# Freshmen: New high school graduation requirements set to take effect this fall

#### **Graduation alteration**

Incoming freshmen in all Michigan high schools will see new requirements they must meet if they want to graduate in the spring of 2011. Here is a breakdown of the students' new courseload at Northville High School, with the old requirement in parentheses. Students need 28.5 credits to graduate. More than half, 16.5, come from the Michigan Merit Curriculum, while the remaining credits come from electives and seminar credits.

#### ■ Class of 2011 first to see new, more stringent demands

The number of credits Northville High School students need to receive their cap and gown - 28.5 - didn't change when the state graduation requirements did. The courseload got a little heavier, though.

Across the state, students are now required to complete four English language arts credits; four credits in math with the additional requirements that one credit be

taken in a student's senior year and students must complete Algebra II; three science credits; three social studies credits; one health/physical education credit - a half-credit in Northville and one fine arts/music credit. Northville high students are also required to complete half-credit online and health courses and two seminar credits as well.

The remaining number of credits required for graduation varying by district - would be made up of elected classes that would be part of the 21st Century

Applied Learning Core.
Northville Public District Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said the changes have caused the district to reinvent its summer school programs. He said students are no longer taking summer courses "because they have

to," adding the off-season classes give students the option of exploring courses before the school year

'This change makes it possible that we're leaning more toward year-round schooling," Rezmierski said. "Not formally, because we don't have the funds to do so, but the changes give a challenge to stu-dents to complete those require-

ments in four years."
On Nov. 15, 2005, Michigan Superintendent of Public Instruction Mike Flanagan announced that he had presented the State Board of Education final recommendations to "improve the rigor, relevance and outcome of Michigan high schools."

requirement Flanagan's changes, which go into effect this fall with the class of 2011, will add two math credits and one additional science credit and make finishing Algebra II mandatory for students.

According to Flanagan, the changes are necessary in order to prepare students to succeed in post-secondary education and subsequent careers in the competitive global economy of the 21st

In his memorandum to the board, Flanagan outlined the requirements based on a detailed study conducted over the past year on the issue of improving Michigan high schools.

The changes will incorporate the Michigan Merit Curriculum and become the content standards for high school students.

Michigan The Merit Curriculum would incorporate the Michigan Merit Core and the 21st Century Applied Learning Curriculum to make Michigan high school students competitive with other highly-educated students around the globe, according to Flanagan.

Rezmierski said the changes are affecting all levels of K-12 education. Some of the courses required to receive a high school diploma will be offered to middle school students as a way to free up more time to dedicate to other classes upon entering high school.

The rigor and relevancy of the new requirements signals a vast improvement and certainly implies that all academic, levels will see improvements," Rezmierski said. "But here in Northville, both our general and special education curriculums have been similar to (the state's revised) requirements for more than 20 years.

"Ninety-percent of our graduates go on to college, too, so we're expecting those trends to continue even with the changes."

# Salsa dancing

#### ■ Northville sisters balance family, growing business

Sisters Lisa Ruggirello and Angela Plachta began making salsa using their mother's recipe in the basement of their childhood home about 20 years ago.

For the Northville residents, this fall tradition became popular amongst family and friends, who would come to the home hoping to snag a jar of the savory

"People loved it," Ruggirello said. "They'd come over, and the first thing they'd say is 'where's the salsa?' We never gave away much because we only made so much each year. We were stingy about it."

The demand for the salsa spread in January 2006 when Ruggirello and Plachta entered the Northville Fire & Ice Chili and Salsa Cook Off, naming their entry "Little Diablo Salsa." The concoction, made with 100-percent natural, fresh ingredients, earned the sisters first prize for best consumer salsa and best product name, respectively.

"Angela, her husband, Doug, and I were talking one day when we came up with the name,"

Ruggirello said. "We liked it so ding business venture. Angela much, we kept it."

and winning was the icing on the cake. It was Doug, however, who decided the salsa was good enough to distribute to the mass-

It was Doug who did most of the "footwork," Angela said. He visited manufacturers and got the creation patented. Because of this team effort, the salsa is now mass produced through Blue Torch Distribution in Westland. It is also sold in more than 150 Spartan Stores, along with Northville's Hiller's and Busch's.

