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



Lead concerns prompt library officials to ask for some summer prizes back

oncerns about excessive lead content within prizes given away this summer as part of the Northville District Library's community reading program have prompted officials to ask nearly 200 local recipients of the toys to return or discard them immediately.

Library officials were informed by Highsmith Company, a Fort Atkinson, WI-based prize manufacturer, a recall was issued for two small toys because the lead content exceeds federal regula-

Northville District Library Director Julie Herrin said the small bendable dog and cat were mixed with other toys and snacks inside a special treasure chest participants reached into after completing summer reading goals.

Herrin said parents should return the bendable toys to the library or dispose of them right

Abbo primary victory opens door to speculation about Board's future

The Northville Township Board of Trustees will likely play musical chairs in November, if Supervisor Mark Abbo wins his general election bid to become the 20th

District's next state representative. But who would be left standing, and who will vote to shape the next board, remains unknown.

Clerk Sue Hillebrand said an Abbo victory would likely move Treasurer Dick Henningsen to the supervisor chair, where for the second time in his political career he would serve as interim supervisor. In 2000, Henningsen served the remaining nine months of former supervisor Karen Woodside's term

after she resigned and later lost a close 2002 election campaign for a 35th District judge post.

"My guess is that the board would be unanimous to move (Henningsen) to that position," Hillebrand said.

She said Board members interested in the interim supervisor position are typically asked to accept the nomination only if they do not plan to run for the post during the next election.

Henningsen, 71, said if asked he's up to the challenge. "Oh, yeah, sure," he said Tuesday. "I like serv-

ing the township." He said it's unlikely that he'll seek re-election as treasurer, or even

Downtown makeover group poised to walk

Volunteers will visit potential project sites to execute strategic plan

By Maureen Johnston RECORD STAFF WRITER

At dinner time next Thursday, 100 residents are expected to assemble outside city hall.

Armed with keen eyes and sharp pencils, they'll receive marching orders, then disperse into the downtown.

They're on a mission: Visit shops, inspect parking decks and follow walkways to get a frontline perspective on potential projects. The 6 p.m. walk about town is the latest step for volunteers who enlisted in the effort to implement the city's new strategic plan.

"They want to see results," said Lori Ward, executive director of Northville Downtown Development Authority, the coordinating body of the volunteer efforts.

"We've spent a lot of time, money and community interest in the past few months and they're interested in it moving forward."

Marching orders

In June, Ann Arbor-based consultant Beckett and Raeder submitted to city council a strategic plan which spawned committees to address deficiencies in downtown Northville's marketing.

business mix, design and parking. Next week's walking tour is a follow-up to an Aug. 8 kickoff meeting when volunteers were recruited according to their areas of interest. More than 100 people

City officials heading up four separate committees plan to hire design and marketing experts.

A fifth committee will work without volunteers, internally addressing concerns like setting joint meetings, staff and potentially expanding the development authority borders.

Behind the scenes, Ward said five design firms attended a meeting last week when city administrators walked them through proposal requirements and answered questions.

The consultant's fee and scope of the work will be outlined in their proposals, which the development authority will review Aug. 29. Council action is expected Sept. 5. After a similar process, Ward said hiring a marketing consultant is scheduled for October.

Concurrent efforts

After the walk about town next week, Ward said project leaders will schedule future meetings.

Some committee goals, like recruiting new businesses, hinges on completion first of the marketing goal to create a brand identity for the downtown, Ward said.

"We've got to come up with a way to sell our community to diverse groups," she said "I think that's going to be a real challenge, finding what to communicate for the whole downtown."

Meanwhile, Ward said some low-cost, "low-hanging fruit,"

Next Thursday, the parking group will look at city-owned lots and decks, talk about surveys currently under way and consider capacity. With a to-do list from improving the streetscape to

expanding the town square, the design volunteers will view the potential projects like the Hutton Street entrance to Ford Field.

