

Interstate 275 will be covered with diamonds by winter.

Actually, on June 28, the State Transportation Commission approved a recommendation by the Michigan Department of Transportation to diamond-grind a five-mile stretch of I-275 in Oakland and Wayne counties. The section will be from Five Mile Road to Nine Mile Road. The diamond grinding project is intended to reduce the noise levels and has made at least one state representative happy.

"I could not be happier that the Department of Transportation has decided to act on the concerns of residents," state representative John Stewart, R-Plymouth said. "Many constituents have come to me express their frustration with the excessive noise levels on 275. Diamond grinding the road should make a significant improvement in the amount of noise area residents will hear."

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
Banner adds fuel to postal debate

The future of the Northville post office has one downtown business owner thinking about the parking problem.

On July 3, Ron Bodnar of Copy Boy Printers displayed a banner in front of his shop expressing his distaste for the time and money being put into attempting to keep the post office downtown by the city and Downtown Development Authority (DDA). He was later told by city manager Gary Word and building inspector/code enforcement Rick Starling to take down the banner or be issued a violation.

"This downtown is dying because of a lack of customer parking," Bodnar said. "The DDA is using our taxes to keep the post office here. Instead of utilizing as much as \$1.5 million of Northville

Central Business District (CBD) and resident tax monies to facilitate the expansion of the post office, the funds should be used to create new downtown parking."

Bodnar was told to take down his banner and proceed through the proper channels in order to get it approved for display. Northville city manager Gary Word said Bodnar was not supposed to have the sign up until he received approval from the city.

District outlines plan of attack if bond issue fails

On September 25, voters will head to the polls and decide the fate of the \$26 million dollar bond designed to improve many of Northville's school buildings.

However, what happens if residents reject this proposal?

"We're very confident that this issue is going to pass," said Jerry Rupley, treasurer of the Northville Board of Education. "If it doesn't, obviously it's going to impact our ability to deliver the quality of education that we think the children of Northville deserve."

Rupley said that if the bond fails, two things will be imminent for the district.

"It's going to mean larger class sizes, it's going to [mean] more use of portables," he said.

But Rupley feels confident that the majority of voters will favor the \$26 million dollar deal.

"We expect the bond issue to

pass. This community supports education. The need for these facilities is pretty clear. We've got a very good bond campaign committee," he said. "Ultimately it's going to pass."

The district is facing a space crunch due to rising numbers of students and school officials are awaiting the opportunity to make more room available. But that action will depend on the voters.

If the bond fails, Rupley said, "Whatever we would do would be an interim solution because these facilities are indeed needed. It

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What vacation? For a custodian, summer is work

Although school bells are not currently ringing, Donna Viel is hard at work making sure Northville's school buildings stay in top-notch condition.

Viel, a long-time resident of Northville and employee of the Northville School District, has made a career of serving and helping others around her.

She presently works in the central maintenance division for the district and supplies the schools with all of their cleaning supplies and equipment. In addition, Viel said she does snowplowing in the winter, mowing and indoor and outdoor maintenance on any building requested.

"Wherever they need us, we go," she said, adding that she began her duties in 1987.

Viel also said that although school is out of session for the summer, some of the buildings have programs and various activities taking place. Such activities include summer school programs, driver education courses and early childhood programs.

Viel said the summer months are a busy time for custodians and maintenance workers as they prepare the building for the hustle and bustle of returning students.

She also said the summer break allows a greater window of time to do all the needed maintenance work and repairs to the buildings.

"There's not enough time at Christmas or Easter to do a thorough job," she said. "This is our busy time. It's a real beehive of activity."

Viel also said she values the staff and co-workers that join her in her daily responsibilities.

"I really appreciate my co-workers," she said. "We're a pretty good group."

Viel said she is the only female worker in the maintenance department but shares a common team goal of making a safe and friendly environment for children to learn.

"We're working even harder," she said. "[We're] getting ready for the children."

Has she enjoyed her many years with the district?

"I can honestly say that I have," said Viel. "It's just amazing how fast time flies when you're having fun."

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Court mows down suits brought at rock concerts

Northville's Cellar Door let off the hook in state decision

Sod throwing may be seen as the immature rowdiness of the occasional rock-concert-goer, but two instances of it were recently reviewed by the state Supreme Court and made law for Michigan businesses.

In a 5-2 ruling issued Tuesday, June 26, the Michigan Supreme Court concluded that business owners are not responsible for criminal acts committed on their premises. Owners' only duty to protect patrons is to call the police, the Justices concluded.

That ruling was issued in two liability cases brought against the Pine Knob Music Theater in Clarkston over sod throwing incidents at a Danzig concert in 1994 and a Ramones concert in 1995. The first case also involved concert promoter Cellar Door Productions of Northville.

One plaintiff, a wheelchair user, was struck in the head and shoulders by sod while seated in the handicapped section of the theater. In the second, the plaintiff

broke her leg while trying to avoid being hit by flying sod.

In both cases, the concerts were stopped, the bands announced to the crowd that sod throwing must stop before it could continue, and some members of the audience were ejected.

In one case, the theater halted alcohol sales. In both cases, police were already present at the theater as a regular part of concert security.

Plaintiffs alleged the theater was negligent for failing to have enough trained guards on hand, failing to have those throwing sod arrested, and allowing the concert to continue. The Court of Appeals had agreed.

But the Supreme Court concluded that businesses can't be expected to anticipate criminal activity and their duty to protect

patrons is limited to quickly calling the police.

"Even police, who are specially trained and equipped to anticipate and deal with crime, are unfortunately unable to universally prevent it," the court stated in its decision. "This is a testament to the arbitrary nature of crime. Given these realities, it is unjustifiable to make merchants, who not only have much less experience than the police in dealing with criminal activity but are also without a community deputation to do so, effectively vicariously liable for the criminal acts of third parties."

"We hold that the duty to respond is limited to reasonably expediting the involvement of the police, and that there is no duty to otherwise anticipate the criminal acts of third parties. Finally, we reaffirm that merchants are not required to provide security personnel or otherwise resort to self-help in order to deter or quell such occurrences," court concluded.

The cases were Molly MacDonald vs. Pine Knob Music Theater and Stephen Lowry vs. Cellar Door Productions and Pine Knob

Northville is the new home of the minibike.

