State police post ready to dim the lights?

Authorities say they're heeding complaints about new tower

It looks like the Michigan State Police are willing to compromise when it comes to the lights on their new Northville radio

tower

Meanwhile, one local man is working hard to make sure that they do and Daniel Biedzen, a resident of the Park Place Apartments near Eight Mile and

Griswold is looking for help. He wants Northville residents to make their voices heard, a gesture of community strength that he hopes will convince the state to make changes in the tower's controversial lighting system.

"I moved in there because I loved the view," Biedzen said, adding that the windows of his home directly face the 400-foot high tower located at the State Police post on Seven Mile Road.

Now I've got those bluish white lights

blinking on and off all night long. It just fills up the whole horizon."

The tower is the second of 181 planned across Michigan, the backbone of a microwave radio communications system for use by troopers and other state workers. The lights on it have been active since Feb. 16 and have been cause for many a complaint since then by residents living as far away as Six Mile Road.

Biedzen is just one of several people, some of them township officials, who have

been exploring what could be done about getting the lights to be less obtrusive. Judging from the comments made Tuesday by the man who is overseeing the entire tower project, their efforts just might pay off.

"We're leaning very strongly in that direction," civilian State Police employee Harry Warner said of the possibility that a system of less noticeable red beacon lights will take the place of the white strobes at

Electronic snags delay mailing of tax notices

The best laid plans of mice and men can still go awry if your hard drive hardly works.

Just ask the folks in the Northville Township tax assessing department.

Computer glitches have kept thousands of township property owners from getting their tax assessments in the mail. The problem's been handled, however, and the notices should be going out this week. To make sure no one feels slighted, the township board of assessment review has added an extra meeting date to handle any latecomers.

The board began meeting Tuesday and will meet on the following

days and times:

- Saturday, March 9, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Hearings on this date will be on a walk-in basis; no appointment is necessary.

- Monday, March 11, and Tuesday, March 12, from 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. Hearings will be held by appointment. To make an appointment, call the assessing office from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at 348-5800.

- The new meeting date is Saturday, March 23. Hearings will be held on a walk-in basis from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

- You can also drop off a written appeal at Township Hall in a specially marked drop box or mail it, postmarked by March 23 to the board of assessment review, 41600

Six Mile Road, Northville 48167.

In case you don't know the property assessment is the basis by which your property taxes are calculated. There are two basic ways to convince the board that your assessment should be changed: (a) prove that a factual error's been made or (b) prove that your home's true cash value is different from what the assessor says it is.

The factual error method is pretty straightforward. You can review the assessor's field sheet for your property (on file at Township Hall) and see if someone's made a mistake. That could include anything from faulty arithmetic to listing something that isn't there.

HOW TO APPEAL

To contest your tax bill you must demonstrate:

- ✓ That a factual error was made on your field sheet; or
- ✓ That your property's fair market value is less than it was assessed at.

To contest your assessment, present written documents that establish the cash value of your property, such as:

- ✓ The deed to your home, listing the price you paid for it; or
- ✓ Written figures from a realtor on what comparable nearby homes have sold for.

Trustees rebuff county land plan

When it comes to Wayne County's development plan for its land in Northville Township, "as is" just isn't good enough for the township board of trustees.

Though they differ about the reasons why, members of the board were united on one thing when they reviewed the county proposal for the 900 acres the county owns between Five and Six Mile and Beck Road and Hines Drive. That one thing is that the proposal has to change.

"Frankly, I'm insulted by this plan," was the way Clerk Sue Hillebrand put it. "This is not acceptable."

County and township officials are playing their cards close to their vests these days, keeping a public lid on the specifics of the plan until it's presented at a spe-

cial board meeting on March 28. The trustees Feb. 29 study session focused on the trustees' reactions to what they've seen in private and what they want to see come March 28.

Essentially, the board suggested that Wayne County modify the concept development proposal to better fit the trustees' vision of the kind of community they want Northville Township to become. Their "wish list" for the property includes

City officials approve drug testing program

Department of Public Works employees who are required to have a commercial drivers license and bus drivers for the senior center will be required to submit to drug and alcohol testing according to a new city policy.

The Northville City Council formally approved the new policy Monday as part of a compliance requirement by the Department of Transportation and the Omnibus Transportation Employee Testing Act of 1991.

City Manager Gary Word said that under the new requirement local governments are required to

conduct alcohol and controlled substances testing in several instances that include:

- Pre-employment testing - Word said that the city will require testing of new employees in positions requiring a commercial drivers license (CDL). The requirement applies to both new employees and current covered employees who transfer to a position requiring a CDL, he explained.

- Reasonable suspicion testing - The city is required to test employees for alcohol or controlled substances when there is a reasonable suspicion that the employee has violated the rules. Word said that a

Committee puts out call for playscape volunteers

A newly formed committee, charged with the planning and construction of a new playscape development project, is seeking volunteers to begin fund-raising and planning efforts.

According to Cindy Buckley, publicity chairman for the Playscape Development Committee, several volunteers will be needed within the upcoming months, as the committee begins the first phase of the development process.

"We're looking for people to volunteer some time helping the committee contact local businesses, raising funds, and other important activities," Buckley said. "We're

just getting started and the more volunteers helping the better."

The Northville City Council gave the green light in January to a Parks and Recreation Commission recommendation for a playscape development project at Ford Park.

Council members unanimously approved preliminary authorization for the development of playscape projects.

Children in the community will be invited to participate in the planning phase of the project, and the community will conduct fund-raisers to obtain construction funds, according to Parks and Recreation Director Traci Sincok. The playscape is then constructed by community volunteers super-

Economic summit on tap for spring

Session aimed at providing shot in arm for downtown

The Northville City Council has approved the scheduling of an economic summit in April to rejuvenate the city's downtown area.

The city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA) submitted a proposal to the city council recommending Northville enlist the services of Virginia-based consulting firm HyettPalma to conduct an economic summit focusing on Northville's downtown.

The city council approved the measure Monday.

City Councilman Chuck Keys said that the summit is a good idea and reminded city officials that it will only be the "first step" toward rejuvenating the downtown.

"We also need to remember that it's important to communicate with all of the businesses in the downtown area," Keys said. "We need to keep them informed, not only with the economic summit, but with the other activities of the DDA."

HyettPalma specializes in community economic enhancement, according to City Manager Gary Word, and has worked extensively within the state in helping communities breathe new life into downtown areas.

The DDA's proposal calls for the economic summit to take place April 2.

Community leaders, merchants, businesses, and city officials will take part in the three-to-four hour program.

The focus of the summit will be bringing downtown Northville into the future.

The cost of the summit would be approximately \$2,500, according to Word.

That figure doesn't include travel and lodging costs, but Northville could take advantage of splitting a portion of the cost with several area communities which are planning economic summits of their own.

The summit, according to city officials, will serve to generate more enthusiasm and involvement from downtown stakeholders.

people whose livelihoods are tied to the economic viability of the central business district.

"We need to develop a specific economic plan that addresses the needs of our downtown, and I think that an economic summit would be a good place for the city and merchants to start," said Northville Mayor Chris Johnson. "But we don't just stop there, we need to follow through with what has been started."

City councilman Tom Swigart said it's time for Northville to begin to plan the future of its downtown area.

"If we're not planning ahead we're going to get buried by the other communities in our area," Swigart said, adding that "this summit is a good positive first step, in what could be a lengthy process."

City Councilman Mark Cryderman agreed.

"All you have to do is look at communities like Plymouth and Novi. Both are developing downtown areas that are similar to ours," he said. "They are not waiting around for something to happen, they are making it happen themselves."

Word said HyettPalma is quite familiar with Northville, and studied the community extensively when they were contracted by Plymouth to help them develop an economic plan.

"They are quite knowledgeable about our downtown area, and we will provide them with plenty of information so that they will be able to provide us with viable options," he said.

Representatives from the consulting firm will be making visits to Northville to meet with city officials before the economic summit, Word added.

Mayor Pro Tem Carolann Ayers agreed with the summit idea, but hoped city officials did not already have an end vision to what takes place downtown. "I would hope that the end of this process has not already been decided," she said.

"(Councilmembers) want to make sure that we're not just rushing into this, that there has been plenty of forethought that has gone into the process so far," Word said.

"We're just taking the first couple of steps in the process and we'll continue to gather information and input as we go."

Cleanup measure finally passed by Legislature

House leaders needed a week to round up the votes, but in the end won a 71-37 victory for Sen. Loren Bennett's pollution cleanup bill. The House then sent SB 728 back to the Senate for routine concurrence in an amendment.

Three opponents summed up the reasons for the long controversy.

"It's like pulling the State Police off the highways and allowing speeders to write their own tickets," said Rep. Eileen DeHart, D-Westland, who voted no.

"This legislation would allow units of government to exempt themselves from public scrutiny (under the Freedom of Information Act) if they pollute, whether that action is accidental or deliberate," said Rep. Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills, also a no vote.

"The bill would provide polluting companies new rights both to keep information about pollution confidential and for immunity from penalties for violating environmental laws," said the Sierra Club, which lobbied against it.

Other opponents were the Michigan Prosecuting Attorneys' Association, Attorney General Frank Kelley, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Attorney.

Bennett, R-Canton, was strongly supported by the Michigan Chamber of Commerce. Neither discussed the secrecy portion of the act, either as it applied to business or local government.

As Bennett, chair of the Senate Natural Resources Committee, described it, SB 728 would

encourage businesses to conduct their own environmental tests and cleanups without "coercion" from government. Businesses would be immune from prosecution if cleanups are prompt and efficient.

Bennett said state and federal authorities lack manpower to police polluters. Currently, companies reporting spills are fined. He called opponents "extremists" who "misrepresented" the bill.

Local representatives Willis Bullard, R-Milford, and Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, both voted yes.

Defective car, defective driver

A man stopped by Northville Township early Monday morning for having no tail lights turned out not to have a valid drivers' license either.

The one thing he did have, however, was a warrant out for his arrest.

Township officers said they stopped the man's 1984 Ford Bronco in the parking lot of the Hampton Inn after noting that the car's tail lights weren't working. A computer check revealed a warrant for the 25-year-old Utica resident's arrest for failing to appear in court on an Auburn Hills reckless driving charge.

Also noted was the fact that the man's license has been suspended four times, the last suspension still current. He was arrested and held without bond until Auburn Hills police picked him up.

SUSPENDED LICENSE: A 47-year-old South Lyon man was arrested for driving with a suspended license Feb. 28.

The man was initially stopped by police for having defective equipment on his automobile. A computer check turned up an outstanding Oakland County warrant, and officers immediately placed the man under arrest.

He was transported to the Northville Police Station and was held on \$180 bond.

FAMILY JEWELS GONE: A Northville Township woman divorcing her husband told police that he stole her jewelry.

The woman, 45, said that \$4,489 worth of jewelry was taken from her home sometime in February. She believes her husband, 51, is responsible.

LICENSE PLATE THEFT: An employee at McDonald Ford reported the theft of a dealer license plate, Feb. 29.

According to the police report, the plate was initially missing more than two weeks ago, and was sighted last week by Detroit Police on a pickup that was involved in a illegal dumping complaint.

DRUNK DRIVER: Northville Township police arrested a Novi man for driving while intoxicated one week ago.

The reporting officer in the case said he saw the man's 1993 Eagle Vision weaving and crossing traffic

lanes while eastbound on Seven Mile near Haggerty. The man, 37, allegedly admitted to having a few drinks" after being stopped. Breath testing later at police headquarters showed him to have a blood alcohol level of 14 percent, police said.

He was held until he sobered up and then was released on bond and faces a court hearing soon.

ESPRESSO MAKER STOLEN: A 15 cup Espresso machine was reported missing from the Kitchen Witch, 134 E. Main, Feb. 29.

An employee reported that she noticed the machine missing when she arrived at work, and after questioning other employees reported the incident to police.

No suspect or leads have been identified in the theft. The machine was estimated at \$600.

TOOLS TAKEN: Someone broke into a construction trailer on Legend Road during the night of Feb. 27-28, stealing \$650 worth of tools. Damage in the amount of \$50 was done to the trailer door.

HUBCAP HEIST: A 63-year-old Northville man reported his hubcaps stolen March 1.

According to Northville police, the man had parked his car on Church Street at about 10 a.m. and when he returned about one hour later he noticed the hubcaps on the passenger side of his 1987 Cadillac were missing.

The hubcaps are estimated to cost \$280.

COURT NO-SHOW ARRESTED: A South Lyon man who "forgot" to show up in court for a hearing on charges of driving with a suspended license and improper plates was the guest of township police on Sunday afternoon.

South Lyon police arrested the man in their community after learning of the warrants arising out of a township incident. The man was turned over to township officers, then booked at police headquarters. He posted bond and was released with a new court date of March 18.

Attendant thwarts would-be robbery

A gas station attendant who's been through it before had the last laugh on a would-be armed robber one week ago.

Northville Township police are looking for the man who tried to rob the Sunoco service station at Five Mile and Haggerty roads at about 12:30 a.m. on March 1. His method was remarkably similar to the Nov. 5, 1995, heist at the station of which Dearborn Heights resident Terry Lee Clinton is

accused.

The robber's target was the same as Clinton's as well: a 61-year-old man working the graveyard shift. He told police that a white male about 30-35 years old came in, went to the cooler at the back and brought a bottle of pop up to the counter.

He is described as roughly 5 feet 10 inches tall with short reddish brown hair and beard stubble. The suspect was wearing glasses, a bright blue baseball cap with a white insignia and a darker blue

jacket with a white insignia at the time of the robbery.

He gave the attendant some money, township Detective Fred Yankee said, and then put a hand inside his jacket pocket as the man opened up the cash register.

"This is a hold up," put the money on the table, the man said.

At that point, according to Yankee, the attendant slammed the cash drawer shut and said he wasn't going to give the man any money.

"At that point, the man said I

was only joking and left the area on foot," Yankee said. "He did leave the money for his pop behind."

The attendant saw no vehicles in the vicinity before or after the theft and police found nothing when they checked the area. If they do find him, however, the offense he could be charged with is no joke: a felony that carries a multi-year prison term.

New city enforcement officer kept occupied

Since coming to work as the new code enforcement officer late last year, Rick Starling has been an extremely busy man.

Starling, who was hired by the city in late November, has had plenty of work to do because Northville had gone a few years without a full-time code enforcement officer.

"I've certainly been busy these first few months, but it's been an enjoyable experience," said Starling, who provided the same ser-

vices in Taylor and Oak Park before joining Northville's city staff.

"There was a lot of work to be done, but we're pretty close to being caught up."

According to City Manager Gary Word, Starling's first few months have been spent becoming familiar with the community and bringing code enforcement issues up to date.

Starling, who has plenty of construction experience and is a registered code official and inspector, is licensed in residential building

and is a journeyman member of the AFL-CIO Rough Carpentry Union.

Starling officially began his code enforcement work Nov. 20, and his easy going demeanor and hard work ethic have not gone unnoticed by city staff and council members.

"I've heard nothing but good things about Rick," said City Councilman Chuck Keys. "He's a professional and I think that those people who have dealt with him would tell you that he's extremely fair."

"There was a lot of work for him to catch up on," Keys added. "We've gone without a full-time code enforcement officer for a couple years now, so he had his work cut out for him when he started."

Starling said that he will carry through with the council's goal of compliance with codes and ordinances.

"We're really pushing the compliance issues and my basic message to people has been I'll deal with you straight if you deal with me straight."

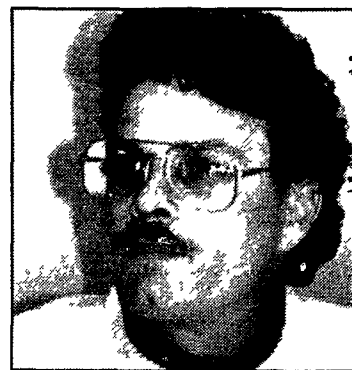
"Even though the community's

Tax-free zones gain support

Republicans gave party-line support to Gov. John Engler's "renaissance zone" bill when Democrats tried to tack on too many amendments in the House Urban Policy Committee.

"I'll have some floor amendments," said Chairman Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills, after his panel gave the key bill 4-3 party-line support on Feb. 28. He was confident he can woo enough Democrats to make up for soft GOP support of the plan to revitalize old cities.

The Engler-GOP approach is to cut the state income tax, property taxes, single business tax and city income tax to zero in depressed zones of such older cities as Detroit, Pontiac, Flint, Saginaw and Benton Harbor.

Democrats take a holistic approach, arguing low taxes alone aren't a magic wand and cities will lose too much revenue. Rep. Michael Hanley, D-Saginaw, offered an amendment to use Michigan Strategic Fund money for land assembly, infrastructure redevelopment, cleanup of toxic sites and public safety.

Kaza said Hanley's final point - improving public safety - had merit, but that Hanley was asking too much money for it.

Kaza and some in the Republican caucus have objected because renaissance zones could become a tax haven for millionaires. He has promised to plug that loophole.

Rep. William Bryant, R-Grosse Pointe, accused Democrats of taking a party-line approach. "We did address their concerns and it wasn't enough. I get the feeling it will never be enough," Bryant said.

"The Democrats don't want to give John Engler a renaissance zone bill. They don't want the bill, but they don't want to say that. The renaissance zone concept says, 'We've tried pouring public money into cities. Why don't we try something simpler - tax-free zones - and allow the market to create (economic recovery) rather than the bureaucracy?'" Bryant said.

Republicans said they and Engler cooperated with enabling legislation on Democratic President Bill Clinton's "empowerment zone" designation for Detroit, but now Democrats don't want to give the GOP's renaissance zones a chance.

The Senate has approved the renaissance zone bills sponsored by majority leader Dick Posthumus, R-Alto. One bill is in Kaza's committee; others are in the House Taxation Committee chaired by Willis Bullard, R-Milford.

If they are enacted, cities, villages, townships and counties could apply for RZ designations for up to 5,000 acres (7.8 square miles), supplying a plan for redevelopment.

A state panel would approve, modify or reject the designated zones. The panel would include the state budget director, state treasurer and state Jobs Commission director or their designees. The state is limited to a total of eight RZ designations which would last for 15 years. RZ boundaries could not be altered during that time. The state would reimburse school districts, intermediate districts and community colleges for lost revenue.

Border's dried out after springing leak

Water, water, everywhere ... at least that's what the customers and employees at Border's Books and Music were thinking Sunday night when the overhead sprinkler system lines burst and rained down on books, tapes and people.

"It happened around 8 p.m.," said Leslie Boughton, community relations coordinator for Border's. "There was a frozen pipe in the sprinkler system, it burst and water came down through the light fixtures. It also caused the sprinkler system to go off."

Apparently, this is not an unusual situation, according to Novi Fire Chief Art Lenaghan.

"This has happened before in other businesses. The sprinkler system is above the drop ceiling and, of course, that area is not heated except for what heat will naturally rise," he explained. "We shut down the circuits and shut off water and started cleaning up the mess."

Most of the water poured down to the front portion of the store including directly over the entrance. A few tables of books and books-on-tapes were damaged by the water and promptly moved out of the way.

Those items that were damaged by the water will, in fact, be placed

on sale sometime in the near future, Boughton said.

Customers who were in the store at the time were asked to leave by the emergency exit.

After the fire department left, various Borders' employees stayed behind in an effort to clean up the mess, some until 12:30 a.m. Many of those employees returned as early as 6 a.m. on Monday morning to clean again. The store opened as usual at 9 a.m. on Monday morning.

"The pipes are fixed and the sprinkler system is functioning fully again," Boughton said. "We're literally in the dark, however, in some parts of the store. The light fixtures down the middle are still off and we can't turn those back on until everything has completely dried."

Borders management had special words for employees who helped set things right.

"Border's is so pleased with the staff that devoted so much time and effort to helping out; there are so many of them - Jennifer Roberts, Alex Tuszynski, Jill Davis, Jeremy Reed, Kerry McDonald, Todd Marsh and Rick Caudill, just to name a few," Boughton said. "We'd really like to thank a customer who was in the store on Sunday who knew a lot about sprinkler systems."

A key state representative has given up on trial court reform - at least until the Senate takes a crack at it.

"I'll wait and see what the Senate does. They said they could pump it out in a week," said Rep. Michael Nye, R-Litchfield, chair of the House Judiciary Committee and sponsor of three pieces of legislation that could unify Michigan's trial courts into a single court of justice.

"The Democrats won't put up the votes unless (Detroit) Recorder's Court is intact. But that's not court reform," Nye said in an interview Feb. 28, the day after he announced his frustration to the House leadership.

His legislation has been sitting on the House calendar for weeks after coming out of his committee, but he lacks the votes to move it. The GOP's 56-54 majority in the House isn't enough to pass the proposal.

A key step involves proposing a constitutional amendment to voters, and a two-thirds vote is required to put it on the Nov. 5 ballot.

"It simply broke down," agreed Rep. James Ryan, R-Redford, a committee member. "Mike Nye said 'I've had enough.' We were trying to come up with a floor substitute."

Meanwhile, Rep. Deborah Whyman, R-Canton, has hopes Nye's panel will take up her simpler bill to combine Detroit Recorder's with Wayne Circuit Court, in effect elevating the Detroit judges. Courts in the other 82 counties would be unaffected.

