District shows impressive grad rate

New student programs and increased student assistance are getting the credit for keeping students in school until graduation.

Northville High School, for the second straight year, posted the second lowest drop-out rate of any high school in Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties, according to statistics released this week in a report by the state's Education

Department.

Northville High School reported a drop-out rate of 0.17 percent for the 1993/94 school year - a decrease from the 0.59 percent posted by the school in 1992/93 school year. Only the Redford Union School district posted a lower rate, just 0.02 percent less than Northville.

Neighboring Novi High School posted a 1.73 percent drop-out rate for 1993/94 - an increase from the 0.85 rate the school

posted in 1992/93.

This year, Northville High School graduated 280 seniors, with 160 of those students graduating with grade point averages (GPA) of 3.0 or higher.

School district officials reported that more attention on student programs and stronger involvement by parents is responsible for keeping students in school. According to Assistant Superintendent Dolly McMaster an intense focus

on students and programs has saved quite a few students who were considered "at risk."

"Student programs like student assistance, peer mediation. Students Against Drunk Drivers, and our involvement with Oakland Vocational Technical Institute are just a few of the programs that have helped our students," she said.

Schools could get higher fund total

Officials cautious despite good news

Despite passage of the state's school aid bill that will reportedly increase per-pupil-funding an additional \$156, the Northville Public School District will approach the upcoming budget year on a conservative note.

The district approved its budget for fiscal year 1996/97 Monday, and according to projections, revenues and expenditures will increase slightly.

According to district Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski there is still uncertainty surrounding the district's per-pupil funding amount from the state. The district is taking a conservative line in projecting how much the district will take in and how much it will spend.

"The figures we are getting from the state show an increase in per-pupil funding by about \$150, but we believe that figure will more likely be about \$120," he said. "We're still budgeting for a \$100 increase, and we'll just see how the actual figures shape up."

Video recording foils suspected store thief

A 20-year-old Northville man will face embezzlement charges after he was captured on tape by state police surveillance cameras stealing money from the cash register of a Northville party store.

Neil Craig Lokey was arraigned in 35th District Court Tuesday. He pled not guilty to the felony charges and posted 10 percent of the \$4,000 bond. Lokey's preliminary exam is scheduled for July 1.

According to Northville police, Lokey may have stolen more than \$25,000 over a 10 month period from the cash registers at Good Time Party Store on Seven Mile where he has been employed for the last year.

Party store owner Jim Roth told police he suspected Lokey of stealing money from the registers since October 1995, and had been

attempting to set the man up with phony liquor buys on several occasions.

It wasn't until Northville Police, with help from the Michigan State Police Department, set up surveillance cameras and caught Lokey in the act of the thefts.

According to police reports, Lokey was caught on tape more than four different times pocketing cash from the registers. Once police had the evidence they confronted the suspect, who admitted to stealing more than \$200 per week over a 10 month period. Police and Roth believe Lokey most likely took more than \$200 and estimate the man stole about \$25,000 from the store.

If convicted of the felony Lokey could face up to 10 years in prison and/or a \$5,000 fine.

Senior center gains planning recommendation

Could a new elderly housing complex be in store for our community?

A Novi developer wants to build one off Seven Mile and he got a helping hand from the Northville Township Planning Commission Tuesday night. Not everyone who lives in the area is giving the idea a round of applause, however.

The commission voted 4-0 (three members were absent) to recommend that the township board of trustees rezone a parcel of land owned by a township couple across Seven Mile from the Michigan State Police post. The move, should the board allow it, would change the parcel's zoning from its

current R-3 (small lot single family residential homes) to R-E (elderly residential housing).

The rezoning would allow Carl Simcox, a Novi developer, to bring forward a site plan for some type of senior housing on the site. R-E zoning allows a variety of different elderly housing options, including everything from condos to a nursing home.

Jim Pappas, an architect working for Simcox, told the commission no formal site plan design has been decided on yet but that plans are leaning towards a small-scale assisted living setup that may include, for instance, 10-12 buildings with space for two or three living units apiece. A nursing

Oasis owner rebuffed in bid for land rezoning

One thumb up, one down. While the township planning commission agreed to recommend a rezoning request to accommodate a senior housing developer, the commission turned down another rezoning application at the same meeting.

Brian Ashley, the owner of the Oasis golf center on Five Mile, asked the commission to recom-

mend that the board approve his request to rezone land he owns from its current OS-1 (office/service) designation to B-3 (general business).

The move is not intended as a prelude to make major changes in the land's use, Ashley said. He explained that he intends to keep Oasis focused on golf, possibly expanding offerings in that area at some point in the future.

Ann Arbor environmental firm wins Mill Pond bid

Two weeks after accepting a \$180,000 grant from Wayne County the Northville City Council has selected an engineering firm to design improvements to Mill Pond.

The council unanimously approved the Ann Arbor firm Johnson, Johnson & Roy (JJR) to design alternatives and construction documents for the restoration of Mill Pond at a cost of \$129,347.

According to City Manager Gary Word, the Friends of Mill Pond, in 1993, anticipated possible future funding and solicited proposals

from several professional engineering and planning firms to assist in the restoration project. During the competitive bid and interview process JJR was selected to perform the work once funding was secured, he said.

"JJR is a quality firm that has performed similar projects throughout the country," Word added. "At our request they have modified their original proposal to match current Rouge River Stormwater Demonstration grant goals and objectives."

Word said the company will provide several engineering and plan-

ning services including the establishment of existing conditions, development of a preliminary restoration design, a final restoration design, construction follow-up, and provide a long term management plan.

According to JJR Vice president Tim Larson the project is a multi-faceted approach for addressing stormwater in the city of Northville in partnership with Friends of Mill Pond, the city of Novi, Northville Public Schools, and the Northville Historical Society.

"The purpose of this project is to restore the Northville Mill Pond to

enhance its function to treat stormwater while providing opportunities to increase its educational, recreational, environmental and neighborhood aesthetic potential," Larson said. "We're pleased to have the change to provide services for the restoration project."

Mill Pond is about a quarter-mile in length and is located between Griswold Avenue and Grayson Street, near Mill Race Village, in Northville. It is a man-

made body, having been constructed by Henry Ford to assist in auto manufacturing.

HEALTH NOTE

DOWN AT THE HEELS

Achilles tendinitis is usually characterized by a dull or sharp pain along the large tendon that connects the two major calf muscles to the heel bone. Other symptoms may include limited ankle flexibility, redness or heat over the painful area, and/or the appearance of a lumpy buildup of scar tissue (nodule) on the tendon. All this can be brought on by light or fatigued calf muscles which transfer too much of the burden of running to the Achilles. The road to recovery from Achilles tendinitis begins with a cessation of running taking anti-inflammatory medication, icing the area for 15 minutes at a time several times daily, and massage. Once the nodule disappears, a stretching program should be undertaken to stretch the calf muscles. The return to running should be gradual.

Bands earn festival awards

Northville High school is the home of three state championship bands this year. The fifth hour Symphonic Band, made up entirely of freshmen, and the sixth hour Symphonic Band, consisting of 10th through 12th graders, earned First Division ratings at both district and state festivals this spring.

The Jazz Ensemble I, which meets after school as a seventh hour class, received a First Division rating at Jazz Festival and was given its seventh invitation to perform at the Montreux Detroit Jazz Festival over the Labor Day weekend.

This kind of success naturally leads to increased interest in the bands. As a result, the size of the bands has increased dramatically. This year student enrollment for the bands is expected to explode by more than 40 percent. There could be more than 220 students in the Marching Band this coming year, and roughly 260 in the band program.

Such rapid growth brings an increased need for funding. The administration and the music boosters have been trying to come up with the funds needed to run so successful a program, and the Northville High School bands are working on solutions themselves.

This fall both choir and band students will collect aluminum cans on Oct. 5 for the annual pop can drive and will sell cheese and sausage again in time for Thanksgiving. As a new fund-raiser, students will be selling entertainment books when school starts.

The band is also offering a CD of "First Division Performances." The CD will be available in mid-July. Brand new driver faces first accident

The man was booked and held on \$100 bond.

ANOTHER DRIVER ARRESTED: What began as a family dispute ended in the drunk driving arrest of a 43-year-old Wixom man June 18.

According to Police, the man had been involved in a family argument and when Northville Police were notified, the man left the scene in his 1996 Plymouth mini-van.

Police responded to the family disturbance call and while en route were notified that the man had left and was driving away on Dubuair Street.

Police were able to stop the man on Dubuair, and when he attempted to exit his vehicle the man stumbled, almost falling to the ground.

Police asked the man to perform several field sobriety tests and then asked to administer a preliminary breath test.

The test registered .17 blood alcohol content.

The man was arrested and transported to the Northville Police Department where a second breath test registered .16 percent blood alcohol content.

The man was held on \$100 bond.

INTELLIGENCE IMPAIRED: A 21-year-old Highland man wasn't thinking very clearly when he decided to attempt a U-turn on Eight Mile Road near Center Street June 10.

Northville police witnessed the man's lapse in judgment and followed him as he traveled east on Eight Mile, driving erratically and at a high rate of speed. The officer finally stopped the man near Griswold.

The man was asked to perform several field sobriety tests along with a preliminary breath test. The PBT resulted in a reading of .15 percent blood alcohol content.

The man was arrested and transported to the Northville Police Department where a second breath test registered .14 percent.

The man was held on \$100 bond.

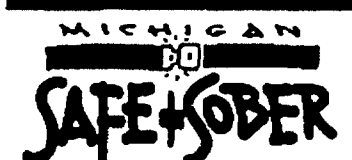
Monroe, Flat Rock, Detroit and Pontiac.

Sidewalk repair program approved

The City of Northville will be repairing sidewalks and crosswalks along Main Street this summer, causing a slight impact on pedestrian and automobile traffic, city officials reported this week.

According to Public Works Director Jim Gallogly, La Rocca Inc. of Livonia has been awarded the \$53,000 contract to remove and replace segments of curb and sidewalk in the downtown area.

The project is slated to take place on Main Street between Center and Hutton, Gallogly said.

"This project is necessary to

eliminate irregularities in the pavement and minimize city liability with regards to slip and fall accidents," Gallogly explained.

La Rocca submitted the sole bid on the contract, which came in under the \$60,000 budget established by the city's Downtown Development Authority.

According to Gallogly the project could begin immediately and will be completed within 45 working days. He said there will be an impact to traffic on Main Street as replacement of the brick crosswalks on a new concrete base will require half the street to be closed at one time.

"Traffic will be detoured accordingly. However, one-way traffic will always be maintained," he said. "The contractor is also aware of special street and parade events through the summer months."

required to have their general fund budgets approved by July 1, while the state's budget is due Oct. 1. That makes it hard for school officials to estimate how much per-pupil funding the state will pay to that particular district.

The approved budget calls for the district to take in about \$32-million in revenue - an increase of about 3 percent over last year - and spend about \$31.9 million, also a 3 percent increase.

The district's debt millage rate will be reduced from 4.3 mills to 3.5 mills next year. The decrease comes in the wake of a sale of a portion of district owned land on Six Mile Road to Cambridge Homes. This year the district received about \$380,000 in principal and another \$60,000 in interest from the sale. That \$440,000 represents about 0.46 mill and leaves a principal balance of more than \$880,000 or 0.93 mill worth of revenue.

The 3.5 debt millage, combined with 18 non-homestead mills and 6 mills levied by the state, total 27.5 mills.

"I think it's important to note that this district is not going to have to borrow money," Rezmierski said. "The actions this board and staff have taken has put the district in this financial position."

The school board also passed a resolution opting out of the newly enacted Schools of Choice legislation for the 1996-97 school year. The district had until July 1 to opt out in order to avoid a 10 percent state imposed penalty.

Schools of choice legislation allows parents to shop around for a school that meets the needs of their children, Rezmierski explained. The problem is simple - if parents remove their children from Northville schools the lower student population would mean reduced state funding. Conversely, he added, if the district participated in the program it could face the prospect of opening its doors to an

unending stream of students, putting additional strain on some school facilities that are already suffering from overcrowding.

"As of this date the count is about 150 additional students," said Assistant Superintendent Dave Bolitho. District officials had predicted an increase of 160 students over last year's district population.

"All of these factors make it extremely difficult for us to accurately predict how much revenue we will be receiving from the

state," Rezmierski said. "I expect we'll have a more accurate count by the middle of August."

With district enrollment figures projected to increase by about 163 students, to 4,673, and the per-pupil state foundation amount to increase by \$100, to \$6,803 per pupil, the district will receive a little more than \$31-million from the state.

State funding is the largest revenue source for the district, making up 97 percent of the operating capital in the general fund.

The high school counseling staff consists of Carolyn Bovair, Betsy Sole, Tim Turner and Jack Wickens.

With the high school Future's Committee and the new Coalition for Students Success, a lot of attention has been focused on the high school, according to McMaster. "I think the students have benefited by the work that has been done by these committees over the past few years," she added.

Northville High School Principal

Tom Johnson agreed.

"I think it's a combination of things at work. We provide the programs for students and that's a benefit. But I think, more importantly, it is the support of parents that keep kids in school," he said.

"Parents in this community regard education as paramount and they view the learning process as critical in the life of their chil-

dren. I believe that's a major reason behind our success and the success of our students."

The high school ranked among the best statewide according to the department of education statistics, which reported that the state's drop-out rate dipped 1.4 percent to 5.2 percent overall, the lowest rate Michigan has enjoyed in years.

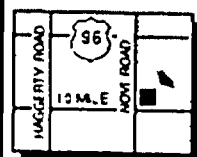

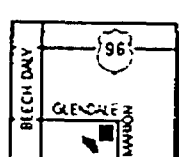

Community steps up anti-drug abuse effort

Latest survey outcome spurs action

The news is alarming - drug use is still on the rise despite increased educational and community awareness.

