




Cops apprehend Northville man in \$10K burglary

Late in February, an unknown perpetrator stole more than \$10,000 in personal property from an unlocked vehicle and home on Shadbrook Drive in Northville Township.

However, a day after the larce-

arresting officer discovered several of the stolen items within Hwang's

Hwang was arraigned at 35th District Court House before Judge John MacDonald. He is expected to be bound over for circuit trial. Hwangs next court appearance for preliminary examination is slated ow, where it will be determined whether or not there is sufficient evidence to bound him over. According to Northville Township police detective William Helke, Hwang has confessed to the

After reviewing the case, Helke said preparing for unexpected crimes may be the surest way in preventing one.

*No matter how safe we perceive our community, you can never be 100 percent sure a crime will not be committed against you," Helke

Helke said Hwang gained access to the vehicle, garage and then the home because all three were unlocked at the time of the early morning robbery, which Helke described as an "open invitation" to criminals on the prowl. Hwang first took such items as a business briefcase containing computer equipment, credit cards, cash and camera from the vehicle. From there. Helke said he most likely observed the neighboring garage door open causing him to seize the next unlawful opportunity of snatching other goods like the sporting equipment stored within.

Hwang made several trips between his car and the unlocked home in which he stole several thousand dollars worth of personal property. Helke said during Hwang's home invasion, the homeowners were home at the time, but were asleep.

Bloomfield Township police stopped Hwang on a traffic violation and subsequently arrested him on an outstanding warrant. A search of his car turned up credit cards bearing names different than his own. Follow-up telephone calls to the card owners led police to learn they had been stolen the day before. The cards' owners were advised by Bloomfield Township police that Northville Township police were conducting an investigation of their own regarding the Feb. 26 thefts of cards.

The subsequent investigation conducted by detectives from both departments resulted in Hwang confessing to the crimes. A search warrant for Hwang's Northville home was then obtained by Northville Township, which turned up the remaining stolen items, all of which were recovered. Hwang is currently in the custody of the

Rec master plan gets mixed reviews Police Reports

Taken in the aggregate, support for the Northville recreation master plan seems to be strong, but once specifics are investigated, those opinions seem to vary.

Both the Northville city council and township board of trustees have adopted the plan that sets out a course for recreational planning for the next five years. However, both groups raised concerns about future planning and the prioritized capital improvement proj-

*Effective recreational planning is not what it used to be," city councilman and parks and recreation board member Thomas Swigart said. "It's an incredible challenge."

For the city council, the primary concerns revolved around the use of outdated standards for addressing the needs and determinig whether the plans in question met the needs for the community. Parks and recreation director Traci Sincock said the state's standards, established in 1983 by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, do not apply to many communities, but they must be complied with.

There is a diversity of desires within the community, so it is difficult to devise a plan," Mayor Chris Johnson said. "However, this does give us a focus so we can proceed."

Johnson said there should be an increased effort by the recreation department to hone in on volcing the need to state recreational decison makers to see the standards updated.

The township board expressed concerns over the placement in priority for upcoming projects, such as Thayer Corners and Northville Community parks.

"Some things should be worked on sooner because the property may diminish with time," board trustee Mary Gans said in reference to Thayer Corners potential to become a nature park, which in the plan's capital improvement schedule is proposed to be worked on in 2006.

Township planning consultant Jennifer Frey and Sincock both said the document can be amended in the future, which it was three times for the prior plan. Sincock said for the moment, the plan serves two functions for planning and seeking grants.

The recreation commission said this is a fluid document," board trustee and recreation commission liaison Brad Werner said. "It is primarily for the state to get something in place."

The plan was embraced by the recreation commission by 4-3 vote in favor of adoption. Some of the commissioners wanted additional time to review some layout and formatting modifications as well as allowing the further incorporation of the public hearing into the plan. Commissioners were directed to submit any final comments to the city council and board of trustee liaisons prior to the adoption decisions.

In response to the board's concerns, township supervisor Mark Abbo asked Sincock to have the recreation commission review the priorities in the capital improvement schedule section of the plan.

NO SUCH THING AS A FREE LUNCH: According to a Northville Township police report, a larceny was committed at Northville High School on Feb. 13 with the student identification of a 17-yearold student. The stolen ID was discovered after a 15-year-old student attempted to use it to buy lunch. He said he did not steal it. but found it in the locker room.

The 17-year-old has decided not to press charges against his fellow classmate. The school said the incident will be treated as a school discipline.

SCRAP WITH SCRAPS: Two construction workers were involved in an altercation on Feb. 22 in a new subdivision on Springwater Drive in Northville Township. A township police report stated that a 32-year-old

Taylor man, had been punched in the face by a co-worker, a 28-yearold Royal Oak man. The two had been exchanging heated words and the Royal Oak man claimed the other threw a piece of wood at him, to which he reacted by throwing a punch. The Taylor man was hit in the left eye by the punch. There were no witnesses and the case remains open.

Country Club poised for makeover

The hope of Country Club Village residents is that Northville resident Bob Kunkel will be able to breathe new life into the development itself, as well as the golf course.


Residents like Judy Costigan said there is a need to improve Country Club Village and its ninehole golf course, and she believes Kunkel has the ability to do it.

