40,000 witness parade, festival

Russ Weisner was one of a very few people on the streets of downtown Northville in the early daylight hours of July 4.

Weisner, a Livonia resident, sat patiently with lawn chairs and a cooler near Main and Center streets sipping coffee, watching the occasional car drive by. "Got the place virtually all to myself," he said smiling. "It won't stay like this for long though. In a couple hours this place is going to be packed."

Weisner, it turned out, was quite prophetic. Less than two hours later Northville's downtown was indeed packed with an estimated 40,000 people lining Main Street to watch the city's annual Fourth of July Parade.

"Last night I told my wife that I was going to head out early so we could get a good spot to watch the parade," Weisner said. "With the beautiful weather forecasted I figured there would be plenty of people so I got up early, poured myself some coffee in a thermos and hit the road."

"Besides it's great to be able to sit by here by myself, when everything's pretty much quiet," he added.

For Weisner, his wife Marlene, and two sons Chad and Martin, the wait was worthwhile as Northville provided one of the best parades it has hosted in years. With temperatures hovering in the 70 degree range by parade time, parade goers and participants did not have to deal with the sweltering heat that is usual for this time of year.

The parade kicked off the two-day-long Celebrate Northville festivities. More than 1,000 people representing 125

A grand marshal Klope celebrates century of 4ths

A little more than 100 years after the day he was born Bill Klope added another milestone in a century's worth of milestones - he got to ride in a vintage 1911 Model T Ford in his first Northville Fourth of July parade.

Klope, who resides at Allen Terrace, was asked to serve as the parade's grand marshal, and Northville's oldest resident said it was an honor to take part in the event.

The parade's theme this year was 100 years of automobiles

and Klope, who spent 31 years as an autoworker for General Motors, has seen just about every automobile ever produced in this country, and played a part in building quite a few of them.

He was born the youngest of eight children in 1896 on a Morgan County Tenn. farm, the very year Henry Ford introduced the automobile to the world. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War I as a munitions loader aboard the USS Kansas. He's lived through four major wars,

Board adopts new guidelines

New bylaws to conform with state's General Powers Act

There will be little change in how the Northville Public School Board conducts its business despite sweeping changes in the state's General Powers Act, governing the power of school boards.

The Northville Board of Education approved new bylaws Monday, and according to school district Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski, the board will conduct business pretty much the same as it always has.

"There are really no changes in the way the board carries out the business of the school district," he explained. "Under the act, the board could make some drastic changes, but they have decided against that in an effort to keep things simple."

The bylaws govern how the school board undertakes its business at public meetings and in closed sessions, as well as how members are elected and the length of elected terms.

Under the new guidelines recently approved by the state legislature, school boards now have the power to make plenty of policy changes, including compensation

for board service, or even changing the number of board members that could serve. Those types of shifts in power, according to board member Bob McMahon could be dangerous.

"Once again I have to say that not much thought was put into

this legislation," he said. "This is another example of the state legislature reacting and not thinking."

McMahon requested that the board evaluate the new bylaws in January 1997 to ensure they are serving the best needs of the district.

"(The general powers act) is quite a departure from the past. Under this legislation school

Library board set for Orr decision

Tonight marks the end of Pat Orr's decade as director of the Northville District Library, a last page that comes two and a half months after the final chapter began.

Members of the board voted unanimously on April 25 to place Orr, library director since 1986, on "indefinite administrative leave" pending conclusion of employment-ending legal negotiations. Those negotiations recently yielded Orr's resignation, part of a written separation agreement which includes a lump-sum cash payment to her in the \$23,000-\$24,000 range.

The board's July 11 meeting is expected to include a trustee vote giving a final stamp of approval to the deal. The payment includes six months severance pay and benefits and pay for vacation, sick and personal days.

Details on why this has happened have been hard to come by. Both Orr and members of the board refused to comment when she was placed on leave and the separation agreement includes a provision banning her and the trustees from publicly discussing the situation surrounding her resignation. It was a clause both sides held firmly to this week.

Orr would say only that she is

"actively looking for a new position" in her field. Board Chairperson Bill Brown, selected by the other six trustees as their "spokesperson," had little to add.

"This issue has been satisfactorily resolved and we're looking forward to moving ahead," Brown said. "I don't think I should make any further comment."

Who will permanently replace Orr is an open question. The board named librarian Julie Herrin acting director after their April decision. Brown said that the trustees will likely get through the flurry of activity surrounding the Oct. 6 opening of the new library building before deciding what to do next.

Orr's demise began when the board met in April closed, non-public session to discuss her yearly personnel evaluation, placing her on leave shortly after that.

When asked to explain why they had done so, the trustees declined comment, saying instead that their written comments in Orr's 1996 evaluation would explain their position.

A Record review of that evaluation and the five before it, which took place in May, showed that Orr began receiving poor marks as soon as the district library was born.

For decades the library was a joint operation managed and funded

Woodside not in conflict opinion states

Karen Woodside would not face violations of state law and Northville Township's own code of ethics if she's elected supervisor, according to a private attorney retained by the candidate.

Gerald Fisher, a member of the Farmington Hills-based Kohl-Seccrest law firm, recently issued two written legal opinions regarding those allegations made by Bob Grant, who is running against Woodside for the supervisorship in the Aug. 6 Republican primary.

As reported in last week's issue of The Northville Record, Grant claims that Woodside, an assistant Wayne County prosecutor, would face a legal and practical conflict of interest if she became supervi-

sor.

He bases that on state law prohibiting "incompatibility" in public office, and the township's ethics code, which bars any official in taking part in township consideration of any matter with which he or she has a "financial interest." That, according to Grant, blocks Woodside from serving as supervisor, since the township and county will do business over the huge

county-owned land on the south side of town.

Woodside said those assertions have no merit in law and sought Fisher's counsel on the issue. The Record obtained his opinions late for publication in its July 4 issue.

For starters Fisher concludes that Woodside would not face a problem with incompatibility of office if elected.

The lawyer did not speak with

any township or county official before issuing the opinion, basing it instead on "factual statements" given him by Woodside. Those include the following:

"Woodside as a county assistant prosecutor is a legally protected civil servant, so that matters of compensation, promotion, demotion and termination would not be influenced by lawful action (she) may take" as supervisor.

Wayne County has an office of corporate counsel to handle all non-criminal legal business, so Woodside "would have no involvement or responsibility, directly or indirectly, with respect to the County's property."

Given that, the lawyer contin-

Northville police take part in Safe and Sober campaign

Two adjectives best describe the ideal holiday driving conditions: safe and sober.

The Northville Police Department has joined several other law enforcement agencies in a campaign to make sure this summer remains an accident-free season for area motorists.

Called "Safe and Sober," the campaign is now in the second of its three segments. The first wave was centered around Memorial Day, the second is built around the Fourth of July period and the third will take place during Labor Day.

This present phase will continue until Sunday, July 14. According to Northville Police

Officer Bill Edgar, Safe and Sober consists of efforts to heighten public awareness of the dangers of summertime motoring.

"Holidays are heavily trafficked times," Edgar said. "The summer months, with the kids out of school, encourage families to travel."

In addition to increased public awareness efforts, Safe and Sober

consists of stepped up patrols on area streets.

"This is a time when there will be less tolerance of traffic violations, including drinking and driving and falling to use safety belts," Officer Edgar said. "Let's remember to designate a driver when alcohol is involved and especially to buckle up."

Officer Edgar said Northville is generally a safe driving community. A fatality this spring when a woman crashed into a police squad car at Randolph and Eight Mile was the first in many years.

But it's better not to tempt fate.

"Residents of the city of Northville and Northville Township choose to live in a relatively safe and secure community," Officer Edgar said. "Unfortunately, forward-thinking residents equipped with a fair share of common sense are sometimes victimized by those around them who have too often thrown aside their common sense."

Edgar is the head of the Northville Traffic Bureau and a member of the state Safety Belt Coalition. He said he was disap-

pointed recently when the state Legislature agreed to raise the speed limit on certain sections of freeway but refused to give police what's called primary enforcement of safety belt laws.

"We know that seat belt use saves lives," he said.

State policy current allows patrol officers to issue seat belt tickets only when motorists have been pulled over for some other violation. Primary enforcement would enable police to stop motorists specifically for non use of seat belts.

The Northville Public School District Board of Education has a new slate of officers and a new board member to start the 1996-97 school year.

She was unanimously elected to the post during Monday's board meeting, which also saw the election of Joan Wadsworth as vice-president, Jean Hansen as board secretary, and Tom Gudritz as board treasurer.

Livonia man, teens to face misdemeanor drug charges

A Livonia man found with a bankroll big enough to choke a horse is facing misdemeanor drug charges following his encounter with Northville Township police on Friday.

A township officer on patrol near Five Mile and Haggerty a little past six that evening saw a 1984 Pontiac Firebird pull out of the McDonald's parking lot. The car headed east on Five Mile, accelerating rapidly in the center turn lane, the officer reported.

He paced the Firebird and allegedly found it to be hitting speeds of up to 60 miles an hour, 15 miles over the limit. The officer stopped the car and questioned the three males found inside. While doing so, he said, he saw seeds and stems from marijuana plants on the Firebird's gear shift console.

The officer had the three males, all from Livonia aged 20, 17 and 14, get out of the car while he took a look inside. The driver, 20, was found to have \$1,200 cash in his pocket.

During the search of the Firebird the officer allegedly found Zig-Zag cigarette rolling papers in the glovebox and under the driver's seat. He also allegedly discovered a

hexagonal-head screwdriver in the glovebox which matched the screws found on the gear shift console.

After undoing the screws and lifting the console the officer said he found two plastic baggies containing small amounts of marijuana seeds and stems, along with a half-smoked joint.

The driver was issued citations for possession of drug paraphernalia and traffic violations. He faces a hearing on July 26 in 35th District Court.

An E. Northville Place Drive woman called police at about 5:30 p.m. on Friday, saying that her car had just been stolen out of her apartment's parking lot.

The 1992 Toyota Paseo, estimated to be worth \$11,000, was taken sometime between 3:30 and 5:15 p.m. The woman said she noticed it missing as she looked out of her window. Police took a report from her and listed the Paseo as stolen in the area law enforcement computer network.

The woman called back at 8:15 p.m., however, to say that she'd found her car. The Paseo's parking

brake had somehow disengaged and the vehicle had rolled backwards out of its parking space about 200 feet. It ended up between two buildings to the south of the woman's apartment building.

No damage was done to the Paseo or the surrounding property. The vehicle was delisted from the computer.

and a global depression.

He's seen the introduction of electricity, the shift from the horse-drawn carriage to automobiles, the invention of the telegraph, telephone and the radio.

