Library plan ready for submission

After more than a century of waiting, Northville's library may soon have a home all its own.

The proposed plan for a new Northville District Library building, the first one ever to be specifically intended for use as a library, will go before the Northville City Planning Commission on Tuesday. If it wins approval soon from sev-

eral city bodies and Northville Public Schools, construction could begin in late June and the new library could be open for business in the fall of 1996.

Between now and then lies a lot of work, however. That's something that the plan's supporters are used to, though; they've spent a lot of time and energy developing the proposal, a plan which they hope will give Northville-community residents a library to be proud of.

"The library was established in 1889 but it's never had a home that was built to be a library," Library Director Pat Orr said. "This new plan gives it one."

The library has moved from place to place all over the city during its century of existence and entered its current location inside Northville City Hall in 1980.

The two-story building is proposed to be con-

Schools fare well on state accreditation

That the Northville School District had more than half of its schools receive the highest mark of approval from the Michigan Department of Education last week would seem cause for celebration.

But rather than reveling in the fact that the district fared exceptionally well in the state's results of its first accreditation process - Northville was one of only two districts in the area to have several buildings receive summary accreditation - officials are giving the results the brush off.

"I don't take any great relish in this," said Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski, saying the criteria for accreditation are not in-depth nor a credible way to gauge the quality

of education at a given school.

"This is something that the state imposed on us and we filled out the paperwork."

Amerman and Moraine elementary schools and Cooke and Meads Mill middle schools were four of 145 schools in the state that received summary accreditation status - meaning the buildings met standards in core curriculum, Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) test scores and school improvement goals and teams.

Silver Springs and Winchester elementary schools and Northville High School received interim status, which means the schools met some but not all of the standards put forth by the state.

Record editor pleads to drunk driving charge

Lee Snider, editor of *The Northville Record*, pleaded guilty one week ago to operating a vehicle while impaired by alcohol.

Canton Township police arrested Snider at about 2:30 a.m. on April 15. The reporting officer said he saw Snider's 1993 Ford Escort swerving while eastbound on Michigan Avenue near Belleville Road and observed it cross the center line.

Breathalyzer testing later at police headquarters showed him to have a blood alcohol level of .16 percent, the officer's report stated. A blood alcohol level of .10 percent is considered legally drunk.

Snider was arraigned on charges of operating a vehicle under the influence of liquor (OUIL) and unlawful blood alcohol level (UBAL), both first offenses. On April 20 he agreed to plead guilty to the lesser offense of operating

while impaired and the original charges were dismissed.

35th Thirty-fifth District Court Judge John McDonald sentenced Snider to a 90-day restriction of his driver's license and six months probation. He was required to pay \$745 in fines, court and probation costs, attend counseling and refrain from consuming alcohol during the probation period.

Snider, 43, is a resident of Livonia.

"I feel fortunate that nothing serious happened because I was very drunk and had many miles to drive before I got home," Snider said. "Something serious could have happened and I'm grateful that it didn't."

"I'm very embarrassed by this as a member of the Zero Tolerance Committee in this community. It's going to be hard for me to explain my actions."

Township to sue state over prison population

Northville Township will formally take the Michigan Department of Corrections (DOC) to court this week.

Two weeks ago the township board of trustees ordered attorney Jim Tamm to file a request for a show cause order against the DOC with the Wayne County Circuit Court. Tamm on Monday said that he expects to be ready to file the request by the end of the week.

The request will ask a circuit court judge to demand that the DOC be held in contempt for violating a court order which caps the prison population at the Western Wayne Correctional Facility, located off Five Mile in Plymouth Town-

ship, at 500.

Corrections officials increased the prison's population to about 775 inmates earlier this month. The move followed failed talks between the township and the state aimed at winning the township's approval of the plan.

The explosive increase in Michigan's prison population in recent years has led corrections officials to double bunk prisoners at facilities all over the state. The communities hosting those facilities usually have little say about such decisions. That's not the case with Northville Township and Western Wayne, however, the court request will say.

In 1986 the state Legislature

passed a law which among other things capped Western Wayne's population at 500. Northville Township went to court seeking an order to back up that provision and got it.

Earlier this month the Legislature amended the law to increase the cap from 500 to 775. That move followed discussions between state officials and the township. In return for trustees' approval of the double bunking Lansing offered to tear down the closed Phoenix Correctional Facility, located across Five Mile from Western Wayne in the township.

The state said it would pay for the demolition and subsequent land cleanup and then sell the

property to the private sector, getting it back on the tax rolls.

With media footage of such places as Daytona Beach and Fort Lauderdale showing hordes of young people hanging off hotel balconies in raucous revelry, it's no surprise.

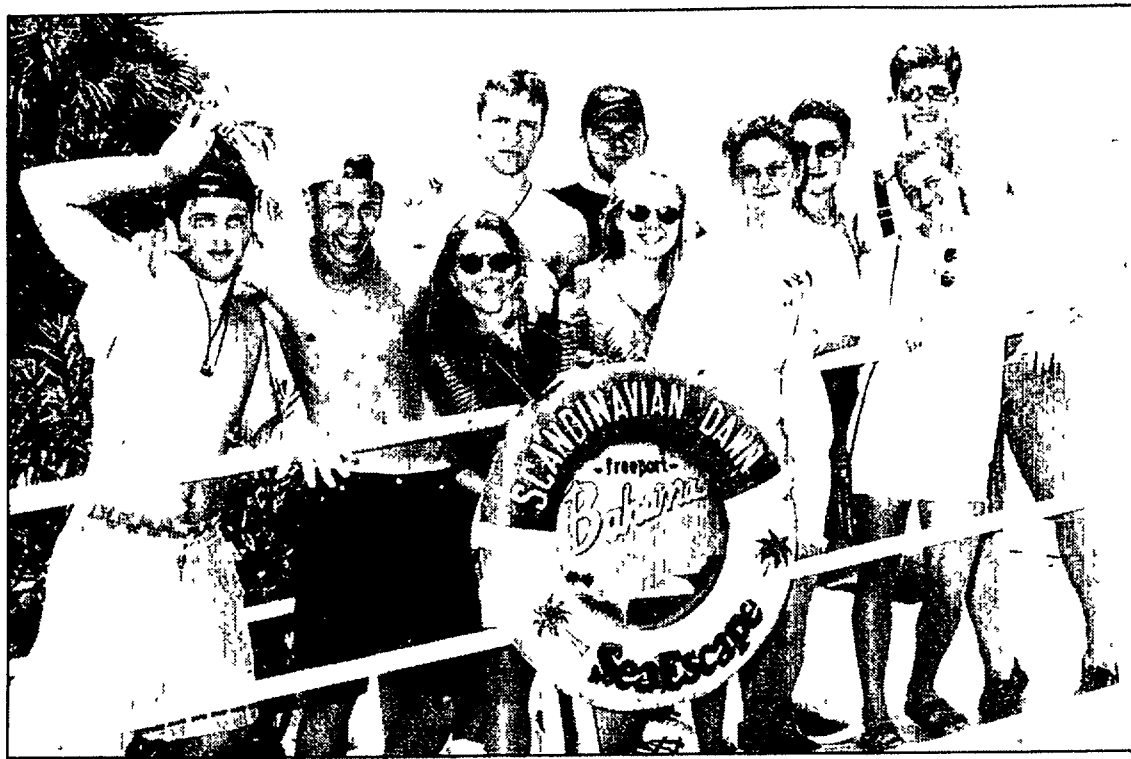
To ease the fears of some nail-biting parents and to lend a supervisory hand to a group of Northville High School seniors, parent Steven Holman accompanied 10 seniors to Florida and the Bahamas during spring break vacation last week.

Holman, who is the head of heating and cooling for the school district, said he organized the excursion to provide an opportunity for the students to make a spring break trip with some limited parental supervision.

"These young men and women are adults - you can't put the thumb screws in them anymore," said Holman, whose son James, a senior at the high school, attended the trip with the nine other students.

"But I wanted to provide some sort of chaperone-related trip and at the same time give the kids a sense of responsibility for their actions."

The group spent two days in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and then the students took a boat to Freeport Harbour in Grand Bahama Island. Holman flew to the island and then stayed in a

Farmers' Market returns to Northville Downs

Due to popular demand, the long-time tradition of the Farmer's Market will return to the place it formerly enjoyed calling home - Northville Downs.

As the market's season kicks off next Thursday to provide residents with fresh fruits, vegetables, flowers and plants, the Northville community will find it back downtown each Thursday at the corner of Seven Mile and Sheldon roads across from Northville Downs race track.

Hordes of community members voiced dissatisfaction with last year's decision to move the market to the Highland Lakes Shopping Center, located on Seven Mile Road east of South Main Street after Downs officials decided to not allow the market to set up on its premises.

"We got so much flack last year," said Laurie Marrs, executive director of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce. "I applaud Northville Downs for listening to the public and supporting the community."

Both farmers and residents were unhappy with last year's move that made the market less accessible for patrons and uncomfortable for farmers who no longer had the shade of trees to help ward off the sweltering heat of summer.

This year's season will begin next Thursday, May 4, and ends the last Thursday in October and will be bigger than ever, Marrs said. Thirty-three spaces in the Down's parking lot are already taken up by vendors, she said.

The market, a long-time tradition for the community of Northville, is approaching its 13th year running.

Youth arrested after trying to take cash register

A 15-year-old Novi boy was arrested for larceny from a building April 22 after he attempted to swipe a cash register at Crawford's Restaurant, 160 E. Main St., and began walking down the street with it.

Patrons at the restaurant told Northville city police that the boy entered the building and sat down on a bench in the front of the restaurant near the cash register. The boy then got up and left the building, witnesses told police.

A few moments later, the boy returned with his hood up, looked up and told patrons that he was going to take the cash register and then picked it up and walked out the door.

A patron at the restaurant, a 30-year-old Stanwood man, saw the boy walking down the street with the register and asked his waitress if he was authorized to have it. When the waitress said no, the man chased after the boy.

The customer found the boy around the back of the building attempting to take the cash from

the drawer. The man escorted the boy back into the building with the register and called the police.

The boys case has been forwarded to Wayne County Juvenile Court.

DRUG POSSESSION: A 27-year-old Plymouth woman has been charged with possession of a controlled substance after police found what appeared to be cocaine in her purse when she was arrested for drunken driving.

Northville city police pulled the woman over after she stopped at a green light at the intersection of Novi and Eight Mile roads.

An officer stopped the woman after she finally proceeded through the green light and was driving 32 mph on a Eight Mile, a 40 mph zone. She also crossed over the double line in the road a number of times.

The woman admitted to police that she had had too much to drink that night. The woman failed a number of field sobriety tests and registered a .153 percent

blood-alcohol level. .11 is considered legally drunk, though motorists can be arrested for .07, considered driving while impaired. She was arrested and processed at the station.

At the station, police searched through her purse to inventory her belongings and found a folded-up magazine page that contained what appeared to be cocaine.

The woman admitted to police that the substance was cocaine. Lab results on the substance are pending.

Police seized the woman's car and searched it but found no other drug-like substances.

The car was forfeited to the police department but later the woman paid a \$900 forfeiture fee to regain possession of the vehicle.

The woman posted a \$100 cash bond for the drunken driving charge. A preliminary examination has been set for April 25 at 35th

District Court in Plymouth.

OUIL: A 56-year-old Southfield man was arrested for drunken driving April 23 after he stopped in the middle of North Center Street and backed up onto Eight Mile Road.

While driving down Eight Mile Road, a Northville city police officer noted that the man repeatedly drifted into the left lane of the road.

The officer pulled the man over, who thought he was at Eight Mile and Halstead roads in Novi.

The man failed a number of field sobriety tests and registered a .19 percent blood-alcohol level. While at the station, the man began to complain of chest pains. An ambulance was called and the man was transported to Botsford Hospital.

The man was released to the hospital on a \$500 personal bond. A preliminary examination has

been scheduled for April 28 at 35th District Court.

CABINETS PURLOINED: Someone stole \$890 worth of aluminum doors, cabinets and a sink base from an under-construction apartment on Northville Place Drive one week ago. Police are investigating.

FRAUD: A 53-year-old township resident was the victim of credit card fraud at the Home Depot store on Seven Mile one week ago. The man told police that he made a purchase at the store with his credit card April 19, but later discovered that it did not leave the store with him.

A call to his credit card company revealed that someone had charged \$1,171 on it at Home Depot within the previous 24 hours. Police are investigating.

MARIJUANA: A 16-year-old boy

was arrested in Northville Township last Thursday for possession of marijuana.

The reporting officer in the case said he stopped a 1979 Chevrolet Camaro on Haggerty Road near Schoolcraft Road because it had illegally tinted windows.

As he spoke to the driver, a Westland resident, the officer said he noticed a nightstick behind the boy's seat.

A search of the vehicle revealed a pair of hemostats, commonly used in marijuana consumption, in the Camaro's glovebox, the officer added.

The boy soon admitted to having marijuana in a baggie in his pocket, the officer said. He faces a hearing soon in juvenile court.

Mill Race Matters

This week the Northville Historical Society wishes to thank Walt and Sally Bernard for their gift to the organization in memory of Dorothy Stow, the mother of longtime active member Sally Henrikson.

All are invited to attend the third annual Mill Race Village Plant Exchange on Saturday, April 29, from 8 a.m. to noon. Free compost will be available from the city. Recipients must provide their own containers. The swap will include perennials, shrubs, trees, annual seedlings, wildflowers and more. If you have nothing to trade some items will be available for donation to the maintenance of the village. Bring spare pots and containers as well.

Also on Saturday, April 29, docents hold their organizational luncheon for the season. Participants are asked to bring a dish to share. Place settings, dinner rolls and beverages will be provided. Former, current and potential docents are encouraged to participate. Call 348-1845 if you plan to attend. If interested but unable to attend, please call as well.

The docents keep Mill Race Village open and available to the public during summer months by providing information on the buildings, the village and community history. Training is provided for those requiring it. Membership in the Northville Historical Society, while desirable, is not mandatory. Each docent works three or four Sunday afternoons during the summer and fall.

Other area Historical Societies have provided information on upcoming programs. These include: The South Lyon Area Historical Society, May 16, program on perennial gardens by Gretchen Boyle; June 20, pot luck dinner; July 18, tour of Mill Race Village with Bruce Turnbull; Aug. 15, Preserving Memories with Jeannette Holtman; Sept. 19, Lincoln's Funeral Train with Weldon Petz; Wixom Historical Society Victorian Ice Cream Social on Sunday, May 17, from noon until 4 p.m., at Wixom Wire House located on the corner of W. Maple and Wixom Road; Livonia Historical Society Quilt Show, April 30, from noon to 5, plant sale, May 20, both at Greenmead; and Livonia Garage Sale, May 6, at Edgar Arena on Lyndon, west of Farmington Road.

Continuing in the series on early settlers this week focuses on an early arrival in what is today's city. Daniel Cady, according to family records, arrived in the area in 1825 to locate desirable land. He filed for title to land in the southeast one-quarter of Section 3, Feb. 23, 1826.

Cady arrived in the area with several children, at least two brothers and their families. He was, at that time, widowed. In January, 1828, he returned to New York and married Eliza Ellsworth who returned with him to raise a family. Eliza died in the mid 1840s, causing Daniel to remarry a third time. This time he married Lucinda Knapp Lockwood, probably also widowed.

The original Cady farm sat on land bounded by Main Street, Northville Road or South Main, and Center. The property ran below today's Seven Mile

and encompassed all of the Northville Downs property as well as the southeastern portion of Northville's downtown.

Joining Cady in what became the city were early settlers Ira Rice and John Blanchard in 1826, preceding him slightly were Alanson Aldrich and Alvah Smith in 1825. Before 1830, all four of the others had sold their property in the community.

The Cady family remained in the area. Daniel's children included: Hiram, Anson, Elsay, Nathan, Daniel, and Clarissa by his first wife; Henry, William, Jessie, Sallie, Eliza and Jane by wife, Eliza; and Jenny and Helen by third wife, Lucinda.

Daughter Elsay married Alanson Norton, son Hiram married first Cynthia Packard and then Abigail. He was known to have run an inn in this region prior to 1840 with his first wife. Son Anson married Jane Johnson, his Nathan married Louisa Robinson, Daniel Jr. married Harriet Taft, and daughter Clarissa married Mr. Stevens.

Henry, William, Jessi, Eliza and Jane all died during childhood, daughter Sallie (Sarah) married William P. Yerkes, daughter Jenny married Martin Bovee and daughter Helen (Nettie) remained single. Most are buried in the area with their families. Cady brothers, Samuel and David, who traveled to Michigan with him, settled properties nearby and remained as well.

Along with William Dunlap, Cady first superintended during and after construction of the Stone School located at Main and Hutton. Cady died in 1860. His birth date, inconsistently recorded, indicates he was either 72, 73 or 60 at the time of his death. The street to the south of Main led to his farm and is named for him.

The Inn now located at Mill Race Village stood for much of its history on land originally deeded him, and has been renamed Cady Inn because it stood on Cady Street for over 100 years. Interestingly, son Hiram is recorded as having run an Inn in the area prior to 1840. More about early settlers next week.

Teen arrested with drug tools

Northville Township police put a kink in the budding career of a suspected would-be entrepreneur two weeks ago when they arrested him for possession of a wide variety of narcotics paraphernalia.

A township officer on patrol said he saw the 18-year-old Waterford man's car pull out of the closed Wayne County Child Development Center property on Sheldon Road at about 2:30 a.m. on April 12.

The teen admitted to not having his driver's license with him and was arrested on that charge. When the officer asked if there was anything in the Grand Prix that he should know about, the teen reportedly told him about a "bong" used to smoke marijuana.

The officer said he requested and received the teen's permission to search the vehicle and found the bong there. He said he found three boxes of handgun ammunition and a number of other drug paraphernalia items, including a canister of nitrous oxide, a measuring scale, three pipes, drug literature and a mirror and razor blades commonly used in drug activities. A hearing for the man will be scheduled soon in 35th District Court.

United Methodist sponsors homeless from Detroit center

"They like the treatment they get from the congregations," said Wyvette Linebarger, director of the Cass United Methodist Homeless Drop In Center in Detroit and coordinator of the Interfaith Hospitality Ministry.

"I have heard them say that the treatment is more relaxed and not as regimented as in the other shelters," she said.

"They feel that the people really do care about them and would rather go to the rotating shelters than some of the others," she said.

From 6 to 7 every morning volunteers from Moms Supporting Other Moms (M.O.M.S.) help get the children ready so they can be driven back down to the Drop In Center in Detroit at 8 a.m.

Some guests leave at 5 or 6 a.m. because they have jobs.

"We usually have volunteers to drive vans," said Dick Ozburn, chairperson for the Homeless Hospitality Week, "but this year they rented Cass Avenue United Methodist Church bus."

There are committees for breakfast and lunch, snacks, dinner, set

up and cleanup.

There is also a hygiene committee that has collected toothbrushes, toothpaste, shaving cream, wash rags, bars of soap, Vaseline, sample sizes of shampoo which are given to the guests in 2-gallon zip lock bags. Volunteers in the Clothing Closet make appointments for the guests to shop for items they need from the donated merchandise which includes shoes, belts, suits, sport coats, casual wear, coats, underwear and socks.

The host congregation prepares dinner for the guests and provides some kind of activity or entertainment in the evening. Entertainment can include TV, movies or a program such as basketball or volleyball.

At the First United Methodist Church of Northville, the guests come back in the evening between 5:30 and 6 p.m. Various groups at the church, along with Our Lady of Victory Church and Plymouth United Methodist Church, are taking turns providing dinner from 6:15 to 7 p.m. From 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. the guests attend a worship

service.

The M.O.M.S. group from the church is providing child care from 7:30 to 10 p.m. every night, allowing the parents some free time to participate in scheduled activities.

The guests then have free time from 8:30 to 10 p.m. On Monday, they were entertained by a wild animal presentation and on Wednesday, the Youth Choir performed. Other nights during the week the guests will read, play games, watch TV or go to Cooke Middle School for basketball.

At 10 p.m. the host congregation is providing a snack. Lights out is at 11 p.m.

The guests receive breakfast and are given a bag lunch to take to their jobs if they are employed or to take back to the Drop In Center, where they stay during the day.

The Youth Group at First United Methodist Church of Northville has decorated all the lunch bags for the guests.

At 4 p.m. the Drop In Center will conduct a roll call of those who stayed with the host congregation the previous evening. Those guests

who do not answer and have not called in to say they were going to be late are dropped from the roster and are replaced by someone from the waiting list.

There is a job and a housing coordinator who will work with the guests to find them employment

and housing.

"Those that work have to see the housing coordinator and if they turn housing down, they can't stay at the shelter," said Linebarger.

Modeled after other similar programs in the area, the Interfaith Hospitality Ministry was founded

in 1990 when the Cass United Methodist Homeless Drop In Center in Detroit found that it could not adequately care for the 100 homeless people standing at their door in the evenings. The Drop In Center takes the overflow from the other shelters.

Church gets help for alleged thief

One Northville community church practiced what it preaches earlier this month in dealing with an accused thief.

A church representative called police at about 6:45 p.m. on April 10 and said that at about 1 p.m. that afternoon he'd given permission for a man, who was a church member and former employee, to take the church van to a metro-area business to have repairs done

on it.

The man is a 33-year-old resident of another community.

The representative said he also gave the man his credit card to pay for the repairs. When he and

the vehicle had not returned after a few hours the church representative called the business. Employees there told him that the man and the van had never arrived.

A call to his credit card compa-

ny, the representative added, revealed that his credit card had been used twice that afternoon to purchase about \$300 worth of goods.

Police listed the van as stolen on the area law enforcement computer network but erased the entry later that evening. The representa-

tive called back to report that the van had been returned to a church member's home in Redford.

Officers later spoke to the man, who allegedly admitted that he had a substance abuse problem and had used the credit card to buy merchandise which he later exchanged for drugs in Detroit.

The church representative agreed to drop charges against the man if he enrolled in a drug rehabilitation program. The man agreed, enrolling in one sponsored by the church in Detroit. The representative said he would file charges if the man did not complete the program.

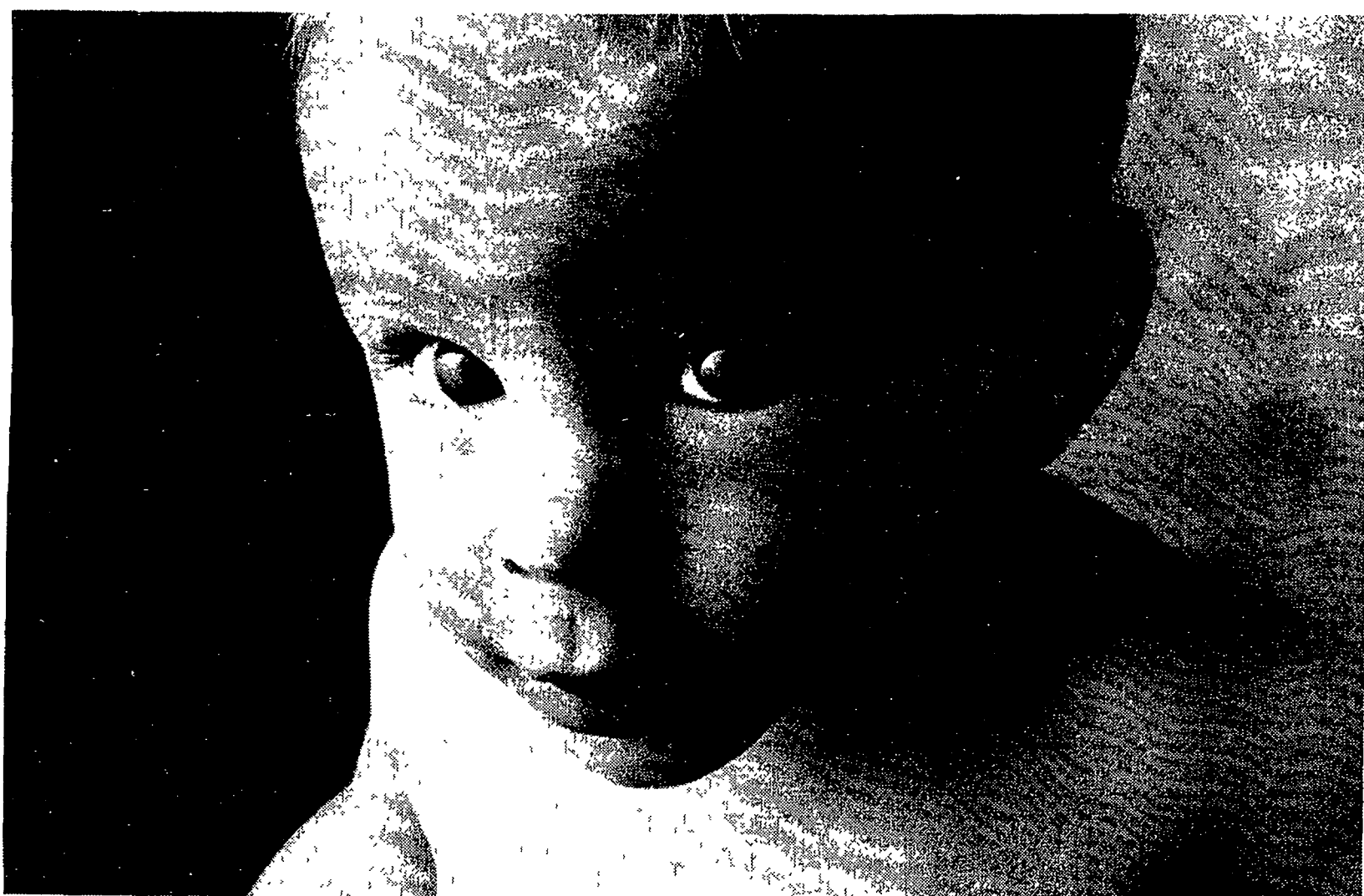

Three juveniles arrested for possession of drugs

Three Northville boys were arrested April 1 after Northville City Police allegedly found them in possession of almost a quarter-pound of marijuana and drug paraphernalia at a friend's house.

The boys, all juveniles - one 14-, one 15- and one 16-year-old - were arrested for possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, a felony which carries 10-20 years in prison for adults. The charges have been forwarded to Oakland County Juvenile Court.

Police say they found 91.5 grams of marijuana in a ziplock bag at the scene of the arrest.

The incident began after the 15-year-old boy called his friend, also 15, because he had a large bag of marijuana and needed a place to "split it up." The phone call, however, was overheard by the boy's mother because the phone's speaker was activated.

The mother went down to the station and requested that police arrest the boy who had made the call to her son. An officer on duty, however, told the woman there was not enough evidence to arrest the boy based on what she had heard over the phone.

