District ponders MEAP scores

The Michigan Assessment Program scores prove to be a hollow victory for Northville High

School and the district. While central office administrators like assistant superintendent Linda Pitcher were pleased with the results, they were disappointed at the meager turnout of students to take the test.

We didn't have enough students take the test for it to be significant in monitoring the curriculum." Pitcher said.

The test, given every spring and winter, is an assessment of students' basic skill levels in the areas of math, science, reading, writing and social studies. The social studies portion of the test is a new addition and this year and thus the scores for this will not be available until later in

Out of approximately 340 students in the Junior class, only 130 students actually took the incentive, the Michigan Merit Award Scholarship

test. Though this was an improvement from last year, it is still only roughly 38 percent of the 11th grade population.

There was also a discrepancy as to how many students actually took each section. The reason for that, said NHS guidance counselor Tim Turner, was that some students attended the first day of the test and may have later decided it was not worth it to take the rest of the test or they simply were absent from school for one or more of the other days.

Therefore, the second place state ranking of the district, with a score of 88.8 percent overall, was a little misleading, according to superintendent Leonard Rezmierski.

*Although the results are very good, it doesn't reflect what the students could have done if they had all taken the test," Rezmierski said.

A retest is scheduled for the end of January in the hopes that more students will take it. As an money is being offered along with the MEAP. Turner said that the state is now offering \$2,500 for students to use at in-state colleges or trade schools and \$1,000 to students who want to go

The scholarship is available to a student for seven years. Additionally, a student who does well in two out of the five categories on the test also can and who receives an ACT or SAT score in the top 25 percent of the country are also eligible for \$2,500.

Northville High School principal Thomas Johnson said that the administration can't force students to take the test because it is not mandated by the state. However, he was hoping that parents, and not the lure of scholarship money. would provide the push for students to take the

Not 'if,' but 'when?'

Area railroad crossing safety questioned by former employee

One year after a six-car train derailment in Northville Township dumped 1,000 gallons of toxins from its load, conditions appear ripe for another similar accident.

And it's a problem that apparently slipped through a twice-weekly company inspection of the railroad, but couldn't get by a 71-year-old Northville Township resident stopped at the tracks for a passing train.

The company that owns the tracks, CSX Transportation. has made plans to fix the area after being contacted about the problem by The Northville

We will be doing some major work at that crossing," said Gary Wallenhaupt, spokesman for CSX Transportation.

The problem is dirt - or the lack thereof - underneath the train tracks, said Joe Macura, a Northville Township resident who used to work for Michigan Central. Rain has washed dirt away from underneath the tracks and with it a major part of the support system for huge trains that travel through the area every day.

Macura, who used to repair tracks at Michigan Central. said he first became concerned about the tracks when he was stopped at the crossing near the intersection of Seven Mile Road and Northville Road.

The tracks bounced wildly as the train crossed, he said.

They must have been moving about eight to 10 inches up and down," he said. "They've got a real problem."

About 18 trains with three

companies, CSX, Norfolk, and Conrail, pass through the Northville area daily on the tracks owned by CSX. CSX also is the major carrier of chemicals for Bay City-based Dow Chemical.

Trains rolling through Northville often bear loads containing hazardous materials such as sulfuric acid. molten sulfur, anhydrous ammonia and liquid petroleum, the company said.

The track is made up of four components: the rails, which the train rides on; the ties, which are perpendicular and underneath the rails for support; the block, which sits on top of the ties on the outside of the rail to keep the rails and ties in place; and the stake. which goes through the block.

Macura saidjafter he saw the


rails moving so much, he went back to examine the tracks closer and saw gaps between the track and the ground where dirt had been washed away. Additionally, the upand-down action of the rail had loosened the stakes to the point where he could pull many of them out with his hand, he said.

City, township say they're ready in the event of hazardous spill

Jim Allen, Northville Fire Department chief, said preparing for a train derailment comes close to training for a high school shooting. That is, you're not really sure what

the emergency really is like until it happens. There are always situations that

are tough to handle, such as a high school shooting or train derailment," Allen said. "You just try and prepare the best you can so you can make some good decisions when the situations come up."

According to CSX Transportation,

which owns the railroad property in Northville and Northville Township, the volume of hazardous materials carried by the nation's railroads has more than doubled since 1980. At CSX alone, the company said, the volume of hazardous materials carloads handled has increased by 22 percent over the last decade.

In 1998, CSX handled 340,000 carloads of hazardous materials with 15 cars releasing toxins as a result of derailment, including one in Northville Township.

Township fire crews elect to let vacant home burn down

An abandoned Northville Township home that caught fire late Oct. 3 burned all the next day and was fully extinguished early Oct. 5.

About 20 firefighters from Northville Township and 12 from the Plymouth Community Fire Department originally responded to the 2 a.m. call, which was believed to be an act of arson. "It had probably been burning

since 11:30 p.m. or 12 a.m. before it was called in, said Bill Zhmendak. chief of Northville Township Fire Department. A woman driving by the area where the fire was called Northville

Police about "heavy fog or smoke" while driving in the area of Five Mile Road and Beck. When Northville Township Police

went to investigate they found an abandoned home engulfed in flame.

The house, which used to be where the warden of Scott Correctional Facility lived until the 1960s, is located about a half-mile off of Five Mile Road, west of Beck. There

are two other abandoned buildings behind the one that burned.

Between 2,500 and 3,000 gallons of water were sprayed on the home from the fire engines that drove back through the thick brush and narrow road before Zhmendak said he decided to stop putting water on

That didn't make a dent in the fire," he said. "So instead of risking the safety of the firefighters I decided to let the thing burn all night."

Zhmendak said had he decided to fight the fire all night, the township would have been spending money on water and equipment and risking life for a vacant building. Each time an engine has to go off road. Zhmendak said, something breaks which also may be very costly.

Additionally, he said, "terrible memories" were brought back to life of other abandoned Wayne County properties in the past that had caught fire and been extinguished only to be torched again two weeks later.



Northville's Masonpro completes Seven Mile Road location renovations

A Northville Township business hopes it has cemented itself as both a financial and visual success with its new facil-

Masonpro Inc., 43300 Seven Mile Road, moved into a new 14.000 square foot building last week across the street from Wooly Bully's restaurant.

The design of the new building gives Masonpro plenty of room. but business owner Jeff Snyder said the design has an alternate motive as well.

"We worked real hard with the township to come up with an aesthetically pleasing design that will contribute to the com-munity," he said. "The design was inspired by other buildings in downtown Northville."

The 11-year-old mason supply distribution center is owned by Snyder and his wife Terri and a partner. Don Hunson. The duo returned to Northville in 1988 after living in New Mexico.

"We worked real hard with the township to come up with an aesthetically pleasing design that will contribute to the community. The design was inspired by other buildings in downtown Northville."

The company distributes masonry products for mostly commercial and industrial contractors.

"I'd worked for cement contractors and wanted to try and

be on my own," he said. The Snyders became distributors of Masonpro products around that time and started a business out of a downtown Northville office, with a farm in Northville Township as their

The distribution center, which is not a public "walk-in" kind of business, started by serving southeast Michigan.

However, business grew by 15 percent annually and the Northville office of Masonpro moved to an older building at its current location in 1991.

The business now serves southeast Michigan, northern Ohio and northern Indiana with 10 employees.

The downtown office just wasn't efficient enough by the time we moved," Snyder said. When we moved here it gave us two-and-a-half times more

The building they moved to was 8,500 square feet, but the ceiling only was about 10 feet high, which limited the inventory Masonpro could carry.

"It really wasn't functional at all." he said.

The new building, designed by Snyder with the help of another architect, features 20-foot high ceilings and a second level that

can be used if needed. It also features special brick and wall designs that conserve

energy, Snyder said. Additionally, the office space of the building is about four times as big as the previous

office, Snyder said. Snyder said he didn't want to comment on how much the

building cost. Maureen Osiecki, director of planning for Northville Township, said the building was a welcome addition to the town-

Mr. Snyder has done a fine job adhering to and going beyond township standards. she said. "It's an attractive and well-landscaped piece of proper-



Nerio, a veteran of the NHS stage, will be giving his final performance at the high school in this performance. In November, he and his family will be moving to San Antonio, Texas. However, tight rehearsal schedules have given him little time to fret over his big move.

Zany murder mystery runs in reverse

What can an audience expect from a play where the main character dies in the first act? Plenty, when he miraculously reappears very much alive in the last act.

Richard Strand's "Lincoln Park Zoo." is a murder mystery in reverse. It was first performed at Eastern Michigan University at their 150th anniversary season. The Northville High School show may be the first time the production has ever been done on a high school stage.

"I think it's very fresh and new," said director Kurt Kinde. The play is broken into seven scenes which take place over a 24-hour period. Kinde said that the show is unique in that it is written from finish to start with the characters propelling it.

"It is perfectly balanced," Kinde said. "Every character is a lead."

The first scene takes place in the Lincoln Park Zoo where there has just been a murder. "Alice" (Leah Sims) is an undercover detective assigned to the case. She is looking around for clues when she meets "Stan" (Joe Tracz). When Stan pretends to be the undercover cop that she is and the hijinks begin. in the next scene. Alice meets with more trouble when she runs into "Robin" (Nick Nerio), who wants more than anything to be a cop. However, it is not to be for teh bumbling flat foot wanna be. His fear of guns keeps him from his dream and from being helpful.

