

## Teams to make odyssey to finals

Imagine constructing a structure of balsa wood and glue, built to withstand more than 180 pounds of dead weight, and the structure also has to endure constant battering with a billiard ball.

If that's not hard enough for you, imagine having to figure out a mechanism that would allow someone to play the trumpet - with no arms.

Those are just a couple of the problems that were thrown in the path of three teams of students from Cooke and Meads Mill middle schools in the regional Odyssey of the Mind competition.

Odyssey of the Mind is a worldwide program that tests the problem solving abilities of youngsters. Each competition is divided into two rounds - individual problem and spontaneous. The problem portion is given to the teams two months before the actual competition, and team members must either build or utilize an object within a scripted skit.

The spontaneous round is where team members are given a word and each member must think of ways to use the word creatively - for example if a team was given the word "water" members could use "waterwheel, waterlogged, Bridge over Troubled Water, etc.

The individual problem is determined by what category a team enters in. Two of the three Cooke/Meads teams were entered in the crunch division and had to construct a structure from balsa wood.

## Bomb threat at store is hoax

A bomb threat was made against the Meyer store in Northville Township last week - one that fortunately turned out to be a hoax.

A store detective called township police on Friday afternoon, March 8, saying that someone had called Meyer and claimed to have planted an explosive device in the business.

This is the People's Liberation Army, the caller is reported to have said. "I put a bomb in your store because of the oppression around the world."

The switchboard operator who took the call told police that the male on the other end of the line was "well spoken" and "calm."

Meyer supervisors checked the store for anything unusual but found nothing. Police were called about a half hour later, reports said, and also found nothing.

The Meyer at Fifteen Mile and Haggerty roads was also the target of a bomb threat - a phone call coming into the store about 10 minutes after the one made concerning the Northville Meyer.

## Honigman will resign Senate seat

Saying it would be unethical to carry on in public office due to his chronic ill health and pain, State Senator David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, is resigning, effective Friday.

Honigman announced Tuesday morning that while "it's difficult to retire," he is giving up the political arena and concentrating on his health, for now.

Honigman represents Oakland County Northville from Michigan's 15th Senatorial District.

The same fighting spirit that made Honigman a wrestler and judo champion in college kept the state senator, 40, in office through

Gov. John Engler is expected to set a date by the end of this week for both a primary and special election for Honigman's term.

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# Library board considers \$30,000 art expense

## Funds would purchase fiber piece

You gotta have art. The DIA's old pitch is on the minds of the Northville District Library board of trustees these days as the body considers whether to commission a world-renowned artist to create a piece that will hang in the new building once it opens this fall.

As the price tag for Gerhardt Knodel's work would likely run at least \$30,000, the board has so far only agreed to have the Pontiac-based artist develop sketches and a scale model of what he has in mind. That will cost \$3,000.

Knodel is a "fiber artist" and Director of the Cranbrook Academy of Art in West Bloomfield. His works, many of which use fiberglass as a medium, have been sold all over the world, board member Wendy Gutowski said.

"The man's talent is beyond words," she opined. "He's the kind of artist who can pick his projects and so we're very excited that he's expressed an interest in ours."

The board "didn't have anything

specifically planned" in the way of art when it originally approved the \$4.8 million library construction budget. That changed, however, as time went on.

Part of the library's design calls for a central circular area reach up to the windowed clerestory area near the top of the building. It's in that open space that Knodel's work, if approved, would hang.

"I think it's fair to say that we as a board view art as important and integral to the architecture of the new library," Gutowski said. "Putting art in the building is part of what we see as our mission to the community."

The price isn't a deterrent, either, she added.

"To spend \$30,000 on a piece of art of this quality in a \$4.5 million budget is not, in my view, out of line," Gutowski said. "In fact, it's pretty good."

An act passed in 1980 by the state Legislature encourages public entities to spend up to 1 percent of their budgets on art. In the case of the district library,

Gutowski argued, that would amount to \$45,000.

Besides that, the library's booster group, Friends of the Northville District Library, has agreed to help defray the cost of the work if the board decides to approve it. President Janine Baughat said that the group has formally approved the donation of \$10,000 towards the art work and more could be on the way.

Knodel has spoken with members of the board and construction officials and is now developing his concept plan for the piece, Gutowski said. He will present his proposal to the board when he is ready but no formal date has been set.

The district library's annual operating budget for this year is about \$859,000. The library construction budget totals just under \$4.8 million. Of that amount, \$500,000 is earmarked for furnishing, fixtures and equipment. It would be out of that area that the money for any art approved by the board would come.

## Staffers say yes to union idea

When you're checking books out of the Northville District Library, you can look for the union label from here on in.

A special vote conducted Monday afternoon by the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC) resulted in two groups of library employees voting to form collective separate bargaining units.

Each of those units will now be represented by the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) in contract negotiations with the

library board of trustees.

Unit One, which include five library clerical employees, was created on a 5-0 vote.

Unit Two, composed of librarians, saw a 4-1 vote in favor of unionizing.

Contract talks on behalf of both groups are expected to begin soon, although no date has yet been agreed to.

Concern over changes in working conditions prompted the election changes that have surfaced since the district library was created in 1994.

Voters in Northville and Northville Township authorized

the library to become its own independent entity and levy a millage to cover operating expenses.

The library operation used to be funded jointly through the Northville city and township governments.

Since the switchover, some library staffers, according to union official Dennis Nauss, have worried about how their working hours, wage levels and benefit packages, particularly health care, could be affected.

But at this point the possibility, rather than the reality, of a problem is what's driving the vote, he added.

**ON THE RIGHT COMEBACK TRAIL**

Athletes sometimes talk about "playing through an injury" or playing themselves back into shape after an injury. These sentiments owe more to stubbornness and machismo than to good sense. The fact is that the best way to recover from an injury is to rehabilitate, stretch and straighten the injured area. Subjecting an injured body part to full-blown activity is a likely prescription for prolonging it. Athletes should rule out a return to full action before their injuries are 95 percent healed. That is, the injured area should be 95 percent as strong as its corresponding uninjured body part. By coming back too soon, athletes run the risk of reinjury.

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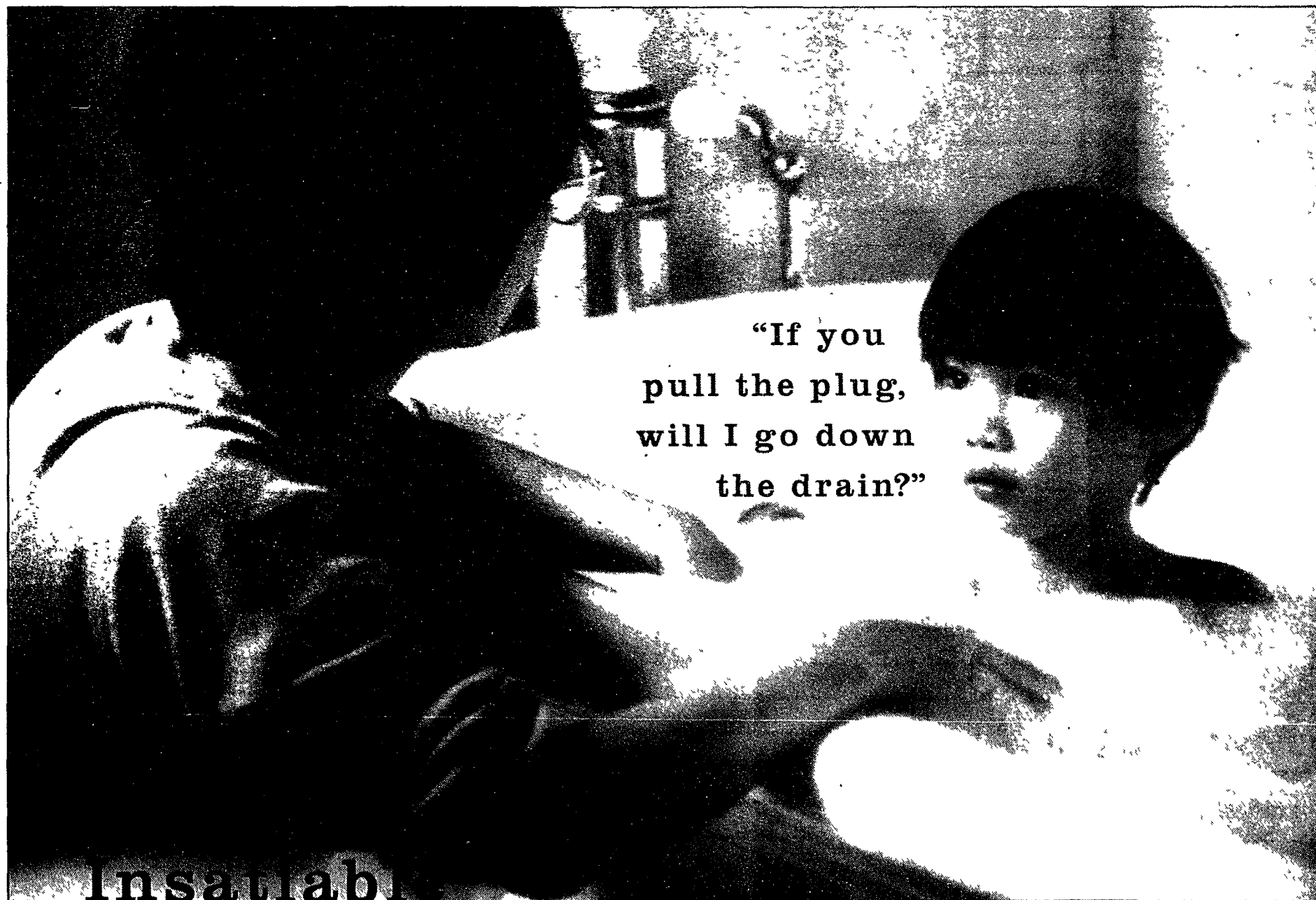

## Credit card fraud suspect arrested

A Westland man was arrested one week ago at Meijer for trying to buy a television with a stolen credit card.

Northville Township police were called by store detectives after the man, 36, tried to pay for a \$700 TV with a card that came up on the computer as stolen. He was taken to police headquarters and held until his arraignment at 35th District Court. Magistrate Eric Colthurst set the man's bond at \$20,000 cash, which he was unable to post. The man was then taken to the Wayne County Jail.

**CAR STOLEN:** A Northville man's car was stolen from the Meijer parking lot late Saturday afternoon. The man, 31, said that someone took his 1983 Buick Regal while he was inside the store. Inside were a CD player, radar detector and a cellular phone.

Township police listed the car as stolen in the local law enforcement computer network.

**GARAGE HEIST:** A township family fell victim to thieves last week when someone took a fish tank and a snowblower out of their garage. The theft happened sometime between March 3 and March 9, the homeowner told police. Her son had left the garage door open, she added.

The items are valued at \$875.

**PURSE STOLEN:** A purse belonging to a Meads Mill Middle School employee was stolen. The woman told township police it was taken out of her unlocked office. It contained a bifold, cellular phone, sunglasses, cash and a credit card - items valued collectively at \$641.

Police have no suspects or leads. The witness was unable to obtain the license plate number of the vehicle.

## Bid to get former chief enshrined falls short

Another year of waiting.

That's a hard thing to do but the family of Eugene King has no choice. Turned down this time around, they will have to try again to get the ex-Northville police chief's name added to the national police officers' memorial in Washington, D.C.

The National Law Enforcement Officers' Memorial was established in 1984 to honor local, county, state and federal police agents killed in the line of duty. To date more than 13,000 names have been inscribed on its stone face.

King was shot twice in the chest on Feb. 10, 1965, by Warren Robert Wright, a convicted felon and bank robber who was determined never to return to jail. He carried the slugs in his body until the day he died 11 years later.

Last year, King's family, now living in Arizona, began a campaign to convince the memorial's governing committee to add the chief's name to it. Names are added to the memorial only once a year, during a special ceremony each May during national police week.

The committee's choices for 1996 were announced this month.

memorial Director of Research Aimee Holloway said, and Eugene King's name is not among them due to lack of medical documents concerning his injuries.

To show the committee that King qualifies for inclusion, his family must show a link between the 1965 shooting and the chief's death due to complications from surgery in Arizona in 1976.

His son Greg, now an Arizona state trooper, told *The Record* last year that the bullets directly caused years of suffering for King and eventually caused his death.

Family members have been trying to track down the necessary medical files for the committee. Greg King added at the time, but it's been hard because of the decades that have passed. Holloway said that the information has not yet been submitted.

"I hope they will reapply (for inclusion in 1997)," she said. "If they can find this documentation it should be no problem but we do have to have it."

The *Northville Record* was unable to contact a member of the King family for comment.

If the family should reapply, all application materials, including the medical information, will have

to be submitted to the committee by Dec. 31, Holloway said.

Wright shot King as the chief was taking him to police headquarters for questioning by the FBI in connection with the 1964 robbery of the Detroit Federal Savings bank at the corner of Center and Dunlap Streets.

City police had stopped Wright's car near Seven Mile and Northville roads after a teller in the bank called them reporting that he looked like the robber of nine months before.

King decided to take him to headquarters himself, handcuffing Wright's hands in front of him and sitting the man in the front seat of his squad car.

Wright, already a convicted felon, soon produced a small handgun from an ankle holster and tried to get King to drive out of Northville.

The chief tried to overpower him and was hit twice in the chest as the car rolled to a stop near the intersection of Main and Rogers Streets.

He was eventually sentenced to 10 years in prison by a state court for attempted murder and to 20 years on federal bank robbery charges. Wright served a total of

only six and a half years behind bars, however, and was paroled in 1971. He has been dead since at least 1988, according to state criminal records.

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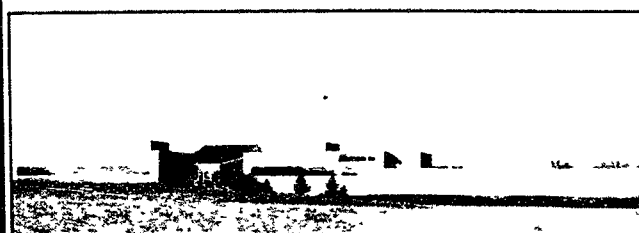
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# Battle looms over state transportation money

Regional planners and the Michigan Department of Transportation are heading for a March 21 showdown over how to split a shrinking bundle of federal and state fuel taxes in the next three years.

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, the regional planning agency, decided 29-9 it would acquiesce in the state's eating the lion's share of money this year in return for giving local roads a better break in 1997-98.

"It's not a win-win situation. It's lose-lose," said Brent Bair, managing director of the Oakland County Road Commission, which has rattled the state cage for more road funds.

"I feel like I'm getting screwed, but I have to vote yes," said Nancy Dingledey, R-Wixom, an Oakland County commissioner and executive committee member of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. Her ribaldry brought laughs of agreement from nearly 40 other SEMCOG delegates and staffers at a March 7 executive committee meeting.

"I voted no because the resolution restrains us to a one-year guarantee of funding," said a key state official, Louis Lambert, a planner with MDOT who serves on SEMCOG's executive committee.

## STATE WINS IN '96

Michael Duggan, deputy Wayne County executive from Livonia, won SEMCOG's "reluctant" approval of what he called a "compromise" resolution. Most delegates from Detroit, suburban Wayne County, Oakland, Livingston and Washtenaw counties supported it. Opposed were MDOT's Lambert along with Macomb and St. Clair counties.

"The heart of SEMCOG's resolution:

• For nearly two decades, federal road aid has been split 75-25 between state and local agencies. MDOT, under Gov. John Engler, this year is seeking a bigger chunk of the money for four major projects: rebuilding Davison Freeway in Detroit, extending the Haggerty Connector north of 12 Mile in Oakland County, widening a section of I-96 between Brighton and Howell in Livingston County, and upgrading a chunk of M-59 in Macomb County.

• This year, the first in a three-year plan, the state could keep 86 percent, the state 14.

• But in 1997 and '98 local roads would get their customary 25 percent. MDOT's Lambert objected that it hamstringed the state in those two years.

"There would be one condition," added Duggan. "Local roads would get any savings from state projects. The state could not substitute projects or spend all its share if bids came in low."

The effect was for SEMCOG to amend the dollar amounts of its three-year TIP (Traffic Improve-

ment Plan). SEMCOG, whose delegates are local elected officials, will meet again March 21 to prioritize projects.

## ENGLER BLISTERED

Although MDOT spokesperson Robin Pannecouck said SEMCOG's March 7 action "jeopardized" the 1996 entire construction program, the matter is still in the air until March 21, or 10 days before the deadline for submitting TIP to federal officials.

"A TIP isn't just numbers. We have to put projects behind Dug-

gan's numbers," said SEMCOG chair Joan Buser, supervisor of Oakland Township.

SEMCOG in January was sent back to the drawing boards after: 1) federal road aid was cut and 2) state legislators and Gov. Engler failed to agree on a \$350 million increase in fuel taxes over three years. The entire TIP had to be pared from \$2.1 billion to \$1.8 billion.

Many SEMCOG delegates were infuriated at Engler's unilateral action in commandeering the federal money and his refusal to negotiate a compromise with SEM-

COG. Some wanted to disapprove a new TIP, canceling the entire 1996 construction program for everyone.

Majority sentiment, as Duggan represented it, is to keep looking for a deal, no matter painful.

"Our best bet," agreed John Grubba, deputy Oakland County executive and a Milford resident.

"Government and politics are the art of the possible," said SEMCOG executive director John Amberger, of Livonia.

The OCRC's Bair called even the Duggan compromise a "Sophie's Choice" - a reference to the novel

in which a mother must decide which of her children won't survive.

## 'HOLD YOUR NOSE'

"Hold your nose and vote yes," advised Steve Brock, assistant city manager from Farmington Hills, during the public comment portion of the meeting.

John Grace, an attorney from Rochester Hills who practices in Farmington Hills, praised Michigan's congressional delegation for getting US-DOT to remind the Engler administration that it must

deal with SEMCOG, which is a federally-designated "metropolitan planning organization" as well as a creature of the state.

Grace singled out U.S. Rep. Dale Kildee, D-Flint, for praise. Kildee faces an election challenge this year from former MDOT director Patrick Nowak, a Republican from Waterford.

Novi City Manager Ed Kriewall said his growth city is "extremely disappointed at how the Legislature and governor have dodged a much-needed gas tax increase," helping to precipitate the showdown.

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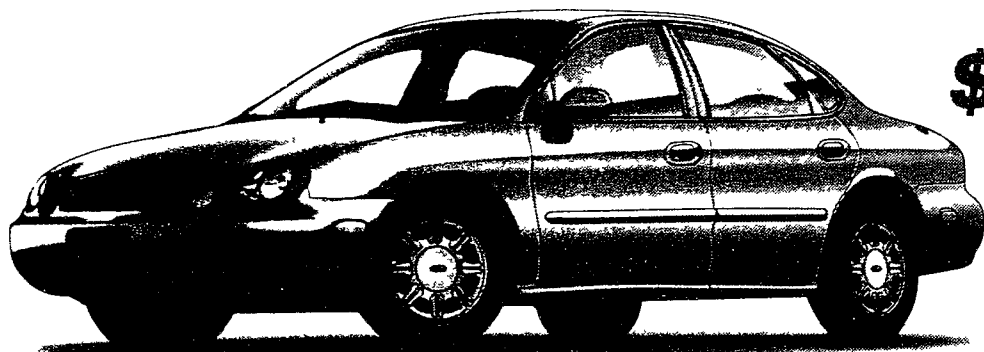
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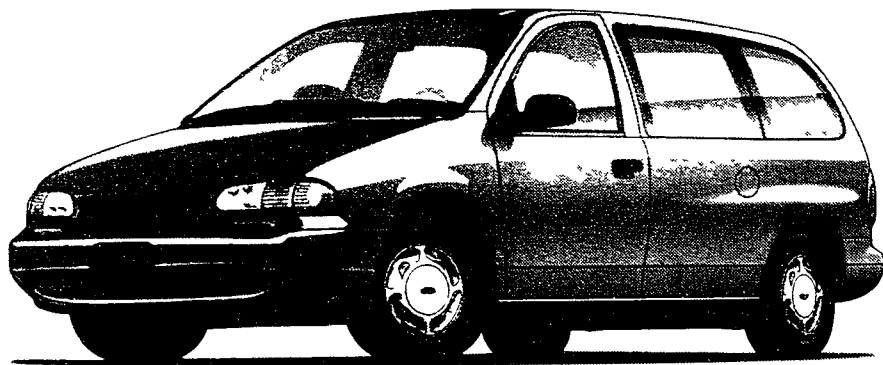
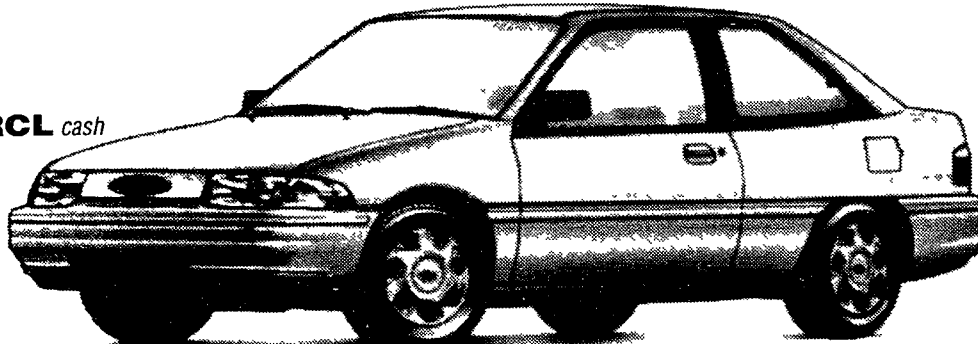
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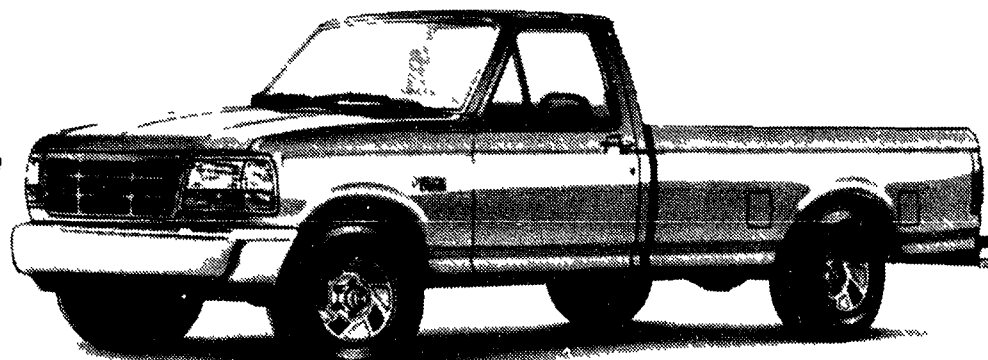
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## Income tax forms available

## Partisan battle shapes up over state tuition credit

Gleeful Democrats in the state Senate are trying to drive a wedge between Republicans on the college tuition tax credit issue.

Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, would like to leave the law - which he sponsored last year - as is. The family of a student paying tuition to one of Michigan's 15 public universities gets an income tax credit of \$250 a year for four years - if the university doesn't hike tuition more than the rate of consumer price inflation, about 3 percent.

"Bennett wants to keep the law the way it is. It's an incentive for universities to keep down the rate of tuition," said aide Bill Sullivan.

Bennett introduced Senate Bill 678 to amend that law by preventing prison inmates from using it.

But Sen. John J.H. Schwarz, R-Battle Creek, kept SB 678 from going to a taxation committee and put it in his own Senate Appropriations subcommittee on higher education.

There, Schwarz amended it to expand the credit to students at all public universities - even those that hike tuition more than 3 percent.

Schwarz's amendment expands the number of eligible families from 150,000 to 330,000.

Last year only four universities kept tuition hikes below the rise in the U.S. Labor Department's consumer price index: Michigan State, Western Michigan, Grand Valley and Lake Superior.

Schwarz had a change of heart, however, when Gov. John Engler announced he wanted to eliminate the tax credit entirely.

Now they want to turn the \$36 million back to all universities as general aid.

University of Michigan President James Duderstadt agreed during recent budget hearings. In general, universities argue that the CPI represents a consuming family's market basket of goods.

Universities pay more attention to HEPI, the higher education price index.

HEPI takes account of the fact that 85 percent of a college's budget is payroll, that health benefits are a larger component of HEPI than of the CPI, and that health benefits are one of the most inflationary aspects of the economy.

Duderstadt said the state could do more for students by spreading the money around evenly than by giving tax credits to some students.

Bennett's bill, as amended by Schwarz, has languished for weeks on the calendar (the agenda of the full Senate).

Democrats like the amended version that gives a tuition tax credit to everyone with a household income under \$200,000. Democrats want to debate it and see it enacted.

"It's not the students' job (to pressure universities to cap tuition)," said minority leader John Cherry, D-Clio.

"It's not the parents' job. It (current law) pits students and parents against the universities."

"We ought to build a stronger basis for higher education and still keep tuition low," Cherry told the Senate March 6.

Said Sen. Gary Peters, D-Bloomfield Township: "The Republicans have let their own bill languish for weeks. When I argued for moving the bill, they decided they just can't give tuition-weary, middle-class taxpayers a break. But each day they delay is a day we will fight to get this tax cut passed."

"One thousand taxpayers got an intangibles tax break of \$36 million."

"But when it comes to helping middle-class taxpayers, we can't even get the Republicans to pass their own bill with their own amendment to benefit even more middle-class families," Peters said.

The Engler-Schwarz plan of turning the money to general university aid is flawed, Democrats said, because "there would be no guarantee to students that their institutions would not take the money and still raise tuition."

"Surely," said Sen. Alma Wheeler Smith, D-Salem, "out of a \$30 billion (total) budget, we can find \$36 million for some relief to middle-class taxpayers trying to put their children through college."

