

Gas station heist suspect had rap sheet

Northville Township police detective William Helke said the arrest of 39-year-old Livonia resident Michael Ankenbrandt was a great example of two neighboring departments working together to rid the community of an habitual criminal offender.

After Ankenbrandt's Feb. 12 preliminary examination for his alleged involvement . in

two Livonia armed robberies Helke placed Ankenbrandt into custody for the Jan. armed robbery of a Sunoco on Five Mile Road Northville Township. Ankenbrandt was later video



arraigned by 35th District Court on charges of armed robbery, felon in possession of a firearm and habitual

offender fourth notice. According to Helke, Livonia police earlier this month responded to a 911 telephone cali from an employee of Hancock Fabrics, informing police that a man had just robbed the store at gunpoint. Shortly thereafter, Livonia officers stopped a vehicle and found a man matching the description and who had a handgun in his possession. The man, identifled as Ankenbrand, later confessed in both verbal and written form to the Hancock robbery as well as to

the Sunoco incident and to another one committed at a Livonia gas sta-

Livonia authorities had contacted the Northville Township department stating that they had in custody a man matching the description given for the Sunoco robbery suspect. Ankenbrandt had also been klentified in a line up by victims from each case. Follow-up investigation enabled the township to determine Ankenbrandt has had a history of committing similar crimes in the community.

In August of 1999, a Northville Township police officer was stationary near Five Mile and Haggerty roads when he had heard an alarm at the nearby Northville Auto Wash. which is located at 39780 Five Mile. Upon arrival at the scene, the officer observed a parked car in the car wash lot with a man in the passenger seat. The other man. Ankenbrandt, ran out from the nearby bushes into the car. The two failed to stop and a chase ensued that had the police following the car into the Nativity of the Virgi.. Mary Church parking lot where the two men fled the vehicle after driving it about 100 feet into the woods.

The township police report stated Ankenbrandt used a hammer to break a window at the car wash and that a pipe used for smoking crack cocaine was also found in the abandoned vehicle. Helke said drug use is a common root-cause for robberies and larcenies. Further inves-

Online investors hope for return of money

Northville resident investigated by feds for operating fraudulent computer futures trading market

The chance of recouping funds placed with a Novi futures firm does not look good for at least 60 clients who trusted a Northville resident with their hard-earned cash.

"At this point when looking at the assets available compared to the deposits made, there would not be enough to pay all of the clients 100 percent of their deposits," said Dan Driscoll, executive vice president and chief compliance officer of the National Futures

sis is based on records pro vided by Todd James Snively, president of FutureWise Trading Group and Commodity Consultants International in the Crystal Glen Office Center.

Snively, 40, provided records to the association which Driscoll points out may or may not be accurate.

The records show Snively began taking orders in June.

Snively's trading groups were closed Feb. 6 by the association and now a complaint has been filed by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission in the United States District Court

Driscoll stressed this is a preliminary opinion for the Eastern District of Michigan. Scott case, our Chicago enforcement staff, in coordiwilliamson, an acting regional counsel for the division of enforcement in the central regional office of the CFTC in Chicago, said the complaint charges defendants with fraudulently operating an Internet-based trading platform which purportedly permitted investors to place orders for commodity futures contracts through CCI and FutureWise. In addition, it alleges the defendants misappropriated investors' funds. The complaint states the defendants solicited and accepted at least \$2.9 million from at least 60 people.

Investor protection and market integrity are the commission's primary objectives. In this

Mammoth multi-use entertainment venue proposed for 5 Mile

Westland businessman George Marvaso would like to see his dream realized in Northville Township.

Marvaso has devoted an abundance of time and money for his dream of constructing an entertainment facility that would look a little like Las Vegas, but have the feel of the family-oriented destination Disney World.

However, some township residents are afraid of what the project could bring, and township planning commissioners said the project has some major hurdles to clear before it can be seriously considered.

Marvaso appeared at the Jan. 29 Northville Township planning commission meeting to give an introductory presentation of the Electropolitan, a proposed 140,000 square foot complex that would provide a number of entertainment dining" choices.

Electropolitan carries with an estimated \$40 million price tag.

Our intentions are to build the finest entertainment center in America," Marvaso said of the Electropolitan project. "We have come to Northville Township because we think it is a fine, growing community and the particular location has great visibility.