That was the conclusion of the Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) Survey released by the Northville Public School District in May. The survey was taken by district eighth, 10th, and 12th grade students and although district officials expected an increase in drug and alcohol use, they were not prepared for the startling statistics that reflect a large increase in substance abuse over the 1994 survey.

In the months that have followed the startling revelation, the school district and the community have continued to search for answers that will lead to a reversal of the alarming trend.

"I'm sorry to say that the trend towards increased youth substance abuse has continued in our community despite the very considerable efforts of school staff and community leaders," said Bob Sornson, the Executive Director of the school district's Special Education Program and a member of the community's Zero Tolerance campaign.

Sornson presented short- and long-term recommendations to the school board Monday.

Among the suggestions the district is exploring are:

- placing additional emphasis on the successful transition of students from middle school to high

school;

- having police liaison officers on site;

- increase parental education, targeting parents of eighth through tenth graders;

- expanding conflict resolution training at all schools;

- developing a mentoring program for students, with one staff member assigned to mentor 15 to 20 students;

- provide more activities to students, placing healthy alternatives to alcohol and drug use.

"I am extremely pleased that the district is continuing its efforts and I think that because of the latest AOD results, there is a growing awareness within the community that these problems are not made up, that they are indeed a reality," Sornson said.

It's not just high school students community leaders are worried about.

The statistics coming out of the eighth grade are just as alarming, according to Sornson.

According to the survey 23 percent of eighth grade students answering the questionnaire admitted to using drugs, and 38 percent admitted using alcohol, also categorized as a drug.

Even more disturbing were results that showed close to 14 percent admitted using illicit drugs within a one month period. That's 4 percent higher than the 1994 survey and 7 percent higher than the survey taken in 1992.

Fifteen percent admitted to drinking alcohol in the past month.

There were 320 eighth graders, 292 10th graders, and 223 12th graders participating in the survey.

At the high school level, 35 percent of 10th grade students admitted to using illicit drugs within a one month period, and almost 49 percent admitted to drinking alcohol.

Figures from high school seniors were also up from 1994 results

with close to 40 percent admitting using illicit drugs within the past month and 70 percent admitting to drinking alcohol.

The survey also revealed the following:

- Of the 70 percent of high school seniors who admitted to using alcohol within the last month, 52 percent admitted to binge drinking, which is five or more drinks in a row.

- Of the 49 percent of high school sophomores who admitted using alcohol within the past month, 30 percent were binge drinkers.

- Close to 60 percent of eighth graders, 88 percent of 10th graders and 95 percent of 12th graders said that obtaining drugs was easy. About 90 percent of eighth graders, 95 percent of 10th graders and 99.5 percent of 12th graders said that obtaining alcohol was easy.

In both cases the numbers have steadily increased from 1992 and 1994 survey results.

When the results were released, Northville High School Principal Tom Johnson characterized the figures as alarming.

"Along with the survey results, my concern is also focused on the number of alcohol or drug related incidents happening at the high school, and those instances have increased as well," he said.

"I believe the programs we have in place are excellent, but until we can attack this thing from a societal point of view, we are going to continue to see these numbers increase."

School board President Richard Brown said that in order to be successful the schools and community must do their part.

"There is a lot to be done and I think the responsibility is shared. The schools need to do their part, as do parents and the community," he said.

"It is a total community effort and is a never ending task."

Committee plots drug war strategy

While there is no single program that will eliminate drug use and abuse among youths in Northville, research does predict that a variety of factors will influence the likelihood of youth substance abuse, according to Bob Sornson, Executive Director of the district's Special Education Program and a member of Northville's Zero Tolerance campaign.

According to Sornson the following factors have been supported by years of research:

- Comprehensive school-based educational efforts produce better results than one-shot hit-or-miss strategies.

- The use of older students as instructors affects attitudes toward drug abuse.

- School staff awareness and

training, along with a clear perception that it matters to significant adults whether students are using drugs influences use rates. Positive student-teacher relationships are very important factors.

- The use of law enforcement officers in school to enhance enforcement and educational efforts is recommended.

- Early anti-social behavior in school is a significant risk factor, as is academic failure in elementary school.

- Positive involvement in community activities, sports or church activities is related to students being less likely to engage in drug use.

- Involvement in family activities, active participation of fathers in the child-rearing process, and the presence of at least one parental figure with whom adoles-

cents feel they can talk openly are significant and positive factors.

- Inadequate parental supervision, early experimentation with drugs, community tolerance of alcohol and other drug use, family use of alcohol and other drugs, and chronic parental conflict are all negative risk factors.

According to Sornson, there are a variety of other promising programs or practices that offer hope for schools that are trying to reduce substance abuse among students.

"The schools cannot and will not significantly change drug use behaviors by acting alone," he explained.

"Students, parents, schools, churches, business, municipal government, and the media must all choose to be actively involved in the effort."

Coalition claims early successes

There's nothing like getting off to a fast start.

The Northville Public School District's newest coalition, charged with drafting the educational future of Northville High School, has already succeeded where other district committees have failed.

The Coalition for Student Success has begun tackling several initiatives that, when implemented, will change the face of how Northville teens are educated at the High School, according to Coalition Chairman and Northville High School Principal Tom Johnson.

"We've had a very short but eventful history," Johnson said. "We're excited about what we've accomplished so far."

The Coalition has set its timeline to complete the eight initiatives it was originally charged with when the school board approved the coalition's formation in April. According to Johnson, the first initiative — to develop and implement mechanisms for effective communication and collaboration with parents, teachers and the community — has already been accomplished.

we've been meeting just about every week to develop the mission statement and begin work on the initiatives," he explained. "During that period of time we've accomplished just about everything we have set out to do."

The coalition consists of 14 members: Tina Juntunen, Josh Brugeman, and Kevin Wood are student representatives; Al Ferrara, Judy Prain, and Dale Otterman serve as parent and community representatives; and Sue Couzens, Jan Smith, Maureen Gorshak, Ron Meteyer, Chris Ford, Ann Cook, and Carolyn Bovair serve as teacher/counselor representatives.

Of the eight initiatives four have completion dates in September and October. The remaining initiatives are slated to be completed by late January or early February 1997.

Johnson said the coalition will study several possible changes

and conduct a review of the high school's organizational practices and support services. It will also study high school scheduling options; identify a learning environment and school climate that will support high academic and social expectations for students; review athletic programs and other activities; determine a relevant curriculum and effective instructional program practice; and compare the high school's graduate profile and adult roles to curriculum and program delivery systems.

"We've done plenty of work, but we still have plenty of work to accomplish," said Al Ferrara, who is chairing a subcommittee that will be studying changes in high school scheduling.

"We have come together as a team and for the first time all of the stakeholders are taking part in the process."

Dale Otterman said she is excit-

ed about the coalition's progress and added that the group has taken on some "ambitious" goals.

"These are daunting initiatives and sometimes I feel a bit overwhelmed by the whole process," she said.

"But we're tackling the initiatives one at a time, and we're making progress."

The coalition plans to meet through the summer in order to have some of the initiatives in place by the beginning of the next school year.

"Al (Ferrara) and his committee are studying the findings of previous district committees in regards to scheduling because that's something we need to get in place early on in this school year so that we'll be able to make changes for the following school year," Johnson said.

"I think it's important that we remember that the (Future's Committee and community dialog) process set the climate for change. It has given us the opportunity to sit at the table and really begin the meaningful dialog that is necessary if we're going to adopt the attitude that our children are first."

Local districts can get grants to teach adults

Local school districts will be able to compete for \$20 million in state grants for teaching adults under new rules approved by the state board of education.

Local schools will be told to develop consortia with other districts, county intermediate districts, community colleges, work force development boards and private industry.

"The basic purpose," said Arthur Ellis, superintendent of public instruction, "is to enable eligible adults to enroll in a program to obtain basic skills, learn English as a second language, prepare for the general educational development (GED) test, acquire job or employment-related skills, or complete requirements for a high school diploma."

The board voted 7-0 June 19 to approve rules under the new state aid act signed the same day by Gov. John Engler.

But board member Dorothy Beardmore, R-Rochester, saw a flaw in requiring the development of group proposals in such a short time. "To require they (other agencies) be players adds to the complexity. You have to wonder: Is this deliberately planned to fail?"

Districts have until July 1 to make their applications. The Department of Education must notify successful applicants by Aug. 1. Top officials doubt everyone will meet the deadlines.

"What would happen if we missed the deadline?" asked board member Gary Wolfram, R-Hillsdale. "In Treasury (where he worked before returning to Hillsdale College), we missed deadlines all the time. They never hauled me off to jail."

"No, they (Engler) sent you here," quipped board president Clark Durant, R-Grosse Pointe. That ended all humor in the discussion.

The deadlines are "legislative time frames. The administration will do everything to help the school districts," said Dr. Ron Gillum, a deputy in charge of adult ed, hinting the department will wink at the dates.

At Engler's urging, the Republican Legislature, on almost party-line votes, cut adult education from \$185 million to a total of \$102 million, providing that \$20 million must be awarded by competitive bids rather than mailed directly to K-12 districts.

Local school officials and lawmakers in both parties have criticized the cuts bitterly. Democrats withheld their votes because of the adult ed cuts.

"I've attended adult ed graduations," said board member Kathleen Straus, D-Detroit. "They are very impressive. Such a cross-section of people - young, old, native-born, immigrant. I just hate to see it cut so dramatically."

"It doesn't make sense to do something so dramatic in such a short time," Straus said, referring to a legislative passage in the post-midnight hours of June 7. "We should have said more about adult ed. We said nothing."

Added board member Barbara Roberts Mason, D-Lansing: "I'm concerned about the cuts. Many (districts) didn't fund their programs. I'd like to know how many will no longer offer adult ed, cut staff, cut curriculum offerings? We can also find the impact on the economy."

Even board vice president Marilyn Lundy, R-Detroit, who usually lines up solidly with Engler and Durant, recalled, "In Detroit, this was one of the hot issues." She referred to a June 17 hearing by the department to get public input on the state of the schools.

Another hearing was held Monday at the Oakland Intermediate School District in Pontiac. Another will be held at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 27, in the Independence Building, Freedom Hill, Sterling Heights.

Karen Katz, executive director of the Michigan Association of Community and Adult Educators, also criticized the July 1 deadline.

"We suddenly must make a formal grant proposal in one week, no matter what we've been doing in the past."

Engler, signing the school aid bill that morning, hailed the "reform" of adult education, praising the need for "input from local workforce development boards and the Michigan Jobs Commission among others."

"I look forward to working with the Legislature to meet their goal of 50 percent competitive grants next year," the governor said.

Four categories of grants will be made under the rules:

- Persons with a high school diploma or GED under age 20 on Sept. 1 and enrolled in the Michi-

gan Career and Technical Institute.

- The same group not attending college and enrolled in a job-related program under referral by an employer.

- Persons studying English as a second language for a maximum of one year.

- Others at least 20 on Sept. 1 lacking a diploma or GED.

"Grant amounts will range between \$49,500 and \$2 million, based on \$2,750 per participant FTE (full-time equivalent student) of 450 hours," say the rules.

"Last year's \$4,000 was cut to \$2,750 per FTE," said Gillum. "This limits the number of hours to 900 for a high-school diploma and \$450 for a GED. Anything after that, you pay tuition. Local school districts set the tuition."

Engler's action was scorched by Rep. James Agee, D-Muskegon, a former school superintendent.

"It was short-sighted and cruel," Agee said.

Debate over phonics stirs strong emotions

Public schools are great. Not perfect, but not deserving such blistering criticism, and certainly better than private and parochial schools and most foreign schools.

Government and industrialists are plotting to make American kids dumb by teaching whole-language instead of phonics. The plot follows Nikolai Lenin's Soviet plan that children are human resources for industry rather than reservoirs for memorizing knowledge.

So went Oakland County's "broad conversation about the future of public education," as sent to the State Board of Education by way of Mike Williamson, an assistant superintendent of public instruction. Williamson, Northville Township resident and former Wyandotte superintendent, listened Monday evening to two and one-half hours of testimony in the Oakland Intermediate district auditorium in Waterford.

"I'm disappointed no State Board of Education members are here," said Carolyn Das, a Farmington mother defending special education. Lynette Sisson of Royal Oak and Barbara DeMarco of West Bloomfield agreed. Neither presi-

dent Clark Durant or any of the other six State Board members (there's one vacancy) attended the Oakland hearing, although some had attended others.

Most are happy. If the 29 speakers weren't a cross-section of Oakland opinion, a school official said polling data indicate considerable happiness.

Rick Simonson, assistant superintendent of Oakland Schools and its legislative agent, said 15 percent give public schools an A, 94 percent an A, B or C.

"Parents of students in private and parochial schools are more positive yet because of the technology and facilities available in public schools," Simonson added. As for trends, 24 percent say their public schools are getting better and 10 percent worse.

Added Royal Oak Superintendent Fred Esch: "The quality of instruction is far superior to what I provided when I started in this 37 years ago - and I'm proud to say it." But he added there never has been as much criticism.

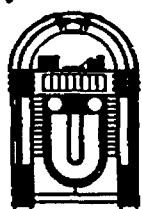

Local man given heavy sentence

A former "No-ville" resident convicted of murder will spend a long time behind bars.

Laquana Jones had a big, bright future in front of her, a future which was blown away by a bullet. Holding the gun was Andrew Blakely, who until his December arrest on homicide charges lived in the Woodland Glen apartments on Eight Mile between Novi and Meadowbrook roads.

Neighborhoods near the Northville/Novi border that are located in Novi but use a Northville address are sometimes said to be located in fictional "No-ville," a

composite of the two communities.

Last week a Washtenaw County Circuit Court Judge found Blakely guilty in connection with the death of Jones, 24, and the wounding of her mother, Beverly on Dec. 26, 1995. Judge Donald Shelton sentenced the 22-year-old to a total of 24-35 years in prison on six separate criminal counts.

Court officials would not specify what the six charges were. Blakely was charged with murder, attempted murder and felony firearms counts.