Mak-It Manufacturing, which is a producer of Lil' Indian Minibike parts, has relocated to Northville and now occupies a section of the former Ford Motor manufacturing facility on Northville Road. The manufacturing company, owned by Regis Michrina was founded in 1989 and was formerly located in Livonia.

"My wife and I live here in Northville at King's Mill. We are very happy to have our business in Northville now," Michrina said. "We plan on being here for another 20 years hopefully."

Rick Birdsall of Signature Associates-ONCOR International brokered the deal on behalf of Hans Peterson, owner of the former Ford building. Peterson still operates his company Peterson

Window out of the building on Northville Road next to McDonald Ford. Birdsall said the addition of the new business is a great thing for the community.

"I grew up with Lil' Indian minibikes and I'm sure a lot of guys my age will remember these minibikes," Birdsall said. "I'm excited about it and I think there is a resurgence in minibike popularity. Plus, the owner Regis Michrina is a good person."

Both men commended Peterson on his effort to bring new business to his Northville location. Michrina said having Peterson as a landlord has been good.

"Mr. Peterson has made a lot of improvements to the building and it's good to see," Michrina said. "I'm very pleased with him. We have a 10-year lease and a 10-year option, so I'm sure we'll be here 20 years."

Besides constructing the

parts for the minibikes, Michrina also produces go-carts and specialty tools for the snowmobile industry. He said there aren't many companies in America today that manufacture the type of products that he does.

"Our shop here is a two-person operation. Me and my wife do the day-to-day work," Michrina said. "My brother works the sale end of the operation through his own company. We build the parts ourselves, which are later assembled into the final product."

Birdsall said he was excited that such a business relocated to Northville. Lil' Indian is a business that has been in existence for 43 years, according to Michrina.

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State debates tax on Web sales

Proposed measure runs into complications in state tax policy committee

A plan to "streamline" sales taxes, so they can be collected more easily for goods purchased over the Internet, is running into a buzz saw in the state House Tax Policy Committee.

To Gov. John Engler, the tax is one Michigan residents have been paying for some 70 years, up to 6 percent on items bought at any store. But now that shopping on the World Wide Web has become popular, Michigan — like most states — has no way to collect it. That means a loss of \$180 to \$350 million in revenue to the state annually.

For many businesses, it's a matter of fairness. They fear that unless e-businesses pay the tax, just like "bricks-and-mortar" businesses, retailers here could lose substantial revenue.

To Rep. Robert Gosselin, R-Troy, it's a new tax, one that is "anti-Republican, is bad for business and stinks of big government."

Bill McMaster, president of Tax-

payers United, argues it's unconstitutional and a violation of Congress's decision to put a moratorium on any proposals for taxes applied to the Internet.

But Sen. Joanne Emmons, R-Big Rapids, who introduced Senate Bill 433, said her plan is to have Michigan join a multi-state consortium to work out a uniform way of collecting the sales tax for items sold on the Web.

Her bill already received the go-ahead from the Senate, winning approval 28-8 vote back in May. The plan has been referred to the House Tax Policy Committee which has already held two hearings on the topic. Emmons' aide Erik Hingst is expecting fast action on the bill because, he said, the deadline for joining the consortium rolls around later this month.

Because the Internet allows consumers to buy from retailers across the country, any attempt to collect sales tax on purchases made across the Web will require federal action, as well as federal coordination, Emmons explained.

Different states collect taxes very differently. For instance, in

Indiana, local governments collect local sales taxes. Michigan's of course is strictly statewide.

Emmons argues that because Michigan's sales tax is already uniform across the state, it would make a good model for the multi-state consortium to follow. If the state does not participate, she fears the consortium might produce a version of the sales tax that would result in a number of changes for Michigan later if the state eventually decided to join.

The bill would not alter Michigan's tax structure or what it is applied to. For example, Michigan law exempts groceries, prescription drugs and some publications. Texas law exempts cowboy boots, because there they are considered work boots, according to Hingst.

That would not have to change, he said. Michigan would not have to start taxing groceries, nor would Texas have to tax boots. But a similar format for taxes would have to be used so e-retailers could what items are taxed in which states and be able to forward the collections.

Engler supports collection of the

sales tax. In fact, he was recently in Washington D.C. to testify before Congress in support of the program.

But Gosselin, a member of House Tax Policy, sees it as just another tax hike. He notes the state GOP has been proud of its tax cutting record in the past, boasting of more than 30 tax trimming measures in recent years.

By staying out of the consortium and leaving Internet sales untaxed, Gosselin argued it would provide an incentive for e-businesses to move to Michigan.

McMaster said it's a tax hike, but there are other issues of concern as well. The consortium plan would involve hiring a business to design software and operate it so retailers could collect and send in their sales taxes. That puts a third party in charge of tax collections, he argued, something strictly prohibited by the U.S. Constitution.

Additionally, there are privacy concerns. He worries government web sites could install "cookies" on citizens' computers to track their Web browsing activities and make sure they pay their sales taxes.

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NHS student bags record-size black bear in Quebec

When Northville High School student Tanner Hann says he's hunting for bear, it's not just an expression.

Hann, 16, son of Ruth and Curt Hann is now in the record books for shooting a black bear in Canada this past June. According to Curt Hann, he and his son arrived at a provincial wildlife reserve in northern Quebec in the last week of June for Tanner's first trip of hunting black bear.

"Tanner has been observing me hunting since he was five years old and he has been deer hunting the last couple of years," Curt said. "We thought it would be good to have him start out using a muzzleloader rather than a bow for his first black bear hunt. He has become quite the deer hunter. He's gotten six deer by gun and bow in the last two years."

Tanner Hann's 400-pound black bear was shot with a black powder muzzle loader. Curt said the bear's skull measured in at 18 1/2 inches. He said the minimum inch count for a bear to be registered in the Pope and

Young worldwide record book is 18 inches.

"I first heard of Claude Turcotte's bear hunting trip at an outdoor show I was at. I'm a manufacturer of

rifle and bow slings, so I attend many outdoor shows. It seemed like the perfect opportunity since we have never been to Quebec and it sounded like it would be a great

experience for the both of us," Curt said.

Tanner Hann said he and his father would go bear hunting during the evening hours from 4 to 9:30 p.m. He said his excitement was very high on the first day before their first trip out to the tree stand.

