What to do about the Downs dominates candidates forum

With two weeks until election day, Northville Downs has emerged as the main issue being focused on by the two Northville mayoral and three city council candidates.

The five candidates tackled the Downs question and other tough issues at a candidates forum sponsored by the League of Women Voters on Monday.

The forum allowed incumbent Mayor Chris Johnson and long-time Councilman Paul Folino to

speak directly to city residents about the upcoming election.

Council candidates Carolann Ayers, Tom Swigart, and Roxanne Casterline also attempted to distinguish themselves. More than 70 people packed the city council chambers to hear the differences between the candidates. Each was given time for an opening statement, followed by a question and answer period in which audience members were allowed to submit questions.

The top issue of interest centered around Northville Downs

and current legislation that will drastically decrease the state paramutuel funding the city currently enjoys.

Johnson wasted little time in mentioning the Downs situation and how it will effect Northville's future, even intimating that the property might be more beneficial as something other than a race-track.

"I'd have to say that (Northville) loses money because the governor has cut the city's entitlement from para-mutuel betting in half," he

Bill would provide boost for horse racing industry

The "fatted calf" may soon be dead for the City of Northville if the state Legislature approves a bill that will drastically cut the funds Northville receives from para-mutuel betting at Northville Downs.

Northville has been receiving the tax free funding for years, and has used the money for infrastructure improvements and other assorted services.

That could all change if the Legislature approves the bill that

requires horse racing tracks to only pay one half of one percent of all pari-mutuel wagers to city and township officials for services such as fire and police protection, and public utilities.

The measure, co-sponsored by state representative Willis Hall and

Jr., R-Milford and Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, will abolish the current 4.5 percent pari-mutuel tax - which brings about \$450,000 per year to the city of Northville and \$18 million statewide.

The legislation is geared toward

Police discover occult hang out

Tree house found with satanic saying

It was someone's home away from home, a well built and carefully disguised shelter constructed along the Rouge River in Northville Township.

Just what may have gone on there concerns police, however, after they discovered evidence of

devil worship and animal poaching at the now dismantled enclosure last week.

Township Police Sergeant Michael Panagiotides said he learned of the shelter's existence earlier this month. It was located on the Rouge in a densely wooded area about 300 yards east of the Moose Lodge building on Northville Road between Six and Seven Mile.

Individuals in the area reported that two white males were living in what was described as a "tree-house," Panagiotides said.

What he and Officer Paul Sumner found on Oct. 18, however, was no child's play place. Instead, the

shelter was an elaborately built and adeptly camouflaged structure, Panagiotides said.

It was triangular in shape, he explained, stood five feet off the ground and measured 15 feet long by seven feet high. Painted green and draped with camouflage netting, the shelter was insulated and weather-proofed, Panagiotides added, and had electric power provided by a gasoline generator.

No generator was found, he said, but it was apparently kept in a hole in the ground and covered over with plywood and dirt. A system of exhaust pipes and a car

Trick-or-treating and safety equal worry-free fun

It's a dark and spooky night, filled with horrifying hobgoblins of all kinds that send a chill down your spine and wrench a terrified scream from your lips.

No, it's not the editorial offices of The Northville Record on deadline night. We're howling about Halloween here and how to keep the kids safe and sound as the tykes troll the town for tricks and treats this Tuesday. The experts offer these tips:

- Halloween is a time when kids should be seen and heard. Make sure children wear light-colored clothing, either as part of or over a costume. Consider adding strips of reflective tape or a reflective vest to their ensemble as well.

- Costumes should be short enough to prevent tripping and preferably made of fire retardant materials.

- Makeup beats a mask every day of the week for safety. Masks can restrict a child's vision. If your child does want to wear one, however, make sure he or she can see well with it on.

- When choosing a costume avoid hard plastic, metal or wooden props such as daggers or swords. Substitute soft, flexible foam rubber ones if possible.

- Pets may be frightened at the sight of a costume-clad little one, even your princess or Power Ranger is part of Fido or Fluffy's own family. It's best to keep animals away from kids, especially ones they don't know.

- It's best to trick or treat before dark. Bring a flashlight along, though, in case you get caught out

after the sun goes down.

- Remember, there's safety in numbers. Trick or treating is both more fun and better if you do it in groups. Never forget to be sure to have at least one adult accompany young children at all times.

- Stay within your neighborhood and out of the road whenever possible. Use sidewalks if they're there and walk facing oncoming

traffic if they're not. Avoid poorly lit areas if possible.

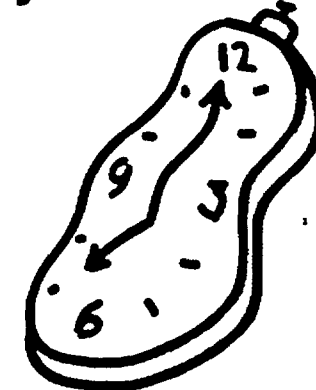
Cross streets only at the corners and take extra time to check for traffic from all directions. Never cross near anything that might shield you from a driver's view, such as parked cars or bushes.

- It's been said many times before but that's because it bears repeating: only give or accept

wrapped or packaged candy and make sure that the kids don't eat any of it until you give it a thorough going over at home.

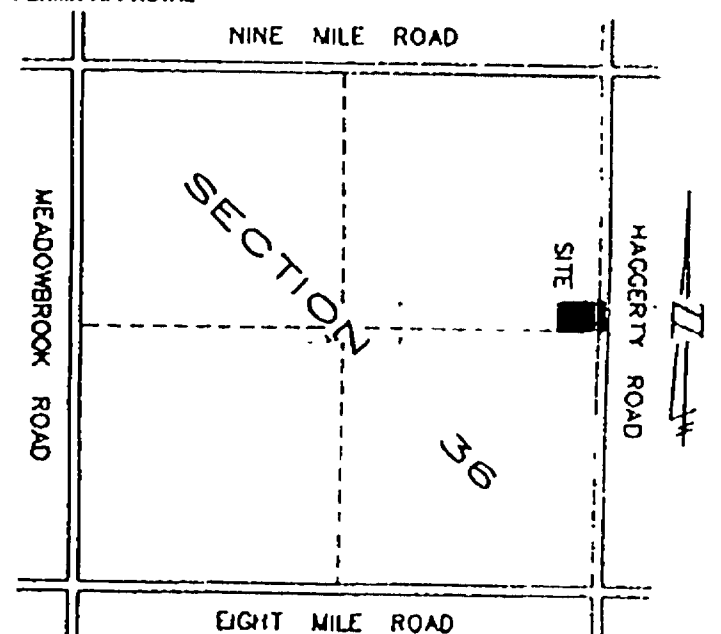

Cable work to start in city

What's reputed to be the next generation of cable television technology comes to our town this week.

If you're a Northville city resident, chances are that last week you found a flyer hung on your doorknob from Ameritech New Media Inc.

This week you're likely to see the company's trucks cruising the streets and stringing new cable TV lines, spokesperson Marcia Sayles said Tuesday.

"We're planning to start this week and we hope to be finished with construction by the end of the year, with initial cable services being available by April of 1996," she said.

If they live up to billing, those services should be something to see. Ameritech New Media is a subsidiary of the Ameritech telephone company and earlier this year concluded a landmark franchise agreement with Northville and Plymouth cities and Plymouth and Canton Townships.

For the first time in America a phone company will provide a community with cable TV.

The four communities are also the first in the United States to have more than one firm competing to provide cable services to residents. Plymouth-based Omnicom Inc. is the other cable firm which holds a franchise agreement with Northville city.

Once all of its bells and whistles come on line, Ameritech says it will be able to provide its customers with a range of new features: everything from interactivity to shopping and banking via TV.

The cable lines will be laid along the same routes as telephonic lines, spokesperson Dave Onak explained, be it under or above ground.

Sayles said that in Northville the lion's share of the lines will be strung above ground on poles.

For now, workers will be laying cable along public rights of way or easements. No cable will be installed on private property, of course, without the owner deciding to choose Ameritech's cable services.

Besides the company's vehicles you may also see ones belong to NST Network Services, Ameritech's contracted installer, Sayles said.

Cynthia Henderson, a special education teacher at the high school, will receive an Award of Excellence from the Michigan Learning Disability Association at a luncheon in Lansing tomorrow, Oct. 27.

The honor is awarded yearly by the organization and is the result of nominations by teachers and parents.

"I'm excited that I was chosen to receive this award," Henderson said in an interview this week. "I really didn't expect this honor, but it's one I feel good about."

Henderson has taught special education at the high school for 15 years.

She has been with the district for 19 years.

She said her students are responsible for her winning the award.

"They're the ones who go home and tell their parents, so I believe they are the ones that made this possible."

Henderson always wanted to be a special education teacher. It's a challenge she loves each day, and she believes she can make a differ-

Charter schools could get new freedoms

Charter schools - like the Nah Tah Wahsh and El-Hajj Mallik El-Shabazz public school academies - would be able to set their own standards for professional teacher orientation under new "alternative teaching certificate" rules approved by the State Board of Education.

The board gave the controversial rules 5-3 approval Oct. 18 and forwarded them to the Legislature for approval under the Administrative Procedures Act.

The rules are designed to allow experts in their fields to teach in public schools without going through the lengthy teacher certification process - college courses in education, student teaching under a mentor and provisional certification.

Under current rules, say those

who want change, Lee Iacocca couldn't teach business, U.S. Sens. Carl Levin and Spence Abraham couldn't teach civics, and filmmaker Ken Burns couldn't teach Civil War history in Michigan public schools.

Nah Tah Wahsh is a Potawatomi culture and language academy in Menominee, and El-Hajj Mallik El-Shabazz offers a "holistic, Afrocentric curriculum" in Lansing, according to the Michigan Partnership for New Education's report to the State Board. They are among 37 charter schools in the state.

Charter schools would have broad powers to set standards and request "expert in residence" teaching permits under the new rules.

"Exert great caution," Jerry Robbins, dean of Eastern Michigan University's College of Education, warned the board, citing his expe-

rience in Georgia.

"Some (alternately certified teachers) were very good, but it was a disaster in other cases," Robbins went on.

While teachers recruited from as far away as Germany to teach science, math and foreign languages knew their subjects, they didn't know classroom management and how to motivate kids.

"There was enormous turnover. Many didn't survive the first semester. It was a wasted year for the kids," Robbins said.

Said Paula Wood, dean of Wayne State University's College of Education: "There's a consistent, positive relationship between student achievement in science and teachers' background in both education courses and science courses. Best student performance in math results from teachers who had

higher numbers of math methods courses."

Wood said teachers who haven't taken courses in how to teach don't know curriculum development, don't know different teaching methods, don't know cooperative learning, don't know about different learning styles and don't know classroom management.

Board president Clark Durant, however, urged immediate board approval over protests from some members.

Voting yes were Republicans Durant of Grosse Pointe, Marilyn Lundy of Detroit, Gary Wolfrum of Hillsdale, Sharon Wise of Owosso and Ruth Braun of Saginaw.

Voting no were Republican Dorothy Beardmore of Rochester Hills and Democrats Kathleen Straus of Detroit and Barbara Roberts Mason of Lansing.

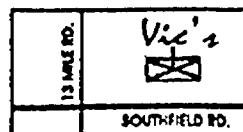
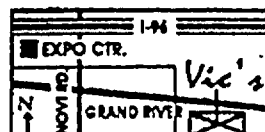

School program off to good start at area malls

Shoplifter makes suicide try

Township police chased down two suspected Meijer shoplifters last week.

Store detectives chased a Livonia man into the woods near I-275 on Oct. 19 after allegedly seeing him steal property. He was taken for psychological evaluation by township police later that day after reportedly threatening to commit suicide.

Criminal case filings increased last year

Michiganians in 1994 sued each other more, witnessed a jump in juvenile cases but saw filings drop in their local district courts.

"Labor-intensive criminal, domestic and juvenile case filings increased over the previous year, while less complex traffic filings declined," said an annual report from the State Court Administrator's Office.

Actually, the total number of new case filings dropped, and many hardly kept pace with population growth.

Trial court filings were almost level - 3.19 million in 1994 versus 3.197 million the previous year. Trial courts consist mainly of three types:

• Circuit - Total new case filings

-State Court Administrator's report

rose 1.3 percent to 240,270. Of these, 44 percent were domestic relations (mainly divorces), civil matters 25 percent, criminal matters 25 percent, and appeals from district court 4 percent. (Numbers are rounded off.)

• Probate - Overall filings fell 7.5 percent due to a drop in cases involving estates, guardianships and the mentally ill. But juvenile cases rose 4.6 percent to 94,704. Of those, 62 percent were criminal matters; 17 percent traffic; 11 per-

cent, child protective proceedings; and 10 percent "status" violations (such as runaways).

• District - New cases were up a bare 0.3 percent to 2.8 million. Some 75 percent were traffic-related; 14 percent, civil; 11 percent, criminal. A drop in traffic cases was "offset in workload terms by more criminal cases. (District courts hold pre-trial exams for criminal cases that are tried in circuit courts.)

Michigan has two appellate

courts.

The Court of Appeals saw new case filings drop nearly 10 percent to 11,287, in part because voters approved a constitutional amendment limiting the right of appeal by those who have pleaded guilty.

The Supreme Court's business was up 16 percent to 3,188 new cases. The state's highest court completed 2,733 cases, up 9 percent.

Of all the cases brought to it, the Supreme Court denied leave to appeal 88 percent of the time.

Meanwhile, state legislators are studying the Supreme Court's proposal to consolidate the circuit and probate courts - a measure that would require voter approval - and an experimental program of integrating circuit and district courts.

Assault suspect retains license pending outcome

Dr. Robert Dock can continue to practice medicine despite facing felony assault charges but could lose his medical license if he's convicted.

Dock, 50, is an obstetrician with offices in Livonia and Northville city.

He was arraigned on Oct. 13 on one count of felonious assault for an alleged Oct. 11 assault on his ex-girlfriend, a Northville Township resident.

Police say the physician forced his way into the woman's apartment and tied her up using handcuffs and surgical tape.

He then tormented her for two and a half hours, investigators allege, threatening the woman, 39, with a baseball bat while questioning her about her new boyfriend.

Felonious assault in Michigan carries a penalty of up to four years in prison upon conviction. Dock was released after his arraignment on a \$5,000 personal bond and faces a pretrial hearing tomorrow, Oct. 27, at 35th District Court.

The state Department of Commerce issues medical licenses in Michigan and its Board of Medicine is responsible for deciding if a doctor's accreditation should be suspended or revoked.

The board in all likelihood will not make any decision regarding Dock's license, which is due for

renewal at the end of 1996, unless and until the criminal case against him is resolved.

"Very rarely do we take action in the case of someone being accused of a crime due to due process," spokesperson Carol Engle said.

If the obstetrician is convicted of the felony offense, however, he will automatically lose his license, at least temporarily.

The state public health code requires the board to suspend the license of any doctor convicted of one or more of the following, Engle said:

• Any felony crime.
• A misdemeanor carrying a penalty of two years or more in prison.

• An offense involving the delivery, possession or use of alcohol or controlled substances.

The board can "in emergency situations," Engle said, choose to impose a suspension when those conditions do not exist.

Suspensions can be imposed for a set period as a penalty, Engle said, or the board can issue one as "an interim step" while considering the disciplinary option of outright license revocation.

In all cases the licensee can request a hearing before an administrative law judge, Engle explained, who will determine whether or not a board decision will be invalidated.

Road work to end soon

Pre-construction work at the Five Mile and Beck Road area is supposed to be finished by Nov. 15, according to the Wayne County Road Commission.

Commission road crews are

working on drainage, earth excavation and pavement removal prior to reconstruction of the highway. The work began on Sept. 25.

There's no word yet on when the actual reconstruction will begin.

Amendment would tighten FOIA restrictions

On the final roll call, it looked as if Rep. Greg Kaza won an easy 104-0 victory recently on his bill to allow administrative appeals under the Freedom of Information Act.

But a week earlier, Kaza had to fight down Democratic attempts to open up more records to public view by tacking amendments on his relatively simple bill. His bill moves to the Senate, where Kaza is confident it will be taken up.

Currently, FOIA requires a person who has been denied access to what he or she believes is a public record to sue in circuit court. Kaza's bill would set up an administrative appeal procedure. The person would not be required to use the administrative appeal, and if denied he still could sue.

"The amendments would have killed the bill in the Senate," Kaza said after the vote. "The Democrats were using my bill as a political football. If those amendments had gotten on, my bill would have been DOA (dead on arrival) in the Senate."

Kaza said that in 1993 he sponsored amendments, with bipartisan help, to open up legislative records, but the Senate immediately scuttled them.

Only Rep. Howard Wetters, D-Kawakawin, was successful in winning 57-47 approval of his amendment to keep some records from being hidden. Wetters' amendment would make documents transferred by a public body to the executive office still open to the public.

FOIA, which became law in

1976, has exempted the governor's and lieutenant governor's offices from its definition of public records. Democrats charge that Gov. John Engler has had records - such as the Accident Fund and a vaccine-manufacturing operation - deliberately shifted to his office to hide them.

"I don't believe you should be able to go out and take documents in the public domain and have them transferred - physically or electronically - into the executive office and say it has executive privilege," Wetters said.

Supporting the Wetters amendment were all 54 Democrats and three Republicans.

Opponents were all Republicans, including Gerald Law of Plymouth and Willis Bullard of Milford.

"I don't know what the Senate

will do" to the Wetters amendment, Kaza said.

Repeat drunk driving still a problem

While Michigan's newest drunk-driving laws have helped reduce alcohol-related traffic deaths by as much as 25 percent since 1992, the measures have had little impact on repeat offenders, says a University of Michigan researcher.

In his study of 56 drunk drivers convicted in 1992 and 1993, David Eby, an assistant research scientist at the U-M Transportation Research Institute, found that nearly half had at least one other drinking and driving conviction in the previous 10 years and 15 percent had at least two prior alcohol convictions during that time.

"The study revealed a high drunk-driving recidivism rate among offenders, which suggests that the current drunk-and-impaired-driving laws in Michigan are not having a strong, specific deterrent effect on individuals with a history of drinking and driving," Eby says.

About 55 percent of the drunk drivers in the study's sample had

at least one previous crash (although not necessarily alcohol-related), 43 percent were classified as "unacceptable" or "problem drivers" (according to Eby's Index of Past Driving Competence), and 30 percent were driving with a restricted, suspended, revoked or expired license.

"These data indicate that those who are driving drunk also tend to violate other driving laws and be involved in traffic crashes," Eby says. "Further, it appears that a large percentage of these people do not change their poor driving behaviors in response to license sanctioning."

Because 30 percent to 70 percent of perpetrators may still choose to drive - albeit illegally -

after losing their licenses, Eby believes that impounding or immobilizing vehicles during the sanction period would be more effective than suspending licenses.

In addition to the need for tougher licensing sanctions, Eby found that most courts usually follow at least the minimum sentencing guidelines for convicted drunk drivers.

However, more than a third receive a lesser conviction than warranted - thanks to plea bargaining.

The study also shows that about 88 percent of convicted drunk drivers become inebriated in public prior to their arrest, underscoring the need for stronger enforcement of "alcohol-server" laws.

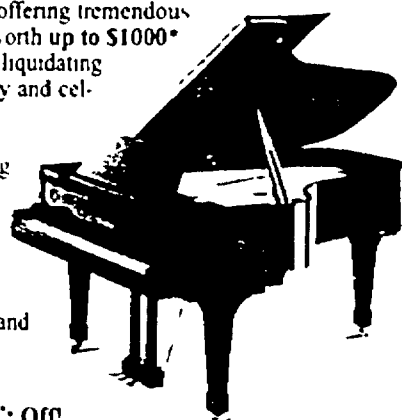

HEALTH NOTE

SOUND TREATMENT

Ultrasound is a modality that is in widespread use as a treatment for injured muscles and tendons. Now, there is preliminary evidence that ultrasound may also play a significant role in speeding the healing of fractured bones. According to one study, patients with shinbone fractures who were treated to ultrasound therapy through cutouts in their casts were able to have their casts removed in three months (versus the usual four months for patients untreated with ultrasound). In another study, patients with arm fractures who received ultrasound treatment experienced a similar 25 percent quicker healing time than untreated patients. So far, ultrasound therapy for fractured bones has yet to receive FDA approval.

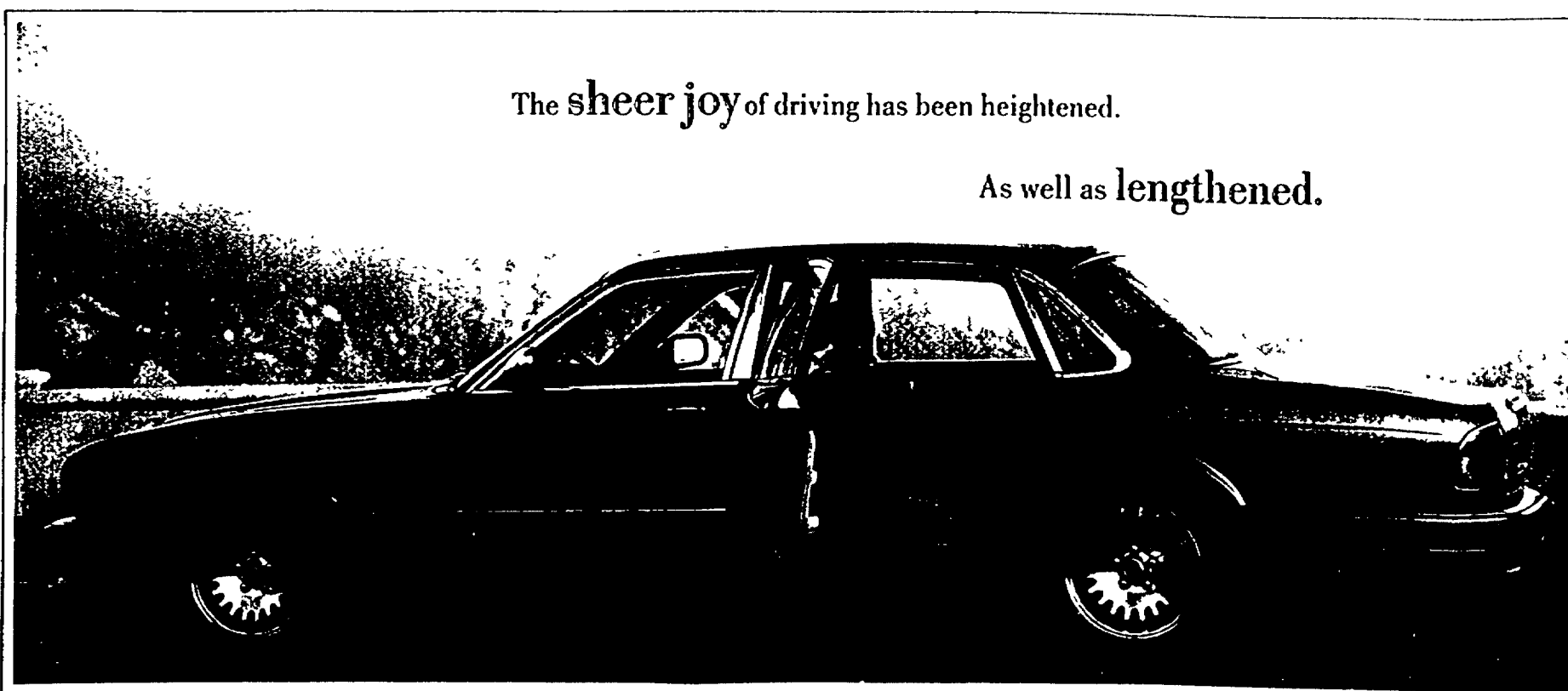

Whitetail population reaches record levels

The good news for deer hunters is that the state's whitetail population is near a record level.

