City hall renovation bill shoots up by over \$500,000

Between a rock and a hard place, Northville officials are there now because of big problems in the plan to renovate Northville City Hall and add on to the fire department.

Cost overruns and an expensive construction labor market have significantly jacked up the price of the project.

In September 1996 the original renovation budget was just under \$1.4 million. It's now almost \$2 million despite efforts to cut costs by scaling down the work.

Members of the Northville City Council now face three alternatives, none of them desirable:

- They can cut even more out of the plan to bring costs down further. That would likely mean scrapping the fire hall expansion, something that almost everyone agrees is badly needed.

- Some feel this move would defeat the very purpose of the renovation.

- The council can leave the project intact and try to come up with \$200,000-\$570,000 more to cover additional costs.

Township officials meet with critics

They did the best they could with what they had. However, is what they have enough for the future of Northville Township?

That was the conclusion reached and the question raised by last week's unprecedented meeting about the fire which recently damaged two homes in Country Club Village.

On the night of the fire and for days afterwards many residents of the condominium complex at Six Mile and Haggerty criticized the way the Northville Township Department of Public Safety (DPS) battled the July 18 blaze.

The slew of complaints prompted DPS officials to hold the July 24 meeting, where they hoped to convince the standing room only crowd of what they themselves believe: they did things right.

Judging from their reactions, DPS officials succeeded. By the end of the night, most people seemed to agree with the conclusion of one Country Club resident: "they did a terrific job with what they had to work with."

But is what they had enough? That's the question still on a lot of

people's minds. Has the time come for Northville Township, a community in the midst of a development boom, to, as one woman put it, "step up and pay the piper" and spend more money for fire protection?

It's a question that members of the township board of trustees will wrestle with on two fronts over the next several months as they hammer out next year's budget and consider a possible fire department millage for the 1998 election ballot.

Standing center stage for most of last Thursday's sometimes emotional meeting was Fire Chief Bill Zimendak, who went over the chain of events on the night of the fire.

Senior complex wins initial OK in township

Northville Township is on its way to welcoming a new senior housing complex into the community sometime next year.

The 120-resident center, divided into two distinct facilities, has been proposed for the north side of Seven Mile Road across from the Michigan State Police Post. Two different companies

would own the two buildings, which would offer a variety of accommodations and levels of assistance based on a person's needs.

The southern building, called American House, won preliminary site plan approval from the Northville Township Planning Commission Tuesday night. That's a key step on the road to final approval, which is up to the township

board of trustees.

Architect James Pappas, who is designing both American House and northern neighbor Addington Place, said the firm, which operates several senior facilities in metro Detroit, wants to put shovels into the ground as soon as possible.

The Oakland County Board of Commissioners July 1 received the executive's budget recommendations for fiscal years 1998 and 1999.

The recommended county budget for fiscal year 1998 is \$552.1 million and for fiscal year 1999 is \$558.2 million.

The budget recommendations are considered by the board's, finance and personnel committee, chaired by Commissioner Sue Ann Douglas, R-Rochester.

On Aug. 28, the committee recommendations for the fiscal year '98 and '99 budgets will be forwarded to the full 25-member board of commissioners. Following

BFI asked to test compostable bags

Browning-Ferris Industries representatives have ordered several compost bags made from corn starch and have been charged with testing them to make sure they really are compostable.

The plastic bags reportedly break down in the compost pile and may soon be hitting supermarket shelves.

Spurred by a provision in a newly-passed Salem Township composting ordinance to eliminate non-compostable plastic bags as a way to control odor, BFI asked for the opportunity to test the bags as an alternative to paper bags and cardboard boxes.

"We are not promoting any particular vendor," BFI Vice President John Myers said. "We just want to see how well they work."

Although compostable plastic bags are sold mostly for commercial use, Myers said he has seen a variation of them in hardware stores that don't work as well.

Of the bags BFI is planning to test, he said, "These bags are truly biodegradable."

Petoskey Plastics of Petoskey, Mich., has been manufacturing compostable plastic bags made from polyethylene and a corn starch-based additive for the past eight years, said James Craig, director of the company's industrial division.

Although they sell their bags mostly to waste haulers, municipalities and composters, the bags do sit on supermarket shelves in areas where municipalities have requested them.

He said in properly-run composting facilities, the bags should break down within eight to 12 weeks.

"Definitely, we're on the cutting edge of this business. The technology has improved dramatically over the past 24 months," Craig said.

Indaco Manufacturing Ltd. in Willowdale, Ontario, Canada, also has been manufacturing a com-

postable plastic bag out of 50 percent post-consumer polyethylene, some virgin polyethylene and a patented additive since 1991, the company's Vice President of Marketing Gary Naylor said.

He said all materials are non-toxic and break down in compost windrows in 45 days or less.

Naylor said his company sells its bags primarily to municipalities and institutional and commercial accounts, but will sell to supermarkets if there is a demand.

"Unless they (supermarkets) see a draw for it, they will not order them," Naylor said.

Indaco's compostable bags were even used on the May 15 space launch from Kennedy Space Center to protect the camera equipment, he said.

Cargill's EcoPla Group manufactures EcoPla resin, a material derived from corn that goes into manufacturing compostable plastic bags, market development consultant Steve Mojo said.

The Duro Bag Manufacturing Co. uses Cargill's resin to make the finished product. Unlike some other bags, their bags contain no polyethylene and break down in the same amount of time as paper bags, he said.

The amount of time a bag breaks down can be anywhere from three-four months to as long as a year depending on the management of the facility.

"The management of the pile and how often it is turned are the key criteria," Mojo said.

BFI's Arbor Hills Resource Recovery Center is located at Six Mile and Napier, near the boundary with Northville Township.

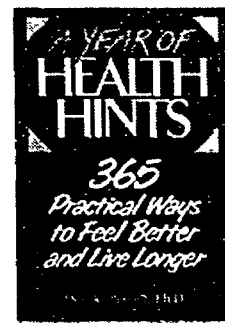

Police News

Church construction site attacked by group of vandals

Sombody out there thinks that Ward Church can't see the forest for the trees.

The under-construction worship center near the corner of Six Mile and Haggerty roads was the target of vandals with a political bent sometime during July 20 or 21. Police report that "anti-development slogans" were spray-painted on the site such as "kill the contractors" and "worship the trees."

The vandals did thousands of dollars in damages to the church building, temporary trailers and construction equipment. Police have no word on whether the perpetrators fled the scene in a pollution-spewing internal combustion vehicle.

DOPE BUST: Police arrested a Northville Township man for possession of marijuana last week.

The reporting officer in the case stopped the 1982 Oldsmobile Cutlass that the man was driving on the evening of July 22. Police said the car's license plate number didn't match computer records, which had it matched to a 1986 Pontiac.

According to police the man, 32, admitted to having just smoked a joint when questioned. The man also confessed to having marijuana on him, the officer said.

The man was searched and police said they found a lunch

baggie one-quarter full of the narcotic in one pocket and more than \$500 in cash in another. The officer claimed to have found seven more partially smoked joints inside the Cutlass as well.

He smokes every day, the man allegedly admitted, and had just bought the marijuana in Inkster that day. He was arrested and taken to police headquarters where he was booked then released after posting bond. He'll be in court next month to answer charges of marijuana possession and an improper license plate.

BREAK-IN: Burglars ransacked the cash drawers of the Moose Lodge on Northville Road last week.

An employee called police on July 22 when she arrived at the Lodge to find its rear door pried open. The burglary must have taken place sometime on July 21 or 22, according to police.

Once inside the thief or thieves pried open the safe, cash registers and two video poker machines. Taken was \$1,500 in cash. Those responsible also cut the building's phone lines and ripped an alarm system control pad out of the wall.

TEEN SHOPLIFTING: Three local teens were arrested for shoplifting at Meijer last week. On the evening of July 21 store

detectives claimed to have spotted a 19-year-old man making off with a \$12 bottle of liquor. The man allegedly took the bottle and tried to conceal it in the Meijer garden center, then leave the store without trying to pay for it.

He was booked then released at the scene on bond. The man faces a court hearing next month.

Also headed for a judge is a case involving a 15-year-old and 16-year-old pair of Novi girls. The two allegedly stole some makeup from Meijer on the afternoon of July 22.

Store detectives say the two stuffed the makeup into their purses then left without trying to pay for any of it. They were booked at the scene and released to family members.

CELL PHONES NABBED: Two cellular phones were taken from vehicles in Northville recently.

A Winchester Road man told police that his phone, valued at \$1,000, was taken from his car sometime between July 11-18. A second township resident told police that his phone, valued at \$350, was taken from his vehicle during the night of July 21-22.

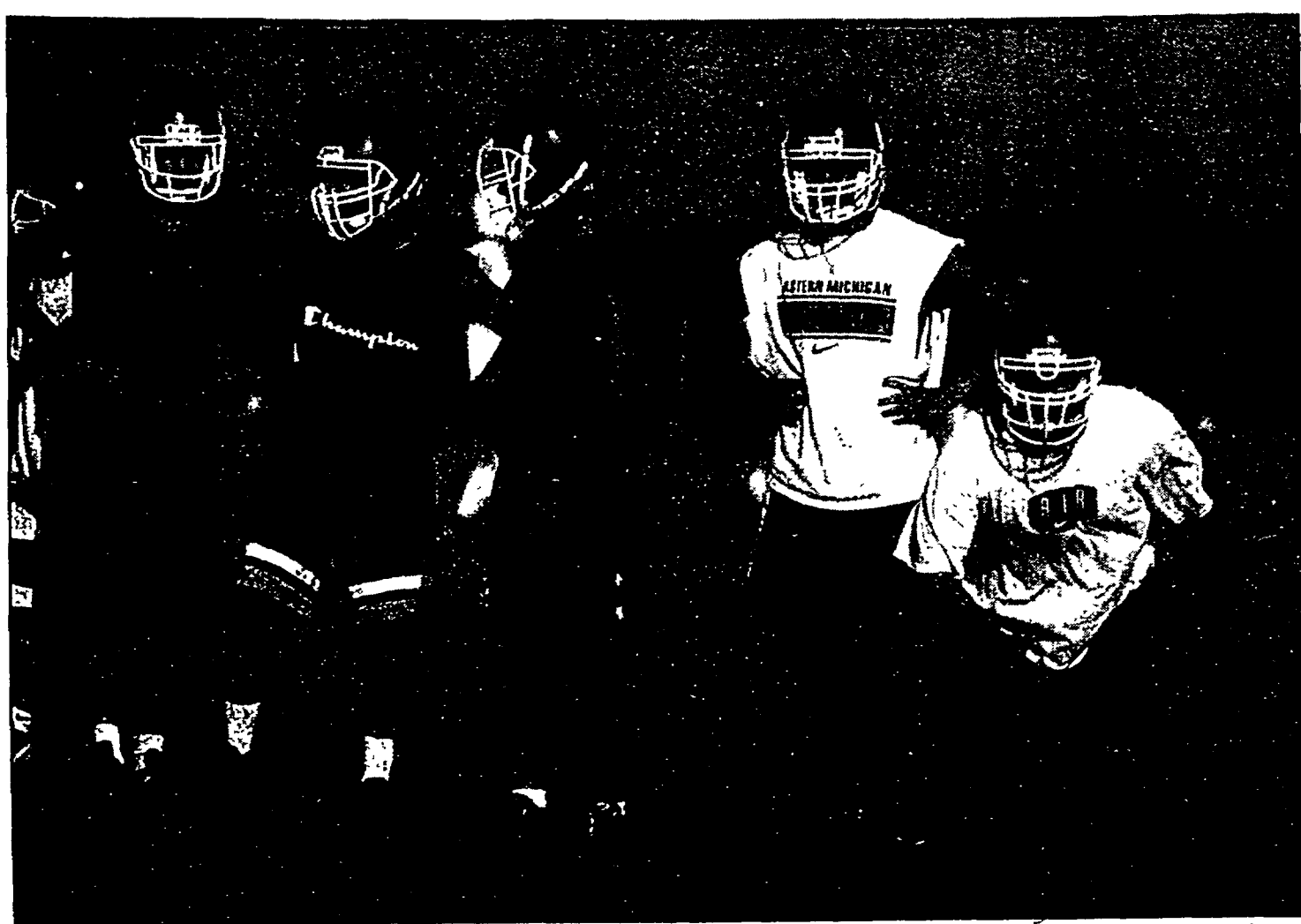

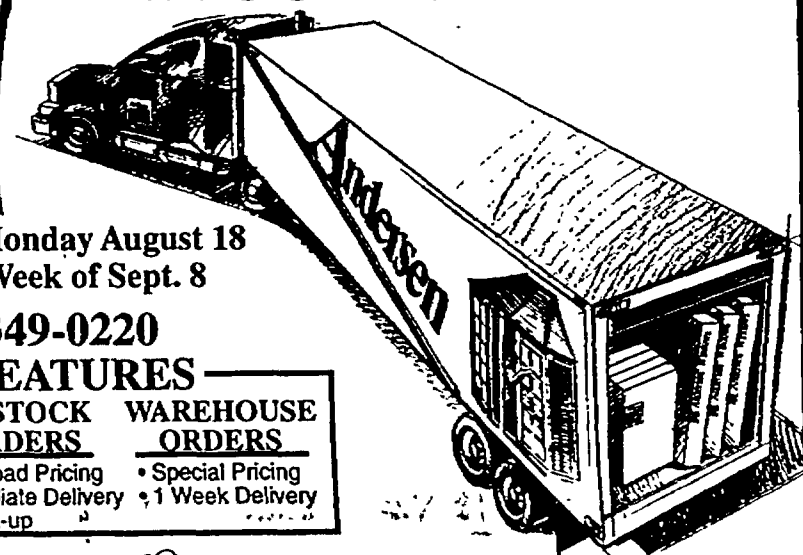

High school design examined

Plans for the new Northville High School were discussed at a school board meeting July 23.

David Bolitho, assistant superintendent for administrative services, presented the conceptual design space for the new school as proposed by the school's "design team."

George Kacan, from the architectural firm of Fanning Howey Associates, which will design the structure, was present at the meeting.

Bolitho said the design team met on July 8 and July 16 to review space requirements and reduce the new school's square foot total to 350,000, as specified by the bond issue.

Although the applied technology and special education areas may need to be reworked, Kacan was confident a schematic could be ready by mid-August.

Bolitho said that 65-70 people - including educators, parents and students - were present at both meetings. The meetings are open to the public. The next one will be held Tuesday, Aug. 19, in the Northville High School library.

The board then passed a motion to accept the design team's square footage allocation.

Also at the July 23 meeting, a decision was made to purchase 12 new school buses. Ten of the buses will be the conventional 65-seat buses, one will be a 78-passenger bus and the other will be an 84-passenger vehicle.

According to Tom Bailey, administrative assistant for operations, the bid that was awarded amounts to a savings of approximately \$50,000, which can be used for other bonded projects.

A special meeting of the board will be held Tuesday, Aug. 5, at 7 p.m. to discuss the "Durant" issues. The Durant case was a lawsuit brought by school districts against the state. The ruling went in favor of the districts and Northville could be eligible for as much as \$7 million in reimbursement revenue. But the actual payment amount remains uncertain.

The next regular meeting of the board is scheduled for Tuesday, August 12, at 7:30 p.m. Both meetings will be held at the district offices.

buses; and developing and improving playgrounds, outdoor physical education and athletic facilities.

According to Street, \$5.2 million will be used to refinance a portion of the district's outstanding 1991 bonded debt. Proceeds from that portion of the bond sale will be put into an escrow account.

"We are refinancing old debt to save some money," Street said.

The savings to the district amounts to about \$271,860.

Street said the spread on the interest rates for the various bonds ranges from 3.8 percent to

5.35 percent, averaging about 5.1 percent.

Because of the lower interest rates, the district will be able to pay off its debt in 20 years instead of the projected 25 years, with the same estimated millage rate.

By approving the proposal June 9, voters effectively authorized a 2.5 increase in the current millage rate, raising it from 3.5 mills to 6 mills for debt retirement. Taxpayers were assessed for the first time on July 1 and will receive an identical bill in December.

Street said the lower interest rate and shortened repayment

time will result in a savings to taxpayers of approximately \$19.3 million over the 20-year debt retirement schedule.

"I'm really pleased with how this issue is progressing," Nield added. "It shows good timing and planning on the part of the district."

According to Street, the district has been selling bonds to A.C. Edwards since 1983.

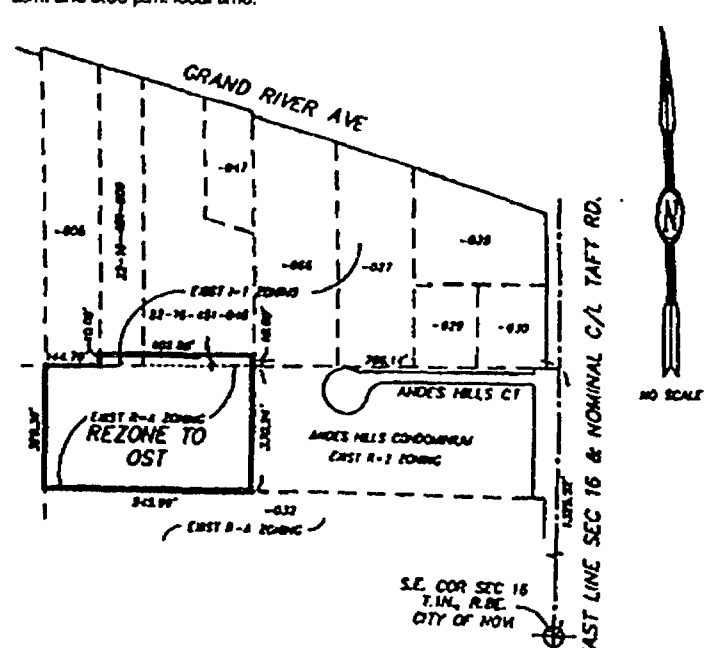

WHAT HAPPENED? • THE COUNTRY CLUB VILLAGE FIRE

Questions go to heart of safety function

Here are most of the questions Country Club Village residents asked about the July 18 fire and the responses offered by the Northville Township Department of Public Safety:

Q: How does the fire department operate?