A family recipe has turned into a growing business. But the business aspect hasn't led to Angela. 39, and Ruggirello, 42, neglecting something that is extremely

important to each of the sisters. Ruggirello's four children, and Angela's two youngsters, all attend Northville Public Schools. Each child, ranging in ages 5-15. is also active in sports within the district. A large support group, which conducts business with distributors in Grand Rapids, enables the two sisters to handle local matters while making it possible for them to maintain their family

"Both (Angela and Ruggirello) have worked extremely hard balancing six kids and running this local start-up company," Doug

said it's a bit of a struggle balanc-Both sisters said entering the ing children and commerce since competition was a fun experience, her youngsters are home for summer vacation. The salsa has also made its way onto school grounds through promotions - by the children — and donations to school events.

Angela said one of her children has reached the point to where he can't live without the salsa. The family tradition hasn't taken a backseat to the business endeavor. Salsa is still made in the fall, and the young Plachta's and Ruggirello's now take part in making the snack.

"My 8-year-old son's diet literally consists of chips and the salsa," she said. "I'm not fabricat-

ing that at all." Both sisters are hoping the salsa becomes a part of many more people's diets. Angela said a homestyle salsa and Little Diablo chips are in the works. She said she's anticipating a fall release.

Angela also said they try to keep the salsa affordable — at \$3.99 a jar. She said the jar the salsa comes in, with the Little Diablo logo draped on front, is something that isn't fancy or con-

"We both want to make it big. but if we don't, we won't be disappointed," Angela said. "This is something that's fun for us."

# Dog bite case raises ordinance questions

#### Animal must be quarantined

With a young girl allegedly bitten in June at Community Dog Park at Five Mile and Beck roads, several residents have asked what the local ordinance states.

The township ordinance, which can be found on the township's Web site under Code Enforcement, says any person who owns or has control of a dog which bites a person or has been bitten by an animal with rabies, has been subjected to rabies or even just suspected of having rabies has to notify police and deliver the dog to a veterinarian.

At the owner's expense, a veterinarian will observe and examine the dog for rabies. The owner must also provide the veterinarian with all information pertaining to the health, actions, history and vaccinations of the

If the veterinarian determines the dog is not rabid, then the dog can be returned to the owner.

If the veterinarian determines that the dog does have rabies, the dog must be destroyed at the owner's cost.

#### Vet can order quarantine

If the veterinarian determines the dog may be afflicted with rabies but no positive final diagnosis is possible at the time, the veterinarian may order that the dog be held and establish a temporary quarantine to prevent the spread of the disease or to make a final diagnosis.

Chip Snider, township manager, said a 10-day confinement is state law. The Public Health Code contains the recommendation for confinement of dogs. cats and ferrets that bite humans, which is where the 10-day observation period is referenced.

Situations involving other species are reviewed on a caseby-case basis, said T. J. Bucholz, director of communications for the Michigan Department of Community Health in Lansing.

The cost of the quarantine

period is also the responsibility of the dog's owner.

The ordinance says that any dog delivered to the pound or veterinarian by a law enforcement officer suspected of biting any person, having been bitten by an animal or having contracted rabies shall be temporarily quarantined.

If the owner does not apply for the return of the dog and pay all fees and costs, the dog can be sold or destroyed.

The veterinarian must also forward a record of all dogs examined to the township, which the township must maintain for 90

On March 1, 2007, a new state law was passed regarding dog

HB4065 requires a person whose dog bites another person to remain on the scene and provide certain information and assistance or face criminal penal-



# Man charged with murder of woman in Garden City

■ Relatives sav he tried to help down-and-out; body found in Northville Twp.

A 62-year-old Garden City man has been charged with first-degree murder in the death of 44-year-old Cheryl Lynn Boeskool, also of Garden City.

Thomas Joseph Roe was arraigned before 35th District Judge John MacDonald Friday on a charged of killing Boeskool and then dumping her body in a retention pond at the Country Club Village condominium complex.

A not guilty plea was entered and a preliminary exam set for 8:30 a.m. Aug. 24. If convicted, he faces life in prison.

Roe is being held without bond in the Wayne County Jail.

Boeskool's body was found on Aug. 7 face down in the pond near the intersection of Six Mile and Haggerty roads by a passing motorist. Police believe Boeskool was killed in Garden City and transported to Northville Township. The Wayne County Medical Examiner has determined that she died of blunt force trauma to the head.

Northville Township detectives obtained a confession from Roe with the assistance of Garden City Police detectives. Police also found what they believe to be the murder weapon in the Garden City home.