And the bad news? Vehicle-deer crashes are on the rise as herds increase.

The state's herd — estimated at between 1.8 million and 2 million — probably hasn't been this big since 1989, when hunters enjoyed a record harvest of 452,490.

While hunting promises to be golden, AAA Michigan says vehicle-deer crashes remain a big-bucks expense in the state (pun intended) with the Auto Club paying out some \$10.4 million in property damage claims last year.

Numbers tell the story: A record number of accidents involving vehicles and deer occurred last year, with every county showing an increase.

In 1994, there were 56,666 vehicle/deer crashes in Michigan, a 19 percent increase over the 47,813 reported in 1993.

Five people died in such accidents in 1994, the same as a year earlier.

There were 2,040 injuries reported in 1994, up from 1,712 the previous year — a 19 percent increase.

The average repair bill for a vehicle involved in a crash with a deer was \$1,400 last year, up from \$1,350 in 1993.

Of the 398,050 total car crashes in the state last year, 56,666 (or 14 percent) involved deer.

While vehicle/deer crashes are reported in each of Michigan's 83 counties and occur throughout the year, most happen during the fall and early winter months, says AAA Michigan Community Safety Services Manager Jerry Basch.

Last year, the top five counties in the number of vehicle/deer crashes reported were Kent with 1,805; Jackson, 1,695; Calhoun, 1,553; Kalamazoo, 1,336; and Oakland, 1,297.

The fewest number were recorded in Upper Peninsula counties. However, this can be misleading with comparatively low volumes of traffic there.

There is no reasonable way to eliminate all vehicle/deer crashes because of the unpredictability of the animal, but Basch advises motorists to always wear safety belts, avoid alcohol when driving and heed the following tips:

Deliberately look for deer. Your visual search should include well

down the roadway and far off to each side.

Vehicle/deer crashes most often occur on paved local and country roads, but freeways are not exempt.

Use extra caution when driving in the hours before dawn and just after dusk. Those are the most likely times to find deer moving from area to area.

If you see a deer, slow down, drive cautiously and assume others are nearby.

Should a deer dart into the road in front of you, do not take unsafe evasive action, such as swerving. It is usually safer to strike the deer than another object, such as a tree or other vehicle.

Be alert for shining eyes at night. Your headlights can "freeze" the deer. Flash your headlights on and off well in advance to encourage the deer to move from the roadway.

Should you strike a deer, report it to local or county police and your insurance company. If you choose to keep the deer, you will need a permit from the police department or the Department of Natural Resources.

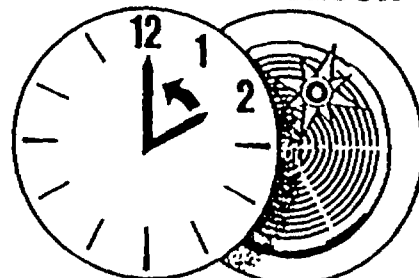

Novi mourns untimely death of city official

After his election to the Novi City Council in 1989, the word around town was that Tim Pope was a rising star, a young man with a future.

That bright future ended at 10:30 a.m. Sunday at St. Joseph Hospital in Ypsilanti, when Pope, 32, died after lingering in a coma since a May 8 automobile accident. He was suffering from a traumatic head injury.

"Because of the injury, his blood pressure and temperature were very irregular. He was never really stabilized. It was something they had prepared us for," his wife, Sara Pope, said Tuesday.

Pope was the father of two children, Andrew, 3 and Abbie, 10 months old.

His funeral was at 11 a.m. Wednesday at Falth Presbyterian Church, just across the street from the Novi Civic Center, where Pope spent most of his Monday nights from November 1989 until the day his car inexplicably crossed the center lane and collided with a semi-truck on Grand River Avenue.

Born on the Fourth of July, 1963, he first became mesmerized with politics when serving on the Richard Headlee campaign for governor.

"He listened to Dick speak and he learned then that he had a fire in his belly for politics. He learned he had the people skills of listening and communicating. He did a lot of things to develop those skills," Sara Pope said.

"His dream really was to represent Novi in the legislature."

At an early age, he became active with the Oakland County Republican Part. Before his accident, Pope was a legislative aide to State Sen. David Honigman (R)-West Bloomfield.

"His career was as a politician. Tim would have gone on to bigger things, definitely. A representative, a senator... He knew the laws, he

stayed on top of everything," City Council Member Carol Mason, a close friend, said.

He was just 26 when he took on the challenge of running for the city council in 1989. That year, Pope was a leader in the fight against commercial development at Ten Mile and Beck roads and helped found Citizens for Responsible Development.

As an outspoken council member, he proved popular with residents, who liked him not just for the way he voted. The public obviously had his ear but they also had his time: Pope was known for showing up in person when homeowners had complaints.

The young politician loved to sleep in, but Sara Pope recalls his reaction when an angry citizen called at 6 a.m.

"The resident was just furious. I answered the phone and he was yelling 'do you hear this?' It was the sound of some kind of construction. He was so upset it had started so early in the morning," she said.

"Tim took the phone and then got up and got dressed and went out there to see what he could do. That was the kind of person he was."

Residents were urging Pope to run for mayor this year, but he decided against it, Sara Pope said.

"He didn't want to just climb the ladder. He wanted to do what he could for Novi. He wanted to leave his options open for that," she explained.

Pope was raised by his mother, Margaret Pope in Country Place Condominiums. In 1991, he and

mayor and helped Nancy Cassis get on the city council. Then it was his turn.

One of Pope's first stands while in office was against a plan to offer industries at Grand River Avenue and Novi Road tax abatements to move to an industrial park in west Novi. He was staunchly against government subsidies to businesses and was one of two council members to take a stand against Main Street.

"He would talk to other people on the council in such a way that it would help people reach solutions. That cheery smile. He had his great wit. He could almost break any deadlock by getting people to laugh at themselves," Cassis said.

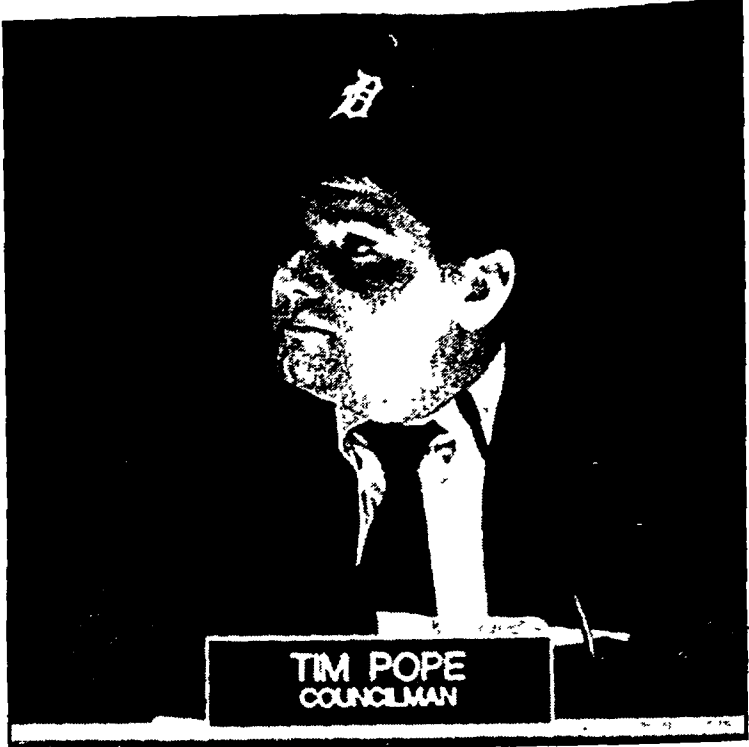
"He's going to leave a big, big gap."

In September 1993, in the midst of his campaign for a second term on the council, Pope announced that he would undergo open heart surgery for a congenital heart valve defect. While his campaign slowed down as he recovered, his success didn't. He was the top vote-getter in the local election.

Eyewitness accounts of the May 8 accident led to speculations that Pope could have been in medical distress when his car swerved into the path of the semi-truck. The right side of his skull was fractured.

"We had some hope earlier in the summer. Maybe we wanted so much to believe, we wanted him to come back to us," Cassis said.

"We all had the opportunity in the last five months to say what

we wanted to say to him. If he had died immediately in that accident, we would never have been able to go to him."

Tim Pope is survived by his mother, Margaret Pope, his brother Tom Pope and sisters Susan Pope and Cindy Bush.

He was active in the Michigan Republicans, the Oakland County Republicans, the Novi Jaycees, the Novi Chamber of Commerce, Preservation Novi, the Michigan

Heart Association and Christmas in April.

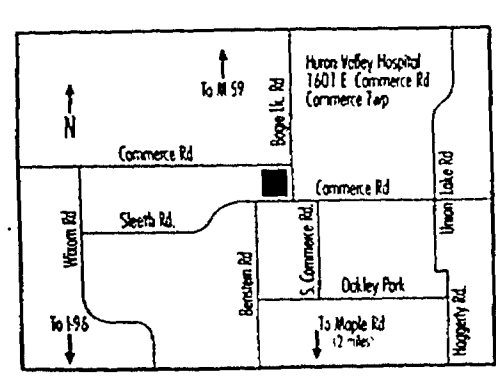

Northville High School senior Andrew Song has big plans for his future.

"Essentially my parents have allowed me to make decisions. They've let me do the things I need to do," McMahon said. "The teachers and administrators here at the



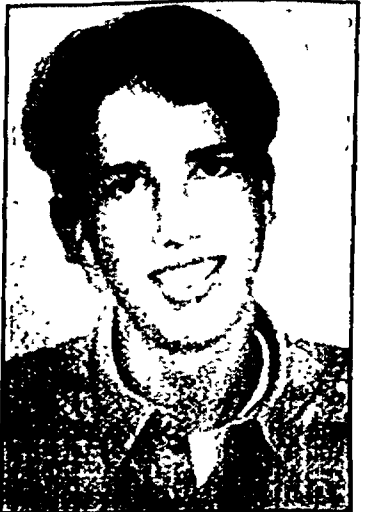

Novi dollmaker is artist to stars

If you listen very carefully when night falls upon the Florio home in Novi, you can almost imagine hearing the faint voices of Ginko Rose, Lydia, and Fifi the Teatime Lady coming to life from the spare bedroom down the hall.

Those enchanting women, each with magnificent style and presence, are just a few of the unique contemporary fabric art dolls designed and created by nationally acclaimed doll maker, Marla Florio.

Florio, 39, works independently from her small studio which occupies a spare bedroom in her Novi home. This creative sanctuary, with two rectangular cafeteria-style working tables, two treasured sewing machines, a rolling chair, an ironing board, a pair of dress-making scissors, and a box overflowing with 100 colors of thread, is where Florio has spent innumerable hours creating her remarkable fabric dolls.

A closet in the corner of the room with doors removed displays an extraordinary collection of fabric which Florio affectionately refers to as her "palette of colors." There is not a sound in the studio while Florio works, other than the steady stitching of her sewing machine.

Among the more celebrated buyers of Florio's dolls are actress Demi Moore and author Anne Rice, both avid doll collectors. Moore once commissioned Florio to create a one-of-a-kind doll for her which featured Demi holding her children in her arms, capturing a significant memory of motherhood.

Florio, a 1982 graduate of the Art Institute of Chicago with a bachelor of fine arts in fashion and fabric design, has recently been nominated for the 1995 Award of

Excellence by *DOLLS - The Collector's Magazine* in recognition of the conception, design and creation of her dolls.

Florio's dolls are sold both nationally and internationally and are owned by collectors in Japan, England, and South America. She is an annual participant in the American International Toy Fair held in February in New York City and was featured at the International Doll Show held in Japan in 1990.

Florio has sold over 400 dolls, ranging in price from \$250-\$1,000, since beginning her enterprise 10 years ago.

Florio's fascination with dolls and fabric began in early childhood. Her mother, Zelda Strecker, an accomplished textile crafts artist and fabric designer, was highly influential in Florio's calling to an artistic life. Growing up in the Chicago suburb of St. Charles, Ill., Florio recalls watching her mother working in her studio, a converted three car garage located behind the family home.

While in her teens, Florio would lie on the ground and have her mother trace her body to get accurate proportions for full size doll figures made of felt.

Working with felt eventually progressed to working with stockings. In high school, Florio began creating stocking face dolls (torso figures) that were interpretations of

people or portraits. "If I saw a woman with white hair and a pink dress, that became my next doll," Florio says.

Why does Florio make dolls? "Because I like to dress them!" Florio confesses with a smile. Her passion is the outfitting. "I love fashion because it is ever changing, ever evolving," Florio says. Although most doll makers design the face of a doll first, Florio's process is reversed.

"The doll's personality comes out in the clothing. Then, I decide on the face," Florio says, which she designs and hand draws with colored pencils.

Since becoming a mother, Florio has been more interested in making family and home oriented dolls. Although the majority of her

dolls are adult women, Florio is currently working on a little girl doll.

"I find it difficult to do children. It is much easier to do a doll that is like me, an adult woman," she admits.

"It usually takes about eight hours to complete the very simplest of dolls," she says, although Florio rarely sits down to complete a doll at one sitting.

Florio is "finally caught up on back orders," she says, that have been placed within the last four years.

Florio is enjoying her success. "It is very gratifying to have people buy my dolls, that someone else would enjoy them," Florio says.

For the past eight years she has been represented by Thomas

Boland and Co. of Chicago. "He has gotten me in all the right places," she says.

"It is very gratifying as well when other doll artists appreciate my work. Peer recognition is very important," she says.

When asked about her future plans, Florio says with a smile, "More dolls! I would like to do some clowns, and some brides," she says.

She would also like to begin silkscreening the faces and clothes at some point.

Florio is intrigued with the actual display of dolls. "Display is an art work. It gives the doll a stage, a presence," Florio says.

She would also like to devote more time to experimenting with display.

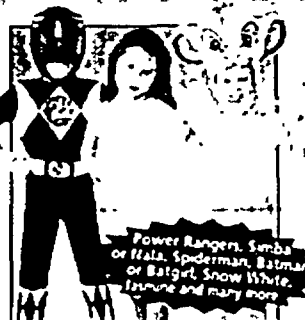

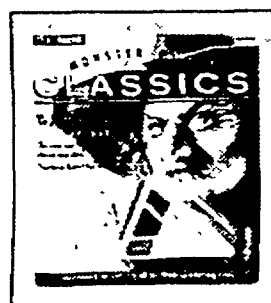

Hopefuls tackle track question at forum

said. "I think there is a possibility that a mixed land use (of the property) might be more beneficial to the city as long as the state fails to uphold its funding obligation."

Folino, a long-time supporter of Northville Downs, disagreed, stating that it would take "a lot of houses" to make up the revenue that the Downs brings to the city. "They are our biggest taxpayer," he said. "We currently get about \$450,000 in state revenue (from para-mutuel betting) that we don't have to share with any other governmental entity."

The council candidates had some ideas of their own when it came to Northville Downs. Roxanne Casterline, in her first try for public office, said that the Downs has been a good neighbor.

"I think we need to ask (the Downs) about the future of the track and the property," she said. "They have been the largest taxpayer in this city."

Since it opened in 1944, Northville Downs has provided the City of Northville with \$23.6 million in revenues — \$5.8 million in expenses billed by the city and \$17.8 in rebate money from the state. This figure doesn't reflect the property taxes paid by the Downs, but instead, is considered "free money."

With the steady decline of interest in horse racing in Michigan, track owners, earlier this year, attempted to convince Gov. Engler to allow video gaming machines at the track to boost revenue.

First-time council candidate Tom Swigart said that changes in the racing industry are coming, adding that those changes might not be beneficial for Northville.

"Anything that would allow the expansion of gambling would not be in the best interest of our community," he said. "I do not see it as

a viable option."

Incumbent council member Carolann Ayers agreed.

"I don't support additional gambling," she said. "There is very little local control as far as the horse racing industry is concerned and it is extremely important that our residents have their values tended by this council."

Folino said he would be in total support of video gaming at Northville Downs only when the track was open for its season.

"It would make the Downs more

viable and I believe our economy will ultimately suffer if the track is not viable," he said.

Johnson maintained that video gaming would have had a big effect on Northville, and would have changed the character of the community. Additional gambling, he said, would have been too much for Northville to handle.

"Changing the character of the community in favor of helping Northville Downs become more viable is unacceptable to me," Johnson added.

Candidates were also questioned about whether they had personal involvement with Northville Downs. Casterline admitted that her husband, Butch Casterline, had stock in the Northville Driving Club. She said the stock was inherited from Ray J. Casterline, who purchased it when the property was considered the Wayne County Fairgrounds.

"I don't know how much stock

(Butch) has. It's not that much," she said. "It's not something he considers an investment. It's his inheritance from his grandfather."

The city election is Tuesday, Nov. 7. City council terms are for four years, mayorships are two years in duration. All positions are part-time.

The mayor's compensation is \$600 a year, and city council members are paid \$500 annually.

Other city issues discussed at Monday debate

While Northville Downs took the spotlight as the top issue discussed by the candidates, other questions were posed by city residents at the candidates forum. Here's what was on some Northville residents' minds:

Mayoral candidates — Chris Johnson and Paul Folino.

Would the mayoral candidates support a skateboard park for kids?

Chris Johnson: Believes that recreation opportunities for kids are important. "I think that would be an excellent idea that could be accomplished by working with the Township."

Paul Folino: Also believes recreation opportunities for children are important but was uneasy with the skateboard park idea. "It may be something that would be good

for kids, but I don't think the city could handle the cost and issues associated with liability."

What are your views on shared services between communities?

Paul Folino: "I believe there are services that we can share with other communities. A perfect example is the city is currently working on an arrangement with Novi to share dispatch services."

Chris Johnson: "I've been an active proponent of sharing services with other communities. We cannot take on a large administrative load and I think we are proactive in exploring areas where we could share services with surrounding communities."

Northville High School is overcrowded. What is your opinion on the district's attempt to build a new high school?

Chris Johnson: "While we don't

ultimately make that decision, we have a large impact on that decision. We need to work together, and we need to stay involved in the process, keeping the interest of our children in mind."

Paul Folino: "We can't control what the school district does, as far as the high school is concerned."

Council candidates — Carolann Ayers, Tom Swigart, Roxanne Casterline.

With all the changes taking place in Northville, how can we keep our neighborhoods intact?

Roxanne Casterline: "I will continue to be a spokesperson for the majority. We need to continue to talk with citizens to address the needs of the community."

Tom Swigart: "We'll have to look at regulating traffic and address other issues. I believe it's impor-

tant to work with whatever resources we have available to us."

Carolann Ayers: "Our neighborhoods are indeed important, and there are several areas that we need to get control of, and we need a long-term plan to keep that small town environment."

How do we handle growth?

Tom Swigart: "We need to create a collective community vision, and by that I mean we need to assemble the collective opinion of our community."

Carolann Ayers: "I disagree that our population is growing. The population may be changing, and we need to develop long-range plans to deal with that change."

Roxanne Casterline: "The city itself is not growing. The important issue is how we work with the surrounding communities that are growing."

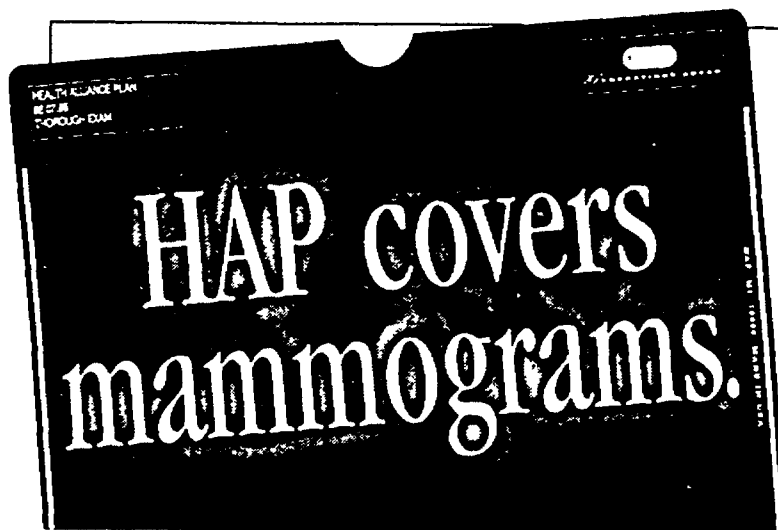

Folino offers cash for sign thief info

Northville mayoral candidate Paul Folino wants to get tough on crime - one that's been committed against him.