However, if the boy would agree to make the phone call again and tell the other boys to come to his home with the marijuana with the officers waiting inside the home - the arrest would then be lawful. The mother and her son agreed to the procedure.

The two police officers got approval from the captain and proceeded to the home.

The boy called his friends again and told them to come over. One officer waited on the second level of the home with a clear view of the boy's room. Another officer waited in the home's attached garage.

After a couple of minutes, the

boy let in three of his friends and they proceeded to his room. The officer noted that the 15-year-old suspect had a large, half-gallon-sized ziplock bag more than half full with a substance that later proved to be marijuana.

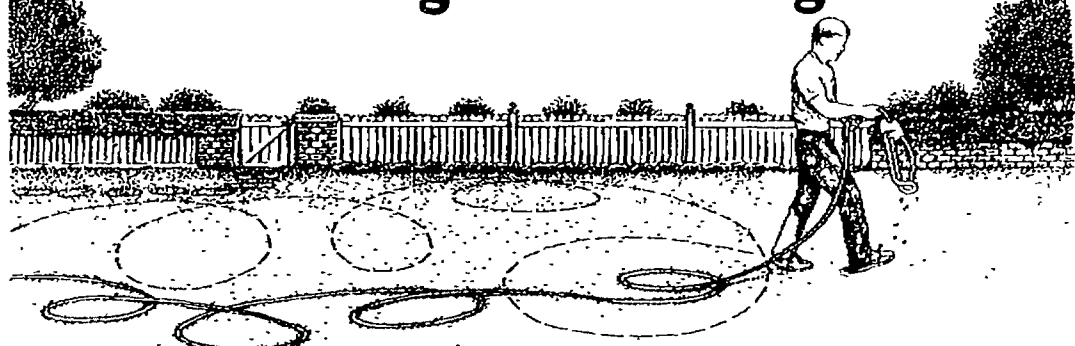
The officers then entered the room, had the boys stop what they were doing and told them to put their hands on their heads. A search of the 15-year-old suspect revealed that the boy had \$100 cash in his jacket pocket. The money was forfeited to the police department.

A marijuana pipe and a "roach clip" were found in the jacket pocket of the 16-year-old.

The three were arrested and turned over to the custody of their parents.

Another friend, a 16-year-old who had stopped by unexpectedly, was searched and released. The boy who had the friends come over to his house was not arrested.

structed on land just south of Northville City Hall near the intersection of Wing and Cady Streets, including part of the western end of the small park that exists there now. The plan calls for the new library to be built into the side of the gentle slope there and over an existing service drive from City Hall to Cady.

A single public entrance on the western side of the building is planned. Most of the existing parkland would be preserved.

The new library is planned to be 25,000 square feet in size with over 75,000 circulation items. The current library is 6,500 square feet and houses 40,000 items.

"We'll be able to grow into the new library over a period of 10-15 years," Orr said. "This building gives us the room to grow."

Besides room for more books, videos, newspapers, magazines and other items the building would provide the public with activity, meeting and quiet study rooms and much more seating. The current library has no public rooms and a small number of seats and tables.

A special feature of the design plan is a proposed plaza area near the library's northwestern corner. It will eliminate traffic between the parking lots to the east and south of the Northville Community Center and contain trees and benches for public use.

"It's really full of possibilities for community use," Wendy Gutowski said. Gutowski is one of the seven members of the Northville District Library Board, which governs library activities. Voters approved the board's creation a year ago and gave the green light to the millage needed to operate the library and construct the new building.

The Northville City Council must approve the library plan for it to move forward, as must the Zoning Board of Appeals, the city Historical Commission and the Northville Board of Education, since it owns part of the land under discussion.

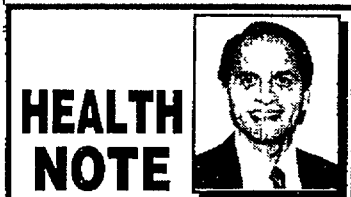
Orr and Gutowski said that a special building committee has spent a lot of time working on the library's design and continues to try to do everything possible to satisfy any concerns raised about it.

A key one is parking. The site plan calls for 242 total spaces, some shared with City Hall and the Rec Center, "as has always been done," Orr said.

Gutowski said that committee volunteers had conducted a traffic study of sorts, counting cars over a five-day period. The most seen in one day, she said, was 165, a day that saw a Handcrafter show which drew a lot of traffic to the area.

"According to our numbers it appears we have more than enough parking spaces," Gutowski said.

"Work on this plan has been a wonderful collaborative effort on the part of many people," she added. "I think we're going to have a wonderful library."

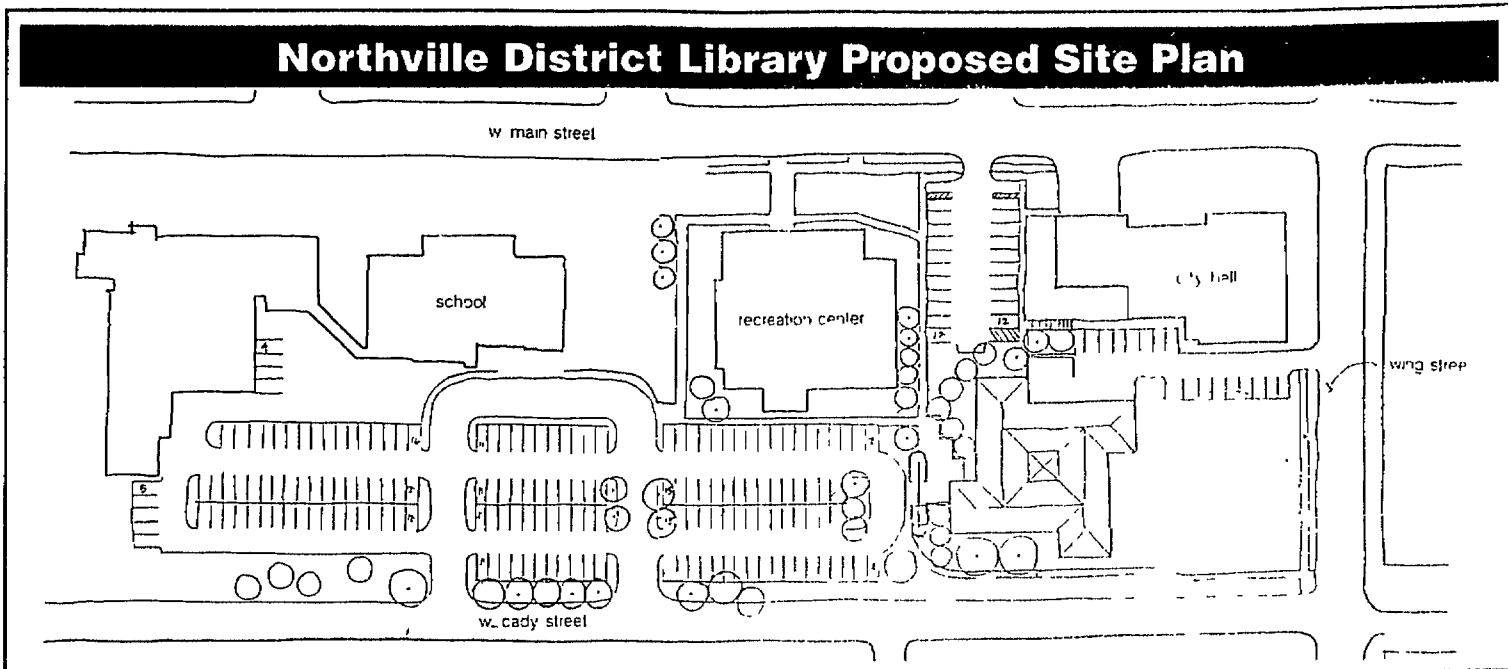

New building taking shape rapidly

The infancy of the new Northville District library has been a busy time for both the members of the board that governs it and the staff members who work in it.

"It's been a very eventful year," District Library Board member Wendy Gutowski said. "It's like starting a business up from scratch. It would have been hard work even without working on a new building."

"Our mission has been to create a new library literally from the ground up," Library Director Pat Orr said. "It's a very exciting thing to be a part of."

Northville community voters one year ago approved the creation of

the district library, a seven-member board to govern its activities and the millage need to operate it and build a new library building. Since then, Gutowski said, the board and library staff have spent their time on two main goals: fleshing out operating details and working on a design plan for the new building.

Formerly governed by Northville city and township the new district library is an independent entity. Consequently, it's now responsible for a myriad of organizational particulars: everything from payroll to health care insurance to book-keeping to establishing formal policies and procedures and hiring new staff members.

"It's a once in a career opportunity for us," Orr, a 22-year librarian, said.

Meanwhile a special board building committee which Gutowski is a part of has been proceeding with development of a new district library building plan (see related story).

"It's been fun, it's been frustrating, it's been rewarding," Gutowski said of her experiences during the board's first year of existence.

"It's been an exciting job and the chance to meet and work with some great people."

Orr and her staff have also been working on improving the current library, located inside Northville City Hall. It's open longer hours - 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Thurs-

day, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and Saturday - and now features Sunday hours, 1-5 p.m., through the end of the school year.

May will see four new librarians join the Northville staff and a variety of programs will be offered to the public this summer, Orr said.

Also under way is work on a new state of the art computer system which library users can take advantage of, Orr added.

The library hopes to offer four computer terminals for public use, with CD-ROM technology. Eventually, she added, the library may offer access to the Northville school computer system, the Internet and even home computer dial in access.

New style post office set to open in South Lyon

A new kind of U.S. post office will be unveiled in South Lyon this Sunday, April 30.

Dedication and ribbon cutting for the new South Lyon postal retail store will be held at 1:30 p.m. An open house with guided tours will follow from 2-4 p.m. The postal store is located at 111 South Lafayette Street.

"This facility will provide South Lyon customers with top-of-the-line service and convenience," said Detroit District Postal Manager Vermita Martin.

"Customers can browse through displays of all the latest stamps, pick up envelopes or packaging materials, then take their purchases to a cashier just like a department store," added South Lyon Postmaster Gerri Dorais.

Martin and Dorais described Sunday's "party" as a family affair. The public is invited to join the fun at the Kids Corner, stop off at the Inspection Service booth, or take a tour of the facility. Students from South Lyon's Bartlett Elementary School will be on hand to give lessons in stamp designing.

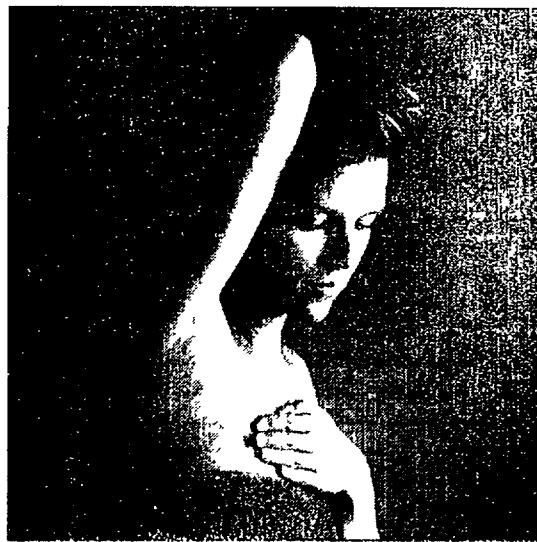
Clerk counters will be open for business, and refreshments will be served.

Geake in favor, Law is against lifting prison cap

Northville Township's state representatives split their votes this month on a law which increased the allowable population at an area prison.

Gov. John Engler on April 10 signed a bill to let the Michigan Department of Corrections (DOC) house up to 775 prisoners at the Western Wayne Correctional Facility, located off Five Mile Road in Plymouth Township. The bill amended a law originally passed in 1986 that capped Western Wayne's population at 500.

The move followed failed talks between the township and the state, including possible concessions from Lansing, aimed at winning Northville Township approval. The amendment's passage has prompted township officials to plan to file suit against the DOC (see related story).

State Sen. Bob Geake, R-Northville, voted for the amendment. Geake said that he understood the township's dismay at the decision to double bunk at Western Wayne but felt that a vote for the bill was in the best interest of the community.

"I know they're disappointed but I feel we can get some of things that have been discussed in the future," Geake said. "We need the

cooperation of the governor and the other legislators. To vote against the bill would have made that cooperation much more difficult to get."

State Rep. Gerry Law, R-Plymouth, voted against the amendment, however. He said he did so because the communities in his 20th House District did not give the amendment their support. Law added that the DOC "should have done a better job" of trying to win their endorsement.

Despite that, however, Law expressed support for the concept of double bunking in general and for allowing it at Western Wayne through the amendment's population cap increase.

Prisoners have been housed in the Plymouth/Northville area since the 1920s, Law said, most of that time in the old Detroit House of Corrections facility, what is now Western Wayne. In the last two decades, he continued, the state has been responsible for the area's prisons.

In that time, Law said, the total number of prisoners housed here has stayed about the same as before. The situation is much better, however, because of the nearly \$30 million the state has spent to improve security, he added.

The area's prison population hasn't increased at all in the last

offer, instead proposing three other concessions. The first called for the state to agree to give the Phoenix property to the township and let it pay for the demolition and clean up. The second called for the state to conduct the demolition and cleanup but to give the township first crack at buying the land for public recreational space.

The third involved the state agreeing to ease restrictions on the use and sale of 16 acres of property off Seven Mile that it sold to the township in 1991.

The trustees hoped that the parcel could be sold to the private sector if the state restrictions were eased and the money put into township coffers.

State officials would not agree, however, and earlier this month passed the amendment. That led to the board's April 13 vote.

Before the vote Tamm told trustees that the township would stand a good chance against the state, but just what will happen remains an open question.

"I don't know what the state's going to do," Tamm said. "I expect that they will oppose this but that doesn't change the fact that there is the court order that they agreed to."

He said that he anticipates that the state will argue that the court cannot override the Legislature's power to amend the laws it makes.

The attorney added that he did not know how fast the court would make a decision but added that he would ask for a hearing within seven days of the request being filed.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 95-03-94

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ZONING ORDINANCE BY AMENDING A PORTION OF THE TEXT THEREOF.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

PART I. The Charter Township of Northville Zoning Ordinance No. 94 as amended is hereby further amended by amending Article XVIII, GENERAL PROVISIONS, Section 18.11 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES OR USES to read as follows:

1. Accessory buildings, structures and uses shall be subject to the following regulations except as otherwise permitted in this Ordinance.

a. Relation to Principal Building. Accessory buildings, structures and uses are permitted only in connection with, incidental to, and on the same lot with, a permitted principal building, structure or use. No accessory building, structure or use shall be occupied or utilized unless the principal structure is occupied or utilized.

b. Permit Required. All accessory buildings or structures shall require a building permit.

c. Restrictions in Front Yard and Side Yard. Accessory buildings shall not be erected in any front yard or required side yard, with the following exceptions:

(1) An accessory building or structure may be erected in the non-required front yard on a lot at least two (2) acres in size provided the front yard setback of the accessory building is at least equal to the front yard setback of any residential dwellings on adjacent properties, including those directly across the street.

(2) Attached residential dwelling units, detached parking garages or carports may be exempted from this requirement provided the Planning Commission approves elevation drawings and materials. In reviewing such structures, the Planning Commission shall consider the impact of headlights and views from nearby public streets and adjacent properties.

d. Required Setbacks When Attached to Principal Buildings. Where the accessory building, structure or use is structurally attached to a principal building, structure or use, it shall be subject to all the regulations applicable to principal buildings, structures and uses, except where noted otherwise herein.

e. Required Setbacks when Detached from Principal Building. Detached accessory buildings shall be at least ten (10) feet from any principal building or any public OR PRIVATE street right-of-way line, at least three (3) feet from any rear lot line, and at least twenty-five (25) feet from the shoreline of any lake, pond, flowing watercourse or wetland regulated by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources or U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, except a boathouse, deck or patio may be constructed along the shoreline.

f. Restriction from Right-of-way. In no instance shall an accessory use, building or structure be located within a public right-of-way or easement, or private access easement.

g. Maximum Size: The cumulative square footage of detached accessory buildings or structures shall comply with the following:

(1) On lots up to two (2) acres in size the cumulative square footage shall not exceed one-half (1/2) the occupable square footage of the main building, which shall be defined as all living areas excluding a basement or garages.

(2) On lots over two (2) acres in size, the cumulative square footage of accessory buildings(s) shall not exceed two (2) times the occupable square footage of the principal building. The Zoning Board of Appeals may modify the maximum size standard for accessory buildings related to farming or raising of livestock in consideration of the size of the property, conformance with other standards and the character of adjacent uses.

h. Maximum Coverage. The combined square footage of all accessory buildings, structures and uses, excluding swimming pools, may occupy a maximum of twenty-five percent (25%) of a required rear yard and a maximum of twenty percent (20%) of any total rear yard.

i. Maximum Number: No more than three (3) detached accessory buildings shall be permitted on any lot less than two (2) acres in area in any zoning district. For lots two (2) acres and over in size, the number of buildings shall be determined by the maximum size and maximum lot coverage.

j. Maximum Height. The maximum building height of any detached accessory building shall be fourteen (14) feet, measured from the average height between the eaves and the ridge (see Section 2.2 DEFINITIONS, 13 for calculation of building height and Section 19.3. HEIGHT LIMIT).

k. Drainage. The placement and design of any accessory building or structure shall not have a significant negative impact on stormwater runoff. The Building Department may require grading plans to ensure compliance with this provision.

l. Parking: Required parking for an accessory use or structure shall be consistent with the requirements of Section 18.12 OFF-STREET PARKING REQUIREMENTS computed for each accessory building, structure or use.

m. Restriction on Use. The parking, storage or remodeling of mobile homes, semi-trailers or similar items as accessory buildings is prohibited in all zoning districts, except the Zoning Board of Appeals may permit temporary construction trailers as provided in this Ordinance.

n. Restrictions on Occupancy. Accessory buildings shall not be occupied for dwelling purposes, as accommodations for household employees or caretakers, nor used for any business profession, trade or occupation.

PART II. Conflicting Provisions Repealed.

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 94, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

PART III. Effective Date.

The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effective immediately upon publication.

PART IV. Adoption.

This ordinance may be adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Northville, pursuant to authority of Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, at their next regular or special meeting.

Restaurant liquor decision delayed

A proposed new restaurant will have to wait a couple of months while Northville Township officials decide on a liquor license policy.

The Delaware-based Ruby Tuesday Inc. wants to build one of its restaurants in the township, on land off Haggerty between the Meijer store and the under-construction WindRidge subdivision. The nearest Ruby Tuesday is currently located in Twelve Oaks mall in Novi.

The proposed Haggerty eatery would serve liquor, something that needs township and state approval. Attorney John Carlin,

who represents Ruby Tuesday, tried to get the township board of trustees to sign off on the liquor license last week. The trustees, however, voted to delay a decision on the license for up to 60 days while a special committee works out an official liquor license policy.

The state of Michigan uses a formula based on population to determine how many liquor licenses a community can grant within its borders. Northville Township has a total of 12 now. Eight are in use and four have yet to be assigned.

Trustee Gini Britton said the board needs to decide where in the

township it wants establishments serving alcohol to be located. The suggestion to form a committee to work that out was hers.

"We need to develop a strategy," Britton said. "We need to let the state know what our priorities are."

The board agreed to the idea, tabling the Ruby Tuesday request for up to two months. The trustees promised Carlin that they would make a formal decision on it within that time, however, in light of the company's tight timetable.

Britton will serve on the committee along with Supervisor Karen Baja, Manager Tamara Hanlin,

Director of Public Safety Chip Snider and a member of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce.

Once a decision is made on the license Ruby Tuesday will submit formal site plans for the restaurant to the township planning commission. Carlin said that the company's parent organization is looking at putting in another restaurant, not a Ruby Tuesday, in the proposed commercial center that forms part of the new Ward Church proposal on land it owns at the corner of Six Mile and Haggerty.

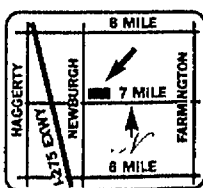

Fish Hatchery courts to get facelift

The Fish Hatchery Park tennis courts will be injected with new life late this year as the park's five courts should be renovated by the end of the summer.

"We're hoping that at least part of the summer we'll be able to hold tennis lessons," said Parks and Recreation Director Traci Johnson.

The Northville City Council awarded a bid April 17 to T&M Companies of Milford to resurface the courts and install a new drainage system for \$96,878. The

city received five bids for the project, which will include pulling out the existing asphalt, digging up the soil underneath and adding limestone and a drainage system to the courts.

The majority of the repairs will be funded through a \$100,000 grant approved by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Community entities will match the funds with \$33,000, with the city and township contributing \$7,500 each and the Friends of Parks and Recreation contributing \$18,000. A total of \$133,000 will be invest-

ed in Fish Hatchery, located on Seven Mile Road near Edenderry Drive.

Currently Johnson is working with T&M officials to set a timetable for the project in stone. She expects the project to begin in early May and take no longer than four months, Johnson said.

A poor drainage system and a lack of maintenance was what led to the courts' recent demise after they were closed down in 1992. Once the repairs are completed, maintenance of the new courts will

be a priority, Johnson said in a previous interview.

In addition to the tennis courts' face lift, new playground equipment will be installed in the park this summer. The recreation department has been awarded \$40,000 through a Wayne County community development block grant to purchase new equipment.

The old playground apparatus was removed last fall because it was old and run down. The new equipment will include a climbing structure and swing sets, which will be barrier free.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE 95-04-94

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ZONING ORDINANCE BY AMENDING A PORTION OF THE TEXT THEREOF.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF NORTHVILLE ORDAINS:

PART 1. The Charter Township of Northville Zoning Ordinance No. 94 as amended is hereby further amended by amending Article XVIII, GENERAL PROVISIONS, Section 18.11 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS, STRUCTURES OR USES, 2. Decks and Patios, to amend subparagraph a. (4), to read as follows:

2. Decks and Patios:

a. Attached or unattached uncovered decks, terraces, patios, cement slabs and porches without roof or other form of solid enclosure in all residential districts, shall meet the following standards:

(1) Decks shall extend no further than sixteen (16) feet into the required rear yard setback.

(2) For shoreline lots, a minimum fifteen (15) foot wide greenbelt shall be provided between the deck and the nearest edge of the shoreline, except a maximum five (5) foot wide connecting walkway may be allowed in the greenbelt. A separate patio may be permitted along the shoreline with a maximum size of one hundred eighty (180) square feet, a maximum length measured along the shoreline of ten (10) feet and a maximum height of six (6) inches above the mean grade.

(3) Decks shall not extend into the required side yard.

(4) Decks may include a roofed gazebo a maximum size of one hundred fifty (150) square feet provided the gazebo is unenclosed year round except by wood, screens or wooden railings to a maximum height of thirty-six (36) inches above the gazebo floor.

b. Decks and patios in non-residential districts shall be reviewed and approved in accordance with Section 18.24 SITE PLAN REVIEW (ALL DISTRICTS)

PART II. Conflicting Provisions Repealed.

Any Ordinance or part of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed save that in all other respects Ordinance No. 94, as amended, is hereby ratified and reaffirmed.

PART III. Effective Date:

The provisions of this ordinance shall be in full force and effective immediately upon publication.

PART IV. Adoption

This ordinance may be adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Northville, pursuant to authority of Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, at their next regular or special meeting.

Officials downplay fine school report

School received a "no status" rating because it is a new building and does not have three years of MEAP scores to track - a major criteria of the accreditation process.

In the education department's listing of the state's 3,331 academic buildings, Northville and Novi were the only districts in the immediate area to receive more than two summary accreditation rankings - the highest designation. Novi, like Northville, received summary accreditation on four of its schools.

Other neighboring districts such as Walled Lake and Livonia received no summary accreditations. Farmington schools had two fully accredited buildings and Plymouth-Canton had one.

Ninety-one percent of school buildings in the state received either summary or interim status. Only 4 percent received summary accreditation.

Dolly McMaster, assistant superintendent for instructional services, characterized the rating system as "pathetic."

"What this all means - I don't have any idea," McMaster said. "I don't think the state even knows."

That 87 percent of all the schools in Michigan received interim status - schools that most like-

ly have vast differences - is a point of concern, she said.

"With almost 90 percent of the schools reaching interim status - to me, that makes all of this data absolutely meaningless," McMaster said.

Eighty-nine school buildings - 3 percent - received "pending" status, meaning the schools did not meet all of the criteria set forth by the state and have less than 50 percent of students passing the MEAP.

A final determination will be made in June as to whether pending status schools will be bumped up to interim status or whether they will be unaccredited.

Unaccredited schools stand to lose 5 percent of their state funding if they go for more than a year without reaching at least interim status.

To complete the accreditation process, set forth by the state this year in an effort to raise standards and set the direction for public education, building principals filled out a stack of paperwork to document whether their schools were making the grade. Principals will now have to go through the process each year to renew or strive for summary accreditation status.

The criteria for the process are based on four major components:

1) MEAP scores - A summary of

scores over the past three years. Each building must have at least 66 percent of students effectively passing the reading, math and science components of the test for summary accreditation.

Fifty-one to 65 percent of students must satisfactorily pass the test for interim status. Schools which have 50 percent or fewer students pass the test received pending status.

2) A core curriculum based on research and best practice.

3) Whether the school completes an annual education report at the end of each school year - required by law.

4) Whether the school has a 3-5 year school improvement plan and a school improvement team - also required by law.

The strong emphasis on the MEAP tests in the accreditation process is a major sticking point with Rezmierski.

"This is beginning to show people that we have to be teaching to a test," said Rezmierski, who has voiced displeasure in the past with the emphasis on MEAP results by the community and state.

The original intent of the test, he said, was to serve as a tool for administrators to target problem areas in curriculum and instruction. In recent years, however, MEAPs have taken on a new life of their own by influencing property

values and now a school's accreditation status, he said.

The reason the high school and the two elementary schools did not receive summary accreditation this year is that the schools missed the 66th percentile mark in various MEAP categories by a sliver, he said.

"In a district our size, a percentage point on the MEAP could be the difference of one or two children," McMaster said.

Although the high school did not attain the state's highest designation, it has been accredited by the North Central Association, a regional accreditation agency that Rezmierski said is much more credible.

The NCA, which has a team of people come to the school to interview teachers and students and witness classroom instruction, has accredited the high school.

Still, high school principal Tom Johnson said he is not happy with the state results.

"We were disappointed that we didn't make it," he said.

Moraine Principal Mary Kay Gallagher said she's happy her school received summary accreditation.

"We are certainly pleased with our status," she said. "We will continue to work on keeping up our MEAP scores and continue to focus our attention on our academic standards."