"I saw four bears the first evening out. The one I shot finally arrived at the bait pile around 7 p.m. and came in four times to eat at the bait pile," Tanner said. "I didn't have a good angle or shot the first couple of times. The third time it came in it scented me and left. I thought it wasn't going to come back, but it did."

Tanner said he was a mix of excitement and nervousness when the bear came back and stood in front of the bait pile. He said the bear looked as if it was going to leave, but it stayed with his back toward the tree stand leaving an open shot for Tanner.

"I fired one shot behind the shoulder and it went through both lungs. It was an adrenaline rush," Tanner said. "It ran about 20 yards and

gave out a death moan before dropping to the ground. I was calm up to the time I squeezed the trigger after that I was so excited I was shaking. It took me awhile to get back to normal."

Curt said the wildlife reserve is a prime hunting area due to the fact that there is little hunting pressure put on it. Only 14 bears are taking out of the reserve per year. He said there are 50,000 square miles of land that is not only great for hunting, but also for fishing and sight seeing. The Hanns videotaped a lot of their experiences while hunting.

"I was up in a tree stand, which is 10 feet off the ground. This 200-pound bear came up to stand and stood up reaching its paws to the top of the ladder we used to get up onto the stand," Curt said. "His

head was about five feet away from me and he was just looking at me. The bear eventually ran off. They are very curious as well as intelligent animals, but they can be unpredictable."

Curt said the hunting trip was great and they plan on going back next year.

"There were moments out there on the trip that you don't see on or experience through television. Just hearing the bears fighting, breaking branches and snapping their teeth is a once-in-a-lifetime experience."

Northville to get walking history lesson

Bruce Turnbull is a walking history book and interested individuals can have the opportunity to witness historic Northville through his memories.

"I was born in Northville on Oct. 7, 1919. My father moved here with Detroit Edison in 1918 and opened up his electrical shop on Main Street. He practically wired every home in Northville at that time," Turnbull said. "When television arrived, I also helped install antennas on many Northville homes, so we have had our hands in Northville history. The Turnbull family goes back four generations in Northville, so my family history is deeply connected with this great town."

On July 17 from 9 to 10 a.m. the Northville Parks and Recreation Department is sponsoring Walk Northville, which is a program in cooperation with the Michigan Recreation and Park Association Walk Michigan program. The goals of Walk Michigan are to promote health and wellness while enjoying a community's surroundings.

"We had a walk two weeks ago and we thought there would be more seniors, but there were more younger people than seniors. So we now have our walks open to all ages," Turnbull said.

Turnbull said he will be telling stories on the walk that are both humorous and informative. In his 80 years of life in Northville, Turnbull has seen many memorable events. He said the buildings on south side of Main Street, such as

where Genitti's-Hole-in-the-Wall is located, have not changed much.

"What makes this town so special, especially the downtown, is that it hasn't changed much. The north side of Main Street was rebuilt because of the fire that destroyed it in 1926," Turnbull said. "Besides that, the downtown has actually gotten better, but it still remains a quaint town."

The walk will start at the rear of Stampeder Plus, which is located on the corner of Dunlap and Main streets and will proceed up Dunlap Street so walk participants can view the historical Victorian homes that reside on either side of the street. Turnbull said during the walk he will tell stories about certain homes and the people that lived in them. The walk will then turn down Linden Street

and then end at the Northville Community Center on Main Street where refreshments will be available.

"The homes in the historical district have been maintained very nicely, which is good to see," Turnbull said. "Each home has a unique story behind it."





Haggerty crunch has communities talking

Road is already five lanes wide from Five Mile to Six Mile, the primary concerns of the improvements lie at the Haggerty Road intersections from Six Mile Road down to Schoolcraft Road. Wayne County's project to widen Six Mile in Northville Township in 2003 is another reason why the immediate attention should be given to the intersections, Weaver said.

According to the study performed by Parsons-Brinckerhoff of Ann Arbor, the short term improvements that would be necessary near the Northville Greens development include adding a right turn lane at eastbound Six Mile, extending the northbound right turn lane and changing the signal system. The signal changes would include right turn arrows, pedestrian-activated crossing signals and re-timing the light for more green time to westbound Haggerty. Weaver said the study concluded that these improvements would result in an acceptable level of service at the Haggerty and Six Mile intersection.

Weaver said in regard to the Plymouth Lakes development, there are short-term improvements needed at the Five Mile and Schoolcraft intersection. A left turn lane should be added

along the development's Haggerty Road frontage, according to the plan. The plan also stated that creating indirect left turns at Schoolcraft would be more beneficial than adding a right turn lane at the Five Mile intersection.

"There is a commitment from the Northville Greens and Plymouth Lakes developers to help fund these short term improvements," Weaver said.

Weaver said the improvement plan also formed several long term improvements to the corridor since it is anticipated that traffic volumes will increase

because of future development in the area. He said three long-term alternatives discussed in the plan included dual left turns from westbound Six Mile turning onto southbound Haggerty, indirect left turns with medians, similar to Telegraph Road, and even constructing a roundabout. However, the costs would be very high to acquire the necessary right-of-way, move major utility lines and for construction, Weaver said.

"We wanted to make Wayne County aware of the needed improvements. Hopefully, by working with the county the improvements can be incorporated into the future road improvement plan," Weaver said. "It's still early yet and the two developments will probably not come to fruition until three or four years from now. The township will need to continue working with Wayne County to monitor traffic conditions and work toward a major improvement in the future."

Blood supply dangerously low, church hopes drive turnout is big

"There's always a need.

"If you've ever considered making a difference in someone's life, now is the perfect time to do so.

"Northville's First Baptist Church, located at 217 N. Wing is hosting a blood drive and all eligible donors are being encouraged to donate.

"The drive is scheduled for July 23 from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. The church is located on the corner of Randolph and Wing and parking is available off of High Street behind the church.

"John Geisland, coordinator for the blood drive and a Red Cross employee, said that it is preferred that people call to schedule an appointment to donate on July 23.

"We'll take them right up to the start of the drive," he said, adding that now is a critical time to donate blood.

"This time of year, it's hard to get to people to commit and then donate," said Geisland. "One part of the drive is to sign people up. Then it's another difficult time to get them actually in."

"Geisland said two of the most scarce times during the year for blood donations occur in mid-December to the end of January and during the summertime.

