the popularity of Step Aerobics, we are going to add a step segment to this year's Exercise for Heart," said Snurka. "It will just be the basics, a 20-minute long introductory program, but it will give people who have never tried Step Aerobics a chance to see if they like it. The majority of people do. If the steps frighten anyone, they can also do the Step Aerobics on the floor without a step and get the full aerobic workout."

"Exercise for Heart is a national program to raise funds for the American Heart Association, as well as to educate people that aerobics and dancing are good for the heart. Novi's Exercise for Heart last year raised over \$4,100 for cardiovascular research and educational programs. Novi's event had the highest average "per per-

son" donations of any event in Michigan.

"In the five years Exercise for Heart has been in Novi, the participants have raised over \$18,400," said Snurka. "If we had more participants, think how much more we could raise for such an excellent cause."

Participants are awarded prizes based on their level of pledges. The 1995 prizes include special "Exercise for Heart" water bottles, T-shirts, tank tops, hooded long-sleeve T-shirts, sports bags and hooded pullovers. They will also offer a prize to the person who travels the farthest to participate.

"I want to stress to everyone that you don't have to do all three hours of aerobics," said Snurka. "All I am asking for is a 90-minute commitment. It's fun and you will be doing a wonderful thing for the American Heart Association. I hope more people come together this year to work out and raise money for this good cause."

This is the sixth year Connie Urban, a Novi resident of 10 years, has participated in the Dance for Heart event. She is eager to exercise and collect pledges for the American Heart Association because her family has a history of heart disease.

How does Urban last the entire duration of the event you ask?

"I've been exercising aerobically for 15 years through Community Education and the Fitness Factory. Because the class schedule is so structured exercise has become routine for me to go on the same days every week." Urban maintains that the best aspect of being involved in the "Exercise for Heart" is that everyone can workout at their own pace.

Participants can work at their own pace which is the secret to lasting three hours. Instructors stress the safety factor and will periodically monitor the participants pulse rate.

The event is limited to the first 100 participants and a \$25 minimum pledge is required. Sponsor pledge sheets, rules and guidelines are available at the Novi Parks and Recreation Department. For more information, call 347-0400 or 349-2193.

Contact lenses have come a long way

wets well, but causes long-term damage to certain cell layers.

The 1970s saw the advent of the soft lens, a tremendous improvement in comfort that allowed oxygen to pass through the flexible plastic lens. Gradually the prescription range was expanded to include nearly all astigmatism and other corrections that are now available. Soft lenses have great initial comfort, but are fragile and soil easily.

Early in the '80s, a replacement for the hard

lens was developed. This was known by many names - semi-hard, semi-soft, or more accurately, rigid gas permeable (RGP) lenses. A new polymer Boston-7 was just released last fall, a further refinement for the most stable lens that is clear and comfortable. RGP lenses are wonderful lenses when properly fitted on the right patients and can correct many difficult prescriptions. They take about a week to adapt to and are not appropriate for wearing during certain jobs or hobbies.

The '90s will definitely be known as the decade of the disposable soft lens. We now have tinted, bifocal and astigmatism corrections available that are replaced weekly to quarterly.

This spring marks a quantum leap for contact lens technology with the advent of the one-day disposable lens. This is designed for single use - you insert it in the morning and throw it away that night.

Some major clinical advantages will be essentially no deposit build-up or solution sensitivity concerns. In addition, a number of studies show that a clean lens is healthier for the eye. Also since you don't have to store the lens overnight there is no opportunity to pick

up bacteria from a dirty case, a common source of eye infections.

Never having to clean a lens or worry about replacing a torn or lost lens offers ultimate convenience. It also will offer the safety of a daily wear schedule, decreasing 15-fold the chances for complications from extended wear.

Full-time contacts wearers will enjoy these hassle free lenses for everyday use. Sports, travel, special occasions and part-time wear all will be simpler and more convenient.

You should always remember that contacts are prescription drugs. This includes using them only under a doctor's guidance with proper follow-up care that usually involves a total of three to four visits during the first few months then annual exams thereafter.

Oxygen responsible for energy level?

Unfortunately, your body can store only a limited amount of ATP. You must produce it almost constantly. Through a series of chemical reactions, we convert food into ATP energy. We increase ATP markedly when sufficient oxygen is available to our body tissues. This process is called aerobic metabolism.

But when oxygen is absent, ATP is produced

less efficiently. This process is called anaerobic metabolism. Anaerobic production of ATP supplies energy when we need it in a hurry for brief, high-intensity activities such as dashing up a flight of stairs.

Anaerobic production of ATP, however, is extremely inefficient compared to production with oxygen. When your body converts food to ATP without oxygen, you get only about 5 percent of the potential ATP. Conversely, if oxygen is present, you get 20 times more ATP.

There is another disadvantage of anaerobic metabolism - a chemical by-product called lactic acid. Unfortunately, lactic acid causes your breathing to increase and your muscles to tire.

Thus, if your body can supply enough oxygen to exercising tissues, the output of ATP energy is greater, and fatigue is less likely.

Two things influence your ability to consume oxygen: 1) how much blood your heart can put out each minute; and 2) how much oxygen your tissues can absorb.

You are going to be one heck of an energy-

producing person if your heart is able to pump a lot of blood and your tissues are able to take up large amounts of oxygen.

The greatest amount of oxygen your body can consume is called your "maximal oxygen consumption" or "aerobic capacity." This variable, considered by most physiologists to be the best overall index of heart-lung fitness, can be determined during an exercise stress test.

How can you increase your maximal oxygen consumption?

Do endurance exercise - walking, jogging, bicycling, swimming.

Performed regularly, such activities will increase the maximal oxygen consumption typically by 10 to 30 percent.

Exercise, and you too can become a "high energy" person.

Real estate brokers join the information highway

The big news from progressive real estate brokers last year was their marketing technique of listing for-sale properties on commercial on-line computer networks like CompuServe, America OnLine or GENie.

This year it's communicating marketing information on The Internet, a consortium of computer networks used by nearly 40 million users throughout the world. Descriptive text about individual property, along with color photos, sound and videos, can circumvent the world via The Internet.

Exposure is the keyword in real estate marketing. It can find a buyer for individual properties — even those one-of-a-kind and hard-to-sell types. And it can expedite the sale of entire inventories of multiple listing services. The Internet is the ultimate exposure vehicle.

The ERA (Electronic Realty Associates) real estate broker franchise carries detailed text and color photos for each listed property submitted by members to the national headquarters office in Kansas City. Soon, photos and biographies of each agent also will be carried, an ERA spokesman said.

A rapidly increasing number of real estate firms and organizations are either using or planning to use The Internet to enhance their mar-

keting outreach. The information is normally carried in Internet's World Wide Web, involving live text and graphics.

"We currently have a very strong intra-group on-line system in place for our offices throughout the U.S. and Canada," said Mark Surfas, director of on-line communications for Coldwell Banker Residential Group. "But we're now studying the possible expansion of our marketing capabilities by using The Internet."