Volunteers sought for July Fourth parade activities

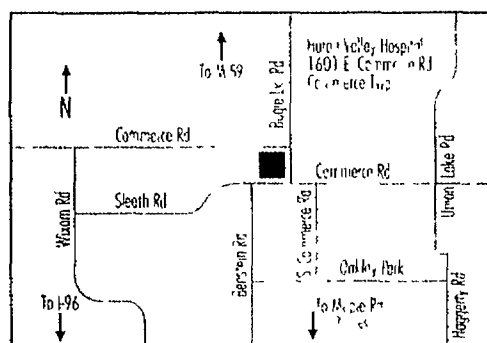

Outpouring of support for patient extends to contributors nationwide

As Novi resident Kathy Karney moves closer to the date of her bone marrow transplant, contributions continue to roll in from not only local residents but from concerned people across the country.

Karney, who lives in Dunbarton Pines and has three children attending Northville Public Schools, will travel to Duke University in North Carolina May 15 to undergo a self-donating autologous bone marrow transplant to battle her metastasized breast cancer.

The Northville and Novi communities began an ambitious fund-raising campaign back in January to help pay for the some \$160,000 it will cost for the procedure. Karney's insurance carrier Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Michigan is not planning to cover the procedure, which is deemed experimental for breast cancer patients by the company.

The fund-raising efforts have included such events as a rock concert in downtown Northville, raffles, a silent auction and dinner events. Up until recently, contri-

butions have remained at mostly the local level.

But now, after a recent article in *Solidarity*, a national magazine for the United Auto Workers union highlighting the Karney family's situation, checks have been rolling in from around the country. Kathy's husband Vic is an employee of General Motors Corp.

"It's amazing," said Lynda Baca, Karney's neighbor who has helped organize fund-raising efforts. Donations have come in from such states as California, Texas, Florida, New York and West Virginia. Karney even received a \$100 donation from an 82-year-old woman who was expecting to have hip surgery soon.

So far, the efforts of friends, family and coworkers have managed to raise \$67,000.

Donations, which are tax deductible, are going through a non-profit organization out of Birmingham called My Friends Care. The group helps cancer patients in situations like Karney's. If at some point she no longer needs the money that has

been raised, the funds will help someone else.

As part of the treatment Karney undergoes three 21-day series of intensive chemotherapy treatments. From May 15-June 12 she will undergo the self-donating transplant.

The quest to further help the family continues.

Joe Dorsch, the owner of Players Billiards Bar & Grill in Farmington Hills will be holding a 9-ball tournament Saturday, April 29. Dorsch, who has known the Karneys for several years, said he felt compelled to help in whatever way he could.

Dorsch said he hopes to get at least 60 participants in the tournament, which will begin at 2 p.m. All of the \$20 entry fee will go to Karney's cause.

A Bud pool stick, \$50 and a Players sweatshirt and cap will be awarded to the first place winner. The second place winner will receive a mirror and a Players sweatshirt and cap and the third place winner will receive a mirror and Players T-shirt.

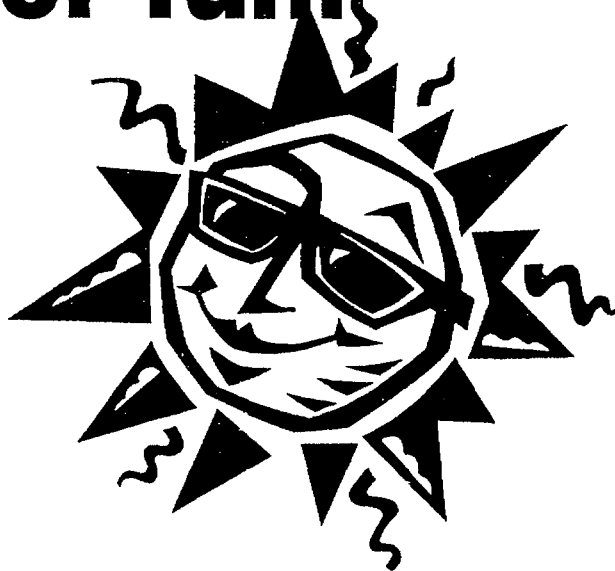

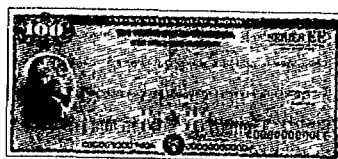

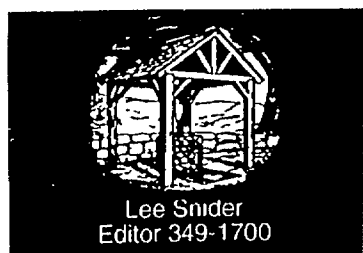

State deals unfairly over prison issue

Ever hear the term "good faith negotiations?"

It means that when two sides sit down to try and work out a deal there's one thing they agree to right off the bat. Everyone promises, either implicitly or explicitly, to deal honestly with each other. Neither side may get what it wants but at least both know exactly where things stand.

Judging by the way that the state of Michigan has recently dealt with Northville Township, however, it seems that some folks up in Lansing don't care much for that pesky principle.

In February the state began discussions with township officials aimed at winning their approval of a plan to double bunk prisoners at the Western Wayne Correctional Facility, located off Five Mile Road in Plymouth Township. Lansing was looking to trade off something the township wanted in return for that approval.

Normally the state doesn't bother seeking approval because it doesn't need to. It can increase prison populations just about anywhere in Michigan without the local community's OK.

They faced a different situation with Western Wayne, however. In 1986 the state Legislature passed a law which among other things capped Western Wayne's population at 500 inmates. Northville Township soon went to court, requesting and receiving a judicial order requiring the Michigan Department of Corrections (DOC) to enforce the cap. That's why Lansing approached the township two months ago when DOC officials wanted to increase Western Wayne's population to 775 inmates.

The township board of trustees didn't think much of the state's first offer and asked for consideration of other concessions. Lansing didn't want to give them and so earlier this month the state Legislature and Gov. John Engler agreed to amend the 1986 law, increasing the cap from 500 to 775, without township approval. The DOC then moved the extra prisoners into Western Wayne.

That move led the board to order attorney Jim Tamm to file a request for a show cause order against the DOC with the Wayne County Circuit Court. The township will ask a circuit court judge to hold the DOC in contempt for violating the court order.

Tamm told the trustees that Lansing will probably strongly object to the request, claiming that the court can't make the state enforce an order that applies to a law that's been amended. Doing so, the thinking goes, would violate the Legislature's right to make laws under the Michigan constitution.

What the law says is up to the judge. The point we want to make is that the state didn't negotiate in good faith with the township.

Understand first why the DOC wanted to double bunk at Western Wayne: because Michigan's prison population has simply exploded in the last decade. In 1986 the state housed about 15,000

prisoners and the DOC had a budget of about \$300 million. Today there are 38,000 prisoners in the system and the DOC budget has swelled to \$1.3 billion.

Lansing is still scrambling to find more beds and most of the time it's turned to double bunking to solve the problem. Building more prisons is a politically popular idea until the subject of how to pay for them comes up. Putting prisoners two to a cell in an existing facility is much, much cheaper than building a new prison.

The second fact to keep in mind is that despite the overall inmate increase our community has been spared dealing with the burgeoning prison population until now. Beside the cap at Western Wayne and at the nearby Scott Regional Correctional Facility the 1986 law ensures that another prison won't be built in the Plymouth/Northville area. That has meant that about the same number of inmates are housed here now as in the 1970s, despite large increases at prisons all over the state.

Given that, we can understand the reasons why both of Northville's state legislators voted as they did on the amendment to increase the Western Wayne cap. State Sen. Bob Geake, R-Northville, voted for it. State Rep. Gerry Law, R-Plymouth, voted against.

Geake agreed to be the middleman in the negotiations between the state and the township and as always conducted himself in a forthright manner. He shouldn't be blamed for the shoddy way that other state officials handled the situation.

The senator said he felt that it was in the best interests of the township for him to vote for the amendment. Voting against it would have sent a message, he said, but the political reality is that the township needs to be able to work with the governor and other state legislators. Voting against the amendment when communities all over Michigan are seeing their prisons double bunked wouldn't foster a cooperative spirit, Geake pointed out.

Law, who wrote the 1986 law, said he voted "no" because the communities in his 20th House District didn't give the amendment their support. He also noted that the state should have done a better job of trying to get that endorsement. Law added, however, that he supports the DOC's initiative to double bunk at Western Wayne.

We think both Geake's and Law's positions are entirely reasonable. What is unreasonable is the way other state officials handled this whole thing. If they didn't think they needed the township's approval for their plan they shouldn't have pretended that they did. If they didn't like the township's concessions they should have told the board so.

Instead, they went ahead and passed the amendment without bothering to discuss their move with township officials.

We don't think that fits the definition of "good faith negotiations."

Keep search process open

We intend to do two things in this space. One, commend Sen. Robert Geake for a wise vote he made in the upper chamber of the state Legislature. Two, take the Senate to task for approving the bill Geake voted against.

The measure in question is designed to amend the state Open Meetings Act to allow Michigan colleges and universities to meet in closed session while searching for and interviewing candidates to serve as school presidents.

The legislation was prompted by a recent Supreme Court decision that the University of Michigan Board of Regents violated both the Open Meetings Act and the Freedom of Information Act in selecting current president James Duderstadt.

The amendment that passed the Senate is now under consideration by a House committee.

Proponents of the amendment argue that opening the interview process to the public and to the media will tend to discourage potential candidates and endanger their standing with their current employers.

There are several reasons why the advantages of an open process outweigh any potential drawbacks:

- Openness can help ensure that all candidates get asked the same set of questions. Favoritism for any reason is made more difficult.

- An open process can shed light on the board of regents' long-term agenda for the future.

- Open discussions can prevent the kind of phony unanimity that surfaces in public once a majority of trustees make their choice.

- Openness can help prevent self-severing leaks to the media from candidates or other parties who have a vested interest in the outcome of the search.

Amending the Open Meetings Act to close presidential searches is bad public policy. University presidents are public servants and regents are elected representatives of the taxpayers and voters. The public has a right to an accounting of their actions.

Sen. Geake sees that. Others should too.

This ending is a happy one

My anger, I think, is understandable.

I'm angry that I had to get caught drunk driving in Canton, a local district court community. If it had happened anywhere else, no one would have found out. On the day of my appearance in court, I would have spent several hours waiting in a hallway where no one would've recognized me and I would have gone before a judge who didn't know me as the editor of the local newspaper. The chances of being discovered would have been slight.

I'm angry, too, that I work at a job where I'm considered a public figure. If my occupation was a low-visibility one, as most are, few people would have ever known about my arrest. Just some family and a handful of friends perhaps, people from whom you could expect forgiveness. Instead, because of who I am, I'm forced to explain myself to a public that's growing increasingly impatient with irresponsible behavior. Sympathy will be hard to come by.

Then there are the fines. Having gone through the conviction process, I can see that we in the media are woefully inadequate at informing the public about this aspect of the drunk driving sentence. We tend to report only that first offenders face a fine of up to \$500, but this is hardly the whole story. There is a virtual laundry list of fees sending the total skyward.

In my case, by the time they added up all the court costs, screening fees and victims rights levies, the bill topped out at \$745. I was told I had to plunk a check down right on the spot, otherwise I wouldn't have been allowed to drive away from the courthouse.

And that's just the beginning. I'll also have to pay for a 6-month probationary program and for my enrollment in a 10-week substance awareness course. Later, at the end of my three-month restricted license period, I'll have to fork over \$125 to the Secretary of State to

get my full driving privileges restored. And, of course, my insurance premiums will hit stratospheric heights as a result of the four points added to my driving record.

I estimate the monetary damages will reach the \$3,000-\$4,000 range, maybe more.

Finally, I'm angry about the indignity of getting handcuffed, fingerprinted, patted down, photographed and thrown into a locked cement cell for seven hours with only a blanket to cushion my tired bones from the hard surface underneath.

Yes, I'm angry, but when I shake my head clear of all the bitterness blurring my thinking, one inescapable fact emerges: I brought it on myself. All of my problems could have been avoided if I had simply made the decision not to drink and drive.

I think one of the great mysteries of human existence is that people can see something happening all around them and still believe it'll never happen to them. I know about this one, I have the emotional scars to prove it.

One day back in 1990, when I worked at a different newspaper, my assignment editor asked me to interview a local family that had lost a teenage daughter in a drunk driving accident one year earlier.

I telephoned the mother and heard the horrendous details of the crash. The girl was pulling out of a restaurant parking lot and an onrushing car, driven by a drunk driver who couldn't react, struck her broadside. The victim was flung into the lap of her mother, who was riding in the passenger seat. That was where the youth breathed her last.

The young girl's father owned a towing service at the time and was out with the wrecker when he came upon the accident scene. That's your worst nightmare, the mother told me, when you drive a tow truck - that your job will take you to a crash involving someone you love. At the time of my interview a year later, the father was still too distraught to talk about the tragic incident that claimed his daughter.

Say no to church, strip mall plan

Northville Township has only four east-west thoroughfares of which Six Mile Road is the most heavily traveled by township residents.

Adding 3,500 parking spaces to accommodate 6,000 Sunday worshippers in addition to the daily activities sponsored by Ward Church will substantially increase traffic and congestion on the Six Mile corridor.

The Ward group and their developer propose to add a 300,000 square foot mall with 1,350 additional parking spaces to their church complex. Unfortunately, the peak use of the mall would be at night and on weekends which would coincide with the peak use of the church facility. This has the potential of turning a bad situation into a potential disaster for Northville Township residents.

The current zoning for commercial office development with 72 residential home sites is not a panacea. However, it is certainly less of a problem for township residents in terms of crime, congestion, and traffic flow than the proposed mall plan.

Most of the flow of traffic for the office development would be from the I-275 corridor in the morning west to the Northville limits and the reverse in the evening. This flow would not interfere with township residents who would be leaving and reentering the township in the opposite direction. There would be little or no weekend use of the facility, and the overall impact on traffic and congestion would be minimal.

But let's face it — this proposal has never been about open space, trees, traffic or community goodwill. It has always been about money, pure and simple.

It should be apparent to even the most casual observer that Ward Church is trying to maximize its profits from the sale of the land to a developer.

It is also apparent that the sale of the land for the development of a shopping mall offers the best

return on the sale of the property.

How this proposal as outlined by the Ward Church group and their developer can be termed a substantial benefit to our community defies logic.

The time has come for the planning commission and the trustees to stand up to their responsibilities for all the residents of Northville Township and end this charade by voting no on the proposed strip shopping mall at Six Mile and Haggerty.

State accreditation a good gauge

The Michigan Department of Education last week released its first-ever list of state-accredited schools.

Although complex and very bureaucratic — the department's question and answer guidelines ran to nearly eight pages, single-spaced — this is the first time all Michigan public schools have been rated by a common standard: comparative success in a series of MEAP (Michigan Education Assessment Program) tests.

Of Michigan's 3,600 schools, only 145 received the highest rating — "summary accreditation." Locally, four Northville schools attained top ranking, a terrific accomplishment.

Around 3,000 schools received "interim accreditation," which means they are making progress but more improvement is needed in next year's test round to keep up. Three Northville schools were given interim approval.

Of the 89 schools that received no accreditation next year's results will be crucial. If they continue unaccredited, they could lose up to 5 percent of their state per-pupil aid. Continued poor performance could result in having principals removed and students transferred to accredited schools. Locally, no schools were unaccredited.

For the first time, schools that fail to measure up will get hurt. That alone is good news for those who realize Michigan's schools need substantial improvement. As state superintendent of public instruction Robert Schiller said, "This is the first opportunity for us to shine the light on those who are doing it well and those who are not."

All this comes about while a fierce debate is raging about how best to reform schools. Very broadly, the argument is between those who think that improvement can best come about by letting the forces of

market competition determine which schools survive and which die and those who hold that it's possible to reform the public school system in Michigan without destroying it.

For those readers who are interested in some factual background to this debate, here's a compilation that might be useful:

Michigan has some 560 local school districts with more than 3,600 schools serving 1.6 million students. An additional 190,000 children go to non-public schools.

Each local board of education sets its own courses, credits and graduation requirements. Michigan joins only Nebraska and Wyoming in this extraordinary degree of local control. In the other 47 states, courses, credits and graduation requirements are set statewide.

Each local school district picks its textbooks, determines class organization and size, and hires and evaluates its teachers. The last state to do so, Michigan in 1993, mandated teacher evaluation.

Given the high degree of local control, it's not surprising that Michigan schools therefore vary enormously in student achievement, parental expectation, standards and services. We have some of the finest schools, best teachers and most able students in the nation. We also have some schools, teachers and students whose failures are chronic.

Through the MEAP test, we at last have a single uniform tool to measure what kids actually learn in all 3,600 Michigan schools. MEAP isn't the best test, but some objective test is better than no test.

And now, through the accreditation process, the results of MEAP tests are being brought together for our schools, building by building. That's a big step forward, one that parents, teachers, students and employers should applaud.

Lesson learned from bitter medicine

The night before I was scheduled to appear in court last week, I voluntarily attended a victims' impact panel session at 34th District Court in *Romulus*. The program, sponsored by Mothers Against Drunk Driving, consists of personal accounts of the survivors of victims of drunk driving accidents. People convicted of operating under the influence are required to sit and listen to the terrible consequences of mixing alcohol and driving.

One of the presenters looked familiar to me but I couldn't quite place her. I wasn't sure if she was someone I knew or just someone who reminded me of somebody else. Then she started to tell her story and I recognized her — it was the mother of the girl whose story I had written five years ago.

As I sat there, numbed by the flood of memories coming back to me, the woman began passing out pictures of her late daughter. I had seen

them before. They were given to me at the time that I wrote the story and I selected one of them to run in the paper alongside the article.

The coincidence of seeing the mother prompted me to stand up and identify myself. After explaining who I was, I told the woman I was sorry I hadn't learned a lesson from her unhappiness. At the time that I wrote the story, I was praised for the sensitivity with which I had described the accident and its god-awful impact on the family. Now, five years later, I was waiting to plead guilty to a drunk driving charge the following day.

It really is true that, for all the headache and embarrassment resulting from my conviction, I was one of the lucky ones. I can recover from my experience. I can repair the damage to my public image and to my finances and move on.

Given the vast number of deaths and injuries caused by drunk driving accidents, not everyone has that opportunity.

Township board of trustees changes meeting policy

Regularly scheduled study sessions are a thing of the past for the Northville Township board of trustees.

Members of the board at their April 13 meeting voted 5-1 (Clerk Sue Hillebrand was absent) to just hold the discussion-only sessions on an as-needed basis from now on. Up until now, the board normally held one study session a month.

They haven't always been very productive, however, most every-

one on the board seemed to agree. Sometimes issues were put on the agenda with little or no background information submitted to the board beforehand, making the discussions less than fruitful.

At other times the sessions didn't seem to serve a useful purpose, some trustees felt, because the debate on an issue would be repeated when that issue came before the board during a regular meeting.

Not all members accept that notion, however. Hillebrand in a

memo said that she wanted to see the sessions continue to be regularly scheduled. Trustee Barbara O'Brien, the lone "no" vote, agreed.

"I think they're useful because we can bounce ideas off of each other and get each other's viewpoints," she said.

Treasurer Rick Engelland and Trustees Gini Britton and Mark Abbo all favored scheduling the sessions on an as-needed basis, however.

Trustee Russ Fogg supported scheduling the sessions on a reg-

ular basis but canceling them if no one put anything on that month's agenda. Abbo said that might leave board members open to do what they've done in the past, namely to frequently bump items from a regular meeting to a study session.

Supervisor Karen Baja said she supported the as-needed requirement but also called for the trustees to agree to begin holding two regular board meetings a month. The rest of the board expressed reservations about that idea and did not support it.

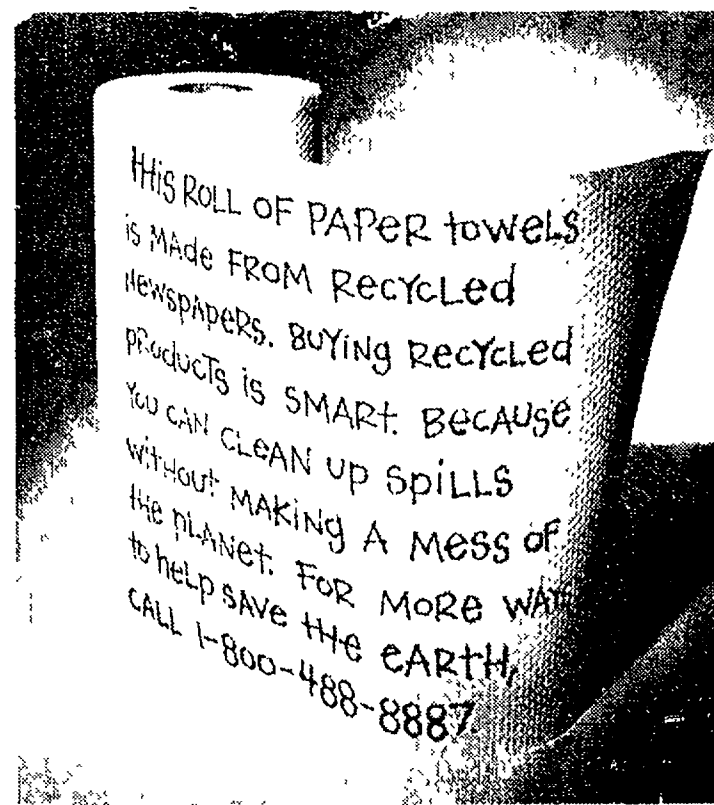

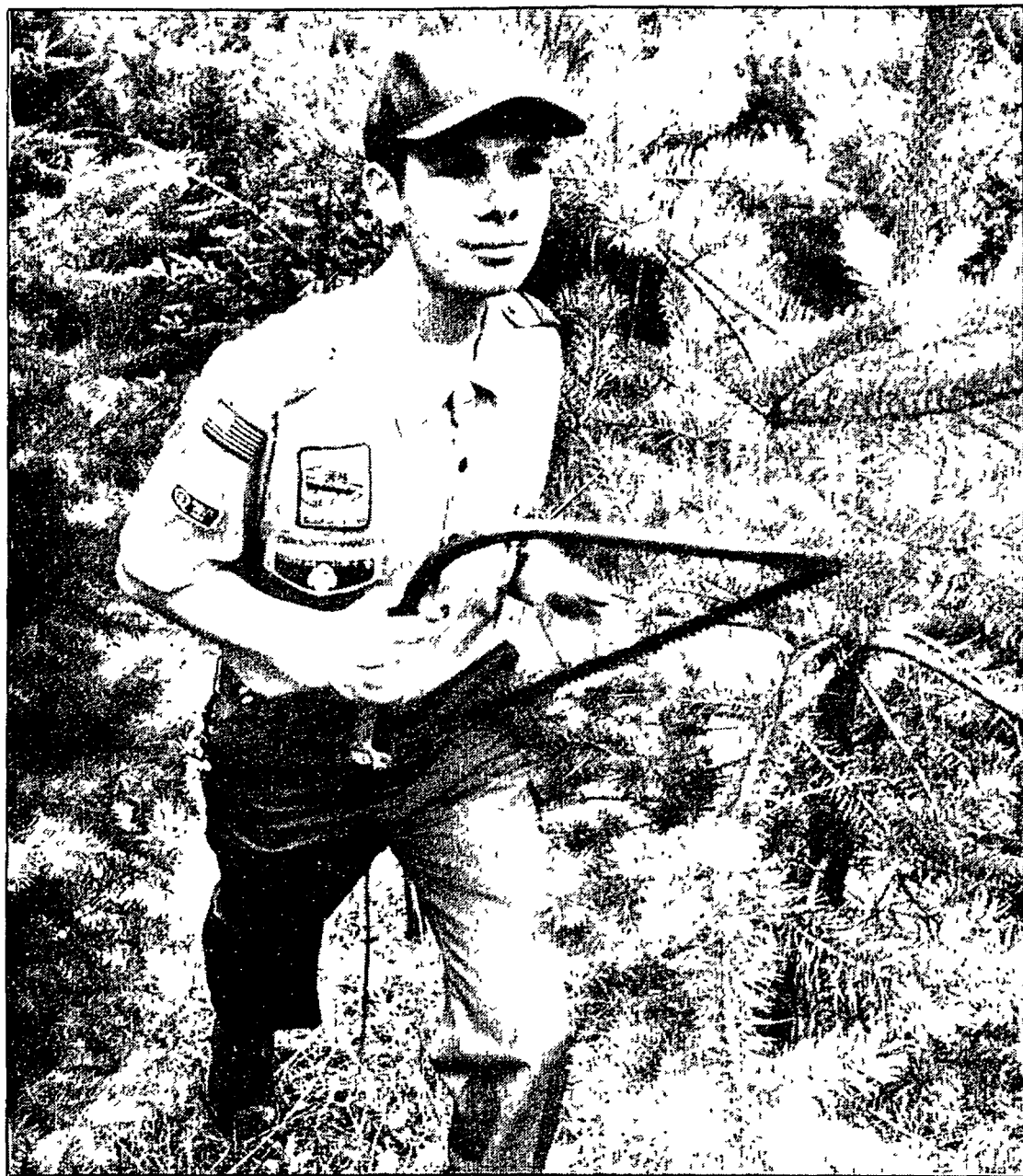

Scouting's highest rank is achieved by only two percent of the 25 to 30 percent of boys who join. On the average, a little over half the troops will produce one Eagle Scout per year. In this area, that number is much higher. Three Scouts in Novi recently earned the rank of Eagle.

Scouting is designed so that each boy will advance at his own pace. Scouts do not compete against each other, but set goals and challenge themselves to go as far as their own ambitions take them.

Unlike other service project requirements in Scouting, which require the Scout to be a follower, the Eagle service project requires the Scout to be a leader.

The service project for the Eagle Rank requires that the scout to plan, develop and give leadership to others in a project to help a religious group, school or community.

Projects are approved by the Scoutmaster, by the troop committee and by the council or district before the Scout begins. Ideas do not have to be original but they do have to be of real value. Eagle service projects, unlike other service projects, must meet national Scout requirements.

Eagle Scout candidates must also earn a total of 21 merit badges including camping, citizenship in the community, citizenship in the nation, citizenship in the world, communications, emergency preparedness, environmental science, first aid, lifesaving, personal fitness, personal management, safety, sports and swimming. They must also hold a position of responsibility within the troop and have completed the requirements for both a star and a life rank.

JEFF DUNESKE
Jeff Duneske has been in Scouting for nine years and is the 13th Eagle Scout Troop 54 has produced. As a junior assistant scoutmaster, Duneske helps

the senior patrol leader prepare and carry out troop activities. He also helps supervise at all troop meetings. Once a month Duneske teaches a skill to the troop such as orienteering and camping.

