Northville woman waits for nephew's release

The aunt of Senior Chief Petty Officer Nicholas Mellos learned of his imminent release from China early Wednesday morning and said she couldn't be happier.

"I'm thrilled." said Northville resident Christina Mellos, aunt of Nicholas Mellos. "It has been very busy around my house since the incident. I'm glad it's over."

The 24-member crew of the U.S. Navy's EP-3E surveillance plane

has been held in China since April 1. Mellos, 46 years old and a native of Ann Arbor, and the entire crew had been detained in China ever since the surveillance plane had a mid-air collision with a Chinese fighter jet and was forced to make an emergency landing on Hainan Island in the South China Sea. Christina Mellos said she did not expect a release until late this weekend, but is very glad to see it come before she thought it would.

Right now I'm just hoping and praying everything goes right, so they can have a safe return home." Mellos said. "I think the situation was handled very well by the Bush administration. It has worked out and Nicholas is coming home, so they obviously knew what they were doing."

The crew was released Wednesday after China and the U. S. reached a deal early on Wednesday for the release of the EP-3E crew. The White House said the deal came after the U.S. sent China a

Cops search for robbery holdup man

Threatening violence against a teller, an man who may have been armed made away with \$2.000 Monday from a Northville Town-ship Standard Federal Bank.

Witnesses said the man wore baggy pants, possibly Guessbrand jeans. They described the man as being well-dressed and well-groomed. According to witnesses, the suspect may have been right-handed.

entered the bank at approximately p.m. and stood at the transaction table for a moment writing on a bank slip. The suspect then presented the bank slip to the teller, which stated on it "100's, 50's, 20's as well as having an account number on it. The teller proceeded to explain to the suspect that the slip needed a signature on it.

The suspect then told the teller, You don't understand. Give me your money. All of it." He then repeated his statement as he put his hand inside his jacket and then said. Don't make me take this out." According to Sumner, threatening the teller as well as

The armed robbery suspect implying that he had a weapon turned the robbery into an armed one as well as a crime against a person.


Ask long-time residents of Northville, and they'll say Northville isn't the town it once was.







Ten Northville Public Schools students have been declared state level winners in Reflections, a nationally PTA sponsored program.

Northville Council Reflections chairperson Susan Brattma said the Reflections program is more than 30 years old.

All entries for this year were based on the theme "It Would Be Really Strange If..."

In the literature division, students could enter pieces of prose, poetry or even a short story.

For music entries, students had to create their own original music composition and submit it on a tape or CD. For grades six through 12, students were required to include sheet music with the musical notations on it.

In the photography category, students were allowed to submit a photograph of any size.

Brattina said the work must be created entirely by the student. Students began submitting materials into their school during the fall and winter of 2000.

on to the state level of judging. Judging for the state entries was conducted in mid-January and February. A total of 7.808 entries were submitted statewide. Out of those entries. 1.640 were forwarded to the state level for additional judging. Ultimately. 94 students were chosen as the state winners across the four categories. Ten were from Northville.

"I was really pleased with the work," said Brattina. "I knew we had the talent. We just had to get the kids to enter."

Brattina said there were a total

of 16 students from Michigan whose entries were forwarded to national level of judging in Chicago. Three of those 16 students were from Northville. The final decisions for the national competition will be made during mid-April.

"It's just amazing to see the entries that come in," she said.







The database provides mostly full-text articles from magazines, newspapers, pamphlets and reference books.

Mannisto said the two online sources are designed specifically for students in grades kindergarten through ninth grade. Both offer full-text articles from magazines, newspapers and reference sources. The online program also allows an individual access to search the library catalog to request titles, check one's library record and renew items.

"Not only does the library offer remote access, but we also provide seven computers for free access to the Internet. We also have trained librarians who can assist persons in searching the Web or other information sources for the best information to fit their needs and we offer free classes each week to help those wanting to learn more about using the Internet or email," Mannisto said. |Planners OK Belanger II development on Gerald Ave.

The Northville Township planning commission has approved the preliminary site plan for a new Belanger industrial inc. building that would be built on Gerald Avenue.

The preliminary plan involves the construction of a 23,015 square-foot office/industrial building, as well as its associated parking and storm water detention facilities. According to Lee Belanger, the Gerald Avenue location would be the new home of their sandpaper operation. Belanger said because of the lease arrangement at their current sandpaper operation, it was necessary to move the operation out of their downtown Northville location to a new building by the end of the year. It was the company's desire to have the two locations near each other. Belanger

The proposed Gerald Avenue location would be set on two parcels which covers 1.8 acres. The actual industrial building would be 22,500 square feet. It would be positioned just north of Sinelli Cement Company and the east property line would abut the Highland Lakes condominiums. One of the parcels, which the building will be built on, will be demolished.

Belanger Inc. is a privately-owned family business that has been operating in the Northville. Northville Township and Novi areas since 1968. The

sold worldwide and sandpaper products that are sold throughout North America, employs 250 people at six locations. According to Belanger, the employee base has never exceeded 40 people at their current sandpaper facility and the factory maintains a consistent 40-hour work week. Belanger said the shipping department will unload or load an average of 15 times per week.

The preliminary plan had two requested variances to the township ordinance to allow a 50 foot rear setback from the adjacent residential zoning district. False Bullard story pulled from Web

A Hamburg Township man has removed from the Internet transcripts of an interview after State Sen. Bill Bullard, R-Highland Township, proclaimed the document to be a hoax.

Bullard, supposedly the subject of the interview, said the questionand-answer session never occurred.

David Fitch, Hamburg resident and administrator of www.PoliticalThoughts.com, would neither confirm nor deny the accuracy of interviews posted on the website when contacted by telephone Monday. He said that he'd received the supposed Bullard interview by email from another user of the "GM Intranet" or "Truck and Bus" and had simply "cleaned it up" before posting it on the site.

Asked if he had an obligation to check the accuracy of interviews posted there. Fitch said that "that's insignificant.

Bullard's staff asked Fitch Monday. April 9. to remove the transcript from the website. Tuesday, April 10. it and two other questionable interviews were gone from the

"As a public official. I have limited recourse against lies and falsehood," Bullard said. "Now with the Internet, lies and falsehood can be spread more widely. ... I guess I'm going to have to trust in the public. trust that they will not take as true things that are clearly ridiculous

and that I would not possibly have

Although his office asked the interviews be removed, Bullard said he doubts there is any further recourse he can take.