In addition to national real estate organizations, executives of many individual firms are becoming savvy to The Internet and are tapping into its marketing potential. And on-line property listing firms are soliciting listings from brokers.

Properties OnLine, for example, is a regional firm reaching out to brokers nationwide. They offer an Internet-based real estate listing service. Each submitted property can be described on-line for about \$20. If photos, maps and floor plans are included, it's another \$5.

Based in McLean, Va., Properties OnLine can be reached by phoning (703) 356-1481.

Other communications firms are assisting a variety of businesses gain access to The Internet — from local chambers of commerce to manufacturing organizations with the world as their marketing area.

Vault into the Montpelier.

The Montpelier is a contemporary tri-level home. The master suite and one of the secondary bedrooms are on the top level. The family room, utility room and garage are on the lowest level, and the rest of the rooms are at midlevel, halfway between.

Vaulted ceilings increase the sense of spaciousness in the entry and family gathering spaces on the main floor. The kitchen has plenty of counter space and is designed for efficient work flow. The pantry and appliance center are at the rear. The central work island could be surfaced with a chopping block. Once the veggies are chopped, it's just a step to the range and oven. Standing at the sink, you can gaze out at the street through a wide garden window.

A circular hearth curves around the wide fireplace at the rear of the huge living room. Tall windows flank the fireplace, while sliding glass doors in both the living room and dining room open onto the raised deck. Bedroom three could be used as a den or office. The bathroom to the right of the entry is convenient to the garage and the rest of the main level.

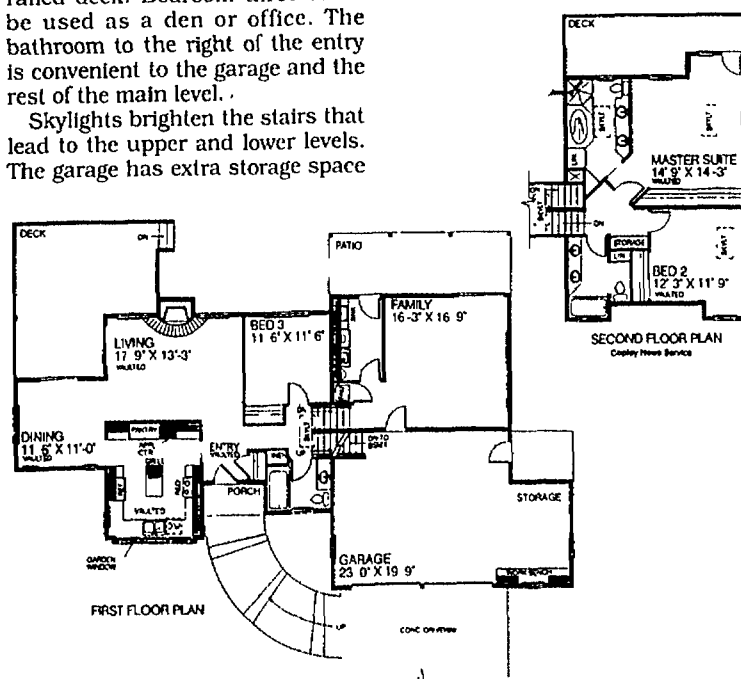
Skylights brighten the stairs that lead to the upper and lower levels. The garage has extra storage space

LOVE IT & LEAF IT

Do you ever long to lie in the shade of the lush growth of a grand old tree, but sometimes there just doesn't seem to be one around?

Shade is one of the benefits of trees. "Trees turn a hard place into a place of comfort," said Francis Sandoval of Global ReLeaf of Michigan, part of the national Global ReLeaf effort, a program developed by the American Forestry Association.

Shade trees can cut air conditioning costs up to 50 percent in the summer. In the winter, windbreak trees can reduce heating bills up to 30 percent. Trees provide homes for animals and help screen out urban sounds.

Deciduous trees help block the sun in the summer and let the sun in during the winter. Evergreen trees on the north side block the winter winds. Trees add to property values. Treed lots go for a premium in new subdivisions. "When building new construction, work around trees," said Sandoval. "Trees can't be replaced for the additional cost of keeping them on the lot."

Although trees on private property are the responsibility of the homeowners, Global ReLeaf can help in common areas and on public property through the Neighborhood Tree Planting program. Local community groups from Cub Scouts to homeowners associations, from schools to civic groups can form neighborhood tree planting groups to spruce up their commons areas, play areas and streets.

In the past, cities were not always developed with trees in mind, according to Sandoval. Development has left trees with a number of problems, including a lack of space, poor soil, air pollution, runoff pollutants, people pressure and foot traffic.

"Dutch Elm disease taught us not to take our city trees for granted," said Sandoval. There is a need to get a variety of trees so that if one species is wiped out again, there are others left. But at present, for every four trees cut down, only one is replaced, according to Sandoval. Global ReLeaf of Michigan will match up to \$1,000 for volunteer groups to plant trees on public property, commons areas in subdivisions, around schools and along city streets.

The group must first submit a Neighborhood Tree Planting Application to Global ReLeaf. Forms are available by calling 1-800-642-7353. Ask for a tree planting application and leave your name, address and telephone number.

Each application is evaluated by Global ReLeaf. During the first year of the program in 1989, Global ReLeaf did three plantings. Now the group averages 30 to 35 plantings in the spring, with fewer in the fall.

Global ReLeaf will meet with the group at the site to determine the site's feasibility. The organization will be looking at the

ing the soil and cutting off the flow of water to the root system.

Maintenance includes selective pruning, to keep the tree in its natural structure, fertilization, because leaves are raked up; and watering. Global ReLeaf will monitor the after-planting maintenance program.

Global ReLeaf will order and arrange for the delivery of the trees to the site. The group must meet Global ReLeaf at the site on the day of delivery, preferably with a front end loader truck because balled and burlapped trees can weigh more than 200 pounds. The trees are placed next to the holes. Global ReLeaf will come out on planting day and supervise the group's volunteers who do the planting of the trees.

Global ReLeaf will also give demonstrations on how to "right" a tree, using the shovel as a wedge to straighten it, and how to loosen the basket.



Its representatives will also do a quality control check and answer any questions the group might have. It will acquaint the group with the maintenance requirements of the trees.

Although most people think of planting in the spring, the fall is also a very good time to plant, especially at schools. Once school has let out, there is no one around to take care of the trees for the first few critical months. In the fall, schools are back in session and there are always people around to see that the tree's needs are met.

"This is a wonderful project for high school seniors to do as a class project," said Sandoval. "They are always looking for something to leave behind." What better than a tree that will continue to grow new leaves yearly.

To fund a tree planting program, groups often host bake sales, hold car washes or get outright donations. Some groups have received grants from groups like the Rotary. Sometimes the PTA/PTO will help.

"I've seen very inventive, wonderful ideas people come up with to raise money," said Sandoval. One teacher used herself to goad the students into raising the money. She said she would get a buzz cut if the students raised the funds for the program. They did so, and she had a barber give her a buzz at a school assembly.