A: Northville Township does not have a fire station staffed 24 hours a day as larger communities such as Livonia do.

Fire Chief Bill Zhmendak and three other fire professionals are full-time staffers working regular business hours during the week. The fire stations are not staffed during evening/overnight and weekend periods.

When an emergency occurs paid-on call firefighters are contacted via emergency radio page. They must drop whatever they're doing at work or home, drive to a fire station, suit up and then drive fire apparatus to the scene of the incident.

Q: Why were police on the scene of the Country Club Village fire before the fire department?

A: In Northville Township police officers are on patrol 24 hours a day. The DPS emergency response system sends them to a scene first while firefighters are paged and make the trip from home or work to the fire station and from there to wherever they're going.

Q: What caused the fire?

A: Spontaneous combustion. Rags soaked in cleaning solvents were sealed in a closed recycling bin in the garage of home where the fire started.

Some chemicals can react with one another to produce heat. If that reaction takes place in a closed container enough heat can build up to start a fire. After smoldering for an hour to an hour and 45 minutes the heat from the fire triggered the garage door's circuit, causing it to open.

The resulting in-rush of oxygen essentially caused superheated air in the garage and second floor area to catch on fire and explode, shooting through the roof.

Q: How do you prevent a spontaneous combustion fire from breaking out in your home?

A: Many chemicals can cause this reaction such as oil, varnish, paint thinner, or petroleum prod-

ucts. Whenever you put a chemical on a rag, newspaper or other substance, don't put it into a closed container. Instead let the rag thoroughly air dry and then place it into an open container for disposal.

Q: Why were the 911 operators so short with people calling in about the fire?

A: They had to be. The DPS dispatch center received 28 911 calls in 90 seconds after the fire's explosion and had to check them all. Also, a computerized system allows a dispatcher to see the name and address of the 911 caller; they knew people were calling from Country Club Village, the site of so many calls about the blaze.

Q: Why did so many people hear sirens heading in many different directions? Were firefighters lost?

A: No. What people heard were the sirens on the personal vehicles of the firefighters as they drove from all over the area to the township's fire stations.

Q: Some fire trucks stopped to ask directions to the fire from Country Club residents. Couldn't they see the flames and smoke? Didn't they have maps?

A: Yes to both questions. However, experience has shown that asking local residents can often get you where you need to go faster than trying to negotiate streets with a map on the fly.

Q: It seemed like fire department personnel just stood around for several minutes after arriving at the scene, doing nothing. What's the story?

A: Although they weren't putting water on the flames they weren't doing nothing. Fighting a fire is a complex process and firefighters have to consider a number of variables before coming up with a strategy. It then takes time to get equipment and people in place to implement the plan. That's what was happening here.

Q: Why didn't the firefighters hook up to the hydrant nearest to the building on fire instead of using one significantly farther away?

A: Two issues were involved - safety and water pressure. First, the hydrant was just a few feet from the blazing structure, too

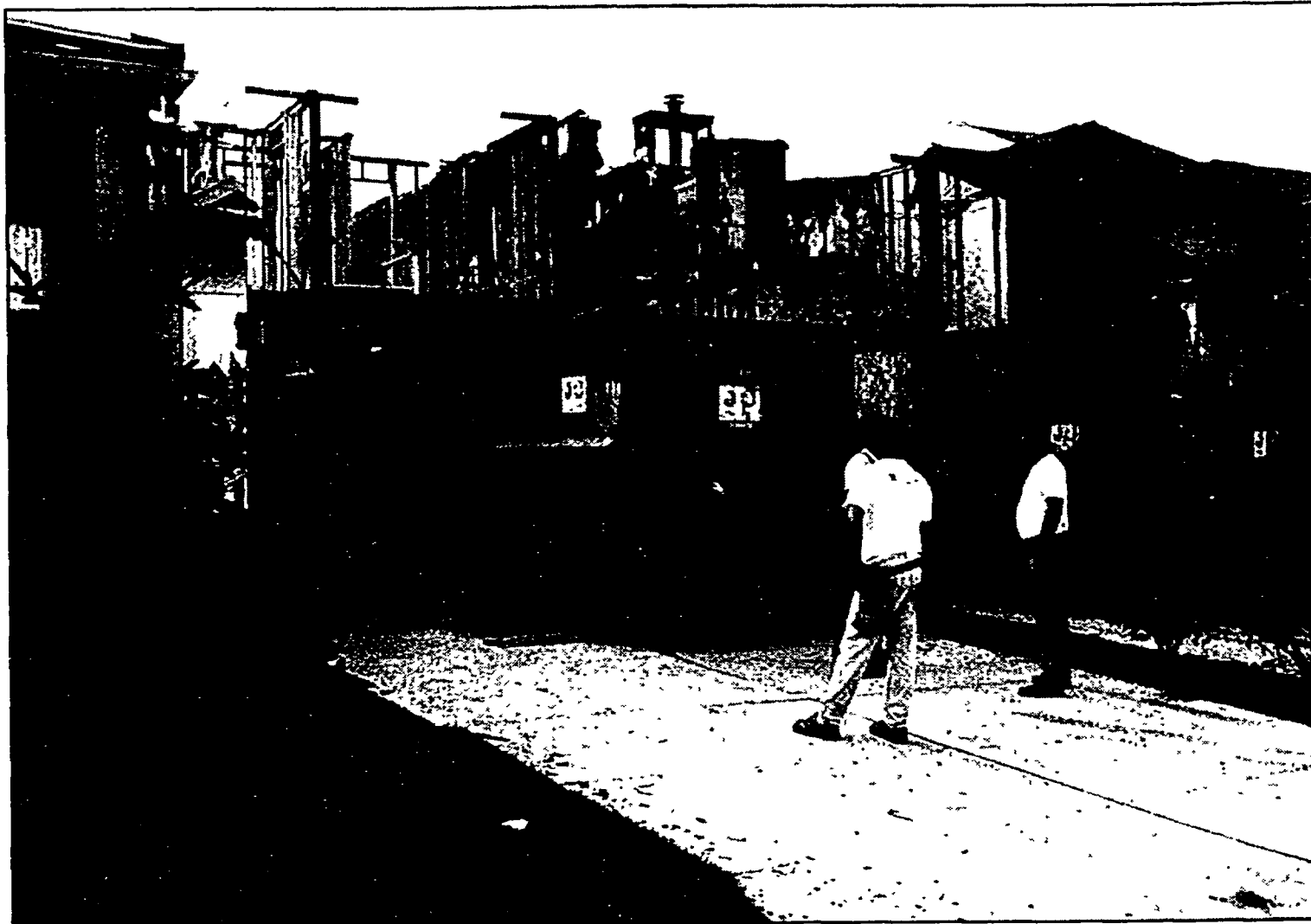

close to put equipment or people in the area.

Second, that particular hydrant is on a "dead-end" line running off of the main "loop" system. The fire department hooked up to a main loop hydrant because dead-end hydrants don't offer enough water pressure and often run dry.

Q: Why was water being sprayed on the building around the fire or on nearby buildings which weren't on fire, instead of on the fire itself?

A: Firefighting is often like triage in medicine. You have to decide what can and can't be saved then spend your finite resources on the

possible, not the impossible.

Members of the fire department say that the sections of the building already on fire when they arrived were lost.

Spraying water on them would not have helped. Instead they chose to work on preventing the fire from spreading to the unburned sections of the structure and nearby buildings.

They say it worked. The first floors of both burned units survived and the two adjacent condos have only smoke and water damage.

Q: Northville Township waited nearly 40 minutes before calling for

help from other fire departments, including requesting a vitally important aerial truck. Why?

A: The township fire department has a "mutual aid" pact with several area communities, whereby everyone agrees to lend a helping hand when one is needed.

Calling for it isn't quick, easy or cheap, however. You're stripping another community of its fire protection system. It has to take time to assemble and respond to a request and must also in turn seek backup from a third community. Consequently, firefighters dealing with an emergency must take time to evaluate their situa-

tion to see if the problem can be contained without outside assistance.

Fire departments are wary of pressing mutual aid too far. "Crying wolf" could end up discontinuing mutual aid altogether, leaving your community less protected.

Q: Why wasn't the township's own aerial truck used?

A: The truck, built in 1967, is old and outmoded. Putting it into service would have taken too much time compared to getting one from the City of Northville, and would have also meant taking several township firefighters away from other duties.

Response time unknowns resolved by dispatch log

How fast did emergency personnel respond to the Country Club Village fire?

Here are some key points in the chain of events on July 18 as recorded by the Northville Township police/fire radio dispatch computer system:

• 9:07 p.m.: Dispatchers receive the first of dozens of 911 calls about the fire after hundreds of people hear an explosion in the burning unit which sends flames through the roof. Dispatchers send

out an emergency radio page to fire personnel less than 60 seconds later.

• 9:08 p.m.: The first township firefighter responds to the page by radio, indicating that he's received it and is on the way to the fire station.

• 9:11 p.m.: The first township police officer arrives at the fire scene. He quickly radios headquarters that DPS is facing a "fully engulfed" structure fire, a key piece of information for firefighters who will soon be battling the blaze.

• 9:14 p.m.: The first fire

department vehicle, with three men inside, arrives on the scene.

• 9:38 p.m.: The last township fire unit arrives.

• 9:45 p.m.: Request for assistance made to the Plymouth Community Fire Department. Units from that department arrive on scene within 35 minutes.

• 9:52 p.m.: Request for assistance made to the Northville Fire Department. Units from that department arrive on scene within 25 minutes.

• 11:32 p.m.: The fire is officially announced to be under control.

Fraction of mill provides most funding

Here are some fast facts about the finances of the Northville Township Fire Department:

• A voter-approved dedicated property tax millage pays for almost all of the fire department's annual expenses. The 0.84 mill tax is a very small part of your property tax bill.

Only about 16 percent of all the money you pay in property taxes comes back to Northville Township's local government. Of that revenue only about 20 percent goes to the fire department. About 70 percent goes to the police

department, the rest for other expenses.

• One specific example: the condominium in Country Club Village where the fire started. Its most recent tax bill totaled about \$2,200, according to the township finance department. Of that amount just \$72 came from the fire department millage.

• Overall, the fire department's current budget stands at about \$566,000. That pays for a full-time staff of four fire professionals who work regular business hours and a staff of about 50-60 paid on-call firefighters who are called to emergency scenes from their homes

and jobs when needed.

• Having a fire department with a fire station staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week would mean a tripling of your tax bill. A home with a taxable value of about \$95,000, for example, pays less than \$100 a year for fire services. A full-time department would put that cost at nearly \$300.

• Also affecting costs are big-ticket capital costs such as major equipment purchases. A new aerial truck, for example, to replace the current 30-year-old model would cost as much as \$540,000. That's nearly equal to the department's entire current budget.

His bottom line: the experience of two decades in firefighting guided his actions. That included a choice many bystanders at the time either didn't understand or didn't agree with, namely Zhmendak's decision to spend his time preventing the fire's spread rather than extinguishing the flames in the two houses.

"I had a decision to make - put out the fire or protect the exposures. With the resources we had at that scene I made a decision to protect the exposures. We knew when we arrived that the second floors of those homes were gone. It

was my decision," he said.

Beyond just answering questions about the fire itself DPS officials spent a lot of time talking finances.

Many township residents were surprised to learn that their affluent community has a fire department which lacks funding for a 24-hour staffed fire station or a replacement for a 30-year-old aerial fire hose truck.

"Your fire department doesn't come with air conditioning or power windows or locks. You have a basic system," Zhmendak said.

Making up for that fact is a hard-core training program designed to get the most out of a

mostly part-time fire department. Both Snider and Zhmendak said that's got to change.

"It's time that we as an organization step up to the population growth in Northville Township," Zhmendak said.

That would mean more full-time firefighters and big-ticket expenditures like a new aerial truck and a third fire station. Both Snider and Zhmendak said they don't think a 24-hour fire department is the right move for now, however.

The model that's in is the most cost-effective and provides the same service equal to or greater than a full-time equivalent," according to Snider.

now have combined to hike costs by more than a half million dollars, neither of which is the fault of his firm.

"I realize your discomfort. I feel equally bad about it," Allen told the council.

That explanation isn't good enough for some city officials. They've raised concerns about Allen's performance, especially in light of the fact that the city's paid the firm \$160,000 to date and construction hasn't even begun yet.

They say the company should have navigated the plan through the mine fields that have popped up.

"I have a problem with the way this whole project has been managed from the beginning. It was your responsibility to keep us out of this situation," was how Council

member Chuck Keys put it.

"We are going more and more into a hole," he added. "We can't afford it."

In September 1996 the firm and the city agreed to a project budget of \$1.39 million. Five months later, in February 1997, that figure rose to \$1.47 million despite cutting some parts of the plan to save money.

The reason, according to City Manager Gary Word in a letter to Allen last week, is that a lot of unexpected expenses have arisen for the city, such as environmental testing and costs for the removal of hazardous materials like asbestos.

Allen in a reply letter said his firm's contract makes it clear that they make no guarantees about price and can't be held responsible for failing to predict unpredictable costs.

The same is true, he told the

council, for the problems the city's experienced with bid prices for the project.

Despite two rounds of bidding the city has received no bids for some parts of the work and only one bid for several others.

Allen attributes that to an extremely busy construction labor market.

There's a lot of business for contractors to choose from now, he said.

Given that, many of them choose to avoid the trouble of jumping through extra hoops to get municipal jobs.

As a result, solo bidders facing no competition have increased their prices, according to Allen.

"It's a very unusual circumstance," he said. "I don't believe it's going to get better."

If the scope of the work and the bid prices all stay the same the city's looking at a bill of \$1.96 mil-

lion. Allen on Monday night suggested a way to shave at least \$200,000 off that total.

He proposed a slew of reductions in the project, everything from eliminating a proposed basement storage room to not replacing city hall's old and energy inefficient windows. That would lower the budget to roughly \$1.76 million.

Combined with that Allen suggested a third attempt to solicit bids from the construction contractor community. With some competitive bidding, he said, the cost could drop into the \$1.6 million range and still allow for the project to start in mid-September and be completed by mid-April of 1998.

"I don't see any way to get it back within budget and still maintain the essential features of the plan," Allen added, meaning that any more cuts in the scope of the

Allen & Laux, the current firm, has handled the project, citing unexpected costs and exorbitantly high bid prices.

The top priority is that whatever city officials decide to do, they've got to move quickly to do it. Demolition work inside city hall is already under way. The boiler that supplies heat to the police department in the winter has been disconnected. City workers

are housed in the former library in the lower part of the building.

"We're past the point of no return," was how Council member Carolan Ayers put it. "We can only delay for so long."

The council will take up the matter when it meets Monday night, Aug. 4, at 7:30 p.m. in the meeting room of the Northville District Library. Council members will review recommendations from the city's administrative staff on what to do next.

work will pretty much defeat the point of renovating city hall in the first place.

The problem city officials have is that the extra work means more money out of the project budget.

"Each time you redesign the project," Word said in his letter, "more of the dollars in the project budget are consumed by your fees, leaving less money available to actually construct the project."

"We have to be under construction this year. We have to keep moving forward," he told the commission.

To achieve that Pappas will have to meet with township planning specialists to hammer out a number of concerns they have about the site, everything from the number of parking spaces to the location of fire lanes and drainage ponds. The commission's approval vote is conditioned on resolution of those issues.

Addington Place, an 80-resident facility, won preliminary approval from the commission in April. It features a "neighborhood" design plan: residents in each wing would have their own kitchen, dining area and outdoor patio as well as individual apartments.

The plan is to design both American House and Addington Place in a common style, according to Pappas - what architects refer to as a "campus" look. That would include similar architectural patterns and building materials as well as a single road and sidewalk system.

You won't be able to get "The World's Greatest Hamburger" anymore, but you will get to savor seafood prepared by the former executive chef of the famous Golden Mushroom in Southfield.

Steve & Rocky's, an upscale seafood restaurant, took over the Fuddrucker's Restaurant building on Grand River Avenue which closed last month. The new venture is owned by Charles (Rocky) Rachwitz, the owner of the Rocky's restaurants in Northville and Brighton, and Steve Allen, the former chef of the Golden Mushroom.

"We'll have a lot of seafood but also have steaks, veal and simple pastas," Allen said. "It will be a fun, family environment on the verge of fine dining."

"I think we can do some upscale things and still keep it within the family budget," he added.

The restaurant is scheduled to open in October after undergoing an interior decorating make-over, according to John Campbell, the general manager of Rocky's of Northville.

"We're putting quite a bit of money into it," he said.

The outside of the building will remain virtually the same, with changes to just the signage and the awnings, according to Roman Bonislowski, an architect with JPRA. The inside will be completely remodeled to feature a large bar and two dining areas. The decor is inspired by the seafood and grill theme.

"It's a rather interesting approach with a lot of natural stone and woodwork," Bonislowski said.

Allen said he and Rocky began talking about a joint restaurant five or six months ago and the opportunity to lease the building in Novi was something neither could pass up.

"It's a beautiful area. We're excited," he said.

Allen said he will leave the Golden Mushroom to work full-time at the new place. He's been with the Southfield eatery for 15 years.

"Normally, when you change ownership it's a pretty simple process," Allen said.

Fuddrucker's, a national restaurant chain specializing in hamburger plates, was closed by the owner Thomas Antoniou only last month.

The Northville Central Business Association held its second annual Bargain Bazaar last Saturday, and the day started out with a bang—literally.

