

High school block schedule format OK'd

It might have taken more than nine years to achieve, but Northville High School educators will be making drastic changes to the school day at the beginning of the next school year.

The Northville Board of Education Monday unanimously approved a memorandum of understanding with the Northville Education Association that will change the traditional high school day to a rotating block schedule. The change will occur at the start of the 1997-98 school year.

■ Northville is officially a portable classroom district following action by the board of education. The story appears on page 10A.

Members of the faculty association

approved the measure last week by approximately a 2 to 1 margin, and sent it to the school board for ratification.

Board President Martha Nield called the change a historic moment for the district, and one that will benefit all high school students.

"It's taken a long time to bring (block scheduling) to Northville, and I think we need to take the time to celebrate this change and the efforts of so many people

that made it possible," Nield said. "We're at an exciting point in time - exciting for teachers and students."

District officials have tried to implement the block since 1989, but two attempts failed due to a lack of support from high school teachers. This time around, Nield explained, teachers, parents, and students all worked together to develop a plan that will move the high school forward

"I'm extremely pleased with the efforts of our teachers and parents who volunteered countless hours in making this process work," Nield said.

District Personnel Director Roy Danley said that teachers and administrators spent more than 20 meetings negotiating the structure of the schedule. The pact is for one year and will be evaluated at the conclusion of the 1997-98 school year.

2nd bond try repeats \$61.5 million request

Same question, second time around.

The Northville Board of Education finalized the remaining pieces of the puzzle Monday in its attempt to seek voter approval for a second multi-million dollar bond request later this year.

The board voted unanimously to cap the bond request amount at \$61.5 million. The proposal is almost a carbon copy of the one voters turned down in September 1996, and calls for constructing a new high school, converting the current high school into a middle school, renovating the remaining schools, adding classrooms to Silver Springs Elementary, and upgrading district technology.

The vote is slated for June 9. School officials had discussed increasing the bond amount to about \$63 million - \$68 million in actual costs minus about \$5 million in interest income - but chose to make minor cuts in the proposal to keep it at the \$61.5 million

limit.

Board members also decided to keep the proposal bundled into one single package, instead of separating the request into several ballot questions.

"We're hoping to convince voters that the bond is necessary if we're going to carry educational excellence into the 21st century," school board President Martha Nield said. "We've spent quite a few months meeting and discussing

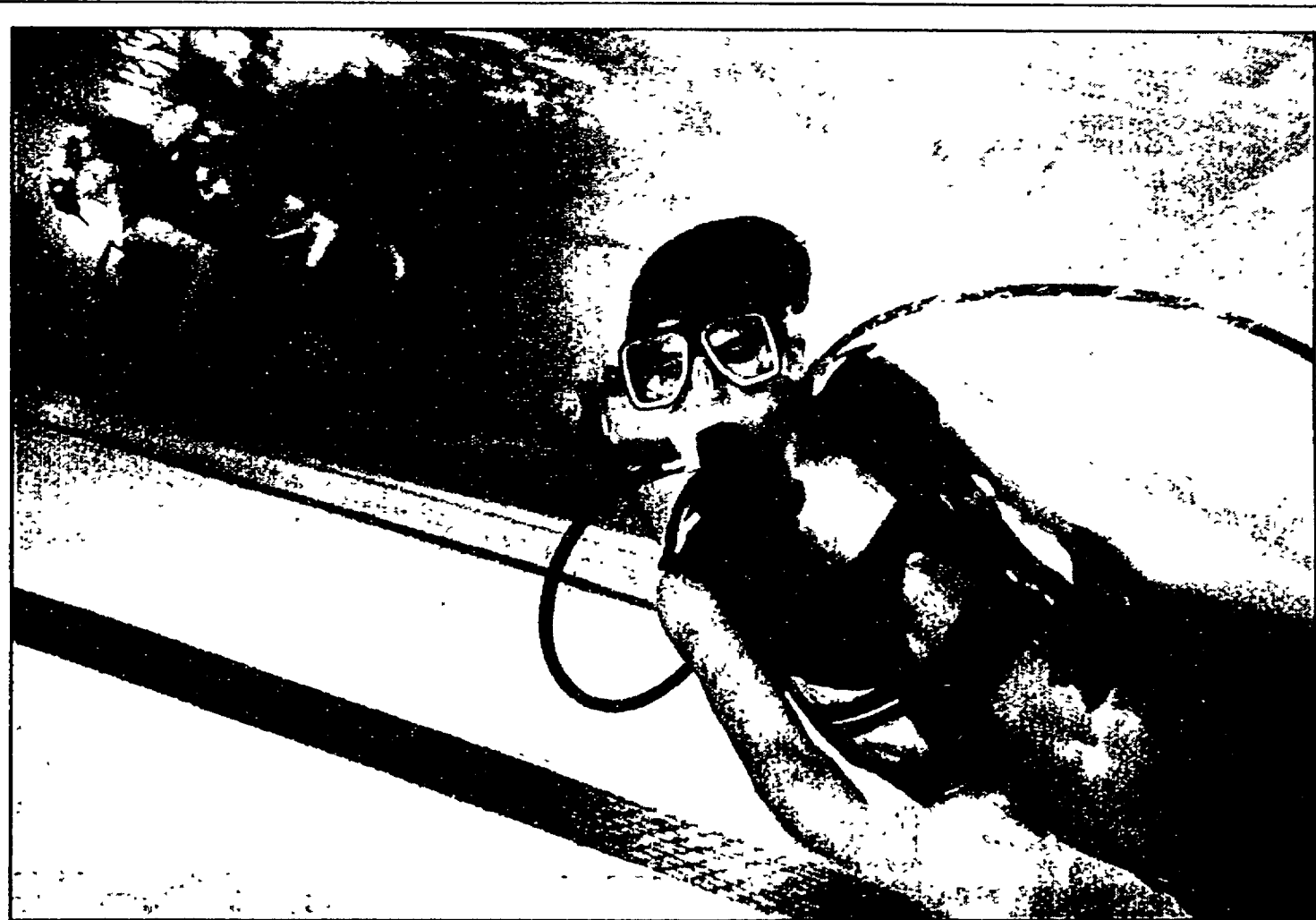

Watery classroom proves great learning grounds

Imagine attending class six feet underwater.

That's what 75 students at Meads Mill Middle School had the opportunity to experience last week when they strapped on scuba tanks and plunged into the water at the Northville High School swimming pool.

The Meads Mill sponsored scuba class is in its second year

and continues to be a huge success, according to teacher Roslyn Steiman.

"It's a real eye opener for these students, and it represents an opportunity for them to experience something they normally wouldn't encounter," she said.

The special program is funded by federal title I monies, which allow for after-school activities and tutoring, according to Meads

Mill Assistant Principal Sue Meyer.

"We try to be creative and allow for a variety of activities to take place," she said. "Classes like scuba diving and our Adventure Challenge are just some of the different activities we plan for students."

Dive instructors from Rec Dive in Royal Oak provided classroom instruction during two informa-

Enterprising Trekkies bring collectibles to library

The Smithsonian, that mother of all museums in Washington, D.C., houses many priceless pieces of Americana.

A trip through its halls reveals slices of history like the original handwritten lyrics to *The Star Spangled Banner*, the Enola Gay aircraft and latter-day classics like the bridge of the starship Enterprise.

That's right, the Enterprise, registry number NCC-1701, boldly going where no one went before for three seasons on prime time TV.

It may no longer patrol the vast stretches of space governed by the United Federation of Planets, but the ship and the show that brought it to life have made their way into the American mind at warp speed.

That's what brought Mark Gilday to the Northville District Library last week. Gilday is a member of the U.S.S. Intrepid, a Dearborn-based Trek fan club that is the largest in the nation. He came to town on March 18 to host a discussion of *Star Trek* and *Star Wars* collectibles.

"*Star Trek* has really become a part of our culture now," Gilday said. "It's something we all know."

Of course, he's right. When you say "Beam me up, Scotty," (a phrase never actually used in the

series, by the way) everyone makes the connection with the 1960s TV show. But *Star Trek* was not just another sci-fi show, according to Gilday.

"(Creator) Gene Roddenberry was really trying to talk about the human mind and human con-

sciousness, our values," he said.

Many of the adventures of the Enterprise crew saw them confronting social issues of the day. *Star Trek* tackled the heated issue of race relations more than once, such as when Captain Kirk kissed Uhura, a black woman who played

the ship's communications expert.

"That shocked some people at the time," Gilday said. "It was part of that theme of evolving thinking, erasing the differences between us."

Park grant could transform area around old Ford plant

Imagine spending a lazy afternoon strolling along the banks of a quiet stream, maybe stopping along the way to fish or just enjoy the beauty of a quiet summer afternoon.

Sound good? It could eventually come to our own backyard with a little luck and a lot of money.

The Northville Parks and Recreation Department will drop a grant application in the mail before the week's out seeking more than \$160,000 in state funds for a new park area on city-owned land behind the old Ford plant that's now owned by R&D Enterprises.

Bordering the 1,100 foot stretch of shore of the Middle Rouge River that runs behind the site, the new park would include walking trails, landscaping and observation and fishing decks over the water.

Don't lace up your shoes or whip out that pole just yet, however. Applying for the grant is one thing, getting it is another.

It all depends on whether the Michigan Department of Natural Resources trust fund considers the grant application favorably. Millions of dollars are available for

local communities to use to improve their parks and recreation systems. Canton Township alone, for example, will apply for \$3 million for land purchases.

The proposed improvements here will run about \$216,000, according to preliminary estimates. If Northville's proposal wins trust fund approval, only 75 percent of that cost will be covered by grant money. The rest, some \$54,000, would have to come from a local match.

Communities face stiff competition for trust fund money but state officials have said that creating public access to water bodies should be a high priority. That could give Northville a leg up.

"We're optimistic," Recreation Director Traci Sincovec said.

The city received the parcel as a gift from the Ford Motor Co. some years ago. The land, about two acres, lies east of Griswold across from Ford Field. The proposed improvements are part of the city's master development for the site.

The additions would build on what was done with a \$71,000 grant obtained last year from the Wayne County Rouge River program. That money paid for an

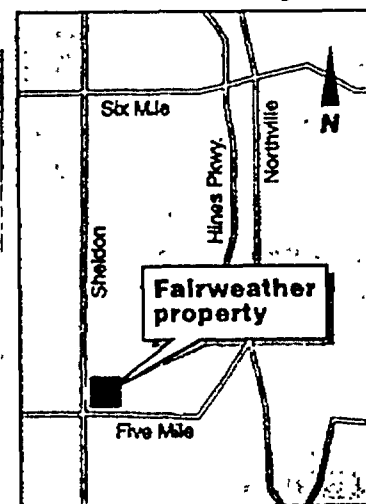
extensive cleanup of the area.

Waiting for word on the new grant will be a long process. The trust fund will announce money recipients in December. The Michigan Legislature will then formally vote to allocate money for projects in the spring of 1998. If Northville's proposal is one of them, work could begin in the fall of 1998 or the summer of 1999.

Township considers purchase of abandoned building

Fairweather eyed

Northville Township is looking into the possibility of buying the Fairweather Building and its surrounding grounds from the State of Michigan.

Occupying 18 acres at the corner of Five Mile and Sheldon, the Fairweather was once a mental health facility but has been closed for at least three years.

Livonia teenager Scott Brown, trespassing in the abandoned building on the night of Jan. 12, fell to his death from the top of the Fairweather. His friend Joel Couch, 26 and a Livonia resident, allegedly accidentally shoved Brown, sending him over the edge. Couch is scheduled to go to trial next month on a charge of negligent homicide.

Township and state officials

confirmed that they are now discussing whether the township might buy or even receive the Fairweather as a virtual gift.

According to Northville Township Supervisor Karen Woodside, the deal could involve the state selling the property at fair market value or donating the property to the township under the method known legally as "conveyance."

That arrangement would see the

land sold for \$1 and a provision written into the contract requiring the township to use it only for a public purpose, such as a new fire station. If the township were to buy the land outright, no restrictions would likely be placed on its future use.

Either way if a deal is reached the township will work speedily to get the Fairweather demolished, Woodside said.

One possibility would involve Wayne County.

The county is rapidly moving toward awarding demolition contracts for its abandoned buildings near the Fairweather. The township may approach county officials about including the Fairweather in the contract bids, Woodside said.

Suspected drunk driver has many legal problems

Northville Township police arrested a Plymouth man for drunk driving in the early morning hours on Friday, discovering later that the man had no driver's license and is wanted in other communities for the same offense.

A township officer was on patrol near Six Mile and Northville Road just after 1 a.m. on March 21. He said that he saw a 1974 Porsche ahead of him and ran its license plate through the law enforcement computer.

The computer reported no record of the vehicle, so the officer tried to stop it. The driver, 45, allegedly ignored police lights and sirens and stopped only after a second patrol car blocked his path.

The man, whom police said showed signs of intoxication, told police that he'd had only three beers that evening. Testing allegedly proved him wrong. According to police the man's blood alcohol level was .14 percent, well over the legal limit of .10 percent.

A computer check on the man revealed that his driver's license had been revoked and that he is wanted in Ypsilanti for failing to appear in court on charges of driving with a suspended license and for drunk driving.

The man was held until he sobered up then was released on bond for all of the counts. He faces a court hearing soon.

MORE DRUNK DRIVERS: Four more people were arrested for operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol last week in Northville Township. They included a 44-year-old Plymouth man, a

24-year-old Northville man, whom police said was driving with a suspended license, a 26-year-old Westland man and a 23-year-old Garden City man.

ELECTRONICS GONE: A Northville Township man's home was cleaned out of more than \$17,500 worth of electronic entertainment equipment on Friday night.

The man lives on Village Run Drive. He told police that sometime during the evening of March 21 someone pried open the front door of his house causing \$200 in damage.

The thief or thieves then took the man's stereo system, laser disc player, projection TV and other equipment, leaving everything else undisturbed.

Two weeks before the man had placed an ad in *Tradin' Times* to sell his stereo. A man who responded to it could have been involved in the burglary, authorities speculate.

That individual, who gave his name only as "James," came out to see the stereo and agreed to buy it. James said he would get paid on Friday, the homeowner said, and would come back then. The homeowner, however, told him that he would not be home on Friday.

PURSE VANISHES: A purse belonging to a woman shopping at Home Depot disappeared as she left the store on her way to the parking lot on Sunday.

The woman told police she left the store with the purse on her shoulder but that it was gone by the time she reached her car. She does not know how the incident

occurred.

Inside was \$100 in cash, glasses, medication, a checkbook and credit cards.

PURSE SNATCHED: Hiller's Market on Five Mile and Haggerty was the site of an alleged purse snatching on Saturday afternoon.

A Livonia woman told township police she only turned away from her shopping cart for a moment, but the cart disappeared in that time and the woman found it an aisle away. Her purse, which had been sitting on the baby seat, was gone.

Inside was \$60 in cash and the woman's credit cards and ID.

STUNG! Northville police are employing new tactics to keep local stores from selling alcohol and cigarettes to minors.

Police recently cited Good Time Party Store, 567 Seven Mile Road, on two counts of selling alcohol to a minor.

The citations resulted from a sting operation in which an 18-year-old who was working with police was sent into the store on two different occasions to purchase a six-pack of beer.

Both times the store clerk allowed the transaction to take place, and police later cited him for the infractions.

The penalty for each offense is up to 90 days in jail and a maximum fine of \$500.

Township gas station robbers get tough sentences for offense

Two teenage brothers convicted of robbing a Northville Township gas station last fall are going to do hard time for their crime, a Wayne County Circuit Court judge decided last week.

For \$92 and a VCR, Ali Hourani and his older brother Mohamad will be behind bars until both are well into their 20s. The two brothers, both Dearborn residents, were sentenced last week along with a third man for the Sept. 10, 1996, gunpoint robbery of the Sunoco gas station at the corner of Five Mile and Haggerty.

According to Northville Township police, the heist occurred just before three that morning.

The two Houranis and a third man, Mohamad Bazzi, entered the station's store, then Ali Hourani then pulled out a handgun. Ali, 17, ordered the station's attendant into the back room and tied him up, police said, then took \$92 in cash and a necklace from the man. Meanwhile, Bazzi, 22, broke into the station's safe while Mohamad Hourani rifled through

the cash register.

The attendant managed to trip the silent alarm, however, and Northville Township police were at the station within two minutes. Bazzi and a fourth man, who was driving the quartet's gray Pontiac Grand Am, were arrested outside the store moments later.

The two Houranis escaped out the back door, and evaded a large-scale search involving police from four departments and tracking dogs. The pair did not stay free for long, though, as Ali Hourani was arrested that night by Dearborn police. His brother was apprehended a few days later.

The Houranis and Bazzi, a Detroit resident, were each convicted of two counts of armed robbery, one for robbing the station and one for robbing the attendant. Each charge could have netted

them a life sentence.

During sentencing in circuit court last week, Bazzi received a term of two to five years, according to Northville Township Detective Fred Yankee.

Ali Hourani will spend the next four to 15 years in prison and another two years for being convicted of using a firearm during the commission of felony.

His brother, Mohamad, received the stiffest penalty: seven to 15 years behind bars for the robberies and an additional 10.5 years to 37.5 years for his conviction on a charge of being a habitual offender. Mohamad Hourani had been convicted of three prior felony offenses.

The driver, a 22-year-old Detroit man, has not been charged with any crime. Of the stolen money, \$624 was eventually recovered.

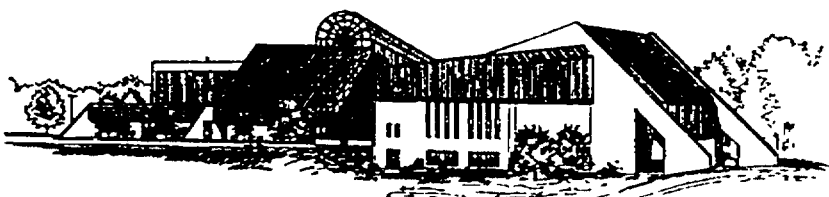

Court stays city's order to demolish Horton house

Razing date put on hold

For almost a year Northville city officials say they attempted to get Don Norton to comply with the city's building ordinances.