1995 Plant of the Year

The Perennial Plant Association is pleased to announce the Perovskia has been selected as the Perennial Plant of the Year for 1995. Commonly called Russian sage, Perovskia has silver stems and small, grayish foliage. It reaches heights of nearly 4 feet and is categorized as a subshrub with a woody base.

The leaves are barely toothed, 1 inches long and, when crushed, have the scent of sage. Small, light-blue to lavender flowers are arranged in whorls along the stem, and the spikes are often 12 inches long or more. Perovskia begins flowering in July and often lasts through September.

In winter, Russian sage provides interest in the garden with its silver-gray foliage and stems.

Although there are seven species of Perovskia, only a few are cultivated and available. Perovskia atriplicifolia, the most readily available, is native to Afghanistan and Tibet, and is a member of the mint family. However, the Perovskia atriplicifolia currently sold in the United States has been identified as a hybrid

between P. atriplicifolia and P. abrotanoides, and appears to be identical with P. Blue Spire.

Perovskia atriplicifolia grows best in sunny, dry locations and is one of the most heat- and drought-resistant perennials available. It is easily grown in hardiness zones 3 through 8, but it will perform best in areas with consistently warm summers, even when the humidity is high. In shaded areas, plants will grow, but tend to be leggy and sprawling.

The only condition that Perovskia resents is poor drainage, especially in winter. For best results, plants should be cut back nearly to the ground each spring before new growth begins.

Perovskia is most easily propagated by 3- to 4-inch stem cuttings, which root easily in sand or in an equal volume mixture of peat moss and perlite. If placed under mist, remove immediately after roots begin to form since cuttings will be lost if they remain moist for too long. To avoid the use of mist altogether,

Refinishing hardwood floors

HERE'S HOW

Q. Our home contains a grooved, prefinished hardwood floor in the living room, dining room and family room. I have been very unhappy with the finish as it stains easily, and every drop of moisture leaves permanent marks. My neighbors have the same type of flooring.

I understand that these floors can be successfully refinished by sanding down to the bare wood. In refinishing, I would like to know if a Swedish water-base urethane finish or a standard polyurethane finish would be most durable and spot resistant.

Can you provide me with information to help determine which finish would be best?

A. What's feasible in refinishing will depend on the particular type and brand of your existing flooring. From your description of water spotting, it sounds like the current flooring has a wax coating. If this is true that is a negative factor.

Wax tends to penetrate the pores of the wood. Even with refinishing (sanding down to the bare wood surface), all of the wax residue cannot be removed. You cannot put a urethane coating over wood that contains wax or wax residue.

Some of the prefinished hardwood floors already have polyurethane finishes (usually it is recommended not to wax these floors). A prefinished wood floor (even a polyurethane floor) often can be refinished if you strip the floor down to the bare wood and start anew.

This is a lot of hard work and fairly expensive if done professionally. You must be careful, because some floors are laminates and the wood surface is very thin. I would not recommend refinishing a laminate because extensive sanding could easily destroy the

thin surface layer.

Other prefinished wood floorings are acrylic impregnated and the acrylic goes through the entire wood plank. Acrylic floors can be sanded down, and a new surface coating applied. But they cannot be refinished with polyurethane.

Your best bet on floor care would be to contact the manufacturer of your particular flooring and seek advice on floor care as well as refinishing. Different manufacturers offer different care systems suited to their specific flooring products.

Your manufacturer may be able to recommend a care system that would minimize staining and water spots. Any wax finish will tend to water spot. You can check with a local dealer, or preferably the local flooring distributor for information.

Q. The previous owner painted the ceramic tile in the bathrooms of our home. Is there any way that this paint can be removed and the original tile restored?

A. Although the work is messy and time-consuming, you can probably remove the paint with a paint stripper. Choose a water-base stripper (not methylene chloride-base), such as Safest Stripper by 3M, EasyOff Paint Stripper by Klean Strip or StrypSafer by Savogon. These products are available at home centers and paint stores.

Even if you successfully strip the paint, you may not be happy with the results. The tile surface may have been sanded or etched prior to painting to assure a better bond. In that case, the tile will be irreparably damaged. Even if you find the tile in good condition, you will still need to re-grout (scrape out the old grout between tiles and fill in

with new).

Considering these factors, it may be more practical to remove the existing tiles and replace them with new ones.

Q. I would like to have a butcher block cutting board installed as an insert in my kitchen counter top. I burned a section of the plastic-laminated counter top and this would camouflage the damage, as well as provide a functional element.

If I do this, what type of treatment should the butcher block have to protect the wood, and how should the wood be cleaned and maintained?

A. I would use one of the commercial, non-toxic finishes that is safe for food contact. This would be similar to tung oil, but non-toxic. Check with a woodworking store for such a product, or contact Leichtung Workshops, 4944 Commerce Parkway, Cleveland, OH 441128; phone (800) 321-6840, for their non-toxic finishing oil that retails for approximately \$10.

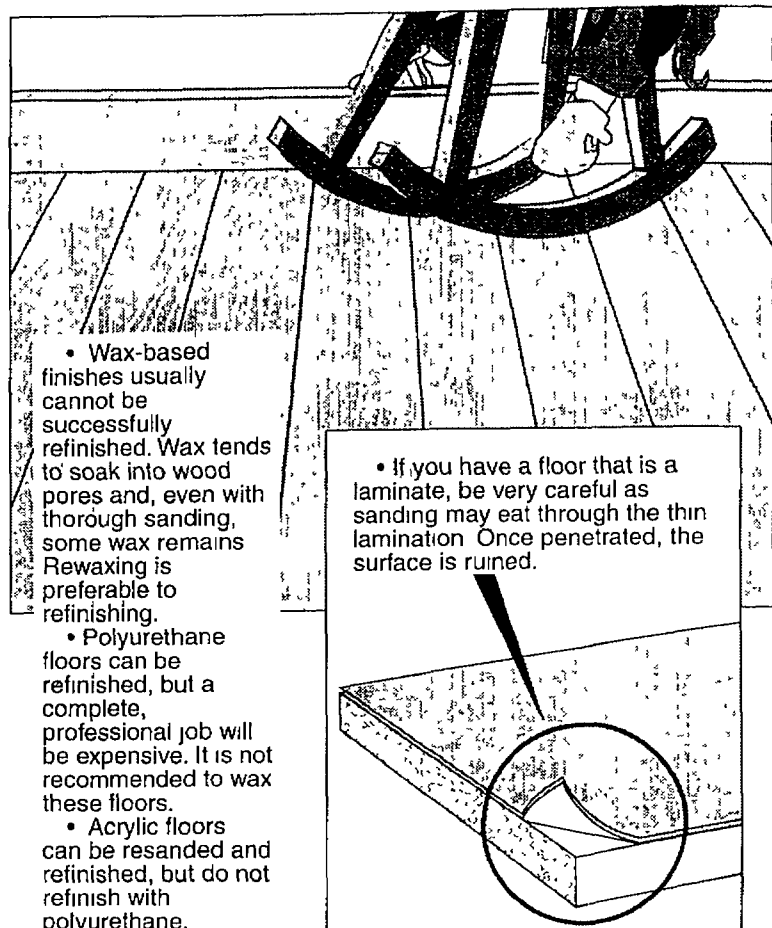
Before installation, be sure and seal the edges and underside of the butcher block as well as the top to protect the wood from moisture. You should clean the board after each use with soap and hot water, rinse with clear water and dry completely.