"I could file a lawsuit, but under New York Times vs. Sullivan. I would have to prove it was published with malice or in reckless disregard for the truth. I would have to pay attorney fees. I could probably shut him down, but how many people would read and believe it in the meantime."

Fitch said he would have the name of the person who emailed it to him in his email logs, but did not feel it necessary to look the name up.

The interview, supposedly done by the "Freep's John Simon" with Bullard was on the topic of mandatory seatbelt use and a recent bill making a violation a primary offense and adding two point to a driver's record.

The Detroit Free Press is often referred to as the Freep, and it uses the term on its own website. But Free Press editor John X. Miller says there is no reporter at the newspaper named John Simon.

In the supposed interview. Bullard was quoted as saying. With advice from the insurance lobby, the bill was drafted so as to be innocuous at first. The first amendment was to make violation of this act a primary offense, the second amendment is now in front of us ... The facts of life are this: The insurance industry is one of the biggest lobbies in the State of

Michigan. Campaign contributions from the insurance lobby far outweigh those of people. While it is true that it is the people who actually vote us into office, it is the insurance monies that pay for the exposure that candidates need."

The senator denies making such comments.

Fitch, who said he is typically apolitical," objects to Bullard's bill adding points to drivers' licenses.

"Ask him how many constituents asked him to make this a primary offense," Fitch said. "Ask him how many letters he has from constituents asking to have two points added to their license when they get a ticket for this.

The impetus for the bill came from the National Safe Kids Campaign, according to Bullard aide John Wozniak. The national activist group recently gave Michigan, along with several other states, failing grades for safety of children due to light penalties for failure to wear a seatbelt. Parents who do not buckle may themselves can be throw about in an accident,

even if the children are buckled. It has also been noted that kids tend to imitate their parents, including whether or not they wear seatbelts.

Two other interviews posted on PoliticalThoughts.com were also removed Tuesday. One purported to be a transcript of a Talk of the Nation show in which Congressman Bob Barr. R-Georgia, was questioned about medical marijuana. Barr's office said the interview was "entirely bogus."

Another transcript was supposedly from a Talk of the Nation show in which C. Fay of the Drug Free America Foundation: E. Voth of the Institute on Global Drug Policy: and J. Bronson of the Institute of Social Research were interviewed together by "J. Williams."

Tracy Terry, spokesperson for National Public Radio, said Juan Williams did have Calvina Fay on a recent Talk of the Nation show, but never had a show with the three appearing together. Archives show Eric Voth was interviewed in 1998, but there is no record of a Bronson appearing on the talk show.





Sumner said if any persons or businesses are concerned about the potential for a crime against them they should contact township police officer Joseph Hetu. Hetu is the crime prevention resource for the community. He can give prevention suggestions and ideas to interested residents or businesses.

*We thoroughly investigate all crimes, if its either against property, such as a vehicle that was broken into or against people, such as a sexual assault." Sumner said. *However, in a case such as this when a suspect threatens violence we will aggressively investigate it because there is the potential for the suspect to commit violence in

The evening allows the center's residents and day clients to have proper access and be able to take advantage of the opportunities and services offered at the center.

The fundraiser dinner and dance will be held on April 28 at the Laurel Manor at 39000 Schoolcraft Road in Livonia.

"Susie's dinner dance is very important to our center," said Sister Linda Willette, the administrator at Our Lady of Providence. "All the proceeds go toward our programs here. This is our major fundraiser."

Our Lady of Providence Center is located at 16115 Beck Road in Northville Township. According to Willette, the center provides residential, educational and vocational opportunities for mentally impaired children and young adults featuring both residential and day programs aimed at the development of the whole person. The center was established in 1957 as a private, nonprofit organization owned and operated by the Daughters of St. Mary of Providence, which is a international congregation of religious sisters.

"The dinner dance began in 1957 and Susie was one of our first residents." Willette said. "Her father was a big band leader and he started the dance. Susie represents all of the persons involved in our programs."

The dinner dance is set to begin at 5:30 p.m. with hors d'oevres and an open bar. At 6:15 there will be a musical performance by some of the center's residents and dinner and dancing will proceed the performance. The auction and rasse will close

"The fundraiser involves a combined auction and raffle as well as a cash raffle." Willette said. "We are also raffling off 1,000 tickets at \$50 each for a 2001 Ford Taurus SES."

Items such as a Steve Yzerman Red Wings jersey, autographed Detroit Lions football, vacation trips, jewelry and paintings will be raffled and auctioned off. The vacation trips include a week at the 2001 Seniors Golf Player's Championship, two nights at the Grand Hotel on Mackinae Island and a stay at the Kimberly Country Estates Bed and Breakfast. The top prize in the cash raffle will be \$1,000. Willette said 33 percent of the budget is made up by community and private donations, the remainder of the budget is made up by support from agency contracts and family contributions.

Willette said 70 percent of the residents receive \$1,100 a month through such programs a social security and some are eligible for food stamps, but the total cost to provide adequate living care and services for each resident is about \$3,200 a month. The annual dinner and dance helps provide funding for the costs not covered by the residents' income. There are 65 residents living at the Beck Road campus and an additional group of six living at a group home on Seven Mile Road.

There are four sponsorship opportunities available and are listed in the categories of bronze. silver, gold and platinum. This year's bronze sponsors include RBF Business forms, Our Lady of Good Counsel. Community Bank of Dearborn. Gary and Peggy Schwass, Michael and Brenda Polselli and K of C. Fr. Victor J. Renaud. The Russell family is a gold sponsor. A bronze sponsor donates \$1,000 and a gold offers \$10,000. each sponsor receives a recognition plaque.

The center provides a variety of living options that ensure 24-hour care, support and supervision. According to Willette, the apartment-like living arrangements provide semi-private bedrooms, with living and recreation rooms as well as dining areas to meet their social needs. Prevocational, vocational training and supportive employment programs are available to both residents and day clients from the community.

"Our job training programs gives our residents and day clients a boost in self-esteem." Willette said. "It makes them feel important to be a part of the local workforce."





Northville faith looks to relocate

Holy Ascension Eastern Catholic has eye on M-14 / Salem location

An age-old religion wants to build a brand-new church in Salem Township.