I think I can speak on behalf of all three home-owners associations by saying we are in support of Kunkel's plan to bring an affordable restaurant in, bring back the beauty and playability of the course. And I think developing the property along Haggerty with the condominiums is the best option for that parcel." Costigan said. "We are looking forward to supporting Mr. Kunkel and his partners in their endeavors.

A public hearing regarding the project was held on Feb. 26 at Northville Township planning commission meeting. The overall residential sentiment seemed to be in support of Kunkel's plan.

"I think the residents are hopeful that Mr. Kunkel can breathe new life into the golf course and return that development to what it was originally intended to be," township planning commission chairperson Lisa Anderson said.

the northeast corner of the village. He said the improvements should be a success because of the expert-

ise of himself and his two partners. "It should be a win-win-win situation for the Country Club Village residents. Northville Township and ourselves," Kunkel said. "The professional experience and background of myself and my partners Frank Garzia and George Dimopoulos gives each new aspect the expertise required to give the entire project a whole new look."

Kunkel is the owner of Livonia's Pro Golf Caddy Shack, Garzia owns two golf courses as well as managing three others, and George Dimopoulos has an extensive hisminiums on a 2.8-acre parcel at tory in managing restaurants and

he recently opened up a new restaurant in Dearborn named George and Harry's Blues

Restaurant. Anderson sald in order for Kunkel's plan to proceed there must be an amendment to the zoning of the development to allow the residential units to be constructed. The village is zoned planned residential unit development, which is a special zoning that allows the developer to work outside of the ordinances with the consent of the planning commission. Anderson said the village PRUD, which was originally built in the late 1980's and early 1990's, was the township's first attempt at creating a PUD type development.

The village had been perceived to have been fully developed, but Kunkel saw opportunity on an vacant tract of land along the vil-

lage's eastern edge.
"Mr. Kunkel has come forward with an interesting proposal to develop approximately 2.8 acres on the site along Haggerty Road." Anderson said. "He's proposing to build 10 residential unit, similar in style and appearance to the units currently existing in Country Club Village. In addition, Mr. Kunkel is asking permission to convert the banquet facility and club house to a full-service family restaurant."

One of the more important details is Kunkel's plan to make the course's greens greener and overall course options more diverse.

"We want to get the course.

which is currently a little run down, back in mint condition. Kunkel sald.

He said restoring the greens and installing a first-rate watering system will be immediate priorities. Additional elements, such as a golf academy, lessons and instruction, a new pro shop with golf pros as well as league play, will give the course a look and feel that has not been there for some time. He expects to debut the new-look course early this summer.

The proposed residential units will be of two types: ranch and a two-story model. The ranch model will be 1,900 square feet and the other will be 2.300 square feet. Each unit will have a two car garage and eight of the 10 will have walk-out basements.

The zoning amendment has been delayed because Kunkel said there remain legal terms to work out with the current owner of the course and restaurant. He said he was confident they will be handled before the next township meeting on March 12. Anderson said prior to placing the final zoning amendment decision in the hands of the board of trustees, the commission must feel confident the plan will conform with township standards for setbacks and water detention.

Bigger dollars has Downs' thinking capital improvement

Odds are Northville Downs Race Track is feeling pretty good after seeing live wagering increase at the harness racing establishment late in 2001.

Downs' director of operations Lou Carlo said the increase was good to see. He attributed the increase to the mild-autumn and winter weather the area experienced last October through December.

"In a way, we go as the weather goes," Carlo said. "The large increase is mostly due to the fact that the weather during our 2000 season was much worse on the track conditions than this current season. However, it is good to see the turn-up. It has boosted morale."

According to statistics at the Michigan's

Commissioner's Office, live wagering at the Downs went up 19.9 percent compared to 2000. Carlo said the increase was an exciting thing, but he said there was new competition wagering outlets needed to keep tabs on. He said the introduction of the Detroit casinos has had a negative effect on their operation, but he said the casinos have not done enough to put them out of business.

"Yes, it is competition, but everyone has competition in one way or another," Carlo said. "It's not necessarily a bad thing though because the atmosphere here has its own unique style."

With the increase in wagering and subsequent profits. Carlo said the Downs would push forward with what he termed as a serious capital improvement pro-



Six / Sheldon condo developer ups house count to 96

By Lon Huhman

There was a slight disagreement between Northville Township and Pulte Land Development over where the future fire station would be placed in the area along Six Mile Road between Beck and Sheldon roads.

However, the point of contention has been resolved to the liking of both parties. Pulte's project, called Woodlands South, calls for the creation of 96 singlefamily homes or duplexes in the vicinity of the southwest corner of Six Mile and Sheldon roads. Pulte went before the township planning commission and board

of trustees to ask for the permission to

add one more home to the project plan. which was granted. Township trustee Mary Gans said he was glad to see one more duplex added rather than more road space because of its enhancement fea-

The earlier dispute was over the fact that the township was considering modifying its open space agreement with Pulte to change the designation of the property donated to the township from park/recreational use to public use. Late in 2001, the township had made it known to Pulte of the possible designation change. Pulte president Howard Fingeroot then conveyed the message that Pulte was wholeheartedly against the change because it went against the original donation agreement that the land would be used only for recreational purposes. Fingeroot had said the public use change, which would have enabled a fire station to be constructed on the donated six acres, may cause challenges for Pulte in the company's future sales efforts of their duplexes.