"I've seen quite a bit and have been to a lot of places," he said proudly.

Klope moved to Detroit in 1927, and was hired by General Motors Corp. in 1934. He continued working for the automaker until 1965, serving as a maintenance welder at a Chevrolet Gear and Axle Plant.

He likes to tell people about the time he unknowingly met famous photographer Ansel Adams. "I didn't really know it was him until I saw a photo of him in a book," he said.

He'll also tell you that his first love was always his wife Winnie, who passed away in 1975. His sec-

ond love, one that he has to this day, is the automobile. That love affair began in 1916 when his brother in law let him take his first drive in a Buick through a North Dakota farm field. From the time he gripped the steering wheel Klope knew he was hooked.

In the 80-years that followed, Klope said he and Winnie drove through every state in the continental United States. It wasn't until two years ago, when his eyesight became poor, that he was forced to give up his driver's license and sell his last car - a Chevy Chevette.

Today, Klope boasts 10 grand children and 12 great grandchildren, and the reason for his longevity is really no secret, he concluded: "Work hard. Take pride in what you do. Save your money, don't drink, smoke or acquire bad habits. Eat oatmeal every morning and eggs once a week."

County seeks .25 mill for parks improvements

Hines' site in Northville Township on list

Do Wayne County voters want to pay a tax specifically to improve parks?

That's the question facing voters as a proposal to increase taxes by a quarter mill will be on the primary ballot Aug. 6. The tax increase would run for five years, 1996 through 2001, and is earmarked to improve and operate the county's parks system as well as work with several municipalities on parks projects.

A quarter mill is 25 cents per \$1,000 of taxable valuation. The increase would cost the owner of a \$100,000 house \$12.50 a year.

Wayne County's proposed list of parks projects has a \$26.3 million price tag.

The quarter mill levy is expected to generate \$7.65 million in the first year and more than \$41 million over the life of the millage. Of that total, the money not assigned

to projects will be used for operations and acquisitions, according to Hurley J. Coleman Jr., director of the Wayne County Division of Parks.

Millage language also includes the provision that the county will continue to fund the parks system from the general fund budget at \$2.8 million, which is the amount funded in fiscal year 1996.

The parks department will also use proceeds from the millage to match grants and help extend the value of the millage amount, Coleman said. "I think we've got a pretty good history of utilizing grants in Wayne County," he said.

"I believe Hurley has taken the parks system as far as it can go without a dedicated source of money," Deputy county CEO Michael Duggan said, calling the way parks projects have been funded in Wayne County "by hook

or by crook."

Wayne County Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, who opposes the tax increase, suggested the money for parks improvements should come from the general fund or from the 21st Century Fund, which the county recently set up.

McCotter, who represents Northville Township and Wayne County Northville on the county commission, said he agrees the parks need more funding, he just doesn't support a tax increase.

One of the things businesses look at is what it costs to do business in Wayne County, and increased taxes could discourage them, he said.

The 21st Century Fund, which takes money from the sale of county property and uses it for a development loan fund to distressed areas of the county, could have been used to fund parks

instead, McCotter said.

But Duggan and Coleman insist using that fund wouldn't generate the money to maintain the parks into the future.

McCotter pointed out that Duggan and Coleman are assuming the parks millage will be passed and later will be renewed to ensure the funding.

Duggan said continued funding is important. "The worst thing we could do here is build world-class projects and not have the money to maintain them," Duggan said.

Millage project list embraces director Coleman's vision

Parks Director Hurley J. Coleman Jr. has a dream for Wayne County's parks system.

And the county's project list includes something for just about everyone.

As for the specific parks improvements, Coleman pointed out that adding 1,000 picnic tables in Hines Park may seem like a lot but that 25 years ago there were 3,500 picnic tables in Hines Park and now there are about 750.

He called picnic areas and the new picnic pavilions, "incredibly popular." Ten more new pavilions would be built with the millage.

"We average seven calls a day on the pavilions," he said.

A lot of people don't even know about the Bennett Arboretum in Northville Township, which has about 300 species of trees planted by an early forester in Wayne County, Coleman added. The area can be used for educational purposes too, he said. The Arboretum is located south-

west of Cass Benton on Hines Drive.

Restoring the trails and footbridges in Holiday Forest would make sure people have access, Coleman said. Walking areas are cut off because bridges are out, he said. "The trails have not been maintained or developed in 10 to 15 years," he said.

As for recreation, the new sports facilities, including soccer fields and street hockey rinks, would answer the growing popularity of those sports, Coleman said.

The county also plans to work with Detroit on three projects. It makes sense for the county to get involved with Detroit, Coleman said. The county isn't buying the Chandler, Martner and Fort Wayne sites, but entering into an agreement that allows the county to develop the sites, he said. The county will also be working with the city's Department of Museums and History on the Fort Wayne project.

In Sumpter Township, the \$1 million the county plans to spend at Crosswinds Marsh would create recreational opportu-

nities in the wetland preserve, which was built with Metro Airport funds. The plan would include eight miles of canoe trails, eight miles of walking trails and board walks and 12 miles of equestrian trails.

"It's an unbelievable, breathtaking facility," Coleman said. Crosswinds Marsh is located near the Monroe County border, west of I-275.

"We're the only ones that can bring it to the public," he said.

"The beauty of the whole plan is that it includes supplies and staffing, Coleman

said.

That staffing includes a plan to increase the number of full-time permanent parks employees from 38 to 65-70, Coleman said.

Staffing has been a problem in the parks department, Coleman said. If mowing needs to be done, other parks operations have to be shut down so parks personnel can go out and mow, Coleman said as an example.

Staffing levels remain low, while parks usage has increased, he said. In a rough estimate, about 1.5 million visits were made to county parks facilities in 1995, Coleman said.

On one Saturday in the Park at Hines Park in 1995, it was estimated 10,000 people came to Hines Drive, he said.

The county issues permits for 28 picnic areas from April 1 to Labor Day. By the end of April weekends for the whole season are 90 percent booked, he said.

When talking about running the parks

system, Coleman becomes philosophical. "We're either going to support the needs of the Wayne County Parks system or we're not," he said.

Parks staff members echo that sentiment. "I've been here 20 years. I've seen the parks system decline from what it used to be," Deputy Parks Director Daniel J. Navarre said.

Just cutting the grass does not constitute what needs to be done in the parks, he said.

"The county has a gem here, and it can't afford to let it decline," he said.

It's important for people in urban areas to have green space to renew and refresh themselves, said Kathleen Lewand, executive assistant for parks development.

Parks also offer recreation areas for all age levels, according to Anastasia "Tessie" Pittses, manager of recreation. The demand for programs is so high, without more funding the county won't be able to keep up with demand, she said.

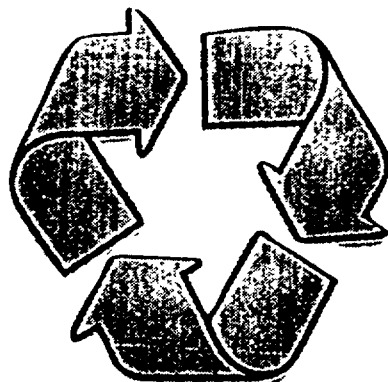
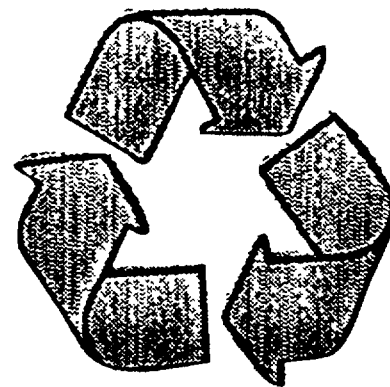

Ravines plan approved by planners

Whether you're hunting for a home in Northville Township or wonder what will become of the old Haller property, you should know that a new subdivision is on its way to Six Mile and Sheldon roads.

The township's board of trustees last week voted unanimously to approve plans for the Ravines of Northville, a 111-lot sub slated for the northeast corner of Six and Sheldon. Owned for many years by the Haller family, part of the property was proposed to become the home of a new Northville library several years ago.

Instead the 84.4 acre parcel will now be developed by West Bloomfield-based Windham Realty following the trustees' green light, which came in under the town-

ship's open space development ordinance and will include stiff restrictions against future building variances.

The open space ordinance is a tradeoff of sorts involving money and quality of life. It's an option that allows the township board to let a developer build a sub with smaller home lots than what a site's conventional zoning allows.

The developer gets more lots and the township, in return, receives a plan with open space set aside for the use and enjoyment of a sub's future residents.

All of the Ravines parcel was zoned R-2, a classification which would allow Windham to construct as many as 106 lots with no requirement of providing open space.

Neither the developer or the

board favored that option.

Instead Windham proposed a 114-lot sub with most lots smaller than minimum R-2 limits and 23 percent of the total site preserved as open space. That included tracts of land that were earmarked to be kept in their pristine state, such as woodlands and wetlands, as well as more open areas for recreational use.

That many lots were a little too much for the board, who called for far less. Eventually the two sides came together on the 111-lot figure, the smallest that Windham said would make the deal economically viable for them.

Part of the agreement, however, takes into consideration a board demand for strict and clear prohibitions preventing future Ravines homeowners from seeking setback variances.

Township ordinances spell out the minimum distance from which a home must be set back from its lot property line.

Some trustees fear that the large number of lots, reducing each one a little bit in size, might lead future residents wanting to build three-car garages or big decks to flood the township's zoning board of appeals with setback variance requests.

To avoid that and the possibility of the Ravines having a "squeezed-in" feel to it if the variances were granted, the board demanded and got provisions inserted in individual lot covenants outlining the no-setback-variance, rule. Homeowners who want to add amenities to their homes will instead have to take them out of the square footage available in their building envelope.

MESC to accept auto job applications

The Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC) has reopened its popular centralized application process for auto jobs.

"For a 15-day period, which began Monday, July 1, MESC will once again make applications available for its Centralized Auto Plant File system," MESC director F. Robert Edwards announced.

The centralized file contains applications from workers who are interested in jobs at Michigan's auto plants. MESC launched its one-stop, centralized application process for the state's auto indus-

try in February but was forced to temporarily halt the application process in early April because of the overwhelming response it drew from jobseekers.

"Applications for our auto plant file will be available through MESC Job Service offices statewide or jobseekers can request an application package by either calling or writing to our Centralized Auto Plant File unit," Edwards said.

The centralized file unit phone number is (313) 876-JOBS (5627) and its mailing address is MESC Centralized Auto Plant Files, 7310

Woodward Ave., Room 427, Detroit, MI 48202.

While applications will only be distributed by MESC through July 15, the agency will accept completed applications anytime during or after the application period.

