

GREEN SHEET Council approves dispatch

City council votes to contract public safety dispatch from township

By Maureen Johnston RECORD STAFF WRITER

Immediate access to technology, increased staffing and cost savings tipped the scale for the cash-strapped city toward consolidating public safety dispatch voted 4-1 Monday to approve a contract Northville with Township for dispatch and lock-up services. Pending Board of Trustees approval, the combined system could be implemented as soon ås Sept. 1.

An 11th-hour publicity blitz by the grassroots group created to convince local leaders to keep public safety dispatch inside the city failed to postpone the deci-

Kathi Tarrant-Parks, one of the founders of the Northville Volunteer League, said the group had offered to help the city examfund local public safety to the level residents demand

The council-approved plan would make the township's police headquarters on Six Mile Road the central dispatch location for the entire Northville community. Police officers and fire crews still will be based in and/or patrol their respective municipalities; their calls to service will originate from the common location.

The plan awaits formal Northville Township approval next month

The council vote followed months of council study of the

arrangements, Northville Police Chief James Petres reviewed for the approximate 200 residents who attended the special meeting at the senior community center. Councilman Tom Swigart cast the lone dis-

senting vote. The agreement includes consolidated dispatch and lock-up operations, including each municipality's responsibilities, costs, services and liability. The city's two current full-time dispatchers will become township employees.

Prior to the vote, council members cited benefits of high-quality

service by the neighboring township, the efficiencies of consolidation and cost savings. Mayor Christopher Johnson said ongoing budget concerns and unexpected state cuts contributed to the deci-

Monday night's decision to contract out city services was a tough one, Johnson said. Council members who voted in favor of the switch said the potential loss of identity, less local control and decreased night-time presence at the Main Street station were concerns outweighed by the benefits of a combined dispatch operation. continued on Page 3A

Township vote: primary importance

In Northville Township, next Tuesday's primary election is big.

Residents of the township's 18 precincts will vote for the members of their governing authority, the Board of Trustees. The board's seven members include one parttime supervisor, one part-time treasurer, one full-time clerk and four

Polls will be open between 7 a.m. and 8 p.m.

Typically, an election primary whittles down partisan competition, leaving one Republican and one Democratic contender for each position. In November, voters then decide between the two remaining candidates.

But because only five Republican candidates are vying for the four available trustee positions, next Tuesday's primary will decide who comprises the township board for the next four years.

Seven polling locations exist, including Ridgewood Elementary, a new location, due to the recent addition of the 17th and 18th precincts.

The county registration deadline to vote in this election was July 6. There are 18,233 registered voters in Northville Township. Voters at the polls will use an optical scan system. This year, 2,020 absentee ballots were mailed. This Saturday is the last day to apply for an absentee ballot. Absentee ballots are due by 8 p m. on Tuesday.

Precinct inspectors close polls at 8 p.m., but anyone already in line nay still vote. A computer-generated "rough official draft" will be available by 8:30 p m.

Voters are encouraged to know their proper precinct before heading out. Barring an administrative error, a vote cast from the wrong precinct likely won't be counted.

Beloved former Northville pastor dies

Brasure, 92, leaves behind a loyal First Presbyterian following

The final sermon the Rev. Llyod Brasure delivered from his hospital bed a week before he died was a comfort to his family - a celebration of life and absent a fear of death.

Rev. Brasure died of congestive heart failure July 20, 2004, at age 92. Doris, his wife of 61 years, and daughter Leslie, were in town last week making memorial arrangements for the 20-year pastor of First Presbyterian Church on Main Street. The service will be at 11 a.m. tomorrow.

"He was healthy until two weeks before," said Leslie. "He

was a vital person to the last minute.

One of three surviving children, Leslie described Rev. Brasure's request to gather loved ones around his bed so he could say good-bye. The emotion-filled audience will never forget those 40 minutes filled with the pastor's wisdom about life and death, she said. 'To go from a deathbed, to a sermon, we all agreed it was the most powerful thing we had ever

The pastor's words and impact linger with many long-time Northville area residents. Brasure

was instrumental in the congregation's growth, spiritually and structurally.

The church flourished under his warm and folksy, whimsical style," said current pastor, Rev. Kent Clise. "He was a community pastor. His ministry was highly personalized, focused very much

on people. During his tenure at First Presbyterian, Brasure led the congregation through construction of the Christian education wing in 1964 and the new sanctuary in 1970. Clise, who arrived in Northville years after Brasure's retirement in 1980, said he came to know the man during his return visits to the church, through stories and personal experience.

"He was very gracious to me," the pastor said. "I cared for him on a personal level.

"His death marks the end of an era for this congregation."

In 1981, Dr. Larry Chamberlain, Brasure's successor, acted on the congregation's

consensus to bestow an honorary title upon the pastor. "With his death, we no longer have a Pastor Emeritus," Clise said.

Inside the room First Presbyterian members dedicated to past leaders "with a powerful and lasting impact on the life of the church," there are photos and memorabilia of Brasure's service

Clise was among the friends and family who visited Brasure in his hometown of Grand Blanc during his final hours last week. The couple moved from Northville seven years ago.

The people who have been calling, writing, they're just saying they are so proud to have known him and be part of his life," Leslie said. "That just makes me so proud."

Leslie's 22-year-old son, Seth Tuuri, will deliver the eulogy at the memorial service. Like he had with his own children, she said,

Brasure helped nurture the beliefs of the next generation. "My son likes to say he's the Methodist grandson of a Presbyterian minister raised in a Catholic school now teaching in a Lutheran ministry," she said. Even in her youth, Leslie said she understood her father's feelings about ecumeni-cal ministry. "This was so strong and so important to him."

Brasure emphasized it was important how you lived your life, how you worked, how you conducted yourself, Clise said. The passages of scripture he preferred talked about doing your work well, and taking care of the way you treat others, he said.

"I think personal conduct was important to him."

Brasure served as an Army chaplain, and later signed on with the Army Reserve, serving for several years before retiring at the rank of major. Following active duty, he served at two other churches before being called in

1961 to First Presbyterian Church

in Northville. He served until his retirement in 1980 at age 68.

Brasure later served as interim pastor at numerous metro-Detroit churches. In July 1997, the couple moved to Grand Blanc. The couple enjoyed traveling and together took 13 hot-balloon trips. He drove up until two weeks before he died. "He loved to drive," Doris said.

Brasure is survived by his children, Neal, Leslie and Wayne, 15 grandchildren, and four great grandchildren.

Mom and daughter praised Brasure as a husband, dad and grandfather. "He was quite a guy,"

They touched - both of them the lives of many people." Leslie said. "She will continue to, we'll make sure of that."







of a combined dispatch opera-

Swigart said he faulted the structure of the agreement that rendered the city --- as the purchaser of services - weak in negotiations. The township is set up to provide services to its residents, not a business to provide services to others, he said.

Local business owner Roxanne Casterline was one of two dozen city residents who opposed contracting dispatch in comments to

the council. She and others asked the city leaders to meet with a citizen advisory council to explore options to pay for proper dispatch staffing, purchasing new equip-ment and bringing the lock-up facility up to acceptable standards.

The Northville Volunteer League suggested spending special racetrack tax proceeds as a stop-gap measure, said group cofounder Larry Parks. Then voters could decide on a longer-term proposal for a dedicated public safety millage, he said.

"Postponement would have allowed the city to use us," Tarrant-Parks said. 'Their minds were made up, we knew that."

The vote did not reflect the community consensus, she said. The volunteers that gathered 335 signatures in five days will weigh, their next course of action,, Tarrant-Parks said after the meet-

"We're ready to regroup and reorganize tomorrow," she said. "We will consider a recall of the council who voted yes."