DNR will staff exhibit at Fair

Department of Natural Resources staff will build "Michigan: Your Great Outdoor Adventure," a 50,000-square foot pocket park, Aug. 4-16, at the Michigan State Fair Exhibition Center, Eight Mile Road and Woodward Avenue in Detroit.

Located on the fairgrounds near the Community Arts Building, the 100 foot by 500 foot park will feature a Welcome Tent, three activity

DNR wants to know about problems with geese

Some Michigan residents have been complaining about problems associated with Canada geese on their property. The Michigan department of Natural Resources is asking for specific information about these problems.

The DNR's "Evaluation of Damages Associated with Canada Geese" is a single sheet of multiple-choice questions which will help the DNR determine exactly what types of problems geese are causing, what time of year the problems occur, the economic costs involved, and what control methods have been tried.

"We want to assess what constitutes a nuisance to people and what they consider to be a tolerable number of geese," said Pete Squibb, supervisor of the DNR's Wildlife Management Section. "We're also interested in finding out what measures people have taken to control geese problems on their property."

The surveys are available from any DNR office, including the one in Livonia, phone (313) 953-0241.

If you are having problems with Canada geese on your property, the following measures may help keep the birds away:

- First and foremost, do not feed the geese. This only keeps them attracted to the area.

- Border your yard with string or fencing. This will only work on areas where geese are walking (not flying) onto the property. To string

your property, tie two strands of string, at five and 14 inches off the ground, to make a visual border around the area.

- Put owl or snake decoys on your lawn. They must be moved frequently to be effective.

- Apply a commercial goose repellent made from grape extract to your lawn.

- Train your dog to scare geese off your property.

- In small areas, such as docks, using a mylar helium balloon can dissuade birds.

- Use noise makers or shell crackers. This method can only be used in areas where local ordinances allow for the discharge of a firearm and can be obtained by contacting your district office.

- Put large, bright-orange flags on your lawn. Flags should be 1.5 to 3 feet in size.

Because geese graze primarily on grass, well-manicured lawns and golf courses provide a great food source. Michigan's many lakes, streams and ponds furnish plenty of water and nesting sites, and there are no significant predators to control populations.

In past years, the DNR relocated geese to other states and rural areas of Michigan. In recent years, however, the demand for Canada geese in other states has dropped.

Last year, hunters harvested about 160,000 geese statewide. Of those, about 90,000 to 100,000 were local giant Canada geese.

Kristin has only been playing the oboe for a couple of years, but her progress has been remarkable, according to Jan.

Disaster claims from storm highest in Wayne County

Anyone living or working in Oakland, Wayne, Genesee or Macomb counties who became unemployed or whose work was interrupted as a result of the July 2 severe storms, tornadoes and flooding may be eligible for disaster unemployment assistance, officials from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Michigan State Police Emergency

Management Division (MSP-EMD) announced. Gary Pierson, FEMA's Federal Coordinating Officer, said this special program was triggered by President Clinton's July 11 disaster declaration. Those eligible include people who are:

- Self-employed or a migrant or seasonal worker with income that was substantially affected by the disaster.
- Not covered by any other unemployment compensation
- Survivors who, as a result of the disaster, become heads of households
- Individuals may apply for benefits at any Michigan Employment

Security Agency office through Aug. 18. For further information, call MESA at 1-800-638-3995. As of the close of business on July 23, the number of disaster assistance applications FEMA received totaled 4,843. The breakdown by county is: Oakland 113; Wayne 4,580; Genesee 32; Macomb 118.

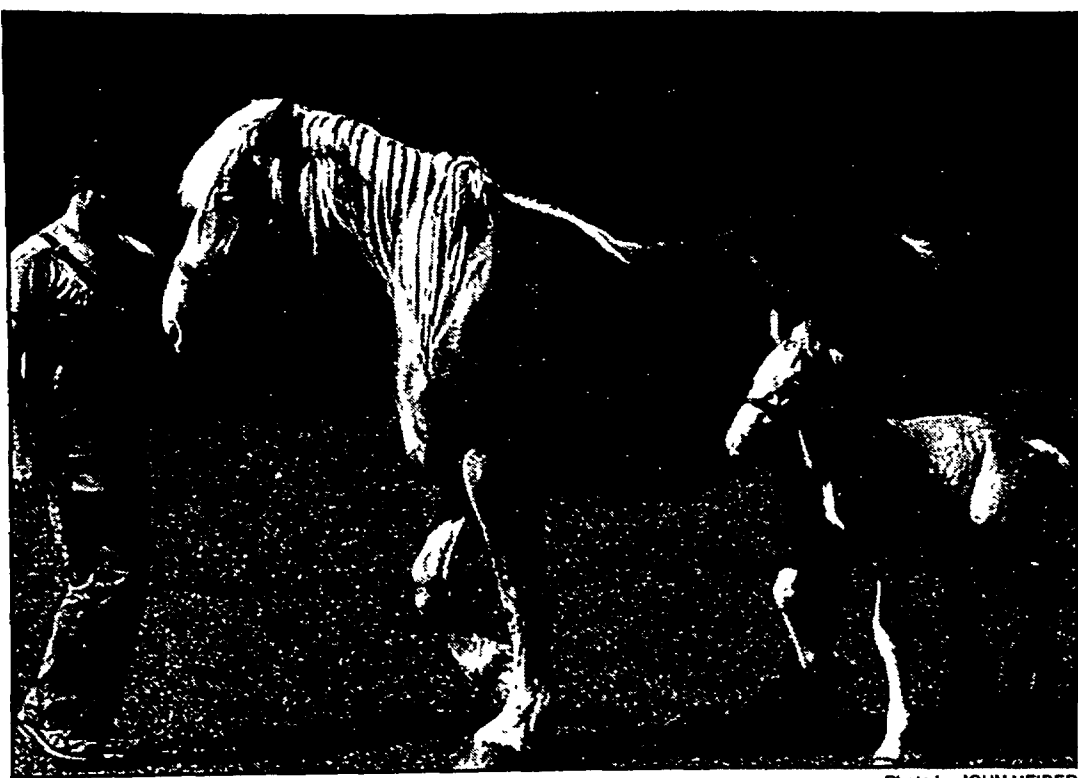

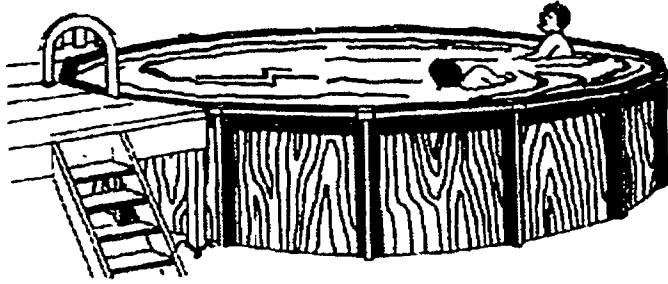

Overheating avoidable during summer

Vehicle owners can avoid doing a slow burn over an overheated engine by staying cool during summer's heat and following some common sense advice, according to AAA Michigan.

"An overheating car on a hot summer day in a traffic tie-up is not fun not only for you, but the drivers behind you," says Jerry Basch, AAA Michigan Community Safety Services manager.

Basch offered some tips to help motorists beat the heat:

- Make sure your battery is in good condition. "An old or weak battery will fail, maybe even more than during winter, with the power demands of air conditioning and hot, humid weather," Basch says.

- Maintain your car's cooling system. Mechanics recommend draining or flushing your system and replacing coolant if it is dirty or rusty or more than two years old. This is especially important on cars with aluminum engine parts and radiators.

- Check your engine oil, and maintain proper levels. Oil not only lubricates the engine, but acts as a "heat sink," drawing

excess heat away from the engine. Don't wait for dashboard warning lights to tell you to add oil. By the time most lights come on, you've only got 30 to 40 percent of your engine's oil remaining.

Check your oil at least every two weeks and consult your vehicle owner's manual for oil change intervals. If it's black, it's probably time for a change.

- If your vehicle starts to overheat in traffic, turn on your heater and fan to high. It may get uncomfortable, but pulling heat away from the engine might save thousands of dollars of mechanical damage to your vehicle's engine. If possible, pull off of the crowded road onto a less busy highway to allow more air flow through the radiator to return the engine temperature to normal.

- If that doesn't help, pull over and open the hood to cool down the engine. Don't remove the radiator cap. You risk being scalded by the hot, pressurized liquid, and your engine will lose nearly all its coolant, possibly causing damage.

- Bring plenty of cool liquids in a non-air-conditioned car on warm

days. Travelers should also carry a sun shield to cover the windshield and cut interior heat build-up, and sunglasses to protect against glaring sun. A cellular telephone or CB radio are useful emergency tools.

- Never leave a child or pet unattended in a car. According to the Michigan Humane Society, on an 85-degree day, the air in a car, even with its windows slightly open, can reach 102 degrees in 10 minutes and 120 degrees in 30 minutes. On warmer days it can get even hotter. Cover metal and plastic on seat belts and child safety seats to prevent burns.

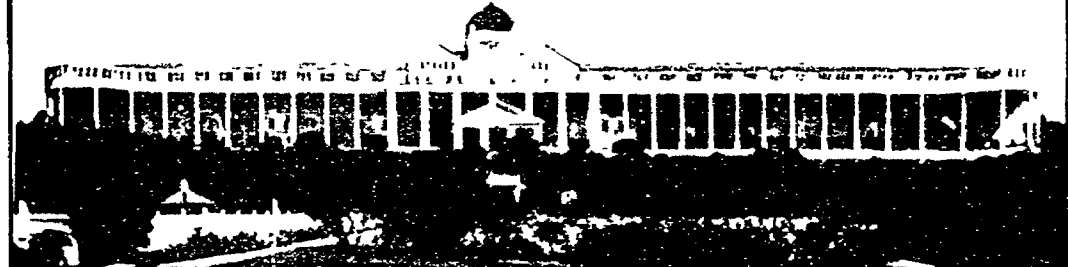

Pointers can help in freezing food safely

Much confusion exists on how freezing protects food. The Michigan Department of Agriculture offers the following guidelines on how to safely freeze food and how long frozen food may be safely kept.

Almost any food but eggs in shells and canned food may be frozen. Food stored at a constant temperature of zero degrees Fahrenheit should always be safe. Freezing to zero degrees Fahrenheit inactivates the microbes, including bacteria, yeast and mold, that are present in food. After thawing, proper cooking will destroy these microbes.

Foods frozen at the peak of freshness will taste better than foods frozen near the end of their usual life. Freezing does not destroy nutrients and there is little change in nutrient value during freezer storage of meat and poultry products.

Vegetables must be blanched or partially cooked in boiling water or a microwave oven in order to be frozen adequately. The vegetables must then be chilled rapidly before freezing and storage.

To avoid freezer burn, foods should be wrapped in airtight packaging. Freezer burn does not spoil food, it merely dries it in spots. It may be cut away before or after cooking.

Food should be frozen as quickly as possible. Slow freezing allows large ice crystals that damage cells and dissolve emulsions, while thawing to form in and around the product.

Freezing keeps food safe almost indefinitely, and recommended storage times are for quality only. A freezer storage chart is included at the end of this article. As a general rule, if the taste and texture of cooked food is pleasing, it can be used.

Food should never be defrosted in a garage, basement, car, dishwasher, plastic garbage bag, on the kitchen counter or on a porch. These methods could render food unsafe to eat. There are three safe ways to defrost food: in the refrigerator, in cold water, or in the microwave.

Faster defrosting can be achieved by placing frozen food in a leak-proof bag and immersing it in cold water. The water must stay cold and should be changed every 30 minutes.

Once defrosted, the item may be refrigerated. Food defrosted in a microwave should be cooked immediately after defrosting as some of the areas may become warm and begin to cook during the process.

Food defrosted in the refrigerator is safe to refreeze without cooking. After cooking raw foods that were previously frozen, it is safe to freeze the cooked food.

Poultry, raw or cooked meat, and casseroles can be cooked or reheated from a frozen state, but will take approximately one and a half times the usual cooking time of food that has been thawed.

The labels of USDA inspected frozen meat and poultry need to be read because some of these items must be cooked from the frozen state to ensure a safely cooked product.

Release of crime figures delayed

Want to know about crime in your community?

Too bad. Computer changeovers at Oakland County and the Michigan State Police have slowed the results of 1996 crime statistics typically released early in the year for local communities.

The Court and Law Enforcement Information Management System in Oakland County originally released the numbers to local departments, but Novi Police Chief

Douglas Shaeffer said they were unreliable.

Shaeffer explained the wrong figures means the department can't use the numbers in the yearly comparisons and studies it does of crime.


That's preventing some groups, like Communities That Care, from using the information in their studies. Communities That Care, a group of local citizens and community leaders studying teen behavior and juvenile delinquency in Novi, cannot utilize the most up-to-date

figures in their study this year.


Without those figures it's difficult to spot trends or compare statistics to other studies, he explained.

"If you have no confidence in your numbers you must be careful about what a trend or comparison might mean," he said.

He said the problem hasn't caused major problems for the department, which can rely on other measures of crime such as officer reports, public dialogue and dispatch records.

Campaign against inhalants launched

Parents across the country have very little knowledge about inhalant abuse - a sometimes deadly behavior of youth nationwide.

With teen drug use increasing, much has been reported in the media about the effects of substance abuse on America's youth. Unfortunately, inhalant abuse - sniffing concentrated fumes of common household products to get high - is often left out of the picture. Consequently, inhalant abuse is now America's silent epidemic.

According to the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, in any given month this summer, nearly half a million young people ages 12-17 will be using inhalants.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse, more than one in five children abuse inhalants to get high before finishing high school. In Oakland County, 32.2 percent of eighth grade students have used inhalants. Inhalant abuse ranks third in use after alcohol and tobacco for children in first through seventh grade. For children in eighth grade and up, inhalant abuse is fourth behind alcohol, tobacco and marijuana.

Common, legal products abused as inhalants include: glue, lighter fluid, nitrous oxide, shoe polish, spray paint, correction fluid, markers, gasoline, nail polish remover, spot remover, whipped cream, butane, chloroform, helium and propane. Young people in the 12-17 age group most commonly abuse nitrous oxide or "whippets."

Abusing inhalants is like playing Russian roulette. Abuse anytime

can result in sudden sniffing death, even the first time. Long-term effects of chronic inhalant use include short term memory loss, hearing impairment, limb spasms, permanent brain damage, bone marrow damage, and liver and kidney damage.

Unfortunately, inhalant abuse has the potential to become an even larger problem because the products are readily available and the modes of administration are simple.

The first step in preventing the problem is education. Recently in Washington, D.C., the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, Partnership for a Drug-Free America and a group of industry leaders unveiled a new national education campaign designed to educate parents about the dangers of inhalant abuse.

The campaign will include a new public service announcement featuring Deloris Jordan, mother of Chicago Bulls basketball star Michael Jordan, to be aired on television stations around the country. New educational outreach information to be distributed by campaign participants to parents nationwide, and the results of a study examining parents' awareness of the inhalant abuse problem.

The Oakland County Health Division is joining the national effort and leading the fight against inhalant abuse in Oakland County.

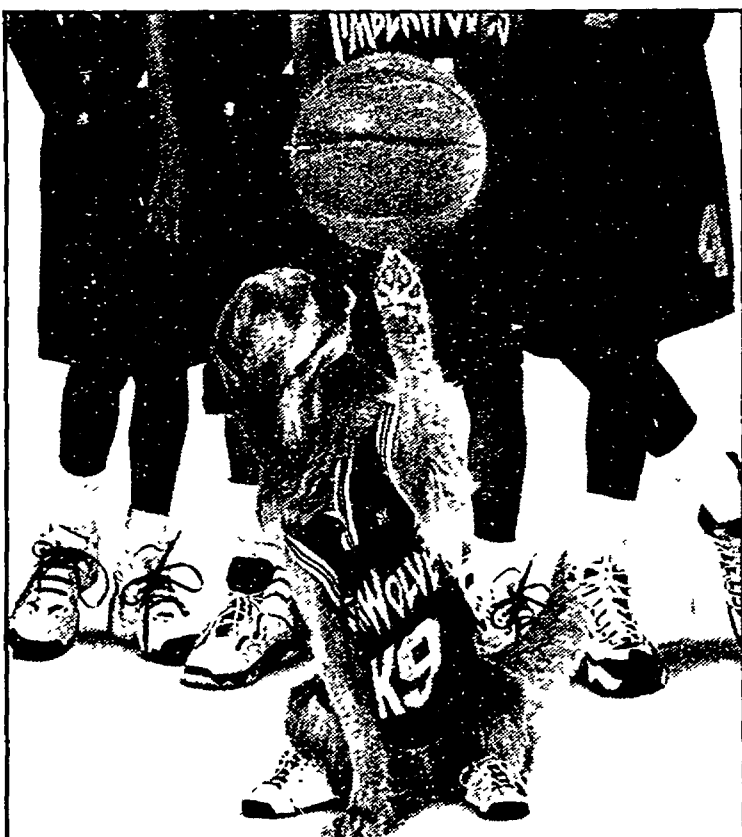

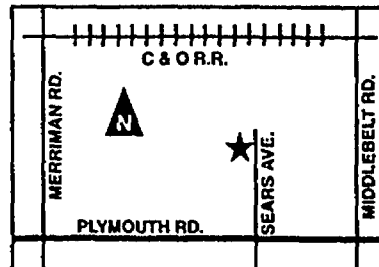

OCC Highland Campus to get new president

"I heard Michigan had an extremely fine system of higher education," said Dr. Oswald Person, who takes over Aug. 4 as president of Oakland Community College's Highland Lakes Campus.

