Ward closes in on approval

Church/retail complex wins planning OK

There are still plenty of hoops left for Ward Church to jump through but this week saw the L'Amour sanctuary score a key victory in its 2 year old campaign to make Northville Township its new home.

At Tuesday night's meeting of the township planning commission Ward and the shopping complex which shares a 140 acre parcel with the worship center at Six Mile and Huggerdy roads won final site plan approval. That cleared the way for the push to begin on hammering,

out the proposals final details and linking in agreement between church and township officials.

The green light is contingent upon both sides working out the kinks in a laundry list of details related to the nuts and bolts of the two site plans and in fine tuning the language of the written contract that it will be the final ward on the whole deal.

That contract required because Ward and the shopping center are seeking to develop under the townships' Hagerdy Road Planned Unit Development (HURD) ordinance won't be

signed until the board of trustees gives its consent. The board could consider a revised version of the HURD contract as early as next week although that's against the odds.

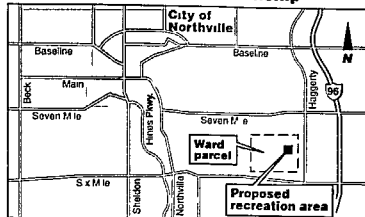
If an agreement is signed within the next couple of months however both the church and shopping center hope to begin construction sometime this spring or summer and wrap things up sometime in 1997.

Two major changes in the proposed HURD contract came about as the result of Tuesday's meeting. The first will be in placement of the back barrier (possibly for use of the widening of Six Mile Road) and Hagerdy.

The board in July 1995 approved the concept

Audience surveyed about bond plan

Questionnaire seeks input on \$60.2 million for schools

Dr. William DeJong, admitted he was apprehensive.

The man hired by the Northville Public School District to build a community consensus on the future of the school district admitted to about 250 community members attending the second of three community dialogues that the district had all the cards on the table Monday.

That's because DeJong and the district had all the cards on the table Monday asking community residents if they would support a bond issue to build a new high school in the district's bond technology and enhancement committee.

What we want is community direction he said. We want some idea whether there is support within this community for the recommendations of the three committees.

The meeting was a drastic departure from the format of the first community dialog which saw plenty of open floor discussion about the future of education in Northville. Instead community members were presented a review

of the recommendations given to the N. Public School District last year by the three committees.

The presentations lasted nearly two hours then community members discussed those proposals in small groups. At the conclusion of the discussion members were asked to complete a sample survey to indicate their support for the committee recommendations whether they would favor a bond and enhancement package proposal and whether they would support a recently developed high school program concept.

District Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski hoped the questionnaire would result in members of the community pumping to conclusions about the process.

"This process is not finished. We have accomplished plenty of work within a very short period of time."

Little screen, big message

Local NYA program participants to appear on PBS show about combating youth violence

Northville will go prime time this Saturday as two of our own will take part in a nationally televised PBS show celebrating the spirit of volunteerism.

It's kind of like a television except we're not asking for money. Chris Benjamin producer of *Act Against Violence: Help Wanted* said of the program.

"The purpose of the show is to encourage people to volunteer their time, especially to organizations that deal with kids and young adults. Our tag line is 'We're not asking for a dime, we just want some of your time.'"

Providing an example of the rewards an investment like that can bring are David Vincent and Steven Stanley, participants in Northville Youth Assistance (NYA). They'll be

interviewed during the live Feb. 3 broadcast which airs from 9-11 p.m. on Channel 56.

Funded jointly by Northville City and Township NYA is a bit like the Big Brother/Big Sister program aiming to match caring volunteers like Dave with kids like Steven who could benefit from spending a couple of hours a week with a positive role model.

That distinguishes Youth Assistance from some of the other organizations across the country that will be featured is part of *Act Against Violence*, such as those trying to keep kids away from guns and drugs in big cities like Los Angeles.

Instilled Vincent and Benjamin said they hope the NYA segment will show the value of giving time to those quiet heroes publicized causes that help youths who are just

wrestling with the normal pressures of growing up.

"Volunteerism is something I feel very strongly about," Vincent said. "We need more of that and I hope that this can help people to see that there are a lot of good kids out there that just need some attention and some time."

"We think that there are a lot of people who like to do something like this but they just need a little shove in the right direction," Benjamin said. "They need to be shown a way that this can help. We hope to do that and then things may grow from there."

To that end *Act Against Violence* will have phone banks set up to take calls from people interested in lending a hand to volunteer agencies all over the metro area. Operators

Home construction booming in township

Northville Township continues to be a hot venue for home growth and there are no signs that the trend will slow down any time soon.

"We met last week with a local builders' task force," Township Department of Public Services head Bill Anderson said Tuesday. "The word on the street is that their industry is projecting at least a good year in 1996 so they had in 1995 for us that means that our growth will continue at least through the rest of this year."

That growth as measured in the number of building permits and certificates of occupancy (COs)

issued by the township building department has continued to climb steadily for the last several years. For example, in 1994 the township issued 884 building permits and 166 COs. In 1995 those numbers jumped to 734 permits handed out and 207 COs.

It's important to understand what those numbers mean. A building permit is issued when either a new home or business facility is being put up or additions such as a new garage room or deck are made to an existing building.

The 734 permit figure then doesn't translate into many hundreds of new homes going up in

Motoring hazardous when slipping, sliding on roads

Snowy weather slippery roads conditions and people in too much of a hurry to get to work made life along area highways more than a little chaotic Monday morning.

Michigan State Police reported 18 separated incidents between 7 a.m. and noon along I-275, I-96, M-14 and I-696 freeways in Northville, and Novi residents drive everyday.

According to Trooper Mark Tinney at the Northville post those numbers are high and don't include the people streaming into the Seven Mile Road station Tuesday and Wednesday to file late reports.

Troopers said they were unprepared for the snow and didn't see the hazardous conditions coming. Salt trucks were slow to get out before morning traffic picked up and people didn't take driving

more seriously that morning. Troopers said all available resources were used to cover the accidents.

Tinney said many of the accidents took place along I-96 near Novi Road and Macdowd Brook and occurred within minutes of each other around 7:30 a.m. Country to Monday morning radio reports there was no 25 car pile up on I-96 in that area just five or six accidents involving three or four cars each with so many people pulling off the road it just seemed like a pile up said Tinney.

He said the victims of the accident he investigated "said they didn't know what happened. They just started spinning and sliding."

It was really icy and there was a lot of traffic," said Tinney. "That's a mixing bowl out there where M-5, I-96 and I-696 come together."

Some accident victims required medical attention he said.

Tinney explained that people should really pay attention to road conditions and slow down. He explained that tires begin to hydroplane above the road in wet

and snowy conditions at about 55 mph so it's definitely unsafe to drive that fast even if it looks safe.

"You need to get to know your car," he cautioned.

Township News Briefs

OIS MAKES AN OFFER: The Wayne County Board of Commissioners is considering a land purchase proposition made by Northville Township-based Optical Imaging Systems (OIS).

The company's desire to buy 80 acres of land next to its Five Mile manufacturing and research plant was made public last week.

Assistant County Executive Dewitt Henry said OIS wants to buy the county-owned land for "flexibility" in the event it decides to build a second, bigger plant. That could cost as much as \$300 million.

The company's current facility, which opened last year, cost about \$100 million to build. Wayne County agreed to sell OIS a 30-acre parcel near Five and Beck for \$10, the idea being to encourage the firm to set up shop in the township.

This time around, OIS will pay more, however. Its offer is \$800,000; a per-acre price of \$10,000, an amount that's still considerably below its appraised value (\$46,667 per acre).

To get that price, though, the company must agree to spend at least \$300 million on the plant and begin construction within five years of the date of sale, Henry said.

Henry recommended that the money be put towards the \$1 million delinquent property tax bill that Wayne County owes Northville Township for unpaid back taxes on its township-owned land.

VICTIMS' FUND SWELLS: Northville residents have reached out to their own in the past two weeks, donating cash and goods to help a local family whose house burned down Jan. 19.

No one was injured in the blaze which consumed the Maxwell Road home of the Hughes family but its seven members, including five children, "literally have been left with the clothes on their backs," township Fire Chief Bill Zhemendak said.

The fire department has set up a fund to raise money to help out the Hughes and to date more than \$1,300, as well as toys, clothes and other items, have been provided.

If you'd like to make a donation, stop by Fire Station No. 1 or No. 2 from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Station No. 1 is located in Northville Township Hall on Six Mile near Winchester. Station No. 2 is on Seven Mile west of Beck Road.

Fire department sets goals for '96

Better and better.

That would sum up how the year just ended and the one just begun have gone for the Northville Township Fire Department, as described by Chief Bill Zhemendak.

The department realized great success in 1995, Zhemendak said last week, both in dealing with emergencies and in developing new training and education programs.

The department picked up some awards along the way, a trend Zhemendak wants to take into - and improve on - in 1996.

"Overall we had a very good year, especially because no one died in a fire in Northville Township in 1995," Zhemendak said. "That's what's really important."

Township firefighters and Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) were busier in '95 than they were in '94, seeing a 7 percent increase in the total number of blazes, accidents and medical emergencies.

But the fire department spent a lot of time on a variety of other "non-incident-related" tasks. More than 400 township businesses were inspected or reinspected for compliance with code regulations.

Another big focus was fire prevention and public education efforts, which encompasses everything from monthly tours of the township's two fire stations to regular civilian CPR and first aid classes to firefighters' safety talks to homeowners' associations and PTA groups.

The year 1995 also saw the adoption of several new in-house innovations that are aimed at improving and expanding the department's readiness to deal with fires, car crashes and the like. They include:

• The township's first-ever firefighter training academy. Eleven pupils are getting free training and certification as firefighters in return for two years of service with

the department. An EMT training system is also in the works.

• In another first, the fire department adopted a new promotion system, using nationally-recognized written exams and oral boards conducted by metro-area fire chiefs to select leaders.

"Our system is being looked at now by Rochester Hills, Van Buren (Township) and some other people," Zhemendak said. "We're just trying to do the best job we can, but if we set a trend, hey, so be it."

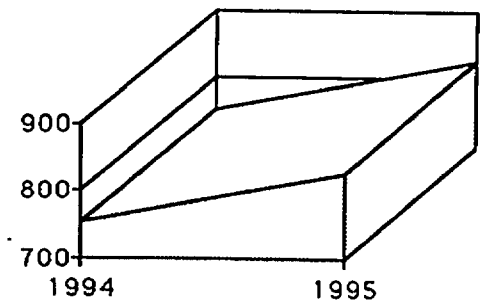
• A "customer survey" asking those who've received emergency assistance to rate the quality of help they've received.

Northville Township also won recognition at the international 1995 convention of fire chiefs, winning one of only six awards in America given out for its public education and fire safety efforts.

What's ahead for 1996?

"We hope to see more of the same and then some," Zhemendak indicated.

A key goal will be to have 100 percent of township businesses become compliant with fire codes, the chief said, as well as completion of "pre-plan" surveys so firefighters know the layout of a building - and any hazardous materials in it - that may one day be involved in a fire.

"We also want to pursue 100 percent EMT certification" for the department's workforce, Zhemendak added.

That consists of him, three full-time employees and 32 paid on-call firefighters who respond to emergencies as needed. That figure will rise to 40 in '96 if all goes as planned, the chief said.

Also in the hopper is a plan to lower the township's municipal insurance rating, a move that's possible given the improved water supply system that now extends all the way to Beck Road.

ARTHRITIS AND EXERCISE

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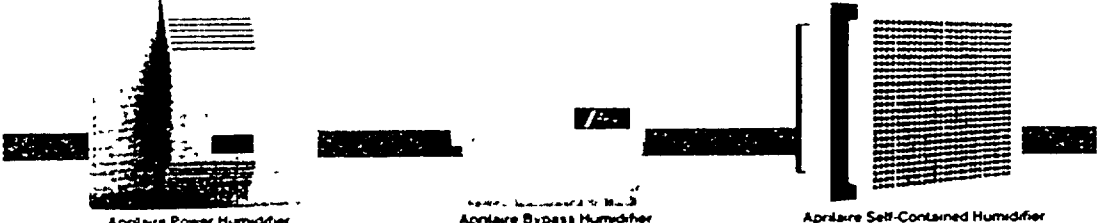

Police News

Theft attempt stymied by neighbor

A would-be thief's plans for running a Northville Township home were cut short last week when he was spotted by a neighbor.

The woman, 36, is the daughter-in-law as well as the neighbor of the Ridge Road couple whose home was broken into on Jan. 24. She told township police that she saw a strange car in the driveway of the house as she pulled into her own driveway at about 11:15 that morning. The couple was not home at the time.

The car pulled out as she drove over to the home, the woman said. Driving the 1995 Chevrolet Monte Carlo was a white male, said the woman, who recalled in his late teens to early 20s with short dark hair and a white baseball cap. The woman got the car's license plate number before it drove off.

A computer check showed that the car was stolen from Milford on Dec. 29. Officers checked the couple's house and found a door kicked in but nothing apparently taken. Damage to the door was estimated at \$300.

PREACHER'S WHEELS LIFTED Someone made off with the minivan a area pastor drove to Meijer on the evening of Jan. 22.

The clergyman said he was shopping in the store when the 1994 Pontiac Trans Sport he was driving was discovered missing from the parking lot. It was then listed as stolen in the area's law enforcement computer network.

The Trans Sport is valued at \$20,000.

THIEF SWIPES KITT A man accused of shoplifting razors, medicine and a home pregnancy test kit from Meijer was arrested on Jan. 26.

Store detectives told township police that they saw the man, a 36-year-old Dearborn Heights resident, conceal the items and then leave the store without trying to pay for them. He faces a court hearing on Feb. 15. The items are collectively valued at \$307.

SMASHED WINDOWS Two windows were broken and six bricks of liquor stolen in a Jan. 23 break-in at the Brookline golf course clubhouse.

City and township officers responded to the club's burglary alarm, which went off at about 2:10 a.m. They found no one there but noted that the clubhouse's cash registers had been tampered with but hadn't been opened.

The damage to the windows is estimated at \$1,000; the liquor is valued at \$120.

A COP WHEN YOU NEED ONE An off-duty police officer helped township police arrest a suspected drunk driver in the early hours of Jan. 27.

The officer called 911 on his cellular telling dispatchers about a man driving a 1983 Dodge erratically near Five Mile and Haggerty. The car had bounced off two curbs the man said.

A township officer who pulled the interlopers out reported that the driver, a 42-year-old Texas man, showed signs of intoxication. His blood alcohol level was 0.15 percent, measured at 19 percent, nearly twice the legal limit.

He was held at police headquarters until he sobered up, then was released on bond and a summons for court.

PHONE HOME For Detroit Township police arrested a bail woman for shoplifting at Meijer Jan. 28, then turned her over to Livonia officers after a computer check revealed outstanding warrants for her arrest in that community.

Store detectives said they saw the woman, 32, put a cordless phone base and a book in a shopping cart and then cover the items with her coat. She then tried to leave the store without paying for them but was stopped.

After being ticketed and presented with a Feb. 16 court date on the larceny charge, the woman was handed over to Livonia police in the parking lot of Hampton Inn.

DRUNK DRIVER A 64-year-old Northville resident learned not to drink and drive the hard way on Jan. 27.

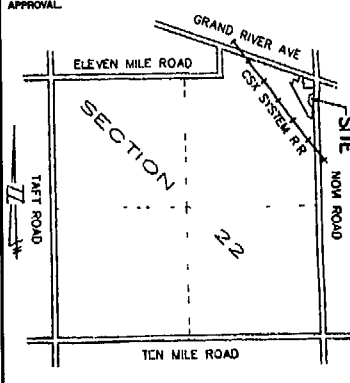

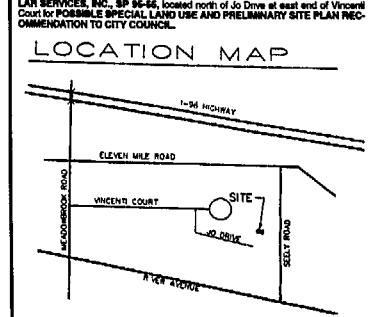

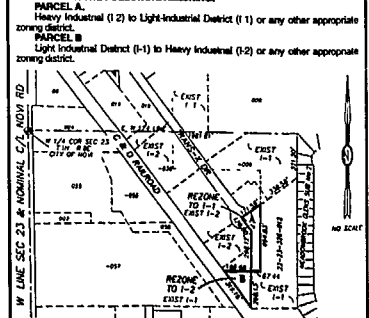

School election revisions on hold

There'll be a year's delay before the Michigan Legislature can simplify and reduce school elections.