Township prepares for ratification

Six Northville Township officials were present at Monday's Northville City Council meeting when members approved the contracting of city public dispatch services to the township.

Township Police Chief John Werth credits the dissenting city citizens, but also emphasizes the quality of township-based dispatch.

"It was obviously a group that was well-informed," Werth said. "From a township standpoint, we've made this a very good contract to benefit both the city and the township. We're going to give them the same service that we give our residents here. There's going to be no difference"

The next step is approaching

the township board for review and recommendation at its meeting on Thursday, Aug. 19. The plan will likely be implemented between Sept. 1 and Oct. 1, said Werth.

"It's not a done deal now," Werth said. "Upon their approval, we're both - myself and (City Police) Chief Petres — we have a lot of ground work we have to get

The job will involve realigning alarm and phone systems to the township. The two dispatchers coming from city to township will undergo new training to utilize the township's computer aided dispatch program.

Township Manager Chip Snider said he has "a great respect for residents who voice their opinion," but wishes the "already existing cooperation" between city and township would have

been stated.

"I think it would have relieved some of the anxiety of the residents," Snider said. "I walked away (Monday) night thinking I


should have said it." Werth and Snider said the contract allows the township to back out. However, both indicated this isn't in the cards, particularly since the township has held off on hiring new dispatchers for months.





Political flier draws local ire

A political flier, distributed throughout Northville Township by board trustee incumbents Marjorie Banner, Brad Werner, Shirley Klokkenga and Marv Gans has caused a stir.

The two-sided flier lists on one side information about the four candidates who are running as slate. The opposing side lists public endorsements collected by the group.

But Brandon Kekich, of the Lansing-based Realtor Political Action Committee, said the flier is improper and does not comply with state election guidelines as spelled out within Michigan ampaign Finance Act 388.

Kekich, whose group endorsed trustee challenger Chris Roosen, said the flier did not list the proper "Paid for by" disclaimer, and

some of the endorsements listed are questionable.

the public He questioned endorsements of Clerk Sue Hillebrand and Northville girls hockey coach Bill Holden.

"If you don't follow the little rules, what rules are you following?" Kekich said.

You have a group of people who are misusing endorsements..." he said.

Hillebrand said she supports the slate, as presented on the flier. But yesterday Holden said though he was originally asked by Werner to support the group, and

subsequently granted it, he has

since become more familiar with Roosen's campaign. "I am going to vote first and foremost for Chris Roosen," Holden said. "I was impressed by

him. He's earned my vote." Holden said because he originally told Werner he would sup-

port the four-incumbent slate he does not, at this point, feel the flier is misleading. "I don't have a problem with the flier," he said.

Werner said any mistakes made on the 1,500 black-and-white fliers, designed by Banner and paid for by the group were simply the result of human error.

He said the group will stop distributing the fliers and make new

"I would say, basically, it was simply an oversight," Werner said, who had personally solicited and received from Holden support for the slate within the past two

"We didn't do it to purposely hurt anybody. I don't want to mislead anybody in anyway. The future of this flier is to cease and desist from passing any more of them out."

Banner said Holden should have called the group to notify them of his voter preference change.

"If he has changed his mind, he should have notified us," she said. "We are not running a dirty campaign. We are just running as a

team." Gans said the "paid for by" disclaimer must have been acciden-

tally omitted. "It had all of our names," Gans said. "We shared equally in the costs. That was just an oversight, because we all chipped in to cover it. We're not trying to do anything illegal. Everything's been clear and above board."

Klokkenga could not be reached for comment.



Neighborhood Watch: program a 'sign' of the times

By Victoria Sadlocha

Out are the days of neighborhood residents sitting on porches keeping a watchful eye on neighbors' properties.

In is a more education-based, organized approach at keeping neighborhoods safe.

With the guidance of community liaison officer, Samantha Bowlin, the Northville Township Police Department combines the "in" approach with visual aids through its Neighborhood Watch program.

The most noticeable indicator the program is hard at work is brand new Neighborhood Watch signs placed in participating sub-

The reflective signs designed by the department resemble the force's Web site and are often the first step in stopping subdivision

The signs are posted in the neighborhoods near the front to deter crime," Bowlin said. "They indicate neighborhood residents are the eyes and ears of their communities."

The first associations on the block to purchase the colorful signs were Highland Lakes and Cascades subdivisions.

Highland Lakes purchased 13 signs and Cascades purchased two signs for placement at the entrance of the street and another about halfway down.

"We were approached by Samantha and she explained the

coordination and cooperation between her and the community and we thought we would benefit from fostering such a relationship," said Eric Lark, president of Cascades Homeowners Association.

Lark said the signs were received and have been posted.

"It provides some comfort for our residents," he said. "And it might just provide the turning point that makes someone think twice before committing a crime in our neighborhood."

Another important portion of the Neighborhood Watch program is designing an information tree.

Bowlin creates the calling tree as a way to disseminate information in case of an emergency.

The community liaison officer explained the information-spreading tool is necessary in a time where not everyone knows the names of their neighbors.

The tree makes appointed residents responsible for a small group of their neighbors.

"In the case of an emergency, residents are then able to tell the police department who didn't answer and we can concentrate on those residents and then have more time to spend on the more major issues going on at that time," Bowlin said.

As part of the Neighborhood watch program, the community liaison officer also speaks at each of the participating associations' homeowners meetings.

At the meetings she provides latest crime statistics for the sub-

division, lectures on the danger of strangers and talks to residents about mail and Internet fraud.

"I teach residents how to better protect themselves," Bowlin said. I also explain how they can help other residents too."

The Northville Township Police Department Neighborhood Watch program is administered through a community service

"My major goal is to have every homeowner's association be a part of the Neighborhood Watch program," Bowlin said. "I want to keep residents informed and involved of what is happening and help protect themselves and their







Thanks to Gans' efforts, the township has expanded its park system and built its land ownership base to 315 acres. He has also devoted much effort, via the Economic Development Corporation, to diversifying the township's tax base. We now expect Gans, a board veteran, to lead with both gusto and prudence. He led the majority which approved the Community Park expansion, absent operational funds. That was a bad decision. And we hope a lesson well-learned.

He is passionate in his opposition to the war, but his position supporting unilateral withdrawal is naive and dangerous for the people of Iraq and the Middle East as a whole. His views opposing Israel also overlook the reality of Israel's existence and the need for a resolution that benefits all sides.

Fundarski admits openly that he chose the 11th District bécause he believes he can attract Republican voters to cross over and vote in the Democratic primary since McCotter is running unopposed. That would deprive mainstream Democrats of a candidate in the

There is a better option. Phil Truran, president of Communications Workers of America Local 4013, is a political novice, but his views are in keeping with mainstream, centrist Democrats. Except for a six-year enlistment in the Navy, Truran has lived in the communities that are part of the 11th District.

Truran would face an uphill battle against McCotter. In his meeting with Observer editors (Observer & Eccentric newspapers and the Northville Record are owned by HomeTown Communications Network), Truran was vague on some key issues, particularly on education and the specifics of health care reform. He has also admitted that his campaign has taken a while to get organized.

He will have to do a lot of debating research before McCotter, who is well-versed in government issues with a long history of debating as a legislator in county, state and federal offices.

Truran offers the best opportunity for giving the 11th District an honest choice.

Working next to me. hammering garishly printed "All The Way With LBJ" signs onto wooden lath, was a young United Auto Workers guy called Steve Yokich. Who would have known he would activist, Jim Blanchard, then age 22 and attending his first national convention, would wind up as governor of Michigan?