Folino is offering a reward of \$250 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for stealing his campaign lawn signs.

"About 50 of them are gone," Folino said. "We think it happened Saturday night or early Sunday morning."

Folino said the thefts occurred in the North Center/Baseline vicinity. He was first alerted to the theft by friends Monday morning. He filed a police report of the incident soon after learning about it.

Because so many signs were taken, Folino believes it wasn't

just a case of rambunctious youth having a little fun.

"This is not kids," he said. "Kids would just grab it or knock it over or tear it. They wouldn't blanket a whole area like this."

Folino said 200-300 lawn signs promote his candidacy throughout the city. Fifty signs, then, would represent 17-25 percent of the total.

Folino, a longtime member of the Northville City Council, chose to challenge incumbent Mayor Chris Johnson this year.

In doing so, he forgoes the chance to run for reelection to the council.

Johnson indicated this week that some of his campaign signs have disappeared too.

muffler were used to quiet the generator's noise, Panagiotides said.

Furniture and a large supply of canned food were found inside the shelter, he said. What else was present shocked the officers.

The phrase *Fortress of Evil - Beware* was written on both the outside and inside walls of the edifice, Panagiotides said. A shrine apparently devoted to devil worship was found inside the shelter, he added, along with Satanic writings, fake human and goat skulls

and illegal drug paraphernalia.

Real bones and skeletons of wild animals were found woven into the camouflage netting, Panagiotides continued.

Northville Township firefighters dismantled the shelter over the next 24 hours. Police suspect that the materials used in its construction may have been stolen from area construction sites. The investigation into who may have called it home continues

Job service goes on-line

Michigan jobseekers in search of employment anywhere in the country can find openings by accessing a new free on-line computer service offered by the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC), said agency director F. Robert Edwards.

MESC's electronic bulletin board, LMI On-Line, now carries America's Job Bank (AJB). AJB features 40,000 current job orders from the 50 states plus Guam and Washington, D.C. The number of job orders and states varies from week to week depending on the number of orders in the system. The listings are updated weekly.

"Jobseekers can dial into the system through their computer modems and look at all types of jobs throughout the country from managerial and professional jobs to general laborer positions at no charge," said Edwards.

"This supplement to our regular placement services is a great way for jobseekers to see what options are available to them around the country in their chosen occupa-

tion," he added.

Users can select an occupation and a geographic area in which to conduct their job search. Then jobseekers may directly contact the employment security office listed on the job order for more information or to apply for the job. Some other occupational categories to choose from include technical, sales and administrative support, service, precision production, craft and repair, operators and fabricators and agricultural, forestry and fishing.

To access LMI On-Line, callers need a personal computer, a communications package and a modem. The service is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Proposal would alter race track funding outlook

giving Michigan horse tracks a financial break after Gov. John Engler effectively quashed their bid to bring video gaming to the tracks. The horse racing industry has been in decline the past two decades, and some tracks may be forced out of business.

Since it opened in 1944, Northville Downs has provided the City of Northville with \$23.6 million in revenues - \$5.8 million in expenses billed by the city and \$17.8 million in rebate money from the state.

That figure doesn't reflect the property taxes paid by the Downs, but instead, is considered "free money."

The city does not include the funding in its budget because, as Northville Mayor Chris Johnson explained, it's not a sure bet.

"I'd have to say that (Northville) loses money because the governor has cut the city's entitlement from para-mutuel betting in half," he said. "I think there is a possibility that a mixed land use (of the property) might be more beneficial to the city as long as the state fails to uphold its funding obligation."

The state has decreased the funding amount to race track cities for the past few years.

Bullard is the chairman of the House Tax Policy Committee, and maintains horse-racing tracks such as Northville Downs are on the verge of going out of business.

"Keeping tracks healthy makes sense, especially for the surrounding communities that depend on them for jobs and revenue," he said.

"Comprehensive economic devel-

opment should not only invite new opportunities but ensure that existing facilities are not left to crumble," Bullard added. "The loss of a track can be very damaging to an area's long-term stability."

He explained that the positive impact of this legislation should not be underestimated. The bill's intent is to ensure that communities like Northville remain vibrant and avoid the downward spiral of many urban centers experienced today, he explained.

Law believes the loss of Michigan's horse racing industry would be a serious blow. Horse racing is important to recreation and tourism. It also generates business for the state, he explained.

"In 1994, about 2.1 million people bet more than \$356 million at Michigan's eight race tracks," Law said. "This \$1.2 billion industry supports more than 42,000 jobs and generates about \$233 million in income to Michigan residents."

Mayoral candidate and current councilman Paul Folino believes the city should treat Northville Downs as a "good neighbor."

"They are our biggest taxpayer," he said. "We currently get about \$450,000 in state revenue (from para-mutuel betting) that we don't have to share with any other governmental entity."

Under the initiative, the Legislature could appropriate up to \$7.5 million for funding county fairs, licensed pari-mutuel race tracks, other equestrian programs and various agricultural activities.

Tracks can benefit from tax elimination

Gov. John Engler's decision earlier this year to disallow additional wagering in the state was a mixed blessing for Michigan race tracks.

It was a setback because track owners were hoping that approval of electronic gaming machines would enhance their competitive position vis-a-vis casino gambling houses.

It was a blessing because the governor's decision not to permit new casinos will help limit the number of establishments that stand to lure away the wagering dollar.

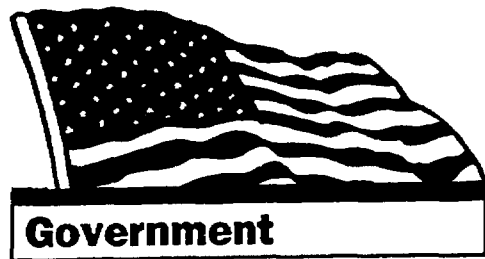
With metro-area tracks already facing competition from a casino across the river, Engler's decree was more of a blow than a boon. The track continues to face a natural decline in attendance along with a drain from Casino Windsor.

To help offset the negative effects of the governor's move, the state Legislature is considering abolishing the 4.5 percent pari-mutuel tax levied against tracks.

Such a development would hurt the city, which currently receives about \$4.5 million a year from the tax. But tracks would benefit from the tax relief.

Gerald Law and Willis Bullard, both of whom represent portions of Northville in the state House, are co-sponsoring the measure, and we support their position.

The loss of the money would impact the city, which has used its share of



the revenue mostly for capital improvement over the years. But budget planners have wisely stopped counting on the money, because the state has been inconsistent in rendering payment since 1991.

This year's budget does not account for the \$450,000 the city could receive in state race track funds. If the money materializes, fine. But if it doesn't, no one's depending on it.

The track, on the other hand, clearly needs the help. Track representatives say that attendance was off 20 percent this past winter, the first season that the Downs went up against Windsor for the wagering dollar. Other metro-area tracks report the same kind of drop off.

The situation was so bad, Detroit Race Course even had to cancel its famed Michigan Mile run.

No one knows if the elimination of a 4.5 percent tax will enable Michigan race tracks to survive - it might just prolong the inevitable.

But, with an estimated 40,000 jobs statewide hanging in the balance, it's an attempt that must be made.

Downs deserves our support

I'm probably going to catch heck for this. Seems like everytime I criticize a public reaction I get

called on the carpet from the readers and reminded that I live in another community. Who am I, a non-resident, to second guess people who have to live with the consequences of local decisions, they tell me.

I can see it coming but I'll speak my peace anyway, which is this: I think it's crummy that so many people are down on the Downs.

As everyone knows, the track, like all racing establishments, has fallen on hard times. Race wagering is on the decline as a form of entertainment, and metro-area tracks have doubly suffered with the inception of casino gambling just across the river in Windsor.

Complaints about the track and the people who frequent it are nothing new, but it seems that a lot of people are using the track's latest misfortune to level a fresh series of attacks.

There is a very real possibility that Northville Downs, the healthiest race track in Michigan, won't survive much longer, and it appears that there is no shortage of folks who are eager to witness the agonizing end.

Have they forgotten how long the track has been a part of this community? It's more than 50 years old.

Have they forgotten how much the track has contributed to the city? Over \$23.6 million since the words "they're off" first blared from a loud speaker back in

1944.

In a city whose budget in current dollars is only around \$4 million, that's a lot of treasury notes.

If I were designing a city with a small downtown and narrow streets, I'm sure I wouldn't plop a race track down in its central business district. But Northville, like all communities, has built up in piecemeal fashion and the track got its foot in the door very early on. By any reasonable account, it has a right to its plot of ground at Seven and Center.

Northville Downs can boast enough seniority to warrant status as an institution. But the track has its detractors, and recently they've bent the needle on the complaint-o-meter.

And the harsh voices are liable to become even harsher because state lawmakers are considering legislation that would virtually eliminate the city's take of track profits. If the proposal passes, the Downs would still pay considerable property taxes but the six-figure annual windfall the city has enjoyed as a host community would be gone.

Needless to say, that would further lower the race track's neighborly appeal with the locals.

The primary knock against the track is that it is a draw for all manner of riffraff from the outside. The track has its characters, to be sure, but they seem to just come here, do their business and leave. If they cross anyone, it's probably other wagers. I've heard Chief of Police Rodney Cannon publicly dispute the notion that the track is a drain on police resources.

Writer responds to OLV defender

To the Editor:
I would like to address the following comments to Martha Phillips who wrote last week defending the plans of Our Lady of Victory to expand in a residential neighborhood.

The meeting "to inform neighbors and address their concerns" was called by Fr. Porcari and of Our Lady of Victory after it was learned residents had met to investigate the building proposal. Mayoral candidate and member in good standing of OLV, Paul Folino, states in a letter dated Oct. 17: "I first learned of these proposals after much of the parish and Orchard Heights residents had already attended a meeting to discuss them. It was not until I attended church service on Oct. 8 that I saw the architectural rendering hanging on the vestibule wall."

The architectural drawing which shows many trees remaining flies in the face of reality when one considers a building of 36,000 square feet on 1.8 acres plus legal set-backs.

You have said that 35 parking spaces for the new building have been approved by the city planning commission.

How can this be true when it hasn't come up before the commission?

The present parking facility is short some 20 plus spaces according to the present zoning ordinance.

A parking variance enabling the church to occupy their present facilities was granted by the zoning board, requiring that certain arrangements be met, 10 years ago.

None of these arrangements was ever fulfilled.

Inquiries to the city as to why this has not been enforced have been unsatisfactory.

In the meantime they remain in non-compliance and park all over the neighborhood

I am sorry to learn that the Schrader house, still lovely, has been allowed to deteriorate.

Observation will show that most of the surrounding homes have been cared for and maintained in a first rate manner.

I know you don't live in this neighborhood and it is easy to be untroubled by increased traffic, over-extended parking and the erosion of a residential area, if you are not the one experiencing it.

I believe it is important to look to the future and realize that if the growth of the OLV school and church are imminent, the sooner they find a site appropriate for the expansion they envision, the better things will be for all.

It seems to be a little publicized fact that the church has made inquiries about buying additional property adjacent to and west of the Orchard Drive, Main Street lots

These are in the township and indicate a wish to expand even more in this area in the future.

The goals of OLV are in contradiction to the goals of the City of Northville as stated in the Master Plan.

I sincerely hope that the planning commission will pay heed to this when this proposal comes before them.

Also, "my hat is off" to Fire Chief Zhmendak for his department's recent recognition, a special life saving achievement award from the International Association of Fire Chiefs.

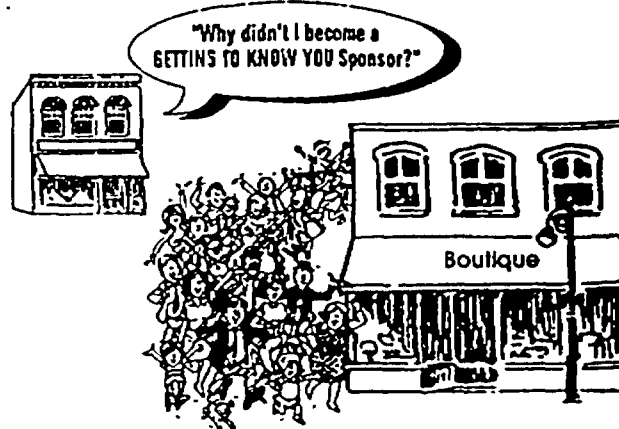
It was a real honor for each member of the department and our Northville community.

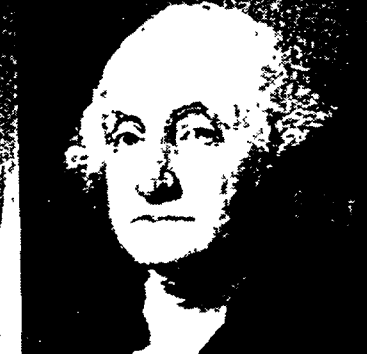

Don't just talk about family values

Peter Luke is a reporter in the Booth Newspapers' Lansing bureau. In his column last Sunday, he produced the interesting idea that the Michigan Legislature may be on the way to giving something more than mere lip service to the now-trivialized phrase "family values."

As evidence, Luke pointed to bills now under consideration that would make it tougher to get a divorce, crack down on underage drinking and restrict driving privileges for teenagers.

I think he's on to something.

Most thoughtful people are beginning to come around to conclude there is something terribly important about maintaining intact functioning families as social units that can pass on values and ethics and discipline to the unruly impulses of adolescents.

Interestingly, the day after Luke's column was published, the wire services moved a piece reporting U.S. Census Bureau findings that the percentage of single-parent families is continuing to grow in the U.S. From a low 13 percent in 1970, the figure rose to 22 percent in 1980 and to 28 percent in 1990. Last year it was nearly 31 percent.

Of the 11.5 million single-parent families

nationwide, 9.9 million are headed by mothers and 1.6 million by fathers. Nearly two-thirds of black families with children are headed by single parents; for whites, it's 25 percent.

Nationwide, 30.5 percent of all births (22 percent white, 68 percent black) are now out of wedlock, the highest in the world.

Ask the cops. The kids who get in trouble with the law tend to come from broken homes. Ask the teachers. The kids who are in trouble at school are more often than not from single-parent families. Ask the social workers. Dysfunctional families are the single most common root cause for a whole range of social ills from drug abuse to sexual abuse.

Our society's crisis is not legal. It's no longer even racial. It is social. Whole neighborhoods of children are growing up without families, mostly without fathers and usually without the habits, schooling and skills required to survive in today's world.

The obvious question is whether a device as clumsy as a bill enacted by the Michigan Legislature can really do anything concrete or effective about reversing the trend toward deteriorating families.

In the case of divorce, where the Legislature is considering rewriting the no-fault divorce law, it seems clear that passing a law would have an undeniable effect. If a couple is childless, the divorce would be granted if both parties want it. But if one spouse objects or if there are kids, the divorce would be granted only if a spouse broke the mar-

riage contract - i.e., adultery, abuse, drugs, drinking.

But most abuses remain stubbornly immune even to legislative prohibition.

I think instead we should explore novel ways to punish (and, hopefully, deter) bad behavior and to stimulate that old-fashioned feeling: shame.

Newspapers already print the names of "Johns," men who are arrested for soliciting prostitutes, as well as people convicted of drunk driving. What about requiring convicted drunk drivers to put an icon of a bottle or a big red "D" on their license plates? Big-time troublemakers in school used to be made to wear dunce caps; why not now?

Why shouldn't unwed, underage mothers be required to live with their parent(s) instead of using welfare to get their own apartments?

And why shouldn't we start enforcing the old regulation that every birth certificate has to contain the social security number of the father?

Wringing our hands about the decline in family values seems pointless. What we need to do is identify concrete ways in which our social institutions can help the values of the family, now under assault from a complex, rapidly changing, and sometimes threatening world.

Attention Deficit Disorder

A special three-event program on Attention Deficit Disorder will be presented by Oakland Community College's Community Awareness Institute on Friday, Oct. 27 and Saturday, Oct. 28.

All three segments feature nationally-recognized ADD expert Daniel G. Amen, M.D., and will take place in the Smith Theater on OCC's Orchard Ridge Campus in Farmington Hills.

Chancellor clears out

Fired OCC head leaves; board searches for replacement

Now that Dr. Patsy Calkins has cleaned out her desk in the chancellor's office, Oakland Community College trustees have begun tying up loose ends that unraveled during the three-months battle that ended in her firing.

The five-member majority — with Calkins supporters Janice Simmons and Anne Scott absent — on Oct. 19 scheduled two special meetings at 6 p.m.:

- Monday, Oct. 30 — to discuss hiring a permanent interim chancellor. Dr. James Warner, vice chancellor for curriculum, is serving as temporary Interim Chancellor. Trustees also want to discuss an audit amid hints by vice chair Judith Wiser that "everything's going to be audited — the trustees, the former chancellor, everything."

- Thursday, Nov. 2 — to hear presentations by five companies for a contract as construction manager for tens of millions of dollars of renovations and repairs that voters asked for when they approved a \$25 million property tax increase in June.

Calkins had recommended the firm of Barton Malow in Southfield. But the board, at her final

meeting Oct. 16, shoved aside the recommendation because it wanted more information on the other four finalists.

Those are A.J. Etkin Construction Co., Farmington Hills; George W. Auch Co., Pontiac; Turner Construction Co., a large New York firm with a Detroit office; and Albridge Aldinger Co., Detroit. All will be asked for 10-minute presentations.

Trustees will ask: What recent experience do you have with community college projects? In the report submitted by an administrative committee, only Barton Malow appeared to have recent work — with OCC itself. Its chief executive is a former OCC employee, and it has trained OCC employees.

OCC has five campuses, including three that are 30 years old. Little if any new construction is anticipated.

As temporary CEO, Warner promised that "my style will be considerably different from my predecessors." He said he would seek "mutually acceptable" solutions.

Trustees broke a logjam with approval of a revised list of administrative, faculty and staff appointments. "Under no circumstances," said human resources director Edward Callaghan,

"will we touch contingency funds" to pay them — a sore point that contributed to Calkins' downfall.

Callaghan said four positions were dropped from the list recommended by Calkins over the last two months. An administrative assistant who had been transferred out of the chancellor's office was transferred back; a faculty transfer and a building and grounds transfer between campuses were added.

Among major personnel changes:

- Schavi Mali Ali, Orchard Ridge English faculty member since 1989, was granted a winter semester sabbatical to work on a cultural diversity text in Florida and Egypt.

- Anne C. Craigmile was promoted to interim dean for student services at Highland Lakes, replacing Dean Sarah Serrah, who resigned to take a private university position.

- Kathy Groesbeck-Moran, coordinator of cardiovascular technology at the Highland Lakes Campus, had her program eliminated this semester.

- John Domm, director of advanced police training at the Auburn Hills Campus, retired.

Calkins got 'B' grades from board

Imagine a student who gets three A's, 15 B's and eight C's — and then is flunked out of school.

That's what Dr. Patsy Calkins' report card looked like after four of Oakland Community College's seven trustees last week gave her a performance evaluation.

Then the board on Oct. 16 fired her as chancellor on a 5-2 vote.

Her performance evaluation indicated the forms were filled out by two trustees who backed her and two of the dissidents. Three dissidents ignored the evaluation process.

Trustees were asked to rate Calkins in 26 areas on a scale of 1-5.

She received three 5 ratings (relations with business and political leaders and collaborative projects with community leaders).

"The red head from Texas has taken Oakland County by storm," one trustee wrote anonymously.

Her lowest marks, which averaged out to 3's, were in relationships with the board of trustees — making a sincere effort to know trustees' wishes, providing them information and so on.

"The information provided to the board is not adequate to make

decisions because the best and complete information is not presented," another trustee wrote. "Board members have to make formal motions to get pertinent information. PJFC communicates with individual board members — not with the board."

"PJFC plays the blame game; everyone is responsible for mistakes but the chancellor."

As an educational leader, Calkins had 15 ratings of 4 — presenting a clear educational vision, aligning the faculty to the vision, demonstrating the importance of students. On a student's report card, it amounted to a solid B

average. As an administrator she scored most 4's — organizing and scheduling time, demonstrating multi-culturalism, and budgeting — with a couple of soft spots in "maintaining fiscal integrity" and labor relations.

When news broke in September of two trustees' request for her resignation, Calkins was publicly supported and praised by County Executive L. Brooks Patterson, business leaders and black groups, former trustees, faculty members, staff and students. The only dissenting voice was one student.

Key to quality is fair's jury process

The first and most important step in presenting a quality fine art and crafts fair is the jury process; it is also the most difficult, according to Sugarloaf Art Fairs' President Deann Verdier. "Jurying" is the selection process artisans must go through in order to have their work accepted at quality fairs. Sugarloaf Art Fairs receive over 10,000 applications and typically accept only one in five artisans.

Applicants to Sugarloaf Fairs must display quality fine art and crafts with a focus on excellent workmanship. The artists' work must be innovative and reflect new designs and creations. Even exhibitors that have been coming to Sugarloaf Fairs for years must resubmit applications twice annually to show improvement and change in their work. The artisans' work is placed in the following media: wood, photography, leather, jewelry, textiles/fiber, fine arts, glass, pottery, metal and miscellaneous. Verdier determines the number of exhibitors for each category at each show based on the sales from previous years.

Verdier oversees all aspects of "jurying" for Sugarloaf. After viewing thousands of slides of the artisan's work, she makes the final decision on every artisan selected. Over the years she has developed a reputation in the industry for being highly selective. Verdier says, "I would rather leave empty booths than sacrifice the quality of the fair." Fortunately, she has not had to face that dilemma since applications to Sugarloaf fairs have steadily risen for the past 20 years.

The competitive selection process ultimately results in tough decisions. Over the years, Verdier has developed a love-hate relationship with the jury procedure. "I love reviewing all the new work, but at the same time I know everyone will not make it into the fair. Art is an extension of someone's personality and a personal insult."

Every year Verdier receives hate mail from exhibitors who are not accepted. However, most are reasonable; they realize she must insist on high standards and new work to maintain the quality of the fair. Verdier also includes new artists each year in anticipation of the question that patrons most often ask: "What's new this year?"