"We want to slow down and make sure we do it right," said Rep. Bob Brackenridge, R-St. Joseph, head of a task force seeking to reduce the number of elections and election dates.

"I told the legislative committee of the Michigan Association of School Boards, and they see it coming," said Brackenridge. "But it's like a string from a big ball of yarn. You pull it, and everything moves," added Brackenridge, a former Berrien County clerk.

"I intend to re-introduce this next January," he said, anticipating his own re-election to a fourth term.

Currently, school board members are elected on the second Monday in June each year (except in Detroit). School boards also schedule special tax and bond elections at various times with the approval of a county committee

3 votes a year
Brackenridge has two goals:

1. To eliminate the need in many places of the city and township maintaining one set of election records and polling places while school districts maintain a second set of records and maintain polling places. He wants cities and townships to conduct all elections.

2. To reduce the number of elections of all types to three a year - for example, May, August and November. The only exceptions would be recall elections demanded by voters and special elections to fill congressional and legislative vacancies.

In his district, voters in one village voted nine times in a year - the village elections, township-state primary and election, and multiple school money elections.

Even where there are no villages, many voters become annoyed at repeated school district tax and bond elections. In Brackenridge's view, school districts would elect trustees annually in May and be confined to the May,

August and November dates for ballot issues.

Meanwhile, Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, has joined two outstate senators in a three-bill package of school election reforms. Their plan calls for electing school boards in November in even-numbered years - the same as for state and U.S. representatives and county boards.

The Senate bills also would assign cities and townships all election responsibility. Special school money questions would be confined to Tuesdays in April, August and November.

What's so complex? Brackenridge wants another year of work?

Many cities' special election dates - e.g., in March, April, August and September. While state law takes precedence over a city charter, legislators are reluctant to infringe on municipal home rule.

Villages have a different election schedule - Feb. 19 for the pri-

mary and March 11 for the general election this year.

Officials of the State Bar of Michigan would like to separate non-partisan judicial elections from the partisan, even-year elections in August and November. They're eyeing May, when school boards would be elected.

Phil Power, chairman of the company that owns this newspaper and a University of Michigan regent, is getting attention with his advocacy of a single "education election" in spring for school boards, community college boards, State Board of Education and the Big Three university boards.

Brackenridge has pulled together a "working group" of legislators and officials that already has met four times and will continue to meet through 1996.

He sums it up: "Election consolidation is as significant to the election laws as Proposal A of 1994 was to school finance."

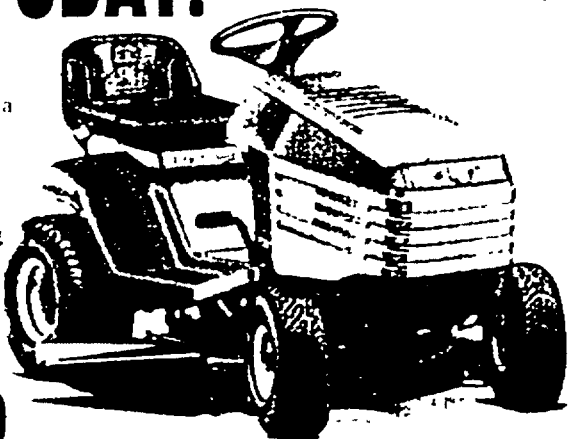

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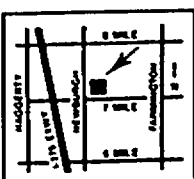
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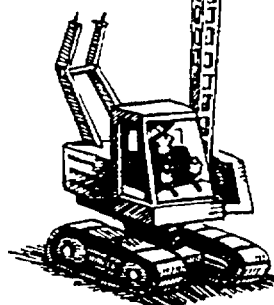

Revamped governmental system proves cost effective in township

She took her lumps for it last summer but now Northville Township Manager Tamara Hanlin is wearing a smile when the word "reorganization" comes up.

Why? Because, according to her figures a key element of the plan - privatizing the municipality's planning department - is on track to do just what she said it would: save taxpayers a nice chunk of change.

Approved by the township board of trustees in July 1995, the proposal involved, among other things, eliminating the position of then-Planning Director Carol Maise and turning all township planning functions over to McKenna Associates, Northville's contracted planning firm.

Hanlin, criticized by some at the time, argued that the move would result in a net cost savings for the township.

That is what the numbers are

saying is going to happen. Hanlin said on the six month anniversary of reorganization's implementation this week.

According to the manager, Northville Township from July 31 through Dec. 18 of last year spent \$20,531 for McKenna to do the work that Maise would have done during that time: an average per-month cost of \$4,106.

It would have cost about \$5,518 per month to have Maise perform the same work, Hanlin said, based on the planning director's yearly salary/benefits package of \$66,220. If those numbers would remain the same through 1996, therefore, the savings to the township would amount to \$1,412 a month and \$16,945 for the calendar year.

It's important to remember a few things when considering the issue, according to Hanlin:

- The cost savings are only projections for 1996. The township

did not save any money from reorganization in 1995. Hanlin explained, because the severance package agreed to with Maise when she left her post assured her a paycheck through the end of the year.

That and a few costs associated with McKenna preparing to become the entire planning arm offset any reductions in bills for services.

- Second the cost savings figures do not take into account the fact that Maise would likely have gotten at least a 4-percent raise in salary in 1996 and that costs for her health care package might have increased as well.

A 4-percent pay hike would have given Maise a salary of \$68,869. Compared to a 12-month cost of McKenna's services (\$49,275), the township would save \$19,594. Hanlin said.

- Before reorganization was implemented, McKenna performed

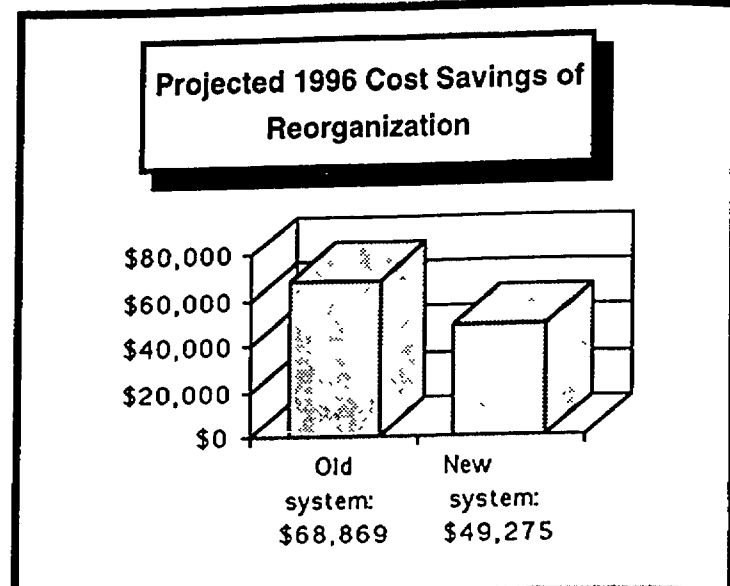
a variety of planning duties for the township such as writing the technical language of ordinances and reviewing development plans for compliance with engineering and landscape standards. Northville Township budgeted \$45,000 in 1995 for those services.

In the post-reorganization system, McKenna continues to perform those functions and now completes a variety of tasks that were once Maise's purview.

A key element of that is dealing directly with developers and others seeking township approval for projects. The 1996 budget sets aside \$92,500 to pay for all planning services new and old, the manager explained.

So how does it feel to know she was on target half a year ago?

"I feel positive that we're saving money," Hanlin said. "That's important but even more than that we've been able, by my measure, to at least maintain, if not



improve, the level of service to the community."

Township planning clerk Jan Balok and McKenna personnel "deserve a lot of credit for their effort," Hanlin added. "They've really stepped up to the challenge."

One critic of reorganization at the time it was approved was Dick Allen, chairman of the township planning commission. He raised concerns over whether the plan

would in fact increase costs and reduce levels of service.

This week, Allen said his opinion of the new system is generally favorable. Reorganization has even brought township officials a full-time contact at McKenna to handle their questions about planning issues and specific projects under consideration. Allen added, something he was glad to see.

"It's better than it was," he said. "It's improved."

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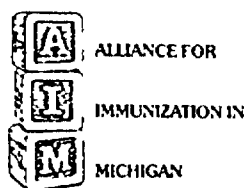
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BACKWARD GLANCE

Northville's past

Randy's learned a lesson this past week, namely that he can't in the future be so quick to offer free coffee to readers who pass me information for ABG as he has been to date.

At the rate you generous people out there are responding, I'd soon need to just deposit my paycheck at Caffè Bravo.

No less than three people answered my trivia challenge of last week, each one confirming that the mysterious cantilevered white building on Main Street between Wing and Center was the home of the Hills Brothers' Meat Market. Randy's a man of his word and I look forward to slipping java with Paul Folino, Dave Schultz and Dorothy Van Atta.

Mrs. Van Atta was kind enough to let me share her memories of Northville with all of us this week and she does have a few socked away, being that she's lived here

for 71 years

She was just a 15-year-old girl named Dorothy Kiiken (incorrectly spelled "Keegan" in last week's ABG - my apologies) when she moved to Northville in 1925.

Actually, she originally came to town even earlier than that, paying visits to her cousin, Conrad Langfield, a former mayor.

But it was the new job (or maybe we should say "jobs") of her father, Reinhold, that brought the family here on a permanent basis.

Reinhold Kiiken was a Jack-of-several-trades for Northville in the 1920s and '30s. He was appointed caretaker of the village hall (the old Lapham house, which stood on the site of the current city hall complex) in 1925. Dorothy can vividly remember living in the house, which was also the Kiiken residence, for a decade

"The home had beautiful leaded glass and marble fireplaces," she said. "The council room was in the living room, where they met once a month, and the clerk's office was opposite from it. We had living quarters on the first and second floors."

In 1926, Reinhold's resume expanded when Reinhold decided to buy a brand-spanking-new fire truck. They sent him to the factory in Cincinnati to learn all about it and put Kiiken in charge of its care, as well as making him a 24-hour town fireman and policeman. Dorothy even got in on the act, handling the phones whenever Dad was dispatched on an emergency call.

"I was in school right down the street and Mr. Amerman gave me permission to leave class and go home whenever we heard the siren go off," she recalled.

It was in school that the 1928 Northville High graduate met town native Roy Van Atta. They were sweethearts from the ninth grade on, got married in 1936 and between them built a successful car dealership near Park Place and Cady and raised a fine family in a home on Randolph.

But back to that fire truck, Reinhold's pride and joy.

"He took such good care of that truck," Dorothy said with a smile.

"I remember that sometimes people passing through town who needed a place to stay could stay in the jail - it was just one cell. My dad would be glad to have them and he'd walk down to town to buy food for them but he locked them up, too. No one was going to mess with that fire truck."

The Depression hit hard but spared Dorothy at least a little of the misery it inflicted on many Northville.

"All in all we got on all right," she said. "We always had food because my dad was paid in script, which he could only use in town, but the pay was always there."

Dorothy lost the money she was saving for a winter coat when her bank went belly-up, however. Still, Northville was a town with a lot of good times, she said.

There were all the Sundays

spent attending St. Paul's Lutheran Church (she's been a member since '25); skating at Fish Hatchery Park; seeing *Gone With The Wind* at the P&A Theater; catching football games at Ford Field followed by a hot fudge sundae at Leo Mainville's Northville Drugs store on Main Street.

For her, the intersection of Main and Center Streets will always be known by its old moniker: "the four corners."

"I always liked it here," Dorothy said, although she confessed that she doesn't like Northville as much today.

"It's just too grown-up now. Things just seem too big for our town, but I realize that progress has got to happen and I can't expect things to just stop."

State House puts new teeth into arson homicide law

Capitol capsules:

The House on Jan. 25 gave 104-0 and 100-0 approval to a pair of bills that will tighten the definition of murder by arson. Sponsors included Sen. Mike Rogers, R-

Howell. It is expected to be signed by Gov. John Engler.

Karen Woodside, the Northville Township resident who prosecuted a major case for Wayne County, said current law allows only a five-year sentence in the killing of a firefighter.

The key measure defines arson as the burning of property - not just a dwelling house. Woodside testified that a Detroit was sentenced to just five years for torching an abandoned building which collapsed and killed firefighter Roland Walters. The prosecutor

wanted to charge felony murder.

The Michigan Supreme Court, in its first case last year, ruled that arson was defined by the common law - "burning of another's house or dwelling house or appurtenances" - and ordered the charges reduced.

The high court said the Legislature, not the court, should define arson.

SB 565, sponsored by Rogers, redefines arson committed during a felony murder. SB 511, sponsored by Sen. Joe Young Jr., D-Detroit, provides for life in prison without parole for homicide resulting from arson.

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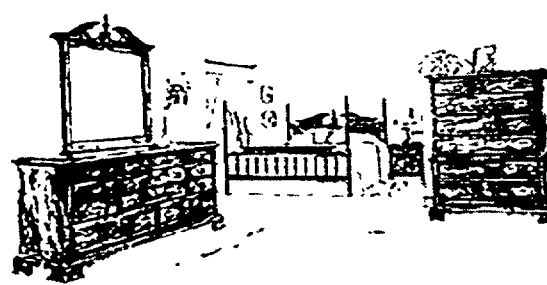


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Innovation draws attention to salon

The Face of Venus, Kraska purports, uses completely natural ingredients to remove toxins and excess fluids from the skin. The effect, she explained, "is that it lifts, firms and tightens the skin of the face. It gets rid of the droopiness, the puffy eyes and all the rest, and allows your youthful features underneath to be revealed again."

If you want to get a look-see at the product in performance, tune into Channel 7 news this Monday (Feb. 5), where the Face of Venus will be featured on the station's Monday Makeovers segment. Should that pique your interest, you can drop by Studio 424 and try it for yourself.

"We're very excited that this is happening here," 424 owner and Venus user Sue Marie Klimick said. "I've been in this business for 20 years and I was totally, totally shocked. I've never seen anything work as well as this did."

Treatments run about \$70.

The organic makeup of Kraska's entire stable of merchandise isn't by accident. She's a passionate opponent of synthetic skin care, arguing that the many ingredients in some national-

brand products actually cause pollutants to be trapped in the epidermis and can introduce dangerous chemicals into the body itself.

"I got into this a few years ago because I tried a body cream and a few weeks later, when I happened to be getting a physical, the doctor found carcinogenics in my body," Kraska said.

That led her to develop a line of goods based on natural items: "my philosophy now is don't put in on your body if wouldn't put in in your mouth. My advice is don't just buy it because there's an ad on TV and don't accept something at face value just because

of a [brand] name or because it says it's 'natural.'"

Fighting the fight for good skin isn't cheap, of course. Besides the cost of the Venus facial advocates say you'll need to use "maintenance" products in between regular treatments to keep the skin fit. Kraska, however, said that it's an "investment in yourself that's worth the price."

"You don't just exercise once and then that's it. To do any good you have to do it on a regular basis," she explained.

"It's about spending money on something that works versus wasting money on something that doesn't."

Phone company says new codes needed soon

Ameritech's Vice President for Corporate Planning Harry Semerjian admits he got the figures wrong when calculating southeastern Michigan's area code split in 1994.

At the time, 313 and its new counterpart, 810, were expected to provide enough telephone numbers for 15 years. Two years later, due to the proliferation of cellular phones, the expansion of alternative local providers such as MCI and the growth of on-line computer services, an additional pair of area codes are now in the works, bringing the region up to four.

"I was the idiot who said that the present [split] was going to last 15 years," Semerjian said ruefully last week.

"We're more realistic now. Nationwide for 40 years, there was virtually no growth. This year, it's going to be even higher. It's beyond comprehension ... There isn't a soul in this country who predicted the explosion in the Internet a year and a half ago."

The initial division was recommended by a citizens committee in 1992. Ameritech once again has a committee on the job and following a series of yet-to-be scheduled public hearings, they're expected to come in with a recommendation in mid-March on exactly how the two new codes should be added.

The new digits have not yet been selected. However, what is now the 810 district will get its new code in fall 1997 because the demand far surpasses that in the 313 district, which won't add a new code until fall 1998.

Two options are under consideration. One is a simple division of the 810 and 313 area codes along geographical districts, which will leave many customers scrambling to have their stationary and business cards reprinted.

Or, an overlay such as that employed in Houston and Maryland could kick in here. In that case, new phone service customers would get the latest area code in each of the existing districts. For example, all customers in the 810

area code district would remain unchanged, but incoming residents installing new phone lines in future subdivisions would be assigned the alternative number.

