



■ Purtell's pro-kids projects range from computers to pinafores

Jan Purtell asked why there wasn't a computer in her son's kindergarten classroom.

That inquiry to a Northville Public Schools administrator — from a mother of two recently relocated from Toledo — launched a series of experiences, relationships and service that 20 years later landed Purtell community-wide accolades. On Oct. 18, she was named the Northville Chamber of Commerce 2006 Citizen of the Year.

By the time technology was implemented throughout the district, Purtell had proven her mettle to local educators, bringing high hopes for local students, planning skills and the work ethic to get things done. In and out of her 16-year role as community liaison for the district, she's known for taking a project from start to finish, with her sleeves rolled up along the way.

"I'm sure some of it comes from my upbringing," Purtell said. "Everyone needs to take a part. It's not just worker bees, it's leaders who organize.

"You end up with projects that never get off the ground if someone doesn't take the initiative."

Natural networker

Back in 1986 when Purtell moved to Northville with her husband, Greg, and children, Steven and Kara, she was pursuing a college degree, volunteering part-time and homemaking. Even before the professional positions that followed, she knew she wanted the latest tools and best opportunities for her children.

Her own children now grown and on their own, Purtell remains dedi-

cated to supporting local youth on a variety of fronts. And she'll drag along with her anyone she can.

"I kind of have the philosophy it's no fun unless you do it with someone else," Purtell said with a laugh. "People tend to run the other way when they see me coming."

Purtell said her father was a chamber of commerce president so she learned at a tender age about pulling your own weight and pulling together.

"It's part of giving back to the community," she said. "It's just fun to get people together.

"Let's put everyone together, put our best thinking forward and go from there."

Not enough hours

Purtell's known for sinking her

Behind the scenes, she's working on professional development, implementation of the new high school graduation requirements and public relations.

And that's her part-time job. Her position as business/education part-nerships project supervisor has fluctuated with the district's financial health.

Regardless of whether she's punched in for her 20 hours, Purtell looks around her town and sees interesting projects afoot in the district and municipalities.

I believe in this community and what people are trying to accom-

plish in the schools," she said.
"That's been my biggest problem: wanting to be involved with everything and not having the time to be."

'Wonderful kids'

Through her work for the district and her Young Life youth ministry efforts, Purtell tries to instill esteem, a child at a time, on their own turf.

"There's a lot of wonderful kids in this community," Purfell said. "They work hard. Sometimes, they just need a little direction to make things happen."

She has encouraged student involvement in community service and connected businesses with the schools.

"They would also say I'm a last-minute person. I drive them crazy."

Proudest project

In Jan Purtell's formal role as business/education partnerships project supervisor for Northville Public Schools, she has helped place students in a variety of learning settings.

She counted the program with Community Financial Credit Union as among her proudest accomplishments because it was the first partnership she worked to establish in Northville and it has become a model duplicated by the institution at other branches.

Victorian Festival weekend:

Each September, Jan Purtell can be spotted dripping with cell phones, walkie talkies and any other electronic device to keep her connected to the downtown businesses, schools and other entities that make the festival happen.

With her network of volunteers, Purtell leads the Northwile. community's 500-plus third graders on an educational trip back to time

She laughed, recalling she first got involved with the district project, before her children were old enough to participate. "They asked me why I volunteered, and I said, 'Because they needed help."

In the trenches

Laurie Marrs, former Northville Chamber of Commerce president, who served alongside Jan Purtell for more than a decade, said she was always a ready volunteer.

"The entire time she was on the board, when there was work to be done, Jan would say, "I'll help you. I'll help you. She was always the first one to raise her hand."

The chamber selection committee chose well, Marrs said.
"I'd say that award is long overdue for Jan," she said. "She was undying enthusiasm. She was undying energy. She's definitely such an asset to our community.

The award is well-deserved.

Prop 1: Initiative will protect recreation funds

Government involvement with the allocation of recreational funds is an issue that people will decide on Nov. 7.

Proposal I would amend the state Constitution to protect Department of Natural Resource funds. If adopted, it would require that money held in conservation and recreation funds only be used for their intended purposes.

The ballot also states that it will establish the current Game and Fish Protection Fund and the Nongame and Fish and Wildlife Fund within the Constitution.

The initiative arose from concern that government would divert funds from specific recreation funds to manage a balanced budget.

An analysis written by the nonpartisan, not-for-profit Citizens Research Council of Michigan (CRC) recalls one incident when \$7.8 million of the Waterways Fund was used to support the state's general fund.

Revenue currently collected through recreational activities such as snowmobiling, hunting,

fishing or camping is ultimately available for government use. The proposal looks to combine individual DNR accounts into one large fund, The Michigan Conservation and Recreation Legacy Fund.

Highland Conservancy President Mick Bell said he would like assurances that money spent on recreation programs will be used for its original intent.

According to the CRC analysis,

government benefits from the flexibility that allows them to use tax dollars where they are needed most. But he further contends that if funds are not used for their intended purposes, a hunter, for example would pay more in tax dollars toward the general fund than a non-hunter.

"Do we really need a constitutional amendment to allocate user fees to their intended purposes? Maybe in today's political climate we do. That's sad," Bell said.

Whether you're a veteran voter or a rookie, the voting booth can be an intimidating place — especially when you are facing complicated ballot issues.

BALLOT PROPOSALS

Craig Thiel, a research associate with Citizens Research Council of Michigan, a non-partisan public policy research organization, recently provided an unbiased analysis of one of the issues facing voters -Proposal Five on the statewide ballot.