But that's the way it is with national conventions. Of course, they're the place where party elders preen and spin before the TV cameras and where nominations are bestowed. But, equally important, they are also the places where the party's young talent first spreads its wings, meets (and sizes up) other talent, learns some of the steps, some of the moves. The firefight took place four

years later, in Chicago, where Mayor Richard Daley the First was king. Angry at the long, slow bloodletting in Viet Nam and longing for the style and grace of Jack Kennedy, I had been involved in his brother Bobby's campaign for the presidency. We fought the good fight in Michigan, holding the labor people and party regulars who were backing Hubert Humphrey to a draw in the delegate selection process. It's still painful to remember, even nearly 40 years later, the feelings of another Kennedy had been cut down by another gunman, this time in a grimy hotel kitchen in Los Angeles.

The delegates gathered in Chicago, where the atmosphere was electric. Anti-war liberals, including the "Chicago Seven," led by my old college friend Tom Hayden, were holding political theater demonstrations in the parks. Police were everywhere. The convention hall was behind barbed wire, and the delegates were driven through pressing crowds on busses with squad cars in the lead. Rumors were rampant.

Delegates were deeply and emotionally split: The regu-lars backed Vice President Humphrey (Johnson had withdrawn several months before); the anti-war crowd worshiped Sen. Eugene McCarthy; the despondent Bobby Kennedy backers tried to rally around Sen. George McGovern.

The emotional summit of the convention took place after the showing of a film memorializing Bobby Kennedy. On the floor of the darkened auditorium, people started — truly spontaneously this time - singing "The Battle Hymn of the Republic* in grief and defiance and anger. We sang on and on, 20 minutes, then 30 minutes. The convention managers simply could not stop it.

Here's what I wrote in a column published back then: The demonstration was an enormous, spontaneous and, at the start, dignified outpouring of genuine emotion and respect, intensified by the fact that all the frustration and bitterness of the convention could be submerged in a common feeling. Rep. Carl Albert, a skilled and capable man at running the House of Representatives. evidently misread the nature of the outpouring and tried to gavel it to a halt. It didn't work. He tried again, and again. And a fourth time. And suddenly the entire convention came very near to going completely out of control."

The conventions this year will be entirely different. The Democratic convention, with no platform fights of old and no real decisions left to be made, is organized to appeal (in the few hours of prime

time coverage the networks deign to grant) to the tiny fraction - maybe 10 percent - of voters who have not yet made up their minds. Next month's Republican convention will proceed in the same pablumized way, content to crown President George W. Bush in a way designed to appeal to the same small slice of the electorate.

I suppose I'll watch both conventions for a bit. I'm interested to see if John Kerry can actually convey emotion in his speech and will marvel at how President Bush, a man who has governed from the hard right, will present himself as a moderate. But I'm afraid I will come away from the process disappointed in the substitution of spin for substance, and wishing forlornly for the passionate feelings and smoke-filled rooms of the old

Conventions past have seen titanic struggles over the party's positions - the so-called "platform" — with roll call debates on issues ranging from civil rights to Viet Nam to whether to seat a state delegation deemed to be insufficiently diverse or improperly chosen.

"Now, they are all sort of coronations," said Blanchard, who says he is nevertheless excited, in part ecause he thinks his party's ticket of John Kerry and John Edwards "is maybe the strongest we've had in 40 years.

what is not is that for many of the delegates (and the press) national conventions these days are in many respects much more like high school reunions than anything else. Politicians and reporters see old friends they haven't seen in four years: relive old battles; open new

"You have to pace yourself." Blanchard said. You can easily spend all day talking politics and listening to speeches on the convention floor, and all night going from hotel to hotel and party to party.

Conventions are still politically worthwhile, he notes, because they serve two other key purposes: To introduce the party's candidates to the American people, many of whom have, until now, been paying scant attention to the process, and also to fire up the delegates to work hard for the ticket.

The best recent example of that was probably 1992. when Bill Clinton arrived at the convention trailing both President Bush and H. Ross That may be debatable: Perot, and left the clear

front-runner. Four years ago. the convention was duller. but delegates still talk about the startlingly passionate kiss between Al and Tipper

Most conventions produce some memorable moments: Mario Cuomo's famous speech in 1984; Clinton's famously long and boring speech in 1988, and the bizarre scene in 1980 when Jimmy Carter seemed to be chasing Ted Kennedy around the platform, trying futilely for the traditional victory embrace.

Democrats, who tend to be a more unruly lot than Republicans, have also had their presidential campaigns ruined by conventions. The worst of all time was the 1924 convention in New York City, when a deadlocked convention continued for three weeks and 104 ballots, until the nomination itself was worthless.

The ultimate modern horrors were 1968 in Chicago, Hometown Communications. when out-of-control cops tear-gassed and clubbed at (248) 901-2561 or by edemonstrators and dele- mail gates, and 1972, when anar-

chy prevailed: vice-presiden-? tial votes were actually cast for Mao Tse-tung, and the, nominee didn't get to speak. till 3 a.m. - prime time only. on Guam.

Back then, networks prid-7 ed themselves on so-called "gavel-to-gavel" coverage. Sadly, that's now a thing ofthe past. The major networks plan to show only three. hours of coverage all week. That (won't present (many) opportunities for the 155, Michigan delegates to see themselves in prime time.

Yet questions remain. Will .. John Kerry finally electrify people? Will Al Sharpton behave? Will Michigan's two; party chairmen, who loathe each other, make nice for the cameras? U18 Hawks swoop in for national championship victory over Surf

All three local U18 Michigan Hawks soccer players who competed in the national championship are quick to admit that it was the single greatest moment in their entire careers.

Of course, most people would say the same thing after winning a national championship.

Novi's Moe Pawlak and Northville's Nicole Cauzillo and Lindsay Hill brought home a national championship with the Hawks after their squad defeated the California Surf, 3-2, in the title game held in Orlando, Fla. July 25.

"I'm totally going out with a bang," Hill laughed. "I won a state championship in high school, a state championship in club and a regional and national championship. I can't ask for anything more.

The Hawks were ranked at the top spot in the country heading into the tournament. After the first game, the squad was already down 0-1 in the standing after losing to the Surf in the first game of three round-robin contests.

"The first game was a shocker," Pawlak said. "We knew every single team down there was good We knew we were going to have to battle every team to win; we just didn't expect to lose that quickly."

Especially since the Surf was ranked fourth in the nation at the

"They put us in our place," Pawlak added. "We went in there with a lot of confidence and we came out knowing we better start winning some games."

And win they did.

The road to the title

In game two, the Hawks decided to show the other teams just what it meant to be the leading contender for the title. They took on and defeated World Class, 4-1, after trailing early.

"In every game we fell behind at first and had to come back to win," Cauzillo said.

Game three was no different. The Hawks were down 1-0 against Georgia but added a quick goal of their own for the 1-1 tie.
"It's really difficult to explain,"

Hill said of the tie and Michigan's berth into the national title game. "It has to do with the number of goals scored for and against for each team It's a plus-and-minus

And luckily the Hawks had the plus in their favor. They beat Georgia and were more than happy to find out they would be playing the Surf for the title game.
"The second our game was

done we wanted to know how California did," Cauzillo said. "We wanted a rematch against them so bad."

And the rematch was theirs

Heading into the final game, which began at 10:30 a.m., the Hawks knew they had to get the game done during regulation or face another opponent on the field.