"It is uncanny for people to accept the idea right now that my son or daughter in my household will have a different area code. We'll try as a priority to keep households uniform," said Joe O'Connor, president of Consumer Market Analysis.

O'Connor serves on the citizens committee; his marketing group is planning a survey of 1,000 customers prior to the submittal of a final proposal to Ameritech.

Changing all their business material to update the phone number is far from a pleasant prospect to Novi businesswoman Diana Canup. She and her husband, Brent, have a firm which provides back-up electrical generators to farms.

"This is too expensive to do to all these businesses. The last time around, my husband had to go to every farm in the State of Michigan and put new stickers with our 24-hour service number on the machinery," Canup said.

"The phone company told us we could send our customers new rolodex cards. Farmers don't keep rolodexes. When they're milking 300 cows and their equipment breaks down, they want service."

Ameritech spokesperson Jonathan James said the company can't predict exactly when they'd run out of numbers within the 313 and 810 area code prefixes, but the firm aims to position itself for growth in the industry.

Besides Ameritech, local service providers MCI, City Signal and Teleport have entered the Michi-

gan market and AT&T soon hopes to be moving in.

Each of the companies is entitled to a share of the available phone numbers, which are assigned in blocks of 10,000.

The additional area codes are expected to allow sufficient room for expansion for seven to 10 years. Per area code, 792,000 exchanges - the first three numbers, as in Northville's 349 - are available. Each code has 7.9 million telephone numbers available.

Nationwide, over the long-term phone companies plan to reduce consumers that area codes are no longer associated with geographic areas. Los Angeles alone now has six area codes.

Within 10 years, it's possible that a customer may be assigned a lifetime 11-digit phone number which will move with the consumer from residence to residence Semerjian said. This could make translating phone messages more mysterious.

You'll know who you're calling, you'll have no idea where they are," O'Connor explained.

Due to the explosion in new area codes, the traditional numerical sequence, with 1 or 0 in the center, will change, too.

Once again, Ameritech is assuring customers that if the phone call is not long-distance, they will not be charged for a long-distance call even though an area code is required.

By the end of March, Ameritech is expected to submit the committee's recommendation to the New Jersey-based Bellcore, a group of five regional Bell companies which has the authority to issue area codes based on its North American Numbering Plan.

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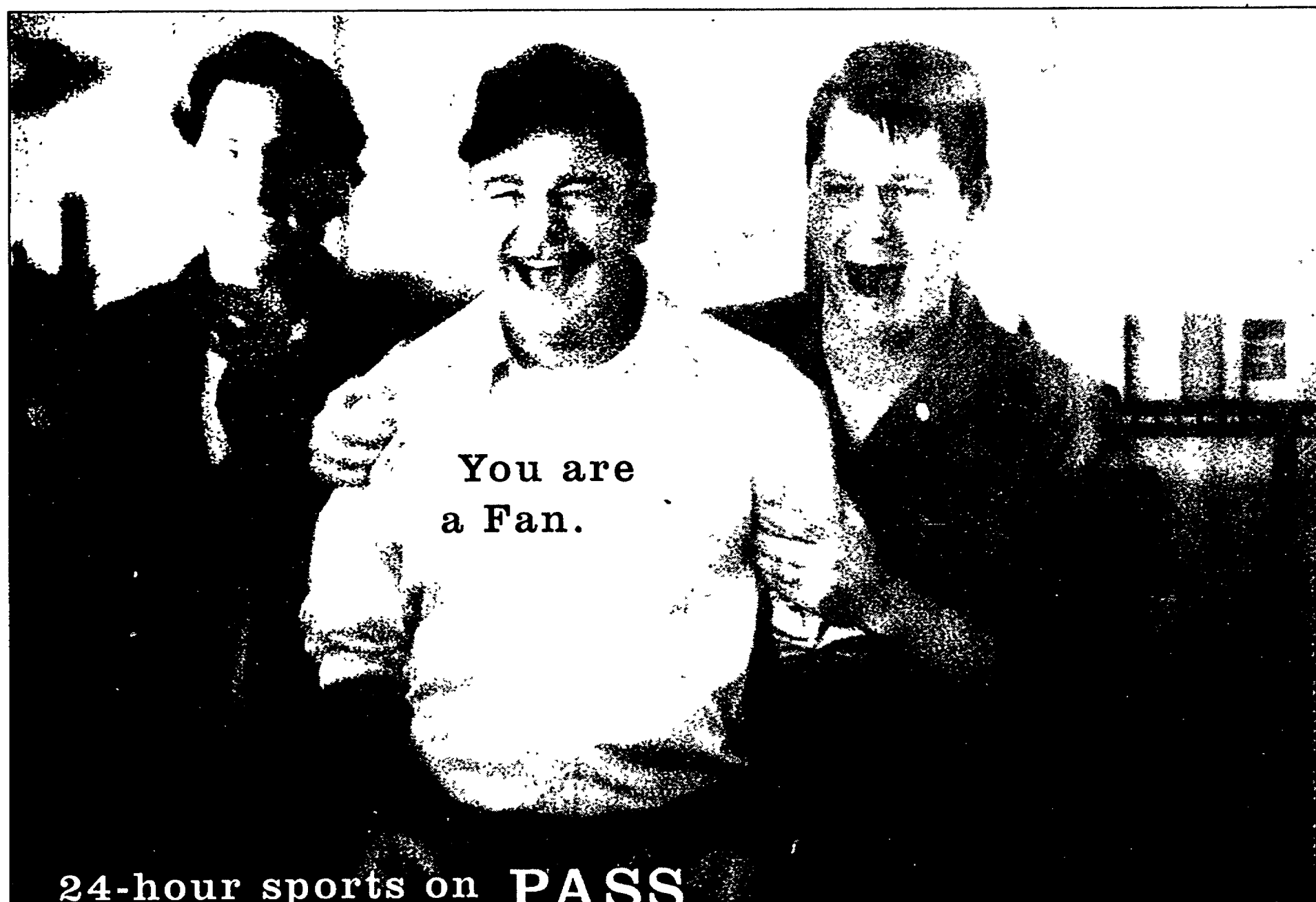

Last week this column began a general history of the area. Continuing along those lines this week's installment discusses the area's earliest settlers.

Little is known of the first humans who inhabited this region after the last ice age. Limited numbers of artifacts have been located in the region although some have been found indicating the existence of human life.

One such relic, an arrow or spearhead, was unearthed about two years ago beneath a dwelling on North Rogers. The Anthropology Department at the University of Michigan determined that the late archaic spear point could be dated back about 8,000 years.

The weapon made of nipping chert is gray-green in color. The smoothness of the point indicates that it was under water for a long period of time. Late archaics hunted and fished along the edges of

melting glaciers.

Later residents in the same area consisted of scattered bands of Native Americans from the tribes Europeans labeled as Potawatomi, Chippewa, Huron, Fox and Sioux.

Plymouth historian Helen Gilbert has spent much of her life researching the last known Native Americans in this area. She has published two volumes called Tonquish Tales, named for the Indian chief for whom Tonquish Creek running through Plymouth was named.

Tonquish's Pottawatomie band inhabited the Plymouth/Northville region at the time that the first European "settlers" arrived. They appear to have been gone from the area within 10 or 15 years of the first arrival so little is remembered of their life and character in this region.

The first established European inhabitants arrived in the 1823-25 period. When first settled the region we call Northville today was part of Town One South, Range Eight East, the surveyor's designation. The designation was given to the first township south of Baseline road (Eight Mile) and the Eighth Range east of Meridian (a road runs today near Lansing's Meridian Mall). Each township so identified was six miles wide and six miles deep.

The first "settlers" called their new home Plymouth and thus it remained legally for many years. By 1831, at least four communities had grown up within the township. These villages were: Phoenix, Waterford, Northville and Plymouth.

The first record of the name Northville being used occurs in 1831 and probably referred to the fact that it was Plymouth's northernmost village or perhaps even Wayne County's northernmost town.

Both Waterford and Phoenix filed plats in 1831. Northville and Plymouth did not do so until 1840.

Those first to file seem never to have grown too large although the region's earliest history comes from them. Next week this column looks at a little of that history.

Information about the history of this region can be found through the Northville or Plymouth libraries as well as through the historical societies of both communities. A limited number of publications of the subject have been printed and are available for sale in both communities. Local schools also have materials available for additional information.

McCotter pushes for vote on commission term limits

Republican Wayne County Commissioners Thaddeus McCotter, Andrew Richner, and Bruce Patterson, have called for county term limits to be placed before Wayne County voters this November.

McCotter, who drafted the legislation and represents Northville Township and Wayne County Northville on the Commission, believes that "term limits are clearly the will of the public," and that the proposals will prove it.

But only if the Republicans can get at least five of their Democratic

colleagues and County Executive McNamara to agree with letting the public vote on the proposals.

McCotter, however, is optimistic that a bipartisan effort can be forged.

"We will constructively seek the support of our Democratic colleagues and the county executive. The overwhelming public support for term limits at all levels of government proves this is an issue that transcends party politics. It's only fair that the public be allowed to speak on this issue."

If placed on the November ballot and approved by the voters, the Wayne County Charter would be amended, effective Jan. 1, 1997, to do the following:

- Limit the county executive, clerk, sheriff, prosecuting attorney, and register of deeds to two full four-year terms of office; and
- Limit Wayne County commissioners to four full two-year terms of office.

McCotter expects the proposals to be considered by the commission in February.

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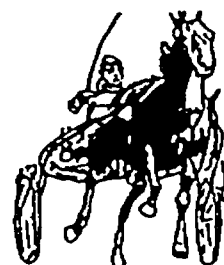

Church plan gets commission OK

plan for the Ward parcel based on a number of conditions. One of them called for the church and Farmington Hills-based developer Grand/Sakwa Properties to cough up the local matching funds needed to win a federal grant for the widening: \$150,000.

Recent moves at the state level, township planning consultant Brad Strader informed the commission on Tuesday, have severely cut back the availability of the grant funds and therefore the likelihood of the Six Mile widening being done in 1996 as scheduled.

"It appears unlikely that the project will be done this year as result of all of this," Strader said.

Township officials and representatives of Grand/Sakwa agreed to huddle and work out some language for the HPUD contract that will address the new situation and specify how the developer's funding commitment for the widening will now be handled.

Grand/Sakwa and the commission came to terms on recreation issues as well, a topic that's divided them for months.

Practically since concept plan approval this summer, the developer and the township have been

at odds over the size of the company's promised commitment to provide recreational facilities for public use.

Part of the reason the board approved the special HPUD concept plan was that trustees felt that township citizens would see a substantial benefit from the deal, especially in increased recreation opportunities.

Several members of the board and other township bodies have criticized Grand/Sakwa of late, however, saying that the company was backing off from the grandiose promises it originally made.

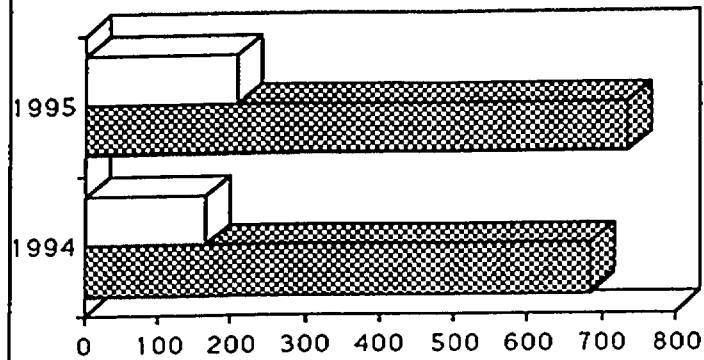
Company representatives have

disputed those claims, saying they've done everything they promised and more. Tuesday night saw the two sides finally reach a tentative compromise.

The company agreed to pay whatever it costs to build two tennis courts on a five acre chunk of the shopping center parcel, deed the courts and the acres to the township and then kick in an additional \$50,000 in cash for additional recreational facilities there such as a soccer field.

Whether that and the other provisions of the complex agreement fly with members of the township board remains to be seen.

Instead, Steven's mom just thought it might do a good kid some good to hang out with a positive older role model like David. Just how strong the bonds have become surprises Vincent.

"You'll get more involved than you might expect going in but it's hard to hold back when you see a kid you can help," he explained. "Besides, I get as much out of it as he does."

The same goes for Vincent's wife, son and daughter-in-law, all of whom get to spend time with Steven on his weekly visits. Together they do everything from ice skating and soccer (Steven's a proud member of the Northville Hot Spurs) to chores and homework.

"We feel grateful that his family lets him be part of ours," Vincent said.

And the good-natured 10-year-old clearly is that. A visitor to the Vincent home can find Steven getting an affectionate lick from Missy, their dog, or leafing through the family photo album, giving chapter and verse on who's who and what's what.

Just last week, Steven, a member of Mrs. Rigney's fifth grade Silver Springs Elementary class, baked a surprise birthday cake for his mom in the family kitchen with a helping hand from the man he calls a friend.

"I made it myself," Steven said, grinning. "He just sort of supervised."

SEMCOG traffic concept to see further revisions

David Moffitt, an Oakland County commissioner from Farmington Hills, looked around the executive committee meeting room of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments and shook his head.

"Gee, I wish my road officials had been here to advise me on this vote," Moffitt said after the Jan. 19 meeting in Detroit.

SEMCOG, the official planning agency for the seven-county region, is being forced to go back to the drawing board on its Traffic Improvement Program (TIP).

The \$2.1 billion, three-year TIP was cut drastically by: 1) the Leg-

islature's failure to pass \$350 million in fuel tax increases; and 2) federal cuts under the ISTEA (Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act).

SEMCOG's executive committee debated whether to fight (bringing all construction to a halt), surrender to state-directed cuts, or negotiate. Its final decision is due at a meeting in March. Consensus: It will be a negotiated surrender.

What bothered Moffitt was that so few local elected chieftains attended the monthly meeting.

A bewildering blizzard of road fund numbers is floating around, complicated by the fact that federal, state and local funds are

involved. Outgoing MDOT director Patrick Nowak told SEMCOG the situation was further complicated by the fact that the feds changed categorical figures.

In a nutshell, there appears to be a 25 percent cut in available money over the next three years. Gov. John Engler and MDOT promptly announced four state projects would be given priority:

- Constructing M-5, the Haggerty connector, between Twelve and Fourteen Mile roads in eastern Novi - \$33 million.
- Widening I-96 between Chilson and Dorr roads in Livingston County - \$12 million.
- Constructing M-59 to highway

standards from Romeo to Plank roads in Macomb County - \$40 million.

• Rebuilding the 50-year-old Davison freeway in the middle of Detroit - \$65 million.

"These projects were identified as priorities in the Regional Transportation Plan and the State Long Range Plan," said Louis H. Lambert, Nowak's deputy director.

the township during 1995.

As far as COs go, they are issued when a home or building is ready to be moved into. So, many projects for which building permits are issued late in a calendar year - after August, said Building Official George Kilpatrick - don't actually get a CO until the next year.

A home which pulls a permit in September 1994, for example, might not get its CO until spring or summer 1996.

Despite those caveats, it's fair to say that the numbers do show a constant increase in home building in the township, Anderson said.

"Business seems good, mortgage and interest rates seem steady or even declining a little bit and developers are optimistic," he said. "We're on course for a good year."

"This is for sure a pretty hot

area," Kilpatrick said. "It's going to keep us hopping."

No staff increases are planned for the building department this year as of now, Anderson said, but efforts are under way to find a person to fill the position of chief building official open since former department head Mick Kruszewski's departure in December.

Township officials hope to complete the application and selection process by the end of March and present a candidate to the township board of trustees for approval in April.

A recently released study completed by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) noted that the township's population in 1990 stood at 17,313. Given current growth trends, the study predicted that 29,896 people will call Northville Township home in the year 2010.

Poll could provide barometer on odds of bond issue passage

A survey presented to residents attending the second Northville Public School District community dialog meeting could give district officials a pretty good idea where they stand as far as support for a possible bond and enhancement millage election is concerned.

That leaves several questions for district taxpayers to mull - does the school district need a new high school? Do we need to move Cooke Middle School to the existing high school facility? Does Silver Springs Elementary School need to be expanded? And what about all

that technology talk? Do we really need that computer high-tech gear?

Most district taxpayers want to know the bottom line as well.

They want to know, for example, that if the bond issue and enhancement millage are approved how will the additional tax burden affect them.

While district committee members attempted to answer the facility questions Monday night, the district's consensus building facilitator, Dr. William DeJong, did his best to answer the financial questions.

"In 1994 voters in this state

approved a new funding formula to finance public education," DeJong explained. "The new formula has affected the way your schools are operated and financed, by shifting the burden from local property tax to a statewide sales tax."