Washtenaw County prosecutors say Blakely shot Jones, his ex-girlfriend, and her mother because the younger woman would not

agree to leave her Ypsilanti Township home with him. The two had broken up some weeks before, according to reports.

Laquana and Beverly were each shot once with a handgun, the mother allegedly hit while trying to intercede in the incident.

Both victims were taken to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Superior Township, where Laquana, a 1989 graduate of Ypsilanti High School, was pronounced dead an hour and a half after the shooting. Beverly, 43, remained in the hospital for several days.

Suspect could do time for traffic death

More than three weeks after an automobile accident claimed the life of his friend, a 22-year-old Novi man is facing a felony charge in connection with that death.

Jason Walker, a 1992 graduate of Novi High School and former high school basketball star, was arraigned at 47th District Court this month on one count of operating a motor vehicle under the influence of alcohol (OUIL) and causing a death, in connection with the early morning Memorial Day crash that killed David Ward Clemens, 22, of Novi.

According to Farmington Police Department Deputy Director Mike

Wiggins, Walker pled not guilty to the charge, and posted \$1,000 - 10 percent of the \$10,000 bond set by 47th District Court Judge Frederick Harris. His pre-trial exam is set for July 12 at 8:30 a.m.

Wiggins said that if found guilty of the charge, Walker could spend up to 15 years in prison and face fines of up to \$10,000. He has two prior convictions of driving while impaired, according to police.

Walker, Clemens and three friends had spent most of May 26 in Brooklyn, Mich., watching the inaugural U.S. 500 Indy car race, and had stopped for drinks at the Cadillac Cafe, 30555 Grand River Ave., in Farmington Hills. The accident occurred hours later as

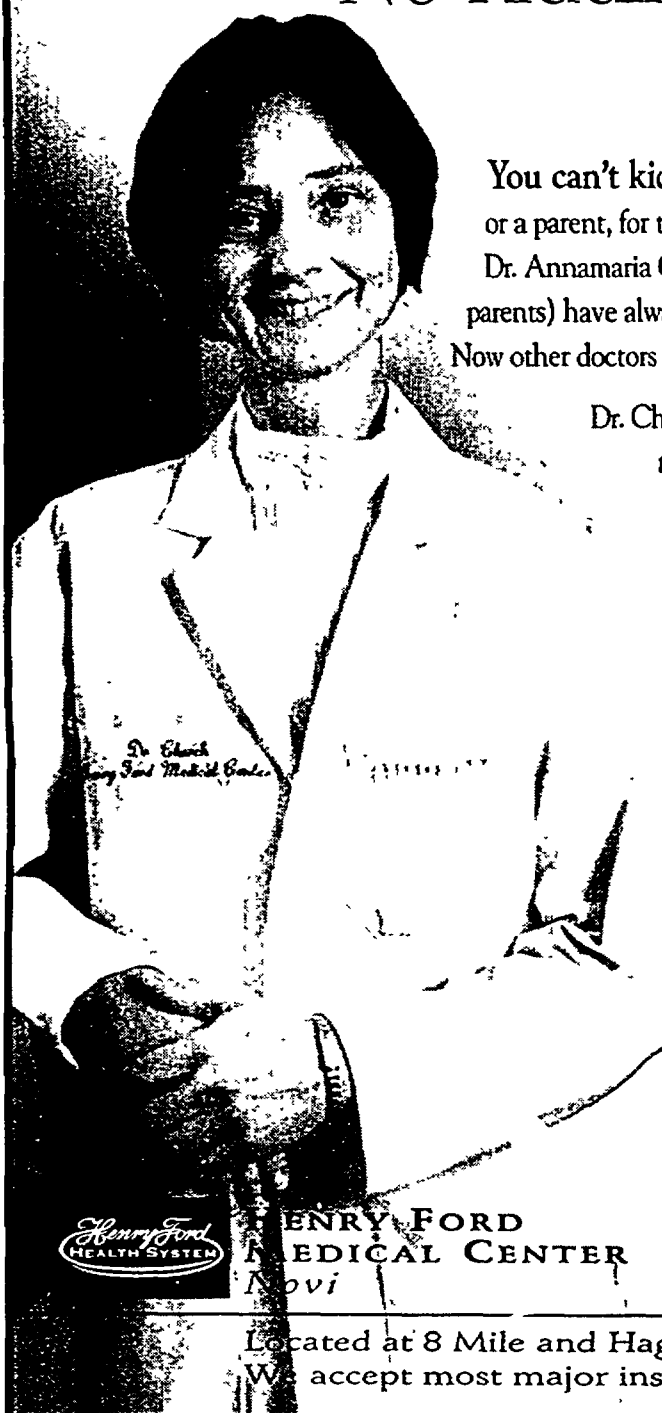
Walker was driving the group back to Novi.

According to Wiggins, at about 2:20 a.m. on May 27, Walker was driving westbound on Freedom Road at speeds in excess of 90 mph, and when the car reached the curved intersection of Freedom and Halstead. At that point, the vehicle crashed into a utility pole, flipped several times, slid on its roof, hit another pole, and then finally came to a stop.

Clemens, who was sitting in the front passenger seat, was pronounced dead at Botsford General Hospital.

Tests showed Walker to have a blood alcohol content of 0.24 percent, twice the state's legal limit.

home type design isn't in the picture, he said.

Simcox is experienced in the field, having created the Home-Stein Residences, a series of seven elderly housing complexes in Wayne and Oakland Counties.

Township planning consultants said the rezoning would be consistent with the uses for land envisioned in the community's master plan. Surrounding the site is a multiple-family residential development including Harbour Village to the west and the Northridge complex to the east.

Several township residents

who live near the site expressed concerns or outright opposition to the rezoning and any elderly housing plan. Among those concerns are the potential problems which can come with locating a "business" such as elderly housing in a residential area, traffic safety for its residents coming and going on busy Seven Mile and the aesthetic appearance of any complex and its effect on the surrounding area.

The rezoning request now moves on to Wayne County. County officials will offer their comments on it, if any, within 30 days and then the board will consider the issue.

Oasis owner turned down on request for rezoning

Rezoning the property to B-3, Ashley said, would allow him legally to do things on his land such as putting up the Oasis golf dome each winter. Right now, he explained, he has to seek special permission two or three times a year from the township board, at a cost of \$1,000 per visit, for such moves because of the OS-1 zoning. Commissioners rejected his request 4-0, expressing concern that zoning the site B-3 opens the

door to some undesirable possibilities were Ashley ever to sell the parcel to someone who wanted to build something different there.

B-3 zoning includes a wide variety of businesses, commissioners said, some of which the township may not want at that spot. The commission did vote to ask the board to consider creating a "commercial recreation" zoning classification, a move they felt would accommodate Ashley's needs while giving the township control over any future use of the site.

County stakes historical claim during auto centennial year

With Detroit being the birthplace of the automobile, who better than Wayne county to give birth to the modern road?

"Most people are not aware that the modern era of road construction began right here in Wayne County," said Wayne County design engineer and history buff Nancy Darga. "In fact, much of the road-related technology we take for granted today was invented by the Wayne County Road Commission."

"So as America celebrates the 100th anniversary of the automobile this month," Darga added, "people should also take note that the roads they drive their cars on have their beginnings right here."

For example:

- The first mile of concrete road, 1909.

When the Wayne County Road Commission paved Woodward Avenue from McNichols to Seven Mile, it was the first time a road was paved with concrete. While not as durable as the bricks that

had been used, concrete was easy to lay and considerably less expensive. Nearly 90 years later, concrete remains the industry standard.

- The first modern road maintenance facility and testing lab, 1910.

The County's Wayne Yard on Michigan Avenue was the first road maintenance facility and included a testing lab for the concrete road building industry it created. The old complex will be demolished this year to make way for a new, \$4 million state-of-the-art engineering facility.

- The first center line painter, 1911.

In its first incarnation, this innovation was little more than a paint brush strapped to an arm on the back of a truck. Later versions were refined, such as one that dribbled paint onto a painting wheel that rolled along, marking the line as the truck slowly moved along.

- The first snow plow, 1912.

Like the centerline painter, this innovation seemed less than impressive at first - a board fastened to the front bumper of a truck. The idea, however, was refined and the world's first snow plow was born.

- The first traffic signal, 1920.

Invented by a Detroit police officer, the traffic signal got its first use in Wayne County. Today, there are more than 1,500 intersections with traffic signals on Wayne County-operated roads alone.

- The first superhighway, 1942.

The Davison is America's first limited access, below-grade superhighway built as part of the war effort. In fact, the freeway even lured German engineers to view the design, which reportedly helped inspire the world-famous Autobahn.

County road employees were not surprised recently when reconstruction began this spring on the aged freeway and the contractor needed to use dynamite to break out areas of the pavement. This is

particularly impressive since the Davison, in all its 52 years, never received a major surface improvement.

Cars and roads in America also share an important link: Henry Ford was one of Wayne County's first road commissioners and is often credited with spearheading the "Good Roads" movement of the early 1900s that led to the creation of Michigan's Road Commissions and provided the catalyst for large-scale road construction.

Perhaps the largest industry spawned by the advent of the automobile, road construction has been a huge employer for the nation. In fact, over the next three years, more than \$1.9 billion will be spent in Southeast Michigan on road construction, most of which is performed by private companies.

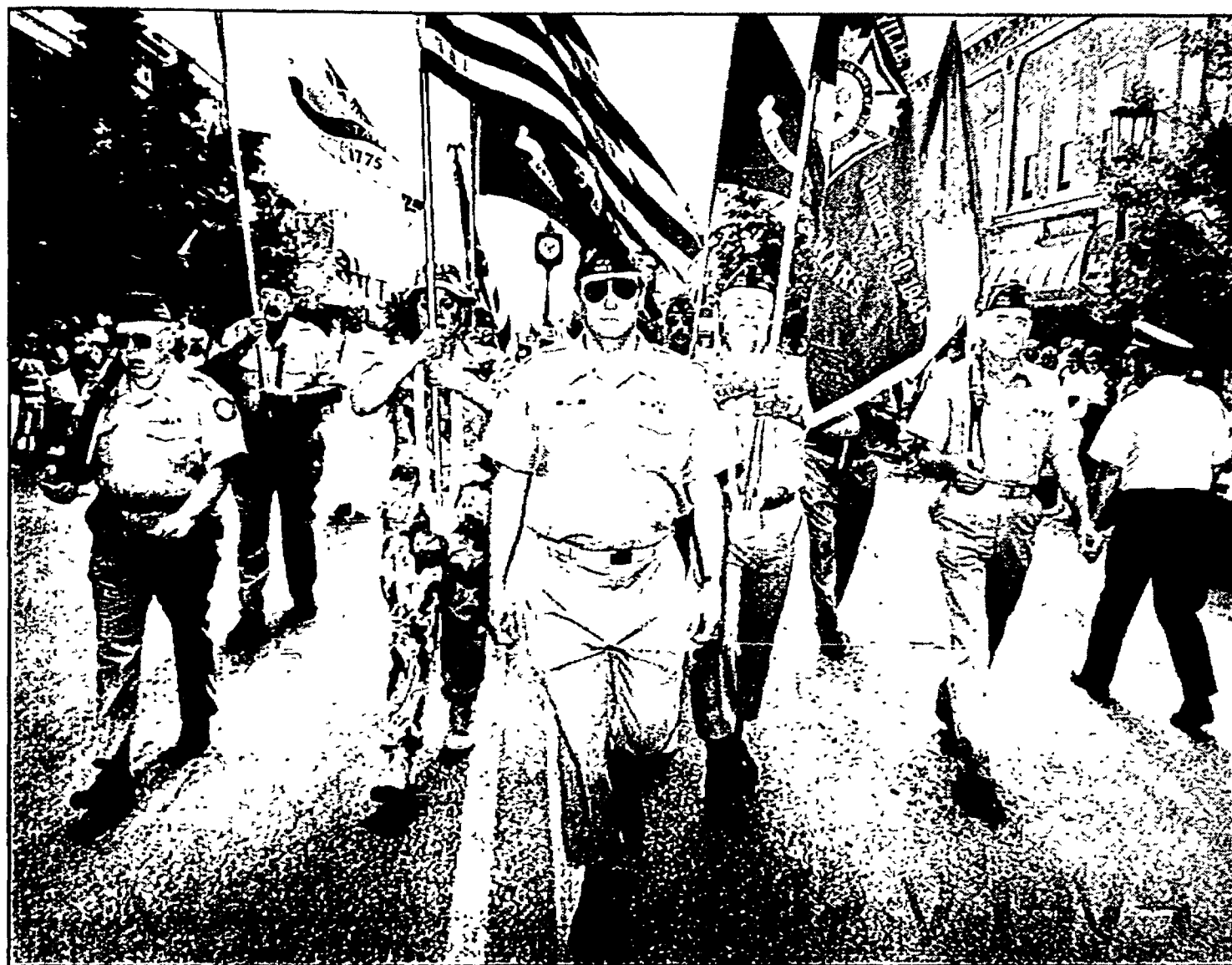

Stars to come out at '96 Fourth of July events

Northville is getting ready to roll out the red carpet for the good ole U.S.A. and honor the world's oldest democracy on its 220th birthday.

And what a day it will be. Following up on many of the traditions it established last year, celebrate Northville, the Independence Day organizing committee, has set a full table of events and activities for Thursday, July 4.

In addition to the parade, the centerpiece of the Fourth of July celebration, the classic auto show will make a return appearance this year, fresh off its successful 1995 debut.

Mill Race will open for a host of children's games and historical reenactments.

Later, during the late afternoon and early evening hours, two free concerts will take place at Beck Road Community Park between Five and Six Mile roads.

The always popular fireworks display will provide a stirring finale to the daylong series of pageantry and play.

The day gets under way prior to the start of the parade with a farm breakfast at the Masonic Temple in Northville. Next up is the parade itself, which will begin at Northville Downs and wind its way through the downtown.