Stains can be treated with lemon juice and the board can be scrubbed with a nylon scouring pad. If the surface becomes badly stained, a light sanding and new application of the finishing oil will restore the wood finish.

Hardwood floors: Refinish or not?

Hardwood floors vary in quality of wood and type of finish. Here are a few guidelines to follow when considering which course of action to take.



• Wax-based finishes usually cannot be successfully refinished. Wax tends to soak into wood pores and, even with thorough sanding, some wax remains. Rewaxing is preferable to refinishing.

• Polyurethane floors can be refinished, but a complete, professional job will be expensive. It is not recommended to wax these floors.

• Acrylic floors can be resanded and refinished, but do not refinish with polyurethane.

Debbie Nichols, ERA referral marketing manager, summed up the potential in using The Internet to sell real estate.

"The Internet is becoming a pri-

mary communications tool for businesses to provide information to millions of people. It's a breakthrough for consumers who now can view pictures of homes listed anywhere in the country from the privacy of their personal computers. It's a great marketing tool for home sellers and a shopping guide for buyers."

The Internet has the potential of becoming the vehicle for a giant,

worldwide multiple listing service (MLS), accessible to buying and selling consumers as well as real estate professionals.

However, one industry leader takes a conservative view of The Internet's potential for real estate marketing.

"It's not the ideal medium for Realtors," said Bud Smith, executive director of the National Associ-

ation of Realtors. "But it may become more viable as the number of users continue to increase."

NAR is developing its own national computer on-line system that will carry a database of property descriptions from MLS operations throughout the country. It's called Realtors Information Network (RIN), a separate corporation totally owned and operated by

NAR.

RIN was scheduled to become operative in January 1996, but may be operational by July or August of this year, Smith said.

er plastic may be placed over the cuttings to maintain humidity. Rooting generally occurs within two to three weeks.

Propagation by division is possible, but slow, or by seed. Seeds require a short cold treatment of about 30 days. Rooted cuttings or seedlings should be planted out in the spring or early enough in the fall to allow sufficient root development so plants do not heave the following spring. They grow best in neutral to alkaline soils.

Perovskia is normally purchased as a potted plant. At planting, loosen the soil in an area two to three times the diameter of the pot. Thoroughly work in a complete fertilizer like 10-6-4 or 10-10-10 at the rate of 2 to 3 pounds per 100 square feet into the top 6 to 8 inches of soil in the planting area.

In addition, 4 to 6 inches of leaf mold or other organic compost can be spread over the planting area and thoroughly worked into the soil to a depth of 6 to 8 inches. Composts are particularly valuable in

improving soil structure and water-holding capacity.

Finally, remove the plant from the pot and set it at the same depth as in the pot. Firm the soil around the plant and water in thoroughly.

Commonly available Perovskia cultivars are: Blue Mist, Blue Haze, Blue Spire and Longing. The earliest flowering cultivar is Blue Mist, which, along with Blue Haze, has lighter blue flowers than the other species.

Blue Spire has deep-purple flowers and

larger panicles. Longing has stiff upright stems and a more formal appearance.

A new cultivar, Filigran, has deeply cut foliage, bright-blue flowers and is more compact than other cultivars.

In the landscape, Perovskia's bright-blue flowers are particularly striking when planted along with white flowered species like Phlox paniculata Mount Fuji.

And, besides its attributes as a landscape plant, Perovskia is also a reasonably good cut flower. Other landscape uses include massing or filling in the bor-

der as well as being used to separate dominant colors.

Homeowners may obtain this lovely cultivar through local garden centers or mail-order nurseries.

Child's rocker is from Golden Oak period

Q. I just finished restoring this child's oak rocker for my new baby. I think it is about 80 years old.

Could you please tell me its vintage and value?

A. You have a Golden Oak rocker. This period of furniture was made from around 1890 to 1920. Oak was sturdy wood that was impervious to extremes in temperature. Golden Oak furniture was factory made for the popular tastes and demand.

Strength, simplicity and durability were the qualities emphasized by the manufacturers. Oak was finished to a rich, warm, golden color. The simplicity of line and the warm color were reactions to the dim, dark, ornate Victorian furniture. Manufacturers frequently used ash, hickory, elm and chestnut because they resembled oak.

Your child's rocker was made around 1900. It would probably be worth about \$225 to \$250.

Q. I have a Rookwood mug with the word "Lonhuda" on the bottom. It is a bronze-green color and decorated with flowers and leaves.

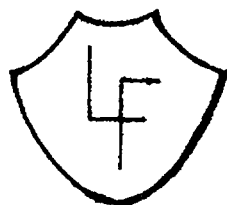
Could you tell me any interesting facts about it, and what it is worth?

A. One interesting fact that I can tell you is that it isn't a Rookwood mug. It was made by Lonhuda Faience Co.

In 1892, William Long of Steubenville, Ohio, along with W.H. Hunt, and Alfred Day, established a pottery factory. Lonhuda was formed by using the first two letters

of the last names of the three men.

The brown underglaze they used was similar to one by Rookwood. Lonhuda ware was exhibited at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair.

In 1895, Samuel Weller of Weller Pottery and Long formed the Lonhuda Faience Co. They parted company in 1896.

Long was associated with a variety of potteries over his lifetime. He organized the Denver China & Pottery Co., the Clifton Pottery, returned to Weller Pottery, went on to Roseville Pottery and finally ended up at the American Encaustic Tiling Co.

"Kovel's Collector's Guide to American Art Pottery" by Ralph and Terry Kovel shows this mark was used in 1896. Your mug would probably be worth about \$195 to \$200.

Q. I have been given a set of Cambridge crystal stemware. My mother said the pattern is "Caprice."

Does my stemware have any value other than sentimental?

A. Cambridge Glass Co. existed from 1901 to 1954 in Cambridge, Ohio. Their glassware was all handmade and available in both clear and colors. Cambridge Glass was accepted worldwide as glassware of exceptional quality.

The St. Louis Exposition in 1904 granted Cambridge glass several awards. Although much of their glass was marked, paper labels were used from 1935 to 1954. The National Cambridge Collectors Inc., Cambridge, Ohio, has documented reference information for anyone researching Cambridge glass.

Each piece of your stemware would probably be worth about \$25 to \$30.

Q. I was given a set of three plates. Each is set in a wood frame. Each is marked "Salem China Company." They are decorated with pictures of ladies dressed in 19th century gowns. I was told that they were scenes from "Godey's Lady's Book."

According to my encyclopedia, Louis Antoine Godey was an authority on women's fashions. Do my plates have any value?

A. Godey lived from 1804 to 1878. He was the American publisher of "Godey's Lady's Book." Scenes from his prints have been widely reproduced over the years.