The Holy Ascension Eastern Catholic Church has no building of its own and wants to correct that problem by building one on 35 acres of property it purchased near M-14 and Napier Road. The group currently holds services at the Our Lady of Providence building at 16115 Beck Road, between Five and Six Mile roads in Northville, said Sandra Desjarlais of the church's Membership Committee. About 150 to 175 parishioners belong to the group.

'We will build the 'social hall' phase of the construction first. with room enough to cater to close to 1.000 people." Desjarlais said.

The new church would have 500 parking spaces.

An estimate for building the hall is \$1.5 million, while the church itself might cost \$3 million to \$5

People sometimes refer to the Eastern Catholic Church as the

Byzantine Catholic Church.
The history of the church is as old as the Byzantine Empire." Desjarlais said. "Our traditions are Eastern as opposed to Western. Most people are Roman Catholics and are familiar with

"We try to offer an opportunity to worship that speaks to every-body," she said. "it's a message for everybody. We try to make people more aware of the Eastern Church and try to bridge the gap between the Eastern and Western churches. That's one of Father (Wayne) Ruchgy's main goals, and to offer a different and unique way of wor-

A lot of Holy Ascension's mem-bership has shifted out to the Western suburbs, which is one of the reasons the group wants to move to Salem Township.

"It's hard to build membership when you don't have a building. Desjarlais said.

The group will reveal its dream of a new building at its first Founders Dinner on April 22, she said. An artist's full-color rendering of the church will be revealed

at the event, and Father Wayne Ruchgy will present his ideas for the future of Holy Ascension.

The dinner will be the church's major fund-raiser for the year. Other fund-raisers will include a summer picnic, fall golf outing and Mardi Gras Party in February. Investment opportunities also

will be described.

The public will be able to buy promissory notes ranging from \$1,000 to \$50,000 with "an appealing rate of interest," Desjarlais said.

In addition, the church wants to sell seven one-acre lots fronting on Napier Road for homes to be

The 35 acres the church owns has wetlands on it. which it will preserve.

"We want to keep it (the land) as beautiful as it is." she said. "It's a really nice piece of land. It's right off the freeway. Desjarlais said the plans are

preliminary, since the group hasn't approached Salem Township officials with its ideas. Desjarlais said the church will present its plans to the township as soon as

the land is tested and the surveying is done.

Father Ruchgy also is the priest at the Ukrainian Catholic Church of Dearborn. He will continue to serve there after the new church is built in Salem.

in the Oakland County section. Word said.

'We didn't hit the average increase we would have liked and I hope this does not affect our state shared revenue. However, it's to early to tell." Northville mayor Chris Johnson said. "In regard to our Wayne County side increasing more than our Oakland County side, I'm not really sure why at this point, but it may be due to family size because there was no housing loss in Oakland County."

For Northville Township's part. township manager Chip Snider said vast commercial and residential development over the last 10 years was the source of the township's growth spurt.

After viewing the population figures. McCotter said the new census data will provide a valuable tool to help government better target services to meet the needs of residents.

The figures stated that Wayne County's numbers decreased by 2.4 percent from 2.111,687 to 2.061.162 with a population change of 50.252 residents. The city of Livonia had 0.3 percent population decrease from 100,850 to 100,545. Plymouth city had a 5.6 percent decrease while the

township had 17.5 percent increase in the same period.

"The main concern with the increase in the 1990's is how we can meet the additional service needs of township residents. Snider said. "Pertaining to our public safety services the main concern is response time. With the increase of residential needs there will also come an increase in our fire and police departments receiving multiple calls, that could happen at the same time. To meet these needs we have already increased and in the future when seems fitting will increase our force power even further to be able

Northville law firm wins big condo case

Fausone, Taylor and Bohn, LLP of Northville represented the Plymouth Pointe Condominium Association in its winning lawsuit against Del-

Delcor Homes, an Oakland County developer with projects in Washtenaw, Oakland and Livingston Counties, has been ordered to pay more than \$2.4 million for construction defects and violation of the Michigan Consumer protection Act. The Association was represented by Thomas F. Campbell and Michael M. McNamara of Northville during the jury trial before Judge Daphne Means Curtis in Wayne County Circuit Court. Delcor was ordered to pay \$2.16 million for breach of its warranty to the association and an additional \$280,000. Delcor must also pay the attorneys' fees and costs to the Association.

According to McNamara, this may be the largest judgment of its kind in Michigan.

Delcor was saying that any problems that developed after a year weren't covered by the warranty. We argued that the fact that the

defects were hidden was Delcor's problem, not the residents' problems, and the judge agreed."

Campbell said. The jury awarded damages based upon construction defects in the roofs, driveways, porches, steps, plers, fences, drainage, garage floors

The Association consists of the owners of the 144 units at the Plymouth Pointe condominium complex at North Territorial and Ridge Roads in Plymouth Township. The \$18 million development was built in three phases between 1993 and 1995.

The Association spent nearly \$200,000 for urgent repairs and additional maintenance prior to filing the lawsuit in late 1999. According to McNamara, defects included leaking roofs on all six buildings, crumbling masonry and loose bricks, inadequate footings for porches, fence posts and decorative piers as well as sagging driveway pavement. McNamara said some homeowners had roof leaks within a month after moving into their homes.

According to McNamara, the homeowners were given a one-year limited warranty when they bought their condos from Delcor. Some

repairs were made during the year, but Delcor did not acknowledge or correct the construction defects that were hidden from view.

The plaintiffs provided evidence that Delcor knew about some of the construction defects. vet in a Disclosure Statement given to the homeowners Delcor said it was unaware of any violations of applicable codes with respect to the construction at Plymouth Point Condos. Campbell said that was a deceptive trade practice and is prohibited by the Michigan Consumer Protection Act.

McNamara said that many of the plaintiffs purchased their newly-built condos because they wanted to live in a home that would have

minimal maintenance.

They were misled by a warranty that didn't provide protection against the numerous hidden defects," McNamara said. This case was about keeping your promises. That's what a warranty is — a promise."