*Pulte was adamant that it remain park use." Northville township manager Chip Snider said. "It will remain park, but there is now a possibility that land further to the west will be used for the development of a new fire station."

Snider and township planner Maureen Osiecki both said nothing is definite regarding the possibility of the fire station being developed on the property currently

located further to the west of Sheldon in Millennium Park. Both said the donated park land may be used for soccer fields. and that the new fields would conceivably replace the fields the station would climinate, if built.

Despite the tentative decisions for the station and soccer fields. Pulte and the township have reached concrete decisions on several other project details. Pulte has agreed to comply with the planning commission's recommendations and complete the Sheldon Road bike path and the Six Mile bike path from Woodlands' south entrance to Sheldon Road, in accordance with the other current township bike path specifications. In addition, Pulte would

Johnson Creek support grows

It didn't take long for House Bill 5556 to be approved.

The bill involved adding Johnson Creek to the newly designated number of miles of quality trout streams in Michigan, which gives the Michigan Department of Natural Resources the ability to specify the types of fishing lures and bait to be used, as well as the size and number of fish taken. In Michigan, the number of designated miles has tentatively been increased from 100 to 212.

"Passage of House Bill 5556 increases the possibility that Johnson Creek can get the designation that will provide a quality resource for generations to come. House Representative John Stewart, R-Plymouth.

White Lake Rep. Mike Kowall (R) said the House's approval is just "phase one" and said there remained work to do, including

state Senate, signed by the governor and then actually sitting down with the DNR and Natural Resources Committee to go through the exact details of what the designation will mean, which will include researching the Johnson Creek watershed to determine whether or not the trout are sufficiently reproducing and if the creek is actually "fishable." Kowall said he believes the work can be done just as thoroughly and quick-

Kowall said the passage effectively locks in the intent of his own amendment.

"The Johnson Creek watershed is a step closer to having an additional level of oversight and protecagainst environmental threats," Patterson said. "I was happy as floor leader to put this bill before the House as soon as possible, and with the help of representatives Kowall and Stewart. get the support needed."



gence conclusions — specifically, environmental ons — were an attempt to drive down the sale price. K/LB's \$5 million good faith deposit has been returned to them causing the land purchase agreement to be nullified.

Bob Berg, spokesman for Detroit mayor Kwame Kilpatrick, said in a nutshell, K/LB wanted the price reduced. Berg said it was Kilpatrick's view that if K/LB did not want to pay the full asking price then the city would not sell the property.

"He is not in a rush to sell it." Berg said of Kilpatrick's opinion on the future of the property. It is the last major piece of undeveloped property in Wayne County and we believe it is worth every bit of the \$50 million.

Berg said the city would now conduct a "more detailed" appraisal of the property, but there was no time schedule for the city to accept new

The objectionable environmental concerns raised in study conducted by NTH Consultants, Ltd. for K/LB included:

• The possible health risks posed by the pesticides and herbicides utilized on defunct fruit orchards.

 Documented evidence that groundwater from Onyx Ann Arbor Hills Landfill. located on Napier across from the property, has migrated onto the property.

· A parcel of the property had

been formerly used as a shooting range, which could pose lead contamination risks to the surface soils and water.

• Several areas were identified to have been sites for extensive surface dumping, with the possibility of buried refuse.

The wetlands study was carried out by Tilton and Associates, Inc. of Ann Arbor. Tilton's report disclosed that approximately 232.7 acres of the property is made up of wetlands, 227 acres of which are regulated wetlands. In addition, it concluded 204 acres are located in a 100-year flood plain and nearly 200 are woodlands.

Tilton also deduced that out of the acreage, only 451 acres are considered "developable," and 190 acres are considered "developable with restrictions and 226 are con-"undevelopable." amount of regulated wetlands and

Furthermore, the report stated the flood plain areas far exceeds that which K/LB was led to believe existed by preliminary reports, and as K/LB had been advised, that which the city believed to exist. Its final conclusion stated the amount and scattered nature of the areas dramatically impaired K/LB's ability to develop the property.

Antone said K/LB is still interest-

ed in the property, but only if the price would be reduced.



Notorious Record letter-writer Galli dies at age 89

And yet, Alfred Galli's local distinction went beyond his letter writing to the Northville Record .

Galli, a Northville resident since the early 1950s, died on Monday at age 89, whose years his son said were packed with care and love as well as plenty of reading and letter writing. Alfred Galli is survived by his son, Robert, and his two daughters, Roberta and Susan as well as five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Before my mother's death she had been a resident at the

Whitehall nursing home [in Novi] and my father used to visit the home to be with her, but he also went there to visit with everyone else," Robert Galli said. "Even after her death, he continued to visit Whitehall, as well as at the American House and Addington Place. He would go to these places and play old songs on the plano for the residents, which he did almost everyday up until three weeks ago. He considered all these people close friends and I'm sure they thought of him in the same way."