Mill Race Historical Village will open and offer children games, puppet shows and Civil War reenactors.

The classic auto show, featuring vintage autos from all eras, will run from noon to 4 p.m. at the R&D Enterprises building. Two concerts at Beck Road Community Park will prepare the mood for the fireworks display, which will conclude the activities.

Here's more on each of the major events:

• Farm breakfast, Masonic Temple, 106 E. Main.

For just \$3.50 (\$2 for children under 12) you can get a bellyful of tasty grub, including scrambled eggs, pancakes, hash browns, ham, orange juice, and coffee, tea or milk. Come and get it anytime between 6:30 a.m. and parade time, approximately 10 a.m.

• Pre-parade warm up. You didn't think they'd go into a monster event like the famed Northville Fourth of July parade without some lead-in activity did you?

Between 9-9:50 a.m. the Flying Aces Pro Frisbee Team will be back performing their aerial wizardry near the Main Street clock area.

Following the demonstration the National Anthem will ring out from an amplifier and

• Parade

A seemingly endless stream of floats, bands and specialty acts will loop through the city, beginning and ending at Northville Downs.

The parade will last about an hour and will feature a variety of marchers. Pet and bicycle parades will be included, and the best bicycle entry will win a free bike from Meijers.

This year's grand marshal is Allen Terrace resident Bill Klopf, who turned 100 earlier this year. Klopf, who recently received write ups in *The Northville Record* and *The Detroit News*, will ride through the downtown in an antique automobile.

Three Detroit media celebrities will also participate in the parade, including WJR radio personality Jimmy Barrett, Channel 50 news reporter Cynthia Canty, and local meteorologist Jim Madus.

• Mill Race Village

Northville's own historic village will bustle with activity from 11 a.m.-4 p.m. Parade goers will find a Punch and Judy show at noon, a performance by magician Ming the Magnificent at 12:125 p.m., and a ventriloquist's show by John Osborne at 12:45 p.m.

In addition, The 5th Michigan Regiment will perform in concert from 1-3 p.m.

Throughout the day, craft demonstrations will be offered by the Mill Race Basket Guild, the Mill Race Weaver's Guild, and by blacksmiths Owen Createau and Frank Cunningham.

Dulcimer music and children's games (with prizes) will also be featured.

• Classic car show

Builder wins suit against DNR

A state Court of Appeals panel stunned the Department of Natural Resources by ruling it must pay \$5.3 million to an Oakland County builder for "taking" 28 acres of his property by declaring it a protected wetland.

Joseph Kosik, his J.F.K. Co. and his Resorts and Co. wanted to build a restaurant on 55 acres of land zoned commercial on M-59 just west of Pontiac in Waterford Township. DNR refused a permit in 1988. DNR also refused Kosik's later proposal to fill in 3.17 acres and convert 5.36 acres of upland to wetland.

"This is a very important decision," said Kevin Smith, assistant attorney general representing DNR. "There have been other cases where trial courts found there had been a taking, but the others were reversed by the Court of Appeals. This is the first case where the Court of Appeals found there had been a taking."

Smith was unsure whether the state solicitor general would recommend appealing to the state Supreme Court. "If the decision is not reversed, it will have a significant impact for the wetlands program. The DNR will have to consider the impact of all permit denials."

"The crucial issue," said Michigan's second highest court, "is whether there is a taking within the meaning of the Fifth Amendment to require just compensation."

It said there was. "The decision to build a restaurant, or a request to fill in wetlands, do not constitute nuisances that a government may abate," wrote Judge Kathleen Janssen. She was joined by Judges Clifford Taylor and J.P. Noecker in upholding a Court of Claims ruling.

They said "the Legislature's declarations in the Wetlands Protection Act and the Michigan Environmental Protection Act ... do not constitute background principles of nuisance and property law sufficient to prohibit the use of plaintiffs' land without just compensation."

The state court relied heavily on a 1992 decision of the U.S. Supreme court in Lucas v. South Carolina Coastal Council. "While property may be regulated to a certain extent, if the regulation goes too far, it will be recognized as a taking," Janssen wrote.

Court of Claims Judge William E. Collette awarded Kosik and his companies \$3.2 million for the property taken, \$1.6 million in interest and nearly \$460,000 for a temporary taking of part of the

land. Collette in 1991 ruled the DNR wetlands restrictions "rendered the property essentially worthless as commercial real estate, and that plaintiffs were therefore entitled to just compensation." The base award amounted to about \$60,000 an acre.

"The parties do not question that the state has a legitimate interest in preserving and protecting wetlands," said Janssen's opinion. The question was money.

The trial and appellate courts found unconstitutional a section of the statute limiting the landowner's recovery to twice the state equalized value of the property (half the supposed market value).

Janssen's opinion noted "the 28 acres of wetlands is irregularly shaped within the 55-acre parcel. Thus, it is not possible to simply leave the wetlands area undeveloped and build on the remaining 27 acres ... Here the plaintiffs could not develop the remaining 27 acres because of the configuration of the wetlands within the parcel."

She added, "Defendant (DNR) has not shown that the Court of Claims' computation of damages was erroneous or excessive."

The Michigan Association of Home Builders joined the case as an "amicus" on Kosik's side.

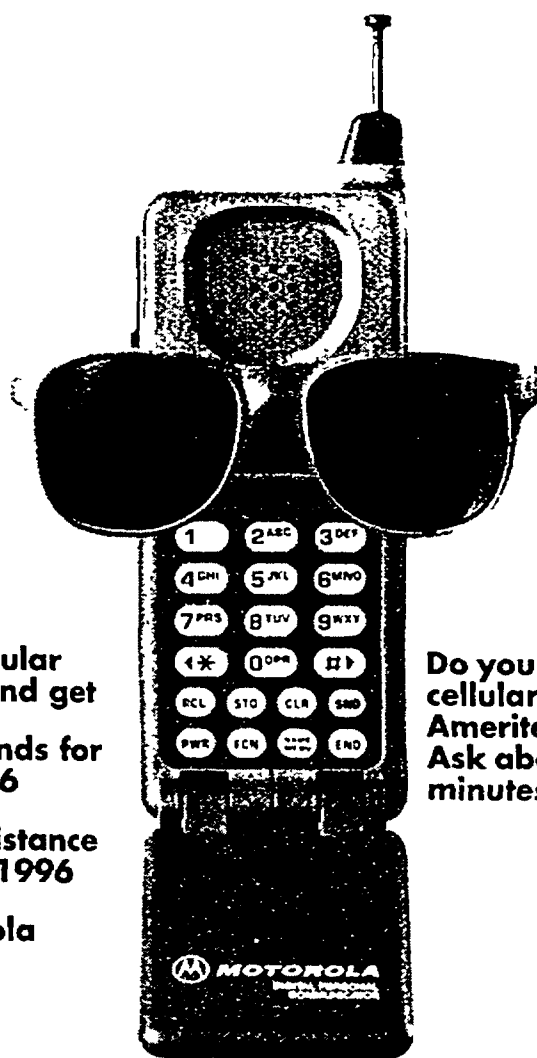

The case is part of a nationwide battle between landowners, who say government is taking their property by regulating its use, and environmentalists, who insist wetlands are essential to the ecosystem. The 1992 Republican national platform came out squarely for the landowners' side.

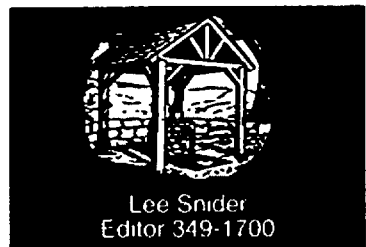

Home environment leads to excellence

There was more good news about the Northville School District's overall academic performance this week.

Figures from the Michigan Department of Education indicate that Northville High School's dropout rate compares very favorably with that of other districts in the area. In fact, for the 1993/94 school year, the latest year for which figures are available, Northville's dropout level was a barely visible 0.17 percent, better than all neighboring districts except (perhaps surprisingly) Redford Union.

The dropout statistics, when viewed along with the district's outstanding Michigan Education Assessment Program scores and the high scholarship dollar amount garnered by the recently graduated Class of '96, justify the district's reputation as one of the finest in the state.

Certainly it would be hard to find fault with a district that continues to perform at such a high level of achievement. Credit can be given to all segments of the district, including school officials, teachers, program design and, of course, the students themselves.

In the last analysis, however, we tend to agree with Northville High School Principal Tom Johnson, who gives the lion's share of the credit to the district's parents. Programs like student

assistance, peer mediation, Students Against Drunk Drivers, and the partnership with Oakland Vocational Technical Institute were all cited in this week's front-page article as being partly responsible for student achievement. But Johnson had it right when he said there is simply nothing to equal the emphasis on education students receive throughout the vital years of their development.

We hear much about how it's important to downplay competition in the school setting to spare the sensitivities of those who might be less motivated or gifted.

We believe that parents are in the right, however, when they hold their children to a higher standard and insist on a proper ordering of priorities in the home. Achievement is important and comparative measures of excellence remain the best predictors of future success.

Replacement brought capability to position

Monday's meeting of the Northville Board of Education was the last for trustee Barb Bennett, who leaves her post after serving roughly a year and a half on the board. Bennett was appointed to fill a vacancy after Pat Custer resigned her seat in the winter of 1995, then she won the right to serve the balance of the unexpired term at the polls last June.

The first school board meeting in July will mark the start of the new fiscal year for the district, and incoming trustee Michael Poterala will be installed for a four-year term at that time. We wish him every success in his new position of responsibility.

Earlier this year, Bennett chose not to seek reelection, offering the understandable reason that she wanted to devote more time to raising her family. The Bennetts have a house full of boys to supervise - four all told, including 5-year-old twins.

In any school district where there is a high level of parental involvement, one would think there would be a lot of opinionated people ready and waiting to second guess the decisions of school board members.

Happily, Bennett said that wasn't the case. There were some who voiced displeasure with the decisions of which she was a part, but most people were respectful and expressed themselves with calm thoughtfulness, she reports.

On the whole, she characterized her experience on the board as a satisfying one.

We like to use opportunities such as these to remind the community

that board of education members are not compensated for the hours they spend on school-related matters and that their posts - though not without their rewards - are basically volunteer positions. When you count up all the time board members spend studying the issues, attending meetings and answering parents' concerns, their commitment as trustees often equates to a non-paid part-time job.

Of course, the upside of a complex task is achievement gratification and that, presumably, is what motivates people to run for elective office.

In any case, Bennett has earned a note of thanks for the time she spent on the board. It's unselfish individuals like her who help create a quality edu-

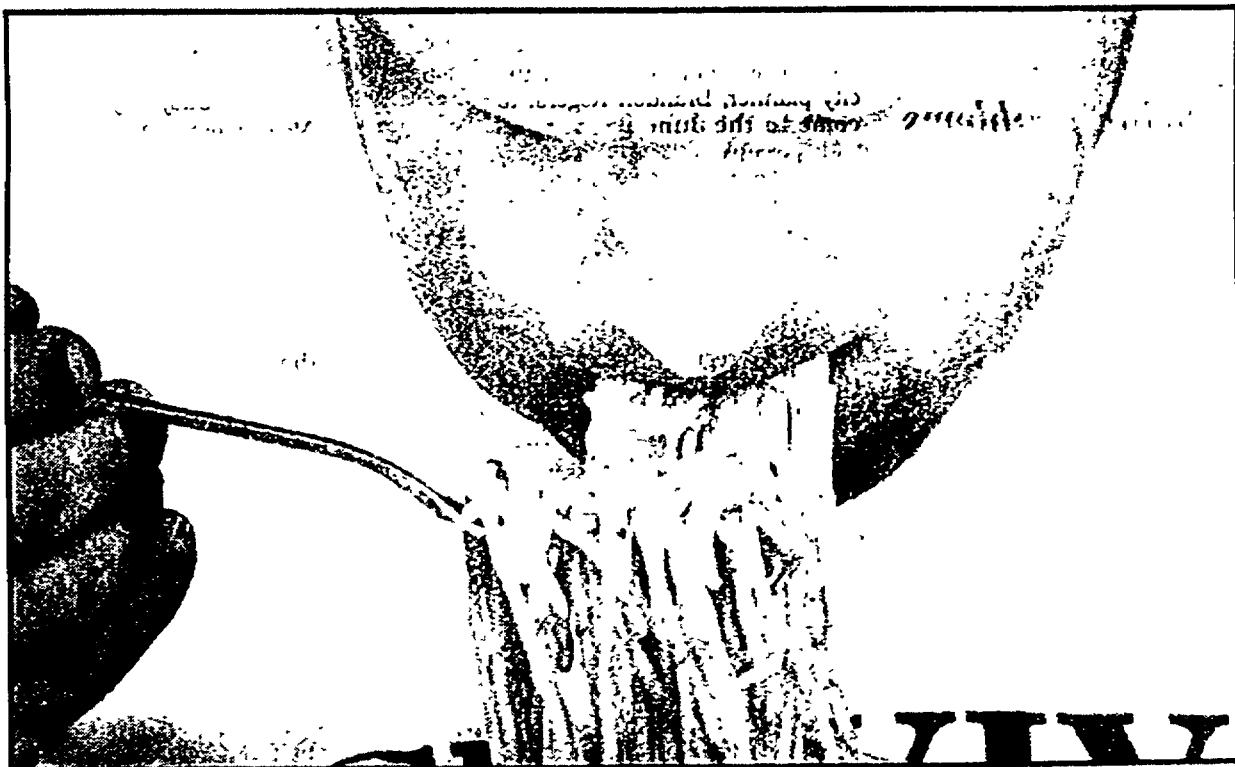

Well, ask yourself this question: How would you like to wake up to coach whistles and starting guns from the swim team competitions that could possibly be held at such a facility? Or how about trying to go to sleep while hockey teams are leaving the ice arena after a late night game? Don't you just love those tall, bright-enough-to-catch-any-thief, lamp posts that will be on into the late night hours, possibly shining in your bedroom window? Not to mention the traffic on Beck Road that is sure to have its affects at any given time of the day.