The new funding program for the operation of schools decreased the local homestead property tax in the Northville School District from 34.1 mills to 10.3 mills - six mills to the state and 4.3 mills for debt retirement - for a reduction of 70 percent, according to DeJong. At the same time the sales tax was increased 50 percent, from four to

six cents on the dollar.

"However, the manner in which school construction is financed did not change," he added. "It is still based on property tax."

What that means is that district patrons, should they approve a bond or enhancement millage, would pay 10.3 mills yearly for school operating costs plus the cost of the bond debt.

How much would that additional burden cost? The formula is actually very simple, according to DeJong.

For tax purposes, the assessed value of a private residence is 50 percent of market value. So resi-

dents owning a home with the market value of \$100,000 actually pay taxes on \$50,000 of assessed value. At one mill, the property owner would pay \$50, three mills would equal \$150, and four mills would run \$200.

Similarly, the owner of a \$200,000 home would have an assessed value of \$100,000, and that homeowner would pay an additional \$400 per year, based on four mills.

Any additional millage - such as an enhancement millage - would tack on additional property tax

costs. Although the school board passed on the Enhancement Committee recommendation to place a 1.95 enhancement millage on the ballot this year, the district could ask voters to approve three additional mills - raising an additional \$2.7 million - sometime this summer.

DeJong said the district could support the \$60.2 million bond debt. The district's current debt capacity is \$138.4 million and its total bonded indebtedness is \$25.5 million, which was used for construction, renovation, technology upgrades, and refunding.

but we're by no means finished," he said. "This is a work in progress, and there's plenty of work ahead for all of us."

According to June Handley, who served on the Bond Committee, a variety of options were reviewed by committee members to address overcrowding at the elementary, middle, and high school levels.

To address the space requirements at the elementary level the committee recommended constructing an addition to Silver Springs Elementary School.

"We believed that the addition to Silver Springs would be the most viable alternative," she said during the Bond Committee presentation. "Silver Springs and Winchester Elementary were originally constructed based on the same design. However, Winchester is the larger facility so the addition to Silver Springs would be fairly straight forward."

Handley explained that addressing overcrowding issues at the middle school and high school was a little more complex. She said that several options were considered, all calling for renovating and constructing additions to both Cooke Middle School and the current high school facility.

"We felt that because of the limi-

tations at both sites, renovating and adding to Cooke or the high school would not be a feasible long term option," Handley said.

She added that although those options might be good in the short-term and be less costly to district patrons, the long-term consequences could present bigger problems.

"If enrollment at the high school continued to grow and 10 years from now there is a need for additional space, we could be confronted with having to build a new middle school and high school, and find a use for the existing high school," Handley explained.

Portable classrooms were also considered by the committee, but because of space constraints and possible health problems, the portable classroom idea was scrapped almost immediately.

"You also have to consider that the environment in that type of situation would not be conducive to kids learning," she said.

According to the committee report it will cost approximately \$47.1 million for the construction of a new high school \$12 million to build an addition to Silver Springs, and another \$2 million to convert the existing high school facility into a middle school.

Those costs, along with an additional \$9.9 million for other dis-


trict facilities and technology improvements - computer hardware and software upgrades would represent the bulk of the technology improvements - would bring the total price tag to about \$60.2 million.

Rezmierski said that the results of the survey will be released to the public, and will be available at the final community dialog set for Feb. 13.

In the meantime, Future High School Committee member Mary

Ellen Wolbers hopes that district patrons who were unable to attend the second dialog will take time to view the video tape replay on Continental Cablevision channel 15. The air times for the replay will be Feb. 2 and 9 at 6 p.m.

"There's still plenty of questions that need to be asked and answered," Wolbers said. "I hope members of the community will be interested in viewing the taped meeting and become better informed on the process."

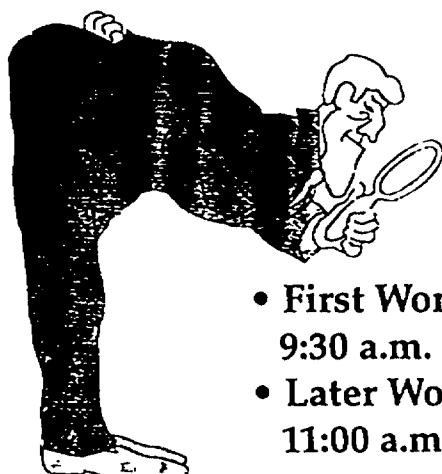
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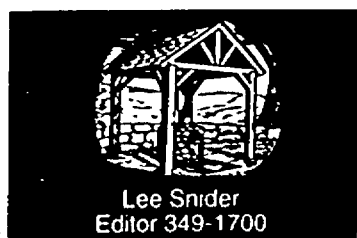

Are taxpayers willing to bear millage burden?

Northville school district consultant Dr. William DeJong continues to draw impressive crowds to his large community-wide dialog sessions.

DeJong is in town to help district officials and residents arrive at a consensus as to what should be done to accommodate the district's growing student population.

He's also helping design curriculum content for the fast-evolving educational needs of primary and secondary students.

More than 300 people showed up at last month's dialog meeting and an estimated 250 people attended the Jan. 29 brainstormer. It's encouraging to see people turning out in such numbers for school-related participatory events.

As DeJong has rightly pointed out, the district's buildings are already crowded and growth projections indicate that pressure will continue to mount. Doing nothing and trying to subsist on the current level of accommodations is not a realistic option.

But what is the appropriate avenue to take? Must new buildings be constructed and, if so, where and how big? Or can current school buildings be renovated and expanded to provide for greater numbers of students?

As we have stated before - and we are not alone in thinking this - we suspect school district officials are partial to options that call for large-scale construction. Three volunteer committees conducted studies last year and recommended capital improvements to the tune of more than \$50 million. Taking no stance on the issue, officials voted to hire DeJong to help sort through the maze of facts and figures.

But it wasn't long before DeJong presented hard figures of his own. At Monday's dialog, a questionnaire was distributed to attendees asking their disposition toward new millage to finance construction. Only this time the price tag was quite a bit higher: \$60 million.

It'll be interesting to learn the results of the survey. DeJong's positivism is infectious and, despite widespread anti-tax sentiment, the scale might just tilt in favor of higher taxes for new buildings.

But we wonder if an affirmative outcome should be taken as truly indicative of the wishes of the electorate. Sixty million tax dollars is a lot of revenue, and property owners who aren't showing up for the dialogs might not be persuaded that the tab is truly necessary.

Firefighting capability adds to area's appeal

A community is nothing if it isn't safe. Rows of beautiful homes, an upscale shopping district and acres of scenic open space amount to little more than superficial niceties if people can't feel safe in their homes and their neighborhoods.

That's why public safety stands at the core of any community's public service responsibility.

Fortunately, Northville Township residents can boast of living in a place that has top-notch fire protection.

The township fire department gained recognition at last year's international convention of fire chiefs, winning one of only six nationwide awards for public education efforts. The honor was not misplaced.

Despite seeing an increase in the number of outbreaks in 1995, there were no fire-related fatalities in the township in 1995. That was no coincidence.

The department has worked hard to maintain a high performance standard, implementing several innovations designed to enhance readiness to respond to fires, car crashes and medical emergencies.

The department's firefighter training

academy, for example, provides students with free training and certification as firefighters in return for two years of service with the department. A similar EMT training program is also planned.

The department also adopted a new promotional system, using nationally-recognized written examinations and oral panels to choose leaders, and was proactive in asking those who received emergency aid to rate the quality of assistance provided them.

In addition, more than 400 township businesses were inspected or re-inspected for compliance with fire code regulations during 1995.

Add to those efforts the heart that fire department representatives demonstrated in helping to raise funds for the Hughes family, who lost everything in a fire that broke out at their home while they were away, and you have all the bases covered - professionalism, dedication and an attitude of caring.

Fire Chief Bill Zmendarak and his crew deserve real credit for their efforts and enthusiasm. One only hopes they can sustain that spirit of commitment and energy in the coming months and years.

View of schools from abroad

Our features editor, Carol Workens, has prepared quite an interesting piece on student foreign exchange programs for this week's issue.

I recommend the article highly. It makes for both informative and enlightening reading. But I might also add that her piece is a little disturbing. Find it on page B1 of today's edition.

Carol talked with host families in both Northville and Novi, listening to parents speak about their experiences with their teenage guests from abroad. She also interviewed some of the exchange students and got their impressions of life in the world's oldest democracy.

While the students were generally positive about the friends they've made in our communities, they offered observations that will leave anyone feeling at least a little uncomfortable.

A student from the South American nation of Uruguay, for example, said her chemistry, computer and economics classes at Novi High School are not very difficult. She covered the same basic material at home a year or two ago. She also said that students attend high school for six years in Uruguay, a country with a gross domestic product not even half that of the good old U.S.A.

The exchange student added that American youths are not as serious or as friendly as she's accustomed to back home and tend to be unwilling to admit new acquaintances into their social circles.

Another foreign visitor, this one from Thailand, said she's noticed that youngsters here don't have as much

respect for their older relatives as they do in her Asian homeland. She was also dismayed to see students at Northville High School propping their feet up on desks, something she said would never be tolerated in the Thai schools.

A third student from Mallorca, an island in the Mediterranean that's part of Spain, echoed the view that American teens aren't as open as he expected.

Unfriendly, disrespectful young people and unchallenging classroom subjects ... not exactly a ringing endorsement of the state of secondary education in the greatest country on earth. And this assessment stems from visits to Northville and Novi, communities with some of the top high schools in the region, if not the state.

So what are we to think about the bad report card coming from our foreign friends? Discipline is generally poor in the home? School districts are dumbing down their curricula? Our culture fails to value qualities that are important, such as wisdom acquired through experience?

The simple answer, I think, is all of the above. What's not so simple is what can be done about it.

Recently I had the chance to talk to a woman who has 25 years seniority as a teacher in Ecorse. She told me conditions in that drug-infested district are appalling and that there's little anybody can do about it. The students are so coddled, teachers are afraid even to speak to them in a firm tone of voice.

The whole situation is big-time scary and it makes you realize that the role of authority figure - be it parent, teacher, police officer, minister, judge, or whatever - is both more difficult and more potentially rewarding than at probably any other time in our history.

Letter writers off the mark

Alrightee, I've got a few things to say about Northville Township and the letters to the editor sent to The Northville Record both this week and last, so here we go:

Some of us out there, including township Trustee Russ Fogg, completely missed the point of The Record's recent editorial concerning the board of trustees' debate over Supervisor Karen Baja's mileage, phone bills and other expenses. Russ and several others took us to task, asking why we oppose the examination of the supervisor's expenses.

How do I put this: Hellooo? That was not what happened!

This newspaper did not say that those expenses shouldn't be examined and did not agree with Baja's contention that she's constantly singled out for unfair scrutiny. We were talking about board priorities.

Specifically, we had a problem with trustees spending more time deciding what to do about \$160 worth of mileage than they did debating the merits of "reorganization" last summer or the more recent proposal to hire clerk Sue Hillebrand as a full-time administrator.

Now to this week's letters page. First off, let me correct an error that some people in Northville have, township Trustee Gini Britton among them. In one passage of her little missive about the vast journalistic talents of The Record's staff she indicates that our paper reaches only a "minute" (pronounced "my-nute,"

meaning very small) percentage of the community.

This has driven me up the wall since I started working here three years ago. Despite my best efforts to tell them differently, some folks have the idea that our weekly circulation is about 1,200 copies. Actually, The Record's circulation is roughly 6,400 per week. Multiply that by the average number of persons living in each subscriber's house, and the newspaper is seen by the majority of residents in our fair little borough.

Second, I agree 100 percent with Karen Baja's "response" letter to the one written last week by regular letters page contributor Dean Lenheiser.

I like Lenheiser but his effort of last week crossed the line. It started off just fine, a harsh criticism of - but only of - the supervisor's job performance.

About midway through, though, Lenheiser began analyzing Baja's psyche based on the wording of her Christmas news letter, then got into the condition of her home life. Keep those letters coming, friends and neighbors. I'll need something to write about for my next column.

First, a disclosure: I am both a regent of the University of Michigan and a working newspaper publisher.

So I have a foot in both camps in the developing debate over the mechanism the Board of Regents, as governing body of U-M, adopted last week to seek a new president.

The board tried - successfully, in my view - to balance two worthy but conflicting objectives: the Michigan Open Meetings Act, which holds that decisions of a public body like the Board of Regents should be taken fully in the public view, and Art. VIII Sec. 5 of the Michigan Constitution, which imposes a duty on the board to "elect a president."

The mechanism we adopted sets up a Presidential Selection Advisory Committee composed of U-M faculty, staff, students and alumni - no regents whatsoever. This committee is to meet in public with the Board of Regents and work up a set of criteria - skills, experience, background - which should govern the selection of the new president.

The committee is then, without contact with the regents and meeting in private, to develop a pool of prospects and, after careful evaluation, forward a list of at least five recommended candidates to the board. The board will then meet, deliberate and select a new president entirely in public.

There already is a fair amount of huffing and puffing under way about this. Some of my news media friends are grumpy that the search process isn't going to take place entirely in the open, while one of my regental colleagues abstained from the final vote on the grounds that the process compromises too much of the Board of Regents' fiduciary duty to find and recruit the very best president possible.

Abandoning the legalisms that usually infest this kind of discussion, I'd make just three points:

First, it's often overlooked, but the absolute key to any successful search is the care and thoughtfulness with which the selection criteria are set out. In the process we adopted, the Board of Regents and the search committee are to meet in public and develop their vision for the university and the criteria for the kind of person who will help them achieve that vision.

The whole point behind the Open Meetings Act is that public bodies like the Board of Regents should be held accountable not only for what they decide (picking an individual to be president, in this case) but why they decide the way they do (their vision of the university and the criteria in determining the selection).

When the Board of Regents conducted its last search for a president eight years ago, it formulated with no public debate a list of 18 largely boilerplate selection criteria. This time around, board members had a public obligation to be pointed, detailed and specific about just what their looking for and why.

Second, there is compelling evidence that conducting searches for university presidents entirely in public deters qualified candidates

from allowing their names to be put forward. It is this concern that has led many university boards - Michigan State, Northern Michigan, Oakland and now U-M - to view with alarm the public meeting requirements of the Open Meetings Act.

This evidence is more than anecdotal. A survey done by the distinguished search firm of Korn/Ferry found that of presidents and chancellors of the leading universities in the country, 93 percent said they would not participate in presidential search that publicly disclosed names of candidates as part of the process.

It's this fact that has led Wayne State University President David Adamany to argue that persistently restrictive application of the Open Meetings Act to the selection of Michigan's university presidents, over time, has disadvantaged our public universities compared to privates in the competition for able leadership. I think he's right.

Third, when real people are trying sincerely to develop a real world process to get something important done, there is always a risk that absolutist editorial writers may become obsessively concerned about just how many Open Meetings Act angels can dance on the head of a public body pin.

The U-M Board of Regents has a real job to do in the real world. From my divided perspective, we have done our level best to respect both the requirements of the Open Meetings Act and the obligation of our constitutional duty to find the best possible president for U-M.

THE ACADEMIC TOURISTS

Host families of foreign students usually find out about the exchange program either through newspaper articles or word of mouth or, as in Brenda Anderson's case, through first-hand experience.

Anderson has been on both sides of the fence.

The year was 1979, and Anderson was attending South Lyon High School. She picked up a Youth for Understanding brochure from her biology teacher and within a few months, having just completed her sophomore year in high school, found herself in Copenhagen, Denmark, on a summer exchange program.

"It was more than I thought it was going to be," she said. "It was fascinating. I was so perfectly matched with the family that we hit it off immediately."

Anderson has kept in contact with her former host family and took her eldest son, Steven King, who is 13, to Denmark to meet them in 1991.

When Brenda and her husband, Tim, were faced with the possibility of Steven's participation in an exchange program, she returned to the Youth for Understanding (YFU) international exchange program as the area representative for Novi and South Lyon.

"That was one reason why I got back into YFU. I thought that if my son wants to go, I would find out as much as I could about the organization and how it's doing now before I sent him," Anderson said.

Anderson is also host to her first exchange student, 16-year-old Orlando Guastavino, who arrived from Chile in January on a one-semester program.

"Within five hours of Orlando's arrival, Tim said it was going to be hard to send him home," Anderson said.

As an area representative, Anderson

recruits and oversees host families and students who want to join the exchange program.

"The biggest and most important thing is to include them (the exchange student) comfortably in your home, talk with them, encourage them to ask questions and be open to answering those questions," Anderson said.