"It was a cooperative effort," said Lt. Greg Rhodes of the Northville Township Police Department.

Roe was taken into custody on Wednesday evening along with another suspect, who has not been charged, but police believe may know something about Boeskool's

#### A romantic relationship

Rhodes said Roe and Boeskool had some sort of romantic relationship, and that she stayed at his Garden City home occasionally.

Roe grew up in the Northville community. A retired dry wall hanger, he attended Northville schools, according to his niece and his brother and sister-in-law, who were at the arraignment and asked not to be identified.

Boeskool's brother, Ronnie Short, and sister-in-law, April, also attended the arraignment.

It was the first time Short had seen Roe, but he knew that his sister had lived with him off and on, according to media reports.

#### 'She always came back to him'

"She always came back to him when she needed help, and he always helped her as best he could, even taking her to hospitals and stuff, which was good," Short told reporters following the hearing. 'Then it turned out tragic.'

Roe's relatives said he was a widower. His wife, Maxine, who needed a heart transplant, died in

They also described Roe as a church-going man who tried to assist down-and-out individuals in the Detroit area. They said Boeskool was homeless when he first met the woman a couple of

They also said that Boeskool had a drug problem and that when she got arrested, police would usually bring her back to Roe's resi-'The Lord told him to help her,

and he did," said Roe's brother, "but then he had to kick her out many times. He really is a good person' Both families agreed on Roe and

Boeskool's relationship, saying that she was troubled mentally and criminally, and Roe tried many times to help her.

April Short said her sister-in-law was "not mentally right."

"She was the type of person that if someone said go jump off of a bridge, she would," she told reporters. "She did not have the

mental capacity to know." The victim's relatives also wondered why a man who had tried to help her in the past could have brutally killed her and dumped her

half-naked body in a pond.

"She was made out to be a monster with her criminal past, but she's still a person," Ronnie Short said. "She had a heart and would do anything she could for somebody. This should have never hap-







#### ■ Novi eatery chosen to be in cookbook

When Shigeru Yamada opened Cherry Blossom 15 years ago, appealing to the business community and the residential population is what attracted him to Novi.

For Novi and Northville residents, the authentic atmosphere and traditional Japanese cuisine has been attracting them to Cherry Blossom for more than a decade.

"When you come into our restaurant, you can see Japanese gardens. Our restaurant is very authentic," Yamada said.

For these reasons, Cherry Blossom in Novi was chosen to be featured in a cookbook celebrating Michigan's finest cui-

"Being featured in this cookbook says you are one of the best, if not the best in the State," said Matt Sutherland, author of "Savor Michigan Cookbook: Michigan's Finest Restaurants Their Recipes and Their Histories.'

· After consulting with numerous chefs and wine distributors, the 35 restaurants Sutherland selected represent the superior quality of food Michigan has to

"Michigan is the second most agriculturally diverse state in the country," Sutherland said. "When you combine adventuresome farmers with adventuresome chefs, we come up with very interesting, fresh ingredients. The chefs let the natural flavor of the food come out, so the food stands out on its own."

Not only has Yamada appreciated Michigan for its fresh ingredients, but he said it has

increasingly become one of the most Japanese-populated areas in the United States.

"Since (the) Japanese population increased (from 15 years ago), vendors for Japanese food came to Michigan, as well," Yamada said. "It is easier for us to get fresh food."

The cookbook features four or five recipes from each restaurant, along with a profile and history of the restaurant.

"It's a nice, diverse list of recipes," Sutherland said. "I pushed them (the chefs) to do interesting stuff, not just cookie-cutter recipes."

Even though Yamada said it was difficult to choose only five recipes, the goal was to select signature dishes that represent the restaurant.

"Cherry Blossom is really the only true Japanese sushi place (in the cookbook)," Sutherland

Among the Cherry Blossom recipes chosen was the noodle dish Kamo Nabe Duck, one of Yamada's favorites, and Sakura (meaning Cherry Blossom) Roll, which is a salmon, yellowtail, tuna and avocado sushi.

Cherry Blossom in Novi isn't the only restaurant Shigeru Yamada owns, but it is his most lucrative.

"Novi does the best among three of the restaurants I have. Yamada said, in comparison with his other two restaurants Cherry Blossom in Ann Arbor and Cafe Sushi in Troy.