Verdier has developed a skill for predicting trends — from discovering specific gems, like wooden compact disc cases, to identifying large patterns, such as colors evolving from neutrals to the now popular vibrant tones. She adds, "After directing fairs for 20 years, you know what the people want." And although Verdier would never sacrifice the quality of the fair, she attempts to include something for everyone.

Labor Day campers this year ran into "full" signs at most of the popular state parks unless they had a reservation. This year DNR inaugurated the 800 toll free number for reservations and had enormous success.

When you call, be ready with this information: name, address, camping equipment type (tent or vehicle) and size, Visa or MasterCard number, and telephone number of a contact person.

For a mail-in reservation form, call the same number.

The toll-free number is staffed from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on weekends.

There is a small charge for making a reservation and a minimum stay of three nights required.

The system is used for the state parks, which generally have nicer facilities, including electric power and hot showers. It is not used for state forest campgrounds.

Michigan also has campgrounds in the Huron, Manistee, Hiawatha and Ottawa national forests, run by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. So far they have not instituted reservation systems.

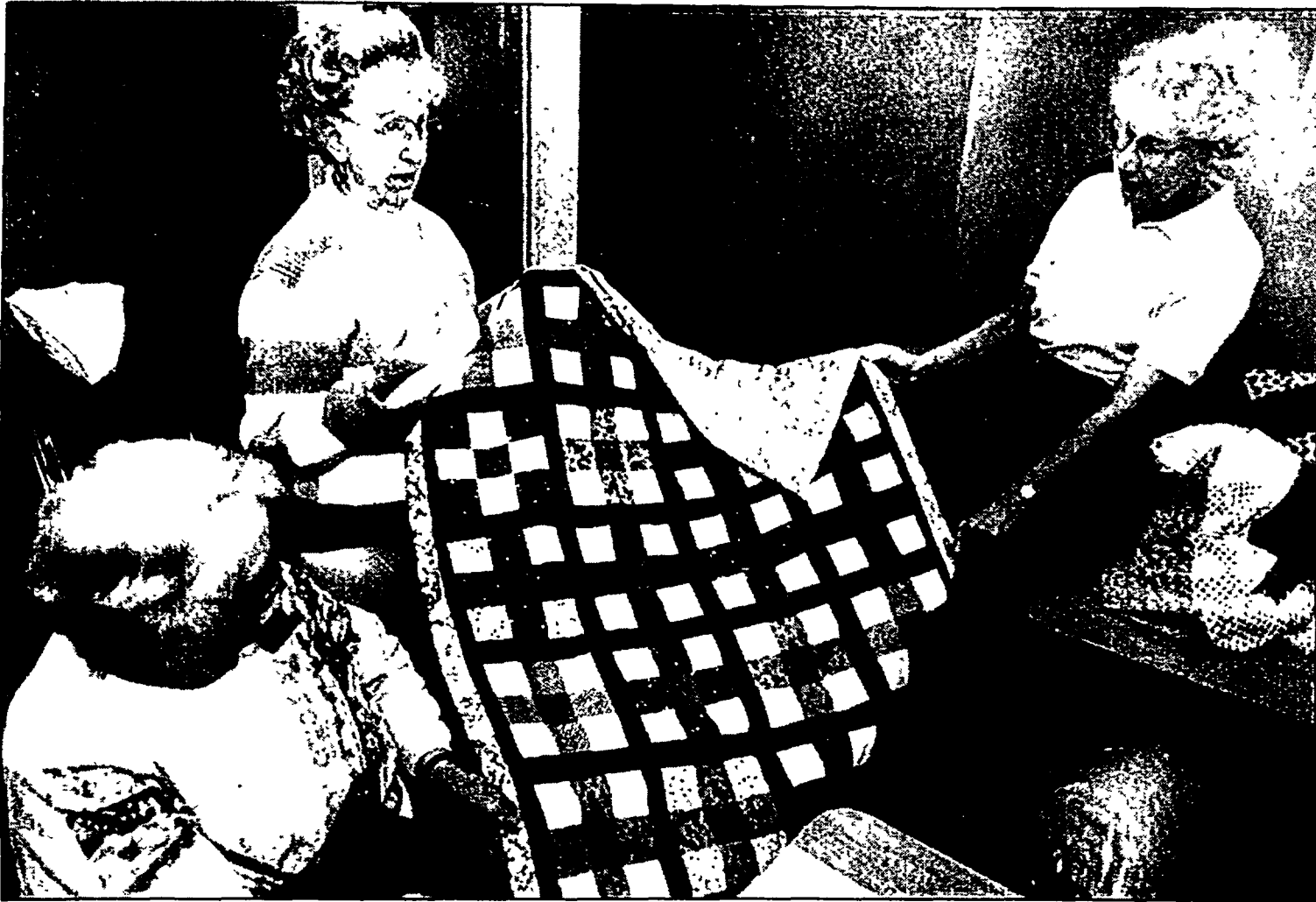

New law stopped teacher strikes

Guess what did not happen this September? There were no teacher strikes in Michigan. State Rep. Willis Bullard Jr. R-Milford, said he believes that is good news worth publicizing.

"Classrooms are not empty but bustling with activity due to Michi-gan's new anti-strike law," Bullard said. "Our children are extremely important and should not be used as pawns to force negotiations."

Under Public Act 112 of 1994, teachers and teachers unions are financially penalized for illegal strikes.

"PA 112 attacks the heart of the matter," Bullard said. "Teacher strikes have been illegal since 1965 when legislation was enacted giving public employees the right to organize and collectively bargain contracts. Teachers are entitled to fair wages, benefits and working conditions. PA 112 does not limit or impair teachers' rights to collectively bargain, express opinions or file grievances or complaints as long as such actions do not inter-rupt their duties."

"PA 112 returns school manage-ment to the community without diminishing the employment rights of teachers. By ensuring that par-ents have a voice in determining how local schools are run and avoiding illegal strikes, we guaran-tee that our children will receive a quality education."

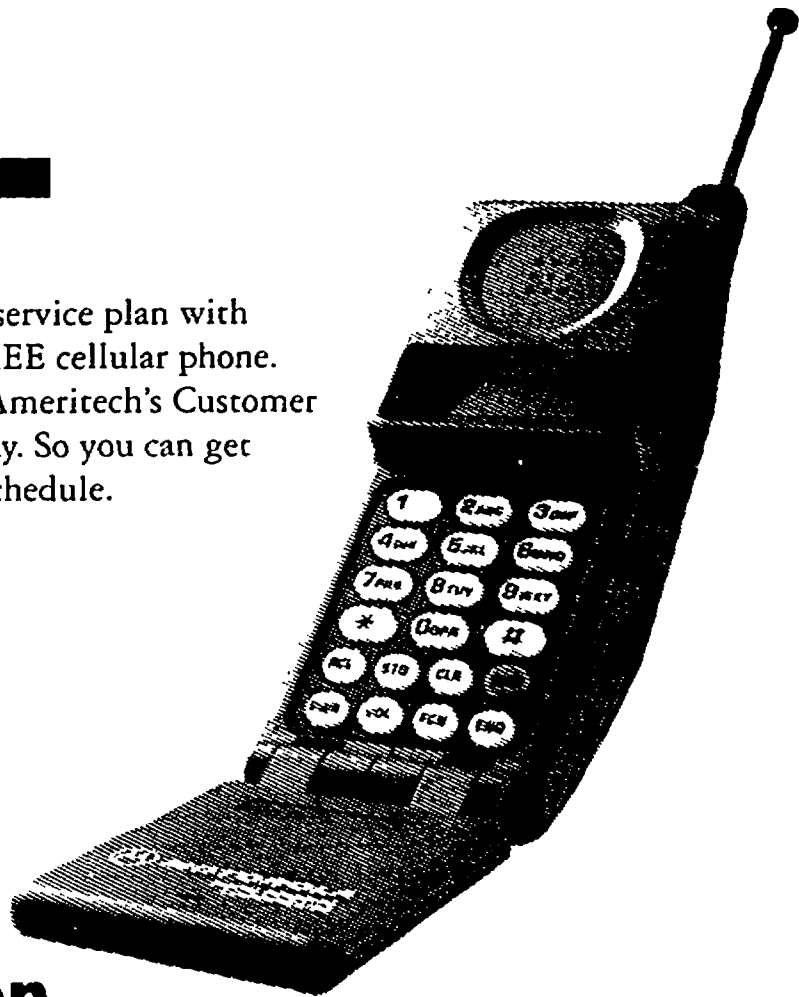

Guests will be enchanted by the magical tale of "Wizard of Oz" as Hudson's presents its sixth annual holiday animated walk-through display.

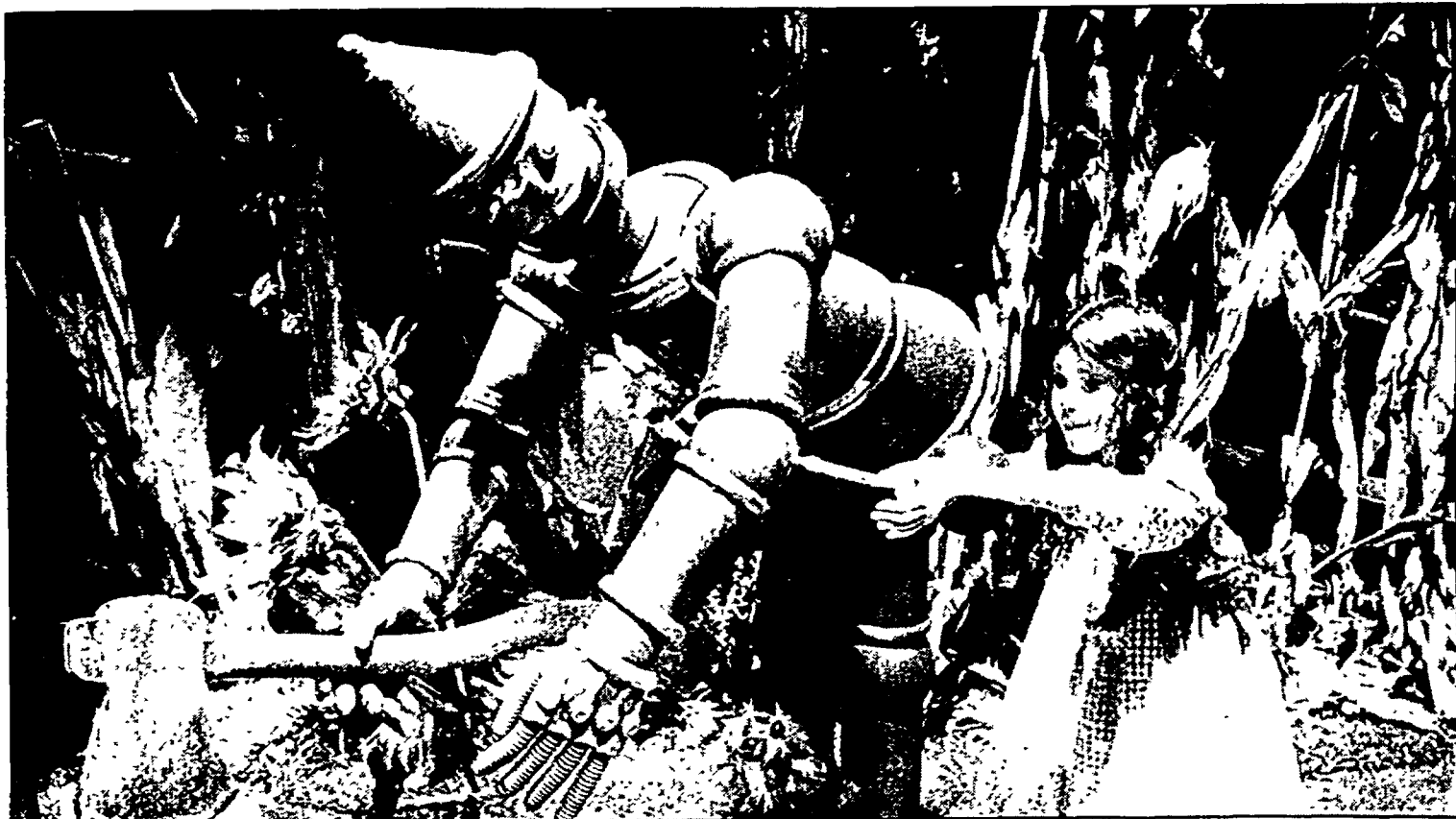

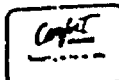

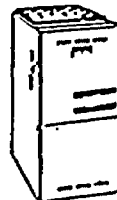

Ghost encounters

(Though the following story is based on a true account, family members have asked that their real names not be used to protect their privacy. The names used in the story, then, are substitutes.)

he stands in the doorway studying Bill as he sleeps on the couch, a much deserved rest after a day painting and fixing up the recently purchased colonial style home for his wife, Betty, and their two young children. Sleep also brings escape from the unexplainable events of the day. His deep slumber is not enough to keep him from sensing he is not alone. He awakens to find her watching over him. The soft white silhouette of her petite frame is standing in the kitchen doorway, but the face is lost as is the reason she has decided to linger in this world and keep the house safe from harm long after her death. A chill cuts through the calm as he begins to understand he is not dreaming. Once she is gone, sleep does not return. Bill says nothing to Betty about the mystery before moving into the house. He does not want to alarm her that the 25-year old home

in Northville may be haunted.

He needs time to sort things through. This is not the first time Bill has witnessed the supernatural. When he was in his early twenties, he was riding in a car with a group of friends when the vehicle hit an embankment. Bill had an out-of-body experience and witnessed the EMS squad pulling his friends from the wreckage for transport to the hospital. He also heard the technicians pronounce him dead.

Bill survived and five years later had his first ghostly encounter. As an insurance salesman, he made a call on a home which had been the scene of a murder. Bill saw a desecrated ghost in the home.

Before Bill could move his family into their new home, there was a lot of work that needed to be done. One day, while Bill and a friend were on the second floor painting, they heard a toilet on the first floor flush.

Another time, before the installation of the wall-to-wall carpet, both heard footsteps on the floor below and went down to see who was walking around. They found no one.

Six months after moving into their home, Bill told his wife about the bizarre occurrences and the ghostly visits. She thought he was crazy and was just complaining because he had so much work to do.

When they first walked through the house with the realtor, the shrubs were overgrown and the house was dark, empty and neglected.

The couple wondered about the crosses and crucifixes that had been left in the home by the previous owner, who had already moved out. They assumed he must have been a religious man. • The Downtown Development Authority. The subject was one of adequate parking for customers coming to the downtown area.

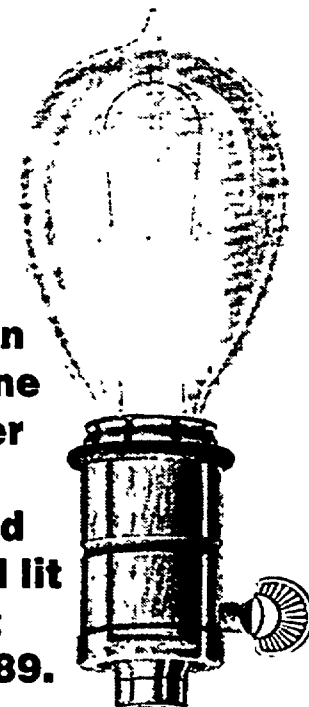
"I'm still waiting for a meeting to be called" this year. His term of office is through September 1996.

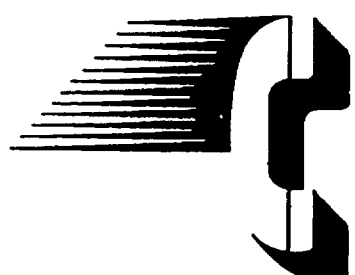

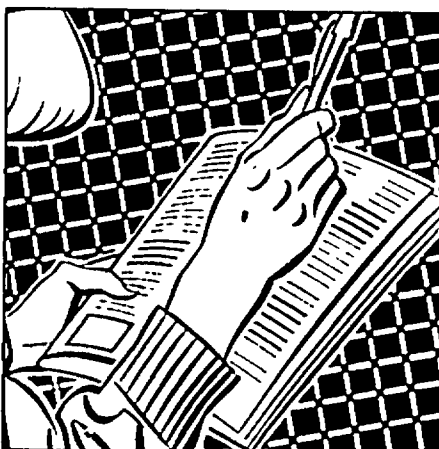

When it comes to decorating, this home constantly changes

Halloween decorations don't stop at the "The Witch Is In" sign on the front door at Chuck and Aletta Holmes' historic Northville home.

One guest to the 150-year-old home recently told Aletta that she doesn't have room for one more Halloween decoration. She told him he was wrong, of course, since she could put a full-size witch right where he was standing.

Theme decorating may have started about 20 years ago when Aletta made a set of jack-o-lantern dishes. Since then, estate sales and auctions, garage sales and antique shows have proven to be fruitful places for finding collectible items to decorate their home in any of 10 different themes throughout the year.

Even a cow rider's cast-off flowers turned into Halloween decorations, as well as the old, not often-rebaked.

Everything can become a holiday item, Aletta said, from the orange and black pasta in a jar on the kitchen counter to the ads and stories, from 1942 issues of *Woman's Home Companion* which are framed and scattered throughout the house. One ad gives

instructions on making a clown from a hollowed-out pumpkin.

In the first floor bathroom, temporarily renamed the costume room, old costumes, masks and props some of which were used by the Holmes's two children when they were young are hanging up on the wall and shower doors.

A motion-activated witch mask and costume have been strategically hung on the wall to let out a hearty "heh heh heh heh heh" to an unsuspecting visitor.

Range from full-size witches to minnequins in costumes Aletta made from old drapes, animated figures, including a rat scurrying in a rat trap on a floor, a small village decorated for Halloween, and more pumpkins than Aletta has ever counted, there is a binder for each holiday with recipes that have become family traditions.

A hell-wad, or pumpkin, serves as a centerpiece dish for chicken stew, Pumpkin chesecake, a jack-o-lantern chocolate cake, and burgers with melted cheese in the shape of jack-o-lanterns have become regular menu items at Halloween.

A frequent entertainer, Aletta makes placecards which she puts

in front of such dishes as bat wings with satin sauce, rotten raven's eggs, creepy crab salad and BBQ bones (that's chicken wings, deviled eggs, crab salad and spare ribs).

The recipe names are changed to reflect both the holiday or theme and the dish.

A new addition to the dining room this year is a full-size witch Aletta purchased from Tivoli Fair.

"I can work anything in and build on it," she said.

One year while on a weekend of football games, tailgating and sightseeing, an antique store beckoned Aletta to pass through its portals. Chuck and their friends, who had waited outside, just shook their heads as Aletta emerged a few minutes later with a black cat pedestal ashtray.

"Every year is different," she said. "I probably couldn't duplicate a year if I tried."

With just days to go before the big night, Aletta is still putting the finishing touches on the ghosts she has made with cheese cloth stiffened with starch which adorn the curtain rod in the living room.

For Sweetest Day, Chuck bought Aletta the book *Hauntings - Tales of the Supernatural*.

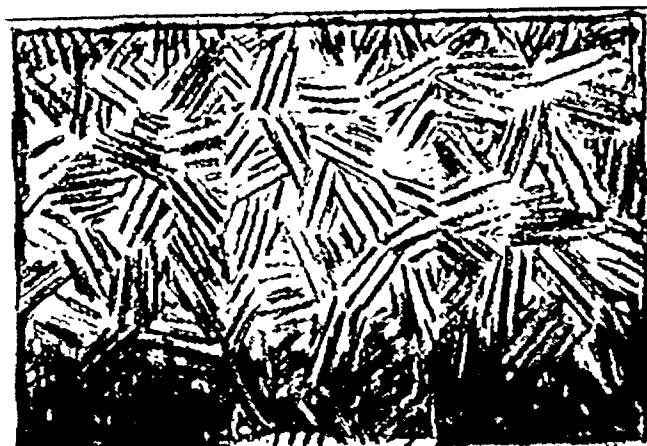

siege of murders in San Francisco. There's something unusual about the way these crimes are being committed, and M.J. knows she needs Hudson's expertise to find the killer.

A driven pursuer, Monahan, assisted by her young partner, Ruben Goetz (Dermot Mulroney), will do whatever it takes to enlist Hudson's help.

The two women find themselves locked in a struggle of wills as Hudson tries to remain uninvolved and Monahan is determined to end the doctor's self-imposed exile.

And the murders keep occurring, taking on an ominous pattern that Hudson suddenly recognizes ... someone is imitating the

methods of infamous serial killers of the past in his crimes.

But now their quarry discovers he's being monitored, and he figures out who's doing the observing.

Helen Hudson knows how he thinks.

But the killer knows where she lives.

"Copycat" is directed by Jon Amiel.

For centuries, we have been fascinated by serial killers, whose careers have shocked, disgusted and terrified, but ultimately obsessed people the world over.

Perhaps it is the idea that, beneath a human exterior, thoughts and impulses are at work in these killers that are considered

inhuman.

Perhaps it is man's desire to understand such deviant behavior better, so that it can be prevented in the future. Or perhaps these assailants are so incomprehensibly bizarre that we cannot turn away from them until we feel as if we can know them, recognize them, protect ourselves from them.

Director Jon Amiel felt that the time had come in his career to explore these powerful feelings.

"I felt ready to really look at one of the darker corners of life," he said. "I wanted to make a thriller which worked within the genre and was new and truthful as well as exciting and scary."

Amiel said he has never seen a

movie that gave a realistic portrayal of a serial killer with the possible exception of "Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer."

"In most films we see the demonic figures of our imagination, none of them have much to do with reality," explained Amiel. "If you look at pictures of Bundy or Dahmer, for example, you find people who look intensely normal. Their neighbors always say how quiet they were, how nice and helpful they were."

"To me, the fascinating question is — how can you tell?" added the director.

"They are not the gibbering, dysfunctional maniacs you see in the movies; they appear to be just the guys next door."