Galli's wife, Freda, died in 1997. "He lived a colorful life and he was always politically involved — especially in his letter-writing."

inspire conversation and discourse. Not only did he encourage our family to think independently. ask questions and find out answers for ourselves, but also everyone else. That's what he aimed for in his letter writing - to get people to think for themselves."

Born in 1913 in the town of Manziana, Italy, Galli later moved with his parents back to America to the coal mining town of Apollo. Pa., where his father worked as a coal miner in local mines. Both Galli and his wife were registered nurses, specifically working in the psychiatric field.

Galli and his wife moved to

Galli's son said. "He wanted to Detroit in 1941, where he worked as an industrial nurse for Chrysler and later in 1952 to Northville after both of them received positions at the Northville Psychiatric Hospital. He earned his RN in 1937, and his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in nursing service administration at Wayne State University. In Northville, Galli served as the Director of Nursing Services and Education.

He retired from the hospital in the late 1960s, only to perform further nursing work at the Outer Drive and Botsford hospitals. Galli was the assistant director of nursing at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills.

Robert Galli said his father will be remembered as a loving father. a great communicator and someone who genuinely cared.

He was a friend and advisor to the world as well, as a hell of a poker player," his son said in memory of his father.

Record editor Chris Davis, who regularly received Galli's letters. said he would remember Galli fondly. Davis had the chance to interview Galli at his home while working as a reporter at the Record.

*Alfred was a thinker and the kind of person who had a very global view of things," Davis said. His letters certainly drew a lot of

fire from those who didn't share his viewpoint, but I happen to believe that's what he wanted. He wanted to generate discussion and discourse. Wherever he is now, I'm sure his pen and paper aren't far


behind." Funeral and memorial services were held privately for family and close friends only. Galli's ashes will be returned to his boyhood home in Pennsylvania.



Students given insight into smoking danger

Just say no.

After visiting the Health Exploration Station at the St. Joseph Mercy-Canton Health Center March I, eighth grade stu-dents from Meads Mill Middle School discovered the dangers of drug use and smoking and plan to use that information to create their own anti-smoking cam-

"What we're hoping they're going [to learn] today is how drugs. specifically tobacco. affects their body." said Meads Mill teacher Kathleen Mroz.

Mroz also said the students will be doing research at school about how elgarettes are made, how they are sold, and the health effects that can result from smok-

Ultimately they are going to come up with a project to convince their peers not to use tobacco in any form," said Mroz. "In this team, it's going to a PSA or a poster. The other team has already created T-shirts."

Aging school sewer systems may get lift

Michigan voters will likely to be asked to approve a \$2 billion bond issue on this November's election ballot to fix aging municipal sewer systems and deteriorating school buildings

Members of the Senate Republican caucus recently unveiled plans to put the question to an election this fall.

· But whether it will appear as one ballot question or two is still a matter of debate.

'I don't see the nexus between the two issues." Rep. Bruce Patterson (R-Canton) said. "I would not want to see a coalition come forward in an attempt to kill one or the other and end up eliminating both."

Sen. Leon Stille (R-Spring Lake) advocates keeping them together. Both issues need to be addressed and together they have

a better chance of being passed," explained Lynell Shooks, legislative aide to Stille. This way you'll have multiple communities coming forward to support this because one of the proposals will be good for them, or both."

Half of the money raised through the bond issue would be made available for loans to municipalities through the State Revolving Fund for the construction or upgrading of sewer systems. It is intended to address aging sewer systems that have been failing in recent years, cause sewage to overflow into surface waters. Patterson and Sen. Ken Sikkema (R-Grandville) argue that much more is actually

The other half would be made available to school districts for low interest loans for the construction of new schools. In

recent years, voters have been reluctant to approve bond issues for the construction of schools. As a result, the buildings in many districts are aging and deteriorat-

Part of the problem, Shooks said, is that in some districts the tax base is too small to allow them to pay off the bonds needed for new schools?

Any school district could apply to use the state bond funds, but poor districts would get the best interest rates. The poorest would be allowed to take loans at zero percent interest, Shooks said.



NHS students gear up for robotic wars

In late March, the Robotics team from Northville High School will be vying for victory as the team-built robot flexes its muscle in the Great Lakes Regional Competition, sponsored by the group For the Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology.

The competition will take place March 21-23 at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti and dozens of teams are expected to attend.

The Robotics team joined forces with engineers from the Robert Bosch Corporation and even assembled their robot at their Farmington Hills facility.

We worked with the Robert Bosch engineers at the Hills Tech Center to create the robot in as close to a simulated work force environment as possible," said Nick Moroz, a NHS senior and cocaptain of the Robotics team. They make up a large part of the backbone of the team.

Northville High School teacher James Conzelman said Bosch is a main sponsor for the team. Ford Motor Company also contributed, he said.

Moroz said the robot has gained a nickname, due to its appearance and maneuverability.

We like to refer to it as The Crab'," he said. "It has two large arms that swing in and swing out like crab claws and [can] grab two

180 pound goals."

He also said the robot has four main wheels that can each turn 90 degrees, thereby giving it crabwalking capabilities.