Although some chefs were hesitant to release their recipes, Yamada believes the cookbook will have a positive effect on

"Hopefully, more new clientele will try the Japanese food,"







The program nearly ended when HelpSource made the decision to close its doors in May. The nonprofit Ann Arbor-based agency had provided child and family services in Washtenaw and western Wayne counties for nearly 100 years.

At the beginning of the year, director Laurie Krause was notified the program would have to vacate the rented space at Riverside Park Church on Newburgh at Plymouth Road in Livonia. On May 1, she and the seniors moved into the Revival Outreach Center building, formerly the site of Our Lady of Providence. On July 1, the Revival Outreach Center church adopted the program primarily tailored for senior citizens who are not totally independent due to dementia, stroke or other diseases, and could benefit from structured, supervised activities up to five days a week. It is funded by the Senior Alliance (Area Agency on Aging), community development block grants from Livonia and Canton. 

# Money saved in the prescription revolution

Mary Zurkin knows money doesn't grow on trees.

And if it did, the 74-year-old Novi resident said she must have forgotten to plant the seeds in her backyard.

Living on a fixed budget. Zurkin said she must watch her spending closely, learning to shy away from some of the finer things in life.

"When you're a retired widow, depending on Social Security and the little amounts that come in here and there, you've got to be smart," she said. "I'd love to spend money on redecorating my home, but my health comes first."

Zurkin said she spends the majority of her monthly income on groceries, medication and household bills.

"I had a stroke three years ago and was put on several medications, which can be very expensive," she said. "Thank God for insurance, otherwise. I'd probably be dead."

Zurkin said she spends \$200 to \$300 a month on prescriptions, not including over-thecounter medications.

"I try to ask for generic drugs," she said. "It's cheaper and in my opinion, the same as getting the name brand prescriptions.

Like Zurkin, many people are asking their doctors to prescribe generic medications

instead of name brands. According to Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan, to help keep health care costs low without compromising quality, insurance company

#### Why go generic?

Dr. Chad Savage, of Park Internal Medicine affiliated with St. John Providence Hospital in Novi, said generic drugs are the way to go for the cost savings alone.

Generic drugs, according to the Federal Trade Commission, as a requirement by most state laws, are the equivalent to their name brand counterparts. Generics must have the same active ingredients, strengths and dosage in pill, liquid or injection form. They must also be therapeutically equivalent with the same chemical makeup and medical effect.

There has been a huge push in Michigan with people trying to switch over to generic drugs," Savage said. "Medical costs have been out of control. The amount of money continues to increase disproportionately to other industries.

"Insurance companies are trying to save money and one way to do that is to encourage people to use generic drugs whenever

Savage said many people think generic drugs are inferior to name-brand medications.

"I try to save my patients money when prescribing medications," he said. "In many

#### **Generic medications**

#### ■ What is a generic drug?

A generic drug is the same as a brand-name drug in dosage, safety, strength, quality, the way it works, the way it is taken and the way it should be used.

■ Are generic drugs as safe as brand-name drugs? Yes. The FDA says all drugs must work well and be safe. Generic drugs use the same active ingredients as brand-name drugs and work the same way. So they have the same risks and

benefits as the brand-name drugs. ■ Does every brand-name drug have a generic drug?

No. When new drugs are first made, they have drug patents. Most drug patents are protected for 17 years. The patent protects the company that made the drug first. The patent doesn't allow anyone else to make and sell the drug. When the patent expires, other drug companies can start selling the generic version of the drug. But, first, they must test the drug and the FDA must approve it.

#### ■ Why are generic drugs less expensive?

Creating a drug costs lots of money. Since generic drug makers do not develop a drug from scratch, the costs to bring the drug to market are less. But they must show that their product performs in the same way as the brand-name drug. The FDA approves all generic drugs.

#### ■ What is the best source of information about generic drugs?

Contact your doctor, pharmacist or other health care worker for information on your generic drugs.

#### A generic revolution

Tony Hassan, pharmacist at St. John Pharmacy at Providence Hospital in Novi. said drugs become generic once the patent on a name brand has expired.

'Many of the major manufacturers are having their own generic drugs to compete with

the market of other competing companies," Hassan said. "If a company lost their patent, they would have their own generics drugs. It's a win-win for the major companies trying to capture the generic market, too."

Hassan said not only are generics good for manufacturers, but also for insurance companies and the consumers.