"When I came to Michigan State University in 1972 as a graduate student, some of the professors brought us to OCC. It is one of the best in the state. It has a good history in terms of leadership and student achievement," said the Texas-born educator who has worked in Lansing, California and North Carolina.

Person was OCC Chancellor Richard Thompson's choice to head Highland Lakes, and his appointment to the \$105,000 post was confirmed 4-0 in a special board meeting. He shares Thompson's vision of "a new system so we don't end up working as separate campus systems."

Person will move here from Tarrant County Junior College in Fort Worth, Texas, where he has been president of the South Campus since January 1994. In 1993-94 he was dean of student academic support at Lansing Community College. He also has taught or lectured at Winston Salem State University, Lansing CC and MSU.

"It will be a large challenge," he said, "to get to know the units and get to know the community." He wants to be "compassionate, friendly, open to ideas. You can't fool people."

OFF-ROAD CAMPUS

Person comes to the westernmost of OCC's five campuses. Highland Lakes is located off the roads in the southwestern Waterford Township, where it meets West Bloomfield, Commerce and Highland Townships.

It's the area of Oakland County that gave OCC its weakest voter support for the 1995 property tax hike and where its public identity is the faintest.

With 6,000 of OCC's 26,000 students, Highland Lakes specializes in: allied health, such as nursing, dental hygiene, early childhood development, medical assisting and exercise technology; business, including accounting and business information systems; aviation flight technology, liberal arts and engineering.

He replaces Preston Pulliams, who left several months ago to take a presidency in the east.

Person's intellectual interest is "diffusion" - how ideas spread. "Some 2.5 percent are innovators; others are early adopters; then there are the early majority, the late majority and the laggards."

"I wanted to determine if people in community colleges could be classified by their awareness of innovation."

"I thought my study had some relevance, but I wouldn't want to stake my life on my conclusions," he smiled.

Person's academic studies were broad: a bachelor of science in special education and American

history from DC Teachers College in Washington, master of library science from the University of Maryland, and a doctorate in instruction and development and history from MSU. In 1988 he was one of 30 educators chosen for the Executive Leadership Institute of the League of Innovation in the

Community College.

TOP SLOTS FILLED

After a year as chancellor, Thompson finally has a full complement of campus presidents, with Person in Highland Lakes, Diann Schindler in Auburn Hills, and the continuation of George

Keith at Orchard Ridge and Martha Smydra at Southfield-Royal Oak.

In the second tier of administrators:

- Ann Craigmule, who had been acting president at Highland, will return to her post as dean of academic and student services.

- Gordon May, acting dean at Highland, will move over to Auburn Hills as dean, replacing Dorothy Buchan, who retired. May continues as director of the Pontiac Center.

- Timothy L. Walter was approved as academic dean of the

Orchard Ridge Campus. He will move here July 21 from the University of Illinois-Chicago, where is director of the Academic Center for Excellence and associate director of the counseling center. He replaces Carol Brown, who has moved up to acting vice-chancellor.

The board, with only four of its seven members present, delayed action on retaining Karoub Associates as its Lansing lobbyist. Trustee Sandra Ritter questioned the need for both a lobbyist and membership in the Michigan Community College Association.

Shaggy-haired teen idol headlines Novi music festival

At 17, an age when most of us are fretting about who we're going to sit next to in the school lunchroom, Peter Noone was an international superstar.

As the "Herman" part of Herman's Hermits, he was the lead singer in a British rock 'n roll band that by 1965 was giving The Beatles some serious competition in the hit parade.

Saturday night, Noone wowed a revved-up crowd at the Michigan 50s Festival with standards like "I'm Henry The Eighth, I Am" and "Mrs. Brown, You've Got A Lovely Daughter" - plus Johnny Cash and Bob Dylan imitations.

"He's as good today as he was in 1965," said a fan among the crowd jamming - and jammed - by the stage.

Noone told the audience he kept his youthful looks and remembered the 1960s because he didn't do drugs.

"We did drink some alcohol, but we never swallowed," he quipped.

Today, Noone, who turns 50 in November, is a resident of Santa

Barbara, Calif.
The Northville Record interviewed him before his performance.

Record: How many days are you on the road touring annually?
Noone: 120 to 130 days

Record: You've worked with so many different people over the years, which person or people made the biggest impression on you?

Noone: I enjoyed meeting all of them. The biggest impression was The Beatles, they were so good and nice and they were the first. Elvis was good and nice.

Record: You were so young when your career started. What was it like to have girls screaming for you? How about trying to date?

Noone: I never dated any of the ones that were screaming. It's really very difficult to go out to dinner with someone who's screaming at you from across the table.

I have an 11-year-old daughter and she gets excited about The Hanson Brothers. They have someone age nine and someone age 11 and someone age 13;

there's somebody for each age of teenager to lust after.

Record: At what age did you know you were destined for a career in entertainment?

Noone: When I got my first check, at age 11 or 12.

(By 13, Noone was an actor on the highly popular British soap opera Coronation Street.)

Record: What do you do in your free time? Do you have any absorbing hobbies?

Noone: I listen to records. I love anything musical. I'm sort of a one-trick pony.

I'm a music guy.

I came from a musical family. My father was a professional musician, my grandfather was somewhat professional. They wanted me to be a doctor.

At first, I was going to do this to pay for school.

Record: What do you think about new recording artists?

Noone: I've never had a problem with things. I like some rap songs. I don't like rap when it's rude to people.

Record: What's your favorite type of music? Is music as good today as it used to be?

Noone: Early '60s, early '70s era.

I don't think it's stopped. There's a lot of good stuff going on all the time.

Perry Como was always one of my favorites.

Record: What was the funniest thing that ever happened to you on tour?

Noone: I was at Keith Moon's birthday party when all his teeth got knocked out. That was funny at the time.

(In 1967, The Who opened for The Herman's Hermits in a U.S. tour. Moon, The Who's drummer,

died in 1978.)

Record: You were in a lot of movies.

Noone: That was just a gig. We were just a rock 'n roll band. Being in the movies, that was for Cary Grant.

Our movies were for teenage girls.

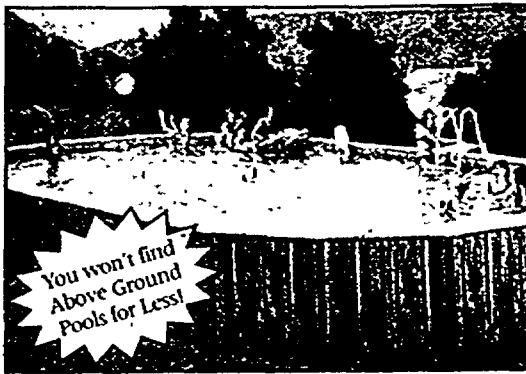

"Return to a time when Marlon Brando could fit on a motorcycle. When Prince was a guy who married Grace Kelly, not who dressed like Grace Kelly..."

That's what Bowzer, a.k.a. Jon Bauman, the former leader of Sha Na Na, said Saturday night. Bowzer urged the crowd at the Michigan 50s Festival to escape from the 1990s, for a rendezvous with the 1950s.

Each July since 1988, Novi's done just that.

An estimated 200,000 turned out for last week's five-day event, which went off with few glitches, according to festival organizers.

"There were a few more people than in past years. It was very evident on Friday and Saturday night," said festival board president Bob McCann.

"I thought the shows were terrific."

It was a hot festival, in all meanings of the word.

Cindy Kopczynski, coordinator of The Cruisers, a 60-member group of festival volunteers, said the thermometer on her deck reached 97 degrees on Saturday.

"The volunteers and all the people who enjoyed themselves, even with the heat and everything, that was a positive," festival manager Jane Thomas said Tuesday.

"We are very, very fortunate to have such hardworking volunteers. I think it was a big success."

While the final financial figures aren't in yet, the board's goal is to build a bandstand on Main Street. In the near future, results from a survey are expected to provide detailed demographics on the festival.

While the first 50s Festival was a disaster, things went so smoothly this time, McCann said, that on the opening night last Wednesday, board members were both shocked and delighted when they realized there weren't any last minute details to worry about.

OK, all was not perfect. There was one big problem. Laura, the eight-foot-tall African elephant, had an anxiety attack last Friday night.

Not that she was rampaging through the Expo Center; it happened while she was in her travel trailer.

Thomas said a festival-goer

parked her car illegally in front of a garage door at the Expo Center. Laura was packed up and ready to go to another engagement, but her vehicle was blocked. After a fruitless search for the owner, the offending car was finally towed away.

"Laura got stuck for an hour and a half. She was getting anxious to get going," Thomas said.

Such prima donna behavior is to be expected from a star. Laura's film credits include "Ace Ventura - When Nature Calls."

Laura proved a popular attraction with adults and kids. The pachyderm was parked next to popcorn and ice cream vendor Mary Smith.

While Smith said her sales were down from previous years, she was enthusiastic of the event, especially the shifting of the Family Entertainment Tent to the outdoor midway, near the food.

Young people seemed to enjoy flitting around the area on Saturday night, although the under-21 set was banned from the Entertainment Tent, where alcohol was served.

"It gave the food vendors the opportunity to have people go right by them. I think Jane Thomas did a wonderful job," Smith said.

Smith said her husband was partial to Laura.

"I fed her almonds. I didn't know that elephants slobbered," Smith added.

Speaking of soggy, Friday's ice cream social at the Novi Civic Center was a dripping success.

"We got rid of everything. We had 6,500 ice creams. We had Bugs Bunny. We had great rides. A puppet show," said Tom Marcus, who helped organize the event for the Novi Downtown Merchants Association.

"The big thing is for people to go in those stores and say 'thank you.'"

Marcus, who is looking for someone to take over the job for him next year, said he had a incredible volunteer team, mainly of senior citizens. But he couldn't resist taking a dig at a restaurant-owning buddy.

"All we saw Frank Malsano do is ride around in the golf cart," Marcus said.

Also on Friday, another star proved to be far from a prima donna. When the driver for Doris

Jackson, of the Shirelles, didn't hook up with the singer at the airport, she found her own way to Novi.

For McCann the highlight of the event for him was a private Shirelles concert, in their dressing room before the performance. The women were in the mood to sing some gospel music.

"I said, 'do you mind if I stay?' I stayed there for ten minutes to listen to all three of them sing a capella gospel music," McCann said.

McCann, strictly a volunteer, chauffeured many of the entertainers. He estimated he put in 150 hours of work for the event last week.

"I got 18 hours of sleep in that amount of time. You keep going on adrenaline. It's just so much fun. You keep going or you'll fall down," he added.

Saturday saw a second performance by Bowzer and former Hermit Peter Noone on stage, as well as a spectacular fireworks show provided by Twelve Oaks Mall after nightfall.

Noone, who's not lacking in experience with crowds, guessed his audience was in the 11,000 to 12,000 range.

Sunday was the Classic Car Show and the Grand River Cruise. Novi Police Chief Doug Shaeffer helped organize the car show this year.

About 1,000 classic cars showed up, Thomas estimated.

"It wasn't a bad festival at all. The cruise went pretty well," Shaeffer said.

"I had to keep myself hydrated. I bet I drank two gallons of water on Sunday."

Meanwhile, the festival board is already working on next year. Hey, hey, Thomas is eyeing The Monkees ...

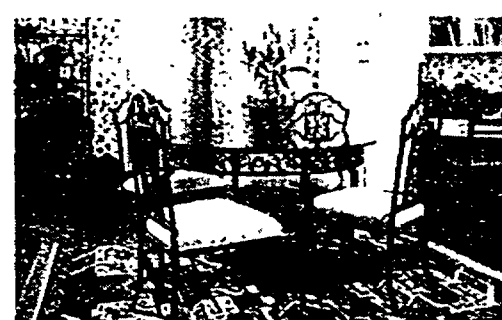

Time to rethink township priorities

Upset over the way the Northville Township Fire Department handled a blaze at their complex, some residents of Country Club Village made utterances that they were going to help defeat next year's fire millage in the township.

Now, after learning more about the meager resources with which the township department works, some sound willing to pay more tax dollars to beef the department up.

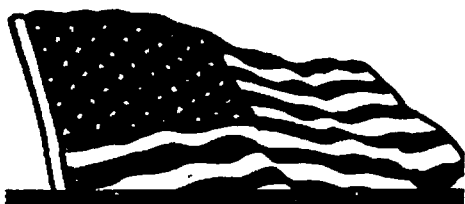
Now that's more like it.

Yes, Virginia, your community really is a township and that means lower taxes. But it also means fewer services for all departments, including the big one - public safety.

The controversy over the way the department fought the fire - response time, the use of equipment, certain firefighting practices - has afforded us an opportunity to prepare what amounts to a fire department primer for our readers who live in the township.

We're happy to clarify the way the department works (see page 7A), but we hope no one will be shocked to learn that the township only retains the services of four full-time firefighting professionals and keeps no station staffed round-the-clock.

The township makes use of what's known as a paid on-call staff: that is, firefighters are paged at the time of an outbreak and must leave their homes and places of business to suit up and fly to the scene.



Government

The tiny fraction-of-a-mill tax that provides most of the funding for the department doesn't generate enough revenue for state-of-the-art provisions. For example, the township aerial truck is a 1967-vintage vehicle. More time is required to put it into service than it takes to call for a truck from a neighboring department.

Given the way the department is set up, it's nothing short of amazing that the township's firefighting capability is as efficient as it is. Overall, the department is staffed by highly dedicated, superbly qualified firefighting experts. Township residents are indeed fortunate to be served by such a group. But as good as they are, there's only so much you can do with next to nothing.

We agree with certain Country Club Village residents who are quoted in today's paper as saying it's time to make a reassessment. Northville Township is no longer the semi-rural place it once was. It's a dynamic, growing, full-service community. No need for an identity crisis, just a change in priorities.

Folk festival conclusion to leave summertime void

Calling all community-minded leaders and organizers! Your talents, energy, commitment and time are sorely needed.

Sunday marked the end of a great and venerable tradition in Northville, as the final installment of the annual Folk & Bluegrass Festival came and went under sunny skies and in humid, steamy conditions.

It was the 21st consecutive July the day-long celebration of music-making and camaraderie had taken place.

But, unless someone steps in and picks up where organizer Tom Rice left off, it'll be the last.

Rice first staged his folk bash back in 1977 as a fund-raiser for Huntington's Disease research. Dedicated to folk legend Woody Guthrie and Rice's sister Donna Jarski, both Huntington's victims, the event has provided a great opportunity to relax and listen to outdoor music during the peak of

summer. The fact that the money went to a good cause was the icing on the cake.

But Rice is about to initiate a major life change that will probably involve the closing of his Gitfiddler music store in Northville. And when he goes, so goes the festival.

It's been a great run: 21 terrific marathon concerts featuring top name entertainment from the folk music world. The festival has also served as a great showcase for local and regional performers, many of whom are masterful musicians deserving of wider recognition.

We'd like to say thanks to Tom for doing so much to put Northville on the musical map of southeastern Michigan. Thanks again, and good luck in your next venture.

In the meantime, a great tradition begs to be continued if a civic-minded leader will only take up the cause.

Democracy, grassroots style

I'd swear sometimes I've spent more hours covering government meetings than I've had hot dinners. After five years of them I've learned that 90 percent of my time's spent waiting for the 10 percent that's really important to happen.

Last Thursday's meeting about the July 18 Country Club Village fire was definitely a 10 percent. It was one of the most engaging and useful dialogs between township residents and the people who make up their local government that I've seen in a long time.

It was a booster shot to my faith in democracy. I sure hope it inspires some of you out there to get involved with your government.

More than 100 people packed Northville Township Hall that night. The best thing to come out of it is that they walked away with a much better understanding of the police and fire system that's in place to protect them.

That's how it should be. After all, you pay for it and you're the ones who have to rely on it if and when disaster strikes.

The thing I've always liked about local government is that it gives you the best value for your tax dollar because it's right in your neighborhood.

You see what you get for your money: police cars driving by, fire trucks rolling up at an accident scene, the garbage getting picked up.

There's also the fact that the people who spend your money are your neighbors. You can bump into them at a PTA meeting or a ballgame or the supermarket and get your voice heard.

If you've got something to say it only takes a phone call or a quick trip to Township Hall for a chat with anyone from a member of the board of trustees to the chief of police.

That's why I'm echoing the call they put out at the meeting last week: get involved with your local government.

Take this month's fire. If you were shocked to discover that your township doesn't have the level of protection you thought it did, do something about it. Get in on the decision-making process about what's going to happen in the future.

The Northville Township Board of Trustees will be holding meetings on next year's budget soon. Not too long after that will likely start talking about a fire and police millage for next year's election ballot.

If you're discouraged by the size and scope of things, remember that a budget is a budget is a budget, whether it's your family's or your community's. You can learn how the township's works with just a little investment of your time.

The reward is that then you'll be in a position to offer an informed opinion to the folks who make the choices and that's the lifeblood of democracy, folks.

Besides, I'd like some company at all of those meetings yet to come.

Beware the folly of over developing

It would be difficult to argue against your advice in editorials of July 17 and 24, in which you prescribed a cautious and thorough study of the proposed retail space expansion of downtown Northville.

"Proposed" is the proper word because, as the past has shown, whenever an idea strikes the fancy of an "in" group in the Northville community, it is usually revealed to the public after having been studied and sanctioned by an "independent" consulting firm which by inference elevates the plan to the level of necessity for the community.

Does it seem peculiar to anyone else that any proposed publicly funded improvement, whether it be a new high school or new parking decks, is always supported by public-funded outside consultants? Has there been any project in recent years which has not received the endorsement of the consultant?

On July 14, *The Northville Record* reported that a consulting firm from Birmingham has recommended a 50 percent increase in the retail space of the City of Northville. Ironically, seven days later, in the July 21 issue of the *U.S. News and World Report*, page 51, appears an article "They drop till you shop. Montgomery Ward stumbles. Is America overstore?"