"I enjoy teaching camping skills and how to pack and prepare different equipment to use," he said. "I also enjoy being outside for the weekend."

He received the Order of the Arrow, an honor not earned by, but bestowed upon the Scout by the troop. It is in recognition of his being a worthy Scout and an unselfish camper.

Duneske sat down with his Scoutmaster to come up with ideas for his service project.

"I have taken woodworking classes in school," he said, "and enjoy working with wood."

He chose to work with the Novi Parks and Recreation on the future Rotary Park on Nine Mile Road.

Duneske invested 161 hours in the project which began in mid-November and was completed Feb. 22.

He started by designing benches and picnic tables and drawing up the plans.

Duneske made four benches and assembled two grills. He then dug the holes for the benches and grills. The benches were cemented into holes he dug along the river path. The grills were cemented into holes dug in the picnic area. He then built three picnic tables which are also used in the picnic area.

"The requirement is that the project must benefit the community in some way," said Duneske, "and the Scout cannot profit from the project."

Projects must be carried out and designed by the Eagle Scout himself.

Davenport checked with the city regarding the code for the stairs and with the city forester about the tree selection.

He then received the go ahead from the Novi Historical Society.

"They (members of the historical society) were looking for something they could use," said Davenport.

Davenport and his crew of 30 Scouts constructed a mulch and log terraced pathway along the west side of the building. Eight large pear trees line the pathway.

"I learned how hard it is to manage a bunch of kids and how hard it was to manage a project over 100 hours," said Davenport.

"It takes a lot of prior planning to go into a project like this," he said. When all was done, Davenport had clocked in 140 hours for his service project.

Davenport, a junior at Novi High School, is on the tennis team and is an active debater. After high school, he has his sights set on either the Naval Academy or the University of Michigan and pursue a degree in business or economics.

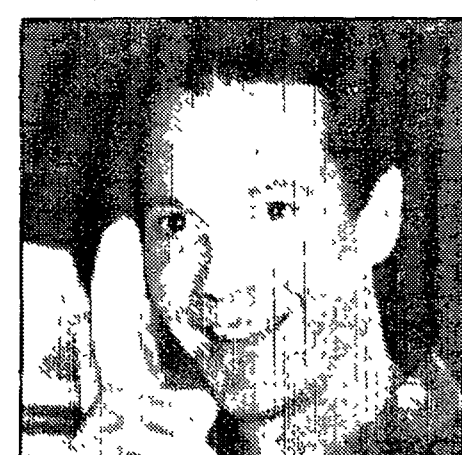

Louise Bradley picked up a cello when she was 13 and hasn't put it down yet. Bradley has been playing the cello for 77 years and has been volunteering with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra for 27 years.

"My cello is the most important part of my life," said Bradley. "I do it for the love of the music."

Bradley was raised in Chicago in a musical family and went to a very large active church which had an orchestra.

There was a cello player in the orchestra about her age and they became good friends. It was during this time that Bradley decided to take up the cello herself. The church orchestra rehearsed every afternoon at 4 p.m. and performed on Sunday evening.

"I've made some wonderful friends through music," she said.

Bradley ended up teaching, not science, but the cello.

"I taught so many youngsters - I couldn't tell you how many," she said. "I loved to work with young people ranging in age from 10 up through high school."

Volunteering has also been a big part of Bradley's life. "In our life we have to do a lot of volunteering, it is necessary to the public." The Northville resident has been involved with so many orchestras she has lost count.

Bradley has always been active in music circles. Besides playing with the PSO, she currently volunteers at St. Bede's in Southfield where she is rehearsing for their production of *The Merry Widow*.

"I don't let any grass grow under my feet," she said. "Life is too short."

"There's such a wide range of

things you can do in music," she said. "There is always something interesting to take up."

Practicing the cello at rehearsals once a week helps keep her fingers moving. Bradley will have three or four rehearsals, plus a dress rehearsal for each concert. Added to that is several more hours of practice at home per week.

down too much, a little on the walking side especially carrying a cello," she said. "It gets a little heavier all the time."

Life for humane society poster dog ends quietly

Lady Ginger's life ended naturally on April 4 at the age of 15.

Lady Ginger had an brush with death in 1987 when she was left abandoned and chained inside a garage with no food and relying on drops of water that came through a hole in the roof as the snow melted.

Her second chance at life came on January 30, 1987, when the six year old Afghan hound was rescued by the Michigan Humane Society. Weighing only 19 pounds she was literally skin and bones.

When word of her plight became known, Marge Cinader, the owner of Ewe, Me and Co. in Northville, called the Humane Society every day for two months asking to adopt the dog.

After Lady Ginger's weight doubled, Cinader was allowed to take her home.

Lady Ginger became the poster

dog for the Michigan Humane Society and was often used in fund-raising efforts until 1990, when she retired from public life.

Cinader has kept a scrap book in her store of Lady Ginger which details her progress and her fame as top dog at the Bow Wow Ball in 1989. Lady Ginger was also a frequent visitor to the store which opened five years ago.

"She loved gourmet food," said Cinader. "At cocktail parties she sniffed out the imported cheeses. She was one super dog," she said.

The Cinaders and the Michigan Humane Society have set up a memorial fund for Lady. The fund will benefit the MHS Cruelty Investigation Division. "If somebody is calling an audition," said Peerbolte, "I'm usually there."

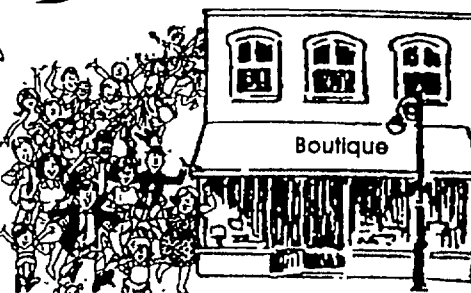
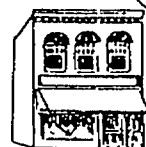

"Call Northside 777" is an "oldie" from the 1948 old black-and-white crop, and a "goodie!"

It's James Stewart in his prime, displaying the kind of acting that made him so famous.

Stewart, a famous newspaper reporter, learns that an old woman, the mother of a prisoner (Richard Conte) serving a life's sentence for murder, has offered \$5,000 to find the true killer. So certain of her son's innocence, she's scrubbed floors for 11 years since his conviction, scrimping and saving to make this earnest plea for help.

Stewart's editor (Lee J. Cobb) feels the story will create lots of human interest and sell many papers, so he assigns Stewart the story.

READER MOVIE REVIEWS

Once Stewart gets involved, he becomes convinced of the man's innocence and conducts a tireless, determined investigation.

There's one scene that deserves special mention. Conte undergoes a lie detector test which appears entirely authentic. Later, not surprisingly, I learned in fact the man rendering the test wasn't an actor, but indeed someone who actually

conducts these sensitive tests.

Based on a true story and handled in a semi-documentary style, the pacing builds suspense toward a fulfilling climax.

odd friendships and unlikely events.

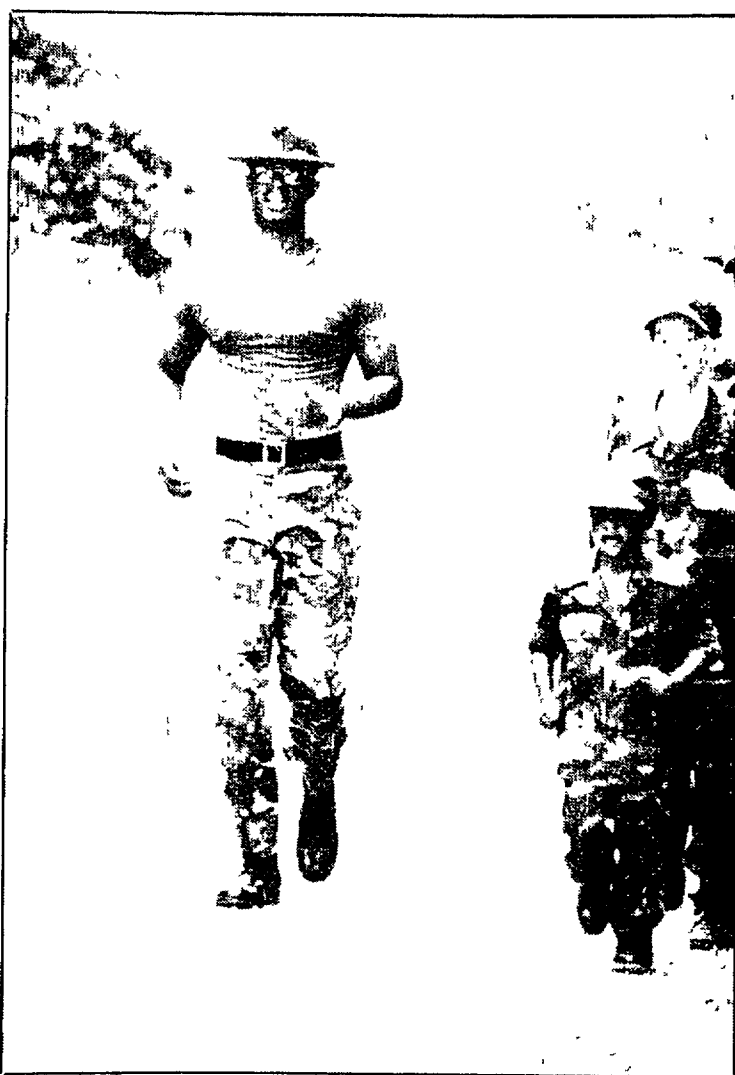

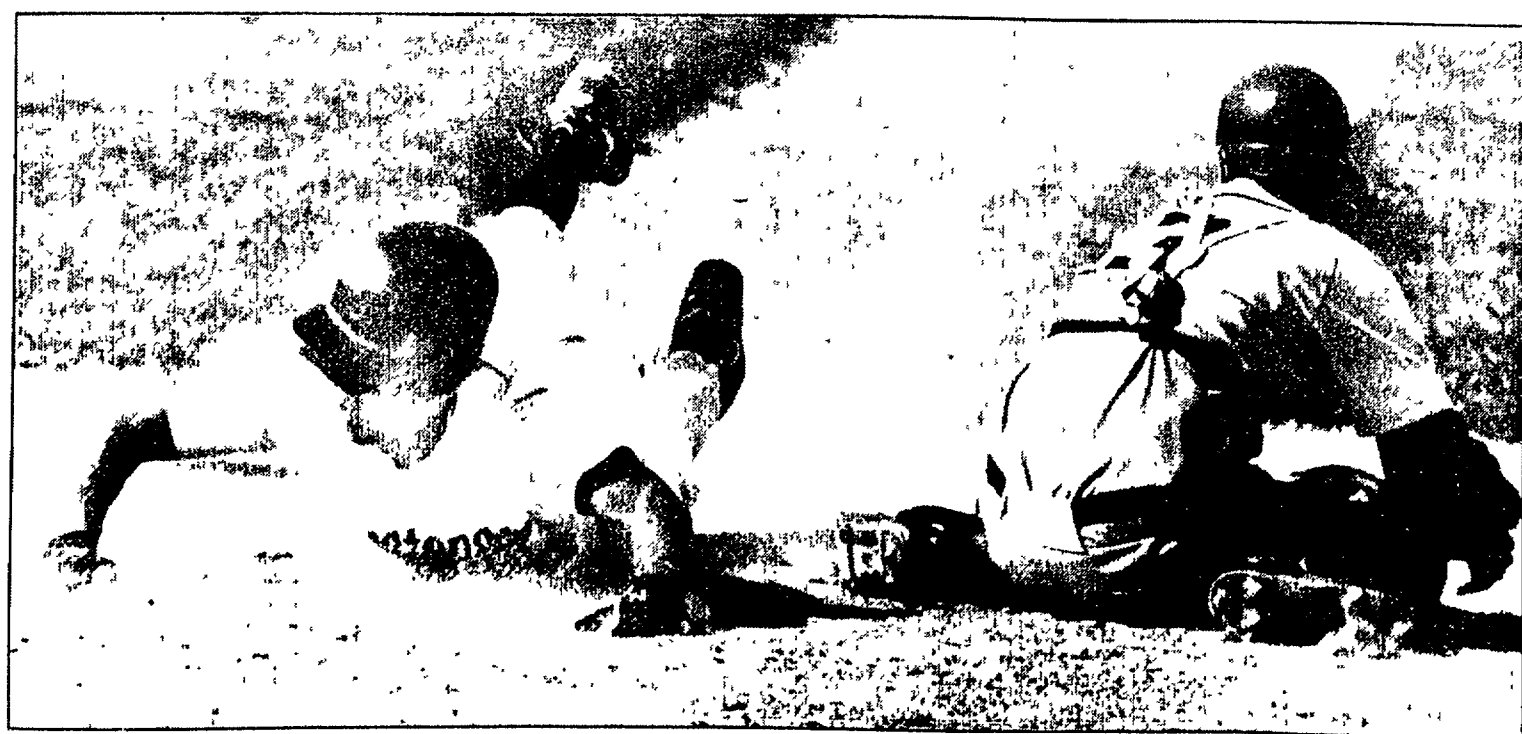

among the top 20 in the state. Friday will feature a contest with Livonia Franklin, another tough competitor, in Northville. The team faces a Saturday home double-header against Novi.

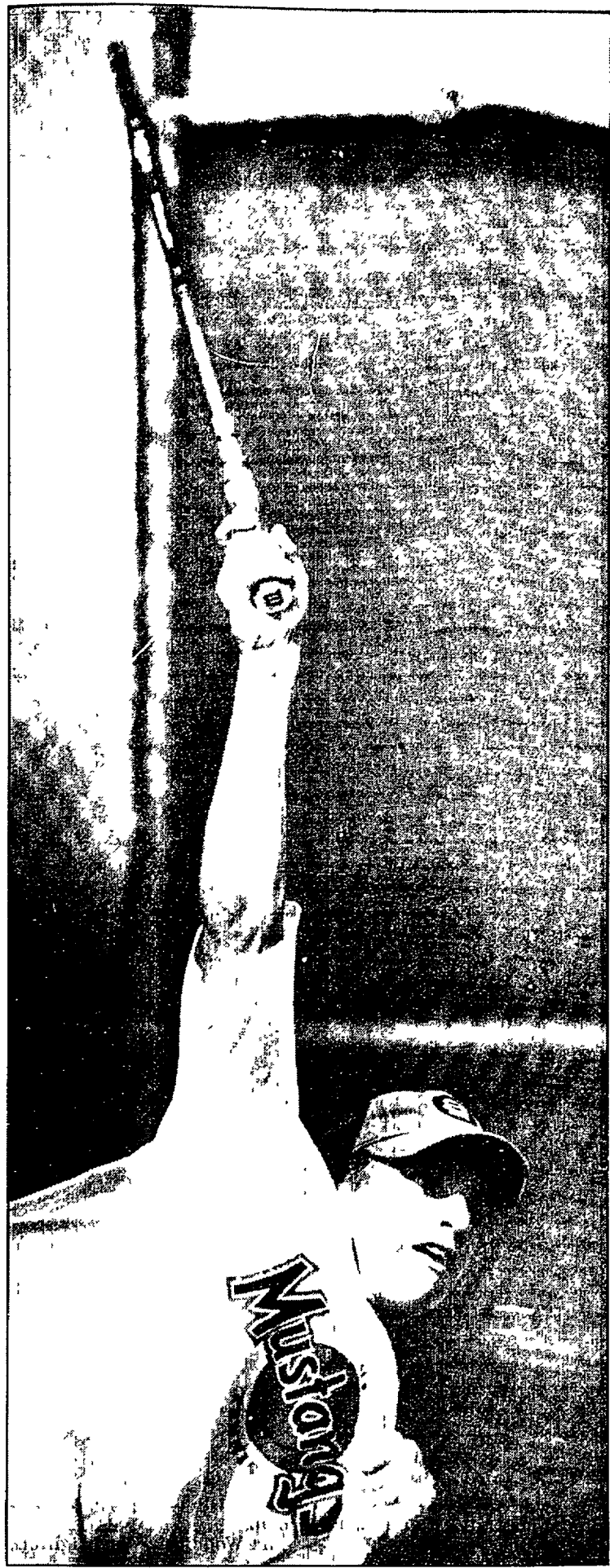

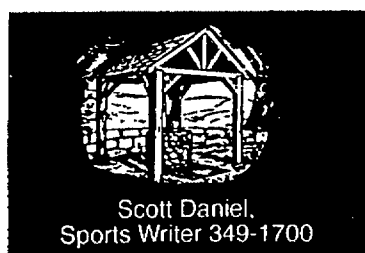

It's said that tennis is the sport of kings. Thanks to the Northville Parks & Recreation Department, though, you don't have to spend a king's ransom to learn to play it.

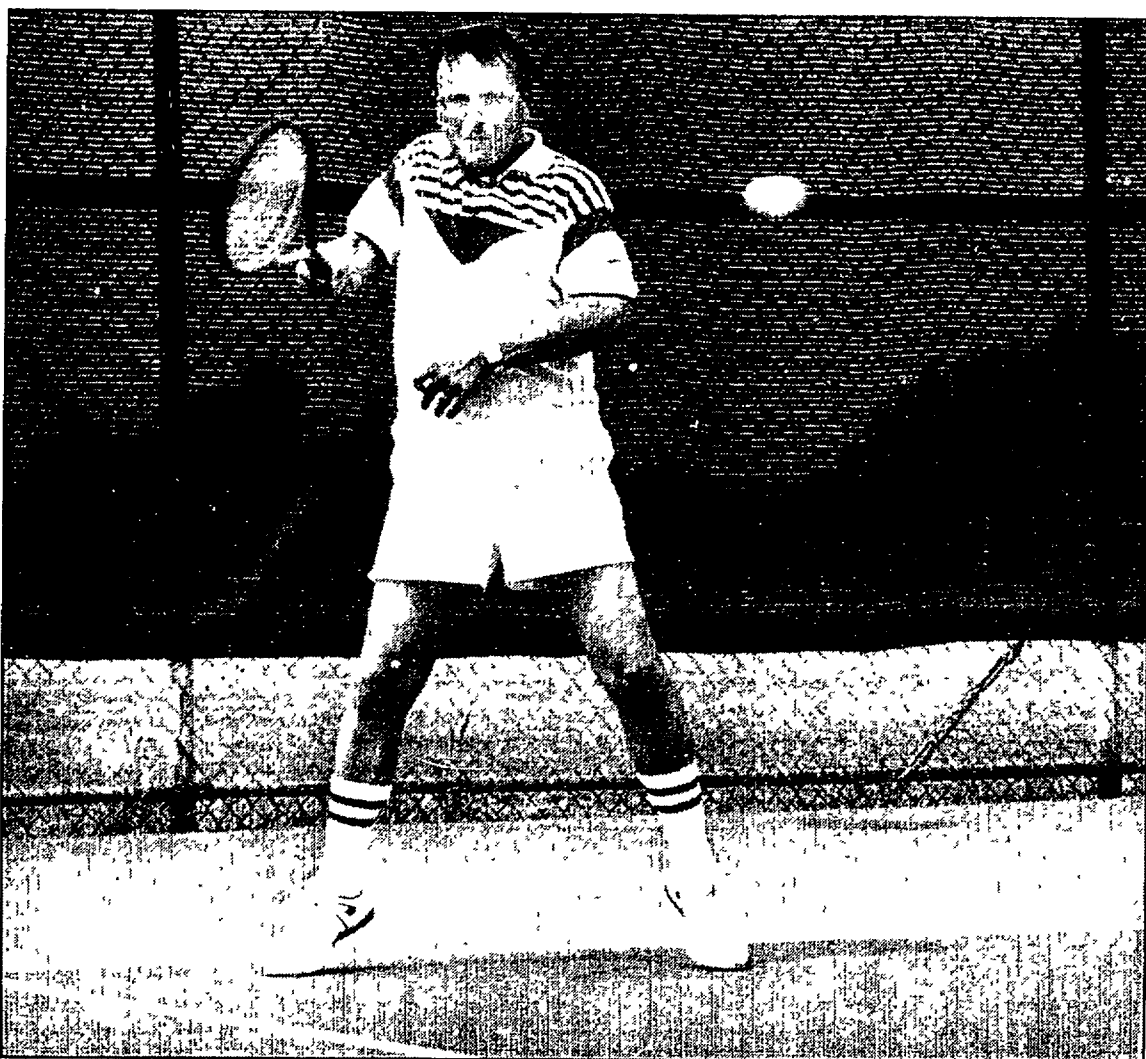

Non-surgical prostate cures explored

Men over 40 years old commonly suffer from benign prostatic hyperplasia, or BPH, a noncancerous enlargement of the prostate gland that often leads to difficulty in urination. Surgery to reduce excess tissue in the gland has been the mainstay of treatment for the past 50 years; it is the second most common operation - after cataract extraction - for men older than 65.

Approximately 400,000 surgical procedures involving an enlarged prostate are performed annually in the United States, with associated expenses of more than \$5 billion each year.

And while surgery remains the standard form of care for symptomatic BPH, it does present a number of potential complications. Up to one in four men undergoing the surgical procedure report problems ranging from diminished sexual function to urinary incontinence (leakage).

Now, however, doctors are looking at a number of nonsurgical treatment options for managing an

enlarged prostate. One option may be drug therapy. Two major classes of drugs affect the prostate in different ways: androgen-deprivation drugs reduce the amount of male hormones that stimulate swelling in the gland; and alpha-adrenergic-antagonist drugs relieve the pressure between the bladder and the urethra. While the use of drugs seems to be helpful for many men, additional research is needed to determine whether medications will offer long-term solutions to BPH.

Meanwhile, minimally invasive treatments for BPH include making an incision to remove blockage between the bladder and the urethra; inserting a pliable metal stent into the prostatic urethra to improve urinary flow; and using lasers to perform prostate surgery. While each procedure requires more documentation of long-term effects, much progress has been made within the last few years to develop minimally invasive treatments that are easy to perform

safe, and allow minimal hospitalization and quick recovery periods.

Another procedure currently under investigation at the Michigan Prostate Institute of the University of Michigan relies on low-level radio frequency, or RF, energy to selectively target and shrink prostate tissue. Called transurethral needle ablation, or TUNA, the outpatient procedure is performed under local anesthesia and may lead to fewer side effects and a shorter recovery time.

During TUNA, the urologist uses a fiber-optic image to direct a special catheter into the portion of the urethra that passes through the prostate gland.

Two needles, covered by protective shields, are deployed from the catheter and placed into the prostatic tissue. The shields are retracted to expose the needles, which then deliver the RF energy to specific locations in the prostate gland.

The U-M study will compare the outcomes of men undergoing TUNA

with those who have conventional surgery for BPH. Patients will be followed for a year after treatment to measure their changes in urination, sexual function and quality of life.

Whether it's surgery, a minimally invasive procedure, or medication, men seeking treatment for an enlarged prostate must be informed of any potential benefits and risks.

One man may prefer medical therapy to avoid surgery, while another may choose a minimally invasive procedure to avoid having to take medication for his entire life. In any event, the physician and patient must decide together what the best treatment option is for that individual.

the United States and Canada a few years ago.

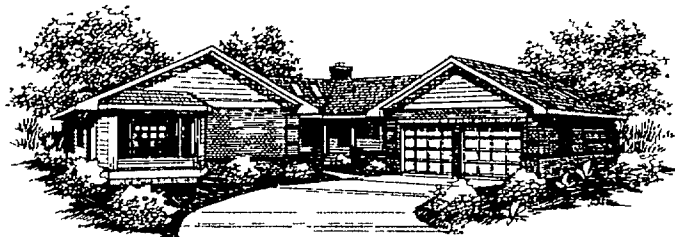

**The Apricot makes
use of natural light**

A striking entry courtyard welcomes family and friends to the Apricot, a basically C-shaped home that makes good use of natural light throughout.

Chest-high brick walls on both sides of the walkway give an enclosed feeling to the entry courtyard. A gate could be added for full enclosure, if desired. Combining potted plants with artistic landscaping here will create a colorful and inviting outdoor environment that can be enjoyed walking through it, or while relaxing on the covered porch.

Stepping inside, you notice a long display case, naturally illuminated by skylights — an ideal showcase for a collection, be it books, sculptures, coins, miniatures, antique dolls, etc. A large walk-in closet is to the left of the door.

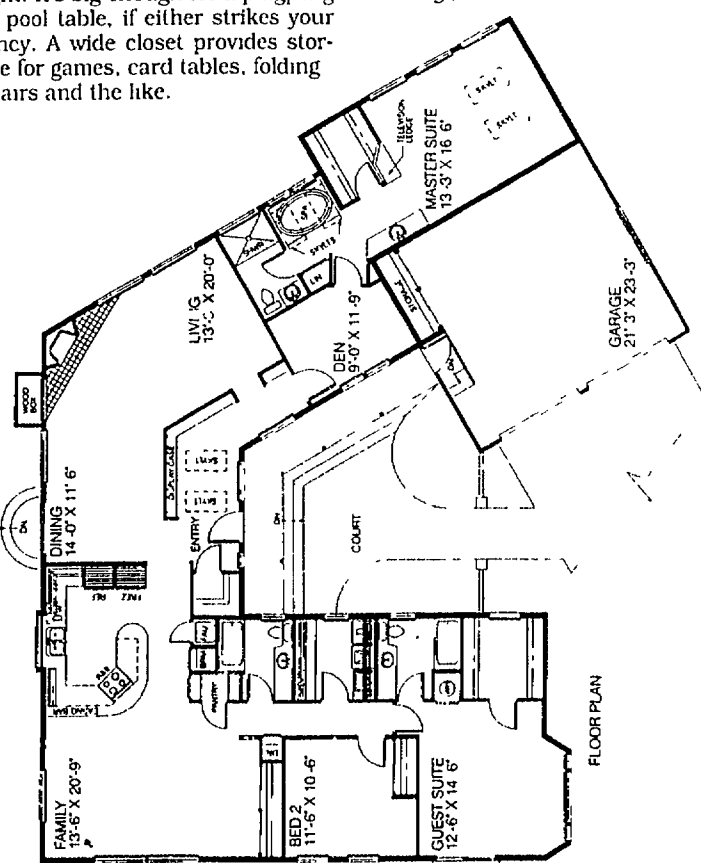
Dining room and living room flow together, with a wide hearth spanning the angled corner. This bright open area is great for entertaining. Sliding glass doors open to the rear deck or patio. The family room/kitchen is large and full of light. It's big enough for a pingpong or pool table, if either strikes your fancy. A wide closet provides storage for games, card tables, folding chairs and the like.