REFORM OBSTACLES

Ryan said Nye's package faced these obstacles:

- Recorder's Court. Of 1,775 units of local government in Michigan, only Detroit has its own criminal court, moreover it has handled out-county cases - a major irritation to suburbanites. In the other 82 counties a circuit court tries criminal matters and major civil cases within a county. Detroit politicians view any attempt to combine Recorder's Court as racist; they won't even consider a name change.

- Employees. Some court employees work for counties, others for cities, others for townships. They also belong to various unions.

- Administration. Some judges want to do the hiring and union negotiating, county officials think general government can handle those chores, and judges should stick to judging.

- Judicial conflicts. Circuit judges have been adamant that they don't want probate judges elevated to their level.

"Circuit judges have fought this tooth and nail," said Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, another member of the House Judiciary Committee.

As a suburbanite, Law likes the idea of combining circuit, probate and district courts - a kind of one-stop shopping. "Attorneys have to charge clients two hours driving time to file papers downtown," said Law.

A single trial court has been discussed by lawyers for a long time, but Gov. John Engler's budgets are bringing matters to a head. He has threatened to veto the creation

of new judgeships until lawmakers come up with more efficient methods of deploying judges - between kinds of cases and between geographic boundaries.

Engler's position hits hardest in the growth areas of Wayne and Oakland Counties and, to some extent, in Washtenaw County.

NYE'S PLAN

Lawmakers and lawyers have many variations on the reform theme. Here is Nye's plan:

- A single Court of Justice in each county with three divisions - 1) family (divorces with children, adoption, juvenile matters, abuse, paternity, etc.); 2) circuit (major civil suits, divorces without children, criminal cases, foreclosures); and 3) district (small claims, landlord-tenant cases, misdemeanors, pre-trial exams).

Detroit would be one court unit; suburban Wayne County would be a second unit. Elsewhere, each county would be a unit.

- A 1-cent increase in the sales tax, and elimination of the fuel tax. Of the new \$1.1 billion, 93 percent would go for roads, 5 percent for libraries; and 2 percent for secondary road patrols and justice training. The general effect would be to increase road money by half.

His complex financial measure met such widespread opposition

that it's considered dead. Nye said it probably will be sent back to committee.

House Joint Resolution S was a constitutional amendment to remove the need for a probate court in every county. HJR T was the sales tax measure. House Bill 5158 was the bill that implemented all the changes.

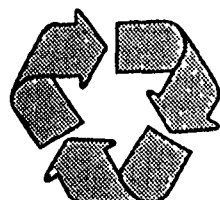
SENATE PLAN

In the Senate, Judiciary Chair William VanRegenmorter, R-Jenison, has a plan that's closer to Chief Justice James Brickley's views. There would be "a two-level trial court, similar to the existing circuit and district courts ... uniform statewide. Wayne County would no longer have a (different) system," he said in a Michigan Bar Journal article.

"The Recorder's Court for the City of Detroit would be abolished - it would become part of the criminal division of the new Wayne County Circuit Court. The probate court would be abolished. Its jurisdiction would be divided between the new circuit and district courts."

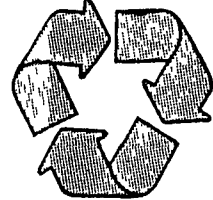
VanRegenmorter's circuit court would have three divisions - family, criminal and civil. "The chief judge of each circuit would have authority to re-assign cases within the circuit's trial court system."

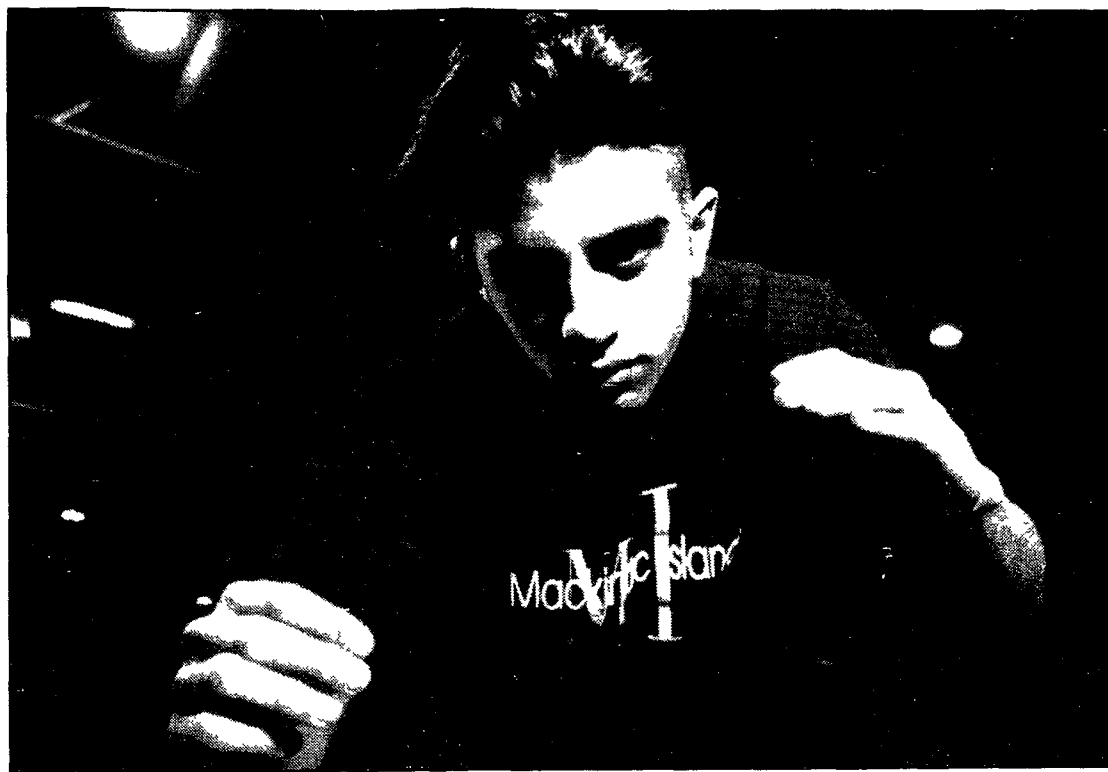

City News Briefs

MORE POLICE HIRES: The Northville Police Department will be adding one uniformed officer to its ranks sometime within the next few weeks.

The City Council approved a request by the department to hire a temporary police officer - until July 1 - with city officials reviewing the continuation of the position for the next fiscal year.

According to Police Chief Rod Cannon the additional officer is needed because of new racetrack legislation that will allow Northville Downs to be open year-round.

"The simulcasting program has overtaken the department's ability to provide the necessary police service to Northville Downs," Cannon explained.

The city must provide police service to the track if revenue is received from the track, according to the state Racing Commission.

In addition, Cannon said that the current police contract requires a third officer to be on patrol when the track is in operation. The additional 245 simulcast days requires 2.8 officers to fill the detail, as compared to 1.7 officers under the old 120 day program. Cannon explained.

"Currently the department, in an effort to provide service to the track, has assigned the detective and administrative personnel to

patrol duty," Cannon said. "The elimination of the investigative and administrative function, along with excessive overtime, is seriously hampering the department's operation."

Cannon said the cost of hiring the new officer for the remainder of the fiscal year will be \$8,274.

TRAFFIC STUDY APPROVED: The city council approved a 60 day traffic study for Larry Drive and Jeffrey Street that could result in the implementation of a three-way traffic stop.

Concerned citizens living on the two streets approached the city council to request the study. According to resident Russ Dore, there is more traffic on the streets because many drivers use the route to access new subdivisions on the west side of Taft Road.

Dore told council members that he was concerned for the safety of children and residents along the thoroughfare. The corner represents a school crossing where children walk on their way to Amerman Elementary School, as well as Cooke Middle School and Northville High School.

The open stretch of Jeffrey Street - from Sherr Lane to the corner of S. Ely - has also become a "speedway challenge," according to Dore. "There have been numerous times

when we hear a car bottom out as they take the S. Ely corner," he said.

"Many new families have moved into this subdivision recently and truly fear for their young children's safety because of the unchecked speeding," Dore added.

The council unanimously authorized city staff to conduct a traffic study of the area. According to City Manager Gary Word the study will be done in house, or would be performed by the Oakland County Traffic Improvement Association at no cost to the city.

FUNDS EARMARKED FOR RENOVATION: Northville city officials will be using \$72,000 in Wayne County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to renovate the city municipal building.

The city council approved staff's recommendation to use the money to construct modifications to the municipal building that will allow the city to become compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

According to City Manager Gary Word the modifications include installation of an elevator allowing access between floors to physically challenged individuals along with the modification of restroom facilities, drinking fountains, and doorways.

Library workers to take union vote

Is a union in store for the staff of the Northville District Library? A special vote to be held on Monday will tell the tale.

Twelve library employees will cast ballots in the March 11 election, held at the library under the auspices of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC).

At issue is whether two groups - librarians and clerical workers - each want to form a collective bargaining unit in alliance with the American Federation of State, Municipal and County Employees (AFSCME).

Should the vote be for the union in either case, AFSCME would then begin negotiations with the district library board of trustees on a labor contract.

Why the vote? Library employees declined to comment. The AFSCME representative who has been assisting staffers since August in petitioning MERC for the election did, however. Dennis Nauss chalked the vote up to uneasiness in the face of changes that have come about since the district library's birth two years ago.

"They want to see their rights protected," Nauss said. "They're basically at-will employees right now and that type of situation can create some anxious feelings."

That worry, Nauss emphasized, was more over what could happen

than what is happening: in other words, the library board and the employees groups are not having a significant problem at the moment.

"I think this (vote) is more to protect them against the possibilities that are out there than any reality right now," Nauss said.

Key concerns to library workers, according to the union official, include their number of working hours, wage levels and benefit packages, including changes in health care coverage since the district library became its own entity independent of the city and township in 1994.

Board President Bill Brown said the trustees realize that "transition issues" related to the change are of concern to the library employees but added that "we think we're doing well in addressing those issues."

The ballots will be tallied at the library shortly after all votes are taken and the results announced there.

If the vote for either or both of the two units is in favor of unionization, Nauss said that the MERC will then formally certify each one as a bargaining unit and certify AFSCME as their representative in contract talks.

Those talks will likely take a few weeks to set up, Nauss said. How long it takes to reach a deal "depends on both of the parties involved," he said. "It could take weeks or months."

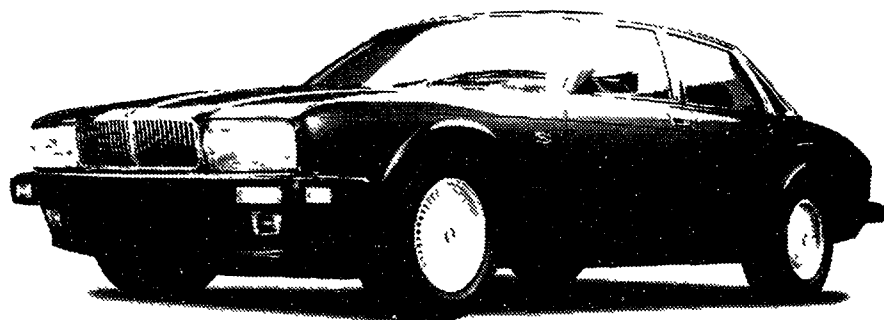

Caring resident uses literacy to cut crime

If judges and police hope to combat crime by attacking illiteracy among offenders, they'll need the help of a lot of volunteers to offer one-on-one tutoring.

That's where Northville resident Laurel Johnson comes in. As the volunteer director of Reading to Reduce Recidivism, known as The 3 Rs Project, she'll be in charge of training the tutors who will teach offenders how to read.

"Some may be so learning disabled that they will never be extremely literate. We need to individualize this to the person. The idea is to identify their (reading) weaknesses and aim it specifically at remedying those weaknesses. Many did not graduate high school. They may have dropped out in the ninth or tenth grade. So you can't just put them in an adult basic education classroom. They'll just not succeed again. Many of them would just hide in the back of the room and be quiet," Johnson said.

The brainchild of Oakland County Circuit Court Judge Fred Mester, The 3 Rs Project was unveiled in a press conference Wednesday in Pontiac. The program will involve Mester and the Oakland County Circuit Court, Judge Brian MacKenzie of the 52-1 District Court in Novi, the 48th

District Court, the 50th District Court, the Probate Court, the Sheriff's Department, the Department of Community Corrections, the Eton Academy and the Michigan Dyslexia Institute as well as private businesses.

It will also require the effort of many volunteers. Johnson said that already 30 have gone through the training. They'll start the program by beginning tutoring for 25 adult offenders and five juveniles.

But there are many more offenders who can use the tutoring. And Johnson said additional offenders will be brought into the program as more volunteers are trained.

Tutoring will require the commitment of a fair amount of time on the part of the volunteer. Training will take 16 hours, Johnson said. After that, tutors are asked to spend two hours a week with their students. When travel time and preparation are included, the volunteer effort will likely require about four hours a week.

To sign up, those interested should call the Probate Court volunteer programs office at (810) 858-0041. The court will send an application packet to be filled out and returned. Training sessions have been set for Saturday, April 20 and April 27, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Probate Court conference room in the county courthouse building in Pontiac.

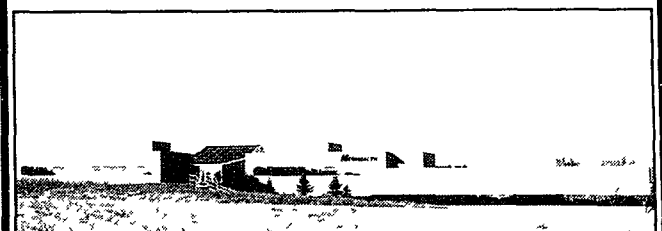

Township Briefs

CWW MEETS HERE: The Conference of Western Wayne (CWW) will hold its monthly meeting at Northville Township Hall tomorrow (March 8). The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. CWW is a consortium of western Wayne County communities that aims at addressing a variety of issues important to all of them in a collective way. A number of items are on this Friday's agenda, including: the fiscal year (FY) 1995 compilation report from the auditing firm of Plante & Moran; a resolution opposing injection wells; and discussion of the policies governing grants to local communities' youth assistance programs.

WARD CHURCH PROPERTY GRADING: You may see bulldozers at work on the Ward Church land in the coming days but it doesn't mean that a deal for development of the site has been worked out between Northville Township and the church. The Haggerty Planned Unit Development (HPUD) contract, the agreement that will govern development of the 140-acre parcel, has not yet been approved. The township's chief building official did grant Ward a preliminary grading permit in December, however, allowing for some land balancing and tree removal to take place as soon as warm weather came. The township has made provisions with Ward for the replacement of removed trees. The HPUD agreement could be before the board of trustees on March 14.

A primary primer for the uncertain
Balloting open to non-GOP members
Caucus limited to Democrats only

Questions and answers concerning the state's March 19 Republican presidential primary election.

Q. I vote Republican. I didn't like the 1992 presidential preference primary when we had to declare our party affiliation to election workers. Will we have to do that in the GOP primary?

A. No. Public Act 87 of 1995 restores the "open" primary. You need only be a registered voter. By the way, the hours are 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., and you vote in your usual precincts.

Q. Why are so many of the dropouts - like Phil Gramm - still on the ballot?

A. The deadline for withdrawal was Jan. 12, when Gramm was still a candidate.

On the Michigan ballot, in alphabetical order, will be nine candidates: Lamar Alexander, Patrick Buchanan, Bob Dole, Robert Dornan, Steve Forbes, Phil Gramm, Alan Keyes, Richard Lugar and Maurice Taylor.

Q. What if I don't care for any of them? Can I vote for "none of the above"?

A. No. But you may write in another name. Or you may vote "uncommitted."

Q. May I vote absentee?

A. Yes. Absentee voter ballots are ready at your city or township clerk's office. The deadline for applying is 2 p.m. Saturday, March 16. You may also vote by AV at the clerk's office until 4 p.m. Monday, March 16.

Voters 60 or older may vote absentee. Others may vote absentee if they: 1) expect to be out of town election day, 2) will be serving as a precinct inspector at a different precinct, 3) are unable to go to the polls for religious reasons, 4) are physically unable to go to the polls, 5) or are in jail awaiting arraignment or trial.

Q. Will we also vote for convention delegates?

A. No. Republican precinct delegates you elected in 1994 will meet in county or congressional district conventions April 23 and pick delegates for a state convention May 17-18 in Grand Rapids.

The state convention will elect Michigan's Republican national committeeman and committee woman as well as national convention delegates.

Party rules will determine how delegates are apportioned between candidates and "uncommitted," based on primary results.

The delegation will attend the Republican National Convention Aug. 11-15 in San Diego.

Q. What if I'm a Democrat or Libertarian?

A. Democrats will have no names on the ballot, and the primary doesn't count for their party. Under national party rules, Democrats will hold caucuses March 16.

The Libertarian Party didn't qualify for the primary ballot because its Senate candidate fell short of 5 percent in 1994. Libertarians will have to use the convention route to nominate any and all candidates. Ditto for any other parties.

Q. The rules seem to keep changing. Why?

A. Michigan used the presidential primary from 1916 to 1928, then abandoned it for the precinct delegate system. It was so "open" that in 1920 Herbert Hoover won the 1920 Democratic primary and finished fourth in the Republican primary.

In 1972 Michigan returned to the primary system, but immediately there was trouble. With President Nixon assured of renomination, many GOP loyalists crossed over to the Democratic primary and gave Alabama's George Wallace the bulk of the votes.

Thereafter, the national Democratic Party decreed that its national convention delegates could come only from a "closed" system in which only declared Democrats participated.

So Michigan adopted a "closed" primary in 1992.

In 1995, with Republicans controlling both chambers for the first time in decades, the state Legislature adopted an "open" primary, law. Democrats are forced to shun it and will have a Democrats-only caucus three days earlier (see related story).

day, March 16, or the presidential primary Tuesday, March 19?

A. Go to your local caucus Saturday, March 16, between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. No names will be on the Democratic side of the ballot in the March 16 primary. The primary won't count in the allocation of delegates to the Democratic national convention.

Q. Will I have to tell my party affiliation at the caucus?

A. Yes. Party rules say only declared Democrats may take part in the presidential candidate selection process. You'll be asked to sign a statement confirming you are a Democrat.

Q. Do they check to see if you're registered to vote?

A. No, but you'll be asked for identification - either a Michigan driver's license, a state ID card or your voter registration card. You'll

be asked to sign a statement confirming that you are a registered voter.

One little quirk: Persons who aren't 18 and registered may take part in the Democratic caucus if they affirm they will be 18 by Nov. 5 and will register to vote in that election.

Q. Who's on the ballot? Did Paul Paulsen and Lyndon LaRouche make it?

A. Your three choices are Bill Clinton, a write-in and "Uncommitted."

You'll vote on a ballot and drop it in a ballot box - just like a standard election.

Q. Is the March 16 caucus just for precinct delegates?

A. No. It's for all declared Democrats.

Q. May I vote absentee?

A. Only if your religious convictions prevent your participation March 16.

To obtain an absentee vote application, write the Michigan Democratic Party, 606 Townsend, Lansing 48933; or telephone (517) 371-5410.

Q. For this caucus, do I vote in my regular precinct?

A. No. The party has divided the state into 300 caucus zones. You may participate only in the zone in

which you live. This newspaper will publish announcements from local party leaders about caucus sites.

If you lose the article, call your local party leader or Democratic headquarters in Lansing at the above number.

Q. Do we vote for national convention delegates or just presidential preference?

A. Just presidential preference. Delegates will be apportioned according to the results of the caucus. By various means, Michigan will select 158 delegates and 21 alternates to the Aug. 26-29 national convention in Chicago.

In May 4 congressional district meetings, party delegates will pick 83 delegates and 14 alternates to the national convention.

On May 11 the Democratic State Central Committee will pick most of the rest.

Q. Hey! As you've described it, I could also vote in the March 19 Republican primary, too, couldn't I?

A. Yes. Party leaders officially disapprove of Democrats' invading the GOP primary, but it can be done.

Republicans opted for an "open" primary, where a voter doesn't have to declare a party affiliation, knowing there was a risk of a crossover.

BACKWARD GLANCE ... at Northville's past by Randy Coble

Well, this week brought your friendly neighborhood reporter his first (and only, if I can help it) cold of the winter season. Fear not, however: I've broken out the Ny-Quil and the Kleenex and stand ready to serve up another helping of ABG.

After all, neither rain nor snow nor — oh, wait, that's the post office.

Anyhow, we're going back, back, way back, all the way to the

warning track to explore a question that came to me amidst my sleepless, post-nasal-drip filled nights this past week. Namely, how did this little town of ours get started in the first place?

The answer is actually very interesting, a tiny microcosm of the stories and struggles of America's pioneer days.

To begin with, Northville is actually an offshoot of our neighbor to the south, Plymouth Town-

ship. Created in 1827, Plymouth Township at its founding included all of modern-day Plymouth, Northville and Canton.

It was in the northern section of town that a little village developed, possibly even before any place else around, which was given the name Northville, a contraction, some historians think, of the words North Village.