Marvaso said the project has received support from such governmental officials as state treasurer Doug Rothwell, Wayne County executive Edward McNamara, and former U.S. Senator Spencer Abraham. He said financial support for the project will not be an

The proposed location is at Five Mile and Haggerty roads near Hiller's Market and the Oasis Golf Course. At the January meeting.

Marvaso was told that before the project would be considered fully. the 2-acre site would need to be rezoned from office use to B-3 use. Marvaso has brought the project

Township and city officials examine Six Mile bike path

One shared idea which is wholeheartedly agreed upon by the leadership of the Northville community is the definite need for pedestrian linkages between township and city neighborhoods and recreation areas.

According to Northville city public works director James Gallogly, the pathway idea of connecting Northville Township's Six Mile pedestrian walkway to Ford Field was given a preliminary talk-through at a meeting last week. At present, Gallogly said it appears Wayne County may take the lead in getting it done. Even though a plan has not yet been presented to the township board of trustees or city council, Wayne County officials proposed to be the primary design leader of it and said they would use park funding to help finance the project.

ule section of the proposed updated Northville Parks and Recreation master plan, there are listed two specific linkages planned to be constructed within the next five years. In 2003. the improvement schedule has proposed the construction of a pathway to link the Six Mile Road bike path to Ford Field. During the two year span from 2004 to 2006, the hope is to also construct a contiguous pathway along Eight Mile Road from Randolph Street to Maybury State Park.

Currently, there is a township pathway along Six Mile Road that ends near Northville Road. Gallogly said the plan may be to have the path extended for more than a mile into Hines Park then north onto Seven Mile Road. He said this is where a possible snag in the plan could be encountered: deciding how the path will cross the street so it can reach

The project cost is estimated at

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
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"It would be an equal partnership between the city, township and county. Since it may go through Hines, the county has said it would take the lead in getting it done." Gallogly said. "It would be a win-win situation for everyone.

Funding would be sought from the Michigan Department Transportation's enhancement program, which Gallogly said would possibly cover half of the expected cost. The other half would be divided equally into three parts among the city, township and county.

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
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






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

. The student cannot transfer back to the origi-

nal school during the present year of transfer. This procedure must be followed annually.

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
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
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

A first and second reading of the Sewer Use Ordinance (YCUA) will be held at the Board of Trustee meeting on February 21, 2002 at 7:30 p.m. at the Northville Township Croic Center, 41600 Six Mile Road, Northville, Michigan

The Sewer Use Ordinance is to regulate industrial sewer use and disposal of wastewater, requiring connection to sewage works and prohibiting unauthorized discharge. The ordinance regulates the content of industrial sewage flows and requires information prior to connection to the sewage system. The ordinance requires a permit for connection and prohibits discharge of stormwater into the sanitary sewer. The ordinance regulates building sewers and connections and provides for an enforcement process. The ordinance regulates use of public sewers as well as private sewage disposal. Among other provisions, the ordinance repeals the prior industrial sewer use ordinance.

The public is invited to attend this public hearing and express their comments

and questions. Written comments regarding the proposed changes will be received by the Township Clerk's Office, 41600 West Six Mile Road, Northville, MI







Sheehan building's future uncertain

The future of the Sheehan building on Main Street in downtown Northville is up in the air at this point in time, but a decision on it could happen this year.

According to Northville city manager Gary Word, building owner Larry Sheehan may move the building, demolish it or just keep it where it is. Word said there is no definite plan. The 150-year-old building is located at 170 E. Main and houses Justin York Salon. The Northville historic district commission has approved the building for demolition.

However, Northville Downtown Development Authority board member Greg Presley spoke on Sheehan's behalf at the last DDA meeting, saying that Sheehan would like to see the building preserved and possibly moved to another location. Presley presented the DDA with the conceptual idea of relocating it to across the street so it overlooks Ford Field in the corner block of Hutton Street and

"It is Mr. Sheehan's impression that the building has been rendered obsolete and is an impediment to the potential sale of the property it is situated on." Presley said of the reasoning behind seeking demolition approval. "However, he is willing to move it to another city-owned location."