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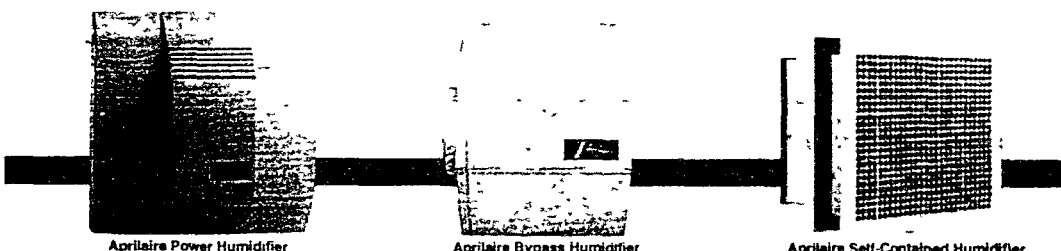

## HomeTown Newspapers donates to indexing project

The Northville District Library's newspaper indexing project received a critical infusion of financial support this week when a donation check for \$1,800 was presented to library volunteers.

HomeTown Newspapers, the parent company of *The Northville Record*, cut the donation check, which will be used to finance the exhaustive effort to index all back issues of *The Northville Record*.

The newspaper has published continuously since 1869.

"We look at it as a living history," project organizer Dolores Prom said. "It's not only a way for some body to find out what old Uncle Charlie did, it's a way for people to know what the community has been doing recently."

The Friends of the District Library provided the initial \$1,800 for the indexing effort, which makes use of both volunteers and a paid temporary worker. This latest donation will help finance the project into its next phase.

A few years ago all back issues

of *The Record* were placed onto microfilm.

Now the editions must be indexed by subject and heading so that bound reference volumes can be created.

To date two volumes have been made, covering the years 1869-79 and 1888-89.

Project participants have completed indexing on paper up to the year 1917 and, working backward from the most current issues from the present to 1888.

Northville Record Editor Lee Snider issued a challenge for service groups to get on board with the project.

"Northville service clubs and civic-minded organizations are endlessly generous, and we think this is a worthwhile project for them to contribute to," he said. "We'd like to see groups put up money to match or top our contribution. Hopefully someone will put our donation to shame."

Prom said the library enthusiasts have applied for a grant to get

the back issues placed onto CD ROM, but the status of that request is uncertain. A grant from the federal Library Services Construction Act provided initial project funds for the microfilming program.

Once the index books are completed, libraries in Novi, South Lyon, Wixom, Farmington and Detroit plan to purchase the volumes.

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# Reality check badly needed to stave off youth disasters

The image of Samantha Berry haunts my soul to this day.

I can still see the 14-year-old's crumpled body lying on the living room floor of her Glendale, Ariz., home, a thin stream of blood flowing from the back of her head over the stained hard wood floor, pooling next to the stairway that she had to climb several times a day to get to her bedroom.

A beautiful 14-year-old girl, dead before she ever realized her goals and dreams for life. A promising gift, never opened for the world to enjoy.

I also remember her killer, 15-year-old Timothy "Dutch" Hardin who, in a fit of jealous, drunken teenage rage, fired off a bullet into Samantha's head.

He looked like your typical teenager, who was quietly polite to the police officers who had traveled to Wagoner, Okla., to pick him up after he had fled the state, a non-threatening kid who broke into tears when he faced his parents for the first time after his arrest.

An easy going, well liked 15-year-old who, because of his crime, stood trial as an adult and was convicted of manslaughter, ending his hopes and dreams for life.

Both teens resided in an affluent community. Glendale is similar to Northville in many ways; families demand the best education money can buy, they live in relatively crime free neighborhoods and enjoy the amenities that are attached to upper-middle class communities.

One of the problems I found with the community, when I served as a reporter for the *Glendale Star*, was a collective feeling of denial by parents when it came to their children using drugs and alcohol.

Despite all the signs and symptoms, despite the constant warnings from police, teachers and school administrators, Glendale parents couldn't quite allow themselves to believe that a major problem was in the making. They refused to take responsibility for their children's actions, and more importantly, they refused to hold their children accountable for

the bad choices they were making.

That all changed when Samantha's dead body hit the floor of the Berrys' well furnished living room.

During the trial that followed, Hardin's defense attorney pointed at his abuse of alcohol as the major factor in the murder. The young man was drunk at the time, and was in a fit of jealous rage when he took his father's nine millimeter Berreta to the Berry home to confront his former girlfriend. Witness after witness testified that Hardin's problems with alcohol had begun when he was 9-years-old, that his trouble in school was directly tied to his growing out of control, drinking habit.

Why, everyone asked, didn't the parents do anything about the problem?

The question, unfortunately, came too late.

I look at last week's alcohol and drug related incident at Northville High School the very same way I viewed Glendale's problem - many parents are not taking a look at a growing problem, and more importantly, they are not teaching kids that every choice has a consequence.

The kids I talked with last week seemed to believe that there are no consequences to worry about, and they can get away with just about anything they want.

That's not reality. Reality was the lifeblood draining out of Samantha Berry's head; reality was a young Waterford girl, knocked out of her shoes late last fall by a car driven by a man whose blood consisted of 20 percent alcohol; reality is the dead homeless man whose body was discovered frozen in Chicago

last month, his hand still clutched to a cheap bottle of booze.

That is what's happening in the world today. That is the environment we choose to hide our children from. Instead of opening our children's eyes to real life, we choose to coddle them, hide them from the distasteful - pretend the whole damn thing never happened!

Instead we spend our time complaining about the injustice of commenting on cheerleading, or the fact that our child wasn't properly recognized for learning something. We demand that our children get the very best, but we don't demand the very best of our children.

At the very least we're not teaching them that life is not always fair, not always easy, and for God's sake we don't prepare them for the difficulties that life has in store for them.

The child we are helping to evolve, consequently, becomes a world class narcissist. "What's in it for me?" will become the battle cry of the future.

I realize that the majority of our kids do not fit in that category, just as I realize that the majority of parents attempt to instill a sense of responsibility and community into their children.

But Glendale taught me one important lesson - one person, disconnected from society because of drugs or alcohol, can drastically, and fatefully, change the balance of life as we know it.

It only took one night, where one bullet from one gun, held in the hand of one troubled teenager, ended the sweet life of one, beautiful, promising, human being.

Samantha Berry could have been your daughter, anyone's daughter, but today she is just a vision that will never escape this reporter's memory.

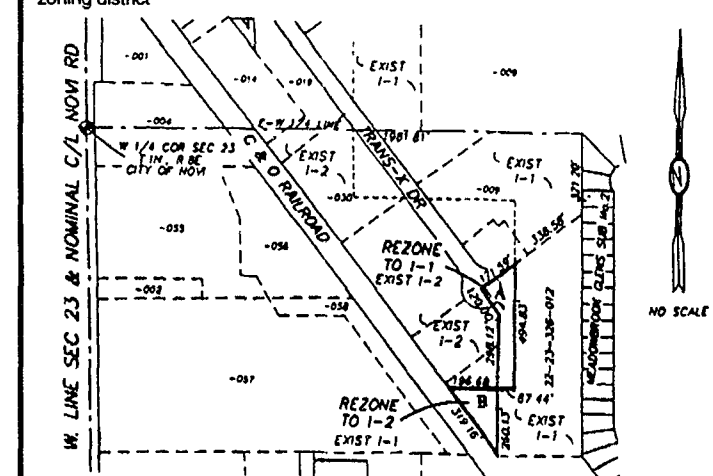

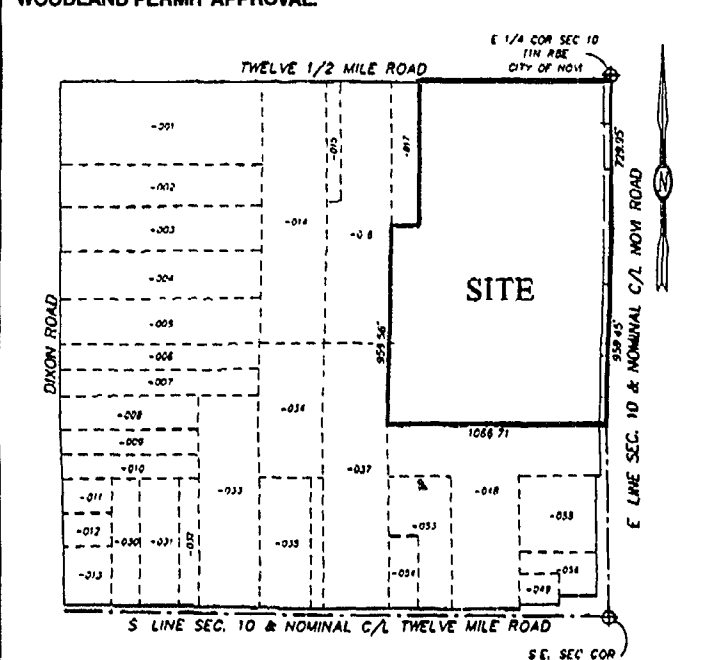

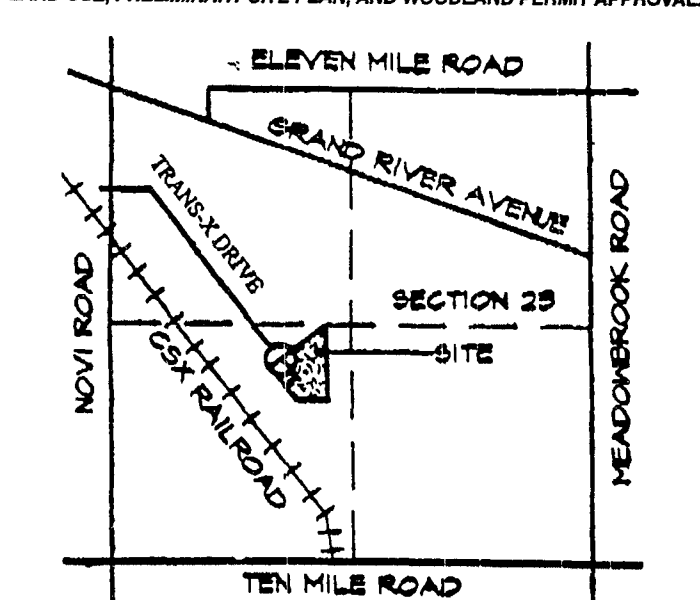

# BACKWARD GLANCE

... at  
Northville's past

It's a shame that Alexander Graham Bell died before I was born because if I could meet him I'd shake his hand. His little creation - the telephone - brought me a new friend this week.

Actually, he's an old friend of some of the people who read this column, too. Charles Sessions, ex-Northville resident who was affectionately known as "Art" when he lived here more than five decades ago. Reading a recent edition of ABG stirred some memories for him and so Art gave me a bump Monday afternoon from his home in Pahrump, Nev.

We had a really enjoyable chat about Northville's old days and what this native son's been doing with himself since leaving town during World War II. I can't resist passing it along to you folks out there. If any of you remember Art, by the way, and want to say hello, give me a call at 349-1700 and I'll pass your message along.

To be honest, Art caught me at a bad time. When the phone rang I was piecing together a new table for my computer and was lying on the floor under the thing, cursing the engineer who thought up its idiotic design.

"I just read that column you wrote about Dorothy Van Atta," he told me, which appeared in the Feb. 1 issue of *The Record*. "That really took me back."

Born in 1913 in his family's house at 121 High Street, Art was a couple of years behind Dorothy in school but can still remember just about as far back as she can. Dorothy told me about how her father took care of Northville's first top-of-the-line fire truck. Art could recall what the village did to fight fires before that, however.

"There was a hose cart at the station, two wagon wheels with the hose strung between them," he said. "The first car to get there pulled the cart to the fire. I'll never forget the day that truck showed up, though. I bet half the town turned out to see it."

This whole area was a different kind of place back then, Art, a 1930 Northville High graduate, said. It was a town with lots and lots of farms, including his father's. 160 acres of ginseng and goldenseed near Novi Road and Ten Mile. Charles Sr., by the way, was Northville's tax assessor for 40 years.

Charles Jr., however, spent his time behind the wheel, earning a living by driving buses. He was a driver on the Northville Coach Line, taking passengers to stops from the Maybury Sanatorium and the intersection of Grand River and Seven Mile.

By 1943, though, it was time for a change. Art had gotten married and moved to Plymouth but soon the couple decided to move to the home of the Rose Bowl. Pasadena, Calif.

"I'd been out there a couple of times when I hitchhiked all over the country and I liked it," he recalled. "So we sold most of our things and loaded up a trailer with the rest and set out."

It was a tough trip - remember, this was during the war. I managed to get an allotment of ration coupons to make the trip. I ran out in El Centro, Calif., so I had to get more from the ration board there to make it to Pasadena.

He drove buses out there, too. Art told me, both in Pasadena and later in Simi Valley until he retired in 1978 to Pahrump. In case you're wondering how he ended up there (I know I was), they moved to be near Art's son, who was working in Las Vegas at the time. Pahrump, which is an Indian word meaning "water rock," is about 70 miles from the city of lights.

Art's been back home just once, in 1994. "I was surprised," he recalled. "I expected things to be different but it's really changed."


A lot of people I talk to say that. For them, like for Art, new Northville lacks something when compared with old Northville. "A hominess" was how he put it.

"Everyone knew everyone and people watched out for each other," Randy Coble is always interested in hearing about your stories and memories of Northville. Call him anytime at 349-1700.

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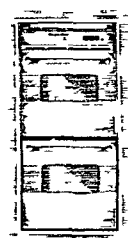
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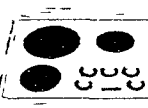
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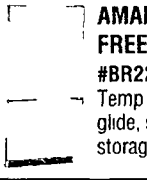

received a bachelor of science degree in accounting in 1957 and a master of business administration degree in 1963. He was also a CPA.

In June 1989, Mr. Pinkelman was awarded the Distinguished leadership award of the Association of Government Accountants to recognize his 23 years of service to the state.

# Road commission gets break in court

The Oakland County Road Commission won't have to pay Holloway Construction Co. nearly \$100,000 interest on an arbitrator's award, the Michigan Supreme Court decided.

Besides the money, it was an important public policy matter, wrote Justice Michael Cavanagh in the 7-0 opinion.

"For nearly \$100,000, it justified an appeal," said the road commission's appellate counsel, Thomas R. Charbonneau Jr.

The dispute arose in 1988 when Holloway contracted to resurface three sections of county roads with a rubberized asphalt material called Plus Ride. The projects were 0.7 mile of 14 Mile Road in front of Oakland Mall in Troy and Madison Heights; 2.3 miles of Tienken Road in Rochester Hills; and a half-mile of Greenfield Road in Southfield and Oak Park.

"The road commission was extremely dissatisfied with the Plus Ride surfaces, which completely failed within a matter of days, necessitating extraordinary repairs," the Supreme Court said.

"After Holloway refused to repair the Plus Ride surfaces, the road commission removed and replaced them with conventional asphalt. The road commission refused to pay for the work done by Holloway, and subsequently (May 2, 1988) Holloway sued the road commission in Oakland Circuit Court."

The parties submitted the dispute to an arbitrator, who on Nov. 21, 1991, said the road commission should pay Holloway \$200,000. Two months later, the road commission paid the award plus \$1,500 interest from the date of the award.

Holloway, however, wanted interest for three-quarters of a year, from the date the suit was

filed until the arbitrator's award. No, said Circuit Judge Fred Mester. Yes, said a Court of Appeals panel, which issued a summary order with no opinion.

No, the Supreme Court ruled on March 1, reversing the Court of Appeals. After sorting through the statute on interest and two prior cases, Cavanagh wrote:

"We find that the arbitrators in this case did not exceed the scope of their authority when determining whether they should grant an award of interest to the prevailing party (Holloway)." He cited three reasons:

"First, mandating interest could result in plaintiffs being overcompensated, contrary to legislative intent ...

"Second, mandating an interest award that accrued at filing (1988) would give plaintiffs an incentive to litigate. An attorney would be strongly encouraged to advise a client to file suit, rather than

to hammer away at this problem." Stiles said that school officials were quick to take action immediately contacting parents and the Northville Police Department. Each student was questioned by school officials and police with their parents present, he added.

"We brought the parents in to get them involved in the process," Stiles explained. "The parents responded positively, and every single one said they would ensure that their kid would go through a drug and alcohol assessment."

The school was in the middle of proficiency testing for junior students. The school had also scheduled Red Ribbon Week programs focusing on drug and alcohol awareness.

The story has yet another ironic twist, as high school students were asked to participate in the Alcohol and Other Drugs (AOD) survey on Wednesday.

This is the third major alcohol related incident that has occurred at the high school during the 1995-96 school year. NHS Principal Tom Johnson said that while the incidents are serious, the students involved represent a very small minority of the student population.

"We treat these incidents seriously, and I think the parents of these particular students responded quickly and were as concerned as we were," Johnson said. "We do not condone, nor will we tolerate the use of alcohol or drugs by students on our campus or anywhere else. Our students have to realize that when they make poor choices they are going to have to take responsibility for those choices."

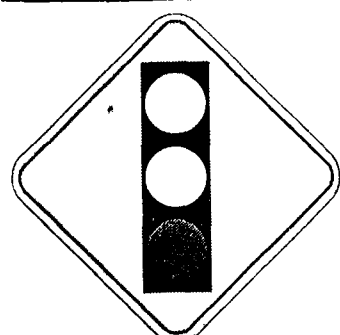
Stiles agreed. "We are talking about a small minority of the student population, but we have to try to reach every single kid, not just the students who are on the bubble," he said.

Some students, however, believe going to school drunk can be a "challenging game." One high school junior who wished to not be identified said there are students willing to take the risk.

"There are a lot of guys that will try to drink as much as they can and then come to school and see if anyone notices," the student said. "It's a kick for them, because of the danger of getting caught."

"I don't think I'd do something like that, but I know some guys who do, and they laugh because they think they can get away with it," the student added. "They know the worst thing that will happen is maybe a suspension, and that's a joke. They treat it like a vacation."

Johnson said that abuse drugs or alcohol is not a game. "We don't consider it a game, not when you're talking about the lives of young people," he explained.

look we're after." Savedes is no stranger to the restaurant business, but neither is just about every member of his family. He and brothers Al and Mark and father, Aleko, run two other restaurants - in South Lyon and Hamburg - and Sam worked for years with his uncle and cousins at Gus's in Howell.

"They've got the best baby-back ribs in Livingston County and we brought that to Northville," Sam boasts. "You should always do what you do best."

Savedes said workers put in months of renovation effort on the building, taking the walls "right down to the studs."

Now freshly refurbished, the interior sports a low, understated look, with walls painted off-white and large black and white photographs providing the decor.

Uptown Cafe offers seating for 66 and includes nine booths and seven tables. There is a lunch and

a dinner menu, with the possibility of breakfast offerings sometime in the future.

Lunch includes sandwiches, a variety of salads, seafood and pasta dishes. Italian chicken noodle soup is on the menu every day.

Savedes said customers can expect to pay about 50 cents more for sandwiches but it's "definitely worth it," in his view.

Dinner specialties are ribs, chicken and pasta. Rice pudding and New York cheesecake are the only desserts available to date, but brownie delights and other items are possible for the near future.

Savedes has surrounded himself with several familiar and friendly faces at his restaurant, bringing some of the help with him from Gus's where he used to work. ## ‘Odyssey’ students head for next round

The three teams swept the top three positions at the competition, which was held in Grosse Pointe. More than 160 teams took part in the single day competition, and the top two teams will move on to the state level of competition, scheduled for April 20 at Central Michigan University.

According to Aditya Prasad, member of the Cooke/Meade team that placed first in the competition, building a structure from balsa wood was a challenge.

"We tested everything. First we tested 10 different types of glue to see which one would provide the best bond and support," he said. "Then each member of the team took 10 sticks of balsa wood and built a panel. Each panel was tested and the strongest were used on the structure."

Prasad said that the structure could only weigh eight grams and had to withstand plenty of weight. "Our structure ended holding 173 pounds," he explained. "It could have held more except this year we were required to roll a billiard ball down a ramp into the structure every 50 pounds of weight."

The other members of the first place team were Jessica Walker, Stefanie Russell, Rachel Helwig, and F. Daniel Myers.

Walker explained that the structure was used in a scripted play as well. "In our skit, we were pirates and the structure was the treasure," she said. "We felt we had a good chance of winning because our structure was put together well and the skit was entertaining."

"The team also performed well in the spontaneous round," she added.

Only a couple of points behind was the second place Cooke/Meade team, consisting of Liz Piet, Audrie Lin, Chris Balow, Jacob Helwig, Adam Sinkus, and Ken MacKinnon. The team had to solve the same problem, and according to Balow, the team's

structure managed to hold 153 pounds of weight.

"We also did a lot of testing on our structure to make sure that it would hold plenty of weight," he said. "We paired off and built different parts of the structure, tested them all, and then took the strongest parts."

"I think the hardest part was devising a way to provide gravitational support and at the same time keep the structure under the eight gram weight limit," he added. Teammate Liz Piet agreed.

"We had to first design a structure that would work, as far as holding weight," she said. "The second goal was to incorporate it into a scripted play. We approached that problem by writing a fairy tale explaining what really happened to Humpty Dumpty. It was really funny."

Piet added that the five member team will be focusing on improving the overall quality of its product before the state competition.

"We didn't lose first place by much, and we figure that if we improve our presentation we will have a real good chance of winning," she said.

The third place Cooke/Meade team ended up missing a chance to compete at the state level by only five points. The team, consisting of Nathan Petro, Jennifer Tucker, Jeff Mihalik, Dan Mihalik, Elena Bazini, Megan Gilshire, and Kyle MacFarlane, had a different problem to solve — they had to create an invention that would help handicapped people.

"We decided to devise a way for an amputee to play the trumpet," Petro explained. "Our first step was to do some research so we visited Old Village School to find out what type of special needs handicapped people require."

The team constructed three foot pedals and placed sponges underneath. Then they connected string to the pedals and attached them to swivels that were connected to levers mounted on the trumpet.

## Two Northville instructors given prestigious honors

Two teachers one philosophy - to celebrate kids and education

That's how Northville teachers Bob Sharer and Kate Devendorf approach their jobs every day. Both have taught in the classroom for more than 20 years - Sharer spending 35 years as a Northville High School physics teacher and Devendorf teaching special needs children for 21 years at Winchester Elementary.

Both are extremely dedicated in what they do and both enjoy spending their day teaching young people.

Sharer and Devendorf share something else in common - both were named WDIV/Newsweek Teacher of the Year.

"The recognition makes you feel good in the sense that it validates what you are doing," Sharer said sitting in his physics classroom which is full of all sorts of interesting gadgets. "When you are recognized in this fashion, you're more enthusiastic and you work harder."

"The honor has instilled a higher level of confidence in myself and what I do in the classroom."

Devendorf and assistant Judy Stuart spend the day meeting the learning and sometimes emotional needs of children with special needs.

"The job is extremely rewarding and challenging. I enjoy being a champion for children," Devendorf said. As for the award that's exciting too. I now have a better understanding as to what recognition can mean - not only for myself but for the children as well.

Both teachers were nominated by their peers. The yearly award recognizes outstanding teachers in the tri county area with an elementary, middle and high school teacher from each of the three counties - Oakland, Macomb and

Wayne - being selected.

The Northville School district has had at least one teacher selected for the award for the past five years. This is the third year in a row that at least two Northville teachers have received the award.

The Wayne County Regional Educational Service Agency (RESA) coordinates the program for Wayne County, and the committee bases its decision on biographical and career summaries, the ability to excite students to maximum potential, superior subject knowledge and an ability to share that knowledge with students, classroom management skills and outstanding leadership and citizenship qualities.

"Both teachers are well respected by their peers and have earned the respect of their students," said School Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski. "We are extremely proud of their accomplishments."

For Sharer, making physics fun for high school students has been one of his greatest challenges.

"The kids love the lab work, and I always try to schedule labs in that touch on various areas within physics," he said. "Allowing them to handle the equipment and go through the entire process step-by-step is a wonderful learning experience."

"I think that's where I have changed the most, trying to make the class more hands-on as opposed to lectures, reading and tests," he added.

Currently there are about 170 students enrolled in Sharer's physics classes.

"I think we've brought physics to the more general population of students," he said. "What makes it more enjoyable for me is that I am learning right along with them."

Devendorf finds her classroom at Winchester a long way from the classrooms of her youth in

Unionville, Mich.

"My father took an active involvement in education," she said. "I think that interest rubbed off because I knew I wanted to teach and more importantly I

knew I wanted to spend my time with children."

"I love what I do here. The job is a challenge, and I truly enjoy being a champion of public education and special needs children," she

added. "What makes it even more pleasurable is that at Winchester I am surrounded by teachers who celebrate children, and really help each other out."

"I really couldn't be successful if

I didn't have the support of (Principal) Kathy Morhous and the rest of our staff. They make everything possible."

Both teachers will be honored at a banquet at the Roostertail in May, where they will each receive a \$2,000 award. This is the 10th year for the Outstanding Teacher Awards Program.

## Local clerks object to primary process

They work hard to make sure our elections run smoothly. Northville's and Novi's election clerks face a tougher row to hoe nowadays, however, in the wake of recent changes in state law making it harder to find poll workers.

Michigan has always required the election-day workers who staff the polls around the state to declare their party preference and required local communities to appoint an equal number of Democrats and Republicans. The idea is to lessen the chance of someone playing hanky-panky with voting results.

The notion makes sense, Northville City Clerk Delphine Gutowski said, but has always caused headaches around here, an area that's overwhelmingly GOP country. The problem's only been magnified by a 1995 state law which requires local clerks to submit the names of their election workers to the chairpeople of their county's Democratic and Republican parties.

Tuesday's presidential primary (March 19) will be the first time the law's new provisions will take effect. Party chairs can challenge the names of anyone on the list and appeal the matter to the local

city council or board of trustees.

"Because of some problems in a few other communities, the state's making us do a lot more work," Gutowski said. "If they want to pull this kind of stuff, I say they should give us the people to work our elections."

"It's ridiculous," Northville Township Clerk Sue Hillebrand agreed. "It's burdensome on us. If I can't find enough people to staff our precincts (because of this), I plan to go to the party chairs and say 'OK, you find them.'"

"We have a hard enough time finding workers as it is," Tonni Bartholomew, Novi city clerk, said. "This just makes it harder."

The three clerks also are united in their dislike of the presidential primary itself, arguing that the public shouldn't have to pay for the process of selecting delegates to private political parties' conventions. The March 19 vote will cost state taxpayers at least \$10 million.