"We didn't want to play in that heat," Pawlak said. "Everyone knew if we went into overtime it would be unbearably hot and

humid." So they went in looking to put the game in the bag in the first

two halves. Of course, it was the Surf that got on the board first, scoring a goal about 15 minutes into the of the goal's magnitude began to game for the 1-0 advantage over

Michigan. 'I, personally, wasn't worried," Hill said. "We had to come back in the other games too, and I knew

we could do it this time as well." The Hawks fought back just as they had in the previous games, tying the contest 1-1 before the

When they came out for the second half of play, it was the Surf getting the best of them yet again and scoring early for the 2-1

advantage. The Hawks brought the ball up the field and found Hill passing it forward to a teammate. She quickly passed it inside where Cauzillo jumped into the air and headed it into the upper corner of

the net for the 2-2 tie. "You don't think I can get air being as short as I am, but I can in the national championship game," Cauzillo joked. "I can jump as high as I need to score a goal in that game."

It wasn't much later that the Hawks were given the opportunity to take the lead. A Michigan player broke free with the ball and had a clear shot at the goal before being dragged down in the box by the goalie.

The result was a penalty kick in favor of the Hawks. None other than Cauzillo was selected for the

"I've shot a lot of PKs in my career," she said, "I had scored one earlier in the tournament too. and the coach and I talked about the goalie probably knowing which way I was going to go. So, when I took the shot this time, I shot the other way and scored."

She said it wasn't until after she made the shot the realization

"Suddenly I realized we could win the national championship with that goal," she said. "It was awesome.

The goal put the Hawks up 3-2 for the final tally. As the whistle sounded to end the game, the team erupted in cheers. They were national champions.

Deserving their honors

The Hawks weren't just awarded a national title. The team as a whole was also given the Fair Play award and the team's goalie earned the Golden Glove nod. Cauzillo was also rewarded for her outstanding play, earning the Golden Boot which is awarded to the player with the most outstanding play in the tournament.

"It's a great honor," she said. "I never expected it." Each girl on the team was also

given a hat and a T-shirt as well as a medal to wear around their

"I bring that medal everywhere," Hill said. "I'm going to be wowed for a long time. This is one of those once-in-a-lifetime experiences, and I'm going to remember it forever." In the beginning of Pawlak's

senior year with the Novi Wildcats, after she scored her 100th goal, she said she was willing to trade all of them for a state title. The question, it seems, is if a national title is just as good.

"It's unreal," Pawlak said. "It's so sweet. This is by far the biggest thing that has ever happened to me in soccer. It's what you dream about. To win a national championship is unbe-

The sweetness of earning that title

In my time as a sports writer, I've had the pleasure of speaking to conference champions, district champions, regional champs and even the state title holders.

Now, I can truly say I've had the pleasure of speaking to national champions.

Moe Pawlak, Lindsay Hill and Nicole Cauzillo are the kind of athletes that deserve this honor. All of them have worked extremely hard to be where they are at, and all of them are Division I college soccer players, thanks to their dedication to the sport.

They went to Orlando knowing full well they were ranked first in the nation. That meant their foes at the national tournament were going to be shooting for them. Of course, when the top four teams in the country make an appearance at an event, who is to say which team is the best until the smoke clears?

Well, the Hawks went in with a number one ranking, and they left with it. Looks like the rankings were pretty much on the money this time around.

In talking with each of the above-mentioned players, one thing became readily apparent. They were happy. No, they were remarkably ecstatic. Bubbling

The entire time Cauzillo was being interviewed she was smiling. She made it very clear the smile wasn't about to fade any time soon.

And then there was Lindsay Hill. Hill and I have talked a few times this past year. Unfortunately, it seems, the majority of the time I talked to her was to apologize for misidentifying her as her sister, Lauren.

Hill is the kind of athlete I know deserves so much more than she ever gets. She works hard. She pushes herself to the limits. Her play is one of the most solid on the field at any given moment. Hill never quits when things get rough. Instead, she buckles down, grits her teeth and pushes forward.

For Northville's Ava Ohlgren, swimming in the Olympic Trials in California was like any other swim meet she has competed in - sans the 10,000 fans, of course.

It was a time and a place for Ohlgren to prove herself. Though she didn't make this year's Olympics in Athens, she gave herself a great idea of what it will take to make the 2008 summer games in Beijing.
"It was really fun," Ohlgren

said. "It was a great meet, but it was pretty much like any other meet except there were 10,000 people watching."

Though Ohlgren said 10,000 people are hard to ignore prior to a face, she said once she was in the water it was a different

"You don't notice them while you're in the water," she said. "This isn't soccer or football where the fans are practically on top of you yelling in your face. Here, you can't hear them yell at you or cheer for you. You can't hear the crowd because you can't hear anything.

With the sound blocked out. Ohlgren was able to focus on races she could muster. She did

exactly that.
In the 400 individual medley, Ohlgren was seeded 47th entering the trials. When she finished she was 12th with a time of 4:50.78. It was the same story in the 200 freestyle and the 200 IM. She was seeded 60th and finished in 2:03.31 for 20th in the first and seeded 65th and finished 12th in 2:17.25 in the lat-

"Overall, Ava far exceeded our expectations," said Kurt Ohlgren, her father. "Every finish you could see the look of satisfaction on her face. She enjoyed the pool, the meet and being an Olympic hopeful."

Ohlgren has never been a pushover in the pool. In her time swimming with the Bulldogs Aquatic Club out of Livonia she has swam everything from national to world-wide meets and competed in every one of them. Even with Olympic Trial qualifying times, Ohlgren was never one to bang her own drum.

In fact, her father believes she doesn't see herself to be near the athlete she truly is.

"She is unaware that she belongs to this elite team of athletes," he said. "She sees herself as someone who loves to swim,





Michigan Secretary of State Terrifynn Land visited the Northville Record office this month, and discussed some topics on the minds' of her constituents.

Such topics ranged from long lines at Secretary of State branch offices to implementing the federal Help America Vote Act of 2002 at the state level.

- Michigan is eligible to receive about \$80 million in federal grant money, allowing the state to replace ditdated voting equipment reainly the punch-card system.

The money will also go toward improving access for voters with disabilities and those living outside the country, including military personnel stationed overseas.

Land, 46, said the majority of the state's expenditures will focus on replacing outdated voting equipment.

"This is a once in a lifetime opportunity," she said, adding she remains cautious of the federal government making sweeping decisions

"I don't think we even want to get to the point where federal government is making decisions for us," Land said.

The state has a deadline of 2006 to implement all aspects of the act. While remaining focused on election issues, Land's other responsibility includes overseeing the state's department of motor

vehicles.

Michigan is one of three states where the secretary of state over-sees both departments, Land said.

As head of motor vehicles, she oversees 7 million motorist records, 1,900 employees and 173 branch offices.

The self-professed republican said the majority of her time is dedicated toward motor vehicles.

In response to all the complaints on how branch office lines are too long, she offered this advice, "skip

"I believe in one man one vote," Land said. "Or one woman one vote." Land believes if local communities wish to institute the voting system that is their choice, but she would not change to Instant Runoff Votingon a state level.

Although the secretary of state did say elderly drivers are involved in more accidents, the accidents are usually minor and don't involve bodily harm. Land said male drivers between the ages of 17 and 25 cause the most fatal accidents.


Lomske honored by Northville



Growth, finance top township challenges

Rolling hills, luxury homes, recreation and public service amenities -- the Northville community has the draw easily promoted by home sellers and increasingly purchased by home buyers during the past decade.

This section of suburbia has sprawled from Five Mile north to Eight Mile and from Haggerty west to Napier, gobbling up farmfand, golf courses, and institutional acreage. Northville Township's population has swelled passed 24,000 residents in 20 years.