U.S. News quotes Kurt Barnard, "... the respected president of Barnard's Retail Marketing Report in Scotch Plains, N.J." "America is absolutely overstored ... there are 20 square feet of retail space for every man, woman and child in this nation, up from 14.7 square feet per person in 1986."

Further, "The industry may have 30 to 50 percent more space than we really need."

The fact that major retailers such as Montgomery Ward, Woolworth's, Sears, Kmart and Talbot's, to name a very few, are all in financial trouble should make us all pause. D&C Stores, a small town downtown feature for decades (including Northville) closed all its stores a few years ago accompanied by the pronouncement by its CEO that the public fantasizes that, given the opportunity, it would leisurely shop on

small town Main Street, but, in fact, it doesn't. Not in sufficient numbers to support a viable downtown even when they live in the town.

One need only ask that if given the same opportunity to develop our town, would those who propose these schemes gamble their own money? After all, when a business outside the immediate downtown of Northville attempts to expand, it is saddled with the entire burden of its own financing, its own land purchase, its own parking lot, its own maintenance, its own insurance premiums and pays taxes, etc., etc. ... forever.

If a publicly funded project fails, the millage continues and the public pays off the bonds. Furthermore, the recent offer to sell city owned land for 67 cents per square foot is a public subsidy of private enterprise. That is equivalent to buying a vacant residential lot 100 feet by 120 feet for \$8,000.

Where are all the developers for the city owned Cady Street properties which have sat idle, vacant and off the tax rolls for numerous years?

And what about the argument of those who would support expansion of the retail space that "... the viability of the city's residential areas is directly tied to the health of the business district." (Northville Record, July 24, editorial, page 20A)? Based on that argument Franklin Village and Beverly Hills, Mich., should be moribund. (Does either have a "downtown"?)

Does that argument infer that Northville's downtown is not presently healthy? That it needs an infusion? That growth will always be healthy growth? That growth never fails? Also, are the streets wide enough to support a 50 percent increase in traffic? If not, who will pay to widen those streets?

All who are entrusted with the public coffers should be required to read Pulitzer Prize winning historian Barbara Tuchman's excellent, iconoclastic examination of centuries of repeated folly in government, *The March of Folly*, Ballantine Books, 1984.

Time management big part of the job.

Most new teachers are surprised by the overwhelming time pressures of the job. "Time management" is consistently up there with "classroom management" and "discipline" as an urgent topic to be explored in our new teacher support programs.

"I'd love to be a teacher with all that time off. You get half the afternoon off and you work only 180 days a year. How hard can a job like that be? Why should teachers be paid

much for such an easy job?" Teachers just shake their heads at the critics and skeptics over this misunderstanding of teaching.

Two idealistic students at Wayne State University graduating, married each other, and took jobs teaching high school composition. I was pleased with their choice of career. I had befriended them in an English methods class I was teaching and I knew they were outstanding candidates. They stuck it out for three years.

"Mike," said Bill, "I spend every night reading piles of compositions. I have 150 students. If I

spend just five minutes looking at each paper a week, I'm spending over 12 hours a week just giving a quick look at one assignment. I give at least two assignments a week. Can you imagine a football coach asking for just one practice a week?"

On top of that I have the school play to put on, university classes to take, lessons to plan, meetings to attend, notes to respond to, and parents to call. It's impossible.

"What about summers?" I asked, hoping to change their minds.

"It takes us two weeks to unwind, another two to fix the leaking faucets, the broken doors and such that we couldn't get done through the year. The rest of the time we're taking classes, going to conferences and planning for the coming year. We can't find the time for vacations or for each other."

He became an IRS agent, she became a parole officer. They live on a small farm that they tend. I get postcards from them from all over the world during their brief vacations. "Never had more time to their selves," they said, pitying my choice of career.

According to *What Matters Most: Teaching for America's Future*, the report of the National Commission on teaching and America's Future, American teachers work "50 to 55 hours a week and most of the days of their vacations."

The report flies in the face of conventional

wisdom: "Despite a shorter school year, no nation requires teachers to teach a greater number of hours per day and year than the United States. American teachers teach more than 1,000 hours per year, far more than teachers in other industrialized countries, who teach between 600 and 800 hours per year, depending on grade level. In most European and Asian countries, teachers spend between 17 and 20 hours of a 40- to 45-hour work week in their classrooms with students. The remaining time is spent at school planning and working with colleagues, as well as parents and students."

"In contrast, most U.S. elementary school teachers have three or fewer hours for preparation each week ... Most teachers spend at least 10 to 15 hours each week outside school preparing lessons and grading homework and papers. This time is spent in isolation, in contrast to the in-school time of teachers in other countries, which is spent primarily in collaborative planning and learning."

"U.S. teachers don't work hard? Teachers overseas report they could not succeed in the conditions under which American teachers work."

Education division knows no party lines

On education, Michigan's two parties are no longer Republicans and Democrats. They are advocates and enemies of public schools.

We saw it on the State Board of Education when it voted 5-3 last month to scuttle the religious right mission statement. The vote didn't follow Republican-Democratic lines at all.

We may see the battle fought out next year in the 67th House District when Rep. Dan Gustafson,

R-Williamston, is forced out by term limits. The district includes eastern Ingham County and western Livingston County, including Fowlerville and Howell.

"I'm planning to run in the 67th," said former Rep. William Keith, a public school fan (and Democrat) who dropped out in 1994 after 22 years in the Legislature from Garden City.

Keith, looking lanky and fit at 67, was visiting the House from his retirement home in Haslett when I encountered him.

"Paul DeWeese is running," he said, referring to the Lansing area doctor who founded Teach Michigan. "DeWeese is the voucher guy. I'm for public education."

DeWeese is indeed the voucher guy. He makes no secret of the fact he would like to amend the Michigan Constitution to allow state funds to flow to private and parochial schools.

DeWeese doesn't play word games with charter schools. He comes right out and says he would like to scuttle the Michigan Constitution's Art. VIII Sec. 2 which voters approved in 1970. It forbids direct aid, tax breaks, vouchers and anything that will send taxpayer money to non-public schools.

Personally, I respect DeWeese's candor. Other pro-parochial people, like GOP chair Betsy DeVos and State Board member Sharon Wise, hide behind code words like "parental choice" and "freedom." They shun the word "parochial," but that is precisely what they want. DeVos has said publicly she will have nothing to do with the PTA.

There is nothing "conservative" about their point of view because they advocate opening up the state budget. They epitomize the term "religious right."

Keith, in contrast, spent eight years on his local board of education. In his youth, he went to a trade school, hence his interest in voca-

tional education and his study of the German system. No less a Republican than Gov. John Engler, in this year's state of the state message, picked up Keith's plan, though Engler didn't give Keith credit for it.

Keith is hardly a flaming liberal. He was a banker (Manufacturers, predecessor of Comerica). In 1985 he wrote the state's current law allowing statewide branch banking, bringing Michigan banking out of the 1930s.

"It's an interesting district," he said of the 67th - "a lot of little towns. I'll go around to all the little PTAs. I'm looking forward to it."

"DeWeese has support from the DeVoses, the Barretts (state chamber) and Bob Mylod (the ex-chief of Michigan National Bank) - Grand Rapids and Bloomfield Hills money."

By my calculation, Keith served just one term under the 1992 term limits amendment to the constitution. That means he still is eligible to serve two terms.

In my estimation, there are lawmakers who need term limits, like the late Dominick Jacobetti and others who grew cocky and abusive as committee chairs, and there are lawmakers who don't. Keith is in the latter category.

It looks as if the two education parties will be on the ballot in the 67th District next year.

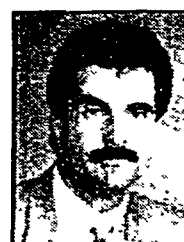

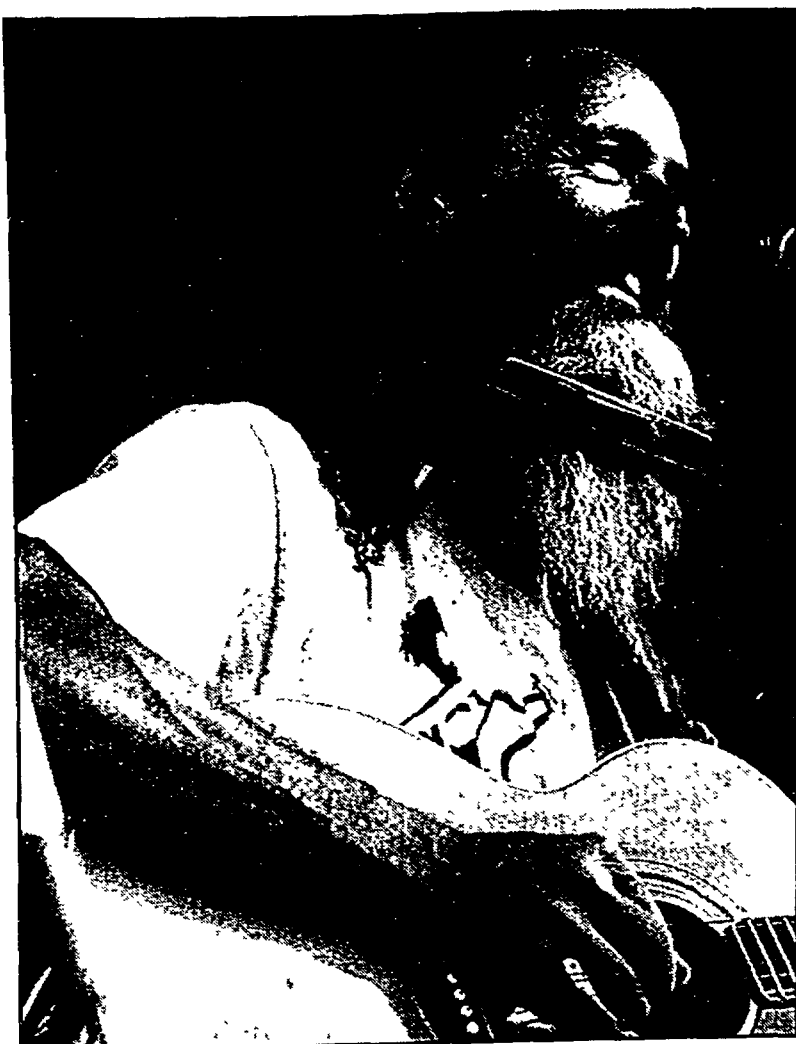

Sales decline in June

Michigan retail sales fell off in June and stores lowered their expectations slightly for the third quarter of '97.

Overall, 45 percent of the state's retailers reported increased year-to-year sales for June - a 6 percent decrease from May, according to the Michigan Retail Index, a joint project of the Michigan Retailers Association (MRA) and the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago. Another 16 percent reported no change, while 39 percent saw sales declines.

Looking ahead to the next quarter, 64 percent expect stronger year-to-year sales. That was down from the 68 percent in May who projected higher sales for the three-month period June through August.

"All areas of retail activity - sales, inventories, prices, advertising promotions and hiring - were essentially flat or declined slightly during June," said Larry Meyer, MRA Chief Executive Officer and former director of the Michigan Department of Commerce. "There just didn't appear to be much happening out there."

Northern Michigan retailers, who had reported healthy year-to-year gains in May reported a fall-off in June. Forty-one percent reported increased sales, lagging behind all other regions of the state.

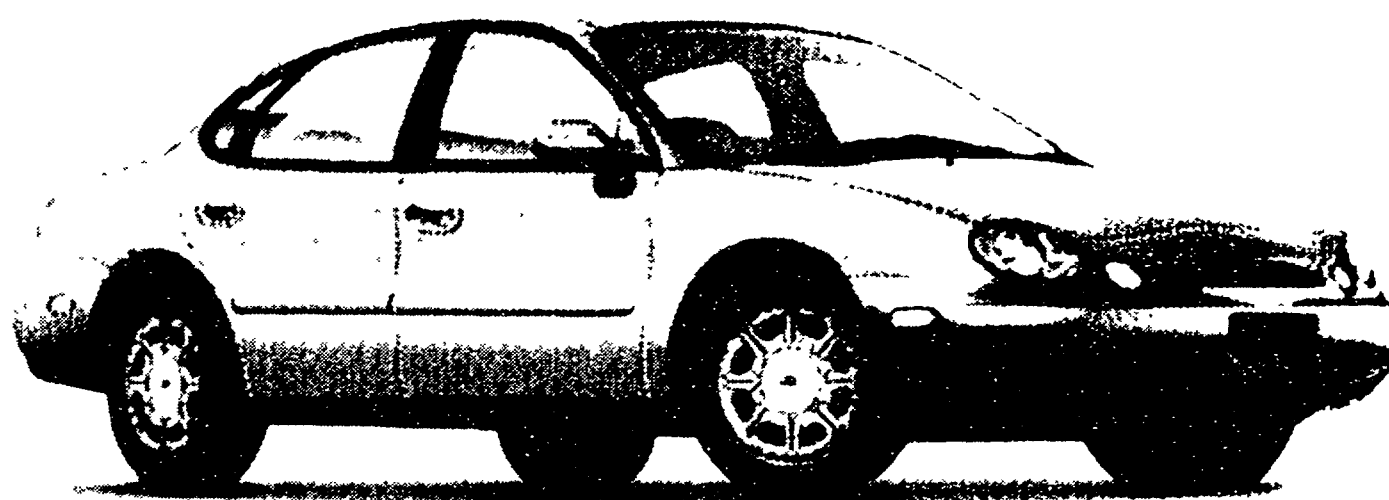
General merchandisers led the state's retail industry in June, with 53 percent reporting sales increases. They were followed by jewelers (51 percent) and electronics and computer retailers (50 percent).

The Michigan Retailers Association is the unified voice of retailing in Michigan and the nation's largest state trade association of general merchandise retailers. MRA's 4,500 retail business members operate more than 9,000 stores across the state.

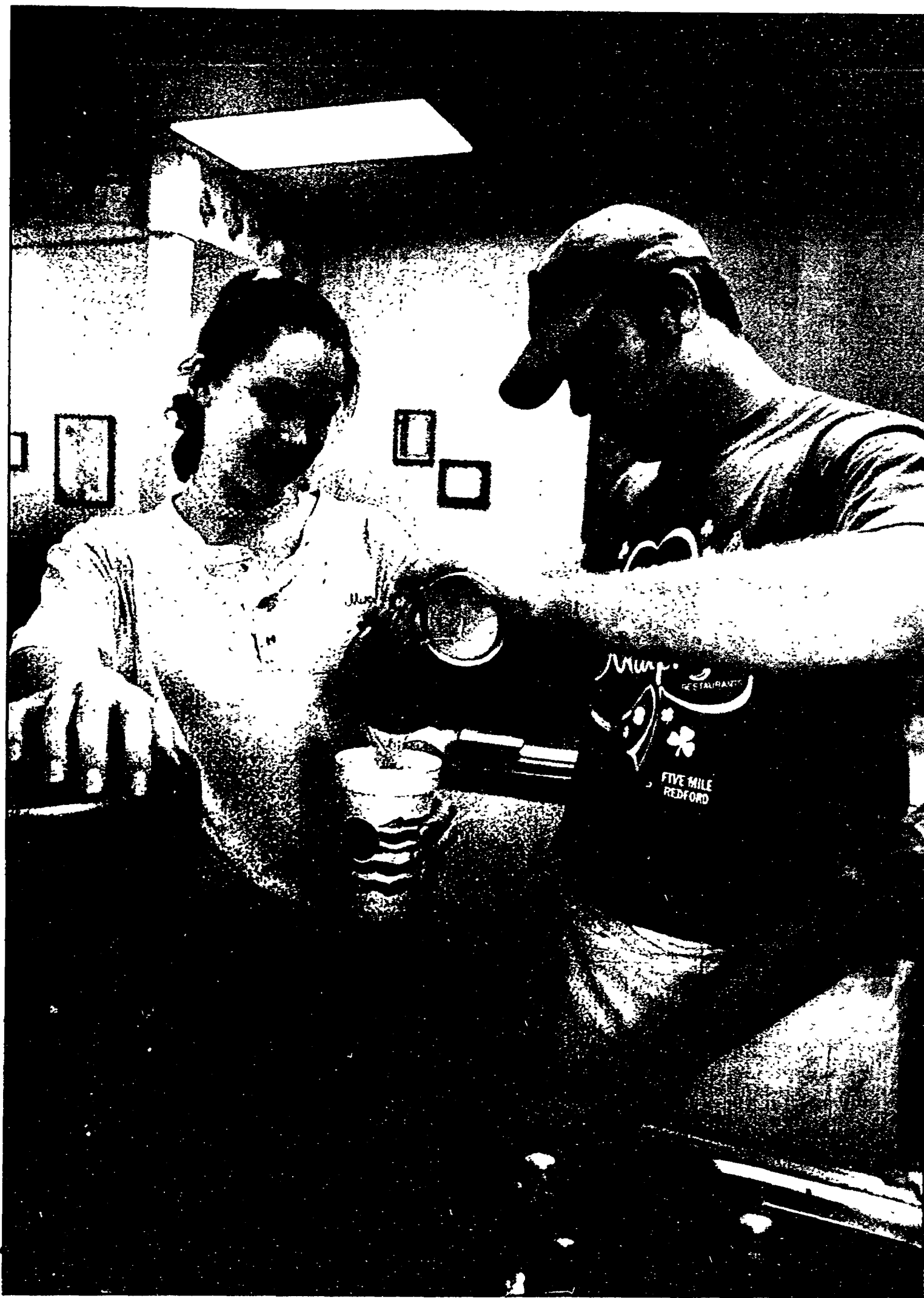

SHAKE IT UP, baby, TWIST 'N' SLURP

*Summer beverages
make for cool customers*

It's summertime in Michigan and the sipping is easy. There are sodas, malteds, shakes, Boston Coolers and Black Cows.