Moroz said it was beneficial to work and interact with engineers

as the team assembled its robot.
"We [got] to see what they work on in their jobs," he said. "We worked with mechanical engineers and electrical engineers."

Paul Winter, a NHS junior and Robotics team member, said, They told us what they knew."

During the regional competi-tion, teachers from Northville High School and engineers from Bosch will be present as the team robot contests for the best results.

Team members said the robot will be judged on its speed, maneuverability and its adept-ness at completing specific tasks. "The main idea is teamwork."

said Winter.

Northville High School students will also be traveling to Orlando, Fla. to contend at the national level competition.

"It's like the Olympics in a lot of ways, especially when you get to Florida," said Conzelman. "Disney World goes all out. They support this 100 percent."

Lansing debates cell phone use in schools

Although state representatives voted to end a five year old ban on cell phones and pagers in schools, the final version was "watered down" enough to make

the bill sponsor angry.
Rep. Wayne Kuipers (R-Holland) complained that House Bill 4991 had been changed, to allow the ban to continue in districts where school boards do not want to adopt a policy regulating "personal communication devices," before it was passed Wednesday, Feb. 27. His original draft would have required each district to craft its own policy.

"We were trying to give them local control," he said. "But there are a lot of boards that don't want to deal with the issue. It is easy to hide behind a state policy and say. There is nothing we can do about it.' We wanted them to step up and address the issue."

The ban on pagers and cell phones was adopted in 1998 when students in some districts were using them to arrange drug deals.

"It's a different day now, a new century," Kulpers said. "Some parents give their children these devices to keep track of them after school and for emergency reasons.

Kulpers expects that school boards will adopt policies ban-ning use of the cell phones in class or during the regular school day. The current statewide ban would not even allow students to carry cell phones in their backpacks for use after

The initial request for an end the ban came from Schools Clarenceville Superintendent Tom Tatten, who explained parents there wanted their children to have phones so they could call parents to be picked up when after school activities concluded.

Rep. MaryAnn Middaugh (R-Paw Paw) offered an amendment that would leave the state ban in place unless school boards adopt local policies regarding their use.

The change was spurred by school principals who didn't want the responsibility of creating their own policy in the absences of a state law," according to the House Republican Communications office.

"Local school boards and Parent/Teacher Associations are where decisions like cell phone usage ought to be fought," Kulpers said. "I'm disappointed that some school administrators want local control only on their own terms."



Rouge health to be measured by amphibian count

They'll be making a list and checking it twice.

No, these people aren't Santa's helpers. They are volunteers for the Fifth Annual Rouge River Watershed Frog and Toad Survey.

For a few minutes on damp evenings from March through July, volunteers will venture to different areas in the Rouge Watershed to identify and record which species of Michigan frogs and toads they hear. They will complete forms detailing which species they find and which ones they don't.

"Amphiblans (frogs and toads) are sensitive to water quality." said Sally Petrella, public involvement coordinator for Friends of the Rouge. "We're using it (the data) to

assess the health of the Rouge.

"If the frogs and toads can't survive, there's a problem."

For this reason, it is important for volunteers to record which species of amphibtans they do not hear. This tells the Friends of the Rouge that the volunteer listened for the frog or toad but did not encounter it.

Salem, which is in the headwaters (or beginning) of the Rouge, has the highest number of amphibian species in the watershed, Petrella said. Survey participants found eight species of frogs and toads in Salem Township last year.

A welcome finding last year was a greater number of leopard frogs in the Rouge Watershed than in 2000. The leopard frog has been disappearing from Michigan for unknown reasons, she said.

A survey by the Michigan Department of

Environmental Quality also indicated the presence of more leopard frogs in the state.

Throughout the Rouge Watershed, volunteers found that the most common amphiblan was the American toad. Volunteers should especially stay on the lookout for sounds of the Blanchard's cricket frog, a threatened species, Petrella said.

This rare amphibian has not been found yet in the Rouge Watershed, but some could be living there. If a volunteer hears a Blanchard's cricket frog, he or she should notify the Friends of the Rouge right away so the call can be verified.

Other frogs and toads volunteers could encounter include green frogs, bullfrogs, spring peepers, wood frogs, Western chorus frogs, pickerel frogs, Cope's gray tree frogs and Eastern gray tree frogs.

The two types of gray tree frogs are very

difficult to tell apart, she said. Friends of the Rouge does not ask volunteers to identify them for this reason.

Volunteers can choose any area of wetlands in the Rouge Watershed to observe at least twice a month during the study period. Some have wetlands in their back yards, Petrelia said. Others travel to parks, public land or nature preserves.

Each volunteer or team of volunteers is responsible for monitoring a survey block, or a quarter of a square mile. Friends of the Rouge can use hundreds of people to participate in the Frog and Toad Survey because of how large the watershed is, she said.

The Rouge River Watershed extends from west of Detroit to Northville and Salem. It also runs north to Bloomfield and Troy, includes a small portion of Rochester Hills and extends to Romulus and Van

Buren.

In 2001. Friends of the Rouge had almost 400 volunteers for the Frog and Toad Survey. The number of survey blocks and teams doubled from the year before.

The best times to listen for amphibian calls is when temperatures are greater than 46 degrees Fahrenheit and the weather is damp but not windy or pouring rain.