■ Concerns aplenty in cell tower story

As the owner of the Northville Road property where the Sprint Spectrum tower will be located. I'd like to both clear up and point out some considerations that the officials of Northville Township. Sprint, and myself as the property owner addressed as part of the approval of the tower located between our building and McDonald Truck Rental. All along. Northville Township was con-

cerned about the impact on residential property owners adjacent to the site. I know this, as my residence was also adjacent. I talked to my neighbors about it, and they were all notified. The family featured in the article lives in one of the few houses that are contained within a commercial area. I believe that they have a non-conforming, but grandfathered use of their property as it is zoned. It is entirely understandable how they may have been overlooked in the notification process since so few homes are impacted and they are contained in this commercial zoned area.

The township planner and planning committee, as part of the approval, has required over \$20,000 worth of landscape improvements to the property, some of which are hundreds of feet away from the tower site. This does not include all the improvements, landscaping, etc. that are being required immediately adjacent to the tower.

All along they were concerned with the ability to co-locate other carriers on the tower, to minimize the need for the construction of additional towers in the area. You can't put a number of carriers on a short tower. Would we rather have three 80-foot towers or one 100-foot tower? The fact that other carriers will be locating their equipment should answer the concerns of others over the "interference" to their particular cell phone carrier. As far as the railroad communication, these towers are located alongside railroad tracks all over, if there were any problems they would be known by now.

All along my desire has been to minimize the impact on the site, yet still be able to receive some income to help offset the tremendous costs of operating 80year-old industrial building with historical significance. If the Hollises believe there is an impact with the cell tower, how would they feel if I developed the property and placed a 40,000 square foot industrial building on the site, with the removal, rather than addition, of a number of trees as a result? Or a mini-storage facility? These are just a couple of examples of the uses that would be permitted with the zoning, which I'm sure most would agree would be a more intensive use of the property. The planning commission is aware of these alternative uses and, I would think, certainly willing to work with an owner for a less intensive use while still allowing some income from the property, which benefits the surrounding property owners

at the same time. As a business property owner and resident of Northville Township. I also pay taxes, not only on the land and building but on all personal property such as furniture, my phones, computers, and other equipment located here as well. Sprint will be paying personal property taxes on any equipment located here. I'm sure they will be significant. This industrial and commercial tax base is valuable, as residential property taxes alone are usually not enough to support the services at the level we enjoy here, and they provide signifi-cant revenue to the schools without placing any demands by increased enrollment.

• The local rate of inflation is expected to drop from 3.6 percent in 2000 to 3 percent for

So, you may ask, are we in a recession? It's a near thing, as a recession is usually classified as two quarters of what the economists call "negative economic growth."

The folks at RSQE say the loss of 30,000 jobs in Michigan is "sufficiently modest to avoid being classified as a recession."

Certainly, the RSQE forecast contains real grounds for hope, assuming one gets through this year. In 2002, employment should be picking up in the automobile industry and in construction. Wages and the number of hours worked in a week should be increasing, and so, too, should personal income. The threat of inflation should remain low, and there is a real chance that interest will come down another half point or so.

I talked to Joan Crary, one of the smarter economists around, who is largely responsible for the Michigan forecast. I asked her what advice she had for the ordinary person reading this column.

letter expressing regret for the forced landing. The negotiated statement used the words "very sorry" that the plane had to land on Hainan Island, which is in Chinese territory. However, the letter did not give the full apology demanded by China. China wanted the U.S. to take full responsibility for the incident.

The official Xinhua News Agency of China quoted the letter as saying. *please convey to the Chinese people and to the family of pilot Wang Wei that we are very sorry for their loss," and that Washington is "very sorry the entering of China's airspace and landing did not have verbal clearance."

Chinese Foreign Minister Tang Jiaxuan said the crew would be released as soon as "appropriate travel procedures" were completed. Jiaxuan delivered a statement on Chinese television and radio saying they are releasing the crew because of humanitarian reasons. Jiaxuan said that China puts great importance in its relations with the United States.

Trying to understand political jargon and statements used to make a difficult situation sound more comprehensible can cause some to turn their ears off and look the other way. This column comes in the wake of a similar one written by Novi News staffer Randal The issue came

which is part of Communist China. I referred to the plane as a spy plane in the beginning of the story and I received a call from a man who had served in the Navy as well as on that specific type of reconnaissance plane, which he termed it. The questions I have for each person terming the downed plane as an "air vehicle" meant for surveillance or reconnaissance are: is that what China would call the plane, and what does "surveillance" mean?

For people serving in the military, those terms are just fine, but for my perspective, I think the terms boil down to something pretty basic. No matter how you term it, the U. S. spies on or watches other countries constantly, sometimes for good reason. I've heard many military and government representatives say the mission was routine and that the plane was in international airspace. I don't doubt these two statements, but what bothers me is when these representatives attempt to sound as if they're in control and the situation is no big deal, when in fact they are probably screaming and pulling their hair out behind these scenes because the Chinese government is not complying by releasing our 24 servicemen and women.

They are not complying because they are probably sick of us spying on them. Let's think about it for a moment. Our Navy is flying missions in international waters to keep an eye on what China is doing. They are keeping an eye on what military developments China has been employing on the coast near Taiwan. No big deal — the U.S. wants Taiwan to remain democratic and China does not want Taiwan to declare independence.

Our government has maintained the idea of one China, meaning Taiwan should not declare independence, but China is communist and Taiwan is not. In turn, our government supplies Taiwan with weapons and military hardware to combat a potential attack from the mainland. This is where our "surveillance" comes in.

Let's make it clear. In no way am I supporting China. However, I believe that sometimes our government believes we are ignorant and can be fed the usual jargon to calm our fears and concerns, as well as keeping us in the dark about the truth of our actions overseas, which has an effect on many people including us in Northville.

I'm not personally afraid of a possible conflict with China over this incident, but I'm confused and fearful on how our government keeps us in the dark with words and statements many of us don't truly understand. Am I asking our government to stop using these terms? No. However, it would be nice if our society wasn't always about covering our own behinds all the time.

At the local level, I covered a story that involved a Northville family angered about the lack of information Northville Township did not supply residents being directly affected by a cellular tower to be placed near their home. In the story, the family went to a planning commission meeting to get information, only to see their questions responded with answers that involved legal procedure and replies that — in short — came down to meaning "ask someone else."

I believe U. S. citizens, as well as Northville residents, want the truth and nothing but it. None of this beating around the bush with words and answers that will only confuse people even more.