"It's a great way to cut down on the spiraling health care costs in this country," he said. "Now-a-days, people are asking for generics where years ago they would shy away from them."

Hassan said he's been in the pharmaceutical business since 1974 and has seen times with no generics, the introduction of generic drugs, and the revolution.

"Everyone is coming around to generics, from the younger generations to the seniors," he

"I've been around a long time from when we have to convince doctors it was OK to use generics. We had to call doctors and let them know that certain drugs had generics, because many did not know."

Hassan said today, most pharmacies fill prescriptions in generic medications unless notified by a doctor or patient to do otherwise.

#### Saving seniors

Christine Marks, Erickson Advantage manager at Fox Run in Novi, said picking up a generic medication is a better way to stretch your dollar further.

"Especially when it comes to a Medicare Part D plan," Marks said. "Every Medicare Part D plan has a doughnut hole in the amount of coverage allowed.

"Once you reach that doughnut hole, you're responsible for paying for your medication until you've reached the other side and covered once again." Marks said using generic


drugs for seniors is a cheaper way to get more medication and not reach that doughnut hole. 'Seniors should really discuss


with their doctors if generics are an option," she said. "Brand name drugs will eat up that initial coverage very quickly." Zurkin said more people


should ask for generic medications and not be so concerned about name brands. "I've been using generics for years and I'm still alive," she



# LAID OFF: Return of teachers hinges on many factors

■ Student enrollment, perpupil allotment both factors

By Jason Carmel Davis STAFF WRITER

"We're not in the business of laying anyone off," Northville School District Superintendent DR. Leonard Rezmierski said. "This is the first time in 15-plus years that we've laid off anyone."

Due to cutbacks, 10 teachers in the Northville district were laid off at the end of the 2006-07 school year. What could aid in the possible return of those teachers to their jobs is the enrollment of new students throughout the district.

Northville officials say the district has budgeted for 80 new students to enter the district when school begins Tuesday, Sept. 4. With a current per-pupit allotment of \$8,435, those new bodies could bring an additional \$674,800 into

Although the district has bud-geted for 80 students, Rezmierski said a soft projection of 126 has been made. However, that number must be validated by building principals, Rezmierski said, adding the ultimate validation comes when the students are in the classroom

If that "soft projection" proves to be accurate, the district could see an additional \$1.06 million. That additional funding could assist in the possible return of those 10 displaced teachers.

"It's disappointing any time you have to lay off anyone because we

need staff at al levels to sustain how our district operates," Rezmierski said. "But with people leaving the state, and the way the housing market is, those things, and other factors make things difficult for schools."

District Human Resource Director Don Thomas said district officials remain cautiously optimistic about the return of the staffers. He said the district should have accounting information in hand by mid-August that will help in determining if those teachers will be called back to work.

Another factor that could play a

role in the proceedings is any decrease in the district per-pupil allotment that comes from the

"If we do add 126 students, but we lose \$100 a student, that negates our foundation allowance," Rezmierski said. "We budgeted for no increase or decrease from the state. We'll really find out the numbers on (Count Day)."

Count Day takes place twice each school year: on Sept. 26, and in early February of the 2007-08 school year. The number of students present on both days determines the amount of state funding

per pupil. Seventy-five percent of the funding comes from the September count, while the remaining quarter comes from the February numbers.

Students must be enrolled on or before count day, meet state age requirements, have identity and age verified by their school district, proof of residency, class schedule and be in attendance all day on the specified day.

# Tentative goals released for 07-08 school year

Northville Public School District Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski has five areas he would like to focus on during the upcoming school year.

Rezmierski relayed those goals to the district board of education during its regular meeting Tuesday night. Although each goal is an in depth one, they are not set in stone. the superintendent said.

District goals for the 2007-08 school year include deciding on going to a November date for future board of education elections, as opposed to a May date.

District officials will discuss the pros and cons and value to the district of seating a board member in January in any given year instead of November. The change would also call for the extension of the terms of Board President Joan Wadsworth and Trustee Judith Wollack through Dec. 30, 2008.

Northville officials would have to apply for a change no later than this lovember, and the change would save the district about \$17,000.

This is a legal issue that needs to be made clear," Rezmierski told the board. "If this is to be a goal, we'll need to discuss it further."

Another goal discussed by Rezmierski is the establishment of a Citizen/Staff Committee by September to propose recommendations for any needed Northville High School additions or adaptations, which is due to potential student growth by 2011 or 2012.