The marketing group will visit downtown stores and talk about promotional techniques business owners have used with and without success. The business mix group will board a shuttle bus to explore sites like the Foundry Flask area on Cady Street.

An hour later, volunteers, leaders and city administrators will reconvene for a reception at Swearingen Portraits.

■ Volunteers: 'My two cents'

Northville Downtown . Development Authority Lori Ward said the Aug. 8 turnout of more than 100 residents at the volunteer kick-off meeting indicated strong support for undertaking downtown improvement projects.

Since then, people who were tied up with the election, their business or the school board meeting that night have called and e-mailed to say they still want to join the process, she said.

"i was shocked — pleasantly," Ward said. "We're thrilled. That's telling me there's a lot of interest to see the strategic plan move forward." -

The volunteers divided into the various committee meetings at the Northville Senior Community Center last week based on their area of interest.

"In the design committee, between 40-50 people sat in on that," said Ward, adding city planning commissioner Marc Russell jotted six pages of suggestions. "How about that?

"People were anxious to share their ideas about specific issues."

The steering committee that worked alongside the consultant agreed drafting residents and business owners in the process was the best way to

Ward said. "And we want to continue to engage them and keep them active in the process.

"The bulk of the work won't be until the consultant is on board."

Chamber adding new delights to Victorian Festival Sept. 15-17

With the Victorian Festival four weeks away, the Northville Chamber of Commerce marketing and events director is finalizing arrangements for the community's trade-

mark celebration Sept. 15-17. And Bloom thinks a bird's eye view from a balloon tethered at Ford Field would be a hot draw.

While awaiting word whether that plan will fly, she confirmed several additions to the 18th annual festival, which commences with a 6:30 p.m. parade downtown Friday.

"With the Victorian Festival, you can always count on your old favorites," Bloom said. "But each year, we look for something fresh to bring in for our returning visitors."

New for 2006

Among the new attractions for 2006 are a Great Dog Expedition, a vintage car display and a puppet show. Chamber staff also shifted performer locations to ease crowd flow and moved the Victorian saloon to a park-

Returning festival mainstays include children's rides, activity and food booths hosted by non-profit organizations and the Art Market Saturday and Sunday. Live entertainment, staged and strolling, is scheduled through the weekend.

Starting Friday night, people strolling in elaborate costumes set the stage for visitors' trip back to Queen Victoria's era, when the town was established. The chamber will again present awards to the business and non-profit group that best pay tribute to the Victorian

era.

"The one fabulous thing about the Victorian Festival is the support of the community,"

Bloom said. "It's nice to see the community get in the spirit of the

"It's a joy to every one to see people in full costume."

Vintage flavor

Other endeavors lending to the festival's historic backdrop will be vintage baseball games, Mill Race Historical Village activities and tours of Northville's 19th century downtown streets and neighborhoods. Tea and etiquette presentations will be held at three locations.

Bloom said the chamber estimates 60,000 people will visit downtown Northville Friday through Sunday.

Donning layers of lace or knickers and cap isn't for everyone, Bloom said. However, there will be something to hear, eat or do for everyone.

Symptoms include headaches, memory problems, reduced coordination, vomiting, muscle weakness, seizures, abdominal pain and weight loss.

The prizes were available to children from early June through

Herrin said parents choosing to return the toys will receive a replacement prize.



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

as supervisor. But he did not rule out either proposition

"I don't think there is any possi-bility of me running in 2008," Henningsen said "I think it will be time to turn it over to a new generation ... but you never know.

Abbo. November. Republican, will face Democrat Marc Corriveau, who also won the partisan Aug. 8 Primary Election. The 20th District seat - which includes Northville Township, a portion of the City of Northville. Plymouth, Wayne and portions of Canton - is being vacated by termlimited State Rep John Stewart (R-Plymouth).

Under Michigan law, state representatives may serve a maximum of three 2-year terms; state senators may serve a maximum of two 4year terms.