"Who is the public electing? No one," was how Gutowski put it. "They're picking delegates to a convention that are only obligated to vote for the candidate that voters pick for the first two or three (convention) ballots. After that if nobody's won the nomination, they're free to do they want."

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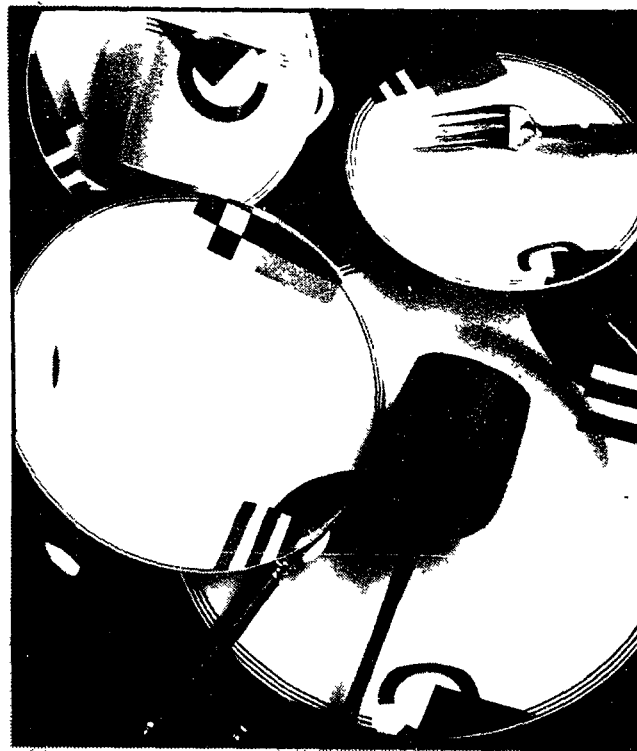
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# Ann Arbor hopeful mounts challenge for U.S. Congress

Joe Fitzsimmons is restless. Fitzsimmons retired from his longtime position at University Microfilms International (UMI) last June but wasted little time deciding on a possible new direction - the United States Congress.

Fitzsimmons, a Republican, was an early filer to challenge for the 13th District Congressional post, notifying the Federal Elections Commission of his intention to run for office as early as July 5 of last year.

"I'd like to see if we can't fundamentally change the way the government process works," the 61-year-old Ann Arbor resident said. "I think the people inside the Beltway forgot who the customers are, the customers are you and me."

Michigan's 13th Congressional District includes Northville Township and Wayne County Northville. First-term Democrat Lynn Rivers of Ann Arbor now represents the district in the House of Representatives.

Fitzsimmons retired as president of UMI after 29 years with the firm. He said the company boasted only \$5 million in sales when he joined it but came in close to \$200 million at the time he left.

"The government in my view should be run more like a business - not entirely but it should adopt more business practices," he said. "In many cases they have people who are not motivated, they have people who are just stacked in there like wheat and we need to change that."

Fitzsimmons earned an engineering degree from Cornell University in 1957 then went to work for the Haloid Co. which later became Xerox.

In 1966 he joined UMI where he served in several capacities including chief executive officer from 1976-93. He became chairman of UMI in 1994.

Fitzsimmons said he didn't become active politically until he

spent time in Washington lobbying for clients like the *New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal* and *The Washington Post*.

While there, his interest was piqued by the waste and inefficiencies he saw.

"I'd look out the window at the joggers on the bridges of the Potomac at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and say, 'Wait a minute, that's our tax dollars at work. If we ran our businesses like that back home we'd be out of business in a heart beat.'"

Fitzsimmons depicts himself as a straight-ahead conservative who favors tax, regulatory and welfare reform, as well as big cuts in government.

"We've got 131,000 pages in the code of regulations," he insisted. "There's another 4,500 or so on the drawing board. Where do you draw the line?"

"We need clean air and clean water but what we don't need is distilled water or oxygen. We don't need to spend millions and billions of dollars beyond the point of return from a common sense point of view."

Fitzsimmons said he supports the idea of a flat tax, though he couldn't be specific about particulars. He also said he'd like to see the Internal Revenue Service abolished and its functions turned over to a "much smaller group."

"We don't need this huge bureaucracy. We could save hundreds of millions of dollars," he added.

Regarding welfare reform, Fitzsimmons said the federal government could take a cue from the Michigan model, which has helped Gov. John Engler gain national prominence. He opposes government funding of abortions but is pro choice.

He also favors a balanced budget term limits and "tough enforcement" of criminal laws, including the death penalty for major drug dealers.

Fitzsimmons, an adjunct lecturer at the University of Michigan School of Information and Library Studies and the first president of the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum, said he is "very pro education."

but would consider downsizing the department of education.

"I want the kids to get hooked on books, not on drugs, but I am against a huge federal bureaucracy saying this is what you ought to do."

"I believe in a wide diversity of education choices - community colleges, charter schools, a whole variety."

Fitzsimmons attributed Rivers' defeat of Republican nominee John Schall in 1994 to poor funding on Schall's part, something he vows won't happen to his campaign.

He said he raised \$216,850 last year alone and is anticipating a budget of \$1.1 million.

When contacted this week, Rivers said she is leaning toward running for a second term and acknowledged raising roughly \$237,300 for her reelection bid during 1995.

No other Republican candidate besides Fitzsimmons has announced for the 13th District GOP nomination thus far. The Congressional primary will take place Aug. 6.

In addition to Northville Township and Wayne County Northville, the 13th District includes Plymouth, Canton, part of Livonia, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Belleville, Romulus, Garden City and the Wayne/Westland area.

# Honigman turns in resignation

which expires in 1999.

Both State Rep. Barbara Dobb, R-Commerce Township, and State Rep. Willis Bullard, R-Milford, have already announced they will seek to fill the vacancy left by Honigman. Bullard now represents Oakland County Northville in the Michigan House.

Honigman's legislative aide D. J. Lincoln said that the state Senator is not yet endorsing a successor.

"I guess he is leaning towards a certain candidate. He'll be releasing that later," Lincoln explained.

While not ruling out the possibility that he might seek public office in the future, Honigman said his doctors had advised him that failure to look after his physical well-being "may pose grave and perhaps even ultimately fatal health risks."

"After trying every imaginable medical treatment and visiting medical experts across the country over the last two years, even I have to conclude that I am unlikely to recover fully if I do not stop working as hard as I do now and if I don't dedicate most of my time and effort to recovering, a process which may take several years," Honigman said in a letter released Tuesday.

"I have concluded that it is not fair to the people that I represent or to my colleagues to continue serving in an important public office when it is unlikely that I will be able to function in the near future at the high level of performance they have a right to expect. It would be unethical to permit a Senate office to be half-full for three years."

In 1994, when Honigman ran for a second term in the Senate, he said his health was not an issue and that he was recovering from the removal of his intestine early that year.

"I have continued on in public office, hoping to fully recover as time passed despite the doctors' warnings about the risks I am taking by not taking it easy. I have had serious illnesses and surgeries from childhood onward and I consistently confounded the doctors' predictions by recovering speedily and completely," he said.

"I hoped and expected that I would be able to do so again."

But this year Honigman has been noticeably absent from the Senate floor.

## Senator speaks movingly of difficult health condition

In 1984, when he was 29 years old, Dave Honigman was elected to the Michigan House of Representatives.

Since then, he's remained in Lansing. He was reelected in 1988 and ran unopposed in 1990, voters put him in the Senate for the first time and returned him there in 1994.

Honigman is a graduate of Yale University and the University of Michigan Law School. Some of his current health problems have been attributed to his participation in wrestling and judo at college. He was once a national winner in judo and twice a Connecticut state champion.

Following are excerpts from the five-page March 12 letter announcing his resignation:

"As you may know, I have undergone six surgeries and many months of hospitalization and illness over the last couple of years. Three of those surgeries were abdominal surgeries. ... Unfortunately, these spinal surgeries have not cured me. As a result of both severe back and abdominal pain, and to control the medical consequences of having so little small intestine

left, I have to take many medications daily and spend a great deal of time caring for and physically rehabilitating myself. ...

"Because my health no longer permits me to do battle with the problems that plague our state with the all-consuming intensity and passion that my position requires, I feel a moral duty to retire and to allow someone not restrained by physical limitations to replace me and to continue that quest in my stead."

"It is difficult to retire when there are so many pressing legislative issues and causes I am involved with and deeply concerned about. ... No one person is indispensable to the continued life of a cause that is truly good. ... For now, I stand ready to still be of service to good and noble causes as my health permits and I hope to perhaps be able to return someday to life of full-time public service. ...

"To the people of my district, you have my heartfelt gratitude for choosing me on so many occasions to represent you. I only hope that my service has made a difference for some of you."

be slated for 45 days after the filing date for the office. For the election, another 45 days must be set aside between the filing and the day the voters hit the polls. This could be a special election or it could coincide with previously scheduled elections.

Both Dobb and Bullard say they find the idea of moving from the state House to the Senate appealing, because it is easier to make an impact in the Senate, with its 38 members, than in the house, with 110.

Dobb, 46, is a certified public accountant. She says she's ready to take on the Senate post because her district already covers most of the communities within the district. Dobb has been in the House for five years.

"You have a working majority of Republicans in the Senate. Often in the House you have one or two Republicans in the caucus that could hold the rest of the House

hostage by withholding their votes," she said.

"I feel I'm very much in tune with the constituents. I grew up in the area."

It's an opportunity to represent a larger district, Bullard, 52, a 14-year veteran of the House, said. An attorney, he's up for reelection in November and due to term limits that would have to be his final term as a state representative.

Honigman notified the governor of his decision on Monday.

"All of us who had the pleasure of knowing and working with Senator Honigman are saddened today by his departure. But we are inspired and enlightened by his courage in the face of immense personal challenges," Engler said.

Honigman has had aspirations towards national office. In 1992, he attempted to win the Republican nomination for the 18th District, but lost out to newcomer, now Rep. Joe Knollenberg, 3.

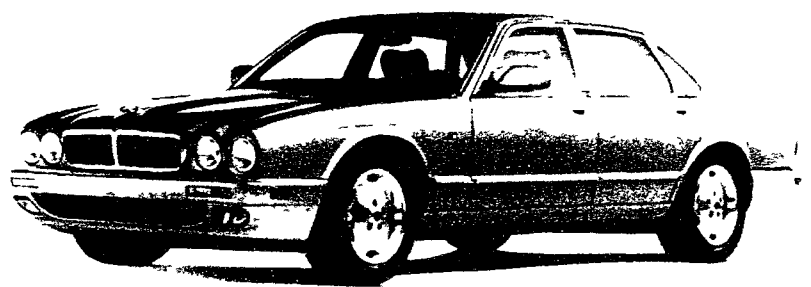

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## Mill Race Matters

As spring approaches the Northville Historical Society once again seeks volunteers to help with a variety of summer and fall activities. Some activities are ongoing throughout the year while others are one-time events. Most volunteer endeavors can be tailored to the time the individual has available.

Offering to assist in the work of a community organization provides contact with neighbors and other area residents as well as the sense of accomplishment at seeing necessary work completed. Of course, it also provides the volunteer with the knowledge that they have helped to better the community in which they live.

Included in the projects for which assistance is needed are: the Sunday afternoon docent program, the weekday school tour docent program, building maintenance and repair, Tivoli Fair chairs and workers, helpers and leaders for the Fourth of July and the Victorian Festival Mill Race activities, creators of new and interesting projects, and much more.

Docents meet in early spring to discuss the upcoming Village season which this year runs from May 26 to mid October. The Historical Society tries to keep all eight buildings open each Sunday afternoon from 1-4 p.m. The effort requires a substantial volunteer pool. Training will be provided for individuals interested in sharing a few Sunday afternoons during the summer months.

School tour leaders provide weekday educational experiences for elementary students from this region. The effort requires opening the school, discussing its purpose and history with students, providing a tour of the Village and then closing the building later in the day. School tours are scheduled on weekdays between April and the close of the school year then again during the fall months. This season most dates from April until June are already filled. Again training can be provided.

The Stone Gang meets each Tuesday from 9 a.m. until noon at the Village. This group of retired gentlemen work on grounds maintenance, light building repair, and creative projects to provide extra funding for the Village. Recently they have created a set of Mill Race birdhouses for sale.

Tivoli Fair, a juried arts and crafts fair, occurs on the final Friday and Saturday of September. It serves as the primary fund-raising event which maintains the Village, frequently bringing in almost one half of the operating expenses for Mill Race. The two-day event provides enormous opportunity for volunteering.

Numerous individuals are needed to clean and prepare the Northville Downs facility then later to clean up afterwards. Others are needed to staff ticket booths and act as floor monitors assisting vendors as needed. Still others work to sell baked goods and Historical Society items during the event.

Planning activities include publicity to newspapers and magazines, distribution of fliers in the area, jurying booth layout, supply purchase, and a variety of odds and ends.

July 4 and the Victorian Festival provide opportunities for the members of the Northville community to show off Mill Race Village to visitors. In order to do this assistance above and beyond the regular volunteers is needed. In addition to building staffing, special activities like children's games require workers.

Historical Society members also march en masse in the parades that precede both of these events. Marchers are always needed.

Other programs and projects over the years have included the recent Auction '96 Progressive Dinners, Educational Workshops, quarterly publication, dinner dances, meeting programming, Christmas Walks and much more.

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

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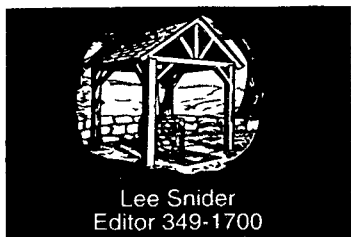

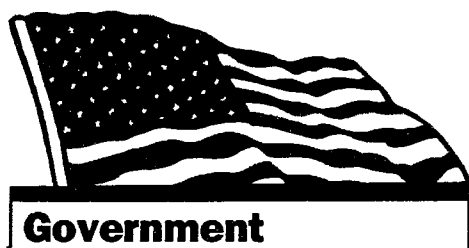
### Interest in downtown bodes well for future

It's good to see that the Northville Downtown Development Authority has come up with something resembling a vision for the downtown. The DDA has been mostly silent in recent times, and many are wondering what, if anything, will ever be done with the war chest the authority has gathered from incremental property taxes within the DDA boundaries.

But we finally saw some movement earlier this month when the DDA put forward a proposal for an "economic summit" to be held in April. Under the plan, approved by the Northville City Council March 4, the Virginia-based consulting firm of HyettPalma will huddle with city representatives and try to find out what can be done to stimulate the economy of the central business district.

We're usually skeptical about development sessions. Often all that comes from them is a lot of nebulous talk about market possibilities and future directions.

But, when done right, concrete recommendations that have real follow-up potential can result from professional consultations. If HyettPalma officials spend enough time feeling the pulse of the city they might be able to put forth some suggestions to increase pedestrian traffic. In any event, the summit is slated to cost only around \$2,500, so the financial risks are minimal.



If they're smart, city officials will advise their consultants to seek out members of the newly formed Central Business Association.

The CBA was launched during the 1995 holiday shopping season and is continuing its organizational efforts now. The association is planning to hold another meeting later this month and is contemplating a summer event that would replace the annual Sidewalk Sale.

Members of the association have shown a spark of energy that has been too rarely seen in the city. Under CBA leadership, there is a real chance that the various downtown elements could come together and work toward the common goal of promoting a healthy and viable business district that attracts spenders as well as browsers.

The economic summit is a step in the right direction and so is the formation of the CBA. Let's hope this is the start of a renewed dynamism and interest in the downtown.

### Law makes it possible to keep lid on tuition

As higher education becomes more expensive, Michigan needs to make sure public university boards make an effort to hold down tuition rates. Fortunately, this is a case where people can fight "city hall."

Under a 1995 law, a student's family is eligible for an income tax credit of \$250 a year - or \$1,000 over four years - for tuition, with one catch: The university must hold its tuition increase at or below the consumer price index (CPI), which, during the 1990s, has been in the 3 percent ballpark.

The law was sponsored by Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, and enacted with a great deal of fanfare. Now there's an effort to repeal it.

Only four universities have capped tuitions and made 155,000 students eligible for the tax break: Michigan State, Western Michigan and Grand Valley, all at 2.6 percent; and Lake Superior State, 2.5 percent. Families of their students received tax breaks totaling \$12 million.

Here is the record of others in southeastern Michigan:

Eastern Michigan University, 4 percent.

Wayne State University, 4.1 percent.

University of Michigan - Dearborn, 4.7 percent.

Oakland University, 5.9 percent.

University of Michigan - Ann Arbor, 6.8 percent.

Three of our 15 universities are governed by elected boards. The others are governed by boards appointed by the governor. All boards have eight members. None is a dictatorship. We need to keep pressure on the schools that aren't cost conscious.

Unfortunately, Gov. John Engler and key members of the Senate Appropriations Committee on higher education don't see it that way. They want to declare the tax break a failure, end it, take the savings and spread it more or less evenly to all 15 universities.

We oppose that move. The tax credit should stay, as written.

There is no guarantee - or even a ghost of a chance - the universities will use the extra revenue to cap tuitions. They are most likely to succumb to administration, faculty and staff pressures to keep on spending.

The benefit should be targeted to students and their families at the universities which control costs. They are the most deserving. Tuition is a far higher proportion of university revenue that it was a generation ago.

What can students, parents and grandparents do?

- If you're close to a campus, visit the governing board and give them a piece of your mind. Their meeting schedules are published. They are governed by the Open Meetings Act, which requires them to listen to public comment. If even a few people gripe about high tuition, the board is likely to pay attention and exercise some ingenuity in holding down costs and tuition.

- Pay attention to whom the Republican and Democratic parties nominate in their post-Labor Day conventions. Become a delegate in the party of your choice, and ask the candidates tough questions. Tell the candidates you'll oppose them if they don't promise to hold down tuition.

- If you can't take part in the party conventions, look up the candidates when they come to town. Usually they are desperate for audiences and will speak to any group that will listen for 15 minutes. Then ask them if they'll hold down tuition. Tell them to hold down tuition. If they won't promise to hold down tuition, tell them you won't vote for them.

- Write letters to the editor about the candidates' views.

The law is designed so constituents will put pressure on the university board. The law will work if constituents use it. Tuitions can be capped.

## Dialog sessions were failed elixir

Is the Northville Public School District selling consensus building or snake oil?

That's the question I asked myself as I walked out, in disgust, from the beginning of the third and final meeting that was billed as a Community Dialog.

Why did I leave? Simple - I don't believe a true community dialog ever took place.

That's right, you the taxpayers of Northville put up \$50,000 to bring Dr. William DeJong into our community to help us wrestle with a concept for the future of Northville High School. We were all invited, and at the first

dialog Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski told us this would be the forum for all the complaints, concerns, and ideas. "I don't want it discussed in the parking lots, at cocktail parties, in back rooms," he told us. "I want it all put on the table right here, and right now." But that never happened.

I don't blame Leonard. I happen to believe he was dead serious when he made the remark. He's tired of the whispers, the allegations, the mistrust. He wants to right the wrongs that happen within the district and he believed that in hiring DeJong and creating a forum the community would come forth and we would all hash this thing out together.

Unfortunately, that didn't happen, and I'm putting the collective blame on everyone involved.

Instead of community members coming together to openly - not in small little groups, but out in the open for everyone to hear the exchange of ideas - communi-

cate their vision of the future, we got charts and figures, and square feet, and more figures, and trends, and data. And just when I thought things couldn't get any worse, we brought in Dr. Rudy Randolph.

Yep, it's true. Just as some community members were beginning to actually ask questions of our hired consultant Tuesday evening, Dr. Rudy interrupted the proceedings for a little bit of fun. There were ripples of laughter as he gave Dr. DeJong some roundies and made wisecracks to district officials.

I didn't think it was funny. As a matter of fact the incident caused me to ask some serious questions about the whole process. Did the district really want community input or were we just invited to place a collective stamp of approval for an upcoming bond election? Was DeJong hired to spirit community debate, or was he brought on board to steer us toward a predetermined decision?

# Days of two-party system numbered

Meditations on next week's Michigan presidential primary election

How'd he do that? Simple: He talked bluntly about things - nasty things like race, law 'n' order morality and school busing - that most respectable politicians were scared to talk about.

But let's face it. Those were things that touched a lot of folks where they lived. Wallace touched them and, in so doing, extended a long and powerful tradition of silent populist discontent that runs back to Father Coughlin, the "radio priest" from Royal Oak, and Huey Long, the "every man a king" senator from Louisiana.

Buchanan also talks bluntly about things - nasty things like abortion, immigration, jobs

and tariffs - that most respectable politicians are scared to talk about.

These things touch a lot of people where they live. Political transactions are denominated in emotion, not cognition. And Buchanan's campaign is the only one fueled on high-octane emotion.

His appeal is a special conundrum for the Republican Party. The traditional GOP reflex is to support the workings of the free market, free trade and the global economy at the same time as it advocates traditional family values. Buchanan, however, realizes that it is precisely the unfettered workings of the global market that are doing most to erode today's economic security and community morality.

Much as the Republican hierarchy would wish it, Buchanan won't go away. Neither did George Wallace in 1972 nor Jesse Jackson in 1988. Nor will Ross Perot.

Each represents fears and discontent that the traditional two-party structure has failed to accommodate. That's why the American political system keeps straining and tugging at the bonds of the two traditional parties.

A couple of weeks ago, I had dinner with a group of thoughtful and engaging people. The conversation turned to the politics of the future. To my surprise, everyone felt there would be three or more parties within 10 years.

What's driving this? Certainly the new global economy and the force of technology

have shattered the economic foundation of people's lives and threatened the stability of their values. Traditional politics can't keep up.

But there are two more subtle and pervasive factors.

One is the "reflexively cynical" way (James Fallows' phrase) the news media treat politics and politicians. Like the Chinese water torture, relentlessly cynical media coverage eventually wears down innate trust in a political system.

The other has to do with fundamental changes taking place in how we access information. I believe the convergence of digitized database technology with the distribution capability of the Internet and the World Wide Web are the most significant changes since Gutenberg invented movable type in the 15th Century.

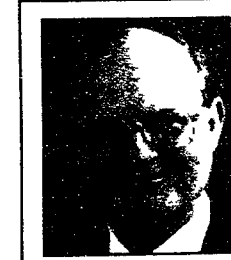
With the Web, transmitting and receiving information become individualized, no longer dependent on mass media. When opinion and information are filtered through the individual prisms of countless individual participants in the Web, the basis of the traditional clumping of people into just two parties changes forever.

For me, at least, that's scary, just like listening to George Wallace back in 1972 or Pat Buchanan today.

# Court ill advised in impound ruling

The police state won one this month. The vote was 5-4.

Justice William Rehnquist wrote the lead opinion and was joined, predictably, by Justices Antonin Scalia, Clarence Thomas and Sandra Day O'Connor - plus Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a Clinton appointee.

The case was complicated because the wife, Tina Bennis, was co-owner of the car for which the couple paid \$600. In other words, an innocent party was being punished by Detroit police and the Wayne County prosecutor's office.

One evening in 1988, John Bennis cruised a northwest Detroit neighborhood looking for a lady of the evening. It's a neat neighborhood. As a teen, I used to walk through

there. At night. Alone. That was years ago.

But when Bennis took his fateful ride, neighborhood street corners had become pickup points. A civic-minded resident who worked for the prosecutor reportedly had raised Cain about such activity.

Two cops caught Bennis and his pickup in the act. OK, let the culprits pay the penalty. But confiscating an innocent wife's property? That's police state stuff.

Originally, the purpose of confiscating property used in the commission of an illegal act was to break up organized crime. As Rehnquist pointed out, 19th century privateers (entrepreneurial pirates) could have their ships confiscated. More recently, Michigan has used the concept to seize the garages and tools of auto "chop shops."

Michigan law declares a property a "nuisance" and forfeitable when used for "lewdness, assignation or prostitution..." Rehnquist cited "a long and unbroken line of cases" allowing forfeiture, "even though the owner did not know that it was to be put to such use." A Nixon appointee, Rehnquist was elevated to chief justice by Reagan.

Dissenting, Justice John Paul Stevens (a Ford appointee) stormed: "Fundamental fairness prohibits the punishment of innocent people."

Added dissenting Justice Anthony Kennedy (Reagan): "This forfeiture cannot meet the requirements of due process." To the argu-

ment that the 1977 Pontiac had little value, Kennedy replied, "Nothing supports the suggestion that the value of her co-ownership is so insignificant as to be beneath the law's protection."

And if Tina Bennis' interests were insignificant, consider that the American Bankers Association filed a brief on her behalf, arguing that forfeiture threatens banks with loss of their collateral. It's not nice to alienate financiers.

Rehnquist and his authoritarians from both ends of the spectrum added another link to the chains of the police state. Other links include excessively imposing life sentences, lifting drivers' licenses for offenses unrelated to driving, lifting professional licenses for offenses unrelated to malpractice, charging a 9-year-old with stalking, and so on. In a police state, any rationale, however contrived, will do.

Justice Stevens, like the late Earl Warren before him, saw the issue properly: "Fundamental fairness."

Local footnote: When the Michigan Supreme Court in 1994 ruled against Tina Bennis, Justices James Brickley and Charles Levin wisely dissented. Brickley is eligible to seek reelection this year. Levin will be forced by age to retire.

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# State school board wants to impact model

Conservatives on the State Board of Education want to put their philosophical fingerprints on the Model Social Studies Content Standards before sending them to 562 local school districts.

"We're ready to receive but not to distribute," board president Clark Durant, R-Grosse Pointe, told a committee of Department of Education staffers and social studies teachers. "But this is very impressive."

The standards show what students at four levels between early elementary and high school are expected to know and how to integrate history, economics, civics and geography with English and the arts.

Some modifications that Durant's conservative majority requested before final approval in mid-March:

- Gary Wolfram, R-Hillsdale and an economics professor at a private college: "We need to show private property rights as a way of solving environmental problems. People didn't own the buffalo, so they became extinct; people owned Hereford (cattle) and they're not extinct."

- Wolfram: "I'd like to see something on the role of profit. Profit is a signal for resources to move from one market to another. I'd like to see a little more on market versus 'command' economics."

- Marilyn Lundy, R-Detroit: She urged "sensitivity" when asking students to make genealogy charts to demonstrate America's ethnic diversity due to immigration because "I see problems with inquiring into family backgrounds."