The former Northville High School graduate has refused to fulfill the city's numerous requests to correct ordinance violations, cited by Northville's building inspector, at his 620 Horton Street home, according to city officials.

Last week the Northville City Council approved an order calling for the home's demolition, and just when it seemed like the problem was going to come to some sort of resolution Norton, who has been out of contact with city officials for months, finally took action.

He took the city to court. In what's being viewed as a sudden reversal of fortune, a temporary restraining order from Wayne County Circuit Court has saved Norton's home from its date with the wrecking ball—at least for the next few weeks anyway.

Both sides will be back in circuit court April 1.

"It's incredible. Our repeated attempts to work with him have failed, and at the last possible moment he takes us to court," Northville Building Inspector Rick Starling said in disbelief.

"We have given him every possibility to correct the situation and he has done nothing up until now."

Plymouth attorney Kenneth Harrison doesn't see it that way. In court records, Harrison paints a different picture from that of city officials. As a matter of fact, Harrison argued, his client's situation is a classic example of a Catch-22.

"As a result of subsequent building permit and board of zoning appeals denials, the property has

now been labeled a health hazard by the (city), and (Norton) is powerless to correct the health hazard because he cannot obtain a building permit," Harrison complained.

According to Starling, Norton bought the small garage home in 1995 and planned to move into the dwelling with his wife and two children. When he completed the move he decided to double the size of the 650 square foot home by constructing a second floor.

According to Starling Norton failed to apply for a building permit, submittal of construction plans and other licenses deemed necessary by the city's ordinances and building codes, and the city condemned the home as unfit for human habitation on Oct. 13, 1996.

City officials issued a demolition order in December for the home to be destroyed this month.

Harrison admitted that his client did work to the home, but he labeled them "emergency repairs."

"(Norton) was forced to conduct emergency repairs to preserve the investment, and then, because those repairs were made without a permit, he is faced with the loss of the entire investment," Harrison said in his motion for a preliminary injunction.

Starling maintains that Norton was not just conducting emergency repairs, but was making major changes to the structure. By the time the city was able to stop the work, a second floor had been added to the aging garage home.

"His excuse was that he went to the store to get some coffee and when he returned the workers had managed to build a second floor to the home," Starling said.

Harrison claims that prior to his purchase of the home Norton was told by former Northville building inspector Mick Kryzewski that renovating the home to a two story structure would be no problem, and that he would ensure the house was "grandfathered in," meaning that updated ordinances would not have retroactive application to the renovation of the home.

City records include documentation from Starling to Norton asking him to provide construction documents for a site plan review.

The documents are required for the plan review process prior to the issuance or denial of a building permit, according to Starling. The letter also advised Norton that the Board of Zoning Appeals had expressed concerns about the lack of progress in having the necessary documentation submitted in a timely fashion.

"Your failure to provide all of the documentation by April 19 will result in the denial of a building permit," the letter continued.

The request included the submittal of a detailed site plan, engineering specifications, sealed drawings and calculations from a licensed structural architect, as well as soil investigation results. Norton failed to submit the necessary documents and by not making that deadline, forced the ZBA to deny his request.

"You have 10 days to appeal a ZBA decision but once that time period is over you can never reappeal," Starling said.

The \$5,700 demolition contract with Maged Contracting of Plymouth is temporarily on hold until the legal tangle is sorted out, Starling explained.

City officials expect to discuss the matter with city attorney Richard Connors today.

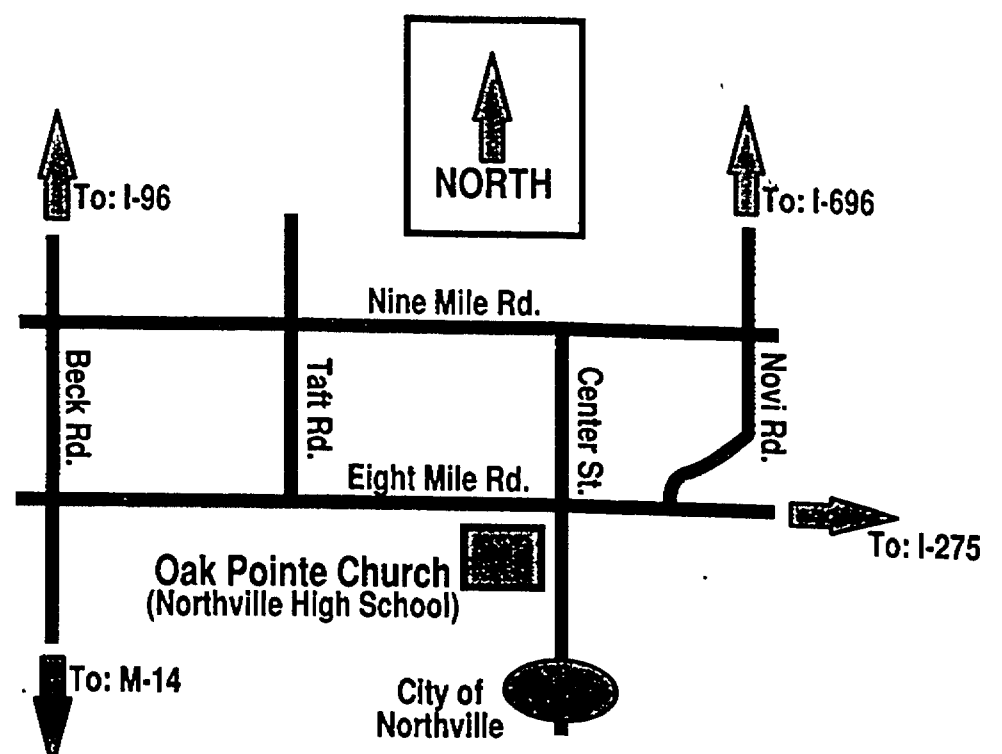

Former top cop denied honor again

The names of thousands of cops who've died in the line of duty are etched in stone at the National Law Enforcement Officers' Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Once again, the name of Eugene King, the only Northville police officer to be shot in the line of duty, won't be joining them.

The committee that votes each year on additions to the memorial last week decided not to add King to the list of officers whose names will be engraved this May.

King, Northville's former chief of police, was shot in 1965 by War-

ren Wright, a convicted felon wanted for questioning in two Northville bank robberies the year before (see related story).

Forced to give up his job due to ill health, King lived painfully for more than a decade, dying in Arizona in 1976. Two years ago his family petitioned the memorial governing committee to add his name to the monument, established in 1984 to honor American law enforcement officials who've been killed on the job.

The hurdle for King's loved ones has been to provide the medical documentation that links the 1965 shooting with the chief's death

more than a decade later. They were unable to do it in 1996, when the committee voted against adding King's name. The same thing happened earlier this month during the committee's 1997 vote.

"We just don't have the evidence at this point in the case of Eugene King," explained Pam Kline, director of research for the committee.

There has been difficulty obtaining some records because the town where King spent his last years (Hayden, Ariz.) is so small, Kline said.

"We have requested more information and if the family can provide us with that documentation,

we can reconsider," she added.

They'll get it if Greg King has anything to say about it. One of Eugene's seven children, Greg was in sixth grade on the day his dad was shot. Today he's a state trooper with the Arizona Department of Public Safety.

"We'll keep after it," he said, speaking by telephone from Tucson this week. "It's something we'd like to see happen but for now we'll just have to wait and see."

His father was never sick until he got shot, King recalled. Eugene King would carry the pair of bullets in his chest until the day he died 11 long, hard years later.

"He was tough but it was difficult," Greg King said. "It was constant pain, then pills and eventually surgeries."

The two shells did damage to King's stomach, intestinal tract, pancreas and liver. Eugene, hired as a police officer in 1954, was forced to quit his job and eventually ended up working as the city manager of Hayden. He died as a result of complications from surgery in 1976.

Current City Police Chief Rod Cannon in 1995 tried to help the King family by sending the committee records of the confrontation that led to Eugene's wounding.

Memorial facts

Here's some interesting information about the National Law Enforcement Officers' Memorial.

• **PURPOSE:** Established in 1984, the memorial honors local, county, state and federal officers killed in the line of duty. It was dedicated and first put on public display in 1991.

• **LOCATION:** Judiciary Square, Washington, D.C.

• **NUMBERS:** The memorial's face has the names of more than 14,000 officers inscribed on it. More than 100 are women.

• **GREATEST LOSSES:** The New York City police department is the agency with the largest number of names on the memorial, more than 500. The state which has lost the most officers is California. More than 1,000 officers have lost their lives in the line of duty in the country's most populous state.

On average a law enforcement officer dies in the line of duty every other day in America, and more than 65,000 are assaulted each year.

• **NEW ADDITIONS:** New names are added during a candlelight vigil each May.

Gentle handling of suspect repaid with permanent bullet wounds

Eugene King was trying to make it easy on Warren Robert Wright.

The 29-year-old Wright had just spent several anxious minutes sitting in his aqua-colored four-door Dodge. It was the afternoon of Feb. 10, 1965, and two Northville police officers had stopped his car on Seven Mile Road, drawing their pistols when Wright repeatedly refused to step out of the vehicle.

William McGee and Louis Westfall were apprehensive as well. Wright, a convicted armed robber, was the man the FBI wanted to question about a pair of gunpoint bank robberies that had taken place in Northville the year before.

The tense standoff came about because of the sharp eyes of

Judith Hellund, a teller at the Northville branch of the Detroit Federal Savings Bank, located on the corner of Center and Dunlap. On her way back from lunch Hellund saw Wright, the man who had robbed her in the bank at gunpoint in May 1964 and gotten away clean.

The bank manager heard Hellund's story and called the FBI, who immediately asked Northville police to pick up Wright for questioning. McGee and Westfall arrived at the bank within minutes but by that time Wright was back in his Dodge, driving around the downtown area.

They followed him as he drove south on Main Street and then east on Seven Mile, heading out of Northville. Soon Chief Eugene King

arrived on the scene, returning from lunch with a friend, Theodore Cuda.

"They're going to shoot me," Wright told King when asked why he wouldn't get out of the car, adding that he was in town to visit his grandmother. The chief ordered McGee and Westfall to holster their weapons and decided to take Wright back to police headquarters himself.

King did not frisk or handcuff the suspect and had Wright ride in the passenger seat of the chief's

car, Cuda in back.

As they drove on Main Street and neared the station, Wright drew a .25 caliber semi-automatic pistol out of an ankle holster and pointed it at King. He told the chief to drive right on past the station and ignored King's urges to surrender.

"I'm a two-time loser. You are not taking me in," was Wright's response.

Wright shot King twice in the chest a few seconds later as the car neared the intersection of Main

and Rogers. Despite his wounds the chief helped wrestle Wright into custody, assisted by McGee, who'd been following the car in his police cruiser.

While he was sentenced to 10 years in prison by a state court for attempted murder and got a 20-year hitch on federal bank robbery charges, Wright would spend only six and a half years behind bars. He was paroled in late 1971 and has been dead since at least 1988, according to state criminal computer records.

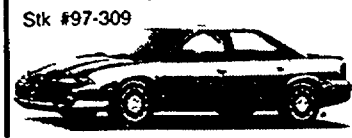

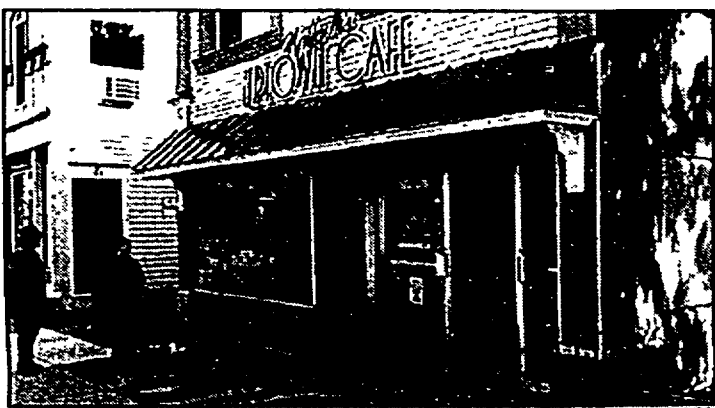

Wrapping finally off Main Street facade



Facade work at 160 E. Main has finally been completed.

Notice anything different about downtown Northville lately? Like maybe the lack of a 1,800 square foot bright blue plastic building wrap?

The huge covering (actually a series of tarp panels) that was draped over the building at 160 E. Main finally came down earlier this month following the completion of exterior work on the structure.

The enormous plastic sheets were used to shield the facade of the building, which received an attractive stucco treatment during renovations that dated back to the beginning of the year.

"Stucco can't dry when it gets too cold," said Northville architect Greg Eitelman, who designed the facade improvements. "So the tarp was used to cover a gas heater that was kept running 24 hours a day."

Eitelman, whose Greg Eitelman Design Inc. office is located

on the upper floor of the building, said the addition of the stucco was only one of the upgrades completed, albeit the one that caused the most disruption.

Also added were a copper canopy over the front entrance, a decorative cornice and window accents.

"Even though the building went up sometime in the 1950s, we tried to do something to make it blend in with Northville," Eitelman added.

The huge tarp, which resembled a swimming-pool liner, remained in place for almost three months during the renovations.

The improvements were paid for by the building owners, The Beal Group. Sam Savedes, the owner of Northville's Uptown Cafe, said he's delighted with the snazzier exterior.

"It looks great," he chimed. "I'm probably the tenant who'll benefit



the most, because everybody identifies the building with our restaurant."

Savedes has been in Northville for about a year now and contributed many interior improvements to the building before moving in.

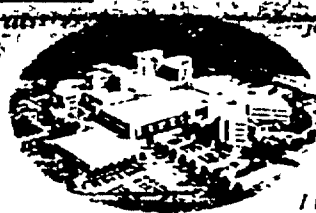

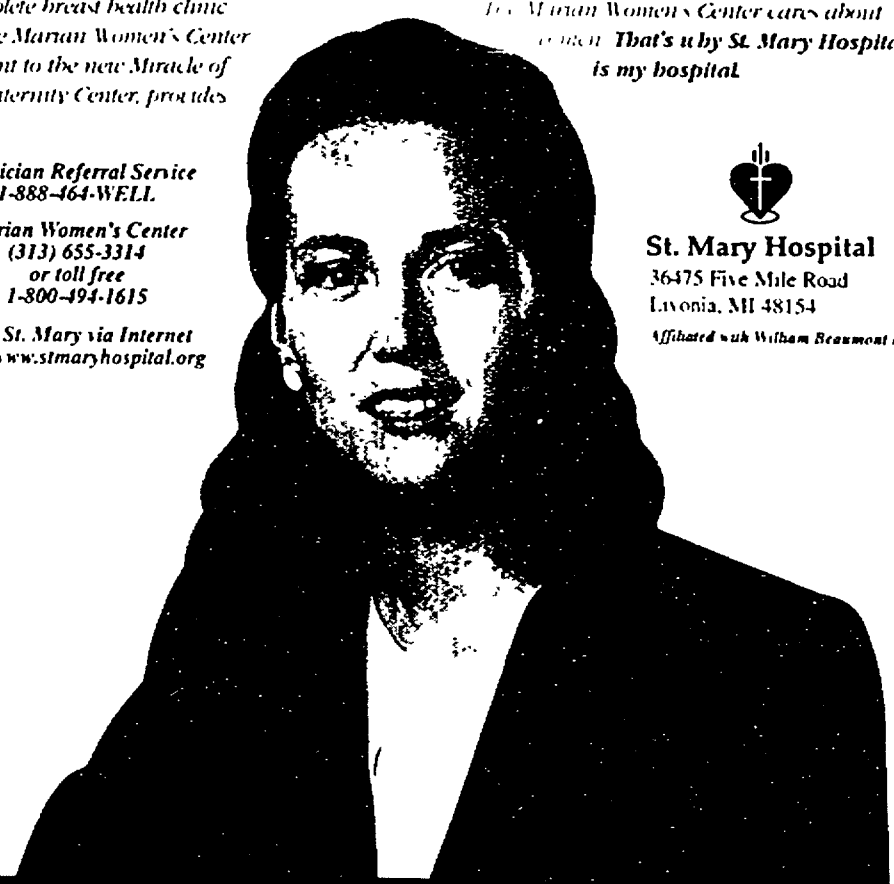

The popular image of *Star Trek* fan clubs isn't too flattering: a bunch of geeks who haven't been on a date in years sitting around discussing the trivia of a show that went off the air before many of them were born.

That notion is far from the truth, according to Mark Gilday. Gilday is a member of the U.S.S. Intrepid, which is not only the nation's largest *Trek* fan club but is also based right here in Michigan. Dearborn, to be exact.

"Do we wear uniforms all the time? That's what you really want to ask. Isn't it?" he joked with a *Northville Record* reporter during an interview last week.

Actually, the Intrepid's membership, now at 800-plus counting those in America, Canada and overseas, is made up of regular individuals who just happen to enjoy *Star Trek*. Everyone from

doctors to computer experts are members, Gilday said. The leader of the Intrepid, who carries the rank of admiral, is a lawyer.

"We are not by any stretch of the imagination just a bunch of people acting silly. To do what we do takes a committed organization," Gilday said.

The Intrepid group, for example, is responsible for organizing the three to five *Star Trek* conventions which come to the metro Detroit area each year. That takes thousands of hours of planning and effort to arrange matters like security, transportation and vending for popular shows.

Besides that the group performs regular charity work all over the area such as money drives for the blind, working in soup kitchens and manning the phone during fund-raising marathons for public television station Channel 56.

"Some groups do sit around and ask each other, 'What happened to

Spock's brain? We do a little bit of that but we do a lot more besides," Gilday said.

Making friends and breaking down barriers is also a lot of what the U.S.S. Intrepid is about, according to him.

"We try to bring that philosophy of the 24th century into the 20th century," he said. "We try to demonstrate things like trust and respect for each other. We just throw out hatred and bigotry and say that we're all part of one group, the human race."

The name of the group, by the way, comes from a starship which was featured in an original *Trek* TV episode. Gilday, who joined Intrepid after attending a *Star Trek* convention several years ago, doesn't like the stereotypes he and his friends sometimes get saddled with.

"Some people do dress up in costumes but so what?" he asked. "With all of the drugs and other

bad things out there. If the worst thing you do is dress up in a costume, I'm not going to criticize it.