Below are some of the issue stownship residents will face during the coming years.

Growing community

Developers continue to eye Northville as a destination for residential homesites. Growth has spawned conflicts between development proponents and preserva-

With new construction throughout the community, plans were inked earlier this year for the 307 acres of former farmland at the southeast corner of Ridge and Six Mile roads. It was months of discussion between township representatives and developer Grand/Sakwa of Farmington Hills that finally produced a plannedunit-agreement for 356 homes on the former Detroit House of Corrections property, lined by the Johnson Creek. Pulte Homes of

gle-family houses and duplex condominiums.

The last undeveloped parcel in the township is the state's 415 acres along Seven Mile Road, between Haggerty and Northville Roads. The zoning layout drafted by township leaders shows singlefamily residences, condominiums, a corporate campus, a local retail strip, regional commercial, public land, senior housing and natural areas. The next decade still will see lots of new neighbors in homes and businesses.

Sound finances

The number of new homes added to the tax rolls each year has far outpaced expenditures, contributing to Northville Township's sound financial con-

With an annual budget of about \$17 million, the township levies less than 1 mill to generate revenue for the general fund. The tax first appeared on tax bills two years ago — less than \$250 for a \$500,000 home, for example to pay down the debt on the townbuilding program. Primarily state revenue sharing and interest earnings, as well as various other sources, fund the about \$4.4 million operations portion of the budget.

Conservative leadership combined with the continued growth during the past decade has increased the township's general fund balance from \$200,000 to approximately \$5 million today.

The township's cash reserves for all accounts total about \$14 million; voter-approved dedicated millages that helped fill those coffers - for public safety, shared services and land acquisition, for example — expire in 2006.

As developers target township property for their new construction, local leaders have repeated their desire for light commercial, research and development, and other non-residential uses in an effort to diversify the tax base. Their goal: maintaining the current level of services without increasing taxes to pay for them.

Funding recreation

Hundreds of new families annually selecting Northville as their nest adds to the need for recreational amenities. The area is home to a host of active and passive opportunities, from Maybury State Park to Wayne County's Hines Park, to the local system.

Parks Northville Recreation, a joint-services arrangement with the 'City of Northville, provides year-round. youth-to-senior citizen programming. Local leaders in recent discussions committed to the concept of pay-to-play services, ideally perpetuating self-sufficient programs and eliminating subsi-

Township residents committed their support to the system during the past two decades with passage and in 2000 a six-year renewal of millages that support recreation and other joint services. Township taxpayers in 2002 also approved a land acquisition/park development tax, which generates approximately \$1 million annual-

Both taxes supporting recreation are set to expire in 2006, a public vote would determine the level of service.

Community Park

Located near the northwest corner of Beck and Five Mile roads, Community Park ultimately will flank the Robert Scott Correctional Facility in an "L" stretching 118 acres.

Expansion plans include five soccer fields, two lacrosse fields, six sand volleyball courts and three baseball diamonds -- began May 20. The price was set at \$3.1 million.

But unexpected costs began mounting quickly when extensive rubble from the state-owned Phoenix Center, which previously stood on the site, was found buried underground. Excavation costs are expected to reach \$600,000, and have raised questions about scaling back park development plans.

Former Northville Psychiatric Hospital

Closed in 2002, the 29 buildings of the former Northville Psychiatric Hospital sit on about 415 acres of heavily wooded land on the south side of Seven Mile Road, west of Haggerty.

Real Estate Investments, a Bloomfield Hills-based development team, was recently awarded the state-owned land for \$55 million in June. Through zoning the land as "planned unit development," the township has a hand in the future - and there's much to consider, from types and extent of development to traffic impact. The state has set Sept 30 as the

transaction deadline.

Shared services

Northville Township and the City of Northville concurrently fund youth assistance, senior services and parks and recreation. Due to its larger size, the township typically puts in about 80 percent of the costs, and the city 20 percent.

The township recently has been asked by the city to consider consolidating its public safety dis-patch services as early as this fall. If the contracting occurs, each fire and police department would remain independent, but all incoming police and fire calls would be taken and dispatched from the township's Six Mile Road police station.

New municipal buildings

Construction on the new township hall and fire headquarters began in April 2003. The fire station is moving from its current location on Seven Mile to Millennium Park, on Six Mile Road between Sheldon and Beck.

The present township hall is located on Six Mile Road, about a mile east of Northville Road. It will be moving to a new building at the southwest corner of Six Mile and Sheldon roads. The anticipated open date was June 1. but has been pushed to the end of August or first week of September. That Six Mile Road locale will serve solely as the police station.



Whether new residential neighborhoods or work that continued last week on the expansion of Northville's Community Park on Beck Road, now facing a \$600,000 cost overrun, township officials regard growth as a key issue.



Abbo: many challenges still ahead Mark Abbo

Fiscal conservative, consensus builder, long-term resident and big-picture guy — Mark Abbo assumes many roles while acting

as community leader. Abbo approaches the Aug. 3 primary and Nov. 2 general elections as the Northville Township supervisor — and the only person to seek the local government's top

Leaders in the next term face challenges of guiding development along the Seven Mile corridor, funding programs like recreation and managing the township's growth, the supervisor said. He said he looks for diverse opinions from his fellow board members to fuel debate, then create consensus direction for the good of the township.

"I try to never lose sight of the bigger picture," Abbo said. "I believe I'm the best person for the position right now."

A township resident since 1989, Abbo served as a trustee, then treasurer, before his election to the top post in 2000. He and his sharp eye peers during the past decade have deliberately looked ahead — during the 2020 Vision session last fall, for example --- to try to anticipate needs and wants of the growing community.

With quality schools recreation opportunities, jurisdictional cooperation, and services for residents of all ages, Northville Township offers a high quality of life, Abbo said. 'The character of your community shows through it's volunteers," he said. "I think that's a heavy tribute of Northville."

He said long-term planning is key. Abbo said township planners purposely have looked at how other communities have developed, and tried to glean lessons how to maintain services without

For example, the township's new civic hall, fire station, and police headquarters expansion accommodate current growth, but were not overbuilt, Abbo said. Strategic planning allowed the municipality to benefit from lower interest rates and more favorable bids during a slower economy, he said.

Henningsen said rapid growth during the past 30 years is not likely to subside any time soon.

There are new homes currently under construction in a dozen different subdivisions, he said "You can not slow them down, you can-

not turn them off." Henningsen said development of the Seven Mile corridor will be one of the biggest challenges for the coming term. He said he is concerned about the high bid of \$55 million for the property by Real Estate Investments of Bloomfield Hills. He said that price tag, plus the estimated \$20 million to clean up the site, might force a request for high density by

the developer. The planning commission will have a key role in evaluating the proposals and information they present, Henningsen said. "I think the process works pretty well."

"I'd like to see a nice, welldesigned layout of the different things that we may need in the community," he said. "It behooves them to look at all the set-ups that we have, and what they want."

Henningsen said the board recently learned a lesson after investing in expansion of Northville Community Park on Beck Road. He and Supervisor Mark Abbo voted against pro-

To alleviate the township's residential tax base reliance, she said zoning commercial pockets in specific areas, such as the Five Mile Road corridor, is important. Tax abatements are an option she'd consider.

But for the former state psychiatric hospital land, located along Seven Mile Road, she has a different vision.

"I don't understand why we can't get something creative, sort of a little community within a community," Hillebrand said. "It's such a relating, green, lush corri-dor. Put a lot of stuff in the middle if you want.'