It was a time as different from today as night is from day. Although Detroit was on the map, it was still a town where you could see deer and black bear wandering the streets on occasion.

Beyond the city lay the hinterland, a vast, sparsely populated frontier filled with timber and game and sporadic Indian tribes.

Some folks' obstacles are other folks' opportunities. Such was

true of the settlers who founded our town.

Lured by fact that land was cheap and abundant, Northville's pioneers came mainly from New York State and Vermont in the 1820s, a bit before those who founded modern-day Plymouth showed up, according to some sources.

Most came by steamship across Lake Erie and up the Detroit River. Others walked, either through Canada or to the south of the Great Lakes through Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Once you made Detroit, everyone had the fun to slogging into the interior across the most primitive of roads, hacked out of the forest along the routes of the Indian foot trails.

The very first land patent for property in Northville was filed on

Aug. 3, 1823, by a settler named Gideon Benton: 240 acres just south of Seven Mile Road that today include the Kings Mill subdivision and part of Hines Drive. Other Northville pioneers, however, are more familiar to us: our streets bear the names they did in life, names like Daniel Cady, Joseph Yerkes and Captain William Dunlap.

Most came to farm, even though some surveyors thought that the ground here was too swampy and sandy to make it worthwhile.

Some harvested timber, culling the great stands of sugar and black maple trees, while others trapped or traded. All lived in log houses.

It wasn't too long after the settlers came that Northville moved from being a wide place in the foot

trail to a town. In 1827 William Bartow was elected as the first Plymouth Township supervisor. He, like constable Abraham Markham, was a Northville resident.

The next step to civilization came with saw mills to cut the trees and grist mills to grind the grain.

Then followed blacksmiths and barkeeps and merchants and all the rest in the fullness of time.

Just think — this place where we work and play today, where we grew up and where our kids are too, has seen not just us but our grandparents and grandparents' grandparents before us.

Cable wars headed for court

It didn't take much time for competition to heat up between two cable franchises, vying for customers in Northville and Northville Township.

Ameritech New Media and Continental Cablevision are not only competing for customers these days, they're competing for premium channels as well.

Ameritech New Media - along with Americast - has filed a complaint with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) charging Continental Cablevision and Home Box Office, a subsidiary of Time Warner, with unlawfully denying consumers in five Wayne County communities - including Northville and Northville Township - access to HBO and Cinemax programming.

What that means to Northville and Northville Township residents is that Ameritech will be unable to offer HBO or Cinemax as cable television options - at least for the time being.

That's unfair, according to Stephen Weisswasser, president and chief executive officer of Americast, who said that Continental and Time Warner are limiting consumer choices to unfairly protect their own interests.

"Continental Cablevision and HBO are preventing competition and are holding these communities hostage to that goal in clear violation of the 1992 Cable Act, which guarantees consumers unrestricted access to programming," Weisswasser said.

service in Northville, Northville Township, the city of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, and Canton Township.

Ameritech signed franchise agreements with those communities last summer in a historic deal that opened the door for competition within the cable industry.

Ameritech's cable system is scheduled to go online for portions of the five community area sometime this summer, according to Dave Onak, spokesman for Ameritech New Media.

In Northville, some subscribers should begin receiving cable service in late June or early July.

Some subscribers may be wondering, however, whether HBO or Cinemax will be an option.

"What it means initially, depending on when the FCC rules, is that Ameritech will not be able to provide those two premium channels," Onak explained. "I think it will have an impact on a small group of potential customers who want premium channels, but there are a lot of customers who don't necessarily subscribe to those channels."

Onak said that the Continental/HBO contract is anti-competitive and represents the very prob-

lem Northville and the other consortium communities thought they solved when they approved franchise agreements with Ameritech and Continental.

"What we have said all along is that the cable customers, not the cable providers, should be able to make the decision as to what they want to watch," Onak said. "This type of anti-competitive contract will hurt competition within (Northville and Northville Township)."

Continental Cablevision currently offers services in the five communities through Omnicom of Michigan cable systems that it purchased in January.

The complaint asks the FCC to order HBO to offer its programming, along with Cinemax, to Americast and Ameritech in the five communities.

"We have attempted for many months to acquire HBO programming for distribution in the affected communities," said Greg Brown, president of Ameritech New Media.

"But Continental Cablevision chose to say no to consumers in these communities which have led the charge for competition in cable TV."

Americast had signed an agreement to offer HBO and Cinemax in its partners' service areas across the country, except in communities served by Continental, because of an exclusive contract allegedly signed by Time Warner's HBO division and Continental in 1988.

Officials for Time Warner claim that agreement prevents it from licensing HBO and Cinemax programming to any competitor of Continental's that builds a wired cable system.

In formulating the Cable Act of 1992, Congress said exclusive contracts such as the Time Warner/Continental pact were anti-competitive and outlawed them, but agreed to grandfather any contracts signed before June 1, 1990.

The Americast/Ameritech complaint says that because Continental purchased its interest in the affected cable systems after the June 1, 1990, cut-off, its exclusive contract with HBO does not apply to these former Omnicom properties.

Onak said that the FCC has not indicated when it will rule on the complaint.

Ameritech New Media is the cable TV subsidiary of Ameritech, one of the world's largest communications companies, and provides a wide array of local phone, data and video services in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin.

Americast is the telecommunications programming venture of Ameritech, BellSouth, SBC Communications, GTE and The Walt Disney Co.

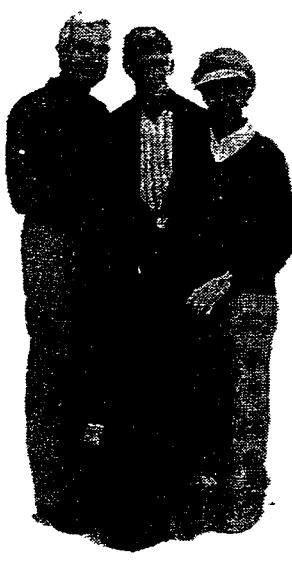

vised by the Robert Leathers Co. Plymouth Township recently sponsored a successful playscape project that involved several hundred residents, according to Sincoc. such as an air conditioner. If the information on your file sheet is correct - and it very rarely isn't, township officials say - the only way to get the board to change your assessment is to demonstrate that the assessor's value of your property is off.

The best way to do that, assessing officials say, is to present written documentation that establishes the cash value of your property. Items such as the deed to your home, listing the price you bought it for, or written figures from a realtor on the price that comparable homes have sold for.

Assessment increases have var-

ied widely in Northville Township this year, all the way from zero percent in places like Quail Ridge, parts of Highland Lakes and Crestwood Manor to highs of 12.5 percent in Northville Colony Estates No. 5. On the average, though, most homeowners will see assessment hikes of between 4-6 percent.

Engler school-to-work plan takes hold

Even without help from the Michigan Legislature, Gov. John Engler is moving the state into a job preparation mode called "school-to-work."

Most corporate types and educational administrators love it. A handful of vocal critics equate it with Nazism, Communism, Big Brother and slavery.

"The No. 1 issue for business is the lack of skilled workers," state business ombudsman Margaret O'Riley told a panel of lawmakers Feb. 26 in Pontiac. "But our education system is designed for one thing - getting into college."

About 50 percent of high school graduates go to college, but only half graduate. Of those who graduate, 30 percent wind up in jobs that didn't really require a four-year university degree; many wind up having to learn technical skills.

Thus, 75 percent who never earn a baccalaureate degree need job skills, O'Riley said. "We want business in on the design of the school-to-work (STW) system and not in an advisory capacity," she told a Republican task force.

Engler made sure Michigan was one of the first states on board a federal program providing \$49 million for regional STW projects.

"I have trouble hiring people to do what needs to be done," said Terry Barr, president of Libralter Plastics in Walled Lake and chair of the Oakland County STW partnership.

Some familiar critics of public education fired a barrage of criticisms at STW. Items:

• The employer shouldn't be "King of the Road. Elitist control is offensive to free-minded citizens" - Evelyn Sonnenberg, Sterling Heights.

• "I actively oppose what the governor and the federal government are doing to teaching in this state ... 'Harvesting' children ... 'human capital' ... We will become a national socialist state - through regulating their (graduates) access to employment" - John Skurnowicz, IBM retiree.

• "The governor has bypassed the Legislature to impose this hideous school-to-work plot ... German-Soviet style education plan ... to enslave them to the master elite" - Barbara Skurnowicz, Bloomfield Hills.

No specific bills are before the Legislature on the federal program. The House has passed a bill by Rep. Glen Oxender, R-Sturgis, to set up vocational-technical councils, but House Bill 4196 has seen no Senate action.

Mill Race Matters

Regularly, members of this community hear of the flooding on Hines Drive. Less regularly, residents see flooding close at hand.

The property upon which Mill Race Village stands is part of the Rouge River's natural flood plain. Records do not say how often the area flooded while milling operations took place on that site, but Historical Society records recall three incidents since the property has been an historic village.

The most recent occurred on June 21, 1989. By noon on that day the water had spilled over the banks between the Cottage House and the gazebo. It rushed across the green joining the creek behind the Cady Inn and Blacksmith Shop.

That evening flood watchers gathered on the village's bridge to take photographs and marvel at the splashing carp being swept along by the current.

Despite the severity of the flooding the only serious damage sustained was to building furnaces. The interiors of the buildings miraculously remained dry.

By the following day only puddles remained in addition to a badly eroded parking lot. Silt and dirt covered the grass.

The 1986 flood brought similar results as did the earlier flood during the '70s. Severe floods throughout the nation make us aware of the powers of nature. These minor disturbances close at hand bring the message even closer.

determination that reasonable suspicion exists must be based on observations concerning the appearance, behavior, speech or body odors, and must be made by a supervisor or other management person trained in detecting the symptoms of drug and alcohol abuse.

• The city will not conduct random testing in lieu of regular biannual testing of all covered employees with a CDL. The testing will be performed in conjunction with required CDL physicals.

• Post-accident testing - Northville will test each surviving covered employee for alcohol and controlled substances if it is determined that the employee contributed to the cause of the accident. A police/public safety officer will make the determination as to the culpability of the employee, Word said.

Along with those requirements Northville must adopt a federally prescribed employee alcohol and controlled substance misuse program, according to Word. "This program must provide pertinent information to all covered employees, as well as establishing a supervisor training program," he explained.

The policy also establishes authority to terminate an employee who is tested positive for drug and/or substance abuse, Word added.

He said that the results of the tests and programs will remain confidential. The policy was reviewed by the city's safety consultant, Concentral Occupational Health Center, and was approved by the city employees who are members of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME).

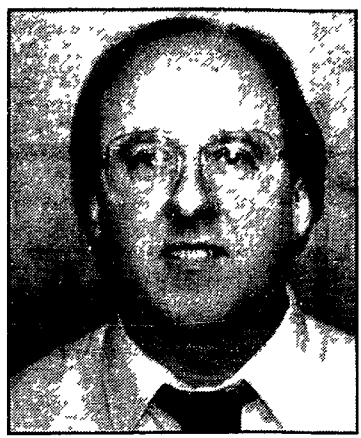

night.
"We aren't ignoring the fact that people aren't happy about this situation," Warner said. "We're trying to live with our neighbors."
State Police officials are now looking at their budget for the project to see if they can come up with the \$27,000 necessary to make the lighting modifications to the Northville tower.
The system would include white

strobes by day and a series of red-lense strobes and steady lights by night. A formal decision will be made "probably pretty quickly," Warner added.
To help the state make up its mind, Biedzen is calling for Northville residents to show up en masse to the township board of trustees' March 14 meeting and call for changes to be made.
The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. and will be held at Township Hall, located off Six Mile Road between Winchester and Haggerty

"I'd like to see the community give a firm and clear answer on this situation. This is not just complaining to complain. I think we could effect a real change."
Besides speaking to members of the board about the tower lights, Biedzen said he also plans to ask them to beef up township ordinances regulating the placement and lighting of towers "so that we don't see this problem come up again."
Whether any local regulations can apply to state-owned towers is

an open question. Township officials reportedly are checking the possibility; Wagner said that state facilities are exempt from local building and zoning codes.
The fact that the State Police didn't seek community input of any kind before building the tower concerns Biedzen.
"It's my money going to build it. I feel that I should have been given a chance to have a say," he said. "Now not only have I paid for the tower but I get the lights going off, too."

County's land plan bombs with trustees

- Seeing bigger home lots than what's been proposed so far. Some are as small in width as 70 feet, a figure the board more or less flatly rejected. The trustees also favored more single family home subdivisions versus more dense multiple-family developments like attached condominium complexes

- Creating an industrial/R&D zone along Five Mile from Beck to Sheldon Road, an area that includes the existing Optical Imaging Systems (OIS) plant. The trustees were specifically opposed to allowing OIS's upcoming expansion to go north along Beck, preferring it instead to go along Five Mile

- Seeing a good chunk of land, at least 5-percent (about 45 acres) set aside for public recreation use, preferably along Beck Road across from Beck Road Park

- Setting aside land for "public facilities" such as a new township fire station or an elementary school.

- Putting in more recreational open space for the site's future residents to use

- Getting senior housing built on the site.

"The county has to help deal with the increases in demand for public services that this (development) land is going to provide," Trustee Mark Appo said in describing the rationale behind the request.

Township officials have asked Wayne County to discuss the land issue with the Northville public school district as well.

- Reserving space near the intersection of Five Mile and Sheldon for a "neighborhood" shopping center.

- Getting details on county plans for roads on the property, particularly whether they will connect with existing roads in the area

- A key concern was getting the county to get rid of contamination problems at the site such as underground fuel storage tanks and asbestos as well as the ongoing demolition of the abandoned buildings there

"I say we don't give them anything until they attend to that property," was the way Trustee Russ Fogg put it.

A suggestion from Trustee Barbara O'Brien to consider pursuing legal measures in an attempt to force the county to clean up the land was rejected. Other members of the board argued that such a move "would be too adversarial," in the words of Trustee Gini Britton.

Many of the items on the wish list are incorporated into changes proposed for the township's Planned Unit Development (PUD) ordinance, alterations that are tailored specifically with the county and in mind.

If approved, the PUD will be a written contract between the township and the county that will govern the development of the site. The agreement will spell out what each section of the site can be used for and other key features such as land for recreation or public facilities.

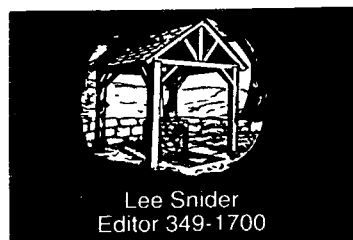

Continue pressing for softer lights on tower

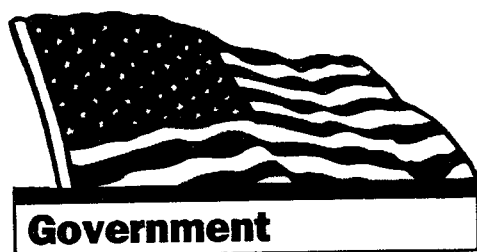
It's been about three weeks since the new state police radio tower on Seven Mile became aglow. But to residents who live within range of the searing beams at the top of the 400-foot structure it probably seems like an eternity.

Anyone who has been within miles of the Northville area any evening since Feb. 16 knows all about the tower and its supernova strobes. The communications antenna sports enormous white beams that blink on and off, sending streaks of intense light into the blackened night sky. It's fascinating, for about 10 minutes anyway. After that it resembles a flood lamp captors might use while giving an undercover agent the third degree.

Residents are understandably upset. No one wants to hinder the law enforcement efforts the radio system is designed to enhance, but no one much likes the idea of living in an area that resembles the DMZ either.

Fortunately, it appears the state police are prepared to take steps to lower the flame. Several alternatives are available to authorities, the most promising of which appears to be a plan to convert to less intrusive red lights after nightfall.

It's encouraging that state police representatives have sounded a cooperative note, but one wonders why they didn't go on an outreach campaign and



seek public input from the very first. Their unwillingness to consult the public before the tower was constructed has caused distrust and reinforced the idea that state institutions think of themselves as continents apart from the communities that host them. In any event, residents' discomfort could soon be relieved if the post takes corrective measures.

But one resident, Daniel Biedzen, isn't leaving anything to chance. He is urging people to show up for a Northville Township Board of Trustees meeting Thursday, March 14, and make sure officials get the message.

We think he's got a point. Public pressure offers the best hope that the problem will get addressed with positive action rather than just hollow sympathy.

We join Biedzen in putting out the call to residents to come forward and make their displeasure over the intense lights known.

Work-based program is right for the times

Gov. John Engler's plans for a so-called "school-to-work" program, which would seek to give students technical job training skills that would translate directly to employability, is certainly drawing a good deal of comment from across the area and around the state.

Unfortunately, most of the commentary is reactionary and poorly thought out. There is a great deal of discussion to be made on the issue, unless the hyperbole obscures the subject matter.

Engler is proposing to encourage technical and vocational training in high schools as an alternative to college preparatory course work. He notes that while half of all high school grads head off to college, fewer than half of them come home with degrees. And of those, only about 30 percent wind up with jobs that require a college education. Often, students have to go back for technical training to get and hold a job.

No bills have been introduced as of yet, but plans have been laid out for local technical councils. And those plans were recently developed in Pontiac by state business Ombudsman Margaret O'Reilly.

Those reacting to the idea have labeled it everything from a Communist scheme to a Nazi plot. The fear apparently is that if education is more directed toward getting kids into jobs, corporations will have more control over their education.

We don't understand that reaction. Fewer goals of education, frankly, can

be more important than preparing students for the world of work. They'll spend more time working at their careers than just about anything else they could possibly do.

Certainly, their economic well-being depends on how well their education has prepared them for work. But while the reactionary responses seem to be coming from the lunatic fringe, there are still valid issues here. The first is that it seems unlikely a student will opt for vocational training if college is a possibility. And it is college that opens the greatest potential.

Vocational training, for all the positives of job opportunities, doesn't typically prepare students for moving up into the management ranks, or for ownership of a company. And parents are going to want their youngsters to have every opportunity to move ahead in the future.

Perhaps what is needed is not more emphasis on training for vocational students, but vocational training for all students, even those headed off to college.

College bound students after all will still have to enter the workforce eventually. And these days they may have to enter the workforce on their way to getting a college degree.

Instead of putting students on one of several tracks in high school - college prep, vocational or general - perhaps the goal should be to graduate seniors and turn them loose on the work place with as many options open as possible.

'Inn' crowd a different breed

I told my newest friends, the group of young people who live in the infamous Inn on Main across the street from *The Northville Record* office, that I understood their frustration with people who look down their noses at them.

When I spoke with four or five of the tenants at the apartment house recently I explained that I came from a generation that vowed not to judge people by the color of their skin or the cut of their clothes. I had been on the outside looking in once myself, I said, and I knew how it felt.

You might have caught the story I wrote about the Inn that ran in last week's edition of the newspaper. The article came about after a reader wrote a letter to the editor and sent a copy to city hall. The letter contained accusations and claims that were potentially libelous, so it was rejected for publication.

But the point it made and the tone it contained were familiar to anyone who listens to what people say in this city: the apartment building is a stain on an otherwise spotless downtown.

When I called Police Chief Rodney Cannon to hear his observations about the place he was more than happy to talk. He said the Inn on Main isn't the drain on police resources many think it is and he agreed that

an article might help clear up some of the misconceptions about the people who live in the building. He was laudatory toward the new owner, who bought the property two years ago, but acknowledged the questionable element at the rooming house, saying it was helpful to the police to "have them all corralled in one location."

To get a better sense of what goes on inside the Inn I paid a visit to one of the tenants who was good enough to introduce himself to me a couple of weeks ago. We huddled in his tiny room - he, a friend of his and I - and talked about life, injustice, Zen and the art of motorcycle maintenance (remember that cult book from the late '60s?).

The tenants were friendly and respectful and not without their share of righteous indignation. But, make no mistake, they're no angels. Some of them have prison records while others told stories of drifting around after growing up in broken homes. One is on parole, another a former member of a youth gang.

As I sat in the unkempt room, books and clothing strewn about the floor, listening to the stories of defiance and anger, I realized that these were precisely the type of people many residents assumed lived in the Inn. And after I told them I understood their frustrations at being looked down upon, I told them that too.

My resolve not to judge people by their appearance has been challenged many times over the years. Probably no one is as bad as you thought they were once you get to know them. But appearances do matter.

Anti-abuse efforts make a difference

We think the community should know that there are programs in Michigan that have been teaching young people how to say no to alcohol and other drugs for 13 years. They also learn how to help their peers. Student Leadership Services of Michigan is a non profit organization, specializing in student training and leadership.

SLSM coordinates three leading youth substance abuse prevention programs in Michigan: Students Against Driving Drunk-Michigan (SADD-MI) for 580 high schools. Students Taking a New Direction (STAND) for 250 middle schools and Peer Resistance Skills for 300 high school and elementary schools.

The schools are an excellent place to educate children, and that is where SADD and STAND begin.

High school SADD chapters are active members of the state network. SADD promotes no use of alcohol and other drugs, including tobacco, safety belt awareness and leadership development.