"*Star Trek* is one of those things that some people are a little embarrassed about," Gilday added. "They don't want to admit they like it. I say if you enjoy it, stand up and say so."

The U.S.S. Intrepid holds meetings on the first weekend of each month in the Dearborn Civic Center, Michigan near Greenfield.

fiction, was not the same thing, in Gilday's opinion.

"George Lucas just wanted to tell a story. It's a good one but *Star Trek* is different," he said.

One thing that *Star Wars* and *Star Trek* do have in common is memorabilia, lots of it, in fact. Product merchandising from the movies and multiple *Trek* TV series is big business all across the world. Overpricing due to hype or even dishonest merchandising is a problem for any collector, especially those who are just getting started.

"Everything is mass-produced now so it's not easy to see what's a good collectible and what's not," Gilday explained.

Most valuable are items from the era of the original *Trek* series because they're rare. An enterprise technical manual in good condition, for example, goes for \$50. The issue of *TV Guide* which

featured a story about the show can sell for as much as \$300.

Don't think that something with *Star Trek* slapped on it is automatically worth money. Gilday tells the tale of one collector who "invested" \$1,000 on the entire first-run series of trading cards for *Star Trek: The Next Generation*. The set is worth less than \$100 today.

"There's so much bogus stuff out there that not everything is a good deal," he cautioned. "You also have to remember that you're not going to get rich off this stuff so don't get into it thinking that."

If you're interested in getting into *Trek* collecting or sci-fi memorabilia in general, the best way to learn how and what to obtain is by reading books and guides on the subject, joining a *Trek* fan club or attending a convention.

Gilday will be back at the Northville District Library at 7 p.m. April 29. The evening's free and everyone is welcome to attend.

New laws pin tougher penalties on drunk driving offenders

New drunk driving laws take effect in Michigan on April Fool's Day, and it's no joke. The four laws provide stiffer penalties for minors and first-time violators, and clamp down hard on repeat offenders.

Here's a summary of the four new Michigan laws:

• PA 490 — For the warrantless arrest of an intoxicated

person found in the driver's seat of a vehicle, if any part of that vehicle intrudes onto the roadway. The warrantless arrest provision also applies to boat operators who have been involved in a crash and are suspected of being drunk.

• PA 491 — Gives judges the power to seize a vehicle for a first-time drunk driving arrest, a second impaired conviction within

seven years, three drunk driving convictions within 10 years or an alcohol conviction where a driver caused serious injury or death.

• PA 492 — Penalties pertaining to underage drinking or possession include fines of up to \$100 and/or 90 days in jail, as well as community service and substance abuse counseling for first-time offenders. Police can arrest minors

based on the results of a preliminary breath test, and a driver's license can be suspended or restricted after just one conviction.

• PA 493 — The owner of a vehicle used by a minor in the transporting of alcohol could have his or her car impounded for 15 to 30 days (if that person had knowledge of or gave consent to the use of the vehicle for transporting alcohol).

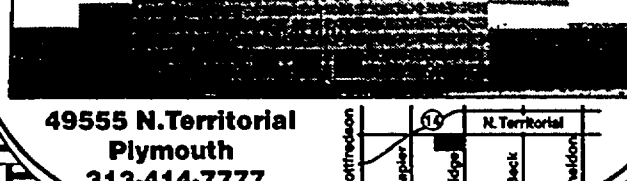

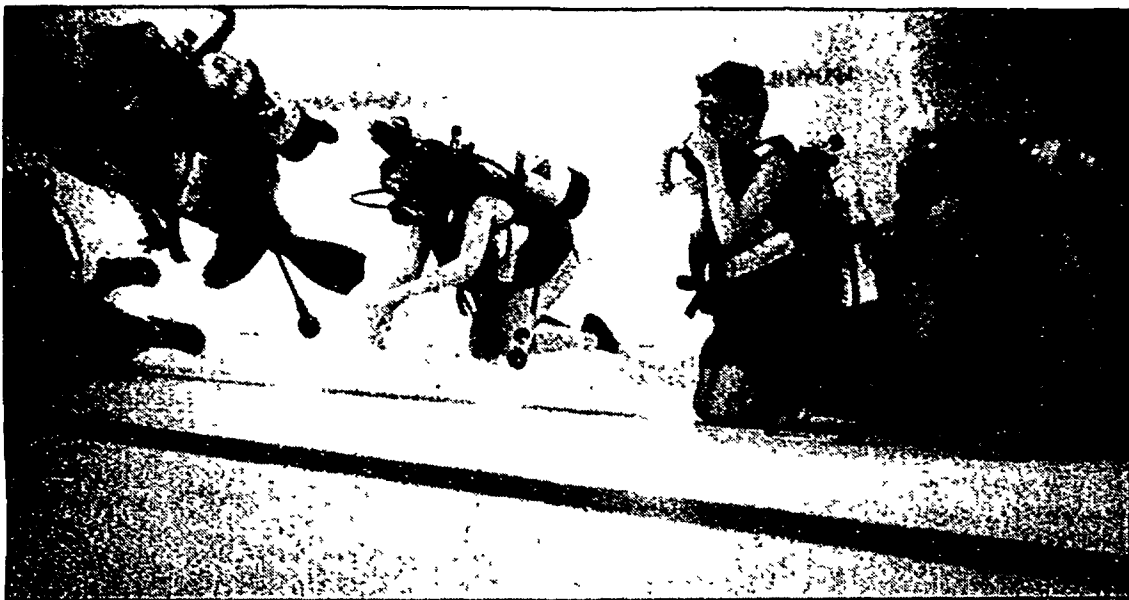

School board agrees to purchase portables

The Northville School District has finalized an agreement that will place three portable classroom units at the two local middle schools at the beginning of the 1997-98 school year.

The school board approved the lease/purchase of three portable classrooms within the next few weeks at a cost of more than \$90,000. School officials have awarded the contract to the R. J. Taylor Co., one of six companies bidding for the contract, according to Assistant Superintendent Dave Bolltho.

The proposal was tabled at the

March 10 meeting because board members wanted additional information on the lease/purchase agreement. At issue was whether the board wanted to purchase the units outright at a lower price, or pay more and spread the payments over a three year period.

"The leasing option is desired from a budget standpoint because we wouldn't have to pay in one lump sum," Bolltho explained.

Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said two double unit portables will be placed at Cooke Middle School, which has already exceeded its population limits.

The other portable, a single

classroom unit, will be used at Meads Mill.

The district has been planning for the purchase of portable units for some time.

"Even if we had been successful in (September's bond election) we still would have had to purchase these portables to be able to handle the student load at the two middle schools," Rezmierski said.

At the end of the three year lease, according to Bolltho, the district will own the portables.

The lease option will cost the district \$33,010 per unit per year, for a total of \$99,030.

HELP FOR FROZEN SHOULDER

The condition commonly known as frozen shoulder (adhesive capsulitis) is characterized by a shoulder that is so stiff and painful that it is impossible to move normally. The problem usually starts with a slight injury or a minor incidence of bursts or tendinitis which prevents use of the joint. Eventually, a vicious circle of stiffness, pain, and disuse may follow that leads to weakening of the tissues and loss of function of the shoulder. If left untreated, the condition may slowly progress to the point where the stiffened, immobile shoulder may show partial improvement, followed by no more feeling of pain, however, shoulder mobility may remain permanently impaired. For this reason, it is important to seek treatment when you think that frozen shoulder may be developing. The physical therapist can improve mobility with exercises, including those to preserve or increase the range of motion of the shoulder.

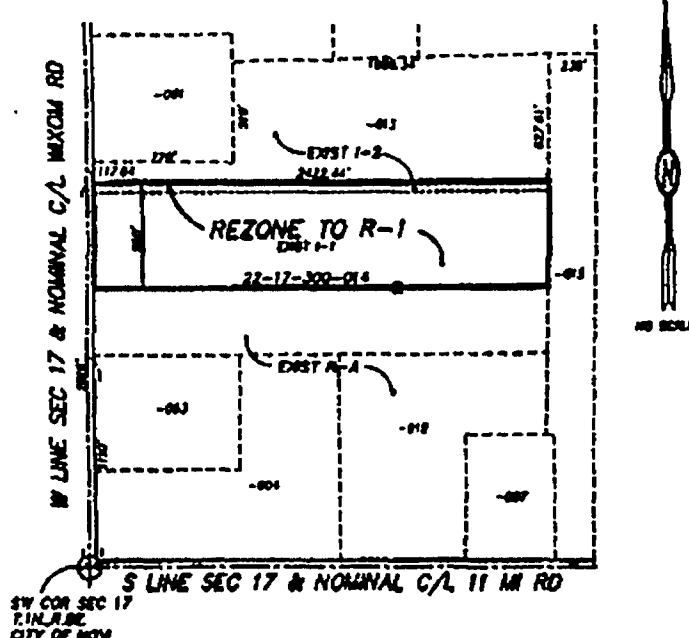

this issue, and I believe that it will benefit our kids and the community."

September's bond campaign did not feature any organized opposition but this time around detractors might actively oppose the bond.

Northville resident Don McCulloch, who recently criticized the board for bringing the issue back to the voters, is proposing an alternative strategy to that of the \$60 million-plus proposal.

The proposal would call for the district to construct a new middle school at an approximate cost of \$25-27 million and house ninth grade students at the Cooke Tech-

nology Center, which would be included as part of the high school campus.

The proposal also calls for classroom additions at Silver Springs, as well as funding for new technology.

McCulloch claims the proposal is designed to address the projected overcrowding at the middle and high school levels, and to facilitate the deployment of technology throughout the district.

"This alternative proposal will cost district homeowners about half as much as the rejected high school proposal," he explained. "It will maximize the chance for the successful implementation of ever-changing technology and will maximize the return on technology

dollars."

District officials maintain the proposal is flawed because it doesn't address issues relating to the high school.

The district would still be required to build a new high school, and the cost to taxpayers would be greater at that time, they claim.

The district will forward its bond proposal language to the state Department of the Treasury for approval within the next week, according to Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski.

Rezmierski added that community meetings are also being planned to allow for citizen comment and requests for information on the bond issue.

Block schedule adopted for coming year at NHS

The rotating block operates on a two-week cycle, according to the plan's outline. In week one, periods one through four will meet on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and periods five, six, seven, and a "seminar" will meet on Tuesday and Thursday.

In week two, periods one through four will meet on Tuesday and Thursday, and periods five through the seminar will meet on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

Each class is 86 minutes long and allows five minutes for passing between classes. The second period is 87 minutes long to allow for announcements.

The seminar period is considered an "on-task" period, according to school officials, where tutoring, homework, testing, music sectionals, college visitations, school appointments, state and national testing and assemblies, can occur.

The end result, school officials claim, is that students will have more options, and teachers will be able to have more collegial time for lesson planning and development. Officials also cited other advantages:

- With longer class periods, students will more easily experience "in-depth" learning and real world

applications of learning.

- Opportunities for extra help and enrichment through the seminar periods.

- Students will have time to learn and be evaluated in a variety of ways, promoting the mastery of knowledge by students with different learning styles.

- Lower student stress by cutting down the number of classes students have to prepare for each day, and provides for more time to complete homework assignments.

- Students and teachers will get to know and understand each other better as students see teachers for longer class periods and deal with fewer teachers each day.

- With fewer class changes per day, the school environment will be calmer.

Board member Tom Gudritz said the change reflects the courage of high school teachers willing to take risks.

"I am proud of the courage displayed by the high school staff, who are willing to try this new

approach," he said. "We expect the change to block scheduling will be successful and in the final analysis everyone involved believes it will benefit the kids."

Nield stressed that the block schedule will not result in any loss of "seat time" for students. "We have increased the length of the school day by five minutes to ensure that we didn't lose any seat time for students, and I think that is extremely important to point out," she said.

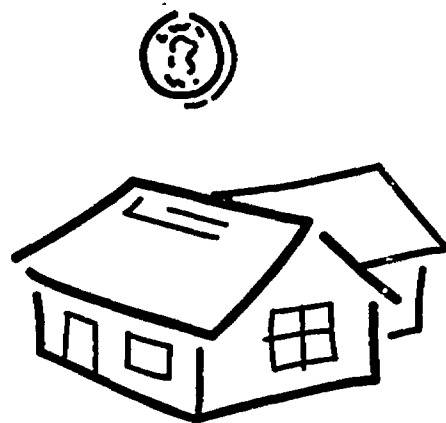

Bond proposal amount best left at original level

Northville Board of Education members must have been wearing their voter radar detectors Monday.

Wisely, the school board decided not to raise the ante on the bond request they'll place before the voting public June 9.

District trustees had considered increasing the amount of last September's proposal to cover increased construction costs since that time. District voters last fall turned down a request for \$61.5 million for a new high school and major renovations to other buildings.

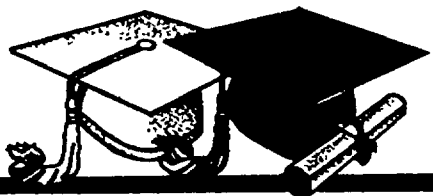
But instead of asking for authorization to sell even more revenue bonds, district officials trimmed their package and kept the dollar amount constant.

Good move. We felt the September 1996 plan was a solid one and we said as much in an editorial endorsement prior to the election.

But essential or not, the request necessitated a hike of approximately 3 mills per year, and taxpayers are not exactly in a giving mood.

We have reservations about placing the same request before voters a second time. The bond proposal's main components - a new high school and conversion of the existing high school into a middle school, major technology investments, classroom additions to Silver Springs Elementary, and improvements to the other school buildings - are all valid. But what has changed since September to swing the outcome the other way?

As a demonstration of responsiveness to voter concerns, school officials could have separated some or all of the proposal's main components and presented them as a multi-issue request.

Though risking confusion from a cumbersome ballot, "unbundling" the different aspects of the proposal would have contributed to the perception that school officials were offering voters a choice and a greater say in the future of their school system.

Proposal proponents told us that unbundling would have created an implied priority pyramid and consigned at least some of the requests to certain rejection at the polls.

We won't dispute the point.

All of the primary facets of the plan are necessary and there's no need to over-strategize. Just state your case and trust the voters to make the right call.

But bond supporters are going to have a tough enough time as it is trying to convince the public to say yes to something it turned down only months before.

Asking for even greater debt authorization would have virtually signed the proposal's death warrant.

We wish bond proponents luck in presenting their case throughout the upcoming campaign.

But nothing should be taken for granted, especially when you remember that roughly 70 percent of the households in the school district have no children attending the public schools.

building after assuming ownership.

Under consideration is an outright purchase of the building or acceptance of the structure as a gift from the state. The first option would involve an expense, of course, but would come with no strings attached. The second alternative would save money but would restrict usage of the building to some public purchase, such as a fire station.

At first blush, the gift route would seem to us the more desirable option, but township officials should be encouraged to continue pursuing all acquisition avenues.

The Fairweather building is a proven menace and if the state won't step up to its responsibilities in tearing it down, someone must. Fortunately, the township sees the hazard for what it is and is moving to do something about it.

Messenger's role is truly no-win

There's been something I've been wanting to say in a column to some Northville teachers and school officials for some time now, but everytime I broach the subject with my boss, Lee Snider, he cringes.

It has to do with a group of educators and officials - albeit a small group - that becomes almost rabid each time this newspaper is critical of the school district.

As soon as the newspaper hits the streets on Thursday the phone calls commence.

"Once again you show your anti-education bias with your slanted editorials and stories," the claims charge. "It's a wonder that this district is able to do anything positive because of your negative coverage."

I usually sit at my desk, phone cradled by my ear, patiently waiting for the tirade to come to some type of conclusion. Then I politely attempt to answer any questions, restate my opinions, thank the caller for his or her time, and proceed to the next call.

So now, close to two years after I agreed to take this job and paint a red bullseye on my back, I'm going to try to set some things straight.

First, however, I should let school officials in on a little secret. If you get real close I'll even whisper it to you - the newspaper isn't the cause of your problems.

That's right. We, the staff of *The Northville Record* - all three of us - don't have the time, energy, or inclination to wreak havoc on district employees or school children. Nor are we, single-handedly, capable of burning bridges with community volunteers, attempt-

ing to remove board members or the school superintendent, cause the failure of bond elections or change the votes of the membership of the local teachers union.

None. You folks don't need us to do that. You've done a fine job all on your own. All we do is report all of the happenings to the public - what they do with the information is up to them. That's how the system works.

It is the newspaper, however, that receives the anti-education moniker. Like it or not we are the community's messenger, and we all know what happens to the messenger who is the bearer of bad news.

It is a role I readily accept. I'm not complaining about it, but I would like to share a concept that seems to be truly foreign to some people.

Think about it. If we truly disliked teachers, if we were indeed anti-education, if we really didn't care, we wouldn't bother writing one word about our schools, teachers, administrators or board members.

In short, we would ignore their very existence. But we don't do that. We attend meetings, go into the schools, write about the teachers and students, and yes, voice our criticisms when they don't quite hit the mark.

For a profession that supposedly encourages critical thinking, I find it interesting that there is a rush to condemn those who are critical of public education.