Of more concern, she said, would be appointing a qualified trustee who understands township issues and will work well with current Board members.

That task is made more crucial because the appointed trustee could also tilt the Board politically and provide a working majority, especially on key issues such as establishing budget priorities and the redevelopment of the former Northville State Psychiatric Psychiatric Hospital, a 415-acre site located at the southwest corner of Six Mile and Haggerty roads.

Currently, trustees Mary Gans, Marjorie Banner and Brad Werner often vote in lock-step --- including continued funding for the development of Community Park, moving and refurbishing a Thayers Corner barn and the development fate of a township-owned Five Mile and Sheldon roads parcel.

Though Hillebrand said it is premature to know how many potential trustee candidates could emerge in November, some familiar names have been circulating for months. Among them, she said, is former trustee Shirley Klokkenga, who lost her 2004 re-election bid and is generally thought to share the same political philosophies as Gans, Banner and Werner.

Hillebrand said she likes, respects and misses Klokkenga's presence on the Board - but that's not enough to gamer her support as a potential board trustee.

The voters chose who they wanted to be on their board, and she was not one of them," Hillebrand said. "For that reason, I don't think I could support bringing her back."

■ Board games: How will things play out?

If township Supervisor Mark Abbo wins the November general election, here's how things could play out:

. The Board would likely accept Abbo's official resignation at the Nov. 16 meeting, effective some time in late December.

 Treasurer Dick Henningsen would likely be appointed by the Board to serve as interim supervisor for the two remaining years of Abbo's term.

The Board would appoint a treasurer from current members.

 According to state law, the Board would have 45 days from the effective date of Abbo's resignation to appoint a trustee replacement, or risk a state-imposed special election - paid for by town-

· Prior to appointing a trustee, the Board would likely hire a consultant who would review candidate applications, conduct interviews, identify strenoths and weaknesses and make recommendations, based on criteria provided by the Board.

Trustee Chris Roosen has been mentioned as a potential candidate for the treasurer post, if Henningsen becomes interim supervisor. Roosen is a financial officer for the Visteon Corporation.

Klokkenga and Roosen did not return Northville Record calls prior to press.

Who's playing?

Abbo declined to speculate on the viability of potential trustee candidates, though said he has also heard Klokkenga's name mentioned privately. And even though state law allows him to vote for every potential vacancy except his own, he remains uncertain about the propriety of that right.

'I don't plan on voting for these selections, but I will definitely let my feelings be known," Abbo said, who left open the option of abstaining from any potential vote.

They have to live with whomeyer they bring on, so I would not want to burden them with someone they may not want. They should have the

right to choose the kind of board they want."

Henningsen is not concerned about who, or how many, potential candidates could emerge. "If push comes to shove, we have some good candidates in the community," he

And of working majorities and potential voting blocks?

"The business of the township will proceed," Henningsen said, crediting the "excellent" work done by Hillebrand, Township Manager Chip Snider and township staff.

The system works." Corriveau said such speculation is much ado about nothing.

"I'd like to make that all for naught," he said. "I plan on winning the thing ... Doing so would allow Mark to stay in his position and make sure the people in Northville Township don't have to make those decisions."

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Watts up?

Skylights and brighter lights on tap for new school year

A ray of light will shine on Hillside students next month as they fill the hallways on the first day of school.

New skylights placed near both middle school entrances and the library will greet them, one of many projects taking place in district buildings this summer

A complete light fixture exchange is also taking place throughout the Hillside building with cost-efficient lighting taking

"There are less fixtures, but more light," said Scott Ellis, Skanska project manager. "It's actually quite a bit brighter."

Shining light

Installing electronic ballast lighting with occupancy sensors is happening in most of the district's buildings, as part of the 2004 bond.

"It is an energy savings and it is mandated by the State of Michigan in their conservation said David Bolitho, Northville Public Schools assistant superintendent for administrative services. "We should see a big difference. We're going to see a drop in our electric bills.

