Layoffs likely at Hayes Wheels

A planned layoff of more than 1,200 people by Northville Township-based Hayes Lemmerz won't significantly affect the local plant, a spokesman said

However, news of the layoffs at the township's third largest taxpayer has at least one township official hoping and praying business improves for the automobile wheel manufacturer

"I don't ever like it when any of the businesses in the township are not doing well," said Mark Abbo, Northville Township supervisor. "I trust they have the kind of management team that can see them through and I trust in the long run they'll be fine. At least that's what we hope and pray happens.

Hayes Lemmerz International Inc. is a supplier of automotive and commercial highway wheels, brakes, powertrain, suspension, structural and other lightweight components The company has 46 plants and six joint venture facilities with more than 15,000

Michael Murphy, 49, was charged with drunken driving and refusal to take a preliminary breath test from a Dec. 15 arrest in the city of Northville. The police report indicates Murphy as an, "attorney/state of Michigan."

According to a city of Northville police report, Murphy was so intoxicated he had difficulty with several sobriety tests, including the mability to recite his "ABCs" past the letter 'C,' and count backwards from 100.

"I'm cooked. It doesn't matter. I'm not doing it," the report said Murphy told police.

Genna Gent, spokesman for the Attorney General Jennifer Granholm, said it was too early to comment on the charges

We know nothing about these allegations so it would be prema-ture to comment in any way," Gent said

Murphy said he's been

"absolutely clean and never did anything wrong" in his life.

Additionally, he must report the incident to the state Bar of Michigan. Murphy said he didn't know if there would be an professional repercussions from the Bar or the attorney general's office.



Rough week at Foundry Flask

Striking workers at a local business played a key role in saving the building they were picketing from turning into a pile of ashes last week

Two workers on strike called the city of Northville Fire Department after flames and smoke started to shoot through smokestacks and the roof of Foundry Flask, 456 E Cady St Dec. 13 at about 4 p.m. The city of Northville Fire Department responded and was able to contain the fire. There were no injuries in the blaze, however, the roof was damaged "We were just walking along there when the next thing we knew there was smoke and flames coming out of the stacks," said Earl Skeens, one of the picketing workers. "That's when we realized the building was on fire." Doug Brinkman, owner of Foundry Flask, said he didn't want to comment on the fire

Thinking spring early: duo plans greenhouse

If a tree grows in Brooklyn, what grows in the parking lot of the racetrack?

Plenty, if you ask father and son team Fred and Troy Goethe

Recently, the Northville city council approved a temporary greenhouse and garden center for the parking lot of the Northville Downs Race Track at 301 S. Main Street.

While the Goethes will not grow their wares on the premises, their 30 foot-by-100 foot fully-stocked greenhouse will come complete with benches of flats surrounding the facility.

The Goethes expect to open up shop the first week in April and will remain open at least through July They said the bulk of their business will be flowering plants, some vegetable plants and combination hanging baskets.

But this is not the first time the two have teamed on a business

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venture, they said. Since the younger Goethe can remember, the two have trained and raced horses all around the country. While the thought of mixing work and family might raise the hair on the back of most peoples necks, the two say they wouldn't have it any other

way. "There are some days we can go into work and not even talk but we know what the other would say and is thinking," said son Troy Goèthe. "It's great because we know we both work hard and we'll show up every tlay and one will work just as hard as the other .'

Father and son Goethe won't be the only ones selling their wares at the Northville Greenhouse. They said they will also put their wife and girlfriend to work as well. Troy said even his sister, Tracy, might stop by to throw a hand in for the family cause.

Troy Goethe said like every family, they have their ups and downs, but for the most part they shrug it off and keep going.

There are no suspects or witnesses.

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

Northville School Briefs

DISTRICT SUPPORTS EIGHT MILE ROAD SIDEWALK

The Northville school board approved a request from district superintendent Leonard Rezmierski to support the city of Northville build a pathway along Eight Mile Road.

The proposed sidewalk would run from Eight Mile Road and Center Street to Eight Mile Road and Taft Road.