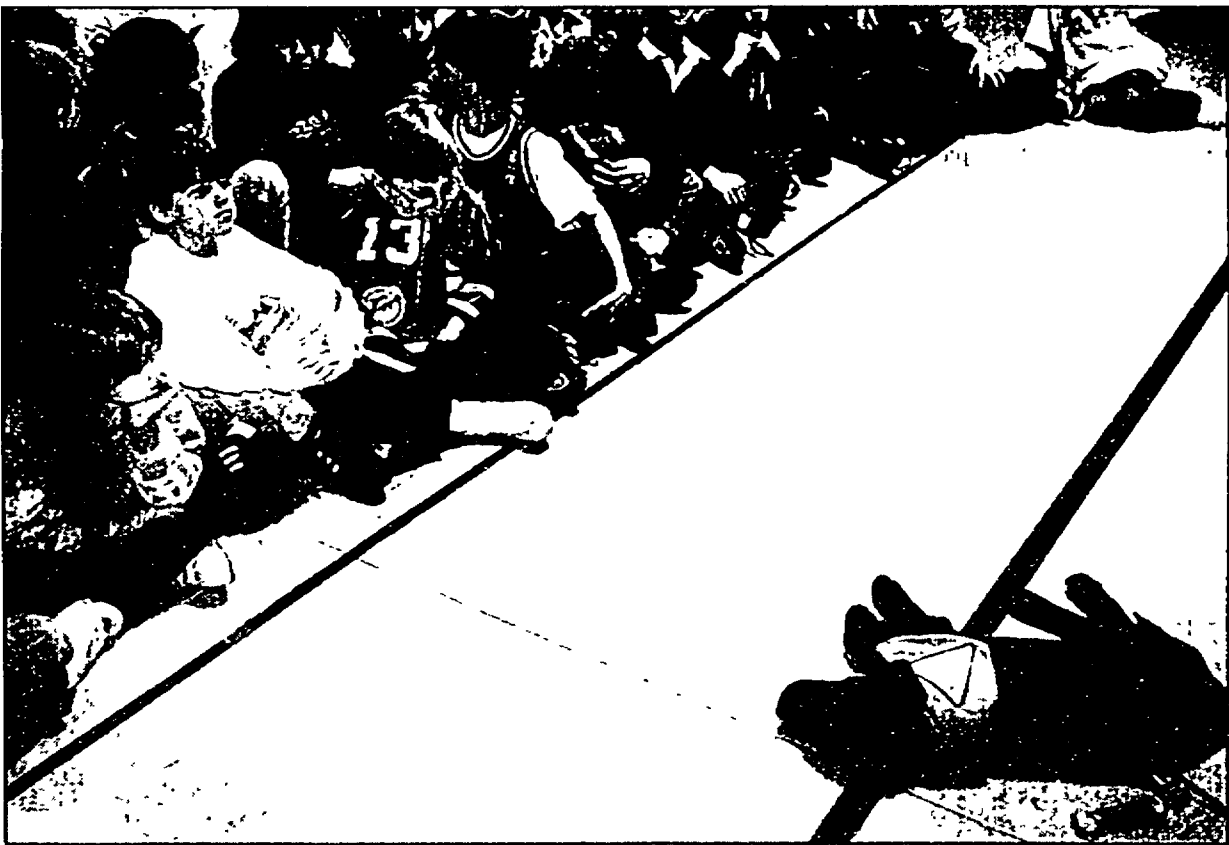
If "anti-education" means that I can't voice my ideas to help improve the education of students then so be it.

Obviously, the real reason for the Pinebrook alternative is simply a case of economics: it is far less costly for the developers to open up Pinebrook than it is to open up Edenderry with its wetland and steep embankment. Any other

A potential liability that seems to have been completely ignored is the fact that in 40 years there has not been a traffic related serious injury or a fatality on our streets and certainly there will now be greater risk to the residents of the older neighborhoods that will now be nothing other than throughways to heavy traffic.

There's still time to combat moths

To the editor:

I would like to emphasize a few points as a follow-up to *The Northville Record's* article a few weeks ago on gypsy moths.

The arrival of gypsy moths in our area should not discourage people from planting trees and shrubs.

Keep in mind that the only time gypsy moth caterpillars eat everything in sight is when their numbers become very high - hopefully we can work together to prevent this from happening here in our area.

By planting species that gypsy moth caterpillars don't prefer instead of their favorites such as oak and aspen, we can increase the likelihood of having plenty of healthy foliage in our yard.

Trees and shrubs at minimal risk to defoliation by gypsy moths are: ash, tulip tree (yellow poplar), sycamore (London plane tree), northern catalpa, honey locust, black locust, horsechestnut, dogwood, eastern redbud, juniper, yew, lilac, azalea, rhododendron, arbutus, viburnum, ginkgo, and magnolia.

Now is the time to look for and destroy gypsy moth egg cases. We have about a month left until they hatch - usually in early May.

Destroying the egg cases is a lot easier and more pleasant than dealing with the thousands of caterpillars once they hatch (you can do this by trapping them in carrier bands placed on tree trunks or by spraying the young caterpillars with soap solution - 1-2 ounces of hand soap per gallon of water).

So look now for the soft, light-brown mounds that the females attach to tree trunks and branches and other flat surfaces (I found lots on our shed and our lawn furniture).

Remember, you can't just scrape them off onto the ground, they have to be destroyed by burning or burying them.

Gypsy moths are not the same thing as tent caterpillars.

They do not make webs in the branches of trees as do tent caterpillars, and they do a lot more damage.

We will need to pay attention to gypsy moths on an ongoing basis. If you don't find any in your yard this spring or summer, don't assume that you have escaped the problem.

Their populations can take years to build up before they crash.

After you have destroyed egg masses you should call Northville Township at 348-5800, as they are trying to keep track of gypsy moth numbers in our area.

Mill Race Matters

Members of the Northville Historical Society are once again planning a progressive dinner. This year's event is planned for late spring or early summer. Details will be provided as they become available.

Those who have attended this event in previous years will recall that the organization arranges sit-down dinners in several homes in the community, following an opportunity to join for appetizers in a first home and another chance to mingle with another group in a third home for dessert at the conclusion of the meal.

Each participant brings a dish to share in one of the homes, specified by menu, and pays for his or her share of the main meat dish as well as the beverages for the evening. Although the event raises a minimal amount of money, it is used primarily as an opportunity for members of the community to mingle and socialize.

Also coming this summer will be the annual Mill Race Village auction. This year the event will be scheduled as part of the Fourth of July celebration. Donations for the auction are now being accepted. Call 348-1845 for donation information.

Both events have been held previously, but this year the timeframe of each has been altered to generate renewed interest on the part of members and the community. Both have been successful in the past, and hopefully will prove to be again.

For the past two weeks, this column has highlighted community organizations of the past, some of which have continued to the present. Numerous other organizations have played a significant role in the history of the community. One of them is, of course, the sponsor of this column, the Northville Historical Society.

The Historical Society originated over 30 years ago. A group of active community residents became concerned about the changes being made in Northville early in the 1960s. Much of the concern sprang from plans at that time to demolish the Northville Library building and replace it with a shopping mall, today's MAGS building.

Leading the move to save the building were members of the Northville Woman's Club. Several individuals met and determined to establish an organization to work on preserving the community's history. That group eventually divided into the Northville Historical Society, a volunteer non-profit organization, and the Historic District Commission, a branch of city government.

The Historical Society began by visiting other such organizations and becoming involved in regional history. Members held regular meetings and heard speakers who discussed historical topics.

By the early 1970s they had begun to stage Tivoli Fair, an arts and crafts show, to fund their efforts at preserving community history. They also began to co-sponsor their Historic Home Tours with the Northville Presbyterian Church.

At the same time, the group and the city decided that a public site for the relocation of buildings would be appropriate. In 1972, under the leadership of Mayor Mike Allen, the community negotiated with Ford Motor Co. for the donation of land for the establishment of Mill Race Village.

The Northville Historical Society was asked by the city to take over responsibility of maintaining the village location. Over the past 25 years the group has overseen the move to and/or the construction of 11 buildings.

The group has continued to stage fund-

raising events to repair and maintain the site and the structures. It has also furnished and decorated all of the structures to represent different portions of the Victorian era during which the village of Northville developed.

While creating and maintaining Mill Race Village the Historical Society has continued to collect memorabilia for the community's history and has developed an Archive for those doing historic or genealogical research on the area.

The *Mill Race Quarterly* began publishing in 1974, and for 23 years has provided not only Historical Society information, but a variety of articles on the history of the region.

In addition to maintaining the village structures and the community history, the organization has developed the Mill Race Village site as one of the community's leading public park facilities while making the grounds available for a number of private events as well. In part, this has been made possible by the assistance of numerous other community groups such as the local Boy and Girl Scouts and area garden clubs.

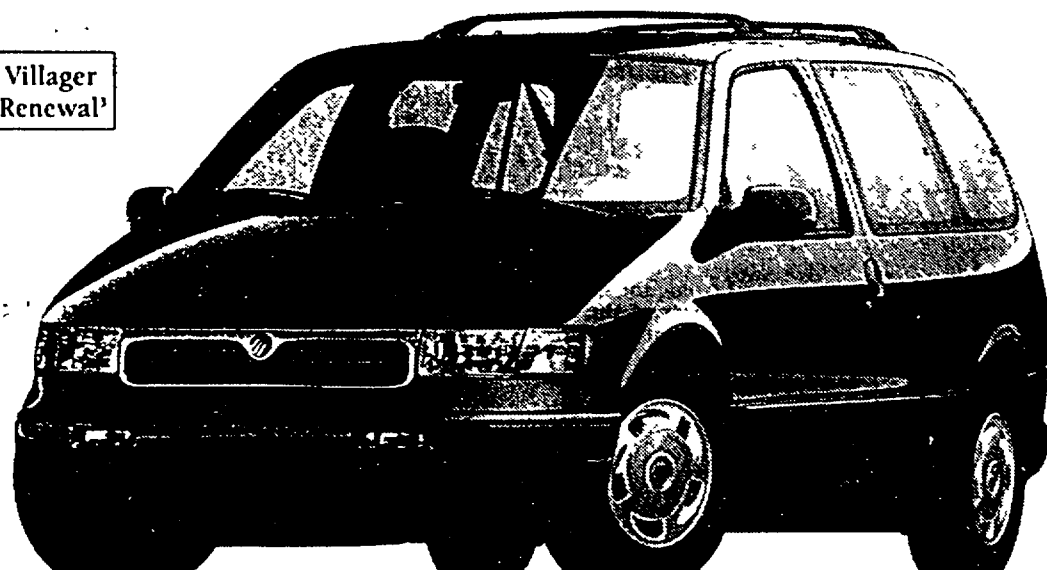

Casino's opening is not exactly grand

Casino gambling has become a reality in downtown Northville.

The "Victorian Casino and Resort" opened its doors yesterday amid protests from community and business leaders.

A joint venture between entertainment magnate Bob Seaman and restaurateur Tom MacKinnon, the 10,000 square foot facility was mobbed by gamblers and protesters on its first day of operation.

"It's a sad, sad day for Northville," Mayor Chris Johnson said. "This is not the kind of development this city needs or wants."

The casino opened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at 6 p.m. By 6:30, gamblers had completely filled the old Ford Valve Plant's basement, now converted into a casino.

"I won, I won," screamed Gina Mathews, the casino's first slot machine winner. The longtime Northville resident netted close to \$2,000.

Mathews' screams were but a faint cry to an angry crowd of protesters. Mockingly chanting, "show us the money," the group, led by community activist Busy O'Body, tried to block the doors.

But Northville officers, who were aided by the Michigan State Police, removed the protesters.

Seaman, a co-owner of the old Ford building which already housed his batting cage business, a gymnastic center and health

club, said the protesters didn't take away from the casino's opening.

"I want this building to be the top entertainment facility in metropolitan Detroit," he commented. "Tom and I feel we've created a world class complex."

Construction of the resort area is still ongoing.

Ground breaking at what was formerly Ford Athletic Field began a year ago. A 500-room hotel, which will be operated by the owners of Las Vegas' Caesar's Palace, is planned to open in about two months.

MacKinnon's new restaurant will be a main feature of the hotel. The current Main Street facility will close when "MacKinnon's II" opens.

"We'll be serving most of our old favorites plus expanding our menu," MacKinnon said.

The Victorian Casino is expected to generate \$100 million in revenue in its first year. Business owners don't think much of it will trickle into their pockets, however.

"Traffic around town is sure going to increase," said one owner who wished to remain anonymous. "But I don't think the kind of people that'll be coming in will buy much of my merchandise."

"The only people who are going to get rich are the owners," said another business operator. "This stinks."

Mayor Johnson agreed. "Our resources will be stretched beyond their limits," he added.

Teen body mutilation carries big price tag

Conservative elements of the community are protesting Northville Township's newest business, set to open in the Highland Lakes Shopping Center April 1, 1997.

"Drawn 2 U" is described by its owner as a "total body redesign facility," but parents say it's really nothing more than a glorified tattoo parlor and body piercing salon.

"I don't want my daughter's big toes pierced," growled resident Phyllis Shifly. "I hear that's what they do at this place. There's no telling what else will go on there."

Shifly and other parents brought their complaints about the new store to a Northville Township Board of Trustees meeting last week. They warned of dire consequences to the community if teenagers start walking around with rings in their lower lips and images of slithering snakes permanently stamped on their backsides.

"I've seen what those guests on 'Jenny Jones' look like," parent Terry Stalwell warned. "One had scutes from the Kama Sutra tattooed on his shins. That's probably what my son's going to end up with. These kids don't realize what it means to do something you can't reverse."

Drawn 2 U owner Sunshine Bliss attended the meeting and defended her establishment to concerned parents.

"We've got taste," she insisted. "We don't paint dirty pictures on kids. The most we'd ever do was something from 'Private Parts.'"

Despite her reassurances, Bliss

caused a new uproar when she disclosed that NBA badboy Dennis Rodman would be signing copies of his new book, *You Said It, Mutha*, at the grand opening of Drawn 2 U.

She said there were plans to make the event a combined ribbon cutting ceremony and bridal fashion show.

"Dennis is a fine role model," Bliss emphasized as a collective gasp went up from the audience. "The last I heard his hair was a beautiful Chartreuse and his agent promised me he's given up groin kicking for good."

Far from being placated, the angry parents grew more vocal in their denunciations of the new business. One parent brought the hostility to a fever pitch when she began ticking off items from the store's selection menu.

- Barbed wire ankle bracelet tattoos - \$25 apiece;
- Elbow piercing - \$50;
- Skull-and-crossbone forehead etchings - \$150;
- Frankenstein neck bolt installations - \$225;
- Shaquille O'Neil growth hormones - \$75 for a two-week supply;
- Book titles, including *How to Talk to Your Parents* by Dr. Hannibal Lecter.

Members of the township board said they sympathized with the residents but could do nothing to keep the store from opening.

"They've met all the zoning requirements," Supervisor Karen Woodside said. "Besides, I really want Dennis Rodman's autograph."

Councilman is key during expo rampage

The Northville Business Expo was the scene of a near riot last week when a man dressed in a clown costume began throwing cream pies at people as they made their way through the exposition hall.

Northville police were able to restore order within minutes and arrested the clown, who turned out to be Northville City Councilman Chuck Keys.

According to police, Keys was dressed as Chuckles the Clown and had been handing out balloons and party horns to expo guests. Midway through the expo, Keys apparently snapped and began squirting women with a fake lapel flower he was wearing.

"Witnesses said he began squirting people, and was shouting, 'I want to be a kid again, I want to be a kid again,'" Police Chief Rod Cannon said. "Then he began chanting. That's when people really started to get nervous."

Cannon said that Keys then reached into a big burlap sack nearby.

"My guys were just getting ready to slap the cuffs on him, and all of a sudden he pulls out a bunch of cream pies," Cannon said. "The first pie hit one of my officers, who dove to the ground immediately."

Pandemonium followed as Keys began hurling the tasty treats at horrified on-lookers.

"It was terrible, I'll never be able to look at another pie in my entire life," said a still frantic Laurie

Marrs, the director of the local chamber of commerce. "I can still picture that poor officer getting hit in the face by that first pie. It was a horrible sight."

The officer, Sgt. Jim Marks, was listed in good condition at nearby Providence Hospital. He suffered an injury to the eye that was caused by the aluminum pie plate.

The other officer, Detective Dave Fendelet, managed to duck behind a table to escape being hit by the deranged prankster. Fendelet said the situation was the worst he's seen in his 18 years as a Northville officer.

"You read about these things happening but you never believe they'd happen right here in your own backyard," Fendelet said. "I was lucky. If I had been three feet

closer I would be the one lying in that hospital bed."

Fendelet was able to apprehend Keys moments later when he began chasing City Manager Gary Word through the building. Word had tried to talk Keys into stopping his pie attack when the chase ensued.

"You just never know about people," Word said later. "All this time I thought Chuck was in complete control of his faculties, but I guess I was wrong."

Fendelet finally was able to wrestle Keys to the ground and make the arrest. Keys was booked and held at the city jail on \$100 bond. His pretrial examination in court is expected to be held April 1.

Park supervisor honored

Anna Sylvester was presented with the Northville-Novati branch of the American Association of University Women's 1997 Community Enrichment Award at the group's spring meeting held March 11.

Sylvester, the Maybury State Park supervisor, was recognized for promoting the education of girls and women in the fields of math, science, and the environment.

The award acknowledges people who have a current or historical impact on the community and who reflect AAUW's goals of promoting equity for women and girls, lifelong education, and positive societal change.

Sylvester came to Maybury in 1990 as the assistant manager. She had spent summers working at Island Lake Recreation Area while attending Michigan State University where she earned a bachelor of science degree in agriculture.

After college, she worked at Island Lake, Pinckney Recreation Area, before becoming the assistant manager of the Mitchell State Park in Cadillac, the position she held prior to coming to Northville.

Once at Maybury, Sylvester developed the learning program Partners in Education along with

the Northville School District. Partners in Education allows fourth graders to spend a day in the park with Sylvester learning about ecology and nature preservation through outdoor activities and hands-on projects.

When Sylvester was almost transferred to Escanaba during the 1992 reorganization of the state Department of Natural Resources the students and teachers involved in the Partners in Education program mounted a successful letter-writing campaign to keep her at Maybury.

Besides her involvement with Partners in Education, Sylvester acts as the parent committee member on the Northville Middle School Science Materials Selection Committee. Her contributions include helping to revise the curriculum by combining earth science, life science, and physics into one class to be taught in three one-year sections, rather than three separate one-year courses.

"She is conscious of the issues surrounding classroom bias, and works both to make science and math of greater interest to girls and to make teachers aware of how the girls' interests are manifested," Community Enrichment

Awards Committee member Christa Coxon said.

In 1995, Sylvester was saluted for her evening program "Becoming an Outdoors Woman" by the Law Enforcement Division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Sylvester also makes education presentations to Girl Scout troops, routinely sponsors a girl on "Take Your Daughter to Work Day," and actively recruits and mentors female interns who are working to be park rangers.

She helps with the AAUW Northville-Novati branch's annual Excited about Science and Math workshops for girls that are held at Maybury.