Proposal Five would set school funding levels slightly higher than they are now - and increase them annually by the inflation rate. The idea is to prevent the legislature from decreasing school funds, as they have several times in recent years. If the state has less money than counted on, it would have to cut spending to something else, not schools.

Come election day, voters must decide whether it should be passed into law.

If passed, the law would:

Increase current funding to public schools, intermediate school districts, community colleges, and higher education by approximately \$565 million. It would require the state to provide annual funding increases equal to the rate of inflation.

According to Thiel, if this pro-

posal passes, and inflation goes up by 3 percent, for example, colleges and universities would get an increase by 3 percent although not necessarily in equal amounts. Public schools under this proposal would get per pupil increases based on inflation. Depending on the district, schools currently receive an average of \$7,500 per student enrolled.

• Require the state to fund any deficiencies from the General Fund.

"We currently fund K through

12 schools out of pot of money called the school fund in which most of the revenue source is the sales tax," Thiel said. "If the cost exceeds this revenue, the state's general fund will have to make up the dif-

· Provide base funding forschool districts with declining enrollment on a three-year student enrollment average.

Right now, according to Thiel, the way the state determines the numbers of pupils enrolled is by

looking at student enrollment for the current and previous year. This proposal would allow districts to look at three-year averages, which would lessen the effect of a declining enrollment.

· Reduce and cap retirement fund contributions paid by public schools, community colleges and state universities, and shift the remaining portion to the state.

Schools, colleges and universities are currently responsible for 100 percent of the contributions to fund pension and health care benefits for retirees and their

benefactors. This proposal would put a cap on the contribution. The cap would be 80 percent of total contribution, and the state would pick up the other 20 percent.

Unlike the inflationary increases, this is a cost that is going to have to

be born," Thiel said. "Under this proposal, it shifts a portion to the state, and frees up resources that the schools would have to use to either provide salaries or put into the classroom."

• Reduce funding gap between school districts receiving basic per-pupil foundation allowance and those receiving maximum foundation allowance.

According to Thiel, the pro-

posed law would require the gap between the basic per pupil foundation allowance and the maximum state-guaranteed per pupil foundation allowance to be reduced from \$1,300 to \$1,000

by fiscal year 2012. Although Thiel and his associates are committed to providing factual, independent and unbiased analysis of issues concerning state and local government,

voters have their own opinions. Milford resident Carol Nagy plans on voting for the proposal. I believe schools do need the money, especially here and in Huron Valley. We need to be able to provide the same education as kids in West Bloomfield and

Birmingham," Nagy said.

three young children. "I find the whole proposal frustrating because we as taxpayers were sold a bill of goods when the 6-percent sales tax was enacted," Mikolaiczik said. "As a father of three, however, I plan to vote for the proposal because it's

the right thing to do for my kids." Salem Township resident Basil Barrett is undecided at this point, however, he says "I haven't heard good things about it."

Prop 3: Initiative would allow dove hunting

A game bird or a song bird? It will be up to Michigan voters to decide on Nov. 7.

If approved, Proposal 3 will make Michigan the 41st state to establish a hunting season for mourning doves.

Gabe Kish of the Gun Barn in Highland said he supports a season that is already legal in Michigan's surrounding states.

In 1905 legislation banned dove hunting in Michigan. The law was reversed in 2004 to establish a three-year trial period in six of Michigan's counties, - he -said. Enough people signed a petition, suspending the season until this year's election.

"It's only an issue because of the type of people that have moved into the neighborhood. All those non-hunters," said Kish.
"It's not the same place as it was 20 years ago."

According to Kish, doves are the most populated bird around. They are a good size piece of meat, and they taste good, he said. only argument neard from non-hunters is that "they are cute little birds," Kish said.

who are opposed to dove hunting said that as the state's bird of peace, doves deserve protection. They say that doves are not overpopulated, not an agricultural threat and not a viable food

Barb Foland said it is evil the way people are teaching children it is okay to hunt doves.

"I feel that it's target practice on a living creature," she said.

Foland is not opposed to hunting in general. She points out that there are many other birds that are larger and a more feasible food source to hunt. She added that doves are not a nuisance to society.

If enacted, Proposal 3 would require a mourning dove hunter to have a small game license and purchase a \$2 stamp.

Autumn Fog of the National Rifle Association said she believes a dove hunting season would add to the economical engine of the society.

Doves are said to be an easier target than most other animals. "It's a great way for new hunters to try hunting," Fog said.

Prop 4: Would restrict government use of eminent domain

Last year, the U.S. Supreme Court decided in a split 5-4 decision that government agencies could force homeowners and businesses to sell their privatelyowned property for the purpose of economic development.

The court ruling, known as the Kelo Decision was a case involving the city of New London, Conn., which condemned private property to be used as part of a redevelopment plan. The court saw the plan as a public benefit, therefore, a good reason to exercise eminent domain.

Michigan voters will decide how they feel on the issue on Nov. 7. Proposal 4 would amend the Michigan Constitution, restricting government's power to use eminent domain in purposes solely to promote economic growth.

According to William Nowling, director of media relations at Sterling Corp., a case in Lansing is still percolating where the state has declared an entire area as blighted. Many residents and businesses are concerned about their welfare including a 3-year-

old McDonalds and a flower shop that has operated in the community for 50 years. Michigan's cur-rent law allows eminent domain to be used for blight removal.

If approved, the amendment will require the government to decide when to use eminent domain on a case-to-case basis using, strict justification. Their authority to declare an entire area as blighted will be limited and determined individually. And only then, if the power of eminent domain is justified the government will be required to pay 125 percent of the fair market value to the owner, Nowling said.