The district's support includes up to \$80,000 from the district to build the pathway. That is about one-quarter of the total cost of the project. The city will also cover a fourth of the project. For the rest, the city is asking the Michigan Department of Transportation for a grant.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$320,000.

Rezmierski said in a letter to the Northville Board of Education the district is in favor of the project "for safety and enhancement reasons.

If the city's application is approved, the project should begin in the spring of 2002 and conclude by August 2002, prior to the opening of the 2002-2003 school year.

The city of Northville brought the pathway proposal to the district last year.

At the time the district made a written commitment to the city to consider the financial obligations of such a project, Rezmierski said However, he said earlier this year, MDOT refused the city's application

This year, city manager Gary Word and public works director Jim Gallogly are resubmitting their request, Rezmierski said.

SUMMER TAX COLLECTION RESOLUTION

The school board approved a resolution to levy a split tax collection for 2001.

According to a letter from business and finance director John Street, even though there has been a significant reduction in school property taxes to 18 mills on the non-homestead property plus debt mill on all property, the early tax collection of property taxes will be a benefit to the district to help meet cash needs.

In 1983, the board of education determined to impose a summer property tax levy to collect onehalf of school property taxes. including debt services upon property located within the school district

That began in 1984 and was to continue from year to year until specifically revoked by the board. MORE TREES, PLEASE

Northville Township resident Jim Pizzimenti donated more trees to adorn the berm lining the perimeter of the new high school Pizzimenti donated 15 arborvi-

tae and four serviceberry trees In a letter to assistant superintendent Dave Bolitho the additional texture of the arborvitae as well as the color of the serviceberry trees would be a nice enhancement to the area

The donations were discussed at the Dec 5 administrative services subcommittee meeting and approved by the full board Dec.

DISTRICT WELCOMES NEW COORDINATORS

The Northville school district filled two more vacant positions this week.

Kevin Cavanaugh and John Bojanowski will be the new custodial and transportation coordinators, respectively.

The custodial coordinator is responsible for directly supervising the operation of the custodial program, maintaining records of complaints, problems and work requests and ensuring follow-up ties after hours.

The transportation coordinator will directly supervise the operation of the transportation program, maintain records of complaints, problems and requests, train employees and investigate concerns with bus service, among other things.

In September, the district posted an operations supervisor position After holding interviews in October, personnel director Roy Danley said in a letter to superintendent Leonard Rezmierski that the district would be better served by dividing the position into two positions

The custodial coordinator and transportation coordinator positions were posted in November with interviews held in December The interview panel consisted of Jackie Hunter from the transportation department, custodian Dan Miles, administrative assistant Chris Gearns and Danley.

The coordinators are non-union positions with compensation of \$50,000, with one-year probationary contracts.

Condos damaged in township fire

Several condominium units were damaged in an early morning Northville Township blaze this past weekend, while 11 people inside them escaped without harm.

The incident happened Dec. 17 at about 7 a m.

According to Northville Township Public Safety Department Detective Paul Sumner, police and fire units were called to the 41900 block of Scenic Lane on a report of a structure fire

Two police officers arrived first and witnessed smoke around the building. The condos closest to the smoke were forcibly entered by emergency personnel to make sure everyone inside were evacuated without injury. Fire departments in the city of Livonia and Plymouth district were put on alert status during the fire.

Subsequent investigation determined the origin of the fire to be in the chimney of 41983 Scenic Lane.

"As soon as the occupant realized the building was on fire, he tried to call emergency, but his phone was dead," Sumner said "Fortunately, he

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was able to get out of the condo and call from a cellular phone while he tried to get as many people out of the other units as he could.

Six units, all connected in the same building, were damaged in the blaze. The extent of damage depended on the closeness of the unit to the origin of the fire, Sumner said.

"Some of the units were only damaged by smoke and water because they all share the same attic," he

Sumner said the investigation of the fire determined it started in unit 41983 between the chimney and wall. The occupant of the unit told investigators he had used his fireplace for the first time this year the night before

To make things worse, Sumner said, the building is located close to a lake and wind gusts during the fire reached 28 mph at times.