A line from a famous Rob Reiner film comes to mind when I think of what our government officials would think of this column: "You can't handle the truth."

I think we can, because we pay your salary. NOTE: Thirty minutes after writing this column. Northville township manager Chip Snider gave me a call informing me that a public meeting will be held before Easter to resolve the questions and concerns residents may have with the cell tower being placed at the old Ford Plant. That's tax dollars at work and it is also a responsible official concerned about the needs of the residents.

In short the professors, who will swear on a stack of copies of Darwin's book that they are without a trace of anti-God prejudice, think that only an ignorant bumpkin could possibly believe anything so ridiculous as that life is the product of an intelligent creator. At the same time, they are worried sick about the possibility that people might learn enough about the evidence to draw their own conclusions.

When President Clinton announced the sequencing of the human genome at a press conference in June, 2000, he said that Today, we are learning the language in which God created life. we are gaining ever more awe for the complexity, the beauty, the wonder of God's most divine and sacred gift." Dr. Francis S. Collins. Director of the government's Human Genome Project, used similar words, saying that "It is hum-bling for me and awe-inspiring to realize that we have caught the first glimpse of our own instruction book, previously known only

There are good scientific reasons for thinking that Clinton and Collins were right. Biological cells are irreducibly complex, meaning that they are full of complex parts that all have to be present at once before any one part does anything useful. Even Richard Dawkins, the world's most prominent Darwinist, admits that to coordinate the cell's complex activities requires "a digitally coded database larger, in information content, that all 30 volumes of the Encylopedia Brittanica ... And this figure is for each cell, not all the cells of the body put together."

Natural selection has never been shown to be capable of writing even one sentence of that encyclopedia, or of creating one new organ like an eye, a kidney, or a brain.
The Darwinian picture of gradual, step-by-step progressive change doesn't fit the fossil record either. The reason biologists insist that natural selection has fantastic (but never demonstrated) creative power is that they believe on faith that nature has to have done all the creating, without any assistance from God. That being the case, the least implausible naturalistic mechanism they can imagine wins by default. Biology professors believe in Darwinism not because of what they observe as biologists. but in spite of it. They believe because naturalism - the view that nature is all there is and therefore had to do its own creating — is the sacred cow of their community of faith.

The Darwinists are determined not to allow a fair discussion of the evidence in the classroom, and with media support they probably can keep the public sufficiently confused and intimidated to get their way for now. But when scientists resort to dogmatism and censorship, science doesn't come out a winner. And the number of people who know that Darwinism is a house of cards will grow larger every year.

You can look mah-velous with the right kind of shirt

*Costly thy habit as the purse can buy,but not express'd in fancy: rich, not gaudy: For the apparel oft proclaims the man." – Hamlet. Act I. Scene III

When talking with a gentleman face-to-face or when watching television, especially in close-up shots, lean't help noticing men's shirt collars. It is, after all, the article of apparel that is closest to the face. Quite often they are rumpled, wrinkled, curled up or the wrong color with the tie.

So gentlemen, continuing my articles on how to look your super best, let me give you a few tips on

selecting a dress shirt: · A fine quality shirt is 100 percent cotton. It may cost a bit more but it is clothing that is next to the body almost like a second skin. It has a look of luxury and is the shirting fabric choice of the

well-dressed man. Buy a shirt and tie at the same time. All colors have different shades and tones which do not always blend well together. It Margit **Erickson** Etiquette

is easier to match colors when

you have both in hand than to try and remember colors hanging in your closet. For variety, choose two ties while you're at it.

· Even though all the solid colors in shirts today are acceptable, white is still the color of choice for dress. However, light blue, cream. ivory or light gray are also good choices along with pinpoint stripes.

· Just as in necklines for women, men need to choose the right collar style to balance the shape of the face. For a long narrow face, choose a collar that is

more rounded. If your face tends to be more full, a longer more pointed collar is best. It is estimated that some 75 percent of men wear collars that are too tight. This causes the flesh to overhang on the collar which is unsightly. To determine correct size: Encircle your neck just ... under the Adam's apple with a tape measure, then insert one finger inside the tape. You must remember that as you age. pounds add on and even a's Inch around the neck makes a difference. Choose a larger size - you will not only look better but be

more comfortable. The shirt collar in the back should be one-half inch above the collar of the jacket. In the front, a good collar forms an upside down V with the edges of the collar meeting at the throat. No space should be left between the edges. Also, the shirt should not show above the knot in the tie.

· There should be a stitching around the edges of the collar to hold the material in place and to give it some stiffening. If there is no stitching on a dress shirt collar, do not buy it. And speaking of stiffening, all shirt collars need at least a mild starch for a crisp. smooth effect. It does away with the limp look and improves your appearance 100 percent.

The straight point is the most popular and versatile of all shirt collars. Be sure that the points of any collar touch the shirt when your tie is knotted.

 A good quality shirt has a long tail and should be long enough to meet between the legs usually 7 Inches to 9 inches below the top of the trousers.

• There should be a gauntlet button - a button sewn halfway up the sleeve opening. Buttons should be mother-of-pearl and sewn on with cross stitches, not two parallel rows. If there are two closing buttons on the cuff. choose which fits you best and cut the other off.

· What about short-sleeved shirts? You will never catch a successful executive (male or

female) wearing one to the office. Why? Because when you wear one you immediately lose your credibility and you are now taken seriously. As John Malloy states in his "Dress for Success" book: 'Never ever wear a short-sleeved

shirt to the office, unless you are in the short-sleeved shirt business." It is better to wear long sleeves and roll up the cuffs. if necessary.

· Lastly, if you want to monogram your shirt, you need to do it in a subtle, discreet manner. Initials should be in a straight line with your first, middle, and last initials in a row using either black, navy or medium blue thread. They are properly worn in only two places: First, believe it or not, a few inches above the belt on the left side, or on the upper part of the pocket. Any place else on the shirt is considered too showy. (I did say "discreet," didn't

CHANGE JOHN T. BERESFORD GRADE 11 - HOME SCHOOL

Change seems to be everywhere in life. It is evident everywhere we look. Our family just adopted a small puppy. and we're all still adapting to the

changes she has brought to our lives. The very ground where we stand today has seen many changes. The roads, homes, businesses and parks that we take for granted today are youngsters compared to the setting in which this city first grew out of the wilderness.