Are you ready to pay \$900 a year to go swimming or play tennis? This is the present membership fee, according to a *Northville Record* article. Could this be the Mini Grand Plan?

Do you have small children? Who will make sure children stay out of any parking lots? If your property backs up to any such facilities, who will make sure

your personal property will be safe from fun loving intruders getting their kicks?

It may be of benefit for local residents to understand exactly what has transpired since this new Mini Grand Plan has come to light.

On May 15 at a city planning meeting, Matters for Discussion, No. 3, was the "rec" ordinance. Under the direction of the city manager, it was the intent of those commissioners to set a date for a public hearing in order to put in motion, in a possibly irreversible direction, for rezoning this prime jewel known as the last outpost of rural Novi. The commissioners voted instead, by a margin of 7 to 0, to give quality consideration and review to this proposed ordinance by setting aside an entire meeting dedicated to this review. This, as it should be, is putting the horse before the cart.

Somehow another special commission meeting was scheduled for the evening of May 29.

Apparently the city manager, unhappy with the decision of the May 15 meeting, strongly urged commissioners, via inner office memo dated May 28, to "set this matter for public hearing at a Special Meeting of Wednesday, June 26." During the May 29 meeting, heavy discussion regarding the pressure for setting a date for a public hearing resulted in a 6 to 3 vote to continue in-depth study of this new proposed ordinance. Again, as it should be, this is putting the horse in front of the cart.

A note of commendation should be added at this point. As witnesses of that meeting we can tell you it was apparent the commissioners were sincere in their efforts to be as prepared as possible for a public hearing. Since they had not had time to settle, even between themselves, many concerns regarding the ordinance, they felt in the best interest of the residents of Novi that they become as familiar as possible and perhaps change, correct, add or delete to the proposed ordinance. They even asked the city planner, Brandon Rogers, to come to the June 26 meeting with possible alternatives to this ordinance as it has brought up many unresolved questions.

Apparently, with failure to comply with the city manager's directive to set a public hearing date, he went over their heads and included in the agenda for the June 3 regular meeting of the city council, under Matters for Council Action Part II, Item 10, "Approval of Resolution, Re: Direction to the Novi Planning Commission."

A public hearing date was then voted in by city council members, 6 to 0. In other words, if planners wouldn't do it the city council will. One question here, why do we have city planners?

As a result, a joint meeting of city planners and city council will take place on July 10 as a public hearing to get input from the citizens of Novi.

It should be noted, David Freed, city attorney, expressed concern that there may not be enough time to send out all public notices and notification to the newspapers with a July 10 deadline. We ask, why the big rush?

We don't know about you, but could we be smelling a rat? Why is all of this being pushed so hard? Why can't the citizens of Novi have a chance to speak before putting the wheels of government in motion?

Do the citizens of this fine city know that once a public hearing is set, that even after hearing public opinions and even if the planning commissioners don't think it's a good idea, the city council has the power to vote any old way they want?

Could this push be due to the fact that Mr. Meyer is about to get another generous amount of earnest money from the purchasers and could it be that before the purchasers give over that non-refundable earnest money they want a guarantee from the city that there will be no slip-ups and the contingency for placing a commercial venture in a residential district will be no problem for big daddy?

And could it be that by the city setting a public hearing date they have complied with any legal requirements, just in the kick ... nick of time and can pretty well shake on this deal in spite of any recommendations from planning commissioners or concerns from the public? Could it be that they will do what they want to do anyway because this will really make Novi shine?

Let's get a grip, what exactly is the big draw to live in Novi? Is it cultural amenities? Is it the great shopping? Is it the festive downtown atmosphere? No, it's because we are rural and for the most part at any given moment you can be in the hustle and bustle of shopping centers and expressways and within six minutes be in the country or at least the country atmosphere.

That's what's so great about this community. Just ask your neighbor. No bells and whistles, just peace, quiet and safety. Remember we don't have to be West Novifield or Novi Hills in order to be great. Just be who we are, a great city with our own unique personality and gifts. Could it be some people don't like it here?

School district can't be objective

Two months ago, I suggested that the Northville Public Schools (NPS) had abandoned their spring, summer, fall, winter format in publishing the *School News* because it was preparing its big push to sell the community on the \$60 million bond proposal. The law says that the NPS cannot spend public funds to influence the electorate. The NPS may, however, spend public funds to objectively inform the people on issues related to its function as a public body.

citizens in our community, or those on fixed incomes, or the impact on property values.

Instead, remember that the NPS decided two years ago that it wants to expand its facilities. Think about the more than \$50,000 the NPS have spent since then on a consultant hired to "build consensus" among the voters, and think about the thousands the NPS is spending to repeatedly tell you its version of why we need a \$60 million tax increase. Then ask yourself if the NPS is objectively informing you on issues related to its function, or attempting to influence your vote.

We chatted on the House floor during a lull in the school aid debate. Law, R-Plymouth, had just seen his bill to license hospices signed by Gov. John Engler. He is working on pain management bills with Rep. John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Township, in a bipartisan group on the Health Policy Committee.

Clearly, Law was thinking ahead - and he was right.

On June 18, the *New York Times* reported, the New Jersey Legislature passed a law banning health insurers from denying access, or setting higher rates, to individuals who are genetically predisposed to certain diseases.

Eleven states have such laws. New Jersey is considered the most comprehensive, said the *Times*, because it covers both genetic testing and genetic information.

A group called Council for Responsible Genetics was quoted as saying it identified more than 200 cases of insurance and job discrimination around the U.S. based on genetic information.

Here is the worker's problem: If you find at 30 that you carry a gene that programs you to get breast cancer or Alzheimer's or cystic fibrosis in your 40s and you apply for a big job, an employer's health insurance carrier won't want you hired because you will cost them a pile of money. The results: you don't get a job, you are discarded on an economic scrap heap and you buy health insurance from anyone who knows about your genes.

An insurer does well when it can weed out bad risks and cream off good ones.

The New Jersey law considers genetic information private property. Without it, the insurer has to treat everybody pretty much alike, so everybody has a crack at the job.

Genes are the units of heredity. Genetics is the science that showed how Darwin's theory of evolution worked.

Thirty years ago, Dr. Leroy Augustenstien began talking about the impact of genetics on human life and moral laws. He campaigned for the U.S. Senate on the issue of the biological revolution. A biophysicist at Michigan State University, Augustenstien spoke on who

makes decisions, and how, on such questions as:

- Of three possible patients, who should get one open place on a kidney machine?

- If the odds are one in four you and your spouse will have a child so retarded it wouldn't know who or what it is, would you procreate?

- "Would you deliberately choose to have a child with an IQ of 200?"

- "Should the immediately family be the ones to decide whether a person in a terminal illness should or should not be treated even if there is a large inheritance involved?"

Augustenstien won a seat on the State Board of Education in 1966 and was gearing for a bigger job with this pitch: No one in the U.S. Congress was scientifically prepared to deal with these issues or was even raising the moral questions that genetics was raising.

He was 41 when he died in a 1969 plane crash near Charlotte.

Many of his questions still are with us. Sometimes they pop up in the assisted suicide context; other times, in an insurance context, or an abortion context. But in today's moron-level campaigns, we are unlikely to see hear them in a TV debate.

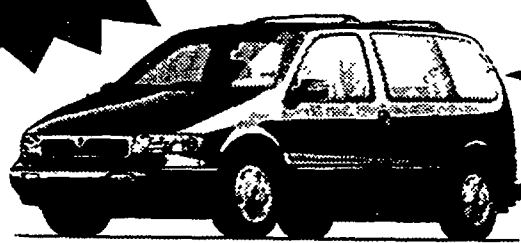

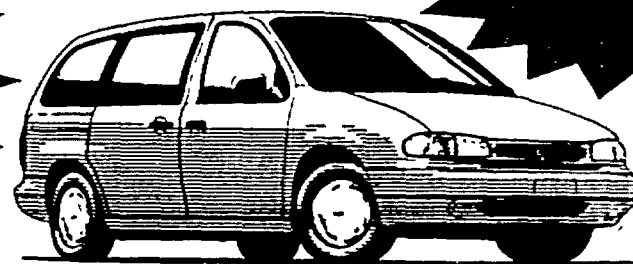

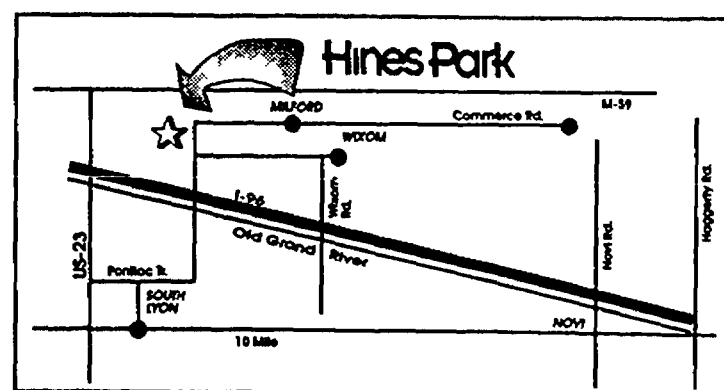

Sixty-five years of celebrating
birthdays sounds like a lot, except
when time flies with your...

It wasn't written in blood. No one spit and shook hands. It was just a vow that a group of school girls made in 1931 to meet once a month.

Sixty five years later, the "school girls" Jennie (Dombeck) Jablonski, Jo (Kluba) Seghi, Irene (Kosnowski) Wygonik, Monica (Stowers) Skubis, Betty (Pepp) LeButt, Florence (Hoeft) Hutton, Helen (Mantush) Golec and Katherine (Kern) Sparks still meet, once a month.

The original members of the group, Wygonik and Hutton began chumming around in kindergarten. Followed by Skubis and LeButt in second grade. Sparks, who just moved to Detroit from Germany and didn't speak a word of English also joined the group in the second grade.

Seghi and Jablonski became members a year or two later.

All except Golec were students at Oliver Wendell Holmes Elementary in Detroit. Golec joined the group when she was in junior high.

"When we were little it was during the depression," Wygonik said. "We went to Halloween parties, and for summer time recreation, we played baseball and soccer in the grade school playground."

Hutton's father had a grocery store on Michigan Avenue and she used to bring in candy.

"Nobody had a penny," Wygonik said. "That was a rough time during the depression."

Of the eight, Hutton lives in Novi. Skubis lives in Northville, and LeButt, Seghi and Golec live in Northville Township.

Sparks lives in Saline, Wygonik lives in Allen Park and Jablonski lives in Dearborn.

"We never thought of it as being unusual, we thought of it as being fun and enjoyable," LeButt said. "We can't imagine that we've been getting together that long."

Having lived within a few blocks of each other, they became playmates starting in kindergarten and grade school.

"We were such close friends in school, when we did things we did them together," Wygonik said.

All graduated from Chadsey High School in 1941, except Jablonski, who graduated from Fordson High School in Dearborn.

The original premise of the group was to celebrate birthdays. Monthly dues went into the cultural fund and for birthday gifts.

"When the fellas were gone (during World War II) that is when we started to get together to celebrate each others' birthdays," LeButt said.

Prior to the war, transportation to Birthday Club meetings was via street car or bus. It wasn't until after the war that each bought

their first cars.

Jablonski and Hutton were hospital aids during the war and were also hostesses for the USO in the recreation hall in Detroit.

Through the years the women have participated in sports together, including bicycling in Rouge Park, canoeing at Belle Isle, golf and tennis, and a boat trip to Cleveland during

the war.

Now the person who has a birthday usually selects the location, unless she wants to switch with someone.

When they were mothers of young children and money was tight, they would have their monthly meeting at each others' homes during the evening.

For a few years, the women, along with their husbands and young children, went to Hutton's cottage once a year.

As their children grew up, each returned to work. Skubis is the only member still employed.

"We are very careful when we talk about husbands or grandchildren," Golec said. "We do have some sensitive members and we are aware of each other's feelings."

Nowadays, the husbands join the women, the men sitting at one table, the women at another.

"The men seemed to fill in with the group

and it is family to them too," Wygonik said.

Those who are in town during the summer will get together. When the weather makes driving hazardous they may change the date. Rarely do they cancel.

After 65 years, there's even more to talk about than in the beginning.

Made up of conservatives and liberals, the group talks about "everything and nothing," Seghi said.

Olson helps in fight for gender equality

"Them with us, not against" is basically what motivates AAUW (American Association of University Women), and Karen Olson is president of the Northville-Novi branch which is composed of 115 women who have a baccalaureate or higher degree.

Working toward a goal of equal recognition and opportunity for women and men, members in the area raise money for the Women's Resource Center at Schoolcraft College and for scholarships which the national organization awards in post-graduate work.

The Resource Center helps displaced women homeowners who "never got on with their higher education," Olson said, and suddenly they were left stranded because of divorce, illness, death. They need suggestions on how to proceed.

Nearer home and younger, Olson said, they provide "a day of fun for the fifth and sixth graders" at Maybury State Park. The girls work on

experiments in natural habitat wildlife. "It's science, an interesting hands-on-things project."

To support these projects, Olson said, they don't sell used-books as many branches of AAUW do. Instead, they sell tickets for a tour of five or six homes in Northville during the Victorian Festival.

Last year - "It was a perfect day," she said - they sold 800 tickets, all for scholarships and whatever expenses they have.

The whole group meets monthly to hear speakers talk on various subjects, and individual members meet monthly in study groups on things like investments, computing, and foreign policy.

"It's a nice way to start in the community," Karen Olson said, because the members are of all ages but they have a common background and a belief in the equality of opportunity with men - them with us not against.