According to Grand Haven City Manager Pat McGinnis, using eminent domain is sometimes necessary. Under a recent \$100 million development plan the city exerted eminent domain when one of 20 owners of contaminated property refused to sell. The construction plan promised 600 jobs

to a town of 11,000 people. "It's not as harsh as it's made out to be. We're very sensitive to people's needs," McGinnis said. The city paid immensely for the property and also took responsibility for its relocating expenses.

Creating a large number of jobs in a small town is a public benefit and a compelling reason to use eminent domain, McGinnis said.

Nowling referred to the Poletown case of 1981, where the city condemned five square miles of land to build a new General Motors plant, which would extend across the borders of Detroit and Hamtramck. It was built in a path where about 1,500 homes, businesses, churches and a hospital once stood. Families and company owners were forced to sell their property in the government's robust effort to keep the automotive industry in Detroit.

Many times, eminent domain actions occur and go unnoticed to the public, according to Nowling.

The threat is so daunting to homeowners that they usually just sell," Nowling said. The likelihood to prevail against govern-ment action is small and many choose not to dispute the administration, he added.

Prop 2: Affirmative action comes under fire

If Proposal 2 is approved at the polls next month, Jennifer Gratz will finally have what she asked the Supreme Court for in 2003.

After being denied admittance to the University of Michigan in 1995, Gratz and another student who was denied admittance in 1997 filed a class action lawsuit against the school, asking for, among other things, an injunction prohibiting U of M from using race as a determinant in its admittance policy.

The case eventually worked its way up to the Supreme Court, which decided in a separate case (also related to U of M) that racial consideration in a school's admissions policy did not violate the equal protection clause of the Constitution.

U of M's admission system, the Court decided in Gratz's lawsuit, took it too far. Ultimately, the verdict came down in favor of

Now, with Proposal 2, the Michigan Civil Rights Initiative, with Gratz as executive director, is asking voters to do what the Court did not: "ban affirmative action programs that give preferential treatment to groups or individuals based on their race, gender, color, ethnicity or national origin for public employment, education or contracting purposes," by way of a constitutional amendment.

According to the MCRI web site, Proposal 2 will not change the Supreme Court's decision because "The court only ruled that consideration of race in the university admission process was not barred by the equal protection clause of the U.S. Constitution, not that it was required."

The people of the state of Michigan are entitled to set a higher standard for their own universities, if they choose," it stated. Calls to the MCRI were not

Malotke-Meslin, Rebecca director of the Get Out the Vote

office, which is run by the Oakland County National Organization for Women, sees problems with Proposal 2.

"Statistics show that white women have been helped more than any other group from affirmative action," she said.

Malotke-Meslin uses heart disease research as an example. Before women entered the field, most heart disease research was conducted on white men, the same demographic as the

researchers, she said. Through affirmative action for better education and better jobs, women were able to research heart disease in women. It was discovered that for women, heart attack symptoms can be completely different than in men.

"Women are still benefiting (from affirmative

Malotke-Meslin said. . She also pointed out that affirmative action can benefit anyone, including men. Affirmative action helps people find opportunity in places they otherwise might be shut out; Malotke-Meslin offers men in the nursing

field as an example. Should it pass, Proposal 2 will not mean the end to affirmative action. While gender and race will no longer be permitted as affirmative action classifications, other classifications implying socio-economic disadvantage will still be allowed.

But to Malotke-Meslin, that's not enough. Without affirmative action, she fears things like closing the gender wage gap will become difficult.

Oppose Proposal 2: The misnamed Michigan Civil Rights Initiative is based on a similar law in California and is being promoted in Michigan by California millionaire Ward Connerly. It is opposed by Governor Granholm, Dick DeVos, and leading candidates from both parties, as well as many religious, community, and civil rights organizations.

If Proposal 2 passes, it could eliminate all programs that address inequality or special needs that exist for women as well as for people of color and ethnic minorities. Passage could mean:

- An end to outreach programs to encourage women and minorities to enter key fields—such as engineering, law enforcement and health care—or to attend college.





Preliminary plans

Highlights of the proposed downtown makeover plans include:

· Big trees. Plans include raised wells, sized to accommodate seating along the edge, like those on Ann Arbor's Main Street.

 Hard surface. The central gathering area would feature stone, brick or concrete, allowing flexible use of the space for movable chairs, portable stages and tables.

 Relocated Main Street median. The trademark clock would shift to be centered on the town square, instead of the Marquis Theatre. Traffic would no longer cut through the median, because the Bandshell Park parking and cutthrough would be eliminated.

 Two-way Mary Alexander Court traffic. Motorists would access the businesses and municipal parking lot from Hutton and Center streets.

 More parking spaces. By reconfiguring the area, the city would net additional stalls on Main Street and Mary Alexander Court, despite angled spaces lost adjacent to Bandshell Park.

 "Celebrated" intersections. The plan calls for a new surface and trees where Main intersects Center and Hutton streets.

. Central fountain. The diamondshaped structure at the town square entrance would feature water in the warm months, and possibly a fire pit in the cool months.

 No more gazebo. The plan doesn't include a permanent structure in the town square. Wide steps terracing down to the Mary Alexander grade would allow seating for performances facing north. like a portable movie screen.

. New on-street lighting. A new torchiere system could highlight downtown's historic facades, include documentation the area's heritage and colorful plantings.

 Outdoor dining. Four businesses adjacent to the town square Helen's Uptown Cafe, Sizzling Sticks, Mackinnons and Great Harvest Bread Company — may be able to offer outdoor seating.

Budget expands public safety

■ Police, fire share equally in millage funds

Thanks to voters, Northville Township's public safety departments are getting a few new bells and whistles this year.