"Be ready to discuss family rules so the student knows where they stand right away. YFU backs the students up with orientation instruction before students leave their country."

Host families are screened by the area representative both here and in the other country and have to fill out a questionnaire about their interests, habits and hobbies. Everything from whether anyone in the family smokes or attends church, and whether they expect the student to attend with them, is included on the form, according to Anderson.

"The only thing required of a family who wants to host a student is to provide for the student a bed to sleep in," Anderson said. "They definitely can share a room if it is a same-sex child. They have to provide three meals a day and a place for the student's personal belongings."

As an area representative, part of her job is to go through the profiles of the students, their families, hobbies and grades.

"We try to match the student profiles to the family as best we can," she said. "The host families are allowed to choose the sex of the student, the country, and the approximate age of the student."

Anderson will then choose two to four profiles of students and present them to the host family so the family can choose one.

Students wishing to stay with a host family in another country should be willing to try new things and be flexible according to Anderson. Students traveling on the summer program need not

speak the host country's language. Those students who are traveling for a year or a semester will need to know the host country's language, if it is readily available here.

"We don't speak a word of Spanish in this house," Anderson said of her exchange student's native language.

"When you are immersed in a language, it's amazing how fast you pick it up. In six weeks time I picked up a lot of Danish."

The YFU program has nearly 30 countries from which to choose. When a country becomes unstable, it is removed from the list. Prices range from about \$2,360 for a summer program in Mexico to about \$6,190 for a full school year program in Spain.

YFU has several meetings for exchange students with and without their host families. One is held in preparation for the student's arrival followed by a couple of meetings to monitor progress and a final meeting in the spring dealing with separation as the student prepares to return home.

"It will touch your life for the rest of your life in any number of ways," she said.

There are a variety of exchange programs available, including those run by the Northville and Novi Rotary Clubs, YFU, PACE, World Learning, and PAX to name a few.

Families interested in becoming host families or students interested in becoming exchange students can call their high school counseling offices. To reach Anderson, call 349-1658.

Novi High School has eight foreign exchange students this year, according to Rose Rasplet, the high school's counselor, while Northville High School has three.

A few students and their host families participating in various exchange programs this year include

Fabiana Mazza

Host Family - Steven and Mary Nims of Novi have a son, Brandon, who attends Novi Woods Elementary School and a daughter, Hilary, who attends Novi High School.

Fabiana Mazza arrived in August from Uruguay and is a senior at Novi High School. She will return to Uruguay in July.

Although she is taking a pretty heavy course load this semester - chemistry, conservation, computer application, economics, English literature and aerobics - Mazza said her studies present no problems.

"All this I did one or two years ago," she said.

For Mazza, unlike other exchange students, her classes at Novi High School will not transfer to her school in Uruguay.

Since she was half way through her senior year when she left for the United States, Mazza, who is here with the Youth for Understanding international exchange program, will have to complete the last half of the school year when she returns.

Mazza also attends after school group functions such as those sponsored by the International Club and the Interact Club, an environmental group. She has also performed some community service.

An exchange student for the first time, Mazza has found a difference in the schools. In Uruguay, they do not have graduation ceremonies and students attend high school for six years.

"We have the whole year on the same subject. At the end of the year we have a final exam," she said.

Although an orientation session Mazza attended before leaving Uruguay was meant to prepare her for her year abroad, it was taught by former exchange students and Mazza questions its accuracy.

"Some things were different," she said. "Americans are not as serious and not as friendly. They are not as open as young people in my country."

"It has been hard to make American friends at this high school," she said. "They don't integrate me into their groups." Most of Mazza's friends are exchange students.

Overall, Mazza has enjoyed her stay.

"I also like this experience because I'm going to have a lot of friends from all over the world, other exchange students and friends from here," she said.

Assimilating into Steven and Mary Nims' family has been easy for her.

"I feel like I'm a member of the family already," Mazza said.

Mazza helps Mary Nims, whom she calls "Mom," with things around the house like loading the dishwasher. She is also responsible for keeping her room clean.

The Nims first read about an exchange family in a newspaper article over a year ago and were very much intrigued by it. With their own daughter, Hilary, beginning Spanish lessons, they thought the timing was right.

"Fabiana has really made it quite easy because she has very much wanted to please," Nims said. "She tried to blend herself in immediately."

"She's not afraid to take challenges, which has been good for our family to see."

Through casual conversation the Nims have learned about Mazza's culture.

"We would recommend it for any family if they could have a student like Fabiana," Nims said.

"The separation is going to be difficult," Nims said. "We realized Fabiana is going back to her family, and we are going to feel a loss. The fax machine will definitely be busy."

They may doze off now and then, but the fact that the same people come each week - residents and staff - and new ones each week, too, indicates that the volunteering is worthwhile.

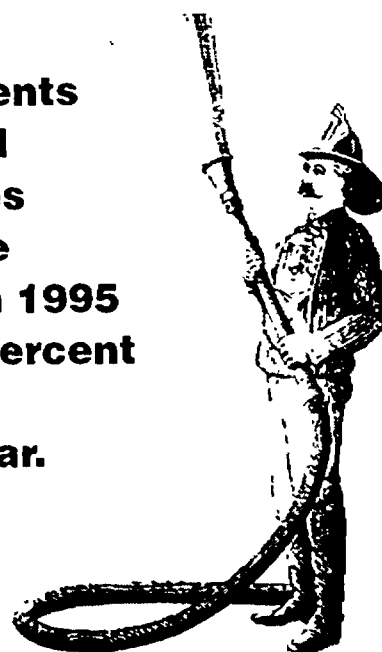
And they applaud when the concert is over.

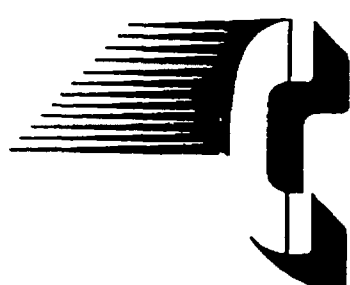

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Exchange students make easy-going adjustments

Mol Wiyaporn

Host Family—Rebecca and Randal Armstrong of Northville have a 16-year-old daughter, Courtney, a junior at Northville High School.

Mol Wiyaporn arrived from Thailand with the World Learning exchange group for a one year program from September through June.

Wiyaporn, who is 17, was quick to notice the differences between the two cultures.

First, there was the relationship between younger people and their older relatives. There is not as much respect for older adult relatives here, according to Wiyaporn.

A senior at Northville High School, Wiyaporn was shocked to see students with their feet on their desks and sitting on their desks, neither of which is allowed in Thailand.

Wiyaporn's subjects this semester include adult living, business class, gym class, ceramics, German class and American history.

For Wiyaporn, who attends an all-girl school in Thailand, her credits are transferable.

"Sometimes I miss my family," she said. "But I am having a lot of fun here."

"I knew something about the culture before," she said. "I have learned a lot of experiences and culture."

Some of the things Wiyaporn had decided she wanted to try while here is snow skiing and hanging out with American friends and going to parties.

"My English is better than when I first came," she said.

Her host mother, Rebecca Armstrong, would definitely agree.

"She now knows a lot of English slang," Armstrong said of the terminology Wiyaporn has picked up at school.

"It wasn't a big adjustment, she fit right into our family routine," Armstrong added.

As is usually the case, most exchange students become like a

brother or sister to host siblings and meet their own friends and cultivate their own interests.

Rebecca and Randal Armstrong, who are 1974 and 1972 graduates of Northville High School themselves, fell into the exchange program when Rebecca struck up a conversation with a customer at work who happened to be involved in an exchange program.

Within four days the Armstrongs had made their decision. Although the Armstrongs had two short visits from a 12-year-old exchange student from France, this is their first long-term exchange student.

"The culture between Asia and the U.S. is as different as night and day," Rebecca said. "It has been a big learning experience for both of us."

"It really takes a lot for the kids to come over here and go through the program for a whole year."

Axel Vom Freyhold

Host Family—Teresa Garland and Ted Peterson of Northville have a son, Jerry, who is a junior at Northville High School and a daughter, Rose, a sophomore at Wayne State University.

Axel Vom Freyhold, who has lived in Mallorca, a Spanish island in the Mediterranean Sea, for nine years, is originally from Germany. He is here with the PAX student exchange program.

Arriving in August for the full school year, Vom Freyhold's first experience with American life has been similar to his life in Spain.

"Culturally, it is not that different," he said.

"I thought it would be more happy, more action," Vom Freyhold said. "The people aren't as friendly as I thought they would be."

At Northville High School, where he is a junior, he is taking humanities, U.S. history, algebra II, ceramics II, independent arts studio and biology.

"If I pass all my classes they will transfer and I will get credit for the year," he joked.

Vom Freyhold has made a lot of friends at school and also plays

bass guitar in a band with some friends.

"My dad sent me here to clear my ideas," he said.

"Here in Northville they have a very good art program. I really discovered the artist in myself. I am going to study something creative like architecture or interior design."

Falling into a routine with his host family has also been easy for Vom Freyhold.

"They are really nice people," he said.

"They have some house rules like keeping my room clean and every other day I have to do the dishes, the usual housework."

Vom Freyhold's curfew is quite different here than in Spain. Garland has set a weekday curfew at 9 p.m. with an open curfew on weekends.

In Spain, Vom Freyhold has to be home more or less by 10 p.m. during the week but has a curfew on the weekends of 6 or 7 a.m.

Since the legal drinking age in Spain is 16, Vom Freyhold, who is 17, had to make a little adjustment.

Vom Freyhold had just come of legal drinking age in Spain and was also allowed into the nightclubs which stay open quite a bit later than in the U.S.

"It's been great, we've enjoyed the daylight out of Axel. He's mature, responsible and a lot of fun," said Teresa Garland, his host mother.

"I think my biggest worry was when I found out about the drinking and Axel's long hair. His lifestyle is freer at home but he has not taken advantage of the freedom he could have here and he is very responsible about making sure he follows the rules. He wants to be here."

Garland and her husband, Ted Peterson, saw an article in the newspaper about Vom Freyhold who was ready to come here but did not have a host family.

"They (PAX) asked us about our religion, smoking, asked us about various characteristics of Axel and

we matched perfectly," Garland said.

"Jerry and Axel act like brothers. They each have their own set of friends, they go out together every so often. The down side is that

Axel is not allowed to drive, so Jerry drives."

"I recommend this to people who know and like teenagers. People who don't know or understand teenagers could have a pretty diffi-

cult time with this. Teenagers are very interesting characters. Seventeen is a really wonderful age. Once you've been through it it's fun. You know how to stay a step ahead of them."

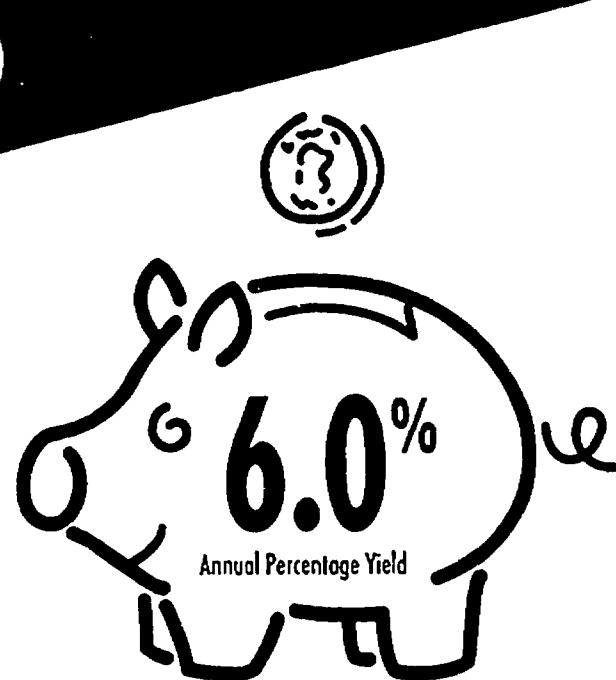

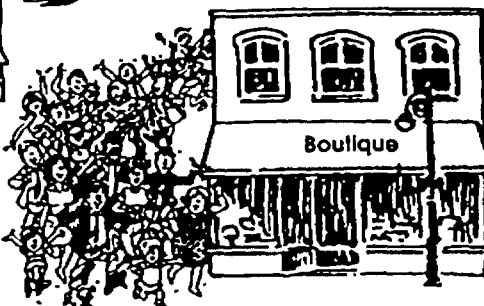

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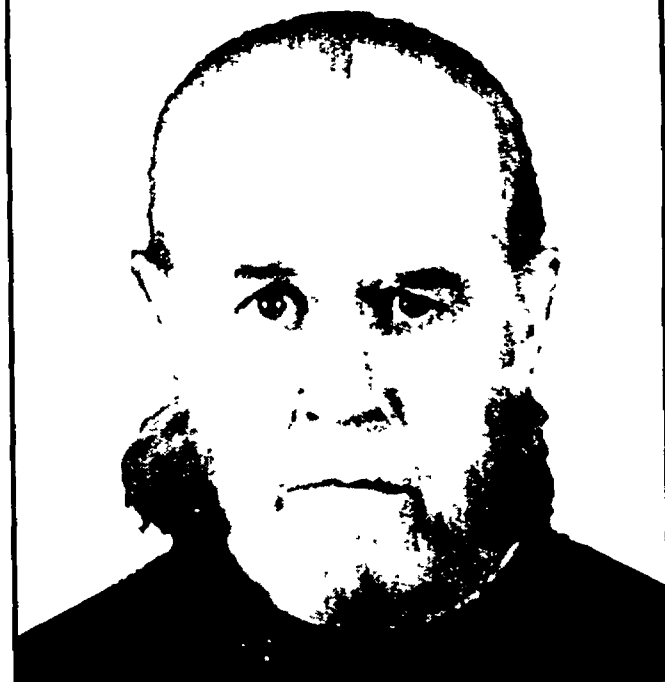

Ashley Ossola had three digs in the game and Amanda Dekoker

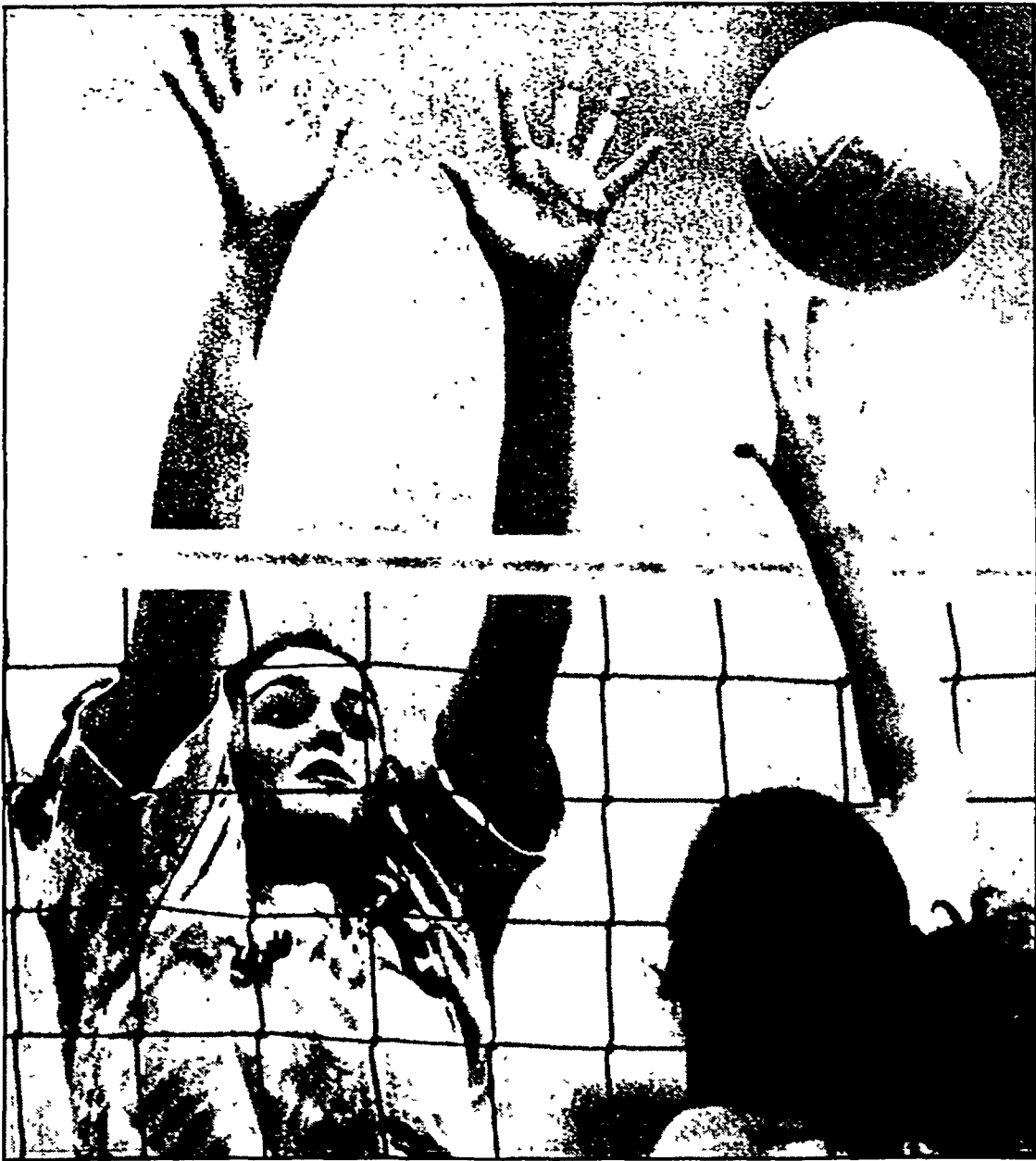

Regular exercise vital for health

You've done it! Spring is just around the corner and you're managing to stay on course with those vows of a healthier lifestyle for 1996.