Edwards noted, however, that jobseekers who have submitted an application to the centralized file since Jan. 1, 1996, do not need to submit a new application now.

"Applications remain active for six months, unless updated, and they can be updated by calling our (313) 876-JOBS phone number

after July 15," he explained.

During its initial application process in March and April, MESC accepted 49,000 job applications. When combined with the applications it already had on file in its local offices, MESC's central file has nearly 183,000 applications on hand.

MESC expects to use its centralized auto file system to funnel job applications to the auto industry as job openings become available.

The agency will reopen the application process for 15 days in November.

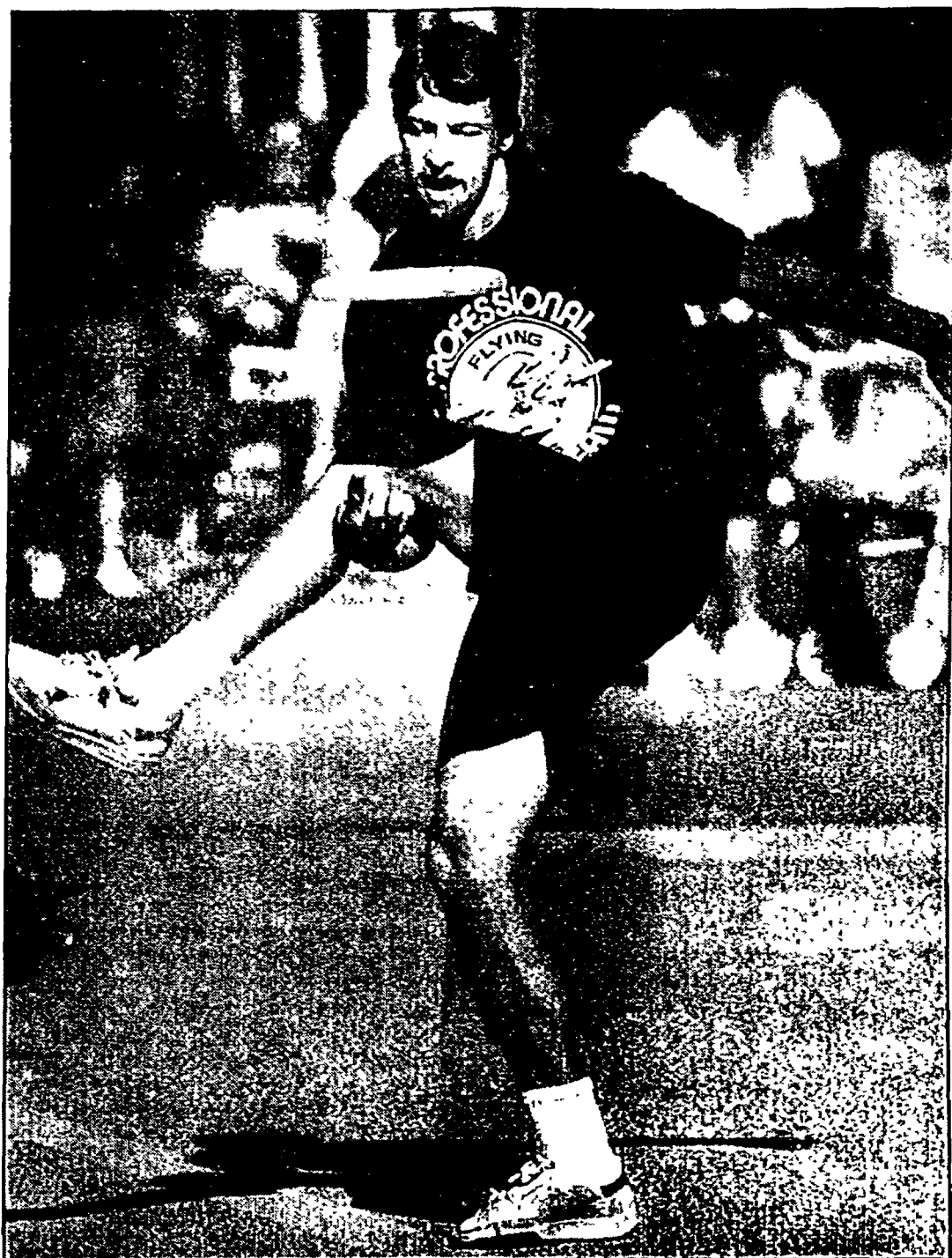

Woodside attorney opinion addresses 'conflict' charges

ued, the duties Woodside would face as assistant prosecutor and supervisor don't conflict.

"That doesn't happen because of the structure of Wayne County government," Fisher said. "There's no cross-over or conflict of duty here. She would not be dealing with herself."

In a second opinion Fisher decided that the township's ethics code prohibits Woodside, chair of the township's planning commission, from taking part in any discussions of the recently-submitted Wayne County land plan.

But would the code bar Supervisor Karen Woodside from doing so as well? "Not necessarily," is Fisher's response.

The difference lies in the fact that township boards can more or less set whatever rules they want for planning commission members but state law limits what they can restrict board members (such as a supervisor) from doing.

State law regarding incompatibility is narrow, Fisher argued, and deals solely with specific cases

where one person cannot fairly fulfill the duties of two public offices. The ethics code, on the other hand, is much more broadly written and prohibits a person from participating in something merely because their employer is involved, whether a conflict of interest actually exists or not, he said.

While that's legal for commission members it's not for board members, Fisher said. According to the Michigan Charter Townships Act a board member, including the supervisor, can only abstain from participation in any issue when the entire board agrees.

The ethics code cannot override that, Fisher said, adding that the code itself specifically states that its rules don't apply when township officials would have to violate state laws in order to abide by them.

In this specific case the code could not prohibit Woodside as supervisor from participating in consideration of the county land plan unless the board unanimously agreed to let her abstain.

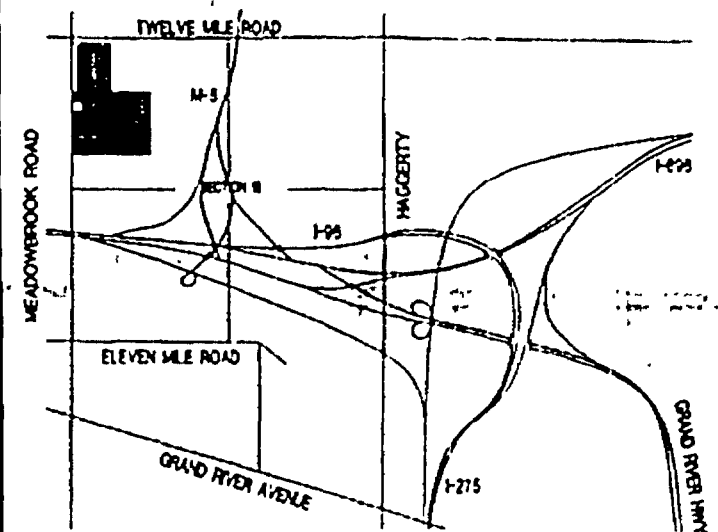

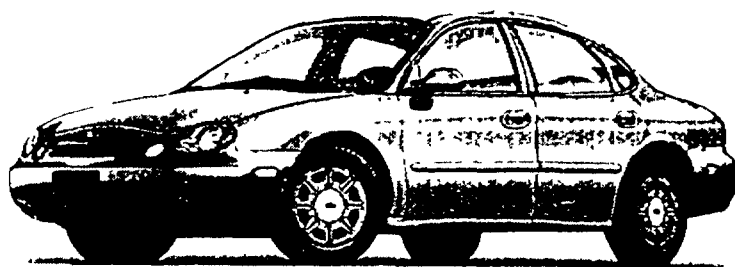

Engler signs 'massive' Friend of Court legislation

A massive package of bills to reform Friend of the Court operations means more than exposing deadbeat dads. It's also part of welfare reform, said Gov. John Engler as he signed three more bills pushed by Sen. Robert Geake. "No one's done more than Bob," Engler said of the Republican senator from Northville. "He has been tireless in going around the state" in 10 public hearings totaling more than 50 hours. "There was merciless beating and upbraiding of the Friend of the court," said Geake. "In spite of that, we've had very gracious cooperation from FOC associations."

Engler, in a signing ceremony July 2, said assuring that custodial parents get child support will "keep people from falling into poverty and see that children are well-served. For many, the failure to receive child support is a floor they fall through into poverty and welfare."

As cameras rolled, Engler point-

ed to a chart listing two fathers and a mother from Kent, Ingham and Tuscola counties who had skipped the state owing \$42,000, \$29,000 and \$21,000 respectively in child support.

Each month state agencies will release lists of "10 most wanted" parents based on how far they are behind in support payments.

"We're going after those people who conceal their income by taking payment under the table," said Geake. "We want the court to enforce its own orders."

The new laws will:

- Direct Friend of the Court offices to be open 20 hours a week during "non-traditional" times. FOC offices must disburse payments within 14 days of receiving them. FOC also will be required to report much data, such as tax intercepts and support modifications, to the State Court Administrator's office.
- Create a FOC advisory committee in each county's board of commissioners. The FOC director will

continue to be an appointee of the chief circuit judge, but aggrieved persons will have a public sounding board. The bill was an alternative to Geake's original plan to take FOC entirely away from courts and place them under general county government.

- Allow a judge to change, retroactively, the amount of support payments from parents who hide income.

Earlier bills allow the lifting of state driver's and occupational licenses of deadbeat parents; punish those who make false reports of child abuse; mandate the reporting of deadbeat parents to credit agencies; and establish a

"parentage registry" in the Family Independence Agency to help enforce child support obligations.

The bills also dovetail with efforts by Rep. Jessie Dalman, R-Holland, to change Michigan's no-fault divorce law.

Dalman said her bills would require a "parenting plan" in each divorce so there will be "more mediation, less arbitrary decisions. Divorce will continue. We just want people to understand their responsibilities."



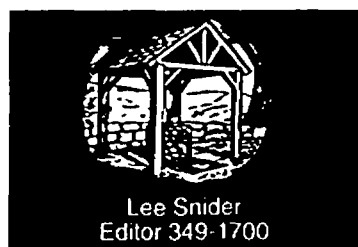

Second Downs study is more than enough

It's always a good idea to have a back up plan at hand just in case your first plan falls through.

That was the stated philosophy of the Northville City Council in accepting a second land use plan for Northville Downs a few weeks ago.

The plan, drafted by city planner Don Wortman and approved by the city Planning Commission, indicates alternative uses for the Downs property should the track discontinue racing at the Center Street/Seven Mile location.