- Lundy: Be cautious in judging past generations because "they had different ideas of right and wrong. In dealing with children, we used to say don't be judgmental. It was all tolerance. Now all of a sudden, we're telling them to make judgments. It shows the pendulum is swinging."

- Durant: In civics judgments, drop "fairness, which is too limiting and too narrow a word, for justice, which has standards.... It appalls me how few kids have even read the Declaration of Independence."

Kathleen Straus, D-Detroit, stunned the group when she agreed with some of Durant's praise of the standards and emphasis on the Declaration. "I'm impressed. I think they're quite demanding."

## SAMPLE BENCHMARKS

The benchmarks are "models" and not the state-set standards that conservatives abhorred. "The benchmarks don't dictate content," added Karen Todorov of the Department of Education staff.

The report contains 25 content standards, rising in sophistication and difficulty for each of the four school levels. Examples:

Standard 1 is sequencing history. Early elementary students will learn to tell time on different kinds of clocks; use years, months and days as intervals of time; distinguish between past, present and future; and place events of their lives in chronological order.

High school students will learn time periods in American and

Michigan history and describe time periods (such as industrialization and the world wars).

Michael Yocum, an Oakland Intermediate School District staffer who served on the committee, explained, "To think in historical perspective, people must be able to think chronologically."

Standard 2 involves narratives about people. At all levels students will learn to "identify and explain how individuals in history demonstrated good character

and personal virtue" - highly pleasing to State Board members.

Standard 3 involves comparing interpretations of history - "Explain why accounts of the same event differ."

Standard 6 involves ecosystems: "Describe the environmental consequences of major world processes and events."

This is the one Wolfram said should show the role of private property in preserving the ecosystem.

## NO POLITICAL FORUM

"We shouldn't look at it (class) as a forum for political beliefs," said Oakland's Yocum. "We have no right to form the politics of students."

Committee member Dick Jankowski, who teaches in a Bloomfield Hills middle school, said the benchmarks are "not a curriculum but a framework. They are better than top-down standardization."

"They are intellectually

demanding. The student is an active participant."

Committee member Paul Dain, a department head at Bloomfield Hills Andover High and teacher of American government, said the benchmarks will bring accountability into teaching.

"A teacher can't wing it through a semester. Students will find that social studies aren't disconnected from mother courses. In the end, we'll be better governed and have more politically-minded citizens."

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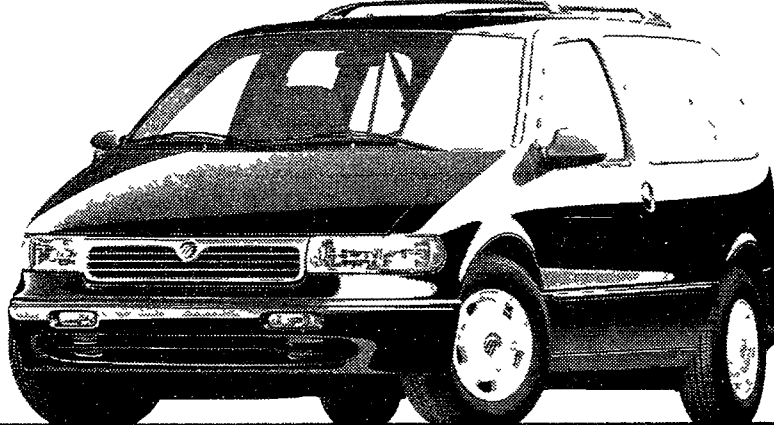

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# New OCC head gets same pay as old chief

Richard Thompson will be paid the same \$120,000 a year as his predecessor when he takes over March 19 as chancellor of Oakland Community College.

The OCC board of trustees on March 11 approved his contract for three years and three months, through the middle of 1999, the end of a fiscal year.

Thompson, 56, of Milford, a veteran administrator in the district office and three of the five OCC campuses, was hired to replace Dr. Patsy Calkins after the board terminated her last October.

Choosing between two applicants, the board last month promoted him from within rather than conduct a lengthy, national search.

"I'm glad it was unanimous," said interim Chancellor Anthony Jarson after the board's 6-0 vote. "He wants to work with everyone."

Other terms of Thompson's contract:

- Through the period ending June 30, 1997, he may be terminated only for just cause.
- In the last two years, he may be terminated at will or for just cause. An at-

will termination will require 30 days written notice. If terminated at will, he can be paid for the rest of his contract; or he may revert to faculty.

- The board will give him an annual evaluation.


- Benefits will be about the same as Calkins' - an annuity, all benefits accruing to administrators, plus five days additional vacation per year.
- Unlike Calkins, Thompson won't receive health club expenses or \$400

per month for such "professional obligations" as professional development, civic and charitable contributions.


Because Thompson's wife and son are classified (technical, non-faculty) employees of OCC, trustee Anne Scott raised the question of whether there may be a violation of the board's anti-nepotism policy.

Three isn't, said Jarson. Thompson will not directly supervise his family members, who have long-time status. "There are no legal grounds to fire them," he added.

### Irish Soda Bread

Preheat oven at 350 degrees  
4 cups sifted flour  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
2 tablespoons caraway seeds (optional)  
1/4 cup butter  
2 cups raisins  
1 1/3 cups buttermilk  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 egg yolk or a little cream  
Grease 2 quart casserole.  
Sift flour, sugar, salt, baking soda

in large mixing bowl. Stir in caraway seeds. Cut in butter till coarse like corn meal. Stir in 1 1/2 cup raisins.  
Combine buttermilk, egg and soda. Stir in flour mixture until moistened.  
Turn dough onto lightly floured surface and knead until smooth. Knead in remaining 1/2 cup raisins. Shape dough into balls.

One hour before serving add potatoes, carrots, onions.  
Continue simmering.  
One half hour before serving add cabbage, which has been cut into quarters.

### Irish Cream

2 cups half and half  
1 can condensed milk  
1/4 cup Kahlua  
2 cups Canadian Whiskey (80 proof)  
1 teaspoon instant coffee  
Mix together and refrigerate

How do they do all these things?

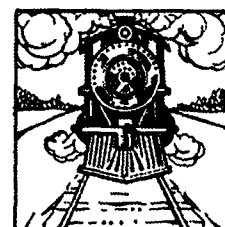

The choir was based on the Wayne campus until last year, when it moved its rehearsal home to Royal Oak.

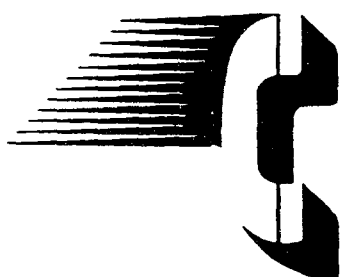

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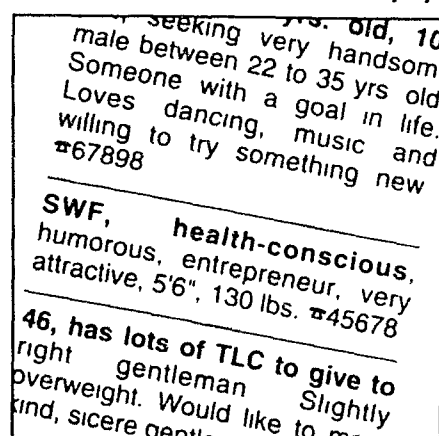

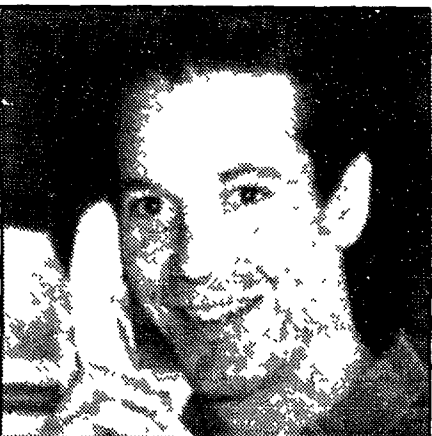

# Heritage comes through in dance

A group of local kids are learning the ways of their ancestors and are quite in demand this time of the year.

The Northville and Novi youngsters are learning Irish step dancing which includes jigs, reels, hornpipe and treble jigs and are performing around the Detroit Metropolitan area during the weekend before and on St. Patrick's Day.

in Irish dancing himself, who comes to the Detroit area from Chicago twice a week to teach.

The children perform both soft shoe and hard shoe dances. Jigs and reels are done with a soft shoe similar to a ballet shoe. Dancers wear a hard shoe for the hornpipe and treble jig. Hard shoes are similar to the shoes farmers adapted for dancing by putting nails in the toes and heels to make a clicking sound.

Performances include the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Detroit, Our Lady of Victory Church Party on March 3 and St. Aidan's benefit for Angela Hospice.

"People are discovering that it is a great family activity," said George Shea, president of the Irish Dance Booster Club. "As children learn it they can continue doing their dancing through adulthood." George and his wife, Kathleen,

who is treasurer of the booster club, live in Plymouth.

Dancers, who range in age from four to 20, are usually of Irish descent.

The girls wear ornately embroidered dresses which usually incorporate into their design an animal such as a swan, serpent or lion. The boys wear kilts, plain jackets and a brat, or scarf, on their backs which is symbolic of the blanket soldiers carried on their backs.

As one story goes, according to O'Hare, Irish step dancing has been around for three centuries. During the time when England outlawed everything Irish, including dancing and music, the Irish continued their love of dancing but adapted it so that the legs and feet did all the moves and the upper body was almost motionless and expressionless. Moving English soldiers would not be able to tell

that a party was going on through the windows of their homes. The modern version of Irish step dancing includes more jumping and movement of the upper body.

Irish immigrants retained their dance form after coming to the United States and it is the root for American square dancing, clogging and tap.

O'Hare has about 110 student in the Detroit area, 20 of those are from Northville and Novi.

Children also compete at a Feis, or Irish dance competition, throughout the country. Those that do well, go on to the Midwest championships which are held in November. The very best go on to the national championships. From there it is on to Dublin, Ireland for the World Championships where they compete against dancers from around the world.

## Pacino, De Niro superb in 'Heat'

"Heat" is truly one of the greatest epics that has hit the popular "cop vs. criminal" theme. A solid plot, astounding characters and a depressingly real atmosphere float and swerve through this dark cloud of realism

that the viewer must face.

Al Pacino is a cop married to his job determined to stop an intelligent bank robber, Robert De Niro. Both have chosen a way to live as different as day and night and cannot be separated from it.

Pacino cannot maintain his life with his wife and step child and De Niro cannot afford to have a close companion or even a life "Heat" is not a movie that is just about a super criminal who pulls off some amazing crime and a cop's obsession to bring justice.

A new standard for cop/crook thrillers has been set as this film brings the thoughts and

feelings of two different lifestyles and relates them in a flashy direction.

Pacino and De Niro are superb together, the music is soothing yet disturbing, and a dark atmosphere strongly sends the message that living as a criminal is not the road to take in life.

"Heat" steals a stunning four and one half stars. (Based on five with five tops.) A film with more of a message than action, but the style and mood it is displayed in is a shock to the senses.

The only set back is this flick is almost three hours long!

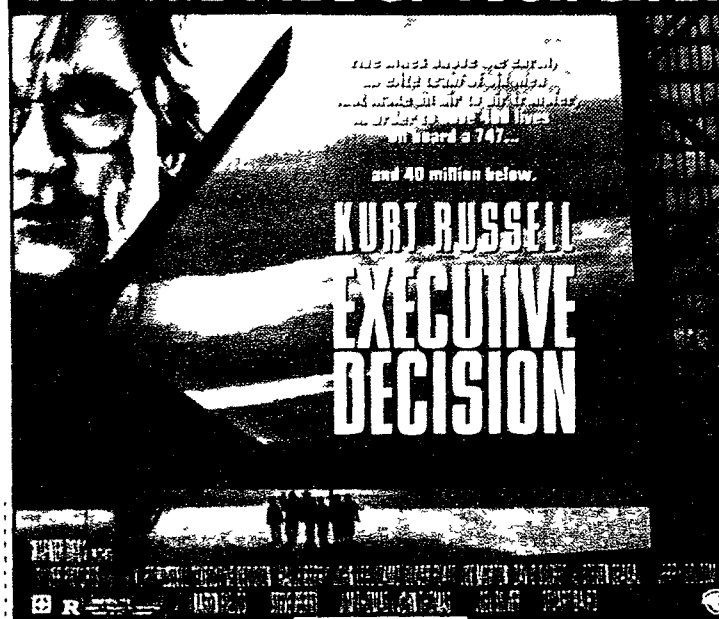

### Gymnasts place 3rd in team state final

At this rate, Northville-Noví will win a state gymnastics title next year.

A year after placing fifth in the state, the combined team moved up to third with a combination of rock-solid performances. Canton edged the Mustangs for second by a mere half-point.

"We were really happy to get third," gymnast Gina Spinazze said. "But we wanted to beat Canton."

The Chiefs beat Northville-Noví by a fraction of a point on the balance beam and floor exercise to take second. Coach Barb Winn said her team may have put too much emphasis on beating Canton.

"We wanted to be top three," she said. "We got there."

Holland won its third consecutive state title Friday at Troy High school with 144.85 points. Canton scored 141.85 for second and Northville-Noví had 141.35 for third.

It's way early, but Winn likes her team's chances of unseating Holland next year. It doesn't hurt that none of her gymnasts graduate this spring.

"If they all take another step up," she said, "we could be there."

Holland won every event but the balance beam. Canton took first in that event.

Northville-Noví placed third on the vault, uneven bars and beam and were fifth in the floor exercise. The Mustangs scored highly in every event by recording at least two nines - with one exception.

The combined team didn't record a nine on the balance beam. A couple of miscues hurt scores in the event.

Winn said her gymnasts were trying more difficult moves on the beam, and all of the events, to try and score more highly.

"I was really proud that they kept working (on new tricks) up until the end," she said.

Erica Winn led Northville-Noví in the meet's first event, the vault. She scored a 9.15 while Noví freshman Nicole Pelletier added a 9.1. Stacey Williamson had an 8.7 and Spinazze an 8.45.

On the uneven bars, Spinazze led the way with a 9.15. Mary

Gymnasts didn't get much of a chance to rest from state competition.

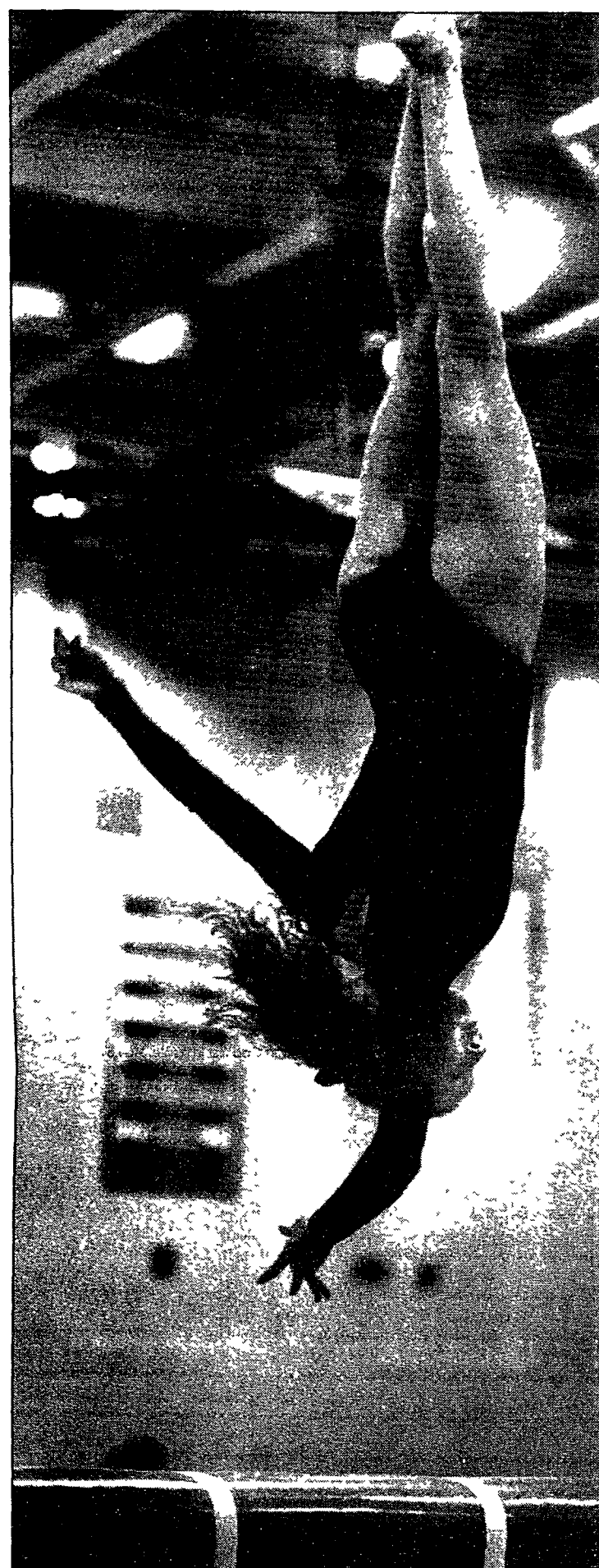
The individual final was held

That work ethic never disap-

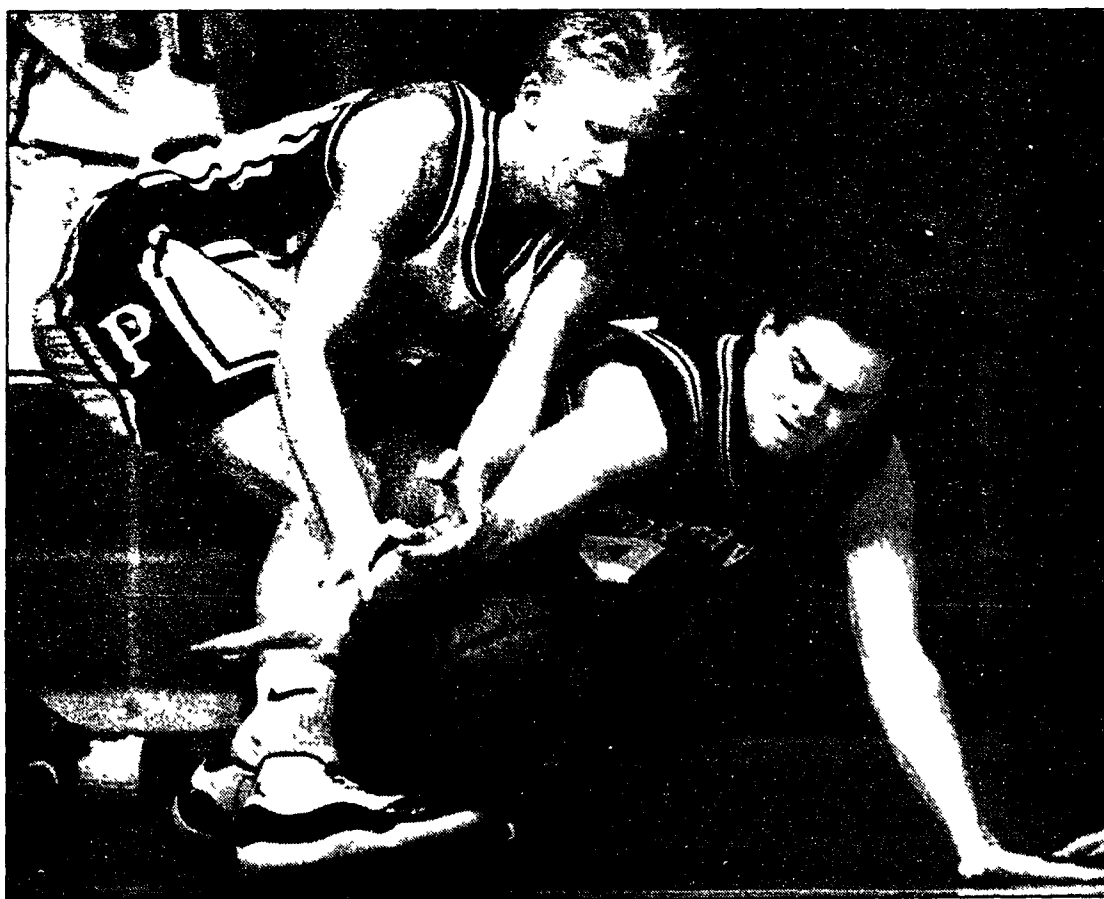

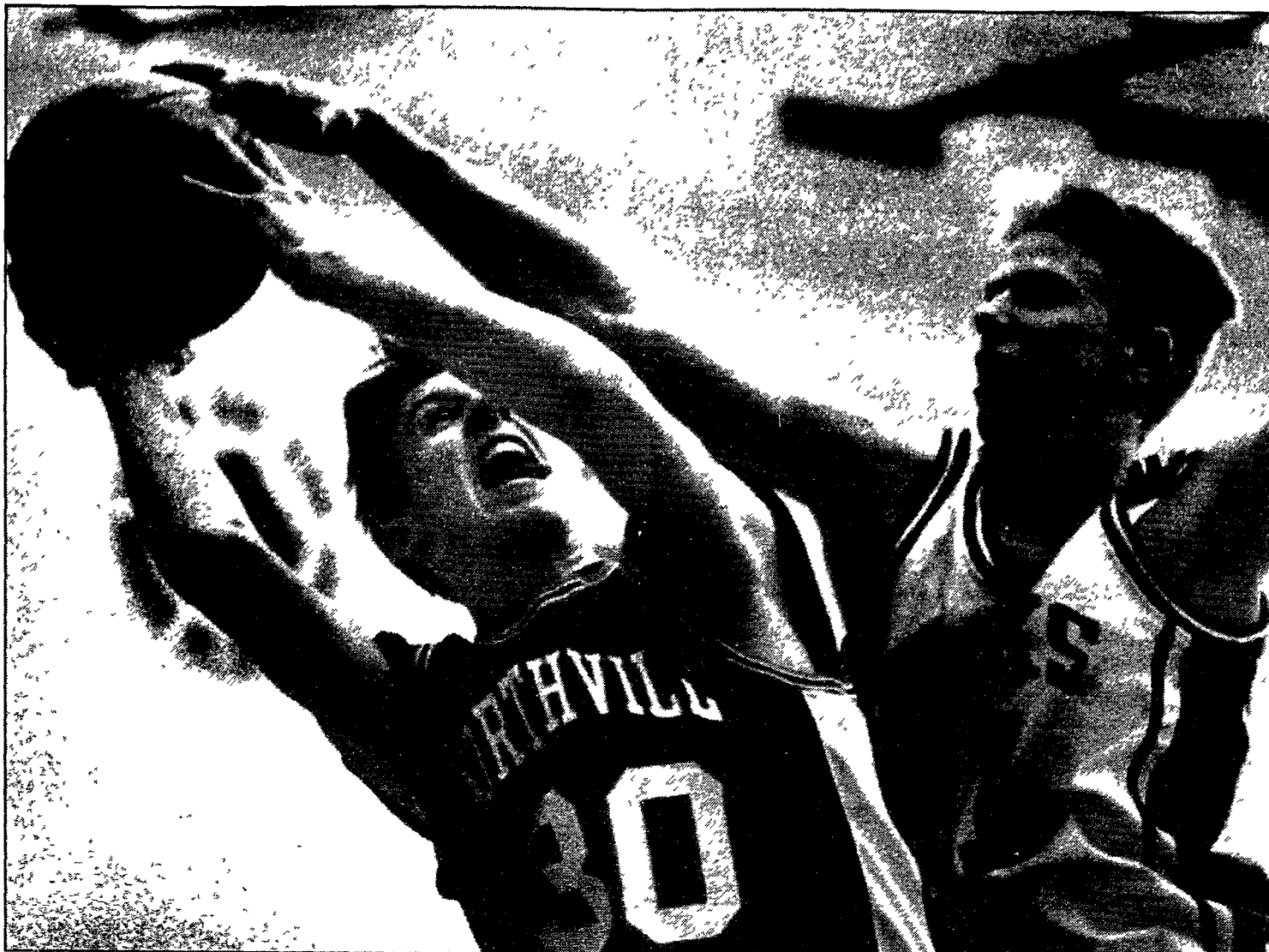

"That hurt him more than anything," he added.

"It's important to go to state finals as a junior or sophomore," said Potter. "You know what's going to go on."

Kyle didn't have as many butterflies. He went out and wrestled aggressively the entire day, said Potter.

The senior faced Clarkston's Ryan Nick in round one and dropped a 6-2 decision. Kyle fell behind 4-0 midway through the second period.

He cut Nick's lead to 4-2 before the period ended. But the Clarkston wrestler scored a reverse of his own to put the match on ice in the third.

Kyle came on big with his lone win in round two. He decided Jacob Champ of Hazel Park 7-1 and "wrestled very well," Potter said.

Kyle needed a win in Friday's final round to advance. But Mickey Cheyne ended his hopes with an 8-3 decision.

Kyle was in the match until the very end. He fought back from a 5-0 deficit with a takedown and escape. But Cheyne held on and took the win to advance.

"James really impressed me," said Potter. "It's the best I've ever seen him wrestle."

Kyle finished the year with a 32-12 record. Sriraman closed with a 29-10 mark.

early in the round. But the 14-year-old recovered and forced a standing eight count on Mitchell before the bell rang.

Banks dominated the final round. A pair of strong right hands gave him a technical knockout about midway through the third round.

The night's best fight was between Dearborn's Fred Hawkins and Detroit's Rodney Robinson. Neither man stood taller than 5-foot-4, but both threw bombs from the opening bell.

The two 132-pounders charged to the middle of the ring and started swinging. Robinson was particularly ferocious as he swung hard enough to lose his footing several times.

He dominated the middle of round one.

But Hawkins took his best shots and came back to win the final minute of the round.

That's pretty much how the fight went. Hawkins took a lot of good shots and gave back just as many. The arm-weary senior novice fighter won the fight in a narrow decision.