Our activities have been evaluated by a recent Federal study, by NHTSA, National Highway

Traffic Safety Administration 8-95, that showed where there are SADD chapters there is a significant difference in attitudes about underage drinking.

Students in schools where there is SADD were more likely to hold negative attitudes about alcohol and were exposed to more in-school activities directed against drinking and driving.

The results of the western Michigan drug study show that half of high school seniors said their close friends would disapprove of them having five or more drinks on weekends or trying marijuana. We see this as positive peer pressure and believe that SADD-Michigan is making inroads among youth where others have failed. We empower youth to take a stand and use role models to influence their peers. The goal is no use.

We would ask for continued support from the state and local governments, businesses, schools and parents, to help us in our mission to empower our youth, develop leadership, create alternatives and hopefully save lives in this process.

Juniors set to blaze trail with tests

Starting this week, some 110,000 students in 11th grade will take the new Michigan High School Proficiency Test. It won't be easy.

Covering math, science, reading and writing, the new test will consume more than 11 hours over a two-week period.

Much tougher than the old Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) test that it replaces, the new proficiency tests

stress writing and creative problem-solving skills and downgrade multiple-choice questions.

The writing test, for example, will ask students to analyze their own writing as well as write original essays on assigned topics. The reading portion will involve three passages on the same theme, students will be asked to identify the theme and analyze it.

The new tests will determine whether students get a state endorsement on their high school diplomas. Given the current climate in Lansing, they will also likely play a role in whether individual schools receive accreditation for full state funding.

Like upgrading for the MEAP tests, scoring the new tests cannot be done entirely by computer. The majority of the grading will be

done by the contractor administering the test for the state. Results are not expected until August.

With the new test, Michigan joins a national movement to assess what students actually learn in school. Seventeen states have tests that students must pass in order to graduate, and three others - now including Michigan - offer a state diploma endorsement for students who demonstrate satisfactory achievement in given subjects.

Not surprisingly, the new test is causing a fair amount of anxiety.

Kids are worried over the length of the tests and their reputed difficulty. Parents who have seen their 11th graders sweat over the MEAP test are wondering why the kids must go through the whole ngamarole again. Teachers wonder whether they have prepared their pupils properly. Administrators grumble about having to jam an additional 11 hours for test-taking into an already crowded schedule.

Beyond the short-term aggravation, many wonder just how much difference the new proficiency test is going to make. Will colleges really base their admissions decisions on test results, or will they stick with the national ACT and SAT scores? Will employers, who have been complaining for years that high school diplomas are meaningless, really start looking for state endorsements while conducting job interviews?

I can sympathize with much of the concern. Examination periods for my 13-year-old son aren't exactly delicious times around

my own household.

But at the end of the day, I firmly believe that the new proficiency tests mark yet another milestone on the way to fundamental improvement in our public schools.

Many criticized the use of MEAP tests to evaluate what children learn, on the perfectly legitimate grounds that this was not what MEAP was designed for. But most agreed that some data were better than no data, especially if the data gave parents and school people an objective way of evaluating their success in helping kids learn.

Now we have the new proficiency test, explicitly designed to assess what kids actually learn. Sure it will be tough, and certainly it will force teachers and parents to rethink just how they teach and review what they teach.

After all, as they used to say at IBM, "You cannot manage what you cannot measure."

Over time, these new tests will provide the customers of our school system - students, parents, teachers, employers, taxpayers - a measure of outcome. And once we have a measure of outcome, we can begin the task of managing the process by which our children learn.

Good luck, 11th graders! It probably won't do you any good when you're sweating over a tough math problem, but you should realize that you are taking the first step in an important leap forward for our schools.

So much effort and energy is expended to get across the message that seems so easy to grasp -

illegal drugs are bad for kids, our families and our community. So many work so hard to rid our community of illegal substances, many behind-the-scenes are just trying to be the best parents they can. Our Northville has begun to grasp the zero tolerance concept and we all are pro actively pushing forward.

Why then are things getting worse? Just last week a new drug scare, "Roofies," appeared that is aimed at helpless teens, and the news broke that the state of Michigan invests \$400 million a year in tobacco companies and spends just \$5 million a year to convince kids not to smoke.

Drug use is up after an 11 year drop for the fifth straight year, more teenagers are buying cigarettes more easily, more kids are into using pot than since the '60s and '70s etc., etc. I could fill pages about what I see and hear yet there is hope.

You see, before change can begin we need to be educated and given the facts. The facts don't look good on the side of the increases in drug use. The facts do look good on the side of the Northville community because a lot is being done through the zero tolerance effort coordinated through the Northville Youth Forum and the efforts of individuals and families who are sick of seeing it, hearing it, and living it.

In my opinion the key to change is the family. Parents need to set the guidelines. The following is a reasonable "Signs of Drug Abuse" list:

- School tardiness, truancy, declining grades
- Loss of motivation, energy, self-discipline
- Loss of interest in activities, hobbies

- Forgetfulness, short and/or long-term
- Short attention span, trouble concentrating

- Aggressive anger, hostility, irritability
- An "I don't care" attitude
- Disappearance of money and valuables
- Changes in friends, evasive about new ones

- Unhealthy appearance, bloodshot eyes
- Changes in personal dress, grooming
- Unusually large appetite
- Use of eye drops, room deodorizers, incense

- Pipes, small boxes or containers, baggies, rolling papers or other unusual items
- Peculiar odors or butts, seeds, leaves in ashtrays or clothing pockets
- Running away

If parents have concerns or questions please call me at 344-1825. My suggestion is to act early in elementary, middle school when you have a child who exhibits behaviors or attitudes that concern you.

When you see the red ribbons applaud this outward sign and an inward community attitude. We need your support as you need ours. The whole community raises the child.

Bill designed to help scalp disease sufferers

Insurers would pay for hair pieces

Coverage of hair prostheses extends to sufferers of Alopecia Areata under a measure being considered by the House Insurance Committee.

House Bills 5133-35, sponsored by state Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, require insurers to pay for hair pieces and wigs prescribed for non-cosmetic purposes. Alopecia Areata is a disease affecting approximately 158,000 Michigan residents. It causes hair loss on the head and, in some cases, the entire body.

"It's not a cosmetic problem," said Law. "This is the loss of a body part. It leaves the

scalp, eyes and nose unprotected from sun, dust and foreign particles. Insurance companies pay for drug therapy and counseling related to Alopecia Areata, but they won't cover a necessary prosthesis for medical and emotional rehabilitation."

Alopecia Areata occurs in men, women and children. Patients with the disease are otherwise healthy, although they have a higher incidence of atopic conditions, such as asthma. Treatments are available, but there is no cure.

"Various drug treatments are covered by

insurers but are costly and often dangerous," said Law, vice chair of the Insurance Committee. "Many patients do not want to endure the harmful side effects. They would rather purchase a quality prosthetic device and get on with their lives."

Under House Bills 5133-35, scalp hair substitutes are covered in the same manner as other prosthetic devices. An insurer could, however, limit payment to 80 percent, excluding deductibles.

"In the long run, this legislation will actually reduce insurance costs," Law said. "Giving patients the option of obtaining an attractive and well-fitting hair prosthesis eliminates the need for a lifetime of drug therapy or counseling."

Abusive men would foot shelter bills under proposal in Michigan House

Capitol capsules:

Abusive husbands may find themselves required to pay for domestic violence shelters under a series of bills sponsored in part by Rep. James Ryan, R-Redford.

"About 200,000 times a year, a spouse must escape because, usually, he is abusing her," said Ryan, a first-term lawmaker. "These are non-profit organizations staffed by volunteers. We put a cost of \$33 a night on them."

"Under these bills, if an abused spouse feels it's safe, the prosecutor can seek reimbursement (from the abuser) for the shelter. These bills don't affect a large population. Many women are afraid to seek shelter. It's a shame."

The House of Representatives on Feb. 20 gave 105-0 approval

to Senate amendments of three bills and sent them to Gov. John Engler's desk for signatures. The co-sponsor was Rep. Eric Bush, R-Battle Creek.

House Bills 4509, 4510 and 4608 let judges order convicted stalkers or other domestic violence offenders to reimburse shelters in which victims seek refuge. In addition, any person or safe house named in the restitution order could enforce it through civil action.

PERRY SHIFTED

Lowell Perry, of Southfield, has a new job in Gov. Engler's administration. He will be shifted in early March from director of the Department of Labor to the cabinet-level Office of Urban Programs.

Engler's announcement said the post will strengthen the governor's Southeastern Michigan

Office, focusing on minority business procurement, urban parks and recreation, and the Detroit Area Pre-College Engineering Program.

"My efforts will not be limited to Detroit only," said Perry, a lawyer and one-time football star. "My responsibilities extend to all areas of the state."

Perry's old Labor Department is scheduled to be merged with the Department of Commerce. They will form a new Department of Consumer and Industry Services.

Heading the new department will be Kathy Wilbur, a Birmingham native who headed the Department of Licensing and Regulation until Engler merged it with Commerce.

ABATEMENTS LIVE

Dissident state representatives failed to kill the 22-year-old sys-

tem allowing industrial property tax cuts of 50 percent for 12 years.

The House gave 59-41 approval to a bill blocking cities—notably the Grand Rapids suburb of Kentwood—from charging "fees" equal to the amount of city property taxes that are being abated.

The Kentwood practice left schools, the county and community college bearing the costs of the industrial tax break while the city broke even.

The bill goes to Governor John Engler for his signature, which is expected.

An amendment by Rep. David Jaye, R-Macomb County, to kill the entire program fell a dozen votes short.

Voting yes on final passage were local representatives Willis Bullard, R-Milford, and Gerald Law, R-Plymouth.

Candidate for Congress to hold coffee meeting

Joe Fitzsimmons, candidate for the Republican nomination for U.S. Congress, will be hosting a coffee hour in Westland this weekend. All constituents are invited to meet him, have a cup of coffee and share their concerns with him.

The coffee hour will be held

on Saturday, March 9, from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. at Big Boy's restaurant, 6360 N. Wayne road, Westland.

Fitzsimmons is hoping to be the Republican nominee to face 13th District incumbent Democrat Lynn Rivers in the fall general election.

Abraham gets Senate award

U.S. Sen. Spencer Abraham, R-Mich., recently received recognition by the U.S. Senate for having completed his first year as Michigan's freshman Senator with a perfect attendance record.

"Just like Cal Ripken played in every game, Sen. Abraham made every vote in the Senate," Sen. Strom Thurmond said. "Judging by some of his achievements in the past year, he has a good shot at being the Senate's rookie of

the year," Thurmond added.

Abraham said he was just doing his job.

"During my campaign, I pledged to the voters of Michigan to end business as usual, and I'm working hard to keep the promises we made to balance the budget, cut taxes, save Medicare and reform welfare," he said.

Abraham is the only freshman Senator and one of four Senators to have 100 percent attendance.

Why wait for Spring? Seasonal decorating can help with the winter blahs

Spring will be in the air in two weeks and many can't wait to ditch their winter digs for dirt under their fingernails.

As with all seasonal decorating, there are many things homeowners can do now before the lure of warm weather has them busy planting pansies and perennials.

One does not have to wait until March 21. You can start the transition to the outside by beginning indoors. By the time spring is here, your home will be done and you'll be ready to concentrate on the garden.

Spring cleaning is definitely the first item on the agenda. Making the windows sparkle will help bring in the sunshine.

But shaking off the winter dust is not the only thing that should be done while one waits for the first crocus.

To make the transition from winter to spring, designers Barbara Barone and Sue Suramey, who have worked together at The Designing Woman in Northville for two years, explain that the goal is to move from the closed-in feel of winter to one that is airy and outdoorsy.

In her own home, Barone has placed a decorative fan in front of the fireplace and a basket of green plants on the corner of the hearth.

Gone is the Christmas decorating on the mantel. In favor of a large print, bunnies and Easter eggs.

The wood bird cage which was decorated in Christmas colors and contained angels and evergreens just a few months ago now has been topped with bear grass, wide leaf greens and florals.

"The bear grass adds height to draw the eye to the ceiling," Barone said.

"Our Michigan weather is so gray. We need to do things more cheery. That's why gray and mauve went out of style so quickly," Barone said.

"Clients call me because they are sick of the winter look and they want to update," Barone said. "We like it when men get involved. You get the total family picture."

Even in a burgundy, ivory and hunter scheme, the addition of golden yellow accents will bring a different seasonal feel into the

room, according to Barone. Accessories can include silk flowers, toss cushions, table mats and candles, all in golden yellow.

Another idea to add spring to a dark decorating scheme is to pull out some of the lighter colors which are in the fabric of a couch and again use them in accessories.

"Most fabrics have lots of colors which can be drawn from, sometimes as many as 10 or 12," Barone said.

Use Battenburg lace or other lighter colored fabric as table toppers on round decorator tables.

"Don't concentrate on one area, go through with one fell swoop," Barone said. "Give the whole home the airy feeling."

Suggestions from interior decorator Brenda Crofoot of Brenda's BorderLine Designs in Novi include taking down draperies and replacing them with toppers to open up and brighten the room.

If the color scheme is brown, bring in the lighter tones, the beiges and neutrals, suggested Crofoot. Bring in the lighter tones of colors from other dark color schemes too.

"Stick with the same tone but just brighten or lighten it," Cro-

foot said. "If there is a deeper tone of beige on the wall, get a lighter shade and sponge it onto the wall and create a faux finish or textured finish with a new look for all under \$50," she said.

"Flowers, whether they're silk or real, always brighten a home," Crofoot said. "The flower scent of candles, which can also be in your accent colors, also adds to the warmth of the spring."

Other decorating touches include:

- Replace winter potpourri with spring bouquet, lilac, rose garden or summertime fragrances.
- Fill the tea pot with tulips and set on the table.
- Removable, reusable wall paper borders help give a room a seasonal look.
- Remove heavy draperies or tie them back with decorative tasseled cords to create an airy effect.
- Take up dark throw rugs and replace with lighter ones.
- Add toss pillows in spring colors for brightness.
- For dark furniture, put on the summer slipcovers or toss a light, decorative throw over the piece.

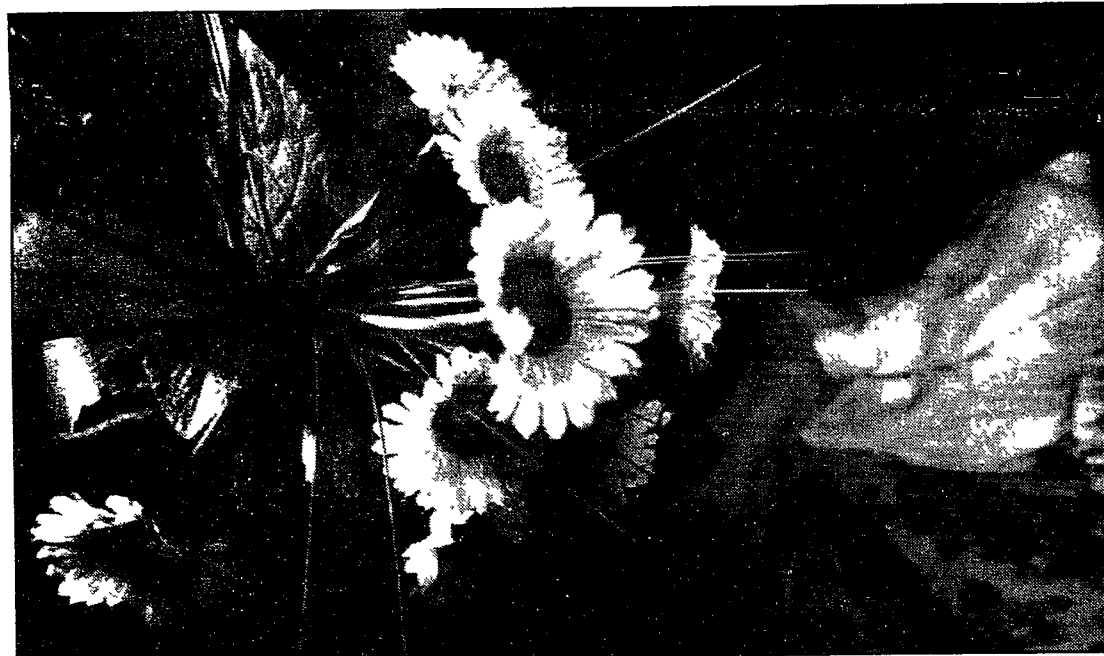


Interior decorators Barbara Barone, left, and Sue Suramey are "thinking spring" during these last two weeks of winter.

- Replace heavy blankets with a light colored coverlet, dust ruffle and pillows.
- Try rearranging artwork. A new location for a print or oil does wonders in changing the focal point of a room.
- Cover the "black hole" created by an empty fireplace with either a painted screen or large floor plant.
- Replace some of the light bulbs in the lamps with pink bulbs to

- give a soft, rosy glow.
- Get out the summer china (clear glass, plain white, etc.) and
- set the table on bright patterned mats with matching napkins.

- The key is to think "spring."

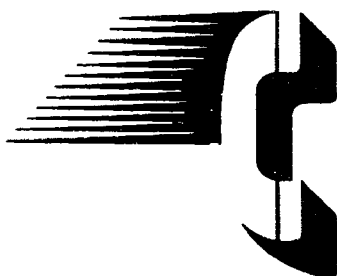

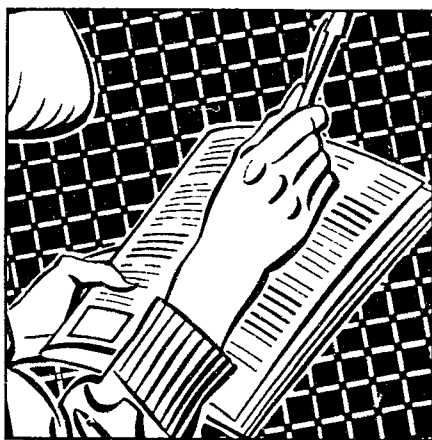

Rededication of church is also for parishioners

When the Cardinal's in town, it must be an auspicious occasion.

Cardinal Adam Maida presided over the rededication of Holy Family Catholic Church on Feb. 18 which included representatives from the Novi Ministers Association, concelebrating priests from area Catholic churches and about 800 parishioners.

Also involved in the rededication was the church's pastor, Father John Budde, associate pastor Fr. Andrew Tomasko, and people from the parish of all age groups and representative families.

"Children, young married couples, single adults, all the groups were represented and took part in some way during the rededication ceremony," said Pastor Budde.

Whenever there is a major renovation, especially when a new altar and lectern have been fashioned, there is a rededication.

When Holy Family was founded in 1974, there were 200 families. Today there are 2,670 households.

Because of the increase in the number of people in the parish, there was a need to expand the worship space.

At the beginning of the rededication ceremony which began at 3 p.m. at the church located at 24505 Meadowbrook Road in Novi the architectural plans and keys of the building were offered to the Cardinal as a sign of the church's connection to all the Catholic churches in the Detroit area.

After the scripture readings, there was an anointing of the altar and the walls of the church which signified the prayers and praise to God rising like incense before the Lord.

The church, which had started off very plain and dark at the

beginning of the ceremony was then decorated with flowers and banners. The altar was covered with altar cloth and children carrying candles and waving ribbon banners processed to different points in the church where the walls had been anointed and placed lighted candles on that spot.

"This signifies that the light of Christ is something that is to be taken into our lives and into the world as a whole," said Pastor Budde.

The lights of the church are then brought up and the ceremony continues with the celebration of the Eucharist.

In the homily delivered by Cardinal Maida, he said that whenever a church is dedicated, it is a rededication of the people to their life of faith and service.

"He also said that the architecture of our church brings one right to the Eucharist and leads one

forth from the Eucharist to other aspects of our parish life," said Pastor Budde. "He also said that we're privileged to have the name Holy Family after the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph and that one of the marks of our community has been the communion of life and love that is modeled after that Holy Family."

Holy Family Catholic Church is one of the finest parishes in the Archdiocese of Detroit, according to Cardinal Maida.

A gathering for all participants was held in the new activities building following the Mass.

There were two major additions to the building, new offices and a new activities building besides the renovation of the church. The old office space was renovated for a youth room and four new classrooms for religious education.

A gathering space was also created which links the different buildings together.