When you have a fire like this, a strong wind can be like putting fuel on the flames," Sumner said.

MADD is in the midst of its tie one on for safety campaign, during which time its members are encouraging people to get the speciallydesigned MADD ribbons to tie on their cars It's a show of commitment by people to not drink and drive during the holiday season

This is the 12th year of the program, and was one of the first awareness campaigns organized by MADD

Oakland County MADD chapter director Michele Compton said this is one of MADD's biggest campaigns of the year She said she hoped people took the time to observe some basic safety tips during the holidays

"We just hope if people choose to drink, they will be responsible and not drive." Compton said

Compton said she hoped people who hosted parties know they can be held responsible for the alcohol consumption of their guests She said in Michigan, if a party guest gets drunk at a private residence, the owner of the residence can be held liable if the guest gets into a car and drives under the influence

She said people can prepare for arguments from guests unwilling to

give up their keys or accept a ride from someone sober Reminding people of the potential penalties for driving under the influence is often a good deterrent strategy, she said

She also said that if guests argue that they only have a short distance to drive, the host may remind them of the statistics which say three out of four accidents happen within 25 miles of the home

She also said the argument of having coffee or something to eat to sober up is not valid, either

Only time can sober a person up," she said "Nothing else — not coffee or food or a cold shower Only time

Additionally, for those guests who admit they've driven under the influence without incident in the past, she said a host need only say "I'd hate for this to be the one time you kill or seriously injure someone

Compton said AAA-Michigan, as well as all MADD chapters carry a book of non-alcoholic beverages designed for the holidays and to keep people safer.

"It's called 'The Great Pretender," she said. "They are the most lus-cious drinks and you really don't miss the alcohol

Also Compton said red ribbons for cars are also available at any of the MADD chapters

There are no losers at the Northville E

Even though there is evidence of loss everywhere you turn, including tickets littering the floors and faces wearing looks of "almost" and "if only." But those are simply tickets that lost their luck and faces who have yet to see the next race. Where there's a race and while the betting windows are open, there's a way to be the luckiest man or woman in the world.

At least for an evening — at least for one race.

The Northville Downs is more than a harness racing track Sure, it has simulcasting, too, allowing its patrons to get the most bang for their buck betting around the country But there is more. There is a feeling of adventure in this place "Woulda," "coulda." "shoulda" and their cousin "next time" all reside here Every day is "anything can happen day" at the Downs It's all the drama a dollar ticket can buy.

THE ATMOSPHERE

It's not Vegas

It's not the Kentucky Derby

But for the die-hard Downs movers and shakers it might as well be Many hop from table to table talking to other "lifers" at the Downs The ones who ve worn worry knots into "their" tables more times than they care to and tread the boards to the winners' window fewer times then they'd like.

However, there are some who don't leave their luck to chance They plan, strategize and choreograph their wins Their table in the upper level dining room rivals war rooms at the Pentagon Half cups of coffee accent a table cloth of racing forms which have been poured through, sweated on and sometimes cried over.

"You can pick horses because you like their color or their name. But you won't win very much,' said Edward O'Hare, patron of the Downs for 25 years "But if you study the horses and analyze the racing form, you have a better chance breaking even and leaving with your shirt and a couple of dollars still in your pocket "

Edward and his wife, Julie, are from West Bloomfield. But every Friday night for 25 years the couple have come to the Downs to sit at "their" table on the upper level of the Dining Room at the Downs. Edward had his own stable of horses for many years, he said. He also has frequented the great gambling gables of Yonkers, N Y., Pompano and the Meadowlands. Yet, he said it is the people and the atmosphere of the Northville Downs which earns his patronage every Friday

Edward's not a big betting man He said Julie sees to that He said she

"keeps me in line " If he were really honest, he never bets more than \$20 at a time on any given race.

For Julie's side of the story, she said "I just go along with my husband" 'She goes along,' he said finishing her sentence for her "A woman must really love her husband a lot to spend 25 years at a track with him." Julie just smiled She knew he was right.