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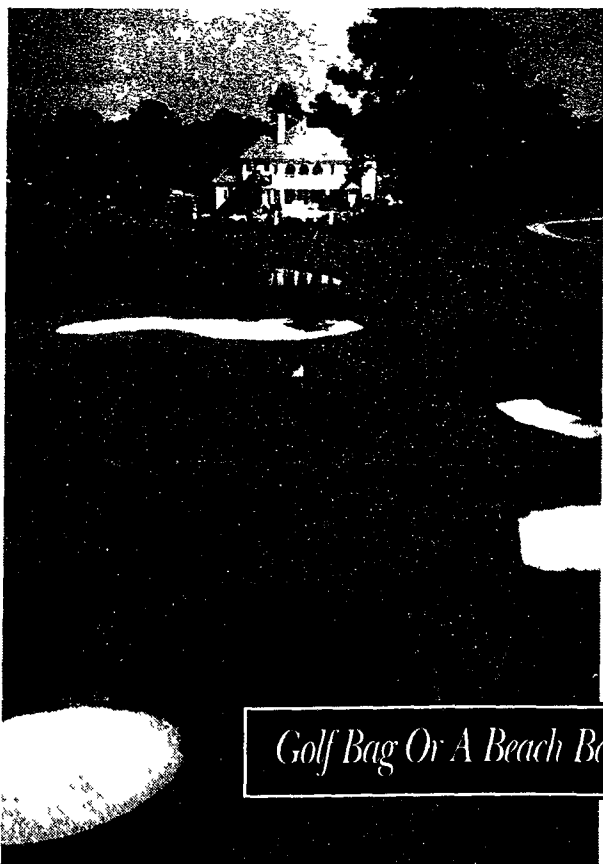
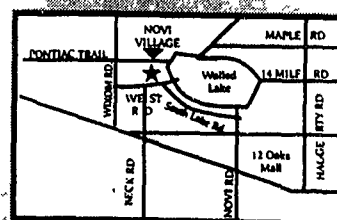

## Don't believe everything you read

Last March the telephone started ringing off the hook with calls by concerned patients who had been alerted, both in the printed news and television news media, that "hypertension medication may cause heart attack risk." Briefly, the media reports suggested that patients taking a blood pressure medication known as calcium channel blocker might increase the risk for a heart attack by 60 percent. Understandably many patients who had been on calcium channel blockers (known by the trade names Procardia, Cardizem, Calan, Isonin and others) became extremely concerned and felt that they were at an increased risk of a heart attack. What the articles, with a few exceptions, failed to mention was that the study quoted was a so-called "case controlled study" where retrospectively patients treated with short-acting calcium channel blockers, such as Procardia 10 mg and Cardizem 30 mg, had experienced a heart attack rate of 1.6 percent as compared to patients who were treated with other blood pressure medications who had experienced a heart attack rate of 1 percent. Obviously the increase in risk of heart attacks was minute in absolute figures, although it did, indeed, amount to 60 percent. Furthermore, the research was performed retrospectively on patients who were treated with short-acting calcium channel blockers which had not been released for the treatment of hypertension, for which presently only long-acting sustained release preparations are being used. Indeed, there is no study that incriminates long-acting calcium channel blockers as causing an increased incidence of heart attacks.

In the scientific medical literature the controversy continued and many medical experts took

exception to the report that caused such mass concern among the many patients that had been successfully treated with calcium channel blockers. Most physicians and experts in the field advised their patients not to discontinue on their own their blood pressure medication, and to consult their physicians before making any changes.

The uproar about this sensationalized report in the media had hardly quieted down when another report appeared in the news media: "Cholesterol lowering medications cause increased risk of cancer." What are the facts behind this new sensationalized media report? When given to rate in a multiple of the dose used in humans, the so-called "statins," which have been extremely effective in lowering cholesterol, were shown to cause some liver tumors, some of which turned out to be malignant. No such relationship was ever shown during treatment of patients. Indeed, two landmark studies, "the 4-S study" which is a study of Simvastatin done in Scandinavia, showed that in patients with coronary artery disease treated with the drug Simvastatin, both the mortality and coronary events were lowered by some 30 percent. In addition, there was a 37 percent reduction in the risk of having to undergo myocardial revascularization procedures. Most recently, a study was reported with the use of Pravastatin (Pravachol) in asymptomatic men with hypercholesterolemia, in which a reduction of 31 percent of coronary event (myocardial infarction or death from coronary artery disease, was seen in those patients treated with Pravastatin. A 22 percent reduction in the risk of death from any cause in the Pravastatin group was proven.

Obviously, in both these large cohort trials, the benefit of treatment with potent cholesterol

lowering drugs far exceeded any risk of increased incidence of cancer. It is understandable, however, that if a patient reads a shortened and incomplete report in the paper or watches it on the television news, he gets extremely concerned about his or her own health and tends to discontinue medication which has been prescribed by his or her physician based on well-established, scientific criteria. It is unfortunate that our news media tend to report perceived main conclusions of complicated scientific trials without explaining all of the ramifications, and thereby create anxiety and panic reactions in many patients who are benefiting from those drugs.

Physicians prescribing these potent drugs for the treatment of high blood pressure and high cholesterol do so based on scientific evidence gained in clinical trials which are thoroughly designed and carried out. Only these large scale clinical trials can conclusively prove or disprove the use of a given medication. A patient who reads an alarmist news report on a drug that he or she might be using should never discontinue the drug without consulting his or her physician and discussing the risk and benefits of the treatment. After all, it is the physician who has spent years of training in acquiring the skill to treat his patients to the best of his knowledge, and not the journalist who writes a quick article that may unnecessarily scare away patients from necessary treatment.

## High cholesterol levels can be trouble

Cholesterol is a naturally occurring substance in the body. It is a building block for many essential body materials and is necessary for survival. When in excess, however, it is a risk factor for cardiovascular disease.

Abnormal cholesterol levels are among the many potential warning signs of cardiovascular disease. The aggressiveness of pursuing cholesterol problems depends not only on the levels themselves, but also on the profile of other risk factors. Therefore, people with multiple risk factors, such as smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, prior history of heart or vascular disease, or a family history of cardiovascular problems, need to pay particular attention to their cholesterol levels.

Cholesterol is produced mainly in the liver and may be absorbed whole from food. The body uses cholesterol to build several important substances such as steroid hormones and bile acids. It is transported internally using a variety of particles with confusing names such as

HDL (high-density lipoprotein), LDL (low-density lipoprotein), and so forth.

Having a high HDL level provides a protective effect, whereas having a high LDL level is an adverse risk factor, hence their nicknames as "good" and "bad" cholesterol. Triglycerides are fats which, if elevated, also reflect increased cardiovascular risk.

If a person is found to have a high risk based on their cholesterol level, treatment is recommended. The first step in treatment is to remove external sources of cholesterol and improve the workings of the body's cholesterol economy.

This means alterations in diet, regular aerobic exercise and weight loss. Furthermore, since the goal of treatment is the reduction of cardiovascular risk, taking care of other treatable risk factors for cardiovascular disease is quite important. This means proper control of diabetes and high blood pressure, as well as quitting smoking.

Dietary treatment involves decreasing both cholesterol and fats in the diet. If fats must be eaten, polyunsaturated fats are better than saturated fats. For example, canola oil is better than lard.

The American Heart Association has published recommendations for proper diets. I would suggest that anyone interested in dietary modification obtain one of their pamphlets or

consult with a professional nutritionist for more detailed recommendations.

Regular aerobic exercise, among its many other benefits, improves cholesterol levels. It increases HDL levels and decreases total cholesterol levels — both favorable effects. Weight loss tends to decrease both total cholesterol and triglyceride levels.

Finally, if dietary modifications, exercise, and weight loss are unsuccessful in lowering the cholesterol to the desired levels it may be necessary to use a medication. There are several medications available, each with its own profile of effectiveness, risk and side effects.

The decision whether to treat and with which agent will depend on the other cardiovascular risk factors, the degree of the cholesterol abnormality, and the preferences of the patient and physician. Monitoring the therapy will generally require regular blood tests.

Cholesterol is a naturally occurring substance essential for survival. Unfortunately, in excess it may lead to cardiovascular disease. Proper lifestyle modifications and medical treatment may reduce this risk.

Colorectal cancer screening kits (take home) screen for early warning signs of ulcers, colitis and cancer. Cost of this take-home test is \$5. A pulmonary function test that measures lung capacity will also be offered for \$5.

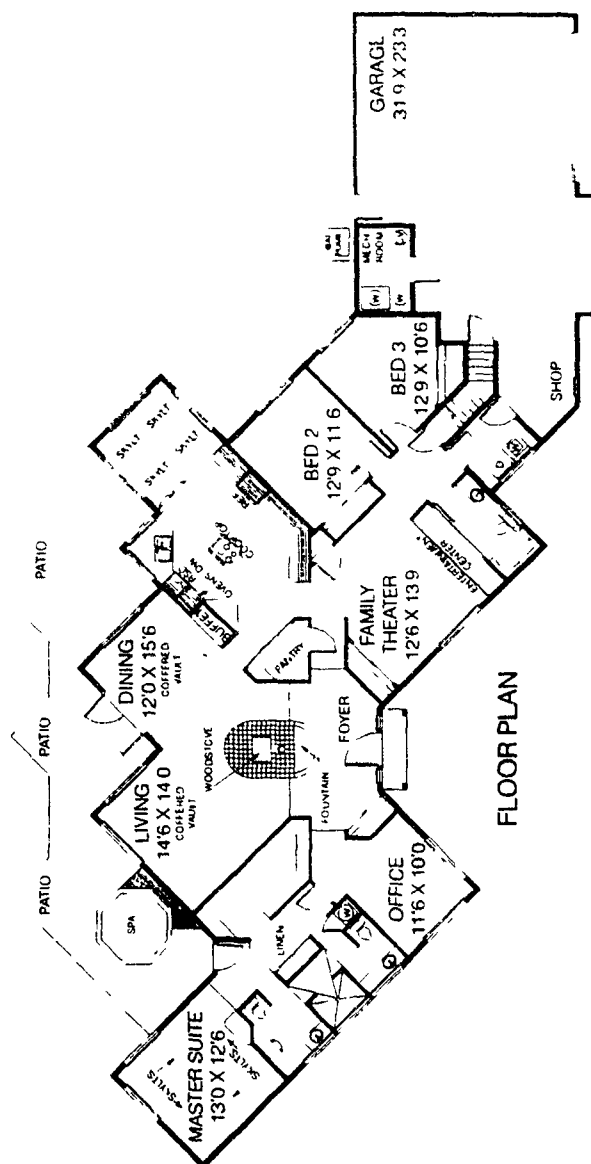

# BORN FREE

Partly feathered birds blown from their nest, tiny rabbits with their eyes barely open found at the edge of your lawn, kitten-sized raccoons orphaned on a busy road — who could resist an opportunity to rescue these helpless creatures?

Though it seems hard-hearted, probably the wisest thing you can do — and in the long run, the least cruel to the wild babies — is to leave them where you find them, says Glenn Dudderar, Extension wildlife specialist at Michigan State University.

"One good reason to leave them alone is that rescuing baby animals is a violation of state law against taking wild animals captive," Dudderar points out. "Another is that most wild animal foundlings really don't need your assistance. Their parent or parents are nearby, just waiting for you to leave so they can take care of their young."

Even if you know the babies have been orphaned or abandoned, taking them in to raise may not have the desired results.

"It takes a lot of time and effort to create a suitable environment for raising a baby bird or animal," Dudderar said.

"Any creature too small to have fur or feathers has to be kept warm to avoid chilling, but it will become dehydrated unless you provide a humid environment. Proper food may be difficult to come by, too."

To live in the wild, many animals need survival training that only their parents can provide. Released in the wild without this training, they are severely handicapped. They may not know where or how to obtain food or even what natural foods to look for because they have always depended on humans to feed them.

Lack of fear of humans is another handicap. Wild animals that have been raised by humans and released may approach other humans seeking food or companionship. Those people may not understand what's going on and interpret an animal's approach as an attack or a sign the animal is ill. They may kill or injure it.

In nature's scheme, it would have been better if the baby animal had not been "rescued" but rather left in the wild to serve as food for a snake, hawk, owl or fox. It would at least have helped another animal to survive.

"Most of the wild animals born or hatched each year die in the first few weeks or months of life," Dudderar notes. "That's part of nature's scheme — baby rabbits die so that baby owls have

something to eat. Common species such as rabbits, robins and raccoons have so many young that the relative few that survive are sufficient to continue the species. If the surplus animals don't die when they're young, disease, parasites or an increase in the predator population kicks in to reduce their numbers later. If you take in a baby animal and raise it so that it can't fit into its natural niche, you're not doing the animal or the species any favors."

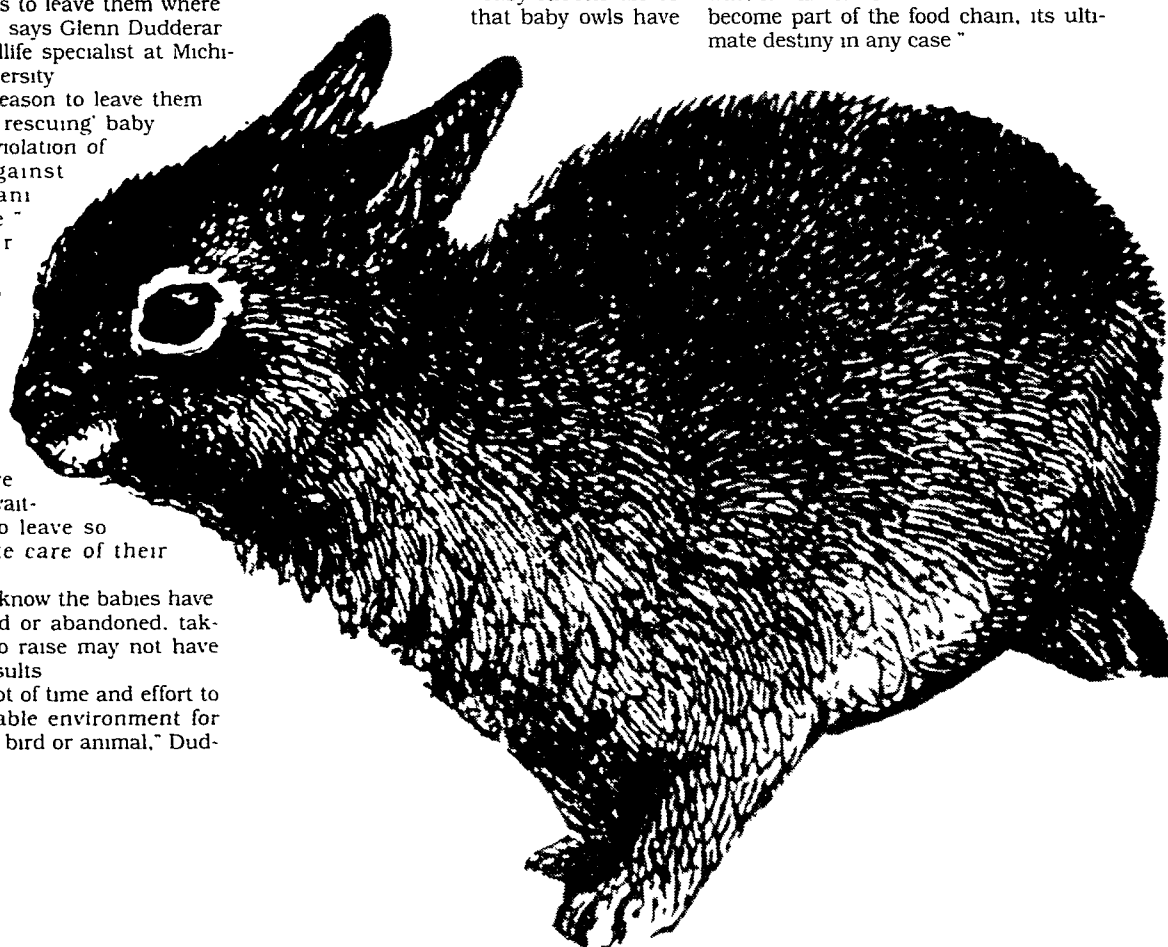
Many, if not most, people have trouble resisting the urge to try to care for an injured or orphaned wild animal, Dudderar said. If you feel compelled to aid an orphaned or injured young animal, consider doing the following:

- Without touching it, try to determine if it is truly orphaned or injured.

- If it is orphaned or injured, contact a local DNR officer, nature center or wildlife rehabilitation center and ask for advice.

- If one of these agrees to accept the animal, the consider capturing it and transporting it to that individual or facility. Remember that in capturing and handling it, you will be exposing yourself to the possibility of injury or disease.

- If the animal is gone when you return, it probably wasn't orphaned or injured," Dudderar pointed out. "If it was, it will either survive on its own or become part of the food chain, its ultimate destiny in any case."



## GARDENING Climate zones

Before buying plants, make sure the varieties you choose are suited to the climate you live in. Creating an attractive garden involves more than just coordinating and selecting a mix of eye-pleasing plants. It won't mean much if your plants wilt, freeze or die because of your climate.

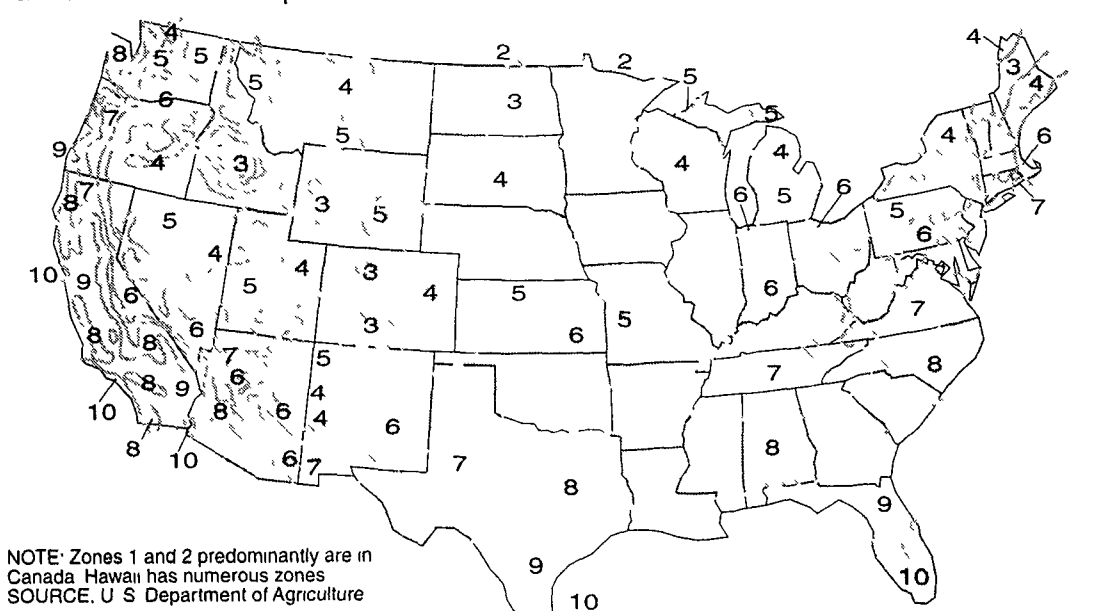
Climate maps show low temperature extremes by zone. By choosing plants best adapted to your zone and planting them at the proper time, you will have more success. Most plants and seeds in nurseries, garden centers and mail-order catalogs will be classified by a growing zone.

Green-thumb gardeners, however, use climate maps only as general guidelines. They realize that within one square mile of their houses may be dozens of microclimates. Even within one's back yard or garden there

may be a half dozen or more situations that affect the choice of plants and planting times.

### CONSIDER THESE FACTORS

**EXPOSURE:** Southern and Western exposures are best because they are the sunniest and warmest. So match a plant's needs to the prop-

er exposure.

**WIND:** Gusting winds can dry out the soil and endanger delicate plants. Especially the cruel winter winds in northern zones.

**ELEVATION:** When planting plants and their placement in the garden or yard, remember that cold air sweeps down hills and rests in low areas.

These frost packets are OK for some plants, but deadly for others. Always put plants that prefer warmth on the tops and sides of hills.

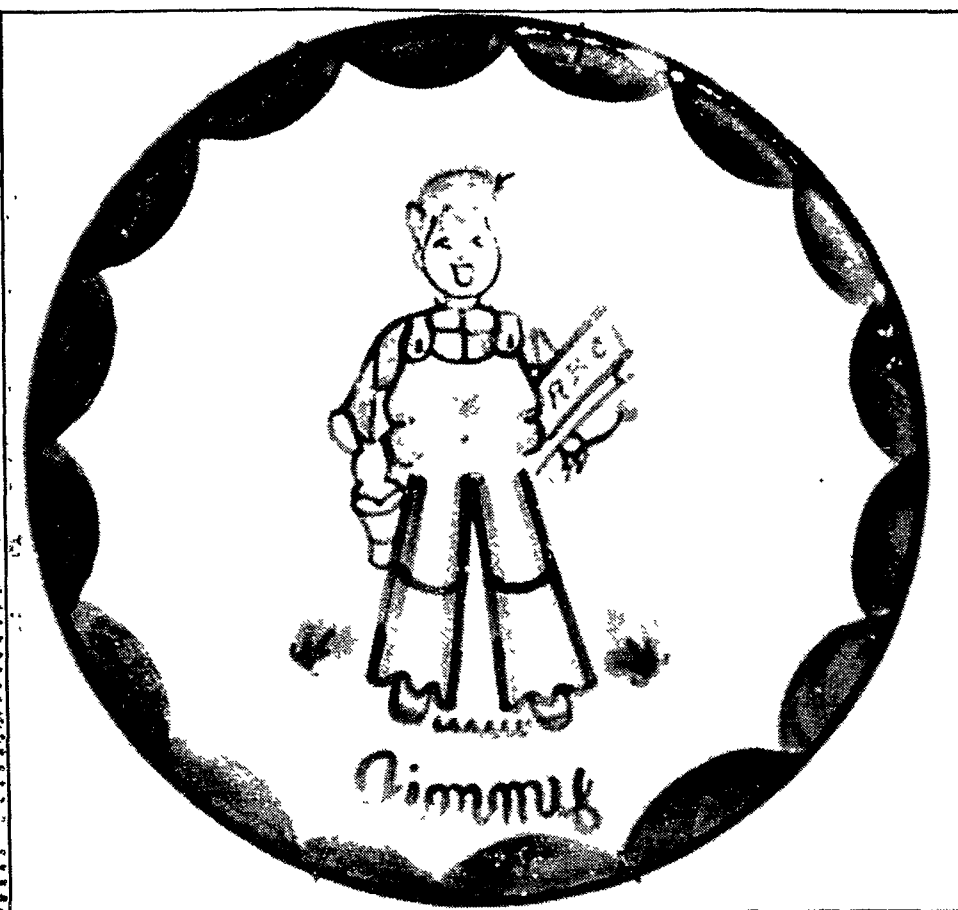
**STRUCTURES:** When planting, take advantage of shrubs, trees and buildings for protection. Watch carefully for the play of shadows at different times of the year.

**Q.** Enclosed is a photo of a stoneware plate that was purchased by my parents about 40 years ago. The plate is 8 inches in diameter. The words "John B. Taylor — Made in the USA" are on the back.

**What can you tell me about my plate?**

**A.** Your plate was made by Louisville Pottery, Louisville, Ky. The firm was founded in 1906 and later sold by John B. Taylor to John and Vivian Robertson in 1971. It is now Louisville Stoneware. The value of your plate would probably be about \$85 to \$95.

**Q.** I have a Bambi stuffed animal that is in excellent condition. He is light beige with tan spots on his back and ears. His eyes and nose are black plastic. A tag around his neck has the words "Ideal Novelty & Toy Co. — 1940."

**I would like to know if this was made to coincide with the Disney movie "Bambi," and if it has any value.**

**A.** Your Bambi stuffed animal was made to capitalize on the success of the Disney movie. Ideal Novelty & Toy Co. made these stuffed animals circa 1940. It would probably be worth about

\$55 to \$75.

**Q.** I have a porcelain figurine of a lady in 18th century clothes. She stands 9 inches tall and her skirt forms the base. The word and number "Cordey — 5054" are on the bottom.

**Could you please tell me something about my figurine?**

**A.** Your figurine was made by the Cordey China Co. in Trenton, N.J. The firm was founded by Boleslaw Cybis in 1942. Their figurines and busts are recognized by the elegant period clothes, delicate applied flowers and lace and gold scroll trim. The lace was often real lace dipped in liquid clay and then applied to the figurines. Most pieces were marked and numbered.

The numbering system ran from 200 to the 8,000s. Production continued until the mid-1950s. Your figurine was made about 1942. It would probably be worth about \$100 to \$125.

**Q.** We recently found a Louis Vuitton steamer trunk and hatbox in our grandmother's attic. The trunk has six drawers and a section with the hangers for hanging clothes. Both are

in perfect condition.

**Any information you can give us would be truly appreciated.**

**A.** Your trunk and hatbox were designed about 1900 by Louis Vuitton and are very popular collectibles. The value of your set would probably be about \$1,750 to \$2,500.

## Consider the climate when planning this year's garden

there was a big effort to "update" and modernize the USDA hardiness zone maps. I bought one from Rutgers University, but it doesn't indicate any city, counties or state boundaries for landmarks. How can I tell what zone I'm in? I live in a borderline area in Rockbridge Baths, Va. Could I possibly obtain a zone map just for Virginia? Do you have the same problems that I do? Help!

**A:** The map you got from Rutgers is not the official map prepared by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The USDA's map, which has been updated for the first time in 25 years, clearly shows boundaries, as well as each county.

According to my copy, you're definitely in Zone 6B. This means your average annual low temperature is between 0 and 50 degrees. This is kind of a new zone because when the USDA updated the map, they split old zones into 2 sections (A & B); each new half zone represents a 5-degree temperature difference instead of the old 10-degree difference.

I'm sorry to inform you that there aren't any state-size zone maps, they simply don't exist. Try calling your cooperative extension office and ask them specific questions regarding the climate in your area.

You can order a full-size USDA map for \$6.50 from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, 8660 Cherry Lane, Laurel, Md. 20707.

### SPRING SMELLS

Early spring smells of damp earth and blooming spring bulbs. A flower that smells marvelous to you may not seem so sweet to your best friend. Keep in mind a few flowers just plain stink — at least to some people.

Flower fragrances are for attracting insects and birds — not people. The birds and insects called pollinators find flowers by their color, smell, shape and pattern. Pollinators spread the flower's pollen from flower to flower. With the help of pollinators like bees, flies, hummingbirds and butterflies,

flowers make seeds that grow into new plants.