Near my home there are ruins of an old mill on a branch of the Rouge River. When I was small, I loved to climb on the crumbling stone and watch the water rush by at my feet. It wasn't until recently that I wondered about the lives of people who walked this land years before I was born.

Change. That is something the city of

Detroit is well acquainted with.

Let's go back to the year 1701. The sun is setting. Campfires burn brightly on both sides of a great river. On the fertile land of the western shore, a pioneer settler hangs up the harness of his horse and enters a crude wooden cabin. He is from France, and he came to d'Etoit, the fort by the river, with a few dollars, some tools, a poor, struggling family, and the shirt on his back. He came here to carve a home out of the wilderness. Change was an intimate part of his life.

A mere mile away, a Chippewa clan settles in for the evening. Associated with the Potawatami and the Pokagon Indians, they are part of the vast Algonquin nation.

A woman with a baby strapped to her back strings out fish to dry, while her husband and brother enter camp from checking their traps.

They have, for many years, been friends with the French fur traders and have developed a treaty, which allows them to live peaceably with their neighbors at Fort Pontchartrain or Fort

This peace is a temporary one. Their land will change hands dozens of times. belonging first to the Indian, the French and the British, and back again. War will become a way of life for many of their descendants.

A hundred years from now, much of their land will be ceded to the Americans who will come to settle the Northwest Territory. They will be well acquainted with change.

The year is now 1807. An Ojibwa shaman leads an old horse over territory that used to be his people's hunting grounds. He wonders what has happened to the traps that used to line the river. Stopping for a sip of the clear water, a large trout jumps mid-stream. startling him out of his reverle. He notices a new mill built to grind the white man's corn. Cabins are interspersed in the distance.

He met this morning with some soldiers who want his people to move west. Although his lifestyle has allowed him to live somewhat apart from the usual rhythm, he has long been a healer for both Indian and white man. That will soon change. He knows in his heart he will never ride this way again. His job now is to restore peace and preserve the pride of his people. His prayer fills the

sky.
I cry for my people. I am trying to believe the promises of the white man. Where are we to go?"

The sound of his song travels downstream, where a Quaker man puts the finishing touches on a wall that conceals a door to a hidden compartment in his barn. The man and his family have recently arranged to harbor fugitive slaves from the South.

It is up to him to complete the carpentry work. Food and clothing will be provided by the sweat of his brow. They are to become agents on an invisible system soon to be called the Underground Railroad.

He knows what he is doing is against the law, but believes that in the changing circumstances of human nature, a man must sometimes follow a higher law. Like many other Quakers in the area, he believes that slavery is evil and . degrades not only Negroes, but white

people as well. Over 5,000 slaves will eventually cross over the river to Canada and free-

Change. The Potawatami and the Chippewa knew it well. So did the pioneer, the fur trader, and

Hidden away among the turn of the century homes refurbished into mortgage companies and law offices long East Main Street, is the pearl of Northville art scene: McGuire's Fine Art Gallery.

Proprietor William McGuire, who has been a private art dealing in Northville for the past 20 years, has accumulated an enormous amount of art spanning generations and including many noted Detroit area artists.

The gallery, located at 341 East Main Street, has paintings from Robert Hopkin. Dutch painter C.C. Swan, Hungarianborn Pal Fried, Michigan artist Roy Gamble, New Yorkers Douglas Arthur Tweed and Ernest Harrison Barnes in residence. Many of the artists have works that hang in some of the great museums of castern United State including Boston. Detroit and New York.

Unlike many of the modernistic art galleries that are scattered across Oakland and Wayne Counties. McGuire has many of the works by artists that worked in the late 19th Century and early 20th Century.

McGuire, a graduate of MacKenzie High School in Detroit, has been long been a afficionado of fine art, especially artists that set up shop in the metro Detroit area.

"I took painting lessons as a kid, and could copy pretty good, but then got into collecting." McGuire said. "There are a few paintings in this building that I bought while I was in high school. I took art classes at Cass

Tech High School."
"Most collectors will become dealers to continue collecting," McGuire said, as sifted through the rows of paintings in his

upstairs office.

he said.
Another New Yorker who came to Detroit was Ernest Harrison Barnes, educated at Hillsdale College and became Professor of Art at the University of Michigan in 1915.


"Barnes painted in the Detroit area." McGuire said. "He did a painting of the Rose Cottage, the building Henry Ford brought to Greenfield Village."

McGuire also has paintings by Roy Gamble. Gamble, who studied at the Detroit Fine Arts Academy, then at the Art Student's League in New York and the Juian Academy in Paris. He earned a majority of his commission for works depicting the early history of Detroit. Gamble is said to have lived in Sylvan Lake area and is noted for doing paintings of children.

"If you were anybody in Detroit in the 1920's to the 1950's, you had to have your portrait done by Gamble." McGuire said. "He painted Ty Cobb, Mayor Cobo and James Couzens, among oth-

ors."
One of the more colorful characters of Detroit paint scene in the early part of the 20th century was Pal Fried (in Hungarian. Fried Pal"). Apparently, Fried was the typical starving artist and would often trade paintings for nourishment.

"I used to go Harold's Bar in Redford and there were a number of painting by Pal Fried." McGuire said. "Harold told me that when the bar was in Detroit, years ago, the artist used to eat and drink there and that is how he used to pay his bar bill. It's funny, because I just sold a Fried the other day."

Fried was, according to McGuire, a "painter of beautiful women" who painted many nudes, of which McGuire has a few in his upstairs hall.

"I have enough paintings by Pal Fried to have a special exhibit," McGuire said. "Just hang the whole gallery with Pal Fried paintings." But the man who McGuire calls his 'main guy', possibly because of his connections to Northville, was the Scottish Artist Robert Hopkin.

"He painted the sets for the Northville Opera house that was over on Center Street," McGuire said. "It used to be called Little's Opera House. It was torn down about 20 years ago. He did the interior decor, scenery and curtains in 1877."

Hopkin, who work was likened to that of the Impressionist by former Detroit Institute of Arts Chief Curator William Peck, tended to follow in the footsteps of the Hudson River School of artist painting sea and land-scapes

"He used to go over to Belle Isle and paint all the time." McGuire said. "He moved his family to Chicago just in time for the



Creative thinking begins at home

David Sanders thinks everyone deserves a custom home. As Architectural Designer and Marketing Director Of Paradigm Building Company his goal is to make each and every home fit the homeowner's lifestyle and it's property. For this, he uses a CAD or computer assisted design allowing for hands on rendering and illustration, so the homeowner can visualize their goal.