For the past two years Northville city officials have been salivating at the thoughts of condominiums, commercial office space and single family homes occupying the 50 acres of property. There is wisdom, of course, in planning for a rainy day but it is difficult to avoid the conclusion that someone in Northville officialdom would be less than disappointed if the track saddled up and rode out of town.

Unfortunately, in their haste to create a plan for Downs redevelopment city planners forgot one important issue - Northville Downs is not up for sale, and it won't be going anywhere for quite some time.

There are no plans at this time to use the property for anything other than a race track, according to David Karoub of the Northville Driving Club, who called the plan a bit premature. "If the track were to leave, the owners of the property would want more input into any plan that would be devised for the property," he said.

There's more than mere grumbling going on here. More than two years ago the city commissioned planning consultant, Don Wortman, to complete the initial Downs land use study proposing possible alternative uses of the 50-acre track site. As councilman Chuck Keys, a vocal supporter of the track, has rightly pointed out, it's more than a little presumptuous to talk about building houses and offices on property owned by a business that is still "doing business" and has been a "good neighbor" to Northville for more than 50

years.

Keys also believes Wortman's study suggests a lack of appreciation of the Downs revenue picture by underestimating the amount of money the city gets in track-generated dollars each year.

The track pays property and personal taxes to the city, and under the new state horse racing law, directly returns hundreds of thousands of dollars to the city in "breakage" payments. Yet the most recent report, just like the first study, only factors in the real estate taxes, resulting in a distorted assessment of the race track's real monetary value.

According to Wortman the study is not intended to dictate land use or suggest a possible demise of the racetrack. Rather, the study is intended to offer alternative land uses in the event that another use for this property is necessary. If that were indeed the case, why would Wortman, along with several city officials, want the study adopted into the city's master plan in the first place?

At a time when city officials have expressed desire to revitalize the economics of downtown, we find it curious that they would not even consider the possible role Northville Downs could play in attracting more visitors to our city. There is no mention in the study as to how the city and racetrack could form a strong partnership to the benefit of all concerned.

There has also been no discussion from the city's Downtown Development Authority - which will spend \$25,000 on a downtown planning consultant - as to how Northville could maximize the racetrack's potential as a draw to the downtown area.

We maintain that it is time for city officials to accept the fact that Northville Downs will be racing horses well into the next decade. Instead of planning for the track's demise we would suggest that city officials find ways to capitalize on this business asset to bring economic vitality to downtown Northville.

Neighbor on right side of law

It's no secret that organized crime is heavily involved in the waste hauling and disposal industry. More than

one journalist has sharpened his or her investigative teeth on the mob's influence in the trash removal business. (The potential for alliterative headlines is nearly unlimited: Sultans of Sludge, Godfathers of Garbage, Renegades of Refuse, etc.)

So it should come as no surprise to anyone that the Houston-based Browning-Ferris Industries is in it up to their proverbial necks. That's right, the folks who run a state-of-the-art resource recovery facility over at Six and Napier and whose name is connected with so many local charitable projects are deep in the muck and mire of cartel-related activity.

Fortunately, they're on the right side. I don't know if you saw it but an NBC "Dateline" broadcast of a few weeks ago detailed how BFI is working with the feds to clean up the waste carting industry in New York City. The haulers in the Big Apple are notorious in their use of intimidation, price-fixing and racketeering tactics, and have openly violated federal anti-trust laws for decades.

In 1992, BFI attempted to interject a little competition into the market but ended up dealing with people who don't like to play by the rules. Many BFI trucks were damaged or destroyed and one employee awoke one morning to find the severed head of a German shepherd on his front lawn.

"Welcome to New York," read an attached note. BFI then began cooperating with the Manhattan dis-

trict attorney and helped the feds secure indictments against 17 trash kingpins. More could follow.

The story of BFI's risky venture into the New York waste market was described in an article in *Fortune* magazine ("Talk About Tough Competition," Jan. 15, 1996).

I have to admit for a while there I had my suspicions about our Salem Township neighbor. A June 1990 story in the Ralph Nader publication *Multinational Monitor* proclaimed that BFI was "one of America's most notorious polluters." While acknowledging the outstanding credentials of BFI CEO William Ruckelshaus (who distinguished himself by refusing to participate in Watergate's infamous Saturday Night Massacre), the magazine questioned the company's anti-trust performance and environmental record.

Then when a local BFI official went before the Northville Township Board of Trustees in 1993 and offered money if township police would ignore the weight limit violations of BFI's trucks, I really became uneasy. To me, that smacked of the arrogance of someone who is used to operating outside the law.

I called BFI's corporate office in Houston recently to discuss all of this and I ended up, talking to spokesman Peter Block. Block explained that, while the offer to the township might have been dumb (his word), it wasn't criminal. After all, it took place in an open public meeting, hardly the kind of place one goes to conclude an illicit deal.

In any event, I felt a sense of relief after seeing the "Dateline" program, knowing that a company that takes such an active part in the community is one of the good guys.

We've got enough to worry about already without adding the Godfathers of Garbage to the problem list. Lee Snider is the editor of *The Northville Record*.

Ah, yes: I DON'T CARE!! Like and dislike by definition do not enter into the equation of responsibility. When you are entrusted with the people's affairs, keeping them fully and fairly informed just goes with the territory. If you've got a problem with that then go learn to play the guitar.

Increased issues of the Northville School News, like parent and senior citizen visitation days scheduled in individual schools, reflect district goals to be open to the community and improve awareness and understanding of school issues and progress.

Healthcare, a cow and a moon?

Does one wonder why health costs are emulating, to use a metaphor, the cow that jumped over the moon?

The \$9 billion merger between U.S. Healthcare and Aetna Life and Casualty Co., as reported in the June 15 issue of the New York Times, will provide Healthcare's chairman, Leonard Abramson, with \$967 million in cash, plus a \$25 million corporate jet.

U.S. Healthcare's co-presidents are to be paid millions of dollars in bonuses just to stay on after the \$9 billion merger, according to the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Though Mr. Abramson will no longer be a full-time executive as consultant to Aetna, he will be paid \$10 million under a five-year agreement.

To John Aetna, co-president and principal medical administration J.T. Sebastianelli will get about an extra \$5.56 million in cash and restricted stock.

Michael Cardillo, co-president and principal marketing officer, will receive \$6.06 million in cash and restricted stock to join Aetna.

Now let me see. Presently, Congress is agonizing over whether or not the minimum wage should be raised from \$4.25 to \$5.15 an hour. How about it, wouldn't we be justified in characterizing those who

now receive \$4.25 an hour as being ingrates imbued with an unhealthy sense of greed? Hmmm!

(Webster's 9th New Collegiate Dictionary).

The document was written after months and months of research and hours and hours of committee and public input. It is a document Northville Township can point to with pride and other communities will emulate. It wasn't written lightly and should not be taken lightly.

I am concerned re: "revising" the Code, as suggested by a candidate for office, if it presents a problem for only one person in or running for office. How a marijuana habit forced Bob Payne onto the street.



He remembers like it was yesterday. His daughter, Lindsay, had supposedly stopped smoking marijuana since

attending a self-help group during the past month. But on this night she seemed a little too eager to go to one of the meetings. So he decided to drive up there. Just to check.

Her car was nowhere to be found. So he drove by one of her friend's. And her car was parked out front.

"We refer to that day as Dark Thursday," says Bob. Because that's when Lindsay finally understood her marijuana problem was out of control.

Lindsay first smoked marijuana in 10th grade. She tried it to find out what it was like. And she found out she liked it a lot.

"I'd get high almost every day," she says. "In the morning. Skip classes to get high. After school, get high. I was in a different world."

And it was easy to get away with. Teachers didn't suspect it. Neither did her parents.

"I had no clue," says Bob. "Sure, I saw a change in Lindsay. She was always involved in sports, but lost interest. She dropped out of choir. But she always

"She'd been on the honor role," says Sue. "But then her grades started to slide. She started skipping classes. The spark was gone."

had a reason. So I just chalked it up to sophomore blues or whatever you want to call it. It went right over the top of my head."

Eventually, marijuana led to other drugs. Acid. Mushrooms. She was smoking "bud" every day, and tripping every weekend. Finally, she hit a wall.

"I treated my parents like crap. I had an attitude toward them. I lied to them. One day I said, I can't do this to them anymore."

So, with the help of a former drug addict who had spoken at her school, Lindsay resolved to end her problem. One of the first steps was telling

her parents. They were not prepared.

"Needless to say, I was a little bit devastated," says Lindsay's mom, Sue.

"I was very surprised. I really feel we were not parents with our heads in the sand. I just feel we were parents that didn't know how to detect it."

After enrolling Lindsay in two different substance abuse programs, the Paynes' life has been challenging. But ever since that Dark Thursday, it's also been hopeful.

"I owe a lot to Bob's suspicious nature," says Sue. "Because if she had not been caught that night, according to her own admission, it might have been starting again."

"For 30 days after that, she was not allowed to hang out with anybody," adds Bob. "It was just school and home, school and

"One time I found a pipe, but of course she said it was not hers," says Sue. "I believed her."

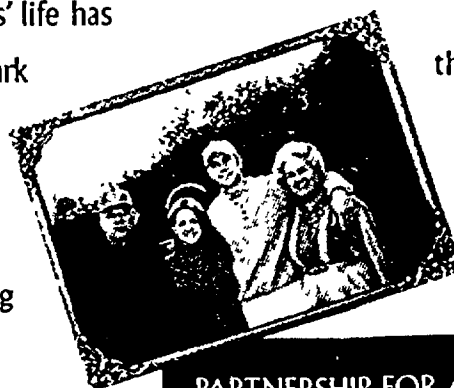
home. And she resigned herself to that fact. That 30 days really helped the communication between us. We started to see the old Lindsay coming back."

Today, Lindsay's clean. She has a new set of friends. She's trying out for the softball team. And, as she puts it, the "sparkle" is back in her eye. But, as the entire Payne family will attest, she'll be challenged the rest of her life.

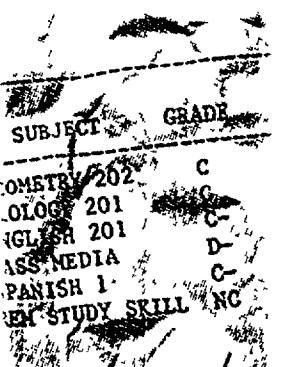
According to a 1995 University of Michigan study, 15 percent of all 8th graders and over 28 percent of all 10th graders have tried marijuana within the last year.

"This sobriety period you have to take a day at a time, a day at a time," says Sue. "To get your self-esteem, to get your confidence back, takes a long time. My future for her right now is that she becomes a very strong gal. We're not out of the woods yet. But we are moving forward."