Jenny Turnage, a waitress at Murphy's of Northville, gets a lot of orders for chocolate shakes.

For those of you who haven't tried a Boston Cooler it's a blend of Vernors and vanilla ice cream. Black Cows are made with vanilla ice cream and root beer.

Usually sodas are made with carbonated water, two scoops of ice cream and flavored syrup. An unusual request Turnage received recently from a high school student was for a chocolate soda with Superman ice cream.

"They're pretty daring," she said of teenagers. "I had to try it myself to see how it tasted. It was pretty good."

On a typical weekend day, Turnage guesses the shake machine is cranking out 100 to 200 drinks.

Some people have their own specials, like a Superman shake or a Cookie Monster shake which includes a flavor of ice cream other than vanilla, chocolate or strawberry.

"Whatever kind they like, if we have the ice cream we'll make it for them," she said.

Turnage has her own way of making the perfect shake, putting in the ingredients in a certain order so they mix well.

The three scoops of ice cream come first followed by the malt flavoring if the order is for a malted, then the syrup and the milk.

According to Turnage's shake meter, as long as the straw stands up in the middle it's a perfect shake. But most customers prefer a medium shake which means the straw when placed in the center will slowly fall to the side of the glass.

"It depends on how hard they really want to work for it," Turnage said.

With four or five people behind the counter on the weekends scooping, Turnage said, "it gets pretty crazy, but it's a lot of fun."

Milkshakes are being served the old-fashioned way again at Guernsey Farms Dairy in Novi.

Orders in the restaurant for old fashioned chocolate milkshakes are now mixed and served in the tin cup just like in the old days,

according to Marty McGuire, an owner of the family-owned business.

"Dad is still down here every day telling us to make sure we do it right," McGuire said.

On a typical weekend day McGuire estimates they serve between 200 to 300 drinks, mostly for typical shakes, sodas and coolers.

"We do get some different concoctions people like to come up with," McGuire said. "Probably the newest one is the Moose Track Malted."

Weather is a good predictor of business, according to McGuire.

"Usually when it gets super hot and humid sales drop," he said. "People don't like to go out, they stay home in the air conditioning."

"Temperatures in the 80s and lower humidity is the best selling day for ice cream," McGuire added.

Greg Pierson, the owner/manager of another family business, Top of the Cone in Northville Township, finds that slushes, especially the blueberry, are popular with the kids.

Although adults seem to order more coolers and shakes, when they order slushes, they prefer the raspberry, cherry and strawberry flavors.

"We can go through 10 gallons of slush on a hot summer day, easily," Pierson said.

"Chocolate seems to be the most popular," Pierson of the shake orders, "but we do have people that will venture on the other side and get something that is not as traditional."

Like requests for nuts mixed in the milkshake.

"We do get some crazy requests, although nothing really seems crazy after being in the business 21 years," Pierson said.

There is a variety of soft-serve ice creams available and Top of the Cone carries a line that is more ice milk than cream. Ice milk is 97 percent fat free.

The trend lately is that people are more concerned and ask about the fat and calorie content," Pierson said. "People will request a sundae with yogurt and then hot fudge and whipped cream or a soda with ice cream and diet soda."

"It's a psychological thing for them," he said.

Nelda and Tom Morrison were entertaining 15 people on the balcony of their vacation condominium on Round Lake when a fireworks explosion turned the sky orange during the Venetian Festival in Charlevoix on Saturday.

"All the windows in town are blown out," Nelda said. "It looks like a war zone."

One person was killed and 15 people were injured in the blast which occurred at about 11 p.m. when a shell that was supposed to go off in the air exploded on the launching trailer. Shrapnel from one-third of the trailer went flying 1,200 feet.

A frying-pan size piece of shrapnel landed

just two feet in front of the Morrison's 18-year-old son, David.

David, his friends and cousins, were among the 50,000 spectators in the grassy park area by the waterfront watching the fireworks display.

"We were really worried until we got all the teenagers back to the condo safe," Nelda said. David waited until the large piece of shrapnel cooled down before he was able to take it to the condo.

"Just looking at it makes me shudder that it came that close to my son," Nelda said. "It is all just twisted, bent metal."

The fireworks were being launched directly opposite the Morrison's condo on Round Lake.

"We had a really good view of what happened," Nelda added.

Nelda said she heard a sonic boom then the glasses in her cupboard shook.

"When we were on the balcony we thought the windows were going to break," she said.

David has worked at Four Seasons Flower Shop for three years and a half years and just graduated from Lutheran High School in Westland. Tom and Nelda own Morrison Antiques in Northville.

Divers were looking for shrapnel on Sunday, according to Nelda.

"It is a beautiful festival," Nelda said. "It's just a tragic end to it."

Girls Scout is in touch with nature

Whether it's backpacking, white water rafting or rock climbing, Alexis Troshinetz loves the outdoors. So when it came time to decide on a project for her Gold Award, it was a given that she would choose something to do with nature.

To be eligible for Scouting's highest honor, the Gold Award, a girl must be a Senior Girl Scout, attending high school, have earned four Interest Patches, a Career Exploration Pin, a Senior Girl Scout Leadership Award, and complete a Senior Girl Scout Challenge and a Gold Award project.

Combining both her outdoor interests led her to worked closely with Anna Sylvester, assistant park manager at Maybury State Park.

Through her research and discussions with Sylvester, Alexis learned that this part of the country is the habitat of the eastern bluebirds.

"Their population in the Michigan area has been decreasing," said Alexis of her decision to make and monitor birdhouses for her Gold Award project. "I wanted to find a way to possibly increase those numbers."

Alexis chose four different types of birdhouses and hung four of each style to see which type the bluebirds preferred.

The pine birdhouses ranged from shallow to deep with flat, slanted or peaked roofs but all included a one-and-a-half-inch entrance hole recommended by National Audubon Society reference books.

"The bluebirds seem to like the

deeper ones," Alexis said. "Sparrows have used the shallow ones."

Alexis placed the birdhouses next to berry and sumac bushes, the bluebirds' natural food supply.

She had been observing the bluebirds weekly, taking a couple weeks off while she was in Australia as a member of the People to People Student Ambassador Program.

"There were more bluebird eggs and nests in the deep birdhouses," she said.

The raccoons discovered and ate six bluebird eggs which were in each of two houses, so Alexis is going to try mounting them on round fence posts which she will grease.

A Girl Scout for 10 years, Alexis has enjoyed the outdoor activities the most including backpacking, hiking, camping, white water rafting, canoeing and rock climbing.

She plans to continue her involvement with Girl Scouts, taking a trip next summer to the Girl Scout Guide World Center in Adelboden, Switzerland. She'll hike and go white water rafting in the Swiss Alps.

The daughter of David and Valerie Troshinetz, Alexis is a junior at Northville High School and is a member of the high school's High Adventure Club, the cross country track team, and the National Honor Society.

This coming school year she is looking forward to joining Rotary Interact and SADD.

One third of the 15 Gold Awards the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council gave out this year went to Northville Girl Scouts.

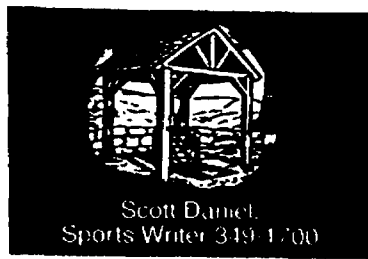

Knee surgery can provide long-term relief

Many Americans suffer from arthritis of the knee, a painful and disabling disease that may affect every facet of daily life, particularly activities that require walking or even standing.

Frequently the pain associated with knee arthritis is treated with medication, braces and/or physical therapy. When these conservative measures fail to alleviate pain and improve mobility, surgery such as total knee replacement may be recommended.

Osteoarthritis, otherwise known as "wear and tear" arthritis, is most commonly caused by a long-standing overload of the joint surface from repeated trauma, sports injuries or obesity. The ends of the bone in the knee are covered by a hard, slippery tissue called hyaline cartilage. When this cartilage is overloaded, softening, cracks and fissures occur in the cartilage. This causes a thinning of the cartilage and, eventually, exposure of the bone.

Degenerative changes associated with arthritis, even early arthritis, lead to more and more destruction within the knee joint. As the hyaline cartilage and the meniscus cartilage, a type of cushion within the knee, degenerate, the knee is unable to accommodate the high forces and load associated with simple walking or standing. The joint contact area, which corresponds to the area which carries body weight, decreases significantly when the meniscus is lost or torn. The load inside the knee becomes higher and further injures

the already insufficient hyaline cartilage covering the bone. This creates a self-perpetuating, irreversible cycle.

Knee replacement surgery may provide long-term relief of the pain caused by severe arthritis and may offer an opportunity to return to a pain-free and more active lifestyle.

Contrary to common beliefs, knee replacement surgery does not remove the entire knee. It merely removes the defective cartilage and a small amount of bone from the ends of the knee and introduces a metallic surface and a piece of plastic. The metal is usually made from cobalt-chrome or titanium. The metal glides against a plastic bearing which is made from ultra high molecular weight polyethylene.

After knee replacement, patients no longer have symptoms of arthritis, because the diseased and inflamed cartilage tissue have been removed.

The hospital stay for knee replacement surgery is approximately four to five days. The total recovery time is about six weeks. After the six-week recuperation period, most patients are walking well, are able to drive and are experiencing little or no pain.

Unfortunately, knee replacements do not come without risk: the knees do wear out and have a limited life span. With today's technology, we are able to predict that 95-98 percent of the knee replacements performed will last 12-15 years.

While there are drawbacks to

total knee replacements, knowledge of the risks and benefits in each case will assist in the decision-making process.

Number of new melanoma cases rising

Baby boomers grew up believing a golden tan was a good thing. And if a golden tan meant a burn first, so be it.

Now baby boomers, and all Americans are being diagnosed at alarming rates with melanoma skin cancer — the most deadly form of skin cancer. The number of new cases of melanoma continues to rise faster than any other human skin cancer. Melanoma is now the fifth most common type of cancer, the most common cancer

in white males in Michigan 25 to 44 years old, and the third leading cancer in white females in Michigan in this age group.

Lifetime analysis shows that one in 84 people born in the United States in 1997 will develop melanoma during their lifetime, up 1,800 percent from 1930. More than 7,000 people will die from melanoma this year, or one death every hour and 12 minutes.

Prevention, risk directed interventions, early detection and public education programs are the keys to turning the tide of the present melanoma epidemic. The good news is that melanoma has one of the best cure rates of any cancer if caught early.

Learning the risk factors and ABCD's of melanoma is key to early detection. With greater awareness, patients will show their lesions to their doctors for examination. Doctors at the University of Michigan Multidisciplinary Melanoma Clinic have seen five new patients with melanoma in the past month who diagnosed their melanoma while watching a television show on melanoma.

The melanoma epidemic continues to pose a serious and significant public health problem in

the United States. It is estimated that over \$1 billion was spent on melanoma treatment in 1990. Assuming a continuation of the current 6 percent annual increase in melanoma incidence, the cost of melanoma treatment for Medicare alone may exceed \$5 billion by the year 2010.

The guidelines regarding screening studies, staging work-ups, surgical margins and investigational intervention continue to rapidly change and new knowledge is gained daily from clinical trials. The multidisciplinary team approach with dermatologists, surgeons, oncologists, and other members of the health care team may provide the most up-to-date cost effective care.

At the University of Michigan, patients with a new diagnosis of melanoma are evaluated and educated by the entire team of physicians in one afternoon. Approximately 600-700 new patients will be seen in this clinic in 1997. A team and community commitment to treat, educate, and help patients with melanoma is necessary to further our knowledge and advance therapy of melanoma into the 21st century.

The following chart shows the likelihood of a person developing melanoma if the current trend continues:

For a person born in: The chance is:
1935, 1/1,500
1960, 1/600
1980, 1/250
1997, 1/84
2000, 1/75

To check out your spots for melanoma, apply the alphabet test:

A. Asymmetry: If the mole or spot, when cut down the middle, isn't the same size or shape on either side, have it checked out.

B. Border: An indistinct or scalloped, irregular border indicates a troublesome spot.

C. Color: Jet black moles or shades of red, white and blue should be checked. Brown is generally better.

D. Diameter: If the mole is larger than 6 mm

(the size of a pencil eraser), it should be checked.

Risk Factors:

The following are some of the factors associated with the tendency toward skin cancer:

- Blue eyes, fair skin, red or blond hair.
- Significant sun exposure with peeling and sun burning (especially as a child).

- A lot of moles: people with more than 20 and up to 200 moles on their body are more likely to develop melanoma. Also, the presence of irregular moles and freckling carries a significant increased risk. People with more than five irregular moles carry a higher risk of developing melanoma.

- A personal or family history of melanoma in any first-degree. Also, if a family member has atypical mole syndrome (a lot of atypical or dysplastic moles) approximately half of the family members will have atypical moles as well, with a significant increased risk of developing melanoma.

The use of sunscreen and sun protection clothing beginning in childhood is critically important for sun protection. The numbers on the sunscreen bottles pertain to the SPF (sun protection factor). The SPF determines how long someone can stay in the sun without burning.

A fair skinned person who burns in 10 minutes in the sun unprotected would multiply that time by the SPF to determine the amount of protected time in the sun he or she would obtain by applying the sunscreen. A SPF of 10 would protect that person for 100 minutes, and a SPF of 50 would protect that person for 500 minutes.

HOLDING KNEECAPS IN LINE

"Runner's knee" is the catchall term for aches and pains that involve the kneecap. It occurs when the tendon below the kneecap becomes irritated, either from overuse or wear beneath the kneecap. Leg muscles sometimes pull the kneecaps of knock-kneed people out of the groove in which they normally slide up and down, causing painful grating on the cartilage. While prevention of kneecap misalignment may simply entail replacing worn-out running shoes or using shoe inserts (orthotics), holding the kneecap in line involves strengthening the quadriceps by performing leg extensions on a weight machine, concentrating on the last 30 degrees of the extension in an effort to isolate the thigh muscles that hold the kneecap in line.

A painful, stiff knee can prevent you from doing the things you enjoy, even things as simple as walking. Your new goal should be to return safely and comfortably to your daily activities. P.S. To avoid injury, exercisers should follow the "10 percent rule," which calls for increasing the frequency, duration, and intensity of an activity by no more than 10% per week.

GARDENING

Tips for a great fall garden

To keep fresh produce coming in for weeks after the onset of the first hard frost, you have to use the best vegetables. The seed catalogs are full of 60- to 70-day wonders! Beets, lettuce (all varieties), broccoli, kale, radishes and spinach are some examples. Choose the fast-maturing types, since you'll need to add a week or two to the maturity estimates in the catalogs.

The late summer days, despite the intense heat, simply don't have the growing power of spring days because there is less light. One advantage to fall planting is that vegetables won't bolt in cool weather. They remain tender and sweet in the soil for a good week or more after they ripen. You'll find you can grow some of the best fresh foods you've ever had!

Start seedlings now. The key of starting plants indoors is to provide conditions for germination and growth that don't exist outside. Either in the greenhouse or windowsill, seedlings must be watered twice a day. Don't overwater the seeds. Also, watering properly when setting transplants out in the garden is crucial to the plant's adjustment. The seed-starting medium around the roots of the plant should be wet, not swimming, but a little more than moist.

PREPARE FOR FALL NOW

Many vegetables for fall harvest should be sown and transplanted during the summer months. If transplants for crops such as broccoli, cauliflower, collards, cabbage and head lettuce are not available in August, seed packages for them can be sown now in a bed or row. In three or four weeks, they can be transplanted into the garden. Of course, your other fall crops can be seeded directly into their permanent rows.

Planting times should correspond to harvesting crops around the time of the first frost date, Oct. 20. Even though harvest can extend well up to Thanksgiving, don't push your luck. You have to prepare the soil just as you did in the spring, but use only half the fertilizer, rate 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of 5-10-5 per 100 square feet.

PLANT PARTICULARS

For broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and collard greens, plant seed by July 30; transplant by Aug. 15-20.

For kale, kohlrabi, mustard and Swiss chard, plant seed by Aug. 1-20.

For leaf lettuce, spinach and cress, plant seed by Aug. 1-20; transplant by Sept. 1-10.

For beets, carrots and turnips, plant seed by Aug. 15 to Sept. 1.

For radishes, plant seed by Sept. 10.

For bush beans and peas, plant seed by Aug. 10-20.

SEED TIPS

Use a cold frame or greenhouse to start perennial seeds in July so you'll have blooming plants next spring and summer. A good one is coralbells. It is good for bouquets and attracts hummingbirds. Other good ones are delphinium, Gloriosa daisy and Shasta daisy. Columbine (Aquilegia) comes in a mixture of lovely pastel colors, with large flower heads and long spurs, which hummingbirds drink from. For good germination, store seeds in the refrigerator (at 40 degrees) for four or five days.

Summer greenhouse crops require a great deal of ventilation, so keep the fan going. Protect your seedlings by putting screens on doors and vents to keep moths and beetles from flying in and laying eggs.

Biennials are special in that they produce only foliage with their first growing season and then the following year produce a marvelous show of blooms.

Many times the plants will surprise you, they will live over another year and flower once again.

Biennials are easily started from seeds now through August. They will grow vigorously during the late summer and fall, and will overwinter in cold frames or outdoors. Next spring, the plants will take off as soon as the weather warms up.

Sow the tiny seeds of Sweet William, foxglove (Digitalis) Canterbury Bells, pansies and English daisy. Into properly prepared outdoor beds or flats (use sterile soil). Always keep the rapidly developing plants moist, especially during extended dry spells of summer.

"Does music help plants grow? If so, what kind of music?" "What color pot do you recommend for my container vegetables?" "How many cucumber seeds should I plant in a 10-inch pot?" "My son is doing a science project. ..." "How do I grow wildflowers?" "Why don't you have ...?" "When should I plant?"