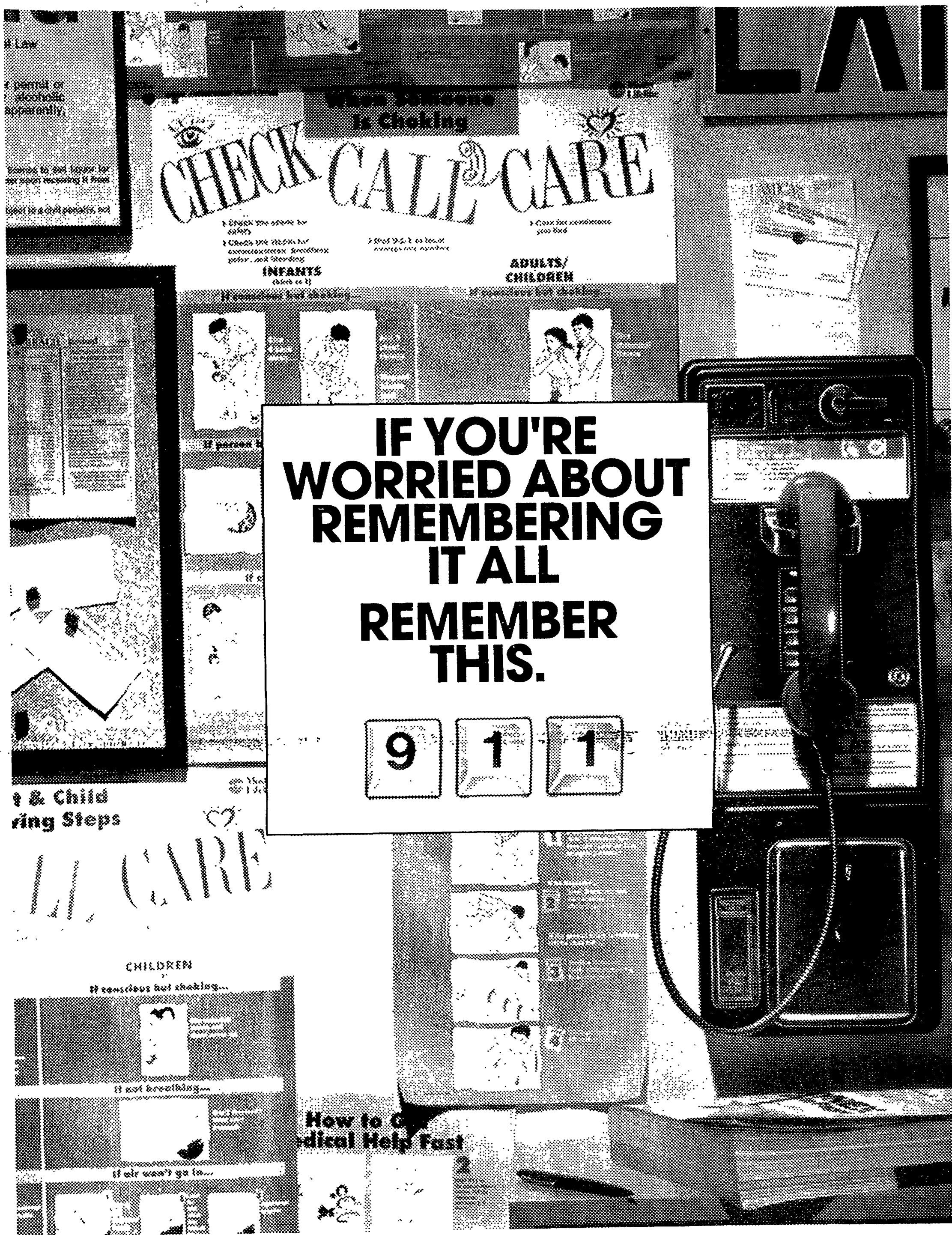

Then the real swashbuckling, basket-driving, press-you-into-submission Mustangs showed up for the second half and blew Novi off the court for a final of 58-38.

"What a bad first half," coach Pete Wright admitted. "We didn't come ready to play in the beginning."

The weather was crummy, the course was soaked and the wind was blowing.

Other than that, Friday was a great day to golf at Michigan State University's east course. Northville High's K. Yoshida didn't mind too much, though.

"I had a lot of fun," the senior said. "It was a good experience."

Yoshida was Northville's lone representative at the state finals. More than 100 golfers competed in the less than ideal conditions for a chance at Saturday's final round.

While Yoshida fired an excellent round of 78, it was quite good enough to make the cut. Northville coach Trish Murray said players had to shoot 75 or better to make it to Saturday.

"That's a great round in that kind of weather," she said of Yoshida's effort. "It just rained non-stop. It was miserable."

Yoshida shot 40 on the front nine and 38 on the back.

"He played very well," Murray said.

The east course lends itself to good scores. It's not very long and hazards can be avoided.

"The par 5s are reachable in two," said Murray. "If you're playing well you're going to be able to score. There's not much trouble."

Yoshida has as much trouble with his own gear as the course.

Because of the cold, he wore four layers of clothes. Wearing a jacket made it tough to swing free and easy.

Mustangs fall 21-7 to John Glenn in WLAA cross over

Scoring seven points isn't going to win many football games.

Northville High managed just a touchdown against Westland John Glenn Friday and lost 21-7. Coach Darrel Schumacher was worried about letting the Rockets get a lead on their home field.

"I was concerned that if they could score on us early or often we'd be in trouble," he said, pointing to Glenn's strong defense.

Northville scored first in the cold and windy weather, but couldn't do much with that defense the rest of the way.

"We knew we'd have to score again," Schumacher said. "There was no way to keep them from scoring."

The Mustangs may have been hampered by the loss

of quarterback Scott Vigh, receiver Eric Moore and fullback Mike Edwards. All three starters were suspended from the team for the final two games of the season for disciplinary reasons.

Schumacher felt the rest of the squad stepped up in their absence.

"To be honest," Schumacher said, "I think that's outstanding for this team. We're not happy with 4-4, but it could've been worse."

The Mustangs close the season tomorrow at Novi in the Annual Baseline Jug game. The Wildcats are 3-5 going into the contest.

"It will be a tough game," Schumacher said. "Don't pay attention to the records."

As for Friday's game with the Rockets, Northville started out with the ball.

The Mustangs carried for two straight first downs to start the drive. Northville moved down to the Westland 42-yard line before it stalled. Glenn, however, didn't do much with its first possession.

The teams traded possessions until late in the first quarter.

Garrett Carter, who wound up with 17 tackles, dropped the Westland quarterback for an eight-yard loss back to the 26-yard line. The Rockets were forced to punt.

Anell Kersey gathered the Glenn kick at his own 38 and promptly scampered 62-yards for a touchdown. Northville led 7-0 at 1:41.

"It was a classic return," Schumacher said. Westland tied the game early in the second quarter.

The Mustangs turned the ball over on downs after a punt attempt went awry. John Glenn then got the ball at Northville's 32.

The Rockets converted on a fourth down and five for the touchdown. Tailback Jay Jackson caught the scoring strike.

Northville missed a chance to go ahead before the half ended.

The Mustangs drove deep into Westland territory at the 10-yard line and elected to go for a field goal on fourth down. Adam Tibble missed on a 27-yard attempt and the half ended 7-7.

"That would've been a nice lift," Schumacher said. John Glenn scored 14 unanswered points in the second half.

Friday was his last round as a Mustang. He said his good showing this fall came down to a lot of hard work.

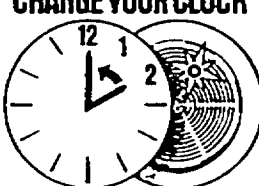
"I practiced a lot in the summer," he said. "I worked on my game a lot."

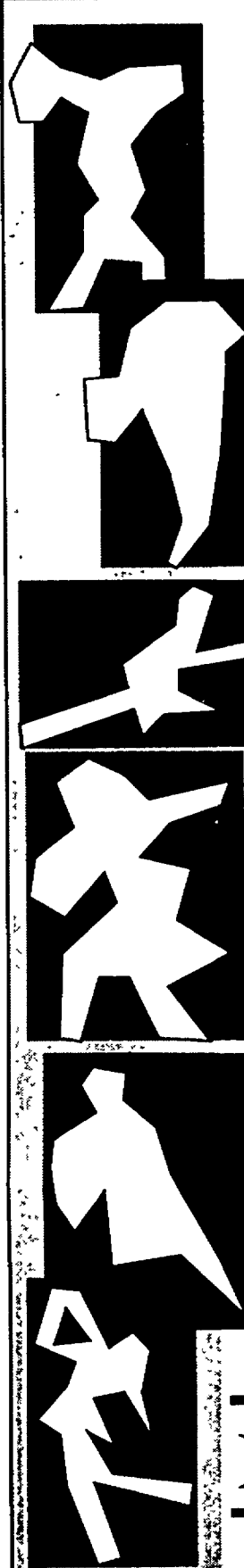

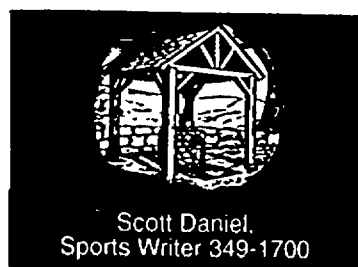

CCODA helps communities fight drugs

The Community Commission on Drug Abuse (CCODA) is a non profit organization that works with local communities to help prevent drug abuse. Here are some recent success stories.

The Wayne-Westland Schools working with CCODA have created a Parent Resource Center

where parents can turn for education, information and referrals. Parents make an appointment for a one hour consultation with a master's level social worker regarding any issue that may be on the parent's mind. The center has worked with homeless families as well as those who may not know how to deal with a child who won't go to school. Depressed and

worried parents leave the meeting feeling much more positive about what to do next.

CCODA also works with community task forces to help create after school and summer programs for kids. Romulus has brought together the city's recreation department, school PTAs and mayor's task force to provide elementary and middle school students the opportunity to take part in many fun, substance-free activities.

CCODA also has developed a program to help teen moms learn how substance abuse is closely linked to pregnancy. More recently, CCODA has piloted a six-hour program to help Girl Scouts learn more about their sexuality as it relates to drug and alcohol use.

School districts have utilized CCODA's prevention specialists to run student support groups, eight-week conflict resolution classes, and anti-alcohol, drug and tobacco education programs. CCODA also has created a workshop called "Successful Students: A+ Parents," designed to address the issues and obstacles related to a child's lack of school success. That

program frequently generates a bimonthly parent support group, similar to those in many schools and churches where parents gain support from each other and the CCODA facilitator.

CCODA's goal is to increase community awareness about the detrimental effects of substance abuse. We would like to think that we planted a seed through one message, one comment or one fact that persuaded you to think differently about the impact of substance abuse on your family. Young couples often use 'creative' financing

When a young married couple wants desperately to buy a home but can't save enough for a down payment or qualify for a mortgage loan, what can they do?

Like many other young people, they borrow from their parents. Or have their parents co-sign for the mortgage. They tap the resources that are readily available to them.

Accepting a little financial help from parents or other relatives or friends is a common practice for today's young home-buyers. And it usually works out fine. The couple can live in their own home and start building equity. And loans are usually paid back on schedule.

Some parents provide some or all of the needed down payment for the fledgling family's home purchase. It can be in the form of a gift or a loan.

Others use a little more sophisticated method of helping. They buy-down the mortgage loan. For a lump sum made to the lender, the buying couple's monthly payments will be greatly reduced for the first couple of years. This also helps the couple qualify for the loan.

Another way to help is to co-sign with the couple for the loan. However, in recent years lenders have become more cautious about co-signers. It was noted in a report carried in Real Estate Today magazine.

A co-signer's income does not automatically cancel the need for a qualifying income of the buying couple. Both the incomes must be acceptable to the lender.

Fannie Mae, the nation's largest buyer of conventional mortgages, now allows only a 7 percent increase above the industry standard guidelines for a maximum debt-to-income ratio when nonoccupant co-borrowers are used. That means the buyers can have monthly obligations of up to 35 percent of income for housing debt and 43 percent for total debt.

In other cases, relatives or friends put together an equity-sharing arrangement with young home-buyers. The cooperating relative purchases an actual ownership interest in the property.

This method often appeals to parents who provide a large down payment and want to exercise con-

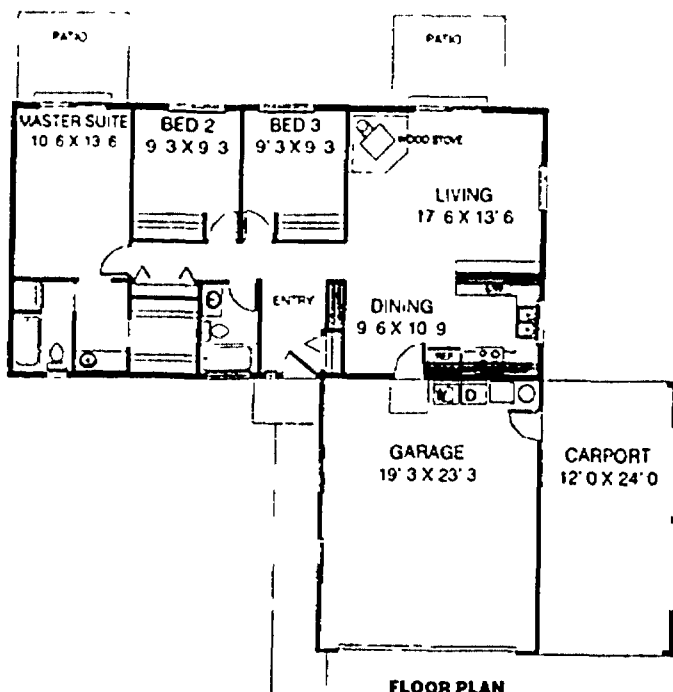

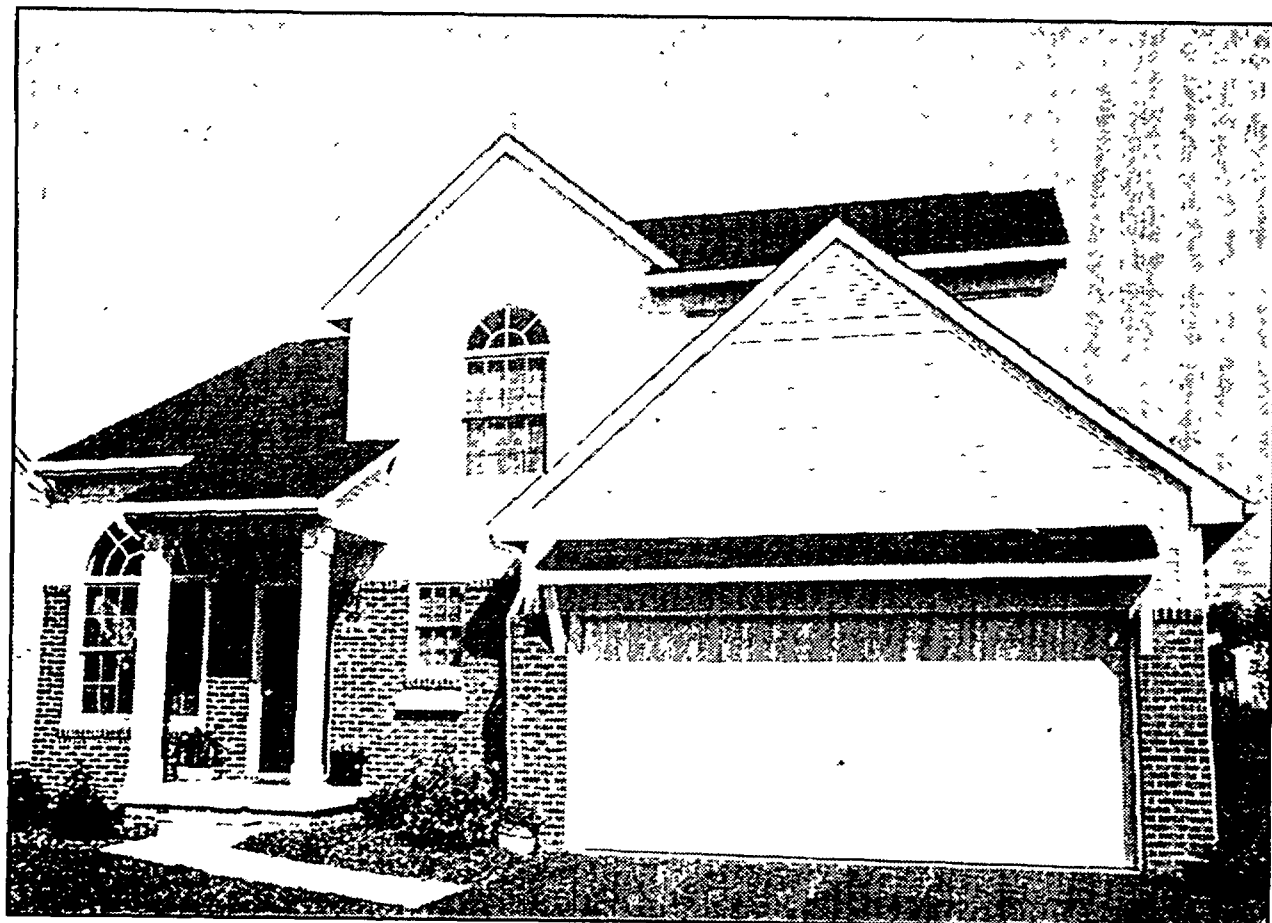

Brookwood farms blends luxury apartments and single-family homes in South Lyon

With all the new housing developments cropping up in South Lyon these days, it would be easy to assume that Brookwood Farms, one of the area's newest projects, is just another development.

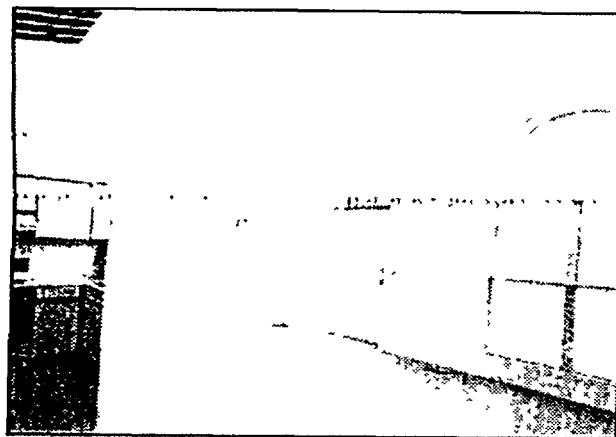
Upon closer examination you'll find instead a unique concept that blends luxury apartments and single-family detached homes on a deep, almost triangular, 32-acre site within the city limits.

Yet what really distinguishes Brookwood Farms, located on Ten Mile just east of the downtown area, is that it is the first all-lease development in the city.

The site plan was the result of agreement between NuttHorizon Properties Inc., the developers of the project, and the city of South Lyon, said Joe Veltri of the city's building and planning department.

"Working with the city, the developer and the city came up with this plan to have the 19 single-family rental units face Ten Mile Road and the multiples to the rear," Veltri said.

Praising its "nice blend of rental options," Veltri also said the site plan, the first he's seen of this kind, gives the development "eye

appeal." Brookwood Farms has been a new experience for NuttHorizon Properties as this is its first foray into building rental homes, and judging from the response thus far, the idea is a hit. The response has been "overwhelming," said Linda Coulter, an officer with NuttHorizon Properties, a Lapeer-based company that has had projects in Lapeer, Midland, Caro and Imlay City.

When it was determined that rental homes would be included in the development, Coulter said her company did a market study and concluded the homes would be rented.

But what they didn't expect was how quickly they would be rented.

In the first phase of the project, which began construction this April, 12 homes were built. The homes, which vary in size from 1,100 to 1,580 square feet, include a full basement, deck, two-car garage and a yard. The lease period runs for one year and the rents range from \$1,100 to \$1,600 a month.

Of the 12 built, 11 have been leased. The 12th home currently serves as a rental office until a permanent office is complete.

"We had them leased before they were even finished," Coulter said. That, said Coulter, was most surprising because while they had concluded the homes would be leased, their projections indicated it would take until December to do so.

"Probably a third of our calls are still on the houses," Coulter said. "We've pulled as much of the ads as we can in regards to leasing the houses."

The final seven homes will be built in the

Be careful when freezing fertilizer

GARDENING

If you use organic fertilizers, read the labels carefully to see which should not be allowed to freeze.

If freezing is harmful, the label will tell you. Take the product indoors and store out of the reach of children.

No gardener should be without a hardiness zone map. Developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, it is commonly used to indicate what will grow where. With fruits, suitability is based mostly on cold hardiness and partly on chilling requirement. The chilling requirement is the number of wintertime hours below 45 degrees necessary for the tree to complete its dormant cycle and resume normal growth.

When selecting fruit varieties, consult a fruit tree catalog or your county agent to learn if the varieties will grow successfully in your area.

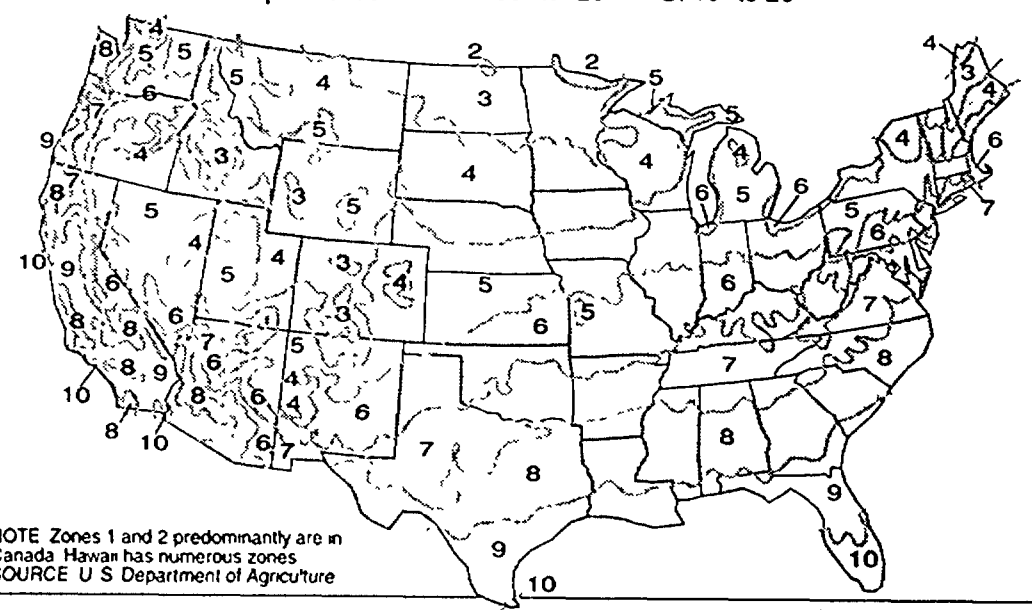
Fall planting of fruit trees can be done successfully over much of the country, from Southern portions of Zone 5 on down.