Presley said Sheehan has no definite plans for the Main Street building or property, but did say the property could become home to a two to three-story mixed-use building. But he reiterated that nothing is definite.

The relocation area just might be in the same location of the Buckhave project proposed some years ago by Stampeddler owners Margene and Bob Buckhave, which was rejected by the city. According to mayor Chris Johnson, at the time the Buckhave project was rejected on the grounds that it would have blocked the view of the field, was taking away greenspace from the field and the potential increase in traffle it would bring. Johnson, along with several other DDA members, believes the potential move is conceptually a good idea, but said the issues of parking and other legalities remained to be major obstacles.

"If the city can possibly sell the property, then the idea can move forward, but if not, then there is no reason to proceed," Presley said.

Presley said if the project could proceed, the next step would involve some engineering plans. which basically would mean learning if the move and eventual placement of the building and constructing of parking would be feasible. Presley said Sheehan would like to retain ownership of the building, as well as own the property it would sit on.

The building has a long history, Presley said. It was the home of a library and a hardware store at one time. If successfully moved, Presley said Sheehan envisioned it as a place for a cafe and a prime location for senior citizens to view the activities going on at Ford Field. The city and parks and recreation commission has plans to link the field with the downtown by constructing seating and stairs down the slope off of Hutton down to the field. Any plan to relocate the facility would have to work in these ideas, he said.

The challenge of parking for the building would have to be addressed. Presley said. He introduced the idea of possibly building a parking area near the new location. He said the parking serving the area is already hard-pressed

and short of spaces due to such new developments as Starbucks and the First Presbyterian Church of Northville expansion.

The Sheehan buildings future originally came into question in the summer of 2000 when Northville businessman and DDA member Jim Long began building his 22,000 square foot, three-story building located at 180 E. Main. At the time. Sheehan took Long to court on multiple unsuccessful attempts to stop the construction. Long's building is now open and it houses the Fine Threads men's

clothing store. One of Sheehan's complaints at the time was the close proximity of the Long building's western wall. In an interview with the Record in September of 2000. Sheehan said the close proximity of the wall would not allow for routine maintenance of the building and ultimately it would fall into disrepair.

Presley said if possible, Sheehan would like to move the building






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






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Cambridge project shifts into crucial second phase

The second reading and possible adoption to amend the Northville city zoning ordinance to provide for planned-unit development zoning for Cambridge Place still remains, but Cambridge planners have a plan on how to proceed.

we will be going back before the historic district commission in order to have them finalize the building's colors. Cambridge planner Mark Guidobono said of one of the next steps. They have already approved the colors in

concept.

Cambridge design architect Greg Presley said the 113,578 square foot building will be designed and eventually constructed in such way that it will appear to be three, distinct buildings. Guidobono said there will be three different brick colors for each section.

Simultaneously, the planners will begin to design the floor plan for the five-story mixed-use development that is intended to be built on Cady Street. The project is proposed to be three stories of residential use and two stories of commercial and office space.

Guidobono said it could take two to three months to complete the floor plans.

Another eventual step will be the marketing aspect of the project that will begin this year. Guidobono said Cambridge will set up a sales center at location on Center Street. The sales center will have a model of the kitchen and bath facilities on display. Guidobono said the step in the pre-sale mode will give potential buyers an idea of what Cambridge's owner-occupied condominiums will look like.

According to city manager Gary

Word, there are several remaining issues to be worked out, the largest being the city-mandated reverter clause in the PUD agreement, as well as in the sales and development agreement. Northville officials mandated the clause in the event Cambridge didn't materi-

The purpose of the reverter clause is to have the property reverted back to the city. Word said because the city is required to pay Northville Downs Racetrack \$136,823 for selling land the land purposes other than public parking, the city is requiring

Cambridge to repay the city in the like amount should the property be reverted to the city in the event of default. Cambridge has not agreed to the clause.

However, Guidobono said Cambridge would agree to a clause, but needed to tweak the wording of the clause before an

agreement could be reached.

PUD extension is another issue that may be ongoing until the project is completed. Word said Cambridge has indicated the project will require advance marketing and pre-commitments for occupancy before construction can

begin. Cambridge planners have stated actual construction is not likely to begin for at least one to two years from approval. Since the PUD ordinance provides that construction shall be commenced within one year following approval. Cambridge will need to return to the planning commission at least once for an extension of the PUD prior to construction.