When you can visualize (the home) you can catch so many things you may not have noticed." Sanders said. "People don't realize how much flexibility they

have, or how creative they can be." Customers are able to see their plans on the computer screen on site during the planning process.

Paradigm uses three steps in home planning with each client, site selection, design and construction. For starters. Sanders personally walks each and every lot available for ideas.

In his mind, the lot dictates much of what the home should and could be. For example, will it accommodate a walk out? Where is the position of the sun? An eastern exposure would work great for a sunrise in the breakfast nook, or, a master suite with a western exposure to enjoy a sunset. In addition, he approaches the home design with an artist's

eye, being a graduate of the Center for Creative

Their model, the Oakmont, in San Marino Woods and Foldenauer Farms in Hartland is a perfect example of how Sanders blends form and function for practical, yet beautiful designs.

"I get people to be aware of things they might not consider." he said.

In the kitchen, small windows were installed between the counter and cupboard space, allowing more sunshine into the work area. Since many homeowners don't frequently use a formal dining area. one's not incorporated here. Instead, you'll find open space from the kitchen to a generous dining area. including lots of counter space. Sliding glass doors lead off the dining area to conveniently accommodate casual entertaining on the deck and barbecuing.


He thought of other details, such as with an angled wall near the door of the first floor master suite. Since the master suite is situated off the great room, he thinks of privacy. With the angled wall, the sleeping area is not immediately visible, until you walk completely through the doors. Built in shelves are customized once the homeowner is nearly ready to move in, so they've had time to consider how they might want them arranged. They can also be changed later, if desired. For a fun luxury item, he installed unique lighting into the cove ceiling over

the bed. Light passes through rolling water to create an undulating effect.

Sanders also thought long and hard about his use of space. The area over the garage is converted into 10 X 25 room for an office or playroom. An open stairway and windows give it a bright airy look to an otherwise dark space. An open stairway also leads to the lower level giving it the appearance of a living area as opposed to a "basement" look.

You can't talk about the Oakmont without recognizing the fun features built into the lower level. For the golf fanatic, he's incorporated a putting green right into the basement floor. This faces a sliding door to the outdoors. There's also a built in bar and a work out/exercise room. He took advantage of the darkest corner of the basement and installed a mini theater there, complete with large screen TV, and sleek black leather furnishings.

Pesticides 101-Part 1

A pesticide is a product that is designed to prevent, control or kill pests. Herbicides kill plants, fungicides kill fungi - in products like athlete's foot powder - and bacteria are killed with pesticides in antiblotic medicines. There are pesticides designed to kill rodents, insects, fish and other organisms.

Pesticides may be chemical or non-chemical. The microbial insecticide containing the bacterium. Bacillus thuringiensis (BT) is used to cause a flu-like disease that kills many insect species. Different strains are used to kill Colorado potato beetle, mosquito larvae and caterpillars that eat vegetable crops.

Virtually all pesticides are chemicals. It is the source of the chemical that many people are overly concerned with. Synthetic chemicals are man-made and can be identical or very similar to naturally occurring chemicals. Most natural chemicals need refining, purifying or concentrating before they can be useful. Organic pesticides are derived from plant or animal sources, while inorganic pesticides come from minerals.

All substances, including water. are poisonous at some level of dosage. Pesticides are designed to be poisons. Toxicity refers to a substance's ability to produce injury or death. Toxicity can be acute or chronic. Acute toxicity is poisoning resulting from a single exposure. Chronic toxicity is poisoning from repeated low doses over a prolonged period of time. Most chemicals have the ability to produce both acute and chronic toxicity.

The human body has the ability to filter out, or metabolize, many chemicals before they can build up to a poisonous level through repeated exposure. There is a lethal dose of caffeine in 200 cups of coffee, a lethal dose of ethanol in a fifth of bourbon and a lethal dose from aspirin in 100 pills. We are not killed by these doses, because the body can destroy the chemicals before they reach the toxic level.

Tests for toxicity are performed on laboratory animals. The dose that kills 50 percent of the animals is called the LD50 (lethal dose). If a large quantity of the chemical is required, the chemical has a low toxicity. Since the exposure to pesticides can be through contact, inhaling or swallowing, each chemical is tested for an oral LD50, a dermal LD50 and an inhalation LD50.

Pesticides are rated as high, moderate, low and very low toxicity. Highly toxic pesticides must have a skull and crossbones and the words "Danger - Poison" on the label. Moderately toxic chemicals must say "Warning." while low and very low



the word pesticide labels must say "keep out of reach of children.

The oral LD50 of a highly toxic chemical for a 150-pound person. ranges from a few drops to a teaspoon. A moderately toxic pesticide's oral LD50 is a teaspoon to 2 tablespoons. A low-level toxicity oral LD50 is 1 ounce to 2 pounds.

Toxicity alone does not measure the danger of a chemical. Exposure and toxicity together form a chemical's ability to be a hazard. A highly toxic chemical may present little hazard when the formula is in a very diluted concentration, or it is formulated to not be inhaled or absorbed through the skin, or it is applied so that contact is avoided.

The opposite is also true. A normally non-toxic chemical can be hazardous if it is used in a form that concentrates it or it is used in a way that allows contact with the skin or inhalation. Repeated doses of chemicals that break down slowly in the body or that are stored in the body may cause a hazard.

Although pesticides are designed to control pests, some exposure to non-pests is to be expected. Chronic exposure, such as with contaminated gloves, makes the body less able to handle acute exposures. Skin contamination is the most common exposure method. Its seriousness depends upon the dermal toxicity of the material, the size of the area contaminated, the length of time and rate of absorption.

Thin-skinned areas of the body, such as the lap, scalp, eyes and ears, absorb chemicals much faster than the hands.

Outdoors, chemicals can contaminate the environment during or after application. Some chemicals are rapidly biodegradable through contact with sunlight, water or microorganisms. Some chemicals do not breakdown rapidly and are called persistent. Some chemicals accumulate in living organisms, some do not.