When the board of trustees approved the municipality's 2007 budget Thursday night, the elected officials also gave public safety officers the go-ahead to buy the tools they need to better fight fires and criminals.

The money for the upgrades isn't coming from the townships' \$5 million general fund, which had a 3-percent increase in revenues and expenditures over last year. Instead, an Aug. 8 millage passed by voters is the source of income for these improvements.

Revenues to the general fund include property taxes, as well as state sources and fees residents pay for local permits. That money pays the townships' \$4.8 million in expenditures to various township departments including the clerk, treasurer and planning and zoning departments over the course of the year.

Finance Director Thelma 'Kubitskey said overall, this year's budget isn't much different from last year's except the police and fire departments are getting an 'equal share in revenue.

She said funds for the departments were split 70/30 last year, with the police department getting the lion's share of the revenue.

"With this new millage, the fire department is getting more money," she said.

Police

The police department budgeted \$4.5 million in revenue this year, but also budgeted just over \$7 million in expenditures. Kubitskey said the budget is balanced because the leftover expenditures are paid for by the department's fund balance from a previous millage.

The police department's budget calls for several capital improvements valued at \$688,750.

A \$500,000 chunk of that figure is allocated to expanding the department's jail cell.

The expansion will add three to four additional cells, which Police

Chief John Werth said is a necessity as the community's population grows.

"We're having to double people up in a cell and that's a liability." Werth said. "I know I can get three additional cells: I'm hoping I can get four."

Other capital improvements for the police department include upgrading current vehicles and incar computers.

Police also have one new fulltime dispatcher budgeted for 2007, along with two additional part-time dispatchers.

Fire

The fire department budgeted slightly more than \$4.6 million in both revenue and expenditures, keeping spending lower than income by \$37,680.

A few new faces will appear at the fire department with the passing of this budget. The bulk of the department's expenditures includes three additional full-time firefighters.

Capital improvements include building maintenance at fire headquarters and new mobile radios.

The rest of the budget includes housekeeping items, such as paying back nearly \$300,000 to the general fund for previously purchased equipment.

Township Manager Chip Snider said year after year, all department heads are required to develop their own budgets before presenting them to the finance director.

"They must take a look at the items they want her to fit in a balanced budget," he said. "Their capital improvements are their decisions to make."

The grant comes from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, which siphons the money to Wayne County.

The county then distributes the funds to eligible communities, including Northville Township.

expected the municipality to receive nearly the same amount it received last year, \$85,000.

She even included a similar figure of \$82,970 in the township's recently approved 2007 budget.

But she was off, by more than \$20,000.

The township is getting \$104,000 this year.

The budget she prepared calls for the funds to spent on public services, administration and senior citizens, who were given the bulk of the money, \$63,050.

Now, those numbers have to be slightly adjusted.

But the buck doesn't stop there. Residents who fit certain income requirements — such as those who make between \$39,150 per year and \$55,900 per year and follow federal Community Development Block Grant guidelines — can request Community Development Block Grant Funds to rehabilitate their homes.

Delores Bowden, accounting administrator for Northville Township, handles Community Development Block Grant funds, and a portion of her salary is paid by the grant.

She said interested parties need to be able to show proof of all of their income, including their record of deed or mortgage, bank statements, homeowners insurance and property taxes.

Bowden said that not enough people requested the funds from the township last year so the money was used to upgrade air conditioning at Allen Terrace, a City of Northville senior housing facility which is home to former Northville Township residents and family members of residents.

"By law we have to have the public hearing," Bowden said. "(But) we are looking for more people to use the funds."

Construction worker killed

■ Twp. police investigating

Northville Township Police are looking into the Tuesday afternoon death of a 29-year-old worker for San Marino Excavating, Inc.

His body was found partially buried in a 10-foot trench at home under construction on Parkview Road in the Stonewater subdivision.

Lt. Greg Rhodes said the incident happened at about 2 p.m.

when the worker was hooking up water and sewer pipes for a house when part of the trench collapsed.

"We're interviewing the workers and looking into it," he said.
"The body has been turned over to the medical examiner's office. It appears to be accidental at this time."

Rhodes said Tuesday that police were unsure whether the victim has surviving relatives.

Fire Chief Bill Zhmendak said the fire department responded to the scene at about 2 p.m., and police secured the area while two firefighters went into the trench to recover the body.

He said the water department

assisted in the process by providing equipment that prevented the rest of the trench from collapsing on the firefighters.

He said the worker was buried

from the waist up, and it appeared he died because something fell on his head. Zhmendak said the cause of death would have to be determined by the medical examiner's office.

"He was deceased when we arrived," Zhmendak said. "I wish it would have been a rescue, but it didn't turn out that way."





We applaud event organizers, including Vickie Kopistiansky and Jan Purtell, for making this happen year after year. The lessons learned in one morning will go beyond a classroom lesson.

Township: 2006 vote made jobs for 2007

Tucked somewhere between Detroit and Ann Arbor is a quiet township that isn't laying off its public safety workers. And that's refreshing. Other municipalities are trying to heal their financial wounds, caused by cuts in state revenue sharing and the Headlee amendment by slicing law enforcement and fire-fighting personnel through layoffs and attrition. According to the Michigan Municipal League, 1,500 police officers were laid off across the state during the last five years. But that's not happening in Northville Township. Residents here didn't want that. Keeping the streets safe and having an adequately staffed fire department were a priority. And so was creating jobs. Because of the Aug. 8 millage that voters passed, six people will be employed by the end of 2007; three in the police department and three in the fire department. It isn't hundreds. Sculpture's powerful message

On a recent trip to Northville, my friend, who is a resident of Northville, mentioned that a new sculpture had been installed at the far end of the park where we were walking. She said that there had been some controversy over whether the piece should be installed in the public park. It was a memorial erected by the family of a young man afflicted with mental illness who was fatally shot by police during a crisis. A terrible tragedy.