A curved eating bar supplies generous counter space and minimal separation between the kitchen and family room. Range and oven are built-in. Other amenities include a walk-in pantry, garden window, broom closet, and space for an upright freezer next to the refrigerator.

The master suite is a sumptuous adult retreat, well-isolated from the hustle and bustle of daily activities in the family room. Strawberries are the exception, after the planting year, fertilize June-bearing strawberries after harvest. Early spring fertilization of strawberries promotes lush vegetative growth at the expense of flower and fruit production. Berries that are produced tend to be soft.

Q. My soil is high in clay and so fairly heavy. I've had terrible luck with carrots. Any suggestions?

A. Double-dig to loosen soil well below the depth to which carrot roots will grow. Incorporating generous amounts of organic matter such as leaf mold or compost. An alternative is to make raised beds or grow carrots in containers.

The choice of variety is important, too. Select shorter, blunter varieties such as Nantes, Danvers half-long or Chantenay rather than the long, slender types like those you are used to buying in the grocery store.

Q. When I try to sow fine seed in the garden, I invariably end up with thick clumps of seedlings and big bare areas. Any tips?

A. Buy pelleted seed — it's larger and easier to control so you don't plant so thickly. You can also mix small seed with sand or dried used coffee grounds. Then adapt a restaurant-type sugar or salt shaker to sow seeds, enlarging the holes in the top with a nail until they are just large enough to allow seeds to shake out at the rate you want.

A more expensive option is to use seed tapes — seeds are applied to the tape at the proper spacing.

Q. How is insecticidal soap different from liquid dish soap? Can I use dish soap for controlling aphids?

A. Insecticidal soaps are specially formulated to control insects on plants. They are biodegradable and nearly non-toxic to

humans and many beneficial insects. Dish soap — which is actually a detergent rather than a soap — may have some effect on pests, but may also damage plants.

Q. The carrots I grew last year were forked and hairy. What's the cause?

A. Too much nitrogen, either from chemical fertilizer or fresh manure, will cause carrots to develop forked, hairy roots. Use a fertilizer such as 5-10-10 around carrots and avoid sidedressing with nitrogen in midseason.

If you use manure to add nutrients, age it or compost it first. Overcrowding, heavy soil and nematodes can also cause problems with carrots.

Q. My neighbors and I have planted dozens, if not hundreds, of tulip bulbs over the past few years and have had only a handful of flowers to show for it. What could be preventing them from blooming?

A. Sometimes bulbs fail to bloom because they're planted too close to a heated structure and don't get the necessary cold treatment they require for flowering. Bulbs planted in heavy soil that tends to remain wet for long periods may rot. And bulbs planted too deep, especially in heavy soil, may fail to bloom.

Failure to bloom on a neighborhood scale may be due to moles. Though they usually feed on insects, earthworms and other small creatures, they find by burrowing in the soil, moles will also take advantage of high-protein plant foods — such as bulbs just as they begin to sprout. Controlling moles or repelling them from bulb beds may solve your problem.

Q. When I'm buying bedding plants, is it better to choose plants that are already in flower or plants that aren't blooming yet?

A. Most gardeners like to see what they're getting and so look for plants already in bloom. But plants that haven't started to bloom yet transplant better. They haven't switched from vegetative growth to reproduction and so have more active root systems for quicker establishment.

When buying plants, look at the ones in flower, pick out what you want and then purchase plants that aren't blooming. Or, if you buy plants already in flower, remove the flowers at transplanting so the plants will concentrate on establishing a good root system to support flowering later.

Q. How do I find out whether I need to put lime on my garden site?

A. Contact your local MSU Extension office (it should be listed under "County Government" in your phone book) and ask

More than just an ugly eyesore, weeds battle with plants, shrubs and trees for water and essential nutrients. Gardeners and professional landscapers alike used to fight weeds the time-tested way, with a hoe or spade, or even more painstakingly, with their bare hands.

Then, plastic bags were laid on top of the soil but this proved a poor substitute. Plastic allowed too much water runoff and interrupted the flow of air and water. Poor, soured soil often resulted. Worse, plastic only blocked weeds temporarily, as it tore easily and soon disintegrated.

Finally, as the environment and its well-being transformed from a minor concern into an international issue, homeowners, municipal park managers and landscapers alike realized there had to be a more effective, safer way. That better way turned out to be landscape fabrics.

Landscape fabrics, barriers designed to prevent the growth of weeds in the soil, are produced either by weaving fibers together at right angles or by bonding short of continuously spun fibers together through heat bond-

ing, needle-punching, spin bonding or other processes (nonwoven).

The result is a fabric with the ability to block weeds and harmful sunlight without disturbing Mother Nature.

Today's multipurpose landscape fabrics available at most major garden centers are easy to cut with a pair of scissors or a knife, don't unravel and can last for several years despite direct exposure to the sun.

Commercial landscapers have been using fabrics successfully for years as a weed deterrent and are continually finding new places to use them. Fabrics are often utilized by professionals when transplanting or installing new plants in a landscape formation, and when erecting or repairing walkways, patios and decks.

Today, many do-it-yourself gardeners have also discovered the fabric's many applications and its cost effectiveness. According to recent studies, people who purchase the fabrics report great results and note that they would buy the product again.

A well-made fabric is ideal

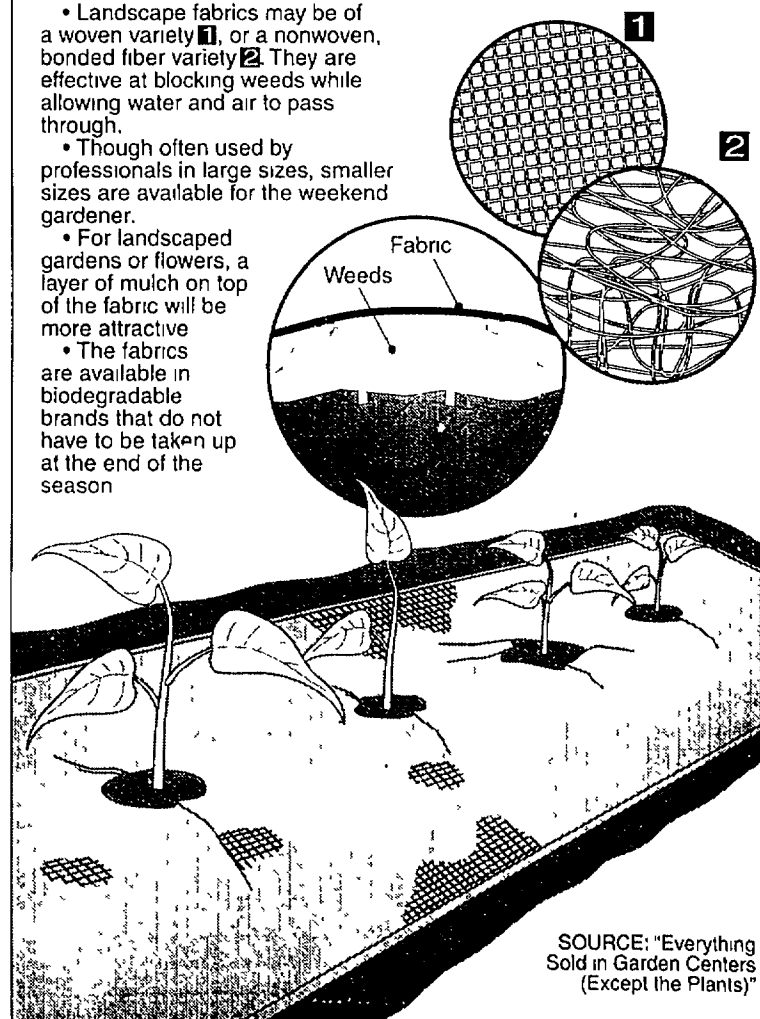
Weed relief: Landscape fabrics

Springtime is the question and answer time for gardeners

about having a soil test run. A soil test is an inexpensive, accurate way to tell whether your soil needs lime and how much you need to add. It will also tell you if nutrients in your soil are inadequate for the crop(s) you intend to grow and how much of which nutrients to add.

Q. What causes gray spots on my crabapple leaves and fruits? Does the same thing cause the leaves to turn yellow and drop in midsummer? What can I do about it?

A. Spotted leaves and fruits, yellowing foliage and early leaf drop are common signs of apple scab, a fungal disease of apples and crabapples. In susceptible varieties, regular sprays with fungicides are the only alternative to the disease. Apple and crabapple

cultivars are available with genetic resistance to the disease.

Planting resistant varieties is definitely the way to go when establishing new plantings or replacing declining trees. Another cause of spots on crabapples is cedar-apple rust. Leaf spots may be pale yellow to bring orange.

Q. My neighbor says if I plant cucumbers and melons next to each other, they will cross-pollinate and the melons will taste funny. Is this true? How far apart do they have to be?

A. Cross-pollination is not a problem in the garden, except in sweet corn. If it cross-pollinates with field corn, popcorn or Indian corn, eating quality will suffer. Other closely related crops may cross-pollinate, but the only effect will be in the seed produced — this year's fruits will not be affected.

So, squashes and pumpkins planted next to each other will not produce squashes this year. But if you save the seeds for planting next year, the fruits of those plants may look radically different from the fruits that produced the seeds.

Q. I received a split-leaf philodendron as a gift a while back. It's growing well and looks green and healthy, but the new leaves aren't split. What's the problem?

A. Young leaves often don't have perforations. When a plant's mature leaves lose the split-leaf characteristic, the cause is most likely low light. Try moving the plant into an area with bright, indirect light area or supplementing natural light with several hours of fluorescent light each day. If this doesn't remedy the situation after a while, the problem may be lack of nutrients or insufficient moisture, and changes in fer-

tilizing or watering may be in order.

Q. Some years I have so many yellow jackets around my house that my backyard is almost unusable by late summer. Why do they invade my yard then? Is there anything I can do to prevent it?

A. The invasion actually begins in the spring, when overwintering females begin to build nests — usually in the ground, in abandoned animal burrows and other openings — and lay eggs. The queen raises the first batch of workers, who then take over nest-building, young-rearing and foraging duties, leaving her free to concentrate on egg laying.

By late summer or early fall, each colony may number hundreds of stinger-armed individuals. Any yellow jackets you see flying around or basking on south-

facing walls or walkways on those first balmy spring days are probably females looking for good nesting sites. Destroying these individuals in the spring is much easier — and safer — than trying to control their hundreds or thousands of descendants a few months later.

In late summer, yellow jackets seek out overripe fruit and protein foods. Keep overripe and rotting produce cleaned up in the garden and cover garbage cans tightly to make your yard less attractive to these insects.

Q. I'm confused about miniature vegetables — are they small plants that produce small fruits or other edible parts, or are they just ordinary vegetables picked before they reach full size?

A. The term can refer to both genetically small plants and produce and baby vegetables — imma-

ture specimens that would reach normal size if allowed to grow. Anyone can grow miniature vegetables in the second sense — simply plant standard varieties and pick the produce while it's still small.

To grow vegetables that are midsize when they mature, you must select miniature varieties. These may be small plants or standard-sized plants that simply produce small fruits. To confuse the issue even further, seed catalogs are full of bush or dwarf varieties — small, compact plants that produce good yields of standard-sized fruits.

So, if you're thinking of growing miniature vegetables to save space, read catalog or seed packet information carefully to be sure you're getting the combination of plant traits you're looking for.

Home-exchange program a great vacation alternative

alize.

"I've personally exchanged my home 14 times and never had a bad experience," Horne said. "I'm now planning a three-week vacation in Greece, and expect to save about \$4,000 with a home exchange."

Nearly all exchanges work out successfully, she noted. But it does require common-sense preparations. In many cases, an exchange leads to new and lasting friendships.

A typical exchange would be a U.S. family vacationing in Europe for a three-week period, she noted. But trips often range from two weeks to two months. In most cases, the residence is left in better condition after the exchange. And it's customary for the guest to leave a gift (household item) for the owner.

Most home exchanges are international. But an increasing number are domestic — within the United States. People are discovering the home-exchange process to be their affordable key to enjoying a stay at

points of interest throughout the country.

Currently, there are about 10,000 listings in Horne's Intervac USA directory — a publication issued three times a year. About 20 percent of those listings are properties in the United States. About 400 listings are in Canada, 75 in Mexico. Thirty-four countries are represented.

Planning a single vacation trip using multiple exchanges, as the Ruckerts are planning, is rather new. Intervac has asked them for a report after the trip is concluded, so they can pass along tips to others who might use the concept.

Every week I learn about new ways major real estate organizations are tapping in to computerized communications capabilities to enhance their marketing outreach.

"Presentation Pro," developed by Better Homes and Gardens Real Estate Service, a national broker network, is a recent example. This is a proprietary multimedia software package used by their member

brokers and sales associates.

It allows the member to present a customized and interactive listing presentation to homeowners who are interested in selling their home. It includes full-motion video segments, animation, and sound and music to clearly and dramatically explain what the broker can offer when contracted to market the home.

The software can be customized for each member firm, broker and associate — including information on individuals who will be actively involved in the marketing process.

"Our computerized listing presentation program, one of the industry's first, provides a viable high-tech helping hand to our members," said Allen Sabbag, president of Better Homes and Gardens Real Estate Service. "When using it, they can graphically define their proposed marketing process, including price-strategy counseling."

Q. Is there such a thing as a totally computerized home appraisal?

A. Not yet, but we seem to be headed in that direction. And that's creating a big concern for appraisers.

A new automated loan underwriting service — "Loan Prospector" — developed by Freddie Mac (major buyer of existing mortgage loans) has stirred appraisers throughout the country.

The program evaluates a borrower's credit and collateral and returns a quick purchase decision to the primary lender.

Freddie Mac claims it will "revolutionize mortgage finance and cut average settlement time from 45 days to 5 to 10 days." And it will reduce costs by 20 percent to 50 percent, they predict.

Appraisers are concerned about the speed of service, as proposed by Freddie Mac.

"Quality should remain a top priority," said Richard Sorenson, president of the Appraisal Institute. "Freddie Mac's rather loose qualification requirements for indi-

viduals performing 'curbside' inspections are disturbing. If national vendors are expected to deliver a set number of appraisals under arbitrary time constraints, that leaves quality pretty far down on the priority list."

There are efforts in the real estate lending industry to establish national databases of home resale prices, local property tax data, residential form appraisal data and other information, Sorenson noted. Once databases are established, artificial intelligence can be used in some cases to derive quick, computer-based appraisals. Those appraisals have serious inherent drawbacks, he stressed.

for weed control anywhere, including around trees, plants and shrubs, and even in potted plants. Although more costly than the black plastic sheeting many people still buy, landscape fabrics are resistant to tears, and because they "breathe" (meaning that air and water can pass through), decorative mulches laid atop the fabric won't

wash away with the water buildup caused by rain, hose watering or sprinklers.

Because fabrics help soil to retain moisture by blocking sunlight and slowing down the evaporation process, covered areas require less watering, an important factor in drought-stricken areas where rain and water are limited.

If you want to achieve results similar to those of a professional when canning

for your own yard, look to landscape fabrics. They are readily available at local garden centers, hardware stores and chain retailers.

Audit does not have to be costly

If your pulse races at the thought of an IRS tax audit, you aren't alone. Every year, more than a million taxpayers react to letters from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) with fear and trepidation.

According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants (MACPA), if you understand the audit process and your rights as a taxpayer, an audit does not have to be an unnerving and costly experience.

TYPES OF AUDITS

The IRS usually will notify you by mail if your tax return is selected to be audited. There are three types of audits: correspondence, office and field audits.

The correspondence audit is conducted through the mail and is typically the simplest type of inquiry to endure. With this type of audit, the IRS generally asks you to send them documents supporting or verifying certain items on your return. If a professional preparer completed your tax return, you should contact this person immediately and request that he or she respond to the IRS. In any case, be sure either you or the preparer responds by the IRS's deadline.

The office audit, the most common type of audit, is held at the IRS's office with a tax auditor. The

IRS will ask you to meet with its representative at a specific time and place. If the appointment is inconvenient, you have the right to reschedule at a time that is mutually convenient for you and the IRS. In the audit notification letter, the IRS will specify the areas in question and ask you to present supporting documentation.

The more formidable field audit usually is reserved for a wealthy taxpayer with a complex return that shows business or professional income. If you're selected for a field audit, the IRS will send a tax auditor to meet with you at your place of business or your home. Again, you have the right to reschedule the audit at a mutually convenient time that does not interfere with the normal operations of your business. The field audit involves an extensive examination of your entire return and the supporting documentation.

WHO GOES TO THE AUDIT?

You do not have to attend an audit by yourself. In fact, you don't have to meet with the IRS at all, unless an administrative summons

requesting your presence is issued. Instead, you can choose to have a CPA, or another tax professional qualified to practice before the IRS, represent you.

When determining whether you should meet with the IRS without a tax preparer, consider what kinds of deductions are being scrutinized and how much is at stake. Also determine how comfortable you feel defending yourself. If you think your nerves might get the best of you, send a qualified representative who can present your case more professionally.

PREPARING

Carefully collect and organize the documents pertaining to the items in question. To limit your exposure, bring only those records that are needed to support the items being examined. Although office audits generally don't go beyond the items indicated on the audit notification letter, the IRS isn't precluded from looking into other areas on your return.

If the IRS decides to delve into new areas, the agent will most likely schedule another meeting so you

can provide additional information. This will give you time to prepare.

Also keep in mind that, during the audit process, you may be able to claim additional deductions not previously claimed on your return.

WHEN THE BIG DAY ARRIVES

Be sure you are on time for your office audit. Be pleasant, but don't let your guard down. Listen carefully to the auditor's questions, and consider your answer before making it. Skilled IRS auditors can ask probing questions in the hope of identifying other problem areas on your tax return.

When responding to the auditor's questions, do not elaborate or offer unnecessary explanations. Finally, be sure to provide requested documents in an organized and businesslike manner. Sloppy records give the IRS the impression that errors may have been made on your tax return.

So that you know what can and can't be expected of you during the audit process, the MACPA urges you to read IRS Publication 1, "Your Rights as a Taxpayer."

Housing trend rising so far in 1995

Michigan 1995 housing project starts are up 8.8 percent over 1994 and February project starts were up 14.8 percent over January, according to figures just out from the Michigan Association of Home Builders.

"1995 seems to be bucking the trend so far," commented Bob Woodard, president of the home builders association. "(This year) has started out better than both 1993 and 1994. However, 1994 really took off in the months of March, April and May. At this point we still do not expect 1995 to top 1994."

Fixed-rate mortgages dipped to 8.8 percent in February from 9.22 percent in January. Lumber prices also fell in February from \$387 to \$371 per 1,000 board feet. Last

year at this time lumber prices were \$457.

The following information appeared in the MAHB New Residential Construction Report, February, 1995:

• **Oakland County** - For year-to-date, the 1995 construction value was \$97.2 million as compared to \$99.1 in 1994, a 1.9 percent decrease. For February 1995, 314 units were built, valued at \$41.4 million, compared to 588 in January, value at \$55.8, a decrease of 46.6 percent in construction, and a decrease of 25.8 percent in value. The number of units for year-to-date 1995 was 902, compared to 881 for the same time period in 1994, a 2.4 percent increase.

• **Wayne County** - For January, 1995, 325 units were built and 259 were built for February, a decrease of 20.3 percent. The value in January, 1995, went from \$27.2 million to \$23.7 million in February, 1995, a decrease of 12.9 percent. For the same time period, 333 units were constructed in 1994 compared to 615 in 1995, an 84.7 percent increase. There was a 66.5 percent increase in the year-to-date dollar value, from \$32.8 million in 1994 to \$54.6 million in 1995.

• **Livingston County** - The year-to-date construction cost for 1995 was \$14 million as compared to the same time period in 1994, which was \$12.4 million, an increase of 12.9 percent. Fifty-four

units were constructed in January 1995, at a cost of \$4.8 million. In February, 1995, 64 units were built at \$6.7 million, an increase of 39.6 percent. For year-to-date, a total of 130 units were built in 1994, and 131 in 1995, a .8 percent increase.

Get help when selling your home



Kim Thomas Capello

Dear Kim Thomas Capello:
My husband and I are thinking of selling our home this spring. We have thought about selling "By Owner," as opposed to paying the high commission costs charged by a real estate broker. What risks are associated with selling our home ourselves, and what other costs are associated with the sale of our home besides a brokerage commission?

With the help of other professions, a homeowner can sell his/her home without listing the home with a real estate agent, and paying a brokerage commission. Risks are always associated with the purchase or sale of home.

For most people, their home is the single largest investment they will ever make. The risks are there, whether one hires a real estate agent or sells their home themselves. The risks can always be reduced by retaining the services of a good real estate professional who will work on a flat fee or hourly basis.

Costs incurred by individuals who sell their

home without the assistance of a real estate agent, are advertisement costs, professional fees (i.e., attorney fees) and possibly a closing fee charged by the Title Insurance Company. These fees should, however, be less than one-fifth of the cost of commissions (given an average sales price of \$100,000).

If you do choose to sell your home on your own, the first thing to do is determine the value of your house. The assessed value for tax purposes is usually lower than the true market value.

Contact a few local real estate companies and tell them that you are interested in selling your home. Most companies would appreciate the opportunity to speak with a prospective client, and give you a cost-free market analysis.

The next step is to prepare a marketing strategy. If you are unable to get prospective purchasers to your doorstep, you need not worry about preparing an offer, ordering title insurance and attending a closing. You will have costs associated with marketing, such as signage costs and advertisements.

Be prepared to hand interested purchasers a blank form Buy-Sell Agreement, which can be obtained from a local attorney or a title insurance company.

The standard agreement is just that: standard and general, to meet the general terms of any sale. The sale of your home is unique. Those terms will not address all of the particu-

lar conditions of your sale.

A professional should be contacted prior to signing the Buy-Sell Agreement. A few dollars spent now, could save you several in the future, and make the rest of the transaction run more smoothly. Attorney fees should run anywhere from \$450 to \$650.

Once the Buy-Sell Agreement has been signed by all parties, many things must take place before the day the money actually changes hands.

The seller must order a commitment for title insurance. A fee will not be charged until the day of the closing when the actual insurance policy will be ordered. Some insurance companies may charge additional closing costs for FSBO ("For Sale By Owner") transactions.

If you have not retained the services of an attorney, ask the Title Insurance Company if it will prepare the Closing Statement, Warranty Deed and other closing documents, and what fee will be charged for those services. If any. These fees can run anywhere from \$100 to \$200, plus the costs of the title insurance.

End of the line for Brooklane

Developer's plans call for Northville course to be replaced by a subdivision

One of the area's best short courses will soon make way for development.

Brooklane, a 4,000-yard executive course, is slated to become a new subdivision within the next few years. General Manager/Golf Professional John Koch said it's just a matter of time before the Northville Township links are bulldozed.

"It hasn't been finalized," he commented. "But it's going to be sold to (Gary Sakwa) or someone else for real estate."

Brooklane opened at Sheldon and Six Mile roads in 1963 as a nine-hole course. A second nine was cut through the woods a few years later.

Ross B. Northrup owned and operated the links until he passed away. The 80-acre course went over to his trust and was put up for sale shortly afterwards.

Sakwa, a Farmington Hills developer, purchased an option on the land about a year ago. Since then

he's approached township officials with several plans for the site.

One called for some of Brooklane's original holes to be saved and for others to be constructed on adjacent land. In all, nine holes would have been maintained and a 280-lot subdivision built around it.

That idea was shot down by the township board of trustees in January. Sakwa brought a new concept to the town planning officials in early April.

A total of 130 large-lot upscale homes are called for under the new plan, which would not preserve Brooklane at all.

Koch said getting that plan through various township approvals will be a "long process." In the meantime, Brooklane will be open as usual.

"We won't let the course go down the tubes," said Koch, who's been with the course nearly three decades. "We'll keep it up and running."

He predicted that Brooklane will be open through next golfing sea-

son. Uncertainty has already hurt business, however.

About a third of the course's leagues have left, Koch said.


"We lost some leagues due to the confusion," he admitted.

Over the years, Brooklane has

catered to ladies, seniors and mixed couple leagues. In an attempt to lure back golfers, Koch said he has created a beginner's league.

Also, Brooklane will feature open

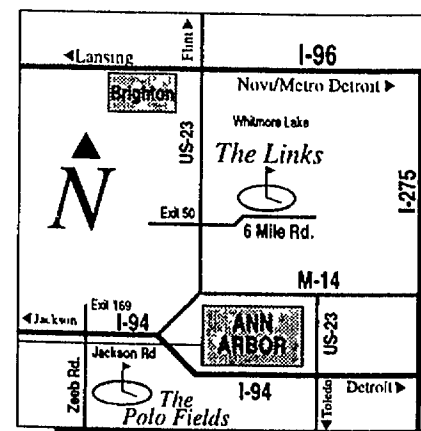

prime time golfing.

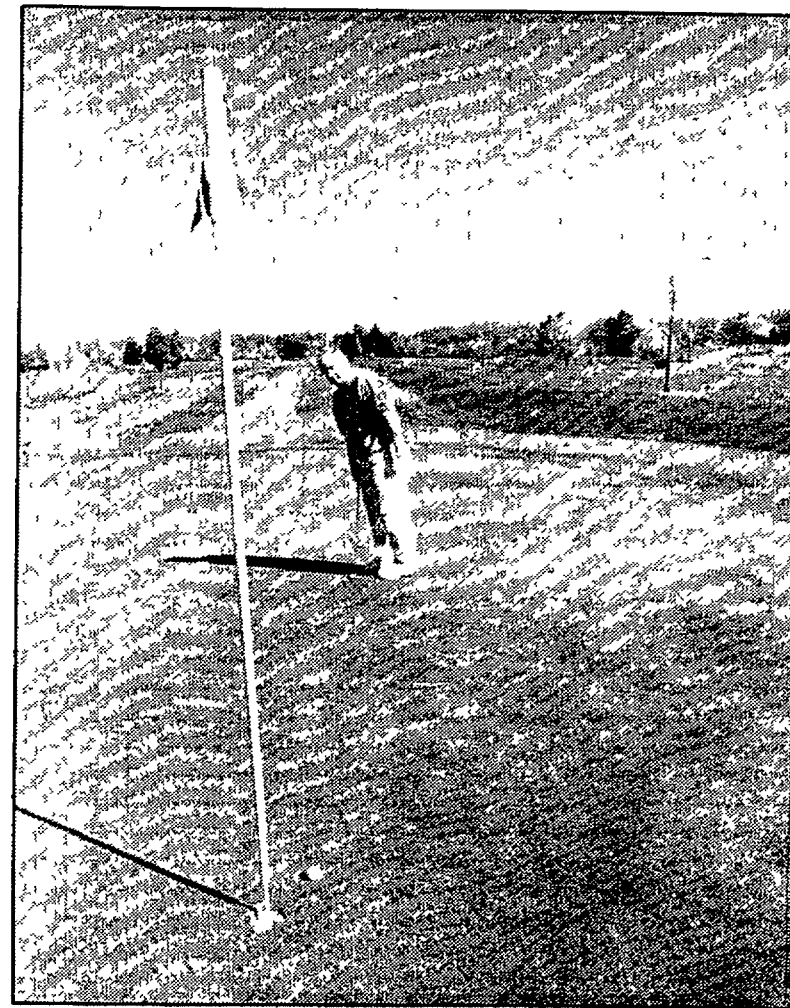

A place where memories were made

It takes more than Main Streets, subdivisions and shopping malls to define a community.