Perhaps you've eliminated those late-night snacks or chosen not to order dessert when out for dinner.

Now, with warmer weather approaching, you should take your healthy attitude one step further - by starting a regular exercise program.

If, unlike the majority of people who resolve to improve their health with the new year, you've managed to engage in some form of regular physical activity, then you're off to a good start. However, most people find themselves leading a fairly sedentary lifestyle when that spring fever strikes.

For this group, as well as a segment of those currently exercising, a formal medical evaluation and exercise prescription may be in order before starting or continuing their exercise program.

Who should see their doctor before exercising? Anyone who has not previously been engaging in a regular exercise program, regardless of age, should have a baseline medical evaluation.

Those individuals who have been exercising but plan to take their program to the next level or become competitive should also see their physician. Certainly, everyone with chronic medical conditions like diabetes, high blood pressure, or heart disease, should consult their doctor.

What is an exercise prescription? Just like ordering a drug to treat a specific disease, a physician can make specific exercise recommendations based on individual capabilities and goals.

*An exercise prescription consists of five components: mode - the chosen type of activity; frequency - how often you exercise; intensity - how hard you exercise; duration - how long you exercise; and progression - how often you increase either frequency, intensity or duration.

Depending on the individual, the pre-exercise evaluation may consist of history-taking and a limited physical examination, or a more detailed evaluation including laboratory and exercise stress testing. The data your doctor gathers can then be used to customize the components of the exercise prescription to meet your specific needs.

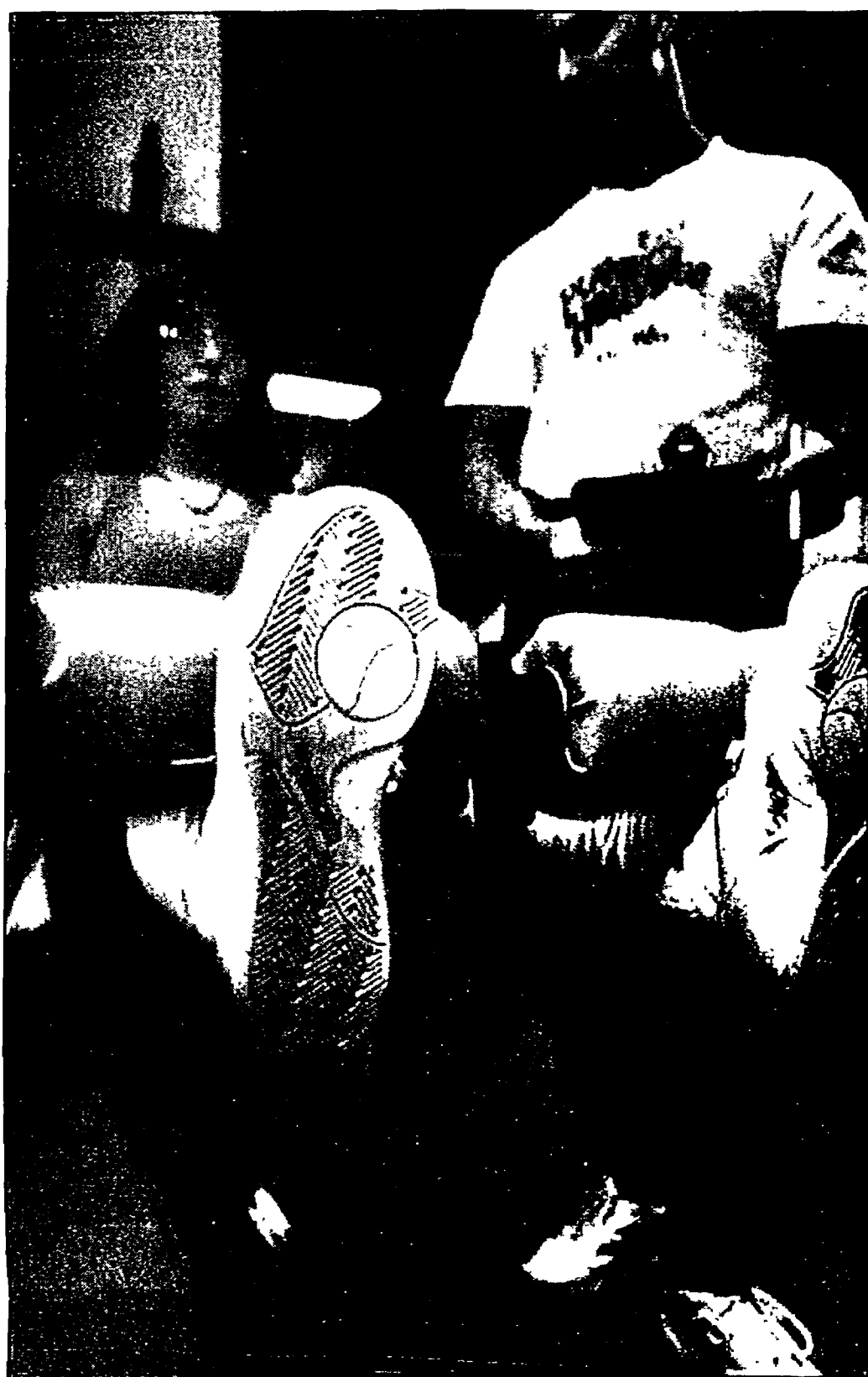

Why exercise? Be it a treatment for spring fever, regular and safe exercise can have lasting benefits in preventing certain diseases, improving others, and enhancing one's outlook on life.

Unfortunately, the road to most exercise programs is paved with good intentions only, and often fails to become a regular habit. This is often a result of misguided enthusiasm that leads to too much too soon. Although an exercise pre-

scription from a physician is no guarantee that you will exercise regularly without risk of injury, it will take into consideration your particular needs and abilities and hopefully improve the chances of successfully incorporating regular physical activity into your routine.

So take heart! If you've tried to start exercising before and been unsuccessful or you just cannot seem to make any gains in your current routine, don't

give up. The fact that you're considering these changes is the first step in getting started. It's a new year and spring is near, so with a little effort, determination and help from your physician these goals are well within reach.

Protect your eyes from ills of winter

Low temperatures and harsh winds can be tough on people - colds, dry skin, nosebleeds and earaches are all hazards to be expected in the winter.

Are eyes also affected? You bet. Here are some suggestions that can help keep your eyes healthy despite the cold.

Conjunctivitis. People seem to catch more colds during the winter months than at any other time. Regardless of the cause, more colds mean more sniffles and more sniffles mean an increased risk of viral conjunctivitis.

More commonly called pink eye, viral conjunctivitis is neither long lasting nor vision threatening. But it is very uncomfortable and highly contagious. The eye becomes red and uncomfortable, has a watery discharge, and often secretes a sticky substance.

Pink eye is usually caused when germs associated with a cold are transferred from your

nose to your eyes via your fingers. The best way to avoid conjunctivitis is to wash your hands frequently and keep your hands away from your eyes. Admittedly this is difficult, but the greater the effort, the more likely you will avoid an irritating case of pink eye that could travel through your entire family. If you think you have pink eye, see your ophthalmologist.

Snow Blindness. Mountain climbers or skiers exposed to sunlight reflected off snow for long periods of time can sustain a burn to the front surface of the eye (cornea). This painful condition is called "snow blindness" and usually resolves with conservative treatment. If you are going to be skiing or climbing on a sunny day, be sure to wear sunglasses that give you good protection.

"Pink" vision. Sometimes patients who have had a cataract removed and an intraocular lens implanted report that "everything's pink." This peculiar condition almost always arises after the patient has been shoveling snow, skating or skiing. "Pink" vision is painless, only lasts a day or two, and is not dangerous. It is caused by the artificial lens implant's inability to filter light as efficiently as a natural lens.

Dry eyes. Many of us experience a dryness or burning of the eyes during the winter. Indoor

heating, blowers and low humidity combine to make the natural tears that lubricate our eyes evaporate more quickly. Sometimes the symptoms can be relieved with over-the-counter artificial tears, but if there is no relief, be sure to call your ophthalmologist.

Injuries. What are some common causes of wintertime eye injuries? Hockey pucks and sticks, of course. But there is also some danger from snowball fights. Remind your children to take aim at the body, rather than the face, when engaged in snowball fights. And remember - never put a rock in the snowball.

And finally, people who recently have had eye surgery must be extra careful. Snow and ice can be treacherous for walking. If you fall and experience unusual visual symptoms or bump your eye directly, give your ophthalmologist a call. You may need medical attention.

Outstanding success in revitalized downtowns

Efforts to revitalize the downtown areas of cities and towns throughout the country are achieving outstanding success in many cases, surpassing the expectations of planners and making downtown real estate more appealing to area residents and commercial property users.

In fact, in some areas residential trends are being reversed. Instead of a rush of residents and businesses moving from central core areas to the suburbs, as was the case a few years ago, people are taking a new look at attractive, close-in condo and town house residences, as well as business

properties.

"Many American cities are now on an aggressive comeback trail with programs to keep their downtowns alive and growing," notes a report by the Urban Land Institute. This strong trend was the focus of a recent forum sponsored by ULI.

"Something new is happening in our cities," said Joseph Canizaro, ULI president. "Many of our cities have been an underutilized economic force, but now are being re-evaluated. They are being looked at and revitalized in very innovative ways."

This development is a natural evolution, Canizaro said. First, the

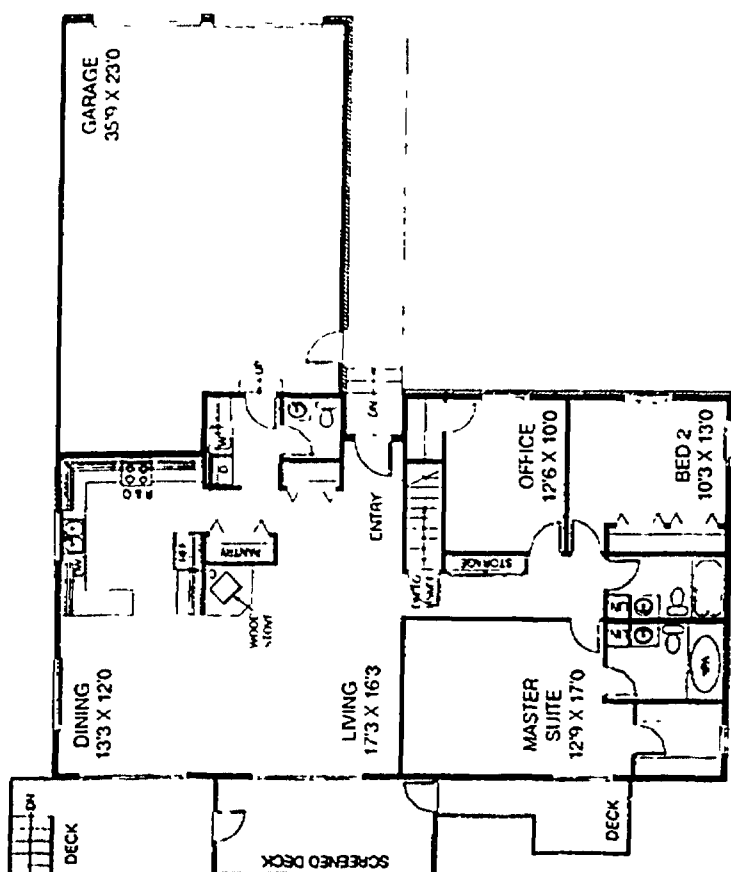

AVOIDING ANIMAL ATTRACTION

To some people, having to "guard" your garbage might seem a ridiculous and laughable activity.

But for anyone who's ever had to clean up the yard after neighborhood animals turned their trash into a self-serve buffet, being more cau-

tious with trash disposal isn't such a bad idea.

"The first line of defense is a trash can," said Steve Hornback, the president of Hornback Recycling and Disposal. If you don't want to do that and use trash bags, a few moth balls in the bag or a quarter cup of liquid bleach poured in the bag before you seal it up should do the trick, according to Hornback.

Hornback said it's a must to put the bleach in the bag not on the bag or else all his workers end up with spotty clothes.

"Use some kind of odor the animals don't like," he said. Raccoons can eat right through a plastic trash can, in which case a steel can with a rubber stretcher over the can to keep the lid on is the alternative.

"If you have a very persistent problem, set a trap and see what you catch," said Hornback, whose company does about 4,000

homes in the city of Novi.

"If you catch a raccoon turn it over to the humane society."

Most of the persistent problems Hornback has found come from the same customers whose own pets turn out to be the pests.

Unprotected and improperly stored refuse is a magnet for hungry and messy animals. Dogs, cats, raccoons, deer - just about any four-legged scavenger with a sense of smell - can follow garbage odors back to their source, and they won't think twice about turning open and available trash into their evening meal. Worse, they won't clean up when they're finished.

To avoid this scenario, try practicing a few helpful trash tips.

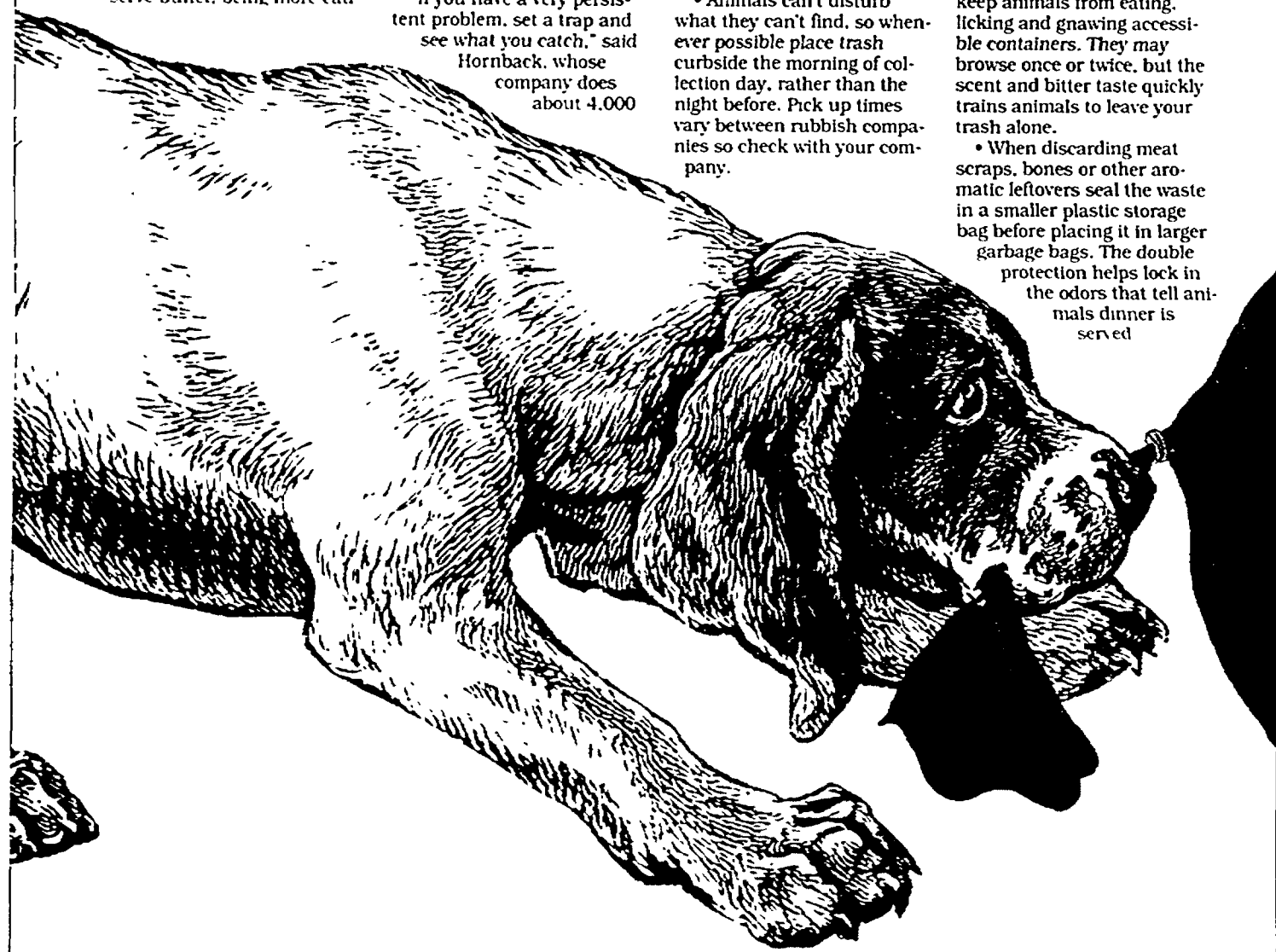
• Animals can't disturb what they can't find, so whenever possible place trash curbside the morning of collection day, rather than the night before. Pick up times vary between rubbish companies so check with your company.