Give Electropolitan a chance to be heard

Northville Township: the entertainment capital of southeast Michigan?

That's the dream of Westland businessman George Marvaso, whose proposal to create a giant family-oriented entertainment multiplex in the township was first brought to the township's attention last week.

At first glance, the 140,000 squarefoot facility may appear to be entirely too large for Northville Township to absorb.

There are, however, several reasons the township and residents alike should give the Electropolitan a chance — especially since the project is still miles from even being formally

Let's start with the size issue. There's no getting around the fact that 140,000 square feet is a lot of space. But Ward Evangelical Presbyterian Church is nearly 60,000 feet larger than the proposed Electropolitan, and the township doesn't seem to be hurting on account of its presence.

There's the matter of proximity: being located along Five Mile Road would put the Electropolitan very close to easy freeway access both on Interstate 275/96, and also to M-14. Such placement would allow for easy in- and out-flow of traffic for folks just interested in visiting the venue and would prevent massive streams of traffic through the heart of the community. Conversely, persons interested in taking in Northville Township and the city of Northville would have but a short five-minute drive to escape the jazzy nightlife facility to the quieter digs of a city antiques shop.

Aesthetically, the facility (at least in artists' renderings) seems to be in step with use of traditional building mate- ing wrong with listening and a variety of rooflines prevent the proj- missed.

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ect from having a hulking uniform appearance.

The project has also received endorsements from the likes of state treasurer Doug Rothwell, Wayne County executive Ed McNamara and former U.S. Senator-turned Energy Secretary Spencer Abraham. Notable names, to be certain.

And while it shouldn't be the preeminent reason for doing so, there are some obvious dollars-and-cents advantages. The township stands to gain a sizeable amount of property tax revenue from the project, and the addition of jobs for both for the shortterm (construction) and long-term (employment / management) would be a major help in an ailing economy.

We're a little perplexed over the township's request that Mr. Marvaso be made to establish a doomsday-scenario plan, in the event he would opt to pull out of the project after the property in question was rezoned. To us, the solution for such a situation would be a matter of re-rezoning the property, or including language in an agreement with Mr. Marvaso which gives the township financial and legal leverage in the event the bottom would

In our opinion, communities have every right to expect maximum quality from developers, but not to ask them to write their own obituaries before they're even ill.

The Electropolitan came within a breath or two of being the pride and joy of neighboring Canton. It's too early to say whether or not the project would be good for Northville Township, but there's certainly nothrials. Brick is the order of the day, and the facts before it's categorically dis-

Reflections on Enron...

Modern American free market equity capitalism depends entirely on public confidence in three underlying propositions:

• The accuracy of statements of company earnings and net worth, as validated by the accounting profession.

The integrity of the recommendations

to buy or sell stocks, as rendered by analysts in the securities industry.

The clarity and even-handedness of the rules of the game whether the tax code or the regulatory environment — as set out by the government.

All three fundamentals have been seriously compromised by the events of the past several years, culminating in the Enron

What the Arthur Anderson accounting firm did at Enron is now widely known and easily condemned. The firm certified that Enron's financial statements accurately presented the profits, assets and debts of the company. But it turns out that Arthur Anderson helped invent and then accepted complex accounting tricks

into legal but deceptive partnerships. The point is not that Arthur Anderson is a particularly bad or unethical public accounting firm; it's not. Rather, it's that Arthur Anderson, like other accounting firms, has in recent years got into the

that inflated profits and tolerated moving

debt off the corporation's balance sheet

business of helping companies find ways to aggressively jigger financial statements to inflate profits and disguise debts, usually legally and "in accordance with generally accepted accounting standards.

This kind of activity is very profitable. But when the accounting firms - whose functional purpose in our economic system is to maintain public trust in the accuracy and integrity of financial statements — also engage in what might be called "earnings consulting," they immediately put themselves in a conflict of interest. This risks public confidence in the integrity of their audits.

The integrity of the securities industry also has been eroded as it has become clear that many of the market analysts who recommend that we buy or sell a given stock are also employed by the same Wall Street firms that profit by underwriting and selling that stock. According to the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal, these supposedly independent analysts often have issued recommendations on stocks underwritten by their own firms without revealing their own affiliations. Reporters found that the vast majority of these were "buy," even when the companies faced deteriorating business conditions.