"As one of very few female park supervisors in the state, Sylvester provides our community with a rare role model," Coxon said. "Combined with her expertise in the sciences and park management, her concern for environmental protection and her strong interest in promoting education for women and girls, Sylvester's mentorship of youngsters exemplifies the spirit behind the Community Enrichment Award."

The center will be staffed by trained volunteers during the week. The volunteers will take telephone questions and try to arrange

Among the 19 perspective volunteers who gathered at Genitti's Hole-in-the-Wall for an all-day information and training session on Feb. 28 were Northville residents AnnaMary Postma, Margaret Gill, Hazel Coon, Ethel Ogilvie and Marie Barr. Another training day is scheduled for April 11.

Volunteers are taught how to talk to callers and how to be empathetic listeners.

"We have almost 400 volunteers in Arbor Hospice alone," Peltz said. "Our nucleus in Northville will probably be about 30 to 35."

The Director of Adult Bereavement at the new center, Kathy Clough, has 11 years experience. Sally Dunning, ACSW, is the director of children's services.

Adult services are offered free of charge. Children's individual coun-

selling is provided by certified social workers and scholarships are available.

"Laughing on the Outside," a comedy showcase to benefit the center, will be held on Sunday, April 13, at Genitti's Hole-in-the-Wall, 108 E. Main Street in Northville. There will be two seatings, 5:30 and 6:45 p.m.

Residents exhibit at show

The 1997 Ann Arbor Flower and Garden Show has among its exhibitors Northville residents Pen-rith Goff, Joan Doty and Winnie Boni and Novi resident Marcia Stewart as well students who attend Garden City's Burger School for the Autistic which includes Northville residents.

The Burger School students developed their flower show project entitled "Sunny Day Fun" based on their vision of what a summer day is like in the garden, according to Mary Mirabitar, a Northville resident and one of the 30 teachers who worked on the project with the students.

Goff, the president of the Southeastern Michigan Bromeliad Society, will display the use of bromeliads in home decorating - wreaths, bouquets, hanging baskets, mounted plants, etc.

"The society has exhibited every year since the show started," Goff said. "We intend to keep on doing it."

Bromeliads are a family of plants originally found only in the southern United States, and Central and South America. The most familiar is the pineapple. Another is the Spanish moss which grows on the branches of trees.

Although the flowers themselves are often uninteresting and short-lived, the change in coloration of the plant can last for weeks, even months. They are becoming popular in commercial interior decorating because they are exotic, rugged and can endure low light levels.

Doty, exhibiting in the Roots and Shoots category, is developing a

creative dried arrangement in a niche 4-foot-by-4 feet and 30 inches deep using dried cholla cacti from Arizona. The background of the niche will be painted spring green. Wisteria will be incorporated to give the appearance of roots.

"I'm kind of formulating this design using a tall green dried pencil cacti I picked up in New Orleans," said Doty, who has exhibited in all but the first Ann Arbor Flower and Garden Show and is a member of the Livonia Garden Club.

Last year Doty won the creativity award for best creative design in the flower show and the traveling trophy for the best design depicting the theme of the show, which is offered by the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan.

The theme of this year's show is "An American Bouquet."

Stewart, who usually exhibits or judges every year, will exhibit a pot of blue hyacinths in the horticulture category.

She has planted and timed the pot of bulbs which will hopefully peak at the time of the show.

"Most of the time it has worked for me," said Stewart, a member of the Hill and Dale Garden Club in Farmington.

"It is a really interesting show for people to come to," Stewart added. "It really gets you in the mood for spring and gardening and getting outdoors again."

The show will celebrate great American gardens, from a Martha's Vineyard seaside retreat to the sunny hills of California. The eighth annual program will showcase the best new garden styles, and the latest in horticulture and

landscape design.

The featured 2,600-square-foot garden this year, "The New American Garden," is inspired by the work of renowned American architect Frank Lloyd Wright. Other influences are Jens Jensen, hailed as the dean of American landscape architecture, and 20th century landscape designers Wolfgang Oehme and James van Sweden.

The show will also feature more than 500 displays and exhibits.

Sponsored by the University of Michigan, show dates and times are Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 3, 4 and 5, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Sunday, April 6, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Senior Days are Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

"That's where I really saw it's a way of life. It's not something you do for an hour on Sunday," she said.

Unity was co-founded in 1889 by Charles and Myrtle Fillmore in Kansas City, Mo. and is built on the belief in the healing power of affirmative prayer. Myrtle was healed of terminal tuberculosis after praying for perfect health for two years.

Charles was healed of injuries received in childhood after using the same type of prayer. Unity supports the medical community and still believes in people getting help in every way they can.

"We are very loving when someone is sick and we believe we have some responsibility for getting well," she said. "It sounds like a paradox but it isn't."

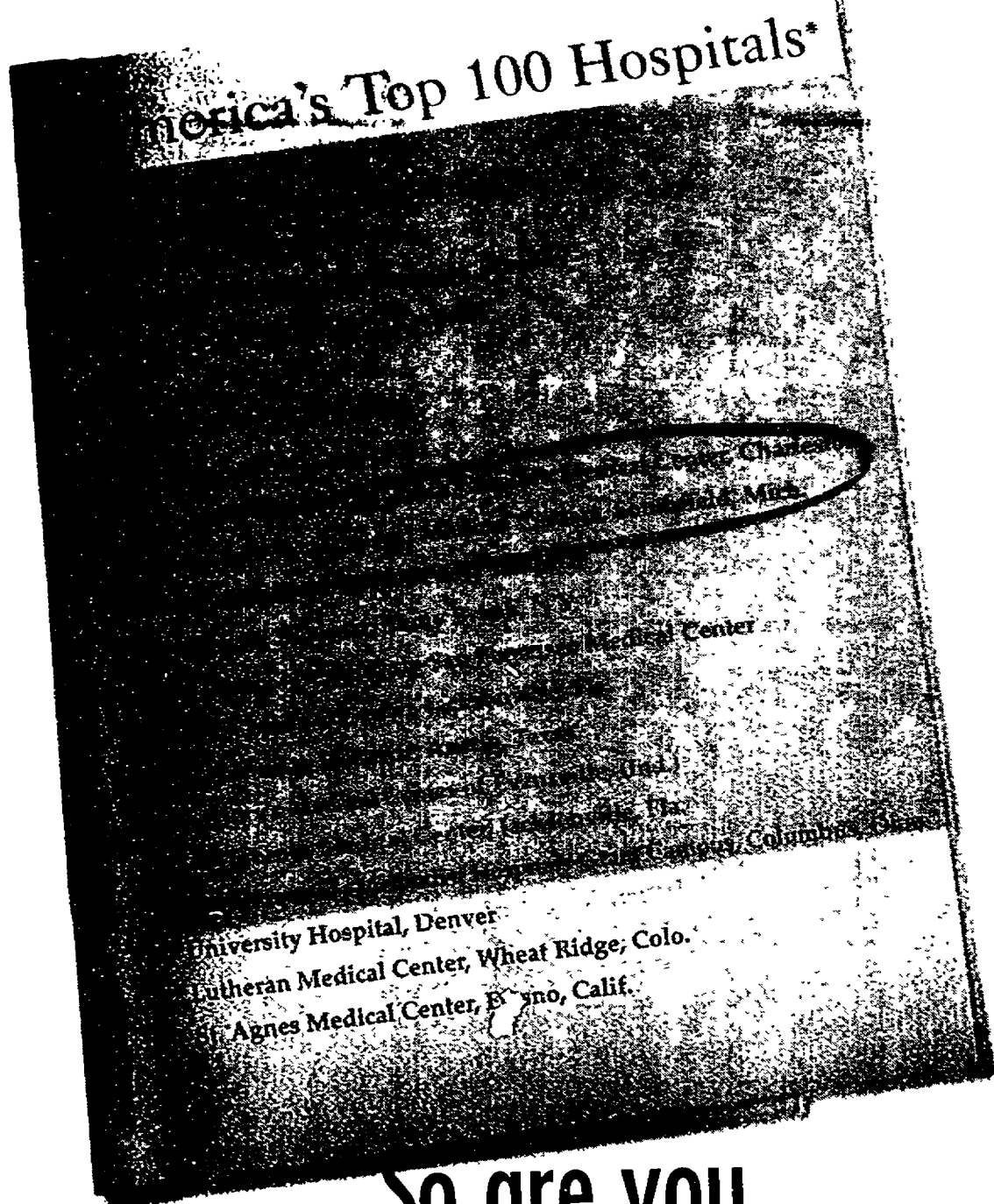

Ghost takes brother's team from worst to first

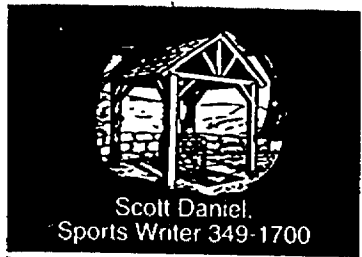

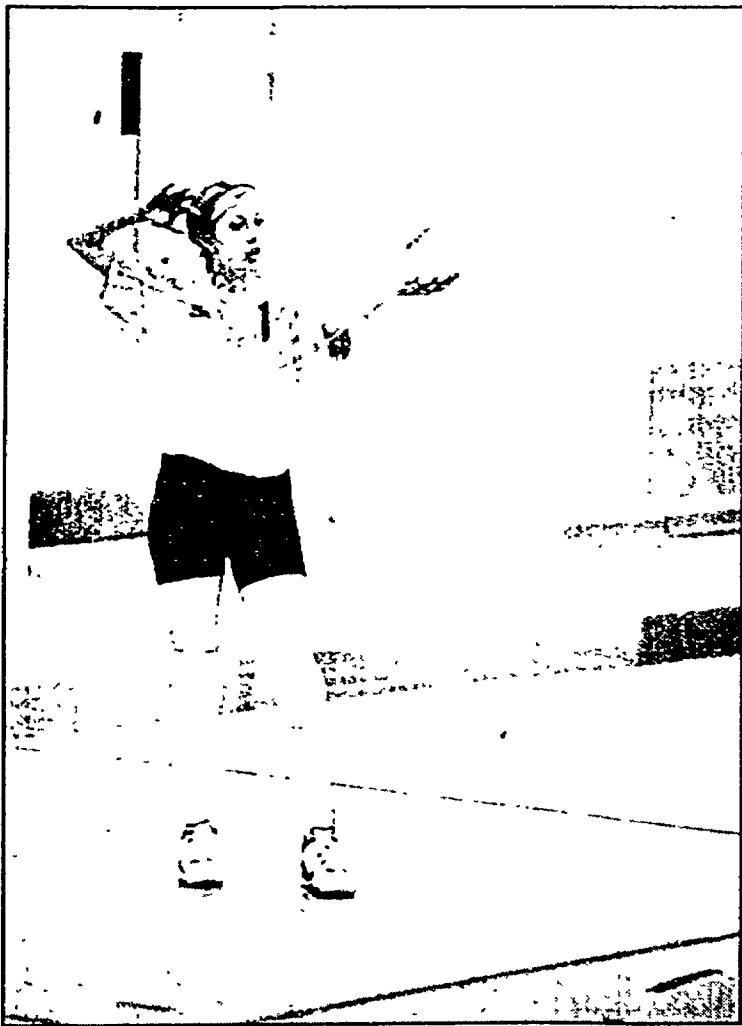

Staying strong and flexible will help your balance and your overall golf game.

Tips for injury-free golf season

The weather is warming, the golf courses are getting ready, soon thousands of people will be teeing it up on courses all over Michigan. You may have read golf books, watched tournaments on television, been part of the new attendance record of over 40,000 at the Novi golf show or even hit a few buckets of golf balls at a local golf dome, but is that enough physical preparation? Dennis Preebe, local golf pro and personal trainer, says probably not.

Preebe owns Golf Etc., a local golf training company that combines golf instruction with golf specific physical conditioning for a complete approach to the game. He has designed programs for individual clients from celebrities to the physically challenged, beginners to pros, since 1975, and has currently formed a joint venture with the Water Wheel Health Club in Northville for individual and group sessions.

Preebe says, "Most golfers think preparing for the season and planning better is the result of beating more golf balls. Actually, the oppo-

sition is true, hitting golf balls with your current swing can only make it tougher. Others think the answer is in the latest equipment. The secret is - there is no secret.

"The touring pros all swing differently and all use different equipment. The one attribute they all have in common is balance. Balance comes from being flexible, strong and understanding how your body works while playing a particular sport. Your body will seek to maintain its balance. Your body doesn't care if you hit the ball or where it goes. Improving your balance throughout your game will let you play your best and be more consistent."

Since the key ingredient is to improve your balance, and ultimately your swing and game, here are some preseason tips for an injury-free, improved golf season.

• Year round conditioning - every golfer is at different skill levels, but to help avoid back and shoulder injuries and to get the most out of your season even the Sunday golfer needs to look at conditioning. Types of conditioning

include:

• Flexibility - stretching is key. There are specific golf stretches but even basic stretching helps. Never bounce during the stretch and hold the stretch for 15 to 30 seconds each.

• Cardiovascular conditioning - it is very important to maintain some level of cardiovascular conditioning. Walk, treadmill, swim or jog - three to four times a week, 20-30 minutes while maintaining your target heart rate. (Check with a fitness professional or physician to determine your specific heart rate range.)

• Strength - shoulder and back injuries have become common in the game, Preebe states. "A certain amount of injury is more problematic in the game due to the specific movement of the body, but being stronger and in better overall physical shape minimizes your risk."

Look to some weight training to strengthen the muscles. Depending on how serious you are, you may investigate golf specific training programs. Basketball players

train differently than football players. Golfers should train for golf.

• Maintain your bodyweight - "There are golfers of all sizes and weight, some very good. But your body has to compensate for the weight factor," Dennis says. Carrying a lot of extra weight is just one more marginal factor in your game.

Combining these conditioning factors with practice and professional golf instruction are vital ingredients to overall preparation.

There is a lot to do for your game with a short time left before you head to the course. By placing as many of these positive factors in your favor, the better your odds for a safe, fun, long season. Good luck.

All foods can fit into a healthful diet

It is hard to describe the eating styles of ordinary Americans without contradicting oneself.

On the one hand, statistic after statistic shows that Americans seem to be obsessed with eating right: Each year, an estimated \$33 billion is spent on diet books, over-the-counter medications, health club memberships and low-calorie foods.

On the other hand, survey after survey in recent years consistently reveals that only about 30 percent of Americans are doing what they can to eat healthfully.

Why? A recent national survey conducted by The American Dietetic Association found that perceived obstacles of taste, time and confusion about nutrition information are deterring most Americans from achieving a healthful eating style.

The slogan for the 1997 National Nutrition Month campaign will help consumers learn that "all foods can fit" into a healthful diet and that enjoying a variety of foods encourages lifelong, healthful eating habits. Thousands of local and national groups, private companies and public agencies are expected to host activities to reach the public in all 50 states with the campaign's messages.

For the first time, ADA and Dietitians of Canada are joining forces during National Nutrition Month to reach the public with a common message. All across Canada, con-

sumers will learn how "all foods can fit" into a healthful eating style.

So what constitutes a "healthy" diet? Contrary to popular belief, the healthiest diet isn't necessarily 100 percent fat free, or sugar free, or low sodium. A "healthy" diet is one that is based on three important principles: balance, variety and moderation.

A balanced diet is one that does not exclude any one particular food group. The "food guide pyramid" is an excellent guide to daily food choices. Each of the food groups provide some, but not all, of the 40 or more nutrients needed for good health. Foods in one group cannot replace those in another. In other words, no one food group is more important than another. To ensure adequate nutrition for good health, you need to incorporate them all.

Variety is simple: It's including a wide assortment of foods in your diet. Balancing out a variety of selections during the course of a day or week, with an emphasis on grain-based dishes and fruits and vegetables, can lead to an overall healthful eating pattern.

Moderation is something many Americans often ignore. Webster defines the word "moderate" as "observing reasonable limits."

Moderation is the key to making all foods a part of healthful eating. It doesn't mean you give up certain foods. It means setting limits on how much and how often.

A healthful eating pattern is not created or destroyed by one meal or one food. It is the overall pattern of food intake and choices over time that are important.

There are times when you feel the need to indulge on certain foods, such as a candy bar or gooey pizza. If you go a bit overboard with high-fat food, balance your diet with a variety of grain foods, fruits and vegetables and other

lower fat choices from the base of the "food guide pyramid" during the next day or two.

By following these basic guidelines, consumers can eat right and stay physically active while reducing their risk of nutrition-related diseases such as diabetes, cardiovascular disease and certain cancers:

• Be realistic. Make small gradual changes to your eating pattern and level of physical activity. Small steps work better than giant leaps.

• Be adventurous. Expand your food repertoire to include a variety of foods.

• Be flexible. Go ahead and balance what you eat and your physical activity over several days. No need to worry about just one meal or one day. And, physical activity doesn't just have to be done in one big burst - small increments of activity can add up to a physically active lifestyle.

• Be sensible. Enjoy all foods, just don't overdo it.

• Be active. Walk the dog, don't just watch the dog walk.

**Proposed legislation
could benefit consumers**

Finally, a major problem that has been needlessly costing homeowners a lot of money for decades is being corrected; at least a new corrective law is in the works and has an excellent chance of being enacted.

The Home Owners Protection act of 1997 (Senate Bill 318) would require lenders to notify consumers of their right to cancel the private mortgage insurance once their home's equity exceeds 20 percent of the original purchase price of the property. Such a law seems to be obviously fair and beneficial for the homeowner, but some real estate professionals are expressing concern.

As it now stands, lenders usually require home buyers to purchase PMI to obtain conventional home loans covering more than 80 percent of the purchase price. In most cases, a portion of the PMI premium is paid up front at closing, and the remainder is amortized and included with the monthly mortgage payments.

The rationale behind the requirement is that a homeowner with a relatively small amount of equity (less than 20 percent of the property's value) is more prone to

default on the loan - resulting in a foreclosure - than homeowners with more than 20 percent of the purchase price invested in their home.

As a result, the buyer making a lower down payment represents a greater risk to the lender, thus necessitating a requirement for mortgage insurance.

The extra cost for that insurance is justified. But the problem surfaces when the loan is amortized (paid) down to the point where it's less than 80 percent of the home's value. At that point, the coverage and monthly premium payments should stop. But in many cases the lender keeps collecting the extra payments, as long as the borrower doesn't object.