Many people love the smell of violets, and so do bees. They are attracted by the bluish color, too. The shape of violet flowers

helps bees find the nectar, which is the food the pollinators want.

Have you ever smelled skunk cabbage flowers? To us, they smell like rotten meat. Flies love that smell. Parts of the flowers

are even the color of rotting meat and heat up, spreading the odor.

Look for skunk cabbage when there is still snow on the ground — the flowers are warm enough to melt nearby snow.

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# Tax proposal could result in loss of home equity in trillions

home. The flat tax would adversely impact those funds."

The findings of a new study, conducted by McGraw-Hill, support Courcelle's conclusions. It revealed that a pure flat tax (removing all deductions) would result in home values dropping an average of 15 percent, translating into \$1.7 trillion in lost home equity.

"It's obviously a plain bad idea for homeowners," McGraw-Hill researchers concluded.

In a recent nationwide public opinion poll, people were asked: "If Congress did decide to change to a flat tax, do you think that the

deduction for what they pay in home mortgage interest should be eliminated with all other deductions, or do you think it should not be eliminated?"

More than 68 percent of respondents supported keeping the mortgage interest deduction.

Art Godi, president of the National Association of Realtors, also expressed strong feelings about the proposed flat tax.

"We are not surprised that a small sample of Realtors throughout the country liked the idea of a flat tax at first blush," Godi said. "Indeed, when the issue is first discussed in any group of people, the concept of a flat tax that would allow people to file their taxes on a

post card sounds appealing.

"However, when people, including Realtors, take a closer look at a flat tax that does away with the mortgage interest deduction, they quickly find its price tag far too high — devastating, in fact."

Godi also pointed to a study that showed a 17 percent flat tax could result in a budget deficit of almost \$200 billion a year. "Our members (Realtors) overwhelmingly support balancing the federal budget, as does the general American public."

"The citizens of this country have serious reservations about tax reform proposals that eliminate the mortgage interest deduction. For example, a majority of respondents to the recent poll

oppose a flat tax without a mortgage interest deduction because it makes owning a home less affordable."

"Also, the elimination of mortgage interest deduction will reduce the number of homes sold each year. The bottom line is that a flat tax with no mortgage interest deduction would not be fair, simple or wise."

**Q. Is it true that real estate values have dropped precariously in the resort area of Aspen, Colo.?**

A. Poor Aspen. It's true, the average price of single-family homes dropped last year for the first time in many years.

That average price slipped from about \$2 million the previous year to a mere \$1.7 million last year. The average price topped the \$1 million level for the first time in 1989.


The number of real estate sales last year was down by 15 percent compared to the previous year, according to Aspen Realtor Robert Ritchie, a partner with the firm of Coates, Reid & Waldron. He cited two key reasons for the downward sales curve in the area.

However, like any good Realtor, Ritchie puts a positive spin on his current market. "Despite the prob-

lems, last year was the second best year for real estate sales in the history of the Aspen Valley."


"Condominiums sold for record prices (condo prices increased 33 percent). Inventories remained low. That low inventory pushed average home sale prices down, creating some good bargains in the current market."

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## Carnival Cuts makes hair styling fun for youngsters

For adults, getting your hair cut is a necessary albeit boring part of life.

For children though it can be a downright traumatic experience. When you're 3 years old and a large person is coming at you with steel blades, well it's a little scary.

A trip to Carnival Cuts in Novi may just disarm your child's fears, however. Located in the upper level of Twelve Oaks Mall, the store is designed to make getting a hair cut a pleasant experience for tykes.

"Children like places that are fun," owner Andrew Dagher said. "We have a saying that great hair cuts only happen at a fun place."

Kids can't help having a good time at Carnival Cuts.

One step in the store puts the child directly in front of a giant carousel. While you can't hop on for a ride, it definitely provides a carnival atmosphere.

The waiting area comes equipped with video games and educational play toys. But the real fun starts at cut time.

Instead of sitting and leaning back to wet their hair in a sink like grown-ups, children lay down flat on their backs. Kids then look up at a clown that has a water hose coming out of its mouth.

Cuts are done on toy horses. While "riding" children can watch their favorite video as the stylist trims their hair.

While these features make it fun and simulate a carnival, it's the shop's colors that give it the right feel. Bright yellow, red and blue

leaps out from the walls and floor.

"It seems to relax children," Dagher said of the store's design and coloring. "It takes their mind off going to the barbershop."

Carnival Cuts opened last December. Dagher and his wife Dina, came up with the idea for the store about two years ago.

"We had a bad experience with our daughter getting her hair cut," he said.

That got the couple thinking of how to make hair cuts fun for children. It didn't take the Dearborn residents long to come up with the carnival theme.

"We wanted to make it amusing for the kids," said Dagher.

A lot of time and effort went into making the shop just that. It took several months to design and build the shop.

Dagher has plans to open about a half-dozen more Carnival Cut shops. He chose Novi for the first store because of its continued growth.

"The demographics were very good," Dagher added.

So far, so good.

"We've had a lot of repeat customers," manager Kim Reed said. "People have been coming from Ann Arbor, the east side and down river."

Having a hair salon that caters to kids is a fairly new concept. Dagher said Carnival Cuts' strong start has relieved some concerns.

"We were pretty nervous in the beginning," he commented. "But it's something that was needed."

About 85 percent of Carnival Cuts patrons are children. Parents

Children's hair cuts are \$11.95.

Bangs can be cut for \$5.95, a shampoo and style is \$9.95 and ear piercing is done for \$12.

Adult services include cuts, beard trims, braiding and thermal

curl, nails, perms and color among others.

## Household help comes with taxes

While hiring household help may relieve you of some domestic responsibilities, it may add to your tax responsibilities.

The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants points out that if you hired someone to care for your home, children or an elderly parent over the past year, you may be liable for paying certain taxes, such as Social Security and Medicare taxes, on their behalf. For the most part, these taxes can be paid when you file your 1995 income tax return.

### WHO QUALIFIES AS HELP?

The woman who babysits for you, the college student who mows the lawn, and the individual who provides cleaning services all may be considered your employees for tax purposes, depending on the circumstances. Generally, an individual who works in or around your house qualifies as your employee if you control his or her working conditions, such as the work schedule and duties. The individual needn't work for you full-time to qualify as your employee.

However, if you obtain the individual through an agency, you are not responsible for paying Social Security, Medicare or other federal or state taxes for the individual, provided the agency — and not you — is considered the employer of the

individual.

Similarly, if the individual is self-employed as an independent contractor, you also have no tax liability with respect to the individual.

However, it's important for you to ascertain that the worker actually meets the requirements for acting as an independent contractor or you risk facing certain penalties.

### WHEN DO YOU HAVE LIABILITY?

If you paid a household employee wages of \$1,000 or more during calendar year 1995, those wages are subject to Social Security and Medicare taxes. Employers and employees are required to pay equal portions of these taxes — known as FICA. You can choose to withhold your employee's share of 7.65 percent of his or her wages, or pay the full 15.3 percent amount yourself. Keep in mind that if you decide to pay the full amount, the employee's portion is considered added earnings for the employee for income tax purposes.

The tax law exempts you from paying FICA taxes for individuals

under the age of 18, no matter how much they earned from doing household work for you during the year, unless their principal occupation is household employment. Also, FICA taxes do not apply to amounts paid for household services provided to you by your spouse or your children under age 21.

You also are required to pay Federal Unemployment Taxes (FUTA) for 1995 if you paid your household employee cash wages of \$1,000 or more during any calendar quarter of 1995. These taxes are equal to 6.2 percent of the first \$7,000 of the total wages paid to an employee. (However, this rate is reduced if you pay state unemployment tax.) The tax does not apply to wages paid to your spouse, your parents, or your children under 21 years old. However, it does apply to other teenagers that do occasional domestic work for you.

In addition to FICA and FUTA, you also may be liable for state and local unemployment insurance. It's a good idea to review state tax rules or consult a local CPA to determine your responsibility.

### WHAT ABOUT INCOME TAX?

Household employees are responsible for paying their own income taxes. You are not required to withhold income tax from your household employee's wages, but you can do so if you and your employee prefer this arrangement. If you agree to withhold taxes, be sure your employee completes a Form W-4, Employee Withholding Allowance.

### YOUR RESPONSIBILITIES

In recent years, Uncle Sam has simplified the tax filing and payment rules. You now pay your employee's Social Security and Medicare taxes (FICA) when you file your personal income tax return. Federal Unemployment Taxes, which used to be paid annually with a separate return, also can be paid with your Form 1040. However, if you had any non-domestic employees during the year, these simplified filing rules do not apply.

It's wise to consult a tax adviser, such as a CPA, to guide you through the tax laws associated with retaining and paying household help.

## Joblessness up in January

Unemployment rates rose in all 10 of Michigan's major labor market areas in January, according to unadjusted estimates compiled by the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC).

"Seasonal job losses combined with labor force increases to cause unemployment rate increases in every major labor market in January," MESC Director F. Robert Edwards said.

Although MESC's monthly labor force report shows employment gains in most labor markets between December and January, the data between the two months is not comparable.

"Because of the two recent federal government shutdowns, the Bureau of Labor Statistics has delayed the benchmarking of the 1995 labor force estimates,"

Edwards explained. "The revised 1995 data should be available when the February estimates are issued in March."

MESC's monthly payroll survey of employers, however, reveals seasonal job losses in construction and retail trade.

"Construction dropped with the onset of cold winter weather and retail employment declined as temporary workers were released from their holiday jobs," he said. "In addition, manufacturing employment was down in several areas because of layoffs in automotive related industries."

Among the major labor markets, the Ann Arbor area reported the lowest jobless rate last month at 3.6 percent, and the smallest increase as its rate climbed by four-tenths of a point.

The Upper Peninsula had the highest rate at 9.5 percent and the largest increase. Unemployment in the U-P climbed by 1.5 percentage points from December to January.

"In the 15-county U-P region, employment losses were largely seasonal and spread across several industries including retail trade, construction, and transportation, utilities and communications," Edwards said. "In addition, employment was down at state colleges and universities which were not in session because of winter breaks."

Among the state's 83 counties, Mackinac County had the highest January rate at 24.8 percent, while Washtenaw County had the lowest rate at 2.6 percent.

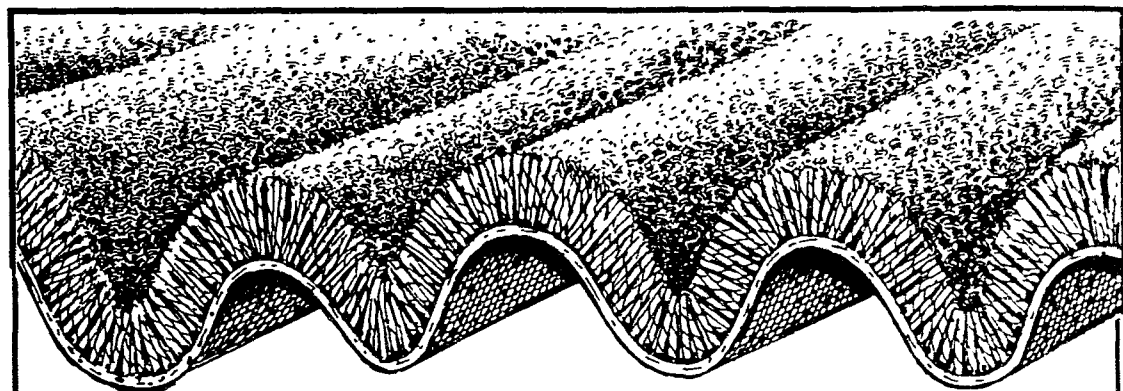
## State retailers win ADA grant

# A Message from the County Executive . . .

Dear County Residents:

Since my letter last year to you in the Community Development Annual Report, Oakland County has made many strides toward preparing for the challenges of the 21st century. We are a county on the move. Oakland County has experienced considerable growth in business and economic development; the County generates 44% of the export business from Michigan, 64% of Michigan's foreign investments are directed to Oakland County, and we are deemed a major player in exporting goods to the international community. Equally important, the County has demonstrated a strong commitment to address the issues in our own back yard by improving the infrastructure of our County to ensure that all county residents are provided needed services and county communities are afforded opportunities to revitalize their neighborhoods and promote a healthy environment. The programs administered by Oakland County's Division of Community Development continue to be our primary vehicle for accomplishing this goal.

Community Development is a division of the Department of Community and Economic Development. It's job is to help revitalize communities, rehabilitate housing and fulfill human service needs in participating communities through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships, and Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) programs. The Community Development Division also administers a Housing Counseling program to enable citizens in the community to make informed and reasonable decisions toward achieving their housing goals by meeting their housing needs or

resolving their housing problems. Each program will be further discussed in other areas of this publication.

Since 1975, this division has invested more than \$104 million in these programs as part of the effort to make our county an even-better place to live and work. In 1995 alone, we invested \$7.4 million to help meet the needs of 50 local communities, low and moderate-income residents, as well as those persons in the County who are homeless. Here are just a few examples of the many activities carried out this past year:

\*212 homes of low and moderate income persons were rehabilitated through our Home Improvement Program.

\*Local communities initiated well over 200 projects through our CDBG program including road and sidewalk improvements, barrier-free access improvements to assist mobility impaired persons, meals for homebound senior citizens as

well as home chore services for seniors, emergency and minor home repair programs, removal of deteriorated vacant buildings and a host of other projects.

\*HOME funds were used by a non-profit housing development company to place three new homes in Royal Oak township for sale to low-income persons who might otherwise not have afforded a home.

\*The Housing Counseling unit assisted 2,104 persons in Oakland County with problems related to fair housing practices, substandard housing conditions, eviction, security deposit returns, mortgage foreclosures, and securing affordable housing.

This report highlights the accomplishments of each of the programs administered by the Division of Community Development during 1995 and details the planned use of CDBG, HOME and ESG funds for the upcoming 1996 program year. The staff of the Division of Community Development, Ken Rogers, Director of the Department of Community and Economic Development, and I have enjoyed working with and supporting the citizens, municipalities and businesses of Oakland County this past year. We look forward to working with you in 1996 to continue our goal of strengthening families and communities and fostering solid economic growth in Oakland County to ensure a finer quality of life for all who live and work here.

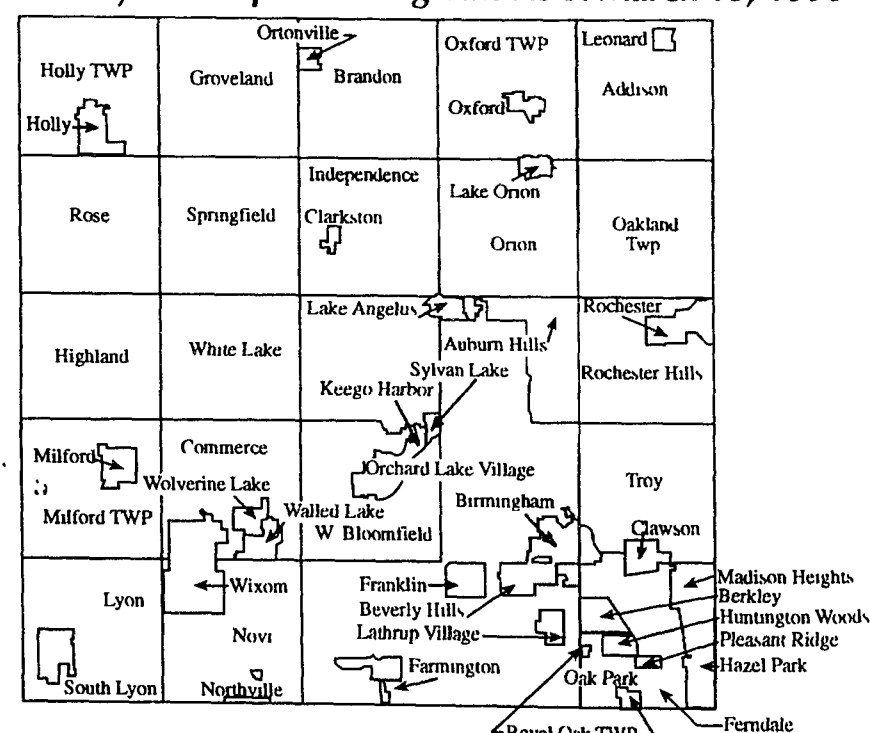

## Introduction to the Community Development Division

Each year the federal government distributes billions of dollars nationwide for a variety of housing and community improvement programs through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The Oakland County Community Development Division is the division of Oakland County government responsible for administering federal housing and community development funds received from HUD. Oakland County receives three sources of funding from HUD: the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships grant (HOME), and the Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG). Each of these grants is designed to provide revitalization and human services to the 51 urban, suburban, and rural communities participating in these programs with Oakland County. Since 1975, the division has financed hundreds of community improvement and public service projects designed to benefit Oakland County's low and moderate income neighborhoods and residents. The intent of this report is to inform you of Community Development's accomplishments during 1995 and its plans for 1996.

# Community Development Block Grant:

## *A Twenty-One Year Partnership to Improve Our Neighborhood*

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) benefits low and moderate-income residents and keeps neighborhoods and business districts structurally sound, attractive, and economically strong. The Division of Community Development earmarks approximately one-third of CDBG funds to operate a Home Improvement Program benefiting low and moderate-income residents. Approximately two-thirds of the funds, less administration, is allocated to 51 communities participating in Oakland County's CDBG program to implement hundreds of community revitalization projects such as water main and sewer installation, street improvements, senior citizen centers, recreational facilities,

historic preservation, code enforcement, fire protection facilities, and neighborhood developments.

The County has invested over \$104 million of CDBG funds since the beginning of the program in 1975. Oakland County's 1995 CDBG funds totaled \$5,835,833. About eighty-percent (80%) of the funds served low and moderate-income residents and eliminated deteriorating community conditions. Approximately twenty-percent (20%) supported administrative, planning and management, and technical assistance activities. Pages 8 through 11 detail each participating community's plans for its 1996 CDBG funds.



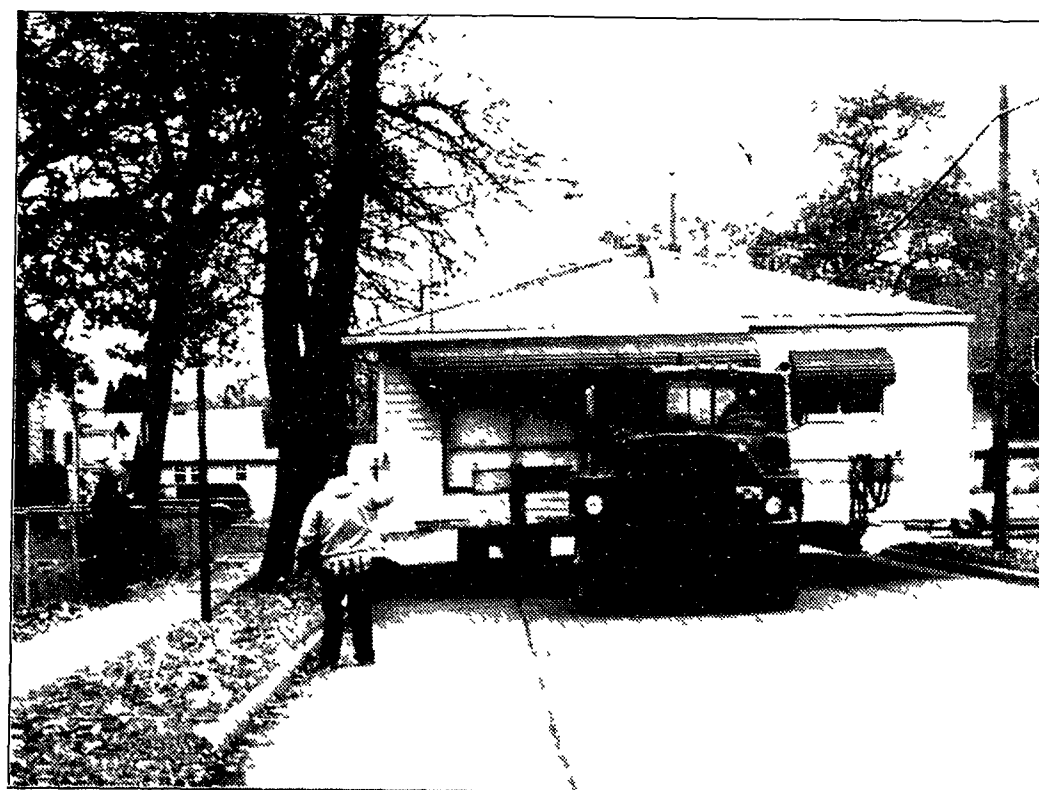

# For County Homeowners . . .

## The Home Improvement Program: Preserving Oakland County Housing

Home improvements may often seem out of reach for many homeowners due to inflation, high interest rates, and rising construction costs. Improving Oakland County's aging housing stock continues to be a long standing commitment of the Community Development Division. Therefore, to help families with necessary home improvements and repairs, Oakland County Community Development provides assistance in obtaining low interest installment and deferred payment home improvement loans through our Home Improvement Program which is financed through two federal sources: The CDBG and HOME Investment Partnerships programs.

The Home Improvement Program repairs and rehabilitates the homes of low and moderate income persons residing in one of the participating communities. Eligible homeowners receive low-interest loans of up to \$12,100 for repairs to roofs, windows, siding, plumbing, heating and electrical systems, water and sewer systems, and other structural repairs. Repayment plans are based on family income at an interest rate of three percent or less. All rehabilitation work is completed by licensed and insured residential builders.

Community Development staff members will assist you in each step of the home improvement process by helping you prepare and file the loan application, advising you on your eligibility for a loan, inspecting your property and conferring with you about the work to be done, requesting contractor bids, assisting you in selecting a contractor and inspecting the work during construction and upon completion to assure your satisfaction.

To further our efforts to help people with low to moderate incomes maintain descent, safe, and sanitary conditions in their homes, the Community Development Division has engaged in a contractual agreement with the Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency (OLHSA) to provide an energy conservation education and home weatherization service program, "Project Warmth", aimed at lower income homeowners and tenants within the participating communities of Oakland County. OLHSA conducts energy education workshops that provide low income individuals with the skills, materials, and impetus to complete low cost energy saving measures and OLHSA completes energy conservation repairs and materials installation to further increase total energy savings.

# HOME Investment Partnership Program . . .

## *HOME: Expanding the Supply of Housing for Lower-Income Residents*

The HOME Investment Partnerships Program, or HOME Program, provides State and local governments with a significant resource to forge new relationships and provide additional affordable housing. The intent of the HOME program is 1) to expand the supply of decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing; 2) to strengthen the abilities of state and local governments to provide housing; 3) to assure that federal housing services, financing, and other investments are provided to state and local governments in a coordinated, supportive fashion; 4) to expand the capacity of non-profit community-based housing development organizations (CHDO's); and 5) to leverage private sector participation in financing affordable housing.

Oakland County's HOME Program entered its fourth year in 1995 with a grant of \$1,485,040. The HOME Program funds two

activities. Eighty-five percent (85%) of the funds are used by the County to expand its existing Home Improvement Program (which includes ten percent for administration) and the remaining 15 percent (15%) of funds support community housing development organizations (CHDO's). A CHDO is a not-for-profit, community-based, and low-income community service organization that is committed to, and capable of, engaging in the development of affordable housing for the community it serves. The County's only designated CHDO thus far, Venture, Inc., was formed by the Oakland Livingston Human Services Agency (OLHSA) to address the housing needs of low-income persons in these two counties.

In 1995, Venture received \$175,125.00 of HOME funds and placed three factory built homes on previously vacant lots on Bates Street

in Royal Oak Township. The homes were subsequently sold to low-income homebuyers. In addition, 212 homes of low and moderate-income residents were rehabilitated throughout the County.

The Oakland County Board of Commissioners and L. Brooks Patterson, Oakland County Executive, have consistently provided the 25 percent matching funds required by federal regulation for housing rehabilitation activities and/or new construction activities. Oakland County will continue to use HOME funds to expand the number of homes rehabilitated throughout the 51 participating Oakland County HOME communities as well as encourage the participation of more qualified CHDO's.

## Fair Housing Is The Law

Every person in the United States has the right to choose housing suited to his/her needs and financial ability. It is illegal for real estate agencies, apartment complexes, or property owners to turn you away from the housing you want solely on the basis of your race, sex, age, religion, national origin, handicapped status, or familial status (i.e. if you have children).

Oakland County, through the Community Development Division, has been working with the Fair Housing Center of Metropolitan Detroit (FHC) and the Oakland County Center for Open Housing (OCCOH) since 1994 to boost fair housing awareness. FHC provides brochures, newsletters, and workshops on fair housing issues. OCCOH provides public awareness activities to affirmatively further fair housing in Oakland County communities. Community Development's Housing Counseling unit delivers comprehensive housing

counseling services to Oakland County residents.

Low and moderate-income families, mentally and physically disabled persons and senior citizens are aided in finding and applying for subsidized or low-cost, safe and decent housing. As part of its activities, the Housing Counseling Unit provides an initial intake/screening interview, makes referrals to public and non-profit resources, and follows-up with clients to see that they are progressing toward their housing goals. Oakland County Community Development's Housing Counseling Unit is the only "public entity" HUD approved counseling agency in Michigan.

# Emergency Shelter Grant Program . . .

## Combating the Problem of Homelessness

The Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) program funds allow Oakland County to contract with existing emergency shelters to defray operating and maintenance expenses and provide overnight lodging, food, emergency medical services, transportation to overnight shelters, homeless prevention activities and essential social services to the homeless. Oakland County has received \$690,000 in ESG funds since the programs inception in 1987 made possible through the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act of 1987. The County received ESG program funds of \$160,000 in 1995, up from \$119,000 in 1994 which was about a 35% increase.

Five shelters received ESG assistance during 1995: Help Against Violent Encounters Now (HAVEN), New Bethel Outreach Ministry, Pontiac Area Transitional Housing (PATH), The Sanctuary, and South Oakland Shelter (SOS).