In the next few scenes, the audience watches as Robin overcomes his fear. "Marla" (Kelsey Jenney) the pathological liar looks for work, and "George" (Powen Shiah), the dead man, begins to look a little healthler.

Nearing the climax of the show, George is alive but has been shot and needs a quarter from Maria in order to call for help. Maria, however, is desperate to find a job, and can't take the chance of having the pay phone tied up should a prospective employer call. This scene dissolves into the events that led to George's untimely demise and a surprise twist at the end.

The Show will run Oct. 7. 8 and 9, beginning at 7:30 p.m., with a possible 2 p.m. matinee Oct. 10.

Tickets are on sale at all three of the Northville High School lunch periods and at the door. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$4 for students and seniors.



Matt Gordon, 25, was among 47 artists invited to exhibit during the grand opening of the new OPop gallery building, 4160 Woodward Ave. in Detroit.

Gordon displayed three mixed media pieces for the show, which debuted Sept. 24 and will be on exhibit until Oct. 21.

*OPop's mission is to package and promote the work of the only important art movement at the beginning of the new millennium." Thewes said of the movement billed 'high,' 'new' or 'low-brow' art.

"A lot of the artists use common art and pop icons as visual vocabulary, somewhere between collage, illustration and fine art paintings." Thewes said. "Matt mixes social and popular culture icons and makes them into a very personal statement.

Gordon said he paints about 12 hours a day in his Northville studio, using tiny brushes to get the detail he desires. Each painting contains about 300 hours of work. no matter what its size, he said.

He exhibited some of his work at Genitti's Little Theater during last year's Northville Walk With Art.

Gordon studied at Detroit's Center for Creative Studies and has worked with ad agencies like Donor and J. Walter Thomson doing animatics, logo designs and

storyboards used by the auto industry.

According to Gordon, that's just to finance his fine art and illustration career, which took a great leap with the showing at OPop.

OPop plans to feature more of Gordon's work in a two-man show with artist Matt Bandsuch sometime in January.

The gallery opened in 1995 and recently moved from the basement of a Royal Oak church to its new three-story location. It has been voted 'best gallery' by the Metro Times more than once.

Gallery founder and director Rick Manore sald Gordon's work was admired by other, internationally-known artists in the show. like Mark Ryden and Robert Williams, who is hailed as "The Godfather" of the movement.



Merchants happy with sign ordinance

The seesaw battle over a new sign ordinance in Northville ended earlier this week with merchants able to raise their hands in victory.

Northville City Council voted 5-0 at its Oct. 4 regular meeting in favor of adopting a new sign ordinance that more clearly tells merchants what they can and can't

included in what they can have are A-frame signs, which had been proposed to be eliminated in the Northville planning commission's version of the sign ordinance. Discussion regarding the proposed ban packed the council chambers twice this year with merchants upset at the idea of losing their

The new ordinance is perfectly logical and fair to merchants." said Laura Williams, owner of Pamplemousse. "I'm real happy because it shows we're all trying to work together."

The new ordinance says that the total permitted sign area shall be calculated by multiplying the total building frontage by one lineal foot. The total permitted sign area applies to all freestanding, projecting, walls signs, or sidewalk signs. The total shall apply to any individual sign or a combination of the above listed sign types. However, not more than two types of signs (freestanding, projecting, wall or sidewalk) shall be allowed on any business site in the CBD. In calculating allowable square footage for projecting signs, walls signs, sidewalk signs, and freestanding signs, the total square footage of both sides of a projecting sign. freestanding or sidewalk sign shall

be used in computing total sign

area allowed."

Businesses that have 20 feet or less of building frontage would be allowed to have up to 28 square feet of sign space to "spend."

The sign amendment was changed following the presentation of the Gibbs-Green report in June

The study examined the future of Northville and made suggestions for possible changes. One of the changes was to allow bracket signs within the central business dis-

During 18 months of deliberation among the Northville Downtown Development Association, the Northville Central Business Association, the historic district commission, the chamber of commerce, city workers and Northville City Council, various changes to the ordinance were discussed.

And while the bracket signs started the discussion into changing the ordinance, the issue of Aframe signs received the most attention after the planning commission made the recommendation to eliminate them permanently

after 2000. However, city council decided to overrule the commission and decided to allow the signs as long

as they meet the guidelines. Gary Word. Northville city manager, said the final version of the sign ordinance is workable.

"I'm glad the process is over." he said. I think we have a workable compromise that the business people, planning commission, city council, downtown development authority and historic district commission all worked hard on."



Fire department offers tips for Fire Prevention week

Autumn naturally brings thoughts of raking leaves, pumpkins and football, but it's a great time to think about fire prevention as well.

That's partly why Oct. 3 through Oct. 8 is National Fire Prevention week. Oct. 8, 1871 was the day a fire destroyed 75 percent of Chicago, killed 250 people and lest more than 100,000 people homeless.

The Northville Township Fire Department has developed a list of preparations families should take to ensure protection against fire that may want to be highlighted by families during the week. They include the following: · Check smoke detectors. Statistics say about half of smoke detectors do not work due to missing or dead batteries.

Without working smoke detectors, you just have a decorative piece of plastic on your wall or ceiling," said Dan Dipple, township firefighter and public education coordinator.

Detectors double your chance of survival in a fire, he said.

The fire department also recommends finding the best locations for the smoke detectors with a minimum of one smoke detector for every floor of the house. The best locations are close to furnaces, hot water tanks or electrical panels and inside every bedroom.

• Prepare a home fire escape plan. Every family should have a home escape plan that has two ways out of a house. One of the ways should be the door, which should be used unless the door is hot. And remember to stay low and crawl.

The other way is to get the attention of the fire department by waving a blanket or sheet out of a window.

Whatever method is used to escape, a meeting place should be set up where all families members are to go so the fire department will know if everyone got out safely.

 Practice stop, drop and roll.
 Family members should know what to do if their clothes catch on fire. They should stop where they are, drop down to the ground and roll completely over so that every part of your body touches the ground.

· Practice. Make a plan that encompasses all of the above elements and practice it periodically with all family members pre-

"Most fire deaths happen because there was no plan of action." Dipple said.

State lawmakers may have voted this spring to get rid of the hated Single Business Tax, phasing it out over the next 23 years, but Michigan business leaders are not done with the issue yet.

"Twenty-three years, are you kidding?" Onsted business woman Sharon Roy asked at the Speaker's Summit on Small Busi-

Nearly 400 business men and women gathered with legislative leaders at the Radisson Hotel in Lansing Wednesday, Sept. 22, for the first-of-its-kind meeting.

Speaker Chuck Perricone, R-Kalamazoo Township, organized the summit meeting to allow small business owners to meet with the chair of each committee in the House of Representatives. He said he hopes to host other summit meetings in the future on a variety of topics, such as health care and senior issues. He also said he hopes to institutionalize such summits. making them something future speakers of the House will continue.

Lingering concerns about the SBT dominated much of the con-

Once you get done adding back the Investment Tax Credit for the Capital Acquisition Deduction, it will take 15 years before this is even revenue neutral." Roy contin-

The bill adopted by lawmakers in the spring phasing out the SBT also replaced the Capital Acquisition Deduction with an Investment Tax Credit. While similar, Roy said, the legislation allows businesses to claim only 85 percent of the new credit, compared to 100 under the old deduction.

Roy said that means the tax liability of many businesses will actually increase initially under the phase out plan.

House Taxation Committee Chair Nancy Cassis, R-Novi, said the increase was unintentional.

"We are beginning to realize that some adjustments will be needed. It was not the intention of the Legislature in eliminating the SBT to increase it for some and make them wait for 15 years for tax relief," she said.

In fact, Perricone said he believes the Legislature will speed up the process of getting rid of the SBT.

"Many of you would like to see the phase out accelerated," Perricone said in his address to the crowd. "Many have said to me. Why can't you speed it up? You should have gone for five years. Well, now that we have the phase out in place, we can speed it up. It's not a matter of if, it is a matter of when. I can assure you we will accelerate it, but not this term. We've had two tax cuts already and another is coming. But I can assure you it will happen and in the next few years."

That should come as good news to Eaton Rapids resident Nicolle Clark, owner of the Lansing office equipment distributorship Hasselbring-Clark.

She complained the tax is so complicated that she can't check her accountant's work.

"We have our up years and our down years. I always pay this Single Business. Tax at the same rate no matter what my profit is. In the past five years, my SBT has been larger, and in many cases double, what my federal income taxes are."

Think about it on a personal level. What's the income tax on a personal level, 4.4? Clark continued. In the marginal tax rate to the federal government, it's 39-40 percent. If you were earning \$100,000 and you paid the federal government \$40,000 of that, you would only pay \$4,000 to the state of Michigan. Then you turn into a business and you pay \$20,000 to the federal government and you pay \$40,000 - double it - to the

State of Michigan." Clark said that because the SBT is calculated in part on payroll and the benefits paid to employees, it penalizes companies that are generous, that is companies which try to avoid layoffs during economic recessions.