Instead of stores, she'd rather see a taller hotel or senior housing building set in the "footprints" of current edifices, along with a vari-

Proper planning for future township development tops Marjorie Banner's list of priorities for the next four years.

ship trustee in 2001, and a seat on the coning board of appeals from 1994 to 2001. 
Banner said her honesty, integrity and compassion for children and senior citizens are attributes qualifying her for the trustee position. "I think we're doing some very good things for the kids in town right now. I'm living that right now.

Gans supports parks, good planning Marv Gans

Northville Township board trustee Mary Gans' re-election pitch is simple: "What you see is what you get."

In his eight years on the town-ship board and 20 with the planning commission, Gans advocated recreation. As land acquisition chairman, he's helped increase the township's purchase tally

from 69 to more than 315 acres.
"Northville Township is a unique community in that not only is it growing, but it has a concern for the quality of life for the people that are living in it," Gans said. "We've done a good job of attempting to acquire land. I only see us expanding in the whole area."

Gans said three things set him apart: background, experience, and being a long-term township resident since 1967.

He earned his doctorate from the University of Utah in health physical education and recreation administration. After teaching and coaching with Livonia Public Schools, he wore a variety of hats at Schoolcraft College for 39 years, retiring in 2002.

Founder and chair of the Friends of Northville Parks and Recreation, he's also chair of the economic development corpora-

Roads, is a priority for Gans, despite recent clean-up costoverruns that could potentially exceed \$600,000.

"It's necessary. It's a total community facility," Gans said.
"This was part of the master plan for years ... but we never had the land, which we now have."

He suggests cost-saving methods such as not immediately paving parking lots, which would run more than \$300,000. Cutting back on landscaping may retain \$100,000 and holding off bleacher installation to save another \$29,000.

"I would not want to cut program things," such as athletic fields, Gans said.

To have sufficient long-term funds for operating recreational services, Gans said the township has to "be creative." He said developers could play a role, but higher taxes are a last resort.

I would if I had to, but right at this point, I don't think we have to," Gans said. "I'm not for carte-blanche tax increases."

He said residential taxes help bring in revenues, but sees the need for reaching out to commercial entities as well.

"We're looking for ways always to try to diversify the tax base," Gans said, citing the for-Detroit House of Corrections property as an area where some land is staked for

Shirley Klokkenga said her knowledge as a teacher and public official sets her apart as Northville Township board trustee candidate.

Active on the board of trustees and zoning board of appeals, Klokkenga previously served on the planning commission. Over the past I4 years, she's also taught at Northville High and Meads Mill Middle School.

"I think that combination ... gives me an inside tract to see what people need," Klokkenga said. "I believe that the decisions we make for this township will determine the character of the township for decades to come. I've had this vision for sometime."

A 25-year resident, Klokkenga said traffic tops her list of concems - especially volumes that could be generated by the development of the former psychiatric hospital property located on Seven Mile Road.

Haggerty," Klokkenga said. "The county has got to work with us. There is an answer out there already.

In addition to a pre-develop-ment traffic control plan, she wants to work with Livonia. which is developing College Park to the south on Haggerty and ask Wayne County to "nudge" that next door city in addressing road concerns.

When it comes to spending, Klokkenga said purchases are based on community and township needs, and good fiscal controls are in place.

However, she thinks the increasing costs of cleaning buried building debris in Community Park at Beck Road between Five and Six Mile roads are cause to "lay aside grandiose plans," "It was within our budget to do," Klokkenga said. "Now we say, 'OK, we have the challenge.' We're not going to not do it; we're going to delay it until we have the funds to do it."

Holding off on lighting installation, delaying the ordinance for paving the parking lot and possibly adding playscapes later are on her list. To help with park operating costs, she supports borrowing from the general fund balance, but is against increasing the current recreation millage or implementing user fees.

It is up to the board - through the planning, public works and building departments — that new construction in the community is high quality, Werner said.

The father of four began his public service with a 1997 appointment to the township's parks and recreation commission. He was elected to the board of trustees in 1999 and served as chairman of the recreation commission.

Currently he serves as the trustees' liaison to the group.

Werner said he supports the board's dedication to increasing recreational opportunities in the community, depsite current cost overruns at the current Northville Community Park expansion.

He said it is the responsibility of the township leaders to scale back the project. To limit project costs, the board will only proceed with the project's first phase at this time, he said.

Werner said his ability to negotiate among representatives of different factions is one of the strengths he bring to the board.





Abbo said. 'This project will serve our needs for a very, very long time."

An accountant by training, Abbo said resident demand for services should determine the level of govemment spending. "You can never be everything to everybody," he said, "You're fooling yourself if you thing you can."

Abbo said he is comfortable with the township's current operational fund balance of about \$5 million, which is above the accounting consultant's recommendation. The township's total budget of \$17 million encompasses voter-endorsed services of public safety, parks and recreation, and other capital improvements, as well as the township's day-to-day operation.

"I do not anticipate increasing our taxes, unless perhaps in recreation if people want an increase in services," he said. "I'm a big believer in less government, less

The township is too reliant on the residential tax base, he said. "I think we need more research and development property, more commercial in the right places, more office space. We're working on that."

Township leaders need to work with developers to get the best project they can offer without draining the services for current residents, Abbo said. For example, on Seven Mile Road, the board will stand by the plans drafted at the local level, while considering the buyer's

The supervisor has supported the township's steady acquisition of land during the past decade. "Once the land is gone, the land is gone," he said. With the largest undeveloped parcels spoken for, there is not much left to accumulate for future generations, he said.

"We should spend wisely, efficiently, effectively," Abbo said. 'Just because there's money in the bank doesn't mean it needs to be

spent. I like operating from a posi-tion of strength." The supervisor said he is open to concepts of shared services and regional planning. "I don't like to lose opportunities.

"I'm a big believer in Northville Township," he said. "I'm proud of the township board's accomplishments collectively."



Overwatering is a good way to cause roots to rot

Q: I'm so confused. You are always telling people to water but this year, my lawn and garden has gotten a great deal of rain. How do I know when or if? Can I water too much?

A: Too much of anything can be a problem (not just chocolate). This has been the year to confound those who are used to watering during June, July and August. The usual rules of watering have been changed for this year. But just because the rules have changed, don't stop playing the game. This is where the intelligent figure out the new rules. Many areas have received more than their fair share of rainfall. Other areas haven't gotten as much. Hippy-hop out to the nearest hardware store of garden center and pick up a rain gauge. These can cost anywhere from two or three dollars on up. My favorites are the cheap plastic ones. If one gets run over by a moose or hit by a falling weather satellite, it can be replaced cheaply. Place the rain gauge so it is in the open, away from buildings and overhanging trees and plants. Every time it rains, check the gauge. For most plants, an inch of water a week is good. If you live where there's sandy soil, you might need somewhat more. If you are on heavy soil, like clay or heavy loam, you might need less. Don't bother dragging out the hose if the Weather Goddess is supplying an adequate amount. It doesn't matter if it's out of the sky or from below the ground. Check the soil around the plants. If it is moist down five or six inches and not just at the top, life is good. Overwatering can cause root rots and force the oxygen out of the soil, causing root damage. Extra watering won't make up for poor placement of a plant. If the area is too shady for the plant, watering won't fix it. Keep an eye on the rain gauge and check soil moisture, and things get much more simple.

Q: I have some silver maples on my property, and I recently noticed that every leaf on these trees has black spots that look almost like patent leather; they're are shiny and raised. Some of these leaves

have fallen on the ground. How can I stop these trees from becoming defoliated and dying?