As we walked up to the wide circle of boulders set into the wooded hillside, we looked for some type of sign to explain the sculpture, but found none. Fine gravel covered the ground and in the center was a very large, rough-hewn rock. Its lines were not particularly beautiful. The most outstanding quality was its overwhelming size and the fact that it was perched on top of an extremely small chrome cylinder. It looked dangerous!

Underneath the giant boulder was a most tender planting of Lamb's Ear, encircled by smoothly rounded river rock. The others in the group naturally moved back to observe and consider the sculpture from the safe distance of the largest boulders.

For some reason I felt compelled to reach out and touch the rock. As I did, the rock began to turn. With only one finger touching the rock, I walked in a circle around it and the rock turned smoothly and easily with me.

The message was thunderously clear to me. The beauty of the message made me weep. How easily we back away from what we fear. Mental illness can look ugly and dangerous. Those afflicted are left to try and survive mostly in solitude. But underneath that threatening exterior lies a tender human spirit needing another human to reach out. To do so, brings life and hope where there was only solitude.

As a mother of a young man with Autism, I can say with conviction that all of us are "handicapped" in one way or another. Some are just more obvious. It is the reaching out of one to another that brings healing to both.

Thank you to the family that placed the monument and to the town of Northville, who allowed his family to share their beautiful vision. The piece is a brilliant expression of a side of life too often ignored.

But who really runs these places, you might ask? To be

sure, it's their presidents — Mary Sue Coleman at the U-M, Lou Anna Simon at MSU and Irvin Dexter Reid at

They, however, have to answer to a higher power — their various governing boards — called regents at the U-M, trustees at MSU and governors at WSU. What few voters realize is that these schools have a special status in Michigan's

Their governors are elected by a statewide vote of the people, something that doesn't happen at our other state schools.

These regents, trustees and govemors serve eight-year terms. Their duties are clearly set out in Article VIII, Section 5 of the Michigan Constitution. That includes the power to hire - and fire - their university's presidents. They are also charged with setting policy and overseeing all spending at their respective institutions.

Plainly, these are hugely important jobs, given special Constitutional standing and freedom from control even from the (far too often) prying legislature. (I should know. I was a trustee of the University of Nuchigan from 1987 to 1999.)

So how do candidates for these jobs get on the ballot?

They are nominated by the conventions of their political parties. And candidates for each school

will be on the ballot Nov. 7. Have the vast majority of the voters ever heard of any of them? Not likely. Do they know their

You know the answer. It is sad but true that members of the goveming boards of our most precious assets are nominated in obscurity and elected in wholesale ignorance.

That's one of the most bizarre and unfortunate aspects of the Michigan political system. Bizarre, because for candidates to get nominated they have to pass through the stringent litmus tests required by each party; for the Democrats, it is acceptance by organized labor. Republicans have to be acceptable to Right to Life.

That's especially unfortunate because once nominees have gotten their respective seals of approval, they then run - utterly unknown - in an election whose outcome is entirely a crap shoot.

Here, by the way, is how those elections are determined. If it is a Republican year at the top of the ticket, nearly all the Republican candidates for these jobs win. That's because most of the votes they get are from people who vote a straight ticket.

If it is a Democratic year, the

reverse happens. So no wonder it's getting tougher and tougher to recruit able people to run for these important offices! Who wants to have to truckle to the unions or the antiabortion fanatics?

And who wants to spent lots of time and (sometimes) money running a campaign whose outcome is almost entirely out of the candidate's hands? This is for an unpaid job, by the way.

Fortunately, there are good people willing to go through this trouble. I'd like to introduce two of them to you, one a Democrat and one a Republican, as inspiring examples of the kinds of publicspirited people who go out of their way to help manage our great uni-

Democrat Debbie Dingell is running for the board of governors at WSU. She's probably better known as the wife of Congressman John Dingell, who has served in the House longer than anyone now there. But she's hardly a shrinking violet from her husband's shadow.

She is vice chair of the General Motors Foundation and chair of the Parade Company, which puts on the annual and legendary Thanksgiving Day event in downtown Detroit.

She also serves on the boards of the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts and the Metropolitan Affairs Coalition.

another, fierce in her views and inclusive in her politics, Debbie Dingell is the prototype of an engaged activist. She graduated from Georgetown University, studying to be a diplomat, and then did a Masters degree in ethics.

Why is she running? "I want to keep Wayne State affordable and accessible to the kinds of people who want and

deserve to go to college. "As a member of the board, I certainly don't want to micromanage the daily business of the University. I think I can be someone to help out, to be a resource to the president, to be a cheerleader, to help make sure the University reaches its potential."

Republican David Brandon is running for re-election to the board of regents at U-M. A very successful businessman, he's Chairman and CEO of Domino's Pizza Company and on the boards of several other Fortune 500 companies.

He graduated from the university in 1974, but he's better known for having played Wolverine football for Bo Schembechler on three championship teams. Talking with Brandon is like listening to a welltuned engine: smooth, powerful, relentless.

He's the archetype of something very rare and valuable: the business leader who is fully engaged in civic

So why is he running again? "Because I feel strongly that it's the fiduciary responsibility of . members of our board to oversee the deployment of the university's resources, to make sure our mission and strategic direction is compatible with the needs of the taxpayers, and to be good stewards of public funds and private donations."

Dingell and Brandon are not the only capable people running. But they're wonderful examples of people who make such a profound difference --- and offer some hope for the future of our state.