Fall planting may be done anytime after the warm spells are over and until the ground freezes.

In Zone 9, planting can be done throughout the winter. And remember, no matter where you live, you can plant fruits in spring.

9. How can I stop bulb-chomping rodents from nibbling on my tulips and dining

on the new growth in spring?

A. Rabbits, squirrels, voles and chipmunks simply can't resist dining on tulips — they're just too delicious. Hyacinths, lilies, blue grape muscari and grape hyacinth fall into that category, too. Of course, there are some bulbs that these creatures just

won't eat, like daffodils, scillas, allium, chionodoxa, colchicum and galanthus. Try intermingling new plantings of these with a woody ground cover, such as cotoneaster and juniper, and see if you get results. You can also

tinuing control over their investment, the magazine noted.

"Unlike a gift, for which the money is gone at the time of purchase, equity sharing creates an investment for the nonoccupant owners. When the offspring eventually sell the house, the parents have to sign off on the deed. In turn, they get a portion of the sales proceeds based on their percentage of the investment."

Another popular method for helping young buyers is for the home seller to contribute up to 3 percent of nonrecurring closing

costs. This is acceptable by most mortgage lenders.

Of course, the seller's willingness to fork over this amount may result in a slightly high purchase price. It's all part of the presale negotiations. But it helps the buyer afford the home now, without waiting until a larger cash sum is saved. And the sooner the purchase is closed, the sooner the couple can start accumulating equity.

Q. Why are so many people buying houses when prices are still sky-high?

A. Many families are now deciding to purchase a home despite high prices, after looking at the total economic picture. Not only are mortgage interest rates low, but the proportion of the average family's income needed to meet monthly payments is down, compared with a few years ago, according to a report from Lomas Mortgage USA.

The typical home-buyer (all ages), financing the purchase with a conventional loan and a 20 percent down payment, now uses only about 20 percent of their household income to meet those

monthly payments. And that includes taxes and insurance.

Five years ago, when overinflated housing prices were commonplace, a buyer with the same type of mortgage needed 31 percent of monthly income to meet the payments, the study revealed.

Q. Who is the nation's top-selling real estate sales representative?

A. To my knowledge, that's never been determined. But a good guess is Marty Rodriguez, a sales agent in the San Gabriel Valley in Greater Los Angeles. She's been

the most productive sales representative in Century 21 franchised offices for six straight years.

She recently decided to take her license from Century 21 and hang it on her own office wall.

"Too many broker firms and organizations today resist change," Rodriguez said. "It's important to know and anticipate the needs of property buyers and sellers in a constantly changing marketplace. We will do that in my new office."

Since 1990, Rodriguez has averaged about \$40 million in sales,

more than \$1 million in gross closed commissions, and 200 closed transactions per year, according to a profile sheet she released. Last year she closed 219 residential transactions totaling \$50 million in sold homes, again becoming the most productive Century 21 sales agent in the country.

Bulb-chomping rodents; trees in a storm; old rhododendron

experiment with different types of bulbs in the hope of finding bulbs whose flavor rodents don't care for.

When planting spring bulbs this fall to thwart these rodents' botanical cravings, try throwing a handful of shorn, crushed gravel into any animal hole you happen to find.

Although you can try to repel rabbits and squirrels with bloodmeal, ground up peppers or human hair in a soapy solution, the best control is an underground barrier.

I surround my bulb plantings with mesh hardware cloth and I use also mesh wire (very fine).

Both work for me, so why not give it a try?

TREES IN A STORM

Storms can do terrible things to trees.

including uprooting them. You can usually save partially or wholly uprooted small trees by acting quickly. The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture has several suggestions for saving these trees.

Cover the exposed roots immediately to keep them from drying until you can put the tree upright again. Use hay, wet burlap, mud, sand or any other convenient material to retard drying. Then just before you put the tree upright, cut away all the shattered roots. If the root system is partly destroyed, you may need to prune away part of the crown to compensate for the root loss.

Water the tree thoroughly during dry weather until new roots have formed.

If the tree is blown over while in foliage, spray the leaves with an anti-wilting preparation carefully to prevent damage to the tree, or strip the leaves to help the tree recover. After the tree is fully restored to its original position, place guy wire to

hold it in place until the root system regenerates. Use at least 2 guy wires.

Trees weakened by storm damage or other injury need special protection from any other stresses that may occur from disease, insects or weather.

OCTOBER & NOVEMBER

Continue to water roses, for they may bloom well into November.

Cut all the tall whippy branches to prevent wind damage, but wait until March for the more serious annual pruning.

You can still plant tree and bush peonies, day lilies and Siberian iris. Tree peonies need generous holes deep enough to cover their graft to insure they put out their own roots above it.

Renew acid mulches like pine needles or oak leaves on blueberries. Nuts, both tall bushes like chinquapins and filberts which bear early, and trees should be planted young.

Most develop long taproots which can't be dug with older trees.

Buy grafted types of English walnut, black walnut, pecans and other varieties when available.

Q. I have a rhododendron that is 20 years old. Every year it comes to a half bloom, then dies. I haven't had a full bloom in 20 years.

I feed it MiraAcid; the bush looks healthy, leaves are dark green. The problem is that the flower will not come to a full bloom.

A. Precautions should be taken to give foliage and roots on plants plenty of moisture in the summer.

Also give winter protection, especially in exposed situations. The key: Roots of rhododendrons should not be allowed to dry out at any time.

Is your plant receiving too much shade?

Or it may have been that the flower buds were killed by an unusually cold winter.

Keep in mind rhododendrons are like many other ornamentals in that they bloom profusely one year and very little the next.

There is little that the amateur can do about this "alternate-bearing" habit of some varieties.

There is a fungus which blasts terminal buds in the summer so they do not bloom the following year and sometime kills leaf buds and twigs.

If this is the case, prune out and destroy all diseased material. Spray with Bordeaux mixture after blooming.

Also plant varieties most suitable for your area — varieties that will thrive and not mind cold New England winters. I was born and brought up in Boston, so I know the cold. If you still have a problem, call your extension service.

second phase of the project.

What sort of tenants do the rental homes peel to? Families that have been transferred who are undecided where they will settle or whether they will build or not seem to make up the majority of tenants in the homes, Coulter said.

Other tenants include those are downsizing from a large home, such as empty-nesters or retirees, but who aren't ready to move into an apartment.

For Beatrice DeVoy, Brookwood Farms fits the bill.

DeVoy moved into a three bedroom home in Brookwood Farms this June after she sold her home in Westland. The 68-year-old widow wanted to be closer to her children, many of whom live in the South Lyon area, yet she wasn't sure whether she wanted to buy another home or rent an apartment.

"It's a lovely way to go," DeVoy said. "The house is gorgeous and it's a very, very nice place to live."

Not only is DeVoy thrilled with the central location of Brookwood Farms, but the former suburbanite is especially pleased with the small-town atmosphere of South

Lyon.

"I feel there is everything you could want right here in South Lyon, outside of the bigger stores. For everyday living I would give this place four stars," DeVoy said.

The interest in the apartments is just as high, Coulter said.

In fact, in late September, NuHorizon found itself without a model ready to show prospective tenants.

"We've got such a demand that we just can't hold one long enough," Coulter said.

Two buildings, each with nine units, are now complete and leased. When the first phase is

complete, there will be 102 apartment units. With the completion of the entire project, which Coulter estimates will take two to four years, there will be a total of 2,362 apartment units.

There are eight different floor plans for the apartments and the units vary in size from a one-bedroom, one-bath unit at 736 square feet to a three-bedroom, two-bath unit at 1,300 square feet.

The second floor units, whether one, two or three bedrooms, have cathedral ceilings and are larger than the first-floor units and as such have a slightly higher rent.

Other features include private

entrances, private balconies or patios, laundry room hook-ups, all major appliances, individually-controlled central air and natural gas heat, smoke detectors, cable TV, carpeting and 24-hour answering service.

Garages and carports can also be leased for a six-month or one-year period and the rents range from \$595 a month for a one-bedroom apartment to \$929 for a second-floor three-bedroom apartment.

With a six-month lease, there is an additional charge of \$40 a month. There is a \$60 a month charge for a garage lease.

While DeVoy is happy about her new home, she is also anxious to see construction begin on the clubhouse because of all of the amenities it will offer.

Judging from the description of the clubhouse, it looks as if it will offer something for everybody. The 7,350-square-foot building will feature an indoor/outdoor swimming pool, a tennis court, a spa, a fitness center, locker rooms, as well as a library, a full kitchen and a large meeting room for meetings and parties.

The building will also house the rental office and the manager's office.

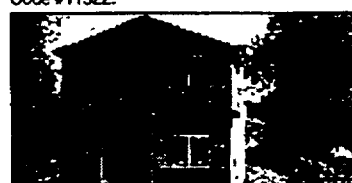

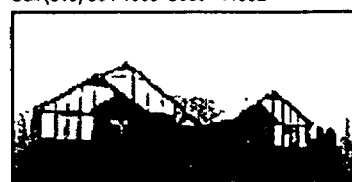

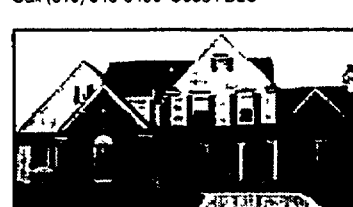

Eighty year-old Bisque figurine still has value

Q. Enclosed is a photograph of a bisque figurine that has been in my family for more than 80 years. I was always told that it was a piano baby. The height is 5 inches and it is in perfect condition. Any information you can give me would be deeply appreciated.

A. The fashionable Victorian parlor usually had a piano. They loved to drape a flowing scarf over the piano and anchor it with an adorable bisque baby. Thus the name, piano baby. They were available in small, medium and large. These beguiling cuties sat, crawled, rolled on their backs, lay on their tummies, cried or smiled.

The finest examples were made by Heubach and were usually marked. Germany was the leading manufacturer of piano babies. Yours

ANTIQUES

was made in the late 1800s. The value would probably be \$225 to \$235.

Q. My mother gave me a clear glass plate. She said it is depression glass. The design consists of concentric circles. The diameter is 14 inches. Can you identify the pattern and who made it?

A. Judging from your description, the pattern is "Manhattan," made by Anchor Hocking Glass Corp. It is known by a variety of names that include, "Horizontal Rounded Big Rib" and "Ribbed." Although it was produced primarily in crystal, examples have been seen in red, pink and green. This pattern was made from 1938 to 1941.

Your plate is currently listed in "Kovel's

Depression Glass & American dinnerware Price List" at \$20.

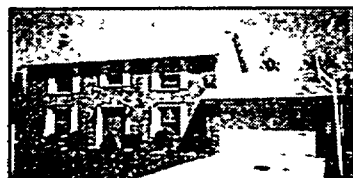

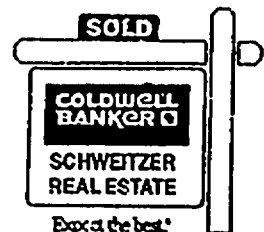

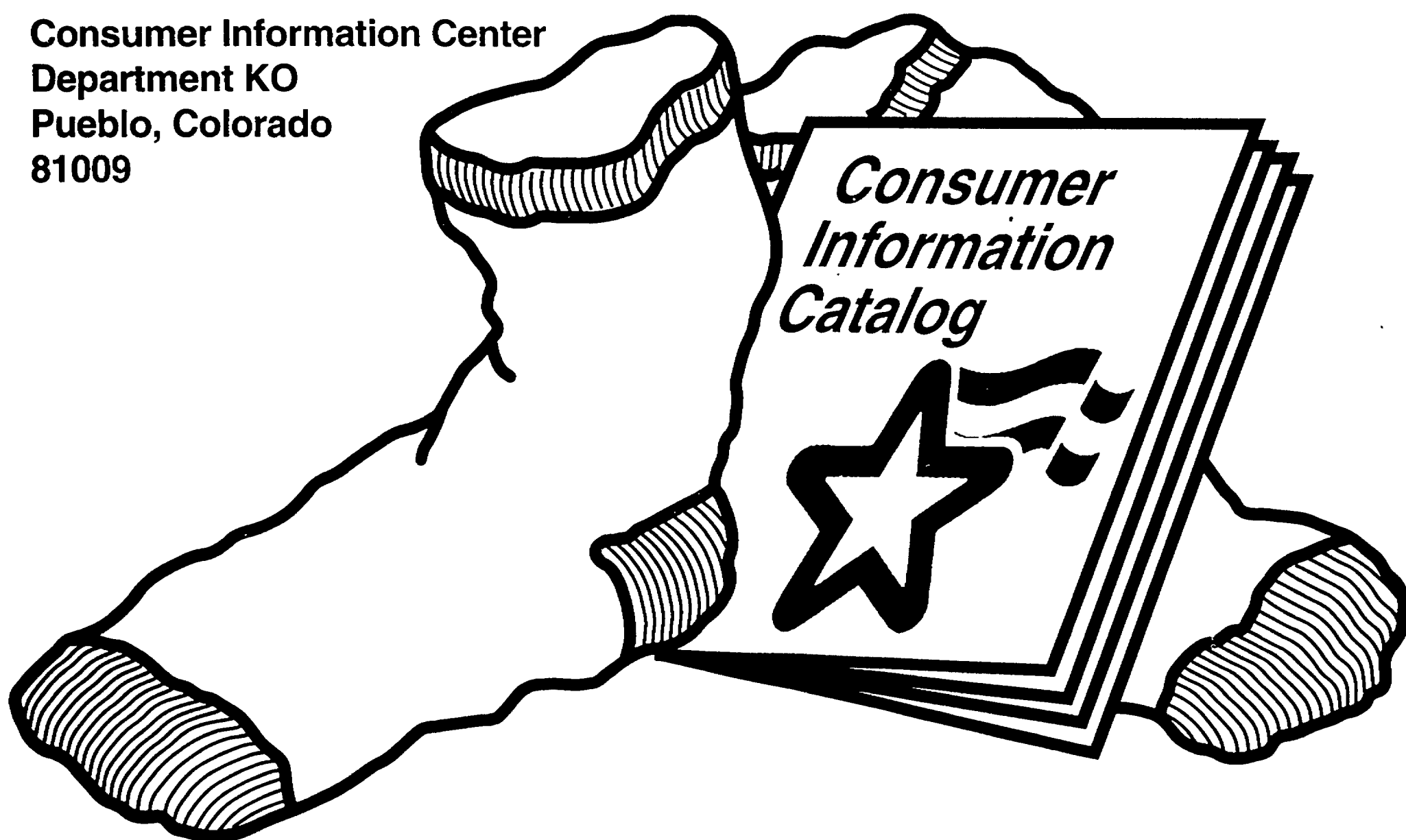

Sweep keeps chimney safe from fires

Now that fall is here it's time to have that chimney cleaned so you can use it without fearing a fire from last year's residue ... or residue from four years ago.

If you can't remember the last time you had the chimney cleaned, it's time to call a chimney sweep, like Rob Glenn of Priority One Chimney Sweep Service.

Glenn, owner Priority One and a former firefighter runs a clean, fairly priced business out of his home in South Lyon.

He got the idea for his business five years ago while reading a fireman's trade journal.

"I saw an ad about a chimney sweeping business," he said.

He liked the idea and after checking it out, he decided to go into business for himself.

He had seen first hand the effects of poorly maintained chimneys during and after fires.

"Most of them (fires) could have been prevented if they would have had their chimney's cleaned properly," he said.

Once he decided to go into chimney sweeping he went with the best technology on the market for controlling dust. He uses the August system. It's a dust controller, he said, that moves large volumes of air and traps dust particles as he cleans.

With the arrival of colder days

and nights, Glenn is getting an increase in inspection and maintenance calls.

"I've had people tell me 'I'm glad I called you.' They see the mess it makes and know they can't do it," he said.

"When they try it themselves and get halfway into it and soot is billowing out of the fireplace and into their family room and covering their \$5,000 leather sofa, it's a real problem," he said.

Cleaning a chimney can also help reduce allergy problems, he added.

"A lot of nasty stuff can grow in fireplaces: spores, mold, fly ash, soot. These are all products left after combustion," he said.

So when and how often should you have your chimney cleaned? Glenn recommends what the National Fire Protection Association recommends - have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually. His initial inspection is free.

There is a nominal fee for inspections thereafter.

During the inspection, if Glenn spots trouble areas in need of repair on your chimney, he is a certified mason and can perform those repairs as well.

The inspection only takes about 15-20 minutes, said Glenn.

The cleaning takes about half an hour to an hour. Some chimney's

don't need to be cleaned.

"It all depends on how much you burn," he said.

Chimney fires are a big problem this time of year, he said.

By having your chimney inspected, and cleaned if needed, you can prevent a fire later, said Glenn.

"It's like the pollo vaccine. You're less likely to get pollo if you get the

vaccine," he said.

"So with chimney sweeping, without it, it can lead to problems or a fire and possibly loss of property and life," he said.

Financial plans with elderly parents

Money Management

Discussions with aging parents about their financial affairs can be difficult for both children and parents.

Nonetheless, the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants says it is important for families to have such discussions in case a sudden event makes it necessary for children to manage their parents' finances.

To help you get started, CPAs recommend that you address the following questions:

DAY-TO-DAY FINANCES

If your parents could use some help managing their day-to-day finances, there are several ways you can assist them. First, arrange for direct deposits of Social Security, pension, and dividend checks into their savings or checking accounts. It's also possible to have recurring bills, such as gas, electric and telephone bills paid automatically as well. Also, your parents could open an asset management account that combines savings, checking, investments and credit/debit cards into one monthly statement.

IMPORTANT RECORDS

Even if elderly parents seem perfectly capable of carrying out routine money management tasks, it's important that you have an overall

understanding about their financial affairs. Ask your parents to prepare a list of their assets, liabilities, and other pertinent financial information. Make it clear that you don't need to know how much they are worth or who will inherit their assets - you merely need to know where you can locate this important information in the event something happens to them.

It's also important that you know where to find your parents' important papers, such as wills, cemetery deeds, real estate deeds and life insurance policies. If these and other documents are stored in a safe deposit box, find out where the box and key are located.

DURABLE POWER OF ATTORNEY

What if senility or a serious illness left one or both of your parents unable to manage by themselves? If no legal provisions have been made, the courts may appoint a guardian to handle your parents' finances. To avoid this situation, it's wise for parents to draw up necessary legal documents before they are needed.

A durable power of attorney allows a parent to give another person - usually a spouse or a

child - permission to handle their financial affairs. Be sure that the power of attorney is durable; an ordinary power of attorney is not valid once a person becomes incapacitated.

A springing power of attorney, which is available in most states, is an option for parents who don't want to give immediate power to their adult children. With a springing power of attorney, your parent can specify the conditions under which the power of attorney "springs" into effect. For example, if the parent becomes physically or mentally incompetent.

Keep in mind, too, that banks will not always accept outside durable powers of attorney. Some banks require that they be designated as the durable power. Have your parents check with their bank to avoid any problems down the road.

HEALTH INSURANCE

If your parents are age 65 or older, they qualify for Medicare. However, it's wise to have some form of Medigap, or supplementary health insurance, which covers deductibles and portions of medical bills not reimbursed by Medi-

care. Benefits and premium costs of Medigap plans vary greatly, so help your parents shop for the most cost-effective policy.

FINANCIAL HELP

After speaking with your parents about their finances, you may discover that they need financial help. If you're able to provide such assistance, CPAs say there are tax strategies that may ease your financial burden.

First, if a parent has a gross income under \$2,500 in 1995 and you contribute more than half of his or her living expenses, you may be eligible to claim that parent as a dependent. Also, as long as your parent qualifies as a dependent, you can add his or her unreimbursed medical expenses to your own and claim a deduction for amounts that exceed 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income. For medical deduction purposes, the gross income test mentioned above does not apply for determining the dependency status.

CPAs recommend that you discuss medical and financial issues with your parents periodically. Changes in their health, their financial situation, as well as in the tax laws, could affect how they plan for, and protect, their future.

Offering financial service to the poor

A recent study by the U.S. Public Interest Research Group (PIRG) confirmed that the poor cannot afford to have accounts in banks.

The PIRG study, released this summer, shows banks gouging customers with fees which rose up to 22 percent over the last two years, while inflation has increased only 5.5 percent. For example, in 1990, the owner of an interest-bearing bank checking account had to leave \$135 in the account to cover fees. By mid-1995, that figure had increased to \$1,123.

Where can those shut out by banks go for financial services? Credit unions.

What's a credit union? It's a democratically-controlled institution which returns profits to its members in the form of low fees and better-than-competitive interest rates.

"From small outposts housed in the basement of an inner city

church in Detroit to larger institutions connected to major employers such as Ford Motor Company, just about everyone, rich or poor, is eligible to join a credit union," said consumer advocate Michael Kelly, of the Michigan Credit Union League (MCUL). "Shouldn't everyone, regardless of income, have access to basic financial services?"

This fall, Michigan credit unions, in conjunction with the Credit Union National Association (CUNA), have launched a campaign to serve low income people who've been ignored by the big banks.

"With the continued turmoil being felt in many of America's inner cities and the mega-bank mergers of late, we are looking at a quantum leap in the number of poor, unbanked people," Kelly said. "Serving the needy and those without access to mainstream financial services has always been a hallmark of the credit union move-

ment, with its philosophy of 'People Helping People.'"