• Investing in a new set of metal or plastic garbage containers with tight-fitting lids is an easy way to avoid trash mishaps. To ensure that lids stay locked against even the strongest paws, secure them with short bungee cords hooked on the pail handles and pulled secure across the top. Containers should be no more than 30 to 35 gallons or weigh about 50 pounds.

• If you don't have containers with lids and put out bags, a BFI Waste Systems spokesperson suggests sprinkling a few drops of ammonia on or near the bags. It does not harm animals such as dogs, cats and raccoons, but it will keep them away.

• Coating trash, trash bags and cans with a liquid repellent, which works on the principle of aversive taste, will keep animals from eating, licking and gnawing accessible containers. They may browse once or twice, but the scent and bitter taste quickly trains animals to leave your trash alone.

• When discarding meat scraps, bones or other aromatic leftovers seal the waste in a smaller plastic storage bag before placing it in larger garbage bags. The double protection helps lock in the odors that tell animals dinner is served.



Growing annual flowers from seed can be easy

Unless you have actually done it before, you cannot realize what a thrill it is to plant annual flower seeds and in six to eight weeks have plants with rare beauty blooming until frost. Flowers are not difficult to grow, and the pleasure and joy they provide will reward you many times the cost and effort expended on them. Most seed packets have instructions, so you can't go wrong.

Here are some suggestions for a fabulous flower garden, a nonstop supply of annuals for cutting right up to the frost! These seeds can be sown direct into the garden:

Aster, baby's breath, cornflower, cosmos, dianthus, marigold, zinnia, seabloss, forget-me-not, nasturtium and pansy.

Annual seeds make a beautiful border of bright, long-blooming flowers especially selected for their tolerance of hot, dry conditions; perfect for long, hot summers. The following seeds can be direct sown:

Celosia, cosmos, all varieties of marigold and nastur-

tium. A garden for hummingbirds and butterflies can add motion, mystery and color to the garden. Start snapdragons and salvia early indoors. The other following seeds can be sown direct after the last frost:

Cosmos, zinnia, cornflower, marigold and latis.

Bats are among a gardener's best friends. They eat thousands of night-flying insects. To encourage these benign creatures to stay in your garden, you can create a habitat that attracts plenty of night-flying insects with the following seeds:

Salvia, cornflower, four-o'clocks, nicotiana, phlox and moonflower.

Annual everlasting flowers look as pretty in the garden as they do in arrangements. These easy-to-grow varieties put on an amazing display throughout the summer and will supply you with an abundance of flowers for dried arrangements to grace your house all year long. All these

Advice for successful annuals

Most annuals are easy to grow. Most can be direct-sown after frost danger is past, but starting them indoors will lengthen their summer life.

■ For hot, summer conditions, consider celosia, cosmos, marigold and nasturtium.

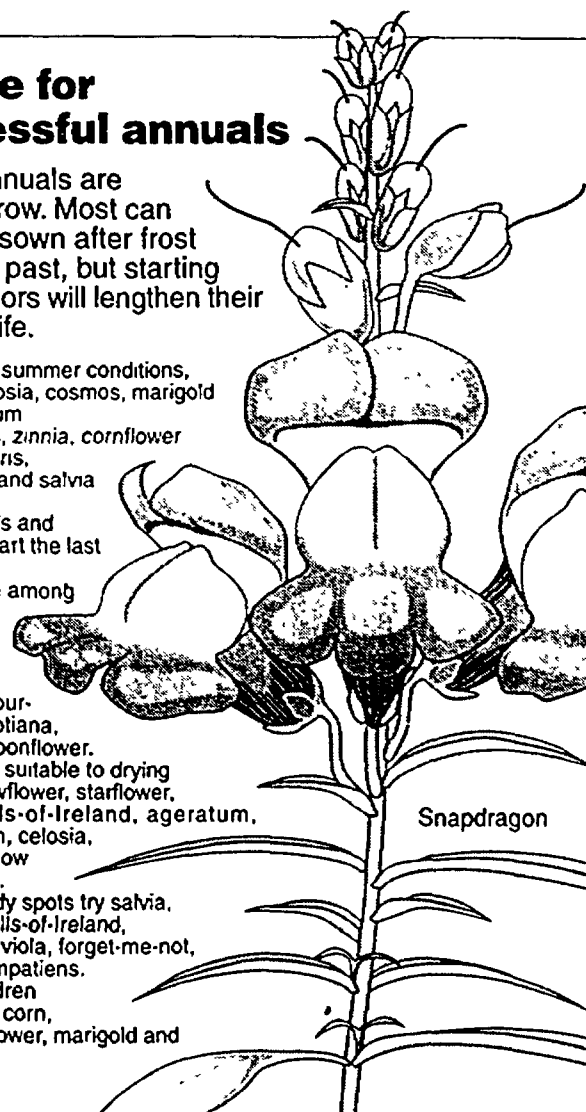
■ Cosmos, zinnia, cornflower marigold, latis, snapdragon and salvia will attract hummingbirds and butterflies. Start the last two indoors.

■ Bats are among a gardener's best friends. Attract them with salvia, cornflower, four-o'clocks, nicotiana, phlox and moonflower.

■ Annuals suitable for drying include: strawflower, starflower, statice, Bells-of-Ireland, ageratum, baby's breath, celosia, larkspur, yarrow and lavender.

■ For shady spots try salvia, nicotiana, Bells-of-Ireland, snapdragon, viola, forget-me-not, coleus and impatiens.

■ Get children involved with corn, lettuce, sunflower, marigold and tomato.

Revitalization of downtown areas brings residents back to the cities

economy is better and developers are beginning to work again in their communities. Second, there's an absolute need as our cities have decayed over the decades. The cities themselves recognize the need to be aggressive about revisiting our communities.

An increasing number of cities have achieved outstanding success in rejuvenating themselves, it was noted by Michael Evans with Kenneth Leventhal Real Estate Group, a participant in the ULI forum.

"One of the most important factors is that many of the successful cities have some form of regional cooperation, whether it's a regional government or whether it's a regional authority in which there

is some form of tax sharing or shared government," he said.

"In this kind of environment there is more cooperation, and cities themselves have not been permitted to deteriorate to the same extent as some of the older cities."

Development alone cannot cure a city's problems, it was noted in the ULI forum. Development meets a certain need. But real estate is built, if done properly, to satisfy a market demand.

If you're satisfying a people-generated demand, real estate is going to be successful. In turn, it will provide all the related economic benefits to the city.

"In fact, I think a city must be a 24-hour operation to be truly successful," Cantzaro said.

"We have all that building. We

have all that infrastructure. The more that it can be used, the more you can spread the cost of the operation over a lot of different people. The idea is to use our cities more efficiently."

As those innovative plans to revitalize downtown areas take form, including aggressive programs to minimize crime, people will continue their trek back to the central districts of cities.

Young residents like the activity that's available within walking distance of their downtown homes — the energy of a dynamic district. Businesses are attracted to downtown offices because of those same conveniences and competitive lease rates. Retailers are attracted by the increasing traffic-

flow, translating into potential sales.

These factors are stimulating a lot of real estate activity in those central districts. New condos and town house developments are being planned and built. Existing buildings are being renovated. They are experiencing increasing values and bringing higher rents.

9. Did the number of home sales go up or down during 1995?

A. Nationally, residential sales (previously owned homes) throughout 1995 were 9.5 percent greater than in 1994, but sales

dropped a bit during the last two months of the year.

"The closing of the federal government coupled with the onset of the holiday spending season may have caused some reluctance among consumers to get into the housing market near the end of the year," said Art Godi, president of the National Association of Realtors. "Still, a recorded sales rate that exceeds the 4-million mark is a sure sign of a healthy housing market."

The national median existing-home price is now \$114,200. That's up by about 5 percent from a year ago.

Home mortgage loan interest rates also are still declining.

"The falling interest rates are causing people to recognize that home ownership is very affordable," said John Tuccillo, NAR chief economist. "We anticipate that recent drops in mortgage rates will continue to motivate buyers well into 1996."

In addition to the varieties I've already suggested, try "air drying" the following:

Ageratum, baby's breath, celosia, larkspur, yarrow and lavender.

Dress up your shady nooks, crannies and borders with flowering annuals from early summer to frost. All these suggested seeds can be sown direct in the garden after all

danger of frost is gone. Of course, if you start your seeds indoors in March, the flowers will bloom earlier when transplanted to the garden:

Salvia, nicotiana, bell of Ireland, snapdragon, viola, forget-me-not, coleus and impatiens are all good choices.

A child's garden is easy to grow with annual seeds to keep a child interested and to teach the joy of gardening. Good choices:

Corn, lettuce, sunflower, marigold, tomatoes.

For an easy-to-grow herb

garden, sow:

Basil, borage, chives, mint, dill, parsley and nasturtium.

Order your seeds early, since some catalogs give a discount. Or visit your favorite garden center. They can advise you for any situation.

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Elly's specializes in cross stitchery

Ellen Danes has cross-stitched since she was very young.

For her "stitching is very therapeutic - I think people do it to relax - besides, even if you're watching TV (when stitching), you feel like you've accomplished something."

Since Danes had to travel quite a distance to get the kind of cross-stitch materials she wanted, she thought that other stitchers in the Milford-Highland area might have the same problem.

So she changed the nature of her existing Highland Township business site from balloons to the stitchery business, and called it Elly's Attic. Danes has had a business at this site for eight years. She said she thinks it was the right move.

In addition to cross-stitch supplies, Danes carries patterns and materials needed to complete silk ribbon embroidery and Hardanger embroidery projects. These include the full lines of DMC embroidery floss and Mill Hill beads.

Cross-stitch, Hardanger embroidery and silk ribbon embroidery are very old arts. She described some of the differences.

Of the three crafts, cross-stitch is the easiest to learn. It is a much more forgiving medium than the other two. Danes explained that most cross-stitch enthusiasts are self-taught like herself. That's why she does not offer classes in cross-stitch to her customers. However, instruction in both silk ribbon and Hardanger embroidery can be

arranged through her business.

"In silk ribbon embroidery you can never make a mistake," she said. She just recently began doing both silk ribbon and Hardanger embroidery when it became more popular. Examples of her work in cross-stitch as well as these two mediums hang on the wall of her business to show examples of how some of the patterns look when finished.

She carries hundreds of patterns as well as the supplies to complete the ever-changing art of embroidery.

"Embroidery today is different," Danes explained. "It's the basics expanded." She added that embellishing one's work with items such as beads, glittery filament blended with embroidery thread, and buttons is both the current style and the wave of the future.

Using embellishments for embroidery can really simplify the work. Danes illustrated this with a cross-stitch pattern she had worked on. In the corner of the piece, there was a clock. Danes happened to stitch the clock by hand, but she could have put a button shaped and textured like a clock in that very size. (She may do it yet). That action would have made the piece quicker to complete and given it a three-dimensional quality.

For those who want to start stitching but aren't sure where to start, Danes stated that she does not recommend starting a project just because it looks like it would be easy to do.

To start with a (stitching) pro-

ject, start with something that looks interesting to you to psyche yourself out," she said. "If you don't find something that really interests you, you're not going to finish it."

If you have a certain type of project you are interested in and don't see it, ask Danes. She does her best to accommodate customer requests for special orders. Framing also is available through Elly's Attic. Dan Shapiro, who does all

the custom framing for the shop, does "a very nice job."

He understands the framing needs of individual projects (extra space between the projects and the glass, etc.) and uses the appropriate materials to ensure an aesthetic appearance for years to come.

One of the nicest resources Danes offers is a book of patterns that various companies automatically send to her. Those that she does not sell and does not want to

buy can go back to the company at no cost to her. This gives her lower overhead costs which she can pass back to her customers in the form of a better price.

A nice feature of Elly's Attic is that there is a place for those who are not stitchery enthusiasts (usually the husbands of Danes' clients) to sit down and relax. She also has something for the men to look at - models of classic automobiles.

"The cars are left over from the balloon shop," Danes said. "The guys like them."

Elly's Attic is located at 112 S. Millford Road in Highland where Livingston and Millford roads intersect. Her hours are from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday; from noon to 6 p.m. Wednesday; and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday. For more information, call Danes at (810) 887-0881.

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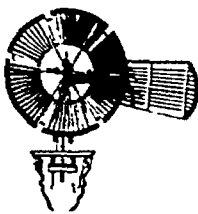
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Friendly St. Ignace a haven for visitors

St. Ignace, Michigan—

Since the 1600s, St. Ignace has attracted voyageurs exploring the Upper Peninsula and the Straits of Mackinac, and it's still doing so today.

The natural beauty of the area, the many attractions and the friendliness of the area's residents make St. Ignace a standout for vacationers. Stroll at a relaxed pace along the tree-lined brick sidewalks under the glow of Victorian style lamps. Costumed interpreters, craft demonstrations, a living history encampment, and films and music of the French colonial lifestyle of the late 1600s and early 1700s are brought to life each July during French Heritage Days.

Festival of Native American Culture - Late August, the Museum is host to a celebration of dance, arts, crafts, and culture. Story tellers,

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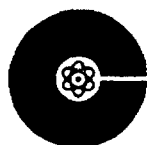

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SNOW'S SUGARBUSH

"A Group Tour Delight"

Sugarbush country is a place where generations of families have farmed for as long as they can recall, where everyone greets each other by name and where the days from February 15 through April 15 are the highlight of the year.

Maple syrup is alive and running in Michigan, as thousands of maple trees are tapped to produce approximately 85,000 gallons.

Maple farmer Ralph Snow has operated Snow's Sugarbush, 3188 Plains Road in Mason, with the help of his two sons and his daughter, for more than 30 years.

Farming maple syrup is not a luxurious job. After the farmer drills holes in the maple trees, a "spile" is inserted — allowing sap to flow freely into an attached container. Each tap will yield from 15 to 20 gallons of sap during a season, with an average sugar content of 2.5 percent. When the "run" is on, it is not unusual for farmers to spend 24 hours a day collecting and preparing the sap.

Hundreds of people, hungry for maple syrup and a good country time, travel from miles around to observe the syrup-making process. They walk through the woodlots and visit his store, restaurant and petting farm, Snow said.

"We find if you give 'em a little attention, they really love it," Snow said after two families from Brighton and Port Huron made purchases and exited his store. "It's too bad most businesses don't do that anymore."

It may be more than Snow's friendly service that keeps customers coming back.

Snow farms about 550 acres of land — some of it he owns, some of it he rents from other farmers — most of which is inhabited by the roots of his sugar maple trees.

Snow's Sugarbush offers sappy-sweet treats for a consumer's sugar craving. The store — decorated with antique memorabilia and a collection of news stories written about Snow over the years — sells maple syrup, maple candy, maple cream, maple sugar and maple gift boxes.

The restaurant, which can only operate 60 days out of the year due to township regulations, offers all-you-can-eat buttermilk pancakes, French toast, waffles and sausage. Its quaint setting hosts a number of tables sheathed with gingham printed cloth, and every one is set with a bottle of Snow's maple syrup.

The petting barn displays an array of animals: ducks, lambs, goats, hens, rabbits — and even a peacock and a donkey.