More than half of all home buyers who make down payments of less than 20 percent carry private mortgage insurance, while the remainder of the "low down payment market" is served by government housing finance programs, according to a recent report from the National Association of Realtors. Typically, the PMI monthly premium cost ranges from \$35 to \$100 per month.

The new law would require

Tundra has room to grow

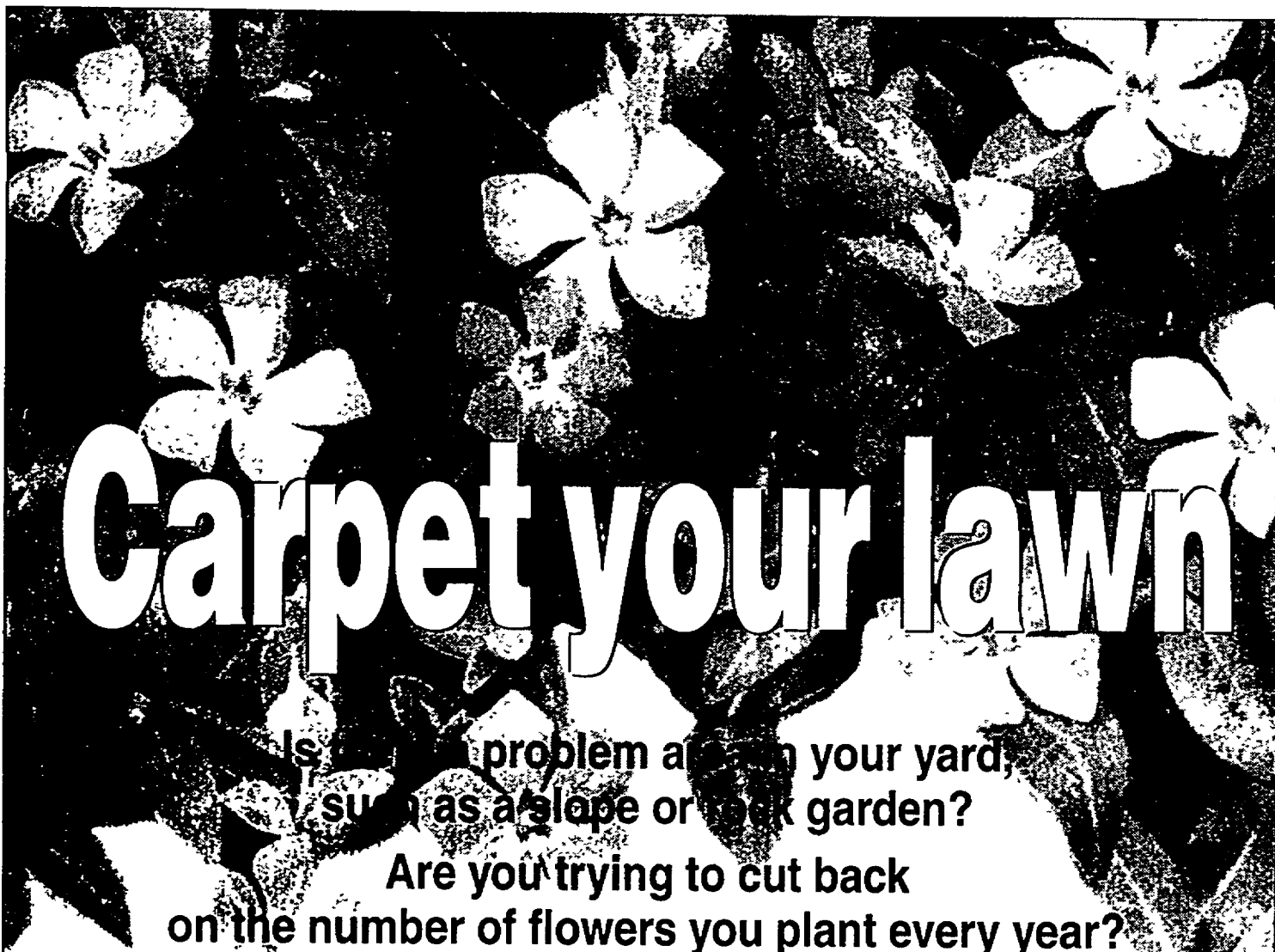
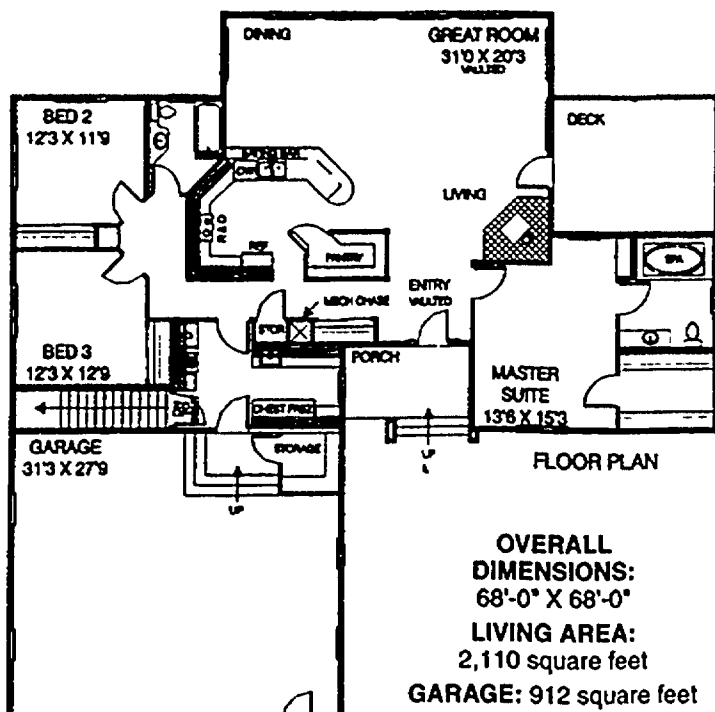

Is there a problem area in your yard, such as a slope or rock garden? Are you trying to cut back on the number of flowers you plant every year? Ground cover plants may be something to look into this spring.

It's safe to start planting ground cover after Mother's Day or after the last full moon in May, according to Norma LaFever of Dinser's Greenhouse and Flowers in Novi.

To determine the number of plants needed, measure the area to be covered. Ground cover can be planted every six to 12 inches.

"It spreads and fills in pretty good," LaFever said. "People always over buy."

Depending on the type of ground cover, it will take about two years for the cover to fill in if it is planted every 12 inches in a zigzag pattern, according to LaFever.

"Phlox and myrtle fill in pretty quick and will eventually choke everything out," she said.

The area should be as free from grass and weeds as possible. Annuals can be added to the ground cover if desired and hostas are often used as a background. However, it's best to plant ground cover where there will not be other flowers. Ground covers are perennials.

Shade-loving ground covers include myrtle, snow on the mountain, Baltic and Thorndale ivies, silver mound (part sun), and hostas.

Some ground covers which do well in the full sun include phlox, dragon's blood, bugle weed and vinca.

Some ground covers will throw a flower like hostas and snow on the mountains. Others have variegated leaves. Dragon's blood has a rose colored leaf and flower.

All ground covers need a little bit of light and the soil should be light-to-medium. A mixture of peat and perlite with a little bit of soil mixed in is a good blend for ground cover, according to LaFever. If you

have clay, break it up with peat and good soil.

Ground covers like snow on the mountain and hostas are more high-maintenance than bugle weed, candy tuft and phloxes because they have to be trimmed.

For steep slopes, bugle weed, candy tuft, and phloxes are good choices.

To divide ground covers, take a shovelful and move to the new area. Keep it watered well for the first week.

"Make sure, especially in a rock garden, that the soil is well drained," LaFever said. Ground cover doesn't like to be soggy.

"You can rot the roots pretty easy," she said.

"Some ground covers will throw a flower like hostas and snow on the mountains," she added. Others have variegated leaves. Dragon's blood has a rose colored leaf and flower.

Snow on the mountain is a good ground cover for planting under trees, as are hostas and lilies of the valley. Ivies and myrtles are mainly low growing, close-to-the-ground plants.

Fertilizers for ground covers include liquid fertilizers diluted at one teaspoon for every gallon of water, which can be used at every watering, and Osmocote, a granule fertilizer, which is sprinkled around in the bed.

Spring is tulip season

A symbol of prestige and wealth in ancient days, tulips are still a favorite flower of many.

Help keep cut tulips fresh by placing bouquets out of direct sunlight, heat and drafts. Cut flowers last longer when you give them a fresh cut every other day (one inch diagonally above the last cut) and add fresh water daily.

When the dark, dreary days of winter last longer than you wish, and a little cheer is badly needed, bring home potted bulbs from a garden center or supermarket. If you didn't pot bulbs in the autumn to force into late-winter bloom. If you didn't get bulbs planted into the garden last fall, buy blooming tulips now and simply pop them in the ground to add a dash of color to a dull garden spot.

Potted flowers last longer than cut flowers. If they start growing leggy or crooked, stake flowers upright and tie. Forced tulip bulbs can be saved for replanting outdoors next fall.

completely and let the soil dry. Cut off stalks, remove bulbs from containers and store the bulbs in a cool, dark, dry place until autumn.

FACTS ABOUT CUT TULIPS
Cut tulips continue to grow up to one inch or more after they are cut. Of the nearly 4,000 named cultivars of tulips, most make excellent cut flowers. For example, Darwin Hybrid, Triumph, Parrot and Peony-flowered are perfect choices.

If you want flowers to bloom in late winter and early spring, fall is the time to decide what bulbs you want and to put them in the ground. Plant spring-flowering bulbs after the cool weather sets in, but before the frost hits your area, so that the soil is still workable. Species tulips begin to bloom in March or early April, then single and double-early tulips, followed by midseason tulips, Darwin Hybrid, Triumph Medal and Tulipa greigii. The beautiful late tulips, Darwin, cottage, parrot, lily-flowered and fringed, reach their peaks in May.

Tulips are tops

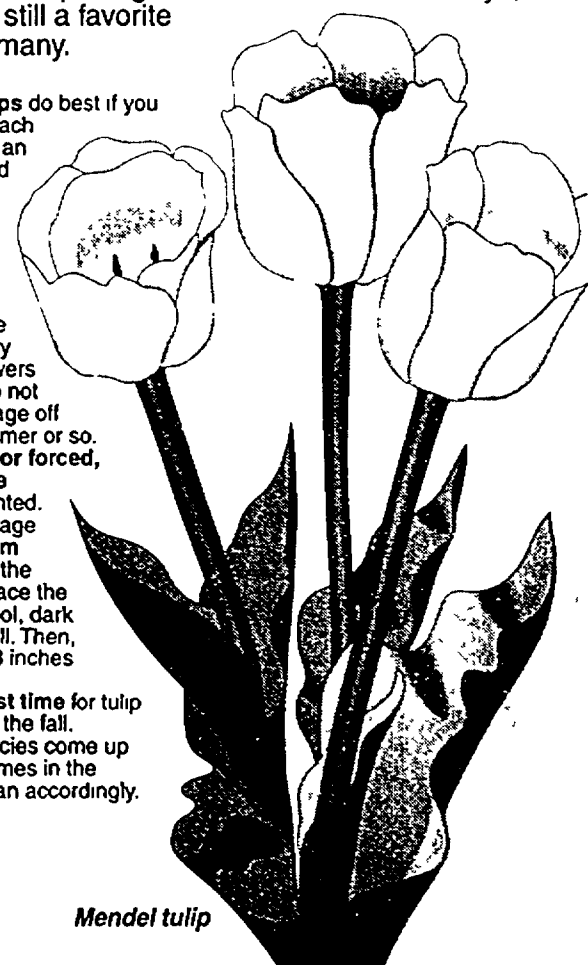

■ Cut tulips do best if you recut them each day (take off an inch) and add fresh water. Most tulips make good cut flowers.

■ Always allow tulip foliage to die back naturally once the flowers are gone. Do not mow the foliage off until midsummer or so.

■ Potted, or forced, tulips can be kept and planted. Once the foliage dies back, trim greenery off the bulbs and place the bulbs in a cool, dark place until fall. Then, plant about 8 inches deep.

■ The best time for tulip planting is in the fall. Different species come up at different times in the spring, so plan accordingly.

Proposed legislation has real estate groups concerned

lenders to notify consumers of their right to request cancellation of their mortgage insurance once the homeowner has accumulated equity totaling more than 20 percent of the original purchase price of their home.

"Millions of consumers (homeowners) nationwide are paying for private mortgage insurance they don't need," said Layne Morrill, NAR president. "This bill will help stop the unnecessary drain on homeowners' pocketbooks."

Although the legislation does not require the identity of the private mortgage insurer to be disclosed

to consumers, Morrill said this information should be made available when the purchase transaction is closed.

"Despite the fact that the insurer's client is the lender, the home buyer is the party paying the mortgage insurance premium. This single bit of information is critical in resolving negotiations with a mortgage lender."

Mortgage Bankers of America is one group opposed to the proposed legislation.

"We are concerned that the legislation, as drafted, may create unintended operational or administrative problems that could undermine objectives of the law

and impose unnecessary costs and burdens on mortgage lenders and servicers," said Ron McCord, MBA president.

There are numerous players in the mortgage process - mortgage bankers, secondary market investors and mortgage servicers, McCord pointed out. Mortgage bankers make loans to borrowers and retain them just long enough to pool the loans together for sale to investors.

"These mortgage bankers are subject almost exclusively to the criteria imposed on them by investors and the secondary market," he said. "Thus, the decisions regarding the status of PMI and its

cancellation rests with the investors in the overwhelming majority of cases.

"The Mortgage Bankers Association supports the ability of borrowers to be apprised of their option regarding private mortgage insurance. But the objectives of the bill may be undermined by the costs and administrative burdens that may be created for lenders and servicers as they attempt to comply with the new (legislation)," McCord said.

The debate continues, with one special interest group lacking horns with another. But at least the issue is finally on the table:

and some form of consumer protection legislation will be passed. That's a major and long-overdue accomplishment.

Q. Do most Realtor firms concentrate on selling homes?

A. Yes, but the picture is changing. The current trend for real estate brokerage firms is to offer diversified services.

Residential brokerage is still the dominant specialization among Realtor firms. Nearly seven out of 10 brokerage firms generate at least 50 percent of their income from residential sales, according to a recent report from the National Association of Realtors.

However, the percentage of firms that specialize in home sales has declined over the past four years. In 1996, about 69 percent of all firms focused primarily on home-sale activities - a 14 percent drop since 1992.

This decline has been offset somewhat by an increase in commercial brokerage, farm and land brokerage, and international sales, the NAR report noted.

GARDEN TIP

Foxgloves are carefree and versatile. Their spires add grace and beauty to any garden. There are about 20 species of Digitalis (the botanical name for foxgloves). Of the 10 or so species in cultivation today, by far the most widely grown is *D. purpurea*, also the easiest to grow. They are members of the figwort family (Scrophulariaceae) which, in addition to the varieties of foxgloves, includes such nongarden treasures as nemesias, snapdragons and celcealarias, to name a few.

The plant was known to Dioscorides, the 1st century Greek physician, but it was not until the opening years of our own century when it was found to contain a powerful cardiac stimulant, which

explained its effectiveness in treating dropsy, an ailment resulting from inadequate pumping action of the heart.

Although foxglove is much too dangerous to be used by amateur herbalists, the drug "digitalis" is still prescribed by doctors for those with heart problems.

PLANTING FOXGLOVES

Most of the garden varieties of foxgloves are biennials, that is they produce only vegetative growth their first year, then bloom, set seed and die in their second year. Because they do not fit into the "annuals" or "perennials" category, gardeners have tended to

overlook these lovely flowers in recent years. That is a pity.

For they bring a wholesome, old-fashioned beauty to early summer gardens and borders that few other herbaceous plants can match.

Sow seeds in spring, then transfer the baby plants to a well-prepared nursery bed in early summer. Keep the plants well-watered over the summer and never let them become overcrowded.

In early autumn, move them to their permanent home and mulch them well for winter protection. Once foxgloves are established, they will self-sow like other biennials for years to come, making their care no more demanding than pulling out unwanted, sickly seedlings.

Spanish Revival furniture gains in popularity and value

Q. Enclosed is a photo of a walnut silver chest that I bought in 1989 in Indiana for \$125 from a secondhand shop. I have always wondered what period the design is, and would like to know what it is worth.

A. Your cabinet is a factory-made Spanish Revival piece. The design was inspired by 17th century Spanish cabinet-desks called *varguenos*. American reproductions of earlier periods of furniture can range from outstanding copies to awful adaptations.

Collectors have come to appreciate the rich heritage of the carefully crafted pieces. Reproductions that were designed with respect for the integrity of the original construction are gaining in popularity.

Your early 20th century cabinet would probably be worth about \$2,000 to \$2,500.

Q. This mark is on a porcelain female figurine that has been in my family for at least 25 years. She is reaching down to pick up flowers that have spilled from a cornucopia that she is holding. The figurine is 15 inches tall and in perfect condition.

I would appreciate any information you can provide on its origin and value.

A. Your figurine was made by the Carl Thieme Saxonian Porcelain Factory, Potschappel, Saxony, Germany. Much of their ware was copied from 18th century Meissen. This mark was used in the late 1800s.

Your figurine would probably be worth about \$400 to \$600.

Q. I would like to have some information on a hand-painted porcelain cake plate that was my grandmother's.

It is decorated with green leaves and clusters of berries. The scalloped edge is trimmed in gold. On the back it is signed by hand with the initials "A.T.S." and the date "1900."

A. China painting was a popular pastime for ladies around the turn of the century. They often painted unmarked blanks and signed their own name or initials and the date.

Your plate would probably be worth about \$45 to \$65.

Q. I have a silver-plated bank of Snoopy. On the bottom are the words "1958 - United Features Syndicate, Inc. - Silver-plated." The bank is 6 inches tall, and Snoopy is reclining on top of his doghouse.

I know it must be worth more than the 50 cents that I paid at

a garage sale. What do you think?