Officials said Ridge Wood Elementary and Northville High schools are the only two buildings that won't have the sensors, but the schools that do will benefit greatly from the change.

"Amerman will have a new look," Bolitho said, "It will be so much brighter.

Another lighting change: The pendant lighting in Thornton Creek Elementary School was removed.

Making room

More noticeable summer school projects include the construction of multi-purpose rooms at Winchester and Silver Springs elementary schools.

Both projects were approved as part of the 2004 bond.

Bolitho said neither project will be finished by the first day of school, Sept. 5. He anticipates. mid-October completion for both. "Getting steel was our biggest

problem." Bolitho said. "We're still feeling not only the increase of cost, but time lag of steel from effects of the hurricane last year."

School officials said the work sites will be fenced off and all construction team members will be required to wear proper identification as the construction continues during school hours.

Upon completion, the multipurpose rooms will feature a stage, mechanical rooms and cafeteria. The rooms will offer a full-time lunch spot and a gathering area for student performances, enrichment programs and large gatherings.

"When we complete Silver Springs and Winchester, every elementary school will have a separate eating area," Bolitho said. A district goal, he said, to lessen the impact on the district's physical education curriculum.

In the past, gym class was stopped for lunch and group gatherings as the lunch room was the only large gathering place.

Summer facelift

The majority of district buildings this summer are receiving

The most noticeable: Thornton Creek Elementary School.

The school's new gymnasium floor will be hard to miss.

"It turned out great," said Paul Durkee; Thornton Creek physical education teacher.

The floor, made of a poured synthetic surface, is in bright primary colors with markings for games like basketball, round-about, bowling and ladder climb-

Amerman Elementary has the same type floor, but with a neutral color scheme.

The Thornton Creek gymnasium was slated for hardwood before the new flooring was intro-

Bolitho said the synthetic surface is cost-effective and safe.

"It probably serves our needs better than the wood floor," Bolitho said.

Thorton Creek students will also be greeted by a new ceiling mural, offering bright, cheery hel-

Other noticeable summer changes to district buildings include new entrances at Meads Mill Middle and Silver Springs Elementary schools.

Both entrances are transformed with the use of new doors and glass panels, outing the days of dark and drab.

Meads Mill received new carpet and outdoor landscaping.

Bolitho said the 2004 bondapproved improvements to Meads Mill are now almost complete.

"The comments from the staff and the students have been amazing," he said.

He credits the Meads Mill teachers for being troopers. They've had two summers of total disruption.

Moraine Elementary School, old tiling is being removed as part of an asbestos abatement program. And Bolitho said basketball rigging will also be removed from the same gathering area, making it a true multipurpose room.

Moraine is also receiving a total ceiling replacement and the old boiler was removed and replaced with two separate components.

Unit ventilators are being replaced in the majority of district buildings this summer and security cameras are being installed in all schools.

Under the gun

Despite torn apart ceilings, missing lighting and an appearance of chaos, Bolitho said the projects will be completed in time

for opening day.

"I'm not worried yet," he said. He does admit however, there is a lot to do in the next couple of weeks.

Bolitho said the unit ventilator replacement and new lighting with occupancy sensors must be complete by the first day of school.



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

"They would take it to another level they wouldn't be able to at school," said Baughman. "We really explored a lot of art outside the box.

That's how you really reach kids - think how they do."

After years of watching children use art to work through peer pressure, substance abuse temptations and other conflicts, Baughman's thoughts turned to an art therapy career.

She said her position as Oakwood's arts for the spirit coordinator is a new path toward making a difference in children's lives.

"(The studio) was a place where kids could come and get messy, have fun and learn a little something." she said. "We weren't playing video games, we were using our hands and our minds.

They all learned something about themselves." And so did Baughman.

"Sometimes you have to reach down and really evaluate who you are," she said. "What's best for you at 20 isn't necessarily best for you at 40 or 70.