Sports Medicine

No pain no gain can run you out of the game

e've all been there. You pull out of your driveway for the morning commute on a cool fall morning and there's the jogger on the side of the road, steady puffs of white air trailing behind their head.

For most people the kneejerk response is a subconscious check of the climate control to make sure it's all the way over to the red side, often

by a sip of steaming coffee and the "better them than thought to oneself. For the fellow jogger on the

other hand, the typical thought is to wonder what took them so long to get out there often followed by the anxious feeling that maybe it's that you didn't stay out there long

Such is the mentality of the avid runner. "No pain, no gain" is taken to an entirely different level. Unfortunately, at some point in their life, most runners will have an encounter with leg pain. One of the most common runner's afflictions is shin splints syndrome. Shin splints are a deep dull ache in the shin experienced during and after running. The anatomic cause is inflammation of the thin lining of the tibia (shin) bone. Distinguishing between shin splints and a stress fracture is challenging since the symptoms are almost identical. Xrays can help in this regard but the most precise way of differentiating is with a bone scan which is a special type of xray done after an injection of a tracer medication.

The heel is the most common site of pain in joggers. Stress fractures can also occur in the heel but typically this is either a plantar fasciitis or Achilles tendonitis. Achilles tendonitis will usually cause pain just above the heel while plantar fasciitis causes pain directly on the heel and on the inside sole of the foot. Worn out shoes, lack of heel cushion and running on concrete rather than a rubberized track are all to blame when heel pain occurs.

Knee tendonitis can strike different areas of the knee. The classic runner's knee is IT band friction syndrome. The IT (iliotibial) band is the firm band of tissue that runs down the outside of the entire thigh between the quads and the hamstrings. This will cause pain on the outside region of the knee. Running on a banked surface is often the primary culprit in this syndrome. Patellar tendonitis is another form of knee pain that falls into the category of an 'overuse' injury. This typically causes pain directly in the front of the knee during and after running and, ironically, also with prolonged periods of sitting (the so-called 'airplane'

Common risk factors for these runner's pains are improper shoe wear, flat feet, and accelerating one's training t∞ rapidly. While your physician can fine-tune the treatment to each specific case, the basic treatment for all of these consists of shoe wear modification, arch supports, physical therapy for stretching tight muscles and, most disheartening to the runner, a break from running of weeks to months depending on the severity of the condition. The most important advice is to listen to your body-persistent pain is persistent for a reason. Crosstraining on an elliptical or in a swimming pool can substitute for the cardiovascular workout but for the true runner, nothing can replace those cool morning sessions watching the rest of the world go to work.



Developers work with community, businesses The developers: Who are they?

The Green Oak Village Place Mall was created through the joint efforts of Quadrants, Inc.; Lormax Stern Development Co.; and REDICO, three developers with an eye for what upscale America is seeking in a shopping experience.

"We feel with the tenant selection, market and the attention to detail, this mall should rise to the top in the nation for lifestyle centers," Sean Valentino, Green Oak Village Place general manager, said.

The mall was designed with specific tenants in mind. The developers wanted to offer the affluent, diverse residents in the surrounding communities an opportunity to shop at stores like Talbot's. DSW Shoes, Chico's and Ios. A. Bank without driving far from home.

The \$100 million plus project includes \$6 million in road improvements that both accommodate the mall traffic and help correct backups and traffic flow issues that were problems long before the mall was even envisioned. All three roundabouts at U.S.-23 and Lee Road were entirely funded by the developers.

The new mall brings other benefits to Green Oak Township and the surrounding communities, as well.

For starters, the new mall brings approximately 2,000 jobs to the county. About one-third of them are high-paying jobs and another third are perfect for those needing flexible schedules.

Additionally, Green Oak Township will benefit from the new taxes the mall creates. Mark St. Charles, township supervisor, said the Green Oak Township Police Department will receive an estimated \$76,000 in new

revenue yearly. The Fire Department would see \$70,000, and the township general operating about \$40,000 in new revenues.

The three developers plan to collaborate on at least 10 more projects two in Livingston County.

"Lifestyle malls are the trend in the U.S. and retailers are demanding it," Valentino said. "Retail development is still a pretty hot market in Michigan."



The roundabout is designed to slow down traffic — that is why they are relatively small — while keeping the traffic moving along.



In addition to improving traffic flow, roundabouts are also good for the environment. Because they keep the traffic moving, they work to decrease emissions and improve fuel economy.

And, roundabouts definitely reduce serious accidents. While reducing the speed, the roundabouts also eliminate the need to turn left.

Both of these factors contribute to a reduction of serious

accidents.

Despite these benefits, some drivers are still, understandably, intimidated. The roundabouts are new to the majority of drivers and can be overwhelming when approaching them for the first time.

Learning the curves

Driving is simple if one follows the signs and remembers these few simple rules.

- Read the signs and lane markings before entering the roundabout so you know which lane to get in.
- Always yield to vehicles already in the roundabout they will be on your left.
- Remember traffic moves counterclockwise always go to the right.
- The right lane is for vehicles exiting the roundabout.
- The inside lane is for vehicles continuing around the roundabout to an upcoming exit.
- Use your right turn signal

when exiting the roundabout.

- If you miss your turn, relax. The beauty of the roundabout is that you can continue along and you will come back by your exit in a few seconds. Just follow through in the left lane until you can safely work your way over to the right lane to exit.
- Do not stop or backup.
- Follow the recommended speed limit of 20 mph. The round-

abouts are designed to reduce the speed of traffic.

"It's built on the concept of yielding and paying attention, and that's probably going to be some of the hardest things for people to learn," Mike Craine, managing director of the Livingston County Road Commission, said. "If they refuse to do either one of them, I have no advice for them."