Back in 1976, when this tax was first passed, I was invited to the Rotary to explain the new Single Business Tax." Northville CPA Lee Holland said. "I looked at it and I said, this is the most complicated thing I have every seen. Even though you are operating at a loss. you have add back your compensation, add back you depreciation. I didn't understand it then and I don't understand it now."

Holland did point out a things about the SBT he found humor-

The "gross receipts reduction" in the SBT for instance applies if a company's gross receipts are more than \$9 million, and less than \$10

"There must be one company somewhere in Michigan with gross receipts somewhere between \$9 and \$10 million," he said.

I read back in 1976 that the auditors for the state of Michigan were really concerned about this law because it was so complicated. They had to make it honest. One of the supervisors was quoted as saying. Just because you don't understand this, and I cannot explain it. does not mean we should not enforce it," Holland said.

Holland also noted that most of those in attendance at the summit would not still be in business when the SBT phase out is complete 23 years from now.

When the SBT was first adopted. it replaced seven other business

Although a variety of formulas are use to calculate it, its purpose is to tax the value a business adds to its product.

Perricone said it was his hope lawmakers would return to session with ideas for new legislation to improve the climate for small businesses as a result of the sum-

Breakout sessions in the conference covered topics such as health care insurance, schools, land use, economic development, deregulation and transportation.

Perricone said he specifically targeted small businesses because they provide 78 percent of jobs in



Wallenhaupt said he did not agree with Macura's observations. He said as long as there are enough spikes that can't be pulled out to adhere to the federal standard there was "not an immediate concern.

"It's normal to be able to pull a few spikes out," he said.

However, Wallenhaupt admitted rails lifting six inches off the ground could, "potentially be a problem.

Additionally, Wallenhaupt said he agreed the situation described usually was an indication of a drainage problem, but didn't think the situation merited any kind of emergency

response on CSX's end of things. Still, it was a serious enough problem that it drew the attention of the Federal Railroad Administration in 1997 after a derailment on the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway

Co. near Kingman, Ariz. for the same reason.

The administration issued a safety advisory after the accident that highlighted the portion of the Federal Track Safety Standards that include. In the event of fire, flood, severe storm, or other occurrence which might have damaged track structure, a special inspection must be made of the track as soon as possible after the occurrence.

Several severe storms made their way through Northville this summer.

FRA believes that more specific measures can be taken by each railroad that conducts operations on track subject to hazards from flowing water to

And Macura said he hoped the fire department wouldn't have to be called to the intersection before CSX performs any scheduled work.

of Northville and Northville Township are trained to handle a train derailment, officials said, although each goes about it slightly different.

For example, in the city of Northville, preparing to handle train derailments is considered to be part of the regular training to handle any situation, Allen said.

In the event of a train derailment, the city fire department would have the job of executing an evacuation and securing the situation," Allen said.

The area Hazardous Materials team; which consists of specially trained emergency personnel from western Wayne County, would be called to assist with handling leaks and bringing in special equipment.

such as trucks designed to move train

The equipment is kept in facilities in Farmington Hills and Metro Airport in Romulus.

Additionally, Allen said, emergency responders from the city attend classes sponsored by train companies on how to handle train derailments.

"I think we're pretty well-prepared to handle a derailment," Allen said. More intense in-house training is conducted at Northville Township, said William Zhmendak, fire depart-

ment chief. "I don't think a lot of people realize Wayne County and the greater Detroit area is one of the largest chemical manufacturing areas in the country,"

That's why Northville Township emergency personnel attend classes put on by CSX. Conrail and other train-related organizations and busi-

The township department has a contingency plan in place for handling a derailment.

It would begin with an emergency dispatcher telling the location of the derailment with pertinent information such as if the derailment occurred in a residential or business area.

Wind direction also is given to the responders so as to not expose them to hazardous material in the air. Zhmendak said.

After they arrive, the train is examined from a distance with binoculars to see what the train contains so they

can determine what should be used to put out any existing or potential fires.

It is determined at that time who should be contacted for further help or information, such as last year's derailment when neighboring communities were informed about diesel fuel that had spilled into a stream that led to

their communities. Additionally, any evacuation and securing of the area would be conducted by the fire department with assistance from the police depart-

We're aware of how we would handle this situation," Zhmendak said.

A tanker truck carrying more than 2.000 gallons of phosphoric acid through Northville teetered on the brink of toppling over and potentially spilling earlier this week.

The incident happened Oct. 3 at about 11:30 a.m.

There were no injuries. City of Northville Police Department Officer Greg Hannewald said he was driving by the the corner of Base Line Road in between Parmenter's Cider Mill and Griswold when he saw a tanker truck stuck with two of its wheels in a ditch in front of Stellar Materials Inc., 777 Base Line.

The tractor trailer is owned by Rogers Cartage Co.

Hannewald said the 7,000 gallon-capacity tanker had about 2.000 gallons of phosphoric acid in it.

"We're probably very lucky it wasn't full," said Jim Allen. city of Northville Fire Department. Otherwise it probably would have tipped over.

The driver of the truck was attempting to back into the driveway of Stellar, which uses phosphoric acid in its manufacturing of concrete, when the right rear corner went into the ditch. The rest of the truck almost followed, including the cab, which had two wheels lifted off the ground.

Additionally, when the tanker drove into the ditch, a small amount of diesel fuel leaked from the cab.

As a result of the tanker driving into the ditch. the employees of Stellar were evacuated while two truck wreckers pulled the tractor trailer out. Northville Fire Department firefighters were prepared with hoses drawn in cases the tractor spilled

We just want to take some precautions." Hannewald said. The tractor trailer was pulled out successfully.

State cops can't locate Aug. 27 Nield FOI request

It appears as if another document related to the investigation of Jim Nield has gone missing.

The Michigan State Police Department told The Northville Record it never received a Freedom of Information Act request

the paper sent out Aug. 27. The request was sent via certi-

However, Ron Sutberry, FOIA officer with Michigan State Police. said he doesn't know if the police ever received the letter.

"That's a good question," he said. It may be coming through the system yet.

Sutberry said the letters sometimes take a week to go through the system once they arrive at the department. However, the FOIA request was made Aug. 27. The request would have given state police 10 days to respond.

"I just don't see anything there," he said. "If I would have seen it I definitely would have responded to it."

The letter requested to see a "whited-out" portion of the police report from the Michigan State Police investigation into Northville businessman Jim

The Record learned through an alternate source the information contained addresses of some Northville School District officials and the name of Lynn Schultz, a Northville Township resident, as possibly having more information on the allegations. Schultz later said she didn't know who Nield was and had no idea how her name got involved.

The other documents related to the case that are missing include detailed information about how

and who originally contacted the Wayne County prosecutor's office.

The five-month investigation that started in March and ended in July centered around Nield's involvement with Families for a Better Northville and accusations that he stole school district properties in that effort by employing school labor and materials for mailings connected with support for the group.

Nield's wife, Martha, is vicepresident of the Northville board of education.

The investigation was started after Ray Walsh, deputy Wayne County prosecutor, contacted Northville Police with the information someone had contacted his office making the allegations.

Any documents relating to who originally contacted the prosecutor's office have been misplaced. officials from the office have to the Record.

The Michigan State Police investigation cleared Nield's name in July after the investiga-tion, but the end of that investigation led to the beginning of others.

For instance. Lyn Bankes. Wayne County board of commission member, conducted an investigation to see if any Wayne County employees had abused their power.

Michigan Attorney General Jennifer Granholm is conducting an investigation into the matter as well.

Chris DeWitt, spokesman for the attorney general, said earlier this week the investigation is continuing.



During the six-car derailment, more than 1,000 gallons of hazardous materials leaked from the tanker into the environment. The hazardous materials got into some running water and ended up in a nearby lake.

But even more scary than all of these things is that CSX Transportation officials insist the track is inspected twice a week.

In other words, a tw inspection by the company that and can inspect. owns the tracks running through your backyards isn't one thing, being able to mean it quite able to find a problem that could mean the difference between a 71-year-old man stopped at a life and death.

That brings up two good points that absolutely must be addressed:

1) CSX Transportation needs to have a better method of inspecting tracks that takes a closer look at them using better trained personnel or equipment. Local fire departments and other law officials should not be responsible for making sure the tracks operate as they should - that's the duty of the rail-

2) CSX needs to send something to local municipalities that tells exactly when and how the tracks were inspected

ing such documents to Gary Word, Northville city manager, or Karen Woodside. Northville Township supervisor, would do just fine.

In all fairness to CSX, the company said after being questioned about the problem that it has major repairs" scheduled for that section of track in late October.

and the press to bother the local school district for the results of the Michigan Education Assessment Program test.

And once again we find that Northville Public Schools is among the elite in the state. Normally that would be cause for celebration, but another statistic has school officials scratching their heads in disbelief. To be honest, it has us wondering as well.

That statistic is the number of 11th graders that sat for all three days of the MEAP exam. Out of approximately 340 students eligible to take the test only 130 participated.

For those of you who don't have a calculator handy, that comes out to a 38 percent participation rate.

We believe that is totally unacceptable.

Especially in a community like Northville. Heck, every year we listen to parents address the school board, demanding more accountability by educators in preparing the youth of our fair town to head off to universities and rewarding careers.

We wonder if any of those parents have ever stopped to consider that the best way to hold an

educational institution accountable for the education of students is to actually test their knowledge

Pretty amazing concept isn't it?