So as long as the stock analysts are unwilling to fess up to their conflicts of interest, the public can no longer take their recommendations as independent.

Lastly, for our modern business culture to survive, people have to have confidence that the rules of the game are fair, evenhanded and understandable.

Fair? Even-handed? What did Enron spend all that money buying access to politicians for? To get the Commodity **Futures Trading Corporation (the relevant** regulatory federal agency) to turn the company lose to run an unregulated energy derivatives trading business. To pick members of the Federal Energy Commission. To sit in secret meetings with Vice President Dick Cheney in developing energy policy for the Bush Administration.

Understandable? Take a quick look at the U.S. tax code. Our tax laws are now so enormously complex and filled with exceptions, gimmicks and loopholes that no ordinary person has a chance of understanding them. Hence high-priced accounting consultants. Hence a political culture that trades campaign contributions for special interest access to writing the tax laws. Hence the hypocrisy of a Congress once delighted to accept campaign contributions from Enron now in full cry to pin blame on greedy Enron

Sure, Enron is a scandal. And there are lots of people to blame. Probably, there will be tinkering around the edges of the conflict of interest rules for accountants and stock analysts. I suspect these will in practice waste a lot of extra time and cause a lot of expense but not get at the root of the problem.

The real problem posed by the Enron mess is that it strikes to the heart of our modern economic system. I am very much afraid that the interest groups that have been so profitably involved - business executives, accountants, lawyers, Wall Street firms, Congress itself - will shy away from the kind of radical reform needed to restore confidence in our economic system.

described a program that sounds a lot like the others. Even President George Bush's education program revolves around the same basic concept.

The latest round came recently when the State Board of Education considered a plan for accreditation of schools put together by state Superintendent Tom Walkins. His idea is to look at six different areas of performance and hand out letter grades to school districts for their overall work. By his estimate, 1,100 schools across the state would get low grades, Ds and Fs.

But the Board of Education has questions about how this will work and put off until early March finalizing much of the plan's detail.

It was not the first delay by the state Board. Earlier Watkins had tossed out an accreditation plan put together by his predecessor so he could come up with his own system.

That left state House Education Committee chairman Rep. Wayne Kuipers (R-Holland) pretty frustrated. He said he'd have to put his own school accountability plan yet this spring.

Kuipers and the Republicans can be as frustrated as they want, but it should not be overlooked that his committee has had a proposal on the table since last spring and has done nothing with it. The state Senate put together its own "priority schools" package and passed it back then. It would target the lowest five percent of schools. sending in three-person assessment teams. Those teams would try to figure what's going wrong in a district and report back to a state education improvement board. The

happen to turn things around in a district. Gov. John Engler was frustrated with the

Board of Education after the recent delay too, and he started talking about abolishing the state board. But then Engler, has been involved in a power tussle with the board for years and he's done just about all he can to move programs away from its department and put them in offices he con-

Nonetheless, on the issue of accreditation, as state board members point out, the effort revise standards dates back almost 10 years under the governor's choice for superintendent was in place. If it's taken too long, much of the responsibility rests with Engler's own people.

The MEA came up with a plan for devising "State Directed Assistance Plans" for those struggling school districts. And Bush's "No Child Left Behind" act includes the same idea, calling for assistance to school districts that fail to meet state-set standards for two years.

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Dubuar Street residents weigh in on extension project

A group of historic trees overlooking a small valley just west of Dubuar Street will most likely be cut down in order for the construction of several new homes as well as a street extension.

Early last week, developer Frank Bauss was granted final lot split approval by the Northville city planning commission for his 0.83 acres of property just west of Dubuar. The current lot split plan calls for Dubuar to be connected to Caldwell Road.

Planning commissioner Marc Russell gave a vote in favor of the split primarily because the project met the required ordinances. However, he said keeping with the city's tree ordinance must remain a priority for Bauss. Other commissioners voiced an unfavorable position toward the project, pointing to the reasons of Wayne County stating the road must be a public, through one and the loss of a large number of trees. In addition, the overall commission attitude would like to see two houses built rather

than the permissible three, which Bauss said he would consider.