Promoting a better way to fix basement leaks

ean Teaster and Keith Potts want people to know that there are two ways to fix a basement leak.

The first is the traditional way and the second is the better way.

The co-owners of Mr. Sponge of Novi have been helping homeowners seal leaks in base-

ment walls for 12 years using a number of different meth-

They have perfected a method of repairing cracks and holes in poured concrete basement walls from the inside, rather than the outside where materials

applied to cracks can breakdown and the cost can break a household budget.

Mr. Sponge uses injection repair to seal the walls.

"We can stop water at its source," Potts said. "Our material flexes with the wall as opposed to the epoxy-fill method which can open back in."

Potts said that Mr. Sponge uses its own materials to repair the cracks and also holds a

patent on a plug, which they use to insert into holes in each wall created by tie rods used to secure the walls when concrete is poured in. Once the steel rods are removed there is a hole, which can introduce water and moisture into a basement wall.

With this common method used in construction, homeowners should be aware that basement walls could begin leaking in only a few months after the new home is built.

"Some homes that are 6 months old can have more active leaks than ones that are 40 years old," Potts added.

He noted that newer, larger homes tend to "rack and roll" and put more stress on the foundation, as opposed to smaller homes.

Potts said that Mr. Sponge can help people who are considering basement remodeling projects. He advises all homeowners to take preventative measures to protect their basements. One simple preventative measure can save thousands of dollars on repairs later on.

Speaking of costs, Potts said some of his repair jobs can be as low as \$500 and take about 1 to 1-1/2 hours to fix. And both Potts and Teaster will be very honest and frank with customers when they assess the basement leaks.

"A lot of folks have allergies and mold spores can be a problem, caused by leaks and moisture," Potts said. "We tested a home after fixing one leak and noticed a 60 percent to 90 percent drop in mold spores."

Mr. Sponge also helps homeowners correctly find and identify the source of leaks in their basement.

"Nine out of 10 times the water that is puddled on a basement floor comes from the wall, through a crack or tie rod hole."

As part of his consultation, Potts will also advise homeowners to install a back-up sump pump, although Mr. Sponge does not sell sump pumps.

"We believe in telling customers just what they need," said Potts. "We like to educate them, too."

Two other benefits of repairing leaks using Mr. Sponge include:

■ No mess — homeowners can paint over repaired walls one week later.

■ All work is backed by a 20year transferable warranty.

Besides repairing leaks, Mr. Sponge also uses a method to stabilize basement walls called "Concrete Stabilization with Carbon-Tech."

This method involves applying carbon tech to walls to prevent damage from fatigue, recracking, and foundation movement.

"We travel to all areas of the tri-county," said Potts. "We believe there is no better way to seal a leak. Our name implies a sponge — something that works like a sponge."






It may be best to beg off on conflict

Q. I am a new lawyer at representing community associations and am concerned about the fact that one of my prospective clients had several board members who have been antagonistic to me. I am about to be hired by the board of directors but am wondering what your experience has been in that regard?

A. In my recent book I talk about the "cast of characters" that one finds on the board of directors and unfortunately sometimes you find directors who have a great distaste for lawyers and/or do not match

your personality.
Sometimes some of the best clients are the ones that you choose not to represent just like some of the best real estate deals are the one that aren't made. If you've got a bad group of board members to begin with, things could only get worse unless, of course, the

Q. Our board refuses to spend the money to fix a number of the units in the condominium and we have received a number of complaints from our members threatening us with litigation. We can't get the other board members to recognize their responsibilities. Can you help?

A. One of the primary responsibilities of the association through its board of directors is to maintain and repair those areas of the condominium for which the condominium documents give the association such responsibility. Boards are frequently reluctant to do so because they are afraid to spend the money or do not have the money. They look for excuses to take the cheapest way out and/or to ignore their responsibilities. The board can be and should be pursued for failure to discharge their responsibilities including the proper maintenance and repair of the condominium project. Hopefully your board will see the light and recognize what their fiduciary and legal responsibilities are without you having to resort to litigation or the political process to remove them as directors of the association.


Just as he did as a music journalist, Henke makes phone calls, pounds the pavement and doesn't take no for an answer. He spent years in talks with Apple Records in London-the Beatles' record label-before finally lining up records, mementos and original footage for an exhibit on George Harrison's Concert for Bangladesh. He logged countless hours sending e-mails and making phone calls until members of ZZ Top allowed him to fly to Houston to obtain their stage props and guitars for an exhibit.

Much of Henke's success stems from his solid reputation and ability to put artists and their families at ease. "He was very much in tune with what we wanted," says Janie Hendrix, sister of the late guitar legend Jimi Hendrix. While overseeing her

brother's estate, Hendrix has worked closely with Henke, and loaned the museum numerous items. "He's very gentle, very kind, very respectful of people," she says.

Henke also is well connected. He used his friendly relationship with the Irish rock band U2-which he first wrote about in 1980to obtain items for a 2003 museum exhibit, including the band's handwritten lyrics, stage costumes and even the first U2 T-shirt from the band's teenage years.

"I enjoy it," Henke says of his job as caretaker of an

American-born art form. "I like the idea that we're passing on the history of rock 'n' roll." ⋨





Seventh- and eighth-graders pour into the gym at South Laurel Middle School in Laurel, Ky., quickly filling the bleachers. Doubly excited, they are not only excused from class, but it's for a rock 'n' roll concert.

As the last students settle into their seats, the band Street Heat launches into "Nod Your Head," a popular song from the movie Men In Black II, and the students rise to their feet to clap, sing along and move to the groove.