Instead, we hear complaints about how tough the test is. Or we hear complaints that it doesn't reward the student enough, even though the state is putting together an incentive package to provide scholarship money for students scoring well on the test. And if that doesn't work, we hear complaints that because the test is too tough, parents are afraid that a poor showing by Johnny or Susie might hurt their chances of being accepted to an elite university.

Never once does the thought ever occur to these parents that the whole purpose for testing is to find out if Johnny or Susie have actually learned anything during their high school experience.

After all we do want them to learn something. Right?

So for all those parents out there who would encourage their teen to opt out of the MEAP test, consider this. If your son or daughter doesn't have a firm grasp of the knowledge necessary to succeed in their future. don't you want to know about it now?

Our CSX story was right on track

Just the thought of it makes me

Imagine for a moment a train pulling dozens of railroad cars full of petroleum winding its way through Northville. It passes the crossing at Seven Mile and Northville roads as cars wait at the crossing for the train to make its way past the intersection. Imagine a section of track giving way. the dirt below it eroded away by heavy rains, and then imagine those dozens of railroad cars leaving the tracks heading straight for the Mobil gas station nearby.

Frightening thought, isn't it?

Well, thanks to some good investigative reporting by Andrew Dietderich and Melanie Plenda, and the sharp eye of Northville resident and retired railroad employee Joe Macura, perhaps that frightening prospect will never become a reality.

The three teamed up to draw attention to some problems with the tracks at Seven Mile and Northville Roads, in Northville Township. The tracks, owned by CSX Transportation, posed a potential threat to the community because the dirt supporting the tracks had eroded away. The end result was that when a train moved over the tracks at that crossing the tracks began bouncing wildly, according to Macura, who used to repair tracks for Michigan Central Railroad. "They must

have been moving about eight to 10 inches up and down," Macura told Dietderich and Plenda. They've got a real problem.

A real problem, indeed.

I could go on about CSX needing to be more responsible in ensuring those tracks are inspected regularly, but that would be redundant - see editorial to the left. No, the reason I make mention of this entire situation in my column is that I'm extremely proud of Andrew, Melanie, and yes — Joe Macura. At a time when most of us have "too

much going on" with our lives to care about things like track inspections, or attending city council or township board meetings, or even attending a seminar on the pros and cons of weighted grades, at the high school, I really take notice of people like Macu-

Here we have a retired man in his 70s, not only taking the time to notice a potential health and safety hazard. but taking the time to bring that hazard to the attention of people who can do something about it. We'll never know if Macura's efforts saved any lives, but I can tell you this I wouldn't want to be at that crossing if something were to break and dozens of railroad cars came hurtling off the tracks.

I'm also proud of my two reporters -Andrew and Melanie - for taking the extra time and effort to tell an important story. To often newspapers become reactive to things that are important to readers. We report what has happened, pick up the pieces and

Sure, we'd have a big story if a train was to derail. But at what cost? By reporting proactively Andrew and Melanie provide an important service to our readers and community. By reporting this story CSX has the opportunity to fix the problem, the tracks are safe for travel, and the train travels on to its destination.

And we can all go about living our lives without having that worry.

Doe and bucks costing us dough, bucks

There are no new northern white cedars in Michigan. Although plenty of older trees exist, as soon as a cedar sapling begins to bud from the moist, dark soil, a whitetail deer, attracted to its sweet, tender buds, eats it down to the

And though I've seen a few of these evergreens in remote, swampy areas, an over-population of deer has negated a part of Michigan's landscape that has been around since the last ice age.

Deer have decimated foliage all over the state, creating open "park-like" environs where lush forests used to reign with dense underbrush. In the downstate areas, gardens and crops aren't safe from them. Up north, it's the cedars.

This state-wide dilemma now enters our own backyard, and hand-wringing aside, there's no simple solution to the deer over-population problem in nearby (Milford's) Kensington Metropark as many "wildlife" lovers have engaged their emotions over scientific-based fact. Fortunately, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Metropark commission is planning an autumn controlled hunt to alleviate the pressure the whitetail put on the park's plant life.

In a way, we have become a poor steward for the state's whitetails by artificially maintaining a large herd for a hunting element that pumps close to a billion dollars into the economy. The unfortunate side-effects of this economic boon the deer afford are many-sided and whether you're "for" the deer or not, consider

these facts on Michigan's whitetail:

 The Michigan Department of Natural Resources estimates that our state's deer population is close to 2 million (at least 1.8 million) and expected to grow after back-to-back mild winters.

· Besides man, and thousands of automobiles. Michigan's whitetail deer have few, if any, predators. Elements in nature that would act to curb deer populations are almost non-existent: Early (and subsequent) Michigan homesteaders, ranchers and farmers have for the most part all but climinated animals that would

naturally prey on deer: bear and wolf. AAA Michigan routinely reports more than 50,000 deer/car collisions each year. Most of the deer involved are fatally injured. Usually ten to 15 car passengers die, thousands more are seriously injured and the cost to repair damaged cars (and persons) is in the tens of mil-

lions of dollars per year. • Michigan's deer herd has a robust appetite: The Michigan Department of Agriculture estimated their damage in 1998 to crops of corn, soybean, sugar beet, apple, cherry and others to cost farmers \$25 million in lost profit. Twenty-five million dollars? That's some serious change. Also, in south-central Michigan, where most of these products are grown, the deer herd with 24-hour open buffets in front of them has, logi-

cally, exploded. A Grayling-based organization of proactive trout fishers. The Anglers of the AuSable, noted in their recent newsletter that In 1998, they spent \$70,000 on planting new cedar trees (which they must barricade from hungry deer) along the AuSable river system.

To summarize: Michigan has an unnaturally high deer population. The deer have few natural predators, and are growing in numbers after recent mild winters. They unfortunately meet headto-head with cars a lot (causing quite a bit of damage to the autos and their passengers) and have a predilection to munch most vegetation and crops within their grasp — to the ground.

Given these effects, an unnaturally high deer population places on the rest of our environment, I'll opt to "save" nature from an over-abundance of deer, any day of the week.

Actions speak louder than anything

Theorists may theorize. Policy wonks may pontificate. Politicians may blather. But the stately and uncontrollable passage of concrete events has a wonderful way of cutting through all the fog.

So it was last week on schools, the issue likely to be of top concern to voters in next year's election.

Event 1: Two weeks ago, billionaire Amway President Dick DeVos kicked off the petition drive to get enough signatures to put a school voucher plan on the 2000 ballot. The plan would entitle students in "failing" school districts (where fewer than two thirds of pupils graduate on time) to publicly funded vouchers worth up to \$3,100, good at any public or private school.

DeVos dismissed school reform efforts in Michigan as "incrementalism," while his wife, state Republican Party chair Betsy DeVos, said current policy, "tinkers around the edges." Both called Michigan schools "underperforming." Event 2: Last week, Republican Gov. John Engler poured cold water on the school voucher plan at, of all places, the big GOP leadership conference on Mackinac Island.

Citing a recent Detroit News poli that showed only 47 percent support versus 34 percent opposition among Michigan residents [10 percent undecided]. Engler argued that any ballot proposal with less than 50 percent support at this point is doomed. His staff said he was also worried a voucher proposal on the ballot would energize teacher unions and various other liberals, thereby threatening Sen. Spencer Abraham's reelection campaign as well as prospects for continued GOP control over the state House of Representatives.

Event 3: Later last week, the Michigan Department of Education released results of last spring's MEAP test. The results showed "steady improvement in MEAP scores," according to

State Superintendent Arthur Ellis. The results also indicated some 20,000 students who scored well on the test have potentially qualified for a \$2,500 state-funded scholarship to college.

Some 66,000 Michigan high school took the test last April, up nearly 10,000 from the year before. Introducing assessments (like MEAP) of what students actually learn has been a central component in school reform for years. Dangling a \$2,500 state scholarship to college as an incentive for kids to take the test (an idea of Engler's) has evidently turned around what looked like a growing boycott against taking the test.

Well, well! What's going on here?
Ignore for a moment the fact that the very top
Republicans in Michigan are dramatically and
publicly at odds over education. That's political
insider baseball.

Focus instead on the extraordinarily revealing juxtaposition of events: The launch of an incendiary ballot proposal that could threaten public education in Michigan and recent MEAP test results indicating overall gains in student achievement.

I think State Board of Education member Kathleen Straus got it right when she told me. The things we have been doing in improve our schools are working. Why destroy all that?

Why, indeed? As I suggested in this column a couple of weeks ago, the issue of reforming education has been improperly framed for years. Instead of looking for some ideologically correct silver bullet (charter schools several years ago, vouchers this year), folks actually interested in improving schools would do well to realize that the education picture in Michigan is actually quite complex.

Many Michigan schools are making real progress; test results are up, graduation rates rising, parents and students satisfied. Reform tools such as MEAP tests, improved curriculum, emphasis on teaching and sustained parental and public attention appear to be working reasonably well. The question is how best to deal with those schools that are not making progress.

Some urban schools such as Inkster or Benton Harbor are in terrible shape. The mess now unfolding in Detroit suggests that the sad realities of urban politics there have overwhelmed any residual interest in taking care of kids. The remedies now being applied to Detroit — pitch out the corrupt-but-elected school board, appoint a competent CEO with the authority to clean house — may well prove appropriate to other failing urban school districts.