Adults and children alike can volunteer to help. Girl Scout and Boy Scout groups have participated in past years. Petrellä said a parent or other adult should accompany children to make sure the forms are completed.

Friends of the Rouge staff members hold free training sessions in different communities to teach volunteers how to perform the survey.



It had better. The changes coming are significant. Automakers will have to retool 10 engine plants located here in Michigan and five transmission plans. Those plants keep 27,000 employed.

There's more. Switching over to fuel cells, which run on hydrogen, will mean all those filling stations out there are going to have to be refitted to deliver a difference type of fuel to vehicles.

Rothwell however pointed out an interesting bit of information. If the government started by transitioning mass transit and military transport over to fuel cells. that alone would account for 25 percent of our fuel needs and "would virtually eliminate imports."

Another place we can look for hints about what's coming is a report on fuel cells issued last August, largely overlooked at the time, by the MEDC.

Among its recommendations were: · Creation of an alliance, a group of

automakers, component suppliers, fuel suppliers and the government to chart the state's course through the transition.

· Establishing a hydrogen infrastructure group to work out how fuel would get distributed.

· That the state be a leader in testing and demonstrating fuel cell vehicles. Studying what kinds of economic

incentives will spur development and sales of fuel cell cars.

One of the most intriguing aspects of about what the plan entails. the report, however, was its explanation of "Stay tuned," was about all Doug how the fuel cell industry is expected to

mature from expensive, first generation fuel cells to cheap, plentiful third generation fuel cells capable of powering cars.

First generation fuel cells are expected to be on the market in 2003, according to the report. "Standby power is the primary application of premium or specialty fuel cells for use in hospitals or other businesses highly sensitive to power disruptions. Due to the high value placed on uninterrupted power delivery, this market could justify costs in the \$1,000 per kilowatt price range," the report states.

We won't see third generation fuel cells for cars on the market for 10 years or more, but there is a second generation five to seven years out for what the report called "stationary applications." And the report really didsn't explain what that

Rep. Mike Kowall (R-White Lake) has been researching fuel cells and offers one possible explanation: As he describes it, fuel cells could be used to power your house. With a hydrogen-powered electric generator in the basement, you could unplug from the utilities and have all the heat, lighting and hot water you want. No more concern about rate increases or power outages. A California-style energy crisis would be out of the question.

Fuel cells have been talked about mainly as a power source for cars. But the part, I think, that has potential to "knock their socks off is that they could also be used to power homes and businesses - a market much larger than just car sales.



All petitions and affidavits are due Monday, April 8, 2002, at 4 p.m. to Northville Public Schools Business Office, Second Floor, 501 W. Main St., Northville, Mich. 48167. The office may be reached at (248) 344-8444.

• The candidate must be a registered voter in the Northville Public School District.

Each petition circulator must be a registered voter, not necessarily in the school district. All signatures must

be made in the presence of the circulator. · All blanks on the upper portion of the petition must be filled out prior to circulating. The petition should not be signed by the circulator until after all signatures have

been collected. · A petition signer must be a registered voter in the Northville Public School district.

· No more than fifteen signatures can be on any one

 All signature blanks (name, street number, post office and date) should be filled in by the person signing. the petition. The post office category can include the ZIP

· Persons signing the petition may use initials for first and middle name even if registered using their full name. If their registration is signed (not printed), however, they must sign (not print) their name on the petition. They may print only if that is how their official registration signature appears. Persons may only sign as many petitions as there are board positions open (i.e. two board vacancies, can only sign two petitions)

A separate petition must be used for each municipali-

ty signatures are collected in (i e. City of Northville, Township of Northville, Novi, Salem Township). Also a separate petition is required for residents in the same city but different county (i.e. Wayne portion of Northville and Oakland portion of Northville). You do not need to collect signatures from more than one city or county.

• Twenty valid signatures are required for a person to be placed on the ballot. You are encouraged to obtain at least five additional signatures to help ensure that at least 20 will be valid. The business office will make every effort to validate signatures as soon as possible so that in the event more names are needed you will have time to file additional petitions.

 In addition to petitions, you are also receiving two Affidavits of Identity. These must be filled out completely, notarized and turned in with your petitions. Also, there is an Affidavit as to Change of Name. If you have changed your name, other than through marriage, in the past 12 years, this form must also be turned in with the petitions.

 When you turn in your petitions and affidavits you will receive a receipt for them. If you want copies of your petitions, please arrange in advance.

• You have until April 11 at 4 p.m. to withdraw your name from the ballot.

. Once you file your petitions, you become a candidate and as such you will be required to file certain campaign statements as required under the Michigan Campaign Finance Act.



"Cash-strapped consumers will pay about \$800 million in RAL charges alone to borrow their own money," said Jean Ann Fox, director of consumer protection for CFA. "Refund anticipation loans are extremely expensive. similar to payday loans, rent to own, and other forms of fringe credit.

RALs are short-term loans secured by the taxpayer's projected refund. Consumers pay three fees to get an RAL: a fee to a commercial tax preparer for preparing state and federal returns. (from \$60 - \$300), a fee for electronic filing (with the average fee being \$40), and a loan fee to lender, typically set on a sliding scale based on the amount of the anticipated refund.