Rather you must look at the people within its borders. And a good measure of people is what they do in their spare time.

Do they read, do they write, do they go for walks or exercise? How do they recreate?

Northville Township residents are about to have one less recreational option. That's because Brooklane Golf Course has a future date with the wrecking ball.

Progress is coming to Sheldon Road. Where fairways and putting greens now stand, brand new homes and Maple streets will sprout up in a few years.

You'll have to pardon me for sounding a little sore. But I, along with many others in town, I'm sure, have a personal attachment to Brooklane. This is where I learned to play golf.

It's not a fancy course. It wasn't designed by Arnold Palmer or Pete Dye.

Rather it's farm land turned into links. It's hills and ravines, a tiny creek that guards the par-3s and apple trees that line a fairway.

Jack Nicklaus, Fred Couples or Ben Crenshaw have never graced the tees at Brooklane, either. But a lot of Mikes, Bobs, Janes and Lindas have played here, had some fun and even a laugh or two at their own ineptness.

For me, it was the perfect place to learn the game.

The holes aren't too long. The first four holes, well, what use to be the first four holes when I was growing up, are all under 200 yards.

I remember being so excited on a Friday night, when I was about 11 or 12-years-old, because my dad and I were going to play on Saturday morning.

I had a particular blue shirt I'd wear to golf in. We often stopped for a doughnut on the way out

to the course, too.

By the time I got to the first tee I was so hyped up I could hardly hit the ball. It always took a few holes to settle down.

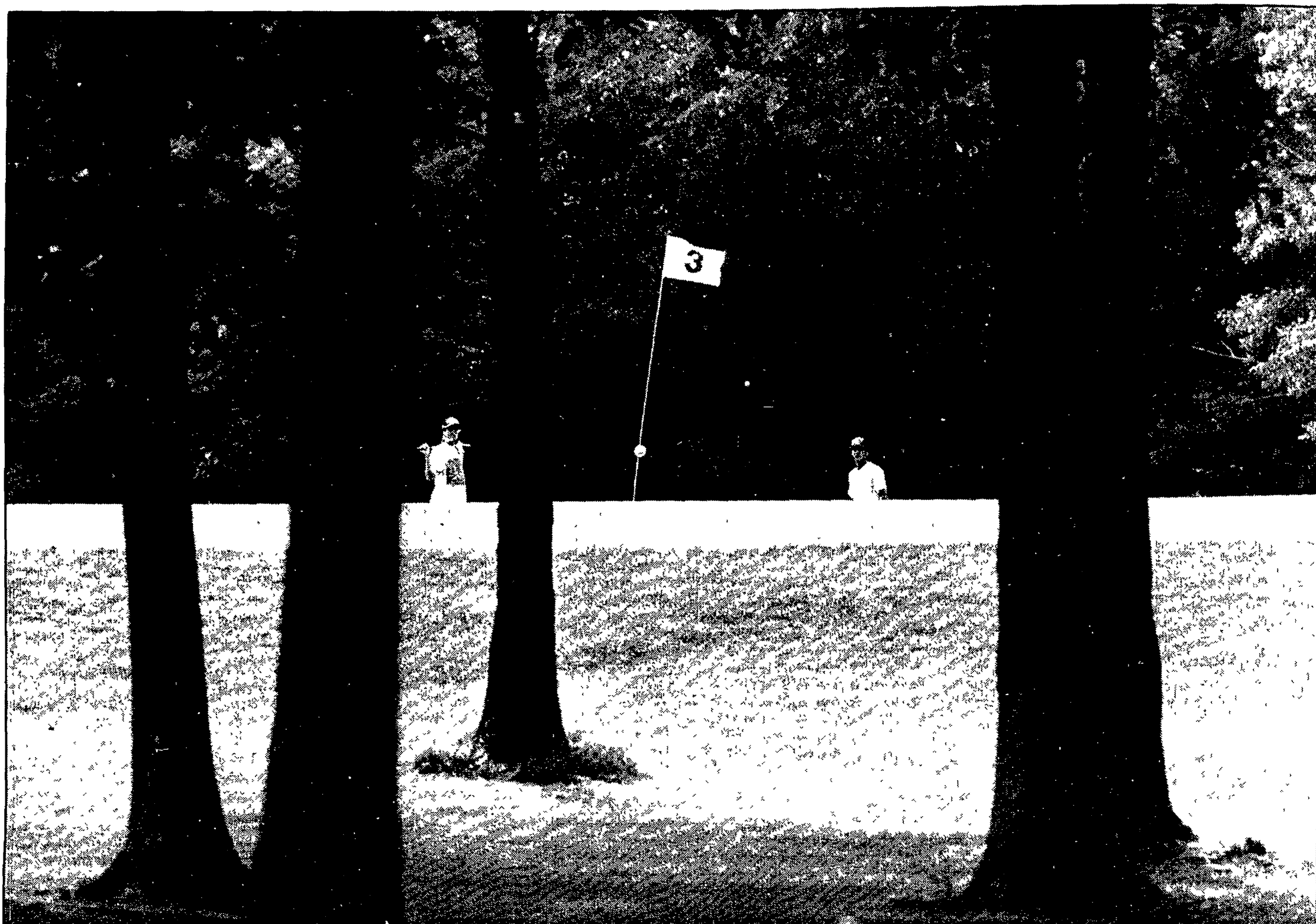
One of the best parts of golfing at Brooklane was meeting and playing with new people.

It was interesting to see how other folks swung at the ball and approached the game. I learned a lot from observing both the good players and the hackers.

So when I learned of Brooklane's fate it made me a little sad. It also made me wonder how many youngsters would miss out on the fun and lessons I learned at the course.

Now I've never been one to stand in the way of progress. And it's likely the land Brooklane sits on will make a wonderful neighborhood for someone.

But there's a price to pay for development. For Northville Township, it's a piece of its history and a place where memories are made.

Looking for some great golf?

Here are our picks for the 18 best holes on Livingston County's public courses

Do you like to play golf? Or do you really like to play golf?

If you're one of those people who *really* likes to play golf you might enjoy mapping out a golfing safari this summer of the best holes on Livingston County's often-spectacular golf courses.

Every golfer has his or her own favorite holes, of course. But here's our list of the Livingston's top 18 holes. Give 'em a try. You may find that you agree with our choices, or you may develop your own list.

WHISPERING PINES

#1 • 425 yards, par 4

A great opening hole which can set the tone for the rest of your round. The elevated tee gives you a great chance to hit a big driver. Following the blind tee shot, your approach

shot shouldn't be much more than a wedge. After hitting your approach, you ring a bell to signal that the fairway is clear. The green is tricky but fair.

DAMA GOLF CLUB

#17 • 314 yards, par 4

Leave your driver in the bag on this compact par 4. This slight dogleg right brings you out of a wooded chute. A drive of more than 210 yards will do you more harm than good. An approach of roughly 100 yards is left after teeing off with a long iron or short wood. Water lurks menacingly along the right to discourage cutting the corner.

RUSH LAKE HILLS

#3 • 311 yards, par 4

This hole was redesigned recently

by longtime course superintendent Jim Puckett. It doesn't play long, but you've got to throw darts to make par on this dogleg left. The fairway is guarded by bunkers on either side and there's also sand around the rolling green. A 200-yard tee shot and a good wedge put you in good position for a birdie.

THE MAJESTIK AT LAKE WALDEN

#6 • 335 yards, par 4

One of the most picturesque holes in the state. This hole is short but uphill off the tee. Woods on both sides and sand to the left are incentive to keep the ball in the fairway. The long, narrow green is nearly surrounded by a huge horseshoe mound. The view from the green back to Lake Walden is breathtak-

ing.

OAK POINTE CHAMPIONSHIP COURSE

#6 • 523 yards, par 5

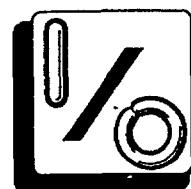
A straight hole which blends in beautifully with the terrain of the course. This 5-hole tempts you into trying to reach the elevated green in two, especially if you blast your blind tee shot. A drive of more than 250 yards will clear a large mound and pick up several extra yards. An errant drive is trouble.

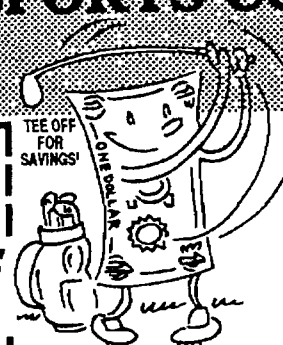

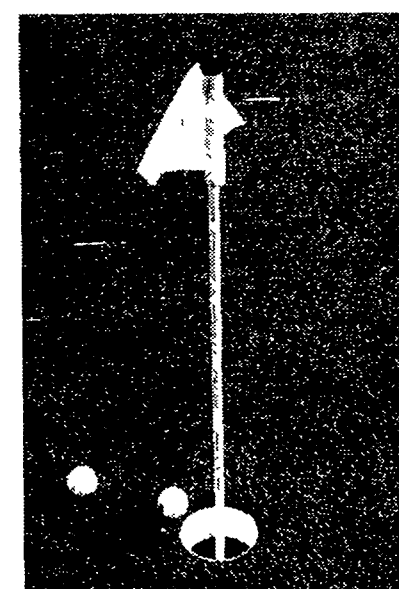

corner? That is the question on this right-angle dogleg left. You can try to boom a driver over the tall trees at the corner, but falling short kills any chance at a birdie. A long iron off the tee followed by a short iron approach is the prudent way to play, but cutting the corner is tempting.

MARION OAKS

#15 • 539 yards, par 5

A big dogleg to the right that will test every part of your game. The trademark Marion Oaks flowers flank both sides of the fairway off the tee to keep you from cutting the corner. Reaching the green in two is nearly impossible due to a large hill on the right. After your blind second shot, an approach to the elevated green must carry a bunker.

OAK POINT CHAMPIONSHIP COURSE

#17 • 416 yards, par 4

This dogleg right is an up-and-down affair. A series of hills make for severe elevation changes. The key to this hole is the tee shot. The fairway slopes right toward thick woods. Position is everything on this very narrow, tree-lined hole. Hitting the elevated green from the rough is tough, so a drive to the left is needed.

IRONWOOD

#12 • 339 yards, par 4

It's easy to get bent out of shape on this slippery hole. From the new tee box, your drive needs to steer clear of a pair of ponds on the right. The trees on the left are adept at swatting down any tee shots sprayed that direction. Unless you're in the center of the fairway, there is no straight shot to the green. Consider par a good score here.

THE MAJESTIC AT LAKE WALDEN

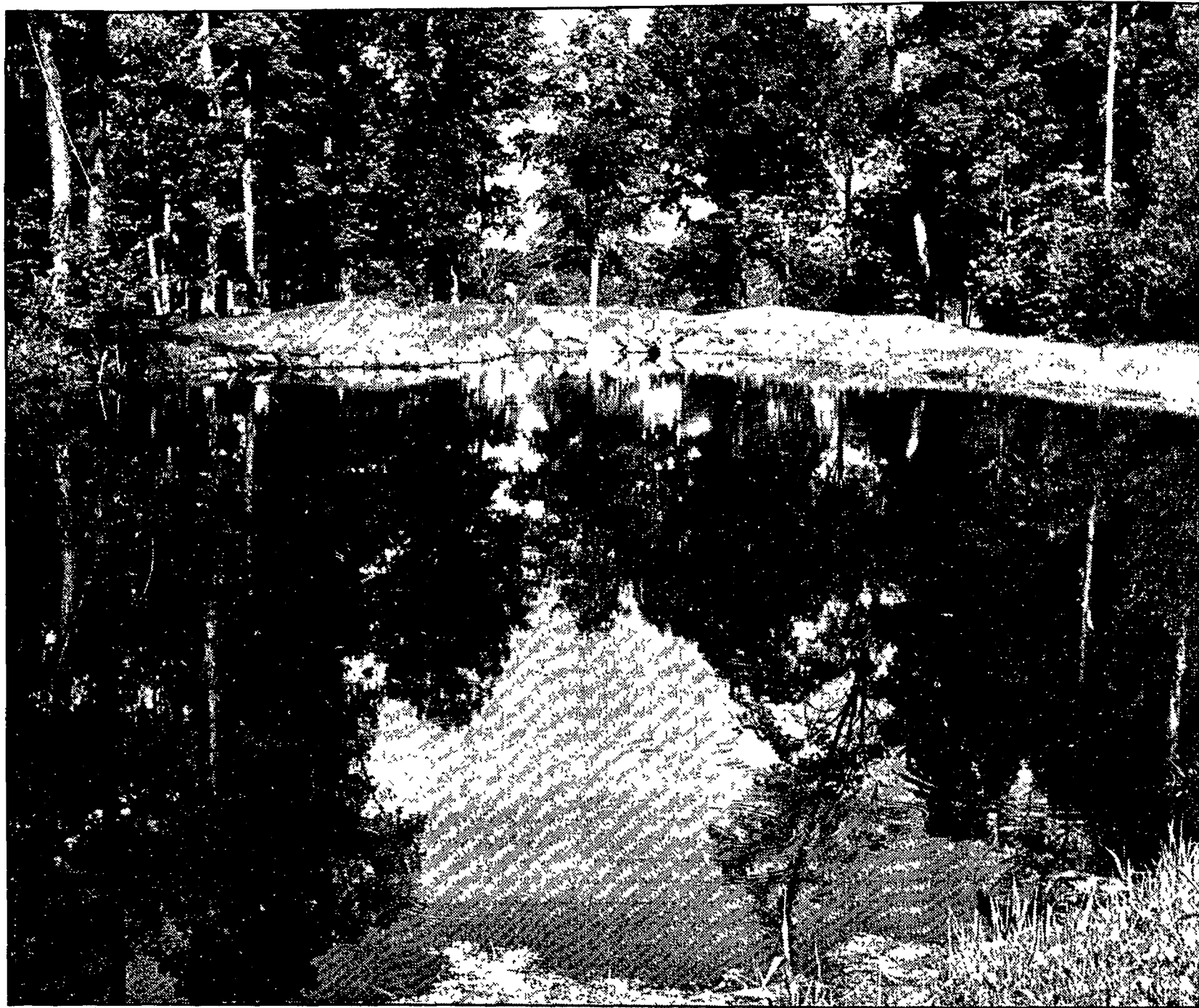
#9 • 390 yards, par 4

A long driving dream. The tee box is elevated high above the rest of the hole, which slopes toward Lake Walden. The view from the tee is spectacular, but concentrate on keeping your drive in the fairway. There's plenty of sand, including an especially nasty, very deep bunker guarding the front left of the large green.

RUSH LAKE

#16 • 548 yards, par 5

Duffers face a true uphill challenge on this dogleg left. This hole is uphill from tee to green, making it play more like a 600-plus yard hole. Making the green in two is not a possibility for all but the longest hitters. In fact, it can sometimes take

three solid shots just to get close to the green on this No. 1 handicap hole.

THE MAJESTIC AT LAKE WALDEN

#25 • 175 yards, par 3

You'll feel like you're standing on top of the world, or at least Hartland, when you address your tee shot. The green is nearly 100 feet lower than the tee, making for a delicate shot with a short iron. Bunkers around the green make you pay for inaccuracy with a difficult second shot. Winds can play havoc with your tee shot.

WHISPERING PINES

#12 • 425 yards, par 4

A good hole for golfers and for boaters. Two ponds are squarely in play on this most difficult hole. A good tee shot will avoid the water on the left. An approach shot with a long iron needs to carry another pond, though there is a bail-out area to the right. Mid- to high-handicappers should be more than happy with a five on this monster.

IRONWOOD

#9 • 311 yards, par 4

There are many ways to attack — and get into trouble — on this hole. The elevated tee box makes hitting your driver seem like a good idea, but the hole runs downhill to a large, unforgiving pond. There's water short and to the right, while M-59 is an easy target on the left. Driving with an iron leaves you an approach over that pond to a large green.

WOODLANDS

#16 • 411 yards, par 4

You'll need all aspects of your game to be sharp if you want to get a good score. The water in front of the tee is the least of your troubles as you tee off out of a chute. This hole is uphill from tee to green, making it difficult to make par if you miss the fairway with your drive. The green slopes from back to front and is heavily bunkered.

HARTLAND GLEN

#9 • 240 yards, par 4

There aren't too many par fours that play much shorter than this one. Still, the potential for disaster is everywhere on this little dandy.

There's water off the tee, trees all around and bunkers by the green. If you need to pick up a couple strokes at the end of your round, this hole gives you the chance.

DUNHAM HILLS

#11 • 447 yards, par 4

This hole plays straight, but there are plenty of obstacles on your way to the interesting green. There's a pond to the left of the fairway at the 230-yard mark and woods all along the right to heavily penalize wayward tee shots. The green is elevated and circled by high banks. Approach shots hit left or long may be kicked back to the green.

MARION OAKS

#3 • 537 yards, par 5

Your second shot should be longer than your drive on this severe dogleg left. A drive of 220 yards should carry from the elevated tee to the landing area over a deep gully, avoiding the woods to both sides. Then you can let the big dog eat, attacking the green with a fairway wood or your driver. This hole produces many birdies — and many others.

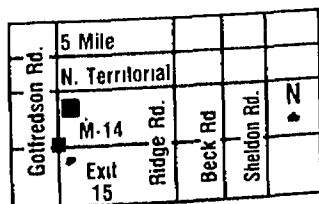

The pathway to heaven

If you're a golfer, things just don't get much better than Tanglewood

The pathway to heaven for the golf enthusiast starts at Ten Mile in South Lyon and ends at the mouth of The Lion.

The Tanglewood Golf Community, located on West Ten Mile in the heart of golf country, is trying its darndest to live up to its name. Tanglewood and its feature course, The Lion, has been a popular facility with refined golfers over the years but the club is making some changes and additions which will virtually make it a one-stop shop for golf enthusiasts within the next few years.

When the entire golf community at Tanglewood is completed — an event which should happen by the year

2000 according to club pro Brian Boeling — golfers will be able to live, eat, sleep and, of course, engage in their favorite sport ... without having to leave the Tanglewood property.

Approximately 400 luxury homes, some ranging in price from \$750,000 to \$1 million in the St. Andrews subdivision near the course, will be completed in the area within the next five years. About 75 homes are currently completed, according to Boeling, and many actually sit on the edge of the front nine at The Lion.

The 18-hole course, known for its challenging, long-distance holes, is owned by Ken and Bob Freund who have transformed Tanglewood into one of the top courses in the area since they purchased it in 1991.

Boeling was hired as the course pro last spring, and he's wasted no time putting his mark on the club. "We wanted to have more of a country club atmosphere but at the same time have a very serviceable club," Boeling said.

He's worked diligently to redesign the club's pro shop and he said he's not nearly done yet. A 10,000-foot addition to the clubhouse and pro shop area is currently in the works. And Boeling hopes to have the shop listed among the top 100 in the country by next spring.

The most talked about and anticipated change at Tanglewood will come later this summer, however. A brand new nine-hole course has been designed on the northwest corner of the Tanglewood property. A

grand opening is planned sometime in August.

Bill Newcomb, who designed the back nine at Tanglewood, put together the plans for the new course, and Boeling said the designer has outdone himself this time.

"This is a more scenic championship course," Boeling said.

The signature holes on the new course will be No. 6 and No. 7. The sixth hole is designed like the lower peninsula of Michigan including models of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron surrounding the green. It culminates with the thumb area which is the putting green on the hole.

A 75-foot replica of the Mackinac

"One reason is because we're trying to go after some more major golf tournaments," Boeling said. "And we're also booked solid right now. Our course is immaculate. The course supervisor (Red Bell) works his butt off, and we have to turn away a lot of golfers."

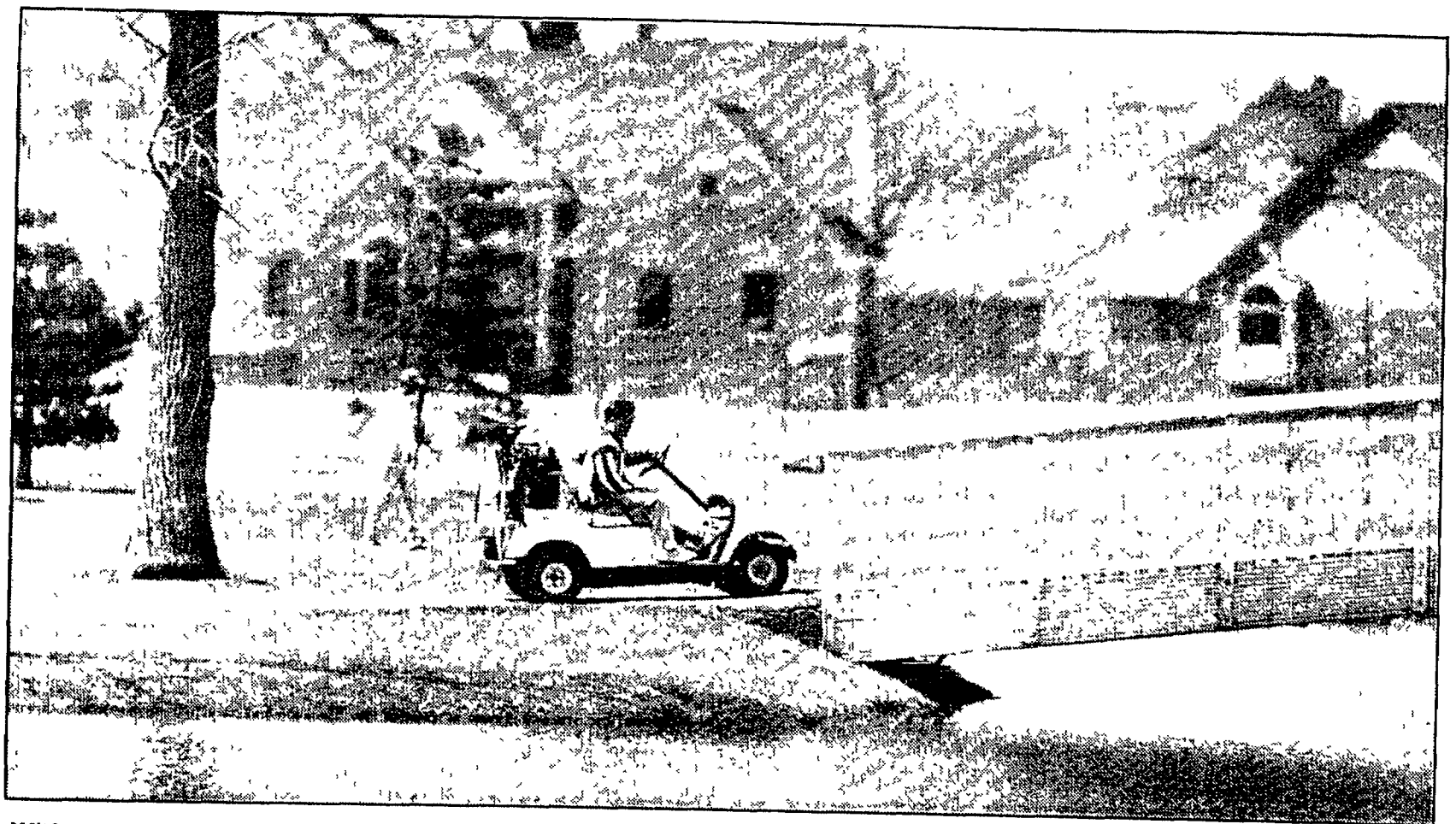

Visitors to Tanglewood this season will not only have the new nine to look forward to, they'll also have quite a treat once they finish their rounds.

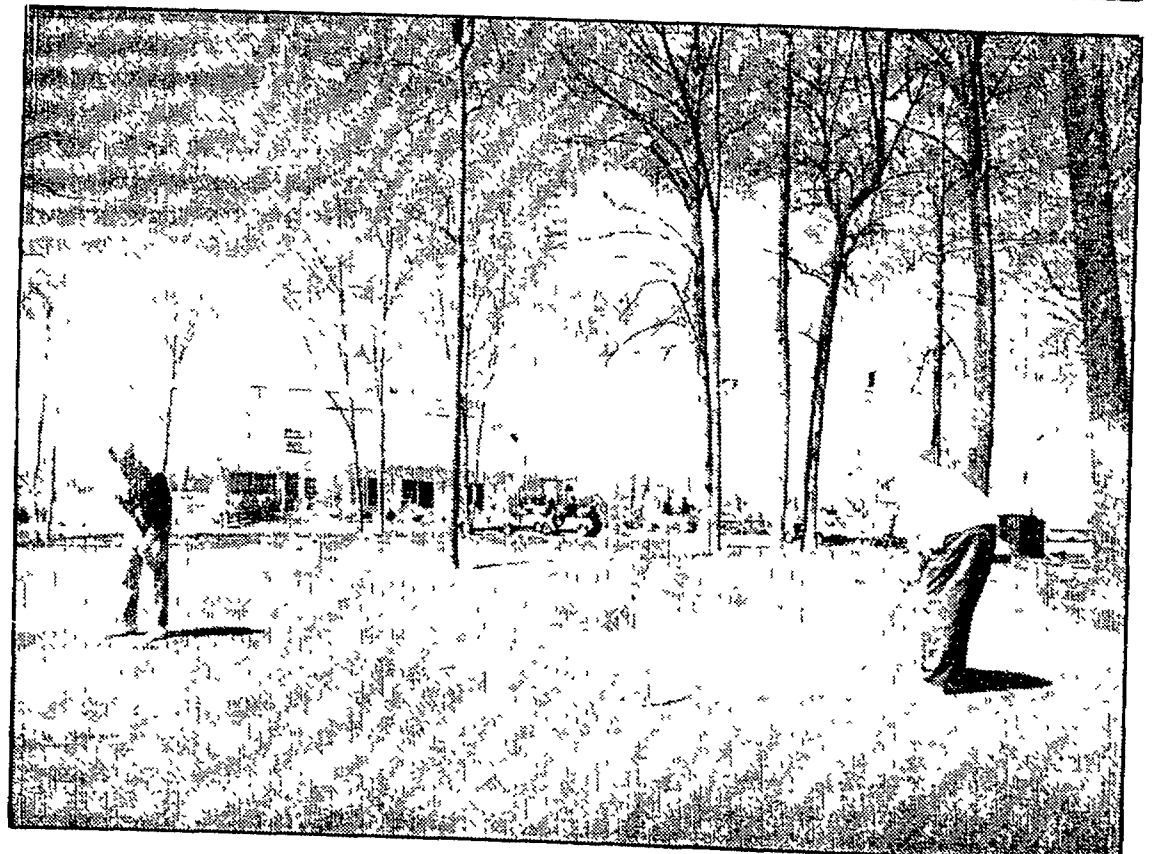

Regular exercise is important in later years

Every morning at 6:30 Mort Glickenhau can be found in the gym of his Boston apartment building steadily working his way through 45 minutes on a treadmill while listening to the morning news on his headset. At age 65, he is about to retire from a demanding regular work schedule, but he has no intention of retiring from the physical activity that he says has kept stress, weight and blood pressure down and energy up.