If elected, Plakas will take the bench alongside Chief Judge John MacDonald and Chief Judge Pro Tem Mike Gerou.

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

Make it a practice to vacuum often areas that receive the most traffic and carpet, at least twice weekly. Removing loose soil prevents it from being worked into the carpet pile by foot traffic.

Use a vacuum cleaner with adjustable rotating brushes able to loosen ground-in soil and with an air flow strong enough to penetrate to the backing, extracting all particles. Enclosed, high filtration bags limit recirculation of particles.

For best results, no matter which type vacuum cleaner you purchase, make sure it's' functioning properly.

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
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Students return from the road with worldly impressions

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



Elections reveal a few surprises

what are we to make of last week's primary elections?

Not very much - with one

huge one exception, which I'll moment. First of Oakland County Sheriff Mike Bouchard won the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate.

beating megachurch pastor and former Detroit councilman Keith Butler. He was expected to win, but the size of his margin Phil Power - 61 percent was surprising.

Most people I talk with say Bouchard is a pretty good guy. He may not be an exceptional thinker, but he's done a perfectly adequate job as Oakland County's top cop, and as a legislator before that.

But he'll have his hands full with incumbent Sen. Debbie Stabenow, a formidable campaigner who already has a \$4.5 million war chest. Still, it's a free pass of sorts for Bouchard.

Even if he loses, he keeps his job as sheriff, wins statewide recognition, and as long as he doesn't embarrass himself, leaves himself in good shape for a future run for governor or U.S. Senate.

Congressman Joe Knollenberg, who also represents much of Oakland, Michigan's largest and richest county, easily overcame a challenge from former State Rep. Patricia (Pan) Godchaux in the 9th Congressional District. Despite strong efforts by Godchaux to attract Democratic crossovers, he still took 70 percent of the vote.

Knollenberg is a very influen-tial member of the House Committee on Appropriations (known in Washington as the "College of Cardinals.") He boasts, accurately, about "bringing home the bacon" (as though that is necessarily a good thing in this time of skyrocketing budget deficits.) While serving in Lansing, Godchaux developed a good reputation as a sensible Republican moderate.

Sadly, that meant that she came to be despised by many in her party. Having withstood her challenge. Knollenberg likely will be re-elected as many times as he wants — unless the district lines are redrawn or age (he is now 73) President Bush on the war.

sentative from Lenawee County, had a ton of money dumped into his campaign by a Washington anti-tax outfit, the Club for Growth, which raised \$477,000 from Club "members" and spent another \$540,000

ads. Meanwhile, Michigan Right To Life, the most powerful force in Michigan poli-

tics, effectively mobilized its troops on the ground. Schwarz's defeat is truly a sad day for Michigan. He is a medical doctor who served with distinction as a U.S. Navy intelligence

officer and CIA agent during the

war in Vietnam. And he is also a 16-year veteran of the state Senate where he was widely regarded on both sides of the aisle as among Michigan's most capable legislators. He is truly a distinguished public servant. A moderate and sensible Republican, he was endorsed by virtually every newspaper in the state, by President Bush, former Gov. John Engler, Arizona's U.S. Senator John

So what happened? The heart of the problem is the dynamics of a crazy redistricting system that, these days, draws most districts in a way to ensure that they are either solidly Republican or firmly Democratic. What that means is that the real winner of these contests gets settled in the primary, not the general election.

McCain, and the state Republican

What's bad about that is that the only people motivated enough to vote in a primary election tend to be extreme — radicals on the right in GOP primaries and on the left in Democratic primaries.

As a result, in the 7th district, the voters who showed up - and there was only an 18 percent turnout, statewide - were disproportionately right-wingers, too many of whom actually were convinced that the moderate Joe Schwarz was too "liberal."