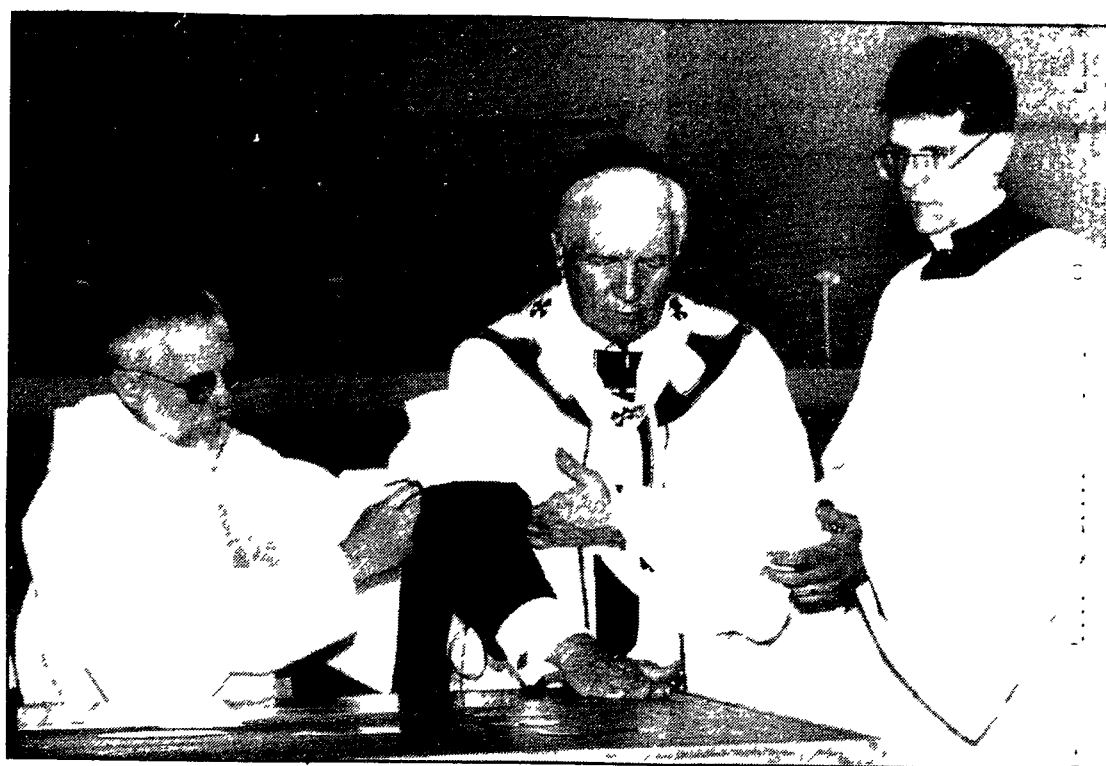

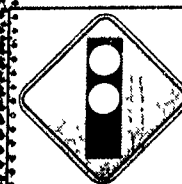

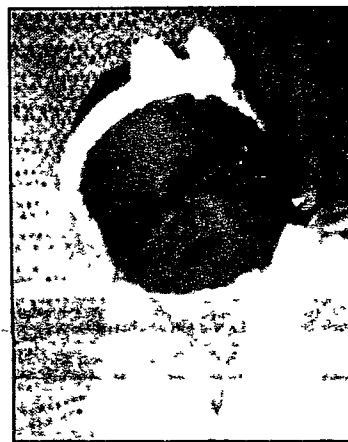

Bear signing kicks off program for foster kids

Novi resident Diane Kroll and her sister Chris Rogers from Howell single-handedly made the lives of almost a dozen foster care children a little brighter.

Between them, they purchased 11 P.J. Huggabee bears as part of a new alliance between The Chance at Childhood Foundation and Hudson's stores to benefit foster children in Michigan.

"It think it is a wonderful program and I like bears," said Kroll, "plus I had a chance to visit with my sister."

On hand to kick off the program was First Lady Michelle Engler and Lieutenant Governor Connie Binsfield who announced the partnership at a news conference held at Hudson's at Twelve Oaks Mall in Novi on Feb. 28.

"We know that our efforts today won't stop child abuse and neglect, but our hope is that by forging this new partnership we will be able to not only give each foster child a cuddly companion, but highlight a very serious issue that has for too long been a silent scourge in society," the First Lady said. "While we continue to work together on solutions to help families better care for their children we must recognize that there are children today who need our love and concern."

The partnership will provide P.J. Huggabee teddy bears to children who are removed from their homes and placed in protective custody. For every P.J. Huggabee bear that is purchased at Hudson's stores throughout Michigan, a bear will be given to The Chance for Childhood Foundation for distribution to

dozen Hudson's stores around Michigan in March.

"By giving a child a cuddly friend, we are providing a sense of security and companionship at a time when they need it most," Michelle Engler said. "But above all we are reminding these children that childhood should be filled with love, laughter and learning and not hurt, hatred and hopelessness."

The Lt. Governor established the Chance at Childhood Foundation to recognize and reward effective child abuse intervention and treatment programs. The foundation's goal is to work with individuals and organizations to better serve and protect Michigan children and families through research, education and training.

P.J. Huggabee was created in 1994 through a partnership with Marshall Field's, part of the Dayton Hudson Department Stores Division and First Lady of Illinois Brenda Edgar's Help Me Grow campaign for children. The program in Illinois provided 15,000 bears to that state's Department of Children and Family Services for abused and neglected children.

Other states that have implemented programs include Minnesota with Dayton's and First Lady Susan Carlson, Ohio with First Lady Janet Voinovich and Dayton Hudson Corporation's operating groups including Marshall Field's, Hudson's and Target.

Currently there are approximately 10,500 Michigan children in foster care. The reported cases of abused or neglected children in Michigan in 1995 totaled 57,914 and more than 7,000 children entered the foster care system.

P.J. Huggabee, the official mascot of the Chance at Childhood Foundation, is a brown, plus 17-inch teddy bear with a tag containing information on how to help an abused or neglected child and the resources available for assistance.

The tag which comes with each bear also provides a number, (517) 373-2035, to call for information about becoming a foster or adoptive parent.

The bears can be purchased at all Michigan Hudson's stores or by mail order by calling 1 (800) 282-2450. They retail for \$20.

Travolta plays villain in 'Broken Arrow'

"Broken Arrow" opens in a non-descript boxing ring, with two fighters squaring off. Suddenly, fists in boxing gloves rush at each other—and us—with explosive force.

The intensity of the combatant's blows belies the fact that they are friends engaging in a spirited round of fisticuffs. Vic Deakins (John Travolta), the older and more experienced of the two is definitely in control, giving his young friend Riley Hale (Christian Slater) an impressive, if painful, boxing lesson.

In addition to having a mentor/protege relationship in the ring, Deakins and Hale are colleagues—crack military pilots who are about to be handed a choice assignment to fly the top-secret B-3 Stealth bomber on a test run. Their cargo: two nuclear warheads.

Although anything but routine, the mission should go without incident. But a shocking treachery is about to put millions of lives at risk...as the timer on an incredible nuclear extortion plot ticks toward ground zero.

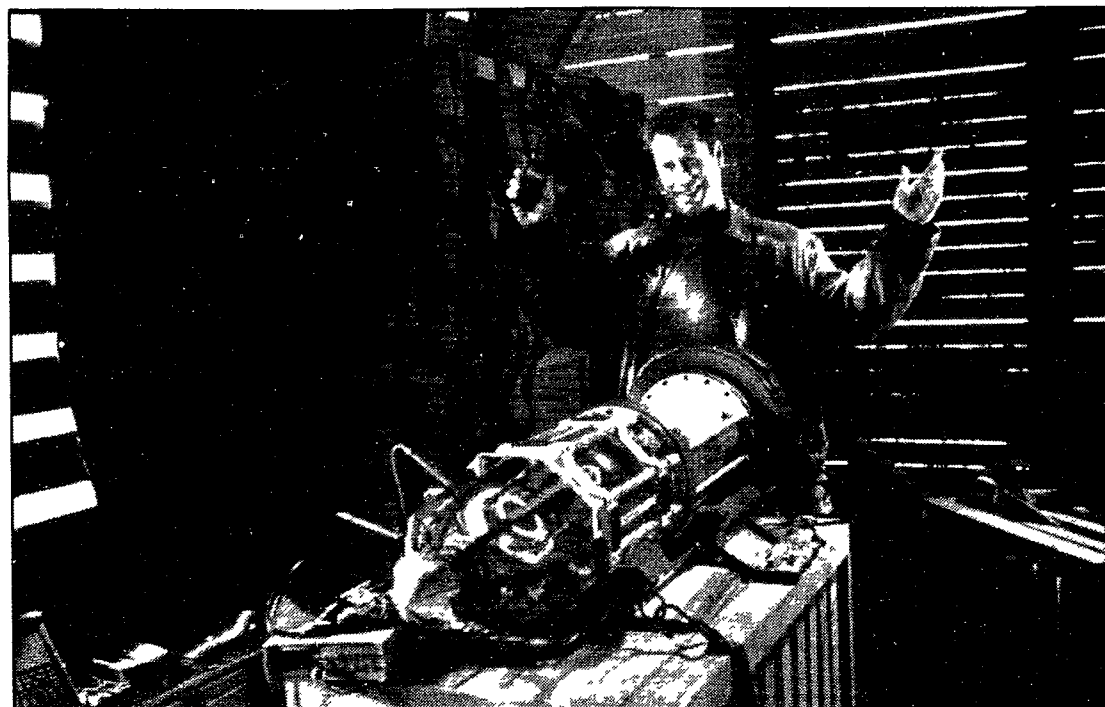

It was this same "anti-typecasting" which led Woo to Travolta. "I enjoyed the contradiction," Woo says, "between the real John Travolta, who has such a warm personality and a certain overall 'twinkle,' to the limitless menace of the character of Vic Deakins." Adds producer Mark Gordon, "We wanted to try something different, rather than hiring someone who had played villainous roles before. We all felt it would be really exciting to surprise the audience, in the casting and in the action sequences, and make them say, 'I wasn't expecting that.'"

Deakins' colleague, and the first one to feel the consequences of his betrayal, is Riley Hale, portrayed by Christian Slater. With millions of lives hanging in the balance the heroic young pilot must find new strength within himself to make a stand against his former mentor.

Slater, like Travolta, enjoyed trying something new with "Broken Arrow." The physical and resourceful Hale is the first adult action hero the acclaimed young

star of such films as "Pump Up the Volume," "Heathers" and "True Romance" has played. "It's a very exciting character for me," enthuses Slater. "He's somebody who comes in and saves the day." Slater, who tackled the role with typical intensity and preparation, adds, "I've been training all my life for a part like this."

In addition to appreciating the opportunity to extend their on-screen personas, cinematic icons Travolta and Slater jumped at the chance to work with a true movie superstar in his own right—director John Woo. Woo's widely-hailed Hong Kong-produced thrillers "The

Killer," "A Better Tomorrow," "Bullet in the Head" and "Hard Boiled," are admired not only for their sensuous mastery of film craft, but also for their humane emphasis on the people at the center of the action.

"Broken Arrow" also stars Samantha Mathis as Park Ranger Terry Carmichael, who teams with Hale to combat Deakins and his gang. Mathis recently co-starred in the features "How to Make an American Quilt" and "The Ameri-

can President."

Figuring prominently in Carmichael's predicament is 'Kelly,' played by football legend Howie Long. Making his motion picture debut as the physically foreboding military officer, Long took on the role during a hiatus from his duties as key analyst on "Fox NFL Sunday." "I couldn't have written a better scenario for myself with which to begin my movie career," says Long. "It was a great opportunity to jump into film work. I've always been lucky like that."

"Eight players scored in the first half," Turner said. "We were

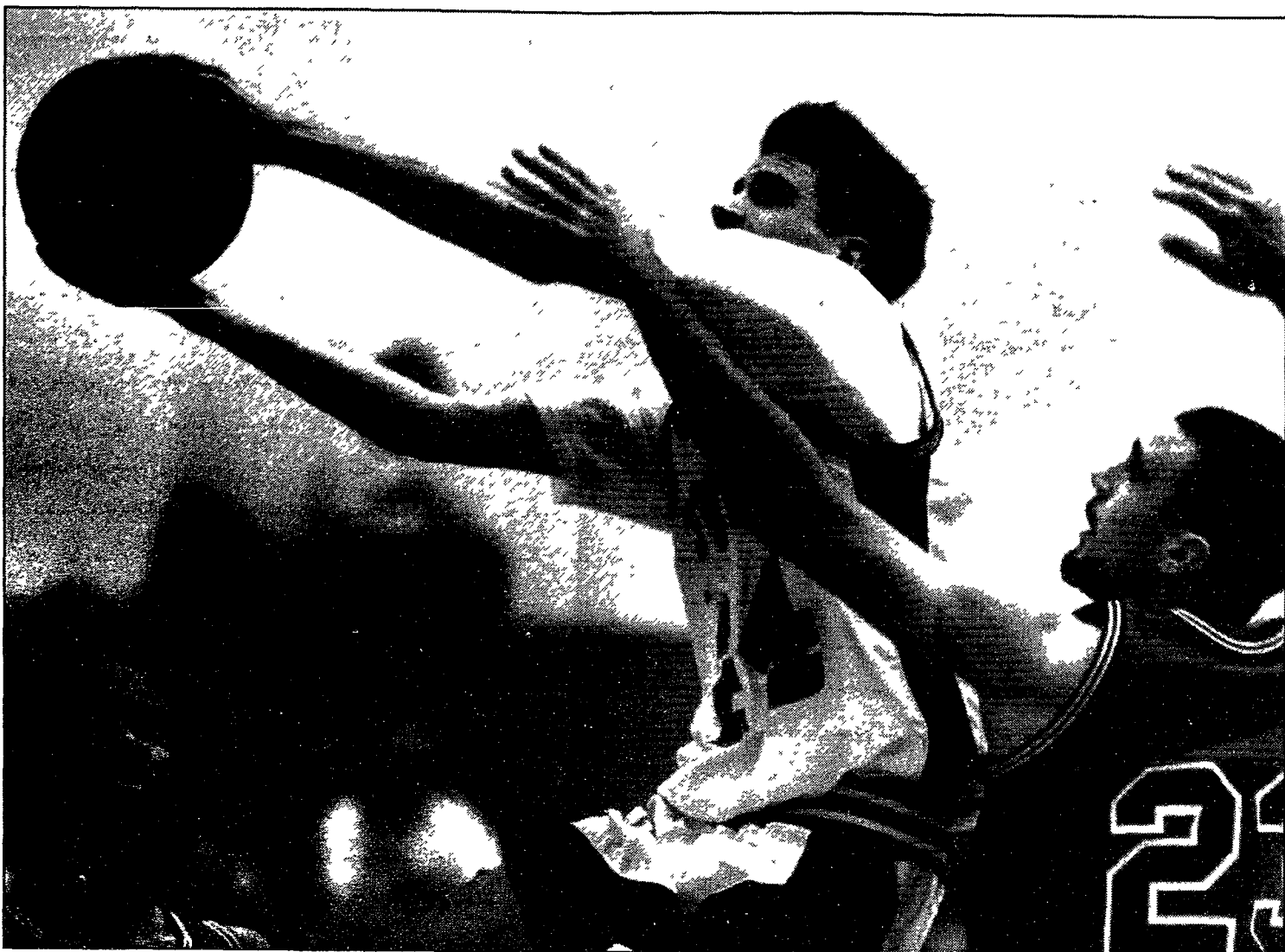

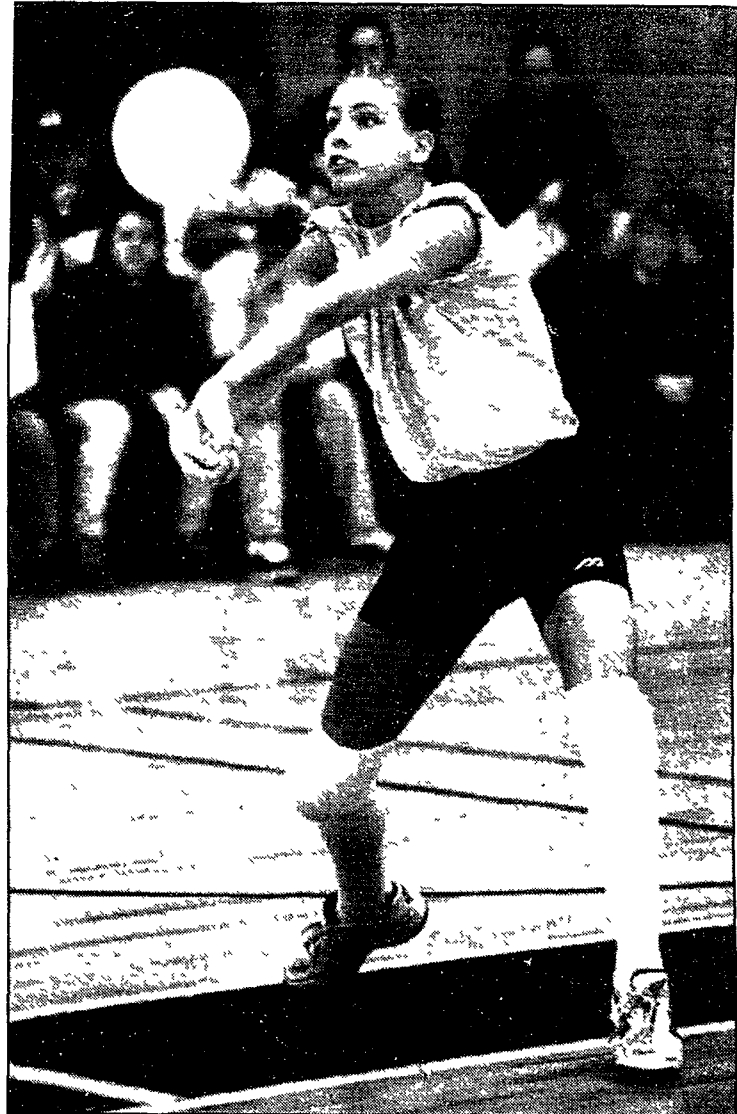

Kyle, Sriraman ready for state wrestling final

James Kyle may not be the best wrestler in the world, but he just might be the hungriest.

Why else would he have spent a month last summer in training camps running and wrestling for eight hours a day? Why else would he spar against an older, more experienced coach who outweighs him by 25 pounds?

No, if you interviewed every wrestler at Saturday's state final in Battle Creek you'd have a hard time finding anyone who wanted to be there more than James Kyle.

"It's a dream come true for me," the Mustang senior said. "Ever since I was little, this is what I've wanted."

Nick Sriraman will join Kyle in representing Northville High at the finals, which begin with preliminary rounds tomorrow. Sriraman will test the waters at 112 pounds and Kyle at 125.

Both the Mustangs are underdogs to earn a top eight place. But no matter how the chips fall, bet on all of them to give maximum effort.

For Kyle, making the state final has been a long, long road.

He began his mat career in the fifth grade in a suburb of Cleveland. He became inspired to try the sport by his uncle, who was an Ohio state champion.

The fact that Kyle was also a little smaller than the other boys also pushed him towards the sport. While he might not have been big enough to play nose tackle, he didn't let it stop him on the mat.

"I used my size to my advantage," Kyle added.

By eighth grade he became accomplished enough to win a Catholic school championship. Kyle got his first taste of wrestling in Michigan his sophomore year of high school after moving to Northville.

Kyle said wrestling styles were much different in Michigan. In Ohio, wrestlers go more for pins.

"You're on your feet a lot more here," he added.

Having the experience in pinning opponents, though, gave him an "advantage," Kyle said.

His first year at NHS Kyle just missed qualifying for the finals. A

single point separated him from a trip to Battle Creek.

After an off junior year, he's come back for an excellent senior year. Kyle goes into the final with a 29-9 record.

"I think my chances are really good," he said. "My goal is to place in the top six."

Kyle said he's at his peak right now. Having wrestled assistant coach Brandon Mardosian, a former Mustang state qualifier, really helped him get ready, he added.

Kyle plans on being aggressive in his matches this weekend.

"I'm going to attack, attack, attack," he said. "I'll mentally break you down if I attack for six minutes."

Sriraman is taking a bit more of a laid-back approach. He said gaining state final experience will help for a serious run next winter.

"My basic goal was to get to the state final," said the junior. "If I go two and out, but know that I gave it my best it'll be no big deal."

Sriraman takes a 27-7 record into tomorrow's action. Like Kyle, it'll be his first trip to the final.

Also like his teammate, Srira-

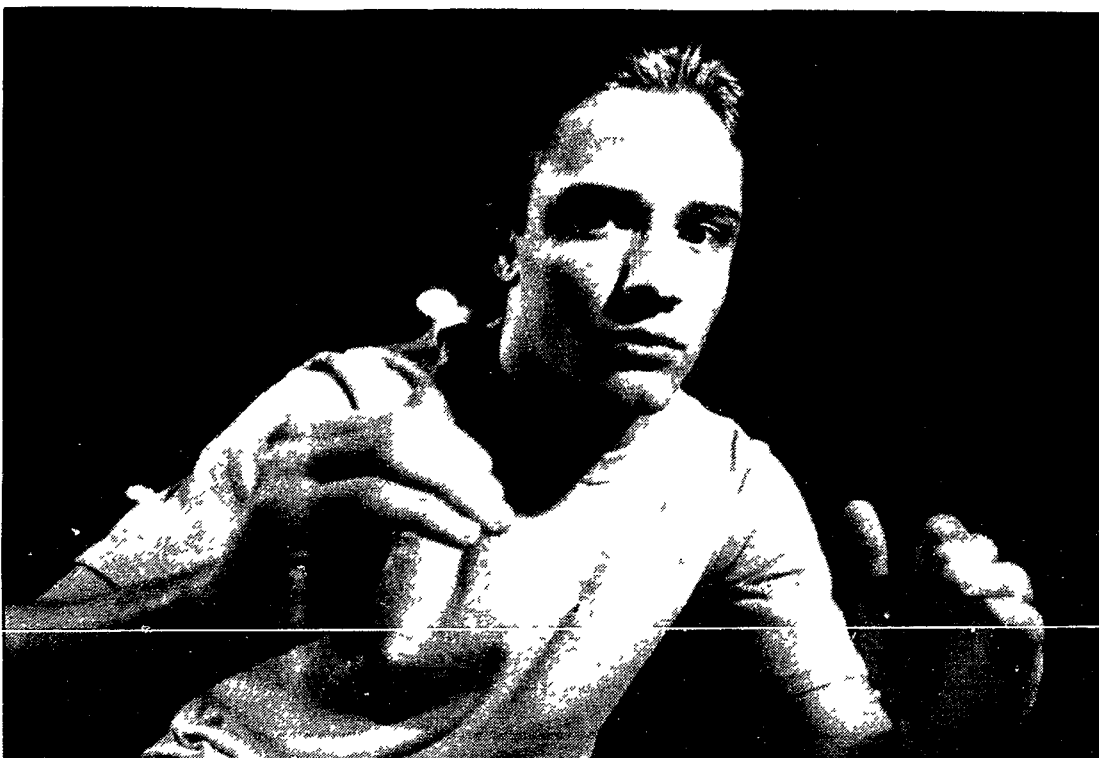

Sriraman has also worked with Mardosian in the wrestling room. "Right now," he said, "I'm in the best shape I've ever been in. Brandon keeps on pushing us."