What the consumer receives in hand is the refund minus the loan fee, tax preparation fee and electronic filing fee. The total amount of three fees, according to the study, can range from \$129 to \$429. This in some cases may be a third to half or more of the refund.

So what's the appeal? Speed and convenience.

RALs do expedite receipt of cash from tax refunds, but not nearly enough to justify the amount paid. The RAL puts a check in the consumer's hand within a day or two. File electronically and you'll get your refund in about 10 days. Fine by mail, and it will take six to eight weeks.

Consumers who are willing to pay what amounts to triple-digit interest rates are generally either unaware of the true cost or have serious financial problems which call for counseling.

Before assuming an RAL, consider your options before surrendering more than the cost of a postage stamp to secure your refund. Also, consider whether you would be able to repay the RAL (which you are obligated to do) if the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) determines that you are not entitled to the refund amount claimed.

For low-income taxpayers, the IRS offers free tax preparation services under the Volunteer income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. VITA sites can be found in community centers, libraries, churches and retirement homes. For information VITA and Community Outreach locations and times, contact the IRS Taxpayer Education Coordinator at your local IRS office or call (800) 829-1040.

The IRS also lists several free online tax preparation services for eligible taxpayers, based on household income and need. Visit www.irs.gov for a list of participating companies.

And finally, seek financial counseling. Your credit union or bank is a good place to begin. Often financial institutions have staff dedicated to assisting members on the road to financial health.



Clint Alexander is new football coach

There is going to be a new face on the Northville Mustangs football team sidelines this fall. That face belongs to recently appointed head coach Clint Alexander.

Besides the character and class of the existing Northville players as well as the prospects waiting to give varsity football a go. Alexander said that there is plenty of athleticism to turn into a toprated program.

There are some excellent athletes at Northville," Alexander said. The young men that I have met at the school seem very excited and are looking forward to working very hard. I think every football coach wants to see bigger and stronger players, and I certainly do too.

Not to mention Alexander and his assistant coaches are going to want to see if they can't force the Northville players' parents to spend a little hard-earned cash.


The score came on a blast from the blue line to make it 2-2. In the third period both teams had some great chances to break the game


the District tournament and the Regional tournament.

Down on the farm

Women are partners in today's life on the farm

WILSON TOWNSHIP, Mich. - A woman's role in a farming operation varies as greatly as the differences among women, but Carolyn Wegmeyer believes every farm woman is an important partner in a challenging business.

Wegmeyer and her husband, Fred, currently have 70 Holstein dairy cows, and they have had as many as 110.

Together they have raised two children. Tyler and Timeen. who have grown and moved away from the farm.

Now Wemeyer's only babies are newborn calves. They are housed near the dairy barn in igloo-shaped

Every morning, one of her chores is to take water and feed to the young animals.

It is a time-consuming job because the babies don't know how to drink from a pail. Wegmeyer teaches them by getting them to practice on her fingers dipped in

They'll stay in the igloos for four or five weeks before being moved to the heifer barn or sold.

Wegmeyer didn't grow up on the farm, but learned as she went along after she married.

It was a difficult move for her, but she was determined to find her niche. Now she wouldn't have it any other way.

"I've met so many amazing farm

women throughout the years Where else do you find women who may have a profession of her own and still is a very valid partner in agriculture?" Wegmeyer said.

Many farm women find it necessary to work other full-time jobs to supplement a fluctuating agricultural market.

"There are challenges, but they're not negatives. One of them for dairy farmers is the fluctuating milk check." Wegmeyer said. "You may have sent the same number of pounds of milk, but your milk check is lower because the price of milk has gone down.

When one of the partners works off the farm, that paycheck fills in the budget gaps that often occur due to weather, the market, and increasing health care insurance

Wegmeyer has worked as a mental health counselor, but right now she's back in school working toward a masters degree. She also manages the farm books and has learned that many women are taking on more primary roles.

Many farm women do work off

the farm; however, it's really interesting that half the females graduating from animal sciences at the university are going into agriculture themselves and not just marrying a farmer." Wegmeyer said.

Whatever role the woman plays on the farm, though. Wegmeyer believes women provide a necessary balance in the operation. That is primarily because it's physically and mentally impossible for one person to plan for and work the farm alone.

Much of the decision-making process in the Wegmeyer operation is done at breakfast.

*Usuaily I do the heifer barn and my calves, and he'll do morning milking. Then when we come in for breakfast that's when we plan, Wegmeyer said.

Having short- and long-term goals is important to the Wegmeyers, and they've come to depend on each other for informa-

"It may be something we've read or something we want to try." Wegmeyer said. The couple then discusses the feasibility of a new idea and whether to go ahead with

They also plan the week's schedule and work load, with each of them taking specific jobs. Wegmeyer's workload, besides going to school, includes taking care of the approximately 50 heifers and various numbers of calves that they have the year around, plus overseeing the cleaning of the dairy glass-

"My house may get messy, but not the barn." Wegmeyer said.

She adds that attitude is impor-

tant when working on the farm.