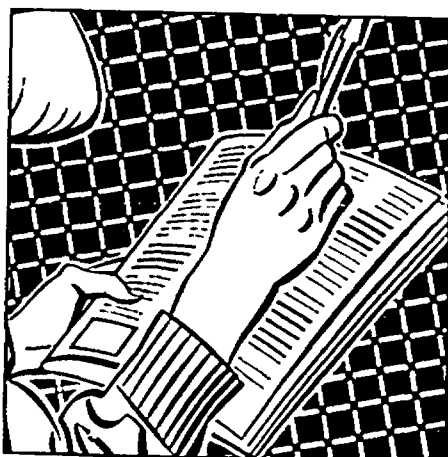

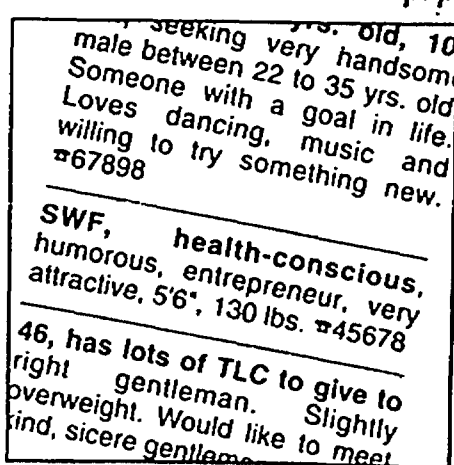

Rotary, Chamber learn about morale

Humor was the topic at a joint meeting of the Northville Rotary Club and the Northville Chamber on June 18 at the First Presbyterian Church of Northville.

The noon meeting was attended by 80 people who came to hear Joyce Weiss, professional speaker, consultant and author of *Full Speed Ahead - Become Driven by Change* talk about employee morale.

"She was very well received," said Laurie Marrs, executive director of the Northville Community Chamber of Commerce. "You can always tell if a speaker was a success because (members of the audience) will come up and talk to the speaker afterward."

Humor is a very important part of morale, according to Weiss, who is called by large and small companies alike.

Some of the main complaints Weiss hears from employees is that they are not appreciated; they have to do more with less; they are told what's wrong, not what's right and they don't know what's going on.

"They may not be part of the decision making process but they still want to be kept abreast of things as they go on," said Weiss, who is also known as a corporate energizer. "When people know what's going on, it stops rumors and rumors decrease morale."

Another thing that decrease morale include negativity.

"I feel that it is everyone's responsibility to stop negativity, not just management," Weiss said.

Negativity is decreased by having meetings and being honest with people.

"Sometimes just starting with one small change helps," Weiss said. "It doesn't have to be a major overhaul."

"Looking at the positive helps bring more joy into life but you still have to be realistic," Weiss said. "There are challenges in all of our lives. The successful person realizes that there are many choices in

life. Humor and positiveness improve morale, but they are skills that sometimes have to be taught.

"The optimists are the real winners," said Weiss, a Michigan native who lives in West Bloomfield.

The Chamber has functions every third Tuesday, either in the morning, evening, or afternoon to accommodate people's schedules.

"The good management know that is real important to take care of their people," Weiss said. "Some companies still don't get it."

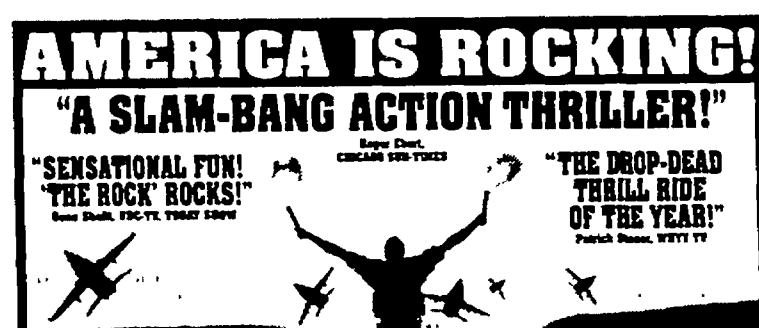

All-Area softball team is made up of fearless leaders

If there's one game besides softball that's perfectly designed for the members of Hometown Newspapers' East All-Area Softball first team it's "follow the leader."

Why?

Because these girls would be the ones doing the leading. No, there aren't any followers in this crop of diamond dandies.

Talent is a prerequisite on most all-area squads and this team is no exception. When it comes to hitting and fielding this group can hold its own with the best in the state. And talk about pitching. The arms were so deep in our area this spring we had to find room for three pitchers on our first team alone.

But what separates this unit from others selected in the past is the character of the players. From athletes like Lakeland's Erin Zwinck and Milford's Anne Madden, who gladly accepted team leadership roles, to players like South Lyon's Megan Wedell and Novi's Melissa Strikulis, who emerged into leaders from their actions on the field. These players just did what they had to do in order to give their clubs a shot at winning.

So follow along with our leaders and take a look at the members of the 1996 first-team all-area softball squad as selected by the sports editors of the *Milford Times*, *Novi News*, *Northville Record* and *South Lyon Herald*.

MINDY DWYER

Lakeland, jr. pitcher

Eagles' coach Kent Griffiths knew his best chance for a return trip to the state finals this spring was with the ball securely placed in Dwyer's hands.

The junior hurler did her best to get her team deep into the playoffs again, continuing as one of the most dominant pitchers in Michigan after a tremendous sophomore season. Dwyer had the same amount of victories as the '95 campaign, posting a record of 25-7 even though LHS was eliminated in the district final game.

She also had 175 strikeouts and the second-best earned run average in the area at 1.03. She was a solid defensive presence on the mound leading the Eagles in assists and she was also a good hitter batting above .300.

Griffiths said his top pitcher, who was an all-KVC and all-state performer this spring, used her head as well as her outstanding arm in action this year.

"She had a little more confidence in her change-up and she was able to control where the ball was going a little bit better," Griffiths said.

ANNE MADDEN

Milford, senior pitcher

When it came to money players no one in the area could ring up the old cash register like Madden this season.

After struggling along with the rest of the Redskins to reach the .500 mark for most of the year, Madden took it to a different level once the postseason bell rang. The experienced pitcher dominated some extremely tough teams in the playoffs leading Milford all the way to the state quarterfinals.

She posted an overall record of 18-10 but she was 5-1 in the playoffs. She struck out 194 hitters and recorded an ERA of 2.98. Madden was a sparkplug on offense as well, batting .290 with 16 RBI, and coach Julie Seets said she knew she could always count on Madden in the clutch.

"Whenever we needed a hit or needed to start the inning off strong she was always good for that," Seets said.

Milford's only first-team all-KVC selection, Madden won all-district and all-regional honors as well as an all-state honorable mention recognition and she was an all-state academic athlete to boot posting a grade point average above the minimum level of 3.5.

FEAR STRIKES OUT

No one could guess that Mindy Dwyer is one of the most feared pitchers in the state of Michigan just by looking at her.

The Lakeland junior hurler, who was selected as Hometown Newspapers' East All-Area Player of the Year, isn't exactly a menacing figure. With a slight build, a sweet smile and quiet voice Dwyer looks like she'd be more likely to help you out rather than strike you out.

But make no mistake about it. Behind that angelic exterior beats the heart of a cold, calculating pitcher who'll rip a batter's heart out once she steps between the lines.

Dwyer has been a picture of consistency for Lakeland over the past two seasons. Last year she produced 25 victories and she helped lead the Eagles to the Class A state final game. This year, Dwyer was asked to do more and she happily obliged.

She typically only pitched one game of a

doubleheader last spring but this season LHS coach Kent Griffiths just gave Dwyer the ball and told her to lead the way. She wound up pitching both games of the team's doubleheaders and she showed no signs of tiring even by the season's end.

"Mindy pretty much carried the load for us this year," Griffiths said. "And she always kept us close. We were in every game defensively."

Dwyer wound up with another magnificent season. She won the same amount of games as last year, going 25-7, despite a relatively early exit in the playoffs by LHS. She also tied 1979 Lakeland graduate Kelly Forbis for all-time wins as an Eagle with 65. Her strikeouts and ERA were not only among the best in the KVC but her numbers compared favorably to the top hurlers in the state.

MEGAN WEDELL South Lyon, sophomore pitcher

South Lyon coach Don Reiff was quick to point out that Wedell was the main reason for his team's dramatic turnaround this season.

The Lions won only one game last spring but they produced 14 victories this year, finishing in a tie for fourth place in the tough KVC. Wedell, a hard worker and a hard thrower, gave the team confidence because the players knew she was a threat to throw a no hitter every time she stepped between the lines. She wound up tossing one "no-no" this year, struck out 143 batters, and finished with a record of 10-11. Only a tough last couple of weeks of the season prevented her from posting a winning record. She also batted .310 in 33 plate appearances.

"She's one of the most composed pitchers I've ever seen," Reiff said. "Whether she was in a tight game or a blowout she would pitch just the same."

ERIN ZWINCK Lakeland, senior infielder

Zwinck completed a marvelous career at Lakeland with another dominant softball season for the Eagles.

The senior third baseman was voted Lakeland's most outstanding athlete this year after standout seasons in basketball, volleyball and softball.

Zwinck ended her fourth season on the LHS varsity team with perhaps her finest effort. She was an all-KVC and all-state selection and she was probably the Eagles best offensive and defensive weapon.

At the plate she was Ms. Everything, leading the team in every major offensive category. She had a .447 batting average, which was seventh on Lakeland's all-time list. She had four home runs and 38 RBI and she found time to lead the squad in stolen bases with 20 on the year.

Her great glove at the hot corner also became a staple in the Lakeland lineup, and she was one of the vocal leaders on a team that was ranked among the top squads

in the state for most of the season. "She's the kind of kid who just works hard all the time," Griffiths said.

Zwinck, who'll attend Bowling Green University in the fall on a scholarship, was one of the top performers in the classroom as well this year. Her 3.97 GPA earned her all-state academic honors and she was the salutatorian of her class.

MICHELLE MENGHINI Northville, junior infielder

Despite batting .370, the junior wasn't completely satisfied with her season. After a fast start, Menghini said she tailed off a bit.

"I did better than previous years," she commented. "I had an alright year. It wasn't as good as I hoped."

Menghini, who was named to the WLAA's All-Western Division squad, led or was near the top in several offensive categories for the Mustangs. Her batting average was second on the team, she was third in RBI and led Northville in runs scored.

Defensively, Menghini excelled at

shortstop. She said she enjoys playing defense as much or more than hitting. Menghini said she and teammate Sarah Johnson, who played second base, liked to turn the double play.

As for next spring, Menghini is hoping to improve a little at the plate.

ERIN TOVEY Northville, junior outfielder

Tovey made significant improvement in her junior year.

She led Northville in batting with a .373 average. Tovey also used her natural speed to steal 11 bases and score 21 runs. She also proved tough to keep off the bases as she drew 20 walks.

An All-Western Division pick by the WLAA, she gave much of the credit to Northville coach Karen Baird.

"Coach Baird has really turned the team around," said Tovey.

The Mustang centerfielder hopes her team will continue to improve next season.

"We really want to win our division," Tovey said.

Mustangs' Frisbie, Sheehan, Moretti make second squad

If experience counts for anything in softball, and it usually does, Hometown Newspapers' East All-Area Softball Second Team has a big leg up on the competition.

Seven of our 10 second teamers were seniors this spring and played major roles in leading their respective teams. Start with Northville.

While the Mustangs didn't win their conference title they did return to respectability after a horrendous 1995 season. Seniors Jenny Sheehan, who caught and batted over .300, and pitcher Andrea Moretti formed a veteran, solid battery for Northville.

Other seniors like South Lyon's Carolyn Kovala and Milford's Barb Chockley delivered key hits and were among the Kensington Valley Conference's top run producers.

Who made Hometown Newspapers' East All-Area Softball Second Team? Let's take a closer look at each 1996 selection as picked by the sports editors of the *Novi News*, *Northville Record*, *Milford Times* and *South Lyon Herald*:

ANDREA MORETTI

Northville, senior pitcher

After pitching well her junior year, Moretti came in as Northville's top hurler in 1996.

On most clubs, she would've pitched full time. But coach Karen Baird decided to break up mound duties in order to prepare for coming seasons.

Moretti did end up pitching most of Northville's "big" games this spring. In limited duty, the senior posted a 5-4 record, averaged six strikeouts per game and posted an earned run average under four.

"She's very competitive," said Baird. "She hated to lose."

The coach said Moretti never "let up" on the mound. "She always gave it her all," Baird said. "She was one of the mentally toughest pitchers I've ever seen."

JENNY SHEEHAN

Northville, senior infielder

A three-year varsity player, Sheehan came along way this spring.

After a slow start, she closed the season by batting .324 and knocking in 12. Baird said Sheehan's real strength was as a receiver, however.

"She showed great leadership behind the plate," she added. "She's a real talker."

Sheehan also wasn't afraid to make the big play. It wasn't uncommon for her to whip a throw down to first base to try and pick off a runner.

"She's one of the most aggressive catchers I've seen," said Baird.

Sheehan made honorable mention All-WLAA this spring.

NANCY SCHULER

Milford, junior infielder

Even though she was only a sophomore, Schuler carried the responsibilities of a veteran catcher for the Redskins this year.

Milford coach Julie Seets had enough confidence in Schuler to allow her to call all the team's games this season and by the end of the year she was also carrying a big load on offense.

Schuler batted .370 this spring and she had 17 RBI

for the district and regional champions. She also struck out only six times all season and only four times in the KVC, where she faced such imposing throwers as Hartland's Erica Strutz and Lakeland's Mindy Dwyer.

At the beginning of the year Schuler batted toward the bottom of the LHS lineup, but by the time the season was done she had moved up to the cleanup spot. "She really turned it on in the playoffs," Seets said.

JODY CAMIS

South Lyon, senior infielder

Camis was like a vacuum on defense for the Lions gathering up balls left and right at first base, and when she was on offense it was like someone turned the machine on reverse as she scattered hits all over the field.

A three-year varsity player for South Lyon, Camis batted over .400 for most of the spring before finishing up with a .351 average. She drove in 20 runs for the team and she also stole 11 bases.

And on defense it was a rarity to see a ball get by Camis.