So, what concrete steps are credit unions taking to serve those of modest means?

• Credit unions have lower fees than banks, making them more accessible.

• A recently-released study by the credit union-supported Filene Research Institute identified barriers to serving the poor and strategies credit unions can use to extend services to them.

• The MCUL, other state leagues, CUNA and its federal regulatory agency, the National Credit Union Administration are convening a national summit on "serving the underserved" for 1996.

• Increasing numbers of "community development" credit unions are being chartered in low-income areas; Detroit now has one and another is in the works. • Since 1994, rules changes have made

over 3 million more low-income Americans eligible to join existing credit unions.

• Seven of 17 Credit Union Family Service Centers (branch offices serving multiple credit unions) are located in low to middle income urban areas throughout Michigan.

• Credit unions around the state are taking part in local community service projects; for example, a coalition of seven Detroit-area credit unions recently gave \$85,000 to Michigan's only developmental center for families affected by poverty and drug abuse.

• The MCUL is disseminating basic consumer information in a broad-based education campaign in an effort to help the poor and others make sound financial decisions.

Edison to help poor winterize their homes

Detroit Edison will provide \$6 million to help low-income customers winter-proof their homes. The money will cover major roofing repairs, electrical upgrades and weatherization projects for about 1,500 customers who meet state of Michigan low-income guidelines.

The utility's Project Care program will distribute the funds through a dozen southeastern Michigan community agencies that provide energy-conservation and education services to low-income persons. The Downriver Community Conference of Southgate and the Human Development Commission of Caro will serve as lead agencies for the other 10 agencies.

Detroit Edison is funding Project Care with interest earned on refunds owed to customers the company could not locate.

The Downriver Community Con-

ference will receive about \$1 million which will be shared with the Monroe County Opportunity Program, Dearborn Community Development and Wayne County Community Development.

The lead agency for the other areas, the Human Development Commission, will share \$5 million with the City of Detroit Human Services Department, County of Washtenaw Human Services Group, Wayne-Metropolitan Community Services Agency, Capital Area Community Services, Macomb County Community Service Agency, Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency and Economic Opportunity Committee of St. Clair County.

The agencies will screen applicants, hire crews and purchase materials for the various projects. This work will begin in October.

Well, brace yourself. Bride's & Your New Home magazine reports that the estimated cost for a traditional wedding in New England is \$19,162. On the West Coast it is \$18,683 and in Middle America, the average is \$14,000.

Author Sharon Naylor walks couples through the entire wedding planning process, showing where savings can be made and where not to cut corners — from announcing the engagement, buying wedding attire and choosing a cake to hiring caterers and photographers, all the way through to saving on the honeymoon.

Lowering the formality of the wedding can mean big savings, too. Naylor points out

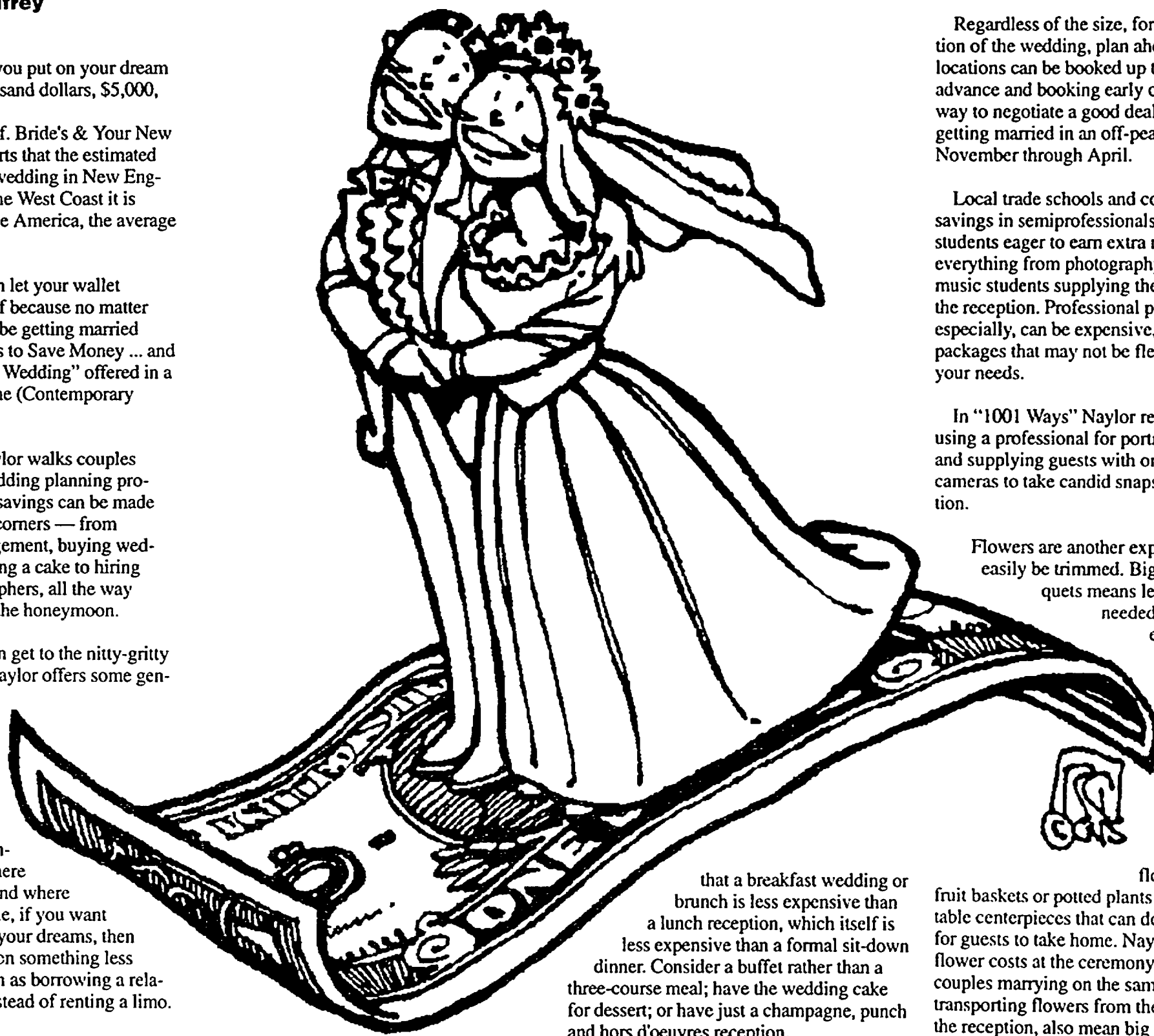

Modern Bride magazine suggests renting a bed-and-breakfast inn that can offer an all-inclusive rate for the wedding, the reception, guest lodgings and even the honeymoon. And remember that a public beauty spot or garden location cuts costs on decorations with nature providing the decor for a memorable event.

Flowers are another expense that can easily be trimmed. Big blooms in bouquets means less flowers are needed. Choose flowers in season and consider a slender, flowing bridal bouquet of one variety rather than a busy bunch.

Bridal shows full of folks trying to get starry-eyed brides-to-be to spend big bucks may not seem to be the best place to save money, but Naylor says they are actually worth a visit. There are always door prizes and raffles to enter for everything from free photography, flowers, cakes and honeymoon packages, to discounts on wedding dresses.

But, Naylor says, most importantly, bridal shows are worth a visit just to look at everything in terms of "How can I make that?" Because, ultimately, if you can do it yourself, why pay somebody else?

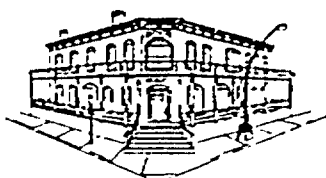

d'oeuvre. The fact that the client could afford it wasn't the point. "Your hors d'oeuvre is not worth \$2.50," the consultant said. They got it for \$1.50."

You can plan your own wedding, of course. But if you need to coordinate 20 participants in your ceremony, select clothes for them, find and deal with at least a half-dozen vendors, throw a party for 200 people and plan a vacation at the same time, you might want some help.

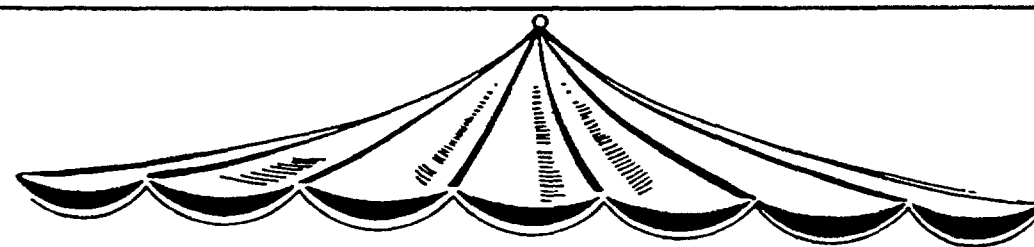
"Brides are finding that, for many reasons, they can't handle all the details. So they're turning to professionals in the field," says Gerard J. Monaghan, president of Association of Bridal Consultants.

All these professional associations offer certification programs to wedding consultants, so that those on their rosters have completed professional training programs satisfactorily. Such professionalism is helping to upgrade the industry's reputation these days.

What does a wedding consultant cost? Fees typically occur in three ways: an hourly rate, a percentage of the event's total cost or a flat fee. None of the professionals today typically take a commission, or "kick-back," from vendors, says Ernst, so they really can find you the best services.

You can also use wedding consultants for a variety of services, from a few initial consultations to planning and coordinating the entire production.

"The average consultant in America costs anywhere from \$50 to \$75 an hour for individual meetings," said Ernst. "To do whole productions, the national average is around \$1,500, and that's usually with two meetings, not seven or eight. We charge \$275 to \$350 for individual meetings and our fees for full production range anywhere from \$3,500 on up. For that we contract for usually five to seven meetings with the client and vendors, and do everything with them."

ENGAGING JEWELS

Choosing that perfect diamond takes research

Weddings today are far different from the ceremonies that took place 500 years ago, but there is one tradition that has stood the test of time — the exchange of wedding bands.

For centuries men and women around the world have exchanged rings as a token of their love and a pledge of their fidelity. Different cultures may wear the ring on different fingers, but the practice is widespread. The early Hebrews wore the wedding ring on the index finger, and in India wedding bands are worn on the thumb. The ancient Greeks started the practice of wearing the ring on the third finger, believing it housed the "vein of love," which ran directly to the heart.

If you're like most couples getting married today, you will probably mark your engagement with a diamond ring. No matter what style you choose, the diamond, with its lustrous sparkle and unmatched beauty, is considered the ultimate symbol of love and the most beloved of all the precious stones.

It's easy to get swept up in the excitement of being engaged and buy the first ring you fall in love with, but experts suggest that you take your time and comparison shop. If you've never bought fine jewelry before, you may be a little overwhelmed by what's available. Don't be bashful about asking a jeweler a lot of questions. Remember, the more you know, the better able you'll be to make a more informed decision.

Experts suggest that you establish a budget before you begin shopping. How much you spend, of course, is entirely up to you, but the general rule of thumb is that you shouldn't spend more than two months' salary.

Some couples, of course, spend less, while others spend considerably more. Keep in mind that you will have a lot of other wedding expenses in the months ahead, so plan accordingly.

THE FOUR C's

There are four factors you should take into consideration when buying a diamond — the color, the cut, the clarity and the carat weight. Commonly referred to as the "Four C's," these are the main characteristics that determine a diamond's quality and value.

Color refers to the diamond's natural color. A colorless diamond is considered the most valuable because it reflects the most light. It is also the most expensive.

Diamonds are measured on a color scale ranging from D, which is perfectly colorless, to Z. Stones in the Z range are called fancy, or colored diamonds, and are considered extremely valuable because of their rare color. They come in a range of colors that includes shades of pink, green, blue, yellow and brown.



Whatever the design, most engagement rings are still dominated by one brilliant diamond.

Before buying any diamond, be sure to look at it under an ultraviolet light to see if it glows. If it does, you may not want to purchase it. Diamonds with strong fluorescence can be worth up to 20 percent less than those without.

If you're concerned about quality, you may want to buy a diamond that is certified by the Gemological Association of America. The advantage of buying a diamond with

GIA certification is that you don't have to take the seller's word for the quality of the diamond. GIA grading scales are the only ones regulated by the Federal Trade Commission.

Cut, more than any characteristic, determines how sparkly and fiery your diamond will be. A well-cut diamond will be proportioned so that the majority of light rays entering the stone will be directed back to

the eye. Most modern diamonds are cut with 58 facets for maximum sparkle and brilliance.

Although diamonds can be cut into a variety of shapes, the most popular shapes include the oval, marquise, emerald, pear, round and square. The round stone is by far

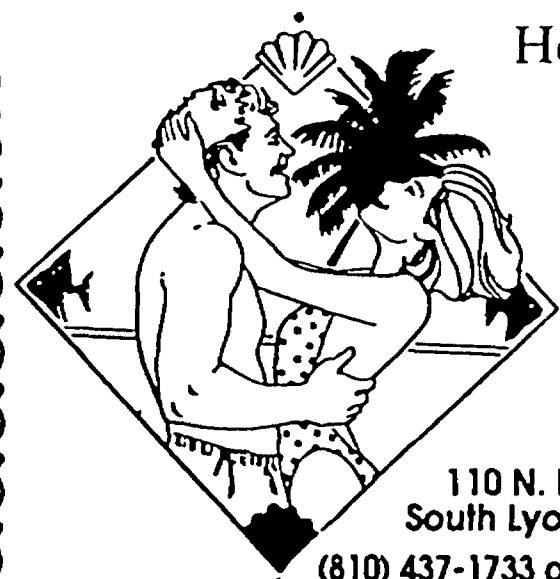

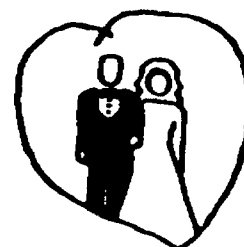

Buying a wedding gown

Here are some of Amsale Abera's tips for buying a wedding gown.

Know what's out there. Before you begin to shop, look through bridal magazines carefully. This will give you a chance to see what types of wedding gowns are available and what is being offered by different wedding dress designers.

Be specific. When you visit your bridal store, give the bridal consultant as much information as possible about your plans, your tastes and what you're looking for to help her best understand your needs.

Look at the big picture. In choosing your gown, focus more on the silhouette than on the small details. For example, make sure the neckline and waistline are flattering to you.

Do you fit in? Ask yourself how your dress will look in the setting you choose? Will it be in a country club, a grand hotel, outside, indoors?

Match your gown to your figure. Consider some of the following guidelines. If you are short, a natural waistline, high neckline and chapel train will probably look best. Avoid a very full skirt.

If you are heavy, look to a princess-line style, with simple lines and lace with a small delicate pattern. Avoid heavy beading, puff sleeves and stiff fabrics. Tall women may consider a full skirt, cathedral train and a dropped waist.

Less is more. Your gown should flatter, not compete with, you. Consider simple lines and understated ornamentation. Think about the total picture — how you will look in your gown along with your headpiece, jewelry and flowers.

Could you dance all night? Plan for the reception as well as the ceremony when choosing your headpiece and train. Your comfort and ability to move around are important.

A train can be designed to bustle so it no longer reaches the floor. If you plan to dance a lot at your reception, you may want to consider a gown with no train or with a detachable train.

the most popular choice among brides because it is the most sparkly and brilliant.

Experts suggest that you avoid buying a diamond that is already in a setting. Trying to grade a diamond this way is very difficult and you may end up with a diamond that has more imperfections than you bargained for. It's much better to buy a diamond loose and have it mounted in the setting you want.

Clarity refers to the presence or absence of flaws inside the stone. Flawless diamonds are extremely rare — and extremely expensive. Most diamonds, when viewed under powerful magnification, will reveal minute flaws that are invisible to the naked eye. Flaws buried deep within a diamond are preferable to those at the surface or sides where the primary path of light may be intercepted.

Last, but not least, is the carat, which refers to the weight of the diamond. Many people assume that the more carats, the more valuable the diamond, but this is not necessarily true. Of the Four C's, carat is actually the least important.

Although people may try to tell you that you shouldn't buy anything less than a one-carat diamond, the reality is that the average diamond purchased in the United States is just slightly larger than one-third of a carat.

CREATING AN ORIGINAL

Rather than purchasing a manufactured ring, many couples decide to custom design their rings with the help of a jeweler. If you decide to go this route, make sure you work with an established jeweler (preferably one who is a member of the American Gem Society or Jewelers of America).

Although ordering a custom-made ring is slightly more expensive than purchasing an in-stock ring, you will end up with a ring that reflects your unique style. Custom designing a ring usually involves several steps.

First, you'll need to discuss with your jeweler the type of ring you want, including the style, size, setting and price range. Your designer will then take your ideas and translate them onto paper in the form of a sketch. Once you approve the sketch, your designer will create an exact wax model of the ring so that you can see it three dimensionally and make any last-minute alterations before final casting.

Most jewelers will ask for a deposit or a signed contract before beginning the design process. This is for your protection as well as theirs.

Although some designers allow customers to reject a custom-designed ring after it's

complete, most will require payment for any work that has been done during the design phase.

Depending on the value of your ring, you may decide to insure it against loss, theft or damage. In order to insure it, you will need to have your ring appraised by an experienced gemologist who is totally independent and a member of an accredited appraisal organization, such as the American Society of Appraisers.

The appraiser should charge a flat fee, quoted in advance, and should offer updated services for a nominal fee.

CARING FOR YOUR RING

One of the great things about diamonds — besides their beauty — is the fact that they are virtually indestructible. Unlike other precious stones that are susceptible to nicks and scratches, diamonds can withstand just about anything.

What can happen to your diamond, however, is a gradual buildup of dirt and oil, which will dull the stone. To keep your diamond sparkling, clean your ring once a month with a special jewelry cleanser or use a mild liquid detergent.

Experts suggest you have your ring professionally cleaned every 12 to 18 months. In addition to giving your ring a thorough cleaning, your jeweler will check the setting to make sure the diamond is firmly mounted.

Wedding consultants prevent headaches

Hodges charges from \$1,250 to \$2,800 for planning an entire wedding, "depending on where the wedding is located and how much they want me to do."

Both Hodges and Ernst and similar professionals can plan weddings virtually anywhere — from their own hometowns to anywhere in the nation, and even some places elsewhere in the world.

Hodges recently planned a Santa Cruz, Calif., wedding for a client living in Virginia, whose parents lived in Pennsylvania.

"It was complicated because the bride wasn't here so she hadn't seen the locations or met with any of the vendors," said Hodges. "But I must say everything went perfectly and they had a wonderful wedding."

All the associations mentioned can give you a list of their certified wedding consultants in your area. Hodges also recommends that you ask your friends who may have used a consultant for their own wedding.

"You can also look in the yellow pages,"

she said, "and sometimes there are wedding publications that people advertise in. But I think the important thing is to look to somebody who has experience and professional training — who is certified by these associations."

One special touch they all seem to share is the "wedding day emergency kit." Nixon, Ernst and Hodges all said they carry these for that all-important day. These kits have virtually everything an emergency might call for — whether glue to fasten those fallen beads back on a dress, or lipstick for the bride who forgot her favorite shade, or needle and thread, or that list of cellular phone numbers for vendors.

And they might also offer something that's even harder to price: creativity. While they are basically financial consultants for your wedding, they also are potential designers.

Ernst had an assignment to do three separate weddings for three sisters in Texas. They each had different dreams.

"One wanted a down-home, country wed-

ding, so we took a dance hall and turned it into a barn, with bales of hay, fence posting, kerosene lanterns," he recalled.

"The other sister wanted an elegant wedding, so in the same hall we put up lattice work, trellises, and used silver and crystal, draping the tin walls with fabric so it looked like a very elegant hall. The third wanted a simple stand-up cocktail party with classical music."

For a Cinderella-theme wedding, Ernst designed and painted a carriage turning it into a pumpkin and draped pearls around the necks of two big stuffed mice — and a crystal slipper sat on the top of the cake.

For a couple who wanted a gypsy theme, Ernst and his teams brought in real psychics, card readers, palm readers and a photographer who had brought costumes easy for guests to put on and take off, including headpieces and bandanas.

The photographer took photos of each of the guests individually, and then the bride and groom sent those pictures in their thank-

you notes.

"We do all kind of fun things like that," said Ernst. "If they want to do a theme and don't know how or what, after we've talked several hours we then bring the right people to them — the florist, decorator, cake baker."

If you want your wedding day to be exactly the way you dream, a consultant may be your very best purchase.

Clear Futures for Young Eyes

School vision screenings give a rough estimate of eye-muscle balance and degree of near- or farsightedness. The main goal of these screenings is to identify major visual problems in kids who have not had routine eyecare. They are not intended to replace eye exams and do not check the overall health of the child's eye. For the most accurate results, your child should be thoroughly examined by a trained eye care professional.



The American Optometric Association recommends a child be examined at the age of six months, at three and five years and then annually, but your optometrist may advise a different schedule due to family history risk factors.

Your eye care provider will begin by taking a complete case history to identify potential risk factors. Past eye injuries, general medical history, school performance, and overall development should be discussed.

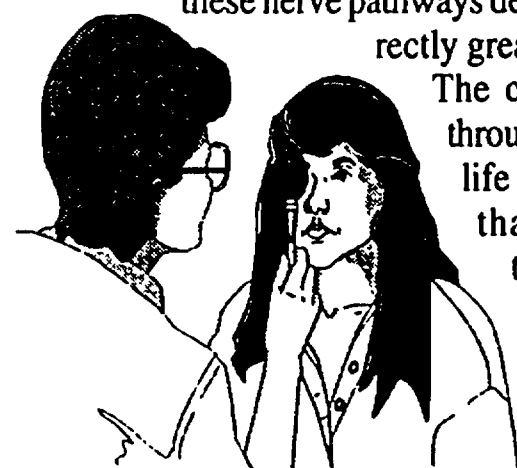
Next, the external eye and lids are examined for disease or congenital disorders. The six muscles that rotate each eye are tested for function and alignment. This is critical if young eyes are to develop normally.