He said during these time periods, people are typically on vacation or concerned about other holiday matters. Donors typically volunteer to donate during the spring and fall seasons, he said.

He said that the donation process is fairly uncomplicated and takes approximately 60 minutes to complete.

"It's really easy," said Geisland. "It's probably about an hour from beginning to end. To actually give blood [takes] about 10-15 minutes."

During that one-hour period, Geisland said the process entails filling out a written history check, undergoing a mini-physical examination, and having blood drive officials check the donor's temperature, blood pressure, weight and age to ensure they meet the requirements to donate.

After the blood is donated, Geisland said donors are to wait 10-15 minutes. Juice and cookies will be provided.

Geisland said blood drive officials draw about one pint of blood and also fill tubes which are used for testing. He said one unit of donated blood is divided into a minimum of three components: plasma, platelets and red cells.

"The blood levels are very mini-

um," said Geisland. [It's in] very short supply this time of year. Blood doesn't come from any other source except other people."

He said the goal for this drive is to raise 60 pints of blood.

"We would like to go over that," he said. In order to reach that goal, at least 60 eligible donors must participate in the blood drive.

Geisland said some of the requirements for donation include being at least 17 years of age, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health on the day of donation.

"It's relatively painless," he said. "The most important thing is it allows people to have another chance."

Geisland said the blood drives held in January and in July are crucial times to volunteer.

"Those are the toughest and most valuable donation times," he said. "It's in really short supply right now."

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
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Stewart backs re-grinding I-275 to ease noise levels

hard and has continuously negotiated with the MDOT Commission for a solution to the noise on I-275. MDOT also believes this is an important project.

"This commission made a commitment several months ago to address this situation and it has been a top priority for us and the department," chairman of the State Transportation Commission Barton W. LaBelle said. "We've been arming ourselves with data to make an effective decision. We anticipate that diamond grinding will reduce the noise level for adjacent residents."

According to MDOT, in addition to the surface texture of a roadway, noise levels also are impacted by the volume and type of traffic, as well as freeway speeds and other factors. The five mile stretch was reconstructed in 1999 with a concrete surface after MDOT conducted the legally-required Life Cycle Cost Analysis. According to MDOT statistics, I-275 is one of

the state's busiest roads and has daily traffic volumes that reach 200,000 vehicles, particularly in the Five Mile and Nine Mile area.

Wear and tear, as well as noise on I-275 can be attributed to the commercial vehicles that travel the road. MDOT said the commercial vehicles account for 12 percent of the total traffic on I-275. Local officials asked MDOT to use a new type of grooving on the road surface in 1999, but the grooves, combined with an increase in traffic have caused the noise to increase, Stewart said.

"This is the most prudent, cost-effective method of trying to help residents in the area deal with the noise from the freeway," State Transportation Director Gregory J. Rosine said. "No magic bullet exists that will completely solve the problems caused by residential development occurring close to freeways."

Rosine said diamond grinding the surface now will allow MDOT to remove the existing grooves and replace them with a pattern the

department normally uses. According to MDOT, similar diamond grinding projects in other states have resulted in a decrease in noise levels. Stewart said this is the first diamond grinding project in the state.

MDOT will also work with the original contractor to maintain the existing five-year materials and workmanship warranty. The cost of the project is estimated at \$1.5 million to \$2 million. MDOT plans on beginning work soon and hopes to be finished by the end of October.

"It is our goal to do this work at night so we can minimize the disruption to traffic," Rosine said. "We also are working with the contractor in an effort to get this completed as quickly as possible, and quite probably by the end of this construction season."



Genitti's to host fundraiser for downtown art sculpture

It's shaping up to be an evening of cocktails, hors d'oeuvres, art and music.

But hopefully the thrust of the night will belong to art and music.

The Northville Arts Commission and John Genitti will be hosting on a fundraiser on Friday at 6 p.m. at Genitti's Hole-In-The-Wall in an effort to raise funds for the commission's public sculpture program. Arts commission chairperson Ken Naigus said the fundraiser is being held prior to the Bandshell concert, which is featuring the Schoolcraft Wind Ensemble. Funds are being raised at this time for the first sculpture that will be selected to be placed in the band shell area near the clock on east Main Street.

"We wanted a fairly representational piece with a musical theme as our first sculpture," Naigus said. Naigus brought the five finalist sculptures to the Northville city

council meeting on July 2 in order to receive council as well as public input to be used in the final selection.

The five finalists include the Harp, Dancer, Treble Clef, Quartet and Bronze sculptures. The sculptures range in size from six to eight feet in height. Of the five, the Treble Clef seemed to spur the most support from the city council and the attending residents. The ultimate selection will be made by the committee comprised of arts commissioners, downtown restaurant owners and city administrators.

"We have two basic challenges and one of them is the final selection," Naigus said. "People have different tastes, so we are trying to get as much input as possible before we make our final selection."

The sculptures have been on display at the Northville Public Library, at the Friday Bandshell concerts and in Northville city hall. The price of admission at the fundraising event at Genitti's will be \$50 and

\$35 of that admission price will be tax-deductible. Naigus informed the city council that slightly more than \$5,000 had been raised so far.

"The other big challenge we are facing now is raising enough funds to sufficiently cover the cost of the final sculpture," Naigus said. "The final cost will range from \$17,000 to \$20,000. Support is needed."

According to Naigus, major contributors will have their names engraved on a plaque that will be set at the base of the statue. Naigus said future sculptures that are planned on being placed at various locations in the downtown area will not be as expensive or large as the current finalists. Tickets for the event are now available at Genitti's, city hall and Mail Boxes Etc. on Center Street.

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
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
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

Road help eases Northville's burden

Everywhere you turn these days, another orange barrel is popping up. Sure, they're making people nuts, but it's the price to be paid for good roads.

We learned this week of two more projects around the Northville area that could spell long-term relief after some short term misery: the regrading of Interstate 275 between Five and Ten Mile roads, and expansions and improvements to Haggerty Road near I-275.

Residents living along I-275 have complained for the better part of the last 18 months that the resurface project taken up in 1999 left the road in better shape, but worse in the noise department.

Using an experimental grooving method, workers placed grooves in the road perpendicular to the flow of traffic. That decision, nearby residents say, is what's causing the constant roar and whine they say had not been there before reconstruction to I-275 had been done. To alleviate that problem, the state announced a plan to grind new grooves in the road, which would follow the older method of running with the flow of traffic.