"My cardiologist says I never have a problem passing the stress test," says Glickenhau. "Daily exercise keeps me fit

and relieves tension."

Having a hard time keeping up with the grandkids? Is lugging a bag of groceries from the car to the kitchen a strain? If you aren't incorporating an exercise routine into your life, the experts say, you aren't taking advantage of a natural fountain of youth that can stave off some age-related problems like arthritis, osteoporosis and heart disease.

A recent study published in the American Journal of Public Health confirmed the benefits of an active lifestyle for seniors. A six-year look at nearly 5,000 men and women over age 65 showed that vigorous physical exercise cut their risk of death by one-half to two-thirds after three years and

reduced the likelihood of their developing disabling physical problems.

Today there are more than 50 million Americans over the age of 55 and increasing numbers are participating in activities that range from exercise walking to weight training.

They're swimming and jogging, playing tennis and golf, and enrolled in aerobics and yoga classes. They are finding that they have more flexibility and strength, more energy and even sleep better at night.

HOW TO START

Last year, Dr. Maria Fiartrone reported that 100 residents of the Hebrew Rehabilitation Center for Aged in Boston who par-

ticipated in a four-year study more than doubled their leg muscle strength using exercise machines. If 85-year-old residents of a retirement home can successfully take up resistance training, you know it's never too late to begin and benefit from an exercise program.

Whether you choose weight training or walking — or both — when you first start out, start slow and be consistent. Dr. S. Terry Canale, a sports medicine orthopedist and chief of staff at Campbell Clinic in Memphis, Tenn., emphasizes that it's important to do something physical every day.

He offers advice for beginning exercisers that suits any activity:

- Don't start an exercise program that overwhelms you.
- Choose activities you like. Don't force yourself to do something you don't want to do.
- Combine exercise and social time. Walk or golf with a friend, join an exercise class, participate on a team.
- Make exercise a normal part of your daily routine.
- No pain, no gain is out. Listen to your body. If you feel pain or fatigue, lighten up.
- Warm up and cool down gradually with stretches and slow movements.
- Use proper equipment, especially shoes.

Seniors should also consider combining activities for the best overall effect. Even if you are involved in some kind of aerobic activity, you may not be fully strengthening your body. Fitness experts are recommending that weight training be incorporated into an exercise program to avoid the weakening of muscles that comes with age.

But before determining your activity of choice, check with your doctor. Aerobic exercise alone may be enough exercise for people with mild hypertension. Strength training, which counters muscle loss and builds bone density, may be a good addition for others.

PUMPING THE HEART

One of the easiest heart-warming activities to start and least expensive to maintain is walking. And not only does it get your heart pumping, it can be a time to catch up socially with friends.

Evie Glickenhau, Mort's 60-year-old wife, has a standing date with a friend several times a week during nonwinter months that takes them from a busy Boston street to a lush reservoir path that they circle twice before heading back. Door to door, they walk six miles.

"We talk and the time goes by very briskly," she says. "It's my social time of the day and my exercise time."

University of Florida researchers found that men and women ages 60 to 79 who participated in either a moderate- or high-intensity 45-minute walking program for six months significantly reduced their blood pressure.

Another study, conducted by researchers in North Carolina, monitored the sleep of a group of older adults. Those who were involved in aerobic walking, or other aerobic sports such as jogging, tennis, swimming and bicycling, fell asleep sooner, woke less during the night and slept more deeply than their sedentary counterparts.

While walking is a pretty safe activity, fitness experts nonetheless recommend a good five-minute stretch before and after a walk that focuses on the Achilles' heel, quadriceps, hamstring and groin.

Of course, stretching doesn't have to be simply a prelude and conclusion to a workout. Hatha yoga, which incorporates gentle movement with breathing and relaxation techniques, can help build strength, flexibility and stamina.

If you can't get to a class or prefer to work out in the privacy of your home, check out what's available in the local video or bookstore. One book to look for is "Yoga for the Young at Heart" by Susan Winter Ward (Capra Press). It offers a one-hour program geared for seniors and 40 instructional photos. Ward also has a video companion available.

Another way to get the heart beating faster — and increase flexibility — is to do

low-impact aerobics. Most communities across the country have a variety of class offerings through health clubs and senior centers. And, of course, videos by entertainers such as Angela Lansbury, Rita Moreno and Debbie Reynolds have proved popular for those who like to stay at home for their workouts.

KEEPING ON TRACK

Whether you go for a morning swim or evening jog, or just a walk around the block, the bottom line is to choose an activity or combination of activities that you enjoy and will participate in regularly.

Need motivation? Check out "Ten Million Steps" by 73-year-old runner Paul Reese (WRS Publishing), who recounts his experience as the oldest person to finish a transcontinental run across the United States. Averaging 26 miles a day for 124 days, Reese says he made the run for fellow seniors.

"I was determined to do it without stopping for a day off," Reese said in an interview with New Choices magazine. "I wanted to show older people that they can do a lot more than they think they can."

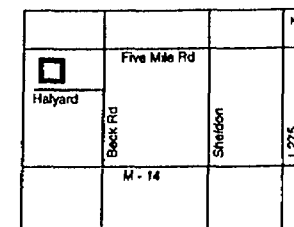

Turn your tax-deferred account into investment for your heirs

Will your individual retirement account pass away when you do?

Or will it live on as a tax-sheltered investment for your heirs?

Millions of Americans have been stashing money away in individual retirement accounts since 1975, when they were created by Congress to encourage individuals to save for their retirement.

IRAs offer a big incentive for savers. Not only are contributions tax-deductible for some taxpayers, account earnings compound on a tax-deferred basis — and thus grow faster than equivalent taxable investments.

An IRA owner pays no income taxes on an IRA account until withdrawal begins, usually in annual increments starting after age 59 but not later than age 70.

As the U.S. population ages, a growing number of people must make important decisions about how to manage and distribute their IRAs.

Unfortunately, say tax and pension experts, most IRA owners are unaware that choices made now will determine what becomes of their IRAs upon their death.

An IRA account can either be passed on to heirs, continuing to grow tax-deferred for a time. Or it will be dissolved, leaving heirs with the account balance — and an income tax bill.

"I fear a lot of decisions are made by default and out of ignorance," says Jeffrey Keyser, national director of personal tax services for Deloitte & Touche in Cincinnati.

Although the Internal Revenue Service would like to discourage taxpayers from passing on tax-sheltered nest eggs from one generation to another, those who know the rules can do just that, Keyser says.

"If you're interested in creating a tax-deferred investment for your heirs," says Keyser, "it's one of the few completely legal ways to do it."

Of course, many people will need all the money in their IRAs to support them during retirement. Leaving it to their heirs, therefore, should be a secondary consideration.

But IRA accounts no longer are just \$10,000 and \$20,000 nest eggs set up by frugal grandparents. They can contain substantial sums "rolled over" from the increasing number of workers' self-directed pension plans, such as a 401(k).

"This is probably one of the biggest planning issues in the country," says Seymour Goldberg, a professor of tax law at Long Island University and an expert on IRA regulations. "We're talking trillions of dollars in IRA accounts."

Dale Stevens, an accredited pension administrator, says most of the "portable pensions" prevalent in the workplace of the 1990s eventually will roll over into IRAs.

"There are very substantial IRAs out there," Stevens says. "Certainly we're seeing more and more IRAs being passed on to the next generation."

But learning the myriad of IRA options is not easy for the average taxpayer, or even for tax experts. The rules governing

IRAs fill 60 pages of fine print.

"These are very, very complicated rules," says Curt Welker, a certified public accountant. "There are exceptions to the exceptions."

Goldberg, who has written one of the only detailed guidebooks to IRA regulations, says many professional advisers can't keep up with the maze of rules. And officials at financial institutions where IRA accounts are maintained often provide incorrect information.

"Don't rely on your bank or mutual fund to give you the answer," Goldberg says. "You may get bad advice."

Taxpayers with substantial assets (more than \$600,000) or complicated finances should seek help from a tax expert or lawyer knowledgeable in managing their IRAs.

And even those of modest means or those far from retirement should learn the basics. Deloitte & Touche developed an IRA distribution choices table for that purpose.

"The good news is that the majority of cases are covered by the situations in the table," says Keyser.

He notes, too, that most so-called qualified pension plans, such as 401(k)s and Keoghs, are governed by these same distribution rules.

There are two important decisions an IRA owner must make that determine what happens upon the owner's passing.

The first is selecting one or more beneficiaries, often done when an account is first opened. But the beneficiary who inherits the IRA can be changed at any time during the account owner's life.

The other choice is how the IRA will be distributed once the owner begins withdrawing from it.

However, the two choices must be weighed together, because they influence how money is withdrawn both during the IRA owner's lifetime and thereafter.

DISTRIBUTIONS

Generally, an IRA owner can begin taking distributions after age 59. (Taking them earlier can result in substantial penalties.)

However, many people prefer to postpone their payouts as long as they can, to continue growing their investment tax-deferred.

But the IRS requires an IRA holder to begin withdrawals by April 1 of the year after the year the owner reaches age 70.

These are minimum annual withdrawals. That is, the IRA owner can take out more than the minimum distribution, but no more than \$150,000 per year without penalty.

"The trick is to try to make these payments as small as possible so there's money left in the pot," says accountant and consultant John Aaron.

The following are two methods of determining the minimum distributions, based on life expectancy. But once you pick one, you must stick with it:

- **Recalculation.** The IRA owner opts to recalculate his or her life expectancy every year. Because life expectancy increases the longer a person lives, this method allows

long-lived individuals to stretch out their payments.

For example, the IRS deems life expectancy at age 70 to be 16 years more. Thus an individual starting withdrawal then would be required to take out a minimum of one-sixteenth of the account the first year.

Life expectancy is then recalculated each year according to an IRS table, and the proportionate minimum withdrawal made. By age 80, the IRA owner's life expectancy would be 9.5 years more, or age 89. The minimum withdrawal that year would be the balance divided by 9.5.

This method could be essential to someone who fears outliving retirement funds.

- **Term certain.** With this method, withdrawals are taken over a fixed term — the life expectancy determined when payouts begin. Thus, the IRA owner who begins distribution at age 70 would be required to take payouts over 16 years — a minimum 1/16th of the account the first year, then 1/15th the next year, and so on.

The disadvantage with this method is that you could outlive your IRA. But the advantage is that the IRA can be passed on to your heirs or your estate, and they can continue to take the payouts according to your life-expectancy schedule.

In making distributions, you also have the choice of using your life expectancy alone or the joint life expectancy of you and your beneficiary.

By naming a younger beneficiary, you can stretch out the distribution period. However, the IRS limits this extension with a special formula that considers a nonspouse beneficiary to be no more than 10 years younger than the IRA owner.

Thus, at age 70, a grandmother and her beneficiary, a 10-year-old grandson, have a joint life expectancy under the formula of 26.2 years. The following year, according to the formula, it is 25.3 years, then 24.4 years and so forth.

When the grandmother passes away, the grandson can recalculate the distribution based on a formula that closely mirrors his life expectancy, even if it's as long as 60 or 70 years.

BENEFICIARIES

The second major choice for IRA holders is naming a beneficiary. While the beneficiary can be changed at any time, even after distribution begins, the decision should be made carefully.

"The choice is very important because you don't know when you're going to die," says Harold Small, an accredited estate planning attorney and CPA.

"Like a will or a trust, a beneficiary designation should be reviewed from time to time," Small says. He suggests a review every two years, or after a major event such as marriage, birth, death or change in finances.

One important note: Although IRA owners can change beneficiaries once they have started taking required distributions after age 70, that choice cannot lengthen the distribution period.

In other words, the age of the beneficiary in place at the time distribution starts determines the maximum length for the

distribution schedule. Naming a younger joint beneficiary afterward won't stretch out the payments and naming an older beneficiary afterward could shorten them.

Here are the three categories of beneficiaries and what can happen to each upon the death of the IRA owner:

- **Spouse.** Naming a spouse as beneficiary usually is the simplest method for most people, and provides the greatest flexibility, says Keyser.

The surviving spouse has several options. But typically the most logical one is to roll the balance over into a new account in the spouse's name.

That allows the spouse to set up his or her own distribution method, essentially start the clock again, as the account owner. It also allows for the naming of new beneficiaries.

- **Other heirs.** If the IRA is left to a child, grandchild or heir other than a spouse, the beneficiary can often start the distribution clock running again based essentially on the beneficiary's life expectancy.

There are exceptions, however.

Take the case of an IRA owner who dies after starting mandatory withdrawals and opting for single rather than joint life expectancy in calculating term-certain withdrawals. The beneficiary must take withdrawals at least as rapidly as the term set by the IRA owner.

Had this same hypothetical IRA owner, using single life expectancy, opted for the life-expectancy recalculation method, the beneficiary would be out of luck. The IRA would have to be dissolved by the end of the year after the year of death.

Thus the key to lengthening the distribution period is for the IRA owner who begins withdrawals to calculate life expectancy jointly with a younger heir.

(If multiple beneficiaries are named, the age of the oldest prevails in refiguring life expectancy. To avoid that, IRA expert Goldberg suggests setting up separate IRAs, with a different beneficiary for each.)

Though the IRA account can be switched from one financial institution to another after the owner's death, it should be kept in the owner's name, Goldberg says.

Here is an example of what the IRA title should look like for an IRA passed from father to son: John Gordon, deceased (date of death, June 15, 1992); Thomas Gordon, designated beneficiary.

Some institutions balk at this, so be sure to check before transferring an IRA.

- **Estate:** What happens to an IRA passed on to an estate depends on the type of distribution method chosen.

If the IRA owner had begun mandatory payouts (after age 70) under the term-certain method, the heirs to the estate can continue taking the payout at the owner's rate or faster.

But if the recalculation method was employed, the IRA dies with the owner. The entire balance must be distributed by Dec. 31 of the year after the owner's death.

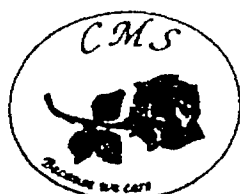

How to avoid the dreaded con artist

If you're an older adult, there's a con artist looking for you. The approach may be by telephone, mail or in person at your front door or in the parking lot near your bank. Of the estimated \$100 billion in fraud perpetrated each year, as many as 90 percent of the schemes against individuals are targeted to older adults.

The reasons are simple: You are probably home more than younger age groups, you are more trusting, you answer the telephone and will listen to telephone pitches, you read all mail — even junk mail — and you have more money than younger people. And if you're age 65 or older and are victim of a scam, you probably will not report the incident or loss, lest your children start to question your ability to handle financial affairs.

Most scam artists deal in a world of improbability and take their lies to older adults by telephone. Listen:

- "Congratulations, our sweepstakes computer has selected you as the winner of a new Cadillac or a trove of uncut gems — you are rich. Our sponsor guarantees your prize but has not funded the shipment and insurance. All you have to do is send your check for \$297.50 for the handling and shipping and the prize is yours!"

You disregard the facts that you did not enter the sweepstakes and that legitimate contest operators do not require that you send money for shipping or handling.

- "We need your help. I'm a bank examiner, and we suspect a teller at your bank is siphoning money from customer deposits. We need for you to draw some cash from your account that we may then use for a deposit. This way we can track the deposit and what we believe will be a theft. Your funds are protected, and for cooperating you'll share in a big cash reward."

You don't remember that for years you've heard about the bank examiner fraud but hear the message of cash reward. Bank examiners do not use customers in their investigations. The scam artists take your cash — from \$2,000 to \$20,000 or more — and disappear.

- "As you have arthritis, I want to share with you the news that the federal government and the American Medical Association have suppressed information on the one miracle treatment which will cure the disease. If everyone with arthritis used this medication, not only would they be cured, but tens of thousands of doctors, nurses and prescription drug manufacturers would be out of business. But I know how painful and debilitating arthritis can be, so I am calling people who really need the miracles that this new, natural medication can produce."

A scam? Most certainly. Dangerous? Probably. Costly? One of the most expensive medical con games in the business.

- "You have won a free trip for two to the Bahamas. But to ensure our sponsor that you are the true winner, we need some bank and credit card information."

This is a ruthless scam because there is no prize. But it is probable that charges will be

made to your credit card and drafts will be drawn on your bank, and you may not know about the rip-offs until you get your monthly statements.

A new study conducted by Princeton Survey Research Association for the American Association of Retired Persons, published in March 1994, reports that 34 percent of all consumers age 75 and older are very vulnerable to fraud and deception because they are less familiar with basic rules governing the marketplace and less suspicious of the prevalent, deceptive sales practices.

This ratio compares with 24 percent for people age 65 to 74, and only 7 percent for people 18 to 64. A sting operation concluded last year by the Federal Bureau of Investigation discovered that older people were the largest group targeted by nearly 100 illegal telemarketing operations.

Telephone scams operate from "boiler rooms," centers where pitch artists — working mainly from scripts — call individuals on lists bought from direct-mail and other solicitation companies.

The con artists may pitch investments, sweepstakes prizes, land offers, vacation bargains, medical cures or information; they may solicit contributions to send underprivileged kids to a circus or summer camp, or to fund programs to feed children in war-torn, Third World countries.

Most often, the investments are worthless, the prizes and vacation bargains nonexistent, the health cures quack, and if the charitable causes receive any funds, it is only after the telephone solicitors cream 90 percent off the top.

How do you recognize a potential fraud? Here are researched recommendations from law enforcement professionals:

- If the telephone solicitor is pressuring for an immediate commitment or if the offer sounds too good to be true, suspect a fraud.

If the pitch person won't send written information or provide a list of credible references, hang up. If someone calls you and for some prize or other reason wants personal financial and credit card information, refuse it.

Do not make any commitment on a first telephone call; never commit support or funds without first checking the offer.

- Examine carefully any "special offer" or "insider opportunity" by mail from an organization of which you are not a member or a company that you do not know.

- If someone comes to your door to deliver a "Social Security bonus check," know that the administration does not hand-deliver checks.

If approached in a shopping center parking lot about a "wallet full of money I just found," from which you are to share in the wealth after putting up some "earnest money cash," know that it is a "pigeon drop," a 1,000-year-old con game that originated in China. It is improbable in its premise but still fleeces thousands of older adults out of millions of dollars every year.

- At times of economic stress or national unrest, as are present in the nation today, the number and scope of scam operations multiply. Advances in technology make telephone scam operations easy. They can operate from

anywhere and move from one location to another almost overnight.

Simply stated, con artists have an advantage over older adults. The scam perpetrators will use any pretense, lie or scheme as they focus on taking your money. As an older adult, you don't have a full-time defense in place and operating to protect your money. You are not required to talk to everyone who calls; neither do you have to listen to or consider any offer that sounds suspicious.

If a letter promises "untold riches," consider that it may be better to miss an opportunity than to lose everything to a scam. If someone comes to your door with an uninvited "special offer," you have no obligation to invite him or her in for a talk.

How can you avoid potential fraud? Here are sources of information and action:

- Have your name removed from telemarketing and direct-mail lists. The Direct Marketing Association provides two valuable consumer services that will forward your request to be removed from mail and telephone lists. This will reduce the junk mail and calls from some reputable marketers and, significantly, from lists that may be sold to unscrupulous firms or con artists.

Write separate letters to Telephone Preference Service and the Direct Mail Preference Service, c/o Direct Marketing Association, 6 E. 43rd St., New York, NY 10017. Provide your name, address(es) and telephone number(s) in your letter, specifically requesting your removal from the lists. This is an important first step.

- Request a copy of the Consumer's Resource Handbook, free from the Consumer Information Center, Pueblo, CO

81009. This publication of the U.S. Office of Consumer Affairs contains hundreds of government, private, nonprofit and corporate consumer information and protection services.

- The National Fraud Information Center operates a toll-free telephone hot line providing consumers with information, referral services and assistance in filing complaints. Call: (800) 876-7060.

State attorneys general offices have fraud information, investigational and prosecuting units that share intelligence on scams and operators and their movements around the country.

This information is also offered to fraud units of local district attorneys' offices throughout the nation.

You will find them ready to assist, provide information and/or referral. Locate attorney general or district attorney offices in the government or white pages of your telephone book.

- The Better Business Bureau maintains national and local files on businesses that have been the subject of complaints. The contact number is listed in the white pages of the local telephone book.

Because most fraud is perpetrated across state lines, such investigations and prosecutions are among the most difficult in the criminal justice system.

In cases of in-person fraud, most perpetrators move actively from one area to another, making investigation and apprehension nearly impossible. Therefore, the mature adult must provide his or her own first line of defense against fraud, whether by telephone, mail or in person.

If the owner dies before the mandatory withdrawal start, the balance must be distributed by Dec. 31 of the year five years after the owner's death.

Clearly, leaving an IRA to a spouse or other heir, rather than an estate, gives the beneficiaries greater opportunity to lengthen the life of the IRA.

However, there are cases when naming the estate or a trust as beneficiary is preferable.

Any pension or IRA is considered part of an individual's estate. An estate worth more \$600,000 is subject to estate taxes.

A wealthy individual might want to name a trust rather than an individual as a means of avoiding estate taxes.

If the trust is irrevocable and meets certain other IRS requirements, the IRA can be passed on to a child or grandchild and continue to earn money tax-deferred during the heir's lifetime.

POINTS TO CONSIDER IN ESTATE PLANNING

- Remember that choices you make about IRA beneficiaries and distributions

not only affect you in your lifetime, but can determine whether your heirs inherit a valuable tax shelter. That sheltered money could be used to help them pay for a house, a college education or their own retirement.

- Get help from an expert. You can start with your family lawyer or tax accountant and get a referral if needed.

- Make sure your financial institution agrees to the distribution option you want.

Goldberg tells clients to make a written election and mail it to the institution, return receipt requested.

- If you want your child or grandchild to sustain the IRA after your death, put your wishes in writing.

- Don't look at your IRA by itself. John Aaron, a CPA, urges clients to consider it as part of a whole. "It's not adequate financial planning to look at each component by itself."

- If you have more than one IRA account, you can take the minimum distribution for the sum total of your IRAs from one account, preferably the lowest yielding one.

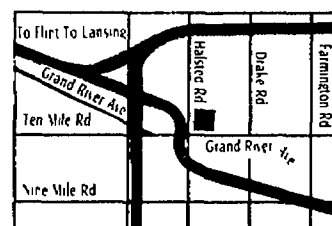

Looking your best for a lifetime

First of all, congratulate yourself. You look great. Want proof? Pull out your old family photo album and take a look at a wedding party picture circa 1950. If you're now the age of your Aunt Sadie or Uncle Phil you'll see a vast difference between that image and your reflection in the mirror. Fifty, 60 and 70 look far more youthful and vital now than when those yellowing snapshots were first taken.

As the TV commercial says, seniors are refusing to age gracefully. Retailers of everything from clothing to cosmetics understand the desire of older adults to look their best. As the popularity of increasing numbers of senior-oriented publications (replete with age-directed ads) proves, this is a generation willing to pay attention — and money — on developing a positive physical image.

The goal — whether you're a man or a

woman — is to find the look and products that work best for you.

YOUR SKIN

If you've found that your skin is much drier than it used to be, it's because the oil glands that produce a substance to protect the skin are smaller and less active. Sun damage from years of overexposure may have contributed to skin change, too, in the form of wrinkles and even skin cancer. Smoking doesn't help either.

To promote healthier skin at any age, begin with a balanced diet and consistent exercise routine. Then take a look at how you cleanse and moisturize your skin. If you're using the same kinds of products you used as a younger adult, switch to gentler versions. To compensate for the lack of a natural moisturizer, use a heavy lotion or cream while your skin is still wet.

Men suffering from dry skin don't have to turn to their wife's treasure trove of products to find relief. Several cosmetic

companies are now producing their own lines of men's moisturizers. Clinique, for example, sells a liquid moisturizer called M Lotion.

Products with alpha hydroxy acids have been touted for the last couple of years as skin exfoliators and rejuvenators. Originally developed for facial skin, lotions with AHA have been found to also help create younger-looking and smoother hands. And one cosmetic manufacture, Estee Lauder, has introduced a product — Revelation — for both hands and chest.

Once you've moisturized your skin, don't forget to put on sunscreen before going out. Look for a product with an SPF (sun protection factor) of 15 or higher that blocks out both UVA and UVB rays.

COSMETIC SURGERY

Increasing numbers of older men and women dissatisfied with their skin tone are turning to cosmetic surgery to correct everything from crow's-feet to jiggly

upper arms. While chemical face peels and face-lifts are the most popular procedures, Longevity magazine reports that a group of surgeons have successfully experimented with a silicone "filler" for laugh lines. The procedure costs about \$1,250.

In another report, a New York plastic surgeon was noted for performing what is called a "batwing" procedure, to remove excess flesh and fat from the upper arm.

If you choose to undergo some form of cosmetic procedure, make sure that the doctor you consult is board certified. Be specific in saying what you want and find out if it's realistic. Ask for before and after pictures of other patients who had a similar procedure performed on them.

Take advantage of video-imaging technology to get a sense of your own "before and after." Be persistent about finding out the risks of the procedure (including any impact your medical history may have) and

weigh those against the benefits.

MAKEUP AND HAIR

Women who for decades thought they had found the look best suited to them may find that as they have gotten older the colors and products that worked before are no longer creating the same effect.

As we age our skin tones pale and we have to adjust and experiment. Less is more where makeup is concerned.

If you use a foundation, select one that has moisturizers and apply it lightly. Play up your eyes and lips, but lighten the colors.

Dominique Szabo of Estee Lauder suggests using matte rather than frosted shadows in a neutral shade or transparent sheer. She also recommends using mascara in shades of black-brown and deep gray, and discourages older women from using hard eyeliners.