Your plates were made in the mid-20th century by the Salem China Co. in Salem, Ohio. The value of each framed plate would probably

be about \$25 to \$35.

Q. My mother has five Dionne quintuplets spoons. Each spoon has a face and a name of one of the quintuplets. How much are they worth?

A. The Dionne quintuplets were born in 1934 on a small farm in rural Ontario, Canada. At the height of their popularity myriad souvenirs featuring the sisters were produced.

Your set of five spoons would probably be worth about \$75 to \$85.

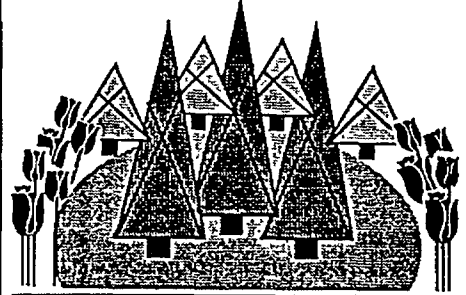

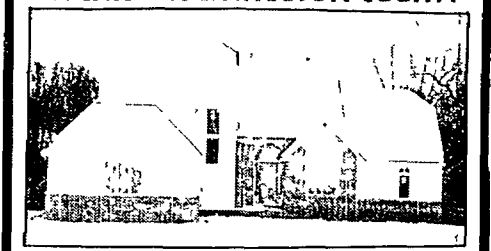

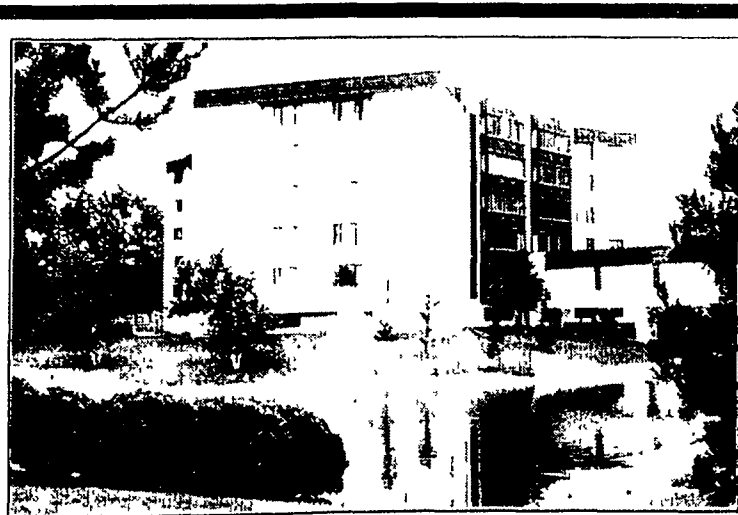

Bring a good appetite to Oxford Inn

If you're planning a trip to the Oxford Inn, bring a good appetite.

That's because one of Novi's newest restaurants likes to pile it on - no matter what you order. No wimpy portions here.

"I'm an old steak-and-potatoes guy," said owner Bob Higgins. "I like hearty meals."

From stacked high corned beef sandwiches at lunch to stuffed chicken breast at dinner, you'll never leave the Oxford Inn unsatisfied.

"What I try to do is give people quality and a good sized portion for their money," said Higgins.

Located just east of Novi Road on Grand River across from the Town Center, the establishment opened last July. Business has increased steadily since last summer. He purchased the restaurant from Victor Cassis, who ran the up-scale Victor's. Higgins first looked at the site last March.

"I came here because of the city's future plans," he commented, "and the building was what I was looking for."

In years to come, the city will be developing its "Main Street" pedestrian shopping district directly adjacent to the Oxford Inn. Hopes

are that the street, which will connect Grand River and Novi Road, will give the city an identifiable downtown like Northville and Plymouth.

Higgins is hoping his restaurant will be well established by the time Main Street is a reality. In that regard, he's lightened up the restaurant's atmosphere.

The Oxford Inn is his second restaurant. Higgins opened the original Oxford Inn in Royal Oak in 1988. Noted for its barbecued baby ribs, the inn won a Best American Restaurant award from the *Metro Times* in 1993. Higgins said serving up good food has always been his goal.

"I always wanted my own restaurant," he explained. "I always wanted a place where people could

come and celebrate a special occasion." But don't wait for a special occasion. The Oxford Inn has plenty to offer for any old time.

For lunch, burgers and sandwiches abound. The Cambridge is one of Oxford's most popular sandwiches - corned beef is piled high on rye or pumpernickel. The Dover Street Dip caters to the roast beef lover and comes on a French roll with au jus.

New York strip steak and ribs are around at lunchtime for bigger appetites. Prices range from \$4.25 for burgers to around \$6 for sandwiches. The New York strip is \$9.95.

At dinner, beef, seafood, chicken and ribs are highlighted. Oxford Chicken features a baked breast stuffed with spinach, mushrooms

and rice, and is topped with a creamy white wine sauce.

A full- or half-slab of ribs is on hand for those that don't mind getting their fingers a little messy.

"They fall off the bone," said Higgins.

Steaks include filet mignon and New York Strip. If seafood is your favorite, Alaskan king crab, shrimp and orange roughy are standard items.

Don't leave Oxford Inn without trying an oyster or two. Oysters on the half shell are \$5.95 for six and Oysters Rockefeller is \$4.95.

Oxford Inn's hours are: Tuesday-Thursday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., Friday 11 a.m. to 11 p.m., Saturday 4 to 11 p.m. and Sunday from 3 to 8 p.m. Call 305-5856 for more information.

From the County Executive

Dear County Residents:

This winter marks the start of my third year as Oakland County Executive and my third letter to you in this Community Development Annual Report. In previous letters, I told you that my administration would work hard to keep neighborhoods strong and to foster solid economic growth throughout the County, and that the programs administered by the Oakland County Division of Community Development had an important role to play in meeting these goals. This is still true today.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships, and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) programs provide millions of dollars each year to Oakland County to help us meet the needs of Oakland County's low- and moderate-income residents, as well as those persons in the County who are homeless. Here are just a few examples of the many activities carried out this past year:

- The homes of 199 low- and moderate-income persons were rehabilitated through the Home Improvement Program.

- Local communities initiated over 100 projects through the Oakland County CDBG program, including road improvements, meals for homebound senior citizens; barrier-free access improvements to assist mobility-impaired persons, minor home repair programs, and a host of others.

- HOME funds were used by a non-profit housing development company to place six new homes on previously vacant lots in Royal Oak Township for sale to low-income persons who might otherwise not have found a home.

Community Development has not been immune to the many political changes sweeping our nation.

In the past year, all planning functions for the CDBG, HOME, and ESG programs were consolidated and program years aligned to simplify and streamline the program process. This will improve the delivery of community development services by the Division of Community Development to local communities, non-profit agencies and, ultimately, to you. There has even been speculation that the federal government will trim the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD's) programs

down from well over 50 to three. Whatever happens at the national level, you can be assured that the County will continue to deliver community development services to you efficiently and effectively.