Street Heat, based in Louisville, Ky., has been performing shows like this for 15 years at schools and other venues across Kentucky. But they're not your typical rock band. Its members are full-time police officers, sheriff's deputies, correctional officers and firefighters who volunteer their time to use music to reach kids with messages about resisting drugs, avoiding violence, dealing with peer pressure and believing in themselves.

Lead singer Billie Monk, 52, a correctional officer, says the reaction to the shows, especially in rural areas, is amazing. "We have actually gone to schools that have never seen a concert," she says. "Not a rock in roll concert, anyway. You'd think we were Van Halen."

Police officer Sonya Talbor, 40, is a vocalist in the band. "Music crosses all boundaries," she says. "This is a positive connection with law enforcement where they can hear from someone other than their parents, other than their teachers, people who are encouraging them to do the right thing."

Street Hear works to stay current on music popular with kids. Their repertoire includes songs on the current pop charts, some rap, a bit of country and even a few golden oldies. But they're careful to select songs with positive messages consistent with their musical mission. For example, "I'm a Believer," the 1966 Monkees smash reworked for the movie *Shrek*, is presented with a commentary encouraging kids to "believe in themselves." Before singing the Maroon 5 hit "Harder To Breathe," Talbot tells the kids that making bad decisions can make you feel trapped, making it incleed "harder to breathe."

The group also modifies the lyrics of some songs. The 1984 hit "Ghostbusters" becomes "Drugbusters." The tag line of the 1995 TLC pop hit "Waterfalls" ("Don't go chasing waterfalls") becomes "Don't go chasing drugs." Percussionist







Barry Shaw, 46, a correctional officer, says the band hopes when kids hear the original tunes on their radios or iPods after a Street Heat show, they'll remember the Street Heat versions. Maybe, he says, "it will make them think about the anti-drug message we put out."



One of the most effective ways to measure the band's success is through the feedback after a performance sometimes years after. It's not uncommon for the group to hear from former students, now adults, who say hearing Street Heat had a positive impact on their lives. "I don't remember much of my middle school years," says Montez Davis, 27, of Louisville, who saw Street Heat in the early 1990s. "But I remember Street Heat. Hearing how to be responsible, how not to get caught up in peer pressure, to respect your elders, to stay in school and to just be a good person-it stuck with me."

The message also seems to be sticking with kids like South Laurel seventh-gracker Kyle Smith. "I liked the music," says Smith, "and the whole point of it was good, too-don't do drugs."

Brooke Butler, an eighth-grader at Louisville's Farnsley Mikklle School, says Street Heat's music encourages kids not to follow the crowd. "You should just say no to drugs and drinking and smoking, instead of trying to fit in with other people," Butler says. "Let them try to fit in with you."

Firefighter and bass guitarist Gerald Shively, 43, says the members of Street Heat believe they're indeed making a difference, which is why the group has stayed together for so long.

'You hope that what we're doing does have an impact," he says. "That's why we put our hearts into it."



Did You Know...

ILLINOIS—The Northwest Passage Root Beer Saloon in Alto Pass (pop. 388) serves a variety of micro-brewed draft root beer in frosty mugs and toasts itself as the world's first root beer saloon.

INDIANA—America's first "union depot" was built in Indianapolis in 1852-53. The term "union" was used because the depot combined and centralized the many independent railroad lines. The Crowne Plaza Hotel is within the station and has 26 authentic Pullman car guest rooms.

Hulman and Co. of Terre Haute (pop. 59,614), makers of Clabber Girl Baking Powder, opened the Clabber Girl Museum in 2002. Before the 1879 introduction of manufactured leaveners, bakers mixed sour (or clabbered) milk with a form of baking soda. The mixture would release carbon dioxide into the dough, causing it to rise. Manufactured baking powder produced a more consistent and reliable result.

Motorists can see the herd from designated viewing areas. MINNESOTA—Opened in 1929 as an ultra exclusive retreat, the Naniboujou Lodge near Grand Marais (pop. 1,353) lists baseball great Babe Ruth, boxer Jack Dempsey and sports writer Ring Lardner among its charter members. Crèe Indian designs and a 200-ton native stone fireplace embellish the dining room.

MISSOURI—The Battle of Wilson's Creek, fought near Republic (pop. 8,438) on Aug. 10, 1861, was the first major Civil War engagement west of the Mississippi River, involving about 5,400 Union troops and 12,000 Confederates. Although a Confederate victory, the battle led to greater

acre battlefield, which has changed little from its historic setting and is in near pristine condition.

NEBRASKA—Elizabeth Robb Douglas invented the collapsible voting booth in 1905 before women even had the right to vote. Her invention led to

the formation of Douglas Manufacturing Co. in Crete (pop. 6,028), which keeps elections running smoothly.

NORTH DAKOTA-

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service operates two federal fish hatcheries in the state—the Valley City (pop. 6,826) National Fish Hatchery and Garrison Dam National Fish Hatchery in Riverdale (pop.273).

OHIO—In 1883, Barney Kroger invested his life savings of \$372 to open a grocery store in downtown Cincinnati He was the first grocer to offer a bakery and to combine a meat market and grocery store under one roof. Today, Kroger Co. is one of the nation's largest grocery retailers.


SOUTH DAKOTA-

Davin Holland of Tabor (pop. 417) reeled in a state record flathead catfish from the James River in June. The whopper weighed 63.5 pounds, was 47 inches long and had a girth of 30 inches.

WISCONSIN—Known as the "father of Social Security," economist Edwin Witte developed the plan for the federal insurance program while serving as executive director of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's Committee on Economic Security in 1934. Witte was born on a farm near Watertown (pop. 1,876) in 1887.