Migraines do occur in children

Usually associated with adults, migraine headaches do occur in children - from preschool age right up through adolescence. Childhood migraines can be as debilitating as those suffered by adults, and can lead to serious physical and psychological consequences. But in many instances, they go undiagnosed and untreated.

According to Steven Leber, M.D., Ph.D., assistant professor of pediatrics and neurology at the University of Michigan Medical Center, many people experience their first migraines in adolescence, when they affect between 10 percent and 20 percent of all teenagers. However, they can occur even in infancy and some 3 percent of children under age seven have them, as do 5 percent of those between ages seven and 12.

Unlike adult migraines, which usually involve a throbbing on one side of the head and "auras," or visual interference such as zigzags or flashes of light, childhood migraines commonly affect both sides of the head and can be accompanied by nausea, vomiting and temporary neurological impairment. But as if to defy stereotyping, children can also have migraines without any head pain at all.

"A preschooler may fall to the floor looking pale and scared," says Leber, "and if the parents are really astute they may see the eyes jerking back and forth. Usually these children don't complain of having headaches at the time."

Childhood migraines can take many shapes. For example, a child may have recurrent episodes of droopy eyelids or "mini-strokes," in which the youngster becomes weak on one side of the body or temporarily blind. Often, says

Leber, this type of migraine is provoked by minor head trauma, such as heading a soccer ball.

Another form of the condition, thought to have plagued British author Lewis Carroll, has been dubbed "Alice in Wonderland syndrome" because it causes visual distortion in which body parts appear to shrink and elongate. Another form of migraine can temporarily leave a child literally speechless.

These neurological effects can last from minutes to hours, Leber says.

While the majority of childhood migraines cause temporary discomfort at best and neurological impairment at worst, they can, in rare cases, cause permanent damage.

"The most dangerous thing about migraines is that on a rare occasion they can cause strokes," Leber says. "The incidence of stroke is very low, but it does happen, particularly with basilar migraines."

A basilar migraine is a severe headache at the back of the head that affects the brain stem and can cause a loss of vision and arrhythmia, or an irregular heartbeat. According to Leber, because of the danger of these migraines, which are most common in adolescent girls, they should be treated by a doctor even after only one or two episodes.

As with many things that occur in the wonderland of the brain, the exact cause of migraines is unclear. What is known, though, is that up to 90 percent of such cases are hereditary. Neurologists believe that during a migraine, chemicals (neuropeptides) are released in the walls of the blood vessels at the base of the brain. This release causes an inflammation of the blood vessels that results in head pain.

Between 5 and 20 percent of all migraines

have clear triggers, such as milk, chocolate or the flavor-enhancer monosodium glutamate, or MSG, commonly used by Chinese restaurants. Menstruation, head injury or a change in sleep habits can also lead to an episode.

For a child suspected of having migraines, the common form of diagnosis is a clinical one, matching the patient's complaints to a laundry list of common symptoms. But often the diagnosis is an exclusionary one, ruling out more serious conditions such as meningitis and brain tumors.

If it is determined that a child is indeed suffering from migraines, there are several treatment approaches a physician may recommend.

While there are many drugs available for children with frequent headaches, the one most commonly used is a blood pressure medicine called propranolol, which may be taken regularly for six months or longer. Propranolol can have side effects, though, ranging from decreased heart rate and exercise fatigue to mood swings.

Another new drug on the market, Imtrex, is the first designed specifically to target migraines. However, it is approved presently only for adults.

When a child is in the midst of an episode, often the best form of immediate relief is sleep. "Sometimes all they need is a nap and then they are fine," Leber says. Other treatments such as biofeedback and hypnosis have proven effective, as has stress reduction.

Not surprisingly many kids find that their migraines get better in the summer - when there's no school.

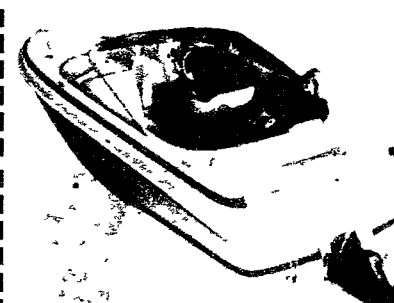

Osteoporosis affects millions of Americans

of their lives to live after menopause.

Almost half of all women over age 50 will experience bone fractures due to osteoporosis. One-third of women age 65 and older have vertebral (spinal) fractures, the most common break caused by osteoporosis.

Most women don't realize they might have osteoporosis until a bone fracture occurs because the disease progresses so slowly. Once a bone does break, osteoporosis is a painful, disabling, and often devastating disease.

Bones are formed over a lifetime, with peak bone mass achieved by the late 30s or early 40s. Age-related bone loss is a universal phenomenon that begins around menopause. Peak

bone mass, therefore, is a crucial factor in a woman's ultimate risk of developing osteoporosis.

It is common knowledge that children under age 12 need calcium daily for growing strong bones. But it is less known that between the ages of 10 and 12 half of one's adult skeletal mass is formed, or that during the adolescent growth spurt the amount of calcium in the bones triples. Or that starvation diets during adolescence can give a 16-year-old the bone-health of a 70-year-old. Or that bones may still be growing throughout one's 40s.

Bones are remodeled throughout one's lifetime, with continual loss and addition. Factors that accelerate the rate of bone loss or slow the rate of gain increase the risks of osteoporosis, such as extreme weight loss, complete bed rest, a calcium-poor diet, physical inactivity, and smoking and alcohol use. Reducing these modifiable risks at each stage of life is the best insurance for having strong, healthy bones at every age.

Hormonal status is another critical risk factor for bone health and is as important for menopausal women as it is for their adolescent daughters. Very low body fat resulting from high levels of physical activity and/or starvation diets can delay menarche, the initiation of regular menstrual periods, preventing the production of sufficient amounts of hormones to maintain good bone health.

Diet and physical activity are central to bone

health at every stage of life, but certainly both of these factors change as we age - most of us don't eat the same foods and in the same amounts as we did when we were children nor are we as active as we were then.

Other things also change as we age, including the development of chronic diseases such as high blood pressure. Medications taken for such diseases can alter bone health and therefore are important to consider when evaluating one's overall risk.

For women, the reproductive years, including the number of pregnancies, breast-feeding history and prenatal diet can play an important role in bone health going into menopause. Whether one took oral contraceptives before menopause and for how long, as well as one's lifelong dietary habits also affect bone health.

Some risk factors, such as racial background, cannot be changed; however, the greater one's non-modifiable risks, the more important it is to make every effort to reduce as many modifiable risks as possible.

Although every woman's overall risk for osteoporosis increases with age, it is never too late to improve bone health and decrease the risks for building good bones.

Sales of Japanese-owned properties are on the rise

The sale of Japanese-owned real estate in the United States is at a record high level. And international business experts predict property sales will increase throughout the year.

By the end of 1995, the Japanese had sold, contracted to sell or were actively marketing nearly \$10 billion in real estate assets, according to Jack R. Rodman, director of Pacific Rim practice for E&Y Kenneth Leventhal Real Estate Group, an international consulting firm.

"Under mounting pressure from their government and financial markets to write off bad real estate loans, Japanese lenders and owners of U.S. real estate will accelerate significantly during the remainder of this year, with luxury hotels, resorts and office buildings topping the list," he said.

"The lenders have no choice. The cost of raising capital has soared and selling properties is a good way for the banks to show the world they are finally addressing their problems. At the same time, the recent government rescue of a

To the left of the entry is a modest living room with a bay window facing the front yard.

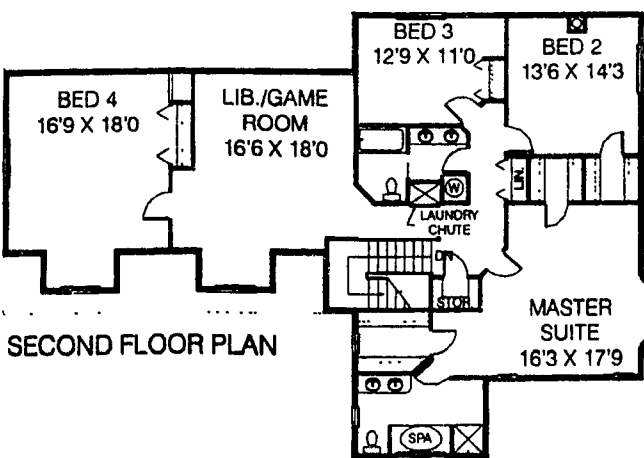
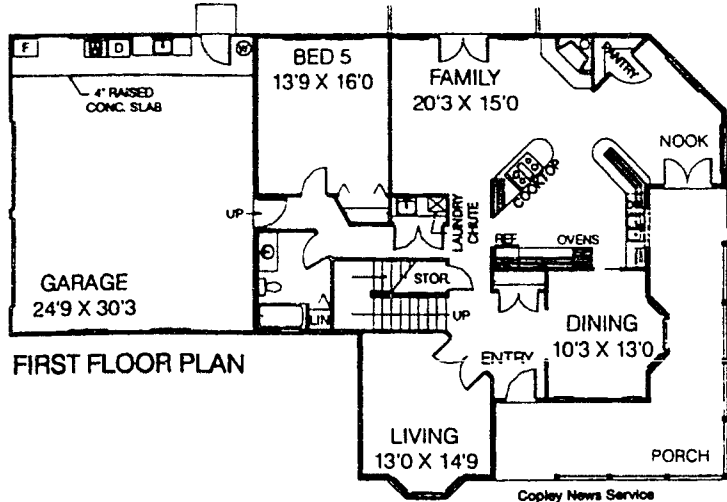

A small niche off the kitchen has a sink and laundry chute from the top floor. Extra storage space is available under the stairway.

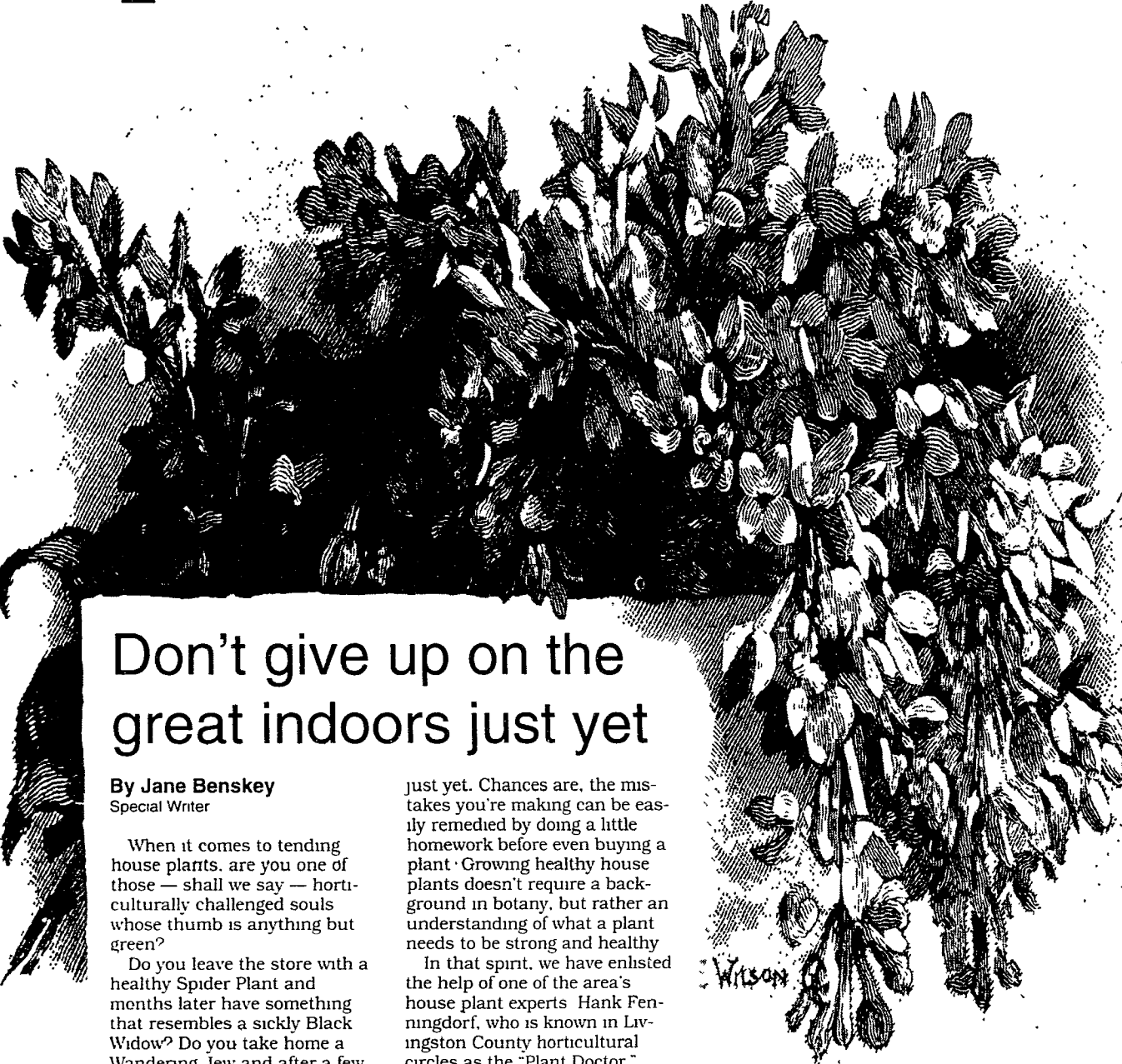
The two-car garage has a utility room in the rear.

Green thumbs up...or down



Don't give up on the great indoors just yet

When it comes to tending house plants, are you one of those — shall we say — horticulturally challenged souls whose thumb is anything but green?

Do you leave the store with a healthy Spider Plant and months later have something that resembles a sickly Black Widow? Do you take home a Wandering Jew and after a few months its wandering days are over?

And worse yet, you haven't a clue as to what you are doing wrong?

With a few failures under your belt, you may conclude two things. One, that as an indoor gardener you're a washout, and two, that your botanical pursuits will have to consist of tending to silk plants.

Don't give up on the thought of surrounding yourself with lush, green and REAL plants

just yet. Chances are, the mistakes you're making can be easily remedied by doing a little homework before even buying a plant. Growing healthy house plants doesn't require a background in botany, but rather an understanding of what a plant needs to be strong and healthy.

In that spirit, we have enlisted the help of one of the area's house plant experts. Hank Fenningdorf, who is known in Livingston County horticultural circles as the "Plant Doctor."

Fenningdorf, who has worked at Country Lane Florists in Howell for 19 years, has a degree from Michigan State University in floriculture. His background includes a five-year stint tending the plants at a private estate in Grosse Pointe and 25 years as the owner of greenhouses in Southfield.

Often one of the biggest mistakes you can make in selecting a plant is not choosing the plant

It's a good time for soil testing

Want to have your soil tested? To do so, you've got to go out to the garden and collect a sample. How you collect this small amount of soil is important if you want proper results.

Wait until the soil to be tested is moist, but not soggy. Scrape away any surface debris and then cut a v-shaped wedge 6- to 7-inches deep into the soil with a clean shovel, then cut a 1-inch slice from the smooth side of the hole you made. Cut out a 1-inch vertical cone from the center of that slice. Then repeat the same process in a couple of other places.

Mix the soil together thoroughly in a clean plastic container using a clean trowel, then measure out the amount of soil requested by the lab from the mixture. Don't touch the soil with your hands, it could contaminate your sample and throw off results.

Your local cooperative extension agents usually offer inexpensive soil testing, but be sure they can provide organic advice for any corrections the test deems necessary. Also, ask the extension agent to tailor such recommendations to the size of your garden; that is, the amount of amendments (mulch, fertiliz-

er, compost, etc.) that you should apply per 100 or 1,000 square feet, instead of per acre.

SPRING TIPS

The term pH refers to the acidity of alkaline of the soil.

Allow cyclamen, poinsettias and other Christmas flowering plants to bloom as long as they like. Fertilize every 2 to 3 weeks and place in a cool spot for the night.

Cranberry, and other berry and fruit stains, should be attended to immediately if possible because stains are hard to remove after they dry.

Most fruit stains should be removed with boiling water if it does not harm the cloth. Sometimes warm water is effective. Its best not to use soap, as the alkalis may set some berry and fruit stains.

Many flower plants are sold as house plants which have a limited value; when the bloom fades the plants are not worth the effort or space they occupy. Enjoy them when in bloom and then discard them.

Most house plant problems are due to neglect, rather than disease. Low humidity is the the problem, especially during winter. This causes

Soil testing tips

Have your lawn or garden soil tested by your local extension office so you can be sure you're doing the right nutritional things.

■ Soil should be moist but not soggy and be careful to keep surface debris out of any samples.

■ Cut a V-shape wedge about 7 inches deep into soil with a clean shovel. Cut a 1/2-inch slice from the smooth side of the hole and cut a 1-inch vertical cone from the center of this second slice. Repeat this process in several spots.

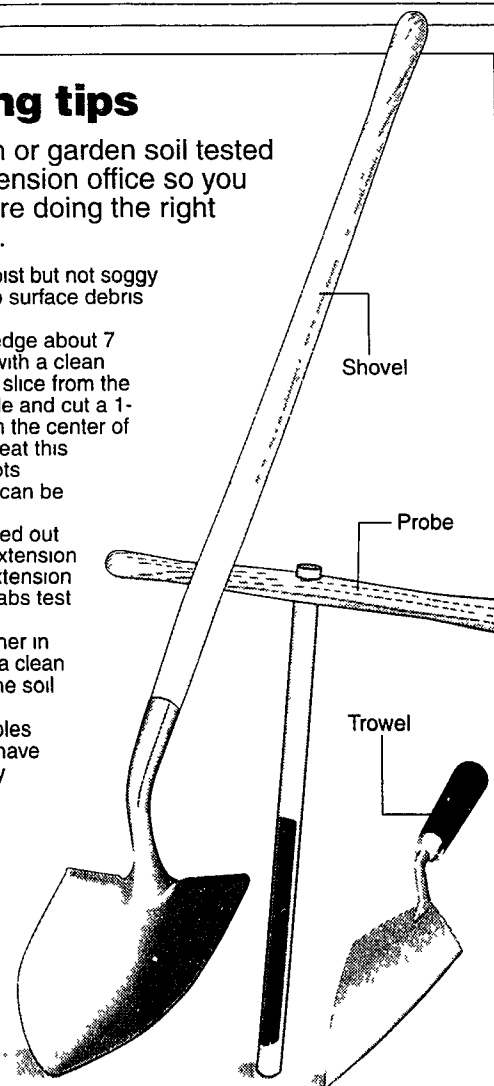
■ A soil probe also can be used.

■ Soil should be dried out before taken to your extension office. In addition to extension offices, many private labs test soil, too.

■ Mix the soil together in a clean container with a clean trowel. Do not touch the soil with your hands.

■ Do not take samples from spots you know have been mulched, heavily fertilized or recently disturbed.

wisely, Fenningdorf says. Several factors should be considered before purchasing a plant.

First, you must decide how much effort you will be willing to put into caring for the plant. Because not all plants are alike, their needs will differ, as well. Some plants can handle erratic care — like over-watering one week and neglect the next — whereas others require careful, regular care.

For example, Fenningdorf says, the delicate Boston Fern requires a great deal of attention and care. Because of its extensive root system, it needs to be watered differently than most plants (from the bottom of the pot), and it requires an environment as close as possible to that of its natural habitat: moist, cool air and light shade.

Whereas the hardy Seloum, a member of the Philodendron family, does well with little care, and in fact, can tolerate less than optimum conditions, like erratic watering or low light.

The second factor to consider is where

you are going to place the plant in your home. The light exposure a plant receives is critical to the life of a plant, especially since not all plants require the same amount of light.