This report highlights the accomplishments of each of the programs administered by the Division of Community Development during 1994 and details the planned use of CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds for the upcoming year. The staff of the Division of Community Development, Kenneth Rogers, Director of the Department of Community and Economic Development, and I look forward to working with you during 1995 and beyond to make Oakland County a nationwide leader in quality of life for all who live and work here.

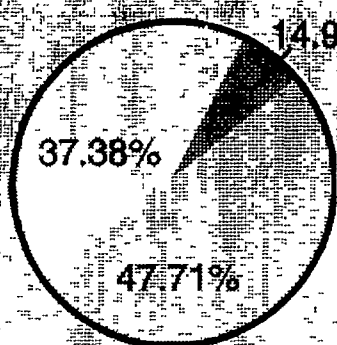

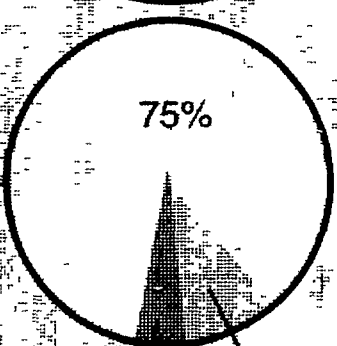

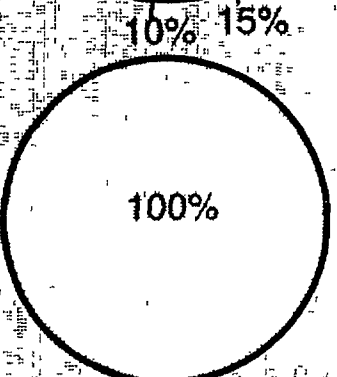


Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) \$6,030,089.56

Introduction to the C.D. Division

The Oakland County Community Development Division is the division of Oakland County government responsible for administering federal housing and community development funds received from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

(HUD). Oakland County receives three sources of funding from HUD: the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) grant, and the Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG). Each of these grants is designed to provide

revitalization and human services to the 50 urban, suburban, and rural communities participating in these programs with Oakland County. This report is designed to inform you of Community Development's accomplishments for 1994 and its plans for 1995.

Community Development Block Grant: A Twenty-Year Partnership to Improve Our Neighborhoods

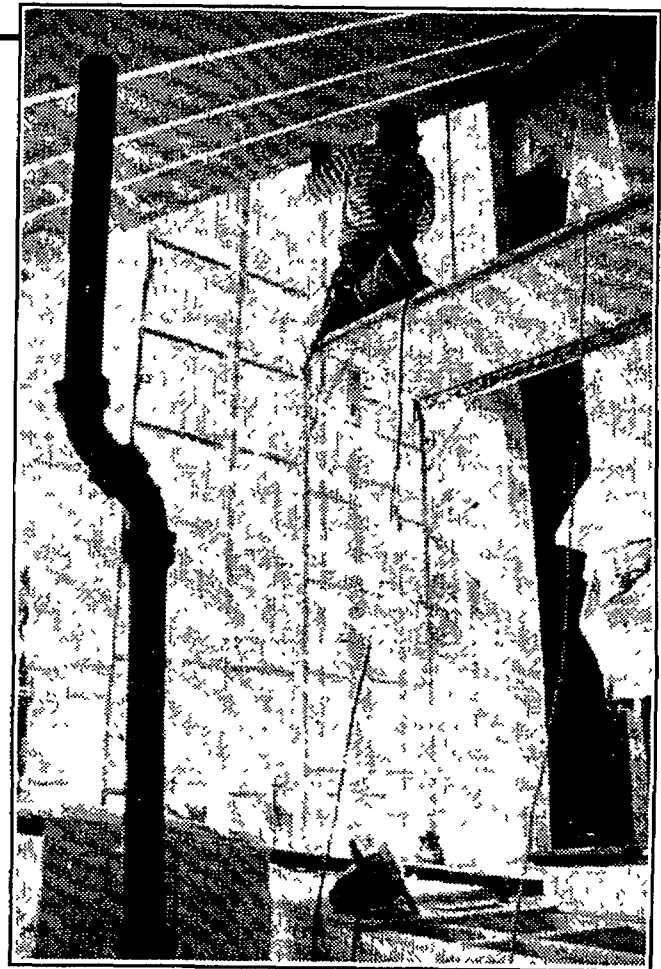
The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) benefits low- and moderate-income persons and keeps neighborhoods and business districts structurally sound, attractive, and economically strong. The county has invested over \$94 million of CDBG funds since the beginning of the program in 1975.

CDBG earmarks approximately one-third of CDBG funds to operate a Home Improvement Program benefitting low- and moderate-income people (see next page). Almost two-thirds of the funds, less administration, go to 50 participating Oakland County CDBG communities to implement hundreds of community revitalization projects, such as watermain or sewer installation, senior centers, fire facilities, and neighborhood development. Pages four through six detail each community's plans for its 1994 CDBG funds.

Oakland County's 1994 CDBG funds totalled \$6,030,089.56. About 80.09 percent of the funds benefitted low- and moderate-income people or eliminated deteriorating community conditions. Approximately 19.91 percent supported administrative, planning and management, and technical assistance activities.

The Home Improvement Program: Preserving Oakland County Housing

Improving Oakland County's aging housing stock is a long-standing commitment of the Community Development Division. The Home Improvement Program is financed through two federal sources: the CDBG and HOME Investment Partnerships programs.

The Home Improvement Program repairs and rehabilitates the homes of low- and moderate-income persons. Eligible homeowners receive low-interest loans of up to \$11,000 for repairs to roofs, plumbing and electrical systems, water and sewer systems, or other structural repairs. Repayment plans are based on family income at an interest rate of three percent or less. All rehabilitation work is completed by licensed and insured residential builders.

HOME Investment Partnerships

HOME: Expanding the Supply of Housing for Lower-Income Persons

The HOME Investment Partnerships Program entered its third year in 1994 with a grant of \$1,143,000. HOME is designed to expand the supply of decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing for low-income persons.

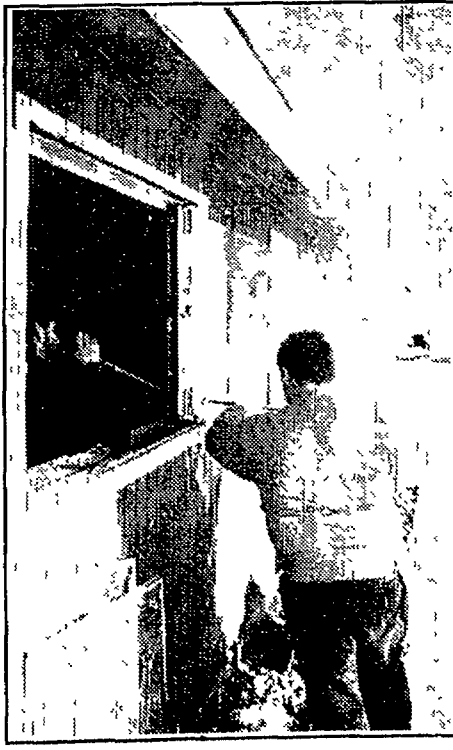
Oakland County's HOME Program funds two activities. Eighty-five (85) percent of the funds are used by the County to expand its existing Home Improvement Program (see "Find Out If You Qualify for the Home Improvement Program" for information on how to apply for a home improvement loan). The remaining 15 percent of funds support community housing development organizations (CHDOs), nonprofits that provide affordable housing for low-income homebuyers.