Persistent chemicals do not always accumulate. Persistence is often desirable, since it offers long-term control of pests and fewer applications. It may not be desirable if it increases exposure to non-target organisms. A chemical can still be measurable at lower concentration levels than are effective for it to work.

IRS can turn you into an April fool

When it comes to responding to inquiries for the internal Revenue Service (IRS), your best offense is a clear understanding of the tax rules. To help you stay on the offensive and avoid becoming an April Fool this tax season, here are some tax tales from the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants.

The right research can lead to a tax credit. - You needn't make a major scientific breakthrough to claim the research and experimentation tax credit. That's what one company learned after the IRS initially denied it the credit. The company had developed and sold commercial accounting and tax return preparation software and claimed the research credit for its development cost. After taking the IRS to court, the tax court ruled in the company's favor, stating that the requirement is not that discovered knowledge be new to science. but that it be technological, new to the taxpayer and not freely available to the general public. (Tax and Accounting Software Corporation, DC N.D. OK., 2002-2 USTC 50,672)

Fishing for deductions can pay off. - The IRS is strict about tax rules pertaining to hobbies: Income from a hobby is taxable, but expenses are deductible only to the extent you have income. Any other money you lose from your hobby is considered nondeductible personal losses. However, if you can demonstrate that your hobby had a profit motive, it may qualify as a

business and enable you to deduct more of your expenses. Take the case of a recreation as bass fisherman who began promoting fishing tournaments. He incurred five years of losses that he deducted on his tax return. Claiming the fisherman was deducting hobby expenses. the IRS denied the deduction. However, the tax court ruled in the fisherman's favor viewing his work on tournaments as a business because he had clearly demonstrated a desire to produce a profit - and had the documentation to back it up. He kept detailed accounts and mailing lists and even consulted with outside professionals. What's more, his business turned a profit in the sixth year, further indicating that he had a profit motive. (Tommy W. Busbee, TC Memo 2000-82)

All Taxes are not created equal. - Married couples are generally liable for all the tax due on a joint return, regardless of how much each individual spouse earns. Similarly, should one spouse fail to report income subject to federal taxes. both spouses will be held liable for any taxes that are due. However, the same is not true when it comes to FICA (Social

Security and Medicare taxes). When tip income wasn't reported by one spouse who filed a joint return, an IRS agent considered holding the other spouse liable for unpaid FICA tax owed on it. However, the IRS issued a legal opinion to the contrary, stating that "joint and several liability, which make each spouse liable taxes. Because FICA tax is a separate liability of each wage earner, one spouse can't be tax. (IRS Legal Memorandum 20016018)

Don't be afraid to ask for a refund. - If you've been overzealous and overpaid you taxes, you can amend your original return and obtain a refund. Generally, you must file your claim for a credit or refund within three years after the date you filed your original return or within two years after the date you paid the tax. whichever is later. Keep in mind that a return filed before the due date is treated as filed on the due date (generally April

in one case, the IRS allowed a refund even though the taxpayer had originally defaulted on his taxes. The taxpayer didn't file a tax return and was sent a deficiency notice. At first

for all the tax due on a joint the individual failed to return, applies only to income respond, but then later paid the tax due. Soon after that, he died. His widow then learned that the notice had overstated held liable for the other's FICA the tax owed, so she asked for a refund. An IRS agent questioned the request because of the default on the notice. The IRS ruled that defaulting on a deficiency notice does not bar a taxpayer from later requesting a refund, but only from suing for a refund in tax court. (IRS Field Service Advisory - 1997-

> Errors can happen, both on the part of taxpayers and the IRS. If you want to avoid becoming an April fool when it comes to your taxes, CPAs advise that you double check the accuracy of your tax return. And if you're the recipient of and IRS notice, be sure that it is accurate and reply in a timely fashion.

Health Tip

Keep Your Skin Safe in the Sun

If you go out in the sun without protecting your skin, the sun's ultraviolet (UV) light can cause sunburn. Your risk of developing skin cancer can also increase. Here are some ways to avoid sun damage:

Use sunscreen generously. You should reapply sunscreen often, especially when exercising or swimming. Even waterproof sunscreen should be reapplied frequently. Use a sunscreen with an SPF (sun protection factor) of at least 15 even on a cloudy day. Please keep in mind that a higher SPF does not offer stronger protection from the sun's UV rays, just slightly longer protection.

Take time out from direct sunlight. Limit the amount of time you spend in the sun, especially between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., when damaging UV rays are the strongest. Keep in mind that the sun can be more powerful when it is reflected by water, snow, patio floors or concrete and at high altitudes.

Cover up. Wear a wide-brimmed hat and tightly woven, dark clothing that covers your neck, arms and legs. Choose sunglasses that block at least 99 percent of UVA and UVB rays.

Examine your skin regularly. Check your entire body for the warning signs of skin cancer. Note any moles, blemishes or birthmarks, Have a trusted friend help you check skin that you can't see, such as back or shoulder areas. See your doctor immediately if you notice a change in the size, shape or color of a mole or birthmark, or if a sore or blemish does not heal.

What is the Best Sleeping Position for Your Baby?

Many parents believe that putting their baby to sleep on his or her belly protects their child from choking on spit-up or vomit. Researchers have found, however, that sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) is much more common in belly-sleeping babies.

Now experts recommend that parents put their babies to sleep on their backs, not their stomachs, on a firm mattress free of fluffy blankets, pillows, sheepskins, stuffed toys or comforters. Although babies placed on their sides to sleep have a lower risk of SIDS than belly-sleepers, they can easily roll onto their bellies while asleep.

So do you need to worry about your baby choking while sleeping? Studies show that babies who sleep on their back aren't at risk of choking unless they have certain medical conditions. If you are unsure about the best sleeping position for your baby, talk to your baby's doctor.

Women: Protect Yourself Against Heart Disease

Heart disease is the number one killer of women, just as it is for men. A woman's risk starts to increase around the age of 55. The good news is that it is never too late to take steps to prevent coronary heart disease.

Stop smoking. Smokers are twice as likely to have a heart attack as nonsmokers. If you quit smoking, your risk immediately decreases and then gradually declines each year you remain smoke free.

Get moving. Being sedentary doubles your risk of heart disease. Regular aerobic and muscle-building exercise can help you reduce your risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, diabetes, cancer, obesity, anxiety and depression.