A Boston Fern placed in a direct sun location will most certainly die, while a succulent plant, like a Kalanchoe, will thrive. By the same token, insufficient light can be just as lethal to some plants as an overabundance of light is to others.

"Just because a plant looks pretty or you like it, it doesn't mean that it's going to grow good for you where you put it in your house," says Fenningdorf.

Generally speaking, there are about four light-exposure categories for indoor plants: very low, low, medium and high.

Fenningdorf characterizes the light settings this way. Very low light would be an area far away from a window, low light would be a north window, medium light would be a east window and high light would be a south or west window.

Another type of light exposure is indirect and direct light. Indirect light would be an area relatively close to a window that gets light, but no direct sunlight.

Direct light are areas that get several hours of direct sun daily.

It's also important to note that light intensities vary throughout the year. For example, the direct sun of winter is not as intense as the direct sun in summer.

With this in mind, take some time to study the light levels in the areas you'd like to locate a plant before heading out to the store.

When shopping for a plant, Fenningdorf suggests dealing with a greenhouse or shop that specializes in plants, because it will be staffed with people who are knowledgeable about plants. Not only can they guide you in your selection, but they can speak in specifics regarding the care needed for each particular plant.

When selecting a plant, look for one that is full, green and healthy. There should be some new growth and small spaces in between leaves. Pass on plants that have large gaps between the new leaves. It could mean either that the plant was over-fertilized or that it spent too much time in inadequate light, and you don't want to start out with a plant that has problems.

Making the right selection is half the task. Once you've gotten your plant home, remember it will need regular care in order to thrive.

Fenningdorf likens it to caring for a baby: "If you treat them like a baby, you talk to them, and take care of them, they're going to grow good for you."

The biggest part of a plant's care is watering, and that's where a lot of mistakes occur. For many people, it's a case of either extreme. Either they flood their plants with too much water, or they dry out their plants with little or no water. In either case, their plants are not likely to survive long.

The best way to gauge whether your plants need water? Fancy water meters or chirping animal gadgets? Forget them, says Fenningdorf. "The Lord gave you the best indicator and that's your finger."

To determine if your plant needs water just touch the top of the soil where it feels dry, then press your finger down in as far as you can. If it's dry, then water thor-

oughly; if you feel any moisture, wait two days and then water thoroughly.

Fenningdorf recommends feeding or fertilizing your plants every time you water. He has little use for fertilizer spikes, but instead recommends a water soluble fertilizer that is less than three percent urea-based nitrogen. Fertilizer with a higher nitrogen content can burn the plant, especially if the plant is dry.

It's also important to remember that plant's watering needs change with the seasons, says Fenningdorf. For example, in the winter when the furnace is on, your plants will dry out faster and will require more humidity. Whereas in the summer in air-conditioned homes the reverse will be true.

So all you discouraged indoor gardeners, take heart. Resolve to turn over a new leaf. Follow the "Plant Doctor's" practical advice, and before you know it, you may find yourself having a bloomin' good time!

major credit union and bank effectively drained Japan's deposit insurance fund and revealed the vulnerability of other financial institutions."

Now, senior executives of Japanese banks, insurance, leasing, finance, real estate and construction companies are confirming they intend to aggressively dispose of real estate in the United States, especially hotels and resorts in California and Hawaii.

"Buyers of Hawaiian properties are offering as much as 35 percent more than last year, and the weakness of the dollar against the yen has created favorable conditions for selling luxury hotel properties that had lost much value since 1990," Rodman said.

He also noted that about half the executives he recently surveyed are currently in the process of marketing and selling U.S. real estate, and will continue to do so until late in 1996 or 1997.

Nearly 75 percent of lenders and 50 percent of property owners said they are most likely to sell their hotel and resort properties, the survey revealed. About 20 percent of those lenders and 33 percent of the owners expect to sell office properties.

"The survey suggests that the Japanese have lowered their recovery expectations somewhat," Rodman said.

"Almost half of those responding are willing to sell if they recover 60 cents for every dollar invested, while a third will accept no less than 70 to 80 cents. Last year, only 22 percent of respondents would sell if they recovered less than 70 cents on the dollar."

The executives favored government actions to help banks resolve their loan problems. However, the majority did not think the Japanese government should use taxpayer money for a bailout that looms over a financial system with an estimated \$500 billion worth of bad loans, mostly tied to real estate.

"The remainder of this year is a good time for Japanese to sell and U.S. investors to buy," Rodman said.

"Opportunity funds, flush with some \$10 billion, have realized substantial gains on their investments in troubled real estate portfolios over the past few years and are eager to realize high returns by reinvesting this capital in Japanese-owned properties."

Q. What's a good source of information about the effective operation of a condo association — things

that a new HOA board member should know?

Also, the Community Association Institute (CAI) recently launched an educational on-line service called Community Associations Online (CAO).

"Associations no longer have to work in isolation from one another," said CAO manager Brent Herrington. "There's no need to reinvent the wheel."

leaf drop or browning leaves. The cure is to simply increase humidity in the room with your plants and it will reduce the problem. Misting should be done only when absolutely necessary, since any wet leaf surface invites bacteria or fungi to infest leaves and cause spots.

GARDENING CALENDAR

Stay off your lawn during periods of

little or no snow. Excessive traffic will injure frozen turf.

If not already done, order seeds at once. The more planning and preparation you do now, the easier your spring gardening chores will be.

Check mulches placed around plants late last fall to see if they are still in place. For the next 2 months, heaving of soil can be a real problem.

Prune grapes without delay. If left too late, bleeding from the cut ends will occur.

This is a good time to air layer dracaena, diffebachia and rubber plants, especially if they have grown too tall and leggy.

Yearly pruning of fruit trees, especially apples, should be done now through mid-March.

Even though this is a good time to prune, try to keep away from certain trees now and wait until they come into full leaf later this spring. These "bleeder" trees are maple, beech, dogwood, elm and sycamore.

Children's china popular in early 1900s

Q. This is a picture of a child's china dessert set that I received for Christmas over 70 years ago. It consists of 21 pieces, including the teapot. Each dish is decorated with American Indians, wigwams and animals. They are marked "Made in Japan." Does my set have any value?

A. In the early 1900s, children's china dishes were widely produced by a variety of manufacturers in Japan for the U.S. market. Your dessert set is a popular collectible.

Its value would probably be about \$225 to \$250.

Q. I have a semivitreous wash set that has this mark on each piece. The set consists of a shaving mug, hot water pitcher, covered soap dish, toothbrush holder, covered chamber pot, large pitcher and bowl. They are white and decorated with lilacs and roses, and trimmed in gold. I would like to know the value of my set.

A. Your wash set was made by Knowles, Taylor & Knowles, East Liverpool, Ohio. They made semivitreous dinnerware, hotel ware and wash sets. This mark was used from 1900 to 1915.

Your set would probably be worth about

\$600 to \$700

Q. I hope you can identify a small teapot that was given to me several years ago. It is decorated with a man wearing a blue jacket, red pants and yellow stockings. There are blue and yellow bands at the base and middle of the teapot. On the bottom it is marked "HB — Quimper."

What is the approximate age and value of my pitcher?

A. Your teapot was made by Hubaudiere Bousquet Factory in Quimper, France. They made tin-glazed earthenware pottery that was hand decorated. The vintage of your teapot is circa 1900.

It would probably be worth about \$300 to \$350.

Q. My great-grandmother bought a bisque figurine of a pink pig in 1901 that was made in Germany. It is a pig sitting in a green washtub holding a baby pig wrapped in a blanket. In front of the pig is a white rabbit sitting on a bar that is across the tub. On the side of the tub are the words "Was not happy until he got it."

Some of my relatives also own these figurines and we would appreciate any information you can provide.

A. Figures of porcelain and bisque pink pigs were all the rage around the turn of the century. The pigs were usually pink with green decorations and were often accompanied by humorous quotes.

They were made by numerous potters in Austria, England and Germany. These perky porkers were frequently sold at dime stores or were carnival souvenirs.

The value of your pink pig would probably be about \$75 to \$85 in good condition.

Q. We have a "Blatz Old Heidelberg" plaster sign that hung above the bar of our saloon for many years. It is a

picture of a young woman carrying beer steins while dancing on a keg. She is wearing a red skirt with a white blouse and apron.

The sign measures approximately 39 by 20 inches. Is it worth anything?

A. Brewiana-related items are very collectible. Your sign was made in the early 1900s. It would be worth about \$50 to \$75 in very good condition.

BOOK REVIEW

"Collector's Encyclopedia of Nippon Porcelain; Third Series" by Joan Van Patten completes her trilogy devoted to Japanese export porcelain.

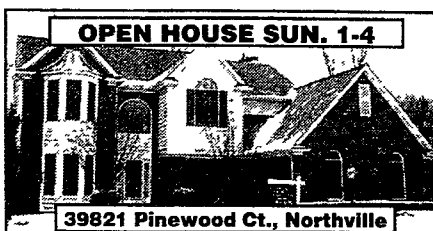

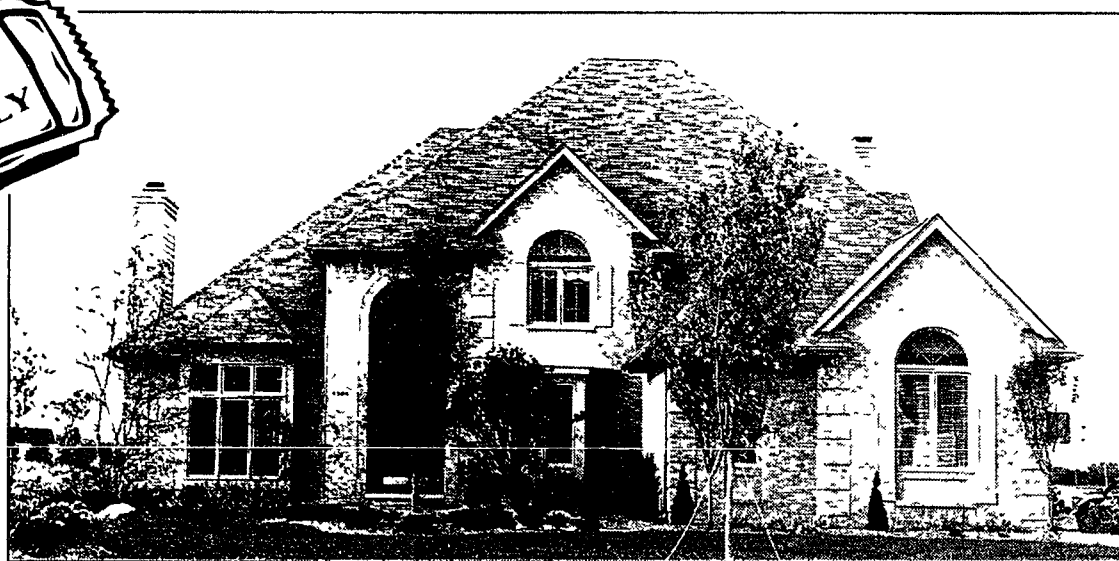

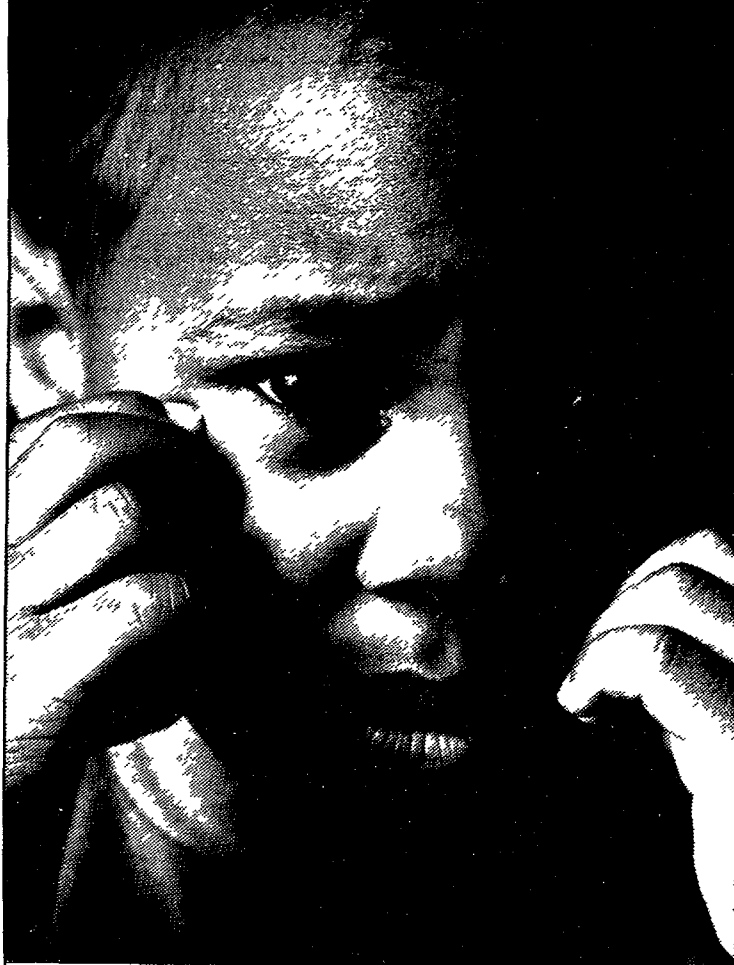

Artistic Touch pros know their nails

Susan Griffan and Lisa Morgan know their nails.

They are the owners and operators of The Artistic Touch Professional Nail Boutique which opened last August on Main Street in downtown Whitmore Lake.

Artistic Touch is a full-service professional nail salon offering anything from nail painting to relaxing paraffin dips for hands and feet, to the traditional pedicure, manicure and acrylic nails.

Though most of their customers are female, it's not just for women, said Morgan.

"Men enjoy everything too," she said.

Men sometimes overlook the care of their nails and feet.

"It's like brushing your teeth. You have to maintain them (nails)," said Morgan. "It beats chewing them off."

The two met and became friends while attending New Midwest Beauty School. They were both seeking their general cosmetology licenses, but when they took a class in nail art they were hooked.

"We both are artsy kind of people," said Griffan. "So when they started doing nail art we fell in love with it."

"To a lot of people this is their pick-me-up. It makes them feel better knowing they are doing

Editor's Letter

Dear Readers,

For the past three years, I have been struggling with the symptoms of a chronic disease. Although my medical care has been excellent, there are some difficult issues to face: one, the prescribed medication has serious side effects; two, the disease is considered incurable; and three, the condition is characterized by flare-ups followed by remissions, followed by periods where you just don't know what will happen. You tend to become consumed by your illness.

Not being one to take things lying down (so to speak), I have begun exploring alternative approaches to keeping myself well. During this research, it occurred to me that we can become defined by our disease: "She's an asthmatic, he suffers from a heart condition, she has diabetes." And the association is usually negative; you assume suffering.

What I've learned about the alternative therapies is that they promote healing of the body and spirit. They encourage strengthening the body, building it up, caring for it so it can, if not prevent or heal the disease, at least lessen its affect on your whole system. Some sources even recommend "embracing" an illness, using it to find out more about yourself, to slow down, to care more.

For example, when arthritis would tend to limit activities because of stiffness and pain; perhaps, you could use the condition as an incentive for beginning a gentle stretching routine, or walking and swimming. You could go further and explore massage therapy, or meditation. Those people with asthma need to find ways to reduce the triggers that bring on an attack, which can include environmental conditions, diet, even stress. Diabetics must watch what they eat; this can be a reason for developing a wonderfully healthy diet.

Practitioners are brilliant and dedicated, technology is unsurpassed and research uncovers new treatment advances every day. That medical care is there for us. But it also can be helpful to look at other approaches to caring for our bodies, our selves. I invite you to read through this issue, it may get you started on your own path.

A Viable Alternative

The 54-year-old college professor was adamant — “alternative medicine” was highly suspect. Incredible claims, no proof. Not something for serious consideration, at least not when it comes to his health care.

Perhaps this attitude is not surprising for a man who, as a mathematician, has built his career on logic, reason and proofs. “But hon,” his wife says gently. “You are using an alternative therapy.

The supplements for your prostate are herbs from the health food store.” He answers slowly: “Well, we did read about those in the New York Times. Research showed they worked.” Such is the case with scores of alternative, natural or holistic therapies, where converts — or at least those willing to give them a try — are growing in number each day.

The first U.S. teaching program in alternative medicine was established in the 1970s at Montefiore Medical Center in New York City. Similar programs are now in vogue across the country. For example, a Tufts University School of Medicine course called “Complementary Healing Systems” has been reported as one of the school’s most popular electives.

Supporters cite a number of reasons why holistic medicine and natural therapies are becoming popular:

- They allow people to control much of their own health care. Alternative therapies and their products are non-prescription, so people must take the initiative to learn about how they work before buying and trying them.
- Holistic medicine is based on prevention. Holistic doctors are trained to look beyond symptoms; that means getting at the root of a medical problem so it can be



prevented in the future. Alternative philosophies don’t discount disease, but they do look very carefully at how to keep the body stable and strong.

- According to the National Center for Homeopathy, holistic medicine considers a person healthy when his or her mind, body and spirit are healthy. In conventional medical thought, health is seen simply as the absence of disease.

What you can’t expect from alternative medicine is reams of scientific evidence. Some studies are showing that select alternative therapies work — other proof is more anecdotal. In fact, the National Institutes of Health has recently opened an Office of Alternative Medicine to determine which alternative remedies do (and don’t) have therapeutic value.

When asked about his patients using alternative therapies, Thomas Schwenk, M.D., chairman of the University of Michigan’s Department of Family Practice, says he uses a “moderate approach,” discouraging his patients only when he believes an alternative could be medical-

ly or financially problematic. “Then, my role is to be accessible, interested and knowledgeable,” he says. Unfortunately,

most traditional doctors don’t know when their patients are seeking alternative care. Schwenk finds this discouraging, he says, because knowing what treatments his patients are trying is important to the care he provides. One concern, he mentions, is the use of nutritional supplements.

While most aren’t physically harmful, he says, they can be expensive and probably aren’t doing much for the patient. “A well-balanced diet takes care of most of your nutritional needs,” he says.

Most natural or alternative healers don’t believe in abandoning traditional medicine; the two approaches should be used as needed, they say.

“No one system is the answer. You need to use what’s best for the patient,” explains Kathleen Anzick, D.O., of the Grass Lakes Medical Center, who practices homeopathy and other alternative treatments. “If you’re in an accident, you want to be in the best emergency room. If you have chronic infections, you may want to see a homeopath.”

Generalizing about the worth or unworthiness of alternative therapies is impossible Schwenk notes, simply because much depends on the type of therapy, provider and extent of claims. He recommends talking with your traditional doctor before starting any alternative treatments.

The following is a look at some of the alternative therapies available. For easier reading, we’ve separated them into categories, recognizing, still, that most therapies work on all parts of the person.



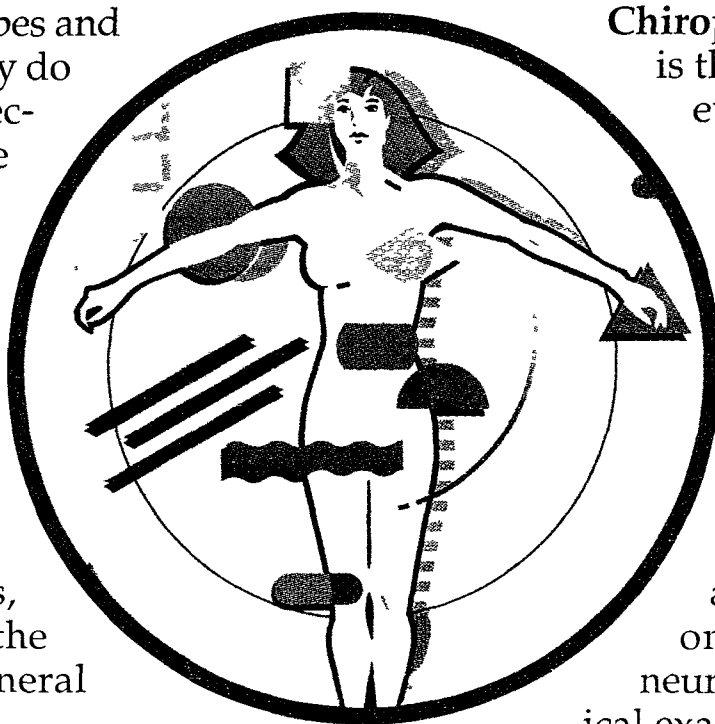
For the Body

Aerobics classes, Jane Fonda tapes and home exercise equipment may do well for the body, but not necessarily for the soul. These therapies are designed for all parts of you.

Acupuncture — Acupuncture is based on the ancient Chinese belief that health is determined by a person's ability to maintain a harmonious internal environment. A person's life force, or "Chi" is affected by pressure on points of the body. Fine needles are inserted into these points, believed to influence the function of the internal organs, the mind and the general state of body energy.

Whether such treatment works is still up for debate. "There's a large-enough volume of data to offer compelling but not conclusive evidence of acupuncture's effectiveness," says Joseph Helms, M.D., director of physician acupuncture education at the UCLA School of Medicine.

Some studies do suggest its possible effectiveness with asthma, bronchitis, chronic pain, osteoarthritis, headaches, postoperative pain and drug and alcohol addiction.