Wow! I didn't realize how thirsty the general public was about gardening information.

One of the reasons for this great gardening curiosity is because of the growing popularity of gardening - it's the No. 1 hobby in the United States (according to a Gallup survey).

Look to the Internet for more housing information

The Internet continues to grow as the pre-eminent source of information for home buyers, sellers and brokers. An increasing number of sites on the World Wide Web offer current data on homes available for purchase and a wide range of other related information.

For example, NewRealty.com, a San Francisco-based Web site launched in 1995, carries data on about 440,000 properties for sale nationwide, according to Patrick Boyle, one of six partners who own and operate the site.

The site also provides school reports, complete with maps and pertinent facts and statistics about selected school districts. And it offers "Buyers Finance Tools" with current mortgage rates, lending terminology and a mortgage calculator.

It also carries news and infor-

mation features of interest to current and future home buyers and sellers, and it maintains a library with informational offerings on a variety of subjects such as "Tips for Relocations" and "Selecting a Home Warranty."

As for the future, the site operators plan to implement more educational features for brokers, particularly in the area of productive use of the Internet to make their business more profitable, Boyle said.

"And we might sponsor brokers who want to work from their homes, limiting the number to one or two per city. Consumers are the most important target of our services."

"We're looking for ways to make the Internet home buying experience easier and more efficient," Boyle said. "We're seeking a better solution for listing searches

and retrieval, but we want to stay out of the listing wars."

A different type of Internet service is keyed to the needs of homeowners who are trying to sell their homes without the service of a broker. It now contains about 23,000 descriptions of homes currently being offered by their owners.

This Web site, called Abele Owners' Network, also provides comparable home-sale data (to help owners determine a realistic asking price), property mapping and a mortgage calculator.

The comparable home-sale data is particularly crucial information for the home seller and buyer, according to Hans Koch, chairman of the network. The seller needs this data to establish the right market value. The prospective buyer needs it when considering the property for purchase and comparing it with other offerings.

"While financial information is at the core of any home transaction, potential buyers can also search for information about the community where the property is located," Koch noted.

"With a home listing on our Web site, the seller can show a buyer exactly where the home is in the community through the property mapping feature. A listing also includes a business directory of local services, like lawyers, contractors, inspectors, title companies and others."

Revenue is generated for the network primarily through advertising sponsorships and home listing fees. Listing a home on the network costs from nothing (for a very brief basic listing) to \$115. The listing period is four months.

"As for the future, we're pursuing initiatives that meet our mission to empower the individual consumer to buy and sell homes and other property on their own,"

Koch said. "Many new features and services will be introduced within the next few weeks."

Q. What do real estate industry leaders think about the current legislative proposal that would deregulate the nation's electric utilities?

A. One major group — the National Association of Home Builders — says such deregulation could place a housing "tax" on new home purchases in the form of increased infrastructure and hook-up fees.

"Before Congress goes forward with any efforts to deregulate the electric utility industry, it needs to consider a potential huge financial downside — the increased cost for a new home that will be passed along to the consumer as a result of rising infrastructure start-up fees," said Don DeLess, chairman

of the association's Energy Subcommittee.

In the past, when building new communities and providing electrical power for those communities, builders and utilities would assess the infrastructure costs and hook-up fees over time, using a prorated formula. This formula spread the costs so that the builder, the utility, home buyers and other members of the community would share payment of those services as a whole.

"This formula could be jeopardized if utility industry deregulation efforts shift the burden or force builders to pay an inordinate amount of costs for infrastructure and hook-up fees," DeLess noted.

Celebrate your passion for mirrors with these tips

Q. I am building a great collection of old mirrors - large ones, round ones, some that came off dressers - and I'd like some ideas on how to display them. My walls are already pretty full.

A. Sharing your passion for mirrors of any kind, I'm pleased to also share the photo we show here of yet another mirror-lover's collection.

Fashion designer Donna Karan has them in all sizes, shapes and states: propped, hung and leaning all about her living room.

We borrowed the photo from a new book by Mary Emmerling called "Quick Decorating" (Clarkson Potter), in which she devotes an entire chapter to "Mirror Images." Some good advice also borrowed from its pages:

- Use mirrors to maximize light and space in small, dark, or awkwardly shaped spaces such as halls, entries and bathrooms.

- Remember that too much mirroring can be cold, or make your room feel "like a 1970s discotheque," as Mary puts it.

- Counter the cool with whimsy, she advises: Hang an empty frame on top. (Velcro will

hold a lightweight; for heavier frames, get a glass cutter to install screws for hanging.)

- Fit a raised-panel door with mirrors: great in a bathroom, closet or bedroom.

- Where space is small, say, between two doors in a hallway, hang a collection of small mirrors or hand mirrors on the wall.

- Keep an eye out for what will be reflected in the mirrors you're hanging or propping. It's doubly important that the view be twice as nice.

- With that in mind, place candles or flowers in front of mirrors when you can to double their impact.

Q. We're thinking about new bedroom carpeting and I keep coming across the term "IAQ" on the labels. I know this has to do with indoor air quality, but what does it really mean?

A. The Carpet and Rug Institute, the public information arm of the industry, has set what it calls stringent criteria for noxious emissions left over from the manufacturing process. The institute's IAQ label shows that the carpet, the cushioning product or the adhesive has been tested and meets the industry's standards for good indoor air quality.

However, says an institute

spokesperson, they still think it's a good idea to ventilate the area during installation and for 48 to 72 hours after installation is complete.

Erphila pottery once made in Czechoslovakia

ANTIQUES

Q. These pottery covered jars were given to me over 30 years ago. They are 7 inches tall. Each is marked "Czechoslovakia - No. 3142 - Erphila - Art Pottery."

I would appreciate any information you can provide.

A. Large amounts of pottery and porcelain were produced in Czechoslovakia from 1918 to around 1938. The quality ranged from the ordinary to the exceptional.

Erphila represents the first letter in Eberling & Reuss and the first five letters in Philadelphia. Eberling & Reuss imported a variety of pottery and porcelain from Czechoslovakia.

Your jars were made around 1930 and would probably be worth about \$100 to \$125 each.

Q. This mark is on the bottom of a pitcher that I found in my grandmother's attic. It is white with gray-green around the neck and trimmed in gold. The height is 9 inches.

I hope you can tell me some-

thing about it.

A. Knowles, Taylor & Knowles, East Liverpool, Ohio, made your pitcher.

They produced a variety of china, ranging from their translucent bone china Lotus Ware that rivaled Belleek to semivitreous hotel ware. The 25 represents the date of manufacture.

A similar pitcher is listed in "Knowles, Taylor and Knowles China" by Mary Frank Gaston at \$75 to \$125.

Q. We have a stationary Allan Herschell wooden carousel horse from the 1920s. It was one of 20 carousel horses that we bought 30 years ago in California.

We think it was designed for a traveling merry-go-round, and this is the last horse left. Could you please give us an idea of its value?

A. Allan Herschell built portable carousels intended for country fairs; these were made in Tonawanda, N.Y.

His horses were smaller in size than those made for permanently

installed carousels. They were less elaborate and designed for convenience in stacking and transporting.

Carousel animals with the original paint and intact are sought by serious collectors. The value of your horse would proba-

bly be about \$2,600 to \$3,000.

Q. I have a set of clear-glass dessert plates that is over 60 years old.

The plates were made by Foster and the etched pattern is Meadow Rose.

The plates are in perfect condition. What is my set worth?

A. Meadow Rose was a crystal pattern that was available in complete table settings.

Each dessert plate would probably be worth about \$15 to \$20.

Q. I have a small pitcher that was my grandmother's.

It is white with a soft pastel flower and pale-green leaves in relief on the front and the back.

The height is almost 5 inches. On the bottom are the words "Hull - USA - 128-4."

Can you tell me something about this pitcher and its possible value?

A. Hull Pottery Co., Crooksville, Ohio, made your pitcher, which is usually referred to as an ewer.

The numbers refer to the mold number and the size.

The pattern is Open Rose. Hull was in business from 1905 to 1986.

Your ewer was made in the mid-1940s, and its value would probably be about \$75 to \$120.

Composting plays important role in organic garden

suckle. Even the seeds create color in her garden all year long.

She prefers a cool color scheme, anywhere from light pinks to purples along with blues and lavender.

Many of the old-fashioned flowers, reminiscent of grandma's gardens, can be found there, including hollyhocks, phlox, poppies, peonies, and snapdragons. She enjoys mixing the old fashioned with the contemporary for an eclectic look.

"Even in winter I get compliments on my gardens," she remarked.

"It's always changing year 'round."

In winter, the ivy, dwarf Alberta spruce and even the gardening pots let people know that a serious gardener lives there. In spring there are the hyacinths, crocus, pansies, phlox and tulips. And in fall the chrysanthemums, cone flower (or echinacea) and asters bloom.

Mikolon's arrangement of her plants and flowers creates a blend and flow that surrounds her property.

A trademark throughout her

gardens is its profuse growth of ivy. This gives the gardens a lush look, akin to English gardens. Ivy is also a favorite camouflage of hers.

"The right garden cover can cover a multitude of sins, like a cyclone fence. I camouflage everything, even wires," she said. Ivy even surrounds the wires to her Edison meter.

Every good Italian cook needs fresh herbs. Mikolon grows oregano (regular and Italian from her father's garden), parsley, chives, basil, sage, lemon balm, garlic and mint.

The variety and size of her garden alone is noteworthy, but even more impressive is that they thrive strictly through organic gardening, which means Mikolon uses no chemical fertilizers or pesticides.

She points out that even the lawn is maintained organically by her husband, Myrl.

One of the basic steps to her organic garden is her compost pile, located near the ravine in the backyard.

Composting is an important step in the cycle of organic gardening

that she believes in.

"What you take out of the earth, you need to put back into the earth - leaves, grass clippings and

branches," she said.

All clippings, branches and leaves go there to be chipped by Myrl. You won't notice it immedi-

ately, though, because of her knack for camouflage.

"This is probably the snazziest compost pile you've ever seen," she laughs.

The compost pile is nestled underneath two large trees, concealed by plants such as dragon's blood and impatiens.

The compost she creates is not only used to enrich her flower beds, but the wood chips are also used to build walkways and paths throughout the gardens. In addition to those benefits, using compost cuts down on weeds and the need to water.

Another organic method to reduce weeds and watering is to plant a lot of groundcover. Some of her favorites include dragon's blood and ivy.

Other earth-friendly solutions

include using beer - yes beer - in small containers to get rid of bugs. The solution attracts slugs, who drown in it. Set it out overnight and dump it out the next morning.

A solution of one-quarter cup of Murphy's oil soap mixed with a gallon of water also works as a spray on plants to protect them from bugs.

Don't forget to do the underside of the plant. An added bonus is that it gives them a nice sheen.

To rid roses of viruses, simply mix one-quarter cup of baking soda with a gallon of water.

Shake in a spray bottle and spray for a natural solution to your rose problem.

Another benefit to her organic gardening is that all the exercise she gets behind her wheelbarrow enables Mikolon to keep in shape.

Pasta to Go combines old-world food, high-tech

Pasta to Go provides evidence that technology really can work in the restaurant business.

Instead of having kitchen workers bump into each other, get confused over multiple orders or duplicate efforts, the new Novi eatery uses a computer to keep work flow smooth and efficient.

Workers are placed at various stations and assigned specific tasks. When a customer makes an order, it's processed by the computer and printed out at the appropriate station.

The result is good, hot food getting to patrons quickly and without goof ups.

"The entire kitchen is designed around the computer system," said Dawn Watkins, who owns the business with her husband, Jason.

Pasta to Go, located in the shopping plaza at the corner of Ten Mile and Meadowbrook roads, opened July 14. Watkins said business has been good thus far.

"We did phenomenally well our

first night," she said. "I think everyone was anxious for us to open."

Pasta to Go, a Michigan-based company, began in 1991. Since then franchises have been granted in the Midwest and several other regions.

Watkins and her husband, who both grew up in Milford, purchased the Novi franchise in August of last year. Both worked for the company before buying into it. The couple had few doubts about where they wanted to locate the business.

"We recognized a long time ago this was a growing area," Dawn said. "We were there at the right time," Watkins said. "We were lucky to get a great spot [in the strip mall]."

Much of the work to get the 2,000-square foot restaurant into shape was done by Jason and Dawn's father. While Pasta to Go provided the basic look, "we strayed from the corporate design a bit," Dawn remarked.

The store's emphasis is, obviously, on take out. But there's room

enough for 38 patrons to sit down and dine in.

"Yes, yes stay here and eat," she said. "It's a really fun atmosphere."

And the food is good, too. Patrons can order just pasta or traditional Italian entrees as well as salads and sandwiches.

Lunchgoers will like the small, 11-ounce pasta for \$3.19. A choice of sauce and garlic bread stick is included.

Bigger appetites can feast on the large 18-ounce size pasta for \$4.19. The family special includes 58-ounces of pasta with sauce and a bucket of salad.

In terms of entrees, baked lasagna, ravioli, tortellini, chicken alfredo and pasta primavera are just a few choices.

Salad choices include tossed, garden, pasta, caesar and antipasto. Sandwiches such as Italian sausage and chicken parmesan are also available.

75 Years of Business Education Leadership

Walsh College, a leader among business educators in southeast Michigan, celebrates its 75th anniversary this year. The occasion affords a unique opportunity to commemorate the rich history and many accomplishments of the institution, as well as anticipate a future bright with promise.

This special anniversary publication features highlights of the College's history. Founded as Walsh Institute of Accountancy in 1922 by prominent Michigan CPA Mervyn B. Walsh, Walsh College became a degree-granting institution in 1970 and has grown from 300 students to approximately 3,700 today.

The College offers two bachelor degrees and five master of science degrees at campuses in Troy, Novi, Port Huron and Clinton Township. It also works in partnership with area businesses to provide customized seminars and computer software training through its Strategic Business Services department.



Walsh has approximately 10,000 living alumni, 91 percent of whom have remained in southeast Michigan, contributing to local business and economic development.

The College's success is due in large part to its 27-year partnerships with area community colleges. The 2 + 2 program has enabled community college students to transfer up to 82 credit hours and complete a bachelor's degree in business. The result is quality education that is also affordable.

Walsh College's strong relationship with the business community has also contributed to its success. A President's Advisory Council composed of more than 100 area business leaders provides insight that is used to keep Walsh's curriculum timely and

relevant. A Leader in Residence program, funded by the Earl-Beth Foundation, brings business leaders directly to the classroom where the focus is on current, "real-world" education. The value of a Walsh education is evidenced by the career achievements of its students and alumni.

The year-long celebration of the College's anniversary is also highlighted in this special section. Celebrating 75 Years as A Leader In Business Education

Here are highlights from Walsh College's 75 years of producing business leaders:

1922 – On Sept. 14, Walsh Institute opens its doors on the sixth floor of the Capitol Theatre Building in Detroit. Twenty-three students are enrolled.

1926 – Edgar Wheeler becomes the first graduate of Walsh Institute.

1930 – Grace Dimmer, a 1927 graduate of Walsh Institute, becomes the first woman CPA in Michigan.

1965 – Mervyn B. Walsh retires as president of Walsh Institute and William C. Stewart is appointed his successor. Enrollment was 728 students. Tuition was \$14 per credit hour.

1967 – The future direction of Walsh is set as President Stewart and the Board of Trustees decide to transform the Institute into an upper division college which will complement the growing community college network in Michigan.

1968 – Walsh Institute of Accountancy changes its charter and becomes Walsh College of Accountancy and Business Administration. It purchases 20 acres of farmland in Troy to build a new campus.

1970 – President William C. Stewart resigns and is succeeded by Jeffery W. Barry, who had served as vice president. Walsh College begins offering bachelor degree courses on its new campus in Troy, with 151 students. Another 152 students are completing the Walsh Institute curriculum.

1974 – The College's first graduate degree, the Master of Science in Taxation, is introduced. Graduate tuition is \$50 per credit hour.

1978 – Walsh College opens an extension office in Port Huron and begins offering classes on the campus of St. Clair County Community College.

1980 – The College introduces its second graduate degree, the Master of Science in Professional Accountancy. Walsh also expands beyond bachelor and graduate degree program courses into corporate training and professional development seminars.

1981 – The number of women pursuing bachelor degrees exceeds the number of men for the first time, 674 women to 661 men. Enrollment is 1,707 students. Tuition is \$60 per credit hour for undergraduate, \$84 per graduate credit hour.

1982 – The Bachelor of Business Administration program is expanded with the computer-based information systems major.