A: If these trees die, it will be

from something else. You are looking at one of our flashy summertime fungal diseases, tar spot. It looks just exactly like tar globs on leaves. There are a couple of different kinds. Some make little black pimples and others make giant conspicuous spots. These spots usually have a yellow halo around them. The spots are one of the most showy and least damaging fungal things around. Tar spot will affect silver, sugar, red and Norway maples. It develops in moist, humid, sheltered areas, like a large number of treed lawns. The fungus remains with fallen leaves and is the host for next year's invasion if weather conditions favor its development. If you remember your term paper from Fungi 101, you need moisture, warmth and the correct host material to grow this and many other fungi. That includes athlete's foot for you and yellow blobs growing on your mulch. With tar spot, it got into the leaves in the late spring or early summer and incubated for a period of time. You can see the light green or yellowish green spots when tar spot is just starting to develop. If the leaf has many spots, it can fall off. Since it isn't fatal to trees, control may not be necessary. One suggested way of reducing the amount of potential tar spot is to rake and destroy the leaves in the fall. It may be somewhat helpful, but if your maple-owning neighbors with tar spot don't do the same, it might not help a lot. If we have different weather conditions, it would help.


How has Joey McIntyre's approach to touring changed since his days with New Kids on the Block? -Anita M., Texas

Dick Ellis of South Royalton, Vt., made it his mission to help others make music.

"It was everything I expected, but it wasn't something I could see doing for the rest of my life," Ellis says. He then enrolled at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston and learned to play wind instruments, from trumpet to trombone. In 1954, he returned home to the village of South Royalton (pop. 2,603) determined to make a living teaching music. Thus began the life of Vermont's pied piper.

"I had 60 to 70 students at one time. I was the only teacher around," he recalls, describing how he worked 12-hour days at different schools and gave private lessons at home.

A problem then in Vermont was that kids had almost no school bands in which to play. In response, Ellis helped establish half a dozen school bands. And so student musicians would have a place to play once they left school, he founded the South Royalton Town Band, which still performs on the town green each Thursday during the summer. "This will be my 58th year," says Ellis, who conducts the band.

"A number of the members of the band are my old students," he adds. "They often come back when they come to bring their own children to play in it."

Today, Ellis estimates the number of kids who caught his love for music numbers in the thousands. He's proud of having taught them something challenging, rewarding and inspiring that they can do for the rest of their life.

Teaching full time and starting up bands would have been plenty of work for most, but Ellis discovered another obstacle to music education: wind instruments were expensive and hard to come by. So early on he began buying used instruments for students to rent. Of course, that helped fill out the bands. It also eventually filled up his house, which turned into the bustling nerve center of a rental business. "As our children moved out of the rooms, we took them over for the business," he says with a laugh.

In 1986, he built a new building in the nearby town of Bethel to house the business. Today, three of his children run the company, Ellis Music, which almost single-handedly is responsible for making band and orchestral music possible in the region. Ellis Music rents around 4,000 instruments to practically every school in Vermont, and many in New Hampshire.

Although officially "retired" at 80, Ellis still spreads his love of music, performing with the South Royalton Town Band and The Keynotes, a group formed more than 50 years ago. "I play seven instruments in that band," he says. "In fact, among the six of us in the band, we play 22 instruments."

It's been a remarkable life, but Ellis remains a soft-spoken, modest man not about to toot his own hom—except in a band. All he's done, after all, is what he loves to do, which is make music.

"I think I've enjoyed making a living more than most people," he says, with just a hint of a smile.

On a clear summer day in 1974, a twin-engine aircraft carrying two smokejumpers to a rapidly growing wildfire flew over a series of granite peaks above the Imnaha River canyon in northeast Oregon.

Mark Corbet made his

first jump 30 years ago.

All was quiet inside the airplane. Rookie smokejumper Mark Corbet, 23, felt butter-

flies fluttering in his stomach—it was his first jump as a firefighter for the U.S. Forest Service on a real fire. The spotter identified a "landing pad"—a small grassy opening surrounded by pine trees. He threw streamers out an open door of the plane to gauge the wind. Everything looked good. Time to go.

Decked out in beige Kevlar-coated jumpsuits, the helmet-clad smoke-jumpers rose to their feet. "Everyone worries, am I going to freeze in the door?" says Corbet of Redmond, Ore. (pop. 13,481). "But after all of the training you go through, when the spotter slaps you on the shoulder, you're ready to go. It's one of those reflex kinds of things."

Corbet leaped out of the plane, and his circular orange-and-white parachute opened with a sweet-sounding pop as he flew through the sky. With the parachute open, he focused on his

next priority: a safe landing. In less than a minute, he'd be on the ground. Corbet pulled on his steering cords—called toggles—and faced into the wind for landing. "Be sure to miss that tree," the spotter had advised him. Corbet focused on landing in the grassy opening and missed the tree. Whew!

Since his inaugural jump 30 years ago, Corbet has logged more than 675 jumps, 375 for training and 300 of them on wildfires. Now 53, Corbet is one of the nation's oldest and most experienced smokejumpers, an elite force of 400 airborne firefighters stationed at nine strategic locations across the American West, from Fairbanks, Alaska, to Redding, Calif.

Smokejumpers are tougher than granite. They jog with their boots on. They risk their lives on a daily basis to fight wildfires. They carry 110-pound packs. And they master the art of parachuting into rugged mountains with remarkable finesse.

Some jumpers fight fire as a summer job on the way to becoming a lawyer, a schoolteacher or an engineer. But increasingly, many of them are like Corbet, who has turned what used to be a seasonal job into a full-time career and a continuous adventure.

"When the siren goes off, we have to spring into action to fight a new wildfire," Corbet says. "Within seconds, things change from mundane to full-tilt excitement. It's great to have a job like that."

Initial attack

Smokejumpers specialize in the art of initial attack. The goal—as always—is to stop the small fire before it turns into a raging inferno that could destroy forests, private property, or at worst, kill people. The first line of defense is usually to dig a line around the perimeter of a blaze, and then extinguish the fire by burying flames and coals into the soil with a Pulaski, a unique firefighting tool that's like a shovel and pick all wrapped into one. If needed, a nearby wildfire base can send tanker planes





to drop fire-retardant on a blaze, or large buckets of water from a helicopter.

After a wildfire has been stopped, firefighters can spend days "mopping up"—snuffing hot spots and monitoring smoldering areas. And then, it's time for the most brutal aspect of the

job: the pack-out. Smokejumpers pile all of their gear into a huge pack that can weigh from 110 to 130 pounds, and haul it out of the woods to the nearest road for pickup.

Most wildfires are

sparked by lightning.

"The pack-out is definitely one of the most punishing aspects of the job, but somehow, you get it done," says Corber, who weighs 165 pounds.

A few women have risen to the physical challenge of being smokejumpers.

"It's a matter of doing the training so you can handle the physical demands of the job," says Kasey Rose, 36, who has been a smokejumper for 15 years. "Then, you can do the pack out and get it done."

Rose, a U.S. Forest Service employee in McCall, Idaho (pop. 2,08-1), took a hiarus from smoke-jumping this summer because she is pregnant with her first child.

First line of defense

The U.S. Forest Service launched the smoke-jumping program in 1940 in Idaho's Nez Perce National Forest. The idea then was that by sending firefighters into the back-country by parachute, they would be able to get to remote, new wildfires quickly and extinguish the fires before they grew into large infernos.

The concept was visionary, and smokejumpers continue to be the nation's first line of defense against remote wildfires.

Because of the arduous nature of the job, smokejumpers undergo considerable training. For starters, they must have at least one year of experience fighting wildfires. In 1972, Corbet started his career on a fire engine crew in Oregon's Malheur National Forest. In his second season, he worked on

a helicopter crew and worked with a group of smokejumpers on a fire. He was quickly impressed.