Chiropractic — The idea behind this therapy is that the body is always trying to balance everything within itself. When anything interrupts the balance, there is some loss of function, says Daniel Berlinger, D.C., of Berlinger Chiropractic in Farmington Hills and Southfield.

Chiropractic works to correct any misalignment of the spine through adjustments. Berlinger says everyone should get a chiropractic exam — from there it can be determined whether one, more or no adjustments are needed. These decisions are based on an assessment of posture, motion, neuro and X-ray findings, along with a physical exam.

If you've had a recent injury, he says, it's important to come in. But even if you think a fall or accident hasn't caused injury, it may have. "It could be a long time from the point of trauma to the point of pain," Berlinger adds. "It might be a month, a year or three years before symptoms will appear."

Chiropractors work to correct pain of the back, neck, jaw, shoulder, arm, hip and leg; numbness; injuries; headaches; strains, sprains and spasms; and joint problems, among other conditions. Chiropractic is covered under Medicare and Medicaid and most health care programs, says Berlinger. It is also authorized under Worker's Compensation.

Herbal/botanical remedies — Use of herbs to treat a variety of conditions goes back to ancient times, says Jackie Schrupp, editor of the newsletter of the Society for the Advancement of Natural Teachings, a nonprofit organization.

"Some elements come from the root, some from the bark and some from the leaf," she says, adding that Echinacea can be used to treat a cold, Chamomile is for insomnia, Slippery Elm neutralizes stomach acid and peppermint improves digestion and relieves headaches, she says. To clean the blood and for overall well-being, Schrupp recommends Pau d' Arco.

Bach Flower remedies use English wildflowers to cure many emotional and mental ailments, Schrupp says. For example, she says that Aspen is taken for fear; for uncertainty, Wild Oat is recommended and for loneliness, people can try Water Violet.

Homeopathy — This therapy was introduced in the late 1700s by Samuel Hahnemann, M.D., a German physician searching for a gentler approach to medical care than the bleeding and purging of the day. He suggested that the actual substances causing disease could help the body fight the disease when given in minute doses.

Critics say the doses of homeopathic medicine are so diluted that the curative substance can't even be measured and may not be beneficial.

So far, studies aren't overwhelmingly in support of

homeopathy's curative powers. There are about 15 studies the *British Medical Journal* analyzed that reported homeopathic treatments were beneficial — about 2,500 others weren't up to western scientific standards. In one that passed the Journal test, a homeopathic medicine outperformed a placebo in bringing relief to 28 patients allergies due to dust mites.

Homeopaths believe that all symptoms people experience are the body's "message" or attempt to restore itself to health. So, for instance, instead of trying to suppress a cough, a homeopath would give a remedy to stimulate that cough so it does its job of clearing congested lungs, after which the body can continue healing.

Supporters say homeopathy can treat colds, flu, stomach upset, teething, colic, earaches, asthma, depression, anxiety and a host of other conditions.

Massage/therapeutic touch — Both of these therapies work under the principle that your body is in an energy field, says Kathy Sinnett, R.N., a certified therapeutic touch healer and instructor with the Holistic Health Center in Livonia. "I can feel with my hands where blocks are in the body. I feel for them then move my hands in a specific wave so the body can heal itself," she says. That is, heal itself of chronic pain, back pain, surgical pain — any type, especially if it's new. Therapeutic touch reduces stress and causes a relaxation response almost immediately, Sinnett says.

Therapeutic massage also relaxes the body and it is good for circulation, says Schrupp. It involves stroking or kneading the body. Swedish massage is a more vigorous form of this.

Naturopathy — Doctors of naturopathy treat disease by following the laws of Nature, and stimulate the body to heal itself. This may include fasting to eliminate toxins, homeopathy, osteopathy, chiropractic, acupuncture, biofeedback and herbal remedies, among others. They don't use drugs or surgery.

Nutritional therapy/counseling — This approach uses food or food supplements to maintain or attain good health, says Schrupp. "People can learn to protect themselves with nutritional supplements." A person who has a heart condition would, for example, be given an enzyme supplement rather than a drug, she explains.

More and more, nutritional therapy is moving into the mainstream. The National Institutes of Health is studying the nutrients found in fruits and vegetables — and determining there are significant benefits in fighting cancer and other diseases. The University of Michigan, the University of Illinois and other institutions around the country are researching the protective properties of produce.

T'ai Chi Ch'uan — The ancient Chinese practice of T'ai Chi Ch'uan emphasizes the integration of the "Chi" or internal energy, with the body and mind. It is characterized as "meditation in motion," according to Wasantha Young, a certified T'ai Chi Ch'uan instructor at the Peaceful Dragon School of T'ai Chi Ch'uan in Ann Arbor. It uses slow, graceful movements and breathing techniques to relax the mind and body.

For the Mind

You've probably all heard the story: two doctors are standing outside a patient's door, describing the patient's grave prognosis. There is really no hope. The patient, not understanding the "doctor-ese" being spoken, mistakenly thinks the doctors are saying he will recover completely. He does.

Just what is the mind capable of? Plenty, as these therapies demonstrate.

Biofeedback - This approach uses equipment to detect physical responses in the body to a particular situation or experience. Once clients understand when such changes occur, they can work with professionals to find alternate, more healthful ways of dealing with them. Biofeedback is used to treat asthma, headaches, stress and can help a person stop smoking. "Biofeedback is an appropriate middle technology that can be used before more drastic methods are tried," says Ovide Pomerleau, Ph.D., director of the University of Michigan Behavioral Medicine Program. Biofeedback can make you aware of building tensions and help you find ways of letting go of them. "We try to help the patient get in touch with the cause of stress and give them the tools



to manage it better," he says.

Guided imagery - This was developed in the 1970s by Stephanie Simonton, Ph.D., for her cancer patients. She had them visualize their white blood cells attacking and ingesting their cancer cells. Studies now show it may enhance the immune system. A therapist guides the patient through the healing imagery to help people overcome phobias and stress-related conditions.

Meditation - Meditation is a method of relaxing and clearing one's mind. It is used to question your actions, feelings and self to understand why they occur so you can gain more control of your life.

Mindful meditation focuses on paying attention to the present, not the past or future. Jon Kabat-Zinn, Ph.D., head of the Stress Reduction Clinic at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center and author of the meditation manual, *Wherever You Go, You Are There*, has reported a 35-percent reduction in physical symptoms and mental distress of his patients.

Support groups - Healing through talking with others like you is not a new concept. It seems virtually every major health problem is represented by a support group, in cities across the country. And with good reason. Studies by the University of Michigan show social isolation is as likely to cause early death as is smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, obesity and a sedentary lifestyle.

"If we create other ways of fostering a sense of intimacy and community, we find that people are much more likely to make and maintain life-enhancing changes," says noted cardiac physician Dean Ornish, M.D., in his book, *Dr. Dean Ornish's Program for Reversing Heart Disease*.

Support groups lessen this risk by offering participants a sense of belonging and acceptance.

For the Spirit

The connection between the body and spirit is not new; religious groups have long been at the center of efforts to heal the sick.

According to medical historian Henry Sigerist, Christianity entered the world as a "religion of healing." Today, some of the most sophisticated medical centers in the world are owned by churches, and roughly 29 percent of all the hospital beds in the United States are owned by Catholic or Protestant groups.

Thousand-year-old Chinese philosophy includes spirituality at the core of its medical practices. When a patient is ill, Chinese doctors look for the symptoms that disrupt the balance of "Chi", the energy force that flows through the body. Their task, as they describe it, is to teach their patients to master this flow of energy in their own bodies through combined physical, mental and spiritual practice.

Dr. Dean Ornish, medical consul-

tant to the President and author, calls his work with heart patients "emotional open heart surgery", because his prescription for a low-fat diet, moderate exercise and stress reduction also includes group support, yoga and meditation.

Researchers at the University of Texas, who tracked 232 open-heart-surgery patients for six months, found that the risk of dying was three times greater for patients who didn't attend religious services regularly. None of the patients who considered themselves deeply spiritual died during the study.

David Myers, Ph.D., professor of psychology at Hope College in Holland, MI, researched hundreds of scientific studies on happiness for his book *The Pursuit of Happiness*. In his research, he found that spirituality is one characteristic of happy people. He says that religion helps people cope with crisis, and offers social support and long-term hope in case of illness.



Complementing treatment for the body with regard for one's religious, spiritual or philosophical beliefs does not belong only to the practitioners of alternative medicine.

Spirituality also is gaining credibility among medical doctors as a way of enhancing treatment efforts. Harvard Medical School recently hosted a course titled, "Spirituality and Healing in Medicine," that was attended by 800 scholars, doctors, clinicians, chaplains and nurses from around the country.

Putting alternative medicine to the test

The following is a look at some scientific study behind a variety of alternative approaches:

- An analysis of 166 studies shows people with hypertension - especially those with mild cases - can greatly lower their blood pressure with non-drug approaches, including cutting out sodium, exercising to lose weight and keeping in touch with their doctors.
- In one study, half of the 30 cocaine-exposed premature babies received three daily 15-minute massages; half didn't. After 10 days, the massaged babies had fewer complications and stress behaviors and showed more mature motor behaviors than the babies who weren't massaged. They also averaged a 28 percent greater weight gain, according to a study published in the *Journal of Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics*.
- Of 86 women with metastatic



breast cancer, the 50 women in support groups lived an average of 18 months longer than 36 control patients in a study at the Stanford University School of Medicine.

- In 212 clinical studies conducted since the mid-1980s, 160 showed positive effects of religious commitment on health, while only 15 showed negative effects, according to Herbert Benson, Harvard Medical School cardiologist and founder of the Mind-Body Medical Institute at Deaconess Hospital in Boston.
- A double-blind study in France published in the *British Journal of Clinical Pharmacology* showed that a homeopathic remedy was effective in the treatment of flu symptoms. Twice as many of the 487 patients using homeopathic medicine recovered within 48 hours compared to those patients who were given a placebo.

Make sure they practice what they preach

Since alternative therapies and practitioners aren't regulated in the same way as traditional providers, you can't assess them using the same tools.

How, then, can you be sure the one you've selected is legitimate? Experts offer these tips:

- Ask a friend who's had a good experience with a practitioner or therapy for a reference.
- Ask a practitioner about his or her training.
- Ask for references from a practitioner.
- Be cautious of someone who guarantees

his or her therapy - no type of health care comes with absolute guarantees.

- Likewise, be leery of someone who pushes a certain therapy particularly hard. This runs counter to the idea behind holistic medicine, which stresses personal choice and responsibility.
- Call the Society for the Advancement of Natural Teachings or another nonprofit alternative medicine group for a referral.
- Again, in the spirit of holistic medicine, read up on various therapies. Going in knowing something about your options is always best.

The place to start

If you'd like more information on alternative therapies, you might start with the Society for the Advancement of Natural Teachings, a nonprofit holistic educational organization that's been around for

about 25 years.

Garlic: the beneficial bulb

As health care moves toward the twenty-first century, many Americans are turning to age old practices such as homeopathy to cure what ails them. Amidst this back-to-the-basics approach to medicine, is one flavor source that keeps rearing its pungent head. Not just for the taste of it, garlic is proving to be an essential part of many healthy diets.

Garlic, or *Allium Sativum*, is prescribed for a range of maladies from colds to heart disease. Dr. Robert Giller and Kathy Matthews in their book *Natural Prescriptions*, claim that garlic is one of the foods that "have been shown to decrease the tendency for blood to clot after a fatty meal."

Joseph M. Kadans Ph.D., author of *Encyclopedia of Fruits, Vegetables, Nuts and Seeds for Healthful Living*, considers garlic to be "a useful cleanser of the blood, therefore helpful in conditions of high blood pressure." Giller and Matthews concur, stating that "garlic has been shown to decrease systolic pressure by 20 to 30 mmHg and the diastolic pressure by 10 to 20 mmHg."

The British Medical Journal states that garlic has "demonstrated its worth" in patients suffering from high blood pressure and high cholesterol by lowering levels of low-density lipoproteins, which are associated with fatty deposits on arterial walls, and raising levels of high-density lipoproteins, which help keep blood clear."

Although doctors may be uneasy about the potential side effects of drugs to control excess cholesterol or high blood pressure, garlic can be safely consumed daily by almost anyone.

Garlic also has a reputation for countering most bacterial, fungal

and viral infections, and, as an aid to the respiratory and digestive systems, it is thought to be useful in cases of colds, asthma, sinusitis and bronchitis.

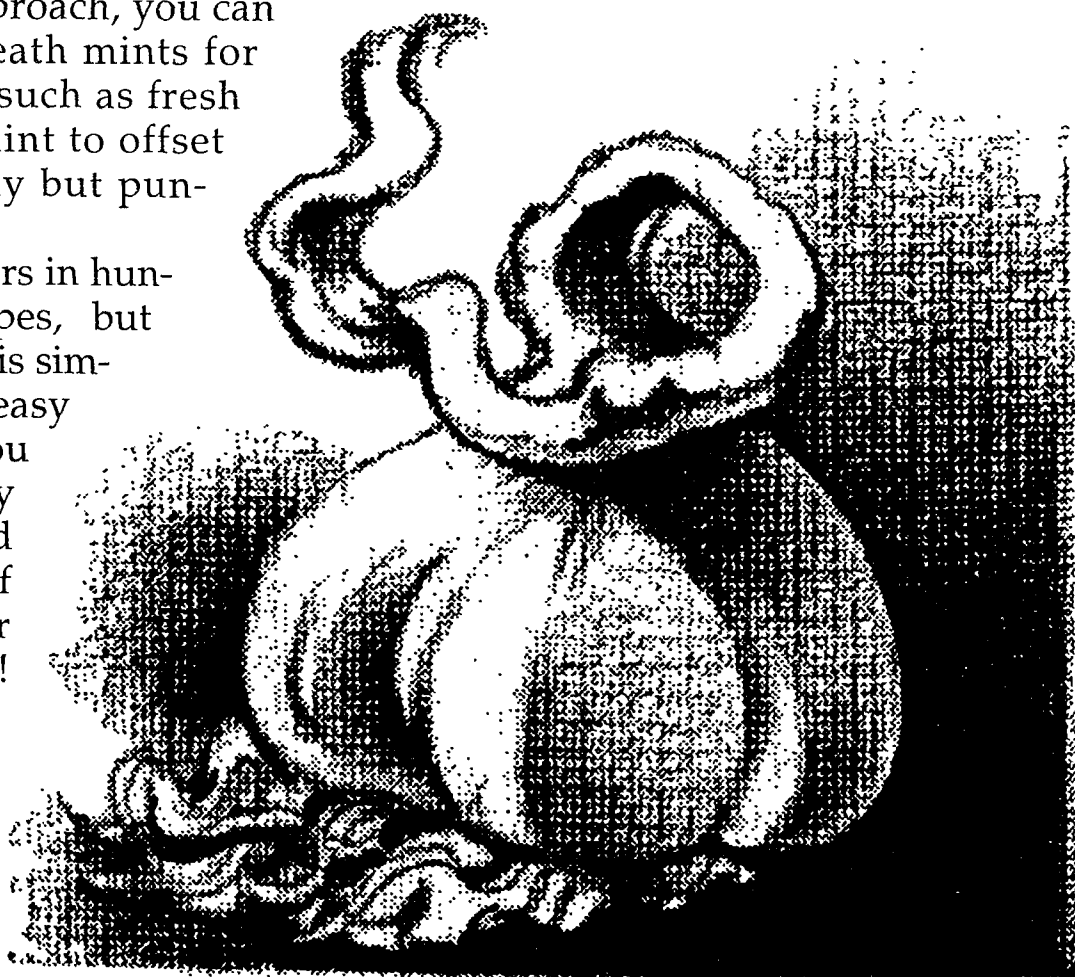
So, how should we ingest this healthy herb? Garlic is most effective when eaten raw. However, if you're concerned about keeping away your friends as well as disease, you can use it generously and frequently while cooking food. Or, you can take it in capsule form, which these days can be found in most health food, drug, and grocery stores. Finally, in keeping with the natural approach, you can trade your breath mints for the real stuff, such as fresh parsley and mint to offset garlic's healthy but pungent effects.

Garlic appears in hundreds of recipes, but here's one that is simple, tasty and easy to prepare. You can vary it by adding sautéed vegetables of your choice, or chicken. Enjoy!

Garlic Pasta (serves four)

1 lb. whole wheat or spinach pasta
1 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
1 tsp. lemon pepper
6 large cloves of garlic

As the water is boiling for your pasta, chop the garlic and sauté it in enough olive oil to cover the bottom of your pan. Better to under cook than over cook the garlic. After your pasta is prepared, mix all the ingredients together and serve.

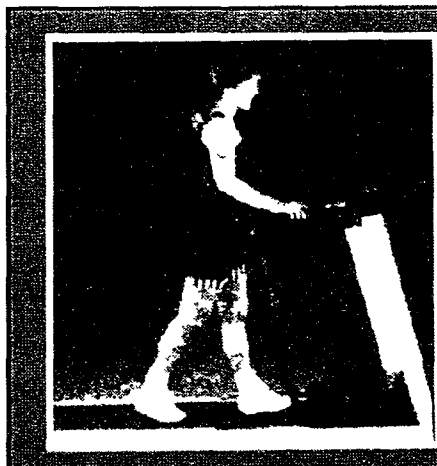

Microwaving Miracles:

How to save time and nutrients with your microwave

According to Cornell University Division of Nutritional Sciences, microwave ovens can save not only time, but nutrients. The minimal liquid loss means that water-soluble vitamins and minerals (such as the B vitamins) stay in the food instead of being drowned in water. And the short cooking time limits the destruction of heat-sensitive vitamins such as Thiamin. Take a look at how the amount of vitamin C (which is both water soluble and heat sensitive) reacts to each method of cooking.

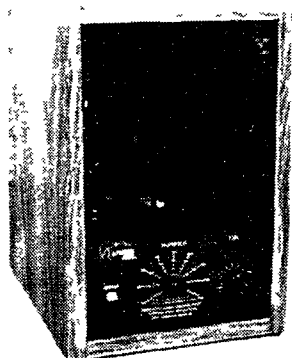

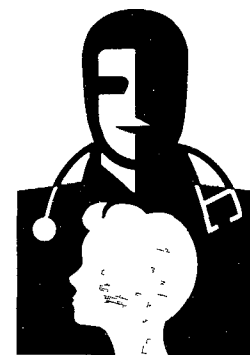

Keeping those cold and flu bugs away

This time of year, either you're sick, family members aren't well, or the office is filled with the sounds of coughs and nose-blowing. How do you stay healthy? Try these simple tips:

- Wash your hands frequently. It could be the best way to keep viruses at bay.
- Remember what your mother told you about covering your nose and mouth when you cough and sneeze. Viruses can be launched into the air with a cough or sneeze and inhaled by others.
- Refrain from touching your eyes,

nose and mouth - thus preventing all those germs you pick up on your hands from entering your system.

- Don't share germs: offer separate towels, cups and glasses, even toothpaste, to each member of the family.
- It may not be cozy, but it helps to sleep alone when you first get a cold. You are most contagious in the first 72 hours; staying away during that time can help avoid spreading the cold to your bed mate.
- Use tissues instead of hankies; they can cut virus transmission in half.

Stretching the benefits of exercise

Experts tell us that a good exercise program always includes stretching before and after the work-out, but stretching incorrectly can be as harmful as not doing it at all. How do we properly s-t-r-e-t-c-h those joints and muscles?

According to Marcia Ditmyer, M.A., M.S., director of Fitness at the Franklin Fitness & Racquet Club, everyone should stretch before and after exercise, but most importantly after, when the muscles and joints are warm and flexible. "Never stretch a muscle when it's cold," she says. "It's better to move around for a few minutes, and then start your stretching routine."

"The main purpose of stretching is to increase flexibility," Marcia adds. "Improved flexibility helps with range of motion, helps to avoid injury and gives you more balance and better quality of movement."

Marcia suggests matching the type of stretch to the muscles that will be used. "We tell people to stretch the muscles they will be working, choosing one stretch for each muscle group," she says. "And no unsupported movements, such as bending from your waist to touch your toes. That just puts pressure on the back, and can cause injury."

Other tips:

Be gentle

Stretch to the point of light ten-

sion, not to the point of pain. Muscles contract sharply when stretched too far. That's called the stretch reflex. By stretching gently, you'll reset that reflex so your muscles are more limber all the time.

Hold that stretch

Marcia says that the pre-exercise stretch helps the body prepare for what is to come. These should last no more than ten seconds. After the work-out, when your muscles and joints are warm, you need to hold the stretch for a full 30 seconds to realize its benefits. The stretch reflex will stop firing, the tension will dissipate, and you'll be able to stretch a little farther, a little more easily next time.

Don't bounce!

Bouncing during a stretch throws your limbs into what are called ballistic stretches. These can trigger your muscles' instinct to contract when



stretched too far. The result: frayed or torn ligaments.

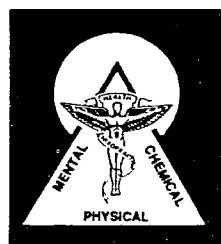