Whether or not the diamond grinding makes a serious dent in the noise troubles reported by residents living along the second-busiest stretch of freeway in the state remains to be seen. When a roadway is handling an average of 200,000 vehicles every day, it's going to be noisy — period. No amount of diamond grinding, resurfacing or noise barrier protection is going to prevent

it from happening.

But the state, with the help of Rep. John Stewart, apparently recognizes that a problem exists, and is willing to extend a hand to give a break to homeowners in Northville and nearby communities deal with the decibel levels. For that, we think the state, as well as Mr. Stewart, deserve a pat on the back.

Haggerty Road's congestion along new developments or proposed developments in Northville and Plymouth townships

apparently caught the eye of township public services director Don Weaver, who said the Haggerty is already over-capacity. The addition of the developments in the neighboring communities, he said, would compound an already-overcapacitated stretch of the road.

Mr. Weaver's foresight and willingness to work with Plymouth Township, the city of Livonia and Wayne County authorities to help ease the gridlock-in-waiting deserves a salute from us, too. We're hopeful the collective plan of the community leaders involved will make traveling this populated area a bit less stressful.

In the meantime, bring a cold drink and some soft music in the car with you this summer. (It's also worth leaving a few minutes earlier each day to avoid rush hour madness.) Traffic snarls are bound to test everyone's patience.

Partisanship at its worst in CCW

On a 4-3 split ruling a couple of weeks ago, the Michigan Supreme Court blocked a referendum on the new concealed weapons law that requires local gun boards to issue permits to carry hidden heat to anybody who isn't a felon or mentally ill. That let the law take effect and nullified the petition drive that collected more than 230,000 signatures calling for a statewide vote.

In short order, thousands of folks lined up to get permits. The flood of applications went a long way to validate the Michigan State Police estimate that the bill would increase the number of permit holders from the current 53,380 to more than 125,000.

Many prosecutors — including Wayne County's Mike Duggan and Oakland's David Goryca — resigned from their local gun boards, reflecting fierce opposition to the law from parts of Michigan's legal and police community.

The majority Supremes are taking a real pounding on this one, and it isn't confined to editorial writers and columnists. "I'm terribly disappointed that the opinion flies in the face of the people's Constitutional right to referendum," says Attorney General Jennifer Granholm. David Fink, Oakland Coordinator for the People Who Care About Kids Committee that ran the petition drive, says the decision "eviscerated the people's right to referendum. If legislators want to take away our right to referendum, all they have to do now is tack on an irrelevant appropriation."

Fink's comments refer to the device the lame duck legislature used to make the bill "bullet

proof and ballot proof" by tacking on \$1 million to distribute locks for handguns. The Supreme Court majority of Justices Clifford Taylor, Maura Corrigan, Stephen Markman and Robert Young opined the bill is not subject to citizen vote because Article 2, Paragraph 9 of the Michigan Constitution says the power of referendum "does not extend to acts making appropriations for state institutions."

The original purpose of the provision was to make sure government did not grind to a halt if appropriations bills were constantly subject to lengthy referenda. So the legal argument turns on whether the money slipped into the CCW bill was really a basic appropriation for a state institution or a limited allocation of funds for a specific purpose.

Majority justices argued "strict construction" of the Constitution required that any grant of money constitutes an appropriation. Dissenting Justices Michael Cavanagh, Marilyn Kelly and Elizabeth Weaver contended \$1 million tacked onto the bill for the admitted purpose of overturning any effort at referendum is hardly an appropriation and opens the door for all manner of similar legislative shenanigans. Justice Weaver noted in her dissent that the majority opinion opens the door for the legislature to "referendum-proof" a bill simply by adding an appropriation — as little as \$1 will do.

Moreover, the four Justices — fierce opponents of judicial activism — have taken the remarkably active judicial step of curtailing a citizen right that has been in the Constitution since 1913.

(To get a sense of the exquisitely twisted logic of the majority's views, have a look at Justice Young's opinion, especially. It's on the Internet at <http://courtofappeals.mijud.net/ds.html>; docket number 119274.)

The politics are equally troubling. Remember that the way Justices Taylor, Young and Markman got into office? It was through the most expensive and vituperative campaign in Michigan political history. Critics

of the campaign — which featured tons of soft money for both Republican and Democratic candidates — charged this method of picking Justices will ensure that Michigan can reliably obtain from this court the best justice soft money can buy.

Years ago people considering a real estate purchase went to a member of the Michigan Appraisers Institute for an appraisal. If the appraisal seemed out of line, skeptics would call the resulting document MAI ("Made According to Instructions"). Reading through the twists of the Court's opinion persuades me this opinion was MAI from start to finish.

It's in that context that monopoly power today exerted in state government by the Republican Party — the GOP controls the legislature, the governorship and a majority on the Supreme Court — becomes a matter of real concern. Thoughtful readers may recall the 19th century English statesman, Lord Acton, who originally observed that, "power tends to corrupt and absolute power corrupts absolutely."

Let's talk reality in race profiling

You know where I can get drugs?' What kind of effect you think this has on the psyche of a black person, on their possibilities? If you sent a hundred thousand black people into your neighborhood, Indian Hills, and they asked every white person they saw, 'hey, you got any drugs?', within a day, your friends and their kids would be selling. It's market forces, man. The product's marked up 300 percent. You can go out on the street and make 500 bucks in two hours and then do whatever you want for the rest of the day. You think white people would still be going to law school?"

The scene is one of several eye-opening moments contained in that popular motion picture. If you haven't seen it, I recommend it.

Of course, the flick is a commentary on America's ongoing, if less than successful, "War on Drugs." It caught my interest as a commentary on our even longer-standing war on each other's neighborhoods.

I bring it up because of proposals at the state and national level to ban "racial profiling."

Both the NAACP and the ACLU have called for federal prohibitions on the practice of police stopping drivers because of their ethnic background. In Michigan, Rep. Samuel (Buzz) Thomas, D-Detroit, has introduced House Bill 4927, which says that "in the absence of a specific report, race or ethnicity of an individual shall not be a factor in determining the existence of probable cause" to stop, detain, investigate or arrest a motorist.

I wholeheartedly agree that race and ethnicity ought not be the factor in making traffic stops. And as a policy statement, the idea of banning profiling is fine. I would not defend or excuse profiling, but I also find it useful when we are discussing public policy to inject a bit of reality, however politically incorrect, into the conversation.