HAVEN provides a domestic violence shelter for women and their children left homeless due to

physical, sexual and/or emotional abuse. New Bethel Outreach Ministry serves families with children, victims of domestic violence and the elderly. PATH operates transitional housing projects designed to help homeless women and their children re-enter mainstream society. The Sanctuary is a transitional living program for homeless or at-risk youth ages 16-21; and SOS is a consortium of approximately 50 shelter sites that receive homeless persons on a rotating basis. These five organizations sheltered and/or provided services to 1,497 men, women and children during 1994. These shelters are outstanding examples of communities responding to the immediate needs of homeless individuals and committed to fostering the development of economic autonomy, self-sufficiency and functional family units within our communities.

The Community Development Division anticipates 1996 funding to equal the amount received for program year 1995.

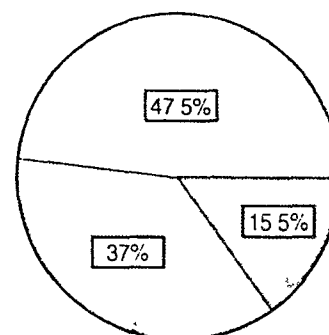
## Citizen Participation: The Heart of the Program Process

Each community's plan for its CDBG funds is included in the block grant section of this report.

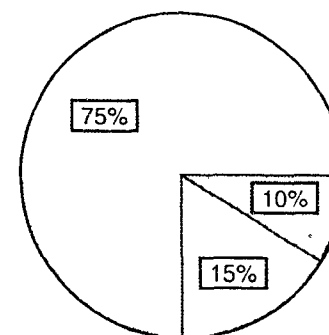

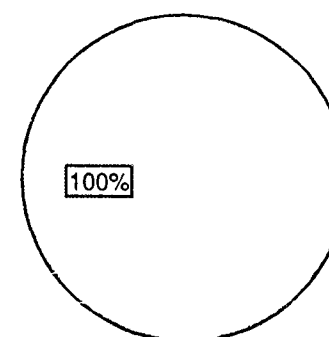

# Oakland County's Consolidated Plan . . .

## Streamlining Services To You

The Consolidated Plan saved administrative staff time considerably by allowing grantees of federal funds, including Oakland County, to apply for various housing and community development funds at one time. Prior to program year (PY) 1995, Oakland County had to apply for its Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships Grant, and Emergency Shelter Grant program funds at different times. This meant that the Community Development Division had to balance three separate program calendars and publish another legal advertisement in addition to this Annual Report which added financial costs that could have been spent on other program activities.

The Community Development Division provides a detailed summary of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. In it, the projects of each of the 51 communities participating in the Oakland County CDBG program are listed. The Environmental Review Notice is the County's official statement that it is in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The Notice of Request for Release of Funds is the official request to the federal government to give Oakland County its CDBG funds after the public comment period has expired.

Directly below this article, you will find the County's proposed uses of funds for the HOME

Investment Partnerships and Emergency Shelter Grant programs. These proposed use of funds statements are not broken down by community because the County administers 100 percent of the funds from these programs. On the next pages, you will see the Community Development Block Grant proposed use of funds as it has traditionally appeared, broken down by community. On page 11, you will find a combined Notice of Environmental Review and Notice of Request for Release of Funds for all three programs. It is arranged this way to save space and time; otherwise, the two notices would have to be printed three times each.

## Home Investment Partnerships Program Projected Use of Funds

### Program Description

The HOME Investment Partnerships program (HOME program) began in 1992 and was created by the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act of 1990. The program's purpose is to increase the supply of decent, safe, sanitary, and affordable housing for low income people.

Unlike the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, the Oakland County government itself receives and administers 100 percent of HOME funds. By federal law, the County must set aside 15 percent of its annual HOME funds for community housing development organizations (CHDOs), which are non-profit agencies whose primary purpose is the provision of housing for low-income persons. Oakland County's only CHDO so far has been Venture, Inc., a subsidiary of the Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency (OLHSA). Venture has been placing factory-built housing on previously vacant lots in Royal Oak Township for sale to low-income persons.

Oakland County uses the remaining funds to

expand its Home Improvement Program, which provides loans to low- and moderate-income homeowners for housing rehabilitation. In order to comply with the mandate that HOME funds be used to assist low-income persons, only the lowest-income homeowners receive HOME-funded Home Improvement Program loans. Moderate-income homeowners receive a CDBG-funded loan.

Federal regulations also require the County to provide a 25 percent match on all HOME-funded rehabilitation projects. The Oakland County Board

of Commissioners and Oakland County Executive L. Brooks Patterson have authorized this match, which is drawn from the County's General Fund. A 10 percent administrative allowance to operate the program is permitted under federal guidelines.

## Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) Program Projected Use of Funds

### Program Description

The Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) program has been operational in Oakland County since 1987 and was initially authorized by the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act.

The program is intended to help improve the quality of existing emergency shelters for the homeless, to make additional shelters available, and to help meet the costs of operating emergency shelters. Therefore, all ESG funds have been distributed by Oakland County to the five shelters currently participating in the program: Help Against Violent Encounters Now (HAVEN), Pontiac Area Transitional Housing (PATH), New Bethel Outreach Ministry, The Sanctuary's A Step Forward program, and South Oakland Shelter. A separate Request for Proposals (RFP) notice will be published soon to allow all Oakland County shelters an opportunity to apply for funds.

Three categories of expenditures are eligible under the Oakland County ESG program:

Essential Services, which can be up to 30 percent of a shelter's grant; Operations and Maintenance, which can be 100 percent of a shelter's grant; and Administration, which can be up to 10 percent of a shelter's grant. Each shelter chooses its own combination of expenditure categories, within the acceptable percentage limits.

Essential Services are expenses associated with medical care, counseling, food, clothing, education, and similar expenses. Operations and Maintenance expenses are incurred in the operation of the shelter's building/program, such as insurance, utilities, security services, rent, and supplies. Administration expenses are mainly

concerned with the salaries of shelter personnel.

Comment periods for the Emergency Shelter Grant program are identical to those for the HOME and CDBG programs. Please see the section of the CDBG program description entitled "Notice of Request for Release of Funds" for comment deadlines and addresses to contact should you desire to comment on this program.

This year, assuming that each participating shelter will elect to budget the maximum allowable percentage for administrative and essential services expenses, the 1996 Oakland County ESG budget will be:

# Program Year 1996 CDBG Projected Fund Use

## STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVES

Since 1975, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has allocated over \$94 million to Oakland County to administer annual Community Development Programs pursuant to the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The primary objective of Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act and of the Oakland County CDBG Program is the development of viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment and expanding economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income. Consistent with this primary objective, the Housing and Community Development Act identifies three broad national program objectives. Oakland County gives maximum feasible priority to CDBG projects which comply with one or more of the national objectives.

### NATIONAL PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Ensure benefit to low and moderate income persons; not less than 70% of a grantee's aggregate funds shall be used to support activities that benefit low and moderate income persons.
  - Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blighting community conditions
  - Meet other community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs.
- In promoting the primary national objectives Oakland County Community Development has developed the following specific objectives and strategies consistent with policy statements for Federal, State, Regional and County levels of government for the 1996 program year.

### COUNTY PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Encourage communities to realistically plan for future development and to assist communities in developing the capacity to implement activities.
- Increase each community's commitment to its proposed community development activity.
- Discourage the use of community development funds on projects which can be funded through other sources.
- Improve, upgrade and increase property values through the concentration of rehabilitation efforts within the neighborhood.
- Reduce the number of substandard dwelling units within the county through the rehabilitation of existing residential units
- Improve living conditions within housing units and reduce the financial burden of low and moderate income persons.
- Reduce housing maintenance and fuel costs and enable lower income persons to remain in their housing unit
- Instill within homeowners the incentive to maintain and improve conditions within the housing unit.
- Assist homeowners in using available funding sources to accomplish housing rehabilitation activities
- Reduce the isolation of income groups and increase housing opportunities for low and moderate income persons.
- Affirmatively further fair housing and equal opportunity
- Minimize displacement of persons as a result of CDBG assisted activities through counsel and careful assessment of each project requiring displacement
- Provide relocation assistance in accordance with the Uniform Relocation Act of 1970 (24 CFR 42) and mitigate adverse effects of displacement, if any, on low and moderate income persons.
- Ensure that persons displaced as a result of CDBG assisted projects will be treated fairly, consistently, and equitably so such persons will not suffer disproportionate injuries as a result of projects designed for the benefit of the public as a whole.
- Ensure that tenants displaced involuntarily and permanently as a result of the use of CDBG assistance to acquire or substantially rehabilitate property will be treated the same as activities covered under the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970.
- Ensure that not less than 70% of CDBG funds received annually are used for activities that principally benefit persons of low and moderate income.
- Provide for citizen participation in the CDBG process by implementing a detailed citizen participation plan.

## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT- PROGRAM YEAR 1996 PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS

The County of Oakland, a Michigan Constitutional Corporation, in compliance with the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, will submit the following proposed projects and allocations to HUD for FY 1996 CDBG funding totalling \$5,065,000 on March 14, 1996. Oakland County will supplement the 1996 CDBG entitlement from HUD with \$858,113.84 in County and Community CDBG program income generated from 1/1/95 to 12/31/95 for total 1996 revenues of \$5,923,113.84.

### How To Read This Projected Use of Funds

The use of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds must comply with a number of federal guidelines. These requirements must all be listed in this Projected Use of Funds. To save space, a number of codes have been used. For example, you may read a project title like this:

#### Senior Citizen Center A2a \$44,500

This means that the community will spend \$44,500 of its 1996 CDBG funds on a senior citizen center. Each part of the code "A2a" has a meaning also.

The capital letter indicates which national CDBG objective the project falls under. The national objective codes are:

- Project benefits low and/or moderate income people.
- Project addresses slums or blighted conditions
- Project meets an urgent community need where no other funding is available.

The number indicates the project's status under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (NEPA). These codes are:

- The project has been environmentally assessed.
- The project is categorically excluded from environmental review by NEPA.
- The project is exempt from environmental review by NEPA

Finally, the small letter indicates the regulatory authority for the project; in other words, where in the regulations it says that the project may be funded with CDBG money. All regulations regarding CDBG are found in the Code of Federal Regulations, Volume 24. This is abbreviated as "24 CFR". The specific section comes after the Thus 24 CFR 570.201(c), means volume 24, Code of Federal Regulations, section 570.201(c). The regulatory codes used in this publication are:

### What's the difference between Minor Home Repair, Home Chore, and Emergency Home Repair?

**Minor Home Repair**-Small repair projects around the home, such as screen and/or window repair, painting, and minor plumbing repairs. Generally, these are repairs which are too small to warrant the homeowners' applying for a County Home Improvement Program loan

**Home Chore**-Leaf raking, lawn mowing, snow removal, installation of screens, cleaning, and other jobs around the house.

**Emergency Home Repair**-Repairs such as furnace replacement in the winter. Those repairs that must be immediately undertaken to protect the health and safety of the household.

No objection received after April 26, 1996 on any program will be considered by HUD.

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Design ideas for home's

By square footage it's the most expensive room in the house to design or remodel. But, as designer Ellen Cheever so succinctly puts it: "Based on use and function, it's one of the most important rooms to invest in because it's where you start and finish the day doing very specific activities."

We're talking, of course, about the bathroom. You can't live without one, and many people, it seems, have a hard time living with the one they have, typically because in most older homes' bathrooms are small, confining and not very comfortable or functional.

Cheever, a certified bath and kitchen designer and author of "Kitchen & Bath Showcase" (Vitae Publishing Inc.), says it's important to begin bathroom design by determining who uses the bathroom first in the family, when they use it and, beyond the obvious, what they do in there.

"There are three broad types of baths," Cheever explains, "and from a design standpoint, you approach each very differently."

First there's what she calls "the proverbial powder room." This is usually either the bathroom on the first floor or a guest bath typically not used on a daily basis by family members.

"The sky's the limit in this bathroom as far as graciousness and exciting, unique use of products. You might use a pedestal lavatory with a wonderful glass shelf above it because you don't have everyday grooming going on. Or you may consider a clear-glass shower or tub

enclosure. They take more to maintain, but in a guest bath it makes the room look prettier and bigger and allows you to see the beautiful marble or decorative tile in the shower," Cheever says.

Then there's the hall bath serving the majority of bedrooms. Typically, it's the bathroom used mostly by children. For this hard-working bath, Cheever suggests a functional stall shower instead of a tub, so you can gain an extra foot to maximize storage and shelf space, allowing each family member using this bathroom to have his or her own drawer or shelf.

Last, there's the bathroom that usually gets the most attention design-wise: the master suite, which is not always as large as its grandiose name suggests. To help make the master suite larger, Cheever says consider having just one vanity in the bathroom and adding plumbing for a second sink in the bedroom.

The space gained may allow for more luxury, such as a whirlpool or two person tub. If you do have two sinks, consider placing them back-to-back.

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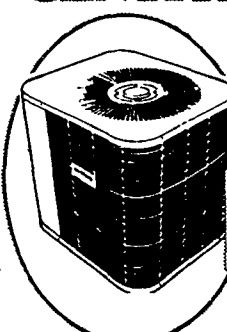

## Expert offers tips to conquer clutter

Are piles of paper taking over your home? When you enter your closet, do you find yourself on a warlike mission that seems impossible to win? Do you fear windowed cabinets in your kitchen would reveal the disorganization in your world?

You can conquer clutter, and Stephanie Culp can help you. The Copley News Service columnist and author of eight books, including "How to Conquer Clutter," "Streamlining Your Life" and "Conquering the Paper Pile-Up" (all published by Writer's Digest Books), "You Can Find More Time For Yourself Every Day" and, her most recent, "Stephanie Culp's 12-Month Organizer and Project Planner" (both published by Better Way Books), says clutter comes down to the fact that "we just have too much stuff."

"In general terms, I advocate the in and out inventory rule," says the Wisconsin resident. "If something new comes in, something old goes out."

Culp got her start in the business of organizing other people's homes and offices after she'd helped friends at nights and on weekends while she was vice president of an importing firm for Chinese antiques.

"People knew I was organized, and finally I decided to turn this into a business," she said. "I've been quite successful, and now I'm a consultant and travel nationally to work on business projects as well as large home projects."

To organize incoming paper — that stuff that just seems to combust spontaneously year after year — Culp suggests that you set up four baskets, labeling them "To Do," "To Pay," "To File" and "To Read."

"Throw the rest away," she asserts. She prefers wire baskets for this task. "The bigger and deeper, the better; small plastic ones never work because papers fill up in there too fast."

Place these organizing paper baskets where you need them: in your home office or bedroom or kitchen, wherever that paper comes in for handling.

"The 'To File' basket can be on the floor somewhere, under your desk — it doesn't have to be up on top of something because that's just stuff that's going to storage," she adds.

How about those piles of magazines many of us accumulate?

"Review subscriptions you have and let some go — this is a revolutionary thought," says Culp. "And then instead of hanging onto them because there's something in there you have to read, keep scissors and stapler in a basket, clip articles and staple them, and throw the rest away."

As for closets that have gotten away from you, "as a new year's thing, break down the task into manageable segments," advises Culp.

"Don't try to do all your closets in one day. Do one closet a day, and while you're working on that project, don't allow yourself to be distracted by other things, such as phone calls, visitors,



snacks. You really need to eliminate things you don't need or don't use. Mementos are good, but mementos need to be selections, not entire archives worthy of warehouse space."

When you weed out your clothes closet, keep only clothes that you regularly wear, "period." "You might install a new closet system, which can sometimes even double closet space," adds Culp. "Especially in older homes and apartments where closet space is really not used well at all, systems make a big difference."

Two top franchisers of closet systems are the California Closet Co., based in San Francisco, with 114 locations nationwide, and The Closet Factory, based in Los Angeles, with 30 locations nationwide. Both firms have branched out from offering organizing closet systems to organizing home offices, garages, basements, pantries and other areas of living space.

Firms like these can take your closet from a mess of a single rod and shelf to a built-in organization of double rods, shelves and drawers that literally maximize the unused space your closet could provide. The cost for these closet systems ranges from \$300 to \$40,000.

Culp also suggests that when you tackle your own closet, bring along a friend.

"A closet with 14 items in it that mix and match that you absolutely love and look great in is a lot better than 40 items you're always digging through and yet you never feel just right when getting dressed. When you're going through your closet, have a friend who can tell you to rid yourself of something that looks horrible on you. They'll probably take half the stuff with them, and that's always a plus — saves you a trip to charity," she adds.

In your kitchen, likewise, "the biggest secret is to get rid of stuff you never use," says Culp. "Almost everyone has fancy dishes or cookware they never use or duplicates like three lemon peelers, and the last time they peeled lemons was 1952."

As for bathroom clutter, get rid of expired medicines first, says Culp.

"If you have 12 containers of eye shadow, get rid of 10. Old makeup gathers bacteria and is really not good for you, and people usually keep tons of it. Also put shelves in the bathroom, over the toilet or over the towel rack where you can keep additional bubble bath or washcloths — they can be attractive extra storage."

# Noise is root of many problems

"Every American has neighbor problems. Neighbor wars affect the famous as well as regular folk. If not today, then yesterday, and almost certainly tomorrow."

So writes Bill Adler Jr. in his book, "Outwitting the Neighbors:

A Practical and Entertaining Guide to Achieving Peaceful Coexistence With the People Next Door" (Fireside/Simon & Schuster).

Whether you have complaints about bushes, noise, kids or dogs coming from that place next door, there are ways to resolve these issues without taking your neighbor to court.

Before we consider specific strategies, listen to some very sound advice from an unidentified, wise woman in the Midwest who spoke with Adler for his book: "Get along with your neighbors at all costs. Find out what they are like and be flexible. It's the only solution. ... If you can ignore the problem with your neighbor, do so."

"The problem will eventually disappear — teen-agers eventually grow up; dogs die. ... For kids who trample my bushes, a little manure helps, and for the barking dogs, earplugs do the trick. What can you win, except stress, anger and frustration? Nothing. Just get along. Calm down. Life's too short."

### NOISY, BAD KIDS

Whether it's that toddler in the upstairs apartment who screams constantly, or the teen-age juvenile delinquent who won't stop riding his bike through your rose beds, use your head before you strike.

"Confrontation is tough, because parents are defensive about their kids," says Adler. "Try sleeping in another room. Get a white-noise machine. Try some environmental sound tapes. Test out earplugs."

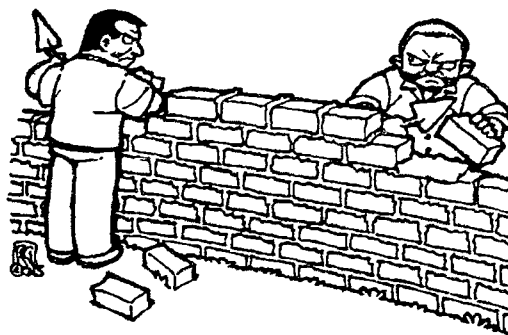
Other soundproofing techniques that might really make a difference in your life are installing acoustical tile on your ceiling or even offering splitting the cost of carpeting in the apartment overhead with the hardwood floors. Get some sound-absorbing drapes for windows.

As far as those trespassing issues, Adler gets a little creative.

"We had a problem with neighborhood kids cutting through the corner of our back yard. We spoke to the parents without success. They usually cut through after dark. So I started piling all the dog droppings at the corner they went through. After a week, they never did it again," says one neighbor.

Adler himself suggests if you don't have that dog poop on hand, put on your bathrobe and go outside to ask those kids nicely to play elsewhere "because you're sick with the black plague. Cough a lot and tell them how three people at your office have died from it. They'll scatter."

Don't be too hard on kids, though, or you'll create persistent monsters —



those kids who will perform masterful tricks to "get even" with you. "Choose your battles carefully. One adult cannot rule the neighborhood, and without parental support, you have to be pretty clever."

### NOISY NEIGHBORS

Whether it's a howling dog or the party that never quits, noise can be truly intrusive.

"Of all the complaints people have about their neighbors, noise ranks at the top," says Adler.

Don't forget those white-noise machines and earplugs and acoustical tiles. If the noise is only occasional, try simply asking your neighbor to be quieter.

You can also get help for serious noise problems from local police — check to see if your neighborhood is governed by noise regulations, which most are.

When all else fails, you might "amass defensive noise to use against your enemies when there's no hope of a solution."

One couple was so distressed over the rock music blaring from their neighbors into the wee hours of the morning, the next morning at 6 they played a record that contained a full 15 minutes of U.S. Marine recruiting ads plus some John Philip Sousa marches and the national anthem — at full blast and on repeat mode.

"From then on, anytime they started making a racket at night, all I had to do was stand under the skylight and holler, 'Join the Marines, fellas,' and they'd quiet right down."

Use your head and your heart, consider ways you can minimize your own response to any neighborly problem, try to have reasonable conversations first, try to compromise and just try to get along.

If all else fails, there are other, formal ways of forging agreement still short of going to court.

Neighborhood mediation services are increasingly available throughout North America. Your local bar association is usually one of the first places to seek it. Or check your yellow pages under "Mediation." Many centers are staffed by volunteers and often perform free mediation services — exacting compromise from neighbors willing to meet with each other and a mediator.

The American Bar Association's Section of Dispute Resolution, 740 15th St. NW, Washington, DC 20005; (202) 662-1680; has a directory of such programs, but check with your local bar first.

Other mediation services may not be free but will be substantially cheaper than legal fees in taking your case to court.

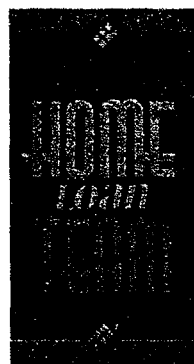

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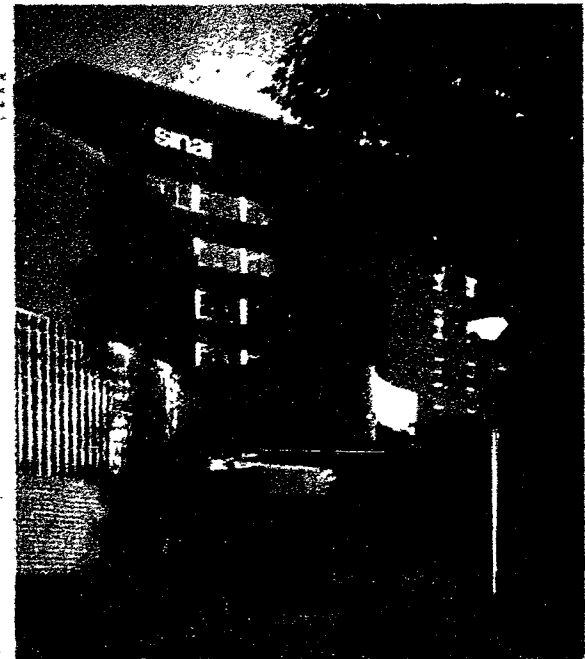

#### Sinai is Growing

Sinai was successful in issuing \$75 million in tax exempt bonds to fund our Outer Drive campus master facility plan. The bonds were sold to finance renovation of the Labor and Delivery area, the Emergency Department, Cardiac Cath Labs, the Intensive Care Units and various ambulatory-related areas.

#### Sinai Receives Numerous Accreditations

Sinai Health System recently received accreditations from four major organizations: Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO); American Osteopathic Association (AOA); Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF), and the College of American Pathologists (CAP).

Sinai received a three-year accreditation from JCAHO as a result of its demonstrated compliance with the Commission's nationally recognized health care standards. The on-site survey occurred last July and the accreditation was effective July 22, 1995.

AOA awarded Sinai a three-year accreditation based on the positive results of their survey. This accreditation will allow Sinai to offer Osteopathic Post-Graduate Programs (internships and residencies), in addition to their current Allopathic Programs. Sinai is one of the few hospitals in Southeastern Michigan that boasts both AOA and JCAHO accreditations. The accreditation was effective in August 1995.

Sinai's Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation received a three-year accreditation from CARF. This accreditation was particularly noteworthy as CARF made no recommendations for improvement to Sinai. Some strengths cited were nationally recognized medical leadership, highly tenured clinical staff and strong administration. The accreditation was effective October 1995.

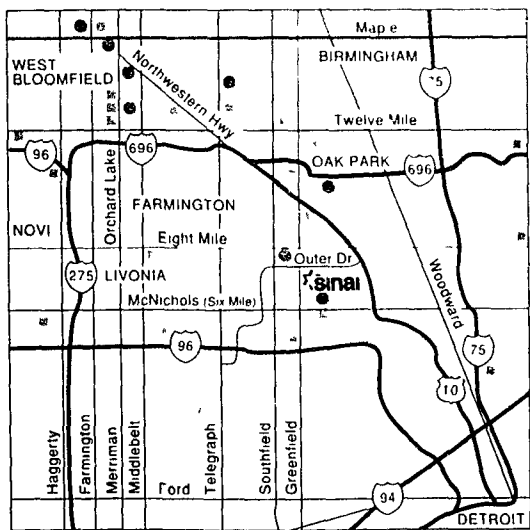
Sinai received a two-year accreditation from the Commission on Laboratory Accreditation of CAP for the excellence of service provided. This accreditation was effective August 1995.

## Sinai Women's Health Breast Care Center Opens

**T**hroughout the world, the diagnosis of malignant tumors of the breast is growing at an alarming rate. "Breast cancer has evolved in the last decade to a common disease," says Eduardo Phillips, MD, Chairman of Sinai Hospital's Department of Surgery and medical director of the Breast Care Center. Worldwide, there were 850,000 new cases of breast cancer diagnosed in 1994 and 250,000 deaths were attributed to this disease in that same year.

According to the *Cancer Journal for Clinicians* of the American Cancer Society, there were approximately 183,000 new cases of breast cancer during the past year (1995). The disease accounts for 17 percent of all malignancies in females, including skin cancers.

However, statistics tell only part of the story. The increased incidence may be due to improved diagnosis and increased number of women detecting lumps and seeking medical treatment. Much progress has been made in understanding breast cancer over the past decade. "Radiology equipment has improved greatly, especially mammography. Therefore, we have uncovered more cases of breast cancer," Dr. Phillips says. Such advanced technology can detect breast cancer at earlier stages. Cancers are far more treatable, with increased survival, the earlier they are diagnosed and treatment is started.