"She gobbled up everything in the field," SL coach Don Reiff said. "She showed a lot of guts and covered the base very well."

Camis showed her versatility by serving as a back-up pitcher for the Lions as well.

LINDA SALCZYNSKI

Lakeland, junior infielder

Salczynski quickly turned a question mark into an exclamation point at second base for the Eagles this

season.

Lakeland entered the year with almost every position locked up except second base. Salczynski switched from shortstop to second, replacing her sister Lisa who graduated in '95, and she made the change smoothly.

"Linda has great range and a strong arm," LHS coach Kent Griffiths said. "She turned out to be a real strength for us."

Salczynski was also a big plus at the plate batting .405 and driving in 20 runs. She was a second-team all-KVC selection this year and she also took home all-district honors for her play in the postseason.

JENNY FRISBIE

Northville, senior infielder

This senior went from unknown quantity to clean-up hitter this year.

Frisbie led Northville in several offensive categories. But, more importantly, Baird knew she could rely on her clutch hitting.

"She was a good hitter with people on," the coach added. "Her strength was her bat."

Frisbie hit .354 with 16 runs batted in and 23 hits. "She was very consistent," Baird said.

Frisbie was named All-WLAA honorable mention.

Lakeland, junior infielder

The Eagles needed Dominick to come into her own in her third year on the varsity team and she did not disappoint.

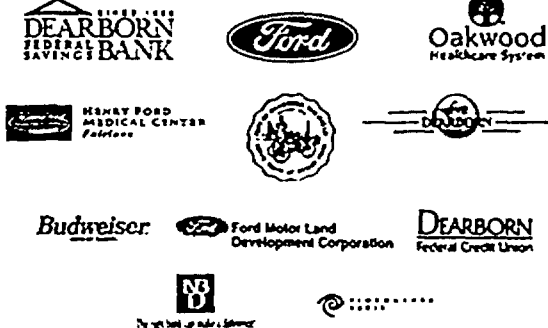

Mammograms help beat breast cancer

It's a medical fact that of all the types of cancer that strike the female body, one of the deadliest is breast cancer. But it's also a fact that if breast cancer is detected early enough, chances are it can be cured.

This is why early detection is so vital and why every woman should examine her breasts on a regular (preferably monthly) basis and why check-ups by a doctor are in order, as well as periodic breast x-rays, or mammograms.

A mammogram is simply a low-dose X-ray of the breast in order to detect any tumors - even before they can be felt by hand.

In most cases, whether detected by self-examination, an examination by a physician or by a mammogram, lumps in the breast are benign or non-cancerous.

However, if there is a possible malignancy or cancer, a biopsy might be carried out. A biopsy is safe and performed with only minimal discomfort. A sample of the questionable tissue is withdrawn in a hollow needle for further examination under a microscope and a diagnosis made.

In the fight against breast cancer, early detection is the key to success. Monthly self-examinations, periodic examinations by your physician and regular mammograms are all called for.



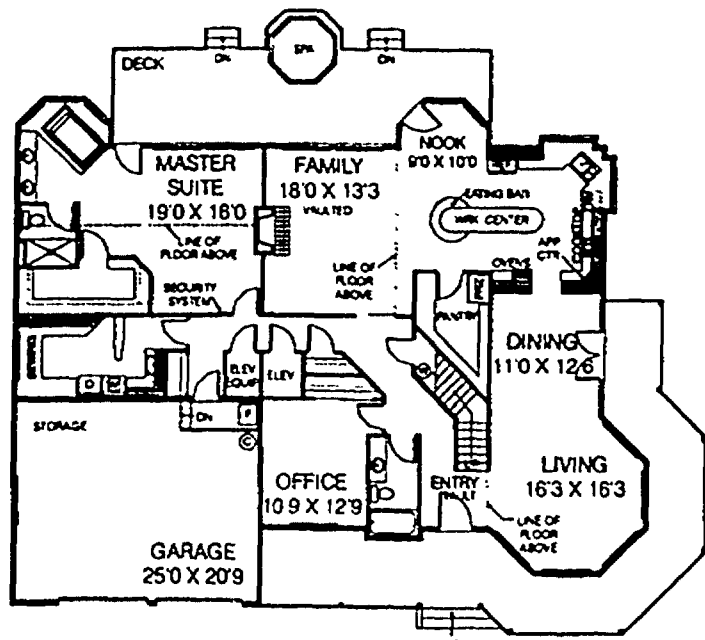

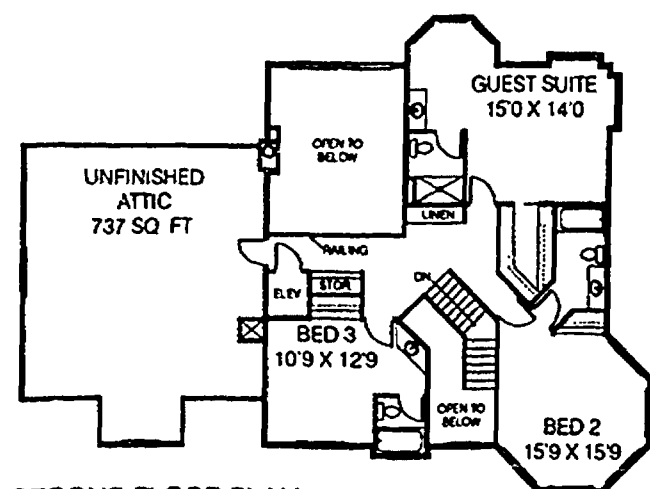

PEAS OF MIND

**Taking notes
and making a
map of your
garden can help
to plan next
year's horn of
plenty**

As you stand in your garden in mid-summer, you're sure you'll remember the name of that outstanding new snap bean variety and where you planted each crop. You'll also remember all the details of your early planting experiments — what you planted when and what worked.

Sure you will — especially if you draw a map of this year's garden and make notes on varieties, planting times, quantities of plants and row footage, insect or disease problems and when they occurred — anything, in short, that you want to remember next year so you can do it again or avoid it.

Mary McLellan, Master Gardener coordinator at Michigan State University, suggests sketching this year's garden layout to greatly simplify crop rotation. Planting related crops in different areas of the garden each year reduces the carryover of diseases and some insect problems from year to year, she explains.

"This gets even easier if you group related crops so you can move the whole cluster as one unit," she notes.

The number of vegetable varieties increases each year. Notes on varieties you tried and liked will guide you through the pages of seed catalogs and flats of transplants at the local garden center. Records of quantities planted and the resulting yield can help you adjust the number of plants or seed packets you buy to get the desired quantities of produce.

Keeping track of when various problems occurred last year — such as tomato hornworms or squash bugs — can remind you to watch for their first appearance this year. Several years of data can be even more valuable — it can enable you to sort out the unusual from the norm.

Every garden is at the mercy of the weather, so notes on weather-related growing conditions can help you determine whether problems with a particular crop or variety were inherent in the crop as the result of unusual conditions.

"Poor performance by salad crops planted in early spring could be due to the varieties — or it could have something to do with 90-degree temperatures in early

May."

she suggests. "Likewise, tomatoes that refuse to ripen could be the result of unusually cool temperatures and cloudy weather in July and August."

When certain crops or varieties perform well in spite of adverse conditions, they rate a special note as varieties worth planting again.

If your records show that weeds overwhelmed your garden in late June, the underlying message may be that your garden was too big to handle with the time and the tools that you had available, she suggests. Chances are you will remember this, but it won't hurt to write in big, bold letters: **USE MULCH.**

Making notes is one thing — finding them when you want them is another issue.

"Some gardeners put this year's records in storage with leftover seeds so that when they go to inventory their seeds to see what they need to order, they have their notes right at hand," McLellan observes. "Others put their notes with their hand tools and gardening gloves. The underlying strategy is to put them somewhere that makes sense now and will seem like the logical place to look for them later. Not only will you have your notes when you need them, but you'll feel so organized!"

Common plant diseases

Weeds, insects and diseases top the gardener's list of problems. What causes plant diseases? Parasitic organisms called pathogens cause diseases. Pathogens include three main groups: bacteria, fungi and viruses.

Fungi is the largest cause of plant diseases. They're responsible for rusts, molds, wilts, cankers, leaf spots and mildews. Since fungi can't produce their own food, they're quite content to sap the nutrients made by green plants. These nasty microscopic fungi are reproduced by minute spores, which drift in the air constantly. Most fungi live on decayed or dead matter, while some owe their existence to living plants.

Bacterial diseases include scabs, blights, soft rot, galls and vascular wilts. They're all killers. Bacteria invades plants through wounds, natural openings caused by weather, careless gardening or insects. Bacteria can survive for years in soil.

Often they stay dormant during winter and emerge in the spring. Blights kill plant tissue.

Viruses are extremely tiny. You can only see them through a microscope.

Viruses are responsible for stunt, leaf spot and ring spot. As a virus multiplies it usually spreads to all parts of the plant. Therefore, once a plant becomes infected, there is no cure, unless it recovers through its own healing process. Most viruses are introduced to plants by insects, mostly leafhoppers and aphids.

Naturally, I understand that it's impossible to keep your garden completely free of insects and disease, but good cultural practices are a must for healthy, vigorous plants.

Helpful hints:

Give your plants a good start. Healthy, happy plants have a better chance of surviving if attacked by diseases or insects.

Choose disease-resistant varieties, check your seed catalogs for these types.

Provide proper spacing and watering. Plants need ample sunlight and proper ventilation.

Provide proper drainage. Stagnant water encourages root rot and weakens plants, which makes them more susceptible to disease.

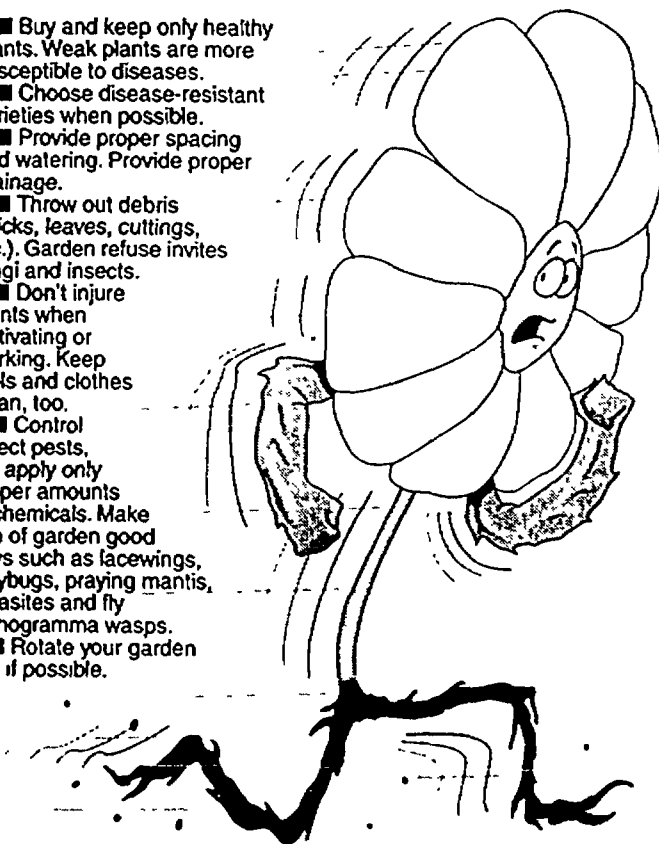

What plants must avoid

Fungi, bacteria and viruses are the culprits that cause all plant illnesses. Here are some simple guidelines to keep all three at bay.

- Buy and keep only healthy plants. Weak plants are more susceptible to diseases.
- Choose disease-resistant varieties when possible.
- Provide proper spacing and watering. Provide proper drainage.
- Throw out debris (sticks, leaves, cuttings, etc.). Garden refuse invites fungi and insects.
- Don't injure plants when cultivating or working. Keep tools and clothes clean, too.
- Control insect pests, but apply only proper amounts of chemicals. Make use of garden good guys such as lacewings, ladybugs, praying mantis, parasites and fly trichogramma wasps.
- Rotate your garden site if possible.



CD-ROM helps aid potential home buyers

The "really new" concept focuses on a basic need of home buyers. In many cases, the neighborhood is just as important as the house when considering a home purchase. And the only way to check out a neighborhood is to drive along its streets.

Now, as a prospective home buyer, you can tour a neighborhood from the comfort of your own living room, or a broker's office. You can inspect every house in the neighborhood from several perspectives, just as you would when driving down the street.

And that neighborhood could be in the town where you currently reside, or across the country. It can all be viewed, in still photos and motion pictures, right there on a computer monitor.

If you want to take a closer look at a home, the operator simply

clicks the mouse with the pointer on the house, and close-up views are shown. And it will show the neighborhood from the vantage point of the prospective house. In some cases, interior views are also available.

The new system, called Geovista (visual geographic information), links location and address information to video movies from eight different views. It's accomplished with the use of state-of-the-art technology, coupling video cameras on a touring "Geovan" vehicle to stored data on computer CD-ROM disks.

"It's the most current, most accurate and most complete information on street geography available anywhere," said Bob Lutnicki, vice president of Geospan Corp., based in Minneapolis.

Using Geovista information, the firm is creating a video log of all urban streets in America. Or that's

its goal. Right now, the system is fully implemented only in Minneapolis-St. Paul. This is the test market for the new product, and so far the results are very positive. Houston and Chicago are the next targeted cities. Taping is now underway in those markets and is due to be completed this fall — all 16,400 miles of neighborhoods in Houston and 16,200 miles in Chicago.

Within the next two years, the firm plans to videotape every street in the largest 25 metro areas in the United States. Then it will start taping smaller cities — 850,000 miles of streets in metro areas with more than 25,000 population.

For example, the Geospan schedule calls for taping 64,400 miles in Los Angeles by the end of next year, and 70,000 miles in New York City metro area by the spring of 1998.