Bauss could not be reached for further comment.

In a 5-4 vote, the planning commission approved the split with the understanding the recommendations stated in commission consultant Don Wortman's memorandum would be adhered to as the project continues.

The recommendations include adding zoning classification of the township property to the west of the plans, continuing coordination of storm water management with the city engineer, requiring city administrative review of the northerly retaining wall to help preserve existing trees and coordinating the wall design after street improvements to the east portion of Dubuar are complete, continuing coordination of road design with city engineer and complying with city tree ordinance. Bauss must also install a sidewalk on the north side of Dubuar at his own expense. and finally, city staff and their attorney will review the water and right-of-way easement with posstble follow-up action.

The road connection was a sce-

nario some Dubuar area residents did not want to see happen. However, Northville public works director James Gallogly said Wayne County has required Dubuar be a normal city-owned, public street. County officials said that because of public, fire and safety issues, Dubuar should be linked to Caldwell, which Bauss had planned for originally. Caldwell is situated within Northville Township boundaries, making the county a party to any potential

connection to it. Gallogly said a thru-street was "the only thing the county would He said having a thrustreet was good for public reasons.

"Most of the residents in the area, specifically the ones on the south side of Dubuar, do not want this to happen." Dunlap Street resident Denise Nash said of the project. 

Caring for Oriental rugs is a snap

Some call it art under foot. Mondi Miller agrees: Beautiful Oriental rugs are art for the floor.

As owner of Heirloom Oriental Rugs in downtown Brighton, she knows peo-ple are often intimidated about caring for these treasures. But, they're more durable than one might think.

"It's very simple." Miller said of caring for an Oriental rug.

*Once people get over the fear over how delicate they are or how to care for it. they realize the most important thing is how they feel about it," she said.

Common sense is the best plan when caring for such an investment. Rugs should be vacuumed as frequently as the rest of the floors or carpeting. And just like carpeting, cleaning up spills immediately is crucial.

If there is a spill, it will usually bead up on the surface of the rug due to the lanolin in the wool. That's the time to scoop it up with a spoon. If any liquid is absorbed into the carpet, use a clean rag rung out in a diluted mixture of mild cleanser, like Ivory and water, to clean the spill. A clean, damp cloth works well to blot out the soapy mixture.

"It's real important to get to pet accidents quickly." Miller said. "The sooner the better."

If a stain has a chance to set, it's best to call a professional, she said.
Oriental rugs should be deep cleaned

periodically, according to Miller. Once a year, flip the rug and vacuum the back where dirt tends to work its way down.

It's also beneficial to rotate the rug every year or two so it wears evenly. especially in high-traffic areas, she said. Rotating the rug will also prevent the sun from fading colors, though many rugs made of wool and silk hold their color well.

A pad placed underneath the rug can also prevent wear. There are two kinds of

Purchasing an Oriental rug

Purchasing an Oriental rug can be a daunting task.

These woven works of art can be costly because of the materials used, the labor involved and the shipping needed to import them. An 8-foot-by-10-foot rug can take anywhere from a

year to a year and a half to be made. But choosing the rug that best suits a particular room may be the tricklest part of the buying process.

Proportion is one of the most important decisions in selecting an Oriental rug, according to Mondi Miller, owner of Heirloom Oriental Rugs in downtown Brighton.

It's hard to know exactly how the rug will work in the one's home. Until the rug is actually in the room, the customer may not know if it will look too big or too small. For that reason, Miller believes it's important for rug dealers to let customers try out rugs

When selecting a rug, coordinating a color scheme is important, according to Miller, but a dark-colored background may be better for hiding dirt and stains. Also, the design of the rug should be harmonious with fabric pat-

terns and accent pieces in the room. Heirloom Oriental Rugs recently moved into a new showroom and have expanded to offer home decorating accessories like lamps and vases so customers can more easily coordinate

pads available: One is for use on hardwood, marble or tile floors, while the other is meant to be used over carpeting. A pad keeps the rug in place so it won't slip and prevents creeping on carpeting.

A thorough professional cleaning needs to be done every five to six years for rugs in high-traffic areas like a foyer or family room and every 10-15 years in low-traffic areas like living rooms and bedrooms.