The best way to identify an ideologue is to see whether the passage of concrete events has any effect on ideological consistency. In the case of the voucher proposal, it's hard not to conclude that backers are so taken up with their ideology they have lost touch with reality.

If the visual qualities of Gao Siyong's artwork doesn't set a mind at ease, the titles of the pieces will.

Try "Dream."
Or maybe "Autumn."

What about *Beauty?*

Siyong's work is currently on display in the lobby of the Novi Civic Center. Siyong herself is on the other side of the world, in her native China. But her friend and former colleague. Wenchi Wang, is hoping that the display of the artwork will expose area residents to culture from the Far East.

Wang said that for Siyong, the pieces created early on in her art career held a deeply personal meaning: they were used to help her deal with the death of her

Nothing else really seemed to help her through those times. Wang said. When she started her art, it was almost as if the work was drawing

something out from within her. It was a very spiritual thing she experienced." The majority of Siyong's

work is done on rice paper. which allows the ink to mildly bleed through the fibers of the material, giving it a gentle appearance.


Fear not —variable annuities a good addition to portfolios

Is your investment portfolio reeling from the one-two punch of higher taxes and low interest rates? Are you looking for a way to potentially increase investment earnings. while minimizing your tax liability? Are you interested in an investment that can help you save for retirement and enable you to provide income for your heirs?

In the past, many investors ignored variable annuities because they believed they were too complicated to understand. Today, many investors are learning that this just isn't the case. They're turning to variable annuities because they not only offer a competitive alternative in today's volatile economic environment, but also provide important features not found in other investments.

It's easy to understand why variable annuities are a popular investment once you look at the potential benefits they provide to investors. In short, a variable annuity is a financial contract between an investor and an insurance company allowing investors the flexibility to choose among a number of different investment portfolios. Because the investment is part of an insurance contract. variable annuities will not only provide tax advantages but also offer an estate benefit to beneficiaries at the time of death.

There are two basic types of variable annuities; immediate and deferred. Immediate annuities are appropriate for investors who need income at the present time, as income payments begin when you purchase the annuity. With deferred annuities, distributions made after age 59 1/2 allow investors to take maximum advantage of income tax deferral. Withdrawals made prior to this age may be subject to a 10 per-

cent IRS penalty. Let's take a closer look at how variable annuities work to meet investors' needs.

TAX ADVANTAGES

Under current tax laws, variable annuities are one of the few remaining ways to achieve tax-deferred savings growth. In fact, according to Best's Review Magazine, variable annuities have "evolved into something like a universal retirement savings product. That's because they offer many of the tax advantages of a traditional retirement account, without some of the limitations.

For example, there are no limits on the amount of money you can contribute to a variable annuity. Dividends and interest carned within a variable annuity are not taxed until withdrawn, allowing your principal the opportunity to grow faster than a taxable investment. With today's higher tax rates, this is a significant advantage.

Here are two reasons why: first, your principal earns interest and is not currently taxed; second, your interest earns interest and is not currently taxed.

Let's consider the advantages of tax deferral in more concrete terms: If you're in the 36 percent tax bracket and invest \$10,000 earning an annual rate of 7 percent, your principal would grow to \$24,027 over 20 years in a taxable investment. If your investment was tax deferred, however, your money would grow to \$38,696 within that same

Of course, the income you earn in an annuity will be taxed upon withdrawal, but in a deferred annuity that will probably be after retirement, when you're likely to be in a lower tax bracket. In an immediate annuity. your periodic payments - which are considered to be return of principal plus interest earned on the principal - also receive tax-favored treatment since there are no taxes on the return of principal portion of each payment. Therefore, the money you invest continues to grow tax-deferred until you receive it as part of an income payment.

INVESTMENT CHOICES

Most variable annuities allow you to allocate your money among many different investment portfolios, including domestic and global stock, bond and money market funds. Like mutual funds, these portfolios are professionally managed and pool investors' funds, so risk can be minimized through a level of investment diversification that would be difficult to achieve independently. You can also transfer assets freely among different funds as your personal goals and market conditions change without triggering tax events, such as capital gains.

Something particularly important in today's low interest rate environment is

investment flexibility. Such flexibility within a variable annuity allows you to decide how your money is invested and gives you the opportunity to generate higher returns on your capital. Keep in mind, however, the value of your annuity depends on the actual performance of the underlying investment portfolios. Your return will fluctuate and can be worth more or less than your original investment at any given time.

FLEXIBILITY

Variable annuities allow you to choose a payout option that can help you meet the important financial milestones in your life. whether you want to fund your child's education, build a new career, or supplement your retirement income. Depending on your age and financial situation, you may elect to withdraw your money immediately or at a later date. You can also help design the size and duration of your payouts. or example, you may decide to receive regular payments for a specific time period, regular payments for life, regular payments for life plus the life of a loved one, or specific payments made in equal, periodic installments.

Whatever payout options you choose, it's important to understand that variable annuities should be considered a long-term investment. While in most cases you can access your money at any time, as most annuities allow a free withdrawal annually of as much as 10 percent, there are often significant surrender charges imposed for early withdrawals. As stated earlier, in the case of deferred annuities, there is a 10 percent tax penalty assessed on withdrawals prior to age 59 1/2.

ESTATE BENEFITS

To some people, the most attractive feature of an annuity is the ability to pass a lifetime of income on to their beneficiaries. Most variable annuities promise to provide an estate benefit which is at least equal to your principal investment, less any withdrawals. at the time of your death.

That means, even if your portfolio performance is down, your heirs will receive no less than what you invested. What's more, many annuities are now offering a guaranteed minimum estate benefit which will increase annually at a predetermined rate for a specified period of time.

Variable annuities are sold by prospectus only, which includes more complete information on charges, expenses and risk factors. Variable annuities are long-term investments designed for retirement purposes. Withdrawals may be subject to surrender charges and if taken prior to age 59 1/2, a 10 percent IRS penalty may apply. Variable annuities are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.



'Beauty' nothing short of excellence

*Both my wife and my daughter think I'm a gigantic loser," says a desperate Lester (played with

excellence by Kevin Spacey).

And as this phrase is indelibly imprinted on the inside of your eyelids. "American Beauty" has only been playing for less than five minutes.

It may seem quite mundane, but it is this attitude that propels Spacey's character throughout the entirety of "Beauty."

He gradually loses his infesting conformity, but only after he loses his job, his wife begins cheating on him, and his obsession with a teenage girl takes full flight.

Humor, drama and suspense are all artfully established within these five minutes as well, along with a more defined version of what a film should be.

"American Beauty" is the definition for more than just *Oscarcaliber." It lends its name to greatness as only a few films have done in past years. It is "The Graduate for a new generation a twisted "Casablanca" for the

Surprisingly enough, most films similar to "Beauty" are subjected to a limited release capsule or suffer from mass criticism from audiences.

Stanley Kubrick's *Eyes Wide Shut was possibly the most recent example of this cinema theory - it was a highly publicized masterwork that was plagued by its thick, analytical plot — audiences just didn't get

ent. The film delves into the prolific mid-life crisis of an average man, turning his life upside down with the realization that his life is ordinary.

With "Beauty," it may be differ-

He is content with an ordinary existence, but can't stand those around him.

From here, a child-like Lester matures throughout Beauty. narrating over the film's breathtaking cinematography as he veers into a new lane in life.

The formula for the film is why Beauty" works so well. The brilliant mixture of realistic family tension, physical and vocalized humor, and even eroticism blend into one of the most enduring films of 1999.

*People began asking me to do

films about three or four years ago," says Director Sam Mendes, whose play, "The Blue Room," shocked theatergoers because of a primarily nude Nicole Kidman parading on stage. Though out-of-the-ordinary, his

production made headlines and received critical acclaim.

Coincidentally, Mendes' theater

experience offers an interesting aspect to "American Beauty."

He establishes drama with an edge, and it is because of his stage background that the film blends so well dramatically.

Though, it is not static film to any end. "Beauty" is moreover a potent cocktail of sex. love and fast food, fueled by powerful visual fireworks and gritty dialogue.

And even though the focus of the film may seem to be projected on Spacey, all the characters in "Beauty" have pivotal roles.



ordinary objects. Bentley could be considered the Timothy Hutton for the 90's, conveying a powerful performance in "Beauty" as Hutton did in "Ordinary People" nearly 15 years ago.

With such an extraordinary cast, an excellent screenplay by sitcom writer Alan Ball, and a plot that takes a dangerous look into the mentality of suburban America. "American Beauty" is truly a theatrical marvel.





Cancer patients have new allies

Facing cancer is hard enough. But facing the fact that part of your cancer has broken loose and invaded your bones - once seen as a guarantee of an imminent and painful death - is even harder.

Now, patients at the University of Michigan Comprehensive Cancer Center have a new team of allies when confronting bone cancer that has spread, or metastasized, from their original tumors. A group of physicians from many specialties has banded together to start an innovative Bone Metastases Clinic, allowing them to choose the best treatment for each individual from a range of new pain-alleviating and even life-saving options.

The cooperative approach - unique in the nation - gives patients a much better chance of surviving or living comfortably with their secondary cancer, says clinic head and director of orthopedic oncology Dr. J. Sybil Biermann. Bone cancer no longer automatically carries the weight of a death sentence.