"The Geovista concept is going to significantly alter the pattern by which residential properties are sold," said George Karvel, director of the Minnesota Real Estate Research Center at St. Cloud State University. "I see this as big time. It's the latest development in the continuing technology-driven transformation of the real estate industry."

The concept is, of course, a boon to real estate brokers. With this capability, they have a new service that's genuinely useful to prospective home buyers, and therefore their home selling clients. It gives them a real edge on competition.

"With my laptop computer on my shoulder and Geovista CD-ROMs in my briefcase, I can tour a variety of neighborhoods throughout our metro area from my prospect's home or my office," said Nancy Argo, a broker and relocation specialist in Minneapolis.

"And we can do it in the time it takes for a couple of cups of coffee."

"The system allows us to map routes to schools, nearby shopping malls, dry cleaners and grocery stores. For me, it's 'have computer, will travel' to all areas."

Each user broker pays a one-time licensing fee of \$495, then rents the needed CD-ROM disks for \$25 each per month. Special discount packages are priced separately.

In the Minneapolis area, 93 disks are needed to cover the entire area. Most brokers only rent disks for areas strategic to their personal marketing activities. Each disk contains about 7,000 addresses.

At last report, 350 real estate professionals have signed for the Geovista service.

Processing the data is a highly sophisticated process. Each of the

\$400,000 Geovan vehicles are equipped with eight broadcast-quality video cameras, satellite receivers, a special navigational system and an on-board mapping system.

"While it's collecting information on video tape, it's also dynamically digitizing its location at full scale and in real time," Lutnicki pointed out. "The Geovan can take over 100,000 pictures an hour, and identify the exact global position of each and every picture."

and debris. Garden refuse harbors disease pathogens. It's best to dispose of it by burning.

Be careful not to injure plants when cultivating, since injuries weaken plants. Remember, viruses enter plants through wounds made from careless gardening.

Keep tools and clothes clean. They can harbor disease pathogens.

Control insects that transmit diseases. You can do this with beneficial bugs like praying mantis, ladybugs, lacewings, fly trichogramma wasps and parasites.

Always read chemical labels carefully before applying dusts or sprays to your plants. Remember, less is better than more!

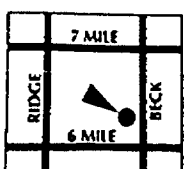

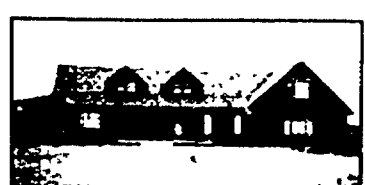

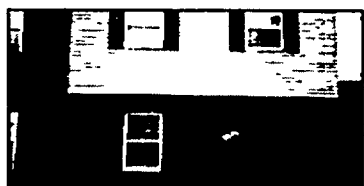

Torquay vase worth hundreds

Q. I have been trying to find out about the vase that is in this photo. It stands 19 inches high and has been in my family for more than 60 years.

On the bottom there is a "T" superimposed over a "C."

Is this one of Torquay Terra-Cotta Co.'s marks? Any information you can give me would be most appreciated.

A. Torquay Terra-Cotta Co., Torquay, England, used several marks, the one you provided being one. The Torquay area was rich in red terra-cotta clay.

Torquay Terra-Cotta Co. was one

of several potteries that flourished in the Devon district in the late 1800s.

Your vase was made around 1900. Its value would probably be \$325 to \$400.

Q. We have an old violin that has been in the family for ages. It is in excellent condition. There is a label that has the words "Antonio Stradivarius Cremonensis Faciebat Anno 1715."

A friend told us it could be valuable and if we sold it, we could probably retire. What do you think?

A. I think you better keep your day job. Authentic original Stradivarius violins made in the 18th century are in the hands of collectors or museums.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s many reproductions were made. They were often designed for music students. Some were sold in the Sears Roebuck & Co. catalog.

As a rule, violins similar to yours are in the \$200 to \$400 range. Those with exceptional sound can go as high as \$1,000.

Q. I have a porcelain humidor. It is decorated with cattails and a swan gliding across a stream. The height is 10 inches. On the bottom is a wreath with the letter

"M" and the words "Hand Painted — Nippon."

How old is it, and what is it worth?

A. This mark was used on porcelain made in Japan from 1891 to 1921. The "M" represents the Morimura Bros., who imported porcelain from Japan to the United States. Nippon is the Japanese word for Japan.

Your humidor would probably be worth \$450 to \$500.

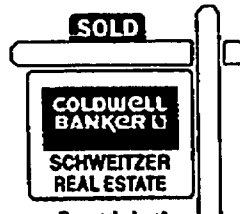

Pro builds upscale, public golf course

PGA Golf Professional Bill Jayne wanted a name that would howl for the attention of area golfers.

As they began construction on the new golf course he manages, workers saw coyotes in the wild. Jayne noticed the potential to be unique to the area: he changed the course name from Windmill Pointe to Coyote Golf Club at Windmill Pointe.

Jayne, who graduated from Lakeland High School and grew up in Union Lake, said that he was surprised that coyotes were still living in the vicinity.

"Lyon Township and this general area is home to coyotes in the woods on and adjacent to this property," he explained. "It was a conversation piece and we thought it would be something that would be memorable. It just sticks in your brain."

Jayne's philosophy about the

golf course is simple - it's a place to have a good time and get away from the pressures of daily life.

"What better environment can you be in?" he asked. "And the lines are shorter than Disneyland."

Jayne said that members of the Osburn Group, which owns the golf course, chose Lyon Township for the site due to Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEM-COG) data which projected it as a high-growth location.

"It's a growth-oriented area for residential and commercial (properties)," he added. "Demographically, this location makes sense."

First, they checked out all the properties in the area that would be good sites for a golf course. The Millford Road site, just south of Grand River Road, was the best location for the set-up they wanted. Jayne's goal for the course is simple.

Researchers predict strong economy

Although job growth in robust Oakland County has slowed considerably since early last year, 23,000 new private-sector jobs will be created this year and another 33,000 will be added next year, University of Michigan researchers predict.

"The slowing during 1995 coincided with a national economy that was already weakening in response to the Federal Reserve's raising of interest rates a year earlier," says economist George A. Fulton of the U-M Institute of Labor and Industrial Relations (ILIR).

"The Oakland County economy will once again regain momentum in 1996 and maintain its prominence throughout 1997."

In their annual forecast of the Oakland County economy, Fulton and ILIR colleagues Donald R. Grimes and Peter Nicolas predict job gains of 3.8 percent in 1996 and 5.1 percent in 1997.

"We project employment to grow at an annual rate of 5.5 percent this spring and expect it to accelerate to 7.5 percent this summer, with the opening of Somerset Collection North and some expansion of auto facilities," Fulton says. "At the end of this year and during 1997, local employment growth is forecast to settle in at a healthy and above-trend rate."

The researchers expect overall employment in Oakland County to reach 670,000 in 1997, with manufacturing jobs increasing from 115,000 in 1995 to 122,000 in 1997 — the highest level ever recorded for this sector.

Auto industry employment is expected to hold steady this year, but should add 2,000 jobs in 1997, thanks to a stronger national economy and anticipated employment gains at Chrysler Corp. headquarters and the General Motors Truck and Bus Technical Center, they say.

"Moderate employment growth should occur in almost all other manufacturing industries, except for food processing, which is expected to continue to decline," Fulton says. "We anticipate, however, that electrical machinery and instruments will have the fastest employment growth in the manufacturing sector."

Overall, the manufacturing job growth rate should expand from 2.1 percent in 1995 to 2.4 percent in 1996 and to 3.4 percent in 1997, according to the forecast.

Non-manufacturing jobs are projected to increase by 20,000 in 1996 and another 29,000 in 1997, with retail trade expected to gain 7,000 jobs over the two years — following five years of virtually no growth, the researchers say.

Business and professional services, they add, should account for the largest non-manufacturing employment gains over the next two years with an increase of 21,000 jobs (a rise of nearly 18 percent).

In all, growth in non-manufacturing jobs this year is expected to remain similar to 1995's rate of 4 percent, but should increase to 5.5 percent in 1997, the forecast shows.

Once again, the researchers predict that private-sector employment in Oakland County will grow

more than twice as fast as that of Michigan as a whole through the end of next year.

"Although Oakland County has only a 17 percent share of private employment in the state, it accounts for nearly 40 percent of private-sector job gains during the next two years," Fulton says. "While job growth is expected to be much more rapid in the non-manufacturing sector than in the manufacturing sector, for both the county and the state, Oakland's much more robust manufacturing sector, compared with the state's, gives it a large advantage."

Since 1990, Oakland County's growth of 13.8 percent in private-sector jobs is the best among major local economies in Michigan, the researchers say. Moreover, employment in the county has grown about twice as fast as the nation during this decade.

In addition, the study shows that Oakland County's 1993 per capita income of \$33,641 is the highest in Michigan and among the top 1 percent in the nation.

Trust is powerful estate tool

Money Management

Living trusts can be powerful estate planning tools. The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants explains that establishing such trusts can help minimize your taxes, ensure that your estate is managed effectively, and distribute your assets according to your wishes. Living trusts also can help you avoid probate — the time-consuming and often costly process of validating a will.

WHAT IS A TRUST?

A trust is a legal entity that is established to hold assets for your benefit, or for the benefit of others determined by you. A trust is managed by one or more trustees who are legally responsible for ensuring that the trust operates according to your wishes.

One significant advantage of trusts is that beneficiaries are able to receive income from the trust, but you maintain control over how funds are distributed. For example, if you gave your 18-year-old son a \$10,000 gift, he could spend the money immediately as he sees fit. However, if you established a trust instead, you could specify in the trust that the funds are to be released to your son over a set

period of years or only for a specific purpose, such as college expenses.

TYPES OF LIVING TRUSTS

A living trust is established between living persons. For instance, between parent and child, as opposed to a trust that is established by your will. Living trusts can be funded with securities, other property, or money available for investment.

There are two types of living trusts: a revocable trust and an irrevocable trust. With a revocable living trust, you retain control of your assets while you're alive. "Revocable" means you can change beneficiaries, modify the terms of the trust, and even terminate or revoke the trust and get back your property. You have the option of naming yourself as a trustee so that you can continue to manage your assets, or appointing someone else as the trust's administrator.

After you die, the property in the

trust is distributed directly to the beneficiaries without going through probate. As a result, estate settlement costs are likely to be reduced and your beneficiaries will have quick access to the trust's funds. Keep in mind, however, that revocable trusts offer no federal estate tax advantage. Because you retain control over the trust, the assets in the trust are included in your estate for federal estate tax purposes and also may be subject to state death taxes.

As the name implies, an irrevocable trust cannot be changed, modified or revoked, regardless of how your personal financial circumstances might change. You also cannot name yourself as trustee. For giving up control, you get a tax benefit: Funds put in this type of trust not only help reduce your current taxable income, but also generally are not subject to estate taxes because the trust owns the assets.

Another type of irrevocable trust — an irrevocable life insurance

trust — often appeals to those who own substantial life insurance policies. The value of certain life insurance policies, which are normally included in your estate for tax purposes, can be excluded by creating this type of trust. However, there is a trade-off. When you transfer your insurance policies to the trust, you give up all ownership rights, the right to assign the policy to anyone, and the right to borrow against the policy's cash value. When you die, the trust is the beneficiary of the policy and the policy's value may be excluded from your estate for tax purposes.

DETERMINING THE NEED

Before spending the time and money — generally, \$1,000 to \$3,000 — to set up a living trust, it's wise to discuss with a CPA how the trust fits into your overall estate and financial plans. You'll want to consider whether or not you can afford to set aside funds in a trust permanently without changing your current lifestyle, and the extent to which you want to provide for your heirs and beneficiaries.

"We want to build a championship golf course with a premier practice facility and offer first class service from our staff," he explained. Since the golf course will take two to three years for the grass surface to mature, Jayne added that if guests are going to return to the course, "it's going to be because of our service. The product is the golf course," he said. "The service is our staff. I told my staff they're not here to work but to make sure our golfers have a good time."

According to Jayne, Coyote Golf Club is part of nationwide trend: a boom in building upscale public golf facilities. Citing National Golf Foundation figures, Jayne said that Michigan is first in the country for new golf course construction. "We're on the edge of growth in this area. Hopefully we're going to provide another

avenue to people to enjoy their day."

Coyote Golf Course is slated to open this month. In addition to a nicely manicured, quality golf course, its amenities consist of a driving range, a putting green, a clubhouse with a kitchen that serves lunch, dinner and drinks, as well as an on-site golf shop.

In addition to Jayne's instruction and expertise, golfers at Coyote Golf Club can draw upon the experience of two other seasoned PGA golf professionals — Jerry Lewandowski and Gary Laurin. In addition to helping other golfers improve their game, the professionals will assist people in the golf shop on a non-commissioned basis to answer any questions about the equipment sold there. "We're providing a pretty well-rounded golfing experience for everybody," Jayne said.

As a PGA professional and man-

ager of the course, it is above all else Jayne's job to ensure that Coyote Golf Club's guests are happy with its services. Since his professional golfing experiences have taken place primarily in this area, he is aware of the competition. He also was not surprised that they already had one dozen golf outings scheduled one month before the course was scheduled to open. Approximately 400 people had signed up for league play by that time as well, he said, and "they have not seen the golf course."

Jayne spent his first four weeks on the job setting up leagues and returning phone calls from the winter months after they set up a phone. "People were beating the door down before we had a chance to hire any staff," he said. His actual promotion of the course began at the Novi Golf Exposition in March.

Up to that time, news about the new golf course was strictly by word-of-mouth. "It's almost like (there is) a golfing underground," Jayne said. "I'm getting calls every day. Someone even called from Toledo for a tee time." Jayne speculated that this may be because many golfers enjoy trying different types of golf courses.

He added that those golfers who choose this course won't be disappointed.

"One of the unique things we've done here is that there is literally six of everything: six ponds, six wetland areas, and six holes carved out of the woods." (And they may even see six coyotes.)