Snow, whose father, grandfather and great-grandfather were all farmers of the region, said he attempted other jobs but always came back to his family's tradition.

Beggar's Banquet, 218 Abbott Road, has been doing business with Snow's Sugarbush for at least 10 years. General Manager William Sawyer said that over the years, many diners have commented on the quality of maple syrup.

"It's the finest brand, it's homemade and it's made in Michigan as well... The quality is excellent—it's not at all watered down—and we don't like substitutes," Sawyer said.

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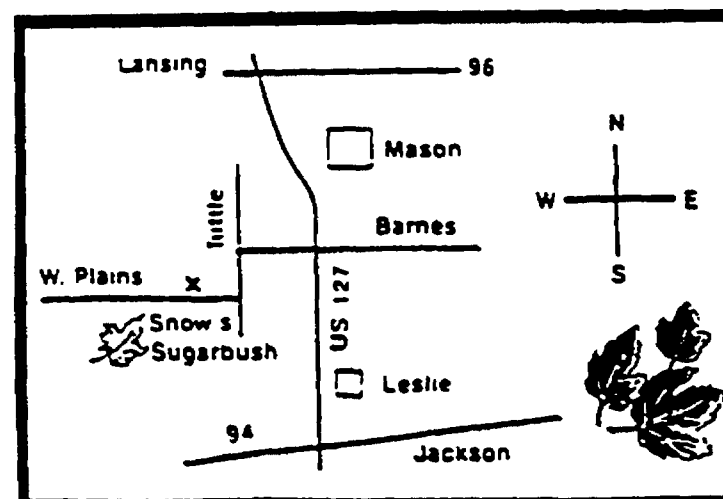
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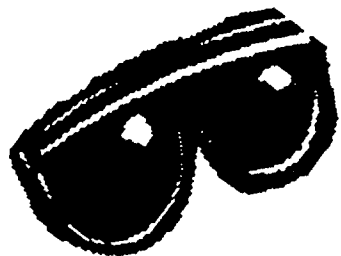
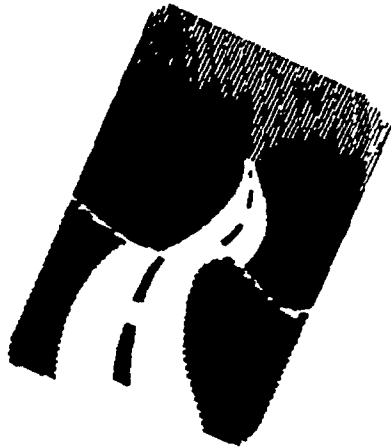
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Vacation roads meet in Jackson

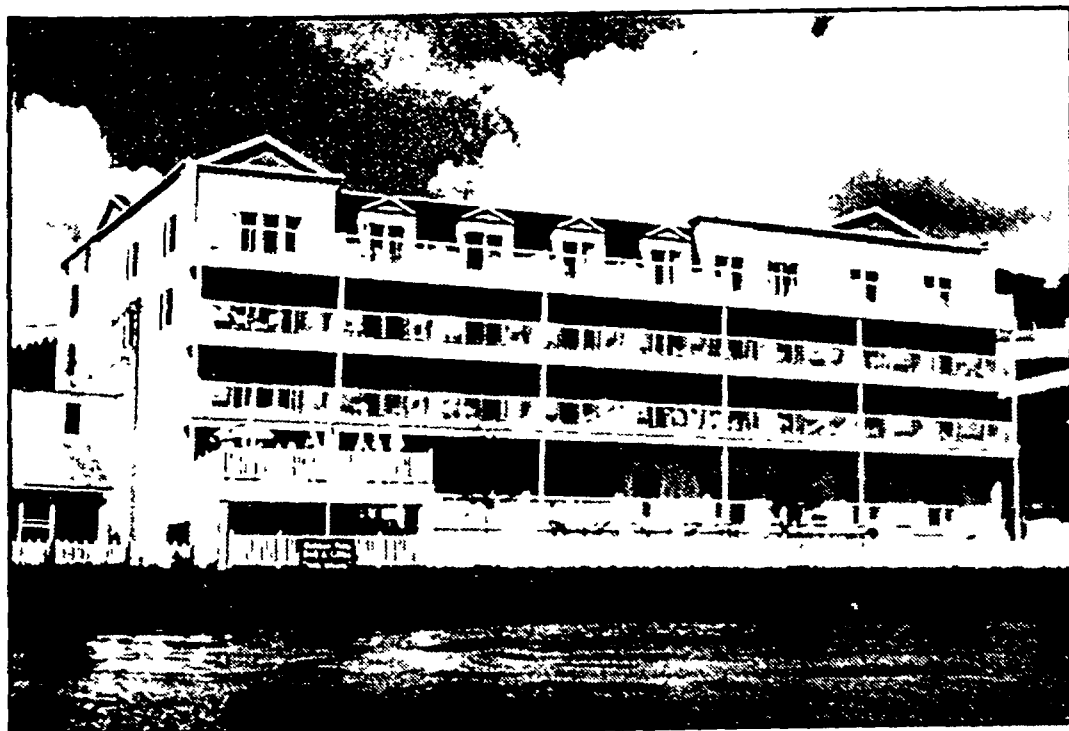

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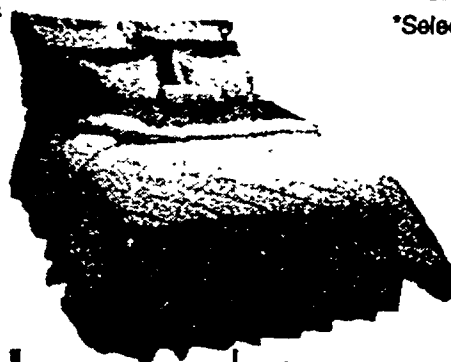
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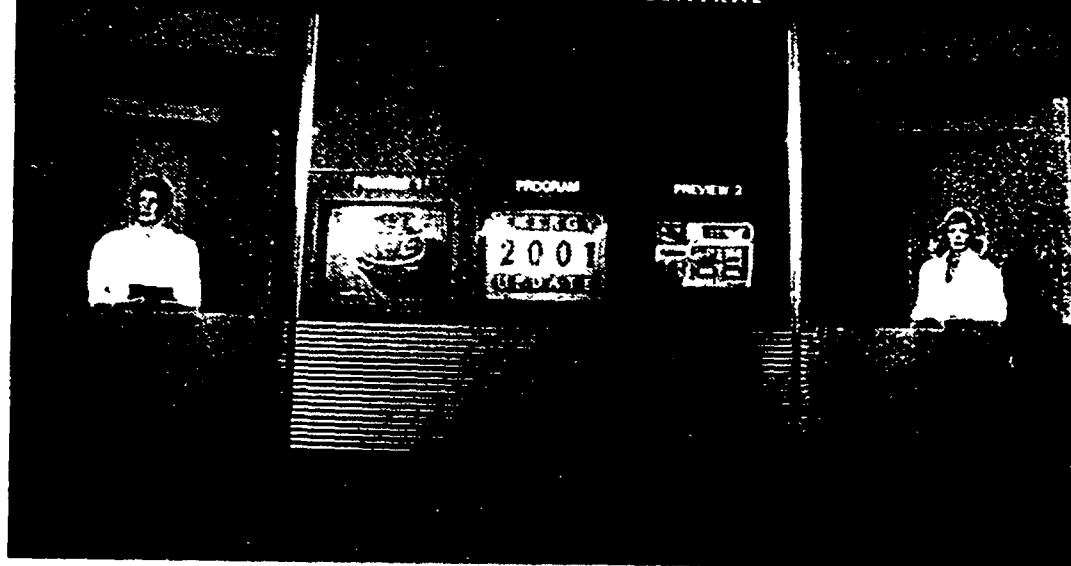

Humanoids get star billing at Cook Energy education show

Bridgman, Michigan—

"We've worked to make them very human, but their show is popular precisely because Jared and Velva aren't human. They're different and unique in this area."

That's Eustace Smarrella's view of the humanoid news anchors, Velva and Jared, who deliver a fast-paced broadcast tour of America's energy future in Cook Energy Information Center's new "Energy 2001". Smarrella is Manager of the Cook Center located in Bridgman, Michigan.

"The newscast is an entertaining way to help people understand and be more aware of our important energy resources," explains Smarrella. "The entire presentation - lights, video monitors, cameras, even views of the actual audience as they visit — makes the learning fun, and therefore, more memorable."

Set in Theatre I's television station in the year 2001, the news anchors explain how important renewable energy resources are to the earth's preservation in this new century. In news clips from "contributing roving humanoid reporters", visitors learn how energy is supplied in 2001 to homes and businesses.

The two humanoid stars were manufactured by Mannetron Corporation of Battle Creek. Their movements and voices are logged into a computer's digital memory, which also coordinates the TV set lighting, sound and video. The result is a smooth, approximately human TV performance.

To humanize Jared and Velva further, people at Cook Center have created complete, autographed biographies for their electronic stars.

For example, Velva enjoys light rock (Electric Light Orchestra), is married and has two sons, Atom and Chip. Jared, on the other hand, is on the singles circuit and dreams of doing color commentary for the San Diego Chargers.

From Jared and Velva's newscast, the energy lesson moves on to Cook Center's Theatre II — a high-tech model of the adjoining Cook Nuclear Plant which uses light animation, mechanical movement, and sound to show how nuclear energy is produced.

Next, Theatre III's Vistascope wide-screen film takes you on a helicopter ride along Lake Michigan and then down into the nuclear plant to witness the unique refueling process. A 'copter ride along the lines traces the electric power to the very wall switch you use every day.

Cook Center's energy education tour is then completed with a series of hands-on video games, touch-screen computers, video monitors, displays, and a panoramic view of the actual Cook Plant.

The Cook Center also offers a variety of art shows - held one or two weekends every month throughout the year - featuring outstanding local and regional artists, as well as other community interest programs and exhibits on most weekends.

The Cook Energy Information Center is located in Bridgman, Michigan, off I-94 (Exit 16) and is open from mid-January through mid-December, Tuesdays through Sundays, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tour buses and school groups are welcome, and there is a picnic area and indoor snack bar for dining.

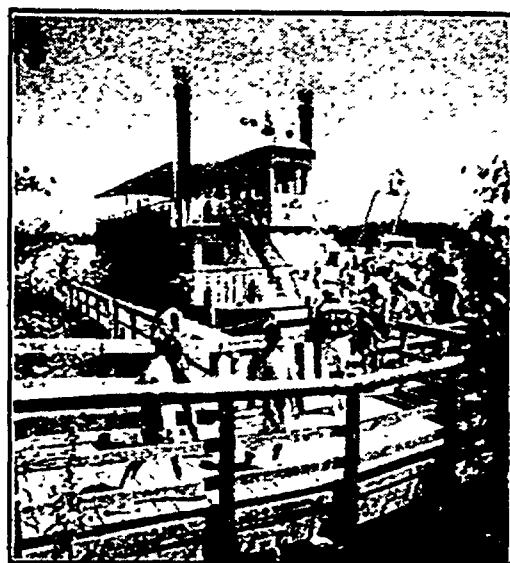

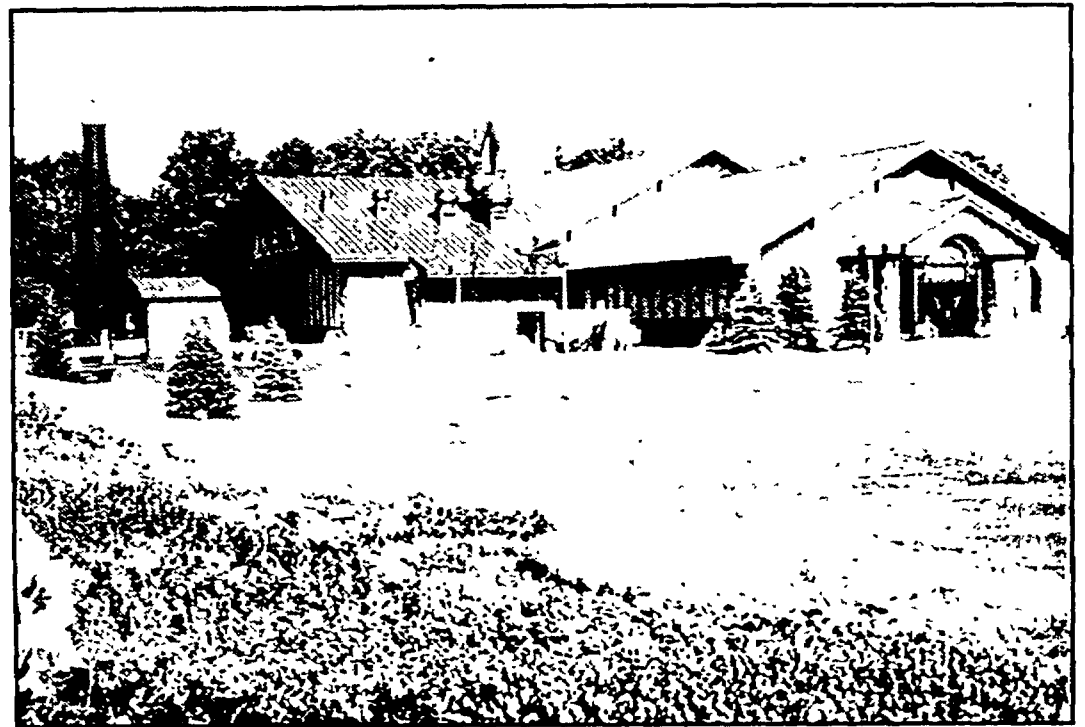

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Music House celebrates old tunes, good times

Acme, Michigan—

Rowdy cowboys, frontier lawmen stalk streets at Stagecoach Stop

Onsted, Michigan—

A visit to Stagecoach Stop USA in Irish Hills, Michigan, is like stepping back into the good old days of frontier living, where everything you need could be found along the boardwalk on Main Street.

Stagecoach Stop lives up to its reputation as one of Michigan's most visited attractions, rated a Diamond Star attraction by AAA. Over 100,000 guests visit each year to be entertained and to learn about life in the days of the frontier.

Casino expansion attracts world-class entertainers

Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan—

A \$30 million expansion currently underway at Michigan's largest casino in Sault Ste. Marie will add 316,000 square feet by year's end, including a thousand-seat entertainment and bingo hall, convention center, restaurants and 250 additional hotel rooms.

One of five gaming centers owned by the Sault Ste. Marie tribe of Chippewa Indians, the Kewadin Casino in the Sault is already the number one vacation and group tour destination in the state, attracting over two and a half million visitors last year. This most recent expansion includes an entertainment venue large enough to allow booking of world-class entertainment, and grand opening act negotiations have included discussions with agents for entertainers such as Bob Seger and Alan Jackson.

Even as this huge building project is underway, construction continues just two blocks away at an all-new tribal-owned 1,300 seat ice arena, also scheduled for completion in 1996. This new sports facility will serve as a home for another recent tribal acquisition, the "Soo Indians", a

Junior "A" hockey team which has been playing in temporary locations since September of last year.

Meantime, the Sault Ste. Marie tribe of Chippewa Indians has just completed the purchase of two existing hotels in Mackinaw City and Toronto, to be named Kewadin Inn Mackinaw City and Kewadin Inn Aurelia.

The expansion at the Sault Ste. Marie Kewadin Casino adds four floors to the existing two-story Clarion Hotel and brings the total number of guest rooms to 300, including ten corporate suites. Views of the St. Mary's River and Canada will be possible from a roof-top observation deck and upper floor hotel rooms.

Convention facilities include two meeting rooms for seating up to 700 persons with state-of-the-art audio, video, teleconferencing and computer technology. In addition to the 16,000 square foot concert and bingo hall, a separate 5,000 square foot nightclub is also being added.

A two-story enclosed "street" will connect the two new structures and feature cafes, street vendors, landscaping and water features. A

swimming pool and spa, saunas, exercise facilities, lounge shops, beauty salon and complete in-house laundry are also being added, along with expanded parking and shuttle service.

Nearly four million customers visited Kewadin Casinos' five gaming locations in Sault Ste. Marie, St. Ignace, Christmas, Hessel and Manistique in 1995. The live entertainment line-up at the Sault facility has served as one of the most popular attractions and included

performers such as Waylon Jennings, Tammy Wynette and Eddie Rabbitt. Upcoming acts include Boxcar Willie March 7 - 9, and Dan Seals April 17-19.

Tribal casino revenues have paid for the construction of a \$7.5 million outpatient health clinic in the Sault, supported the local Bahweting Anishnabe School, and funded the purchase of a Pontiac plastics company.