But there are patrons like Chris Poulos, who has lived in Northville for 60 years who said this is his chance to "get away from the wife for awhile." She was raised in Ontario and born in Greece and she couldn't care less

about the track, Poulos said. But he has been coming since it opened One would think he would be the expert on wins and losses at the track

"I've never bet on a race," he said. "I just love watching the horses. I can't even put it into words."

THE REASON

To find out the skinny on the winnings though, one need only go so far as the betting and cash out window.

"They come here to buy their tickets and complain,' said 20-year veteran cashier Jeanette Jackson

She said she's seen winners come and go with the biggest taking away \$90,000 on one race

"You see them come and go and you don't really get involved, unless they win and you were the one that sold them the ticket and they give you a tip," she said "But they're usually not anywhere near the window when they win.'


Simulcast director Sam Reichard said during the simulcast season, workers at the Downs see \$300,000 wagered a day, seven days a week. He said they only see \$65,000 during the live racing season, which is only held over four days

Anyone who asks Reichard what he does at the Downs will get the same answer. "A little bit of everything " When he started at the Downs, he was a ticket taker, he said Now he directs the simulcasting and is in charge of knowing everybody — so it would seem. He may not know their favorite color or what their family life is like, but he knows their track records

Reichard said business may not be exactly what it used to be but the Downs is still doing well.

"Yeah, the casinos are starting to affect our business," he said. "There are only so many gaming dollars to go around "

Yet he said he still believes people will be drawn to the track. Mostly because it's based on the sport of horse racing. He said there will always be gamblers And specifically, there will always be gamblers attracted to the



Township says its hands are tied for snow, ice removal

Not even frigid temperatures and ice-crusted landscapes were enough to soothe boiling hot tem peratures of some Northville Township residents last week

Chip Snider, Northville Town ship manager said township phones were ringing off the hook with residents angry about their subdivision streets not being plowed clear following two late nutumn snowstorms that blanket-

ed metro Detroit

Snider said residents are looking to the wrong place to help their headaches when they have such complaints though

"We don't have any control over the streets or highways," he said Because we are a township, we don t assess a millage for that kind of protection or service. The only way to be sure your streets are going to be cleared during big storms like the ones we had are to hue private contractors.

Snider said the only way the

township would offer such a service would be if residents or the board wanted to raise taxes to pay for it

We are not in the snow removal business," he said

Because of the community's township status, the majority of the responsibility on road clearing is doled to Wayne County

John Roach, spokesman for the county, said county snow removal equipment was being used in full force from early Dec 11, when the first major storm started.

For example, the county had 132 trucks out plowing in addition to 12 graders for almost 30 hours straight.

"Basically, everyone was working straight through the storm as close to humanly possible." he said

Roach said the first priority is to clear highways, such as Interstate Highway 275 or State Highway 14 The next priority is to clear "major roads" such as Six Mile Road and Seven Mile Road followed by bus routes.

"Once we get all of that done we start to move into more residential and secondary areas," Roach said.

The county started off good on Dec. 11, but then things took a turn for the worse, he said

"What hurt us this time was a major, major snowfall followed by another significant snowfall just as we got the first one cleared up," he said 'We were ready to move into some of those more residential areas but then that second snowfall came " The second heavy snowfall came just two days later



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

Bob Akers, another striking employee, said loyalty was the reason he wanted to let someone know about the fire.

"When we saw the black smoke and flames we almost wanted it to burn," he said. "But we've been here about 30 years so we called."

Thirteen workers at the foundry are on strike against proposed health care coverage and wage increases. Skeens said a skeleton crew of foremen and managers would have been working in the plant at the time of the fire.

A worker in the plant at the time of the fire who did not want to be identified said he didn't know the building had caught on fire because there wasn't a fire alarm and no one told him.

"All the sudden I seen people walking and running out," the worker said. "Then someone said the roof had caught fire "



Neil Staebler: gentleman, friend

Neil Staebler, the man who created the modern Michigan Democratic Party, died last week after a lifetime of distinguished public service.