There are so many blessings on the farm. Where else can you work while birds are chirping in the morning? Wegmeyer said. These are things that get you in touch with the simplicity of living."

A. You have a reverse-painted lamp. They were popular in the early 1900s and made by several major companies, including Pittsburgh Lamp Company, Handel and Phoenix Glass. Reverse-painted lamps were often sold through mail order catalogs.

Your lamp was made around 1910 to 1920 and would probably be worth about \$1,500 to \$2,000.

Q. I would like some information and also the value of my teapot. It belonged to my father and has been in my family for about 70

It stands 5 inches tall and is in excellent condition. I have enclosed a drawing of the mark on the bottom of the teapot.

A. Epiag in Pirkenhammer,

Q. I have a jardiniere that was made by Weller Pottery Company. It is the Tutone pattern and stands over 8 inches tall. I found a photo of it in a Weller reference book, but it was a reprint from an old catalog and there was no price listed.

Could you please help me? A. Weller Pottery Company was located in Zanesville, Ohio, from 1872 to 1948. They produced their Tutone pattern in the 1920s. Although berries, flowers, and arrowhead shaped leaves were often the motif of the Tutone pattern, there were exceptions.

Your jardiniere would probably be worth about \$175 to \$250.

They are heavy ironstone, decorated with a brown band on the border, and a tea leaf in the center of each plate. Marked on the back of the dishes are a lion and a unicorn on either side of a crest. The words "Royal Ironstone China," are above the crest and below it are the words "A.J. Wilkinson Ltd."

What are my plates worth?

A. A.J. Wilkinson Ltd. made earthenware and ironstone in Staffordshire, England, from 1885 to 1964. Anthony Shaw and Co. located in England was the first to produce his copper luster design in the mid-1800s. Shaw's pattern was a sprig of three copper luster leaves.

In the beginning, it was known Q. I inherited several ironstone as "Luster Band and Sprig."

Wartime recruiting posters put patriotism in perspective

The revved-up patriotism engendered by Sept. 11 has spilled into all areas of the culture — G.I. Joe their skills to the effort. is a hot toy again. World War II and other military movies are drawing big crowds and books on battles and heroes are high on the best-

For the collector, especially in terms of making a powerful graphic statement, a strong area to consider is the propaganda posters of the two world wars. World War I -"the war to make the world safe for democracy" — inspired some of the most potent and enduring images. Certainly best known is James Montgomery Flagg's depiction of a scowling Uncle Sam pointing at the viewer above the legend "I WANT YOU FOR THE U.S. ARMY.

Flagg was already a famous magazine and advertising illustrator when war broke out and

Charles Dana Gibson, creator of the iconic Gibson Girl, headed the Division of Pictorial Publicity during the Great War and enlisted such eminent colleagues as Flagg. Howard Chandler Christy and Joseph Leyendecker to contribute poster designs, holding spirited weekly meetings in New York restaurants during which they dis-

tributed assignments. An original I WANT YOU poster - valued today at \$3,000 to \$4.000 - would be among the prizes of any collection, but there are other equally vigorous Army. Navy and Marine Corps recruiting posters. Flagg did several for the Marines, including one with a serviceman in an Uncle Sam finger-pointing pose (THE U.S.

MARINES' WANT YOU'). Another features a tough-looking guy taking off his jacket, getting ready for a fight, a newspaper reading "Huns Kill Women and Children!" at his feet, the legend reading TELL THAT TO THE MARINES."

Howard Chandler Christy preferred to employ the feminine allure of pert young women in uniform — one sailor girl, for instance, proclaims I WANT YOU FOR THE NAVY." Another, in a more provocative pose, states GEE!! I WISH I WERE A MAN. I'D

Two of the most sought-after recruiting posters are Fred Spear's softly romanticized view of a mother holding her baby, with the single word "ENLIST" (\$7,000 to \$9,000), and a 1916 King Konglike simian wearing a German helmet, carrying off a bare-breasted female with the legend *DESTROY THIS MAD BRUTE - ENLIST." drawn by H. R. Hopps (\$8,000 to \$10,0001.

An impressive new book called World War I Posters" by Gary A. Borkan (A Schiffer Book for Collectors) exhibits several other types of subject matter in addition to recruitment, some of them put out under the aegis of various government agencies.

The United States Shipping Board posters mostly feature

States Food Administration's theme was "FOOD WILL WIN THE WAR" and stressed warnings against waste. and promoted sending food abroad ("HUNGER BREEDS MADNESS -Woodrow Wilson") and feature the images of such influential illustrators as Edward Penfield. There were the United States Fuel Administration ("UNCLE SAM NEEDS THAT EXTRA SHOVEL-FUL"), the Department of Agriculture and Garden Army ("POTATOES FOR PATRIOTISM,"

"World War I Posters" explores primarily in beautifully reproduced illustrations — other facets and elements of the war effort pushed by the propaganda machine. These included a campaign to get people involved in war work at the Red Cross, YMCA and community centers, relief to the British, French and Russians, books and films for the soldiers. and, finally, postwar readjustment. The book includes posters produced in Canada, Britain. Australia, France, Italy, Russia and even Germany.

Linda Rosenkrantz has edited Auction magazine and authored 13 books, including "My Life as a List."