Miller suggests using a professional cleaner that's been specifically trained in Oriental rugs.



According to Mondi Miller, owner of Heirloom Oriental Rugs in Brighton, Oriental rugs should be vacuumed as frequently as carpet. Some people trim or cut the rug's fringe so it doesn't get caught in the vacuum when cleaning, but Miller cautions against cutting the fringe too short. "The fringe is part of what keeps the pile together," she said.

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

The love-hate nature of reverse mortgages

The reverse mortgage is becoming the love-hate loan instrument in this year's real estate market.

A reverse mortgage is primarily designed for senior homeowners (age 62 or older) who have acquired a substantial equity in their home. It's a special type of mortgage loan that lets the homeowner convert home equity into cash. Instead of homeowners making mortgage payments to the lender each month, the lender sends them a check (in most cases).

Actually, the loan can be paid to the homeowner in a lump sum, in a stream of payments, or line of credit. Most seniors like the idea of receiving the loan funds in monthly payments, with an arrangement (often involving an annuity) that allows the payments to continue until the last spouse dies or the

house is sold or the owner moves out. At that time, the house is sold and the loan plus interest and other costs are repaid.

in some cases, the agreement calls for the lender to receive a specified proportion of the property's appreciation in value when sold, as well as interest being charged. The appreciation is the difference between the appraised value at the time the reverse mortgage was contracted and the final sales price. The lender's share is typically 20 percent to 50 percent of the appreciated amount.

There in lies the rub. In some cases, due to the owners' death or new situations arising, the house is sold a few months or a year or two after the contract is signed. And the homeowner (or estate) must pay thousands or even tens of thousands of dollars for the short-term loan because of rapidly appreciating value.

More and more of these horror cases are surfacing and being publicized. This motivates seniors to take a closer look at reverse mortgages before signing for one, which is really a good thing.

On the other hand, many seniors praise their reverse mortgage for providing them with the extra monthly income needed to makes ends meet. Often those Social Security and pension payments just can't pay all the bills. The added income flow from a reverse mortgage makes up the difference.

The most popular type of reverse mortgage is federally insured and offered through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

A HUD report states: "Our plan can give older Americans greater financial security. Many seniors use the funds to ... meet unexpected medical expenses or make home improvements.

To be eligible for a HUD reverse mortgage, the homeowner must be; 62 years of age or older and have a very low outstanding mortgage balance, or own the home free and! clear. Also, the homeowners mustmeet with a representative of a HUDapproved counseling agency to be; sure they understand what a HUD

reverse mortgage will mean for them.

The most appealing aspect of this loan is that it doesn't become due until the home is sold, or is no longer the original owner's primary residence or the owners die. They cannot be forced to sell their. home to pay off the mortgage loan; even if the loan balance grows to exceed the value of the property. HUD's Federal Housing! Administration guarantees that the owner will receive all payments due to them.

The New York Times doesn't come right out and say it, but it clearly reflects an American media bias against violent video games: *But here the carnage on the screens has moved into the real world," reporter Nick Madigan quotes police as saying.

The police profess a causal relationship, an assumption that goes unchallenged throughout the story. He continues, "The trouble at cybercafés is not confined to Garden Grove." One might add that the trouble with gang violence is not confined to cybercafes.

You would think that ANY gangrelated murder would be a wakeup call to the town leaders of Garden Grove, whether it took place in a bar, an abandoned

warehouse or a slum apartment. Bruce A. Broadwater, the 60year-old mayor of Garden Grove, told the Times: "What's going on here? Are these cases places where hoodlums hang out, like pool halls in the old days?" I'm not sure where Mr. Broadwater has been, but I'm fairly sure hoodlums still do hang out in some pool halls.

Understandably, the Garden Grove City Council is considering restrictions on these cybercafes, such as requiring guards and closed-circuit surveillance cameras. Other proposals include enforcement of fire codes and restricting hours of operation.

However, the proposed moratorium on the opening of more cybercafes in Garden Grove reflects the public's need to find a scapegoat for gang violence, rather than addressing its underlying

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

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

More bang for your buck

Knowing that the American dollar is worth more in Canada is one thing, but exchanging those greenbacks for Canada's more colourful currency is another matter.