He was a role model to me and a genuine hero to many of my generation. His engagement in politics helped create a political chmate in Michigan — civil, honest, citizen-based — that has lasted to this day.

Those with long memories will remember Staebler as "Mr. Democrat." Work-ing with Walter

trine of citizen participation, Staebler then built the Democratic Party into the powerhouse that elected Williams governor an unprecedented six straight times and spawned the likes of Senator Philip A. Hart and Congresswomen Martha Griffiths.

Staebler's argument was radical for the times. In order to win elections, a political party had to be honest and democratic.

Otherwise, the thousands of citizen volunteers necessary for an effective mass political organization simply would refuse to get involved.

Good citizenship, he argued, required everybody to get involved in the political process. Whether Republican or Democrat, he didn't care - just so long as people got

involved. It was Neil Staebler who convinced countless Michigan citizens that politics was not necessarily ugly or corrupt and that political involvement was the highest expression of citizenship.

I was lucky enough to see this process up close from my early childhood on. Neil Staebler and his wife, Burnette, were among my parents' closest friends. It was Neil Staebler who persuaded my rock-ribbed Republican businessman father to become a Democrat ---perhaps the most profound testimony to his gift of patient, stubborn persuasion.

In contrast to our era when political figures are one thing when on the public stage and entirely different in private, Staebler was identically the same at all times, whether at family dinners or at a Democratic convention. Thoughtful, rational, courteous, exquisitely well informed, endlessly patient to the point of doggedness. He could go on arguing a point literally all night. In fact, he once coauthored a whole book, "How To Argue With A Conservative."

More at home in the back rooms than on the bright stage, Staebler only ran for high office twice. When the Legislature and the courts couldn't get congressional redistricting right after the 1960 census, Staebler was elected in 1962 Congressman-at-large, representing all of Michigan in the U.S. House. He ran unsuccessfully for governor in 1964, largely to keep off the Democratic ticket a candidate he considered corrupt.

Staebler's contributions went far beyond Michigan. He had a hand in national politics in the days when party leaders actually knew the personal qualities of candidates contending for nomination to high office - something entirely lacking today, when nominations are bestowed largely through primary elections. He was one of the "wise men" of the Democratic Party, consulted by and listened to by a who's who of national political figures. He was an early member of the ppower@homecomm net

Staebler's argument was radical for the times: in order to win elections, a political party had to be honest and democratic. Otherwise, the thousands of volunteers needed would simply refuse to get involved.

National Election Commission and would have, I think, been disappointed at its ineffectiveness today.

Staebler's legacy is still with us today. Consider, for example, the contrast between the recent recount chaos in the Florida presidential election and the matter-of-fact and civilized way in which the recount between Diane Byrum and Mike Rogers took place in the Eighth Congressional District. Much of Michigan's clear, practical law governing recounts and civilized way of conducting them is the direct product of Staebler's work.

Those who knew Neil Staebler in his heyday cannot but feel a sense of loss at what he could have contributed help us through the aftermath of the presidential election fiasco.

As for myself, I count him among the tiny number of truly great men I have had the good fortune to meet. I'll miss him and his gift for civic virtue more than I can say

Russell to continue serving on council

The recipe for making Northville a better place to live wouldn't be complete if one of its main ingredients – Bob Russell – was missing.

From his membership in the Mill Race Stone Gang to his work to get Northville's waterwheel running to his role as chairman of the Northville Area Senior Citizen Advisory Council, Russell spends an enormous amount of time doing his part to make sure the community is a great place. Russell will be reappointed to serve the senior citizen council until 2003 at the Northville Township board of trustees meeting tonght.

The reason Russell spends so much of his time on different groups in the Northville area is simple, he said.

"I love Northville and if there's anything I can do to make it better, I'm going to do it," Russell said.

Russell, 81, has lived in the Highland Lakes subdivision of Northville Township since 1972. He moved to the community from northwest Detroit and retired from Ford Motor Co in 1977. He and his wife, Katherine, have three grown children.