A. Since you only paid "peanuts" for your bank, you'll be pleased to know its value is probably about \$75 to \$85.

Q. I have a gold mesh evening bag that my aunt purchased in the 1920s. It measures 6x8 inches and was made by Whiting & Davis. Does it have any value?

A. Whiting & Davis was one of the leading manufacturers of mesh handbags. Mesh bags similar to yours are in the \$85 to \$125 range.

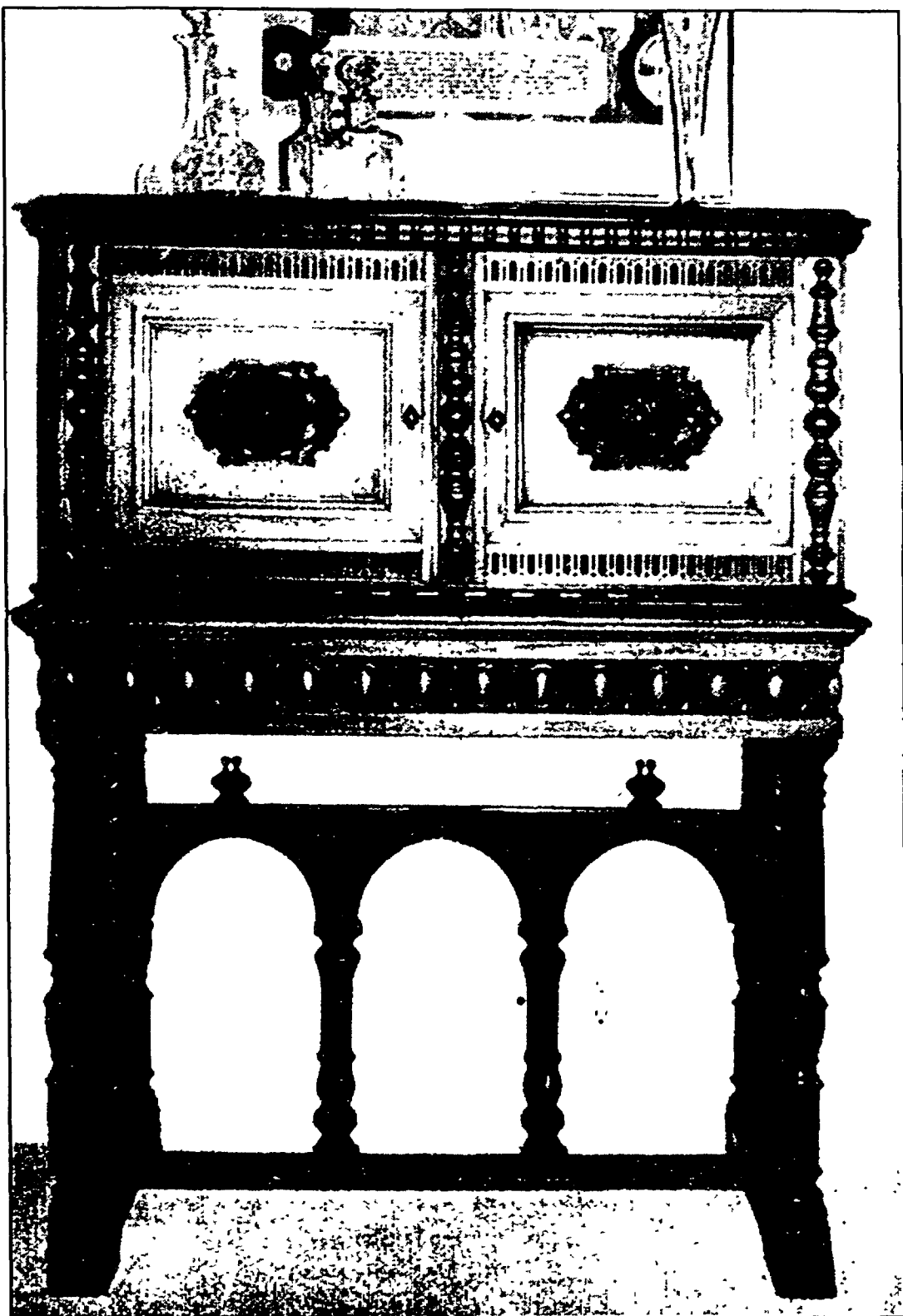

Career Development

Did you know you have just 15 to 20 seconds to impress a potential employer?

Writing a resume is a way to market yourself, and marketing consists of highlighting your successes. Your resume is your personal career marketing document. Based on its strength, you'll either be selected for that all-important interview, from potentially hundreds of other candidates, or you'll be passed over.

Does your resume get you the interview you want?

The sole purpose of any resume is to get an interview, not to get a job. And, anyone who is in the market for a new job, or a job change, is up against very stiff competition. Because of this, your resume must accurately reflect the wonderful things you've accomplished in your career.

Pretend you are the human resources manager of a company who has advertised for a job opening. The morning mail has just arrived and with it a stack of 100-200 resumes for you to sort through. Your first objective is to narrow the field down to 10-20 candidates.

You begin by sorting through the resumes one-by-one, eliminating as many as possible. Your goal is to have 20-30 left to review in detail.

So the first function a resume serves is to eliminate most candidates from consideration.

Job recruiters spend approximately 15-20 seconds looking at each resume and, in that time make a determination as to whether it is put in the "yes" pile or the "no" pile. This decision is usually based on the overall appearance of your resume, the format and the three to four key selling points you have listed in your "Qualifications Summary" at the

top of the resume.

If you make it to the "yes" pile, your resume will be read in more detail, but again, the recruiter is looking for reasons to eliminate you as a candidate. Out of the original 100-200 resumes, the recruiter's goal might be to narrow the list down to only a few candidates. These people will be the lucky ones called in for an interview.

Remember, this entire process happens solely on the strength of your resume. If you are one of the fortunate ones to get called in for an interview, the resume then becomes the basis for your interview. The recruiter will use it to discuss your history, accomplishments and skills to see how they match with the needs of the company.

After the interview, your resume continues to represent you, as your qualifications are then weighed against other candidates who have been interviewed. Those people involved in the hiring decision gather together and go over each resume again, looking for reasons to eliminate all but one candidate. So, as you can see, even at this stage, your resume is playing an important role.

Think about your resume. Does it command a second look? Will it get you through the whole interviewing process, where you will be the candidate chosen for that dream job?

Also, if you are an employee with a regular place of business, you may be able to deduct daily transportation expenses when you are required to work at a "temporary" business location. But should that temporary assignment progress into something more regular, be prepared to pay your own way.

For example, an employee working for a lengthy period as a consultant at a client's office is considered to be commuting if the trip originates from home; therefore, he or she cannot deduct the cost of transportation to and from this workplace. If, however, you are self-employed, and your home is your principal place of business, the miles you drive to a client's office may be claimed as business mileage. You should consult with your CPA on the specific requirements.

ACTUAL OR STANDARD?

The IRS gives you a choice of two methods for calculating deductions for the business use of your car: actual expenses or the standard mileage rate.

The actual expenses method

allows you to deduct the cost of gas, oil, tires, maintenance and repairs, vehicle registration, insurance, depreciation and other allowable expenses. (You may deduct the business portion of parking fees and tolls, regardless of which method you choose.)

To use the standard mileage method, which covers all the expenses outlined above, you multiply the number of unreimbursed business miles by the standard mileage rate (31 cents per mile for 1996). This method may not be used if you claimed a depreciation deduction for your auto in a previous year. Your deduction is determined based on the percentage of miles related to business use.

RECORDKEEPING

You'll need complete and accurate written records to substantiate the extent to which you've used your car for business purposes and to defend your deduction in the event of an audit. It's a good idea to keep a log in your glove compartment in which you can note the details of all your business-related miles.

You should record when the trip took place, where and why you went, who you saw and how many miles you drove. If you're using the actual expenses method, you'll also need receipts for gasoline, oil, repairs, car washes and maintenance work to support your deduction. Receipts for tolls and parking should be kept when using either method.

The way you report business use of your car depends on whether you are an employee or are self-employed. If you're an employee, you must complete Form 2106, *Employee Business Expenses*, to deduct your automobile expenses. Employees may claim unreimbursed transportation expenses as miscellaneous itemized deductions, which can be deducted only to the extent that they exceed two percent of your adjusted gross income. Self-employed individuals report transportation expenses on Schedule C, where they are fully deductible.

Although the recordkeeping can be cumbersome, your efforts can pay off in a valuable tax deduction if you're not sure whether to use the actual expenses method or the standard mileage rate, confer with a CPA to determine the best approach for your circumstances.

for salary deferral plans, such as 401(k) plans.

As of Jan. 1, married, single-income couples can contribute up to \$2,000 each - a total of \$4,000 - to Individual Retirement Accounts. Previously, a single-income couple could contribute only \$2,250. Existing income guidelines, which phase out tax deductibility as a couple's income approaches \$50,000 a year, will not change, but couples who fall outside the guidelines can continue to contribute to IRAs and their earnings will grow on a tax-deferred basis.

In addition, individuals who work past age 70 1/2 will no longer be required to begin taking minimum distributions from their qualified retirement plans until they actually retire, although distributions will still apply for IRAs and for owners of 5 percent or more of a business.

Two changes will help high-income individuals with their

retirement planning - elimination of the family aggregation requirement for pension contributions and a three-year moratorium on the success tax. Elimination of the family aggregation requirement means that married couples who work together will be able to contribute a total of \$60,000 a year to a pension plan. Instead of being limited to \$30,000 in total contributions, the limit increases from 20 percent to 25 percent, they'll be able to contribute up to \$75,000.

High-income retirees will benefit from a three-year moratorium on the success tax, a 15 percent excise tax on excess retirement accumulations and

distributions. The tax generally applies only when annual distributions exceed \$155,000 and when lump-sum distributions exceed \$75,000. Distributions will still be subject to income taxes, and the 10 percent premature withdrawal

penalty still applies if the individual is under age 59 1/2. The moratorium, which applies to distributions in 1997, 1998, and 1999, is likely to increase federal tax revenues by encouraging wealthy retirees to take money out of their retirement plans during the moratorium period. Although it will be beneficial for some to pull money from their retirement accounts before 2000, it is important to study the financial implications carefully.

Individuals who are covered by union pension plans will be vested in five years, instead of the current 10 years, beginning in 1997 or 1998, depending on the contract year. Five-year vesting is already the norm for non union plans.

As these examples show, the new tax law includes something for just about everyone.

10 ways to stay motivated

Vanity and the mirror often inspire fitness programs. But between starting and succeeding is often a wasteland of failed intentions, forgotten promises and stationary bikes draped in dirty laundry.

Even with an epic workout/video library, state-of-the-art equipment and membership to the snazziest gym in town, if you're not motivated, your fitness program will fail.

We talked to several fitness pros and compiled their 10 best tips for staying motivated over the long haul.

After all, you can't just do it just once and expect results. Fitness is a commitment.

Set goals. Without goals, you don't know when you've succeeded.

Goals are highly personal. Decide what you want to accomplish within, say 12 weeks. Maybe it will be to walk an hour three times a week, to bench press 140 pounds or to do 100 sit-ups. It's up to you.

"You are an expert with your own body

and your own personal goals," says personal trainer Tony Little.

Be realistic. There's nothing more motivating than success. But set impossible standards and failure is inevitable. Without the genes of Elle Macpherson or Arnold Schwarzenegger, you'll never look like them, no matter how hard you work.

"How quickly your body decides to lose weight and where to lose it from isn't really your business," says personal trainer Keli Roberts. "That's nature's business."

Remember, too, that physical changes come slowly, so making weight loss your goal is a bad idea, says Philip Walker of the Walker Wellness Clinic in Dallas.

"Instead of looking for physiological improvement, look for an action improvement," he says. It's a lot easier to succeed at adding another mile to your walk than at losing 10 pounds.

Throw away your scales. "The scale is the most unrealistic method of tracking progress in a fitness program because generally you gain muscle while you're losing fat," says Roberts. "Muscle is so much

more dense than fat that you tend to gain weight on the scale and so you think, 'I'm not making progress, I'm going backward. I'm dropping out.'"

Though Walker has clients weigh themselves to "keep them in line," he doesn't keep scales in his office.

"I think it's been abused by people who are using it for false sense of accomplishment," he says. "The real accomplishment is a change of behavior."

Forget "no pain, no gain." Don't listen to people who say it has to hurt.

"They're scaring the public, even turning people off," says Denise Austin, star of ESPN's "Getting Fit With Denise Austin."

After all, Walker points out, people are wired to avoid pain. And working too hard too soon causes pain, injury and discouragement.

Cyndi Targosz, president of Starglow Productions Inc., says, "Usually when people start out, they're really excited. I give them less than they really can do - I want to keep them excited. I gradually put in more and more and by that time, they're

hooked."

"At the end of your workout you should feel good and energized and like you can conquer the world," says aerobics instructor Leisa Hart. "You should not feel like you're lacking in energy or you need to go lie down."

The trick is not how hard you work out, but how regularly. "Consistency is more important than going to the wall all the time," says Little.

Work variety into your fitness plan. If you do nothing but aerobics classes, running or weights, you're bound to get bored.

"Variety is the key because it's going to stimulate you," says Little.

At the gym, "Don't wait in line for that next machine just 'cause it's the next machine," he says. "There are 20 different ways to work the chest."

And don't make your workout all work.

Olympic gold medalist Mitch Gaylord in-line skates, plays basketball, water-skis and hikes with his family, all of which con-

These 10 foods belong in a healthy diet

We're all aware of the supermarket aisles full of food that is bad for us. But more and more, current research is pointing to foods that can help people avoid illness. Focusing on nutrition and loading up the diet with these potent protectors may keep ailments as minor as the common cold or as serious as heart disease or cancer at bay.

It's no accident that fruits, vegetables and other plant foods make up the bulk of these superfoods. It seems a diet laden with fruits, vegetables, legumes and whole grains has been proved healthful, even if scientists aren't exactly sure why. Many believe anti-oxidants are capable of countering substances that invade healthy cells, and that the phytochemicals in plant foods help the body fight off illness.

Whatever the source of their healthful boost, incorporating the following 10 foods into your regular diet may be exactly what you need to stay one step ahead of sickness.

Citrus fruits. Oranges, grapefruits and

other citrus family members boast the phytochemical flavonoids and loads of vitamin C, which means they excel at stopping cell-attacking free radicals and building up the immune system.

Apples (or pears, or plums). These contain soluble fiber that aids in lowering cholesterol levels.

Carrots. Choose any fruit or vegetable with a rich orange color (sweet potatoes, squash, apricots, cantaloupe) and the form of vitamin A called beta-carotene, which is thought to reduce the risk of cancer and stroke.

Soybeans. Recent studies suggest soy may be the most powerful cholesterol cutter around. Best of all, it lowers the levels of bad cholesterol but not the so-called good cholesterol.

It may also play a role in the prevention of breast and prostate cancers.

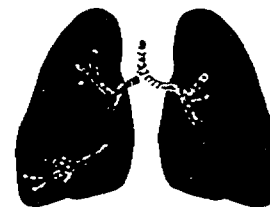
Mushrooms. Exotic Asian varieties like the reishi, shiitake, maitake and others have been used for centuries by Chinese

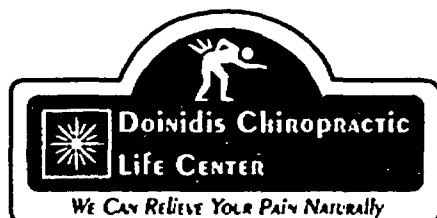

Buying exercise equipment that you can use

The \$3.6 billion exercise equipment industry is more than happy with our spending habits - they've reported a growth rate of more than 11 percent over the past five years and expect continued growth through the end of the century. There's no doubt about it - we definitely like to buy home exercise equipment.

But the increase of obese adults and children over the past decade seems to reflect that few of us actually use that equipment.

Why is it that Americans - world-class leaders at buying exercise equipment - aren't quite so sharp when it comes to actually using the stuff?

A prime reason could be that we simply don't know how to shop for the right equipment. When it comes to home exercise equipment, we seem to rush in where experts dare not tread - and all too often we end up with lemons that quietly slip into the shadows at the back of the garage.

There is hope, however. With these tips from Wayne Westcott, Ph.D., a strength consultant for the national YMCA, you should be able to buy home exercise equipment that will work for you well into the future:

Premeditate your goals. According to Westcott, the most important step when buying fitness equipment is to decide what your fitness goals are. If you want to get stronger, you should probably look for a product like a free-weight set or strength-training machine.

If you want to increase your flexibility, look for a piece of equipment that will emphasize flexibility, such as a Pilates-based personal reformer.

For a good cardiovascular workout, you'll want a piece of equipment that will raise your heart rate, such as a stair-climber or treadmill.

How much space do you have? If you can dedicate a whole room to your home gym, more power to you! Most of us, however, are relegated to putting a piece of equipment in the garage or TV room. And although more home exercise equipment manufacturers are building products that are easy to store out of sight, some machines can permanently occupy more than 10 square feet of floor space. Be sure to consider the amount of space you're willing to sacrifice for your home exercise equipment.

Try before you buy. "I always prefer to buy from stores where I can actually see or, better yet, even try the equipment, rather than just buying it from a brochure or from an infomercial," says Westcott.