There used to be a very limited number of treatments available for bone metastases patients could either have surgery or they could have radiation, and there wasn't really much else," Biermann said, "In the last few years, a number of medications and other theraples have been developed that can be used very effectively for bone metastasis. In fact, this has presented a fairly confusing array of alternatives for both patients and the physicians who

Biermann and her colleagues decided to help

metastatic bone cancer patients sort through the confusion by reviewing each case together and recommending which treatments to pursue, from surgery and chemotherapy to radiation and radioactive drugs. Patients can even elect to try brand-new treatments by participating in clinical trials offered at the clinic including tests of treatments being developed at

With an estimated 500,000 Americans living with bone metastases, and 190,000 more being diagnosed each year, the clinic's concept may become a model for hospitals nationwide.

Bone cancer arises when cancerous cells from the main tumor break off and travel through the bloodstream or lymphatic system. When they lodge in the bone, the cells can take root in the welcoming environment and begin to

As the new tumor or lesion grows, it can press on nearby nerves, causing pain and welling. It also can weaken the bone, increasing the risk of fractures, and cause too much calcium to enter the bloodstream, a condition called hypercalcemia.

The American Cancer Society estimates that half of all cancer patients, except those with skin cancer, will develop metastatic bone cancer. Most common are metastases that spread to the bone from breast, prostate, lung and kidney cancers - with the spine, pelvis, hip and upper leg bones being the most likely

"As cancer treatments become in general

more effective, patients are living longer and longer with cancer," Biermann comments. "It also means that a substantial part of the population actually has metastasis of the bone, and those patients are needing treatment as well."

The U-M clinic gives such patients easy access to a diverse range of specialists, all in one visit. For those who must rely on others to transport them to medical appoints, the "onestop shopping" approach makes a world of difference.

Biermann also hopes the clinic will help clear up some of the popular ideas about metastatic bone cancer that have become untrue in recent years as medicine has advanced.

"A common misconception is that patients with bone metastasis are in the very terminal phases of their disease. While it's always a more serious situation when a cancer has spread from one place to another, with contemporary cancer treatments, patients can be alive with metastasis for years or even decades," she

As for the idea that bone cancer means excruciating pain, crippling bone weakness or constant sedation, she said: "With new treatments, we can stabilize the bones, we can strengthen the bones, and we can allow patients to get out and do the things that they want to do with less pain and with more mobili-

First aid for fungus growth

Q. I have a brick patio that faces north and gets almost no sun because it is shaded by the deck above. My problem is a dark-green fungus growth that really sticks to the brick. I have found that the only thing that removes this growth is a 1300 PSI power washer, and it does not do a very good job. Can you recommend a cleaner that will take the place of the power washer and a sealer that will protect the brick from this growth after it has been cleaned?

A. This is a common problem, and we receive a number of similar questions annually, so the information deserves repeating.

Copper sulfate, also known as bluestone or blue vitriol, is a chemical you can use to get rid of moss and algae on masonry (concrete, brick, flagstone, etc.). This chemical can be safely used with minimal damage to grass or garden plants nearby. Sold at feed stores and some nurseries, copper sulfate is available in both powdered and crystal form. The powder is the easier to dissolve in water. Mix 1 pound of it in 20 gallons of water, and spray it over the mossy area. Copper sulfate may seem to be staining the masonry, but the color is easily hosed

If brick or concrete remains stained once the moss residue has been removed, you can give it a deep cleaning with dry sal-soda concentrate. Hose the whole area thoroughly, preferably in the evening, and then sprinkle the entire surface uniformly with the dry sal-soda concentrate. Allow to stand overnight. Then go over the area with a broom, or even better, with a stiff-bristle scrubbing brush (do not use a wire brush, which will leave rust stains). Hose off the area, and repeat as

If grass grows at the edges of the area you are cleaning, it will be necessary to mop up the wet sludge after scrubbing. Don't hose it off into the grass. Wear rubber gloves when cleaning up the sludge. Protect your eyes from splatters with eye goggles. After removal, flush the area with clear

Check either a chemical supply company or janitorial supply house that handles cleaning chemicals as a source for sal-soda concentrate.

Once the masonry is clean, apply a good masonry sealer over the surface for future protection. There are many brands on the market. Check with your local masonry dealer or a wellstocked home center. Look for a penetrating prod-uct that reduces biological growth, as well as atmospheric soiling and staining. Because your patio is in continual shade, it is very likely you will experience regrowth of moss during moist weather conditions. This will require additional treatments with blue vitriol and reapplication of a masonry sealer, but shouldn't require the deep-cleaning process with sal-soda concentrate.

Q. My 8-year-old roof is still in excellent condition except for the brown streaks that appear to be slowly spreading. I was told it was a mold that could be removed by spraying the roof with a combination of household bleach and water, but this didn't help. It is unsightly since it is the front of the house, and from across the street, the roof looks dirty and dingy. Can you help?

A. Excessive moisture, particularly hot and humid summer weather, as well as too much shading of a rooftop by nearby trees, can contribute to this problem. It is more than a cosmetic problem. because moss and algae growth on a roof can promote decay in the basic structure.

If it is just mildew, regular household bleach will remove the residue (four parts water mixed with one part bleach). This solution should be applied near sundown to let it work without evaporating too soon. Don't rinse.

If the discoloration is green or brown like yours. it is likely that this is more than mildew, but rather a fungus growth. A method of removal I have recommended before is to scrub the roof with a stiff bristle brush using a solution of 2/3 cup trisodium phosphate (available from paint dealers, not the super market product), I cup detergent, I quart household bleach mixed in 3

quarts water. The copper sulfate solution, as described in the preceding question regarding removal of moss and algae from masonry surfaces, is also an excellent treatment for roofs and is another option (not including the sal-soda treatment).

Be sure to use extreme caution when working on a roof. Use solid ladders that are securely anchored, and be aware that the area may be very slippery with algae growth, particularly when wet. Be careful not to damage shingles by stepping on them or scrubbing too hard and disturbing the surface granules that protect the asphalt base of that type of shingle. Before using any of these ckaning solutions, it's best to do a test application on a small area to check for discoloration of the shingles. This would be particularly important on

darker surfaces. Prevent further growth with zinc strips placed on the ridge of the roof line. Rain water running off the zinc creates fungistatic compounds of zinc oxide that impregnate and cover the roofs surface, thus inhibiting growth of moss, fungus and

Chicago Metallic Corp. manufactures "Shingle Shield," which is a rigid 3-foot roll-formed section of zinc that is applied continuously along each side of the roof ridge line and additionally below any point that interrupts the flow of rainwater

Charitable trusts untaxing way to sell farms

Selling a home can be a real challenge. But it's usually a cinch compared to the task of selling an entire farm. However, there is an increasingly popular option for farm and land owners.

Many farm families find that tax consequences can be an insurmountable obstacle to fulfilling their dreams of completing a successful sale and entering a new phase of life. Their land has often appreciated in value and is subject to stiff recapture taxes.

Also, many who adopted a tax strategy of prepaying their expenses while they were actively farming have found that the tax bill must finally be paid at the worst possible time - when they're trying to finance their retirement.

During the past year, weak commodity prices have stressed the

uidity becomes more important than expansion to most farm operators, it's difficult to sell farms in most regions of the country.

"A comment I often hear is "I can't get a decent price for the farm and even if I did, I couldn't afford to pay the taxes," said Lee-Holfeltz, owner of Holfeltz Realty & Investment, a firm specializing infarm sales. Amid this generally bleak assessment by many farm owners, there is a viable option from an unlikely source."

Holfeltz explained that Congress established many programs over the past 30 years to assist charitable organizations in raising donations by providing tax breaks and incentives to those who give to charity. Among these programs was the charitable trust, a tool that can break the cycle of taxation some farmers face.

Charitable trusts are exempt from capital gains taxes, recapture

extent, even income taxes, he said. *Charitable trusts can indeed be

a viable option for farm and land owners, if they are structured properly," said attorney Ronald Harrington.

A charitable trust allows a farmer or other land owner to transfer his or her property to a charitable organization while retaining a life interest in the property. The organization can sellthe property tax-free because they are a tax-exempt entity. The trust then sends payments to the farmer. In many ways, it's similar to an annuity.

"At current interest rates, these charitable annuities are more or less twice as profitable as other

options." Holfeltz said. "In addition to being more lucrative, a met service provider - those promoting X-rated Web sites, gamcharitable trust may also be an easier and faster way to selling a farm or other land."

Golf goes on at Golfsmith

Just because the season has changed from summer to fall doesn't mean that golf is gone for the winter. In Michigan, true golf enthusiasts don't put their clubs away until mid-January. And even then they may only stay put for a month or two.

All of that is good news for Golfsmith, Northville's newest and largest supplier of golf equipment and apparel. The largest direct marketer and superstore retailer of golf equipment in the world opened up its doors in June, giving it a late jump on this year's golf season.

The store, which is located in corner of Six Mile and Haggerty. is just the second Golfsmith location in the state of Michigan and the 27th in the United States. Their Troy location opened up in February. Michigan is just one of six states which has two or more store locations.