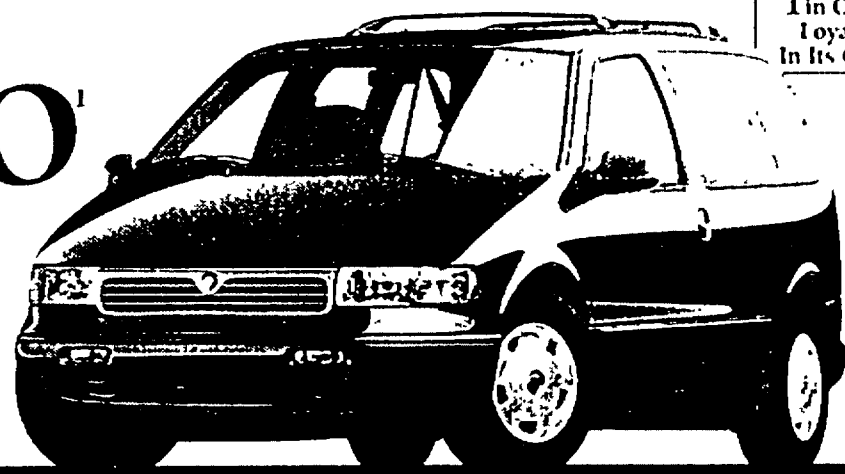

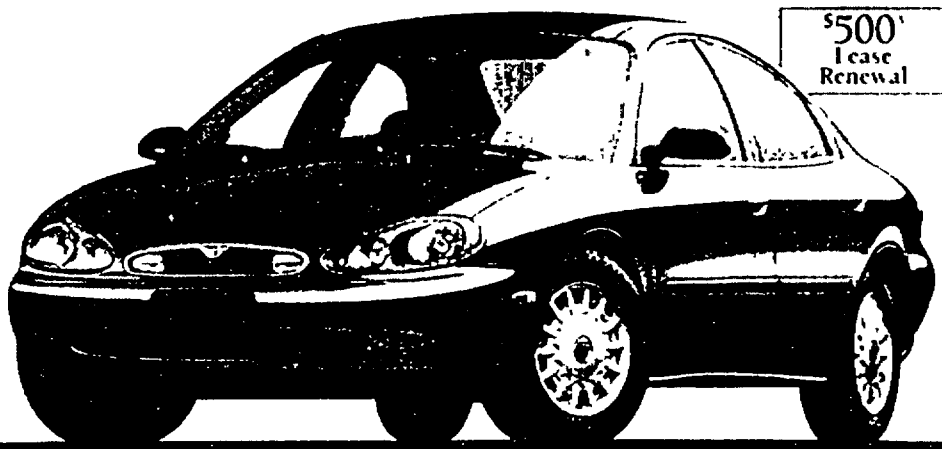

STRIKING UP THE (ILIOTIBIAL) BAND

Runners who feel a dull ache on the outside of their knees may be suffering from iliotibial band syndrome. In severe cases, the iliotibial band, the ligament that runs along the outside of the thigh, may become inflamed and painful. These symptoms are the result of an inward-bending knee (due to over-pronation or other conditions) that causes the iliotibial band to stretch against the femur. As a preventive measure, you may help to use a stretching exercise. Begin by standing with the left leg crossed in front of the right and lean with the left arm extended against a wall. Exert your weight against the wall and push your right hip in the opposite direction. Then, while keeping your right foot anchored and allowing your left knee to flex, stretch the iliotibial muscle in your right hip.

Stretching has many benefits. These include enhancing one's physical fitness, reducing risk of injury, reducing muscular soreness, and increasing physical and mental relaxation. Jessica Black: Preserving the Potawatomi's past

Jessica Black was put in touch with Julie Fountain at the Northville Historical Society when she was ready to start her Gold Award project.

Fountain told Jessica, who is a member of Troop 122, that what Mill Race Village really needed was a wigwam. During her research at the Northville city and high school libraries Julie learned that the Potawatomi Indians lived in the Northville area.

Potawatomi Indians made their wigwams from cattail stems which were woven together with tree bark and mounted to a frame made from willow branches.

Jessica recruited other girls to help snip the 2,000 cattail stems after getting the approval from Wayne County.

Finding 16 willow branches was easy enough. But there was no information available locally on how to assemble a Potawatomi wigwam.

With a book Fountain located at the Livonia Library, Jessica was able to start assembling the wigwam. Using her parents' garage, Jessica

began the longest part of the project, weaving the wigwam together in sections that would be transported to the grassy area in the center of Mill Race Village near the bridge.

"They were very understanding about it," Jessica said of her parents, Donna and Robert Black of Northville.

"Wigwams were permanent," Jessica said. "When Indians wanted to move they would leave it and other Indians would move in later."

The Indians would drape animal skins over the cattails to make the wigwam water proof and warmer, according to Jessica.

The completed wigwam is about six to seven feet in diameter and five feet high. A wigwam of this size would house about four to six Indians.

When covered with animal skins, a wigwam would last three to five years. Because Jessica chose not to cover hers with animal skins, she expects it will only last about a year. From research to completion the

"I tried to think of things my friends and I would be doing," Dana said. "These girls have problems but they like the same things we do."

Once a month for three months Dana, and the eight to 10 girls she recruited went bowling and roller skating, hosted a Valentine's party at Our Lady of Providence, danced and made craft projects. About eight to 10 girls attended each function.

"We ended up with a one-to-one ratio," Dana said.

"No matter how different we are on the outside we are all just people on the inside," said Dana, who is a member of Girl Scout Troop 1250.

"I get a lot out of it," Dana said of her 12 years as a Girl Scout. "I learned leadership, it helped me gain confidence, and I made a

Northville grad to carry torch

Although the flame has left Michigan, the glow of being an Olympic torchbearer has yet to reach one Northville High School graduate.

In Duluth, Ga., Bill Norton is awaiting the arrival of the torch that has traveled through 42 states, as well as Washington, D.C.

Just days before the Olympic games open on July 19, Norton will put on his Olympic-issued singlet and shorts and securely tie his running shoes for the most important run of his life. He doesn't know when yet. He hasn't been told where.

Norton will be among 5,500 community heroes whose nominations were accepted by the Atlantic Committee for the Olympic Games to be torchbearers. The committee calls this torch relay the most extensive ever, traveling 15,000 miles in 84 days with a motorcade of at least 12 vehicles.

Norton was not supposed to be home when the 9 x 12 envelope which contained the acceptance letter from the Atlantic Committee for the Olympic Games arrived in his mailbox. His wife, Vena, had hoped to intercept it and surprise him.

"It is a pretty neat honor," Norton said. "To have no clue and then read it, I was very happy."

Norton, a 1973 graduate of Northville High School lived in Northville until he moved to Duluth, Georgia three years ago to take charge of print production at BBDO South, a world wide ad agency.

Norton married Vena Hosler, a

1975 graduate of Northville High School and the sister of Nelda Morrison, who, along with her husband Tom, own Morrison Antiques in Northville.

When Vena read that the Atlantic Committee for the Olympic Games was looking for nominees for torch runners - she thought of her husband. So she wrote an essay about why she thought Bill was a community hero, the theme set by the Atlantic Committee for the Olympic Games. The committee was looking for people who through acts of charity or community service set them apart.

"I was very excited and couldn't wait to find my wife and love her," said Norton, who was completely unaware of the nomination as well as a little curious about what his wife could possibly have written to have earned him the honor of being a torchbearer.

"Whatever community he lives in, he's a community hero," Vena said of husband.

Only three years in Duluth, and he has been a Cubmaster with the Cub Scouts, is a volunteer coach with the Duluth High School cross country team and has taught Sunday School.

Norton is co-chartering a running club in Duluth, the Duluth Trackers.

Vena also wrote that he is very neighborly, he always helps a neighbor in need.

While in Northville, Norton was a member of the Novi Trackers Running Club for four or five years and also edited the club's newsletter.

"It couldn't have happened to a better guy," said Hubb Copp, president of the Novi Trackers Running

Club, of his former member. "Bill is a good family man and a very dedicated church man."

"He has a great sense of humor, very dry, but very subtle," said Copp.

During a 15-mile race, Norton was unaware that Copp was running right behind him and then Copp said he passed Norton up with 15 yards to go.

Norton got even with Copp though. Norton gave Copp a few training tips such as don't drink

any water during a marathon, eat Mexican the night before a race, wear as many worm clothes as you can during a race, and don't pace yourself and go out as fast as you can.

"It became the slogan with the club, if you were going to run a race, use the 'Bill Norton Training Tips,'" Copp said.

Norton has run marathons in Detroit, Chicago, Monterey and Columbus.

"He is always running in

marathons, but he has never won," Vena wrote in her letter.

"Bill started running after we had been married five years," Vena said. "He had been eating pizza at 2 a.m. and the next day decided to run around the block, he came back looking purple. His next goal was to run downtown and back."

Norton still runs every day.

His co-workers at BBDO plan to close the department to watch him run and cheer him on.

Bill and Vena have three chil-

dren, Benjamin, 14; Maggie, 12; and Joe, 11.

Bill is the son of Bob and Rhoda Norton. Vena is the daughter of Cliff and Margaret Hosler. Both parents are former Northville residents.

There is no question in Norton's mind about whether he will purchase the torch he will carry, which is tagged at \$275. There is only one answer. The torch, along with the memories, will last forever.

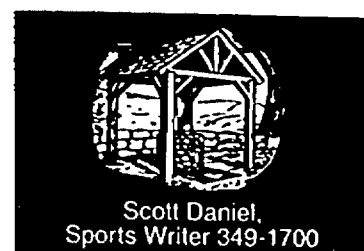

As a swimmer, Heckemeyer was one of the Mustangs' most versatile performers. She did everything

from sprint freestyle to the breaststroke and individual medley.

Heckemeyer finished 11th in the state in the 50 freestyle this past season. The graduate said she enjoyed swimming with her sister, Katrina, during her four years at Northville and also liked the competition.

"It was a lot of fun," said Amity.

Heckemeyer doesn't plan on continuing her swimming career at U of M. But she will stay involved in athletics by being part of the crew team for the Wolverine track squad.

Anderson's athletic career is also probably over. But she may eventually wind up in coaching.

She's already had the experience of working with youngsters through parks and recreation.

"I've taught some lessons now for seven years," Anderson said. "I love it. I love being with kids."

A back injury cut her senior season short with Northville. After a strong start, Anderson was hurt in October and was not able to swim afterwards.

She showed her team commitment by going to all the Mustang meets and practices.

"It was the hardest thing I've gone through," she said. "I've swam since I was 5-years-old."