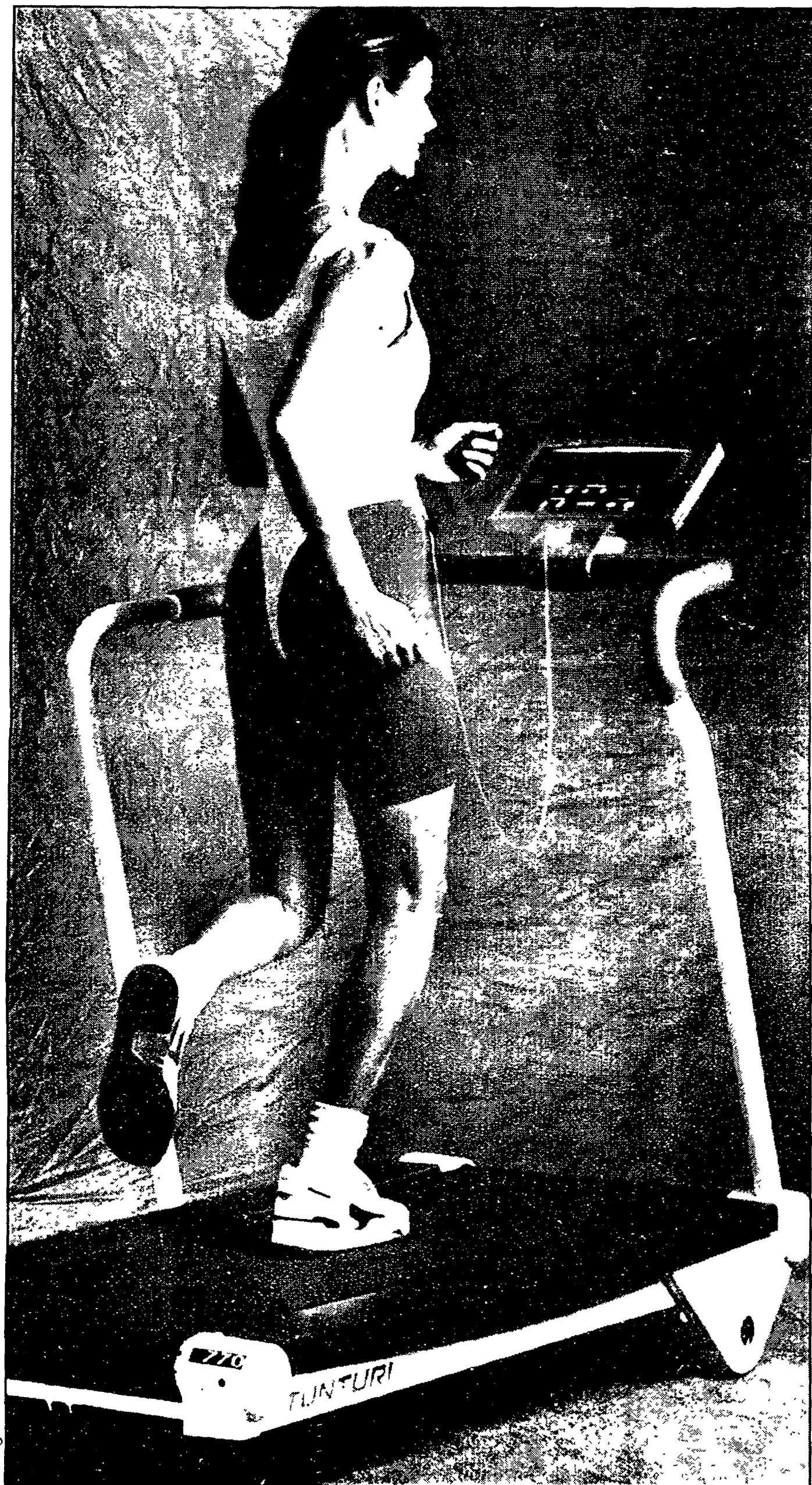
A good sporting goods retailer should let you try a floor model of a piece of exercise equipment before you lay down your cold, hard cash for it.

Ask an expert for help. Personal fitness trainers are becoming more common - and less expensive. Hire one for a day to accompany you to a retailer and offer advice as you try pieces of equipment.

Afterward, you may want to keep a professional on a retainer for a few weeks to show you how to get the most out of your new product. Trainers charge \$25 to \$50 per hour in most areas, and can usually be found in the yellow pages or through a local fitness facility.

"I definitely feel that a counseling session is important," says Westcott. "Before you buy a piece of equipment, you should check with a certified personal trainer or exercise instructor to understand what the injury risks are and what its real benefits are."

One size does not fit all. The home exercise product you choose should align with the way your body works. If you are

Misunderstood mental disorders can be treated

Mental illnesses affect millions of people and can be truly debilitating diseases, attacking body and mind.

Consider these statistics:

Anxiety disorders are the most common mental illness in America, affecting more than 23 million each year.

Clinical depression affects 17.6 million Americans each year.

Seasonal affective disorder and subsyndromal SAD (the winter blues) affect 10 million and 25 million Americans respectively.

Alcohol dependence and abuse are among the most common mental disorders, affecting some 23.5 percent of Americans in the course of a lifetime and 9.7 percent during the course of a year.

Drug dependence or abuse affects some 11.9 percent of Americans at some point in life and about 3.6 percent in a given year.

Unfortunately, according to statistics from the National Institute of Mental Health, seven in every 10 Americans with a mental disorder do not receive any treatment.

"Most people with anxiety disorders, depression or other mental illnesses face great difficulty receiving appropriate treatment due to widespread lack of understanding and stigma," according to the NIMH.

But excellent treatments for virtually any mental illness exist and can be remarkably effective.

ANXIETY DISORDER

While most people experience feelings of anxiety before an important event, such as a big exam, business meeting or first date, anxiety disorders are actual illnesses that cause people to feel frightened, distressed and uneasy for no apparent reason, according to the NIMH.

There are five basic kinds of anxiety disorders:

Panic disorder. Characterized by panic attacks, sudden feelings of terror that strike repeatedly and without warning.

Obsessive-compulsive disorder. Repeated and unwanted thoughts or rituals that seem impossible to control.

Post-traumatic stress disorder. Occurs after experiencing a traumatic event, such as war, rape, natural disaster or child

Exercise-emotion connection

"Aerobic exercise is actually the best anti-depressant I know, provided it is done vigorously enough and often enough," says Andrew Weil, M.D., director of the new Program in Integrative Medicine of the College of Medicine, University of Arizona, in his newsletter, *Self Healing: Creating Natural Health For Your Body and Mind* (Self Healing, 42 Pleasant St., Watertown, MA 02172; 800-523-3296).

In addition to its well-known effects on the body, exercise increases production of endorphins, "the brain's own opiatelike molecules that are associated with some of our best natural highs," says the Harvard-trained physician.

To get such benefit from exercise, Weil

abuse; symptoms include nightmares, flashbacks, depression, anger, irritability.

Phobia. Extreme, disabling and irrational fear of something that really poses little or no actual danger.

General anxiety disorder. Chronic, exaggerated worry about everyday, routine life events and activities, lasting at least six months.

"Treatments for anxiety disorders are extremely effective and often combine medication or specific types of psychotherapy," reports the NIMH. "More medications are available than ever before to effectively treat anxiety disorders."

DEPRESSION

Serious depressions are "whole body" disorders, affecting body, feelings, thoughts and behaviors, according to the NIMH. "They are not the temporary blues or the passing sad moods that everyone experiences after a loss."

Symptoms of depression include persistent sad or "empty" mood; loss of interest in pleasurable activities, including sex; decreased energy and fatigue; sleep disturbances; eating disturbances; difficulty concentrating, remembering, making decisions; irritability or excessive crying; feelings of guilt, worthlessness, helplessness; thoughts of death or suicide.

About 2 million people experience cycles of terrible "lows" and inappropriate "highs." This emotional roller coaster is called "bipolar disorder" or "manic-depressive illness."

Symptoms of mania include excessively "high" mood; irritability; decreased need

advises that you must do 30 minutes of sustained aerobic activity at least five days a week, "and your effort must be great enough to get your heart rate up, accelerate your breathing and make you sweat."

Another reason to work up a sweat, according to Susan Chollar, writing in *American Health* magazine, is that "exercise acts as nature's form of Prozac, boosting brain levels of norepinephrine, dopamine and serotonin, three neurotransmitters that elevate mood."

Studies have shown that depressed people often have abnormally low levels of these neurotransmitters and most anti-depressant medications work by correcting this imbalance, "and to some extent, exercise also does," says Chollar.

So start exercising for your mind as well as your body.

for sleep; increased energy and activity; increasing talking, moving and sexual activity; racing thoughts; grandiose notions; being easily distracted.

Whether depression or mania, "when four or more of these symptoms last longer than two weeks or interfere with ordinary functioning, professional treatment is needed," reports the NIMH.

About twice as many women as men experience clinical depression, while the rates are about the same for bipolar disorder. Studies show that depressive illnesses run in families.

"Where a genetic vulnerability exists, onset probably results from a combination of vulnerability and life experience," says the NIMH.

But here's the good news: Effective treatments (psychotherapy, anti-depressants or a combination of both) are successful in 80 percent of all cases of clinical depression, according to the National Mental Health Association.

WINTER BLUES

Seasonal affective disorder is characterized by depressed periods in fall and winter (beginning in October/November and subsiding in March/April), which alternate with less depressed, nondepressed or even elevated moods in spring and summer, reports the NIMH.

About 80 percent of those suffering from SAD are women.

Symptoms of SAD in adults include tiredness and fatigue, increased appetite, weight gain, difficulty concentrating, sadness or anxiety, withdrawal from friends and family.

SAD is caused by response to changes in environmental light. Treatment usually involves light therapy, in which SAD patients are exposed to levels of artificial light five to 20 times brighter than ordinary indoor lighting.

"Studies show that anywhere from 30 minutes to a few hours of light therapy in the morning, per day, relieves symptoms within days to two weeks in about 75 percent of SAD sufferers," says the NIMH.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

"Alcoholism is a chronic, progressive and potentially fatal illness, not a failure of willpower," say Dianne Hales and Robert E. Hales, M.D., in their book, *Caring For the Mind: The Comprehensive Guide to Mental Health* (Bantam Books).

"Although the exact cause of alcoholism is not known, certain factors - including biochemical imbalances in the brain, heredity, cultural acceptability and stress - seem to play a role in the disease," say the Hales.

Detoxification and stabilization, either in inpatient or outpatient settings, begin treatment.

"Once abstinence is achieved in the first months of recovery, persons are strongly encouraged to continue their progress through long-term, even lifelong, participation in Alcoholics Anonymous," say the Hales.

While causes of drug or substance abuse are not fully understood, "inherited body chemistry, still-unknown genetic factors and sensitivity to drugs may make some individuals more susceptible," say the Hales.

There also seems to be an overlap between mental disorders and substance abuse disorders.

"A little more than a third of those with a psychiatric disorder also have a chemical dependence problem, and a little more than a third of those with a chemical dependency problem have a psychiatric disorder," psychiatrist Richard Frances, M.D., founding president of the American Association of Addiction Psychiatry, told the Hales.

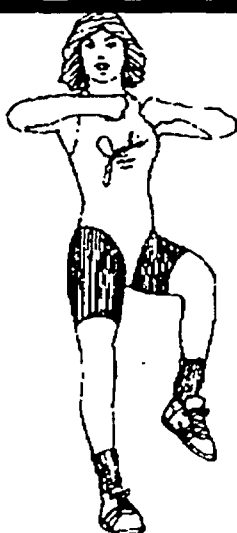
"Substance abuse counselors agree that eventually drug treatment works," say the Hales.

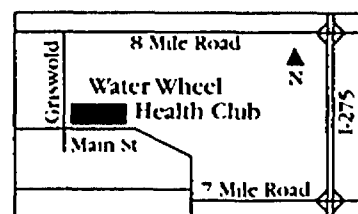

tribute to his overall fitness. If you're hooked on the convenience of videos, treat yourself to new ones now and then to keep things interesting. Remember, both cardiovascular and strength work are necessary for total fitness.

Do it your way. Gaylord doesn't like lifting weights, so he doesn't - he gets his strength training other ways, such as pull-ups and dip machines. He also likes yoga.

And, he says, "I'm not a morning person, so I plan my workout toward the afternoon when my body feels more awake."

Some people like the camaraderie of classes, some the solitude of a long walk. Don't do what you think you should do, do what you enjoy.

Pay attention to the details. Concentrate on doing things correctly and you'll see results faster.

"It's not a big-time commitment if you do it right," says Little. Lackadaisical leg lifts or neck-straining sit-ups won't help, and even might hurt.

And have you ever noticed how time flies when you're concentrating on a task? That applies to exercising, too. Gaylord calls it "staying in the present," and says it contributes to athletes reaching the coveted, Zen-like state of "flow." Set goals, then forget about them and concentrate on the process.

Reward yourself. Hart tries to find out what makes her clients' eyes light up - "a shoe fetish,

a watch fetish," she says - and encourages them to reward themselves with that when they reach personal goals.

Cut yourself slack. Some days are better than others.

"There are times when everything's going wrong for you. That's the day when you should take off and take a walk, read a book or write down why you're bummed out," says Little.

"Giving yourself that freedom puts you in control," says Targosz. "Guilt is a waste of time."

Even the pros cut themselves slack.

"I could go for a week without doing a darn thing and I don't feel bad about it," says Austin. "As long as 80 percent of the time you know you're doing well."

Use the mind muscle, too. Walker says it's not lack of fitness, per se, that causes people to exercise, it's feeling bad about themselves. Use those bad feelings as motivation to feel better - by exercising. Then use the memory of that happier feeling as motivation for the next time.

Personal trainer and motivational speaker T.D. Doherty advises learning to differentiate between "how I feel and what I know about myself." You might feel incapable of sticking to a fitness program, but the fact is, you probably don't have a genetic lack of willpower. Reality: You can do it.

And, as Austin likes to remind people, "You're worth it."

Mitch Gaylord, gold medal gymnast in the 1984 Olympics, stuntman in "Batman Forever" and star of "The Men's Total Body Workout": "If you're having a tough workout, know tomorrow will be better and just do the things you do well, instead."

Cyndi Targosz, president of Los Angeles-based Starglow Productions Inc., which offers corporate wellness programs and produces audio and video fitness tapes: "Realistic goals, that's the key. Beauty and handsomeness come in all different shapes and sizes."

Denise Austin, star of "Getting Fit With Denise Austin" on ESPN and a line of fitness videos: "It's not as hard as you think. Even if it's a 10-minute walk, heck, you're gonna feel better. Just start out with 10 minutes. Don't worry about it."

Keli Roberts, personal trainer in Hollywood and star of several fitness videos: "Suit up and show up. If you

let go of the results and have faith that they'll come, they will."

Tony Little, president of Tony Little Inc., which encompasses a personal training center in St. Petersburg, Fla., fitness videos and other fitness products: "Five days a week you treat your body like a temple and two days a week you can treat it like an amusement park."

Leisa Hart, aerobics instructor in Dallas and star of "Buns of Steel" videos: "Train consistently and train moderately. You don't need to go at it full force."

T.D. Doherty, president of Fitness for Today in Carrollton, Texas, personal trainer and motivational speaker: "Stop believing that just because that (failure) happened 42 times, the 43rd time is going to fail again."

Philip Walker, Walker Wellness Clinic in Dallas, fitness management consultant: "If exercise is the least bit painful, it's innate within our biology to try to avoid it. It's like putting your hand in a fire and wondering why you don't want to keep it there. Avoid the pain from exercise at all costs."

ists for medicinal purposes. In the West, researchers are suggesting that consumption of exotic mushrooms may help stimulate the immune system and protect us from health problems, including cancer, diabetes, high blood pressure, cholesterol, allergies and viral infections. Some varieties can easily be cooked into delicious recipes, while others work better brewed into a tea.

Beans. Dried beans combine soluble fiber, protein and lots of vitamins and minerals into one powerful, energy-packed package. Busy cooks should know that they're just as healthy out of the can, and it doesn't take a lot of fat to make them taste good.

Oatmeal or oat bran. Not everyone agrees, but many researchers believe the soluble fiber in oats goes a long way toward lowering blood cholesterol and reducing the risk of death from heart disease.

Bran. The bran in cereal and bran muffins, along with whole-wheat bread, is loaded with insoluble fiber - which wards off colon cancer

and appendicitis by rushing foods and toxins out of the intestines.

This talent also accounts for its ability to end constipation and hemorrhoids.

Fish. Some varieties of fish - salmon, mackerel, tuna, herring, whitefish and rainbow trout - are blessed with the valuable, heart-strengthening omega-3 fatty acids credited with making platelets less sticky and greatly reducing the risk of cardiac arrest.

Garlic. This tasty additive has been likened to a bacteria-killing antibiotic. Proponents claim it fortifies our systems against everything from colds and flu to breast and prostate cancer. It's also been known to lower blood cholesterol levels.

Of course, one of the benefits of working all these superfoods into your diet is that you won't have much room left for fatty fast foods and the empty calories of sweets like cookies and cakes! Focusing on what we can eat to stay healthier, rather than what things break down our bodies and cause problems, may even make them easier to swallow.

Herbal Helpers

Many people believe the proper use of certain medicinal herbs can lead people to a higher level of wellness. Herbal medicine makes a good partner to modern medicine, but you should always consult your health professional about the herbal treatments that you intend to incorporate into your health care.

Most health food stores carry a supply of herbal treatments, but you may have to search out an herb shop for better variety. They are available in several forms, including teas, capsules or tablets, or extracts (which work best for herbal mixtures).

Following are just a few of the widely accepted herbal remedies and their reputed affects:

Ginger. A warming herb that produces a cleansing sweat and also works as an expectorant. It is also reported to control nausea and vomiting. These properties make it a

good choice to treat bronchial and gastrointestinal infections.

Ginkgo. Increases circulation to the brain and extremities, increasing memory, the ability to concentrate and cognitive functioning in general.

Echinacea. Considered an immune stimulant that just may work to fight bacterial and viral infections in the body. While it may do quite well against a cold or flu, don't rely on it as sole treatment for a serious infection.

Chamomile. Used for relaxation in times of anxiety and nervousness, as well as to relieve the pain of stomach cramps or painful periods.

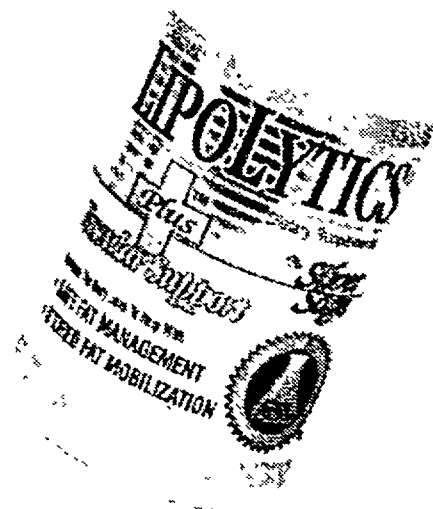
Aloe. Used topically, aloe is a popular herbal treatment providing almost instant relief for minor skin irritations, insect bites and sunburn.