"The three-year-old visit is important so we can check for amblyopia" says Dr. Kirk. Amblyopia, better known as lazy eye, can occur when one eye turns slightly, causing the vision in that eye to be unfocused. "This 'turning' may not always be visible to the layperson. Left untreated the brain will learn to ignore the eye and the nerve pathway does not develop from the eye back to the brain properly."

If this problem is not addressed early — before the child is six to eight years old — the chances of these nerve pathways developing correctly greatly diminish.

The child may go through their entire life with one eye that is poorer than the other.

Keeping Your Kids Injury-Free

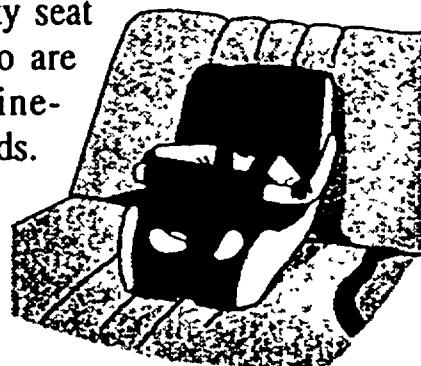

Injuries are the leading cause of death and disabilities in children ages five through 15. Here are some safety tips to help reduce injuries:

Motor Vehicle Safety

Motor vehicle accidents are the most common cause of accidental death among children. Use a federally-approved child carrier for infants, and a child safety seat for toddlers who are more than nine-months-old and weigh at least 20 pounds. Once a child weighs more than 40 pounds, they can use a regular seat belt, but make sure the belt passes over the thighs, not the abdomen. Set a good example and buckle up yourself.



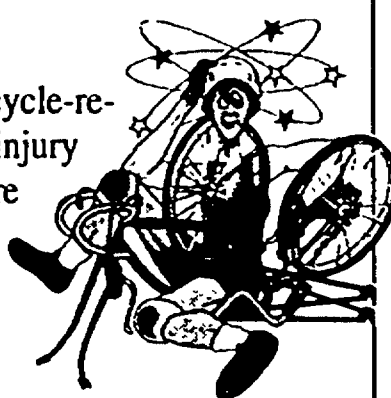
Water Safety

Drowning is the second most common cause of accidental death in children. Provide adult supervision whenever your children are near water. Teach children basic safety rules: No running in pool areas, no pushing others underwater, no swimming during storms or lightning and always wear a life preserver when boating. You can be better prepared for an emergency by learning CPR.



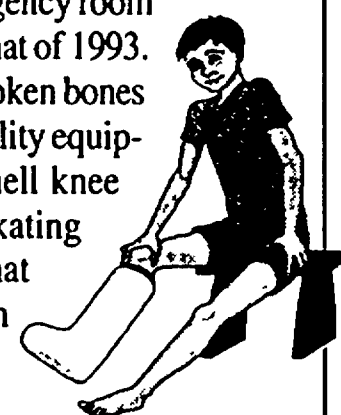
Bicycle Safety: No Helmet — No Riding!

One out of seven children suffers injuries in bicycle-related accidents. A helmet can reduce the risk of injury by 85 percent. Purchase helmets at a reputable store where you are assured of a correct fit and quality product. Teach children road safety rules and outline specific boundaries for them to ride within.



In-Line Skating

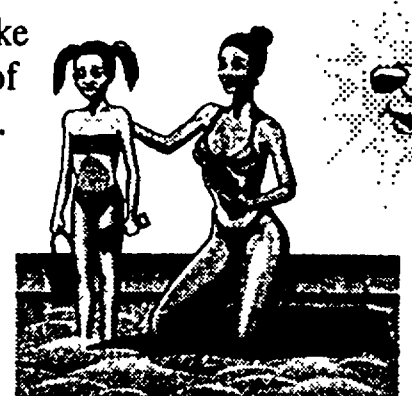
Statistics for 1994 show that there were 76,000 emergency room visits resulting from in-line skating injuries, double that of 1993. While most injuries are minor scrapes and bruises, broken bones can result from falls. A key to safety is to buy top quality equipment, including helmets, wrist guards and hard-shell knee and elbow pads. Consider getting professional skating lessons if your child's balance and skills are not what they should be and make sure they skate only on smooth, level surfaces.



Environmental Hazards

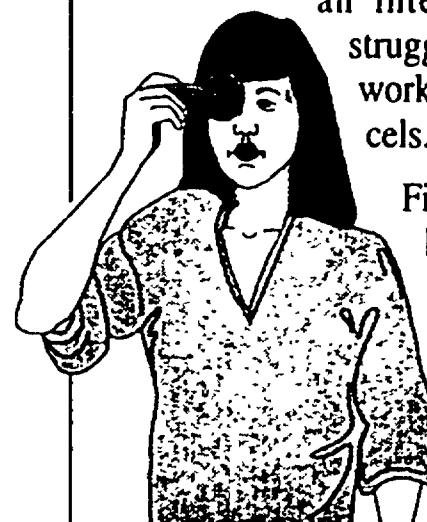
Children are at increased risk for heat stroke and dehydration and should drink plenty of water during outdoor games and activities. Protect children from the sun by using sunscreen, hats and sunglasses. A severe sunburn in children increases the risk of skin cancer later in life.

Once the eye muscles and distance vision are evaluated, the reading vision is tested to assure the eyes can focus at all distances accurately and comfortably. This can make the difference between an intelligent student struggling with school work and one who excels.



Finally, the internal health of the eye is carefully assessed through a dilated pupil. "This step is important for two reasons.

The first is that we can check the overall health of the eye and identify any potential problems," says Dr. Kirk. "Secondly, dilation relaxes the muscles that focus the eyes. This allows us to verify the prescription, independent of the child's subjective responses."

Parents should be aware that a child's normal visual development includes a stage of farsightedness usually outgrown in elementary school. "As long as the child's school performance is not being negatively affected, this situation can often be monitored without the use of corrective lenses," continues Dr. Kirk.

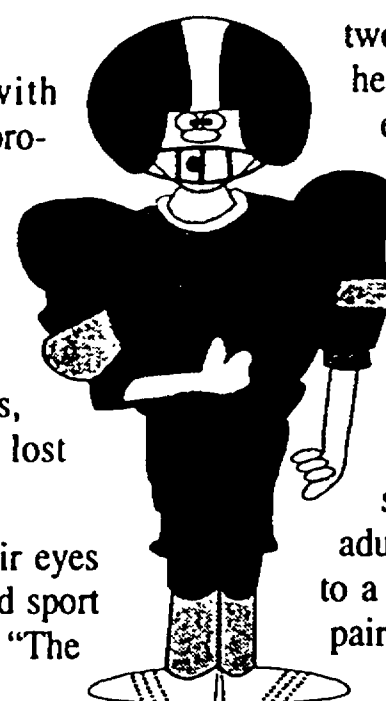
Keeping Your Kids Injury-Free (cont.)

Prevent Sports Injuries

Provide your child with protective equipment appropriate for the sport. Dr. Tuchklaper recommends the use of mouth guards. "This will give greater protection against concussions, jaw injuries, and broken, chipped or lost teeth."

"Children can protect their eyes from injury with approved sport glasses," says Dr. Kirk. "The

two main injuries sports glasses help avoid are abrasions to the eye, such as a finger-poke, and blunt trauma from a ball or elbow that can lead to internal injury or fracture of the eye socket."



Children's muscles and bones are still growing. What may cause only a simple bruise or sprain in an adult could be a serious injury to a child and could lead to impaired growth and development.

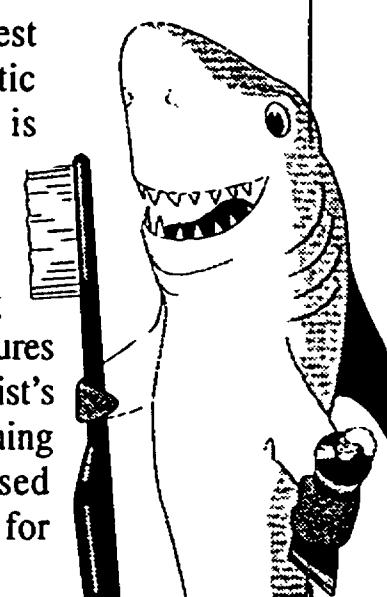

Computer Use and the Effect on Your Eyes

Computer use can present an unnatural working environment. This is because when using our computers, we often sit in one position, which is hard on the body. Staring at the screen for long periods of time is also tough on the eyes.

Normally during the day, the muscles in your eyes relax when focusing on something far away and contract when focusing on something close. Your eyes — like the rest of your body — depend on this variety of movement to stay relaxed and fresh all day.

In addition, the concentration level used when operating a computer tends to cause our natural blink rate to slow. This, coupled with the dry air typically in offices, yields dry-eye symptoms.

Simple solutions include looking away from the screen every 15-20 minutes, consciously trying to blink more often and placing a small humidifier in the area.



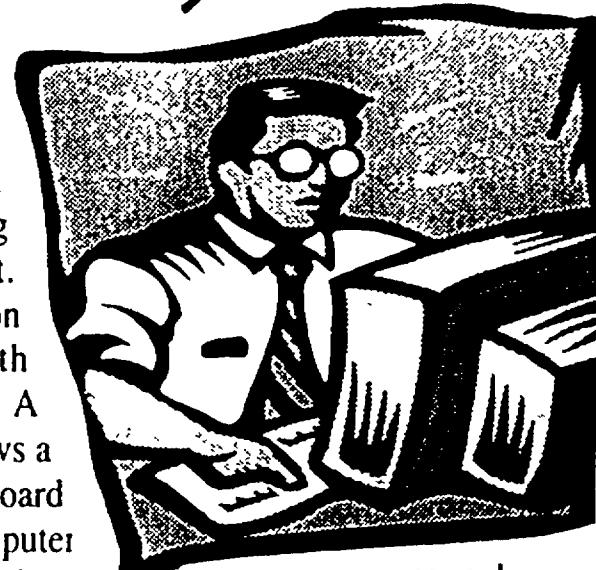
Adjust Your Office Environment

Correcting equipment setup and office lighting can add to your comfort. Ideally, your workstation should be designed with computer use in mind. A desk that is 26" high allows a natural reach to the keyboard and puts the top of the computer screen at or below eye level.

Proper lighting is also important to reduce eye strain. Office lighting should equal the screen brightness. Generally, most offices are lit at about twice this level. Try removing a few light bulbs from overhead fixtures, closing the shades or turning your workstation so that your back is not to a window.

Look For Possible Eye Problems

Anytime you experience eye problems — headaches, eye strain, blurred vision, irritation, double vision, excessive tears or dry eyes, pain in the eyes — you should get a comprehensive eye



exam to be sure that the computer screen is not just aggravating an underlying visual problem.

Those who need bifocals and work on computers for a good portion of the day might consider a separate prescription for computer use. A set of reading glasses focused at the distance to the computer screen is recommended.

Advances in Bifocals

A real technical advance for bifocal wearers with limited computer use is the Progressive Addition lens which is an improvement of the invisible bifocal. This type of eyewear gives the bifocal wearer the ability to look just below eye level and see the computer in focus at arms length instead of having to move the bifocal up and down until the eyes are in focus.

"Correcting your vision can help not only at work, but with driving and leisure activities as well. It comes down to finding a doctor who is willing to take the time to find the right answer for an individual's problem," says Dr. Kirk.



High Blood Pressure — A Hidden Disorder



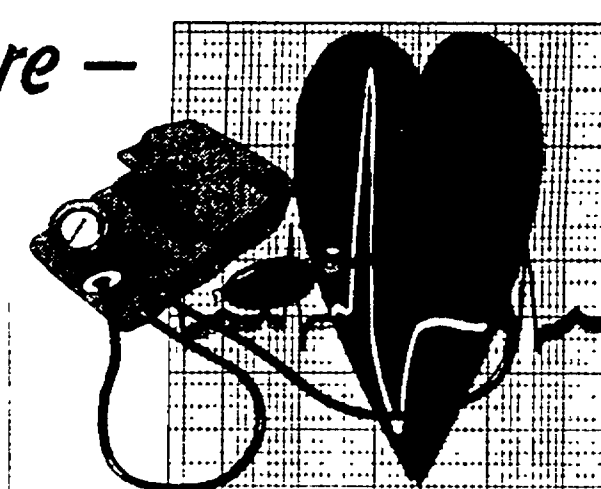

High blood pressure usually has no symptoms, but left untreated can cause heart attacks, heart failure, strokes, bleeding into the brain, vascular disease and kidney damage. It affects 10 - 20

percent of adults in this country so it's important to know how to treat and prevent this disease.

Diagnosing elevated blood pressure can be tricky as it fluctuates with exertion and emotional states. For example, blood pressure rises with exercise but falls during sleep. Anxiety and pain can cause a rise in it and these may be present during a visit to the doctor's office.

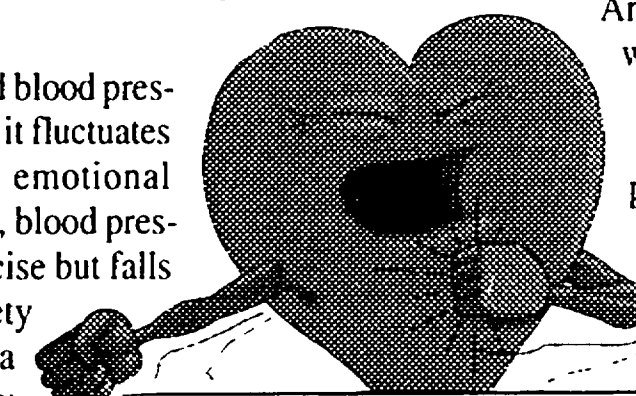
For that reason, physicians often measure the blood pressure on more than one visit or arrange for measurements at home or work. If these measurements are high, diagnosis of hypertension is more certain.



Treatment for high blood pressure consists of two basic strategies: Lifestyle improvements and medications. Lifestyle improvements include aerobic exercise, modest weight loss, avoiding salt and limited alcohol intake.

Exercise does not need to be unpleasant.

Any aerobic activity will do. Many people enjoy walking. Going a mile at a casual pace will only take a half hour. Other activities include biking, jogging, swimming, team sports and skiing.

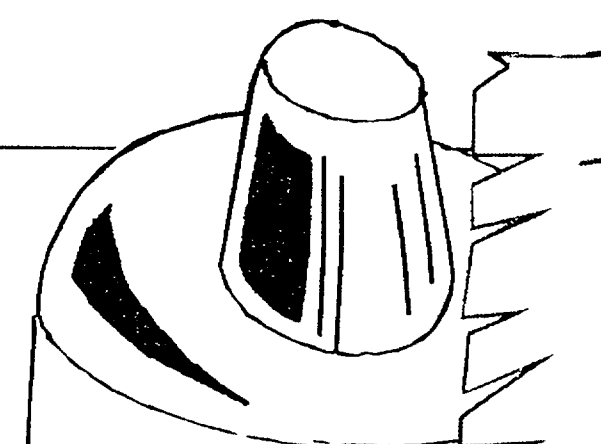

Modest weight loss means just that. Losing five to 10 pounds can significantly lower blood pressure. Avoiding salt is important. Many people find that food tastes good without added salt. Generally, moderate salt usage during cooking is OK.

One drink of alcohol a day tends to lower blood pressure while greater amounts raise it. Anyone with high blood pressure should have no more than one drink a day.

Lastly, treatment of high blood pressure often includes medications. Many effective drugs are available. Physicians usually consider the effectiveness, side effects, ease of use, cost and personal preference in prescribing a medication. Although treatment is usually long term, people who begin life-style improvements can decrease or avoid the use of medications.



Advances in Dentistry

In the 1950s the majority of Americans over the age of 65 had no teeth at all!! Advances in dentistry and the addition of fluoride to water and toothpaste have reversed that trend.

No longer does anyone have to lose a tooth because they are old. Tooth decay and periodontal disease can be prevented at any age. In addition to fluoride and better education on home care, new dental materials and advanced techniques that we use make dentistry more comfortable with every visit.

No More Silver!

One of the latest advances is a white filling material used to replace the silver fillings used in the past. The problem with silver is that over time it expands, weakening the tooth structure. The new white fillings look beautiful and are much less damaging to the tooth structure.

Protect Your Child's Mouth With Sealants

When your child's permanent teeth come in, consider protecting them with sealants. This clear, plastic coating is applied to the chewing surface of back teeth to form a barrier that keeps food and bacteria out of the grooves of the tooth. Sealants are nearly 100 percent effective in preventing decay.

Tips for a Cavity-Free Family

Prevent "Nursing Bottle" Syndrome

Avoid giving your baby a bottle filled with milk, formula or fruit juice at bedtime or for long periods during the day. Sugars in these liquids can cause decay or discoloration.

Make Sure Your Child is Getting Enough Fluoride

Fluoride strengthens tooth enamel, supports bone and helps repair minor tooth decay damage.

Make sure your child is getting fluoride from one or more sources: City drinking water, fluoridated tablets and drops, fluoridated

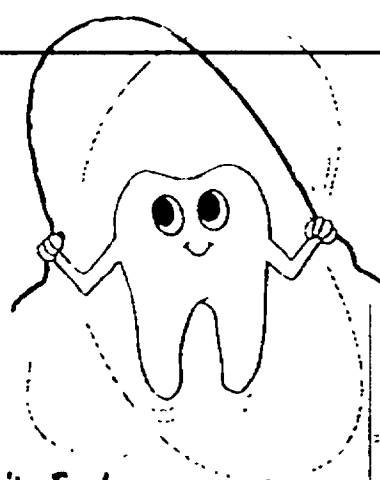
toothpaste and rinses, and professional fluoride treatments.

Begin Dentist Visits Early

Make sure your children see a dentist by age two or three, earlier if you suspect a problem or the child experiences some sort of trauma to the mouth.

Encourage Good Eating Habits Early in Your Child's Life

Your child's diet should include a variety of good foods. Calcium from milk, cheese and yogurt is especially important for building strong teeth and bones. Don't drink milk at bedtime.



Teach Your Child to Brush Properly

Children are usually ready to learn how to brush their teeth by the age of two or three. Make teeth brushing fun and not a chore. Remember that a child's dexterity does not develop until seven years of age, so be sure you brush any teeth they have missed.

Make Dental Visits Positive and Enjoyable Experiences

Start encouraging a positive attitude early. Play dentist with your child before making the real visit to get your child familiar with what will happen. Answer questions honestly, but not too specifically.

Watch Out for Sticky or Chewy Foods

Sticky or chewy foods can cling to the surfaces of and lodge between teeth.

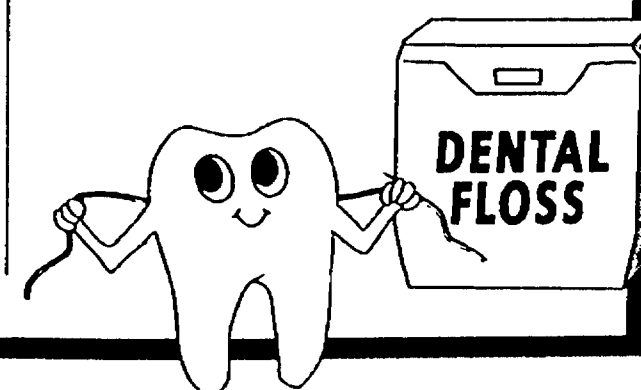
Brush and floss immediately after eating such food.

Avoid Hard Candies and Cough Drops

Because of the nature of these foods, they tend to stay in the mouth a long time and bathe the teeth in sugar. This can lead to decay.

Eat Sweets Only with Meals

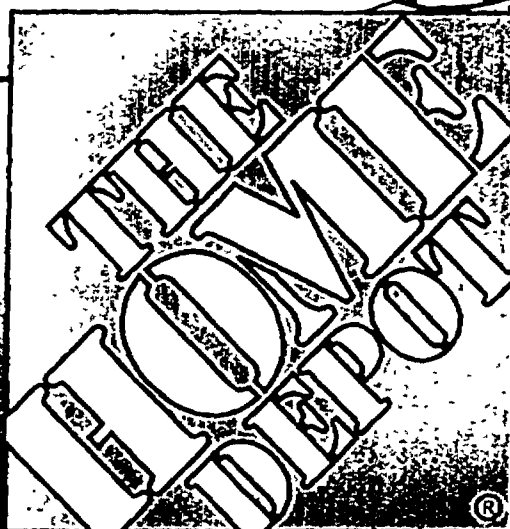
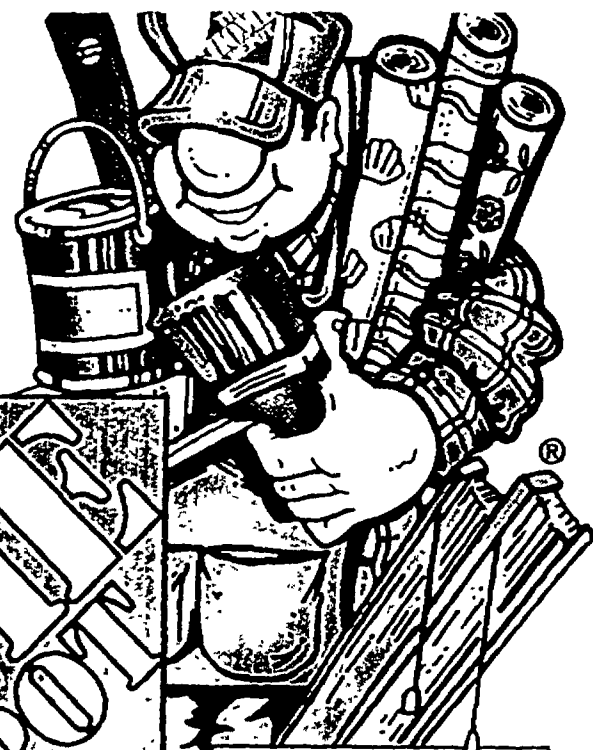
More saliva is present at mealtime, and that can help wash food particles from the mouth. It may also help to neutralize acids and kill bacteria.