For one, we live in one of the most segregated metropolitan areas in the country. Metro Detroit has a long-standing reputation for separating our white neighborhoods from our black communities. And cops, when they are on the look out for criminal activity, try to spot people who don't appear to belong in the neighborhood. In a Lilly-white suburb, when cops are on patrol, skin color — inappropriate or not — may be the first indicator they get that someone is not a resident. Then again, as the movie "Traffic" points out, a white person in a black neighborhood might attract just as much attention.

In the suburbs, one of most frequent crimes that police deal with is home burglaries. I've never seen statistics for this or a study of the question, but 20 years of reading police reports in my role as a suburban journalist, has convinced me that many of these break-ins are transplanted crimes from the central city. Cops no doubt see this trend, too. They're the ones who fill out all those reports.

Why have a bond election at all?

Great news, everyone! In the annual Novi-Northville football game later this year, Northville is going to win. It's going to happen.

Of course, I have no iron-clad evidence to support my claim, but since it's going to happen, why bother playing the game at all? Hey — just chalk up a 'W' in the Mustangs' column right now.

If it's going to pass eventually, then why bother having an election at all? Just start tilling the ground and pouring the concrete. Pop the tax bills in the mail and let's get going. All we're doing by postponing the inevitable is dragging out the process longer than it needs to be.

I thought bond issues were up to the voters to determine, but maybe I'm just being dumb again.

Why not just be done with this whole thing

and save everyone the hassle of interrupting their day with a trip to the polls?

Traditionally, voters in Northville have been kind to open their wallets to the district when it comes calling for money. The most recent example of generosity now stands along Six Mile Road between Sheldon and Beck. And if you're the gambling type, the smart money is on an approval of the bond issue this September.

Personally speaking, I'd like nothing better than to see the district get its way. There certainly appears to be a need for additional space looming out there. Whether or not you have children in the district (which I don't), there's a dividend that comes with having quality schools in a community that may not be immediately realized, but certainly manifests itself when it's time to sell that home of yours.

So ask me if I think the bond will pass, and I'll agree with the board.

But where I take great exception is this notion of inevitability. That's a dangerously confident approach to be taking, and one I think needs to be toned down a notch or two.

We're talking about \$26 million, after all. It's not like a bake sale fundraiser. This is some serious cash. Laid end-to-end in one dollar bills, those \$26 million would run roughly from here to San Diego — no joke.

That's a trip to California on your tax dollars. And don't even get me started on this "if-at-first-it's-not-approved / vote, vote-again" angle that seems to have become increasingly popular among public entities these days. I find

It ought not be a surprise to us that our inner-city neighborhoods, our black neighborhoods, have in many cases become breeding grounds for crime or that it comes back to haunt us even after we have moved to the suburbs. It is not as if whites didn't have a lot to do with it. We abandoned those neighborhoods in the "white flight" of the '60s and '70s. Then we turned them into shopping districts for our recreational pharmaceuticals, as the movie "Traffic" points out.

We've let government withdraw services from the central cities. The lack of good effective mass transit, so residents of the inner city can get to jobs, is just one good example. And we've priced many of the suburbs beyond the means of all but the wealthiest members of the middle class.

You can ban profiling, and perhaps we should.

But it seems to me that's like giving cough syrup to a man with lung cancer. It treats the symptom when the root cause is deeper and much more serious.

something deeply troubling that public bodies can make multiple attempts to get approval for a program, apparently under the assumption that the voters just didn't know what was best for them the first, second, third or fourth time around.

Issues can get trashed in landslide defeats in election after election. But the day that same proposal gets just one more "yes" than "no," watch the steel beams get put in place.

The board has a right to be optimistic, and should be. Northville is a community that backs its schools, by and large. I'd like to count myself among the supporters the district has. Taking the doomsday route doesn't do much good.

Let's just not start counting the chickens before they hatch. There are 26 million of them this time around.

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Portables big part of Plan B, should bond not pass

would simply mean an continuation and extension of what we're doing now."

Martha Nield, secretary of the Northville Board of Education said if the voters reject the bond proposal the district would likely ask again.

"We'd probably come back and ask the voters a second time," she said. "The crowding would be extended for another year. Immediately I think there would have to be increases in class size. We've got to put those kids somewhere."

One option the district would explore is establishing portable classrooms on the grounds of the

schools. Currently, the district owns five portables.

Due to capacity limitations, the district has already decided to place one doublewide portable classroom at Silver Springs Elementary School and at least one portable classroom at Thornton Creek Elementary. The district is also considering establishing a portable at Winchester Elementary, but that has yet to be determined.

Although the use of portable classrooms provides some relief to the overcrowded school buildings, Nield said using portables is not a ideal answer in the long run.

"They are a great short term solution because it takes so long

to build what you need," she said. "It's not a good long term solution. It's just not the ideal situation."

Nield also said if the voters decide to vote "no," the district would have to accommodate students by having higher class sizes and using more portables.

"I hope that [voters] can see that this is something we really need," said Nield. "It's a careful plan. The plan was very well thought out."

She also added that debt mills have been retired and that by passing this bond proposal in September, the millage rate will still be not as high as it was in 1997.

"I think it's just a matter of making them see the need," said Nield. "We've got to get the word

out and make them circle the 25th on their calendar."

If voters decide to approve the district's upcoming request for the multi-million dollar bond, additions for the district will include a brand-new elementary school, additions to Winchester Elementary, Moraine Elementary and Northville High School as well as a storage addition at Amerman Elementary. Furthermore, the district is requesting fiber optic cabling to the new elementary school and the establishment of a redundant loop to complete the district's technology structure.

According to school officials, the new elementary school will accommodate the projected peak enrollment

and will be of adequate size to implement the district's lowered class size targets. Also, the Amerman storage addition will provide space to properly store cafeteria tables, equipment, folding chairs and supplies.

The additional classrooms and the remodeling of the south centrum at Moraine Elementary and the additional classrooms at Winchester Elementary will provide space to implement lower class sizes and provide adequate space for special classes, said school officials.

The district is also planning to construct an addition to Northville High School which will accommodate the projected peak enrollment

of approximately 2,200 students.

In addition, the fiber optic cabling project will connect the new elementary school to the district's wide area network and will provide a redundant loop for many of the district's school buildings.