"It really shows the fanaticism of the Michigan golfers," said store general manager Chris O'Brien. "And Northville is in the middle of the golfing hotbed. This

is a huge golf area. Golfsmith's main business is in the club making industry, but looking at the 30,000 square foot showroom of retail equipment and apparel would make one

think otherwise.

The store is different than your average golf retail outlet in that it has vendor participation. There are more than 20 different brandnamed golf apparel and products which outline the showroom. Reebok, Etonic and Foot-Joy shoes, Jack Nicklaus, Greg Norman and Izod clothing and nearly all the major club manufacturers such as Cobra, Taylor Made, Callaway and Titleist have separated sections throughout the

There's also a gift shop, putting green and a club-making center where professionals reshaft. lengthen and shorten shafts. regroove lines, tighten club head The store also has its own golf simulator where customers can learn their swing speed and distance and test equipment.

Every customer that walks through the door is greeted by a staff member and a handshake.

Twist of fate can leave once-loved animals homeless

There's no place like home ... especially if you don't have one.

The Humane Society of Livingston County has been connecting adoptable pets with potential owners since their 1972 founding

1972 founding.

Through a 24-hour, seven day a week voice mail system, volunteers handle more than 4,000 call a year concerning lost pets, found animals or assistance.

They search the county pound several time weekly, as well as scan lost and found animal ads, hoping to reunite missing pets with their owners.

In addition, the Humane Society pays for medical costs — last year alone over \$30,000 — and provides daily care in the "foster" homes of volunteers until the animals are adopted. Half of their adopted animals are saved from the county pound and the other half come from local residents who can no longer care for them.

Considering how many calls the Humane Society receives every year for assistance alone, the homes it finds for 500-600 animals each year is not enough.

The Humane Society has an administrative office site and adoption center at 2464 Dorr Road in Howell. Pets available for adoption are shown from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturdays, and from 1-4 p.m.

Every pet needs a place to call home, and a chance to be a special part of someone's life. Even though the volunteers at the Humane Society have caring hearts, it doesn't replace having a home, a bed, and a hug from a special friend. Animals are often victims of circumstance and the wrong twist of fate can turn a beloved pet into a stray or homeless animal.

An all-volunteer organization, the Humane Society of Livingston County is a non-profit agency and receives no funding from any municipality or animal orga-



Breast Cancer Survivors:

Feeling and Looking Better than Ever

eating breast cancer is a victory that is bittersweet for many women. While survivors have won more time with family and loved ones, they have suffered a tremendous emotional and physical loss that affects all areas of their lives. October is Breast Cancer Awareness month and there are many ways in which sur-

vivors can find ways to help heal the painful scars

that are left behind.



Invasive treatments such as radiation and chemotherapy take a toll on a woman's appearance. Thinning hair or complete hair loss, botchy skin and frail nails are often the result of these life enhancing treatments. Our outward appearance is often a reflection of how we feel inside and vise versa. There are many ways in which survivors can empower themselves and turn the many negatives of breast cancer into positives in their lives.

An example of this is the "Look Good, Feel Good" program, sponsored by the American Cancer Society, the Cosmetic, Toiletry and Fragrance Association Foundation and the National Cosmetology Association. The program (800-395-LOOK) is available locally at St. Joseph's Hospital and U of M's Comprehensive Cancer Center in Ann Arbor, and throughout the country.

"The program gives women the tools they need to help themselves feel better when they go out during the day and while receiving treatment," says Lisa Ziske, American Cancer Society Community Development Program. Ziske coordinates the "Look Good, Feel Good" program and has worked hard to build awareness of its existence.

The program lasts two hours and is split into sessions, says Ziske. "The beauty section deals with the hair issues—loss of hair, eyebrows and eyelashes. It also covers what to do when the skin is affected by chemotherapy," she says.

Volunteer licensed cosmetologists complete an extensive training course to help them hone in on the special problems breast cancer survivors face. The participants are given up to \$250 in free cosmetics and taught how to determine what colors are best for them, how to apply makeup and use turbans and scarves.

The other portion of the program is dedicated to educational issues about chemotherapy and radiation. "It's a good opportunity to compare notes about their experience, learn some things and connect with other women," Says Ziske. "Most of the women leave feeling very uplifted—the people are very friendly and open.

"A lot of women are very depressed when diagnosed," she continues. "There are so many side effects. This is a way to conquer something that's running a person down. I think it's empowering for a lot of women, it shows they can do this; they can beat what's driving them down. It really improves esteem and confidence."

"Everybody wants to look good most of the time," says Sharon Cure, director of Patient and Family Support Services at the Barbara Ann Karmanos Cancer Institute. "We approach the cancer diagnosis as something that's not just a situation that's going to put them into a dysfunctional state for today and the rest of time. It's something they can deal with today and it will help them develop new goals for tomorrow—goals that may have nothing to do with cancer. We try to help them turn cancer into a positive."

Several years ago, Cure and several others took a good look at the "Feel Better" program and also at the "I Can Cope" program offered at Karmanos. "We felt these were two great pro-

grams, but that they were one-dimensional," says Cure. "One really focuses on beauty and the other is very education oriented. We decided to try and develop our own program, 'All About You,' five years ago."

This program is offered in four week long sessions: The first session, "The Image of Style For You," discusses hair loss and skin care. It also discusses the importance of fashion—from the clothes you wear to the wigs, turbans, hats or scarves you choose. "What we were doing was addressing the fact that they looked different and giving them tools to use after recovery," says Cure.

The second week is "The Essence of You," designed to heighten self-esteem and strengthen the emotional fortitude of the women. In an interactive discussion, speakers share their own personal experiences with breast cancer.

The third week, "What's On the Horizon For You?" is very educational with speakers on topics like genetic counseling and bone marrow transplants. "Knowledge is a very powerful tool— and that's how the session is approached," says Cure.

"This is one of the coping mechanisms."

The fourth week is called "The Many Colors of You." The women in the program get their choice of a makeover or a professional manicure. Free nailpolish, blush or eye shadow and information booklets are distributed.

"By the completion of the program we have brought the women full circle," says Cure. The participants are then informed about other support groups and community services available for them. Karmanos offers Family Night Out on the fourth Wednesday of each month, which consists of six different support groups for cancer survivors and their families. To find out more, call 1-800-KARMANOS.

"You know that even when you're sick, if you feel good and look good, you can feel more empowered to tackle the challenges that are upon you," says Lynn Dworzanin, a nurse practitioner at U of M Hospital's Comprehensive Cancer Society.


In collaboration with St. Joseph's of Ann Arbor and The American Cancer Society of Washtenaw County, U of M offers the "Look Good, Feel Better" program on the first Monday of each month. (St. Joseph's offers the program on the third Wednesday of each month). The free program was designed for women undergoing cancer treatment to help them look and feel their best.

"When you don't have hair or eyebrows, you don't feel good about yourself—you withdraw from others," concluded Dworzanin. "The patients who attend the 'Look Good, Feel Better' programs are smiling, sitting up straighter...they feel better and you can see it in them."

Thyroidism are you at risk in


Feeling constantly dragged out or over-stimulated?

Always cold or generally hot and sweaty without regard to weather conditions?

Constipated or using the rest room more often?

Ask yourself about these symptoms to detect whether you might have some form of thyroid problem.

omeone who is fatigued, cold and constipated might have an underactive thyroid, while an individual who is agitated, sweaty and experiencing more frequent bowel movements could have an overactive thyroid.

The thyroid, a small, butterfly-shaped gland located in the neck, does not function properly for some 20 million Americans. Two common disorders are Hashimoto's Thyroiditis, a chronic inflammation that often brings hypothyroidism, and Graves' Disease, a thyroid enlargement that results in hyperthyroidism. Goiter is an enlarged thyroid that may or may not need treatment.

Although a blood test measuring Thyroid Stimulating Hormone (THS) lets people know if they have one or the other of these conditions, getting to that test isn't necessarily straightforward. That's because the thyroid affects the functioning of just about every cell in the body, and hormone irregularities result in symptoms that build gradually and also could be indicators of many other diseases.

"The symptoms of thyroid disease are very non-specific," says Ronald Koenig, a University of Michigan internal medicine professor who also holds a doctorate degree in biochemistry. "For almost every common symptom of thyroid disease, there are many other conditions or problems that can cause those symptoms. In most cases, it would not be a thyroid problem."

Thyroid patients also can experience heart irregularities, weight changes, moodiness, hives, fluid retention and muscle aches. Tracy Green, who is being treated for hypothyroidism, knows just what it means to have symptoms that aren't readily diagnosed. At first, she was told her rigorous life style was making her feel tired and sometimes foggy.

"A lot of doctors can focus on a couple of symptoms and not look at the total picture," says Green, who lives in Plymouth and was diagnosed five years ago. "My thyroid had been depressing my system, and I often felt like I was looking at the world while wearing someone else's glasses."

When Green was originally put on medication, she felt her system was back to normal pretty quickly, but after her third child, she had a hard time getting regulated again. Green believes hunting for the right specialist in the field, an endocrinologist, is critical to feeling well.

Wanting to help others going through similar experiences and looking for more information, Green started a support group last January. The five original members spread the word about their frank discussions, and the group has grown to 90 members and invites medical experts to speak at once-a-month meetings held at the Plymouth District Library.