Patient care at Sinai reflects the progress that physicians and researchers are making in diagnosis and treatment of this disease. Sinai Women's Health, an 8,700-square foot facility located on West Maple Road between Orchard Lake Road and Farmington Road, opened its doors on November 13. It is a multi-disciplinary outpatient facility which is geared to the modern woman's lifestyle as well as her healthcare needs.

At Sinai Women's Health, the Breast Care Center offers flexible appointment schedules

and provides comprehensive care by well-trained personnel. The latest state-of-the-art equipment at the Breast Care Center includes four mammography machines, an ultrasound room, and a special stereotactic biopsy room so biopsies can be performed on site. A stereotactic biopsy is a non-surgical procedure used to diagnose non-palpable lesions in the breast. It combines mammography with a computer-assisted needle biopsy.

places, the process is fragmented. First, a woman sees a physician for an evaluation, then she is sent to another doctor for a diagnosis. If follow-up care is necessary, she'll be sent to other doctors at other sites. Then, somehow, all of these specialists need to collaborate and coordinate. It is cumbersome and time consuming. The delays distress the patient. At the very least, this approach is inconvenient; at the worst, it may compromise the quality of care.

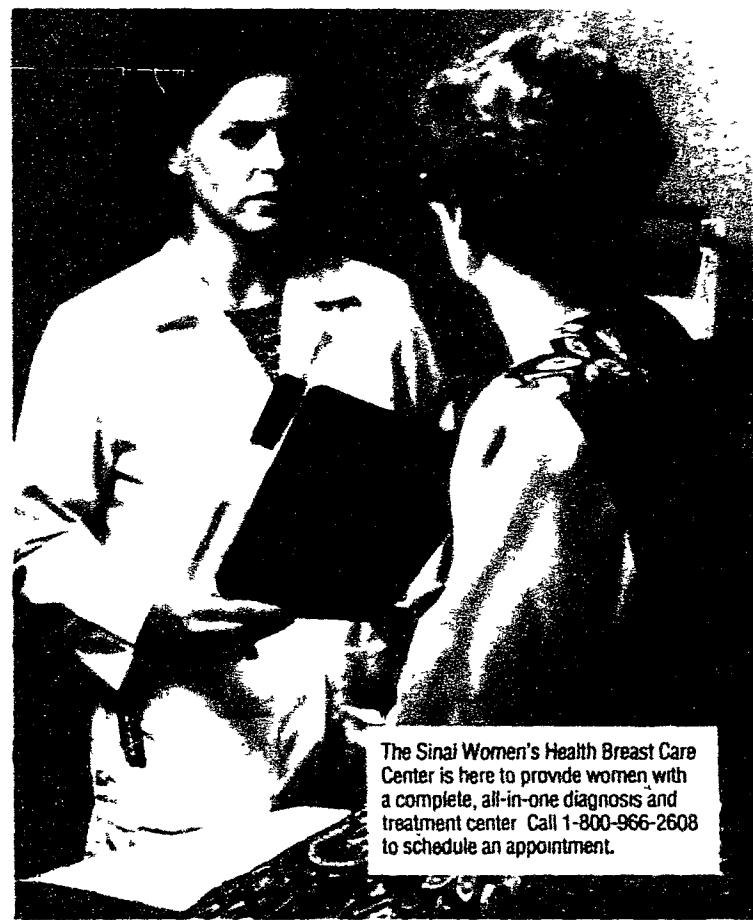
"Sinai Women's Health Breast Care Center is a seamless system to provide continuity of comprehensive care for women with any breast disease, beginning with screening, including diagnostic services, and concluding with follow-up treatment," states Elizabeth Schmitt, MD, Imaging Director of the Center and member of Sinai's Diagnostic Imaging/Radiology Department. Thus, a more convenient, patient-friendly, efficient approach to breast care is available to patients with or without a referral from another doctor.

There is a team of specialists, including a radiologist specializing in breast disease, general surgeons, medical oncologists, radiotherapists, plastic surgeons, a cancer counselor for emotional support, pathologists, cancer specialist nurses and the patient's primary care physician (family practitioner, gynecologist or internist). The team meets to evaluate the results of clinical examination and test results, determine a diagnosis and make treatment recommendations.

"A woman will come to a single location, we bring the doctors to her; she doesn't have to go to different offices or facilities," according to Dr. Phillips. The visit may begin and end with a screening mammogram and breast examination. If the breast tissue X-ray is normal, with no suspicion of disease, she's on her way.

If the mammogram results are abnormal

## Comprehensive Obstetrics Center Meets Women's Needs In New Location

**S**inai Women's Health is relocating the Comprehensive Obstetrics Center to the new Sinai Women's Health building. Sinai is adapting to women's needs by providing them with a range of healthcare services in one convenient location.

The Comprehensive Obstetrics Center, formerly called the High Risk Pregnancy Program, serves pregnant women susceptible to a full range of actual or potential risks to either mother or infant. Housed in the new Sinai facility on West Maple Road, between Farmington and Orchard Lake Roads in West Bloomfield, the obstetric component joins the recently opened Breast Care Center.

The Comprehensive Obstetrics Center is a multi-disciplinary program for pregnant women with actual or potential complications such as diabetes, high blood pressure, multiple pregnancy or a loss of a previous pregnancy. The four physicians at the center are perinatologists David B. Schwartz, MD, Gregory L. Goyert, MD, Richard Bronsteen, MD, and Debra Wright, MD, who are specialists in treating pregnant patients with complications. The personnel include specially trained nurses and technicians who help provide fetal assessment

services such as ultrasound scanning, amniocentesis and non-stress testing. In addition, on-site counseling services include those of a certified genetics counselor as well as those for the psychological stresses from a pregnancy loss. The nurses are certified nurse practitioners and specially trained in providing emotional support and assisting with educational programs and in managing these high-risk patients. Thus, patients and their primary care physicians have access to a multi-skilled team of healthcare providers.

The Comprehensive Obstetrics Center provides consultation (second opinion) services to physicians and their patients. However, should medical care during a pregnancy become a concern, the patient may be a candidate for co-management by the obstetrician and by the specialists at the Center. Sometimes, though, a mother's problems are so significant it is in her best interest to have her care transferred exclusively to the Center's specialists.

Since the Comprehensive

Obstetrics Center is an extension of care already provided by Sinai Hospital, mothers can depend on continued access to specialized services when they deliver. The hospital conducts a special fellowship training program

in obstetric anesthesiology which allows for 24 hour availability of anesthesia procedures, including epidurals. In addition to the Center's skilled complement of four perinatologists, Sinai also boasts

## Surgical Alternatives To Hysterectomy

**H**ysterectomy has been the traditional surgical procedure used for certain patients with excessive or intractable bleeding. Now, there are alternative surgical approaches that may be able to be used in place of the major surgery required for hysterectomy. The endometrium is the lining of the uterus, and advances in technology now allow for the destruction of this lining as an alternative to removing the uterus, in suitably selected cases. The destruction of the lining is called endometrial ablation, and the current techniques use either laser surgery or a procedure called rollerball ablation that uses electrical energy. Both of these techniques are able to be offered to patients by the gynecologists practicing in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Sinai Hospital.

The word lasers may bring to mind your last trip to Disney World with colorful light rays playing against the night sky to the sound of show tunes. You may also think of the scanners at your local store. But lasers are much more than an amusement park phenomenon or a means of reading those UPC codes. They are important medical tools that perform a variety of tasks, often much more effectively than traditional methods. Sinai's Department of Ob/Gyn has been at the forefront in state-of-the-art laser application.

Milton Goldrath, MD a Sinai gynecologist, pioneered the use of lasers in women's health. In 1979, he discovered that by passing a laser light beam through a tube and into the uterus, he could stop excessive non-cancerous bleeding by removing the endometrial lining, and this surgery provided a more desirable alternative to hysterectomy.

More recently, an alternative to laser surgery has been provided by the rollerball technique. With this procedure, electrosurgical energy is used to destroy the lining and the procedure may be somewhat simpler and reduce operating time when compared to the laser. Women who bleed excessively have an endometrium that is malfunctioning, and both of these techniques burn off the bleeding tissue and bring a halt to the problem in the majority of cases. Because these effects are permanent, most of the women will never have a period again or be able to have children. Although bleeding problems can occur

at any age, most will be present in women between the ages of 30 to 50 and in many, they would have already completed their families. The advantage of endometrial ablation by either technique is that it will cure the problem in the majority of patients with a minimum of discomfort and trauma. The procedure can be done as same day surgery with a woman returning home within a few hours. Most women go back to work in a day or two after the procedure.

It is estimated that of the 600,000 hysterectomies performed in the United States,

These abnormal cells can be destroyed with a laser once and for all. Again, the procedure is relatively easy and can be performed as same day surgery.

As is the case with excessive bleeding, Sinai's gynecologists see a lot of patients with cervical dysplasia. However, these women tend to be younger — in their teens to the early thirties. Doctors are pretty sure cervical dysplasia is caused by the same human papilloma virus that causes genital warts. Human papilloma virus is a sexually transmitted disease seen primarily in sexually active individuals. While symptoms of warts will cause most women to go the doctors fairly quickly, cervical dysplasia has no symptoms. Thus, even if one is young, it is very important to go for an annual Pap smear, which is the only way cervical dysplasia can be detected. The laser can also be used to treat genital warts, although it is usually reserved for the stubborn cases that do not respond to medication.

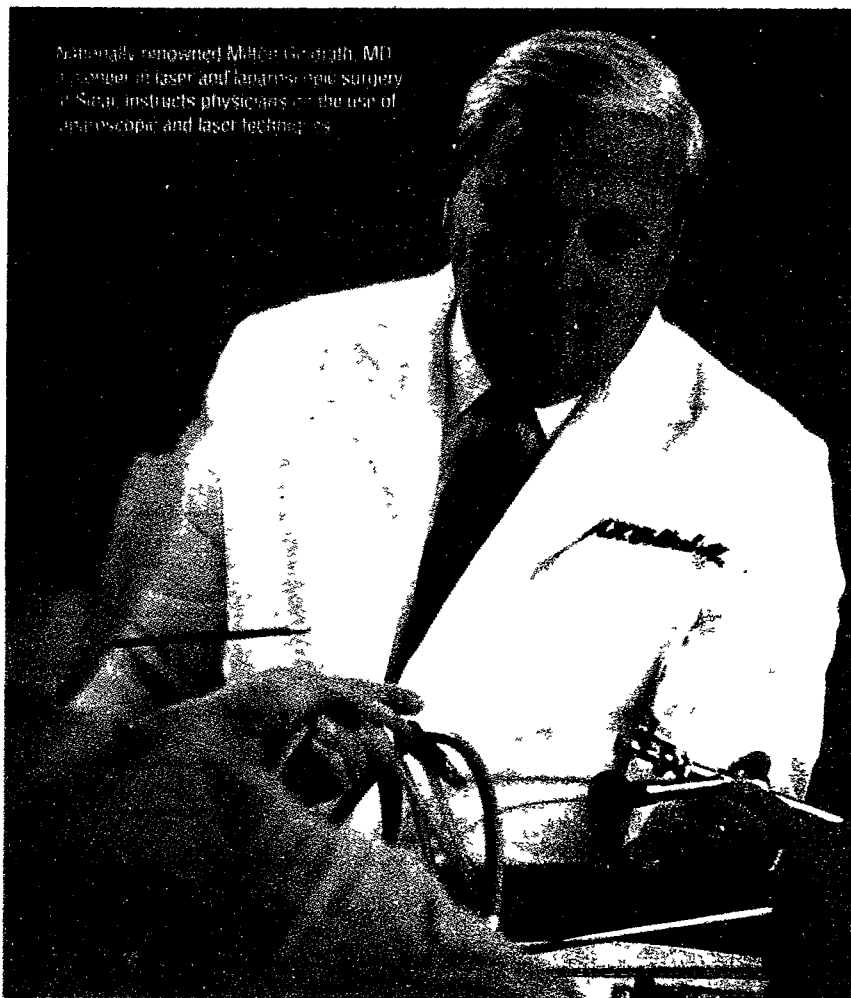
The laser is an option in treating endometriosis, another problem that causes untold pain and discomfort to thousands of women. With endometriosis, pieces of the endometrium (the same tissue that causes excessive uterine bleeding) somehow escape from the inside of the uterus and begin growing in other parts of the pelvis. Every time a woman has a period, the endometrium outside the uterus swells and ultimately bleeds the same as the endometrium inside the uterus. While inside the uterus, the swelling and bleeding are normal and referred to as the period. Outside the uterus, this cycling can be very painful and result in infertility. Laser can destroy this wayward tissue and relieve the intense cramping, pain and sometimes the infertility associated with endometriosis.

Even though laser technology is useful for suitable patients, gynecologists don't always choose a laser. "Fifty percent or more patients with heavy periods can be treated with hormone pills," says Dr. Goldrath. "It's always a matter of what is best for the patient. It is a very conservative attitude, but it's the way our OB/Gyn physicians care for people at Sinai."

These technologies and medical management skills are an integral part of the training program for Sinai OB/Gyn Department physicians. A list of specially trained gynecologists can be accessed through the physician referral service at 1-800-248-3627.

about 200,000 could have been avoided by treating the problem with laser ablation or rollerball. The cost represented by time lost from work and family, discomfort and actual expense is enormous. "At Sinai's Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, we're more interested in applying technology to better serve our patients than any other reason, and we hope that some day hysterectomies won't be necessary for heavy bleeding except for cancer or very large fibroids," says Dr. Goldrath.

Laser surgery may also be used for a variety of other gynecological problems. One of the most common ones is found in the cervix (the opening of the uterus) when cells change and become abnormal. These pre-cancerous lesions, which could become cancer if left untreated, are known as cervical dysplasia.

or disease is suspected, more detailed tests can be done on-site. Sophisticated testing with minimal invasion include ultrasound, fine needle aspiration, stereotactic core biopsies, and X-ray localization procedures.

Within days of her diagnosis, the patient has had the benefit of learning and understanding what breast cancer is, what the available treatment options are and has received the support of the cancer counselor and the team of specialists. With this wealth of information, the patient can make a reasonable and truly informed decision about her treatment.

In Dr. Phillips' opinion, "The time required to complete the entire process from start to finish is much shorter than most patients expect. From the time of diagnosis, through

surgery, to returning home, typically requires little more than a week or so."

## Strongest Risk Factors for Developing Breast Cancer

According to Dr. Phillips, these are the strongest risk factors for developing breast cancer in women:

- **Age** — 50 to 70 are the peak years of risk. Risk actually diminishes after age 70
- **Family history** — A first degree relative (mother, sister or daughter) who has breast cancer will increase the risk for others. Premenopausal occurrence of breast cancers indicates a higher risk for other family members. A premenopausal onset, with involvement in both sides, puts first degree relatives at 8.5 - 9 percent risk of getting breast cancer
- **Reproductive factors** — Early menstruation and late menopause increase the number of years the breast is exposed to estrogen stimulation and therefore increases the possibility of developing a breast malignancy. The age of a woman at the time of her first pregnancy is also considered when assessing risk (estrogen stimulation stops during pregnancy — thus lowering the risk of breast cancer). The younger the age at the first pregnancy, the lower the risk of developing breast cancer
- **History of pre-cancerous conditions**, such as atypical ductile hyperplasia or proliferative fibrocystic disease
- **Previous experience** of breast cancer

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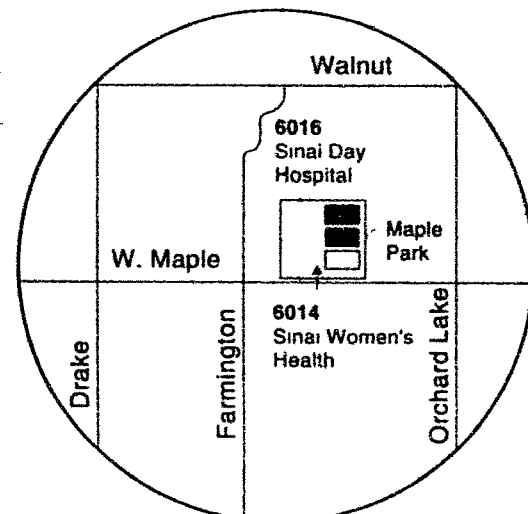

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# Gynecologic Cancers – Early Detection is Crucial

There's both good news and bad news about gynecological cancers (cancers of the reproductive organs in women). Many are preventable or curable if they are caught early, but in many cases the cancer is well advanced by the time symptoms appear.

Cancers of the lower reproductive tract include ovarian cancer; uterine cancer, which is either endometrial cancer (the endometrium is the lining of the uterus) or cervical cancer (the cervix is the neck of the uterus); and cancer of the vagina or vulva. Gynecological cancers strike women of all ages. Endometrial cancer is more common in post-menopausal women; cervical cancer usually occurs in younger women, often those in their early thirties.

"Annual gynecological exams are crucial for detecting these cancers," Alfred Sherman, MD, said. Dr. Sherman is Director of the Sinai Hospital Gynecological Oncology program and a professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Wayne State University. "Every woman who is over 18 years of age or is sexually active should have an annual pelvic exam and Pap smear," says Dr. Sherman. "These procedures are the best ways of finding these cancers early and finding them early is the key to successful treatment and survival."

Dr. Sherman estimates that about 20,000 new cases of endometrial cancer will be diagnosed in the United States this year. Of those, most will be cured. "We anticipate a 60-70 percent survival rate," he says. "Close to 100 percent of the women whose cancer is de-

tected early and treated with surgery and radiation will survive."

Cervical and endometrial cancers can be detected in their pre-cancerous states by a Pap smear, which reveals the lesions that precede them. The lesions can then be treated and the cancers prevented.

The outlook for those diagnosed with ovarian cancer is less optimistic. Of the approxi-

mately 17,000 women who will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer this year, about 4,000 will survive. The difference in survival rates may be caused by the difficulty in finding ovarian cancer before it has reached an advanced stage. Usually it can be detected only by a pelvic ultrasound. Ovarian cancers tend to grow and spread quickly. Gilda Radner, comedienne and TV and film star, died from ovarian cancer.

"We don't have a good clue as to the possible causes of ovarian cancer," Dr. Sherman states. "We do know that a small percentage of the cases are related to abnormal gene factors, so if a woman's mother had ovarian cancer, she is considered at high risk. We also know that women who have taken birth control pills for an extended period, five to ten years, seem to have a lower risk of ovarian cancer."

Researchers don't know the causes of gynecological cancers. There is some indication that endometrial cancer may be related to hormone disturbance. Viral infection may be one of the factors in cervical cancer.

With so little information available, it may be impossible to assess an individual's risk of developing one of these diseases. "The morbidity associated with these diseases underscores the need for continued research in this area. The support of the community as participants in clinical trials, as well as donations to

support research activities, are of paramount importance as federal funding continues to decline," comments Vicki Baker, MD, Section Chief of Gynecologic Oncology at the University of Michigan Medical School and Associate Section Chief of Gynecologic Oncology at Sinai Hospital.

Treatment for gynecological cancers has advanced a great deal in recent years. Sinai was one of the first hospitals to use an instrument called a laparoscope, which allows doctors to inspect the ovaries and uterus — and even to remove the uterus — through a small incision rather than through conventional surgery. Not only can this be used when performing a hysterectomy for non-malignant disease, but it can be incorporated into the diagnostic procedures performed if there is suspicion of cancer. A laparoscopy does not require hospitalization and it is far less invasive than traditional abdominal surgery.

Many gynecologic cancers are treatable, even curable. It is very important to seek medical attention if you have any abnormal symptoms. Sinai will provide you with the best medical care available. We will also continue to improve the diagnosis, technology and treatment options available to women. The earlier cancer is treated, the better the results.

## Glossary of Terms

<b>Antenatal</b>	before birth has occurred
<b>Birth Classes</b>	educational classes to inform expectant parents about the birthing process, what to expect, and ways to improve the experience for both parents and baby
<b>Lactation Consultant</b>	nurse with special training about breast feeding
<b>LDRP</b>	labor/delivery/recovery/postpartum room. The mother is admitted to one room during labor, remains there for the birth of the baby and through her entire stay in the hospital.
<b>Neonatologist</b>	a doctor who specializes in the development, care and diseases of newborn babies
<b>NICU</b>	neonatal intensive care unit. Usually categorized as level 3 for more complicated cases
<b>Non-stress Test</b>	one of a series of tests (e.g., monitoring fetal movements and heartbeat) that are used to determine the well-being of the baby before birth
<b>OB ICU</b>	intensive care unit staff by specialists in both intensive care and obstetrics
<b>Obstetrician</b>	a doctor who specializes in the medical care preceding and immediately after the birth of a baby
<b>Obstetrics</b>	area of medicine which deals with birth and with the time before and after the birth
<b>Pediatrician</b>	a doctor who specializes in the development, care and diseases of children
<b>Pediatrics</b>	area of medicine which deals specifically with children
<b>OB Nurse Practitioner</b>	nurse with specialized training to deal with the mother and baby before, during and after birth
<b>Perinatologist</b>	physician who is specially trained to take care of pregnancies with risks to mother and fetus
<b>Postnatal</b>	after birth has occurred
<b>Postpartum</b>	the time period during the first six weeks following delivery of a baby
<b>Prenatal</b>	before birth has occurred

# Hope is Available for Infertility

Approximately 15 percent of couples in the childbearing years encounter infertility. Technically, a couple isn't termed infertile unless they are unable to conceive a child after at least a year of regular intercourse without using any form of birth control. The inability to conceive can be due to problems with the man, the woman or both. Sometimes there is no obvious explanation for why they cannot conceive. Infertility can occur at any time, even after you have already had children.

Infertility can result from many different causes. In men, the number and quality of sperm can affect a man's ability to impregnate a woman. Something as simple as the temperature of the scrotum can influence a man's fertility. Infection (such as mumps in adulthood), venereal disease or hormone imbalances can also cause infertility in a man.

A woman's reproductive system can be affected by infection, hormone imbalance, endometriosis, scar tissue, fibroids and many other conditions.

Depending on the source of the infertility, different treatment options are available which may help a couple become pregnant. Once a couple has been evaluated for infertility, deciding on the appropriate therapy can be difficult. There is an array of choices, especially for women. To help make the best choice for them, Sinai has three specialists in Reproductive Endocrinology — David Magyar, DO, Maria Hayes, MD, and Gary Jones, MD. These specialists offer complete services for infertility evaluation and therapy at the Sinai facility at 29255 Northwestern Highway.

Normal conception rates vary by age. A woman has a 20 to 25 percent chance of conceiving during each menstrual cycle at the peak of her fertility. Fertility starts to decline slightly in her late 20s and early 30s and more steeply after about age 35. According to Dr. Jones, "Many members of the baby boom generation who have delayed starting a family will generally find getting pregnant is not necessarily easy."

Infertility today can be treated with a variety of therapeutic approaches depending upon the cause of the problem. Drug therapy, for example, is often used to treat infertility. Fertility drugs are used to induce ovulation or to improve semen quality. When hormonal testing in the course of an infertility workup suggests some sort of hormone imbalance in one or both partners, corrective therapy with fertility drugs is frequently prescribed. The most popular of these drugs are Clomid and Serophene, which act on the hypothalamus and Pituitary (human menopausal gonadotropins), which stimulates the ovaries or testicles directly. "Because these powerful drugs can have a wide range of side effects, patients need to be carefully counseled in their use and should be closely monitored during their administration," warns Dr. Magyar. With both types of fertility drugs, there is an increased risk of multiple births when administered to the woman.

Tubal surgery is another common form of treatment for infertility resulting from previously damaged tubes. Endometriosis also may be treated surgically and/or with medication. Problems with the cervix and cervical mucus may be bypassed with intrauterine insemination using the partner's sperm. Donor insemination may be utilized where the treatment of the man's infertility has not been successful.

New reproductive technologies like *in vitro* fertilization and GIFT (Gamete Intrafallopian Transfer) can be used with couples who have not responded to other forms of infertility treatment. *In vitro* fertilization can even be effective for women whose fallopian tubes are damaged or missing. Eggs are retrieved from the woman and mixed with sperm. Fertilized eggs are then placed into the woman's uterus. *In vitro* also can use techniques such as intracytoplasmic sperm insertion (ICSI) which is used in instances when semen quality is poor. The insertion of semen into the ova usually results in higher rates of fertilization than through traditional means for these couples.

GIFT is appropriate for a woman whose tubes are normal but who has not, to date, been able to conceive with other therapies. GIFT varies from *in vitro* in that eggs are collected in the operating room and are immediately mixed with sperm. This egg-sperm mixture is then transferred to the tubes where fertilization will hopefully occur. Unlike *in vitro*, GIFT requires that the woman have at least one healthy fallopian tube. Zygote Intrafallopian Transfer (ZIFT) is a procedure similar to GIFT, except that an already fertilized egg is inserted directly into the fallopian tube. ZIFT and GIFT have higher success rates than does *in vitro* fertilization. However, advances in technology and knowledge have improved the success rates of all high-tech forms of treating infertility. Unfortunately, success is not assured for all couples.

In addition to the new reproductive technologies, some of the older technologies are undergoing revision. An example is the transvaginal treatment of tubal blockage. Passages of thin wires through the cervix into the fallopian tube has allowed for the treatment of some forms of tubal blockage and can often be done with sedation in an outpatient setting. According to Dr. Hayes, "The recovery time is very short and the procedure can be performed very quickly and much more inexpensively using the transvaginal route."

There are numerous causes for male and female infertility. A given couple may demonstrate more than one single cause. However, treatments abound, and couples now have multiple options. At Sinai, these options are now available from our team of experts.

Level III nursery certification. The neonatal intensive care unit is staffed 24 hours-a-day by one of six neonatologists, who are physicians specially trained and certified to take care of newborn problems.

Dr. Schwartz, Chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, and the committee charged with developing the women and infant service's strategic plan, is proud of what's been accomplished. "I think the center is another major innovation that we have accomplished; it continues to address the issue of taking service sites out into the community. The Comprehensive Obstetrics Center will bring a range of services and personnel together in a very unique way, combining a convenient site with a

combination of services not easy to duplicate."

Dr. Schwartz adds, "There's a whole range of additional specialty services that we would like to offer to women." Underway are plans for a Sinai Park Complex in Novi that will include a women's center and program to also address issues that face not only women of childbearing age but the mature woman. As the healthcare needs of women continue to grow and change, so will the Sinai Health System.