The Oakland County Board of Commissioners and L. Brooks Patterson, Oakland County Executive, have provided the 25 percent match required by federal regulation on all rehabilitation projects.

Through the HOME program, Oakland County has nearly doubled the number of houses rehabilitated each year. In 1994, 199 homes of low- and moderate-income persons were rehabilitated throughout the County.

Oakland County's designated CHDO, Venture, Inc. received fifteen percent of program year 1992 HOME funds. (Oakland County received \$934,000 for HOME in 1993.) Venture was formed by the Oakland Livingston Human Services Agency (OLHSA) to address the housing needs of low-income persons. During 1994, Venture used program year 1992 and 1993 HOME funds to place six factory-built homes on previously-vacant lots in Royal Oak Township. The homes were subsequently sold to low-income homebuyers.

This year qualified CHDOs will receive program year 1994 HOME funds to continue developing affordable housing for low-income persons. Oakland County will continue to use the majority of HOME funds to expand the number of homes rehabilitated throughout the 50 participating Oakland County HOME communities.



The majority of HOME funds received by the County each year are allocated to the Oakland County Home Improvement Program. This has allowed the County to substantially boost the number of home improvement projects completed each year.

EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT (ESG) PROGRAM Shelter For Homeless Persons

Oakland County has received \$530,000 in ESG funds since the program's inception in 1987. The Emergency Shelter Grant program helps alleviate homelessness by paying shelter operations, maintenance, and social services expenses.

Seven shelters received ESG assistance during 1994: South Oakland Shelter (SOS), Help Against Violent Encounters Now (HAVEN), Pontiac Area Transitional Housing (PATH), SoJourney House, Pontiac Rescue

Mission, The Sanctuary, and New Bethel Outreach Ministry.

SOS is a consortium of 50 shelter sites that receive homeless people on a rotating basis. HAVEN provides a domestic violence shelter for women. PATH and SoJourney House operate transitional housing projects designed to help homeless women re-enter mainstream society. The Sanctuary is a transitional living program for youth ages 16-21. New Bethel Outreach Ministry is a shelter for families in

Pontiac. Pontiac Rescue Mission is also a permanently-sited facility for men, women, and children. These seven organizations sheltered 3,251 men, women, and children during 1993.

In accordance with new federal priorities, the County has received a substantial increase in its homeless funding for 1995, to \$160,000, up from \$119,000 in 1994. Community Development will expand its program to aid homeless shelters with these new funds.



This building in downtown Holly Village is the site of the last Rental Rehabilitation Program (RRP) project in Oakland County. RRP, authorized by the Urban-Rural Recovery Act of 1983, was designed to give rental property owners incentives to rehabilitate their properties in exchange for a subsidy of a portion of the repair costs. The program was terminated by the federal government and phased out by Oakland County as projects already in progress were completed. The owner of this property used RRP funds to make the upper story into four apartments. On the first floor, private funds were used to rehabilitate the commercial area.

Citizen Participation: The Heart of the Program Process

Citizen participation is at the heart of the community development process. Citizens' ideas and needs are crucial to determining how CDBG funds are spent.

The Community Development Division publishes this newspaper supplement each March informing you of our accomplishments and plans for the coming year. Your community advertises and conducts a public hearing, usually in autumn, to obtain your views on local CDBG projects. The County also holds a county-wide public hearing on the upcoming year's CDBG plan each February. The final pages of this Annual Report show the County's Consolidated Plan for the use of CDBG, HOME, and ESG funds. Each community's plan for its CDBG funds is included in the block grant section of the report.

The Citizens Advisory Council for Community Development monitors the Community Development Division throughout the year. The council serves an advisory role in planning, implementing and assessing community development activities. Council members are appointed by the Chairperson of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners biennially.

FAIR HOUSING IS THE LAW

Every person in the United States has the right to choose housing suited to his/her needs and financial ability. It is illegal for real estate agencies, apartment complexes, or property owners to turn you away from the housing you want solely on the basis of your race, sex, age, religion, national origin, handicapped status, or familial status (i.e., if you have children).

To boost fair housing awareness, Oakland County, through the Community Development Division contracted with the Fair Housing Center of Metropolitan Detroit (FHC) and the Oakland County Center for Open Housing (OCCOH) in 1994. FHC provides brochures, newsletters, and workshops on fair housing issues. OCCOH affirmatively furthered fair housing in many Oakland County communities through public awareness activities.

Oakland County Consolidated Plan:

STREAMLINING SERVICES TO YOU

Many changes have taken place in the federal government over the past year. In an effort to cut costs and boost efficiency, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) is developing a number of cost-cutting strategies. One of these is the introduction of the Consolidated Plan.

The Consolidated Plan saves administrative staff time by allowing grantees of federal funds, including Oakland County, to apply for various housing and community development funds at one time. Previously, Oakland County had to apply for its Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships, and Emergency Shelter Grant program funds at different times. This meant that the Community Development Division had to balance three separate program calendars and publish another legal advertisement in addition to this Annual Report. This costs money--

money which could be spent on other program activities.

If you are a reader of this report each year, you will recall that the Community Development Division has previously only published a program summary of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. In it, the projects of each of the 50 communities participating in the Oakland County CDBG program were listed. Also included were an Environmental Review Notice, which is the County's official statement that it is in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and a Notice of Request for Release of Funds, which is the official request to the federal government to give Oakland County its CDBG funds after the public comment period has expired.

This year, because the County is applying for all of

its housing and community development funds at one time, the format of this Annual Report has changed. Directly below this article, you will find the County's proposed uses of funds for the HOME Investment Partnerships and Emergency Shelter Grant programs. These proposed use statements are not broken down by community, because the County administers 100 percent of the funds from these programs. Starting on the facing page, you will see the Community Development Block Grant proposed use of funds as it has traditionally appeared, broken down by community. On page 11, you will find a combined notice of Environmental Review and Notice of Request for Release of Funds for all three programs. It is set up this way to save space; otherwise, the two notices would have to be printed three times each.

HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS

1995 Program Description

The HOME Investment Partnerships program (HOME program) began in 1992 and is authorized by the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act of 1990. The program's purpose is to increase the supply of decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing for low-income people.

Unlike the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, the Oakland County government itself receives and administers 100 percent of HOME funds. By federal law, the County must set aside 15 percent of its annual HOME funds for community housing development organizations (CHDOs), which are non-profit agencies whose primary purpose is the provision of housing for low-income persons. Oakland County's CHDO up to this point has been Venture, Inc., a subsidiary of the Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency (OLHSA). Venture has been placing factory-built housing on previously vacant lots in Royal Oak Township for sale to low-income persons.