"If you can believe it, Northville Township was considered the boonies back then," Russell said.

He is involved in several Northville area organizations For example, he is a member of his church choir at First Presbyterian Church, he volunteers at St. Mary Mercy Hospital

as a greeter as well as works on several other organizations close to home.

For example, he is a member of the Stone Gang at Northville's historic Mill Race Village. The organization is a group dedicated to maintaining the buildings in the village, which consists of several historical facilities that have been transplanted to it.

"The seed was planted when I worked as a tour guide at Greenfield Village in high school," Russell said "That's why I love Mill Race Village."

The village contains an old home, a church, and a blacksmith shop among other things. Russell said he's worked on all of the buildings at one time or another as a member of the Stone Gang.

"I'm no great repair person or anything like that," Russell said. "But I do what I can to help keep the small stuff up."

For example, Russell has helped put stone on the walls and a new roof on the blacksmith shop as well as helped paint porches and been part of bridge repair.

"The village is tremendously important to Northville," Russell said. "We have busloads of people who come here for tours I consider this the centerpiece for this whole area of the community."

Pat Schimmer, office manager of Mill Race, said Russell has assumed the role of overseeing the Stone Gang left by Fran Gazlay, who has retired

"Bob is very instrumental in keep-

ing the village going and alive," she said.

Russell was integral in another project in the same area – getting the waterwheel running on the old Ford Plant He started a committee in 1998 to raise funds and develop a plan to get the wheel running.

The wheel began operating late in 1999, but a mechanical problem has rendered the wheel motionless once more – for now.

"It was made to run and it should be running," Russell said. "It's like having a flat tire on a car. It's not complete."

The committee has raised more than \$13,000 in the project and is in the process of fixing it again.

"I hope to have it running by next summer," Russell said.

Another Northville organization Russell heavily involves himself in is the Northville Area Senior Citizen Advisory Council. He is chairman of the council, which acts as a haison between Northville seniors and the Northville Parks and Recreation Department. The department oversees the senior program.

Russell has been a member of the council for 15 years.

"It's a very important group because we coordinate the interest of all of the seniors and convey the information to the decision makers," Russell said.

For example, he said, the group currently is compiling a list of needs the seniors have for a senior citizen center Russell said the hope is the information will be considered if the decision is made to pursue a new senior citizen center.

"We're rolling on that and we're going to be ready with an answer when they ask," Russell said

Interurbans popular in Northville

Public transportation in Detroit came in many forms throughout the late 19th and early 20th centuries Among the most colorful was the electric interurban.

The interurban, or electric streetcar, was a combination of the earlier horsecar and modern technology.

The horsecar was a vehicle drawn by horses over tracks, popular during the Civil War. Horses were replaced by steam engines and later with electricity

More comfortable than the horsecar, more convenient than the railroad, the interurban sailed through Detroit and its environs for many years Gaming speeds of up to 60 mph, the interurban was a popular form of transportation that carried passengers as far as 75 miles from Detroit in many directions

After the Civil War ended in 1865, more people began to migrate to the cities. The Industrial Revolution that resulted from the war produced factory



away from the farms.

As more and more people began to move to the cities, the demand for fresh farm produce rose. The high efficient interurban lines provided an inexpensive and expedient way to ship farm goods to their urban destinations.

By the time the interurban came to Northville in 1898, Detroit was reportedly labeled the "interurban capital of America." More lines traveled out of Detroit than from any other city.

The electric streetcar was a phenomenal success and independent line owners rivaled for service. Soon, and Northvil two sep

promised hourly service to and from Plymouth, which connected with the cities of Wayne and Detroit at low rates.

Soon, however, the Detroit, Pike's Peak and Ann Arbor Railway offered a similar plan along a different route. This line also included the transportation of milk from farmers along with the passenger cars.