Rezmierski said this is crucial since projections show the popula-tion of Northville High School students to be in off-site locations, meaning they wouldn't be in the high school five days a week.

A third goal for the upcoming school year is the establishment of a Citizens/Staff Committee to review high school and middle school pro-

This group would review the present Block Schedule at Northville High and the middle school day, along with reviewing comparable programs in neighboring districts and other states. A report would be given to the board by January 2008.

Northville staffers want to review and implement all cost savings and containment programs and measures this year, too.

District officials would like to employ an Energy Savings report and give recommendations to the board, with action steps established.

The final goal outlined by Rezmierski is the consideration of requesting a Capital Improvement Bond Election in Northville. Officials will review new legislation on sinking funds and provide detailed change analysis of district needs for this type of capital improvement bond.

Rezmierski said each plan is designed to be a part of a larger goal.

'All of these things lead to student learning," he said. "That's our number one goal."

Board President Joan Wadsworth said although the process is in the early stages, each is a good way to save money and time without taking the focus off the classroom.





### Board approves energy-saving measure Savings over next 7 years will average more than-\$500,000

After a number of attempts at lowering energy costs in house, the Northville Public School District Board of Education Tuesday night unanimously, 7-0, entered into an agreement with energy management consult ing firm that will net the district \$3.5 million in energy cost savings over the next seven years.

Dallas-based Energy Education, Inc. will aid the district in curbing natural gas, electricity, and water costs, which have increased greatly since the 1999-2000 school year. The district will pay the company about \$15,000/month for the next four

years. If the estimated yearly savings isn't realized, the company will write Northville Public Schools a check for the difference each year the contract is in place, according to Energy Education, Inc. Division President Michael Betar.

The district will also employ a part-time energy educator/manager, with an estimated salary range of \$22,000-\$25,000 a year. Betar said the program should be up-and-running by October.

"It's been our goal for the last three years to make improvements with our energy costs," Bolitho, assistant superintendent of administrative services. "We've tried to do it ourselves, and we were close, but we never fully realized our savings. I think we can expect a significant savings with a partnership with (Energy Education, Inc.)."

Walled Lake, in cutting their Northville energy costs. Superintendent Leonard Rezmierski said he contacted leaders in some of those districts - all of which realized a large savings by working with Energy Education.

In an effort to cut costs, Northville administrators implemented a two-year initiative that was supported by joint project divisions that would have cut energy costs, Bolitho said. He added the district fell just short of its goal.


new lighting system, Bolitho said. If there is no movement in a room after about 10 minutes, the system shuts off.

# Veteran's flags fly proud at Crossing

From the time he was a boy, World War II veteran John Reiff has had a love affair with the American Flag. Reiff, who served in the 302nd Combat Engineers Company in the Pacific Theater, recalls walking to school through a small business neighborhood and watching as shopkeepers put out the flag for display. They did this daily. He also recalls that on Flag Day, his neighborhood was a riot of color with American Flags on display at all homes. In his classroom, the Pledge of Allegiance was not just a routine occurrence but was explained by the teacher as to why they recited this pledge each and every day. From these experiences, Reiff internalized a love for the flag and an enduring appreciation for what our flag represents. He continues that dedication and appreciation to this day.

Fondly referred to as "The Flag Man" by residents of Northville Crossing Manufactured Home Community, where he has live

Community, where he has lived for five years, Reiff's respect for

the flag, and what it represents, is obvious. Adoming the bridge that connects the two sections of the community are more than 150 American flags: one for each Michigan soldier that has died in the Middle East conflicts. Reiff explained that each month, the VFW in Redford sends him the names of Michigan soldiers killed in conflict. For each one, an American Flag is displayed.

He said the best months are the ones where no names are sent to him.

Reiff began his active work on behalf of Old Glory one Flag Day many years ago. His daughter had a friend visiting who asked him why so many flags were being flown in his neighborhood. He realized the young lady had no knowledge of Flag Day and what it represents. He decided to change that. He put together a presentation about Flag Day and the American Flag, and over a period of time visited every school in Redford explaining to students how our flag came to be and what Flag Day represents.