"At every meeting, people say they can't believe how much they've learned," Green says. "I ask doctors to speak for free, and we haven't had a problem getting any of them."

Barbara Aldinger of Livonia knows all about coping with thyroid problems. First diagnosed with Graves' Disease 20 years ago, she has relatives who have survived thyroid cancer.









"I believe that the key to feeling well is getting the right dose of medication," says Aldinger, who sees a family doctor for treatment. "I have been up and down with the dosages. If it's too high, I have a fast heart rate. If it's too low, I'm tired and crabby."

Dr. Koenig, who sees patients in addition to teaching, says that regulating medication can take a bit of time. With an underactive thyroid, fine-tuning the medicine can take as long as four months. With an overactive thyroid, the time depends on the treatment — doing nothing because it sometimes goes away on its own, giving medicine to inhibit thyroid functioning, administering radioactive iodine or using surgical procedures.

Surgery and radiation treatments have entered the life of Eric Vahlbusch, who was diagnosed with thyroid cancer nearly three years ago. Sometimes treatments result in an underactive thyroid, and other times, they result in an overactive thyroid.

Through internet contacts who have gone through similar procedures, Vahlbusch has begun participating in a national thyroid cancer support group, ThyCa, Inc. In October, members will meet for the second time in Boston.

"I believe I have had first-rate medical care, but sometimes I need more details and think I will get that through other patients in the support group," says Vahlbusch, who lives in Clarkston.

Although it is known that certain kinds of thyroid problems can be hereditary, there is nothing people can do to prevent the disease other than eliminate any risk of insufficient iodine in the diet. Still, the outlook is good for people getting the proper treatment.

"There's some controversy about having the thyroid tested as a matter of routine," Dr. Koenig says. "Certainly, I think a physical examination of the thyroid as well as asking the patient questions about symptoms related to the thyroid should be routine.

"But if a patient doesn't have symptoms of thyroid disease and has a normal thyroid physical examination, then I don't believe it would be cost effective to do a thyroid blood test — with one exception.

"As people get older, hypothyroidism becomes so common that many people do advocate doing a TSH test periodically, just because the likelihood of someone being hypothyroid is quite high and patients would not always recognize the symptoms."



Fall for Hiking: Discover the colorful splendor on an autumn hike

s my breathing got heavier under my 50-pound backpack and my legs grew weaker, I started to question why I ever wanted to go hiking. But slowly, as I emerged from the shadows cast by the 100 foot tall pine trees, I beheld a kaleidoscope of colors, a spectacular panorama. And then it all became radiantly clear.

It was two years ago while hiking the Manistee river trail that I discovered one of the many rewards of hiking. While my trek took place in May, I wondered what this wonderful view might look like in October as the leaves turned brilliant reds, dazzling oranges and fiery yellows.

According to Carol Nilsson, public information officer for the Huron-Manistee National Forest, hikers will find that autumn is a great time to hit the trail.

"The views are breathtaking along the Manistee River Trail," she said. "On some of the ridges, you can see quite a long way and in the fall the colors are beautiful. It's probably one of the most popular and widely used trails, but sometimes you can hike for days and not see a person."

Wildlife abounds in this part of Wexford County. Deer, beavers, raccoons opossum, coyotes, otters and black bears are just some of the creatures you'll be sharing the rail with along this 12 mile journey. And as you've probably heard a thousand times before, be careful when you're in bear country. While it isn't very likely you'll encounter a black bear in Michigan, it's better to play it safe by hanging your food from a tree branch 10-12 feet up and to make some noise while walking. Finding yourself between


a nervous mother and her cubs can really put a damper on a hiking trip. Enough of Bear 101.

Northern Michigan is also home to white pines, poplars, maple, beech, red oaks, aspen and black oak where eagles, loons, osprey, northern waterthrush, vireos, turkeys, sparrows, ducks, rails, bitterns, hawks and woodpeckers make their homes.

But fall hiking requires some preparation. Since temperatures can dip close to or below freezing, a quality sleeping bag is essential. When shopping for a sleeping bag, look for a drawstring that closes the bag up fairly tightly and at least a 30 degree rating. A white gas stove, layers of clothing, hand/pocket warmers, quick hiking socks, thermal underwear for sleeping and any other gear you'd take on a hike are essential.


However, if you're going to invest in one item that can make or break a fall hiking trip, make it a good tent. North Face, Sierra Designs, Mountain hardware and Eureka all manufacture reliable tents to hold heat in and keep rain and dew out.

Comfort is an important ingredient for an enjoyable and successful fall hike. Before you set up your tent, scour the group for pine branches and lay them



under your tent for additional cushion and to keep the cold away from your body. Also if you don't mind the additional baggage, an 8-foot by 8-foot piece of plastic is a good way to prevent a soggy tent floor.

As I learned over the past two years, one or two chilly wet nights are a small price to pay for the sensational views and sheer enjoyment of Michigan's many trails.





Vodel tries to remind people that they can't possibly do it all. She encourages caregivers to

reach out to others, whether it is a local agency, a neighbor or another family member.

For instance, contacting your Area Agency on Aging can put you in touch with caregiving programs to ease your strain. Put yourself on the program waiting list even if you don't need the program yet. There is a good chance you will need it by the time the agency calls your number.

Self care means setting your own rules, says Vodel. Perhaps you can't give your loved one the care he or she deserves or needs. Then you need to step back and find someone who can. Looking for quality care does not mean that you are abandoning you loved one or breaking a promise. "You need to shift your way of thinking," to find the best care possible, said Vodel.

Self care occasionally involves changing

your perspective. Sometimes loved ones might seem difficult. Ration these feelings and ask yourself if a negative emotion is the best way to spend your limited energies.

Other times loved ones seem stubborn but they're really not. For instance, an Alzheimer's patient might cling to his seat when you try to help him rise. This isn't defiance; he simply can't get out of the chair. Call a physician to better understand your charge's behaviors and needs.

Self care also means hours for you that don't involve cooking, cleaning or worrying about someone else. Vodel suggests you go to lunch with a friend or make a date with your husband. Mark them on the calendar and keep your appointment. You need to foster your own emotional and physical wellness for the hope of your loved one and yourself.



Wills: What you need to know

Family members fighting over their mother's favorite watch, her house. Making a Will might prevent these ugly scenes from happening in your family and ensure that your wishes are fulfilled. And making a Will is a little simpler with a few fast facts.

A Will is a very flexible instrument that can be very simple or very detailed by which you can decide who, when and how your probate property shall be distributed. In Michigan, anyone who is in sound mind and 18 years of age can make a valid Will. A Will is revocable until your death—no particular wording is needed. The Testator (or Will maker) need not be a US citizen, or a resident of Michigan, but can be illiterate and need not even personally sign his own Will.

Keep in mind your will might need to be witnessed. A competent witness must witness the acknowledgment and signing of the Will and cannot inherit under the Will. If your Will is written in your own handwriting, and signed and dated, it won't need to be witnessed. All other Wills must be acknowledged and signed by or at the direction of the maker or Testator, and witnessed by two competent witnesses.

Knowing all that, you should consider a will it:

- Your property is held in your name alone;
- You have minor children so you can designate a guardian and property;

- "You own appreciated assets so your heirs can avoid excessive capital gains tax;
- You have an undetermined interest in a current lawsuit, in another's estate or trust, or are owed money by a debtor;
- You do not feel easy for any reason about putting you children's name in joint tenancy on your home or other property;
- When you estimate your assets, or the combined assets of yourself and your spouse you approach \$625,000.00. [In this instance, you should seek legal advice about a Will or a living trust, because your estate may be subject to federal estate tax and a mistake in estate planning could be very expensive. (Estate Taxes begin with the 37% bracket and rapidly reach the 55% bracket.)

Before you decide whether or not you need a Will, you will need to inventory your assets, determine your net worth and understand how your assets will be distributed if you do not make a Will.

Your Estate

List and identify all your assets, their cost, their current market value, in whose name(s) the title is held, and note if you have designated a beneficiary after your death to the custodian of the asset. Then list and value all your debts. The net value of your assets and your debts is your net estate.

stan-Probete Property

Your estate consists of two kinds of property, non-probate property and probate property. Examples of non-probate proper-

ty, are insurance, POD (payable on death) accounts, trusts created during your life, and joint tenancy with right of survivorship property. Non-probate property passes title to your designated beneficiaries by operation of law at the time of your death.

Probate Property

All property that does not pass by operation of law becomes Probate Property.

Intestate Property

If you do not have a will but you die owning probate property, the law will determine who will receive your property and it may not pass as you expect.

If you are unmarried, but survived by children and parents, your parents under the law of many states will inherit from 1/3 to 1/2 of your intestate property, and your children will inherit from 2/3 to 1/2 of you estate. If your are married with children, your wife in many states will inherit from 1/3 to more than 1/2 of your intestate property and your children will inherit the remainder.

What property does a Will effect? A Will only effects probate property. However, non-probate property that is payable to your estate is also probate property.

While there are many things wills can do, there are many that they can't. A Will cannot change the disposition of property of non-probate property. A Will cannot provide for you during your life if you become ill or incompetent, because a Will cannot take effect until your death. Furthermore, a Will cannot disinherit your spouse. Still, the document will make make your passing that much easier on the people you will leave behind.