This is a man who served his country in uniform for years, and who is a staunch supporter of

Had voters in the sensible cen-Of course, the big election ter shown up at the polls, the result would have been different. This is not all that far-right a district; it only gave President Bush 54 percent of its vote last time.

But now 660,000 people will

get the kind of representation they deserve, selected for them courtesy of their own apathy and a political action committee funded by a bunch of New York-based rich guys, combined with the passion of the right-to-lifers.

How sad for Michigan. How sad for our nation.

But there you are. This all happened the same day that U.S. Sen. Joe Lieberman, a distinguished moderate Democrat who supported the war in Iraq, got ambushed by left-wing primary voters.

Do these results suggest a continued national trend of polarized politics? Sadly, that conclusion is hard to avoid. I talked last week with an old friend who happens to be a moderate Republican.

"I simply cannot figure out how a moderate of either party gets through the system any more," my pal said. "The litmus tests are too strict and the primary voters are too ideological and passionate."

These days, the notion of a passionate moderate seems a contradiction in terms. This is partly because moderates tend to look at issues one at a time, in a practical way without the clarifying lens of dogma. That is what used to be called common-sense. Today, too many fear it makes them look as

though they lack "core principles." Worse, many moderates tend to react to silly proposals made by the ideologues rather than com-


ing up with their own programs. The whole thing reminds me of the famous lines from W. B. Yeats' poem, The Second Coming:

Things fall apart; the center cannot hold ...

The best lack all conviction, while the worst

Are full of passionate intensity. Most voters say they're pretty much in the middle of the road, and lots of them say they're turned off by the intense partisanship they see in Lansing and Washington, where ideologues call the tune. Small wonder that so many feel so disconnected from the political system. The one glimmer of hope is that if moderates of both parties ever come up with serious, far-reaching, emotionally compelling program, watch out! It just might sweep the country.




No effort was spared on accessibility and safety measures. This park, unlike others, was carefully laid out without a single step or stair. Even the laser arena and golf course are fully accessible.



BUSINESS SENSE

For some customers, call 'waiting' is a big hangup

In your business, you will sometimes have to keep callers waiting while you figure out answers to their questions or find the right person to answer their questions. You could just leave the phone off the hook. perhaps, but callers' cavesdropping is only desirable to a point.

There are several ways that you can entertain callers when you put them on hold. Here are five options to consider.

Staying silent

You could put nothing on the hold line, leaving callers to hear only silence. With no recording, you do not need to worry about the overlap of repetitive recordings. Unfortunately, the person put on hold has absolutely no way of knowing if you are coming back to the phone, or if you have ditched him or her. Lengthy waiting periods will probably result in the caller hanging up - and probably being disgruntled as well

Wait for the beep

A variation on the silence theme, this option adds a beep every few seconds so the caller knows he or she is on hold and has not been disconnected. Because the simple beep is easy to keep in a cycle, callers do not realize when they have reached the restart time of the recording. This grows annoying fast, though, and may result in a number of customer hang ups though fewer than would occur with silence.

Sounds of music

One of the more common methods for entertaining callers put on hold is music. The music is supposed to be soothing, but the problem is, there are different definitions of "soothing" for different types people. Some people may find Celtic or classical music soothing; others may find it depressing or even outright hate it. Some callers may even find it difficult to concentrate as the music soothes them to sleep. Music with some form of beat may be preferred by some and loathed by others. With carefully chosen musical selections, the caller can have a hard time noticing when the recording repeats itself.

Chat them up

Do you like it when someone starts talking halfway into a sentence or cuts out partway? If you decide to use the time in which you put callers on hold to educate them about your products, times of business or other information, you must consider that this will happen to some, if not, most callers. The few callers interested in what is being said will probably also be frustrated, since they will most likely find themselves interrupted while absorbing the information. It is also virtually impossible to hide the restart of a recording when you go this route.