Instead of going with either line, however, Northville joined with Detroit and Plymouth in September 1898, to incorporate the Detroit, Plymouth and Northville Electric Railway Co. interurban finally made its debut in Northville in November of the same year, with a train arriving from Plymouth

Soon, a second line was added and interurban service in Northville was being handled by two separate companies

The Detroit United Railways consolidated all the various independent interuitor lines in 1901. Besides - providing efficient transportation, the interurban also ended up furnishing street lighting for a number of communties along the route, including Northville, Farmington and Plymouth.

The lines grew to encompass much of the state, enabling Novi and Northville residents to travel, via Farmington, as far as Toledo, Ohio or Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids.

The life of the interurban spanned almost four decades. By the 1920s, new modes of public transit, such as busses, which were far less expensive to run, had

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


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Northville home abounds with color and charm

Some rooms just look effortless. A well designed home often looks as though it naturally evolved through years of collecting However, in many cases, just the reverse is true, where a lot of careful planning creates a room that's woven together like a perfect tapestry

'What we try to do is to guide the client to what they like "Bossio said I m really trying to interpret what they want An important part of this is working with the client through interviews to determine what their likes dislikes and needs might be

Kathryn O Reilly says they used Bossio in their previous home, and were extremely pleased So, when the couple undertook a major renovation or rebuilding of the an 5 000 square loot structure, they contacted the designer immediately to start researching ideas for their new residence. Bossio set out to find unique and one of a kind items that would blend throughout the decor



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Garage sale buyer scores with a Victorian organ

Q. I recently purchased an antique reed organ at a garage sale and would like to learn more about it. The Beckwith Organ Company in Chicago manufactured it. It is made of solid oak and stands 88 inches tall by 55 inches wide. Although there are ivories missing from two keys, it plays and is in very nice condition.

I'm thinking of selling it and would like to know when it was manufactured, how many were produced and its value.

A The curvilinear applied carving, inlay with musical motif, fretwork below the key panels beveled center mirror and carpet-covered pump pedals are typical of late Victorian organs made around 1890 Pump or reed organs were extremely popular and were produced in large quantities. The market for Victorian organs can be limited due to their size and weight

Your organ would probably be worth about \$1 500 to \$2,500

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Q. This mark is on back of a dessert set of dishes that was given to my moth-er as a gift roughly 30 years ago by an antiques dealer. The set includes triangular shaped cups, saucers, dessert plates, sugar bowl,

cream pitcher and coffee pot. They are decorated with a rider on a horse playing polo. I'm interested in learning the origin and value of this set.

A Salem China Company located in Salem Ohio made your dessert set of dishes The company was established in 1898 and is in business today Tricorne, a three-sided shape. was introduced in the 1930s and The value of vour set would probably be about \$275 to \$350

Q. I have a dough tray that was brought to Iowa around 1856 by covered wagon from Pennsylvania. It appears to have been made of pine and maple. The upper portion is the original, but the legs don't show signs of being made in the 1800s. They seem to be in too good condition to be that old. Does it have any value?

A Dough trays are also known as dough boxes or troughs Many were made by Pennsylvania Germans of combined woods, usually maple and pine Dough was placed in the trough for rising The flat removable top was used for kneading It's not surprising the legs have been replaced they were often the first to go

Your early- to mid-1800s dough tray would probably be worth about \$800 to \$1,000.

Q. What can you tell me about a Steiff bull on wheels that I have? He is brown and light tan, has horns and is on metal wheels. There is a Steiff button on his ear. He is in good condition, but has a few worn spots.

A Stelff Company well-known as a maker of stuffed animals, was founded by Margaret Stellf She established her company in Grengen Germany. In the 1880s Her early toys were made of lelt and stuffed with lamb's wool Subsequent toys were made of plush. wool and velvet and also stuffed with lamb's wool or excelsion kapok, or felt scraps

In 1907 almost 1 million teddy bears were sold Steiff's button in ear' trademark was registered in 1904 and is still used today. The

early buttons that included the Steiff name

While Victorian organs were very popular in the late 19th century, the market for them can be limited due to their size and weight. This one is worth \$1,500-\$2,500