Reiti's friends and neighbors often contribute money to help purchase his flags. Recently, one resident presented him with five dozen flags to help in his effort. And his display of flags on the bridge sometimes receives unique acknowledgement. This Memorial Day, four restored World War II planes that had done a flyover in Milford, flew over his house. Reiff's wife Virginia watched as they flew over, slowly turned and came back low over the bridge. As they passed, all four tipped their wings in salute to the flags. She said it was one of the most amazing things she had ever seen.

When asked what the flag really means to him, Reiff

replied, "It's just a piece of cloth, but it has represented our country for over 200 years. The flag reminds me of the freedom, opportunity and privilege we all enjoy living in the United States. I believe that each and every one of us should revere the flag and look at it with the highest respect." Reiff shows his respect by taking the flags down every 10 days and inspecting them to assure they are still in good condition.

As he said, the flags must never be displayed in a manner that restricts their furl. For this reason, all of his flags fly freely and proudly as a symbol of one man's dedication and respect for the Red, White and Blue.

# Hunger has no season in Michigan

It stands to reason that more of us think about the poor, hungry and homeless during the holiday seasons of Thanksgiving and Christmas. Certainly as the frigid temperatures of winter come around, the necessity to help those less fortunate comes to mind as we overindulge in holiday meals and snuggle in our cozy, warm homes.

While the temperature is warmer now, our thoughts do not readily focus on the homeless and hungry among us. The needs of the poor do not disappear just because it is warm.

I believe it is our moral duty to help our fellow human beings here at home and around the world. Many help by writing checks for children in developing Asian, South American and African nations, while others give their time and energy to help alleviate hunger. Far too many simply look the other way.

Yet, right here in the middle of our beautiful Michigan summer, we have men, women and children going hungry.

A Food Bank Council of Michigan report identified a 37percent gap between meals provided and meals needed. You heard me right. No, this is not a statistic from Africa, or poor Caribbean Islands, this is Michigan in 2007. The Michigan food bank estimates that approximately 10 percent of Michigan's population, or one multion people, are using emergency food programs such as community food banks. "Do they need the free food," you ask? Would you stand in line at the local "soup kitchen," with all the indignity it offers, if you and your kids were not hungry?

### As Michigan's economy tumbles, people go hungry

The continued downturn in the Michigan economy is taking its toll on many families across our state. The unemployment rate exceeds 7 percent, twice the national average. The stereotype of a "wino" or uneducated drug addict does not paint the tapestry of the hungry and homeless who make up the people in need in our state. It is estimated that more than I million Michigan residents are enrolled in the federal food stamp program. If trends continue, soon there will be twice as many people using food stamps as there were in 2001. These are not simply

"hunger statistics;" these are someone's mother, father, sister, brother, son or daughter that do not have enough food to eat and, for

many, a decent place to call home.

As you read this, I want you to imagine the pain you would feel if your child had to go to bed hungry tonight. Imagine what it's like to be an 8-year-old girl who cries inconsolably on a Friday morning at school because she realizes it's a half-day of school and she won't get to eat lunch. There is no food at home. What does she and her family do until Monday? Worse yet, what does she do during the long, hot summer? This is not make-believe for far too many children in our state and nation.

Doing right by the hungry is what the Food Bank Council of Michigan is all about. This statewide, nonprofit organization provides leadership to food banks in their efforts to alleviate hunger through the distribution of surplus food to those in need.







"The fans here are absolutely crazy," Langston said. "There is a small niche for American football that is growing "The 5-8000 fans we do bring in, they live and die


with us. They bring whistles and noise makers. They are pretty much Meijer brand soccer hooligans." Adjusting to the new league as far as playing was

# How to avoid Dehydration

ost of us have been told to drink more water since we were small children, and most of us have filed this suggestion neatly in the back of our minds with all the other seemingly non-significant sugges-

tions. You know ... eat more veggies, cut back on caffeine, walk more etc. With the warmer, humid summer weather

you may want to re-visit the "drink more water" idea. Dehydration is a real threat and can cause some real problems.

1. Some studies suggest 75 percent of Americans are chronically dehydrated.

2. 37 percent of Americans have their thirst mechanism so weak that it is often mistaken for hunger.

3. Even mild dehydration will slow down you metabolism as much as 3 percent. 4. Lack for water is the number

#### Pre-activity guidelines

 Drink approximately 16 ounces of fluid two hours before activity, and an additional 8-16

ounces 30-60 minutes prior to training on warm and/or humid

· Water may be adequate for activities less than an hour.