School officials said the district is in need of additional space in order to properly house the growing numbers of students and maintain low class sizes.

said, was pleasantly surprising.

"Many people were in agreement with me about the seriousness of this issue," Bodnar said. "A lot of them didn't know all the facts."

Bodnar said another issue that concerns him is the notion that the Northville Central Business Association is in agreement that the post office helps their businesses. Bodnar said the NCBA does not observe a direct impact from post office business. However, he also said the business group is not fully against the post office remaining in some form in the downtown area. Bodnar said the NCBA is concerned its views on the issue have not been fully heard and understood by the DDA or city administrators.

"Our stance at this point is that

we want to look into this issue even further to get up to speed as well as in the hope of getting some real answers and information," Bodnar said. "The NCBA and residents are paying a huge chunk of money on this proposed expansion, so we would like to get more serious about it. That includes speaking with city manager Gary Word in more depth about every related issue."

Bodnar said it's an ongoing learning process and the main priority is obtaining information so the right questions can be asked.

the boys not to plan anything on June 16. One of the runners father's booked hotel reservations. They were already registered for the 4 x one-mile. The director wanted Moore to run the two-mile open and Smith entered the boys in the distance medley relay (DMR) just for "kicks."

"I was still saying 'Boy, what did we get ourselves into.' We run against good competition. If we have a hard time against Rockford, what are we in for? I didn't realize Rockford is the best in the nation. My gosh, what we see is national caliber. I didn't give us that much credit. Our environment is top-notch," Smith said.

"With four minutes of time for each runner, we knew we'd have to be careful and play on each other," said Smith. The second-fastest runner usually opens a race, but who was the Wildcats' second-fastest runner?

Eric run the first leg. He loves to run route with people. We knew if he had to play catch-up, he could overreact and go for the lead early. He's our No. 3 runner and he was running against everyone else's No. 2. He finished his leg in second place," Smith said.

Next came Avenius, usually Novi's No. 4 runner even though he's not slow. Avenius finished his leg still in second place. He was running against everyone else's No. 3.

Smith decided to have Toloff run the third leg. In track, coaches traditionally hide their slowest runner in the third slot. However, the Wildcats didn't have a slow runner. 

Labor of love

Resident brings Renaissance feel to Northville

If you keep your eyes closed and listen to the surrounding sounds of nature and smell the scents the breeze is carrying, your mind might begin to slip away into a place that resembles a garden in Florence, Italy.

However, as your eyes open, you remember that you are at Northville resident Tom Holleman's home on Dubuar Street basking in the atmosphere Holleman has created out of a love for past creators.

"There are qualities to classical design that don't go out of style," Holleman said. "I try to incorporate traditional qualities into a design. There is something refreshing about seeing a work that looks as if the worker put a lot of effort into. A lot of designs today tend to forget the beauty an object could possess."

Holleman, originally from Indian Village in Detroit, moved to Northville 15 years ago and took up residency in his current home. The home he now lives in is of his own design and he likes to call it a work in progress. Holleman moved to and remained in Northville because of the small town atmosphere.

"There is a unique quality to Northville that may be going away soon with the increase of growth, which is the small town feeling you get when walk down a street," Holleman said. "There are many historical homes in Northville that give the community a great character."

Residents can become more knowledgeable of Holleman's work by going to city hall and sitting in

the sun while listening to the smooth sounds of the copper fountain out front. His fountains have become a fixture at several houses on his street. He is assisted by Robert Grant in the installation and construction of the fountains.

Holleman said he has even had experiences of finding neighbors come by his home to sit and enjoy the fountain that resides on the west side of his house.

"It's unusual to live in a downtown area and be able to sit in your yard and enjoy nature like I can here," Holleman said. "I've found people sitting on my bench who just decided to stop by to appreciate the surroundings and the refreshing sound of the water splashing in the fountain. There is something magical about water."

The first question a person would have for Holleman after seeing his handcrafted fountain is, what is it made out of? Holleman goes to great lengths to find usable materials for his projects, but it is connections and friendships he has developed throughout his years that help him the most when it comes time to find the right materials.

"Several of the fountains I have made are made from old beer making vats that I have salvaged from breweries. These vats are very old and were handcrafted by German craftsmen," Holleman said. "I enjoy working with materials and items that have the look of having been slaved over and worked on for hours. Sometimes people want to throw older objects out, but many times those throw aways have plenty of productive life left in

them, they can be made into something else. Character is important to me and if something has wrinkles or scratches on it, then that just means it has been through life."


Much work goes into the fountains, Holleman said. The initial planning is crucial for the final look of the fountain. One aspect to the planning is the question of placement. Holleman said he usually falls back on his knowledge of classical design to make decisions. His love for classical design can be attributed to the years he spent studying and traveling in Europe.

"Classical architects knew something about symmetry and proportion. Modern architects can learn a lot from the classic creators' understanding of design," Holleman said.

The surroundings of the fountain are also important in that it adds to the overall feel and look, according to Holleman. Holleman has examples of a fountain surrounded by tiles, hand-crafted granite and polished granite stones from China. He has used flower pots to make fountains and one favorite of his are his bird baths, which in the winter can also be used by birds and animals because of the placement of a small heater underneath the fountain. His fountains range in price from \$1,000 to \$3,000.

"Seeing the effect of the water without being able to see how it is done is a neat thing," Holleman said.

Holleman also does other projects pertaining to landscaping and home design. His work has recently taken him to Palm Beach to work on a home there and he will soon be working on a project in Lexington, Ky. In Lexington, he will be helping renovate a old horse farm. He said he will be getting a better understanding of the project by becoming more knowledgeable in the farm's surroundings and indigenous features.

"For the horse farm, I will have to renovate it well enough so that it will fit the needs of the horse as well as the trainers," Holleman said. "I want the final product to be beautiful, but there can be compromises involved in projects. Ultimately, my goal for any project is to satisfy the functional requirements, but also turn the project into something beautiful. That's what I strive for. Having the right materials as well as workers who give 110 percent of their effort and time is crucial in achieving this

goal." Besides the hours of research and work, Holleman said getting involved with clients that are very interested in the final outcome of a project is what makes a project easy and more enjoyable to do. "I will always be working and doing things like constructing fountains," Holleman said. "It's great to be able to enjoy your work, but it also makes a decent living."