Oakland County uses the remaining funds to expand its Home Improvement Program, which provides loans to low- and moderate-income homeowners for housing rehabilitation. In order to comply with the mandate that HOME funds be used to assist low-income persons, only the lowest-income homeowners receive HOME-funded Home Improvement Program loans. Moderate-income homeowners receive a CDBG-funded loan.

Federal regulations also require the County to provide a 25 percent match on all HOME-funded rehabilitation projects. The Oakland County Board of Commissioners and Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson have authorized this match, which is drawn from the County's General Fund. A 10 percent administrative allowance to operate the program is permitted under federal guidelines.

PROGRAM YEAR 1995 EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT (ESG) PROGRAM PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS

Program Description

The Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) program has been operational in Oakland County since 1987 and was initially authorized by the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act.

The program is intended to help improve the quality of existing emergency shelters for the homeless, to make additional shelters available, and to help meet the costs of operating emergency shelters. Therefore, all ESG funds have been distributed by Oakland County to the seven shelters currently participating in the program: South Oakland Shelter, Help Against Violent Encounters Now (HAVEN), Pontiac Area Transitional Housing (PATH), Women's Survival Center's SoJourney House, New Bethel Outreach Ministry, Pontiac Rescue Mission, and The Sanctuary, Inc.'s A Step Forward program. A separate Request for Proposals (RFP) notice will

be published soon to allow all Oakland County shelters an opportunity to apply for funds.

Three categories of expenditures are eligible under the Oakland County ESG program: Essential Services, which can be up to 30 percent of a shelter's grant; Operations and Maintenance, which can be 100 percent of a shelter's grant; and Administration, which can be up to 10 percent of a shelter's grant. Each shelter chooses its own combination of expenditure categories, within the acceptable percentage limits.

Essential Services are expenses associated with medical care, counseling, food, education, and similar expenses. Operations and Maintenance expenses are incurred in the operation of the shelter building/program, such as insurance, utilities, security services, and rent. Administration expenses are mainly concerned

with the salaries of shelter personnel.

Planned Use of Funds

This year, assuming that each shelter will elect to budget the maximum allowed percentage for administrative and essential services expenses, the 1995 Oakland County ESG budget will be:

PROGRAM YEAR 1995 CDBG PROJECTED FUND USE

STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVES

Since 1975, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has allocated over \$94 million to Oakland County to administer annual Community Development Programs pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.

The primary objective of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act and of the Oakland County CDBG Program is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income.

Consistent with this primary objective, the Housing and Community Development Act identifies three broad national program objectives. Oakland County gives maximum feasible priority to CDBG projects which comply with one or more of the national objectives.

NATIONAL PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Ensure benefit to low and moderate income persons; not less than 70% of a grantee's aggregate funds shall be used to support activities that benefit low and moderate income persons.
- Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blighting community conditions.
- Meet other community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs.

In promoting the primary national objectives Oakland County Community Development has developed the following specific objectives and strategies consistent with policy statements for Federal, State, Regional and County levels of government for the 1995 program year.

COUNTY PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Encourage communities to realistically plan for future development and to assist communities in developing the capacity to implement activities.
- Increase each community's commitment to its proposed community development activity.
- Discourage the use of community development funds on projects which can be funded through other sources.
- Improve, upgrade and increase property values through the concentration of rehabilitation efforts within the neighborhood.
- Reduce the number of substandard dwelling units within the county through the rehabilitation of existing residential units.
- Improve living conditions within housing units and reduce the financial burden of low and moderate income persons.
- Reduce housing maintenance and fuel costs and enable lower income persons to remain in their housing unit.
- Instill within homeowners the incentive to maintain and improve conditions within the housing unit.
- Assist homeowners in using available funding sources to accomplish housing rehabilitation activities.
- Reduce the isolation of income groups and increase housing opportunities for low and moderate income persons.
- Affirmatively further fair housing and equal opportunity.
- Minimize displacement of persons as a result of CDBG assisted activities through counsel and careful assessment of each project requiring displacement.
- Provide relocation assistance in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Act of 1970 (24 CFR 42) and mitigate adverse effects of displacement, if any, on low and moderate income persons.
- Ensure that persons displaced as a result of CDBG assisted projects will be treated fairly, consistently, and equitably so such persons will not suffer disproportionate injuries as a result of projects designed for the benefit of the public as a whole.
- Ensure that tenants displaced involuntarily and permanently as a result of the use of CDBG assistance to acquire or substantially rehabilitate property will be treated the same as activities covered under the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970.
- Ensure that not less than 70% of CDBG funds received annually are used for activities that principally benefit persons of low and moderate income.
- Provide for citizen participation in the CDBG process by implementing a detailed citizen participation plan.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT-PROGRAM YEAR 1995 PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS

The County of Oakland, a Michigan Constitutional Corporation, in compliance with the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, will submit the following proposed projects and allocations to HUD for FY 1995 CDBG funding totaling \$5,065,000 on March 16, 1995. Oakland County will supplement the 1995 CDBG entitlement from HUD with \$770,823.18 in County and Community CDBG program income generated from 1/1/94 to 12/31/94 for total 1995 revenues of \$5,835,823.18.

How To Read This Projected Use of Funds

The use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds must comply with a number of federal guidelines. These requirements must all be listed in this Projected Use of Funds. To save space, a number of codes have been used. For example, you may read a project title like this:

Senior Citizen Center A2a \$44,500

This means that the community will spend \$44,500 of its 1995 CDBG funds on a senior citizen center. Each part of the code "A2a" has a meaning also.

The capital letter indicates which national CDBG objective the project falls under. The national objective codes are:

- Project benefits low and/or moderate income people.
- Project addresses slums or blighted conditions
- Project meets an urgent community need where no other funding is available.

The number indicates the project's status under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA). These codes are:

- The project has been environmentally assessed.
- The project is categorically excluded from environmental review by NEPA.
- The project is exempt from environmental review by NEPA.

Finally, the small letter indicates the regulatory authority for the project; in other words, where in the regulations it says that the project may be funded with CDBG money. All regulations regarding CDBG are found in the Code of Federal Regulations, Volume 24. This is abbreviated as "24 CFRV". The specific section comes afterward. Thus 24 CFR 570.201(c), means volume 24, Code of Federal Regulations, section 570.201(c). The regulatory codes used in this publication are:

What's the difference between Minor Home Repair, Home Chore, and Emergency Home Repair?

Minor Home Repair-Small repair projects around the home, such as screen and/or window repair, painting, and minor plumbing repairs. Generally, these are repairs which are too small to warrant the homeowners' applying for a County Home Improvement Program loan.

Home Chore-Leaf raking, lawn mowing, snow removal, installation of screens, cleaning, and other jobs around the house.

Emergency Home Repair-Repairs such as furnace replacement in the winter. Those repairs that must be immediately undertaken to protect the health and safety of the household.

All interested agencies, groups, and persons must specifically indicate the program commented on (Community Development Block Grant, HOME, or Emergency Shelter Grant) and, for each program, whether the objection(s) submitted addresses the Environmental Review or the Request for Release of Funds. No objection received after April 28, 1995 on any program will be considered by HUD.