Anderson originally hurt her back her junior season. But with physical therapy and conditioning,

Wildlife, setting makes golfing fun at Kensington Metro Park

This week's Northville Record starts a series of weekly golf course reviews. Our focus will be to provide you, the reader, useful information and tips on playing your favorite local courses.

Kensington Metro Park is the subject of our first review. In coming weeks we'll look at Milford's Mystic Creek and Coyote golf courses. If you would like to see a particular course reviewed this summer, please contact us at (810) 349-1700 or by fax at (810) 349-1050.

If you wanted to use one word to describe Kensington Metro park golf course, beautiful would be more than appropriate.

This spring's steady rainfall has left the 18-hole Milford course lushly green and in prime condition to challenge area golfers. According to Novi resident Jim Haslett, it's not uncommon to see a multitude of wildlife during a round of golf.

"It's got about everything," he said and noted that ducks, squirrels and various other animals inhabit the park course. "You'd be lucky not to see any deer."

Indeed, on the day of this review in late June, no fewer than five deer were seen while walking the links.

It helps make a day at Kensington

ton even more enjoyable, said Haslett, who plays the course nearly every week. Another reason he comes back so often is the staff at the Metro park course.

"I like the people that work out here," he said.

Kensington was built in 1959-60 and opened for play in the spring of 1961. Since then, the course has undergone minor changes to improve play.

At just under 6,400 yards from the white tees and slightly more than 5,200 yards from the reds, the metro park course, which is one of nine in the Detroit area, plays fairly for most golfers.

Fairways are generally open and greens are large enough to catch most approach shots. Beware of the rough, however.

While it's not U. S. Open length, Kensington's rough averages about

two inches. So your choices are either to keep the ball in the fairway or plan on using a club more than you'd normally hit from a given distance.

The 490-yard par 5 second hole is a good example.

A dog leg left, most golfers will be tempted to cut the corner and shoot for the green in two. But with the thick rough and strategic placing of trees on the left side of the hole it becomes an unlikely scenario to make it home in two.

As a rule of thumb, most of Kensington's green are easily reachable in regulation. You don't have to crush the ball, on most tee shots at least, to leave a short to mid-range second shot.

Take No. 4. At 397 yards, a decent drive should leave well under 200 yards for your second shot.

There is trouble on this hole, though. A shank either on the tee shot or approach to the green will leave golfers in deep valleys.

Also, a large oak tree guards the right side of the fairway catching any slicing drives from the tee.

"This is a tough hole," Haslett said.

Long hitters will find the 468-yard par 5 fifth hole a good chance at birdie. A dog leg right, the fairway is wide open and favors a bit of a slice. If you can hit a long 3 or 5-wood from the turf, the green is

definitely reachable in two.

Of the remaining holes on the front nine, No. 6 is the most interesting.

A 200-yard par 3, this hole is a "tweener" for most golfers. It's too long for 3-iron off the tee and too

Enjoy summer, but be careful

Ah, summer. What's more American than the family in the backyard roasting hot dogs on an open grill or watching the fireworks bursting in the night sky?

Hopefully not visiting the emergency room with a nasty case of food poisoning or first- or second-degree burns. What can you do to make sure that this summer is safe and healthy? Think ahead.

Take for example the backyard barbecue. The biggest danger when grilling either beef or poultry is bacteria contamination, says Gale Cox, wellness program's coordinator at Botsford's Health Development Network (HDN). Here's a few of her rules of thumb for your cook-out:

- Always wash your hands after handling raw meat to reduce the risk of contamination.

- Never use the same utensils and plate for uncooked as well as cooked food.

- Always make sure that the grill is hot enough to cook meat. Just remember that three-fourths of the coals should be ash white says Cox.

- Always make sure meat is cooked properly, and that meat juices run clear before you serve it. Ideally, you should partially microwave the

meat and then immediately transfer it to a grill with coals at cooking temperature, advises Cox.

- Always use a thermometer to check for internal meat temperature - which should be 180 degrees F for chicken or 160 degrees F for beef.

Summer also wouldn't be complete without fireworks. However, Sanford Vieder, D.O., a physician in the Botsford General Hospital Emergency Department, treats a variety of firework-related injuries every year.

"I can't emphasize enough the importance of proper supervision and common sense," he says. "Although it's really just a matter of maturity and proper supervision, it's best if children aren't allowed to light or handle fireworks at all."

The most common fireworks-related injuries are first- and second-degree burns to the hands and feet. The most serious accidents can result in scarring or amputation, and explosions near the face can lead to corneal burns and potential blindness.

Dr. Vieder has a few suggestions on how you can avoid meeting him in the emergency room this summer:

- Never purchase, or use homemade fireworks. If you do buy them, make sure it's from a reputable outlet, says Dr. Vieder. And always read and follow the directions.

- Never use fireworks in windy conditions and always make sure you're in a cleared area, away from dry grass or other objects that could catch fire.

- Never point fireworks in the direction of people, buildings, trees or overhead wires.

- Children handling sparklers should wear gloves, made from a material such as leather, that are flame resistant. If a child touches the wire, reminds Dr. Vieder, they could be badly burned.

- Never wear loose clothing which may catch fire. And always wear shoes, not sandals or sneakers, says Dr. Vieder.

Enjoy your summer in the sun. Keep safety in mind whatever you do.

Avoid needless eye injuries this summer

With the warm weather we all spend more time outdoors. We fish, golf and mow the lawn without giving much thought to the possibility that we could sustain a sight-threatening injury to our eyes. Yet every year thousands of ocular injuries occur needlessly.

When I drive through my neighborhood and see someone using a lawn mower or weed trimmer without wearing protective eyewear, I want to stop and give that person a lecture. We all know that we can injure our hands if they become entangled in the blades of a mower, but we don't always think that a mower can also turn small rocks or pieces of metal into missiles. If those objects hit the eye, they can cause serious damage or even the loss of an eye.

Nylon weed trimmers can also be dangerous. A small fragment of the cord can break off, penetrate the eye wall and lodge inside. These not only damage the eye's internal structures but can also cause a serious infection. Protective eyewear is a must when mowing or using a

weed trimmer.

Even simple gardening harbors some dangers. Be careful if you're bending over a bush or shrub, because a branch can snap back and strike your eye, causing a scratch or abrasion. Eyelids that come in contact with chemicals or pollen can suffer an allergic reaction with symptoms of itching and swelling.

Summertime sports can be a lot of fun, but they also can be dangerous. Golf can be a real hazard if you fail to look behind you during your backswing. Many children sustain serious injuries as a result of an adult's backswing. The golf ball itself, if it directly hits the eye, can result in lost vision from hemorrhage or a detached retina.

But it's not just golf balls that are hazardous. Many people end up in the emergency room after being hit hard in the eye with a tennis ball - and a squash ball can travel at speeds up to 100 miles per hour. If it hits an eye, the damage can be devastating.

Summer is also a time for fish-hook injuries. Fishing is usually considered fairly risk-free, but when fish casting catches an eye instead of a fish, a serious injury can result. If a fish hook becomes embedded in the eye, do not touch it. Seek emergency care immediately. The hook may need to be surgically removed to prevent further damage to the internal structures of the eye. And the eye will need to be thoroughly

cleaned to prevent serious infection.

Even though the Fourth of July has passed, fireworks are still available. Each year children and adults lose an eye as a result of playing with firecrackers, bottle rockets, cherry bombs and other explosives. These items can cause devastating eye injuries even if you are standing 50 feet away. Sparklers can cause severe ocular burns.

Don't be one of those people who think, "An eye injury will never happen to me." It can happen and you would be wise to take the necessary precautions:

- Wear sunglasses to protect your eyes not only against ultraviolet rays but from flying objects.

- Don't play with fireworks.

- Remember, too, if you have recently had eye surgery, your eye is weaker and more easily damaged if struck.

- Wear protection even when hammering a nail into the wall to hang a picture.

- And in the heat of summer when tempers may flare, stay cool and avoid getting punched in the eye.

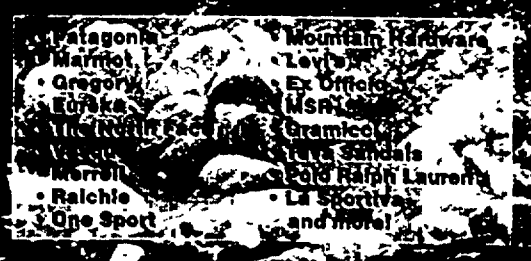

High-end homes increasing in values

After a period of slumping values, high-end homes are now increasing in value, according to a recent survey.

Expensive, one-of-a-kind type homes have been particularly difficult to market during the past few years, and values have declined in most local markets. But during the past year, values of the top 10 percent of single-family homes have risen significantly — up to 11 percent in some regions of the country.

That's the finding of TRW REDI Property Data, a nationwide real estate information company, after surveying 24 key metro areas throughout the country.

The figures are based on a "special sales model" — a process of tracking home values that have sold at least twice, calculating price trends based on gains or declines evidenced by these reported sales, the study report said.

San Francisco showed the greatest increase in high-end home values, with values increasing by more than 10.8 percent during the past year. Other areas that experienced significantly higher values were Seattle, New York City, Phoenix, Denver, Los Angeles and Detroit.

The area in which owners of luxury property lost the most equity

during the past six years was Southern California, where owners of high-end homes have lost as much as 17 percent of their equity since 1990.

In some "hot" housing markets of the country, high-end homes have appreciated well above the inflation rate, according to the report. In Denver, for example, values are 50 percent above the 1990 level.

"There are, however, indications that in some of these markets the rate of increase in home values has slowed considerably in recent months, with the implication that homeowners will not be building equity as rapidly as in the early 1990s," said Nlm Nattagh, with TRW REDI.

Several recent inquiries from readers have asked about information sources regarding special types of high-end residential properties. These one-of-a-kind homes are often difficult to find.

In most metro areas, there are special real-estate-related publications that list and picture current residential offerings, usually categorized by price. And special properties are often advertised in newspaper classified or display ads.