In fact, the Convention and Visitors Bureau of Windsor, Essex County & Pelee Island urges American shoppers to consider using their credit cards first, followed by ATM cards, the border currency exchange sites or a bank, in order to receive the fairest exchange rates.

Definitely don't rely on retail establishments, says Elizabeth Hamel of the bureau. Retailers don't offer a guaranteed exchange rate, she adds. In fact, it is entirely legal, if shortsighted, for merchants to offer no exchange at all. Such instances are rare, but Hamel's advice helps customers to avoid the possibility.


Egypt: The Gift of the Nile, a traveling exhibition from the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto, is showing until March 28.





But sometimes, the rules regarding customs duty and taxes can complicate the trans-

The following letter is typical of the kinds of questions Windsor-area furniture retailers receive. So we decided to forward the letter writer's queries to one of the experts at Coulter's Furniture.

The question and answer are below:

Dear Sir,

I'm an Italian resident working in: Michigan and living in Birmingham. I received your brochure Explore Windsor, and since I'm interested in buying furniture for my house, I would ask you the: following information:

'Museum without walls'

Ever wonder about those sculptures that grace Windsor's riverfront?

Flying Men

In Elisabeth Frink's sculpture, the viewer is presented with art in its most essentialized form.

Stripped of any ornament or stylistic conceit, the rough-textured Flying Men are held in straightforward action. They display raw plainness of a purely fluid motion.

As some critics have noted, Frink's art is without "theatrical fat," there is no "falsity of feeling." These figures move in simple pleasure. They illustrate the full realization. that they are physically and spiritually free.

About Elisabeth Frink

She was born in Thurlow, Suffolk, England in 1930. From 1947-1949 she attended the Guilford School of Art and from 1949-1953 she studied under Bernard Meadows and Willi Soukop at the famous Chelsea School of Art. Solo exhibitions of her work have been staged in most of the world's finest galleries. Among her best known works are the Eagle Lectern in Coventry Cathedral, Man on a Horse in Piccadilly Circus and the Kennedy Memorial in Dallas, Texas. Elisabeth Frink's honourary titles include degrees from Oxford University, the University of Surrey, University of Warwick, University of Exeter, and Cambridge University. She was awarded a Doctorate by the Royal College of Art in 1982. In 1990, a book entitled Elisabeth Frink: Sculpture and Drawing 1950-1990 was published in Washington, D.C. by the National Museum of Women in the Arts. The British Postal Service released a commemorative stamp honouring her as one of the outstanding women of the 20th Century, Elisabeth Frink died in 1993.

Department of Parks and Recreation

The official name of the disture by world renowned play is the Odette Sculpture Park and it's been described as a "museum without walls." It was made possible by the generosity of local philanthropists Mr. and Mrs. Louis Odette and is maintained by the Department of Parks & Recreation.

It is located along the riverfront at Ambassador and Centennial Parks.

The park showcases largescale, internationally recognized contemporary sculp-

artists. Windsor Parks and Rec, on its website (www.city.windsor.on.ca/par krec/), says Odette Sculpture Park "is about convergence and divergence, differences and similarities. The garden is about connections."

The park is open year round, free of charge.

Explore Windsor profiles the individual works of the artists to help visitors know the story behind the sculptures.

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

VISITOR INFO: IMPORTING FIREARMS, WEAPONS

Some restricted, prohibited

Any firearm or weapon brought into Canada must be declared or Customs will confiscate it and you could face criminal charges.

Those importing a firearm into Canada must be at least 18 years old or have a certificate or a permit that allows the possession of that firearm in Canada.

There are generally three types of firearms and weapons: Prohibited, restricted and nonrestricted. Not all firearms and weapons are allowed into Canada.

Non-restricted firearms, such as a sporting rifle or a shotgun, can be brought into the country for hunting purposes, use in competitions, as part of an in-transit movement through Canada, or for protection against wildlife in remote areas. No permit is required.

Visitors can import a restricted firearm only to attend an approved shooting competition. A Permit to Carry is required. Examples of restricted firearms are target pistols and short-barrelled, centre-fire, semi-automatic rifles or shotguns.

Prohibited weapons and firearms have no legitimate recreational use and cannot be imported into Canada. It is a criminal offence for any person to possess a prohibited weapon unless he or she is authorized by law.