Lodge Living

"We both led pretty busy lives. We like to go up north a lot. In fact we have property there, but this worked out to be our up north in Howell," commented Sue Frazier.

The pine trees leading up the winding driveway give the impression of a ski resort. At the end of the drive, the home sits atop a hill, secluded from the main road. An open deck with wagon wheels and front porch welcomes visitors and provides the couple with a bird's eye view of their land. A faint tinkle of wind chimes in the gentle breeze is about the only noise you'll hear back in this peaceful neck of the woods.

The latest addition to their outdoors landscaping is a pond built off the back of the house. All the stones used in the waterfall came from the property. It's stocked with fish and water foliage.

Inside, the home is a nice balance of Richard and Sue's interests and hobbies. He's retired from the construction industry and she's a retired high school teacher. The great room is a favorite spot and it's a true reflection of both of their personalities.

"We live here in the great room," comments Richard Frazier whose soap stone wood stove keeps it cozy in the winter. "My woodpile is ready to go," he

said thinking ahead to cool winter nights. In fact, that's his favorite time in his log cabin.

"I like it back here in the wintertime. I turn the lights down low and just watch the fireplace," he said.

Open beam ceilings and an open-air loft give warmth to the room, as does large half round palladium windows. Richard is an outdoorsman and hunter, so you'll find lots of rugged décor like animal furs and pelts. Mounted moose and deer trophies and other wildlife are on display as well as a unique antler chandelier.

"I like to collect skins...I like to hunt, but I don't always get something. I just like to get away and out with nature," Richard explained.

The large palladium windows shelve a collection of hand carved Santas. Some were made by Bob Susa who taught Richard how to carve them as well.

Sue's contributions are more in the way of antiques and collectibles, which are equally important to the style and warmth of this log home. For example, the brown cookie molds in the kitchen, or the ceramic quilt collection hanging from the loft.

"People started giving them to me as gifts, because I'm a quilter," Susan commented.

Sue's handiwork is found throughout the home. Handmade quilts cover each bed and an antique trunk in Jonathan's old room stores some extras.

In fact, everything in the home has a story from the serving plates that her grandma in Oklahoma used as well as a chair and bookshelves that were discarded from the U of M library that Richard rescued.




The Frazier's Howell home sits atop a hill secluded from the road. An open deck with wagon wheels and front porch welcomes visitors.

"Last year they didn't understand the fee structure for restaurants and they didn't participate," Flaharty explained. "They're coming back."



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
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Her 'star' shines with fest logo

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



Come along for the Magical History Tour

Fine food, fine arts and fine times – as usual – will await folks who make their way to the Farmington Area Founders Festival. But, this year's annual celebration invites patrons to step back in time and take a closer look at why there's a "founders" festival in the first place.


It's an abridged version of "The Magical History Tour," the subject of a book written by Farmington Historical Society vice president Brian Golden. Instead of 20 stops, as detailed in his book, the special festival version includes 10, beginning, of course, with Stop One. It's the southeast corner of 11 Mile-Power roads – the site where Quaker Arthur Power founded Farmington in 1824.

"This is an effort to put the 'founder's' back into the Founders Festival, by adding this historical component," Golden explained. "... I want people to explore this community, instill some excitement in the history of this town. Maybe they'll pass that information on to their children. It's all about education, making people aware."

Plenty of awareness-building can be had during Golden's 30-minute freebie tour, available for about 20 patrons per trip. Between 1-5 p.m. both Friday and Saturday of festival week, the bus will make its way around the historical loop, starting at Grand River and Grove.

It will crawl past a potpourri of history and heritage. There's a stop on the Underground Railroad and a

cemetery where at least one soldier is buried from American wars dating back to the 1700s. There's a prime spot for folklore, the Minnow Pond – where legend has it that smoke rising from valley campfires hovered like "a curtain."

And don't forget the Drake family farm and Old Mill Site of Sleepy Hollow among favorite landmarks.

The tour won't bypass those with physical disabilities, either. Because Farmington Public Schools provided medium-sized buses equipped with lifts and ramps, wheelchairs can be hoisted into and off of the bus, Golden said.

Stop 1: In the beginning

Other than the historical landmark "Where Farmington Began," the southeast corner of Power and 11 Mile roads is nothing extraordinary. But the corner is the cornerstone of Farmington. In 1823, a Quaker named Arthur Power surveyed acres of rolling, forested property and decided that would be the place to bring his family.

The 160 acres would be settled the following year as Farmington Township, named after the Quaker settlement in New York the family left behind.

"They set up shop here," said Magical History Tour guide Brian Golden.

tennis tournaments at Founders Sports Park and Farmington High School, respectively.

"There just seems to be an energy, a real positive energy around the festival," said Lichtman, who took over the reins following a two-year run by Watts Up Inc. "We're just feeding off each other that way."

That the ox roast is back seems to be watering many mouths in anticipation. During the recent Memorial Day parade, a festival float featuring an ox statue triggered much applause along the route, Lichtman said.

The ox roast will be stationed at the Founders Cafe, behind Page's Food & Spirits. There, hungry and thirsty patrons can enjoy food and beverages throughout the fest. A 60-foot-by-120-foot tent with capacity for 450 will

be augmented by outdoor bistro seating for another 40 or so.

Staffing the Founders Cafe will be some of the dozens of volunteers, who city officials say have been essential to the festival's revamping in every area from food to entertainment to convincing merchants and crafters to climb on board.

Carleigh Flaharty, president of the Farmington/ Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce, said those volunteers have contributed to "a turnaround in attitude" but so has the festival board's - and Lichtman's - emphasis on including community input in producing a festival that is a spread-the-word happening.

That connectedness wasn't the case last year, when there was enough overall disappointment to call for a Town Hall meeting and the decision to go back to the future.

Folks who stroll through Downtown Farmington Center parking lot, which again will be a hub of activity - with food, vendors and entertainment throughout - might see at least one example of the new attitude. Longtime festival staple The Great Wall, absent last summer, again takes up a booth near Starbucks. The Great Wall, in case you forgot, features

Flaharty said nine cash prizes will net winners anywhere from \$150 to \$1,000.

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
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

tainment by artists like, the U.S. National Scottish Fiddle Champion for 2000.


And artists with the Farmington Artist Club will also be painting, at the fairgrounds during the festival.