Also, national real estate organizations — especially those with strong relocation capabilities — sometimes offer special publica-

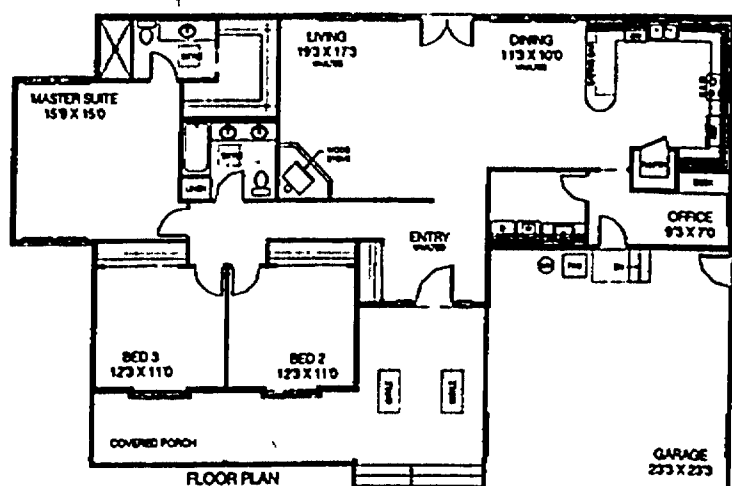
The living room and dining room,

Moon Shadows offers rare lake frontage

While Livingston County has no shortage of subdivisions under construction — if you seek a pleasant bulldozer, look about you — most of them are being built on former farmland or in woody areas.

There aren't many new subdivisions in this area being built on prime lakefront property, and that fact has made Moon Shadows a hot commodity in the housing market.

Moon Shadows is a new development in Hamburg Township which is well on its way to becoming one of the premier addresses in southern Livingston County.

Located on the shores of bustling Rush Lake, Moon Shadows' main entrance is located on M-36 near Pettysville Road, right next to Country Elementary School.

The 197-acre development broke ground in 1991 with its Phase I. When it's all finished, Moon Shadows will have 121 homes sprinkled throughout its scenic site.

Thus far, 39 percent of the lots have been sold or developed, with about 40 homes already built.

"Most of the people who have bought in Moon Shadows have come here because of all the amenities," said Linda Strang of the Michigan Group, the company which is selling the development. "The lake is a huge selling point, as well as the beach. And we have an 11-acre park here that's been very popular."

Strang said that five main builders have built all of the homes in Moon Shadows, but new residents can bring in their own builder, if they'd prefer.

The homes in the subdivision are priced in the \$140,000-\$300,000 range for off-water lots, while waterfront homes are going for \$400,000-\$500,000.

"There are 39 lots along the lake, and some of them are still available," Strang

said. She said that Moon Shadows' clientele has been a nice mix of locals and Detroit-area folks.

"We've had some people from Livingston County move in, as well as some from Farmington, Livonia and Ann Arbor," Strang said. "It's a good mix."

Strang said the main thing that makes Moon Shadows unique among Livingston County subdivisions is its lakefront location.

"The good thing about it is that these aren't old, cottagey lakefront lots," Strang said. "The lots are brand new, and the land around the lake is very solid down to the water's edge."

Rush Lake is a 100-acre all-sports lake with no public access. A very active homeowners' association helps keep the lake in good shape.

Delays can cause problems

Timing in gardening is everything. You just received the day lilies and gladiolus that you ordered by mail and the back yard is already crowded with shrubs, so you can't plant right now and you won't have time this weekend. And to boot, freezing rain is predicted.

What you do during the critical days between the time you receive your plants and the time you plant them can mean the difference between their success or failure. Planting immediately is best. But if planting must be delayed, you can take several steps to ensure your plants' survival and health.

First open the package and check to see that your order is correct. Be sure to open anything wrapped in plastic to allow air circulation. Don't be alarmed if on nursery stock you find last year's foliage and stems withered and brown (the plants are dormant, after all), but they shouldn't be broken or shredded, and there should be no signs of mold or decay.

Keep bulbs such as daffodils and tulips in a cool, dry spot with good air circulation. Whether the bulbs are packaged in plastic or paper bags, open the bags and spread the

bulbs in a single layer. Be sure they do not get wet. Avoid temperature extremes and changes that could cause sweating and subsequently promote the growth of mold on the bulbs.

In contrast, keep lilies in the dark. Moistening them with an occasional sprinkle of water. Don't let them dry out because they may sprout. Caladiums, dahlias and other bulbs that are not winter-hardy should also be moistened lightly.

Rhizomes such as irises can be kept in their original packing material as long as you open the shipping container. Simply store them in a lighted area, but out of direct wind or sun.

Bulbs can be held longer than most plants, depending on the time of year. For spring bulbs, an extended holding period of three to four weeks won't hurt so long as you plant before they sprout. Fall bulbs, however, can suffer from a long shelf life, and they should be in the ground and growing during that time.

Many perennials, trees and shrubs are shipped bare root or without any soil around the roots. Since these plants

Planting: When you have to wait

Use these hints when you have plants and flowers on hand that cannot be planted right away.

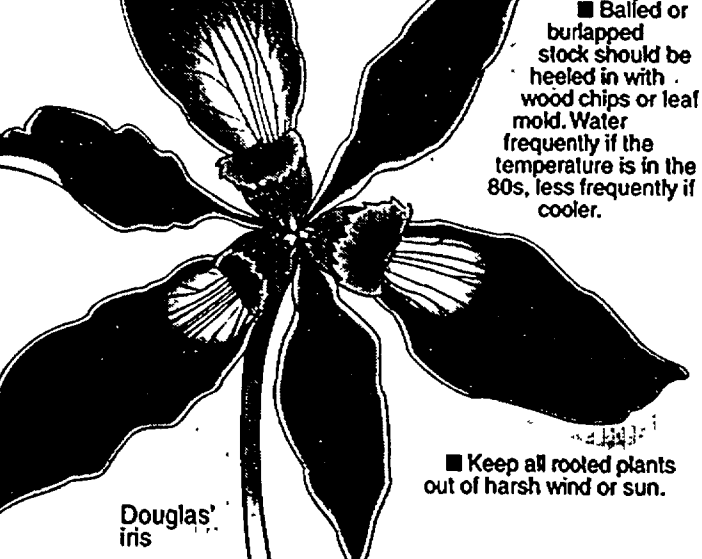
- Always open anything wrapped in plastic.
- Bulbs, such as daffodils and tulips, should be kept cool and dry and should have good air circulation. Bulbs should not be stacked.
- Lilies should be kept in the dark and occasionally sprinkled with water. Caladiums, dahlias and other nonwinter hardy bulbs also should be dampened occasionally.

- Rhizomes, such as irises, should be left in their packaging. Keep them in a well-lighted place but, out of direct sun.

- Plant all bulbs before they sprout.

- Keep the roots of bare root stock moist. If you need to plant such stock temporarily, plant in a mixture of 1 part builder's sand and 1 part peat moss in a shallow trench in the ground. This is called "heeling in."

- Balled or burlapped stock should be heeled in with wood chips or leaf mold. Water frequently if the temperature is in the 80s, less frequently if cooler.

are shipped dormant, you'll usually find no signs of life in the upper part of the plant. Do check the plants' roots when your package arrives. If the packing material around the roots is dry, trickle in a little water, enough to moisten, but not soak, the roots.

Unfortunately, nurseries sometimes prove more prompt than Mother Nature and plants may arrive while your garden soil is still half frozen and soggy. Digging soil in that condition will destroy its structure and you may have to wait several weeks before it dries sufficiently to be worked. During that time, provide your bare-root stock with temporary houses to keep them healthy.

The best option is to "heel them in." Dig a trench a half-spade deep in a well-drained, sheltered area — the side of a south-facing slope is ideal. Fill the trench with a mixture of one part builder's sand and one part peat moss. Dormant perennials can also be planted like this or they can be planted in pots.

Balled and burlapped stock should also be heeled in outdoors with wood chips or leaf mold if you cannot plant it within a week or two of purchase. Water the stock every day if the temperatures are above 80 degrees or every other day if temperatures are in the 60s or 70s. Keep plants in containers, watered and away from extreme temperatures. Try to store them in a protected area outdoors, in bright light but away from direct sun. Don't keep them in a warm, balmy area indoors.

For container stock planted in midsummer, cut tops back by one-third to prevent dieback. Ready-to-plant boxes don't usually need to be opened, but do need water frequently. Bare-root tree roots should also be soaked again before planting.

When planting bare-root stock in its final resting place, it's important to not let exposed roots dry out. Carry the plants to the garden in a bucket of water and don't remove them until you are ready to set

each one in the ground. Once they are planted, water them well. Follow your supplier's directions for your newly planted nursery stock from this point.

Small perennial plants can be covered for two or three days with an overturned bushel basket. Shielding the plants from the wind protects against dehydration until the roots awaken.

Q. I have tried unsuccessfully several times to root roses. Could you please tell me the best way?

A. If you've been trying to root cuttings of certain Morden roses, it's no wonder that you've been having a rough time. Grandifloras, hybrid teas and floribundas are usually pampered rose plants that have been grafted onto the sturdy rootstock of a stronger rose.

So, even if you do get a cutting to sprout, it won't have as strong a root system as the original plant (which was actually a combination of two different roses), and probably won't survive more than a

couple of years.

For example, old garden roses practically root themselves because they are already growing on their own rootstock. Some people just stick such cuttings in the ground to let them take root. It's that simple.

The best time to take cuttings for most of the country is late spring, after the first round of bloom (rose propagators in the north should take cuttings in fall).

Take a stem, cut about 6 inches off the tip and strip off the bottom leaves, leaving a few at the top. The angle of the cut doesn't matter. Put the cutting in a moist medium and be sure to keep it moist until rooting occurs.

Commercial breeders use a mist bench to root their roses — and so can you. Simply use clear plastic to make a little tent over the container in which you're going to place the cuttings you wish to root. Don't place your cutting in direct sunlight. Keep it where temperatures will be moderate. Again, keep the medium moist, lift the

cover and mist the cutting three or four times a day, replacing the cover each time.

I root my rose cuttings in plastic bags in a very light, damp soil mix. I seal the bags and put them in a bright, cool spot and wait for roots to fill the bag, then I move the rooted cuttings into pots. When the rooted cuttings are actively growing, you'll see new leaves begin to emerge.

Just keep the little plants in their pots until they're on the verge of becoming root-bound.

If you've been growing the cuttings indoors, gradually accustom them to the great outdoors by hardening them off for a week or so, then plant the roses in their permanent home. April or May are the best months for this.

tions that list currently available high-end homes. For example, Better Homes and Gardens Real Estate Service, with 800 affiliated Realtor firms, produces a full-color publication titled "Elegant Homes," which describes and pictures high-end, upscale homes at points throughout the country. It's available at the office of any member firm.

The Better Homes and Gardens

network also publishes a more general listing of available homes called "Homes Away from Home." It's a color-photo-listing magazine focusing on relocation, vacation or second homes and retirement properties. It also is available at member offices.

Q. For retirement housing, what are the pros and cons of moving into a continuing-care retirement community?

A. The advantages of living in a

continuing-care retirement complex are widely publicized by the developer. They include companionship, planned activity programs and multilevel care services and facilities.

Disadvantages, not well-publicized, include uncertain future cost increases and the difficulty of getting out of the contractual arrangement if you decide the community lifestyle is not to your liking.