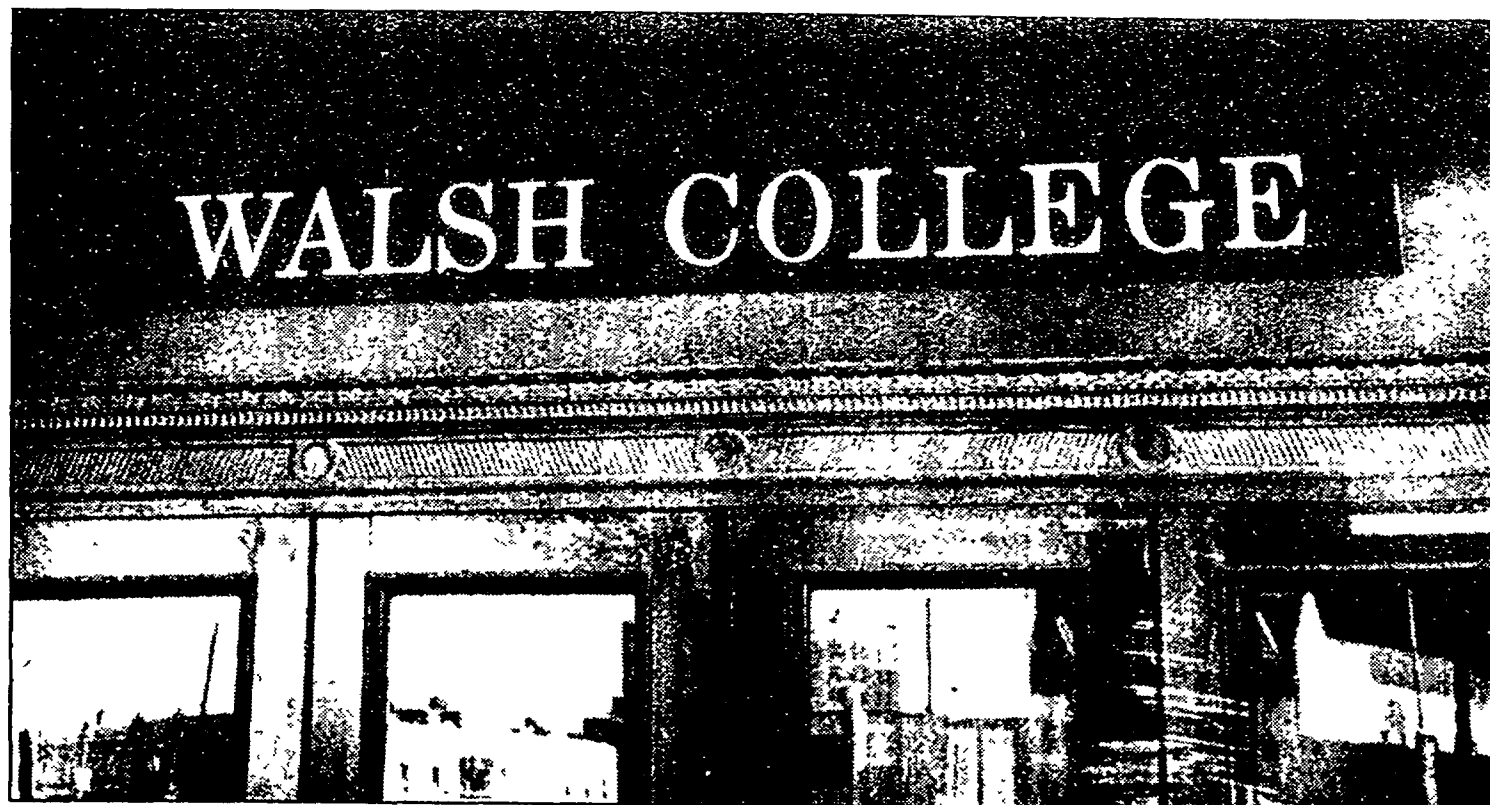
1983 – An enrollment milestone is reached with

2,072 students pursuing bachelor and master's degrees.

1986 – The Master of Science in Finance degree is introduced.

1988 – The College adds another major -- marketing -- to its B.B.A. program.

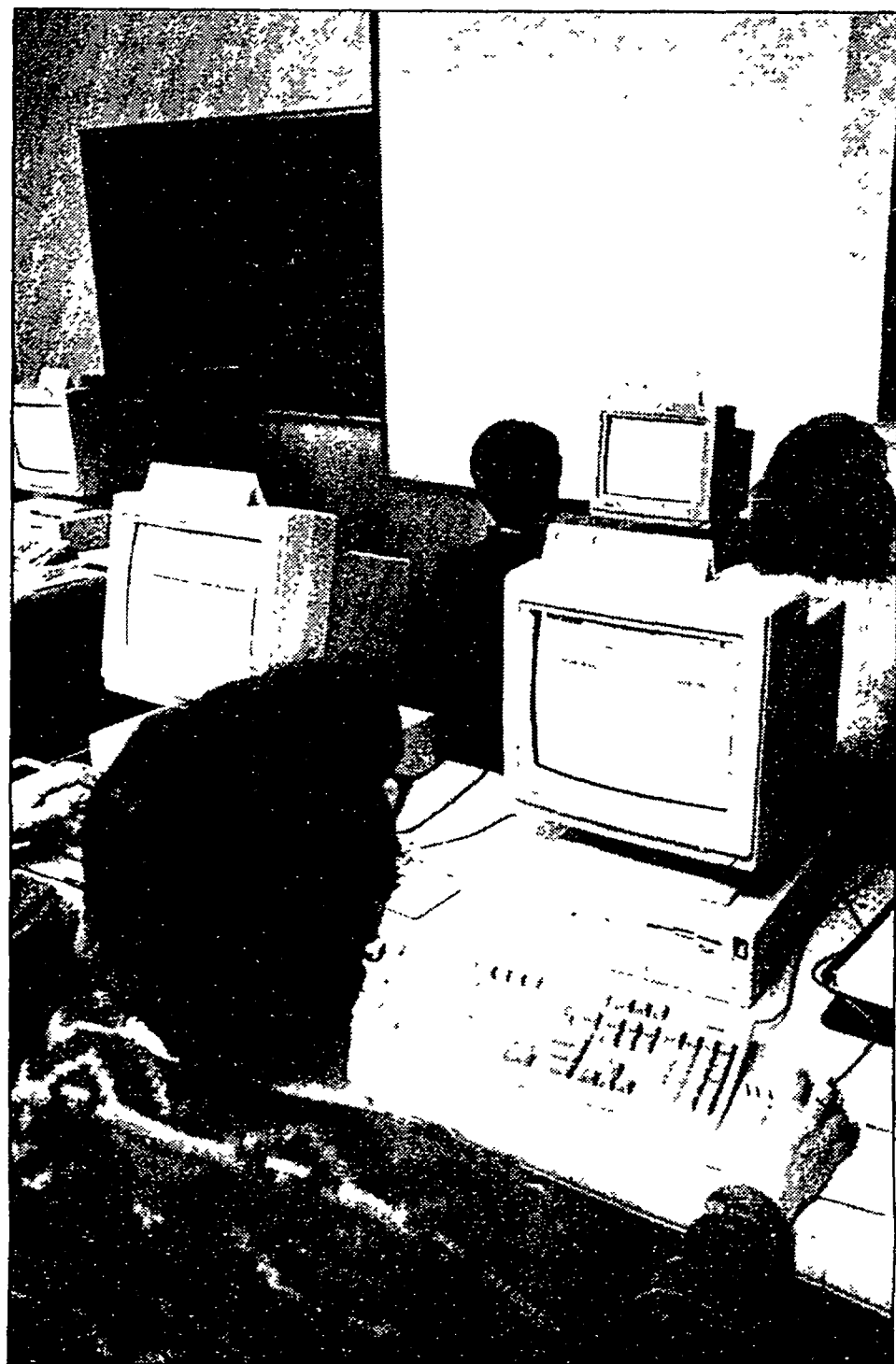
1989 – The Master of Science in Management degree is introduced.

1991 Jeffery W. Barry announces his retirement after 21 years as president. David A. Spencer, executive vice president and chief operating officer, is named the new president. In the fall, Walsh becomes a partner institution in the new University Center on Macomb Community College's Center Campus in Clinton Township.

1993 – Walsh College opens its west-side extension campus in Novi. Graduate student enrollment exceeds undergraduate enrollment for the first time, 1,770 graduate students to 1,758 undergraduate.

1996 – In January, a new degree is introduced -- the Master of Science in Information Management and Communication. The College also purchases 11 acres in Novi to build a permanent campus, which will open in the fall of 1998. The official college enrollment is 3,620 students. Undergraduate tuition is \$184 per semester credit hour; graduate tuition is \$252.

1997 – Walsh College celebrates its 75th Anniversary as a leader in business education.



Book Tells Walsh's Interesting History

Thomas Edison's influence is felt at Walsh College more than in the flow of electricity through its classrooms.

Before starting Walsh Institute, founder Mervyn B. Walsh worked as an accountant for the brilliant inventor, first in Edison's fledgling motion picture industry and later in his Primary Battery Corporation. Walsh learned an early lesson in both image and finance from Edison during a meeting with bankers who were about to invest in one of Edison's projects.

In their excitement at meeting Edison, the bankers set up a large buffet. "Edison came and promptly sat down and asked for a piece of bread and bowl of milk," said Mark Walsh, Mervyn's grandson. "That was his way of showing the bankers he wasn't wasting their money."

The story is one contained in the recently-published *The History of Walsh College: 1922-1997*. It also reflects an approach evident even today in the management of Walsh College. It certainly was a lesson well learned by Mervyn Walsh. According to his grandson, Walsh borrowed money only once -- to open Walsh Institute in 1922. "And he paid it back right away so he was free of any debt."

The book reveals previously-

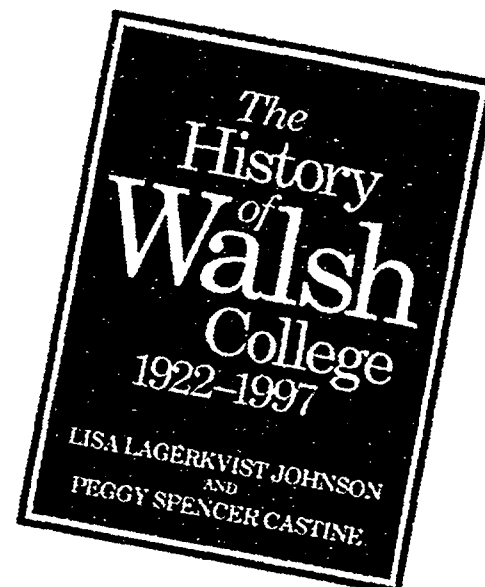


unknown facts about Walsh Institute and contains anecdotes and memories gathered from numerous interviews started in the late 1980s by then-President Jeffery Barry and Russ Nelson, an alumnus and member of the Board of Trustees. Written by Lisa Lagerkvist Johnson, former Walsh marketing director, and Peggy Spencer Castine, free-lance writer and editor, the book details the growth of a business college that began on the sixth floor of Detroit's Capitol Theatre

Building in offices that doubled as classrooms at night.

During the research, it was discovered that Walsh Institute actually began as a franchise of a program originated by Pace University in New York City. It was also learned that Walsh College is one of two original Pace franchises that are still in existence; the other is Robert Morris College located in a suburb of Pittsburgh.

Throughout the years, several char-

acteristics of Walsh have remained constant -- classes are primarily offered in evenings to accommodate its working students; adjunct faculty bring "real world" experience to the classroom; the curriculum is continuously up-dated through the direct involvement of area business leaders, and Walsh graduates get jobs.

"As people read the book, I hope they feel as I do," said David Spencer, president. "Proud of our past and excited about our future."

Technology: A Tool to Enhance Education

What does the "classroom" of the future look like?

Does it even exist?

Will students put on a headset and "experience" higher education in a virtual reality-like setting?

Will they commune with faculty and professionals from all over the world via their home or office computer or through interactive video?

While the classroom is becoming increasingly high tech and colleges are offering more flexibility in course delivery, the college education experience likely will continue to center on faculty-student and student-to-student interaction. The personal exchange between faculty members and students, which is the hallmark of a Walsh College education, will continue to be the primary means of imparting knowledge, exchanging ideas and sharing professional experiences.

"The cornerstone of a Walsh education has been, and will continue to be, a faculty composed of highly-qualified working professionals who bring their real world experiences to the classroom," said Dr. David A. Spencer, president of Walsh College. "Education delivered through adjunct and working full time faculty has characterized Walsh College for the last 75 years and is expected to remain constant for the next 75 years."

"That's not to say that advances in technology won't impact education. They will," he added. "We expect to offer students more and more flexibility in terms of taking classes at their convenience via distance learning or using resources like Internet and the World Wide Web," he said. "Ultimate-

ly, the concept of the traditional 14-week semester will change as colleges customize learning for each individual. The notion of proceeding lock-step through a four or five-year program will change as colleges incorporate the use of multimedia systems, Internet, bulletin boards, chat rooms, and the World Wide Web in course delivery."

Within the next year, the College plans call for giving all students universal access, enabling them to access the library, faculty, registration office, student advising, financial aid and career services departments from their homes or offices.

The "paperless" library already

exists at Walsh College's Novi campus. A row of computer terminals provide access to endless – and exceedingly up-to-date – research resources. Books, periodicals and annual reports are available primarily through the College's main campus in Troy.

Novi Campus: Technology in Action

The college recently broke ground for a new "technology rich" building in Novi. Though it has leased office and classroom space in Novi since 1993, it recently purchased an 11-acre site at Eleven Mile and Meadowbrook roads to build a campus where flexibility

and technology reign. The 14 classrooms will be wired for extensive use of computers and multimedia by students and faculty. It will open for the fall 1998 semester.

"Smart" podiums will put technology at a faculty member's finger tips. Interactive library resources will be expanded.

"The Novi campus will be designed for the future," said Doug Smith, vice president. "It will have the infrastructure to support the technological advances in education delivery."

Amid all the speculation about technology in education, Walsh has been careful not to overlook a primary reason why students choose Walsh – the opportunity to develop a network of professional contacts while earning a college degree. Because Walsh students tend to be older and working while attending classes in the evenings, students often develop relationships with faculty and fellow students that prove beneficial as they advance in their careers.

Some industries, banking in particular, are moving toward charging a premium for services rendered in person. While the same trend is predicted in higher education, Spencer doesn't foresee a time when Walsh courses taught in person will be charged a premium rate.

"We value that personal interaction between faculty and student and intend to encourage it in the future," he said. "Technology is a tool that provides tremendous opportunity to improve higher education; but it won't replace the interaction that makes a Walsh College education so special."

Superior Business Education That's Affordable

During the last 27 years, hundreds of professionals have started their education at area community colleges, and completed it at Walsh College through the non-competitive 2+2 relationship initiated by Walsh's second president, William Stewart.

The partnership is one way that Walsh strives to provide an affordable business education for its students. Other ways include participation in federal, state and independent grant, loan and scholarship programs. Many students also benefit from employer reimbursement and assistance finding employment.

The upper division concept was unique in the late 1960s, when Walsh College was formed. As Walsh Institute was taking steps to become a degree-granting institution, community colleges were establishing their niche in the higher education market of southeast Michigan. Stewart saw these institutions as potential partners in the education process.

"Bill Stewart positioned Walsh for the future with his insight into the

higher education market at the time," said David A. Spencer, current president. "Walsh and the community colleges forged partnerships that provided educational opportunities for hundreds of students."

What evolved was a strong relationship through which community college students can plan their first two years of course work so that it transfers smoothly into Walsh's undergraduate degree programs for the final two years of study.

Walsh's main campus was established in Troy to be conveniently located between Macomb and Oakland community colleges, its first two partners. Later, campuses were established in Port Huron, Novi and Clinton Township, in convenient proximity to other partner institutions.

The partnership also provides a cost-effective method for earning a bachelor degree.

The cost of a four-year degree from a public university is currently estimated at \$16,500, while the approximate cost of tuition alone from a private college in Michigan is \$34,000.

Grants, Loans, Scholarships

During the 1996/97 academic year, a total of \$3.2 million in financial assistance was awarded to 1,045 Walsh students. Financial assistance falls into three basic categories: grants, loans and scholarships.

A number of federal programs are available at Walsh, including the Pell

Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), Subsidized Stafford, Unsubsidized Stafford and PLUS (Parent Loan). State programs include the Michigan Tuition Grant, Michigan Competitive Scholarship, and Adult Part-Time Grant (APTG).

Academic scholarships provide full and partial tuition assistance. Walsh College offers three primary scholarships which are based on academic achievement. It also administers several external scholarships for which students must meet academic, income and/or other eligibility requirements.

Work and Reimbursement

Most Walsh College students work while attending college, and many receive tuition reimbursement. Students who need assistance finding employment are encouraged to work with Career Services. Available services include a job listing book, campus recruiting, career days and individual appointments for resume critiquing, mock interviews and job search advice.

Robert Cooper, president of Ameritech Michigan, and Stephen D'Arcy, managing partner of Coopers & Lybrand, were among 50 business leaders who participated in Walsh's Year of Inquiry.



1997: A Year of Inquiry

For Walsh College, 1997 is the Year of Inquiry.

The College has marked its anniversary by conducting a series of speakers, focus groups and a conference to stimulate thinking on issues related to business competitiveness. Insight from the intellectual debate will be incorporated into Walsh's classes. Some findings were presented to U.S. Sen. Spencer Abraham, R-Mich, at a conference held at Walsh College and could influence future legislation.

In April and May, a series of focus group discussions continued the Year of Inquiry theme under the leadership of William H. Sandy, retired chairman and chief executive officer of Sandy Corporation and Walsh's 1997 Leader in Residence. More than 50 presidents and chief executive officers from local companies participated in the wide-ranging inquiry into issues that affect long-term global business competitiveness.

"Having been involved in the investment of hundreds of millions of dollars applied to the development of performance solutions, I learned something simple and fundamental," said Sandy. "There tends to be a rush to answers before the right questions have been asked."

"The front end of solution design is the most important stage. In an academic setting like Walsh College, where the spirit of inquiry is prized and where business effectiveness is a priority, we can best contribute by being open minded and challenging. We can think in fresh ways about the issues and stimulate critical thinking."

As a result of these discussions, business leaders gained new insights into areas related to Walsh's mission: What creates profit and how it can be improved; how technology can make education more relevant to business; and how the delivery of professional services can be more productive.

As a powerful culmination to the Year of Inquiry, Senator Abraham chaired the Business Competitiveness Conference at Walsh College. Sponsored by Citizens Insurance Company, the conference brought together more than 150 small business owners from all parts of Michigan, including the Upper Peninsula.

Together, the Focus Group discussions and conference provided information which Abraham will use to foster initiatives that will help businesses become more competitive and which serve the needs of businesses overall.

Homecoming Planned for Sept. 14