"I saw one guy hanging in a tree, and they were razzing each other and having so much fun, it looked really interesting to me," Corbet says.

"And they had much better food, which they shared with us. We had K-rations, and they had real food. I took a skydiving class that summer, so that got me interested, too."

The following year, Corbet applied to become a smokejumper. He was trained in Winthrop, Wash., in the mountainous North Cascades. First, he had to pass a number of standard physical fitness requirements, including running 1.5 miles in less than 11.5 minutes and doing a minimum of seven pull-ups, 25 pushups, and 45 sit-ups.

"At first, I thought, 'What am I getting myself into?" he recalls. "Those physical fitness sessions were extremely difficult. We ran around the airport in boots. These big dudes came in and wore you out. They wanted to see how badly you wanted to do it."

They also practiced short jumps from a 35-foot tower, learned how to get untangled from a parachute and harness in the midst of a tree and practiced climbing trees with spikes and ropes.

Most people figure out pretty quickly if they're cut out to be a smokejumper.

"I love that feeling of getting out of the plane and flying through the air," Rose says. "You know, I wouldn't want to be a lawyer—that would freak me out having to argue a case in front of a judge and jury, and a lawyer would probably hate my job, especially if he or she is afraid of heights."

The scariest thing about jumping, Rose says, is running into a patch of "down air" right before a landing. "I ran into some down air one time and it was the hardest landing I've ever had," she says. "My whole spine made a loud crack like when you crack your knuckles."

With the advent of every new season, Corbet wonders if it will be his last. He'd like to continue working full-time

until he passes the threshold for full retirement pay, which is only a couple of years away. "I don't want to cripple myself up before I'm done," he says. "In a lot of ways, my wife would rather have me home, but she also knows it's important for me to get my excitement in life, too."

Rose, who is expecting a baby boy Sept. 1, hasn't decided whether she's going to return to smoke-jumping after she becomes a mother. "That's going to be a big challenge—how to fit being a mom into being a firefighter," says Rose, whose husband, Eric Messenger, also is a smokejumper.

No matter what Rose or Corbet decide, our nation's smokejumpers will carry on, with fresh recruits taking to the skies this summer to snuff out wildfires in our remote Western forests.


"The job keeps me young," Corbet adds. 🌣







Emergent Records

The great American songwriter Stephen Foster died in 1863 at age 37, leaving



behind a leather waller containing 38 cents and a scrap of paper with the scrawled words, "Dear friends and gentle hearts." To the last, he was writing songs.

Beautiful Dreamer: The Songs of Stephen Foster features artists such as Raul Malo, Alison Krauss and John Prine interpreting Foster's most popular compositions (Camptour Races, Oh! Susanna) and lesser-known parlor songs. It is hard to imagine an album more affecting.

Foster's music carries the inherent sadness of the man himself and the Civil War era in which he penned it. But performers such as David Ball, who brings a mournful feel to Old Folks At Home (Suanee River). and Mavis Staples, who infuses Hard Times Come Again No More with the heart-rending integrity of a Negro spiritual, prove that this beautiful dreamer's suffering-was not in vain.

James Segrest and Mark Hoffman Moanin'At Midnight: The Life and Times of Howlin' Wolf Pantheon Books

The first serious biography of Chester Arthur Burnett, who rose from an illiterate Mississippi sharecropper to help define the Chicago-style



of electrified Delta blues and inspire generations of white rock stars, is long overdue.

Moanin' At Midnight, the authors' first book, sometimes stumbles in weaving a lively narrative out of historical facts and detailed musical analysis, but Wolf is such a charismatic character that it barely matters. The text is most poignant in tracing his wretched childhood and his mother's lifelong rejection of him for playing "the devil's music," and how that surfaced in his art.

It makes a noble attempt to resolve the duality of his nature—a gentle giant who allegedly killed a man and sometimes resorted to crudeness on stage. Above all, it humanizes a legendary performer, a man strong enough to take a butcher knife in the leg and keep on singing.





Hometown Spotlight

Residents of Garden

City, Utah, have been cultivating raspberries since early homesteaders planted the first canes nearly a century ago. From those roots, the town has grown into the Raspberry Shake Capital of the West.

What makes it a great location (to grow raspberries) is that we get cool nights and nice warm days," says resident Tammy Calder, who owns a

family farm with her husband, Ned, a second-generation raspberry grower.

Situated between the mountains of the Cache National Forest and 20-mile long Bear Lake, Garden City sits midway along the western shores of the lake's Caribbean-blue waters. Established in 1877, Mormon settlers built the town's first cabins, and many locals can trace their roots back to those early pioneers.


Garden City's Raspberry Roots

Residents used to raise dairy cattle and grow hay. Now most cater to Utah's vacationers, dishing up shakes and fries in the town's numerous drive-ins restaurants and renting out boats and jet skis in the summer and snowmobiles in the winter.

Still, it's raspberries that gave Garden City is nickname, the Raspberry Shake Capital of the West. Despite a blight that

hit the town's raspberry crop in recent years, residents have vigilantly continued celebrating their local fruit during the Raspberry Days Festival.

The celebration, scheduled Aug. 5-7 this year, was created by the Bear Lake Rendezvous Chamber of Commerce 21 years ago, and is a mainstay for the town's 357 residents. "It draws a bigger crowd than Labor Day and the



Raspberry fans across America descend on the Utah town during its annual Raspberry Days Festival.


Fourth of July, and people plan their family reunions around it," says Carmen Madsen, an early promoter.

Due to the blight, some raspberries had to be brought in from outside the community last year, according to Calder, who's had a raspberry sundae stand at the festival for 12 years. "We started replanting three years ago," she says. "It takes about three years for a new plant to mature. So we should be back in business again and have some raspberries ready for the festival." Calder adds that raspberries—which grow on canes-ripen "for about five weeks, varying from the first week of July to the first week of August."

During the celebration the town holds a parade, Miss Berry Princess contest, raspberry bake-off, rodeo, craft fair, pancake breakfast, dance. lighted-boat parade, musical entertainment and fireworks. Growers sell freshly picked berries from roadside stands.

"It's been dubbed the biggest little parade in the West," says Bryce Nielson, the town's former mayor. "We've had as many as 75 entries and 15,000 to 20,000 visitors."

Garden City resident JoAnne Anderson recalls the year she and friends dressed as a centipede. "Twelve of us wearing wigs and dark glasses poked our heads through holes in the top of the bug and weaved down the street," she says.



The Bear Lake Monster, fashioned after a "Loch Ness-type" creature that some locals say inhabits the lake, even makes appearances at the parade. "During Utah's bicentennial year, we named her Isabella," resident Bess Huefner says.

The parade highlight is the Miss Berry Princess Float. All the 4- to 6-year-old girls who compete are entitled to ride on the float with the Raspberry Princess.

"In 2001, the theme was survivor," says former competition chair Angie Haller. "The girls were island-style attire and did the limbo to the Banana Boat song. We had a gal dressed in camouflage and one with a gorilla and bananas sewn to her sweatshirt. The mermaid won."

The festival has evolved over the years. The original flea market has turned into a juried crafts fair that sells raspberry shakes and ice cream.

A buckaroo rodeo with mutton busters (kids riding sheep) became a full-fledged rodeo.

In 1998, the town added the popular lighted boat parade. That year, nearly 60 entries—with lights strung in the shape of the Stars and Stripes, Christmas trees, and Snoopy-streamed out of the

"If it's a foggy day, and it's bouncing along with its big 15-foot snaky head, it looks pretty good," Nebeker says. 🆈