Here's another aspect that

should be considered: A few years ago I interviewed many residents of a national chain of continuing-care retirement complexes owned and operated by a major church denomination. I was gathering input for a series of articles.

I discovered a problem that seemed to prevail at all units of the chain. Many administrators and staff leaders were retired from positions long held in the church denomination — or they were young relatives of denomination

leaders. They had little aptitude or capability in their role at the retirement community. And that caused continuing problems for residents.

When considering a continuing-care retirement community, the best practice is to spend several days or a couple of weeks at the complex. In most cases, such a "guest visit" arrangement is an integral part of the development's marketing program.

During your visit, make it a point to talk candidly with permanent residents. Ask a lot of questions. Don't rely entirely on information received from a marketing director or administrator.

"We are curious to know if the figurine in this photo has any value. It is marked 'Beswick — 868 — England.'"

A. Beswick Ltd., Staffordshire, England, was founded by John Beswick in 1936. The firm is now part of Royal Doulton. Your Huntsman figurine was designed in 1940. '868' is the model number.

Its value would probably be \$85 to \$125.

"I received four pieces of pattern glass from my mother, who would be 99 if she were living. I was told that my grandmother used it from the time my mother was very young."

The set consists of a creamer, covered sugar bowl, covered compote and spooner. The pattern, "Westward Ho," is a clear frosted design with a blison, log cabin and deer in relief. The final on the covered pieces is a crouched Indian.

Could you give me some information on its value and origin?

ANTIQUES

A. "Westward Ho," a nonflint pattern, was made by Gillander & Son, Philadelphia. "Pioneer" and "Tippecanoe" are other known names for this pattern. Some pieces have been reproduced in the 20th century.

Your set was made in the late 1800s and would probably be worth \$575 to \$625.

"Could you please tell me the value of my plate collection? I have nine 'Bits of the West' plates designed and copyrighted by Vernon Kilns. They

are all in mint condition.

A. Vernon Kilns, Vernon, Calif., made earthenware and semivitreous porcelain from 1931 to 1958. They also produced "Bits of Old New England" and "Bits of the Old South." Each series depicted scenes that portrayed the life and culture of the region. Your plates were made circa 1937.

Each plate would probably be worth \$25 to \$35.

"A friend gave me an amethyst Carnival glass dish. The pattern is 'Nesting Swans.' In the center of the dish is a swan on a bed of reeds with her wings open. Surrounding her are leaves, flowers and cattails."

The dish is 10 inches in diameter and has a ruffled edge. On the back is a diamond and fan design in relief.

What is the age, manufacturer and value?

A. Millersburg Glass Co. made the "Nesting Swans" pattern in the early 1900s. John Fenton founded his glass factory in Millersburg, Ohio, in 1908. After major financial difficulties and several owners, the plant was demolished in 1919.

Your dish would probably be worth \$350 to \$400.

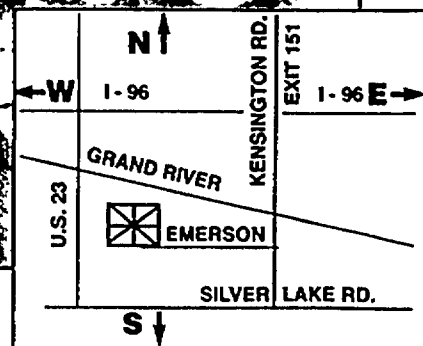

Agosta opens salon to serve Novi folks

for. "It's been extremely successful," said Agosta. "I feel this has been my opportunity to put all of the things I believe in into practice."

The Northville resident began her career nearly four decades ago. She said she was always fascinated with hair.

"From the time I was a child," Agosta said, "I loved playing with hair."

"It was almost a given that I would be a hair dresser after high school."

After a few years in the business, she became interested in more than just cutting and styling. Agosta began specializing in hair coloring in the early-1970s.

Since then, she continued to learn and improve in that area. She has been a member of the International Hair Color Exchange for years.

"We believe in on-going education," Agosta said. "It's not a one-time shot."

Besides education, the salon takes the guesswork out of serving clients.

Records about each patron are kept. Details of the type of coloring, type of style and dates of all services are kept on the computer.

Such attention to details is important, said Agosta. It's the reason so many clients have remained loyal to her.

"I have clients that have been with us for 30 years," she commented.

Nearly 50 percent of the salon's business is in hair coloring. Cutting and styling makes up the other major component.

"We take care of our clients," said Agosta, who still spend four days a week working with clients. "This is my hobby as well as my career."

Gina, of course, doesn't work alone.

The salon has about 35 professionals on staff. Agosta's son, John, heads up the stylist department as art director.

He charges \$38 for shampoo, treatment, haircut and blow dry. Prices for other stylists range from \$20 to \$36.

Permanents are \$50 for normal hair and \$60 for custom work. Manicures (\$13-15), paraffin for hands (\$8), pedicure (\$28) and makeup application (\$25) are just some of the other services.

Agosta is the Color Director and charges \$52 for permanent or demi-permanent cream color; \$70-\$90 for highlights and \$70-\$85 for lightening.

Staff prices for coloring, highlights and lightening range from \$31 to \$80.

Hours for Gina Agosta Hair Salon are: Monday through Thursday 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.; Friday 9-5 and Saturday 8:30-4. Call 477-2266 to make an appointment.

Home businesses get tax breaks

Operating a home-based business may entitle you to special tax breaks that can help maximize your income and offset some of the day-to-day expenses of maintaining your home and office.

According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, if your home-based business meets certain guidelines, you may be able to deduct business expenses for your car, personal equipment and entertainment, as well as a portion of mortgage interest, property taxes, utilities and other costs associated with home ownership.

Unlike employee business expenses that are subject to the 2 percent of adjusted gross income limitation, you can deduct qualified home-based business expenses in full on your individual income tax return. But before you start dreaming of tax write-offs, you'll need to be sure your home-based business qualifies.

BUSINESS OR HOBBY?

Your challenge is to distinguish your business from a hobby. Generally, a home-based business is entered into with the primary intent to make a profit, while a hobby is pursued without the intention to make a profit - although your hobby may incidentally produce income. In general, an activity is presumed not to be a hobby if profits result in three or more of the five consecutive tax years ending in the current year, unless the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) proves otherwise.

Business expenses must be

Money Management

"ordinary" and "necessary" to qualify as deductions. An "ordinary" expense is one that is common and usual for your type of business, trade, or profession, while a "necessary" expense is defined as "appropriate" or "helpful" for your particular business.

AUTOMOBILE EXPENSES

If you use your automobile in connection with your home-based business, you may claim a deduction equal to 30 cents per mile plus the business portion of parking fees and tolls, or write off the actual costs of operating your automobile in connection with your business. These costs include gas, oil, tolls, parking, depreciation, and maintenance expenses. Keep in mind that if you lease a car for business purposes, you must use the actual-cost method.

EQUIPMENT COSTS

The tax law allows a business to deduct up to \$17,500 in qualifying property in the year the property is placed in service, rather than depreciating the cost over a period of years. If you are in need of some new equipment, consider the benefits of immediate expensing. Be aware, however, that the expensing deduction is phased out once the cost of the property placed in service during the year exceeds \$200,000.

In some bases, home-based business owners find it more cost-effective to lease a business asset. If the leased asset is used strictly for business purposes, you generally can deduct the entire leasing expense. When the asset is used for both business and personal use, only the portion attributable to business use is deductible.

MEALS AND ENTERTAINMENT

You can deduct 50 percent of the cost of business-related meal and entertainment expenses incurred in entertaining a client, customer, or employee. To qualify, a bona fide business discussion must take place immediately before, during, or immediately after the meal or entertainment. Also, your records of business meals and entertainment must reflect the amount, time, place and business purpose of the expense, as well as your business relationship with the per-

son entertained.

HOME OFFICE DEDUCTION

You may qualify to deduct the costs of operating and maintaining the portion of the home you use for business only if your home office is used regularly and exclusively as 1) your principal place of business or 2) a place where you routinely meet, customers, clients, or patients. You will not meet the exclusive-use test if the business portion of your residence is not used solely for the purpose of carrying on your trade or business. To claim these deductions, you must file form 8829, Expenses for Business Use of Your Home.

YOU'RE IN CHARGE

When you operate a home-based business, you take on a number of other financial responsibilities, such as paying estimated taxes, insuring your business, and creating retirement savings plans. For this reason, you may want to seek professional advice from a CPA with small business experience.

State labor market shows stability

Michigan's major labor market areas, for the most part, reported only minor changes in their unemployment rates from April to May, according to seasonally unadjusted labor force estimates compiled by the Michigan Employment Security Commission (MESC).

"Labor force conditions remained fairly stable in May for most of the state's major labor markets," MESC director F. Robert Edwards reported. "Only two areas - the Upper Peninsula and the Saginaw/Bay/Midland areas - had significant changes in their unemployment rates last month."

In May six areas had unemployment rate declines, while three had increases and one reported no change from its April level. In most cases the rate changes over the month ranged from one tenth to two tenths of a percentage point.

May jobless rates fell in the Ann Arbor, Flint, Kalamazoo/Battle Creek.

Lansing, Saginaw/Bay/Midland and Upper Peninsula areas. Only the Benton Harbor, Detroit and Jackson areas

had unemployment rate gains last month. The grand Rapids/Muskegon/Holland area held steady from April to May at 3.7 percent.

"All of the major markets had labor force and employment gains," Edwards noted. "Summer job seekers, especially college students, were entering the job market last month, and while the number of new jobs also increased, job growth could not keep pace in every area, causing unemployment to increase in some labor markets."

Edwards said that in most markets, construction, retail trade and service industries had the largest job gains in May. An increase in new housing starts helped boost construction jobs, while employment growth in the restaurant industry helped boost the number of retail trade jobs. In the service sector, business and agricultural services had strong job growth.

The Ann Arbor area had the lowest May rate at 2.4 percent. The U.P. had the largest change, dropping by one and six-tenths per-

centage points to 7.6 percent, but still had the highest May rate among the major labor markets. The second largest change occurred in the Saginaw area as its jobless rate fell to 4.5 percent in May from 5.1 percent in April.

"The sharp drop in the U.P. jobless rate was caused by across the board job gains in mining, manufacturing, construction, retail trade and services," Edwards explained. "In the Saginaw area, job increases were concentrated in all of the same industries, except for mining."

All of the areas, except Benton Harbor, had lower unemployment rates this year than they did in May 1995.

Among Michigan's 83 counties, Ontonagon had the highest May jobless rate at 17.3 percent, while Washtenaw had the lowest rate at 2.1 percent.