Finding the best mix

Some businesses make a lengthy music recording and, after each cycle, thank callers for waiting and reassure them that someone will be attending them shortly. The "thank you" betrays the music's restart even if the music itself does not but some people may find this method more polite. Speech and beeps can also be mingled, though any repeat of the recording is noticeable to the caller.

Where would you be without your customers and clients? Whatever route you choose to go when putting customers on hold, keep customers and clients in mind. Work with your telephone service provider or telephone software specialist to find the best on-hold method for your business and your bottom






staff who are already licensed veterinary technicians

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

On the other hand, some neighbors can be a problem, hosting loud parties or not maintaining their property. Nanci J. Rands, associate broker with



Rands

SKBK/Sotheby's International Realty in Birmingham, has some advice.

"I think the best way of dealing with these kinds of problems if you will is to be forthright with people," said Rands, president of the Metropolitan

Consolidated Association of Realtors. Some neighbors may simply not know they're making a situation unpleasant.

"My feeling has always been make friends with your neighbors," Rands said. "You take the chocolate chip cookies over first." She feels you've lost the



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war if you have to resort to calling police; Rands adds you may not be aware your dog's been barking while you've been away.

"It's much more a human relations situation than it is strictly a real estate situation." In selling homes, Rands can contact neighbors to enlist help, finding people who'd like to move in.

"It will help us sell our property and get nice neighbors for you," she said. Rands recommends taking an active role in neighborhood/homeowner associations, meeting at least once a year for a potluck or other informal gathering.

That's an ongoing opportunity to deal with any problems, and has a lot of benefits, she said. "From a real estate point of view, it certainly is helpful." She adds much of the topic is common sense – and cents in that it carries economic benefits.

"That goes a long way to helping in any conflict resolution," Rands said of being on good terms with neighbors, something she recommends establishing early on and continuing with the Whetstine said most municipalities have ordinances on such things as grass length and general property maintenance. A good neighbor can help if you've canceled your newspaper while on vacation, but it continues to be delivered, she added. Such a neighbor will know if something has gone wrong.

Marge Whetstine, associate broker at Keller Williams Northville Market Center, agreed it's best to get along with neighbors. If you can't resolve a problem, you may need to enlist the help of your city/township officials.

"It's not worth having a fight with your neighbor," said Whetstine, 2005 president of the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors. "Most people are responsive."

She said most municipalities have ordinances on such things as grass length and general property mainte-

nance. Birmingham, for example, will mow grass that's too long and put the fee on the tax bill if necessary.

Whetstine has found it's good to know what your ordinances allow even for yourself. "Some places won't allow you to have an RV. It's a good idea to know what is allowed in your neighborhood."

She agreed with Rands that neighbors can be a good source of leads for potential buyers. Realtors often send out "just listed" and "just sold" cards to neighbors, and Whetstine finds the latter can give a sense of current property values.

"That gives them some knowledge base to go to their tax assessing meeting," Whetstine said.



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Q. We are on the board of directors of our coop and have been approached by a converter to do a conversion to a condo. Do you have any information or experience in that regard?

A. Many cooperatives are considering converting to a condo for a multitude of reasons including increased resale ability of the units, the ability to obtain financing more easily and to come within the condominium statutes and laws which are, in many instances, better suited to community association development then landlord tenant law is as it relates to co-ops. Of course, the

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cooperative should retain an experienced condominium attorney before considering the conversion process to insure that it is done in a proper fashion maximizing the benefits to the members of the co-operative.

Q. We understand that there has been an influx in conversions of various properties presently being held for lease. Do you have any information in that regard?

A. Marinas, industrial parks, garages, old warehouses, and apartment buildings are among the ever-increasing

real estate properties which are being converted from a leasing situation to fee ownership in the form of a condominium. Moreover, mobile home parks, which have been owned by their operators for many years, now find it financially feasible to convert the mobile home parks to condominiums. In short, there is a substantial

movement not only in Michigan but around the country toward conversions of various real properties into condominium units with the intended benefits of condominium development and operation.