• If you are participating in endurance events, repeated bouts of exercise greater than 60 minutes, or multiple practices a day, a sports drink containing 6-8 percent carbohydrate (e.g. Gatorade) is recommended.

#### **During activity**

· Depending on your sport, consame 6-12 ounces of water or sports drink every 15-20 minutes. This equates to approximately 32 ounces per hour.

 For prolonged exercise greater than 4 hours, choose a sports drink with small amounts of electrolytes.

#### Post-activity guidelines

· Immediately following activity, consume at least 16 ounces of fluid for every pound of weight lost to ensure proper rehydration.

 A liquid shake with high carbohydrate content, minimal protein and fat can maximize recovery if muscle glycogen levels have been depleted.

 Drink an additional 16 ounces with your post workout snack and/or meal.

· Weigh yourself each morning. A stable weight generally indicates proper fluid balance.



With tongs, remove turkey as each slice is done, allowing any excess oil to drain back into skillet; place on several thicknesses of paper towels. Repeat with remaining turkey slices.

Stir in tornatoes. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat; simmer about 5 minutes or until mixture thickens. Add spinach; toss until wilted. Pour mixture into bowl with other vegetables; stir until cooled slightly. Add basil and cheese; toss until well mixed. Serve warm or at room temperature.



heryl Sulek has one goal in mind for the hundreds of students enrolled in her dance classes at Sheryl's School of Dance in Novi: to teach people how to set goals and attain them through the disciplines

Many of her former students have gone on to successful careers in all walks of life and Sheryl is proud to know that the lessons they learned through instruction by her experienced staff have played a big role in their lives.

"Dancing is good training for the future," said Sheryl. "It gives you focus on your goals and your achievements. iance isn'i necessamiv a It is all about attaining goals."


In fact, Sheryl does not encourage students to go on to college and pursue a dance career. It is important to her that young people attain their scholastic goals and then make career choices.

Students of all ages, from 3 to adult, are encouraged to choose from several different disciplines and what level of involvement they want. 







ground."

Curbing is an elegant, yet heavy-duty, method of edging landscapes, flower beds, gardens, trees, walkways and drives. Unlike plastic edging or timber, curbing does not allow weeds or grass to infiltrate a planting bed, and likewise does not allow beds or mulch to creep onto the lawn.

It not only gives a clean and neat appearance to a landscape, but keeps the landscape from coloring outside the lines.

Although new to Michigan, landscape curbing is popular in many states and in Canada, where it has brought dimension and infused style into tired landscapes with little upheaval to the homeowner or the pocketbook.

Traditional edging has met its match with curbing. Curbing does not move. It does not pop up out of the ground nor allow itself to be pushed around or infiltrated by grass or weeds. Weather doesn't faze it.

"We experimented with curbing for three years before being confident it would stand up to Michigan winters," said Ron Jackson of Jackson Landscape Solutions. "We have talked to installers in Minnesota who have been using this particular product for several years just to be sure. We are very confident about this product for Michigan landscapes."

Because of the material and installation method used, curbing can follow any shape desired for a border. The mortar and fiber mesh material can be permanently dyed in a multitude of colors, can be stamped to resemble many finishes such as brick or stone, and will withstand all types of weather. The curbing allows your lawn mower to ride on the edge to provide a clean cut.

The curbing is installed by an extruding machine into a 8-to 10-inch-wide trench that is a few inches deep. Expansion cuts are made to allow the inevitable expanding and contracting from outdoor temperature changes. The material is then trowel-finished and sprayed with sealer. The front side of the curbing is flush with the lawn while the back has a higher edge, which keeps soil, bark and other materials in their place.

"If a homeowner wants to have a finish coat reapplied to it in a few years to give it a

fresh look, we can do that or the homeowner can, but otherwise curbing is maintenance-free," Jackson said. "It will not rust, will not rot, will not shift, and there are no seams for weeds to grow through."

For the look and performance, curbing is very economical, according to Jackson. "Curbing starts at \$6 a foot," he said. "A traditional brick border will run two to three times more."

Curbing is also an economical choice for homeowners faced with a tired-looking land-

"With curbing we can make the landscape look new again by trimming things up without making it completely over," said Jackson.

A little trimming, remulching and new curbing perks up the look, framing the land-scape and bringing out the house's features.







Gustafson's D&G story is an interesting one to tell and its future course is evident in the vitality and strength of each and every one of his retail stores.