Caring for the hair that frames your face may also need to be rethought. Hair, like skin, becomes drier with age, the texture thins and volume decreases. Buy a mild shampoo that contains ingredients like silicones, proteins and polymers.

They create an illusion of fullness by keeping individual strands from sticking

together.

If you color your hair, select shampoos that strengthen hair shafts. Men and women who opt for a natural gray have a variety of shampoo products at hand — such as Aveda's Blue Malva, Matrix's So Silver and Clairol's Shimmer Lights — to keep the color from yellowing.

Both men and women should consult a stylist to choose a simple, flattering cut that requires little maintenance. Avoid heavy dousings of hair spray and mousse. If hair loss bothers you, there are a number of treatments worth investigating, including hairpieces, drugs like minoxidil and hair transplants.

FASHION

What's the image you want to project? Fun-loving and youthful or serious and mature? Your wardrobe can reflect the variety of roles you play in life, and impacts not only the outside world but how you move and interact.

To look younger, women should borrow some of the more flattering aspects of young clothes like color and fabric texture. Avoid heavy fabrics and drab hues like maroon and lavender. Keep fussiness to a minimum in jewelry, handbags and hats.

If you're after a more elegant, sophisticated look, select clothes with a more formal cut. Incorporate silk scarves and more

conservative jewelry such as pearls and gold chains.

Most importantly, take a good look at your body. Even if you haven't gained weight, the distribution probably has shifted over the years. Clothing manufacturers

recognize this and have developed lines that are both fashionable and better fitting. And, as with selecting new makeup colors, take a second look at how the clothing near your face suits your skin tones. Choose fabric hues that most flatter your coloring.

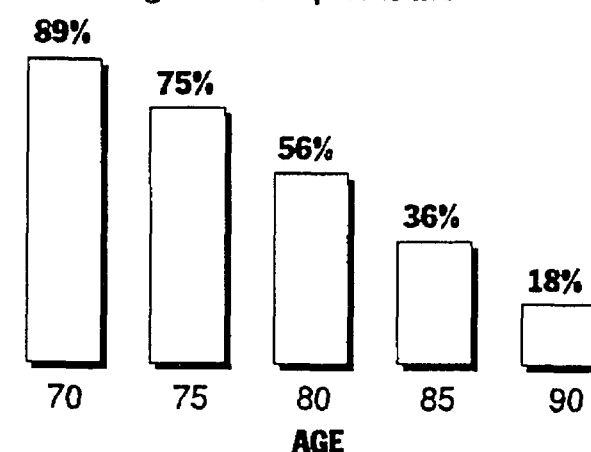

Two of southeast Michigan's most trusted health care organizations have come together as a community-based health care network and will be jointly managed under the new name of Mission Health. Providence Hospital and Medical Centers and the three hospitals in the Catherine McAuley Health System (St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor, McPherson Hospital in Howell and Saline Community Hospital in Saline) will be aligned to provide quality, accessible health care to residents across southeastern Michigan.

Mission Health will offer virtually every medical, surgical, therapeutic and rehabilitative service with the same outstanding quality and compassionate care that have always hallmarked our individual hospitals.

A caring mission for those in need

Mission Health is committed to being a health care system that makes a difference in the community--a difference based on our mission and our commitment not only to provide traditional patient care but also to develop programs to keep the community healthy.

The McAuley system is sponsored by the Religious Sisters of Mercy, Regional Community of Detroit. Providence is sponsored by the Daughters of Charity National Health System, Inc. Both of these religious orders have always made it their mission to care for the sick and the poor and to make their communities better places to live.

Both congregations of sisters are committed to providing health care to people regardless of ability to pay. It's their mission. So, in addition to the \$15.2 million our two organizations currently provide in charity care, Mission Health will commit to spend an additional \$2 million annually during each of the next five years--a total of \$10 million--on the special needs of the poor in our area.

We've already enlisted the assistance of people on our own staffs and throughout the region to help us plan the best use of these funds to aid the greatest number of people.

Inviting the stork

A woman's healthy lifestyle both before and during her pregnancy is very important to her baby's development and health. At Mission Health, delivering healthy babies to healthy mothers is one of our most important goals.

"A preconception visit is an important first step in achieving that goal," said Marvin Schrock, MD, director of Obstetrics for McPherson Hospital. "It makes sense to make an appointment to discuss with your doctor a venture as important as having a baby."

A preconception visit includes a general health exam and discussions of nutrition, exercise, hereditary concerns, vaccination status and previous pregnancies.

Some women have medical conditions that require special attention during pregnancy. Pre-existing conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes should be brought under control before a woman becomes pregnant.

"The most important focus is on overall health and understanding what you are trying to accomplish, which is to establish a pregnancy in the best possible environment to make a successful outcome," said Daniel McMurtie, MD, chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital. "But pregnancy is a durable state and babies aren't as fragile as we think."

Behave as if you are pregnant

"The most important message I give people is that from the time they decide they want to get pregnant, they should behave as if they already are," said Federico Mariona, MD, chairman of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Providence Hospital. "Women should live a healthy lifestyle and follow an appropriate diet to increase their nutritional resources."

"I advise women to give up smoking and alcohol and any drug use. It's important to let other health care professionals know if you could be pregnant, for example if you need an X-ray or are being prescribed medications."

At a preconception visit, Dr. Mariona discusses genetics and family history and for African-Americans, sickle cell screening. Hereditary issues include previous problem pregnancies, cystic fibrosis and Tay-Sachs disease.

Diet and weight

"Eat a healthy diet, including plenty of fruits and vegetables, and lose weight if you

need to before you become pregnant," advised Dr. McMurtie. "A good pre-pregnancy diet is the best way to ensure that you and your baby start out with the nutrients you both need. Two to three months prior to conception, begin to take folic acid and a good prenatal vitamin including an iron supplement."

It's important that a woman not be excessively underweight or overweight before she becomes pregnant. Underweight women tend to have smaller babies who can have more problems during labor, according to the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

In general, being overweight is a health hazard. During pregnancy, being overweight is linked to high blood pressure and diabetes. Overweight women are also more prone to discomforts during pregnancy.

Providence Hospital offers a class on prenatal nutrition, conducted by a registered dietitian. For more information, call (800) 968-5595 or ask your doctor.

Vaccinations

Women who have measles, mumps or rubella during pregnancy run the risk of serious birth defects in their baby. Since some vaccines may also be harmful to the baby, women are advised to get vaccinated before they try to become pregnant. They may also consider a tetanus booster and a flu shot prior to pregnancy.

Medications

If you take over-the-counter medications or are on prescription medication for diabetes, high blood pressure, migraine headaches or seizure disorders, ask your doctor about continuing to take those medications.

Dr. McMurtie advised women to see their dentist. Pregnancy is associated with gum problems so it is best to treat underlying gum disease before pregnancy. Dental repairs that may require X-rays should be completed prior to becoming pregnant.

Exercise provides many benefits. It helps to make labor easier, regulates weight gain, improves self-image and acts as a stress reducer. A woman's doctor can advise her on ways to exercise at an appropriate level during pregnancy.

Walking, swimming, cycling and stretching are good exercise choices. Avoid contact sports, competitive sports and stress on joints.

Grow Fit, offered by St. Joseph Mercy Hospital and Saline Community Hospital, is designed for women who wish to exercise in a supervised setting during pregnancy. Women may join the program once they begin their second trimester of pregnancy and participate until the day of delivery, if they wish. For more information, call (313) 712-3094 or (313) 429-1640.

Family Birthing Center, Southfield

Free-standing Center adjoining Providence Hospital offers home-like birth advantages.

In an **LDRP** room, the mother and baby are in the same room for the entire hospital stay, about 24 hours after the baby is born.

In an **LDR** room, the mother labors, delivers and recovers in one room. After that, mom and baby move to another room for postpartum care, where they may stay for up to two days before going home. The nursery provides supportive care for the baby during the stay.

All LDR and LDRP rooms have a home-like atmosphere with everything needed for a safe delivery. Should the necessity arise, there are C-section rooms adjacent to the LDR-LDRP areas. All mothers who deliver by C-section go to another room for their postpartum care, where they usually stay two to three days. With both programs, classes on infant care, self care, breast feeding and pain management during labor are available. In either type of room, a mother can have her baby in the room as long as she wishes.

24 hour stay rooms are designed for those women who have been carefully pre-screened and assessed as low-risk for medical and surgical complications by their physicians.

High-risk rooms at the New Life Center at Providence Hospital are designed for the high-risk mother with medical problems. These rooms offer specialized care during labor, birth and the early postpartum period. Providence also offers a 15-bed **Neonatal Intensive Care Unit**.

Immunizations and health examinations for adults

Most parents keep close track of the immunizations and health screenings their children need, but are we as vigilant as we should be about ourselves? If we don't keep our immunizations and health examinations up to date, we could be in for trouble.

"Skipping immunizations or tests may turn a controllable illness into a life-threatening illness or may be the cause of financial loss because of time taken off from work," said Charles Kelly, DO, internal medicine physician at McPherson Hospital.

"With cancer for example, a cure or good result may be a consequence of early detection," he said. "People with advanced disease don't do as well."

Prevention is the key

"Hepatitis B is a totally preventable disease," Dr. Kelly said. "The immunization is expensive and not covered by many insurances, but a person couldn't spend the money more wisely."

Many preventive health exams detect controllable coronary artery disease risk factors such as high cholesterol and high blood pressure. Dr. Kelly believes that cholesterol screening should be done every five years if the results are within a normal range.

"But if your cholesterol is high, don't just talk about it at a cocktail party, do something about it," Dr. Kelly said. (See *Cardiovascular risk factors* page 8.)

Cardiovascular risk factors

Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death and disability in the United States. More than 66 million Americans suffer from one or more forms of heart and blood vessel disease.

The occurrence of atherosclerosis, commonly called "hardening of the arteries," is affected by heredity, lifestyle and the presence of other health problems or risk factors. Cardiovascular disease does not occur overnight. No single risk factor is generally held responsible for the development of cardiovascular disease. Instead, many factors can contribute to its occurrence.

"Risk factors are divided into two major groups: factors which cannot be changed, and factors which can be changed," said Mary Poskie, director of Education Services at the Michigan Heart & Vascular Institute at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

Mission Health is proud of its comprehensive cardiovascular programs.

Risk factors we *cannot* change

Risk factors that cannot be changed include age, gender and heredity.

As we grow older, our risk of cardiovascular disease increases. Men between the ages of 40 and 65 are more susceptible to cardiovascular disease than women in the same age group. After menopause, a woman's risk of heart attack becomes equal to that of a man.

"If someone in your family has suffered from heart disease, you may also inherit a tendency toward heart disease," said Leilani Ware, RN, manager of Cardiac Rehabilitation at Providence Hospital. "This is a risk factor which you can't control, and so you should work harder to eliminate other risk factors that you can control."

Risk factors we *can* change

"The more risk factors you can eliminate from your lifestyle, the healthier you, your heart and your blood vessels will become," said Ware.

Elevated cholesterol and elevated triglycerides

Cholesterol, a soft, fat-like substance essential for normal body function, is found in almost all cells in the body, becoming "bad" only when there is too much. When excess cholesterol sticks to the inside of artery walls, blood flow to the heart is decreased.

"Persons with elevated cholesterol levels are four times more likely to have heart attacks than those with normal cholesterol levels," said Poskie.

"Triglycerides are another type of fat that may be produced by a diet high in fat, alcohol and excess calories," she explained. "Triglycerides, like cholesterol, can also become deposited on the walls of the arteries, and lead to atherosclerosis. Reduce triglyceride level by eating foods low in fat, limiting or avoiding alcohol and eating a calorie level appropriate to maintain or lose weight."

Smoking

"Of all the major risk factors, this is perhaps the one that increases the risk of cardiovascular disease the most," said Poskie. "The heart attack rate among smokers is four times greater than that of non-smokers, and the death rate for smokers is also much higher."

Smoking has many negative effects on the body. It damages the walls of the arteries, allowing cholesterol and triglycerides build up. It causes an increase in heart rate and blood pressure, and constricts the blood vessels, making the heart work harder. Smoking also contributes to increased low density lipoprotein ("bad" cholesterol), and decreased high density lipoprotein ("good" cholesterol).

When a smoker quits, the risk of cardiovascular diseases begins to decrease, becoming about the same as a non-smoker's risk within two to three years.

High blood pressure (hypertension)

Blood pressure is the amount of force exerted on the walls of the arteries as blood is pumped through the body. The risk of cardiovascular disease is two times greater in persons with high blood pressure than

persons with normal blood pressure.

High blood pressure makes the heart work harder to pump blood. This can lead to stroke, kidney or heart disease. It can also damage artery walls, so that cholesterol and triglycerides build up, causing decreased blood flow to the heart.

The causes of high blood pressure are not always known. Obesity, family history, stress, smoking, diabetes and elevated cholesterol and triglyceride levels can all contribute to hypertension. Hypertension can be treated through diet changes and increasing physical activity. Physicians may also prescribe medications.

Obesity and diabetes

Having excess body weight, especially if you weigh 10 percent more than your ideal weight, puts extra demands on the heart because it has to work harder, according to Ware. Obesity may also contribute to the development of high blood pressure and diabetes.

Diabetes develops when the body is unable to regulate the amount of sugar in the blood. Excess blood sugar can cause a rise in cholesterol and triglyceride levels, leading to atherosclerosis.

The risk for a person with diabetes developing cardiovascular disease is two times greater in men and three times greater in women, according to Poskie. Individuals with diabetes should follow their physician's advice about diet, medications and exercise. It is especially critical to modify cardiovascular risk factors.

Negative stress

Stress causes muscles to tense, the heart to beat faster, blood vessels to constrict and blood pressure to go up, all of which mean extra work for your heart.

"Stress is a normal part of life, but too much stress can be harmful," said Ware. "Since a stressful lifestyle increases the risk of heart disease, people must learn to adapt to change, thus lessening the effects of negative stress."

Lack of physical exercise

"Many people believe that lack of physical exercise can contribute to heart disease," said Ware. "Physical activity may also help to control obesity, cholesterol, stress, high blood pressure and diabetes."

How does lifestyle influence my heart's health?

The demands of a hectic life can make it difficult to take time to care for ourselves the way we know we should.

"It's hard when you have a busy life," said Ruth Munzel, of South Lyon. "And as mothers, we may put our own needs last."

After she had open heart surgery, Ruth reordered her thinking. She exercises more and has changed her menu planning, shopping and baking habits.

"I used to plan dinner around a meat entree, now we have pasta and vegetables and meat isn't the centerpiece of the meal," she said. "I was one of those people who thought part of being a good mother meant making rich homemade desserts. Now for example, I make cake with applesauce rather than shortening. The cakes are moist and don't even need frosting."

"It's never too late to reeducate yourself about cooking. My husband is flexible and he likes the new eating program," she continued. "It's been real educational for the kids also. Hopefully, learning about heart healthy eating now will save them from having the same type of problem when they are older."

"Another habit some families have is using food as a reward. That's a pattern parents shouldn't start. Use a favorite activity as a reward instead," Munzel said.

"My husband walks with me and this has become our time," said Munzel. "It's good exercise and good companionship. We never would have done that before."

Food is only one factor to consider

"Diet alone doesn't always work," said cardiologist Ron VandenBelt, MD, chief of staff at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital and on staff at Saline Community Hospital. "You need exercise and, in some cases, medication to get cholesterol down."

"I can't emphasize the importance of



prevention enough," Dr. VandenBelt said. "I see patients who are highly motivated only because they have already had a heart attack. There is often a failure to appreciate the importance of a healthy lifestyle."

"I emphasize smoking as a major risk factor people can change," added Wolf Duvernoy, MD, Cardiology section chief at Providence Hospital.

"I just returned from France and you don't see as many overweight people there as you do here--they walk. Regular activity seems to cut down on cardiac disease."

"Alcohol in excess is detrimental," he said, "but some regular consumption of small amounts has been shown to be beneficial. The Mediterranean diet with olive oil rather than saturated fats also helps reduce cardiac risk factors."

"Some people want a quick and easy answer to their health problems and there just isn't one," said Dr. VandenBelt. "They want something fancy, and they really just need to walk, eat right and stop smoking."

The building also contains an auditorium and classroom for community education programs.

The Michigan Heart & Vascular Institute has a strong clinical research program and has obtained major grants and national research projects. MHVI offers continuing medical education programs as well as conferences and seminars.

Cardiac Services at Providence Hospital offers a full range of cardiac care services from a Chest Pain Unit to care for patients when they first experience chest pain through diagnosis, treatment, open heart surgery and rehabilitation. The cardiac specialists at Providence are committed to responding to the needs of their cardiac patients with skilled physicians and surgeons, specialized nursing care and state-of-the-art technology including an electrophysiology lab to diagnose and treat irregular heartbeats. Outpatient cardiac diagnostic testing services are available at Providence Hospital in one convenient location--the Providence Heart Institute.

Some procedures are also available at Providence Medical Center-Livonia and Providence Medical Center-Providence Park, Novi.

Both Providence Hospital and St. Joseph Mercy Hospital have Chest Pain Emergency units staffed with physicians and nurses trained in emergency cardiac care procedures, who determine the source of

chest pain quickly and provide expert, immediate treatment.

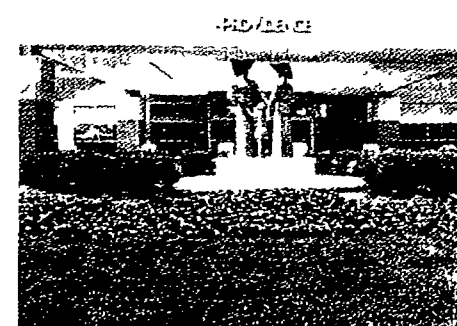

Joint venture for Livonia

A new ambulatory care center in Livonia is the first major Mission Health venture since the Joint Operating Agreement (JOA) was announced between Providence Hospital and Medical Centers and Catherine McAuley Health System.

"The Livonia project marks the first jointly sponsored medical center for our two organizations," said Michael A. Slubowski, Providence chief executive officer. "It shows a spirit of cooperation among staff, physicians and services."

The 68,000-square-foot facility will be located on 17 acres at the corner of Seven Mile and Newburg roads. It will house an urgent care center, open 365 days a year; 25 to 30 physician offices and other medical services. It will open in late 1995.

The Livonia facility will have a primary care emphasis (internal medicine, pediatrics, obstetrics and family practice). In addition, pharmacy, physical therapy, radiology and laboratory services also will be available. Specialty physicians, including cardiologists; general, neuro and plastic surgeons; allergists; ear, nose and throat specialists and podiatrists will have office space in the building.

"The development of the Livonia facility reflects the shared values of the Daughters of Charity and Sisters of Mercy by contributing toward the improvement of the health status of residents in the Livonia area and other communities along the I-275 corridor," said Garry Faja, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital chief executive officer.

"The people of Mission Health are excited to have a tangible example of the union of our two Catholic sponsors, medical staffs and associates," he said.

Close to home and close to work

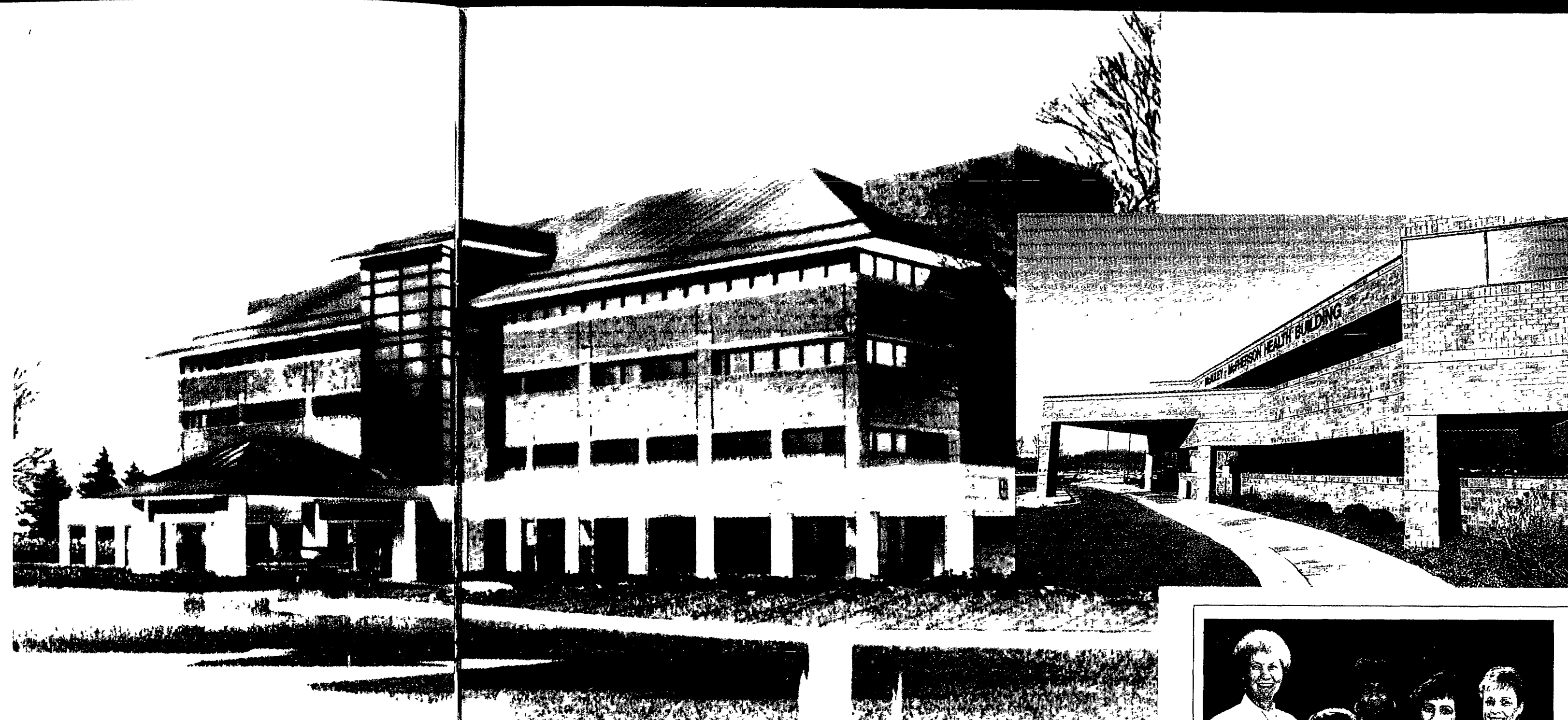
"The key to the vitality of Mission Health is our ambulatory network development," said Slubowski. "It is a fundamental priority of Mission Health to expand this ambulatory and primary care network in order to provide accessible medical services to all of the residents of the communities we serve--young families, seniors and those who might be medically underserved."

The four hospitals of Mission Health (Providence Hospital in Southfield, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor, McPherson Hospital in Howell, and Saline Community Hospital in Saline) are working to establish a complete community health care system to better serve families in Lenawee, Livingston, Monroe, Oakland, Washtenaw and Wayne counties. With the combination of services offered at the hospitals and numerous ambulatory sites, patients will be able to come to Mission Health for practically all of their health care needs and have access to quality

services at locations close to home and work.

"Our convenient ambulatory sites have been designed to meet the health care needs of the entire family as more and more patient care is delivered in outpatient settings," Faja said. "All of our ambulatory centers are backed by the specialists and resources available through the Mission Health hospitals. Specialty centers range from outpatient cancer care and pain control to outpatient surgery."

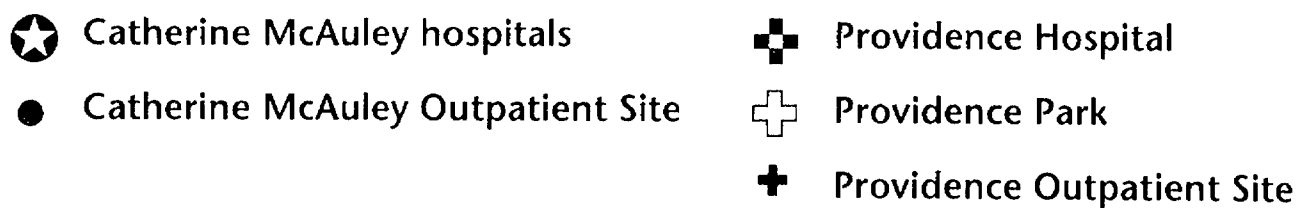


Providence Women's Center

Emergency medical services-- when you need us, where you need us

Life is unpredictable. To help you deal with those unexpected injuries and illnesses, many Mission Health locations offer emergency medical services.

Whether it's chest pain, a broken bone, a sprained ankle or a 2 a.m. earache, we're near to help.

The newest aspect of our network of emergency services is the addition of Urgent Care at Saline Community Hospital, in Saline. Urgent Care was added when the Hospital's Emergency department moved into a new addition in May, upgrading its 1959 facility. Now Saline Community Hospital offers both Urgent Care and Emergency services in the same area.

"This is definitely a service our community has been waiting for," said Brian Cook, MD, medical director of the Emergency department at Saline Community Hospital.

Emergency care vs urgent care

An emergency, according to the generally accepted definition, is a life-threatening illness or condition that risks permanent impairment to bodily functions or health. Urgent care, as defined by Dr. Cook, is for less severe conditions that still demand swift medical attention. These may include an injury to an extremity (bumps, breaks, bruises, small cuts), upper respiratory infections and ear infections.

"We constantly receive calls from consumers asking if we have urgent care services," Dr. Cook says.

These consumers know that for certain less serious conditions their HMOs will only support an urgent care visit, and they also know they can't wait to see their own doctor.

Throughout the Mission Health network, emergency and urgent care physicians specialize in emergency medical treatment. Nurses, technicians and even registrars are specially trained to assist people in an emergency.

"Sometimes people are reluctant to come to an emergency department thinking maybe their problem isn't all that serious," Dr. Cook said.

Prompt medical attention is best

"The main message I want to stress to the community is that if you think you are in a life-threatening or serious medical situation, don't wait to evaluate it or call for insurance authorization. Call 911 or go to the nearest emergency department," he said. "We can help you figure out the insurance procedures after we've taken care of the emergency."

To be covered by most insurances, you'll need to follow up with your regular physician, who then needs to communicate support of the "off hours" urgent care visit to your insurance company within a few days.

Dr. Cook noted that the earlier a person seeks treatment, the more options there may be available. For example, some of the "clot-busting" drugs used to treat heart attacks are most effective if administered within two to four hours of the onset of trouble.

One of the pleasures of his job, Dr. Cook said, is telling someone who came in with chest pains that what felt like a heart attack is only a bad case of bronchitis. "It's always better to play it safe," Dr. Cook said, "especially when it's your health, and sometimes your life, at stake."
